EAGLES AND FALCONS KICK OFF SEASON ON THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 6

It's time to get "Back to Football!"

The 2018 season begins with the NFL's annual primetime kickoff game. The opener on Thursday, September 6 on NBC (8:20 PM ET) will feature the Super Bowl champion Philadelphia Eagles hosting the Atlanta Falcons at Lincoln Financial Field in a battle of the NFC's past two Super Bowl representatives.

2018 KICKOFF WEEKEND NOTES

Kickoff Weekend begins on Thursday, September 6 in primetime on NBC when the defending Super Bowl champion Philadelphia Eagles host the Atlanta Falcons. Below is a sampling of notable active NFL Kickoff streaks:

- The Super Bowl LII champion PHILADELPHIA EAGLES, who open the season at home against the ATLANTA FALCONS, have won their past two Kickoff Weekend games and six of their past seven.
- The defending AFC champion **NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS** open the 2018 season at home against the **HOUSTON TEXANS**. The Patriots have won eight of their past nine home openers on Kickoff Weekend.
- The **DENVER BRONCOS**, who start the season at home against the **SEATTLE SEAHAWKS**, have posted a 38-19-1 (.575) record on Kickoff Weekend, the top mark in the AFC. Denver has won its past six Kickoff Weekend games, the longest active streak in the NFL.
- The defending NFC North champion MINNESOTA VIKINGS, who open the season hosting SAN FRANCISCO, have won their past three home games on Kickoff Weekend.
- $\cdot \text{The GREEN BAY PACKERS} \ \text{host the CHICAGO BEARS} \ \text{in a division showdown on Kickoff Weekend. With a win percentage} \\$ of .592, the Packers (55-39-3) and Bears (54-39-5) are tied for the best Kickoff Weekend winning percentage in the NFL. The Packers have won their past three Kickoff Weekend games, the longest streak in the NFC.
- The TENNESSEE TITANS, who made the playoffs last season for the first time since 2008, face the MIAMI DOLPHINS on the road to start 2018. The Titans have won their past four road openers, the longest active streak in the NFL.

HOME SWEET HOME: The **SEATTLE SEAHAWKS**, who host Dallas in Week 3, have won nine consecutive home openers, the longest active streak in the league... the PITTSBURGH STEELERS, who open at home in Week 2 against Kansas City, have the most wins (50) among AFC teams in home openers.

HEAD COACHES: New England's **BILL BELICHICK** is 15-8 (.652) on Kickoff Weekend and his 15 wins are the most among active head coaches...Belichick and Kansas City's ANDY REID (11-8; .579) are the only active head coaches who have won at least 10 Kickoff Weekend games...Green Bay's MIKE MC CARTHY and Reid have won three consecutive games on Kickoff Weekend, the longest current streak among active head coaches... VANCE JOSEPH (1-0) of the Broncos, DIRK KOETTER (1-0) of the Buccaneers, SEAN MC DERMOTT (1-0) of the Bills, SEAN MC VAY (1-0) of the Rams and DOUG PEDERSON (2-0) of the Eagles are the only active head coaches with perfect records on Kickoff Weekend...and five head coaches - Chicago's MATT NAGY, the Lions' MATT PATRICIA, the Colts' FRANK REICH, the Titans' MIKE VRABEL and the Cardinals' STEVE WILKS - make their Kickoff Weekend debuts in 2018.

HOPE SPRINGS ETERNAL

New teams making the playoffs and winning divisions, consistent teams excelling once again, records falling and young players making their mark all helped shape the story of the 2017 season.

Week 17 came right down to the wire as three playoff spots and one division title – the NFC South – were decided on the last day of the season. The excitement of Week 17 was due in part to having 16 divisional games played on the season's final day, a tradition instituted in 2010.

Every team enters the 2018 season with a trip to Atlanta for Super Bowl LIII in mind and below are a few reasons why.

- Five of the eight divisions in 2017 were won by a team that finished in third or fourth place in the division the previous season Jacksonville (AFC South), the Los Angeles Rams (NFC West), Minnesota (NFC North), New Orleans (NFC South) and Philadelphia (NFC East).
- Since the 12-team playoff format was adopted in 1990, at least four teams have qualified for the playoffs in every season that were not in the postseason the year before. Eight teams that missed the postseason in 2016 Buffalo (9-7), Carolina (11-5), Jacksonville (10-6), Los Angeles Rams (11-5), Minnesota (13-3), New Orleans (11-5), Philadelphia (13-3) and Tennessee (9-7) accomplished the feat in 2017, tied with the 2003 season for the most such teams since 1990.
- The Eagles, who finished last in the NFC East with a 7-9 record in 2016, became the second team since 2003 to go from "worst-to-first" en route to a Super Bowl victory, joining the 2009 New Orleans Saints.
- The Jaguars, who finished in last place in the AFC South in 2016, won their first division title since realignment in 2002 last season and advanced to the AFC Championship Game.

- Fresh off its first Super Bowl in franchise history, the PHILADELPHIA EAGLES begin their quest to repeat as champions as the race to Atlanta's Mercedes-Benz Stadium for Super Bowl LIII kicks off. Only eight teams have repeated as champions since the first Super Bowl in 1967, with the 2004 NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (Super Bowls XXXVIII and XXXIX) being the last team to accomplish the feat.
- Seven teams enter the 2018 season with a new head coach STEVE WILKS in Arizona, MATT NAGY in Chicago, MATT PATRICIA in Detroit, FRANK REICH in Indianapolis, PAT SHURMUR with the New York Giants, JON GRUDEN in Oakland and MIKE VRABEL in Tennessee.
- Five quarterbacks Oklahoma's BAKER MAYFIELD (No. 1 overall, Cleveland), USC's SAM DARNOLD (No. 3, New York Jets), Wyoming's JOSH ALLEN (No. 7, Buffalo), UCLA's JOSH ROSEN (No. 10, Arizona) and Louisville's LAMAR JACKSON (No. 32, Baltimore) were selected in the first round of the 2018 NFL Draft, marking the third time that at least five quarterbacks have been selected in the Draft's opening round since the inception of the common draft in 1967

At least one rookie quarterback has started Week 1 in 10 consecutive seasons, the longest streak in the NFL since at least 1950.

• Several notable players were on the move during the offseason, including quarterbacks KIRK COUSINS (Minnesota), ALEX SMITH (Washington) and TYROD TAYLOR (Cleveland); wide receivers JARVIS LANDRY (Cleveland), JORDY NELSON (Oakland), MICHAEL CRABTREE (Baltimore) and BRANDIN COOKS (Los Angeles Rams); tight end JIMMY GRAHAM (Green Bay); guard ANDREW NORWELL (Jacksonville); tackle NATE SOLDER (New York Giants); defensive end ROBERT QUINN (Miami); defensive tackles DONTARI POE (Carolina), SHELDON RICHARDSON (Minnesota), NDAMUKONG SUH (Los Angeles Rams) and MUHAMMAD WILKERSON (Green Bay); cornerbacks MALCOLM BUTLER (Tennessee), MARCUS PETERS (Los Angeles Rams), RICHARD SHERMAN (San Francisco) and AQIB TALIB (Los Angeles Rams); and safety TYRANN MATHIEU (Houston).

 In each of the past two seasons, a rookie running back has led the NFL in rushing yards – Dallas' EZEKIEL ELLIOTT (1,631) in 2016 and Kansas City's KAREEM HUNT (1,327) in 2017. Three running backs – SAQUON BARKLEY (No. 2 overall, New York Giants, right), RASHAAD PENNY (No. 27, Seattle) and SONY MICHEL (No. 31, New England) – were selected in the first round of the 2018 NFL Draft.



FROM WORST TO FIRST

Competitive balance, one of the hallmarks of the NFL, gives fans hope entering each season.

For the 14th time in the past 15 seasons, at least one team finished in first place in its division the season after finishing in last or tied for last place. In fact, of the 46 teams in league history to go from "worst-to-first," 23 of them have done so in the past 15 years (2003-17), including an NFL-record three such teams in 2005 and 2006.

After finishing in last place in their divisions in 2016, the **JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS** (AFC South) and **PHILADELPHIA EAGLES** (NFC East) each turned it around to win their respective divisions last season. The Eagles won 13 games to claim the NFC East crown en route to their Super Bowl LII victory. The Jaguars won 10 games in 2017 to capture the AFC South title, rebounding from a 3-13 season in 2016 to win their division for the first time since 1999.

Since 2003, the NFL's 23 teams to go from "worst-to-first" in their division are the most among the four major professional sports leagues in the United States.

In the NBA, only two teams since the 2003-04 season have finished first in their division after placing in last or tied for last the previous season. There have been seven such teams to accomplish the feat in the past 15 seasons in both MLB and the NHL.



Getting off to a strong start is important.

Over the past 10 years, six teams – **DENVER**, **NEW ENGLAND**, **BALTIMORE**, **ATLANTA**, **GREEN BAY** and **DALLAS** – have a winning percentage of at least .600 through the season's first month. Those six clubs have combined for 37 playoff berths and nine Super Bowl appearances – including five Super Bowl championships – during that span.

OVERTIME EXCITEMENT

With so many close games in the NFL, it's no surprise that 14 contests in the regular season were ultimately decided in overtime.

The Green Bay Packers and Indianapolis Colts tied for the league lead with three overtime games each, while Arizona, Chicago, Cleveland, Jacksonville and San Francisco all went to overtime twice in 2017.

Green Bay won overtime games in both Week 13 and Week 14, marking the first time in franchise history that the Packers won back-to-back games in overtime. In their Week 14 win at Cleveland, Packers wide receiver **DAVANTE ADAMS** scored a touchdown in both the final minute of the fourth quarter and in overtime and became the fourth player in NFL history (including the postseason) – and the first since New England's **JAMES WHITE** in Super Bowl LI – to score a touchdown in both the final minute of the fourth quarter and in overtime.

Indianapolis kicker **ADAM VINATIERI** (below) converted a game-winning 51-yard field goal with 1:43 remaining in overtime in the Colts' Week 5 victory over San Francisco. Vinatieri has 10 career game-winning field goals in overtime, the most in NFL history.

MODIFIED SUDDEN DEATH OVERTIME

For the 2010 postseason, the NFL installed a modified sudden death overtime system to determine the winner when the score is tied at the end of regulation. In 2012, the system was expanded to cover all NFL games. Teams have the opportunity to possess the ball at least once in the extra period unless the team that receives the overtime kickoff scores a touchdown on its first possession.

A look at the NFL's overtime procedures:

PRESEASON AND REGULAR SEASON

At the end of regulation time, the referee will immediately toss a coin at the center of the field in accordance with rules pertaining to the usual pregame toss. The captain of the visiting team will call the toss prior to the coin being flipped.

- Following a three-minute intermission after the end of the regulation game, there shall be a maximum of one 10-minute period. Each team must possess or have the opportunity to possess the ball unless the team that has the ball first scores a touchdown on its initial possession.
- Play continues in sudden death until a winner is determined, and the game automatically ends upon any score (by safety, field goal, or touchdown) or when a score is awarded by the referee for a palpably unfair act. Each team shall be entitled to two timeouts, and if there is an excess timeout, the usual rules shall apply. The try is not attempted if a touchdown is scored. Disqualified players are not allowed to return.
- If the score is tied at the end of the 10-minute overtime period, the game shall result in a tie.
- Instant Replay: No challenges. Reviews to be initiated by the replay official.

POSTSEASON

At the end of regulation time, the referee will immediately toss a coin at the center of the field in accordance with rules pertaining to the usual pregame toss. The captain of the visiting team will call the toss prior to the coin being flipped.

- Following a three-minute intermission after the end of the regulation game, play will be continued in 15-minute periods until a winner is declared. Each team must possess or have the opportunity to possess the ball unless the team that has the ball first scores a touchdown on its initial possession.
- Play continues in sudden death until a winner is determined, and the game automatically ends upon any score (by safety, field goal, or touchdown) or when a score is awarded by the referee for a palpably unfair act. Each team has three time outs per half and all general timing provisions apply as during a regular game. The try is not attempted if a touchdown is scored. Disqualified players are not allowed to return.
- Instant Replay: No challenges. Reviews to be initiated by the replay official.

KEY DEFINITIONS

- <u>Possession</u>: Actual possession of the ball with complete control. The defense gains possession when it catches, intercepts, or recovers a loose ball.
- Opportunity to possess: The opportunity to possess occurs only during kicking plays. A kickoff is an opportunity to possess for the receiving team. If the kicking team legally recovers the kick, the receiving team is considered to have had its opportunity. A punt or a field goal that crosses the line of scrimmage and is muffed by the receiving team is considered to be an opportunity to possess for the receivers. Normal touching rules by the kicking team apply.



A SAMPLING OF 2018 NFL ANNIVERSARIES

CELEBRATION
Grant Dibert signs the first known professional football contract (1893).
The Morgan Athletic Club forms in Chicago (1898) and later becomes known as the Normals, then the Racine Cardinals, the Chicago Cardinals, the St. Louis Cardinals, the Phoenix Cardinals, and, in 1994, the Arizona Cardinals. The team remains the oldest continuing operation in professional football.
The forward pass becomes legalized from anywhere behind the line of scrimmage (1933).
The Pittsburgh Steelers and the Philadelphia Eagles join the NFL (1933).
The league approves the mandatory use of helmets for all players (1943).
Pittsburgh and Philadelphia merge for one season and are known as the Steagles (1943).
On December 28, 1958, Baltimore defeats the New York Giants in the first ever sudden-death overtime in an NFL Championship Game in a game known today as "The Greatest Game Ever Played."
The NFL awards NBC with exclusive network broadcasting rights for the 1963 NFL Championship Game for \$926,000 (1963).
The Pro Football Hall of Fame is established in Canton, OH (1963).
On September 10, 1978, Oakland defeats San Diego 21-20 on a play known as the "Holy Roller."
The Colts franchise relocates to Indianapolis (1984).
The NFL approves the Cardinals franchise relocation to Phoenix, AZ (1988).
Don Shula becomes the winningest coach in NFL history when Miami beats Philadelphia to give Shula his 325th victory on November 14, 1993.
The NFL allows fans to vote for Pro Bowl participants for the first time (1993).
The Tennessee Oilers' name is retired by the NFL and the team becomes the Tennessee Titans (1998).
NFL Network launches on DirecTV on November 4, 2003.
An NFL game is broadcast on NBC and also streamed live in its entirety to fans on the Internet via NFL.com and NBCSports.com (2008).



Los Angeles Rams quarterback **NORM "THE DUTCHMAN" VAN BROCKLIN** entered the 1951 season entrenched in a duel for the starting position with veteran **BOB WATERFIELD**. A Waterfield injury sidelined the incumbent quarterback prior to the season opener against the New York Yanks on September 28, and opened the door for Van Brocklin to show his worth. He took advantage of the opportunity by producing the most prolific passing performance in NFL history. Van Brocklin threw for an NFL-record 554 yards in a 54-14 rout of the Yanks at the Los Angeles Coliseum. The Pro Football Hall of Fame quarterback tossed five touchdowns and completed 27 of 41 passes.

"It's the finest exhibition of passing I've ever seen," said Rams coach **JIMMY PHELAN** after the game. "Van Brocklin was hitting them in the eye practically every time he threw the ball."

Van Brocklin, who passed away in 1983, remained subdued about the performance. "Everything I threw seemed to be caught and run for a long gain," he said.



The Rams' **TOM FEARS** averaged 23.1 yards on his seven catches and **ELROY "CRAZYLEGS" HIRSCH** averaged 19.2 yards on nine receptions. Los Angeles amassed an NFL-record 735 total yards and 34 first downs.

"They don't need me out here anymore," said Waterfield after the game. The two quarterbacks would split time for the rest of the season as the Rams captured the 1951 NFL Championship.

Van Brocklin's record has stood for the past 67 years. Quarterbacks **MATT SCHAUB** and **WARREN MOON** have come the closest to breaking Van Brocklin's mark. In 2012, Schaub, then with the Houston Texans, passed for 527 yards against Jacksonville on November 18, while Moon had a 527-yard day for the Houston Oilers against Kansas City on December 16, 1990.

71 YEARS AGO ON KICKOFF WEEKEND: A RECORD 87 POINTS!



Seventy-one years ago, the **WASHINGTON REDSKINS** and **PHILADELPHIA EAGLES** opened the 1947 season with a record-breaking bang. The Eagles outscored the Redskins 45-42 on September 28 before a crowd of 35,406 in Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium. The 87-point total was an NFL record and continues to stand as the most points scored in a game on Kickoff Weekend. (The record for most combined points in any NFL game is 113 by Washington (72) and the New York Giants (41) on November 27, 1966.)

The 12-touchdown scoring blitz, an NFL record at the time, was highlighted by the play of two future Pro Football Hall of Famers – Washington quarterback **SAMMY BAUGH** (left) and Philadelphia halfback **STEVE VAN BUREN**.

Baugh, whose 1947 totals in completions (210), attempts (354) and yards passing (2,938) were NFL records, threw for 364 yards and five touchdowns, including three to rookie end **HUGH TAYLOR**. Van Buren,

whose 1,008 rushing yards for the year were also a league record, returned a kickoff 95 yards for a touchdown and rushed for another while totaling 98 yards on the ground.



NEW NFL RULES FOR 2018

The following are rules changes for the 2018 season:

- **STANDARD FOR A CATCH**: Changes the standard for a catch for a forward pass or interception in the field of play, at the sideline, or in the end zone if a player, who is in bounds:
 - a) secures control of the ball in his hands or arms, prior to the ball touching the ground; and
 - b) touches the ground inbounds with both feet or with any part of his body other than his hands; and
 - c) after (a) and (b) have been fulfilled, performs any football act (e.g., tuck the ball away, extend it towards or over the goal line or the line to gain, take an additional step, turn upfield, or avoid or ward off an opponent), or he maintains control of the ball long enough to do so.
 - **Note 1**: Movement of the ball does not automatically result in loss of control.
 - **Note 2:** If a player, who satisfied (a) and (b), but has not satisfied (c), contacts the ground and loses control of the ball, it is an incomplete pass if the ball hits the ground before he regains control, or if he regains control out of bounds.
 - **Note 3:** A receiver is considered a player in a defenseless posture (See Rule 12, Section 2, Article 7) throughout the entire process of the catch and until the player is capable of avoiding or warding off the impending contact of an opponent.
 - **Note 4:** If a pass is caught simultaneously by two eligible opponents, and both players retain it, the ball belongs to the passers. It is not a simultaneous catch if a player gains control first and an opponent subsequently gains joint control.
 - **Note 5:** If a player, who is in possession of the ball, is held up and carried out of bounds by an opponent before both feet or any part of his body other than his hands touches the ground inbounds, it is a completed or intercepted pass.
- **HELMET RULE**: Makes lowering the head and initiating contact with the helmet a foul.
- <u>DISQUALIFICATIONS</u>: Authorizes the Senior Vice President of Officiating to instruct on-field game officials to disqualify a player for a flagrant non-football act when a foul for that act is called on the field.
- **SCORING AT THE END OF REGULATION**: Eliminates the requirement that a team who scores a touchdown at the end of regulation of a game to kick the extra point or go for a two-point conversion if it would not affect the outcome of the game.



