DePaul, Marquette Co-Favorites To Win BIG EAST Women's Basketball Title

Blue Demons And Golden Eagles Tied Atop The Regular-Season Standings In 2017-18 And Have Squared Off In The Last Two Big East Title Games

Coming off a shared regular-season title, DePaul and Marquette are predicted to once again finish atop the BIG EAST women's basketball standings in 2018-19, based on a vote by the league's head coaches. The BIG EAST Preseason Coaches' Poll, unveiled at Media Day on Thursday, saw the Blue Demons and Golden Eagles with five first-place votes and 77 points apiece, while fellow 2018 NCAA Tournament teams Villanova and Creighton were slotted third and fourth, respectively. Coaches were not allowed to vote for their own teams.

The Wildcats edged the Bluejays for third place by just four points, with VU collecting 57 points to CU's 53. Even tighter, Creighton squeaked by Georgetown which rounded out the top five with 52 points. Coming off a trip to the WNIT Quarterfinals, St. John's was selected sixth with 48 points, followed by Butler in seventh with 34 and Seton Hall in eighth with 23. Providence (ninth, 17 points) and Xavier (10th, 12 points) rounded out the poll.

DePaul claimed at least a share of its fifth consecutive BIG EAST regular-season title in 2017-18 after finishing 15-3, and won its third BIG EAST Tournament crown in March. The Blue Demons, who went 27-8 overall, earned their 16th straight NCAA Tournament berth and were a No. 5 seed, their highest since 2011. DePaul finished with the nation's sixth-highest scoring offense, averaging nearly 83 points per game, and posted the BIG EAST Tournament's highest average margin of victory since 2009. The Blue Demons return four starters and seven letterwinners from 2017-18, including their top two scorers in Mart'e Grays (14.4 points per game) and Ashton Millender (13.6 PPG).

Following a 15-3 league finish, Marquette won a share of its first BIG EAST regular-season title and advanced to the BIG EAST Tournament Final for a second consecutive season. The Golden Eagles, who went 24-10 overall, have had their most wins in any two-year span in program history (49) and earned an NCAA Tournament berth for the second consecutive year, marking the first time since 1999-2000 they've made back-to-back trips to the Big Dance. MU is the lone team to return all five starters from a year ago – a squad which averaged a league-high 80.1 points per game over 18 conference contests. Highlighting the group of returners is reigning BIG EAST

Player of the Year Allazia Blockton. The rising senior guard led the BIG EAST in scoring both overall and in league play, averaging just over 19 points per contest.

Villanova finished the regular season in third place in the BIG EAST standings and earned its first NCAA Tournament at-large selection since 2013. The Wildcats, who return a trio of starters from 2017-18, including reigning BIG EAST Sixth Woman of the Year Mary Gedaka, went 23-9 overall and posted the nation's second-fewest turnovers at just 9.7 per contest. After winning its first 10 games, Villanova cracked the Associated Press Top 25 for the first time since 2004-05.

Rounding out the list of four BIG EAST teams to make the 2018 NCAA Tournament, Creighton was announced as one of the final eight teams under consideration for the Big Dance the night prior to Selection Monday.

The Bluejays were the final team announced

in the field, marking their first back-to-back NCAA appearances since 2012-13. Creighton upset No. 6 Iowa in the First Round before falling to No. 3 UCLA to finish the year 19-13. The Bluejays finished fourth in the BIG EAST at 11-7 and return a trio of starters from that squad, including their top two scorers in Audrey Faber (14.8 PPG) and Jaylyn Agnew (14.5 PPG).

In its first season under the direction of head coach James Howard, Georgetown advanced to its first BIG EAST Tournament Semifinal in 18 years, while qualifying for the WNIT for a third consecutive season. The Hoyas went 16-16 overall and 9-9 in BIG EAST play, and return two starters, highlighted by 2018 BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year Dionna White. Also of note, Dorothy Adomako, a three-time All-BIG EAST selection who missed all of last season, is slated to return to the court in 2018-19.

St. John's qualified for the national postseason for an 11th consecutive year and advanced to the WNIT Quarterfinals. The Red Storm finished the season 19-15 overall, 9-9 in BIG EAST play, and return four of their top-five scorers from that squad, including reigning BIG EAST Freshman of the Year Qadashah Hoppie. Since conference realignment, St. John's has finished no lower than fifth in the BIG EAST standings, earning a BIG EAST Tournament First Round by every season.

Butler won a BIG EAST Tournament game for a third consecutive year in 2018, but the Bulldogs aim to avoid the First Round by finishing in the top six in 2019. Butler returns four starters this season, including its top three scorers – Whitney Jennings (16.8 PPG), Tori Schickel (16.4 PPG) and Kristen Spolyar (11.6 PPG) – while also adding a pair of key transfers in Ashanti Thomas (Penn State) and Katherine Strong (VCU). The Bulldogs went 15-17 overall, 6-12 in BIG EAST play last year.

Wintrust Arena – Home Of The BIG EAST Women's Basketball Tournament

Wintrust Arena Is Part Of A Plan To Transform The Surrounding Neighborhood Into A Vibrant Entertainment District

The BIG EAST Women's Basketball Tournament presented by Jeep was held at the brand new Wintrust Arena, located in downtown Chicago, in March 2018. The BIG EAST agreed to a three-year deal with Wintrust Arena, keeping the Women's Basketball Tournament in the Windy City through at least 2020.

From the renowned architects at Pelli Clark Pelli and Moody Nolan, Wintrust Arena is part of a redevelopment plan to transform the surrounding neighborhood into a vibrant entertainment district. The building's design is contemporary, but it grows from a study of the adjacent neighborhoods. The

arena's main entrance is located on the site's most public spot, at the corner of prominent streets Cermak and Indiana. The building's many transparent façades help to create an architecture of experience in which the activity energy and excitement of the arena is felt around the site on the street.

