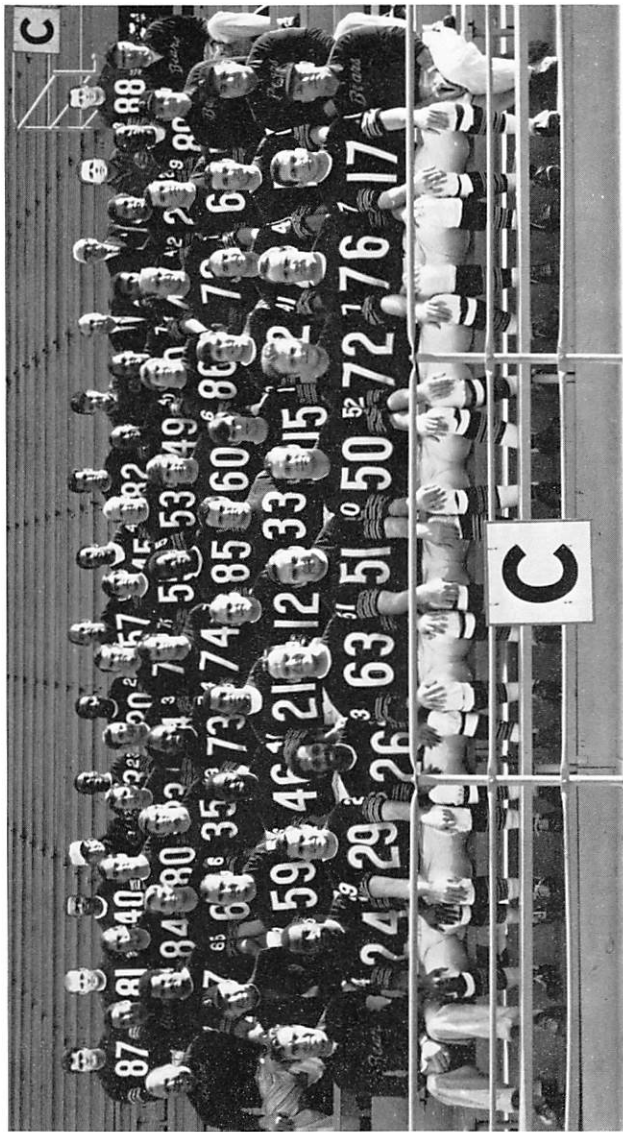

BEARS FIFTY YEARS OLD

The Bears are in the fiftieth year of their existence, a half century rich in color, tradition and achievements that have contributed so much to the success of professional football.

And still an active guiding force in the operation he founded back in 1920 is George S. Halas, most colorful and enduring of the scores of personalities that have been identified with the Bears.

This happens to be the fiftieth anniversary of the National Football League too. Halas is the sole survivor of the little group of men who on Sept. 17, 1920 organized the American Football Association that, on June 24, 1922, was to become the NFL.

He and his associates from middle west communities sat on the running boards of cars in a Canton, Ohio, automobile sales-room that early autumn day in 1920, hopeful only that each town could average several thousand attendance each home game. There was never a wild flight of fancy that the future might bring the major status that is professional football's possession now.

But the Bears came along before this, even though they were known as the Decatur Staleys at the outset. They're direct descendants of the Staleys and their home base for one year, 1920, was Decatur.

Halas, a Chicago native and graduate and all-around athlete at Illinois, served in the Navy at Great Lakes in 1919. After his discharge, he played briefly for the New York baseball Yankees who optioned him to St. Paul of the American Association. A hip injury made his baseball future questionable so in 1920, he went to work for a Decatur corn products firm owned by a rabid sports fan, A. E. Staley.

Staley, who also sponsored a semipro baseball team, offered Halas a position as athletic director and coach of a semipro football team. In 1921, Staley decided to reduce his sports promotion program so, giving Halas \$5,000, he suggested that he take the team to Chicago and carry the name Staleys for one year, 1921.

In 1922, because Wrigley Field was the home grounds, Halas adopted the name Bears—and Bears they have been since.

Fifty years can produce enough anecdotes and incidents to fill a library of sports books. And the Bears have provided their share, and more, of memorable events.