- KICKOFF FORMATION: Modifies rules for a free kick formation and for blocking on a free kick.
- <u>TOUCHBACKS</u>: The playing rule that changes the spot of the next snap after a touchback resulting from a free kick to the 25-yard line is now permanent.
- <u>ILLEGAL BATTING AND KICKING</u>: Makes the penalties for Illegal Batting and Kicking the same (loss of 10 yards).
- <u>OVERTIME</u>: Provides that in overtime, if the team that possesses
 the ball first scores a field goal in its initial possession and the
 second team loses possession by an interception or a fumble, the
 down will be permitted to run to its conclusion, including awarding
 the points scored by either team during the down.





WOMEN'S CAREERS IN FOOTBALL FORUM

Diversity and inclusion is a priority across the NFL and all 32 clubs. As part of its ongoing commitment, the NFL offers innovative career development programs aimed to inspire, engage, and connect women with careers in football. Hosting these events is part of the League's overall efforts to develop a pipeline of qualified women for Football Operations positions and provides women with critical knowledge, tools and resources to pursue careers in football.

As part of these efforts, the NFL created the **NFL WOMEN'S CAREERS IN FOOTBALL FORUM**. In its first year, the Forum brought in NFL team owners, coaches, and general managers to speak to 220 female tackle football players about the different areas that exist within football operations. As a result of the inaugural event, 18 women went on to work in football operations across the professional, collegiate, and high school levels, nine of whom secured positions for coaching and scouting in NFL training camps.

This year, 50 qualified women were selected to participate in the Forum from a pool of more than 420 applicants. The graphic below depicts the participants from the 2018 program who have received opportunities at the high school, collegiate and professional levels and most notably within the realms of coaching, scouting, and operations. In addition to the results listed, several NFL clubs have hired women in coaching and/or personnel roles this year including the **ATLANTA FALCONS**, **MINNESOTA VIKINGS** and **OAKLAND RAIDERS**. Since the Forum, the NFL has also worked with a number of NCAA programs and head coaches, including Dartmouth University head coach Buddy Teevens, who have learned about these efforts and have committed to interviewing more women for openings on their staffs.

While the NFL is encouraged by the progress, it is dedicated to further advancement and the normalization of women on the sidelines.

NFL teams will adorn a handful of special patches during the 2018 season to highlight league initiatives and commemorate special moments and teams in franchise history.

The NFL will celebrate **A CRUCIAL CATCH** and **BREAST CANCER AWARENESS** with a decal in Weeks 5, 6 and 7. In Weeks 9, 10 and 11, all teams will wear a camouflage ribbon decal on their helmets to celebrate **SALUTE TO SERVICE** games.

Additionally, several NFL franchises will be wearing special patches in 2018. The **GREEN BAY PACKERS** will celebrate their 100th season, while the **INDIANAPOLIS COLTS** will commemorate their 35th season in Indianapolis and the **TENNESSEE TITANS** will memorialize their 20th season.

NFL ON TV IN 2018

Includes Thursday Night Football "Tri-Cast" distribution model of broadcast (FOX), cable (NFL Network, FOX Deportes) & digital (Amazon Prime)

NFL fans continue to tune in to the sport they love. Here's a look at what's in store on TV in 2018.

The regular-season schedule – spanning 17 weeks and 256 games – kicks off on Thursday night, September 6 in Philadelphia and concludes on Sunday, December 30 with 16 division games.

The season begins with the NFL's annual primetime kickoff game, as the defending Super Bowl champion Philadelphia Eagles host the Atlanta Falcons at Lincoln Financial Field on September 6 (8:20 PM ET, NBC).

Week 1 is a **FOX** national weekend with key games on Sunday, September 9 featuring the Dallas Cowboys at the Carolina Panthers (4:25 PM ET) and the Seattle Seahawks visiting the Denver Broncos (4:25 PM ET). Week 1 matchups on **CBS** include the Houston Texans at the New England Patriots (1:00 PM ET) and the Los Angeles Chargers hosting the Kansas City Chiefs (4:05 PM ET). Week 2 represents the first CBS national weekend with doubleheader games showcasing the Oakland Raiders at the Denver Broncos (4:25 PM ET) and the Patriots visiting the Jacksonville Jaguars (4:25 PM ET).

NBC's Sunday Night Football gets underway on September 9 when the Green Bay Packers host the Chicago Bears (8:20 PM ET) at Lambeau Field in the 195th regular-season meeting between the storied franchises.

Kickoff Weekend concludes on Monday, September 10 with an **ESPN Monday Night Football** doubleheader. The Detroit Lions will host the New York Jets (7:10 PM ET) in the first game followed by the Los Angeles Rams visiting the Raiders in the nightcap (10:20 PM ET).

ESPN will televise one game each Monday night in Weeks 2-16. There will be no Monday night game on the final regular-season weekend (Week 17) to provide more flexibility for the scheduling of the opening weekend of the NFL playoffs.

<u>Primetime games will all kick off earlier this season</u> – Thursday night at 8:20 PM ET (from 8:25 PM ET), Sunday night at 8:20 PM ET (8:30 PM) and Monday night at 8:15 PM ET (8:30 PM) – and all 32 clubs are scheduled for at least one Thursday, Sunday or Monday night game.

FOX will kick off their Thursday Night Football package in Week 4 with a showdown of NFC playoff teams, as the Minnesota Vikings visit the Rams at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum (8:20 PM ET, FOX/NFLN). FOX will broadcast 11 Thursday Night Football games between Weeks 4-15 (excluding Thanksgiving night), with those games also being simulcast via NFL Network and distributed in Spanish on FOX Deportes. In addition, NFL Network will exclusively televise seven games this season, with FOX producing the full slate of 18 games.

A select number of games will be "cross-flexed," moving between CBS and FOX to bring potentially under-distributed games to wider audiences. Some of those contests were announced this spring and other "cross-flexed" games will be decided during the season.

The regular season will conclude with Week 17 on Sunday, December 30. For the ninth consecutive year, all 16 games scheduled for Week 17 are division contests, enhancing the potential for more games with playoff ramifications.





Other highlights of the schedule include:

Nine games in the 2018 regular season will feature a rematch from the 2017 postseason. In Week 2, Jacksonville will host New England at EverBank Field in a rematch of last season's AFC Championship Game (4:25 PM ET, CBS). Minnesota travels to Philadelphia in Week 5 in a rematch of the 2017 NFC Championship Game (4:25 PM ET, FOX).

Thanksgiving will feature a trio of divisional matchups on Thursday, November 22. 2018 marks only the second time since 1970 (2014) that the holiday has featured exclusively divisional matchups. The first game will send the Bears to Detroit to face the Lions (12:30 PM ET, CBS). The late afternoon game will feature the Washington Redskins visiting the Dallas Cowboys (4:30 PM ET, FOX). The Thanksgiving Day festivities conclude with an NFC South showdown as the Falcons travel to New Orleans to face the Saints on NBC (8:20 PM ET).

The NFL's international slate includes three games in London – occurring in three consecutive weeks (Week 6-8) – and one in Mexico City. The first game of the 2018 London Series takes place at Wembley Stadium in Week 6 as the Oakland Raiders host the Seattle Seahawks on Sunday, October 14 (1:00 PM ET, FOX). The following week, action returns to Wembley as the Los Angeles Chargers host the Tennessee Titans on Sunday, October 21 (9:30 AM ET, CBS). The 2018 London Series concludes in Week 8 with the Jaguars hosting the Eagles on Sunday, October 28 (9:30 AM ET, NFLN).

For the third consecutive season, the NFL will return to Mexico City's Estadio Azteca. On Monday, November 19, the Los Angeles Rams host the Kansas City Chiefs in the historic venue on Monday Night Football (8:15 PM ET, ESPN).

The NFL's 32 teams will each play 16 games over 17 weeks. Byes will begin in Week 4 and end in Week 12.

The playoffs will include four division winners and two wild cards from each conference. The playoffs begin with Wild Card Weekend on Saturday and Sunday, January 5-6. The two division winners with the best records in each conference will earn first-round byes.

Wild Card Weekend winners join the top two division champions in each conference in the Divisional Playoffs on Saturday and Sunday, January 12-13. The AFC and NFC Championship Games will be played on Sunday, January 20. The winners meet two weeks later on Sunday, February 3 in Super Bowl LIII at Atlanta's Mercedes-Benz Stadium (CBS).

The NFL is the only sports league that presents all regular-season and postseason games on free, over-the-air television in local markets. All postseason games are televised nationally.

Westwood One will broadcast on radio all NFL primetime games, the three Thanksgiving Day games and the entire NFL playoffs.















FLEXIBLE SCHEDULING

"Flexible scheduling" will be used in Weeks 11-17. Additionally, in Weeks 5-10, flexible scheduling may be used in no more than two weeks. In Weeks 5-16, the schedule lists the games tentatively set for Sunday Night Football on NBC. Only Sunday afternoon games are eligible to be moved to Sunday night, in which case the tentatively scheduled Sunday night game would be moved to an afternoon start time. A flexible scheduling move would be announced at least 12 days before the game.

Flexibility for Saturday games in Weeks 15 and 16 is also part of the 2018 schedule. In Week 15, there will be two games played on Saturday on NFL Network: Houston at the New York Jets and Cleveland at Denver, with the game times of 4:30 PM ET and 8:20 PM ET to be determined. In Week 16, two of four possible matchups will be scheduled for Saturday: Baltimore at Los Angeles Chargers, Jacksonville at Miami, the New York Giants at Indianapolis or Washington at Tennessee. Start times and Saturday games for Week 15 and 16 will be announced no later than following Week 8, with the non-Saturday games to be played on Sunday.

For Week 17, the Sunday night game will be announced no later than six days prior to December 30. The schedule does not list a Sunday night game in Week 17, but an afternoon game with playoff implications will be moved to that time slot. Flexible scheduling ensures quality matchups in all Sunday time slots in those weeks and gives "surprise" teams a chance to play their way into primetime.

Flexible scheduling will not be applied to games airing on Thursday or Monday nights.

SEVEN COLLEGES TO ADD FOOTBALL PROGRAMS IN 2018

As the anticipation for football season continues to build, fans can look forward to more action on college campuses this fall. Seven colleges will add football programs in 2018 – ALLEN UNIVERSITY, ALVERNIA UNIVERSITY, INDIANA WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY, KEISER UNIVERSITY, LAWRENCE TECHNOLOGICAL UNIVERSITY, OTTAWA UNIVERSITY ARIZONA and UNIVERSITY OF NEW ENGLAND.

Since 2008, a total of 69 NCAA and NAIA schools have added football teams and five additional schools plan to add football programs by 2020.

According to the National Football Foundation, a record 778 colleges/universities have football programs in 2018.

Football is returning to Allen University after a 15-year hiatus.

"The ember for football never dimmed in a group of alumni that ultimately set ablaze the current decision and process to relaunch football," said Allen University President **DR. ERNEST MC NEALEY**.

Keiser University in Fort Lauderdale, Florida is adding football to their athletic program and is bringing former Buffalo Bills Offensive Assistant **DOUG SOCHA** on as the team's head coach.

"I am excited to get started, and I will start right here in Palm Beach County," said Socha. "The Keiser football program creates an opportunity for local student athletes to get a quality education and to compete at a high level in their own back yard. We will be a program that embeds ourselves in the community, and competes for championships while representing Keiser University in a first-class manner."






ATLANTA TO HOST SUPER BOWL LIII



BEST NFL RECORDS, PAST 10 YEARS

Over the past 10 years, three NFL teams – **NEW ENGLAND** (123-37, .769), **PITTSBURGH** (106-54, .663), and **GREEN BAY** (100-59-1, .628) – have posted a winning percentage over .600. Those three clubs have combined for 24 playoff berths, seven Super Bowl appearances and four Super Bowl championships during that span.

The New England Patriots, under the guidance of head coach **BILL BELICHICK**, have the best regular-season record over the past 10 years, gualifying for the postseason nine times and winning Super Bowls XLIX and LI.

"We've been doing this a long time, so you get to know each other over the years and you respect each other's work," Kansas City Chiefs head coach **ANDY REID** said about Belichick. "Nobody does it better than him. We've just gotten to know each other over the years and I appreciate his friendship and I appreciate what he's done for the National Football League too."

FOOTBALL REMAINS MOST POPULAR HIGH SCHOOL SPORT

Football continues to lead the high school sports landscape with more than one million participants for the 19th consecutive year.

The number of boys playing high school football – totaling 11, nine, eight and six-player teams – led all sports with 1,086,723 participants, according to the most recently published National Federation of State High School Associations participation survey (2016-17 school year).

The 1,086,723 boys involved in the sport account for almost 25 percent of the 4,563,238 boys that participate in athletics and is significantly larger than the next most-played sport, outdoor track and field, in which 600,136 boys participated.

PLAYER HEALTH & SAFETY



As part of the NFL's *Play Smart. Play Safe.* initiative, the NFL allocated \$60 million toward the creation and funding of the <u>Engineering Roadmap</u>. It's a comprehensive effort—funded by the NFL and managed by Football Research, Inc. (FRI)—to improve the understanding of the biomechanics of head injuries in professional football and to create incentives for helmet manufacturers, small businesses, entrepreneurs, universities and others to develop and commercialize new and improved protective equipment, including helmets.



DRIVEN BY EXPERTS: BIOMECHANICAL ENGINEERS


Football Research, Inc. (FRI), a nonprofit corporation formed and financially supported by the NFL, manages the Engineering Roadmap. The Board of Directors includes leading engineers and experts who advise FRI on how best to achieve the goal of advancing the understanding of biomechanics in football and creating an environment where new and improved protective equipment will be developed. Jeff Crandall, Ph.D., chairman of the NFL Engineering Committee, serves a leading role in managing the Engineering Roadmap. Dr. Crandall is the Nancy and Neal Wade Professor of Engineering and Applied Sciences at the University of Virginia and Principal Scientist and Consultant at Biocore, LLC. The Board also works closely with Dr. Kristy Arbogast and Dr. Barry Myers, consultants to the NFL Players Association, who are co-leads on essential elements of the Engineering Roadmap.





RESEARCH: MEASURING THE ON-FIELD ENVIRONMENT AND SHARING TOOLS

As part of the Engineering Roadmap, biomechanical engineers completed a comprehensive video review of all reported concussions sustained in NFL games over the past three seasons to better understand concussion-causing impacts. The data is shared widely with helmet manufacturers, designers, innovators, entrepreneurs, universities and others to stimulate new ideas and designs for protective equipment. FRI has also collaborated with university partners to develop new tools to encourage innovation and advance equipment design, including finite element models of modern football helmets, impact test dummy components and test conditions simulating on-field impacts.





EDUCATION: EXPERTS AND INNOVATORS LEARNING FROM EACH OTHER

Experts share the latest knowledge regarding the causes of concussion in professional football, including the best tools available for assessing and optimizing the design and manufacturing of protective equipment. These discussions are an important step to educating and creating incentives for those in the marketplace to design and manufacture protective equipment that performs better than current models. Periodic symposia, webinars and other educational efforts allow experts to share the most up-to-date biomechanical and biomedical information.











CROWDSOURCING: HeadHealthTECH CHALLENGES OFFER INCENTIVES FOR INNOVATORS AND ENTREPRENEURS

The NFL and FRI created the HeadHealthTECH Challenges, which are attracting innovative grant proposals from institutions, individuals and corporations that are interested in designing the next generation of protective equipment. The TECH Challenges are structured to stimulate research and innovation, as well as encourage connections with mentors and/or venture capitalists, with the goal of spurring developments in engineering, biomechanics, advanced sensors and material science. The TECH Challenges are operated and managed by Duke University's Clinical and Translational Science Institute (Duke CTSI), which provides constructive feedback for all applicants.

Thus far, the NFL and FRI have awarded grants totaling more than \$1,340,000 to 11 winners to support product development for innovative protective equipment concepts.



TECH CHALLENGE I WINNERS

Winners included VyaTek Sports for its highly efficient energy-absorbing Zorbz technology and Guardian Innovations for its Guardian Cap technology—a soft helmet cover designed to reduce the severity of impacts.



TECH CHALLENGE II WINNERS

Winners included 2ND Skull, to research the effectiveness of its 2nd Skull* skull cap in reducing impact forces and developing a second-generation version; Baytech Products, for its prototype HitGard* multi-component helmet system concept; and Windpact, for its Crash Cloud*, an impact liner system using restricted air flow and foam in helmets and protective gear.



TECH CHALLENGE III WINNERS

Winners included Impressio, Inc. to support development and testing of its ultra-dissipative padding made from liquid-crystal elastomers; HRL Laboratories, LLC to support development and testing of its novel impact-attenuating pads for football helmets; and AES Research & Design for testing of its anti-rotational kinematic helmet prototype.



2018 HELMET LABORATORY TESTING PERFORMANCE RESULTS

THE NFL, IN COLLABORATION WITH THE NFLPA, THROUGH THEIR RESPECTIVE APPOINTED BIOMECHANICAL EXPERTS, COORDINATED EXTENSIVE LABORATORY RESEARCH TO EVALUATE WHICH HELMETS BEST REDUCE HEAD IMPACT SEVERITY. THE RESULTS OF THOSE TESTS, WHICH ARE SUPPORTED BY ON-FIELD PERFORMANCE, ARE SET FORTH ON THIS POSTER.

The helmet models are listed in order of their performance in the laboratory testing, with a shorter bar representing better performance. The rankings are based exclusively on the ability of the helmet to reduce head impact severity measures in laboratory testing. Issues with helmet fit, retention, and long-term durability are not addressed in these rankings. The Top-Performing Group consists of helmets whose performance was not statistically different from the two top-ranked helmets. The information presented here is based solely upon the results of this research and the expert opinions of the scientists involved.

The laboratory test conditions were intended to represent potentially concussive head impacts in the NFL. The results of this study should not be extrapolated to collegiate, high school, or youth football.

A subset of cleat patterns from current manufacturers available to NFL players are listed in order based on their performance in the laboratory testing. The performance of each cleat pattern is illustrated on the bar graph, with a longer bar representing better performance. The rankings are based exclusively on the ability of the cleat pattern to allow release from a synthetic surface in laboratory testing. Issues with shoe fit, shoe structure, and long-term durability are not addressed in these rankings. The information presented here is based solely upon the results of this research and the expert opinions of the scientists involved.

The laboratory test conditions were intended to represent potentially injurious lower extremity loading in the NFL. The results of this study should not be extrapolated to collegiate, high school, or youth football.


BREAKING DOWN SIDELINE MEDICAL CARE—A TEAM BEHIND THE TEAM

There is a specialized squad of medical professionals, including team physicians, unaffiliated medical staff, and physicians from the local area, that watches the field for potential injuries and is available to provide immediate care to players at every NFL game. In 2012, in conjunction with the NFLPA, the NFL added two certified athletic trainers (booth ATC spotters) who provide an "eye in the sky" from a stadium box—they monitor the field and television replays to help identify players with potential injuries for team medical staffs.

