# ALL EYES ON DOWN UNDER

The Women's World Cup Year is here – although it came a bit quicker than normal after the delayed 2020 Olympics Games were held in the summer of 2021 – and the tournament promises to be the biggest and best in history. The U.S. Women's National Team will be participating in its ninth Women's World Cup and head coach Vlatko Andonovski has been charged with the difficult but exciting task of integrating a wave of dynamic newer talent into a team that still has multiple veterans capable of contributing in big ways. While the majority of the USA's game schedule over 2020, 2021 and the first part of 2022 was impacted by the global pandemic, the final eight matches of 2022 were against teams that will feature in the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup, which will be staged in Australia and New Zealand from July 20-August 20.

The USA earned its berth to the Women's World Cup at the newly dubbed Concacaf W Championship, an eight-team tournament that took place in Mexico in July of 2022 and qualified four countries – the top two finishers in each of the two first round groups – directly to the World Cup. The USA won the tournament while outscoring its opponents 13-0 over the five games, culminating with a 1-0 victory over Canada in the championship game. That victory also earned the USA a berth to the 2024 Olympic Games in Paris.

This run to the World Cup presents the USA with unique challenges and another chance to reset goals. With a solid core of players from the team that won the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup still in the mix, the USA has a deep and united group of players who are highly motivated to accomplish a feat never before seen in women's soccer: to win a third consecutive World Cup.

That said, to be crystal clear, the USA's philosophy as it looks forward is that they are *defending nothing*. This new journey is about *attacking* yet another challenge. All of the World Cup trophies are resting comfortably for eternity at the National Soccer Hall of Fame, and this is a new team, with new players and new goals, competing in an ever-changing landscape for the global game.

Andonovski – a veteran of seven seasons as a head coach in the National Women's Soccer League – had the best-ever start of any USWNT coach in terms of winning percentage and understands the team's history and its expectations. He has also brought a new energy to the ongoing evolution of a Women's National Team that for years has been fighting off competitors from around the world as the women's game continues to grow by leaps and bounds at both the club and international levels.

Heading into 2023, in his just over three years on the job, and despite the majority of 2020 being unavailable for any camps or games, Andonovski has called up 65 players to take part in at least one training camp. Of those 65 players, 49 have earned at least one cap under Andonovski, who has given 23 players their first senior team call-ups and 17 of those their first caps. For the final two games of 2021, he started the transition to bringing in a younger group of players, many of whom have excelled in the National Women's Soccer League and who will challenge the veterans for roster spots, while at the same time valuing the talent and experience that already resides in the player pool.

In 2023 the core group of players will refocus on continuing to improve as a team, developing relationships on the field, incorporating younger players to gain experience and improving the overall depth, all with the goal of peaking at the World Cup during the summer. Many of the

veterans who helped the USA to so much success over the past few years will still be competing for spots, providing even more motivation towards evolution and success this year. This much is clear: despite once again holding the top spot in the FIFA Women's World Rankings for the entire year (for the seventh year in a row), the U.S. team is working hard to progress and improve in the increasingly competitive arena of women's international soccer.

# 2023 KICKS OFF IN NEW ZEALAND

The goal of the USWNT program is always to play as many of the world's top teams as possible, a task that is becoming more difficult every year, not only over the past three years due to the global pandemic but also due to the increased programming for club and national teams around the world. Heading into the Women's World Cup, the USA will play eight full international matches prior to the start of tournament, almost all against fellow World Cup qualifiers.

The annual January training camp will this year be held in World Cup co-host New Zealand and will include two matches against the Football Ferns while serving as a "preseason" for the players coming off a well-deserved six-week break and before the start of preseason for the 11th year of the NWSL. The USA will then come together to train for the eighth annual SheBelieves Cup that will be staged in three doubleheaders over Feb. 16-22 as the tournament returns to its traditional three-venue format with matches to be played at Exploria Stadium in Orlando, Fla., GEODIS Park in Nashville, Tenn. and Toyota Stadium in Frisco, Texas.

The SheBelieves Cup games will be USA's first domestic matches of the year. The U.S. players will then return to their pro clubs in the spring, but there will also be two home friendlies in April and a World Cup send-off match in July.

At the World Cup, the USA was drawn into Group E and will face World Cup debutant Vietnam, Netherlands and the Netherlands and Group A Playoff Winner Portugal. The 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup will take place from July 20-Aug. 20 in 10 stadiums and nine host cities, five in Australia and four in New Zealand.

The U.S. will open Group E play against Vietnam on July 22 at Eden Park in Auckland/Tāmaki Makaurau, which will also serve as the host venue for the Opening Ceremony of the 2023 World Cup on July 20 when New Zealand plays Norway. The USA then faces Netherlands on July 27 at Wellington Regional Stadium in Wellington/Te Whanganui-a-Tara, followed by Group A Playoff Winner Portugal on Aug. 1 at Eden Park in Auckland/Tāmaki Makaurau.

The USWNT is also scheduled to play two home friendlies in September, two in October and perhaps two away matches in December.

# TALENT, DEPTH, MOTIVATION HIGHLIGHT 2023 FOR USWNT

A solid core of veterans who played in the most recent Women's World Cup and Olympics are part of the player pool for 2023, but Andonovski will be brave in his quest to strengthen the U.S. team in the starting XI and on the bench. Over the past few years, some new faces have worked their way into important roles for the USWNT, invigorating the roster and adding valuable depth. That process will continue as Andonovski and his coaching staff zero in on the 23 players – three goalkeepers and 20 field players – who will represent the USA at the World Cup, meaning they will be facing some "good problems" in choosing the best roster to push the USA to new successes.

As usual for the U.S. WNT, the selection of rosters for camps and games is a difficult but desirable proposition for Andonovski and his staff. It means the competition within the squad is always there, and players will earn playing time and roster spots based on their performance.

At the end of 2014, the U.S. Women dropped to second in the FIFA Women's World Rankings after holding the top spot for seven years. The U.S. WNT regained the #1 spot in July of 2015 after winning the World Cup and has maintained it ever since, meaning the American women once again head into the new year as the world's top ranked team. Over the past 19 years, since the end of the 2003 FIFA Women's World Cup through the end of 2022, the U.S. team has

lost just 23 matches in regulation time. This year's team will seek to build on the tradition that has made the USA the most successful women's soccer nation in history, winning four Olympic gold medals and four Women's World Cup tournaments, as they once again focus on the largest women's sporting event on the planet.

# WHO WILL BE IN THE 23?

The USWNT player pool remains deep, and the challenge of blending together the best mix of young talent and experienced veterans is one that many coaches face. The USA will of course rely extensively on some of the players who featured in the most recent World Cup and Olympics tournaments, but there has been an exciting infusion of new players into the squad.

In goal, **ALYSSA NAEHER**, who has played in 76 matches over the past six years, has proven herself as a go-to starter. Her excellent performances in France in the summer of 2019 and in Japan in the summer of 2021 (despite suffering a serious knee injury in the Olympic semifinal that kept her out for the rest of the year) showed once again that she is a world class 'keeper. The 6-foot-1 **CASEY MURPHY**, the tallest GK in U.S. history, turned heads with some stellar performances at the end of 2021 and has marked her as a contender for the starting XI. Murphy, who had an excellent NWSL debut season in 2019 after playing her first two professional seasons in France, elevated her game in 2021 with the North Carolina Courage and then had one of the most impressive goalkeeper debuts in U.S. history when she made eight saves, several of them spectacular, in a 3-0 win over Australia on Nov. 27, 2021, in Sydney. In her first year of consistent action with the USWNT in 2022, she started nine games.

Veteran **ADRIANNA FRANCH**, who earned her first caps in 2019 and was on the 2019 World Cup roster, played in the Olympic bronze medal game win in place of Naeher and hit double figures in caps in 2021. Franch, the two-time NWSL Goalkeeper of the Year, has played very well in the NWSL and gives the USA excellent depth in goal. She was traded to her home state Kansas City Current in 2021 after helping the Portland Thorns remain among the league's elite while solidifying a consistent spot on WNT rosters when healthy. **JANE CAMPBELL**, who has established herself as the Houston Dash's long-time starter, made strides over the past two years while **AUBREY KINGSBURY**, who helped the Washington Spirit win the NWSL championship in 2021, earned her first cap in 2022 at age 30, becoming the oldest goalkeeper ever to make her debut.

The U.S. team defense, led by a stingy back line, has proven tough to break down over the past few years. Over 2021 and 2022, the USA allowed just 11 goals in the 36 matches outside of the unfortunate aberration of the Olympics Games, with seven of those coming in the final four games last year when the USA played England, Spain and Germany. Three of the four starting defenders from the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup Final - KELLEY O'HARA, BECKY SAUERBRUNN and CRYSTAL **DUNN** – are still solidly in the running for roster and starting spots, although Dunn will be working her way back to fitness in the early part of 2023 after returning to the field in the fall of 2022 after giving birth to her son that spring. The USA's central defense has long featured Sauerbrunn, now one of the most experienced and respected defenders in the world. With the rise of ALANA COOK and NAOMI GIRMA and the return from injury of TIERNA DAVIDSON, who has two world championship tournaments on her resume, the USA boasts four savvy and smooth center backs. Cook, who was a college teammate of Davidson's at Stanford, had a breakout year for the USA in 2022, starting 15 games after playing two excellent matches for the USA in Australia at the end of the 2021 campaign. Girma, who played the first 10 games of her senior international career in 2022 and won both the NWSL Rookie of the Year and Best Defender awards, jumped right into the lineup and played like a veteran, performances that bode well for the U.S. defense in 2023.

World Cup and Olympic veteran **ABBY DAHLKEMPER** underwent back surgery at the end of 2022 and faces an extended rehabilitation period that will rule her out of contention for the World Cup.

While she continues to play attacking roles in the NWSL, Dunn's performance at the 2019 World Cup solidified her standing as one of the world's top outside backs, and she should be a valuable part of the U.S. team moving forward as she continues her return to form and fitness post-childbirth.

The veteran O'Hara, the 2015 Women's World Cup semifinal hero who was a starting outside back in the 2012, 2016 and 2020 Olympics and in the 2019 World Cup, has continued to display her fitness, grit, versatility (she can play on either flank) and experience. She played a crucial role in the USA's success in France, and the former MAC Hermann Trophy winner as a forward at Stanford has also proven valuable in the attacking third.

Despite some injury struggles, Davidson – the top pick in the 2019 NWSL Draft by the Chicago Red Stars – has shown her talent on the international stage and still has many quality years ahead. She saw her minutes increase over 2021 but missed almost all of 2022 due to an ACL injury. When healthy, she gives the USA an exceptional option in the middle of defense (or in a pinch, at outside back), but will have to bounce back from her injury to make the World Cup team.

**EMILY SONNETT**, the first pick in the 2016 NWSL Draft by the Portland Thorns and a vital part of their run to the title in 2017, moved clubs three times in 2020 but has consistently shown her quality, mostly at outside back for the USA or centrally in the NWSL for the 2021 Champion Washington Spirit. She has proven herself to be a solid option in the middle or on the flank, whether starting or coming off the bench. She scored her first career international goal during the Concacaf W Championship.

**EMILY FOX**, the top pick in the 2021 NWSL Draft for Racing Louisville FC, is a veteran of the two U-20 Women's World Cup Teams and has emerged as a stellar new young player on defense. She earned her first senior team caps at the end of 2018 and 2019 but had two breakout games at the end of 2021 in Australia and then started 14 games in 2022. She has shown qualities – both defensive and offensive -- that show brightly for the future.

**SOFIA HUERTA**, who excelled in her role at outside back in the latter part of the 2021 season and through the 2022 season for OL Reign, showed that she could provide increased depth on the back line during the USA's trip to Australia at the end of 2021 and then had her best year ever for the USWNT in 2022, playing in 16 matches with 11 starts.

