The Bears Coaches

GEORGE HALAS is in his 44th season of professional football and his 36th as head coach of the Chicago Bears, the team he founded at Decatur, Ill., in 1920. They were first known as the Staleys but became the Bears after the move to Chicago in 1921.

Halas' personal coaching record shows 284 victories, including the first six games of 1942; 119 defeats, and 26 ties. He has been head coach four different times, 1920-1929; 1933-November 1942, when he entered the Navy in world war 2; 1946-1955; and 1958 to the present. He is a native Chicagoan who graduated from Crane Tech high school and the University of Illinois where he was a three-sport letterman.

Halas was with the Great Lakes eleven that won the Jan. 1, 1919 Rose Bowl game and later, he played outfield briefly for the New York Yankees. He was an end for the Bears until his retirement as an active player in 1929. Halas served as Welfare and Recreation Officer of the Pacific Fleet in world war 2 and was decorated with the Bronze Star.

JOHN L. "PADDY" DRISCOLL, appointed director of research and planning this season, has been on the Bears' staff since 1941 with two years, 1956-'57, as head coach. The 1956 team won the NFL Western Conference title. Paddy, a native of Evanston, starred at Northwestern University and then, entering the Navy in world war 1, he was a team mate of Halas on the Great Lakes eleven. He went into pro football as a player with the Cardinals in 1920 and was their coach in 1921-'22, joining the Bears in 1926. After retiring in 1931, he coached at Marquette University and at Chicago St. Mel's high school before returning to the Bears. He also played baseball as a Cub infielder one season. Paddy was one of football's greatest drop-kickers and holds two NFL records.

LUKE JOHNSOS has been a Chicago Bear, either player or coach, for 35 years since his graduation from Northwestern University. He was an outstanding end for nine years, beginning in 1929, and upon his retirement after the 1937 campaign, he became an assistant coach. Johnsos

has been an important figure in six of the Bears' seven world championship seasons, as player in 1932-1933 and as a coach in 1940, 1941, 1943 and 1946. When Halas entered the Navy in mid-season 1942, he became co-coach with Hunk Anderson. The 1942-43 Bears won championships. Luke also was an outstanding baseball player at Northwestern and after graduation, he had a tryout with the Cincinnati Reds. During the offseason, he is employed by the Bagcraft Corporation of America.

PHIL HANDLER is in his 34th consecutive NFL season as a coach or player. He came to the Bears as line coach in 1952, after long service with the Cardinals. As a player, beginning in 1930, Handler was one of the finest of pro linemen. He was head coach of the Cardinals in 1943 and 1945; and co-coach with Buddy Parker in 1949, following tenures as assistant under Ernie Nevers, Milan Creighton and Jimmy Conzelman. He also did an effective scouting job for the 1947-'48 Cardinals. Phil attended Texas Christian University in Fort Worth and is rated one of its brightest all-time stars. Outside of football, he is a salesman for the Douglas Lumber Company in Chicago.

CHARLES "CHUCK" MATHER came to the Bears in the spring of 1958 from the University of Kansas where he effected a remarkable rebuilding job.

From an 0-10 record in 1954, his first year there, he developed the football squad into one that finished second in the Big Eight Conference in 1957. That won him conference Coach of the Year honors. Previously, Mather had coached six consecutive state champions with an overall record of 57-3 at Massillon, Ohio, Washington high school. He holds an M. A. degree from Kent State University and is author of books and articles on football. As an innovator with imagination, he developed IBM evaluation of players and use of closed circuit TV on sidelines.

GEORGE ALLEN has been on the Bears' staff since October, 1958, coming here after one season as Los Angeles Rams' end coach and nine years as a successful college head coach. Two of his college teams ranked in the top three nationally on pass defense. Under his direction last season, the Bears' pass defense held opponents to the NFL's lowest completion percentage, 46.8, and also permitted only 14 touchdowns by passing as against 28 in 1961. Allen, a native of Detroit, played varsity football at Marquette and at Alma, Mich., College and later attended Michigan where he was a varsity wrestler. He is a member of Sigma Delta Psi, national honorary athletic and scholastic fraternity.

SID LUCKMAN, a fabulous name in Bears' history, has been with the organization as player or coach or in an advisory capacity continuously since 1939. His 12-year playing career included the championship teams of 1940, '41, '43 and '46. He was all-NFL quarterback 1941-'47, inclusive, and in 1943 won the Most Valuable Player Award. Sid retired as an active player in 1951. He hails from Brooklyn and was a brilliant college halfback at Columbia University. Luckman was named to the Collegiate Football Hall of Fame. He has lived in Chicago since his playing days and is vice president of Cellu-Craft Products Corporation.

JOE STYDAHAR, all-time Bears' great tackle, returns this year in a coaching role. Between 1936-'46, with two years out for military service, he was a line star who four times won all-NFL honors. As the Bears' no. 1 draft choice of 1936 from West Virginia, he was the first lineman in league history ever to be chosen on the first round. Stydahar served as an assistant with the Los Angeles Rams beginning in 1947 and was their head coach in 1950-'51. The Rams won the world championship in 1951 after losing in the '50 playoff. Joe coached the Chicago Cardinals in 1953-'54, then decided to devote full time to his business. Two years ago, he did color commentary on WBBM-radio broadcasts of Big Ten games. He is president of Starr Container Corporation of Chicago.

JIM DOOLEY was appointed to the coaching staff this year after a brilliant playing career that began in 1952 when he was the no. 1 draft choice of the Bears. Dooley caught 211 passes for 3,172 yards and 16 touchdowns to rank second to Harlon Hill (226) in the Bears' all-time list in that category. After starring as a halfback for Miami, Fla., University, he joined the Bears in 1952 and was used on defense as a rookie. In 1953, shifted to right flanker on offense, he led the team in pass receptions for the first of three times, the others being 1957 and 1959. His '53 mark was his best single season effort, 53 for 841 yards.

ED ROZY, an all-around long service athletic career man, has been trainer of the Bears since 1948. Before that, except from 1944-'47 when he was a lieutenant in the U.S. Navy, he was a prominent figure in Marquette University sports. He lettered as a guard in football and graduated in 1933. In his senior year, he was intramural athletic director, a position he continued to hold for twelve years after graduation, in addition to coaching freshman football, boxing, wrestling, tennis, golf and fencing and training all of the school's athletic teams. He held those positions until he joined the Navy. He returned to Marquette in 1947 and a year later, came to the Bears. Rozy is a native of Two Rivers, Wis.

ART ANDERSON (79) OT 6'3" 244 Idaho 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1961, F.A. Born: 10-9-'37, Wahpeton, N. D.

Anderson showed considerable improvement on his pass blocking last season, his second in the National Football League. But a personal highlight came in the Bears' game against the New York Giants at Wrigley Field when, on the last play of the fourth quarter, he took a lateral pass from Bill Wade and advanced the ball seven yards to break into the NFL rushing statistics, something rare for a lineman. He was a 212-pound tackle at University of Idaho for three years before joining the Marines in 1958. Then, his weight rose to 244 pounds, he earned All-Service tackle honors and upon his discharge, he was signed by the Bears as a free-agent. He became starting offensive tackle early in 1961. Offseason home: San Diego, Cal.

DOUG ATKINS (81) DE 6'8" 255 Tennessee 11th Season
Joined Bears: 1955, T-Cleveland. Born: 5-8-'30, Humboldt, Tenn.

