OVERVIEW
The Astros Foundation and Community Relations team manage a wide variety of community and charitable programs that focus on supporting youth baseball and softball, honoring members of our nation's military and veterans, aiding in the fight against childhood cancer, and helping address pervasive issues in our society such as homelessness and domestic violence. These efforts are an investment in the Houston community and speak to a culture of giving back that touches every facet of the Astros organization.

Each year, the Astros Foundation continues to grow the Community Leaders program, which provides young baseball and softball players with the environment and resources they need to develop mentally and physically.

Through fundraising and volunteer efforts, the Astros Foundation supports many local non-profits, dedicating thousands of volunteer hours each year.

In 2017, the Astros Foundation was awarded the Allan H. Selig Award for Philanthropic Excellence, Major League Baseball's highest recognition of the charitable efforts of its clubs, for the Astros Community Leaders program.

ASTROS FOUNDATION IN 2022
The 2022 season, the first full year under the leadership of Paula Harris, Executive Director, Astros Foundation and Senior VP of Community Affairs was a very successful one for the Foundation, as $\$ 5.3$ million was donated to community programs.

The Astros also embraced the community of Uvalde, Texas, after the shooting at Robb Elementary School, engaging in community activities, having a Uvalde Strong Day at Minute Maid Park, making 2023 Astros Caravan stops in the community and making Uvalde Little League a Community Leader Little League.

The Astros Foundation participated in granting the 10,000th wish for the Make-a-Wish Foundation Texas Gulf Coast and Louisiana on Oct. 4 at the Astros game against the Philadelphia Phillies. The wish kids ranged in ages from 12 to 18 and signed a one-day contract, were presented with custom Astros jerseys and special goodies, and enjoy the opportunity of a lifetime to meet players during batting practice prior to the start of the game, among many other special activities.

The 2022 Astros Foundation Charity Game, presented by AT\&T SportsNet was once again a successful event for the Astros, as proceeds from the telecast benefitted the Astros Foundation, the Boys and Girls Club of Greater Houston, Kids' Meals and the Uvalde Little League.

The Astros Foundation also put on the Diamond Dreams Gala presented by Chevron in November of 2022, a wonderful night of fundraising for the Astros Foundation and New Hope Housing, an organization combatting homelessness by providing housing and support services for those in need. The event featured a fantastic dinner, live and silent auctions and a concert by Boyz II Men.

The Astros Foundation could not have had the success they did in 2022 without World Champion Volunteers, a group of over 2,800 that served over 19,000 hours at 626 events for over 94 partner organizations. The Astros volunteers were named the 2022 Volunteer Group of the Year by Kids Meals.

Additionally, in February of 2023, the Astros Foundation and Minute Maid Park hosted the first Cactus Jack HBCU Classic, a round-robin collegiate baseball tournament featuring six Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs).

Since rejoining the team in 2012 as the official mascot of the Houston Astros, Orbit has quickly become one of the most popular mascots in baseball and all of sports! During pregame, you can often find him giving a fun Astros "welcome" to top athletes, entertainers and dignitaries from around the world. During the game itself, be on the lookout for some of Orbit's signature shenanigans which can happen on the field or even right next to you in the stands.

Whether it's on the dugout, in the stands or on the field, Orbit's hilarious hijinks have garnered attention from some of the world's top media outlets, including ESPN, MLB Network, FOX Sports, CBS Sports, SB Nation, Yahoo! Sports, The Huffington Post, USA Today, E! Online, MTV, and GQ Magazine to name a few! Many of these performances can be found online, where their respective videos have collectively garnered nearly two billion views.

Orbit's contributions don't stop on the field. In the community, Orbit makes nearly 300 appearances a year! These include everything from public appearances such as community festivals and parades, to private events such as corporate events and birthday parties. Orbit also has been known to participate in a number of promotional stunts throughout the year, including taking on the BP MS 150 bike ride from Houston to Austin, rappelling down the side of the Four Seasons hotel, and tag-teaming events such as the Houston Marathon and the Cypress Triathlon with other Houston-area mascots. Additionally, Orbit offers a series of educational assembly shows geared toward elementary schools that cover topics such as literacy, anti-bullying, having character, making smart choices during Red Ribbon Week, STEM and preparing for the STARR test.

In 2019, Orbit joined the team on their trip to Monterrey, Mexico, as they played the Los Angeles Angels as a part of MLB's International Series. This was Orbit's fourth international trip, including a trip to Japan (2014) and Mexico (2016) and Taiwan (2018).

In 2017, Orbit released his very first children's book, Orbit's First Day of School! The book covers topics such as making new friends, how to handle bullies, embracing differences, celebrating strengths and practicing respect. ## JIM CRANE

## OWNER \& CHAIRMAN

On Nov. 17, 2011, Major League Baseball unanimously approved the purchase of the Houston Astros by a group headed by Houston businessman Jim Crane, marking the beginning of a new era of Astros baseball.

As Owner and Chairman, Jim Crane hit the ground running upon taking control of the Astros in 2011 by immediately putting his plan to rebuild the franchise into action. As a highly successful businessman in Houston and former standout college pitcher, Jim's credentials made him the perfect choice to build a winning team both on and off the field in Houston.

From the start, Jim was clear about his goals: to make the Astros a ballclub that can have sustained success at the Major League
 level by building a top-notch farm system and to provide Astros fans with an outstanding experience at Minute Maid Park.

In just six years, Jim Crane took the Astros from worst to first in spectacular fashion. Houston's farm system, which was ranked as one of the worst in baseball in 2011, recovered in a three-year span to be ranked as the best in baseball in 2014. Since then, that same farm system has produced multiple Major Leaguers and everyday players and has given the Astros the ability to pull off multiple trades, all signed off on by Crane, including the acquisitions of Justin Verlander in 2017, Gerrit Cole in 2018 and Zack Greinke in 2019.

Buoyed by promotions and acquisitions, the Major League club went from a 111-loss season in 2013 to ultimately winning its first World Series Championship in 2017. The club has continued to produce at the highest level, as the Astros posted 100-plus win seasons in five of the last six years (did not reach the mark in 2020 due to a shortened season because of the COVID-19 pandemic). Not only have the Astros reached the postseason each of the last six seasons, but they have advanced to the ALCS in all six of those years, becoming just the second team in MLB history to advance to six-straight LCS. In 2019, the Astros set a franchise record with 107 regular season wins and won the American League pennant. Last season in 2021, the Astros won their fourth American League West Division title and third American League pennant in five seasons. Overall, three of the club's four World Series trips, including the 2017 World Series Championship, have come under Crane's ownership.

In order to make the experience at Minute Maid Park one of the best in baseball, the Astros have made several largescale renovations to the ballpark under Jim's leadership. The multi-million-dollar investment in center field, the addition of the Astros Hall of Fame Alley and the renovations and enhancements to the ballpark's suites were the most recent innovative updates that showcase Jim's commitment to making Minute Maid Park a great destination for fans of all ages.

Jim recognized the need for a new Astros Spring Training facility and successfully moved the team to West Palm Beach in 2017, where players and fans now enjoy a first-class, state-of-the-art facility, Ballpark of the Palm Beaches. Through a partnership, Jim also purchased an office building five miles from the Spring Training facility and had it redeveloped into a Hilton Garden Inn branded hotel which serves the public as well as Astros players, staff and families.

He also successfully brokered the purchase of the Double A Corpus Christi Hooks in 2015 and was closely involved with the acquisition of a Class A Advanced affiliate in the Carolina League in 2017. In 2019, that team had a new stadium built in Fayetteville, N.C., and a new nickname, Fayetteville Woodpeckers. Ballpark Digest recognized the Woodpeckers' brand with the Logo/Branding of the Year Award in 2019. Additionally, Jim continued to add to the Astros minor league system acquiring the Sugar Land Skeeters franchise to serve as the Astros Triple A affiliate prior to the 2021 season. In January of 2022, the Skeeters underwent a successful re-brand to the Sugar Land Space Cowboys.

Under Jim's leadership, the Astros have supported several of MLB's diversity initiatives, including MLB's eighth annual Civil Rights Game and ancillary activities as well as MLB's Diversity Summit, a sports employment and business opportunity career and trade fair. Houston has twice hosted the Urban Invitational, a nationally-televised collegiate baseball tournament designed to give HBCUs and their baseball programs national exposure, as well as the Breakthrough Series, a collegiate and professional scouting showcase featuring a diverse group of top high school players in the country.

## Passion for the Game

Jim hails from St. Louis, Mo. where he became a loyal, spirited fan of the St. Louis Cardinals. As a teenager, he caddied for members of the Cardinals team at local golf clubs and parked cars for patrons at Cardinals games. Jim was impressed

by the Cardinals' caring, family atmosphere and the team's close ties with the local community. He has carried these values forward throughout his life in business, philanthropic and personal relationships.

As a young man, Jim put his innate passion for baseball into action at Central Missouri State University (now the University of Central Missouri), where he was a standout pitcher for the Mules from 1973-76 under the late, revered coach, Robert Tompkins. Jim still holds the Mules' single-game strikeout record with 18, and in 1997, was inducted into the Central Missouri State University Athletic Hall of Fame.

Jim was the primary underwriter of a $\$ 1.2$ million renovation in 1998 of the old Mules Field on the University of Central Missouri campus. On Jan. 21, 1998, the facility was renamed the James R.
 Crane Stadium/Robert N. Tompkins Field in honor of Jim and his beloved coach. Jim continues to contribute to the college annually to provide athletic scholarships for Mules baseball. On Jan. 29, 2017, Jim was enshrined in the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame for his outstanding pitching career at the University of Central Missouri, his generous donations to UCM baseball and his successful efforts in rebuilding the Houston Astros franchise.

Jim earned a Bachelor of Science degree in industrial safety from Central Missouri State University in 1976. This led to a loss-control job evaluating commercial risks for an insurance company and then a move to Houston in 1982, where he entered the freight forwarding business.

## Success in the Business World

In March of 1984, at the age of 30 and with $\$ 10,000$ borrowed from his sister, Jim founded Eagle USA Airfreight (EGL, Inc.). In his first office located in Houston with a sole employee, Jim handled the loading and trucking himself. The company made money in its first month, and Jim ultimately built it into an organization of more than 10,000 employees with 400-plus facilities in 139 countries. EGL was named one of Houston's "Best Places to Work," and reached No. 599 on the Fortune 1000 list during Jim's tenure. Jim has been the recipient of a long list of awards and honors for his entrepreneurial activities and business successes. The company was acquired in an LBO transaction in August 2007.

In August of 2008, Crane formed Crane Worldwide Logistics (CWL), a premier global provider of customized transportation and logistics services. CWL continues to grow rapidly with experienced members of Crane's management team and sales force at the helm.

Jim's love of baseball is unabated, and he has added the game of golf to his athletic endeavors. He acquired the Floridian, a private golf resort in Palm City, Fla., in 2010. In 2017, Jim ventured into the restaurant business and opened Osso \& Kristalla and Potente named after his children. In 2018, he also took ownership of the Houston Open, the PGA TOUR tournament that was in danger of leaving the city. The tournament is operated under the Astros Golf Foundation transitioned to the newly renovated Memorial Park Golf Course in 2020.

Jim also acquired Davaco, a leader in high-volume remodels and technology deployments for global brands. He then started a software company, Modiant, as well as Crane Safety, a commercial safety supply company.


## Stepping Up and Giving Back

As Astros Owner and Chairman, Jim has embraced the opportunity to give back to the City of Houston and beyond. Since he took ownership of the club, the Astros Foundation has donated and invested over $\$ 50$ million into the Houston community and beyond.

In 2021, the Astros Foundation led the way in the fight against COVID-19, partnering with the City of Houston to use Minute Maid Park as both a COVID-19 testing site and as a vaccination site.

In April of 2020, during the early stages of the pandemic, Jim stepped up to connect the Astros Foundation with Crane Worldwide Logistics, which resulted in millions of medical supplies being delivered to Houston hospitals within the Texas Medical Center. The goal of the partnership was to provide funding, logistics and transportation support for much-needed medical supplies and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) being used by healthcare professionals to treat COVID-19 patients.

In 2020, Jim also connected the Astros Foundation and Crane Worldwide with Astros players Carlos Correa and Martin Maldonado plus other MLB players from Puerto Rico to assist with delivering medical supplies to the island during the COVID-19 pandemic. In that endeavor, the Astros Foundation and Crane Worldwide covered 100\% of the freight and transportation costs and also coordinated the logistics to get those much-needed medical supplies to Puerto Rico.

Crane and the Astros Foundation are the first to jump to action after natural disasters in the area, holding supply drives at Minute Maid Park to support relief efforts for communities impacted by storms. Most recently, drives were held
to collect supplies for communities in Louisiana impacted by Hurricane Laura in 2020 and Hurricane Ida in 2021. In 2021, the Astros Foundation and Alex Bregman held a water distribution drive to support local Houstonians during recovery from Winter Storm Uri.

In the immediate aftermath of Hurricane Harvey in 2017, Jim and the Astros ownership group were among the first to pledge \$4 million to relief efforts. Jim also facilitated the shipment of more than 240,000 pounds of disaster relief supplies to Puerto Rico, where he was instrumental in transporting families of Astros and other MLB players, as well as hospitalized patients in critical condition, to safety.

In 2018, when the City of Houston was in danger of losing the Houston Open golf tournament, Jim helped establish the Astros Golf Foundation to ensure that the historic, PGA Tour tournament
 would remain in Houston. As a result, since 2019, the Houston Open has been presented by the Astros Golf Foundation and has had a tremendous impact on the Houston community, becoming the single-biggest fundraiser for the Astros Foundation. The Astros Golf Foundation spearheaded a $\$ 34$ million renovation to Memorial Park Golf Course, which now plays host to the Houston Open. One of the key goals of the Astros Golf Foundation is to provide much-needed resources and funds to the citizens and community of Houston through park improvements, charitable fundraising and investing in youth programs.

Jim is committed to providing local children the opportunities he feels baseball afforded him in his youth. One of his first initiatives after purchasing the Astros was the creation of the Astros Community Leaders program, which won MLB's prestigious Allan H. Selig Award for Philanthropic Excellence in 2017. As part of the program, a multi-million-dollar partnership was formed with the City of Houston's Parks and Recreation Department and included participation from several corporate partners, whose financial donations supported the field refurbishments, year-round maintenance, league programming and uniforms. Now, tens of thousands of young athletes receive free uniforms, equipment, tickets to Astros games and professional instruction through the Community Leaders program. The parents, coaches and league participants also benefit from different types of clinics through the Community Leaders program, attending clinics on coaching, groundskeeping, nutrition, education, and much more.
"Baseball was very important to my development," Jim said. "Playing baseball made me a lot more confident and comfortable in my ability to achieve things. I'd like to be able to help more kids get the opportunities that I had through baseball."

Jim has been the recipient of a long list of awards and honors for his entrepreneurial activities and business successes. In 2019, Jim was recognized as the MD Anderson "Living Legend" and was also presented with the Ben Taub Humanitarian Award at their Jubilee of Caring event. He also won the 2019 Houston Sports Award Executive of the Year award. In May of 2018, he received the Public Service Award from the American Leadership Forum and was also inducted into the St. Louis Sports Hall of Fame where he received the August A. Busch, Jr. Award. On November 1, 2018, Jim was inducted into the Texas Business Hall of Fame and in December 2018 received the Jack Buck Award from the Missouri Athletic Club in St. Louis, Missouri.

Dana Brown was named the 14th General Manager in Astros franchise history on Jan. 25, 2023.

Brown becomes the second AfricanAmerican general manager in Astros history, joining Bob Watson (1994-95).

Brown joins the Astros after spending the last four seasons (2019-22) with the Atlanta Braves organization as their Vice President, Scouting. In that role, he oversaw several successful drafts in which the Braves selected impact players such as outfielder Michael Harris, right-handed pitcher Spencer Strider and infielder Vaughn Grissom. In 2022, Harris earned National League Rookie of the Year honors while Strider finished second.

The Braves success in recent years,
 which includes five straight division titles and a World Series championship in 2021, has in large part been the result of a solid farm system.

Prior to joining the Braves, Brown spent nine seasons (2010-18) with the Toronto Blue Jays as a special assistant to the general manager. In that span, the Blue Jays earned an American League East Division title in 2015 and a Wild Card berth in 2016. The postseason appearance in 2015 was the first for the Blue Jays since 1993.

Before his stint in Toronto, Brown served as the Director of Scouting for the Nationals/Expos franchise for nine seasons (2001-09). During his tenure, the Nationals/Expos would draft over 40 players that would go on to appear in the Major Leagues. Seven players drafted in that span would earn All-Star status, including lan Desmond, Stephen Strasburg and Ryan Zimmerman.

Brown's career also includes an eight-year stint with the Pittsburgh Pirates, where he served as their area scouting supervisor and east coast cross checker.

Brown also played professionally for three seasons as an outfielder in the Phillies minor league system after being drafted out of Seton Hall University in the 35th round of the 1989 June Draft. In three minor league seasons as an outfielder, Brown hit . 262 in 280 games with 82 stolen bases, advancing as high at Double-A in his final season in 1991.

One of his teammates at Seton Hall was Astros Hall of Famer Craig Biggio. Brown also played with three other future Major Leagues while at Seton Hall: former All-Star and MVP first baseman Mo Vaughn, shortsop John Valentin and left-handed pitcher Kevin Morton. Brown was inducted into the Seton Hall Hall University Hall of Fame in 2008 and the New Jersey Sportswriter Hall of Fame in 2012 for notable accomplishments in baseball.

Brown and his wife, Casandra, have two children, Dana Jr. and Autumn.

ASSISTANTGENERALMANAGER

Andrew Ball is in his second season as Assistant General Manager for the Astros. In his role, he assists Dana Brown with all aspects of Baseball Operations, primarily focusing on Major League roster management, player evaluation and procurement, contract negotiations, and rules compliance. Ball also oversees departmental administration and works closely with all departments on long-term strategy, innovation, and facilitating learning and development.

Prior to joining the Astros, Ball spent five seasons (2017-2021) as the Director of Baseball Operations for the Los Angeles Angels and three seasons (2014-2016) with the Tampa Bay Rays in their Pro Scouting department. He began his career in professional baseball with the independent York Revolution, starting as an intern in 2011 before spending two seasons as Manager of Baseball Operations.

Ball graduated from Gwynedd-Mercy College, where he earned a business administration degree and pitched for the baseball team. He lives in Houston with his wife, Rachel.


CHARLES COOK

ASSISTANTGENERALMANAGER

Charles Cook enters his eighth year with the Astros, seventh in a full-time capacity and first as Assistant General Manager. Charles previously held the roles of Senior Director of Player Evaluation, Baseball Operations Coordinator, Manager of Amateur Scouting Analysis and Director of Player Evaluation for the Astros.

Charles is a 2015 graduate of Yale University, where he was a member of the baseball and football teams. As a student, he held a summer internship with the Astros business strategy \& analytics department.


BILL FIRKUS

ASSISTANT GENERALMANAGER

Bill Firkus is entering his first season as an Astros Assistant General Manager after being named to the position in January of 2023. In his role, Bill oversees player personnel, research \& development, sports medicine \& performance and performance science.

Bill joined the Astros in July of 2013 and has served a myriad of roles in the Astros baseball operations department, including most recently working as the team's Senior Director of Baseball Operations (2019-22). He also served as the club's Director of Sports Medicine and Performance (2015-19) after originally joining the club as a Medical Analyst (2013-15).

Prior to joining the Astros, Bill worked in the healthcare field, for nearly three years in healthcare investment banking with Piper Jaffray and for nearly four years in marketing and strategy with Medtronic, the largest medical device manufacturer in the world.

Bill received his bachelor's degree in finance from the University of Wisconsin, Madison and his MBA from the University of California, Berkeley. He resides in Houston.


## JEFF BACWELL

SPECIALADVISORTO BASEBALLOPERATIONS \& COMMUNITYOUTREACHEXECUTIVE

Jeff Bagwell, who was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 2017 and the Astros Hall of Fame in 2019, was one of the greatest sluggers of all-time.

In his current role as Special Advisor to Baseball Operations \& Community Outreach Executive, Jeff is an active member of the Astros front office staff and of the Houston community. In addition to making public appearances and acting as an ambassador for the organization, Jeff can also be heard on the club's TV and radio broadcasts, serving as a part-time color analyst on both platforms.

In his illustrious playing career with the Astros, which spanned 15 years, Bagwell hit 297 with 488 doubles, 32 triples, 449 home runs, 1,529 RBI with a .948 OPS (. 408 OBP/. 540 SLG) in 2,150 games. The four-time All-Star and three-time Silver Slugger Award winner was the first player in Astros history to be named the MVP of his league (1994), as well as the first player to receive a Rookie of the Year Award (1991). The franchise leader in homers, walks and RBI, Bagwell was also known for his elite defense at first base, winning a Rawlings Gold Glove Award in 1994. He is the only first baseman in MLB history to record a 30-homer, 30-stolen base season, which he accomplished twice (1997, 1999). Under Bagwell's leadership, the Astros won four division titles and made the playoffs six times, reaching the National League Championship Series in 2004 and the World Series in 2005.


## CRAIG BIGGIO

## SPECIALASSISTANT TO THE GENERAL MANAGER

Hall of Famer and longtime Astros icon Craig Biggio is in his 16th season as a special assistant to the General Manager. In this role, Craig works in several areas, including with the baseball operations staff in its Major and minor league player development programs with special emphasis on instruction, the amateur draft and scouting, and Major and minor league talent evaluation. Additionally, Craig participates in the club's community development program.

On Jan. 6, 2015, Craig Biggio became the first player in Astros history to be voted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame after receiving 82.7 percent of the total votes from the Baseball Writers'Association of America. He was officially inducted into the HOF during the annual ceremony in Cooperstown on July 26, 2015. Craig was also inducted to the Astros Hall of Fame on August 3, 2019, as a part of the inaugural class.

The franchise career leader in hits, games played, runs scored, and at-bats, Craig retired at the end of the 2007 season following a stellar, 20-year career, all with the Astros. His No. 7 was retired by the ballclub on Aug. 17, 2008.

He finished his career with 3,060 hits, 668 doubles, 291 homers, 1,175 RBI, and a 281 career average in 2,850 games. He remains the franchise leader in several categories, including hits, doubles, games played and runs (1844).

A first-round selection by Houston in the June 1987 draft, Craig became the first Astro to reach the 3,000-hit plateau with a seventh-inning single against Colorado's Aaron Cook on June 28, 2007 at Minute Maid Park. His 3,060 hits rank 25th alltime, and his 668 career doubles are the 2nd-most of any right-handed hitter in Major League history (sixth all-time overall).

Craig's 20 seasons with Houston are a franchise record, and he also made a club-best 19 consecutive Opening Day starts. He is also the only player in Major League history to reach all of the following milestones: 600 doubles ( 668 ), 250 home runs (291), 2,700 hits ( 3,060 ), and 400 stolen bases (414). Craig and Cal Ripken Jr. are the only middle infielders (only 13 players all-time) to collect 3,000 hits and 1,000 extra-base hits.

Craig was named to a franchise-record seven National League All-Star teams, received five Silver Slugger Awards, four Rawlings Gold Glove Awards and was a member of six Astros playoff teams. Craig holds National League records for leadoff home runs with 53 (ranks second all-time) and for hits in interleague play with 201. He also led all players during the 2005 postseason with 18 hits.

Additionally, Craig was the 2007 recipient of the Roberto Clemente Award, a prestigious honor bestowed upon one Major League player each season by Major League Baseball and the Clemente family recognizing community service. Craig has been actively involved with the Sunshine Kids throughout his career, a support organization for children with cancer and their families.

Craig and wife Patty reside in Houston and have two sons, Conor and Cavan, and one daughter, Quinn. In 2010, Craig coached his sons'St. Thomas High School baseball team to the Texas Class 5A state championship. Both Conor (graduate '15) and Cavan (drafted '16) played baseball for the University of Notre Dame. Cavan was drafted by the Blue Jays and made his Major League debut for Toronto in 2019. On Sept. 17, 2019 in Baltimore, Cavan hit for the cycle, making he and his father just the second father-son duo to each hit for the cycle in an MLB game; Quinn is a member of the Notre Dame softball team.

SPECIALASSISTANT TO THE GENERAL MANAGER

Russ Bove (pronounced boe-vay) joined the Astros in 2023 as a special assistant to the general manager.
Bove brings close to 40 years of experience in professional scouting to the Astros. His current role will include assisting with the amateur draft as well as minor league player evaluation.

Prior to joining the Astros, Bove had served as a special assignment scout for the Toronto Blue Jays since 2010, during which time he worked alongside current Astros General Manager Dana Brown. While in Toronto, Bove was a part of the signing of several current Major League players, including Bo Bichette, Marcus Stroman and Vladimir Guerrero Jr. During his stint in Toronto, Bove was named East Coast Scout of the Year at the Winter Meetings in December of 2017.

Bove's career in scouting began in 1983 with the Major League Scouting Bureau. In 1992, he was hired by the Brewers organization where he would first serve as an area scout before being promoted to East Coast Supervisor. In 2004, he worked as an area scout for the Montreal Expos for one season before being hired by the New York Mets as amateur scouting director. He would remain with the Mets until 2011, at which time he would join the Blue Jays.

A native of Queens, NY, Bove received a Bachelor's of Science degree in business from St. John's University. While in college, he was the Team MVP of the St. John's baseball team in 1971 was twice named as a District II All-American.


ENOS CABELL
COMMUNITY OUTREACH EXECUTIVE \& SPECIALADVISOR TO BASEBALL OPERATIONS

Enos Cabell is in his 19th season as a special assistant to the General Manager after being named to the post on Nov. 17, 2004. He had been serving as a consultant since joining the Astros front office on July 29, 2004. Enos assists the Astros Baseball Operations staff and the Astros scouting department in evaluating the Astros Major and minor league players, along with other projects and assignments within the scouting area.

During his 15-year Major League playing career, Enos played for the Astros from 1975-80 and 1984-85 and is in the top 10 in franchise history in several categories. In 1978, he was named the team's MVP after setting club records in at-bats (660) and games (162) and tallying a then-record 195 hits, which ranked third in the National League. He currently ranks tied for eighth on the club's all-time list in stolen bases (191) and tied for sixth in career batting average (.281).

Enos stole more than 30 bases for four straight seasons (1976-1979) while with Houston. In 1,688 career big league games from 1972-86, he hit . 277 (1647x5952) with 60 home runs and 596 RBI. He started 149 games at third base for the 1980 National League West Champion Astros and played on two other division-winning clubs, the 1974 Baltimore Orioles and the 1985 Los Angeles Dodgers.

From 1991-94, Enos was an analyst on Home Sports Entertainment telecasts of Astros home games and from 1991-96, he hosted the weekly call-in show, Astros Report, on KCOH Radio. He was a member of the Texas Southern University's Board of Regents from 1995-2001 and served as interim athletic director for the school in 2000.

Enos is a graduate of L.A. Harbor Junior College in San Pedro, Calif., where he was an all-conference selection in baseball. He is a cousin of former Major Leaguers Dick Davis and Ken Landreaux. He and his wife, Ruby, make their home in Missouri City, Texas. Enos has three sons, Marcus, Stephen and Cordell.


## JOSE CRUZ

## COMMUNITY OUTREACH EXECUTIVE

The 2023 season is the 40th with the Houston Astros organization for Jose Cruz, who is one of the most popular figures in franchise history.

Jose has served in several roles with the Astros during his long, distinguished tenure. In his current role as community outreach executive, Jose makes public appearances on behalf of the club and serves as an ambassador for the organization.

Prior to his current role, he spent five seasons as a special assistant to the general manager (2010-14). Prior to that, he was a Major League coach for 13 seasons (1997-2009).

On the field, Jose spent 13 of his outstanding 18-year Major League playing career as an outfielder with the Astros (1975-87). In that span, he developed into an All-Star and one of the most popular players ever to wear the Astros uniform. Nicknamed "Cheo", Jose held franchise records in games, at-bats, hits, total bases and triples at the time of his retirement. His 80 career triples remain the franchise record. In addition to his Astros career, Jose also played for the St. Louis Cardinals (1970-74) and the New York Yankees (1988).

Jose holds the distinction of being involved with the first nine of the Astros postseason appearances, three as a player (1980, '81 and '86) and six as a coach (1997-99, '01, ‘04-05). He was the Astros Team MVP four times and hit . 300 six times in his career while stealing 317 bases.

Jose's uniform No. 25 was retired by the Astros on Oct. 3, 1992, along with former teammate Mike Scott's No. 33. They were the third and fourth numbers retired by the team. In 1999, Jose was selected by a panel of experts as one of the three outfielders on the franchise's All-Astrodome team. In 2003, he was inducted into the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame. On August 3, 2019, Jose was inducted into the Astros Hall of Fame as a part of the inaugural class.

Jose and his wife, Zoraida, make their home in Houston and have four children: Jose Javier, Jose Cheito, Shakira and Jose Enrique. His son, Jose Jr., was the first-round selection (third player overall) of the Seattle Mariners in the 1995 June free agent draft. Jose Jr. graduated from Bellaire (TX) High School and attended Rice University, where he currently serves as the Owls Head Coach. As a high school player, he led Bellaire to the number one national ranking by USA Today and was a finalist for the Golden Spikes Award while at Rice. Jose Enrique also excelled on the baseball diamond, helping to lead Rice University to a national championship in 2003 before being drafted by the New York Yankees in the 13th round of the 2003 June Draft.


## GAVIN DICKEY

## SPECIALASSISTANT TO THE GENERAL MANAGER

Gavin Dickey was promoted to special assistant to the general manager in March of 2023.
He has been with the Astros organization since 2011, which is when he was hired as an area scout. As part of his current duties, Dickey will be involved in this year's amateur draft as well as all aspects of player acquisition and evaluation.

After a six-year minor league playing career as an outfielder, Dickey was hired by the Astros as an area scout in September of 2011, covering South Texas. From 2013-15, his territory to cover was moved to Georgia and North Florida. In 2016, he was promoted to regional cross checker, covering the Southeast region of the country, before being named national crosschecker in 2018. In 2021, he was named as a special assignment scout, handling those duties until this year when he was promoted to special assistant to the general manager.

Dickey was originally drafted out of the University of Florida by the Seattle Mariners in the 12th round of the 2006 June Draft. He ended up playing six seasons of minor league baseball (2006-11) advancing as high as Double-A.

Prior to his college career, Dickey was a highly-recruited quarterback and centerfielder at Lincoln High School in Tallahassee, FL. As a quarterback ( 4.4 time in the 40-yard dash), Dickey received several scholarship offers before deciding to attend the University of Florida, where he would play football and baseball. On the gridiron, he served as a backup for both Rex Grossman and Chris Leak. During his junior year on the baseball diamond, he would hit . 304 with 11 home runs and 41 RBI in just 50 games prior to being drafted by Seattle.

Dickey and his wife, Rachel, have two children, son Tristan (5) and daughter Alessa (3).

## WILL SHARP

Will Sharp is entering his 11th season with the Houston Astros and was promoted to Special Advisor to Baseball Operations in November 2021. Sharp is focused on management of the Astros' Major League and 40-man rosters, ingame strategy, and facilitating communication within and outside of Baseball Operations.

Prior to this role, Sharp worked as an Analyst, Pro Scouting and Manager, Major League Strategy while based in Houston, beginning in December 2017. He then worked for the Dodgers as a Baseball Operations Assistant with a focus on pro scouting, serving as a liaison between the club's professional scouts and its front office decision makers, from November 2009 to November 2012.

A Los Angeles native and 2009 graduate of the University of Southern California with a major in Economics and a minor in Religion, Sharp resides in Houston, TX with his wife, Tatiana, and their two dogs, Pooch and Penny.


## JACOB BUFFA

DIRECTOR, PERFORMANCE SCIENCE

Jacob Buffa joined the Astros in January 2019 as a development coach and was promoted to Director of Performance Science in January 2022. In this role, Buffa oversees biomechanics and sports science, which will include the recruiting, hiring, and development of staff. He will also assist with technology acquisition, data collection, and research initiatives.

Prior to joining the Astros, Buffa co-founded a baseball performance facility in St. Louis Missouri. A 2016 Graduate of Missouri State University, Buffa currently resides in Houston with his wife, Shanna.


## CARIDAD CABRERA

## DIRECTOR, LATIN AMERICAN OPERATIONS

Caridad Cabrera joined the Astros in January 2010 as the DR Academy administrator. She is now in her 14th season with the organization and fourth as Director, Latin American Operations. Caridad oversees all aspects of the Astros Latin American development and operations in addition to overseeing the administrative aspects of the Astros Academy in the DR. In addition to administrator, Caridad also served in the positions of Supervisor, Latin American Operations and Manager, Latin American operations.

Prior to joining the Astros, Caridad served as Analyst in the pledge's unit of the Dominican Ministry of Agriculture. Before that, she served as administrative assistant in EMC Abogados, handling all aspects related to human resources and payroll.

Caridad graduated, cum laude, from O\&M with an engineering degree in computer systems and holds a master's degree in business administration (senior management) from INTEC.

Derrick Fong joined the Astros in 2019 as the Director of Minor League Operations. ## MAJOR LEAGUE COAGHING CAREER

Dusty Baker was named the Astros 19th field manager in franchise history on Jan. 29, 2020.
In what was his 25th year as a Major League manager, the 2022 season was perhaps Baker's most memorable as he guided the Astros to a World Series championship. En route to the title, Baker's Astros posted one of the most dominant seasons in recent history. After leading the American League with 106 wins, the Astros went 11-2 in the postseason, which included a combined 7-0 record in the ALDS (3-0 vs. Seattle) and ALCS (4-0 vs. New York)., before defeating the Phillies in the World Series in six games. The title was Baker's first as a manager and second overall as he was a part of the championship 1981 Dodgers club as a player. Additionally, Baker has now won three pennants as a manager in his career, including in back-to-back seasons as the Astros skipper (2021-22).

Baker also reached another historic milestone in 2022 when he became just the 12th manager and first AfricanAmerican manager ever to reach 2,000 career wins with a 4-0 victory over the Mariners on May 3. The future Hall of Famer enters the 2023 season with 2,093 career wins, which ranks ninth all-time. For his efforts, Baker was named named 2022 Coach/Manager of the Year by the Houston Sports Awards Association.

In Baker's three seasons at the helm, the Astros have gone 28-14 (.667) in the postseason, giving them more playoff wins than any other club in that span. Baker's win percentage (.667) in the postseason is the best in club history. Baker's Astros are also 230-154 (.599) in the regular season, giving him the best winning percentage of any manager in franchise history (min. three seasons).

The 2021 season included multiple highlights and historical milestones for Baker. Most importantly, he led the Astros the AL pennant, marking the club's fourth trip to the Fall Classic in franchise history. It also marked the second time that Baker had led his club to the World Series.

Along the way, the Astros captured the AL West Division title, making Baker the first manager in Major League history to win division titles with five different clubs. In the postseason, the Astros defeated the White Sox in the ALDS in four games and then the Red Sox in the ALCS, rallying from 2-1 deficit to capture the pennant in six games. For his efforts, Baseball America named Baker as their $\mathbf{2 0 2 1}$ Manager of the Year.

Baker's first season in Houston, 2020, was a memorable one, as his Astros had an outstanding postseason run, falling just one win shy of a return to the World Series. The Astros were 8-5 in the postseason with series wins in the Wild Card round at Minnesota and in the ALDS vs. Oakland. Making the club's performance even more impressive was that the club had to overcome a great deal of injuries to key players. The Astros were forced to use a club-record and MLB-high 15 rookie pitchers, including 10 that made their MLB debuts in 2020.

When the Astros qualified for the playoffs, Baker once again made history, becoming the first manager in MLB history to take five different teams to the postseason. Baker also managed the Giants (1997, 2000, 2002), Cubs (2003), Reds (2010, 2012-13) and Nationals (2016-17) into the playoffs.

A three-time BBWAA NL Manager of the Year (1993, 1997, 2000), Houston is Baker's fifth managerial stop. His last four were with San Francisco (1993-2002), Chicago (2003-06), Cincinnati (2008-13) and Washington (2016-17).

An All-Star, Gold Glove, Silver Slugger, and World Series winner during his 19-year playing career, Baker has produced 12 postseason teams during his 25 -year managerial career, including nine division championships (San Francisco, 1997 \& 2000; Chicago, 2003; Cincinnati, 2010 \& 2012; Washington, 2016-17, Houston 2021-22, and three wild card appearances (San Francisco, 2002; Cincinnati, 2013; Houston, 2020).

Baker has World Series experience as a player, coach and manager, having played in the Fall Classic in 1977, 1978 and 1981 with the Dodgers. As a manager, prior to 2022, Baker guided both the 2002 Giants and 2021 Astros to the World Series and was a coach on the 1989 NL Champion Giants club.

Baker finished his Giants managerial career with 840 victories in San Francisco, which ranks third in club history. Following his stint with the Giants, Baker served as Cubs manager for four seasons (2003-06), where he enjoyed early success as well. Despite inheriting a club that had finished with a 67-95 record the previous season, Baker guided the Cubs to the NL Central Division title in 2003 with an $88-74$ mark. That club would ultimately fall just one win shy of reaching the World Series, falling to the Marlins in the NLCS in seven games. His 2003-04 Cubs teams were the first to post back-to-back winning records in Chicago since 1971-72.

A successful six-year stint in Cincinnati would follow, as he guided the Reds to three playoff appearances, including two NL Central Division titles. As a manager of the Nationals (2016-17), Baker won back-to-back NL East titles in both seasons at the helm.

Baker is also one of only two individuals in MLB history to produce at least 1,800 hits as a player and win at least 1,800 games as a manager, joining Joe Torre on that list. A seven-time All-Star (twice as a player: 1981 \& 1982; three times as a member of the coaching staff: 1994, 1997 \& 2001; twice as manager: 2003 \& 2022), Baker has had success at every managerial stop in his career. His teams have finished first or second 17 times in his 25 years, and Baker is just the seventh manager in MLB history to win 90 -plus games on 12-or-more occasions (source: Elias).

As a player, Baker tallied 242 home runs and 1,031 RBI in his 19-year career ( 2,039 games) that included stops with the Atlanta Braves (1968-1975), Los Angeles Dodgers (1976-1983), San Francisco Giants (1984) and Oakland Athletics (1985-1986). Baker finished in the top 10 in MVP voting twice ( 1980 \& 1981), and won two Silver Slugger Awards, a Gold Glove, and earned two All-Star selections.

Early in his career, as an everyday player with the Braves in the 1970s, Baker found himself hitting fifth, behind Hank Aaron, during the historic 1973 and 1974 seasons as Aaron closed in on the the all-time HR record.

Baker played in four postseasons (1977, 1978, 1981 \& 1983), which included three World Series (1977, 1978, 1981). He earned the NLCS MVP award with the Dodgers in 1977, hitting .357 with a .438 on-base percentage an .837 slugging percentage, two home runs and eight RBI in four games against Philadelphia), and a World Series ring, playing left field for the 1981 Dodgers.

Born Johnnie B. Baker Jr. on June 15, 1949 in Riverside, CA, "Dusty" Baker currently resides in California with his wife, Melissa, and has two children, Natosha and Darren. A 1967 graduate of Del Campo High School in Carmichael, Calif., Baker attended American River College in Sacramento, Calif. Baker's son, Darren, was selected by the Washington Nationals in the 2021 MLB Amateur Draft from the University of California (Berkley).

## MAJOR LEAGUE COACHING CAREER

Third Base Coach, Miami Marlins (2010-13); Third Base Coach, New York Yankees (2015-17); Bench Coach, Houston Astros (2018-present)

Joe Espada was named the Astros bench coach on Nov. 6, 2017.
The 2023 season is his sixth with the Astros and his 13th overall on a Major League coaching staff. In addition to his bench coach responsibilities, Espada also serves as infield coach and has mentored some of the game's biggest stars, including 2022 AL Gold Glove winner Jeremy Pena, who became the first rookie shortstop ever to win a Gold Glove. In 2021, both Carlos Correa and Yuli Gurriel earned Gold Glove Awards, while the Astros earned the Rawlings AL Team Gold Glove Award.

Additionally, under Espada's tutelage, the Astros have led the American League in fielding percentage in four of the last five seasons and have led the Majors in three of the last five seasons.

Prior to joining the Astros, Espada spent four seasons (2014-17) in the New York Yankees organization, first, as a professional scout in 2014, and then as third base coach from 2015-17. During his Yankees coaching tenure, the Yankees earned two playoff berths (2015 \& 2017), advancing to the ALCS in 2017.

A native of Santurce, Puerto Rico, Espada attended the University of Mobile (Ala.), where he still owns the school's top two single-season batting averages (. 468 in 1995 and .446 in 1996) and top overall career batting average of .442 . Drafted in the second round in the 1996 MLB Amateur Draft by the Oakland Athletics, Espada enjoyed a 10-year playing career, playing in the Oakland (1996-2000), Florida (2001), Colorado (2001), Kansas City (2002), St. Louis (2003), Texas (2003), and Tampa Bay (2004) organizations.

After retiring as a player, Espada started his coaching career, which began with the Marlins in 2006. The 2023 season will be Miller's third as Major League Pitching Coach. Previously, he served as the Astros bullpen coach for two seasons (2019-20).

The 2023 season will also mark his 17th season with the Astros and his fourth at the Major League level. Prior to joining the Major League staff, Miller spent the 2018 season as the organization's minor league pitching coordinator. He also served as the Astros complex pitching coordinator for two seasons from 2016-17, overseeing the Astros pitching programs at their complex in West Palm Beach, Fla.

Miller began his coaching career in 2013 as a pitching coach at Rookie Level Greeneville, which followed a twoyear stint as a pro scout for the Astros. He next spent three total seasons as Greeneville's pitching coach, helping to lead the club to an Appalachian League Championship title in 2015.

During his final season at the school in 2011, Snitker was named Peach Belt All-Conference after hitting . 340 with a team-best six home runs and 44 RBI, while starting behind the dish in all 54 of the Saints' games.

Snitker has a bachelor's degree in exercise science and a master's degree in physical education. He is also a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS).

Troy is the son of Atlanta Braves manager Brian Snitker, and is a graduate of Brookwood High School in Snellville, Ga.

## MAJOR LEAGUE COAGHING GAREER

First Base Coach, Houston Astros (2020-present)

In 2022, Omar López returned to his role as the Astros first base coach after filling in for Gary Pettis as the club's third base coach from September 2020 through the 2021 season while Pettis recovered from multiple myeloma.

The 2023 season is López' fourth on the Astros Major League staff, but his 25 th season in the Astros organization. He joined the Astros Major League staff in 2020 after a successful two-year stint as manager of the Double-A Corpus Christi Hooks (2018-19). In 2018, López was named the Texas League Manager of the Year after guiding the Hooks to an 82-56 record and a spot in the postseason.

In 2023, Lopez will miss a portion of the Astros Spring Training camp while serving as the manager for Team Venezuela in the World Baseball Classic, whose roster will include Jose Altuve, Luis Garcia and several other star Major League players. His Venezuela club will hold their early workouts at the Astros Spring Training complex in West Palm Beach before departing for the start of the tournament. Lopez, who was born in Valencia, VZ, has some previous experience participating in the World Baseball Classic as he served as the quality control coach for Venezuela in the 2017 WBC.

Overall, Lopez spent 12 seasons managing in the Astros farm system. Prior to managing the Hooks, he had stints at Buies Creek (2017), Quad Cities (2013-14, 2016), Lancaster (2015), Greeneville (2011-12), the Gulf Coast League (200910) and the Venezuelan Summer League (2008). In 2013, López led Quad Cities to a Midwest League Championship title after an 81-57 finish in the regular season. That team featured 16 future Major Leaguers, including two future All Stars in shortstop Carlos Correa and right-handed pitcher Lance McCullers Jr.