The speedy and versatile **HAILIE MACE** – she can play several positions in the back and also on the wing -- earned her first USWNT caps in 2018 but was out of the rotation until the fall of 2022, returning in part because of her quality play for the resurgent Kansas City Current. She earned five caps in 2022 and will be working hard to earn more this year. **CARSON PICKETT**, the first-ever player with a limb difference to play for the USWNT, earned her first caps in 2022 and adds depth to the group of outside backs in the player pool.

**CASEY KRUEGER** saw little playing time for the USA over the past four years while hampered with injuries and then while she was pregnant in 2022 but did make the 2020 Olympic Team, seeing action in one match. She has shown tremendous speed and one-on-one defensive abilities when healthy, but Krueger, who gave birth to a son in the summer of 2022, must regain her fitness and get in some quality matches to regain the form required to make the World Cup Team.

**LINDSEY HORAN**, the first American woman to skip college and turn pro, has had an excellent run for club and country over the past six years while carving out an impactful midfield role. She was named the 2021 BioSteel U.S. Soccer Female Player of the Year for her consistent excellence for club and country. With 10 professional seasons already on her resume at the age of 28, Horan continued to enhance her value as a key player in the U.S. midfield. **ROSE LAVELLE**, who had a stellar WNT debut at the 2017 SheBelieves Cup, has rebounded from injuries early in her career to display her unique talents over the past five years. Lavelle has been consistently fit, impactful and entertaining over the past two years as she has developed into one of the world's top players. She was a breakout star at the 2019 Women's World Cup, where she showcased her skill and craft in the U.S. midfield and established herself as a truly unique and valuable player for the National Team.

The skillful and elusive **ASHLEY SANCHEZ**, who helped the Washington Spirit win the 2021 NWSL title, earned her first senior team cap at the end of 2021 and put together some solid performances in 2022, playing in 15 games while scoring three goals with three assists. She will be looking to earn even more playing time in a crowded midfield.

**ANDI SULLIVAN** took a big step to establishing herself in the WNT in 2021 with her performances for the USA and for the Washington Spirit, which she captained to the NWSL title. In 2022, she started 15 games for the USA and threw her hat squarely in the ring to see significant time at defensive midfield during this World Cup year.

One of the best women's soccer stories of 2020 was the return to the National Team of midfielder **KRISTIE MEWIS**, the older sister of Samantha Mewis and former U.S. YNT star whose performances for the Houston Dash vaulted her back into the USWNT picture. On Nov. 27, 2020, she scored the clinching goal in the 2-0 victory against the Netherlands, her first goal for the USA in 2,722 days (a U.S. record for most time between goals) in what was her first USWNT match in more than six years. The tremendously skillful and left-footed Mewis continued to contribute in 2021 and 2022, scoring five goals including a game-winner against Mexico in World Cup qualifying, and will be looking to establish herself even more now in 2023.

Based off an excellent rookie year for Portland Thorns FC, for whom she helped win the NWSL title, **SAM COFFEY** broke into the USWNT to earn her first cap in 2022, and although she got limited minutes, will be looking to make a bigger splash this year.

**JAELIN HOWELL**, the second pick in the 2022 NWSL Draft by Racing Louisville, won two NCAA titles with Florida State and was a consistent performer for the USA at the Youth National Team levels. She earned her first senior team cap at the end of 2020, and her athleticism and ball-winning give the USA more depth at defensive midfield. **TAYLOR KORNIECK**, who at 6-foot-1 is the tallest field player in U.S. history, earned her first senior team caps in 2022. She scored in her WNT debut in Colorado where she attended college, was productive in spot time over the last year and will be looking to make even more of an impact in 2023.

The USA will likely be without two of its midfield stalwarts from the 2019 World Cup as **SAMANTHA MEWIS** continues to struggle with a knee injury and **JULIE ERTZ**, the 2017 and 2019 U.S. Soccer Female Player of the Year, has yet to return to the field after the birth of her son.

The USA is fortunate to be deep up top with both flank players and center forwards. An X-factor for the USWNT may be **CATARINA MACARIO**. Entering 2021, the Brazilian-born attacking midfielder and two-time MAC Hermann Trophy winner for Stanford had attended just one full USWNT event and was in the process of securing her eligibility to play for the United States, which she did prior to the USA's first matches of the year. She made her debut in the USA's first match of the year against Colombia, scored minutes into her first start and second match for the USA and would go on to play in 12 matches and make the 2020 Olympics Team. She was off to a great start for the USA in 2022 and helped her club Olympique Lyon to an UEFA Women's Champions League title before suffering an ACL injury during a club match. If she can regain her pre-injury form, the unique qualities she brings to the U.S. attack will likely play a critical role in the USA's success.

**ALEX MORGAN** missed almost all of 2020 while pregnant and following the birth of her daughter, but before that she had been in some of the best goal-scoring form of her career. She returned to the U.S. to score eight goals in 2021 and four in 2022, making her the second-highest goal scorer in USWNT history as a mom, while showing flashes of the form that has long made her one of the most dangerous players in the world running at goal and inside the penalty area. Entering 2023, she was fifth on the USA's all-time goal scoring list with 119 career goals and will be looking to earn a spot on her fourth World Cup Team.

**ASHLEY HATCH**, who scored in both games in Australia at the end of 2021 for her first two international goals, scored two more in 2022. With her play for the USA and always dangerous goal-scoring form with the Washington Spirit, she has laid claim to be solidly on the depth chart among the USA's center forwards.

**MEGAN RAPINOE**, who in 2019 had one the most remarkable years any soccer player has ever enjoyed, continues to show her value. After logging a career-high 10 goals in 2021, including two spectacular strikes in the Olympic bronze medal game, she has transitioned to more of a substitute role at the end of her international career but can still add game-changing value off the bench for the USA.

**MALLORY SWANSON**, who turned 24 in the spring of 2022, has rebounded in a huge way from her struggles with injuries and form and was an NWSL MVP candidate in both 2021 and 2022 for the Chicago Red Stars. She brings special attacking talents to the player pool along with experience and goals in an Olympics and a World Cup, as along with more than 80 caps. With seven goals and seven assists in 2022 for the USA, she was in some of the best form of her young career, and she will continue to push to show her pedigree as a speedy and creative attacking player.

**SOPHIA SMITH**, still one of the USA's youngest players at 22, is a veteran of the 2016 U-17 Women's World Cup and the 2018 U-20 Women's World Cup. She was the 2017 U.S. Soccer Young Female Player of the Year, but 2022 was her breakout year for the senior side. She helped the Portland Thorns to the NWSL title, was named the NWSL MVP, was the MVP of the NWSL Championship Game and was also named the 2022 BioSteel U.S. Soccer Female Player of the Year. She scored 11 goals for the USA to lead the team and became the youngest player to lead the team in scoring since Mia Hamm in 1993. Smith helped lead Stanford to an NCAA title in 2019 before turning pro as the top pick in the 2020 NWSL Draft, and although her pro career started slowly due to injuries and the pandemic, she has developed into one of the most dangerous forwards in the league and the world with the Thorns. With her tremendous speed and ability to run at goal and beat players in the attacking third, she earned 17 starts for the USA in 2022. At the end of 2020, she debuted for the senior side against the Netherlands and became the first player born in the 2000s to earn a cap for the USWNT.

The end of 2019 and what action the USA and the NWSL had in 2020 were a proving ground for **LYNN WILLIAMS**. Perhaps the fastest player in the pool, Williams is also one of the all-time leading scorers in NWSL history and had a match for the ages at the 2020 Olympics, getting a goal and an assist in the USA's quarterfinal win over the Netherlands. A serious hamstring injury in 2022 that required surgery kept her off the field for both club and country for almost the entirety of 2022, but she will be looking to use her speed and scoring ability to make a mark on the USWNT in 2023.

Young forward and 2021 NWSL Rookie of the Year **TRINITY RODMAN** has shown remarkable talent in the NWSL and will be looking to perform more consistently for the USWNT in this important year for the program. She made her Senior National Team debut (at age 19) and scored her first two international goals in 2022, including one at the Concacaf W Championship.

**MARGARET "MIDGE" PURCE**, who has shown tremendous versatility in the NWSL at forward or in the back, was capped for the first time at the end of 2019, earned another in 2020, and saw action in seven games for the USA in 2021 while scoring her first two international goals. She was in and out of rosters in 2022, but she did solidify her position as winger, and she will be looking to add her dynamic abilities on the flank to the U.S. attack this year.

The youngest player in the pool is 18-year-old **ALYSSA THOMPSON**, a blazing fast winger who played in the 2022 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup where she had a goal and an assist. She earned her first senior team cap in spectacular and unique fashion, coming into the match against England at Wembley Stadium for Megan Rapinoe in front of 76,893 fans.

Veterans **TOBIN HEATH** and **CHRISTEN PRESS**, who have 100 international goals between them, have both been sidelined with major injuries but will be hoping to regain their form in the NWSL and still have a chance to work themselves back in the USWNT picture.

It is clear that the USA has the foundation and talent to make a run at another World Cup title, but as is the case every year, the competition is constantly improving, and every opponent strives to give the Americans their best game. Fortunately, those are the kind of challenges the U.S. players relish as they aim to expand their national and international popularity while enhancing the profile of the women's game at home and abroad.



# Kate MARKGRAF

GENERAL MANAGER: U.S. Women's National Team BORN: Aug. 23, 1976, in Pontiac, Michigan HOMETOWN: Bloomfield Hills, Michigan

Kate Markgraf was named as the first Head of Women's Soccer and General Manager in U.S. Women's National Team history on Aug. 12, 2019. In what was a newly created position, she took on the responsibilities of working with the head coach in creating, executing and monitoring technical plans for the U.S. WNT and all U.S. Youth National Teams, both short term and long-term. These plans are aligned with U.S. Soccer's Sport Development Programs while maintaining, creating and building partnerships and networks among the American and global soccer community.

Markgraf is charged with overseeing the technical and administrative staffs for all teams, managing the day-to-day activities around the teams, leading the planning of National Team activities, helping implement High Performance programs and representing U.S. Soccer and the Women's National Team at various events around the country and the world. Beyond the senior team, she is responsible for influencing the development of women's soccer within the Federation and managing the overall technical plan for the Women's National Team program, which includes hiring of Youth National Team coaches and staff.

Markgraf had a monumental day on Dec. 5, 2022. In the morning, she became just the fourth women's soccer player to earn the NCAA Silver Anniversary Award. The awardees, all 25 years removed from the end of their collegiate careers, were honored for their outstanding collegiate and professional achievements. That evening, live on ESPN Networks at halftime of the NCAA Women's Soccer Championship Game, she was told by her former teammate Julie Foudy that she had been elected as part of the 2023 class to the National Soccer Hall of Fame.

Markgraf came to U.S. Soccer after spending eight years as a soccer commentator for ESPN and NBC as well as working in the academic arena. She represented the U.S. Women's National Team 201 times from 1998 through 2010, playing in three World Cup tournaments and three Olympic Games. She was a member of one World Cup winner (1999) and two Olympic champions (2004 and 2008). She is one of just 13 American female players to appear 200 or more times for her country and started at center back in six consecutive world championship events for the USA. She played in 16 World Cup matches and 16 Olympic matches in her career.

Known as a gritty defender with excellent speed and fitness, and an ability to dominate in the air, she started in 187 of her 201 caps. She was co-captain of the National Team during the latter part of her career. She famously scored her first and only international goal on Sept. 20, 2008, against Ireland, nailing a penalty kick to break her U.S. record scoreless streak of 192 games. She had eight career assists.

