HEAD COACH GREGG BERHALTER

HEAD COACH: U.S. MEN'S NATIONAL TEAM BORN: Aug. 1, 1973 in Englewood, N.J. HOMETOWN: Tenafly, N.J.

An accomplished manager and two-time FIFA World Cup™ veteran, Gregg Berhalter was named head coach of the U.S. Men's National Team on December 2, 2018.

After leading the USMNT through a successful World Cup Qualifying campaign, he will be the first in U.S. Soccer history to participate in the FIFA World Cup as both a player and a head coach.

The first two years of work were a prelude to arguably the most successful year in USMNT history, as the team collected back-to-back championship titles in 2021. Deploying almost two entirely different rosters, the U.S. defeated regional rival Mexico in the inaugural Concacaf Nations League Final in June and then again in the Concacaf Gold Cup Final the following month. By year's end, the team had amassed a record-setting 17 victories, while Berhalter became the fastest coach in USMNT history to collect 30 wins at the helm.

Utilizing the youngest team in the world during World Cup Qualifying, the team advanced through the grueling 14-match Octagonal and qualified for its eighth World Cup since 1990. Of the 32 finalists in the 2022 World Cup, the USA's lineup averaged four years younger than the other 31 participants. In addition, a total of 29 of the 38 players the USA deployed during qualifying were participating for the first time.

During his first year on the job in 2019, Berhalter worked to develop a new style of play with a young group, leading the side to an 11-5-2 record, and becoming the second-fastest manager in team history to achieve double-digit victories (17 games). That summer, Berhalter guided the USMNT to the 2019 Concacaf Gold Cup Final, advancement to the 2019-20 Concacaf Nations League Final Round, as well as 1-1 draws against reigning Copa América champion Chile (March 26) and No. 5-ranked Uruguay (Sept. 10).

An intelligent and competitive anchor in central defense as a player, Berhalter spent 18 professional seasons in the Netherlands, England, Germany and the United States before serving seven years as a coach in Sweden and Major League Soccer. Capped 44 times, Berhalter represented the United States at two FIFA World Cups and was a notable part of the 2002 team that advanced to the Quarterfinals in Korea/Japan. A natural leader, Berhalter is one of only a few Americans who have captained multiple teams in Europe, earning that honor for two different clubs in Germany. He is the first USMNT head coach to have played for the USA at a FIFA World Cup.

Showing a keen interest in coaching, Berhalter began in the sport's technical side during the late stages of his playing career. While with German club 1860 Munich, the defender scouted opponents from 2007-2009. He transitioned into the coaching ranks during his final season as a professional, serving as a player/assistant coach for the LA Galaxy in 2011, helping the club to the MLS Cup and Supporters' Shield in the process.

Immediately after his retirement in 2011, Berhalter moved into the management ranks full-time, taking the top job with Swedish club Hammarby that December. The move was unique in that Berhalter became one of the first Americans to begin his management career with a foreign club. During two

seasons, the club played to an 18-11-17 record and finished within one spot of promotion to the Swedish top flight in 2012.

In late 2013, Berhalter returned stateside to take the reins as sporting director and head coach of Columbus Crew. Overseeing all facets of the club's soccer operations, Berhalter led Crew SC to postseason appearances in four of his five years in charge, all while working with a salary budget that consistently ranked in the bottom half of Major League Soccer. Most significantly, Berhalter guided Columbus to the 2015 MLS Cup Final and nearly returned the club to the league's title game two years later, falling 1-0 to eventual champion Toronto FC in the 2017 Eastern Conference Final.

Collecting 44 caps during an international career that spanned 12 years, Berhalter earned his first appearance in 1994 and went on to play a part of USMNT squads at six major tournaments, including the 2002 and 2006 FIFA World Cups. A fiery competitor and vocal leader, the center back played in both of the USA's World Cup knockout round matches in Korea Republic, helping keep a clean sheet during the 2-0 win against Mexico in the 2002 Round of 16. His most memorable moment in a U.S. shirt came in the following match. With the USA trailing Germany 1-0 in the second half of the Quarterfinal, Berhalter's volley was handled on the line by Torsten Frings, but Scottish referee Hugh Dallas waved off calls for a penalty kick. With his appointment, Berhalter becomes the first USMNT head coach to have represented the United States in the sport's pinnacle competition.