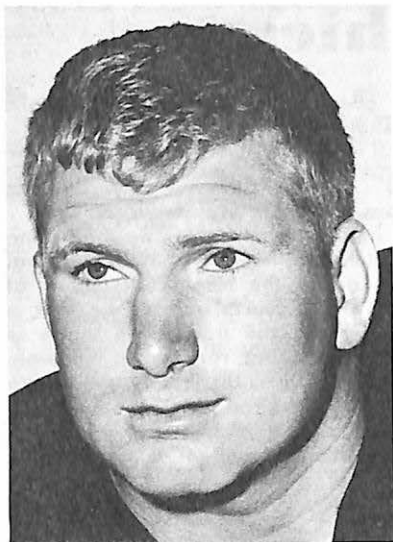
Atkins not only is one of the largest but one of the most consistent defensive ends in the National Football League. He was an all-NFL selection in 1960-'61 and played for the West in the Pro Bowl six straight times, 1958 through 1963, inclusive. In 1959, he was voted outstanding lineman in the Pro Bowl game. Last year was a typical Atkins production—he had 81 tackles and 29 assists, recovered two opponents' fumbles. Atkins was Cleveland's no. 1 draft choice in 1953 after having been an all-American tackle at Tennessee where, incidentally, he had enrolled on a basketball scholarship. Two years later, he came to the Bears on a trade. Offseason home: Knoxville, Tenn.

STEVE BARNETT (73) OT 6'1½" 255 Oregon 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1963, D-2 Born: 6-4-'41, Fremont, Cal.

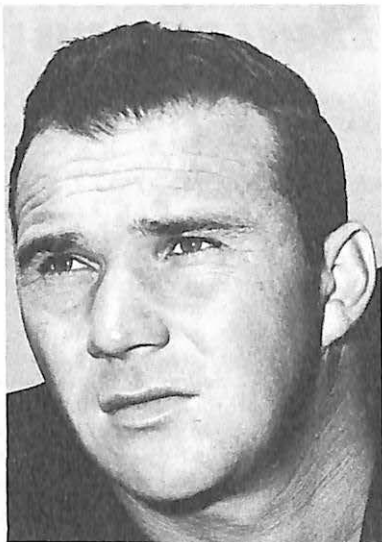
Barnett won All-America tackle honors on the authoritative elevens selected by the American Football Coaches Association and the Football Writers of America. He averaged more than 40 minutes per game in three seasons at Oregon where he co-captained the 1962 squad. Barnett's

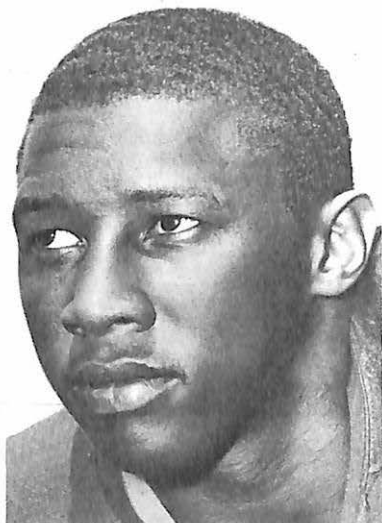

exceptional blocking for the West All Stars was a highlight of the Shrine game at San Francisco and following that, he co-captained the victorious West team in the Hula Bowl game at Honolulu. He is a top student who also was named on the Scholastic All-America. Besides football, he lettered in wrestling at Oregon and as a junior was undefeated. Offseason home: Fremont, Cal.

TOM BETTIS (62) LB 6'2" 235 Purdue 9th Season
Joined Bears: 1963, T-Pittsburgh. Born: 3-17-'33, Chicago.

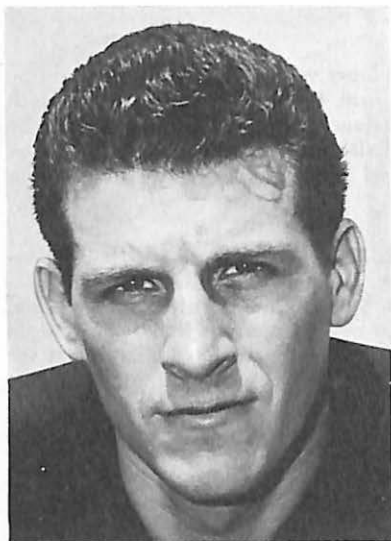
Bettis came to the Bears from the Steelers for a draft choice in June. Before going to Pittsburgh on a trade a year ago, he had been middle linebacker who called defensive signals for the Green Bay Packers for seven years. After starring at Purdue, where he was captain and most valuable player two straight seasons, Bettis was drafted no. 1 by the Packers in 1953. Basically a middle linebacker, he was called upon for duty on both the right and left sides at various times because of injuries that struck Steeler linebackers last season. He played thirteen of Pittsburgh's fourteen NFL games and then added a fine defensive performance in the Playoff Bowl game against Detroit at Miami last January. Bettis is a native Chicagoan who prepped at St. Mel's high school before going to Purdue. Offseason home: Green Bay, Wis.

CHARLES BIVINS (49) HB 6'2" 212 Morris Brown 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, D-7. Born: 10-16-'38, Atlanta, Ga.

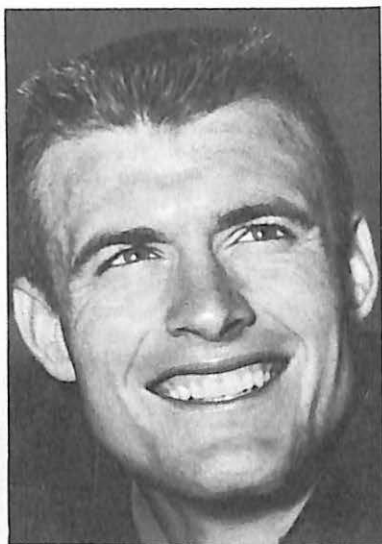
Bivins holds two Bears' records—most yards kickoffs returned, career, 1,273, and most yards kickoffs returned one season, 668 in 1961. A leg injury in the second game of 1962, against the Rams at Los Angeles, restricted his playing time from that point on so he had no opportunity to improve on his work in the rushing department. In 1961, he averaged 4.37 yards on 43 rushes but last season, he ran only 14 times for 44 yards. Offseason home: Atlanta, Ga.

RUDY BUKICH (10) QB 6'2" 205 Southern Cal. 9th Season
Joined Bears: 1962, T-Pittsburgh. Born: 12-15-'32, St. Louis, Mo.

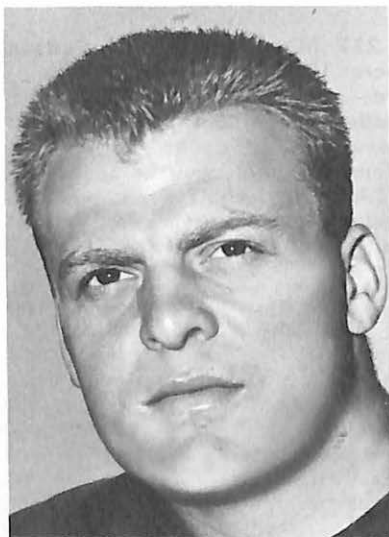
Bukich is with the Bears as a reserve quarterback for the second time since he first came to the NFL as the Los Angeles' Rams no. 2 draft choice in 1953. He went into the Army for two years, returned to the Rams in 1956 but was traded to Washington in 1957. The Bears got him on waivers in 1958 and after two seasons with them, he went to the Pittsburgh Steelers. In 1961, Bukich stepped in for the injured Bobby Layne and had his best NFL campaign, finishing tenth among quarterbacks with 89 completions, a 57.1 percent completion average, 1,253 yards and eleven touchdowns. The Bears reacquired him on a trade following that season. Offseason home: Glenview, Ill.



