The Coaches

GEORGE S. HALAS, in his 47th season as the owner and his 39th as the head coach of the Bears, has enjoyed a successful career in his own home town. Born on Chicago's west side and a high school student at Crane Tech, he enrolled at the University of Illinois and won letters in football, baseball and basketball there.

Halas served in the U.S. Navy in two world wars. He enlisted after graduation in June 1918 and the following January 1, starred at end on the Great Lakes eleven that won the Rose Bowl game. He entered the Navy again in world war 2, served as welfare and recreation officer of the Pacific Fleet and was decorated with the Bronze Star.

In 1956, then Secretary of the Navy Thomas Gates awarded Halas the Distinguished Public Service Award, the highest honor that can be bestowed on a civilian by the Navy.

It was after Halas left the Navy as an ensign in the spring of 1919 that he made the moves that were to determine his life's profession. He played outfield for the New York Yankees early that season but a leg injury hampered his baseball career.

In 1920, Halas founded the present Bears as the Decatur, Ill., Staleys, the name of the starch company whose owner recognized the public relations potential in a good professional football team. The following year, the team was moved to Chicago and the name was changed to the Bears because they played at Wrigley Field, home of the Cubs.

This is Halas' fourth separate tenure as coach—1920-'29; 1933-November '42; 1946-'55 and 1958 to the present.

His personal coaching record includes six of the eight world's championship teams, 309 victories, 129 defeats and 28 ties.



JOHNSOS

LUKE JOHNSOS has been with the Bears organization longer than anyone except George Halas. This will be his 38th season, beginning in 1929 after his graduation from Northwestern. Like others of his football era, he was a sixty-minute man and he starred at end on both offense and defense, first with the Wildcats and then for nine seasons with the Bears. He also lettered in baseball and got a tryout with the Cincinnati Reds. Johnsos figured in seven of the Bears' eight world championships, as a player in 1932-'33; co-head coach with Hunk Anderson in 1943; and as assistant in 1940-'41, '46 and '63. He became co-coach in mid-season 1942 when Halas re-entered the Navy and shared the responsibilities with Anderson through 1945. In the offseason, Luke is associated with the Bagcraft Corporation of America.

JOHN L. "PADDY" DRISCOLL has been a member of the staff since 1941, first as an assistant, then as head coach in 1956-'57 (with a Western Conference first place the former year) and, in recent seasons, as director of research and planning. Last year, he was inducted into pro football's Hall of Fame. Driscoll is an Evanston native who went on to collegiate greatness at Northwestern. He was Halas' team-mate on the 1919 Great Lakes eleven and in 1920, he began his pro career as a player with the Chicago Cardinals. He coached them in 1921-'22 and in 1926, joined the Bears. Driscoll retired five years later and coached subsequently at Marquette and at St. Mel's high school in Chicago. He holds two NFL drop-kicking records.



PHIL HANDLER, who first came to the Bears' staff in 1952, is in his 37th consecutive season in the NFL as player or coach. A knowledgeable football man with head coaching experience with the Chicago Cardinals in 1943-'45. Handler is directing the defensive line for the second straight year after having tutored the offensive forwards for several seasons. There was a marked reduction of opponents' offensive efforts—from 1,863 enemy yards and a 4.3 average per play in 1964, the yield dropped to 1,530 and 3.8 last season. Handler began his pro career in 1930 after graduating from Texas Christian. He ranks as one of the greatest of all Southwestern Conference linemen. He starred for the Cardinals and later served as an assistant as well as head coach. In the offseason, Handler is sales manager in charge of industrial lumber for the Douglas Lumber Co., Chicago.



ABE GIBRON, offensive captain of the Bears in 1958-'59, returned last season as offensive line coach after five years on the same assignment with the Washington Redskins. The crisp line blocking was an important factor in the stepped-up offense of 1965 which saw the Bears score an all-time high 409 points. Gibron is a native of Michigan City, Ind., who, after winning All-Big Ten guard honors at Purdue, played

seven seasons with the Cleveland Browns and one with the Philadelphia Eagles before coming to the Bears. He was on six straight Eastern Conference winners at Cleveland, three of which won world titles. This is Gibron's seventeenth NFL season as a player or a coach. He was all-NFL in 1955 and also played in five Pro Bowl games.



JIM DOOLEY is the new defensive coach but the position is not unfamiliar to him. Since 1962, after his retirement as a player, he has played a major role in modernizing the Bears' defense with the accent on greater coordination of linebackers and halfbacks on pass defense. Dooley, no. 1 draft choice from Miami of Florida, spent his rookie season of 1952 on defense. Thereafter, he was a regular offensive end whose career pass receptions (211 for 3,172 yards and 16 touchdowns) rank him fourth among Bears' all-time leaders. His career was interrupted twice—all of 1955 and the first eight games of 1956 when he served in the U.S. Air Force; and 1958, when a badly dislocated ankle idled him all year.



SID LUCKMAN has been with the Bears as player or in an advisory coaching capacity since 1939. His twelve seasons as their quarterback brought high success—world championship teams in 1940, '41, '43 and '46, and such individual honors as all-NFL selection from 1941 through 1947; and Most Valuable Player Award in 1943. Last year, Sid was inducted into pro football's Hall of Fame. When he retired as an active player in 1951, he had gained unanimous recognition as the most successful early practitioner of the "T" formation that gave new, exciting dimensions to the sport. He is a native of Brooklyn who starred in athletics at Columbia University and named to the Collegiate Football Hall of Fame. He is vice president of CelluCraft Products Corp.



ED CODY is backfield coach of the Bears this season, his second on the staff for he returned last year to the team on which he was line-

backer, halfback and fullback in 1949-'50. Since retiring as an active player, he has enjoyed coaching success, notably as head mentor at University of California at Santa Barbara (1956-'60) where he developed Johnny Morris into stardom. More recently, he was head coach at San Bernardino Valley College and an assistant at Washington State University. His record as a collegiate head coach shows 68 victories; 31 losses; 3 ties. Before going into the college field, he coached Chicago St. Rita's high from 1952-'55. Cody, a native of Newington, Conn., who graduated from Purdue University, was captain, Big Ten scoring and ground gaining leader as a senior.

