ABE GIBRON . . . *The New Head Coach*

Abe Gibron became the new head coach of the Bears last January 27 and that started only the sixth different coaching regime in team history.

The point is an important one because founder-owner George S. Halas (himself head coach a total of forty seasons split into four separate tenures of ten years each) maintained tradition.

Changes in leadership have been rare and every head man except Ralph Jones has had a Bears' background.

Abe takes over on a multi-year contract of unannounced duration.

He is steeped in Bears' tradition—nine years service with them in all, the last seven as an assistant coach and two seasons (1958-'59) as offensive guard and co-captain.

He is of and for the immediate Chicago area—born Sept. 22, 1925 at Michigan City, Ind., a comparatively brief travel piece down the expressway. That also is his permanent, year-around home with wife Susie; sons William Abraham, 11; and James Kahlil, 5; and daughter, Matina Frances, 9.

He is a football career man and a rugged fundamentalist whose coaching inauguration comment was:

"... twenty-three years and over a thousand head-on blocks, and I'm finally a head coach so I don't propose to blow this shot."

Gibron's playing and coaching experiences made him an outstanding, colorful but young-at-heart personality for nearly a quarter of a century. Roughly, in the Gibron manner, he lettered at, and graduated from Purdue . . . turned pro with Buffalo of the old-All-American conference in 1949 . . . spent seven seasons with the Cleveland Browns . . . the last three games of 1956 and all of 1957 with the Philadelphia Eagles and then the Bears.

He was all-NFL offensive guard three times and played in five Pro Bowl contests.

As an assistant, Abe went first to the Washington Redskins for five seasons beginning in 1960 but returned to the Bears in 1965—first three years coaching the offensive line, next four the defensive forwards. His first year, with the help of the Gibron-coached offensive line, the Bears broke their own team scoring record with 409 points.

And now the man in charge at last, he is very aware where improvement is needed most desperately. It's obvious—an offense that produced only 185 points last season. From 1966 through 1971, the Bears have totaled 1,374 points, averaging 229 a season or slightly over sixteen a

game. The scoring song paused after 1965 and the malady lingered on.

Abe got his personal competitive philosophy across this spring in one three-day session involving the drafted players and signed free agents and another over a four-day period that brought in the veterans. Simply, it is:

"We have to restore the Bears reputation as a physical team. We have to get back that overpowering urge to want to win more than anything else. All I ask for are forty guys who want to play football—and not be just specialists or spectators. If I can't get forty, I'll take thirty and if I can't get thirty, I'll take twenty or twenty-five and ask 'em to go both ways."

He brings some rather old fashioned notions to his job—that the right to play, for instance, is not a gift but must be earned. Or that all-out team effort means offense and defense players should be well enough acquainted with the assignments of each other that they can be interchangeable in certain down-and-yardage situations.

In the pages that follow are biographies of the 1972 training camp Bears . . . a complete roster . . . tentative depth charts, all relating to the immediate future. There also are biographies of key staff personnel, particularly the assistants selected by Abe who counsels with them constantly on evaluation of talent and day-to-day planning.

Emphasis all winter and spring has been on a competitive situation that's wide open, in line with the theory that a job must be won in training camp and through the preseason schedule. And after that, in the heat of NFL competition, it must be held against the challenges of others.

Last year's Bears rode high in a competitive position that lasted through mid-November. They wrote two contrasting stories, the first an exciting series of winning adventures that amazed everyone and the other a disastrous finishing skid.

They were 5-2 at the halfway point but only 1-6 for the second half of a schedule that called for something considerably short of pleasureable, light weekly exercises.

Their eleven opponents included both Super Bowl principals, champion Dallas and Miami . . . NFC runnerup San Francisco plus semifinal playoff principals Minnesota and Washington.

Four of the Bears' wins came on fourth quarter rallies and a fifth (over Dallas) occurred despite the Cowboys' edge statistically. Only the 35-14 disposal of New Orleans was easy.

The team statistics probably tell better than any game-by-game narration what happened for the yardage totals were low. In five of the eight losses the Bears were unable to score a touchdown.

