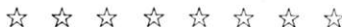

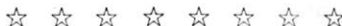

BEARS SECOND HALF CENTURY

This is the year the Bears begin the second half century of their existence. The objective is to come ALL the way back from a 1969 season unprecedented as a week-to-week exercise in futility and incredible in the number and manner of weird happenings.

Six of the losses were by a total of only twenty-two points and in four of those, the Bears yielded the decisive scoring points in the last few minutes of the fourth period.

For the year, they were third in ball control—possession 901 times.

Defensively, they were second in ball control plays by opponents, 769 to 768 for Dallas. But despite those isolated team statistical gems, they could not coordinate attack and defense consistently.

They had the NFL's top rusher, Gale Sayers, and he along with linebacker Dick Butkus were unanimous all-league selections.

But there were holes in the dike all the way so three quick trades within one week in late January brought seven established big leaguers at the cost of two top draft choices and one player. That was the beginning of a program to shore up offense and defense.

Feeling is solid at every level in the Bears' organization that quality in quantity was added in those trades.

Historically, Bears teams have had the ability to recover from a losing season. Only once (1952 and 1953) did they suffer back-to-back sub-.500 campaigns.

Distasteful though they are in retrospect, a few of the un-



believable events that marked the 1969 schedule might be re-run in print:

—Against the Vikings, the Bears blocked a field goal attempt, but the ball line drove its way into the hands of the place kicker who ran eleven yards for a first down on the 29 and a touchdown followed eight plays later.

—Against the Falcons, a Bears' onside kickoff was turned into an Atlanta recovery and 48-yard return for a touchdown.

—Against the Rams, a great defensive play forcing a fumble of a completed Los Angeles pass with the Bears recovering, was nullified because the defensive player inadvertently kicked the loose ball. Possession reverted to the Rams, with a 15-yard penalty tacked on, and on the sixth play thereafter, they kicked the winning field goal of a 9-7 win.

—Against the Cardinals, the ball was snapped as an attempt was made to call time, it carromed off the Bear quarterback's knee and was turned into a 62-yard touchdown run by the opponents.

Jim Dooley . . . Head Coach



Jim Dooley hopes that his 1970 course as head coach will be smooth with a minimum of the unfortunate circumstances that made his first two years in his position something of a nightmare best forgotten.

When he was named head coach of the Bears in the spring of 1968, Dooley realized the ambition of any football player who ever dreamed that some day he might lead the team for which he had starred. Except for a year-and-a-half (1955-'56) on U.S. Air Force duty, he has been as-

sociated continuously with the Bears since 1952, as a player, then an assistant and finally as head coach.

The letdown of the 1969 team, far below the Bears' traditional winning pattern, brought deep personal disappointment for him. It was doubly rough to take because the fine stretch finish in 1968—6-3 that followed a 1-4 start—suggested better things were in store.

However, Dooley offered no excuses designed to shift the burden of blame elsewhere. At the end of the incredible year, he and his coaching staff associates promptly went about the job of restoration through changes of personnel and significant trades that brought seasoned NFL regulars to the roster.

So there is complete confidence that 1970 will see a return to the high road of victory to which the Bears have become accustomed.

As a player, Dooley, all-American end at Miami (Fla.) University, was the Bears' No. 1 draft choice for 1952. He was a defensive back as a rookie but except for that season and 1958, when a fractured ankle sidelined him all year, he was an offensive end who caught 211 career passes for 3,172 yards and 16 touchdowns before his retirement in 1962.

Dooley became an assistant coach that year and in 1965, assigned to offense, saw the Bears set a team scoring record of 409 points. The next two seasons, he was in charge of defense and in 1968, when George S. Halas announced his retirement, Dooley was named successor.

Jim, born in Stoutsville, Mo., Feb. 8, 1930, spent his school-days in Miami. In recent years, his home has been Arlington Heights and his family consists of his wife, Elaine; four sons, Jim, 17; Pat, 13; Tim, 11, and Bill, 8, and a daughter, Lisa, 15.

