WHO WE ARE

The FireWolves' brand identity reflects the organization's deep roots in the National Lacrosse League, pays tribute to lacrosse's Native American heritage, and represents the team's commitment to serving the community throughout the Albany area.

Lacrosse's history goes back 1,000s of years on the lands of the Six Nations of the Haudenosaunee Confederacy, which spanned from the Hudson River and the Mohawk Valley north into Quebec and Ontario in the Great Lakes region. The Albany area was originally inhabited by both Mohawk (Iroquois) and Mohican (Algonquin) tribes, and the roots of lacrosse began in what is now New York State and Canada as early as 1100AD. The Haudenosaunee (Iroquois for "People of the Longhouse") believe lacrosse, which they call Dehoñtjihgwa'és (translation: "they bump hips"), was a gift from The Creator. Also known as "The Medicine Game", lacrosse is believed to have healing powers and remains a central part of Native American communities throughout the Northeast.

The FireWolves are proud to call the Capital Region home and continue our lineage in the area that dates back to the National Lacrosse League runner-up Albany Attack in 2002. A through line beginning in the early 2000s, the wolf was part of the Attack's logo, while also being part of the logo and name of the New England Black Wolves that played in Connecticut from 2015 to 2020 before the franchise moved to Albany before the 2021-22 season. Native to the Adirondacks and also one of only three repeating clans throughout the Haudenosaunee Confederacy, the wolf embodies many of our organization's key values: courage, strength, loyalty and leadership. On and off the field.

While the "FireWolf" is a mystical creature, the use of fire in the name represents the symbolism of community and gathering for ceremony. The Mohican tribes who originally inhabited the Capital Region called it Pempotowwuthut-Muhhcanneuw, meaning "the fireplace of the Mohican nation". We believe strongly in the power of sports as a common-ground meeting place for the community, and the entire FireWolves organization is excited to celebrate competition at the highest level and honor lacrosse's deep roots in the Capital Region.

In summary, the FireWolves are fierce competitors, hunt together and are loyal to the pack. The Albany FireWolves organization holds the values of teamwork, competitive desire and community focus in the highest regard as we honor the heritage of lacrosse and the National Lacrosse League teams that came before us, while working to create a positive impact throughout the Capital Region.





GAME PREVIEW



GAME 5 MATCHUP PREVIEW FIREWOLVES VS RIPTIDE

The Albany FireWolves (2-2) return to the Capital Region this Saturday,
January 21, at 7:00 p.m. for a matchup against the New York Riptide (0-4).
Albany is coming off a massive overtime victory on the road against the Halifax
Thunderbirds while New York is seeking its first win of the season. This weekend's
game can be watched on My4 Albany or ESPN Plus.

FireWolves Players to Watch:

John Piatelli has found his groove early on in his debut season in the NLL. In last weekend's win over the Thunderbirds, the rookie accounted for three points on one goal and two assists. His second assist of the night came with 30 seconds to go in regulation when he connected with Ethan Walker who tied the game at 10 and forced overtime. Through three games, Piatelli has logged nine points on two goals and seven assists. His nine points ranks fifth on the Wolves, while he sits tied for fourth on the team in assists. Piatelli is making a name for himself early on in the season and has quickly become another weapon in the FireWolves' offensive arsenal.

Patrick Kaschalk, another rookie playing an important role on the FireWolves, has been exactly what the team hoped for when they selected him in the first round of last year's Entry Draft. Last week, his lone point came from an assist to Jackson Nishimura in transition after he made a defensive stop. On the season, the rookie defenseman is tied for the team lead with four blocked shots, ranks third on the team with 18 loose ball recoveries, and has five points to boot. As part of a strong defensive unit, look for Kaschalk's role to continue to grow as his debut season continues.

Doug Jamieson returned to the net last weekend after missing the previous game. Despite not playing the prior weekend, Jamieson came back in top form as he allowed just 10 goals and stopped 53 Halifax shots on goal. He was spectacular all night, holding the league's top goal-scoring team in check as the FireWolves secured a huge road win. Though the Riptide have yet to win a game this season, they certainly have dangerous offensive weapons. The FireWolves will continue to lean on the former Goaltender of the Year in this one as they look to make it two wins in a row heading into a week off.



