PRESIDENT
Kate Caithness

Scotland's Kate Caithness is the first female president of the World Curling Federation and the first female president of any Olympic winter sports federation.

First elected president of the WCF in April 2010 and re-elected without opposition two years later, Caithness has been involved with the sport of curling since the 1980s. As a member of Scotland's Royal Caledonian Curling Club, she went from playing the game to putting something back into the sport in the late 1990s. She served as president of the RCCC Ladies' Branch in 1997-98, then became an RCCC representative to the World Curling Federation.

Since 2000, Caithness has been the driving force behind the WCF's development of wheelchair curling. She was on the team that created the first World Wheelchair Curling Championship and was instrumental in the sport's inclusion at the 2006 Paralympic Winter Games in Turin, Italy.

From 2005 to '09 Caithness was an elected member of the International Paralympic Committee's five-person Sports Council Management Committee and she served on the Paralympic Games Committee from 2006 to '09.

Caithness was elected vice-president of the WCF in 2006 and served two two-year terms under former president Les Harrison.

In March 2011, Caithness was appointed to the Olympic Program Commission, responsible for reviewing and analyzing the sports, disciplines and events program, as well as the number of athletes in each sport, for the Summer and Winter Olympics.

Married and the mother of two sons, Caithness became a grandmother in 2008. She spends her free time with family and, when she has a chance, curling and playing golf at her home club in Edzell, Angus, where she was the Lady Captain from 2002 to '04.

The World Curling Federation is the recognized governing body of curling in the world.

The WCF's first formal constitution was approved in 1967 under the original charter of the International Curling Federation in Perth, Scotland. The constitution was significantly adjusted in 1982, when the federation was declared independent from Scotland's Royal Caledonian Curling Club, to which its original constitution had been tied. In 1991, the official name was changed to World Curling Federation. Further significant changes were made in 1994.

The WCF has a four-part mandate:

- To represent curling internationally and to facilitate the growth of the sport through a network of member associations
- To formulate rules of the sport of curling for world competition and all other competitions approved by the WCF and to further the interests of world curling
- To conduct world curling competitions
- To provide co-operation and mutual understanding among member associations and to unite curlers throughout the world

CHAIR

Ron Hutton

The new chair of the Canadian Curling Association's board of governors is Ron Hutton of Saint John, New Brunswick, who will also serve as a member of the CCA International Committee.

Hutton was president of the New Brunswick Curling Association and Curl Atlantic before being elected to the CCA board in 2009. He first served the sport in New Brunswick as a director and president of the Carlton Curling Club.

A curler of note, Hutton has played in men's and junior championships at the local, regional and provincial levels and has dedicated many hours as an organizer for a number of championships, including the 1985 Canadian mixed and the 2009 Ford World Men's.

Professionally, Hutton has served in a number of positions for a variety of businesses, including New Brunswick Publishing Co. Limited, Trecartin Bros., Stafford Foods, Diversity Inc., Admiral Inc. and RDI Chemical Corp. Since 2005, he has been the executive director of the New Brunswick Roofing Contractors Association and general manager of Master Roofers Guarantee of New Brunswick.

Hutton's volunteer work has not been limited to curling. Over the years he has donated much of his time to the Saint John Harbour Authority, the Rocmaura Nursing Home Foundation, St. Jude's Church and Scouts Canada in Saint John.

Married to Barb, Hutton is a member of the Governor General's Curling Club and an honorary life member of the New Brunswick Curling Association.

CCA ADMINISTRATION

The Canadian Curling Association's head office is located in Cumberland, Ontario, at 1660 Vimont Court. The administration unit has a resident staff of 12, headed by chief executive officer Greg Stremlaw. In addition, the CCA retains Warren Hansen under contract from his office in Vancouver as director of event operations and media, and Paul Webster, the national development coach, works from the National Training Centre in Calgary. The CCA has numerous event offices across the country and several dozen contractees who help administrate and manage the organization in support of the national office. It also retains a local marketing office and personnel in Winnipeg and a national marketing office and personnel in Toronto.



CEO Greg Stremlaw

Greg Stremlaw works out of the CCA's national office in Cumberland, Ontario, and has just completed his fifth year as chief executive officer.

Before joining the CCA in 2007, Stremlaw was the CEO and executive director of Chicopee Ski & Summer Resort in Kitchener, Ontario, where he had been employed since 2002. Before that, he was for six years director of sport services for luge and bobsleigh for the Calgary Olympic Development Association (now WinSport Canada), which included his role as race chairman/race director for numerous international events, including the 1999 Viessmann Luge World Cup, the 2001 Skeleton World Championship and Women's Bobsleigh Championship.

He holds a master's degree in sports management from the University of Miami in Coral Gables, Florida, a master's of business

administration from the University of Maine in Orono, Maine, and a bachelor of arts in commerce from the University of Western Ontario in London, Ontario.

Stremlaw's board experience includes the Canadian Ski Council, KidsAbility Centre for Child Development and the Conestoga College Program Advisory Committee. He is an international delegate to the World Curling Federation, a member of the Sandra Schmirler Foundation Advisory Board — which raises funds for neonatal intensive-care units across Canada — and a Canadian Olympic Committee session member.