Additionally, López was named the Manager of the Year in the Venezuelan Professional Baseball League for the 2014-15 season after guiding the Caribes de Anzoategui to a league-best 39-24 regular season record and an LVBP Championship title in what was his first year as the club's manager. As a 38-year-old, López was the youngest manager in the league and became the third manager in the history of the Caribes club to win the prestigious award.

In 2010, López earned the Astros Player Development Man of the Year award, as he was credited with guiding the organization's Spanish-speaking prospects through their first year of professional baseball in the United States. Prior to starting his managerial career in 2008, López served as a hitting and infield instructor in the Astros Venezuelan program and was a full-time scout from 1999-2007. While in Venezuela, López was one of the scouts who recommended that the Astros sign Jose Altuve, who was a little-known, 16 -year-old free agent at the time.

A native of Valencia, Venezuela, López played three seasons of minor league baseball with the Chicago White Sox (1996-97) and Arizona Diamondbacks (1998). He played his first professional season with Rookie Level Bristol in 1996, leading the club in walks over 55 games. In 1997 at Bristol, the third baseman hit .276 with 23 RBI while setting career highs in almost every category. He finished his playing career in 1998 with Arizona's Class A affiliate at South Bend.

López and his wife, Helen, reside in Orlando, Fla. They have two children, Omar Eduardo and Emily Gabriela.

Gary Pettis returned to his familiar third base coaching box in 2022 after missing time while recovering from multiple myeloma. In 2021, Pettis was away from the club at the start of the season before returning in July, resuming his duties as the club's outfield and baserunning instructor.

Pettis was named the Astros third base coach on Oct. 17, 2014. In addition to that position, Pettis is the club's outfield and baserunning instructor. He played a key role in Kyle Tucker earning his first career Gold Glove Award in 2022. Additionally, Astros outfielders have the highest combined fielding percentage (.991) in the Majors from 2017-22.

Prior to joining the Astros, Pettis spent eight seasons (2007-14) on the Major League coaching staff of the Texas Rangers, spending his last two seasons (2013-14) as their third base coach after spending six seasons (2007-12) as the club's first base coach. Over those eight years, Pettis also served as the club's outfield and baserunning instructor.

Pettis also served on the Major League staffs of the New York Mets (2003-04) and Chicago White Sox (2001-02) as first base and outfield coach. Pettis began his coaching career as a roving minor league instructor for the Angels (1995) and White Sox (1997-2000), and later had a two-year stint as Milwaukee's Triple A hitting instructor (2005-06).

The former outfielder was a five-time Gold Glove winner during his 14-year Major League career with the California Angels (1982-87), Detroit Tigers (1988-89, 1992), Texas Rangers (1990-91) and San Diego Padres (1992). He amassed 354 career steals and stole at least 40 bases five times during his career, which included a pair of 50 -steal seasons. His Gold Gloves came in 1985, 1986, 1988, 1989 and 1990, which made him the fifth player in Major League history to win a Gold Glove with three different teams. Pettis hit . 346 ( $9 \times 26$ ) for the Angels in the 1986 ALCS vs. Boston.

Pettis makes his offseason home in San Clemente, Calif., with his wife Peggy. The couple has two daughters, Paige and Shaye, and two sons, Kyler and Dante. Dante, who currently is a receiver in the NFL for the Chicago Bears, was a second-round pick of the San Francisco 49ers in 2018 after starring as a consensus All-American at the University of Washington. He owns the NCAA record for career punt return touchdowns with nine. Kyler is a model/actor, who appeared on the television soap opera Days of Our Lives for four years (2015-18), appearing in over 120 episodes.

Jason Kanzler, who joined the Astros coaching staff as Major League coach in 2022, will make the transition to Astros assistant hitting coach in 2023.

This season is Kanzler's fifth in the Astros organization. In 2021, he served as minor league hitting coordinator. In 2020, he was to serve as hitting coach at Corpus Christi (AA), but when the minor league season was cancelled due to the pandemic, he ended up being one of the coaches assigned to the Astros alternate training sites (Univ. of Houston and Corpus Christi), which were formed as a result of the pandemic.

In 2019, which was his first in the Astros system, Kanzler was the hitting coach at Fayetteville (A).
Before becoming a coach, Kanzler spent three seasons (2013-15) as an outfielder in the Minnesta Twins farm system. He was selected by the Twins in the 20th round of the 2013 MLB amateur draft after starring at the University of Buffalo. His best minor league season came in 2014, when he hit a combined .282 in 111 games at Fort Myers (A) and Cedar Rapids (A) with nine triples, 12 home runs and 27 stolen bases. In 2015, he played in several Spring Training games with the Twins Major League club.

Kanzler enjoyed an oustanding career at the University of Buffalo, shining both offensively and defensively. In 2013, he hit . 330 in 57 games with six triples, 12 home runs and 53 RBI with a 1.008 OPS, earning Mid-American Conference Player of the Year honors. He was also named University of Buffalo Male Athlete of the Year that season as well. As a centerfielder, he became the first player in NCAA history to win two Rawlings Gold Glove Awards (2012-13). Kanzler earned a degree in psychology from Buffalo and is also a certified strength and conditioning specialist.

Michael Collins is in his sixth season with the Astros, and his fourth as a Major League coach. He spent his first two seasons as the Astros catching coach and bullpen catcher.

Collins joined the Astros in 2018 after a seven-year stint (2011-17) in the San Diego Padres organization, including a six-year run (2012-17) as a minor league manager. He last served as the manager in the Arizona Rookie League, holding that post for three seasons overall (2013, 2016-17). He also managed in the Dominican Summer League (2012), at Class A Fort Wayne (2014) and at Class A Lake Elsinore (2015). While with Fort Wayne, Collins led his club to a division championship and earned the Padres 2014 Jack Krol Award for his contributions to player development.

A native of Australia, Collins managed his hometown Canberra Cavalry team of the Australian Baseball League for six offseasons from 2012-18. In his six years on the job, he led Canberra to one Australian Baseball League Championship (2012-13) and two second place finishes (2013-14, 2017-18).

Collins is a former player, having played 10 years in minor league baseball with the Los Angeles-AL (2001-08) and San Diego (2009-10) organizations. He topped out at the Triple A level in 2009 and 2010, but had his best minor league season in 2005 at Class A Advanced Cedar Rapids. That season, Collins appeared in 100 games, hitting . 320 (116x363) with 32 doubles, seven home runs and 64 RBI with an .894 OPS.

Following his minor league career, Collins played two seasons (2010-11, 2011-12) for Canberra before taking the reigns as the club's manager in for the 2012-13 campaign.

A native of Canberra, Australia, Collins originally signed as a 16-year-old minor league free agent with the Angels in 2001.

Tommy Kawamura was announced as the Astros Major League game planning coach on Dec. 15, 2022, which is a new position for the club.

Although the 2023 season will be the first as part of the Major League coaching staff, Kawamura has played a significant role in the Astros baseball operations department for several years, most recently serving as manager of advance scouting. In that role, he worked in the clubhouse directly with the players, coaches and manager for all home and road games.

Kawamura first joined the Astros organization as a development coach at Double A Corpus Christi, serving in that role for the 2016 and 2017 seasons. He joined the Astros Major League staff as coordinator, Major League advance information in November of 2017. He would later be promoted to manager of advance scouting in November of 2020.

Prior to joining the Astros, Kawamura spent the 2015 season as a baseball operations intern with the New York Mets organization. Before joining the Mets, he was a video intern for Baseball Info. Solutions in 2014.

Kawamara is a graduate of Willamette University, in Salem, Oregon, where he was an infielder and four-year starter. He served as team captain for the varsity for two seasons. Kawamura earned a bachelors of arts degree at Willamette in mathematics and economics.

Jeremiah Randall was named the Astros Major League head athletic trainer on Nov. 9, 2015. The 2023 season will be his eighth atop the Astros athletic training staff.

Randall and his staff proved to be invaluable in 2020 and 2021 as they oversaw much of the Astros COVID-19 safety protocols as the club navigated through two challenging seasons. Randall oversaw the testing of players and staff, which became a daily occurrence in 2020 during the Astros extended playoff run.

Randall and his staff are recognized as one of the best in baseball, as the group was named the Major League Baseball Athletic Training Staff of the Year in 2017, an award that's given out by PBATS (Professional Baseball Athletic Trainers Society) and voted on by training staffs from throughout the league.

Prior to joining the Astros, Randall spent the previous three seasons with the Pittsburgh Pirates serving as the club's Major League rehab coordinator and physical therapist/assistant athletic trainer.

Prior to joining the Pirates, Randall worked two seasons with the Los Angeles Dodgers, serving as their minor league rehab coordinator in 2010 and as their Major League physical therapist for the 2011 season. In addition to his time in Major League Baseball, Randall spent time as an intern in the NFL with the Seattle Seahawks and New England Patriots. He has also presented at several national sports medicine conferences and has contributed as an author to various sports medicine and rehabilitation textbooks.

Currently, he is the principal investigator for the testing of several functional upper extremity assessment tools for use in the overhead throwing athlete. In addition to his clinical research, he has co-authored several case studies that are under peer review for publication in the American Journal of Sports Medicine.

Randall received his Doctor of Physical Therapy Degree in 2009 from the University of Miami (FL). While there, he conducted research involving active military members and aided in the development of the Comprehensive High-level Activity Mobility Predictor (CHAMP).

During his time at Tabor College, he was a three-year letterman in basketball and track and received all-conference honors in both sports.

ASSISTANT ATHLETIC TRAINER

Eric Velazquez joined the Astros organization in 2022 as Major League assistant athletic trainer.
Velazquez previously served as the athletic training coordinator for the Boston Red Sox from 2019-2021. Prior to that, he worked in the Boston system as an affiliate athletic trainer for the Triple A Pawtucket Red Sox for two seasons (2017-18) and for Double A Portland for one season (2016).

Velazquez began his career in baseball in 2010 with the New York Mets organization, working at their Dominican Republic Academy. He then was named as their Latin America coordinator in 2011. Over the next few seasons, he served as athletic trainer for Short-A Brooklyn (2012-2013) and Single-A Savannah (2014-2015).

Additionally, Velazquez has worked as an athletic trainer for the Dominican Winter League (2011), Arizona Fall League (2012), Venezuelan Winter League (2014-15) and the World Baseball Classic (2017).

Taylor Witczak joined the Astros organization in December of 2022 as assistant athletic trainer/physical therapist for the Major League club.

Witczak recently worked for the Miami Marlins during the 2021-22 seasons, serving as the minor league medical coordinator for most of 2022 and as minor league rehabilitation coordinator from 2021-22.

Prior to beginning his career in baseball, he completed a seasonal athletic training/physical therapy internship with the San Francisco 49ers during the 2020 season.

Witczak received his Bachelor's degree in athletic training and Doctorate of physical therapy from Grand Valley State University (MI), where he completed internships with EXOS, the Arizona Diamondbacks, and Northwestern University Football.

## TAYLOR RHOADES

## MAJOR LEAGUE STRENGTH \& CONDITIONING COACH

Taylor Rhoades is in his fourth season with the Astros Major League staff, and his second as the club's Major League strength \& conditioning coach. He spent the previous two years as the Astros assistant strength \& conditioning coach.

Prior to joining the big club, Rhoades spent his previous six years in the Astros minor league system, most recently serving as the club's assistant minor league strength and conditioning coordinator for two seasons (201819), working out of the Astros Spring Training complex in West Palm Beach, Fla.

Rhoades originally joined the Astros in 2014 as the atrength and conditioning coach for the Class A Short Season Tri-City ValleyCats. He then moved up to Class A Advanced Lancaster in 2015, where he was named the Astros strength and conditioning Coach of the Year. Rhoades then served as the strength and conditioning coach for Double A Corpus Christi in 2016 and Triple A Fresno in 2017.

Rhoades, who played on the baseball team at Bowling Green State University, spent six months working as a graduate assistant in the university's strength and conditioning department, where he worked mainly with the Olympic sport athletes. Rhoades also spent two summers working for the Class A Kane County Cougars of the Midwest League.


## HAZAEL WESSIN

## ASSISTANT MAJOR LEAGUE STRENGTH \& CONDITIONING COACH

Hazael Wessin joined the Astros Major League staff as an assistant strength and conditioning coach in 2022. A native of Santo Domingo in the Dominican Republic, Wessin is believed to be Major League Baseball's first full-time, Dominican-born strength and conditioning coach.

The 2023 season will be his ninth in the Astros organization, and his second at the Major League level. Prior to joining the Major League staff, Wessin served as strength coach for the Triple A Sugar Land Skeeters in 2021. In 2020, he was part of the staff assigned to the Astros alternate training site, which was a result of the 2020 minor league season being cancelled due to the pandemic.

In 2019, Wessin, who is fluent in Spanish, was the Astros Latin America strength and conditioning coordinator. Prior to that, he was the strength and conditioning coach for Class A Quad Cities in 2017 and Class A Advanced Buies Creek in 2018, with both of those clubs winning their respective titles.

Prior to joining the Astros, Wessin assisted the Boston Red Sox Dominican Summer League operations in 2014.
Wessin received his bachelor's degree in sports management from Faulkner University in 2014. He also received his associate of arts degree in liberal arts from Western Oklahoma State College in 2012, where he played catcher on the baseball team. In 2011, his Western Oklahoma State squad captured the NJCAA National Championship.

Additionally, Wessin is a certified strength and conditioning specialist (CSCS).

LISA CLARK
MAJOR LEAGUE DIETITIAN

Lisa Clarke began her position as the Major League dietitian in February of 2022. She serves as the nutritional resource for the Astros players, coaches, support staff and medical staff. As part of her duties, Clarke coordinates and executes nutrition programming, which includes medical nutrition therapy and performance nutrition. The athlete's progress is monitored and evaluated by combining their individual blood work, body composition, supplements, and hydration plans. Clarke oversees organization of home and travel nutrition and catering and assists with the development of the department's policies and procedures, and supervises the Triple A minor league dietitian.

Prior to her position as the Major League dietitian, she served as the Triple A minor league dietitian apprentice for the 2020 season and assisted the Major League club in the 2021 Postseason. In this position, Clarke oversaw the Triple A Minor League athletes' nutritional needs and individual performance fueling plans, as well as organized home and travel nutrition and catering.

Before working for the Astros, she was the director of sports nutrition at Lamar University in Beaumont, Texas, serving as the dietitian for 15 teams competing at the Division I level. In that position, she prioritized the nutrition care of high-risk athletes, provided regular team nutrition educations, and conducted consultations creating individualized performance nutrition plans for the athletes. Prior to Lamar Athletics, Clarke served as the primary sports dietitian for the spirit squads and assisted the football dietitian at the University of Texas at Austin. As a part of the Texas Performance Nutrition staff, her main responsibilities were to assess and provide nutrition interventions and education for the three spirit squads and assist the football dietitian in execution of the football athletes' nutrition needs.

Clarke earned her bachelor's degree in nutritional sciences from the University of Texas at Austin and completed her master's degree in sports nutrition at Auburn University. She is a registered dietitian, licensed in the state of Texas, and is a certified specialist in Sports Dietetics (CSSD).


JAVIER BRACAMONTE

BULLPEN CATCHER

Javier Bracamonte has spent the last 22 seasons as the Astros bullpen catcher, joining the club in that role in 2001. In his role, Javier, who wears jersey number 85, travels to Spring Training and on every road trip assisting the coaching staff by catching bullpens, throwing batting practice and hitting infield practice.

During his time with Houston, Javier has taken part in six MLB All-Star Games, including as the batting practice pitcher in the Home Run Derby for Alex Bregman in 2018-19. He also took part in the 2004 All-Star Game in Houston, catching bullpens and working pregame activities. He would also pitch batting practice in the next two All-Star Games, throwing to Andruw Jones and Jason Bay in 2005 in Detroit and to Miguel Cabrera in Pittsburgh in 2006.

A former shortstop and second baseman, Bracamonte played at the New York Yankees Venezuelan Academy from 1988-90, which made him just the third Venezuelan to sign a professional contract after serving as a bat boy in the Venezuelan Winter League. He would join the Astros organization in 2001 after five years of giving private baseball lessons.

Born in Caracas, Venezuela, he now resides in Houston, Texas, with his wife, Katie, and his daughters, Jaelyn and Jade. His son Gustavo,currently works in the Miami Marlins organization.

## CARL SCHNEIDER

## CLUBHOUSE MANAGER

Carl Schneider, who has been with the Astros organization since 1989, became the Astros clubhouse manager in 2011. While with the Astros, Schneider has worked 16 Astros playoff runs, four All-Star Games (1998, 2003-04, 2018) and six World Series (2005, 2017, 2019, 2021-22).

In 2020, Schneider was named the winner of the Fred Hartman Long and Meritorious Service to Baseball Award, named by the Houston Chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America.

Additionally, in 2017, Schneider was named the winner the Pete Sheehy Clubhouse Award (Clubhouse Manager of the Year), which is given out annually to a home and visiting clubhouse manager, and voted on by the MLB Clubhouse Manager's Association.

Schneider, who is one of the longest-tenured employees in the organization, originally joined the Astros in 1989 as a bat boy and also handled clubhouse duties during the baseball season. He joined the home clubhouse staff full time in 1995 and would work in that role until assuming the clubhouse manager duties in 2011.

A Texas native, Schneider currently resides in Houston where he has enjoyed raising his sons Zachry and Max and daughters Amie and Madyson. Schneider's oldest son, Zach, is currently a left-handed pitcher at Truman State University in Missouri.


## STEVE PERRY

## visiting clubhouse manager

Steve Perry has worked for the Astros organization since 1979 and has served as the visiting clubhouse manager since 1989.

Over the years, Perry has developed a fine reputation in Major League Baseball for his work. He is a three-time winner (2000, 2008-09) of the Pete Sheehy Clubhouse Award (Clubhouse Manager of the Year), which is given out annually to a home and visiting clubhouse manager. The award is voted on by his peers within the MLB Clubhouse Manager's Association.

He also earned the Fred Hartman Long and Meritorious Service to Baseball Award in 2013, named by the Houston Chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America.

Perry joined the Astros as a bat boy at the start of the 1979 season, but by the All-Star Break was promoted to an assistant in the visiting clubhouse. He was named visiting clubhouse manager in 1989, and has filled that role since. During his Astros tenure, Steve has worked five All-Star games and 16 postseason runs.

Perry is fluent in Spanish, having spent several years of his childhood in South America after his father was relocated for work. He and his wife, Jessica, reside in Houston and have two daughters, Nicole and Amanda.

Grew up playing youth baseball and basketball in the Dominican Republic...at the age of 14, was requested by his mother to choose baseball or basketball as a singular focus...chose baseball and was rewarded with a professional contract just two years later...still loves the game of basketball, and in Spring Training of 2019 , Abreu, who was an unknown prospect at the time, was selected by Justin Verlander to be his partner during the team's annual basketball shooting contest... Abreu grew up idolizing Verlander and still holds that idol today.
During his time in the minors, learned to speak English through the Astros ESL program.... has great confidence in his English skills and looks for opportunities to improve and utilize his English abilities...at times in his minor league career, has helped Spanish-speaking teammates as an interpreter for interviews.
As a prospect, was a longterm project of former Astros pitching coach Brent Strom, who always believed in Abreu's abilities...in the offseason prior to the 2022 season, honed in on improving his command with the assistance of Astros minor league pitching coach Erick Abreu, who has worked with Bryan at various levels of the Astros organization since his professional debut in 2014.
After that offseason work, had a breakout 2022 season and postseason behind an overpowering arsenal of a 97 mph fastball and a high spin rate slider...primarily mixes those two pitches, throwing the fastball $45 \%$ of the time, compared to the slider at $44 \%$... his fastball topped out at 100.8 in 2022, the hardest pitch of his Major League career
Was added to the Astros 40-man roster on Nov. 20, 2018... is currently signed to a one-year contract for the 2023 season...received 1.000 full year of service time in 2022 and is still under control by the Astros for another four years.

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Slugging veteran first baseman joined the Astros as a free agent this offseason...is a former American League MVP (2020), Rookie of the Year (2014), three-time ALL-STAR $(2014,2018,2019)$ and a three-time Silver Slugger Award recipient (2014, 2018, 2020)...is one of 25 players in MLB history to win both MVP and Rookie of the Year honors during their career.
- Prior to this year, spent his entire nine-year Major League career with the Chicago White Sox, hitting .292 ( $1445 \times 4954$ ) with 243 home runs, 863 RBI, 697 runs and a 860 OPS (. 354 OBP/ . 506 SLG)...from 201422 , led the American League in total bases $(2,509)$, and games played ( 1,270 )...also ranked second in hits $(1,445)$ and RBI $(863)$ and third in home runs (243)...additionally, has played in 152 or more games in six of his eight full seasons in Majors...in the COVID-shortened 2020 season, he played in all 60 of the White Sox games.
- Ranks among White Sox all-time leaders in homers (3rd, 243), slugging (3rd, .506), HBP (3rd, 117), OPS (4th, .860), extra-base hits (5th, 562), RBI (5th, 863), doubles ( 6 th, 303 ) and total bases ( 7 th, 2,509 ).
- With the White Sox in 2022, Abreu batted .304 (183x601) with 15 home runs, 75 RBI, a career-high 62 walks, and a . 824 OPS (. 378 OBP/. 446 SLG.)...he also ranked second in hits, third in multi-hit games (53) and fifth in batting average in the AL.
- In 2020, Abreu earned the AL MVP after he batted .317 ( $76 \times 240$ ) with 19 home runs, 60 RBI, 148 total bases and a . 987 OPS during the COVID-shortened season...he led the AL in hits, RBI, slugging percentage and total bases.. became the only player in White Sox history to lead the Majors in RBI
- In seven career POSTSEASON games, Abreu has hit .321 ( $9 \times 28$ ) with a home run and five RBI ( 871 OPS)... his two career postseason series were the 2020 Wild Card round at OAK and the 2021 ALDS vs. Houston... hit .357 ( $5 \times 14$ ) in the ALDS.
- Has won the AL Player of the Month Award four times: April 2014, July 2014, July/August 2020 and August 2021...was named AL Rookie of the Month in April, June and July 2014.
- Prior to signing with the White Sox, had an incredible 10-year career playing for Cienfuegos in Cuba's Serie Nacional...hit . 341 ( $884 \times 2592$ ) with 178 homers in 640 career games in Cuba.


## NOTES

Was born and raised in Cruces, which is a small town in the Cienfuegos Province in Cuba....Cruces is around 150 miles southeast of Havana, the Cuban capital city...in Cuba, players compete for their provinces, so at the age of 16, Abreu joined Cienfuegos in Cuba's top league, the Serie Nacional.
Played 10 seasons (2004-13) with Cienfuegos before defecting in August of 2013...played in multiple International tournaments throughout his Cuban career, which exposed his talents to the rest of the baseball world...last competed Internationally for Cuba in the 2013 World Baseball Classic, during which he made the decision to eventually defect.
Defected in August of 2013 along with his wife, Yusmary, his parents, his sister and her husband... had to leave behind his two-year old son Dariel, due to the dangerous nature of their defection...went over two years without seeing his son before returning to Cuba as part of Major League Baseball's goodwill tour in December of 2015 ...Dariel resides in Cuba with his mother, but has been able to visit his father in Miami on visitor visas dating back to the 2016 season.
At the time of his defection, first went to Haiti, where he established residency, then on to the Dominican Republic, living in Santo Domingo...worked out in showcases for three months before signing with the White Sox as a free agent on Oct. 29, 2013.
Wears the number 79 in honor of his mother, Daisy Correa, who was the driving force behind the families defection from Cuba....when signing with the White Sox, José asked his mother to pick a jersey number that would stand out, and she chose \#79...he's now set to become the first player to wear \#79 in a regular season game in Astros history.
IN THE COMMUNITY: Throughout his time in Chicago, established the "Abreu's Amigos", which were visits to the ballpark by special-needs youth from the Easterseals, a nationwide organization dedicated to children and adults with disabilities.
After nine seasons (2014-22) in Chicago, signed on with the Astros on Nov. 28, 2022...signed a threeyear deal, which will keep Abreu in an Astros uniform through at least the 2025 season.

## $२ 022$ SEASON:

- Played in 157 games in his final season in Chicago, hitting .304 ( $183 \times 601$ ) with 40 doubles, 15 home runs, 75 RBI, a career-high 62 walks, and a .824 OPS (. 378 OBP/. 446 SLG).
- With 75 RBI on the season, got his career total up to 863 , which ranks second in the Majors since making his debut in 2014.
- Hit 30 -plus doubles for his eighth straight full season (15 in 2020).

- Was the White Sox OPENING DAY first baseman for the eighth straight season...hit safely for the seventh time on Opening Day on April 1 at LAA.
- Connected on his third career grand slam on April 2 at Angel Stadium...also marked the first slam of the MLB season...hit his second grand slam of the season off Keynan Middleton in the 8th on April 6 at SEA...became the first player in Sox history to hit a slam for his first two home runs of a season.
- Drove in three runs on May 12 vs. MIN to become the 11th player in franchise history to reach 700 RBI... joined Rafael Palmeiro, José Canseco, Tony Pérez, Tony Oliva and Kendrys Morales as the only Cubanborn players in baseball history with 200-plus homers and 700-plus RBI.
- Left on May 14 vs. KC after colliding with Hunter Dozier on the first-base line during a pop up...suffered a facial contusion and laceration but tested negative for a concussion...was in the lineup the following night vs. the Royals and homered in the 4th inning.
- Was named AL Player of the Week for May 24-30, his sixth career weekly honor, after going $9 \times 24$ (.375) with two doubles, two home runs, 10 RBI and four walks in seven games...drove in five runs, including a tworun homer, in the doubleheader sweep on May 29 vs. BAL...snapped a 5-5 tie with a game-winning sacrifice fly in the 8th on May 31 at CLE.
- Was named AL Player of the Month for August, his fourth career monthly honor...batted .330/.382/.661 ( $37 \times 112$ ) with seven doubles, 10 home runs, 25 RBI and 22 runs scored over 28 games to win his second consecutive August AL Player of the Month Award.
- Hit the first-ever regular-season home run in the state of lowa in the "MLB at Field of Dreams" Game on Aug. 12 vs. the Yankees, a solo shot off Andrew Heaney in the 1st inning.
- In the POSTSEASON, went $5 \times 14$ (.357) with three RBI, a run scored, two walks and two HBP in the ALDS loss to Houston...went 2-4 with a RBI in both Game 1 and 2 at Minute Maid Park.

- Ranked among the AL leaders in numerous categories...was the only player to rank in the Top 5 of the following categories in the AL: hits (1st, 76), RBI (1st, 60), slugging percentage (1st, .617), extrabase hits (1st, 34), total bases (1st, 148), home runs (2nd, 19), average (4th, .317) and OPS (5th, .987).
- Became the first player in White Sox history to lead the Major Leagues in RBI.
- Became the first qualifying player to record as many RBI (60) as games played (60) in a season since the Cubs' Sammy Sosa (160) and Cleveland's Juan González (140) in 2001.
Was on a 162-game pace to record 205 hits, 51 home runs, 162 RBI, 92 extra-base hits and 400 total bases.
- Ranked among the MLB Statcast leaders in 95-plus mph contact (3rd, 97) and total barrels (T-3rd 26).
- Made his seventh straight OPENING DAY start at . first base on July 24 vs. MIN.
- Recorded a career-high, 22-game hitting streak from Aug. 16-Sept. 9...batted .370/.414/.772 (34x92) with seven doubles, 10 home runs, 28 RBI, 18 runs scored and a 1.186 OPS during the streak....marked the longest hitting streak in MLB in 2020...also marked the longest hitting streak by a Cuban-born player since Rafael Palmeiro in 1994 ( 24 games).
- Was named AL Player of the Month for the third time in his career in July/August after hitting .315/.359/.636 ( $45 \times 143$ ) with 10 doubles, 12 home runs, 32 RBI, a . 996 OPS over 35 games.
- Was named AL Player of the Week for Aug. 1723 (fifth career weekly honor) after batting .533/.563/1.333 (16x30) with three doubles, seven home runs, 15 RBI and nine runs scored...became the second player in Sox history to hit .500 or better with at least seven homers and 15 RBI over a sevengame span...OF Albert Belle hit .517 with eight home runs and 17 RBI from July 10-15, 1998.
- Was among the AL Leaders in RBI (1st, 123); games (5th, 159); HBP (T-5th, 13); hits (7th, 180); TB (8th, 319); PA (8th, 693)...reached 300 total bases for the fourth time in his career.
- Led the AL with a career-high 123 RBI, joining Dick Allen (113 in 1972) as the only players in White Sox history to accomplish the feat.

Was placed on the 10-day injured list on Aug. 22 following surgery to repair a testicular torsion... returned to the lineup on Sept. 10...missed the final 13 games following a procedure to treat an infection in his right thigh (played his final game on Sept. 16).

- Was the White Sox nominee for the Roberto Clemente Award.
- Ranked fourth in the AL with a . 360 (59x164) average vs. LHP and 10 th with a .337 ( $56 \times 166$ ) mark with RISP.
- Collected nine straight RISP hits from April 22-May 1, the longest streak in MLB since Troy Tulowitzki in 2014 (Elias).
- Went $4 \times 5$ with a homer and five RBI on April 26 vs. DET....would have recorded a multi-homer game in the 7th but passed Tim Anderson on the bases and was credited with a single.
- Broke up Justin Verlander's bid for a no-hitter with a solo home run in the 7th inning on May 21 at HOU.
- Hit a game-ending, three-run home run in the 12th on July 3 vs. DET....marked his second career walkoff homer (also April 25, 2014 vs. TB).

- Joined Al Simmons (1924-34), Albert Pujols (200110), Ted Williams (1939-42, '46-49) and Joe DiMaggio (1936-42) as the only six players in history to record 100-plus RBI in his first four-plus seasons.
Ranked among the AL leaders in average vs. LHP (3rd, .356) and with RISP (3rd, .357).
Reached base on an error, advanced to second and third base and scored on three wild pitches on 5 May 13 vs. SD... was the first White Sox player to accomplish the feat since J.C. Martin on 7/14/1961 vs. the Yankees (Elias).
- Was named AL Player of the Week for May 22-28 after batting .452 ( $14 \times 31$ ) with three doubles, two home runs, five RBI, seven runs scored and a 1.194 OPS (fourth career weekly honor).

Recorded the sixth cycle in White Sox history on Sept. 9 vs. SF and first since José Valentín on April 27,2000 vs. BAL... hit his 29th home run in the first, doubled in the third, singled in the seventh and tripled in the eighth...according to Elias, became the first Cuban-born player in Major-League history to record a cycle.

## 2016 SEASON:

- Recorded his third consecutive season of 30-plus doubles, 25 -plus home runs and 100-plus RBI.
- Joined Albert Pujols and Joe DiMaggio as the only players in Major League history to record the following numbers in his first three-plus seasons: 25 -plus home runs, 100 -plus RBI and 175 -plus hits.
- Reached base in a career-high 29 consecutive games from Aug. 2-Sept. 2.
- Played in front of his son, Dariel, for the first time in his career on Aug. 12 at Miami...his son was visiting the U.S. from Cuba.


## २ 015 SEASON:

- Became just the second player in Major League history to record 30 -plus home runs with 100 -plus RBI in each of his first two seasons, joining Albert Pujols (2001-02 with St. Louis).


## 2014 SEASON:

- In his rookie season, led the AL in SLG (.581), while ranking second in TB (323) and OPS (.964), third in HR (36), and fourth in RBI (107) and XBH (73)... became the first rookie in Major League history to rank among the Top 5 in his league in each Triple Crown category.
- Was named AL Rookie of the Year by the BBWAA, Sporting News and Baseball America...was a unanimous choice by the BBWAA (ninth overall in AL)...also received the Players Choice AL Outstanding Rookie.
- Placed fourth in the AL MVP voting.
- Won his first AL Silver Slugger Award...he and Alexei Ramírez became the first Cuban-born teammates to win the award in the same season.
- Was named an AL ALL-STAR, becoming just the fifth White Sox rookie to accomplish the feat...Abreu and Ramírez also became the eighth set of Cuban teammates to be All-Stars (last, Minnesota's Tony Oliva and Leo Cárdenas in 1971).
- Went $2 \times 4$ with a double, RBI and run scored on OPENING DAY vs. MIN...doubled off Ricky Nolasco in his first at-bat.
- Earned AL Player of the Month honors in April and July and Rookie of the Month for April, June and July...became the first rookie to be named Player of the Month twice in one season and fourth player to earn three-plus rookie awards.
- Joined Pujols and Ryan Braun (2007-08) as the only players in baseball history to hit 30 or more homers in each of his first two seasons.
- Hit his first career OPENING DAY homer on April 6 at KC.
- Became the first AL player ever to receive both honors in his first month in the Majors...joined the Dodgers' Yasiel Puig (June 2013) as the only players in history to be named Player of the Month in his first month in the majors.
- Hit $.270(31 \times 115)$ with eight doubles, 10 homers and 32 RBI through April, earning both AL Player and Rookie of the Month awards...set Major League rookie records in home runs, RBI, extra-base hits (19) and total bases (71) through April.
- Was walked intentionally twice on April 2 vs. MIN, becoming the first player since 1955 (when the stat was first tracked) to accomplish the feat within his first two games.
- Became the first rookie since Minnesota's Kent Hrbek in 1982 to lead the Majors in home runs and RBI through April.
- Won June Rookie of the Month honors after batting .313 (31x99) with 10 homers, 22 RBI and a .677 slugging.
- Was named AL Player of the Month for July after hitting .374/.432/.667 (37x99) with 11 doubles, six homers and 19 RBI....became the fourth rookie to earn three-plus Rookie of the Month honors (also Ichiro Suzuki, Mike Trout and Jason Bay).

- Played in 42 games for Cienfuegos during a shortened season in 2013...led Serie Nacional in homers (19), slugging percentage (.604) and total bases (163) and ranked second in average (.345)... was named the All-Star first baseman for the fourth consecutive year...represented Cuba at the WBC.
- His 35 home runs in 2012 were the second-most in Serie Nacional history finished second in the Most Valuable Player voting...led the league in AVG (.394), OBP (.542), SLG (.837) and HBP (22), and ranked second in homers (2nd) and RBI (99).
- Was named the 2011 MVP of Serie Nacional, becoming the second winner in Ciengfuegos history...established a then league record with 33 home runs (shared with Yoenis Céspedes)...led the league in average (.453), slugging percentage (.986) and ranked second in RBI (93)...represented Cuba at the Baseball World Cup and Pan American Games... was named the World Cup MVP after hitting .442 with three home runs and 10 RBI over 11 games...batted .524 with three homers and nine RBI on Cuba's bronze medal winning team at the Pan Am Games.

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- The eight-time All-Star (2012, 2014-18, 2021-22), five-time Silver Slugger (2014-17, 2022), three-time AL Batting Champion (2014, 2016, 2017), 2015 Gold Glover, 2017 AL MVP and 2019 ALCS MVP has played in 12 Major League seasons (2011-22), posting a 307 (1935x6305) batting average with 379 doubles, 986 runs, 192 homers, 279 steals and an .830 OPS (. 362 OBP/. 468 SLG) in 1,578 career Major League games.

## NOTES

Signed by Houston as a 16-year-old non-drafted free agent out of Maracay, Venezuela, on Sept. 27, 2006... the Astros Venezuelan Coordinator at the time, Pablo Torrealba, and a local Astros scout, Wolfgang Ramos, are credited with the signing of Altuve, which might be the most influential signing in Astros history...in addition to those two men, Omar López, who was the club's Venezuelan team manager at the time, and Al Pedrique, the Astros former Special Assistant, also had strong ties to the signing...coincidentally, López now serves on the Astros Major League coaching staff.
As it's been written, it took Altuve many trips to the Astros Venezuelan Academy to receive a contract offer from the club....he eventually made believers out of every staffer, but not yet the organization... Torrealba, Ramos and López all pleaded with Pedrique to visit the academy himself to take a look at Altuve... Pedrique agreed, made the trip, and came away a believer...Pedrique then made the pitch to Astros General Manager Tim Purpura, who signed off on the deal...Altuve signed for just $\$ 15,000$, and according to Lopez, would have signed for free for just an opportunity to play baseball.
Sixteen years after his signing, Altuve now has eight All-Star Game selections under his belt (2012, 201418, 2021-22), including starting nods in 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2022...is the first player in franchise history to be named an All-Star starter five times, besting Hall of Famer Craig Biggio (1995-98), who started the All-Star Game four times in his career.
IN THE COMMUNITY: Jose and his wife Nina have undertook several charitable initiatives in his career with the Astros, which has earned Jose three team nominations for the Roberto Clemente Award (2013, 2017, 2022), which goes to a Major League player who best represents the game of baseball through extraordinary character, community involvement, philanthropy and positive contributions, both on and off the field...Jose and Nina focus their efforts on children's causes, which has included providing support to children with serious illnesses and providing meals to child services.

- ALCS VS. NYY: Was named the 2019 ALCS MVP after batting $.348(8 \times 23)$ with one double, two homers, three RBI, four walks, six runs scored and a 1.097 OPS (. 444 OBP/. 652 SLG) in six games.
- Hit a two-run walkoff homer off Aroldis Chapman in the bottom of the 9th inning in Game 6 of the ALCS vs. NYY to send the Astros to the World Series.

Was the fifth series-clinching walkoff homer in League Championship Series history, joining Travis Ishikawa's walkoff HR for SF in Game 5 of the 2014 NLCS vs. STL, Magglio Ordonez' walkoff HR for DET in Game 4 of the 2006 ALCS vs. OAK, Aaron Boone's walkoff HR for NYY in Game 7 of the 2003 ALCS and Chris Chambliss' walkoff HR for NYY in Game 5 of the 1976 ALCS vs. KC.

- Had his sixth-career All-Star season, ranking third in the AL in average (.316) and sixth in OBP (.386).
- Served his first-career stint on the Injured List from July 26-Aug. 21 (right knee soreness)...prior to his DL placement, was leading the Majors in hits.
- Led the Majors in road batting average with his . 349 ( $94 \times 269$ ) mark...marked the third-consecutive season that he led the Majors in road batting.
- Led the Majors in batting average in the 7th inning-or-later with a .380 average ( $57 \times 150$ ), a franchise record for a single season (previously Lance Berkman, .371 in 2004).
- Led the Majors in All-Star fan votes, becoming the first player in franchise history to do so...was his fourth-consecutive fan-elected start at second base.
- Became the second player in club history to start four All-Star Games, joining Craig Biggio (1995-98).
- OPENING DAY: Made his seventh-career Opening Day roster, and seventh Opening Day start at second base on March 29 at TEX.
- Played in his 1,000 th career game on April 10 at MIN.
- Recorded 1,272 career hits within his first 1,000 career games, the second-most by a foreign-born player in MLB history behind only Ichiro ( 1,414 hits).
- Played in his 500th career game at Minute Maid Park on April 27 vs. OAK.
- Posted 41 hits prior to May, the second-most in club history prior to May of a single season behind Derek Bell and his 45 hits in 1998.
- On May 6 at ARI, became the seventh player in club history to hit a triple on his birthday.
- Logged his 1,000 th career game at second base on May 22 vs. SF...became the third player in Astros history to play 1,000 games at the position, joining Craig Biggio $(1,990)$ and Bill Doran $(1,138)$.


## 2017 SEASON:

- Was named the 2017 American League MVP in what was his fifth All-Star season, joining Jeff Bagwell (1994) as the only players in Astros history to win an MVP Award
- Won the 2017 Hank Aaron Award, his fourth consecutive Silver Slugger award, his second consecutive Sporting News Player of the Year nod, the Sports Illustrated Sportsperson of the Year award, the Esurance Best Major Leaguer award, and the MLB Player of the Year and the AL Most Outstanding Player at the Player Choice Awards...also received the Lou Gehrig Memorial Award.
- Received an AL Player of the Month award (July) and an AL Player of the Week award (July 3-9).

Recorded a hit in 10 consecutive at-bats spanning three games (May 25-27), topping his previous franchise record of hits in eight straight at-bats that he set in 2017.

- Combined for back-to-back-to-back homers with George Springer and Alex Bregman on June 20 vs. TB (Springer-Bregman-Altuve)...was the sixth time in club history that the Astros hit three consecutive homers in an inning, and the first since May 2, 2008 vs. MIL (Miguel Tejada-Lance Berkman-Carlos Lee).
- Recorded 129 hits prior to the All-Star Break, the second-most in franchise history for a single season and one shy of his club record of 130 set in 2014.
- Hit safely in 22 consecutive starts at home from June 2-July 14, the longest streak by an Astro in Minute Maid Park history....was the second-longest home streak in franchise history, behind Rusty Staub's 25game streak at the Astrodome in 1967.
- Went $1 \times 3$ as the starting second baseman in the 2018 ALL-STAR Game at Nationals Park...his single was his first-career hit in an All-Star Game.
- Became the ninth second baseman in AL history to start four All-Star Games, joining Roberto Alomar (9), Rod Carew (8), Nellie Fox (8), Charlie Gehringer (6), Joe Gordon (5), Bobby Doerr (5), Robinson Cano (5) and Willie Randolph (4).
- POSTSEASON: Batted 265 ( $9 \times 34$ ) with two doubles, one homer and four RBI in eight postseason games... reached base in all eight games.
- ALDS VS. CLE: Homered off Corey Kluber in Game 1 of the ALDS vs. CLE, going back-to-back with George Springer...was the fourth set of back-to-back home runs by the Astros in postseason history (first since Altuve and Carlos Correa in Game 2 of the 2017 World Series at LAD)
- Underwent surgery on his right knee on Oct. 19.
- Won his third-career and second consecutive batting title as he led the AL with a career-high . 346 batting average...led the Majors in batting average by 15 points, topping Charlie Blackmon (.331).
Joined Ty Cobb (11), Rod Carew (7), Ted Williams (6), Wade Boggs (5), Nap Lajoi (5), Miguel Cabrera (4), Harry Heilman (4), George Brett (3), Tony Oliva (3), Carl Yastrzemski (3) and Joe Mauer (3) as the only AL players to win three-or-more batting titles.
- Led the AL in hits (204), becoming the first player in MLB history to be the outright leader in hits in his league in four consecutive seasons.
Was his fourth-career (and fourth consecutive) 200hit season.
- Became the fourth right-handed hitter in MLB history to reach 200 hits in four straight seasons, joining Simmons, Puckett and Young.
- Led the AL in multi-hit games (59) and the Majors in games with at least three hits (23).
- Led the Majors in WAR (8.4, Baseball-Reference).
- Led the AL in infield hits (35), ranked tied for second in runs (112), third in OBP (.410), third in steals (32), third in OPS (.957), fifth in total bases (323), sixth in SLG (.547) and tied for ninth in doubles (39).
- Posted his sixth consecutive 30 -steal season, the only MLB player to do so in that six-season span... joined Cesar Cedeño (1972-77) as the only Astros with six consecutive 30-steal seasons.
- Posted a batting average above .290 and an OPS above 850 in every month.
- Posted a .441 ( $26 \times 59$ ) batting average in close and late situations, which led all Major League hitters.
- Hit . 381 (112x294) on the road, which led the Majors and was the highest mark by a Major Leaguer since Ichiro Suzuki hit 405 on the road in 2004.
- Led MLB hitters in batting average against righthanded pitchers with a .344 ( $155 \times 451$ ) mark.
- Made his sixth consecutive OPENING DAY roster.
- Stole the 200th base of his career on April 9 vs. KC.
- Reached base safely in 11 consecutive plate appearances from April 11-14, going $8 \times 11$ (.727) with four walks and three doubles over a threegame span...became the first Astros player to reach in 11 straight plate appearances since Bill Spiers set a franchise record by reaching in 13 straight plate appearances in 1997.
- Went $4 \times 5$ with two doubles, two triples and an RBI on May 17 at MIA, becoming the first player in club history to hit two doubles and two triples in a single game, and the 12th player in MLB history to do so (first since Carl Crawford in 2005).
- Received his fifth career ALL-STAR nod, and third-career fan-elected start at second base after finishing second among all AL players in votes with $3,880,372$, behind only Aaron Judge ( $4,488,702$ ).
- Became the second player in club history to start three straight All-Star Games, joining Craig Biggio (1995-98 at 2B).
- Named the AL Player of the Month for July after leading the Majors in batting (.485), hits (48), OBP (.523), OPS (1.251) and total bases (72)...was the highest batting average by an Astros player in any month in club history.
- Was named the AL Player of the Week for the week of July 3-9...was his third career weekly award...during the week, he hit . 625 ( $15 \times 24$ ) with two doubles, two homers, 10 RBI , two steals and a 1.625 OPS in five games, leading the AL in batting, OBP and OPS.
- Recorded three hits in five consecutive games from July 4-9, setting a club record for consecutive threehit games...became the ninth player in Major League history to record at least three hits in five straight games, and the first since George Brett, who tied the Major League record with a six-game run in 1976.

