



MLS' MAGNIFICENT

Rob Stone is the co-host of MLS ExtraTime, the Monday night one-hour show dedicated to Major League Soccer highlights and personalities. He is joined by former Dallas Burn Head Coach Dave Dir and ESPN The Magazine's Jeff Bradley with all the MLS insider information.

hat do Chiquinho Conde, Doctor Khumalo and Digital Takawira have in common besides making me giggle to myself when I hear their names said in unison? The answer is they are all former MLS All-Stars who did not make my All-Time MLS All-Star Team.

You have to have more than an amusing name to make this squad, which leads me to how I selected this team from the 111 players who participated in the five previous midseason soccer showcases. First off, you have to generate fan excitement, on and off the field. Secondly, I look for creative offensive players who make you think twice about taking that bathroom break. Finally, I need a bunch of guys who understand that despite the score, the objective is to score more (defenders, I'm talking to you). Since I will never be an MLS head coach, here is my first

I never be an MLS head coach, here is my tirst and final crack at drawing up a starting 11.

GOALKEEPER: We begin with the goalkeeper. Let me make this clear: Unless you enjoy countless 5v1 attacks and balls whistling at you from 10 yards out, this is the worst job in the All-Star Game. Tony Meola of the Wizards is my no-brainer choice. He leads all keepers in minutes played, shots

faced and saves in All-Star Games. Heck, in last year's All-Star Game in Columbus, he not only allowed me to interview him while he was playing, but he escaped the cage and got a brief stint up front.





hat a difference four years makes. For the United States National Team, four years have seen reversal in fortunes on the international stage after a disappointing World Cup France '98 campaign.

There is no question that as Major League Soccer, now in its sixth season, has matured so has the national side. Better play in the league has spurred the full national team to greater heights, led by former D.C. United Head Coach Bruce Arena.

"In fact, we are grateful for the unbelievable support MLS has provided the entire national team," Arena says. "There is no question our depth has been greatly improved by MLS."

The U.S. team has breezed through World Cup qualifying for

MLS has provided the national side with the heart of its defense and its two most dangerous attacking players. Veterans Jeff Agoos (San Jose) and Carlos Llamosa (Miami) are veterans who have improved by leaps and bounds in league play, while holding up the center of Arena's defense.

"Carlos is one of the best markers I've ever played with,"

Agoos says. "At D.C. United he played next to me, and now in Miami he's doing a great job shutting people down and he's one of the best one-on-one players I've ever played with. I've tried to limit the mistakes I make and try to get things more consistent. I think when you get older you acquire more experience and you learn from your mistakes, and that is really the sign of a good player."

The national team has also benefited greatly from the emergence of Clint Mathis (MetroStars) and Josh Wolff (Chicago) in MLS and on the international stage. Mathis set up Wolff for the game-winning goals in qualifiers against Mexico and Costa Rica this year.

"You look at some of the players you are playing against and know that they are playing for some of the top teams in the world," Mathis says. "If you are able to get on the field and compete with them, it says a lot about yourself and how much the U.S. and MLS is progressing in soccer and that we can compete with the rest of the world."



The pair of strikers from Georgia suffered injuries this season and will miss significant time throughout 2001. Mathis will not be back on the field until December at the earliest, but both will likely be prominent in Arena's plans for an eventual World Cup run.

Mathis was MLS' leading scorer at the time of his injury, while Wolff has continued his development into one of the league's top

strikers in 2001 with the Chicago Fire.

"Over the last three years the Fire have been very attack-oriented and I've been able to come in and do some things to help our club win games and now it's certainly more of a responsibility and opportunity for me to do that day in and day out," Wolff says. "MLS has been a great training ground week in and week out."

Brian MLS veterans McBride, Eddie Pope, Cobi Jones and Chris Armas have all been fixtures for the resurrected U.S. side during the past year.

"The talent is getting better and I see young players getting better and better," Jones says. "You can see that the new crop of players is stronger, faster and more skilled and they can compete at a higher level. That's due to the fact that Major League Soccer is here and the popularity of soccer has increased. You see players going professional at a younger age who can play at a high level."

