### The Bears Coaches

GEORGE HALAS is in his 32nd season as head coach since 1920 when he organized the Decatur Staleys, who became the Bears. This is the second season of his fourth coaching tenure. He led the Bears from 1920 through 1929; from 1933 until November 1942, when he entered the Navy; from 1946 through 1955; and returned as head coach in 1958. He is a native Chicagoan.

Star in football, basketball and baseball at the University of Illinois, Halas also was a member of Great Lakes' championship eleven of 1918. Later, he played outfield briefly for the New York Yankees, before a leg injury terminated his baseball career. Helped to organize National Football League and retired as active football player in 1929. In World War 2, served as Welfare and Recreation Officer of Pacific Fleet and was decorated with Bronze Star by Admiral Nimitz. Holds amazing coaching record of 382 victories; 121 defeats, 27 ties, including both championship schedule and nonconference games.

JOHN L. "PADDY" DRISCOLL, who is an assistant coach, was head coach in 1956 and 1957, leading Bears to Western conference title in '56. A Northwestern graduate and one of greatest backs in Big Ten history, Paddy was a team mate of Halas at Great Lakes and later played briefly with Chicago Cubs. First joined Bears as player in 1925, after having starred for Cardinals. Became member of coaching staff in 1941.

CLARK SHAUGHNESSY, technical advisor since 1951, specializes on defense. This is his 44th season as a coach, a service record that includes head coaching posts at Tulane, Loyola of the South, University of Chicago, Stanford, Maryland, Pittsburgh and Los Angeles Rams as well as advisory position with Washington Redskins. He is a graduate of Minnesota and a native of St. Cloud, Minn. Shaughnessy is a noted exponent of the T-formation.

LUKE JOHNSOS is in his 31st season with the Bears, first as a player, and then, in 1937, as a member of the coaching staff. He is a Northwestern graduate who had a baseball tryout with the Cincinnati Reds before joining the Bears in 1929. When Halas entered the Navy in 1942, Johnsos and Hunk Anderson became co-coaches, leading the Bears to the title in 1943. They continued in that capacity through 1945. Luke has been with six Bear championship teams, as player or coach. Apart from football, he is partner in Johnsos-Coppock Printers, Skokie, Ill.










**SID LUCKMAN** is in his fourth season as quarterback coach. One of Bears' and National Football League's all-time greats, he retired as a player in 1951 after leading team to championships in 1940, 1941, 1943 and 1946, and winning Most Valuable Player award in 1943. He played twelve seasons in all, following a brilliant collegiate career at Columbia University. Aside from football, he is vice president of Cellucraft in Chicago.

FULLBACK

First Season

Ht., 6:3. Wt., 235 Los Angeles State Birthplace: San Diego, Calif. Nov. 28, 1937 Joined Bears: 1959: No. 4 selection.

Collegiate record: Last season, averaged 6.4 yards rushing with 718 yards on 114 carries; caught 11 passes for 62 yards; completed four for 191 yards; averaged 40.2 on 12 punts; returned nine kickoffs 326 yards, including one for 103 yards. Ambidextrous passer.

RALPH ANDERSON

END

Second Season\*

Ht., 6:4. Wt., 220 Los Angeles State Birthplace: Long Beach Calif., Jan. 1, 1937

Joined Bears: 1958; No. 9 selection.

**Record with Bears:** As rookie offensive end, caught eleven passes for 177 yards and one touchdown. Big physically but has excellent speed—:10.1 for 100 yard dash.

Previous record: Great offensive performer for Los Angeles State.

DOUG ATKINS

END

Fifth Season (Seventh in NFL)

Ht., 6:8. Wt., 255 Tennessee Birthplace: Humboldt, Tenn., May 8, 1930

Joined Bears: 1955; on trade from Cleveland.

**Record with Bears:** One of biggest players in league; defensive ace since he came over, along with Ken Gorgal, on trade sending two player selections to Cleveland. Pro Bowl, 1958 and 1959, and though his West team lost, 28-21, in most recent meeting, Atkins was voted outstanding lineman.