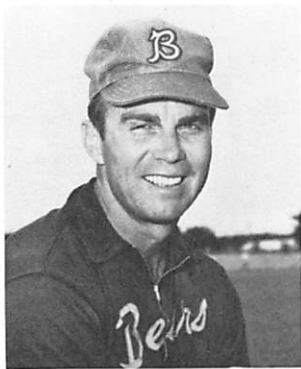
In this modest year-book, the pages that follow detail much of the statistical and individual history of the Bears—the records, including Halas' own NFL mark of a 98-yard touchdown run after recovering a Jim Thorpe fumble—the all-time statistical leaders and the all-star selections—the honor roll that lists every man who ever played so much as one minute with the Bears—the year-by-year scores.

To capsulize some of the glory that has come to the Bears, they have had only eight seasons out of forty-nine in which they played under .500 ball . . . thirty four have been finishes of third or better . . . they're tied for most consecutive regular season games without defeat, 24 . . . twice, they won eighteen consecutive games . . . forty-one different players have been given all-NFL honors. . . . There have been eight championship seasons, the most recent in 1963.

Halas and the Bears have been responsible for innovations too . . . first pro team to practice daily; to take home movies for study; to hire its own band that played its own team song, to have a homecoming game the last home Sunday every year with an evening banquet attended by all ex-Bears.

It was Halas too who signed Red Grange off the Illinois campus and arranged a coast-to-coast, eighteen game, three-month tour beginning Thanksgiving Day 1925 and ranging far west, east and south with success at all stops . . . in December of 1925, on a bitterly cold Sunday afternoon, for example, some 70,000 turned out to see the Bears defeat the New York Giants in the Polo Grounds . . . a crowd that was 20,000 larger than saw the Army-Navy classic of the previous week.

Jim Dooley...Head Coach



Jim Dooley will never forget his debut year of 1968 as head coach of the Bears. It was one of hills and valleys with a magnificent midseason comeback.

The Bears had enjoyed their best pre-season campaigning (4-1, including decisive victories over 1967's divisional champions Green Bay and Dallas) in many seasons. They also had a 45-13 win over the Washington Redskins, who were to be their opponents in the NFL opener played for the first time in history at Wrigley Field.

But the 'Skins made off with a 38-28 victory and the following week the Detroit Lions overwhelmed the Bears' 42-0 — 80 opponents' points in two weeks! A win over Minnesota broke the evil spell, but cost the services of two quarterbacks, Jack Concannon and Rudy Bukich. Then followed losses to Baltimore and Detroit and the season record was 1-4 whereupon Dooley went to young Virgil Carter as his quarterback.

Carter pitched the Bears to four consecutive victories but the bad luck wasn't at an end yet—Bobby Joe Green, 1-2 among NFL punters, needed knee surgery when one of his kicks was blocked. So did Gale Sayers, injured in the second quarter of the game against the San Francisco 49ers and idle the rest of the year.

Yet with the loss of Sayers for five full games, the Bears wound up as top rushing team in the league.

So went the season and on the very last date, as Green Bay squeezed out a 28-27 victory, the Bears lost offensive linemen George Seals, Doug Kriewald and Bob Wetoska, the first two on knee injuries and the offense co-captain on an ankle injury.

Dooley's entire pro career has been with the Bears, beginning in 1952 with a year-and-a-half out (1955-'56) for U. S. Air Force duty. He also missed the entire 1958 campaign because of a fractured ankle but in eight playing seasons with the Bears, he caught 211 passes for 3,172 yards and 16 touchdowns. He retired in 1962, became an assistant coach on offense in 1965 when the team set an all-time Bears' scoring record of 409 points.

In 1966-'67, Dooley was in charge of the defense and came up with a number of innovations. He is 39 years old and was the Bears' No. 1 selection for 1952 after starring at Miami, Fla., University.

The Coaches

JIMMY CARR comes to the Bears as defense coach after serving three seasons with the Minnesota Vikings where he effected a remarkable improvement in the defensive secondary. In 1965, the season preceding his coaching debut, the Vikings had allowed 403 opponents' points, 186 on 31 touchdown passes. Last year, his third as defensive secondary coach, that had been cut to an all-time Viking low of 242 points with only 16 touchdown passes. Carr had nine NFL playing seasons, with the then Chicago Cardinals, Colts, Eagles and Redskins. He played his collegiate football at Morris-Harvey.