On many occasions during the last two years, the majority of the roster Arena has called into national team training camp has come from MLS.

The U.S. National Team may feel the positive effects of MLS to a higher degree with the next generation of top young talent. The heart of the U.S. Under-20 and Under-17 teams are now professionals in MLS, learning their craft daily in America's top-flight

league. The likes of current U-20 stars Landon Donovan (San Jose), DaMarcus Beasley (Chicago) and Bobby Convey (D.C. United) are the future of the senior national side.

"We wanted to develop ourselves with the hope of being future national team players," Beasley says. "For me to do that, I thought that MLS would speed up that process. Chicago is one of the best teams in the league and my decision is definitely helping me get where I wanted to go."

Even further down the chain, MLS rookies Santino Quaranta

(D.C. United) and Eddie Johnson (Dallas) have U-17s the this September's World Championship in their age group. Each decided their game would improve by turning pro before they araduated from high school.

"The decision to turn pro has worked out very well," Quaranta says. "At age 16, I get to train with such accomplished international players like Marco Etcheverry and Jaime Moreno daily. "


Johnson is yet another young player who is benefiting from training in a professional environment, learning from some of MLS' best attackers.

"It's clearly an opportunity for a young forward coming in to learn from guys like [Ariel] Graziani and Jason [Kreis] and that's ideal for a young player," Dallas Head Coach Mike Jeffries says.

Whether it's Johnson picking up pointers from Kreis or Mathis exploding on the American scene with the MetroStars, MLS continues to play a significant role in the success of the national teams that represent our country throughout the world. Those results should only improve in the coming years with the rise of American players in MLS.


"This is a combined effort," Arena says. "U.S. Soccer is not just people in Chicago [headquarters] and the players on the field. It's the people in the stands and

THE SOCCER SHRINE CALLED

an Jose and Spartan Stadium weren't exactly what the North American Soccer League club owners had in mind when they were considering awarding a franchise to the San Francisco Bay Area in 1974.

"The league was adding a four-team Western Division, including one team they thought would be in San Francisco," said San Jose-area businessman Johnny Moore, who at the time was an assistant to general manager Dick Berg and primary investor Milan Mandaric for the pending Bay Area club.

"When the owners found out we wanted to locate the team in San Jose, they were furious. They couldn't comprehend a New York or a Chicago playing a team from San Jose."

Berg and Mandaric stood firm, were awarded the San Jose team and the growing city's amazing response to the new sport in town exceeded the expectations of even Quakes management.

"The fans took a liking to us even though many of them weren't knowledgeable about the sport back then," said Moore, who also played in 62 games as a forward for the

Quakes from 1974-77. "They were excited about the city's first major league team. Saturday nights at Spartan Stadium became a happening, the place to be."

As much as the fans enjoyed attending games in the cozy confines of Spartan Stadium, which is to soccer what Wrigley Field and Fenway Park are to baseball, Moore said the Quakes delighted in playing there.

"Nearly all of our players were from Europe, and Spartan reminded them a lot of the stadiums in their homelands. where the crowd is right on top of you," Moore said. "We began calling Spartan 'The Pit.' It was definitely a homefield advantage.

The space was tight. The width of the field at the time was 62 yards, the length 100 yards. It was the smallest field in the league.

"What had been strictly a football stadium suddenly had the reputation of a soccer stadium," said San Jose State University Men's Soccer Coach Gary St. Clair, a goalkeeper at SJSU in the early 1970s, who played for the Quakes in 1975 and the San Diego Jaws the following season.

Spartan Stadium, constructed in 1933, underwent renovation in 1980, with the addition of an upper deck, and again in 1985, when mezzanine-level private boxes and additional seats were installed in the upper deck and end zones.

> The stadium underwent renovation again in 1998 to widen the field to approximately 70 yards to satisfy FIFA requirements for holding women's World Cup matches there in 1999.

> Despite the NASL's demise after the 1984 season, Spartan Stadium was still in the soccer spotlight.


