# IIIII) NEW ERA, NEW FUTURE TAKES SHAPE FOR MNT IN 2019 

## Founded in 1913, U.S. Soccer is the non-for-profit, governing body of soccer in the United States and has helped chart the course for the game for more than 100 years. Now in its second millennium, the Federation is driven by the singular mission of making soccer the pre-eminent sport in the United States.

To achieve that goal, we will serve the athlete by developing world-class players, coaches and referees, thereby growing participation and increasing awareness. We will serve the fan by connecting supporters to their heroes. By focusing on these two key constituencies, U.S. Soccer is well positioned to elevate the sport to new heights and continue to build on the magnificent traditions established by a century of hard work in support of the beautiful game in this country.

For the U.S. Men's National Team, the disappointment of 2017 gave way to the incredible promise of the future when the United States, Canada and Mexico won the right to host the 2026 FIFA World Cup. This gamechanging opportunity for the sport in North America provided a new guidepost for a long-term benchmark of the team and its progress, while also reawakening the excitement of the fan base eager to see the MNT take its first steps on the road to redemption.

Dave Sarachan stewarded the team through a transition period, giving nearly two dozen players their first taste of the Senior National Team during his tenure from November 2017 to November 2018. Most significantly, 13 of the 23 debutantes were age 22 or under and 11 of those will be age-eligible for the 2020 Summer Olympics in Tokyo. A 1-1 draw away to eventual World Cup champions France punctuated an invaluable experience gathering period which opened the eyes of many to the challenges of international soccer at the senior level. Five players each recorded their first goal or assist during Sarachan's tenure, while two goalkeepers earned their first win and kept their first clean sheet in the same time span. Many also got their first taste of the vaunted USA-Mexico rivalry, with the MNT running out 1-0 winners on an emotional meeting on Sept. 11 in Nashville. Against four-time World Cup champion Italy, Sarachan put out a starting XI with an average of 22 years, 71 days, besting the record for youngest starting XI in the MNT's modern era (1990-present) set during May's 3-0 win against Bolivia and setting a new mark that may never be broken.

During the same window, the long-term vision started to take shape with the hiring of three-time World Cup veteran Earnie Stewart as General Manager. A member of the National Soccer Hall of Fame with 30 years of experience as a player and in technical roles for clubs in the Netherlands and United States, Stewart was tasked with finding the next coach of the Men's National Team and setting the direction of the program for the next eight years and beyond.

After an extensive search, he found his man in two-time World Cup defender Gregg Berhalter. At 45 years old, he became the first coach in MNT history to have represented the United States as a player in the FIFA World Cup, including the historic quarterfinal run durring the 2002 edition in Korea/Japan. Additionally, Berhalter is the first U.S. MNT boss with experience as a player and a coach both domestically and internationally, following an 18 -year playing career that spanned four countries. Having earned a reputation as a detailoriented manager with a keen tactical understanding of the game and indefatigable work ethic during his years with Hammarby in Sweden and Columbus Crew SC of Major League Soccer, Berhalter brings a deep-rooted pride and passion for representing the United States.

## U.S. SOCCER FEDERATION - HISTORY

Throughout the 100-year history of U.S. Soccer, the organization has been known by three different names:
U.S. Foot Ball Association - 1913-1944
U.S. Soccer Football Association - 1945-1973
U.S. Soccer Federation - 1974-Current

The rebuilding project encompasses a fouryear journey to a World Cup, and Berhalter began by establishing three foundational pillars for the group: building a team culture, instilling a style of play, and establishing a competitive mindset. The first measures of progress will be taken this summer when the USA seeks to defend its confederation title at the 2019 Concacaf Gold Cup, having captured its sixth championship in 2017. The MNT will get to road test of all three

principals against the top 16 teams representing North America，Central America and the Caribbean．From there，regional competition continues in the fall when the inaugural Concacaf Nations league kicks off．The draw for the new event takes place in March and will likely provide the first opportunity for the USA＇s budding group to experience the challenges of away matches in the region．

A review of the player pool highlights a group combining promise，potential and seasoning．With a healthy mix based in MLS，Europe and Mexico，some of the top young players are making significant contributions to club and country．Christian Pulisic has set the bar for Americans in Europe as a regular contributor for Champions League contender Borussia Dortmund．This summer，the 20 －year old will make an historic jump to Chelsea，smashing the record transfer fee for a U．S．international．Tyler Adams made eight appearances in 2018 and scored his first international goal in the USA＇s 1－0 victory against Mexico on Sept．11．After registering seven assists in 27 appearances to help the New York Red Bulls to the MLS Supporters Shield and the Eastern Conference Final，he made the move to RB Leipzig in Germany．Fellow Bundesliga midfielder Weston McKennie established his place in the USA midfield by making six appearances while also taking huge strides with Schalke，helping Die Knappen qualify for the UEFA Champions League last season before going on to score his first two goals during the current campaign．Matt Miazga led all MNT center backs with seven appearances，while serving as a key figure in helping Dutch Eredivisie side Vitesse qualify for the UEFA Europa League．With six caps，Zack Steffen tied the MNT record for most appearances by a goalkeeper in their debut year and made eight saves in the friendly against France before their successful run to the 2018 FIFA World Cup title．Voted U．S．Soccer＇s 2018 Male Player of the Year，Steffen also earned MLS Goalkeeper of the Year honors after helping Columbus Crew SC back to the MLS Cup Playoffs，and will make a summer move to Premier League powerhouse Manchester City．As the captain of Columbus Crew SC，25－year－old Wil Trapp＇s veteran presence in midfield served a young MNT group well as he wore the captain＇s armband for the U．S．as well in each of his team－leading nine appearances while earning Man of the Match against Paraguay and Peru． Meanwhile， 2017 U－17 World Cup veterans，and the first two players born in the 2000s to appear for the MNT， Josh Sargent and Tim Weah continue to progress as they seek regular first－team minutes．

The spotlight will also shine on the Youth International level．Following a 2017 in which the United States was only one of two nations in the world to reach the quarterfinals of both the U－17 and U－20 FIFA World Cups－England won the championship in each tournament－the teams are once again gearing up for the ultimate tests at this level．In this cycle，Tab Ramos led the U－20s to a second consecutive Concacaf U－20 Championship title．Alex Mendez took home the Golden Ball as tournament MVP，while goalkeeper Brady Scott was recognized with the Golden Glove Award．All together，eight U．S．players were named to the tournament Best XI team by the competition＇s Technical Study Committee．The team will now head to its fourth straight FIFA U－20 World Cup，with this edition to be held in May and June in Poland．Meantime，the U－17s enter Concacaf qualifying in April at the IMG Academy in Bradenton，Fla．with the goal of advancing to the 2019 FIFA U－17 World Cup in Korea Republic．Having reached the final of the Concacaf U－17s in 2017 only to fall to Mexico，the latest crop will hope to unseat the three－time defending champion El Tri．

With full－time coaches in every age group from the U－14 Boys＇National Team through the U－20s，the National Teams program has never been more integrated and the development pathway never clearer．The pinnacle is the Senior National Team，and it is there that a new journey continues in 2019.



## Gregg BERHALTER

U.S. MNT Head Coach<br>Born: Aug. 1, 1973, in Englewood, N.J. Hometown: Tenafly, New Jersey

An accomplished manager and two-time FIFA World Cup veteran, Gregg Berhalter was named head coach of the U.S. Men's National Team on December 2, 2018.

An intelligent and competitive anchor in central defense as a player, Berhalter spent 18 professional seasons in the Netherlands, England, Germany and the United States before serving seven years as a coach in Sweden and Major League Soccer. Capped 44 times, Berhalter represented the United States at two FIFA World Cups and was a notable part of the 2002 team that advanced to the Quarterfinals in Korea/Japan. A natural leader, Berhalter is one of only a few Americans who have captained multiple teams in Europe, earning that honor for two different clubs in Germany. He is the first MNT head coach to have played for the USA at a FIFA World Cup.

Showing a keen interest in coaching, Berhalter began in the sport's technical side during the late stages of his playing career. While with German club 1860 Munich, the defender scouted opponents from 2007-2009. He transitioned into the coaching ranks during his final season as a professional, serving as a player/assistant coach for the LA Galaxy in 2011, helping the club to the MLS Cup and Supporters Shield in the process.

Immediately after his retirement in 2011, Berhalter moved into the management ranks full time, taking the top job with Swedish club Hammarby that December. The move was unique in that Berhalter became one of the first Americans to begin his management career with a foreign club. During two seasons, the club played to an 18-11-17 record and finished within one spot of promotion to the Swedish top-flight in 2012.

In late 2013, Berhalter returned stateside to take the reins as sporting director and head coach of Columbus Crew SC. Overseeing all facets of the club's soccer operations, Berhalter led Crew SC to postseason appearances in four of his five years in charge, all while working with a salary budget that consistently ranked in the bottom half of Major League Soccer. Most significantly, Berhalter guided Columbus to the 2015 MLS Cup Final and nearly returned the club to the league's title game two years later, falling 1-0 to eventual champions Toronto FC in the 2017 Eastern Conference Final.

Collecting 44 caps during an international career that spanned 12 years, Berhalter earned his first appearance in 1994 and went on to play a part of MNT squads at six major tournaments, including the 2002 and 2006 FIFA World Cups. A fiery competitor and vocal leader, the center back played in both of the USA's World Cup Knockout Round matches in Korea Republic, helping keep a clean sheet during the 2-0 win against Mexico in the 2002 Round of 16 . His most memorable moment in a U.S. shirt came in the following match. With the USA trailing Germany 1-0 in the second half of the Quarterfinal, Berhalter's volley was handled on the line by Torsten Frings, but Scottish referee Hugh Dallas waved off calls for a penalty kick. With his appointment, Berhalter becomes the first MNT head coach to have represented the United States in the sport's pinnacle competition.

Berhalter went on to help the USA qualify for the 2006 FIFA World Cup, and though he made the squad did not appear in any matches in Germany. The cerebral center back participated in many of the USA's significant runs in international competitions, including the third-place finish at the 1999 FIFA Confederations Cup in Mexico. He was also part of the USA squad that finished fourth at Copa America '95 and went to the final of the 1998 Concacaf Gold Cup.

A native of Englewood, N.J., Berhalter played three seasons at the University of North Carolina before deciding to leave college early to begin his professional career in 1994. Foreshadowing the choice to begin his management career abroad, he moved to Dutch Erstedivisie side Zwolle, beginning a six-year stay in Holland. In 1996, he moved up to the top flight, spending another two seasons with Sparta Rotterdam followed by two years with SC Cambuur where he won the club's Player of the Year award in back-to-back seasons.

In 2001, Berhalter joined English League Championship side Crystal Palace before making a long-term move to Germany the following year. Following impressive performances at the 2002 FIFA World Cup, he signed with

Joining the Galaxy in the twilight of his career, Berhalter helped mentor the likes of Omar Gonzalez, AJ DeLaGarza and Sean Franklin, a core of young defenders that would become staples in the club's most successful years. In 2009, he helped the Galaxy advance to the 2009 MLS Cup Final where they fell to Real Salt Lake on penalty kicks. The following year, he aided in the club's 2010 MLS Supporters Shield campaign, before ending his career with the MLS Cup and Supporter Shield double as a player/assistant coach in 2011.

Showing his leadership qualities early on, Berhalter served as captain for the U.S. at the 1993 FIFA World Youth Championship in Australia, helping guide the team past the group stage for just the second time in tournament history. Three years later, Berhalter was slated to captain the U-23 MNT at the 1996 Summer Olympics in Atlanta but was forced to miss the tournament after suffering an injury just three weeks prior.

Along with holding the UEFA "A" coaching license, Berhalter was part of the inaugural class to attain U.S. Soccer's "PRO" coaching license in 2016.

Berhalter is the godson of former Boston Red Sox player and baseball Hall of Famer Carl Yastrzemski. Gregg and his wife Rosalind have four children: Sebastian, Santana, Lily and Delilah. The family enjoy traveling together, cooking, golf and reading in their spare time.



## Josh WOLFF

U.S. MNT Assistant Coach

Born: Feb. 25, 1977
Hometown: Stone Mountain, Ga.

A two-time World Cup veteran with the U.S. Men's National Team, Josh Wolff returns to the MNT after working for seven seasons as an assistant coach in Major League Soccer. The Stone Mountain, Ga., native was part of Gregg Berhalter's staff from 2014-2018 at Columbus Crew SC, helping the club to the 2015 MLS Cup Final and playoff appearances on four occasions. Prior to his work with Columbus, Wolff transitioned into the technical side of the game with D.C. United, serving as a player/assistant coach in 2012 before working as a full-time assistant on Ben Olsen's staff and winning the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup in 2013.

Wolff earned 52 caps with the MNT from 1999-2008, recording nine goals and five assists. He first made his mark on the international stage with the U-23 MNT at the 2000 Summer Olympics, appearing in all six matches and providing two goals to help the USA to a fourth-place finish in Sydney. A tenacious second striker, Wolff helped the MNT qualify for the 2002 and 2006 FIFA World Cups, appearing in both tournaments. He showed a specific knack for turning in big performances against Mexico, scoring his first international goal against El Trí on Oct. 25, 2000, before his goal-and-assist, Man of the Match performance in the 2-0 World Cup Qualifying win on Feb. 282001 in Columbus, Ohio. Wolff went on to provide the assist to Brian McBride to open the scoring in the USA's 2-0 victory against its regional rivals during the Round of 16 at the 2002 FIFA World Cup. The striker was part of the USA's 2002 and 2005 Concacaf Gold Cup-winning sides, as well as the U-20 MNT at the 1997 FIFA World Youth Championship in Malaysia.

A speedy forward, Wolff's 15 -year club career began with the Chicago Fire, helping the expansion club to the unprecedented MLS Cup and U.S. Open Cup double in 1998. Wolff spent five seasons with the Men in Red, pushing the club to another U.S. Open Cup title and MLS Cup Final appearance in 2000, before he was to the Kansas City Wizards ahead of the 2003 campaign. In Kansas City, Wolff raised his third U.S. Open Cup trophy in 2004, as well as helping the Wizards to the MLS Cup Final that year.

In 2007, Wolff signed with Germany's 1860 Munich, and played two seasons alongside Berhalter with the German club. Wolff returned to Kansas City in 2008, playing three more seasons before moving to D.C. United where he finished his playing career before transitioning to the Black-and-Red's coaching staff in 2012.


Prior to his rookie season in MLS, Wolff recorded 21 goals and eight assists in 43 games at the University of South Carolina from 1995-1997.

A holder of the U.S. Soccer "A" and "PRO" coaching licenses, Wolff and his wife Angela have four children - Tyler, Owen, Gavin and Ella.

# Nico ESTEVEZ 

U.S. MNT Assistant Coach

Born: Jan. 29, 1980
Hometown: Valencia, Spain


Nico Estevez joins the MNT after spending the past four seasons working under Gregg Berhalter at Columbus Crew SC. Estevez served as the first team's Director of Methodology from 2015-16, before working as an assistant coach from 2017-2018.

In his Director of Methodology role, Estevez was responsible for developing and implementing the training curriculum for all Crew SC teams, while reinforcing principles of play consistent with the philosophy of the first team throughout each level. He also oversaw the individual player development plan for each youth player. He spent eight years in Spain with La Liga club Valencia, working in its Academy and Department of Methodology, which included a stint as interim head coach of the first team in 2013.

Estevez joined Valencia in July 2004, first working with the youth teams and later spending two seasons as head coach of Huracan Valencia CF in Spain's Segunda Division B from 2011 to 2013. Estevez helped the team qualify for the promotion playoffs during both seasons.

In July 2013, he was appointed Head Coach of Valencia Mestalla of Spain's Segunda Division B. On October 21, 2013, the Comite de Entrenadores de la Real Federacion Espanola de Futbol ("Royal Spanish Football Federation's Coaches' Committee") awarded him the Ramon Cobo award in recognition for his work.

Prior to his time with Valencia, Estevez worked with CF San Jose, a youth soccer academy in Valencia, Spain. He originally worked as a youth team head coach upon his arrival on July of 1999, overseeing the Under-12, $\mathrm{U}-14, \mathrm{U}-15, \mathrm{U}-16$, and U-18 sides during his time there. In July of 2003, he was made Technical Director. Estevez also served as CF San Jose's Director of Methodology from 2010-2011.
Estevez and his wife Amparo have two children - Sandra and Nico.


## B.J. CALLAGHAN

## U.S. MNT Strategy Analyst / Assistant Coach <br> Born: July 1, 1981 <br> Hometown: Ventnor, N.J.

B.J. Callaghan comes to the U.S. Men's National Team after spending the last seven years with the Philadelphia Union. For the past five seasons, Callaghan worked as an assistant coach under Jim Curtin, focusing on team defending, opponent analysis, set-piece design, player development and scouting. During this time, he helped the Union to appearances in the 2014, 2015 and 2018 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Finals as well as postseason berths in 2016 and 2018. Prior to his involvement with the first team, he spent the previous two years working with the Philadelphia Union/YSC Academy.

Prior to his time with the Philadelphia Union, Callaghan spent six years at Villanova University, rising to the level of Associate Head Coach. While at Villanova, he was involved in all aspects of the program, and helped lead the team to three straight Big East playoff appearances, including the 2011 Big East Semifinals - the highest finish in program history.

Callaghan graduated in 2003 from Ursinus College with a degree in Economics and Business Administration, and has held many coaching positions within the Philadelphia soccer community, working with FC Delco, Montgomery Soccer Club, and EPYSA/Region I ODP programs. He holds the U.S. Soccer "PRO" and "A" coaching licenses.


# Steve TASHJIAN 

U.S. MNT Head Performance Expert Born: Aug. 16, 1976 Hometown: La Verne, California



Steve Tashjian joins the U.S. Men's National Team staff after spending the past five years with Columbus Crew SC, where he worked alongside Gregg Berhalter as the club's High Performance Director.

A licensed physical therapist and respected performance specialist, Tashjian is renowned for being the lone American in the same role in the English Premier League for half a decade. With Columbus, Tashjian was tasked with continuing to develop data driven performance platforms in the areas of health and wellness, sports medicine, sport science, strength and conditioning and recovery.

Tashjian joined Crew SC from English Premier League side Everton, where he served for five years as strength and conditioning coach, then later as the Head of Sports Science and Conditioning and Director of End Stage Rehabilitation. During his time at Everton, Tashjian became well known for his innovative approach to player monitoring and performance development. While serving the club, Everton never finished outside the top eight Premiership positions, qualifying in 2009-2010 for the UEFA Europa League, appearing in the 2011-2012 FA Cup semifinal and finishing fifth in the Premier League in 2013-2014. During his tenure, Tashjian worked with a list of elite players including Tim Howard, Landon Donovan, Tim Cahill, Louis Saha, Phil Neville, Steven Pienaar, Romelu Lukaku, Marouane Fellaini and Leighton Baines.

From 2007 to 2009, Tashjian served as Assistant Coach and Head of Fitness, Director of End Stage Rehabilitation and Reconditioning with Columbus. He was a part of Sigi Schmid's staff that led the Black \& Gold to the 2008 MLS Cup, and was a part of back-to-back Supporters' Shield wins in 2008 and 2009.

Tashjian's clinical experience began in 2002 as Physical Therapist and Strength and Conditioning Coach in Pasadena, California at the Competitive Athlete Training Zone (CATZ), assisting with the off-season training program for the LA Galaxy. In 2003, he left his position with CATZ to become Co-Owner and Director of Athletic Performance at Rehab United Physical Therapy and Sports Performance Center in San Diego, California, working with elite amateur, Olympic and professional athletes from multiple sports.

As an Assistant Coach, Head of Fitness and later a consultant for Azusa Pacific University from 2006-2008, he helped the university to a 2007 NAIA Men's Soccer National Championship as well as runner-up honors with the women in 2007 and the men in 2006.

# Darcy NORMAN 

U.S. MNT Movement \& Conditioning Coach<br>Born: Sept. 9, 1971<br>Hometown: Grande Prairie, Alberta, Canada

Darcy Norman brings 20 years of experience in the human performance industry to the U.S. Men's National Team. For the past 10 years, his work has primarily focused on creating and implementing methodologies, applied data and building strategic relations, as well as managing medical, rehab, fitness, nutrition, psychology and sport science staff at the highest level. Norman's soccer-specific experience includes time as Performance Data Analyst and Fitness Rehab Coach with the German Men's National Team from 2012-2018, helping Die Mannschaft to the 2014 FIFA World Cup title and third-place finish at Euro 2012. From 2015-2018, Norman also worked as the Director of Performance with Italian club AS Roma, helping the side to a semifinal appearance in 2017-18 UEFA Champions League. Though he spent a year away from the international game during the U.S. Men's National Team's transitional year in 2018, 29-year-old Jozy Altidore still remains firmly in the player pool as a veteran as the squad turns its sights towards qualification for the 2022 FIFA World Cup in Qatar. A talented forward prospect in his youth, Paul Arriola's path to a professional career came amidst turning down some situations that might have been deemed more comfortable instead electing to sign with Mexican side Club Tijuana at age 18. Recruited heavily by UCLA and offered a Homegrown deal with the LA Galaxy, Arriola instead signed with Los Xolos in 2013. Having worked his way from spot appearances to regular substitute roles, Arriola became a regular in the side in 2016, which helped him carve out a consistent role with the MNT the following year. Now a veteran defender with a FIFA World Cup under his belt, Brooks is a towering center back who possesses all the physical tools and calm demeanor to dominate a match from his position on the back line. With both American and German citizenship, Brooks was called in to Youth National Team camps by both the United States and Germany, making appearances for the U.S. at the U-20 and U-23 level, while also doing so for Germany's U-19 side. His choice to represent the United States rang loud and clear when he headed home the game-winning goal in the 2-1 win against Ghana in the USA's opening match of the 2014 FIFA World Cup in Brazil. A model of perseverance, Aaron Long's path to the U.S. Men's National Team has been lengthy, but the time it's taken to arrive has made it all the more rewarding. One of the most exciting prospects in recent memory, Christian Pulisic had a breakout year in 2016, earning his first-team debut for Borussia Dortmund on January 30 and his first U.S. Men's National Team appearance two months later. Just 17 years old when doing both, Pulisic racked up multiple "youngest player" records for club and country during 2016, including becoming the youngest player to score for the MNT and youngest player to score two goals in the German Bundesliga. A prolific goal-scorer in the Youth National Team set-up, Josh Sargent is a striker with a knack for finishing and a bright future on the front line for the U.S. Men's National Team. The 18 -year-old experienced a whiriwind 2017 , becoming the first player to be called up to the $\mathrm{U}-17, \mathrm{U}-20$ and senior MNTs in the same year. # ALL-TIME U.S. MEN'S NATIONAL TEAM FIFA WORLD CUP RESULTS 

The U.S. Men's National Team has qualified for 10 FIFA World Cups since the tournament's inception in 1930.

Most recently, the U.S. put on a spirited display at the 2014 World Cup in Brazil, escaping the 'Group of Death' that contained nemesis Ghana, European power Portugal and eventual world champions Germany, before falling 2-1 after extra time to a seeded Belgium side.

In South Africa in 2010, the U.S. won its group for the first time in 80 years with ties against traditional power England and a talented Slovenia side in the first two matches. In the final minute of the final group match, the U.S. was locked in a scoreless tie with Algeria when Landon Donovan electrified a soccer nation by finishing a full-field counter attack with the most dramatic goal in U.S. Soccer history. The U.S. team would come from behind again in the Round of 16, taking Ghana to extra time in Rustenburg. But the African side prevailed with a 2-1 victory, mirroring the result in Germany four years prior.

The team's most successful recent World Cup experience came in 2002 in Korea/Japan, reaching the quarterfinals for the first time in 72 years before losing to eventual runners-up Germany. After opening group play with a stunning 3-2 victory against Portugal, the USA earned a 1-1 draw against the host Korea Republic, before closing out the first round with a 3-1 defeat to Poland. The second-place finish in Group D was enough to place the team in the Round of 16 , where they squared off against arch-rival Mexico. The Americans famously blanked Mexico 2-0 to advance to
the quarterfinals, but their run ended with a hard-fought defeat at the hands of Germany, 1-0.

The USA's 2002 success was followed by a disappointing first-round exit in Germany in 2006. Despite a three-games-and-out performance, the USA heroically drew 1-1 with eventual World Champion Italy with only nine men on the field in one of the team's greatest performances.

The U.S. appeared in the first two World Cups in 1930 and 1934, and made an appearance in 1950 before waiting 40 years to return to the world's stage in 1990.

Two of the USA's greatest victories in World Cup play prior to 2002 include a 1-0 win over powerful England on June 29, 1950, on a goal by Joe Gaetjens in Belo Horizonte, Brazil, and a 2-1 win at home against Colombia on June 22, 1994, with Earnie Stewart scoring the game-winner. The victory over England is still considered by many to be the greatest upset in World Cup history.

The 1990 World Cup marked the first time in 40 years that the U.S. team made it through the Concacaf qualifying rounds. The U.S. squad captured the 24th and final position for Italia ' 90 by defeating Trinidad \& Tobago 1-0 in the final match of Concacaf qualifying.

As the host nation in 1994, the USA went one step further by advancing to the Round of 16 , losing a 1-0 match to eventual world champion Brazil.

Clint Dempsey and Landon Donovan became the second and third Americans to score in multiple FIFA World Cups.

Donovan became the USA's all-time leading World Cup goalscorer with his fifth career goal in the Round of 16 against Ghana. With his 12th career appearance against Ghana he also became the U.S. leader in World Cup caps.

For the third time in the last four World Cups, the USA's opponents scored an own goal for the United States, this time courtesy of Italy's Christian Zaccarado in a thrilling 1-1 draw on June 17 in Kaiserslautern. That match featured the only World Cup game in U.S. history in which two players from the United States received red cards (Pablo Mastroeni and Eddie Pope).

The U.S. has scored first in just three of 18 World Cup games since 1990.
Brian McBride ended his illustrious career with the United States with a teambest three career World Cup goals.

McBride and Landon Donovan are the only two players to play in all eight U.S. World Cup games in 2002 and 2006.

Claudio Reyna and Kasey Keller are the only two players to be on four U.S. World Cup rosters.

WORLD CUP NOTES: The U.S advanced as far as the World Cup quarterfinals for the first time in 72 years. Its previous best was a semifinal appearance at the 1930 World Cup, where the U.S. advanced straight from group play into the final four.

The U.S. victory over Mexico marked the USA's first-ever knockout round victory in World Cup play. It was also the USA's first World Cup shutout since the team's historic 1-0 victory over England in Brazil in 1950.

Claudio Reyna became the first U.S. Men's National Team player to be named to the FIFA All-World Cup First Team.

Brian McBride became the first player in U.S. MNT history to score goals in consecutive World Cups, scoring two game-winners for the U.S. in 2002.

Cobi Jones and Earnie Stewart each played in four 2002 World Cup games to extend their career totals to a U.S. Soccer record 11 World Cup match appearances.

With an exciting crop of young prospects coming up through the Youth National Team pipeline, the Under-23 Men's National Team is well-positioned to qualify for the USA's first Olympic tournament since 2008. After narrowly missing qualification to the 2016 Summer Olympics in Rio de Janeiro by dropping an intercontinental playoff, the new U-23 MNT will aim to bring the USA back to the global stage at the 2020 Summer Olympics in Tokyo.

## FULL STEAM AHEAD TOWARDS POLAND

In 2018，the U．S．U－20 Men＇s National Team claimed its second－straight and second－ever Concacaf U－20 Championship in emphatic fashion．The U－20s put together a plus－44 goal differential in the eight－game tournament，as 11 players scored 46 goals for the USA．After rolling through its five－team group，the U．S．took down Costa Rica 4－0 to clinch its spot at the 2019 FIFA U－20 World Cup and defeated Mexico 2－0 in the final to claim the confederation crown．

The U．S．is primed for success in Poland after a series of strong performances at the U－20 World Cup．The USA is one of five countries to qualify for four consecutive tournaments and one of just two teams to advance to the quarterfinals of the 2015 and 2017 editions．The 2018－19 cycle is the fourth for head coach Tab Ramos at the helm of the U．S．U－20 MNT，and he＇ll look to guide the U－20 MNT to new heights this summer in Poland．


## Tab RAMOS

U.S. Under-20 Men's National Team Head Coach<br>Born: Sept. 23, 1966<br>Hometown: Colts Neck, N.J.

Tab Ramos heads into his eighth year at the helm of the Under-20 Men's National Team after being announced as head coach in October 2011. One of the most accomplished figures in U.S. Soccer history, this summer's FIFA U-20 World Cup will see Ramos become the first male to go to 11 FIFA world championship tournaments as a player or coach.

In his tenure with the U-20 MNT, Ramos has guided the USA to new heights. By qualifying the team to all four U-20 World Cups during his tenure, the U.S. has become one of just five countries to play in the last four tournaments. In 2017 and 2018, Ramos led the USA to back-to-back Concacaf U-20 Championships, its first-ever confederation titles.

As a former U.S. National Team midfielder and U-20 MNT assistant and interim head coach, Ramos brings a wealth of experience to the U.S. National Team program. He has been a member of the U.S. Soccer Federation Technical Board since 2006, and after receiving his "A" coaching license in 2007, became the U.S. U-20 MNT assistant coach two years later. Ramos served as interim head coach in late 2011, guiding the U-20 Men through training camp and two friendlies in France. In December 2016, Ramos completed the first U.S. Soccer Pro License coaching course, earning the highest form of soccer licensing offered in North America.

Ramos's first coaching experience came with the New Jersey Soccer Academy (NJSA 04), a U.S. Soccer Development Academy club, which he founded in 2004. He is currently the Executive Director of the program and has won four New Jersey state championships and a national championship, the only U.S. Youth Soccer National Championship for a N.J. boys' club in more than two decades.

Ramos first earned international playing experience with the U-20 MNT when he scored two goals for the U.S. in FIFA U-20 World Cup Qualifying. He played for the U.S. in the 1983 U-20 World Cup and was also a member of the U.S. team that competed in the 1988 Olympics in Seoul, South Korea.

His first appearance with the full team came on Jan. 10, 1988, against Guatemala, and Ramos went on to play in the 1990 World Cup, where his performance earned him the title of U.S. Soccer Athlete of the Year. By the time he retired from international duty in 2000, Ramos had played in three World Cups, earned 81 caps and scored eight goals, becoming the only U.S. player to score at least one World Cup Qualifying goal in three different decades.

A 2001 graduate of North Carolina State University, Ramos studied foreign language and literature while becoming a three-time All-American in his four years playing for the school's men's soccer team. He joined American Soccer League side New Jersey Eagles in 1988 before moving to fellow ASL club Miami Sharks the next season.

In 1990, Ramos had a contract to play exclusively for the U.S. MNT as it prepared for the 1990 World Cup, but Spanish Second Division club Figueres took him on loan later that year, before eventually signing him. Ramos was sold to Real Betis in 1992 and helped the team win promotion to La Liga, but a skull fracture suffered in the 1994 World Cup kept him from making any La Liga appearances.

Ramos was the first player signed to Major League Soccer in 1995, and before being allocated to the N.Y./N.J. MetroStars, MLS loaned him to UANL Tigres in Mexico, where his team were 1996 Mexico Cup Champions. In his seven seasons with the MetroStars, Ramos tallied eight goals and 36 assists before retiring in 2002.

Ramos lives in Colts Neck, N.J., with his girlfriend Tracey and his three children Alex, Kristen and Sarah.

The U-19 MNT program, along with the U-16 Boy's National Team, began its first year of programming in 2016 as a part of an overall commitment to player development. U.S. Soccer now has a total of eight youth National Teams for both its men's and women's programs: U-14, U-15, U-16, U-17, U-18. U-19, U-20 and U-23.

The additions create two separate programming tracks for even-birth year players and odd-birth year players to allow for a more consistent approach toward development and additional opportunities for players to participate in National Team events and matches.

The pool for the U-19s will be brought to a number of training camps over the course of the year in order to expose more players of this age to the National Team camp environment as well as give activity to the younger group of players in the pool competing for a spot at the FIFA U-20 World Cup.

Dave van den Bergh returns to the helm of the U-15 Boys' National Team for a second straight cycle after he was appointed head coach in February of 2016.

Originally from Amsterdam, van den Bergh has a polished soccer background. He played his youth career with Ajax before switching to play for Rayo Vallecano, helping the team get promoted to the Primera División, while also helping earn the club's first UEFA Cup qualification.

Before traveling to the U.S., he spent most of this soccer career with Utrecht in the Netherlands, leading his team to five consecutive UEFA Cup appearances. Once in the U.S., van den Bergh played for the Kansas City Wizards before being traded to the New York Red Bulls. In 2007, he led the Red Bulls with eight assists. The Red Bulls gained a berth in the 2008 MLS Cup after van den Bergh's lone goal in the Western Conference Final against Real Salt Lake. He ended his professional career with FC Dallas in 2009 with 30 appearances and three goals in his final season.

He represented the Netherlands in the 1995 FIFA U-20 World Cup and was capped twice with the senior team in 2004.

## EYES ON THE WORLD CUP

After a busy first year of the 2018-19 cycle, the U.S. U-17 Men's National Team will turn its attention to qualifying for the 2019 FIFA U-17 World Cup. This age group began the U-17 cycle in Dec. 2017 at the 2017 Nike International Friendlies, and followed up a promising performance there with 17 international matches in 2018, capped off by the 2018 edition of the Friendlies, where the USA went undefeated.

Now, the team turns its attention to the 2019 Concacaf U-17 Championship, where the USA will aim to become one of four nations to qualify from Concacaf to this fall's FIFA U-17 World Cup. Playing on home turf, the USA will face Canada, Bermuda and Guatemala in group stage play before a 16 -team knockout round bracket.

The U.S. has qualified for 16 of the previous 17 FIFA U-17 World Cups, tied for the most appearances all-time at the tournament.

## 2019 U.S. Under-17 Men's National Team Player Pool-02s

Following is the current player pool for the U.S. Under-17 Men's National Team. The U.S. U-17 MNT head coach and coaching staff will, for the most part, use this pool of players for training camps and matches in 2019 in preparation for qualifying for the 2019 FIFA U-17 World Cup. To be age-eligible for the FIFA U-17 World Cup, players must have been born on or after Jan. 1, 2002. The pool is constantly evolving, with new players being added and called-up. Players from the U-16 Boys' National Team pool (03s) or U.S. Under-15 Boys' National Team (04s) may also be called to the U-17s.

# U.S. SOCCER'S UNDER-17 RESIDENCY PROGRAM <br> <br> Bradenton, Fla.

After establishing a blueprint for creating a successful every day training environment, the U.S. Soccer Under-17 Men's National Team Residency Program completed its final semester in the Spring of 2017 after 18 years at the IMG Academy in Bradenton, Fla.

Started in 1999, the Residency Program created an elite training environment for the best youth players in the country by focusing on daily training to improve their development. Eight years later, the success of the Residency Program helped guide the 2007 launch of U.S. Soccer's Development Academy, which took the Residency Program model down to the club level, creating an elite development environment across 63 clubs, providing thousands of players the opportunity to improve.

Currently in its 11th season, Boys' Development Academy has grown to 162 clubs across six age groups with more than 14,000 registered players. With nearly 500 Boys' Academy coaches to have earned the USSF ' $A$ ' license, the level of coaching continues to improve the day-to-day training environment.

Following 10 years of success for the Boys' Development Academy, the Girls' Development Academy launched in the fall of 2017 to bring the development initiative to female youth players. With 32 players in Residency throughout 2016, the program began the first year of the process towards developing players individually and building a team that will compete at the 2017 Concacaf U-17 Championship where they'll look to qualify for October's FIFA U-17 World Cup in India.

The U.S. players live on campus at the IMG Academy in Bradenton, Fla., and train in the morning under the guidance of the U.S. U-17 MNT coaching staff. In the afternoon, the players attend classes at St. Stephen's Episcopal School. While in the full-time residency program, the U.S. not only trains daily, but also has access to the IMG Academy facilities. The team regularly uses IMG's state-of-the-art strength-training facilities, as well as some of the nation's best sports psychologists who work at the Academy. The IMG Academies include top-of-the-line soccer equipment, three Bermuda grass fields, newly renovated student housing and dining facilities.

The Residency Program has given players an excellent opportunity to grow and move up the ladder in the world of soccer and become professionals in Major League Soccer, some of the biggest clubs in Europe and even make an impact on the full U.S. Men's National Team. The program in Bradenton provides players with an environment where they can prosper as individual players and gel as a team.

Since its inception, more than 450 players have been through the full-time Residency Program, and more than 150 of those players have moved on to Major League Soccer, or professional leagues in Europe. Twentynine players have also registered at least one cap with the full MNT: Freddy Adu, Gale Agbossoumonde, Juan Agudelo, Jozy Altidore, DaMarcus Beasley, Kyle Beckerman, Michael Bradley, Bobby Convey, Landon Donovan, Greg Garza, Eddie Gaven, Luis Gil, Omar Gonzalez, Joe Gyau, Eddie Johnson, Perry Kitchen, Eric Lichaj, Justin Mapp, Chad Marshall, Dax McCarty, Oguchi Onyewu, Heath Pearce, Santino Quaranta, Robbie Rogers, Rubio Rubin, Brek Shea, Jonathan Spector, Danny Szetela and Anthony Wallace.

The first full-time U.S. Soccer Residency Program began on Jan. 17, 1999, when U.S. Soccer collected 20 of the country's elite youth players to train year-round. In its first year of existence, the U.S. Soccer Residency Program produced instant success as the Under-17s qualified for the FIFA Under-17 World Championship in New Zealand in November of 1999. On the world stage, the American teenagers rose to the occasion, winning their group and advancing to the semifinals before being ousted in a penalty shootout. The fourth-place finish tied for the best showing by a U.S. Youth National Team in a major international competition. U.S. stars Donovan and Beasley were awarded the Gold and Silver Balls, respectively, as the top two players in the entire tournament. The U.S. has continued its successful tradition at this level by qualifying for all but one the 12 FIFA Under-17 World Cups in history.

## NIKE INTERNATIONAL FRIENDLIES HISTORY

Beginning in 2001, U.S. Soccer's Nike International Friendlies were established to provide top-level competition for the U.S. Under-17 Men's National Team and evolved into one of the premier annual events on the youth soccer calendar. It is a highly anticipated event by clubs and college coaches due to the emphasis on quality soccer and the top-level competition.

Featuring the top club teams in the Under-16/17 and Under-18/19 age groups from around the United States, the Nike International Friendlies are now staged alongside the U.S. Soccer Development Academy Winter Showcase, acting as the event's centerpiece.
The USA went undefeated at the 2018 Nike Friendlies, but came up just short of taking home the tournament title. Facing Portugal, Turkey and Brazil, the U.S. played three evenly-matched, hard-fought games. In its opener, opportunistic play put the $\mathrm{U}-17 \mathrm{~s}$ ahead of Portugal just before the half, but they conceded in the 81st and had to settle for a draw. Another goal minutes before the break proved to be the difference in a 1-0 win over Turkey. Needing to overcome a goal-differential disadvantage to win the tournament, the USA struck first against Brazil in first-half stoppage time, but gave up a late equalizer to finish the tournament with a record of 1-0-2.
The 2017 edition of the Nike Friendlies featured the USA matched up with Brazil, England and Netherlands. The 2002 birth year group, who finished second at the CONCACAF U-15 Championship four months prior, were under the helm of head coach John Hackworth for the very first time. After falling to England after being one minute away from a draw, Hackworth switched up the starting lineup against Netherlands, where the USA fell 5-1. In the tournament's final match against Brazil, the young group representing the U-17 MNT for the first time found their first result, drawing the tournament champions 1-1.

The USA re-gained the tournament crown at the 2016 Nike International Friendlies, putting in dominant performances in a $7-1$ win vs. Portugal and 5-1 victory against Turkey to set up a winner-takes-all group finale vs. Brazil. A goal before halftime from Ayo Akinola gave way to an assured second-half performance as strikes from Josh Sargent and Timothy Weah pushed the USA to a 3-0 victory and its first Nike International Friendlies title since 2013.

The 2015 Nike Friendlies saw a young U.S. U-17 Men's National Team finish fourth in a strong field of teams which featured champions England, Netherlands and Brazil. At the 2014 event, the USA finished runner-up to Brazil in a tournament field that also included England and Australia. In 2013, the U.S., Brazil, England and Portugal made up the four-team field, with the U.S. winning the event with a victory over Brazil in the tournament's final match. It was the USA's second Nike Friendlies title in three years after also winning the 2011 title; Portugal won in 2012.

Originally, the U-17 MNT would face mainly U.S.-based club teams with an international opponent sprinkled in. That changed with the 2008 Winter Showcase in Lancaster, Calif., as the Nike Friendlies evolved beyond the capacity of its original IMG Academy home in Bradenton, Fla., with more than 140 teams participating in the tournament. By comparison, there were 19 teams at the inaugural 2001 competition.
By that time, it had become tradition to bring in international opponents for the U-17 MNT - and the Nike International Friendlies reached its current format. Australia and Brazil joined the U.S. U-17 MNT in 2008, and Brazil returned along with Portugal and the Netherlands in 2009. In 2010, it was Turkey, Brazil and Portugal, then, Turkey and Brazil were joined by France as the event shifted to Lakewood Ranch, Florida, near Bradenton in 2011.
The 2007 edition of the Nike Friendlies featured 54 teams, including the USA's 40 -player Under-17 Residency Program and the U.S. Under-15 Boys' National Team, as well as the Under-17 National Teams of Brazil, Russia and Turkey. In 2006, the tournament included 53 teams in three different age groups, including three U.S. National Teams, a youth team from Italian club Juventus and the Brazil Under-17 National Team.

The U-16 BNT program, along with the U-19 Men's National Team, began its first year of programming in 2016 as a part of an overall commitment to player development. U.S. Soccer now has a total of eight youth National Teams for both its men's and women's programs: U-14, U-15, U-16, U-17, U-18. U-19, U-20, and U-23.

The additions create two separate programming tracks for even-birth year players and odd birth year players to allow for a more consistent approach toward development and additional opportunities for players to participate in national team events and matches.

The pool for the U-16s will be brought to a number of training camps over the course of the year in order to expose more players of this age to the National Team camp environment as well as provide programming to the younger group of players in the pool competing for a spot at the FIFA U-17 World Cup.

## U.S. UNDER-14 NATIONAL IDENTIFICATION PROGRAM

With the objective to expand and improve the Men's Youth National Team player pool, U.S. Soccer launched the Youth National Teams Under-14 Talent Identification Program in 2019. This new scouting model functions as a collaboration between the U.S. Soccer Talent Identification department (TID) and the Youth National Teams Program.

Designed to discover and introduce a larger base of top talents at the U-14 age group into the scouting funnel of the older YNTs, a mini-camp format helps evaluate and inspire high-potential players while accelerating their development in an engaging and challenging environment.

The program starts with the in-market scouting process: players are observed in games and the top talents selected to attend YNT Identification Centers. Formerly known as Training Centers, Identification Centers are scheduled to be held in 25 key markets nationwide and will be overseen by U.S. Soccer TID Managers and YNT Network Scouts. These single-day sessions, hosted at local clubs or U.S. Soccer member organizations, gather more than 600 top talents each year in the $\mathrm{U}-14$ and $\mathrm{U}-15$ age groups. Depending on the number of top players identified in each market, YNT Identification Centers are held there two to three times each year in the fall, winter and spring.

Following the in-market scouting process, YNT U-14 TID Regional Mini-Camps will bring together 80 of the best players from each of U.S. Soccer TID's three scouting regions - East, Central and West - for a three-game, round-robin competition. Overseen by the U-14 Boys' National Team Coach, the five-day camp will feature four, 20-player teams (one representing each scouting area), playing three games against each other over the course of four-and-a-half days.

The inaugural West Regional Mini-Camp ran in January, while the Central and East mini-camps will take place in March and April, respectively.

After the Regional Mini-Camps, 60 players gather for a U-14 National Identification Camp over the summer. Roughly twenty players come from each region, but the roster may also include international-based players beginning at this stage. Held for a full week in the vein of a traditional YNT training camp, the U-14 BNT head coach, all three boys' TID Managers and six U.S. Soccer Development Academy coaches will be on-hand to guide the camp.

The culmination of the new U-14 Identification Program comes in the fall, when 20 players will compete in an international event as the U.S. U-14 Boys' National Team, giving the selected players the opportunity to represent their country in their first international games. From there, players will have the opportunity to advance to the U-15 BNT and continue to progress through the YNT program pathway.

In addition to expanding the YNT player pool at its early stages, the new scouting and identification structure changes programming for U-14 players by allowing them more time to absorb core principles of the YNT philosophy and accelerate their development. Each region's best talents will compete against each other in three additional meaningful games. Additionally, travel is minimized through the first stages of the program, helping minimize days away from home, school and club.

The new program also offers the opportunity to bolster U.S. Soccer's national network of scouts to further their education and development while also building its connection with clubs across the country. While the U-14 BNT coach and TID Managers will be on-hand at Regional Mini-Camps, the four sub-regional teams will be coached by scouts from U.S. Soccer's YNT Scouting Network and local Development Academy coaches from the same area.

In recent years, the United States' play at the Youth National Team level has confirmed its status as a top youth nation in CONCACAF and in the world. In existence since 1997, the U.S. Under-14 National Development Program is a major reason for increasing quality and quantity of young players vying for sports in the U.S. Youth National Teams program.

Prior to the YNT U-14 TID program's launch this year, the Under-14 National Development program kicked off in Aug. 1997, with the knowledge that to compete with the elite countries on the international level, the U.S. would have to build a base of players from the youth level up. The U-14 program continues to introduce young players to a level of soccer they would not otherwise see at such a young age and allows the country's top youths the chance to experience soccer at its highest level.

## Overview：Developing the Next Generation

The U．S．Soccer Development Academy program is driven by the game and its players，coaches and referees． This game－centric approach allows for long－term development to occur through a deep understanding of what makes players successful around the world．As the sport of soccer grows in the United States，young players in our country need the proper environment to compete against the world＇s elite．The U．S．Soccer Development Academy program provides the optimum developmental environment for the nation＇s top youth soccer players， coaches and referees by emphasizing development through quality training and limited，meaningful competition．

## 10－Month Schedule

After receiving overwhelming support from Development Academy membership，the Academy moved to a schedule in the fall of 2012 that runs from September through June（or July based on postseason play）．This creates a format that is similar to those followed by the elite soccer playing nations around the world as the Development Academy and U．S．Soccer continue their goal of closing the performance gap with the top soccer nations．

## Meaningful Training

Academy teams spend a greater amount of time focused on training to improve as individuals and as a team． The teams and players receive direct feedback and evaluations from national team staff and have access to video analysis．A major value in the Academy utilizing a 10－month season format is the importance of additional training as teams practice four times per week in preparation for their 30－game national schedule．

## Competitive Environment

The Academy program features teams from the top youth clubs from around the country．Each Academy team plays approximately 30 regular－season games to ensure all games are meaningful．Games are also played according to FIFA＇s Laws of the Game and officiated by a pool of the nation＇s top young referees in order to prepare players for the next level of competition．U．S．Soccer National Team scouts regularly attend Academy games，so players are evaluated over the course of the season and in their natural positions，allowing for better player assessment．

## Early Success

As the program plays its season in 2018－19，it has already dramatically impacted the player development process in the United States．Since its inception，several hundred players from Academy clubs have been included in U．S．Youth National Teams．Many former Academy players have signed with professional clubs both domestically and abroad．Virtually all college programs use the Academy program as a scouting vehicle，and the program has received increased attention from professional scouts representing domestic and international clubs．Visit www．ussoccerda．com for more information on the Academy and its teams．

## Year Two of Girls＇Academy

In an effort to accelerate the development of world－class female players，U．S．Soccer launched the Girls＇ Development Academy Program in the fall of 2017．The Girls＇Academy program focuses on positively impacting the everyday club environments to assist in maximizing female youth player development across the country． Seventy－one clubs are participating in the program＇s second year across four age groups：U－14，U－15，U－16／17， and U－18／19．The implementation of the Girls＇Development Academy is part of U．S．Soccer＇s global leadership position in women＇s soccer and impacts thousands of players．The program also works alongside the NWSL and its efforts to support player development and the long－term growth of professional soccer．

## U.S. Soccer YNT Identification Center Program

YNT Identification Centers are one of the main tactics of Talent Identification. YNT ID Centers are no-cost identification opportunities for U.S. Soccer Talent Identification Managers to evaluate and monitor top talents. U.S. Soccer, in conjunction with local clubs, hosts approximately 100 sessions each year in 24 key markets throughout the country. These invite-only training sessions provide opportunities for scout development, education, and mentoring, and help strengthen connection and collaboration between U.S. Soccer, clubs, and their constituents in local markets. Talent Identification Managers assess the top players from different clubs and markets in different combinations, cross-referencing talent across the nation. Each YNT ID Center is conducted with a particular focus to ensure our staff sees the widest variety of talent in different contexts. Over 5,000 boys and girls aged 12-16 attended U.S. Soccer YNT Identification Centers in 2017-18.

## PURPOSE

- U.S. Soccer YNT Identification Centers are free, single-day player identification opportunities for local players with the most potential to train under the direction of U.S. Soccer Talent Identification Managers
- U.S. Soccer Talent Identification Managers run YNT ID Centers to identify and compare the top talent and potential nationwide for Youth National Team recognition

- Ages: 12 to 16 years old
- Each U.S. Soccer YNT ID Center will feature a specific gender and age group.

In 1994, the first World Championship was held for beach soccer in Rio de Janeiro, and the U.S. team had modest success with a second-place finish in 1995 and a third-place finish in 1997. FIFA recognized beach soccer beginning in 2005, and has staged four FIFA Beach Soccer World Cups. The first three tournaments were staged on the beaches of Rio in Brazil. In 2008, the tournament moved to Marseille, France, with the 2009 edition gracing the beaches of Dubai, United Arab Emirates. After 2009, the tournament became a biennial event, with the 2011 FIFA Beach Soccer World Cup taking place in Rome, Italy.

In 2005, qualifying for the Beach Soccer World Cup for the U.S. was a combined tournament with North and South America. Since then, Concacaf has hosted its own Beach Soccer Qualifying Tournament, with the U.S. winning both the 2006 and 2007 editions before dropping two of the team's three matches in 2008 and failing to qualify for the 2008 FIFA Beach Soccer World Cup.

The U.S. kicked off 2013 by winning the Concacaf Beach Soccer Championship in Nassau, Bahamas, with a $5-4$ overtime victory against El Salvador. The team qualified for the 2013 FIFA Beach Soccer World Cup by virtue of a 4-2 victory against Costa Rica in the semifinals.

At the 2013 FIFA Beach Soccer World Cup, the U.S. was drawn into Group A with Spain, host Tahiti and the United Arab Emirates. Despite a 6-4 victory against UAE in the final group game, the U.S. finished in third place and did not advance to the knockout rounds. The tournament started with a 5-4 loss to Spain, followed by a 5-3 loss in extra time to Tahiti that eliminated the team from the knockout rounds.

The U.S. team's attempt to qualify for the 2015 FIFA Beach Soccer World Cup began well, as the U.S. navigated through its group and past Jamaica in the Quarterfinal Round. The U.S. fell 4-3 to Mexico in a tight Semifinal affair and fell 5-2 to hosts El Salvador in the Third-Place match, failing to qualify for the final tournament in Portugal.

In 2017, the USA put on a valiant attempt to qualify for the 2017 FIFA Beach Soccer World Cup at the 2017 Concacaf Beach Soccer Championship. The U.S. rolled past its group stage opponents, winning all three matches, but fell to Panama 6-4 in a tough Quarterfinal. The USA then defeated Jamaica and tournament hosts Bahamas to take fifth place in the Concacaf tournament, thus failing to qualify for the Beach Soccer World Cup set to take place in Bahamas later in the year.

## Basic Laws of the Game

Beach Soccer is played on a field that is approximately 36 meters long and 27 meters wide. The game is played on sand that is a minimum of 40 centimeters deep and players must be barefoot. Five players, including a goalkeeper, are on the field at one time and play three, 12 minute periods.
There are up to seven substitutes on the bench, and like Futsal, there are unlimited substitutions. In instances where games cannot end in ties, the winner is decided by a three-minute overtime and then kicks from the penalty spot, which is an imaginary mark on an imaginary penalty area line nine meters from the goal.

## Other rules include:

- After a ball goes out of bounds, it can be thrown or kicked back in play.
- Goalkeepers can pick up the first back pass from a teammate per possession.
- Players taking a free kick can make a small mound of sand to place the ball on.



## Eddie SOTO

## U.S. Beach Soccer Team Head Coach <br> Born: June 14, 1972 <br> Hometown: Long Beach, Calif.

U.S. Soccer appointed Eddie Soto as head coach of the U.S. Beach Soccer Team in April of 2009.

Soto's extensive soccer background spans more than 25 years. Since 2014, Soto has served double duty as the head coach of both the U.S. Beach Soccer Team and the University of San Francisco men's soccer team. He started coaching as an assistant with the Long Beach City College women's soccer team before making the jump to assistant coach at Cal State Fullerton in 2001. In the following years, he spent time as an assistant coach at Long Beach State and UCLA. He also served as head coach for the LA Galaxy Development Academy U-18 team while simultaneously assisting the Galaxy's U-17 and U-16 Academy squads as well.
Soto's professional playing career began in 1996, when he was selected in the initial MLS Draft by the New York/New Jersey MetroStars before the San Jose Clash took him in the 1998 Supplemental Draft. He also played professionally and was an All-Star for the Orange County Zodiac of the A-League and the Los Angeles Cobras of the USISL before ending his career with the U.S. Beach Soccer Team.

He started his youth career with the North Huntington Beach youth club, while also spending time in the U.S. Youth National Team ranks. He then played one season at Chapman University before transferring to Cal State Fullerton, where he played from 1992 to 1994. He graduated from Cal State Fullerton in 1995 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in kinesiology. Soto carry's a US Soccer A license.

## U．S．FUTSAL TEAM

## FUTSAL HISTORY

Futsal is a sport that is derived from soccer and played with five－man teams on a basketball－style court，with no walls and a smaller，low－bouncing ball．It is unlike the sport of indoor soccer，which is played with six－man squads and walls on turf．Great soccer superstars such as Pele，Zico，and Ronaldo grew up playing futsal and credit the game with developing their skills．

The first FIFA Futsal World Cup was held in the Netherlands in 1989．In 1992 the U．S．Futsal Team set the mark for highest finish for a U．S．male National Team at a FIFA competition，with a second－place finish behind legendary indoor goalkeeper Victor Nogueira and stars from the Indoor leagues like Ted Eck，Jim Gabarra and Dale Ervine．The 1992 Team also included Jeff Agoos and Fernando Clavijo，who later appeared in World Cups for the full Men＇s National Team．

MISL and other U．S．indoor soccer leagues have been providing the Futsal Team with its player pool since the first games played in 1986．Former U．S．head coach Keith Tozer，an indoor coaching legend in his own right，was part of the inaugural team．

Futsal has experienced a massive growth in popularity and in 2008，the World Cup was expanded to 20 teams for the first time．Once seen as an amateur sport that players would use to hone their skills before transitioning to the outdoor game，many of the participating nations in the World Cup now sport their own professional futsal leagues and play dozens of full internationals a year．

## FUTSAL RESET

After suffering heartbreak in Costa Rica and failing to qualify for the FIFA Futsal World Cup for the second straight cycle，U．S．Futsal National Team head coach Keith Tozer stepped down from the program．

The team has not played any games since 2016．However，U．S．Soccer has committed to applying new and different resources to the sport．In 2014，futsal was implemented into Development Academy programming．

## ABOUT PARA 7-A-SIDE SOCCER

The U.S. Para 7-a-side Soccer Team is an elite program that selects players from across the United States in preparation for international standard competition. The National Team, in addition to challenge matches and invitational tournaments, competes in World Championships, Copa America, the Parapan American Games, and more.

To be eligible for Para 7-a-side soccer, athletes must be ambulatory and have a diagnosis of non-progressive brain damage that is associated with motor control dysfunction such as Cerebral Palsy, traumatic brain injury or stroke. More information about eligibility and the classification of athletes is available at ifcpf.com.

## Laws of the Game

Para 7-a-side soccer is a seven vs. seven game using the International Federation of Associated Football (FIFA) rules which have been slightly modified to accommodate the impairments of the players. The smaller field is 70 meters long and 50 meters wide with smaller goals which are five meters wide by two meters tall.