An athlete of note, Stremlaw has been active in many sports, including soccer and track and field, and was a member of the United States hockey team program.

Married to Wendy, Stremlaw has two children, Kristin and Michael. The family leads an active lifestyle that includes coaching and participating in competitive soccer, baseball, hockey and synchronized swimming.

FORD HOT SHOTS

The Ford Hot Shots celebrated its 18th season at the 2012 Scotties Tournament of Hearts and Tim Hortons Brier.

When the Ford Motor Co. of Canada became part of international curling in 1995 as title sponsor of the Ford World Curling Championships, it introduced an opportunity for Hearts and Brier curlers to participate in individual skills competitions known as the Ford Hot Shots.

Points curling has long been part of the game in most corners of the curling world. While some countries have individual curling competitions, Ford Hot Shots is the first skills competition at major curling events that pits the abilities of championship curlers against one another's.

In each round of competition, each curler delivers six skill-testing shots — hit and stay, draw the button, draw the port, the raise, hit and roll and double takeout.

Each shot is worth a maximum five points,

with the final location of the shooter being valued as follows: button — 5 points, four-foot circle — 4 points, eight-foot circle — 3 points, 12-foot circle — 2 points. On each shot a single point is awarded if the shot has been missed on the professional side or is deemed to have provided some sort of positive result.

The 2012 Scotties Tournament of Hearts and Tim Hortons Brier Hot Shots winners were awarded two-year leases on 2012 Ford Focus Titaniums, each valued at approximately \$13,000. Runners-up received \$2,000 and third-place finishers were awarded \$1,000.

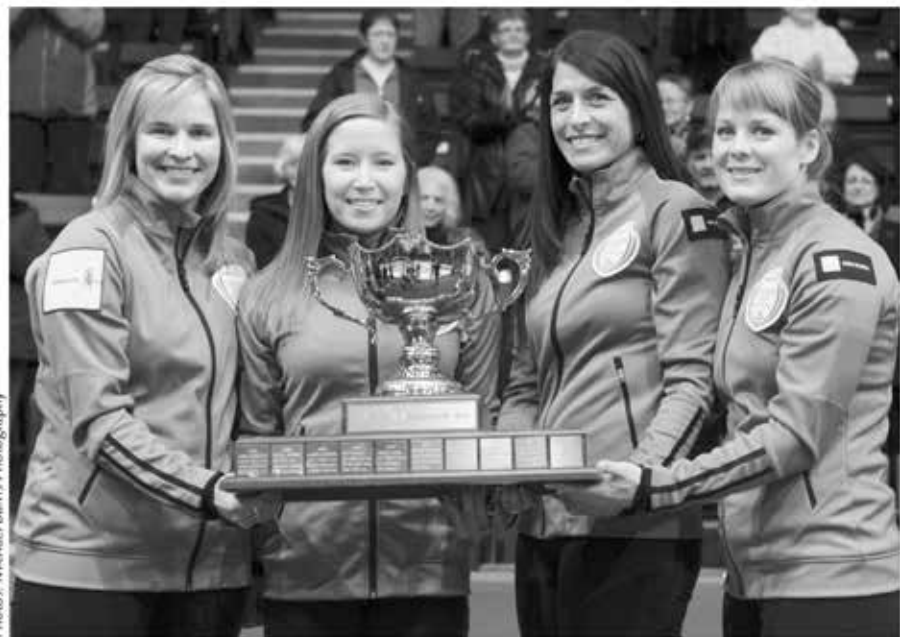

The win avenged an embarrassing 298-102 thrashing a year earlier. The competition includes mixed doubles, singles, men's and women's team games, and mixed, men's and women's skins.

The World Financial Group Continental Cup brought together 12 of the best curling teams in the world — six representing Team World, six representing Team North America — facing off in a unique competition in January 2012 in Langley, British Columbia.

A total of 400 points was available from the competition's four events — mixed doubles, singles, team and skins. When the competition was completed, Team World was declared the winner with 235 points and awarded the Continental Cup trophy.

MIXED DOUBLES

Each side picked six doubles teams. A doubles team consists of two throwers — one man and one woman — who also provided the sweeping.

Points

A total of six points was awarded for each doubles game won. In the case of a tie, each team received three points. Six games were played and a total of 36 points awarded.

Rules

- Scoring was counted as in normal curling.
- Each game was eight ends. Ties were not broken.
- Each team was given 48 minutes per game.
- Each team threw five rocks per end. The player

delivering the first rock of each end also delivered the last rock of the end; the player throwing the second rock delivered the third and fourth rocks of each end. This rotation could change from end to end and was simply determined by the player who delivered the first rock of each end.