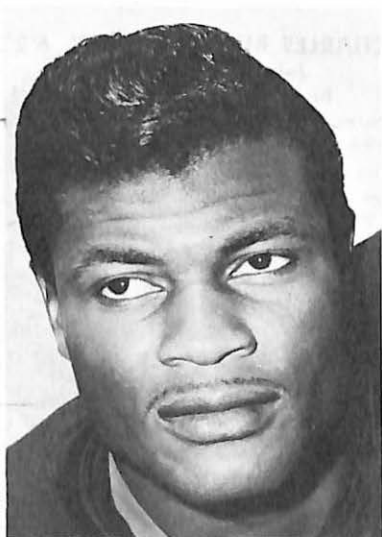

RON BULL (29) HB 6' 200 Baylor 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1962, D-1. Born: 2-2-'40, Kingsville, Tex.

Bull was NFL rookie of the year in 1962, the second straight time that a Bear first year man won that honor. Mike Ditka was the 1961 choice. Ron, an All-American at Baylor, was handicapped in his NFL debut season. A virus infection hospitalized him through most of the training season and he was used some on defense in the first two games. Then, injuries to Willie Galimore and Charlie Bivins brought about a shift to offensive left halfback where, despite initial unfamiliarity with the assignments, he showed steady progress. His value is expressed in 363 yards rushing, 331 yards on 31 pass receptions and 235 yards on nine kickoff returns. In three straight seasons at Baylor, he averaged 4.6 yards per rushing play, set a new school pass receiving record of 59 for 635 yards, alternated at halfback and fullback on offense and halfback on defense. Including five freshman contests, he started 36 of 37 Baylor games for four years. Offseason home: Waco, Tex.

JIM CADILE (72) G 6'3" 240 San Jose State 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1962, D-4. Born: 7-16-'40, San Jose, Cal.

Cadile, one of the most sought after collegiate linemen in the 1962 player draft, suffered a broken ankle in the pre-season contest against Washington at Norfolk, Va., and was inactive until the 10th game of the NFL schedule at Dallas. He showed promise in appearances as a reserve guard in the remaining games. He was a junior college All-American selection in 1959, while attending San Jose City College, and then he enrolled at San Jose State where he starred at offensive tackle and defensive end. Offseason home: San Jose, Cal.

J. C. CAROLINE (25) DB 6'1" 190 Illinois 8th Season
Joined Bears: 1956, D-7. Born: 1-17-'33, Columbia, S. C.

Caroline leads all present Bears in pass interceptions with 21, only one less than the all-time team record held by Don Kindt. Last year, J. C. was credited with 73 tackles and 22 assists. In his past are such collegiate achievements as 1,670 yards rushing for Illinois in 1953, a mark that led the nation as well as breaking Red Grange's and the Big Ten single season records. He played offense frequently his first couple of seasons with the Bears, then was shifted to defense. He was with the West squad in the 1957 Pro Bowl game. Offseason home: Chicago.

RICK CASARES (35) FB 6'2½" 225 Florida 9th Season
Joined Bears: 1955, D-2 in 1954. Born: 7-4-'31, Tampa, Fla.

Casares is the all-time rushing leader of the Bears with 5,257 yards for a 4.09 average. Last season, injuries limited his playing time and his 255 yards and 75 attempts both were his "lows" for one year. He leads all present Bears in two other career departments—150



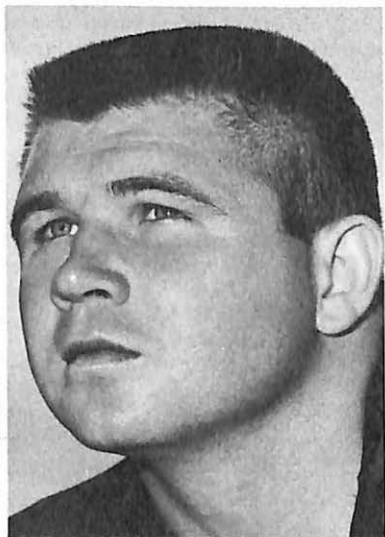

pass receptions, and 56 touchdowns, 49 of those rushing. In his eight years, he has scored four touchdowns in a game twice; gained most yards rushing in one season (1,126 on 234 tries in 1956); most yards in one game (190 on 17 in 1956); most touchdowns one season (12 running, two passes in 1956); and has gained 100 yards or more in one game twelve times. He was all-NFL fullback in 1956 and has played for the West in the Pro Bowl five times (1956-'60, inclusive). Offseason home: Chicago.

ANGELO COIA (46) E 6'2" 202 So. Cal. 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, D-20. Born: 4-21-'38, Philadelphia.

Injuries restricted Coia to limited service through the first eight games of 1962, at which point he had caught only three passes for 25 yards. In game no. 9, against Minnesota here, he grabbed three for 85 yards, including a 71-yard touchdown catch and that launched his comeback. He captured 16 for 251 yards in the five final games, including a 6 for 128 yard effort in the 57-0 defeat of the Colts at Baltimore. In that one, he had two touchdown receptions, one for 65 yards. Coia, a no. 20 draft choice, was a real rookie find in 1960, breaking in as regular left end in the third game. Injuries slowed him in 1961 until the final two games against Cleveland and Minnesota when he caught five passes, three for touchdowns, including one for 64 yards and another for 62. At Southern California, he was a half-back but was converted into an end with the Bears. Offseason home: Philadelphia.

ROGER DAVIS (60) G 6'3" 235 Syracuse 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, D-1. Born: 6-23-'38, Cleveland, O.

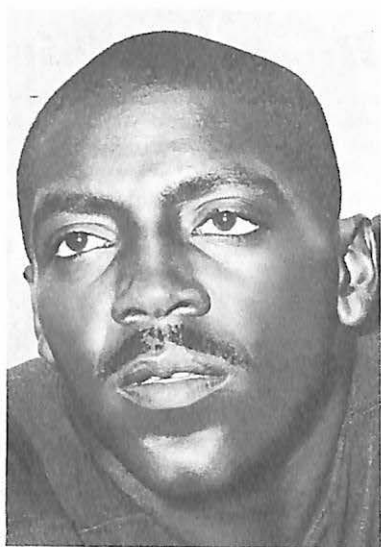
Davis has improved steadily on pass blocking. He is fast and agile and has adapted successfully to offensive assignments although at Syracuse, where he was an All-American in 1959, he was most famous as a defensive lineman. An injury in the 1960 College All Stars training camp retarded his progress with the Bears although he came on rapidly in the latter stages of the campaign. In 1961, he took over a first string guard position but last year, a knee injury received in the Vikings' game here Nov. 11 put him on the inactive list the remainder of the season. He underwent surgery Nov. 26 which was successful in relieving his knee ailment. Offseason home: Elbridge, O.

MIKE DITKA (89) E 6'3" 230 Pittsburgh 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1961, D-1. Born: 10-18-'39, Carnegie, Pa.

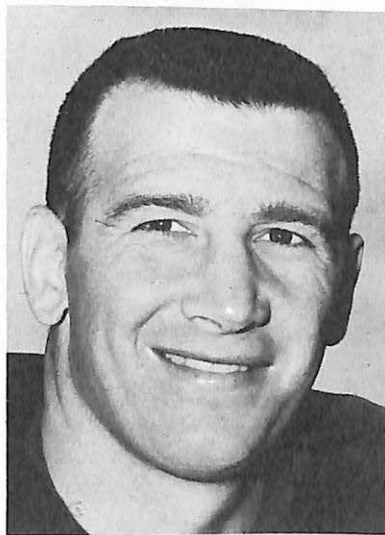
Ditka, NFL rookie of the year in 1961, followed up with another

productive campaign last season despite a groin pull injury that plagued him through training and the early part of the schedule. At the end of 1962's first four games, he had caught only seven passes. However, he wound up with 58, the same total as team mate Johnny Morris as they tied with Philadelphia's Tommy McDonald for fifth among NFL pass receivers. His pass receiving talent is matched by his blocking as a big factor in the Bears' running attack. At Pittsburgh, he was a unanimous All-American in his senior year. As a collegian, he was a two-way performer—defensively at end or middle linebacker, and offensively as an outstanding pass catcher and blocker as well as a punter with a three-year average of 40 yards a kick. Ditka's best single game in the National Football League was against the Green Bay Packers at Wrigley Field Nov. 12, 1961 when he caught nine passes for 187 yards and three touchdowns. He was all-NFL end in 1961 and 1962 and played for the West in both the 1962 and 1963 Pro Bowl games. Offseason home: Lombard, Ill.