Gibron lived in the thick of all that through 1971 and he doesn't need to read the details in this book. In fact, he went to work on his assignment the day after he was moved up from the ranks.

The Staff

EDMUND "ZEKE" BRATKOWSKI returns to the Bears for whom he played five seasons after being a second round draft choice as a future in 1953. Since 1963, he has been with the Green Bay Packers, as backup quarterback to Bart Starr through 1968; then two years as backfield coach and, in 1971, active again as a player. With the Bears, he played in 1954, went into the Army for two years, then got in four more seasons (1957-'60) before he was traded with Erich Barnes to Los Angeles for Bill Wade in 1961. He remained with the Rams in 1961, 1962 and early 1963 before he was sold to Green Bay. In fourteen NFL seasons, he completed 762 passes out of 1,484 attempts for 10,291 yards and 65 touchdowns. He's a native of Danville, Ill., who attended the University of Georgia and, as a senior, led the NCAA in punting. Bratkowski and his wife, Mary Elizabeth, have two sons, Bobby, 16; and Steve, 12; and a daughter, Cassie, 10.

CHARLES "CHUCK" CHERUNDOLO was on the Bears' staff (1966-'68) after having been assistant with Pittsburgh Steelers, 1948-'61; Philadelphia Eagles, 1962-'63; and Washington Redskins, 1964-'65. Since leaving the Bears, he was head coach of the Tri-City Apollos (Midland, Mich.) of the Continental League in 1969 and the past two years, has been scout for the Quadra scouting combine which functions for Dallas, Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Diego. Cherundolo's home since 1970 was Falls Church, Virginia. He and his wife, Margaret, are parents of a son, John, now in law school after graduating from Syracuse where he lettered in football; and a daughter, Mary Pat. Chuck was an all-American center at Penn State. Between 1937-1948, he played for the Cleveland Rams, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh of the NFL with four years (1942-1945) in the U.S. Navy.

WILLIAM "WHITEY" DOVELL, (pronounced: Doe-Vell) was on the Denver Broncos coaching staff the past five seasons, following fifteen years as an assistant at the University of Maryland where he played varsity football under coach Jim Tatum. As an offensive guard, he appeared

in the Gator Bowl twice and the Sugar Bowl once. Upon graduation, he became freshman coach for three years. In 1955, Dovell moved up to the varsity where in twelve seasons, he coached receivers, both offensive and defensive lines and linebackers at various times. Twenty-two of his players went into professional football. He is a native of Newark, N. J., who interrupted his high school education there in 1944 when he enlisted in the Seabees and served until 1946. Dovell and his wife, Claire, have three daughters, Audrey, 13; Patricia, 11; and Lisa, 9.

BILL GEORGE, first of the assistant coaches to be signed this year by Abe Gibron, was with the Bears fourteen seasons (1952-'65) and was all-NFL linebacker eight times. He played on two Western Division championship teams, 1956 and 1963, the second of which defeated the New York Giants for the world title. Bill ended his playing career in 1966 with the Los Angeles Rams. For his NFL career, he had eighteen pass interceptions for 144 yards return and as a place kicker in 1954, he booted four field goals and thirteen extra points. Since his retirement, he has been head of an industrial supplies firm. A native of Waynesburg, Pa., he was all-American tackle at Wake Forest College, and was the Bears no. 2 draft choice as a future in 1951. He and his wife, Lucy, now live in South Barrington with their son, Vince, nicknamed "Biff", who is 12 years old; and two daughters, Cindy, 10; and Jennifer, 3.

PERRY MOSS was rehired for 1972, his third year with the Bears. As an all-America quarterback at Illinois, he led the 1946 Big Ten champions to a Rose Bowl victory. After graduation, he played one year with the Green Bay Packers but then went into coaching. Collegiate assignments included a dual responsibility as athletic director and head coach at Florida State and head coach at Marshall University, Huntington, W. Va., for two years before coming to the Bears in 1970. In professional football, Moss was head-coach and general manager three years with the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian League as well as head coach two seasons each at Charleston and Orlando of the Continental League. He and his wife, Jeannette, live in Park Ridge with their two children, Les, 5; and Penny Lee, 2.