- No rock could be removed from play until after the third rock of each end and any rocks it may have displaced came to rest.
- Two stationary rocks were positioned by the officials at the start of each end. One rock bisected the centre line, approximately eight feet in front of the house (the exact position of this rock was determined by the chief umpire before the competition, depending on ice conditions); the other was positioned at the back of the button so that it bisected the centre line and touched the tee.
- Before the start of each end, one team had an option. The team with the option had its choice of having its rock placed as a guard or having the rock positioned in the house behind the button. If the guard was chosen, the opponent's rock was positioned in the house or vice versa.
- The team with the rock out front as a guard delivered first and the team with the rock in the house delivered second (had last rock in the end).
- After the first end, the team that lost the previous end had the option.
- If an end was blanked, the team that blanked forfeited the option for the next end.

SINGLES COMPETITION

All of the teams participated in the six singles matches. The competition included six skill-testing shots and each player on each team threw at least one but not more than two shots. The other team members from each side acted as sweepers or skips.

Points

The winner of each game earned four points. Two points were awarded to each side in the event of a tie. A total of six singles games were played, so the total points awarded was 24. Eight bonus points were awarded to the side with the highest aggregate score, meaning the greatest number of points from all the shots played by that side. A total of 32 points was available for singles.

Run-through

A rock was positioned at the back of the button so that it bisected the centre line and touched the tee. A second rock was positioned four feet in front of the house, also bisecting the centre line. The thrower attempted to hit the front rock and raise it onto the one at the back of the button, removing it from play. Points were awarded as follows:

SKINS COMPETITION

Aggressive strategy combined with exceptional shot-making was the highlight of this final battle for points. Each gender played three skins games but the points value varied from game to game. Two mixed skins games were also played.

Points

A total of 260 skins points was available. The men's, women's and mixed Game A were worth 20 points each. The men's, women's and mixed Game B were worth 30 points each. The men's and women's Game C were worth 55 points each.

Rules

- Each game consisted of eight ends.
- Each team was allocated 64 minutes per game.

If a team exceeded the allotted time, the game was stopped. Each team retained the points already earned in the game and the remaining points were forfeited to the non-violating team.

- Each end was referred to as a skin. To count a skin when a team had last rock, it had to count at least two points. When a team didn't have last rock, it had to steal at least one point to count a skin.
- If a team scored only one point when it had last rock, it not only lost the hammer, but the end was carried over, which meant the points at stake were carried over to the next end.
- If an end was blanked, a carryover took place and the team that blanked the end forfeited last rock to its opponent.
- If the final end of a skins game resulted in a carryover, the two teams determined who would claim the carryover points by selecting a player from each team to deliver one rock to the button with sweeping. The team that had last rock in the last end shot first.
- The mixed skins lineups had to include two players named to compete in the 20-point, two in the 30-point and four in the 55-point skins games.

The awards began after the CBC was presented with the Golden Rings Award by the International Olympic Association for its excellence in broadcasting curling from the Nagano games. CBC decided to fund an annual award for junior curlers in Canada as an ongoing legacy of the Golden Rings Award and established the CBC Legacy Awards.