STAN FANNING (65) DT 6'7" 270 Idaho 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, D-11. Born: 11-22-'37, Peoria, Ill.

Fanning, who actually grew nearly an inch in height and added thirteen pounds since first coming to the Bears, was shifted to defense last season after having been used on offense. He functioned mainly in a reserve role. Offseason home: Chicago.

JOHN FARRINGTON (84) E 6'3" 217 Prairie View 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, D-16. Born: 1-18-'36, De Walt, Tex.

Farrington has caught 34 passes for 546 yards and five touchdowns in the past two years after having seen service on kickoff and punt return units in his rookie campaign of 1960. Among his catches is a 98-yarder from Bill Wade against Detroit in 1961 for a team record that was only one yard less than the NFL mark. In the Armed Forces Benefit game of that season, he caught touchdown passes of 90 and 75 yards and was voted winner of the Eisenhower Most Valuable Player trophy. Offseason home: Houston.

JOE FORTUNATO (31) LB 6'1" 225 Miss. State 9th Season
Joined Bears: 1955, D-8 in 1955. Born 3-28-'31, Mingo Junction, O.

Fortunato has been the left corner man of the Bears' linebacking trio and 1962 was one of his better campaigns. He intercepted three passes, including one returned for 36 yards, to raise his career total

to eleven. He also was credited with 79 tackles and 37 assists. The result was his selection for the second time to play for the West in the Pro Bowl. He also had been in the game in 1959. Fortunato was an offensive fullback at Mississippi State with a 6.09 average on 779 yards rushing as a senior. Drafted eighth by the Bears in 1953, he went into the Army for two years at Fort Benning, Ga. Incidentally, he has scored two touchdowns as a Bear—one on a one-yard smash as he carried from fullback once in 1956 and the other on a 27-yard return of an interception. Offseason home: Natchez, Miss.

WILLIE GALIMORE (28) HB 6'1" 187 Fla. A.&M. 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1957, D-5 in 1956. Born: 3-30-'35, St. Augustine, Fla.

Galimore, whose 707 yards rushing in 1961 constituted his greatest season with the Bears, opened 1962 on a high note at San Francisco—he ran 22 times for 181 yards (which stood up as the NFL's best single game rushing mark for the year) and had touchdown runs of 77 and 37 yards. The following week, at Los Angeles, a knee injury sidelined him and kept him on limited service the rest of the season. In fact, his season rushing total was 233 yards on 43 tries, meaning he added only 52 on 21 to his spectacular opening game production. His career total of 2,664 yards ranks him third among all-time Bear ground gainers. He also shares the Bears' one game scoring record of four touchdowns with Rick Casares and Harlon Hill. Other career highlights include his selection as winner of the Eisenhower Most Valuable Player trophy in the 1958 Armed Forces contest and a 99-yard return of a kickoff against the Baltimore Colts in the NFL opener that same year. He was an all-NFL halfback in 1959. Offseason home: Tallahassee, Fla.

BILL GEORGE (61) LB 6'2½" 235 Wake Forest 12th Season
Joined Bears: 1952, D-4 in 1951. Born: 10-27-'30, Waynesburg, Pa.

Injuries reduced George's playing time in 1962 more than in any previous season of the eleven that he had spent with the Bears. Yet the records show he was credited with 90 tackles and 31 assists as well as two interceptions. For the first time since 1955, however, he missed selection on the all-NFL team as well as participation in the Pro Bowl. He had been all-league seven straight times and had played in eight consecutive Pro Bowl contests. George, one of the shrewdest play diagnosticians in the NFL, has been defensive captain of the Bears since 1956. Incidentally, he personally set up the West's decisive touchdown in the 31-30 triumph over the East in the 1962 Pro Bowl. His vicious tackle caused East fullback Jim Brown to fumble

and George recovered to set up the score with 70 seconds remaining. In eleven seasons with the Bears, George has broken into these statistical departments—15 interceptions for 112 yards return; 15 opponents fumbles recovered; and 26 scoring points on 14 place kick conversions and four field goals. Offseason home: Morton Grove, Ill.

LARRY GLUECK (43) DB 6' 190 Villanova 1st Season
Joined Bears, 1963, D-3. Born: 10-5-'41, Hatfield, Pa.

Glueck was a top defensive star Aug. 2, the night the College All Stars defeated the Green Bay Packers at Soldier Field, 20-17. In fact, he received some votes in the balloting for Most Valuable Player. He was a two-way performer at Villanova but admits he prefers defense. Last season, besides his quota or more of interceptions, he averaged around 15 tackles a game. On offense, he had a high rushing average and as a junior, in 1961, he caught 30 passes. Glueck also provided a key interception for the North team in the Senior Bowl game at Mobile. Offseason home: Hatfield, Pa.

BOBBY JOE GREEN (88) K 5'11" 185 Florida 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1962, T-Pittsburgh. Born: 5-7-'36, Vernon, Texas

Green, used exclusively as a punter, has a three-year NFL average of 45.5 yards on 206 punts as compared to 45.09 for Yale Larry of Detroit and 44.95 for Tommy Davis of San Francisco over the same period. While with Pittsburgh in 1960 and 1961, he was second among the league's punters both years. In 1962, his first campaign with the Bears, he was fifth with a 43.7 average. Offseason home: Gainesville, Fla.

BOB JENCKS (80) E 6'5" 227 Miami (O.) 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1963, D-2. Born: 7-15-'41, Columbus, O.

Jencks was a strong second in balloting for the Most Valuable Player in the College All Stars' 20-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers in the Chicago Tribune classic Aug. 2. He booted field goals of 20 and 33 yards, caught two passes and added extra points after two touchdowns. That production simply carried on the outstanding efforts he contributed to Miami of Ohio where, in three seasons, he had 17 field goals to tie the NCAA record and broke a school scoring record with 177 points (13 touchdowns, 48 conversions, 17 field goals). Jencks earned Lineman of the Week honors when he scored all of his team's points in the 10-7 upset of Purdue—a 31-yard field goal in the first quarter and, then, after Purdue had taken a 7-3 lead, he scored a touchdown on an 88-yard overall effort and also added the point. His late father, W. B. Jencks, was a professor of accounting at Ohio State. Jencks' off season home: Columbus, O.

JOHN JOHNSON (76) OT 6'5" 260 Indiana 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1963, D-5. Born: 7-5-'41, Gary, Ind.

Johnson, originally a tackle but shifted to guard as a sophomore and junior at Indiana, was moved back to tackle last season. Injuries reduced his playing time to 81 minutes in the first six games, including only 2 minutes against Iowa and 6½ against Michigan State. Then, sound again, he played 48 minutes against Northwestern and 39 each against Ohio State and Purdue. Johnson came into his own in those three games—the Hoosiers led Northwestern, 21-20, going into the fourth quarter only to lose, 26-21; they locked Ohio State in a 7-7 tie until the Buckeyes came up with a field goal with eight seconds remaining in the fourth quarter; and they defeated Purdue, 12-7. His work in those three "comeback" games established him as one of the Big Ten's best linemen. Offseason home: Hobart, Ind.