Assistant to President . . . Player Personnel Director



WALSTON

BOBBY WALSTON is in his second year of responsibility in a dual role—assistant to the president of the Bears, a position to which he was named last year, and also director of player personnel. He held the latter position since 1968. Walston's concern is in the area of playing personnel, from procurement of talent in the college draft, trades with other NFL teams or acquisition of players by waivers to the signing of all veterans. He is one of pro football's all-time great place kickers who had eighty field goals and 365 conversions with the Philadelphia Eagles (1951-'62) and also caught 46 touchdown passes as an

end. After retirement as a player, Walston was player personnel director two years at Philadelphia and then was kicking and pass receiver coach at Miami for two seasons. He was an all-American at the University of Georgia. Walston and his wife, Neil, live in Schaumburg, Ill. and are parents of a daughter, Bobbie, 19; and two sons, Mark, 16; and Michael, 13.



Director of Technical Research



JOHNSOS

LUKE JOHNSOS is dean of them all in continuity of service with the Bears. He has been a key figure in the organization, as player or coach and now as director of technical research, since 1929. He had graduated from Northwestern in June of that year, joined the Bears that fall and was a regular end through 1936. Luke was appointed to the coaching staff and had one tenure (1942-'45) as co-head coach. He became director of technical research in 1969. As player or coach, Luke has figured in seven of the Bears' eight championships. At Northwestern, where he was a three-year regular end, he also lettered in base-

ball. In 1929, before deciding to go into professional football, Luke had a tryout with the Cincinnati Reds. His home is in Evanston and he and his wife, Rosemary, are parents of one son, Luke, Jr., of Deerfield; and four daughters, Judy (Mrs. John Wolford of River Forest); Janet (Mrs. Dean Traflet of La Grange Park); Barbara (Mrs. Brian Kocher of Minneapolis); and Ann (Mrs. Gary Smith of Kansas City). They also have eleven grandchildren.

Director of Professional Talent

ED CODY is in his second year as director of professional talent for the Bears, following six straight seasons as offensive backfield coach. He first was associated with the team in 1949 as an offensive back and linebacker on defense. Cody earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Purdue where he also was football captain and Big Ten scoring and ground gaining leader. His pro playing career began with the Green Bay Packers and later, his coaching career included the assignment of defensive coach of the Oakland Raiders as well as collegiate positions at University of California, Santa Barbara; and Washington State. Ed and his wife, Mickey, have three daughters, Chris, 19; Kim, 13; and Tracey, 11.

Director of Training Services

ED ROZY rounds out a quarter of a century with the Bears this year, his second as director of training services. He was named to that position in 1971. He was the longest service active trainer in the NFL until he assumed his new responsibilities, coming to the Bears after four years as a U.S. Navy lieutenant (1944-'47). Rozy previously had been intramural director of athletics, head trainer of all major sports and coach of half a dozen minor sports teams at Marquette. Rozy had lettered in football at the Milwaukee university from which he graduated in 1933. Ed lives in Niles and he and his wife, Jo, are the parents of two daughters, Mary 21; and Julie, 19.

Head Trainer

BERNIE LAREAU became head trainer in 1971 after working as associate trainer with Ed Rozy, his long-time mentor, in 1970. He had been cast in the dual role of business manager and trainer of the Indiana Pacers of the ABA until returning to the Bears with whom he got his start. Lareau, graduate of St. Joseph's College at the Bears' Rensselaer, Ind., training base, first became acquainted with Rozy in the summer of 1957. A year later, he was named assistant of the Bears and upon his graduation in 1961, he became the college's first full-time trainer for six years.

LIONEL ANTOINE T 6'6" 255 So. Illinois 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1972, D-1a Born: 8-31-'50, Biloxi, Miss.