ED CODY is backfield coach for the fifth season. He was fullback, half-back and linebacker for the Bears but before joining them he was with the Green Bay Packers. Cody has an excellent college coaching record with the University of California at Santa Barbara and Washington State University. At Santa Barbara he developed Johnny Morris into a star. Cody also was defensive coach with the Oakland AFL Raiders. Although

he is a native of New Britain, Conn., he received his bachelor's and masters degree from Purdue where he was captain and Big Ten scoring and ground gaining leader.

ABE GIBRON returns to the defensive line coaching assignment this season following four years of directing the offensive forwards. Last season, his offensive line was credited with the Bears' achievement of leading the NFL in rushing. This is Gibron's 20th season in the league as player or coach. He played seven seasons with the Cleveland Browns, figuring in six straight eastern titles, winning all-NFL honors twice and all-East five times. Three of the divisional champions went on to league titles. Following that, he was one season with the Philadelphia Eagles and two (1958-'59) with the Bears before going to the Washington Redskins as line coach. He's a native of Michigan City, Ind., who attended Purdue where he was all-Big Ten guard.

SID LUCKMAN has been a player or served in an advisory capacity in the Bears' organization since 1939. In 12 seasons as quarterback, he led the team to world's championships in 1940-'41-'43 and '46. He was all-NFL quarterback seven straight times, 1941 through 1947, and was voted most valuable player in 1943. In 1965, Luckman was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He is a native of Brooklyn who attended Columbia University and for his collegiate achievements, was named to the Collegiate Football Hall of Fame.

JIM RINGO was all-pro center eight consecutive seasons during his fourteen-year NFL career, before his retirement as a player in 1967. He became Bears' offensive line coach this year. This is his coaching debut but during his career with the Green Bay Packers, (1953-'63) he prepared himself well by playing in three straight championship games (1960-'61-'62) two of which they won. In all, he got into 187 regular season NFL games, including 145 with the Packers and 42 with Philadelphia. Ringo, a native of Orange, N. J., was a collegiate All-American at Syracuse.

BOB SHAW, another new addition to the Bears' staff, is a former all-American in both football and basketball at Ohio State but the former sport was his forte as his career proves. He played eight years and coached fifteen. As a player with the Chicago Cardinals, he set an NFL record with five touchdown passes in one 1950 game.

The Coaches (Continued)

LUKE JOHNSOS is veteran of veterans with the Bears, now in his forty-first season of continuous service with one year as all-pro end. He was a player from 1929-'36 and followed that by service on the coaching staff that included one period (mid-1942-'45) when he was co-head coach. This year, he is director of technical research. Johnsos figured in seven of the Bears' eight world's championships, as a player (end) in 1932-'33; co-head coach in 1943; and assistant in 1940-'41, 1946 and 1963. Because early statistical information on the Bears is sketchy, his complete record is unavailable but for five of his eight seasons, he had 62 receptions, 11 touchdowns and 985 yards. He is a graduate of Northwestern.

The Trainer



ROZY

ED ROZY has been a major league career man from the time he lettered as a football guard at Marquette to the present when he began his 22nd season with the Bears. In his senior year at Marquette to the present as he begins his of athletics, a position he retained after graduation. For twelve years, he also was trainer of all Marquette athletic teams as well as coach of boxing, wrestling, tennis, golf, fencing and freshman football. He served as a U. S. Navy lieutenant (1944-'47) and in 1948, came to the Bears.

Director of Player Personnel



WALSTON

BOBBY WALSTON is an all-time NFL great now in his second year at assembling and assessing scouting information on collegiate prospects for the Bears. He was a director of player personnel for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1964-'65 but the next two years, was pass receiving and place kicking coach of the Miami AFL Dolphins. Walston is one of pro football's all-time great place kickers whose career scoring total of 881 points rank him high on the all-time list. From 1951 through 1962, he had 46 touchdowns; 80 field goals and 365 extra points.