GAME PREVIEW



Opposing Players to Watch:

Jeff Teat took the league by storm last year as rookie, and has picked up right where he left off. The young superstar leads the Riptide in total points (25) and assists (19) and sits tied for second on the team in goals scored (6). Despite the team dropping their fourth game in a row to begin the season last weekend, Teat assisted on five of the team's eight goals in the contest. He certainly has the ability to light the scoreboard up in any given game, but so far on the season, it has been Teat's ability to set up teammates for scoring opportunities that has made him most dangerous.

Reilly O'Connor is a name FireWolves fans already know as he was one of the team's top five scorers last year. Both sides made out in the offseason deal that sent O'Connor to New York, as Albany acquired Kieran McArdle, who currently leads the team in points, goals and assists, in return. O'Connor has had himself a strong start to the season with the Riptide, ranking second on the team in total points (16), goals (6), and assists (10). The forward is coming off a three-point outing a week ago and it's all but certain that he will try to light up the scoreboard in his return to the Capital Region.

Steve Orleman has had a tough start to the season, as one could expect considering the team is searching for their first win. Through the first four games, the goaltender has allowed 48 goals. Orleman is coming off a decent performance in last weekend's loss, surrendering just 11 goals to the undefeated Knighthawks. You can't pin the team's winless start solely on the goaltender play, as the offense has garnered the second fewest goals scored in the league with just 40. There will be opportunities for the FireWolves to get points on the board in this one as they look for another win heading into a bye week.

COACHING STAFF

Glenn Clark

General Manager / Head Coach

Head Coach Glenn Clark brings over two decades of NLL experience as both a player and a coach with him to the Capital Region. He began his professional box lacrosse career in 1998 when he was drafted by the Ontario Raiders. One year later, the team moved to Toronto and became the Toronto Rock. Clark spent the majority of his playing career in Toronto, helping lead the Rock to five NLL championships. After the 2005 season, Clark signed with the Philadelphia Wings where he was named to the All-Star team for the third time in his career.

Clark wasted no time transitioning into coaching as he was named head coach of the Toronto Rock following the 2006 season. The Rock reached the playoffs before being defeated by the eventual champion, Rochester Knighthawks. Clark was at the helm of the Rock until the team's 2009 season.

Following his coaching stint in Toronto, Clark spent the next five years coaching at various levels



including minors, Junior A Lacrosse, CLAX, and the Canadian national team. Clark returned to the NLL in 2015, being named head coach of the New England Black Wolves. In just his first season with the Black Wolves, Clark led the team to a six win improvement from the season prior, and won a playoff game. During his five seasons as head coach of the Black Wolves, the team successfully made the playoffs in each of them. The team found itself in first place in 2020 before the season came to a halt due to COVID-19.

Clark now resides in the Capital Region and is eager to start the 2O22-23 season and work towards bringing Albany FireWolves fans a championship!

Clem D'Orazio

Assistant General Manager / Assistant Coach

Coach Clem D'Orazio is no stranger to the Capital Region and looks forward to bringing professional box lacrosse to the area. Now entering his 10thyear as a Lacrosse Director and Vice Principal of Everest Academy in Vaughan, Ontario, D'Orazio has traveled to the region many times for games with his teams having played at UAlbany, Union College, and other surrounding areas.

D'Orazio brings championship experience with him to Albany, having won five National Championships as a player for Brock University. Following his collegiate career, D'Orazio joined the Brock coaching staff where he helped lead the team to three more National Championships finals, winning one of them.

D'Orazio continued his coaching career within the Junior B and Senior A league's for four years before joining Coach Clark in 2015 with the Toronto Beaches in Junior A where he served as the GM for the past six years. Sticking with Clark, D'Orazio joined the staff of the New England Black Wolves that same year. After two years as Video Coordinator and Head Scout, D'Orazio was promoted to Defensive Coach. Last year, D'Orazio was named Assistant GM of the team.

D'Orazio keeps busy and wears many hats on the job, but is excited to return to the Capital Region and play in front of a packed arena at the Times Union Center!



COACHING STAFF

Darryl Gibson

Assistant Coach

Now entering his fourth season with Glenn Clark, Coach Darryl Gibson might be a familiar face to some Capital Region lacrosse fans. He began his NLL career right here in Albany as a member of the expansion team Albany Attack. Gibson spent two seasons with the Attack before joining the Toronto Rock in 2002, playing alongside Coach Clark for three seasons. In his first season with the Rock, Gibson returned to Albany where he led his team to a championship over the Attack, 13-12. Gibson scored the game-tying and game-winning goals of that game, both of which were assisted by Coach Clark.