The Earthquakes continued to play there on the minorleague level until 1988. The San Francisco Bay Blackhawks emerged in 1989 and became part of the American Professional Soccer League, the country's only

existing professional major league at the time. They played throughout the Bay Area, including Spartan Stadium.

Spartan Stadium's legacy resulted in Major League Soccer staging its inaugural game there in 1996. The San Jose Clash (renamed the Earthquakes in 2000) defeated D.C. United, 1-0, on a late Eric Wynalda goal in front of sellout crowd of 31,683 spectators on April 6.

A little more than a month later, the Clash set a club home attendance record that still stands when 31,728 showed up for a match against the Los Angeles Galaxy and popular Mexican National Team goalkeeper Jorge Campos.

When the next great soccer showcase event takes place at Spartan Stadium—the 2001 MLS All-Star Game—a new chapter in a rich history will be written and the soccer tradition will live on.

in the quality of talented youth that emerges on a regular basis. One look at Major League Soccer rosters in 2001 gives a clear indication of the progress and development made in that area by America's top-flight league.

Just by comparing the inaugural 1996 player pool to that of 2001, the trend is obvious: Elite youth soccer players are making their rise through MLS. Soccer in the United States is growing from the grass roots and MLS has become the option of choice in the development of young American stars.

"I wanted to develop myself with the hope of being a future U.S. National Team player," Chicago Fire midfielder DaMarcus Beasley says. "For me to do that, I thought that MLS would speed up that process. Chicago is one of the best teams in the league and my decision is definitely helping me get where I wanted to go."

In what can be considered a natural soccer development, players 22 years old and younger are claiming starting spots on MLS teams. And not only do they start, but they are also making a significant impact—a sign that players in this country are more talented than ever.

The top three 2000 Kellogg's Rookie of the Year candidates— Carlos Bocanegra (Chicago), Danny Califf (Los Angeles) and Nick Garcia (Kansas City)—are all defenders and have won starting-11 roles. Goalkeepers Tim Howard (MetroStars) and Nick Rimando (Miami) are two of the top goalkeepers in the league. And Jamar Beasley (Chicago), Marvin Quijano (Los Angeles) and Francisco Gomez (Kansas City) are having their best seasons as pros.

"It's an unbelievable opportunity," San Jose Earthquakes defender Troy Dayak says. "I wish this league was here when I was 18 years old. To have that opportunity to play week in and week out and actually play in your own country is a brilliant opportunity. You can see players' touches on the ball and their comfort level at a younger age now is phenomenal. That's because they have an opportunity to play every day here in the United States."

The trio of Bobby Convey (D.C. United), Landon Donovan (San Jose) and Beasley are the names on everyone's tongue when it comes to promising talent and they have all earned appearances with the senior U.S. National Team. They were joined at the recently concluded Under-20 FIFA World Youth Championship by Columbus Crew standout forward Edson Buddle, who also netted a goal in the tournament.

"By turning pro, D.C. United has definitely helped me and given me the opportunity to play in games when I wouldn't be playing," says Convey, a 17-year-old. "The more you play, the better you get and the more confidence you get. Between MLS and the national team, I've gotten better partly because I play all year round."

Convey was the first teen to leave a permanent mark on an MLS club. He was the youngest player to sign with MLS (16 years, 10 months) and during his 2000 rookie season, he became a D.C. United fixture. He is now an undisputed starter on the Black-and-Red along the right flank and is putting up better numbers than he did in last year's breakthrough season.

The Philadelphia native's stock has risen to the point where he started a U.S. National Team game against Brazil and neutralized the world-renowned Cafú.

"At the Under-17 World Championship [in 1999], there were foreign scouts talking to me, but I was really stuck on MLS because I wanted to stay in the U.S. and finish school," Convey says. "Right now I'm in D.C. and it's only two hours away from my parents, so I can see them every weekend. It was an all-around good situation for me to stay here."

Among the other 13 teenagers in MLS there is Beasley, who is also a starter on the MLS Cup 2000 runners-up Chicago Fire. His speed and creativity on the left flank have become a key component of the Fire's attack.