The NFL added unaffiliated medical professionals in 2014—each sideline is staffed with an Unaffiliated Neurological Consultant (UNC), who supports the team medical staffs in the identification, screening and diagnosis of in-game concussions. In 2015, the NFL also authorized booth ATC spotters to stop the game and call a medical timeout—which does not count against either team—if needed to provide a player with immediate medical assistance. Game officials also have the authority to send a player off the field for medical evaluation. For the 2018 season, a third UNC will monitor the broadcast video and audio feeds of each game, and notify on-field UNCs of possible head, neck or spine injuries.

Visiting Team Medical Liaisons (VTML)—board-certified physicians licensed to practice medicine in the state in which the stadium is located—work with the visiting team to provide medical care for its players, including access to leading medical centers for emergency care. Additionally, every club is required to design and implement an Emergency Action Plan to follow in instances of severe trauma. All NFL team physicians work under these plans, which are reviewed by the NFL and NFLPA and approved by third-party experts each season.

The National Football League Physicians Society (NFLPS)—a professional organization made up of world-class team doctors focused on the prevention and treatment of injuries for their patients, NFL players—compiled a list of all these professionals, illustrated in this chart:



NFL MEDICAL COMMITTEES OVERVIEW

The NFL is advised by many of the world's preeminent experts in medicine and science. Specialists in a wide variety of disciplines relevant to player health and safety volunteer their time to explore groundbreaking research and make recommendations for how the League can continually improve the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of injuries as well as invest in scientific research to promote player health and safety.

The NFL medical committees meet throughout the year to review player health and injury data and determine what policies, programs and protocols should be adopted by the League.

The diligent work of the committees normally begins in the spring at the NFL Combine in Indianapolis before the NFL draft introduces a new class of eligible players to the League. Members take this opportunity to gather for the first of several meetings throughout the year to analyze injury data from the previous season. The committees discuss statistical trends, identify outliers in the data, debate reasons for the numbers and ask important questions that need further analysis and reporting.

They also form judgments that are shared with the competition committee and the NFL about potential changes that need to be made to the rules or to medical protocols or practices.

These discussions last long after the initial annual meetings in Indianapolis and lead to a year-long effort to make the game safer. The men and women on these committees comprise a wide range of perspectives and expertise on some of our players' most challenging health issues. They are not employed by the NFL and most receive no compensation for their involvement other than a small honorarium (less than \$1500), typical in the medical field for volunteer efforts like serving on a medical committee or advisory board, and reimbursement of travel expenses for attending committee meetings.

An overarching Health and Safety Committee—including chairs of the General Medical Committee, the Head, Neck and Spine Committee and the Musculoskeletal Committee—oversees committee efforts and facilitates cross-specialization and discussion among subject matter experts, team physicians and athletic trainers.

An ad hoc committee of equipment and field managers focuses on keeping game day surfaces safe—bolstering the league's commitment to injury protection on the field. In the league's ongoing mission to make the game safer for those who play it, each and every medical committee includes participation by representatives from the NFL Players Association (NFLPA), including its long-time Medical Director, Dr. Thom Mayer.

HEALTH AND SAFETY RELATED CHANGES FOR THE 2018 SEASON

Advancing Player Health and Safety on the Field

NFL clubs gathered this spring to vote on significant rules changes that aim to improve player safety.

The NFL <u>Competition Committee</u> proposes rules changes to try to improve the game. The committee consults with players, coaches, physicians and safety experts—including the NFL's <u>medical committees</u> and the NFL Players Association.

The New Rules

Three new health and safety related playing rules were approved:

- Makes permanent the playing rule that changes the spot of the next snap after a touchback resulting from a free kick to the 25-yard line.
- Playing Rule Proposal #11, Article 8—Use of Helmet—It is a foul if a player lowers his head to initiate and make contact with his helmet against an opponent. It is a penalty that will result in the loss of 15 yards. If the foul is by the defense, it is also an automatic first down. The player may be disqualified.
- Modifies the kickoff play for one year only.

Throughout the offseason, the league is working with players, coaches, officials, medical personnel, media and fans to communicate and educate about the new helmet and kickoff rules.

Driving Significant Change Through Data

A comprehensive review of data and video led by the NFL's medical and engineering advisors demonstrated the increased risk associated with lowering the head to align the neck and spine before initiating contact. This behavior put both the player making the contact and the player struck at greater risk of injury.

"We do a video review of each and every concussion," said Dr. Jeff Crandall, Director of the Center for Applied Biomechanics at The University of Virginia and Chairman of the NFL Engineering Committee. "We've been doing it the last three years, and we started to notice when we looked at the video that a large number of players were leading with their helmet, initiating contact that caused concussions."

The league's medical and engineering experts presented to the Competition Committee and the NFL Owners Health & Safety Committee an analysis of the latest injury data.

"We had examples on field of concussions occurring under leading with the helmet, and we had the biomechanical explanation of why it was risky," said Dr. Crandall. "So when you put these two together, it makes a pretty compelling case that we need to get this behavior out of the game."

The clubs unanimously agreed that a rule change could help to eliminate certain techniques that put players at risk.

"There are so many hits that we saw where a player lowered his head, delivered the hit, and either injured himself or the person he was contacting," said Rich McKay, President and CEO of the Atlanta Falcons and Chairman of the NFL Competition Committee. "So, we felt it was time for a change of this magnitude."

"This new rule is a huge component [of our injury reduction strategy], and it came based on our review of all the data and biomechanics to figure out what changes we can make immediately that could really impact the incidence of concussion," said Dr. Allen Sills, NFL Chief Medical Officer.

The ejection standards to go along with the use of helmet rule are:

- Player lowers his helmet to establish a linear impact body posture prior to initiating and making contact with the helmet;
- Player delivering the blow had an unobstructed path to his opponent:
- Contact was clearly avoidable; Player delivering the blow had other options.


Changes to the Kickoff

The Competition Committee worked with special teams coaches and NFL medical and engineering advisors to consider changes to the kickoff play during an owners and coaches session in early May. NFL clubs approved the Competition Committee's proposal during the Spring League Meeting.

The comprehensive review of injury data and video showed that over the course of all games during the 2015-2017 seasons, the kickoff represented only six percent of plays but 12 percent of concussions. Players had approximately four times the risk of concussion on the kickoff compared to running or passing plays. The changes to the kickoff rule addressed the components that posed the most risk, like the use of a two-man wedge, while maintaining the play.

"We want to continue to try to improve the safety of [the kickoff] and preserve the play," <u>said</u> Atlanta Falcons President Rich McKay, the chairman of the competition committee. "And I think we've taken a big step toward that."

Coordinating Across Disciplines to Try to Improve Player Safety

NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell emphasized the teamwork behind the new rules. "I don't think in my 37 years, I've seen quite the coordination between various disciplines—whether it's the football people, the officiating, our Competition Committee, various other people that have a stake in it, including our medical teams," said Goodell. "Everyone is enthusiastically behind this and supportive of this."

As the NFL continuously learns more about player health and safety, the <u>league evaluates and changes rules</u> to improve the game and try to enhance protections for players.

50 HEALTH AND SAFETY RELATED RULES CHANGES SINCE 2002

As the NFL learns more about player health and safety, the league evaluates and changes rules to evolve the game and try to improve protections for players. Since 2002 alone, the NFL has made 50 rules changes intended to eliminate potentially dangerous tactics and reduce the risk of injuries.

2018

- Makes permanent the playing rule that changes the spot of the next snap after a touchback resulting from a free kick to the 25-yard line.
- It is a foul if a player lowers his head to initiate and make contact with his helmet against an opponent. It is a penalty that will result in the loss of 15 yards. If the foul is by the defense, it is also an automatic first down. The player may be disqualified.
 - Modifies the kickoff play for one year only.

2017

- Prohibits the "leaper" block attempt on field goal and extra point plays.
- Extends the rule changing the spot of the next snap after a touchback resulting from a free kick to the 25-yard line for another year.
- Gives a receiver running a pass route defenseless player protection.
- Prohibits crackback blocks by a backfield player who is in motion, even if he is not more than two yards outside the tackle when the ball is snapped.
- Reduces the length of overtime in the preseason and regular season to 10 minutes.

2016

- All chop blocks are prohibited.
- The horse collar tackle rule is expanded to include when a defender grabs the jersey at the name plate or above and pulls a runner toward the ground.
- In an effort to increase touchbacks, the spot of the next snap after a touchback resulting from a kickoff is moved from the 20- to the 25-yard line.

2015

- Rules prohibiting illegal "peel back" blocks are extended to cover all offensive players.
- Offensive backs are prohibited from chopping a defensive player engaged above the waist by another offensive player outside the tackle box.
- Defenseless player protections are expanded to cover the intended receiver of a pass in the immediate continuing action following an interception.
- When a team presents a punt, field-goal or try kick formation, defenders are prohibited from pushing teammates on the line of scrimmage.

2014

 Clipping and unnecessary roughness penalties are expanded to prohibit blockers from rolling up on the side of a defender's leg.

2013

- Players are required to wear protective knee and thigh pads.
- It is illegal for a runner or tackler to initiate forcible contact by delivering a blow with the top or crown of his helmet against an opponent when both players are clearly outside the tackle box.
- "Peel back" blocks below the waist are illegal inside the tackle box.
- The list of "defenseless players" is expanded to include long snappers on field goals and PATs (point after touchdowns).
- The "bunch" formation is eliminated on field goals and PATs. No more than six defenders may be on the line of scrimmage on either side of the snapper at the snap for these plays.

2012

• The list of "defenseless players" is expanded to include defensive players on crackback blocks, making it illegal to hit them in the head or neck area.

2011

- The restraining line for the kicking team is moved from the 30- to the 35-yard line in an effort to increase touchbacks.
- All kicking team players other than the kicker must be lined up no more than five yards behind their restraining line, eliminating the 15- to 20-yard running "head start" that had become customary for many players.
- The list of "defenseless players" is expanded to include: a kicker/punter during the kick or during the return; a quarterback at any time after a change of possession; and a player who receives a "blindside" block when the blocker is moving toward his own endline and approaches the opponent from behind or from the side. Previously, these players were protected against blows to the head, but not against blows delivered by an opponent with the top/crown or forehead/"hairline" parts of the helmet against other parts of the body.
- A receiver who has completed a catch is a "defenseless player" until he has had time to protect himself or has clearly become a runner. A receiver/runner is no longer defenseless if he is able to avoid or ward off the impending contact of an

opponent. Previously, the receiver who had completed a catch was protected against an opponent who launched and delivered a blow to the receiver's head.

2010

- During a field-goal attempt, punt or try-kick, a defensive team player who is within one yard of the line of scrimmage at the snap must have his entire body outside the snapper's shoulder pads.
- After a half has expired, dead ball personal fouls by either team will be enforced on the succeeding kickoff.
- A player who has just completed a catch is protected from blows to the head or neck by an opponent who launches.
- All "defenseless players" are protected from blows to the head delivered by an opponent's helmet, forearm or shoulder.
- Kickers and punters during the kick and return, and quarterbacks after a change of possession, are protected from blows to the head delivered by an opponent's helmet, forearm or shoulder, instead of just helmet-to-helmet contact.
- The ball is declared dead at the spot if a runner's helmet comes completely off.

2009

- Teams are not permitted to intentionally form a wedge of more than two players on a kickoff return in an attempt to block for the runner.
- The "bunch" formation on kickoffs is eliminated. The kickoff team must have at least three players outside each hash mark, one of whom must be outside the yard-line number.
- It is an illegal "blindside" block if the blocker is moving toward his own endline and approaches the opponent from behind or from the side, and the initial force of the contact by the blocker's helmet, forearm or shoulder is to the head or neck area of an opponent.
- It is an illegal hit on a defenseless receiver if the initial force of the contact by the defender's helmet, forearm or shoulder is to the head or neck area of the receiver.
- The rule regarding low hits on passers is clarified:
 - A. A defender cannot initiate a roll or lunge and forcibly hit the passer in the knee area or below, even if he is being contacted by another player.
 - B. It is not a foul if the defender swipes, wraps or grabs a passer in the knee area or below in an attempt to tackle him.

2007

 A block below the waist against an eligible receiver while the quarterback is in the pocket is a 15-yard penalty instead of a 5-yard penalty (an illegal cut block).

2006

- Low hits on the quarterback are prohibited when a rushing defender has an opportunity to avoid such contact.
- Blocks in the back above the waist by the kicking team while the ball is in flight during a scrimmage kick are illegal.
- The definition of a "horse collar tackle" is expanded to include grabbing the inside collar of the jersey.
- During a field-goal attempt or a try, a defensive player who is within one yard of the line of scrimmage at the snap must have his helmet outside the snapper's shoulder pad.
- Personal or unsportsmanlike conduct fouls that occur during halftime or during intermission between the fourth period and an overtime period will be penalized on the ensuing kickoff.
- During a free kick, at least four kicking team players must be on each side of the kicker when the ball is kicked.

2005


- It is illegal to grab the inside collar of the shoulder pads to tackle a runner ("horse collar tackle").
- Unnecessarily running, diving into or throwing the body against a player who should not have reasonably anticipated such contact by an opponent is unnecessary roughness. Previously, the rule only protected a player who is out of the play.
- A kicker/punter must not be unnecessarily contacted by the receiving team through the end of the play or until he
 assumes a distinctly defensive position. An opponent may not unnecessarily initiate helmet-to-helmet contact to the
 kicker/punter during the kick or during the return.
- An offensive player who is aligned in the tackle box at the snap and moves to a position outside the box is prohibited from initiating contact on the side or below the waist of an opponent if the blocker is moving toward his own end line and approaches the opponent from behind or from the side ("peel back block"). The near shoulder of the blocker must be in front of his opponent's body.

2002

- The chop block technique is illegal on all kicking plays.
- It is illegal to hit a quarterback helmet-to-helmet any time after a change of possession.


Representing the best of the NFL's commitment to philanthropy and community impact, 32 players are selected as their team's Man of the Year and become eligible to win the national award.

Houston Texans defensive end J.J. Watt was named the **2017 Man of the Year** for his incredible humanitarianism during the aftereffects of Hurricane Harvey. In the wake of the devastating natural disaster, Watt rallied around his home team city and created a viral social media fundraising campaign as he watched news coverage of the destruction from the safety of his hotel room in Dallas.

His initial goal was \$200,000, pledging to match the first \$100,000. In only 19 days, Watt was able to raise more than \$37 million for the city and people of Houston.

During that time, he dedicated every free waking moment to identifying organizations that would help put the donations to good use and fulfill his promise of ensuring that the funds went directly to the victims of Harvey.





What started from the feelings of helplessness and heartbreak in that Dallas hotel room turned into a massive recovery effort that helped to salvage homes, feed and clothe families, and rebuild lives.

This wasn't Watt's first foray into charitable causes. In fact, his dedication to serving others is something that was instilled in him at a young age. In 2010, Watt started the Justin J. Watt Foundation in Wisconsin to help support underserved kids in the community. In total, the organization has raised over \$3.4 million for middle schools to help fund after-school athletic programs for kids created around his motto of "Dream Big, Work Hard." He also regularly works with foundations—including Make-A-Wish—and frequently visits local hospitals to raise the spirits of children receiving treatment.

Watt's commitment to bettering the world serves as an example for all of those around him—his coaches, teammates, competitors and fans—and the effects of his efforts are felt all across the nation.

WOUNDED WARRIOR PROJECT

The NFL teams with **Wounded Warrior Project** (WWP) to connect wounded veterans with free programs and resources that empower them to live their lives to the fullest. The NFL's support has enabled WWP to fund the expansion of combat stress recovery programs, as well as numerous Physical Health and Wellness expos across the country. More than 700 warriors and their families have benefited from the NFL's support this past year.

TRAGEDY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FOR SURVIVORS (TAPS)

The NFL and **TAPS** teamed to create a new team4taps program at the NFL Pro Bowl, supporting families of the fallen and military mentors. In addition, TAPS families were invited to the NFL's Vikings-Browns game in London to reconcile with military families of the fallen abroad. NFL funding also supported youth mentoring and counseling programs, including Good Grief Camps.

The NFL and USAA, the NFL's Official Military Appreciation Sponsor, annually recognize NFL players, coaches, personnel and alumni who demonstrate an exemplary commitment to honoring and supporting the military community with the **Salute to Service Award**. Atlanta Falcons wide receiver **ANDRE ROBERTS** was the 2017 recipient.



Roberts, whose parents served in the U.S. Army, has been widely engaged in military appreciation events throughout his NFL career. In his short time with the Atlanta Falcons, Andre has expressed extreme gratitude to the military with multiple visits to local VA hospitals, spending a day fishing with veterans at 'Fishing with the Falcons' and selecting the Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS) as his organization for My Cause My Cleats. His coach, Dan Quinn, was the 2016 recipient of the Salute to Service Award.

USAA, a leading provider of insurance and other services to U.S. military members, veterans and their families, donated \$25,000 in Roberts' honor to the official aid societies representing all five military branches.

Roberts' reach goes beyond team-based military community service and well into a deeply diversified off-season travel schedule to military bases across the nation. He also volunteers his time to camps offered to youth in grades 1–8.

MY CAUSE MY CLEATS

My Cause My Cleats was launched during the 2016 season to provide NFL players the chance to share the causes most important to them. The initiative was a culmination of 18 months of collaborative work between the NFL and players across the league. In its inaugural year, more than 500 players showcased their causes on-field during games, and many worked directly with Nike, Under Armour and Adidas to design their cleats.

This year, more than 800 players participated and took the field in customized cleats with special meanings during Week 13 of the 2017 NFL season. Players again had the opportunity to raise funds for the cause of their choosing by auctioning their cleats off at the NFL Auction. The NFL donates all funds to charities selected by players. Cleats from the 2017 My Cause My Cleats campaign have raised nearly \$200,000 for players' causes, with more cleats being auctioned every week.

MAKING AN IMPACT ON SOCIAL ISSUES

During the last year, the NFL has engaged owners, teams, players, public officials, law enforcement, members of the military, veterans, academic institutions and a host of other individuals and organizations to identify meaningful ways to strengthen our communities on issues pertaining specifically to social justice. This unprecedented dialogue has enabled listening and learning on a variety of complex issues.


LET'S LISTEN TOGETHER

In December 2017, the NFL announced a new and expanded program of community improvement aimed at featuring and supporting the positive efforts of our players making a difference in communities relative to social justice issues, particularly in three key areas: Education and Economic Advancement, Community-Police Relations and Criminal Justice Reform.

The campaign, **Let's Listen Together**, includes featured content highlighting the player-led work on social and racial equality. The campaign also includes social media support, as well as individual letters from players and owners sharing their stories and personal reasons for making social justice a priority.

The league also announced a working group committee, comprised of owners and players. The group includes Arizona Cardinals Owner and President MICHAEL BIDWILL, Atlanta Falcons Owner and Chairman ARTHUR BLANK, Cleveland Browns Owner JIMMY HASLAM, Jacksonville Jaguars Owner SHAHID KHAN and Miami Dolphins Owner STEPHEN ROSS.