MARTY AMSLER DE 6'5" 255 Evansville State 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1967, F. A. Born: 10-26-'42, Evansville, Ind.

Amsler missed the entire 1968 schedule because of a pre-season operation for a ruptured Achilles tendon and he had no chance to add luster to his record as one of 1967's most impressive defensive rookies. Coming to the Bears as a free agent, after having played with Wheeling (Continental League), he got into 773 out of a possible 800 defensive plays; had 31 tackles and 30 assists and sacked enemy quarterbacks 21 times. He also had an interception and a fumble recovery. Offseason home: Chicago.

BOB BREITENSTEIN G 6'3" 265 Tulsa 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1968, F. A. Born: 4-8-'43, Buenos Aires, Argentina

Breitenstein spent the '68 campaign on the reserve squad but in 1967, he got into eleven games with the Minnesota Vikings. The year before that, he was a regular with Denver which had signed him as the 5th draft choice for 1968. He was a three-year regular at the University of Tulsa. Offseason home: Tulsa.

DOUG BUFFONE LB 6'3" 230 Louisville 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1966, D-4 Born: 6-27-'44, Yatesboro, Pa.

Buffone last season surpassed his previous high mark as outside linebacker in 1967. He had 92 tackles, 34 assists and was second to Dick Butkus. He also threw enemy passers for losses nine times and hurried throws four more. In the two wins over the Vikings, Buffone was especially effective with a total of a dozen tackles, five assists and three sacks. He had an 8-3-1 day against Philadelphia; 8-2-2 against New Orleans and nine unassisted tackles against the Colts at Baltimore. The previous year, he had a season record of 70-42-18. Offseason home: Rosemont, Ill.

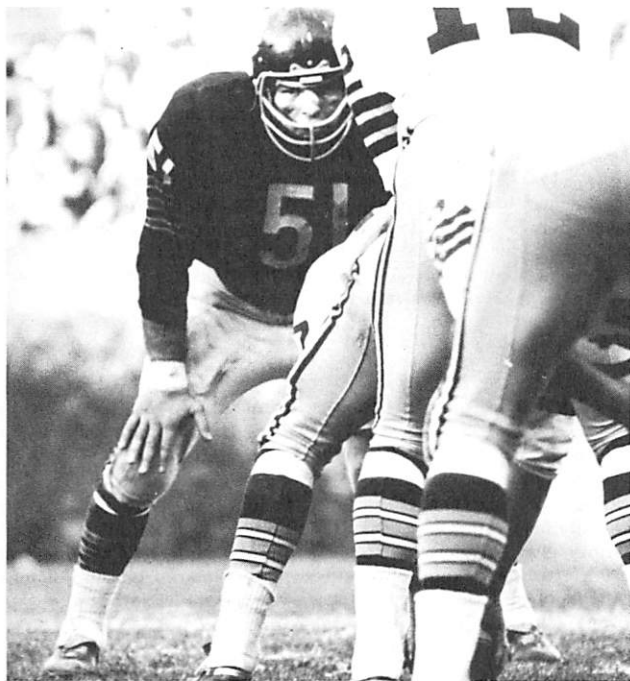
RON BULL RB 6' 200 Baylor 8th Season
Joined Bears: 1962, D-1 Born: 2-2-'40, Kingsville, Texas

Bull, fifth among all time Bears' rushing leaders (2,470 yards), is sixteenth in the list of NFL active running backs. He's a sturdy, grind-it-out driver who last season averaged 4.4 yards a carry, nearly a yard per try better than his career average of 3.66. His 472 yards were his best single NFL season, surpassing the 417 total he had in 1956. His best single games in 1968 were 82 at New Orleans and 80 against Green Bay here. In 1962, Bull was NFL rookie of the year. The following season, his running in the late games was a factor in the Bears' capture of a Western division title. In the 14-10 championship win over the New York Giants, Bull hauled ten out of thirteen times in the fourth quarter, picking up two vital first downs and missing another by a foot. Off-season home: Park Ridge, Ill.