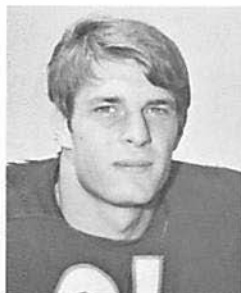
Antoine was third collegian in the nation to be chosen in the NFL player draft and the first of the Bears' two first round choices. (The Bears traded Bob Hyland and Bennie McRae to the New York Giants in September, 1971 to get that pick). Antoine is figured on at offensive tackle as a pro although he also saw service at tight end on offense and was used at both end and tackle on defense at Southern Illinois. His coach, Dick Tower, pointed out that while Antoine blocked 75 percent of the time at tight end, his career pass receiving record shows 53 for 730 yards and four touchdowns. He has been an outsized athlete as long as he can remember and at 13, he was barred from Little League Football because he was 6'1" and 150 pounds. Home: Carbondale, Ill.

ROSS BRUPBACHER LB 6'3" 215 Texas A&M 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1970, D-6 Born: 4-7-'48, Lafayette, La.

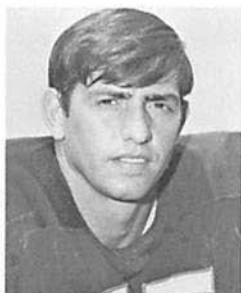
Brupbacher, whose two interceptions as a rookie set up touchdowns against Baltimore and New Orleans, scored one on his own last season when he was a starter. It was a 30-yard return of a recovered fumble in the opener against Pittsburgh and the first of two scores in the Bears' comeback for a win. During his second year, Brupbacher also intercepted two passes, recovered three fumbles and caused three others. He also ranked fifth in tackles, 61, plus 50 assists. Home: Lafayette.

DOUG BUFFONE LB 6'3" 230 Louisville 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1966, D-4 Born: 4-27-'44, Yatesboro, Pa.

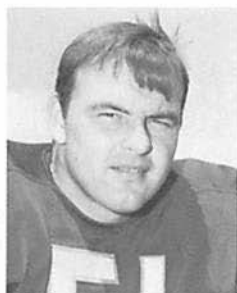
Buffone, starter at left linebacker since 1967, has a sparkling career record that includes a dozen interceptions and, for five full seasons at the job, 356 tackles and 258 assists. In 1970, his four interceptions were the most ever by any Bears' outside linebacker while his 90 assists on tackles were high for the team. In his first year as a starter (1967) he broke into the scoring statistics by recovering a Detroit Lions fumble and going for a touchdown. This past June, he was the Bear's player representative at the President's Commission on Drug Abuse Conference held in Washington. Doug also conducted a summer football school at North Central College, Naperville, Ill. Home: Deerfield, Ill.

DICK BUTKUS LB 6'3" 245 Illinois
Joined Bears: 1965, D-1

8th Season
Born: 12-9-'42

Butkus has been a starter in seven consecutive Pro Bowl All Star contests and his career statistics with the Bears provide some credentials, as though any were needed. His twenty recoveries of opponent fumbles are two away from the NFL record of twenty-two shared by ex-Bear Joe Fortunato and ex-Giant Andy Robustelli. He has intercepted nineteen passes for 150 yards return and returned eleven kickoffs 105. He has 850 tackles and 379 assists and even is in the scoring category—the important catch of a Bobby Douglass pass in the end zone that was the conversion deciding last year's 16-15 win over Washington and a safety scored against Pittsburgh in 1969. Despite offseason knee surgery for reconstruction of loose ligaments, he still was a defensive terror though at slightly diminished speed in 1971. That ligament condition had been with him for fourteen years, but without loss of playing time. In 1971, he led in tackles and assists, 117-68; recovered three enemy fumbles and caused three. Home: Chicago Heights.

JIM CADILE G 6'3" 250 San Jose State
Joined Bears: 1962, D-4

11th Season
Born: 7-16-'40, San Jose, Cal.