For the sixth consecutive year, FS1 and FS2 will provide coverage of the BIG EAST Women's Basketball Tournament, with this season's event returning to Wintrust Arena in Chicago for a second consecutive year. FS2 will air the quarterfinal round on March 10,

with games set for 1, 3:30, 7 and 9:30 p.m. (ET). FS1 picks up the remainder of the tournament, with the semifinals on March 11 slated for 4 and 6:30 p.m., and the championship game set to tip off at 8 p.m. on March 12. The BIG EAST Digital Network will live stream both first round games on March 9, with tip times not yet determined.

Marquette's Blockton Unanimously Selected As BIG EAST Women's Basketball Preseason Player of the Year

Reigning Big East Women's Basketball Player Of The Year Allazia Blockton Is The Uncontested Pick To Repeat As The League's Top Player

Marquette senior guard Allazia Blockton was unanimously selected as the 2018-19 BIG EAST Preseason Player of the Year, as announced by the Conference on Thursday. The reigning BIG EAST Player of the Year was unanimously selected by a vote of the league's head coaches who were not allowed to vote for their own players. St. John's newcomer Kadaja Bailey was selected BIG EAST Preseason Freshman of the Year, the first Red Storm player to garner the honor since 1988.

Blockton was one of four Marquette players to collect awards on Thursday, as classmates Erika Davenport, Natisha Hiedeman and Amani Wilborn were all selected to the Preseason All-BIG EAST Team. A total of 11 players were selected to the preseason squad. The Golden Eagles were one of three teams with multiple Preseason All-BIG EAST picks, along with fellow BIG EAST preseason favorite DePaul (two) and Creighton (two). Butler, Georgetown, Providence and Villanova each had one student-athlete selected.

Blockton was named BIG EAST Player of the Year and Scholar-Athlete of the Year in March as she led the Golden Eagles and BIG EAST Conference with 19.1 points per game, breaking a long-standing Marquette record for points scored in a single season with 648. Blockton will enter her final year sitting at No. 3 all-time on the MU scoring list with 1,774 career points and looks poised to become the Golden Eagles' all-time leading scorer, surpassing 1,940 points. She is 80 league points shy of cracking the BIG EAST's top-20 scoring list, while her career average in BIG EAST play of 18.4 per game would rank 15th in conference history. The Milwaukee, Wisconsin native is the first player in MU program history to earn All-America status in consecutive seasons following back-to-back WBCA honorable mention certificates.

St. John's only other Preseason Freshman of the Year came when Cozette Ballentine was honored in 1988. Bailey is a four-star guard out of Long Beach, N.Y. She attended high school at St. Mary's in Manhasset, N.Y., where she averaged 28.6 points and 5.0 rebounds per game as a senior. Bailey, a 6-0 guard, is ranked 91st overall by ESPN and is the No. 12 guard in the Class of 2018.

Davenport garnered All-BIG EAST Second Team honors in 2017-18, averaging just shy of a double-double (12.1 PPG, 9.3 RPG) thanks to the fourth-best field goal percentage in the BIG EAST at a .523 clip. Wilborn earned All-BIG EAST Honorable Mention accolades last year and once again posted some of her best performances of the season at the BIG EAST Tournament. The All-Tournament Team selection averaged 18 points over the three-game stretch. Hiedeman finished second on the team overall in scoring, averaging 13.4 points over 33 games. She

posted seven 20-point games on the year, including a 32-point outing in Marquette's NCAA Tournament First Round win.

DePaul junior guard Kelly Campbell and senior forward Mart'e Grays were both Preseason All-BIG EAST Team unanimous selections. Campbell and Grays were All-BIG EAST First Team honorees in 2017-18, leading the Blue Demons to at least a share of a fifth-straight regular-season title and its third BIG EAST Tournament crown. Campbell is one of the top all-around players in the BIG EAST as the guard finished first in the league in assists (6.2) and assist-turnover ratio (4.1), and second in rebounding (10.3), while being among the leaders in scoring (10.3) and three-point shooting (.400). She recorded the lone triple-double in the BIG EAST last season. Grays led DePaul in scoring, both overall (14.4) and in BIG EAST play (15.2), totaling five 20-point games and two double-doubles.

Creighton's Jaylyn Agnew and Audrey Faber each garnered All-BIG EAST Second Team honors in 2017-18 after finishing first and second on their team in scoring. Agnew averaged 12.9 per game to finish 10th in the BIG EAST, while posting the second-highest blocks per game average at 1.2. Agnew was unanimously selected to the preseason squad. Faber had seven 20-point games and two 30-point games, matching Blockton for the single-game high in the BIG EAST last season with a 34-point outing at Drake.

Villanova's Mary Gedaka was named BIG EAST Sixth Woman of the Year this past March. Gedaka came off the bench in all but one game yet ranked second on the squad in scoring at 11.6 per game, including 12.4 in 18 BIG EAST contests. She's led the Wildcats in scoring seven times and is Villanova's top returning scorer.

Reigning BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year Dionna White sparked Georgetown to its first BIG EAST Tournament Semifinal appearance in 18 years and a return to the WNIT for a third consecutive season. The rising senior guard finish among the national leaders in steals in 2017-18, and was voted to the All-BIG EAST First Team after finishing as the conference's No. 2 scorer at 19.1 points per game.

She is a Preseason All-BIG EAST selection for a third consecutive season.