BORIS "BABE" DIMANCHEFF is the third Purdue alumnus on the staff. With the Boilermakers, he was All-American fullback in 1944, when he also captained the team, and the no. 1 draft choice of the Boston Yanks. In all, he played nine NFL seasons, with Boston, the Chicago Cardinals and, in 1952, with the Bears. Dimancheff returned here this year as new player personnel director and assistant coach in charge of pass receivers. Since retirement as a player, he coached the Pittsburgh Steelers backfield 1957-'60; served as Dallas Cowboys' offensive coach, 1960-'62; head coach of the United Football League champion Canton Bulldogs and Coach of the Year in 1964; and head coach of the Philadelphia Bulldogs of the Continental League last season.

CHARLES "CHUCK" CHERUNDOLO comes to the Bears after having served as defensive coach of the Washington Redskins, (1964-'65); the Philadelphia Eagles (1962-'63); and the Pittsburgh Steelers (1948-'61). This is his 26th year in the NFL, ten as lineman with the Cleveland Rams, the Eagles and the Steelers. A unanimous All-American center at Penn-State, he went into professional football and duplicated his success as he was chosen all-NFL several times. Between 1942 and 1945, he served in the U.S. Navy in world war 2.

The Trainer



ROZY

ED ROZY is a real athletic career man who is in his nineteenth season as trainer of the Bears. After lettering as a football guard at Marquette University, he became intramural director of athletics in his senior year (1932-'33) and retained the position after graduation. For twelve years, he was trainer of all Marquette athletic teams as well as coach of freshman football, boxing, wrestling, tennis, golf and fencing. Rozy was a lieutenant in the U.S. Navy from 1944 through 1947.

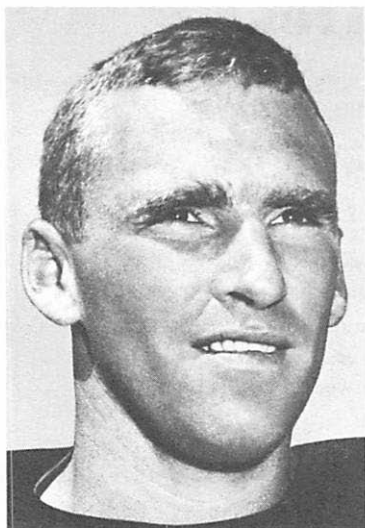


JON ARNETT (21) HB 5'11" 203 Southern Cal. 10th Season
Joined Bears: 1964, T-Los Angeles Born: 4-20-'35, Los Angeles

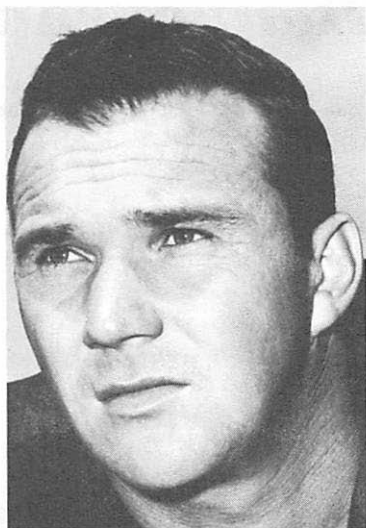
Arnett's established offensive productivity has been up to standard since he came over from Los Angeles on a trade sending three players to the Rams on Aug. 24, 1964. In two seasons as a Bear, Jon has accounted for 763 yards rushing; 337, pass receiving; 481, kickoff returns; 240, punt returns; plus eight touchdowns. He shared the running back spot with Gale Sayers last season and among his top accomplishments were 73 yards on 13 rushes in the 31-10 win over Green Bay; a 59-yard touchdown pass to Johnny Morris against Detroit; and a 77-yard return of a San Francisco kickoff. Arnett's career total offense yardage is only 103 short of 10,000—3655 rushing; 2248 pass receiving; 3071 kickoff returns; and 923 punt returns. Arnett was the Rams' no. 1 draft choice for 1957 after a brilliant career, including All-American honors, at Southern California. Offseason home: Los Angeles.

DOUG ATKINS (81) DE 6'8" 270 Tennessee 14th Season
Joined Bears: 1955, T.—Cleveland Born: 5-8-'30, Humboldt, Tenn.

Doug Atkins goes into his fourteenth NFL season—and his twelfth with the Bears—as one of the most respected defensive ends in the league. He has been an all-NFL selection three times (1960, 1961 and 1963) and has been with the West team in the Pro Bowl eight out of the last nine years. After a great campaign with the 1963 world's champions, Atkins was slowed in 1964 by, first, a knee injury and then, in November, by a groin injury that caused him to miss four games. Surgery on



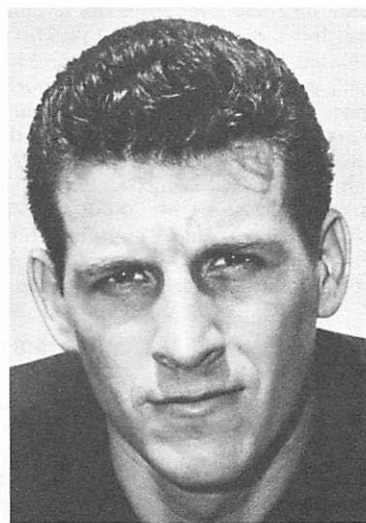

the knee during the offseason was successful and he got into all 14 games with the Bears last year. Offseason home: Knoxville, Tenn.

CHARLES BIVINS (49) E 6'2" 212 Morris Brown 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, D-7 Born: 10-16-'38, Atlanta, Ga.

Bivins was moved to reserve tight end last season, along with duties on kicking units, after having been an alternate at both half-back and fullback in preceding years. He caught four passes for 108 yards, including two for touchdowns. Although he had no kickoff return yardage in 1965, his career total of 1,531 on 62 runbacks is high for the team. Offseason home: Atlanta.

DENNIS BREWSTER (68) G 6'2" 245 Brigham Young 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1966, D-6 Born: 10-6-'43, San Antonio, Texas

Brewster was named offensive guard on the second Western Athletic Conference all star team in 1965. He also was selected on Colorado State's all-opponent team. Brewster prepped at Iolani high in Honolulu and was voted most valuable player. Offseason home: Mt. Holley, N. J.

