THE BEARS-PRO FOOTBALL

1951

The history of professional football is to a great extent the story of the Chicago Bears. This story began to unfold itself in 1920. Playing first as the Staleys of Decatur, the Bears made the sports world pro football conscious. They were the first champions of the National Football League. The Bears, by signing the glamorous Red Grange, and capitalizing on his wave of popularity, brought the "million dollar gate" to professional football. They spread the "gospel" on barnstorming tours from New England to Florida to California. And it was the Bears who made the modern-streamlined game of football possible by introducing and perfecting the T-Formation with Man-in-Motion.

To millions of Americans, the Chicago Bears have been the symbol of the post graduate grid game through the years. The Bears have won more world championships and more games, while scoring more points and compiling more yardage than any other team in football history. It has been said that Halas U. wrote the record book. This may be a slight exaggeration, but it is true that the Bears are the proud possessors of virtually every major team record in professional football, from win percentage to box office marks.

In the matter of popularity, the Bears are in a class by themselves. They are the favorite team not only of Chicago, and Illinois, but of Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Memphis, New Orleans, and Kansas City, of Texas and Oklahoma. More fans, nearly 15,000,000, have watched the Chicago Bears than any other three pro football teams combined. Seventy million, or more, have either read about the Bears, watched them on television, or listened to their exploits over the air lanes. They truly represent a national institution.

The Bears have held a monopoly on "Firsts" from the start. They were the first champions; the first pro team to practice daily; first to travel from coast-to-coast; first to cover the playing field with a tarpaulin; first with a band and a team song; first with a club newspaper; first pro team to broadcast; first to take game movies and first to play before capacity crowds. The Bears are the only team with an official Alumni, which meets annually.

Founded by George Halas, the Bears in every respect symbolize the spirit and will-to-win of their founder. Halas' Bears all through the years have had the "Esprit De Corps." They either have it when they join the Bears, or acquire it soon after. Nearly every youngster who tosses a pigskin around in high school hopes some day to be a member of the Chicago Bears.

They have come from all parts of the land, the Sidewalks of New York City, and the farms of Illinois, Minnesota and Nebraska; Notre Dame and Knox, to gain everlasting fame with the Bears—Bronko Nugurski, Ed Healey Beattie Feathers, Danny Fortmann, Jack Manders, Sid Luckman, Hugh Blacklock, Joe Kopcha. Jake Lanum, Johnny Sisk, George McAfee, Bill Osmanski, Ken Hufine, Johnny Mohardt, Hunk Anderson, Gene Ronzani, George Wilson, Jim McMillen, Laurie Walquist the Sternamans, Bill Hewitt, Chic Harley, George Trafton, Bill Karr, Joe Stydahar, Ray Nolting, Guy Chamberlin and Carl Brumbaugh.

The tradition began back in 1920, and each Bear team has been handing that tradition down to its successor through the years. Bulldog Turner, who has played on four championship teams, was asked recently to name his choice of the "greatest Bear eleven." Perhaps his answer explains best the secret of success of Halas U. Turner said: "Every Bear team I played on was the greatest team I ever saw, win or lose. Each one of them had the greatest spirit in football."

Since 1920, more than 650 players have carried the Bear standard through 500 gridiron battles. To this long list of Bear heroes, from Blacklock and Healey to Turner, the men who made these great records, this book stands as a tribute.

THE FIRST BEARS AND THE **CHAMPIONS**

STALEYS' TIE AKRON INDIANS FOR NATIONAL TITLE AT CUB PARK IN CHICAGO.

The Monday morning sports pages of December 12th, 1920 carried that banner, and it told the full story of the first Bears-the Decatur Staleys. Sports Editor Howard V. Millard, writing in the Decatur Daily Re-

view, said: Showing the same brand of high class football that brought them the title of Western Champions on Dec. 4, when they downed Paddy Driscoll's Cardinal team, 10 to 0, the great Decatur Staleys battled the Akron Indians, champions of the East, to a scoreless tie Sunday, Dec. 11, before 11,000 fans at Cubs Park, Chicago, for the National Title. The Halas machine put up one of the greatest exhibitions ever seen on the professional field and not only tied the great Eastern eleven, but outplayed them.