Cadile's durability as one of the NFL's fine pulling guards is evidenced by the fact that he has been in 122 of 140 games since joining the Bears. Most of the games he missed, because of injuries, came in two seasons, his rookie year of 1962 when he was out of nine and 1967 when he didn't play in four. The past four years, he has logged 3,216 offensive plays—801 last season; 673 in 1970; 870 in 1969 and 872 in 1968. He's known around the league as "the quiet man," entirely for his off-field manner because physically, he's most eloquent. Cadile was a back-up guard on the Bears' 1963 champions. Home: San Jose.

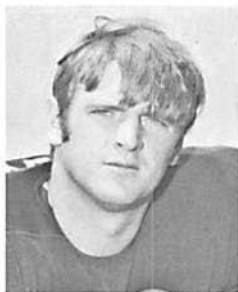
CRAIG CLEMONS DB 5'11" 187 Iowa

Clemons, the Bears other first round draft choice, had an impressive

career record at Iowa—182 solo tackles (ten for opponents' 37 yards loss) 79 tackle assists; sixteen touchdown saves; 21 pass deflections; and one blocked kick. He also intercepted nine passes, returned 31 punts for 9.6 average and the same number of kickoffs for 24.1. As a senior, he was even used briefly at tailback and Iowa coach Frank Lauterbur commented: "He can play any skill position." Home: Piqua, O.

RICH COADY C 6'3" 245 Memphis St.
Joined Bears: 1968, D-11

3rd Season
Born: 12-17-'44

This will be Coady's second year as center, a position he took over as starter when Bob Hyland was traded to the New York Giants just before the opening of the 1971 campaign. He had been back-up center, as well as tight end, in 1970 upon his return from one year in the Army reserve. As an end, he caught six passes, one for a touchdown. Coady saw no action at all at center in the 1971 pre-season but in the NFL schedule, he was in 834 plays. He is a graduate of Chicago's Taft high school. Home: Park Ridge.

JEFF CURCHIN T 6'6" 255 Florida St.
Joined Bears: 1970, D-6

3rd Season
Born: 12-17-'47, Binghamton, N.Y.

Curchin has been a reserve offensive tackle in his two seasons with the Bears. Although used but sparingly, he got in enough playing time to develop and supplement his quickness, size and agility with experience. Home: Park Ridge.

LAVERNE DICKINSON DB 5'11" 183 Southern U. 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1972, D-17 **Born: 12-12-'49, Rochester, N.Y.**

Dickinson transferred to Southern after two years at Wyoming and as a senior, he had three interceptions and led the secondary in tackling. He has been timed in :04.7 for the forty and at Bishop Kearney high school in Rochester, N. Y., he was rated one of the top prep players in the east. Home: Rochester.

PAUL DICKSON DT 6'5" 255 Baylor 14th Season
Joined Bears: 1972, W-Cardinals Born: 2-26-'37, Waco, Tex.

Dickson, Los Angeles Rams' no. 1 draft choice for 1959, has been with the Cleveland Browns, Dallas Cowboys, Minnesota Vikings and St. Louis Cardinals since. Most of his playing time (1961 through 1970) has been with the Vikings. Last season, he was a backup defensive lineman for the Cardinals. Home: Bloomington, Minn.

BOBBY DOUGLASS QB 6'4" 225 Kansas 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1969, D-2 Born: 6-22-'47, Manhattan, Kan.

Douglass won three (Detroit, Dallas and Washington) and lost one (Green Bay) in four consecutive starts last year that constituted his best show of consistency yet as a Bear. Over that stretch, the big left hander completed 55 out of 110 passes for 706 yards, four touchdowns; and had run 25 for 133 and three touchdowns to bring the Bears to 6-3 when he lost his winning touch. As a rookie, he got into nine games, starting six, and pitched a 38-7 win over Pittsburgh. On Nov. 22, 1970, he threw four touchdown passes against Buffalo, three of them after he had suffered a fractured wrist early in the game, and won, 31-13. He's a strong running quarterback who has averaged 7.36 yards rushing. Home: Chicago.

GEORGE FARMER WR 6'4" 214 UCLA 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1970, D-3 Born: 4-19-'48, Chattanooga, Tenn.