CHARLEY BROWN (22) DB 6'1" 193 Syracuse 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1966, D-2 Born: 9-13-'42, Massillon, Ohio

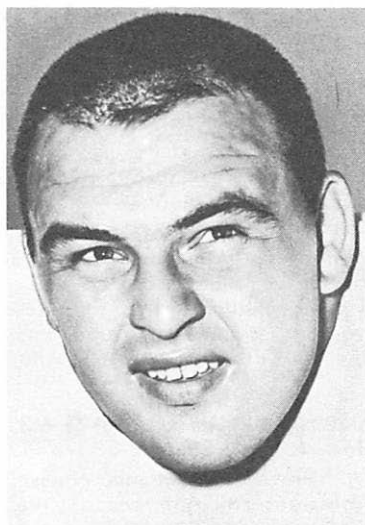
After averaging 4.4 yards a carry as a sophomore running back at Syracuse, Brown was shifted to defense and in 1964-'65, led the team in pass interceptions as well as being leading tackler in the secondary. He was named All-East both years too and shared punt and kickoff return duties. Brown prepped at Massillon, famed for its high school elevens, and was All-America as well as All-Ohio. Offseason home: Massillon.

DOUG BUFFONE (55) LB 6'3" 230 Louisville 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1966, D-4 Born: 6-27-'44, Yatesboro, Pa.

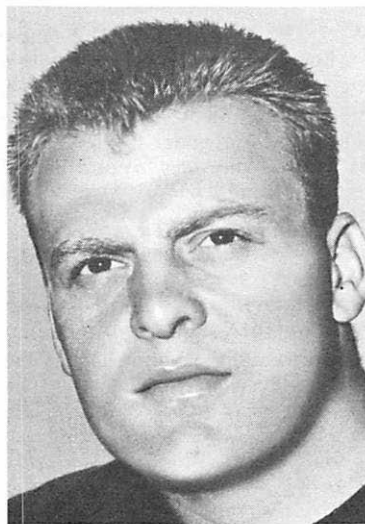
Buffone was named the South's outstanding lineman after the 27-18 victory over the North in the Senior Bowl at Mobile when he intercepted a pass to set up the winning rally and later came up with a fourth down, goal-line tackle to repulse a scoring bid. He also played in the North-South game at Miami. He was captain at Louisville where his last two seasons were spectacular statistically. As a junior he had 138 unassisted tackles; 39 assists; recovered three opponents fumbles and intercepted one pass. As a senior, he had 132 tackles, 48 assists; and recovered three fumbles. His sophomore efforts were 64



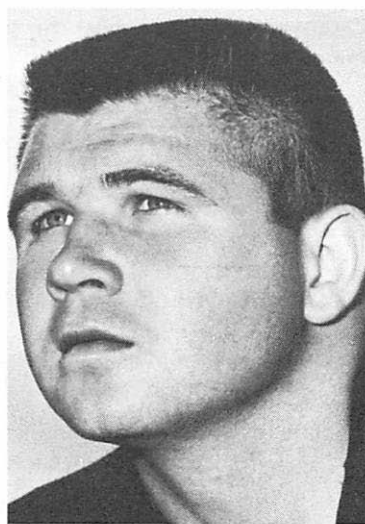

RUDY BUKICH (10) QB 6'2" 205 Southern Cal. 12th Season
Joined Bears: 1962, T-Pittsburgh Born: 12-15-'32, St. Louis, Mo.

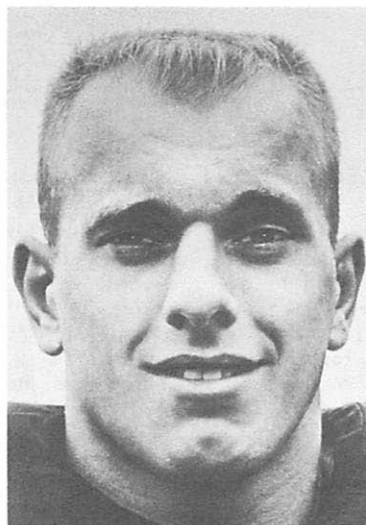
Bukich won his first NFL passing championship last season. This honor is based on standing in four categories and Bukich led in low percentage interceptions (2.9); was second in average yards per attempt (8.46); third in completion percentage (56.4); and fifth in total touchdowns (20). It was by far Bukich's best season in eleven NFL campaigns, beginning in 1953, when Los Angeles drafted him no. 2, and continuing through service with Washington, Pittsburgh and the Bears. In 1965, he completed 176 for 2,641 yards and was the victim of only nine enemy interceptions. In 1964, when he completed 99 out of 160 for his best NFL campaign up to then, he tied a league record for consecutive completed passes with thirteen in a row against San Francisco Nov. 22 and Detroit Nov. 26. Bukich has a nightly sports telecast on station WBKB. Offseason home: Glenview, Ill.

RON BULL (29) FB 6' 200 Baylor 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1962, D-1 Born: 2-2-'40, Kingsville, Tex.

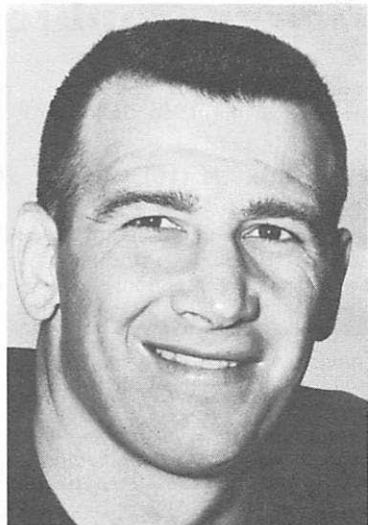
Bull was shifted to fullback last season and wound up with his best season yet as a Bear. . . . 417 yards on 91 rushes, a 4.6 average; 186 yards on 16 pass receptions; 63 yards on two pass completions out of three. While his overall best single game was against the St. Louis Cardinals here (66 yards on 13 rushes; 77 yards on three pass receptions), he had two particularly productive days against Minnesota—92 yards on 10 rushes there and 80 and 17 here, plus four pass receptions for 39 yards in the two games. Ron was an all-American at Baylor and was selected as rookie of the year in 1962, his first in the NFL. Off-season home: Park Ridge, Ill.