The player representatives are offensive tackle **KELVIN BEACHUM**, NFL Legend **ANQUAN BOLDIN**, quarterback **JOSH MCCOWN**, cornerback **JOSH NORMAN** and NFL Legend **AENEAS WILLIAMS**.

The group will focus on supporting programs and initiatives that reduce barriers to opportunity, with a priority on supporting improvements in education and economic development, community and police relations, and the criminal justice system.

As part of the leaguewide social justice efforts, The NFL Foundation also launched a new grant for active and retired players who develop social justice programming or partner with local nonprofit organizations committed to this work, as well as a similar grant for team foundations.

Many teams and owners are engaged in ongoing social justice work. During the 2017 season alone, NFL teams, together with ownership and hundreds of players, have hosted or taken part in more than 100 events pertaining to social justice. This ongoing work is built upon the constructive dialogue that has been taking place for the past year among owners, players and NFL teams.

RALIANCE

The NFL also continues to support **Raliance**, a national collaborative comprised of three leading organizations committed to ending sexual violence in one generation. Raliance is making sexual violence prevention possible through awarding grants for innovative programming, advancing research, informing policy and supporting services for victims and survivors. Since its inception in 2016, the Raliance Impact Grant program has supported 52 projects totaling over \$2.3M to further sexual violence prevention initiatives.

Recently, Raliance launched a new, first-of-its-kind interactive resource center designed to engage the sport community as a partner in ending sexual and domestic violence. The Sport + Prevention Center includes more than 100 resources, best practices and key action steps to adopting sexual and domestic violence prevention strategies in communities across the country. In addition, as part of Raliance and NFL's shared commitment to youth empowerment, Raliance hosted two youth summits aimed at positively influencing high school students to engage as leaders in sexual violence prevention in their communities.

NFL CAREERS IN FOOTBALL FORUM

During Pro Bowl Week, the NFL hosted the **NFL Women's CAREERS IN FOOTBALL FORUM.** The program served to educate, inspire and connect qualified female candidates for positions in coaching, scouting and football administration at the NFL, CFL, collegiate and high school levels. Fifty women were selected to participate in the career development program from a pool of more than 400 applicants. Following the 2017 Women's Careers in Football Forum, ten females secured internships with NFL training camps in coaching and scouting, and twelve others secured football operations positions in collegiate and high school football.

Together with experts and advisors, the league continues to educate its staff, teams, players and the public about domestic violence and sexual assault prevention, as well as identifying steps that can prevent them before they occur. The NFL also continued the practice of meeting with employees of local domestic violence and sexual assault (DV/SA) organizations in conjunction with major NFL events, such as meeting with local DV/SA groups in Philadelphia during Draft Week and in Boston during Kickoff Week. The goal of these meetings is to update the groups on the league's social responsibility work and listen to them on issues facing the field and ways the NFL and its clubs can help.

"Unsung Heroes" luncheon to celebrate the often unnoticed efforts of the hundreds of employees and volunteers working behind the scenes at domestic violence shelters, sexual assault prevention organizations and similar institutions. This year's event featured a panel discussion from NFL Commissioner ROGER GOODELL, One Love CEO KATIE HOOD, and NFL players ANTHONY HARRIS, BENJAMIN WATSON and STEPHEN WEATHERLY, all of whom are engaged in domestic violence and human trafficking prevention efforts. In addition, the NFL works annually with Super Bowl host communities on funding and deploying human trafficking prevention initiatives.



This year marked the 10th anniversary of NFL PLAY 60, the league's youth health and wellness campaign to get kids active and healthy. In celebration, the NFL, all 32 teams and players hosted youth football clinics and built playgrounds and fitness zones all around the country to encourage physical activity and help remove access barriers for kids to play.



With contributions from the NFL Foundation, Special Olympics provided grants to local Special Olympics Programs in 11 NFL team markets. This year, the NFL and Special Olympics will expand those efforts to five new markets that will receive NFL Foundation funding. The grants will be used to help enhance Unified Sports programming and increase participation of athletes, Unified partners and coaches across the country. Over 100 new Unified Flag Football teams have been formed across the country through this partnership in the last 10 months.



CONTINUING THE FIGHT AGAINST CANCER

Through a longstanding partnership with the **American Cancer Society (ACS)**, the NFL has been a key supporter in the fight against cancer. Together, they have been committed to saving lives from breast cancer and addressing the unequal burden of cancer in underserved communities.

In 2017, the NFL and the ACS expanded this life-saving partnership—in conjunction with all 32 NFL teams—to have a broader focus on cancer prevention and early detection across multiple cancers.

The expanded Crucial Catch: Intercept Cancer campaign works to promote early detection and risk deduction for screenable cancers, including breast, colorectal and cervical. In addition, money raised continues to support the American Cancer Society's Community Health Advocates implementing Nationwide Grants for Empowerment and Equity (CHANGE) program, which provides outreach and cancer screenings to individuals in underserved communities.

CHARACTER PLAYBOOK

The NFL/United Way Character Playbook is a digital education program that helps middle school students learn how to cultivate and maintain healthy relationships. The NFL, United Way Worldwide and digital learning innovator **EVERFI, Inc.** created the evidence-based program that has rolled out in all 32 NFL market communities.

Character Playbook consists of six interactive modules that support positive character development, social-emotional learning and healthy relationships for students in grades 7–9. In its first year alone, the program saw an incredible effect.

Building off this success, Character Playbook has expanded to 360 more schools and included the 2017 NFL season launch of Character Playbook LIVE, part of a leaguewide initiative to engage more students in the important conversation about why character matters. This new virtual classroom experience, hosted by NFL clubs and local United Ways, allows NFL players to virtually join multiple classrooms and connect lessons taught in Character Playbook modules to life both inside and outside of football.

NFL GRANTS

The NFL Foundation is a strong supporter of youth and high school football, and through a multi-year grant has helped USA Football—the sport's national governing body and a member of the U.S. Olympic Committee-support the development, participation, safety and values of football. In 2017, USA Football's Heads Up Football program eclipsed 10,000 youth league and high school enrollments for the first time.

The Foundation also encourages active and healthy living by providing grants to the American Heart Association and The Cooper Institute. These grants power the NFL PLAY 60 campaigns. NFL clubs also receive grants from the Foundation to provide the NFL PLAY 60 programs in their areas.

Expanding student athletes' access to athletic trainers is another priority area for the NFL Foundation. In 2014, the NFL Foundation established a grant program designed to work with NFL clubs to increase access to athletic trainers in their communities. To date, 22 NFL clubs have utilized this grant to support local schools and leagues. In 2017, the NFL Foundation, in collaboration with Gatorade, the National Athletic Trainers' Association, the Korey Stringer Institute

and the Professional Football Athletic Trainers Society, launched a pilot program to award grants to public high schools in four states—Arizona, Illinois, Oklahoma and Oregon. Each grant is in the amount of \$35,000, awarded over a three-year period, to fund an athletic training program. Seventy-five schools received this grant to enhance sports health and safety for student athletes this year.

The Foundation is also deeply committed to supporting NFL players' philanthropic and community efforts and provides multiple grant opportunities to current and former players and clubs that help grow our game, support our communities and empower our youth.

NFL HIGH SCHOOL COACH OF THE YEAR

Every year, each of the NFL's 32 clubs nominates an exceptional high school coach to be considered for the Don Shula NFL High School Coach of the Year Award, named for the winningest coach in NFL history. The coaches are selected by each team for their character and integrity, leadership and dedication to the community, commitment to player health and safety, and on-field success.

During the 2018 Pro Bowl on ESPN, head football coach ROBERT GARRETT of Crenshaw High School in Los Angeles was named the 2017 Don Shula NFL High School Coach of the Year. Coach Garrett received \$25,000 from the NFL Foundation, \$15,000 of which is donated to his high school's football program.

Coach Garrett was nominated for the award by the Los Angeles Chargers. He led the Crenshaw Cougars to an impressive 12-3 record this season, and the team was crowned the 2017 CIF Division 4-AA State Champions.

Coach Garrett's success on the field is matched by his outstanding leadership and role as a mentor to young student-athletes. He is also the former coach of two current Los Angeles Chargers players, linebacker Hayes Pullard and defensive tackle Brandon Mebane.





NFL CONTINUES INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT WITH FOUR GAMES IN 2018

- LEAGUE WILL PLAY THREE GAMES IN THE UK AND ONE IN MEXICO -

The NFL's schedule of London Games for 2018 features three games at iconic Wembley Stadium, including three teams playing a regular-season game in London for the first time.

"We continue to be very excited by the growth of the NFL in the UK," said NFL commissioner **ROGER GOODELL**. "The fans have demonstrated outstanding support and passion for the NFL over the past 11 seasons and we look forward to some great games in London this year."

The 2018 London Series kicks off in Week 6 on Sunday, October 14 (1:00 PM ET), as the Oakland Raiders host the Seattle Seahawks. The Raiders, the home team in London for a second time, welcome the Seahawks to Wembley for their first game in London.

This game will mark the third straight season and the fourth time in five years that the Raiders have hosted a regular season game internationally, having played games at Mexico City's Estadio Azteca in each of the last two seasons, as well as making the team's debut in London against the Miami Dolphins in 2014.

"The Seahawks are excited to be playing in London on October 14 against the Raiders," said Seahawks Owner **PAUL ALLEN**. "We have a strong international following and are eager to celebrate the passion of the 12s in a city known for its enthusiastic support for sports."

Over the following two weeks, two additional teams will make their London debuts as visiting teams.

The Tennessee Titans will be hosted by the Los Angeles Chargers on October 21 (9:30 AM ET).

"We are excited as a franchise to be playing in London," said Titans controlling owner **AMY ADAMS STRUNK**. "There is a great relationship developing between Nashville and London with music being the common thread. We are looking forward to showcasing our team to the NFL fans in London and throughout Europe."

"Since we last visited London in 2008, the NFL's popularity has continued to grow in the UK," said Chargers president of business operations **A.G. SPANOS**. "It was an honor to be part of the early wave of regular season games played abroad back then, and it is every bit the honor to represent the league in London this time around. We're excited to introduce the Los Angeles Chargers brand, in person, to football fans in the UK this year."

The Super Bowl champion Philadelphia Eagles will face the Jacksonville Jaguars in a matchup of 2017 playoff teams on October 28 (9:30 AM ET). The Jaguars are playing a home game in London for the sixth straight season.

"I'm very much looking forward to it," said Eagles owner **JEFFREY LURIE**. "It's the first time we've really had a chance to go over there and it's nice to go over as Super Bowl champs. It's going to be a big game. We're playing an outstanding football team in the Jaguars. But I'm very much looking forward to it. I think London has a chance to be a franchise someday in the NFL."





"It's hard to believe we're about to play our sixth regular season game in London," said Jaguars owner **SHAD KHAN**, "but not hard to believe at all the positive impact our annual game continues to make, year after year, for the Jacksonville Jaguars and the growth of American football throughout the United Kingdom. The Jaguars and the NFL overall are building something special and, as important, something that is lasting. This season we welcome the Super Bowl champion Philadelphia Eagles to face us at Wembley Stadium, our home away from home. It doesn't get much bigger or better for the thousands of Jaguars fans throughout Europe who've grown to love and support our team since our first visit in 2013. The Eagles vs. Jaguars would be a highly anticipated game anywhere this season, but playing it at Wembley in the capital of the UK is going to be epic."

By the end of the 2018 season, the NFL will have played 24 regular-season games in London, with 29 of 32 teams having participated.

The NFL kicked off its series of regular-season games in London in 2007, when the New York Giants beat the Miami Dolphins at Wembley Stadium on their way to winning the Super Bowl. The home of English football has now hosted 18 NFL games, with almost 1.5 million fans attending those games.

"The NFL holds huge value and importance to Wembley Stadium. We are proud to have hosted games under the arch for the past decade and to have played a key role in the growth of the sport," said **MARTIN GLENN**, chief executive of the Football Association. "NFL games bring people to the stadium from all over the world, provide a boost to the local economy, and are among the highlights of the Wembley events calendar. Working closely together, we have been able to share knowledge and expertise with the NFL, and continue to learn a great deal from their events and the activation of their games. We are very excited to be welcoming some outstanding playoff teams to the stadium in 2018 and hope our strong partnership will continue for years to come."

Building off the tremendous success of the Mexico Game Series, the NFL will play in Mexico for a third consecutive season.

The Los Angeles Rams will host the Kansas City Chiefs at Estadio Azteca in Mexico City on November 19 (8:15 PM ET). This will be the second Monday Night Football game at Estadio Azteca. In 2016, the Oakland Raiders hosted the Houston Texans in the first-ever Monday Night Football game played outside the US.

"Over the past two seasons, we have seen the extraordinary passion that exists for NFL football in Mexico," said Goodell. "We are excited for another memorable event at Estadio Azteca as the Los Angeles Rams and Kansas City Chiefs head to Mexico City in 2018."

The Rams and Chiefs will both play their first regular-season game in Mexico next season. The Chiefs played a preseason game against the Dallas Cowboys in Monterrey, Mexico on August 5, 1996, earning a 32-6 win over the Dallas Cowboys.

Both clubs are looking forward to the opportunity to play in Mexico City.

"Southern California and Mexico share strong historic and cultural ties and this game will provide an opportunity to celebrate the special connection between these two regions," said Rams owner/chairman **STAN KROENKE**. "It is great to be participating in the NFL's international games again and working with the league to grow the game. Mexico has one of the largest NFL fan bases in the world and we are excited to bring Rams football to the millions of fans there."

"We are thrilled to be a part of the NFL's international initiatives once again, and we are excited to face the Rams at historic Estadio Azteca," said Kansas City Chiefs chairman & CEO CLARK HUNT. "The support for the NFL in Mexico has grown significantly since our initial trip in 1996. We look forward to returning to Mexico and connecting with a new generation of fans this season."

In 2017, the Ministry of Tourism and the NFL announced an agreement to play three NFL regular-season games from 2019 to 2021, having achieved positive results in tourism and the presence of Mexico's brand through the NFL's previous games in Mexico. The previous agreement covered games from 2016 to 2018.

The Ministry of Tourism highlighted the importance of high impact sporting events for the promotion of Mexico's tourism both nationally and internationally. This agreement is part of the strategies that are implemented within this sector to increase economic impact.

The relationship with the League has served as a platform to significantly boost the tourism industry in Mexico, with fans taking advantage of the opportunity to expand their trips and explore the country.









FROM LONDON TO THE SUPER BOWL

Born in London, Philadelphia Eagles running back **JAY AJAYI** (below) moved to the United States at the age of seven and has grown into one of the most popular and involved players in England. In Week 4 of the 2017 season, Ajayi, as a member of the Miami Dolphins, became the first London-born skill position player to appear in a London Series game, rushing for 46 yards on 12 carries.

"Having local heroes has always been something we see as a key part of growing the sport," said NFL Executive Vice President, International MARK WALLER. "Jay's success has given us a player who gains national media attention and can create headlines through scoring TDs in a way that a lineman, for example, can never achieve. He is someone we can use as a success story when talking to young British athletes about the potential of taking up our sport."

Originally selected by the Dolphins in the fifth round of the 2015 NFL Draft, Ajayi was acquired by Philadelphia via trade in Week 9 of the 2017 season. After rushing for 465 yards in seven games with the Dolphins, Ajayi added 408 rush yards with the Eagles in 2017, becoming the first player in NFL history to produce at least 400 rushing yards with two different teams in the same regular season.

Ajayi led Philadelphia with 184 rushing yards in the 2017 postseason, including 57 yards in Super Bowl LII. As the Eagles celebrated on the field following their Super Bowl victory, Ajayi was seen draped in a Union Jack, the national flag of the United Kingdom.

Ajayi will return to Wembley Stadium in Week 8 as the Eagles square off against the Jacksonville Jaguars (9:30 AM ET, NFLN).





INTERNATIONAL FEEL

While the NFL continues to grow in popularity across the globe, international players are making an increasing impact on the field.

For the 12th time in the past 13 seasons, at least one player who attended high school outside of the United States was selected in the NFL Draft.

This year, the Philadelphia Eagles selected offensive lineman JORDAN MAILATA (top) in the seventh round of the NFL Draft. The Samoan-born Australian professional rugby league player for the South Sydney Rabbitohs converted to football full-time early in 2018. The 6-8, 350-pounder has impressed NFL scouts at various workouts with his strength, footwork and athleticism, and will now continue his football journey with the Eagles.

"I had to weigh the pros and cons before I made the decision to come to the NFL," said Mailata. "I knew that if I made the decision, it has to be all-in. And that's what I have been giving it."

The Seattle Seahawks traded up to select Australian punter **MICHAEL DICKSON** in the fifth round of the 2018 NFL Draft. Dickson called the Seahawks' decision to trade up "a massive compliment."

"I'm really just focused on wining that job and trying to leave a footprint in the organization," said Dickson.

Canadian defensive lineman **NATHAN SHEPHERD** (bottom) was selected by the New York Jets in the third round. He began his college football career at Simon Fraser University in British, Columbia, the only NCAA-affiliated school in Canada. Financial issues forced him to leave school two years later but he never lost his love for the game. He worked, saved money and continued to train, eventually walking on to Fort Hays State's Division II football team.

"It says a lot about the man," said Jets head coach **TODD BOWLES** of Shepherd's long journey to the NFL. "He's determined to succeed no matter what he does. He carries himself that way. He works that way and I can appreciate that."

This season, eight teams will carry an overseas player on their practice squads during the 2018 season as part of the expanded International Player Pathway program (full details on page 95).

HISPANICS MAKING THEIR MARK ON THE NFL

Hispanic players are making their mark on the NFL. Following are some examples:

 Miami Dolphins linebacker KIKO ALONSO (top) hosted a free football camp in San Juan, Puerto Rico this offseason, the second year in a row he has hosted the camp. The clinic included a stretch session, on-field football drills and games.

"My dad was born in Cuba and grew up in Puerto Rico," said Alonso. "I've been visiting there since I was a little kid, ever since I can remember. That place is like a second home to me and my brothers."

In the aftermath of Hurricanes Irma and Maria, Alonso started a fundraiser, posting videos encouraging people to donate to recovery efforts. Alonso pledged the first \$25,000 and the Miami Dolphins matched his pledge. The campaign raised more than \$190,000.

In addition to hurricane relief, Alonso is raising funds for an American Youth Football chapter with the Pee Wee Football League of Puerto Rico. Funds will go towards facility renovations, uniforms, equipment, training and a week-long trip to Orlando, Florida for a team from the PWFL to play the best teams in America.

 New York Giants rookie guard WILL HERNANDEZ (bottom) faced pressure when deciding which sport he wanted to play growing up.

Hernandez's father, Robert Hernandez, was a professional soccer player in Mexico. His father passed down his love and passion for the sport to Will, coaching his soccer teams throughout his childhood. Eventually, Will decided he wanted to try a different sport.

"My dad was so passionate about soccer and so passionate about me being good in soccer, but he was 100 percent supportive when I told him I didn't really like the sport anymore and I wanted to try football," said Hernandez. "He said, 'That's fine, but if you're going to switch sports, you're going to give everything you've got in that sport."