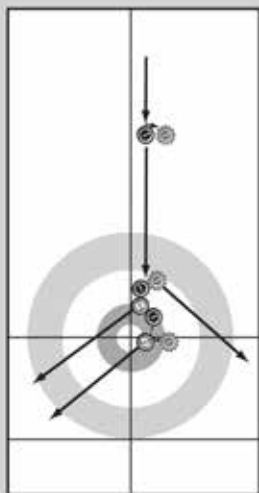

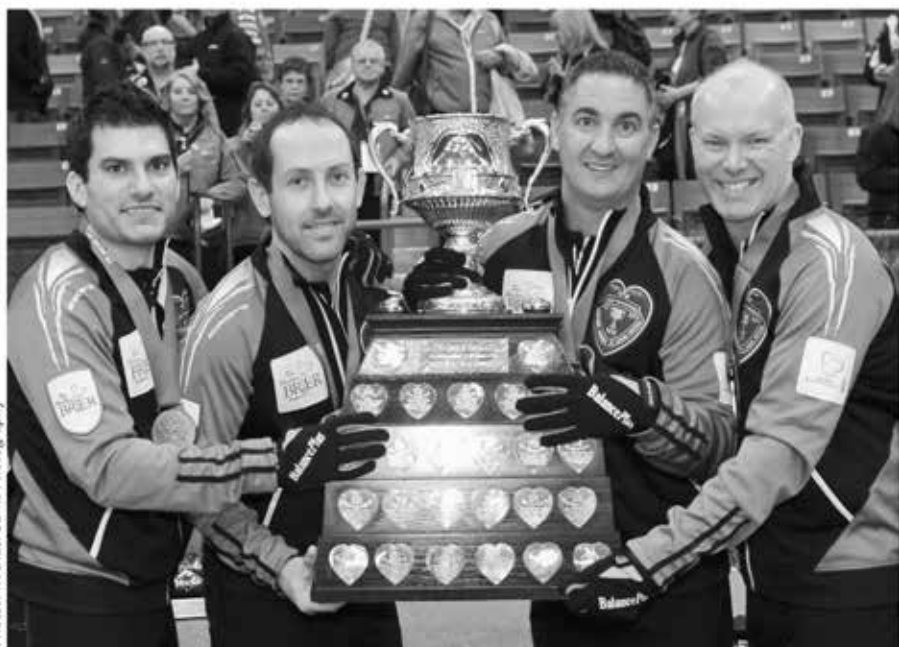

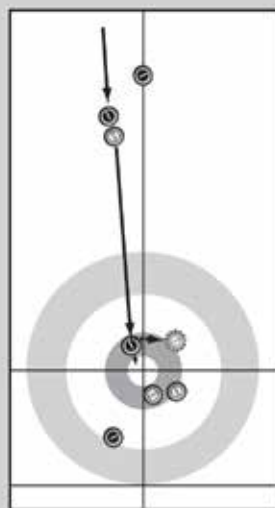

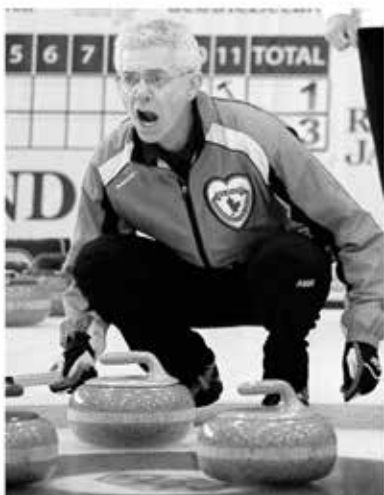

THE ROAD TO SOCHI, RUSSIA

The World Curling Federation has 49 member associations, but only 10 are allowed to participate at the medal level of the 2014 Olympic Winter Games in Sochi, Russia.

Russia, as host country, has a berth in both the men's and women's competitions. Seven berths will be assigned on the basis of points accumulated at the 2012 and '13 World Curling Championships. The remaining two berths will be determined at a new WCF Olympic qualifying event to be held in December 2013.

FRANCES BRODIE AWARD

Skip Eve Muirhead of Scotland is the 2012 winner of the Frances Brodie Award. The award winner is selected annually by competitors in the World Women's Curling Championship as the player who best combines playing ability with sportsmanship. The award was named in honour of Scotland's Frances Brodie, one of curling's pioneering women. 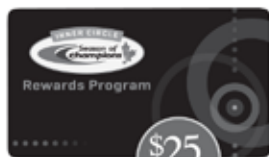

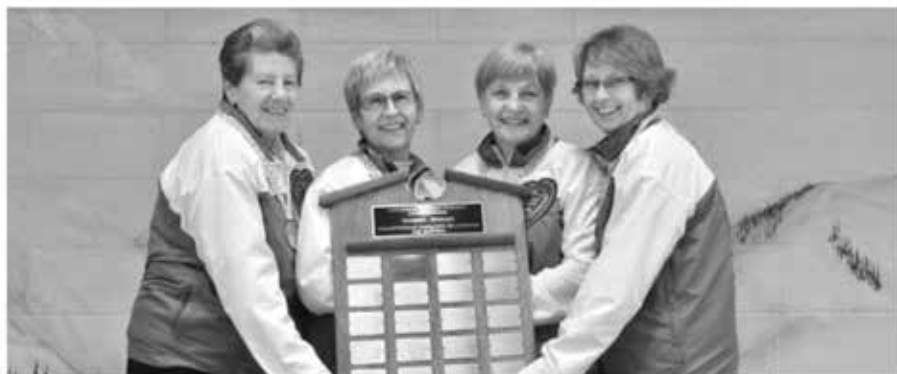

THE ROAD TO SOCHI, RUSSIA

The World Curling Federation has 49 member associations, but only 10 are allowed to participate at the medal level of the 2014 Olympic Winter Games in Sochi, Russia.

Russia, as host country, has a berth in both the men's and women's competitions. Seven berths will be assigned on the basis of points accumulated at the 2012 and '13 World Curling Championships. The remaining two berths will be determined at a new WCF Olympic qualifying event to be held in December 2013.

COLIN CAMPBELL MEMORIAL AWARD

New Zealand third Sean Becker is the 2012 winner of the Colin Campbell Memorial Award. The award was instituted in 1979 to honour the memory of Colin A. THANKS FOR THE MEMORIES

The curling community will always remember seven great champions of the sport who died in the past year. Each played an integral role and made significant contributions to curling in Canada and worldwide.



JIM SULLIVAN

Jim Sullivan passed away suddenly on November 12, 2011, at the age of 43. The tall, quiet New Brunswick skip won the 1987 Canadian Junior Men's Curling Championship and the 1988 world juniors

and was a finalist in the 1990 Brier.

Sullivan skipped his New Brunswick boys — cousin Charlie Sullivan at third, Craig Burgess at second and Dan Alderman at lead — to a 6-4 victory over Ontario's Wayne Middaugh in the final of the 1987 Canadian juniors. The next year, Sullivan and his teammates defeated Sweden's Peja Lindholm 4-2 to score world junior gold in Füssen, Germany. It was the first time that a team from New Brunswick had won a world title in any sport in more than 60 years.