Berhalter went on to help the USA qualify for the 2006 FIFA World Cup, and though he made the squad, he did not appear in any matches in Germany. The cerebral center back participated in many of the USA's significant runs in international competitions, including the third-place finish at the 1999 FIFA Confederations Cup in Mexico. He was also part of the USA squad that finished fourth at Copa America '95 and went to the final of the 1998 Concacaf Gold Cup.

A native of Englewood, N.J., Berhalter played three seasons at the University of North Carolina before deciding to leave college early to begin his professional career in 1994. Foreshadowing the choice to begin his management career abroad, he moved to Dutch Erstedivisie side Zwolle, beginning a six-year stay in Netherlands. In 1996, he moved up to the top flight, spending another two seasons with Sparta Rotterdam followed by two years with SC Cambuur where he won the club's Player of the Year award in back-to-back seasons.

In 2001, Berhalter joined English League Championship side Crystal Palace before making a long-term move to Germany the following year. Following impressive performances at the 2002 FIFA World Cup, he signed with Bundesliga side Energie Cottbus that summer where he spent four seasons, captaining the side for the final two and eventually helping the team win promotion back to the Bundesliga at the end of the 2006 campaign. From there, Berhalter joined 1860 Munich, where he continued to wear the armband for three seasons before departing to join the LA Galaxy in the summer of 2009.

Joining the Galaxy in the twilight of his career, Berhalter helped mentor the likes of Omar Gonzalez, AJ DeLaGarza and Sean Franklin, a core of young defenders that would become staples in the club's most successful years. In 2009, he helped the Galaxy advance to the 2009 MLS Cup Final where the team fell to Real Salt Lake on penalty kicks. The following year, he aided in the club's 2010 MLS Supporters' Shield campaign, before ending his career with the MLS Cup and Supporters' Shield double as a player/assistant coach in 2011.

Showing his leadership qualities early on, Berhalter served as captain for the U.S. at the 1993 FIFA World Youth Championship in Australia, helping guide the team past the group stage for just the second time in tournament history. Three years later, Berhalter was slated to captain the U-23 MYNT at the 1996 Summer Olympics in Atlanta but was forced to miss the tournament after suffering an injury just three weeks prior.

Along with holding the UEFA "A" coaching license, Berhalter was part of the inaugural class to attain U.S. Soccer's "Pro" coaching license in 2016.

Berhalter is the godson of former Boston Red Sox player and baseball Hall of Famer Carl Yastrzemski. Gregg and his wife Rosalind have four children: Sebastian, who signed as a Homegrown player for Columbus Crew in 2020, Santana, Lily and Delilah. The family enjoy traveling together, cooking, golf and reading in their spare time.

- Registered his first goal and assist in his second cap, a 6-0 win against El Salvador on Dec. 9, 2020 in Fort Lauderdale, Fla.
- Made his USMNT debut at age 19 in the 1-0 win against Costa Rica on Feb. 1, 2020 in Carson, Calif.



- Ahead of the 2017 season, he began a series of loans that saw him play over 150 combined matches with Sheffield Wednesday, Ipswich Town, Swansea City, Stoke City, Luton Town, AFC Bournemouth and Celtic – with which he made 45 appearances in 2021/22, helping the club win the Scottish Premiership title and the Scottish League Cup

- The son of Howard "Hi-C" Carter from Baton Rouge, Louisiana in the USA and Geraldine Vickers from Essex, England, he took on both of his parents' last names while growing up in Southend-On-Sea, England with his mother and grandmother and visiting his father in the USA over the summers
- His father played college basketball at LSU, reaching the 1981 NCAA Final Four He was drafted 15th overall in the 1983 NBA Draft by the Denver Nuggets – After one season in Denver (1983-84), and a brief stint with the Dallas Mavericks (1984-85), Carter then played professional basketball in France for a decade before finishing his career by playing in Greece for three seasons – He also became a citizen of France and represented the country internationally
- His mother, a track runner as a youth, is a school teacher in England
- While soccer was his primary sport, as a youth Cameron also participated in track, shot put, swimming, rugby and even lead his team to the Essex County Cup basketball championship, scoring 32 of the 64 points
- His favorite hobby is building 3000-6000 piece Lego structures of famous international
- landmarks, including the Taj Mahal, Eiffel Tower and Sydney Opera House