The Staff

ED CODY is backfield coach for the sixth season. He was fullback, half-back and linebacker for the Bears but before joining them, he was with the Green Bay Packers. Cody has an excellent college coaching record with the University of California at Santa Barbara and Washington State University. At Santa Barbara, he developed Johnny Morris into a star. Cody also was defensive coach with the Oakland Raiders. Although he is a native of New Britain, Conn., he received his bachelor's and master's degree from Purdue where he was captain and Big Ten scoring and ground gaining leader.

ABE GIBRON is in his sixth season on the Bears' staff after five seasons with the Washington Redskins. A native of Michigan City, Ind., where he still makes his home, Gibron played one year at Valparaiso University but transferred to Purdue, graduating from there in 1949. After one season of pro competition with the Buffalo Bills (All-America Conference) he went to the Cleveland Browns as offensive guard for six seasons, 1950-'55, inclusive. In 1956-'57, he was with the Philadelphia Eagles and the following two seasons, was with the Bears as a guard before moving to Washington. This is Gibron's second year as defensive line coach here, following four with the offensive line.

SID LUCKMAN has been with the Bears' organization as a player or in an advisory capacity since 1939. In twelve seasons as quarterback, he led the team to four championships and was an all-NFL selection seven straight times. A native of Brooklyn, he graduated from Columbia University where he won three letters as a halfback in football and three as a shortstop in baseball. Since retiring as a player, he has served in an advisory role with the Bears. He has been honored by selection to the Pro Football Hall of Fame as well as the Collegiate Hall of Fame. Luckman's home is Chicago.

PERRY MOSS joins the staff this year with a wide background of coaching since his all-America playing days at Illinois where he quarterbacked the 1946 Big Ten champions who went on to win the Rose Bowl. After graduation, he played for Green Bay in 1948 and then took up coaching exclusively. In addition to collegiate positions that included athletic directorship and head football coach at Florida State University, he was successful in the pro ranks as head coach-general manager of Montreal Alouettes three years; and head coach of Charleston, S. C., and Orlando, Fla., both Continental League, two years each. He was head coach at Marshall University, Huntington, W. Va., before coming to the Bears, for whom he will work with the quarterbacks. He will make his home permanently in Chicago.

BOB SHAW, a top football career man as player and coach, is with the Bears' staff for the second straight year. At Ohio State, he was an all-American in both football and basketball, graduating from there in 1944. His NFL playing career covered the 1945-'50 period. He was an end with Cleveland and then the Los Angeles Rams and later with the Chicago Cardinals with whom he set an NFL record of five touchdown passes caught in one game. Shaw's college coaching experience included tenures at Loyola of Los Angeles and New Mexico Military and he also was on the staffs of the Baltimore Colts, the San Francisco Forty Niners and the New Orleans Saints. With the Bears, he is assigned to the wide receivers. Shaw's home is Arlington Heights, Ill.

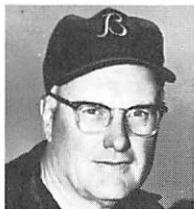
DON SHINNICK makes his coaching debut this season with the Bears after a thirteen-year career as a linebacker with the Baltimore Colts. His 37 interceptions are an all-time NFL record for linebackers. Shinnick was a member of Colts' NFL championship teams in 1958-'59 and 1968 as well as their Western division winner of 1964. He graduated with a bachelor of science degree from UCLA and was Baltimore's second round draft choice for 1957. He will work with the linebackers and defensive backs. His present home is Palatine, Ill.

JIM RINGO goes into his second year on the Bears coaching staff with a fifteen-year major league playing record behind him. Ringo, selected as center for the Pro Bowl nine straight times, was all-Western division center from 1956 through '63 inclusive. His first eleven seasons in the NFL were with the Green Bay Packers and he played on championship teams in 1961-

'62 and the 1960 western titleholders. He went to the Philadelphia Eagles in 1964 and after four seasons with them, retired following the 1967 campaign. His collegiate career was at Syracuse University from which he received a BA degree in 1953. An all-American center, he was Green Bay's choice on the seventh round of the draft for 1953. With the Bears, he is offensive line coach. His present home is Barrington, Ill.