Previous record: Browns' No. 1 choice in 1953, following brilliant career at Tennessee where he won All-American tackle honors. Played in Cotton Bowl twice, Sugar Bowl once. Actually went to Tennessee on basketball scholarship.

JOHN AVENI

END

First Season

Ht., 6:3. Wt., 210 Indiana Birthplace: Glassboro, N.J., March 17, 1935

Joined Bears: 1959; No. 27 selection.

Collegiate record: Three football letters; as sophomore, played 30 minutes total but caught one pass from Norm Mackin good for 70 yards overall and touchdown against Michigan; played 131 minutes as junior and ten pass receptions ranked him high on team and eighth in Big Ten; as senior, played 225 minutes, in nine games, including 38½ against Notre Dame; caught six passes, although Indiana offensive primarily rushing; recovered fumbles against Notre Dame and Iowa; good place kicker.

ERICH BARNES

### HALFBACK

Second Season

Ht., 6:21/2 Wt., 198 Purdue Birthplace: Elkhart, Ind., July 4, 1935

Joined Bears: 1958; No. 4 selection.

Record with Bears: As rookie defensive back last season, scored two touchdowns both against the Rams, one on pass interception in Los Angeles and another after blocking field goal attempt at Wrigley Field; intercepted four passes in all for 90 yards.

Previous record: Lettered three years at Purdue, playing two seasons at halfback and one at end; quarter miler on track team.

### TACKLE

Eighth Season

Ht., 6:4. Wt., 248 North Texas State Birthplace: Borger, Tex., May 8, 1931

Joined Bears: 1952; No. 11 selection.

Record with Bears: Starter at defensive right tackle for Bears since his rookie season. Has intercepted four passes for 30 yards, recovered eight opponents fumbles. Still remembers, with a grin, that in 1952, the year he broke in, there were sixteen tackles in the Bears' camp. Pro bowl, 1955.

Previous record: North Texas State, his alma mater, also has sent four other regulars to Bears—center Larry Strickland of present squad; halfback Loyd Lowe in 1954; end Joe Abbey in 1948; end Abe Croft in 1944. Bishop named to all-Texas defensive honor team in 1951; All-Conference in 1950, 1951.

### ZEKE BRATKOWSKI

### QUARTERBACK

Fourth Season

Ht., 6:21/2. Wt., 203 Georgia Birthplace: Danville, Ill., Octo. 20, 1931

Joined Bears: 1954; No. 2 selection in 1953.

Record with Bears: With two years out (1955, 1956) for duty in United States Air Force, Bratkowski's career record shows 145 pass completions out of 300 for 2,185 yards, 16 touchdowns and a 39.7 average on 69 punts.

Previous record: At Georgia, completed 360 passes in 734 attempts for 4,863 yards in three seasons; led nation in passing yardage, 1952, with 1,824 yards; top college punter of 1953 with 42.6 average; member of College All Stars; star of both North-South Shrine and Senior Bowl games.

### **ED BROWN**

### **QUARTERBACK**

Sixth Season

Ht., 6:2. Wt., 208 San Francisco Birthplace: San Luis Obispo, Cal., Oct. 26, 1928 Joined Bears: 1954: No. 7 selection in 1952.

Record with Bears: Leading passer (50 percent completions) and punter (39.9 yd. average) past four seasons. In 1956, led NFL passers with 57.1 percent completions and average gain of 9.92 yards. Only Bear player in long line of great passers to lead the league in this department. Forte is long distance throw and, among lengthy touchdown completions, are two to Harlon Hill (86 yards and 84 yards, both in 1955) and to Willie Galimore (79 yards in 1956). Also strong runner, with 4.04 rushing average for career. Pro bowl, 1956, 1957.

Previous record: All-Pacific Coast selection as he led San Francisco U. to undefeated record in 1951. Two years as U. S. Marine, at San Diego in 1952, Camp Pendleton, 1953, winning all-service honors in football at both assignments. Won Eisenhower Trophy as most valuable player of 1955 Armed Forces Benefit game victory over Browns, 24-21.