In 1999, she solidified her starting spot in the central defense, playing in 21 matches, including five of the 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup games when she was most inexperienced U.S. starter in the lineup. She experienced her WNT breakthrough in 1998, playing in her first 13 games for the full national team and starting both matches as the USA won the 1998 Goodwill Games gold medal. She earned her first cap on April 26, 1998 vs. Argentina and played in her last game on July 17, 2010 vs. Sweden

As a youth player, she represented the USA at the Under-20 level. A four-year starter at Notre Dame, she started all 96 games in her career and was a three-time NSCAA All-American, twice

earning First-Team. She scored seven goals with 24 assists in her four years at Notre Dame and captained the Fighting Irish as a senior. Her play at marking back during her sophomore year was instrumental in the Fighting Irish winning the 1995 NCAA championship and she was the Defensive MVP of the 1995 NCAA Final Four. She was a three-time All-Big East selection and the Big East Defensive Player of the Year as a senior.

At the professional club level, Markgraf played for the Boston Breakers in the WUSA, the first professional league in the USA, for all three years of its existence and then played a few matches for the Chicago Red Stars at the tail end of her career during the startup of the second pro league, the WPS. She also did a brief stint in Sweden with KIF Orebro DFF in 2005. At the youth level, Markgraf was a product of the Michigan Hawks club.

The former Kate Sobrero, she married former Providence College soccer player Chris Markgraf on Oct. 31, 2003 and started using her married name on the back of her jersey in 2004. They have three children, 16-year-old son Keegan, and twins Xavier, a son, and daughter Carson, both age 13. Markgraf came back to the National Team twice after the birth of her children, first after Keegan was born in 2006 and then briefly after twins Xavier and Carson were born in 2009.

In 2005, she was accepted into Northwestern Law School in Chicago and Northeastern Law School in Boston but deferred to continue her soccer career. She earned her degree in Science Business at Notre Dame.

After retiring from professional soccer, Markgraf went into the academic world. She holds two graduate degrees: a Master's in Kinesiology and a Master's in Educational Psychology from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Her research on elite athletes and the influence of "Grit," a psychological metric predictive of success in elite domains, was the first of its kind and was published, with her as the co-author with her advisor, in the top Sport Psychology Academic Journal, the Journal of American Sport Psychology. In addition to her work for ESPN and NBC Sports as a soccer analyst, she served as a counselor charged with the development and management of the Student Employment Program at Cardinal Stritch University, which entailed overseeing more than 200 students and more than 30 supervisors.

In addition, Markgraf has served as a volunteer assistant coach with four Division I college programs, at Marquette, Harvard, Texas and with her alma mater at Notre Dame. She also coached youth soccer in the Milwaukee area for five years.

# Vlatko ANDONOVSKI

HEAD COACH: U.S. Women's National Team BORN: Sept. 14, 1976, in Skopje, North Macedonia HOMETOWN: Kansas City, Missouri

Vlatko Andonovski (Ann-DON-ahv-skee) was named the ninth head coach in U.S. Women's National Team history on October 28, 2019.

Although his first full year as head coach was tremendously impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, Andonovski did win his first 11 games in charge, going 11-0-0 while setting a record for best start for any coach in USWNT history.

He coached his first two games at the end of 2019, defeating Sweden and Costa Rica, and before the sports world shut down, he won two tournaments at the beginning of 2020, leading the USA to titles at the 2020 Concacaf Women's Olympic Qualifying Championship and the 2020 SheBelieves Cup. The USA got in one more match in 2020, an impressive 2-0 victory against the Netherlands in Breda at the end of November.

In 2021, Andonovski led the USA to a 17-2-5 record and a bronze medal at the delayed 2020 Tokyo Olympics. The USA also won the 2021 SheBelieves Cup, sweeping Canada, Brazil and Argentina.

In 2022, Andonovski led the USA to 14-3-1 record and two more tournament titles, at the 2022 SheBelieves Cup and the 2022 Concacaf W Championship, at which the USA defeat Canada in the title game, 1-0, and earned berths to both the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup and the 2024 Paris Olympics.

Through his first three years on the job, Andonovski called up 65 different players to take part in at least one training camp. Of those 65 players, 49 earned at least one cap. Through the end of 2022, Andonovski had given 23 players their first senior team call-ups and 17 players their first caps, seven of those coming in 2022.

Andonovski, 46, came to U.S. Soccer after spending seven years as a head coach in the National Women's Soccer League (NWSL), five with FC Kansas City (2013-2017) and two with Reign FC (2017-2018).

He led FC Kansas City to back-to-back NWSL Championships in 2014 and 2015 and was twice named NWSL Coach of the Year, in 2013 and again after the 2019 season. He led his teams to the NWSL Playoffs in five out of the seven seasons he coached in the league.

During his time in the NWSL Andonovski coached numerous U.S. and foreign international players who have represented their countries on the highest stage. He had an overall record of 21-13-16 with the Reign and a 51-37-27 record at FC Kansas City, giving him an overall record of 72-50-43 in NWSL play. As of the end of the 2019 NWSL season, his total of 165 games coached in the NWSL ranked him first all-time and his 72 wins tied for 2nd all-time. He had a playoff record of 4-3.

Andonovski was born in Skopje, North Macedonia in the former Yugoslavia. As a player, he spent six years playing professionally in Europe as a center back with Macedonian clubs FK Rabotnički, Makedonija GP and FK Vardar, before coming to the United States to play professional indoor soccer. He played in European competition for Makedonija GP in the UEFA Intertoto Cup, which served as qualifying what is now known as the UEFA Europa League. He also played with the Macedonia Under-18 National Team.

# HEAD COACH VLATKO ANDONOVSKI

Andonovski signed with the Wichita Wings of the National Professional Soccer League in 2000 and later played for the Kansas City Comets, California Cougars and Philadelphia Kixx of the Major Indoor Soccer League. With the Comets, he was named Defender of the Year in 2002 and the team's MVP in 2005. He was a two-time MISL All-Star.

In addition to his work with FC Kansas City, Andonovski also served as the head coach for the professional indoor Kansas City Comets from 2013-2016, winning the MISL title in 2014-2015 season, and compiled a 58-15 record in the MISL and later the Major Arena Soccer League. He was also an assistant coach with the Comets for the three seasons prior to becoming head coach.

During his time in Kansas City, he also worked in youth club soccer, winning four Missouri State Championships and a girls' U.S. Youth Soccer National League title with Futura FC. He was also head coach of the girls' Olympic Development Program in Missouri for two years.

In 2018, he completed the U.S. Soccer Pro License Course. Andonovski also holds a USSF "A" License, an NSCAA Goalkeeping License and an NSCAA Premier License.

Andonovski is a 2008 graduate of Park University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in business administration/management and earned a master's degree in coaching education with a soccer track from Ohio University in 2018. He is currently working towards a PhD in Sports Leadership through the University of Concordia-Chicago.

Andonovski resides in Kansas City, Missouri, with his wife Biljana. They have three children, Dragana, Luka and Daria. His oldest daughter, Dragana, played collegiate soccer at Park.

# Milan IVANOVIC

ASSISTANT COACH: U.S. Women's National Team BORN: June 25, 1985, in Belgrade, Serbia HOMETOWN: Belgrade, Serbia

Milan Ivanovic joined U.S. Soccer in November of 2019, coming aboard as an assistant coach when Vlatko Andonovski was hired as the ninth head coach in U.S. WNT history.

Ivanovic was part of the staff that won the bronze medal at the delayed 2020 Tokyo Olympic Games and has helped the USA to a 42-5-6 record in his first three years on the job.

He was also a part of the coaching staff that helped the USA win the 2022 Concacaf W Championship in Mexico to qualify for both the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup and the 2024 Paris Olympics.

Prior to joining the U.S. Women's National Team staff, Ivanovic worked four seasons as an assistant coach under Vlatko Andonovski in the National Women's Soccer League, two for FC Kansas City (2015-2016) and two with Reign FC (2018-2019). He helped FCKC to the NWSL title in 2015.

Ivanovic played six seasons of professional indoor soccer under Andonovski for the Kansas City Comets in the Major Indoor Soccer League (later the Major Arena Soccer League) between 2012-18. He also spent the 2018-2019 season with the Tacoma Stars.

Ivanovic came to the Kansas City in 2005 to attend Park University where he played three seasons and earned a bachelor's degree in International Business. He then began coaching youth soccer in Kansas City working with girls' teams at Futura FC.

In 2009, he returned to Serbia where he played with lower division side Lokomotiva Belgrade. In 2012, he returned to the USA to play with the Kansas City Comets, where Andonovski was an assistant coach. He once again started coaching youth soccer as Futura transitioned to FC Kansas City and two years later joined the professional ranks as an assistant coach in the NWSL with Andonovski.

He grew up playing in the Red Star Belgrade youth system, one of the most renowned player development environments in the world, and then transitioned to playing with Lokomotiva before coming to the United States at age 20 to attend college.

Ivanovic received his USSF Pro License at the end of 2022.

He is married to Jovana and they have two children, Lenka (8) and Vukan (6).

# Twila KILGORE

ASSISTANT COACH: U.S. Women's National Team BORN: Jan. 18, 1980, in Downey, Calif. HOMETOWN: Los Angeles, Calif.

Twila Kilgore was named as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's National Team on head coach Vlatko Andonovski's staff on Feb. 11, 2022.

She was a part of the coaching staff that helped the USA win the 2022 Concacaf W Championship in Mexico to qualify for both the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup and the 2024 Paris Olympics. She also served as head coach for the U.S. Under-23 Women's Youth National Team for two events in 2022.

Kilgore came to U.S. Soccer after two and a half years as an assistant coach with the Houston Dash in the National Women's Soccer League, numerous training camps coaching with the U.S. Youth Women's National Teams and 15 years spent in the college game as a head coach and an assistant coach.

She is just one of four women, and the first American-born woman, to earn U.S. Soccer's Pro Coaching License, which she completed in 2021.

With the Dash, Kilgore helped Houston win the 2020 Challenge Cup to bring the first trophy to the club. Prior to joining the pro ranks, she was the head women's soccer coach at the University of California, Davis from 2014-2019. From 2004-2014, she was the assistant coach (five years) and then associate head coach (five years) at Pepperdine University in Malibu, California. While at Pepperdine she coached players who would go on to play for the senior National Teams of the United States, Italy, Iceland, Mexico, Chinese Taipei and South Africa.

Prior to joining U.S. Soccer full-time, she worked extensively with U.S. Soccer's Women's Youth National Teams. Since 2011, she has also worked for U.S. Soccer at the Southern California and Northern California Training Centers and has worked with the U.S. WYNTs at the U-14, U-15, U-19, U-20 and U-23 levels. In 2019, she was the head coach for the U.S. U-20 WYNT for the La Manga Tournament in Spain.

Kilgore has pursued her coaching education with zeal. In 2023, she will finish up work in the process to earn her UEFA "A" Coaching License and she earned her U.S. Soccer "A" License in 2010. In 2022, she was a FIFA Women's Development Program mentee and a mentee in U.S. Soccer's SheChampions Mentorship Program, Presented by Volkswagen. In 2023, she will be a SheChampions mentor in the program. She also has an NSCAA "Premier" License and an NSCAA State and Regional Goalkeeper Diploma and is an NCAA Women Coaches Academy graduate.

She earned a B.A. in Education at the University of Arizona, where she was a four-year starter, and ended her college career having played more matches than any player in Wildcat team history. She also etched her name into the record books on several top-10 lists, was a two-time honoree on the Pacific-10 Conference All-Academic team and was the team's Rookie of the Year in 1998. After college, she played for the Arizona Heatwave in the W-1 League, and in 2009 she earned a master's degree in coaching and athletic administration from Concordia University.

Kilgore also coached extensively in the Region IV (West) Girls' Olympic Development Program, working with various regional and state teams as a head coach, assistant coach and staff coach from 2003-2015. She also spent one season as a head coach in the USL W-League with the Los Angeles Legends in the summer of 2009.

Formerly Twila Kaufman, she married Jeremiah Kilgore in September of 2021.