Director of Technical Research



JOHNSOS

LUKE JOHNSOS has been with the Bears as player or coach continuously since 1929 when, as a graduate of Northwestern, he played end with the Bears that fall. He was active through 1936, and then went on the coaching staff with one tenure (1942-'45) as co-head coach. Johnsos figured in seven of the Bears' eight championships, as player or coach. The past two years, he has been director of technical research. He makes his home in Evanston.

The Trainer



ROZY

ED ROZY, a major league career man in athletics, is in his 23rd season as Bears' trainer. He graduated in 1933 from Marquette where he lettered in football as a guard and also was intramural director of athletics as a senior. He held the intramural position after graduation and also was trainer of every Marquette athletic team as well as coach of boxing, wrestling, tennis (golf, fencing and freshman football. Rozy was a U.S. Navy lieutenant in 1944-'47 and in 1948 came to the Bears. His home is Niles, Ill.

Director of Player Personnel



WALSTON

BOBBY WALSTON, all-time NFL great, came to the Bears in 1968 as director of player personnel. He had a similar assignment for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1964-'65 but the next two seasons, he was place kicking and pass receiving coach of the Miami Dolphins. Walston is one of professional football's all-time great place kickers, with the Eagles for whom he booted eighty field goals and 365 extra points from 1951-'62. As an end, he also caught 46 touchdown passes. Walston was an All-American end at the University of Georgia. His home is Schaumburg, Ill.

PHIL ABRAIRA CB 6' 186 Florida State 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1970, D-15 **Born: 8-20-'47, Chicago**

Abraira caught thirteen passes for 157 yards and three touchdowns in his first two years at Florida State. Shifted to defense as a senior, he led the team in interceptions with five for 54 yards; returned twelve punts 241 yards, including a school record 92-yarder against North Carolina State; and ran back six kickoffs 163 yards. Offseason home: Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

JOE ALUISE RB 5'11" 210 Western Arizona 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1969, D-9 **Born: 1-7-'43, Silver Springs, Md.**

Aluise was on the Bears' reserve squad all of 1969. In 1968, he was fifth in rushing in the Continental League with 745 yards on 190 attempts for the Sacramento Caps. In 1967, he was with Edmonton of the Canadian League. Offseason home: Chicago.

MARTY AMSLER DE 6'5" 255 Evansville (Ind.) 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1967, F.A. **Born: 10-26-'42, Evansville**

After a pre-season operation for an Achilles tendon idled him for all of 1968, Amsler came back last season and got into eleven games. In 1967, he was an outstanding rookie defensive lineman as he got into 773 of a possible 800 plays; had 31 tackles, 30 assists and sacked rival quarterbacks 31 times. Offseason home: Prospect Heights, Ill.

CRAIG BAYNHAM RB 6'1" 203 Georgia Tech 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1970, T-Dallas **Born: 7-24-'44, Casper, Wyo.**

Baynham, one of the two players obtained from Dallas for the Bears' second draft choice for 1971, brings impressive career statistical credentials—442 yards on 103 rushes, with six touchdowns; 32 pass receptions for 393, three touchdowns; 42 kickoff returns, 1,035 yards. At Georgia Tech, where he also was captain of the track team, he was a two year regular in football. The Cowboys selected him as a future on the twelfth round of the 1966 player draft. Offseason home: Dallas.