DICK BUTKUS (51) LB 6'3" 245 Illinois 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1965, D-1 Born: 12-9-'42, Chicago

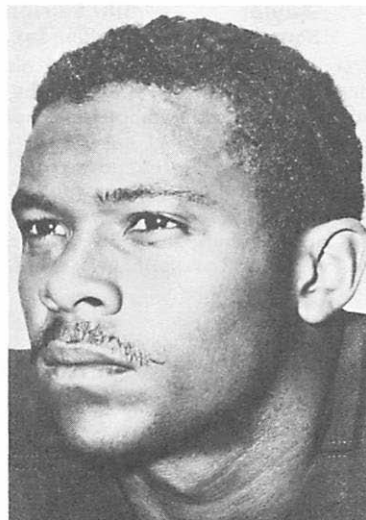
Butkus, twice in succession All-American at Illinois as well as American Football Coaches Association Player of the Year for 1964, maintained his outstanding tempo with the Bears. He was an All-NFL selection as linebacker, played for the West in the Pro Bowl and led the Bears in pass interceptions, five, and opponents fumbles recovered, six. Probably his most important interception came against the Vikings at Minnesota when, with the Bears holding a 38-37 lead and only 1:32

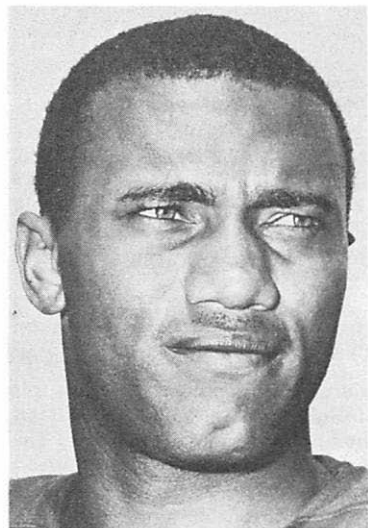

Joined Bears: 1956, D-7 Born: 1-17-'33, Columbia, S. C.

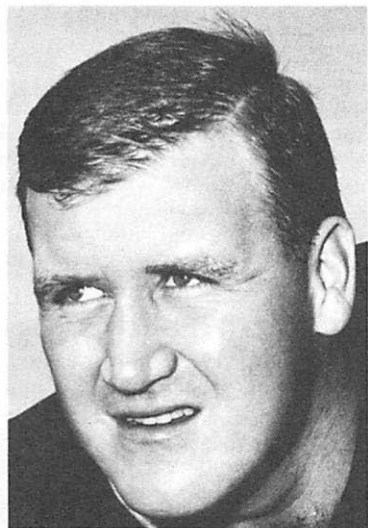

Cornish also was selected on the Associated Press Small College All-American and in his own conference, the Southwestern, he received a unique recognition—by unanimous vote of all seventeen coaches, he was chosen on both the offensive and defensive platoons. MIKE DITKA (89) E 6'3" 230 Pittsburgh 6th Season
Joined Bears: 1961, D-1 Born: 10-18-'39, Carnegie, Pa.

Ditka caught 36 passes in 1965 as compared to 75 in 1964 yet, despite a foot injury suffered during the training season, he was an important factor in the Bears' successes. Rivals were aware of him, as a potential pass receiving threat but even more so, as a blocker who played an important role contributing to the improved running game. He caught at least one pass in all but two games with his best day at New York when he had five for 80 yards. His best day's effort in five NFL campaigns saw him catch 13 for 168 Oct. 25, 1964 against Washington. That was only one under the Bears' club record of 14 set by Jim Keane in 1949. He also holds a share of an NFL mark with ex-Bear Ken Kavanaugh, each of whom recovered team-mates' fumbles for touchdowns. Ditka's came on a Ron Bull muff in 1962 and on Johnny Morris' bobble in 1964. Ditka, rookie of the year in 1961, has played for the West in the Pro Bowl five straight years and has been all-NFL tight end 1961-'64 inclusive. Offseason home: Lombard, Ill.

RICK DUNCAN (14) K 5'10" 208 E. Montana State 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1966, F.A. Born: 8-14-'40, Mattoon, Ill.

Duncan gained state-wide recognition as a punter and place kicker at Mattoon high school, where he was a regular end in 1958. Enrolling at Eastern Montana State where ex-Illini Ken Karr (now assistant at Wake Forest) was head coach, Duncan was 12th in the nation as a punter in 1959, averaging 43.2. He also played quarterback and was the place kicker. He dropped out of school the following year but in 1962, enrolled at Pierce Junior College, Woodlands, Cal., where his 41-yard punting average topped the Western States conference. MIKE EISCHEID (37) K 5'11" 185 Upper Iowa 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1965, F.A. Born: 9-29-'40, Orange City, Ia.

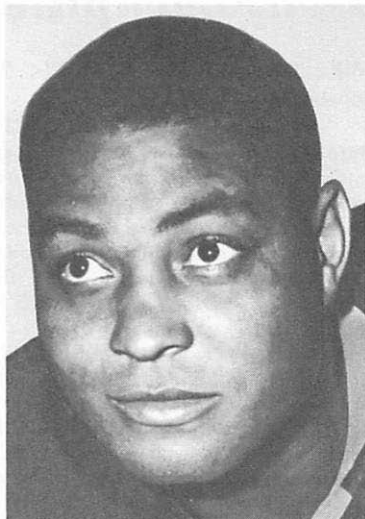

Joined Bears: 1964, D-1 Born: 2-12-'41, State College, Pa.

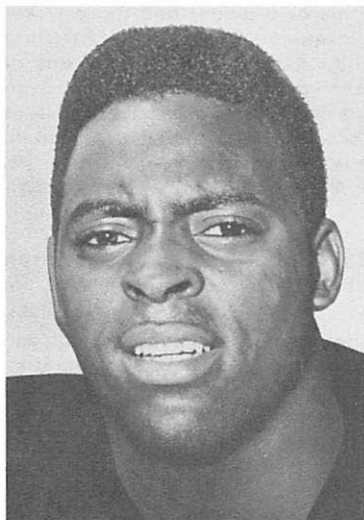

LARRY GLUECK (43) DB 6' 190 Villanova 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1963, D-3 Born: 10-5-'41, Norristown, Pa.

Glueck was an aggressive reserve on the defensive secondary for the Bears in 1965 but an injury forced him to sit out the last two games of the schedule. He also functioned on special kicking units during the twelve games in which he was active. Glueck didn't get in much playing time at all in 1964 because of knee cartilage damaged in the preseason schedule. He underwent successful surgery after the 1964 campaign. DICK GORDON (45) E 5'11" 190 Michigan State 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1965, D-6 Born: 1-1-'44, Cincinnati.