Butler's Tori Schickel is on the cusp of cracking the BIG EAST's all-time rebounds list as she is just 35 boards shy of the top-20 ledger. The senior

forward/center was an All-BIG EAST First Team pick as a junior last year, averaging 16.4 points, 8.6 rebounds and a league-high 1.3 blocks per contest. Her 11 double-doubles ranked third in the BIG EAST and are the most by a 2018-19 returner. Schickel was a unanimous Preseason All-BIG EAST pick.

Providence's Jovana Nogic earns Preseason All-BIG EAST accolades for a second consecutive year. The senior guard totaled 11 20-point games last season, tied for third most in the league, and posted the nation's No. 2 free-throw average as Nogic made 86-of-91 from the charity stripe for a .945 clip. She was dangerous from far as well, knocking down 41 percent of her attempts from deep for 2.81 triples per game.

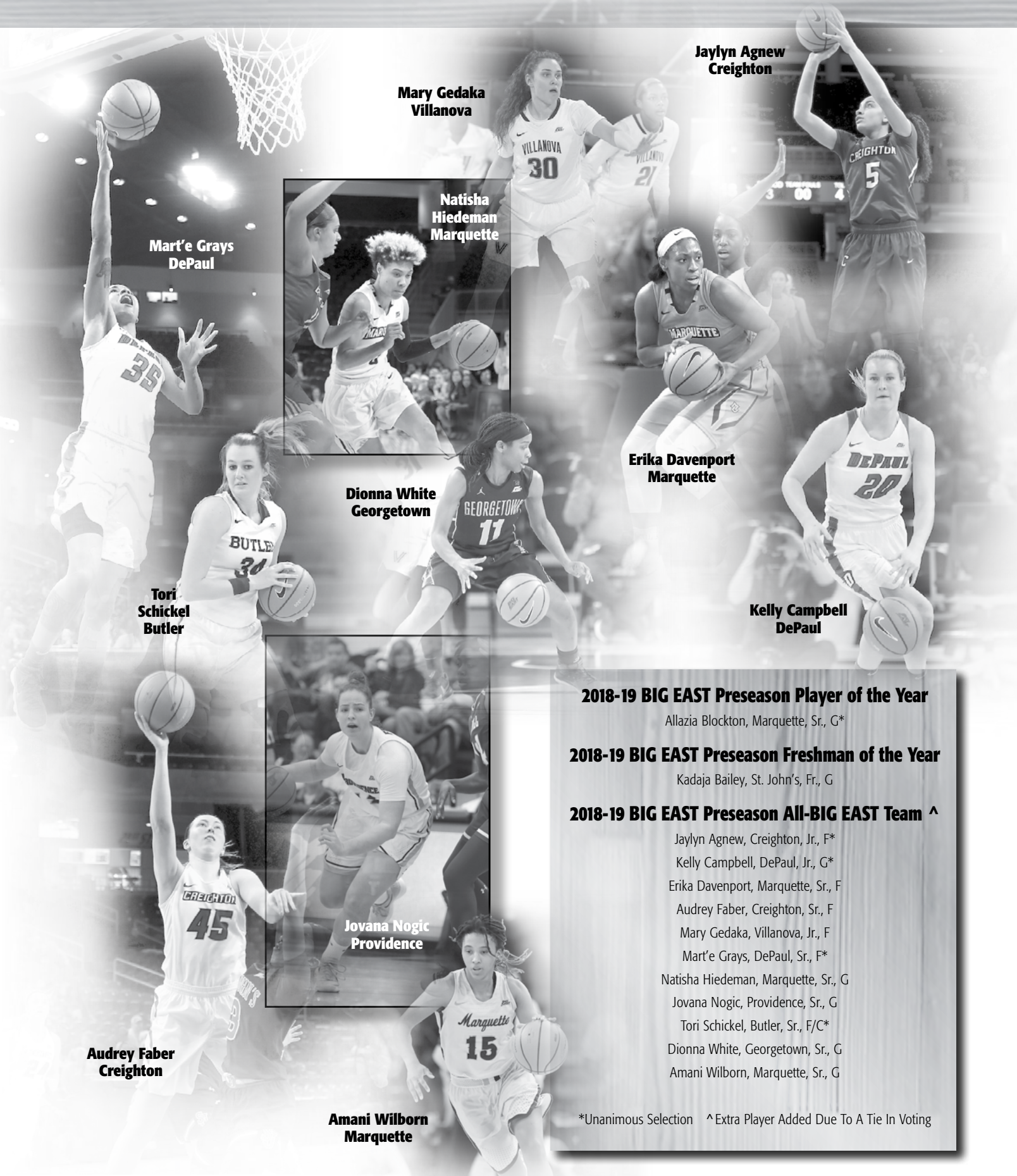

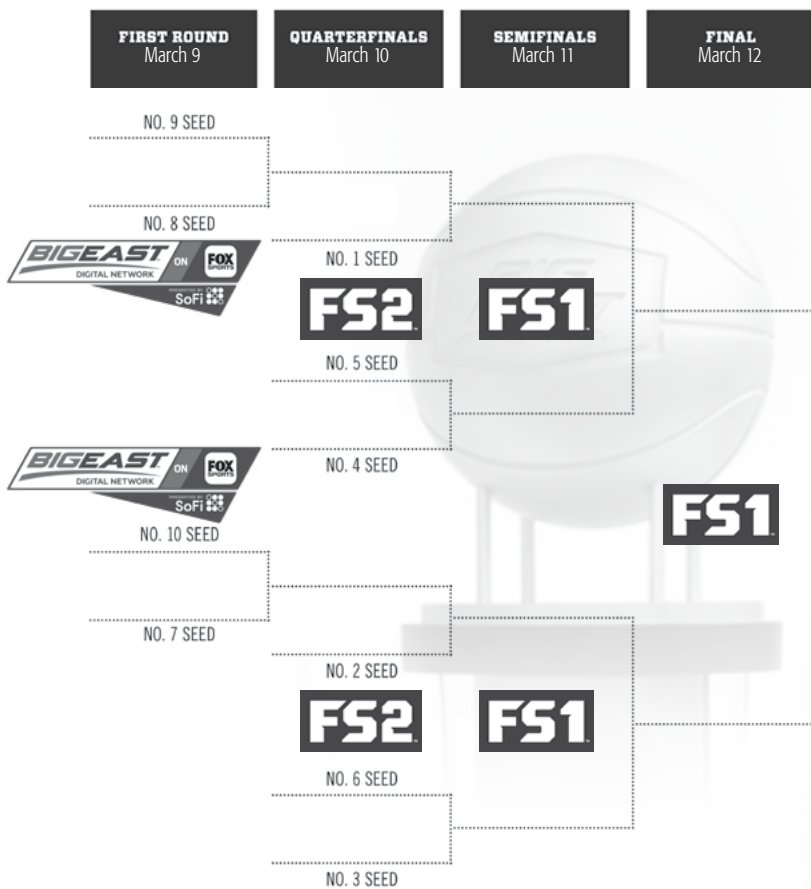

The BIG EAST Conference 2018-19 women's basketball schedule, announced on Monday, tips off Nov. 6-9 for all 10 teams. Conference play will begin on Dec. 29, with all teams playing at least one BIG EAST game prior to the New Year. FS1 and FS2 will air a total of 22 games, including the quarterfinal, semifinal and championship games of the BIG EAST Tournament, March 9-12.

All 10 BIG EAST teams will appear on at least two nationally televised games during regular-season play across the FOX Sports family of networks, while an additional two games will be featured on CBS Sports Network (CBSSN). For the fourth straight year, the BIG EAST Digital Network (BEDN) will air all women's basketball games during conference play that are not scheduled for a television broadcast, for a total of 74 tilts.

For the sixth consecutive year, FS1 and FS2 will provide coverage of the BIG EAST Women's Basketball Tournament, with this season's event returning to Wintrust Arena in Chicago for a second consecutive year. FS2 will air the quarterfinal round on March 10, with games set for 1, 3:30, 7 and 9:30 p.m. (ET). FS1 picks up the remainder of the tournament, with the semifinals on March 11 slated for 4 and 6:30 p.m., and the championship game set to tip off at 8 p.m. on March 12. The BIG

EAST Digital Network will live stream both first round games on March 9, with tip times not yet determined.

Through the first five seasons as a 10-team league, eight different programs have received bids into the national postseason, including four squads earning NCAA Tournament berths in 2018, the most since reconfiguration. The BIG EAST has combined for 14 NCAA berths over the last five seasons, with all four invitees in 2018 advancing to the second round. Eighteen teams have qualified for the WNIT since realignment, including St. John's in 2018, when the Red Storm marched on to the quarterfinal round. Six