ROSS BRUPBACHER LB 6'3" 215 Texas A. & M. 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1970, D-4 **Born: 4-7-'48, Lafayette, La.**

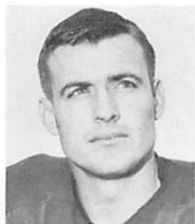
At Texas A. & M., Brupbacher broke into the statistics in three different categories—eight pass interceptions for 265 yards, including returns of 71 against Baylor and 50 against Arkansas; 24 pass receptions for 418 yards and six touchdowns; 104 yards on 35 rushes. As a sophomore, he was an alternate running back for the first four games, all losses, and then was shifted to defense. A. & M. won six in a row, and added a 20-16 conquest of Alabama in the Cotton Bowl. He also played defense as a junior but was shifted to tight end last year. Offseason home: Houston.

DOUG BUFFONE LB 6'3" 225 Louisville 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1966, D-4 **Born: 6-27-'44, Yatesboro, Pa.**

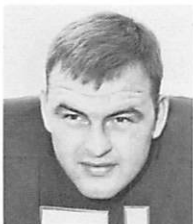
Since taking over as starting left linebacker in 1967, Buffone has rolled up defense statistics of 230 tackles, 101 assists and 30 sacks of quarterbacks. Two pass interceptions last year raised his career total to six for 72 yards return. He also broke into the scoring column in 1968 with a touchdown after recovery of a fumble. Buffone's first season was spent as an alternate at left linebacker and duty on special units, including the goal line defense platoon. Offseason home: Rosemont, Ill.

RON BULL RB 6' 200 Baylor 9th Season
Joined Bears: 1962, D-1 **Born: 2-2-'40, Kingsville, Tex.**

Bull, fifth among Bears' all-time rushing leaders, was averaging 4.25 yards a carry up to the time he suffered a knee injury against the Los Angeles Rams last Oct. 26. Offseason surgery has been successful. Bull's 150 pass receptions for 1,344 yards are high among present Bears while his rushing total shows 2,657 yards on 719 tries. He has been a regular since 1962 when he was voted rookie-of-the-year. In 1963, his running was a valuable contribution to the Bears' western division title and subsequent 14-10 victory over the eastern champion New York Giants. At Baylor, where he won all-American honors, he started 36 out of 37 games, including five as a freshman, and led the team in rushing and pass receiving for three straight seasons. Offseason home: Deerfield, Ill.

He has been unanimous all-NFL choice at running back five straight times; winner of the most valuable player award in the Pro Bowl all-star contest three out of four times (his 1968 knee surgery kept him out of that one); twice league rushing leader (1,032 last year, 1,231 in 1966); second to Rick Casares in Bears' all-time rushing records (4,866 to 5,657); twenty games of 100-or-more yards rushing in his career; selected on the all-time all pro honor team. When he led the NFL in rushing in 1969, it was the first time on record that any running back had ever hit the 1,000-yards plus total the season immediately after knee surgery. For that, the Professional Football Writers Association of America voted him the George S. Halas trophy as the most courageous player of 1969. On May 25, evening of the presentation at Pro Football Writers dinner in New York City, Sayers expressed his gratitude but said he would give the courageous trophy instead to his close friend and room-mate on road trips, Brian Piccolo who was to die of cancer on June 16. In January, the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce honored him as one of the nation's ten outstanding young men of 1969. Offseason home: Chicago.

GEORGE SEALS DT 6'3" 260 Missouri 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1965, T-Wash. Born: 10-2-'42, Higginsville, Mo.

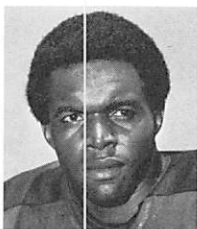
Following a career in which he was a lineman on offense in 79 out of 81 games, Seals was shifted to defensive tackle for the final three contests of 1969 and that will be his assignment from now on too. He also has operated on special teams and last season, returned two kickoffs for twenty yards. Amazing speed along with his size and mobility made him one of the better pulling guards in the NFL during his nearly six years on offense. Originally, he was the New York Giants' fourth draft choice for 1964 but he was traded to the Washington Redskins who, in turn, dealt him to the Bears the following season. Offseason home: Chicago.

