DANIEL SNYDER

Dan Snyder is Co-Owner and Co-CEO of the Washington Commanders. A self-made man and an entrepreneur at heart, Dan Snyder's life is marked by an enduring passion for the people, the team and the community he loves. He has been a key member of the leadership team since he and his wife Tanya Snyder acquired the team in 1999. A D.C.-area native, Dan Snyder is a lifelong Washington fan who grew up attending Washington Commanders – then Redskins – games with his father Gerald. His childhood and adolescence were shaped and inspired by his devotion to the team. To Snyder, football is family. He has put his passion into action since purchasing the team 23 years ago, consistently leading the franchise to new prominence in the community, in business and across the National Football League.

Dan Snyder continues to be one of Washington's most engaged and impactful community leaders and philanthropists. Shortly after purchasing the franchise, one of Dan and Tanya Snyder's first actions was to create the Washington Commanders Charitable Foundation, which launched in 2000, to bring together the team and its corporate and community partners to make a positive and measurable impact on area youth across the Washington, D.C.-Maryland-Virginia area. Under Dan and Tanya Snyder's leadership, the Washington Commanders Charitable Foundation has contributed more than \$31 million to the local community and grown to impact more than 178,000 area youth each year.

Beyond the team's expansive charitable foundation efforts, Dan and Tanya Snyder have identified numerous ways to support and contribute to communities in-need around the world, primarily through contributions to disaster relief, COVID-19-related relief, social justice, Children's National Hospital and the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC). Dan and Tanya Snyder have donated hundreds of thousands of dollars and mobilized widespread resources to support Ukrainian response efforts, hurricane relief efforts across the U.S. and internationally in the Caribbean, Haiti, Indonesia and Thailand. As a longtime supporter of the Children's National Hospital Foundation, Dan Snyder's support enabled construction of the Snyder Family Emergency Medicine and Trauma Center. He also funded construction of the Daniel M. Snyder and Family Communication Center at the NCMEC. Each day, the Center fields hundreds of calls from around the nation from law enforcement organizations, parents of missing children, runaways seeking help and people responding to the Center's well-known awareness campaigns on behalf of missing children. Dan and Tanya Snyder were honored with the Charles B. Wang International Children's Award in 2014. Dan Snyder's support has also extended to the military community. Under his leadership, the organization created Salute, the team's official military appreciation club which coordinates the team's decades-long military appreciation initiatives into one comprehensive, year-round platform. This first-of-its-kind program in the NFL serves, supports and thanks the military community by hosting a variety of events, including pre-game parties for military members, re-enlistment ceremonies at both team headquarters and FedExField, military appreciation events and more. Snyder also contributed to the construction of the USO Warrior and Family Center at Fort Belvoir.

Under his leadership, the Washington Commanders remain at the forefront of marketing and business operations in the NFL. The organization has evolved to be innovative with an entirely new, best-in-class leadership team at the Senior Vice President level and above, including Tanya Snyder as Co-CEO and Jason Wright as Team President, making the Commanders leadership team the most diverse in the National Football League. As part of this cultural and business transformation, Dan and Tanya Snyder led the organizational rebrand. The pair also hired a first-of-its-kind Chief Creative & Digital Officer to oversee the organization's storytelling and brand marketing strategies while also developing engaging new content to drive even greater value for fans and team sponsors. In addition to their collaborative work around the team's rebrand, Dan and Tanya Snyder worked closely with senior leadership to launch an in-house content studio. Dan Snyder also leads the team's active stadium search.

During the Snyder's 23 season tenure, 30 different Washington players have earned a total of 62 Pro Bowl appearances, 14 have been named All-Pro per the Elias Sports Bureau and 20 draft picks have been selected to the PFWA All-Rookie Team. In addition, five players – Darrell Green, Bruce Smith, Deion Sanders, Champ Bailey and Jason Taylor – have been inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Prior to acquiring the Washington Commanders, Dan Snyder founded and acted as Chairman and CEO of Snyder Communications, Inc., making him the youngest CEO of a New York Stock Exchange company at the time. From its launch in 1985, Snyder Communications, Inc. grew to a global organization of 12,000 employees with 77 offices across 17 countries and more than \$1 billion in annual revenue. The company's client base included 200 of the Fortune 500, to which it provided targeted marketing solutions, including advertising and marketing services. It was acquired by Havas in 2000 for more than \$2.3 billion, at the time the largest such merger in the history of the advertising and marketing industry. Snyder is also Founder and Chairman Emeritus of inVentiv Health and Founder and Managing Member of the Board of Red Zebra Broadcasting, LLC, which operates radio stations across the Washington, D.C.-Maryland-Virginia area. Snyder is active in a variety of other private business ventures, both as an investor and as an advisor to management. He is a frequent invitee to share his experiences and views with business organizations nationwide, and he is enshrined in the Greater Washington Jewish Sports Hall of Fame.

Tanya Snyder is Co-Owner and Co-CEO of the Washington Commanders. She has been an integral part of the executive team since Dan and Tanya Snyder acquired the team in 1999, spearheading the launch and continued commitment of the Washington Commanders Charitable Foundation and expanding her role over the years into various aspects of the organization. Since 2000, Tanya has led “the team behind the team” and guided social and community efforts across the organization. Under her stewardship, the Charitable Foundation has contributed more than \$31 million to the local community and grown to impact more than 178,000 area youth each year.

In 2021, Tanya Snyder was named Co-CEO, becoming a catalyst for the evolution of the Washington Commanders into a franchise of the future. Under her leadership, the Commanders have undergone a cultural and business transformation that includes a new, innovative leadership team at the Senior Vice President level and above, as well as an organizational rebrand. The Commanders have assembled a best-in-class leadership team – the most diverse in the National Football League – with Tanya at the helm.

A breast cancer survivor and longtime advocate for cancer awareness and research, Tanya Snyder and Zeta Tau Alpha co-founded the THINK PINK® campaign for breast cancer awareness within the NFL in 1999 by passing out 8,000 handmade pink ribbons at FedExField to remind fans that early detection saves lives. This gesture launched a pink movement each October throughout the league and across the nation, and what started at FedExField has resulted in nearly 10 million pink ribbons pinned leaguewide and millions of lives touched around the world to date. Tanya’s community impact, especially her breast cancer awareness and advocacy efforts, has been recognized by a number of organizations including the American Cancer Society with “Mother of the Year” honors (2013), Men Against Breast Cancer with the Gloria Heyison Inspiration Award (2012), and Zeta Tau Alpha Foundation with the ZTA THINK-PINK!® Ambassador Award (2008).

An Atlanta native, Tanya Snyder is the proud mother of three children and a beloved dog, Tackle. Dan and Tanya Snyder reside in Virginia.

33RD NFL SEASON // (26 COACHING/9 PLAYING) / 3RD WITH WASHINGTON

Ron Rivera enters his 26th season coaching in the NFL and his third as Washington's head coach in 2022.

He was named the 30th head coach in franchise history on Jan. 1, 2020 and led Washington to their first division title since 2015. During the 2020 season Rivera was diagnosed with Squamous Cell Carcinoma (SCC) located in a lymph node and detected from a self-care check. Rivera continued to coach through his treatments and on January 28, 2021, he was declared cancer free. Rivera was selected as the NFC Coach of the Year by the Committee of 101 following the 2020 season.

A friend of legendary head coach Joe Gibbs, Rivera is a passionate and skilled leader who has earned the respect of his players, coaching staff and the community. He most recently served as the head coach of the Carolina Panthers for nine seasons, where he led the team to three straight divisional titles and an appearance in Super Bowl 50. Rivera was also recognized twice as the NFL Coach of the Year by the Associated Press in 2013 and in 2015.

Rivera inherited a 2-14 Carolina Panthers team as a rookie head coach in 2011 and guided it back to an NFC force with four playoffs appearances since 2013, tied for the second-most playoff berths in the NFC over that six-year period. In that span, the Panthers recorded 58 wins, tied for the most in any six-year period in their franchise history and fifth-most in the NFL.

In 2015, Carolina won its second NFC Championship in franchise history, third consecutive NFC South division title and appeared in Super Bowl 50. Carolina finished the season with a franchise-best 17-2 record, including home playoff victories over Seattle in the divisional round and Arizona in the NFC Championship game.

Hired by the Panthers for his defensive expertise, Rivera did not disappoint as the Panthers put together five top-10 finishes in total defense in seven seasons from 2012-18. Like Rivera, the Panthers' rebound has been steady and solid, starting with six wins in his first season in 2011 and seven victories in 2012 before registering three consecutive division championships starting in 2013 when he earned his first Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year award. Laying a foundation that included back-to-back Rookie of the Year award winners in quarterback Cam Newton and linebacker Luke Kuechly, Rivera blended veteran and young talent into productive units on both sides of the ball.

Rivera helped lead a Panthers team that finished among the league's top 10 rushing offenses, including top-five finishes in 2011, 2015, 2017 and 2018. The Panthers recorded 30 consecutive regular season games with at least 100 rushing yards from Week 6 of 2014 to Week 3 of 2016, the longest streak in the NFL since Pittsburgh tallied 43 from 1974-77.

Carolina's run defense ranked in the top 10 of the NFL in 2013, 2015, 2016 and 2017. Starting in Week 14 of 2016 through Week 1 of 2018, the Panthers went 21 consecutive games without allowing a 100-yard individual rusher, setting a franchise record.

In 2018, Rivera coached two players to All-Pro selections. Panthers running back Christian McCaffrey earned AP All-Pro second-team honors as he helped the Panthers lead the NFL in rushing yards per carry (5.1). McCaffrey also recorded 107 receptions, the most by any running back in a season in NFL history and broke Steve Smith's franchise record for single-season receptions by any player. He ran for 1,098 rushing yards, becoming the third player in NFL history with over 100 receptions and 1,000 rushing yards in the same season. McCaffrey accumulated a franchise-record 1,965 scrimmage yards, ranking third in the NFL.

Linebacker Luke Kuechly earned his sixth-straight Pro Bowl selection and fifth AP All-Pro first-team honor, tied for the most among active players. Kuechly tied for third in the NFL with 20 tackles for loss. In 2017, the rushing attack helped propel the team to an 11-5 record and a Wild Card berth by averaging 131.4 yards on the ground, good for fourth in the league.

In 2015, Rivera was named NFL Coach of the Year for the second time in three seasons as his team earned its third consecutive NFC

South title and claimed the top seed in the NFC for the first time in Panthers franchise history. The Panthers became just the seventh team in the Super Bowl era to post a 15-1 or better record in the regular season. Carolina started 2015 with 14 consecutive victories, which, combined with four wins to close the 2014 regular season, gave the Panthers an NFC-record 18-game winning streak.

Rivera's Panthers went 12-4 and won the NFC South in 2013, Carolina's first division title since 2008. The Panthers then recovered from a 3-8-1 start in 2014 to win four in a row and capture a second consecutive NFC South crown. Prior to Rivera's arrival, Carolina had never reached the postseason in consecutive years, and no team had captured the NFC South twice in a row.

Rivera arrived in Carolina with a reputation for hard work, attention to detail and preparation. Those were also the qualities he exhibited in his first campaign as the Panthers tripled their win total from the previous season. Rivera did not even meet his team until they reported to training camp and, despite a slow start, held it together to finish with four wins in the final six games.

Rivera has shined as a coach and player during his 30-plus years in the NFL, serving as defensive coordinator for the San Diego Chargers' top-ranked defense in 2010 and playing linebacker for the Chicago Bears' top-ranked defense and Super Bowl XX championship team in 1985. In 23 seasons as a coach and nine as a player, he has been with teams that have reached the playoffs 19 times, including nine conference championships and three Super Bowls. The mentality of the Chargers defense that Rivera coached and the Bears defense on which he played has stuck with the head coach, and he has transferred it to his teams.

Rivera's character has been influenced by two innovative defensive coordinators. As a player, Rivera was coached by the late Buddy Ryan, the architect of the "46 Defense," which involved blitzing on nearly every down. As a coach, Rivera toiled under the late Jim Johnson, a highly regarded defensive coordinator renowned for his aggressive approach.

Rivera's identity also has been shaped by his family. The son of a U.S. Army officer and the second youngest of four boys, Rivera learned from a young age about chain of command and many of the principles he teaches and expects from his players. "I come from a military family where discipline isn't taught, it's lived. It's expected from day one. I have a philosophy that every player, every coach, everyone who works for this organization, they'll know it day one," Rivera said in his introductory press conference with Washington on Jan. 2.

Rivera worked with the Chargers from 2007-10. He coached inside linebackers before taking over as the team's defensive coordinator midway through the 2008 season. Under Rivera's guidance, the pass defense steadied itself — intercepting nine passes and yielding 229.6 passing yards per game and 11 touchdown passes over the final eight games. Those numbers contrasted to the first half of the season when San Diego notched just seven picks and was victimized for 265.1 yards per game and 14 touchdowns through the air. In Rivera's first full season leading the defense in 2009, the Chargers ranked 16th in total defense and 11th against the pass. Those rankings improved in 2010 as San Diego led the NFL with an average of 271.6 total yards allowed per game and gave up a league-low 177.8 passing yards per game. From 2004-06, Rivera oversaw the Chicago Bears defense, engineering the unit to two top-five finishes in the league. Under Rivera's direction, five different defensive players went to the Pro Bowl: linebacker Lance Briggs, safety Mike Brown, defensive tackle Tommie Harris, linebacker Brian Urlacher and cornerback Nathan Vasher.

In his first season as a defensive coordinator in 2004, Rivera presided over a defense that produced nine more takeaways and 17 more sacks than the previous year and scored a franchise-record and NFC-high six defensive touchdowns. The Bears also thrived on third down and buckled down inside their own 20-yard line, ranking first in the NFL in third-down efficiency (30.5 percent) and topping

the NFC in red zone defense (42.6 percent). The following year, Chicago continued to build on the foundation Rivera laid in 2004. The Bears won their first of two consecutive NFC North titles and stood second in the NFL in total defense. In surrendering the fewest points in the league, Rivera's defense went 43 consecutive quarters without allowing more than seven points – the longest streak in the NFL since 1969. During Rivera's last season with the Bears in 2006, the defense paced the NFL with 44 takeaways and finished fifth in the league in total defense and third in scoring defense, helping propel Chicago to the NFC Championship and an appearance in Super Bowl XLI.

Prior to becoming a defensive coordinator, Rivera spent five seasons from 1999-2003 as the linebackers coach for the Philadelphia Eagles, who advanced to the NFC Championship game in each of his final three seasons. Twice during Rivera's tenure with the Eagles, the team finished second in the NFL in scoring defense and in 2001 held all 16 of its opponents to fewer than 21 points – making them just the fourth team in NFL history to do so.

Rivera gained his first coaching experience with the Bears as a defensive quality control coach from 1997-98. He is just the third Latino head coach in NFL history, joining Tom Flores with the Oakland Raiders from 1979-87 and Seattle Seahawks from 1992-94 and Tom Fears with the New Orleans Saints from 1967-70.

Following retirement from his playing career, Rivera went into broadcasting. He covered the Bears and college football as a television analyst for WGN and SportsChannel Chicago for four years from 1993-96.

Selected in the second round of the 1984 NFL Draft by Chicago, Rivera played all nine of his pro seasons with the Bears. Primarily an outside linebacker, he appeared in 149 games with 62 starts (including 12 postseason contests with six starts) and posted 392 tackles, 7.5 sacks, five forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries, nine interceptions and 15 passes defensed. Rivera was a member of six NFC Central division title teams and a Super Bowl XX championship team in 1985.

As a player, Rivera was known for both his skill and determination on the field and his dedication of time and energy to the community. As a result, he was named the Bears' Man of the Year in 1988 and earned the club's Ed Block Courage Award in 1989. He has carried that same community commitment to coaching, sponsoring a bowling tournament to benefit the Ronald McDonald House, USO and Humane Society. He was a finalist for the 2017 Salute to Service Award, an annual award presented to NFL players, coaches, personnel and alumni who demonstrate an exemplary commitment to honoring and supporting the military community.

Rivera, who lost his brother Mickey to pancreatic cancer in 2015, also serves as a spokesman for the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network. He has twice been the honorary starter for the organization's PurpleStride 5K in Charlotte. An All-American at the University of California, Rivera finished his career as the school's all-time leader in sacks with 22 and tackles with 336. As a senior in 1983, he set the Bears' single-season record for sacks with 13 and tackles for loss with 26.5.

Born Jan. 7, 1962, in Fort Ord, Calif., Rivera lived in Germany, Panama, Washington and Maryland before his family settled in Marina, Calif. He attended Seaside High School in Seaside, Calif.,

and was a three-sport star in football, basketball and baseball. Rivera and his wife, Stephanie, have two children, Christopher and Courtney. Stephanie is a former assistant coach for the WNBA's Washington Mystics.

As President of the Washington Football Commanders, Jason Wright is responsible for leading the organization's business divisions, including operations, finance, sales, and marketing. In addition to leading a historic transformation of a sports franchise, he is the first Black team president in the history of the NFL and currently is the youngest team president in the League. He is the fourth former NFL player to become president of a team.

Prior to joining the Washington Football Team, Jason was a partner in McKinsey & Company's Washington DC office. His work focused on expanding the value of large, complex organizations through operations and culture transformations. Jason specialized in steering companies through their toughest moments - in crisis and turnaround scenarios. From systemic personnel misconduct to financial distress to COVID-19 response, Jason's tenure at McKinsey supported a range of multi-national, corporation-specific challenges, while also leading the company's global inclusion and anti-racism strategies.

His deep passion for intentional change that profoundly expands opportunities for historically marginalized populations resulted in his work co-founding McKinsey's Black Economic Institute. A research entity that analyzes the racial wealth gap, the Institute today serves as a prominent voice in public discussions regarding racial equity in corporate America. This advocacy, combined with his data- and results-oriented approaches, have been sought out by leading organizations, such as The Greater Washington Partnership, where Jason helps lead its Inclusive Growth Strategy Council as co-chair. The Inclusive Growth Strategy Council is a regional collaborative that dissects and identifies a blueprint for the region to address long-standing gaps in income, services, employment, and access to capital for lower-income populations.

Jason's commitment to faith, family, and community is marked by his service on the Board of Trustees at Union Theological Seminary, where he is helping the institution better equip a changing student body focused on community organizing and social entrepreneurship. His leadership, passion for community change, and business acumen have been noted nationally and regionally, with Jason being awarded as a "Top 40 under 40" by Black Enterprise magazine, Sports Business Journal's "Best Hire of 2020," and standing as a member of The Economic Club of Washington D.C., where he serves alongside DC-based executives supporting a range of initiatives in the DMV.

Jason spent seven years as a running back in the NFL and was team captain and NFLPA player representative for the Arizona Cardinals during the 2011 NFL lockout. He has a B.A. in psychology from Northwestern University, where he was an Academic All-American student athlete, a two-time All-Big Ten football selection, and the president of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. He received his M.B.A. in Operations and Finance with honors, from the University of Chicago-Booth School of Business.

Mission Statement: The Washington Commanders Charitable Foundation is ever-present in the community, constantly working to achieve its mission of making a positive and measurable impact in the lives of children that need it most. Since the Snyder family created the Charitable Foundation in 2000, the organization has given back more than \$31M to the community and currently provides support and services to more than 179,000 individuals (mostly children) annually, focusing on supporting education, children's health and wellness and preparing them for their future.

Capital Investment Project – During training camp in July 2021, The Foundation made a \$75,000 donation to support Richmond's Department of Parks, Recreation and Community Facilities to assist with the renovation and additional upgrades for the Hotchkiss Field Community Center. This donation was made with the goal of continuing to invest in the future of children in the RVA community. The Foundation was also able to surprise one of the organizations that utilizes the facility, RVA League for Safer Streets, with a gift of \$15,000 in brand new sports equipment ahead of its upcoming season. Additionally, Team President Jason Wright and Washington Legends Gary Clark, Chris Baker and Tim Hightower met with players and offered words of wisdom in a character-building workshop. RVA Leagues for Safer Streets provides services to its area community through basketball, unifying families and reducing crime.

Back to School Fair – In August 2021, The Foundation hosted over 1,000 Washington D.C. metro area students at the 7th Annual Back to School Fair at FedExField. Children and their guardians in attendance received school supplies, sports equipment, haircuts and much more to prepare for the upcoming school year. The goal, as it has been since 2015, was to provide low-income children with a central place to be completely prepared for the upcoming school year. The Back to School Fair initiative will return this August.



Hispanic Heritage -- On September 28, 2021, The Foundation kicked off the 2021-2022 Washington Reads Program with a virtual Hispanic Heritage Month celebration with 200+ students across DC, Maryland and Virginia. Washington tight end and first Chilean-born NFL player, Sammis Reyes, surprised students with a reading of the book *La Frontera*, shared his journey to the NFL, talked about his heritage and concluded the event with a Q&A with students.

Breast Cancer Awareness & Crucial Catch – For the 23rd year in a row, The Foundation hosted its annual Breast Cancer Awareness game as the organization encouraged fans to “Think Pink” in the fight against breast cancer. To promote early detection awareness, Co-Owner and Co-CEO Tanya Snyder helped hand out 45,000 pink ribbon pins to fans entering the game, as the organization has surpassed nine million ribbons given out over the last two-plus decades. The team also hosted the All-Star Survivors, 30 women whose lives have been affected by breast cancer, to honor and recognize them at the game. Washington staff also kicked off National Breast Cancer Awareness Month in partnership with the National Breast Cancer Foundation, by packaging 335 HOPE Kits filled with essential items for women currently battling breast cancer in the DMV.



All-Star Survivors -- On Oct. 12, The Foundation hosted the 13th annual All-Star Survivors Celebration, an event focused on supporting and celebrating 30 All-Star Survivors, women whose lives have been affected by breast cancer, and their families. During the event, the breast cancer survivors, or “All-Stars”, were treated to lunch, makeup consultations and massages. They also received new jeans donated by Gap Inc., custom Color Bar jewelry donated by Kendra Scott, spa services courtesy of Lansdowne Resort and Spa, wigs and scarves provided by the American Cancer Society, and a Washington gift bag. Attention to the little details played a big role in the mission to make these women feel special.