DICK BUTKUS LB 6'3" 245 Illinois
Joined Bears: 1965, D-1

5th Season
Born: 12-9-'42, Chicago

Butkus is a unanimous selection as the NFL's best middle-linebacker with the acceptance emphasized in his choice on four straight West squads in the Pro Bowl and as all-league three out of four times. For three seasons, he has been Bears' defensive signal caller and beyond that responsibility, he has been a personal terror physically—in the past two years, he is credited with 238 tackles, 92 assists and 29 "sacking" of quarterbacks. In 1968, he had his best single season year with 127 tackles and 55 assists, bettering the 1967 total of 111-35. Butkus leads the team in opponents fumbles recovered, 13. He also has intercepted ten passes for 128 yards return to rank third among active Bears and has returned five kickoffs 62 yards. Offseason home: Chicago Heights, Ill.



JIM CADILE G 6'3" 240 San Jose State
Joined Bears: 1962, D-4

8th Season
Born: 7-16-'40, San Jose, Cal.

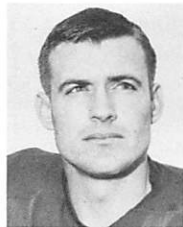
Cadile was second busiest man on the offensive line last season as he got into 872 of 912 plays. It was the best season yet for Cadile, regarded as one

of the NFL's better pulling guards. The previous year, injuries caused him to miss four games but he still got into 509 offensive plays. Since breaking in with the Bears in 1963, he has appeared in 83 of 98 games. Offseason home: San Jose.

LEE CALLAND CB 6' 190 Louisville 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1969, T-Los Angeles Born: 9-14-'41, ouisville, Ky.

Calland came to the Bears from the Rams along with two undisclosed draft choices (for 1970 and 1971) in exchange for Richie Petitbon. His NFL experience shows four seasons with Minnesota, 1967 and half of 1968 with Atlanta before he went to Los Angeles. Of his eight career interceptions, one off Johnny Unitas in 1967 was returned 77 yards for a touchdown. Offseason home: Atlanta.

VIRGIL CARTER QB 6'1" 185 Brigham Young 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1967, D-5 Born: 11-9-'45, Provo, Utah

Carter spent all of 1967 on the reserve squad but last season, when injuries created quarterback personnel problems, he was activated following the third game of the schedule. He got into the late stages of the next two games but when he got his starting chance at Philadelphia Oct. 20, he responded with a 29-16 victory, the first of four straight for him. However, in the third play of the third quarter against Atlanta, he received a fractured ankle and that sidelined him for the remainder of the season. A running quarterback as well as a passer Carter picked up 265 yards rushing and 769 passing in his seven NFL appearances. Offseason home: Northbrook, Ill.

TIM CASEY LB 6'1" 225 Oregon 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1968, F. A. Born: 2-29-'44, Portland, Ore.

After graduating from Oregon in 1966, Casey played two seasons with Eugene, Ore., and last summer, was signed by the Bears. He functioned on the reserve squad all year. With Eugene in 1967, he intercepted four passes for 81 yards and scored a safety. Offseason home: Portland, Ore.

Others were Gale Sayers, 132 in 1965, and Johnny Lujack, 109 in 1950. Ten of Percival's 25 field goals came in succession, five in a row against the Philadelphia Eagles; four-for-four against the Minnesota Vikings; and one against Green Bay before he missed. He had seven field goals of 40 yards or more in 1968. On kickoffs he was one of the NFL's booming best. Of 64 kick-offs, 18 went into the end zone and 24 landed between the five and the goal line. Return yardage against the Bears was the lowest in the league, an average of 17.9 as compared to the overall league average of 21.3. Offseason home: Garland, Tex.

LOYD PHILLIPS DE 6'3" 240 Arkansas 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1967, D-1 Born: 5-2-'45, Fort Worth, Tex.

Phillips was starting defensive right end in 1968 and was a convincing workman—35 tackles, 20 assists, nine times dropping the quarterbacks and hurrying their passes five times. Against Detroit here, he had eight tackles, two assists. In the second win over Minnesota, he had five tackles, two assists and thrice dropped the opposing quarterback for losses. Those were his heaviest chores since 1964 at Wake Forest when he led the nation on offense with 1,044 yards on 252 carries. Teaming with Bull in the backfield for the final five games of 1968, Piccolo added 76 carries for 269 yards, 15 pass receptions for 155. Against New Orleans, he rushed for 112 yards, his first 100-plus day in the NFL. Offseason home: Chicago.

