# 1968 CHICAGO BEARS



## 1968-A New Chapter

Another chapter in Bears' history was written May 27-28 when George S. Halas retired as head coach and named Jim Dooley his successor. Halas founded the team in 1920 and 1967 was his forty-eighth year as owner and his fortieth as a head coach.

Dooley, a No. 1 draft choice from Miami, Fla., University in 1952, has



been with the team continuously since, as player or coach, so he is definitely a Bears' career man.

Halas' previous head coaching tenures were 1920-'29 (with Ed Sternaman as a co-coach); 1933 to November 1, 1942, when he entered the U.S. Navy in World War 2; 1946-'55; and 1948-'67.

His forty season personal service career contains records that probably will never be equalled or surpassed. He has a personal winning mark of .685 with 321 victories, 142 losses and 31 ties . . . the victory total is 91 more than the second coach in the all-time rankings, the late Curly Lambeau

who, in 29 seasons with the Green Bay Packers and two each with the Chicago Cardinals and Washington Redskins, had 230-138-25 for .625 . . . third is the late Steve Owen with 150-100-17 for .600 in 23 seasons with the New York Giants.

Halas was head coach in six world championship seasons . . . nine first place finishes . . . thirteen seconds . . . five thirds and four fourths . . . seven teams lost only one game each . . . four lost only two each . . . seven dropped only three apiece . . . there were two perfect NFL schedules 13-0 in 1934 and 11-0 in 1942 . . . two eighteen game consecutive winning streaks . . . and only six seasons under .500.

From Crane Tech High School on through the University of Illinois, his has been the athlete's life . . . monograms in football, basketball and baseball; a partial season (1919) with the New York Yankees of the pre-Babe Ruth era; and, in what became his ultimate career, pro football. He organized, coached and played for the Decatur Staleys who became the Chicago Bears in 1921 and also was one of the founders of the National Football League.

## The Coaching Staff

JIM DOOLEY has been in the Bears' organization since 1952, although he took out a year-and-a-half (1955-'56) for service in the U.S. Air Force. He also missed the entire 1958 campaign because of a fractured ankle but in eight playing seasons with the Bears, he caught 211 passes for 3.172 yards and 16 touchdowns to rank fourth among the team's all-time receivers. Dooley retired in 1962 and was an assistant on offense through 1965. The '65 team set an all-time Bears' scoring record of 409 points.

The past two seasons, Dooley was put in charge of the defense. He came up with a number of innovations that gave the Bears one of the NFL's best defensive teams. Following the 1967 campaign, George Halas decided to return Dooley to the offense with Joe Fortunato, who had retired a year ago and became an assistant, directing the defense. The day after announcing his retirement as head coach, Halas named Dooley as his successor.

Dooley, 38 years old, was the Bears' No. 1 choice for 1952 after starring as defensive back at Miami, Fla., University.

#### The Coaches (Continued)

CHARLES "CHUCK" CHERUNDOLO is another NFL career man on the staff. This is his 28th season as a player or coach. He came to the Bears in 1966 after service as defensive coach of the Redskins, the Eagles and the Steelers. Ten seasons, he was an outstanding lineman with the Cleveland Rams and several times was an All-NFL choice. Cherundolo was a unanimous All-American center at Penn State and from 1942 through 1945 he saw World War 2 action in the U.S. Navy.



ED CODY is backfield coach for the fourth season. He was linebacker, half-back and fullback for the Bears but before joining them he was with the Green Bay Packers. Cody has an excellent college coaching record with a career total of 68-31-3 at the University of California at Santa Barbara and at San Bernardino Valley College. At Santa Barbara he developed Johnny Morris into a star. Cody also coached defense at Washington State University and with the Oakland AFL Raiders. Although he is a native of Newington, Conn., he attended Purdue where, as a senior, he was captain and Big Ten scoring and ground gaining leader.



BABE DIMANCHEFF is the third Purdue alumnus and the eighth Bears' "graduate" on the staff. This is his third season here, following tenures as Pittsburgh Steelers backfield coach and Dallas Cowboys' offensive director; and head coach of the Canton United Football League champions in 1964 and the Philadelphia Continental League team in 1965. He was an All-American fullback at Purdue and the No. 1 choice of the Boston Yanks for 1945. He played for seven years, first with Boston and then with the Cardinals and in 1952 joined the Bears.