Alumni Homecoming -- On October 16th, 2021, over 30 Washington Alumni, Jackie Taylor & family came together with Washington's partners, Out Teach and Pepsi Stronger Together, for a garden build at Burrville Elementary School in Washington, DC to launch the Sean Taylor Legacy Project as part of the Team's Alumni weekend of activities to honor the life and legacy of Sean Taylor. The garden will allow 325+ students to grow their STEM knowledge each year.



Trunk or Treat -- In October 2021, The Foundation partnered with Dreams for Kids DC for a Halloween Trunk or Treat. The students were able to visit five themed cars where they received an assortment of candy, Washington swag items, toys and more. After Trunk or Treating, participants hit the dance floor alongside members from the Entertainment Team and Washington Legend Joshua Morgan.

Harvest Feast -- On November 22, 2021, volunteers assisted in assembling 7,500 bags of dry goods, perishables and beverages that were distributed to 2,500 families the following day at Washington's 19th Annual Harvest Feast presented by Ryan Homes. In total, the event distributed roughly 90,000 pounds of nutritious packaged food and fresh produce in addition to 50,000 pounds of turkey in a drive-thru format at FedExField. Through partnership with the Capital Area Food Bank that benefits the DMV region, Washington has gifted nearly 1,602,335 pounds of packaged and fresh food and 640,500 pounds of turkey since 2003.

Digital Divide Grant -- As part of the National Football League's Inspire Change initiative to reduce barriers to opportunity, Washington awarded two grants -- in the amount of \$15,000 apiece -- to two critical organizations in the District of Columbia and Prince George's County, Maryland that are working to bridge the digital divide. Inspiring change begins with a commitment to equity in all forms, and these organizations are demonstrating a determined approach to breaking down barriers in technology access. The Foundation and the National Football League are proud to serve the community through these two far-reaching organizations.

Everfi306 + BGC Partnership -- With Washington players leading the charge, along with help from alumnus Doug Williams, The Foundation partnered with EverFi and the Boys & Girls Club of Greater Washington to bring an African American History program (known as Everfi306) to students in the DC metro area. The goal of the partnership, and the team's \$50,000 donation towards this program, was to educate and encourage kids and teens of all races and backgrounds to have difficult conversations and use their voices to create positive change. During this year's Program Kickoff, Washington Alumni Tim Hightower and Joshua Morgan provided insight to the students about how a program like Everfi306 helps to change a limiting narrative and expand the dreams of those in young Black communities.

Washington Winter Wonderland -- On Dec. 14, 2021, The Foundation hosted 200 elementary school students from D.C. and Prince George's County Public Schools at FedExField for a holiday-themed winter wonderland experience. Students were served lunch by Washington special guests, including Tanya Snyder, alumni and the Entertainment Team before they rotated through different holiday-themed activity stations. These activities included photos with the day's special guests, face painting, arts and crafts, ornament making, cookie decorating and story time, as well as a surprise visit with Santa during which each child received several personal gifts.



Amazon Books Holiday Event – In connection with the Washington Reads program, the team partnered with Amazon Books to bring 50 students from Randle Highlands Elementary School, a Ward 7 D.C. school, to Amazon Books' storefront location in Georgetown. Washington Co-Owner & Co-CEO, Tanya Snyder, and alumni joined the event, where students were treated to breakfast and surprised with gifts for the holiday season.

Toys for Tots -- The Foundation and the U.S. Marine Corps teamed up for the Toys for Tots toy drive benefitting children across neighboring communities in the DMV. More than 70 U.S. Marines from across the DMV area were on-hand at our Dec. 12th game to help collect toys and monetary donations. Since 2011, The Foundation has raised nearly \$280,000 for the Toys for Tots initiative.

Toy Giveaway – Washington's Toy Giveaway, the grand finale of the team's month-long Season of Giving initiative, was organized in partnership with surrounding community groups to provide presents for local youth who would benefit most from the gifts. During the day, the team distributed more than 10,000 toys and team gifts to thousands of these families. Some selected dolls and science kits, others picked out jerseys and board games. Every single one of these families, though, left with a present that couldn't be wrapped in paper or placed under a tree -- the joy of a child with a gift of their own for Christmas.

My Cause, My Cleats -- As part of the NFL's My Cause, My Cleats campaign, more than 70 Washington players and coaches created custom cleats to raise awareness for initiatives and causes they are passionate about. Players revealed their passions beyond the game and wore their hearts on their feet in Week 13 of the 2021 season. The Foundation then auctioned off select players' and coaches' game-worn cleats, raising more than \$30,000 in the initiative's seventh year, to support their chosen non-profit organizations.

High School Coach of the Week Program -- The High School Coach of the Week program is a league-wide initiative, recognizing area high school football coaches who continuously demonstrate hard work and dedication to their football programs by creating successful football teams and players both on and off the field. During the Coach of the Week selection process, the committee considered how each nominee demonstrated the importance of player health and safety, which includes their philosophies on teaching the fundamentals of the game, proper tackling techniques, concussion management practices, and adherence to heat and hydration guidelines. The chosen coaches were honored in-game with an on-field moment in January during the 2021 season. Additionally, each coach chosen throughout the high school football season received a \$2,000 donation from The Foundation to their football program to provide additional resources and training to recipients and their coaching staff. After all 10 coaches were selected, the committee nominated a coach for the Don Shula NFL High School Football Coach of the Year award who demonstrates a commitment to the health and safety of their players as well as the exemplary characteristics of the late Coach Don Shula. Coach Michael Nesmith, head football coach of Paint Branch High School (PBHS) in Burtonsville, MD, was named the Washington Football High School Coach of the Year.

National Gun Violence Awareness Day: On National Gun Violence Awareness Day, the Washington Commanders locked arms with other Washington, DC-based sports teams, pledging a combined donation of more than \$85,000 to Everytown for Gun Safety's Community Safety Fund, providing direct investment, peer convenings and capacity building to community-based violence intervention programs. Additionally, the Commanders' Rookie class came together to wear orange shirts recognizing the day.

Rookie Community Club Initiative – The Rookie Community Club Initiative is a platform to introduce Washington Commanders' rookies to the DMV community and community partners that are an integral part of the franchise. Through Coach Ron Rivera's commitment to community outreach, the program has increased participation initiatives that fulfill the mission of The Foundation. The 2022 Rookie Community Club Initiative events included the B.R.A.K.E.S Safe Driving, Capital Area Food Bank Packaging and a Big Bus Tour of Washington, D.C.

B.R.A.K.E.S Save Driving – The Washington Commanders teamed up with B.R.A.K.E.S (Be Responsible and Keep Everyone Safe), a national teen driving program, to hold free safe driving lessons at FedExField for teenagers aged 15-20. During the Safe Driving session, two dozen Washington players received important lessons for best driving practices. B.R.A.K.E.S. course graduates are 64% less likely to get into a crash in their first 3 years of driving.

Capital Area Food Bank – Washington rookies helped package 585 boxes of meals to help feed families in the DMV community. Capital Area Food Bank leads the team's regional efforts to provide equitable access to food for those struggling with hunger and food insecurity. The Commanders are proud to have a long-standing partnership with Capital Area Food Bank with a variety of events throughout the year.

Washington Salute - the Commanders' official military appreciation and outreach program. Salute recognizes the duty to serve and support those who have courageously fought for our freedom, and an opportunity to thank our military for their continued selfless efforts to serve the United States. Washington Salute allows service members to connect with the team and with each other, sharing stories, experiences and the shared passion of the Commanders fan base and service members. Washington Salute includes free year-round events and activities supporting the program's four pillars: education, family services, health and wellness, and job creation. It also features team news, social media updates and photo sharing. Additional features include contests and sweepstakes, photo galleries, special events, promotional giveaways, meet & greets with players and alumni and discounted offers. Military Combine: 100-150 Salute members go through a simulated "combine" similar to what team prospects go through. This event is typically in the spring, held around the same time as the NFL Combine. The event has been hosted at the St. James Sports Complex and The Commanders practice facility.

Touching Base Tour: In past years, Salute has traveled to up to 15 bases in MD, DC, and VA and provided giveaways and lunch to service members.

Military Appreciation Day at Training Camp: 150 guests hosted at training camp practice. Lunch, giveaways, raffles, and autograph opportunities were included.

Game Day Events: USO Metro Club hosts up to 500 club members, active-duty service members and veterans on gameday with drinks, food, raffles, alumni appearances, discounted ticket opportunities and service member in-game recognition moments.

TAPS (Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors): event held in conjunction with Salute: As a part of Salute to Service week, Washington hosted five Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS) families for a special practice viewing at The Commanders practice facility in Ashburn, Virginia. After practice, alongside current players, Washington Legend Doug Williams and Head Coach Ron Rivera told the TAPS families that Washington players would be wearing helmets with the initials of their loved ones during the upcoming game against Tampa Bay. For Washington personnel and TAPS, marking players' helmets with the initials of troops who have passed is a sacred and personal gesture that embodies and furthers a commitment Washington has forged to recognize the sacrifice and service of these families. In 2015, Washington became the first NFL team to partner with TAPS. Since then, nurturing that relationship and spotlighting the important work TAPS spearheads has been a top priority for Washington.

Pack4Troops events at FedExField: Active-duty service members representing Fort Belvoir (Navy/Army/Air Force) alongside the USO of Metropolitan Washington-Baltimore helped pack care packages and write uplifting holiday messages for deployed military members

USO Care Package Event at FedExField: On March 10, 2022, the Washington Commanders and USO staff teamed up to pack 4,000 Care Packages comprising more than 24,000 items for troops deployed to Eastern Europe in response to the Ukrainian crisis. The Care Packages, which included hygiene essentials such as combs, razors, shaving cream, toothbrushes and toothpaste, as well as team merchandise and snacks, are the last items troops receive before deploying overseas and an invaluable resource. The event was the largest USO packaging event to date. Co-Owners and Co-CEOs Tanya and Dan Snyder, Washington Commanders Staff, active duty service Members, 15 Washington Alumni including Ken Harvey, Doc Walker, Fred Smoot, Dexter Manley and Women of Washington Wives were in attendance to help box care packages. Additionally, prior to the event, Co-Owners and Co-CEOs Tanya and Dan Snyder donated \$300,000 to support response efforts for the ongoing crisis in Ukraine to the USO, DC-based World Central Kitchen, International Rescue Committee, and Save the Children.

USO Care Package Delivery at BWI Airport: On April 26, 2022, the Washington Commanders partnered with the USO to deliver care packages to troops deploying from BWI Airport. Washington Commanders Co-CEO and Co-Owner Tanya Snyder was in attendance as well as Head Coach Ron Rivera, his wife Stephanie Rivera, and players Jamin Davis and Jonathan Allen to hand deliver care packages that Commanders staff and USO members assembled at FedExField.

Marching Band & Fight Song: After taking a two-year hiatus, Washington's 85-year-old marching band is back for the Commanders inaugural season. The 60-person band features professional musicians from across the DMV and is composed of woodwind, brass and percussion instruments. The 2022 Marching Band will be led by Washington's first-ever Music Director, Maestro Jeffrey Sean Dokken. Dokken will work closely with Assistant Director Brittney Lynn, Percussion Instructor David Constantine, and the rest of the gameday leadership team to bring renewed musical energy back to FedExField. Also returning after a two-year hiatus is the team's historic Fight Song, which will retain its iconic tune. The Marching Band will premiere the new version during the Commanders preseason home game.

Hype Squad: The Commanders Hype Squad is made up of 30 team members who audition every year. The Hype Squad are experts in delivering a best-in-class guest experience and celebrating the most unforgettable moments with Commanders fans. Hype Squad members are all around the stadium to help get fans excited about the game. Additionally, Hype Squad members are available for game seat visits for any types of celebrations, e.g., birthdays, first games and anniversaries.

Command Force: The Washington Commanders Command Force is one of the league's most diverse entertainment team groups. The 44-person team is comprised of dancers, gymnasts, breakers, b-boys and b-girls and Beat Ya Feet dancers. Command Force performances aim to bring to life the rich culture of D.C.'s world-renowned and iconic dance scene through high-energy, hip hop-based choreography incorporating tricks, stunts, visuals, Beat Ya Feet, and elements of street funk at all home games and Commanders events year-round throughout the DMV.

Additions to FedExField for the 2022 season include a total of 2,095 mesh seats across 12 total sections in the club level as well as 12 4-Top tables in the West Endzone, 21 2-Top tables in the East Endzone, and 224 new half moon private tables located in both endzones of the club level.

DMV Local Food Vendors: The Commanders are excited to bring local DMV food vendors to FedExField this fall as part of the annual Flavors of the DMV Showcase. Eight vendors include EllaRay's Café, Everything Legendary, KitchenCray, Seafood At The Shack, Suit2Cook, South Mountain Creamery, Casa De Ávila Tacos and Fireman's Café.

Command the Canvas: A new initiative at FedExField, the Command the Canvas art installation project will bring select DMV-based artists to display their artwork around the stadium in places including ramps, large walls on the Main and Upper Concourse and in specialty areas like Legends Plaza and Touchdown Club. The Washington Commanders' Diversity, Equity & Inclusion efforts are driven through engaging programs, educational trainings, impactful initiatives and a talent pipeline focused on diversity.

STAFF ENGAGEMENT THROUGH ERGs:

The Washington Commanders offers employee resource groups (ERGs) to all employees. During onboarding, staff are presented with the ERG offerings and encouraged to participate in offered programs and take advantage of resources. All full-time employees may participate. Allies are also encouraged to join.

ERG offerings include:

The Black Engagement Network (“BEN”): BEN’s mission is to foster a community of support that Washington Commanders’ employees of the African Diaspora (African American/Black) can utilize for professional and personal development by facilitating networking events, mentorship opportunities, seminars, and other activities meant to enhance the overall employee experience. The organization is the go-to resource for African American/Black Commanders employees. Its goal is to be recognized internally and externally as the gold standard ERG in the NFL by spearheading the Washington Commanders’ commitment to be the best place to work in sports for members of the African American/Black community.

The Women’s Initiative Network (“WIN”): WIN’s mission is to empower, support and enrich women to succeed and advance at the Washington Commanders, both personally and professionally. WIN, in partnership with its allies, aims to achieve these goals by supporting the hiring, development and retention of women at the Washington Commanders. Additionally, WIN works to make the Washington Commanders a safe space for women to foster peer connections and share their experiences.

The Commanders Pride Network: The Commanders Pride Network’s mission is to empower LGBTQ+ colleagues at the Washington Commanders and develop an organization-wide culture of intentional allyship through support and belonging. This will be done by offering community, professional development, networking, and educational programming.

Washington’s ERGs have spurred far-reaching programs such as Shop Black, a directory of small Black-owned businesses on the Commanders website, Educator of the Month, a program which recognizes an African American teacher going above and beyond in the DC area to serve their classroom, the Dress to WIN clothing drive, a clothing drive designed to collect professional attire for women at local shelters, and the Commanders’ participation in the Capital Pride Parade & Festival.



Commanders Programming

INSPIRE CHANGE: Leading up to last season’s Inspire Change game, the Washington Commanders held a panel session for employees on the topic of criminal justice reform and systemic racism, featuring the story of Sean K. Ellis and his lawyer, Rosemary Scapicchio. Sean is a Boston, MA native and was wrongfully convicted of murdering a police officer at the age of 19. Over the course of 21 years and 4 trials, Sean was finally granted his freedom with the help of Rosemary. Prior to the event, staff were encouraged to watch Sean’s Netflix documentary, Trail 4.

CAPITAL PRIDE PARADE: In 2021, the Commanders participated in the annual Washington D.C. Capital Pride celebration.

The festivities started on Saturday June 11th, where approximately 60 Commanders employees and their families, as well as 20 entertainment team members, marched in the Pride Parade and distributed Pride-themed Commanders swag along the parade route in downtown DC. Other marchers that shared the streets with the Commanders included the Washington Mystics basketball team and members of the DC Gay Flag Football League. Celebrations continued through Sunday, June 12th, where the Commanders sponsored the official “Sports Village.” Fans that celebrated in the Sports Village received additional Commanders’ Pride swag and had the opportunity to meet and take photos with alumni in attendance including Fred Smoot, Doc Walker and Brian Mitchell, as well as members of the Commanders Entertainment Team.

DIVERSITY, EQUITY, & INCLUSION

Juneteenth Panel Discussion: Each Juneteenth, the Commanders offer staff the day off to observe the holiday. Additionally, the company offers the opportunity to learn about this important day in American history. In 2021, Washington hosted an African Studies professor from Howard University to teach staff the history of Juneteenth. This year, the Commanders collaborated with other trailblazers across the league to steer enlightening and impactful conversation with a panel discussion. Panelists included Patrick Claybon, NFL Network Anchor; Dr. Nyaka Niilampti, NFL VP of Wellness & Clinical Services; Whitney Meyer, Chief Impact Officers for the Jacksonville Jaguars; and Washington's own Jennifer King, Assistant Running Backs Coach.

DE&I ON GAMEDAY: During the 2021 Inspire Change game, the Commanders highlighted several DE&I driven activations including:

Shop Black Holiday Market: The Black Engagement Network hosted the first-ever Shop Black Holiday Market on Washington's Inspire Change game against the Seahawks on Nov. 29, 2022. Seventeen local DMV businesses participated in the event sponsored by Vistaprint. Throughout the game, fans had the opportunity to shop and browse products in the Party Pavilion. Washington Legend Doug Williams had the honor of cutting the ribbon to open the market prior to kickoff.

In-Game Recognition: During the game, two DE&I centric recaps were featured on the video board. The first feature was the Shop Black Small Business Bootcamp. Powered by the Black Engagement Network, this bootcamp taught small Black-owned businesses key tools to accelerate their online stores. This recap powered the economic advancement extension of the Inspire Change initiative. The second in-game recognition was a video recap of the Inspire Change panel discussion featuring Sean K. Ellis & Rosemary Scappichio. This highlight helped push forward the criminal justice reform extension of Inspire Change.

HBCU Halftime: Halftime show featured the Bowie State University Band Educator of the Month. Established by the team's Black Engagement Network, Educator of the Month spotlights a Black educator in the DMV that goes above and beyond to support their classroom. During the Inspire Change game, these educators are invited recognized on the field and presented with an official ball customized with their name.

CULTURAL CELEBRATIONS: EVERYDAY CHAMPIONS:

As part of the team's Everyday Champions campaign, members from the team's diverse employee populations are highlighted via cultural celebrations throughout the year. Each cultural month is met with a social media post from the team, programming for staff, and the opportunity to highlight Washington's employees. These employee highlights are referred to as the team's Everyday Champions.

Notable programs include:

Black History Month Fireside Chat w/Doug Williams: Doug Williams, HBCU graduate and first Black quarterback to win a Super Bowl, was featured in a fireside chat with staff share with staff his life stories, moments of triumph, and talk about what Black History Month means to him.

Latinx Heritage Month Celebration: The Washington Commanders invited Antonio Tijerino, Executive Director of the Hispanic Heritage Foundation, to have a conversation on Latinx culture, history, and his connection to the Washington Commanders.

Martin Mayhew enters his second season as General Manager of the Washington Commanders after being hired by the organization on January 22, 2021.

Mayhew joined Washington with 22 seasons of NFL experience as an executive, including eight seasons as the general manager of the Detroit Lions. He returns to the franchise that he played for from 1989-92 and was a member of the Super Bowl XXVI team.

"Martin is a proven general manager who will bring a wealth of knowledge and experience to the organization," said Head Coach Ron Rivera. "He will be an integral part of running the daily football operations and will allow me the opportunity to focus more on coaching. He impressed both myself and Mr. Snyder during the interview process and we both believe he will be a tremendous fit here. He is a man of high character and integrity and was part of the rich history and tradition of this great franchise as a member of the Super Bowl championship team in 1991."

Mayhew spent the previous four seasons with the San Francisco 49ers, most recently as the club's vice president of player personnel. He held the position of senior personnel executive for the franchise from 2017-18. Mayhew assisted first-time general manager John Lynch and was a major contributor to a personnel department that was vital in the team's Super Bowl appearance in 2019.

Prior to joining San Francisco, Mayhew spent the 2016 season as the director of football operations/special projects with the New York Giants. In his role with the Giants, he worked on all aspects of the salary cap, CBA compliance and player contract negotiations.

Prior to his time in New York, Mayhew spent 15 years (2001-15) in the Detroit Lions organization, including the final seven as the team's general manager. He took over as the general manager following Detroit's winless season and oversaw the building of a roster that resulted in a 10-win season in 2011 and an 11-win season in 2014.

During Mayhew's tenure as Lions general manager, he was responsible for the draft selections of Pro Bowlers QB Matthew Stafford, DE Ezekiel Ansah and DT Ndamukong Suh. Suh was a four-time Pro Bowler and three-time First Team All-Pro selection with Detroit and was the 2010 NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year. Mayhew was also responsible for signing WR Golden Tate and S Glover Quin in free agency, both of whom went on to earn Pro Bowl honors in Detroit.

Mayhew first joined the Lions organization in 2001 as the senior director of football administration/staff counsel and was promoted to senior vice president of football administration/staff counsel in 2003. Mayhew was appointed senior vice president and assistant general manager in 2004. In 2008, Mayhew was promoted to general manager.

Mayhew played nine seasons in the NFL and was originally selected by the Buffalo Bills in the 10th round (262nd overall) in the 1988 NFL Draft. During Mayhew's nine-year career, he appeared in 118 games (107 starts) for Buffalo (1988), Washington (1989-92) and Tampa Bay (1993-96) and notched 473 tackles, 21 interceptions, 1.0 sack and four forced fumbles. He started at cornerback for the Super Bowl XXVI champion Washington Redskins.