WORLD CUP QUALIFYING BY THE NUMBERS USMNT YOUTH LIGHTS THE WAY TO OATAR

In Returning the USMNT to the FIFA World Cup™, the Current U.S. Squad Rewrote the History Books as the Youngest Team to Qualify for Qatar

During the course of 14 matches in seven months, a youthful U.S. Men's National Team side navigated a rigorous road to qualify for the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022[™].

Though there were highs and lows throughout the process, this inspiring and talented USMNT side set a number of records throughout qualifying, almost all of which lead back to the team's unprecedented youth.

Take a look back at some of the standout numbers from the USMNT's successful World Cup Qualifying effort.

YOUNGEST TEAM TO QUALIFY FOR QATAR '22

Let's start here: Your USMNT is by far the youngest in the world going to the 2022 FIFA World Cup, coming in more than a year-and-a-half younger than the next closest team.

Through 14 qualifying matches, the team's average age of players that appeared was 24.07. The next closest is Ecuador, whose average age of all players during their 18 qualifying matches came in at 25.81.

From the available data for the qualified teams, the USMNT played the 10 youngest lineups worldwide during the recently concluded cycle, with all 14 lineups falling in the 22 youngest Starting XIs in the world during qualifiers dating back to October 2020.

The 2022 qualifying group also smashed team records, with Gregg Berhalter putting out the five youngest Starting XIs in the USA's World Cup Qualifying history.

Seven of the team's 10 youngest qualifying lineups were deployed during the 2022 cycle:

RECORD-TYING NUMBER OF WCQ DEBUTS

The substitute appearances by Aaron Long and Erik Palmer-Brown to help preserve the point at Estadio Azteca in Mexico City in March took the total number of qualifying debuts to 29 during the 14 matches of the 2022 FWCQ cycle. That number ties the team record set during qualifying for France '98, a figure impacted by the fact that USMNT did not have to qualify for the 1994 FIFA World Cup. The overall player pool was also smaller than present day.

Remarkably, of the **29 WCQ DEBUTANTS**, 19 were 23-years-old or younger at the time, smashing the USMNT record of 14 debuts by players 23 or younger in FWCQ previously set during the 2010 qualifying campaign. During that cycle, the team played four more matches than in '22 qualifying, with 11 of those 14 Under-23 debuts coming during the team's preliminary matchup with Barbados, a two-game series which the USMNT won 9-0 on aggregate.

INCREDIBLE U-23 MINUTES AND GOALS RATE

In terms of minutes played during a cycle by players 23 and younger, the dominance of youth throughout the squad is nearly unprecedented in team history. Only numbers from the 1990 qualifying cycle – when the USMNT featured a number of semi-professional and collegiate players – trends younger than the current squad. Even then, it's not by much.

The team's U-23 start rate during the recently concluded cycle was 55 percent in 14 games, compared with 56 percent through 10 games in 1990 WCQ. Meanwhile, U-23 players accounted for 51 percent of the total minutes played for Qatar '22, compared with 58 percent for Italia '90. The next closest rate in the modern era in both categories is substantially less, coming in at 28 percent during 2006 qualifying.

The youth of the 2022 qualifying team also surpasses previous cycles when it comes to goals scored, with 15 OF THE TEAM'S 21 GOALS (71 percent) tallied by U-23 players. That number increases to 76 percent if you credit Tim Weah with the own goal he forced in last October's 2-1 win against Costa Rica.

In total, U-23 players either scored, assisted, contributed in the run of play or earned a foul that led to each of the 21 goals scored by the USA during the 2022 FWCQ cycle.

Meanwhile, the team's 21 goals came from 11 different goal scorers, besting the previous goal distribution record during final round qualifying, which was 10 different scorers contributing a total of 17 goals during the 1998 Hexagonal.