STAN JONES (78) DT 6'1" 250 Maryland 10th Season
Joined Bears: 1954, D-4 in 1953. Born: 11-24-'31, Altoona, Pa.

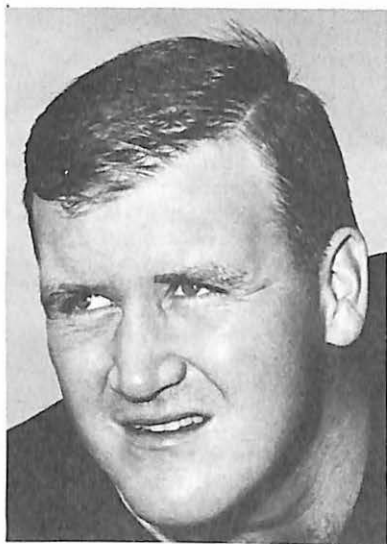
Jones, who has played for the East in seven Pro Bowl games (1956-62 inclusive) and has been an all-NFL guard selection four times (1955-'56 and '59-'60), has been primarily an offensive lineman although he was used on defense frequently last season. He has, at various times, played guard, tackle or center on offense. At Maryland in 1953, he was a unanimous selection as All-American guard and also was named Lineman of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association. He also was an intercollegiate weight-lifting champion. Offseason home: Rockville, Md.

TED KARRAS (67) G 6'1" 243 Indiana 6th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, T-Pittsburgh. Born: 1-31-'34, Gary, Ind.

Observers agreed Karras had his best NFL season yet in 1962 with marked improvement in both straight-ahead and pass blocking. He is regarded as one of the best pulling guards in the league. After graduation from Indiana, he enlisted in the Marine Corps and in 1957, was selected at guard on the All-Service honor eleven. He went to the Bears' camp in 1958 but was sold to Pittsburgh before the season opened. After two years with the Steelers, Karras was traded back to the Bears. Karras was bothered by a knee ailment last season but he underwent surgery Dec. 19 and returns in top condition. Offseason home: Gary, Ind.

BOB KILCULLEN (74) DT 6'3" 245 Texas Tech 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1957, D-8. Born: 8-1-'36, St. Louis, Mo.

Kilcullen has been a member of the Bears' defensive line unit since 1960, the year he returned from two years in the Army. In his rookie campaign of 1957, he was used on defense but in 1958, was

ROGER LECLERC (83) LB 6'3" 235 Trinity 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, D-15 in 1959. Born: 10-1-'36, Springfield, Mass.

Leclerc did all of the place kicking for the Bears in 1961 and 1962 with 145 points off 76 conversions out of 81 and 23 field goals of 51 attempts. He tied an NFL record against Detroit Oct. 18, 1961 by kicking five field goals. The mark of five originally was set by Ernie Nevers and later equalled by Bob Waterfield. At Trinity College, Hartford, Conn., Leclerc was a Little All-American selection at center. He also won the Maxwell Memorial Award. Offseason home: Hartford, Conn.

HERMAN LEE (70) OT 6'3" 247 Fla. A.&M. 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1958, D-23 in 1954. Born: 7-1-'33, Phenix City, Ala.

Lee is one of the fastest big men in the National Football League. His blocking, vicious at times, is equally effective on running plays as well as on passes. Great physical strength is another asset. Originally drafted no. 23 in 1954, Lee went into the Army and served with the military police for two years, including nine months in Korea. He had tryouts with the Bears in 1956 and again in 1957 and after the second one, he was traded to Pittsburgh. He played regularly with the Steelers in 1957 and then was traded back to the Bears. Offseason home: Chicago.

EARL LEGGETT (71) DT 6'3" 250 Louisiana State 6th Season
Joined Bears: 1957, D-1. Born: 5-5-'33, Jacksonville, Fla.

Leggett came back with a banner campaign in 1962 after being inactive all of 1961 because of a knee injury that required surgery. He had 74 tackles and 26 assists and recovered four enemy fumbles. Before his injury, he had shown steady progress in three years with the Bears. Highlight of 1960 was his pass interception and eleven-yard return against the Green Bay Packers that set up a Bears' field goal for a 17-14 victory. Offseason home: Raymond, Miss.

JOE MARCONI (34) FB 6'2" 225 West Virginia 8th Season
Joined Bears: 1962, T-Los Angeles. Born: 2-6-'34, Fredericktown, Pa.

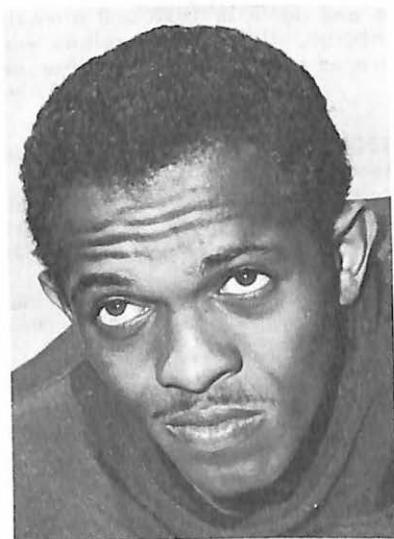
The Bears traded a no. 1 draft choice to Los Angeles for Marconi who, two weeks after joining his new team-mates, led them to a 27-23 victory over his old Ram pals. He ran 15 times for 82 yards, scored one touchdown and caught two passes. He wound up the season with 406 yards on 89 attempts to lead the team in rushing and added 306 more on 23 pass receptions as well as scoring six

BILLY MARTIN (22) HB 5'11" 197 Minnesota 2nd Season Joined Bears: 1962, D-4 in 1959. Born: 6-6-'38, Chicago.

Martin was used principally on kick return units in his rookie season, although he also gained 28 yards on nine rushing plays and caught one pass for eight. His speed and elusiveness resulted in his leading the Bears in kickoff returns with 515 yards on 25 and finishing second to Johnny Morris on punt returns with 62 yards on 17. He was All-Service and All-Marine Corps halfback for four straight seasons while serving at San Diego, 1958-'61. Before entering the Marines, he attended the University of Minnesota for two years and he was drafted by the Bears in 1959 as a "future". He is a Chicago native who starred at Wendell Phillips high school. Offseason home: Chicago.

BENNIE McRAE (26) DB 6' 180 Michigan 2nd Season Joined Bears: 1962, D-2. Born: 12-8-'39, Newport News, Va.

McRae, whose 1,037 yards gave him a three-season 4.6 average rushing for Michigan, broke in with the Bears on defense and was used mainly in a reserve role. He had one pass interception, good for a 47-yard return, and was credited with 11 tackles and 3 assists. McRae has tremendous speed and, in fact, was Big Ten indoor and outdoor 70 and 120 yard hurdles champion. Another distinction as a collegian came when he was the first Negro invited to play in the North-South Shrine post-season game at Miami. Offseason home: Newport News, Va.

JOHNNY MORRIS (47) HB 5'10" 180 U.C.S.B. 6th Season Joined Bears: 1958, D-12. Born: 9-26-'36, Long Beach, Cal.