## Some of the exceptions to FIFA rules include:

- No offside rule
- Under-arm throw-ins are permitted
- Defenders are required to be seven meters from the ball on restarts
- The game is 60 minutes long with two 30 -minute halves


# Stuart SHARP 

## U．S．Paralympic National Soccer Team Head Coach Born：July 2， 1978 Hometown：Old Kilpatrick，Scotland



Stuart Sharp has been at the helm of the U．S．Paralympic National Soccer Team since 2014．In his tenure with the U．S．PNT，Sharp has guided the team to a $25-30-4$ record and a No． 4 world ranking－its highest of all－time－heading into the 2019 campaign．

The team has achieved impressive finishes in major tournaments，mostly recently earning third place at the 2018 IFCPF Copa America and fifth at the 2017 IFCPF CP Football World Championships，marking the program＇s best finish at a world championship in the modern era of the sport．As a result，the group was recognized for its efforts by receiving the 2017 United Soccer Coaches Honorary All－America Award．

The squad also earned a seventh－place finish at the 2016 Paralympic Games，for which it qualified by a strong result at the 2015 IFCPF Football World Championships．

Sharp previously held the position of National Development Manager（Disability）for the Scottish Football Association in addition to being head coach of the Scottish National CP Team from 2005－11．Under his stewardship，the team climbed from 32 nd in the world to hold a steady sixth－place ranking and earn a qualifying position for the 2008 and 2012 Paralympic Games．His work with the Scottish National CP Team saw him named Scottish Disability Sport National Coach of the Year in 2007，and the team was named the Scottish Sports Awards Team of the Year in 2008.

During his time with the Scottish FA，Sharp developed a player pathway for those with disabilities that included National Teams，regional squads，regional school leagues，a coaching education course and multiple clubs that serviced six different disability categories．He was also a key member of the successful Bid Team and Local Organizing Committee for the 2010 CPISRA European Championships．

In addition to his coaching credentials，Sharp serves as the Head of Technical Development and Chaired the World Coaches Technical Committee for the International Federation of Cerebral Palsy Football（formerly the Cerebral Palsy International Sport and Recreation Association），the world＇s soccer governing body for Para 7－a－side athletes．He has worked with IFCPF／CPISRA since 2007.

## FIFA WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Federation Internationale de Football Association (FIFA) currently conducts eight major outdoor soccer world championships played at the international level. Those tournaments are the FIFA World Cup, the FIFA Women's World Cup, the Men's Olympic Football Tournament, the Women's Olympic Football Tournament, the FIFA Under-20 World Cup, the FIFA Under-17 World Cup, the FIFA Under-20 Women's World Cup and the FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup. Additionally, FIFA also conducts the Futsal World Cup every four years, and the Beach Soccer World Cup annually. A quick synopsis of these tournaments is listed below. More detail can be found on USA performances at each of these tournaments throughout the U.S. Men's National Team Media Guide and the U.S. Women's National Team Media Guide.

## FIFA WORLD CUP

The FIFA World Cup has been played 21 times since the first competition in 1930 in Uruguay. The tournament has grown in stature over the years and has become not only the biggest sporting event in the world, but also simply the biggest event in the world every four years. Outside of the USA's third-place finish in the inaugural tournament, the team's quarterfinal run in 2002 is the team's best ever World Cup finish.

## FIFA WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

The FIFA Women's World Cup has been contested on seven occasions with the USA earning three championships (China '91, USA '99, Canada '15), Germany two (USA '03 and China ‘07) and Norway (Sweden '95) and Japan (Germany '11) one each. The Women's World Cup returned to North America in 2015, with Canada hosting an expanded 24 -team field after the previous four editions featured 16 nations. After falling to Japan on penalty kicks in the 2011 final, the U.S. navigated its way back to a rematch with the defending World Cup champions, earning a 5-2 victory on July 5 in Vancouver to become the first nation to capture three Women's World Cup championships. ## OLYMPIC FOOTBALL TOURNAMENTS

After competing as an exhibition sport at the 1900 and 1904 Olympic Games, soccer became the first team sport included in the Olympics with the first official tournament dating back to the 1908 London Games when the United Kingdom defeated Denmark to claim the gold medal. Since that time soccer has been part of every Olympic Games except the 1932 event in the United States.

On the women's side, the sport wasn't introduced to the Olympics until the 1996 competition in the United States. The U.S. claimed the inaugural gold medal in women's Olympic football by defeating China 2-1 on Aug. 1, 1996, in front of a capacity crowd of 76,481 fans in Athens, Georgia.

The growth of professional football after World War II meant that some of the best players were not eligible to compete in the Olympics. Nevertheless, the Olympic Tournament retained its vitality as the forum for the amateur game. In 1952, Hungary's great generation with players such as Grosics, Czibor, Puskas and Kocsis won the tournament in Helsinki. After that, and until Los Angeles in 1984, all the Olympic titles went to Eastern Europe, a span of eight straight tournaments.

When the Olympics moved into their modern era, FIFA was obliged to reconsider its position for the Barcelona 1992 tournament, where for the first time, the tournament was restricted to Under-23 national teams. In 1996, FIFA altered the U-23 designation slightly, allowing teams to add three overage players into the mix.

Through the 1928 Olympics in Holland, Olympic caps were counted as full international appearances, but that designation changed with the advent of the World Cup in 1930. Although the Olympic Games football tournament actually falls under the realm of the International Olympic Committee, FIFA presides over the event on behalf of the IOC.

## FIFA UNDER-20 WORLD CUP

Contested every two years, the FIFA Under-20 World Cup is restricted to players under 20 years of age. The tournament was renamed from the FIFA World Youth Championship in 2006. The U.S. has qualified for the tournament on 16 occasions, finishing fourth in 1989 (Saudi Arabia). At the most recent tournament in 2017 in Korea Republic, the U.S. won its group with draws against Ecuador and Saudi Arabia coupled with a 1-0 win against Ghana; however, after dancing past New Zealand 6-0 in the Round of 16, the USA fell to a tournament finalist for the second time in a row in the quarterfinal, dropping a 2-1 decision to Venezuela. In 2015, the U.S. finished second in its group before running to the quarterfinals where it lost to eventual champion Serbia on penalty kicks. That performance came 12 years after forward Eddie Johnson became the first U.S. player to win a Golden Boot at a FIFA World Championship in 2003. After finishing second in the 1999 and 2001 group phase, the U.S. went one better, winning its group three consecutive tournaments from 2003-07.

## FIFA UNDER-20 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

Renamed the FIFA Under-20 Women's World Cup, the tournament was staged as a U-20 event for the first time in 2006 after two initial tournaments were played as a U-19 tournament. The inaugural FIFA U-19 Women's World Championship was held in Canada with 12 teams. The inaugural tournament was an incredible success, with the USA capturing the first championship via a Lindsay Tarpley golden goal in a 1-0 victory in front of 47,784 fans in Edmonton. The U.S. was unable to defend their crown in 2004, losing to Germany in the semifinals in Thailand, and in 2006 finished out of the top three for the first time in their history. In 2008, however, Golden Ball winner Sydney Leroux and Silver Ball winner Alex Morgan returned the U.S. to the top of the pile. After faltering in 2010, a 1-0 victory against Germany in the final led the USA back to first place in 2012 with defender and captain Julie Johnston earning the Bronze Bal. The U.S. won the 2015 Concacaf U-20 Women's World Cup Qualifying tournament and went on to finish fourth at the 2016 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in Papua New Guinea.

## FIFA UNDER-17 WORLD CUP

The FIFA U-17 World Cup is contested every two years for players under 17 years of age. The U.S. was the only team in the world to qualify for every U-17 World Championship, from the tournament's inception in 1985 until 2013. The first three tournaments were actually played as U-16 World Championships, but FIFA changed the event to its present U-17 status in 1989. The Concacaf region hosted the tournament for a first time in 2001, when Trinidad \& Tobago served as the first-ever Caribbean host for a FIFA World Championship. Mexico became the first Concacaf team to win an outdoor men's world championship in 2005 with an impressive triumph in Peru before winning the tournament a second time in 2013 as the host country. The U.S. returned to the U-17 World Cup in 2015 but could not escape the group phase. 2017 saw another leap forward as the U.S. went on a freewheeling run to the quarterfinal (the first time both the U.S. U-17 and U-20 MNTs reached a World Cup quarterfinal in the same year) before bowing out to eventual champs England. The U.S. achieved its best result in 1999, finishing fourth.

## FIFA FUTSAL WORLD CUP

The FIFA Futsal World Cup has been contested seven times with Brazil winning the first three tournaments, and Spain winning two championships in 2000 and 2004 before Brazil returned to glory as hosts in 2008 and defeated Spain for a fifth title in 2012. The Futsal World Cup is the only indoor tournament hosted by FIFA. The 1992 second-place finish was the best-ever showing in a FIFA event by a U.S. men's team, and came on the heels of a third-place finish in 1989.

## FIFA BEACH SOCCER WORLD CUP

Beach soccer became a part of the FIFA family in 2005 when the first FIFA Beach Soccer World Cup was staged on Copacabana Beach in Rio de Janeiro. To everyone's surprise, France defeated Portugal in the final, while Brazil fell in the semis; however, Brazil rebounded to win four straight tournaments from 2006-09. 2011 marked the first time the competition was played biennially and ushered in a new era of dominance as Russia upended Brazil in the final before defeating Spain in 2013 to claim a second straight championship. In 2015, hosts Portugal knocked off Russia in the semifinals before defeating Tahiti to claim its first Beach Soccer World Cup. The USA failed to qualify for the 2017 FIFA Beach Soccer World Cup in the Bahamas due to a fifth-place finish at the Concacaf Championship. The U.S. fell to eventual first-place finishers Panama in the quarterfinals.

The Confederations Cup was contested under FIFA's auspices for the first time in 1997 and replaced the Intercontinental Championship, which was staged in 1992 and 1995 with all three tournaments held in Saudi Arabia. In 1999, the Confederations Cup was held in Mexico and it returned to Asia in 2001, where it was staged as a precursor to the 2002 FIFA World Cup in Korea and Japan. In 2005, the competition became quadrennial, staged one year before the World Cup in the tournament's host country. Brazil has won the last three editions of the tournament from 2005-13, defeating the U.S. in the final of the 2009 edition after the USA had built a 2-0 half-time lead.

# FIFA CONFEDERATIONS CUP 2009 FIFA Confederations Cup (South Africa) 


#### Abstract

Winning the 2007 Concacaf Gold Cup earned the U.S. a spot in the 2009 FIFA Confederations Cup in South Africa - the second consecutive tournament held one year before the FIFA World Cup in the host country. The U.S. started shaky and were dismissed by the two defending FIFA World Cup champions, Italy and Brazil, by a combined 6-1 score in the first two matches of the 2009 event. Needing to score at least three goals and on the verge of elimination in their third game against Egypt, the U.S. overcame incredible odds and advanced to the semifinals on goals by Charlie Davies, Michael Bradley and Clint Dempsey. Once through to the semifinals, the U.S. stunned the world by defeating Spain and ending the European Champions' 35-game unbeaten streak. Tim Howard made eight saves as Jozy Altidore and Dempsey scored, sending the U.S. men to their first-ever final in a FIFA Tournament. In the final the U.S. would again face Brazil, and Dempsey scored in his third straight game with Landon Donovan adding another as the U.S. was up 2-0 on Brazil in the 27th minute. The U.S. would hold on until halftime, but just a minute into the second half Brazil scored and continued attacking in waves, eventually coming from behind for a 3-2 victory. Still, the second-place finish was the best performance ever for the team in a FIFA competition. Dempsey was honored by winning the Bronze Ball, while Howard won the Golden Glove - the first such awards for the U.S. at a FIFA tournament.


## 2003 FIFA Confederations Cup (France)

In 2003, the U.S. returned to the Confederations Cup, which was held in Europe for the first time. Drawn with Cameroon, Turkey and Brazil, the U.S. opened play against the Turks, but fell to a 2-1 defeat. Though DaMarcus Beasley opened the scoring, a resilient Turkey side fought back and eventually grabbed the winner in the 73rd minute. In the next match, the U.S. again met Brazil in the group stage, a rematch from the 1999 tournament, and the result was a similar 1-0 victory for the Seleção. This time, the Brazilians were powered by an Adriano goal in the 22 nd minute. With two defeats from the opening two games, the final match was rendered meaningless, but the U.S. put forth a spirited effort to tie eventual runners-up Cameroon 0-0. The tournament was in the end overshadowed by the untimely death of Cameroonian midfielder Marc-Vivien Foé, who suffered a heart attack during the Africans' semifinal match against Colombia. Though France went on to win the championship courtesy of a Thierry Henry Golden Goal, the defining image from the 2003 tournament is undoubtedly Marcel Desailly and Rigobert Song, captains of France and Cameroon respectively, holding the winning trophy together in honor of Foé, who died at the age of only 28.

## 1999 FIFA Confederations Cup (Mexico)

For the first time in seven years, the U.S. competed in the Confederations Cup, which was held in the country of local rival Mexico. Because Mexico, as host, was automatically entered into the draw, the U.S. was put into the competition by virtue of their runner-up finish in the 1998 Gold Cup. The first major competition for then head coach Bruce Arena, the U.S. acquitted itself well and matched its third-place finish from 1992. After an opening defeat of New Zealand, the U.S. was beaten 1-0 by Brazil behind a goal from Ronaldinho. Needing a result in their final Group B game, the Americans came through, and defeated Germany 2-0 for the second time in six months, thanks to goals from Ben Olsen and Joe-Max Moore. Through to the semifinal, the U.S. ran into Mexico and a hostile Azteca Stadium crowd of over 80,000. Though they put up a memorable fight, Bruce Arena's side eventually succumbed to a Cuauhtémoc Blanco golden goal in the 97 th minute. Despite the heartbreak of defeat, the U.S. rebounded to down Saudi Arabia 2-0, avenging its loss to the Saudis in 1992 and matching its finish of third-place from that tournament.

## 1992 King Fahd Cup (Saudi Arabia)

The U.S. team traveled to Saudi Arabia for the first time in its history in 1992 to take part in the King Fahd Cup, as it was then known. As 1991 Concacaf Gold Cup Winners, the U.S. earned a birth into the four team tournament, which also included the Ivory Coast, who won the 1992 African Nations Cup, Argentina, winners of the 1991 Copa América, and host nation Saudi Arabia, who were champions of Asia in 1988. In the first game, the U.S. took on Saudi Arabia in the first ever match between the two countries. In front of a crowd of 70,000 in Riyadh, the Americans were beaten 3-0, courtesy of three second half goals from The Sons of the Desert. The third-place match saw the U.S. beat the Ivory Coast 5-2, in what is still the only meeting of the two countries. For the U.S., Marcelo Balboa opened the scoring, before future U.S. cap record holder Cobi Jones scored his first international goal. The teams went back and forth before Eric Wynalda eventually grabbed what would prove to be the winning goal in the 56th minute.

## COPA AMERICA

The Copa America is the oldest international tournament in South America，dating back to 1916．Since 1993， teams from Concacaf and Asia have taken part in this biennial event as invitees of CONEMBOL．The U．S．made its debut in the tournament in Ecuador in 1993，but was eliminated in the first round．In 1995，the U．S． returned to Copa America，and advanced to the semifinals in Uruguay，eventually finishing in fourth place．
After a 12－year absence from the event，the U．S．accepted an invitation to compete in the Venezuela edition of the tournament in 2007，though they were eliminated in the first round．In 2016，the tournament celebrated its 100th anniversary by holding the Copa America Centenario in the USA，combining the 10 nations from CONMEBOL with six qualifiers from Concacaf．Held from June 3－26 in 10 cities across the United States，the tournament drew a record $1,483,855$ spectators（ 46,370 average）and saw the host USA finish fourth，while defending champions Chile defeated Argentina on penalty kicks in the final to win their second－consecutive tournament．

## 2016 Copa America Centenario（USA）

Celebrating the 100th anniversary of the historic Copa America，the USA hosted a special edition of the tournament， combining the 10 nations from CONMEBOL with six qualifiers from Concacaf for an overall 16 －team competition． Kicking off the tournament in front of a sold－out crowd of 67，439 at Levi＇s Stadium in Santa Clara，Calif．，the USA surrendered first－half goals to Cristian Zapata and James Rodriguez，as it fell 2－0 to Colombia．
Knowing a second loss would see them exit the tournament earlier than anticipated，the USA responded well four days later against Costa Rica in Chicago．A ninth－minute penalty kick from Clint Dempsey set the tone，before Jermaine Jones＇37th minute strike and Bobby Wood＇s 42nd minute finish put the U．S．up 3－0 at halftime． Coasting through the second half，the USA added a fourth from Graham Zusi in the 87th minute，earning an emphatic 4－0 victory against Los Ticos．
The USA arrived in Philadelphia for its final match against Paraguay knowing that a win would see the side advance out of the group stage of the tournament for the first time since 1995．The USA survived an early scare when defender John Brooks singlehandedly broke up a 3－on－1 counter attack，before Clint Dempsey found the back of the net again in the 27th minute．The USA then held on after defender DeAndre Yedlin was sent off for a second yellow card in the 50th minute，earning a hard－fought 1－0 victory against Paraguay．Combined with Costa Rica＇s 3－2 upset of Colombia，the USA not only advanced，but finished atop Group A．
That placement set up a quarterfinal date with Ecuador in Seattle．Once again，Dempsey opened the scoring for the USA in the 22 nd minute，before an early second－half altercation saw MNT midfielder Jermaine Jones sent off as both teams were reduced to 10 men．Gyasi Zardes added a second goal in the 65th minute and despite Ecuador＇s Michael Arroyo pulling one back nine minutes later，the U．S．would outlast La Tricolor 2－1，advancing to the semifinals．
With the win，the USA had the honor of facing No． 1 ranked Argentina in Houston and finally met its match． Ezequiel Lavezzi put La Albiceleste on top just three minutes in，before Lionel Messi added a highlight reel free kick in the 32nd minute．Gonzalo Higuain tacked on two goals in the second half，giving Argentina a 4－0 win and sending the U．S．to the third－place match where it fell 1－0 to Colombia，but still equaled its best finish in the tournament，when it finished fourth at the 1995 edition．

## 2007 Copa America（Venezuela）

For the first time in over a decade，the U．S．team traveled to South America to compete in the world＇s oldest soccer tournament．The United States was drawn in a group including Argentina，Paraguay and Colombia， and headed to what would be their home base in Maracaibo just hours after completing their victory against Mexico in the Gold Cup．
The first game was played against regional and world powerhouse Argentina at the Estadio José Pachencho Romero．Though the U．S．jumped out to an early lead courtesy of an Eddie Johnson penalty kick，the Albiceleste fought back to equalize before the halftime break．In the second period，the quality of the two－ time world champions was apparent，and they eventually broke the resistance of the U．S．defense to score three goals in the final half hour，winning the game 4－1．
Having lost the opening match of the tournament，the U．S．entered its second game with Paraguay needing a positive result．Played at the Estadio Agustín Tovar in Barinas，the match was an even affair，with Paraguay jumping out to an early lead．The U．S．equalized through Ricardo Clark in the 35th minute after the midfielder slotted home a Taylor Twellman pass．After halftime，though，Paraguay regained their one－goal advantage in the 56th minute and the teams exchanged blows for the rest of the game，with the U．S．coming close to equalizing on more than a few occasions．In the end，however，Paraguay scored a goal against the run of play in injury time to close out the game with a 3－1 victory．
The third match of the group stage was played with the knowledge that neither the U．S．nor Colombia would advance to the next round．Nonetheless，the crowd at the Estadio Metropolitano de Fútbol de Lara were treated to a competitive affair which Colombia won 1－0．In the end，the young U．S．squad，though eliminated in the first round，gained worthwhile experience in one of the world＇s premier tournaments and showed again their ability to compete on one of soccer＇s largest stages．

## 1995 Copa America (Uruguay)

In their second consecutive trip to the Copa America, the U.S. proved their worth against the South Americans, posting an impressive fourth-place finish. The Americans began the '95 Copa America with forward Eric Wynalda scoring twice in a 2-1 victory over Chile. After dropping a 1-0 decision to Bolivia, the USA earned a spot in the quarterfinals after shutting out defending champion Argentina 3-0 in the final match of group play. The victory vaulted the U.S. past the stunned Argentinians in goal differential and came in Paysandu, a city on the border of Uruguay and Argentina. The U.S. goals were scored by Wynalda, forward Frank Klopas and defender Alexi Lalas. In the quarterfinals, the U.S. faced a familiar foe from the Concacaf Region: Mexico, whom the U.S. downed in penalty kicks 4-1 after a goalless draw. The USA's run ended in the semifinals as the squad lost a heartbreaking 1-0 match to Brazil. U.S. midfielder John Harkes was named Co-MVP of the '95 Copa America (along with Uruguay Captain Enzo Francescoli), while U.S. goalkeeper Kasey Keller and Wynalda were both named to the All-Tournament Team.

## 1993 Copa America (Ecuador)

After competing in a four-nation international competition three days prior to the event, the U.S. made its debut at the 1993 Copa America in Ecuador but dropped two out of three first round matches and were eliminated from tournament play. The Americans opened the '93 Copa America with back-to-back shutout losses to Uruguay (1-0) and host Ecuador (2-0), but the team's 3-3 draw against Venezuela in their final game was arguably their most disappointing result. Needing to win with a strong goal-differential to still have a chance to advance to the quarterfinals as a third-place team, the U.S. built a 3-0 lead before watching the lowly Venezuelans score three unanswered goals in the final 25 minutes and earn a 3-3 draw.

## CONCACAF GOLD CUP HISTORY

Although it only dates back to 1991, as the regional championship for the Confederations of North, Central America and Caribbean Association Football, the Concacaf Gold Cup has quickly established itself as a topflight international tournament. Originally staged as a biennial event held in July of odd-numbered years, the tournament was staged from 1996 to 2002 in even-numbered years in the winter. In 2003, the tournament returned to a summer schedule in odd-numbered years. With six tournament titles, the U.S. MNT sits second for the most in Concacaf, including its 2017 triumph.

Below are recaps of each of the USA's previous 14 Gold Cup appearances:

Held in a record-tying 14 venues across the United States, the 2017 Concacaf Gold Cup was another big success, both in the stadiums and on the field as the U.S. MNT earned its sixth confederation title.


Utilizing a roster that was a majority domestic-based, as well as a number of untested players, the U.S. received a 50th minute goal from Dom Dwyer en route to a hard-fought 1-1 draw against Panama in Nashville. Bruce Arena's side moved to Tampa where it utilized a goal from Omar Gonzalez and Jordan Morris' first international brace to see off a feisty Martinique side 3-2, collecting its first win of the tournament. Heading into the final Group Stage match, the U.S. needed a three-goal victory against Nicaragua in Cleveland in order to guarantee a top of the table finish. The MNT took a 1-0 lead into halftime thanks to Joe Corona's 36th minute strike and got its second via Kelyn Rowe who hit home his first international goal in the 56th minute. As time crept away, the U.S. looked destined for a second-place finish based on goal difference, only to be rescued in the 88th minute when Graham Zusi's free kick picked out center back Matt Miazga, who headed home the necessary third goal to finish atop the group.

As the competition moved to the Quarterfinals, the U.S. took advantage of tournament regulations by calling up six new players, including long-time veterans Jozy Altidore, Michael Bradley, Clint Dempsey and Tim Howard - for
the remainder of the tournament. Matched with EI Salvador in Philadelphia, the USA went ahead when Gonzalez bagged his second of the tournament in the 41st minute, only to be followed by Eric Lichaj's first international goal in first-half stoppage time to propel the MNT to a 2-0 victory. The two goals marked just the third time in the MNT's modern era (1990-present) in which a pair of defenders scored in the same match and set up the USA's Semifinal date with Costa Rica.

The Semifinal showdown in Arlington, Texas saw the USA dominate possession throughout, but it the game went scoreless until the 72 nd minute when Clint Dempsey provided Jozy Altidore with the go-ahead marker. The U.S. iced the game 10 minutes later when Dempsey hit home a historic free kick which tied him with Landon Donovan as the MNT's all-time leading goal scorer at 57.

Matched up with Jamaica in the Final at Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara, Calif., the USA played a tight first half with the Reggae Boyz until Jozy Altidore's 45th minute free kick took the hosts into the locker room up 1-0. Jamaica was undeterred and hit back when Je-Vaughn Watson got on the end of a corner kick in the 50th minute. Locked 1-1, a number of U.S. chances - including a Dempsey hit off the post -- went begging until Morris hopped on a loose ball in the box and buried a dramatic 88 th minute winner to hand the U.S. a 2-1 victory.

With the triumph, Bruce Arena became the first head coach to win three different Gold Cup titles, having previously guided the USA to championships in 2002 and 2005. With three goals, Morris finished as the competition's joint-leading goal scorer and joined five teammates - Jozy Altidore, Michael Bradley, Omar Gonzalez, Darlington Nagbe and Graham Zusi - on the tournament's Best XI.

Held in a record 14 venues across the United States and Canada, the 2015 Concacaf Gold Cup made another large footprint during the month of July. The U.S. team, however, faltered in their bid to repeat as Gold Cup champions, falling 2-1 to Jamaica at the tournament's semifinal in Atlanta.

The U.S. began the tournament well enough, defeating Honduras 2-1 in Frisco, Texas before a 1-0 win against Haiti in Foxborough, Mass. Through to the knockout stage, the U.S. played to a 1-1 draw with Panama, ensuring the MNT topped its Gold Cup group for the 12 th time in 13 tournaments. In the quarterfinals, a Clint Dempsey hat trick saw the U.S. easily dispatch Cuba 6-0 in Baltimore, setting up the semifinal showdown with Jamaica in Atlanta. Two first half goals from the Reggae Boyz put the U.S. down 2-0 at the break, but Michael Bradley pulled things back quickly in the second half. Despite the goal and constant pressure, Jamaica held on to defeat the U.S. 2-1. The defeat set up a Third Place Match with Panama, where the U.S. used another goal from Clint Dempsey to earn another 1-1 draw before falling 3-2 on penalty kicks.

Despite the disappointing end to the tournament U.S. players received individual accolades, with Dempsey's seven goals earning him the tournament's Golden Boot award, while goalkeeper Brad Guzan won the Golden Glove.

The 2013 Concacaf Gold Cup shaped up to be another spectacular event, with 13 venues across the United States chosen to host matches in the confederation championship. The U.S. aimed to reach its fifth consecutive Gold Cup Final, while Mexico sought to defend their title. Teams like Costa Rica, Honduras, Jamaica and Panama prepared to demonstrate the shrinking gap between Concacaf nations.

Keen to win another championship, the U.S. started strong with a 6-1 win against Belize. Consecutive wins against Cuba (4-1) and Costa Rica (1-0) saw the Americans claim the top spot in the group. After an emphatic 5-1 win against El Salvador in the quarterfinals and dispatching a quality Honduras side 3-1 in the semifinals, the stage was set for a meeting between the USA and high flying Panama, which topped its group with a tournament opening win against Mexico before defeating EI Tri a second time in the other semifinal match.

Facing a confident and athletic Panama team that was buoyed by its unbeaten run to the final and included two of the tournament's leading goal scorers in Gabriel Torres - his five goals tied the USA's Landon Donovan and Chris Wondolowski for most in the tournament - and Blas Perez (three goals), the U.S. found itself in a stalemate

through the first hour of the match. However, the Americans would not be denied as winger Brek Shea pounced in the 69th minute to score the only goal of the game and hand the U.S. its fifth Gold Cup title and first since 2007, when the U.S. also beat Panama in the final.

## 2011 GOLD CUP

The 2011 Concacaf Gold Cup shaped up to be another spectacular event, with 13 venues across the United States tagged to host matches in the confederation championship. The U.S. aimed to reach its fourth consecutive Gold Cup Final, while Mexico sought to defend their title and teams like Costa Rica, Honduras, Jamaica and Panama prepared to demonstrate the shrinking gap between Concacaf nations.

Keen on winning another championship and earning a spot in the 2013 FIFA Confederations Cup, the U.S. started strong with a 2-0 win against Canada. They took a surprise setback with a loss to Panama - the first ever in the group stage - but rebounded to claim the top spot in the group. After an emphatic win against Jamaica in the quarterfinals and taking revenge on Panama in the semifinals, the stage was set for another marquee meeting between the USA and Mexico.

Facing a stacked Mexican team that included one of club football's most prolific scorers in Manchester United striker Javier "Chicharito" Hernandez, the U.S. bounded out to a 2-0 lead with goals from Michael Bradley and Landon Donovan. Undaunted, the Mexicans recovered to score four unanswered goals in one of the most exciting and well-played finals in Gold Cup history.

## 2009 GOLD CUP

Venues: Arlington, Texas; Carson, Calif.; Chicago, III.; Columbus, Ohio, East Rutherford, N.J.; Foxborough, Mass.; Glendale, Ariz.; Houston, Texas; Miami, Fla.; Oakland, Calif.; Seattle, Wash.; Washington, D.C.

Held in a record 12 venues across the U.S., the 2009 Concacaf Gold Cup made a national footprint during the 2009 "Summer of Soccer" in the U.S. The U.S. team, however, faced the disappointment of not winning a thirdconsecutive title, but did have the satisfaction of returning to a third-straight final with a largely unproven roster.

The Concacaf Gold Cup kicked off just six days after the U.S. played the 2009 FIFA Confederations Cup Final, and Bob Bradley selected an inexperienced squad that saw seven players earn their first cap during the event. The U.S. continued its unbeaten record in group play, and in the knockout stage got past Panama and Honduras.

By the time the U.S. met Mexico in the final, a record 10 different players had scored the U.S. teams' 12 goals in the tournament. In the second-straight Gold Cup title game against Mexico, the U.S. returned only Brian Ching to the starting lineup from the 2007 squad. The teams were evenly matched for a half, but eventually Mexico prevailed by opening the flood gates with five second-half goals for a $5-0$ win.

# 2007 GOLD CUP <br> Venues: Carson, Calif.; East Rutherford, N.J.; Foxborough, Mass.; Houston, Texas; Los Angeles, Calif.; Miami, Fla. 



The 2007 edition of the Gold Cup was played with the added incentive of admission to the 2009 FIFA Confederations Cup for the winner. The United States successfully defended its title, its fourth all-time and third in the last four tournaments.

Though the U.S. coasted through the group stage, taking maximum points while not allowing a goal and in the process extending its unbeaten record in the opening round, they ran into some tough opposition in the knockout stage. After defeating Panama 2-1 in the quarterfinals, the U.S. came up against a stingy Canadian side in the semifinals, and ended up holding on for a 2-1 victory to set up a U.S.-Mexico marquee match up in the final.

Played at Soldier Field for the first time, the championship game pitted the two Concacaf powers against one another in what would prove to be a gritty affair. In front of 60,000 people, the U.S. came from behind for the first time in the 2007 tournament to eventually defeat Mexico 2-1 for its second consecutive Gold Cup title.

2005 GOLD CUP

The 2005 Gold Cup was played in a record-high seven different venues in the United States, and was noteworthy as the United States became the first team in the tournament's history to advance to five overall finals. The USA would go on to win their third title, and second in three tournaments since 2002.

The USA's victory would not come easy, though, as the team needed a penalty kick shootout to down Panama in the tournament's scoreless championship game at Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, N.J. To get to the final, the U.S. needed two goals in the game's final moments to overcome a 1-0 deficit to Honduras and win 2-1.

In the 2005 tournament, the U.S. extended their amazing undefeated history in first round play at the Gold Cup with two more wins and a draw. The USA has never lost one of their 19 opening round matches in eight all-time Gold Cups.

## 2003 GOLD CUP <br> Venues: Foxborough, Mass.; Miami, Fla.; USA; Mexico City, Mexico

The 2003 Gold Cup was the first in 10 years to be played in two countries, with games in both Mexico and the United States. Mexico twice defeated Brazil, who along with Colombia was an invited guest to the tournament, by one goal in Azteca Stadium, including a golden-goal victory in the final. The U.S. finished in the top three for the sixth time in seven tournaments with a thrilling 3-2 come from behind victory over Costa Rica in the Orange Bowl.

The U.S. continued its win streak in group play of the Gold Cup, making easy work of El Salvador and Martinique by identical 2-0 margins. Brian McBride continued his Midas-touch scoring in the tournament with three of the first four U.S. goals. The victories extended the USA's standing as the only Concacaf team to win every one of its first round games since the inception of the tournament in 1991. The U.S. has won 16 consecutive first round games and has outscored their opponents 33-8. The winning streak includes 10 shutouts, nine one-goal victories and four come-from-behind wins.

## THE GOLD CUP

## 2002 GOLD CUP <br> Venues: Miami, Fla., Pasadena, Calif., USA

The 2002 Gold Cup once again featured two invited teams (Ecuador and Korea Republic) along with 10 Concacaf teams. In spectacular fashion, the U.S. won their first title since 1991 by posting a 4-0-1 record with four shutouts on their way to their 2002 Gold Cup crown.

The United States opened the tournament with consecutive wins in the first round against the Korea Republic (2-1) and Cuba (1-0). After easily blanking El Salvador 4-0 in the quarterfinals, the semifinals saw the U.S. defeat the defending champion Canada 4-2 on penalty kicks after both teams battled to a scoreless draw.


The 2002 final had the USA topping Concacaf rival Costa Rica 2-0 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. Forward Brian McBride was named the tournament MVP after leading the Americans with four tallies.

## 2000 GOLD CUP <br> Venues: Miami, Fla., Oakland and Los Angeles, Calif., USA

The first Gold Cup of the new millennium featured nine teams from the Concacaf and three invited squads (Colombia, Peru and Korea Republic). The 2000 edition also had several surprises, with a new champion being crowned (Canada) and both Mexico and the United States not reaching the semifinal round, a first for the two regional rivals.

The Americans cruised through the first round by capturing the Group B title with back-to-back shutouts against Haiti (3-0) and Peru (1-0). Cobi Jones led the offense for the USA by notching a goal in the win over Haiti and the game-winner against Peru. In the quarterfinals, though, the U.S. faltered. After battling Colombia to a 2-2 draw through regulation and two overtime periods, the U.S. were defeated in penalty kicks 2-1 and were eliminated from the competition.

Colombia would go on to meet Canada in the 2000 finals. The Canadians had surprisingly advanced out of their first round group by winning a coin-flip tiebreaker against Korea Republic after the two teams had finished dead-even on results and goals. After eliminating three-time defending champion Mexico 2-1 in overtime in the quarterfinals and then topping Trinidad \& Tobago 1-0 in the semifinals, Canada would pull off yet another shocker, being crowned 2000 Gold Cup champions after blanking Colombia 2-0 in the finals.

## 1998 GOLD CUP <br> Venues: Miami, Fla., Oakland and Los Angeles, Calif., USA

The 1998 Gold Cup was the most successful yet for Concacaf, despite bad weather, postponed games and an historic USA-Brazil clash which was played with less than 24 hours notice for both teams.

Preki Radosavljevic was the story for the U.S. on the offensive end, scoring a brilliant late goal against Costa Rica to send the U.S. through to the semifinals. That goal would have been enough to lift Radosavjlevic into U.S. prominence, but he did it one better in the USA's next match, an historic 1-0 triumph against Brazil courtesy of a 22-yard bomb from Preki in the 65th minute.

Of course, Preki's goal was only half the story, as goalkeeper Kasey Keller replaced Brad Friedel in the nets (who started the USA's first two matches) and stymied Romario and Brazil with a 10 -save performance, widely considered to be the best in U.S. Soccer history. On the strength of that game alone, and a 1-0 loss to Mexico in the finals not withstanding, Keller was voted the MVP of the tournament for just two games' work.

In the final, Mexican World Cup hero Luis Hernandez scored in the closing minutes of the first half to give the Tricolores a 1-0 victory against the U.S. National Team and the 1998 Gold Cup crown in front of a sold-out crowd of 91,255 fans at the Los Angeles Coliseum. The crowd was the fourth largest to watch the U.S. National Team domestically, and could have included an additional 6,941 paid spectators who watched the game on a giant television screen inside the Los Angeles Sports Arena, adjacent to the Coliseum.

# 1996 GOLD CUP Venues: Anaheim, San Diego and Los Angeles, Calif., USA 

With Brazil competing in the tournament for the first time via a special invitation, most eyes centered on the defending World Champions. But an impressive 2-0 victory by Mexico on a muddy, wet pitch in front of 88,155 rain-soaked fans handed Mexico their second straight Gold Cup victory. With goals from Luis Garcia and Cuauhtemoc Blanco, the Mexicans were able to stymie the Brazilian attack with help from muddy conditions. Nevertheless, the Brazilians impressed throughout the tournament with a young squad using the experience to prepare for the 1996 Summer Olympic Games.

For the U.S., the tournament wasn't as disappointing as their third place finish would seem. Only a third consecutive 1-0 defeat at the hands of Brazil kept the U.S. out of the finals after the team easily handled the rest of their opposition, including an impressive 3-0 victory against Guatemala in the third place match. That match featured Eric Wynalda's tournament-leading fourth goal, which was the 22nd of his international career, setting a new USA goal standard.

The MVP of the tournament, though, was probably former U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger. The Nobel Peace Prize winner and lifelong soccer fan helped secure visas for scores of visiting players despite a U.S. government shutdown.

## 1993 GOLD CUP <br> Venues: Dallas, Texas, USA; and Mexico City, Mexico

The second Gold Cup tournament wasn't quite as successful for the U.S., but the team still advanced to the finals where they fell to Mexico 4-0 at Azteca Stadium. Following three single-goal victories in the first round against Jamaica (1-0), Panama (2-1) and Honduras (1-0), the U.S. squared off against Costa Rica in the semifinals in Dallas. In that match, the U.S. extended their unbeaten Gold Cup run to nine-games with a 103rd minute golden goal from defender Cle Kooiman.

Meanwhile in Mexico City, where the Mexican team would play all their matches, the Tricolores were racing into the finals. Led by Luis Robert Alves (better known as Zague), the ruthlessly efficient Mexican attack produced 28 goals in five matches, overwhelming group foes Martinique (9-0) and Canada (8-0), while drawing with Costa Rica (1-1). Zague's seven goals against Martinique is, obviously, a Gold Cup record.

In front of a capacity crowd of 120,000 , Zague scored again in the final as Mexico downed the U.S. 4-0. Zague finished the tournament with 12 goals in five matches, another Gold Cup record. Third place honors were split after a 1-1 draw between Costa Rica and Jamaica.

## 1991 GOLD CUP Venues: Los Angeles and Pasadena, Calif., USA



The U.S. surprised the region in 1991 when they swept their way to the inaugural Gold Cup championship. In the finals, the U.S. downed Honduras $4-3$ in penalty kicks after the two teams went scoreless after 120 minutes of action in front of 39,873 fans at the L.A. Coliseum. It was in the semifinals, though, where the U.S. stunned all observers with a convincing 2-0 victory against Mexico behind goals from John Doyle and Peter Vermes.

In group play, Marcelo Balboa's stunning bicycle-kick goal capped off a last-minute comeback for the U.S. in their 2-1 victory over Trinidad \& Tobago in the opening Gold Cup match. That victory was followed by wins against Guatemala (3-0) and Costa Rica (3-2), which set-up the U.S. heroics against Mexico.

Mexico was forced into the match-up with the U.S. when they lost their group to Honduras on goal differential. Honduras would later advance to the finals with a $2-0$ semifinal victory against Costa Rica, which set-up a 2-0 victory for Mexico against the Ticos in the third place match.

The first official men's Olympic soccer tournament dates back to the 1908 London Games, where Great Britain defeated Denmark to claim the first soccer gold medal. Since that time soccer has been part of every Olympic Games program, with the exception of the 1932 Los Angeles Games. The 1940 and 1944 Olympic Games were canceled completely due to the political tensions surrounding World War II.
The United States has competed in the men's Olympic competition 13 times, including five straight tournaments from 1984 to 2000. In addition, the U.S. qualified for - but did not compete in - the 1980 Moscow Games following a boycott by the U.S. Olympic Committee. The U.S. missed out on qualifying for the 2004 Athens Olympics, but returned in 2008 after finishing second at the Concacaf qualifying event, which was held in the U.S.

Up until and including the 1988 Seoul Games, the Olympic soccer tournament was an unrestricted event, and thus the U.S. Olympic Soccer Team was essentially the U.S. National Team. However the tournament structure has changed since that time, and the restrictions on age and experience of players involved in Olympic competition has been under review by FIFA, which makes all tournament recommendations to the International Olympic Committee (IOC).

The 1992 Barcelona Games proved to be the turning point for the Olympic soccer tournament, which was competed as an Under-23 event for the first time. Host Spain captured the title at Barcelona's famed Nou Camp Stadium in front of 95,000 jubilant fans. Spain's progress in the tournament aided struggling attendances in 1992, which were far lower than expected. There is little doubt that the poor attendance in Spain played a role in the changes made for the 1996 Atlanta Games.

Not only did Atlanta '96 signify the first time women's soccer was included in the Olympic Program, but the men's tournament was adapted from its Under-23 format in 1992 to include three "overage" players. "Overage" players are either over 23 years of age or have previously played in an Olympic soccer tournament. Claudio Reyna (who was age eligible in 1996, but had competed for the U.S. in 1992), Kasey Keller and Alexi Lalas were the USA's overage players in 1996.

In 2000, veteran defenders Jeff Agoos and Frankie Hejduk, as well as goalkeeper Brad Friedel, were selected as the USA's overage players, helping the team on an unprecedented tournament run, which saw the U.S. advance to the medal round before falling in the semifinals to a strong Spain team.
For the 2008 Olympics in China, Brian McBride agreed to come out of international retirement and captained a team that included U-23 stars Sacha Kljestan and Freddy Adu, who had paced the U.S. through qualifying. After a 1-0 victory against Japan in the first game, the U.S. was minutes away from upsetting reigning European champions the Netherlands, but had to settle for a 2-2
tie after giving up a late free kick goal. In the third group game, eventual runner-up Nigeria took advantage of a third-minute red card to Michael Orozco and held on for a 2-1 win to send the U.S. home despite earning four points.
In 2012, the U.S. Men were eliminated in Concacaf qualifying in March, dropping to third place in its group following a late EI Salvador goal in the closing seconds of a 3-3 draw on March 26. The U.S. met a similar fate in 2016. Finishing third in Concacaf, the team had to face South American power Colombia in a home-and-away playoff, which went the way of the Colombians.

The U.S. Women's National Team claimed the inaugural gold medal at the Atlanta Games with a $2-1$ victory against China before 76,481 fans on Aug. 1, 1996, in Athens, Ga. The attendance mark, which at the time was the largest crowd to ever watch a women's athletic event, set the stage for the incredibly successful Women's World Cup hosted by the U.S. in 1999.

As they did in 1996, the U.S. Women had a strong run to the medal stand in 2000, winning the "Group of Death" that included China, Nigeria and Norway. In the gold medal match, a feisty Norwegian team refused to yield and eventually took home the title with a thrilling 3-2 overtime triumph.
The 2004 Games in Athens, Greece were a fitting end for a number of U.S. veterans, including Mia Hamm, Julie Foudy and Joy Fawcett, who went out of the sport as they came into it: as champions. The never-say-die team won both its semifinal and final matches in overtime, courtesy of a Heather O'Reilly strike against Germany and an Abby Wambach goal against Brazil to claim the gold.
Four years later, the U.S. came into the Olympics without Wambach, the team's top scorer who broke her leg in a preparation match. With Pia Sundhage leading the team into her first World Championship as head coach, a new class of players including Hope Solo, Carli Lloyd and surprise leading scorer Angela Hucles led the team to gold with a 1-0 victory over Brazil.
In 2012, the U.S. Women went undefeated at 6-0-0 for the first time at an Olympic tournament. The USA's run included a thrilling come-from-behind victory in the semifinal against Canada, with Alex Morgan scoring the game-winner in the 123rd minute for the latest goal ever scored in a FIFA competition. In the gold medal match, Lloyd scored both U.S. goals against Japan in front of more than 80,000 spectators at Wembley Stadium in London, and the USA became the first country - in both men's and women's soccer - to earn a fourth gold.

Fresh from winning the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup, the U.S. WNT had its sights set on winning the Rio Olympics to become the first team to win both tournaments back to back. After a determined march through a tough group, the U.S. went out in the first knockout round on PKs to a decidedly defensive Sweden.

## PAN-AM GAMES HISTORY OF SOCCER PARTICIPATION

The Pan American Games are held every four years during the summer preceding the Olympic Games. In terms of the number of sports and athletes, the Pan American Games are second in size only to the Olympics. The men's soccer tournament has been part of every Pan American games since its inception, and in 1999, women's soccer made its debut.

After scheduling conflicts kept the United States from competing in the 2003 games in Santo Domingo in the Dominican Republic, U.S. Soccer was able to return to the competition at the 2007 event in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. However, conflicts again kept the U.S. out of the 2011 and 2015 events hosted in Mexico and Canada, respectively.

In 2007, the U.S. MNT was represented by head coach Bob Jenkins' Under-18 Men's National Team, and after opening the tournament with a strong 2-1 win over Venezuela, the U.S. then dropped its next two games to be eliminated. In its second match, the U.S. led Bolivia 2-0 at the half, only to lose 4-2. Against Mexico in its final group game, the teams were tied 0-0 with 15 minutes remaining when the U.S. was reduced to 10 men, eventually losing 2-0.

The U.S. Under-20 Women's National Team had a very strong run to the tournament finals, behind a blistering six-goal tournament from Lauren Cheney (U.S. Soccer's Young Female Athlete of the Year in 2007). After winning their group with a 2-1-0 record, head coach Jill Ellis' U-20s defeated the full Canada Women's National Team 2-1 in the semifinal, then lost to the full Brazil Women's National Team 5-0 in the final (Brazil outscored its opposition 33-0 in five games in preparation for the 2007 Women's World Cup).

In the 1999 tournament held in Winnipeg, Canada, Carlos Bocanegra and a young Landon Donovan led the U.S. U-23 National Team with goals in the third-place match - a 2-1 victory over Canada to capture the second Pan-Am Games bronze medal in program history. The Under-23 MNT, composed of U.S. stars from the U-23, U-20 and U-17 levels, did well to rebound from a disappointing 1995 tournament by taking home the bronze.

The 1999 U-18 WNT squad captured gold in the first-ever Pan American Women's Final with a hard-fought 1-0 win over an older Mexico squad. The U.S. Women dominated their opponents throughout the tournament, going undefeated in six games (5-0-1) and outscoring the opposition 22-2.

The first Pan American Games were held in 1951, but its history goes back two decades earlier. In 1932, the South American delegation of the International Olympic Committee (IOC) proposed the formation of an organization to promote amateur sports in the Americas. The idea led to the first Pan American Sports Congress in Buenos Aires, Argentina in 1940. The 16 countries represented at the meeting formed the Pan American Sports Committee and agreed to hold the first Pan American Games in 1942 in Buenos Aires, but World War II forced postponement of the games.

The first Pan American Games finally opened in Buenos Aires on Feb. 25, 1951. The organization governing the Games was renamed the Pan American Sports Organization (PASO) and made up of nations from North, Central and South America and the Caribbean.

The soccer tournament at the Pan American Games has never enjoyed a high profile, perhaps because competing nations have not sent their strongest team. The one exception was the 1975 Games in Mexico City, when 110,000 spectators turned out at Azteca Stadium to watch the final between Mexico and Brazil.

Like many of the competing nations, the United States has used the competition as a preparation for the Olympic Games. In 1991, the U.S. won its only Pan American gold medal in soccer in Havana, Cuba, defeating Mexico 2-1 in overtime. Former U.S. Men's National Team midfielder Joe-Max Moore scored a sensational free kick to win that game for the Americans.

# LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP 

WHAT IS THE LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP?

Dating back to 1914, the U.S. Open Cup is the oldest cup competition in United States soccer and is among the oldest in the world. Open to all affiliated amateur and professional teams in the United States, the annual U.S. Open Cup is a 100 -plus-year-old, single elimination tournament.

The U.S. Open Cup is very similar to domestic cup competitions popular throughout Europe, South America and the rest of the world. Cup competitions, which usually run concurrent with a country's league season, are open in the early stages to any club that can qualify, giving local amateur teams a chance to compete against the best teams a country has to offer.

In leagues like the Premier League in England, Serie A in Italy and the Bundesliga in Germany, cup competitions are prestigious tournaments waged between countries' strongest teams like Manchester United, AC Milan and Bayern Munich, and smaller teams like the amateur French side Calais that made it to the finals of the 2000 French Cup only to fall to defending champions Nantes on an injury time penalty kick. Watford F.C. in England, was another small-time club that hit it big in 1984 by making it all the way to the F.A. Cup Final. Unfashionable Chesterfield of the Second Division (the third flight in England) advanced to the semifinals of the 1997 F.A. Cup in England before finally losing. The winner of each country's domestic cup competition, in addition to taking home the prize money, is automatically placed into a tournament to compete against neighboring countries' cup winners.

In 1999, the U.S. Open Cup was renamed the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup to honor the long-time soccer supporter and pioneer. Hunt, who died in 2006, was one of the sport's first major ownership figures in the United States and is a member of the National Soccer Hall of Fame. His family continues to operate FC Dallas in Major League Soccer.

The winning team of the U.S. Open Cup has its name engraved on the Dewar Challenge Trophy, which has been permanently retired and housed at the National Soccer Hall of Fame in Frisco, Texas.

## HISTORY OF THE LAMAR HUNT U.S. OPEN CUP

As the oldest annual team tournament in U.S. sports history, the U.S. Open Cup dates back to 1914 when the Brooklyn Field Club of the North American Foot Ball League (NAFBL) won the first national title by defeating the Brooklyn Celtics in Pawtucket, R.I. First instituted as the National Challenge Cup under the aegis of the United States Football Association (now U.S. Soccer), it was conceived as a competition open to all players (amateur and professional) and based upon England's Football Association Cup format.

During the Open Cup's early years, teams sponsored by industry in the East's urban centers dominated the competition. Bethlehem Steel of Pennsylvania (NAFBL) won four Open Cup titles between 1915 and 1919. Bethlehem Steel would make it five overall titles in 1926, while the American Soccer League's Fall River Marksmen (Mass.) won four national crowns between 1924 and 1931.The Marksmen became the New Bedford Whalers in 1932 and captured their fifth Open Cup crown (tying Bethlehem Steel) that same year.

The last team to capture five tournament titles was Los Angeles Maccabee SC (1973, 1975, 1977, 1978, 1981).

Although there have been numerous back-to-back winners (eight overall by seven different teams), only the New York Greek-Americans, the Fall River Marksmen/New Bedford Whalers, St. Louis Stix, Baer and Fuller/ St. Louis Central Breweries FC, and the Seattle Sounders of Major League Soccer have won three consecutive crowns. The Marksmen/New Bedford Whalers did it first from 1930-1932, while St. Louis Stix, Baer and Fuller/St. Louis Central Breweries F.C. followed them up with treble of their own from 1933-1935. The GreekAmericans won three straight from 1967-1969 and Sounders FC became the fourth team when they lifted the trophy in 2011 after their 2010 and 2009 triumphs.

While teams sponsored by industries in the East's urban centers dominated the Men's Open and Amateur Cups until the 1950s, the teams from the West and Midwest have flexed their muscles in the later years. In fact, California alone has garnered the lion's share of success, winning 12 titles since 1973. Missouri, Illinois and Florida have also appeared regularly on the winner's list.

Although it is now a complete "knock-out" tournament, with a few exceptions, the U.S. Open Cup final was a two-leg, home-and-away series between 1928 and 1968.

Despite the prominence of the North American Soccer League from 1967 to 1984, NASL teams rarely showed
the inclination to enter the U.S. Open Cup competition. In fact, until the emergence of Major League Soccer, full professional teams were almost non-existent in the competition. That has changed in the last two decades, though, with MLS taking part since 1996, thus helping make the tournament a true "national" championship. Since the league began participating, an MLS club has won the tournament all but once, with the 1999 Rochester Rhinos being the last lower-league club to win the tournament.

## HISTORY OF THE DEWAR CHALLENGE TROPHY

The oldest trophy in United States team sports history, the Dewar Challenge Trophy was donated to the American Amateur Football Association in 1912 by Sir Thomas R. Dewar, a British distiller, sportsman and philanthropist during an AAFA (now United States Amateur Soccer Association) visit to London prior to the 1912 Olympics. The trophy was originally purchased for $\$ 500$ and given in the hope of promoting soccer in the United States and in the name of Anglo-American friendship.

The cup was first awarded to the Yonkers Football Club (N.Y.) in 1912 after they defeated the Hollywood Inn Football Club (N.Y.) at the Lennox Oval in New York City. The trophy was officially adopted as the U.S. Open Cup trophy prior to the Brooklyn Field Club's inaugural championship in 1914 in Pawtucket, R.I.

The trophy was retired in 1979, but was refurbished by the USASA in 1997 and was presented to the 1997 and 1998 Open Cup winners, before returning to the National Soccer Hall of Fame in Oneonta, N.Y., in 1999. Starting in 2011, the trophy resides in the main trophy room at U.S. Soccer House in Chicago. When logistics permit, the still fragile trophy can be taken to the site of the cup final to display prior to the event for fans, and also for the winning team to raise for a night.

## FINAL RECAP: HOUSTON DYNAMO MAKE CLUB HISTORY WITH FIRST U.S. OPEN CUP TITLE BY DEFEATING PHILADELPHIA UNION 3-O IN 2018 FINAL

The Houston Dynamo claimed their first Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup title in club history with a 3-0 win against the Philadelphia Union on a soggy night at BBVA Compass Stadium.

Although Houston ceded much of the ball to Philadelphia, they were dynamic in attack, especially 22-yearold forward Mauro Manotas, who scored two first half goals to set the Dynamo on the path to victory and earn the 2018 U.S. Open Cup Golden Boot award with six goals - a mark that ties the Modern Era (1996-present) record for most goals in a single Open Cup tournament - over the course of the competition.

With 16,060 fans braving the sporadic elements, the Dynamo went to work early, pressing for a goal from the opening whistle. It didn't take long for a goal to come, and at first, it seemed that the Union had scored the opener in the third minute, but Fafa Picault's looping header over Houston goalkeeper Joe Willis was ruled out for offside. Seconds later, the night's winning combination clicked as the speedy Alberth Elis was chipped in behind the Philadelphia backline by Óscar Boniek García. Elis cut in from the right sideline and chopped a cross through the goalmouth past two Union defenders and the outstretched glove of goalkeeper Andre Blake to the head of Manotas, who dropped to his knees in order to guide his header into the roof of the net in just the fourth minute of play.
Unfazed by the early concession, the Union put their foot on the ball and knocked it around the park, looking to find a crack in the Houston defense. Despite garnering more than 65 percent of possession, Philly was not able to carve out many clear-cut goal scoring chances, a marked contrast to the clinical finishing from the Dynamo, who doubled their lead through Manotas' second strike in the 25th minute.

The final dagger then came in the 65th minute on yet another Dynamo counter. Romell Quioto was played in on goal and his low drive was parried by Blake into the path of recovering defender Auston Trusty, whose unfortunate attempt to clear billowed the back of his own goal.

For Houston, which had the fortune of playing every one of its 2018 U.S. Open Cup matches at home in Texas, the title represents the club's first silverware since 2007 when they won the second of their two MLS crowns. It also earns the club $\$ 300,000$ in prize money and a berth in next year's Concacaf Champions League.

## 2018 U.S. OPEN CUP FIELD

When the 2018 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup began on May 9, there were 94 teams with the goal of making it to the Open Cup Final. The 105th edition of the Open Cup featured all eligible Division I, II and III professional clubs in the tournament proper. U.S. Soccer increased the prize money for the competition with the winner taking home $\$ 300,000$ (up from $\$ 250,000$ last year). The tournament runner-up received $\$ 100,000$ (up from $\$ 60,000$ ) and the team that advanced the furthest from each lower division earnd $\$ 25,000$ (up from $\$ 15,000$ ).

# Carlos CORDEIRO 

## PRESIDENT U.S. SOCCER


U.S. Soccer's membership elected Carlos Cordeiro to a four-year term as U.S. Soccer's 32nd President during the National Council Meeting at the Federation's 2018 Annual General Meeting (AGM) in Orlando.

A life-long soccer fan, Cordeiro became President after serving in various roles with U.S. Soccer since 2007, when he was appointed as the Federation's first Independent Director. As Vice President in 2016 and 2017, he worked to reform Board governance with a focus on greater transparency and accountability.

He has also previously served as U.S. Soccer Treasurer and Chair of the Budget Committee. In addition, he represents U.S. Soccer on the Concacaf Council and FIFA's Stakeholders Committee.