QUARTERBACK RUDY BUKICH Second Season (Fifth in NFL)

Southern California Birthplace: St. Louis, Mo., Dec. 15, 1932 Ht., 6:1. Wt., 200

Joined Bears: 1958; obtained on waivers from Washington Nov. 24.

NFL record: Got into one game last season with Bears. Los Angeles Rams' No. 2 choice in 1953 but went into Army in 1954 and 1955. Returned in 1956 but Sept. 9, 1957,

traded to Redskins for player choices. Pro record overall shows 38 completions in 100 pass attempts for 568 yards, two touchdowns; 50 yards on 25 rushing attempts.

Previous record: After freshman year at Iowa in 1949, transferred to Southern California. His 27-yard touchdown pass to Al Carmichael in 1953 Rose Bowl game defeated Wisconsin, 7-0, only Big Ten loss in recent history of post-season classic. Set Rose Bowl pass completion record of 16 out of 24 and became only Pacific Coast player to win most valuable player award.

J. C. CAROLINE

HALFBACK

Fourth Season

Ht., 6:1. Wt., 190 Illinois Birthplace: Columbia, S.C., June 17, 1933

Joined Bears: 1956; No. 7 selection.

Record with Bears: Primarily defensive performer his first two seasons. Caroline added some offensive chores last year, gaining 121 yards on 33 attempts rushing and catching five passes for 78 yards and one touchdown. Three-year record also shows 12 kickoff returns for 233 yards; eight pass interceptions for 204 yards; eight punt returns for 49. Pro bowl, 1957.

Previous record: As sophomore at Illinois, 1953, he gained 1,670 yards to lead nation, break Red Grange's school mark and the Big Ten record as well. As junior, starred on defense though handicapped by injuries. Elected captain for 1955 but declared ineligible and played that year with Montreal Alouettes of Canadian Four Big Four.

RICK CASARES

### FULLBACK

Fifth Season

Ht., 6:21/2. Wt., 225 Florida Birthplace: Tampa, Fla., July 4, 1931.

Joined Bears: 1955; No. 2 selection in 1954.

Record with Bears: Career rushing average of 4.2, with 3,149 yards on 739 attempts and 24 touchdowns. Caught 96 passes for 854 yards, four touchdowns. Led NFL in rushing in 1956 with 1,126 yards. Gained 100 or more yards per game twelve times. Best single game effort: 190 yards in 1956, Scored four touchdowns in one game, 1956, Longest single run: 81 yards (TD) in 1955. All-league offensive fullback, 1956. Pro bowl, 1956, 1957, 1958, 1959. Second only to Bronko Nagurski (4,031 yards) in Bears' all-time ground-gaining list.

Previous record: All-service selection in 1954 while in Army at Fort Jackson. Gained 1,057 yards in two seasons at Florida. All-American high school selection. Won New Jersey amateur middleweight boxing championship at 14 and also took part in basket-

ball and track.

ROBERT CORONADO

END

First Season

College of Pacific Ht., 6:2. Wt., 195 Birthplace: Vallejo, Cal., May 22, 1936

Joined Bears: 1959; No. 9 selection.

Collegiate record: One of nation's fastest collegiate ends at College of Pacific. Coach 'Moose" Meyer rates him a better prospect than another former C.O.P. wingman, Clyde Conner, at a comparable stage of career.

CENTER

Second Season

Ht., 6:0 Wt., 228 Northwestern Birthplace: Riverside, Ill., Oct. 20, 1933

Joined Bears: 1957; on trade from New York Giants.

Record with Bears: Played last four games of 1957 season, upon return from two years in Marine Corps. Obtained in trade with New York Giants who had made him their 13th selection of 1955. Played two years at Quantico, winning All-Service honors in 1956. Ankle injury in pre-season victory over Detroit Lions at Dallas Sept. 5, 1958 sidelined him for entire season.