Gordon had a satisfactory rookie season with the Bears, sharing time with Jim Jones at split end. Three of his thirteen pass receptions were for touchdowns and the total gains covered 279 yards. That yardage, along with 242 on fourteen kickoff returns made him a productive performer. At Michigan State, where he didn't win a varsity letter until his junior year when he got in 112 minutes of playing time, finished up spectacularly as a senior. His 571 yards on 81 rushes were second only to Illinois' Jim Grabowski in the Big Ten. Offseason home: Chicago.

He now is third, with a 44.84 average on 399 punts, putting him back of San Francisco's Tommy Davis with 425 for 45.34 and the retired Sammy Baugh with 338 for 44.93. Green's best single season average came in 1961 with an even 47. Offseason home: Gainesville, Fla.

RANDY JACKSON (65) T 6'5" 245 Florida 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1966, D-4 Born: 3-6-'44, Lake City, Fla.

Jackson played at various times at tackle, tight end and split end at Florida. Basically a lineman on offense, he was mainly at tackle where his speed and blocking served him well. As an end, he was a fine pass receiver. He has been clocked at :04.8 for the 40-yard dash. Jackson was an outstanding prep basketball player who rejected scholarship offers from other Southeastern Conference schools to concentrate on football at Florida. Offseason home: Lake City.

JOHN JOHNSON (76) DT 6'5" 260 Indiana 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1963, D-5 Born: 5-7-'41, Gary, Ind.

Johnson is another example of how injuries revise the thinking and planning of coaches. As a rookie, in 1963, he started on offense but reduction of defensive line manpower caused his shift. At Indiana, Johnson played guard his first two seasons but was moved to tackle as a senior. Offseason home: Schiller Park, Ill.

JIMMY JONES (80) E 6'2" 187 Wisconsin 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1965, D-6 for 1964 Born: 3-3-'41, Washington, D.C.

Jones broke in as starting split end, caught 21 passes for 350 yards and four touchdowns. His best single day's showing was against San Francisco here in December when he had 113 yards on three receptions. In two starts against the Baltimore Colts, Jones totaled seven for 95 yards. He also picked up thirteen yards rushing on two end-around plays. Jones, drafted as a future, got in around 213 minutes of play in each of his last two years at Wisconsin, catching 56 passes for 908 yards and seven touchdowns. Offseason home: Chicago.

He also ran several plays from fullback—one as a ball carrier—but his basic value was on the special groups. He also returned one kickoff eleven yards. In three seasons at Wisconsin, Kurek averaged about four yards per carry off a 957-yard total. As a sophomore, he had an exceptional 6.1 average off 341 yards and scored six touchdowns. Offseason home: Watertown, Wis.

ROGER LECLERC (54) PK-C 6'3" 235 Trinity 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, D-15 for 1959 Born: 10-1-'36, Springfield, Mass.

After two years away from the extra point assignments, Leclerc resumed those duties in 1965 and booted 1,000—he had 52 out of 52, a Bears' team record and NFL's second best season mark without a miss. (Record of 53-53 set by Pat Harder, Cardinals, 1948). Leclerc, who doubled as linebacker on defense and occasional center on offense, is Bears' high scorer for his career—with 299 points off 128 conversions and 57 field goals. In 1961, he tied the NFL record of five field goals in one game set by Ernie Nevers and later tied by Bob Waterfield. Offseason home: Agawam, Mass.

HERMAN LEE (70) T 6'3" 247 Florida A. & M. 10th Season
Joined Bears: 1958, D-23 for 1954 Born: 8-29-'31, Phenix City, Ala.

Lee is a real Bears' veteran, one of about half a dozen present members of the squad who were on the roster in 1958. That's the year Lee came back to the Bears after having played regularly one season with the Pittsburgh Steelers. He was picked on the 23rd round of the 1954 NFL selection meeting but served two years in the Army before entering pro football. Offseason home: Chicago.

DICK LEEUWENBURG (57) T 6'5" 242 Stanford 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1965, D-11 for 1964 Born: 3-26-'42, Salt Lake City, Utah

RILEY MATTSON (75) T 6'4" 255 Oregon 6th Season
Joined Bears: 1965, T-Washington Born: 12-18-'38, Portland, Ore.

Mattson, who suffered a knee injury in the Armed Forces game Sept. 3, 1965 and underwent surgery ten days later, has recovered and will be back again to bid for an offensive line spot. He came to the Bears on a trade during the offseason after 1964. He was the Redskins' no. 11 draft choice for 1961 and took over as a regular offensive left tackle immediately. Offseason home: Portland, Ore.

DOUG McFALLS (44) DB 6'1" 180 Georgia "U" 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1966, D-8 Born: 10-30-'41, Gainesville, Ga.

Although an injury idled him for a great part of 1965, McFalls was elected game captain for the year at the end of the schedule. The Georgia Bulldogs' custom is to name captains, game by game, with an overall leader elected at the windup. He was a regular defensive halfback for both previous seasons. Member of the 1966 College All Stars. Offseason home: Rome, Ga.

BENNIE McRAE (26) DB 6' 180 Michigan 5th Season

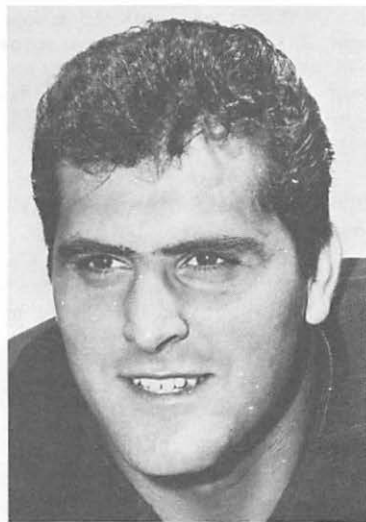

He did a thorough job of rewriting South Dakota State's record book with an amazing total of eighteen new marks, career, one season or one game; and ties of two others. Of individual exploits, his best single game success showed 23 completions out of 34 for 289 yards and two touchdowns against Arkansas State. His longest scoring pass was a 75-yard screener against Montana State. Offseason home: Wells, Minn.

JOHNNY MORRIS (47) FL 5'10" 180 U.C.S. Barbara 9th Season
Joined Bears: 1958, D-12 Born: 9-26-'36, Long Beach, Cal.