His business executive background includes more than 30 years of experience in international finance. Cordeiro became a partner at Goldman Sachs in the early 1990s and was appointed Vice Chairman - Asia in 2000. In those roles, he advised governments, global corporations, and financial institutions worldwide. Although now retired, he remains an honorary advisor to the firm.

From 2005 to 2015, he also served as an independent director of BHP Billiton, the world's largest natural resources company, where he focused on governance, finance and risk management.

Born to a Colombian mother and Portuguese-Indian father, Cordeiro immigrated to the United States from India with his mother and three siblings at the age of 15, becoming an American citizen 10 years later.

He is a graduate of Miami Beach High School, Harvard College, and Harvard Business School. As a dedicated philanthropist, Cordeiro has supported nonprofit causes that reflect his commitment to education and healthcare, and he has held director-level positions at several charitable foundations.


As U.S. Soccer's CEO / Secretary General since June 1, 2000, Flynn has taken his lessons learned from the field and applied them administratively at the sports highest level to help spur the United States Soccer Federation's growth into one of the most respected national governing bodies in the country. Through his tireless efforts, Flynn has been responsible for instilling the groundwork for U.S. Soccer's success in the new millennium.

In his more than 19 years as the organization's CEO, Flynn has catapulted U.S. Soccer's business growth into an organization with more than $\$ 150$ million dollars in reserve. With the benefit of several multi-million dollar partnerships, Flynn oversaw a renewed focus on National Team and player development, creating more opportunities for youth players of all ages by adding Youth National Team programs from U-14 to the U-20s, and launching the Boys' and Girls' Development Academy Programs.

Flynn also focused on creating soccer facilities, leading to the development and construction of U.S. Soccer's National Training Center at the Dignity Health Sports Park in Carson, Calif., which opened in June 2003, and the National Training and Coaching Development Center in Kansas City, Kan., which opened at the end of 2017. He also led the process of building the brand new National Soccer Hall of Fame in Frisco, Texas, which opened in October of 2018.

Flynn has also overseen the establishment and expansion of the U.S. Soccer Development Fund, engaging with benefactors at all levels to help support Federation initiatives.

During the summer of 2003 Flynn served as the Chief Executive Officer of the FIFA Women's World Cup USA 2003, putting his strong business background to work in preparing the framework to help the Local Organizing Committee successfully stage the tournament. With attendance peaking above 350,000 despite just four months to organize the event, the tournament was the most financially profitable Women's World Cup ever.

Flynn's career path has included both sports marketing and management positions at Anheuser-Busch, as well as more than 25 years of experience within the sport of soccer at World Cup 1994, the U.S. Soccer Foundation and the U.S. Soccer Federation. Flynn was a part of the amazing growth of Anheuser-Busch, where he served in numerous capacities both domestically and internationally. He was also directly involved in Anheuser-Busch's sponsorship of the 1986 World Cup in Mexico, which served as the springboard for their future involvement in the sport on a long-term basis.

For two years, Flynn served as Executive Director of the U.S. Soccer Foundation, where he was responsible for the organization's overall management. Prior to joining the Foundation, he played key roles at both World Cup 1994, serving as the Venue Director in Chicago, and at U.S. Soccer, where from 1994 to 1998 he managed the governing body's day-to-day operations at the Federation headquarters in Chicago.

A graduate from St. Louis University, Flynn was a defender at SLU from 1973 to 1977, helping the Billikens to an NCAA championship in 1973 and to a runner-up finish in 1974. Born Jan. 20, 1955, in St. Louis, Mo., he is married to Cathy and the couple has three daughters (Lauren, Anneliese and Erin).


## U.S. SOCCER REFEREE PROGRAM

The U.S. Soccer Federation Referee Program's membership ranks among the largest of all FIFA nations with nearly 138,000 registered officials, instructors, assignors, and assessors. Officials registered with U.S. Soccer work sanctioned games at all levels of competition including youth, adult, professional, and international matches.

## Referee Education Resources

U.S. Soccer is committed to producing referee education resources aimed at supporting officials regularly working amateur games at the youth and adult levels. These officials represent the foundation of the U.S. Soccer Referee Program and their training and development is paramount to the success of the program. This is accomplished through the development of targeted training materials supporting specific levels of competition.

## Referee Identification and Training

These initiatives focus on identifying and training high potential officials with the ability to referee at the professional and international levels. These efforts see U.S. Soccer assign a network of highly qualified assessors, instructors, and referee coaches to various elite-level regional and national events. Quantitative and qualitative data from these events are used to classify the program's up-and-coming and high performing officials.

## The Professional Referee Organization (PRO)

The Professional Referee Organization is the organization responsible for managing the referee and assistant referee program in professional soccer leagues in the United States and Canada, working alongside the U.S. Soccer Federation, Major League Soccer, Canadian Soccer Association, United Soccer League and National Women's Soccer League.

The organization's goals are to increase the quality of officiating in U.S. and Canadian professional leagues, develop more professional-quality officials at a younger age, and produce officials who will represent the United States and Canada in FIFA competitions.

## 2019 FIFA International Panel

A list of international referees and assistant referees that are eligible to officiate FIFA sanctioned matches in the coming year is announced annually by FIFA. The current American contingent totals seven referees, 15 assistant referees and two futsal referees.

# U.S. SOCCER'S COACHING DEPARTMENT AND NATIONAL COACHING SCHOOLS 

The U.S. Soccer Coaching Department was established in the early 1970s by famed West German teacher and coach Dettmar Cramer. Each level of the U.S. Soccer Coaching License Pathway is designed to meet the needs of coaches ranging from the coach who is inexperienced in soccer to the former professional player who desires to coach in amateur, professional or international competitions.
U.S. Soccer has licensed thousands of coaches in the decades since the department was first founded. U.S. Soccer is committed to providing soccer coaches with up-to-date theoretical and practical knowledge so coaches can develop their full potential. The diagram below shows the current U.S. Soccer Coaching License Pathway.

## COACHING LICENSE PATHWAY



The U.S. Soccer National Coaching Schools provide courses in which coaches can earn nationally certified credentials which afford them opportunities and recognition inherent in the attainment of various levels of coaching expertise. This proven curriculum improves a coach's knowledge of the game and provides valuable information on current coaching trends and international developments in the game.

The course curriculum is based on a set of tasks a coach must carry out. These tasks are defined as coaching matches, coaching training sessions, leading the team, leading the player, managing a performance environment and leadership. Coaches will be educated and assessed based on the progression of these tasks relative to each course within the license pathway.

A (Senior and Youth), B and C level courses span three to six months in time and take place over a series of face-to-face meetings. Candidates have an opportunity to practically apply what they have learned in their home environment with their own team between meetings. U.S. Soccer staff travel to assess candidates in their home environment for the Pro, A-Senior and A-Youth courses. Regional assessment centers are organized for the $C$ and $B$ courses.
U.S. Soccer also offers a D license that is available through member associations. While the memberassociations are responsible for the execution of these courses, the curriculum is developed and overseen by U.S. Soccer's Coaching Department. For more information on the course, downloadable materials are available at ussoccer.com.

The following is an overview of U.S. Soccer's coaching education programs and the curriculum for each course offered:

## Introduction to Grassroots Coaching

The Introduction to Grassroots Coaching is a cost-free, online module intended for all parents and coaches of youth players. The focus of this grassroots introduction is to share U.S. Soccer's best practices in creating a fun, supportive, activity-centered and age-appropriate environment for grassroots players.

## Grassroots Licenses

The eight new Grassroots courses, which replaced the F and E License Courses, offer an a-la-carte approach meant to empower coaches with education that is relevant to their specific coaching needs. The Grassroots Licenses will help coaches ensure fun, enjoyable, and developmentally appropriate environments for their players. A unique combination of three of the eight Grassroots Licenses, including two in-person courses (one of which must be the 11 v 11 ) and one online course now formally represent the prerequisite to progress to the U.S. Soccer D License.

## D License

The National D license is a 40 to 45 -hour course, held over two weekends, at minimum 4 weeks apart, designed for the grassroots coach who meets the prerequisites outlined above. The focus of this course is to facilitate the improvement of the candidates in the six tasks of a coach across all four game models ( $4 \mathrm{v} 4,7 \mathrm{v} 7$, $9 \mathrm{v9}, 11 \mathrm{v} 11$ ). The course consists of a mix of classroom lectures and field sessions that focus on using the Play-Practice-Play Training Methodology.

## C License

The C license is designed to introduce concepts that are targeted toward coaching players of 13 years of age or older, with a primary emphasis on the core competencies of coaching in games up to 11v11. The C course consists of two separate meetings over the span of 2-3 months.

## B License

The B license focuses on advanced coaching competencies and the principle of long term player development and developing a team. The B course consists of three separate meetings over the span of 4-5 months with a final meeting taking place in the home environment of the candidate.

## A-Youth License

The A-Youth license is designed to focus on the development of elite youth players as a part of the pathway to becoming a professional player. Targeted at coaches who work with players from 12-19 years of age in an elite youth performance environment, the course consists of four meetings separated by three development periods. Candidates are educated and assessed over a 5-6-month period based on the six tasks of a coach (coaching games, coaching training sessions, leading the team, leading the players, managing a performance environment, leadership).

## A-Senior License

The A-Senior license is designed to focus on creating a winning team in a high-performance environment, based on the development of attacking, defending, and transitioning of the coach's own team related to upcoming opponents. Targeted at coaches who work with senior players in a high-performance environment, the course consists of four meetings separated by three development periods. Candidates are educated and assessed over a $5-6$-month period based on the six tasks of a coach (coaching games, coaching training sessions, leading the team, leading the players, managing a performance environment, leadership).

## Academy Director License

The Academy Director license is designed to meet the high demands and standards of leading an academy in a youth development environment. The goal of the course is to educate candidates to become (more) competent and successful in executing the tasks of an Academy Director. The 10-month course consists of six domestic meetings and one international case study.

## Pro License

The Pro license is designed to enable candidates to acquire or further develop the competencies (knowledge, skills, attitude and personal traits) necessary to work as a professional coach in a professional environment. The 12-month course consists of three meetings and two individual visits centered around the management of a professional team within a professional environment.

## U.S. Soccer National Development Center

Home to U.S. Soccer Coaching Education and Sporting Kansas City's first team, the National Development Center celebrated its grand opening on May 16, 2018. The $\$ 75$ million, 50.49acre facility, which serves as the home to the U.S. Soccer Coaching Education department, is also home to Children's Mercy Sports Medicine Center. Sporting the latest soccer-specific technology and sports medicine innovations, the NDC represents the future of the sport in the United States and aligns with U.S. Soccer's primary objective of improving the sport at all levels.

Located along the north side of the NDC, the U.S. Soccer Coaching Education Center provides a world-class environment designed to maximize the development of coaches. With full-time administrative and technical staff, two locker rooms, four classrooms with operable walls, six breakout rooms, all-day cafeteria access, two full-size, synthetic turf fields with LED sports lighting, and a two-story coaching pavilion, the NDC will host more than its fair share of U.S. Soccer coaching courses over the coming years.

The NDC is located at 1913 Pinnacle Way in Kansas City, KS. Sitting approximately 1.5 miles northeast of Children's Mercy Park, Sporting Kansas City's home venue, the NDC is about a 20-minute ride from the Kansas City International Airport and equidistant from downtown Kansas City (Missouri).

## U.S. Soccer National Training Center

U.S. Soccer's National Training Center at Dignity Health Sports Park in Carson, Calif., stands as one of the great achievements in the organization's 100-plus-year history. What started as a vision in 1999 became a reality with its construction in 2003 and is now widely-hailed as an exemplar of sports infrastructure in the United States.

The complex is a first-class facility that shows the integration of all U.S. National Team programs, from talent identification camps straight through to the full Men's and Women's National Teams playing in the main stadium.

The National Training Center officially opened on June 6, 2003, as the U.S. Under-17 Men's National Team arrived to begin training. The first game at what is now known as Dignity Health Sports Park was played in the stadium one day later on June 7, 2003, as the Los Angeles Galaxy topped the Colorado Rapids 2-0 in Major League Soccer action.

Located on the campus of California State University, Dominguez Hills, the National Training Center includes four grass soccer fields, two FieldTurf soccer fields and a general training area. The complex also includes three additional practice fields for the Galaxy and the college, as well as all the necessary team support facilities, including locker rooms, a training room, a weight room and office space for staff. U.S. Soccer has approximately 15 full-time staff working out of the National Training Center.

In a very short time, the National Training Center established itself as the center of the soccer world in the United States and was the main reason the United States was able to serve as an emergency host for the 2003 FIFA Women's World Cup. The facility hosted early round games, as well as the third-place match and the final on short notice after the tournament was moved from China to the United States.

The stadium has also hosted numerous international and professional tournaments, including the Concacaf Gold Cup, Champions League, SuperLiga and InterLiga, while also attracting some of the largest clubs in the world for friendlies.

## NATIONAL SOCCER HALL OF FAME

Part of a $\$ 55$ million renovation at Toyota Stadium, the National Soccer Hall of Fame (NSHOF) is a publicprivate partnership among FC Dallas, the City of Frisco, Frisco Independent School District and U.S. Soccer Federation. The NSHOF at Toyota Stadium in Frisco, Texas contains two components: The NSHOF Experience and the HOF Club.

The NSHOF Experience is a 19,350-square foot segment of the NSHOF that honors the past, while fully incorporating modern technology of the present and future including virtual reality, gesture technology and interactive digital video boards throughout to celebrate the players, veterans and builders of American soccer that have elevated the sport to where it is today. It features interactive exhibits, iconic soccer memorabilia and serves as the home for Hall of Fame induction ceremonies annually.

The NSHOF's new home in Frisco comes after not having a home for seven years, with the previous home located in Oneonta, NY from 1979-2010. The NSHOF was officially recognized by U.S. Soccer in 1983.

What is now the National Soccer Hall of Fame first sprang to life in 1950 when a group of former professional and amateur players from the Philadelphia "Old-timers" Association took it upon themselves to recognize the achievements of soccer in America. Sixty years after the "Old-timers" first got together, nearly 300 members have been elected to the Hall of Fame for their outstanding contributions to American soccer, both on and off the field.

The Hall of Fame also possesses an archive of more than 80,000 items, which make up one of the largest collections of soccer artifacts and records in the world. The collection includes such rare pieces as the world's oldest soccer ball (made in the USA) and both the 1991 and 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup Trophy. The collection also includes the North American Soccer League archive, the 1994 FIFA World Cup USA archive, a rare soccer photography collection from New York depression-era photographer John Albok, materials from the U.S. National Teams in World Cup competition and artifacts from the American Soccer League of the 1920's and 1950's.

Members are elected in three categories - Player, Builder and Veteran (player) - and elections and inductions are carried out annually. Each year's class is voted on and announced during the first few months of that year, with the induction coming later in the year.

Voters in the Player category include select members of the media, Hall of Famers, past and present U.S. Men's and Women's National Team coaches, professional league coaches of four or more years tenure, and a select group of soccer administrators. The Hall of Fame members vote in the Veteran category, and in the Builder category, select national soccer administrators join the Hall of Famers in voting.

The USA's 3.9 million registered players are the second most in the world, behind only Germany ( 6.3 million*), and ahead of third-ranked Brazil ( 2.1 million*).

Soccer continues to see impressive participation growth at the high school and collegiate levels. In the 2014-15 academic year, Soccer was fourth most popular high school sport for girls (behind only track and field, volleyball and basketball) with 375,681 participants, but showed the steepest continued incline in new participants^ over the last 15 years. Participation levels increase for soccer at the collegiate level relative to all other sports with only track and field involving more athletes; however new track and field team numbers are stagnant, while colleges and universities continue adding women's soccer programs with 599 having been started throughout the country since 1988-89.+

With approximately 145,000 registered referees, the U.S. is second in the world behind only Japan.

According to the 2010 FIFA Big Count, there are nearly 800,000 soccer officials in the U.S. (coaches, referees, administrators).

## SOCCER ON TELEVISION

As the game has grown in the United States, so has the amount of soccer on television. With the amount of coverage increasing each year, soccer fans in the U.S. are able to watch games - in a single weekend no less - from top leagues in countries such as Argentina, Brazil, England, France, Germany, Italy, Mexico, and Spain.

Remarkable growth in the demand for domestic soccer viewership led to the signing of a landmark TV rights deal between U.S. Soccer, MLS and major television broadcasters ESPN, FOX Sports and Univision in 2014. An eight-year agreement through 2022 will see all three networks televise both U.S. Men's and Women's National Team matches. ESPN and FS1 will split the English-language Men's National Team broadcast package of approximately 10 games per year and will likewise share the schedule of Women's National Team games. Univision Deportes, the exclusive Spanish language home of U.S. Soccer, will broadcast all U.S. MNT games, plus a minimum of four U.S. WNT matches each year throughout the term of the agreement.

The U.S. viewer has benefited from the overall increase in the number of televised games, be they domestic or international matches, and viewership will continue to grow in the years to come.

Details of the U.S. Soccer and MLS television broadcast deal through 2022:

## ESPN Networks \& FOX Sports

- ESPN and FOX Sports 1 will share all U.S. Soccer matches.
- ESPN and FOX Sports will share MLS Cup Playoff matches outside of two Univision games.
- MLS Cup will alternate each year between ESPN and FOX Sports.
- The AT\&T MLS AII-Star Game will alternate each year between ESPN and FOX Sports.


## ESPN Networks

- ESPN will broadcast a minimum of 34 MLS regular season games, on an exclusive basis, on Sundays at 5 p.m. ET primarily on ESPN2.
- ESPN3 will carry the matches in MLS' out-of-market package.
- ESPN Radio and ESPN Deportes Radio networks have the rights to broadcast MLS matches.
- ESPN obtains digital rights across all platforms and devices for the games it televises.


## FOX Sports

- FOX Sports will broadcast a minimum of 34 MLS regular season games, on an exclusive basis, on Sundays at 7 p.m. ET primarily on FOX Sports 1.
- FOX Sports obtains digital rights across all platforms and devices for the games it televises, including its FOX Sports GO mobile app and FOXSportsGO.com for desktops.
- FOX Sports obtains digital highlight rights for MLS's out-of-market package via FOX Sports digital platforms
- FOX Sports Radio network has the opportunity to broadcast MLS matches.
- Opportunity to broadcast the MLS SuperDraft and other marquee MLS events.


## Univision

- All U.S. Soccer Men's National Team matches, including a minimum of four U.S. Women's National Team matches each year over the duration of the deal.
- Minimum of 34 MLS regular season games, on an exclusive basis, on Friday evenings either at 7 p.m. ET or 11 p.m. ET primarily on UniMás.
- Two MLS Cup Playoff matches per season, on an exclusive basis, during the knockout round.
- The AT\&T MLS AII-Star Game and MLS Cup, exclusively in Spanish on Univision.
- Exclusive MLS matches on the Univision networks will include second audio program (SAP), providing viewers the option of watching games in English. English audio also will be available for matches televised on Univision's digital platforms.
- Univision Deportes Network (UDN), Univision's 24 hour sports network, will feature five to seven consecutive Friday doubleheaders in May and June that will be surrounded by two hours of MLS ancillary programming.
- UDN will televise a weekly MLS wrap-up program and a condensed MLS match of the week each Sunday.
- Univision obtains digital rights across all platforms and mobile devices for the games it televises.


## 2018/2022 FIFA WORLD CUP TELEVISION RIGHTS

In October of 2011, the amazing growth of the sport was demonstrated when a bidding war over the U.S. broadcast rights for the 2018 and 2022 FIFA World Cups played out in Zurich, Switzerland. In the end, a record sum of more than $\$ 1$ billion was paid by Fox and Telemundo, an increase of more than 147 percent over the combined $\$ 425$ million that ESPN and Univisión paid for the rights to the 2010 and 2014 tournaments.

Fox paid a reported $\$ 450$ to $\$ 500$ million to beat out ESPN and NBC for the English rights, while Telemundo is said to have paid $\$ 600$ million to outbid Univision for the Spanish rights. Additionally, FIFA granted FOX the U.S. broadcast rights for the 2026 World Cup, which was awarded to the United Bid from Canada, Mexico and the United States at the 2018 FIFA Congress.

## 2015 FIFA WOMEN'S WORLD CUP TELEVISION AUDIENCE

MOST-WATCHED USA MATCH IN U.S. SOCCER HISTORY: Ratings for the 2015 Women's World Cup in Canada obliterated all previous marks for the women's tournament with the most impressive fact being that more than 750 million TV viewers around the world tuned in to watch the event. The unprecedented viewership validated FOX's decision to increase its coverage of the world's game in the U.S. and put impressive amounts of resources toward showcasing the FIFA Women's World Cup.

In a break-through year for women's football across the globe, the sport's growing popularity was felt nowhere more acutely than in the United States, where the World Cup final between USA and Japan became the most watched football match (men's or women's) in the nation's history with 26.7 million viewers.

Beginning with the USA's group play matches vs. Australia, Sweden and Nigeria, TV ratings for the WNT climbed steadily throughout the tournament as the team saw five of its seven total World Cup matches ultimately air on network television. Every USA match saw a double-digit ratings growth over the 2011 edition of the tournament with the team's first and last group matches breaking 200 percent ratings increases.

Additional viewing records include the largest audience to watch a Women's World Cup match on U.S. Spanishlanguage TV as 1.27 million viewers tuned into the final on Telemundo and the most unique streamers (232K) on FOX Sports GO, the highest in the platform's history.

## 2014 FIFA WORLD CUP TELEVISION AUDIENCE

U.S. VIEWING RECORDS BROKEN: The 2014 FIFA World Cup was watched by an estimated 195.9 million viewers on English and Spanish language networks. The figure is a 76 percent increase from the 111.6 million viewers during the 2010 FIFA World Cup.

Things started off with a bang when more than 18 million viewers tuned in for the USA's opening match against Ghana on June 16 - a total within touching distance of the 19.4 million viewers who, at the time, made the USA's thrilling match in the Round of 16 against Ghana in 2010 the most-watched USMNT game in the nation's history.

That 2010 record was obliterated on June 20 during the USA's second match at the 2014 FIFA World Cup when 27.4 million viewers took in the MNT's 2-2 draw with Portugal - a total that now stands as the largest TV audience on record to view a soccer match of any kind in U.S history, beating out the 24.7 million who watched the 2010 FIFA World Cup Final between the Netherlands and Spain.

The USA's Round of 16 game against Belgium also beat out the 2010 World Cup Final, drawing an impressive 21.6 million viewers and setting a WatchESPN record with 3.5 million unique viewers. Additionally, it was the highest-rated World Cup match (9.8 rating) in the history of ESPN, beating out the 2014 Final between Germany and Argentina (9.1 rating).

The 2014 World Cup delivered multiple national and market audience records for ESPN and ABC, including: The nine most-viewed men's World Cup matches ever on ESPN or ESPN2 and 10 of the top 20 when including telecasts that aired on ABC.

The most-viewed soccer game in the United States - men's or women's - ever for ESPN's opening round telecast of USA vs. Portugal on June 22 (18,220,000 viewers and a 9.6 US HH rating).

The most streamed sporting event ever, with WatchESPN logging 43,300,000 hours (2.6 billion live minutes) of live match viewing for all 64 matches.

## English Network (ABC/ESPN)

The 2014 FIFA World Cup ranks as the most-viewed World Cup ever on English-language TV in the United States. ESPN, ESPN2 and ABC combined to average 4,557,000 viewers and a 2.8 U.S. household rating for the 64 matches, marking increases of 39 percent and 96 percent (vs. 3,273,000 in 2010 and 2,321,000 in 2006), and 33 percent and 75 percent (vs. 2.1 in 2010 and 1.6 in 2006), respectively.

The 2014 FIFA World Cup Final achieved 17.33 million viewers and a 9.1 HH rating, making it the most watched World Cup final in U.S. history as well as the highest rated soccer match ever broadcast in the United States. It ranks as the third-most viewed World Cup game (Men's or Women's) in U.S. history behind only the USA vs. Portugal match in the 2014 group stage ( 18.22 million viewers) and the 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup Final between the USA and China ( 17.97 million viewers)

## Spanish Network (Univision/UniMas)

On Spanish-language, Univision averaged 3.17 million viewers for coverage of the 2014 FIFA World Cup, up 33 percent from 2010 (2.37), and the highest average ever for the World Cup on the network.

The 2014 FIFA World Cup Final average viewers was 8.52 million, up three percent compared to the 2010 FIFA World Cup Final also on Univision ( 8.29 million).

Also, throughout World Cup 2014, ESPN.com averaged nearly 13,000,000 daily unique visitors and $12,000,000$ video starts per day, up 40 percent and 161 percent, respectively, over 2010. ESPN's SportsCenter app averaged $3,600,000$ million average daily unique visitors (up 409 percent from 2010), while the new ESPNFC.com averaged 5.1 million video starts per day (up 970\% from 2010.)

Driven by World Cup content across all digital platforms, ESPN reached 80.7 million unique visitors in June, establishing a new sports category record, topping ESPN's previous category high of 72.7 million in September 2013. (comScore Multi-platform Data)

## FIFA <br> FIFA - SOCCER'S WORLD GOVERNING BOARD

Founded in 1904 to provide unity among national soccer associations, the Federation Internationale de Football Association (FIFA) boasts 211 members, rivaling that of the United Nations, and is arguably the most prestigious sports organization in the world.

FIFA was established on May 21, 1904, by seven national associations - Belgium, Denmark, France, Netherlands, Spain, Sweden and Switzerland - to "promote the game of Association Football (as opposed to rugby or American football), to foster friendly relations among National Associations, Confederations, their officials and players, by promoting the organization of football matches at all levels, and to control every type of association football by taking steps as shall be deemed necessary or advisable."

FIFA's birth was a result of the growing number of international games shortly after the dawn of the 20th century. Soccer leaders in Europe felt that such expanded competition required a governing body, and under the leadership of Robert Guerin, a French journalist, the seven founding members gathered in Paris to shape the future of the sport. Guerin, FIFA's first president, presided over the organization from 1904 to 1906. Seven other men have also served as FIFA president, including Jules Rimet for 33 years from 1921 to 1954.

Currently, Italy's Gianni Infantino serves as FIFA president, having been elected in 2016's Extraordinary Congress held in the wake of corruption allegations against numerous FIFA Officials that resulted in former president Joseph "Sepp" Blatter stepping aside and then being banned from FIFA by its Ethics Committee. FIFA's general secretary since 2009, Infantino served a three-year term as FIFA president and is now running for a second term. The 2019 FIFA Presidential Election will take place at the 69th FIFA Congress in Paris on June 5.

Under FIFA's governance soccer has become the world's most popular sport. According to the Federation's 2006 "Big Count," the game is played by more than 150 million registered athletes - including 10 million women - and viewed by billions of fans in stadiums and on television worldwide. The 2014 World Cup in Brazil was broadcast in more than 200 countries. Inside the stadiums, a total of $3,429,873$ spectators attended the 64 matches - an average of 53,592 per match - the second highest aggregate attendance behind USA 1994 (68,991).

As soccer's ultimate administrative authority, FIFA governs all facets of the game: regulating the rules of play, overseeing the transfers of players internationally, organizing international competitions such as the FIFA World Cup, establishing standards for refereeing, coaching and sports medicine, and encouraging soccer's development around the world.

Among the official world championships staged by FIFA are the World Cup, the Women's World Cup, the Under-20 World Cup, the Under-20 Women's World Cup, the Under-17 World Cup, the Under-17 Women's World Cup, the Beach Soccer World Cup and the Futsal World Cup. Additionally, FIFA oversees the men's and women's Olympic Football Tournament staged under the auspices of the International Olympic Committee every four years. FIFA has also staged the FIFA Confederations Cup, a competition between each of its confederations' champions, and the FIFA Club World Cup, which was held at the beginning of 2000 for the first time in Brazil.

2015 began Concacaf's current run of hosting the world's largest football tournaments when it held the FIFA Women's World Cup in Canada - its first World Cup at the full international level since the United States hosted the Women's World Cup in 2003. In recent history, Concacaf has hosted the 2014 U-20 Women's World Cup in Canada, the 2011 U-17 World Cup in Mexico and the 2010 U-17 Women's World Cup in Trinidad \& Tobago.

The 2012 London Olympic Games proved to be a landmark tournament for the confederation as the U.S. Women's National Team and Mexico U-23 Men's National Team captured gold, making it the first time in the competition's history that teams from the same confederation stood atop the podium.

The 2002 World Cup was a banner tournament for Concacaf that saw the U.S. advance to the quarterfinals, while Mexico won their group to earn a second round berth in Korea and Japan.

In 2005, Concacaf saw one of its men's teams win the first-ever outdoor world championship in the confederation's history as Mexico swept through the FIFA U-17 World Cup in Peru.

In 2000, Guatemala hosted the FIFA Futsal World Cup and in doing so became the first Central American country to host a FIFA world championship. And in 2001, Trinidad \& Tobago hosted the spectacular Under-17 World Cup, becoming the first Caribbean country to host a world championship. A year later, the first-ever FIFA Women's Under-19 World Cup was staged in Canada in 2002 and won by the United States. After Trinidad \& Tobago hosted the U-17 Women in 2010, Mexico welcomed the 2011 U-17 World Cup for men and triumphed as tournament champions.

As the Confederation's premier event, the Gold Cup is traditionally played every two years by the national teams within Concacaf. It rotated to an odd-year, summer schedule in 2003. Mexico, seven-time winner of the Gold Cup, defeated the U.S. in the 1993, 1998, 2009 and 2011 finals, downed Brazil in '96 and 2003 and most recently defeated Jamaica in 2015. The U.S. has won five Gold Cups, the inaugural 1991 event, and again in 2002, 2005, 2007 and 2013. The 2000 Gold Cup was perhaps the most surprising, with Canada taking home their first major international title as the U.S. and Mexico failed to qualify for the semifinals. In 2015, the Confederation's entrant to the FIFA Confederations Cup shifted to a system whereby one nation must win the two Gold Cups held before the Confederations Cup or, if it does not win both editions, enter a one-game playoff against the nation that also won either of the Gold Cup tournaments in advance of a Confederations Cup.

The Women's Gold Cup lasted for three events, with the U.S. winning all three events in 2000, 2002, 2006. In 2002, it took a golden goal from Mia Hamm for the U.S. to dispatch Canada in the final, 2-1, and in 2000 the U.S. downed guest-team Brazil 1-0 to claim the championship. In the most recent edition of the tournament, the U.S. again prevailed in extra time, this time courtesy of a Kristine Lilly penalty kick in the 120th minute. The Women's Gold Cup is now known as the Concacaf Women's Championship.

Concacaf competed in the FIFA Club World Cup for the first time in 2000, when Mexico's Necaxa impressed with a third place finish in the 2000 tournament in Brazil. Most recently, the confederation's best finish came from Mexico's Monterrey, which claimed third in 2012. The CONACACAF club tournament, which is contested amongst 38 nations' domestic league champions, was won by D.C. United in 1998 and 2001. In 2008, Concacaf unveiled the Champions League to replace the Champions Cup and decide the region's annual club title.

In 1994, Concacaf joined Europe and South America as the only confederations to host three or more World Cup finals. Mexico welcomed the world twice, in 1970 and 1986, while the United States staged the event for the first time in 1994.

Launched on April 6, 1996, Major League Soccer is the U.S. Soccer sanctioned Division I outdoor professional soccer league in the United States. The LA Galaxy are the league's most successful team and its first to claim five MLS Cup titles (2002, 2005, 2011, 2012, 2014), surpassing D.C. United, winners of three of the first four MLS Cup titles $(1996,1997 \& 1999)$ as well as the 2004 crown. Two more clubs have claimed multiple titles; the San Jose Earthquakes (2001, 2003) and Houston Dynamo (2006, 2007). They are joined on the list of MLS Cup champions by the Chicago Fire (1998), Colorado Rapids (2010), Columbus Crew (2008), Real Salt Lake (2009), Sporting Kansas City (2013), Portland Timbers (2015), Seattle Sounders FC (2016), Toronto FC (2017) and reigning champions Atlanta United FC (2018).

In 2019, the league will continue to be divided into two conferences: Eastern Conference - Atlanta United FC, Chicago Fire, Columbus Crew SC, D.C. United, FC Cincinnati, Montreal Impact, New England Revolution, New York City FC, New York Red Bulls, Orlando City, Philadelphia Union, Toronto FC; Western Conference - Colorado Rapids, FC Dallas, Houston Dynamo, LA Galaxy, Los Angeles FC, Minnesota United, Portland Timbers, Real Salt Lake, San Jose Earthquakes, Seattle Sounders FC, Sporting Kansas City and Vancouver Whitecaps FC.

The league has announced expansion plans to bring the total count of teams to 28 , with the cities of Austin, Miami and Nashville having been awarded three of the remaining expansion franchises.

MLS has a unique ownership and operating structure, based on a "single entity" concept. Unlike other professional sports leagues, which are a confederation of independent franchise owners, MLS' "single entity" structure allows investors to own an interest in the league, as well as individual teams. MLS believes that the structure will better position the league for long term success.

## CHICAGO: HOME TO U.S. SOCCER HOUSE

In the tradition of many world soccer federations and the FIFA House in Zurich, the U.S. Soccer Federation took up residence in two refurbished mansions in Chicago's Prairie Avenue Historical District more than two decades ago. Since dubbed the U.S. Soccer House, the corner of 18th Street and Prairie Avenue now serves as the American home of the world's most popular sport.

Formerly located in Colorado Springs, Colo., U.S. Soccer moved their operational base into the Kimball house at 1801 South Prairie Avenue and the Coleman-Ames house at 1811 South Prairie Avenue in December of 1991.

Dating back to 1873 , Soccer House was built by William Wallace Kimball, founder of Kimball pianos and organs; Joseph Coleman, president of a hardware manufacturing firm; and Coleman's wife, Leonora, who served on the board of the Women's Christian Association in 1886.

There was a time when Prairie Avenue, from 16th to 22 nd streets, was the "Fifth Avenue" of the Midwest. The area is a testament to the hard work and dedication of the men and women who helped shape the industrialization of the Midwest and in 1979 it was designated an historical district.

Nearly 20 millionaires once resided within Soccer House's six-block area. Families who were influential in the industrialization of the Midwest and called South Prairie Avenue home included: George Pullman (railroad cars), John J. Glessner (farming implements), Marshall Field (retailer), Samuel Allerton (banker) and Philip Armour (meat packing).

Construction of Prairie Avenue began after the Great Chicago Fire of 1871 when Pullman became the first millionaire to move to the area, building the grandest of Prairie Avenue mansions in 1873. Friends of Pullman followed his lead and also built extravagant homes on Prairie Avenue. The Marshall Field House was the first in the neighborhood to be electrically lit.

The Kimball House, built of Bedford limestone and topped with a slate roof, has an exterior consisting of numerous large and small turrets, gables, balconies and ornamental iron-railed galleries. The interior of Kimball House is as extravagant as its exterior, with wood abundant throughout. The ceilings are beamed in oak and mahogany, and fireplaces made of onyx warm the parlor.

Neighboring the Kimball House to the south is the Coleman-Ames House built in 1886. Numerous families have resided in this mansion. Coleman, the original owner, lived in the home until 1888, when he sold the mansion to Massachusetts coal merchant Miner T. Ames. Ames resided in the house for just two years before he died in 1890.

It wasn't until the late 1940s that a connecting link between the Kimball and Coleman coach houses was erected, designed to give the courtyard a unified appearance.

With its historic appearance, Soccer House has been Chicago's home to Hollywood, serving as a location shoot for a number of motion pictures, including extended use for the filming of Richard Gere's "Primal Fear."


Early 1800s: As was the case in England, many American schools and colleges played forms of football, but under rules that varied from place to place.
1862: The Oneida Football Club, made up of Boston prep school students, was organized by Gerritt Smith Miller. The game the Oneidas played was more like rugby than like soccer, but they were the first American team playing any type of football to be organized on a continuing basis, rather than just for the day.
1866: The first game in America using the association football rules standardized three years before in London was played on Oct. 11 in Waukesha, Wis. A team of Carroll College students beat a team of local residents.
1869: A week after they played what has been called the first American football game, teams from Princeton and Rutgers met on Nov. 13 in Princeton, N.J., in a game using association football rules, the first intercollegiate soccer game in America.
1876: Most of the football-playing colleges abandoned soccer in favor of rugby. However, within a few years soccer had begun to take hold in immigrant communities in various American locations such as Fall River, Mass.; Kearny, N.J., and St. Louis.
1883: The first soccer league in America, the Western Football Association, was organized in St. Louis.
1884: The American Football Association, only the second national soccer association outside of the British Isles, but one that was really more regional than national, was organized in Newark, N.J.

1885: The first American Football Association Cup was won by ONT of Kearny, N.J., and a team representing the United States played one from Canada in Kearny on Nov. 28 in the first "international" game in America.
1894: The first attempt to start a pro soccer league in the United States, the American League of Professional Football Clubs, lasted for only three weeks in October. However, a longer-lasting league, the National Association Foot Ball League, began the following spring.
1898: A depression resulting from the financial panic of 1893 caused the suspension of both the American Football Association and the nation's leading league, the National Association Foot Ball League of New Jersey.

1904: A Canadian team won the soccer competition at the Olympic Games in St. Louis.

1905: A 17-game North American tour by the Pilgrims, an English amateur team, helped to revive soccer in the United States. St. Leo's won the first of its 10 consecutive St. Louis Major League titles.
1906: West Hudson of Harrison, N.J., won the first championship of the revived AFA Cup. A year later, it added the first championship of the revived National Association Foot Ball League.
1913: The United States Football Association was founded at an April 5 meeting in New York. FIFA, which had been founded in 1904, granted it provisional
membership later in the year and full membership in 1914.

1914: The first National Challenge Cup tournament, the championship of the new USFA, was won by the Brooklyn Field Club (the tournament's name was later changed to the U.S. Open Cup).


FIRST TEAM: The very first U.S. Men's National Team squad prepares to take the field in their first match, a 3-2 victory over Sweden in Stockholm on Aug. 20, 1916.

1916: The first national team organized by the USFA, named the All-American Football Club, played six games in a tour of Sweden and Norway. The captain, Thomas Swords of Fall River, scored the first goal ever for the U.S. national team, against Sweden.

1919: Bethlehem Steel, after sweeping the National Challenge Cup, the AFA Cup and the National Association Foot Ball League, became the first American club to make a European tour when it played 14 games in Sweden and Denmark.
1920: The National Challenge Cup was won for the first time by a team from west of the Alleghenies, Ben Millers of St. Louis.

1921: The original American Soccer League, largely a merger of the National Association Foot Ball League in the Middle Atlantic states and the Southern New England Soccer League, began play. In its first season, it included three teams from Massachusetts, two from New York, two from New Jersey and one from Pennsylvania.

1924: The Fall River Marksmen became the first team to win the American Soccer League and National Challenge Cup titles in the same year.

1925: Archie Stark of Bethlehem Steel scored 67 goals in the 44-game ASL season, setting an American firstdivision record that still stands.

1926: A game between Austrian first-division team Hakoah and a New York all-star team drew a crowd of 46,000 to the Polo Grounds in New York. Bethlehem Steel won the last of its five National Challenge Cup titles.
1928: The Soccer War, a year-long battle between the ASL and the USFA, began with ASL demands to take over the leading role in administering the sport.

1947：Ponta Delgada of Fall River became the first team to win the U．S．Open Cup and the National Amateur Cup in the same year．

1948：The first game in the United States between two leading European teams，Liverpool of England and Djurgardens of Sweden，was played in Brooklyn．

1950：Joe Gaetjens＇goal in the 37th minute enabled the United States to score its famous 1－0 victory against England in Belo Horizonte，Brazil．Despite the victory， the United States failed to advance past the first round of the World Cup．

1952：The United States played Scotland in front of a crowd of 107,765 at Hampden Park in Glasgow．
1953：The USSFA assumed administration of the National Soccer Hall of Fame in an agreement with the Philadelphia Old－Timers Association，which had started the Hall three years before．

1959：The first NCAA soccer championship was won by St．Louis University．The United States finished third in the soccer tournament at the Pan－American Games in Chicago．
1960：The International Soccer League，featuring European and South American clubs in their off－seasons， began play in New York．In the first championship game， Bangu of Brazil beat Kilmarnock of Scotland．

1938：The USFA，citing the gathering threat of war in Europe，declined to send a team to the World Cup in France．

1941：The Kearny Scots won their fifth consecutive American Soccer League championship．The National Soccer Coaches Association was formed by 10 coaches at a meeting in New York．
1944：Billy Gonsalves，playing for Brooklyn Hispano， won the last of his remarkable eight U．S．Open Cup championships．

1945：The U．S．Football Association changed its name to U．S．Soccer Football Association．

1961: Concacaf, the Confederation of North and Central America and the Caribbean of Association Football, was formed at a meeting in Mexico City.
1965: The first college women's varsity soccer team was organized at Castleton State College in Vermont.
1966: Pelé played his first game in the United States, for his longtime Brazilian club Santos against Benfica of Portugal in New York.

1968: The Atlanta Chiefs defeated the San Diego Toros in the first North American Soccer League championship series.

1974: The U.S. Soccer Football Association changed its name to U.S. Soccer Federation.

1975: Pelé, who had retired the year before from Santos, signed for $\$ 2.8$ million with the New York Cosmos.
1977: Pelé won his only North American Soccer League championship as the Cosmos defeated the Seattle Sounders in the final. A month after the season, Pele played his final game, changing uniforms at halftime in a match between the Cosmos and Santos, in East Rutherford, N.J. By signing Franz Beckenbauer of West Germany and Carlos Alberto of Brazil, the Cosmos became the first team in world soccer history to field the captains of the last two World Cup-winning teams.

1978: American soccer rode the crest of the attendance surge that followed Pelé's American venture, with the North American Soccer League expanding from 18 teams to 24 and the Major Indoor Soccer League beginning play with six teams.

1982: A European selection played a World selection in the FIFA all-star game in East Rutherford, N.J., but the NASL surge was beginning to fade. The Cosmos won the last of their five NASL championships. North Carolina won the first NCAA women's soccer championship.

1984: A crowd of 101,799, still the largest ever to attend a soccer game in the United States, saw the

Olympic final between Brazil and France in Pasadena, Calif.
1985: The North American Soccer League folded, a year after the second American Soccer League had done the same. Three months later, the New York Cosmos folded, after attempting to play a series of exhibition games. The United States men were surprisingly eliminated by Costa Rica in World Cup qualifying, but the United States women's national team played its first game.
1988: FIFA, which five years earlier had rejected a United States bid for the 1986 World Cup, named the United States as host of the 1994 World Cup.
1989: The United States qualified for the World Cup for the first time in 40 years. Paul Caligiuri's famous goal in the deciding game was a 35 -yard dipping shot that found the net in a 1-0 upset victory against Trinidad \& Tobago Nov. 19 in front of 35,000 red-clad Trinidadians. The U.S. Futsal National Team finished third at the first FIFA World Championship for Futsal.


FIRST OF SIX: The 1990 World Cup marked the first of six consecutive world cup appearances for the U.S.

1990: The U.S. competed in the World Cup for the first time in 40 years. The WSL and the ASL merged to form the American Professional Soccer League (APSL).

1991: The U.S. Women captured the first-ever FIFA Women's World Championship in China with a 2-1 win against Norway Nov. 30. The women qualified for the world championship by defeating its five Concacaf opponents by a combined score of 49-0. The U.S. National Team won its first-ever regional championship July 7 when it captured the Concacaf Gold Cup by defeating Honduras 4-3 in penalty kicks. The U.S. U-23 team won the gold medal at the Pan Am Games in Cuba.
1992: The U.S. Men won the inaugural U.S. Cup '92 in June, defeating Ireland 3-1 and Portugal 1-0, and tying three-time World Cup champion Italy 1-1. The U.S. Futsal Team won the silver medal at the 2nd FIFA World Championship in Hong Kong. The M(I)SL folded after 15 years in existence.

1993: In February, U.S. Soccer held the first-ever Strategic Summit where more than 250 soccer leaders and personalities met in Chicago for four days to plan the development of soccer into the 21st century. U.S. Cup '93 was used as a dress rehearsal for World Cup organizers, officials and volunteers, as well as the U.S. Men. The USA's 2-0 defeat of England made headlines around the world. Attendance and media interest were high, with 286,761 people attending the tournament's

six games，and $A B C$ broadcasting the June 13 U．S．－ Germany match．
The U．S．Under－20 Men defeated Europe＇s No． 1 seed，Turkey，6－0 in the first game of the World Youth Championship in Australia．FIFA officials called the trouncing one of the most extraordinary results in the history of the tournament．
The APSL was declared a Division II professional league．The United States Interregional Soccer League （USISL）was given Division III status．Plans for Major League Soccer－a Division I league to follow the legacy of World Cup＇94－were presented by U．S．Soccer President Alan Rothenberg．

1994：U．S．Soccer served as host national association for the 1994 FIFA World Cup，staging the greatest event in FIFA history．More than 3.5 million fans flocked to stadiums－still a World Cup record－and soccer fever in the U．S．was at an alltime high．The U．S．team advanced beyond the first round for the first time in 64 years，falling to eventual champion Brazil 1－0 in a July 4 round of 16 showdown at Stanford Stadium in Palo Alto，Calif．On June 4，91，123 fans jammed the Rose Bowl to watch the U．S．defeat Mexico，1－0，in its final
tune－up prior to the World Cup．Game proceeds netted $\$ 1$ million in U．S．Soccer contributions to UNICEF／ Children＇s Defense Fund．

The U．S．Women won the Chiquita Cup，a four－team international tournament in which the U．S．hosted Germany，China and Norway．The U．S．went on to successfully defend its Concacaf championship， qualifying for the 1995 FIFA Women＇s World Championship by outscoring the opposition 36－1 en route to winning all four qualification matches．Head coach Anson Dorrance announced his resignation and U．S．Soccer named assistant coach Tony DiCicco to succeed him．
1995：U．S．Soccer announced in February its intention to host the 1999 Women＇s World Cup and began the formal bid process with FIFA．The U．S．Men won the U．S．Cup＇95 in June，defeating Nigeria and Mexico and tying Colombia．Later that month，the women placed third in the FIFA Women＇s World Cup in Sweden，falling to eventual champion Norway in the semifinals 1－0，then defeating China．
In July，the men made international headlines by advancing to the semifinals of Copa America．The U．S． scored its first－ever victory against Argentina，3－0， and advanced via penalty kicks（against Mexico）into the semifinals before falling 1－0 to defending world champion Brazil．Steve Sampson，who had served as interim coach since April，was named full－time head coach in August．
1996：The U．S．Women won the first women＇s soccer gold medal at the 1996 Atlanta Olympics，defeating China 2－1 in the championship game．The U．S．posted a $21-1-2$ overall record and won the Brazil Cup and U．S．Women＇s Cup＇96．The U．S．Men＇s Olympic Team narrowly missed advancing to the quarterfinals with a 1－1－1 record．

Major League Soccer was launched，providing the United States with its first Division I outdoor pro league since the North American Soccer League ceased operations in 1985．MLS averaged more than 17，000 fans per game． The A－League and USISL merged to form a larger and stronger Division II outdoor league．
FIFA awarded the 1999 Women＇s World Cup to the United States and U．S．Soccer pledged it would be the biggest and most successful women＇s sporting event ever．
1997：The U．S．Men qualified for a third straight World Cup，completing al6－game qualifying run with just two losses and advancing with a game to spare．The U．S． Women continued their impressive play by winning their fourth straight Nike U．S Cup．
The FIFA Women＇s World Cup Organizing Committee had awarded the＇99 games to seven U．S．locations：Boston； Chicago；Los Angeles；New York／New Jersey；Portland， Ore．；San Francisco Bay Area；and Washington，D．C．
1998：A disappointing World Cup finished with the U．S．in last place after two difficult match－ups against Germany and Yugoslavia，and a heartbreaking loss to Iran．Brian McBride scores the team＇s only World Cup goal．The tournament concludes with the resignation of head coach Steve Sampson，who is eventually replaced on Oct．27，by Bruce Arena．

The women's team continued their impressive play, losing just twice in 1998 while playing in front of record crowds all across the country. Dr. Bob Contiguglia took over as U.S. Soccer's new president, replacing Alan I. Rothenberg, who had reached the eight-year term limit.

1999: In front of more than 90,000 fans at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif., the U.S. women won the 1999 FIFA World Cup by playing China to a 0-0 tie through regulation and overtime and then defeating them 5-4 in penalty kicks. Soccer hysteria spread through America as the women appeared on every top news program, at the White House and on the cover of Time, Newsweek, People and Sports Illustrated. U.S. Women's National Team head coach Tony DiCicco resigned in November as the winningest coach in U.S. Soccer history with a record of 103-8-8.
In Bruce Arena's first full year at the helm of the U.S. Men, the team records triumphs against Germany (twice), Argentina, Chile and earns third place at the 1999 FIFA Confederations Cup in Mexico. The U-23 Men's beat Canada for the bronze medal at the 1999 Pan American Games in Winnipeg, Canada, while the U-18 Women captured the gold. The U-20 Men advanced to the second round of the 1999 FIFA World Youth Championship in April, with their only two loses coming to eventual finalists Spain and Japan. Taylor Twellman scored four goals and earned the Bronze Boot to become the first American male in the modern era to earn a FIFA scoring award. In November, the U-17 Men extended a record unbeaten streak to 24 games, advancing to the semifinals of the World Championship before losing in penalty kicks to Australia. Landon Donovan and DaMarcus Beasley earned the Gold and Silver Balls as the tournaments top two MVPs.

2000: Bruce Arena's squad continued to advance toward their ultimate goal of qualifying for the 2002 World Cup. The team secured 10 out of a possible 12 points - all shutouts - to win its semifinal qualifying group.
The U.S. Women maintained the momentum from their historic Women's World Cup title with 41 matches in 2000, posting a $26-6-9$ record. The U.S. won six tournament titles in 2000, but had to settle for a silver medal at the 2000 Summer Olympics, losing in overtime
to archrival Norway in the gold medal match.
The U.S. Men and Women put on an impressive display for the world at the Sydney Games as the only nation to have both its teams advance to the semifinals. The men were the surprise team of the tournament, winning their group and advancing to the semis before grabbing fourth place, the highest Olympic finish for the U.S.

2001: The U.S. Men qualified for a fourth straight World Cup, boosted by four wins and a draw to open the final round of Concacaf qualifying. For the first time, the U.S. Men clinched a spot in the World Cup at a home qualifier, topping Jamaica 2-1 behind two goals from Joe-Max Moore in front of 40,483 fans at the last soccer match played at Foxboro Stadium.
The U.S. Women played only 10 international matches as the Women's United Soccer Association begins play, with the Bay Area CyberRays winning the inaugural Founders Cup. Mia Hamm was named the first FIFA Women's World Player of the Year.

The Under-17 Men advanced to a ninth consecutive FIFA U-17 World Cup, but were drawn into the Group of Death in Trinidad \& Tobago with Japan, Nigeria and France, and were eliminated in the first round. The U.S. Under-20 Men qualified for their third straight FIFA World Youth Championship, where the team finished second in their group in Argentina and were eliminated in the second round by Egypt.
The National Professional Soccer League, in existence since 1984-95, merges with the WISL and is renamed as the Major Indoor Soccer League.

2002: The U.S. Men advanced to the quarterfinals at the 2002 World Cup in Korea/Japan, the team's best World Cup showing since 1930. The U.S. shocked the world with a stunning 3-2 opening game upset of Portugal before eventually finishing in second place in Group D. The U.S. then posted their first victory in the World Cup knockout stage, blanking Concacaf rival Mexico 2-0 in the Round of 16 . The World Cup run ended in the quarterfinals with a 1-0 loss to Germany. Claudio Reyna was named to the All-Tournament Team, while Landon Donovan earned honorable mention. The men began 2002 by winning the Concacaf Gold Cup in January with a convincing 2-0 victory against Costa Rica for the first Gold Cup title for the U.S. since 1991.
The U.S. Women's qualified for their fourth consecutive

FIFA Women＇s World Cup after capturing the 2002 Concacaf Gold Cup with a 2－1 overtime victory against Canada at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena，Calif．The U．S． Under－19 Women topped the host Canadians 1－0 in overtime to win the inaugural FIFA U－19 Women＇s World Championship．Kelly Wilson won the Bronze Ball as the tournament＇s third MVP and the Silver Boot，while captain Lindsay Tarpley earned the Bronze Boot．

The U．S．Under－20 National Team qualified for their fourth consecutive FIFA World Youth Championship． The U．S．National Futsal Team played their first home matches in history，defeating Canada and tying Mexico in March in Baltimore，Md．，and Washington，D．C．， respectively．

2003：Due to the outbreak of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome，FIFA relocated the Women＇s World Cup out of China．After a successful bid to host the tournament， U．S．Soccer faced the unprecedented task of hosting the tournament with just four months of preparation． The U．S．Women won Group A and then beat Norway in the quarterfinals $1-0$ ．But Germany stunned the U．S． with a 3－0 victory in the semifinals，which led the U．S． to top Canada in the third－place match．Shannon Boxx， Joy Fawcett and Mia Hamm all earned all－star honors from FIFA．

The U．S．Men，preparing for World Cup qualifying in 2004，finished in third place at the Concacaf Gold Cup with a 3－2 come－from－behind win against Costa Rica． The Men＇s Under－17 and Under－20 squads finished their respective World Championships with fifth place finishes after bowing out with quarterfinal losses to Brazil and Argentina，respectively．

2004：The U．S．Women won every tournament entered，culminating with the 2004 Olympics．Other tournament titles included the Algarve Cup，the Four Nations Tournament and the Concacaf Regional Olympic qualifying tournament，as the team set a record with 28 victories on the year．
Under head coach Bruce Arena，the U．S．Men qualified for the final round of World Cup Qualifying for the Concacaf region．The men finished the year with an 8－1－ 6 record，losing only to the Netherlands away and going a record 13 －games undefeated．

The U－23 Men failed to qualify for the Olympics for the first time since 1976，losing 4－0 to Mexico in Guadalajara after winning their group only match up against the second－place Mexicans in the single－ elimination qualifier．The Under－19 Women finished third at the FIFA U－19 Women＇s World Championship． The Futsal Team won the 2004 Concacaf Championship and qualified for the 2004 FIFA Futsal World Championship，where the team had a strong showing with a seventh－place finish．

2005：Manager Bruce Arena led the U．S．Men to a first place finish in Concacaf World Cup qualifying for the first time in 71 years，earning a berth at the 2006 FIFA World Cup Finals in Germany with a $2-0$ win against Mexico in Columbus，Ohio．The men also brought home the 2005 Concacaf Gold Cup，beating Panama 3－1 in penalty kicks after a scoreless draw．The team finished the year with a record 13 wins and .750 winning percentage．

The U．S．Women began a new era，starting off the year with a new coach and a third consecutive Algarve Cup title，their fourth overall．They ended the year undefeated and without allowing a single goal．

The Under－20 Men swept through Concacaf Qualifying， earning a berth to the FIFA Youth World Championship， where they finished 11th，bowing out to Italy in the Round of 16．The Under－17 Men also had a strong 2005，qualifying for the 2005 FIFA U－17 World Championship and finishing fifth overall after a loss to Holland in the second round．

2006：A disappointing World Cup in Germany for the United States，as the team failed to advance out of the first round despite a gallant，nine－man 1－1 draw with eventual World Cup champions Italy．After eight years in charge，Bruce Arena is replaced at the helm of the U．S． MNT by Bob Bradley，on an interim basis．

Later in the summer，the U．S．Under－20 Women＇s National Team finished fourth in Russia．The disappointing finish marks the first time a U．S．Women＇s National Team has finished outside the top three in a FIFA or Concacaf World Championship event．

The U．S．Women，however，continued their incredible run under Greg Ryan，winning three of the four tournaments they enter．The year concludes with another Women＇s Gold Cup crown and a berth in the 2007 FIFA Women＇s World Cup in China．

2007: Bob Bradley became the first Men's coach to win his first three games in charge and was hired fulltime to guide the USA through 2010. In the summer of 2007, the MNT won its second consecutive Gold Cup, and fourth total title, by defeating Mexico 2-1 in front of a packed house at Soldier Field in Chicago. With the victory, the MNT gained entry into the 2009 Confederations Cup. The Men also travelled to Venezuela to compete in Copa America for the third time.
After qualifying for their respective World Cups to continue impressive streaks, the U-17 Men and U- 20 Men took on the world during the summer in back-toback tournaments. The U-20 team performed admirably in Canada, and reached the quarterfinals after defeats of Poland, Brazil and Uruguay. The U-17 team, meanwhile, did well to qualify from a tough group in South Korea, before being eliminated by Germany in the Round of 16 . The U.S. Women maintained a two-plus year undefeated run, looking to take the streak into the FIFA Women's World Cup. Drawn into the toughest group in Women's World Cup history, the U.S. advanced in first place after three difficult games against Korea DPR, Sweden and Nigeria. The U.S. rolled into the semifinals, but was upended by a quality Brazil side. Eventually, the WNT took third place for the second consecutive World Cup with a convincing win against Norway. Former Swedish National Team player and captain Pia Sundhage was appointed to the position of WNT coach after Greg Ryan's departure from the team.