JERRY SIMMONS WR 6' 189 Bethune-Cookman 6th Season
Joined Bears: 1970, W-Atlanta Born: 11-14-'42, Nichols, Fla.

Simmons suffered a fractured ankle at San Francisco Dec. 6 and up to that time, he had caught thirteen passes for 178 yards for the Bears. He was with the Atlanta Falcons two seasons and his 28 pass catches for 479 yards in 1968 were high for the team. He began his NFL career in 1965 with the Pittsburgh Steelers later going to New Orleans and then Atlanta. Offseason home: Atlanta.



SAYERS

BILL STALEY DT 6'3" 248 Utah State 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1970, T-Cincinnati Born: 9-9-'46, Walnut Creek, Cal.

For two seasons, Staley was rated one of the best pass rushers in the AFL. He was accompanied by Harry Gunner on the trade that sent Rufus Mayes to Cincinnati. Staley was the Bengals' second draft choice for 1968 and, fast, hard hitting and aggressive, he broke in as a regular immediately. At Utah State, he also lettered in track as a weights man. Offseason home: Cincinnati.

DANA STEPHENSON S 6'2" 185 Nebraska 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1970, D-8 Born: 4-19-'48, Lincoln, Neb.

Second all-America defensive back as a senior and all-Big Eight his last two seasons at Nebraska, Stephenson had fourteen interceptions for 224 yards return. That was a Nebraska career record as were his three in one game against Colorado. Offseason home: Lincoln.

TERRY STOEPEL TE-T 6'4" 235 Tulsa 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1967, F.A. Born: 2-8-'45, Cincinnati

Stoepel got into six games with the Bears in 1967 before going into the Army for two years of active duty. As a tight end, he caught one pass for six yards. He was signed as a free agent because of fine recommendations for his blocking ability and speed at Tulsa University. Offseason home: Kerrville, Tex.

JOE TAYLOR CB 6'1" 200 N. Carolina A. & T. 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1967, F.A. Born: 12-27-'40, Miami

Taylor and Dick Daniels finished in an absolute tie (3 for 37 yards return each) for pass interceptions on the Bears last year. It was Taylor's

second year as a regular and his 41 tackles, 11 assists bettered his 35-9 in 1968. He also saw more service than any Bears' defensive back, credited with appearances on 99 percent of the 783 possible. Offseason home: Orlando, Fla.

CECIL TURNER WR 5'10" 170 California Poly 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1968, D-5 **Born: 4-2-'44, Washington, D.C.**

Turner was third in both kickoff and punt returns for the Bears last season, bringing his two-year total in the former department to 30-689 and in the latter to 17-51. He has excellent speed, which reflects his career at Cal-Poly where, as a senior, he led the track team to the NCAA College Division championship. He had firsts in the 100-meter dash and the long jump; second in the 200-meters and ran the first leg of the 440-yard relay. Offseason home: Washington.

EMILIO VALLEZ TE 6'2" 210 New Mexico 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1968, D-12 **Born: 4-30-'46, Belen, N. Mex.**

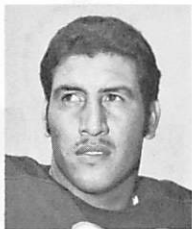
Vallez, though limited in playing time in both years with the Bears, was used at various times on offense, defense and on special units. His versatility caught scouting eyes while he was at New Mexico but his best statistical records were on offense where his 78 pass receptions were a career total as were his seventeen passes in one game against Texas El Paso. Offseason home: Schiller Park, Ill.

BOB WALLACE WR 6'3" 211 Texas El Paso 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1968, D-2 **Born: 10-7-'45, Phoenix, Ariz.**

Wallace led Bears' pass receivers in 1969 with 47 for 553 yards and five touchdowns. His best single game efforts were ten for 100 yards and one touchdown against San Francisco and six for 82 against Atlanta. In his rookie year, he was used principally on special units but in late October, given wider offensive responsibility, he accepted it and wound up with nineteen pass receptions for 281 yards. GEORGE YOUNGBLOOD S 6'3" 205 L. A. State 5th Season.
Joined Bears: 1969, T-New Orleans Born: 1-4-'45, Los Angeles

Youngblood turned one of his three pass interceptions last season into a 22-yard touchdown run against the Baltimore Colts. The Bears gave up a draft choice for Youngblood. Los Angeles selected him on the seventh round for 1966 and he was one of two rookies to start and finish that year with the Rams. Subsequently, he was with Cleveland and New Orleans. Offseason home: Los Angeles.