We have veterans like Hristo Stoitchkov, Peter Nowak and Chris Armas who want to help the younger kids," Beasley says. "They want to see the young players succeed and those guys are great role models. Young players like me need veterans around to help and teach and mold us into top professionals on and off the soccer field."

In San Jose, Donovan has been a part of a turnaround, which has made the Earthquakes one of the early-season favorites to become 2001 MLS Cup Champions. One of the most sublime prodigies ever to emerge in America, he is wowing MLS fans with spectacular play.

Donovan's class was recognized at an early age when he was signed by a German Bundesliga club at the age of 16. But after two years of battling for a spot on

a veteran Bayer Leverkusen team, Donovan had had enough. He wanted to come back home and play in MLS and the U.S. National Team, in the hope of landing a spot on a 2002 World Cup squad.

"For me, the way I like to play is attractive, creative, flashy soccer with a good work ethic and mentality," says Donovan, who followed MLS via the Internet while in Germany. "It wasn't like that in Germany. It was pure work—robotic, methodical and it wasn't fun for me. MLS is real exciting soccer and it makes the game more fun and exciting for a player like myself. But for any kid, I would stress to stay here. You can't get much better than being here."

The play of Donovan, Convey and Beasley in MLS has ensured they are getting notice from U.S. National Team Head Coach Bruce Arena.

"Landon is ready to step in [for the U.S. National Team]," San Jose Earthquakes defender Jeff Agoos says. "He contributes greatly in San Jose and I think he's a very dangerous forward and a very unpredictable type of player. He's going to have a long career with the national team."

The other new faces on the youth scene in 2001 are seeking to match the achievements of Donovan. Speedy forward Devin Barclay has established himself in his first season as a starter for the Tampa Bay Mutiny, who depend on his hard work and tenacity. And U.S. Under-17 National Team phenoms and friends Santino Quaranta (D.C. United) and Eddie Johnson (Dallas Burn) are also slowly making the grade.

"A lot of younger guys see that overseas is not the best thing and that us younger guys want to help the league get better," Beasley says. "We want to stay and put fans in the seats. Players like Quaranta and Johnson—it's good that they're staying in our country and helping our league get better. It'd be a great thing to say about our career, that we helped to make MLS stronger."

Quaranta, who expects to graduate from high school on school ule next year, became the youngest player ever to sign with MLS this season and is arguably having an even better debut than Convey did in his rookie year. A flank player with pace and technique, the 16year-old is a native of the D.C. area and fulfilled a dream of joining the three-time MLS Cup champions at the 2001 SuperDraft.

The Burn's Johnson, a traditional goal scorer, is racking up some of the best numbers ever by an American youth player with the U-17s and he is being compared to Donovan. At this September's U-

17 World Championship, he'll be looking to do even better than the fourth-place finish attained by the team led by Donovan, Beasley and Convey in 1999.

"It was my goal to follow in their footsteps," Johnson says. "I look up to those guys a lot."


There are no doubts: This is a new generation taking over soccer in America. They are confident, flashy and bring more creativity and flair than any class of youth to ever take over the soccer scene. Their conviction and will is what is set to carry MLS, the U.S. National Team and future World Cup teams to heights this country has never seen.


"The whole you<mark>th mov</mark>ement in America is awesome," Donovan says. "And it's only going to get better from here with younger and better players coming up all the time."





SOCCER ROOTS RUN DEEP 1975

he day may come when this season's San Jose Earthquakes team will be heralded as one of the greatest in Bay Area soccer history. And players like Ronald Cerritos, Jeff Agoos, Joe Cannon and Landon Donovan may be recognized among the finest players to have toiled in Spartan Stadium.

But the record-breaking 2001 Earthquakes face stiff competition in the likes of the 1976 and 1983 Quakes, the pioneer 1967 Oakland Clippers and perhaps, the 1991 San Francisco Bay Blackhawks.

