Greatness is measured by achievement. On this premise, the Chicago Bears take rank as the greatest organization in football history. No team through the years has been able to match the gridiron accomplishments of the mighty Bears from Halas U., who since 1920, have virtually written the record books while establishing a system of play which has gained world-wide fame.

The Bears are synonomous with Football. They have won more championships, more football games and have scored more points than any other aggregat:on in pro football annals. In thirty seasons, they have gained a total of 97,357 yards. The Bears are the only team in the game to hold the series edge in victories over every rival they have engaged since the National Football League was formed. In addition, they are credited with the highest win percentage in major sport. This is the achievement of a real Champion.

George Halas organized the Bears in 1920 and they were winners from the start, capturing the Western Championship and just missing the national title by a lone defeat. They have been setting a fast pace ever since. It was Halas and his Bears who made the sports world pro football conscious in 1925 with the fabulous Red Grange and a coast-to-coast barnstorming trip. Fifteen years later they revolutionized the game by trouncing the Washington kedskins in the championship playoff by the score of 73 to 0 . The Bears introduced the modern T-Formation and made it so effective and so "popular, that 90 per cent of the football teams throughout the land today employ the "Bears' T."

The Bears have always been colorful. They captured the imagination of the sports public in the days of Grange, and rate today not only as the pride of Chicago and Illinois, but the favorite team of Dubuque, Iowa; Ashland, Kentucky; Mishawaka, Indiana, and Millville, New Jersey. Many of football's most brilliant stars have played in the Orange, White and Blue colors of the Chicago Bears. It began in Decatur with George Trafton and Hugh Blacklock, and continued through the years with Ed Healey, Jim McMillen, Chic Harley, Guy Chamberlain, Laurie Walquist, Grange, Nagurski, Beaitie Feathers, Hewitt, Kopcha, Danny Fortmann, Joe Stydahar, George Wilson, Luckman, Bill Osmanski, McAfee and the Turners, Brays and Kavanaughs of the present. The daring exploits of these stars, and many others, have thrilled nearly thirteen million fans who have watched the Bears play, and more than fifty million others, who have read about them in the nation's newspapers and magazines.

The Bears were the first pro team to practice daily, They were first with a band; a song and a club newspaper; first to broadcast their games; first to travel coast-tocoast. They are the only organization in professional sport with an official Alumni, an alumni which gathers each fall in Ch:cago to reminisce over past glories. Members of the Bears' Alumni come from all parts of the country, and each year finds their ranks growing larger.

The Chicago Bears' Song is symbolic of the Spirit and Tradition of a great line of athletes who have established a mighty gridiron dynasty:

Nagurski
Jack Manders is the Bears' alltime scoring leader with a total of 372 points. His place-kicking gained him the name of "Automatic Jack." A great fullback at Minnesota, Manders was shifted to right half when he joined the Bears. He was a member of the famous back-field-Brumbaugh, Feathers, Nagurski and Manders. Ray Nolting ranks with the Bears' greatest ball carriers.
 He was one of the quickest starting backs of all time. Formerly head coach at Cincinnati $U$., he now is on the Green Bay staff.

1940-41; known as "One Play McAfee." Scored 39 touchdowns for the Bears. Rated by George Halas one of football's all-time greats. Bill Hewitt is an all-time Bear end, rated by some as one of the greatest wingmen in football history. His teams were among the greatest ever to represent the Bears. Hewitt was a terror on defense and a brilliant all-around end. He was fatally injured in an automobile crash several years ago.

## Beans' Coachning Stalfi

The football world rates the Bears' Coaching Staff "TOPS." It is responsible for the development of the modern T-Formation, and it is the staff which still sets the pace for all of the " $T$ " coaches throughout the land, collegiate and professional. Products of the Bear Coaching System are in big demand everywhere. The Green Bay Packers have an all-Bear alumni staff, headed by Gene Ronzani. Joe Stydahar and most of his assistants at Los Angeles also gained their experience with the Bears. George Wilson and Alde Forte of the Detroit Lions, and Ed Kolman, New York Giants' line coach, are other ex-Bears. Keith Molesworth is at Richmond.

Among the former Bears now coaching college teams are Bob Margarita, Beattie Feathers, Bert Ingwerson, Denny Meyers, Tipp Mooney, Bob Snyder, Ray McLean, Ray Richards, Leo Johnson, Ted Rosequist, Pat Preston, H. Allen Smith and Ed Manske.

## GEORGE S. HALAS

President and head coach. Founder of the Chicago Bears and one of the pioneers of professional football. Born on Chicago's west side on February 2, 1895. Attended Crane Tech, competing in baseball, basketball and football. Entered the University of Illinois as an engineering student in September, 1914; graduated January, 1918. Earned letters in baseball and captained basketball team in final year. Member Coach Bob Zuppke's Fighting Illinois varsity 1915-16 and '17. Switched from halfback to end, where he gained all-estern honors in 1917. Halas was better known in college for his exploits on the baseball diamond and attracted numerous major league scouts to Champaign, even though he was placed on Walter Camp's second All-American honor team.