Brian Piccolo died of cancer shortly before dawn on June 16, 1970, exactly seven months after the last game he was ever to play for the Bears, against the Falcons at Atlanta Nov 16, 1969.

He was only 26 and survivors included his widow, Joy; three daughters, Lori, Traci and Kristi; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Piccolo; and two brothers, Joe, Jr., and Don.

Brian put up the fierce resistance typical of him as a player from his days at Central Catholic high school in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., through a great collegiate career at Wake Forest and into four active NFL seasons with the Bears.

But this time, Brian's opponent was an insidious, deadly malignancy that could not be beaten despite the support his great competitive heart was given by the latest and best weapons in the war on cancer.

He had played in the first nine games of 1969 when a persistent cough led to chest x-ray that revealed an ominous presence. Several operations and constant therapy treatments followed in the all too brief time before his death.

Brian, born in Pittsfield, Mass., Oct. 21, 1943, led the nation in rushing and scoring in 1964, his senior year at Wake Forest. He had 1,044 yards on 252 carries and 111 points on 17 touchdowns, nine conversions.

Inexplicably, he was bypassed in the pro player draft but the Bears signed him as a free agent and, more, set up a contract ceremony complete with newspaper, TV and radio coverage usually given a top draft choice.

He didn't play at all in his rookie season, 1965, because of a leg injury received in practice for the Coaches All-American game at Buffalo that summer. In 1966, he became the alternate for Gale Sayers, his room-mate on road trips.

Two years later, when Sayers suffered his knee injury, Brian became a regular for the final five games, winding up with 450 yards for the season as his contribution toward the Bears' NFL-leading rushing total. His four-season statistics:

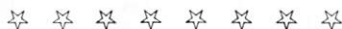

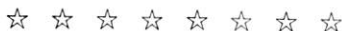

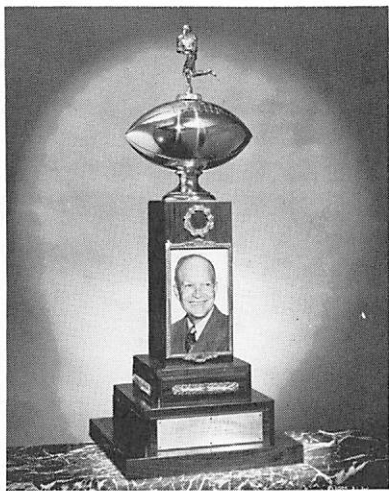

The 25th annual Armed Forces Benefit game, matching the Bears and the Minnesota Vikings at Soldier Field Friday night, Sept. 11, marks the fifteenth straight time it's sponsored by the Chicago Publishers Association (Chicago Today, The Daily News, The Sun-Times and The Tribune).

Sharing in the proceeds are Army Emergency Relief, the Navy Relief Society and the Air Force Aid Society, all official agencies that provide financial assistance to service-men and to widows or orphans of service-men needing it. Since 1946 the series has raised \$1,143,044.

The inaugural in 1946 resulted from a meeting in Washington attended by Dwight D. Eisenhower, then Army Chief of Staff; Admiral Chester K. Nimitz; General Ira Eaker, General Carl Spaatz, George S. Halas and Ralph Cannon, then sports editor of The Chicago Herald-American which sponsored the game in 1946 and 1947. The Sun-Times assumed sponsorship from 1949 through 1954 and in 1955, the four Chicago metropolitan daily newspapers joined in its direction.