And the prime-time players on the Quakes' 2001 roster have to match the achievements to be immortalized with the likes of: George Best, Paul Child, Ilija Mitic, Steve Zungul, Godfrey Ingram, Chris Dangerfield, John Rowlands, Laurie Calloway, Mike Hewitt, Mirko Stojanovic and the legendary brothers, Buzz and Mark Demling.

Even though he played in San Jose only two seasons, Best was arguably the most talented player to don a soccer jersey in the Bay Area. One year after the Cosmos signed Pelé in the NASL's pursuit of attracting some of the world's great players, Best, the 10-year Manchester United star, joined the Los Angeles Aztecs in 1976. He moved on to the Ft. Lauderdale Strikers in 1978 and came to the Quakes in 1980.

Of his 53 career goals scored in the NASL, Best produced the most memorable in the 17-year history of the league in a come-from-behind 3-2 Quakes win over the Strikers in 1981 at Spartan Stadium.

On a warm July 22 evening in front

of nearly 12,000 witnesses, Best dribbled through and around nearly the entire Strikers team in the penalty area before depositing a closerange shot in the goal. The roar of the crowd increased as Best dazzled one Striker after another. The play ended with the fans standing in

feverish cheer. The NASL's Goal of the Year made highlight reels across the Atlantic in England.

The 2001 MLS East All-Star Team coach, Ray Hudson, vividly recalls the goal. He was one of the Striker defenders schooled by Best.

"I think he beat me twice," the Miami Fusion coach said. "The goal was absolutely brilliant. It was classic."

Looking back at the play after the game, Bestie said, "My blood was twistin'."

But even before the arrival of Best, who scored 22 goals in two years in San Jose, a developing soccer culture had been established with the Oakland Clippers and San Francisco Gales, who were the Bay Area's first professional clubs in 1967 and competed in rival leagues.

Oakland won the National Professional Soccer League (NPSL) title its first year while the Gales finished second in the Western Division of the United Soccer Association (USA).

When the NPSL and USA merged in 1968 to form the North American Soccer League, the Gales were absorbed by Vancouver and the Clippers, who barely missed the playoffs that year, left the league and attempted to survive by playing exhibition matches against international club teams before folding in 1969.

The Bay Area was without a professional soccer team until local businessman Milan Mandaric and a group of limited partners landed an NASL franchise for San Jose in 1974. The team—the Earthquakes—was an instant success, averaging a league-best 16,584 fans a game in its first season.

Mani Hernandez—who while at San Jose State in 1968 was the second recipient of the Hermann Award as college soccer's player of the year—stamped his name in Quakes history by scoring the team's first goal in franchise history, the first at Spartan Stadium and the club's most spectacular of the 1970s.


In the third match of the inaugu-

ral season, the naturally rightfooted winger struck a leftfooted volley from 25 yards that dipped suddenly and lodged in the upper right corner of the net without an inch to spare.

"I remember that well," said the 5-foot, 4-inch Hernandez, a successful coach today at San Jose Presentation, an all-girls' high school. "It wasn't bad for a little dude."

The 1975 season was memorable for the Quakes because it marked the first time the Cosmos came to Spartan Stadium with Pelé. It remains etched in the mind of Johnny Moore, a San Jose-area businessman who played for the Quakes and at the same time was the club's administrator.

"I was excited about playing against the world's greatest player, but I was also concerned whether the San Jose fans were aware of the stature of this man," said Moore, who scored goals in both Spartan Stadium games against Pelé's Cosmos. "My question was answered when 25,000 fans jammed into a 17,000-seat stadium and gave Pelé a rous-

ing standing ovation when his name was announced over the P.A. before the game. The memory still gives me goose bumps."

Pelé made a second appearance at Spartan Stadium with the Cosmos in 1976 (a second Quakes win). Moore and Calloway made the traditional jersey swap with him after the game.

"It's certainly something I treasure," Moore said, before quipping, "I'm sure he has my jersey hanging on his wall."

Calloway would take his Pelé jersey to Earthquakes soccer camps and select a camper to wear it for a day.