teams carry multi-year national postseason streaks into the 2018-19 season led by DePaul's 19-year postseason run, which includes 16 consecutive NCAA appearances, along with St. John's (11 years), Creighton (11 years), Villanova (seven years) and Georgetown (three years). Marquette joined the pack this year after claiming its second consecutive NCAA berth for its first back-to-back trips to the big dance since 1999 and 2000.

The Conference is in the sixth year of its multi-year contract with FOX Sports, which has exclusive television rights to all BIG EAST competitions. The lone non-conference game on the television lineup is Marquette's date with the reigning national champions, Notre

Dame. The two former league foes, who battled into overtime last season, will tip off at the Al McGuire Center on Dec. 22 at 1:30 p.m. (ET) on FS1.

Conference play tips off on FS2 when Villanova, which is coming off its first trip to the NCAA Tournament since 2013, hosts Butler on Dec. 29 at 8 p.m. ET. The Bulldogs and Wildcats each boast three nationally televised games this season, along with Butler's opponent on Jan. 6, St. John's. The Red Storm make their season television debut against the Bulldogs on FS2 at 1 p.m.

What has become a marquee BIG EAST rivalry, DePaul travels to Marquette on Jan. 4, in a rematch of the last two BIG EAST Tournament title games. The contest will air on FS1 at 8 p.m. ET. The two teams shared the 2017-18 regular-season title, while the Blue Demons won their third tournament crown this past March after the Golden Eagles claimed their first BIG EAST Championship in 2017. Scoring will be on display when the two nearby foes meet, as each team is averaging roughly 90 points per game in each of their last six regular-season meetings.

Coming off a second-straight NCAA Tournament appearance, Creighton makes its national television debut on Jan. 6 at 2 p.m. when it hosts

Georgetown on CBS Sports Network. CBSSN has two BIG EAST matchups this season, with the second coming in South Orange, N.J., on Feb. 17 at noon, when Seton Hall hosts Marquette.

The Pirates welcome longtime foe Providence to Walsh Gym on Jan. 13 for the Friars' first TV game of the season, set for 1 p.m. on FS2. Creighton returns to the lineup for its second of five television games, as the Bluejays host Butler on FS1 on Jan. 20 at 3 p.m. Xavier gets its first TV exposure on Jan. 27 on FS2 when it hosts DePaul at 2 p.m. The Musketeers also face the Friars on FS2, with the game set for Feb. 15 at 7 p.m. in Cincinnati. FS1 takes over for the next two contests, with Villanova hosting Creighton on Feb. 3 (2 p.m.), and Marquette welcome Georgetown on Feb. 8 (8 p.m.). The Bluejays return to FS2 on Feb. 10, when Seton Hall travels to Omaha for a 2 p.m. tilt. The Wildcats' TV slate concludes at Xavier on March 1 (7 p.m., FS2).