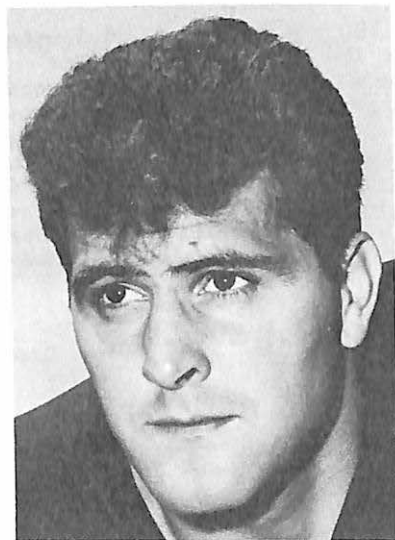
Johnny, co-holder of the world's 50-yard dash record of :05.2 while at University of California at Santa Barbara, has been a brilliant all-around speedster since joining the Bears. His total yardage in four categories is 5,024 (2,028 on pass receptions; 1,024 rushing; 1,267 kickoff returns; 705 punt returns). As a flanker the past two seasons, he has developed into a dangerous pass receiver whose nine touchdowns in 1961 and 1962 have included distance exploits of 80, 73, 45, 42 and 41 yards. Last year, he caught 58 passes to tie team

mate Mike Ditka and Tommy McDonald of Philadelphia for fifth among NFL pass receivers. His speed and ruggedness have been combined on other lengthy runs during his NFL career, including a 78-yard punt return against Los Angeles in 1959 that is second only in Bears' team records to "Scooter" McLean's 89-yarder in 1942. He played for the West in the 1961 Pro Bowl. Offseason home: Chicago.

LARRY MORRIS (33) LB 6'2" 230 Georgia Tech 8th Season
Joined Bears: 1959, T-Washington. Born: 12-10-'33, Decatur, Ga.

Morris represents one of the best trades ever made by the Bears who gave a no. 2 draft choice to the Redskins just before the start of the 1959 schedule. He had been traded to Washington after the 1958 campaign by the Los Angeles Rams who got him as their no. 1 draft choice in 1955. Morris has been an aggressive, consistent linebacker since coming to Chicago. Last season, he had 84 tackles and 30 assists as well as intercepting two passes and recovering two opponents' fumbles. Offseason home: Decatur, Ga.

TOMMY NECK (48) DB 5'11" 190 La. State 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1962, D-18. Born: 1-10-'39, Marksville, La.

Neck, captain of Louisiana State's famed "Chinese Bandits" defensive platoon as a collegian, went on the Bears' active list late in the 1962 campaign. He was a three-year defensive regular at Louisiana State and called the defensive signals as his team defeated Colorado in the 1961 Orange Bowl game. Offseason home: Marksville, La.

ED O'BRADOVICH (87) DE 6'3" 255 Illinois 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1962, D-7. Born: 5-21-'40, Hillside, Ill.

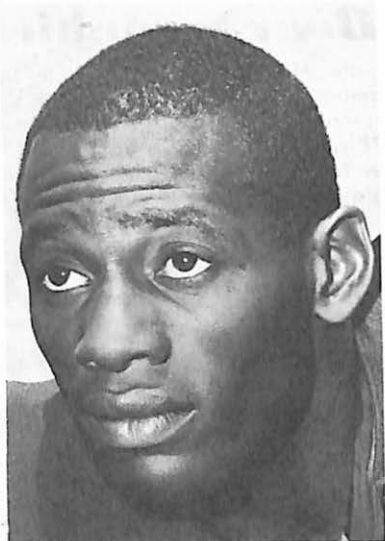
O'Bradovich was one of the NFL's outstanding first year men in 1962. He led the league in recovering enemy fumbles with five and as a speedy, aggressive defensive end, he was credited with 62 tackles and 26 assists. O'Bradovich was an all-state high school fullback at Proviso and then, enrolling at the University of Illinois, he was shifted to offensive end as a sophomore and junior in 1959-'60. Joined Bears: 1959, D-2. Born: 4-18-'38, New Orleans.

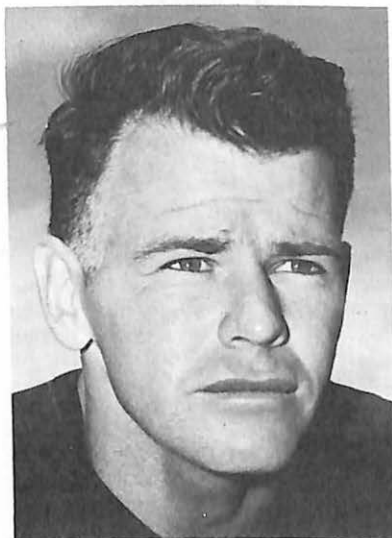

record of 102. That was one of six interceptions by him for the season and his 212 yards total return rated him no. 1 in yardage in the league. Petitbon also was credited with 84 tackles and 26 assists and recovered one enemy fumble during his best season since he first joined the Bears. Although he was an outstanding quarterback at Tulane, he was converted into a defensive back with the Bears. Early in his rookie season of 1959, he intercepted a pass, ran it back 33 yards for a touchdown that gave the Bears a lead they never relinquished during the course of a 26-21 victory over the Baltimore Colts. He was a member of the West squad in last January's Pro Bowl game. Offseason home: New Orleans.

MIKE PYLE (50) C 6'3" 245 Yale 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1961, D-7. Born: 7-18-'39.

Pyle has been starting offensive center for 28 straight NFL games. In his two seasons with the Bears he has played every minute of every offensive play from scrimmage (passes or runs) and is rated the best young center in the league. He preserved his durability record when, in the 1962 season final against Detroit at Wrigley Field, he received a deep gash on his right hand from a cleat. He stayed in the game for several plays that followed. When he did come to the bench, after the Bears had relinquished the ball, his hand was bandaged with a protective pad and he played the rest of the way. He was an All-Illinois high school center at New Trier and then enrolled at Yale where he lettered three years in football. In 1960, he was captain of Yale's first undefeated, untied team in 37 years. He also lettered in track, tying for first in the discus at the IC 4-A meet with a throw of 158 feet, 10 inches. Offseason home: Winnetka, Ill.

JOHN SZUMCZYK (21) HB 6'1" 210 Trinity 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1963, D-13. Born: 3-19-'41, Poland.

Szumczyk (pr. Sum-Zick) was born in Nięcierowicz (pr. Nee-est-charow-we-chay) Poland and came to this country with his parents at the age of eight. He was a regular three years at Trinity College, Hartford, Conn., also alma mater of Roger Leclerc. Szumczyk was a halfback his first two seasons but alternated at halfback and fullback as a senior and on defense, was an outstanding linebacker. His three-year offensive record shows 1,802 yards on 394 rushes; 20 pass receptions for 184 yards; twelve touchdowns and three two-point conversions by running. He carried the ball on three of every five Trinity rushing plays in three years. Twice, he was an all-New England selection and as a senior, he won Little All-America honorable mention. Szumczyk also lettered in track, running the 100 and the 220. This past spring, Trinity's track team was undefeated in dual competition. Offseason home: West Hartford, Conn.

ROOSEVELT TAYLOR (24) DB 5'11" 186 Grambling 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1961, F.A. Born 7-4-'37, New Orleans.

Taylor had a great season defensively in 1962. He scored two touchdowns, one on a 43-yard return of an intercepted pass against San Francisco Sept. 16 and the other an 11-yard scamper into the end zone after team mate Roger Leclerc had blocked a Los Angeles punt, Dec. 9. He also was credited with 95 tackles as well as assists on 17 others. Taylor was one of the real finds of 1961, signed as a free agent after he had led the nation's small college backs with 12 interceptions for the 1960 Grambling (La.) College team. Offseason home: New Orleans.

ANDY VON SONN (53) LB 6'2" 223 UCLA 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1963, D-14 in 1962. Born: 11-5-'40, Los Angeles

Von Sonn, co-captain, linebacker and offensive center for UCLA last season, was drafted as a "future" in 1962. Speed (:10.5 for the 100), aggressiveness and pursuit earned him selection to the All-Pacific Coast honor eleven last year. However, his forte is defense and he called UCLA's defensive signals. Highlight of 1962 came when he was chosen Lineman of the Week after his team upset Ohio State, 9-7. In post-season competition, he played in the Hula Bowl and the Tucson, Ariz., All-America Bowl. High grades won him selection on the Pacific Coast All-Scholastic Honor team. Offseason home: Reseda, Cal.