Recorded consecutive four-hit games from July 2324, tying a franchise record for most consecutive four-hit games.
POSTSEASON: Batted .310 ( $22 \times 71$ ) with two doubles, seven HR, 14 RBI, two steals and a 1.021 OPS (. 388 OBP/. 634 SLG) in 18 postseason games.

- Set a franchise record for hits in a single postseason with 22, surpassing Carlos Beltrán's record of 20 set in 2004...marked the second-most hits by a second baseman in a single postseason in MLB history, behind only Marty Barrett (1986).
- Set an MLB record for RBI as a second baseman in a single postseason with 14.
- His seven HR tied for the most by a second baseman in a single postseason with Daniel Murphy (2015).
- Tied the fourth-most homers in a single postseason in MLB history, regardless of position.
- Hit six of his homers at Minute Maid Park, tying a MLB record for the most home runs at home in a single postseason (also Jayson Werth in 2009).
- Tied a Major record for most three-hit games in a single postseason with four, joining Albert Pujols (2004), Edgar Martinez (1995) and Jay Buhner (1995).
- ALDS VS. BOS: Hit three home runs in Game 1, hitting two off LHP Chris Sale...became the first player in club history with a three-homer game in the postseason, and the ninth player in MLB history to do so (first since Pablo Sandoval in 2012 World Series Game 1).
- Hit back-to-back homers off Sale with Alex Bregman in the 1st inning of Game 1, making the Astros the fifth team in AL history to hit back-to-back HR in the 1st inning of a postseason game (first since Detroit in 2011).
- Became the first player in club history to record multiple hits in each of his first three games of a single postseason.
- WORLD SERIES VS. LAD: Hit a go-ahead solo homer to lead off the 10th inning of Game 2 of the World Series, homering off his former teammate RHP Josh Fields...was the 18th extra-innings homer in World Series history, and the first since David Freese's walkoff homer for the Cardinals in Game 6 of the 2011 World Series vs. TEX.
- Became the 13th player in MLB history to post a game with three hits, four RBI and three runs scored in the World Series when he did so in Game 5...hit a game-tying, three run homer off Kenta Maeda in that game.
- Was tabbed as an All-Star for the fourth time in his career...received the Sporting News Player of the Year, MLBPA Player's Choice Player of the Year, MLBPA Player's Choice AL Most Outstanding Player and his third-consecutive Silver Slugger Award.
- Won the AL batting title and led the AL in hits for the second time in his career with a . 338 average and 216 hits.
- Became the first second baseman in Major League history to reach 100 runs, 200 hits, 40 doubles, 20 $\mathrm{HR}, 95 \mathrm{RBI}$ and 30 stolen bases in one season, and the sixth player regardless of position in history with this distinction (source: Elias).
- Ranked in the top-five in the AL in several categories: batting average (1st, .338), hits (1st, 216), four-hit games (1st, 8), three-hit games (T-1st, 23), steals (T-2nd, 30), WAR (3rd, 7.7), doubles (T-3rd, 42), total bases (4th, 340), OBP (4th, .396) and OPS (5th, .928)
- Was the Astros MVP as voted by the Houston Chapter of the BBWAA and was the Astros nominee for the 2016 Hank Aaron Award.
- Batted .376 on the road, tops in the Majors.
- Named AL Player of the Month in June after hitting . 420 ( $42 \times 100$ ) with six doubles, 4 HR, 15 RBI, six steals and a 1.112 OPS (. 492 OBP/. 620 SLG) in 26 games... led all AL players in batting average, establishing a franchise record for the month of June (min. 75PA).
- Started his second consecutive All-Star Game.
- Reached 200 hits for the third straight season, the first player to do so since Ichiro Suzuki (2001-10).
- He and shortstop Carlos Correa each had 96 RBI, becoming the first AL middle infield combo to reach 95 or more RBI in the same season since 1950, when Red Sox SS Bobby Doerr (120) and 2B Vern Stephens (144) turned the trick.
- His eight games with four-or-more hits were the most in franchise history for a single season...the last Major Leaguer with at least eight games with four-or-more hits was Ichiro Suzuki in 2004.
- Became the first Astros player with 20 homers and 20 stolen bases in the same season since Carlos Beltran in 2004 ( 23 HR, 28 SB).
- Became the second Astro to record 40 doubles in three straight years (Craig Biggio, 2003-05).
- Became one of three second basemen in MLB history to have a year with 40 doubles, 100 runs, 24 HR and 27 steals: also Alfonso Soriano $(2002,2005)$ and Roberto Alomar (1999).
- Reached 1,000 hits for his career in his 786th career game...became the quickest player in franchise history to reach 1,000 career hits, surpassing Cesar Cedeno (889 games).
- OPENING DAY: Made his fifth consecutive Opening Day roster and start.
- Named the AL Co-Player of the Week on April 8, along with Baltimore's Mark Trumbo...was his second-career Player of the Week award...hit . 407 (11x27) with eight runs, three doubles, three HR, seven RBI, two steals and a 1.336 OPS (. 484 OBP/. 852 SLG) in seven games...led the AL in OPS in that span.
- Became the first player in MLB history to reach 11 doubles and nine steals in April in a single season.
- Became the first Astros player to record at least three leadoff home runs in April of a single season.
- Became the second player in MLB history with six leadoff HR before June of a single season, joining Brady Anderson (7 in 1996 for BAL).
- On June 9, made his first-career appearance at a position on the field other than second base, as he moved to shortstop when Correa left the game with a left ankle sprain...received two chances at shortstop and recorded two assists.
- Posted a career-high six RBI in what was his second career multi-HR game on July 24 vs. LAA...per Elias, the only other second baseman in club history to record two HR and six RBI in a single game was Craig Biggio on Aug. 23, 1998 vs. CHC...became the first Astros player with six RBI in a game since Chris Johnson on May 2, 2012 vs. NYM.
- Reached 200 career doubles on Aug. 5 at CLE in what was his 804th career game...reached the 200-double mark in the fewest amount of games in club history (previously Lance Berkman, 811 games).


## 2015 SEASON:

- Was named to his third career All-Star team (his first start) won his second consecutive Silver Slugger, earned his first career Gold Glove Award and was given the inaugural Majestic Always Game Award, a Players Choice Award voted on by the MLBPA.
- Led the AL in hits (200) and steals (38) for the second straight season, joining Snuffy Stirnweiss (1944-45) as the only players in Major League history to lead the AL in hits and steals in back-to-back seasons.
- Became the first player in club history to reach 200 hits in consecutive seasons.
- Was the only Major Leaguer to reach 40 doubles, 15 HR and 35 steals, and the first to do so since Jacoby Ellsbury in 2011...became the second player in club history to do this, joining Craig Biggio in 1998.
- Became the seventh player in club history to earn a fan-elected start to the All-Star Game (10th time overall), and the first to do so since Lance Berkman in 2008...joined 2015 Hall of Fame inductee Craig Biggio (1995-98) and Jeff Kent (2004) as the only Houston second basemen to earn a fan elected start. - Led all Major League second basemen in fielding percentage (.993, 5E/669TC), closing out his season with 51 consecutive errorless games.
Became the first player in club history to record four consecutive 30 -double, 30 -steal campaigns.
Became the fourth player in MLB history with 800 hits, 150 doubles and 150 steals through his first five seasons...joined Ray Durham (1995-99), Ben Chapman (1930-34) and Del Pratt (1912-16).
- Joined Michael Bourn (2008-11), Jose Cruz (197780), Cesar Cedeno (1972-77) and Enos Cabell (197679) as the only players in club history with 30 -ormore steals in four consecutive seasons.
- Hit . 372 vs. LHP, becoming the first player since 1974 to lead MLB in batting vs. lefties in consecutive years.
- OPENING DAY: Made his fourth consecutive Opening Day roster and start.
- Tied a club record by recording 39 hits through the team's first 25 games (also Billy Hatcher in 1987).
- Recorded multiple hits in nine straight games from April 22-May 1, which tied a franchise record set by Jesus Alou (1969) and Billy Hatcher (1987).
- Was named the AL Co-Player of the Week along with Josh Reddick for the week ending May 3...hit . 467 ( $14 \times 30$ ) with seven runs, five doubles, one homer, eight RBI, two steals and a 1.233 OPS in the week.
- Hit his first career walk-off homer on July 23 vs. BOS, tallying a career-high tying four hits in the contest... per Elias, became the third Astros player in club history to start a game in the leadoff spot and then hit a walk-off home run, joining Craig Biggio (1998 and 2001) and Jimmy Wynn (1973).


## 2014 SEASON:

- Was named the Astros MVP by the Houston Chapter of the BBWAA and became the first player in club history to win a batting title.
- Was the Astros nominee for Major League Baseball's Hank Aaron Award...also named the Astros recipient of the Heart and Hustle Award, presented by the MLB Players Alumni Association.
- Was named one of three finalists as the AL's Most Outstanding Player in the Players Choice Awards.
- Set a club record with 225 hits while leading the Majors in hits and batting average...surpassed Craig Biggio (210 hits in 1998) for the Astros single season hits record, while joining Biggio as the only players in club history to reach 200 hits in a single season.
- Posted single-season franchise records with 69 multi-hit games, 24 three-hit games and 168 singles (all tops in MLB in 2014).
- Won a Louisville Silver Slugger Award as the American League's top offensive second baseman... joined Biggio as the the only second basemen in Astros history to win the award.
- Became just the second player in Major League history to compile 225 hits, 47 doubles and 56 steals in a single season, joining OF Ty Cobb, who did so in 1911 ( 248 hits, 47 doubles, 83 steals).
- His 225 hits were the most by a second baseman in a single season since Charlie Gehringer posted 227 hits in 1936 for Detroit.
- Received his second All-Star selection after getting voted to the All-Star team via the player vote.
- Set the single-season record for hits by a Venezuelan-born player, passing Magglio Ordonez, who set the previous record with 216 hits in 2007.
- Led the AL in batting average, hits and steals, becoming the first player to lead his league in those categories since Ichiro Suzuki in 2001.

Hit in 18 consecutive games at Minute Maid Park from June 4-July 29, marking the longest hitting streak recorded at the venue by an Astro all-time... was the longest home-hitting streak by an Astro since Derek Bell (21 straight games in 1998).

- Recorded 26 consecutive singles from July 29-Aug. 18...marked the longest streak by an Astro since Roy Oswalt recorded 31 consecutive singles without an extra-base hit from 2007-10.
- Reached base safely in every game in August while leading the Majors with 45 hits...tied the club record for most hits in a single August (Jesus Alou, 1970).
- POSTSEASON: Made his first career postseason appearance, starting at second base and batting leadoff in all six of Houston's playoff games.
- Tied a club record for most hits within a player's first two postseason games (4), joining Kevin Bass.
- Became the first Astros player to lead his league in stolen bases (56) since Michael Bourn in 2010 (52).
- Led the Majors with a .414 ( $63 \times 152$ ) average vs. LHP.
- His strikeout rate of $7.5 \%$ ( $53 \mathrm{SO} / 707 \mathrm{PA}$ ) ranked as the second-lowest in MLB.
- Tallied 130 hits prior to the All-Star Break, which marked a new Astros record, besting Bob Watson and his 123 hits prior to the 1973 All-Star Break... Altuve set the club record in 88 first half games, while Watson did so in 102 games.
- Per Elias, set a franchise record by going errorless in 88 straight games from Aug. 17, 2013-May 27, 2014.
- Became the first Major League player in 97 years to have four straight multi-steal games (June 26-29, 2014)...became just the third player in baseball's modern era (since 1900) to do this: also Ray Chapman (1917) and Bill Dahlen (1904).
- Tied a club record with 28 consecutive successful stolen base attempts from May 17-July 19, 2014... tied the record set by Carlos Beltran in 2004.
- On June 18 at WSH, recorded his 500th career hit with a 9th-inning single...marked his 426th career game, making him the fastest player to reach 500 career hits with the Astros franchise.
- Set a club record by recording a steal in seven straight games from June 24-30, 2014.
- Went $3 \times 5$ with two steals on June 30 vs. DET, making him the first player in the modern era with a four-game streak with multiple hits and steals.
- Was the first player in the All-Star era (since 1933) with 130 hits and 40 SB prior to the All-Star Break.
- Entered the ALL-STAR Game in the 5th inning at second base and drove in Alexei Ramirez on a sac fly to left field in his only PA...became the fifth Astros player to record an RBI in an All-Star Game.
- Tied a career high with four hits and hit his first career grand slam on Aug. 18 at BOS.
- Entering the final game of the season (Sept. 28 at NYM), held a . 003 advantage over Victor Martinez for the AL batting title...went $2 \times 4$ on the day to secure the title with a $.341(225 \times 660)$ average, directly ahead of Martinez's 335 ( $188 \times 561$ ) mark.

Following the season, traveled to Japan as part of the 2014 Japan All-Star Series... was a member of the MLB All-Star Team that faced off against "Samurai Japan" (Japan's National Team) for five games.

- Led the Astros in hits and steals, and ranked tied for first in runs (64) and games played (152).
- Ranked sixth in the American League with 35 stolen bases and fourth in multi-steal games (5).
- Was the Astros Roberto Clemente Award nominee.
- Led all MLB second basemen in stolen bases and double plays turned (114)...among American League second basemen, finished third in hits and fifth in both batting average and fielding percentage (.987).
- Became the fifth player in club history to record 30+ doubles and 30+ stolen bases in back-to-back years.
- Made his second consecutive OPENING DAY start.
- Led the Majors in hits and led the AL in batting average (.357) during September.
- On July 13 , signed a four-year contract extension for the 2014-17 seasons...the deal also included club option years for the 2018-19 seasons.


## 2012 SEASON:

- The first-time ALL-STAR was named the Astros recipient of the MLB Players Alumni Association's annual Heart and Hustle Award...also named the Astros MVP by the Houston Chapter of the BBWAA.
- Led the club in games played, extra-base hits, runs, hits, doubles, triples and stolen bases in what was his first full season in the Majors.
- Voted to the NL All-Star team at 22 years old, becoming the second-youngest All-Star in Astros history behind Cesar Cedeno (21 years old as a NL All-Star in 1972)...was the second-youngest NL AllStar in 2012 behind Bryce Harper.
- Ranked seventh in the NL with 33 steals.


## 2011 SEASON:

- Had 200 hits combined between the Majors (61) and minors (139) in 578 combined at-bats.
- His 51 starts at second base ranked fifth all-time in Astros history by a rookie and were the most since Bill Doran in 1983 (151 starts).
- Named the Astros 2011 Minor League Player of the Year after leading the minors with a .389 (139x357) average between Double A Corpus Christi (. 361 in 35 g ) and Class A Advanced Lancaster (. 408 in 52 g ).
- Started at $2 B$ for the World Team and went $2 \times 3$ with a double in the 2011 SiriusXM All-Star Futures Game.
- Selected to the Major League roster from Double A on July 19...made his MLB debut on July 20 in a start at second base...singled in his fifth career at-bat.
- His first career home run was a leadoff, inside-thepark homer on Aug. 20 vs. SF (Bumgarner), making him the first player to record his first career homer in that fashion since Hall of Famer Rich "Whitey"
- Among NL second basemen, ranked first in stolen bases, second in hits and third in batting average.
- Made his first-career OPENING DAY start.
- Stole home and homered on June 10 at CWS, becoming the first Astro to do so in the same game since Jeff Bagwell on June 22, 1993 at LAD.
- Became the only player in Astros history to begin his career by posting 40+ doubles and 40+ stolen bases within his first 200 Major League games.
- Played for Navegantes del Magallanes in the Venezuelan Winter League during the 2012 offseason...hit . 336 ( $48 \times 143$ ) with 10 doubles, 16 walks, eight steals and an . 847 OPS (. 406 OBP/. 441 SLG) in 35 games with the club.

Ashburn did so on May 29, 1948.

- Also became the first Astro to hit an inside-the-park homer for his first Major League homer since LHP Butch Henry (May 8, 1992 at PIT), and the last Astro to lead off a game with an inside-the-parker since Bill Doran (April 22, 1987, vs. ATL) (Elias).
- Tied the franchise record by hitting safely in each of his first seven Major League games (.423, 11x26), which was set by Russ Johnson in 1997 (.321, 9x28).
- Only two other players in Astros history collected 11-or-more hits in their first seven games in the Majors: Ken Caminiti in 1987 (11x27) and Orlando Miller in 1994 (11x23) (Elias).
- Following the season, played for Magallanes in the Venezuelan Winter League and led the league in hits (82) while ranking third in batting average (.339).

In 2008, his first year in America, hit . 284 in 40 games for Rookie Level Greeneville.

In 2007, led the VSL Astros in batting average (.343) and OBP (.429).

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Towering left-handed hitter enters his fifth Major League season with Houston...in 368 career games in the Majors, spanning the 2019-22 seasons, has hit 296 ( $393 \times 1328$ ) with 90 doubles, 98 homers, 283 RBI and a . 973 OPS (. 384 OBP/. 590 SLG).
- Is listed as an outfielder after starting a career high 56 games in left field in the 2022 regular season...in regular season action, has 104 career starts in left field and 250 as the Astros designated hitter.
- Had a huge 2022 season in which he finished third in the AL in MVP voting...was named the Astros MVP, was a 2022 All-Star Game selection and was named the AL Silver Slugger at DH.
- Followed up his 2022 regular season with a strong postseason...hit three go-ahead homers in the 6th inning or later in the postseason, all three coming with the Astros trailing...hit a walkoff homer in Game 1 of the ALDS and then a go-ahead homer in Game 2 of the ALDS, both against the vaunted Mariners bullpen...capped his postseason with a game-winning, go-ahead, three-run homer over the batters eye in center field in Game 6 of the World Series vs. PHI.
- Played his first full season as an Astro in 2021 and led the club in home runs (33) and RBI (104)...named a second-team All-MLB selection and was a Silver Slugger finalist at the DH position...named the 2021 ALCS MVP after hitting .522 ( $12 \times 23$ ) with a homer, six RBI and a 1.408 OPS during the series...his . 522 avg. in the series was the sixth-highest in a single postseason series in MLB history (min. 25 PA ).

## NOTES

After defecting from Cuba in 2016, Alvarez's journey took him first to the Dominican Republic, then to Haiti, where would eventually establish residency.
While working to establish residency, Alvarez crossed paths with fellow Cuban Yuli Gurriel, who was also working to establish residency...Alvarez grew up idolizing Gurriel, who was a star in the Cuban league during Alvarez's childhood...the two would later become teammates and friends, sharing the same clubhouse with each other for Alvarez's first four professional seasons (2019-22).
After establishing residency in Haiti, Alvarez signed his first professional contract with the Dodgers and their scouts Ismael Cruz and Mike Toscar.
Spent less than two months in the Dodgers organization and did not play in a professional game with them before being acquired by Houston in exchange for reliever Josh Fields...Fields posted a 2.61 ERA in three seasons with Los Angeles while Alvarez blossomed into one of the top prospects in baseball before debuting in 2019...the Astros scouts credited with the identification of Alvarez as an amateur include Charlie Gonzalez and Oz Ocampo.
Went six years, from the moment he defected from Cuba, until August of 2022, without seeing his father (Agustín Alvarez), mother (Mailyn Cadogan Reyes) and little brother (Yonder), who's turning 16 in 2023... with the help of Astros Owner \& Chairman Jim Crane, who worked with an immigration lawyer, the three secured visitor visas to eventually make it to the United States...the next step for the family is to apply for residency, with their goal being a permanent move to Florida, where Yordan makes his offseason home... despite being apart for six years, Yordan still talked to his parents daily by phone.
Has had several eye-opening moments in his career, with perhaps the top regular season moment coming on Sept. 9, 2019, when he became the first Astro to hit a homer into the third deck at Minute Maid Park (off A's RHP Paul Blackburn)...that shot landed in section 337, row 1 , seat 18 , a seat location that no longer exists after the addition of the Michelob Ultra View Deck.
Played his first four seasons (2019-22) under his rookie contract...signed a six-year contract extension with the Astros on June 6,2022 , which will keep Alvarez in an Astros uniform through 2028.

- Hit . 311 (288×927) with 56 doubles, 56 HR, 218 RBI and a . 956 OPS (. 395 OBP/. 561 SLG) in 250 minor league games in four years prior to his MLB debut.

Played in the SiriusXM All-Star Futures Game in 2017 and 2018...was a Midwest League Midseason All-Star in 2017.

- In Game 1 of the ALDS, hit a walk-off three-run home run to complete Astros four-run comeback... was the 1st walk-off HR in MLB postseason history by a team trailing by multiple runs....was the second walk-off HR in MLB history with a team down to its final out, other was OF Kirk Gibson in Game 1 of the 1988 WS.
- Capped his postseason with a game-wining goahead three run homer over the batters eye in center field in Game 6 of the World Series vs. PHI... the homer traveled 450 feet, which is the secondlongest WS HR of the Statcast era (since '15).
- Has six homers and 26 RBI in his postseason career...ranks second in MLB postseason RBI by a Cuban-born player, trailing only 1B Yuli Gurriel (39).

In the POSTSEASON, he batted .315 ( $17 \times 54$ ) with 13 runs, four doubles, two triples, two home runs, nine RBI and a 1.023 OPS.

- Was named the 2021 ALCS MVP....hit . 522 ( $12 \times 23$ ) with a homer and six RBI and a 1.408 OPS during the ALCS...became the fourth Cuban-born postseason MVP in MLB history, joining OF Randy Arozarena in the 2020 ALCS, RHP Orlando Hernández in the 1999 ALCS and RHP Liván Hernández in the 1997 NLCS.
His . 522 avg. in the series is the sixth-highest in a single postseason series in MLB history ( min .25 PA ). Went $4 \times 4$ in Game 6 of the ALCS, becoming the fifth Astros player with a four-hit game in a potential series-clinching game in postseason history, also Yuli Gurriel in Game 3 of the 2017 ALDS, Carlos Correa in Game 4 of the 2015 ALDS, Carlos Beltrán in Game 5 of the 2004 NLDS and Terry Puhl in Game 5 of the 1980 NLCS.

- Made his first career OPENING DAY roster, going $1 \times 3$ with three RBI as the Astros DH.
- Reached 101 RBI on the season at 24 years and 87 days old...became the second youngest player in Astros history to reach 100 RBI in a season, behind only César Cedeño, who reached the mark at 23 years, 216 days in 1974.
- Reached the 30 -homer mark on Sept. 13 at TEX at 24 years and 78 days old, becoming the youngest Astros player to reach 30 homers in a season.
- Played in just two Major League games, going $2 \times 8$ with a homer and four RBI.

Underwent arthroscopic surgery on both of his knees on Aug. 26...a slight tear of the patellar tendon was repaired in his right knee, while his left knee received a routine cleanup...missed the remainder of the season.

- Was named the AL Rookie of the Month in June, July and August....became the first player in franchise history to win three consecutive Rookie of the Month awards, and the first MLB player to do so since Aaron Judge from April-June of 2017.
- Set a Major League record for RBI in a player's first 45 career games with 51 , surpassing Ted Williams' record of 47 set in 1939...also set a record for RBI within a player's first 30 games ( 35 RBI), surpassing Albert Pujols (34 in 2001).

## NOTES

Grew up in Santiago, DR, which is the second-largest city in the Dominican Republic...played amateur baseball as a light-hitting corner infielder and outfielder with a strong arm...did not hit enough to get a look by scouts so switched to pitching at the age of 18...worked on his pitching in the morning, and in the afternoon he worked at a car wash, to help support himself and his mother, Maria.
Continued pitching in showcases and on the tryout circuit in the Dominican, where he was eventually seen at a workout by Astros scout Francis Mojica...Mojica attended the workout to get a look at the highly-touted prospect and eventual 2022 AL Rookie of the Year Julio Rodríguez, who shared the same trainer as Blanco... after seeing him throw, Mojica invited Blanco to the Astros academy and subsequently signed him at the age of 22 on April 27, 2016...Mojica, Oz Ocampo and Roman Ocumarez are all credited with the signing of Blanco.

Blanco joined a growing list of Astros pitchers who were signed at advanced ages out of Latin American countries...the Astros have also signed Framber Valdez (21 years old), Luis Garcia (20), Enoli Paredes (19) and Cristian Javier (18) at ages that most teams would deem too old to sign.
After signing, slowly worked his way up the Astros minor league system, eventually receiving non-roster invites to Spring Training in both 2021 and 2022...after a strong Spring Training, made the Astros Opening Day roster in 2022.
Picked up 25 days of Major League service in 2022 before using his first of three option years last season...is currently signed to a one-year contract for the 2023 season.
struck out 57 in his 45.0 innings pitched...named a Triple A PCL Postseason All-Star...following the regular season, had a stellar stint with the Estrellas in the Dominican Winter League...made 17 scoreless appearances for the Estrellas, pitching 18.0 innings...tacked on another two scoreless appearances in the Dominican League postseason.

- Trained at the Astros Alternate Training Site in 2020 during the pandemic-shortened season.

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- The five-time ALL-STAR $(2014,2017-19,2021)$ and 2014 Silver Slugger Award winner has hit . 298 (1641x5512) with 751 runs, 346 doubles, 25 triples, 127 home runs, 713 RBI, 125 stolen bases and a . 794 OPS (. 356 OBP/. 439 SLG) in 1,430 career games in the Major Leagues spanning 10 seasons with Cleveland (2009-18) and four in Houston (2019-22).
- Has had a nine-year run as one of the top hitters in the Major Leagues...during that span, which covers the 2014-22 seasons, ranks second in the Major Leagues in batting average (.309) behind only Jose Altuve (.313)...has posted an . 840 OPS (. 370 OBP/. 470 SLG) in 916 games during this run.
- Has been one of the game's elite contact hitters throughout his Major League career...is averaging one strikeout every 9.29 plate appearances, the best mark among active Major League players, immediately ahead of 2B Jose Altuve (8.27).

## NOTES

Michael is the son of former Major League outfielder Mickey Brantley, who played for the Seattle Mariners from 1986-89 and was on the Toronto Blue Jays coaching staff from 2005-07.
While his father was playing for the Mariners, Michael was born in Washington, but he grew up on the opposite end of the country in Florida, where he went to high school and still lives today...like a true Floridian, Michael is still an avid fisherman.
Brantley graduated from Fort Pierce Central High School (FL) in 2005, where he played baseball and golf...he was selected out of high school by the Brewers in the seventh round of the 2005 MLB Draft... signed by Brewers scout Larry Pardo.
After four seasons in the Brewers minor league system, was acquired by Cleveland as the player to be named later in the trade that sent CC Sabathia to Milwaukee in 2008...the blockbuster deal happened on July 7,2008 , but he was not named as the PTBNL until Oct. 3, 2008.
Nicknamed Dr. Smooth during his time in Cleveland for his sweet swing and steady performance...upon joining the Astros in 2019, earned the moniker Uncle Mike, dubbed by former teammate George Springer.
Despite not playing in the 2022 World Series due to injury, is credited by most of his teammates as a major reason for the Astros winning last year's Fall Classic... following the Astros 7-0 Game 3 loss to the Phillies in the World Series, which put the Astros down two games to one, the stoic Brantley delivered a postgame speech for the ages in the clubhouse...Brantley says he sensed his teammates were down and needed to be reminded how special that group was... his paraphrased message was a reminder that if they played their brand of baseball, they'd be World Series champs...the 2022 Astros never lost again in the series, responding with a $5-0$ win in Game 4...following Game 4, 3B Alex Bregman named Brantley that game's offensive MVP.
Is playing in his fifth year with Houston and is playing on his third contract...originally signed as a free agent to a two-year deal on Dec. 19, 2018...entered free agency after the 2020 season and was re-signed to another two-year deal on Jan. 25, 2021...became a free agent again after the 2022 season and was signed for the third time, this time to a one-year deal on Dec. 21, 2022.

- Finished in third place in the 2014 AL MVP Award voting behind Mike Trout and Victor Martinez.

Had a 247-game errorless streak from 2012-14, the longest streak in Indians history by an outfielder.

- Hit . 288 ( $70 \times 243$ ) in 64 games with 14 doubles, five home runs and 26 RBI before being placed on the Injured List on June 27 with a right shoulder injury... eventually underwent an arthroscopic labral repair on his right shoulder and was lost for the season.

- Went $2 \times 4$ with a walk, a homer and four RBI on Sept. 1 vs. TEX...hit an RBI-single in the 10th inning, and a go-ahead, three-run HR off the right-field foul pole in the 7th inning with Houston trailing 3-1.
- Hit a go-ahead two-run HR in the 1st inning on Sept. 2 that proved to be the difference in the game...was his second straight game with a go-ahead HR.
POSTSEASON: Batted .346 ( $18 \times 52$ ) with two doubles, three home runs, 11 RBI and a .981 OPS (. 424 OBP / . 558 SLG) in 13 postseason games.
- Reached base safely in all 13 of his postseason games, while hitting safely in 12 of those contests.
- Finished the postseason with an 11-game hitting streak, the third-longest streak in franchise history behind a 14-game streak by George Springer and a 13-game streak by Jose Altuve.
ALDS VS. OAK: Went $3 \times 5$ with two home runs, three RBI and three runs scored in the seriesclinching Game 4...was his first-career multi-homer game in the postseason.
- Put together his fourth-career and third-consecutive All-Star season in what was his first year in Houston.

- Posted the AL's longest hitting streak of the season, a 19-game run from Aug. 3-27.
- Hit a walkoff two-run home run in the 13th inning on Sept. 5 vs. SEA...was his third-career walkoff homer, and first since Aug. 3, 2014 vs. TEX....was his eighth-career walkoff plate appearance.

- Connected for his first grand slam on May 1 vs. TEX off Keone Kela in what was his 3,930th career plate appearance...hit his second-career grand slam just nine games later on May 11 vs. KC off Jason Hammel.
Posted a club season-high 19-game hitting streak from May 19-30.
- Recorded his 500 th career RBI on July 5 at KC... played his 1,000 th career game on July 28 at DET.

ALDS VS. HOU: Played in all three games of the, going $2 \times 10$ with a walk and an RBI.

## 2017 SEASON:

- Was named to the All-Star team for the second time in his career.
- Had a strong first-half before a persistent right ankle injury forced him to the Disabled List twice and kept him out for the vast majority of the second-half of the year.
- Hit . 304 ( $76 \times 250$ ) in the first half with 31 runs, 17 doubles, five homers and 37 RBI in 66 games.
- Stole 11 bases in 12 attempts ( $91.7 \%$ ), the seventhhighest stolen base rate in a single season in Indians history (min. 10 attempts).
- OPENING DAY: Made his seventh Opening Day roster.

Originally hurt his ankle on May 7 at KC, serving a DL stint from June 16-25 with a sprained right ankle... was placed on the DL again on Aug. 9...received a second opinion on Sept. 19 in Vail, Colo. (Dr. Thomas Clanton), where he received a cortisone injection and was diagnosed with a deltoid ligament sprain along with right ankle synovitis.

- Was activated from the DL with two days left in the regular season (Sept. 30), collecting a 10-pitch, pinch-hit single that night vs. Minnesota...also collected at bats ( $0 \times 2$ ) at DH on Oct. 1 vs. MIN.
- Did not strikeout in 21 consecutive plate appearances to end his season.


## 2016 SEASON:

- Was limited to just 11 games...did not appear in a game after May 10.
- Appeared in two Spring Training games while rehabbing his right shoulder surgery...was placed on the DL to start the season and activated on April 25.
- Placed back on the DL on May 14 with right shoulder inflammation...underwent a diagnostic ultrasound and hydrodissection of the tendon on July 22.

Was shut down for the season on Aug. 3 after feeling more soreness and underwent surgery on Aug. 15 to address chronic biceps tendinitis in his shoulder... the biceps tenodesis procedure re-attached the tendon from his shoulder to his humerus...the 45 -minute procedure was performed by Dr. Keith Meister and Dr. Mark Schickendantz.

- Was removed from the DL on Nov. 7.


## 2015 SEASON:

- Became the third Indians batter since 1961 to pace the American League in doubles, netting a careerbest tying 45.
- His Major League-leading 45 doubles were the most by an Indians batter since Grady Sizemore led the AL with 53 in 2006.
- Finished fourth in the AL batting race with a .310 batting average.
- Posted the American League's lowest strikeout rate (8.6\%).
- Drew a career-high 60 walks against just 51 strikeouts.
- Joined Tris Speaker, Joe Sewell, Nap Lajoie, Odell Hale, Lou Boudreau and Earl Averill as the only Indians players to collect 45+ doubles and 60+ walks while striking out fewer than 55 times in a year.
- OPENING DAY: Made his sixth Opening Day roster.
- Hit . 335 ( $75 \times 221$ ) with 10 homers and 38 RBI in 58 second-half games...finished sixth among AL hitters in second-half batting average, on-base percentage (.400) and OPS (.963), and was fourth in doubles.
- Was limited to just two games over the final 12 games of the season after straining his right shoulder diving for a ball on Sept. 22 at MIN...had surgery on the shoulder on Nov. 15.


## 2014 SEASON:

- Enjoyed a breakout season as he earned his first American League All-Star selection and Silver Slugger Award while finishing third in the AL MVP voting.
- Was a finalist for a Rawlings Gold Glove Award.
- Led the club in runs scored, hits, doubles, RBI, steals and batting average and set career-highs in each of those categories....also set a career-best in home runs (20).
- Became the first Indians player to amass at least 200 hits, 45 doubles, 20 homers and 20 stolen bases in the 114-year history of the franchise, and the ninth player all-time in the history of baseball to accomplish the feat.

- Equaled a single-game club record with five runs scored on June 9 at TEX, the first Indians player since Joe Carter in Sept 1986 to turn the trick.
- Won AL Player of the Week honors for the week of June 9-15.


## 2013 SEASON:

- Went the entire season without making an error, breaking Rocky Colavito's club-record 212-game errorless streak that stretched over two tenures with the club from 1959-66.
- Finished tied for fourth in the AL with 11 outfield assists, the most by an Indians left fielder since Albert Belle (11) in 1996.
- Led the team with a .284 batting average and was third on the team with 73 RBI (career-high).
- Ranked third in the AL in batting w/RISP (.375).

- Collected four straight three-hit games from Sept. 22-26, the first Indians batter to do so since Kenny Lofton in June of 1995...also became the first Indians hitter since 1959 (Minnie Minoso) to have four straight games with at least three hits and one RBI.


## 2012 SEASON:

- Batted .288 with 37 doubles and 60 RBI in 149 games.
- Was the toughest batter to strikeout in the AL (9.2\% strikeout rate)...struck out just 56 times in 609 plate appearances.
- Made all of his appearances in the Majors in center field after a Spring Training injury to Grady Sizemore...started 140 games in center field.


## 2011 SEASON:

- Played in 114 games in the Majors before right wrist and hand problems ended his season on Aug. 22.
- OPENING DAY: Made his second Opening Day roster.

Placed on the 60-day DL on Aug. 23 and underwent right hand surgery at the Cleveland Clinic (Dr. Thomas Graham) on Aug. 31 to remove a fractured hamate bone in his right hand.

## 2010 SEASON:

- Was the club's Opening Day left fielder and made three stints in the Majors with Cleveland, playing in 72 games.
- Finished seventh among AL rookies in runs (38), eighth in hits (73), tied for third in triples (3) and tied for second in steals (10).
- OPENING DAY: Made his first-career Opening Day roster

## 2021 SEASON:

- Played in 91 games, batting $270(94 \times 348)$ with a . 777 OPS (. 422 SLG/ . 355 OBP).
- Made his fifth career OPENING DAY roster and start at third base...went $2 \times 4$ with a double, homer and two RBI on Opening Day (April 1 at OAK).
- Started the season with four straight multi-hit games...tied the club record for most consecutive multi-hit games to begin a season, reached by Willy Taveras (2005), Richard Hidalgo (2004), Craig Biggio (1997) and Enos Cabell (1976).
- Recorded a 20-game on-base streak (May 10-June 2), which was a team-high.
- Went on the IL on June 17 with a strained left quad, which sidelined him into late August...returned on Aug. 25 after missing 58 team games.
- In the POSTSEASON, hit $.217(13 \times 60)$ with nine runs, two doubles, one home run and seven RBI... upped his career postseason RBI total to 36 .
Played in 16 postseason games this year, upping his career total to 73, which ties for the third most in franchise history with Yuli Gurriel behind only Jose Altuve and Carlos Correa.
- After making 16 starts together this postseason, Bregman, 2B Jose Altuve, SS Carlos Correa and 1B Yuli Gurriel reached a Major League record for the most postseason games together than any four teammates in MLB history (73 games)...in Game 2 of the World Series, the Astros group surpassed the quintet of Derek Jeter, Bernie Williams, Tino Martinez and Paul O'Neill, which started 68 postseason games for the Yankees (1996-2001).
- Had surgery on his right wrist on Nov. 8, 2021.


## 2020 SEASON:

- Posted an . 801 OPS (. 350 OBP/.451) during 42 regular season games in the 60-game season.
- OPENING DAY: Made his fourth-career, and fourthconsecutive, Opening Day start at third base.
- Tied the longest season-opening on-base streak in club history ( 25 games), a mark previously reached by Jordan Schafer (2012) and Denis Menke (1969).

Dealt with one stint on the Injured List due to right hamstring discomfort (Aug. 20-Sept. 8)...was heating up prior to his IL stint, as he was on a ninegame hitting streak (. 393 batting average, 1.157 OPS) prior to his IL placement.
Recorded the 100th home run of his career on July 27 vs. SEA in what was his 521st career game.

- Per Elias, reached 100 HR faster than all but three players in Astros history: Lance Berkman ( 452 g ), George Springer (483g) and Glenn Davis (514g).

Hit . 220 (11×50) with one homer and two RBI in 13 POSTSEASON games...drove in the Astros first run of the ALDS for the third time in a four-season span, as he put Houston on the board in Game 1 with a solo homer off Chris Bassitt.

- Finished second in the AL MVP race in what was his second consecutive All-Star season...named the Astros Team MVP by the Houston Chapter of the BBWAA, a Second-Team All-MLB selection, and won his first career Silver Slugger Award.
- Joined Barry Bonds (1993), Ted Williams (1949), Lou Gehrig (1936) and Babe Ruth $(1924,1921)$ as the only players in MLB history to reach the following totals in a single season: 41 homers, 119 walks, and 37 doubles with 83 strikeouts-or-fewer.
- Became the sixth third baseman in MLB's modern era (since 1900) to post a 1.000 OPS season at 25 years or younger, joining Adrian Beltre (2004), Troy Glaus (2000), Jim Thome (1996), Dick Allen (1966) and Eddie Matthews (1953-55).
- Led the AL in WAR (8.4, Baseball-Reference), the second-highest total by a position player in Astros history (Craig Biggio, 9.4 WAR in 1997).
- Recorded the seventh 40-homer season in Astros history, joining Jeff Bagwell (47 in 2000; 43 in 1997; 42 in 1999), Lance Berkman (45 in 2006; 42 in 2002) and Richard Hidalgo (44 in 2000).
- Led the AL in BB (119) and ranked second in OBP (.423), third in OPS (1.015), third in SLG (.592), tied for third in HR (41), fourth in R (122) and fifth in RBI (112).
- Posted the lowest swing rate on pitches outside the strike zone in the Majors (18.8\%)...posted the second-lowest overall swing rate in the Majors, regardless of pitch location (35.1\%).
- Played 99 games at third base ( 91 starts) and made a career-high 65 appearances at shortstop with a career-high 59 starts at the position...ranked third among AL third basemen in defensive runs saved (7)...ranked third among AL shortstops in fielding percentage ( .986 , min. 50 games).
- Made his third-career OPENING DAY roster.
- Celebrated his 25th birthday on March 30 at TB with a solo HR in the 1st inning.
- Tied the franchise record for most consecutive games with a walk (11 games, April 20-30), tying Joe Morgan (1970) and Jimmy Wynn (1969)...drew 13 walks during his streak.