BOB PICKENS T 6'4" 258 Nebraska 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1967, D-3 for '66 Born: 2-2-'43, Evanston, Ill.

Pickens did not play much in 1968, following a rookie season in which a neck injury suffered in training camp restricted him to 388 plays on offense. Last year, he got into four games, a total of 49 offensive plays, all toward the end of the season. Offseason home: Evanston.

DAN PRIDE LB 6'3" 225 Jackson State (Miss.) 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1968, F.A. Born: 6-7-'42, Ironton, Ohio

Pride spent all of 1967 and virtually all of 1968 on the reserve squad but was activated in time to get into three games toward the end of last season. He was defensive end as well as linebacker in college. Offseason home: Ironton.

Pyle, iron-man of the line, got into every one of 912 possible offensive plays in 1968. He's co-captain. He has missed only five games out of 112 possible games since coming to the Bears and three of those were in early 1964 due to an ankle injury. Up to that time, he had not missed a single minute of play on offense, from his years at New Trier high school, on through Yale and then for 45 consecutive games with the Bears. The past two seasons, he has been in 1,641 offensive plays, 854 of them coming in 1968.

Four seasons . . . four times unanimous all-NFL, including 1968 even though he missed the last five games because of the knee injury suffered in San Francisco game (he had 856 yards on 138 rushes) . . . holder of eight league records and thirteen other Bears' team records . . . sixteen games in which he has 100 or more yards rushing (his four year playing record shows 50 games out of 56 possible). That capsulizes Sayers' career up to date. HANDLER

Death came to Bears' defensive line coach Phil Handler in the twilight of Sunday, Dec. 8, 1968, as he sat in his Skokie home watching his team fight it out against the Los Angeles Rams on television.

His wrist watch was on a coffee table in front of him as he presumably used it to time the seconds ticking away in a game won by the Bears, 17-16. For Phil was a dedicated football man—especially dedicated to the Bears whom he had served since 1952.

It was distressing to him that in what was to be the last year of his life, Phil was forbidden by physicians' decree to watch the Bears in person or, for that matter, on television. But toward the end of the 1968 season, he was allowed some look at games on TV.

Handler was a native Texan, born in Fort Worth July 1, 1908. He gained national recognition as a guard at Texas Christian University and in 1930, following his graduation, he joined the old Chicago Cardinals. That developed into 22 seasons of employment, seven as a player and 15 as an assistant coach with a head coaching interlude from 1943 to 1946.

He was co-head coach with Buddy Parker in 1949.

With the Bears, Handler coached the offensive line from 1952 through 1964 and the next three seasons, he shifted to defense.

The twenty-fourth annual Armed Forces Benefit game, matching the Bears and the St. Louis Cardinals at Soldier Field Friday night, Sept. 12, marks the fourteenth straight time it's sponsored by the Chicago Publishers Association (Chicago Today, The Daily News, The Sun-Times and The Tribune).

Sharing in the proceeds are Army Emergency Relief, the Navy Relief Society and the Air Force Aid Society, all official agencies that provide financial assistance to service-men and to widows or orphans of service-men needing it. Since 1946 the series has raised \$1,070,307.77.

The inaugural in 1946 resulted from a meeting in Washington attended by Dwight D. Eisenhower, then Army Chief of Staff; Admiral Chester K. Nimitz; General Ira Eaker, General Carl Spaatz, George S. Halas and Ralph Cannon, then sports editor of The Chicago Herald-American which sponsored the game in 1946 and 1947. The Sun-Times assumed sponsorship from 1949 through 1954 and in 1955, the four Chicago metropolitan daily newspapers joined in its direction.

In 1953, President Eisenhower authorized presentation of a trophy to the outstanding player in every game, selected by sports writers, radio and TV broadcasters. Of 17 winners, including two Bears who tied in 1960, eight have been representatives of visiting teams. No one has ever won it twice.