Years later, Hernandez heard his name called as the second pick of the second round by the New York Giants in the 2018 NFL Draft.





• Los Angeles Rams rookie quarterback **LUIS PEREZ** had an uncommon journey to the NFL. Undrafted out of Texas A&M-Commerce, a Division-II football team, like Hernandez, Perez originally pursued a different sport.

Perez was a competitive bowler in high school, after discovering his talent going bowling for his dad's birthday. He's bowled 12 perfect games and competed across many different states.

Despite his skill as a bowler, Perez always had a love for the game of football. A love that paid off when he won the Harlon Hill trophy, the Division-II Heisman equivalent.

"I'm sitting in the stands and looking around and I'm seeing everybody come out of the tunnel and I'm like, 'Holy cow! What am I doing up here? I need to be down there,'" said Perez. "That was the moment that I decided, you know what, it's time to play football."

• Former NFL linebacker **DONNIE EDWARDS** joined NFL Legends **TONY RICHARDSON** and **AMANI TOOMER** on the first All-NFL Legends, week-long USO tour throughout Japan to visit U.S. Service members and their families at military bases.



EIGHT INTERNATIONAL PLAYERS ADDED TO PRACTICE SQUADS FOR 2018 SEASON

Eight teams will carry an overseas player on their practice squads during the 2018 season as part of an expansion of the **INTERNATIONAL PLAYER PATHWAY** program.

The program, instituted in 2017, aims to provide international athletes the opportunity to compete at the NFL level, improve their skills, and ultimately earn a spot on an NFL roster.

ALEX GRAY (Atlanta Falcons), **ALEX JENKINS** (New Orleans Saints), **ERIC NZEOCHA** (Tampa Bay Buccaneers), and **EFE OBADA** (Carolina Panthers), participants in 2017, will return to their NFC South teams for the upcoming season.

"Last year was exciting and special. Being a part of this program is great and my experience with the Falcons has been great as well," said Gray. "I learned so much. This game is amazing."

"I know the system better than the new guys coming in," said Obada at the conclusion of Panthers' rookie camp. "I feel like I know the standard and requirements that they want and all I have to do is apply myself."

An additional four teams – the **AFC NORTH** – will carry an overseas player on their roster until the end of the 2018 training camp. At that time, the players would be eligible for an international player practice squad exemption.

The Baltimore Ravens, Cincinnati Bengals, Cleveland Browns and Pittsburgh Steelers will each be given an exemption for an eleventh practice squad member – ineligible to be activated during the season – with two of the players selected coming from the UK and two from Germany. The AFC North was chosen to receive the international players in a random draw.

The players include **MORITZ BÖHRINGER** (Cincinnati Bengals), who was originally drafted in the sixth round by the Minnesota Vikings in 2016, German Football League player **CHRISTOPHER EZEALA** (Baltimore Ravens), former British American Football League player **TIGIE SANKOH** (Cleveland Browns) and former English professional rugby player **CHRISTIAN SCOTLAND-WILLIAMSON** (Pittsburgh Steelers).

For three months during the 2018 offseason, the players trained alongside NFL players and draft hopefuls in Florida, under the supervision of former NFL UK head of football Aden Durde, who was hired as the Atlanta Falcons defensive quality control coach after this season's program, along with IMG Academy coaches including running back coach Earnest Byner, offensive line coach Paul Dunn, defensive back coach Donnie Henderson and wide receiver coach Larry Kirksey.

Moritz Bohringer, 24 TE/WR, Cincinnati (Germany)	Selected in the sixth round of the 2016 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings, becoming the first player to be drafted directly from European football. Had previously been combining his university studies with playing for the Schwäbisch Hall Unicorns in the German Football League. Spent the 2016 season on the Vikings practice squad.	
Christopher Ezeala, 22 FB, Baltimore (Germany)	Played as a fullback and linebacker in the German Football League for the Ingolstadt Dukes, having begun playing the sport for the Munich Rangers and Allgäu Comets. Has focused on the fullback position, saying: "My coaches told me that while there are many linebackers like me in the NFL, there is no fullback that is so athletic and fast, so they are trying to create a new type of player with me."	
Tigie Sankoh, 21 DB, Cleveland (UK)	Played amateur football throughout his teenage years and attended the American Football Academy at Filton College in Bristol, England. Went on to represent the London Warriors in the British American Football League.	
Christian Scotland-Williamson, 24 TE, Pittsburgh (UK)	Converted to American football early in 2018 after a professional rugby career in England, where he played for the Worcester Warriors in the English Premiership. Having been selected to participate in an all-star high school camp in Virginia, he earned a scholarship to play college football at the University of the Incarnate Word in San Antonio, Texas. WHAT TO LOOK FOR - THE PLAYERS

TOM BRADY, New England, can join Peyton Manning (14) and Drew Brees (12) as the only players in NFL history to pass for at least 4,000 yards in 10 seasons. Brady has passed for at least 4,000 yards nine times in 18 career seasons (see Rivers note).

Brady needs 21 touchdown passes (incl. postseason) to surpass P. Manning (579) for the most touchdown passes in NFL history (incl. postseason). In 18 seasons, Brady has 559 career touchdown passes, including the postseason.

Brady needs 12 touchdown passes to join P. Manning (539) and Favre (508) as the only players to reach 500 career regular-season touchdown passes. In 18 seasons, Brady has 488 career touchdown passes in the regular season (see Brees note).

Brady needs 3,841 passing yards to become the fourth quarterback in NFL history with at least 70,000 passing yards. In 18 seasons, Brady has 66,159 career passing yards.

DREW BREES (top), New Orleans, needs 1,394 passing yards to surpass Brett Favre (71,838) for second place in NFL history in passing yards and 1,496 yards to surpass Peyton Manning (71,940) as NFL's all-time leading passer. In 17 seasons, Brees has 70,445 career passing yards.

Brees needs 79 completions to surpass Brett Favre (6,300) for the most completions in NFL history. In 17 seasons, Brees has 6,222 career completions.

Brees needs 12 touchdown passes to join P. Manning (539) and Favre (508) as the only players to reach 500 career touchdown passes. In 17 seasons, Brees has 488 career touchdown passes (see Brady note).

BEN ROETHLISBERGER, Pittsburgh, needs 411 passing yards to pass John Elway (51,475) for seventh place in NFL history in career passing yards. Roethlisberger has 51,065 career passing yards in 14 seasons (see Rivers note).

PHILIP RIVERS (bottom), Los Angeles Chargers, needs 1,128 passing yards to pass John Elway (51,475) for seventh place in NFL history in career passing yards. In 14 seasons, Rivers has 50,348 career passing yards (see Roethlisberger note).

With at least 4,000 passing yards in 2018, Rivers (nine) would join Peyton Manning (14) and Drew Brees (12) as the only players in NFL history with 10 seasons with at least 4,000 passing yards (see Brady note).

CAM NEWTON, Carolina, needs 609 rushing yards to pass Randall Cunningham (4,928) for the second-most career rushing yards by a quarterback in NFL history. In seven seasons, Newton has 4,320 career rushing yards.

Newton can become the first quarterback in NFL history to rush for at least 700 yards in four seasons.





MATT RYAN, Atlanta, can become the second quarterback in NFL history with at least 4,000 passing yards in eight consecutive seasons, joining Drew Brees (12) (see Stafford note).

MATTHEW STAFFORD (top), Detroit, can become the second quarterback in NFL history with at least 4,000 passing yards in eight consecutive seasons, joining Drew Brees (12) (see Ryan note).

RUSSELL WILSON, Seattle, has passed for at least 3,000 yards and 20 touchdowns in each of his first six seasons and can join P. Manning as the only quarterbacks to reach 3,000 passing yards and 20 touchdowns in each of their first seven seasons.

LARRY FITZGERALD, Arizona, needs 92 receptions to pass Tony Gonzalez (1,325) for second place on the NFL's all-time receptions list. In 14 seasons, Fitzgerald has 1,234 career catches.

Fitzgerald needs 390 receiving yards to pass Terrell Owens (15,934) for second place on the NFL's all-time receiving yards list. Fitzgerald has 15,545 receiving yards in 14 career seasons.

Fitzgerald needs 48 receptions to pass Jerry Rice (1,281) for the most receptions with one team in NFL history. In 14 seasons with the Cardinals, Fitzgerald has 1,234 receptions.

With 1,000 receiving yards, Fitzgerald (nine) would tie Randy Moss (10) for the second most 1,000-yard receiving seasons in NFL history.

Fitzgerald (five) can tie Brandon Marshall (six) for the most career seasons with at least 100 catches and 1,000 receiving yards (see Brown note).

ANTONIO BROWN, Pittsburgh, needs three games with at least 10 receptions to tie Andre Johnson (22) for the most career games with at least 10 catches. Brown has 19 such games in eight seasons.

Brown (582) can surpass Wes Welker (672 from 2007-2012) for the most receptions by a player over any six-season span in NFL history. Brown (7,848) can also surpass Jerry Rice (8,759 from 1990-95) for the most receiving yards by a player over any six-season span in NFL history.

Brown (five) can tie Brandon Marshall (six) for the most career seasons with at least 100 catches and 1,000 receiving yards (see Fitzgerald note).

JARVIS LANDRY, Cleveland, needs 27 catches to surpass Larry Fitzgerald (426) for the most receptions by a player in his first five seasons in NFL history. In four seasons, Landry has 400 career receptions.

ODELL BECKHAM, JR. (bottom), New York Giants, has 313 receptions in 47 career games and needs seven receptions in his first three games to surpass Lionel Taylor (319) for the most receptions by a player through his first 50 career games.

Beckham has 4,424 receiving yards in 47 career games and needs 362 receiving yards in his first three games to surpass Lance Alworth (4,785) for the most receiving yards by a player through his first 50 career games.

MICHAEL THOMAS, New Orleans, can join Odell Beckham, Jr. as the only players in NFL history to record at least 90 receptions in each of their first three seasons.

JULIO JONES, Atlanta, has recorded at least 1,400 receiving yards in each of the past four seasons and can become the first player in NFL history to register five consecutive seasons with at least 1,400 receiving yards.

BRANDON MARSHALL, Seattle, has 959 receptions in 12 career seasons and needs 41 catches to become the 15th player in NFL history to record 1,000 career receptions.

ROB GRONKOWSKI, New England, can surpass Tony Gonzalez (four) and Jason Witten (four) for the most 1,000-yard seasons by an NFL tight end. Gronkowski has four career seasons with at least 1,000 receiving yards.

FRANK GORE, Miami, needs 1,000 rushing yards to join Emmitt Smith (11), Curtis Martin (10), Walter Payton (10) and Barry Sanders (10) as the only players in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards in at least 10 different seasons. In 13 seasons, Gore has rushed for 1,000 yards nine times.

MARK INGRAM, New Orleans, needs 735 rushing yards to surpass Deuce McAllister (6,096) as the franchise's all-time leading rusher. In seven seasons with the Saints, Ingram has 5,362 rushing yards.

Ingram needs six rushing touchdowns to surpass McAllister (49) as the club's all-time leader. Ingram has 44 rushing touchdowns in seven seasons.

MELVIN GORDON (top), Los Angeles Chargers, can become the third player in team history to record at least 1,200 scrimmage yards and 10 total touchdowns in three consecutive seasons, joining Lance Alworth (eight consecutive seasons) and LaDainian Tomlinson (four).

DUKE JOHNSON, JR., Cleveland, can become the first running back in NFL history with at least 500 receiving yards in each of his first four seasons.

JULIUS PEPPERS, Carolina, needs six sacks to pass Kevin Greene (160) for the third-most in the NFL since the sack became an official statistic in 1982. In 16 seasons, Peppers has 154.5 career sacks.

J.J. WATT (bottom), Houston, can become the second player to record four seasons with at least 15 sacks since the sack became an official statistic in 1982. Reggie White had five such seasons.

ADAM VINATIERI, Indianapolis, needs seven converted field goals to pass Morten Andersen (565) for the most made field goals in NFL history. In 22 seasons, Vinatieri has converted 559 career field goals.

Vinatieri needs 58 points to surpass Andersen (2,544) for the most points scored in NFL history. Vinatieri has 2,487 career points in 22 seasons.

Vinatieri has appeared in 337 career games in 22 seasons and can become the fourth player in NFL history to appear in 350 career games.

RUSSELL WILSON

Seattle quarterback **RUSSELL WILSON** vaulted himself into the MVP conversation in 2017, passing for 3,983 yards, 34 touchdowns and 11 interceptions for a 95.4 passer rating, while adding 586 rushing yards and three rushing touchdowns.

Wilson guided the Seahawks to a 9-7 record last season and became the first quarterback in NFL history with a winning record in each of his first six career seasons. Wilson has a career 65-30-1 (.682) regular-season record since being drafted by the Seahawks in the third round (75th overall) of the 2012 NFL Draft.

Wilson, who led the NFL with 34 touchdown passes last year, had 19 fourthquarter touchdown passes in 2017 and surpassed **ELI MANNING** (15 in 2011) for the most in a single season in NFL history.

His 34 touchdown passes tied his own franchise record (2015) for the most in a single season. Wilson has also climbed Seattle's franchise leaderboard, ranking third in franchise history in career passing yards (22,176), touchdown passes (161) and completions (1,815).





It marked the sixth season of Newton's career in which he has passed for 3,000 yards and rushed for 500 yards in the same season, the most by a quarterback in NFL history.



The first-overall pick by Carolina in the 2011 NFL Draft, Newton joined Cincinnati quarterback **ANDY DALTON** and **PEYTON MANNING** as the only quarterbacks in NFL history to pass for at least 3,000 yards in each of their first seven seasons.

In 2017, Newton became the first quarterback in NFL history to rush for 50 career touchdowns and is the league's all-time leader among quarterbacks with 54 rushing TDs. He has rushed for at least 700 yards three times during his career, tied with quarterback **MICHAEL VICK** (three) for the most such seasons by a quarterback.

Newton has 4,320 career rushing yards and is the fourth quarterback in NFL history to rush for at least 4,000 yards. With 680 rushing yards in 2018, Newton can join **MICHAEL VICK** (6,109) as the only quarterbacks in NFL history to rush for at least 5,000 yards.

15 YEARS OF MANNING, RIVERS & ROETHLISBERGER

2018 marks the 15th season for players selected in the 2004 NFL Draft, which featured quarterbacks ELI MANNING (first overall), PHILIP RIVERS (fourth) and BEN ROETHLISBERGER (11th) all taken in the first round. Manning, who was selected first overall by the San Diego Chargers, and Rivers, who was the fourth overall selection of the New York Giants, were swapped on Draft night and both players have served as the faces of their respective franchises from that point on, while Roethlisberger has anchored two Super Bowl-winning teams in Pittsburgh.

Over the course of their careers, Manning, Rivers and Roethlisberger have all become their respective franchise leaders in passing yards and touchdown passes, and the trio represents three of only nine quarterbacks in NFL history to throw for at least 50,000 yards and 300 touchdowns in their careers.

THE PLAYERS QUARTERBACKS

QUARTERBACK SUCCESS

NFL QBs put together a historically proficient and prolific year in 2017.

The league-wide completion percentage (62.1) and passer rating (86.9) both rank as the fourth-highest totals in league history.

New Orleans quarterback **DREW BREES** ranked first in the NFL with 386 completions in 536 attempts in 2017, leading to an NFL-record 72.0 completion percentage, surpassing **SAM BRADFORD**'s record of 71.6 percent set in 2016.


The league-wide interception percentage of 2.5 percent was the third-lowest of any season in NFL history. Quarterback **ALEX SMITH** finished the 2017 season with 4,042 passing yards, five interceptions and a league-best 104.7 passer rating for the Kansas City Chiefs. Smith, who was traded to Washington during the 2018 offseason, is the first quarterback in NFL history to pass for at least 3,000 yards and throw fewer than 10 interceptions in five consecutive seasons.

Eight quarterbacks passed for at least 4,000 yards in 2017: New England's **TOM BRADY** (4,577), Los Angeles Chargers' **PHILIP RIVERS** (4,515), Detroit's **MATTHEW STAFFORD** (4,446, top), Brees (4,334), Pittsburgh's **BEN ROETHLISBERGER** (4,251), Atlanta's **MATT RYAN** (4,095, bottom), Washington's **KIRK COUSINS** (4,093) and Smith (4,042).

Brees (4,334) extended his NFL-record streak to 12 consecutive seasons with at least 4,000 passing yards, while Stafford (4,446) and Ryan (4,095) each recorded their seventh consecutive season with 4,000+ passing yards, tied for second-longest streak in league annals.

Brady, who turned 40 years old during the 2017 season, led the NFL with 4,577 passing yards and is the oldest player in NFL history to lead the league in passing yards. The previous record was held by Pro Football Hall of Famer **FRAN TARKENTON** (38 years old), who led the NFL with 3,468 passing yards in 1978. Brady's 4,577 passing yards and 32 touchdown passes in 2017 are both the most by a quarterback in a single season at the age of 40 or older.

"It's a quarterback league. I mean, who are we kidding?" said Bills general manager **BRANDON BEANE**. "If you look at the playoff teams, the consistent guys that at least qualify for the playoffs or are close every year, most of them have QBs, most of them have a legit quarterback. If you're a GM, you have to find a franchise quarterback. It obviously helps keep you on a consistent playing field if you have one."

Five quarterbacks finished the season with a passer rating of at least 100: Smith (104.7), Brees (103.9), Brady (102.8), Philadelphia's CARSON WENTZ (101.9) and Los Angeles Rams' JARED GOFF (100.5).

Wentz, who set a single-season franchise record with 33 touchdown passes, became the third quarterback in NFL history to have at least 25 touchdown passes (28) and five or fewer interceptions (five) through his team's first 11 games, joining Tom Brady (2007, 2015, 2017) and AARON RODGERS (2011, 2014).

Three quarterbacks threw for at least 30 touchdowns in 2017: Seattle's RUSSELL WILSON (34), Wentz (33) and Brady (32).

Wilson led the NFL with 34 touchdown passes and threw 19 fourth-quarter touchdowns, surpassing ELI MANNING (15 in 2011) for the most in a single season in NFL history.

The 2017 season featured many exciting games that came down to the wire. Some of the most iconic moments in NFL history have taken place with the game on the line.

Seattle quarterback RUSSELL WILSON (top) led the NFL with a 134.1 passer rating in the fourth quarter in 2017 and had 19 fourth-quarter touchdown passes, surpassing ELI MANNING (15 in 2011) for the most in a single season in NFL history.

Wilson's 134.1 fourth-quarter rating is the highest in a single season since 1991, surpassing the previous high of 130.4 by Pro Football Hall of Famer STEVE YOUNG for the 1994 San Francisco 49ers.

Houston quarterback **DESHAUN WATSON** (bottom) quickly earned a reputation as a clutch performer during his rookie season. In Week 5 of the 2017 season, Watson became the first rookie since 1983 (Pro Football Hall of Famer JOHN ELWAY) to throw three touchdown passes in a fourth quarter.