# **Tiffany Roberts SAHAYDAK**

ASSISTANT COACH: U.S. Women's National Team BORN: May 5, 1977, in Petaluma, Calif. HOMETOWN: Orlando, Florida

Tiffany Roberts Sahaydak, a member of the historic 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup Team, began work as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's National Team on head coach Vlatko Andonovski's staff in January of 2022.

She was a part of the coaching staff that helped the USA win the 2022 Concacaf W Championship in Mexico to qualify for both the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup and the 2024 Paris Olympics.

An Olympic gold medalist in 1996, a Women's World Cup champion in 1999, a two-time NCAA champion at the University of North Carolina, and a professional league champion for the Carolina Courage in the WUSA, she is currently the head women's soccer coach at the University of Central Florida, a post she has held since May of 2013.

Roberts Sahaydak spent more than a decade in the U.S. National Team player pool from 1994-2004, earning 112 caps with 62 starts while scoring seven goals with nine assists. She was a part of three Women's World Cup Teams – 1995, 1999 and 2003. In 1995 in Sweden, she played in five matches, starting four. In 1999 in the USA, she played in two games, starting one and in 2003 in the USA, she played in two matches, starting one. At the 1996 Olympics, she played in all five matches, starting two, to help the USA to the first gold medal ever awarded for women's soccer.

She debuted for the USA in 1994 when she was just 16 years old and was one of the youngest players ever to suit up for the U.S. Women's National Team. She played in her first FIFA Women's World Cup a month after her 18th birthday and won Olympic gold before she was out of her teens.

Her final match for the USWNT came in 2004, but since then she has remained very involved in U.S. Soccer, serving as an assistant coach for various U.S. Youth Women's National Teams. She has also served as an ambassador for U.S. Soccer with the U.S. Department of State Sports Envoy Program since 2007, promoting the power and benefit of sport internationally. With the program, she has visited Indonesia, Uganda, the Philippines, Thailand, Namibia, Brazil and France. In 2014, she was appointed to President Barack Obama's Presidential Delegation to the Federative Republic of Brazil at the opening of the FIFA World Cup in Brazil.

She is a four-time American Athletic Conference Coach of the Year for the Knights. Under her guidance, UCF have earned five NCAA Tournament bids and four American Athletic Conference championships while boasting 16 conference Player of the Year awards and 61 all-league and tournament selections. In 10 seasons at UCF, she has compiled a record of 108-48-25 at UCF and an overall college coaching record of 161-98-44 including her time at the helm Virginia Commonwealth.

Roberts Sahaydak came to Orlando after serving six seasons at VCU alongside her co-head coach, husband and current UCF associate head coach Tim Sahaydak.

She is a native of San Ramon, Calif., and was selected as the 1994 California High School Player of the Year. She was a three-time Parade High School All-American, a three-time NSCAA All-American and was the two-time National Girls' High School Player of the Year.

As a collegian, Roberts Sahaydak was a standout midfielder for North Carolina (1995-98). She was a threetime AlI-ACC First-Team selection. She led the Tar Heels to two NCAA titles (1996, 1997) and was voted the 1998 ACC Tournament MVP, finishing third in voting for collegiate soccer's highest honor, the Hermann Trophy. She still ranks among the top five for career starts in UNC's record book.

She was a two-time captain for the Carolina Courage in the first fully professional U.S. women's league (Women's United Soccer Association). She helped the Courage win the 2002 title after finishing last in the team's inaugural campaign one year prior.

Roberts Sahaydak took over VCU's program in 2007 and led the Rams to three conference championship game appearances. She was voted as the 2011 Colonial Athletic Association Co-Head Coach of the Year, along with her husband Tim.

Roberts Sahaydak has a USSF "B" Coaching license and is a participant and mentor in the U.S. SheChampions Coaching Mentorship Program. The Sahaydaks reside in Orlando with their two daughters, Layla and Evie.

# Philip POOLE

GOALKEEPER COACH: U.S. Women's National Team BORN: Nov. 5, 1981, in Newcastle, England HOMETOWN: Charlotte, N.C.

Philip Poole joined head coach Vlatko Andonovski's staff in January of 2020 and was the goalkeeper coach for the Concacaf Women's Olympic Qualifying Championship and the SheBelieves Cup, both won by the USA. In September of 2020, he took on the role full-time after leaving his job as the Associate Head Coach for the Wake Forest women's soccer program and was on the staff that won the bronze medal at the delayed 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

Poole was a part of the coaching staff that helped the USA win the 2022 Concacaf W Championship in Mexico to qualify for both the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup and the 2024 Paris Olympics.

Poole has been involved with U.S. Soccer since 2012, working many camps and events as a coach and scout from the U-14 level up to the senior National Team. He was the goalkeeper coach for the U.S. Under-20 Women's World Cup Team in 2014 and from 2017-2019 was the goalkeeper coach for the U.S. U-23 WNT.

Poole has experience working with the Charlotte Independence and Charlotte Eagles (USL Championship) and was also the goalkeeper coach for the Puerto Rico Men's National Team from 2011-12.

Poole also has prior experience in collegiate coaching, spending three years as an assistant coach at UNC Charlotte on the men's side as well as one year at Wingate, his alma mater.

He graduated from Wingate in 2004 with a degree in Parks and Recreation Management. A four-year starter, Poole helped Wingate to a pair of conference titles, served as a two-year team captain, and was named to Wingate's All-Decade Team. He also earned conference Freshman of the Year honors his rookie season.

The Newcastle, England native played as a youth player with Newcastle United before spending three seasons with the Hull City AFC. He came to the USA to attend college in 2000 at the age of 18.

He holds a USSF National "A" license, USSF Talent Identification license, USSF Academy Director license, and is currently undertaking the USSF Pro license.

He and his wife, Melissa, have three daughters, Isabella, Jenna and Alexa.



# Ellie MAYBURY

HEAD OF PERFORMANCE: U.S. Women's National Team BORN: Oct. 17, 1985, in Lichfield, England HOMETOWN: Lichfield, England

In September of 2020, Ellie Maybury became the full-time Head of Performance for the U.S.
 Women's National Team. Maybury had been overseeing the USWNT's fitness since the latter part
 of 2019.

In 2022, she was a part of the staff that helped the USA win the 2022 Concacaf W Championship in Mexico to qualify for both the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup and the 2024 Paris Olympics.

Maybury is responsible for creating and executing the team's overall day-to-day sport science and performance plan which includes the athletic development of players, optimal preparation of players for competition, monitoring of players' training/match loads, maintaining optimal recoveries for post-training/competition, injury prevention strategies, nutritional strategies and prescription of strength and conditioning training programs.

Maybury joined U.S. Soccer full time in January of 2016 as the lead sport scientist for all of the Women's Youth National Teams, overseeing the sports science and physiological aspects of the USA's eight youth teams with specific emphasis on the U-17 and U-20 WYNTs during their World Cup cycles.

Maybury began her career in 2007 working with the youth female players at Birmingham Centre of Excellence, providing fitness and conditioning programs to the youth squads at the U-10, U-13, U-14 and U-16 levels.

She also traveled with the Great Britain women's team as the sports scientist to the World University Games in China in the summer of 2011.

She has a BSc (Hons) in Sport Science and Materials Technology from the University of Birmingham, and an MSc in Exercise Physiology from Loughborough University. She is currently working on developing her research portfolio in order to enhance her applied skills of working with female youth players at the elite level.

She is a certified paramedic in England and worked as a paramedic for two years in the West Midlands.

For about a year, she worked in the Netherlands at the Nike European Headquarters as a Football Apparel Materials Technician, helping develop game day club and national team uniform development.



# WORLD CUP HISTORY

## USA IN THE FIFA WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

The U.S. Women's National Team kicks off the Women's World Cup year widely regarded as the most successful women's soccer team in history, with four FIFA Women's World Cup titles, one second-place finish and three third-place finishes.

In its previous eight Women's World Cup competitions, the U.S. is 40-4-6 in 50 total games and is the only nation to finish in the top three in each Women's World Cup (as well as the first four Olympics to feature women's soccer).

The USA qualified for the upcoming 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup in Australia and New Zealand by winning the 2022 Concacaf W Championship. The tournament, which was held from July 4-18 in Monterrey, Mexico, served -- for the first time -- as the region's qualifying tournament for both the 2023 World Cup and the 2024 Olympics. The USWNT punched its ticket to the World Cup by advancing to the semifinal round and defeated Canada, 1-0, in the championship game to secure its spot in the upcoming Paris Olympics.

The USA's 2-0 victory against the Netherlands on Sunday, July 7, 2019, at Stade de Lyon marked the USA's record fifth appearance in a FIFA Women's World Cup Final and added a fourth star to the USA's jersey. The USA earned its way into the 2019 Final by blazing through its group in record fashion beating Thailand (13-0), Chile (3-0) and semifinalists Sweden (2-0) before combining tremendous skill, savvy and will to meet increasingly tough challenges from rising power Spain (2-1) in the Round of 16, World Cup host France (2-1) in the Quarterfinal and No. 3 ranked England (2-1) in an epic Semifinal showdown. Goals from Megan Rapinoe – the tournament's Golden Ball winner and Golden Boot winner and best player as top scorer – and Rose Lavelle, the Bronze Ball winner, propelled the USA to victory in the championship game.

The USWNT booked its spot at the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup by rolling past Jamaica 6-0 in the semifinal of the 2018 Concacaf Women's Championship before winning its sixth Concacaf Women's Championship title when it blanked Canada 2-0 in the tournament final. The USA cruised through group play outscoring Mexico (6-0), Panama (5-0) and Trinidad & Tobago (7-0) by a combined 18-0.

In 2015, after a tough group stage saw the U.S. tie former coach Pia Sundhage and Sweden before prevailing in a nail-biter against Nigeria, the WNT turned on the jets, storming to the 2015 FIFA World Cup title. Powered by captain Carli Lloyd's six knockout round goals, including three in the thrilling title rematch with Japan, the USA dashed past up-and-coming Colombia 2-0 before beating old foe China in the quarterfinal. A showdown with Germany loomed in the semifinal, but a penalty kick miss by Germany and subsequent make by Lloyd set the U.S. on the path to the final, and substitute Kelley O'Hara's late goal, courtesy of a Lloyd assist, cemented the WNT's passage.

The epic final of the 2015 World Cup featured a record-making performance from Lloyd that catapulted her to her first FIFA Women's World Player of the Year award. With a hat trick that featured a goal from inside her own half, Lloyd put the game away by the half hour mark as Lauren Holiday and Tobin Heath also notched goals in the 5-2 win vs. Japan that saw the USA become the first nation to win three World Cups.

The USA hit some bumps in the road on the way to the 2011 FIFA Women's World Cup, falling in the semifinal of the Concacaf Women's World Cup Qualifying Tournament at the end of 2010 before defeating Italy in a two-game playoff to earn the final berth to Germany. The Americans also lost two games during its World Cup preparation, but still headed into the tournament as one of the favorites. What transpired in Germany will forever be remembered as a breakthrough event for women's soccer as the U.S. team's dramatic run to the World Cup Final inspired a nation.

The USA opened the 2011 tournament with a hard-fought 2-0 win against Korea DPR in Dresden on second-half goals from Lauren Cheney and improbably, defender Rachel Buehler. That set the stage for a 3-0 demolition of Colombia that featured the entire team saluting the crowd after the opening goal by Heather O'Reilly in recognition of the large group of U.S. military and their families that helped sellout the stadium in Sinsheim. The USA fell 2-1 to Sweden in its final group match in Wolfsburg, which sent them into a quarterfinal against Brazil back in

Dresden. The drama and controversy-filled game featured the latest goal in Women's World Cup history: Abby Wambach's legendary header that sent the U.S. to a penalty kick shootout where it prevailed to reach the semifinal.

In the semifinal in Mönchengladbach, the USA ran into an extremely talented France team that dominated the match for stretches, but as the Americans often do at the highest levels, they found a way to win on a first half goal from Cheney, another Wambach header and a late clincher from Alex Morgan. The USA was by far the stronger team in the World Cup Final in Frankfurt, but let two leads slip away and fell in a penalty kick shootout to Japan.