Mayhew is a native of Tallahassee, Fla. and graduated from Florida State University with a degree in business management and also holds a law degree from Georgetown University. At Florida State, he lettered in both football and track. Mayhew interned for Washington's personnel department in 1999 while in law school at Georgetown. He also held labor and legal department internships with the NFL League Office before joining the Detroit Lions.

Marty Hurney enters his second season as Executive Vice President of Football/Player Personnel of the Washington Commanders after being hired by the organization on January 22, 2021.

Hurney joined Washington with 29 seasons of NFL experience as an executive and will rejoin the franchise where he started his NFL career as a member of the team's public relations department.

"Marty Hurney is an excellent evaluator of talent and someone whom I trust and have worked with in the past," said Head Coach Ron Rivera. "He knows the amount of hard work it takes to operate a successful personnel department. Marty has a proven track record as a successful scout and general manager and will be a vital part of shaping our roster. Both myself and Mr. Snyder agreed that he would bring an enormous amount of experience to our operation. It is also fitting that Marty started his career here working for the legendary Bobby Beathard. I look forward to collaborating with both Marty and Martin in the years to come."

Hurney was named the Carolina Panthers General Manager in 2002 and held the position until 2012. He was then brought back as the club's interim general manager in 2017 and maintained the official role from 2018-2020. During Hurney's tenure as general manager, the Panthers appeared in the postseason four times, with two NFC South titles, two trips to the NFC Championship game and an appearance in Super Bowl XXXVIII.

Hurney has had a strong number of draft selections in the first round. Most notably, he selected both QB Cam Newton and LB Luke Kuechly in the first round of consecutive drafts in 2011 and 2012. Newton went on to win NFL Rookie of the Year in 2011, NFL MVP in 2015 along with setting nearly every passing and rushing record in franchise history. Kuechly won NFL Rookie of the Year in 2012 and NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 2013 and was a seven-time Pro Bowl selection. Carolina was just the fourth team in NFL history to have consecutive players win rookie of the year honors since the awards inception in 1967.

Hurney's other notable first round selections include DE Julius Peppers (2002), T Jordan Gross (2003), CB Chris Gamble (2004), LB Thomas Davis Sr. (2005), RB DeAngelo Williams (2006), RB Jonathan Stewart (2008), WR DJ Moore (2018) and DE Brian Burns (2019). Peppers was selected to the Pro Bowl nine times, was the NFL Rookie of the Year in 2002 and is the Panthers' all-time leader in sacks. Gross started at tackle for the Panthers for 11 consecutive seasons, made three Pro Bowls and is the Panthers' all-time leader in games started. Gamble started at cornerback for the Panthers for nine seasons and is the all-time franchise leader in interceptions. Davis Sr. was selected to three Pro Bowls along with gaining First Team All-Pro honors in 2015 and is the Panthers all-time leader in tackles. Stewart and Williams went on to compile 7,318 rushing yards and 6,846 rushing yards, which is No. 1 and No. 2 in Panthers' history, respectively. Moore has led Carolina in receiving and posted 1,000-plus receiving yards in consecutive seasons and was selected to the PFWA All-Rookie Team in 2018. Burns ranked No. 4 among rookies in sacks in 2019 and led the Panthers with 9.0 sacks in 2020.

During Hurney's tenure as Panthers GM, he also had considerable success in free agency and through trades. Hurney executed trades for TE Greg Olsen and long snapper J.J. Jansen who were both Pro Bowlers. Olsen holds the franchise record for receiving yards among tight ends and ranks No. 3 overall in receiving yards in franchise history. He also acquired RB Stephen Davis, QB Jake Delhomme, LB Mark Fields and G Mike Wahle via free agency. All four players were named to Pro Bowls during their time with Carolina. Delhomme ranks second behind only Cam Newton as the franchise's leader in passing yards and passing touchdowns.

Prior to being named general manager of the Panthers in 2002, Hurney held the position of coordinator of player operations from 1999-2001 and director of football administration in 1998.

Before joining the Carolina Panthers organization, Hurney held the role of coordinator of football operations with the San Diego Chargers under Pro Football Hall of Fame and Washington Ring of Fame executive Bobby Beathard.

Hurney began his career as a reporter covering Washington in the 1980s. After developing relationships with Owner Jack Kent Cooke, General Manager Bobby Beathard and Head Coach Joe Gibbs, Hurney joined Washington's public relations department in 1988.

Hurney is a native of Wheaton, Md. and attended Catholic University in Washington D.C. Before joining Washington's public relations department, he worked for the Montgomery Journal, Washington Star and Washington Times.

Rob Rogers enters his 28th season in the NFL and third with the Washington Commanders in the role of Senior Vice President of Football Administration. In this role, Rogers works for the football senior leadership team on the development of player budget parameters, roster management, contract proposals, negotiation strategies and salary cap management. Rogers also oversees the club's football analytics department along with being one of the main liaison's between the football and business operations.

Prior to coming to Washington, Rogers held the title of executive director of player finance and football research. In this role, he worked closely with the Panthers general manager on the development of player budget parameters, roster management, contract proposals, negotiation strategies and salary cap management. He also oversaw the Panthers football analytics department and worked on research and analysis of player contracts and statistics. He directly conducted the majority of contract negotiations with player representatives during his time in this role.

Before gaining the title of executive director of player finance and football research, Rogers was the director of football administration for 11 years (2008-18). He negotiated contracts for all of the Panthers first round and other draft selections during a 16-year span (2003-19) along with numerous free agents. He also worked with the front office on issues dealing with the NFL Collective Bargaining agreement and as the club's liaison to the NFL Management Council, he kept the Panthers in compliance with all NFL personnel, contract and labor-related issues.

Starting in 2013, Rogers worked on developing efforts in analytics, football research in personnel, opponent analysis and self-scouting along with sports science and next gen statistics. He developed the in-house salary cap management database and also designed the current pro scouting system in Carolina and in the mid 90s worked with in-house developers to design and implement the initial opponent analysis and self-scouting system. Rogers worked extensively with Coach Rivera in Carolina on on-going efforts to develop game management analysis and practices.

Rogers is also a member of the NFL Club Services Committee, which is a group made of various front office executives from around the league, tasked with providing guidance and feedback on technology integration initiatives to the development staff of the NFL Management Council. He has served on the committee since 2002.

Rogers joined the Carolina Panthers in 1995 and worked as a quality control assistant along with helping out on the in-house business analytics team. He is a 1993 graduate of Harvard University and holds a degree in government.

Rogers and his wife Clair have two children: daughter Emma and son Brady.

JACK DEL RIO

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

24TH NFL SEASON // 3RD WITH WASHINGTON

- Jack Del Rio enters his 24th season coaching in the NFL and his third as the Commanders Defensive Coordinator in 2022 after being named to the position on Jan. 2, 2020.
- In 2021, Del Rio oversaw a defense that featured defensive tackle Jonathan Allen, who set career-highs in sacks (9.0) and quarterback hits (30). Washington's defense allowed the eighth-fewest rushing yards per game and recorded the best defensive tackle team grade in the NFL according to Pro Football Focus.
- In 2020, Del Rio helped lead a defense that ranked in the top 10 in total yards per game (6th), passing yards per game (5th), interception rate (8th), redzone percentage (3rd) and total points per game (7th).
- Del Rio has accumulated 35 combined seasons of NFL experience, including 24 as a coach and 11 as a player. He has held head coaching roles with the Oakland Raiders, Denver Broncos (interim) and Jacksonville Jaguars. He has also coached 29 players to a total of 57 Pro Bowl selections.
- From 2015-17, Del Rio was the Head Coach of the Oakland Raiders. In 2016, he guided the Raiders to a 12-4 record, marking the franchise's first 12-win season since 2000. The Raiders earned a postseason berth for the first time since 2002 and landed an NFL-high seven players on the AFC Pro Bowl squad. Del Rio was selected as the recipient of the Maxwell Club's Greasy Neale Professional Coach of the Year Award, becoming the sixth Raiders coach to earn NFL Coach of the Year honors. In addition, he was named the AFC Coach of the Year by Kansas City's Committee of 101.
- As defensive coordinator with the Denver Broncos from 2012-14, Del Rio was part of three-straight AFC West titles and helped lead Denver to an AFC Championship and appearance in Super Bowl XLVIII following the 2013 campaign. It marked his second stint under Head Coach John Fox, as the two also spent the 2002 season together in Carolina.
- Prior to joining the Broncos in 2012, Del Rio spent nine seasons at the helm in Jacksonville. During his head coaching tenure (2003-11) with the Jaguars, the club ranked sixth in the NFL in yards per game allowed (317.3) and eighth in points per game allowed (20.3).
- Under Del Rio, the Jaguars made two playoff appearances in 2005 and 2007, highlighted by the club's first postseason win in eight seasons with a 31-29 road victory against the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 2007 AFC Wild Card Game.
- During his lone season as a defensive coordinator with Carolina in 2002, he inherited the NFL's worst defense statistically (371.4 yards per game allowed) and turned it into the league's second-ranked unit (290.4 yards per game allowed). Additionally, the 2002 Panthers squad led the NFL in rushing average against (3.7 avg.) and ranked second in third down efficiency (32.9 percent) and sacks (52).
- As linebackers coach for the Baltimore Ravens from 1999-2001, Del Rio tutored a talented group that included Peter Boulware, Ray Lewis and Jamie Sharper. Baltimore's 2000 team set the NFL 16-game record by allowing only 165 points while recording four shutouts and forcing a league-best 49 turnovers. Lewis was named the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year and the MVP of Super Bowl XXXV that season after a playoff run in which the defense surrendered just one touchdown in four games.
- Del Rio began his coaching career with the New Orleans Saints under Head Coach Mike Ditka, serving as an assistant strength coach in 1997 before moving on to coach the linebackers in 1998.
- A veteran of 11 seasons as an NFL linebacker, he was selected in the third round (68th overall) of the 1985 NFL Draft by New Orleans and went on to make the NFL's All-Rookie Team and earn the Saints' Rookie of the Year award.
- Del Rio was a four-year starter at the University of Southern California, where he earned consensus All-American honors as a senior and was runner-up for the Lombardi Award, given to the nation's best lineman or linebacker. Named co-MVP of the 1985 Rose Bowl, Del Rio recorded 340 career defensive stops, including 58 tackles for a loss. A standout catcher on the USC baseball team, Del Rio was drafted by the Toronto Blue Jays in 1981. He was inducted into the USC Athletic Hall of Fame in May 2015.
- Del Rio was a three-sport star in football, baseball and basketball at Hayward (Calif.) High School. He earned a degree in political science from the University of Kansas while playing for the Chiefs.
- Del Rio and his wife, Linda, have three daughters, Lauren, Hope and Aubrey, and a son, Luke, who also works for Washington as an offensive quality control coach and assistant quarterbacks coach.

NATE KACZOR

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

15TH NFL SEASON // 4TH WITH WASHINGTON

- Nate Kaczor (pronounced Kat-sir) enters fourth third season as special teams coordinator with Washington in 2022. He will be entering his 15th NFL season and has held positions with the Jacksonville Jaguars, Tennessee Titans and Tampa Bay Buccaneers during his NFL career.
- In 2021, Kaczor led a special teams unit that finished with the sixth-most total return yards in the NFL which was the most by the organization since 2015. The unit also allowed 643 kickoff return yards, the seventh fewest in the NFL. Washington punted for an average of 47.4 yards, the seventh-most in the league.
- In 2020, Kaczor helped standout punter Tress Way record the highest single season net punting average [44.3] in franchise history. Way broke his own record from 2019 [44.1], also under the direction of Kaczor. Way also set a franchise record for most punting yards in a single game, punting 10 times for 511 yards against the Rams in Week 5. Washington led the league in net punting yards in 2020 with 3,325.
- In 2019, Kaczor helped guide punter Tress Way to his first Pro Bowl selection. Way was also named to the Associated Press All-Pro Second Team. Way finished the season No. 2 in net average (44.1) and No. 2 in punt yardage (3,919) and No. 7 in punts inside the 20 yard line (30). Under Kaczor's guidance, Washington ranked No. 4 in the league in kickoff return average (25.2) and No. 5 in kickoff return yardage (833) despite fielding one of the league's youngest rosters.
- Under Kaczor's guidance, Tress Way became the first Washington punter since Matt Turk in 1997 to be named to the Pro Bowl. Steven Sims Jr. (NFC Special Teams Player of the Week in Week 12) and Tress Way (NFC Special Teams Player of the Week in Week 13) were also the first players in the history of the franchise to receive the honor of NFC Special Teams Player of the Week in consecutive weeks.
- During Kaczor's three seasons with Tampa Bay, the Buccaneers were one of the top punt coverage units in the NFL, allowing only 6.6 yards per return, the fourth-lowest mark in the league during that span.
- Punter Bryan Anger was a standout during Kaczor's tenure with the Buccaneers. In his first year with the team, Anger set Buccaneers records for both punts inside the 20 (37) and net punting average (42.7), with both of those ranking in the top five in the NFL in 2016. In the three seasons that Anger spent under Kaczor's tutelage, Anger ranked top 15 in the league in punts inside the 20 and net average while only recording 14 touchbacks.
- Kaczor came to Tampa Bay having spent the previous four seasons with the Tennessee Titans, the final three as the teams' special teams coordinator (2013-15) after being hired as the assistant offensive line coach in his first season (2012). In 2015, the Titans tied for the NFL lead in special teams takeaways, while in 2013 Kaczor's unit ranked third in the league in opponent punt return average and eighth in kickoff return average.
- Kaczor entered the NFL as an assistant special teams coach with the Jacksonville Jaguars, working there from 2008-11. During those four years, Jacksonville had one of the league's top special teams coverage units, allowing the lowest punt return average in the NFL (6.5 avg.) and the eighth-lowest kickoff return average (21.8 avg.). In each of Kaczor's final two seasons, Montell Owens earned Pro Bowl recognition as a special teams player.
- Prior to joining the NFL, Kaczor spent 17 years coaching in college, the final two working as co-offensive coordinator (2007) and tight ends coach (2006) at Louisiana-Monroe. In his only season as co-offensive coordinator, the team ranked second in the Sun Belt Conference in rushing offense and averaged its most points scored since 1993.
- Before his time at Louisiana-Monroe, Kaczor spent two seasons (2004-05) as the co-offensive coordinator/tight ends coach at Idaho and four seasons as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Nebraska-Kearney (2000-03). Kaczor began his coaching career as an offensive assistant at his alma mater, Utah State, working as an offensive assistant for nine seasons (1991-99), helping the team win three conference championships.
- A center at Utah State, Kaczor was a team captain, who earned all-conference honors in 1989. A native of Scott City, Kansas, he and his wife, Angie, have two children, Kaylee and Micah, who is currently a pitcher in the Colorado Rockies organization.

SCOTT TURNER

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

11TH NFL SEASON // 3RD WITH WASHINGTON

- Scott Turner is entering his third season as the offensive coordinator of the Commanders after being hired on January 8, 2020. He will be entering his 11th NFL season and has held positions with the Carolina Panthers, Cleveland Browns and Minnesota Vikings during his NFL career.
- In 2021, Turner aided several players reaching significant milestones, including Wide Receiver Terry McLaurin and Running Back Antonio Gibson, both of whom reached the 1,000 receiving and rushing yard plateau respectively. Washington had a 1,000-yard rusher and receiver in the same season for the first time since 2014.
- McLaurin has recorded 1,000 yards in each of his first two seasons under Turner, becoming the first receiver to record two-straight 1,000-yard seasons in Washington since Henry Ellard did so in 1994-96.
- Turner led an offense that recorded the sixth-most rushing yards and the sixth-most rushing yards per game in the NFC. Washington averaged 30:44 minutes of offensive possession, the 10th-most in the NFL.
- In Turner's offense, running back J.D. McKissic recorded the second-most receptions [80] and fifth-most receiving yards [589] for a running back in a season in franchise history.
- Washington started four different quarterbacks during the 2020 season, combining for the second-most completions in a single season in franchise history [389].
- Under Turner's tutelage, two players amassed 1,000 yards in 2020. Running back Antonio Gibson became the first Washington rookie to gain 1,000 scrimmage yards since Alfred Morris in 2012, as Terry McLaurin became the first Washington wide receiver with 1,000 yards in a season since 2016.
- The offense in Washington took leaps in the second half of last season, registering 2,916 second-half scrimmage yards. It marks the seventh-most in a single season in club history and most since 2016 [3,635], since the stat was officially recorded in 1991.
- Turner came to Washington from Carolina, where he served as quarterbacks coach as well as interim offensive coordinator in 2019.
- In 2018, Turner helped quarterback Cam Newton post a franchise-record 67.9 completion percentage, despite playing through injury. The Panthers finished 10th in the league in net yards [373.3], the second-highest season average in club history.
- Turner served as quarterbacks coach with the Minnesota Vikings from 2014-16, helping quarterback Sam Bradford to set a then-NFL record in completion percentage [71.6].
- In 2014, he assisted Teddy Bridgewater in setting virtually every franchise rookie passing record, and producing the third-best completion percentage [64.6] and seventh-highest passer rating [85.2] in NFL history for a rookie.
- As the wide receivers coach for the Cleveland Browns in 2013, Turner helped Josh Gordon to become the first Browns player in history to lead the NFL in receiving yards [1,646] and became the first player in NFL history with back-to-back 200-yard receiving games.
- In 2013, Turner coached wide receivers for the Cleveland Browns, helping Josh Gordon to the best receiving season in Browns history. Despite appearing in just 14 games, he became the first player in Browns history to lead the NFL in receiving yards (1,646).
- Turner entered NFL coaching with two seasons as offensive quality control coach for the Panthers in 2011 and 2012. The Panthers recorded two of the top four seasons in franchise history in terms of net yards, setting the all-time mark with 389.8 yards per game in 2011 and 360.7 in 2012. Newton was named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year in 2011. His 14 rushing touchdowns broke the NFL record for rushing touchdowns by a quarterback and were just one shy of the NFL record of rushing touchdowns by a rookie.
- Prior to Turner's first stint in Carolina, he spent three seasons at the University of Pittsburgh, two as an offensive assistant and the last as wide receivers coach. Turner made his coaching debut in 2005 as a graduate assistant at Oregon State before serving as the offensive coordinator at South County (Va.) Secondary School from 2006-07.
- A three-year letterman at Nevada-Las Vegas from 2002-04, Turner graduated with a degree in psychology. He served as a reserve quarterback for the Rebels as a junior and senior and played on special teams as a sophomore after being redshirted as a freshman. He earned his college degree in psychology from UNLV in 2006.
- Turner is the son of former NFL Coach Norv Turner. The two previously coached together in Carolina, Minnesota and Cleveland. Turner graduated from Oakton High School in Vienna, Va. when his father was the Head Coach of the Washington Football Team. He and his wife, Robyn, have two children – a son, Harry (7) and a daughter, Rose (5).

- Juan Castillo is entering his 26th year of coaching in the NFL. He spent the previous two seasons with the Chicago Bears as the offensive line coach and has worked with three other teams on both sides of the ball, primarily along the offensive line.
- Castillo has spent time with the Bears (2020-21), Buffalo Bills (2017-18), Baltimore Ravens (2013-16) and Philadelphia Eagles (1998-2012), where he worked five seasons with Commanders Head Coach Ron Rivera, who was the team's linebackers coach from 1999-2003.
- In 2021, Castillo helped the Chicago offense rush for over 2,000 yards, the seventh-most in the NFC. Running Back David Montgomery recorded 21 rushes of 10 or more yards, tied for the sixth-most in the NFL.
- In his first season with the Bears in 2020, Castillo navigated an offensive line group that featured six different starting combinations throughout the season and still produced a 1,000-yard rusher in David Montgomery. Montgomery's 1,070 rushing yards ranked fifth in the NFL, and he went on to record three 100-plus yard performances. Castillo developed two first year players who were both undrafted free agents from Notre Dame in 2019, Sam Mustipher and Alex Bars, into key starters on the line over the last six weeks of the season. Mustipher started seven games at center and Bars started six games at right guard, one at left guard, and one at center.
- Castillo served as the offensive line coach and run game coordinator with the Buffalo Bills from 2017-18. Under his watch, the Bills' rushing attack ranked in the top 10 both seasons. Buffalo finished sixth in the NFL and second in the AFC with 126.1 yards per game in 2017 and fifth in the NFL with 124.0 yards per game on the ground in 2018.
- Prior to Buffalo he spent four seasons with the Baltimore Ravens, serving as the run game coordinator in 2013 and offensive line coach from 2014-16.
- As Philadelphia's offensive line coach from 1998-2010, the Eagles made nine postseason appearances and rushed for an average of 1,854 yards and 12 touchdowns per season. In 2010, the Eagles finished first in the NFC and fifth in the NFL with 145.2 yards per game on the ground. During his 13 seasons as the offensive line coach in Philadelphia, five different players earned nine Pro Bowl honors including three-time selection tackle Tra Thomas (2001-02, 2004), guard Shawn Andrews (2006-07) and tackle Jason Peters (2009-10). He finished his Eagles tenure as the team's defensive coordinator in 2011-12.
- Castillo earned a bachelor's degree in health/kinesiology in 1986 and a master's in education administration in 1990 from Texas A&I (now Texas A&M-Kingsville), where he was a three-year letterman (1978-80) at linebacker for the Javelinas.
- Following college, Castillo spent two seasons (1984-85) with the USFL's San Antonio Gunslingers as a linebacker before moving to the coaching ranks. Castillo attended Port Isabel High School in Texas, where he was an all-state linebacker. On July 4, 2009, Port Isabel celebrated "Juan Castillo Day," in which Castillo received a key to the city and in 2015 Castillo was inducted into the Lone Star Conference Hall of Honor, which recognizes outstanding individuals who have brought pride and honor to the conference through their contributions either as an athlete or coach/administrator.
- Castillo has four sons: Gregory, who played cornerback at the University of Iowa and is currently a scouting coordinator with the Kansas City Chiefs, John, who is currently interning in Washington D.C., Andres, who played football at the University of Delaware and is a paralegal, and Antonio, who is currently a senior at Lady Bird Johnson High School in San Antonio, Texas and a member of the cross-country team.