BILL WADE (9) QB 6'2" 205 Vanderbilt 10th Season
Joined Bears: 1961, T-Los Angeles. Born: 10-4-'30, Nashville, Tenn.

Wade has made spectacular contributions to the Bears' offense since coming over on the trade that sent Erich Barnes and Zeke Bratowski to the Rams who, in turn, dealt the former to the New York Giants. In two seasons as a Bear, Wade has completed 364 passes, 40 for touchdowns, with a yardage total of 5,430. Last year, his 225 completions and 3,172 yards surpassed Sid Luckman's club records of 176 and 2,712 set in 1947. His 412 attempts broke George Blanda's record of 362 set in 1953. In 1961, his 98-yard touchdown completion to John Farrington set a new record in that respect. Twice, he has thrown four touchdowns in a game for the Bears (Minnesota and San Francisco in 1961). He has had five three-touchdown games. Over one three-game stretch last season (Nov. 11, 18 and 25 against Minnesota, Dallas and Baltimore) he completed 77 passes, eight for touchdowns, out of 120 attempts for a .642 average and 1,068 yards. In the Dallas effort, his 28 completions totaled 466 yards, only two shy of Johnny Lujack's single game club record. Wade was the Rams' bonus choice in 1952 but served in the Navy for two years before reporting in 1954. Offseason home: Nashville.

BOB WETOSKA (63) T-G 6'3" 240 Notre Dame 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, F.A. Born: 8-22-'37, Minneapolis.

Wetoska has alternated at reserve guard and tackle on offense in his three seasons with the Bears. That was a departure from his collegiate experience since he lettered at end for three years at Notre Dame. The Washington Redskins drafted him no. 5 in 1959 but he was not retained and in 1960, the Bears signed him as a free agent. Wetoska played in the 1959 College All Star game after having starred in the North-South and Senior Bowls. Offseason home: Minneapolis.

DAVE WHITSELL (23) DB 6'1" 190 Indiana 6th Season
Joined Bears: 1961, T-New York. Born: 6-14-'36, Shelby, Mich.

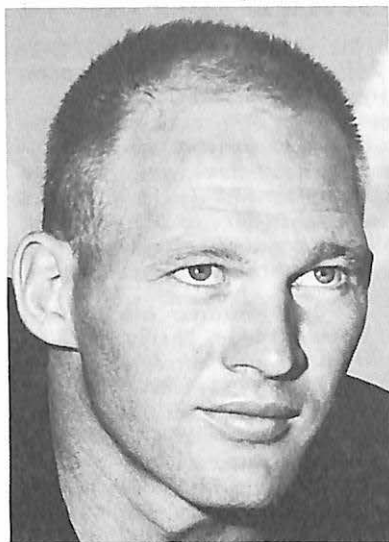
In two seasons with the Bears, Whitsell has intercepted eleven passes. Last year, he was credited with 35 tackles and 18 assists. Whitsell, an all-around high school star at Shelby, Mich., before enrolling at Indiana, first came into the NFL in 1958 with the Detroit Lions. After three seasons there, he was designated as one of three Lions to be selected by the new Minnesota Vikings. The Vikings in turn traded him to the New York Giants in the deal for Mel Triplett and Bob Schnelker. Offseason home: Indianapolis.

FRED WILLIAMS (75) DT 6'4" 248 Arkansas 12th Season
Joined Bears: 1952, D-5. Born: 2-8-'30, Little Rock, Ark.

Williams had injury problems that reduced him to comparatively limited service early in 1962 but he played almost full time in the final three games. He underwent knee surgery after the season ended and the operation was successful. He has been one of the Bears' finest defensive linemen since he first came to the team. Four times, he appeared with the West in the Pro Bowl, 1953-'54 and again in 1959-'60. He is one of the most popular players in the entire league, mainly because of the scores of witty, quotable remarks made by him. His drawling, Ozarkian-type wit has made him an entertaining, much sought-after public speaker. At Arkansas, he was an all-Southwestern Conference selection in football and an intercollegiate boxing and wrestling champion. Offseason home: Pine Bluff, Ark.

MAURY YOUNG (82) DE 6'6" 260 Syracuse 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, D-9 in 1959. Born: 10-18-'36, Eagle Bay, N. Y.

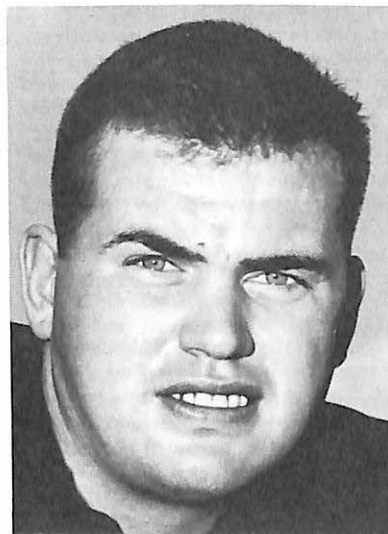
Young saw less service in 1962 than at any time since he took over as a regular defensive end as a rookie in 1960. A back injury hampered him most of the season. 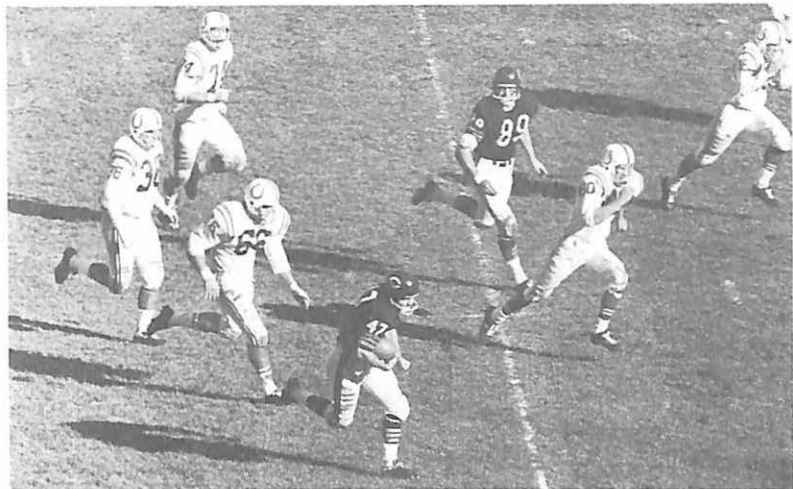

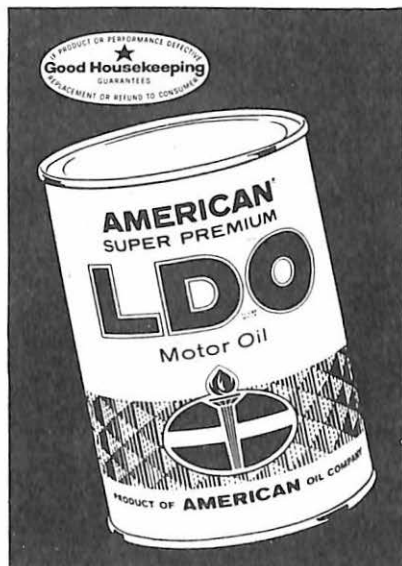

The eighteenth annual Armed Forces Benefit game, sponsored by Chicago's four metropolitan daily newspapers, will match the Bears against the St. Louis Cardinals at Soldier Field Saturday night, Aug. 31. It will be the ninth straight time it is sponsored by the Chicago Newspaper Publishers Association (Chicago's American, Daily News, Sun-Times and Tribune.)