Abby Wambach scored in the final four games – the first U.S. player to achieve such a feat in a World Cup tournament – and took over the U.S. career lead in Women's World Cup goals from Michelle Akers with her 13th in the championship game. Wambach and Morgan became the first U.S. players to score in the semifinal and final of a World Cup.

In 2007, the USA was riding a long unbeaten streak and held the world's top ranking heading into the FIFA Women's World Cup in China where they won perhaps the most difficult first-round group in the history of the tournament. In Group B, the USA drew with Korea DPR 2-2 in the opening match, and then got two goals from Abby Wambach in a must-win 2-0 victory over Sweden. With advancement to the quarterfinals still up in the air, the USA won the group with a hard-fought 1-0 victory over a vastly improved Nigeria. The American women then met up-and-coming England in the quarterfinal, and after an evenly played first 20 minutes, put together its best performance of the tournament, winning 3-0 and earning a place in the semifinals against Brazil. The semifinal marked a low point in U.S. history as the team suffered some heart-wrenching misfortune while scoring an own goal and seeing Shannon Boxx harshly sent off at the end of the first half. That combination of factors led to a 4-0 loss, the worst in U.S. history, and a spot in the third-place match. The USA rebounded wonderfully to win the bronze medal, rolling over Norway with a 4-1 score to end the tournament on a high note.

Considered the top team in the world heading into the FIFA Women's World Cup USA 2003, the defending champion U.S. was assured the title of tournament favorite after the competition was moved from China to the U.S. due to the outbreak of SARS. After rolling through group play with a 3-0 record and an 11-1 advantage in goal differential, the U.S. squeezed past rival Norway by a 1-0 margin in the quarterfinals. Then in Portland, Ore. – the only city in history to host a World Cup match in consecutive competitions – the U.S. was shocked by Germany, who scored two injury time goals in a 3-0 victory en route to winning it all and being crowned world champion. The U.S. was relegated to the third-place game. There, the Red, White and Blue made quick work of northern neighbor Canada 3-1, the same team that forced the U.S. to sudden death overtime in the Concacaf Women's Gold Cup final less than a year earlier.

The United States Women's National Team added to its prestige by becoming the first squad to host and win a Women's World Cup, when it downed China PR 5-4 in penalty kicks after battling to a 0-0 draw through regulation and overtime in the 1999 final. The match was played in front of a women's athletics record crowd of 90,185 on June 10, 1999 at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. The winning penalty kick goal for the U.S. has become a pop culture moment in American history, with Brandi Chastain connecting on the shot and then celebrating the goal with a nation. The championship marked the USA's third major championship of the decade, including the 1991 Women's World Cup crown and the 1996 Olympic title.

The biggest disappointment for the U.S. Women in the 1990s came at the 1995 Women's World Cup in Sweden, when the team fell to arch-rival Norway in the tournament semifinals, 1-0. The defeat was the first ever for the USA in WWC play and helped Norway into the final where they downed Germany to take the crown.

In 1991, the U.S. won the inaugural FIFA Women's World Cup in China. The championship was the first for the USA in a FIFA competition and established the dominance that the U.S. women have continued to display at the international level. The United States was led by Michelle Akers, Carin Jennings and April Heinrichs, dubbed "the triple-edged sword." The trio combined to score 20 of the team's 25 goals in China, including all five (Jennings 3, Heinrichs 2) in a 5-2 semifinal victory over Germany and both goals (Akers) in a 2-0 win over Norway to win the title.

WOMEN'S WORLD CUP NOTES: The USA became the first country to win four FIFA Women's World Cup titles.

This is the third World Cup in which the USWNT has never trailed throughout the tournament, a feat also achieved in 1991 and 2015.

The U.S. is unbeaten in its last 17 Women's World Cup matches (14W-3D), winning the last 12 in a row. They are the only team to win 12 consecutive WWC matches, besting Norway's run from 95 to 99. Seven of the USA's 12 wins have been by multiple-goal margins. After the win vs. the Netherlands, the USWNT is Anter the win vs. the Neutenrands, the OSWNT is now 40-4-6 all-time in World Cup play, outsoring opponents 138-38 in 50 games. The 40 wins, 50 games-played and 138 goals scored are all FIFA Women's World Cup records.

The USA is 7-1-0 all-time against the Netherlands.

Megan Rapinoe is only the second player to start three Women's World Cup finals (2011, 2015, 2019), after Germany's Birgit Prinz (1995, 2003, 2007).

Megan Rapinoe won the Golden Ball as the best player in the tournament and the Golden Boot as the Dest player is the tournament and the Golden Boot as the top scorer. Alex Morgan won the Silver Boot as the second-leading scorer and Rose Lavelle won the Bronze Ball as the third-best player.

The USWNT had nine different goal scorers at this tournament. Only the 2003 German team (10) and the 1999 American team (10) have had more at a single WWC.

The USA was only the third defending champion to The OSA was only the third detending charlipton to reach the World Cup Final in the following tournament after winning the title – Germany did so in 2003 and 2007, while Japan accomplished the feat in 2011 and 2015.

The USA was the first team to reach three consecutive World Cup Finals and was only the second nation to repeat as champions after Germany did so in 2003 and 2007. The USA has reached a record five World Cup finals, winning four. The second most accomplished team, Germany, has been to three finals, winning two. The USA scored in the first 12 minutes of each of its first six World Cup matches. Only in the World Cup Final did it fail to find the net early.

At the World Cup, the USA set a record for most goals in tournament history with 26, breaking its own record of 25, set in 1991 in six games.

The USA also set records for most goals in a single Women's World Cup match and largest margin of victory when it beat Thailand 13-0 in its Group F opener, a game that featured 10 second-half goals, also a record.

Alex Morgan tied the record for most goals in a single match when she scored five against Thailand, matching the feat of Michelle Akers against Chinese Taipei at the 1991 Women's World Cup in China.

Jill Ellis became the first coach to win two Women's World Cup titles. Italy's Vittorio Pozzo, who won the Men's World Cup in 1934 and 1938, is the only other coach to win two World Cup titles.

Rose Lavelle (24 years, 54 days) became the second-youngest American to score in a World Cup Final, trailing only Alex Morgan (22 years, 15 days) in 2011.

The USA was ahead in its World Cup games for 70.2 percent of the time. The Americans never trailed in their seven games and led for 442 of 630 total minutes.

Rapinoe's goal against the Netherlands made her the oldest player, at 34 years and two days, to score in a Women's World Cup Final. She broke teammate Carli Lloyd's record set in 2015. Lloyd was 32 years, 354 days old when she scored three times against Japan.

By scoring in the final four World Cup matches in 2015, and the first two World Cup matches in 2019, Carli Lloyd set a record for scoring in the most consecutive World Cup games.

WOMEN'S WORLD CUP NOTES: The USA became the first country to win three FIFA Women's World Cup titles.

Hope Solo, Julie Johnston, Meghan Klingenberg, Carli Lloyd and Megan Rapinoe were named to the FIFA Women's World Cup All-Star Team.

Carli Lloyd is the first woman in FIFA WWC to score a hat trick in a Final match and scored the fastest hat trick in Women's World Cup history.

Llovd also became the third U.S. woman to score a hat trick in WWC play: Carin Jennings Gabarra netted three goals against Germany in 1991 and Michelle Akers scored five against Chinese Taipei that same year.

Lloyd also became the first USWNT player to score in four straight games in a World Cup. She netted a goal against China, Colombia and Germany and three against Japan. Lloyd's goal in the third minute was the fastest goal in a WWC Final game.

With her three goals against Japan, Lloyd became the first American to score in three major-tournament finals: 2012 Olympic gold medal game (2-1 win over Japan) and 2008 gold-medal match (1-0 over Brazil).

Midfielders Lauren Holiday and Tobin Heath each scored their first goals of the tournament in the final. It was Heath's first goal in a Women's World Cup.

The USA's five goals were the most any team has scored in a WWC Final. No other team has scored more than two.

The USA's two goals in the first five minutes of the match against Japan was first time any team scored twice in that span in a WWC game.

The USWNT finished this year's tournament with a 33-4-6 all-time record in Women's World Cup play, outscoring its opponents 112-35 in 43 games. The 33 wins, 112 goals scored and the 43 games played are FIFA Women's World Cup records.

Abby Wambach won the Silver Ball as the second best player in the tournament and the Bronze Boot as the third leading scorer. Hope Solo won the Golden Glove as the best goalkeeper and the Bronze Ball as the third best player.

By advancing to the championship game the USA kept intact its record of finishing in the top-three of all six Women's World Cup tournaments that have been contested.

*Of the 21 players on the roster, 18 saw action. For 11 of those players, it was their first minutes in Women's World Cup play.* 

The USA's loss to Sweden was its first-ever in Women's World Cup group play.

The USA was the highest scoring team in the tournament with 13 total goals.

Abby Wambach scored four goals, all with her head, one each in the last four games, becoming the first U.S. player to accomplish that feat.

Her four goals upped her World Cup total to 13, moving her past the great Michelle Akers on the all-time U.S. World Cup scoring list.

Wambach and Alex Morgan became the first U.S. players to score in both a Women's World Cup semifinal and final.

With a draw and two wins in first-round play, the USA won what was widely considered one of the most difficult opening round groups in Women's World Cup history.

By defeating Norway 4-1 in the third-place match, the USA finished in the top ➡ three in all five Women's World Cup tournaments that have been contested, the only country to do so.

Abby Wambach scored six goals in the tournament, winning the Silver Shoe as the second-best scorer in the tournament. Her six goals gave her nine WWC goals for her career, second on the all-time U.S. list behind only Michelle • Akers (12).

Of the 21 players on the U.S. roster, 10 saw action in their first Women's World Cup.

Heather O'Reilly became the 11th U.S. player to score multiple goals in her first Women's World Cup. Four of those players did so in 1991, when it was every player's first WWC.



## FIFA WOMEN'S WORLD CUP USA 2003 REVIEW

Originally scheduled for China from Sept. 23 to Oct. 11, the FIFA Women's World Cup 2003 was moved out of the country by FIFA on May 3 because of the threat of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome. In awarding the games

to the United States on May 26, FIFA chose the United States over Sweden, the only other country besides the USA to make a formal bid to host the tournament.

While women's soccer has no doubt become more and more competitive, the group stage of USA 2003 went almost exactly according to script. Seven of the eight quarterfinalists from 1999 advanced. Only Nigeria, who were the only side not to score a goal in the tournament, did not make it through, stepping aside for Canada's advancement. Of the seeded teams, only Norway failed to win their group, bowing to the strong early play of Brazil. The U.S. Women's National Team lived up to its high expectations in opening the tournament with three authoritative wins in the tournament's most difficult group (downing Sweden, Nigeria and upstart Korea DPR). Sweden lost their first match but recovered to eventually fight their way into the finals.

In the knockout stage, Canada provided the tournament's biggest surprise with a well-earned 1-0 victory against China PR, sending the '99 finalist home early. The U.S., Germany and Sweden, who knocked off first-round darlings Brazil 2-1, also advanced to the final four. In the semifinals, the Swedes finally ended Canada's dreams with a dramatic come-from-behind 2-1 victory. In the other semifinal, Germany stunned the hosts, knocking the U.S. into the third-place match with two injury time goals en route to a 3-0 victory at PGE Park in Portland.

The U.S.-Germany match was widely hailed as one of the greatest in women's soccer history, surpassed in 2003 only by Germany's thrilling 2-1 sudden death victory over Sweden. That triumph saw Nia Kuenzer head home in the eighth minute of extra time to send The Home Depot Center into a frenzy of German joy and Swedish tears.