FS2 will cover a BIG EAST women's basketball game at Madison Square Garden for the first time, as St. John's returns to the World's Most Famous Arena for a league contest for the second time in three years. The Red Storm will host DePaul in Midtown Manhattan on Feb. 17 at 1 p.m. St. John's returns to FS2 the following week when it travels to Georgetown on Feb. 24 at 2 p.m.

After the first five years in its current configuration of 10 outstanding and respected academic institutions, the BIG EAST Conference has continued its position as one of the nation's exceptional Conferences and a leader in collegiate athletics.

In the arena and on the playing fields, the BIG EAST's consortium of 10 schools has produced 11 national champions over the past five academic years. Six BIG EAST teams, including two in men's basketball, have captured national titles. BIG EAST student-athletes also have won national championships in five individual events.

In the classroom, 66 BIG EAST athletic programs were recognized in 2017-18 by the NCAA with Public Recognition Awards for outstanding academic achievement in the previous academic year. The BIG EAST ranked third nationally among conferences in percentage of recognized teams with 41.8 percent behind only the Ivy League and Patriot League. By percentage, Villanova led all schools nationally with 82 percent of its squads receiving recognition. BIG EAST schools also produced 15 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans.

In 2013, the BIG EAST began a new era by returning to its basketball-centric heritage. The league's 10 member schools—Butler University, Creighton University, DePaul University, Georgetown University, Marquette University,



Providence College, St. John's University, Seton Hall University, Villanova University, and Xavier University—adhere to an unwavering commitment to academic integrity, athletic excellence and community service.

Val Ackerman, who previously served as founding President of the WNBA, President of USA Basketball and U.S. representative to the International Basketball Federation (FIBA), was named fifth Commissioner

of the BIG EAST in conjunction with new alignment in 2013. Under her leadership, the BIG EAST has maintained its reputation for athletic achievement at the highest level and has continued to be influential on the national intercollegiate landscape, with numerous conference and campus administrators currently serving on important NCAA committees.

Ackerman is one of the few sports executives who has held leadership positions in both men's and women's sports at the collegiate, professional, national team and international level.

Founded by Dave Gavitt in 1979, the BIG EAST has been lauded as a leader in innovative concepts in promotion, particularly

television, and that reputation continues with the conference's relationship with FOX Sports. The BIG EAST has enjoyed a successful multi-year partnership with FOX Sports and its national cable network FS1. FOX's comprehensive coverage of BIG EAST men's basketball includes the broadcast of all regular-season games on FOX, FS1, FS2 or FOX Regional Networks, as well as the BIG EAST Tournament at Madison Square Garden, college basketball's longest-running postseason conference tourney held at the same venue.

BIG EAST institutions are located in seven of the nation's 36 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Indianapolis, Milwaukee and Cincinnati.

FOX Sports platforms carry complete coverage of women's basketball regular-season play and the BIG EAST Women's Basketball Tournament. Every Olympic sport championship is also carried on a network or digital platform.

The BIG EAST has also increased the visibility of its member school programs with the BIG EAST Digital Network (BEDN). When the conference launched BEDN in 2014-15, the league became the first collegiate conference to be hosted on the FOX Sports mobile platform, FOX Sports App, the app that provides live streaming of FOX Sports content. For the third straight year, BEDN will air 225 live events with an emphasis on women's basketball, soccer and Olympic sport regular-season and championship events.

The BIG EAST Conference became a reality in May of 1979 through the vision of Gavitt, the former Providence men's basketball coach and athletic director. Providence, St. John's, Georgetown, Syracuse, Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College formed the original seven-school alliance, and within the span of just a few years the conference had become a national power in men's basketball. While the composition of the BIG EAST evolved over the next three decades, the focus of its schools did not change, reflecting a tradition of broad-based programs that emphasize academic strength and fair play.

In December of 2012, DePaul, Georgetown, Marquette, Providence, St. John's, Seton Hall and Villanova, announced their intention to separate from the conference's FBS football-playing schools and form an independent association. The seven schools reached an agreement to retain the BIG EAST name and assume the conference's long-term pact with Madison Square Garden to host the BIG EAST Men's Basketball Tournament, one of the premier events in college sports. The schools also announced the addition of three distinguished institutions sharing the same academic and athletic values —Butler, Creighton and Xavier— and forged a landmark, long-term broadcast partnership with FOX Sports. The BIG EAST moved its headquarters from its original location in Providence, R.I., to midtown Manhattan in New York City to complete the transformation. The BIG EAST's new era

officially began on July 1, 2013.

To complement its athletic successes, the conference launched BIG EAST Serves in 2014 to align with the service missions of the member institutions. Initiatives housed under the BIG EAST Serves umbrella, the BIG EAST Career Consortium and the national partnership with the It's On Us campaign against campus sexual assaults, reflect the conference's commitment to developing the complete BIG EAST student-athlete and making a positive contribution to the campus communities and the conference's headquarters in New York. In 2017, the BIG EAST hosted a Mental Health Summit to help provide institutional personnel with information, insights and basic training so they

can better support the mental health of their student-athletes. That effort continued with the Well Being Forum in 2018.

The BIG EAST and Commissioner Ackerman have taken a leadership role in Sport at the Service of Humanity, an initiative created by the Vatican's Pontifical Council for Culture to focus on how sport and faith can drive positive social change through six principles – joy, compassion, respect, enlightenment, love and balance.

Ackerman was a delegate at the inaugural Vatican conference and has served on an advisory committee to develop the framework and content for the initiative as well as several regional follow-up events.

The BIG EAST hosts Freshmen Fundamentals, a unique program designed to assist men's basketball student-athletes in the transition from high school to college and the elite level of BIG EAST basketball. The league hosts Transition Game for women's basketball,

which assists women's basketball student-athletes in the transition from college player to emerging professional on and off the court.