Sharing in the proceeds are Army Emergency Relief, the Navy Relief Society and the Air Force Aid Society, all official agencies that provide financial assistance to those servicemen and to widows and orphans of servicemen who need it.

Seventeen previous Armed Forces games have netted \$710,909.56. The inaugural came about at a meeting in Washington attended by Dwight D. Eisenhower, then Army Chief of Staff; Admiral Chester K. Nimitz; General Ira Eaker, General Carl Spaatz, George Halas and Ralph Cannon, sports editor of the Chicago Herald-American, which sponsored the game in 1946 and 1947.

The Sun-Times assumed sponsorship from 1949 through 1954 and in 1955, the four Chicago metropolitan daily newspapers took over direction of the game.

In 1953, President Eisenhower authorized presentation of a trophy to the outstanding player in each game, selected by sports writers, radio and TV broadcasters. The player's name is inscribed on the trophy and he receives a replica of the award. Last year's winner was Jim Ninowski, Cleveland Browns' quarterback.

Winners in other years were John Farrington, Bears, 1961; Rick Casares and Zeke Bratkowski, Bears, who tied in 1960; Jim Dooley, Bears, 1959; Willie Galimore, Bears, 1958; Fred Williams, Bears, 1957; Darrell Brewster, Cleveland, 1956; Ed Brown, Bears, 1955; Frank Gifford, New York, 1954; and Harry Jagade, Cleveland, 1953.

NFL Hall of Fame Honors Bears

Three Chicago Bears—George Halas, Red Grange and Bronko Nagurski—are among the first seventeen all-time greats voted into the new National Professional Football Hall of Fame at Canton, O. They were chosen unanimously by a national board of selectors.

Here are thumbnail sketches of the seventeen charter members:

SAMMY BAUGH: Quarterback, Washington Redskins, 1937-1952. Former Texas Christian All-America was greatest passer and punter of his time. Completed 1,709 passes in 16 years and for 10 years held mark of 3,016 yards gained passing in career.

BERT BELL: N.F.L. commissioner, 1946-1959. Iron-willed former coach and owner of Philadelphia Eagles led circuit in fight with defunct All-America Conference into modern era of popularity.

JOE CARR: One-time Columbus (Ohio) newspaperman, he organized the Columbus Panhandles in 1904. Called "Father of Pro Football" because of his organizational work in early days of the sport.

DUTCH CLARK: Quarterback, Portsmouth (Ohio) Spartans and Detroit Lions (1931-38). Famed triple-threat quarterback and "coach on the field." One of the game's great drop kickers, he also coached the defunct Cleveland Rams from 1939 to 1942.

RED GRANGE: Halfback, Chicago Bears, 1925-1937. Attracted national publicity for pro football by taking 17-game tour with Bears in late 1925 and early 1926. Was star halfback with many great Bear teams.

NFL Hall of Fame (Continued)

GEORGE HALAS: Player, coach, founder of Chicago Bears. Prize student of famous Illinois Coach Bob Zupke, Halas made Bears "the Yankees" of pro football for some 20 years. Pioneered development of modern T-formation.

MEL HEIN: Center, New York Giants, 1931-1945. Perhaps the greatest linebacker in football history, 6-foot, 4-inch, 230-pound Hein stopped 'em all.

PETE (FATS) HENRY: Tackle, Canton Bulldogs, Akron Indians, New York Giants, Pottsville Maroons, Pittsburgh Steelers, 1920-1930. Famed defensive titan of another era, 250-pound Henry also carried ball on "tackle around plays." Still holds N.F.L. record of 94-yard punt.

CAL HUBBARD: Tackle and end, New York Giants, Green Bay Packers, Pittsburgh Steelers, 1927-36. Standing 6-foot, 5-inches and weighing 265 pounds, Hubbard combined enormous strength with surprising speed. Played on four league championship teams.

DON HUTSON: Former Alabama star is considered the finest pass-catching end in football history. Ran 100 yards in 9.6 seconds. Caught record 489 passes during pro career and once scored 138 points in a season and 29 in a quarter. Also was excellent placekicker.

CURLEY LAMBEAU: Player, coach, founder Green Bay Packers, 1919-1949.

TIM MARA: Founder, New York Giants, 1925-59. Built Giants from virtually unknown team in 1925 to great name in league's history.

GEORGE PRESTON MARSHALL: Founder, Washington Redskins. Fiery, controversial owner of Redskins has been leading "showman" of the sport for quarter of a century. He fathered the world championship and the pro bowl games.

JOHNNY (BLOOD) McNALLY: Halfback, Milwaukee Badgers, Duluth Eskimos, Pottsville Maroons, Green Bay Packers, Pittsburgh Steelers, 1925-39. Colorful reckless halfback, played a total of 15 years.

BRONKO NAGURSKI: Fullback and tackle, Chicago Bears, 1930-37, 1943. Ex-Minnesota All-America at tackle and fullback, he ran his own interference. All-time block-busting fullback. Played on four Bear teams that won pro football championships.

ERNIE NEVERS: Fullback, Duluth Eskimos and Chicago Cardinals, 1926-37. Scored six touchdowns and four extra points for record of 40 points in one game against Bears, Nov. 28, 1920. Once played 1,713 minutes of a possible 1,740 during season. A Nagurski-type, although about 40 pounds lighter.

JIM THORPE: Halfback, Canton Bulldogs, Oorang Indians, Cleveland Indians, Toledo Maroons, Rock Island Independents, New York Giants, 1915-26. Famed all-around Carlisle Indian athlete who played pro football until he was almost 40. Combined speed and power to rare degree.

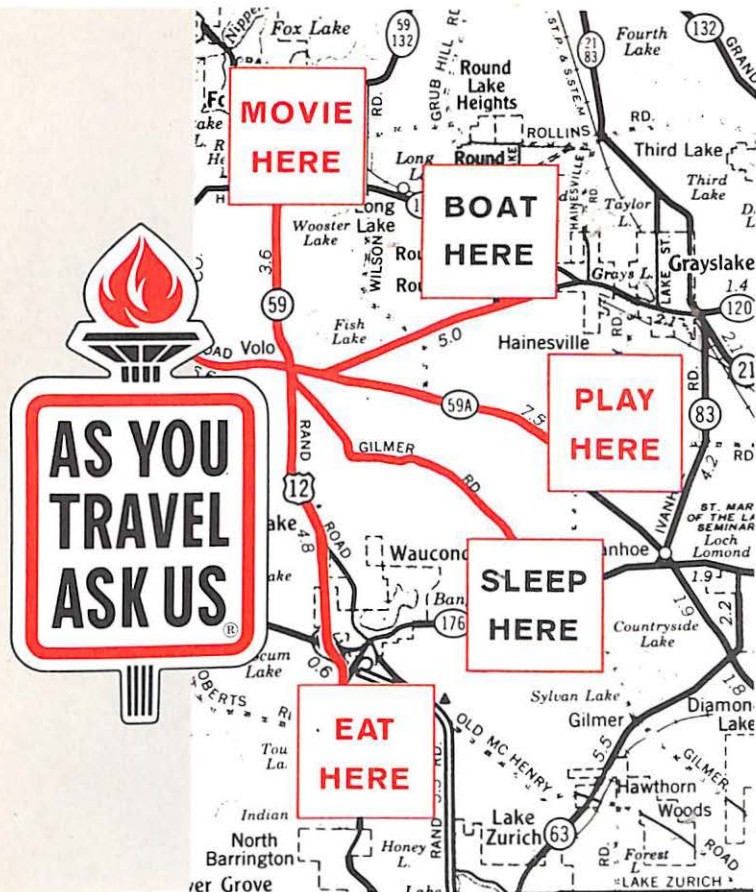