INDIVIDUAL STATISTICAL LEADERS

Brenden Aaronson entered the final window on pace to be the only player to appear in all 14 WCQ matches, but a knee injury forced him to withdraw from the March camp. With appearances in the final three matches, the trio of Kellyn Acosta, Tyler Adams and Antonee Robinson jointly led the USMNT with 13 appearances out of a possible 14 qualifiers.

On the scoring front, Christian Pulisic led the way for the USMNT for the secondconsecutive qualifying cycle. The 23-year-old recorded another five goals during 2022 qualification, matching his output during the 2018 Hexagonal. Since the 1998 cycle, he's the first player in Concacaf to score five goals in back-to-back final round qualifying sets and sits tied for third in goals in the final round of qualifying during that time. His first goal against Panama also made him the youngest USMNT player to reach double-digit goals in qualifying (23 years, 190 days).



With 12 total FWCQ goals, Pulisic now sits tied with Eddie Johnson for fourth place on the team's qualifying goals list, just one back of Landon Donovan (13 goals). Overall, Pulisic's 21 goals in 48 career international matches now tie him with Bruce Murray (21 goals in 85 matches) for seventh on the USMNT's all-time scoring list. He sits just three back of Joe-Max Moore for sixth place.

SIDE BY SIDE:

MATT TURNER recorded four shutouts in eight appearances during his first World Cup Qualifying campaign. CHRISTIAN PULISIC tied for the team lead with three assists. Of note. left back ANTONEE ROBINSON became the first USMNT defender to register multiple goals during a final round of Concacaf qualifying.



After the tournament, AI Bayt will be downsized to 32,000 seats.

AI Thumama Stadium brings a vision beyond its inspiration and purpose – marking a coming of age for the beautiful game.

The stadium has a capacity of 40,000 seats that will be reduced after the tournament to 20,000.

2026: THE BIGGEST FIFA WORLD CUP™ EVER COMES TO NORTH AMERICA

The 2026 FIFA World Cup[™] is coming to the United States, Mexico and Canada, marking the first time that three countries have hosted the competition together. The tournament is expanding to 48 teams and 80 matches, making it the largest FIFA World Cup in history.

Sixteen cities across North America were selected to host the tournament:

UNITED STATES: Atlanta, Boston, Dallas, Houston, Kansas City, Los Angeles, Miami, New York/New Jersey, Philadelphia, San Francisco Bay Area and Seattle.

MEXICO: Guadalajara, Mexico City, Monterrey

CANADA: Toronto, Vancouver

The historic tournament will be the first to feature 48 nations, up from 32 that competed in the last seven tournaments dating back to 1998 when the number of participants was increased from 24.

The 1994 FIFA World Cup in the United States marked a watershed moment for the sport in the USA, smashing attendance records and sparking an explosion of interest in the game. The 2026 competition will mark another monumental moment for soccer's growth in the United States and as the world's game.

ALL-TIME USMNT FIFA WORLD CUP™ RESULTS

The U.S. Men's National Team qualified for seven straight FIFA World Cups™ between 1990 and 2014, and 10 overall since the tournament's inception in 1930.

Most recently, the U.S. put on a spirited display at the 2014 World Cup in Brazil, escaping the 'Group of Death' that contained nemesis Ghana, European power Portugal and eventual world champion Germany, before falling 2-1 after extra time to a seeded Belgium side.

In South Africa in 2010, the U.S. won its group for the first time in 80 years with ties against traditional power England and a talented Slovenia side in the first two matches. In the final minute of the final group match, the U.S. was locked in a scoreless tie with Algeria when Landon Donovan electrified a soccer nation by finishing a full-field counter attack with the most dramatic goal in U.S. Soccer history. The U.S. team would come from behind again in the Round of 16, taking Ghana to extra time in Rustenburg. But the African side prevailed with a 2-1 victory, mirroring the result in Germany four years prior.

The team's most successful recent World Cup experience came in 2002 in Korea/Japan, reaching the quarterfinals for the first time in 72 years before losing to eventual runner-up Germany. After opening group play with a stunning 3-2 victory against Portugal, the USA earned a 1-1 draw against the host Korea Republic, before closing out the first round with a 3-1 defeat to Poland. The second-place finish in Group D was enough to place the team in the Round of 16, where they squared off against arch-rival Mexico. The Americans famously blanked Mexico 2-0 to advance to the quarterfinals, but their run ended with a hard-fought defeat at the hands of Germany, 1-0.