## 2018 SEASON:

- Was named the Astros Most Valuable Player by the Houston Chapter of the BBWAA and was named an All-Star for the first time in his career.
- Was the MVP of the 2018 All-Star Game, received an AL Player of the Month Award (June) and an AL Player of the Week award (June 25-July 1)...was also the Astros finalist for the 2018 Hank Aaron Award.
- Became the first player in MLB history to record 30 homers and 50 doubles in a season while playing the majority of his games at third base.
- Led the AL with 12 homers in May, setting a club record for homers in a single month of May.
- Posted three multi-HR games in May and also had a stretch where he homered in three straight games.
- Tallied four RBI in consecutive games from May 4-5, tying the club record for most consecutive games with at least four RBI.
- Was voted a starter for the ALL-STAR GAME for the first time in his career....went 1x2 with a run scored in the 2019 All-Star Game at Progressive Field in a start at third base...scored the first run of the game.
- Ranked second in the Majors in OPS following the All-Star Break (1.134), a new club record for OPS following the All-Star Break...led the Majors in OBP after the All-Star Break (.463).
- Was named the AL Player of the Month for August, his second-career Player of the Month award...led AL hitters in batting average (.404), RBI (31) and OBP (.487), while ranking tied for first in doubles (14) and third in OPS (1.235)...set a club record for doubles in August (14)...in Sept., led the AL in OPS (1.239), OBP (.486), SLG (.753).
- Hit . 234 ( $15 \times 64$ ) with four HR, 12 RBI and an .832 OPS (. 364 OBP/. 469 SLG) in 18 POSTSEASON games.
- WORLD SERIES VS. WSH: Homered three times in the World Series, giving him five World Series homers in his career...posted eight RBI in the Fall Classic, tying Troy Glaus (2002) for the most RBI in a single WS by a third baseman in MLB history.
- Had an epic Game 4 at WSH, going $3 \times 5$ with a grand slam and five total RBI...was the 20th grand slam in WS history, and the second in Astros postseason history (Berkman, Game 42005 NLDS).
- Set a single-game World Series record for RBI by a third baseman, and marked the 25th five-RBI game in World Series history (first by an AL player since Hideki Matsui had 6 RBI in Game 6 of the 2009 WS).
- Became the 11th player in MLB history to record at least three hits, a homer and five RBI in a WS game, and the first since Albert Pujols (Game 32011 WS).
- Became the fourth player in MLB history with a 50-double, 30 -homer season prior to turning 25 years old, joining Albert Pujols (2003-04), Alex Rodriguez (1996) and Lou Gehrig (1927).
- Joined Lou Gehrig (1927) as the only players in MLB history to record a season with at least 50 doubles, 30 homers, 90 walks and 10 stolen bases.
Led the Majors with 51 doubles, tying the thirdmost in club history for a single season with Craig Biggio (1998), behind Biggio's 1999 season (56) and Lance Berkman's 2001 season (55).
- Recorded 83 XBH, the second-most in the AL.
- Ranked third in the AL in WAR (8.3) behind Mike Trout (10.6) and Mookie Betts (9.5), per STATS Inc.
- Ranked among the top-five AL players in walks (3rd), on-base percentage (4th), runs (5th), OPS (5th) and RBI (T-5th).
- Joined Lance Berkman (2001) as the only players in Astros history with a 50 -double, $30-\mathrm{HR}$ season.
- Led the American League with three walkoff hits and was responsible for four of the Astros walkoff wins (three hits and reached on an E3).
- Ended the season on a 56 -game road on-base streak, setting a new club record (previously 51 games set by Jeff Bagwell from 1998-99).
- Reached base safely in 145 games, tying the thirdmost games reaching base in a single year in club history, last reached by Lance Berkman in 2004.
- Made his second-career OPENING DAY roster and made his second-consecutive Opening Day start.
- Combined to hit three straight home runs with George Springer and Jose Altuve on June 20 vs. TB.
- Went $4 \times 5$ with three doubles and a two-run homer on June 26 vs. TOR...became the fourth player in Astros history to have a game with four extra-base hits, joining Jose Altuve (May 17, 2017 at MIA), Jeff Bagwell (June 14, 1996 at SF) and Kevin Bass (June 27, 1987 at SF)...joined Larry Gardner (1922) as the only third basemen in AL history with three doubles and a home run in a single game.
- Recorded seven consecutive extra-base hits over a two-game span from June 26-27, tying the most extra-base hits over a two-game span in MLB history...became the first player in club history to record five doubles over a two-game span...at 24 years old, became the youngest player in MLB history to do so, surpassing Hall of Famer Red Schoendienst ( 25 in 1948, per STATS Inc.).
- Won his first-career AL Player of the Month award in June...along with Evan Gattis, set a new franchise record for RBI in a single month of June with 30 ... per ESPN Stats \& Info, became the third player in franchise history to post $10+$ homers and $30+$ RBI in a single month, joining Jeff Bagwell (May 1996, Aug. 2000) and Richard Hidalgo (Sept. 2000)...named the AL Player of the Week (June 25-July 1) on the same day he was named AL Player of the Month.
- Was named to his first-career ALL-STAR Team via the player vote...named the 2018 ASG MVP after hitting a go-ahead homer in the 10th inning in what ended up being an $8-6$ win for the AL... became the first player in club history to be named the MVP of an All-Star Game...hit back-to-back homers with George Springer in the All-Star Game, becoming the first pair of teammates to do so since Steve Garvey and Jimmy Wynn of the Dodgers in the 1975 All-Star Game (ESPN Stats \& Info).
- Became the fifth player in club history to participate in a Home Run Derby, joining Lance Berkman (2002, 2004, 2006, 2008), Jeff Bagwell (1994, 1996-97, 1999), Moises Alou (1998) and Glenn Davis (1989).
- Reached 100 career doubles on Sept. 7 at BOS in his 342nd career game in the Majors...reached 100 doubles, 50 HR and 200 RBI in the fourth-fewest amount of games by any player since 1920...the only players to do it faster: Ted Williams (341g), Chuck Klein $(317 \mathrm{~g})$ and Hank Greenberg $(315 \mathrm{~g})$.
- POSTSEASON: In eight games, batted 292 ( $7 \times 24$ ) with two doubles, two HR, five RBI, 11 walks, three hit-by-pitches and a 1.178 OPS (. 553 OBP/. 625 SLG).
- Reached base 20 times over the first six games of the postseason, tying a MLB record for times reaching base in any six-game span in the postseason (also Lou Gehrig, 1928-32; David Ortiz, 2007).
- ALDS VS. CLE: Hit a solo HR off Corey Kluber to put Houston up 1-0 in Game 1 of the ALDS, marking the second-straight year that he scored and drove in the club's first run of the postseason (homered in Game 1 of the 2017 ALDS vs. BOS).
- Homered off Trevor Bauer in Game 2 of the ALDS, becoming the third player in club history to HR in each of the first two games of a single postseason... also Colby Rasmus (2015) and Ken Caminiti (1999).
- ALCS VS. BOS: Walked three times in Game 1, tying the franchise record for walks in a postseason game, last accomplished by George Springer in Game 5 of the 2017 World Series
- Recorded seven assists in Game 1, the most by a third baseman in a game in ALCS history.
- Drew three walks in Game 2, joining Jimmy Sheckard (1910) as the only players in MLB history to record at least three walks in consecutive postseason games.


## 2017 SEASON:

- Led the Astros with 155 games played....became the third player in AL history to reach 39 doubles, five triples, 19 homers, 17 steals and 55 walks in a season at age 23 or younger.
- Led AL third basemen in fielding percentage (.970), making 10 errors in 337 total chances.
- Made his first-career OPENING DAY roster and start...at 23 years, four days old, became the youngest third baseman in club history to start on Opening Day (April 3 vs. SEA).
- Tied a club record by recording an extra-base hit in 10 consecutive games from July 30-Aug. 9 (also Richard Hidalgo in 2000).
- Homered in each of his first two career games at Fenway Park from Sept. 28-29 at BOS.
Hit 208 (15×72) with three doubles, four homers and 10 RBI in 18 starts at third base in the POSTSEASON. Homered off LHP Chris Sale in Game 1 of the ALDS in what was his first career postseason plate appearance...became the fourth Astros player to homer in his first career postseason plate appearance, joining Raúl Chávez (Game 2 of the 2007 NLDS), Jason Lane (Game 1 of the 2004 NLDS) and Glenn Davis (Game 1 of the 1986 NLCS)...per ESPN Stats \& Info, became the second-youngest player in Astros history to hit a postseason homer (Carlos Correa, 21, 2015).
- Became the youngest third baseman in club history to start a postseason game.
- Hit a game-tying, solo homer off Chris Sale in the 8th inning of Game 4.
- Became the fourth-youngest AL player to homer in a series clinching game in postseason history... the only players to do it at a younger age: Mickey Mantle (1952 World Series), Charlie Keller (1939 World Series) and Joe DiMaggio (1937 World Series).
- WORLD SERIES VS. LAD: Became the second player in MLB history to record an RBI in each of his first five career games in the World Series, joining Amos Otis (1980).

Became the eighth player to hit multiple HR in a single World Series at age 23 or younger, joining Hank Aaron (1957), Charlie Keller (1939), Goose Goslin (1924), Lenny Dykstra (1986), Reggie Smith (1967), Mickey Mantle (1952-53), Jimmie Foxx (1929).

- Homered off LHP Clayton Kershaw in Game 1 of the World Series, becoming the youngest player to homer for an AL team in the World Series since Manny Ramirez in 1995.
- Hit a walkoff RBI-single off Kenley Jansen in Game 5 of the World Series...was the 57th walkoff win in WS history, the first for the Astros, and the first since Eric Hosmer's sac-fly in Game 1 of the 2015 World Series.
- Made his MLB debut with the Astros in July.
- Named the Astros Minor League Player of the Year, ESPN.com Prospect of the Year, USA TODAY Minor League Player of the Year, MLB Pipeline Hitter of the Year and a Baseball America Minor League All-Star.
- Began his career in the Majors just $1 \times 32$ (.031) over his first eight games....after that stretch, batted . 308 ( $52 \times 169$ ) with eight homers, 32 RBI, and a .917 OPS (. 355 OBP/. 562 SLG) over his last 41 games of 2016.
- Made 48 starts with Houston: 40 at third base, four at shortstop, three at designated hitter and one at 2B.
- Among AL rookies with at least 200 at-bats, ranked fifth in OPS (.791), fourth in slugging (.478), ninth in RBI (34) and tied for 11th in homers (8).
- 

Was selected to the Major League roster on July 25 and made his Major League debut that night vs. the Yankees at Minute Maid Park.

- Recorded his first Major League hit on July 31 at DET.
- On Aug. 5 vs. TEX, went $3 \times 5$, becoming the youngest third baseman in club history ( 22 years, 129 days old) to record a three-hit game.


## MINOR LEAGUE CAREER:

- Spent parts of just two seasons in the minor leagues...began his pro career in 2015 after signing with the Astros on June 25.
- In 2016, played in just 80 minor league games at Double A Corpus Christi (62g) and Triple A Fresno $(18 \mathrm{~g})$ prior to his promotion to the Majors in July.

Was a 2016 Texas League Midseason All-Star...led all Double A players in OPS (.975) prior to his promotion to Triple A on June 30.
Participated in the 2016 SiriusXM All-Star Futures Game, falling a home run shy of the cycle, going $3 \times 5$ with a double and a triple in a start at third base.

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Right-handed starter has pitched in parts of three seasons (2020-22) in Houston, going 26-17 with a 3.57 ERA (129ER/325IP) in 63 games ( 57 starts).
- Had a strong second full season in 2022, finishing the year as a 15 -game winner, while making 28 starts...ranked tied for fourth in the AL in wins, ninth in opponent average (.222) and 10th in strikeouts per 9.0 (8.98)...finished the year on a career-long seven game winning streak.

## NOTES

Was signed as a 20 -year-old non-drafted free agent out of Venezuela on July 2, 2017...signed by Astros scouts Oz Ocampo, Tom Shafer, Roman Ocumarez and David Brito.
As an amateur in Venezuela and prior to signing with the Astros, had trouble finding baseball cleats in Venezuela for his size 12 feet....Garcia's mom, who is a social worker, had a friend with a connection to Major League Baseball and made the ask for new cleats on behalf of her son...her friend with the MLB connection happened to be the sister of Astros bullpen catcher Javier Bracamonte, who regularly sends equipment back to his native country of Venezuela....without knowing who they were for, Bracamonte provided the cleats, which eventually made it back to Garcia... finally in 2021, at some point during Garcia's rookie season, Bracamonte was surprised to find out that the kid from Venezuela who needed size 12 cleats was Garcia, who was in his first full season with the Astros. Is the third player in club history to wear the \#77 after Pudge Rodriguez (2009) and Pedro Feliz (2010)... was assigned the number when he joined the club in midseason of 2020 and opted to keep it moving into the 2021 campaign...he has a special connection to the number, which was worn by him in photo ops on international signing day in 2017...the \#77 signing day jersey was pulled randomly for photos by the Astros international staff.
Prior to it being outlawed this season, had one of the most unique windups in the Majors, which was a mix of rocking a baby and a salsa dance...Garcia does not have a strong origin story for his windup, instead saying he wanted a windup that he felt could be repeatable...it's so unique that it's been mimicked by all, from Major Leagues, including Shohei Ohtani, to little leaguers, including Spring Branch 9-year-old Charlie Strong, who started using Garcia's windup in his little league games...after a video of Charlie went viral, Luis insisted on hosting Charlie at Minute Maid Park, which happened on May 25, 2022...Charlie threw out a ceremonial first pitch that day, using the unique windup, with Luis serving as his catcher.
Is currently signed to a one-year contract for the 2023 season...this Spring Training will be his third with the Major League club.

## 2021 SEASON:

- Began the year on the club's OPENING DAY roster as a starter, pitching Game 5 of the season at LAA... marked his first time on an Opening Day roster.
- Led AL rookie pitchers in WAR (3.0), wins (11), innings (155.1) and strikeouts (167)...his strikeout total was the second-highest by a rookie in franchise history, trailing RHP Tom Griffin (200 in 1969).

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Right-handed starter has gone 20-12 with a 3.05 ERA (103ER/304.1IP), with 123 walks and 378 strikeouts in 78 games ( 44 starts) in his three Major League seasons (2020-22) with the Astros.
- Has allowed a . 178 (192x1077) opponent batting average in his three-year career...among pitchers to toss 300-plus innings over the 2020-22 seasons, Javier ranks first in the Majors in that category, almost 20 percentage points lower than secondplace Corbin Burnes (.195).
- Has been a strong POSTSEASON performer in his young career, posting a 4-1 record with a 2.20 ERA (8ER/32.2IP) with four holds in 14 appearances, including two starts...has allowed just 14 hits in his 32.2 innings of work for a . 127 opponent average, while striking out 48 hitters.
- Was the starter in two combined no-hitters in 2022, which came on June 25 at NYY (7IP) and in Game 4 of the 2022 World Series at PHI (6IP)...became the first pitcher in Major League history to start two combined no-hitters in a career.
- During the no-hitter on June 25 at NYY, began a streak of striking out two-or-more batters in an inning for 13 consecutive innings over parts of three starts from June 25 -July 6...became just the third player since 1961 to have a streak of 13+ innings, joining Corey Kluber (2014) and Aroldis Chapman (2020-21).
- Had an incredible 2022 season overall, posting the lowest opponent batting average in AL (.170), which was 16 points lower than the second-place finisher and the eventual AL Cy Young winner RHP Justin Verlander (.186)...also ranked second in K's per 9.0 (11.74) and fourth in WHIP (0.95) this season... including his two starts this postseason (11.11P), finished his season by not allowing a run in six straight starts...allowed just seven hits in 34.1 innings pitched in those six starts for a . 067 opponent average.

Grew up an outfielder before transitioning to pitching at the age of 16 ...less than two years later, signed by the Astros as a 17-year-old international free agent out of Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic on March 18, 2015...signed by Astros scouts Oz Ocampo, Roman Ocumarez and Leocadio Guevara.
Received the nickname "El Reptil" (the reptile) during his time in the Astros minor league system, due to his poise, calm demeanor and slow, calculated movements on and off the mound...originally given the name by his High A Manager Morgan Ensberg and his pitching coach at the level, Drew French...Ensberg was a former All-Star player for the Astros, playing for the club from 2000-07.
Works predominately with his low to mid 90 s fastball, which has been nicknamed the invisiball by his teammates...his fastball, which is a four-seamer, has a ride with high spin rates...coupled with his threequarters armslot, the pitch has strong deception to hitters....he follows that pitch up with a slider and a 12-6 curveball, which registers in the top $92 n d$ percentile of spin rates in the Majors.
Just three years in the Majors, Javier has already been an author of several special moments, none bigger than starting the club's combined no-hitter in Game 4 of the 2022 World Series...the night was extra-special for Javier, who had flown his father, Cecilio, and mother, Trinidad Mieses, in from the Dominican Republic for the game...in talking with his parents the night before the game, Cecilio and Trinidad predicted that their son, Cristian, would throw a no-hitter in Game 4....Javier tossed 6.0 innings of no-hit ball the next day...his mother had seen him pitch before in the United States, but that night was his fathers first time to watch his son pitch in the Majors in person.
Was originally added to the Astros 40-man roster on Nov. 20, 2019...with exactly 3.000 years of service time, was eligible for arbitration this offseason...the Astros and Javier avoided that process by agreeing on a five-year contract that will keep Javier in an Astros uniform through the 2027 season...the deal was officially signed on Feb. 10, 2023.

- Finished third in the 2020 AL Rookie of the Year voting...led AL rookies in ERA (3.48) and in opponent average ( $.188, \mathrm{~min} .150$ batters faced).
- In the 2020 postseason, was the winning pitcher in the Astros ALDS Game 4 victory over the A's, and their Wild Card Series Game 2 win over the Twins... both games were series clinchers...joined Charlie Morton (2017) as the only pitchers in Astros history to record two wins in series-clinching games in a single postseason.

Was named the Astros Minor League Pitcher of the Year in 2019, while also being named to the Second Team for MLB Pipeline's Prospect Team of the Year... recorded a 1.74 ERA (22ER/113.2IP) with a careerhigh 170 strikeouts between three levels in the Astros system...led all of minor league baseball in opponent batting average (.130) in 2019, which was 31 points ahead of the next best pitcher, Padres top prospect Mackenzie Gore (.161)...his 1.74 ERA was the second-best mark in all of minor league baseball, behind only Gore's mark of 1.69.

- Made 110 starts at catcher, which ranked second in the AL...ranked tied for first in the AL in catcher caught stealings (16) on the year.
- Made his 10th Opening Day roster in his career and started behind the plate for the Astros on OPENING DAY on April 7 at LAA.
- On June 15 at TEX caught two immaculate innings in the same game...according to MLB.com, the Astros became the first team to have two pitchers toss immaculate innings in the same game...they were thrown by RHP Luis Garcia (2nd inning) and RHP Phil Maton (7th)...the two turned the trick on the same group of three hitters: Nathaniel Lowe, Ezequiel Duran and Brad Miller.

Attended West Chester Henderson High School (PA) and became the first player in school history to score 1,000 career points in basketball and record 100 career hits in baseball.
Went on to attend Division II Millersville, where he had an outstanding four-year career...was named the 2017 PSAC Eastern Division Athlete of the Year...helped the Marauders to a NCAA Division II Championship runnerup finish in 2016...finished his career at Millersville with a .373 average and a . 4410 BP ....owns the program and conference record with 306 career hits...is the only Marauder in program history to be a four-time All-PSAC East selection and one of only four to be a three-time first team selection...was a three-time AllAtlantic Region pick...finished career as Millersville's all-time record holder in hits, runs and RBI.
Drafted by the Astros out of Millersville in the 21st round of the June 2017 draft...signed by Astros scout Zach Clark.
Is an oddity in baseball, as a position player who bats exclusively right-handed and throws left-handed... was one of only four Major Leaguer to hold that distinction in 2022, including teammate Jake Meyers... the two are the first pair of teammates to bat right and throw left since Rickey Henderson and Brian Lesher played together for Seattle in 2000... Henderson is by far the most accomplished player to do so in MLB history, while Jason Lane holds that distinction in Astros history...Lane, McCormick, Meyers and Carl Warwick are the only four players in club history that fit into this exclusive category.

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- The 2017 ALL-STAR has made 130 appearances (127 starts) in his career, posting a 49-32 record with a 3.48 ERA (278ER/718.2IP) and 800 strikeouts across seven Major League seasons with Houston (2015-18, 2020-22).
- Has averaged 94.1 mph on his fastball in his career, using the pitch $40.1 \%$ of the time...in his career, has relied heavily on his breaking balls, throwing $38.2 \%$ curveballs and $7.3 \%$ sliders...has only added his slider to his repertoire over the last two seasons, a pitch he threw $26.1 \%$ of the time in 2022...was very balanced last season, as he used, throwing his curveballs, sliders, and fastballs evenly, while also mixing in changeups and cutters.

- Pitched in three POSTSEASON games, leading Astros to a 2-1 record in those contests...struck out 18 batters in 15.2IP...threw a dominant 6.0 scoreless innings in G3 of ALDS at SEA, while only allowing two hits and striking out seven in a quality start.
- Made the Astros OPENING DAY roster for the fourth time in his career and started the club's third game.
- Following the season, named the Astros Pitcher of the Year by the Houston Chapter of the BBWAA.
- Combined to go 1-0 with a 0.84 ERA (1ER/10.2IP) in two starts in the POSTSEASON, both coming in the ALDS...started Game 1 vs. CWS (0ER/6.2IP) and became the 11th pitcher in franchise history to toss at least 6.2 IP shutout innings in the postseason, and the first since Gerrit Cole (7IP) in Game 3 of the 2019 ALCS vs. NYY...returned on full rest to start Game 4 at CWS (1ER/4.1IP), tossing 4.1 innings before leaving with a flexor pronator strain, which kept him out the remainder of the postseason.

- Struck out a season-high nine batters over just 4.0 scoreless innings in his final start of the season on Sept. 26 at TEX.
- Was on the Astros active roster throughout the entire POSTSEASON...made one start in the ALDS (Game 1) and two starts in the ALCS (Games 1 and 7)...went $0-2$ with a 4.91 ERA (8ER/14.2IP), two walks and 23 strikeouts during his three postseason starts.
- ALCS VS. TB: Had a dominant performance in Game 1...gave up four runs (one earned)...struck out 11 batters without a walk over 7.0 innings pitched... his 11 punchouts ranked sixth in Astros history for a single postseason game, and marked the most by an Astros pitcher since Gerrit Cole's 15-strikeout performance in Game 2 of the 2019 ALDS vs. TB.
- Joined Cole ( 2018 ALDS Game 2 vs. CLE, 12 K ) as the only Astros pitchers to post 11+ strikeouts without walking a batter in a single postseason game.

Became the first pitcher in club history to make multiple Game 7 starts in his career.

- Missed the entire season while recovering from right ulnar collateral ligament surgery.


## 2018 SEASON:

- Tossed a career-high 128.1 innings pitched and struck out a career-high 142 batters in what was his fourth Major League season.
- Set career high marks in wins (10) and apps (25).
- Made 22 starts before suffering an elbow injury in August...returned to the club in September and pitched in three games out of the bullpen, the first regular season relief appearances of his career.
- Went $10-6$ with a 3.93 ERA (55ER/126IP) and 138 strikeouts in his 22 starts...threw 2.1 hitless innings with four strikeouts in his three relief outings.
- Threw his changeup at a career-high rate for a single season (16\%)...previous was 12\% in 2017.

- Carried a perfect game into the 6th inning on April 28 vs. OAK.
- Held a perfect game through 5.0 innings on May 20 vs. CLE...finished with 7.0 scoreless innings in Houston's 3-1 win.
- Struck out a career-high 12 batters on July 6 vs. CWS...gave up one run on three hits over 7.0 innings, walking none...took a no-hitter into the 6th inning.
- Became the second-youngest pitcher in club history to have a game with 12 strikeouts and no walks ( 24 years, 277 days) behind Larry Dierker, who had two games like this as a 22-year-old in 1969.
- POSTSEASON: Pitched in five games in the postseason, posting a 1.80 ERA (1ER/5IP) with two walks and four strikeouts.
- ALDS VS. CLE: Was scoreless in Game 1 (1IP) and Game 3 (1IP).
- ALCS VS. BOS: Recorded a hold in Game 1 in the Astros 7-2 win at Fenway Park.
- Underwent Tommy John surgery on his right elbow on Nov. 6, 2018. start at home in which he allowed more than three runs...snapped his 27-game streak of surrendering three runs-or-fewer at home, the longest in MLB history by a pitcher to begin his career...tied for the third-longest home streak overall in MLB history.
- Appeared in five POSTSEASON games (three starts).
- ALCS VS. NYY: Started Game 4 at Yankee Stadium, tossing 6.0 innings of one-run ball...allowed just two hits, one a solo homer to Aaron Judge...left the game with the lead, but the Astros bullpen could not hold on as the club fell 6-4 to the Yankees.
- Got the save in Game 7 after throwing 4.0 shutout innings....was the seventh save of at least 4.0 innings in MLB postseason history, and the first since Madison Bumgarner's save in Game 7 of the 2014 World Series...allowed just one hit and one walk to preserve Houston's 4-0 victory...threw 24 straight curveballs to end the game.
- Became the first pitcher in MLB history to strike out at least six batters in a postseason save.
- At 24 years, 19 days old, became the third-youngest pitcher in MLB history to record a save in a Game 7, behind LHP David Price (2008 ALCS, 23.054) and LHP Will McEnaney (1975 World Series, 23.250).
- Started Games 3 and 7 of the World Series...got the win in Game 3 after allowing three runs on four hits in 5.1 innings pitched...was the first World Series win in Minute Maid Park history.
- Did not factor into the decision in Game 7, as he went 2.1 scoreless innings pitched...allowed three hits and hit four batters, a Major League record for a postseason game... 24 years, 30 days, became the youngest pitcher to start Game 7 of the World Series since RHP John Lackey (24 years, 4 days) in Game 7 of the 2002 World Series.
- Recorded an RBI groundout in Game 7, becoming the first pitcher with an RBI since Barry Zito (Game 1, 2012), and the first AL pitcher with an RBI in the Fall Classic since Andy Pettitte (Game 3, 2009)....became the first AL pitcher to collect an RBI in Game 7 of a World Series, and the first pitcher overall in Game 7 since Jesse Orosco of the Mets in 1986.
- Posted a 3.22 ERA with 106 strikeouts in 81.0 innings across 14 starts in a season bookended by IL stints.
- Spent the season as one of the youngest starting pitchers in the AL...the only AL pitchers younger than McCullers to make a start were RHP Jose Berrios, RHP Luis Severino and RHP David Paulino.
- Put up an 11.78 strikeouts per 9.0 innings ratio (106SO/81IP), which ranked fourth among all MLB pitchers (min. 80IP) behind RHP Jose Fernandez (12.49), RHP Yu Darvish (11.84) and RHP David Phelps (11.84)...was the fourth-highest single season strikeouts per 9.0 innings ratio by an Astros pitcher all-time (min. 80IP), behind RHP Brad Lidge in 2004 (14.93), RHP Octavio Dotel in 2001 (12.43) and LHP Randy Johnson in 1998 (12.38).
- Became the third pitcher in MLB history with a K's per 9.0 innings ratio of 11.78 or higher prior to his age-23 season (min. 80IP)...also RHP Francisco Rodriguez (13.18) and RHP Kerry Wood (12.58).
- Joined RHP Roy Oswalt as the only pitchers in club history to post an ERA of 3.22 or lower in each of their first two seasons in the Majors.
- Led the AL in ERA at home ( 2.40 min . 60IP).
- Finished second in the Majors in curveball percentage (49.6\%), trailing LHP Rich Hill (49.7\%).
- Began the year on the 15 -day IL with right shoulder soreness...was activated from the IL on May 13.
- In his start on May 26 vs. BAL, struck out 10 and allowed one run in 5.0 innings in a 4-2 Astros win... became the fourth MLB since 1913 to record 10+ strikeouts while allowing one hit or fewer in less than 6.0 innings, joining RHP Felix Hernandez (2013),

RHP Jake Peavy (2003) and RHP Bobby Witt (1986).

- Fanned 10 batters and allowed just one run in 7.0 innings on July 4 vs. SEA...per ESPN.com, induced a career-high 18 swing-and-misses on his curveball.

- Made his Major League debut on May 18 vs. OAK... tossed 4.2 innings and allowed just one run in the game, striking out five and walking three.
- Picked up his first MLB win in what was his second MLB start on May 23 at DET...tossed 6.0 innings, allowing two runs on six hits, with six strikeouts.
- Struck out 11 batters in a one-run complete game effort on June 3 vs. CWS...marked his first professional complete game...became the first Astros rookie to strike out 11 batters in a complete game since RHP Roy Oswalt struck out 12 on Sept. 9, 2001 vs. MIL.
- On June 14 vs. SEA, tossed 5.0 hitless innings...at 21 years, 255 days, became the youngest pitcher to toss at least 5.0 hitless innings in a start since RHP Phil Hughes (20.311) on May 1, 2007 at TEX...
- Finished June with a 2.11 ERA (9ER/38.1IP), which marked the lowest ERA posted by an Astros rookie during the month since RHP Darryl Kile put up a 1.80 ERA in June of 1991...his . 164 opponent batting average ( $22 \times 134$ ) in June was the lowest produced by an Astros pitcher since RHP Mike Scott in June of 1987 (.164, 26x159), and the lowest ever produced by an Astros rookie during the month.
- Among AL rookies in June, ranked first in strikeouts (40), tied for first in wins (3) and third in ERA... received votes for AL Rookie of the Month, which ended up being awarded to teammate Carlos Correa.
- POSTSEASON: Started one postseason game for Houston (ALDS Game 4 vs. KC), becoming the youngest pitcher in club history to start a playoff game (22 years, 10 days old)...prior to McCullers, LHP Mike Hampton held the club record as he started Game 2 of the 1997 NLDS at 25 years, 22 days old.

ALDS VS. KC: Became the youngest AL pitcher to toss at least 6.0 innings while allowing two runs or less in his first career postseason game since LHP CC Sabathia in Game 3 of the 2001 ALDS.

- Was named a Texas League Midseason All-Star at Double A Corpus Christi after allowing two earned runs in his 29.0 innings ( 0.62 ERA), striking out 43.
- At the time of his promotion to Triple A, was leading Double A in opponent average (.146), while ranking second in ERA and tied for fourth in strikeouts.
- Prior to the season, was ranked as a top 10 Astros prospect by multiple publications: Baseball Prospectus (\#7), Baseball America (\#9) and ESPN.com (\#6).
- Was a 2013 MiLB.com Organization All-Star.
- Began his pro career in 2012 with the Rookie Level GCL Astros ( 4 g ) and Greeneville Astros ( 4 g )... combined to go 0-4 with a 3.46 ERA (10ER/26IP) and 29 strikeouts.
In 2013, was ranked by Baseball America as the No. 4 prospect with the 'Best Fastball' and 'Best Slider' in the Astros system...also ranked as the No. 50 prospect in baseball.

- Was ranked by Baseball America as the No. 5 prospect in the Astros system and the No. 77 prospect in baseball in 2014 during his season at Class A Advanced Lancaster...also rated as having the organization's 'Best Curveball' by the publication.

Grew up in the rural hometown of Sabana Huguero, which is inland Dominican Republic and near the Haitian border...played baseball recreationally as a child in Huguero before moving to Santo Domingo with a brother to train as a professional baseball player...at the time of his move to Santo Domingo, he was topping out at 89 ....by the time he turned 20 , he was reaching 94 , which attracted the attention of local scouts.
Despite his advanced age, the Mets signed Montero as a 20 -year-old international free agent on Jan. 20 , 2011...officially signed by Mets scouts Rafael Perez, Ismael Cruz and Gerardo Cabrera.

- After signing with the Mets, blossomed into a huge prospect, eventually starting the Futures Game for the World Team in 2013...entering the 2014 season, ranked as the Mets No. 2 pitching prospect, behind only RHP Noah Syndergaard and immediately ahead of RHP Jacob deGrom (per Fangraphs).
Struggled to find his footing in the Mets organization before undergoing Tommy John surgery in 2018... bounced between the Rangers and Mariners organizations in 2019-20 before finding himself traded at the 2021 trading deadline.

- Has been an incredible performer in the Winter Leagues in the course of his career, appearing mostly for Este in the Dominican Winter League (2012-16, 2018)...in 61 career Winter League appearances, is $4-3$ with a 2.20 ERA (15ER/61.1IP).


## NOTES

Grew up and still lives in Villa Altagracia in the Dominican Republic, which is just north of Santo Domingo...attended and graduated from Colegio José Francisco Peña Gómez in 2008, where he played volleyball, chess and basketball...got into chess playing against his sister in school...also split his free time as a youth working as a rancher.
Neris now owns his own ranch in Villa Altagracia, where he stables 15 horses and 300 cows...during the season, Neris' mother watches after his horses...Neris also claims to be an expert horse rider.
Growing up, Neris had many interests outside of baseball and didn't devote himself to the game until a later age... he credits this devotion to a local trainer named Jose Neval, who persistently invited Neris to train...Neris reluctantly began training with Neval at the age of 17 and was eventually seen by a Cleveland scout who was on hand to look at a different player working out with Neval...that interest proved to Neris that this was the direction he wanted to go with his career.
Did not sign with Cleveland, but less than a year later, he entered into a handshake agreement with the Royals...that deal was voided by MLB when questions about his identity were raised.
Two years later, he officially signed with the Phillies at the age of 20 on April 29, 2010...signed by Phillies scout Koby Pérez.
Spent 12 years in the Phillies system (2010-21) before reaching free agency after the 2021 season...signed by the Astros in free agency to a two-year contract on Nov. 30,2021 , which covers the 2022-23 seasons.
At the time of his signing with Houston, one of Neris' reasons for signing with the Astros was his desire to pitch in the postseason, which the Phillies had missed in each of his eight seasons (2014-21) in Philadelphia...Neris got his wish in 2022, pitching in eight postseason games for the Astros, including three scoreless appearances against his former club, the Phillies, in the 2022 World Series.

Was not heavily recruited by colleges until his senior season in high school...the University of Maine, on the other hand, had followed Jeremy the majority of his high school career....Jeremy credits that early interest in his decision to attend Maine, where he played three seasons for the Black Bears...started every game during his collegiate career...in his junior season of 2018, led Maine in triples and runs scored and was named to the America East Second Team....at the time of the 2018 draft, was rated by ESPN.com as the No. 81 overall draft prospect.
Drafted by Houston in the third round of the June 2019 draft with the 102 nd overall selection...signed by Astros scout Bobby St. Pierre.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Veteran reliever and 2019 All-Star is entering his fifth season with the Astros after being acquired midseason in 2018...spent his first five-plus seasons with Minnesota (2013-18).
- In his Major League career, Pressly has posted a 29-28 record with 77 saves and a 3.20 ERA (188ER/528IP) in 499 career games...has posted 561 strikeouts in his 528.0 career innings pitched.
- In his Astros career, from July 27, 2018 through the end of the 2022 season, has gone 12-12 with 76 saves, 45 holds, a 2.39 ERA (56ER/211IP) and 279 strikeouts in 218 appearances.
- Moved into the Astros full-time closer role in 2020 and has compiled a total of 76 career saves with the franchise...enters the 2022 season ranking tied for fourth in saves in franchise history along with RHP Fred Gladding...the two immediately trail RHP Brad Lidge (123) in that category.
- Has made 41 career POSTSEASON appearances, going 2-0 with a 2.56 ERA (11ER/38.2IP), while also going 11-for-11 in save opportunities...has been scoreless in 24 of his 26 postseason appearances in the Astros last three playoff runs (2020-22)...is the club's all-time leader in postseason appearances (41) and postseason saves (11).

Played baseball and football (defensive back) at Marcus HS, where he graduated in 2011...was tackled and suffered a torn ACL during his senior season, ending his football career...received a scholarship to play baseball at Texas Tech but elected to play professional baseball after being drafted by Boston in the 11th round of the June 2007 draft...signed by Red Sox scout Jim Robinson.
Played five seasons (2008-12) in the Red Sox minor league system before being selected by Minnesota in the 2012 Rule 5 Draft....was selected fourth overall, three picks after the Astros selected RHP Josh Fields first overall.

Was the face of the Rays opener strategy in 2018, becoming the first rookie in MLB history with 25 starts and 25 relief apps. in a single season...since joining the Astros, has not made a start in his 131 appearances.
Split his first four MLB seasons between the Tampa Bay and Miami organizations...non-tendered by the Marlins after the 2020 season and signed an MLB contract with Houston on Jan. 8, 2021...although the deal was for one year, the Astros retained control of Stanek through the arbitration process through the 2023 season...is eligible for free agency after 2023.
Was the hardest-throwing pitcher on the Astros last season, averaging 98.4 mph on his fastball, which was the hardest he's thrown in his Major League career... allowed just a . 168 opponent average on his fourseamer in 2022...also threw a splitter (23\%) and slider (18.5\%) last season.
Standing at $6^{\prime} 4$ " with flowing blonde hair and an eclectic personality, Stanek is one of the Astros most quotable interviews...he can always be found at his locker talking a variety of topics, from baseball strategy to parenthood to fashion, with a particular interest in sneakers and graphic tees.

Topped out at 101 mph this year on June 26 at NYY, the highest velocity of his career.

- Did most of his damage at home, posting a 0.64 ERA at Minute Maid Park while allowing a . 165 opponent batting average...did not give up a single run in May and June.
- Made his fourth career OPENING DAY roster and second straight with the Astros.

Blake is a huge Marvel fan and a Star Wars fan...for Star Wars Night in 2021, the Astros asked Blake to name as many Star Wars characters as possible in one minutes time for a video board feature...Blake rattled off 26 characters, including lesser known Jedi Ahsoka and Plo Kloon, Rebel fighter Captain Antilles and the droid R4.
Was committed to play at the University of Hawaii, but opted to play professionally after being selected by the Pirates in the second round of the 2013 MLB Draft... signed by Pirates scout Brian Tracy.
Spent one season in the Pirates system before being traded to New York (NL) as part of the return for IF Ike Davis...would pitch another six years in the Mets system before being added to their 40-man roster on Nov. 4, 2019.
Earned that addition after a standout 2019 campaign, in which he transitioned to a relief role...had worked as a starter for his first six minor league seasons (2013-18).
Traded to the Astros on Dec. 5, 2019...Houston also received 19-year old OF Kenedy Corona in the deal that sent OF Jake Marisnick to the Mets... has accrued a full 3.000 years of service time in his three seasons (2020-22) in Houston.

२021 SEASON:

- Recorded another solid season for Houston, notching a 3.16 ERA (15ER/42.2IP) with 41 strikeouts and 4-4 record in 51 games.
- Was dominant against lefties on the season, allowing just a .123 ( $8 \times 65$ ) opponent batting average and a .208 OBP against fellow southpaws.

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Outfielder has played in the Majors with Houston in each of the last five seasons (2018-22), combining to hit 268 ( $372 \times 1390$ ) with 85 doubles, 11 triples, 73 homers, 256 RBI and 53 stolen bases in 398 games.

Kyle's older brother, Preston, is a former Astros outfielder, having played for the club from 2015-16... after a successful three-year stint (2019-21) in the KBO, in which he starred for the Kia Tigers, Preston returned to MLB affiliated ball in 2022, playing for Triple A Gwinnett in the Braves organization...this offseason, signed a minor league deal with the Padres. Kyle was selected by the Astros with the fifth overall pick in the 2015 draft, three picks after the Astros selected 3B Alex Bregman...was committed to the University of Florida, but chose to sign with the Astros and scout John Martin.
IN THE COMMUNITY: Runs the Kyle Tucker Foundation, which Kyle dedicated to Hospice Care after the passing of his grandfather, Dwayne, in October of 2021... Dwayne was Kyle's biggest fan, and as Kyle put it, he would watch every inning of every game that Kyle played in, sometimes staying up until 3 a.m. ET when the Astros played late games on the West Coast... Dwayne had to spend the final few months of his life in hospice care, which left a huge impression on the entire Tucker family...hospice is a type of healthcare that focuses on pain and symptom management at the end of one's life....it also provides emotional and spiritual support to patients and their families.
Added to the Astros 40-man roster on July 7, 2018... played parts of the 2018-19 seasons in Houston before solidifying himself as an everyday player in 2020 ... was eligible for arbitration the first time this offseason and is under club control through at least the 2025 season.

- Started in right field at the 2017 SiriusXM All-Star Futures Game, going $1 \times 3$ with an RBI...also named to the 2017 Arizona Fall League Rising Stars Game.

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Right-hander has pitched in parts of four Major League seasons with Houston, posting a 2413 record with a 3.74 ERA (142ER/342IP) in 63 appearances ( 60 starts)...has allowed two or fewer earned runs in 39 of his 60 career starts.
- Has extensive POSTSEASON experience in his career...has pitched in 12 postseason games, making six starts, to a 3-2 record and a 3.72 ERA (15ER/36.1IP)...all three of his wins have come in World Series play, one win in 2019 and two in 2021... is $3-0$ with a 1.23 ERA (2ER/14.2IP) in five career appearances in the World Series, including tow starts...shockingly, Urquidy leads all foreign-born players in MLB history with three career wins in the World Series...he's also just the second Mexicanborn starting pitcher to earn a win in the Fall Classic (also, LHP Fernando Valenzuela, 1981).

## NOTES

Signed by the Astros as a 19-year old, non-drafted free agent out of Mazatlán, Sinaloa, Mexico on March 2, 2015...signed by Astros scouts Oz Ocampo, Carlos Alfonso and Raul Lopez.
Formerly known as José Luis Hernandez, José began going by the last name of Urquidy, at the start of the 2019 season...Urquidy made the change in honor of his mother, Alma Urquidy, who raised him in Mazatlán, supported his baseball journey and prioritized his school, delaying his professional signing until the age of 19 .
Is one of 11 Mexican-born players to appear in at least one game for the Astros and is one of seven pitchers... has pitched more innings (342.0) as an Astro than any other Mexican-born player, besting RHP Aurelio Lopez, who pitched 116.0 innings for the Astros in the 198687 seasons.
In 2019, became just the second Mexican-born pitcher to earn a win as a starter in the World Series joining LHP Fernando Valenzuela, who did so in 1981...that feat earned him a meeting with Mexican president Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador, who hosted him at his office in Mexico City.
For the first time in his career, is set to play for Team Mexico in the 2023 World Baseball Classic...forms a formidable top three in Mexico's rotation along with LHP Julio Urias and RHP Taijuan Walker.
José has a pet pig named Josefa, who was named by combining José and his wife's name, Estefania....Josefa is a favorite of Astros sideline reporter Julia Morales, who featured the pig on an Astros broadcast in the 2021 season...Josefa grew too large to be cared for by José and now lives on a comfortable ranch owned by one of José's friends.
Was added to the 40-man roster on July 2, 2019, the date of his MLB debut....was left unprotected in the 2018 Rule 5 Draft, but went undrafted...has accumulated just over three years of service time across parts of four Major League seasons...was eligible for arbitration for the first time this offseason and settled with the Astros on a one-year deal for the 2023 season.

- Pitched in one game during the POSTSEASON, tossing 3.0 scoreless innings and giving up just one hit in Game 3 of the WS...struck out four.


## 2021 SEASON:

- Made 20 starts for the Astros, missing time with two IL stints, both for shoulder issues...allowed two-or-fewer earned runs in 14 of his 20 starts.
- Known as an aggressive strike-thrower, he ranked third in the AL in walks per 9.0 (1.60) and sixth in strikeouts to walk ratio (4.74) (min. 105 IP ).
- Was an extreme fly ball pitcher, posting the thirdlowest ground ball percentage ( $32.2 \%$ ) and the fifth-lowest ground ball to fly ball ratio (0.76) in the Majors (min. 105 IP).

- Did not pitch in the Division Series, despite being originally scheduled to pitch Game 4, which was delayed due to weather... with the game being pushed back, the Game 4 start went to RHP Lance McCullers Jr. on full rest....instead made his 2021 postseason debut in Game 3 of the LCS at BOS (5ER/1.2IP)...rebounded from his rough LCS start to make two great pitching performances in the World Series, earning wins in both outings.
- In the World Series, started Game 2 vs. ATL (2ER/5IP) to pitch the Astros to a $7-2$ victory...came on in relief in Game 5 (0ER/1IP) and picked up the win in relief.
- Is now 3-0 with a 1.54 ERA (2ER/11.2IP) in four career World Series apps. (2 starts)...according to MLB Stats, Urquidy has the most World Series wins by a foreign-born player in MLB history.
- He's also the only Mexican-born pitcher with multiple wins in the Fall Classic.
- In September ranked tied for seventh in the American League in ERA and seventh in WHIP (1.01).
- Ended the season with a career-long streak of four consecutive quality starts.
- Made four POSTSEASON appearances (three starts), going 0-1 with a 4.02 ERA (7ER/15.2IP), six walks and 12 strikeouts...started Game 2 of the Wild Card Series at MIN, Game 3 of the ALDS vs. OAK, and Game 3 of the ALCS vs. TB...appeared in relief in Game 7 of the ALCS at TB.


## 2019 SEASON:

- Had an impressive nine-game showing in the Majors with Houston after making his MLB debut... allowed one run-or-fewer in each of his last four appearances of the season (1.50 ERA, 3ER/18IP).
- Became the first homegrown Mexican-born player to appear in a game for the Astros...became just the second Mexican-born pitcher to start a game for Houston, joining RHP Edgar Gonzalez, who started six games for the 2012 Astros...became the fifth player in MLB history from Mazatlan, Mexico.
- Made his MLB debut on July 2 at COL, throwing 3.2 innings and allowing two runs in a 9-8 Astros win.
- Recorded his first-career Major League win on July 20 vs. TEX...pitched 7.0 innings of one-run ball, striking out nine with no walks and two hits allowed in the Astros 6-1 win over the Rangers.
- Struck out 17 batters while walking just one over his first three MLB starts (13IP)...marked the fewest walks over a player's first three starts in club history...also had the fewest walks over a pitcher's first four starts in club history (3).
- Struck out a career-high 10 batters over 5.0 innings of one-run ball on Sept. 11 vs. OAK...allowed just one hit...became the fourth Mexican-born pitcher in MLB history to record a start with 10+ strikeouts and one hit-or-fewer.