ATTENDANCE RECORDS

The Bears always have been Attendance Champs of pro football. They began their record breaking box office exploits in 1925 with Red Grange, and today hold the all-time attendance total, the highest home attendance average, and the top mark on the road. The Bears also have attracted the largest crowd for a championship playoff, the largest money crowd, and the biggest turnout ever to see the College All Star game in Chicago (102,000 in 1942).

While winning the world championship for the seventh time in 1946, the Bears drew a total of 754,546 fans in 17 games. This still stands as the highest season attendance mark in professional football.

Bears' Coaching Staff

The Chicago Bears were first with the modern T-Formation with man in motion. Naturally, the Bear Coaching Staff has set the pattern through the years. All present members of the staff, along with the late Ralph Jones and Hunk Anderson, have contributed greatly to the streamlined "T" of today. The 1951 staff consists of four coaches: George Halas, Luke Johnsos, Paddy Driscoll and Clark Shaughnessy.



George S. Halas

Founder, president and head coach of the Bears. One of the pioneers of professional football and an organizer of the National Football League.

Born in Chicago on February 2, 1895. Attended Crane Tech, competing in baseball, basketball and football. Starred with Brothers Walter and Frank in K of C softball. Entered University of Illinois as engineering student in September, 1914; graduated January, 1918. Earned letters in baseball and captained basketball team in 1917-18. Outstanding member of Bob Zuppke's Fighting Illini elevens 1915-16 and '17; All-Western in senior year. Entered Navy in World War I following graduation. Played on famous Great Lakes team which won Service Championship and routed Mare Island in the Rose Bowl, New Year's Day, 1919. His outstanding performance at Pasadena gained him second team All-American honors.

Halas was best known for his exploits on the diamond in college and major league baseball. Scouts were hot on his trail as soon as he received his service discharge. Signed with the New York Yankees and starred in spring training before suffering a leg injury. Optioned by the Yanks to St. Paul of the American Association, where he concluded his professional baseball career. Played professional football with Hammond that fall (1919).

Halas joined the A. E. Staley Company of Decatur, Ill., the following spring and played baseball under Iron Joe McGinnity. The famous Decatur Staleys' were organized by Halas that fall, a team which was to win glory, unrivalled, on the gridiron. He also helped organize the present National Football League in 1920. Halas moved the Staleys' to Chicago in 1921, where they played at Cubs Park and became known as the Chicago Bears.

The Bears were champions from the start, winning the world championship the first season. Halas played end and coached the team. He continued as player-coach until 1930, when Ralph Jones took over the field direction of the club. Halas returned as head coach in 1933, winning another title for the Bears. He has been at the helm ever since, except for a brief period from November, 1942, through 1945, when he served with the Navy in World War Two. Halas acted as athletic and recreation director in the Pacific Theater and was decorated with the Bronze Star Medal by Admiral Chester Nimitz. He rejoined the Bears in 1946 and led the team to its seventh world championship.

Halas has won more football games than any other coach in the history of the game, collegiate or professional. His 319 victories up to the opening of the 1951 campaign tops Pop Warner, Stagg, Rockne and the rest.

LUKE JOHNSOS

Assistant coach and vice president. Johnsos was born in Chicago and attended Schurz High. He is a graduate of Northwestern University, winning honors both in baseball and football. Luke received a trial with the Cincinnati Reds in 1928 but decided to devote his professional career to football. He joined the Bears that fall along with Walt Holmer, Northwestern's All-American fullback. Johnsos took the play away from Holmer and held down an end post with the Bears for seven seasons. He teamed together with Bill Hewitt to form an outstanding end combination. Luke earned all-league recognition in 1933.

Appointed assistant coach in 1937, Johnsos has been a member of the Bears' staff ever since. He has been with the Bears, as player or coach, 23 seasons, and during that time was associated with six world championship teams. Johnsos and Hunk Anderson were named co-coaches on October 25, 1942, when George Halas was called to active duty by the Navy. They were at the helm of the Bears for the remainder of the '42 season, and during 1943-1944 and 1945.