- Luke Del Rio is entering his third season coaching in the NFL, his third as Washington's offensive quality control coach and his first as the assistant quarterbacks coach in 2022. He previously coached tight ends and quarterbacks at Santa Margarita Catholic High School.
- A former collegiate quarterback, Del Rio began his college career at the University of Alabama where he was the backup QB as a true freshman to three-time national champion quarterback AJ McCarron. He then moved to Oregon State where he served as the backup to former Minnesota Vikings quarterback Sean Mannion. Del Rio played his final three years at the University of Florida where he would go on to be 7-1 as a starter in the SEC.
- Del Rio's collegiate career highlights include a win over Georgia, a 320-yard 4-touchdown performance against Kentucky, and then in his senior year, came off the bench to lead a 14-point comeback against Kentucky to extend Florida's winning streak over the rival Wildcats to 31 games. Del Rio also served as a team captain for the Gators in 2016 and served on the leadership committee.
- Del Rio was a state champion quarterback at Valor Christian High School. In addition to his state championship at Valor Christian High School, Del Rio was an Elite 11 quarterback, first team all-state and team captain for the Eagles.
- Del Rio has played under the tutelage of Nick Saban (Alabama), Mike Riley (Oregon State) and Jim McElwain (Florida). Del Rio, a native of Jacksonville, Fla., graduated from the University of Florida in 2016 with a Bachelor's degree and then earned his Master's degree in 2018, also from the University of Florida, in Business.
- He is the son of Washington defensive coordinator Jack Del Rio.

- Englehart holds a Master's degree in human movement with a concentration in corrective exercise from A.T. Still University. He also holds a bachelor's degree in kinesiology with a concentration in exercise science from Southeastern Louisiana University. He is a certified strength and conditioning specialist with the National Strength and Condition Association and is a Performance Enhancement Specialist and Corrective Exercise Specialist with the National Academy of Sports Medicine (NASM).
- Englehart also holds certifications with USA Weightlifting and USA Track and Field, Functional Movement Screen and TRX Suspension Training certifications as well as a Fitness Nutrition Specialist certification from the NASM and a 3DMAPS (3D Movement Analysis and Performance System) certification from Gray Institute.

- A former collegiate linebacker, Garcia finished his college career at the University of Florida and was one of four team captains. He played linebacker and was a key member of Florida's special teams. He played in all 11 games in 2017 as a reserve linebacker and was named the Orange Bowl FWAA Courage Award Player of the Week after he recorded four tackles and one tackle-for-loss at Kentucky.
- The Gainesville Police Department credited Garcia for preventing a sexual assault during the summer of 2016 and he appeared on ABC's Good Morning America to discuss the story. Later, he was honored at the Vice President's House by former VP and current President Joe Biden with one of the administrations inaugural "It's On Us" Courage Awards.

CHRIS HARRIS

DEFENSIVE BACKS

17TH NFL SEASON (8 PLAYING/9 COACHING) // 3RD WASHINGTON

- Chris Harris enters his ninth season coaching in the NFL and his third as Washington's defensive backs coach in 2022.
- In 2020, Harris' group allowed 3,068 net passing yards, Washington's fewest since 2004 [2,977]. He also led cornerbacks Ronald Darby and Kendall Fuller to becoming the first two Washington teammates to both record 11 or more passes defensed in a season since Josh Norman and Bashaud Breeland both did so in 2016 and assisted Fuller in notching four interceptions, tied for the seventh-most amongst all players in 2020.
- Harris joined Washington after serving as the Los Angeles Chargers assistant secondary coach from 2016-19. In 2019, the Chargers defense ranked sixth in the league, only surrendering 313.1 yards per game. The group also ranked fifth in the NFL in passing yards per game, only allowing 200.3 yards per game.
- Harris began his coaching career as a defensive quality control coach for the Chicago Bears, working primarily with the team's safeties. He coached in Chicago from 2013-14.
- An eight-year NFL pro, Harris was a sixth-round pick of the Chicago Bears (181st overall) in 2005. He played four seasons with the Bears over two separate stints (2005-06 and 2010-11). Harris was named second team All-Pro by The Associated Press in 2010 and was named one of the Bears' Brian Piccolo Award winners as a rookie in 2005. Besides Chicago, Harris also played for the Carolina Panthers (2007-09), Detroit Lions (2011) and Jacksonville Jaguars (2012), totaling 422 tackles, 16 interceptions, 13 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries and 37 passes defensed. He appeared in 101 career games and made 88 starts. In 2007, Harris racked up a franchise-record eight forced fumbles for the Panthers.
- Harris is a native of Little Rock, Ark., and played collegiately at Louisiana-Monroe (2001-04). Harris and his wife, Kenetria, have three sons – Jayce, Jaxon and Jett – and a daughter, Skylar.

JIM HOSTLER

SENIOR OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

23RD NFL SEASON // 3RD WASHINGTON

- Jim Hostler enters his 23rd season of coaching in the NFL and his third season with the Commanders. After holding the position of wide receivers coach in 2020, Hostler was promoted to the role of senior offensive assistant following the 2020 campaign.
- In 2021, Hostler helped Wide Receiver Terry McLaurin and Running Back Antonio Gibson, both reach the 1,000 receiving and rushing yard plateau respectively.
- Washington had a 1,000-yard rusher and receiver in the same season for the first time since 2014.
- McLaurin has recorded 1,000 yards in each of his first two seasons under Hostler, becoming the first receiver to record two-straight 1,000-yard seasons in Washington since Henry Ellard did so in 1994-96.
- In 2020, Hostler assisted multiple receivers in achieving career-highs including second-year wide receiver Terry McLaurin as he became the first 1,000-yard receiver for Washington since 2016, and first to do so in 13 games since 2013. Hostler also assisted wide receiver Cam Sims in setting career-highs in almost every category, helping him register 251 YAC, the most in a single season for an undrafted Washington receiver in franchise history.
- Prior to arriving in Washington, Hostler spent 20 years in the NFL coaching ranks with the Panthers, Packers, Colts, Bills, Ravens, 49ers, Jets, Saints and Chiefs.
- In 2019 with Carolina, Hostler led the Panthers receiving corps to top-10 finishes in receiving yards, receptions, receiving yards per game and receptions per game.
- Hostler developed the Ravens receiving group from 2008-13, which played an integral role in the team's Super Bowl XLVII win. During the 2012 campaign, Baltimore's wideouts registered the second-most receiving yards in a season in franchise history to that point.
- Before joining the NFL coaching ranks, Hostler spent 10 seasons coaching at the college level, including nine seasons (1990-92, 1994-99) in a variety of roles at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. In between stints at IUP, Hostler spent the 1993 season as offensive coordinator at Juniata College.
- A four-year letterman and two-time Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference all-conference selection, Hostler was a standout cornerback at IUP from 1986-89. During his collegiate playing career, he helped the Indians capture two conference titles and make three trips to the PSAC Division II playoffs.
- He earned a bachelor's degree in criminology from IUP in 1989. Born in Pittsburgh, Pa., Hostler attended Bethel Park High School in Pittsburgh. He and his wife, Jen, have three sons, Clint, Grant and Cooper, and a daughter, Attie.

ASSISTANT SPECIAL TEAMS

12TH NFL SEASON // 3RD WASHINGTON

- Ben Jacobs is entering 12th NFL season and his third as Washington's assistant special teams coach in 2021 after joining the Carolina Panthers coaching staff in 2019. Jacobs played eight seasons in the NFL prior to coaching.
- A former NFL linebacker, Jacobs spent eight seasons as a key contributor on all four phases of special teams, recording 31 special teams tackles and eight tackles on defense in 73 career games played.
- Jacobs led or tied for the team high in special teams tackles in two of his seasons with Carolina (2014 and 2018) and helped the Panthers win the NFC Championship and advance to Super Bowl 50 during the 2015 season.
- In 2017, Jacobs played a significant role on a coverage unit that finished eighth in opponents' punt return average, allowing just 5.9 yards per return. In 2016, Jacobs was part of a kickoff coverage unit that allowed a league-low 18.1 yards per kickoff return and finished fifth in the NFL with an opponents' average drive start of the 23.7-yard line.
- Jacobs entered the NFL in 2011 with the Cleveland Browns as an undrafted free agent out of Fresno State.

RANDY JORDAN

RUNNING BACKS

19TH NFL SEASON (9 PLAYING/10 COACHING) // 9TH WASHINGTON

- Randy Jordan enters his ninth season as the Commanders running back coach in 2022 after initially being named to the position on January 26, 2014.
- In 2021, Jordan assisted Running Back Antonio Gibson reach 1,000 rushing yards for the first time in his career. Gibson led the NFC in rushing attempts with 258 and finished second with 1,037 rushing yards, both career-highs. He also had a career-high 1,331 scrimmage yards (1,037 rushing, 294 receiving) with 10 touchdowns (seven rushing, three receiving). Gibson recorded the most offensive touchdowns within a player's first two seasons in franchise history, and has two consecutive seasons with 10-plus touchdowns. He is the first Washington player to do so since RB Stephen Davis in 1999-2000 and 2000-01.
- In 2020, Jordan contributed to the development of rookie running back Antonio Gibson and veteran running back J.D. McKissic in both the run and pass game. Under Jordan's tutelage, Gibson rushed for the second-most touchdowns for a rookie in franchise history [11] and became only the second Washington player to rush for 11 touchdowns and record 1,000-plus scrimmage yards in their rookie season [Alfred Morris]. Both running backs finished with over 950 scrimmage yards, only the second time in franchise history two running backs achieved the feat, and the first time since 1983.
- A nine-year NFL veteran as a player from 1993-2002, Jordan appeared in 122 career games with the Raiders and Jaguars. He was the recipient of the NFL Unsung Hero Award and the Ed Block Courage Award in 2001 and served as special teams captain for the Raiders' AFC Championship team in 2002.
- Before joining Washington, Jordan spent two years as the running backs coach at his alma mater, North Carolina. In his first season with UNC in 2012, Jordan's Tar Heels averaged 193.8 rushing yards per game, third-most in the Atlantic Coast Conference and the program's highest average since 1994.
- Jordan coached running backs at Texas A&M for four seasons from 2008-11. In 2011, the Aggies averaged 199.1 rushing yards per game, fourth-most in the Big 12 Conference.
- Jordan began his coaching career with the Oakland Raiders as a special teams assistant midway through the 2003 season. He played nine years in the NFL as a running back, playing in 122 career games from 1993 through 2002.
- Jordan played running back for the University of North Carolina and earned his bachelor's degree in speech communication in 1993. Jordan and his wife, Romonda, have a daughter, Raven – a volleyball player at the University at Buffalo – and two sons, Jalen and Justin.

JENNIFER KING

ASSISTANT RUNNING BACKS

5TH NFL SEASON // 3RD WASHINGTON

- Jennifer King enters her second full season coaching in the NFL and her first as Washington's assistant running backs coach after being promoted to the role following the 2020 season. With the promotion, King became the first African American female assistant position coach in NFL history. King also became the second female assistant position coach in the NFL behind Tampa Bay Buccaneers assistant defensive line coach Lori Locust.
- In 2021, King assisted the running backs and Antonio Gibson rush for over 1,000 yards, the first time a Washington running back has accomplished the feat since Adrian Peterson did so in 2018. Due to Covid-19 protocols, King became the first African American woman in NFL history to serve as a primary position coach in Week 15 against the Philadelphia Eagles. She also became the first woman to serve as a positional coach in the East-West Shrine Bowl.
- As a full-year coaching intern in 2020, King worked with the offensive staff throughout the course of the offseason, training camp and regular season and specifically assisted Randy Jordan with the running backs.
- Prior to coming to Washington, King coached in the National Football League, the Alliance of American Football and in the college ranks.
- King also has experience as a player. She was a seven-time All American quarterback and wide receiver for the Carolina Phoenix women's tackle football team from 2006-17.
- King holds a masters of science in sports administration from Liberty University and holds a bachelor of science in sports management from Guilford College.

- Latham is a Certified Strength & Conditioning Specialist (CSCS) and USA Weightlifting Level 1 Sports Performance Coach (USAW). He also holds Precision Nutrition Level 1 (Pn1) and Fascial Stretch Therapy Level 1 (FST1) certifications.
- Prior to entering the NFL, Latham completed strength and conditioning internships at Rutgers (2011), St. Joseph's (2012) and Temple (2012). In addition, he contributed as an assistant coach at his alma mater, The College of New Jersey, during those two years.
- In addition to playing four years as a defensive tackle at The College of New Jersey from 2007-10, Latham also competed in the discus, hammer throw and shot put during his college career. He earned his bachelor's degree in health and exercise science. He married his wife, Sara, in March 2018.

JOHN MATSKO

OFFENSIVE LINE

31ST NFL SEASON // 3RD WASHINGTON

- John Matsko enters his 31st season coaching in the NFL and his third as Washington's offensive line coach in 2022.
- In 2021, Matsko helped guide an offensive line that aided in Washington's first 1,000-yard rusher since 2018. Washington ranked sixth in the NFC in rushing yards (2,061) and rushing yards per game (121.2). The offensive line also recorded a pass blocking grade of 78.3 according to Pro Football Focus, the fourth-best in the NFL. Washington's 80.7 run blocking grade was the seventh-best in the NFL according to PFF.
- In 2020, Matsko led an offensive line that adapted to four different quarterbacks, while allowing each quarterback to set a career-high in at least one category and assisting them in combining for the second-most completions in a single season in franchise history [389]. Matsko contributed to the success of G Brandon Scherff who earned his fourth Pro Bowl selection and his first NFL First Team All-Pro nod.
- With three decades of NFL coaching experience, two Super Bowl appearances and a Super Bowl Championship, Matsko's career includes coaching roles with the Carolina Panthers (2011-19), Baltimore Ravens (2008-11), Kansas City Chiefs (2006-07), St. Louis Rams (1999-05), New York Giants (1997-98), New Orleans Saints (1994-96) and Phoenix Cardinals (1992-93).
- Matsko began his NFL coaching career as offensive line coach of the Phoenix Cardinals in 1992 and served in that capacity for two seasons.
- Prior to joining the NFL, Matsko spent 17 years on the college level. He worked as a graduate assistant at Miami (Ohio) from 1974-75 and returned as offensive line coach in 1977 after being the head coach at Danbury High School in Lakeside-Marblehead, Ohio, in 1976. Matsko served as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at North Carolina from 1978-84 prior to stops as offensive line coach at Navy in 1985 and Arizona in 1986. He joined Southern California as offensive line coach in 1987 and was promoted to offensive coordinator in 1989 for his final three seasons with the Trojans.

RICHARD RODGERS

ASSISTANT DEFENSIVE BACKS

10TH NFL SEASON // 2ND WASHINGTON

- Richard Rodgers is entering his 10th NFL season and second as Washington's assistant defensive backs coach.
- In his 32nd year in the coaching profession and first with Washington in 2020, Rodgers assisted the defensive backs group that boasted the second-best passing defense in the league in 2020 [191.8 yards per game]. Rodgers helped coach the group that allowed 3,068 net passing yards, Washington's fewest since 2004 [2,977].
- Rodgers joined Washington after serving in a variety of roles with the Carolina Panthers from 2012-19, coaching safety duo Eric Reid and Tre Boston.
- Prior to joining Carolina, Rodgers coached collegiately for 23 years. He coached at Holy Cross from 2005-11, spending his last six seasons as defensive coordinator after handling the secondary in 2005. Rodgers developed the Crusaders into one of the top defenses in the Patriot League. Five players from his unit earned All-Patriot League honors in 2009, 2010 and 2011.
- From 2001-04, Rodgers tutored the secondary at New Mexico State. During his tenure, the Aggies amassed 45 interceptions while lowering their passing yardage allowed in each of his final three seasons. Previously, Rodgers worked at Portland State from 1997-2000. He oversaw the Vikings' secondary and special teams in addition to serving as the team's strength and conditioning coordinator.
- Rodgers was also exposed to professional football along the way. He participated in the NFL's Minority Internship Program with the Oakland Raiders during training camp in 1996 and was the defensive backs coach for the Scottish Claymores of NFL Europe in 1998.
- A two-time second-team All-Pac 10 Conference selection at California, where he was teammates with Washington Head Coach Ron Rivera, Rodgers played defensive back and was the Golden Bears' special teams captain for three seasons.
- Rodgers graduated from California with a degree in political science. He has a daughter, Kayla, and four sons, Richard II – an NFL tight end – Christopher, Noah and Evan, and is married to his wife Sara.

- Steve Russ enters his fifth season coaching in the NFL after spending four in the league as a player.
- In 2021, Russ coached Cole Holcomb to a career-high two interceptions including a pick-six, his first career touchdown. Holcomb also registered a career-high seven passes defensed and 142 total tackles. He also forced two fumbles.
- In 2020, Russ coached linebackers Holcomb and Jon Bostic, both setting career-highs in sacks. He also helped develop Holcomb in his second season, racking up the most tackles for a Washington player through their first two seasons [171].
- Prior to joining Washington, he served as the linebackers coach for the Carolina Panthers from 2018-19 where he coached All-Pro LB Luke Kuechly.

- Russ also coached at Syracuse (2005-07) where he led linebackers in 2005 and 2006, before being promoted to defensive coordinator in 2007. Prior to Cuse, he was an assistant at Ohio (2001-04).
- While playing at Air Force, Russ earned second-team All-WAC honors in 1994. Russ was a seventh-round draft pick of the Denver Broncos in the 1995 NFL Draft. He was just the fifth player in Air Force history to be drafted in the NFL.
- Following two years of active service in the military, Russ joined the Broncos and spent four seasons (1997-2000) with the team. He was a part of Denver's 1997 and 1998 Super Bowl Championship teams. He played in 24 career games as a linebacker and on special teams.
- Russ and his wife, Betsy, are the parents of a daughter, Mackenzie, and a son, Tyler.

- Drew Terrell enters his fourth season coaching in the NFL, his second season in Washington and his first as the teams wide receivers coach. Terrell was promoted to the role following the 2020 season, when he served as the assistant wide receivers coach.
- In 2021, Terrell helped guide wide receiver Terry McLaurin to his second-straight 1,000 receiving-yard season. McLaurin has recorded 1,000 yards in each of his first two seasons under Terrell, becoming the first receiver to record two-straight 1,000-yard seasons in Washington since Henry Ellard did so in 1994-96.
- In 2020, Terrell assisted the wide receiver room that boasted the first 1,000-yard receiver for Washington since 2016. Terrell assisted in the development of McLaurin, who became only the third player in Washington history to surpass 2,000-career yards receiving in their first 29-career games.
- Terrell served as the Carolina Panthers' quality control coach from 2018-19. In his role, Terrell broke down opponent game film and presented statistical analysis to identify opponent tendencies as well as assisted the offensive coaching staff in game plan preparation.
- Terrell joined the Panthers after three seasons (2015-17) at the University of Michigan, where he was an offensive graduate assistant. He worked with the wide receivers and returners his first two seasons, and the cornerbacks and returners in his final season.
- Terrell was a four-year letterman at wide receiver and punt returner at Stanford University (2009-12), earning honorable mention All-Pac-12 as a returner three times. He was a part of four consecutive bowl teams with the Cardinal, and was Stanford's leading receiver in 2012, when the team finished with a 12-2 record and won both the Pac-12 championship and the Rose Bowl. - Vieselmeyer began his coaching career at Orange (Calif.) Lutheran High School, where he spent eight years as defensive coordinator. He led the Lancers to a 2006 California state title. They also won the 2004 CIF Southern Section Championship and were finalists in 2000, 2001 and 2003.
- Vieselmeyer is a native of Wauwatosa, Wis., where he played linebacker at Redlands (Calif.) and Concordia University. He earned a Bachelor of Arts in education from Concordia in 1999 and a Master of Arts in educational administration from the University of Phoenix in 2005. He and his wife, Marnie, have two daughters, Payton and Quinn. During his time at Michigan Tech, he played defensive end for the Huskies and was twice named Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Defensive Lineman of the Year. He also received All-Region Honors twice as well as unanimous All-American accolades following his senior campaign.

TRAVELLE WHARTON

ASSISTANT OFFENSIVE LINE

15TH NFL SEASON (10 PLAYING/5 COACHING) // 3RD WASHINGTON

- Travelle Wharton enters his 15th season in the NFL including five as a coach and 10 as a player and his third as Washington's assistant offensive line coach in 2022.
- In 2021, Wharton assisted an offensive line that helped produce Washington's first 1,000-yard rusher since 2018. Washington ranked sixth in the NFC in rushing yards (2,061) and rushing yards per game (121.2). The offensive line also recorded a pass blocking grade of 78.3 according to Pro Football Focus, the fourth-best in the NFL. Washington's 80.7 run blocking grade was the seventh-best in the NFL according to PFF.
- From 2018-19, Wharton coached with the Carolina Panthers, assisting then-running game coordinator John Matsko.
- Wharton worked with the Panthers prior to the 2017 season in offseason workouts and training camp as part of the NFL Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship.
- Wharton made his coaching debut with his alma mater, the University of South Carolina, with one season of coaching in 2015. He was initially named offensive quality control coach, but was promoted to offensive line coach midway through the 2015 season.
- Wharton is a veteran of 10 NFL seasons, nine (2004-11, 2013) with the Panthers and one with the Cincinnati Bengals (2012). With the Panthers, Wharton started 111 of 115 regular season games played, the third-highest total by an offensive lineman in team history.
- Wharton anchored the offensive line on Carolina's top three seasons of rushing in franchise history in 2009 (2,498), 2008 (2,437) and 2011 (2,408). Carolina ranked third in the NFL in rushing in all three of those seasons. The Panthers averaged 5.41 yards per carry in 2011, a mark that led the NFL and set a franchise record.
- A native of Fountain Inn, S.C., Wharton played collegiately at South Carolina where he was a four-year letterwinner (2000-03) and earned All-SEC recognition in his junior and senior seasons. He also earned Freshman All-America honors and a spot on the All-SEC Freshman team. He was selected in the third round of the 2004 NFL Draft by the Panthers.