The Quakes made the playoffs four times in their first nine seasons. The club's only other playoff team was in 1983, as the Golden Bay Earthquakes went 15-0 at Spartan Stadium that year.

After the NASL folded following the 1984 season, Quakes president Peter Bridgwater kept

soccer alive on the West Coast by forming a four-team Western Soccer Alliance consisting of the Quakes, Victoria (B.C.), F.C. Portland and F.C. Seattle.

The WSA grew to seven teams in 1986, and later became the Western Soccer League with additional clubs.

In 1989, Bay Area businessman Dan Van Voorhis formed the San Francisco Bay Blackhawks and the team developed into one of the best clubs in the country during its five-year existence. In fact, the Blackhawks won the newly formed American Professional Soccer League championship in 1991 (a league formed when the WSL and ASL merged), defeating the Albany Capitals in the final at Spartan Stadium.

In 1992, the Blackhawks reached the semifinals of the CON-CACAF Cup Winners Cup before barely losing the two-game series to Club America. After a 3-1 loss at Azteca Stadium in Mexico City, the Blackhawks prevailed 2-1 in front of more than 20,000 spectators at Spartan Stadium.

Van Voorhis pulled his team out of the APSL after the 1992 season and tried to join the Mexican First Division and later, Major League Soccer, but to no avail. The legacy did carry on to MLS, though, as 15 players from his Blackhawks' teams were on inaugural-season rosters and seven are still active, including Troy Dayak (San Jose) and Marcelo Balboa (Colorado).

San Jose's MLS team (formerly nicknamed the Clash between 1996 and 1999) did not enjoy much success in MLS before this season. The club qualified for the MLS Cup Playoffs in 1996, only to be eliminated in the first round by Los Angeles.

The team has not made the postseason since, but the mood has taken an about face this year, however, with a revamped Quakes' club that not only is playoff-bound, but is vying for the modern-day organization's first division title.

Just like in the good old days, soccer once again is alive and well in the South Bay.



hen the final two teams left standing on October 21 face off for MLS Cup 2001, it will mark a special moment in the history of the league and not only because the sixth title will be on the line. That Sunday will see the MLS Cup Championship decided at a site now considered by many as the hallowed home of soccer in the United States: Columbus Crew Stadium in Columbus, Ohio.

The first major league soccer-specific stadium ever built in this country, Crew Stadium has gained its high standing in soccer circles as the perfect facility for the sport. That reputation has continued to grow with supporters packing the venue for the 2000 All-Star Game, for the electrifying U.S. vs. Mexico World Cup qualifier in February, and for the many Crew games during the past two

seasons. It is understood that no matter which squads make it to the final on October 21, soccer fanatics will emerge in droves, soaking in the most important match of the season.

And if there was ever one year when it was impossible to forecast who the finalists will be, it is 2001. The rest of the field will rely heavily on their individual stars to step up and carry them to Columbus. The Colorado Rapids need

Scotsman John Spencer to continue to lead the attack, while the Revolution have Brazilian midfielder Caté, who alone can often make the difference in most matches. Veterans Marco Etcheverry (D.C. United) and Jason Kreis (Dallas Burn) will look to guide their young teams and the likes of Bobby Convey and Joselito Vaca through the challenges of the postseason.

Then there is the opportunity facing the Columbus Crew, who have an extra special motivation to make it to MLS Cup because the Alan I. Rothenberg Trophy will be hoisted in their home stadium. With a community that has watched its beloved Blackand-Gold fall just short of the final on two occasions, a spot in the championship game would make for the greatest sporting event

ever to grip the city.

"I think it's in the back of everybody's mind," Crew Head Coach Greg Andrulis said. "We're not focusing on October 21 right now but it is our expectation and desire. We have a T-shirt and sign that say, 'Destiny 2001: Columbus Crew Stadium.' We want to be there but we have a lot of work before we get there."


This unpredictability adds to what already has become a popular eightteam playoff format. The

Crew or no Crew, the Columbus-area fans and the surreal atmosphere they create will surely be one of the lasting marks of the 2001 finale.