Wilmer Cabrera was named head coach of the U-17 MNT, replacing John Hackworth. For the first time, U.S. Soccer hired four full-time referees to enhance high-level performance, training and development opportunities for the sport's elite officials in the United States. The U.S. Soccer Development Academy launched in the fall.
2008: Led by Pia Sundhage, the U.S. Women had one of its best years ever, losing only one game, which

ironically came in the opening match of the 2008 Beijing Olympics, a tournament the U.S. would eventually win to take home their third gold medal. Overall, the U.S. won all six tournaments it entered to finish with a $33-$ 1-2 record, giving them the most wins and best winning percentage ever in a calendar year (.944).
The U.S. Men was successful in its own right, starting off on the right foot in 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifying with

a 9-0 aggregate against Barbados in the second round. The U.S. opened the semifinal round with 1-0 victories in Guatemala and Cuba. Coming back to the U.S., home victories against T\&T and Cuba clinched advancement with two games to play.
The U-23 Men joined the U.S. Women by qualifying for the 2008 Olympics in March, but just missed out on the second round once arriving in Beijing. Despite a 1-0 victory against Japan and a 2-2 draw with the Netherlands, the U.S. fell 2-1 against eventual silver medalist Nigeria. On the youth side, the U-17 and U-20 Women's National Teams both made the championship match of their respective FIFA World Cups. In New Zealand, the U-17s went on an impressive run to the final before finally succumbing to Korea DPR in the final, but in Chile their older counterparts were able to exact revenge with a 2-1 victory to bring the World Cup trophy back to the United States for the first time since 2002.
Building off the initial kickoff in 2007, U.S. Soccer's Development Academy wrapped up its first year with a collection of dynamic matches during Finals Week at The Home Depot Center. In the U-15/16 championship, Carmel United topped PDA 1-0, and the Baltimore Bays topped LAFC 4-2 to take the U-17/18 title.
2009: The U.S. Men opened 2009 focused on final round qualifying for the 2010 FIFA World Cup with a 2-0 win against archrival Mexico in Columbus, Ohio, Bob Bradley's squad proceeded to go undefeated at home and clinch a spot in South Africa with a come-from-behind
win in Honduras．They finished atop the Concacaf table with a tie against Costa Rica in Washington，D．C．，on the last day of qualifying．

During the summer，the U．S．Men traveled to South Africa to compete in the 2009 FIFA Confederations Cup． The U．S．MNT was drawn into a group with Italy，Brazil and Egypt，and advanced into the semifinals by virtue of a 3－0 dismantling of Egypt in the final game．They kept the nation captivated by beating Spain，the No．1－ranked team in the world in the semifinals before falling 3－2 to Brazil in the final．Tim Howard was awarded the Golden Glove and Clint Dempsey given the Bronze Ball ．

Pia Sunhage＇s women＇s team had a more relaxed year after their gold medal winning exploits in 2008，and wrapped up the year with a 7－0－1 that included falling in penalties to Sweden in the Algarve Cup final．
Both the U－17 and U－20 Men＇s National Team competed in their respective FIFA World Cups this year，with the U－17 team advancing out of the group stage in Nigeria before falling to Italy in the Round of 16．A tough group containing Germany，Cameroon and Korea Republic saw the U－20s out of the tournament following the first round in Egypt．
The U．S．Soccer Development Academy completed its second year of competition in 2009，once again concluding the season with Finals Week at The Home Depot Center．In the U－15／16 age group，playoff No．1－ seed Derby County Wolves continued their strong season straight through Finals Week with a title．Indiana United Academy defeated D．C．United to take home the U－17／18 championship．

2010：The year＇s most memorable moment came in the U．S．Men＇s third group game at the 2010 World Cup in South Africa as Landon Donovan scored a last－minute goal for the U．S．to clinch advancement and clinch a group for the first time in 80 years．Following a 1－1 tie with England，a 2－2 tie with Slovenia and a 1－0 win against Algeria，the U．S．was eliminated in the Round of 16 losing to Ghana 2－1．Clint Dempsey became the second U．S．player to score in multiple World Cups，and Landon Donovan had three total goals to be come the third to score in multiple World Cups and the all－time World Cup goal leader for the U．S．
After a surprising loss to Mexico in the semifinals of Women＇s Concacaf qualifying，the U．S．topped Italy 2－0 in a two－game qualifying playoff to earn a spot in
the 2011 FIFA Women＇s World Cup．The U．S．won its seventh Algarve Cup with the first of two victories against 2011 hosts Germany．
The U．S．Under－20 Women lost in penalty kicks to Nigeria in the quarterfinals of the 2010 FIFA U－20 World Cup，while the U－17 Women became the first U．S．Women＇s team to fail to qualify for a FIFA World Cup event after not advancing out of the CONACACAF qualifying tournament．
No Division II league met U．S．Soccer＇s sanctioning standards，so the Federation administered a league called USSF D－2 for one year．

2011：The U．S．Women were on center stage during the 2011 Women＇s World Cup in Germany．Their dramatic run in the Women＇s World Cup was highlighted by an electric，come－from－behind victory in the quarterfinals against Brazil，in which Abby Wambach scored the latest goal（six minutes into stoppage time）ever in a World Cup match．The U．S．，however，would lose out in penalties to a spirited Japanese side in the final after playing to a 2－2 draw through 120 minutes．
During the summer of 2011 at the Concacaf Gold Cup， the U．S．advanced to its third consecutive final，scoring two early goals before falling 4－2 to Mexico．
The continental tournament would prove to be Bob Bradley＇s last involvement as head coach of the U．S．， with former Germany international and FIFA World Cup winner Jurgen Klinsmann taking the helm of the U．S． Men in August．He earned his first win in Miami against Honduras thanks to a Clint Dempsey strike and later led the team to a 3－2 victory against Slovenia in its last game of the year．
The U－17 and U－20 Men＇s National Teams both entered another cycle of their respective FIFA World Cups．The U－17 Men reached the knockout round for the seventh time but lost to Germany in the Round of 16．After winning their qualifying group with two shutout victories，the U－20s graduated to the quarterfinals but fell to Guatemala and did not reach the World Cup for the first time since 1995.
2012：The U．S．WNT capped off the 2012 London Olympics with a 2－1 victory against Japan in front of more than 80,000 spectators at Wembley Stadium as the U．S．Women earned their fourth Olympic gold－a first for any country on the men＇s and women＇s sides． Carli Lloyd scored both goals for the USA，capping off a tournament that featured a dramatic game－winning goal from 2012 U．S．Soccer Female Athlete of the Year Alex Morgan in the 123 rd minute of the team＇s semifinal victory against Canada．
The U．S．MNT advanced to the final round of 2014 FIFA World Cup Qualifying，defeating Guatemala 3－1 in the final Group A match of the Semifinal Round as Clint Dempsey scored his 29th and 30th career goals to tie Brian McBride for third all－time in U．S．history．The U．S． Men also had some memorable international friendly victories in 2012，including the first win on Mexico＇s home soil－a $1-0$ victory at Estadio Azteca on Aug． 15.

The U．S．U－20 WNT defeated defending champion Germany 1－0 in the 2012 FIFA U－20 Women＇s World Cup in Tokyo．Kealia Ohai scored the game＇s lone goal and the Americans earned their third World Cup crown in the tournament＇s history．The U．S．U－17 WNT competed in the 2012 FIFA U－17 Women＇s World Cup，and in
an extremely rare occurrence did not advance past the group stage despite an unbeaten 1-0-2 record.
2013: U.S. Soccer celebrated its 100th birthday in 2013, marking the occasion with a doubleheader event on June 2 as the U.S. MNT beat Germany 4-3 in an electrifying match in the nation's capital, Washington, D.C. The U.S. WNT also enjoyed victorious celebration as it defeated Canada 2-0 in Toronto in the first match since the dramatic semifinal victory in the 2012 London Olympics.
The MNT accomplished its primary task of qualifying for the 2014 FIFA World Cup, marking the seventhconsecutive time the team has reached the finals. The USA finished in first place for the third straight Concacaf cycle, highlighted by yet another "dos a cero" victory against regional rival Mexico. The team captured its fifth Gold Cup title, winning all six matches en route to the championship. A multitude of team and individual records were broken, a Snow Clasico played out in Denver and a dramatic comeback against Panama punctuated the end of the qualifying campaign.

The U.S. Women's unbeaten 2013 campaign was highlighted by Abby Wambach capturing the international scoring record on June 20 with four goals against Korea Republic at Red Bull Arena. She surpassed Mia Hamm's record of 158 and continues to extend the record, ending the year on 163. The team will look to extend its 39-game unbeaten run in all competitions as it heads into 2014, with head coach Tom Sermanni yet to taste defeat with the USA.

2014: A banner year for U.S. Soccer. Growth is the word that best defined the year as record numbers of fans flocked to stadiums, parks and any available TV to see the U.S. MNT compete at the 2014 FIFA World Cup. Impressive new television and sponsor agreements were signed, allowing U.S. Soccer to invest heavily in its coaching and youth development programs. All the while, the U.S. WNT continued to cement its role as the No. 1 women's program in the world and turning heads in the process.

Early in the year, the U.S. WNT transitioned to the guidance of former interim head coach and long-time assistant Jill Ellis, who led the team to an impressive qualification to the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup in Canada as well as a 17-1-4 record to finish the year. Along the way, team captain Christie Rampone became only the second soccer player in history man or woman - to reach 300 caps for their country. The team also brought in talented youngsters such as midfielder Morgan Brian and defenders Julie Johnston and Crystal Dunn who are pushed for playing time.
The U.S. MNT's year was highlighted by a successful run to the Round of 16 at the 2014 FIFA World Cup in Brazil. Head coach Jurgen Klinsmann guided the team out of the 'Group of Death' on the back of a cathartic win against Ghana and a dramatic draw against the world's No. 1 player Cristiano Ronaldo and Portugal. Despite goalkeeper Tim Howard's heroics - and tournament record 15 saves - against Belgium, the USA exited in the first knockout round. The team and soccer culture in the United States was then stunned by the retirement of the greatest player it had ever produced when Landon Donovan decided to hang up his cleats after playing one final match for his country in an October friendly against Ecuador.

2015: A year of continued evolution for the U.S. Soccer National Teams and Federation as a whole, saw the U.S. WNT claim the most coveted prize in the sport by winning the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup in record breaking fashion vs. Japan. It was a dominant year for the WNT, which also won a final Algarve Cup title early in the year before launching the \#SheBelieves campaign aimed at inspiring fans throughout the world to achieve their dreams and then drawing record TV audiences for its World Cup games that subsequently let to record crowds during its Victory Tour.
The U.S. MNT's high-water mark came in June when the team won back-to-back friendlies on European soil vs. the Netherlands and reigning World Cup champions Germany. The team also saw an injection of youth in its ranks as promising young players climbed the MNT program ladder from a talented U-20 team that made an inspired run to the FIFA U-20 World Cup Quarterfinals up to the U-23 MNT and in the case of defender Matt Miazga the full National Team. Despite undesired results in the semifinals of the Concacaf Gold Cup and Concacaf Cup, the MNT closed out the year with quality results in its first two games of Semifinal Round Qualifying for the 2018 FIFA World Cup in Russia.

2016: Another big year for U.S. Soccer saw its Men's and Women's teams of all age groups find success throughout the year. On the Women's side, the year began with a storming run to the Concacaf Olympic Qualifying tournament title by the senior team, which then won the inaugural \#SheBelieves Cup with victories against European powers England, France and Germany. From there another pair of quality results against rival Japan had the team looking good heading into the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio; however, a bitter Round of 16 exit at the hands of former coach Pia Sundhage and Sweden on penalty kicks after a 1-1 draw left a sour taste. The team finished the year strong, winning its remaining six games while introducing a wealth of young talent.
Additionally, the U-20 WNT made a strong run at the U-20 World Cup, reaching the third-place match.
The Men's National Team had a roller coaster of a year. A must-win World Cup Qualifying match at home to Guatemala saw the USA come good to set the team up for an impressive summer run at the Copa America Centenario, which was hosted in the United States. Despite an opening match loss to Colombia, the U.S. recovered to steam into a semifinal showdown against world power Argentina, where the team was defeated by a sublime performance from five-time FIFA World Player of the Year Lionel Messi. The MNT righted the ship by cruising into the Final Round of 2018 World Cup Qualifying with a pair of high-flying wins. But the year would take a sharp turn once more as defeats to Mexico at home and Costa Rica away sealed the fate of Jurgen Klinsmann as head coach and saw former manager Bruce Arena reinstalled to lead the team in 2017.

2017: The U.S. Women's National Team experienced one of its busiest, most competitive schedules to begin a World Cup and Olympic cycle. The team played seven teams in the top 10 of the FIFA Women's World Rankings on the way to compiling a

12－3－1 record that included an eight－game unbeaten streak to finish the year．The USA hosted two major tournaments in the SheBelieves Cup and the Tournament of Nations，as head coach Jill Ellis used the year for experimentation and player evaluation as more than 50 players were seen in training camps and games while six players earned first caps．
After starting the Final Round of 2018 FIFA World Cup Qualifying with two defeats to end the previous year，the U．S．Men＇s National Team set a different course with the return of Bruce Arena as head coach．
The turnaround began in March when the U．S．picked up eight points via two home wins and two away draws，one against Mexico at the revered Estadio Azteca．With qualifying stabilized，attention shifted to the Concacaf Gold Cup，where the U．S．earned its sixth confederation title when Jordan Morris＇ 88th minute game winner defeated Jamaica in the championship match on July 26.
With a regional crown in hand，the MNT returned to qualifying in September，but faltered with a home defeat to Costa Rica and away draw with Honduras that saw the USA still alive with two qualifying matches left．An impressive 4－0 win against Panama pushed the U．S．to the brink of qualifying for the 2018 World Cup，but needing just a draw on the last matchday at Trinidad \＆Tobago，the side fell 2－1 to the Soca Warriors in Couva，Trinidad．A result that combined with Honduras＇and Panama＇s wins that night knocked the U．S．out of World Cup contention．
Arena resigned on Oct．13，opening the search for a new head coach，and a month later the beginnings of a new－look MNT took its initial step when a young team led by acting head coach Dave Sarachan played defending European champions Portugal to a 1－1 draw．
On the youth side，the U．S．was one of only two nations to see its U－17 and U－20 Men＇s National Teams reach the Quarterfinals of their respective World Cups．The U－17 squad secured its spot at its World Cup with a second－place finish at the Concacaf U－17 Championship．The U－20 MNT qualified for the competition by winning the Concacaf U－20 Championship for the first time in federation history， defeating Honduras on penalties．
Additionally，the Paralympic National Team earned its best finish at a major world competition since the

1996 Paralympic Games with a fifth－place result at the 2017 IFCPF CP Football World Championships in San Luis，Argentina．

2018：The U．S．Women＇s National Team went unbeaten through 20 matches in 11 states and two countries in a year that will go down as one of the most successful in program history．The squad lifted three trophies by winning the SheBelieves Cup，the Tournament of Nations，and the Concacaf Championship．Jill Ellis＇side punched its ticket to the 2019 FIFA Women＇s World Cup in dominant fashion，winning all five qualifiers by a combined score of 26－0．In its penultimate match of the year， the USA captured its 500th all－time victory with a $1-0$ win versus Portugal in Lisbon．
The U．S．Men＇s National Team took on a transitional year in 2018 by facing one of the most challenging schedules in team history．The USA squared off against the likes of Brazil，England，Italy，and Colombia in a gauntlet designed to test a new generation of the red，white，and blue．One of the team＇s best moments came in June，when it drew eventual World Cup champion France，1－1，in Lyon． The USA then hired its first－ever General Manager in Earnie Stewart and new head coach Gregg Berhalter to lead the charge toward the 2022 World Cup．
On the youth side，the U－15 Girls National Team， U－17 Women＇s National Team，and U－20 Men＇s National Team all won Concacaf Championships． The para 7－a－side team qualified for the 2019 IFCPF World Cup with a third－place finish at Copa America．

And in a momentous moment for soccer in the U．S．， the United Bid of Canada，Mexico and the United States，was awarded hosting rights for the 2026 FIFA World Cup．The 2026 competition will be the first to host an expanded field of 48 teams．The three federations will now begin working to build excitement，energy and awareness about the biggest World Cup in history！

## 2018 U.S. Soccer Players of the Year

For their excellence at the highest levels of the sport, U.S. Soccer voters named U.S. Men's National Team goalkeeper Zack Steffen as the 2018 Male Player of the Year, forward Alex Morgan as the 2018 Female Player of the Year, midfielder Alex Mendez as the 2018 Young Male Player of the Year, defender Tierna Davidson as the 2018 Young Female Player of the Year and U.S. Deaf Women's National Team defender Gracie Fitzgerald as the 2018 Player of the Year with a Disability.

The U.S. Soccer Player of the Year awards have a longer history than any major individual award in American soccer - having first begun more than 30 years ago. Alongside the Best of FIFA awards, the U.S. Player of the Year awards are the only awards to honor both the top male and the top female in the sport.

Votes are collected from respective National Team coaches, National Team players who have earned a cap in the applicable calendar year, American soccer league (MLS, USL and NWSL) head coaches, select media members, former players and administrators. Players cannot win the Young Male or Young Female award more than once.

## U．S．SOCCER MALE <br> PLAYER OF THE YEAR <br> Zack STEFFAN

One of 19 MNT players to debut in 2018，Steffen stood out among his fellow first－timers．The 23－year－old led all goalkeepers with six appearances，which tied him with Kasey Keller（1990）and Troy Perkins（2009）for most caps by an MNT backstop during his debut year．Steffen kept clean sheets in the MNT＇s matching 1－0 victories against Paraguay on March 27 in Cary，N．C．and Mexico on Sept． 11 in Nashville，Tenn．His shining moment came against France on June 9 in Lyon， where the rising goalkeeper made eight saves to help the USA to a 1－1 draw in Les Bleus＇last match before their victorious title run at the 2018 FIFA World Cup in Russia．Steffen continued to impress during his second full season with Columbus Crew SC，keeping 10 clean sheets in 29 matches while racking up a 12－10－7 record to earn MLS Goalkeeper of the Year honors and helping the club back to the MLS Cup Playoffs．Like he did in 2017，Steffen came up huge again in the postseason，saving two penalty kicks to push Columbus past D．C．United in their shootout victory during the Knockout Round on Nov． 1.

## Alex MORGAN

In a career of many excellent years，this one was one of Morgan＇s best．She ended 2017 on a roll and kept it going throughout the entirety of 2018，scoring 18 goals in 19 games，far and away the most on the U．S．team，while also picking up three assists．Morgan averaged almost a goal a game in 2018 while scoring against nine different countries．She tallied in the first game of the year against Denmark，and also scored against Mexico，China PR，Japan，Brazil，T\＆T， Jamaica，Canada and Scotland．She had six multiple－goal games，including a hat trick against Japan in the Tournament of Nations，and moved to third place all－time in U．S．history in multiple－goal games，tied with Michelle Akers （26），and behind only Abby Wambach（45）and Mia Hamm（38）．She won the Golden Boot as the top scorer in the Concacaf Women＇s World Cup qualifying tournament，pounding in seven goals over the five matches．Her two goals in the semifinal win against Jamaica helped send the USA to the 2019 FIFA Women＇s World Cup in France and she bagged a clinching goal in the Concacaf championship game against Canada．Her 18 goals were her second－most in a calendar year as she terrorized opponents all year long with her speed running at goal and lethal finishing in the penalty area．She finished the year with 98 career goals．For the Orlando Pride in the NWSL，she played in 1,500 minutes over 19 games and had five goals and two assists．

## Alex MENDEZ

Mendez led the U．S．U－20 MNT to the Concacaf U－20 Championship title， taking home the Golden Ball as the competition＇s top player at just 18－years－ old，and leading the U－20s in minutes played．The attacking midfielder tallied eight goals and added six assists for the USA in the tournament，and while the U－20s had no trouble finding the back of the net in Bradenton，his scoring came
at the team's most crucial junctures: bagging a brace in the championship match against Mexico and netting the opening goal in the World Cup-clinching game vs. Costa Rica. On the year, Mendez appeared in 14 of the U-20s' 15 international matches and will serve as a key figure for the team as it prepares for next summer's 2019 U-20 World Cup in Poland. At the club level, Mendez captained LA Galaxy to the U-18/19 Academy Championship Final and was named to the Development Academy West Conference Best XI. He scored five goals during the team's six-game playoff run, including an incredible free kick from outside the penalty area in a deadlocked semifinal against Vancouver Whitecaps FC to send the Galaxy to the final. Mendez also made his professional debut in 2018, appearing in six games for the United Soccer League's LA Galaxy II and netting his first professional goal on another free kick on July 1. In October, the midfielder signed with German club SC Freiburg, where he'll look to become the latest in a long line of Americans to break out in the Bundesliga.


## U.S. SOCCER YOUNG FEMALE <br> PLAYER OF THE YEAR Tierna DAVIDSON

Davidson attended the U.S. WNT's annual January training camp in Los Angeles, and then at the age of 19, earned her first senior team cap, starting and playing the full 90 minutes in the USA's first match of the year, a 5-1 victory against Denmark in which she picked up the game-winning assist on a goal by Julie Ertz. She then traveled Trinidad \& Tobago to join the U.S. Under-20 Women's National Team for World Cup Qualifying, playing in the 2018 Concacaf Women's U-20 Championship and helping the USA earn a berth to the World Cup while scoring in the title game. After that, the skillful and remarkably-poised lefty firmly established herself with the senior side, playing 1,049 minutes while starting all 12 games in which she played this year, mostly at center back but with some action at left back. Her second, third and fourth caps were serious tests that she passed with honors as she played every minute of the 2018 SheBelieves Cup, against Germany, France and England. Davidson played 90 minutes against Mexico on April 5 and when she came out of the game in the 60th minute on April 8 against Mexico, it was the first time she left the field for the WNT all year. She scored her first career goal on Aug. 31 against Chile on a header from a Tobin
 Heath corner kick. After helping lead Stanford to an NCAA title last season, the 5 -foot-10 Davidson kicked off her junior season this year and scored on a diving header vs. UC Davis in the opener, but in just her third game on Sept. 9, she fell victim to a bad tackle which broke her ankle and she has not played since as she continues to rehabilitate. Now 20-years-old, she was the third teenager since 2013 to earn a first cap for the WNT. Mallory Pugh (17 in 2016) and Lindsey Horan (19 in 2013) are the most recent teenagers to debut for the senior squad.

## U.S. SOCCER PLAYER OF THE YEAR WITH A DISABILITY Gracie FITZGERALD

Gracie Fitzgerald joined the U.S. DWNT as a defender in 2015. Now 19, her stellar performances, which included a goal against Great Britain during the most dominant Deaf World Cup run in U.S. DWNT's history earned her a place on the Best XI All-World Cup Team. She also recently completed a spectacular sophomore season, starting in the back for No. 4-ranked Centre College, which made a good run to the NCAA Div. III third round where the team fell to No. 15 Wheaton College, 2-1, to finish their season with a 21-1 record. She tallied two goals in the Southern Athletic Association playoffs with a beautiful headed goal in the Final.

## 2014 BEST OF U.S. SOCCER AWARDS

Ten of the best and most meaningful moments throughout 2014 were selected for special mention during U.S. Soccer's Best Of Week that ran from Dec. 15-19. The 10 best moments in U.S. Soccer over the course of 2014 included:

- The U.S. MNT's thrilling 2-1 win against Ghana that secured a vital three points to begin the team's escape from the 'Group of Death' at the 2014 FIFA World Cup.
- Meghan Klingenberg's long-distance golazo against Haiti during Women's World Cup Qualifying was an audacious and timely way for the defender to score her first goal for the U.S. WNT.
- Jermain Jone's thunderous game-tying strike nearly 30 yards from goal against Portugal that sent the USA on its way to collecting the vital point it ultimately needed to advance to the knockout round at the 2014 FIFA World Cup.
- The U.S. WNT booked its place at the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup by rolling through the Concacaf qualifying tournament with a $6-0-0$ record, 21 goals scored, 0 conceded and a clean sweep of the competition's individual awards.
- Fabian Jonshon's picturesque strike against Turkey in the USA's second Send-Off Series game was one of the U.S. MNT's most well-crafted goals the team produced in a year of memorable tallies.
- A rarity among professional athletes across all sports, U.S. WNT captain Christie Rampone was honored for her enduring professionalism and longevity at the highest level of soccer when she made her 300th appearance for her country against Mexico during Women's World Cup Qualifying, becoming just the second soccer player in history man or woman - to achieve the feat.
- The torch was passed on to the next generation of the U.S. MNT as three pillars of the team's unparalleled success over the last decade all announced their retirement: DaMarcus Beasley, Carlos Bocanegra and Landon Donovan.
- With his team approaching its final group game at the 2014 FIFA World Cup, U.S. MNT head coach Jurgen Klinsmann wrote a letter asking that fans be released from work in order to cheer on the USA against Germany. His words went viral on the internet, spawning numerous positive responses from bosses, celebrities and politicians as well as more than a few copy cats.
- U.S. MNT goalkeeper Tim Howard turned in a larger-than-life performance in the USA's Round of 16, overtime defeat to Belgium at the 2014 FIFA World Cup, making a tournament-record 16 saves and cementing his legacy among soccer fans as first goalkeeper to become the "\#Secretaryof Defense."

- U.S. Soccer enjoyed a record year of fan support and interaction, from the thousands that followed the U.S. MNT to Brazil for the 2014 FIFA World Cup to the ever-present U.S. WNT fans that cheered on the team as it qualified for the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup. An assuredly giant leap was made by U.S. Soccer with the help of its fans and partners in 2014, one that has raised the bar higher than ever before in the United States.


## BEST OF U.S. SOCCER \#100YEARS EDITION WINNER

In 2013, U.S. Soccer provided fans with the opportunity to determine the top moment of the Federation's history. Set up as a bracket-style competition that pits the top moments across U.S. Soccer's 100-year history head-to-head, fans voted daily to determine their favorite moment of all-time.

Abby Wambach's dramatic and stunning goal against Brazil in the 2011 FIFA Women's World Cup quarterfinal defeated all challengers to win the Best of U.S. Soccer: \#100Years Edition. More than 10,000 fans voted on the final matchup to crown Wambach the winner, while more than 210,000 votes were cast overall.

Wambach's stoppage-time score that pulled the USA even at 2-2 at the very end of overtime in a match that the USA eventually won in penalty kicks, triumphed in all six of its matchups during the 64-moment bracket-style competition. In the final round, Wambach's 122nd-minute header off a cross from Megan Rapinoe - which at the time was the latest goal ever scored in a FIFA competition - edged Landon Donovan's historic strike in the waning seconds of the USA's last match of group play against Algeria at the 2010 FIFA World Cup in South Africa.

## 2019 MEDIA GUIDELINES

Thank you for your coverage of U.S. Soccer and the U.S. National Teams. Please familiarize yourself with the information and policies in this document so that your coverage of the U.S. National Teams is conducted in the most efficient manner possible. These guidelines and policies are enforced by the U.S. Soccer Communications Department. If you have questions about the policies listed here, please do not hesitate to contact U.S. Soccer Communications at communications@ussoccer.org or 312-808-1300.

## GENERAL GUIDELINES

## Professional Conduct

Media are expected to follow the guidelines set forth in this document, as well as the instructions of U.S. Soccer staff, stadium employees and security, at the risk of limitation of access or revocation of credentials.

Media credentials are issued with the purpose of providing access to interviews and written, audio and visual accounts of the game as appropriate. Media members should not use access for autographs, personal photographs or commercial requests.

Media credentialed for access to shoot photographs and video are expected to use professional equipment to file photographic or video accounts. Use of equipment such as 'point and shoot' style cameras or mobile telephones that are not considered professional equipment will result in access being restricted or rescinded.

## Media Services

Press Releases: To be added to the U.S. Soccer media distribution list, please send an email request to communications@ussoccer.org.

Media Guides: To request a current media guide for the U.S. Men's or Women's National Team, please send an email request to communications@ussoccer.org. A digital version of the Men's and Women's National Team's media guides can be found on the Media Guide page in the right-hand navigation column.

Interview Requests: Media requesting interviews with U.S. National Team players, coaches or administrators should make arrangements with the U.S. Soccer Communications Department or the onsite press officer with the respective team. When requesting and conducting interviews, media should identify the organization that they are representing, and provide advance notice if audio or video will be recorded for later distribution. All audio and video interviews are subject to U.S. Soccer's Video Guidelines, which are included in this document.
ussoccer.com: Is the official web site of the U.S. Soccer Federation. All press releases - content that includes a dateline are posted on ussoccer.com, and can be republished by media in their entirety. U.S. Soccer press releases are available in Spanish. Media interested in receiving press releases in Spanish can send an email request to communications@ussoccer.org.

Video: Media are welcome to embed videos that appear on ussoccer.com. Visityoutube.com/ ussoccerdotcom and http://www.ussoccer.com/stories for the latest U.S. Soccer-produced videos.

Audio, Video Roll \& Interviews: U.S. Soccer periodically sends out video and audio media rolls from National Team events for outlets to use free of charge, provided they properly credit video as; Courtesy of U.S. Soccer/Wazee Digital. If you'd like to sign up for the email list that distributes these media rolls, please email communications@ussoccer.org with Media Roll in the subject line.

Twitter: U.S. Soccer provides updates at www.twitter.com/ussoccer that include breaking news and new content posted to ussoccer.com. Media are welcome to re-tweet @ussoccer, @ussoccer_mnt, @ussoccer_wnt, @ussoccer_esp, @ussoccer_ynt, @ussoccer_acad, @ussoccer_coach, @ussoccer_ref, and @ussoccer_pnt content, including play-by-play accounts.

## U.S. SOCCER EVENTS

## Credentials

Policies: In addition to the policies listed below, please note that only working media will be credentialed and no one under the age of 18 will be issued a credential.

Applications: Media can request credentials for matches online at https://www.ussoccer.com/about/us-soccer-media-services/credentials. The online application process can be found by clicking on the Media Services link in the footer on the front page of ussoccer.com. Media can also contact U.S. Soccer Communications with questions on the application process directly by phone at 312-808-1300 or e-mail communications@ ussoccer.org.

Deadlines: The deadline to apply for credentials to U.S. Soccer events is generally two (2) weeks prior to the game. There is no guarantee that late applications will be accepted.

Pickup: U.S. Soccer will distribute credential pickup times prior to each game. Credential pickup times generally coincide with media availabilities. For pickup on the day of the game, Media Will Call at the stadium will open approximately two (2) hours before kickoff for WNT matches and three (3) hours for MNT matches. Each media member must show identification in order to receive their credential. An individual cannot pick up more than one credential.

Parking Shipping: If you would like single-game parking passes (subject to availability) to be shipped, please provide a UPS or FedEx account number at least two (2) weeks prior to the game. Replacement parking passes cannot be provided if lost in transit.

All Matches Credential Holders: All media provided an All Matches credential must still inform the U.S. Soccer Communications Department of their plans to attend specific matches to ensure a space in the press box. Please do so at least two (2) weeks in advance of a match.

## Media Facilities

Media facilities, including the press box and photographers' work area, will open approximately two (2) - three (3) hours before each game.

Press Box: All seats will be assigned. Auxiliary seating arrangements will be made if the capacity of the press box is exceeded.

Photographer Work Room: Where available, a photographer work room will be available at field level.
Internet: Wireless Internet access will be provided to media filing on deadline.
Game Notes \& Media Guides: Game notes will be placed at each seat and also on a table near the press box entrance. Media guides will be made available upon request and digital versions are available online at ussoccer.com/about/us-soccer-media-services.

Lineups: Official lineups are made available approximately one (1) hour prior to kickoff. Lineups, which include jersey numbers for each team, will be distributed to the media as quickly as possible.

## Media Access / Interviews

There is no pre-game access to U.S. Soccer players and coaches on game days. No "flash" interviews are permitted on the field. All post-game access is available in the press conference and mixed zone.

Press Conference: There will be a formal press conference with the head coach shortly after the final whistle. In the event something changes a member of the U.S. Soccer communications staff will inform the media.

Mixed Zone: Locker rooms are not open to the media at U.S. Soccer events. All post-game interviews will be conducted in a press conference or mixed zone. Players from both teams will typically be available in the mixed zone. The media mixed zone will generally be near the locker rooms.

## Print \& Online Media

Live Blogging / Commentary: Live blogging of U.S. Soccer events from either the venue or via the television broadcast is subject to our Live Blogging Guidelines. The guidelines are included in Appendix II of this document.

Video: Please notify U.S. Soccer in advance if your coverage includes video recording. Any video footage, including interviews, gathered by print and online media is subject to the U.S. Soccer Video Guidelines. The Video Guidelines are included in Appendix I of this document.

Audio: Please notify U.S. Soccer in advance if your coverage includes audio recording. Any audio, including interviews, gathered by radio, print and online media is subject to the U.S. Soccer Audio Use Guidelines. The guidelines are included in Appendix III of this document.

## Radio - Non Rights Holders

Non-rights-holding radio journalists are welcome to conduct pregame and postgame reports from the press box, but NO play-by-play reports are permitted. Radio non-rights-holders will have access to post-match press conference and mixed zones unless otherwise notified. Radio outlets interested in purchasing rights should contact U.S. Soccer at 312-808-1300.

Audio: Any audio, including interviews, gathered by radio, print and online media is subject to the U.S. Soccer Audio Use Guidelines. The guidelines are included in Appendix III of this document.

## Field Access

Print, online and radio writers and reporters are not permitted on the field at any time. Media members granted field access must have a working purpose. Representatives from the broadcast media who are not filing reports, but would like to attend as an observer, should inform U.S. Soccer of such when making the application.

## Still Photographers

Locations: Still photographers are permitted to shoot U.S. Soccer events from behind the field sign boards in either end line. At events where space allows, photographers may also shoot on the sideline opposite the benches between the end line and the 18 -yard line. Shooting from the 18 -yard line will be allowed on a match-by-match basis depending on space. The attacking direction of the teams is determined by a coin toss. Following the coin toss, photographers must pick one end of the field to shoot for the entire half. The ONLY time photographers may change ends is at halftime. At NO time are photographers allowed on the field of play.

Photo Marshals: U.S. Soccer will use photo marshals to assist on-field media. Photo marshals can assist with providing lineups/rosters, distributing bibs and assist with questions on location and other topics. Photographers are required to follow all instructions of the photo marshals.

Bibs: All still photographers are required to wear a colored bib as provided by U.S. Soccer. The bib is lightweight and designed to be worn outside of outerwear and be visible at all times. Please return the bibs to a photo marshal following the game, or leave them in the press box / photographers' work room.

Pre-Game Photos: Each team's starters will pose for a pre-game photo near the bench area following the national anthems. Photographers should gather in the near-side corners once the teams leave the field after warm-ups. U.S. Soccer will escort the photographers to midfield.

Field Watering: The grounds crew may water the field prior to warm-ups and also prior to kickoff. Please be responsible for your equipment during this time. U.S. Soccer is not responsible for damage to any equipment.

## Non-Rights Holder Video (ENG)

Video Footage: All non-rights holders and ENG crews must follow the U.S. Soccer Video Guidelines for all footage gathered at events. The Video Guidelines are included in Appendix I of this document.

TV Reporters: ENG reporters may stay on the field until two (2) hours prior to kickoff to shoot 'scene sets,' and are not allowed on the field again until after the conclusion of the broadcast window. Reporters/anchors will not be issued a bib. U.S. Soccer will not generally credential non-rights holder producers, editors, or technicians.

Location: ENG cameras are permitted to shoot U.S. Soccer events from behind the field sign boards of either end line. The attacking direction of the teams is determined by a coin toss. Following the coin toss, ENG cameras must pick one end of the field to shoot for the entire half. The ONLY time ENG crews may change ends is at halftime. At NO time are any media members allowed on the field of play.

Photo Marshals: U.S. Soccer will use photo marshals to assist on-field media. Photo marshals can assist with providing lineups/rosters, distributing bibs and assist with questions on location and other topics. ENG crews are required to follow all instructions of the photo marshals.

Bibs: All ENG camera operators are required to wear a colored bib as provided by U.S. Soccer. The bib is lightweight and designed to be worn outside of outerwear and be visible at all times. Please return the bibs to a photo marshal following the game, or leave them in the press box / photographers' work room.

Field Watering: The grounds crew may water the field prior to warm-ups and also prior to kickoff. Please be responsible for your equipment during this time. U.S. Soccer is not responsible for damage to any equipment.

Live Newscasts: Please contact U.S. Soccer in advance of the event if you would like to broadcast live pre or post-game as part of a newscast from the stadium.

## Social Media

U.S. Soccer will not generally credential media looking to cover a U.S. Soccer event only for social media purposes. This means someone looking to provide coverage of a match for social media sites not limited or restricted to; Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc., will be considered for a press credential on a case basis but in most cases will not be accommodated for a press credential.

Social Media Reporting: U.S. Soccer permits credentialed reporters to report on behalf of their media organizations through social media channels or personal accounts. U.S. Soccer permits pictures to be taken from the press box for social media reporting purposes but prohibits the collection of any type of video from the press box. Doing so may result in revocation of press credentials.

## APPENDIX I: NON-RIGHTS HOLDER VIDEO GUIDELINES

Video Footage: All rights to match footage including all applicable copyrights belong to U.S. Soccer and its rights holders who broadcast each specific match. U.S. Soccer has three rights holders that will broadcast their Men's National Team and Women's National Team matches in 2019: ESPN, FOX Sports and Univision. If an organization is interested in recording video footage at a U.S. Soccer match for non-news gathering purposes they should contact U.S. Soccer Communications at communications@ussoccer.org.

## Television Broadcasters

Game Action: Television broadcasters can use footage of U.S. Soccer events obtained either via 1) their own recording or 2 ) action dubbed from a U.S. Soccer rights holder broadcast with credit only in connection with its regularly scheduled news programming within a week of the game. This footage should not exceed two (2) minutes. Highlights aired as part of a continuous news program should not be longer than one (1) minute per 30-minute segment.

Filming - Game Action: For televised events, non-rights holders / ENG cameras may record the first 15 minutes of each half (from 00:00 to 15:00 and 45:00 to 60:00 on the game clock). For non-televised events, non-rights holders / ENG cameras may record the entire game but are still subject to the aforementioned limits. This includes events that are web streamed live online.

Filming - Interviews and Scene Sets: There is no limit to the gathering of footage pre-game, at halftime and post-game. All footage gathered is subject to the usage guidelines indicated in this document.

Filming - In Seating Area: Video cameras looking to shoot in the concourse or seating area must contact U.S. Soccer in advance of the event for approval.

Previews or Advances: In advance of a U.S. Soccer event, television broadcasters can use two (2) minutes of archival game action to preview an upcoming event. In the local/regional markets, broadcasters should mention the time and location of the game along with their report. Outside of the local markets, broadcasters should mention the time and broadcast information.

Television Broadcasters' Web Sites: Video produced for air as part of regular programming that is simulcast or archived online must be accompanied by a link to ussoccer.com. Content produced exclusively for the Internet is subject to the guidelines for Online Video.
U.S. Soccer Video Dept. Audio and Video Roll: U.S. Soccer periodically sends out video and audio media rolls from National Team events for outlets to use free of charge, provided they properly credit video as; Courtesy of U.S. Soccer/Wazee Digital. If you'd like to sign up for the email list that distributes these media rolls, please email communications@ussoccer.org with Media Roll in the subject line.

## Online Video

Game Action: Online organizations (including print publications that post video online) are not permitted to film or use game action video at any time. Game action includes any footage of the field, teams, etc., following the beginning of the television broadcast window. Only video of off-field activities (i.e. interviews, training sessions) may be recorded.

Non-Game Video: Any video posted online that is recorded as part of media access is limited to the use of eight (8) minutes per day/activity date. Online video may not incorporate integrated advertising and must be accompanied by links to ussoccer.com.

Professional Presentation: Online video is expected to be recorded, edited and presented in a professional manner. Video must be presented/hosted on an organization's website, and not solely on a site provided by a third-party (i.e. YouTube, Vimeo, Facebook, etc.).

Online Video Sites: Organizations who regularly post video to online video sites (i.e. YouTube, Vimeo, etc.) may not include advertising with video gathered as a result of media access. Allowing users to embed these videos is not permitted, and the description of any video must include a link to ussoccer.com.

## APPENDIX III: NON-RIGHTS HOLDER AUDIO GUIDELINES <br> Radio Broadcasters

Play-by-Play Accounts: Play-by-play accounts are forbidden by non-rights holders at any time.
Non-Game Audio: Any online audio recorded as part of media access is limited to the use of eight (8) minutes per day/activity date. Audio posted on radio broadcaster websites must comply with Online Guidelines below.

## Online

Non-Game Audio: Any audio recorded as part of media access is limited to the use of eight (8) minutes per day/activity date. Online audio may not incorporate integrated advertising and must be accompanied by links to ussoccer.com.

## APPENDIX III: LIVE WRITTEN UPDATES

## All Media

Online or text reports (i.e., live blogs, Twitter, etc.) concerning U.S. Soccer games while they are in progress ("Live Written Updates") are subject to the following:

- Live updates may not use any audio, video or graphic simulations of U.S. Soccer games.
- Live updates must provide television and radio broadcast information for that U.S. Soccer Game. For example: "Tonight's U.S. Soccer game is being broadcast live on (name of television/radio station)."
- All live updates must be free of charge to readers.

NOTE: This policy does not prohibit the posting of the facts of a game (i.e., goals scored, cards given, game score and time remaining).

#### Abstract

Following the end of the last World Cup/Olympic cycle, U.S. Women's National Team head coach Jill Ellis made it clear that the coming years would be a time of change. That meant doing her due diligence on the player pool, giving opportunities for newer players to earn roster spots and challenging veterans to show they could continue to make an impact on the road to the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup in France.


Since the end of the 2016 Olympics, Ellis has used 46 players in matches and has seen 61 different players in a WNT training camp environment. During her time at the helm, Ellis has given 28 players their first caps, 25 after the 2015 Women's World Cup.

The year after the end of a World Cup and Olympic cycle has traditionally seen a decrease in activity for the WNT, but that was not the case in 2017, which was truly a year of opportunity, learning and growth. The USA played seven of the other top nine teams in the world and hosted two major international tournaments: the SheBelieves Cup and the Tournament of Nations. The total of 16 matches was the most played in the year after a cycle since 1997, when the USA was gearing up to host the 1999 Women's World Cup.

In 2018, the group of players that emerged from the tests of 2017 put together a spectacular year on the field as the USA went unbeaten at 18-0-2. The USA won the SheBelieves Cup, the Tournament of Nations and rolled through the Concacaf Women's World Cup qualifying tournament, winning all five games by a 26-0 margin, to qualify for France.

In 2019, the core group of players will focus on continuing to gel as some of the younger players continue to gain experience and improve the team's depth, all with the goal of peaking this summer at the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup. Of course, many of the veterans who helped the USA to so much success over the past few years will be a major part of the team moving forward, but Ellis has made it clear that "if you are standing still, you are falling behind," and will continue to evaluate players while focusing on developing relationships on the field as she and her staff work to formulate a best World Cup roster and starting XI for France. This much is clear: despite once again maintaining the top spot in the FIFA Women's World Cup rankings for the entire year, the U.S. team is working hard to evolve and improve in the increasingly competitive arena of women's international soccer.

## COUNTDOWN TO THE CUP

The USA's schedule in 2019 will be busy and challenging with U.S. Soccer announcing in December of 2018 the "Countdown to the Cup," a 10-game tour leading into the Women's World Cup that will take the USA to Europe for two games at the start of the year before staging eight domestic matches through all four times zones in the continental USA. Those games will give fans across the country a chance to cheer the team on to France while providing excellent tests during the final World Cup preparations.

The annual January training camp will for the first time be staged in Europe, with the USA conducting a "pre-season" training camp in the familiar Algarve region on the southern coast of Portugal before traveling to face World Cup hosts France in Le Havre and then up-andcoming Spain in Alicante. In late February and early March, the USA will host the fourth annual SheBelieves Cup which features four of the top women's National Teams in the world when England, Japan and Brazil play three doubleheaders across three venues. The U.S. players will then head to their pro clubs in the spring, but the USA will play five friendlies before departing
for France. In early April, the USA will take on Australia in Colorado and then face Belgium for the first time in a game that will be staged in Los Angeles. In May, the USA will play its threegame "Send-Off Series," taking on South Africa in Santa Clara, Calif., New Zealand in St. Louis and a final match against Mexico in Harrison, N.J. before the World Cup squad boards the plane to France.

## TALENT, DEPTH HIGHLIGHTS 2019 FOR USWNT

While a solid core of veterans who played in the most recent Women's World Cup and Olympics will lead the USA towards 2019, there have been some new faces in the U.S. team which have invigorated the roster and added valuable depth. Ellis and her staff are relishing the challenge of putting together the best team and lineup possible.

As usual on the U.S. WNT, the selection of rosters for camps and games is a difficult proposition, but Ellis and her staff like it that way. It means the competition within the squad is increasing, and Ellis has stated that performance - not past accomplishments - will dictate who earns those coveted spots on the World Cup roster.

At the end of 2014, the U.S. Women dropped from the top spot in the FIFA Women's World Rankings, a position it had held for seven years, to second, but regained the \#1 spot in July of 2015 and has kept it ever since, meaning the USA heads into the new year once again as the world's top ranked team. Over the past 15 years, since the end of the 2003 FIFA Women's World Cup through the end of 2018, the U.S. team has lost just 17 matches in regulation. The American women will look to build on the tradition that has made the USA one of the most successful women's soccer nations in history, winning four Olympic gold medals and three Women's World Cup tournaments, as they focus on achieving success at the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup in France. The USA will face Thailand, Chile and Sweden in Group F play in what promises to be a spectacular tournament on and off the field. The match against the Swedes marks the sixth meeting between the teams in a World Cup tournament and the fifth consecutive World Cup in which the two countries have played each other.

## ROSTER SPOTS UP FOR GRABS

The U.S. player pool is as deep as ever, but the challenge of blending together the best mix of young talent and experienced veterans is one that many coaches face. The USA will of course rely extensively on some of the players that featured in the most recent World Cup and Olympics tournaments, but there has been an exciting infusion of new players coming into the squad.

In goal, ALYSSA NAEHER, who played in 28 matches over 2017 and 2018, has proven herself as the starter, but ASHLYN HARRIS and ADRIANNA FRANCH have continued to push for playing time. Harris has extensive WNT experience, while Franch, the two-time reigning NWSL Goalkeeper of the Year, has played very well in helping the Portland Thorns remain among the league's elite while solidifying a consistent spot on WNT rosters. JANE CAMPBELL, who has established herself as the starter for the Houston Dash, also earned several call-ups in 2018.

The U.S. team defense, led by a stingy back line, has proven tough to break down over the past few years. The USA's central defense has long featured BECKY SAUERBRUNN, now one of the most experienced defenders in the world, and the rise of ABBY DAHLKEMPER and TIERNA DAVIDSON has given the USA exceptional options in the middle of defense. Dahlkemper has used the NWSL to show her talents and then did extremely well to take advantage of her opportunities with the WNT, while Davidson had an excellent first year with the U.S. team in 2018 and was taken as the top pick in the 2019 NWSL Draft by the Chicago Red Stars. The increased experience for Davidson, who led Stanford to the NCAA title in 2017, and Dahlkemper, a key player on the Western New York side that won the 2016 NWSL title and the North Carolina Courage team that won the league in 2018, has added valuable depth for the USA at center
back. EMILY SONNETT, the first pick in the 2016 NWSL Draft by the Portland Thorns and a vital part of their run to the title in 2017, has played mostly outside back for the USA but plays centrally in the NWSL so she is an option in the middle for the National Team as well.

KELLEY O'HARA, the 2015 Women's World Cup hero who was a starting outside back in the 2012 and 2016 Olympics, has continued to display her fitness, grit, versatility (she can play on either flank) and experience. The former forward has also proved valuable to the USA in the attacking third. The speedy CRYSTAL DUNN returned to the defense in the spring of 2018 and has shown herself to be top choice at left back while also displaying tremendous attacking talents that come from many games played for college, club and country in the midfield or at forward. Davidson has also played at outside back at times and has looked comfortable there as well.

CASEY SHORT, who had a breakout year at outside back in 2017, was hampered by injuries in 2018, but has shown ability as a defender who is very difficult to beat on the flanks. At the end of 2018, EMILY FOX, a rising junior at the University of North Carolina and a veteran of the last two U-20 Women's World Cup Teams for the USA, earned her first senior team caps and has shown qualities that bode well for the future.

One of the main positives that occurred over 2017 and 2018 was the evolution and increased depth in the center midfield positions. Of course, that was helped by the transition of JULIE ERTZ, whose move from the back to defensive midfielder was one of the best stories of 2017. While Ertz has always had world class ball-winning abilities, she has also scored 10 goals over the past two years as she has developed into one of the USA's most important players.

LINDSEY HORAN, the first American female to skip college and turn pro, has had an excellent run for club and country over the past two years while settling into an impactful midfield role. With six professional seasons already on her resume at the age of 24 , Horan has shown why she could be an important player in France. ROSE LAVELLE, the top pick in the 2017 NWSL Draft has been limited by injuries since her stellar WNT debut at the 2017 SheBelieves Cup but rebounded to display her unique talents in 2018. A healthy Lavelle will add a huge dose of skill and craft to the U.S. midfield.

Six-foot SAMANTHA MEWIS was one of the breakout stories of 2017, starting every game and finishing second on the team in minutes played while almost doubling her career caps and goals. A knee injury limited her in 2018, but she came on strong at the end of the year and gives the USA another versatile option in the middle.

Even more midfield depth is added by MORGAN BRIAN, the youngest player on the 2015 WWC Team, who has amassed more than 80 caps by the age of 25 ; ANDI SULLIVAN, who worked hard to come back from a knee injury to work her way onto several rosters in 2018, and DANIELLE COLAPRICO, who has used several fine seasons with the Chicago Red Stars to earn several callups last year.

McCALL ZERBONI is one of the best stories in the deepening of the player pool. The oldest player to earn a debut senior team cap, she has long been one of the top midfielders in the NWSL and used her combination of skills, leadership and work ethic to earn minutes in 2018 despite having to rebound from a serious elbow injury suffered in her first WNT start. ALLIE LONG, who had a breakout year in 2016 at defensive midfield and ended up starting three matches at the Olympics in her first world championship, gives the USA an experienced presence with solid ball-winning ability and passing skill.

The USA is also deep up top with both flank players and center forwards. After being named the U.S. Soccer Female Player of the Year in 2016, TOBIN HEATH played in just four matches in 2017 due to injuries but rebounded to have a stellar end to 2018. An in-form Heath will go a long way towards U.S. success in 2019. MEGAN RAPINOE has been playing some of the best and most effective soccer of her career. Since fully recovering from an ACL injury suffered at the end of 2015, the USA has seen Rapinoe repeatedly involved in goal scoring sequences as the finisher or the provider.

MALLORY PUGH, who will turn 21 in the spring of 2019, has continued to show her pedigree as a dynamic and world class attacking player, while veteran CHRISTEN PRESS has consistently used her ability to get behind defenses and create danger, giving the USA enviable options on the forward line.

ALEX MORGAN has been in some of the best goal-scoring form of her career, finding the net consistently for the last year-and-a-half since she returned from helping Olympique Lyonnaise win the treble in France. Long one of the most dangerous players in the world running at goal and inside the penalty area, Morgan has moved into seventh place on the USA's all-time scoring list and is just a few goals away from hitting 100 for her career.

Veteran CARLI LLOYD, who has deployed more as forward of late, scored her 100th career goal in 2018 and only four players in U.S. history have scored more times. Having the veteran Lloyd, who has scored 69 of her goals after the age of 30 , as an option up top or in the midfield gives the USA even more pieces to work with in the attacking third.

JESSICA McDONALD, a veteran of six different NWSL clubs, who has been an important piece of the recent success of the North Carolina Courage, worked her way into WNT camps at the end of 2018, scoring the game-winning goal against Portugal in her first start. The tall and fast McDonald, who is one of the top scorers in NWSL history, gives the USA another powerful option on the forward line.

It is clear the USA has the foundation and talent to make a run at another World Cup title, but as is the case every year, the competition is constantly improving, and every team always gives the Americans their best game. Fortunately, those are the kind of challenges the U.S. players relish as they look to continue expanding their national popularity while enhancing the profile of the women's game at home and abroad.


Jill ELLIS
U.S. Women's National Team Head Coach Born: Sept. 6, 1966, in Folkestone, England Hometown: Miami

Jill Ellis was named the eighth head coach in U.S. Women's National Team history on May 16, 2014. Just a little under 13 months later, she led the USA to the championship of the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup.

Ellis' 2015 Women's World Cup Team navigated the most difficult Women's World Cup tournament to date as 24 teams competed to play the seven matches it would take to win the competition, all on artificial turf. The team won six of those games, five by shutout, while tying Sweden in group play and allowed just three total goals. Ellis and her staff made several key tactical adjustments in the knockout rounds to help the U.S. make the Final, where it set numerous records in defeating Japan, 5-2, to win the USA's first World Cup title in 16 years.

At the end of 2015, along with a slew of other honors, Ellis was named the Concacaf Female Coach of the Year and the FIFA World Coach of the Year for Women's Soccer, marking the first time an American had been bestowed with that honor. She was also named the Concacaf Female Coach of the Year. During 2015, the USA went 20-2-4 and also won the prestigious Algarve Cup in Portugal.

During her tenure and through the end of 2018, Ellis had called up 79 players to take part in at least one training camp. Of those 79 players, 56 have earned at least one cap and she has also given 28 players their first caps, 25 after the 2015 Women's World Cup.

In 2018, she coached in her 100th game for the USA, making her the fourth U.S. WNT head coach to reach that mark. Heading into 2019 with a record of $88-6-16$, Ellis was third in all-time wins and third in all-time games coached, moving her to within reach of the two coaches ahead of her on both lists.

Ellis guided the U.S. team through an unbeaten campaign in 2018 with an 18-0-2 record, marking only the fourth time in program history that the USA finished a calendar year without a defeat when it played 10 or more games. The USA went 5-0-2 against teams ranked in the top-10 in the world. The USA won the SheBelieves Cup, the Tournament of Nations and the Concacaf Women's Championship, rolling to a 5-0-0 record in the World Cup qualifying tournament while outscoring its opponents, 26-0. She earned her 75 th career win on April 8 vs. Mexico.

Ellis led the USA to a 12-3-1 record in 2017 while playing the most challenging schedule in U.S. WNT history during a year after the World Cup/Olympic cycle, which was exactly how she had planned it. The USA hosted two elite international tournaments - the SheBelieves Cup and for the first time, the Tournament of Nations - while playing seven of the other top-nine teams in the world. The USA maintained its FIFA top-ranking and lost just once in the final 13 games of the year while scoring 2.5 goals a game against stiff competition. In 2017 Ellis gave numerous players opportunities as she saw 44 players in training camps, 30 players in game action and gave six players their first caps.

In 2016, Ellis led the USA to 22-0-3 record, marking just the third time the USA had gone unbeaten in regulation time in a year in which it had played 10 or more matches. The USA hosted the inaugural SheBelieves Cup in March, winning the tournament that featured four of the top teams in the world in the USA, German, France and England. The USA earned 17 shutouts during the year and gave up more than one goal in a game just twice, but a penalty kick loss to Sweden in the quarterfinal of the 2016 Olympics (a match in which the USA had a 27-6 shot margin) ended the USA's gold medal aspirations. She earned her 50th career win on July 22, 2016 in a 4-0 victory against Costa Rica.

Ellis took the position as U.S. Women's National Team head coach after serving as Development Director for the U.S. Women's National Teams since January of 2011.

The appointment of Ellis and April Heinrichs to the youth development positions in 2011 marked the first time U.S. Soccer had named full-time coaches to oversee the women's youth national team program and the programs' overall development.