Morris, whose 93 pass receptions in 1964 set an NFL record, is the Bears' career leader in that category with 331 for 4,779 yards and 30 touchdowns. His greatest concentration of profitable catching, however, has been the past five seasons, after his shift to flanker from a running back spot. Since 1961, he has caught 287 for 4,188 yards, 25 touchdowns. Meantime, he has rushed only 11 times for 66 yards. In eight seasons with the Bears, Johnny has a total offense production of 7,949 yards in four different categories. He was all-NFL flanker in 1964 and also was named for the second time on the West team for the Pro Bowl but a shoulder injury in the final game of the season kept him out of the All Star affair. Petitbon holds the Bears' career interception record of 26 for 518 yards. He turned three of those steals into touchdowns—topped by a 101-yarder against the Los Angeles Rams in 1962 plus a 66-yarder against Detroit in 1963 and one for 33 against Baltimore in his rookie season. He was named safety on the all-NFL team in 1963 and has played in the Pro Bowl twice. Petitbon was an outstanding quarterback at Tulane but the Bears converted him into a proficient defensive back when he joined them in 1959. Offseason home: Metairie, La.

BRIAN PICCOLO (41) HB 6' 205 Wake Forest 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1965, F.A. Born: 10-31-'43, Pittsfield, Mass.

Piccolo suffered a leg injury during workouts for the American Football Coaches Association All Star game at Buffalo in June 1965 and was forced to sit it out for the entire NFL season. He was the nation's collegiate leader in rushing and scoring in 1964, with 1,044 yards on 252 carries, a 4.14 average; and 111 points on 17 touchdowns and nine conversions. Piccolo, a work-horse, had 252 rushes for high total among college backs carrying 200 or more times, and fumbled only once. A native of Pittsfield, Mass., he attended Central Catholic high in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. Offseason home: Fort Lauderdale.

DAVE PIVEC (61) G 6'4" 230 Notre Dame 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1966, D-14 for 1965 Born: 9-25-'43, Baltimore, Md.

Pivec lettered as a sophomore and a junior at Notre Dame but dropped out of school as a senior in 1964 and joined the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian League. He played defensive end mainly as a sophomore although he did catch two passes for 32 yards. In 1963, he was a two-way performer at end, catching six passes for 76 yards and one touchdown. He intercepted one pass and was credited with 22 tackles. Pivec prepped at Patterson high in Baltimore, won

Joined Bears: 1965, T-Minnesota Born: 6-12-'37, Keokuk, Ia.

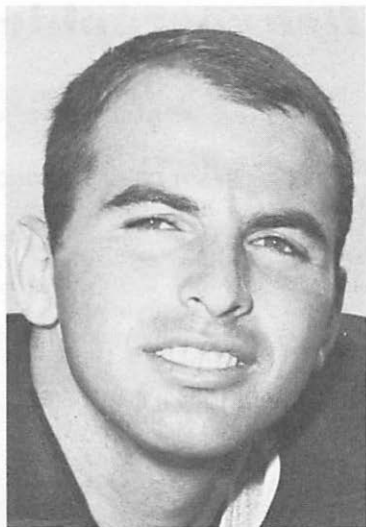

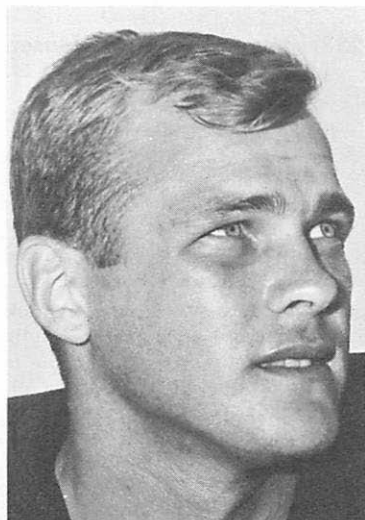
Sayers rewrote some important passages in the NFL record book during a rookie season in which he got even more spectacular results than characterized his collegiate play. He was unanimous choice as All-NFL running back and Rookie of the Year, off such exploits as six touchdowns in one afternoon against San Francisco (tying the record shared by Ernie Nevers and "Dub" Jones); an NFL record breaking 21 yards average on 16 attempts in three categories in the same game (113 on 9 rushes; 89 on 2 pass receptions; 134 on 5 punt returns); a new mark of 22 touchdowns for the season; 132 points, most ever scored by an NFL rookie. He led in scoring, was runnerup in rushing, punt and kickoff returns. Sayers' long distance efforts included



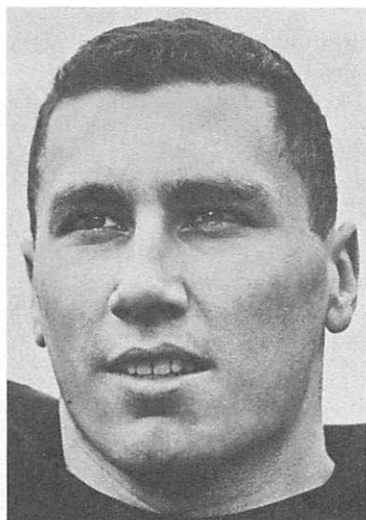

kickoff returns of 96 (for a touchdown) and 86 yards; a punt return of 85 (TD); two pass receptions for 80 yards each (and two TD's); scoring rushes of 61, 50 and 45 yards. He also completed two passes out of three, one for a touchdown. Twice in succession an All-American at Kansas, Sayers set Big Eight Conference records for rushing, 2,675 yards in three seasons; longest run from scrimmage, 99 yards; most yards in a single game, 273 against Oklahoma. Offseason home: Chicago.

BRIAN SCHWEDA (60) DE 6'3" 250 Kansas 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1965, D-8 Born: 4-30-'43, Kansas City, Kan.

Recurrence of a four-year-old hand injury that had healed improperly required a pre-training camp operation for Schweda. The former Kansas lineman, delayed in training as a result, was sidelined all season. He was an All-Big Eight Conference selection as a senior. Offseason home: Lawrence, Kan.

GEORGE SEALS (67) DE-G 6'3" 260 Missouri 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1965, T-Washington Born: 10-2-'42, Higginsville, Mo.