The USA's 2002 success was followed by a disappointing first-round exit in Germany in 2006. Despite a three-games-and-out performance, the USA heroically drew 1-1 with eventual world champion Italy with only nine men on the field in one of the team's greatest performances.

The U.S. appeared in the first two World Cups in 1930 and 1934, and made an appearance in 1950 before waiting 40 years to return to the world's stage in 1990.

Two of the USA's greatest victories in World Cup play prior to 2002 include a 1-0 win against powerful England on June 29, 1950, on a goal by Joe Gaetjens in Belo Horizonte, Brazil, and a 2-1 win at home against Colombia on June 22, 1994, with Earnie Stewart scoring the game-winner. The victory against England is still considered by many to be the greatest upset in World Cup history.

The 1990 World Cup marked the first time in 40 years that the U.S. team made it through the Concacaf qualifying rounds. The U.S. squad captured the 24th and final position for Italia '90 by defeating Trinidad & Tobago 1-0 in the final match of Concacaf qualifying.

As the host nation in 1994, the USA went one step further by advancing to the Round of 16, losing a 1-0 match to eventual world champion Brazil.

WORLD CUP NOTES: For the fifth time in eight World Cups, the U.S. failed to advance out of its group.

For the third time in the last four World Cups, the USA's opponents scored an own goal for the United States, this time courtesy of Italy's Christian Zaccarado in a thrilling 1-1 draw on June 17 in Kaiserslautern. That match featured the only World Cup game in U.S. history in which two players from the United States received red cards (Mastroeni and Pope).

U.S. has scored first in just three of 18 World Cup games since 1990.

Brian McBride ended his illustrious career with the United States with a team-best three career World Cup goals.

McBride and Landon Donovan are the only two players to play in all eight U.S. World Cup games in 2002 and 2006.

Claudio Reyna and Kasey Keller are the only two players to be on four U.S. World Cup rosters.

WORLD CUP NOTES: The U.S advanced as far as the World Cup guarterfinals for the first time in 72 years. Its previous best was a semifinal appearance at the 1930 World Cup, where the U.S. advanced straight from group play into the final four.

The U.S. victory over Mexico marked the USA's first-ever knockout round victory in World Cup play. It was also the USA's first World Cup shutout since the team's historic 1-0 victory over England in Brazil in 1950.

Claudio Reyna became the first U.S. Men's National Team player to be named to the FIFA All-World Cup™ First Team.

Brian McBride became the first player in U.S. MNT history to score goals in consecutive World Cups. scoring two game-winners for the U.S. in 2002.

Cobi Jones and Earnie Stewart each played in four 2002 World Cup games to extend their career totals to a U.S. Soccer record 11 World Cup match appearances.

Following the death of George Floyd and continuing growth of the important Black Lives Matter movement, the members of the U.S. Men's National Team were inspired to develop their own mission statement to send and spread a meaningful message. From a diverse and united group, a call to action emerged:

Be The Change.

The spirit of their message is that each and every person has the ability, opportunity and responsibility to make a difference in their own way.

Under this banner, the players have utilized numerous opportunities to raise awareness and appreciation for the cause, taken specific actions when moments have arisen that demanded their attention, and used their public platforms to stand up for what they believe in.

On multiple occasions, the players wore T-shirts or jackets on field before matches bearing the Be the Change message. With the jackets they went one step further, with each player taking the opportunity to inscribe their own personal message on the back.

On June 5, 2022, the players wrote Members of Congress urging them to enact stricter gun-control laws. In their match that evening against 13th-ranked Uruguay, the entire team wore orange armbands in support of Wear Orange Weekend, a national movement initially championed in 2013 by everytown.org to solve gun violence following the killing of Hadiya Pendleton on a playground in Chicago.

With the 2022 FIFA World Cup on the horizon, the USMNT and U.S. Soccer will continue to elevate and advance the Be the Change message, inviting everyone on the journey – including the tournament host country of Qatar – to make positive change in the world.