Farmer, who led the Bears in pass receiving last season, has a modest string of catches alive—eighteen straight games in which he has caught at least one pass in each. That's all fourteen in 1971 and the final four of 1970. Last season, his most significant single game was the 28-23 win over Detroit when his six for 95 included a 54-yard touchdown reception. He also had seven for 128 in the season finale against Minnesota. Farmer, reserve on UCLA's 1968-'69 NCAA basketball champions, lettered three years in football with fifty pass receptions for 885 yards

as well as 148 yards rushing on 26 tries, mostly the wingback reverse.

JIM FASSEL QB 6'1" 210 Long Beach St. 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1972, D-7a Born: 8-31-'49, Anaheim, Cal.

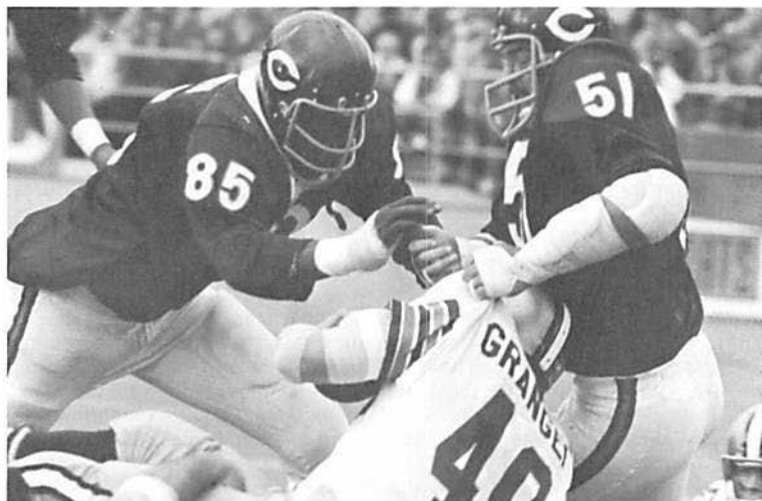
Fassell got to the Long Beach campus by way of Fullerton Junior College, where he completed two years, and Southern California, where he lettered but as a reserve. 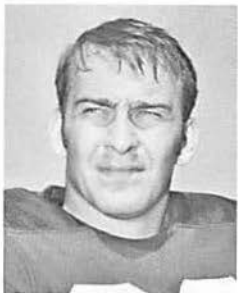

At that time, his career average was a whopping 44.1 yards per punt. Joined Bears: 1971, FA Born: 7-26-'46, Detroit, Mich.

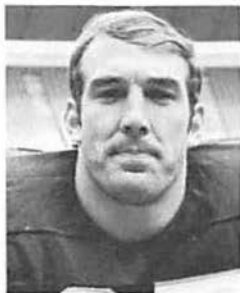

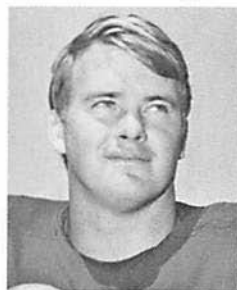

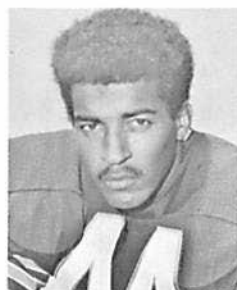

Joined Bears: 1967, D-3 Born: 10-20-'45, Martinsville, W. Va.

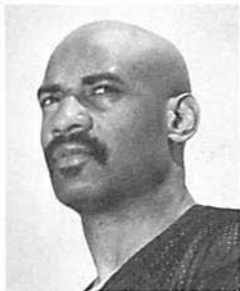

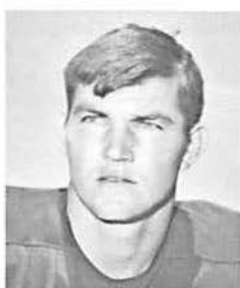

Parsons is one of major collegiate football's more remarkable con-

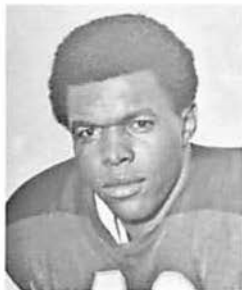

The Bears traded two draft choices (one for 1972, the other for 1973) to the Eagles for Pinder, Philadelphia's no. 2 draft choice for 1968. In 1970, he was the Eagles' top rusher with a 3.9 average on 166 carries

LARRY ROWDEN LB 6'2" 220 Houston 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1971, D-10 Born: 3-17-'49, Pampa, Tex.