The U.S. closed out an ultimately disappointing tournament with an emphatic 3-1 victory over border-rival Canada in the third-place game. The match was never in doubt, with the U.S. seeing goals from Kristine Lilly, Shannon Boxx and Tiffeny Milbrett keep their perfect top three record in Women's World Cup play intact.

## FIFA WOMEN'S WORLD CUP USA 1999 REVIEW

The final Women's World Cup of the century launched the beginning a new era of success for women's soccer. For the first time, the tournament was expanded to 16 teams and was staged in huge stadiums across the host country, raising expectations for attendance, media coverage and television audiences; expectations which were reached, surpassed and then crushed.

The U.S. captured its second Women's World Cup Championship while thrilling a nation and becoming the story of the year. The team played in front of packed houses across the country, beginning with a crowd of 78,000-plus at Giants Stadium cheering the team to a 3-0 tournament opening victory over Denmark. The victory set a tone for the entire tournament. After fighting their way into the final with five victories, which included a come-from-behind 3-2 victory over Germany in the quarterfinals and a nailbiting 2-0 victory over Brazil in the semifinals, the U.S. battled China PR for a grueling

120 minutes before pulling out a breathtaking 5-4 penalty kick victory in the finals in front of a sell-out crowd of 90,125 fans at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena on July 10.

After a scoreless 90 minutes of regulation, China PR appeared to get the winner in the first 15-minutes of suddendeath overtime, but midfielder Kristine Lilly jumped high to head a shot clear of the goal. That save would lead to goalkeeper Briana Scurry and defender Brandi Chastain becoming heroes during the penalty kick tiebreaker. Scurry leaped off her line to save China PR's third shot, allowing Chastain to slam home the game-winning penalty kick goal. With the championship, the U.S. became the first nation to win the Women's World Cup on its home soil.

# **PROGRAMS**

## U.S. SOCCER INVESTMENT IN WOMEN'S YOUTH NATIONAL TEAMS PROGRAMS

U.S. Soccer has for many years been a world leader in its support of women's soccer, especially in the massive amount of resources and programming dedicated to its Women's Youth National Teams. U.S. Soccer has made an unprecedented commitment to developing world-class players and coaches with long-term success the main goal.

In 2015, U.S. Soccer adjusted its Youth National Team structure with a focus on three core areas: 1) assessment, monitoring and identification, 2) training and development, and 3) competition. These areas serve as the foundation on which programming is built for all of U.S. Soccer's Youth National Teams.

When new WYNT programming was added in 2015 at the Under-19 and Under-16 levels, it gave U.S. Soccer Women's Youth National Teams at the U-14, U-15, U-16, U-17, U-18, U-19 (although the U-18s & U-19s are combined now), U-20 and U-23 age groups, which mirrors the structure on the men's side.

At that time, U.S. Soccer had two tracks for players: one for players born in even years and the other for odd years, with the players moving through the age groups while spending two years with each team. In 2022, the structure was changed and now the age groups are conducted on a season-to-season schedule running from Aug. 1-July 31 to parallel the youth club season and come in line with how much of the rest of the world conducts its age groups. The FIFA U-17 and U-20 Women's World Cup cycles and Concacaf World Cup qualifying still run-on two-year cycles, but in each age group, and as the players move up through the WYNT programming, the players will have a different coach each year.

The U-14 Talent ID camps are conducted by a combination of Talent ID Managers and YNT coaches. In any given year, Katie Schoepfer is the head coach for the U-15s, Patchy Toledo is the head coach for the U-16s, Natalia Astrain is head coach of the U-17s and Tracey Kevins is head coach of the U-20s, while also overseeing the combined U-18s and U-19s, although a coach may be hired for this age group in 2023. When the U-20s enter a FIFA World Cup year, this pool is likely the best players three birth years (U-20s, U-19s and U-18s).

This structure provides a consistent development approach and increased opportunities for more players to participate. U.S. Soccer will continue to positively impact the development of players and coaches by implementing specific requirements based on best practices and environments for them to excel. U.S. Soccer will also provide increased education for coaching and guidance for its elite-level players.

## U.S. WOMEN'S YOUTH NATIONAL TEAM PLAYER IDENTIFICATION FRAMEWORK GROWS

Beginning in 2011, U.S. Soccer appointed a Technical Director and Development Director for the U.S. Women's National Teams, marking the first time U.S. Soccer had appointed full-time positions to oversee the Women's Youth National Team Program and overall development. Since that time, the USA's youth development set-up for women and girls has continued to grow and evolve. Now, U.S. Women's National Team General Manager Kate Markgraf oversees all the Women's Youth National Teams and the technical development now falls under Director of Technical Development Barry Pauwels, who oversees both the men and women.

In 2013, U.S. Soccer began adding full-time head coaches for its two Women's Youth National Teams that compete in Concacaf and FIFA tournaments. This marked the first time the head coaches of the U-17 and

#### PLAYER DEVELOPMENT & IDENTIFICATION

U-20 age groups were full-time positions. The addition of full-time Women's YNT head coaches continued in 2015 when U.S. Soccer brought in coaches to oversee the remaining levels of the Women's YNT program (U-18 and U-19). In 2023, U.S. Soccer has full-time positions for WYNT head coaches at the U-15, U-16, U-17 and U-20 levels.

These coaches, along with the four full-time Talent Identification Managers, one for each region -- East: Diane Drake, North: Lindsay Basalyga, South: Katie Cole, West: Marieke Laurens -- combined with other recent scouting initiatives, including U.S. Soccer Talent Identification Centers, have improved the process of identifying the top young female players in the United States to attend Youth National Team camps.

In November of 2017, U.S. Soccer also hired Mirelle van Rijbroek as the Director of Talent Identification to oversee the Talent ID Managers. Previously, U.S. Soccer hired Ellie Maybury in 2016 as the sports scientist for all its Girls' and Women's Youth National Teams, marking another positive step in player development from a physical standpoint. Maybury moved on to be Head of Performance for the USWNT and more sports science hires for the USA's Girls' and Women's Youth National Teams have since been added.

These full-time coaches and Talent ID staff will work together to integrate all of the Women's Youth National Teams, helping players and systems connect from one team to the next. They will play major roles in connecting the philosophies and style of play principles of U.S. Soccer through all the Women's Youth National Teams as well as relating those philosophies to the massive amount of girls' youth clubs in the United States.

## **U-14 TALENT ID PROGRAM**

Over the years, the play of the United States Youth National Teams has confirmed its status as the top nation for women's and girls' youth soccer in Concacaf, as well as one of the best in the world. The work done with the U.S. Under-14 Talent ID program, which has been in existence in one form or other since 1999, is a major reason for the increasing quantity and quality of young players vying for spots on the numerous U.S. Women's National Teams.

In 1999, U.S. Soccer started what was then called the U.S. Under-14 National Development Program, knowing that to continue to compete with the elite countries on the international level, the U.S. would have to build a base of players from the youth level up. The U-14 program has evolved in its structure but still serves the purpose of introducing the USA's top young players to a level of soccer they would not otherwise experience at this point in their careers.

The U-14 Talent ID Program is designed to discover and introduce a larger base of top talents at the U-14 age group into the scouting funnel of the older U-15 to U-20 WYNTs. The mini-camp format helps to evaluate and inspire high-potential players while accelerating their development in an engaging and challenging environment.

In addition to expanding the YNT player pool at its early stages, the scouting and identification structure gives U-14 players more opportunities to absorb core principles of the YNT philosophy to further their development. Travel is minimized through the regional mini-camp set-up, helping minimize days away from home, school and club. The program also bolsters U.S. Soccer's national network of scouts, advancing their education and development while also building the Federation's connections with clubs across the country.

In winter 2018, a new YNT U-14 Talent Identification Program was launched for top male players across the country. A similar program was implemented for female players in early 2020. Players are identified and monitored for the U.S. Youth National Teams through scores of YNT ID Centers that are staged across the country throughout the year and through the many youth soccer development programs across the USA.

The structure consists of three U-14 Talent ID Regional Mini Camps in West (February 2023), Central (March 2023) and East (April 2023) and will total 240 players. This will lead to a U-14 Talent ID National Camp in June with 60 players and the next step is progressing to the U-15 WYNT.

The U-14 girls' program has helped to produce numerous players who have made an impact on the older levels of the Women's National Team. Women's World Cup champion Heather O'Reilly and Lindsay Tarpley, both 2002 U-19 Women's World Cup Champions and Olympic gold medalists, attended U-14 National Team camps at the beginning of their careers. Other well-known names in the WNT program that began their careers as U-14s include Lori Chalupny, Leslie Osborne and Tobin Heath, as well as 2012 U-20 Women's World Cup champions Julie Johnston, Crystal Dunn, Cari Roccaro, Abby Smith, Maya Hayes, Sarah Killion, Bryane Heaberlin, Morgan Brian, Mollie Pathman, Samantha Mewis and Vanessa DiBernardo. In addition, 2016 Olympian, 2019 Women's World Cup champion and two-time U-20 Women's World Cup Team member Mallory Pugh also started her WNT career at the U-14 level, as did 2015 and 2019 World Cup champions Ashlyn Harris. Three of the top young players in the NWSL, midfielders Jaedyn Shaw and Olivia Moultrie, and forward Alyssa Thompson, were also a part of U-14 programming.

## **U.S. SOCCER YOUTH NATIONAL TEAM ID CENTERS**

YNT Identification Centers are no-cost identification opportunities for U.S. Soccer Talent Identification Managers to evaluate and monitor top youth soccer talents. U.S. Soccer, in conjunction with local clubs, endeavors to host approximately 100 training sessions each year in 25 key markets throughout the country. Talent Identification Managers assess the top players from different clubs and markets in different combinations, cross-referencing talent across the nation. Each YNT ID Center is conducted with a particular focus to ensure Talent ID staff sees the widest variety of players in different contexts. Over 5,000 boys and girls aged 13-16 attended U.S. Soccer YNT Identification Centers in 2018-19 before the pandemic hit and U.S. Soccer is hoping to reach those levels once again.

#### **Purpose**

- U.S. Soccer Talent Identification Centers are free, single-day identification opportunities for players with the most potential to train under the direction of U.S. Soccer Talent Identification Managers
- U.S. Soccer Talent Identification Managers run Talent Identification Centers nationwide to identify, monitor and compare the top youth soccer talents for potential Youth National Team recognition

#### **Player Pool**

- Gender: Boys and Girls
- Ages: 13-16-years-old
- Each U.S. Soccer YNT Identification Center will feature a specific gender and age group
- Elite players from any team, club or organization are eligible to attend at no cost to the player upon invitation

#### **Facilities**

## Mirelle van RIJBROEK

U.S. Soccer Director of Talent Identification - Girls' Born: March 19, 1972, in Uden, Netherlands Hometown: Chicago, III.



Mirelle van Rijbroek joined U.S. Soccer in the fall of 2017 after working as the Head of Talent Development and Elite Performance with the Royal Netherlands Football Association.

As Director of Talent Identification with U.S. Soccer, van Rijbroek oversees talent identification through the entire Girls' Scouting Network which includes 90 network scouts, U.S. Soccer's Girls' Talent Identification Managers and Youth National Team coaches across the country. Van Rijbroek is responsible for talent identification and creating a tailored talent development program for individual players, conducting and implementing research related to the development of young players, and overseeing the development of all aspects of young athletes' performance.

Together with colleagues Tony Lepore, the Director of Talent ID for boys, and Barry Pauwels, the U.S. Soccer Technical Development Director, she developed the USSF Talent Scout License course, for which she is an instructor. She also teaches the Talent ID modules for the Academy Director Course and USSF "A" license course.

In her role with the KNVB, van Rijbroek was responsible for talent identification and the Youth National Teams, creating a tailored talent development program for individual players, conducting and implementing research related to the development of young players and overseeing the development of all aspects of young athletes' performance.