Prior to becoming head coach of the U.S. WNT, Ellis twice served as interim head coach for the team. The first time was for a seven-game stint (5-0-2) in 2012 after Pia Sundhage left the program and before the hiring of Tom Sermanni, and then again in 2014 for two matches (1-0-1) after Sermanni was relieved of his duties and before she was officially named the head coach.

Prior to being named head coach, Ellis accrued extensive experience in the U.S. Women's National Team programs having served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's National Team under Sundhage and helped the team to a gold medal at the 2008 Olympics. Ellis has served two stints as head coach of the U.S. Under-20 Women's National Team, guiding the squad to the Concacaf title in 2010 and to the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in Germany.

She joined the full Women's National Team staff in January of 2008 after leaving her post with the U.S. U-20s, which she had led the since the start of 2007.

Ellis has also had two stints as the head coach of the U.S. Under-21 Women's National Team, the second starting in the middle of 2005, after which she guided the team to the Nordic Cup in Sweden. She also coached the U-21s to the Nordic Cup title in Germany in 2000.

Ellis was also a scout for the USA at the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia, and has served as an assistant coach with the U.S. U-21s and U.S. U-16 Girls' National Teams.

Ellis joins U.S. Soccer full-time after a highly successful 12-year run as the head women's soccer coach for the UCLA Bruins. Ellis led UCLA to eight NCAA Final Fours, including seven in a row from 2003-2009, and won six straight conference titles from 2003-2008. She finished her time in Westwood with a record of 229-45-14. Ellis, who was also head coach at the University of Illinois, has an all-time collegiate coaching record of 248-63-14.

She was the 2000 NSCAA National Coach of the Year after leading the Bruins to the NCAA Final in just her second season as head coach.

Ellis arrived in Westwood after heading the University of Illinois women's soccer program for two years. In 1998, she brought the Fighting Illini to a 12-8 record and a first-ever Big-Ten Tournament berth. Prior to coaching at Illinois, Ellis served as an assistant coach at the University of Virginia for one year (1996-97), at Maryland for three years (1994-96) and at North Carolina State for another three years (1988-90). As an assistant coach at North Carolina State, Ellis helped the Wolfpack secure the 1988 ACC title and an NCAA Final Four appearance.

A forward during her playing days at the College of William \& Mary from 1984-87, Ellis was a ThirdTeam All-American in 1987. Ellis gave the graduation commencement speech at her alma mater in May of 2016. In 1984, Ellis helped Braddock Road in Virginia to the Under-19 club national championship.

Ellis grew up in Portsmouth, England and came to the United States in 1981 at the age of 15. She also lived in Singapore for two years while her father helped to develop a national soccer program in that country. She earned her B.A. in English Literature and Composition from the College of William \& Mary in 1988 and currently resides in Miami with her wife Betsy and 13-year-old daughter Lily.

She has a USSF "A" coaching license and at the end of 2017, finished the U.S. Soccer Pro License Course during the second year it has been held. She was the only woman among the 17 coaches in the year-long course and earned another distinction in American soccer history as she became the first woman to complete the course.

Of those 79 players, 56 have earned at least one cap. Ellis has thus far also given 28 players their first caps, 25 after the 2015 Women's World Cup. # Tony GUSTAVSSON <br> U.S. WNT Assistant Coach Born: Aug. 14, 1973, in Sundsvall, Sweden Hometown: Sundsvall, Sweden 



Tony Gustavsson re-joined U.S. Soccer in June of 2014 to work as the top assistant coach with head coach Jill Ellis. Prior to this current position with the U.S. team, Gustavsson was an assistant coach with Pia Sundhage in 2012, helping the team to the Olympic gold medal in front of more than 80,000 fans at Wembley Stadium.

He was a vital part of Ellis' 2015 Women's World Cup Team staff, helping navigate the most difficult Women's World Cup tournament to date as 24 teams competed to play the seven matches it would take to win the competition, all on artificial turf. The team won six of those games, five by shutout, while tying Sweden in group play and allowed just three total goals. The coaching staff made several key tactical adjustments in the knockout rounds to help the U.S. make the final, where it set numerous records in defeating Japan, 5-2, to win the USA's first World Cup title in 16 years.

Gustavsson returned to U.S. Soccer after a highly successful stint as head coach of Tyresö FF in the Damallsvenskan, Sweden's premier women's league. Tyresö was one of the world's top women's professional teams for several seasons and he led the Stockholm-based club to league title in 2012.

With five U.S. Women's National Team players - Christen Press, Whitney Engen, Meghan Klingenberg, and earlier in the tournament, Ali Krieger and Ashlyn Harris -- making major contributions to the 2013/2014 Champions League run, Gustavsson took Tyreso all the way to the 2014 Champions League Final in Lisbon, Portugal, where it fell to Wolfsburg of Germany, 4-3, in a dramatic end-to-end match.

Gustavsson has experience coaching in the top men's professional leagues in both Sweden and Norway as well. He was head coach of Kongsvinger IL in Norway's Tippeligan in 2010 and coached Hammarby IF (where he coached former U.S. international Charlie Davies) in Sweden's Allsvenskan from 20072009. He took Hammarby to the brink of the Europa Cup group stage in 2007 but fell in a tight two-leg series to Braga of Portugal in the first round.

In 2004, he was a player-assistant coach for Degerfors and helped the club win the Second Division in Sweden. In 2005-2006, he became the head coach for the club.

He started his coaching career in 2000 as a player-head coach for Ytterhogdals IK, holding that position for four years, while winning the league in the first year.

Gustavsson spent one semester attending college in the USA at the University of Central Florida in 1994 before finishing his education at Lärarhögskolan in Stockholm from 1995-1999 where he got a teacher's degree in physical education and math. He also received a degree in soccer coaching from the University of Orebro in a two-year program from 2004-2005. He was one of the first coaches in Sweden to receive this degree. While in Florida and prior to attending UCF, he played briefly for the Orlando Lions in the USISL.

Gustavsson also holds a UEFA Pro coaching license.
He has worked as a soccer color commentator for Canal+, one of Sweden's biggest sports networks, and worked matches of the 2010 World Cup in South Africa for Sweden's SVT. He has also done commentary on Sweden National Team matches, Swedish First Division games and La Liga games from Spain.

Gustavsson and Annika have two children, a son Anton, age 17, and a daughter Alva, age 15. When not with the U.S. team, he resides in Stockholm, Sweden.


## Graeme ABEL

## U.S. WNT Assistant Coach Born: Oct. 9, 1980, in Liverpool, England Hometown: Liverpool, England

Graeme Abel joined U.S. head coach Jill Ellis staff as the goalkeeper coach in March of 2015. Abel had worked extensively with the USA's youth Women's National Teams and had previously helped train the senior team goalkeepers in several camps.

He was a vital part of Ellis' 2015 Women's World Cup Team staff, helping navigate the most difficult Women's World Cup tournament to date as 24 teams competed to play the seven matches it would take to win the competition, all on artificial turf. The team won six of those games, five by shutout, while tying Sweden in group play and allowed just three total goals. The coaching staff made several key tactical adjustments in the knockout rounds to help the U.S. make the final, where it set numerous records in defeating Japan, 5-2, to win the USA's first World Cup title in 16 years.

Abel was also on the staff for the 2016 Olympic Games in Brazil and at times continues to work with the USA's youth National Teams. He also served as the goalkeeper coach for the USA at the 2016 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in Papua New Guinea.

Prior to joining U.S. Soccer, Abel had served three seasons as a member of the University of Oklahoma Women's Soccer staff and was promoted to associate head coach during the 2013 offseason.

He returned to Norman in 2012 as an assistant after serving as the OU goalkeeper coach during the 2008 and 2009 seasons. During the 2010 and 2011 campaigns, Abel worked with the current Sooner head coach Matt Potter at Washington State.

Before Oklahoma and Washington State, Abel worked three years as University of Nevada's goalkeepers coach from 2005-2007.

In 2004, Abel started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater Brescia University in Owensboro, Kentucky.

During his youth soccer years, Abel was on the books at Everton FC from 1994-97. He also played with Stockport County FC from 1997-1999 before coming to the USA to attend college at Lindsey Wilson in Colombia, Kentucky. He was a NAIA All-American at Lindsey Wilson and the 1999 NAIA National Tournament MVP, leaving the Blue Raiders to the national championship.

In 2001, he returned to England for a year to half a year at Chester City FC, but then returned to college, this time at Brescia University where he was once again an NAIA All-American and the twotime Kentucky Intercollegiate Athletic Association Player of the Year.

Abel has a USSF "B" Coaching License and NSCAA Advanced National Diploma.
He currently resides in Seattle with his wife Katie and two children, a five-year-old son, Kian, and three-year-old Lila.

## Dawn SCOTT

## U.S. WNT High Performance Coach Born: June 19, 1972, in Newcastle, England Hometown: Newcastle, England



Dawn Scott first worked with the U.S. Women's National Team in January of 2010 and joined Pia Sundhage's staff fulltime the following February. She is widely regarded as one of the foremost fitness and sports science coaches in women's international soccer and has been a part of the U.S. staff for the past two Women's World Cups and two Olympic tournaments. She will oversee the High Performance for the WNT in run up to and through the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup.

Scott came to U.S. Soccer from the English Football Association, where she had worked since 2001 as Head of Exercise Science (women's teams), primarily working with the England Women's National Soccer Teams. Her responsibilities with the U.S. Women include the delivery, coordination and monitoring of the team's strength and conditioning as well as the nutritional, recovery and exercise science strategies for the squad.

Scott also oversees the coordination and integration of sport science with all the NWSL clubs to monitor and develop the physical performance of the National Team players. In addition, Scott has a role in collaborating with Ellie Maybury, the High Performance Coach for the U.S. Youth Women's and Girls' National Teams, in overseeing the sport science strategies for those age group teams.

Scott was a vital part of Ellis' 2015 Women's World Cup Team staff as she prepared the team physically to navigate the most difficult Women's World Cup tournament to date with 24 teams competing to play the seven matches it would take to win the competition, all on artificial turf. The U.S. team got stronger with each match, winning six of those games, five by shutout, while tying Sweden in group play and allowing just three total goals.

Scott has been a key lecturer on a variety of FA courses including The FA Fitness Trainers Award, UEFA "A" License, International License, Youth Coaches, Pro License, Diploma courses, as well as having run courses on behalf of CONCACAF in Trinidad and Tobago, and for FIFA in Jamaica. She has also delivered some of the physical elements of the USSF coaching licenses. Scott was also commissioned by FIFA to produce the Physical Analysis report on the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup, a role she will repeat following the completion of the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup in France this summer.

Scott worked with the Great Britain women's soccer team at the World University Games in Bangkok in 2007 then joined the England senior women for their FIFA 2007 World Cup Finals campaign, where they reached the quarterfinals. Scott was also in New Zealand in 2008 with the England team competing in the inaugural FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, where they reached the semifinals. She has worked with England women's teams in two Under-19 European Championship tournaments and one U-19 Women's World Cup (2002 in Canada) as well as two European Women's Championships with the senior side.

Scott also provided Sport Science support to the GB women's soccer team during the 2009 World University games in Belgrade where the team won a bronze medal and was also on the staff of the England Women's National Team that advanced to the final of the 2009 European Women's Championships held in Finland.

Scott has worked several major events with men's soccer teams, providing support for the World Futsal Championships in Malaysia and the Men's British University Games in Scotland, both in 2008.

From 1997-2001, Scott served as a lecturer of sports science at Worcester University, where she was program leader for many modules including training for sport, match analysis and nutrition for sport performance.

In 1996, Scott earned her BSc (Hons) in Sport and Exercise Science from Manchester Metropolitan University. She went on to earn a Master's in Sports Nutrition from the University of Aberdeen in Scotland in 1997.

She has co-authored numerous research papers, as well as a co-authoring a book chapter on sports science as it relates to elite female athletes, especially soccer players. Scott is currently studying part-time for a PhD through the University of Western Sydney, working closely with her supervisor Dr. Ric Lovell developing a training model for elite female soccer players through the use of GPS, heart rate and subjective wellness data, aimed at optimizing the physical performance of elite female soccer players. In 2018, she had her first scientific article as the primary author published, titled "Individualization of Speed Thresholds Does Not Enhance the Dose-Response Determination in Football Training."

Scott, along with two colleagues in her research group, recently validated speed thresholds specific to women's soccer (Velocity Zone Classifications in Elite Women's Football: Where Do We Draw the Lines; Park et al, 2018), utilizing longitudinal WNT data and using a novel data mining technique. FIFA have subsequently adopted those thresholds for some of the analysis it is conducting. Scott is currently working on further papers in order to better inform practitioners working in women's soccer with regard the physical demands and loads players complete during competitive game play.


## B.J. SNOW

Head of U.S. WNT Talent Identification \& U.S. U-23 WNT Head Coach Born: Jan. 30, 1977, in Kalamazoo, Mich. Hometown: Kalamazoo, Mich.

B.J. Snow transitioned into a newly created role as Head of U.S. Women's National Team Talent Identification in February of 2017. His focus is to connect and empower the external development platforms in the USA to help create a synergistic operating system focused on elite player development. This includes developing and educating those platforms on talent identification assessment criteria and positional profiles. Snow is also responsible for identifying and tracking potential Women's National Team players in the NWSL, college ranks, the U.S. Youth National Teams and overseas.

Snow also serves as head coach for the U.S. U-23 Women's National Team, a post he has filled over 2017 and 2018. The U-23s have gone 6-1-3 in international matches over those two years and have beaten or drawn with four NWSL teams during pre-season exhibitions.

Snow took his current position after serving as head coach of the U.S. Under-17 Women's National Team for the two previous cycles. He was named the first full-time head coach of the U.S. U-17 WNT on Jan. 25, 2013, and compiled a record of 29-3-5 in international matches over those four years while going undefeated from March 2013 to October 2016. During Snow's tenure, the U-17 WNT dominated the Concacaf region culminating with the 2016 Concacaf Championship. Snow posted a 13-0-1 career record against Concacaf opponents, with his teams scoring 55 goals and allowing just four. Snow also led the U-17 WNT to three consecutive NTC Tournament Invitational Championships (2014, 2015, 2016) while compiling a record of 9-0-0, including three victories against U-17 WNT powerhouse Japan. The three victories over Japan were the only losses for Japan at the U-17 level during Snow's tenure.

In the lead up to the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup, Snow served as an assistant coach for Jill Ellis during numerous training camps and was the head scout for the USA during the Women's World Cup tournament. Snow previously served as an assistant with the U.S. Under-20 Women's National Team for the 2010 FIFA Under-20 World Cup in Germany. He has also worked with U.S. Soccer as a clinician at coaching seminars.

Snow, 41, came to U.S. Soccer from UCLA, where he was the head women's soccer coach for two seasons in 2011 and 2012 and helped recruit the core of the group that would win the NCAA championship in 2013. Snow became the fourth head coach in UCLA history in 2011 when he took over for longtime head coach Jill Ellis. Snow led UCLA to a 34-4-6 record during his two years at the helm.

Snow arrived at UCLA as a volunteer assistant coach in 2006 and quickly rose through the coaching ranks, going from volunteer assistant to full-time coach in the span of just one year. He was promoted to assistant head coach in 2009. During his time at UCLA, the Bruins compiled a record of 131-22-13, reaching the NCAA College Cup from 2006-09. UCLA also won three consecutive Pac-10 titles from 2006-08.

An excellent recruiter, Snow helped UCLA sign top- 5 classes in each of his seven seasons on staff. Snow's 2011 class, which featured 10 players with youth national team experience, is widely regarded as one of the best recruiting classes in college women's soccer history.

Snow arrived at UCLA after spending four years as the head men's coach at his former high school, Portage Central near Kalamazoo, Mich. During his tenure at PCHS, he led the Mustangs to three Southern Michigan Athletic Conference (SMAC) titles, including three district championships. In addition, Portage Central set the school record for wins in both 2004 (19) and 2005 (20). He also coached NSCAA National High School Player of the Year Eric Alexander, who went to Indiana, and has been a long-time MLS player.

Snow was an excellent college player and a four-year starter as a defender for Indiana University from 1996-99. Snow helped the Hoosiers capture four-straight Big Ten titles, including back-to-back national championships in 1998 and 1999. Indiana's record during his time in Bloomington was 81-8-3.

Snow is married to former U.S. Women's National Team player and two-time Olympic gold medalist Lindsay Tarpley, who earned 125 caps and scored 32 goals for the USA. The couple welcomed their first child, a son Jacob, in July of 2012, and had daughter Alexandra in January of 2015.

# U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM WORLDCUP HISTORY

## USA IN THE FIFA WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

At the beginning of a FIFA Women's World Cup year, the U.S. Women's National Team is once again widely regarded to be the most successful women's soccer team in history, with three FIFA Women's World Cup titles, one second-place finish and three third-place finishes. This year, the team kicks off with preparations at home and abroad with sights set on capturing a fourth title in France.

In its seven Women's World Cup competitions, the U.S. is 33-4-6 in 43 total games and is the only nation to finish in the top three in each Women's World Cup (as well as the first four Olympics to feature women's soccer).

In 2015, a tough group stage saw the U.S. tie former coach Pia Sundhage and Sweden before prevailing in a nail-biter against Nigeria, the WNT turned on the jets, storming to the 2015 FIFA World Cup title. Powered by captain Carli Lloyd's six knockout round goals, including three in the thrilling title rematch with Japan, the USA dashed past up-and-coming Colombia 2-0 before beating old foe China in the quarterfinal. A showdown with Germany loomed in the semifinal, but a penalty kick miss by Germany and subsequent make by Lloyd set the U.S. on the path to the final, and substitute Kelley O'Hara's late goal, courtesy of a Lloyd assist, cemented the WNT's passage.

The epic final of the 2015 World Cup featured a recordmaking performance from Lloyd that catapulted her to her first FIFA Women's World Player of the Year award. With a hat trick that featured a goal from inside her own half, Lloyd put the game away by the half hour mark as Lauren Holiday and Tobin Heath also notched goals in the 5-2 win vs. Japan that saw the USA become the first nation to win three World Cups. The USA hit some bumps in the road on the way to the 2011 FIFA Women's World Cup, falling in the semifinal of the Concacaf Women's World Cup Qualifying Tournament at the end of 2010 before defeating Italy in a two-game playoff to earn the final berth to Germany. The Americans also lost two games during its World Cup preparation, but still headed into the tournament as one of the favorites. What transpired in Germany will forever be remembered as a breakthrough event for women's soccer as the U.S. team's dramatic run to the World Cup Final inspired a nation.

The USA opened the 2011 tournament with a hard-fought 2-0 win against Korea DPR in Dresden on second-half goals from Lauren Cheney and improbably, defender Rachel Buehler. That set the stage for a 3-0 demolition of Colombia that featured the entire team saluting the crowd after the opening goal by Heather O'Reilly in recognition of the large group of U.S. military and their families that helped sell-out the stadium in Sinsheim. The USA fell 2-1 to Sweden in its final group match in Wolfsburg, which sent them into a quarterfinal against Brazil back in Dresden. The drama and controversy-filled game featured the latest goal in Women's World Cup history: Abby Wambach's legendary header that sent the U.S. to a penalty kick shootout where it prevailed to reach the semifinal.

In the semifinal in Mönchengladbach, the USA ran into an extremely talented France team that dominated the match for stretches, but as the Americans often do at the highest levels, they found a way to win on a first half goal from Cheney, another Wambach header and a late clincher from Alex Morgan. The USA was by far the stronger team in the World Cup Final in Frankfurt, but let two leads slip away and fell in a penalty kick shootout to Japan.

Abby Wambach scored in the final four games - the first U.S. player to achieve such a feat in a World Cup tournament - and took over the U.S. career lead in Women's World Cup goals from Michelle Akers with her 13th in the championship game. Wambach and Morgan became the
first U.S. players to score in the semifinal and final of a World Cup.

In 2007, the USA was riding a long unbeaten streak and held the world's top ranking heading into the FIFA Women's World Cup in China where they won perhaps the most difficult first-round group in the history of the tournament. In Group B, the USA drew with Korea DPR 2-2 in the opening match, and then got two goals from Abby Wambach in a must-win 2-0 victory over Sweden. With advancement to the quarterfinals still up in the air, the USA won the group with a hard-fought 1-0 victory over a vastly improved Nigeria. The American women then met up-and-coming England in the quarterfinal, and after an evenly played first 20 minutes, put together its best performance of the tournament, winning 3-0 and earning a place in the semifinals against Brazil. The semifinal marked a low point in U.S. history as the team suffered some heart-wrenching misfortune while scoring an own goal and seeing Shannon Boxx harshly sent off at the end of the first half. That combination of factors led to a 4-0 loss, the worst in U.S. history, and a spot in the thirdplace match. The USA rebounded wonderfully to win the bronze medal, rolling over Norway with a 4-1 score to end the tournament on a high note.

Considered the top team in the world heading into the FIFA Women's World Cup USA 2003, the defending champion U.S. was assured the title of tournament favorite after the competition was moved from China to the U.S. due to the outbreak of SARS. After rolling through group play with a 3-0 record and an 11-1 advantage in goal differential, the U.S. squeezed past rival Norway by a 1-0 margin in the quarterfinals. Then in Portland, Ore. - the only city in history to host a World Cup match in consecutive competitions - the U.S. was shocked by Germany, who scored two injury time goals in a 3-0 victory en route to winning it all and being crowned world champion. The U.S. was relegated to the thirdplace game. There, the Red, White and Blue made quick work of northern neighbor Canada 3-1, the same team that forced the U.S. to sudden death overtime in the Concacaf Women's Gold Cup final less than a year earlier.

The United States Women's National Team added to its prestige by becoming the first squad to host and win a Women's World Cup, when it downed China PR 5-4 in penalty kicks after battling to a 0-0 draw through regulation and overtime in the 1999 final. The match was played in front of a women's athletics record crowd of 90,185 on June 10, 1999 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. The winning penalty kick goal for the U.S. has become a pop culture moment in American history, with Brandi Chastain connecting on the shot and then celebrating the goal with a nation. The championship marked the USA's third major championship of the decade, including the 1991 Women's World Cup crown and the 1996 Olympic title.

The biggest disappointment for the U.S. Women in the 1990s came at the 1995 Women's World Cup in Sweden, when the team fell to arch-rival Norway in the tournament semifinals, $1-0$. The defeat was the first ever for the USA in WWC play and helped Norway into the final where they downed Germany to take the crown.

In 1991, the U.S. won the inaugural FIFA Women's World Cup in China. The championship was the first for the USA in a FIFA competition and established the dominance that the U.S. women have continued to display at the international level. The United States was led by Michelle Akers, Carin Jennings and April Heinrichs, dubbed "the triple-edged sword." The trio combined to score 20 of the team's 25 goals in China, including all five (Jennings 3, Heinrichs 2) in a 5-2 semifinal victory over Germany and both goals (Akers) in a 2-0 win over Norway to win the title.

WOMEN'S WORLD CUP NOTES: The USA becomes the first country to win three FIFA Women's World Cup titles.
Hope Solo, Julie Johnston, Meghan Klingenberg, Carli Lloyd and Megan Rapinoe were named to the FIFA Women's World Cup All-Star Team.
Carli Lloyd is the first woman in FIFA WWC to score a hat trick in a Final match and scored the fastest hat trick in Women's World Cup history.
Lloyd also became the third U.S. Woman to score a hat trick in WWC play: Carin Jennings Gabarra netted three goals against Germany in 1991 and Michelle Akers scored five against Chinese Taipei that same year.
Lloyd also became the first U.S. WNT player to score in four straight games in a World Cup. She netted a goal against China, Colombia and Germany and three against Japan.
Lloyd's goal in the third minute was the fastest goal in a WWC Final game.
With her three goals against Japan, Lloyd became the first American to score in three major-tournament finals: 2012 Olympic gold medal game (2-1 win over Japan) and 2008 gold-medal match (1-0 over Brazil).

Midfielders Lauren Holiday and Tobin Heath each scored their first goals of the tournament in the final. It was Heath's first goal in a Women's World Cup.
The USA's five goals were the most any team has scored in a WWC Final. No other team has scored more than two.
The USA's two goals in the first five minutes of the match against Japan was first time any team scored twice in that span in a WWC game.
The U.S. WNT finished this year's tournament with a 33-4-6 all-time record in Women's World Cup play, outscoring its opponents 112-35 in 43 games. The 33 wins, 112 goals scored and the 43 games played are FIFA Women's World Cup records.

WOMEN'S WORLD CUP NOTES: Abby Wambach, Hope Solo, Lauren Cheney and Shannon Boxx were named to the FIFA Women's World Cup All-Star Team.
Abby Wambach won the Silver Ball as the second best player in the tournament and the Bronze Boot as the third leading scorer. Hope Solo won the Golden Glove as the best goalkeeper and the Bronze Ball as the third best player.
By advancing to the championship game the USA kept intact its record of finishing in the top-three of all six Women's World Cup tournaments that have been contested.

Of the 21 players on the roster, 18 saw action. For 11 of those players, it was their first minutes in Women's World Cup play.
The USA's loss to Sweden was its first-ever in Women's World Cup group play. The USA was the highest scoring team in the tournament with 13 total goals.

Abby Wambach scored four goals, all with her head, one each in the last four games, becoming the first U.S. player to accomplish that feat.

Her four goals upped her World Cup total to 13, moving her past the great Michelle Akers on the all-time U.S. World Cup scoring list.

Wambach and Alex Morgan became the first U.S. players to score in both a Women's World Cup semifinal and final.

WOMEN'S WORLD CUP NOTES: Team captain and forward Kristine Lilly was the lone U.S. player named to the FIFA Women's World Cup All-Star Team.

With a draw and two wins in first-round play, the USA won what was widely considered one of the most difficult opening round groups in Women's World Cup history.

By defeating Norway 4-1 in the third-place match, the USA finished in the top three in all five Women's World Cup tournaments that have been contested, the only country to do so.

Abby Wambach scored six goals in the tournament, winning the Silver Shoe as the second-best scorer in the tournament. Her six goals gave her nine WWC goals for her career, second on the all-time U.S. list behind only Michelle Akers (12).

Of the 21 players on the U.S. roster, 10 saw action in their first Women's World Cup.

Heather O'Reilly became the 11th U.S. player to score multiple goals in her first Women's World Cup. Four of those players did so in 1991, when it was every player's first WWC.

FIFA WOMEN'S WORLD CUP USA 2003 REVIEW

Originally scheduled for China from Sept. 23 to Oct. 11, the FIFA Women's World Cup 2003 was moved out of the country by FIFA on May 3 because of the threat of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome. In awarding the games to the United States on May 26, FIFA chose the United States over Sweden, the only other country besides the USA to make a formal bid to host the tournament.
While women's soccer has no doubt become more and more competitive, the group stage of USA 2003 went almost exactly according to script. Seven of the eight quarter-finalists from four years ago again advanced. Only Nigeria, who were the only side not to score a goal in the finals, did not make it through, stepping aside for Canada's advancement. Of the seeded teams, only Norway failed to win their group, bowing to the strong early play of Brazil. The U.S. Women's National Team lived up to its high expectations in opening the tournament with three authoritative wins in the tournament's most difficult group (downing Sweden, Nigeria and upstart Korea DPR). Sweden lost their first match but recovered to eventually fight their way into the finals.
In the knockout stage, Canada provided the tournament's biggest surprise with a well-earned 1-0 victory against China PR, sending the '99 finalist home early. The U.S., Germany and Sweden, who knocked off first-round darlings Brazil 2-1, also advanced to the final four. In the semifinals, the Swedes finally ended Canada's dreams with a dramatic come-from-behind 2-1 victory. In the other semifinal, Germany stunned the hosts, knocking the U.S. into the third-place match with two injury time goals en route to a 3-0 victory at PGE Park in Portland.
The U.S.-German match was widely hailed as one of the greatest in women's soccer history, surpassed in 2003 only by Germany's thrilling 2-1 sudden death victory over Sweden. That triumph saw Nia Kuenzer head home in the eighth minute of extra time to send The Home Depot Center into a frenzy of German joy and Swedish tears.

The U.S. closed out an ultimately disappointing tournament with an emphatic 3-1 victory over border-rival Canada in the third-place game. The match was never in doubt, with the U.S. seeing goals from Kristine Lilly, Shannon Boxx and Tiffeny Milbrett keep their perfect top three record in Women's World Cup play intact.

## FIFA WOMEN'S WORLD CUP USA 1999 REVIEW

The final Women's World Cup of the century launched the beginning a new era of success for women's soccer. For the first time, the tournament was expanded to 16 teams and was staged in huge stadiums across the host country, raising expectations for attendance, media coverage and television audiences; expectations which were reached, surpassed and then crushed.

The U.S. captured its second Women's World Cup Championship while thrilling a nation and becoming the story of the year. The team played in front of packed houses across the country, beginning with a crowd of 78,000-plus at Giants Stadium cheering the team to a 3-0 tournament opening victory over Denmark. The victory set a tone for the entire tournament. After fighting their way into the final with five victories, which included a come-from-behind 3-2 victory over Germany in the quarterfinals and a nail-biting 2-0 victory over Brazil in the semifinals, the U.S. battled China PR for a grueling 120 minutes before pulling out a breathtaking 5-4 penalty kick victory in the finals in front of a sell-out crowd of 90,125 fans at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena on July 10.
After a scoreless 90 minutes of regulation, China PR appeared to get the winner in the first 15 -minutes of suddendeath overtime, but midfielder Kristine Lilly jumped high to head a shot clear of the goal. That save would lead to goalkeeper Briana Scurry and defender Brandi Chastain becoming heroes during the penalty kick tiebreaker. Scurry leaped off her line to save China PR's third shot, allowing Chastain to slam home the game-winning penalty kick goal. With the championship, the U.S. became the first nation to win the Women's World Cup on its home soil.

# U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM PROGRAMS 

## U.S. SOCCER INVESTMENT IN WOMEN'S AND GIRLS' YOUTH NATIONAL TEAMS PROGRAMS

U.S. Soccer has for many years been a world leader in its support of women's soccer, especially in the massive amount of resources and programming dedicated to its Women's and Girls' Youth National Teams. U.S. Soccer has made an unprecedented commitment to developing world-class players and coaches with long-term success the main goal.
In 2015, U.S. Soccer adjusted its Youth National Team structure with a focus on three core areas: assessment and identification, training and development, and competition. These areas serve as the foundation on which programming is built for all U.S. Soccer's Youth National Teams.
When new youth WNT programming was added in 2015 at the Under-19 and Under-16 levels, it gave U.S. Soccer Girls' and Women's National Teams at the U-14, U-15, U-16, U-17, U-18, U-19, U-20 and U-23 age groups, which mirrors the structure on the men's side.

The structure means that U.S. Soccer now has two tracks for players: one for players born in even years and the other for odd years. If a player was born in an odd year, which are the age-cut-off years for the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, her track through the U.S. Women's National Team programs will be U-15 (two years), U-17 (two years) and U-19 (two years). Players born in even years, which are the age-cut-off years for the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup, will follow the path of U-14 (one year), U-16 (two years), U-18 (two years) and U-20 (two years).
This two-track structure provides a more consistent development approach and increased opportunities for more players to participate. U.S. Soccer will continue to positively impact the development of players and coaches by implementing specific requirements based on best practices and environments for them to excel. U.S. Soccer will also provide increased education for coaching and guidance for its elite-level players.

## U.S. WOMEN'S AND GIRLS' PLAYER IDENTIFICATION FRAMEWORK GROWS

Beginning in 2011, U.S. Soccer appointed a Technical Director and Development Director for the U.S. Women's National Teams, marking the first time U.S. Soccer had appointed full-time positions to oversee the Women's Youth National Team Program and the programs' overall development. Since that time, the USA's youth development set-up for women and girls has continued to grow and evolve.
In 2013, U.S. Soccer began added full-time head coaches for its two Women's Youth National Teams that compete in Concacaf and FIFA tournaments. This marked the first time the head coaches of the U-17 and U-20 age groups were full-time positions. The addition of full-time Women's YNT head coaches continued in 2015 when U.S. Soccer brought in coaches to oversee the remaining levels of the Women's YNT program (U-18 and U-19).
In 2017, U.S. Soccer made full-time head coach hires for the U-15 and U-16 Girls' National Team. Additionally, a head coach was added for the U-14 Girls' National Team program.
These coaches, along with the hire of full-time Talent Identification Managers combined with other recent scouting initiatives including U.S. Soccer Talent Identification Centers, have improved the process of identifying the top young female players in the United States to attend Youth National Team camps.
In November of 2017, U.S. Soccer also hired Mirelle van Rijbroek as the Director of Talent Identification to oversee the Talent ID Managers. Previously, U.S. Soccer hired Ellie Maybury in 2016 as the sports scientist for all its Girls' and Women's Youth National Teams, marking another positive step in player development from a physical standpoint.

These full-time coaches and Talent ID staff will work together to integrate all of the Youth Women's and Girls' National Teams, helping players and systems connect from one team to the next. They will play major roles in connecting the philosophies of the WNT head coach through all the Youth National Teams as well as relating those philosophies to the massive amount of girls' youth clubs in the United States. All U.S. Soccer coaches will focus on grassroots soccer within the youth club environment to convey the goals and philosophies of player development in order to help produce quality players for the National Team level.

## GIRLS' DEVELOPMENT ACADEMY

## Overview: Developing the Next Generation

In an effort to accelerate the development of world-class female players, U.S. Soccer launched the Girls' Development Academy program in the fall of 2017. The Academy focuses on positively impacting the everyday club environments to maximize female youth player development across the country.
U.S. Soccer started its Development Academy Program for boys in the fall of 2007 with 62 clubs across two
age groups (U-15/16 \& U-17/18). Now in its 12th season, the Academy has 197 total clubs, comprised of teams across six age groups in the boys program: $\mathrm{U}-12, \mathrm{U}-13, \mathrm{U}-14, \mathrm{U}-15, \mathrm{U}-16 / 17$, and $\mathrm{U}-18 / 19$ and four age groups in the girls program: $\mathrm{U}-14, \mathrm{U}-15, \mathrm{U}-16 / 17$, and $\mathrm{U}-18 / 19$. Over 25,000 players are expected to participate in the Academy over the course of the 2018-19 season.
Using the same structure, standards and philosophies that have allowed the Boys' Development Academy to become the elite player development model for the country, the Girls' Development Academy has significantly improved the everyday environment for players, coaches and clubs.

The Girls' Development Academy is part of U.S. Soccer's global leadership position in women's soccer and will continue to impact thousands of players. The program's partnership with the NWSL has quickly paved an elite player pathway with the seven NWSL Academies providing the opportunity to train in professional environments and pull players into first team training sessions to accelerate their development. The NWSL Academy clubs will continue to support player development with the common goal of long-term growth of professional women's soccer.
As soccer grows in the United States, young players need the proper environment to compete against the world's elite. The U.S. Soccer Development Academy program provides the optimum developmental environment for the nation's top youth soccer players, coaches and referees by emphasizing development through quality training and limited, meaningful competition. The overall focus of the program is to assist in developing world class players, coaches and referees by prioritizing training and player development within the team concept.

## Schedule, Training and Environment

Since receiving overwhelming support from Development Academy membership in 2012, the Academy schedule continues to run from September through June (or July based on postseason play). This creates a format that is similar to those followed by the elite soccer playing nations around the world as the Development Academy and U.S. Soccer continue closing the performance gap with those nations.
Academy teams spend a greater amount of time focused on training to improve as individuals and as a team. The teams and players receive direct feedback and evaluations from National Team staff and have access to video analysis. A major value in the Academy utilizing a 10 -month season format is the importance of additional training as teams practice four times per week in preparation for their 30-game national schedule.

Featuring teams from the top youth clubs from around the country, each Academy team plays approximately 30 regular-season games to ensure all games are meaningful. Games are also played according to FIFA's Laws of the Game and officiated by a pool of the nation's top young referees in order to prepare players for the next level of competition. U.S. Soccer National Team scouts regularly attend Academy games, so players are evaluated over the course of the season and in their natural positions, allowing for better player assessment.


## U.S. SOCCER YOUTH NATIONAL TEAM ID CENTERS

YNT ID Centers are no-cost identification opportunities for U.S. Soccer Talent Identification Managers to evaluate and monitor top youth soccer talents. U.S. Soccer, in conjunction with local clubs, hosts approximately 100 training sessions each year in 24 key markets throughout the country. Talent Identification Managers assess the top players from different clubs and markets in different combinations, cross-referencing talent across the nation. Each YNT ID Center is conducted with a particular focus to ensure Talent ID staff sees the widest variety of players in different contexts. Over 5,000 boys and girls aged 12-16 attended U.S. Soccer YNT Identification Centers in 2017-18.

## Purpose

- U.S. Soccer YNT Identification Centers are free, single-day identification opportunities for players with the most potential to train under the direction of U.S. Soccer Talent Identification Managers
- U.S. Soccer Talent Identification Managers run YNT ID Centers nationwide to identify and compare the top youth soccer talents for potential Youth National Team recognition


## Player Pool

- Gender: Boys and Girls
- Ages: 12- to 16 -years-old
- Each U.S. Soccer YNT ID Center will feature a specific gender and age group
- Elite players from any team, club or organization are eligible to attend at no cost to the player upon invitation

- Coach or Club Director Recommendation
- Scouting by U.S. Soccer at game or event
- Talent Identification Manager Selection
- Players can be recommended by their clubs via email at scouting@ussoccer.org


## Facilities

- Local youth clubs, professional clubs, leagues or state associations provide the facility
- Training Centers are held at both indoor and outdoor venues depending on the season and region


## Training

- U.S. Soccer Talent ID staff run the events with the assistance of host site staff, which may include: Talent ID Managers, U.S. Soccer Scouts, Youth National Team coaches, and local club coaches.
- Athletic trainers are present at every YNT ID Center.

## stepping stone TO The full team

The USA's oldest Women's Youth National Team moved from Under-21 to Under-23 in 2008. The change was in response to FIFA moving its oldest youth world championship for women from Under-19s to Under-20s, as well as a change in the Nordic competition which became a U-23 event. The eight-team Nordic Cup, which was a staple of summer programming for this age group for years, ended its 19-year run in 2009. Without the competition, which had been organized annually by one of the Scandinavian countries, the U.S. U-23s have pursued other international competition, mostly in Spain and Scandinavia, and in recent years have attended a four-team Nordic Tournament.

The role of the U-23s in the overall development of U.S. WNT players underwent some changes in 2009 with the start of Women's Professional Soccer (WPS) and again is being positively impacted by the National Women's Soccer League (NWSL). Many players who would have been kept active and in the mix for the full National Team by competing with the U-23s are now playing in the domestic league. Therefore, the U.S. coaches will call up some professionals prior to the NWSL season and when they are released by their clubs, and will have more of a focus on the pros in the early part of the year before the beginning of NWSL pre-season camps. During the NWSL season, more college players will likely get call-ups for the remainder of the spring and into the summer, as that time period falls during the heart of the club season.

The U.S. team has been active at this age group since 1989 (in its previous incarnation it was run as a U-20 program until 1998 and then morphed into a U-21 program until 2007) and has been consistently effective in helping prepare players for the step up to the Women's National Team. The vast majority of current Women's National Team pool players have competed for the U-21s or U-23s. The U-21s used to feature "overage" players in training camps and for the Nordic Cup tournament, but now all players who are age-eligible for the U-23s in 2019 must have been born on or after Jan. 1, 1996. This team serves a valuable role in helping bridge the large gap between college soccer and the National Team, but now has a valuable development partner in the NWSL

## 2019 U.S. U-23 WNT PLAYER POOL - 96s, 97s, 98s, 99s

Following is the current player pool for the U.S. Under-23 Women's National Team. The U-23 WNT head coach B.J. Snow and his staff will, for the most part, use this pool of players for matches in 2019, but players from any age group in the U.S. Youth National Team programs may be called up for a U-23 event. The pool is constantly evolving, with new players being added and called-up. Numerous players eligible for the U-23 team are listed in the full National Team pool. Players born on or after January 1, 1996, are age-eligible for this year's U-23 WNT.

## U.S. U-20s LOOKS TOWARDS 2020 FIFA U-20 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

In its 10th cycle, the FIFA Under-20 Women's World Cup has proven to be an invaluable development opportunity and legitimate proving ground for future stars. The USA's participation in the first nine events - of which the Americans have won three and finished in the top four three other times - gave an early glimpse of the program's up-and-coming young players, many of whom have gone on to make major impacts at the full international level. The first two tournaments were held as Under-19 events before FIFA moved it to a U-20 competition in 2006.

In 2018, the USA played in its ninth consecutive FIFA tournament at this level, going out before the knockout rounds when it tied eventual runner-up Spain, 2-2, in the final group game.

In the history of this tournament, the USA has lost just two knockout games in regulation time, bowing out in penalty kicks in three World Cups and falling in overtime to eventual champion Korea DPR in the semifinal in 2016. The USA won the tournament in 2002, 2008 and 2012, and lost in penalty kicks in the semifinal in 2006, the quarterfinal in 2010 and the quarterfinal in 2014. The USA also lost in regulation to Germany in the semifinal in 2006. The 2018 tournament marked the first time the USA had failed to get out of the group, albeit a difficult one with eventual championship game participants Japan and Spain.

Players eligible for the 2020 U-20 WWC, the host of which will be decided in 2019, must be born on or after Jan. 1, 2000.

The U.S. U-20 WNT will have the benefit of a preparation schedule that features numerous domestic training camps and some highly competitive matches abroad. The player pool features several players who are still age-eligible from the last cycle of U-20s plus some exceptional talent coming up through the ranks from the U.S. U-17, U-18 and U-19 Women's National Teams.

## THE HISTORY OF THE U-20 WNT

Originally created in 1998 as an Under-18 program, the team moved up an age level to the U-19 level in 2001 in preparation for the first FIFA-sanctioned world championship for youth women, before becoming a U-20 program in 2005 for the first FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup that was held in 2006.

In 2018, Jitka Klimkova took the USA through a difficult but successful preparation schedule for the World Cup that included a penalty kick loss in the title game of the Concacaf Women's U-20 Championship (after the USA had qualified by winning a semifinal shootout), as well as victories over the U-20 sides from France, England Germany and Brazil. At the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in France, the USA fell to eventual champions Japan, 1-0, to start group play on the back foot, but then rallied for a 6-0 victory against Paraguay. The USA needed a victory against Spain in its final group game to advance, but ended up drawing, 2-2. The USA played 18 quality international matches during the year and posted an overall record of 12-2-4. The 2017 U.S. Soccer Young Female Player of the year, forward Sophia Smith, put in a stellar performance. She scored 15 international goals to up her career total to 23, the fourth best in U.S. U-20 WNT history. Twentyseven players saw action in international matches during the year.

In 2017, Klimkova's first year at the helm, the U-20s played 12 matches against top teams and hosted the Women's Nike International Friendlies for the first time in conjunction with the Girls' Development Academy Showcase. The preparation year for qualifying for the 2018 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup was highly productive as the USA compiled a 6-4-2 record which included wins against Norway, France, England Germany and Finland. Thirty-eight players saw action in international matches and Civana Kuhlmann and Sophia Smith led the team with eight goals each while Smith was named U.S. Soccer Young Female Player of the Year.

In 2016, the U-20s had a slew of competitive games in the run-up to the World Cup, defeating the U-23 teams from Sweden and Norway along the way, finished the year 8-5-4 overall record and 7-5-4 in international matches. Mallory Pugh led the USA in scoring with six international goals.

In 2015, the U-20s had an excellent year of preparation and growth, going 14-2-2 overall and 10-1-1 in international matches. The USA defeated age group teams from Norway, Netherlands, Sweden, Mexico and Brazil, as well as two Spanish women's clubs, before winning the 2015 Concacaf U-20 Women's Championship in San Pedro Sula, Honduras. The USA topped its group despite a 1-1 tie with Mexico in the opening game and then defeated the hosts in the semifinal to earn its berth to the Women's World Cup in Papua New Guinea. The USA defeated Canada, 1-0, in the title game to take the Concacaf championship.

In 2014, the U-20s had an exciting year while compiling an 11-1-1 international record (12-4-1 overall) that included a title at the Concacaf Women's U-20 Championship in the Cayman Islands. The USA met eventual champion Germany in its opening game of the 2014 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup and fell 2-0, but followed that with wins against Brazil and China to advance out of the group. The USA would fall in the quarterfinal in penalty kicks after a hard-fought match with Korea DPR.

In 2013, Michelle French took over the U-20s in a historic appointment as U.S. Soccer's first full-time head coach for this age level. A team in transition went 4-5-2 overall and 2-3-2 in international matches as the year was spent identifying talent and forming a player pool that would take the USA into the World Cup year.

Looking back at 2012, it was one of the best years ever for the U.S. program, as the team went 16-2-1 in international matches (17-2-2 overall) and won perhaps the most competitive U-20 Women's World Cup in history. The USA rolled through Concacaf World Cup qualifying to earn a berth to Japan by winning all five games by a combined score of 18-1 and pulled off a dramatic late-game comeback to defeat Canada by a 2-1 score in the championship game on a game-winner from Chioma Ubogagu.
U.S. head coach Steve Swanson fashioned a team that had speed and skill all over the field, which when combined with tremendous heart, gave the Americans a unique squad that overcome adversity to reach the top of the podium in Tokyo, Japan. The U.S. team featured several players with bright full National Team futures, and the victory further cemented the USA's youth programs among the best in the world. U.S. captain Julie Johnston, who would be named the U.S. Soccer Young Female Athlete of the Year for 2012, won the Bronze Ball as the third-best player in the tournament, a rare honor for a defender.
2011 was a transition year for the U-20s as Swanson took over the program and played only a handful of international matches, going 6-2-1 overall and 2-1-1 against other countries. Still, the year was highly productive as Swanson refined his player pool and started to develop a team that would go on to win the World Cup. He saw several veterans of the U-20 level continue to mature while numerous young players showed their ability to play and prosper at the international level. The schedule included two matches with the Japanese U-20 squad, which the USA split with the visitors during a camp in Chula Vista, Calif.

In 2010, Jill Ellis led the team to a 16-3-5 overall record and 13-2-3 in international play, winning the title at the Concacaf Women's World Cup Qualifying Tournament in Guatemala. The U.S. team went undefeated against international competition until its final two friendlies before the U-20 Women's World Cup, then fell to Germany and Japan on a pre-World Cup trip to Germany. At the Women's World Cup, the USA was surprised by Ghana in the opener, a 1-1 tie, before rebounding to defeat Switzerland 5-0 and South Korea 1-0 to win the group and earn a berth in the quarterfinal. The USA played a hard-fought match against Nigeria with regulation time ending at 1-1. A scoreless overtime led to a shootout, where the U.S. goalkeeper Bianca Henninger twice saved penalties that were ordered retaken, and the USA fell in the shootout for the earliest elimination in history for a U.S. team at a Women's World Cup. With five goals in the 2010 tournament and 10 in her U-20 career, Sydney Leroux became the USA's all-time leading scorer in U-20 Women's World Cup tournaments.

In 2009, Ellis led the team to a 9-2-3 overall record and 4-1-2 in international play as she narrowed down the player pool in preparation for Concacaf qualifying in early 2010. The schedule included wins against the Norway, England and Canada U-20s teams as well as draws with the always-talented France and Germany. Kelly Cobb, Maya Hayes and 2008 U-20 Women's World Cup star Sydney Leroux led the USA in scoring with six goals apiece in all matches.

In 2008, despite taking over as head coach from Ellis fairly late in the cycle, Tony DiCicco molded a team that would win the USA's seventh women's world title. DiCicco's side experienced some growing pains during the year, but it all came together in brilliant fashion during the Women's World Cup as the USA scored 12 goals and allowed just three, controlling every match (aside from a meaningless 2-0 loss to China in group play), on
the way to a convincing 2-1 defeat of Korea DPR in the title game. The USA won three matches by 3-0 scores, including the quarterfinal against England, and then outplayed a talented German side to win the semifinal by a 1-0 score. Leroux became just the second U.S. player to win the Golden Ball at a FIFA event and also won the Golden Shoe as the tournament's top scorer with five goals. Alex Morgan also had a great tournament, scoring four times and winning the Silver Ball and the Bronze Shoe. Goalkeeper Alyssa Naeher was world class, allowing just one goal, that in the waning moments of the final match, a performance that earned her the Golden Glove as the tournament's top 'keeper. The U-20s finished 2008 with an overall record of 20-7-0 while going 14-4-0 in international games.

In 2007, Ellis took the team through some excellent preparation during the identification stage for this pool of players, eventually winning the silver medal at the Pan American Games in Rio de Janeiro, an achievement that included defeating the full Women's National Team of Canada in the semifinal, 2-1. In the gold medal game, the USA ran into a Brazilian buzzsaw in front of a packed house at the famed Maracana Stadium, but that experience will no doubt benefit the players as they moved forward in their national team careers. The U-20s finished 10-5-1 on the year, but four of those losses were to full Women's National Teams.

In 2006, the U.S. U-20s played a remarkable 50 matches before the 2006 FIFA U-20 Women's World Championship in Russia, eventually compiling an overall record of 39-10-7 for the year. The USA's 16-2-3 international record was stellar, although the year ended on a down note with the fourth place finish at the world championship. The USA got some big-time goal production from several forwards during the year, including Jessica Rostedt (24 goals, 7 in international play), Lauren Cheney (21/9), Kelley O'Hara (20/10) and U.S. Soccer Young Female Athlete of the Year Danesha Adams (18/7). The USA qualified for the world championship with an undefeated run at the Concacaf U-20 Women's Final Qualifying Tournament held in Mexico in January of 2006, downing the hosts 3-0 for a berth to Russia and beating Canada 3-2 in the championship game.

In 2005, the team had a quiet year of activity due to the transition of head coaches.
In 2004, under head coach Mark Krikorian, the USA went 17-7-2 and 11-5-2 in international matches, but lost its first ever match to a team in its age group, falling to Japan, 1-0. The USA finished second in Concacaf qualifying, falling 2-1 to Canada in the championship, but they had already secured a berth to Thailand by virtue of a clinical 6-0 win against Mexico in the semifinal. The USA put together four excellent matches to open the U-19 Women's World Cup, starting with a rousing 3-0 win against Korea Republic followed by a 4-1 domination of Russia. The USA finished group play with a hard fought 1-0 win against Spain. In the quarterfinal match against a plucky Australia, Angie Woznuk came off the bench to help set up the USA's two goals, both of which were assisted by Stephanie Lopez, sending the USA to the semifinal. In the semifinal, the young Americans ran into a German wall. Tied at 1-1 at halftime, the USA took control of the match's pace only to see the Germans score on a lightning counter attack. With the USA pressing forward, Germany scored another to secure the final 3-1 margin. The USA earned third-place honors with a 3-0 win against Brazil.

In 2003, the U-19s went 7-4-1 overall and 6-2-0 in international competition, getting wins against Mexico, Japan, Germany and Holland during the year.

In 2002, the U-19s went 22-2-2 overall and 17-1-0 in international matches, including six wins at the FIFA U-19 Women's World Cup in Canada. The victory in the title game of the first-ever U-19 WWC was another in a long line of "firsts" for the U.S. Women's National Team program, which includes the first Women's World Cup championship and the first Olympic gold medal. Team captain Lindsay Tarpley scored a 109th minute "golden goal" against host Canada to win 1-0 on Sept. 1, 2002, in front of 47,784 fans at Edmonton's Commonwealth Stadium.

In 2001, the USA went 10-4-4 overall and 4-0-1 in international matches as the nucleus of the 2002 world championship team started to form.

Under Steve Swanson in 2000, the U-18s went 10-2-3, including 3-0-2 in international competition, all against senior women's national teams.

The first season of U-18 competition in 1999 was a banner year, as the team went 14-0-3 overall and 8-0-2 internationally, winning a gold medal in the Pan American games to clinch an unprecedented "treble" for the U.S. Women's National Team, which also won gold at the 1999 Women's World Cup and U-21 Nordic Cup.

Shannon Cirovski, a veteran of the USA's 1991 Women's World Cup championship team, was the first coach of the U-18s but stepped down to take the head coach position at the University of Maryland. She coached the U-18s halfway through 1999 before U.S. Women's National Team assistant coach Jay Hoffman took the reins and guided the team to gold at the Pan Am Games in Winnipeg.
In its 21 years of competition as a $\mathrm{U}-18, \mathrm{U}-19$ and now a $\mathrm{U}-20$ team, the program has lost just 40 international matches and just 28 games to teams in its age group, compiling a 175-40-32 all-time international record.

## 2019 U.S. UNDER-20 WNT PLAYER POOL - OOs

Following is the current player pool for the U.S. Under-20 Women's National Team. This is the primary pool of players that will be used by U-20 Women's National Team head coach and coaching staff for training camps and matches in 2019 as the team prepares for qualifying for the 2020 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup. Players born on or after January 1, 2000, are eligible for the next U-20 Women's World Cup. The pool is constantly evolving, with new players being added and called-up. Members of U-20 pool may be called up to the U-23 Pool or the full National Team and members of the U-17, U-18 and U-19 National Team Pools may be called-up to the U-20s. Members of the U-20 pool may sometimes also attend U-19 training camps.

# FIFA U-20 WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP REVIEW 

The U.S. Under-19/U-20 Women's National Team has participated in all nine FIFA World Cups for this age group. The USA won the inaugural title in 2002 in Canada, finished third in 2004 in Thailand, took fourth in 2006 in Russia, reclaimed the crown in 2008 in Chile, got knocked out in the quarterfinal round in penalty kicks in Germany in 2010 and then rebounded to win its third title in 2012 in Japan. In 2014, the USA fell in penalty kicks in the quarterfinal and in 2016 returned to the semifinal round but would finish in fourth place. In 2018, the USA just missed out on the quarterfinals, finishing group play behind the eventual tournament champion and runner-up. In 2006, the competition moved to the Under-20 level, bringing it in line with the men's FIFA U-20 World Cup.

## USA FALLS A GOAL SHORT OF ADVANCEMENT IN FRANCE (2018)

In 2018, the USA became one of four teams to qualify for all nine FIFA Women's World Cups at this level. Drawn into a group with the eventual tournament champion Japan and runner-up Spain, the USA fought until the end, but finished third in Group C and failed to reach the knockout round for the first time. After falling to Japan 1-0 on a long-range goal in its opening match, the USA rolled past Paraguay 6-0 to put itself in position to qualify with a victory in its final group stage match. While the U.S. fell behind early to Spain, the Americans roared back late to draw even at 2-2 but were unable to create a game-winner that would have clinched a spot in the quarterfinals.

In the tightly-contested opening match against Japan, both teams struggled to find their rhythms offensively. While the U.S. out-possessed and out-passed Japan, the Asian champion broke through in the 76th minute, as Honoka Hayashi unleashed a well-hit shot from distance that struck the underside of the crossbar and bounced into the net. Sparked by the deficit, the USA searched for an equalizer and produced a number of quality chances in the last 15 minutes. While Jaelin Howell put two dangerous headers on frame during the game's final stretch, the Japanese defense kept the U.S. off the board.

Needing a convincing result to keep its quarterfinal hopes alive, the U.S. delivered an emphatic victory against Paraguay in its second group stage match. With its attack in full force, the USA created chances early and often, outshooting Paraguay 27-7. Sophia Smith started things off for the U.S. in the 15th minute with a remarkable run through the Paraguayan defense and a nifty finish, while Savannah DeMelo opened the floodgates late in the first half, netting twice in five minutes. Ashley Sanchez added a goal on the other side of halftime, while Smith, who spent the afternoon running roughshod through the South American defense, bagged a brace in the 63rd. DeMelo capped off the scoring in the 78th to complete a hat trick, the USA's fourth in U-20 World Cup history, and a number of near-misses down the stretch could have made the scoreline even more lopsided in a dominant showing.

The USA went into its final match against Spain needing a win to secure a spot in the knockout round. A misplayed clearance set Spain up for an early goal and La Roja doubled its lead off of a set piece just before halftime. Down 2-0, the U.S. rallied late in the second half, working to get back in the game during the final 20 minutes. After a number of dangerous forays into the Spanish final third, the USA finally broke through in the 82 nd minute off of a free kick from Smith. Pressing for an equalizer, DeMelo added her fourth goal of the tournament in the 87th to draw the USA even, but the USA could not get another goal.