KEN ZAMPESE

QUARTERBACKS

24TH NFL SEASON // 3RD WASHINGTON

- Ken Zampese enters his 24th season coaching in the NFL and his third as Washington's quarterbacks coach in 2022. He has served in a variety of offensive coaching roles with the Cleveland Browns (2018), Cincinnati Bengals (2003-17), St. Louis Rams (2000-02), Green Bay Packers (1999) and Philadelphia Eagles (1998).
- In 2021, Zampese helped quarterback Taylor Heinicke record 3,419 passing yards and 20 touchdowns in 16 games. Heinicke had seven games with a 90.0 or higher passer rating, and had five games with two or more touchdowns.
- In 2020, Zampese helped oversee a Washington quarterback room that started four different quarterbacks during the 2020 season, combining for the second-most completions in a single season in franchise history [389]. Three different quarterbacks won games for the franchise in 2020.
- Zampese worked with QB Alex Smith who posted a 5-1 record as a starter in 2020 and won the NFL's AP Comeback Player of the Year Award.
- In 2018, Zampese helped guide Browns rookie QB Baker Mayfield to an NFL rookie record 27 passing touchdowns, despite starting just 13 games. His 27 passing touchdowns ranked fifth in a season among all Browns quarterbacks in franchise history. Mayfield also threw for 3,725 passing yards, setting a Browns rookie record and ranking sixth among NFL rookies all-time. Mayfield led all 2018 NFL rookies in passing yards (3,725), passing touchdowns (27), completion percentage (63.79) and passer rating (93.7) under the guidance of Zampese.
- As the Bengals offensive coordinator in 2016, Zampese helped the Bengals offense finish comfortably in the NFL's top half in net yards at No. 13, averaging 356.9 per game. Prior to being named the club's offensive coordinator, Zampese spent 13 seasons as the Bengals quarterbacks coach, working with Jon Kitna, Carson Palmer and Andy Dalton.
- Zampese came to the Bengals following three seasons in St. Louis. He was the club's wide receivers coach in 2001 as the Rams led the league in passing yards, averaging 291.4. In 2002, he added the title of passing game coordinator, and the Rams finished second in the league at 259.6 yards per game. Zampese began his NFL career in 1998 as an offensive assistant with the Philadelphia Eagles.
- Prior to the NFL, Zampese coached for nine years in college, including two seasons at Miami (Ohio). In 1997, Miami averaged 37.4 points per game. Zampese played wide receiver and kick returner at the University of San Diego from 1985-88. He was the team's Special Teams Player of the Year as a senior. He earned an undergraduate degree in business from San Diego, and later received a master's degree in adult education from Southern California.

- Jeff Zgonina (pronounced ska-KNEE-na) is entering his 24th combined season as a player or coach in the NFL in 2022. He was promoted to Defensive Line Coach in August of 2022.
- Prior to joining Washington, Zgonina served as the San Francisco 49ers defensive line coach from 2017-18, the New York Giants assistant defensive line coach in 2016 and the Houston Texans assistant defensive line coach in 2013.
- A seventh-round draft choice (185th overall) of the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1993 NFL Draft, Zgonina played in 219 games (67 starts) and registered 448 tackles, 26 sacks, and 13 fumble recoveries, 11 passes defensed, three forced fumbles and one interception. - Dorantes also held various social media roles with the National Football League as a social media producer in 2017 and the Arizona Cardinals as a social media intern from 2015-17.

ERIC STOKES

SENIOR DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

25TH NFL SEASON (22 FRONT OFFICE/3 PLAYING) // 3RD WASHINGTON

- Eric Stokes is entering his third season with Washington and his second as Washington's senior director of player personnel after serving as the director of pro personnel in 2021. In this role, he oversees the day-to-day operations of the personnel department.
- Stokes brings 25 combined years of NFL experience to the role. He joined Washington after spending five seasons with the Carolina Panthers in a variety of roles, including director of college scouting, regional director of college scouting and southwest area scout.
- As the director of college scouting for the Panthers, Stokes oversaw a college scouting staff that was tasked with targeting and tracking draft-eligible prospects, as he worked with area scouts. He was responsible for the pre-draft evaluation process at the NFL Combine, pro days and visits by draft-eligible players.
- Prior to joining Carolina, Stokes spent two seasons (2014-15) as the assistant general manager of the Miami Dolphins. In his role, Stokes assisted in all aspects of player evaluation and acquisitions at the professional and collegiate levels, including the daily management and makeup of the Dolphins roster as well as guiding the team's preparation for the annual NFL Draft.
- From 2012-13, Stokes was the director of college scouting for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Prior to joining the Buccaneers, Stokes spent 12 seasons as a member of the Seattle Seahawks scouting staff, working as an area scout (2000-01, 2005-09) and pro personnel assistant (2002-04) before serving as assistant director of college scouting from 2010-11. In that role, Stokes was instrumental in bringing in defensive standouts safeties Earl Thomas and Kam Chancellor, linebacker Bobby Wagner and cornerback Richard Sherman.
- Stokes played two seasons as a safety for the Seahawks after being selected in the fifth round of the 1997 NFL Draft. He was selected by the Cleveland Browns in the 1999 expansion draft before an injury cut his career short.
- Stokes graduated from the University of Nebraska with a degree in sociology. He and his wife, Tisa, have three daughters, Erisa, Payton and Madison.

- Chris Polian enters his 26th season in the NFL and second as Washington's director of pro personnel in 2022. He joined Washington with 24 seasons of NFL experience as an executive and scout, including three seasons as vice president and general manager of the Indianapolis Colts.
- Polian was most recently the director of pro personnel with the Jacksonville Jaguars from 2013-2019. He played a major factor in the team's free agency signings in 2017 of DE Calais Campbell, DT Malik Jackson and CB A.J. Bouye who were all Pro Bowl selections during their tenures in Jacksonville. In that offseason, he also helped target S Barry Church who along with Campbell, Jackson and Bouye helped anchor a defense that was ranked No. 2 in the NFL in 2017 and helped Jacksonville capture an AFC South title and appearance in the AFC Championship game.
- Prior to his seven seasons with the Jaguars, Polian was an executive scout with the Atlanta Falcons in 2012 and also spent three seasons as vice president and general manager of the Indianapolis Colts from 2009-11. He started his career with Indianapolis in 1998 as the director of pro scouting from 1998-2000. Polian then held the position of assistant director of football operations from 2001-03 and was promoted to assistant general manager/football operations in 2004 and spent five seasons as the vice president of football operations from 2005-09. Prior to joining the Colts, Polian worked with the Carolina Panthers for four years (1994-97) as a personnel assistant.
- During Polian's tenure in Indianapolis from 1998-2011, the Colts had a regular season record of 143-81 with playoff appearances in 10 of 14 seasons including seven division titles and a Super Bowl championship in 2006. The franchise also became the only team to win 12-plus games in seven consecutive seasons during that timeframe.
- Polian is a native of New York, N.Y. and earned a bachelor's degree in communications from John Carroll University in 1993. His father, Bill, a 2016 Pro Football Hall of Fame Inductee was a general manager of the Buffalo Bills, Indianapolis Colts and Carolina Panthers. His brother, Brian, is the special teams coordinator at Notre Dame and his brother, Dennis, was the associate athletic director, football at the University of Arizona. He and his wife, Debbie, have three children, Jack (18), Caroline (16) and Kate (13).

- Prior to joining Washington, Cook previously spent six seasons with the Buffalo Bills from 2011-16. He served in various capacities in his time with the Bills, including two seasons each as Director of College Scouting, as a national scout and as an area scout.
- Before his time in Buffalo, Cook spent two seasons with the Miami Dolphins as a regional scout, focusing on the Southwest region in the Dolphins' system from 2008-10. He also spent 11 years as the Director of College Scouting for the Kansas City Chiefs from 1997-2007. COMMANDERS PUBLIC RELATIONS 2022 MEDIA ACCESS POLICY

CREDENTIAL POLICY

The Washington Commanders grant credentials and media access based on merit as guided by the priorities listed below. Because of the limited space available at the Commanders Facility in Ashburn and FedExField, these priority guidelines are intended to facilitate the most efficient use of space for working media covering the Washington Commanders and the NFL.

Full credential request policies are detailed below. For more information about obtaining media credentials, please contact Sean DeBarbieri and Samantha Fristachi.

The Commanders prioritize outlets in the following order:

1. Broadcast partners, including television and radio personnel responsible for live broadcasts of Washington Commanders games.
2. Local beat reporters who cover the team on a daily basis for large-scale local outlets, including newspapers, wire services, radio stations and television affiliates that cover the Washington Commanders and the NFL on a regular basis.
3. Large-scale national outlets, including national newspapers, magazines, television stations, websites and more.
4. Washington, D.C. metro area community publications and stations.
5. Out-of-town community outlets on specific assignment to cover Commanders personnel of unique interest to the outlet's market (e.g.: a player's hometown newspaper).
6. Blogs, Internet radio and other independent outlets, whose merit and credential consideration is subject to the discretion of Commanders Public Relations.

Policies for visiting scouts are handled separately in accordance with the 2022 Scouting Policy as distributed to all NFL teams prior to the season.

The following guidelines will be observed in granting access:

1. Season credentials will be reserved for organizations that provide consistent and substantial coverage of the Washington Commanders. Please be advised that a season media credential does not guarantee working space in media work areas.
2. With the exception of seasonally credentialed Commanders beat reporters who produce daily on-site reports, all credentials at both locations are approved and issued on a daily and/or game-by-game basis.
3. Passes and credentials are transferable within the same media outlet for use by those serving an editorial function with proper notice and approval by Commanders Public Relations. Passes used by any member of a credentialed outlet without specific editorial assignment or by non-working members of the organization are subject to revocation and will affect all future credentialing decisions by Commanders Public Relations for that outlet.
4. As the result of limited work space, credentials will not be issued to freelance writers or photographers without a specific assignment received in writing by the assigning organization.
5. Credentials may be issued: a) to online entities that are affiliated with a national or regional media organization; or, b) to online entities that host a website that regularly and substantially reports on the National Football League or the Washington

Commanders, and employs for that website at least one full-time permanent employee who writes a substantial majority of all material posted on the site. Priority for these sites will be based on potential audience at the discretion of Commanders Public Relations.

6. Commanders personnel may deny or revoke credentials without notice and an individual shall surrender his/her credential upon request for: noncompliance with the priorities or guidelines set out in this policy; noncompliance with health, safety, or security directives issued regarding Commanders events; and for conduct for which there are reasonable grounds to believe violate state or federal law, or constitute a breach of professional ethics. Any organization that wishes to contest a denial or revocation may: a) request Commanders Public Relations provide a written rationale for the denial or revocation; b) submit a written response to that rationale to the Director of Football Communications.
7. Commanders Public Relations reserves the right to change this policy at any time.

Head Coach Ron Rivera will conduct a weekly news conference in the Media Annex on Wednesday and Friday. One-on-one requests should be sent to Sean DeBarbieri (sean.debarbieri@commanders.com).

COORDINATOR INTERVIEWS

During the regular season, both the offensive and defensive coordinators will be available after practice on Thursday. The special teams coordinator will be available after practice on Friday if requested. Charlie Mule (charles.mule@commanders.com) serves as the primary media contact for coordinators. All requests for coordinators beyond that time will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis in accordance with the coaches' scheduling availability.

ASSISTANT COACH INTERVIEWS

All requests for assistants must be arranged through the Commanders Public Relations Department with at least 24 hours notice. Position coaches will be available on a rotation after practice on Friday along with one-on-ones per request. Position coaches are available for questions on specific players and the position group only. No position coaches should be contacted directly by telephone (at an office line, at home or by cell phone) or by email. Charlie Mule (charles.mule@commanders.com) serves as the primary media contact for assistant coaches.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

The Commanders locker room is open to accredited media for specific interview periods after roster cutdown. The locker room is generally open to the media for 45 minutes following practices on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays of normal game weeks. All one-on-one requests should be arranged through the Commanders PR department at least 48 hours in advance. All interviews must be conducted inside the locker room unless additional permission is granted by a Commanders PR staff member. NO B-ROLL, STILL PHOTOGRAPHY OR LIVE STREAMING IS ALLOWED INSIDE THE LOCKER ROOM. Interviews to be conducted by phone must be arranged through Commanders PR prior to the day of the scheduled interview. All times are subject to change without prior notice.

GAME CREDENTIALS

Demand for credentials is high, and as such, the size and legitimacy of each media outlet requesting access will be considered on a case-by-case basis and subject to the discretion of Commanders Public Relations. Full details on credentialing decisions are available at the beginning of this policy.

For home games, all requests must be submitted through the team's online credentialing system no later than 5 p.m. ET on Tuesday of that particular game week.

For away games, all requests must be e-mailed to Samantha Fristachi (samantha.fristachi@commanders.com) and must include attending media members' name, job title and media affiliation.





JULIE DONALDSON

A Senior Vice President and member of the Washington Commanders executive leadership team, Julie is a permanent member of the gameday radio broadcast and the broadcast face of the organization on and off the field. The first woman to be a regular on-air member of an NFL radio broadcast booth, Julie also adds her input and vision toward all of the team's in-house creative content. During a decade-long tenure as a reporter, anchor and host for NBC Sports Washington (NCBSW), Julie has covered nearly every team, athlete and major sports story in the Washington, D.C., and Baltimore region, as well as across national and international sporting events. Julie most recently served as host of NBCSW's Emmy Award-winning NFL pregame and postgame shows and contributed regularly to its other football programs and coverage. In addition to her work with NBCSW, Julie also has frequently held on-air roles for NBC Sports and NBC Olympics. She has held three Olympic assignments as a News Desk Host during the 2018 (PyeongChang) 2016 (Rio) and 2014 (Sochi) Olympic Games, and often serves as a weekend Sports Desk host for NBC Sports. Before that, Julie hosted NBCSW's live NBA gameday shows, and was an anchor and reporter for several NBCSW news, analysis and entertainment shows, including SportsNet Central, Training Camp Daily and Football Central. Julie joined NBCSW in August 2010 after stops in some of the nation's top markets, including Boston, New York and Miami. Donaldson served as a sports anchor and reporter for Boston's WHDH-TV (NBC). Prior to WHDH, she was a reporter for SportsNet New York (SNY) for two years, including the network's inaugural season. A University of Florida graduate, Julie began her career in Miami where she held a variety of positions for FOX Sports, including FS Florida and FS South. She served as a reporter for FS Florida's Sports Rap, hosted SEC and ACC men's basketball shows for FS South. She contributed to national broadcasts as a sideline reporter for ACC Sunday Night Hoops.



BRAM WEINSTEIN

Bram Weinstein is in his third season as the play-by-play voice of the Washington Commanders. Bram can be heard on air weekdays from 3-6ET on ESPN 630 the Sports Capital and has had a quarter century-long on-air career that includes seven years at ESPN mainly as an anchor on the outlet's flagship program "Sportscenter." Bram is a lifelong fan of the Burgundy & Gold, growing up in Silver Spring, MD and attending games as a kid when the team played at RFK Stadium. This is his second stint on the official team broadcast, having served as the sideline reporter in 2006-2008. Bram also owns Ampire Media, a digital video/podcast network focused on DMV sports, and he is an adjunct professor at his alma mater American University.



LONDON FLETCHER

After hanging up his cleats in 2014, Washington Ring of Honor member London Fletcher returns to the organization in a new capacity this season as a member of the Commanders broadcast team. Originally undrafted out of John Carroll University, London spent 16 seasons in the NFL, including seven as a member of the Burgundy & Gold. London started in each game he appeared for Washington, totaling 112 consecutive starts. While in Washington, London recorded at least 111 tackles each season, earned four straight trips to the Pro Bowl from 2009 to 2012 and was named an All-Pro in 2011 & 2012. London currently resides in Charlotte, NC with his wife and three kids.



IMPORTANT DATES

The Start - July 9, 1932

George P. Marshall headed a group (Vincent Bendix, Jay O'Brien, Dorland Doyle) that bought a National Football League franchise in Boston. They contracted to play in Braves Field, home of the National League Baseball team, and were called "The Braves."

The Name

The Boston Gridders moved to Fenway Park, home of the American League Red Sox, and "The Braves" became "The Redskins."

The Franchise - Feb. 13, 1937

The Washington Redskins were officially born as the National Football League approved the transfer of the Boston Redskins franchise to Washington, D.C., and a new history began.

The Band - Aug. 9, 1937

The famed Redskins Band was founded and it was the first of its kind.

First Victory - Sept. 16, 1937

The First Game! The Franchise's Thursday night opener drew 19,941 fans to flood-lighted Griffith Stadium. Riley Smith scored on a 60-yard interception return, while the team added two field goals and an extra point to make the final score - Washington 13, Giants 3.

First Title - Dec. 5, 1937

Ten thousand fans stomped up Broadway behind the brass band following the franchise's first title. In the game, Sammy Baugh completed 11-of-15 passes, while Cliff Battles had touchdown runs of 75 and 76 yards as the team routed the Giants, 49-14, for the Eastern Championship.

World Champs! - Dec. 12, 1937


Freezing weather, frozen field and the icy-nerved Bears couldn't stop Sammy Baugh (center below). He completed 17-of-33 passes for 335 yards and three touchdowns. Wayne Millner (right), the all-time Notre Dame great, finished with nine catches for 160 yards, including 77- and 55-yard touchdowns.

Westward Ho! - Aug. 2, 1939

Washington set forth on their first coast-to-coast football training trip. Training site: Eastern State Normal School in Cheney, Wash.

Zero Hour - Oct. 1, 1939

Washington and the NY Giants battled in the mud and rain as the outcome wound up being a scoreless tie, the only scoreless tie in Washington history.



Record Pass - Oct. 15, 1939

From the kick formation and standing deep in the end zone, Frank Filchock flipped a pass to Andy Farkas who went all the way for the touchdown. It was the longest pass play in National Football League history, 99 yards.

East Champs - Dec. 1, 1940

Miniature-sized Davey O'Brien of the Eagles completed 33 passes in 60 attempts, but Washington won 13-6 to clinch the Eastern Championship.

73-to-Ohhh! - Dec. 8, 1940

Despite Washington gaining the same number of first downs as the Bears in the World Championship Game at Griffith Stadium, the team lost 73-0.

California - Aug. 18, 1941

Washington brought pro football on a large scale to California for the first time. They established training quarters in San Diego at Brown Military Academy.

Title Escapes - Nov. 23, 1941

There were 50 seconds to go in the Eastern Championship Game and Washington held a 13-10 lead, but the Giants managed to score a field goal and a touchdown to win, 20-13.

Only Loss - Sept. 27, 1942

The Giants are unable to convert a first down, gained only ONE yard rushing and completed just ONE pass — but it was good for a touchdown. They then captured another touchdown on an interception and Washington suffered their only 1942 defeat, 14-7.

World Champs! - Dec. 13, 1942

The Bears took an early lead on an errant pass from center, but Sammy Baugh's 85-yard quick kick set them back on their heels. Wilbur Moore then made a vital interception and followed with a sensational catch for a 38-yard touchdown. Andy Farkas capped the victory by carrying the ball 10 of 12 times on an 80-yard touchdown drive. Score: 14-6.

Runner Up - Dec. 26, 1943

Sam Baugh suffered a concussion early, tackling Sid Luckman on a punt return and the Bears went on to win the NFL title, 41-21.

To a T - July 30, 1945

Washington abandoned their double-wing formation and adopted the T-formation.

East Champs - Dec. 9, 1945

Washington had two straight shutouts, the first coming against the Steelers, 24-0, on Dec. 2 and the team defeated the Giants, 17-0, en route to an Eastern title.

One Point Shy - Dec. 16, 1945

In subzero weather, Washington lost the world title to the Rams, 15-14, on freakish plays. Baugh's pass from the end zone hit the goal-post for a safety (no longer allowed); and Bob Waterfield's try-for-point hit the crossbar and bounced over.

Charity Game - Sept. 6, 1946

The inaugural Washington-Rams game benefiting the Los Angeles Times Charities, Inc. drew 68,188 to Memorial Coliseum and netted the Times Boys Club \$96,711.23.

High Note - June 13, 1947

The Redskins Band performed at the Philadelphia Inquirer's Famed Festival of Music alongside Whiteman, Waring and the Philharmonic.

Champs Trumped - Nov. 23, 1947

Fans cheered on Sam Baugh who thanked them with six touchdown tosses, routing the previous-champion Cards, 45-21.

IMPORTANT DATES

First on TV - June 14, 1950

American Oil announced plans to televise all Washington games - no other pro teams were on TV.

Baugh-to-Bach - Oct. 10, 1954

Dr. Howard Mitchell led his National Symphony Orchestra at mid-field in a halftime show.

TD Torrent - Oct. 1, 1955

Twenty-one points in 137 seconds! The Eagles led 16-0 in the 3rd quarter when Brito recovered a fumble on the Eagles' 32 and LeBaron then passed to Janowicz for the touchdown. Torgeson recovered a fumble on Eagles 13 and Janowicz went on to score. Washington won, 31-30.

The Alumni - Oct. 15, 1958

The Redskins Alumni Association was established. Twenty-three former players residing here adopted a formal constitution and bylaws. They invited all non-resident ex-Redskins to join.

New Home - Dec. 12, 1958

Washington signed a 30-year lease to play in a proposed D.C. Stadium that Congress gave the go-ahead to build.

Home Debut - Oct. 1, 1961

The first game in the new D.C. Stadium drew 37,767. Washington failed to hold a 21-7 lead and the Giants won, 24-21.

Redskins Trade for Mitchell - Dec. 14, 1961

Washington finalize an agreement to send their 1962 first overall draft pick, Heisman trophy winning back Ernie Davis, to the Cleveland Browns in exchange for future Pro Football Hall of Famer Bobby Mitchell.

Four of a Kind - Dec. 17, 1961

Dick James scored four touchdowns to set the Washington single game scoring record in a 34-24 win over Dallas.