During her time with the KNVB, she also worked with Girls' Youth National Teams and eventually took the reins of the U-19 Women's National Team, guiding the Netherlands to the UEFA title in 2014 – its first at that age level. Additionally, van Rijbroek served as a KNVB Coaching Instructor and Youth Course Lecturer as well as developed instructional materials for coaching education.

As a trainer and coach, van Rijbroek has worked at the grassroots level with children (boys and girls) as young as five-and-six-years-old up to young adults at the U-19 level. She was also an assistant coach for the Willem II Women's team during their inaugural seasons from 2007-09, which happened to be their most successful in the Eredivisie Vrouwen, the Netherlands top-flight women's professional league. Simultaneously, she also served as an assistant coach to the club's U-17 Men's team.

Van Rijbroek holds her UEFA "A" Youth license and has also earned academic degrees in multiple disciplines including: Communication and International Business Management, Strategic Human Resources Management, and Psychology. She was also involved in the UEFA Women in Football Leadership Program.

## **U.S. SOCCER TALENT ID MANAGERS**

U.S. Soccer Talent ID Managers work closely with clubs in their respective geographic areas, building a close connection with U.S. Soccer and the National Teams. Talent ID Managers are at the forefront of player identification programs, including U.S. Soccer Youth National Team ID Centers, which are held nationwide throughout the year.

The group has decades of experience at the youth, professional and international level and holds a major responsibility in assisting with the continued growth of youth soccer in the United States through both coaching and scouting.



## LINDSAY BASALYGA

#### Talent ID Manager Region: North

The former Director of Coaching at Kings Hammer Academy North in Cincinnati, Ohio, Lindsay Basalyga joined U.S. Soccer as a Talent ID Manager in 2022 in charge of the North region. Basalyga has spent the last six years in the youth soccer landscape, serving as a coach and director of coaching at various clubs in Cincinnati while also serving as a Grassroots Coaching Educator. From 2013-2016, she was the head women's soccer coach at Bowling Green State University after serving eight seasons as head coach at Eastern Kentucky University. Prior to starting the EKU program, she spent just over three years as an assistant at the University of Toledo. A native of Cincinnati, Basalyga played collegiately at the University of Maryland, helping the Terrapins advance to the NCAA College Cup in each of her four seasons. During her senior campaign, she set the school records for most goals (four) and points (nine) in an NCAA Tournament.



## **KATIE COLE**

#### Talent ID Manager Region: South

With a track record of identifying talent as well as developing and enhancing programs to improve player development and aiding high school-aged athletes through the college recruiting process, Cole fits superbly into the Talent ID Manager role. A decorated four-year starter at the University of Texas at Austin and a two-time HEB Sports Hall of Fame inductee, she began her coaching career as an assistant at the University of Louisville in 1998. After founding and operating a club in 2004 and serving as the Director of Coaching, Cole has coached and worked with players in a multitude of platforms across the youth soccer landscape. She was a part of the Arizona ODP program beginning in 2005 and became an ODP Director in 2013. Additionally, Cole was a Region IV ODP age group coach and a part of the Arizona U.S. Soccer Training Center.

## **DIANE DRAKE**

#### Talent ID Manager Region: East

Drake has logged more than 20 years as a college coach in the Atlantic region and holds U.S. Soccer "A" and Talent Scout licenses as well as a NSCAA Premiere Diploma. After a five-year tenure at Georgetown University where she left as the winningest coach in team history, Drake spent 11 years leading the women's soccer program at George Mason University. She was an integral part of the technical staff of the McLean Youth Soccer Association. As the founder of Drake Soccer Camps, she created programs that integrate topics including: nutrition, injury prevention and regeneration, leadership and cognitive soccer areas. She has served on the NSCAA board of directors, chaired the NSCAA Mid Atlantic Rankings Committee and been on the NCAA RAC as well as the event management team for the NCAA College Cup. Drake had an extensive playing career, winning NCAA Woman of the Year as captain with the University of Dayton, as well as MVP of the former Midwestern Collegiate Conference. She was an NSCAA Regional All-American in 1993. Later she would play for the Raleigh Wings in the USISL and win a national championship in 1998.



## **MARIEKE LAURENS**

#### Talent ID Manager Region: West

Laurens holds a UEFA "A" license as well as U.S. Soccer "A" and Talent Scout license and has more than 18 years of professional experience at the club, high school, university and international levels. A native of the Netherlands, she worked closely with the Dutch Women's National Teams and was an assistant coach for the KNVB U-15 Girls' National Team. Additionally, she coached U-14 through U-19 National Team players at the Centre for Elite Sports and Education in Amsterdam. She served as a KNVB Academy Coach Educator, teaching the licenses for candidates who coach players from the U-5 to the U-19 age groups. In addition, Laurens contributed to the growth and success at Dutch Total Soccer through player identification, player development and coach education. She has also been the head coach of ODP Region I teams and a member of the Super-Y League National Scouting Staff.



## **Tracey KEVINS**

HEAD COACH: U.S. Under-20 Women's Youth National Team BORN: September 23, 1974, in London, England HOMETOWN: London, England

Tracey Kevins was named head coach of the U.S. Under-20 Women's Youth National Team on Oct. 18, 2021, after serving as the U.S. Under-17 Women's Youth National Team head coach for one cycle, a cycle in which both the Concacaf qualifying tournament and the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup were cancelled due to the global pandemic.

The first programing for Kevins as U-20 WYNT head coach came at the 2022 Concacaf Women's U-20 Championship in the Dominican Republic, where she helped lead the USA to a berth at the 2022 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup and to the regional title. The USA went 7-0-0 in the DR while scoring 49 goals and allowing zero. She then led the USA to World Cup in Costa Rica with many of the players she had coached with the U-17s, but the young Americans did not advance out of group play. Overall, the U-20s had a 12-2-1 record in 2022 and went unbeaten during the year until the second game of the World Cup. Two players from Kevins' World Cup team, forwards Alyssa Thompson and Michelle Cooper, went #1 and #2 respectively in the 2023 NWSL Draft.

Kevins joined U.S. Soccer full-time in June of 2017 as the head coach for the U.S. Under-15 Girls' National Team and transitioned to the head coach of the U-17 WYNT in 2019 with the task of qualifying the team for the 2020 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup.

The U-17s played just two matches in 2020 before the COVID-19 pandemic hit, forcing the cancelation of the World Cup qualifying tournament, all of team's programming, and eventually the World Cup tournament itself. Kevins will now focus on coaching many of the players who were a part of her U-17 group in a quest to qualify for the 2022 FIFA Under-20 Women's World Cup in Costa Rica.

Kevins came to U.S. Soccer from the Seattle Reign in the NWSL where she served as an assistant coach for a season-and-a-half before joining U.S. Soccer. With the Reign, in addition to her coaching and scouting duties for the NWSL squad, she was also the Technical Director for the Seattle Reign Academy where she was responsible for overseeing five head coaches and their teams.

Kevins will work closely with U.S. Under-19 and Under-18 Women's Youth National Team head coaches to maximize the development, evaluation and movement of players between the age groups for training camps and matches during the World Cup cycle.

Since 2013, Kevins has been coaching at U.S. Soccer Training Centers, first in the Los Angeles area and then in the Northwest, helping to identify and assess players for potential call-ups to the USA's Youth National Teams.

From October of 2013 through December of 2014, Kevins was coach for the L.A. Blues in the USL W-League, guiding the club to a 15-0-0 record and a national championship. Eight players on the team were taken in the 2015 NWSL Draft. Before that, she coached the LA Strikers in the W-League. She was also a coach and mentor for LA Premier Soccer Club from 2013-2016.

From 2004-2013, Kevins worked for the England Football Association as an assistant coach for various age group National Teams, working with the U-15, U-17, U-19 and U-20 squads. On occasion, she served as head coach for the U-17 and U-19 England Women's National Teams during tournaments and training camps.

She was an assistant coach for the England team that finished second at the 2007 U-19 Women's Euros and with the team that finished in the top four in 2008. She was also an assistant coach at the 2008 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in Chile.

#### U.S. WOMEN'S YOUTH NATIONAL TEAM COACHES

During her coaching career in England, she also served as the head coach for the first team at Barnet FC Ladies from 2004-2013 and helped the club win the FA Women's Premier League Cup in 2011. She was also the Barnet FC Academy Head Coach for 16 to 19-year-olds from 2008-2013.

From 2008-2013, she was also the technical director for the Middlesex FA Girls' Centre of Excellence, where she worked with talented young players from ages 7-17 at one of the 30 licensed Centres of Excellence in England. From 2003-2008, she worked in a similar role at the Leyton Orient FC Girls' Centre of Excellence as the U-16 head coach.

On the boys' side, she worked as an assistant coach with the Wealdstone FC U-19s from 2004-2005 and 2008-2009.

As a player, she captained Barnet FC from 1989-2003 before retiring and immediately started managing the reserve team.

Kevins attended St. Mary's University in Twickenham where she earned a B.A. with honors in Sports Science and Physical Education.

She holds a USSF "A" license, a UEFA "A" license and in 2021, completed the U.S. Soccer Pro License course, becoming one of just four women to do so at that time.

## Natalia ASTRAIN

HEAD COACH: U.S. Under-17 Women's Youth National Team BORN: January 5 in Pamplona, Spain Hometown: Pamplona, Spain

Natalia Astrain was named head coach of the U.S. Under-17 Women's Youth National Team on Nov. 17, 2021. In her role, Astrain will oversee all aspects of the U.S. U-17 WYNT program and prepare the team for qualifying for the 2024 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup.

Astrain was able to coach one training camp at the end of 2021 as the U.S. WYNT programming emerged from the pandemic layoff, but in 2022, she led a wonderfully talented group of players on an excellent run, storming through the Concacaf Women's U-17 Championship, winning its group at the 2022 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, and going unbeaten in regulation for the entire year, ending with an 11-0-3 record. During the qualifying tournament in the Dominican Republic, the U-17s set several records while winning all seven matches and piling up a 58-1 margin of victory which included a 3-0 win over Canada in the semifinal to earn a berth to the World Cup and a 2-1 victory over Mexico to win the regional title.

At an historic World Cup, the USA opened with an 8-0 win over host India, drew 1-1 with Brazil and then won the group with a 4-0 victory over Morocco to become the first U.S. team to win its group at the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup. Despite dominating its quarterfinal against Nigeria in every way except on the scoreboard, the USA drew 1-1 in regulation and then fell in penalty kicks. A remarkable 18 different players scored for the USA in international matches during 2022.

Astrain joined U.S. Soccer after spending the 2021 National Women's Soccer League season with the Kansas City Current and brings a wealth of coaching experience in both the professional and youth ranks. In her native Spain, she served as head coach for FC Barcelona, Club Damm, Club Levante Las Planas and as an assistant with Atletico Madrid and the Spain Women's National Team. She also spent time as technical director of Barcelona's women's academy.

As part of an integrated YNT coaching staff, Astrain will work across age groups with a focus on the U-17 WYNT. In her role, Astrain will also manage the integration and programming of U-15 and U-16 WYNTs to maximize the evaluation and movement of players between the age groups for training camps and matches during the World Cup cycle.

Astrain has worked in the United States since 2017, beginning as the girls director at Rise SC in the U.S. Soccer Development Academy and assistant academy director with the Houston Dash. She has also served as an assistant coach with U.S. Soccer in the past, working with the U-17 WYNT and U-15 WYNT. She spent 2020-21 as head coach of FC Bay Area in the Women's Professional Soccer League from before joining Kansas City ahead of the 2021 season.

In her role as part of an integrated WYNT coaching staff, Toledo works across age groups with a focus on the U-16s. She works closely with U-17 WYNT head coach Natalia Astrain and U-15 WYNT head coach Katie Schoepfer to maximize the development, evaluation and movement of players between age groups for training camps and matches.