Last season, Detroit quarterback MATTHEW STAFFORD threw three touchdown passes - including the game-winning score with 10:46 remaining in the fourth quarter - in the Lions' Week 10 victory.

The performance marked Stafford's 30th career game-winning drive in the fourth quarter or overtime. Among players who made their NFL debut since 1970, Stafford has reached 30 such game-winning drives in the fewest number of career games (118).

YOUNG QBs ON THE RISE

As long-tenured veterans continue to climb the record books, young stars are emerging at quarterback around the NFL. Below is a sampling of statistical highlights from several of the league's top young passers.

 Philadelphia quarterback CARSON WENTZ, who set a single-season franchise record with 33 touchdown passes in 2017, became the third quarterback in NFL history to have at least 25 touchdown passes (28) and five or fewer interceptions (five) through his team's first 11 games, joining TOM BRADY (2007, 2015, 2017) and AARON RODGERS (2011, 2014). Wentz suffered a season-ending knee injury in Week 14.

 After being acquired by the 49ers on October 30, 2017, San Francisco quarterback JIMMY GAROPPOLO won each of his five starts with the team and is one of five quarterbacks since 1970 to win each of his first seven NFL starts.

Houston rookie quarterback DESHAUN WATSON (top) threw 19 touchdown passes in his first seven games last season, the most by a player in his first seven games in NFL history, surpassing Pro Football Hall of Famer KURT WARNER (18). Watson became the first rookie quarterback to throw at least three touchdown passes in four consecutive games (Weeks 4-8, Texans had a bye in Week 7) and his 16 touchdown passes from Weeks 4-8 were the most in league history by a rookie in any four-game span.

In Week 8, Watson became the first player in league annals with at least 400 passing yards (402), four touchdown passes (four) and 50 rushing yards (67) in a single game.

Dallas quarterback DAK PRESCOTT had 50 touchdowns (39 passing, 11 rushing) in his first 25 career games and became one of four quarterbacks since 1970 to account for at least 50 touchdowns in his first 25 career games, joining Pro Football Hall of Famers DAN MARINO (62 touchdowns) and KURT WARNER (60) and DAUNTE CULPEPPER (55).

Prescott has 45 passing touchdowns and 12 rushing touchdowns in his career and joined **CAM NEWTON** as the only players in NFL history to have at least 35 passing touchdowns and 10 rushing touchdowns in their first two seasons.

 Los Angeles Rams quarterback JARED GOFF (bottom) passed for at least 300 yards and three touchdowns with no interceptions in Weeks 9 and 10 and became the first player in franchise history to pass for 300+ yards and three touchdowns with no interceptions in consecutive games.

ROOKIE QBS LOOK TO MAKE THEIR MARK

Five quarterbacks - Oklahoma's BAKER MAYFIELD (No. 1 overall, Cleveland), USC's SAM DARNOLD (No. 3, New York Jets), Wyoming's JOSH ALLEN (No. 7, Buffalo), UCLA's JOSH ROSEN (No. 10, Arizona) and Louisville's LAMAR JACKSON (No. 32, Baltimore) - were selected in the first round of the 2018 NFL Draft.

It marked the third time that at least five quarterbacks have been selected in the Draft's opening round since the inception of the common draft in 1967. The 1983 NFL Draft holds the record with six guarterbacks selected in the first round, including Pro Football Hall of Famers JOHN ELWAY, JIM KELLY and DAN MARINO.

"You've got to have a franchise guarterback," says Bills general manager **BRANDON BEANE**. "That's one of the main jobs of a GM is to find a franchise quarterback. It's a quarterback league. I'll say it every single time: You have to have one."

The four quarterbacks selected in the top ten - Mayfield, Darnold, Allen and Rosen - were the most in a single draft since the inception of the common draft era in 1967.

Last season, rookie quarterback DE SHONE KIZER, a second-round pick (No. 52 overall) in the 2017 NFL Draft, started for the Browns on Kickoff Weekend. At least one rookie quarterback has started in Week 1 in 10 consecutive seasons, the longest streak in the NFL since at least 1950.

QUARTERBACKS OF THE FUTURE

The success of a team often hinges on the production at the quarterback position.

GIL BRANDT, who oversaw the Dallas Cowboys' personnel department for 29 years and currently shares his gridiron knowledge as a senior analyst for NFL.com, sees plenty of quarterback talent coming up the pike.

"The quarterbacks we see in college now are so much more developed passers than the quarterbacks we saw 25 years ago, simply because teams are throwing the ball so much more at the high school and collegiate level," said Brandt. "The increase of personal quarterback coaches can also be attributed to quarterbacks being NFL-ready at a younger age."

Los Angeles Rams running back **TODD GURLEY** led the NFL with 2,093 scrimmage yards and 19 touchdowns (13 rushing, six receiving) in 2017, becoming the third different player in NFL history to have at least 2,000 scrimmage yards, 10 rushing touchdowns and more than five touchdown catches in a single season, joining Pro Football Hall of Famers **O.J. SIMPSON** and **MARSHALL FAULK**.

LE'VEON BELL

In 2017, Steelers running back LE'VEON BELL led all NFL running backs with a franchise-record 85 receptions, ranked second in the league with 1,946 scrimmage yards and was third with 1,291 rush yards. It marked his second season with at least 80 receptions (83 in 2014) and he became the fourth running back in NFL history with at least two seasons with 80+ receptions.





Rookie running backs burst onto the scene in 2017, making immediate impacts across the league.

New Orleans' ALVIN KAMARA and Kansas City's KAREEM HUNT, who led the NFL with 1,327 rushing yards last season, both made the Pro Bowl as rookies, while Jacksonville's LEONARD FOURNETTE and Carolina's CHRISTIAN MC CAFFREY both ran their way into the record books.

DOUBLE TROUBLE RUNNING BACKS

They seem to be all over the league. Those running backs, like **TODD GURLEY** (top) and **LE'VEON BELL**, that can hurt you two ways: rushing or catching the ball.

Dual-threat running backs not only force defenses to be ready for anything, but they allow offenses to keep their best playmakers on the field in any situation.

More and more offenses are relying on these dual-threat runners to keep the chains moving. Six running backs rushed for at least 1,000 yards while adding at least 50 receptions in 2017.


Running backs are entering the league with an improved ability to catch the football. That stood out to New Orleans quarterback **DREW BREES**, who saw Saints' rookie **ALVIN KAMARA** (bottom) lead all running backs with 826 receiving yards and rank second among running backs with 81 receptions in 2017. Kamara (826 receiving, 728 rushing) joined Pro Football Hall of Famer **CHARLEY TAYLOR** (1964) as the only rookies in NFL history to have at least 700 receiving yards and 700 rushing yards in a single season.

"Guys seem to come in even more prepared now than they ever have been," said Brees. "They can run the ball between the tackles, they can catch the ball out of the backfield, you can split them out and almost treat them as receivers sometimes."

Six NFL running backs had at least 500 receiving yards in 2017, led by Kamara's 826 receiving yards. Bell led all running backs with 85 receptions.

He also has 7,848 receiving yards since 2013, the most receiving yards over any five-year span, topping Harrison's previous record of 7,594 yards from 1999-2003.

Brown needs 91 catches in 2018 to pass WES WELKER (672 from 2007-2012) and 912 receiving yards to pass Pro Football Hall of Famer JERRY RICE (8,759 from 1990-95) for the most receptions and receiving yards, respectively, by a player over any six-year span in NFL history.

LARRY FITZGERALD

Arizona wide receiver **LARRY FITZGERALD** ranked second in the NFL with 109 catches in 2017 – his fifth career season with at least 100 receptions – and recorded his ninth career 1,000-yard season as he continued his ascent on the league's all-time receiving leaderboard. Fitzgerald was named to his 11th Pro Bowl, the second-most in NFL history among wide receivers, trailing only Pro Football Hall of Famer **JERRY RICE** (13).

Fitzgerald's 1,234 career receptions and 15,545 career receiving yards both rank third in NFL history. With 92 receptions and 390 receiving yards in 2018, Fitzgerald will surpass **TONY GONZALEZ** (1,325 receptions) and Pro Football Hall of Famer **TERRELL OWENS** (15,934 receiving yards), respectively, for second place in league history in both categories.







Cincinnati wide receiver **A.J. GREEN** finished the 2017 season with 75 receptions for 1,078 yards and eight touchdowns, his sixth career 1,000-yard season. Green has recorded at least 950 receiving yards in each of his first seven seasons, becoming the first player in NFL history to accomplish the feat, surpassing **RANDY MOSS** who began his career with six consecutive seasons with 950 receiving yards.

Since entering the league in 2011, Green ranks fourth in the NFL with 8,213 receiving yards, fifth with 556 catches and sixth with 57 touchdown catches. With 10 TD catches in 2018, Green would surpass **CHAD JOHNSON** (66) for the most in franchise history.

In Week 3 of the 2017 season, Green (89 games) became the third player in NFL history to reach 500 career receptions and 50 touchdown catches in his first 90 career games, joining Pro Football Hall of Famer MARVIN HARRISON and LARRY FITZGERALD.

With 787 receiving yards and three receiving touchdowns in 2018, Green can become the seventh player in NFL history with 9,000 receiving yards and 60 receiving touchdowns in their first eight seasons. Three of the six to do so - MARVIN HARRISON, RANDY MOSS and JERRY RICE - are enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.



CLASS OF 2014 ENTERS FIFTH YEAR

The 2014 NFL Draft saw some of the league's top wide receivers selected in the first two rounds. The New York Giants' **ODELL BECKHAM, JR.** (No. 12 overall) and Cleveland's **JARVIS LANDRY** (No. 63 overall to Miami) – who were college teammates at LSU – are both Pro Bowlers who have rewritten the record books in their first four years in the NFL.

Landry, who was traded to the Browns this offseason, led the NFL with a career-high 112 receptions in 2017, his second career 100-catch season (110 in 2015). He has 400 catches since entering the league in 2014 and surpassed **ANQUAN BOLDIN** (342) for the most catches by a player in his first four seasons in NFL history. Landry is also the only player in NFL history with at least 80 catches in each of his first four seasons.

Last season, Beckham recorded his 300th reception in his 45th career game, surpassing Boldin (47 games) as the fastest player to reach the milestone in NFL history.

WIDE RECEIVERS/TIGHT ENDS

MOVING THE CHAINS

A precise route can be the difference between a game-changing play and an appearance by the punt team. It's a skill for a receiver to know exactly where he needs to go in order to move the chains and keep a drive going. On third down, the best receivers carefully gauge each step to ensure their routes finish beyond the first-down marker.

Los Angeles Chargers Pro Bowl wide receiver KEENAN ALLEN led all receivers on third down with 30 first-down catches in 2017, the second-highest total within the last 10 seasons trailing only Pittsburgh wide receiver ANTONIO BROWN, who had 31 such catches in 2015.

Part of what makes Allen so difficult to defend on third down is his ability to move to different positions on the field.

"He's moved around to all different spots," said Chargers offensive coordinator KEN WHISENHUNT. "You always notice him when the ball goes to him a little bit more, but he does a really nice job. He's a fabulous player."

Minnesota wide receiver ADAM THIELEN (right), who ranked second in the NFL with 25 first-down receptions on third down last season, knows the importance of third down.

"Obviously, we know as an offense that third downs are huge, for every team. It's something we talked about in the offseason that we needed to get better at third-down conversions. Coaches did a really good job all season of putting us in really good positions, and our quarterback, [former Vikings quarterback] Case Keenum, did such a good job of giving the receivers a chance and letting us make a play.'

YARDS AFTER THE CATCH

As versatile running backs and quick passing attacks continue to become more prevalent in today's game, additional yards after the catch have become an increasingly important part of an offense's success.

Los Angeles Rams running back **TODD GURLEY** (top) led the league with 811 yards after the catch last season, becoming one of only nine players to eclipse 800 yards after the catch since the stat was first tracked in 1992.

"What I didn't know is how good a pass-catcher he is," said Falcons head coach **DAN QUINN** on Gurley's receiving ability. "And that part of his game has really come through. He's really proved he can handle the load in a big way."

PROTECTING THE QUARTERBACK

Protecting the quarterback is vital to NFL success.

"I have always felt that the offensive line is the heartbeat for a franchise," says FOX NFL analyst and Pro Football Hall of Fame quarterback TROY AIKMAN. "If you've got tough, physical offensive linemen, then your team is going to be tough and physical. That becomes what your identity is."

With such a premium placed on keeping the quarterback out of harm's way, it is no surprise that teams have made it a priority to draft offensive tackles. Three offensive tackles - San Francisco's MIKE MC GLINCHEY (9th overall), Oakland's KOLTON MILLER (15th) and New England's ISAIAH WYNN (23rd) - were selected in the first round of the 2018 NFL Draft, marking the fifth time in the past six years that at least three tackles were drafted in the first round.

"Protecting the passer is always a priority," says Cincinnati head coach MARVIN LEWIS. "It's never changed."





The Los Angeles Chargers tandem of defensive end **JOEY BOSA** (top) and linebacker **MELVIN INGRAM** (bottom) wreaked havoc on opposing offenses last season, becoming one of only three pairs of teammates to each record at least 10 sacks in 2017 and the first pair of Chargers teammates to accomplish the feat since 2006.

Bosa, who was selected with the No. 3 overall pick in the 2016 NFL Draft, made an immediate impact on the Chargers defensive line as a rookie, recording 10 sacks in 12 games and earning NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year honors. Bosa's play continued to elevate in 2017, as he led the team and ranked second in the AFC with 12.5 sacks. Bosa had 19 sacks in his first 20 career games, the most by a player in his first 20 games to begin a career since the individual sack became an official statistic in 1982.







"The numbers are great, but it's all the other stuff," says Dallas defensive coordinator ROD MARINELLI. "He plays the run really well. He's a dominant player and I'm glad to see other people notice that. You guys have watched him relentlessly going sideline-to-sideline. You watch other players in the league, and they don't play like that. His effort energizes the rest of the guys. They don't want to look bad getting passed-up by him. He embodies the standard of what we want by the physical way that he plays his position."

STELLAR DEFENSIVE ROOKIES

The 2017 season continued a strong NFL trend of standout rookie play, especially on the defensive side of the field.

New Orleans safety MARSHON LATTIMORE, who led NFL rookies with five interceptions while helping the Saints to an 11-5 record and the NFC South division title, took home the league's Defensive Rookie of the Year award.

Cleveland defensive end MYLES GARRETT, the No. 1 overall pick in the 2017 NFL Draft, led the Browns with seven sacks in 11 games played last season, while Cincinnati linebacker CARL LAWSON led all rookies with 8.5 sacks.

The New York Jets' safety duo of JAMAL ADAMS and MARCUS MAYE were the only pair of defensive rookie teammates to each start all 16 games in 2017. Adams had 82 tackles, tied with Houston linebacker ZACH CUNNINGHAM for the second-most by a rookie last season and trailing only Detroit linebacker JARRAD DAVIS (96).

Buffalo cornerback TRE'DAVIOUS WHITE tied Lattimore for the most passes defensed by a rookie with 18. White added four interceptions, becoming the third Bills rookie since 1980 with at least four interceptions in a season.

CLUTCH KICKERS

Led by Buffalo's STEPHEN HAUSCHKA (below) and Detroit's MATT PRATER, 2017 was a record-setting season for placekickers. 107 field goals of at least 50 yards were converted in 2017, the most in a single season in NFL history, and both Hauschka and Prater made four field goals of at least 55 yards, tied for the most in a single season in NFL history.

"Lots of times, especially at home when it's kind of quiet. I just listen and you can hear it when it hits his foot," said Lions quarterback MATTHEW STAFFORD of Prater's success in 2017. "He's done a great job...He's been kicking it great."

Hauschka, who signed with Buffalo during the 2017 offseason, converted an NFL-record 13 consecutive 50+ yard fieldgoal attempts dating back to 2015.

A season of long field goals got underway immediately on Kickoff Weekend, as Raiders kicker GIORGIO TAVECCHIO connected on two 52-yard field goals in the contest, becoming the first player in league history to make two field goals of at least 50 yards in his NFL debut.

Entering the 2018 season, Prater (43) needs seven field goals of at least 50 yards to join SEBASTIAN JANIKOWSKI (55) and JASON HANSON (52) as the only kickers in NFL history with at least 50 career 50-yard field goals. Janikowski, who was originally drafted with the 17th overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft by the Raiders and spent the first 17 seasons of his career in Oakland, signed with Seattle during the offseason.

Arizona's PHIL DAWSON, who has 42 career 50-yard field goals, needs eight made 50 yarders to reach 50 in his career.

In Week 12 of the 2017 season, Atlanta wide receiver JULIO JONES (below) recorded 12 receptions, including seven catches of at least 20 yards, for 253 yards and two touchdowns. It marked the fourth game since 1991 in which a player recorded seven big play receptions of at least 20 yards.

REMARKABLE RETURNERS

The 2017 season featured many exciting plays in the return game, as both established veterans and explosive young stars provided exhilarating action throughout the season.

Detroit rookie JAMAL AGNEW led the NFL with a 15.4 punt-return average and was the only player to have multiple punt return touchdowns (two) in 2017, leading to an All-Pro selection.

"It's very rare for a rookie like that to be All-Pro," said former NFL player DEVIN **HESTER**. "You really don't see that happen. To come out and set a tempo that he did as a true rookie, it's an honor. I hope he continues to make the plays he's been making. Hopefully, his future keeps moving forward."

Los Angeles Rams Pro Bowler PHAROH COOPER ranked second among qualified kick returners with a 27.4 yard kickoff-return average and second among qualified punt returners with a 12.5 return average. Cooper had the season's longest kickoff return, taking the opening kickoff 103 yards for a touchdown against Jacksonville in Week 6.

Chicago rookie running back TARIK COHEN became the first player since TERRY METCALF (1975) and the first rookie since Pro Football Hall of Famer GALE SAYERS (1965) to have a punt-return touchdown, rushing touchdown, receiving touchdown and passing touchdown in a single season.

"You see how he is around the guys, but then you see how he is in the classroom," said Bears first-year head coach MATT NAGY. "He is extremely focused and trying to learn the details. He's a humble kid. And when you have guys like that who respect the game and they respect their peers and they want to be great, he has the ability to be really good."

For the second consecutive season, New England quarterback **TOM BRADY** (top) was voted as the NFL's top player by his peers as compiled in NFL Network's "Top 100 Players of 2018."

Brady is the first player in the history of the countdown to be voted No. 1 in three different seasons and he has finished in the top five of the countdown in each of the poll's eight years.

Pittsburgh's **ANTONIO BROWN** and Philadelphia's **CARSON WENTZ** rounded out the top three, while Los Angeles Rams defensive tackle **AARON DONALD** was the highest ranking defensive player, checking in at No. 7.

SAME FACES, NEW PLACES

Whether through free agency or trades, this offseason contained big-name moves that may alter the landscape of the 2018 NFL season.