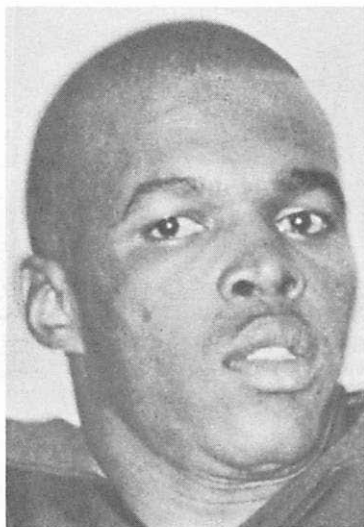
Seals was all-Big Eight Conference defensive end at Missouri and the New York Giants picked him on the fourth round of the NFL player selection meeting for 1964 but in April, he was traded to the Washington Redskins. He was outstanding as an offensive guard and tackle in his rookie year. Just before the 1965 campaign, the Bears traded Ted Karras to the Redskins for Seals, who was alternate offensive guard who also saw some defensive action. Offseason home: Chicago.

JOHN SISK (86) FL 6'3" 195 Miami (Fla.) 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1964, D-17 for 1963 Born: 7-15-'41, Milwaukee

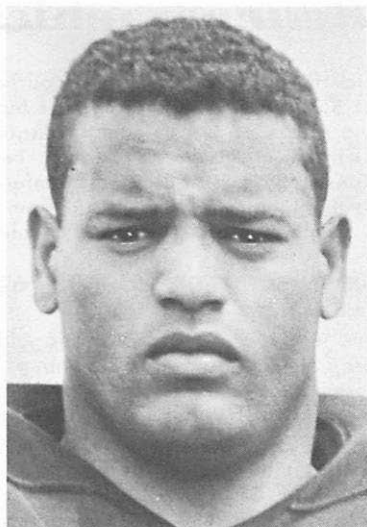
Sisk was on the reserve unit all of last year after seeing service as a defensive back late in his rookie season. He is the son of John Sisk, Sr., halfback on Bear championship teams of 1932-'33. Offseason home: Milwaukee.

ROOSEVELT TAYLOR (24) DB 5'11" 186 Grambling 6th Season
Joined Bears: 1961, F.A. Born: 7-4-'37, New Orleans

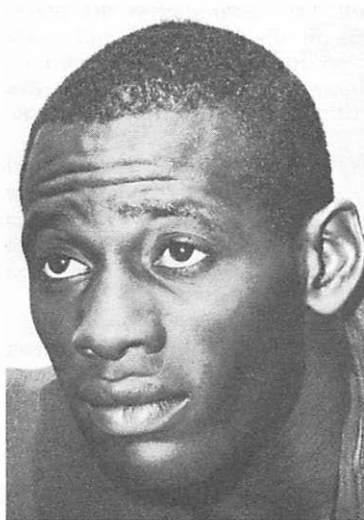
Taylor, a blue chip find as a free agent, has been a valued member of the Bears' secondary for five years. In 1963, his nine interceptions set a new Bears' team record. His first two seasons, he also functioned on the kickoff and punt return units and in these departments totaled 661 yards on 39 runbacks. Last season, when Bob Kilcullen blocked a Ram field goal attempt at Los Angeles, Taylor recovered the loose ball and ran 60 yards for a touchdown, his third in NFL



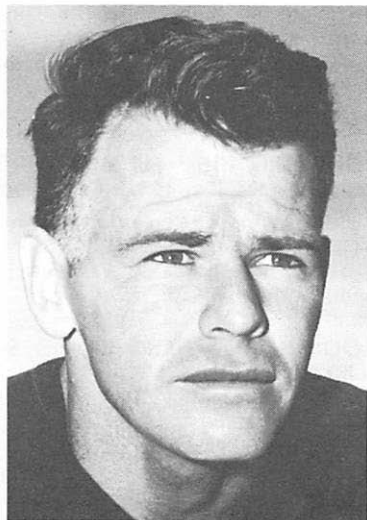

competition. He also ran back two interceptions for scores, both against the San Francisco Forty Niners—43 yards in 1962 and 30 in 1963. He was chosen All-NFL safety in 1963 and also played in the Pro Bowl game. Offseason home: New Orleans.

MICKY UPTON (27) HB 5'10" 185 Southern Cal. 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1966, F.A. Born: 8-3-'44, McCurtain, Okla.

Upton was christened Gary Ray but he prefers Mickey. He lettered one season, 1965, at Southern California, third college he attended after winning all-state prep honors at Stillwater, Okla. Upton enrolled at Oklahoma State as a pre-dental student in 1962. When his parents moved to California, he joined them, decided to transfer to Southern California because of its dentistry school. However, he needed extra credits so he spent a year at San Bernardino Junior college where he was named to the J.C. All-America. His coach was Ed Cody, presently Bears' backfield coach. Upton led his conference in rushing, 961 yards; scored 15 touchdowns and averaged 42 yards punting. After being with the Trojans last fall, he decided to go into pro football. Offseason home: Rialto, Cal.

BILL WADE (9) QB 6'2" 205 Vanderbilt 13th Season
Joined Bears: 1961, T-Los Angeles Born: 10-4-'30, Nashville, Tenn.

Offseason surgery corrected a knee problem that inactivated Wade for a great part of the 1965 pre-season schedule and in all but six games of the regular NFL card. The result was, his 20 completions in 41 attempts were his lowest pass total since 1957 when he had 10 out of 24 for the Los Angeles Rams. Since Wade joined the Bears in 1961, he set club records for most attempts, completions and yards; longest completion; and most attempts and completions in one game. He has had ten three-touchdown games; three four-touchdown games; eight games of 300 yards or more gained passing and one of 466. The injury in 1965 occurred in training camp when, in a signal drill, he twisted his knee as he attempted a double spin. Actually, it was a recurrence of a 1953 knee injury. Offseason home: Nashville.

BOB WETOSKA (63) T 6'3" 240 Notre Dame 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, F.A. Born: 8-22-'37, Minneapolis

Wetoska, one of the NFL's most improved offensive linemen, maintained his status as a top tackle, starting all 14 games last year. He is versatile too and, in his career, has played offensive guard in addition to tackle. At Notre Dame, he played end and was drafted no. 5 by the Washington Redskins who did not retain him. The Bears signed him as a free agent. Offseason home: Glencoe, Ill.

Joined Bears: 1961, T-New York Born: 6-14-'36, Shelby, Mich.