Just two years later, Sullivan and his squad made a big impact at the Brier in Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. After an exciting 5-4 victory against hometown hero Al Harnden of Northern Ontario in the semifinal, Sullivan lost the championship final 5-4 to resurgent Ed Werenich of Ontario. Sullivan skipped New Brunswick again at the 2001 Brier in Ottawa, finishing out of the playoffs with a 6-5 record.

Team Sullivan was inducted into the New Brunswick Sports Hall of Fame in 1994.



ELSIE CROSBY

A dedicated curler for much of her life, Elsie Crosby passed away quietly on December 27, 2011, at her home in Yarmouth, Nova Scotia.

Crosby held a number of executive positions in

the Nova Scotia Ladies Curling Association, including that of president in 1983. She was president of the Canadian Ladies Curling Association in 1987 and during that same year chaired the Curl Canada board of directors.

Crosby was inducted into the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame in 1988 as a builder.



WILLIAM GARNET CAMPBELL

Canadian curling lost another great one on December 30, 2011, when Garnet Campbell of Avonlea, Saskatchewan, passed away just days before his 85th birthday.

Campbell competed in a remarkable 24 provincial curling championships, was a finalist in 16 provincial men's Brier playdowns (winning 10 times), and played in six Western Canada masters (winning four times) and two provincial mixed championships (winning both). He was the first Canadian curler to appear in 10 Briers. Along with his father, Sandy, and brothers Lloyd, Glen, Don and Gordon, Campbell skipped four provincial men's champions and one Brier championship team, going undefeated at the 1955 Brier in Regina.

With brother Glen, Bob Pickering, Jack Keys, Gary Ford and Rob Thomas, Campbell made six more Brier appearances, playing third or second.

As a family, the Campbells won a total of 24 Purple Hearts, emblematic of Brier appearances.

Garnet Campbell was inducted into the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame in 1974.



STAN AUSTMAN

Saskatoon's Stan Austman, whose sliding prowess led the Dominion Curling Association (now the CCA) to introduce its first hogline rule in the mid-1950s, passed away on January 21, 2012, at the age of 75.

Austman played on Bayne Secord's Canadian schoolboy champion teams in 1954 and '55. He was a fixture on the national curling scene for decades and his dream of playing in a Brier finally came true in 1985, when Eugene Hritzuk took him along as an alternate and he got the opportunity to play five ends at the Canadian men's championship.

Austman first came to public prominence in 1954 at the national schoolboy championship when he slid out of the hack and all the way down the ice, rock in hand. He placed the stone in the house as he slid past. Alarmed at what it saw, the DCA instigated a hogline rule to prevent it from ever happening again.



JUDY VEINOT

Former Canadian Curling Association president Judy Veinot of Montreal passed away on March 7, 2012, after a long struggle with Alzheimer's disease. She was 77.

Veinot was a dedicated volunteer but her primary focus was curling and her main ambition was to improve the sport at both the local and national level.

Her curling administration career was launched in 1975, when she became a member of the women's executive at the Town of Mount Royal Curling Club. She held many positions at the club and at the provincial level, including president of the Mount Royal Ladies Curling Club in 1980, president of the Quebec Ladies Curling Association in 1983 and president of the Quebec Curling Federation from 1992 to '94.

A valued member of the Town of Mount Royal Curling Club for 45 years, Veinot was the club's only female president. Elected to the CCA board in 1994, she served as president in 1998-99. She was a member of the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame and an honorary life member of the CCA.

Veinot was a founding member of the Sandra Schmirler Foundation and served as a director and treasurer.



RON MANNING

One of the best curlers in Ontario during the 1960s, Ron "Moon" Manning passed away at Toronto General Hospital on April 10, 2012.

Manning played second for Alf Phillips in 1967

when the team from Toronto's Parkway Curling Club won the Brier in Hull, Quebec. The Ontario champions finished the championship with a record of 9-1, two wins better than defending champion Ron Northcott of Alberta. A few weeks later, the Phillips team became only the second Canadian team in curling history to lose the world championship final, this time to Scotland's Chuck Hay.



TOM KROEGER

Tom Kroeger passed away at his home in Camrose, Alberta, on June 22, 2012.

At only 16 years of age, Kroeger skipped his young team from Stettler, Alberta, to the Canadian schoolboys title in

Noranda, Quebec, in 1960. Despite attempts in 1961 and '62, Kroeger failed to make it back to the national schoolboys championship. In men's curling, he made one Brier appearance, in 1971, as third for legendary skip Matt Baldwin of Edmonton. They finished with a 5-5 record.

CANADIAN CURLING HALL OF FAME

Five new members have been inducted into the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame — curlers Pat Sanders, Marvin Wirth, Ken McLean and Millard Evans and builder André Ferland

Nominations to the Hall of Fame are submitted to the hall selection committee, which annually selects inductees it feels meet the criteria in one of six categories — curler, team, builder, curler/builder, builder/media and executive honour roll.