After three seasons in Toronto, Gibson bounced around between a handful of other teams before retiring in 2012. Through 12 seasons, Gibson won two NLL Championships and was named to the 2006 All-Star team.

Following his successful career as a player, Gibson got his first experience on an NLL coaching staff as an intern with the Minnesota Swarm. After coaching in CLAX and Major Series Lacrosse, Gibson got the call from Coach Clark to join the New England Black Wolves as the team's Offensive Coordinator.

Kevin Montgomery Athletic Trainer

Kevin Montgomery, a Toronto native, is another member of the Albany staff that he been around Coach Clark and the organization for a handful of years. Playing a variety of sports through his school years, Montgomery enjoys being part of a professional team while being able to continue his passion within the medical field.

He began his journey into sports working as an athletic trainer for Canadian junior hockey teams and a private sports rehabilitation clinic. Montgomery then spent two years with the Toronto FC academy which serves as the development system of Toronto FC of the Canadian Major League Soccer club. Montgomery then transitioned into lacrosse where he teamed up with Coach Clark as a member of the Toronto Beaches in the Junior A League. Sticking with Clark, Montgomery joined the New England BlackWolves in 2016 and has been the organization's head athletic trainer ever since. Simultaneously, Montgomery also serves as the Head Therapist of the Track and Field program for York University in Toronto.

Mike McKay

Goalie Coach/Video Coordinator

Mike McKay is yet another member of the team's coaching staff with a connection to the Capital Region. As a player, McKay was drafted by the Albany Attack, though he never actually played a game for the team. McKay then signed with Anaheim where he played his lone season as a player in the NLL.

Following his playing career, McKay quickly transitioned into coaching where he joined Coach D'Orazio in the Senior A Canadian Summer League.McKay then paired up with Coach Clark shortly after, serving as the Defensive Coordinator for the Toronto Beaches in the Junior A League. McKay joined the New England BlackWolves staff in 2017 under his current title, Goalie Coach and Video Coordinator. In 2019, McKay won a gold medal as the Video Coach for Team Canada at the World Indoor Lacrosse Championship alongside Clark.

As the Video Coordinator for the team, McKay handles team scouting, video breakdowns, in-game breakdowns, and a whole lot more. The Ontario, Canada native is enthusiastic about coming to Albany and sees a lot of potential in what he called an "untapped market with good lacrosse roots."

Mike Kettell has been working hard behind the scenes in the NLL for the past 13 years and counting. A Philadelphia native, Kettell got his first work experience in sports working as a Student Manager for the Temple Owls football team.

NICK CHAYKOWSKY

After beginning in minor lacrosse leagues, Chaykowsky was drafted into the Jr. A league by the Barrie Lakeshores. After four and a half years with the Lakeshores, Chaykowsky was traded to the New Westminster Salmonbellies. He then broke into the NLL and was drafted by the New England Black Wolves. Oddly enough, Chaykowsky was drafted on



September 17, as the 17th overall pick, in 2017... it also happened to be his birthday.

Chaykowsky spent his first season on the Black Wolves' practice squad before working his way into the team's regular lineup. He appeared in 16 regular season games with the FireWolves last year, recording 85 loose balls and 10 caused turnovers.

FIREWOLVES OPEN UP NEW SEASON WITH A ROAD VICTORY IN BUFFALO

Albany Defeated the Bandits, 11-10, in the First Game of the 2022-23 Season

After two scoreless minutes to open the second half, Albany was penalized with a five-minute goalie interference major as Walker crashed into Vinc. With 3O seconds left on the major penalty, Albany was hit with minor, extending Buffalo's man-up advantage for two additional minutes. Soon after, Byrne rolled one into the net for his second goal of the night. With six minutes to play in the third quarter, Hiana Thompson soared from behind the net and squeaked in his first goal with the FireWolves. Keeping their foot on the gas, Thomson buried a high shot for Albany's third goal in less than two minutes. Buffalo was finally able to stop the bleeding as Nanticoke beat Jamieson for the second time in the game on a nifty shot with a minute to go in the quarter. Thirty seconds later, Chris Cloutier went airborne and scored another for the Bandits. Albany could not get a shot on net and maintained a 9-7 lead after three quarters of play.

Three minutes into the fourth, Buchanan took a shot from the deep center of the turf that bounced into the net.