BIG EAST institutions boast high graduation rates for their student-athletes, and the league has always been able to boast that many of its best athletes are also its best students.

In 2018, for the first time in league history, the individual BIG EAST Men's and Women's Basketball Scholar-Athlete Award winners also were named BIG EAST Players of the Year. Jalen Brunson of Villanova and Allazia Blockton of Marquette were the honorees.

Track and cross country standouts Catarina Braz-Rocha of Providence and Siofra Clerigh Buttner of Villanova were the BIG EAST nominees for the NCAA Woman of the Year Award.

The conference, which crowns champions in 22 sports, had league teams earn a total of 35 NCAA berths and 28 individual NCAA invitations in 2017-18. Nine different national postseason championships saw multiple BIG EAST teams participate, including six teams in men's basketball and a record four squads in women's basketball. Each women's hoops team won its NCAA first-round game. In men's basketball, the BIG EAST has earned 28 NCAA invitations in the five years of the current 10-team alignment.

Current BIG EAST men's basketball programs have enjoyed extraordinary success through the years. Villanova has won three NCAA Championships, in 2018, 2016 and 1985. Georgetown and Marquette also have won the national title. DePaul, Providence, St. John's and Seton Hall have all made the Final Four. The BIG EAST placed three men's basketball teams in the Final Four in 1985—Georgetown, St. John's and Villanova—the only time this has occurred in NCAA history. Over the past 15 years, Butler, Georgetown, Marquette and Villanova have reached the Final Four, with Villanova making three trips and Butler two. Xavier has advanced to the Elite Eight three times and the Sweet 16 four other times.

BIG EAST student-athletes have achieved recent success in other sports as well. A BIG EAST team has won the NCAA women's cross country championship four of the last nine years (Villanova twice, Providence and Georgetown once), with one runner-up finish (Providence). Creighton men's soccer has advanced to the NCAA College Cup twice in the last six seasons, with the Providence men advancing to the College Cup in 2014. Georgetown's women's soccer team reached the College Cup in 2016. Connecticut, an associate member in field hockey, has won three national championships in five years. Denver, as associate member in men's lacrosse, won the NCAA crown in 2015.

In the 39 years since the original league opened its doors, BIG EAST teams have won 41 national championships in eight different sports with 145 student-athletes winning individual national titles in the league's history.



Commissioner Val Ackerman

Val Ackerman was named the fifth Commissioner of the Big East Conference on June 26, 2013. She was the founding President of the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA) and a past President of USA Basketball, which oversees the U.S. men's and women's Olympic basketball program. She has had a long and accomplished career in the sports industry and is one of the few sports executives who has held leadership positions in both men's and women's sports at the collegiate, professional, national team and international levels.

In 2016, Val was recognized by Sports Business Journal as one of the 50 most influential people in the sports business and received the Women's Sports Foundation's Billie Jean King Contribution Award for significant contributions to the development and advancement of women's sports.

Val attended the University of Virginia as one of the school's first female student-athlete scholarship recipients. She was a four-year starter, three-time captain and two-time Academic All-American for the Cavaliers' women's basketball team and the first 1,000-point scorer in the program's history. She graduated with high distinction with a degree in political and social thought in 1981 and played one year of professional basketball in France before earning a law degree from UCLA in 1985.

Val started her legal career as a corporate and banking associate at the New York law firm of Simpson Thacher & Bartlett and joined the National Basketball Association as a staff attorney in 1988. She was as an executive at the NBA for eight years, serving as Special Assistant to NBA Commissioner David Stern and Director (and later) Vice President of Business Affairs before being named the WNBA's first President in 1996. She guided the league to a much-heralded launch in 1997 and headed its day-to-day operations for its first eight seasons.

In 2005, Val was elected President of USA Basketball for the 2005-08 term, leading the organization to an overall competitive record of 222-23 and gold medal performances by the U.S. men's and women's basketball teams at the 2008 Olympics in Beijing. She was one of the NBA's original appointees to the USA Basketball Board of Directors in 1989 and served as an organizational liaison with USAB during the early

years of NBA participation in FIBA competitions, including the 1992 and 1996 Olympics and 1994 World Championships. A USA Basketball Board member for 23 years, Val played a key role in the long-standing success of the U.S. women's national basketball team program, which won gold medals at the 1998, 2002 and 2010 FIBA World Championships and the 1996, 2000, 2004, 2008 and 2012 Olympic Games. In 2013, Val was named the recipient of USA Basketball's Edward S. Steitz Award, which recognizes outstanding contributions in international

which she prepared a comprehensive white paper in 2013 on growth strategies for women's college basketball. She also worked as a freelance columnist for espnw.com, where she authored a series of articles on the subject of women and sports and participated as a member of the

basketball.

Val also served two terms (2006-10 and 2010-2014) as the U.S. representative for men's and women's basketball on the Central Board of the International Basketball Federation (FIBA), the sport's world governing body. She was a member of FIBA's Competition Commission and served on the Central Board of FIBA Americas, FIBA's zone authority for North, Central and South America.

Val is a member of the Board of Directors for the U.S. Soccer Federation and the NCAA Men's Basketball Oversight Committee. She is also a member of the Board of Directors of the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame, which inducted her as a contributor in 2011, and is a Lifetime Trustee of the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame, which presented her with the John Bunn Lifetime Achievement Award in 2008.

She has done consulting work for the National Hockey League, which she assisted in formulating a long-term plan to support women's ice hockey, and the NCAA, for

espnw Advisory Board.