**Previous record:** Graduate of Northwestern where he won four varsity letters, since freshmen were eligible in 1951, his first year there. Co-captain of 1954 Wildcats; topflight collegiate center who received all-Big Ten recognition.

### GERALD DE LUCCA

GUARD

First Season

Ht., 6:2½ Wt., 248 Middle Tennessee State Birthplace: Peabody, Mass., July 17, 1936 Joined Bears: 1959: No. 7 selection in 1957.

Collegiate record: Three years at University of Tennessee, where he won all-Southeastern Conference honors as sophomore. Transferred to Middle Tennessee State for last season. Played offensive guard and tackle and defensive end; served in Army's six-month training program beginning last January.

### WILLARD DEWVEALL

END

First Season

Ht., 6:4 Wt., 218 Southern Methodist Birthplace: Springtown, Tex., April 29, 1936 Joined Bears: 1959: No. 2 selection in 1958.

**Collegiate record:** Fullback in high school but shifted to end at Southern Methodist where he won three letters, All-Southwest Conference, 1957. Outstanding sophomore lineman award, 1955; East-West Shrine game. Two letters in track and, as weights man, set freshman school record of 51 feet 5 inches in shot-put.

### JIM DOOLEY

END

Sixth Season

Ht., 6:4. Wt., 198 Miami (Florida) Birthplace: Stoutsville, Mo., Feb. 8, 1930 Joined Bears: 1952: No. 1 selection.

Record with Bears: Recovered from injury that idled him last season, Dooley expects to add to NFL career record that shows 128 passes caught for 2,076 yards and 12 touchdowns. As rookie, in 1952, used on defense, intercepting five passes for 30 yards return. Following season, as offensive end, he caught 53 passes for 841 yards and four touchdowns. Went into Air Force in 1955: discharged in time to get into last three games of 1956 schedule.

Previous record: Most impressive as a defensive halfback for Miami of Florida. Intercepted nine passes during regular 1951 schedule; in 1952 Gator Bowl game against Clemson, picked off four enemy aerials and voted most valuable player; also played in 1951 Orange Bowl and starred in 1952 Senior Bowl. As sprinter and hurdler, cocaptained Miami track team.

### MERRILL DOUGLAS

FULLBACK

Second Season

Ht., 6:0. Wt., 204 Utah Birthplace: Salt Lake City, Utah, March 15, 1936.

Joined Bears: 1958; No. 6 selection.

Record with Bears: Carried ball ten times for 53 yards, mostly from fullback. Showed adaptability on occasion by playing halfback.

Previous record: All-Skyline Conference fullback at Utah in both junior and senior years. Eleven touchdowns as senior gave him conference scoring title. Scored two touchdowns in 1957 game against Army. Starred in East-West Shrine game. Lettered in baseball three years, as catcher, and was leading hitter as sophomore.



JOE FORTUNATO

FULLBACK

Fifth Season

Ht., 6:1. Wt., 225 Mississippi State Birthplace: Mingo Junction, O., March 28, 1930 Joined Bears: No. 8 selection.

Record with Bears: Right linebacker on defense since first joining team in 1955 following two years in Army at Fort Benning, Ga. Record shows three pass interceptions for 35 yards return, four opponents fumbles recovered. Pro bowl, 1959.

Previous record: As offensive fullback at Mississippi State, averaged 6.09 on 779-yard total in senior year when he was co-captain. All Southeastern Conference in 1951 and 1952 and named to both offense and defense in final year.

### WILLIE GALIMORE

### HALFBACK

Third Season

Ht., 6:1. Wt., 187 Florida A. & M. Birthplace: St. Augustine, Fla., March 30, 1935 Joined Bears: 1957; No. 5 selection in 1956.

Record with Bears: Career rushing average of 4.5 with 1,157 yards on 257 attempts and 13 touchdowns. Voted most valuable player and winner of Eisenhower Trophy in last year's Armed Forces Benefit game in which he scored four touchdowns against Cleveland on a 95 yard kickoff return and runs from scrimmage of 21, 35 and 15 yards, respectively. Also scored four touchdowns in one regular game in 1957. Returned kickoff 99 yards against Baltimore last season. Pro bowl, 1959.