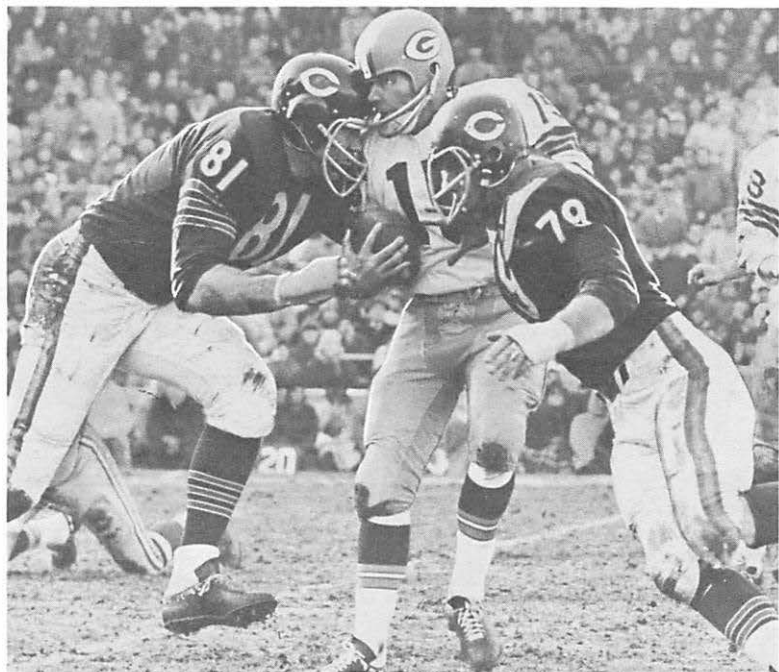

The Pro Bowl Game

The West holds a 10-6 edge on the East in the All Star Pro Bowl game in Los Angeles sponsored by the National Football League in cooperation with the Los Angeles Publishers Association. Coaches from the respective conferences lead squads composed of star players from the West and the East.

Every National Football League coach selects first and second offensive and defensive elevens from among players on the six other teams in his particular conference. He cannot vote for his own players. The NFL Commissioner and the Pro Bowl Committee each selects first and second offensive and defensive squads from each conference. The final selections are made on a basis of two points for a first team choice, one for a second. That means a unanimous selection would be worth sixteen points. Past scores:

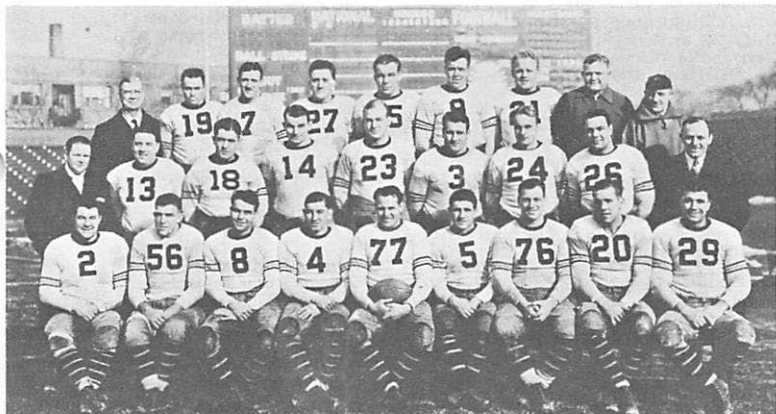

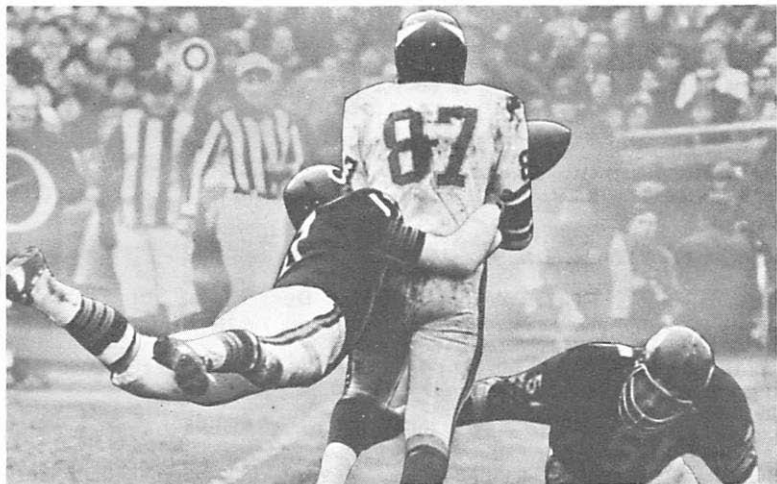

The twenty-first annual Armed Forces Benefit game, matching the Bears and the St. Louis Cardinals at Soldier Field Friday night, Sept. 2, marks the twelfth straight time it's sponsored by the Chicago Publishers Association (Chicago's American, The Daily News, The Sun-Times and The Tribune).

Sharing in the proceeds are Army Emergency Relief, the Navy Relief Society and the Air Force Aid Society, all official agencies that provide financial assistance to service-men and to widows or orphans of service-men needing it. Since 1946, the series has raised \$871,621.36.

The inaugural in 1946 resulted from a meeting in Washington attended by Dwight D. Eisenhower, then Army Chief of Staff; Admiral Chester K. Nimitz; General Ira Eaker, General Carl Spaatz, George S. Halas and Ralph Cannon, then sports editor of the Chicago Herald-American which sponsored the game in 1946 and 1947. The Sun-Times assumed sponsorship from 1949 through 1954 and in 1955, the four Chicago metropolitan daily newspapers joined in its direction.

In 1953, President Eisenhower authorized presentation of a trophy to the outstanding player in every game, selected by sports writers, radio and TV broadcasters.

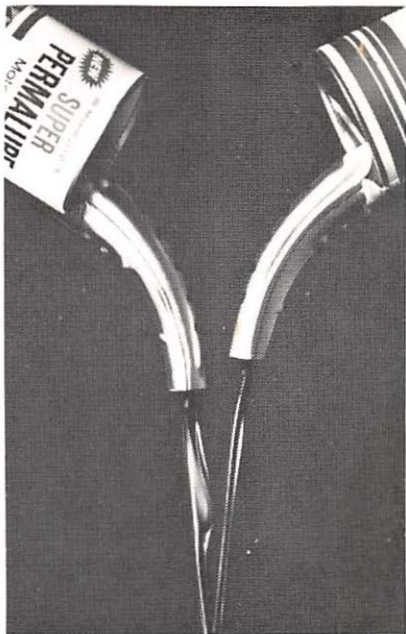