Made the Astros POSTSEASON roster for all three rounds, appearing in four games...went $1-0$ with a 0.90 ERA (1ER/10IP) in four games (one start).

- Threw 1.2 scoreless innings, recording three strikeouts in Game 4 of the ALDS at TB in his postseason debut...earned his first career postseason hold in Game 6 of the ALCS vs. NYY, allowing one earned run over 2.1 innings, while striking out a career postseason-high five batters.

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Left-hander has gone 41-23 with a 3.38 ERA (193ER/514.1IP) and 497 strikeouts in 98 games (76 starts) in the Majors with Houston from 2018-22.
- After bouncing between bullpen and rotation his first two seasons (2018-19), has ascended to the top of the Astros rotation over the last three years (2020-22)...has been one of the best pitchers in the AL in that span, going 33-15 with a 3.05 ERA in 64 games ( 63 starts)...in that time span, he ranks first in the AL in GB\% (67.1\%), second in wins (33) and fourth in ERA (3.05) and ninth in opponent avg. (.225).
- Has been a groundball machine in his Major League career...owns a career $66.6 \%$ groundball percentage, which ranks as the lowest percentage in the Majors from 2018-22 (min. 500 IP)...since ground ball percentage started being tracked in 1987, Valdez's career ground ball percentage is the highest ever posted by a starting pitcher... he edged out RHP Brandon Webb (65.1\%) in that category.
- Has held left-handed hitters to a . 204 average (78x383) and a . 594 OPS in the Majors...has allowed just five homers to left-handed hitters in his career.
- Known as a workhorse, Valdez ranked third in the Majors in innings pitched (226.1IP) in 2022, including the postseason...in 2021, Valdez missed the first two months of the season, but after his return, he led the Majors in innings pitched (172.1)... he also led the Majors in innings in 2020 ( 94.2 IP)... since the start of the 2020 season, Valdez ranks fourth in the Majors in innings (475.1), trailing only RHP Gerrit Cole (493.2), RHP Sandy Alcantara (489) and RHP Aaron Nola (482.2).
- Has combined to go 7-2 with a 3.41 ERA (26ER/68.2IP) in 13 career POSTSEASON appearances ( 12 starts)...was dominant in the 2020 postseason, going 3-1 with a 1.88 ERA (5ER/24IP) and 26 strikeouts in four games (three starts)... earned wins in each round, Game 1 of the Wild Card Series at MIN, Game 2 of the ALDS vs. OAK and Game 5 of the ALCS vs. TB...had an up and down 2021 postseason, which peaked in Game 5 of the ALCS (1ER/8IP) in a start at Fenway Park...was magnificent in the 2022 postseason, going 3-0 with a 1.44 ERA (4ER/25IP) in four starts, which included two World Series starts.


## NOTES

Was signed by the Astros as a 21 -year-old nondrafted free agent out of the Dominican Republic on March 18, 2015...at 21-years old, Valdez was five years older than most amateur free agent signees from the Dominican Republic...according to Valdez, other teams had been skeptical of potential arm issues and didn't want to take a chance on him because of his age. Originally a position player, Valdez began pitching at the age of 16 and had interest from scouts within a couple years of his conversion...by the age of 21 , Valdez was finally seen by the Astros at a workout staged by an independent trainer in Guayacanes, DR, a small town just west of San Pedro de Macaris...after seeing him throw just a handful of pitches, the Astros invited him to throw at their Dominican Academy and promptly signed him following that tryout...signed by Astros scouts Oz Ocampo, Tom Shafer, Roman Ocumarez and David Brito.
In 2022, used his curveball $29 \%$ of the time, registering most of his K's on the breaker ( 132 of 194), which checks in with a spin rate in the 90th percentile of all MLB curves....he learned the pitch from fellow Dominican and former Brewers prospect Angel Ventura, who pitched in parts of eight minor league seasons (2011-19) with the Brewers...Ventura's curveball was nicknamed "The Ax".
At times early in his career, Valdez would struggle with his command and subsequently, his body language... in the 2019 offseason, sought the help of Dr. Andy Nunez, who's part of the Astros mental skills group in the Dominican Republic...Nunez specializes in helping the organization's young Latin American players get in the right frame of mind and prepare them for life in the United States... with this help, Valdez adopting the mantra "attitude above everything"....he credits this thought process in his improvements made to his focus, composure and on-field body language.
Added to the Astros Major League roster in September of 2018 ...surpassed three years of service time last season, making him eligible for arbitration...avoided the process by agreeing to a one-year deal with the Astros covering the 2023 season...is under club control through 2015.

- Dominican lefty had a banner 2022 season...he was the club's OPENING DAY starter, was the winning pitcher in the ALL-STAR Game and dominated in the 2022 postseason...over nearly a five-month span in 2022, tossed 25 straight quality starts from April 25-Sept. 18, setting the MLB record for the most consecutive quality starts in a single-season... among AL starters in 2022, he ranked first in quality starts (26), first in innings (201.1), first in home runs per 9.0 ratio (0.49), first in GB\% (67.3), second in wins (17) and sixth in ERA (2.82).
- Missed the first 49 games of the 2021 season with a fractured finger, but returned on May 28...after that date, he ranked tied for first in the AL in wins (11), while ranking third in innings pitched (134.2) and fourth in ERA (3.14)...posted the highest ground ball percentage (70.3\%) in the Majors, while posting the third-lowest home runs per 9.0 IP ratio $(0.80)$ in the AL.

- While he was not a member of Major League Spring Training camp in 2017, he did impress in five Spring Training games with the Astros as a minor league call-up...struck out seven batters in his 7.0 innings with the Major League club in 2017 Spring Training...pitched in the Arizona Fall League in 2017, going 1-1 with a 3.20 ERA (7ER/19.2IP) and 14 strikeouts in six starts for the Mesa Solar Sox.

- Tossed 25 straight quality starts from April 25 to Sept. 18, setting the MLB record for the most consecutive quality starts in a single-season...the streak tied for the second-longest streak in MLB history when including multiple seasons...also extended the Astros record, which was previously held by RHP Mike Scott, who tossed 20 straight quality starts in 1986 Cy Young season.
- His 26 quality starts this season were the most in the Majors and the most by an Astro since RHP Justin Verlander and RHP Gerrit Cole both had 26 in 2019.
- Among AL starters this season, he ranked first in quality starts (26), first in innings (201.1), first in home runs per 9.0 ratio (0.49), first in GB\% (67.3), second in wins (17), sixth in opponent OPS (.600) and sixth in ERA (2.82).
- Struck out a season high 13 hitters in a start on July 3 vs. LAA....was followed by RHP Hector Neris (2K), RHP Rafael Montero (2K) and RHP Ryan Pressly (3K), who combined to strike out 20 hitters in the game...this tied the MLB record for a 9.0-inning game...the Astros became the eighth team in MLB history to accomplish the feat...the 20 strikeouts in a 9.0 -inning game was also a franchise record, besting their previous record of 19 .
- Made his first career All-Star roster after being selected to the roster by MLB...was the third pitcher used by the AL squad and pitched a scoreless 3rd inning, earning the win after the AL scored their three runs in the top of the 4th...as expected, got all three of his outs in the 3rd inning on groundouts... induced those from Juan Soto, Manny Machado and Freddie Freeman...made the 39th appearance by an Astros pitcher in the All-Star Game in MLB history and became the first Astros pitcher to earn a win...was also the first Astros pitcher to pitch in the ASG since RHP Justin Verlander tossed 1.0 inning in a start back in 2019...was one of five Astros selected to the 2022 AllStar Game, joining 2B Jose Altuve, DH Yordan Alvarez, RF Kyle Tucker and Verlander.
- Tossed his first career shutout on Sept. 12 at DET... Valdez's shutout was the first by an Astros pitcher since RHP Justin Verlander tossed his most recent nohitter on Sept. 1, 2019 at TOR.
- Dominated the 2022 POSTSEASON, going 3-0 with a 1.44 ERA...was the only pitcher in the playoffs to record three wins...recorded 33 strikeouts during 25 playoff innings...allowed 5.04 hits per 9 innings in playoffs...the Astros went 4-0 when Valdez pitched in playoffs.
- Finished postseason with back-to-back 6.0IP+, onerun outings in Game 2 and Game 6 of the World Series, including a two-hit performance in Game 6... struck out 18 Phillies in 12.1 WS innings...became the third Astros pitcher ever to make three or more starts of $6.0+$ innings while allowing one or fewer runs in a single postseason (others: RHP Charlie Morton, 2017, RHP Gerritt Cole, 2019).
- Missed the first 49 games of the season due to a fractured finger, but returned to make 22 starts to complete the season...after his return on May 28, he ranked tied for first in the AL in wins (11), while ranking third in innings pitched (134.2) and fourth in ERA (3.14).
- Posted the highest ground ball percentage (70.3\%) in the Majors (min. 130IP)...ranked immediately ahead of RHP Logan Webb (61.2).
- Allowed just 12 homers in his 134.2 innings pitched this season for a 0.80 home runs per 9.0 ratio, the third-lowest in the AL (min. 130 IP ).
- Had an up and down postseason combining for a 1-1 record and a 7.78 ERA (17ER/19.2IP) in five starts...started Game 2 of the DS vs. CWS (4ER/4.1IP), Game 1 of the LCS vs. BOS (2ER/2.2IP) and Game 5 of the LCS at BOS (1ER/8IP).

- Averaged 2,982 rpms on his curveball, giving him the 10th-highest spin rate among all MLB curves.
- Over his 10 starts, went 5-3 with a 3.92 ERA (28ER/64.1IP) and 68 strikeouts...tossed 6.1 scoreless innings as a reliever (one outing).
- Posted a career-best $5.6 \%$ walk rate, the fifth-best mark in the Majors, as he walked just 16 of 288 batters faced...posted a $15.6 \%$ walk rate in his 2018 rookie season, and a $13.4 \%$ walk rate in 2019.
- Made the Astros OPENING DAY roster for the second consecutive year...started Houston's fifth game of the season.

On Sept. 17 vs. TEX, struck out 11 batters for the second time on the season...became the sixth lefty in Astros history to have multiple 11-strikeout games in the same season, joining Dallas Keuchel ( 4 g in 2015), Wandy Rodriguez ( 2 g in 2011 and 2009), Randy Johnson ( 6 g in 1998), Denny Lemaster ( 2 g in 1969) and Mike Cuellar ( 3 g in 1967, 2 g in 1966).

- Was dominant in the POSTSEASON, going 3-1 with a 1.88 ERA (5ER/24IP), 10 walks and 26 strikeouts in four games (3 starts).
Made his postseason debut in Game 1 of the Wild Card Series at MIN...earned the win in relief after finishing the game with 5.0 scoreless innings...gave up just two hits and two walks with five strikeouts... became the 13th pitcher in MLB history to finish a postseason game with $5.0+$ scoreless relief innings, and the first to do it since Madison Bumgarner ended Game 7 of the 2014 World Series at KC with 5.0 scoreless relief innings...became the first AL pitcher to do this since Pedro Martinez in Game 5 of the 1999 ALDS at CLE...became the fourth pitcher in MLB history finish a game with $5.0+$ scoreless frames in his postseason debut, joining Joe Price ( 1987 NLCS Game 5), George Frazier (1981 ALCS Game 2) and Moe Drabowsky (1966 World Series Game 1).
- Pitched Houston to a 5-2 win in Game 2 of the ALDS at Dodger Stadium in what was his first-career postseason start...tossed 7.0 innings of two-run ball, allowing five hits and one walk with four strikeouts on 103 pitches....became the second Dominican-born pitcher in Astros history to start a postseason game, joining Jose Lima (Game 2 of the 1999 NLDS at ATL).
- Started Game 1 of the ALCS at TB...at 26 years, 327 days old, became the third-youngest pitcher in franchise history to start Game 1 of a postseason series...the only two to do so at a younger age were Wade Miller ( 25 years, 26 days old) in Game 1 of the 2001 NLDS vs. ATL and Brandon Backe (26 years, 191 days old) in Game 1 of the 2004 NLCS at STL.
- Struck out nine batters in Game 6 of the ALCS at TB, leading Houston to a $7-4$ win (1ER/6IP).

- Began the season on the Astros OPENING DAY roster, but ended up splitting the season between Houston and Triple A Round Rock.

- Made his first Major League start on Aug. 26 at LAA and tossed 5.0 innings, allowing one run on two hits with three walks and three strikeouts in the Astros 3-1 win...got his second Major League victory and first as a starter...became the fifth pitcher in franchise history to earn a win in his first two Major League appearances....also Bill Dawley (1983), Mark Lemongello (1976), J.R. Richard (1971) and Don Wilson (1966-67).

Became the first pitcher in Astros history to go 4.0+ innings pitched while allowing one run or fewer in each of his first four career appearances in the Major Leagues...also became the sixth pitcher in MLB history to start a career like this, joining Fernando Valenzuela ( 7 g in 1981), Cliff Markle ( 5 g from 1915-16), Kenta Maeda (4g in 2016), Cody Anderson ( 4 g in 2015) and Drew Smyly ( 4 g in 2012).

- Became the second pitcher in franchise history to allow two hits or fewer in each of his first two starts in the Majors, joining Taylor Buchholz (2006).
- On Sept. 23 vs. LAA, provided the Astros with 6.0 innings of one-run ball, striking out nine in relief... became the first Astros pitcher to strike out nine batters in a relief appearance since Jerry Reuss fanned 10 batters in 7.1 relief innings on Sept. 22, 1972 vs. CIN...24-year-old also became the youngest left-handed pitcher to strike out nine batters in a relief appearance since a 23 -year-old Johan Santana struck out nine batters in 4.1 innings of relief innings on Sept. 2, 2002.
- In 22 combined games ( 14 starts) between Double A Corpus Christi $(20 \mathrm{~g})$ and Triple A Fresno ( 2 g ), went $6-5$ with a 4.11 ERA ( $47 \mathrm{ER} / 103 \mathrm{IP}$ ) and 129 strikeouts...prior to his promotion to Triple A, was ranking second in the Texas League in strikeouts with 120...was a Double A Texas League Midseason ALL-STAR...named the Astros Minor League Pitcher of the Month for July.

Began his professional career in 2015 with the Dominican Summer League Astros, going 4-1 with a 3.68 ERA ( $15 \mathrm{ER} / 36.2 \mathrm{IP}$ ) and 36 strikeouts in 16 games.

## 2022 CLUB NOTES

CHAMPS AGAIN!: Behind a strong pitching staff and timely hits, the Astros secured their second World Series championship in franchise history (also, 2017)...this was the club's fifth World Series appearance and their fourth in the last six seasons.

IN THE POSTSEASON: This was the Astros 16th appearance in the postseason in club history in what was the 61st year of the franchise that began in 1962...this season marked the 11th time in club history for the Astros to make the postseason as a division winner, which includes division titles in the NL West (1980, 1986), NL Central (1997-99, 2001) and AL West (2017-19, 2021-22).

SIX STRAIGHT: The Astros have made the postseason in six straight seasons (2017-22), which extended their franchise record, and for the seventh time in the last eight seasons (since 2015)...only the Yankees and Dodgers have also played in the last six postseasons.

SIX YEARS OF DOMINANCE: According to ESPN Stats, the Astros are the first franchise to post a .620 winning percentage and multiple titles over a six-year stretch since the 1953-58 Yankees... the Astros are 541-329 (.622) over the last six seasons (2017-22).

POSTSEASON VETS: Since 2017, the Astros have played more postseason games (86) and have earned more postseason wins (53) than any other club...the Astros are 53-33 in that span with a .616 winning pct. in the postseason.

## PITCHING WINS CHAMPIONSHIPS:

The Astros pitching staff posted a 2.29 ERA (32ER/126IP) with 160 K's and a . 172 opponent average this postseason...their team ERA was the lowest posted by any team in a single postseason run (min. 13g) since the 1996 Atlanta Braves had a 1.89 ERA in 16 games.

THE BULLPEN'S BEST: In the postseason, the Astros bullpen posted a 0.83 ERA (5ER/54.1IP), while allowing just 23 hits and recording 70 strikeouts...their bullpen ERA was the lowest ever posted by any team in a single postseason run (min. 50 IP ), besting the 1996 World Series Champion Yankees, who had a 1.81 ERA (12ER/59.2IP) in 15 games.

FRAMBER'S FALL: LHP Framber Valdez went 3-0 with a 1.44 ERA (4ER/25IP) with three quality starts in four chances this postseason...in his postseason career, Valdez is 7-2 with a 3.41 ERA (26ER/68.2IP) in 13 career postseason games (12 starts)...Valdez's seven career postseason wins rank second in club history, trailing only RHP Justin Verlander (9)...his seven career postseason wins also make him the winningest Dominican-born pitcher in MLB postseason history, surpassing RHP Pedro Martinez (6-4), with his win in Game 6 of the World Series.

POSTSEASON VET: RHP Justin Verlander went 2-0 in four starts this postseason and now has a lifetime 16-11 record and a 3.64 ERA in 35 games ( 34 starts) in playoff action...as an Astro, Verlander is $9-6$ in the postseason and is the franchise leader in career postseason wins...all-time in MLB postseason history, he ranks first in strikeouts and second in wins.

NOT SO SECRET WEAPON: RHP Cris-
tian Javier worked three times this postseason, going 2-0 with a 0.71 ERA (1ER/12.2IP)...Javier has been a huge weapon for the Astros to use in the postseason in his career, going 4-1 with a 2.20 ERA (8ER/32.2IP) in 14 career postseason games, which includes two starts and nine multi-inning relief appearances...in those games, he's been utterly dominant, allowing just a . 127 (14x110) opponent average, while striking out 48 with 32.2 innings.

FINISHING ON FIRE: Including his two starts this postseason (0ER/11.1IP), RHP Cristian Javier finished his season by not allowing a run in six straight starts, which dated back to Sept. 14...Javier allowed just seven hits in 34.1 innings pitched in those six starts for a .067 opponent average.

THE KING: RHP Ryan Pressly is 11 -for-11 in career postseason save opportunities, giving him the most postseason saves in Astros club history... this postseason, Pressly did not allow an earned run in 11.0 innings, recording 13 strikeouts and converting all six save chances successfully.

TRAFFIC: 3B Alex Bregman reached base safely in all 13 of the Astros games this postseason, hitting 294 ( $15 \times 51$ ) with five doubles, three homers, 11 RBI, a . 379 OBP and a . 948 OPS.

## 2022 CLUB NOTES

BALL GO FAR, TEAM GO FAR: The Astros homered in 11 of their 13 games this postseason, combining to hit 17 longballs among six players, including a team-leading four by SS Jeremy Peña...the Astros pitching staff allowed just 13 homers this postseason, 11 being solo shots..

THE HOT CORNER: 3B Alex Bregman has played six full seasons in the Majors (2017-22) and has advanced to at least the ALCS in every full year, now making four World Series appearances, winning two...he's got 15 career postseason homers (six in the World Series) and 47 career postseason RBI, both Major League records for a third baseman.

THE 100 CLUB: After starting the postseason $0 \times 23$ in his first five games, 2B Jose Altuve recovered to hit . 314 ( $11 \times 35$ ) over his last eight games... by doing so, he became the sixth player in MLB history to reach 100 career postseason hits.

FIRST THINGS FIRST: 1B Yuli Gurriel hit safely in 10 of his 12 postseason games, checking in with a $347(17 \times 49)$ average, with two homers and four RBI...Gurriel leads the Majors in postseason hits over the last two years (2021-22) with 36, immediately ahead of 3B Alex Bregman (28)... he now has 87 career postseason hits, which ties him with 1B Albert Pujols for the most postseason hits by a first baseman in MLB history...additionally, Gurriel went the first 11 games and 48 PAs without a strikeout, which tied as the fourth-longest streak in MLB postseason history.

## ABOUTTHEPOSTSEASONROSTER:

The Astros rostered 29 different players throughout the postseason....a veteran team, the Astros carried nine players with no postseason playing experience into October: RHP Hunter Brown, IF Mauricio Dubón, IF David Hensley, C Korey Lee, IF/OF Trey Mancini, RHP Seth Martinez, RHP Rafael Montero, RHP Hector Neris and SS Jeremy Peña...Lee and Martinez were the only two to not appear in a postseason game this season.

PEÑA'S A FIRST: According to STATS, SS Jeremy Peña is the only player in MLB history to win a Gold Glove, LCS MVP and World Series MVP in their entire career...Peña reached all three in his first MLB season.

ABOUT THE WORLD SERIES: The Astros won the 2022 World Series, defeating the Phillies in six games...it was a true team performance, with contributions from all parts of the roster, including a dominant pitching staff and in particular an untouchable bullpen...the staff allowed just three runs per game, with the relievers working to a 0.84 ERA (2ER/21.1IP)...the Astros pitching staff recorded 71 strikeouts in the series, the most ever in a World Series.

FALLSTARS: The Astros were led in the World Series by LHP Framber Valdez (2-0, 1.46 ERA), RHP Bryan Abreu (4g, 0ER/5IP) and RHP Ryan Pressly ( $5 \mathrm{~g}, 0 \mathrm{ER} / 5.2 \mathrm{P}$ ), who all were dominant in their outings...at the plate, the club was led by SS Jeremy Peña (.400, 10x25), the series MVP, and postseason stalwart 2B Jose Altuve (.308, 8x26).

ABOUT THE MVP: SS Jeremy Peña won the World Series MVP after leading the club in hits in the series, while hitting safely in all six games at a 400 clip (10x25)....he had game-winning RBI in Game 2 and Game 5 , including a three-hit performance in Game 5 ... by winning the MVP, Peña became the third rookie (first rookie position player) to win World Series MVP, following the Marlins Livan Hernandez in 1997 and the Dodgers Larry Sherry in 1959.

ROOKIE IN NAME ONLY: This World Series featured a pair of rookie shortstops in the Astros SS Jeremy Peña and the Phillies SS Bryson Stott... per Elias, prior to this series, there had never been a World Series game in which both teams started rookie shortstops...additionally, in Game 5, Peña became the first rookie shortstop in Major League history to hit a home run in a World Series game.

THE WINTER CLASSIC: The Astros won the World Series on Nov. 5, the latest date the World Series has been played on in Major League history.

FRAMBER'S FALL CLASSIC: LHP Framber Valdez went 2-0 with a 1.46 ERA (2ER/12.1IP) with 18 strikeouts in his two starts in the World Series...he had nine strikeouts in each start, including a run of five straight strikeouts in Game 6 ... according to Stats LLC, he joined the Dodgers Sandy Koufax in 1963 Game 1 at NYY as the only lefties to record five consecutive strikeouts in a World Series game.

## 2022 CLUB NOTES

FIGHTING THROUGH: The Astros had a few players banged up throughout their postseason run, including C Martín Maldonado, who was playing with a sports hernia all October...Maldonado had his injury repaired with surgery on Nov. 15...additionally, 3B Alex Bregman suffered a fractured left index finger on a slide into 2 nd base in the 8th inning of Game 6 of the World Series...Bregman will not require surgery.

YORDANSEALSIT: LF Yordan Alvarez was the hero of the World Series clinching game (Game $6)$, after he hit a three-run, go-ahead homer in the 6th inning...it was his third game-winning homer in the 6th inning (or later) this postseason, which tied him with Troy Glaus (3 for Anaheim in 2002) for the most in a single Postseason...additionally, Alvarez's homer, which went over the batters eye in center field, measured at 450', the second-longest World Series homer since Statcast data is available (since 2015) behind Atlanta's Freddie Freeman (460) in 2021 Game 5.

A HALL OF FAMERS FIRST: RHP Justin Verlander, who was pitching in his fifth World Series (2006, 2012, 2017, 2019, 2022) this season, earned his first World Series win in Game 5...his Game 5 start was his ninth career start in the Fall Classic... he recorded the win after tossing 5.0 innings of one-run ball.

PINEAPPLE SEASON: Postseason veteran 1B Yuli Gurriel reached a few notable milestones in Game 4 of the World Series, including collecting his 12th career World Series RBI, the most ever by a Cuban-born player...also, he picked up a stolen base at the age of 38 years and 146 days in Game 4, becoming the oldest player to record a steal in the World Series since the Yankees Paul O'Neill (38.247) swiped a bag in Game 3 of the 2001 World Series vs. ARI..

YOUR TURN ROOK: DH David Hensley got two starts in the World Series, in Game 3 and Game 5...Hensley has just 34 career regular season plate appearances under his belt, which all came this season...per Elias, only two other position players in MLB history had fewer career regular season plate appearances when making a start in the World Series: Jack Sheehan (6) for Brooklyn in the 1920 World Series and Buddy Myer (8) for Washington in the 1925 World Series.

NO-NO! NO WAY?: In Game 4 of the World Series, the Astros pitched the third no-hitter in postseason history, the second no-hitter in World Series history and the first combined no-hitter in postseason history...just a few of many notes on the night:

- RHP Cristian Javier (7IP) was the starter, as he combined with RHP Bryan Abreu (1IP), RHP Rafael Montero (1IP) and RHP Ryan Pressly (1|P) to turn in the historic trick.
- the offense scored all of their runs in the 5 th, plating five for the franchise's biggest inning in World Series history.
- the other no-hitters in MLB postseason history: Roy Halladay (PHI) in the 2010 NLDS (G1) vs. CIN; Don Larsen (NYY) in the 1956 WS (G5) vs. BKL.
- Javier became the 10th pitcher in World Series history with a no-hit bid of 6-or-more IP and the first since Jerry Koosman (NYM) (6 IP) in the 1969 WS at BAL (G2).
- the starter Javier and the closer Pressly both were also a part of the Astros combined no-hitter back on June 25 at NYY...they are now the first pitchers in MLB history to be a part of two combined no-hitters in their careers.
- C Christian Vázquez was behind the plate for the no-hitter, becoming the second catcher to catch a no-hitter in the World Series, joining C Yogi Berra, who caught Larsen's no-hitter in the 1956 World Series.

BLAST OFF!: In the 1st inning of Game 2 of the World Series, 2B Jose Altuve, SS Jeremy Peña and DH Yordan Alvarez all doubled within a span of four pitches...they became the first teammates in World Series history to start a game with three consecutive extra-base hits.

TUCK'S NIGHT: In Game 1 of the World Series, RF Kyle Tucker became the first player in Astros history with a multi-homer game in the World Series...it also marked the eighth multi-homer game in Astros postseason history and the first since Michael Brantley hit two in Game 4 of the 2020 ALDS vs. OAK, which was played at Dodger Stadium...the previous seven instances for the Astros all came in the Division Series.

SEVEN STRAIGHT TO START: The Astros won their first seven games this postseason, a streak that was snapped in Game 1 of the World Series...it marked the club's longest postseason win streak in franchise history...they became the fifth team in MLB history to begin a postseason with seven straight wins, also the 1976 Reds (7), 2007 Rockies (7), 2014 Royals (8) and 2020 Braves (7).

## 2022 CLUB NOTES

PHILLY CONNECTIONS: The World Series was special for most, in particular OF Chas McCormick, who was born and raised in West Chester, PA, as a Phillies fan...McCormick stayed local in college, attending D2 Millersville College (PA) before being drafted by the Astros in the 21st round in 2017...the series was also big for RHP Hector Neris, who spent the first 12 years of his professional career in the Phillies organization before signing with the Astros as a free agent prior to 2022...McCormick started all six games of the World Series, while Neris worked three scoreless appearances (2IP) in the Fall Classic.

42 YEARS LATER: Prior to the World Series, the Astros and Phillies had some postseason history, as they faced off against each other in the 1980 NLCS, a five-game series that went the distance in favor of the Phils...it was a heartbreaker in Houston as the loss eliminated the Astros from their first postseason appearance in franchise history... Game 5 , which was played at the Astrodome, lasted 10 innings and was one of four extra-inning games that series...the NLCS MVP went to Phillies 2B Manny Trillo, while the Astros best player was CF Terry Puhl, who hit . 526 (10x19) with three RBI in the five games.

BACK IN THE ALCS: The Astros have advanced to the ALCS for six straight years, a feat that has only been accomplished by one other club in Major League history, the 1991-99 Braves...that Braves team advanced to every LCS played from 1991-99, excluding the 1994 season, which did not have a postseason.

ABOUT THE ALCS: The Astros swept through the Yankees in the ALCS for the club's first sweep of a seven-game series in club history...the Astros pitching was the reason, as the club posted a 1.50 ERA ( $6 \mathrm{ER} / 26 \mathrm{IP}$ ) and allowed just nine runs in the four games...the offense produced 18 runs in the series, including four apiece off the bats of 3 BAlex Bregman (.333, $5 \times 15$, HR, 4 RBI) and the series MVP SS Jeremy Peña (.353, 6x17, 2 HR, 4 RBI).

WE WANT HOUSTON!: When the Astros eliminated the Yankees in the ALCS, it marked the fourth time for Houston to bounce New York in the postseason...according to MLB.com's Sarah Langs, four times is the most any team has eliminated the Yankees from the postseason in their storied history...Houston dispatched New York in the 2015 Wild Card Game in New York, and in the ALCS in 2017, 2019 and 2022.

MV-PEÑA: Rookie SS Jeremy Peña was named the ALCS MVP...according to Elias, Peña became the fifth rookie to earn MVP honors in an LCS, following Mike Boddicker in 1983, Liván Hernández in 1997, Michael Wacha in 2013 and Randy Arozarena in 2020.

ROOKIE OPENS BUSINESS IN THE ALCS: In Game 1 of the ALCS, SS Jeremy Peña doubled twice and homered, becoming the fifth rookie in MLB history with three extra-base hits in a playoff game, also Carlos Correa (2015 ALDS), Evan Longoria (2008 ALDS), Jacoby Ellsbury (2007 WS) and Jim Gilliam (1953 WS).

BOUT THE ALDS: The Astros swept the Mariners in a hard-fought ALDS series, winning Game 1 by two runs and Games 2 and 3 by one run in each contest...if an MVP was awarded for the series, it would have gone to LF Yordan Alvarez, who hit two homers and posted seven RBI in the series...Alvarez's homers were both game winners, a walkoff shot in Game 1 and a late-inning go-ahead homer in Game 2...the Astros pitching staff was led by their bullpen, which combined to allow just one run in 20.1 innings (0.44 ERA).

DÉJÀ VU: SS Jeremy Peña homered in the 18th inning of Game 3 of the ALDS, which accounted for the only run in the contest...he is now one of only three rookies to hit a homer in extra-innings in the postseason, including fellow Astro Chris Burke, who hit his memorable shot in the 18th inning of Game 4 of the 2005 NLDS, which sent the Astros to the LCS...joining Peña and Burke on that list is the Guardians Oscar Gonzalez, who did so in Game 2 of the 2022 Wild Card Series vs. TB.

## 2022 CLUB NOTES

GAME 3 MARATHON: The Astros closed out the Mariners in Game 3 of the ALDS with a 1-0 victory in 18 innings....a few notes on the contest:

- in terms of innings, Game 3 tied as the longest postseason game in MLB history...also: 2018 WS G3 (BOS vs. LAD), 2014 NLDS G3 (SF vs. WSH), 2005 NLDS G4 (ATL vs. HOU)...with a game time of $6: 22$, Game 3 ranked as the third-longest in postseason history.
- Game 3 was the first postseason game to remain scoreless through the first 17 innings, besting the previous record of 14 innings, set earlier in the 2022 postseason by Cleveland and Tampa in Game 2 of the WC Series.
- Game 3 marked the Astros fourth 1-0 win in the postseason...they last won $1-0$ in Game 1 of the 1986 NLCS vs. NYM, with RHP Mike Scott going the distance for HOU.
- the Astros struck out 22 hitters, the second-most in postseason history, trailing only the 23 strikeouts racked up by Cleveland in Game 4 of the 1996 ALDS vs. BAL...also, the two teams combined for 42 strikeouts on the day, which is a single-game postseason record.
- RHP Luis Garcia earned the win and became the second Astro to work 5.0 scoreless in relief in a postseason game, joining LHP Framber Valdez, who did so in Game 1 of the 2020 AL Wild Card Series at MIN...Garcia was also just the second pitcher in postseason history to work 5.0 -plus scoreless relief innings which all came in extras, joining RHP Yusmeiro Petit (6IP), who did so for the Giants in Game 2 of the 2014 NLDS vs. SF.

YORDAN'S START IN THE ALDS: LF Yordan Alvarez got the postseason started for Houston, as he was the hero in both Game 1 and Game 2 of the ALDS... he hit a walkoff homer in Game 1 and a 6th-inning, go-ahead homer in Game 2...a few notes on his series:

- Alvarez became the first player in MLB postseason history to hit multiple go-ahead homers in the 6th inning or later while their team was trailing....he would later hit a third homer of such ilk, in Game 6 of the World Series.
- Alvarez posted seven RBI in the first two games of the series, which tied for the second-most of any player in MLB history through their first two games in a postseason, trailing only OF Reggie Sanders, who had eight RBI in the Cardinals first two games of the 2005 postseason.
- Alvarez became the fourth player in Astros club history to homer in the first two games of a postseason and was the first to do so since 3B Alex Bregman in 2018.

YOR KIDDING ME!: In Game 1 of the ALDS vs. SEA, LF Yordan Alvarez hit a historic walk-off, three-run homer...a few notes on his performance below:

- Alvarez is the second player to hit a walkoff homer in MLB history with their team down to its final out, with OF Kirk Gibson hitting the other for the Dodgers vs. OAK in Game 1 of the 1988 World Series.
- Alvarez is the fourth player to hit a walkoff homer in the postseason when his team was trailing, joining Lenny Dykstra (1986 NLCS), Kirk Gibson (1988 WS) and Joe Carter ( 1993 WS)...Alvarez's homer was the only one of these four hit with his team trailing by multiple runs.
- Alvarez's homer was the 7th walkoff HR in Astros postseason history and the first since SS Carlos Correa in Game 5 of the 2020 ALCS.
- Alvarez is the fifth Astro to post a five RBI game in the postseason....also: Carlos Correa (2020 ALDS, G4), Alex Bregman (2019 WS, G4), Morgan Ensberg (2005 NLDS, G1), Carlos Beltrán (2004 NLDS, G5).

IN THE STANDINGS: At 106-56, the Astros finished their regular season with the best record in the AL and the second-best record in the Majors, trailing only the Dodgers (111-51)...the Astros won the AL West by 16.0 games over the second-place Mariners to give themselves their second consecutive division title and their fifth in the last six seasons.

THE \#1 SEED: By finishing with the best record in the AL, the Astros clinched homefield advantage throughout the AL postseason...this season marks the third time in franchise history for the Astros to own the best record in their league (also, 1980 and 2019).

PILING UP WINS: The Astros 106 wins were the second-most in franchise history, trailing only the 2019 club's 107 -win total...the Astros have won 435 games over the last six seasons (2017-22), the second-highest total in the Majors, trailing only the Dodgers (562).

100 CLUB: By reaching 100 wins this season, Elias says the Astros are the first club in AL history to reach 100 victories four times in a span of five full seasons (2017-19, 2022)...on the NL side, the Dodgers have also accomplished this feat, reaching 100 wins four times in the last five full seasons (2017-18, 2021-22).

VS. THE WEST: The Astros dominated their division, going $51-25$ vs. the AL West, including winning records against all four divisional foes, the Rangers (14-5), Angels (13-6), M's (12-7) and A's (12-7).

IN THE DAYTIME: The Astros 42-13 (.763) record in day games was tops in the Majors and ranked as the third best all-time in AL history, behind the 2011 Yankees (44-12, .786) and 2018 Red Sox (36-10, .783).

RUN IT BACK!: On Nov. 9, the Astros announced the signing of manager Dusty Baker to a one-year contract for the 2024 season...Baker has had a remarkable run of success with the Astros over his three seasons (2020-22), leading the club to the ALCS in 2020, the World Series in 2021 and to a World Series Championship in 2022.

AGE IS JUST A NUMBER: Astros manager Dusty Baker won his first World Series as a manager at the age of 73...according to STATS, Baker is the oldest manager or head coach in MLB, NBA, NFL or NHL history to win a championship.

AT THE HELM: By reaching 106 wins this season, Astros manager Dusty Baker became just the fourth manager in MLB history to win 100 games in both leagues, joining Sparky Anderson, Whitey Herzog and Tony LaRussa...in his career, this was Baker's ninth division title and his 12th postseason berth.

HALL OF FAME LIST: Astros skipper Dusty Baker won his 2,000th game as a manager on May 3 vs. SEA, and would finish his regular season with 2,093 managerial wins, which rank ninth in MLB history...all eight managers ahead of Baker on the all-time list are in the Hall of Fame.

BBWAA FINALISTS: The Astros had two players named finalists for national BBWAAAwards: LF Yordan Alvarez (AL MVP) and RHP Justin Verlander (AL Cy Young)...Alvarez is in contention for his first career MVP Award, while Verlander is already a two-time Cy Young Award winner (2011, 2019)...the MVP winners will be announced on Thursday, Nov. 17.

## 2022 CLUB NOTES

SILVER SLUGGERS: The Astros had two players earn Silver Sluggers this season, 2B Jose Altuve and DH Yordan Alvarez...for Altuve, this marks his sixth career Silver Slugger Award (20142018, 2022), which is the most in Astros franchise history, surpassing 2B Craig Biggio (catcher in 1989, second baseman in 1994-95, 1997-98)..for Alvarez, this is his first career Silver SluggerAward.

GOLDEN GLOVERS: During the postseason, Rawlings named SS Jeremy Peña and RF Kyle Tucker the AL Gold Glove winners at their respective positions...for Peña, according to Elias, he became the first rookie shortstop in Major League history to earn a Gold Glove Award...Tucker is just the third Astros outfielder to win a Gold Glove, joining CF Michael Bourn (2009-10) and CF Cesar Cedeño (1972-76).

PENDING FREE AGENTS: Following the postseason, the Astros had nine players reach free agency: LF Michael Brantley, C Jason Castro, IF Aledmys Díaz, 1B Yuli Gurriel, 1B Trey Mancini, RHP Rafael Montero, LHP Will Smith, C Christian Vázquez and RHP Justin Verlander.

MONTERO RETURNS: On Nov. 15, the Astros announced that they had re-signed RHP Rafael Montero to a three-year contract....Montero recorded a career-low 2.37 ERA (18ER/68.1IP) with a $5-2$ record along with 73 strikeouts, 14 saves and a 1.02 WHIP in a career-high 71 appearances this season.

FRANCE ADDED TO 40-MAN: On Nov. 15, the Astros added RHP J.P. France to the 40man roster...France, 27, spent his entire season with Triple A Sugar Land, appearing in 34 games and making 15 starts....he posted a 3-4 record with a 3.90 ERA (48ER/110.2IP) with three saves, 136 strikeouts, a . 233 opponent batting average and a 1.36 WHIP.

PITCHING IN: Astros pitchers won the Triple Crown in the AL, leading in wins (106), ERA (2.90) and K's (1,524)...they also led the AL in opp. avg. (.212), WHIP (1.09) and opp. OPS (.613)...the starters had the lowest ERA (2.95) among all AL rotations and their bullpen ERA $(2.80)$ was the lowest in MLB.

ALL-TIME BESTS: The 2022 Astros pitching staff set franchise records for a full, 162-game season in ERA (2.90), opponent average (.212) and WHIP (1.09)...prior to this year, the franchise record for lowest staff ERA in a full season was 3.10 , set by the 1980 club.

OFFENSIVERANKINGS: The Astros ranked second in the AL in homers (214), third in OPS (.743), third in SLG (.424), third in runs (737), third in walks (528), fourth in doubles and fourth in OBP (.319)...the club also struck out the second-fewest times in the Majors (1179), trailing only the Guardians (1122).

ALL-STAR NOTEBOOK: In the 2022 All-Star Game at Dodger Stadium, LHP Framber Valdez hurled a scoreless inning in relief and became the first Astros pitcher in club history to earn a win in an All-Star Game...manager Dusty Baker also earned his first All-Star Game win in two tries...he is the third Astros manager to manage the Midsummer Classic, joining Phil Garner (2006) and AJ Hinch (2018)...the Astros had five players selected to the AL squad this season (Jose Altuve, Yordan Alvarez, Kyle Tucker, Framber Valdez, Justin Verlander)...the Astros 27 All-Star selections since 2017 are the most in the Majors in that span.

LIKE A FINE WINE: 39 -year-old RHP Justin Verlander wonthe ALCy Young after leading the AL in wins (18), ERA (1.75), WHIP (0.83), opponents OPS (.497) and opponent average (.186).

HALL OF FAME COMPANY: RHP Justin Verlander finished his season with a 1.75 ERA, which was the lowest posted by an Astros starting pitcher in a full season in club history, besting RHP Roger Clemens, who worked to a 1.87 ERA in 2005...additionally, Verlander's ERA was the lowest posted by an AL pitcher in a full season since the Red Sox RHP Pedro Martinez had a 1.74 ERA in his Cy Young season of 2000.

RECORD RUN: LHP Framber Valdez set a new MLB single-season record by registering 25 consecutive quality starts from April 25-Sept. 18...RHP Jacob deGrom had previously held the single-season record of 24 straight, which he set in 2018...Valdez's streak bested the previous franchise record set by RHP Mike Scott (20 straight in 1986).

INNINGS EATER: LHP Framber Valdez led the AL in innings (201.1) and led the Majors in quality starts (26)...also, he was the only AL pitcher with three complete games this season and became the firstAstros pitcher to post three CG's in a single season since LHP Dallas Keuchel in 2015.

## 2022 CLUB NOTES

THE MAN CAME AROUND: RHP Ryan Pressly retired 32 consecutive hitters spanning parts of 10 appearances from June 25-July 28...a few notes on Pressly's record-setting streak:

- per Elias, the 32 consecutive batters retired is the Astros franchise record for a reliever...the previous record by an Astros reliever was 27 hitters, set down by RHP Dave Giusti from July 26-Aug. 14, 1965.
- Pressly's 32 straight batters retired also tied the club record by any pitcher, also only reached by RHP Justin Verlander, who did so from Sept. 1-7, 2019.
- Pressly's streak is the longest by an MLB reliever in a single season since RHP Yusmeiro Petit retired 39 straight for the Giants from June 18-Aug. 23, 2014.
- Pressly's streak began on June 25 at NYY when he hurled the final three outs of the Astros combined no-hitter in the Bronx.

STUD STANEK: RHP Ryne Stanek finished his season with a 1.15 ERA (7ER/54.2IP), which was the lowest in the AL among qualified relievers... his ERA also ranks as the lowest ERA in a single season by a reliever in club history, besting RHP Will Harris who worked to a 1.50 ERA in 2019.

POWER BROKER: LF Yordan Alvarez had an MVP-caliber season, hitting . 306 with 37 HR and 97 RBI with a 1.019 OPS....in the AL, he ranked second in OBP (.406), SLG (.613) and OPS (1.019), third in HR (37), fourth in runs (95), and tied for fifth in RBI (97)...additionally, he ranked second in the Majors in hard-hit percentage ( $59.8 \%$ ).

ALL-STAR ALTUVE: 2B Jose Altuve was named the All-Star Game starter at second base via the fan vote...this marked his eighth career All-Star Game selection, a club record, besting 2B Craig Biggio, who was selected seven times in his Hall of Fame career...Altuve did not play in All-Star Game while nursing an injury.