## CHARACTER, COMEBACKS AND SLIM MARGINS IN PAPUA NEW GUINEA (2016)

In 2016, the USA played in its eighth consecutive FIFA tournament at this level, winning the most difficult group in the competition by the slimmest of margins. Led by 2016 Olympian Mallory Pugh, who captained the U.S. team in the exotic locale of Papua New Guinea, the USA opened the tournament with a hard-fought 0-0 tie against a very talented France side that would go on to advance to the championship game. The USA then defeated New Zealand 3-1 on goals from Pugh, 17-year-old Ashley Sanchez (who became the first player to score in a U-17 and U-20 Women's World Cup in the same cycle) and substitute Ally Watt, who bagged an insurance score later in the match.

A wild dipping shot from distance (which was officially called an own goal as it hit off the post and then the hands of U.S. goalkeeper Casey Murphy) opened the scoring for Ghana in the final group match, but the USA promptly answered back as Pugh scored two minutes later. The eventual 1-1 draw with a tough, physical Ghana team tied the USA with France on every tie-breaker except the last one - Fair Play points - and with the USA receiving no yellow cards in group play while France received one, the Americans won the group and advanced to the quarterfinal against Mexico.

In that match, Mexico took the lead in the 64th minute on a well-struck free kick, forcing the USA to mount an epic comeback. Watt, playing the role of super sub once again, tied the game in the 81st minute off a superb pass from Sanchez. After some end-to-end play produced chances for both teams near the end of regulation, it was Sanchez who set up the game-winner three minutes into stoppage time with a brilliant dribble and pass from the right wing. She beat a defender around the corner, got to the end line and played a pass back on the ground that was dummied by Pugh and rolled to the crashing Kelcie Hedge, who had entered the game in the 68th minute. Near the right edge of the six-yard box, Hedge spun her first-time shot off the foot of a defender from about eight yards out, and it settled into the lower left corner for the game-winner.

The tremendous talent and overall strength of the Asian teams was on display in the semifinal around. The USA met eventual champion Korea DPR in the semifinal and played an excellent first 30 minutes, but as the match wore on, the technical savvy and power of an organized Korea DPR team put the USA on its heels. In the 51st minute, the Koreans got their goal from the penalty spot after U.S. midfielder Katie Cousins was whistled for a handball while blocking a shot, and Jon So Yon converted her spot kick.

The Americans kept fighting and, as they'd done all tournament, got a goal when they needed one. As the game entered the 89th minute, forward Jessie Scarpa cut back on her defender from the left wing and sent a cross into the penalty area for Pugh. She took a hard touch and it bounced off a defender, then back off Pugh, before a Korea defender made a poor clearance. Defender Natalie Jacobs came flying through to hit an athletic left-footed, first-time volley that looped into the right side of the net to tie the game.

Due to the cooling breaks and several injuries in the stifling heat, seven minutes of stoppage time were added to the end of the match that saw some wild end-to-end play. The USA was forced to play the last four minutes of stoppage time with 10 players when Watt, its fastest player, had to go out injured after the Americans had already made their three allowed substitutes in regulation. After the USA dodged a few quality scoring chances from Korea DPR in second half stoppage time, French was able to utilize the new rule allowing for a fourth sub in overtime and sent on Courtney Peterson for Watt.

Korea DPR wasted no time going ahead, however, creating a very nice goal less than a minute into the first overtime. The USA tried to push for a second equalizer and battled with tremendous heart until to the end, but a clearly fatigued U.S. team could not find the net again.

The U.S. team expended a tremendous amount of energy in the tournament but still had enough left to hold a supremely talented Japan without a goal - with Murphy making several excellent saves along the way -- until the 87th minute, when Golden Boot winner Mami Ueno looped in the game-winner from the left side of the penalty box.

Although the USA did not get on the podium, the tournament did showcase some bright young stars, most notably Pugh, Sanchez and Murphy. The third-place match was just the second game the USA had lost in regulation time in its history at this tournament.

## THE PAIN OF PENALTIES, AGAIN (2014)

The 2014 FIFA U-20 Women's World cup opened with a rare meeting between the 2012 finalists. This time, Germany came out on top, scoring two second half goals to down the USA in the first game of Group B. The Americans rebounded with two wins by shutout over Brazil and China PR to earn second place in the group and a spot in the quarterfinal.

Forward Lindsey Horan, the first professional to represent the USA in the U-20 Women's World Cup, showed why she is one of the world's best young players, scoring three of the four goals over the final two group matches. Her goal against Brazil in a tremendously hard-fought match came with eight minutes left to play. Rose Lavelle added a clinching score against China during a $3-0$ victory in Moncton.

The USA's first three games were played on artificial turf, but on grass in Toronto at BMO Field, the USA met the North Koreans in the quarterfinal, the same country it had beaten at this stage four years ago. This time the Koreans turned the tables in a competitive match that saw Makenzy Doniak open the scoring for the USA in just the 6th minute. North Korea tied the game on a penalty kick in the 65th minute and the teams played scoreless through the rest of regulation and overtime.

Unfortunately, the USA missed its first three penalty kick attempts, with only Stephanie Amack converting on the fourth try, but the Americans had dug themselves too deep a hole and the Koreans prevailed 3-1 in the shootout, sending the USA home before the semifinal for just the second time.

Through this tournament, the USA has only lost one knockout match in regulation time in the seven tournaments, that coming to Germany in the semifinal in 2004

## TOP OF THE PODIUM IN TOKYO (2012)

The 2012 FIFA U-20 Women’s World Cup in Japan was a triumph of American spirit as well as Japanese character. The hosts organized a fantastic tournament on short notice after it was moved from Uzbekistan and then captured the attention of the nation with some tremendously attractive soccer played with unabashed joy. The Japanese fell to the powerful Germans in the semifinal (after giving up three goals inside of 20 minutes) while the USA defeated a talented Nigeria team to make the World Cup Final and then triumphed 1-0 on a goal from speedy attacker Kealia Ohai.

What made the USA's march to the tournament title even more special was the adversity the team faced in group play. After a convincing 4-0 opening game victory against Ghana, featuring a hat trick from Maya Hayes, the USA tied China PR 1-1 in group play and then got smashed by Germany, 3-0.

Those results gave the Americans a remarkably tough road to the championship as they would have to defeat three group winners along the way. First up was a Korea DPR side that featured 10 players from their 2012 London Olympic Team. Seven North Koreans who played against the full U.S. Women's National Team at the Olympics during the USA's 1-0 group play victory at Old Trafford in Manchester, England, played against the U.S. U-20s in the quarterfinal, and the Koreans came into the game with a tournament-high 15 goals. The USA got a wonder-strike from distance from Vanessa DiBernardo and an overtime header from Chioma Ubogagu to earn the hard-fought 2-1 win and a berth to the semifinal against Nigeria, the country that had knocked the USA out of the U-20 World Cup two years earlier in the quarterfinal stage.

The Americans played a tremendous match against Nigeria in the 2-0 victory, getting a header goal from Morgan Brian and a strike off a beautiful run from Ohai. That victory earned the USA another shot at Germany, which made the championship game without allowing a goal in its previous five games of the tournament.

The USA ruined Germany's perfect record just before halftime as Crystal Dunn's dynamic run with the ball down the right flank in the 44th minute set up Ohai for what would be the game winner.

The USA played stout defense in the second half, led by center backs Cari Roccaro and Julie Johnston - who would win the Bronze Ball as the third best player in the tournament - and got several clutch saves from goalkeeper Bryane Heaberlin to earn the historic victory.

## THE PAIN OF PENALTIES IN GERMANY (2010)

If the 2010 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup proved anything - besides Germany's dominance at home - is that the African teams are getting stronger. The USA drew 1-1 with both African sides it faced, and was knocked out of the tournament at the quarterfinal stage.

The USA started the tournament with a tie against a tough Ghana side, although the Americans had plenty of chances to win the game, firing 25 total shots with only Sydney Leroux finding the back of the net with 20 minutes left. The young Americans rebounded to defeat Switzerland, 5-0, in its second match as Leroux notched a hat trick, the first for an American woman in a Women's World Cup since 1991 and just the third-ever for a U.S. player.

The USA then faced the Korea Republic with the group title on the line and edged the talented Koreans, 1-0, as Leroux once again found the net. That set up a quarterfinal match with Nigeria, a physical side which somehow racked up 26 fouls (with four yellow cards) to the USA's five. The Americans scored early through Amber Brooks, but gave up a bomb from distance just 11 minutes from the end of the game. The USA once again had plenty of chances to win the game, including a few in overtime, but Nigeria managed to fire a remarkable 31 shots with U.S. goalkeeper Bianca Henninger making 14 saves.

The match went to penalty kicks and U．S．U－20 veterans Christine Nairn and Leroux missed the USA＇s first and fourth kicks，respectively，while Nigeria made all four，but not without controversy．Henninger twice saved the shot of Nigeria＇s third kicker，only to have both wiped away and ordered retaken by the referee．Nigeria finally tallied on its third chance．

Leroux＇s five goals，which won her the Bronze Shoe as the third leading scorer in the tournament，combined with the five she scored in 2008 in Chile，gave her the most for a U．S．player in U－20 Women＇s World Cup history．Henninger， who gave up just two goals in the tournament，won the Golden Glove as the best goalkeeper in the competition．

## GLORY REGAINED IN CHILE（2008）

The 2008 U．S．Under－20 Women＇s World Cup Team put together one of the most complete performances ever for a U．S． team at a world championship event，scoring 12 goals while allowing just three on the way to a glorious 2－1 title game victory over defending U－20 world champions Korea DPR．The fans in Chile adopted the U．S．team during the tournament as the players had once－in－a－lifetime experiences during the first－ever FIFA Women＇s World Cup in South America．

Forwards Sydney Leroux and Alex Morgan had fantastic tournaments，accounting for nine of the USA＇s 12 goals．The USA took home an unprecedented amount of hardware as Leroux won the Golden Ball as the best player in the tournament and the Golden Shoe as the top scorer with five goals．Morgan，who scored four times，won the Silver Ball and the Bronze Shoe while goalkeeper Alyssa Naeher，who allowed just one goal over the five brilliant matches in which she played，took home the Golden Glove．The USA also won the FIFA Fair Play Award．

The U．S．started off with two convincing 3－0 wins over France and Argentina．With the top spot in the group locked up after just two matches，DiCicco played numerous reserves in the third group game against China PR，a 2－0 loss．
The Americans rolled to a $3-0$ win against England in the quarterfinal as captain Keelin Winters scored on a fantastic header to get things started．The Americans then out－battled the Germans，getting an own goal on a cross from Nikki Washington as well as a hustling slide from Leroux．

The win set up a championship game meeting with Korea DPR．Leroux scored a fantastic goal from distance in the 23rd minute and Morgan added another brilliant long range strike just before halftime that goes down as one of the greatest ever goals for a U．S．player in a world championship final．The dangerous Koreans attacked with fervor，but the U．S．defense stayed strong，led by center backs Nikki Marshall and Lauren Fowlkes．The Asian champions did pull a goal back in the second minute of second half stoppage time，but the Americans would lift the trophy in front of an appreciative crowd in Santiago．

## UNFORTUNATE FOURTH IN RUSSIA (2006)

The USA's 2006 U-20 team disappointed in its results at the world championship in Russia, taking fourth and becoming the only U.S. women's team ever to finish out of the top three at a FIFA world championship. The U.S. team had played 50 matches against national teams, colleges and women's clubs in 2006 leading into the world championship and had never failed to score at least one goal, but somehow could not muster one in the semifinal or third place match, which both went to penalty kicks. The U.S. team had kicks to win both games only to miss, and then miss the next as well.

In group play, the USA struggled a bit early as U.S. head coach Tim Schulz utilized his entire roster. The U.S. U-20s opened the tournament with a 2-1 win over minnow DR Congo. The young Americans then defeated Argentina 4-1 in a match that could easily have seen more U.S. goals, but put together a quality performance in the final first round match to defeat France 1-0 on a goal from Jessica Rostedt.

In the quarterfinal round, the USA looked to be the favorite after trouncing defending champion Germany 4-1 as Danesha Adams scored twice, but then came the scoreless semifinal and third-place match against China PR and Brazil, respectively, and the painful penalty kick shootouts.

Standouts on the U.S. team included Adams, a midfielder/forward, who won the Bronze Ball as the third best player in the tournament, as well as goalkeeper Val Henderson and midfielder Amanda Poach, who along with Adams made the All-Tournament Team. Flank defender Tobin Heath and flank midfielder Kelley O'Hara (two goals) also had fine tournaments for the USA.

This U.S. team featured several players with bright futures on the full National Team, including forwards Amy Rodriguez (who scored twice in her second youth world championship), Lauren Cheney, Heath and Stephanie Lopez.

## TAKING THIRD IN THAILAND (2004)

The 2004 U.S. U-19 Women's National Team was going to be hard-pressed to live up to the standards set by the 2002 squad, which won the first-ever world youth championship for women while rolling over the competition in Canada, but amazingly, they almost did. Featuring four players from the 2002 squad, the 2004 team in Thailand put on one of the finest displays of soccer ever seen by a U.S. team in a world championship to win a difficult Group C that featured Asian champion Korea Republic, European champion Spain and Russia.

The USA opened the tournament with a 3-0 victory over Korea Republic, scored in just the second minute in a 4-1 victory over Russia and finished group play with a highly professional 1-0 win over Spain as Jessica Rostedt provided the lone goal. The USA dominated Australia 2-0 in the quarterfinals as Angie Woznuk came off the bench to help create both goals, but ran into a wall in the always tough and talented Germans in the semifinal and fell 3-1 to end their dreams of a second world youth title. The young U.S. team rebounded remarkably well in the Third Place match, taking out Brazil 3-0, despite the South Americans featuring the virtuoso attacking duo of Marta and Cristiane from their silver-medal winning team at the 2004 Olympics.

It was a breakout tournament for Woznuk, the USA's dynamic attacking midfielder, who won the Silver Ball as the second Most Valuable Player and the Bronze Boot as the third leading scorer in the competition despite battling a foot injury throughout. A new wave of talented American strikers also emerged as 17-year-old Amy Rodriguez scored
two goals while 18-year-old Rostedt and 19-year-old Megan Rapinoe scored three goals each.
Like she did for the 2002 U-19 squad, goalkeeper Ashlyn Harris played every minute and was once again stellar, sealing her status as one of the top young goalkeepers in the world. Harris earned All-Tournament recognition along with Woznuk and center-back Becky Sauerbrunn, who teamed with Rachel Buehler to form a bruising partnership in the middle of the U.S. back line. Left back Stephanie Lopez also showed signs of future U.S. stardom while the USA was awarded the FIFA Fair Play Award, getting just two yellow cards in the tournament.

## HISTORIC WIN IN CANADA (2002)

In the first FIFA tournament for $\mathrm{U}-19 \mathrm{~s}$, under the most adverse conditions and on the biggest of stages, the U.S. Under-19 Women's National Team achieved one of the most historic victories in U.S. Soccer history, defeating host Canada 1-0 on Sept. 1, 2002, in front of 47,784 fans at Commonwealth Stadium in Edmonton, Alberta, to win the 2002 FIFA Under-19 Women's World Championship.

This unique group of teenagers represented the first young women in U.S. history with the opportunity to play in a sanctioned FIFA world championship. They embraced that challenge, played the semifinal and championship game in front of massive crowds and a world-wide TV audience, and came out champions, showing with unbridled emotion that all young girls in the United States can now look forward to the chance to be a world champion as a youth player. On the field, the young U.S. players had to maintain their composure in the championship game, played in front of a massive Canadian crowd, awash with red-and-white flags. Substitute Megan Kakadelas created the winning goal by curving a cross on the ground into the penalty area late in overtime. The ball was kept alive by a darting Heather O'Reilly, who crashed into a defender on a hard near post run. The ball squirted across the goalmouth to U.S. captain Lindsay Tarpley who pounded a shot into the net from close range to end the game.

With the win, the U-19s added another first to the glorious history of the U.S. Women's National Team program, which claimed the first Women's World Cup and the first Olympic gold medal for women's soccer. The USA rolled through Group play, defeating England 5-1, Australia 4-0 and Chinese Taipei 6-0, before blasting Denmark 6-0 in the quarterfinal match. The USA fell behind 1-0 to Germany in the semifinal, before storming back to win 4-1 on two goals from Wilson, one from Tarpley and one from defender Jill Oakes.

Tarpley was awarded with the Bronze Boot as the third leading scorer in the tournament with six goals while Kelly Wilson earned the Silver Boot as the tournament's second leading scorer with nine goals in just five games. Wilson also picked up the Bronze Ball as the third most valuable player in the tournament.

The victory was the end of a glorious two-year run to the tournament in which the first crop of U-19s went 21-1-1 in international competition and formed a family bond that carried them past an excellent and tough Canadian team, and their massive fan support, to the first-ever world championship for youth women.
"The journey not only made us better players, but it showed us that great things can be accomplished through hard work, love and belief," said Tarpley, who two years later would score for the USA in the Olympic gold medal match. "Over the last two years, we've had some amazing times on the soccer field, but it's the friendships we'll carry forever. I know we will look back at this 20 years from now with the same feelings for each other that we have now. We'll remember the day we became world champions together."

The U．S．Under－19 Women＇s National Team was re－instituted in 2015．Prior to that year，the last time U．S． Soccer had programming at the U－19 level was 2004，which was the year that the final FIFA Women＇s World Cup was held at the U－19 level before it moved to U－20 in 2006．Since then，the U－19 age level had basically been a part of the U－20s．In 2015，as part of an overall commitment to player development，new programs at the U－16 and U－19 level were started back up and U．S．Soccer now has a total of eight Youth National Teams for both its men＇s and women＇s programs：U－14，U－15，U－16，U－17，U－18，U－19，U－20 and U－23．

These additions create two separate programming tracks for even－birth－year players and odd－birth－year players， allowing for a more consistent approach toward development and additional opportunities for players to participate in national team events and matches．

Although the U．S．Under－19 Women＇s National Team will never again compete for a world title，it has a rich history．In 2002，led by future Women＇s National Team stars Heather O＇Reilly，Lindsey Tarpley，Lori Chalupny and numerous players who went on to successful professional and international careers，the U．S．U－19 WNT won the first World Cup title for youth women in a tournament played in Canada．The USA，featuring many players who would go on to successful careers as well，finished third at the 2004 FIFA U－19 Women＇s World Cup in Thailand．

Players from the pool for the $\mathrm{U}-19 \mathrm{~s}$ will be brought to several training camps over the course of the year in order to expose more players of this age to the National Team camp environment as well as give activity to the younger group of players in the pool competing for spots on the FIFA U－20 Women＇s World Cup Team．The player pool is identified on a year－round basis，through U．S．Soccer Girls＇Development Academy，U．S．Soccer Training Centers，club soccer，ODP interregional events and younger girls＇National Team camps．

Camps are often scheduled to run concurrent with other YNT camps to give the players an opportunity to watch and play against older players and learn through those experiences．

Players in this year＇s group of U－19s are born on or after Jan．1，2001．Players age－eligible for the 2020 FIFA U－20 women＇s World Cup are those born on or after Jan．1， 2000.

## 2019 U.S. UNDER-19 WNT PLAYER POOL - 01s

Following is the current player pool for the U.S. Under-19 Women's National Team. U.S. Soccer re-established this age group in 2015 after not having a U-19 WNT since 2004, which was the year of final U-19 Women's World Cup after before FIFA changed to a U-20 event. This group of players will, for the most part, be used by the U.S. U-19 WNT head coach and coaching staff for training camps and matches in 2019. Players born in 2001 make up this year's U-19 WNT player pool and are age-eligible for the next U-20 Women's World Cup in 2020. The pool is constantly evolving, with new players being added and called-up. In addition, members of U-19 pool will often be called to U-20 WNT camps and members of the U-17 and U-18 National Team Pools may be called-up to the U-19s.

## U.S. UNDER-18 WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM BRIDGES GAP

In 2008, the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team was reinstituted (after having existed from 1998-2001) to give international competition to players who have just finished a cycle with the U.S. U-17s but are a year away from the next U-20 cycle.
This year's group of players, primarily born in 2002, will have several domestic training camps and an international trip. Several of the U-18s may be called into U-19 or U-20 events as that group of players begins more intense preparations for the 2020 FIFA Under-20 Women's World Cup.
The U-18s are an important part of the U.S. Women's National Team program that now fields teams at the U-14, $\mathrm{U}-15, \mathrm{U}-16, \mathrm{U}-17, \mathrm{U}-18, \mathrm{U}-19, \mathrm{U}-20, \mathrm{U}-23$ and full Women's National Team levels. The structure mirrors the men's side (which sends its U-23 team to the Olympics) and with the inception of the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup in 2008, teams now compete every two years for FIFA U-17 and U-20 Women's World Cup titles.

The U-18 WNT provides a transition for a number of those players that could possibly make up the core of the team that would attempt to qualify for the following U-20 Women's World Cup, or even contribute to the current cycle of U-20s. The U-18s also provide a proving ground for players in the U-20 pool who may be just below the core group training for the U-20 Women's World Cup, giving them an environment to show that they are worthy of being pulled back into the top tier of U-20s.
Dave Chesler coached the U-18s in 2009 and 2010 and former Youth Women's National Teams Director April Heinrichs coached the team from 2011-2016, before Jaime Frias took over as the full-time head coach for 2017 and 2018.

In 2018, the U-18s played five international matches, once again all abroad, three during the La Manga tournament in Spain during and two in Switzerland. The USA went 1-1-3 in those games against top European sides.
In 2017, the U-18s played all six of its international matches abroad, traveling to England and to Australia. The USA defeated England and tied and beat Norway during its trip to England. In Canberra, the USA fell to the Canada U-20 WNT, but beat Australia twice to finish with a 4-1-1 record.

In 2016, the U-18s had an excellent slate of international matches, playing games in Spain, England and Northern Ireland over the course of the year. The USA went 4-2-2 with wins against the England U-19, Norway U-19, France U-19 and Northern Ireland U-19. The USA picked up draws against the Denmark U-19 and the England U-18. The only losses both came to England, to the U-18s and U-19s.

In 2015, the team had several domestic events and an international trip to play the Mexico U-20s while compiling a record of 3-1-2. In 2014, the team mostly had domestic events while compiling a 1-3-3 overall record, but did get in two valuable international trips, one to La Manga, Spain, for a tournament against older national teams and a trip to Mexico City for two games against the Mexico U-20s that produced a win and a draw.

## U.S. UNDER-17 WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM LOOKS TOWARD 2020 FIFA U-17 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

The U.S. Under-17 Women's National Team will play its 17 th full season of competition this year as it heads into 2019 with the goal of qualifying for the 2020 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup. The host country for the tournament will be decided in 2019. Players eligible for the next U-17 Women's World Cup must be born on or after Jan. 1, 2003.
U.S. Soccer first added the U-17 Women's National Team to its programming at the end of 2002. The U-17 program was initiated as U.S. Soccer felt it was vitally important to get more talented players training with National Team coaches and with the best players in their age group. The philosophy for the U-17s is to accelerate the development of the USA's best young players and better prepare them for the game's highest levels through training with top players and international matches.

Starting in 2008, the age group got its own world championship, an exciting prospect for the young Americans who will get the chance to compete for their country in a Concacaf qualifying competition and then, potentially, the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup.

## History of the Under-17 U.S. WNT

In 2018, the U-17s had a stellar preparation period for the Women's World Cup, playing 18 international matches in four different countries before heading to Uruguay. The USA lost just one of those games while picking up victories against Venezuela, Argentina, Uruguay, Japan, Costa Rica, Bermuda, Canada, Haiti, Mexico and Colombia. The USA won all five games at an unusual Concacaf Women's U-17 Championship, beating Costa Rica in its first game in Nicaragua before the tournament was postponed due to civil unrest. The tournament resumed about six weeks later in Florida, and the USA took care of business, winning the group before defeating Haiti in the semifinal to qualify for Uruguay, and then defeated Mexico, 3-2, in the championship game to take the regional title. At the World Cup, the USA defeated Cameroon in the opening game, but then fell to youth powers Korea DPR and Germany and did not advance out of the group. Still, the USA went 15-3-3 during the year and 40 players got experience in international matches. Hawaiian forward Sunshine Fontes has a record-breaking year, pounding in 22 goals, most ever for a female U.S. YNT player in a calendar year, and broke the U.S. record for most career international goals at the U-17 level with 24.

In 2017, the U-17s had got off to an excellent start in the first year of the cycle, getting the chance to play 13 high-level international matches as part of its preparations for Concacaf qualifying. The USA went 9-1-3, defeating Mexico, England, Italy, Japan and Haiti, with its only loss coming to China PR in a wild 5-4 game in Weifang, China. The USA got to travel abroad three times, giving the young U.S. players valuable experience playing in difficult environments. Jordan Canniff ( 6 goals) and Maya Doms ( 5 goals) led the team in scoring. The USA allowed five goals in its one loss to China but allowed just six over the other 12 games.
perfect 5-0-0 record, defeating Canada 5-0 in the semifinal to qualify for the U-17 Women's World Cup and then downed Mexico in the championship game, 2-1. The USA also won the U.S. Soccer NTC Invitational at the beginning of the year, defeating the England, Korea Republic and Japan U-17 teams. At the World Cup in Jordan, the USA started strong with a 6-1 win against Paraguay as Civanna Kuhlmann scored three goals, but then lost its final two group games 2-1 to Ghana and 3-2 to Japan, and did not advance to the quarterfinals. The losses were the first in the entire cycle for a team that came into the tournament unbeaten in international matches.

In 2015, the U-17s had an extensive schedule of domestic training camps and won the 2nd annual NTC Invitational in Carson, Calif., defeating the U-17 teams from Mexico, Canada and Japan. The year was used for growth and evaluation to prepare for the Concacaf U-17 Women's Championship at the beginning of 2016 that qualified three teams for the U-17 Women's World Cup in Jordan. The USA finished the year with a 9-0-1 record.

In 2014, the U-17s were split as the 97s finished their cycle with three tremendous results at the NTC U-17 Women's Invitational where USA defeated China, New Zealand and eventual U-17 Women's World Cup champion Japan to win the competition, while the 99s comprised the last three events of the year and logged two dominating victories over the host Korea Republic during a trip to the South Korea. The USA finished the year with a 7-0-0 record.
B.J. Snow was named the first full-time head coach for the U-17 program in January of 2013. The U-17s put together a quality series of results over the year, including two draws with Germany and two dominating wins against England, but a penalty kick loss in the semifinal of the Concacaf Women's U-17 Championship knocked the Americans out of the Women's World Cup despite outscoring its opponents at the tournament by a 26-1 margin. Amazingly, it was the second time in the program's history that a team had dominated at Concacaf qualifying and failed to reach the U-17 Women's World Cup due to a penalty kick loss. Still, the USA compiled a record of 9-1-5 and many talented young players, who would have bright futures with older National Teams emerged from this cycle.

The U-17s had a successful year in 2012, going 19-1-4 overall and 13-0-4 in international matches, but learned how cruel the game can be, especially in a Women's World Cup, when the squad became the first U.S. women's team to fail to advance out of group play in a World Cup tournament. Despite not losing a match, the USA's 6-0 win against Gambia and draws with eventual finalists France (0-0) and Korea DPR (1-1) made the USA the first team ever to exit a FIFA women's tournament after the group stage while earning five points.

Still, 2012 saw the USA register wins against U-17 teams from Germany and China, U-19 teams from France and the Netherlands and a win against the full Slovenian Women's National Team. The USA also drew 0-0 with China's U-20s. The USA rolled through Concacaf qualifying while earning five shutouts, outscoring its opponents 26-0 including a hard-fought 1-0 victory against Canada to win the regional title in Guatemala. Summer Green led the USA in scoring with 16 goals, including 12 at qualifying, the most ever for an American player during a Concacaf qualifying event.

In 2011, Albertin Montoya took over the program and started building and also refining the player pool as he developed a team that played an attractive ball-possession attacking style. The young U.S. team went 1-1-2 in international matches, facing Germany and Japan twice each.

The U.S. U-17s had an odd year in 2010 as head coach Kazbek Tambi put together an incredibly talented group that outscored its opponents 38-0 at Concacaf Qualifying in Costa Rica, but fell in the all-important semifinal in penalty kicks to Canada to end its World Cup dreams.

The $\mathrm{U}-17 \mathrm{~s}$ had a tremendous build-up schedule in place that included games against the Germany, Brazil and Japan U-17s, but one missed penalty kick rendered the preparation moot. The team nevertheless went 16-2-3 during 2010, including a 13-2-3 record in international play with its only losses coming to Japan three months after the disappointment at qualifying.

In 2009, the U-17s put together an overall record of 7-2-2, including 4-2-1 in international games, and ended the year with an impressive four-game sweep of the U-17 and/or U-20 sides from Chile, Argentina and Uruguay in Buenos Aires. The U.S. played three close matches with a German team one year older to start the year but tied once and lost twice at the event in Florida.

After coaching the U.S. U-16s in 2007, Tambi moved with the age group to U-17s in 2008 to prepare for qualifying for the historic 2008 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, the first of its kind for this age group. In 2008, the U-17s compiled a record of 19-3-2 and 11-2-1 in international matches while winning the Concacaf qualifying tournament in Trinidad \& Tobago and came within minutes of winning the inaugural FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, eventually falling 2-1 in overtime to Korea DPR.

In 2007, as this age group began its run to the 2008 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, the team went 9-1-0,
defeating two college teams as well youth sides from Germany (U-17), Denmark (U-19), England (U-19), Argentina (U-20) and Uruguay (U-17). The only setback was a loss to the Argentina U-17s.

In 2006, the U-17s defeated and tied the Germany U-17s twice early in the year and then lost to two women's clubs before reeling off six straight wins including a 4-1 triumph against the Argentina U-20s. The only setback in international matches was a 2-1 loss to the full Argentina Women's National Team. In 2005, the U-17s defeated Germany's U-17s twice, and defeated Japan's U-18s, but struggled on a trip to Mexico where they lost to Mexico and Canada's U-20s and Mexico's U-18s.

In 2004, the U-17s defeated Canada's U-17s with a resounding 5-2 win and downed Germany's U-17s, 2-1. In 2003, the U.S. went undefeated in international matches, defeating Canada once and Germany twice. The $\mathrm{U}-17 \mathrm{~s}$ also went undefeated against much older competition at the U.S. Soccer Festival in Houston, Texas. In fact, the only loss of the year came in a 4-3 shootout to the U.S. U-16 Girls in the first match of the year.

The U-17s played their first three matches in late November of 2002, two against older regional teams, and then won its first international 3-0 against Scotland in Boca Raton, Fla., on Nov. 30, 2002.

## FIFA U-17 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP REVIEW

The U.S. Under-17 Women's National Team has participated in four of the six U-17 Women's World Cups that have been staged since FIFA began holding the competition for this age group in 2008. The USA finished the first tournament in 2008 as runner-up to Korea DPR after a 2-1 overtime loss in the final. Four years later in 2012, having missed out on the 2010 edition of the tournament, the U-17s returned to the competition, only to be eliminated in group play despite finishing level on points with eventual champion France and runner-up Korea DPR. The U-17s did not qualify for the 2014 competition but returned for the 2016 event in Jordan. At the first Women's World Cup to be held in the Middle East, the USA won its first group game but lost its next two matches and did not qualify for the knockout rounds. In 2018 in Uruguay, the USA started fast, but dropped its next two group games and did not advance.

## HARD-FOUGHT EFFORT NOT ENOUGH IN URUGUAY (2018)

Entering its fourth FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, the U.S. U-17 WNT faced a tough group featuring a strong African side in Cameroon, reigning champion Korea DPR and perennial women's soccer powerhouse Germany.

The USA got off on the right foot, putting together a 3-0 victory over a physical Cameroon side. The U.S. back line stood tall while the offense struggled in the early-going, but the USA rode a wild first half into the break with a 2-0 lead. In the 22nd minute, the U.S. played on with a Cameroon player on the ground and as the African players paused, Mia Fishel raced towards goal, shot at the goalkeeper and then pounded her own rebound into the net to put the USA on the board. Tensions rose as the half wore on, culminating with a straight red card shown to the Cameroon 'keeper and a penalty kick awarded to the USA. Sunshine Fontes hammered it home to double the advantage and the Hawaiian forward clinched the match late with a longrange chip in the 81st minute.

Against Korea DPR, the USA were undone by set plays, allowing all three goals on corner kicks in a 3-0 loss. While the U.S. defense, led by goalkeeper Angelina Anderson, held strong during the run of play, the North Koreans capitalized on their set-piece opportunities, finding the net on three of five corners, including the first two of the game.

All four teams in Group C entered the final day of group play tied at three points, and the USA needed a win against Germany to guarantee advancement to the quarterfinals. After falling behind early on a direct free kick in the fourth minute, the U.S. responded energetically, taking the initiative on the attack and creating a number of quality chances. Despite outshooting Germany and controlling the tempo of the game, the U.S. failed to finish any of its opportunities, and German goalkeeper Wiebke Willebrandt put on a remarkable performance. In the first half, a U.S. goal was waved offside and another was disallowed because of a handball just before the break. Down 2-0, the USA fought valiantly in the second, but was unable to find the back of net as Germany was ruthless on the counterattack, going on to win 4-0 as the U.S. failed to advance out of group play for a second straight U-17 WWC.

## GREAT START, TOUGH FINISH IN JORDAN (2016)

The 2016 FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup marked the first FIFA women's event in the Middle East, and Jordan did not disappoint as hosts, putting on a fantastic tournament over four venues in and around the capital of Amman. The USA started the tournament with 6-1 trouncing of Paraguay as forward Civanna Kuhlmann became the first U.S. player to score three times a U-17 Women's World Cup match. She was the fourth U.S.
player to score a hat trick in a youth Women's World Cup as three players had accomplished the feat at the U-20 level. Frankie Tagliaferri, Ashley Sanchez and defender Kiara Pickett also scored against Paraguay.

The USA got off to another fast start in its next Group D game against Ghana, scoring an early goal as Tagliaferri, off an assist from Kuhlmann, tallied again, this time in just the 5th minute, but then a physical Ghana side became the aggressor. Ghana scored an equalizer in the 63rd minute, and an 84th minute penalty kick called for a hand ball in the box turned out to be the USA's undoing. The young Americans fell 2-1 to set up a likely must-win game against powerhouse Japan in the group finale.

Against Japan, the USA started strongly as Sanchez put the USA up 1-0 in the 33rd minute when she burst past the back line to finish a breakaway. The Americans took the 1-0 lead into halftime and were in position to qualify for the quarterfinals even after Japan tied the game in the 53rd minute. That all changed around the 68th minute, when Ghana scored against Paraguay in the other group match taking place at the same time, meaning the USA needed a goal to win the game and earn the three required points to advance.

Instead, it was Japan that scored twice and the USA was eliminated after finishing third in Group D. Sanchez pulled a goal back in stoppage time for the final 3-2 score line, converting a penalty kick after she was taken down in the box, but the Americans would have needed two more scores at that point. The USA did have two goals called back for offside in the second half, significant calls that would have made a big difference had at least one gone the other way, but instead Japan advanced and made it to the championship game where it lost to Korea DPR in penalty kicks after a 0-0 draw in regulation.

## FIVE POINTS NOT ENOUGH IN AZERBAIJAN (2012)

The 2012 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup in Azerbaijan turned into a painful learning experience for the young Americans who became the first team ever in a FIFA women's competition to earn five points in group play and yet fail to advance to the quarterfinals. The USA learned the importance of a goal or two in advancing during a World Cup, losing out to eventual champion France on goal difference to finish third in the group. It was the first time a U.S. women's team had not advanced out of group play during a FIFA event.

The USA was drawn into what turned out to be by far the most difficult group, which produced the eventual finalists and champion France. The Americans drew with the French 0-0 and tied eventual runners-up Korea DPR 1-1, but as it turned out, a 6-0 victory over Gambia in the middle game of Group B proved to be the USA's undoing. The North Koreans beat Gambia 11-0 and France beat the Africans, debutantes in a FIFA Women's World Cup, by a 10-2 score, getting six goals in the last 20 minutes to move ahead of the Americans on goal difference.

Still, there were many positives to be taken from the USA's Women's World Cup experience. The U.S. team allowed just one goal in the tournament and battled extremely talented French and Korean teams to the final whistle. Against North Korea, the USA took the lead on a goal from Darian Jenkins in just the second minute, only to concede a few minutes later to eventual Golden Ball winner Ri Un Sim in the fourth. The USA had several chances to steal the match at the end, but it was not to be and the Koreans deservedly won the group.

The USA did get a glimpse of some future talent, especially in goal where Jane Campbell showed signs that she could be one of the most talented young 'keepers to emerge in a while. In the beginning of 2013, she would get her first call-up to the full Women's National Team. Summer Green, the USA's leading scorer during the year, scored her first two World Cup goals.

Kudos should also go to Azerbaijan, the first predominantly Muslim country to stage a Women's World Cup at any level, as it put on a world class event. The tournament featured many activities around the matches and some of the best crowds of the three FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup tournaments held so far. France would eventually triumph in a penalty kick shootout that went eight players deep as France goalkeeper Romane Bruneau saved RI Un Yong attempt to end the game and Les Blues lifted the trophy.

OH SO CLOSE IN NEW ZEALAND (2008)
The 2008 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup in New Zealand was held with 16 nations playing in four venues and four stadiums - Auckland, Hamilton, Wellington, and Christchurch - and the tournament organizers put on a fantastic first world championship event for this age group.

The high level of play displayed over the 18 days from such young players was a sight to behold, giving cause for excitement about the U-17 and U-20 Women's World Cups to come. The organization from the Kiwis, as well as the support from the people of New Zealand, made the tournament memorable and added to the excitement for these players getting their first taste of soccer at the world stage.

The U.S. team actually started slow, losing its first match to a talented Japan team by a 3-2 score. The young Americans also needed to come from a goal down against a spunky Paraguay side in its second group match to win 3-1, setting up a clash with France for a spot in the quarterfinals. The USA gutted out a 1-1 tie against the French, but that was good enough to earn a quarterfinal meeting with Korea Republic.

The USA's World Cup run then picked up steam as the U-17s put together its best match to date, trouncing the Koreans, 4-2. A powerful German squad awaited in the semifinal, but the USA put forth a tremendous performance, coming back from a goal down to win, 2-1, as forwards Vicki DiMartino and Courtney Verloo each scored. Verloo (four goals) and DiMartino (five goals) combined for nine of the USA's 13 goals with Kristie Mewis adding two more.

The first ever FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup Final opened with a startling goal for the USA in just the second minute off a throw-in, but then Korea DPR methodically took control of the match and ended up doubling the USA in shots. Still, the USA clung to a 1-0 lead until the North Koreans tied the game with just 13 minutes left in regulation time. The match remained knotted at 1-1 and looked headed for penalty kicks, but Korea DPR scored the game-winner just three minutes from the end of overtime.

Despite the loss, which ended the USA's record of winning every "first" FIFA women's world championship (the 1991 FIFA Women's World Cup, the 1996 Olympics and the 2002 FIFA U-19 Women's World Cup), the young Americans distinguished themselves very well and the team produced numerous future professional players.

The USA's emotional run to the title game was backed by some excellent individual performances. Kristie Mewis won the Bronze Ball as the third best player in the tournament and would be named the U.S. Soccer Young Female Athlete of the Year a few months later. DiMartino won the Silver Shoe as the second leading scorer in the tournament and Taylor Vancil won the Golden Glove as the top 'keeper.

Other top players for the USA included defensive midfielder Amber Brooks, defenders Cloee Colohan, Rachel Quon and Crystal Dunn and midfielders Olivia Klei and Samantha Mewis. The Mewis sisters became the first siblings to represent the USA in a FIFA Women's World Cup.

## U.S. UNDER-16 GIRLS' NATIONAL TEAM SUPPORTS U-17 WORLD CUP EFFORTS

The U.S. Under-16 Girl's National Team was re-instituted in 2015. Prior to that year, U.S. Soccer had not had programming at the U-16 level since 2007. When FIFA instituted a world championship at the U-17 level for 2008 the U-16 age group was absorbed into the U-17s. In 2015, as part of an overall commitment to player development, new programs at the U-16 and U-19 level were started back up and U.S. Soccer now has a total of eight Youth National Teams for both its men's and women's programs: U-14, U-15, U-16, U-17, U-18, $\mathrm{U}-19, \mathrm{U}-20$ and $\mathrm{U}-23$.

These additions create two separate programming tracks for even-birth-year players and odd-birth-year players, allowing for a more consistent approach toward development and additional opportunities for players to participate in national team events and matches.
U.S. Soccer will continue to provide quality training environments and training sessions for young players and aggressively expand these efforts through the Girls' Development Academy and with its Training Center program, both of which greatly benefit the U-16 GNT.

As the U-17s have had Women's World Cup since 2008, the U-16s (and U-15s) become even more important as this age group will have a tangible goal to play in a Women's World Cup.

The pool for the U-16s will be brought to several training camps over the course of the year to expose more players of this age to the National Team camp environment and experience. U-16 players may also be brought into U-17 training camps and events during the year. The player pool is identified on a year-round basis, through the U.S. Soccer Girls' Development Academy, U.S. Soccer Training Centers, club soccer, ODP interregional events and the younger girls' National Team camps.

U-16 GNT camps are often scheduled to run concurrent with other YNT camps to give players an opportunity to watch and train against older players and learn through those experiences.

Players in this year's group of U-16s were born on or after Jan. 1, 2004.

## 2019 U.S. UNDER-16 GNT PLAYER POOL - 04s

Following is the current player pool for the U.S. Under-16 Women's National Team, which was re-instituted in 2015. Prior to that, U.S. Soccer had not conducted U-16 GNT programming since 2007. The U.S. U-16 GNT head coach and coaching staff will, for the most part, use this pool of players for training camps and matches in 2019. All the players in this pool are age-eligible for the 2020 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup. To be age-eligible for the next FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, player must have been born on or after Jan. 1, 2003. This year's U-16 GNT player pool consists of players born in 2004. The pool is constantly evolving, with new players being added and called-up. Players from the U-15 Girl's National Team pool (05s) may be called to a U-16 GNT camp.

## U.S. UNDER-15 GIRLS' NATIONAL TEAM SETS BASE FOR THE FUTURE

In its 16th year of activity, the U.S. Under-15 Girls' National Team was instituted in 2004 to help bridge the gap between the annual summer Under-14 Girls' National Identification Camp (which is no Ionger held, having been replaced by for several years by several U-14 GNT training camps and now a new U-14 Talent Identification Program) and the U.S. Under-17 Women's National Team. With the implementation of the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, the importance of the $\mathrm{U}-15 \mathrm{~s}$ and the $\mathrm{U}-16 \mathrm{~s}$ has grown as this age group will have a tangible goal when they enter their first major programming experience with the U.S. Women's National Teams.

The pool of 35-40 players for the U-15s will be brought to several training camps over the course of the year to give more players of this age the experience of being in a National Team camp environment. The player pool is identified on a year-round basis, through the U.S. Soccer Girls' Development Academy, U.S. Soccer Training Centers, club soccer, ODP interregional events and U.S. U-14 Girls' National Team camps.

Camps are often scheduled to run concurrent with older YNT camps to give the players an opportunity to watch and play against older players and learn through those experiences.

Players in this year's group of U-15s are born on or after Jan. 1, 2005, which is the age cutoff for players to be eligible for the 2022 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup.

In 2016, the USA participated for the first time in the Concacaf U-15 Girls' Championship (the second time the tournament has been held). The USA won all seven games by shutout, compiling a 49-0 goal difference, and defeated Costa Rica 5-0 in the semifinal and Canada 2-0 in the championship game to take the regional title.

In 2018, the USA participated in its second Concacaf U-15 Girls' Championship, taking a younger team of players born in 2004 and 2005 to play against teams of players mostly born in 2003. The USA won four games, and lost one, that to guest team Portugal by a 3-0 score in group play, but avenged that setback in the semifinal, flipping the score to win 3-0. In the championship game, the USA battled Mexico to a 0-0 tie through the 70 minutes of regulation before scoring three goals in extra time via Jaedyn Shaw (two goals) and Alyssa Thompson.

Tracey Kevins joined U.S. Soccer full-time in June of 2017 as the head coach for the U.S. Under-15 Girls' National Team.

Kevins came to U.S. Soccer from the Seattle Reign in the NWSL where she served as an assistant coach for just over a year before taking her current post. With the Reign, in addition to her coaching and scouting duties for the NWSL squad, she was also the Technical Director for the Seattle Reign Academy where she was responsible for overseeing five head coaches and their teams.

Kevins works with U.S. Soccer Women's Youth National Teams Director April Heinrichs and the other age group coaches in all aspects of the USA's Youth National Team programs. Kevins will also work closely with U.S. Under-17 Women's National Team head coach Mark Carr and U.S. Under-16 GNT head coach Kacey White to maximize the development, evaluation and movement of players between the age groups for training camps and matches during the World Cup cycle.

Since 2013, Kevins has been coaching at the U.S. Soccer Training Centers, first in the Los Angeles area and then in the northwest, helping to identify and assess players for potential call-ups to the USA's Youth National Teams.

From October of 2013 through December of 2014, Kevins was coach for the L.A. Blues in the USL W-League, guiding the club to a 15-0-0 record and a national championship. Eight players on the team were taking in the 2015 NWSL Draft. Before that, she coached the LA Strikers in the W-League. She was also a coach and mentor for LA Premier Soccer Club from 2013-2016.

From 2004-2013, Kevins worked for the England Football Association as an assistant coach for various age group National Teams, working with the U-15, U-17, U-19 and U-20 squads. On occasion, she served as head coach for the U-17 and U-19 England Women's National Teams during tournaments and training camps.

She was an assistant coach for the England team that finished second at the 2007 U-19 Women's Euros and with the team that finished in the top four in 2008. She was also an assistant coach at the 2008 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in Chile.

During her coaching career in England, she also served as the head coach for the first team at Barnet FC Ladies from 2004-2013 and helped the club win the FA Women's Premier League Cup in 2011. She was also the Barnet FC Academy Head Coach for 16 to 19-year-olds from 2008-2013.

From 2008-2013, she was also the technical director for the Middlesex FA Girls' Centre of Excellence, where she worked with talented young players from ages 7-17 at one of the 30 licensed Centres of Excellence in England. From 2003-2008, she worked in a similar role at the Leyton Orient FC Girls' Centre of Excellent as the U-16 head coach.

On the boys' side, she worked as an assistant coach with Wealdstone FC U-19s from 2004-2005 and 20082009.

## U.S. UNDER-14 GIRLS' <br> NATIONAL TEAM

Over the years, the play of the United States Youth National Teams has confirmed its status as the top nation for women's and girls' youth soccer in Concacaf, as well as one of the best in the world. The work done with the U.S. Under-14 Girls' National Team Program, which has been in existence since 1999, is a major reason for the increasing quantity and quality of young players vying for spots on the numerous U.S. Women's National Teams.

In 2015, the structure of the USA's Youth National Teams was adjusted with new programming added at the Under-16 and Under-19 levels. U.S. Soccer now has Girls' and Women's Youth National Teams at the U-14, U-15, U-16, U-17, U-18, U-19, U-20 and U-23 levels.

The structure means that U.S. Soccer now has two tracks for players, one for players born in even years and the other for those born in odd years. Players born in odd years, which are the age-cut-off years for the FIFA $\mathrm{U}-17$ Women's World Cup, follow the path of U-15 (2 years), U-17 (2 years) and U-19 (2 years). Players born in even years, which are the age-cut-off years for the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup, follow the path of U-16 (2 years), U-18 (2 years) and U-20 (2 years).

In winter 2018, a new YNT U-14 Talent Identification Program was launched for top male players across the country. A similar program will be implemented for female players during the 2019-20 season.

Starting in the fall of 2017, the U.S. Soccer Girls' Development Academy became the prime environment for player identification for the U.S. Youth National Teams, but players are also identified through scores of Talent ID Centers that are staged across the country throughout the year and through other youth soccer development programs such as ODP, id2, ECNL and National League.

Players for Youth National Teams are identified by U.S. Soccer's National Team coaching staff and YNT Network Scouts spread throughout the country. Three regional Talent Identification Managers: Katie Cole in the Central region, Diane Drake in the East and Marieke Laurens in the West oversee the talent identification process and staff.

In 1999, U.S. Soccer started what was then called the U.S. Under-14 National Development Program, knowing that in order to continue to compete with the elite countries on the international level, the U.S. would have to build a base of players from the youth level up. The U-14 program has evolved in its structure but still serves the purpose of introducing the USA's top young players to a level of soccer they would not otherwise experience at this point in their careers. Additionally, players are involved in international games that are invaluable in their development.

The U-14 girls' program has helped to produce numerous players who have made an impact on the older levels of the Women's National Team. 2015 Women's World Cup champion Heather O'Reilly, and Lindsay Tarpley, both 2002 U-19 Women's World Cup Champions and Olympic gold medalists, attended U-14 National team camp at the beginning of their careers. Other well-known names in the WNT program that began their careers as U-14s include Lori Chalupny, Leslie Osborne and Tobin Heath, as well as 2012 U-20 Women's World Cup champions Julie Johnston, Crystal Dunn, Cari Roccaro, Abby Smith, Maya Hayes, Sarah Killion, Bryane Heaberlin, Morgan Brian, Mollie Pathman, Samantha Mewis and Vanessa DiBernardo. 2016 Olympian and two-time U-20 Women's World Cup Team member Mallory Pugh also started her WNT career at the U-14 level.

## FIFA WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Federation Internationale de Football Association (FIFA) conducts eight major outdoor soccer world championships played at the international level. Those tournaments are the FIFA World Cup, the FIFA Women's World Cup, the Men's Olympic Football Tournament, the Women's Olympic Football Tournament, the FIFA Under-20 World Cup, the FIFA Under-17 World Cup, the FIFA Under-20 Women's World Cup and the FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup. Additionally, FIFA also conducts the Futsal World Cup every four years, and the Beach Soccer World Cup biennially. A quick synopsis of these tournaments is listed below. More detail can be found on USA performances at each of these tournaments throughout the U.S. Men's National Team Media Guide and the U.S. Women's National Team Media Guide.

## FIFA WORLD CUP

The FIFA World Cup has been played 20 times since the first competition in 1930 in Uruguay. The tournament has grown in stature over the years and has become not only the biggest sporting event in the world, but also simply the biggest event in the world every four years. Outside of the USA's third-place finish in the inaugural tournament, the team's quarterfinal run in 2002 is the side's best World Cup finish.

## FIFA WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

The FIFA Women's World Cup has been contested on seven occasions with the USA earning three championships (China '91, USA '99 and Canada '15), Germany two (USA '03 and China '07) and Norway (Sweden '95) and Japan (Germany '11) one each. The 2011 Women's World Cup featured 16 teams for the fourth time, after seeing 12 compete in both 1991 and 1995. Most recently, Canada hosted the biggest event in women's soccer in 2015, where the USA defeated Japan in dominant fashion in the final to lift its third trophy - the only country to win a Women's World Cup three times. Additionally, Canada 2015 was the first time the Women's World Cup featured 24 nations.

## OLYMPIC FOOTBALL TOURNAMENTS

After competing as an exhibition sport at the 1900 and 1904 Olympic Games, soccer became the first team sport included in the Olympics with the first official tournament dating back to the 1908 London Games when the United Kingdom defeated Denmark to claim the gold medal. Since that time soccer has been part of every Olympiad except the 1932 event in the United States.

On the women's side, the sport wasn't introduced to the Olympics until the 1996 competition in the United States. The U.S. claimed the inaugural gold medal in women's Olympic football by defeating China 2-1 on Aug. 1, 1996, in front of a capacity crowd of 76,481 fans in Athens, Georgia.

The growth of professional football after World War II meant that some of the best players were not eligible to compete in the Olympics. Nevertheless, the Olympic Tournament retained its vitality as a forum for the amateur game. In 1952, Hungary's great generation with players such as Grosics, Czibor, Puskas and Kocsis won the tournament in Helsinki. After that, and until Los Angeles in 1984, all the Olympic titles went to Eastern Europe, a span of eight straight tournaments.

When the Olympics entered the modern era, FIFA was obliged to reconsider its position for the Barcelona 1992 tournament, where, for the first time, the tournament was restricted to Under-23 national teams. In 1996, FIFA altered the U-23 designation slightly, allowing teams to add three overage players into the mix, a rule that was still in effect for the 2012 Olympiad.

Through the 1928 Olympics in Holland, Olympic caps were counted as full international appearances, but that designation changed with the advent of the World Cup in 1930. Although the Olympic Games football tournament actually falls under the realm of the International Olympic Committee, FIFA presides over the event on behalf of the IOC.

Contested every two years, the FIFA Under-20 World Cup is restricted to players under 20 years of age. The tournament was renamed from the FIFA World Youth Championship in 2006. The U.S. has qualified for the tournament on 15 occasions, finishing fourth in 1989 (Saudi Arabia). At the most recent tournament in 2017 in Korea Republic, the U.S. opened group play with a 3-3 gritty come-from-behind draw against Ecuador, and then defeated Senegal, 1-0 and tied Saudi Arabia, 1-1 to win Group F and advance to the knockout stage. In the Round of 16 , the U-20 MNT put together a dominant 6-0 win against New Zealand to move on to the quarterfinals where it faced eventual World Cup runner-up Venezuela and dropped an incredibly competitive match that went to extra time, 2-1. At the end of the tournament, the USA's Josh Sargent was awarded the Silver Boot as the second highest goal scorer of the World Cup. The 17-year-old scored four goals in South Korea. The U-20 MNT's performance in the Asian nation marked the second consecutive time the team reached the quarterfinals after also doing so in 2015 in New Zealand. The host country for the 2019 edition is set to be announced by FIFA soon.

## FIFA UNDER-20 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

Renamed the FIFA Under-20 Women's World Cup in 2008, the tournament was staged as a U-20 event for the first time in 2006 after two initial tournaments were played as Under-19 events. The inaugural FIFA U-19 Women's World Championship was held in Canada from Aug. 17-Sept. 1, 2002, with 12 teams. That first tournament was an incredible success, with the USA capturing the first championship via a Lindsay Tarpley golden goal in a 1-0 victory in front of 47,784 fans in Edmonton, Canada. The U.S. fell to Germany in the semifinals in Thailand in 2004, and in 2006 finished out of the top three for the first time in program history, taking fourth place after losing in penalty kick shootouts in the semifinal and third-place matches. In 2008, however, Golden Ball winner Sydney Leroux and Silver Ball winner Alex Morgan returned the U.S. to the top of the podium. After getting knocked out once again in penalty kicks in 2010, this time in the quarterfinal, a $1-0$ victory against Germany in the 2012 U-20 Women's World Cup Final in Tokyo, Japan capped a remarkable run by the young Americans with defender and captain Julie Ertz (née Johnston) earning the Bronze Ball as the tournament's third most valuable player. In 2014, the USA once again fell victim to penalty kicks, losing to Korea DPR in a quarterfinal shootout after drawing 1-1 through regulation and overtime, and in 2016 it finished in fourth place after losing to eventual World Cup champion Korea DPR in the semifinal, 2-1, and dropping a tight third-place match against Japan, 1-O. The 2018 edition of the tournament saw the U.S. ousted from a tough group that included champions Japan and runner-up Spain.

## FIFA UNDER-17 WORLD CUP

The Under-17 World Championship is contested every two years for players less than 17 years of age. The U.S. was the only team in the world to qualify for every U-17 World Championship, from the tournament's inception in 1985 until 2013. The first three tournaments were actually played as U-16 World Championship tournaments, but FIFA changed the event to its present U-17 status in 1989. The Concacaf region hosted the tournament for a second time in 2001, when Trinidad \& Tobago served as the first-ever Caribbean host for a FIFA World Championship. Mexico became the first Concacaf team to win an outdoor men's world championship in 2005 with an impressive triumph in Peru before winning the tournament a second time in 2013 as the host country. The U.S. achieved its best result in 1999, finishing fourth. In 2017, the U-17 MNT matched their U-20s counterparts and advanced to the quarterfinals where they fell 4-2 to eventual World Cup champion, England. It was the third time the USA's U-17s and U-20s had both advanced to the quarterfinals, previously doing it in 1993 and 2003.

## FIFA UNDER-17 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

The FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup was played for the first time in 2008 in New Zealand. The U.S. team made an impressive run to the final, but was defeated by Korea DPR in overtime and earned second place. In 2012 in Azerbaijan, the USA was draw into a group with eventual finalists France and Korea DPR, and despite not losing a game and earning five points in the group, the young Americans failed to advance to the knockout stage. The USA became the first women's team in a FIFA event earn five points in the group and not advance. The USA did not qualify for the 2010 or 2014 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cups, losing in penalty kicks in the semifinal of the qualifying tournaments for each of those tournaments. In 2016, the USA failed to advance past the group stage after falling 3-2 to 2014 champion and eventual 2016 World Cup runner-up, Japan. Despite winning its opening game, and injury decimated U.S. team was knocked out in the group stage of the 2018 tournament after losses to traditional U-17 powers North Korea and Germany.