The Los Angeles Rams acquired wide receiver BRANDIN COOKS from New England, cornerback MARCUS PETERS from Kansas City, cornerback AQIB TALIB from Denver and signed defensive tackle NDAMUKONG SUH in free agency while the defending Super Bowl champion Philadelphia Eagles acquired defensive end MICHAEL BENNETT from Seattle via trade. In Minnesota, the Vikings lured quarterback KIRK COUSINS - one of two quarterbacks with at least 4,000 passing yards and 25 touchdown passes in each of the past three seasons - from Washington, while the Redskins acquired Pro Bowl QB ALEX SMITH (top) from Kansas City via trade.

"Alex's experience is well-noted. It's not one thing, it's everything. It's the entire body of work...Coaching him for the first time will be exciting because I don't think there's a limit on what he can do. He does all the things vou want a quarterback to be able to do.

Several notable wide receivers were on the move during the offseason, headlined by JARVIS LANDRY (Cleveland, middle), JORDY NELSON (Oakland), MICHAEL CRABTREE (Baltimore), SAMMY WATKINS (Kansas City), ALLEN ROBINSON (Chicago) and TORREY SMITH (Carolina).

> "The numbers speak for themselves," Browns general manager JOHN DORSEY said of acquiring Landry. "One-hundred plus catches two years, three-time Pro Bowler. Loves the game of football, ultra-competitor. You're lucky to get a guy like that on your team. He is a professional. he's got deep passion for the game. I think that will carry over here moving forward."

A number of former Pro Bowlers will don a new uniform this season, including quarterback TYROD TAYLOR (Cleveland), tight end JIMMY GRAHAM (Green Bay), quard ANDREW NORWELL (Jacksonville), tackle NATE SOLDER (New York Giants), cornerbacks MALCOLM BUTLER (Tennessee), VONTAE DAVIS (Buffalo) and RICHARD SHERMAN (San Francisco, bottom), defensive end ROBERT QUINN (Miami), defensive tackles DONTARI POE (Carolina), SHELDON RICHARDSON (Minnesota) and MUHAMMAD WILKERSON (Green Bay) and safety TYRANN MATHIEU (Houston).

BROTHERLY LOVE

The NFL is a family game for players, coaches and fans. Not only can they all share the experience, but brothers also can share the field and sidelines.

During the 2018 NFL Draft, safety TERRELL EDMUNDS (No. 28, Pittsburgh, below left) and linebacker TREMAINE **EDMUNDS** (No. 16, Buffalo, below right) became the first pair of brothers to be drafted in the first round of the same NFL draft. Tremaine and Terrell's brother, TREY EDMUNDS, is a running back for the New Orleans Saints. Their father, FERRELL EDMUNDS, was a two-time Pro Bowl selection at tight end during his seven-year NFL career with the Miami Dolphins and Seattle Seahawks.

"Man, it was great," said Tremaine of the draft process. "Definitely to see my other brother get drafted tonight, it was a big time relief for my whole family. I know everybody's excited and I'm excited. It's a long time coming, but we can finally say that we made it."

The WATTs - Los Angeles Chargers fullback DEREK, Houston defensive end J.J. and Pittsburgh linebacker T.J. - and the FULLERs - Detroit wide receiver COREY, Kansas City cornerback KENDALL and Chicago cornerback KYLE - are the only other sets of three brothers currently in the league.

New England is the only team in the NFL which has two sets of brothers sharing a locker room - safety **DEVIN** and cornerback JASON MC COURTY, along with CODY and JACOB HOLLISTER. Brothers SHAQUEM and SHAQUIL GRIFFIN in Seattle, MATT and RYAN KALIL in Carolina and NATE and NICK HOLLEY with the Los Angeles Rams are the only other teammate brothers in the NFL this season.

SMALL SCHOOL SUCCESS

They may not come from big-time schools in major NCAA conferences, but their NFL contributions cannot go unnoticed. Productive players from small schools are proof-positive of the old adage, "If you can play, the NFL will find you."

"I tell all these guys when I talk to them, whether they are playing for some big school or some small school, I don't care where you came from," said Tennessee general manager JON ROBINSON. "If you can play football, if you can buy into our philosophy, our style of football, then you can play for the Tennessee Titans."

Kansas City running back KAREEM HUNT - who led the NFL with 1,327 rushing yards as a rookie last season was drafted by the Chiefs in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Toledo, which plays in the Mid-American Conference.

"It's football," said Hunt of his transition from Toledo to the NFL. "The MAC has great competition and we get discredited a lot. It's kind of tough, a lot of people sleep on the MAC. We have Antonio Brown, Big Ben (Roethlisberger), Khalil Mack, some big names from the MAC in the NFL. The game speed is different but that's any college to the pros - you're going to see bigger, faster, stronger. In the NFL it's the best of the best."

NFL teams continue to scout at all levels looking to find talent. The Philadelphia Eagles traded up and used the No. 2 overall pick in the 2016 NFL Draft to select quarterback CARSON WENTZ out of North Dakota State.

"The jump is a big jump no matter where you are coming from - Division III, FCS, FBS, SEC - it doesn't matter," said Wentz. "Everyone is bigger, faster, stronger in the NFL. Obviously, we believe at the FCS level that there is a lot of good talent, and you are playing a lot of good competition."

NOT DRAFTED? NOT A PROBLEM

How does an undrafted player develop into an NFL star? Jaguars Pro Bowl cornerback **A.J. BOUYE** (top) sees being overlooked in the Draft process as a means for motivation.

"I keep that chip on my shoulder," said Bouye. "It keeps motivating you. At the end of the day, this game is about respect. I've been looking for that for a long time."

Minnesota Pro Bowl wide receiver **ADAM THIELEN** had a long and tumultuous journey to the NFL. From not being invited to the Combine and having to pay his way to regional combines, to being cut from the practice squad, Thielen has continued to work hard and, in 2017, led the NFC with 1,276 receiving yards while earning his first-career Pro Bowl selection.

"I was trying to compete every single day," said Thielen on earning his position on an NFL roster. "I tried to beat those starters every day in practice to prove that I belong, that I can play with the starters. That was a great opportunity for me to gain confidence from the coaching staff. Like, hey, this guy is consistently beating our starters, so why can't he be a player in this league?"

Pittsburgh Pro Bowl tackle **ALEJANDRO VILLANUEVA** (bottom) was undrafted out of college and spent the following four years as an active U.S. Army Ranger, serving three tours of duty in Afghanistan. After returning, Villanueva landed a tryout with the Eagles in 2014, where he was originally tried as a defensive lineman before being released during the team's roster cuts. Villanueva signed to the Steelers' practice squad in 2014 and transitioned to the offensive line, a position he had played sparingly while at West Point.

"I started playing defensive line and had no idea after a five-year hiatus of serving in the Army," said Villanueva. "I was the first player to get cut in Philadelphia. I was playing something like eight plays in the fourth preseason game. That was humbling. When you're that beat down, by the coaches, by the fact that you're undrafted and then you're able to overcome that, then you can see football for what it is. It's a beautiful sport."



LUKE KUECHLY WINS ART ROONEY SPORTSMANSHIP AWARD

LUKE KUECHLY of the Carolina Panthers was voted the winner of the **2017 ART ROONEY SPORTSMANSHIP AWARD**, which is given to the NFL player who best demonstrates the qualities of outstanding sportsmanship on the playing field, including fair play, respect for opponents and integrity in competition.

"I want to thank the Rooney family for this award," said Kuechly. "When I got to Carolina, I didn't know what to expect. But when I got there, we had a bunch of older guys that really taught me how to play, how to respect the game and how to go about it. Two of them are right here with Greg Olsen and Thomas Davis. I think this game provides so much for us and brings people together from all walks of life. It gives you the opportunity to learn, to have fun and compete, to work hard. It teaches you a lot. Kuechly received a \$25,000 donation from the NFL Foundation which was distributed to three groups - the **PROJECT LIFE MOVEMENT**, **RECEPTIONS FOR RESEARCH** - **THE GREG OLSEN FOUNDATION** and the **THOMAS DAVIS DEFENDING DREAMS FOUNDATION**.

A six-year NFL veteran, Kuechly led Carolina with 125 tackles in 2017 and is the only player in franchise history with at least 100 tackles in each of his first six seasons as a Panther. Since entering the league in 2012, Kuechly leads all NFL linebackers with 15 interceptions and is the only player in the league with at least 15 interceptions (15) and 10 sacks (10.5) over that span. A five-time AP All-Pro selection, five-time Pro Bowler and the 2013 AP Defensive Player of the Year, he was a first-round draft choice by the Panthers in 2012.

Each NFL team nominated one of its players for the award, which recognizes players who exemplify outstanding sportsmanship on the field. A panel of former players from the NFL Legends Community selected eight finalists (four in the AFC; four in the NFC) from the 32 nominees. The panel of Legends Coordinators was comprised of WARRICK DUNN, CURTIS MARTIN, KARL MECKLENBURG and LEONARD WHEELER.



The eight finalists were listed on the Pro Bowl ballot under the Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award. From the finalists, each team's players submitted a consensus vote of their choice for the winner. As in Pro Bowl voting, a team could not vote for its own player.

To commemorate the honor, Kuchly was presented on-stage with "The Art Rooney Trophy," which represents the important role that sportsmanship plays in the game and how NFL players that demonstrate integrity and honor on the field serve as role models for other players at all levels. The award design was inspired by the upward arc of a football in motion and contains a gold line embedded in glass that represents the path of sportsmanship throughout a career. Etched into the award are the words "integrity," "honor," "respect," and "fairness," the values that define excellent sportsmanship.

The finalists, featuring four players from each conference, were tight end ANTONIO GATES (Los Angeles Chargers), quarterback JOSH MC COWN (New York Jets), quarterback ALEX SMITH (Kansas City) and tackle JOE THOMAS (Cleveland) in the AFC, and tight end VERNON DAVIS (Washington), Kuechly, defensive tackle HALOTI NGATA (Detroit) and tackle JOE STALEY (San Francisco) in the NFC.

The Player Engagement department has four focal points: Continuing Education. Financial Education, Career Development and Total Wellness.




The National Football League Continuing Education Program assists current and former NFL players in completing their undergraduate degree, pursuing graduate studies and utilizing other educational opportunities to prepare for life after football.

The Financial Education Program provides players with engaging and unbiased education through programs and seminars that will improve the financial decision-making ability of players. The program is primarily made up of three components: The Rookie Experience, Financial Education Seminars and The Personal Finance Boot Camp.

The Career Development Program provides players with professional development training (brand assessment, presentation skills, training, business etiquette, resumé writing, and interview skills) to facilitate their growth as public figures and their transition out of professional football and into a desired second career. These include:

- Corporate job shadows and internships both domestically and internationally
- Boot Camps as introductions to post-playing experience career opportunities
 - Development opportunities within football
 - Individual career mentoring
 - Bridge to Success Program (right) to help the post-playing transition





Total Wellness (left) assists players with programs and resources centered around health and safety, leadership, performance, personal, psychological and physical wellness. These resources include:

 - NFL Legend Transition Coaches
 - NFL Fatherhood Initiative

Additionally, Player Engagement offers current players and legends internship opportunities at NFL offices in Canada, China, Mexico, the United Kingdom and the United States, Among many benefits, these internships allow players to gain professional experience and a better understanding of the NFL's business functions.

NFL LEGENDS COMMUNITY

The NFL Legends Community was launched in October 2013, with the objective of celebrating, embracing and connecting former players with each other, their former teams and the NFL. The NFL Legends Community provides unique opportunities for Legends to engage year-round and includes:

- Club Events From Homecoming celebrations to Legends golf tournaments, more than 3,300 Legends participated in events hosted by their former teams in 2017.
- League Events The Legends Community hosts recently retired players at the NFL office in New York as part of continuous efforts to connect them with each other, their teams and the NFL. While there, Legends will hear from league and team executives, participate in networking opportunities and learn about the initiatives and programs specifically designed for them.
- Legends Development Program Provides NFL Legends the opportunity to grow their careers by gaining business experience and exposure in the NFL office. It also exposes players to opportunities in football that are not in front of the camera or in a coaching capacity.
- Legends Community Directors and Coordinators Twenty-four Legends are working on behalf of the league in different regions throughout the country - Pacific West, Central North, Central South, Southeast and Northeast. PRO FOOTBALL RETIRED PLAYERS ASSOCIATION (below left)

The Pro Football Retired Players Association (PFRPA) and its business arm, the Football Greats Alliance (FGA) have been working to vet health and welfare benefits that are of interest to its members, as well as creating revenue generating partnerships with leading brands including Fanatics, VISA, Nike, DirecTV and others which will help drive future member benefits. In April, the PFRPA began notifying and enrolling members in the first ever-dental insurance program (administered by Metlife). This program offers unprecedented coverage for its members; retired players that effectively retired by July 2013. For those players that retired after August 2013, they are eligible to opt into PFRPA membership and will be eligible for the PFRPA Dental Plan after their NFL-offered dental plan expires.


NFL PLAYER CARE FOUNDATION (below right)

The Player Care Foundation (PCF) is an independent organization dedicated to helping retired players improve their quality of life. The PCF addresses all aspects of life by providing programs and assistance with medical, emotional, financial, social and community issues. Since its inception in 2007, the PCF has helped more than 950 former players with over \$12 million in financial grants.

OTHER PROGRAMS

Other groups affiliated with the NFL also offer programs to benefit former players. The NFL Alumni Association's mission is to "serve, assist and inform its members to enrich their post NFL lives." The Gridiron Greats Assistance Fund provides financial grants and "pro bono" medical assistance to retired players in dire need. Finally, the TRUST, powered by the NFLPA, is committed to the well-being of former players and works to meet each individual where he is in his transition off the playing field. RETIRED PLAYER BENEFITS

ASSISTED LIVING BENEFIT

Any former player is eligible for the Assisted Living Benefit which provides special discounts and preferred access in more than 500 communities around the country. There is particular care for those individuals with Alzheimer's and other memory impairment diseases.

CONTINUING EDUCATION PROGRAM (CEP)

The NFL Continuing Education Program (CEP) assists current and former NFL players with completing their undergraduate degree, pursuing graduate studies and utilizing other educational opportunities to prepare for life after football. Former players with a minimum of one credited season also may be eligible for a tuition reimbursement benefit to help with the costs of continuing their education.

DISABILITY BENEFITS

The NFL Player Disability Plan provides three kinds of disability benefits: Total & Permanent Disability benefits, Line of Duty Disability benefits and Neurocognitive Disability benefits. A nationwide panel of expert physicians have been retained and are instructed to examine applicant players fully and fairly. The Plan's Medical Director, who is a physician, also has been hired with the authority and responsibility to oversee the panel of doctors as well as act as a voting member of the Disability Initial Claims.

JOINT REPLACEMENT PROGRAMS

The NFL Joint Replacement Program provides medical and financial resources to retired players who are uninsured or lack the financing to have joint replacement surgery.

NEUROLOGICAL CARE

he NFL Neurological Care Program has neurological specialists available at five medical centers to evaluate and treat possible neurological conditions among retired players. The program will assist players with coordinated care at excellent healthcare facilities nationwide.

NFL LIFE LINE

The NFL Life Line (800-506-0078) is a free, independent and confidential phone consultation service available to all NFL Legends, their wives and other family members who may need assistance with matters such as spousal and child safety, mental and physical health, lifestyle and transition in their post-NFL life. NFL Life Line is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year. All calls are strictly confidential and not shared with the league office, teams, or any related entity.

NFL PLAYER BENEFITS WEBSITE

NFL Legends now have a one-stop shop for player benefits. Introducing NFLPlayerBenefits.com, the new website that replaces MyGoalLine.com. Here, you'll find all the pension, 401(k) and other benefit plan information you're used to seeing, but with key improvements you've asked for, including the ability to apply for benefits online and an easy-toread view of your current benefit eligibility.

SPINE TREATMENT BENEFIT

The Spine Treatment Program provides facilitated access to five premier medical centers specializing in spine care to ensure that retired players seeking evaluation and possible treatment of their spine receive top flight care.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR - THE TEAMS

The **NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS** are tied with Dallas and San Francisco with five Super Bowl wins and need one Super Bowl win to tie the Pittsburgh Steelers (six) for the most in NFL history.

The Patriots have made the playoffs in nine consecutive seasons (2009-17) and can surpass Dallas (nine from 1975-83) and Indianapolis (nine from 2002-10) for the most consecutive seasons in NFL history with a playoff berth.

With at least 10 wins in 2018, the Patriots (15 from 2003-2017) can tie San Francisco (16 from 1983-98) for the most consecutive seasons with at least 10 victories in NFL history.

The WASHINGTON REDSKINS need seven regular season wins to become the fifth team in NFL history to reach 600 regular-season wins. The Redskins have a 593-581-28 all-time record.

The CAROLINA PANTHERS need eight wins to reach 200 wins in franchise history, including the postseason. The Panthers have a 192-192-1 all-time record including the postseason.

The PITTSBURGH STEELERS need one regular season win at Heinz Field to reach 100 wins at the stadium since its opening in 2001. The Steelers have a 99-36-1 record at Heinz Field.

THE TEAMS PHILADELPHIA EAGLES

EAGLES WIN SUPER BOWL LII

The Philadelphia Eagles won their first Super Bowl title last season, defeating the New England Patriots 41-33 in Super Bowl LII in Minnesota. Philadelphia quarterback **NICK FOLES** (right) threw the game-winning 11-yard touchdown pass to tight end **ZACH ERTZ** with 2:21 remaining in the fourth quarter.

Foles was named Super Bowl MVP after completing 28 of 43 pass attempts for 373 yards with three touchdowns and one interception for a 106.1 passer rating. He also added a one-yard touchdown reception and became the first player in NFL history with a touchdown pass and a touchdown catch in a Super Bowl.

Foles, who stepped in for injured quarterback **CARSON WENTZ** in Week 14, joined **DOUG WILLIAMS** (Washington, Super Bowl XXII) and **JEFF HOSTETLER** (New York Giants, Super Bowl XXV) as the only quarterbacks to start and win the Super Bowl after starting three or fewer games in the regular season.

THE TEAMS **PHILADELPHIA EAGLES**



On the path to Super Bowl LII, the Eagles finished the regular season with a 13-3 record and earned the No. 1 seed in the NFC. Philadelphia won the NFC East a season after finishing in last place with a 7-9 record in 2016, joining JACKSONVILLE (AFC South) as teams to complete a "worst-to-first" turnaround in 2017. At least one team has won its division the season after finishing in or tied for last place in 14 of the past 15 seasons.

"I'm so excited for that locker room. For Mr. Lurie to give me the opportunity to coach this team, and then everything that we've been through this season, to get to this point – a lot of people counted us out – but that locker room believed, believed in each other, believed in me. I have a great staff and great players, and we found a way to get it done."

Philadelphia's success as a team can be attributed to a high-level of play from the team's core group of talent.

Six Eagles earned Pro Bowl accolades in 2017, including guard BRANDON BROOKS (1st), defensive tackle FLETCHER COX (3rd), Ertz (1st), safety MALCOLM JENKINS (2nd), tackle LANE JOHNSON (1st) and Wentz (1st).