ALTUVE'S ROUND NUMBERS: 2B Jose
Altuve finished his season with a .300 average and a . 920 OPS...Altuve has hit .300 for a full season six times in his career (2014-18, 2022) and has posted an OPS over . 900 four times (2016-17, 2019, 2022).

LEADING MAN: 2B Jose Altuve led all American League leadoff hitters in runs (103), hits (158), doubles (39), homers (28) and walks (66)...Altuve hit 12 leadoff homers this season, which tied the franchise record for a single season, also reached by CF George Springer in 2019.

POWER + SPEED: LF Kyle Tucker was the only MLB player with $30+$ HR and $25+$ steals... those two totals have only been reached by one other player in the same season in Astros history: 1B Jeff Bagwell $(1997,1999)$.

LEFT-ON-LEFT: RF Kyle Tucker hit 12 home runs off left-handed pitchers this season, which tied the Astros single-season record for homers by a lefty off a lefty, set in 2021 by both Tucker and LF Yordan Alvarez.

ROOKIE BOMBS: SS Jeremy Peña hit 22 homers this season, becoming just the third rookie in franchise history to hit 22 longballs in a single season...others on that list: Yordan Alvarez (27 HR in 2019) and Carlos Correa (22 HR in 2015).

MILB PLAYERS OF THE YEAR: RHP Hunter Brown and C Yainer Diaz were named the club's Minor League Pitcher and Player of the Year...both were September call-ups for the Astros, with Brown excelling in his limited MLB action with a 0.89 ERA (2ER/20.1IP) in seven games (two starts).

10STRAIGHT: With a $3-1$ win on Opening Day, April 7 vs. LAA, the Astros have won 10 straight games on Opening Day (2013-22), which ties as the longest streak in Major League history...2B Jose Altuve has been a part of all 10 of those victories, as he's now 10-1 in Opening Days in his illustrious career.

THAT'S IMMACULATE: According to MLB. com, the Astros made MLB history on June 15 at TEX, becoming the first team to have two pitchers toss immaculate innings in the same game, accomplished by RHP Luis Garcia (2nd inning) and RHP Phil Maton (7th)...the two turned the trick on the same group of three hitters: Nathaniel Lowe, Ezequiel Duran and Brad Miller...these marked the eighth and ninth immaculate innings in Astros history, last accomplished by RHP Will Harris on Sept. 27, 2019 at LAA.

KING TUCK: RF Kyle Tucker hit exactly 30 home runs this season, the same number he hit in 2021...Tucker's 107 RBI were a career high and marked the most by an Astros full-time outfielder since LF Carlos Lee drove in 115 back in 2007.

## 2022 CLUB NOTES

ABOUT THE NO-NO: On June 15 at NYY, the Astros tossed their 14th no-hitter in club history and their third combined no-hitter...it also marked the 18th combined no-hitter in MLB history...a few notes on the day:

- RHP Cristian Javier (7IP), RHP Hector Neris (1IP) and RHP Ryan Pressly (1IP) combined for the no-hitter with C Martín Maldonado behind the dish.
- Javier struck out 13 , which was the most strikeouts by any pitcher against the Yankees this season.
- the no-hitter marked the Astros first combined no-hitter since RHP Aaron Sanchez, RHP Will Harris, RHP Joe Biagini and RHP Chris Devenski turned the trick on Aug. 3, 2019 vs. SEA...Maldonado was also behind the plate for this combined no-hitter, making him the first catcher in MLB history to catch multiple combined no-hitters.
- the no-hitter was the Astros second in their franchise history in the Bronx...the first was June 11, 2003 at old Yankee Stadium...that was also a combined no-hitter that featured six pitchers: RHP Roy Oswalt, RHP Peter Munro, RHP Kirk Saarloos, RHP Brad Lidge, RHP Octavio Dotel and LHP Billy Wagner.
- the Yankees have only been no-hit twice dating back to the 1959 season, both done by the Astros (2003, 2022).

K KINGS: With 20 strikeouts on July 3 vs. LAA, the Astros tied the MLB record for a $9.0-$ inning game, becoming the eighth team in MLB history to accomplish the feat, most recently done by the White Sox on April 28, 2019 vs. DET...the 20 strikeouts in a 9.0-inning game was a franchise record, besting their previous record of 19 , which was last reached on Aug. 28, 2019 vs. TB...additionally, per Elias, the Astros recorded 48 strikeouts in their three-game series against the Angels from July $1-3$, the most ever posted in a single three-game series in MLB history.

UVALDE STRONG: on Aug. 14, the Astros hosted the community of Uvalde, TX, at Minute Maid Park....prior to the game, Astros Owner and Chairman Jim Crane was joined by Dusty Baker, Jose Altuve, Alex Bregman and Lance McCullers, Jr., all of whom took part in a Q\&A session hosted by Todd Kalas with a large group from Uvalde...overall, the Astros donated 3,500 tickets to the Uvalde community and provided 10 buses for the families and staff connected to those that were affected by the shooting at Robb Elementary School earlier this year...the Astros Foundation visited Uvalde on July 8 and have committed to the continued support for healing of the community through the game of baseball.

## HOUSTON OPEN CROWNS CHAM-

 PION: On Nov. 13, Tony Finau was crowned the winner of the 2022 Cadence Bank Houston Open...this year's tournament represents the fourth year the Astros Golf Foundation has hosted this premier PGA TOUR event and third at its permanent home, Memorial Park Golf Course in the heart of Houston...one of the most significant benefits of the Cadence Bank Houston Open is its positive civic and economic impact on the Houston community... overall, thanks to the generous contributions of corporate partners, community leaders and fans, this year's tournament anticipates delivering over $\$ 6$ million in total charitable proceeds to various local initiatives via the Astros Foundation.DIAMOND DREAMS: On Nov. 18, the Astros Foundation is hosting the seventh annual Diamond Dreams Gala presented by Chevron, featuring legendary Grammy Award-winning R\&B group Boyz II Men on the field of Minute Maid Park...the charitable event will benefit the Astros Foundation as well as New Hope Housing, an organization combating homelessness by providing housing and support service for those in need.

TOMMY DAVIS: A right-handed hitting outfielder on the 1969 and 1970 Houston Astros, Tommy Davis passed away on April 3, 2022 at 83 years old. Davis spent 18 years in the Majors with the Dodgers (1959-1966), Mets (1967), White Sox (1968), Pilots (1969), Astros (1969-1970), A's (1970, 1971), Cubs (1970-1971), Orioles (19721975), Angels (1976) and Royals (1976). He was two -time All-Star as well as a two-time batting champion both occurring with the Dodgers in 1962-63. Davis played 81 career games with the Astros recording a .271 batting average with four home runs and 39 RBI.


LEE THOMAS: A member of the 1968 Houston Astros, Lee Thomas passed away on August 31, 2022 at the age of 86 . Thomas had a eight-year Major League career, spending time with the Yankees (1961), Angels (19611964), Red Sox (1964-1965), Braves (1966), Cubs (1966-1967) and Astros (1968). He earned an All-Star appearance during the 1962 season, when he hit 290 with 21 doubles, 26 home runs, 104 RBI and a .821 OPS. In his lone season with Houston, he appeared in 90 games.
 CHUCK CARR: The switch-hitting center fielder Chuck Carr passed away on Nov. 12, 2022 at the age of 55 . Carr had a eight-year Major League career with the Mets (1990-91), Cardinals (1992), Marlins (19931995), Brewers (1996-1997) and Astros (1997). Carr finished fourth in the Rookie of the Year voting in 1993. During that season, he recorded a .267 batting average with 75 runs, 147 hits, 41 RBI and a league-leading 58 stolen bases for the Florida Marlins. The Astros signed Carr as a free agent on June 1, 1997. He went on to play in 63 games for Houston that season in which he batted .276 with 11 doubles, two triples, four home runs, 17 RBI and 11 stolen bases.

ASTROS HALL OF FAME PRESENTED BY HOUSTON METHODIST
The Astros Hall of Fame presented by Houston Methodist was established in 2019, and resides in Hall of Fame Alley on the main concourse of Minute Maid Park in left-center field. The Astros Hall ofFame was created to give Astros fans an opportunity to celebrate and connect with the greatest individuals and moments in Astros franchise history.

The inaugural Astros Hall of Fame class of 2019 featured 16 individuals: the nine Astros with retired numbers, as well as the members of the Astros Walk of Fame located on Texas Ave. outside Minute Maid Park. Each member of the Astros Hall of Fame has their own custom plaque on display inside Hall of Fame Alley.

In 2023, the Astros will induct another two franchise icons into the Astros Hall of Fame as the Class of 2023: Bill Doran and Bill Brown.



## 14•3B BOB ASPROMONTE (1956, 1960-71) <br> CLASS OF 2019

An original member of the Colt .45 s franchise, Aspromonte took the first plate appearance in Houston franchise history, as he was the leadoff hitter in the club's inaugural game on April 10, 1962. Aspromonte recorded the first hit, run and stolen base in Houston franchise history, and was an Opening Day starter in all seven of his seasons with Houston. He established a franchise record for grand slams (6), and in 1965 he tallied 14 game-winning hits and a team-high 11 game-winning RBI. Aspromonte also recorded the first regular season homer by an Astros player in the Astrodome on April 24, 1965.


## 5•1B JEFF BAGWELL (1991-2005) CLASS OF 2019

One of two players inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame as a member of the Astros, Bagwell played his entire 15-year career with Houston, leading the club to six playoff appearances, four division titles and a National League Pennant (2005). He became the first player in Astros history to be named MVP of his league (1994), and was the first Astros player to win Rookie of the Year (1991). The franchise leader in homers (449), walks (1401) and RBI (1529), Bagwell was also an elite defensive player, winning a Gold Glove Award in 1994. He is the only first baseman in MLB history to record 200 steals and 400 homers.


## 7 • 2B CRAIG BIGGIO (1988-2007) <br> CLASS OF 2019

The first player to be inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame as a member of the Astros, Craig Biggio played all 20 of his Major League seasons with the Astros. He is the only player in Astros history to reach 3,000 total hits, and is the MLB modern-day all-time leader in hit by pitches (285) and ranks third all-time in leadoff home runs (53). Biggio was named to seven All-Star teams, won five Silver Slugger Awards and four Gold Gloves. Biggio impacted the community off the field as well with his lifelong dedication to the Sunshine Kids organization, and in 2007 he won MLB's Roberto Clemente Award for his efforts in the community.


## $25 \cdot L F$ JOSE CRUZ (1975-87)

CLASS OF 2019
Jose "Cheo" Cruz played 19 total seasons in the Majors, including 13 seasons with the Astros where he was a fan favorite. Cruz played in 1,870 games with the Astros, batting .292 with 335 doubles, a franchise-record 80 triples, 138 home runs, 942 RBI and 288 stolen bases. Cruz was a two-time All-Star and two-time Silver Slugger Award winner with Houston. In 1980, he finished third in the NL MVP voting and led Houston to its first-ever division title and postseason berth. Cruz spent 13 seasons as the Astros Major League first base coach and over a decade in the front office.


## 49•RHP LARRY DIERKER (1964-76) <br> CLASS OF 2019

In addition to pitching 13 seasons in the Majors with Houston, Larry Dierker impacted the Astros for over 40 years as a broadcaster, front office executive and as one of the greatest managers in franchise history. The franchise-leader in innings pitched, complete games, shutouts and starts, Dierker was a two-time All-Star, posting a 137-117 record and a 3.28 ERA in 345 career games ( 320 starts) with the Astros. Dierker became the sixth manager in MLB history to lead his club to a division title in his first season, and led the Astros to four division titles in his five seasons. In 1998, Dierker was named the NL Manager of the Year.


## BROADCASTER•GENE ELSTON (1962-86) CLASS OF 2019

Gene Elston broadcast Major League games in Houston for 25 years as the Voice of the Astros from 1962-86. He was behind the mic for the first game in franchise history on April 10, 1962, when the Colt . 45 s defeated the Chicago Cubs. Elston was the first play-by-play broadcaster fo the Houston franchise, and a generation of baseball fans received their introductions to both the Astros and MLB by his broadcasts. Elston broadcast baseball 47 years, and in 2006 was honored with the Ford C. Frick Award from the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum for his significant and lasting contributions to the game of baseball.

## BROADCASTER • MILO HAMILTON (1985-2012) CLASS OF 2019

Milo Hamilton, the 1992 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award, broadcast Major League baseball for close to 60 years, including 28 seasons with the Astros. Hamilton was behind the mic for some of the greatest moments in Astros franchise history, including the club's Na tional League pennant run in 2005, Craig Biggio's 3,000th hit, Nolan Ryan's 4,000th strikeout and six postseason appearances. Hamilton was also a tremendous ambassador for the Astros away from the booth, dedicating his time to numerous charitable endeavors and fundraising activities.


## $8 \cdot 2 B$ JOE MORGAN (1963-71, 1980) CLASS OF 2019

Before going on to win two NL MVP Awards and two World Series Championships with the Big Red Machine in Cincinnati, Joe Morgan kickstarted a Hall of Fame career with the Houston Colt . 45 s and Astros from 1963-71. A two-time All-Star with Houston, Morgan finished second in the NL Rookie of the Year Award voting in 1965, winning the Sporting News Rookie of the Year award. Morgan returned to the Astros in 1980 and helped the club reach its first playoff berth and division title in franchise history. Morgan still ranks among the top five Astros all-time in triples (2nd, 63), OBP (4th, .374) and stolen bases (5th, 219).


## 36•RHP JOE NIEKRO (1975-85) <br> CLASS OF 2019

The Astros all-time franchise leader in career wins with 144, Joe Niekro pitched in 11 seasons with the Astros as part of a 22-year career in the Majors. While the knuckleballer found moderate success prior to joining the Astros, he blossomed into a true ace with Houston. Over a seven-year stretch from 1977-83, Niekro was one of the game's elite pitchers, leading the National League in innings pitched $(1,857)$ while ranking second in strikeouts $(1,228)$ in that span. Niekro set a new single-season franchise record for wins in 1979, going 21-11 with a 3.00 ERA while being named to the NL All-Star team.


## $37 \cdot R H P$ SHANE REYNOLDS (1992-2001) <br> CLASS OF 2019

Shane Reynolds led the Astros starting rotation during the final years of the Astrodome and the first years of Minute Maid Park, helping the Astros reach the playoffs four times in his 11 seasons with the club. An All-Star in 2000, Reynolds went 103-86 with a 3.95 ERA and 1,309 strikeouts in 274 career games ( 248 starts) in his Astros career. Reynolds led the NL in starts in back-to-back years from 1998-99, and eclipsed 200.0 innings pitched in three out-offour seasons from 1996-99. He won 19 games while posting a 3.51 ERA and 209 strikeouts in 1998, propelling the Astros to a second-straight division title.


50•RHP J.R. RICHARD (1971-80) CLASS OF 2019

J.R. Richard was one of the most imposing pitchers of his era. In 10 seasons with Houston, he went 107-71 with a 3.15 ERA, 76 complete games, 19 shutouts and 1,493 strikeouts in 238 games. Richard won the NL ERA title in 1979 with a 2.71 mark over 38 starts while also setting a new single-season club record for strikeouts with 313. In 1978, he became the first pitcher in franchise history to lead the Majors in strikeouts in a single season (303). Richard's 1,493 strikeouts are the third-most in club history. Richard was named to the NL All-Star team in 1980, but suffered a career-ending stroke on July 30, 1980.


## 34•RHP NOLAN RYAN (1980-88) CLASS OF 2019

Major League Baseball's strikeout king spent nine seasons pitching at the top of Houston's rotation, his most among any of the four teams he played for in a 27 -year career. In 282 starts with the Astros, Ryan went 106-94 with a 3.13 ERA, 1,866 strikeouts, 38 complete games and 13 shutouts. The all-time franchise leader in career strikeouts, Ryan also owns the top career ERA in Astros history. A two-time All-Star with Houston, he led the NL in both ERA (2.76) and strikeouts (270) as a 40-year-old in 1987. In 1980, his first year with Houston, he helped pitch the club to their first National League West Division title.


## $33 \cdot$ MIKE SCOTT (1984-91)

CLASS OF 2019
Mike Scott pitched nine seasons with Houston, tallying a 110-81 record with a 3.30 ERA and 1,318 strikeouts in 263 games. He became the first pitcher in MLB history to throw a no-hitter in a clinching situation when he shut down San Francisco, 2-0, to help the Astros wrap up the NL West title on Sept. 25, 1986. Scott won the NL Cy Young Award that season after leading the National League in ERA (2.22), innings pitched (275.1) and strikeouts (306). A three-time All-Star with Houston, Scott became the first player ever to win NLCS MVP honors while pitching for the losing team in 1986.


## 32•RHP JIM UMBRICHT (1962-63) <br> CLASS OF 2019

Jim Umbricht was an original member of the Houston Colt . 45 s . He opened the 1962 season with the Colts and was one of the top relief pitchers in the NL, posting a 4-0 record with a 2.01 ERA. Umbricht was diagnosed with cancer in 1963, and made a remarkable comeback. Following a cancer operation in mid-March of 1963, Umbricht came back to the Astros and pitched in 35 games, making three starts, posting a 4-3 record with a 2.61 ERA. Umbricht died on April 8, 1964 at the age of 33 . His number, 32 , was officially retired by the Astros on April 12, 1965.


## 40•RHP DON WILSON (1966-74)

## CLASS OF 2019

Don Wilson compiled a 103-92 record in nine seasons with the Astros, posting a 3.15 ERA with 78 complete games and 20 shutouts. He was named to the NL All-Star team and named the Astros Team MVP in 1971 after going 16-10 with a 2.45 ERA in 268.0 innings pitched. Wilson is the only pitcher to throw two no-hitters in a Houston uniform. On July 14,1968 , he established the franchise record for strikeouts in a single game with 18, eight of which were consecutive. He died on January 5,1975 , and his number, 40, was retired by the Astros on April 13, 1975.


## $24 \cdot$ OF JIMMY WYNN (1963-73) <br> CLASS OF 2019

Jimmy Wynn spent the first 11 years of his 15-year Major League career with Houston, the first two as a member of the Colt . 45 s. Despite his small frame ( $5^{\prime} 9^{\prime \prime}$ ), Wynn boasted enormous power and a strong throwing arm, earning him the nickname "The Toy Cannon". In 11 years with Houston, he hit .255 with 228 doubles, 32 triples, 223 homers, 719 RBI and an .806 OPS in 1,426 games, the majority of which were played in the pitcher-friendly Astrodome. Wynn was named to the 1967 All-Star Team after clubbing 37 home runs with 107 RBI.


## 17 • 1B LANCE BERKMAN (1999-2010) CLASS OF 2020

One of the greatest pure hitters in baseball over his 15-year Major League career, Lance Berkman was a five-time All-Star in 12 seasons with Houston, including four seasons in which he finished in the top-five of the National League MVP voting. A first-round pick by the Astros out of Rice University in 1997, Berkman went on to become the Astros all-time leader in career on-base percentage (.410) slugging percentage (.549) and OPS (.959). Berkman, affably known as "Big Puma" during his time in Houston, helped lead the Astros to three playoff appearances, including the club's first appearance in the World Series in 2005.


## $28 \cdot C$ SAR CEDE O (1970-81)

## CLASS OF 2020

After bursting into the Major Leagues with a fourth-place finish in the 1970 NL Rookie of the Year voting as a 19-year-old, César Cedeño quickly became one of the top outfielders in baseball and one of the best young players in Major League history. The ultimate fivetool player, Cedeño hit .285 with 199 homers, 436 doubles, 60 triples and 550 stolen bases across his 17-year Major League career, with 12 of his years spent in Houston. In 1972 at age 21, he began a stretch in which he received five consecutive Gold Glove awards (1972-76) while being named to four National League All-Star teams in that five-year stretch.


## FOUNDER \& OWNER • ROY HOFHEINZ (1962-76) CLASS OF 2020

One of the founding fathers of the Astros, Judge Roy Hofheinz was the first owner of the Houston franchise. A state legislator at age 22, a Harris County judge at age 24 and the mayor of Houston at age 40, Hofheinz played an instrumental role in getting the Colt . 45 s to Houston in 1962, and in 1965 renamed the club the Astros to coincide with the opening of the first domed stadium in professional sports history, the iconic Astrodome. Hofheinz revolutionized baseball and the sports industry in many ways, including his decision to utilize an artificial playing surface in 1966 which he dubbed "AstroTurf".


## $44 \cdot R H P$ ROY OSWALT (2001-10) <br> CLASS OF 2020

Roy Oswalt ushered in a new era of Astros baseball as the club's first bona-fide ace to pitch inside their new ballpark in downtown Houston, Minute Maid Park. After debuting as a rookie in 2001 with a 14-3 record and a 2.73 ERA, good for a runner-up finish in the NL Rookie of the Year voting, Oswalt went on to win 143 games with a 3.24 ERA in 303 games (291 starts) in an Astros uniform. A 23rd-round pick in the 1996 draft out of Holmes Community College in Ridgeland, Miss., Oswalt ranks second in franchise history in career wins, second in strikeouts (1593), third in innings pitched (1932.1) and fifth in ERA.


## 13•LHP BILLY WAGNER (1995-2003) <br> CLASS OF 2020

A seven-time All-Star and one of the most dominating closers in Major League history, Billy Wagner spent the first nine years of his standout 16-year MLB career with Houston, posting 225 saves and 694 strikeouts in 464 games with the Astros. Wagner was selected by Houston in the first round of the 1993 draft, and within four years became Houston's shutdown closer at the Major League level. He set an Astros single-season franchise record for saves in 1999 (39 saves), before topping his own club-record mark in 2003 with 44 saves. In 1999, Wagner finished fourth in the NL CY Young Award race.


## $27 \cdot 1 B$ BOB WATSON (1966-79) <br> CLASS OF 2020

Bob Watson spent 14 of his 19 MLB seasons with the Astros, making two All-Star teams while batting .297 with 241 doubles, 139 homers, 782 RBI and an .808 OPS in 1,381 games. He scored MLB's one millionth run on May 4, 1975, and became the first player in MLB history to hit for the cycle in both leagues. Following his playing career, Watson became the second African-American General Manager in Major League history when he was named GM of the Astros in 1994. In 1996, Watson became the first African-American GM to win a World Series when he did so as GM of the New York Yankees.


## $21 \cdot$ OF TERRY PUHL (1977-90) <br> CLASS OF 2022

Longtime Astros outfielder Terry Puhl, who spent the first 14 seasons of his 15 -year Major League career in an Astros uniform, is in the top 10 all-time in franchise history in multiple categories, including games played, hits, doubles, triples and runs scored. His 14 seasons as an Astro are topped only by Craig Biggio ( 20 seasons) and Jeff Bagwell ( 15 seasons). In addition to his offensive production, Puhl was considered a talented, all-around player that provided strong defense and speed on the basepaths.


## FRONT OFFICE EXECUTIVE • TAL SMITH (1960-73, 1975-80, 1994-2011) CLASS OF 2022

Covering three different stints, Tal Smith spent 35 of his 54 years in Major League Baseball with the Houston Colt .45s/Astros franchise. In that span, Smith played a major role in many different aspects of the organization's growth, development and success, both on and off the field. Among other accomplishments, as a front office executive, he held leadership roles in the construction of both the Astrodome and Minute Maid Park and in the creation of Astroturf. On the field, he was an architect for both the first Astros team to advance to the postseason and for the first Astros team to play in the World Series.


## BROADCASTER • BILL BROWN (1987-2016) <br> CLASS OF 2023

For 30 seasons, Bill Brown served as the primary television voice of the Astros. His professionalism and knowledge of the game, along with his powerful voice and relentless preparation, made him one of the top play-by-play men of his generation. Over the years, Brown has received many well-deserved honors in his career, including an induction into the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame and an induction into the Astros Media Wall of Honor. He was also honored with the National Sportscasters Association Texas Sportscaster of the Year Award and the Fred Hartman Award for Long and Meritorious Service, which is given out annually by the Houston Chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America.

## 19•2B BILL DORAN (1982-1990) CLASS OF 2023

Bill Doran was a fan favorite among Astros players in the 1980's. He was a tough, hardnosed player that was admired for both his hustle and ferocity and for his production on the field. As a player, he was one of the top, all-around second basemen in the National League and one of the best at that position in franchise history. During the 1980's, the switch-hitting Doran led all Astros players in runs scored, stolen bases and walks, was second in hits and third in games played. Among all NL second basemen in the 1980's, he ranked first in walks, second in runs scored and fourth in stolen bases. On the Astros alltime franchise lists, Doran ranks in the top 10 in hits, runs, stolen bases, walks, at-bats and triples. Among switch-hitters, he ranks second only to Lance Berkman in most significant categories in franchise history. Doran was voted as the Team MVP on two occasions (1985, 1987). Defensively, he ranks third in franchise history in assists and fourth in double plays turned.

The Houston Colt .45s play their first Major League game on April 10, defeating the Chicago Cubs 11-2.

1963 Bob Bruce one-hits the Cincinnati Reds on April 26...Don Nottebart no-hits the Phillies on May 17.

1964 Ken Johnson becomes the first Major Leaguer to lose a nine-inning no-hitter on April 23 with a 1-0 loss to the Cincinnati Reds.


1965 The Houston Colt.45s become the Houston Astros and inaugurate indoor baseball with a 2-1 exhibition win over the New York Yankees on April 9 in the Astrodome...rookie Joe Morgan sets club marks for at-bats, runs, hits and triples.

1966 Mike Cuellar sets a club mark with a 2.22 ERA...home attendance mark, which stood for 22 years, was set on June 22 as 50,908 fans watch Sandy Koufax and the Dodgers down Houston 5-2.

1967 Don Wilson fires a no-hitter vs. the Atlanta Braves, 2-0, on June 18, striking out Hank Aaron for the final out... Jimmy Wynn sets club records with 37 home runs and 107 RBI.

1968 Don Wilson strikes out 18 Cincinnati Reds in a 6-1 win on July 14...four Houston hurlers win 10-or-more games: Don Wilson (13), Larry Dierker (12), Dave Giusti (11) and Denny Lemaster (10)...the Astros down the Mets 1-0 in 24 innings on April 15.

1969 Cincinnati's Jim Maloney no-hits the Astros on April 30 and the next night, May 1, Don Wilson returns the favor by no-hitting the Reds, 4-0...Larry Dierker becomes Houston's first 20-game winner...the club records its first .500 season (81-81).

1970 Fred Gladding appears in 63 games, setting a club mark...three Astros hit over . 300 (Cesar Cedeno, .310; Jesus Alou, .306; Denis Menke, .304).

1971 Cesar Cedeno leads the league with 40 doubles and Roger Metzger and Joe Morgan share the league lead with 11 triples each...during the 1971 winter meetings, Houston acquires Lee May, Tommy Helms and Jimmy Stewart from the Reds for Joe Morgan, Jack Billingham, Denis Menke, Cesar Geronimo and Ed Armbrister.

Astros finish in second place with their best record to date (84-69)... Jerry Reuss and Larry Dierker hurl back-to-back one hitters on June 18 against Philadelphia and June 19 vs. New York, respectively...Cesar Cedeno hits for the cycle on Aug. 2 vs. the Reds.

1973 CesarCedenobecomesthefirst player in historyto steal 50 bases and hit 20 home runs in successive seasons...Roger Metzger leads the league with 14 triples...Lee May hits safely in a club record 21 straight games.

Rookie Greg Gross leads the club with a . 314 average, and sets a club mark with 185 hits...Ken Forsch appears in a then-club record 70 games...Cliff Johnson has five pinch-hit home runs.


Bob Watson leads the Astros with a . 324 average, 157 hits and 85 RBI...Dierker leads the staff with 14 win.
J.R. Richard becomes Houston's second 20-game winner...Cesar Cedeno sets a club mark with 58 stolen bases and earns his fifth-straight Gold Glove.

1977 Three Astros steal 40 bases (Cesar Cedeno, 61; Jose Cruz, 44; Enos Cabell, 42)...Watson sets a new club record with 110 RBI.

Houston finishes in second, just a game-and-a-half behind the Reds...J.R. Richard improves upon his 1978 strikeout total by fanning 313...Joe Niekro sets a club mark with 21 wins...Ken Forsch no-hits the Braves on April 7...Bill Virdon is named Manager of the Year.

Houston claims its first title as the Astros win the NL West with a 93-70 record, defeating Los Angeles in a one-game playoff...Niekro wins 20 games again...Joe Morgan returns to Houston to add leadership in the pennant drive...Houston falls to Philadelphia, 2-3, in a thrilling five-game NLCS.


1981 Houston gets off to a slow start, but takes advantage of the split season created by the player's strike to win the "second season" with a 33-20 mark, earning a spot in the playoffs...Nolan Ryan hurls his Major League record fifth no-hitter, blanking the Dodgers on Sept. 26...Ryan also leads the league with a 1.69 ERA...Art Howe establishes a then-club record 23-game hitting streak.

1982 Ray Knight, an offseason acquisition from Cincinnati for Cesar Cedeno, remains among the league leaders in hitting for most of the season, finishing with a . 294 mark...Bob Lillis takes over as interim manager on Aug. 10 and the Astros finish 28-23 under Lillis.

1983 The Astros rebound from an 0-9 start with one of their finest seasons, finishing 85-77, the third-highest win total in club history...Jose Cruz battles for NL batting title to the last day and finishes third...Nolan Ryan surpasses Walter Johnson's all-time strikeout mark.

1984 The Astros bounce back from another slow start, finishing second in the NL West... 1983 All-Star Dickie Thon is lost for the season in the fifth game after being hit in the head by a pitch from the Mets' Mike Torrez...Cruz repeats as the club MVP by posting a . 312 average and a career-high 95 RBI.


1985 The Astros celebrate the Astrodome's 20th Anniversary with a 2-1 Opening Day victory over the Dodgers in front of 42,876 fans...Joe Niekro becomes Houston's all-time winningest pitcher with his 5-0 shutout of San Francisco on June 9...Nolan Ryan becomes first player to record 4,000 strikeouts in a career when he fans Danny Heep on July 11 at the Astrodome...Jose Cruz reaches the 2,000 hit plateau on Sept. 15.

A Silver Anniversary season turns golden as the Astros win their second NL West title...Rookie skipper Hal Lanier guides the team to a club-record 96 regular season wins, earning Manager of the Year notice from four different press associations...right-hander Mike Scott becomes Houston's first ever Cy Young Award winner, leading the league in ERA (2.22) and strikeouts (306), and winning 18 games for the second straight year.

1987 Houston finishes the season with the third-highest attendance total in baseball $(1,909,902)$...Nolan Ryan leads the Majors in strikeouts with 270 and ties for the lead in ERA with a 2.76 mark...Mike Scott is named the NL starter for the All-Star game and throws 2.0 scoreless innings.

Houston wins its 2,000th game, 6-3, over San Diego on Opening Night...Mike Scott comes within one out of his second career no-hitter on June 12 vs. Atlanta...Bob Knepper tosses a one-hitter on Sept. 21 vs. the Braves.

Mike Scott becomes the fourth Houston pitcher to win 20 games and wins his second Astros MVP award...the Astros win 10 straight on the road from May 7-31 to set a club record...their 10-game winning streak from May 26 to June 4 ties another club mark...Glenn Davis hits a career-high 34 homers.

Danny Darwin posts a league-leading 2.21 ERA, becoming the third Houston pitcher in five years to lead the NL in ERA...Franklin Stubbs sets club mark for left-handers with 23 home runs... Houston ties a league record by playing in 27 extra-inning games...on May 17, Eric Anthony becomes the first Astro to hit an upper deck home run since 1970.

Jeff Bagwell becomes the Astros first BBWAA Rookie of the Year after hitting .294 with 15 homers and a club rookie record of 82 RBI...Craig Biggio leads the club in hitting for the second straight year (.295) and joins Pete Harnisch on the NL All-Star team.

1992 Despite a grueling 26-day road trip made necessary when the Astrodome played host to the Republican National Convention, the Astros rally in the second half to post the club's first non-losing season since 1989...Craig Biggio became the first MLB player to make the All-Star team at both catcher (1991) and second base (1992)...Doug Jones is named to the All-Star team and sets the club single-season record with 36 saves.


1993 The club establishes several club offensive records including batting average (.267), HR (138) and doubles (288)...paced by Craig Biggio's career-high 21 round-trippers, seven Houston players total double figures in homers for the first time in club history...Mark Portugal sets a club record by winning his final 12 decisions... Darryl Kile posts a nine-game win streak and tosses the ninth no-hitter in Astros history on Sept. 8 vs. NYM.

1994 Jeff Bagwell becomes the first Houston player to win the NL Most Valuable Player award...Bagwell becomes a unanimous selection for only the third time in league history after batting .368 and setting club records with 73 extra base hits, 39 homers and 116 RBI...Bagwell earns All-Star honors along with Craig Biggio, Ken Caminiti, Doug Drabek and rookie John Hudek...Rookie skipper Terry Collins guides the club to a 66-49 mark, one-half game behind Cincinnati, before a players' strike ends the season on Aug. 12.

1995 The Astros take the chase for the NL's first-ever Wild Card playoff berth to the final day of the season before finishing one game behind Colorado...Craig Biggio earns the vote for the NL's starting second baseman in the All-Star Game and slugs a solo homer...he later receives team MVP honors and wins a second consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove Award.

A two-and-a-half game lead at the end of August slips away and denies Houston a shot at the NL Central title... the Astros suffer through an 8-17 September, which includes a nine-game losing streak to fall out of the playoff chase...Jeff Bagwell slugs 31 homers and sets single season records with 48 doubles and 120 RBI...Derek Bell knocks in 113 runs, marking the first time the Astros have two 100-plus RBI players in the same season...Craig Biggio collects his third consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove Award...Shane Reynolds wins 16 games, while he and Darryl Kile each top the 200-mark in strikeouts.

1997 The Astros capture their first NL Central title and their first division title in 11 years...Jeff Bagwell hits 43 homers and swipes 31 bases to become Houston's first "30-30" player...Craig Biggio becomes the first player in Major League history to play a 162-game season without grounding into a double play...fans select Bagwell and Biggio to play in the 1997 All-Star Game...Darryl Kile wins a team-high 19 games and also gets selected to the All-Star Team...Larry Dierker becomes one of only six skippers in Major League history to win a division title in his first year as manager.

1998 Houston wins its second consecutive NL Central title en route to a 102-win season...Larry Dierker gets voted NL Manager of the Year by the BBWAA and Baseball America...General Manager Gerry Hunsicker is named The Sporting News Executive of the Year...Biggio and Moises Alou represent the Astros in the 1998 All-Star Game in Denver...Biggio breaks Cesar Cedeno's record for the most runs scored by an Astro...he and Alou each receive Silver Slugger Awards...five Astros starting pitchers, including Randy Johnson who is acquired just minutes before the July 31 non-waiver trading deadline, finish the season with double figures in wins.

1999 The Astros bid adieu to the Astrodome in dramatic fashion, clinching their third straight NL Central title...the pitching staff produces two 20-game winners for the first time in club history in Mike Hampton (22-4) and Jose Lima (21-10)...Hampton and Jeff Bagwell both receive Silver Slugger Awards...four Astros get selected to represent the National League in the 70th annual All-Star Game (Bagwell, Hampton, Lima, Billy Wagner)...Wagner is the recipient of the 1999 Rolaids Relief Man Award.


The doors of sparkling-new Minute Maid Park open for the first time on March 30 before an exhibition game with the New York Yankees...a record 3,056,139 fans pass through the turnstiles during the Astros inaugural season at their new ballpark...Houston finishes the season with a disappointing 72-90 record...Bagwell ends the season with 310 career homers and becomes only the 87 th Major Leaguer to reach the 300-homer plateau... Shane Reynolds is named to the All-Star team, marking his first selection to the Midsummer Classic.

## HOUSTON MAJOR LEAGUE HISTORY

The Astros clinch their fourth division title in five years with a 9-2 win over the Cardinals on Oct. 7 in St. Louis... play stops throughout the sports world following the tragic terrorist attacks on September 11; the regular season gets extended a week....Moises Alou, Billy Wagner and Lance Berkman represent the Astros at the 72nd Midsummer Classic....Jeff Bagwell becomes the sixth player in MLB history to have 30 homers, 100 RBI and 100 runs scored in six consecutive seasons...manager Larry Dierker resigns following the season and is replaced by former Red Sox skipper Jimy Williams...the Astros are named Organization of the Year by SportsTicker, Topps, Baseball America and Baseball Weekly...Brad Ausmus receives a Gold Glove award.

2002 By Houston standards, the 2002 season is a disappointment after the club finishes with an $84-78$ record...Wade Miller and Roy Oswalt combine for 34-13 on the year while stringing together 12 and nine-game winning streaks, respectively...Astros hurlers throw 10 shutouts at home to contribute to a 47-34 record at home...in May, the Astros retire Larry Dierker's No. 49 in a pregame ceremony...Lance Berkman represents the Astros at the 2002 All-Star Game...Houston's ballpark is re-christened Minute Maid Park when the Astros announce an agreement with the local beverage giant for naming rights on June 5...Brad Ausmus wins his second consecutive Gold Glove Award.

Houston ends the season in second place, one game behind the division champ Chicago Cubs...on June 11 at Yankee Stadium, six Astros pitchers combine to no-hit the Yankees for an 8-0 win: Roy Oswalt, Pete Munro, Kirk Saarloos, Brad Lidge, Octavio Dotel and Billy Wagner...it is the first time in MLB history that a team used five-or-more pitchers in throwing a no-hitter...Wagner records a career-high and franchise-record 44 saves on the season and represents the team at the All-Star Game...Jeriome Robertson sets the franchise rookie record with 15 wins, leading all MLB rookies.

Minute Maid Park hosts the 2004 All-Star Game...Roger Clemens comes out of retirement and returns to his hometown to pitch - winning his first nine decisions, and on May 5, claiming the No. 2 slot on the all-time strikeout list with his 4,137 th career strikeout...on May 8, Craig Biggio collects his 2,500th career hit...the Astros acquire outfielder Carlos Beltran on June 24, who finishes with a combined 38 home runs and 42 stolen bases between Houston and Kansas City...four Astros are named All-Stars: Clemens, Beltran, Lance Berkman, and Jeff Kent....on July 14, Phil Garner replaces Jimy Williams as manager...Houston claims the NL Wild Card and wins its first postseason series in franchise history, defeating the Atlanta Braves in Game 5 of the NLDS...the NLCS gets pushed to Game 7 before St. Louis defeats Houston...Clemens claims his unprecedented seventh Cy Young Award.

The Astros advance to the World Series for the first time in franchise history after defeating St. Louis, 4-2, in a rematch of the 2004 NLCS...the Chicago White Sox go on to sweep the Astros in four games...the Astros host the first World Series game in the state of Texas, and Game 3 on Oct. 25 turns into the longest game in World Series history as the White Sox win in 14 innings, 7-5...Houston wins the NL Wild Card for the second season in a row, finishing in second place in the NL Central Division with a record of 89-73...the Astros win the longest game in postseason history, defeating Atlanta in the NLDS, $7-6$, in 18 innings after a Chris Burke solo home run
 in the bottom of the 18th, while Roger Clemens tosses 3.0 scoreless innings of relief...the club starts the season with a 2-21 record on the road, and overcomes a 15-30 record on May 24 to become the first team since the 1914 Boston Braves to make the postseason after falling to 15 games under .500...on June 29, Craig Biggio is hit by a pitch for the 268th time of his career, setting the modern MLB record....Roger Clemens returns to the Astros for a second year and finishes $13-8$ with a career-best 1.89 ERA...Roy Oswalt posts his second consecutive 20 -win season, finishing 20-12 with a 2.94 ERA...Andy Pettitte wins 17 games and records a career-low 2.39 ERA...for the second season in a row, four Astros are named to the All Star squad: Clemens, Oswalt, Brad Lidge and Morgan Ensberg...Ensberg sets career-highs in home runs and RBI, and takes home the National League Silver Slugger Award at third base...Willy Taveras makes the jump from Double A to the Majors and leads all NL rookies in hits, runs and steals...Taveras also leads the Majors with 70 infield hits and 29 bunt singles.

The Astros finish 82-80, in second place, and 1.5 games behind the World Champion St. Louis Cardinals, giving Houston its sixth consecutive winning season...Lance Berkman makes his fourth All-Star appearance and sets the single-season franchise record with 136 RBI...Roy Oswalt wins the ERA crown with a 2.98 mark, while winning 15 games...he is also the runner-up in the NL Cy Young Award voting...Adam Everett records the fourth-best fielding percentage by a shortstop in Major League history, holding down a .990 mark at the position...the Astros finish .500 or better for the 14th time in 15 years, and their second-place finish marks the 12th time in 13 years that the club claimed first or second place in the NL Central.

The Astros finish 73-89, their lowest winning percentage since 2000 (.451)...the Astros draw 3,000,000 fans to Minute Maid Park for the fourth time in franchise history...OF Carlos Lee is named team MVP after driving in a career-best 119 runs...Hunter Pence becomes the first rookie in Major League history to lead a league in hitting at the All-Star Break (.342)...Pence sets Houston franchise rookie records in doubles, extra-base hits, hitting, and slugging...on June 28, franchise icon Craig Biggio reaches the 3,000-hit plateau, all collected in an Astros uniform...on Sept. 20, Ed Wade is named the club's new General Manager, replacing Tim Purpura...just eight days later on Sept. 28, Wade and the Astros promote interim manager Cecil Cooper to the club's fulltime managerial position...Cooper is originally named interim manager on Aug. 27, replacing Phil Garner.

$\mathbf{2 0 0 8}$ The club finishes 86-75, in third place in the NL Central and 11.0 games behind division-champion Chicago...Houston finishes 3.5 games behind Milwaukee in the NL Wild Card race and is not eliminated from playoff contention until the season's 159th game...Jose Valverde leads the NL with 44 saves and ties Billy Wagner's franchise single-season saves record...Roy Oswalt goes 17-10 and wins 10 of his last 12 starts... Houston pitchers compile 13 shutouts, leading NL staffs...in May, Lance Berkman wins the NL Player of the Month Award after enjoying a 50-at-bat span in which he hits 620 (31x50)...the Astros commit 67 errors, the fewest errors for any team in National League history, anchored by shortstop Miguel Tejada.

2009 The Astros play well through their first four months of the season, topping out at 49-46 and just 1.0 game out of first place on July 22...three new Astros emerge as club leaders, including center fielder Michael Bourn, right fielder Hunter Pence and left-handed starter Wandy Rodriguez...Bourn is named the Astros team MVP and is awarded a Gold Glove for his defensive work in the field...he becomes the first Astros center fielder to win a Gold Glove since Cesar Cedeño won the award in five straight seasons from 1972-76...he is also named as the recipient of the Cool Papa Bell Award from the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum after leading the National League in stolen bases...Pence is elected to his first career All-Star Game and leads all Major League outfielders with 16 outfield assists...he also becomes the first right fielder in club history to record consecutive $25+$ homer seasons...Rodriguez has a career year, leading the Astros pitching staff with a 3.02 ERA in 33 starts...other major contributors include Lance Berkman, Carlos Lee and Ivan "Pudge" Rodriguez, who become the first trio of teammates in MLB history to reach their 300th career home runs in the same season...Pudge also contributes to the record books by setting a new MLB record for games caught in a career when he catches his 2,227 th game on June 17 at TEX.

Despite their disappointing record, the Astros show steady improvement under first-year manager Brad Mills...the team loses its first eight games of the season, marking the second-slowest start in franchise history...the club bottoms out on May 31, dropping to 17-34 and in last place in the NL Central...Mills then guides the club to a 59-52 record through the remaining four months of the season...Jeff Bagwell joins the club as hitting coach at the All-Star Break...Roy Oswalt and first baseman Lance Berkman are both dealt in midseason trades... a free agent signing in the offseason, Brett Myers begins his campaign with a franchise record-setting 32 consecutive starts of 6.0 -or-more innings...Chris Johnson earns Astros Rookie of the Year honors after leading all Major League rookies in batting average ( min .300 ABs )...for the second consecutive year, center fielder Michael Bourn wins a Gold Glove and leads the National League in stolen bases.