## FIFA FUTSAL WORLD CUP

The FIFA Futsal World Cup has been contested seven times with Brazil winning the first three tournaments, and Spain winning two championships in 2000 and 2004 before Brazil returned to glory as hosts in 2008 and defeated Spain for a fifth title in 2012. The Futsal World Cup is the only indoor tournament hosted by FIFA. The 1992 second-place finish was the best-ever showing in a FIFA event by a U.S. men's team, and came on the heels of a third-place finish in 1989.

## FIFA BEACH SOCCER WORLD CUP

Beach soccer became a part of the FIFA family in 2005 when the first FIFA Beach Soccer World Cup was staged on Copacabana Beach in Rio de Janeiro. To everyone's surprise, France defeated Portugal in the final, while Brazil fell in the semis; however, Brazil rebounded to win four straight tournaments from 2006-09. 2011 marked the first time the competition was played biennially, and ushered in a new era of dominance as Russia upended Brazil in the final before defeating Spain in 2013 to claim a second straight championship. Portugal won at home in 2015, while Brazil returned to glory in 2017 and earned its fifth title.

## FIFA CONFEDERATIONS CUP

The Confederations Cup was contested under FIFA's auspices for the first time in 1997 and replaced the Intercontinental Championship, which was staged in 1992 and 1995 with all three tournaments held in Saudi Arabia. In 1999, the Confederations Cup was held in Mexico and it returned to Asia in 2001, where it was staged as a precursor to the 2002 FIFA World Cup in Korea and Japan. In 2005, the competition became quadrennial, staged one year before the World Cup in the tournament's host country. Brazil won the tournament from 2005-13, defeating the U.S. in the final of the 2009 edition after the USA had built a 2-0 half-time lead. In 2017, defending World Cup champion Germany defeated South American champions Chile, 1-0 to claim its first Confederations Cup title.

# 00 <br> OLYMPIC HISTORY HISTORY OF SOCCER PARTICIPATION 

The first official men's Olympic soccer tournament dates back to the 1908 London Games, when Great Britain defeated Denmark to claim the first soccer gold medal. Since that time soccer has been part of every Olympic Games Program, with the exception of the 1932 Los Angeles Games. The 1940 and 1944 Olympic Games were canceled completely due to the political tensions surrounding World War II.

The United States has competed in the men's Olympic finals 13 times, including five straight tournaments from 1984 to 2000. In addition, the U.S. qualified for - but did not compete in - the 1980 Moscow Games following a boycott by the U.S. Olympic Committee. The U.S. missed out on qualifying for the 2004 Athens Olympics, but returned in 2008 after finishing second at the Concacaf qualifying event, which was held in the U.S.

In 2012, the U.S. Women's National Team earned its third straight gold medal and fourth overall when it topped 2011 FIFA Women's World Cup champion Japan on Aug. 9 in front of more than 80,000 spectators at Wembley Stadium in London. The U.S. Men were eliminated in Concacaf qualifying in March, dropping to third place in their group following a late EI Salvador goal in the closing seconds of a 3-3 draw on March 26.

Up until and including the 1988 Seoul Games, the Olympic soccer tournament was an unrestricted event, and thus the U.S. Olympic Soccer Team was essentially the U.S. National Team. However the tournament structure has changed since that time, and the restrictions on age and experience of players involved in Olympic competition has been under review by FIFA, which makes all tournament recommendations to the International Olympic Committee (IOC).

The 1992 Barcelona Games proved to be the turning point in the Olympic soccer tournament, when the tournament was competed as an under-23 event for the first time. Host Spain captured the title at Barcelona's famed Nou Camp Stadium in front of 95,000 jubilant fans. Spain's progress in the tournament aided struggling attendances in 1992, which were far lower than expected. There is little doubt that the poor attendance in Spain played a role in the changes made for the 1996 Atlanta Games.

Not only did Atlanta '96 signify the first time women's soccer was included in the Olympic Program, but the men's tournament was adapted from its under-23 format in 1992 to include three "overage" players. "Overage" players are those who were either over 23 years of age or who previously played in an Olympic Games soccer tournament. Claudio Reyna (who was age eligible in 1996, but had competed for the U.S. in 1992), Kasey Keller and Alexi Lalas were the USA's overage players in 1996.

In 2000, veteran defenders Jeff Agoos and Frankie Hejduk, as well as goalkeeper Brad Friedel, were selected as the USA's overage players, helping the team on an unprecedented tournament run, which saw the U.S. advance to the medal round before falling in the semifinals to a strong Spanish team.

For the 2008 Olympics in China, Brian McBride agreed to come out of international retirement and captained a team that included Under-23 stars Sacha Kljestan and Freddy Adu, who had paced the U.S. through qualifying. After a 1-0 victory against Japan in the first game, the U.S. was minutes away from upsetting reigning European champions Netherlands, but had to settle for a 2-2 tie after giving up a late free kick goal. In the third group game, eventual runner-up Nigeria took advantage of a third-minute red card by Michael Orozco and held on for a 2-1 win to send the U.S. home despite earning four points.

The U.S. Women's National Team claimed the inaugural gold medal in women's competition at the Atlanta Games with a 2-1 victory over China before 76,481 fans on Aug. 1, 1996, in Athens, Ga. The attendance mark, which at the time was the largest crowd to ever watch a women's athletic event, set the stage for the incredibly successful Women's World Cup staged in the U.S. in 1999. The gold medal victory culminated an impressive five-game undefeated run through the tournament in which the U.S. Women played in front of packed crowds.

As they did in 1996, the U.S. Women had a strong run to the medal stand in 2000, winning the "Group of Death" that included China, Nigeria and Norway. In the Gold Medal match, a spirited Norway team refused to yield and eventually took home the gold with a thrilling 3-2 overtime triumph.

The 2004 Athens Games were a fitting end for a number of U.S. veterans, including Mia Hamm, Julie Foudy and Joy Fawcett, who went out of the sport as they came into it: as champions. The never-say-die team won both its semifinal and final matches in overtime, courtesy of a Heather O'Reilly strike against Germany and an Abby Wambach goal against Brazil to claim the gold.

Four years later, the U.S. came into the Olympics without Wambach, the team's top scorer who broke her leg in a preparation match. With Pia Sundhage leading the team into her first World Championship as head coach, a new class of players including Hope Solo, Carli Lloyd and surprise leading scorer Angela Hucles led the team to gold with a 1-0 victory over Brazil.

In 2012, the U.S. Women went undefeated at 6-0-0 for the first time at an Olympic tournament. The USA's run included a thrilling come-from-behind victory in the semifinal against Canada, with Alex Morgan scoring the game-winner in the 123rd minute for the latest goal ever scored in a FIFA competition. In the gold medal match, Lloyd scored both U.S. goals against Japan and the USA became the first country - in either men's or women's soccer - to earn a fourth gold.

In 2016, the U.S. women defeated New Zealand 2-0 to open their Olympic tournament in Belo Horizonte, and went on to defeat France 1-0 before drawing Colombia 2-2 in Manaus to win the group. In the quarterfinal round, the USA fell to Sweden in penalty kicks following a 1-1 draw through regulation and extra time despite outshooting Sweden 27 to 6 and dominating much of the match. It was the first time in U.S. WNT's history that the team did not medal at an Olympic tournament..

## PAN-AM GAMES HISTORY OF SOCCER PARTICIPATION

The Pan American Games are held every four years during the summer preceding the Olympic Games. In terms of the number of sports and athletes, the Pan American Games are second in size only to the Olympics. The men's soccer tournament has been part of every Pan American games since its inception and in 1999 women's soccer made its debut.

After scheduling conflicts kept the United States from competing in the 2003 games in Santo Domingo in the Dominican Republic, U.S. Soccer was able to return to the competition at the 2007 event in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. However, conflicts again kept the U.S. out of the2011 event hosted in Mexico and will preclude participation in the 2015 event in Canada.

In 2007, the U.S. Men's team was represented by head coach Bob Jenkins' Under-18 Men's National Team, and after opening the tournament with a strong 2-1 win over Venezuela, the U.S. dropped its next two games and was eliminated. In its second match, the U.S. Ied Bolivia 2-0 at the half, only to lose 4-2. Against Mexico in its final group game, the teams were tied 0-0 with 15 minutes remaining when the U.S. was reduced to 10 men, and eventually lost 2-0.

That same year, the U.S. Under-20 Women's National Team had a very strong run into the tournament finals, behind a blistering six-goal tournament from Lauren Cheney (U.S. Soccer's Young Female Athlete of the Year in 2007). After winning their group with a 2-1-0 record, head coach Jill Ellis' U-20s defeated the Senior Canada Women's National Team 2-1 in the semifinal, then lost to the full Brazil Women's National Team 5-0 in the final.

In 1999, the U.S. Under-23 National Team competed in the men's tournament, while the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team represented the U.S. in the women's competition held in Winnipeg, Canada. The U.S. Men captured the second Pan-Am Games Bronze Medal in their history with a 2-1 victory over the Canada in the third-place match. Carlos Bocanegra and a young Landon Donovan led the USA with goals in that match.

The Women's U-18 squad captured gold medal in the first-ever Pan American Women's Final with a hard-fought 1-0 win over an older Mexico squad. The U.S. Women dominated their opponents throughout the tournament, going undefeated in six games (5-0-1) while outscoring their opposition 22-2.

The first Pan American Games were held in 1951, but its history goes back two decades earlier. In 1932, the South American delegation of the International Olympic Committee (IOC) proposed the formation of an organization to promote amateur sports in the Americas. The idea led to the first Pan American Sports Congress in Buenos Aires, Argentina, in 1940. The 16 countries represented at the meeting formed the Pan American Sports Committee, and agreed to hold the first Pan American Games in 1942 in Buenos Aires, but World War II forced their postponement.

The idea stayed alive, and the first Pan American Games finally opened in Buenos Aires on Feb. 25, 1951. The organization governing the Games was renamed the Pan American Sports Organization (PASO) and is made up of nations of North, Central and South America and the Caribbean.

The soccer tournament at the Pan American Games has never enjoyed a very high profile, perhaps because in the past competing nations have not sent their strongest team. The one exception was the 1975 Games in Mexico City, when 110,000 spectators turned out at Azteca Stadium to watch the final between Mexico and Brazil.

Like many of the competing nations, the United States has used the competition as a preparation for the Olympic Games. In 1991, the U.S. won its first Pan American gold medal in soccer in Havana, Cuba, defeating Mexico 2-1 in overtime. Former U.S. Men's National Team midfielder Joe-Max Moore scored a sensational free kick to win that game for the Americans.

## CONCACAF WOMEN'S CHAMPIONSHIP HISTORY

Hosts, Champions \& Qualifiers

Concacaf has hosted 14 competitions that have served as regional championships for women's national teams. The USA has participated in 13 of those tournaments, missing only the 1998 Concacaf Women's Championship when the Americans were automatic qualifiers for the 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup, which it hosted. The USA has won 12 Concacaf championships.

Eight of those tournaments were qualifying events for the FIFA Women's World Cup, four were Olympic Qualifying tournaments and two did not have any qualifying ramifications (the Women's Gold Cup in 2000 and the Concacaf Women's Championship in 1993). The 1996 and 2000 Olympic Women's Soccer Tournaments did not have Concacaf Qualifying events as the teams qualified for the Olympics based on their Women's World Cup finish the previous years.

Three of the tournaments were called Concacaf Women's Gold Cups. Those took place in 2000 (hosted by USA) when it was an eight-team competition that was not a qualifying tournament and featured guest team Brazil; in 2002 in a tournament co-hosted by Canada and the USA that served as the qualifying for the 2003 FIFA Women's World Cup; and a six-team event in 2006 hosted by the USA that served as qualifying for the 2007 FIFA Women's World Cup.

## Carlos CORDEIRO

PRESIDENT U．S．SOCCER



U．S．Soccer＇s membership elected Carlos Cordeiro to a four－year term as U．S．Soccer＇s 32 nd President during the National Council Meeting at the Federation＇s 2018 Annual General Meeting（AGM）in Orlando．

A life－long soccer fan，Cordeiro became President after serving in various roles with U．S．Soccer since 2007， when he was appointed as the Federation＇s first Independent Director．As Vice President in 2016 and 2017， he worked to reform Board governance with a focus on greater transparency and accountability．

He has also previously served as U．S．Soccer Treasurer and Chair of the Budget Committee．In addition，he represents U．S．Soccer on the Concacaf Council and FIFA＇s Stakeholders Committee．

His business executive background includes more than 30 years of experience in international finance． Cordeiro became a partner at Goldman Sachs in the early 1990s and was appointed Vice Chairman－Asia in 2000．In those roles，he advised governments，global corporations，and financial institutions worldwide． Although now retired，he remains an honorary advisor to the firm．

From 2005 to 2015，he also served as an independent director of BHP Billiton，the world＇s largest natural resources company，where he focused on governance，finance and risk management．

Born to a Colombian mother and Portuguese－Indian father，Cordeiro immigrated to the United States from India with his mother and three siblings at the age of 15，becoming an American citizen 10 years later．

He is a graduate of Miami Beach High School，Harvard College，and Harvard Business School．As a dedicated philanthropist，Cordeiro has supported nonprofit causes that reflect his commitment to education and healthcare，and he has held director－level positions at several charitable foundations．


As U.S. Soccer's CEO / Secretary General since June 1, 2000, Flynn has taken his lessons learned from the field and applied them administratively at the sports highest level to help spur the United States Soccer Federation's growth into one of the most respected national governing bodies in the country. Through his tireless efforts, Flynn has been responsible for instilling the groundwork for U.S. Soccer's success in the new millennium.

In his more than 19 years as the organization's CEO, Flynn has catapulted U.S. Soccer's business growth into an organization with more than $\$ 150$ million dollars in reserve. With the benefit of several multi-million dollar partnerships, Flynn oversaw a renewed focus on National Team and player development, creating more opportunities for youth players of all ages by adding Youth National Team programs from U-14 to the U-20s, and launching the Boys' and Girls' Development Academy Programs.

Flynn also focused on creating soccer facilities, leading to the development and construction of U.S. Soccer's National Training Center at the Dignity Health Sports Park in Carson, Calif., which opened in June 2003, and the National Training and Coaching Development Center in Kansas City, Kan., which opened at the end of 2017. He also led the process of building the brand new National Soccer Hall of Fame in Frisco, Texas, which opened in October of 2018.

Flynn has also overseen the establishment and expansion of the U.S. Soccer Development Fund, engaging with benefactors at all levels to help support Federation initiatives.

During the summer of 2003 Flynn served as the Chief Executive Officer of the FIFA Women's World Cup USA 2003, putting his strong business background to work in preparing the framework to help the Local Organizing Committee successfully stage the tournament. With attendance peaking above 350,000 despite just four months to organize the event, the tournament was the most financially profitable Women's World Cup ever.

Flynn's career path has included both sports marketing and management positions at Anheuser-Busch, as well as more than 25 years of experience within the sport of soccer at World Cup 1994, the U.S. Soccer Foundation and the U.S. Soccer Federation. Flynn was a part of the amazing growth of Anheuser-Busch, where he served in numerous capacities both domestically and internationally. He was also directly involved in Anheuser-Busch's sponsorship of the 1986 World Cup in Mexico, which served as the springboard for their future involvement in the sport on a long-term basis.

For two years, Flynn served as Executive Director of the U.S. Soccer Foundation, where he was responsible for the organization's overall management. Prior to joining the Foundation, he played key roles at both World Cup 1994, serving as the Venue Director in Chicago, and at U.S. Soccer, where from 1994 to 1998 he managed the governing body's day-to-day operations at the Federation headquarters in Chicago.

A graduate from St. Louis University, Flynn was a defender at SLU from 1973 to 1977, helping the Billikens to an NCAA championship in 1973 and to a runner-up finish in 1974. Born Jan. 20, 1955, in St. Louis, Mo., he is married to Cathy and the couple has three daughters (Lauren, Anneliese and Erin).


The U.S. Soccer Federation Referee Program's membership ranks among the largest of all FIFA nations with nearly 138,000 registered officials, instructors, assignors, and assessors. Officials registered with U.S. Soccer work sanctioned games at all levels of competition including youth, adult, professional, and international matches.

## Referee Education Resources

U.S. Soccer is committed to producing referee education resources aimed at supporting officials regularly working amateur games at the youth and adult levels. These officials represent the foundation of the U.S. Soccer Referee Program and their training and development is paramount to the success of the program. This is accomplished through the development of targeted training materials supporting specific levels of competition.

## Referee Identification and Training

These initiatives focus on identifying and training high potential officials with the ability to referee at the professional and international levels. These efforts see U.S. Soccer assign a network of highly qualified assessors, instructors, and referee coaches to various elite-level regional and national events. Quantitative and qualitative data from these events are used to classify the program's up-and-coming and high performing officials.

## The Professional Referee Organization (PRO)

The Professional Referee Organization is the organization responsible for managing the referee and assistant referee program in professional soccer leagues in the United States and Canada, working alongside the U.S. Soccer Federation, Major League Soccer, Canadian Soccer Association, United Soccer League and National Women's Soccer League.

The organization's goals are to increase the quality of officiating in U.S. and Canadian professional leagues, develop more professional-quality officials at a younger age, and produce officials who will represent the United States and Canada in FIFA competitions.

## 2019 FIFA International Panel

A list of international referees and assistant referees that are eligible to officiate FIFA sanctioned matches in the coming year is announced annually by FIFA. The current American contingent totals seven referees, 15 assistant referees and two futsal referees.

# U.S. SOCCER'S COACHING DEPARTMENT and National coaching schools 

The U.S. Soccer Coaching Department was established in the early 1970s by famed West German teacher and coach Dettmar Cramer. Each level of the U.S. Soccer Coaching License Pathway is designed to meet the needs of coaches ranging from the coach who is inexperienced in soccer to the former professional player who desires to coach in amateur, professional or international competitions.
U.S. Soccer has licensed thousands of coaches in the decades since the department was first founded. U.S. Soccer is committed to providing soccer coaches with up-to-date theoretical and practical knowledge so coaches can develop their full potential. The diagram below shows the current U.S. Soccer Coaching License Pathway.


The U.S. Soccer National Coaching Schools provide courses in which coaches can earn nationally certified credentials which afford them opportunities and recognition inherent in the attainment of various levels of coaching expertise. This proven curriculum improves a coach's knowledge of the game and provides valuable information on current coaching trends and international developments in the game.

The course curriculum is based on a set of tasks a coach must carry out. These tasks are defined as coaching matches, coaching training sessions, leading the team, leading the player, managing a performance environment and leadership. Coaches will be educated and assessed based on the progression of these tasks relative to each course within the license pathway.

A (Senior and Youth), B and C level courses span three to six months in time and take place over a series of face-to-face meetings. Candidates have an opportunity to practically apply what they have learned in their home environment with their own team between meetings. U.S. Soccer staff travel to assess candidates in their home environment for the Pro, A-Senior and A-Youth courses. Regional assessment centers are organized for the C and B courses.
U.S. Soccer also offers a $D$ license that is available through member associations. While the memberassociations are responsible for the execution of these courses, the curriculum is developed and overseen by U.S. Soccer's Coaching Department. For more information on the course, downloadable materials are available at ussoccer.com.

The following is an overview of U.S. Soccer's coaching education programs and the curriculum for each course offered:

## Introduction to Grassroots Coaching

The Introduction to Grassroots Coaching is a cost-free, online module intended for all parents and coaches of youth players. The focus of this grassroots introduction is to share U.S. Soccer's best practices in creating a fun, supportive, activity-centered and age-appropriate environment for grassroots players.

## Grassroots Licenses

The eight new Grassroots courses, which replaced the F and E License Courses, offer an a-la-carte approach meant to empower coaches with education that is relevant to their specific coaching needs. The Grassroots Licenses will help coaches ensure fun, enjoyable, and developmentally appropriate environments for their players. A unique combination of three of the eight Grassroots Licenses, including two in-person courses (one of which must be the 11 v 11 ) and one online course now formally represent the prerequisite to progress to the U.S. Soccer D License.

## D License

The National D license is a 40 to 45 -hour course, held over two weekends, at minimum 4 weeks apart, designed for the grassroots coach who meets the prerequisites outlined above. The focus of this course is to facilitate the improvement of the candidates in the six tasks of a coach across all four game models ( $4 \mathrm{v} 4,7 \mathrm{v} 7$, $9 \mathrm{v} 9,11 \mathrm{v} 11$ ). The course consists of a mix of classroom lectures and field sessions that focus on using the Play-Practice-Play Training Methodology.

## C License

The C license is designed to introduce concepts that are targeted toward coaching players of 13 years of age or older, with a primary emphasis on the core competencies of coaching in games up to 11 v 11 . The C course consists of two separate meetings over the span of 2-3 months.

## B License

The B license focuses on advanced coaching competencies and the principle of long term player development and developing a team. The B course consists of three separate meetings over the span of 4-5 months with a final meeting taking place in the home environment of the candidate.

## A-Youth License

The A-Youth license is designed to focus on the development of elite youth players as a part of the pathway to becoming a professional player. Targeted at coaches who work with players from 12-19 years of age in an elite youth performance environment, the course consists of four meetings separated by three development periods. Candidates are educated and assessed over a 5-6-month period based on the six tasks of a coach (coaching games, coaching training sessions, leading the team, leading the players, managing a performance environment, leadership).

## A-Senior License

The A-Senior license is designed to focus on creating a winning team in a high-performance environment, based on the development of attacking, defending, and transitioning of the coach's own team related to upcoming opponents. Targeted at coaches who work with senior players in a high-performance environment, the course consists of four meetings separated by three development periods. Candidates are educated and assessed over a 5-6-month period based on the six tasks of a coach (coaching games, coaching training sessions, leading the team, leading the players, managing a performance environment, leadership).

## Academy Director License

The Academy Director license is designed to meet the high demands and standards of leading an academy in a youth development environment. The goal of the course is to educate candidates to become (more) competent and successful in executing the tasks of an Academy Director. The 10-month course consists of six domestic meetings and one international case study.

## Pro License

The Pro license is designed to enable candidates to acquire or further develop the competencies (knowledge, skills, attitude and personal traits) necessary to work as a professional coach in a professional environment. The 12-month course consists of three meetings and two individual visits centered around the management of a professional team within a professional environment.

## U.S. Soccer National Development Center

Home to U.S. Soccer Coaching Education and Sporting Kansas City's first team, the National Development Center celebrated its grand opening on May 16, 2018. The $\$ 75$ million, 50.49acre facility, which serves as the home to the U.S. Soccer Coaching Education department, is also home to Children's Mercy Sports Medicine Center. Sporting the latest soccer-specific technology and sports medicine innovations, the NDC represents the future of the sport in the United States and aligns with U.S. Soccer's primary objective of improving the sport at all levels.

Located along the north side of the NDC, the U.S. Soccer Coaching Education Center provides a world-class environment designed to maximize the development of coaches. With full-time administrative and technical staff, two locker rooms, four classrooms with operable walls, six breakout rooms, all-day cafeteria access, two full-size, synthetic turf fields with LED sports lighting, and a two-story coaching pavilion, the NDC will host more than its fair share of U.S. Soccer coaching courses over the coming years.

The NDC is located at 1913 Pinnacle Way in Kansas City, KS. Sitting approximately 1.5 miles northeast of Children's Mercy Park, Sporting Kansas City's home venue, the NDC is about a 20-minute ride from the Kansas City International Airport and equidistant from downtown Kansas City (Missouri).

## U.S. Soccer National Training Center

U.S. Soccer's National Training Center at Dignity Health Sports Park in Carson, Calif., stands as one of the great achievements in the organization's 100-plus-year history. What started as a vision in 1999 became a reality with its construction in 2003 and is now widely-hailed as an exemplar of sports infrastructure in the United States.

The complex is a first-class facility that shows the integration of all U.S. National Team programs, from talent identification camps straight through to the full Men's and Women's National Teams playing in the main stadium.

The National Training Center officially opened on June 6, 2003, as the U.S. Under-17 Men's National Team arrived to begin training. The first game at what is now known as Dignity Health Sports Park was played in the stadium one day later on June 7, 2003, as the Los Angeles Galaxy topped the Colorado Rapids 2-0 in Major League Soccer action.

Located on the campus of California State University, Dominguez Hills, the National Training Center includes four grass soccer fields, two FieldTurf soccer fields and a general training area. The complex also includes three additional practice fields for the Galaxy and the college, as well as all the necessary team support facilities, including locker rooms, a training room, a weight room and office space for staff. U.S. Soccer has approximately 15 full-time staff working out of the National Training Center.

In a very short time, the National Training Center established itself as the center of the soccer world in the United States and was the main reason the United States was able to serve as an emergency host for the 2003 FIFA Women's World Cup. The facility hosted early round games, as well as the third-place match and the final on short notice after the tournament was moved from China to the United States.

The stadium has also hosted numerous international and professional tournaments, including the Concacaf Gold Cup, Champions League, SuperLiga and InterLiga, while also attracting some of the largest clubs in the world for friendlies.

## 途 NATIONAL SOCCER HALL OF FAME <br> NATIONAL SOCCER HALL OF FAME

Part of a $\$ 55$ million renovation at Toyota Stadium, the National Soccer Hall of Fame (NSHOF) is a publicprivate partnership among FC Dallas, the City of Frisco, Frisco Independent School District and U.S. Soccer Federation. The NSHOF at Toyota Stadium in Frisco, Texas contains two components: The NSHOF Experience and the HOF Club.

The NSHOF Experience is a 19,350-square foot segment of the NSHOF that honors the past, while fully incorporating modern technology of the present and future including virtual reality, gesture technology and interactive digital video boards throughout to celebrate the players, veterans and builders of American soccer that have elevated the sport to where it is today. It features interactive exhibits, iconic soccer memorabilia and serves as the home for Hall of Fame induction ceremonies annually.

The NSHOF's new home in Frisco comes after not having a home for seven years, with the previous home located in Oneonta, NY from 1979-2010. The NSHOF was officially recognized by U.S. Soccer in 1983.

What is now the National Soccer Hall of Fame first sprang to life in 1950 when a group of former professional and amateur players from the Philadelphia "Old-timers" Association took it upon themselves to recognize the achievements of soccer in America. Sixty years after the "Old-timers" first got together, nearly 300 members have been elected to the Hall of Fame for their outstanding contributions to American soccer, both on and off the field.

The Hall of Fame also possesses an archive of more than 80,000 items, which make up one of the largest collections of soccer artifacts and records in the world. The collection includes such rare pieces as the world's oldest soccer ball (made in the USA) and both the 1991 and 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup Trophy. The collection also includes the North American Soccer League archive, the 1994 FIFA World Cup USA archive, a rare soccer photography collection from New York depression-era photographer John Albok, materials from the U.S. National Teams in World Cup competition and artifacts from the American Soccer League of the 1920's and 1950's.

Members are elected in three categories - Player, Builder and Veteran (player) - and elections and inductions are carried out annually. Each year's class is voted on and announced during the first few months of that year, with the induction coming later in the year.

Voters in the Player category include select members of the media, Hall of Famers, past and present U.S. Men's and Women's National Team coaches, professional league coaches of four or more years tenure, and a select group of soccer administrators. The Hall of Fame members vote in the Veteran category, and in the Builder category, select national soccer administrators join the Hall of Famers in voting.

The USA's 3.9 million registered players are the second most in the world, behind only Germany ( 6.3 million*), and ahead of third-ranked Brazil ( 2.1 million*).

Soccer continues to see impressive participation growth at the high school and collegiate levels. In the 2014-15 academic year, Soccer was fourth most popular high school sport for girls (behind only track and field, volleyball and basketball) with 375,681 participants, but showed the steepest continued incline in new participants^ over the last 15 years. Participation levels increase for soccer at the collegiate level relative to all other sports with only track and field involving more athletes; however new track and field team numbers are stagnant, while colleges and universities continue adding women's soccer programs with 599 having been started throughout the country since 1988-89.+

With approximately 145,000 registered referees, the U.S. is second in the world behind only Japan.

According to the 2010 FIFA Big Count, there are nearly 800,000 soccer officials in the U.S. (coaches, referees, administrators).

## SOCCER ON TELEVISION

As the game has grown in the United States, so has the amount of soccer on television. With the amount of coverage increasing each year, soccer fans in the U.S. are able to watch games - in a single weekend no less - from top leagues in countries such as Argentina, Brazil, England, France, Germany, Italy, Mexico, and Spain.

Remarkable growth in the demand for domestic soccer viewership led to the signing of a landmark TV rights deal between U.S. Soccer, MLS and major television broadcasters ESPN, FOX Sports and Univision in 2014. An eight-year agreement through 2022 will see all three networks televise both U.S. Men's and Women's National Team matches. ESPN and FS1 will split the English-language Men's National Team broadcast package of approximately 10 games per year and will likewise share the schedule of Women's National Team games. Univision Deportes, the exclusive Spanish language home of U.S. Soccer, will broadcast all U.S. MNT games, plus a minimum of four U.S. WNT matches each year throughout the term of the agreement.

The U.S. viewer has benefited from the overall increase in the number of televised games, be they domestic or international matches, and viewership will continue to grow in the years to come.

Details of the U.S. Soccer and MLS television broadcast deal through 2022:

## ESPN Networks \& FOX Sports

- ESPN and FOX Sports 1 will share all U.S. Soccer matches.
- ESPN and FOX Sports will share MLS Cup Playoff matches outside of two Univision games.
- MLS Cup will alternate each year between ESPN and FOX Sports.
- The AT\&T MLS All-Star Game will alternate each year between ESPN and FOX Sports.


## ESPN Networks

- ESPN will broadcast a minimum of 34 MLS regular season games, on an exclusive basis, on Sundays at 5 p.m. ET primarily on ESPN2.
- ESPN3 will carry the matches in MLS' out-of-market package.
- ESPN Radio and ESPN Deportes Radio networks have the rights to broadcast MLS matches.
- ESPN obtains digital rights across all platforms and devices for the games it televises.


## FOX Sports

- FOX Sports will broadcast a minimum of 34 MLS regular season games, on an exclusive basis, on Sundays at 7 p.m. ET primarily on FOX Sports 1.
- FOX Sports obtains digital rights across all platforms and devices for the games it televises, including its FOX Sports GO mobile app and FOXSportsGO.com for desktops.
- FOX Sports obtains digital highlight rights for MLS's out-of-market package via FOX Sports digital platforms
- FOX Sports Radio network has the opportunity to broadcast MLS matches.
- Opportunity to broadcast the MLS SuperDraft and other marquee MLS events.


## Univision

- All U.S. Soccer Men's National Team matches, including a minimum of four U.S. Women's National Team matches each year over the duration of the deal.
- Minimum of 34 MLS regular season games, on an exclusive basis, on Friday evenings either at 7 p.m. ET or 11 p.m. ET primarily on UniMás.
- Two MLS Cup Playoff matches per season, on an exclusive basis, during the knockout round.
- The AT\&T MLS All-Star Game and MLS Cup, exclusively in Spanish on Univision.
- Exclusive MLS matches on the Univision networks will include second audio program (SAP), providing viewers the option of watching games in English. English audio also will be available for matches televised on Univision's digital platforms.
- Univision Deportes Network (UDN), Univision's 24 hour sports network, will feature five to seven consecutive Friday doubleheaders in May and June that will be surrounded by two hours of MLS ancillary programming.
- UDN will televise a weekly MLS wrap-up program and a condensed MLS match of the week each Sunday.
- Univision obtains digital rights across all platforms and mobile devices for the games it televises.


## 2018/2022 FIFA WORLD CUP TELEVISION RIGHTS

In October of 2011, the amazing growth of the sport was demonstrated when a bidding war over the U.S. broadcast rights for the 2018 and 2022 FIFA World Cups played out in Zurich, Switzerland. In the end, a record sum of more than $\$ 1$ billion was paid by Fox and Telemundo, an increase of more than 147 percent over the combined $\$ 425$ million that ESPN and Univisión paid for the rights to the 2010 and 2014 tournaments.

Fox paid a reported $\$ 450$ to $\$ 500$ million to beat out ESPN and NBC for the English rights, while Telemundo is said to have paid $\$ 600$ million to outbid Univision for the Spanish rights. Additionally, FIFA granted FOX the U.S. broadcast rights for the 2026 World Cup, which was awarded to the United Bid from Canada, Mexico and the United States at the 2018 FIFA Congress.

## 2015 FIFA WOMEN'S WORLD CUP TELEVISION AUDIENCE

MOST-WATCHED USA MATCH IN U.S. SOCCER HISTORY: Ratings for the 2015 Women's World Cup in Canada obliterated all previous marks for the women's tournament with the most impressive fact being that more than 750 million TV viewers around the world tuned in to watch the event. The unprecedented viewership validated FOX's decision to increase its coverage of the world's game in the U.S. and put impressive amounts of resources toward showcasing the FIFA Women's World Cup.

In a break-through year for women's football across the globe, the sport's growing popularity was felt nowhere more acutely than in the United States, where the World Cup final between USA and Japan became the most watched football match (men's or women's) in the nation's history with 26.7 million viewers.

Beginning with the USA's group play matches vs. Australia, Sweden and Nigeria, TV ratings for the WNT climbed steadily throughout the tournament as the team saw five of its seven total World Cup matches ultimately air on network television. Every USA match saw a double-digit ratings growth over the 2011 edition of the tournament with the team's first and last group matches breaking 200 percent ratings increases.

Additional viewing records include the largest audience to watch a Women's World Cup match on U.S. Spanishlanguage TV as 1.27 million viewers tuned into the final on Telemundo and the most unique streamers (232K) on FOX Sports GO, the highest in the platform's history.

## 2014 FIFA WORLD CUP TELEVISION AUDIENCE

U.S. VIEWING RECORDS BROKEN: The 2014 FIFA World Cup was watched by an estimated 195.9 million viewers on English and Spanish language networks. The figure is a 76 percent increase from the 111.6 million viewers during the 2010 FIFA World Cup.

Things started off with a bang when more than 18 million viewers tuned in for the USA's opening match against Ghana on June 16 - a total within touching distance of the 19.4 million viewers who, at the time, made the USA's thrilling match in the Round of 16 against Ghana in 2010 the most-watched USMNT game in the nation's history.

That 2010 record was obliterated on June 20 during the USA's second match at the 2014 FIFA World Cup when 27.4 million viewers took in the MNT's 2-2 draw with Portugal - a total that now stands as the largest TV audience on record to view a soccer match of any kind in U.S history, beating out the 24.7 million who watched the 2010 FIFA World Cup Final between the Netherlands and Spain.

The USA's Round of 16 game against Belgium also beat out the 2010 World Cup Final, drawing an impressive 21.6 million viewers and setting a WatchESPN record with 3.5 million unique viewers. Additionally, it was the highest-rated World Cup match ( 9.8 rating) in the history of ESPN, beating out the 2014 Final between Germany and Argentina (9.1 rating).

The 2014 World Cup delivered multiple national and market audience records for ESPN and ABC, including: The nine most-viewed men's World Cup matches ever on ESPN or ESPN2 and 10 of the top 20 when including telecasts that aired on ABC.

The most-viewed soccer game in the United States - men's or women's - ever for ESPN's opening round telecast of USA vs. Portugal on June 22 (18,220,000 viewers and a 9.6 US HH rating).

The most streamed sporting event ever, with WatchESPN logging 43,300,000 hours (2.6 billion live minutes) of live match viewing for all 64 matches.

## English Network (ABC/ESPN)

The 2014 FIFA World Cup ranks as the most-viewed World Cup ever on English-language TV in the United States. ESPN, ESPN2 and ABC combined to average 4,557,000 viewers and a 2.8 U.S. household rating for the 64 matches, marking increases of 39 percent and 96 percent (vs. 3,273,000 in 2010 and 2,321,000 in 2006), and 33 percent and 75 percent (vs. 2.1 in 2010 and 1.6 in 2006), respectively.

The 2014 FIFA World Cup Final achieved 17.33 million viewers and a 9.1 HH rating, making it the most watched World Cup final in U.S. history as well as the highest rated soccer match ever broadcast in the United States. It ranks as the third-most viewed World Cup game (Men's or Women's) in U.S. history behind only the USA vs. Portugal match in the 2014 group stage ( 18.22 million viewers) and the 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup Final between the USA and China ( 17.97 million viewers)

## Spanish Network (Univision/UniMas)

On Spanish-language, Univision averaged 3.17 million viewers for coverage of the 2014 FIFA World Cup, up 33 percent from 2010 (2.37), and the highest average ever for the World Cup on the network.

The 2014 FIFA World Cup Final average viewers was 8.52 million, up three percent compared to the 2010 FIFA World Cup Final also on Univision ( 8.29 million).

Also, throughout World Cup 2014, ESPN.com averaged nearly 13,000,000 daily unique visitors and $12,000,000$ video starts per day, up 40 percent and 161 percent, respectively, over 2010. ESPN's SportsCenter app averaged $3,600,000$ million average daily unique visitors (up 409 percent from 2010), while the new ESPNFC.com averaged 5.1 million video starts per day (up $970 \%$ from 2010.)

Driven by World Cup content across all digital platforms, ESPN reached 80.7 million unique visitors in June, establishing a new sports category record, topping ESPN's previous category high of 72.7 million in September 2013. (comScore Multi-platform Data)

## FIFA

## FIFA - SOCCER'S WORLD GOVERNING BOARD

Founded in 1904 to provide unity among national soccer associations, the Federation Internationale de Football Association (FIFA) boasts 211 members, rivaling that of the United Nations, and is arguably the most prestigious sports organization in the world.

FIFA was established on May 21, 1904, by seven national associations - Belgium, Denmark, France, Netherlands, Spain, Sweden and Switzerland - to "promote the game of Association Football (as opposed to rugby or American football), to foster friendly relations among National Associations, Confederations, their officials and players, by promoting the organization of football matches at all levels, and to control every type of association football by taking steps as shall be deemed necessary or advisable."

FIFA's birth was a result of the growing number of international games shortly after the dawn of the 20th century. Soccer leaders in Europe felt that such expanded competition required a governing body, and under the leadership of Robert Guerin, a French journalist, the seven founding members gathered in Paris to shape the future of the sport. Guerin, FIFA's first president, presided over the organization from 1904 to 1906. Seven other men have also served as FIFA president, including Jules Rimet for 33 years from 1921 to 1954.

Currently, Italy's Gianni Infantino serves as FIFA president, having been elected in 2016's Extraordinary Congress held in the wake of corruption allegations against numerous FIFA Officials that resulted in former president Joseph "Sepp" Blatter stepping aside and then being banned from FIFA by its Ethics Committee. FIFA's general secretary since 2009, Infantino served a three-year term as FIFA president and is now running for a second term. The 2019 FIFA Presidential Election will take place at the 69th FIFA Congress in Paris on June 5.

Under FIFA's governance soccer has become the world's most popular sport. According to the Federation's 2006 "Big Count," the game is played by more than 150 million registered athletes - including 10 million women - and viewed by billions of fans in stadiums and on television worldwide. The 2014 World Cup in Brazil was broadcast in more than 200 countries. Inside the stadiums, a total of 3,429,873 spectators attended the 64 matches - an average of 53,592 per match - the second highest aggregate attendance behind USA $1994(68,991)$.

As soccer's ultimate administrative authority, FIFA governs all facets of the game: regulating the rules of play, overseeing the transfers of players internationally, organizing international competitions such as the FIFA World Cup, establishing standards for refereeing, coaching and sports medicine, and encouraging soccer's development around the world.

Among the official world championships staged by FIFA are the World Cup, the Women's World Cup, the Under-20 World Cup, the Under-20 Women's World Cup, the Under-17 World Cup, the Under-17 Women's World Cup, the Beach Soccer World Cup and the Futsal World Cup. Additionally, FIFA oversees the men's and women's Olympic Football Tournament staged under the auspices of the International Olympic Committee every four years. FIFA has also staged the FIFA Confederations Cup, a competition between each of its confederations' champions, and the FIFA Club World Cup, which was held at the beginning of 2000 for the first time in Brazil.

In 2017, the Confederation saw three teams: Mexico, Costa Rica and Panama qualify for the 2018 FIFA World Cup in Russia, while a fourth, the United States won the biannual confederation championship in thrilling fashion with a 2-1 win against Jamaica in the 2017 Gold Cup final.

The previous year in 2016, Concacaf hosted the Copa America Centenario in honor of the 100th anniversary of the world's oldest international football tournament. In stunning fashion, Chile retained the Copa America crown it had also won a year earlier in a rematch against Argentina in the Centenario Final that drew 82,026 fans, making it the most well-attended final of the Millennium. Staged outside South America for the first time, the tournament featured six teams from Concacaf and all 10 teams from CONMEBOL as the two American Confederations partnered for the historic competition, setting a new standard for worldwide inter-confederation cooperation.

2015 began Concacaf's current run of hosting the world's largest football tournaments when it held the FIFA Women's World Cup in Canada - its first World Cup at the full international level since the United States hosted the Women's World Cup in 2003. In recent history, Concacaf has hosted the 2014 U-20 Women's World Cup in Canada, the 2011 U-17 World Cup in Mexico and the 2010 U-17 Women's World Cup in Trinidad \& Tobago.

The 2012 London Olympic Games proved to be a landmark tournament for the confederation as the U.S. Women's National Team and Mexico U-23 Men's National Team captured gold, making it the first time in the competition's history that teams from the same confederation stood atop the podium.

The 2002 World Cup was a banner tournament for Concacaf that saw the U.S. advance to the quarterfinals, while Mexico won their group to earn a second round berth in Korea and Japan.

In 2005, Concacaf saw one of its men's teams win the first-ever outdoor world championship in the confederation's history as Mexico swept through the FIFA U-17 World Cup in Peru.

In 2000, Guatemala hosted the FIFA Futsal World Cup and in doing so became the first Central American country to host a FIFA world championship. And in 2001, Trinidad \& Tobago hosted the spectacular Under-17 World Cup, becoming the first Caribbean country to host a world championship. A year later, the first-ever FIFA Women's Under-19 World Cup was staged in Canada in 2002 and won by the United States. After Trinidad \& Tobago hosted the U-17 Women in 2010, Mexico welcomed the 2011 U-17 World Cup for men and triumphed as tournament champions.

As the Confederation's premier event, the Gold Cup is traditionally played every two years by the national teams within Concacaf. It rotated to an odd-year, summer schedule in 2003. Mexico, seven-time winner of the Gold Cup, defeated the U.S. in the 1993, 1998, 2009 and 2011 finals, downed Brazil in '96 and 2003 and most recently defeated Jamaica in 2015. The U.S. has won five Gold Cups, the inaugural 1991 event, and again in 2002, 2005, 2007 and 2013. The 2000 Gold Cup was perhaps the most surprising, with Canada taking home their first major international title as the U.S. and Mexico failed to qualify for the semifinals. In 2015, the Confederation's entrant to the FIFA Confederations Cup shifted to a system whereby one nation must win the two Gold Cups held before the Confederations Cup or, if it does not win both editions, enter a one-game playoff against the nation that also won either of the Gold Cup tournaments in advance of a Confederations Cup.

The Women's Gold Cup lasted for three events, with the U.S. winning all three events in 2000, 2002, 2006. In 2002, it took a golden goal from Mia Hamm for the U.S. to dispatch Canada in the final, 2-1, and in 2000 the U.S. downed guest-team Brazil 1-0 to claim the championship. In the most recent edition of the tournament, the U.S. again prevailed in extra time, this time courtesy of a Kristine Lilly penalty kick in the 120th minute. The Women's Gold Cup is now known as the Concacaf Women's Championship.

Concacaf competed in the FIFA Club World Cup for the first time in 2000, when Mexico's Necaxa impressed with a third place finish in the 2000 tournament in Brazil. Most recently, the confederation's best finish came from Mexico's Monterrey, which claimed third in 2012. The CONACACAF club tournament, which is contested amongst 38 nations' domestic league champions, was won by D.C. United in 1998 and 2001. In 2008, Concacaf unveiled the Champions League to replace the Champions Cup and decide the region's annual club title.

In 1994, Concacaf joined Europe and South America as the only confederations to host three or more World Cup finals. Mexico welcomed the world twice, in 1970 and 1986, while the United States staged the event for the first time in 1994.

Launched on April 6, 1996, Major League Soccer is the U.S. Soccer sanctioned Division I outdoor professional soccer league in the United States. The LA Galaxy are the league's most successful team and its first to claim five MLS Cup titles (2002, 2005, 2011, 2012, 2014), surpassing D.C. United, winners of three of the first four MLS Cup titles (1996, 1997 \& 1999) as well as the 2004 crown. Two more clubs have claimed multiple titles; the San Jose Earthquakes (2001, 2003) and Houston Dynamo (2006, 2007). They are joined on the list of MLS Cup champions by the Chicago Fire (1998), Colorado Rapids (2010), Columbus Crew (2008), Real Salt Lake (2009), Sporting Kansas City (2013), Portland Timbers (2015), Seattle Sounders FC (2016), Toronto FC (2017) and reigning champions Atlanta United FC (2018).

In 2019, the league will continue to be divided into two conferences: Eastern Conference - Atlanta United FC, Chicago Fire, Columbus Crew SC, D.C. United, FC Cincinnati, Montreal Impact, New England Revolution, New York City FC, New York Red Bulls, Orlando City, Philadelphia Union, Toronto FC; Western Conference - Colorado Rapids, FC Dallas, Houston Dynamo, LA Galaxy, Los Angeles FC, Minnesota United, Portland Timbers, Real Salt Lake, San Jose Earthquakes, Seattle Sounders FC, Sporting Kansas City and Vancouver Whitecaps FC.

The league has announced expansion plans to bring the total count of teams to 28 , with the cities of Austin, Miami and Nashville having been awarded three of the remaining expansion franchises.
MLS has a unique ownership and operating structure, based on a "single entity" concept. Unlike other professional sports leagues, which are a confederation of independent franchise owners, MLS' "single entity" structure allows investors to own an interest in the league, as well as individual teams. MLS believes that the structure will better position the league for long term success.

## CHICAGO: HOME TO U.S. SOCCER HOUSE

In the tradition of many world soccer federations and the FIFA House in Zurich, the U.S. Soccer Federation took up residence in two refurbished mansions in Chicago's Prairie Avenue Historical District more than two decades ago. Since dubbed the U.S. Soccer House, the corner of 18th Street and Prairie Avenue now serves as the American home of the world's most popular sport.

Formerly located in Colorado Springs, Colo., U.S. Soccer moved their operational base into the Kimball house at 1801 South Prairie Avenue and the Coleman-Ames house at 1811 South Prairie Avenue in December of 1991.

Dating back to 1873 , Soccer House was built by William Wallace Kimball, founder of Kimball pianos and organs; Joseph Coleman, president of a hardware manufacturing firm; and Coleman's wife, Leonora, who served on the board of the Women's Christian Association in 1886.

There was a time when Prairie Avenue, from 16th to 22nd streets, was the "Fifth Avenue" of the Midwest. The area is a testament to the hard work and dedication of the men and women who helped shape the industrialization of the Midwest and in 1979 it was designated an historical district.

Nearly 20 millionaires once resided within Soccer House's six-block area. Families who were influential in the industrialization of the Midwest and called South Prairie Avenue home included: George Pullman (railroad cars), John J. Glessner (farming implements), Marshall Field (retailer), Samuel Allerton (banker) and Philip Armour (meat packing).

Construction of Prairie Avenue began after the Great Chicago Fire of 1871 when Pullman became the first millionaire to move to the area, building the grandest of Prairie Avenue mansions in 1873. Friends of Pullman followed his lead and also built extravagant homes on Prairie Avenue. The Marshall Field House was the first in the neighborhood to be electrically lit.

The Kimball House, built of Bedford limestone and topped with a slate roof, has an exterior consisting of numerous large and small turrets, gables, balconies and ornamental iron-railed galleries. The interior of Kimball House is as extravagant as its exterior, with wood abundant throughout. The ceilings are beamed in oak and mahogany, and fireplaces made of onyx warm the parlor.

Neighboring the Kimball House to the south is the Coleman-Ames House built in 1886. Numerous families have resided in this mansion. Coleman, the original owner, lived in the home until 1888, when he sold the mansion to Massachusetts coal merchant Miner T. Ames. Ames resided in the house for just two years before he died in 1890.

It wasn't until the late 1940s that a connecting link between the Kimball and Coleman coach houses was erected, designed to give the courtyard a unified appearance.

With its historic appearance, Soccer House has been Chicago's home to Hollywood, serving as a location shoot for a number of motion pictures, including extended use for the filming of Richard Gere's "Primal Fear."


## U.S. SOCCER TIMELINE

Early 1800s: As was the case in England, many American schools and colleges played forms of football, but under rules that varied from place to place.
1862: The Oneida Football Club, made up of Boston prep school students, was organized by Gerritt Smith Miller. The game the Oneidas played was more like rugby than like soccer, but they were the first American team playing any type of football to be organized on a continuing basis, rather than just for the day.
1866: The first game in America using the association football rules standardized three years before in London was played on Oct. 11 in Waukesha, Wis. A team of Carroll College students beat a team of local residents.

1869: A week after they played what has been called the first American football game, teams from Princeton and Rutgers met on Nov. 13 in Princeton, N.J., in a game using association football rules, the first intercollegiate soccer game in America.

1876: Most of the football-playing colleges abandoned soccer in favor of rugby. However, within a few years soccer had begun to take hold in immigrant communities in various American locations such as Fall River, Mass.; Kearny, N.J., and St. Louis.
1883: The first soccer league in America, the Western Football Association, was organized in St. Louis.
1884: The American Football Association, only the second national soccer association outside of the British Isles, but one that was really more regional than national, was organized in Newark, N.J.
1885: The first American Football Association Cup was won by ONT of Kearny, N.J., and a team representing the United States played one from Canada in Kearny on Nov. 28 in the first "international" game in America.
1894: The first attempt to start a pro soccer league in the United States, the American League of Professional Football Clubs, lasted for only three weeks in October. However, a longer-lasting league, the National Association Foot Ball League, began the following spring.

1898: A depression resulting from the financial panic of 1893 caused the suspension of both the American Football Association and the nation's leading league, the National Association Foot Ball League of New Jersey.
1904: A Canadian team won the soccer competition at the Olympic Games in St. Louis.
1905: A 17-game North American tour by the Pilgrims, an English amateur team, helped to revive soccer in the United States. St. Leo's won the first of its 10 consecutive St. Louis Major League titles.
1906: West Hudson of Harrison, N.J., won the first championship of the revived AFA Cup. A year later, it added the first championship of the revived National Association Foot Ball League.

1913: The United States Football Association was founded at an April 5 meeting in New York. FIFA, which had been founded in 1904, granted it provisional
membership later in the year and full membership in 1914.

1914: The first National Challenge Cup tournament, the championship of the new USFA, was won by the Brooklyn Field Club (the tournament's name was later changed to the U.S. Open Cup).


FIRST TEAM: The very first U.S. Men's National Team squad prepares to take the field in their first match, a 3-2 victory over Sweden in Stockholm on Aug. 20, 1916.

1916: The first national team organized by the USFA, named the All-American Football Club, played six games in a tour of Sweden and Norway. The captain, Thomas Swords of Fall River, scored the first goal ever for the U.S. national team, against Sweden.

1919: Bethlehem Steel, after sweeping the National Challenge Cup, the AFA Cup and the National Association Foot Ball League, became the first American club to make a European tour when it played 14 games in Sweden and Denmark.

1920: The National Challenge Cup was won for the first time by a team from west of the Alleghenies, Ben Millers of St. Louis.

1921: The original American Soccer League, largely a merger of the National Association Foot Ball League in the Middle Atlantic states and the Southern New England Soccer League, began play. In its first season, it included three teams from Massachusetts, two from New York, two from New Jersey and one from Pennsylvania.
1924: The Fall River Marksmen became the first team to win the American Soccer League and National Challenge Cup titles in the same year.

1925: Archie Stark of Bethlehem Steel scored 67 goals in the 44 -game ASL season, setting an American firstdivision record that still stands.
1926: A game between Austrian first-division team Hakoah and a New York all-star team drew a crowd of 46,000 to the Polo Grounds in New York. Bethlehem Steel won the last of its five National Challenge Cup titles.
1928: The Soccer War, a year-long battle between the ASL and the USFA, began with ASL demands to take over the leading role in administering the sport.


1930：The 1930 U．S．World Cup Team advanced into the semifinals and finished third．

1930：The United States was one of 13 nations to compete in the first World Cup in Uruguay，upsetting Belgium and Paraguay before being eliminated by Argentina in the semifinals．Bert Patenaude of Fall River scored the first World Cup hat trick．Later in the year， the Fall River Marksmen，again winners of the ASL and National Challenge Cup titles，made a six－game tour of Czechoslovakia，Hungary and Austria．
1932：Disputes over the definition of an amateur and the costs of long travel distance from Europe caused the elimination of soccer from the program at the Los Angeles Olympic Games．

1933：Two years after the demise of the original American Soccer League，a new ASL，with a scaled－back budget，began play．

1934：Buff Donelli，later a famous American football coach，scored four goals in a World Cup qualifying victory against Mexico．The U．S．Men too part in their second consecutive World Cup，going winless in Italy．

＇34 IN ITALY：The U．S．lost their only match of the 1934 World Cup，losing 7－1 to host Italy．

1938：The USFA，citing the gathering threat of war in Europe，declined to send a team to the World Cup in France．

1941：The Kearny Scots won their fifth consecutive American Soccer League championship．The National Soccer Coaches Association was formed by 10 coaches at a meeting in New York．
1944：Billy Gonsalves，playing for Brooklyn Hispano， won the last of his remarkable eight U．S．Open Cup championships．
1945：The U．S．Football Association changed its name to U．S．Soccer Football Association．

1947：Ponta Delgada of Fall River became the first team to win the U．S．Open Cup and the National Amateur Cup in the same year．

1948：The first game in the United States between two leading European teams，Liverpool of England and Djurgardens of Sweden，was played in Brooklyn．

1950：Joe Gaetjens＇goal in the 37th minute enabled the United States to score its famous 1－0 victory against England in Belo Horizonte，Brazil．Despite the victory， the United States failed to advance past the first round of the World Cup．


GAME OF THEIR LIVES：The 1950 U．S．World Cup Team shocked the world with their 1－0 upset win over England．

1952：The United States played Scotland in front of a crowd of 107,765 at Hampden Park in Glasgow．
1953：The USSFA assumed administration of the National Soccer Hall of Fame in an agreement with the Philadelphia Old－Timers Association，which had started the Hall three years before．
1959：The first NCAA soccer championship was won by St．Louis University．The United States finished third in the soccer tournament at the Pan－American Games in Chicago．

1960：The International Soccer League，featuring European and South American clubs in their off－seasons， began play in New York．In the first championship game， Bangu of Brazil beat Kilmarnock of Scotland．

THE GOAL：Joe Gaetjens＇redirection of a shot from Walter Bahr rolls into the goal，giving the U．S．their historic 1－0 victory over England in Brazi on June 29， 1950.



1961: Concacaf, the Confederation of North and Central America and the Caribbean of Association Football, was formed at a meeting in Mexico City.

1965: The first college women's varsity soccer team was organized at Castleton State College in Vermont.
1966: Pelé played his first game in the United States, for his longtime Brazilian club Santos against Benfica of Portugal in New York.

1968: The Atlanta Chiefs defeated the San Diego Toros in the first North American Soccer League championship series.

1974: The U.S. Soccer Football Association changed its name to U.S. Soccer Federation.
1975: Pelé, who had retired the year before from Santos, signed for $\$ 2.8$ million with the New York Cosmos.

1977: Pelé won his only North American Soccer League championship as the Cosmos defeated the Seattle Sounders in the final. A month after the season, Pele played his final game, changing uniforms at halftime in a match between the Cosmos and Santos, in East Rutherford, N.J. By signing Franz Beckenbauer of West Germany and Carlos Alberto of Brazil, the Cosmos became the first team in world soccer history to field the captains of the last two World Cup-winning teams.
1978: American soccer rode the crest of the attendance surge that followed Pelé's American venture, with the North American Soccer League expanding from 18 teams to 24 and the Major Indoor Soccer League beginning play with six teams.
1982: A European selection played a World selection in the FIFA all-star game in East Rutherford, N.J., but the NASL surge was beginning to fade. The Cosmos won the last of their five NASL championships. North Carolina won the first NCAA women's soccer championship.
1984: A crowd of 101,799, still the largest ever to attend a soccer game in the United States, saw the

Olympic final between Brazil and France in Pasadena, Calif.