Entered the Navy as an ensign following graduation. Sent to Great Lakes, where he became a member of the famous Blue Jacket eleven which tied Notre Dame that fall, defeated the Nayal Academy and played at Pasadena, New Year's Day, defeating Mare Island. Halas had a great day in the Rose Bowl. Shortly after receiving his discharge from service, George signed to play baseball with the New York Yankees. He went to the spring training camp tagged a "prize rookie" and appeared certain of a regular outfield berth before suffering an injury. The Yanks sent him to St. Paul in the American Association where he concluded his baseball career.

Halas played pro football in 1919 with Hammond. He joined the A. E. Staley Company of Decatur, Illinois, the following spring, playing baseball under "Iron Joe" McGinnity. The famous Decatur Staley's football team was organized by Halas in the fall of 1920, a team which was to win glory, unrivalled on the gridiron. He also was one of the founders of the National Football League the same year. Halas moved the Staley's to Chicago in 1921, where they played at Cubs Park, and became known as the Chicago Bears.

The Bears were champs from the start, winning the title for Chicago the first season. Halas played end and coached the team. He continued as player-coach until 1930, when Ralph !ones took over the club's field direction. Halas returned as head coach in 1933, winning another championship with the Bears. He has been at the helm ever since, save for a brief period from late 1942 through the 1945 season, when he served with the Navy in World War Two. During his service, Halas acted as athletic and recreation director in the Pacific Theater. He was decorated with the Bronze Star Medal by Admiral Chester Nimitz. George rejoined the Bears in 1946 to lead the team to its seventh world championship.

He is the head of a sporting goods and jewelry store, and mail order concern. The Halases make their home in Chicago and have two children, George Jr., and Mrs.
Virginia Virginia McCaskey.

## LUKE JOHNSOS

Assistant coach and vice president. Johnsos was born in Chicago and attended Schurz High. He is a graduate of Northwestern University, winning honors both in baseball and football. Luke received a trial with the Cincinnati Reds in 1928 but decided to devote his professional career to football. He joined the Bears that fall along with Walt Holmer, Northwestern's All-American fullback. Johnsos took the play away from Holmer and held down an end post with the Bears for seven seasons. He teamed together with Bill Hewitt to form an outstanding end combination. Luke earned allleague recognition in 1933.

Appointed assistant coach in 1937, Johnsos has been a member of the Bears' staff ever since. He has been with the Bears, as player or coach, 22 seasons, and during that time was associated with six world championship teams. Johnsos and Hunk Anderson were named co-coaches on October 25, 1942, when George Halas was called to active duty by the Navy. They were at the helm of the Bears for the remainder of the '42 season, and during 1943-1944 and 1945.

Like the other members of the staff, Johnsos is a keen student of football, and an ardent advocate of the T-Formation. He is recognized in football circles as an outstanding strategist. Luke is part owner of a printing company in Skokie, Ill. He is the champion father of the club-two boys and three girls. The Johnsos' make their home in Evanston.

## HEARTLEY "HUNK" ANDERSON

Headman of the line. Hunk has been a member of the staff since 1940. He was one of the early-day Bear players, joining the club in 1922. Anderson is one of the famous Calumet, Michigan, products. Like George Gipp, he enrolled at Notre Dame, playing under Knute Rockne in 1918-19-20 and '21. Hunk gained all-Western honors, and with the Bears was regarded as one of the best guards in pro football. After concluding his playing career with the Bears, Anderson returned to Notre Dame to serve as Rockne's first assistant and line coach, except for a brief period when he acted as head coach at St. Louis U.

Under Anderson's tutelage, Notre Dame linemen like Jack Cannon, Ted Twomey, Bud Boeringer, Ed Krause, Joe Kurth, Bert Metzger, Nordy Hoffman and Tom Conley gained All-American recognition. Hunk was named head coach following Rockne's tragic death in 1931. He served three seasons in that capacity. He moved to North Carolina State College in 1934, and later served as line coach under Harry Kipke at the University of Michigan. Hunk was line mentor of the Detroit Lions before joining the Bear staff.

Anderson is recognized as one of the foremost line coaches in the game. Few men in football have made a more thorough study of line play, and have a better knowledge of the art of blocking and tackling. Hunk is known throughout the National Football League for his defensive innoyations. The Anderson have two children and make their home in Detroit.

## JOHN L. "PADDY" DRISCOLL

Backfield coach. Paddy joined the Bears' staff in 1941, thirteen years after he completed his playing career with the same club. Driscoll rates as one of the greatest athletes ever developed in the Chicago Area. He was an outstanding football and baseball player at Northwestern Univergity from 1915 through 1917. Paddy served with the Navy in World War I, and was a teammate of George Halas on the mighty Great Lakes Naval Training Station team, which won the service championship in 1918 and defeated Mare Island in the Rose Bowl the following New Year's Day. Driscoll turned in one of the greatest individual performances in the history of the Rose Bowl. Paddy signed to play with the first Bear team in 1920, but instead was awarded to the Cardinals. Coached and quarterbacked the Cardinals in 1921 and '22. He was a One Man show for the Cards for six seasons, and finally joined the Bears in 1926. Paddy celebrated his reunion with Halas by leading the Bears to a 16 to 0 triumph over the Cards, scoring all of the points himself. He retired as an active player at the end of the 1928 campaign. Many observers rank him with the four greatest backs of all time. Coached St. Mel High School for several years and became head coach at Marquette University in 1939. Paddy has a seat on the Chicago Board of Trade. The Driscolls have a son and live on Chicago's north side.