Philadelphia ranked third in the NFL in points per game (28.6) and fourth in points allowed per game (18.4). The Eagles were the only team in the NFL last with three players with at least eight touchdown receptions each - NELSON AGHOLOR (eight), Ertz (eight) and ALSHON JEFFERY (nine).

RINGING IN THE NEW YEAR

The **PHILADELPHIA EAGLES** unveiled their Super Bowl LII Championship ring at a private event held for team and club personnel in June. The ring commemorates the organization's historic 2017 season, which culminated in the team's victory over the New England Patriots and their first Super Bowl Championship title.

Made of 10-karat white gold, the ring features 219 diamonds and 17 genuine green sapphires with a total weight of 9.15 carats. The rare rough green sapphires were secured to match the official team color. The ring top features the Eagle head logo, set atop the Vince Lombardi Trophy and custom-cut, genuine



green baguette sapphires surrounded by intricate, pavé-set diamonds. Fifty-two pavé-set diamonds are set within the Eagle head, signifying Super Bowl LII. The bottom portion of the base of the trophy features 13 pavé-set diamonds representing the 13 regular-season victories that tied the franchise record. The top of the trophy is adorned with three diamonds, representing not only the number of times the Eagles were deemed underdogs, but also the number of postseason victories it took to be crowned World Champions. A large marquise-cut diamond is featured at the top of the Vince Lombardi Trophy to represent the first Super Bowl Championship in franchise history. To round out the ring top, the words "WORLD CHAMPIONS" adorn the top and bottom edges.

The bezel of the ring features a waterfall of 127 diamonds, paying tribute to one of the most memorable moments in franchise history – "THE PHILLY SPECIAL" – the trick play that resulted in a touchdown on fourth-and-goal from the 1-yard line in Super Bowl LII. The 127 diamonds represent the combined jersey numbers of three key players involved in the play – TREY BURTON (88), COREY CLEMENT (30) and NICK FOLES (9). Four round, genuine green sapphires adorn the corners of the base of the ring and symbolize the team's four NFL Championships – three World Championships (1948, 1949, 1960) and one Super Bowl Championship (2017).

The left side of the ring features the player's name set above an end zone view silhouette of Lincoln Financial Field, the home of the Philadelphia Eagles. The inclusion of the stadium is a symbolic tribute to the passionate and dedicated fan base that has supported the team since its formation in 1933. The player's number is studded with pavé-set diamonds and set in the middle of the football field.

The right side of the ring features the score from Super Bowl LII (PHI 41 – NE 33) and one of the team's messages of unity throughout the season, "WE ALL WE GOT, WE ALL WE NEED" is set above the Super Bowl LII logo. The word "FAMILY" sits below the logo and serves as a reminder of the team's commitment and dedication to each other.

In honor of Eagles fans across the region, country and world, the words from the team's fight song, "FLY EAGLES FLY", are written on the bottom of the outer band. The top of the inside arbor of the ring is inscribed with the scores from the team's three postseason victories and an image of an underdog mask, an acknowledgement of how the Eagles embraced and overcame their underdog role to galvanize the team, the fans and the entire city of Philadelphia. The bottom of the inside arbor is inscribed with each player's signature – marking the first-time championship rings have ever featured engraved signatures.






LOMBARDI TROPHY BY THE NUMBERS

Immediately following a Super Bowl victory, the winner is presented with the VINCE LOMBARDI TROPHY.

After the trophy is presented, it is then returned to Tiffany & Co. for any repairs and the engraving of the Super Bowl team names and the final score onto the base. It then goes back to the winning team for permanent possession.





THE TEAMS NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS

SUSTAINED SUCCESS

Under the direction of head coach **BILL BELICHICK**, the **NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS** won the AFC East division title for the ninth consecutive season, the longest streak in NFL history, and advanced to Super Bowl LII, the team's third Super Bowl appearance in the past four seasons.

The Patriots, led by the stellar play of quarterback **TOM BRADY** (top) who captured his third career Most Valuable Player award, recorded their 17th consecutive season with a winning record, the longest streak since 1970, surpassing the previous record of 16 held by the 1970-1985 Dallas Cowboys and 1983-1998 San Francisco 49ers. New England finished the season 13-3 and registered their seventh season with at least 13 victories, the second-most 13-win seasons in NFL history (San Francisco, nine).

"One hundred percent. You've always got two sides of an argument when people talk about greatness. 'How good are you? What are your stats? What do you look like on the field?' Then there's people who always want to validate it by wins and championships. He's got both. I don't know who you can compare him to to say that he's not the best of all-time."

New England led the NFL in total offense (394.2 yards per game) and ranked first in the AFC averaging 28.6 points per game. Brady, in his age 40 season, led the NFL with 4,577 passing yards, becoming the oldest player to lead the league in passing yards in NFL history. Brady paced the AFC with 32 touchdown passes, the most by a quarterback in a single season at the age of 40 or older in NFL history.

For the second-consecutive season, Brady set a single-game Super Bowl record for passing yards, throwing for 505 yards against the Eagles after passing for 466 yards in the Patriots' Super Bowl LI victory over Atlanta. He also owns Super Bowl career records in passing attempts (357), completions (235), yards (2,576) and touchdown passes (18) in eight career games.

Brady's top target, tight end **ROB GRONKOWSKI** (bottom), led all tight ends with 1,084 receiving yards and reached 1,000 yards for the fourth time in his career, tying **TONY GONZALEZ** (four) and **JASON WITTEN** (four) for the most seasons with at least 1,000 receiving yards among tight ends in NFL history. Brady and Gronkowski connected on eight touchdowns in 2017 and have teamed up for 75 career touchdown passes, the second most from a quarterback to a tight end in league history trailing only **PHILIP RIVERS** and **ANTONIO GATES** (87).

THE TEAMS MINNESOTA VIKINGS

MARVELOUS MINNESOTA

Led by a dominant defense and an efficient passing game, the **MINNESOTA VIKINGS** won the NFC North with a 13-3 record, capturing the No. 2 overall seed in the conference after winning their second division title in three seasons. However, the Vikings magical run to the NFC Championship Game almost ended in heartbreaking fashion only a week prior on their home turf at U.S. Bank Stadium.

Trailing 24-23 to the visiting New Orleans Saints with 10 seconds remaining in overtime, Vikings quarterback **CASE KEENUM** found wide receiver **STEFON DIGGS** (top) near the left sideline with hopes of setting up a long field-goal attempt. What happened next will forever be remembered as the "Minnesota Miracle."

Diggs hauled in the pass on the New Orleans 35 yard-line, evaded a would-be tackler, stayed inbounds and rushed into the endzone as time expired for a 61-yard touchdown, punctuating the first postseason game in NFL history that ended with a winning touchdown on the final play of the fourth quarter. Diggs' 61-yard score was the second-longest winning touchdown in the final 10 seconds of the fourth quarter of a playoff game in NFL history.

"You're just fighting at that point. You're fighting for your life. You'd do anything to get the ball forward. I don't know if you think about anything. You just react. I'm going to want to go back and remember everything I can from this. ... But right now, it's all a blur."

Despite losing to Philadelphia in the NFC Championship Game, the Vikings' core of young stars on offense and defense made their mark in 2017 and have the team poised to replicate its success in 2018. Minnesota ranked first in the NFL in both total defense (275.9 yards per game) and scoring defense (15.8 points per game), and held opponents to a 25.2 percent third-down conversion rate, the best mark in the NFL since the stat began being tracked in 1991.

Defensive end **EVERSON GRIFFEN** tied for third in the NFC with 13 sacks and become only the third player since the sack became an official statistic in 1982 to record at least one sack in each of his team's first eight games of a season. Safety **HARRISON SMITH** (bottom) was the only player in NFC with 70+ tackles (78), 5+ INTs (5) & a sack (1.5) in 2017 and earned first-team All-Pro honors.



THE TEAMS **MINNESOTA VIKINGS**



Pro Bowl wide receiver ADAM THEILEN ranked second in the NFC with 1,276 receiving yards and finished fourth in the conference with 91 receptions, joining ROD SMITH and WES WELKER as the only undrafted players in the common draft era (since 1967) to record at least 90 catches and 1,200 receiving yards in a single season.

Keenum, who was signed during the 2017 offseason and inserted into the starting lineup after an injury to starter SAM BRADFORD, set career highs in completions (325), completion percentage (67.6), passing yards (3,547), touchdown passes (22) and passer rating (98.3). Keenum posted a passer rating of at least 100 in four consecutive games (Weeks 10-13) and tied Pro Football Hall of Famer BRETT FAVRE (2009) and DAUNTE CULPEPPER (2000 and 2004) for the longest streak in franchise history. The Denver Broncos signed Keenum to a two-year contract during the 2018 offseason.

Newly-signed quarterback KIRK COUSINS, who became the first quarterback in NFL history to have at least 4,000 passing yards and four or more rushing touchdowns in three consecutive seasons, will lead the Vikings offense in 2018.

"I've had calls from coaches that have coached with him, coached him, coached against him, and everyone has given tremendous recommendations," Vikings head coach MIKE ZIMMER said of adding Cousins. "One of the other things I like about him is that he was a guy that always had to prove himself. He's like a lot of our football team - guys who



THE TEAMS **JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS**

Last season, the JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS earned their first AFC South division title since 1999 behind one of the league's top defenses. The Jaquars defensive unit ranked first in the NFL in defensive touchdowns (seven), tied for first in forced fumbles (17) and second in total defense (286.1 yards per game), points allowed per game (16.8), sacks (55) and takeaways (33).

Six Jaquars earned Pro Bowl accolades in 2017, including Campbell (third) and first-time honorees cornerback A.J. BOUYE. defensive tackle MALIK JACKSON. Ngakoue, cornerback JALEN RAMSEY and linebacker TELVIN SMITH.

The Jaguars complimented their elite defense with a potent offensive attack in 2017, leading the league with a 141.4 rushing yards per game average and ranking second in the AFC averaging 26.1 points per game. Jacksonville finished the season as one of four teams, along with **NEW ENGLAND**, **PHILADELPHIA** and **PITTSBURGH**, to score at least 25 points per game and allow fewer than 20 points per game. The Jaguars (+149) tied for third in the NFL in point differential, trailing only the Eagles (+162) and Patriots (+162).

Running back **LEONARD FOURNETTE** (right), selected with the fourth overall pick in the 2017 NFL Draft, made an immediate impact on the Jacksonville offense. Fournette led the team with 1,040 rushing yards and joined **FRED TAYLOR** (1,223 yards in 1998) as the only rookies in team history to rush for at least 1,000 yards. Fournette appeared in 13 games in 2017 and recorded 1,342 scrimmage yards and 10 touchdowns (nine rushing, one receiving), both the third-most by a rookie in franchise history.

Fournette led all NFL rookies with nine rushing touchdowns, was one of two rookie running backs (KAREEM HUNT) with at least 1,000 rushing yards and ranked third among rookie running backs with 1,342 yards from scrimmage. Including the playoffs, Fournette totaled six games with at least 100 rushing yards in 2017, tied for the second most in the NFL and trailing only the Rams' TODD GURLEY, who had seven 100-yard rushing performances last season.

"He really did everything that we thought he'd be able to do from the standpoint of being a power runner. I think the one thing that probably surprised us more that we weren't able to see on the tape was his pass catching ability."

Entering 2018, the Jaguars look to earn back-to-back playoff berths for the first time since 1998-99. Quarterback **BLAKE BORTLES**, who completed a career-high 60.2 percent (315 of 523) of his pass attempts for 3,687 yards and rushed 322 yards in 2017, is one of three quarterbacks in NFL history to begin his career with four consecutive seasons with at least 2,500 passing yards and 300 rushing yards. Bortles can join Carolina's **CAM NEWTON** as the only quarterbacks to accomplish the feat in each of their first five seasons.

In Week 8, Jacksonville will host the Eagles at Wembley Stadium on Sunday, October 28 (9:30 AM ET), marking the sixth consecutive season in which the team will play a game in London. Jacksonville has won their past three London Series games, scoring at least 30 points in each of those victories.



BEST INDICATOR OF SUCCESS? RUNNING THE BALL

A tough, reliable running game allows an offense to command a game's pace. In the majority of contests, it can also control the game's result.

In 2017, NFL teams with a 100-yard rusher posted a 68-17 record for an .800 winning percentage. That rated higher than clubs with a 100-yard receiver (77-52, .597) or a 300-yard passer (58-39, .598).

Kansas City running back **KAREEM HUNT** (right) led the NFL with 1,327 rushing yards last season, becoming the second rookie not selected in the first round to lead his league in rushing yards in the common draft era (since 1967). Cincinnati's **PAUL ROBINSON** led the AFL with 1,023 rushing yards in 1968. The Chiefs were 6-0 in games in which Hunt rushed for at least 100 yards. Hunt's six games with at least 100 rushing yards are the most by a rookie in franchise history.

"He's a load, he's talented and he's a smart kid, which helps at that position because that's a tough one. You have a lot of things to learn as a rookie coming in - I haven't had a lot of rookies start for me over the years. He can think on his feet and that's very important when we're asking you to run the football."

Over the past five years, teams have compiled a 343-123-5 record (.734) when a player has eclipsed the 100-yard rushing mark. By comparison, clubs with a 100-yard receiver have a .566 winning percentage (483-370-3), while offenses with a 300-yard passer have won 53.5 percent of their games (313-272-3).

TURNOVERS ARE KEY TO VICTORY

What is one of the keys to success in the NFL? Winning the turnover battle certainly ranks high on the list.

"You hear us talk about turnovers all the time," said Rams head coach **SEAN MC VAY**. "For us to win the turnover battle is big. I can't say enough about what that does for our team, to be able to give us a lead in the game."

Last season, three of the top six teams in net turnover differential – **KANSAS CITY** (+15), **PHILADELPHIA** (+11) and **JACKSONVILLE** (+10) – made the playoffs and combined for a 33-15 record (.688).

BALTIMORE, led by safety **ERIC WEDDLE** (right), paced the NFL with a +17 turnover differential and recorded the most takeaways in the league with 34.

Last season, eight of the 12 teams to convert at least 40 percent of third-down attempts - ATLANTA (44.7 percent), PITTSBURGH (44.0), MINNESOTA (43.5), BUFFALO (41.9), CAROLINA (41.9), PHILADELPHIA (41.7), LOS ANGELES RAMS (41.1) and NEW **ENGLAND** (40.6) - advanced to the playoffs.

The two-point conversion has become an increasingly popular and important play in the NFL over the past few years.

Last season, the Super Bowl LII champion PHILADELPHIA **EAGLES** (left) converted six two-point conversions, tied for the second-most in a single season since 1994. All four of the teams which converted at least six two-point conversions in a single season qualified for the playoffs that year.

BILL BELICHICK, New England, needs one championship to join George Halas and Curly Lambeau as the only coaches in NFL history with six championships since the league began postseason play in 1933. Belichick has five Super Bowl titles as a head coach.

RON RIVERA (left), Carolina, needs 10 regular-season wins to pass John Fox (73) for the most regular-season coaching wins in franchise history. In eight seasons with Carolina, Rivera has a 64-47-1 record.

ANDY REID (right), Kansas City, needs six wins to reach 200 career victories (incl. postseason). In 19 career seasons, Reid has a 194-133-1 record, including the postseason.

PETE CARROLL, Seattle, needs three victories to surpass Mike Holmgren (90) for the most victories by a head coach in franchise history (incl. postseason). In eight seasons with Seattle, Carroll has a 88-53-1 record (incl. postseason).





BILL BELICHICK

Under the guidance of head coach BILL BELICHICK, the New England Patriots have won nine consecutive division titles, the longest streak in NFL history, and appeared in their NFL-record 10th Super Bowl last season. Wilks was named the head coach of the Cardinals on January 22, 2018 after spending the 2017 season as the defensive coordinator of the Carolina Panthers. Wilks has been coaching since 1995 and has been an NFL assistant since 2006. The Panthers hired Wilks in 2012 as defensive backs coach, adding assistant head coach to his title in 2014. Wilks was promoted to defensive coordinator in 2017, while maintaining his assistant head coach role.

Under Wilks' leadership, the 2017 Panthers defense ranked seventh in total defense, third in rush defense and third in sacks.

Shurmur was named the 18th head coach in Giants history on January 22, 2018. In 2017, he was named the NFL Assistant Coach of the Year by the Pro Football Writers Association. This is the second head coaching assignment for Shurmur, who led the Cleveland Browns from 2011-12.

In 2017, the Vikings were one of four teams with an NFL-best 13-3 record and won the NFC North division title. Minnesota finished 10th in the NFL in scoring (23.9 points per game), 11th in total yardage (356.9 yards per game), and seventh in rushing yardage (122.3 yards per average) under Shurmur's tutelage.

BILL WALSH NFL DIVERSITY COACHING FELLOWSHIP

Established in 1987, the BILL WALSH NFL DIVERSITY COACHING FELLOWSHIP provides NFL coaching experience to outstanding coaches from diverse backgrounds every year. The program, which was named after the man who conceived the idea – late Pro Football Hall of Fame head coach **BILL WALSH** – exposes talented coaches from other levels of football and NFL Legends to the methods and philosophies of NFL coaching staffs. Walsh introduced the concept to the league in 1987 when he brought a group of minority coaches into his San Francisco 49ers' training camp.

In 2017, 144 minority coaches took part in the Bill Walsh NFL Diversity Fellowship, including 43 NFL Legends and a record five female coaches.

Steelers head coach MIKE TOMLIN, who became the youngest head coach (36) in NFL history to win a Super Bowl when he led Pittsburgh to a victory in Super Bowl XLIII, interned with the Cleveland Browns in the summer of 2000 when he was the defensive backs coach at the University of Cincinnati.

Tomlin is one of four current NFL head coaches - joining HUE JACKSON (Cleveland), MARVIN LEWIS (Cincinnati) and **ANTHONY LYNN** (Los Angeles Chargers) – who is a graduate of the program.

"I had the opportunity to work in this program when Coach Walsh initiated it with the 49ers, and it's great to see it continue as strong as it is," said Lewis. "We are happy to bring coaches in to benefit our staff as well as aid in their development as a coach."

The program has tutored more than 2,000 minority coaches through the years and has grown to the point that now every NFL team participates during offseason workout programs, minicamps and training camp.

NFL CONTINUES PARTNERSHIP WITH EAST-WEST SHRINE GAME

At the conclusion of the NFL regular season, teams nominated deserving assistant coaches who were reviewed by a panel that included NFL Football Operations staff, East-West Shrine Game leadership and two members of the NFL's General Managers Advisory Committee. Once the head coaches were selected, each head coach filled his staff from among other NFL assistant coaches nominated by the clubs, a key job requirement for head coaches at every level of the sport.

Coaches nominated by NFL clubs must be active assistant coaches who display extraordinary teaching and communications skills, and are recognized for their integrity and commitment to excellence in the coaching profession. The coaches must be accomplished at developing and preparing players to compete in the NFL.

"Our partnership with the NFL has once again given us two excellent head coaches," said HAROLD RICHARDSON, executive director of the East-West Shrine Game. "Jonathan Hayes and Bobby Johnson are both outstanding coaches and certainly up-and-coming NFL head coaching prospects.