Rowden saw service mainly on special units in his rookie NFL season. At Houston University, he lettered his last two years with 259 minutes playing time as a junior and 252 as a senior. In 1969, he had eight pass interceptions to rank seventh nationally. Home: Houston.

GALE SAYERS RB 6' Kansas 8th Season
Joined Bears: 1965, D-1 Born: 5-30-'43, Wichita, Kansas

Sayers devoted the recent winter and spring to a carefully planned regimen of rehabilitation outlined by Dr. Theodore Fox and supervised by Trainer Bernie Lareau. His case history is familiar by now—right knee surgery in 1968 but a magnificent running comeback (1,032 yards) in 1969; left knee surgery in mid-October 1970 followed by more in the offseason that followed and still more late in 1971. He has played in only four NFL games the past two seasons. Compounding his problems early last year was a foot injury, requiring only a walking cast for support, but that was

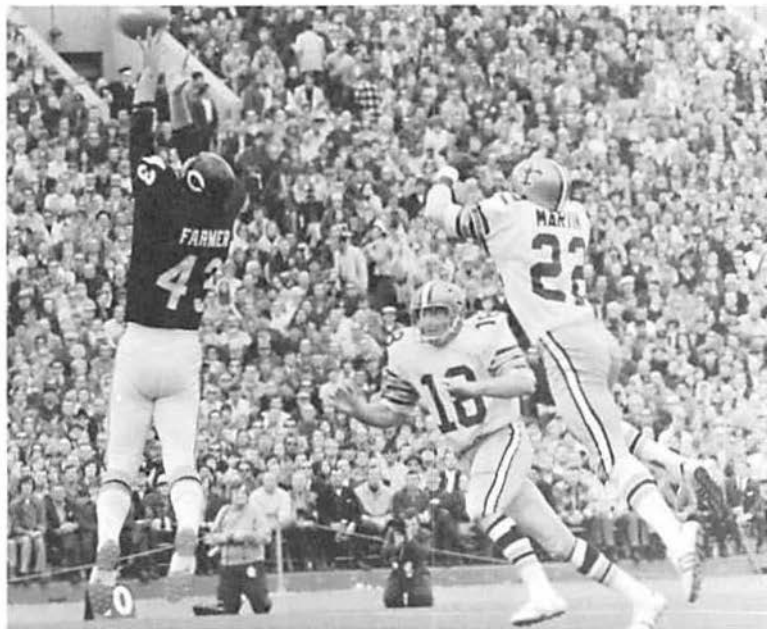

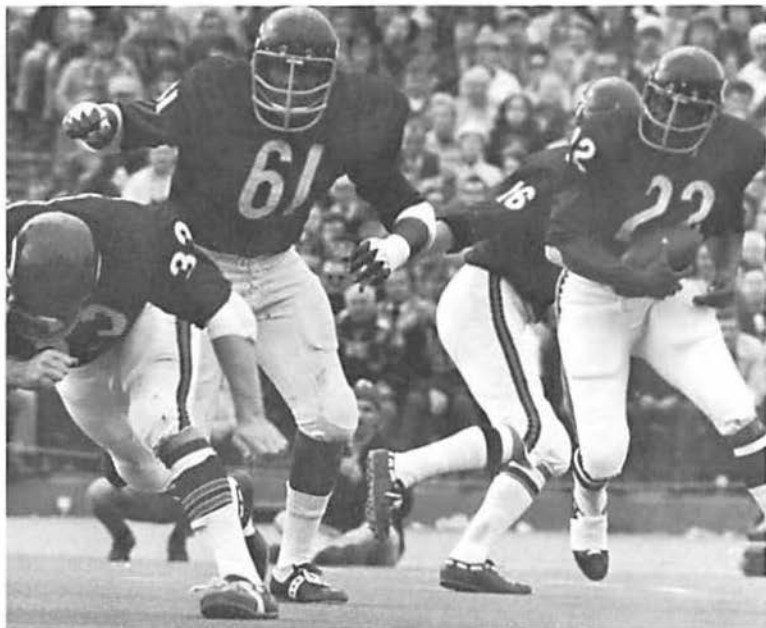


BOB WALLACE TE 6'3" 211 Texas, El Paso 5th Season

Wallace came back well last year from injuries that handicapped him in 1970—he played despite a broken hand suffered in preseason but a knee injury in the fifth game sidelined him the rest of the way. In 1971, as tight end and alternating play messenger with rookie Earl Thomas, he caught only 27 passes (he had 47 for team leadership in 1969). But he contributed two significant efforts. He caught a deflected pass for a 26-yard gain to the 19 that set up the winning touchdown against Minnesota. And in the 28-23 victory over Detroit, his 15 yard touchdown reception put the Bears ahead, 21-20, in a game they ultimately won, 28-23. Home: Phoenix.

Wirtz led North Dakota State pass receivers as a senior (23 for 415 yards, one touchdown) after seeing only limited action in football because he concentrated on track his first two years. He was all-America in track in 1969 (120 yard high hurdles in :14) and again in 1970 (long jump of 24 feet, 11¼ inches). Wirtz also has run the 100 in :09.8. Home: Coon Rapids, Minn.

STEVE WRIGHT T 6'6" 250 Alabama 9th Season
Joined Bears: 1971, T-Washington Born: 7-17-'42, Louisville, Ky.