Previous record: Averaged 14 touchdowns a season in three years at Florida A. & M., averaging 10 yards a try as senior and 8.3 as junior.

### BILL GEORGE

### GUARD

Eighth Season

Ht., 6:2½. Wt., 235 Wake Forest Birthplace: Waynesburg, Pa., Oct. 27, 1929 Joined Bears: 1952; No. 4 selection in 1951.

Record with Bears: Defensive captain since 1956 with seven season record of nine enemy pass interceptions, for 36 yards return, and ten opponents fumbles recovered. All-NFL middle guard, 1955, 1956; all-NFL linebacker, 1957, 1958; Pro bowl, 1955, 1956, 1957, 1958, 1959. Kicking ability also is represented statistically with four field goals in seven attempts and 14 extra points out of 15 attempts, mostly in 1954.

Previous record: All-America tackle at Wake Forest in 1951; twice all-Southern Conference. Member of 1952 College All Stars and also played in 1951 North-South game. National A.A.U. and Southern Conference wrestling champion.

### ABE GIBRON

### GUARD

### Second Season (Tenth in NFL)

Ht., 5:11½. Wt., 248 Purdue Birthplace: Michigan City, Ind., Sept. 22, 1925 Joined Bears: 1958; free agent.

Record with Bears: One of last season's great comeback stories. Reduced poundage from a balloonish 280 to a firm 248 and was a consistent stalwart on offense.

Previous record: Starting guard with Cleveland Browns from 1950 until late 1956 when, released, he joined Philadelphia Eagles for last three games. Eagle regular through 1957 but released again during offseason. All-NFL guard in 1955; Pro bowl, 1953, 1954, 1956. High school star in football, golf, track at Michigan City.

GUARD

Second Season

Ht., 6:3. Wt., 255 Maryland Bithplace: Rome, N. Y., Aug. 28, 1936

Joined Bears: 1958; obtained in trade as Cleveland's No. 3 choice.

Record with Bears: Improved steadily through his rookie season, particularly in in-line blocking, pulling, trapping and open field work.

Previous record: Another great lineman from Maryland; top line star for College All Stars against Detroit Lions in 1958 game. Rated fastest Maryland tackle to enter pro football in recent years. Member of East team in Shrine game; also in Senior Bowl.

HARLON HILL END Sixth Season

Ht., 6:3. Wt., 200 Florence Teachers Birthplace: Florence, Ala., May 4, 1932.

Joined Bears: 1954; No. 15 selection.

Record with Bears: Career totals show 182 pass receptions for 3,889 yards (club record) and 37 touchdowns. Other club records: most yards one season, 1,128 in 1956; most yards in one game, 214 in 1954; most touchdowns one game, four in 1954; longest completion, 86 yards from Ed Brown in 1955 (tied Sid Luckman-"Scooter" McLean pass for same distance in 1944). Voted Rookie-of-the-Year in 1954. All-league offensive end, 1954, 1955, 1956. Pro bowl, 1955, 1956, 1957.

Previous record: Star at little Florence, Ala., State Teachers (enrollment 575 men, 375 women) and a "sleeper" pick in the 1954 player selection.

### CHUCK HOWLEY

### CENTER

Second Season

Ht., 6:3. Wt., 228 West Virginia Birthplace: Wheeling, W. Va., June 23, 1936 Joined Bears: 1958; No. 1 selection.

Record with Bears: Justified his No. 1 selection by breaking in successfully as linebacker. Play in his rookie year was a source of great satisfaction to his former coach at West Virginia, one-time Bear quarterback Bob Snyder who predicted: "Howley will be a star for the next eight seasons . . . one of the greatest pro line prospects I've seen in years."

Previous record: All-American at West Virginia; also All-Southern Conference for three years. Center, guard and linebacker there. Starred in both East-West game at San Francisco and Senior Bowl contest at Mobile, Ala. Runs 100-yard dash in :10.1 and won track letter.