1985: The North American Soccer League folded, a year after the second American Soccer League had done the same. Three months later, the New York Cosmos folded, after attempting to play a series of exhibition games. The United States men were surprisingly eliminated by Costa Rica in World Cup qualifying, but the United States women's national team played its first game.
1988: FIFA, which five years earlier had rejected a United States bid for the 1986 World Cup, named the United States as host of the 1994 World Cup.
1989: The United States qualified for the World Cup for the first time in 40 years. Paul Caligiuri's famous goal in the deciding game was a 35 -yard dipping shot that found the net in a 1-0 upset victory against Trinidad \& Tobago Nov. 19 in front of 35,000 red-clad Trinidadians. The U.S. Futsal National Team finished third at the first FIFA World Championship for Futsal.


FIRST OF SIX: The 1990 World Cup marked the first of six consecutive world cup appearances for the U.S.

1990: The U.S. competed in the World Cup for the first time in 40 years. The WSL and the ASL merged to form the American Professional Soccer League (APSL).
1991: The U.S. Women captured the first-ever FIFA Women's World Championship in China with a 2-1 win against Norway Nov. 30. The women qualified for the world championship by defeating its five Concacaf opponents by a combined score of 49-0. The U.S. National Team won its first-ever regional championship July 7 when it captured the Concacaf Gold Cup by defeating Honduras 4-3 in penalty kicks. The U.S. U-23 team won the gold medal at the Pan Am Games in Cuba.
1992: The U.S. Men won the inaugural U.S. Cup '92 in June, defeating Ireland 3-1 and Portugal 1-0, and tying three-time World Cup champion Italy 1-1. The U.S. Futsal Team won the silver medal at the 2nd FIFA World Championship in Hong Kong. The M(I)SL folded after 15 years in existence.

1993: In February, U.S. Soccer held the first-ever Strategic Summit where more than 250 soccer leaders and personalities met in Chicago for four days to plan the development of soccer into the 21st century. U.S. Cup '93 was used as a dress rehearsal for World Cup organizers, officials and volunteers, as well as the U.S. Men. The USA's 2-0 defeat of England made headlines around the world. Attendance and media interest were high, with 286,761 people attending the tournament's

six games，and ABC broadcasting the June 13 U．S．－ Germany match．
The U．S．Under－20 Men defeated Europe＇s No． 1 seed，Turkey，6－0 in the first game of the World Youth Championship in Australia．FIFA officials called the trouncing one of the most extraordinary results in the history of the tournament．
The APSL was declared a Division II professional league．The United States Interregional Soccer League （USISL）was given Division III status．Plans for Major League Soccer－a Division I league to follow the legacy of World Cup＇94－were presented by U．S．Soccer President Alan Rothenberg．

1994：U．S．Soccer served as host national association for the 1994 FIFA World Cup，staging the greatest event in FIFA history．More than 3.5 million fans flocked to stadiums－still a World Cup record－and soccer fever in the U．S．was at an alltime high．The U．S．team advanced beyond the first round for the first time in 64 years，falling to eventual champion Brazil 1－0 in a July 4 round of 16 showdown at Stanford Stadium in Palo Alto，Calif．On June 4，91，123 fans jammed the Rose Bowl to watch the U．S．defeat Mexico，1－0，in its final
tune－up prior to the World Cup．Game proceeds netted $\$ 1$ million in U．S．Soccer contributions to UNICEF／ Children＇s Defense Fund．
The U．S．Women won the Chiquita Cup，a four－team international tournament in which the U．S．hosted Germany，China and Norway．The U．S．went on to successfully defend its Concacaf championship， qualifying for the 1995 FIFA Women＇s World Championship by outscoring the opposition 36－1 en route to winning all four qualification matches．Head coach Anson Dorrance announced his resignation and U．S．Soccer named assistant coach Tony DiCicco to succeed him．

1995：U．S．Soccer announced in February its intention to host the 1999 Women＇s World Cup and began the formal bid process with FIFA．The U．S．Men won the U．S．Cup＇95 in June，defeating Nigeria and Mexico and tying Colombia．Later that month，the women placed third in the FIFA Women＇s World Cup in Sweden，falling to eventual champion Norway in the semifinals 1－0，then defeating China．

In July，the men made international headlines by advancing to the semifinals of Copa America．The U．S． scored its first－ever victory against Argentina，3－0， and advanced via penalty kicks（against Mexico）into the semifinals before falling 1－0 to defending world champion Brazil．Steve Sampson，who had served as interim coach since April，was named full－time head coach in August．
1996：The U．S．Women won the first women＇s soccer gold medal at the 1996 Atlanta Olympics，defeating China 2－1 in the championship game．The U．S．posted a 21－1－2 overall record and won the Brazil Cup and U．S．Women＇s Cup＇96．The U．S．Men＇s Olympic Team narrowly missed advancing to the quarterfinals with a 1－1－1 record．
Major League Soccer was launched，providing the United States with its first Division I outdoor pro league since the North American Soccer League ceased operations in 1985．MLS averaged more than 17，000 fans per game． The A－League and USISL merged to form a larger and stronger Division II outdoor league．
FIFA awarded the 1999 Women＇s World Cup to the United States and U．S．Soccer pledged it would be the biggest and most successful women＇s sporting event ever．

1997：The U．S．Men qualified for a third straight World Cup，completing al6－game qualifying run with just two losses and advancing with a game to spare．The U．S． Women continued their impressive play by winning their fourth straight Nike U．S Cup．
The FIFA Women＇s World Cup Organizing Committee had awarded the＇99 games to seven U．S．locations：Boston； Chicago；Los Angeles；New York／New Jersey；Portland， Ore．；San Francisco Bay Area；and Washington，D．C．
1998：A disappointing World Cup finished with the U．S．in last place after two difficult match－ups against Germany and Yugoslavia，and a heartbreaking loss to Iran．Brian McBride scores the team＇s only World Cup goal．The tournament concludes with the resignation of head coach Steve Sampson，who is eventually replaced on Oct．27，by Bruce Arena．

The women's team continued their impressive play, losing just twice in 1998 while playing in front of record crowds all across the country. Dr. Bob Contiguglia took over as U.S. Soccer's new president, replacing Alan I. Rothenberg, who had reached the eight-year term limit.

1999: In front of more than 90,000 fans at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif., the U.S. women won the 1999 FIFA World Cup by playing China to a 0-0 tie through regulation and overtime and then defeating them 5-4 in penalty kicks. Soccer hysteria spread through America as the women appeared on every top news program, at the White House and on the cover of Time, Newsweek, People and Sports Illustrated. U.S. Women's National Team head coach Tony DiCicco resigned in November as the winningest coach in U.S. Soccer history with a record of 103-8-8.

In Bruce Arena's first full year at the helm of the U.S. Men, the team records triumphs against Germany (twice), Argentina, Chile and earns third place at the 1999 FIFA Confederations Cup in Mexico. The U-23 Men's beat Canada for the bronze medal at the 1999 Pan American Games in Winnipeg, Canada, while the U-18 Women captured the gold. The U-20 Men advanced to the second round of the 1999 FIFA World Youth Championship in April, with their only two loses coming to eventual finalists Spain and Japan. Taylor Twellman scored four goals and earned the Bronze Boot to become the first American male in the modern era to earn a FIFA scoring award. In November, the U-17 Men extended a record unbeaten streak to 24 games, advancing to the semifinals of the World Championship before losing in penalty kicks to Australia. Landon Donovan and DaMarcus Beasley earned the Gold and Silver Balls as the tournaments top two MVPs.

2000: Bruce Arena's squad continued to advance toward their ultimate goal of qualifying for the 2002 World Cup. The team secured 10 out of a possible 12 points - all shutouts - to win its semifinal qualifying group.

The U.S. Women maintained the momentum from their historic Women's World Cup title with 41 matches in 2000, posting a $26-6-9$ record. The U.S. won six tournament titles in 2000, but had to settle for a silver medal at the 2000 Summer Olympics, losing in overtime
to archrival Norway in the gold medal match.
The U.S. Men and Women put on an impressive display for the world at the Sydney Games as the only nation to have both its teams advance to the semifinals. The men were the surprise team of the tournament, winning their group and advancing to the semis before grabbing fourth place, the highest Olympic finish for the U.S.

2001: The U.S. Men qualified for a fourth straight World Cup, boosted by four wins and a draw to open the final round of Concacaf qualifying. For the first time, the U.S. Men clinched a spot in the World Cup at a home qualifier, topping Jamaica 2-1 behind two goals from Joe-Max Moore in front of 40,483 fans at the last soccer match played at Foxboro Stadium.
The U.S. Women played only 10 international matches as the Women's United Soccer Association begins play, with the Bay Area CyberRays winning the inaugural Founders Cup. Mia Hamm was named the first FIFA Women's World Player of the Year.
The Under-17 Men advanced to a ninth consecutive FIFA U-17 World Cup, but were drawn into the Group of Death in Trinidad \& Tobago with Japan, Nigeria and France, and were eliminated in the first round. The U.S. Under-20 Men qualified for their third straight FIFA World Youth Championship, where the team finished second in their group in Argentina and were eliminated in the second round by Egypt.
The National Professional Soccer League, in existence since 1984-95, merges with the WISL and is renamed as the Major Indoor Soccer League.

2002: The U.S. Men advanced to the quarterfinals at the 2002 World Cup in Korea/Japan, the team's best World Cup showing since 1930. The U.S. shocked the world with a stunning 3-2 opening game upset of Portugal before eventually finishing in second place in Group D. The U.S. then posted their first victory in the World Cup knockout stage, blanking Concacaf rival Mexico 2-0 in the Round of 16. The World Cup run ended in the quarterfinals with a 1-0 loss to Germany. Claudio Reyna was named to the All-Tournament Team, while Landon Donovan earned honorable mention. The men began 2002 by winning the Concacaf Gold Cup in January with a convincing $2-0$ victory against Costa Rica for the first Gold Cup title for the U.S. since 1991.
The U.S. Women's qualified for their fourth consecutive

FIFA Women＇s World Cup after capturing the 2002 Concacaf Gold Cup with a 2－1 overtime victory against Canada at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena，Calif．The U．S． Under－19 Women topped the host Canadians 1－0 in overtime to win the inaugural FIFA U－19 Women＇s World Championship．Kelly Wilson won the Bronze Ball as the tournament＇s third MVP and the Silver Boot，while captain Lindsay Tarpley earned the Bronze Boot．

The U．S．Under－20 National Team qualified for their fourth consecutive FIFA World Youth Championship． The U．S．National Futsal Team played their first home matches in history，defeating Canada and tying Mexico in March in Baltimore，Md．，and Washington，D．C．， respectively．

2003：Due to the outbreak of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome，FIFA relocated the Women＇s World Cup out of China．After a successful bid to host the tournament， U．S．Soccer faced the unprecedented task of hosting the tournament with just four months of preparation． The U．S．Women won Group A and then beat Norway in the quarterfinals 1－0．But Germany stunned the U．S． with a 3－0 victory in the semifinals，which led the U．S． to top Canada in the third－place match．Shannon Boxx， Joy Fawcett and Mia Hamm all earned all－star honors from FIFA．
The U．S．Men，preparing for World Cup qualifying in 2004，finished in third place at the Concacaf Gold Cup with a 3－2 come－from－behind win against Costa Rica． The Men＇s Under－17 and Under－20 squads finished their respective World Championships with fifth place finishes after bowing out with quarterfinal losses to Brazil and Argentina，respectively．

2004：The U．S．Women won every tournament entered，culminating with the 2004 Olympics．Other tournament titles included the Algarve Cup，the Four Nations Tournament and the Concacaf Regional Olympic qualifying tournament，as the team set a record with 28 victories on the year．
Under head coach Bruce Arena，the U．S．Men qualified for the final round of World Cup Qualifying for the Concacaf region．The men finished the year with an 8－1－ 6 record，losing only to the Netherlands away and going a record 13 －games undefeated．

The U－23 Men failed to qualify for the Olympics for the first time since 1976，losing 4－0 to Mexico in Guadalajara after winning their group only match up against the second－place Mexicans in the single－ elimination qualifier．The Under－19 Women finished third at the FIFA U－19 Women＇s World Championship． The Futsal Team won the 2004 Concacaf Championship and qualified for the 2004 FIFA Futsal World Championship，where the team had a strong showing with a seventh－place finish．
2005：Manager Bruce Arena led the U．S．Men to a first place finish in Concacaf World Cup qualifying for the first time in 71 years，earning a berth at the 2006 FIFA World Cup Finals in Germany with a $2-0$ win against Mexico in Columbus，Ohio．The men also brought home the 2005 Concacaf Gold Cup，beating Panama 3－1 in penalty kicks after a scoreless draw．The team finished the year with a record 13 wins and .750 winning percentage．
The U．S．Women began a new era，starting off the year with a new coach and a third consecutive Algarve Cup title，their fourth overall．They ended the year undefeated and without allowing a single goal．
The Under－20 Men swept through Concacaf Qualifying， earning a berth to the FIFA Youth World Championship， where they finished 11th，bowing out to Italy in the Round of 16．The Under－17 Men also had a strong 2005，qualifying for the 2005 FIFA U－17 World Championship and finishing fifth overall after a loss to Holland in the second round．

2006：A disappointing World Cup in Germany for the United States，as the team failed to advance out of the first round despite a gallant，nine－man 1－1 draw with eventual World Cup champions Italy．After eight years in charge，Bruce Arena is replaced at the helm of the U．S． MNT by Bob Bradley，on an interim basis．
Later in the summer，the U．S．Under－20 Women＇s National Team finished fourth in Russia．The disappointing finish marks the first time a U．S．Women＇s National Team has finished outside the top three in a FIFA or Concacaf World Championship event．
The U．S．Women，however，continued their incredible run under Greg Ryan，winning three of the four tournaments they enter．The year concludes with another Women＇s Gold Cup crown and a berth in the 2007 FIFA Women＇s World Cup in China．

2007: Bob Bradley became the first Men's coach to win his first three games in charge and was hired fulltime to guide the USA through 2010. In the summer of 2007, the MNT won its second consecutive Gold Cup, and fourth total title, by defeating Mexico 2-1 in front of a packed house at Soldier Field in Chicago. With the victory, the MNT gained entry into the 2009 Confederations Cup. The Men also travelled to Venezuela to compete in Copa America for the third time.
After qualifying for their respective World Cups to continue impressive streaks, the U-17 Men and U- 20 Men took on the world during the summer in back-toback tournaments. The U-20 team performed admirably in Canada, and reached the quarterfinals after defeats of Poland, Brazil and Uruguay. The U-17 team, meanwhile, did well to qualify from a tough group in South Korea, before being eliminated by Germany in the Round of 16 . The U.S. Women maintained a two-plus year undefeated run, looking to take the streak into the FIFA Women's World Cup. Drawn into the toughest group in Women's World Cup history, the U.S. advanced in first place after three difficult games against Korea DPR, Sweden and Nigeria. The U.S. rolled into the semifinals, but was upended by a quality Brazil side. Eventually, the WNT took third place for the second consecutive World Cup with a convincing win against Norway. Former Swedish National Team player and captain Pia Sundhage was appointed to the position of WNT coach after Greg Ryan's departure from the team.
Wilmer Cabrera was named head coach of the U-17 MNT, replacing John Hackworth. For the first time, U.S. Soccer hired four full-time referees to enhance high-level performance, training and development opportunities for the sport's elite officials in the United States. The U.S. Soccer Development Academy launched in the fall.
2008: Led by Pia Sundhage, the U.S. Women had one of its best years ever, losing only one game, which

ironically came in the opening match of the 2008 Beijing Olympics, a tournament the U.S. would eventually win to take home their third gold medal. Overall, the U.S. won all six tournaments it entered to finish with a 33-1-2 record, giving them the most wins and best winning percentage ever in a calendar year (.944).
The U.S. Men was successful in its own right, starting off on the right foot in 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifying with

a 9-0 aggregate against Barbados in the second round. The U.S. opened the semifinal round with $1-0$ victories in Guatemala and Cuba. Coming back to the U.S., home victories against T\&T and Cuba clinched advancement with two games to play.
The U-23 Men joined the U.S. Women by qualifying for the 2008 Olympics in March, but just missed out on the second round once arriving in Beijing. Despite a 1-0 victory against Japan and a 2-2 draw with the Netherlands, the U.S. fell 2-1 against eventual silver medalist Nigeria. On the youth side, the U-17 and U-20 Women's National Teams both made the championship match of their respective FIFA World Cups. In New Zealand, the U-17s went on an impressive run to the final before finally succumbing to Korea DPR in the final, but in Chile their older counterparts were able to exact revenge with a 2-1 victory to bring the World Cup trophy back to the United States for the first time since 2002.

Building off the initial kickoff in 2007, U.S. Soccer's Development Academy wrapped up its first year with a collection of dynamic matches during Finals Week at The Home Depot Center. In the U-15/16 championship, Carmel United topped PDA 1-0, and the Baltimore Bays topped LAFC 4-2 to take the U-17/18 title.

2009: The U.S. Men opened 2009 focused on final round qualifying for the 2010 FIFA World Cup with a 2-0 win against archrival Mexico in Columbus, Ohio, Bob Bradley's squad proceeded to go undefeated at home and clinch a spot in South Africa with a come-from-behind
win in Honduras. They finished atop the Concacaf table with a tie against Costa Rica in Washington, D.C., on the last day of qualifying.
During the summer, the U.S. Men traveled to South Africa to compete in the 2009 FIFA Confederations Cup. The U.S. MNT was drawn into a group with Italy, Brazil and Egypt, and advanced into the semifinals by virtue of a 3-0 dismantling of Egypt in the final game. They kept the nation captivated by beating Spain, the No.1-ranked team in the world in the semifinals before falling 3-2 to Brazil in the final. Tim Howard was awarded the Golden Glove and Clint Dempsey given the Bronze Ball .
Pia Sunhage's women's team had a more relaxed year after their gold medal winning exploits in 2008, and wrapped up the year with a 7-0-1 that included falling in penalties to Sweden in the Algarve Cup final.
Both the U-17 and U-20 Men's National Team competed in their respective FIFA World Cups this year, with the U-17 team advancing out of the group stage in Nigeria before falling to Italy in the Round of 16. A tough group containing Germany, Cameroon and Korea Republic saw the U-20s out of the tournament following the first round in Egypt.
The U.S. Soccer Development Academy completed its second year of competition in 2009, once again concluding the season with Finals Week at The Home Depot Center. In the U-15/16 age group, playoff No.1seed Derby County Wolves continued their strong season straight through Finals Week with a title. Indiana United Academy defeated D.C. United to take home the U-17/18 championship.

2010: The year's most memorable moment came in the U.S. Men's third group game at the 2010 World Cup in South Africa as Landon Donovan scored a last-minute goal for the U.S. to clinch advancement and clinch a group for the first time in 80 years. Following a 1-1 tie with England, a 2-2 tie with Slovenia and a 1-0 win against Algeria, the U.S. was eliminated in the Round of 16 losing to Ghana 2-1. Clint Dempsey became the second U.S. player to score in multiple World Cups, and Landon Donovan had three total goals to be come the third to score in multiple World Cups and the all-time World Cup goal leader for the U.S.

After a surprising loss to Mexico in the semifinals of Women's Concacaf qualifying, the U.S. topped Italy 2-0 in a two-game qualifying playoff to earn a spot in
the 2011 FIFA Women's World Cup. The U.S. won its seventh Algarve Cup with the first of two victories against 2011 hosts Germany.
The U.S. Under-20 Women lost in penalty kicks to Nigeria in the quarterfinals of the 2010 FIFA U-20 World Cup, while the U-17 Women became the first U.S. Women's team to fail to qualify for a FIFA World Cup event after not advancing out of the CONACACAF qualifying tournament.
No Division II league met U.S. Soccer's sanctioning standards, so the Federation administered a league called USSF D-2 for one year.

2011: The U.S. Women were on center stage during the 2011 Women's World Cup in Germany. Their dramatic run in the Women's World Cup was highlighted by an electric, come-from-behind victory in the quarterfinals against Brazil, in which Abby Wambach scored the latest goal (six minutes into stoppage time) ever in a World Cup match. The U.S., however, would lose out in penalties to a spirited Japanese side in the final after playing to a 2-2 draw through 120 minutes.

During the summer of 2011 at the Concacaf Gold Cup, the U.S. advanced to its third consecutive final, scoring two early goals before falling 4-2 to Mexico.
The continental tournament would prove to be Bob Bradley's last involvement as head coach of the U.S., with former Germany international and FIFA World Cup winner Jurgen Klinsmann taking the helm of the U.S. Men in August. He earned his first win in Miami against Honduras thanks to a Clint Dempsey strike and later led the team to a 3-2 victory against Slovenia in its last game of the year.
The U-17 and U-20 Men's National Teams both entered another cycle of their respective FIFA World Cups. The U-17 Men reached the knockout round for the seventh time but lost to Germany in the Round of 16 . After winning their qualifying group with two shutout victories, the U-20s graduated to the quarterfinals but fell to Guatemala and did not reach the World Cup for the first time since 1995.

2012: The U.S. WNT capped off the 2012 London Olympics with a 2-1 victory against Japan in front of more than 80,000 spectators at Wembley Stadium as the U.S. Women earned their fourth Olympic gold - a first for any country on the men's and women's sides. Carli Lloyd scored both goals for the USA, capping off a tournament that featured a dramatic game-winning goal from 2012 U.S. Soccer Female Athlete of the Year Alex Morgan in the 123rd minute of the team's semifinal victory against Canada.
The U.S. MNT advanced to the final round of 2014 FIFA World Cup Qualifying, defeating Guatemala 3-1 in the final Group A match of the Semifinal Round as Clint Dempsey scored his 29th and 30th career goals to tie Brian McBride for third all-time in U.S. history. The U.S. Men also had some memorable international friendly victories in 2012, including the first win on Mexico's home soil - a 1-0 victory at Estadio Azteca on Aug. 15.
The U.S. U-20 WNT defeated defending champion Germany 1-0 in the 2012 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in Tokyo. Kealia Ohai scored the game's lone goal and the Americans earned their third World Cup crown in the tournament's history. The U.S. U-17 WNT competed in the 2012 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, and in
an extremely rare occurrence did not advance past the group stage despite an unbeaten 1-0-2 record.
2013: U.S. Soccer celebrated its 100th birthday in 2013, marking the occasion with a doubleheader event on June 2 as the U.S. MNT beat Germany $4-3$ in an electrifying match in the nation's capital, Washington, D.C. The U.S. WNT also enjoyed victorious celebration as it defeated Canada 2-0 in Toronto in the first match since the dramatic semifinal victory in the 2012 London Olympics.
The MNT accomplished its primary task of qualifying for the 2014 FIFA World Cup, marking the seventhconsecutive time the team has reached the finals. The USA finished in first place for the third straight Concacaf cycle, highlighted by yet another "dos a cero" victory against regional rival Mexico. The team captured its fifth Gold Cup title, winning all six matches en route to the championship. A multitude of team and individual records were broken, a Snow Clasico played out in Denver and a dramatic comeback against Panama punctuated the end of the qualifying campaign.
The U.S. Women's unbeaten 2013 campaign was highlighted by Abby Wambach capturing the international scoring record on June 20 with four goals against Korea Republic at Red Bull Arena. She surpassed Mia Hamm's record of 158 and continues to extend the record, ending the year on 163. The team will look to extend its 39-game unbeaten run in all competitions as it heads into 2014, with head coach Tom Sermanni yet to taste defeat with the USA.

2014: A banner year for U.S. Soccer. Growth is the word that best defined the year as record numbers of fans flocked to stadiums, parks and any available TV to see the U.S. MNT compete at the 2014 FIFA World Cup. Impressive new television and sponsor agreements were signed, allowing U.S. Soccer to invest heavily in its coaching and youth development programs. All the while, the U.S. WNT continued to cement its role as the No. 1 women's program in the world and turning heads in the process.
Early in the year, the U.S. WNT transitioned to the guidance of former interim head coach and long-time assistant Jill Ellis, who led the team to an impressive qualification to the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup in Canada as well as a 17-1-4 record to finish the year. Along the way, team captain Christie Rampone became only the second soccer player in history man or woman - to reach 300 caps for their country. The team also brought in talented youngsters such as midfielder Morgan Brian and defenders Julie Johnston and Crystal Dunn who are pushed for playing time.
The U.S. MNT's year was highlighted by a successful run to the Round of 16 at the 2014 FIFA World Cup in Brazil. Head coach Jurgen Klinsmann guided the team out of the 'Group of Death' on the back of a cathartic win against Ghana and a dramatic draw against the world's No. 1 player Cristiano Ronaldo and Portugal. Despite goalkeeper Tim Howard's heroics - and tournament record 15 saves - against Belgium, the USA exited in the first knockout round. The team and soccer culture in the United States was then stunned by the retirement of the greatest player it had ever produced when Landon Donovan decided to hang up his cleats after playing one final match for his country in an October friendly against Ecuador.

2015: A year of continued evolution for the U.S. Soccer National Teams and Federation as a whole, saw the U.S. WNT claim the most coveted prize in the sport by winning the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup in record breaking fashion vs. Japan. It was a dominant year for the WNT, which also won a final Algarve Cup title early in the year before launching the \#SheBelieves campaign aimed at inspiring fans throughout the world to achieve their dreams and then drawing record TV audiences for its World Cup games that subsequently let to record crowds during its Victory Tour.
The U.S. MNT's high-water mark came in June when the team won back-to-back friendlies on European soil vs. the Netherlands and reigning World Cup champions Germany. The team also saw an injection of youth in its ranks as promising young players climbed the MNT program ladder from a talented U-20 team that made an inspired run to the FIFA U-20 World Cup Quarterfinals up to the U-23 MNT and in the case of defender Matt Miazga the full National Team. Despite undesired results in the semifinals of the Concacaf Gold Cup and Concacaf Cup, the MNT closed out the year with quality results in its first two games of Semifinal Round Qualifying for the 2018 FIFA World Cup in Russia.
2016: Another big year for U.S. Soccer saw its Men's and Women's teams of all age groups find success throughout the year. On the Women's side, the year began with a storming run to the Concacaf Olympic Qualifying tournament title by the senior team, which then won the inaugural \#SheBelieves Cup with victories against European powers England, France and Germany. From there another pair of quality results against rival Japan had the team looking good heading into the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio; however, a bitter Round of 16 exit at the hands of former coach Pia Sundhage and Sweden on penalty kicks after a 1-1 draw left a sour taste. The team finished the year strong, winning its remaining six games while introducing a wealth of young talent.
Additionally, the U-20 WNT made a strong run at the U-20 World Cup, reaching the third-place match.
The Men's National Team had a roller coaster of a year. A must-win World Cup Qualifying match at home to Guatemala saw the USA come good to set the team up for an impressive summer run at the Copa America Centenario, which was hosted in the United States. Despite an opening match loss to Colombia, the U.S. recovered to steam into a semifinal showdown against world power Argentina, where the team was defeated by a sublime performance from five-time FIFA World Player of the Year Lionel Messi. The MNT righted the ship by cruising into the Final Round of 2018 World Cup Qualifying with a pair of high-flying wins. But the year would take a sharp turn once more as defeats to Mexico at home and Costa Rica away sealed the fate of Jurgen Klinsmann as head coach and saw former manager Bruce Arena reinstalled to lead the team in 2017.

2017: The U.S. Women's National Team experienced one of its busiest, most competitive schedules to begin a World Cup and Olympic cycle. The team played seven teams in the top 10 of the FIFA Women's World Rankings on the way to compiling a

12－3－1 record that included an eight－game unbeaten streak to finish the year．The USA hosted two major tournaments in the SheBelieves Cup and the Tournament of Nations，as head coach Jill Ellis used the year for experimentation and player evaluation as more than 50 players were seen in training camps and games while six players earned first caps．
After starting the Final Round of 2018 FIFA World Cup Qualifying with two defeats to end the previous year，the U．S．Men＇s National Team set a different course with the return of Bruce Arena as head coach．
The turnaround began in March when the U．S．picked up eight points via two home wins and two away draws，one against Mexico at the revered Estadio Azteca．With qualifying stabilized，attention shifted to the Concacaf Gold Cup，where the U．S．earned its sixth confederation title when Jordan Morris＇ 88th minute game winner defeated Jamaica in the championship match on July 26.
With a regional crown in hand，the MNT returned to qualifying in September，but faltered with a home defeat to Costa Rica and away draw with Honduras that saw the USA still alive with two qualifying matches left．An impressive 4－0 win against Panama pushed the U．S．to the brink of qualifying for the 2018 World Cup，but needing just a draw on the last matchday at Trinidad \＆Tobago，the side fell 2－1 to the Soca Warriors in Couva，Trinidad．A result that combined with Honduras＇and Panama＇s wins that night knocked the U．S．out of World Cup contention．

Arena resigned on Oct．13，opening the search for a new head coach，and a month later the beginnings of a new－look MNT took its initial step when a young team led by acting head coach Dave Sarachan played defending European champions Portugal to a 1－1 draw．
On the youth side，the U．S．was one of only two nations to see its U－17 and U－20 Men＇s National Teams reach the Quarterfinals of their respective World Cups．The U－17 squad secured its spot at its World Cup with a second－place finish at the Concacaf U－17 Championship．The U－20 MNT qualified for the competition by winning the Concacaf U－20 Championship for the first time in federation history， defeating Honduras on penalties．
Additionally，the Paralympic National Team earned its best finish at a major world competition since the

1996 Paralympic Games with a fifth－place result at the 2017 IFCPF CP Football World Championships in San Luis，Argentina．

2018：The U．S．Women＇s National Team went unbeaten through 20 matches in 11 states and two countries in a year that will go down as one of the most successful in program history．The squad lifted three trophies by winning the SheBelieves Cup，the Tournament of Nations，and the Concacaf Championship．Jill Ellis＇side punched its ticket to the 2019 FIFA Women＇s World Cup in dominant fashion，winning all five qualifiers by a combined score of 26－0．In its penultimate match of the year， the USA captured its 500th all－time victory with a 1－0 win versus Portugal in Lisbon．
The U．S．Men＇s National Team took on a transitional year in 2018 by facing one of the most challenging schedules in team history．The USA squared off against the likes of Brazil，England，Italy，and Colombia in a gauntlet designed to test a new generation of the red，white，and blue．One of the team＇s best moments came in June，when it drew eventual World Cup champion France，1－1，in Lyon． The USA then hired its first－ever General Manager in Earnie Stewart and new head coach Gregg Berhalter to lead the charge toward the 2022 World Cup．
On the youth side，the U－15 Girls National Team， U－17 Women＇s National Team，and U－20 Men＇s National Team all won Concacaf Championships． The para 7－a－side team qualified for the 2019 IFCPF World Cup with a third－place finish at Copa America．

And in a momentous moment for soccer in the U．S．， the United Bid of Canada，Mexico and the United States，was awarded hosting rights for the 2026 FIFA World Cup．The 2026 competition will be the first to host an expanded field of 48 teams．The three federations will now begin working to build excitement，energy and awareness about the biggest World Cup in history！

## 2018 U.S. Soccer Players of the Year

For their excellence at the highest levels of the sport, U.S. Soccer voters named U.S. Men's National Team goalkeeper Zack Steffen as the 2018 Male Player of the Year, forward Alex Morgan as the 2018 Female Player of the Year, midfielder Alex Mendez as the 2018 Young Male Player of the Year, defender Tierna Davidson as the 2018 Young Female Player of the Year and U.S. Deaf Women's National Team defender Gracie Fitzgerald as the 2018 Player of the Year with a Disability.
The U.S. Soccer Player of the Year awards have a longer history than any major individual award in American soccer - having first begun more than 30 years ago. Alongside the Best of FIFA awards, the U.S. Player of the Year awards are the only awards to honor both the top male and the top female in the sport.
Votes are collected from respective National Team coaches, National Team players who have earned a cap in the applicable calendar year, American soccer league (MLS, USL and NWSL) head coaches, select media members, former players and administrators. Players cannot win the Young Male or Young Female award more than once.

## U.S. SOCCER MALE <br> PLAYER OF THE YEAR <br> Zack STEFFAN

One of 19 MNT players to debut in 2018, Steffen stood out among his fellow first-timers. The 23 -year-old led all goalkeepers with six appearances, which tied him with Kasey Keller (1990) and Troy Perkins (2009) for most caps by an MNT backstop during his debut year. Steffen kept clean sheets in the MNT's matching 1-0 victories against Paraguay on March 27 in Cary, N.C. and Mexico on Sept. 11 in Nashville, Tenn. His shining moment came against France on June 9 in Lyon, where the rising goalkeeper made eight saves to help the USA to a 1-1 draw in Les Bleus' last match before their victorious title run at the 2018 FIFA World Cup in Russia. Steffen continued to impress during his second full season with Columbus Crew SC, keeping 10 clean sheets in 29 matches while racking up a 12-10-7 record to earn MLS Goalkeeper of the Year honors and helping the club back to the MLS Cup Playoffs. Like he did in 2017, Steffen came up huge again in the postseason, saving two penalty kicks to push Columbus past D.C. United in their shootout victory during the Knockout Round on Nov. 1.


## U.S. SOCCER FEMALE PLAYER OF THE YEAR Alex MORGAN

In a career of many excellent years, this one was one of Morgan's best. She ended 2017 on a roll and kept it going throughout the entirety of 2018, scoring 18 goals in 19 games, far and away the most on the U.S. team, while also picking up three assists. Morgan averaged almost a goal a game in 2018 while scoring against nine different countries. She tallied in the first game of the year against Denmark, and also scored against Mexico, China PR, Japan, Brazil, T\&T, Jamaica, Canada and Scotland. She had six multiple-goal games, including a hat trick against Japan in the Tournament of Nations, and moved to third place all-time in U.S. history in multiple-goal games, tied with Michelle Akers (26), and behind only Abby Wambach (45) and Mia Hamm (38). She won the Golden Boot as the top scorer in the Concacaf Women's World Cup qualifying tournament, pounding in seven goals over the five matches. Her two goals in the semifinal win against Jamaica helped send the USA to the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup in France and she bagged a clinching goal in the Concacaf championship game against Canada. Her 18 goals were her second-most in a calendar year as she terrorized opponents all year long with her speed running at goal and lethal finishing in the penalty area. She finished the year with 98 career goals. For the Orlando Pride in the NWSL, she played in 1,500 minutes over 19 games and had five goals and two assists.

U.S. SOCCER YOUNG MALE PLAYER OF THE YEAR

## Alex MENDEZ

Mendez led the U.S. U-20 MNT to the Concacaf U-20 Championship title, taking home the Golden Ball as the competition's top player at just 18 -yearsold, and leading the U-20s in minutes played. The attacking midfielder tallied eight goals and added six assists for the USA in the tournament, and while the $\mathrm{U}-20 \mathrm{~s}$ had no trouble finding the back of the net in Bradenton, his scoring came
at the team's most crucial junctures: bagging a brace in the championship match against Mexico and netting the opening goal in the World Cup-clinching game vs. Costa Rica. On the year, Mendez appeared in 14 of the U-20s' 15 international matches and will serve as a key figure for the team as it prepares for next summer's 2019 U-20 World Cup in Poland. At the club level, Mendez captained LA Galaxy to the U-18/19 Academy Championship Final and was named to the Development Academy West Conference Best XI. He scored five goals during the team's six-game playoff run, including an incredible free kick from outside the penalty area in a deadlocked semifinal against Vancouver Whitecaps FC to send the Galaxy to the final. Mendez also made his professional debut in 2018, appearing in six games for the United Soccer League's LA Galaxy II and netting his first professional goal on another free kick on July 1. In October, the midfielder signed with German club SC Freiburg, where he'll look to become the latest in a long line of Americans to break out in the Bundesliga.


## U.S. SOCCER YOUNG FEMALE PLAYER OF THE YEAR <br> Tierna DAVIDSON

Davidson attended the U.S. WNT's annual January training camp in Los Angeles, and then at the age of 19, earned her first senior team cap, starting and playing the full 90 minutes in the USA's first match of the year, a 5-1 victory against Denmark in which she picked up the game-winning assist on a goal by Julie Ertz. She then traveled Trinidad \& Tobago to join the U.S. Under-20 Women's National Team for World Cup Qualifying, playing in the 2018 Concacaf Women's U-20 Championship and helping the USA earn a berth to the World Cup while scoring in the title game. After that, the skillful and remarkably-poised lefty firmly established herself with the senior side, playing 1,049 minutes while starting all 12 games in which she played this year, mostly at center back but with some action at left back. Her second, third and fourth caps were serious tests that she passed with honors as she played every minute of the 2018 SheBelieves Cup, against Germany, France and England. Davidson played 90 minutes against Mexico on April 5 and when she came out of the game in the 60th minute on April 8 against Mexico, it was the first time she left the field for the WNT all year. She scored her first career goal on Aug. 31 against Chile on a header from a Tobin Heath corner kick. After helping lead Stanford to an NCAA title last season, the 5-foot-10 Davidson kicked off her junior season this year and scored on a diving header vs. UC Davis in the opener, but in just her third game on Sept. 9, she fell victim to a bad tackle which broke her ankle and she has not played since as she continues to rehabilitate. Now 20-years-old, she was the third teenager since 2013 to earn a first cap for the WNT. Mallory Pugh (17 in 2016) and Lindsey Horan (19 in 2013) are the most recent teenagers to debut for the senior squad.


## U.S. SOCCER PLAYER OF THE YEAR WITH A DISABILITY Gracie FITZGERALD

Gracie Fitzgerald joined the U.S. DWNT as a defender in 2015. Now 19, her stellar performances, which included a goal against Great Britain during the most dominant Deaf World Cup run in U.S. DWNT's history earned her a place on the Best XI AII-World Cup Team. She also recently completed a spectacular sophomore season, starting in the back for No. 4-ranked Centre College, which made a good run to the NCAA Div. III third round where the team fell to No. 15 Wheaton College, 2-1, to finish their season with a $21-1$ record. She tallied two goals in the Southern Athletic Association playoffs with a beautiful headed goal in the Final.

## 2014 BEST OF U.S. SOCCER AWARDS

Ten of the best and most meaningful moments throughout 2014 were selected for special mention during U.S. Soccer's Best Of Week that ran from Dec. 15-19. The 10 best moments in U.S. Soccer over the course of 2014 included:

- The U.S. MNT's thrilling 2-1 win against Ghana that secured a vital three points to begin the team's escape from the 'Group of Death' at the 2014 FIFA World Cup.
- Meghan Klingenberg's long-distance golazo against Haiti during Women's World Cup Qualifying was an audacious and timely way for the defender to score her first goal for the U.S. WNT.
- Jermain Jone's thunderous game-tying strike nearly 30 yards from goal against Portugal that sent the USA on its way to collecting the vital point it ultimately needed to advance to the knockout round at the 2014 FIFA World Cup.
- The U.S. WNT booked its place at the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup by rolling through the Concacaf qualifying tournament with a 6-0-0 record, 21 goals scored, 0 conceded and a clean sweep of the competition's individual awards.
- Fabian Jonshon's picturesque strike against Turkey in the USA's second Send-Off Series game was one of the U.S. MNT's most well-crafted goals the team produced in a year of memorable tallies.
- A rarity among professional athletes across all sports, U.S. WNT captain Christie Rampone was honored for her enduring professionalism and longevity at the highest level of soccer when she made her 300th appearance for her country against Mexico during Women's World Cup Qualifying, becoming just the second soccer player in history man or woman - to achieve the feat.
- The torch was passed on to the next generation of the U.S. MNT as three pillars of the team's unparalleled success over the last decade all announced their retirement: DaMarcus Beasley, Carlos Bocanegra and Landon Donovan.
- With his team approaching its final group game at the 2014 FIFA World Cup, U.S. MNT head coach Jurgen Klinsmann wrote a letter asking that fans be released from work in order to cheer on the USA against Germany. His words went viral on the internet, spawning numerous positive responses from bosses, celebrities and politicians as well as more than a few copy cats.
- U.S. MNT goalkeeper Tim Howard turned in a larger-than-life performance in the USA's Round of 16, overtime defeat to Belgium at the 2014 FIFA World Cup, making a tournament-record 16 saves and cementing his legacy among soccer fans as first goalkeeper to become the "\#Secretaryof Defense."

## BEST OF U．S．SOCCER \＃100YEARS EDITION WINNER

In 2013，U．S．Soccer provided fans with the opportunity to determine the top moment of the Federation＇s history．Set up as a bracket－style competition that pits the top moments across U．S．Soccer＇s 100－year history head－to－head，fans voted daily to determine their favorite moment of all－time．

Abby Wambach＇s dramatic and stunning goal against Brazil in the 2011 FIFA Women＇s World Cup quarterfinal defeated all challengers to win the Best of U．S．Soccer：\＃100Years Edition．More than 10，000 fans voted on the final matchup to crown Wambach the winner，while more than 210,000 votes were cast overall．

Wambach＇s stoppage－time score that pulled the USA even at 2－2 at the very end of overtime in a match that the USA eventually won in penalty kicks，triumphed in all six of its matchups during the 64－moment bracket－style competition． In the final round，Wambach＇s 122 nd－minute header off a cross from Megan Rapinoe－which at the time was the latest goal ever scored in a FIFA competition－edged Landon Donovan＇s historic strike in the waning seconds of the USA＇s last match of group play against Algeria at the 2010 FIFA World Cup in South Africa．

Please familiarize yourself with the information and policies in this document so that your coverage of the U.S. National Teams is conducted in the most efficient manner possible. These guidelines and policies are enforced by the U.S. Soccer Communications Department. If you have questions about the policies listed here, please do not hesitate to contact U.S. Soccer Communications at communications@ussoccer.org or 312-808-1300.

## GENERAL GUIDELINES

## Professional Conduct

Media are expected to follow the guidelines set forth in this document, as well as the instructions of U.S. Soccer staff, stadium employees and security, at the risk of limitation of access or revocation of credentials.

Media credentials are issued with the purpose of providing access to interviews and written, audio and visual accounts of the game as appropriate. Media members should not use access for autographs, personal photographs or commercial requests.

Media credentialed for access to shoot photographs and video are expected to use professional equipment to file photographic or video accounts. Use of equipment such as 'point and shoot' style cameras or mobile telephones that are not considered professional equipment will result in access being restricted or rescinded.

## Media Services

Press Releases: To be added to the U.S. Soccer media distribution list, please send an email request to communications@ussoccer.org.

Media Guides: To request a current media guide for the U.S. Men's or Women's National Team, please send an email request to communications@ussoccer.org. A digital version of the Men's and Women's National Team's media guides can be found on the Media Guide page in the right-hand navigation column.

Interview Requests: Media requesting interviews with U.S. National Team players, coaches or administrators should make arrangements with the U.S. Soccer Communications Department or the onsite press officer with the respective team. When requesting and conducting interviews, media should identify the organization that they are representing, and provide advance notice if audio or video will be recorded for later distribution. All audio and video interviews are subject to U.S. Soccer's Video Guidelines, which are included in this document.
ussoccer.com: Is the official web site of the U.S. Soccer Federation. All press releases - content that includes a dateline are posted on ussoccer.com, and can be republished by media in their entirety. U.S. Soccer press releases are available in Spanish. Media interested in receiving press releases in Spanish can send an email request to communications@ussoccer.org.

Video: Media are welcome to embed videos that appear on ussoccer.com. Visityoutube.com/ ussoccerdotcom and http://www.ussoccer.com/stories for the latest U.S. Soccer-produced videos.

Audio, Video Roll \& Interviews: U.S. Soccer periodically sends out video and audio media rolls from National Team events for outlets to use free of charge, provided they properly credit video as; Courtesy of U.S. Soccer/Wazee Digital. If you'd like to sign up for the email list that distributes these media rolls, please email communications@ussoccer.org with Media Roll in the subject line.

Twitter: U.S. Soccer provides updates at www.twitter.com/ussoccer that include breaking news and new content posted to ussoccer.com. Media are welcome to re-tweet @ussoccer, @ussoccer_mnt, @ussoccer_wnt, @ussoccer_esp, @ussoccer_ynt, @ussoccer_acad, @ussoccer_coach, @ussoccer_ref, and @ussoccer_pnt content, including play-by-play accounts.

## Photography Requests

International Sports Images serves as the photography manager for U.S. Soccer. Media outlets can also search and preview the photography archive at isiphotos.com.

## U.S. SOCCER EVENTS

## Credentials

Policies: In addition to the policies listed below, please note that only working media will be credentialed and no one under the age of 18 will be issued a credential.

Applications: Media can request credentials for matches online at https://www.ussoccer.com/about/us-soccer-media-services/credentials. The online application process can be found by clicking on the Media Services link in the footer on the front page of ussoccer.com. Media can also contact U.S. Soccer Communications with questions on the application process directly by phone at 312-808-1300 or e-mail communications@ ussoccer.org.

Deadlines: The deadline to apply for credentials to U.S. Soccer events is generally two (2) weeks prior to the game. There is no guarantee that late applications will be accepted.

Pickup: U.S. Soccer will distribute credential pickup times prior to each game. Credential pickup times generally coincide with media availabilities. For pickup on the day of the game, Media Will Call at the stadium will open approximately two (2) hours before kickoff for WNT matches and three (3) hours for MNT matches. Each media member must show identification in order to receive their credential. An individual cannot pick up more than one credential.

Parking Shipping: If you would like single-game parking passes (subject to availability) to be shipped, please provide a UPS or FedEx account number at least two (2) weeks prior to the game. Replacement parking passes cannot be provided if lost in transit.

All Matches Credential Holders: All media provided an All Matches credential must still inform the U.S. Soccer Communications Department of their plans to attend specific matches to ensure a space in the press box. Please do so at least two (2) weeks in advance of a match.

## Media Facilities

Media facilities, including the press box and photographers' work area, will open approximately two (2) - three (3) hours before each game.

Press Box: All seats will be assigned. Auxiliary seating arrangements will be made if the capacity of the press box is exceeded.

Photographer Work Room: Where available, a photographer work room will be available at field level.
Internet: Wireless Internet access will be provided to media filing on deadline.
Game Notes \& Media Guides: Game notes will be placed at each seat and also on a table near the press box entrance. Media guides will be made available upon request and digital versions are available online at ussoccer.com/about/us-soccer-media-services.

Lineups: Official lineups are made available approximately one (1) hour prior to kickoff. Lineups, which include jersey numbers for each team, will be distributed to the media as quickly as possible.

## Media Access / Interviews

There is no pre-game access to U.S. Soccer players and coaches on game days. No "flash" interviews are permitted on the field. All post-game access is available in the press conference and mixed zone.

Press Conference: There will be a formal press conference with the head coach shortly after the final whistle. In the event something changes a member of the U.S. Soccer communications staff will inform the media.

Mixed Zone: Locker rooms are not open to the media at U.S. Soccer events. All post-game interviews will be conducted in a press conference or mixed zone. Players from both teams will typically be available in the mixed zone. The media mixed zone will generally be near the locker rooms.

## Print \& Online Media

Live Blogging / Commentary: Live blogging of U.S. Soccer events from either the venue or via the television broadcast is subject to our Live Blogging Guidelines. The guidelines are included in Appendix II of this document.

Video: Please notify U.S. Soccer in advance if your coverage includes video recording. Any video footage, including interviews, gathered by print and online media is subject to the U.S. Soccer Video Guidelines. The Video Guidelines are included in Appendix I of this document.

Audio: Please notify U.S. Soccer in advance if your coverage includes audio recording. Any audio, including interviews, gathered by radio, print and online media is subject to the U.S. Soccer Audio Use Guidelines. The guidelines are included in Appendix III of this document.

## Radio - Non Rights Holders

Non-rights-holding radio journalists are welcome to conduct pregame and postgame reports from the press box, but NO play-by-play reports are permitted. Radio non-rights-holders will have access to post-match press conference and mixed zones unless otherwise notified. Radio outlets interested in purchasing rights should contact U.S. Soccer at 312-808-1300.

Audio: Any audio, including interviews, gathered by radio, print and online media is subject to the U.S. Soccer Audio Use Guidelines. The guidelines are included in Appendix III of this document.

## Field Access

Print, online and radio writers and reporters are not permitted on the field at any time. Media members granted field access must have a working purpose. Representatives from the broadcast media who are not filing reports, but would like to attend as an observer, should inform U.S. Soccer of such when making the application.

## Still Photographers

Locations: Still photographers are permitted to shoot U.S. Soccer events from behind the field sign boards in either end line. At events where space allows, photographers may also shoot on the sideline opposite the benches between the end line and the 18 -yard line. Shooting from the 18 -yard line will be allowed on a match-by-match basis depending on space. The attacking direction of the teams is determined by a coin toss. Following the coin toss, photographers must pick one end of the field to shoot for the entire half. The ONLY time photographers may change ends is at halftime. At NO time are photographers allowed on the field of play.

Photo Marshals: U.S. Soccer will use photo marshals to assist on-field media. Photo marshals can assist with providing lineups/rosters, distributing bibs and assist with questions on location and other topics. Photographers are required to follow all instructions of the photo marshals.

Bibs: All still photographers are required to wear a colored bib as provided by U.S. Soccer. The bib is lightweight and designed to be worn outside of outerwear and be visible at all times. Please return the bibs to a photo marshal following the game, or leave them in the press box / photographers' work room.

Pre-Game Photos: Each team's starters will pose for a pre-game photo near the bench area following the national anthems. Photographers should gather in the near-side corners once the teams leave the field after warm-ups. U.S. Soccer will escort the photographers to midfield.

Field Watering: The grounds crew may water the field prior to warm-ups and also prior to kickoff. Please be responsible for your equipment during this time. U.S. Soccer is not responsible for damage to any equipment.

## Non-Rights Holder Video (ENG)

Video Footage: All non-rights holders and ENG crews must follow the U.S. Soccer Video Guidelines for all footage gathered at events. The Video Guidelines are included in Appendix I of this document.

TV Reporters: ENG reporters may stay on the field until two (2) hours prior to kickoff to shoot 'scene sets,' and are not allowed on the field again until after the conclusion of the broadcast window. Reporters/anchors will not be issued a bib. U.S. Soccer will not generally credential non-rights holder producers, editors, or technicians.

Location: ENG cameras are permitted to shoot U.S. Soccer events from behind the field sign boards of either end line. The attacking direction of the teams is determined by a coin toss. Following the coin toss, ENG cameras must pick one end of the field to shoot for the entire half. The ONLY time ENG crews may change ends is at halftime. At NO time are any media members allowed on the field of play.

Photo Marshals: U.S. Soccer will use photo marshals to assist on-field media. Photo marshals can assist with providing lineups/rosters, distributing bibs and assist with questions on location and other topics. ENG crews are required to follow all instructions of the photo marshals.

Bibs: All ENG camera operators are required to wear a colored bib as provided by U.S. Soccer. The bib is lightweight and designed to be worn outside of outerwear and be visible at all times. Please return the bibs to a photo marshal following the game, or leave them in the press box / photographers' work room.

Field Watering: The grounds crew may water the field prior to warm-ups and also prior to kickoff. Please be responsible for your equipment during this time. U.S. Soccer is not responsible for damage to any equipment.

Live Newscasts: Please contact U.S. Soccer in advance of the event if you would like to broadcast live pre or post-game as part of a newscast from the stadium.

## Social Media

U.S. Soccer will not generally credential media looking to cover a U.S. Soccer event only for social media purposes. This means someone looking to provide coverage of a match for social media sites not limited or restricted to; Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc., will be considered for a press credential on a case basis but in most cases will not be accommodated for a press credential.

Social Media Reporting: U.S. Soccer permits credentialed reporters to report on behalf of their media organizations through social media channels or personal accounts. U.S. Soccer permits pictures to be taken from the press box for social media reporting purposes but prohibits the collection of any type of video from the press box. Doing so may result in revocation of press credentials.

## APPENDIXI: NON-RIGHTS HOLDER VIDEO GUIDELINES

Video Footage: All rights to match footage including all applicable copyrights belong to U.S. Soccer and its rights holders who broadcast each specific match. U.S. Soccer has three rights holders that will broadcast their Men's National Team and Women's National Team matches in 2019: ESPN, FOX Sports and Univision. If an organization is interested in recording video footage at a U.S. Soccer match for non-news gathering purposes they should contact U.S. Soccer Communications at communications@ussoccer.org.

## Television Broadcasters

Game Action: Television broadcasters can use footage of U.S. Soccer events obtained either via 1) their own recording or 2) action dubbed from a U.S. Soccer rights holder broadcast with credit only in connection with its regularly scheduled news programming within a week of the game. This footage should not exceed two (2) minutes. Highlights aired as part of a continuous news program should not be longer than one (1) minute per 30-minute segment.

Filming - Game Action: For televised events, non-rights holders / ENG cameras may record the first 15 minutes of each half (from 00:00 to 15:00 and 45:00 to 60:00 on the game clock). For non-televised events, non-rights holders / ENG cameras may record the entire game but are still subject to the aforementioned limits. This includes events that are web streamed live online.

Filming - Interviews and Scene Sets: There is no limit to the gathering of footage pre-game, at halftime and post-game. All footage gathered is subject to the usage guidelines indicated in this document.

Filming - In Seating Area: Video cameras looking to shoot in the concourse or seating area must contact U.S. Soccer in advance of the event for approval.

Previews or Advances: In advance of a U.S. Soccer event, television broadcasters can use two (2) minutes of archival game action to preview an upcoming event. In the local/regional markets, broadcasters should mention the time and location of the game along with their report. Outside of the local markets, broadcasters should mention the time and broadcast information.

Television Broadcasters' Web Sites: Video produced for air as part of regular programming that is simulcast or archived online must be accompanied by a link to ussoccer.com. Content produced exclusively for the Internet is subject to the guidelines for Online Video.
U.S. Soccer Video Dept. Audio and Video Roll: U.S. Soccer periodically sends out video and audio media rolls from National Team events for outlets to use free of charge, provided they properly credit video as; Courtesy of U.S. Soccer/Wazee Digital. If you'd like to sign up for the email list that distributes these media rolls, please email communications@ussoccer.org with Media Roll in the subject line.

## Online Video

Game Action: Online organizations (including print publications that post video online) are not permitted to film or use game action video at any time. Game action includes any footage of the field, teams, etc., following the beginning of the television broadcast window. Only video of off-field activities (i.e. interviews, training sessions) may be recorded.

Non-Game Video: Any video posted online that is recorded as part of media access is limited to the use of eight (8) minutes per day/activity date. Online video may not incorporate integrated advertising and must be accompanied by links to ussoccer.com.

Professional Presentation: Online video is expected to be recorded, edited and presented in a professional manner. Video must be presented/hosted on an organization's website, and not solely on a site provided by a third-party (i.e. YouTube, Vimeo, Facebook, etc.).

Online Video Sites: Organizations who regularly post video to online video sites (i.e. YouTube, Vimeo, etc.) may not include advertising with video gathered as a result of media access. Allowing users to embed these videos is not permitted, and the description of any video must include a link to ussoccer.com.

# APPENDIXIII: NON-RIGHTS HOLDER AUDIO GUIDELINES Radio Broadcasters 

Play-by-Play Accounts: Play-by-play accounts are forbidden by non-rights holders at any time.
Non-Game Audio: Any online audio recorded as part of media access is limited to the use of eight (8) minutes per day/activity date. Audio posted on radio broadcaster websites must comply with Online Guidelines below.

## Online

Non-Game Audio: Any audio recorded as part of media access is limited to the use of eight (8) minutes per day/activity date. Online audio may not incorporate integrated advertising and must be accompanied by links to ussoccer.com.

# APPENDIX III: LIVE WRITTEN UPDATES 

## All Media

Online or text reports (i.e., live blogs, Twitter, etc.) concerning U.S. Soccer games while they are in progress ("Live Written Updates") are subject to the following:

- Live updates may not use any audio, video or graphic simulations of U.S. Soccer games.
- Live updates must provide television and radio broadcast information for that U.S. Soccer Game. For example: "Tonight's U.S. Soccer game is being broadcast live on (name of television/radio station)."
- All live updates must be free of charge to readers.

NOTE: This policy does not prohibit the posting of the facts of a game (i.e., goals scored, cards given, game score and time remaining).

Finished her U-17 international career with 22 caps and 15 goals ... Called up from the U.S. U-15s to the U-17s in 2008 ... Participated in the U.S. Soccer Under-14 I.D. Professional / Club: 2018: On January 1, it was announced that she had agreed to a two-and-a-half year contract with European power Olympique Lyonnaise in France, which was her first experience playing professionally abroad ...