Like the other members of the staff, Johnsos is a keen student of football, and an ardent advocate of the T-Formation. He is recognized in football circles as an outstanding strategist. Luke is part owner of a cellophane-printing company in Skokie, Ill. He is the champion father of the club—two boys and three girls. The Johnsos' make their home in Evanston.

JOHN L. "PADDY" DRISCOLL

Backfield coach. Paddy joined the Bears' staff in 1941, thirteen years after he completed his playing career with the same club. Driscoll rates as one of the greatest athletes ever developed in the Chicago Area. He was an outstanding football and baseball player at Northwestern University from 1915 through 1917. Paddy served with the Navy in World War I, and was a teammate of George Halas on the mighty Great Lakes Naval Training Station team, which won the service championship in 1918 and defeated Mare Island in the Rose Bowl the following New Year's Day. Driscoll turned in one of the greatest individual performances in the history of the Rose Bowl. Paddy signed to play with the first Bear team in 1920. A league ruling awarded him to the Cardinals. Coached and quarterbacked the Cardinals in 1921 and '22. He was a One Man show for the Cards for six seasons, and finally joined the Bears in 1926. Paddy celebrated his reunion with Halas by leading the Bears to a 16 to 0 triumph over the Cards, scoring all of the points himself. He retired as an active player at the end of the 1928 campaign. Many observers rank him with the four greatest backs of all time. Coached St. Mel High School for several years and became head coach at Marquette University in 1939. Paddy has a seat on the Chicago Board of Trade. The Driscolls have a son and live on Chicago's north side.

Bears Coaching Staff

CLARK SHAUGHNESSY

Technical Adviser. Became member of Bears' coaching staff officially this year, although he acted in advisory capacity prior to World War Two. Shaughnessy was born in St. Cloud, Minn., on March 6, 1892. After playing fullback at the University of Minnesota he began his coaching career at Tulane University in 1915. His 1925 Green Wave eleven was named National Champion. Shaughnessy moved to Loyola of the South in 1927, again producing outstanding teams. He succeeded A. A. Stagg at the University of Chicago in 1933 and remained on the Midway until collegiate football was abandoned. Shaughnessy stunned the football world in 1940 by leading Stanford to the Pacific Coast title and a victory over Nebraska in the Rose Bowl. It was the first time the modern T-Formation With Man in Motion made famous by the Bears was employed by a major college eleven. "Shag" moved to the University of Maryland in 1942 and became head coach at Pitt in 1945. He acted in to the University of Maryland in 1942 and became head coach at Pitt in 1945. He acted in advisory capacity with the Washington Redskins and later the Los Angeles Rams. Shaughnessy assumed full command of the Rams in 1948 and after one season led the Angelanos to the Western Division championship of the NFL.

Annual Armed Forces Benefit Football Game Series

The Armed Forces Football Series was inaugurated in 1946, following a meeting in Washington between General Dwight Eisenhower, representing the Army, Admiral Chester Nimitz of the Navy, representing the Air Force General Ira Eaker, and George Halas. It has been an annual classic ever since.

The official relief agencies of the Army, Navy and Air Force share in the proceeds and the game is known as the Armed Force Benefit Football Game. To date, five games have netted the Army Emergency Relief, the Navy Relief Society and the Air Force Aid Society more than \$223,626.27.

Besides Eisenhower, Nimitz and Eaker, the following military leaders have assisted in the promotion of the Armed Forces Series: General "Hap" Arnold, Admiral Louis Denfeld, James Forrestal, General Walton Walker, General "Tooey" Spaatz, General Stephen Chamberlin, Admiral Murray, Admiral Forrest Sherman, Admiral J. Cary Jones and Rear Admiral A. K. Doyle.

Specifically, benefit game funds help the armed forces relief agencies to provide: Financial assistance to widows and orphans of servicemen . . . Care and assistance to service personnel, to wounded servicemen and to their families . . . Hospital-medical attention to needy families and dependents of servicemen . . . Pre-natal and obstetrical care to needy servicemen's families . . . Cash grants to service personnel and dependents in emergencies.