PAT SANDERS

Curler

Born in Neepawa, Manitoba, Pat Sanders first came to prominence at the national level playing third for Victoria's Steve Skillings in 1985, when British

Columbia captured the Canadian mixed crown.

In 1987, Sanders skipped her Victoria-based team — Georgina (Hawkes) Wheatcroft, Louise Herlinveaux and Debbie Massullo — to the Scott Tournament of Hearts title, defeating Manitoba's Kathy Ellwood. Later that year, she won the world crown, defeating Germany's Andrea Schöpp in the final.

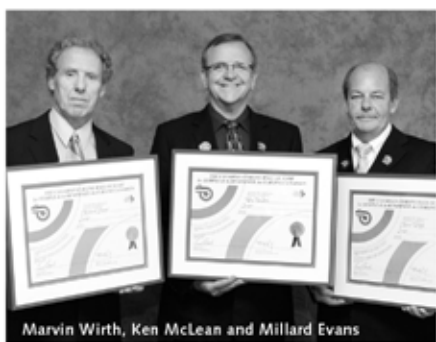
In 2008, Sanders skipped British Columbia's Cheryl Noble, Roselyn Craig and Christine Jurgenson to the Canadian senior women's title with a win over Ontario's Ann Pearson. A year later, the foursome downed Switzerland's Renate Nedkoff to capture the 2009 world senior women's gold medal.

In 2010, playing second for Jurgenson, Sanders claimed her second national seniors title with a win over New Brunswick's Heidi Hanlon, following it up with a world victory over Sweden's Ingrid Meldahl in 2011.

MARVIN WIRTH, KEN MCLEAN AND MILLARD EVANS

Curler

Alberta-based third Marvin Wirth, second Ken McLean and lead Millard Evans won three Canadian and three world senior men's championships with three different skips.

In 2005, skip Les Rogers of Edmonton led them to a defeat of Saskatchewan's Eugene Hritzuk in the Canadian senior men's final and a year later captured the world crown, defeating Brian Simonson of the United States.

In 2007, with two-time world men's champion Pat Ryan at the helm, the Albertans defeated Ontario's Bob Turcotte for the trio's second national title. They followed it up in 2008 with a win over Sweden's Per Lindeman for a second world victory.

In 2010, this time with Mark Johnson throwing skip stones, Wirth, McLean and Evans captured their third Canadian title with a win over Ontario's Gareth Parry. The Albertans would go on to secure their third global title in 2011 with a win over Geoff Goodland of the United States.

Before their seniors' success, Wirth and Evans won the 1990 Canadian mixed title as skip and second respectively.



ANDRÉ FERLAND

Builder

Born in Drummondville, Quebec, André Ferland has been both an innovator and high-profile coach in the sport of curling. He was also instrumental in

popularizing the use of the stopwatch to measure takeout and draw weight, which helped sweepers determine rock speed at release, a facet of the game that is used worldwide today.

Ferland refined what was a novel approach to the delivery of the stone: the no-lift delivery. He advanced and standardized the technique that is now used extensively at all levels of curling. The no-lift delivery is arguably the most significant change in the sport in the last 30 years, increasing the skill level of both high-performance athletes and recreational curlers.

In the early 1990s, Ferland began experimenting with an oval brush head that swiveled from the handle. This moulded, carbon-fibre brush made its debut at the 2002 Brier, leading to the birth of the Performance

Brush that dominates the curling landscape today.

Ferland coached two Quebec junior men's teams to national titles, the first skipped by Denis Marchand in 1980 and the second by Ferland's son, Michel, in 1992. In total, he has coached teams at 10 Canadian junior championships, two world juniors, two Briers, three Scotties Tournament of Hearts and was a Canadian Curling Association national team leader at five world junior championships. He has also coached France at three world men's championships and at the 2010 Olympic Winter Games.



THE DOMINION MEMBER ASSOCIATION CUP

Alberta Curling Federation president Dan Kleinschroth accepts the Dominion Member Association Cup from CCA chair Laura Lochanski. Alberta — which earned 109 points thanks to five first-place performances and three runner-up finishes — also received the Governor's Cup for making the biggest year-to-year improvement on an average points basis.

The Canadian Curling Association has created a provincial-territorial ranking system to measure member association performances at all of the national curling championships it operates and sanctions.

The system was implemented in 2010-11 by the CCA, which is made up of 14 member associations representing Canada's 10 provinces, Northern Ontario and the territories of Yukon, Northwest Territories and Nunavut.

Member associations are ranked based on their final positions in eight annual national championships — the Canadian mixed, M&M Meat Shops Canadian junior men's and women's, Scotties Tournament of Hearts, Tim Hortons Brier, Canadian senior men's and women's and Canadian wheelchair.

The program was created to generate greater interest among curling fans across the country. For years, curling enthusiasts have enjoyed regional rivalries, debating whether their province or territory was better than another. The new system adds legitimacy to a basic ranking system, which tracks how member associations perform.

Under the new system, points totals and results

are tracked and updated after each applicable Canadian championship throughout the curling season.