2011 The Astros continue their rebuilding efforts in 2011, this time dealing Michael Bourn, Jeff Keppinger and Hunter Pence in July for a return of 10 prospects...Jose Altuve begins his season at High A Lancaster, hits a combined . 389 in the minor leagues and makes a rapid ascent to Houston in July...J.D. Martinez posts 28 RBI in August, his first full month in the Majors...following the season, the club is officially purchased by Houston businessman Jim Crane.

The Astros make a number of trades in an effort to build a pipeline of young talent, acquiring 10 prospects by trading veterans Carlos Lee, Brett Myers, Wandy Rodriguez and Chris Johnson...Jose Altuve shines after leading the club in runs, hits, doubles, triples, extra-base hits and stolen bases while posting a . 340 on-base percentage...Altuve is the lone Astro to be named to the All-Star Team...Justin Maxwell leads the club in homers with 18 in his first season as an Astro...Lucas Harrell leads the club in wins, innings pitched and starts as a rookie, going 11-11...Tony DeFrancesco replaces manager Brad Mills on an interim basis after Mills is let go during the season...on Sept. 27, the Astros announce that Bo Porter will serve as the club's manager for the 2013 season.

After 51 seasons in the National League, the Astros become an American League team...they are the first team in MLB history to move from the NL to the AL...the club makes its AL debut by defeating the Texas Rangers, 8-2, at Minute Maid Park on MLB Opening Night on March 31...Jason Castro becomes the first Astros catcher to make the All-Star team since Craig Biggio in 1991... Castro sets club records for a catcher in homers (18), doubles (35), slugging (.485), and OPS (.835), and also wins two Player of the Week awards...Houston has 14 players make their Major League debuts...RHP Jarred Cosart becomes the first pitcher in franchise history to throw 8.0 shutout innings in his Major League debut (July 12 at TB)...Brandon Barnes hits for the cycle on July 19 vs. SEA, going $5 \times 5$...the Astros purchase the Double A Corpus Christi Hooks on Sept. 30.

The Astros make a 19-game improvement, winning 70 games on the year...a core of young stars begin to emerge as Jose Altuve (24), George Springer (25), Dallas Keuchel (26), and Collin McHugh (27) all turn in excellent seasons...Altuve wins the first batting title in club history, leading the Majors in batting average (.341)...Altuve establishes a single-season franchise record for hits (225), surpassing Craig Biggio's mark of 210 set in 1998...his 225 hits are the most in a season for a second baseman since Charlie Gehringer (227) in 1936, and the most ever for a Venezuelan-born player...Altuve represents the Astros at the All-Star Game... he is the first MLB player since 1945 to lead his league in hits, batting and steals, and becomes the first player to reach $220+$ hits, $40+$ doubles, and $50+$ stolen bases in one season since Ty Cobb (1917)...Keuchel becomes the first pitcher in club history to win a Gold Glove Award, and posts a 12-9 record with a 2.93 ERA from the mound...Springer blasts 20 home runs, one shy of the Astros rookie record...he also earns AL Rookie of the Month honors in May after becoming the second rookie player in baseball's modern era to hit seven home runs over a seven-game span...McHugh leads AL rookies in ERA (2.73, min. 100IP)...Chris Carter finishes second in the Majors in homers with 37.

The Astros snap a 10-year postseason drought, defying outside expectations by going 86-76 (.531) in AJ Hinch's first season as Astros manager...franchise icon Craig Biggio gets inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame...the Astros spend the majority of the season in first place (139 days) in the AL West division, ultimately finishing in second by 2.0 games...the club clinches an AL Wild Card spot on the final day of the season...Houston then defeats the Yankees at Yankee Stadium, 3-0, in the AL Wild Card Game before taking the eventual World Series Champion Kansas City Royals to five games in a back-and-forth ALDS...the Astros get off to a scorching start
 and post franchise-best records through several game numbers early in the season, including game 25 (18-7) and 55 (34-21)...the pitching staff leads the AL in ERA (3.57) while posting the second-highest strikeout total in club history $(1,280)$... 11 Astros hit double digit homers, which ties a Major League record set by Detroit in 2004...the club leads the AL in steals (121) and ranks second in MLB in home runs (230)...Dallas Keuchel becomes the third pitcher in franchise history to win a Cy Young Award after leading the AL with 20 wins and ranking second in ERA (2.48)...Keuchel also wins three AL Pitcher of the Month awards and his second consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove Award...Carlos Correa makes his MLB debut in June and wins AL Rookie of the Year honors, setting a club rookie-record and leading all MLB shortstops in homers with 22...Jose Altuve, Keuchel and Hinch represent Houston at the All-Star Game...Altuve wins a Silver Slugger Award and a Gold Glove Award...Lance McCullers leads all AL rookies in WAR (2.8), posting a 3.22 ERA in 22 starts...Mike Fiers throws the first no-hitter in Minute Maid Park history on Aug. 21 vs. the Dodgers...Collin McHugh wins 19 games.

2016 The Astros post consecutive winning records for the first time since 2005-06, but miss the postseason by 5.0 games after finishing 84-78...an abysmal April (7-17) hamstrings the club throughout the season, as the Astros 77-61 (.558) finish over their final 138 games fails to push them into the playoffs...Jose Altuve is named the Sporting News Player of the Year and finishes third in the AL MVP voting after hitting .338 with 42 doubles, 24 homers, 96 RBI and a . 928 OPS...Altuve wins his second batting title, second Silver Slugger and is named to his fourth All-Star Team (second start)...Dallas Keuchel wins his third consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove Award...Will Harris is named to the All-Star Game for the first time in his career...Carlos Correa hits 20 home runs, becoming the franchise leader in career home runs by a shortstop...George Springer plays in all 162 games, while hitting a career-high 29 homers, eight of which were leadoff shots (ties a club record)...Evan Gattis sets a franchise record for home runs hit by a catcher with 19...Chris Devenski finishes fourth in the AL Rookie of the Year voting after setting club rookie records for a reliever in ERA (2.16) and WHIP (0.81).

2017 In the Astros 56th season of play, the club wins its first World Series Championship after winning 101 regular season games...Houston also takes home its first division title since 2001...Jeff Bagwell is inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame...the Astros down the Red Sox in the ALDS (four games), the Yankees in the ALCS (seven games) and the Dodgers in the World Series (seven games) in one of the most thrilling postseason runs in recent memory...the Astros were dominant at home in the postseason, going 8-1 and becoming the second
 team in MLB history to win eight home games in a single postseason...Houston hit 27 postseason home runs, tying the 2002 Giants for the MLB record... 15 of those 27 homers were hit during the World Series, which set a new MLB record...Jose Altuve is named the American League Most Valuable Player, joining Jeff Bagwell (1994) as the only players in club history to win an MVP award...Altuve is also named the Sports Illustrated Sportsperson of the Year, the Baseball America MLB Player of the Year, and the AL Hank Aaron Award winner after winning his third batting title and recording his fourth 200-hit season...Altuve posts a 1.021 OPS and seven home runs in the postseason, which ties him for the fourth-most homers ever hit in a single postseason in MLB history...Altuve hits three of those homers in Game 1 of the ALDS vs. Boston, becoming the ninth player in MLB history to hit three homers in a postseason game...George Springer is named World Series MVP after homering in four consecutive World Series games, becoming the first player to do so in a single World Series...on Aug. 31, Astros GM Jeff Luhnow orchestrates one of the biggest trades in franchise history when he acquires RHP Justin Verlander from the Tigers...Verlander goes on to win ALCS MVP honors following two dominating performances over the Yankees ( $2-0,0.56$ ERA, 1ER/16IP, 21 strikeouts)...in 11 combined games between the postseason and regular season, Verlander goes 9-1 with a 1.66 ERA...the World Series victory gives an emotional boost to a hurricane-ravaged city of Houston...Hurricane Harvey makes landfall in Houston in late-August, prompting the Astros to play three home games against the Texas Rangers at Tropicana Field in St. Petersburg, Fla. from Aug. 29-31...it marks the second time in club history that the Astros are forced to play a home game outside of Houston...in the regular season, the Astros win the AL West Division by 21 games, marking the largest division win in club history...the club sets a franchise record for the best 34-game start to a season (23-11), continuing that run through game number 117 (72-45)...the Astros offense leads the Majors in runs (896), hits (1581), doubles (346), average (.282), OBP (.346), SLG (.478) and OPS (.823) while striking out fewer than any other club (1087)...the Astros set club records in doubles (346), average (.282) and slugging percentage (.478)...this marks the first time in franchise history for the Astros to lead the Majors in runs...the Astros become the seventh team in Major League history to post the league's highest slugging percentage and fewest strikeouts in a single season...the Astros have six players at the All-Star Game, which leads all AL teams and marks the most in a single season in franchise history...they are represented by starters 2B Jose Altuve, SS Carlos Correa and OF George Springer, and pitchers RHP Chris Devenski, LHP Dallas Keuchel and RHP Lance McCullers Jr...George Springer and Jose Altuve win Silver Slugger Awards.

The Astros record-setting 2018 campaign came to an end in the American League Championship Series, as they lost to the eventual World Series Champion Boston Red Sox in five games...despite their exit in the ALCS, Houston followed up their championship season with a franchise record 103 regular season wins, making them the first club to post consecutive 100-win seasons
 since the 2002-04 Yankees, and the fifth defending World Series Champion to win over 100 games dating back to 1970 ... Houston finished with the best run differential in the Majors at +263 , which ranked second in the expansion era (since 1961) of Major League Baseball, trailing only the 2001 Mariners...the club went 57-24 in road games, also good for second all-time in the expansion era...en route to their 103, the Astros tied their franchise record win streak, ripping off 12 straight from June 6-18, which included a 10-0 road trip, marking just the seventh undefeated road trip of 10-or-more games in the Majors dating back to the 1953 season...the club's pitching staff combined for 1,687 strikeouts, the most in Major League history, and also allowed only 534 runs, the fewest allowed by an AL team in a non strike-shortened season since the DH started being used in 1973...the group also led the Majors in virtually every significant category, including ERA (3.11), opponent average (.217), WHIP (1.10), starter's ERA (3.16) and bullpen ERA (3.03)...RHP Justin Verlander led the staff, as the second-year Astro finished second in the AL in Cy Young voting...Verlander (290K) and RHP Gerrit Cole (276K) finished first and second in the AL in strikeouts and became the first pair of right-handed pitchers in the modern era (since 1900) to each surpass 250 strikeouts in a season for the same club...Verlander and Cole headlined a six-player group of Astros All-Stars, which also included 2B Jose Altuve, 3B Alex Bregman, RHP Charlie Morton and OF George Springer, who were managed and coached by the Astros Major League staff...Altuve was the Astros only starter, as he was elected to his sixth-career All-Star Game by leading all of Major League Baseball in fan votes with 4,849,630...the Astros shined in the Midsummer Classic, as Bregman and Springer hit back-to-back home runs in the 10th inning, to give the AL a victory and give Bregman the MVP honors...the Astros sold out Minute Maid Park 17 times in 2018, their most since 2007, which included six sellouts on dates in which the club distributed Replica World Champions Rings at Minute Maid Park...the Astros distributed over 250,000 replica rings this season, which is believed to be the biggest giveaway of a single item in Major League Baseball history.

The Astros captured their third pennant in franchise history, and second in a three-year span, falling just short of their second World Series Championship in seven games to the Washington Nationals...in the postseason, Houston defeated the Rays in a five-game ALDS and the Yankees in a six-game ALCS...during the regular season, the Astros set a franchise record with 107 wins, making them the fifth organization in MLB history to win 100-plus games in three consecutive seasons...the Astros led the Majors in run differential for the
 second consecutive season with a club record mark of +280 ...
the Astros led the Majors with a 60-21 home record...the offense set a MLB record for slugging (.495) while posting the fewest strikeouts in the league...their pitching staff posted 1,671 strikeouts, the most in the Majors, making Houston the first team in MLB history to finish a season with the fewest offensive strikeouts and the most strikeouts by their pitching staff...the Astros won their third-consecutive AL West Division title by 10.0 games, going 56-20 against divisional opponents...at the trade deadline, the Astros executed a five-player deal that brought ace right-handed pitcher Zack Greinke to Houston...Houston tossed two no-hitters during the season: a six-pitcher combined no-hitter on Aug. 3 vs. SEA and Justin Verlander's third-career no-hitter on Sept. 1 at TOR...Verlander won his second-career AL Cy Young Award in a season in which he surpassed 3,000 career strikeouts, while reaching the 300 -strikeout plateau for the first time in his career...Gerrit Cole finished second in the Cy Young race, setting a franchise record with 326 strikeouts...Yordan Alvarez burst onto the MLB scene in June, setting a club rookie record for homers (27) and becoming the third Astro to win Rookie of the Year honors...Alex Bregman led the offense, finishing second in the AL MVP race after leading the AL in WAR (8.4)...six Astros players made the All-Star team for the third-straight year (Verlander, Cole, Bregman, Michael Brantley, Ryan Pressly, George Springer)...Ryan Pressly completed an MLB record 40-game scoreless streak... Springer led MLB with 12 leadoff homers, one shy of the Major League record... the Astros Hall of Fame was created with an inaugural 16-member class...in May, the Astros swept the Angels in Monterrey, Mexico, their first regular season games played outside of the U.S. or Canada in club history.

## HOUSTON MAJOR LEAGUE HISTORY

In perhaps the strangest year in Major League history, MLB completes a 60-game regular season in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic. . .after navigating a tumultuous offseason, a Spring Training shutdown and a three-month hiatus, the Astros return to the field in July and advance all the way to the American League Championship Series for their fourth straight season, this time under new Manager Dusty Baker and new General Manager James Click...their postseason run, which included series wins over the Twins and Athletics, followed a 29-31 regular season record in the truncated season...the club overcame huge blows just to make the postseason, as the Astros got just one start out of reigning AL Cy Young winner Justin Verlander and just two games out of reigning AL Rookie of the Year Yordan Alvarez...Houston also loses four keys from their bullpen, three to season-ending injuries and one to an opt out... outfielder Kyle Tucker established himself as an everyday player, after leading the club in extra-base hits, while starter Framber Valdez leads the club in innings pitched in a breakout campaign...Houston ties a Major League record by using 15 rookie pitchers, including 10 to make
 their MLB debut...Cristian Javier leads that group, as the young starter finishes third in the AL Rookie of the Year voting...despite down regular season offensive numbers, Carlos Correa and Jose Altuve lead the club on their postseason run, with Correa totaling six homers and 17 RBI in his 13 postseason games...George Springer chips in four postseason homers, giving him 19 in his career, which ties him for fourth in MLB postseason history...like most of baseball, the Astros do not host fans at their home stadium in 2020, but still hold home field advantage with a $20-8$ record at Minute Maid Park... Astros Opening Day is held on July 24 vs . Seattle, the latest Opening Day in franchise history...Houston wins the opener, 8-2, extending their franchise record winning streak on Opening Day to eight games.

2021 The Astros captured their fourth pennant in franchise history and, third in a five-year span, falling short of their second World Series Championship in six games to the Atlanta Braves...in the postseason, Houston defeated the White Sox in a four-game ALDS...advanced to play in the ALCS for the fifth consecutive season becoming ...the third team in MLB history to advance to record this feat (since 1969), joining... the Braves (1991-99) and A's (1971-75)... Houston would go on to defeat the
 Red Sox in six games...Yordan Alvarez was named the ALCS MVP after batting . 522 during the series....Jose Altuve hit 5 home runs during the postseason and has recorded 23 career postseason home runs, which ranks second all-time in MLB history...Altuve also tied the Major League record with 21 runs scored in a single postseason, matching CF Carlos Beltran, who also scored 21 for the Astros in 2004...Kyle Tucker led all players in RBI this postseason with 15 ...during the regular season, the Astros led the AL in runs (863), hits ( 1,496 ), OBP (.339) and average (.267)...Houston won their fourth AL West division title in the last five seasons...Carlos Correa and Yuli Gurriel each won the Rawlings Gold Glove Award for their respective positions while Correa was also awarded the Rawlings AL Platinum Glove Award...the Astros also won the Rawlings AL Glove Team Award...Alvarez and Tucker were named to the All-MLB Second Team...Astros manager Dusty Baker became the first manager in MLB history to win division titles with five different clubs (Astros, Nationals, Reds, Cubs and Giants)...Gurriel earned his first career batting title and became the second player in club history to win a batting title, joining Altuve...he also was the second Cuban-born player to win a batting title, joining Tony Oliva and the eighth-oldest player in MLB history to win a batting title...rookie starter Luis Garcia had a phenomenal season, posted a 3.30 ERA with a 11-8 record on his way to finishing second in the AL Rookie of the Year award...Lance McCullers Jr. had his best season as a pro, reaching career highs in wins (13), starts (28), innings (162.1) and strikeouts (185), while also posting the best ERA (3.16) and opponent batting average (.205) of his six-year career...Altuve, Michael Brantley, Correa and Ryan Pressly were selected to the All-Star Game...Houston was on the road in Oakland for Opening Day defeating the Oakland Athletics, 8-1...the Astros have won nine straight games on Opening Day (2013-21), which ties the modern Major league record, also reached by the Mariners (2007-15), Reds (1983-91), Mets (1975-83) and St. Louis Browns (1937-45)...per Elias, the only MLB team to post a longer winning streak on Opening Day was the 1887-1896 Boston Beaneaters (current Braves franchise), with a 10-game streak.

## MAJOR LEAGUE HISTORY

The Astros captured their second World Series title in 2022 after a dominant season that saw them win 106 games, the second-most in franchise history and the sec-ond-most in MLB...Houston defeated the Philadelphia Phillies in six games in a series that saw the Astros throw just the 3rd no-hitter in World Series history and the first combined no-hitter in MLB postseason history behind the arms of Cristian Javier (6.0IP), Bryan Abreu, Rafael Montero and Ryan Pressly
 (1.0IP each) and also saw Yordan

Alvarez hit a 450-foot three-run home run to give the Astros a 3-1 lead in the clinching Game 6...Houston starting pitcher and 2022 Cy Young Award winner Justin Verlander capped his remarkable season at age 39 with his first World Series win in Game 5 against the Phillies...the Astros began the postseason with a remarkable 7-0 record that was helped immensely by two clutch home runs from Alvarez and rookie Jeremy Peña in the ALDS against the Seattle Mariners...Alvarez hit a walk-off 3-run homer in Game 1 against Seattle while a Peña solo shot help end an 18-inning game, clinching Game 3 for the Astros, which ended up tying the record for the longest postseason game in MLB history...the Astros 7-0 start to the playoffs, which is tied for the second-best ever, was fueled by three-and-four game sweeps of Seattle and the New York Yankees, respectively...the Astros faced 1-0 and 2-1 deficits in the World Series against Philadelphia before winning three-straight games to earn the title...Peña became just the third rookie in MLB history to win World Series MVP, as the shortstop hit . 400 with a home run and three RBI against the Phillies...his postseason overall saw him hit . 345 with four homers and eight RBI...the World Series win was the first for Astros manager Dusty Baker, who filled perhaps the only missing hole in his historic and illustrious 25 -year career as a skipper... Houston's pitching staff turned in a remarkable playoff performance, indicated best by the bullpen, which allowed the lowest ERA in MLB postseason history among staffs that threw 35 innings or more (0.83)... Astros starter Framber Valdez went 3-0 in the playoffs while posting a 1.44 ERA, while Javier allowed just a single earned run in 12.2 innings...the postseason was a mirror of the regular season for the Astros, who had the best bullpen ERA (2.80) in MLB and the second-best rotation ERA (2.95)...spearheading the Astros rotation was Verlander, who earned his third career Cy Young award in his first year back from Tommy John Surgery at age 39 after posting a 18-4 record and a MLB-best 1.75 ERA among starters...he is the 4th oldest pitcher ever to earn the award...Valdez also engineered a historic 2022 season, posting a 17-6 record and a 2.82 while breaking the MLB record for most consecutive quality starts in a single-season with 25 ...Valdez also set the MLB record for most consectuive quality starts by a left-handed pitcher (22) while shattering the Astros previous franchise record of 19...Valdez's streak ended at 25, which is now the 2nd-longest in MLB history...the pitching staff also saw Javier engineer his first hitless outing of the year on June 25 in New York against the Yankees, whom the Astros pitched a combined no-hitter against for their first of the year.... relievers Hector Neris and Ryan Pressly helped Javier in the effort, each throwing one frame...the regular season also saw the Astros throw two immaculate innings in a single game, one by starter Luis Garcia and another by reliever Phil Maton on June 15 against the Rangers in Arlington...both were caught by catcher Martín Maldonado, who was also on the receiving end of the combined no-hitter just 10 days later.. 2022 also saw Ryan Pressly's 33 save season for Houston's pitching staff, which shot him up the leaderboard among the Astros' all-time franchise leaders...he ranked T-4th with Fred Gladding in saves in Astros with 76 at the end of the regular season after being T-13th entering the year...Pressly also now is the Astros all-time leader in postseason saves after earning his 11th in Game 6 of the World Series...other notable moments included Lance McCullers Jr. returning from a forearm injury that kept him out until August, where he was incredible in his return, going 4-2 with a 2.27 ERA, and Ryne Stanek posting the 2nd-best ERA in MLB this year among qualified relievers with a 1.15 ERA, which also set a new Astros franchise record...at the plate, Houston hit the 4th-most home runs in baseball, lead in part by Alvarez's 37-homer year, which ranked 6th in MLB...Alavrez finished as an AL MVP finalist, hitting .306 with a .613 slugging percentage, which was the 2nd-best mark in baseball...the Astros also saw Jose Altuve hit . 300 for the sixth time in his career, while the second baseman swatted 28 home runs and stole 18 bases...Kyle Tucker had a remarkable year as well, hitting 30 home runs, driving in 107 RBI and a career-high 25 stolen bases...he was the only player in baseball to hit 30 homers and record 25 steals...he joined Jeff Bagwell as the only other Astro in history to reach each number, who did it in 1997 and 1999...Tucker's back-to-back 30 home run seasons made him the first Astro since Lance Berkman accomplished the feat in 2001-02...Five Astros made the 2022 All-Star Game at Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles: Altuve, Alvarez, Tucker, Verlander and Valdez.

ASTROS STADIUM HISTORY


Colt Stadium served as the home to Houston's first Major League Baseball franchise: the Colt . 45 s . The outdoor, single-deck facility was constructed as a temporary home until a domed stadium was completed. It was in operation for three seasons, from 1962-1964, and was witness to two no-hitters, both by the Colts: Don Nottebart in 1962 and Ken Johnson in 1963. High heat and humidity moved many games to late afternoon starts and pushed the National League to lift its ban on Sunday night games. It was located in what is now the Astrodome's north parking lot.


By the time the Astrodome opened on April 9, 1965, for an exhibition game between the Houston Astros and New York Yankees, it was already heralded as the "Eighth Wonder of the World." The largest structure of its kind and the world's first multi-purpose domed stadium, the Astrodome came to symbolize the futuristic home of professional sports in America. In honor of Houston's significance to the country's space program, it was appropriately named the Astrodome, and to maintain the theme, the Colt. 45 s were proudly renamed the Astros. AstroTurf was developed and installed to start the 1966 campaign after natural grass was unsuccessful. It served as the Astros home for 35 seasons.

## ASTROS FORD C. FRICK AWARD WINNERS

The Ford C. Frick Award is presented annually by the Baseball Hall of Fame to a broadcaster for "major contributions to baseball." The award, named after the late broadcaster, National League President, Commissioner, and Hall of Famer, has been presented annually since 1978. Frick was a driving force behind the creation of the Hall of Fame in Cooperstown and he helped foster the relationship between radio and the game of baseball.

The Ford C. Frick Award is presented annually during the Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony. Each award recipient (not to be confused with an inductee) is presented with a calligraphy of the award during the Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony and is recognized in the "Scribes \& Mikemen" exhibit in the Library of the National Baseball Hall of Fame.

GENE ELSTON (Astros broadcaster from 1962-1986)


Gene Elston's baseball broadcasting career spanned 47 years, primarily as a radio announcer. The 2006 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award, delivered baseball to a new legion of fans as the lead voice of the expansion Houston Astros for 25 years, from their beginnings as the 1962 Colt .45 s , through their 1986 National League West Division championship. While his voice became a beacon to fans in Texas and the Southwest, Elston's broadcasting responsibilities also included numerous national assignments. Elston broke into radio as a high school basketball broadcaster in 1941 in Fort Dodge, lowa. After serving in the Navy during World War II, he returned to the small midwest stations he knew so well. His break came in 1945 when he handled color commentary for the National Football League's Cleveland Rams. His entry into baseball came in 1946, when Elston was hired to call games for the Waterloo White Hawks of the Three I League. Three years later, he was named play-by-play for Des Moines of the Western League. In 1954 he made the major leagues as the number two man for the Chicago Cubs. In 1958, Elston was chosen to work with Bob Feller for Mutual's Game of the Day, which aired over 350 stations across the country, a position he held through 1960. In 1961, as baseball was expanding, he was the first announcer to handle play-by-play duties for the Houston franchise. He went on to work the CBS Radio Game of the Week from 1987-1995 and CBS postseason games from 1995-1997. A Texas Baseball Hall of Fame inductee, Elston also created a unique scorebook, Gene Elston's Stati-Score Baseball Scorebook, and authored two books, including the 2001 release, A Stitch in Time: A Baseball Chronology, 1845-2000.

## MILO HAMILTON (Astros broadcaster from 1985-2012)



Milo Hamilton, the 1992 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award, broadcast Major League baseball for more than 40 years. His big league on-air career included stops with the St. Louis Browns (1953), St. Louis Cardinals (1954), Chicago Cubs (1956-57 and 1980-84), Chicago White Sox (1962-65), Atlanta Braves (1966-75), Pittsburgh Pirates (1976-79), and Houston Astros (1985-2012). It was no coincidence that he was behind the microphone for more historic baseball events than any other announcer. His smooth style appealed to his listeners and his knowledge of the game has earned him the respect of his peers. Among the milestones he broadcast were Hank Aaron's 715th home run, Ernie Banks' fifth grand-slam of the 1955 season, seven no-hitters and Roger Maris' 61st homer (recreated on Western Union ticker). He was also on the Cardinals' broadcast crew when Stan Musial hit his record-breaking fifth home run in a doubleheader and he was doing the play-by-play 18 years later when San Diego's Nate Colbert duplicated Musial's feat. Wherever he has been, Hamilton involved himself in fund-raising activities, and over the years he helped raise over \$1.5 million for local charities. Born in Fairfield, lowa, on Sept. 2, 1927, Hamilton graduated from the University of lowa with a degree in radio speech. Milo shared the broadcast booth with numerous other Frick Award winners, including Jack Brickhouse, Bob Elson, Harry Caray and Jack Buck.

## AL HELFER (Astros broadcaster in 1965)

 Al Helfer, who was big in stature, big in personality and a big league mainstay in broadcast booths across the country for four decades, was named the 2018 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award. The burly 6-foot-4 Helfer worked behind a microphone in the Majors for eight different clubs, the Pirates (1933-34), Reds (1935-36), Yankees (1937-38, 1945), Brooklyn Dodgers (1939-41, 1955-57), New York Giants (1945, 1949), Phillies (1958), Colt .45s (1962) and Athletics (1968-69), and gained a national following as a radio broadcaster for Mutual Broadcasting System's Game of the Day in the 1950's. For a five-year period between 1950 and'54, he was traveling to a different ballpark six days a week. A rewarding but exhausting assignment, it was due to this Game of the Day exposure - the broadcasts carried by approximately 400 stations in non-MLB markets and around the world by the Armed Forces Radio Network - which Helfer became one of the nation's best-known baseball broadcasters. It was said that his audience reached 80 million at times. In 1962, Helfer was a member of the Colt .45s original broadcast crew, along with other Astros greats, Gene Elston, Loel Passe and Rene Cardenas.

HARRY KALAS (Astros broadcaster from 1965-1970)


Harry Kalas, longtime announcer for the Philadelphia Phillies, was the 2002 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award. A native of Naperville, III., Kalas graduated from the University of lowa in 1959 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Speech, Radio, and Television. The affable broadcaster was drafted into the military on graduation day and spent the following two years in Hawaii with the U.S. Army. In 1961, he served as sports director of radio station KGU and also began broadcasting for the Pacific Coast League's Hawaii Islanders as well as the University of Hawaii. An original member of the Astros broadcast team in 1965, he called games for Houston until 1970. In 1971, he moved to the Phillies broadcast booth, where he shared the microphone with Hall of Fame outfielder Richie Ashburn for 26 seasons. Kalas was honored as Pennsylvania Sportscaster of the Year 18 times. He also broadcast Big Five basketball and Notre Dame football. Kalas, revered for his uncanny ability to connect with his listeners, whether on radio or television, called more than 5,000 Phillies games. His passion for the game was unsurpassed, and his powerful, soothing voice was a summertime tradition throughout Pennsylvania, Delaware and New Jersey.

## THE HOUSTON BASEBALL MEDIA WALL OF HONOR

Each season, the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor, located on the club level at Minute Maid Park, inducts a current or former Houston media member who has made significant and lasting contributions to the landscape of Houston baseball through their work in journalism or broadcasting.

## ANITA MARTINI (inaugural, 2007 inductee)



The inaugural inductee into the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor was the late Anita Martini, a pioneer in the sports media field. Martini, a native of Galveston, was a pioneer for women in sports journalism. Martini began her career with Houston radio station KTRH during the 1960s and became the nation's first woman sports anchor in the early 1970s, at Houston television station KPRC. In 1974, she challenged Major League Baseball for the right to join her male colleagues in the clubhouse for post-game interviews with the players. Martini won her fight when she interviewed Jimmy Wynn in the Los Angeles Dodgers clubhouse after a game at the Houston Astrodome. By the 1980s, she was hosting one of the first call-in sports shows on Houston AM radio station KPRC. She died of cancer in 1993 at the age of 54. Martini also is an inductee of the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame.

GENE ELSTON (2008 inductee)


Elston broadcast Major League Baseball games in Houston for 25 years as the Voice of the Astros from 1962-1986. He was behind the microphone for the first game in franchise history on April 10, 1962, when the Colt .45s defeated the Chicago Cubs. Elston was the first play-by-play broadcaster for the Houston franchise, and a generation of baseball fans received their introductions to both the Astros and Major League Baseball by his broadcasts. Elston broadcast baseball for 47 years, beginning with Waterloo of the Triple I League in 1947. After nine seasons broadcasting minor league baseball, Elston made his Major League debut with the Chicago Cubs in 1954. He also called the Mutual "Game of the Week" from 1958-60 and the CBS Radio "Game of the Week" from 1987-97. In 2006, Elston was honored with the Ford C. Frick Award from the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum for his significant and lasting contributions to the game of baseball through his work in broadcasting. Among the highlights of Elston's career with the Astros included calling eight of the team's no-hitters, two Astros NL Western Division Championships (1980, 1986), and Nolan Ryan breaking Walter Johnson's all-time strikeout record in 1983. He was inducted in the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame in 1993.

NEIL HOHLFELD (2009 inductee)


Hohlfeld covered the Houston Astros as the beat writer for the Houston Chronicle from 1979 until 1995. He served as president of the Houston chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America in 1993. In 1996, Hohlfeld went on to cover other sports, including Texas A\&M athletics and NASCAR, through 2006 before assuming an editing assignment for the Chronicle. In 2007, he returned to his first love as a baseball analyst for FS Houston's pre- and post-game shows. Hohlfeld graduated from the University of Missouri with a Bachelor of Journalism in 1973 and began his career in Hannibal, Mo. He worked for the Chicago Tribune from 1974-79 before joining the Chronicle in 1979. Hohlfeld passed away on July 19, 2008 at the age of 56 . He was honored by the Houston chapter of the BBWAA as the recipient of the 2008 Fred Hartman Long and Meritorious Service Award.

## THE HOUSTON BASEBALL MEDIA WALL OF HONOR

## MICKEY HERSKOWITZ (2010 inductee)



Herskowitz was one of Houston's original beat writers and columnists, having covered the team since its inception in 1962. He wrote for both the Houston Post and Houston Chronicle. A graduate of the University of Houston, at age 26, Herskowitz became the nation's youngest sports editor of a major newspaper and later received international recognition for his coverage of the terrorist tragedy at the 1972 Munich Olympics. He was the first writer to win national first place awards in three Associated Press categories in one year, 1968. In addition to his journalism career, Herskowitz has authored books on historical figures, such as Gene Autry, Nolan Ryan, Paul"Bear"Bryant and Prescott Bush. He was also the ghostwriter of several autobiographies, including Dan Rather and Mickey Mantle. A former Marine, he has been inducted into the Houston Chamber of Commerce Hall of Fame, and received the national Headliners Award for excellence in sports writing. Herskowitz is also a former executive with the American Football League; a New York magazine editor; an original partner in the Houston Rockets; and a journalism professor at Sam Houston State University. He was inducted into the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame in 1997.

BILL BROWN (2011 inductee)


Bill Brown was the Houston Astros play-by-play announcer for 30 seasons. Brown, also known as "Brownie," was inducted into the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame on Nov. 12, 2004. He joined the Astros in 1987 after working as senior producer and anchor of the Financial News Network's SCORE program. Prior to that assignment, he was the sports director of the Sports Time Cable Network, which televised select Reds, Royals and Cardinals games. He spent one year with HSE in Pittsburgh and was the television voice of the Cincinnati Reds from 1976-82. Brown, who began his broadcast career on radio at 18 years old, graduated from the University of Missouri in 1969 and became a U.S. Army broadcast specialist, working as a sportscaster for the Armed Forces Vietnam Network in Saigon from 1970-71. After leaving the service in 1971, Brown completed one semester of graduate school at Central Missouri State College in 1971 and then earned a job at WLWT-TV in Cincinnati. Brown has broadcast for two teams in the World Series, the 1976 Reds and the 2005 Astros. He also called Craig Biggio's historic 3,000th hit in 2007, as well as many other memorable moments during both his Astros broadcasting tenure and overall broadcasting career.

MILO HAMILTON (2012 inductee)


Hall of Fame broadcaster Milo Hamilton spent a total of 59 seasons broadcasting Major League Baseball, which ranked as the second-longest broadcasting career in the game's history. A member of the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame, Hamilton has also been recognized by the National Baseball Hall of Fame, having won the Ford C. Frick Award in 1992. As an Astros broadcaster, he called many of the greatest moments in franchise history, including Nolan Ryan's 4,000th strikeout in 1985, the final out of Mike Scott's dramatic, division-clinching no-hitter in 1986, the Astros historic, six-pitcher, combined no-hitter at Yankee Stadium in 2003, the Astros 2005 Game 6 NLCS clincher, and Craig Biggio's 3,000th hit in 2007. Prior to joining Houston, Hamilton had already established himself as a top broadcaster in the game, having called Hank Aaron's historic 715th home run on April 8, 1974. His career accomplishments also include calling games at 59 Major League ballparks, being behind the mic for 11 no-hitters and broadcasting for the Pirates during their 1979 World Series championship season. At the conclusion of the 2012 campaign, he retired from his position as "The Voice of the Astros", having established himself as one of the all-time great broadcasters in Major League Baseball history.

RENE CARDENAS (2013 inductee)


Cardenas, a native of Managua, Nicaragua, started his professional baseball broadcast career with the Los Angeles Dodgers in 1958, becoming one of the first members of a Spanish radio broadcast team in the history of Major League Baseball. In the coming years, Cardenas further made history as a pioneer, as he and his team became the first Spanish radio broadcast team to call a World Series (1959) and an All-Star Game (1961). Cardenas was brought into the Houston organization by Judge Roy Hofheinz in 1962 as the Director of the Spanish Division for the Colt .45's, and stayed with the Astros through 1975. He also spent time with the Texas Rangers organization, where he started their very first Spanish radio broadcast. Following his time in Arlington, Cardenas returned to LA where he did Spanish radio and TV broadcasts for the Dodgers in the 1980s. Cardenas returned to Houston in 2000 where he began writing for the club. He returned to Spanish radio broadcast in 2007 and in 2008, became a television broadcaster for the team. He now writes for La Prensa, as well as the Astros Gameday Magazine and La Voz. Among his many honors are a place in both the Texas Rangers and former LA Dodgers Walks of Fame, and three nominations for the Ford C. Frick award in 1993, 2010 and 2011.

ALEX TREVINO (2014 inductee)


Alex Treviño became a distinguished member of the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor on Thursday, Sept. 18, 2014, in what was his 19th year in the Astros Spanish radio booth .He joined the broadcast team in 1996 and has called over 3,000 Astros games and six postseason appearances, including the 2005 World Series run. As of 2014, his 19 seasons in the broadcast booth were the second-most in franchise history by a Spanish broadcaster, trailing only Orlando Sanchez Diago's 21 years. Prior to joining the broadcast staff, Treviño spent 13 seasons in the Majors, primarily as a catcher, including the 1988-90 seasons with the Astros. He also spent time with the Mets, Reds, Braves, Giants and Dodgers in his Major League career. Treviño finished his playing career in the Mexican League, playing three seasons (1993-95) in his hometown of Monterrey, Mexico. Treviño was a member of the 1972 Pony League World Series championship team, which hailed from Monterrey. He later would become one of seven Mexican-born players to play for the Astros, and was inducted into the Hispanic Heritage Baseball Museum Hall of Fame in 2003.

HARRY SHATTUCK (2015 inductee)


Long-time sportswriter for the Houston Chronicle, Harry Shattuck, was inducted into the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor on Sept. 23, 2015. Shattuck covered the Astros beat for the Houston Chronicle for several seasons. Shattuck worked in the newspaper business for the Houston Chronicle for parts of four decades from 1970-2009. He began covering the Astros in 1970 and served as the Chronicle's beat writer from 1972-1985. He moved on to serve as the Chronicle's national baseball writer (1985-88), the assistant sports editor (1989-93) and the travel editor (1993-09) before his retirement. In his distinguished career, Shattuck covered 14 World Series, was the former chairman of the Houston Chapter of the BBWAA and voted for the Baseball Hall of Fame for over 30 years. While on the Astros beat, Shattuck covered the team during the tumultuous change in team ownership in 1976 and during the Astros 1980's playoff appearances.

## MARK BERMAN (2016 inductee)



On Monday, Sept. 26, 2016, long-time sports director at KRIV-TV Mark Berman was inducted into the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor. Berman has spent over 30 years at KRIV-TV in Houston, having joined the Houston FOX affiliate in 1986 and being named the station's sports director in 1988. In his role, Berman covers all sports in the Houston area, including professional, collegiate and high school athletics. A leader in his industry, Berman is best known for his relentless work ethic, his professionalism and his accuracy in breaking stories. Since joining the Houston media, Berman has covered every Astros playoff team in franchise history (1980-81, 1986, 1997-99, 2001, 2004-05, 2015), including the club's World Series appearance in 2005. Berman grew up in Hempstead, Texas, and graduated from the University of Houston with a degree in communications.

BOB ALLEN (2017 inductee)


Houston sports anchor and director Bob Allen was inducted into the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor on Sept. 17, 2017. One of the most iconic members of the Houston media market, Allen sadly passed away in October of 2016 after a lengthy battle with cancer. Allen spent 38 years as sports director at ABC13 News (KTRK) after getting named to the post in 1975, making him the longest tenured major market sports anchor in the country. He also spent two years as sports director at KHOU 11 News following his run with KTRK. During his career, Allen covered virtually all of the Astros postseason runs, all five ownership groups in the history of the Houston franchise, the construction and opening of Minute Maid Park, the Astros first appearance in a World Series and Craig Biggio's 3,000th hit and Hall of Fame selection. A native of Houston, Allen was committed to giving back to his community, as he was an enthusiastic supporter and board member of both the Sunshine Kids organization and the Special Olympics.

## KAREN WARREN (2018 inductee)



Longtime Houston Chronicle photojournalist Karen Warren was inducted into the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor on Sept. 14, 2018, becoming the first photojournalist to receive this honor since the award's inception in 2007. With over 20 years as a staff photographer at the Houston Chronicle, Warren has covered some of the best years in the history of the Astros franchise and has become a fixture in the Houston media market. Since joining the Houston Chronicle in 1997, she has shot a multitude of Astros regular season and postseason games, and has traveled to Spring Training in Florida to cover the team for close to 20 seasons. In addition to her coverage of the Astros, Warren has also covered the Houston Texans and Houston Rockets during her time at the Chronicle. Warren began her career in photojournalism at the Austin American-Statesman in 1987, where she spent nine years before joining the St. Louis Post-Dispatch in 1996. She joined the Houston Chronicle staff in 1997. A graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, Warren has shot or edited 14 Super Bowls, two World Series runs, the 2004 NLCS, the 2003 College World Series and the 2010 Little League World Series.

## LARRY DIERKER (2019 inductee)



Franchise icon Larry Dierker was inducted into the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor on Sept. 22, 2019, his 73rd birthday and the 55th anniversary of his Major League debut, which came as a 17-year old for the Houston Colt .45s. Dierker debuted with Houston in 1964 and had a remarkable 14-year playing career, including 13 seasons with the Astros (1964-77). After his playing days, Dierker was hired to the club's radio and television broadcast teams in 1979. He worked on both platforms for a total of 20 seasons (1979-96, 2004-05) over two stints in the booth. Dierker has the distinction of moving directly from the broadcast booth to the managerial position, which he did in 1997. He went on to lead the Astros to four playoff appearances (1997-99, 2001) in his five seasons as manager. Since 2005, Dierker has filled a variety of roles with the Astros, including appearances on club broadcasts, writing for team publications and serving as an Astros Community Outreach Executive and as a Special Advisor to the club. Earlier this year, he was inducted into the Astros Hall of Fame, as a member of the inaugural class.

## KEVIN ESCHENFELDER (2020 inductee)



Longtime Houston broadcaster and native Houstonian Kevin Eschenfelder was inducted into the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor on July 24, 2021. He was celebrating his 25 th season in 2021 as the Astros pre and postgame host for their television rightsholder, AT\&T SportsNet Southwest. Eschenfelder has over 30 years experience working in the Houston media market, originally getting his start in 1991 at Fox Sports Net, covering all three of Houston's major professional sports teams. He began hosting the Astros and Rockets pre and postgame shows in 1997 for Fox Sports Southwest, before continuing in that role for FS Houston, Comcast SportsNet Houston and AT\&T SportsNet SW. In addition to his pre and postgame duties for Astros games, Eschenfelder fills in on the Astros television broadcasts as a play-by-play announcer. A graduate of the University of Houston, Eschenfelder has been the radio voice of the University of Houston Football team since 2013.

## JAMIE HILDRETH (2022 inductee)



Longtime Astros executive Jamie Hildreth was inducted into the the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honors on October 3rd, 2022. Hildreth last served as the Astros Senior Vice President of Broadcasting and Alumni Relations before sadly passing away in Spring Training of 2017. Hildreth originally joined the Astros in 1987 as the club's Director of Broadcasting and would remain with the Astros for 30 seasons serving in various roles within the organization. Working behind the scenes, rather than in front of the microphone, Hildreth worked alongside longtime Astros broadcasters Alan Ashby, Bill Brown, Jim Deshaies, Larry Dierker, Milo Hamilton, Alex Treviño, Bill Worrell and others. Hildreth also had a hand in the hiring of the current Astros broadcast teams in the television and radio booths. Prior to joining the Astros, Hildreth was already a fixture in the Houston media market after having a successful career in radio, which included stops at KRBE and KTRH in Houston and KTRM/KALO in Beaumont, TX. Hildreth had a highly decorated career, which included winning the 2014 Fred Hartman Award, given annually by the Houston Chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America. Additionally, in 2021, he was inducted into the Texas Radio Hall of Fame. A native Texan, Hildreth was a graduate of the University of Houston, majoring in radio and television.