### BOB JEWETT

### END

Second Season

Ht., 6:2. Wt., 197 Michigan State Birthplace: Mason, Mich., Nov. 14, 1934 Joined Bears: 1958; No. 5 selection.

Record with Bears: Contributed substantial talent to offensive end corps that was hampered by injuries last season. Caught fifteen passes for 192 yards and one touchdown.

Previous record: Rated by Michigan State Coach Duffy Daugherty one of two best offensive ends during his regime at Lansing. Top student as well as an athlete, Jewett was named to All-Big Ten Scholastic Honor team in senior year. Named outstanding lineman in two post-season games, North-South Shrine at Miami, where he caught nine passes for 208 yards; and College Stars-Southwest Pros game at Tucson, Ariz., where he caught 12 for 256 yards.

### JACK JOHNSON

### HALFBACK

Third Season

Ht., 6:3. Wt., 198 Miami (Fla.) Joined Bears: 1957; No. 4 selection.

Miami (Fla.) Birthplace: Pittsburgh, Pa., Dec. 11, 1933

**Record with Bears:** Sterling defensive back who also has done considerable punting in his two years with Bears. Averaged 35.5 yards on 29 punts. Broke into statistics with four pass interceptions for 36 yards return in 1957 and one for 5 in 1958.

# EISENHOWER TROPHY

In 1953, President Dwight D. Eisenhower authorized presentation of a trophy to the outstanding player of the Armed Forces game, selected by sports writers attending. Player's name is inscribed on trophy and he receives a replica of the beautiful award. Here are players honored so far:

1958—Willie Galimore, HB, Bears 1957—Fred Williams, T, Bears 1956—Darrell Brewster, E, Browns 1955—Ed Brown, QB, Bears 1954—Frank Gifford, HB, Giants 1953—Harry Jagade, FB, Browns The fourteenth annual Armed Forces Benefit game is sponsored by the four Chicago metropolitan daily newspapers—the American, the Daily News, the Sun-Times and the Tribune, members of the Chicago Newspaper Publishers Association. This latest renewal in the series matches the Bears against the eastern conference champion New York Giants at Soldier Field Friday night, Sept. 11.

The Armed Forces game has been played annually since 1946 when the inaugural was planned, following a meeting in Washington attended by Dwight D. Eisenhower, then Army Chief of Staff; Admiral Chester K. Nimitz, representing the Navy; General Ira Eaker, acting for the head of the Air Force, General Carl Spaatz; Ralph Cannon, then sports editor of the Chicago Herald-American; and George Halas.

The Herald-American sponsored the game in 1946 and 1947 and the Sun-Times from 1949 through 1954, after which the four metropolitan daily newspapers joined together in making the worthy enterprise even more successful than it had been previously.

Thirteen Armed Forces games have netted \$548,985.08. Sharing in the proceeds are Army Emergency Relief, the Navy Relief Society and the Air Force Aid Society.

Those official relief agencies provide financial assistance to widows and orphans of servicemen . . . care and assistance to service personnel, to wounded servicemen and their families . . . hospital and medical aid to needy families and dependents of servicemen . . . prenatal and obstetrical care to needy servicemen's families . . . and cash grants to service personnel and dependents in emergencies.

# **Bears Best Rushing, Passing Teams**

Greatest rushing team in Bears' history was the 1934 squad that rolled up 2,835 yards, still second high of all time in the NFL. (Top rushing team: Detroit, 1936, with 2,885.)

Exactly twenty years later, the Bears established an all-time team passing mark of 3,104 net yards on 208 completions. (Yardage total is NFL's fourth best team passing mark of all time, back of 1950 Los Angeles. 3,709 yards: 1947 Washington, 3,336; 1941 Los Angeles, 3,296). Incidentally, individual passing yardage of the 1954 team adds up to 3,299 on completions alone, but the team, according to league rules, is charged with losses attempting to pass so the net is 3,104.

Here are the individual figures that add up to those two all-time Bear record totals:


