### **HISTORY OF THE BEARS**

This is the thirty-fourth year for the Chicago Bears, professional football's most famous and most popular team. Organized in 1920 as the Decatur Staleys, the Bears and their founder, George Halas, have made an outstanding contribution to the sports world, while playing a major role in the establishment of the National Football League and the development of modern-day football.

The Bears with their great championship teams, colorful players—Grange, Nagurski, Luckman, McAfee—and "wide open" brand of football, first caught the imagination of the nation's grid followers. This was the team that put pro football on the map—made it a major sport. Then, not resting on their laurels, the Bears revolutionized all football, pro, collegiate and high school, with the modern T-Formation, the streamlined "T" which means OFFENSIVE FOOTBALL.

Halas and his Bears won the first championship. With only a few exceptions, they have been champs or contenders every season since. The Bears have ruled the roost seven times, but actually their dominance has been far greater. Two Bear teams went through the regular season without defeat, only to lose the title playoff. Seven other times the Bears just missed out for the championship, twice while losing only one game. Everytime the Bears take to the field they set a new record; they have won more games than any other pro team, have scored more points, registered more first downs, and piled up more yardage. The official N.F.L. record book is full of accomplishments by the Bears.

The Bears have set the pattern. They signed the immortal Red Grange to a procontract in 1925, and thus capitalized on the popularity of the most glamorous football player of all time. Packed stadiums turned out to see the Bears—and Grange—from coast to coast. Professional football had become big time overnight! The Bears were famous in Miami, New Orleans, Seattle, Houston—Keokuk, Iowa. They have monopolized "firsts" ever since. More people have seen the Bears play than any other proteam; they were first with a radio broadcast, first to practice daily; first with a club newspaper; first with a team song; first to cover the field with a tarpaulin. The Bears are the only organization in professional sport with an official Alumni.

To millions of Americans, the Bears have been the symbol of professional football. In 1940 the Bears revolutionized the game by scoring a 73 to 0 victory over the Washington Redskins in the championship playoff. This brought a new era to the game. Soon, Notre Dame, Army, Stanford—all of the powers, switched to the T-Formation. Within four years nearly every professional, college and high school team was using the "T"—the Bears "T".

The Bears, with Grange, brought the "million dollar gate" to pro football. Now, through their development of the "T" to a success unparralled in football, they made the other teams "T" conscious, and this in turn resulted in a more interesting game everywhere. Graduates of the Bear system have been in great demand as coaches ever since. Variations of the Bears' "T" followed—the Split T, Winged T.

In every respect, the Bears symbolize the spirit and will-to-win of George Halas. One writer described Halas and his Bears perfectly thus—"They have the Esprit De Corps." The motto of Halas and all of his former players is "Once a Bear, always a Bear." As a result, the Bear Alumni is one of the most fabled groups in sportdom. The class of 1920, Halas U, follows the '53 team with an interest that would do credit to the old Yale grads. They return for Homecoming each December, the Blackclocks and Healeys, Kopchas, Lanums, Manders', McAfees, Luckmans, Karrs, Walquists and McMillens, the Noltings and Brumbaughs, Huffines, Mohardts, Osmanskis, Gallarneaus, Sisks and Carlsons. Old and new Bears alike sing a toast to alma mater:

Bear Down, Chicago Bears — Make every play clear the way to victory:
Bear Down, Chicago Bears — put up a fight with a might so fearlessly:
We'll never forget the way you thrilled the nation, with your "T" formation.
Bear Down, Chicago Bears — and let them know why you're wearing the crown:
You're the pride and joy of Illinois — Chicago Bears, Bear Down!

### ATTENDANCE RECORDS

The Bears always have been Attendance Champs of pro football. They began their record breaking box office exploits in 1925 with Red Grange, and today hold the all-time attendance total, the highest home attendance average, and the top mark on the road. The Bears also have attracted the largest crowd for a championship playoff, the largest money crowd, and the biggest turnout to see the €ollege All Star game in Chicago (102,000 in 1942).

While winning the world championship for the seventh time in 1946, the Bears drew a total of 754,546 fans in 17 games. This still stands as the highest season attendance mark in professional football.

# **Bears' Coaching Staff**

The coaching staff of the Chicago Bears has set the pattern in professional football for more than two decades. It was first with the modern T-Formation with Man in Motion, and first with many of the innovations which followed. For at least ten years, the Bears were the only team in major football using the "T." Then came December 8, 1940, the Bears scored a sensational 73 to 0 triumph over the Washington Redskins in the championship playoff game, and within a few years virtually the entire football world adopted the Bears' "T." Actually it is T for Total Offense Football, in the words of George Halas. The Bears with their "T," have graduated more members of the coaching fraternity today than any other team. Five of the 12 head coaches in the National Football League formerly played with the Bears.

The 1953 staff consists of Halas, head coach; Luke Johnsos, Assistant coach; Clark Shaughnessy, Technical Adviser; Paddy Driscoll, backfield coach, and Phil Handler, Line coach. Clyde "Bulldog" Turner assisted the staff during the training

season.