Sonny and Sam - 1964

Washington stunned the public by trading QB Norm Snead to the Eagles for veteran QB Sonny Jurgensen. The team then repeated the performance by shipping favorite Dick James to New York for Sam Huff.

A Sunny Day - Oct. 11, 1964

Sonny Jurgensen out-duled Norm Snead by throwing four touchdowns against the Eagles in the first meeting of the traded quarterbacks.

Record Rally - Nov. 28, 1965

Sonny Jurgensen sparked the then-largest comeback win in team history. Down 21-0, Washington recorded a 34-31 victory over the Cowboys as Sonny passed for over 400 yards and three touchdowns.

Graham Era - Jan. 25, 1966

Washington hired former Cleveland star, Otto Graham, as their Head Coach and General Manager.

TD Jamboree - Nov. 27, 1966

Washington and the NY Giants scored the most points in NFL history as they tied or set many team and league records in Washington's rout of New York, 72-41.

Record Breakers - 1967

Sonny Jurgensen set new Washington and NFL passing records for most attempts, completions, and yards in a season. Receivers Charley Taylor, Jerry Smith and Bobby Mitchell finished first, second and fourth in the League; it was the highest ever by receivers on the same team.

Lombardi Hired - Feb. 7, 1969

The unbelievable happened - Vince Lombardi left Green Bay to become the head coach of Washington.

George Preston - Aug. 9, 1969

George Preston Marshall, founder of the Washington Redskins, died at his home at the age of 72.

A Winning Season - Dec. 14, 1969

Washington defeated New Orleans by a score of 17-14 to ensure their first winning season since 1955. The victory also continued Coach Lombardi's record of never having coached a losing NFL team.

Lombardi Dies - Sept. 3, 1970

The sports world grieves the death of Vincent T. Lombardi, Head Coach and Executive Vice President of the Redskins.

1,000-Yard Club - Dec. 13, 1970

Larry Brown, on the second offensive play of the game against the Eagles and needing four yards to break the 1,000-yard barrier, gained 12 yards to become the first Washington player in history to become a member of the 1,000-yard club.

NFL Rushing Champ - Dec. 20, 1970

Larry Brown ended the season as the top rusher in the NFL with a total of 1,125 yards on 237 attempts for a 4.7 avg. He was the first Washington player since Cliff Battles in 1937 to win the rushing title.

Allen Hired - Jan. 6, 1971

George Allen, winningest coach in the NFC, was named the Redskins' Head Coach and General Manager.

A New Home - June 2, 1971

Groundbreaking ceremonies were held for the Redskins new home, Redskins Park, near Dulles Airport.

Future is Now - 1971

Allen guided Washington to the most wins, nine, in 29 years with a 9-4-1 record. It was the first time in 29 years that the Redskins earned a championship playoff game.

Coach of the Year - 1971

George Allen was voted NFL and NFC "Coach of the Year."

NFC Champions - 1972

Washington won their first title in 30 years with a convincing 26-3 win over the defending World Champion Dallas Cowboys in RFK Stadium, following a 16-3 playoff victory over Green Bay. Washington lost 14-7 to Miami in Super Bowl VII in the L.A. Coliseum.

Player of Year - 1972

Larry Brown, honored by all selections as NFL "Player of Year," won NFC rushing title by setting a new Washington rushing record with his 1,216 yards.

NFC Coach of the Year - 1972

For a second year in a row, George Allen awarded "Coach of Year" honors.

IMPORTANT DATES

4th Straight Playoffs - 1974

For the fourth consecutive year, George Allen's "Over the Hill Gang" reached the playoffs.

Jurgensen Retires - May 1, 1975

Quarterback Sonny Jurgensen retired after playing for 18 seasons in the NFL, 11 in a Washington uniform.

All-Time Receiver - Dec. 21, 1975

Washington wide receiver Charley Taylor became the all-time receptions leader in NFL history with his 634th career catch coming against the Eagles in the season's finale.

Milton King Dies - Jan. 23, 1976

Milton King, vice president and treasurer of the Redskins, died at the age of 85.

Return to Playoffs - 1976

By winning the final four games, including wins at Dallas and at St. Louis, Washington made the playoffs for the fifth time in six years under Allen.

Pardee Hired - Jan. 24, 1978

Jack Pardee, former Washington player and coach, was named the 19th head coach in Washington history.

Presidential Visit - Oct. 2, 1978

President Jimmy Carter became the second President ever to attend a regular season NFL game when he and Mrs. Carter, along with son Chip and wife Caron, saw the Monday night Cowboys-Washington clash.

Off to the Races - 1978

By winning the first six games, including wins over rivals Dallas and St. Louis and playoff bound New England, Washington enjoyed their best start in over 35 years.

Good News, Bad News - 1979

The 10-6 record was the ninth consecutive year that Washington finished .500 or better. Both the division title and wild card playoff game were lost in the final seconds of the game in Dallas, 35-34.

100 Straight - 1980

Washington extended the NFL's longest consecutive streak of sellouts to 100, dating back to 1966.

Gibbs Hired - Jan. 13, 1981

Joe Gibbs, offensive coordinator of the San Diego Chargers, became the 20th head coach in Washington history.

Finishing Kick - 1981

Victorious in 8 of their final 11 games, Coach Gibbs and his Washington club set or tied 13 club records.

Huff Inducted - Aug. 7, 1982

Former Washington and NY Giant Sam Huff was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

A New Beginning - Sept. 12, 1982

With the 0-5 start of a year ago, the 0-4 preseason fresh on everyone's mind, Mark Moseley lifted the burden with a 26-yard overtime field goal to give Washington a victory over Philadelphia. Moseley had only minutes earlier sent the game into overtime with a 48-yard field goal.

Hogs Take Their Bows - Jan. 15, 1982

The celebrated Hogs created enough holes in the Viking defense for John Riggins to plow for a Washington playoff record 185 yards, leading Washington to a 21-7 win and a spot in the NFC Championship. Before leaving the game, Riggins gallantly bowed to the 54,000-plus Washington faithful who roared in approval.

Strike! - Sept. 21, 1982

The NFL players walked out in a strike that would last until Nov. 17. In all, eight games were missed, seven canceled.

Holy Moseley! - Dec. 19, 1982

With time running out, the game on the line, with an NFL record at stake, Mark Moseley beat the Giants by booting his 21st straight field goal in a snowy RFK Stadium. The kick broke Garo Yepremian's record of 20 consecutive field goals made and gave Washington a 15-14 win. Also, in the game, John Riggins became only the fifth back in NFL history to exceed 2,000 carries (Payton, Simpson, Brown, and Harris are the others).

A Whitewash - Jan. 2, 1983

For the first time since 1980, Washington posted a shutout by beating the Cardinals 28-0. Their 8-1 record was the best in the NFC, giving them home-field advantage throughout the playoffs. The 128 points given up by the Washington defense is the fewest in the NFL.

Sweet Revenge - Jan. 22, 1983

Washington avenged their only loss of the season, setting back the Cowboys, 31-17, to reach their second Super Bowl, and first in 10 years.

Super Bowl Win! - Jan. 30, 1983

Washington won Super Bowl XVII downing the Dolphins 27-17. Their win streak reached eight, and 15 of 16 and 20 of 24 over two seasons. Jack Kent Cooke accepted the Super Bowl Trophy from Pete Rozelle in the locker room as MVP Riggins boasts, "Ron may be President, but for tonight, I'm King." The team's 12-1 record was the fifth best NFL mark in the last 50 years, and their best ever.

Hails from the Chief - Jan. 31, 1983

President Reagan and Mrs. Reagan were at Dulles Airport to greet the World Champions as they arrived back from California.

Parade of Stars - Feb. 3, 1983

The entire city of Washington celebrated as the team paraded before some 500,000 fans in a downtown ceremony amidst pouring rain. Coach Gibbs holds up the Super Bowl Trophy and proclaimed, "This is for you."

High Honors - 1983

Joe Gibbs was named Coach of the Year. Mark Moseley was the first special teams player in history named NFL MVP by Associated Press, Joe Theismann was Miller Man of the Year, and five Washington players (the most since 1972) were named to the Pro Bowl: Moseley, Theismann, Tony Peters, Charlie Brown and Mike Nelms. Later, Bobby Beathard was named Executive of the Year. And Riggins, who had four straight 100-yard rushing playoff games, the first ever to do so, won a car as Super Bowl MVP.

Jurgy to Mitch - July 30, 1983

Former Washington greats — quarterback Sonny Jurgensen and receiver Bobby Mitchell — were inducted into Pro Football's Hall of Fame.

Monday Night Fever - Oct. 1, 1983

Washington lost 48-47, in the highest scoring game in night football history. Washington and the Packers combined for over 1,000 yards of total offense.

IMPORTANT DATES

The Diesel Keeps On Trucking - Nov. 20, 1983

John Riggins set an NFL record as his consecutive games with rushing touchdowns reached 12 while notching his 19th touchdown of the year to tie that NFL mark. John's streak ended at 13 consecutive games while he went on to establish an NFL record 24 touchdowns.

Doomsday Showdown - Dec. 11, 1983

Dressed in army fatigues, Washington marched into Dallas to do battle. The result was a convincing 31-10 victory in Dallas to gain sole possession of first place in the NFC East. It was a game that saw Tony Dorsett held to 34 yards on 14 carries (one yard on five carries in the second half) and scores from four different Washington players.

Alone on a Hill - Dec. 17, 1983

For the second year in a row, Washington finished with the best record in the NFL. Their 31-22 victory over the Giants capped a remarkable 14-2 regular season. It was the first time in the history of the League that an NFC team compiled so many victories.

One-Two Punch - 1983

Mark Moseley's NFL kick scoring record of 161 points, and Riggins' total of 144 points, topped the entire NFL. It was the first time since 1951 that the number one and two scorers played on the same team. Their total of 305 points surpassed the totals of eight other clubs.

Ring Out the Rams - Jan. 1, 1984

Washington rang in the New Year by drubbing the L.A. Rams 51-7 in the most lopsided playoff game in 26 years. The team set or tied 13 club playoff marks with the 44-point margin of victory, the greatest in the 47-year history of the club.

Three of a Kind - 1985

The 10 victories marked a third consecutive season that Washington won 10 or more games, equaling a club-best streak set from 1972-74. The 35 wins in those three seasons were a club record for wins over a three-year period. Threes were also meaningful for offensive linemen Joe Jacoby and Russ Grimm, who each earned a third consecutive trip to the Pro Bowl. Receiver Art Monk (91 catches) went for a second straight time.

Happy Birthday - Feb. 13, 1986

The Washington entered their 50th season in the Nation's Capital, celebrating the franchise's move from Boston to Washington.

Rally Ho - 1986

Headed by Coach Ray Flaherty of the 1937 World Champions, former players and coaches gathered to kickoff the 1986 season.

Little Mr. Big - Oct. 27, 1986

WR Gary Clark accounted for 241 receiving yards (on 11 catches) to break teammate Art Monk's club record on Monday Night TV.

Showdown - Nov. 23, 1986

Eager to avenge their first loss of 1986, Washington came out smokin' against Dallas. The 34-0 first half lead marked the most points the Cowboys had ever allowed in a single half of play. The Washington 41-14 win was their most points ever against the Cowboys.



Gibbs Gets #70 - Jan. 3, 1987

Head Coach Joe Gibbs became the winningest coach in Washington history, gaining his 70th win as the team defeated the Bears 27-13 in a divisional playoff.

A Giant Step - Jan. 11, 1987

With 15 new faces on the roster, Washington played in their third NFC Championship game in five years.

Pro Bowlers, Again - Feb. 1, 1987

Hogs Russ Grimm and Joe Jacoby returned to the Islands of Hawaii for the fourth consecutive season. Joined by Art Monk, Darrell Green, Gary Clark, Dexter Manley, and Jay Schroeder, Washington equaled a club record seven participants in the annual classic.

NFLPA Strike - 1987

NFL players walked out following the second week of the regular season.

Perfect - Oct. 19, 1987

Washington "replacement" players closed out their season with a perfect 3-0 mark. The team held on to defeat Dallas, 13-7, in Texas Stadium.

Relief Pitcher - Dec. 26, 1987

Quarterback Doug Williams connected on 11-of-22 for 217 yards and two touchdowns in Minnesota. The 27-24 overtime victory is highlighted by a Ricky Sanders 51-yard catch-and-run to force sudden death. Haji-Sheikh kicks the game winner.

The Bear Facts - Jan. 10, 1988

For the second consecutive season, Washington traveled to Chicago for a divisional playoff game. After trailing 14-0 in the second quarter, the team rallied to win 21-17. Darrell Green provided the game-winning points on an electrifying 52-yard punt return, as Washington advanced to the NFC Championship Game for the fourth time in six seasons.

NFC Champs! - Jan. 17, 1988

Washington defeated Minnesota, 17-10, as Doug Williams connected with Gary Clark to break a 10-10 fourth quarter deadlock. Washington became the first team to advance to the Super Bowl three times in the 1980s.

World Champs! - Jan. 31, 1988

Twenty Super Bowl records were broken en route to a 42-10 decision over the Denver Broncos. Quarterback Doug Williams is named the game's MVP as he connected on 18-of-29 for a record 340 yards. His four touchdown passes tie another record as the team scores five times in five possessions in the second quarter alone.

100 Wins - Dec. 10, 1989

Joe Gibbs registered his 100th career win as head coach of Washington as the team defeated San Diego, 26-21. Only six other coaches reached 100 wins faster than Gibbs.

Monk Moves Up - Dec. 10, 1989

Art Monk moved into third place on the all-time NFL receiving list, ahead of friend and receivers coach Charley Taylor, in Washington's 26-21 win vs. San Diego.

A Lion of a Comeback - Nov. 4, 1990

Washington equaled the greatest comeback in club history with a 41-38 overtime win at Detroit. Down by 21 points in the third quarter and 17 points entering the fourth, Jeff Rutledge rallied the team by passing for 363 second-half yards (30-42). The game winning points came on a Chip Lohmiller 34-yard field goal in overtime.

700 Catches - Nov. 18, 1990

Art Monk became only the third player in NFL history to catch 700 passes when he hauled in four receptions against the Saints in RFK.

IMPORTANT DATES

Ringing in the New Year - Jan. 5, 1991

Washington pushed their playoff record to 12-3 under Joe Gibbs with a solid team effort 20-6 win over the Eagles at Veterans Stadium.

Perfect Start - 1991

For the first time in franchise history, Washington opened the year with 11 straight victories.

One of the Best - 1991

Washington became only the sixth team in NFL history to record 17-or-more wins in a single season by posting a 17-2 overall mark (best in team history).

Hog Protection - 1991

In 16 games, the "Hogs" allowed a league-low and club-record nine sacks. It was the third lowest total in NFL history.

A Class Act - Dec. 22, 1991

Art Monk becomes only the second player in NFL history to catch 800 passes when he caught five passes in the season finale at Philadelphia.

NFC Champs - Jan. 12, 1992

For the fourth time under Joe Gibbs, and the fifth time in franchise history, Washington returned to the Super Bowl with a 41-10 win over Detroit in the NFC title game.

World Champs! - Jan. 26, 1992

Washington claimed their third Super Bowl win under Gibbs. The team knocked out Buffalo 37-24 and Mark Rypien was named Super Bowl MVP after completing 18 passes and throwing two touchdowns. Gary Clark and Art Monk both caught seven passes, with Clark gaining 114 yards and one TD, and Monk adding 113 yards. Brad Edwards had two interceptions and the defense sacked Bills QB Jim Kelly five times.

Pro Bowl Record - Feb. 2, 1992

Washington set a club record with eight players earning a selection to the Pro Bowl. Jim Lachey and Darrell Green were named starters, while Gary Clark, Chip Lohmiller, Charles Mann, Earnest Byner and Mark Schlereth also were named to the NFC squad.

New Redskin Park Opens - Aug. 24, 1992

Washington moved into their new training complex set on a picturesque 160 acres in Loudoun County, Va. The building is more than 70,000 square feet to complement four practice fields.

Monk is #1 - Oct. 12, 1992

Art Monk became the NFL's all-time leading pass receiver against Denver on Monday Night in Week 5. His 820th career catch was a 10-yarder with 3:12 remaining in the 4th quarter.

Joe Gibbs Resigns - March 5, 1993

After 12 seasons guiding Washington to four Super Bowls, three titles, a 16-5 playoff mark and a 140-65 career record, Joe Gibbs stepped down as head coach. Richie Petitbon is hired as the 21st coach in club history.

Turner Hired - Feb. 2, 1994

Norv Turner, offensive coordinator of the Dallas Cowboys, became the 22nd coach in team history.

Coleman Becomes All-Time Leader - Oct. 9, 1994

Linebacker Monte Coleman played in his 206th career game breaking Art Monk's team record for games played. Monte, tied with Sammy Baugh for most seasons as a member of the organization with 16, ended his career with 216 games played. Darrell Green would take over the record in 1998.

Pro Bowl - 1994

Linebacker Ken Harvey and punter Reggie Roby earned selection to the NFC squad. Harvey led the NFC in sacks with 13.5 and Roby became the first Washington punter selected to the Pro Bowl since Sam Baker in 1958.

BIG Upset Wins - Oct. 1, 1995

Washington's 27-23 win over 13-point favorite Dallas was the team's biggest upset win since defeating the Cowboys, 34-31, on December 11, 1966. The team was 17-point underdogs in the rematch at Texas Stadium, but came up with a 24-17 win. It was the biggest upset win in the NFL since 1980.

Pro Bowlers - 1995

Linebacker Ken Harvey earned his second straight starting assignment in the Pro Bowl, while kick/punt returner Brian Mitchell was honored with his first Pro Bowl selection. Mitchell led the NFC in kickoff returns with a 25.6-yard average and was second in the NFL in punt returns (12.6-yard average).

New Stadium - March 13, 1996

Washington owner Jack Kent Cooke, Maryland Gov. Parris N. Glendening and Prince George's County Executive Wayne Curry signed a contract paving the way for the immediate start of construction for the new home of the team in Prince George's County.

Gibbs To Hall - July 27, 1996

Joe Gibbs is inducted into the NFL Hall of Fame.

Allen Passes Riggins - 1996

Terry Allen rushed past John Riggins' single-season rushing record, gaining 1,353 yards. Allen also led the NFL in touchdowns with 21 TDs.

Pro Bowlers - 1996

Washington sent their largest amount of representatives to the Pro Bowl since the 1991 season, when running back Terry Allen, quarterback Gus Frerotte, cornerback Darrell Green, linebacker Ken Harvey and punter Matt Turk made the trip to Hawaii.

So Long RFK - Dec. 16, 1996

Washington played their final home game at Robert F. Kennedy Memorial Stadium against the Dallas Cowboys. With greats from the past on hand, the team defeated the Cowboys 37-10. Washington finished 173-102-3 at RFK, including 11-1 in the playoffs.

Jack Kent Cooke Passes Away - April 6, 1997

Jack Kent Cooke, only the second owner in team history, died of congestive heart failure at the age of 84. At his memorial service, John Kent Cooke, Sr. announced the new stadium would be called Jack Kent Cooke Stadium.

Big Jack Opens - Sept. 14, 1997

The team christens Jack Kent Cooke Stadium in style with a 19-13 overtime win over the Arizona Cardinals. In overtime, rookie Kenard Lang forced a fumble that was recovered at the Cardinals 35-yard line. Two plays later Gus Frerotte threw a 40-yard scoring strike to a leaping Michael Westbrook in the end zone.

Green is Tops - Dec. 13, 1997

Cornerback Darrell Green played in his 217th career game as a Washington player breaking Monte Coleman's team record for games played.

Pro Bowlers - 1997

Darrell Green earns his seventh Pro Bowl selection in his 15th season. He is also joined by fellow cornerback Cris Dishman, while linebacker Ken Harvey is selected for the fourth straight year and punter Matt Turk makes his second straight appearance.

Mitchell Joins Brown - 1998

Brian Mitchell led the NFL in total combined net yards for the fourth time joining Hall of Famer Jim Brown as the only players in NFL history to lead the league in total combined net yards four

times.

Skip-In to the End Zone- Dec. 13, 1998

Rookie running back Skip Hicks sets a club rookie record with eight rushing touchdowns, breaking Don Bosseler's record of seven set in 1957.

Organization is Sold - May 25, 1999

Daniel M. Snyder gained unanimous approval (31-0) from league owners to become the fourth owner in franchise history. Snyder buys the team for a record \$800 million - the most ever for an American sports franchise.

Welcome to FedExField - Nov. 21, 1999

The organization partners with Federal Express Corporation, re-naming Jack Kent Cooke Stadium, FedExField.

Winning the East - Dec. 26, 1999

Washington overcame a 10-point fourth quarter deficit to defeat the 49ers 26-20 in overtime. The win gave the team their first NFC East crown since 1991.

Records Fall - 1999


Brad Johnson (Below) completed the season with 316 completions - most ever by a Washington player. His 4,005 yards and 519 attempts are second in club history. Stephen Davis' 1,405 yards are the most ever by a Washington player. He led all NFC rushers, and earned his first birth to the Pro Bowl. Darrell Green increases his team records with his 50th interception and played in his 250th game.

Leadership Council - Jan. 2000

Owner Daniel M. Snyder introduced the Washington Redskins Leadership Council, the Redskins' foundation.

Homeward Bound - July 20, 2000

The team opens training camp at home for the first time, welcoming fans to the team facility in Ashburn, Va.



Alumni Recognized - Aug. 24, 2000

Alums Joe Gibbs, Dexter Manley and Art Monk are inducted into the Ring of Fame.

Turner Out, Robiskie In - 2000

Norv Turner was dismissed as Head Coach after 13 games. Terry Robiskie was named interim head coach to finish out the season on Dec. 4, 2000.

Centers Sets Mark - Dec. 24, 2000

Larry Centers became the NFL's all-time leader in catches by a running back with 685 receptions.

Smith "Sacks" the Record Books - Dec. 24, 2000

Bruce Smith sets NFL record with his 13th 10-sack season.