Val's accomplishments in the sports business have earned her numerous awards, including the University of Virginia's Distinguished Alumna Award; the March of Dimes Sports Achievement Award; induction into the GTE Academic All-America Hall of Fame; the Girls Scouts of America National Women of Distinction Juliette Award; the NOW Legal Defense and Education Fund Equal Opportunity Award; inclusion on the Atlantic Coast Conference's 50th Anniversary Women's Basketball team; induction into the International Scholar-Athlete Hall of Fame; the Women's Basketball Coaches Association President's Citation; the NCAA Silver Anniversary Award; the International Olympic Committee Women and Sport Achievement Diploma; the Sports Business Journal Champions in Sports Business Award; inclusion as a Women's Sports Foundation/espnw 40 for 40 Honoree; induction into the National Consortium for Academics and Sports Hall of Fame; the Women in Sports and Events (WISE) 20th Anniversary Women of Distinction Award; the Arthur Ashe Institute for Urban Health Sports Ball Award; the Marquette School of Law Master of the Game Award; and the Emily Couric Leadership Award.

Val is married to Charlie Rappaport, a retired tax partner of Simpson Thacher & Bartlett. They have two daughters, Emily (a 2014 graduate of Yale) and Sally (a 2017 graduate of Wesleyan).



BIG EAST Digital Network Expands

In its fifth year as the BIG EAST's branded channel on FOX Sports GO, the BIG EAST Digital Network (BEDN) will continue to broadcast 225 live events for the 2018-19 season. Highlighted BEDN programming will include all women's basketball conference games not slated for television broadcasts, 36 Championship events and extensive coverage of men's and women's soccer league games.

After a successful pilot year in 2014-15, BEDN expanded in 2015-16 to cover 225 events that season. BEDN will continue to supplement scheduled television coverage of all BIG EAST sports, while broadening exposure of

The BIG EAST women's basketball events and the Olympic sports contests that are not televised by FOX Sports do not require a video subscription.

Select content will also be available on bigeast.com, including historical BIG EAST games on demand, highlight footage, and original programming to be unveiled at a later date. Specific dates and additional details of featured match-ups, including regular season games and championship contests, will be released as game schedules are finalized.

The broadcast schedule for 2018-19 will be announced when the conference schedules are finalized at a later date.

The complete breakdown of the 2018-19 BEDN Programming Plan includes 74 women's basketball, 35 men's soccer, 35 women's soccer, 15 volleyball, 10 baseball, 10 softball and six lacrosse games. As was the case in 2014-15 and 2015-16, 2016-2017, and 2017-2018, BEDN will cover all BIG EAST Championships, with 36 events in the upcoming year.

When the BIG EAST launched the Digital Network in 2014-15, the league became the first collegiate conference to be hosted on FOX's mobile platform, FOX Sports Go, the app that provides live streaming video of FOX Sports content at home or on-the-go.

FOX Sports GO is currently available for iOS, Android, Kindle Fire tablets and Fire phones, select Windows devices, and on desktops through FOXSportsGO.com. Fans can download the mobile app for free from the iTunes App Store, Google Play, Amazon App Store and Windows Store.

FOX Sports GO users who are also subscribers of participating video providers can live stream the BIG EAST men's and women's basketball telecasts, plus the Olympic sports championships, carried on FOX Sports 1, FOX Sports 2, FOX Sports Regional Networks, and FOX broadcast network.

Highlights – Godlevske joined Butler's staff as an assistant coach in the spring of 2013, after spending seven years as girls' head coach at Bedford North Lawrence High School. He guided the Lady Stars to a 120-41 record, including a perfect 28-0 mark and the IHSAA Class 4A Girls' Basketball State Championship in 2013. He also was part of an Indiana boys' state championship staff as a volunteer coach at Lawrence North High School in 2004. An all-state high school player in L'Anse, Mich., Godlevske played basketball at Northern Michigan

University, and then started his collegiate coaching career at NCAA Division II Lake Superior State University, where he posted a 35-19 record in two years. After a few years out of coaching, he returned as head coach of his alma mater in L'Anse, leading the school to a 40-9 record in two seasons before taking over at Bedford North Lawrence. Godlevske was named interim head coach of the Butler women's team on April 23 and had the interim tag removed less than two weeks later.

In his first season with the Bulldogs, Butler surprised everyone after getting picked 10th in the BIG EAST Preseason Poll and finishing fifth, winning eight-straight conference games which included wins over Creighton and at St. John's. Godlevske led Butler to its first ever BIG EAST Tournament win in 2016 as the Bulldogs upset higher-seeded Xavier in the First Round. Butler has advanced out of the First Round in three consecutive seasons, including 2018's overtime win over Providence.

to the District to coach at Howard; recruiting coordinator and associate head coach at Howard under former Hoya Niki Reid Geckeler (2008-11); Howard came to Georgetown from Bethune-Cookman where he spent four seasons, including three as the associate head coach.

Highlights – In his first season as head coach of Georgetown, Howard led the Hoyas to its first BIG EAST Tournament Semifinal appearance in 18 years, while qualifying for the WNIT for the third consecutive season. Prior to taking the reins in 2017-18, Howard helped the Hoyas to a 33-27 record and two consecutive appearances in the Women's National Invitation Tournament (WNIT); coached All-BIG EAST honorees Dorothy Adomako and Dionna White in each of the first two years on the Hilltop as an assistant; helped bring in two-time All-Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) honoree Kaitlyn Williams while at Bethune-Cookman; recruited the Howard class that led the way to back-to-back 20-win seasons.