JOE FORTUNATO, a twelve-year veteran as a linebacker, retired just before the start of the 1967 schedule, became an assistant on defense and this season will be in charge of that department. He had been defensive co-captain since the championship year of 1963. His NFL statistics are impressive—he shares a league career record of 22 opponents fumbles recovered along with the retired Andy Robustelli. He also has scored three touchdowns, on a 24-yard return of a Johnny Unitas fumble in 1966; a pass interception for 27 yards in 1956 and a one-yard slash from the fullback position in 1957. He was chosen all-NFL outside linebacker in 1963-'64 and '65 and was named to the West team in the Pro Bowl four times. He is a

graduate of Mississippi State and as a fullback was selected by the Bears on the eighth round for 1953. After two years in the Army at Fort Benning, Ga., he made his NFL debut in 1955.



ABE GIBRON has been offensive line coach since 1965 following five seasons in a similar capacity with the Washington Redskins. This is his nineteenth NFL campaign, as a player or coach. A native of Michigan City, Ind., who was All-Big Ten guard at Purdue, Gibron played seven seasons with the Cleveland Browns, one with the Philadelphia Eagles and two with the Bears (1958-'59). With the Browns, he was an all-NFL selection, five times was chosen on the East team in the Pro Bowl and figured in Cleveland's six straight eastern titles. Three of those divisional champions went on to capture the world title playoff.



PHIL HANDLER has a record of thirty-nine consecutive NFL seasons, as a player or coach. He has been with the Bears since 1952 following a tenure with the Cardinals from 1930 on, first as a player and then as a staff man, including the head coaching assignment in 1943, '44 and '45 and co-head coach in 1949. He coached the Bears offensive line from 1952 through 1964 but the past three seasons, he has handled the defensive forwards. He is a graduate of Texas Christian University and regarded as one of the greatest guards in Southwestern Conference history.



LUKE JOHNSOS is in his fortieth season with the Bears, the first eight (1929-'36) as a player followed by continuous service on the coaching staff. From mid-1942 through 1945, he was co-head coach. Johnsos has played a part in seven of the Bears' eight world championships—as player in 1932-'33; co-head coach in 1943; and assistant in 1940-'41, 1946 and 1963. He graduated from Northwestern where he lettered in football and baseball. Because early statistical information was incomplete, Johnsos' pass receiving record is available only for five of his eight seasons and it shows 62 receptions for 985 yards and eleven touchdowns.



SID LUCKMAN has been in the Bears' organization as player or in an advisory position since 1939. Twelve seasons as quarterback saw him lead the Bears to world championships in 1940, '41, '43 and '46. He was All-NFL quarterback seven straight times (1941 through 1947) and was most valu-

able player in 1943. In 1965, Luckman was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He is a Brooklyn native who attended Columbia University and, for his achievements there, also was named to the Collegiate Football Hall of Fame.



#### The Trainer



ED ROZY is an athletic career man, now in his twenty-first season with the Bears. He lettered as a guard at Marquette, was named intramural director of athletics in his senior year (1932-'33) and retained that position after graduation. For twelve years, he also was trainer of all Marquette athletic teams and coach of boxing, wrestling, tennis, golf, fencing and freshman football. Rozy took time out (1944-'47) to serve as a U.S. Navy lieutenant and in 1948, he came to the Bears.



#### Director of Player Personnel



WALSTON

BOBBY WALSTON is new to the Bears' organization but an all-time NFL great whose 881 points in twelve seasons with Philadelphia are second only to Lou Groza. He also was director of player personnel with the Eagles in 1964-'65 but the past two years, has been pass receiving and place kicking coach of the Miami AFL Dolphins. Walston is a native of Columbus, O., who, however, went to the University of Georgia. From 1951 through 1962, he scored 46 touchdowns, had 365 extra points and booted 80 field goals.

## Paddy Driscoll



Paddy Driscoll, the most successful all-around athlete of all time, died June 28 at the age of 73 and leaving a heritage of more than a half century of prominent association with sports. He was christened John Leo but no one ever accepted that formality . . . he was always Paddy, from his high school days at Evanston, through collegiate years at Northwestern, at Great Lakes in World War 1 and finally as a pro football star and coach with the Bears and the old Chicago Cardinals,

DRISCOLL

At the time of his death, he was director of research and planning for the Bears, whom he first joined as a player from 1926-'30. Driscoll coached at Marquette University and St. Mel's high school following his retirement but returned to the Bears as an assistant in 1941 and had been with them continuously since. He was head coach in 1956-'57 and led the Bears to a Western division first place his first year.

Driscoll lettered in football, baseball and basketball at Northwestern and after his graduation, he was a utility infielder for the Chicago Cubs.

In football, despite his 5-7, 150 pound physical specifications, he was an astonishing, exciting performer simply because he could beat an opposing team so many different ways—he passed and he ran; he returned punts and kickoffs for substantial vardage; he punted and, finally, was the last truly great practitioner of the art of drop kicking. In fact, Paddy's name is in the NFL record book with most drop kicked field goals (49) and the longest drop kicks (50 yards twice). As quarterback, he also directed the offense.

Paddy lives in the record books and in memory—and will never be forgotten because two years ago, he was given his own niche in the Pro Football Hall of Fame at Canton, O.

MARTY AMSLER DE 6'5" 255 Evansville State 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1967, Wheeling Cont'l Born: 10-26-'42, Evansville, Ind.

Amsler was one of the more impressive NFL defense rookies of 1967. With the Bears, he got into 773 out of a possible 880 defensive plays, was credited with 31 tackles and 30 assists and with getting to the quarterback 21 times. He also had one interception and recovered one enemy fumble. A ruptured Achilles tendon required surgery early in August of this year that was to keep him inactive several months. He was with Wheeling (coached by ex-Bear Bob Snyder) in 1966. Offseason home: Chicago.

DOUG BUFFONE LB 6'3" 230 Louisville 3rd Season Joined Bears: 1966, D-4 Born: 6-27-'44, Yatesboro, Pa.

Buffone has developed into one of the better of the younger outside linebackers in the NFL. Last season, he got into 860 of 880 defensive plays, was second only to Dick Butkus in unassisted tackles (70 to 111); led in assists with 42; and sacked the quarterback eighteen times. He's a prime example of the value of accurate scouting information for his last two seasons at Louisville saw him credited with 270 unassisted tackles; 87 assists; and six opponents fumbles recovered. Offseason home: Yatesboro, Pa.

RUDY BUKICH QB 6'2" 205 Southern Cal. 14th Season Joined Bears: 1962, T-Pittsburgh Born: 12-14-'32, St. Louis, Mo.

Bukich has been in the NFL more seasons than any other of the present Bears. He led the league in passing in 1965 when he ranked first in low percentage of interceptions (2.9); second in average yards per attempt (8.46); third in completion percentage (56.4) and fifth in total touchdowns (20). In 1964, he tied an NFL record with thirteen consecutive pass completions and for the season, he had 99 out of 160, a league leading 61.9 percentage. Offseason home: Newport Beach, Cal.

RON BULL RB 6' 200 Baylor

Joined Bears: 1962, D-1


7th Season Born: 2-2-'40, Kingsville, Texas

Bull is seventh on the list of Bears' all-time rushers with 1,998 yards, within range of two ex-Bears just above him in the statistical chart-George Gulyanics, 2,077 and Ray Nolting, 2,285. His best single season was 1965 when he had 417 yards in 91 shots, a 4.6 average. But his most memorable effort was the championship campaign of 1963. Despite injuries that slowed him to mid-season, he managed to carry a big share of the offensive load down the stretch. In the 14-10 championship win over the New York Giants, Bull carried ten out of thirteen times late in the fourth quarter, contributing two vital first downs and missing another by less than a foot. In 1962, he was NFL Rookie of the Year. In three seasons at Baylor, he led in both rushing (a 4.6 average) and pass receiving and started 36 out of 37 games, including five as a freshman. Offseason home: Park Ridge.