The 2011-12 winners were announced June 16 at the CCA's National Curling Congress in Ottawa. Based on the highest average points, the Dominion Member Association Cup, presented by TSN, was awarded to Alberta, with 109 points or an average of 13.625 per event.

Alberta's total was bolstered by five first-place performances — Heather Nedohin at the Hearts, a juniors sweep by Jocelyn Peterman and Brendan Botcher, and a seniors sweep by Cathy King and Rob Armitage.

Alberta's amazing year also included three runner-up finishes — Kurt Balderston's at the mixed, Kevin Koe's at the Brier and Bruno Yizek's at the Canadian wheelchair.

Alberta — the member association making the biggest year-to-year improvement on an average points basis — also received the Governor's Cup for an average increase over the eight events of 2.75 points year over year.

Scotty Harper Award

Paul Wiecek of the *Winnipeg Free Press* is the winner — for the second time — of the Scotty Harper Award for the year's best curling story.

Wiecek's story *'Toba's Fairytale Story Slipping Away* was chosen as the winner by the faculty of the School of Journalism and Communication at Carlton University in Ottawa.

The award is named for the late Scotty Harper, whose curling reports in the *Winnipeg Free Press* enlivened the paper for many years. Not awarded for a number of years, the award was re-introduced in 2005 with the assistance of the Canadian Curling Association.

Paul McLean Award

Len DUBYTS, the operator of the overhead robotic camera for all of TSN's Season of Champions curling broadcasts, is the 2012 winner of the Paul McLean Award.

The award was created in 2007 by the Canadian Curling Reporters, in conjunction with TSN, in memory of McLean, a TSN executive producer, and his dedication to the sport of curling. McLean passed away on December 14, 2005, at his home in Brampton, Ontario, after a two-year battle with cancer. He was 39.

The award is presented annually to a person in the

media who has made an outstanding contribution to the sport of curling from behind the scenes.

A native of Winnipeg, Dubyts has worked in television for 40 years. He joined CBC-TV's curling broadcasts as a camera operator in 1970 and added TSN to his résumé in 1998.

A self-proclaimed "gadget junkie," Dubyts says he was thrilled to be CBC's first-ever overhead camera operator when the public broadcaster added overhead shots to its curling broadcasts in 1987. This addition changed TV viewing in the sport forever; the overhead shot is essential to today's home viewer.

Now a freelance broadcast cameraman/technician, Dubyts is described by his peers as a true professional, well-liked and respected, and a genuinely great and kind person.

2012 CAPITAL ONE CANADA CUP

The first stop on the 2012-13 Season of Champions circuit is the Capital One Canada Cup, which will be held November 28 to December 2 at the new, state-of-the-art Mosaic Place in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan.

One of the most challenging events of the season, the Canada Cup features seven of the best men's and women's teams in Canada competing in a round robin, with the first-place teams earning byes to the finals, and the second and third-place teams meeting in semifinals. TSN will provide coverage of all playoff games.

Now in its 10th season, the Canada Cup this year offers a total prize package of \$140,000, with the winning teams each receiving up to \$26,000. But most importantly, the winners will qualify for the 2013 Tim Hortons Roar Of The Rings Canadian Curling Trials, which will determine Canada's two representatives at the 2014 Olympic Winter Games in Sochi, Russia.

In addition to berths in the trials — which will be contested December 1 to 8, 2013, at Winnipeg's MTS Centre — the Canada Cup

champs will also be invited to compete in the 2014 World Financial Group Continental Cup.

The 14 teams qualified for the 2012 Capital One Canada Cup — presented by The Mosaic Company — did so by winning the 2011 Canada Cup, 2012 Scotties Tournament of Hearts, 2012 Tim Hortons Brier or by their final standings on the 2011-12 Canadian Team Ranking System.

The women's field is led by 2008 world and defending Canada Cup champion Jennifer Jones of Winnipeg, reigning Scotties Tournament of Hearts winner Heather Nedohin of Edmonton, 2003 Canada Cup champion Sherry Middaugh of Coldwater, Ontario, and two-time Canada Cup winner Stefanie Lawton of Saskatoon.

The other women's teams to qualify are Crystal Webster of Calgary and Chelsea Carey and Cathy Overton-Clapham, both of Winnipeg.

The men's side includes Kevin Martin of Edmonton, defending and four-time Canada Cup winner, 2008 world and 2010 Olympic gold medallist; four-time and reigning world champion and 2010 Canada Cup winner Glenn Howard of Coldwater, Ontario; 2006 Olympic gold medallist Brad Gushue of St. John's, Newfoundland and Labrador; two-time world champion Jeff Stoughton of Winnipeg and Edmonton's Kevin Koe, winner of the 2008 Canada Cup and 2010 world championship.

Rounding out the field are Toronto's John Epping and Mike McEwen of Winnipeg.

In January 2011, the Canadian Curling Association announced its qualification process for the 2014 Olympic Winter Games.