NFL Attendance Record - 2000

Washington set an NFL record for attendance with a season total of 647,424. Average home attendance at FedExField was 80,928.

Schottenheimer Takes Command - Jan. 3, 2001

Marty Schottenheimer signed on as the franchise's 24th head coach.

Return to Carlisle - July 29, 2001

Washington returned to Dickinson College in Carlisle, Pa., for training camp after a six-year hiatus, re-establishing a 32-year summer tradition (1963-94).

Washington Relief Fund - Sept. 13, 2001

The organization announced the establishment of the Relief Fund for the benefit of families of the victims of the September 11th tragedy at the Pentagon. Over the course of the season, the team raised over \$700,000.

Washington Makes NFL History - Nov. 25, 2001

Washington set an NFL record, becoming the first team in history to win five consecutive games after losing their first five. The team would go on to win eight of the last 11 games, following the 0-5 start.

More Records for Davis - Jan. 6, 2002

Stephen Davis became the first player in team history to rush for more than 1,000 yards for three consecutive seasons. He finished the 2001 campaign rushing for 1,432 yards on 356 carries, both career and team single-season records for the Pro Bowl running back.

Arrival of Head Ball Coach - Jan. 14, 2002

Owner Daniel M. Snyder announced former Heisman Trophy winner and offensive genius Steve Spurrier as the club's 25th head coach. Marvin Lewis, with his proven track record of defensive success, is brought on board shortly thereafter as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator, making the team a dangerous foe on both sides of the ball.

Allen Voted to the Hall - Feb. 2, 2002

George Allen, who coached Washington from 1971 to 1977 and posted a record of 67-30-1 and led them to two NFC Championships, was voted into the NFL Hall of Fame. Allen, after being named one of the 70 Greatest Washington players of all time, was enshrined in the Hall on Aug. 4, 2002.

Kickoff Overseas - Aug. 3, 2002

Head Coach Steve Spurrier made his Washington debut in a 38-7 victory over the San Francisco 49ers in the 2002 American Bowl in Osaka, Japan. Washington finished the game with 479 yards of offense, including 434 passing yards.

Off to a Good Start - 2002

Washington finished out the preseason with a 4-1 mark, setting a team record with 164 preseason points. The previous team record was 156 points, set in 1975 in six games.

IMPORTANT DATES

Naming 70 Greats - June 13, 2002

The 70 Greatest Players in team history were announced in June by a blue-ribbon panel, which selected the team's leading on-field contributors in celebration of the franchise's 70th Anniversary. Spanning the entire history of the team, since its founding in Boston in 1932, the 70 Greatest Players encompassed three head coaches and 67 players.

70th Anniversary Weekend - Oct. 2002

The 70 Greatest Players were honored in a weekend of festivities, culminating in a special halftime ceremony during a 31-26 Washington victory over the Indianapolis Colts. The celebration reunited the 70 Greats with a black-tie gala event, an alumni and media brunch, dinner party and pregame barbecue at FedExField. The anniversary season was also commemorated through "retro" uniforms worn at home games all year, featuring a one-season return to the team's spear-and-feather helmet logo, as well as jersey and pants colors and design that reflected back to the 1960s midpoint of the team's storied history.

Green's Last Game - Dec. 29, 2002

Darrell Green concluded his 20th and final season with the club and the NFL, defeating the longtime rival Dallas Cowboys, 20-14. During his 20 years, Green set an NFL record for consecutive seasons with at least one interception (19) and a team record for regular season games played (295) and started (258). In a special pre-game ceremony at the Dallas game, Green was honored by his teammates and by fans. His name was also added to the Ring of Fame.

Downright Defensive - 2002

Under the guidance of assistant head coach and defensive coordinator Marvin Lewis, Washington finished the season ranked 5th in the NFL in total defense, an improvement from 10th during the 2001 season. The club's defense ranked in the league's top-10 for the last three seasons.

Consistently Coles - Oct. 12, 2003

With his six receptions against Tampa Bay, Laveranues Coles set a modern day NFL record for at least five receptions in 19 consecutive games.

Bruce Sacks Record - Dec. 7, 2003

Bruce Smith broke the NFL all-time sack record against the Giants. Smith finished his career with an impressive 200 sacks.

Spurrier Resigns - Dec. 30, 2003

Steve Spurrier resigned as the 25th Head Coach in franchise history.

Gibbs Returns - Jan. 7, 2004

Owner Daniel M. Snyder announced that Joe Gibbs would return as Head Coach.

500th Win - Sept. 12, 2004

Washington earned the 500th franchise victory, defeating Tampa Bay 16-10.

Gibbs - Oct. 23, 2005

Head Coach Joe Gibbs earned his 150th overall victory against the San Francisco 49ers, with a decisive 52-17 win.

Franchise Records - 2005

Wide receiver Santana Moss and running back Clinton Portis both set team records at their respective positions. Moss broke Bobby Mitchell's record for most receiving yards in a season with 1,483. The previous mark was 1,436 set in 1963. Portis set a new record for rushing yards in a season with 1,516, previously held by Stephen Davis with 1,432 yards in 2001. Portis also recorded a franchise-high nine 100-yard rushing games in 2005.

Playoff Win - Jan. 7, 2005

Washington earned their first playoff victory since 1999, defeating the Tampa Bay Buccaneers by a score of 17-10 in the NFC Wild Card Playoff game in Tampa Bay.

Taylor Tragedy - Nov. 27, 2007

Washington Pro Bowl safety Sean Taylor died one day after he is shot by an intruder in his Miami home. Taylor's death devastated coaches and teammates. Meanwhile, fans created a memorial outside the facility honoring Taylor's memory.

In Taylor's Memory - Dec. 2, 2007

Sadness swept over FedExField as the organization and its fans mourned the tragic death of safety Sean Taylor just five days earlier. Fans left flowers, cards and mementos at a makeshift memorial outside the stadium. The team hosted a pregame tribute to Taylor, including a moving four-minute video on the Jumbotron. Washington lost to the Buffalo Bills, 17-16, but this was a day devoted to the memory of Taylor. A day after the game, the entire organization traveled to Miami for Taylor's funeral.

Gibbs Retirement - Jan. 8, 2008

Citing a need to spend more time with family, 67-year-old Hall of Fame Coach Joe Gibbs announced his retirement as Head Coach and President of the club.

Zorn Hired - Feb. 10, 2008

Owner Daniel M. Snyder welcomed Jim Zorn, a long-time Seattle Seahawks quarterback and assistant coach, as the franchise's 27th head coach, ushering in a new chapter in Washington history.

Monk and Green Inducted - Aug. 2, 2008

Wide Receiver Art Monk and cornerback Darrell Green are inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Zorn's First Win - Sept. 14, 2008

Head Coach Jim Zorn registered his first NFL victory as the team defeated the New Orleans Saints 29-24 in the regular season opener at FedExField.

Taylor Honored - Nov. 30, 2008

Sean Taylor was honored and placed in the Ring of Fame in an emotional pregame ceremony prior to the Washington vs. NY Giants game. Taylor became the 43rd member to be inducted. Taylor's father Pedro, fiancé Jackie, daughter Jackie and mother Donna were present to celebrate the life and accomplishments of Taylor in front of a capacity crowd at FedExField.

Bruce Smith Inducted - Aug. 8, 2009

Defensive End Bruce Smith is inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Allen Hired - Dec. 17, 2009

Bruce Allen, son of Pro Football Hall of Famer and Washington legend George Allen, is hired as Executive Vice President/General Manager.

Shanahan Takes Over - Jan. 6, 2010

Mike Shanahan, who won consecutive Super Bowls following the 1997 and 1998 seasons with the Denver Broncos, is hired as the club's Executive Vice President/Head Coach.

IMPORTANT DATES

Russ Grimm Inducted - Aug. 7, 2010

Russ Grimm becomes the first member of the beloved Hogs inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Shanahan's First Win - Sept 12, 2010

Head Coach Mike Shanahan registered his first victory with Washington on Sunday Night Football at home against the division rival Dallas Cowboys, 13-7. Linebacker Brian Orakpo's pass rush drew a holding penalty that negated a Cowboys' touchdown on the final play of the game, giving Washington the win.

DeAngelo Hall Ties Interception Record - Oct. 24, 2010

Cornerback DeAngelo Hall tied an NFL record and Washington record by totaling four interceptions against the Chicago Bears at Soldier Field in Week 7. He became the 19th NFL player and third Washington player to accomplish this feat in a game.

DeAngelo Hall Named Pro Bowl MVP - Jan. 30, 2011

Cornerback DeAngelo Hall, appearing in his third Pro Bowl, was named the game's MVP after he recorded an interception and returned a fumble 34 yards for a touchdown.

Hall of Fame Hanburger - Aug. 6, 2011

Legendary linebacker Chris Hanburger is inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

10th Year Anniversary of 9/11 - Sept. 11, 2011

Washington honors the victims of the Sept. 11, 2001 tragedy on the 10th anniversary of the terrorist attacks as the team hosts the New York Giants at FedExField in the 2011 season opener. Gen. Colin Powell tosses the ceremonial coin as the team opens the 2011 season with a 28-14 win against the eventual Super Bowl Champion Giants.

Chris Cooley Becomes Top Tight End - Sept. 11, 2011

Tight end Chris Cooley recorded two receptions against the New York Giants in the 2011 season opener to pass Jerry Smith for the franchise lead in receptions by a tight end.

Burgundy and Gold Goes Green - Sept. 18, 2011

Washington launches 8,000 solar panels at FedExField prior to the team's 22-21 win against the Arizona Cardinals. The panels were installed to be capable of meeting the stadium's power needs on non-game days and providing up to 20 percent of the needed electricity on game days – the equivalent of providing 300 homes with energy for a full year.

Richie Petitbon Recognized - Dec. 24, 2011

Former Washington player and coach Richie Petitbon is inducted as the 45th member of the team's Ring of Fame.

Blockbuster Trade - March 10, 2012

Washington and the St. Louis Rams officially announce that they have agreed to a trade that gives Washington the rights to the No. 2 overall pick in the 2012 NFL Draft. The league formally approved the deal on March 14. On April 26, the team goes on to select eventual AP Offensive Rookie of the Year Robert Griffin III with that pick.

Celebrating 80 Years - May 10, 2012

From the inside of the newly built Indoor Training Facility, the team launches their 80th Anniversary celebration. The organization would spend the offseason touring the D.C., Maryland and Virginia areas as part of its "Thank You Tour" to commemorate the anniversary with the fans. The event also featured the debut of the team's 1937-inspired alternate uniforms as well as the start of voting for the 10 newest additions to the 80 Greatest Players.

Clinton Portis Officially Retires - Aug. 23, 2012

Running back Clinton Portis officially announces his retirement from the NFL in a press conference at the team facility. He exited the NFL ranking second in franchise history in rushing yardage (6,824), carries (1,667) and rushing touchdowns (46).

Welcome to the NFL, Rookie - Sept. 9, 2012

In Week 1 at New Orleans, Robert Griffin III becomes the first rookie to start at quarterback for Washington in Week 1 since Norm Snead on Sept. 17, 1961. Griffin III becomes the first player in NFL history to compile 300-plus passing yards, two or more passing touchdowns and no interceptions in an NFL debut, leading Washington to a 40-32 win against the Saints.

"10 for 80" Honored - Nov. 4, 2012

At halftime of the team's Homecoming Game against Carolina, Washington honors the 10 members of the organization selected to complete the 80 Greatest Players. The honorees include LaVar Arrington, Bobby Beathard, Joe Bugel, Terry Hermeling, Jon Jansen, Roy Jefferson, Richie Petitbon, Clinton Portis, Chris Samuels and Sean Taylor.

Turkey Day Triumph - Nov. 22, 2012

Washington gets their first Thanksgiving Day win in Dallas in team history, defeating the Cowboys, 38-31. Washington explodes for 28 second-quarter points, and quarterback Robert Griffin III – who had a four-touchdown game vs. Philadelphia a week earlier – throws four touchdown passes to become the first player in franchise history to pass for four touchdowns in consecutive games.

Hawaii Bound - Dec. 26, 2012

The NFL announces that linebacker/special teamer Lorenzo Alexander, quarterback Robert Griffin III and tackle Trent Williams have been selected to the 2013 Pro Bowl. Linebackers Ryan Kerrigan and London Fletcher are later added to the roster, giving the club five Pro Bowlers for the first time since 1996.

How The East Was Won; Morris Surpasses Portis - Dec. 30, 2012

Washington secures its first NFC East title in 13 years with a 28-18 win against the Dallas Cowboys in a win-or-go-home tilt at FedExField. Washington rolls up 274 rushing yards in a game "flexed" into primetime by the NFL. In the process, rookie running back Alfred Morris rushes for 200 yards and pushes his season total to 1,613, breaking Clinton Portis' team record for rushing yards in a single season.

End of an Era - Jan. 11, 2013

After 30 seasons, the beloved "Holettes" decide to hang up their snouts, floppy hats and dresses in announcing their intent to retire. The group says it will continue to help raise money for local children's charities, just in more "incognito" fashion.

Rookie of the Year - Feb. 2, 2013

Robert Griffin III is named AP Offensive Rookie of the Year, making him the third Rookie of the Year in team history and the first since Mike Thomas in 1975.

Road Trip to Richmond - July 25, 2013

Washington holds their first Training Camp session at the brand new Bon Secours Washington Training Center in Richmond, Va. During the three-week span, more than 150,000 fans attend the team's inaugural camp in the capital.

Artful Performance By Garçon - Dec. 22, 2013

Wide receiver Pierre Garçon posts a career-high 11 receptions in Week 16 vs. Dallas, pushing his season total past Pro Football Hall of Famer Art Monk's team record for receptions in a single season (106 in 1984). Garçon would finish the season with a league-leading 113 receptions.

Here's Jay - Jan. 9, 2014

Jay Gruden is named the 29th head coach in franchise history. At 46 years of age, the former offensive coordinator for the Cincinnati Bengals becomes the team's youngest head coaching hire since hiring eventual Pro Football Hall of Famer Joe Gibbs at 40 years of age in 1981.



IMPORTANT DATES

Jay's First Win - Sept. 14, 2014

Jay Gruden earns his first win as head coach as the defense runs wild in a 41-10 home win against the Jacksonville Jaguars. The unit tied a team record with 10 sacks, including a team-record-tying four-sack effort from linebacker Ryan Kerrigan.

Rypien in the Ring - Oct. 19, 2014

Super Bowl XXVI MVP Mark Rypien is inducted as the 46th member of the Ring of Fame at halftime of an overtime win against the Tennessee Titans on Alumni Homecoming Weekend.

You Like That! Historic Comeback - Oct. 25, 2015

Washington overcomes a 24-0 second quarter deficit to post the largest comeback in team history in a 31-30 win against Tampa Bay. Following the game, quarterback Kirk Cousins exclaims "You like that!" while walking back to the locker room. The moment is captured on camera and goes viral, becoming a rallying cry for the team's NFC East championship run.

Bostic and Coleman Enter the Ring - Oct. 25, 2015 and Dec. 20, 2015

Center Jeff Bostic and linebacker Monte Coleman become the 47th and 48th members of the Ring of Fame. Bostic is enshrined during a Week 7 win vs. Tampa Bay and Coleman is honored during a Week 15 win vs. Buffalo.

Win No. 600... In Style - Dec. 26, 2015

Washington becomes the fifth NFL franchise to record 600 combined regular season and postseason wins all-time with a 38-24 win in Philadelphia. The victory also secures the team's 15th division title in team history.

Records Fall in Dallas - Jan. 3, 2016

Having already clinched the NFC East a week earlier, Washington faces the Cowboys in Week 17 with individual records on the line. Quarterback Kirk Cousins breaks the team's single-season passing yardage record during the game on a 28-yard pass to receiver Jamison Crowder. Later in the game, Crowder catches his 59th reception of the season, a team rookie record.

The Park Welcomes Inova - July 25, 2016

As the team departs for Training Camp, the team announces a new health and wellness partnership with Inova, including renaming the team's Ashburn headquarters to the Inova Sports Performance Center.

Washington Goes International - Oct. 30, 2016

Washington makes their European debut when they face the Cincinnati Bengals at Wembley Stadium in London. The back-and-forth game becomes one of the season's most entertaining, as the team storms back to force overtime, but a missed field goal in the extra frame results in a 27-27 draw.



Beathard Honored - Nov. 13, 2016

Former General Manager Bobby Beathard is inducted as the 49th member of the Ring of Fame at halftime of the team's victory against the Minnesota Vikings.

Pro Bowl Bound - Dec. 20, 2016

Four Washington players — linebacker Ryan Kerrigan, tight end Jordan Reed, guard Brandon Scherff and tackle Trent Williams — are selected to the 2017 Pro Bowl. Reed and Scherff's selections are their first of their careers, while Williams becomes only the third member of the franchise since 1970 to earn five consecutive Pro Bowl selections.

From MVP to Senior VP - June 13, 2017

Washington announces that Doug Williams, Super Bowl XXII MVP, has been promoted Senior Vice President of Player Personnel after three-plus years as a personnel executive with the team. Said Williams, "I've been around the circuit, but there's nothing like coming back here to a place that gave you an opportunity to be on top of the stage in football. Washington did that for me."

A Thanksgiving to Remember - Nov. 23, 2017

Washington hosts their first Thanksgiving home game in franchise history, earning a 20-10 win against the New York Giants. After the game, wide receiver Jamison Crowder, quarterback Kirk Cousins, linebacker Ryan Kerrigan and most of the offensive line chomp on turkey legs during postgame interviews with NBC's Michele Tafoya.

Pro Bowl Trio - Dec. 19, 2017

Linebacker Ryan Kerrigan, guard Brandon Scherff and tackle Trent Williams all earn Pro Bowl honors. Together, Scherff and Williams became the first Washington offensive line duo collectively named to the Pro Bowl in consecutive seasons since the duo of Russ Grimm and Joe Jacoby earned selections four straight times following the 1983-86 seasons.

Rings for Replacements - June 12, 2018

After 31 years, Washington honors replacement players from the team's 1987 squad with Super Bowl rings in a ceremony at Inova Sports Performance Center. Charley Casserly, who served as the team's Assistant General Manager in 1987 and helped build the replacement squad, hosted the event and welcomed more than 25 players in attendance. The ceremony culminated with the surprise appearance of 1987 Super Bowl champions Doug Williams, Gary Clark and Dexter Manley, who joined the replacement players for a group photo.

Beathard Inducted into Hall of Fame - Aug. 4, 2018

Former Washington General Manager Bobby Beathard was enshrined in Canton, Ohio at the Pro Football Hall of Fame as a member of the Class of 2018. Beathard helped guide the franchise to three Super Bowl appearances, including victories in Super Bowl XVII and XXII during his 11 year tenure. In his 11 seasons as general manager the team posted a .625 winning percentage which was the best mark in the NFC and second best mark in the NFL in that span.

600th Regular Season Victory - Dec. 16, 2018

With a 16-13 victory over the Jacksonville Jaguars at TIAA Bank Stadium in Jacksonville, Fla., Washington became just the fifth team in NFL history to record 600 regular season victories. Washington joined the Chicago Bears, Green Bay Packers, New York Giants and Pittsburgh Steelers as the only franchises in NFL history to accomplish the feat. Head Coach Jay Gruden presented Owner Daniel Snyder with a game ball following the victory.

London Fletcher Enters Ring of Fame - Sept. 23, 2019

London Fletcher is inducted as the 50th member of the Ring of Fame at halftime of the team's Monday Night Football matchup against the Chicago Bears.

IMPORTANT DATES

Samuels Enters the Ring - Oct. 20, 2019

Chris Samuels is inducted as the 51st member of the Ring of Fame at halftime of the team's matchup against the San Francisco 49ers in Week 7 at FedExField.

Way and Scherff Selected to Pro Bowl - Dec. 17, 2019

Tress Way and Brandon Scherff are both named to the 2019 Pro Bowl in Orlando, Fla. Way earns his first Pro Bowl selection and is named the starting punter for the NFC, becoming the first Washington punter since Matt Turk in 1998 to be named a Pro Bowler. Scherff earns his third Pro Bowl selection, becoming the ninth offensive lineman in franchise history to earn three-plus Pro Bowl selections.

Entering the Rivera Era - Jan. 1, 2020

Owner Dan Snyder announces that Ron Rivera will become the 30th head coach in franchise history. The two-time Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year brings more than 20 years of coaching experience to Washington along with nine at the helm of the Carolina Panthers.

AP Given Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award - Feb. 1, 2020

Adrian Peterson becomes the sixth player in NFL history and first member of the franchise to earn the Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award at NFL Honors in Miami, Fla. The award is given to an NFL player who best demonstrates the qualities of on-field sportsmanship, including fair play, respect for the game and opponents, and integrity in competition.

Washington and Jennifer King Make History - Feb. 10, 2020

Washington becomes the first team in NFL history to hire a female African American full-year coaching intern with the hiring of Jennifer King. King will primarily work with the running backs and will spend an entire calendar year with the team helping in the offseason and draft preparation all the way through the end of the 2020 regular season.

Dan Snyder Pulls Scouts Off the Road - March 12, 2020

In response to the rapid spread of COVID-19, Owner Dan Snyder becomes the first NFL owner to pull all scouts off the road and cancel all Top 40 visits in preparation for the NFL Draft. The NFL and all 31 other teams eventually followed suit.

Washington Opens FedExField to National Guard - March 21, 2020

The organization opens the FedExField parking lots to the Maryland National Guard to operate a COVID-19 testing site for residents of Prince George's County. Owner Dan Snyder also makes a \$100,000 to the Capital Area Food Bank to help feed families devastated by the global pandemic.

Washington Drafts DE Chase Young - April 23, 2020

Picking the highest in the NFL Draft since 2012, Washington selects defensive end Chase Young out of Ohio State. Young is widely regarded as one of the best edge rushing prospects to come out of college in the past decade. Young holds the single-season sack record at Ohio State with 16.5 sacks as a junior in 2019.