DICK BUTKUS LB 6'3" 245 Illinois Joined Bears: 1965, D-1

4th Season Born: 12-9-'42. Chicago

In Butkus' three seasons with the Bears he has been selected all-NFL linebacker twice and three times he was a member of the West team in the Pro Bowl. This season, he again is defensive signal caller and cocaptain. In 1967, he got into 867 of 880 defensive plays and led in tackles (111) along with 35 assists plus 18 "sackings" of quarterbacks. Statistically, his top efforts were thirteen tackles against Pittsburgh; twelve against Atlanta and eleven each against Minnesota and New York. Dick's most significant interception of five in 1965 came in the high scoring, 45-37 win over the Minnesota Vikings, With 1:32 remaining and the Bears holding a slim 38-37 edge, he picked off a Fran Tarkenton pass, raced 35 yards to the 10 from where Gale Sayers went over on the first play for the clincher. Butkus, a native Chicagoan, attended Vocational High School where he was an allstate fullback. At Illinois, he was shifted to linebacker on defense and center on offense and was an All-American as well as American Football Coaches Association choice as Player of the Year for 1964. Offseason home: Chicago Heights.

JIM CADILE OG 6'3" 240 San Jose State 7th Season Joined Bears: 1962, D-4 Born: 7-16-'40, San Jose, Cal.

Cadile missed four games in 1967 yet he took part in 509 offensive plays, to him an unsatisfactory showing. In each of the three previous seasons, he had played full fourteen game schedules. Since he broke in with the Bears in 1963, he has competed in 65 of 70 games. Offseason home: San Jose.

VIRGIL CARTER QB 6'1" 185 Brigham Young 2nd Season Joined Bears: 1967, D-5 Born: 11-9-'45, Provo, Utah

Carter spent all of last season on the reserve squad. He had a brilliant college career during which he set five NCAA records and tied a sixth. His record: most offensive plays, 1,069 passes and rushes; most yards total offense, 6,354; most touchdowns responsible for, 68; most yards passing, one game, 513; most yards total offense, one game, 599. He also tied Babe Parilli's record 50 touchdown passes for a career. Offseason home: Chicago.

TIM CASEY LB 6'1" 225 Oregon 1st Season Joined Bears: 1968, F.A. Born: 2-29-'44, Portland, Ore.

Casey was with the Eugene, Ore., Bombers of the Continental League in 1967. In the Bears' pre-training camp seminar at Soldier Field in June, his speed was impressive — 5 seconds for the forty. At the University of Oregon, he lettered in track, skiing and basketball. In track, he ran a 4:28 mile and a 1:59 half mile. Offseason home: Portland, Ore.

RICH COADY TE 6'3" 218 Memphis State 1st Season Joined Bears: 1968, D-11 Born: 12-17-'44, Chicago

A graduate of Chicago Taft high school, Coady had a three-year record at Memphis of 49 pass receptions for 582 yards and four touchdowns. His senior year was his best with 18-260-1. The last two years, he was named to the Missouri Valley Conference academic honor team for which a "B" average or better is required in addition to playing skills. Offseason home: Chicago.

JACK CONCANNON QB 6'3" 205 Boston Col. 5th Season Joined Bears: 1967, T-Philadelphia Born: 2-25-'43, Boston, Mass.

Concannon became the Bears' regular quarterback early in 1967 although he was retarded by a sore arm. For the season, he completed 92 out of 186 passes for 1,260 yards and six touchdowns. He also ran 67 times for 279 yards and was third among Bears' rushers, back of Gale Sayers and Brian Piccolo, and scored three touchdowns. His career rushing averages a remarkable 6.3. He was the Eagles' No. 2 selection for 1964 but had to remain in the shadow of the more experienced Norm Snead who had come over from Washington on a trade the same year. Last season, he led Bears' pass receivers, 31 for 524 yards and five touchdowns, including two against the Cardinals for 93 and 67 yards, respectively. He also led in punt returns, 12 for 82 yards; and was second in kickoff return yardage (397 on 16 returns as compared to Sayers' 603 on 16.) His career record shows 59 pass receptions for 1,013 yards and nine touchdowns; 17 punt returns for 74 and 49 kickoff returns for 1,160. His first season and the first five games of his second saw him used on special kicking units where his crisp tackling and strong pursuit were outstanding. In the sixth game of 1966, against the Los Angeles Rams in Chicago, Kurek got his first real shot on offense and wound up with 43 yards on nine rushes and one pass reception for 15. ED O'BRADOVICH DE 6'3" 275 Illinois 8th Season Joined Bears: 1962, D-7 Born: 5-21-'40, Hillside, III.