## ASTROS HOME RUNS IN HOUSTON

On May 11, 1998, Jeff Bagwell hit his 98th Astrodome home run off the Marlins' Livan Hernandez to put the first baseman one ahead of outfielder Jimmy Wynn, whose 97 Houston homers were the most by any player in the history of the franchise. Bagwell eventually hit 126 home runs in the Astrodome before the Astros moved to Minute Maid Park in 2000. Wynn hit 93 of his roundtrippers in the Astrodome and four in Colt Stadium during his 11-year career which lasted from 1963-73. And, speaking of Colt Stadium, the record for Houston homers in that facility stands at 21 by Bob Aspromonte.

## ALL-STAR GAME \#39 | ASTRODOME, HOUSTON | JULY 9, 1968



The 1968 All-Star Game reflected overpowering pitching. The two leagues combined for only eight hits and just one run, marking the first 1-0 contest in the history of the Midsummer Classic. The lone run - by the National League - was scored in the 1st inning on a single, an error, a wild pitch, and a double play.

Playing for the injured Pete Rose, Willie Mays led off in the bottom of the 1 st and singled to left field. In a failed pick-off at first, Luis Tiant's (CLE) throw went wild, advancing Mays to second. Curt Flood (STL) was then walked, and a fourth-ball wild pitch moved Mays to third. First baseman Willie McCovey (SF) grounded into a double play, but Mays took advantage to score the only run of the game.

With the victory, the NL stretched its winning streak to six. The sixman NL pitching staff held the AL to just three hits, as Tom Seaver (NYM) tossed five strikeouts late in the game and Juan Marichal pitched 2.0 perfect innings. Nine pitchers in the game did not allow a single walk.

The game was the first played indoors and on an artificial surface, as many players got their first look at the Astrodome.

## ALL-STAR GAME \#57 | ASTRODOME, HOUSTON | JULY 15, 1986



Los Angeles left-hander Fernando Valenzuela fanned five consecutive batters to tie Carl Hubbell's 52-yearold All-Star record, but the National League's pitching triumphs weren't enough as the American League recorded the 3-2 victory on two home runs.

The NL pitching staff sat down 12 total batters, but the AL's Roger Clemens (BOS) had a strong night of his own. He tossed 3.0 perfect innings which included just three balls and 21 strikes. The AL bats came through at the same time as second baseman Lou Whitaker (DET) followed a Dave Winfield (NYY) double with a two-run shot off Dwight Gooden (NYM) in the 2nd. In the 7th inning, Frank White (KC) came in to pinch-hit for Whitaker, knocking an 0-2 pitch from Mike Scott (HOU) over the left-center field wall to seal the AL's second All-Star win in the 1980s.

Valenzuela tied the 1934 record for consecutive strikeouts, setting down (in order): Don Mattingly, Cal Ripken, Jesse Barfield, Whitaker, and Ted Higuera.

The American League displayed its offensive prowess early, scoring six runs in the 1st inning en route to a 9-4 win over the National League in the third All-Star Game played in Houston and the first at Minute Maid Park.

Astros right-hander Roger Clemens, who also started the 1986 All-Star Game in Houston, allowed six runs and five hits in suffering the loss. Clemens allowed two 1st-inning homers, to Manny Ramirez (BOS) and Alfonso Soriano (TEX). Mark Mulder (OAK) pitched 2.0 innings and allowed one run to earn the win. Soriano was named the game's Most Valuable Player after finishing $2 \times 3$ with three RBI. Soriano was the first leading vote-getter to also earn MVP honors in the same season.

The National League cut the lead to 7-4 with a three-run 4th, including an RBI double by Edgar Renteria (STL) and a two-run double by Albert Pujols (STL). David Ortiz' (BOS) homer against Carl Pavano (FLA) in the 6th ended the game's scoring.

The AL pitching staff held the NL scoreless through the final 5.0 innings, thanks to scoreless efforts from Javier Vazquez (NYY), Ted Lilly (TOR), Joe Nathan (MIN), Tom Gordon (NYY), Francisco Rodriguez (ATL), and Mariano Rivera (NYY).

The American League won its seventh consecutive victory, not counting the 2002 tie at Miller Park in Milwaukee. The NL remained winless since 1996.

## CREDENTIALS

All media credential requests and applications for coverage of the Houston Astros must go through MLB's online credentialing system at http://credentials.mlb.com. Daily passes will be issued to approved media members who do not qualify for season credentials and who meet Major League Baseball's policies for media access. Requests for daily credentials must come directly from the affiliation editor, producer or director, via the online credential system at least 24 hours in advance of the game being requested. - ALL credential requests, whether season or daily, must go through MLB's online credential system. This will also be the process for Astros Spring Training, regular season, Wild Card and American League Division Series credential applications.
- Daily credentials will be available at the First Base Entrance, located in the Diamond Lot near the intersection of Preston and Hamilton Streets, four hours prior to first pitch.
- No spouses, guests or children of media members will be issued passes.
- Credentials are not transferable.
- Credentialed media are also prohibited from requesting autographs. Any violations will result in the immediate revocation of the credential.
- Credentials may be revoked at any time without cause.

SECURITY: To comply with security measures implemented by Major League Baseball and the Houston Astros, all media will be required to follow the following procedures upon entering Minute Maid Park and while covering the game.

## When entering Minute Maid Park, please be prepared to:

- Enter the ballpark at the First Base Entrance, located in the Diamond Lot near the intersection of Preston and Hamilton Streets.
- Provide photo identification.
- Sign in at the media entrance.
- Allow bags to be searched upon entering the ballpark.


## While covering the game, please be prepared to:

- Clearly display working credentials at all times.
- Allow bags and equipment cases to be randomly searched if requested by ballpark security officials.
- Observe credential regulations as set forth by Major League Baseball and the Houston Astros. Only those individuals with the proper credentials will be admitted in the clubhouses, on the field and in the press box.


## MEDIA SERVICES

PARKING:Working media may park in the $B$ and $C$ lots at Minute Maid Park with a season credential, BBWAA credential or media identification badge. Entrances to these lots are located on St. Emanuel St., Preston St. and Texas Ave.
MAIN PRESS BOX: The press box and broadcast booths are located on the Club Level behind home plate and are accessible from the press box elevator and the elevator at the First Base Entrance (level C) prior to the opening of gates and after the game. The escalators on the main concourse are available at all times.
MEDIA DINING ROOM: Media dining is located in the press box on the Club Level just behind the broadcast booths. There is a monetary
 charge per meal. Media dining is open to accredited members of the media only. Spouses/children are not allowed in the media dining room. Cash and credit card accepted.
CLUBHOUSES: Both clubhouses are located on the Service Level and are accessible via the press box elevator. The Astros clubhouse is located on the first base side of the ballpark, while the visiting teams and umpires are on the third base side. Pre- and postgame access rules are determined by Major League Baseball. The Astros clubhouse opens approximately four hours before game time and closes once the team takes the field for batting practice. When the team does not hit outside or under unusual circumstances, the Astros will use their discretion on when to open and close the clubhouse. All times are approximate and subject to change.

## General clubhouse rules include:

- Absolutely no autographs or gifts of any kind.
- No still photography in the clubhouse.
- Do not sit in the player's chairs.
- No shooting B-roll inside the clubhouse.
- When shooting video interviews, please make sure it is only of the player at his locker or in front of a wall while he is giving the interview. Players should be shot from the chest up.

FIELD: All media must leave the field 45 minutes prior to the first pitch. No person will be allowed on the field unless that individual has credentials expressly specifying field privileges (i.e., club pass, photo pass).
PHOTOGRAPHERS/PHOTO WELLS: In-game access to photo wells is limited to still photographers and rightsholders broadcasting the game. There are four photo wells, located on either side of both the home and visiting dugouts. All photographers must remain in the photo wells while the game is in progress. Photographers are only permitted to change location between innings. No ball - in play or dead - should be handled by anyone other than a ballboy.
PHOTOGRAPHER WORK ROOM: A photographer work room is located on the Service Level behind home plate.
PRESS CONFERENCE ROOM: The press conference room is located on the Service Level across from the home clubhouse down the first-base side.
NOTES: Game notes, updated Major League statistics, lineup sheets and other pertinent media information will be available near the entrance of the press box on the Club Level two hours prior to first pitch. Box scores, play-by-play sheets and postgame notes will be available in the same area after each game.
MEDIA GUIDES: Media guides are available upon request in the press box from Astros Communications staff members and are available online at MLBPressbox.com.
WI-FI: Wireless Internet access is available in Minute Maid Park. Contact the Astros Communications department for details.
ASTROS ON THE WEB: The official website of the Houston Astros is Astros.com. The site is updated daily with news, statistics, game notes, feature stories and minor league information. The Major League Baseball website, MLB.com, can also be accessed via Astros. com. The Astros also offer a Spanish website, AstrosDeHouston.com. The site features daily news coverage of the team as well as feature stories from international sports writers.
MLB PRESSBOX: With approved registration, media members gain electronic access to numerous Major League Baseball resources by logging onto MLBPressbox.com (on the official MLB website). Some of the information on this site includes: public relations contacts; daily statistical updates; daily game notes; current and archived press releases; media guides; press kits; credential language and media regulations; and historical information about MLB and its entities. In addition, this site provides media the opportunity to download HD-quality video, hi-resolution logos and information on special events for all 30 clubs, as well as headshots of players, coaches, umpires and select executives. All media covering the Astros should register on the MLB Pressbox site to access these resources.

The Astros TV and Radio broadcasts cover Texas and the Gulf Coast region at home and on the road.

- KTRH 740 AM and KBME 790 AM serve as the flagship radio stations of the Astros 30-plus station English network, and broadcasts all Spring Training games and all regular season games.
- TUDN Radio 93.3 FM and 1010 AM serves as the Spanish flagship radio stations of the Astros.
- AT\&T SportsNet SW provides exclusive television coverage of the Astros at home and on the road.


## SOCIAL MEDIA

The Astros maintain an active presence on social media which will continue in 2023. The Astros engage, entertain and inform fans through several online platforms, including Twitter (@astros and @losastros), Instagram (@astrosbaseball), Facebook (Facebook.com/Astros) and Astros.com. In 2023, fans will enjoy behind-the-scenes access to Astros players and coaches, community events, exclusive fan giveaways and increased fan engagement. We encourage open conversation with our fans and look forward to a social 2023 season!

## MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL DRESS GUIDELINES

Major League Baseball requests members of the media covering our games to dress in an appropriate and professional manner that reflects their respect for their colleagues, the teams and the players they are covering. Clubhouses, dugouts, press boxes, interview rooms and the playing field are working areas, and MLB expects members of the media to adhere to a business casual dress code. In that regard, media members are requested to adhere to following dress guidelines:

- Flip-flops are not permitted in clubhouses
- Jeans should be clean, neat and presentable (e.g., Ripped jeans should be avoided)
- T-shirts bearing offensive, disrespectful or inappropriate messages are not permitted
- Clothing bearing MLB club logos should not be worn in press areas
- Clothing should be appropriate for a business casual work environment. The following are some non-exclusive examples of apparel that should be avoided:
» Sheer or see-through clothing
" Excessively short skirts, dresses or shorts (e.g., Cut more than 3-4 inches above the knee)
» Tank tops, muscle shirts, one-shouldered or strapless shirts
» Clothing exposing bare midriffs or visible undergarments
We ask all members of the media to respect these guidelines. MLB will consider appropriate actions in those cases in which the guidelines are violated.

Major League Baseball Online Audio, Photography and Video Rules

The following are rules established by Major League Baseball regarding the usage of audio, photos and video online during the regular season by non-rightsholders.

1) Any media member credentialed to cover a Major League game must notify and receive permission from the host club or Major League Baseball that he/she intends to post audio or video content online.
2) The gathering of audio and video content in clubhouses pre-game and post-game is subject to the host club rules regarding electronic media access.
3) The manager's pre-game media availability may not be carried live and audio and video postings may be no longer than 120 seconds.
4) One-on-one interviews that are posted online with players, team personnel and baseball officials must be pre-arranged, can be posted for a maximum of 72 hours, must be no longer than 120 seconds long and cannot include any game highlights.
5) Any video captured within the ballpark, excluding press conferences, must be limited to 120 seconds and cannot be carried live.
6) No live or taped audio or video is permitted to be captured by any entities other than rightsholders from 45 minutes prior to game time until the game has concluded.
7) The post-game manager's press conference may be captured via video and audio and posted online but may not be carried live. This specific content may be archived for 72 hours.
8) Entities credentialed for photography may transmit on-line or display up to seven still pictures or photographs of any Game during its progress; provided, however, that under no circumstances may Bearer display any more than seven still pictures or photographs of any Game during its progress regardless of whether Bearer obtained such pictures or photographs at the Game.

THE ASTROS TELEVISION BROADCAST TEAM
TODD KALAS

TELEVISION PLAY-BY-PLAY BROADCASTER

- The 2022 season marks Todd Kalas' 31st year as an MLB broadcaster and seventh as the Astros play-by-play voice on television. The Astros have advanced to the ALCS or further in each of Todd's first six seasons with the club.
- Kalas has won three Lone Star Emmys in the last three sesons for his work on Astros telecasts.
- Todd is the son of Hall of Famer and former Astros broadcaster Harry Kalas.
- Prior to joining the Astros in 2017, Todd spent the previous 19 seasons (1998-2016) as part of the Tampa Bay Rays TV broadcast team. While his primary duties for the Rays were as pre- and postgame host and in-game reporter, Todd also handled play-by-play duties for hundreds of Rays games on both television and radio during his time there.
- Known for his distinctive voice and personality, Todd grew to be a popular figure with Rays fans as a result of his work on the broadcasts and was a three-time Suncoast Emmy award winner. Prior to joining the Rays, Todd worked with the New York Mets radio (1992-93) and Philadelphia Phillies television (1994-96) broadcast teams.
- A native Houstonian, Todd was born at St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital in Houston while his father, Harry, served as an Astros broadcaster from 1965-70. Harry would later call Phillies games from 1971-2009 en route to a Hall of Fame career. When the Phillies and Rays met in the 2008 World Series, Todd and his father called an inning together on radio during Game One of the Fall Classic.
- Todd graduated with a degree in broadcast journalism from Syracuse University, and began his baseball career with the Louisville Redbirds in 1991.
- In past years, Todd has called college football, basketball and baseball games and has been a studio host for NHL and NBA teams.
- Todd and his wife, Michele, reside in Houston.


CEOFF BLUM
TELEVISION COLOR BROADCASTER

- Geoff Blum returns for his 11 th season with the Astros TV broadcast team in 2022, which will be his eighth as the everyday color analyst for Astros telecasts. Geoff, who retired after 14 Major League seasons as an infielder (1999-2012), made the transition from the playing field to the broadcast booth in 2013.
- Geoff has won two Lone Star Emmys for his work on Astros broadcasts.
- During his playing career, Geoff had two stints with the Astros, totaling five seasons in Houston (2002-03, 2008-10). Over the course of his tenure with the Astros, Geoff hit . 259 with 228 RBI, 46 homers, 77 doubles and a .711 OPS.
- A switch-hitter, Geoff was known as one of the top pinch-hitters and utility players in baseball, appearing at all four infield positions in nine straight years (2000-08). He appeared in the postseason three times in his career (2005-06, 2011).
- Geoff was originally drafted by the Montreal Expos in the 1994 June Draft. Prior to his professional career, Geoff was a standout at the University of California, Berkeley. He also played a season in the Cape Cod League.
- Geoff and his wife, Kory, have four daughters: Mia Lea and triplets Ava, Audrey and Kayla.


JULIA MORALES
TELEVISION SIDELINE REPORTER

- Julia Morales returns for her 11th season as the Astros TV sideline reporter. As a reporter and anchor for AT\&T SportsNet, Julia serves as the primary in-game reporter on Houston Astros telecasts. She has three Lone Star Emmys for her work covering the Astros.
- Before moving to Houston, Julia worked as a sports reporter for Time Warner Cable News, formerly YNN in Austin, covering a wide range of events, including the Super Bowl, NBA Finals, World Series, and the College Baseball WS.
- Prior to joining the Time Warner Cable sports crew, Julia was the weekend sports anchor/reporter for KYTX-TV in Tyler, TX. Julia began her television career at KTEN-TV in Denison, Texas.
- A native of Crandall, TX, Julia spent two years as a "World Famous Kilgore College Rangerette" before graduating from UT Austin, where she was a member of Texas Pom for the Longhorns' 2005 National Championship season.
- Julia and husband Matt had their first baby in 2020 with the birth of daughter Valerie Rose.
- Julia is extremely passionate about animals and serves on the Board of Directors for Houston Pets Alive!, a no-kill animal rescue. She and Matt foster rescue dogs in the offseason.


## RADIO PLAY-BY-PLAY BROADCASTER

- Robert Ford was named to the Astros radio broadcast team to work alongside Steve Sparks as the play-by-play commentator on Feb. 13, 2013. He enters his 11th season as the radio voice of the Astros. In their 10 seasons, the duo of Robert and Steve have called seven postseasons, including six ALCS and four World Series. The 92 postseason games that they have called in that span are the most in the Majors.
- This offseason, Robert was named the 2022 Texas Sportscaster of the Year.
- Prior to joining the Astros, Robert had served as the radio pre- and postgame host for Kansas City Royals games on 610 AM KCSP, the Royals flagship station, since 2009.
- Robert has seven years of experience broadcasting minor league baseball, having called more than 800 games during stints with the Binghamton Mets, Kalamazoo Kings and Yakima Bears. In that span, Robert was twice named Frontier League Broadcaster of the Year (2003 and 2004). He also has extensive play-by-play experience in college basketball, including calling games for ESPN in recent years.
- Robert is a 2001 graduate of Syracuse University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in broadcast journalism.
- Robert has twice been a finalist for the Esurance MLB Award for "Best Call, TV/Radio," including in 2017 for his call of Alex Bregman's walk-off RBI single in Game 5 of the World Series.
- Robert lives in Houston and has a daughter, Elena.



## STEVE SPARKS

## RADIO BROADCASTER

- Steve Sparks was named to the Astros radio broadcast team to work alongside Robert Ford as the color commentator on Feb. 13, 2013. He enters his 11th season on the Astros radio broadcast.
- Since 2015, Steve and partner Robert have called six ALCS' and four World Series. The 92 postseason games that they have called in that span are the most in the Majors.
- A knuckleballer in his playing days, Steve pitched in the Major Leagues in parts of nine seasons (1995-2004) for the Brewers, Angels, Tigers, A's and Diamondbacks. His best season was in 2001 while with Detroit when he went 14-9 in 35 appearances ( 33 starts) with a 3.65 ERA while leading the Majors in complete games with eight. He also tallied a career high in innings pitched (232.0) that season.
- Steve attended Sam Houston State University, where he helped lead the Bearkats to back-to-back Gulf Star Conference baseball titles and an NCAA Division II Regional playoff appearance in 1986 and again in the school's first year at the Division I level in 1987. On Nov. 3, 2017, Steve was inducted into the Sam Houston Letterman's Association Hall of Honor.



## MATT BOLTZ

## RADIO BROADCASTENGINEER

- Matt Boltz enters his ninth season with the Houston Astros and his 23 rd overall in Major League Baseball.
- Matt is the Radio Broadcast Engineer \& Producer for the Astros Radio Network. He generates, maintains and produces all live audio for the entire Spring Training, regular season \& postseason schedule. Since 2015, Matt and the Astros broadcast team have produced more postseason games 92 than any other team in baseball.
- In 2020, while MLB was on hold due to the pandemic, Matt started an entertaining Astros podcast, that featured current and former players as guests, with Astros broadcasters serving as hosts.
- Matt also orchestrates all broadcast material, live commercial inventory, promotions and live interviews with the broadcasters, the front office, the radio flagship and the entire radio network.
- His offseason duties include editing and archiving all recorded sound, managing and servicing technical elements and assisting with network affiliate relations. Matt also engineers and produces Astroline, the Astros weekly offseason hot stove radio show which has been on the air since 1988.
- Prior to joining the Astros, Matt served as the Radio Producer Engineer for the Chicago Cubs Radio Network from 20012014. During that time, he also engineered game broadcasts for WGN Chicago and Northwestern Wildcats basketball and football programs.
- Matt resides in Pearland, Texas, with his wife, Melissa, and their two children: Emma Lucille and Theodore Matthew.



## FRANCISCO ROMERO

## SPANISHRADIO BROADCASTER

- Francisco Romero enters his 16th season of play-by-play on the Astros Spanish radio network and has called over 2,000 games in his career, including six no-hitters and a perfect game.
- Francisco and partner Alex Treviño are one of the longest-tenured broadcast duos in the Majors. The two have been a team since 2008, and have called 92 postseason games since 2015, which is the most in baseball in that span.
- Prior to coming to Houston, he spent five seasons broadcasting Milwaukee Brewers games in Spanish on Telemundo Wisconsin. His MLB broadcasting experience also includes selected Minnesota Twins games over five seasons (2003-08).
- His Major League broadcast debut was for the Arizona Diamondbacks on Telemundo Arizona in 1999, and he spent two years on Diamondbacks broadcasts from 1999-2000.
- Other Major League broadcasting experience includes select games on Spanish Radio with the Cincinnati Reds in 2005. Francisco also spent four seasons as the play-by-play broadcaster and pre- and postgame show producer on Spanish radio broadcasts for the Triple A Tucson Sidewinders of the Pacific Coast League.
- Additional sports broadcasting experience includes both football and basketball for the University of Arizona Spanish Radio Network (1999-present), as well as three seasons on the Arizona Cardinals radio halftime report.
- In 2015, Francisco and his broadcast partner Alex had the distinction of starting the Spanish broadcast efforts for the Kansas City Royals as they were asked to simulcast for both markets (Houston and Kansas City) during the Royals Hispanic Heritage Celebration while playing the Houston Astros.
- Francisco and Alex also currently produce a series of webisodes for the Astros Spanish social media channels.
- Francisco has been part of three Spanish broadcast effort debuts (Brewers, Reds and Royals) and is the only Spanish broadcaster to have broadcast games for six different MLB teams (D-backs, Brewers, Twins, Reds, Royals and Astros).
- In addition to broadcasting baseball games, Francisco was the English as a Second Language instructor for the Arizona Diamondbacks and the Chicago White Sox (extended Spring Training) players from 1998-2001.
- A graduate of the University of Arizona, Francisco spent 10 years as the sports anchor for the Telemundo affiliate in Tucson, Arizona, as well as one year as general assignment reporter.
- As a sports anchor/reporter for Telemundo, Francisco has covered some of the most important sports events in the world, such as: MLB World Series and All-Star Games, the Super Bowl, NBA Finals, Road to the World Cup, NCAA Basketball Tournaments, NCAA Softball Tournaments, NCAA Baseball Tournaments, NASCAR and Championship Boxing.
- In 2005, Francisco was inducted into his High School Media Hall of Fame, Pueblo High School in Tucson, Ariz. Francisco was also elected to the Pueblo High School Warrior Foundation Hall of Fame Class in 2017.
- He earned a 2004 Emmy Award from the Rocky Mountain Chapter in the sports reporting category; that same year he also earned the Communicators Award for sports reporting. In 2003, the Arizona Daily Star named him as one of the Top 100 Sports Figures of Southern Arizona.
- In 2014, the Association of Sports Broadcasters of Nicaragua invited Francisco to speak on MLB broadcasting.
- Francisco was ranked No. 3 in the Top 100 Sports Figures of Southern Arizona by the Arizona Daily Star, behind former Astros pitching coach Brent Strom and former Astros bullpen coach Craig Bjornson in 2017.



## ALEX TREVIÑO

## SPANISH RADIO BROADCASTER

- Alex Treviño returns for his 28th season as color analyst on the Astros Spanish radio network. He and partner Francisco Romero have been a team since 2008, making them one of the longest-tenured teams in baseball. The two have called 92 postseason games since 2017, which is the most in the Majors in that span.
- Alex joined the Astros broadcast booth in 1996 and has called more than 3,000 Astros games, 12 postseason appearances and four World Series (2005, 2017, 2019, 2021 and 2022).
- Alex's 27 seasons in the broadcast booth are the most in franchise history by a Spanish broadcaster, besting Orlando Sanchez Diago's record of 21 years.
- A native of Monterrey, Mexico, Alex spent 13 seasons playing in the Majors, primarily as a catcher, including the 1988-90 seasons with the Astros. He also spent time with the Mets, Reds, Braves, Giants and Dodgers. While with the Mets in 1980, he threw out $44 \%$ ( 47 of 106) of attempted basestealers, which was tops in the NL. Later in his career, while with the Dodgers on June 13, 1986 vs. the Padres in San Diego, he was part of history when he and pitcher Fernando Valenzuela formed the first Mexican-born battery in Major League history.
- Alex' older brother, Bobby Treviño, played in the Major Leagues as an outfielder for the Angels.
- Alex hit a career-high . 290 while serving as Houston's backup catcher in 1989 and hit . 364 ( $32 \times 88$ ) in 25 starts.
- He played in 939 Major League games and had a 249 lifetime average.
- In September 2014, Alex was inducted into the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor for his significant and lasting contributions to the landscape of Houston baseball through his work in broadcasting.



## STEVE GRANDE

## DIRECTOR, COMMUNICATIONS

- Steve Grande (@AstrosGrande) is in his 16th season (2008-23) as a full-time member of the Houston Astros Communications staff, his first full season as Director of Communications.
- In addition to his day-to-day media relations and communications duties, Grande is responsible for coordinating front office, manager, coach, and player interview requests, producing the Astros media guide, overseeing the production of the department's baseball information, reviewing all season credential requests and is the media and scheduling coordinator for the Houston College Classic and the Houston Winter Invitational.
- Grande travels on the majority of the club's road trips and has traveled on select road trips in each of his 15 full-time seasons. He has worked 15 Spring Trainings, 17 playoff series (2022 ALDS, 2022 ALCS and 2022 WS; 2021 ALDS, 2021 ALCS, 2021 WS; 2020 NLDS; 2019 ALDS, 2019 ALCS, and 2019 WS; 2018 ALDS and 2018 ALCS; 2017 ALDS, 2017 ALCS and 2017 WS; 2015 ALDS; 2010 NLCS) and the 2015 AL Wild Card Game, as well as the 2017 and 2018 Major League Baseball All-Star Game. Additionally, he helped plan and coordinate the media aspects of MLB's 2012 and 2013 Urban Invitational in Houston.
- Prior to joining the Astros full-time in 2008, Grande split his 2007 season interning in the Media Relations departments for the then Florida Marlins and the Astros.
- Grande also has experience outside the sports industry while working at two different public relations entities, both based out of Austin, Texas. In 2006, Grande got his professional start as an intern with BookPros Publishing Company in their publicity department. He moved on to intern for the public relations agency GCI Read-Poland in their public affairs department before pursuing a career in sports.
- Grande received his bachelor's degree in public relations with a minor in business from Texas State University-San Marcos in May of 2006. A native Houstonian, Grande graduated from Klein Oak High School in Spring, TX. He resides in Tomball with his wife, Ginny, and their two sons, James (5) and Wesley (2).



## RACHEL CATON

## MANAGER, BUSINESS COMMUNICATIONS

- Rachel Caton enters her second full season as a member of the Houston Astros Communications staff after joining the team in July 2021.
- Caton is responsible for the organization's business PR and communications, as well as internal and external publications, including the monthly Game Day Magazine. She will also assist in day-to-day media relations and be the main contact for any community or special event.
- Prior to joining the Astros, Caton spent 12 seasons working in college athletics and came to the Astros after a year as the Director of Football Communications at Army West Point, where she handled the day-to-day football PR and social media for the Black Knights, along with overseeing the communications team covering 30 sports.
- Caton has a strong baseball background, spending nine seasons as a Division I baseball communications contact at Baylor University, Army West Point, Pepperdine University and the University of Southern California.
- Caton also assisted with football media relations at Baylor University as a secondary contact for two seasons and a tertiary contact at Boise State for one season.
- Caton's career started as a student-intern in the communications offices at the University of Washington and the University of Southern California. She was a two-season communications fellow for the Pac-12 Conference office and she also completed an internship with the Los Angeles Dodgers in community affairs, along with a high school internship for the single-A Rancho Cucamonga Quakes.
- Caton is a two-time graduate of the University of Southern California, with a bachelor's in communications, a minor in news, media and society and a master's in communication management.

MESHACH SULLIVAN

SENIORCOORDINATOR, COMMUNICATIONS

- Meshach Sullivan is in his fifth season as a full-time member of the Houston Astros Communications staff.
- In addition to contributing to the day-to-day media relations responsibilities, Sullivan oversees media credentials, prepares the press box for every home game, writes content for the Astros media guide and contributes to the Astros Gameday Magazine.
- Sullivan first joined the Astros Communications department as a summer intern in 2018.
- Before joining the Astros organization full-time, Sullivan was a full-time High School Sports Reporter for The Beaumont Enterprise. Sullivan received his bachelor's degree in broadcast journalism from Texas Southern University in May of 2017.

2023 SEASON MANUTE

HOSTTON *ASTROS $=$ COLDEN

The 2023 season marks the 24th year of baseball at Minute Maid Park. The venue has hosted numerous special events, including the 2004 All-Star Game and Home Run Derby, the World Series (2005, 2017, 2019), the 2014 Civil Rights Game, Super Bowl LI Opening Night, major concert events, weddings, graduations, galas, and COVID-19 vaccine drives.

The year 2000 saw something the grand old game of baseball had not experienced since 1964 - a Major League team in Houston playing on natural grass outdoors. While clear skies and real grass were welcome additions for fans, the Bayou City hardball-faithful also enjoyed another first, Minute Maid Park's 242 foot-tall retractable roof. More than 3 million fans embraced the new ballpark in its inaugural season. Since then, the club has welcomed more than 55 million visitors during the facility's 22 -season tenure.

Minute Maid Park has become a welcome home for the Houston Astros and has ushered in a new era of Major League sports in the city. With the downtown ballpark, Houston continues to stand on the forefront of modern stadium construction that began with the club's previous home - the Astrodome. The park's retractable roof brought open-air baseball to Houston for the first time in 35 years, and the natural grass field and classic architecture provided the opportunity of capturing the same atmosphere from the great ballparks of baseball's golden age.

Approval of the ballpark, however, was not limited to the applause of the fans. Less than one calendar year after its opening, Minute Maid Park had already been recognized on local, state and national levels with several awards. The following are the first three major awards with which the new home of the Astros were honored:

- Greater Houston Preservation Alliance, $\mathbf{2 0 0 0}$ Good Brick Award. The President's Award was presented to former owner Drayton McLane, the Astros and the Harris County-Houston Sports Authority for the renovation of the 1911 Union Station building. The Good Brick Awards are presented annually in recognition of leadership and excellence in historic preservation.
- Most Outstanding Civil Engineering Project. This honor came from the Texas Section of the American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE), a professional organization that represents the vast majority of civil engineers.
- National Honor Award for Engineering Excellence. This national recognition for engineering excellence came from the American Consulting Engineers Council (ACEC). This honor stamped Minute Maid Park as one of the top 24 engineering projects among all buildings and civil works projects nationally.
LOCATIONE Minute Maid Park is located at 501 Crawford Street on the northeast end of downtown Houston. Situated near the George R. Brown Convention Center, Discovery Green and BBVA Compass Stadium, the ballpark is located one block west of U.S. 59 and is bound by Congress Avenue on the north, Texas Avenue on the south, Crawford Street on the west and Hamilton Street on the east.
HISTORY: The idea for a public-private financing drive for a downtown Houston ballpark was conceived in 1996. Fourteen leading Houston companies joined together to form the Houston Sports Facility Partnership. The Partnership agreed to provide a $\$ 35$ million interest-free loan with no repayment due until 10 years of ballpark operation had passed. With the Partnership's initial commitment, the Harris County-Houston Sports Authority had the support it needed to present a ballpark proposal to the public in November 1996 . Voters approved the $\$ 250$ million project.


ALL-STAR GAME: in 2004, Minute Maid Park played host to the 75th Major League Baseball All-Star Game. More than 350,000 people participated in All-Star Week activities, which included the Futures Game, the Legends/Celebrity Softball Game, and the Home Run Derby - all of which took place at Minute Maid Park - in addition to the John Hancock All-Star Fan Fest. The week culminated with the All-Star Game and a 9-4 American League win over the National League squad. Four Astros played for the National League squad, including the NL starting pitcher Roger Clemens, Carlos Beltran, Jeff Kent and Lance Berkman.
FIRST GAMES: The Houston Astros and New York Yankees played an exhibition game on March 30, 2000, with Houston winning 6-5. The Astros hosted the Philadelphia Phillies in the first official regular-season game on April 7, 2000, with Philadelphia winning 4-1.
ARCHITECTM The Architect of Minute Maid Park was HOK Sports Facilities Group, along with Construction Manager Brown \& Root Services, a business unit of Halliburton Company.
THE NAME: On June 5, 2002, the Houston Astros and The Minute Maid Company announced that they had expanded their relationship to create a long-term marketing and community partnership. The multi-year partnership agreement included naming rights for the downtown ballpark, rechristening the field "Minute Maid Park."

The partnership agreement also stipulated the pouring rights for products of The Coca-Cola Company, ongoing advertising and marketing programs, and a commitment by Minute Maid to support youth baseball programs in the Houston area.

The Minute Maid Company is an operating unit of The Coca-Cola Company and the flagship of its worldwide fruit beverage business. The Minute Maid Company has been headquartered in Houston since 1967.

Houston's downtown ballpark was originally named Enron Field on April 7, 1999, and was renamed Astros Field on Feb. 27, 2002, by an agreement between the Houston Astros and Enron Corporation.
SIZE: The building dimensions cover 28.97 acres of gross square footage, a total of $1,263,240$ square feet. The height is 93 feet to the last seating tread, equivalent to a nine-story building.
TRA\|N: A replica of a 19th century locomotive (circa 1860) and linked coal tender is a fan favorite. The train provides an architectural icon which combines sight, sound and motion for a dynamic entertainment and celebration feature. It also provides a link to the past for Houston and the Union Station site. The train was designed by Uni-Systems and built by SMI \& Hydraulics, which also provided the transporters for the retractable roof. Weighing close to 50,000 pounds, the train runs some 800 feet along the low roof track on the west side of the ballpark.

## UNION STATION: According to HOK's design

 platform, the most literal tie between Houston's past and its new ballpark is a physical line to Union Station. On March 2, 1911, Houston's second downtown Union Station, rebuilt at a cost of $\$ 500,000$, opened its doors for the first time. In the 104 years since, it has served as an epicenter of the city's population growth, been a catalyst for commercial evolution, and become an identifying landmark within the downtown skyline.Houston was once described as "Where 17
 Railroads Meet the Sea". An article in a 1913 issue of "The Rotarian" called Houston the "City of First Consideration" and "The Largest Manufacturing City in the Southwest." Union Station was at the center of it all, the hub of a strong industrial municipality that specialized in oil, rice, sugar and lumber. The historic landmark has also served as a shelter for hurricane refugees and has been visited by Presidents of the United States.

Trains with names such as Acadian, Argonaut, Katy Flyer, California Special, Lone Star, Orleanean and Pioneer made hundreds of stops at Union Station during its active period (1911-1974). Other trains with monikers such as Sam Houston Zephyr, Southerner, Sunset Limited, Sunshine Special, Texas Chief, Texas Eagle, Texas Rocket and Valley Eagle routinely picked up passengers there as well.

The first-floor Great Hall still includes much of Union Station's original architectural work. It currently serves as a general reception area for guests, functions as an event space, and houses the Astros Team Store. Each Astros fan who enters Minute Maid Park through Union Station retraces the steps of passengers who boarded trains in another era.

Today, the conference rooms and event spaces occupying the second and third floor of the renovated Union Station at Minute Maid Park (open 365 days a year) are named after some of the trains listed above. They are honored as both a tribute to hardworking rail personnel and in remembrance of Union Station's historic importance.

The Houston Astros executive offices occupy the fourth and fifth floors of the building. The sixth floor houses the Roof Deck and Club House at Union Station, where groups of up to 100 people can watch Astros baseball with scenic views of downtown Houston as a backdrop.

Though it sat vacant for a quarter century from 1974-1999, the former transit hub has re-taken its rightful place on the Houston skyline, now serving as the gateway to Astros baseball and remaining an important landmark in downtown Houston.

PLAYING FIELD: Featuring Platinum TE Paspalum grass, the playing surface covers 2.5 acres. The drainage and irrigation systems include 6,682 linear feet of perforated pipe and 4,406 linear feet of PVC pipe, respectively. A total of 51 irrigation heads help make the job for Head Groundskeeper Izzy Hinojosa and his staff much easier.

All grassed areas of the playing field are also constructed to USGA golf green construction specifications, allowing for excellent drainage and a growing media which is ideal for maintaining highperformance turfgrass.


SOUNDS: More than 400 speaker cabinets are scattered throughout the seating areas and almost 1,000 are found along the concourses. The speakers are distributed throughout the ballpark to have cabinets as close to the fans as possible.
THE ROOF: Architects from the HOK Sports Facilities Group recommended early on that a retractable roof would be appropriate for the Texas climate. Since building the first retractable-roof ballpark - the Skydome in 1989 - designers have crafted several kinds of retractable roofs. Some, for instance, open only over a small central section. The roof at Minute Maid Park, however, retracts completely off the ballpark to reveal the largest open area of any retractable roofed baseball stadium in existence today. A total of 50,000 square feet of glass in the west wall of the retractable roof gives fans a view of the Houston skyline, even when the roof is in the closed position.

Uni-Systems provided the technical expertise to design the best roof structure for Minute Maid Park. Mechanized roof panels open and close in 14-20 minutes. The roof moves back and forth an estimated 160 times a year, a distance of 14.6 miles. To cover the ballpark, steel panels roll in sequence along tracks on the east and west sides of the stadium. When the roof is open, the southern and northern panels, each of which measures 537 by 120 feet and weighs 1,905 metric tons, rest at the north end below the large middle section with its dimension of 589 by 242 feet and a weight of 3,810 metric tons. Designers determined the roof's shape - lower side panels flanking the high center panel - by tracking a batted baseball's hyperbolic flight path. Forged steel wheels, 140 in total, measuring 35 inches in diameter transport the three roof panels.
CONCESSIONS: Prior to the 2014 season the Astros and their exclusive food and beverage partner, Aramark, unveiled a $\$ 1.8$ million renovation to Minute Maid Park's main concourse, featuring eight new food and beverage concepts. As part of the transformation to enhance the dining experience, the Astros and Aramark completely overhauled the look and feel of the stands by re-branding each concept with a new name and menu, adding more vibrant signage and lighting, and introducing contemporary color schemes and decor. With the 2014 extension of the Astros and Aramark partnership, future enhancements will continue to incorporate fan feedback and market research into the development and design of new menu concepts and dining options throughout Minute Maid Park. In addition, they will explore new and unique ways to showcase Houston's cuisine and culinary talent, such as local top chefs Jimmy Coatsworth and Scott Strickland who have partnered with Aramark to bring their signature menu items to Minute Maid Park.
TECHNOLOCY: Following the 2010 season, the Houston Astros installed two new, high-definition video boards and a large ribbon board at Minute Maid Park in time for the start of the 2011 Major League Baseball season. The new primary video board is located in right field and measures 54 feet high and 124 feet wide (approximately 6,695 square feet), making it the third-largest board of its kind in the Major Leagues when installed. The Astros previous video board that had been in the ballpark since its inception in 2000 was 26 feet high and 45 feet wide. Additionally, the Astros have the largest video board in the Major Leagues featuring 1080i display format. A smaller video board, measuring 24 feet high by 40 feet wide, was installed in left field, and a ribbon board, stretching from foul pole to foul pole and more than 1,000 feet long, was also added. A speed pitch board and an old-fashioned, manually-operated scoreboard keep fans on top of the action in the ballpark and in every other big league venue. When it opened in 2000, Minute Maid Park was the first major sports facility to feature a closed-captioning board for the hearing impaired. Prior to the 2023 season, the video boards and ribbon boards in the stadium were replaced with new 4K Samsung LED boards. Ross Video now powers the control room and integration allowing the Astros to provide fans with award-winning special video features and effects created by Astros Productions.
RENONATIONS: Prior to the 2017 sesaon, the Astros made major renovations to the center field area. The center field area is now home to new concessions including fan-favorites Shake Shack, Torchy's Tacos and Pluckers, the Lexus Club, retail and more. Following the 2019 season, the Houston Astros renovated the suite level to create the Michelob Ultra Bar. In addition, a new club, Gallagher Club, was added down the left field line to hold up to 120 people.

ASTROS PUBLIC ADDRESS ANNOUNCER

- The 2023 season marks Bob's 30th as the Astros Public Address Announcer.
- Bob first joined the Astros in 1994 and has been with the organization ever since, announcing the final six seasons in the Astrodome as well as the MLB All-Star Game in 2004, the Astros World Series runs in 2005, 2019 and 2021 and the Astros World Series Championships in 2022 and 2017.
- He began his career as a PA announcer at Galveston's Pony-Colt Stadium at the age of 13 where he played shortstop and first base two nights a week and served as PA the other three nights.
- Bob started in radio at the age of 15 at Galveston's KGBC and KILE stations. He spent more than 20 years on the radio in the Houston market on KXYZ, KAUM, KSRR 97 Rock, KLOL Rock 101 and KZFX Z107 where he worked with longtime Houston DJ Crash Collins on the "Bob \& Crash" morning show.
- He also served as the backup PA announcer for the Dallas Cowboys at Texas Stadium, and was the image voice for the Cowboy's Silverstar Network.
- Bob currently owns and operates Bob Ford Productions, Inc. and has been doing voice-overs for radio and TV since 1986. He voiced award-winning projects for PBS, Showtime, Encore and Cartoon Network as well as TV and radio stations coast to coast.
- Bob was inducted into the Texas Radio Hall of Fame in 2021.
- The 2023 season also marks Bob's 10th as the PA Voice of TDECU Stadium for University of Houston football.

MLB GUIDELINES FOR THE MOVEMENT OF RETRACTABLE ROOFS
The decision as to whether a game begins with the roof open or closed rests solely with the home club.
If the game begins with the roof open: it shall be closed only in the event of impending rain or other adverse weather conditions. The decision to close the roof shall be made by the home club, after consultation with the Umpire Crew Chief.
The Umpire Crew Chief shall notify the visiting club, which may challenge the opening of the roof if it feels that a competitive imbalance will arise. In such an event, the Umpire Crew Chief shall make a final decision based on the merits of the challenge.
Once the roof is closed during a game, it shall not be re-opened.
If the game begins with the roof closed: it may be opened when, in the opinion of the home club, the climatic environment has reached a level where fan comfort and enjoyment will be best served by opening the roof to the natural atmospheric conditions. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the following guidelines should be applied to opening the roof during a game.
> The roof may only open once during a game.
$>$ The Umpire Crew Chief will be notified at the commencement of the inning that the roof will be opened at the inning's conclusion.
> The Umpire Crew Chief shall notify the visiting club, which may challenge the opening of the roof if it feels that a competitive imbalance will arise. In such an event, the Umpire Crew Chief shall make a final decision based on the merits of the challenge.
> The opening of the roof shall only commence between innings.