In 1953, President Eisenhower authorized presentation of a trophy to the outstanding player in every game, selected by sports writers, radio and TV broadcasters. Of 18 winners, including two Bears who tied in 1960, nine have been representatives of visiting teams. No one has ever won it twice.

Pro Hall of Fame Big Fan Attraction

Pro Football's Hall of Fame at Canton, Ohio, has so extensive, fascinating a display of the sport's memorabilia that it has become a year-round attraction for fans all over the nation. Every one of the NFL's twenty-six teams—both National Football Conference and American Football Conference—is represented.

An even dozen long service former Bears are among the many grid greats of the past enshrined in the 19,000-square foot, two-building complex. Listed alphabetically with the playing seasons of each as a Chicago Bear in parenthesis, they are:

Paddy Driscoll (5); Danny Fortmann (8); Red Grange (8); George Halas (10); Ed Healey (6); Sid Luckman (12); Link Lyman (9); George McAfee (8); Bronko Nagurski (9); Joe Stydahar (9); George Trafton (13); and Bulldog Turner (12).

Canton is the site of the museum because it was there, on Sept. 17, 1920, that sports enthusiasts from eleven midwestern communities met to organize what eventually was to become the National Football League.

Only one still alive of that group is George S. Halas who, incidentally, was elected president of the National Football Conference of the NFL last March. Elected president of the American Football Conference is Lamar Hunt, owner of the Kansas City Chiefs.

Hall of Fame attractions, besides head sculptures honoring each of the enshrined greats, include old uniforms . . . historic footballs and still photographs . . . more than 700 reels of film dating from the early years up to the present . . . full color sound action movies of modern games . . . recorded voices of scores of old stars.

The building is open daily throughout the year, except for Christmas day. Summer hours are 9 a.m.-8 p.m. while the months from Labor Day through Memorial Day are from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Admission is \$1.50 for adults and fifty cents for children under fourteen with a special family rate of \$3 for husband, wife and their children. There is no extra charge for viewing the films.

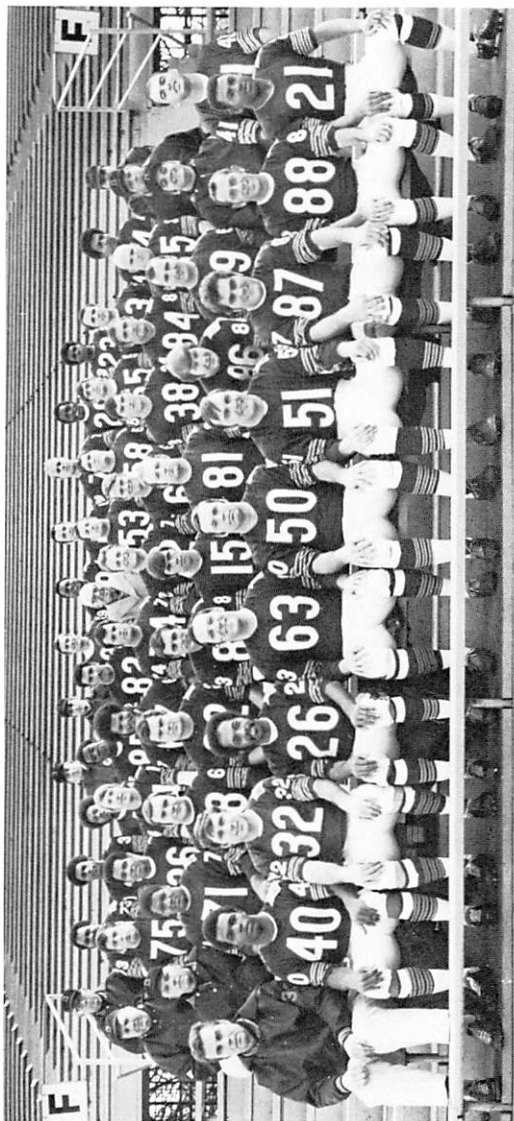