Mitchell's Number is Retired - June 20, 2020

Owner Dan Snyder announces that the team is retiring the No. 49 in honor of the late Bobby Mitchell. Mitchell's number becomes only the second ever retired in franchise history. The team also announces the renaming of the lower level of FedExField in honor of Mitchell.

Washington Football Team - June 20, 2020

After undergoing a thorough review of the organization's nickname, the team announces that they will call themselves the Washington Football Team. The former nickname and logo are both officially retired. The team also announces that the process for finding a new team name will continue and the franchise will undertake an in-depth branding process to properly include player, alumni, fan, community and sponsor input.

Washington Starts New Era with Win - Sept. 13, 2020

Washington defeated Philadelphia 27-17 to secure their first win under head coach Ron Rivera. In the victory, first-round draft selection Chase Young made his NFL debut and recorded 1.5 sacks in the victory.

QB Alex Smith Returns to Live Action - Oct. 11, 2020

QB Alex Smith made his first appearance in an NFL game since suffering a severe leg injury in November of 2018. Smith came off the bench to backup Kyle Allen who exited with an injury.

Thanksgiving Day Victory at Dallas - Nov 26, 2020

Washington defeated Dallas 41-16 on Thanksgiving Day. RB Antonio Gibson rushed for three touchdowns becoming the first Washington player to rush for three touchdowns since Robert Kelley did so on November 11, 2016.

Washington Defeats Undefeated Pittsburgh - Dec. 7, 2020

Washington went in to Heinz Field in Pittsburgh and knocked off the 10-0 Steelers, defeating the club 23-17. TE Logan Thomas had nine receptions for 98 yards and a touchdown.

DE Chase Young and T Brandon Scherff Named to 2020 Pro Bowl Roster - Dec. 21, 2020

Scherff was selected as the starting guard for the NFC. His selection is the fourth of his career (2016-17; 2019-20). Scherff joined Trent Williams, Chris Samuels, Len Hauss, Joe Jacoby and Russ Grimm as the only Washington offensive linemen to be selected to the Pro Bowl four-plus times. Young became the eighth rookie in Washington history to be named to a Pro Bowl and the first since quarterback Robert Griffin III in 2012. He became the first defensive rookie since linebacker Brian Orakpo in 2009. Young was the third defensive rookie in franchise history to be named to a Pro Bowl joining Orakpo and Pro Football Hall of Famer Paul Krause. He became the youngest player in Washington history to be selected to the Pro Bowl at 21-years old.

Washington Defeats Philadelphia to win NFC East - Jan. 3, 2021

In a must-win, Week 17 game, Washington finished off Philadelphia, 20-14, to clinch their first NFC East title since 2015. In the victory, DE Chase Young recorded a sack, three QBHs and one fumble recovery. WR Terry McLaurin caught a five-yard touchdown to amass 1,000 yards in a season for the first time in his career.

Washington Hires Martin Mayhew as General Manager - Jan. 21, 2021

Mayhew came to Washington with 20 seasons of NFL experience as an executive, including eight seasons as the general manager of the Detroit Lions. He played for Washington from 1989-92 and was a member of the Super Bowl XXVI team. Mayhew spent the 2017-20 seasons with the San Francisco 49ers. He held the position of senior personnel executive for the franchise from 2017-18. Mayhew assisted first-time general manager John Lynch and was a major contributor for a personnel department that was vital in the team's Super Bowl appearance in 2019.

Washington Hires Marty Hurney as EVP Football/Player Personnel - Jan. 21, 2021

Hurney is named Washington's EVP Football/Player Personnel. He joined the club with 28 seasons of NFL experience as an executive and rejoined the franchise where he started his NFL career as a member of the team's public relations department. Hurney was named the Carolina Panthers General Manager in 2002 and held the position until 2012. He was then brought back as the club's interim general manager in 2017 and maintained the official role from 2018-2020. During Hurney's tenure as general manager, the Panthers appeared in the postseason four times, with two NFC South titles, two trips to the NFC Championship game and an appearance in Super Bowl XXXVIII.

IMPORTANT DATES

Washington Names Jennifer King Assistant Running Backs Coach - Jan. 26, 2021

Jennifer King is promoted to assistant running backs coach. The historic hire makes her the first African American female full-time assistant coach in NFL history. King also becomes the second female assistant position coach in the NFL behind Tampa Bay Buccaneers assistant defensive line coach Lori Locust.

Ron Rivera Named NFC Coach of the Year by the Committee of the 101 - Jan. 28, 2021

Head Coach Ron Rivera is named the NFC Coach of the Year by the Committee of the 101. It is Rivera's third time receiving the honor (2013 & 2015) and he joins George Allen (1971 & 1976) and Joe Gibbs (1983) as the only coaches in Washington franchise history to earn the honor. Rivera joins Dick Vermeil as the only coaches to earn the honor three times in their careers.

DE Chase Young named AP Defensive Rookie of the Year - Feb. 6, 2021

Chase Young put up impressive numbers in the 2020 NFL season and was rewarded for it by being named the AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. The second overall selection in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Young played in 15 games (all starts) and led all NFL rookies with 7.5 sacks. He posted 44 total tackles (32 solo) and he added four passes defensed, 12 quarterback hits, four forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and a fumble return for a touchdown. Young was selected as both NFC Defensive Player and NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month for December, and he was a PFWA All-NFC honoree – the only 2020 rookie to be selected to an all-conference squad. Young became the eighth rookie in Washington history to be named to a Pro Bowl and the first since quarterback Robert Griffin III in 2012. He was the first defensive rookie since linebacker Brian Orakpo in 2009. Young is the third defensive rookie in franchise history to be named to a Pro Bowl joining Orakpo and Pro Football Hall of Famer Paul Krause.

QB Alex Smith named AP Comeback of the Year - Feb. 6, 2021

Washington QB Alex Smith is named the AP Comeback Player of the Year for 2020. Smith becomes the first player in Washington franchise history to win the award and the first NFC East player to earn the honor since Philadelphia quarterback Michael Vick did so in 2010. Smith becomes the third-consecutive quarterback to win the award, joining Tennessee's Ryan Tannehill (2019) and Andrew Luck (2018). During the 2020 season, Smith made his first appearance since suffering a severe leg injury on November 18, 2018. It was a comeback that surmounted 693 days and several major obstacles. Smith made his first start of the season on November 15, 2020 and threw for a career-high 390 yards while completing a career-high 38 passes.

Washington Retires legendary Safety Sean Taylor's No. 21 - Oct. 17, 2021

Washington officially retires S Sean Taylor's number 21 against the Kansas City Chiefs. It is only the second number ever retired by the franchise.

Washington Football Team Officially Becomes Washington Commanders - Feb. 2, 2022

The Washington Commanders became the team's official identity on Feb. 2, 2022, with the unveiling of the team's new logo, helmets and jersey's.

In 1974, the NFL established overtime to decide regular season games. Since then, Washington has compiled a 25-16-2 record in overtime games.

Nov. 2, 1975 - RFK Stadium Washington 30, Dallas 24

Ken Houston returned a Roger Staubach interception 14 yards, and Billy Kilmer scored the winning touchdown after 6:34 of overtime action.

Nov. 16, 1975 - Busch Stadium St. Louis 20, Washington 17

The Cards scored with 20 seconds remaining on a catch by Mel Gray to force overtime. St. Louis won the coin toss and marched to set up a 37-yard Jim Bakken field goal to win after seven minutes of play.

Nov. 23, 1975 - RFK Stadium Oakland 26, Washington 23

George Blanda's 27-yard field goal decided the contest after 7:13.

Sept. 27, 1976 - Veterans Stadium Washington 20, Philadelphia 17

Mark Moseley's 29-yard field goal won the Monday night game with 12:49 elapsed in overtime.

Nov. 12, 1978 - RFK Stadium Washington 16, New York Giants 13

Washington won on Moseley's 45-yard field goal after 3:32 elapsed.

Nov. 15, 1981 - Giants Stadium Washington 30, New York Giants 27

Moseley kicked a 49-yard field goal on the game's final play to force overtime and a 48-yard field goal to win with 3:44 elapsed.

Sept. 12, 1982 - Veterans Stadium Washington 37, Philadelphia 34

Washington sent the game into overtime on a 48-yard field goal by Moseley with :01 to play. Moseley won the game with a 26-yarder.

Nov. 2, 1986 - RFK Stadium Washington 44, Minnesota 38

Jay Schroeder engineered a four-play, 63-yard drive ending with a Gary Clark 38-yard touchdown pass.

Dec. 26, 1987 - Metrodome Washington 27, Minnesota 24

Ricky Sanders' 51-yard touchdown reception from Doug Williams with less than two minutes remaining tied the score at 24. Ali Haji-Sheikh kicked the 26-yard game-winning field goal after Sanders' 36-yard kickoff return in overtime.

Dec. 17, 1988 - Riverfront Stadium Cincinnati 20, Washington 17

Jim Breech connected from 20 yards out seven minutes into sudden death.

Nov. 4, 1990 - Pontiac Silverdome Washington 41, Detroit 38

Chip Lohmiller's 34-yard field goal 9:10 into overtime capped the Washington comeback that equalled the team's greatest in history. Down by 21 points in the third quarter and 17 points entering the fourth, Jeff Rutledge's 12-yard run tied the game with :18 seconds remaining.

Nov. 3, 1991 - RFK Stadium Washington 16, Houston 13

Darrell Green intercepted a Warren Moon pass which set-up Lohmiller's 41-yard field goal 5:01 into overtime moving Washington to a 9-0 record. The Oilers tied the game with less than two minutes in regulation and had a chance to win after Brian Mitchell fumbled the kickoff, but Ian Howfield's 33-yard attempt

sailed wide left.

Oct. 16, 1994 - RFK Stadium Arizona 19, Washington 16

Arizona scored the tying touchdown with :19 left in regulation. Arizona's game-winner was set up by Terry Hoage, who intercepted a Heath Shuler pass and returned it 12 yards to the 23. Peterson kicked the game-winning 29-yard field goal.

Oct. 8, 1995 - Veterans Stadium Philadelphia 37, Washington 34

Down 10 points in the 4th quarter, Gus Frerotte guided the team back with a touchdown pass to Henry Ellard and Eddie Murray's 46-yard field goal tied it up with :52 left. In OT, Washington stalled on its opening drive and the Eagles' Gary Anderson won the game with a 35-yard field goal.

Oct. 22, 1995 - RFK Stadium Washington 36, Detroit 30

Trailing 30-27, Eddie Murray's 39-yard field goal tied it with :04 to play. Darrell Green's seven-yard interception return of a Scott Mitchell pass for a touchdown 3:41 into overtime ended the game.

Nov. 10, 1996 - RFK Stadium Arizona 37, Washington 34

In one of the most bizarre games in Washington history, the team led by 14 points in the fourth quarter only to squander the lead. The Cardinals won the coin toss and drove to the Washington 15, only to have Kevin Butler miss. Scott Blanton booted the apparent 38-yard game-winner, but a holding penalty forced a retry from 48 that went wide left. Arizona then missed a 29-yarder that was negated because the Redskins were offside. Butler's third attempt was good from 32 yards.

Nov. 24, 1996 - RFK Stadium San Francisco 19, Washington 16

San Francisco's William Floyd's 1-yard touchdown run tied the game in regulation. After winning the coin toss in overtime, the 49ers' Jeff Wilkins hit a 38-yard field goal to win.

Sept. 14, 1997 - Jack Kent Cooke Stadium Washington 19, Arizona 13

In the inaugural game at Jack Kent Cooke Stadium, Washington won with 13:24 left in overtime when Gus Frerotte, sidestepping a heavy rush, threw a 40-yard strike to a leaping Michael Westbrook in the end zone. The winning points were set up two plays earlier when rookie defensive end Kenard Lang forced and recovered a fumble on the Washington 35-yard line.

Nov. 23, 1997 - Jack Kent Cooke Stadium Washington 7, NY Giants 7

In overtime, Washington turned the ball over three times, but the defense forced two punts and the Giants missed a 54-yard field goal. With under two minutes remaining, Washington drove to the Giants 36-yard line, but a 54-yard field goal attempt fell short with 11 seconds left in overtime.

Sept. 12, 1999 - FedExField Dallas 41, Washington 35

Dallas stopped the club's first overtime drive and then scored on a 76-yard bomb from Troy Aikman to Rocket Ismail.

Nov. 28, 1999 - FedExField Washington 20, Philadelphia 17

Brett Conway's game-winning 27-yard FG was set up by a 48-yard kickoff return by James Thrash, which opened the overtime period. The Eagles never had the ball.

Dec. 26, 1999 - 3Com Park Washington 26, San Francisco 20

Washington overcame a 10-point fourth quarter deficit to win their ninth game of the year and clinch the NFC East. Brad Johnson's QB sneak from the 1-yard line with 3:28 left in regulation

sent the game into the extra period. On the opening drive, Johnson connected with Larry Centers for a 33-yard TD.

Oct. 1, 2000 - FedExField Washington 20, Tampa Bay 17

Tampa Bay forced the overtime when Martin Gramatica connected on a 42-yard field goal as the regulation clock fell to 0:00. 10:51 into the extra period, Deion Sanders ignited the crowd with a 57-yard punt return, setting up the game winning 20-yard field goal by Michael Husted.

Oct. 21, 2001 - FedExField Washington 17, Carolina 14

Placekicker Brett Conway kicked a 23-yard field goal in overtime to seal Washington's first victory of the season and the first under Marty Schottenheimer, 17-14. Washington forced overtime by overcoming a 14-point deficit in the fourth quarter thanks to a 67-yard interception return for touchdown by LaVar Arrington and an 85-yard touchdown pass from Tony Banks to Rod Gardner.

Sept. 21, 2003 - FedExField New York Giants 24, Washington 21

With less than five minutes left in regulation, Washington overcame a 21-10 deficit to send the game into overtime. The Giants won the toss and drove downfield from their own 6-yard line. Kicker Matt Bryant connected on a 29-yard field goal to cap off New York's first scoring drive since the second quarter and seal the 24-21 victory.

Oct. 2, 2005 - FedExField Washington 20, Seattle 17

With a chance to win the game at the end of regulation with 0:01 left on the clock, Seattle kicker Josh Brown missed a 47-yard field goal, sending the game into overtime. After winning the coin toss, Washington went on a 5:31 drive that culminated with a Nick Novak 39-yard field goal to seal Washington's victory over the Seahawks.

Nov. 27, 2005 - FedExField San Diego 23, Washington 17

San Diego running back LaDainian Tomlinson scored a 32-yard touchdown run with 3:37 remaining to tie the game at 17. With 0:35 remaining, Washington had an opportunity to take the lead with a 53-yard field goal but the ball sailed wide right. In overtime, San Diego ran two plays that culminated in a 41-yard touchdown run, again by Tomlinson to seal the victory.

Oct. 1, 2006 - FedExField Washington 36, Jacksonville 30

Jacksonville sent the game into overtime with 0:06 on the clock when kicker Josh Scobee connected on a 41-yard field goal. Washington won the coin toss and proceeded to take the ball 80 yards on three plays for the game-winning score. Quarterback Mark Brunell connected with wide receiver Santana Moss for a 68-yard touchdown pass to seal the win.

Dec. 24, 2006 - Edward Jones Dome St. Louis 37, Washington 31

Washington kicker Shaun Suisham nailed a field goal with 1:15 remaining in regulation to tie the score at 31 and send it into overtime. St. Louis came back in overtime and, six minutes into the extra time, running back Steven Jackson took a handoff 21 yards for the game winning touchdown.

Sept. 9, 2007 - FedExField Washington 16, Miami 13

In overtime, Washington won the coin toss and elected to receive. Running backs Clinton Portis and Ladell Betts combined for 46 rushing yards and quarterback Jason Campbell completed a key third-down pass to tight end Chris Cooley, keeping the drive alive. As soon as Washington got into field goal range, kicker Shaun Suisham nailed the 39-yard field goal to seal the victory.

Nov. 4, 2007 - Meadowlands Washington 23, New York Jets 20

Jets kicker Mike Nugent connected on a 30-yard field goal with 0:15 left in regulation to tie the game at 20-20 and send the game into overtime. Washington running back Clinton Portis bulldozed his way down the field in overtime, setting up the game-winning 46-yard field goal by kicker Shaun Suisham.

Dec. 6, 2009 - FedExField New Orleans 33, Washington 30

Saints quarterback Drew Brees drove 80 yards at the end of regulation to tie the game at 30-30. In overtime, the Saints marched down the field setting up an 18-yard field goal by kicker Garrett Hartley to seal the victory.

Sept. 19, 2010 - FedExField Houston 30, Washington 27

After holding the Texans on the first possession of overtime, Washington drove to the Houston 34-yard line, but kicker Graham Gano pushed a 52-yard attempt wide right. On the ensuing drive, Neil Rackers connected on a 35-yard field goal to give Houston the win.

Oct. 10, 2010 - FedExField Washington 16, Green Bay 13

LaRon Landry intercepted an Aaron Rodgers pass on Green Bay's second overtime possession and Washington drove 24 yards to set up a game-winning 33-yard field goal by kicker Graham Gano in the team's Week 5 win against the eventual Super Bowl champions.

Nov. 21, 2010 - LP Field Washington 19, Tennessee 16

After missing a potential game-winning field goal at the end of regulation, Graham Gano redeemed himself in overtime, capping off a 10-play, 57-yard drive with a 48-yarder on the club's first overtime possession to secure a 19-16 road win.

Dec. 26, 2010 - EverBank Field Washington 20, Jacksonville 17

A 20-yard touchdown run by Jacksonville quarterback David Garrard in the final three minutes of regulation helped the Jaguars force overtime. Jacksonville won the toss and elected to receive, but on their third offensive play of overtime, cornerback Kevin Barnes intercepted Garrard, setting up Graham Gano for a 31-yard game-winning field goal.

Nov. 20, 2011 - FedExField Dallas 27, Washington 24

Washington quarterback Rex Grossman lofted a perfect fade to receiver Donté Stallworth in the corner of the end zone with 14 seconds remaining in regulation to force overtime. Washington missed a 52-yard field goal attempt on the first possession of overtime, and Dallas responded as kicker Dan Bailey hit a 39-yard field goal above the right upright for a Dallas victory.

Dec. 9, 2012 - FedExField Washington 31, Baltimore 28

Baltimore took an eight-point lead with less than five minutes to play, but Washington quarterbacks Robert Griffin III and Kirk Cousins led a 13-play, 88-yard drive to tie the game at 28-28. Cousins, in place of an injured Griffin III, threw an 11-yard touchdown pass to Pierre Garçon and followed it with a two-point conversion on a quarterback draw. In overtime, Washington forced the eventual Super Bowl champion Ravens to go three-and-out, and after a 64-yard punt return by rookie Richard Crawford, kicker Kai Forbath hit a 34-yard game-winning field goal.

Leading 24-21 on Homecoming Weekend, the team's defense faced first-and-goal from its own 1-yard line with 21 seconds remaining. After stopping Danny Woodhead on first down, Washington forced two Philip Rivers incompletions and forced the Chargers to settle for a game-tying 19-yard field goal by Nick Novak. Washington took the ball on the first possession of overtime and promptly drove 78 yards in 10 plays, winning the game on fullback Darrel Young's team-record-tying third rushing touchdown of the day.

Oct. 27, 2014 – AT&T Stadium

Washington 20, Dallas 17

Led by quarterback Colt McCoy in his first start with the team, Washington earned their first overtime win against the rival Cowboys since Nov. 2, 1975. On Monday Night Football, McCoy completed 25-of-30 passes for 299 yards, including engineering a nine-play, 58-yard drive culminating in a 40-yard Kai Forbath field goal on overtime's first possession. Rookie cornerback Bashaud Breeland batted away a fourth down pass on the ensuing Cowboys possession, giving the team a 20-17 win.

Oct. 11, 2015 – Georgia Dome

Atlanta 25, Washington 19

Washington trailed by three with 24 seconds remaining in regulation. Quarterback Kirk Cousins led the Redskins 46 yards in four plays, and kicker Dustin Hopkins hit a then-career-long 52-yard field goal with no time remaining to force overtime with the teams tied at 19-19. Washington received the ball to start overtime, but on the seventh play of the drive, wide receiver Ryan Grant slipped in his route, allowing Falcons cornerback Robert Alford to intercept a Cousins pass and race 59 yards down the right sideline for the game-winning touchdown.

Oct. 30, 2016 – Wembley Stadium

Washington 27, Cincinnati 27

In Washington's first game in London, Washington and Cincinnati treated an international audience to a back-and-forth game that featured five lead changes. Trailing 27-24 with 3:15 remaining, quarterback Kirk Cousins engineered a 10-play, 45-yard drive to set-up kicker Dustin Hopkins for a game-tying 40-yard field goal with 1:07 remaining in regulation. In overtime, Hopkins pulled a potential game-winning 34-yard field goal wide left. Washington forced a fumble on the Bengals' ensuing possession, and a potential Hail Mary pass for the Redskins on their next drive sailed out of bounds, resulting in the team's second tie of the overtime era.

Nov. 19, 2016 – Mercedes-Benz Superdome

New Orleans 34, Washington 31

A battered Washington squad led the eventual NFC North champion Saints, 31-16, with under six minutes remaining in New Orleans, but the Saints engineered touchdown drives of 75 yards and 87 yards and converted a two-point conversion to send the game to overtime at 31-31. After a Washington three-and-out to open the extra period, the Saints drove 51 yards to set up Wil Lutz's game-winning 28-yard field goal.

Dec. 22, 2019 – FedExField

NY Giants 41, Washington 35

In a game that looked like it was going to get out of hand early, Washington outscored the New York Giants 14-0 in the fourth quarter to force overtime. New York won the coin toss and elected to receive and QB Daniel Jones led an 11 play, 66 yard drive that was capped with a three yard touchdown pass to TE Kaden Smith to seal the victory. The loss sealed Washington's fate finishing last in the NFC East, but guaranteed the team the No. 2 overall selection in the 2020 NFL Draft.