Wright came to the Bears just before the 1971 season on a trade that sent Mike Hull to the Washington Redskins. He got into 873 offensive plays, showing quickness, aggressiveness and overall speed. He was Green Bay's fifth round draft choice for 1964 but, traded to the New York Giants in 1968, he was a starter until injuries sidelined him. In August 1970, he went to the Redskins on waivers, played on special teams and then was a starter at tackle the final two games. Home: Alexandria, Va.

Pro Bowl All-Star Production

The Pro Bowl that became a complete All-Star production in January, 1971, when for the first time the elite of the National Conference met their AFC counterparts, now is all even in games. The AFC Stars took a 26-13 win at Los Angeles last January after having bowed, 27-6, to the NFC in 1971.

For twenty years prior to 1971, the Pro Bowl, co-sponsored by the National League and the Los Angeles Newspaper Publishers Association, had matched the West against the East with the former holding a 13-7 edge.

Site of the Pro Bowl has been shifted to Dallas where the third meeting of the two conferences will occur Jan. 21, 1973.

The Bears' Dick Butkus again was chosen for the 1972 classic and for the seventh straight time was starting middle linebacker for the West. The other Bears' representative was Dick Gordon. Here's the rollcall of Bears named to the post-season All Star classic in both forms:

FRANK HALAS... 1883-1972

Frank Halas, traveling secretary of the Bears for a half century, passed away January 10, 1972 at the age of 89. He truly was the dean of pro sports traveling secretaries, football or baseball, since he began to shepherd the Bears in 1922, a year after they came from Decatur. His transportation experiences ranged from railroad day-coach travel down to chartered jet planes. Survivors besides his widow, Alice, are a younger brother, George, a sister, Mrs. Martin E. Lauterback, and a daughter, Mary Barbara Hudson. Frank, a native Chicagoan, attended Joseph Medill High School, West 14th and South Loomis, now a grade school. He starred in football, basketball and baseball around the turn of the century. After graduation, he played semipro baseball with the famous Spaldings and the world championship Commodore Barry Council K. of C. indoor baseball team. He also was a member of the Chicago Titans semi-pro football team.