O'Bradovich has overcome the injury and virus jinx that plaqued him his first couple of seasons and has missed only one game in the past three years. Last year, he got into 696 of 880 defensive plays, "reached" enemy quarterbacks 23 times, had 35 tackles and 15 assists. RICHIE PETITBON DB 6'3" 208 Tulane 10th Season Joined Bears: 1959, D-2 Born: 4-18-'38, New Orleans, La.

Petitbon functioned in all but nine plays of the Bears' 880 on defense last season. He broke in on the quarterback ten times and had 38 tackles plus 24 assists. Of his 35 career interceptions, three have gone for touchdowns-101 yards against Los Angeles in 1962; 66 against Detroit in 1963 and 33 against Baltimore in his rookie season, 1959. He was all-NFL defensive back in 1963 and has been named to the West team for the Pro Bowl four times, 1963, 1964, 1967 and 1968. In the '68 game he ran back an interception 70 yards for a touchdown as the West won, 38-20. He is sixth among active NFL players in interceptions. In 1964, he had led the nation in rushing and scoring as offensive star of the Wake Forest team with 1,044 yards on 252 carries and 111 points on 17 touchdowns and nine conversions. BOB PICKENS OT 6'4" 258 Nebraska 2nd Season Joined Bears: 1967, D-3 for '66 Born: 2-2-'43, Evanston, III.

A neck injury suffered in training camp hampered Pickens in his rookie year although he did get into 388 plays on offense. He wore a protective neck brace all season. An all-state high school line selection at Evanston, he went to Wisconsin, lettered one year and then transferred to Wisconsin. In the 1964 Olympics, Pickens finished fifth in Greco-Roman wrestling. Offseason home: Evanston.

JIM PURNELL LB 6'2" 238 Wisconsin 5th Season Joined Bears: 1964, F.A. Born: 12-12-'41, Evanston, III.

Purnell, another free agent find, has been regular right linebacker the past two seasons. In 1966, his 71 unassisted tackles were second only to Dick Butkus' 79. Last season, because of the "stop" defense in which a fifth defensive back was used on second and third down situations, Purnell



For Rakestraw, 1967 will be a memorable year. He won the Eisenhower Most Valuable Player trophy in the 42-14 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals at Soldier Field. In that game, he passed for one touchdown and ran for two. Later, during the regular schedule, Rakestraw took over at quarterback auginst the New York Giants when Jack Concannon was injured in the first quarter. In this one, he threw three touchdown passes and ran for two. He saw his first NFL action in 1966, getting into the last two games. 

The twenty-third annual Armed Forces Benefit game, matching the Bears and the St. Louis Cardinals at Soldier Field Friday night, Sept. 13, marks the thirteenth straight time it's sponsored by the Chicago Publishers Association (Chicago's American, The Daily News, The Sun-Times and The Tribune).

Sharing in the proceeds are Army Emergency Relief, the Navy Relief Society and the Air Force Aid Society, all official agencies that provide financial assistance to service-men and to widows or orphans of service-men needing it. Since 1946 the series has raised \$997,962.98.

The inaugural in 1946 resulted from a meeting in Washington attended by Dwight D. Eisenhower, then Army Chief of Staff; Admiral Chester K. Nimitz; General Ira Eaker, General Carl Spaatz, George S. Halas and Ralph Cannon, then sports editor of The Chicago Herald-American which sponsored the game in 1946 and 1947. The Sun-Times assumed sponsorship from 1949 through 1954 and in 1955, the four Chicago metropolitan daily newspapers joined in its direction.

In 1953, President Eisenhower authorized presentation of a trophy to the outstanding player in every game, selected by sports writers, radio and TV broadcasters. Of 15 winners, including two Bears who tied in 1960, seven have been representatives of visiting teams. No one has ever won it twice.