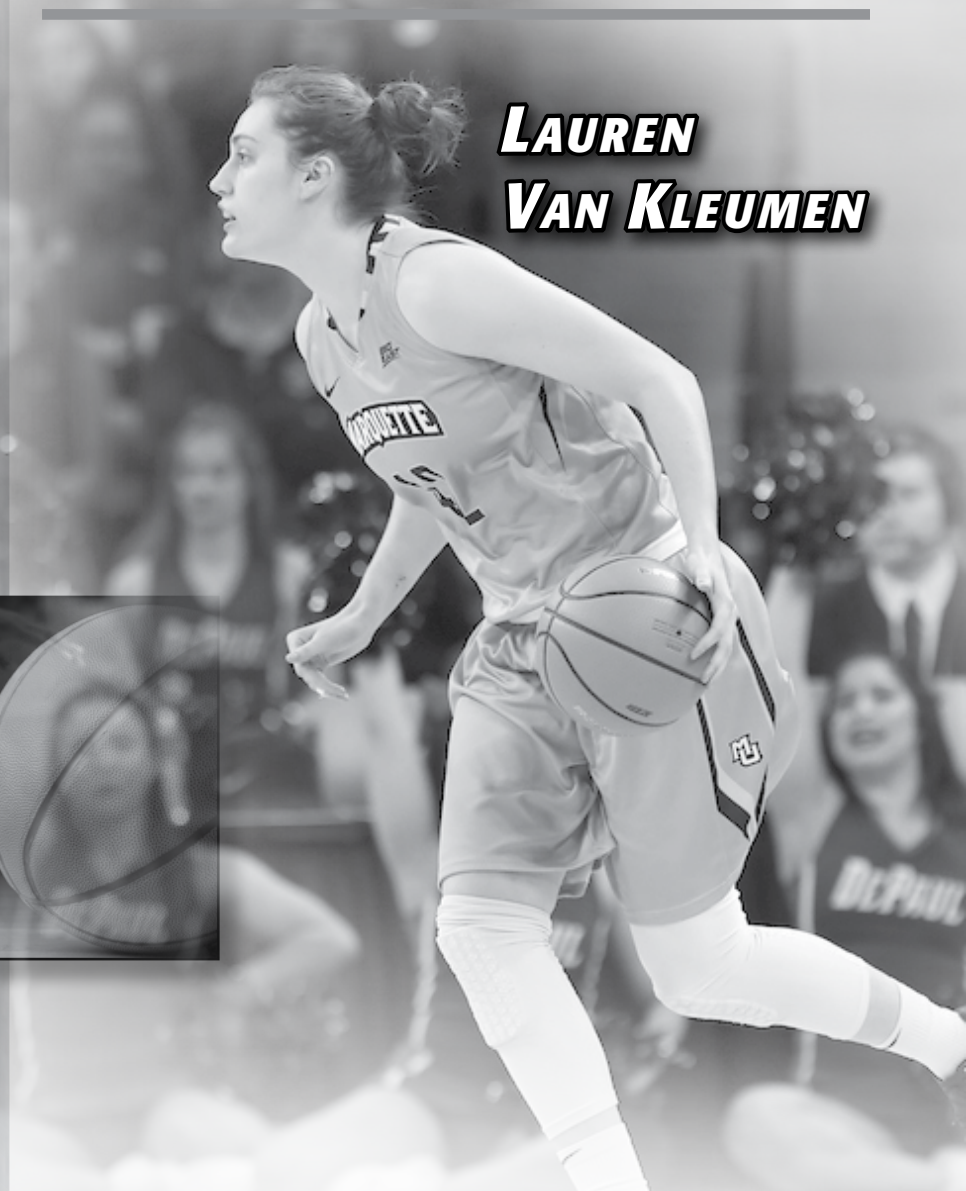

The Red Storm claimed their first BIG EAST Tournament title since 1984 in 2016. Earning its third crown overall, St. John's became the first No. 4 seed to win the tourney and the lowest seed since fifth-seeded Boston College won in 2004.

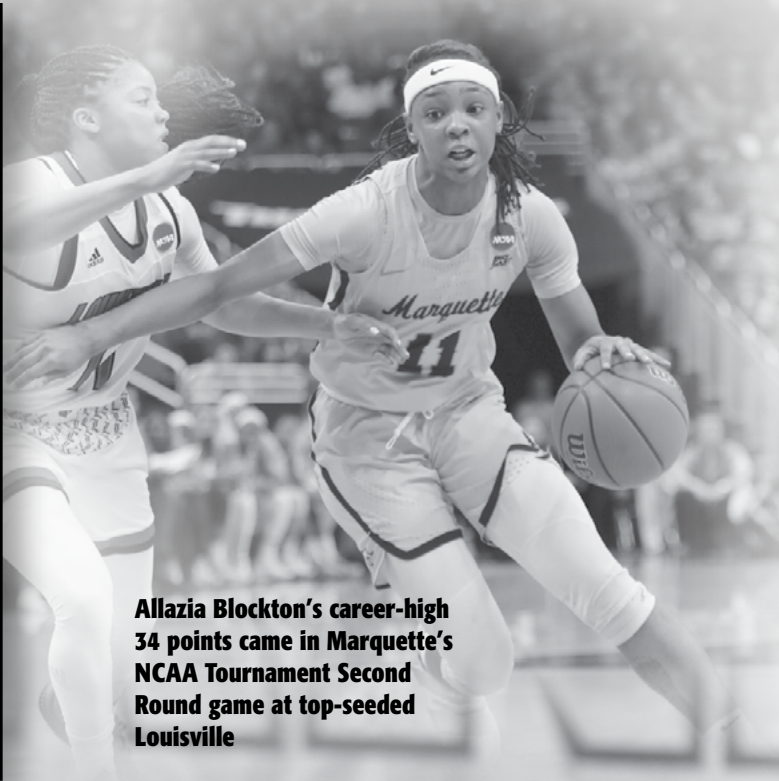