#### GEORGE S. HALAS

One of the organizers of the National Football League. Born in Chicago, Feb. 2, 1895. Entered University of Illinois, Sept., 1914; graduated January, 1918. Earned letters in baseball, basketball and football. Captained cage team and was outstanding member grid squad 1915-16-17. Entered Navy in World War I. Played on famous Great Lakes team which won Service title and routed Mare Island in Rose Bowl.

Joined New York Yankees and was a spring training sensation before suffering leg injury. Joined A. E. Staley Company of Decatur, Ill., in 1920 and organized the famous Decatur

Staleys who tied for title. Moved club to Chicago next fall and team was renamed the Chicago Bears in 1921. Halas played end and coached the team. He continued as player-coach until 1930, when Ralph Jones took over field direction of club. Halas returned as head coach in 1933. He has been at the helm ever since, except for period from November, 1942 through 1945, when he served with the Navy in World War Two. He rejoined the Bears in 1946, winning a seventh world championship. In addition to the Bears, he operates a sporting goods store and mail order business.



#### **LUKE JOHNSOS**

A member of the Bears, as a player or coach, since 1929, Born in Chicago and attended Schurz High before entering Northwestern University. Won honors in baseball and football. Received trial with Cincinnati Reds in 1929, but decided to devote his professional career to football. Joined Bears that fall and won spurs at end. Starred for seven seasons, teaming together with Bill Hewitt to form one of the top end combinations in football. Luke earned all-league honors in 1933.

Appointed assistant coach in 1937. Has been associated as a player or coach with six Bear championship aggregations.

Johnsos and Hunk Anderson were named co-coaches on Oct. 25, 1942, when George Halas was called to active duty by the Navy. They were at the helm of the Bears for the remainder of the '42 season, and during 1943-1944 and '45.

Like the other members of the staff, Johnsos is a keen student of football, and a strict "T" man. He is recognized in grid circles as an outstanding strategist. Luke is part owner of Johnsos-Coppock Co., a cellophane printing firm in Skokie, Ill.

#### **CLARK SHAUGHNESSY**

One of the best known coaches in football. Joined Bears' staff in 1951, although he acted in advisory capacity prior to World War Two. Shaughnessy was born in St. Cloud, Minn., Mar. 6, 1892. After playing fullback at the University of Minnesota he began his coaching career at Tulane University in 1915. His Green Wave was named National Champion in 1925.

Shaughnessy moved to Loyola of the South in 1927, where he continued to produce outstanding teams. He succeeded A. A. Stagg at the University of Chicago in 1933 and remained on the Midway until collegiate football was abandoned.



Shaughnessy stunned the football world in 1940 by leading Stanford to the Pacific Coast title and a win over Nebraska on New Year's Day in the Rose Bowl. Shaughnessy moved to the University of Maryland in 1942 and became head coach at the University of Pittsburgh in 1945. He acted as advisory coach for the Washington Redskins and Los Angeles Rams, assuming the head coaching post at Los Angeles in 1948. Led the Rams to the Western Division title in 1949.

#### JOHN L. "PADDY" DRISCOLL

Joined the Bear staff in 1941, thirteen years after completing his playing career with the same club. Driscoll is rated one of the greatest athletes ever developed in the Chicago Area. He was an outstanding football and baseball player at Northwestern University from 1915 through 1917. Served with Navy in World War I and was a teammate of George Halas on the mighty Great Lakes Naval Training Station team in 1918. Driscoll turned in one of the greatest individual performances in the history of the Rose Bowl.

Paddy signed to play with the first Bear team (Staleys) in 1920 but a league ruling awarded him to the Cardinals. Coached and quarterbacked the Cards in 1921 and 1922. Was a One Man Show for six seasons, winning numerous games with field goals. Joined Bears in 1926 and celebrated his reunion with Halas by scoring all points as Bears defeated Cardinals, 16 to 0. Retired as an active player in 1928. Many observers rank him with the four greatest backs in pro football history. Coached St. Mel High for several years and became head coach at Marquette University in 1939. Paddy has a seat on the Chicago Board of Trade.



#### PHIL HANDLER

Second year as member of Bear staff. Served 22 years with Cardinals, as player, line coach and head coach. Phil is regarded as one of the top line mentors in the business. He was born in Fort Worth, Tex., July 1, 1908. After gaining national recognition as a guard at Texas Christian University, he joined the Cardinals. Starred from 1930 to 1936.

Appointed line assistant to Milan Creighton in 1936, Handler developed top Redshirt forwards while also serving under Ernie Nevers and Jimmy Conzelman, Named head coach of Cards in 1943, and again top man in 1945. Returned as line

coach when Conzelman took over reins in 1946, but was named co-head coach in 1949. Served as line coach again in 1950 under Curley Lambeau. Phil is associated with a lumber company in Chicago.