Eight men's and eight women's teams will compete in the 2013 Tim Hortons Roar Of The Rings Canadian Curling Trials to determine Canada's two Olympic representatives. Round-robin preliminaries, followed by three-team playoffs, will take place in Winnipeg at the MTS Centre December 1 to 8, 2013.

Six teams of each gender will qualify directly into the trials, while the final two berths for each will emerge from a pre-trials competition.

The eight teams for each gender will be determined as follows:

- 2011 Capital One Canada Cup champions Jennifer Jones and Kevin Martin
- 2011-12 CTRS leaders Heather Nedohin and Glenn Howard
- Winner of the 2012 Capital One Canada Cup
- CTRS leader of 2012-13
- CTRS leader of 2011-13 (two-year total)
- CTRS leader of 2011-13 (two-year total)
- Capital One Road To The Roar pre-trials qualifier 1
- Capital One Road To The Roar pre-trials qualifier 2

The 2013 Capital One Road To The Roar pre-trials, to be held November 5 to 10 at the Kitchener Memorial Auditorium, will include 12 men's and 12 women's teams competing in a triple knockout. Four teams of each gender will advance to a modified Page playoff, with two men's and two women's teams qualifying for the trials.

The 12 teams for each gender will qualify from the CTRS as follows:

- The top four teams from the 2010-11 season
- The top four teams from the 2011-12 season
- The top two teams from the 2012-13 season
- The final two teams will earn invitations based on their two-year CTRS points (2011-13)

Teams already qualified for the trials or pre-trials will be replaced by the next-highest-ranking team on the CTRS. Details will be posted on the CCA's website at www.curling.ca.

2011-12 AGM IN BRIEF...

Another curling season completed and another highly productive year for the Canadian Curling Association.

That was the assessment of the past year from Canada's governing body at its Annual General Meeting held in Ottawa in June.

"Our sport has so many success stories from the past year, so it was rewarding for us to provide updates to the membership as well as celebrate accomplishments, including the CCA's Hall of Fame luncheon — the organization's latest initiative," said Greg Stremelaw, the CCA's chief executive officer.

For a fifth consecutive year, the CCA finished the fiscal year in the black and with a positive financial outlook. The surplus for 2011-12 was \$227,508.

The Curling Assistance Program received another significant boost with the CCA's board of governors allocating \$250,000 for this coming year. This funding targets projects designed to develop the sport of curling at the community level and to assist capital projects critical to the operation and health of the CCA's members. The 2012-13 Curling Assistance Program and application details for the CCA's affiliated curling centres is available on the CCA's website.

Two years ago, the CCA created a provincial/territorial ranking system to measure member association performances at all national curling championships operated and sanctioned by the CCA beginning in 2010-11. Based on the highest average points, this year's Dominion Member Association Cup, presented by TSN, was awarded to Alberta. In addition, Alberta — the member association making the biggest year-to-year improvement on an average point basis — also received the Governors' Cup.

Earlier this year, the CCA announced its newest Canadian Curling Hall of Fame inductees — Pat Sanders, Millard Evans, Marvin Wirth, Ken McLean and André Ferland — and all five were on hand to be officially honoured at the inaugural Hall of Fame Induction luncheon.

In other news:

- The equitable opportunity to access the CCA's national championships approved at the 2010 AGM for application at the 2012 Canadian mixed and Canadian seniors has been expanded to include the Scotties Tournament of Hearts and Tim Hortons Brier, starting in 2015. Team

Canada — the 2014 Brier winner — will join the Brier field, and a team from Northern Ontario will be added to the Hearts, both beginning in 2015.

- A new CCA rulebook was approved and will be in effect for the next two years. The major change is in game timing. Beginning this season, the CCA will incorporate "thinking time" for all of its championships. This is the reverse of the traditional approach, which gave each team 73 minutes of game playing time, with the clock running from the time the opponent's stones come to rest until the playing side's stone stops.

The new approach marks the time it takes to put a stone in play — thinking time — versus the time a team actually takes to play a shot. This gives each team 40 minutes of "thinking time" to play a 10-end game, plus five minutes for each extra end.

- Also approved was the addition of a new event — a Canadian mixed doubles championship — that will make its debut March 14 to 17, 2013, in Leduc, Alberta. The championship won't be subject to the residency rule applied to other championships. Competition details are available at www.curling.ca/championships/mixeddoubles.

- The membership voted in favour of increasing the number of teams participating in the Canadian juniors from 12 to 14 (one team representing each member association) for the 2012-13 season. This means there will be no qualifying round. Competition details are available at www.curling.ca/championships/juniors.

Ron Hutton of Saint John, New Brunswick, was elected association chair for 2012-13 and Hugh Avery of Halifax, vice-chair.

Having completed their tenures, Regina's Bernadette McIntyre and Winnipeg's Mitch Tarapasky retired from the board.

Newcomers include Yves Maillet of Riverview, New Brunswick, and Shirley Osborne of Halifax. Jim Mann of Richmond, British Columbia, was elected to the board to replace Jim Campbell, who resigned in February.

The 2012-13 AGM will be held in Ottawa on Saturday, June 15, 2013.