Toledo holds an "A" coaching license from her native Brazil and is currently working towards her U.S. Soccer "A" license. She joins the Federation after five years coaching in Southern California, most recently with Albion SC as head coach of the club's U-18 and U-17 Girls' Academy teams and the SoCal Dutch Lions in the Women's Premier Soccer League. She played professionally in Brazil, England and Iceland and began her coaching career with Albion while playing in the WPSL before several years working with soccer programs in Brazil and Spain.

Toledo earned a master's degree in exercise science at the University of West Florida and holds a master's in high performance from the MBP School of Coaches in Barcelona. Before joining Albion, Toledo spent two-and-a-half years as the head girls' soccer coach for LA Galaxy San Diego. She's also spent time in various coaching roles at the MBP School of Coaches, the University of West Florida and Flamengo in Brazil as well as launching the "Soccer Freak" clinic program outside of Rio de Janeiro.

After kicking off her professional playing career in Brazil with famed clubs Corinthians, Palmeiras and Flamengo, Toledo attended the University of West Florida, earning All-South Region honors her senior year with the Argos. After college, she played for Iceland's Íþróttafélag Reykjavíkur, the WPSL's San Diego United and briefly for England's Lincoln Ladies.



## Katie SCHOEPFER

Katie Schoepfer was named head coach of the U.S. Under-15 Women's Youth National Team on Nov. 18, 2021, after previously serving as technical director at South Shore Select in Hingham, Mass. and working as an assistant coach with the U.S. U-20, U-17 and U-16 Women's Youth National Teams.

In 2022, she coached the U.S. U-15 WYNT to an entertaining and victorious run at the Concacaf Women's U-15 Championship in Tampa, Fla. The USA won all five games while outscoring the competition, 34-1. The young Americans defeated the Dominican Republic 6-0 in the semifinal and then downed Canada, 4-1, in the title game to claim U.S. Soccer's third Concacaf title at this level.

Following seven years as a professional player in the United States, Schoepfer spent seven years coaching at various youth clubs in Massachusetts. Prior to South Shore Select, she spent time as assistant director of coaching at Valeo FC in Newton, Mass. and worked as a head coach in the Boston Breakers Academy during her playing career.

As part of an integrated YNT coaching staff, Schoepfer works across age groups with a focus on the U-15 WYNT. In her role, Schoepfer will work closely with U-17 WYNT head coach Natalia Astrain to maximize the development, evaluation and movement of players between the age groups for training camps and matches during the two-year cycle.

Schoepfer holds a U.S. Soccer "A" Coaching License and serves as a coach educator for the Talent Scout License after completing the pilot course in spring 2019. She also spent six years as an assistant in the college game with Boston University and College of the Holy Cross. She helped guide the Terriers to Patriot League championships in 2014 and 2015, plus a second-place conference finish in 2016.

As a player, Schoepfer was in the U.S. Youth National Team player pools from the U-17 to U-23 and started all four years in college for Penn State University, twice earning All-American honors while scoring 48 career goals. In her professional career, the forward made 100 appearances with the Boston Breakers in two leagues -- Women's Professional Soccer and the National Women's Soccer League. She played the NWSL's first four seasons and her 100 games for the Breakers are the third-most in club history. The Connecticut native was inducted into the Connecticut Soccer Hall of Fame in 2019.

## **STEPPING STONE TO THE FULL TEAM**

The USA's oldest Women's Youth National Team moved from Under-21 to Under-23 in 2008. The change was in response to FIFA moving its oldest youth world championship for women from Under-19s to Under-20s, as well as a change in the Nordic Cup competition which became a U-23 event. The eight-team Nordic Cup, which was a staple of summer programming for this age group for years, ended its 19-year run in 2009. Without the competition, which had been organized annually by different Scandinavian countries, the U.S. U-23s have pursued other international competition, mostly in Spain and Scandinavia, and in recent years have attended a four-team Nordic Tournament.

The role of the U-23s in the overall development of USWNT players underwent some changes in 2009 with the start of Women's Professional Soccer (WPS) and again is being positively impacted by the National Women's Soccer League (NWSL). Many players who years ago who would have been kept active and in the mix for the full National Team by competing with the U-23s are now playing in the domestic league or abroad. Therefore, the U.S. coaches will call up some professionals prior to the NWSL season and when they are released by their clubs, and will have more of a focus on the pros in the early part of the year before the beginning of NWSL preseason camps. During the NWSL season, more college players will likely get call-ups for the remainder of the spring and into the summer, as that time period falls during the heart of the club season.

The U.S. team has been active at this age group since 1989 (in its previous incarnation it was run as a U-20 program until 1998 and then morphed into a U-21 program until 2007) and has been consistently effective in helping prepare players for the step up to the Women's National Team. The vast majority of current Women's National Team pool players have competed for the U-21s or U-23s. The U-21s used to feature "overage" players in training camps and for the Nordic Cup tournament, but now all players who are age-eligible for the U-23s in 2023 must have been born on or after Jan. 1, 2000. This team serves a valuable role in helping bridge the large gap between college soccer and the National Team, and functions as an important development partner with the NWSL.

# U.S. U-20S LOOK TOWARDS 2024 FIFA U-20 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

Now in its 12th cycle, the FIFA Under-20 Women's World Cup has proven to be an invaluable development opportunity and legitimate proving ground for future stars. The USA's participation in the first nine 10 events – of which the Americans have won three and finished in the top four three other times – gave an early glimpse of the program's up-and-coming young players, many of whom have gone on to make major impacts at the full international level. The first two tournaments were held as Under-19 events before FIFA moved it to a U-20 competition in 2006.

Originally created in 1998 as an Under-18 program, the team moved up an age level to the U-19 level in 2001 in preparation for the first FIFA-sanctioned world championship for youth women, before becoming a U-20 program in 2005 for the first FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup that was held in 2006.

In the history of this tournament, the USA has lost just two knockout games in regulation time, bowing out in penalty kicks in three World Cups and falling in overtime to eventual champion Korea DPR in the semifinal in 2016. The USA won the tournament in 2002, 2008 and 2012, and lost in penalty kicks in the semifinal in 2006, the quarterfinal in 2010 and the quarterfinal in 2014. The USA also lost in regulation to Germany in the semifinal in 2006. The 2018 tournament marked the first time the USA had failed to get out of the group, albeit a difficult one with eventual championship game participants Japan and Spain. The USA failed to get out of the first round in 2022 as well from a group that had eventual semifinalists Netherlands and Japan.

It is planned that the U.S. U-20 WNT will have the benefit of a preparation schedule that features numerous domestic training camps and some highly competitive matches abroad. The player pool features several players who are still age-eligible from the last cycle of U-20s plus some exceptional talent coming up through the ranks from the U.S. U-17, U-18 and U-19 Women's Youth National Teams.

Players eligible for the 2024 U-20 Women's World Cup, for which a host has yet to be named, must be born on or after Jan. 1, 2004.

# THE HISTORY OF THE U-20 WYNT

In 2022, the USA rolled through the Concacaf Women's U-20 Championship to earn a berth to the 2022 FIFA Women's World Cup, winning all seven games by out-scoring its opponents 49-0. Michelle Cooper led the USA with eight goals in the qualifying tournament while Andrea Kitahata had seven. Avery Patterson scored six times, as did Simone Jackson, while Talia DellaPeruta found the net five times.

At the World Cup in Costa Rica, the USA's 10th consecutive FIFA tournament at this age level, the young Americans were drawn into a difficult group with Ghana, Netherlands and Japan. The USA started off well with a 3-0 win over Ghana, but then lost to the Netherlands (3-0) and Japan (3-1), both of which made it to the semifinals, and exited the tournament early. Cooper, Alyssa Thompson, Ally Sentnor and Jackson scored the USA's four goals in the World Cup.

Due to the global pandemic, programming for this age group did not begin again until the end of 2021, when training camps in San Diego were conducted in October and November.

The 2020 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup was first delayed and then finally cancelled in November of 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but FIFA awarded the 2022 tournament to Costa Rica, which would have hosted the 2020 event. The USA had already qualified for the 2020 World Cup by winning the Concacaf U-20 Women's Championship earlier in the year, sweeping all seven games while outscoring the opposition, 44-1.

The USA beat host Dominican Republic in the semifinal, 6-0, to earn a World Cup berth and then downed Mexico, 4-1, in the title game. Forward Mia Fishel set a U.S. record for most goals in a

Concacaf qualifying tournament by smashing home 13 in just six games.

In 2020, Laura Harvey, one of the most successful coaches in the history of the NWSL, became head coach of the U-20 WYNT and guided the team through World Cup qualifying, winning the tournament in dominant fashion while out-scoring its opponents, 44-1 over seven games in a new tournament format. Unfortunately, the World Cup was cancelled due to the global pandemic.

In 2019, Mark Carr moved up in age groups from his job as head coach of the U-17 WNT and coached the U-20s for a year before moving on to a college coaching position. The USA played an excellent, albeit difficult schedule during the first year of the cycle and went 5-7-1, but the preparation set an important foundation for 2020 as the players faced several of the top youth programs in the world while picking up wins over China PR, Sweden, Germany, Japan and France. Sixty-seven players saw action in matches, and 16 different players scored goals, as the coaches looked to narrow down the pool for the run to the 2020 World Cup.

In 2018, Jitka Klimkova took the USA through a difficult but successful preparation schedule for the World Cup that included a penalty kick loss in the title game of the Concacaf Women's U-20 Championship (after the USA had qualified by winning a semifinal shootout), as well as victories over the U-20 sides from France, England, Germany and Brazil. At the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in France, the USA fell to eventual champions Japan, 1-0, to start group play on the back foot, but then rallied for a 6-0 victory against Paraguay. The USA needed a victory against Spain in its final group game to advance, but ended up drawing, 2-2. The USA played 18 quality international matches during the year and posted an overall record of 12-2-4. The 2017 U.S. Soccer Young Female Player of the year, forward Sophia Smith, put in a stellar performance. She scored 15 international goals to up her career total to 23, the fourth-best in U.S. U-20 WYNT history. Twenty-seven players saw action in international matches during the year.

In 2017, Klimkova's first year at the helm, the U-20s played 12 matches against top teams and hosted the Women's Nike International Friendlies for the first time in conjunction with the Girls' Development Academy Winter Showcase. The preparation year for qualifying for the 2018 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup was highly productive as the USA compiled a 6-4-2 record which included wins against Norway, France, England, Germany and Finland. Thirty-eight players saw action in international matches and Civana Kuhlmann and Sophia Smith led the team with eight goals each while Smith was named U.S. Soccer Young Female Player of the Year.

In 2016, the U-20s had a slew of competitive games in the run-up to the World Cup, defeating the U-23 teams from Sweden and Norway along the way. At the World Cup in Papua New Guinea, the U.S. topped the group by the slimmest of margins and reach the tournament semifinals with a win over regional rival Mexico. There, the USA fell in a hard-fought loss to eventual champion Korea DPR before finishing fourth overall. The team finished the year 8-5-4 overall record and 7-5-4 in international matches. Mallory Pugh led the USA in scoring with six international goals.

In 2015, the U-20s had an excellent year of preparation and growth, going 14-2-2 overall and 10-1-1 in international matches. The USA defeated age group teams from Norway, Netherlands, Sweden, Mexico and Brazil, as well as two Spanish women's clubs, before winning the 2015 Concacaf U-20 Women's Championship in San Pedro Sula, Honduras. The USA topped its group despite a 1-1 tie with Mexico in the opening game and then defeated the hosts in the semifinal to earn its berth to the Women's World Cup in Papua New Guinea. The USA defeated Canada, 1-0, in the title game to take the Concacaf championship.

In 2014, the U-20s had an exciting year while compiling an 11-1-1 international record (12-4-1 overall) that included a title at the Concacaf Women's U-20 Championship in the Cayman Islands. The USA met eventual champion Germany in its opening game of the 2014 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup and fell 2-0, but followed that with wins against Brazil and China to advance out of the group. The USA would fall in the quarterfinal in penalty kicks after a hard-fought match with Korea DPR.

In 2013, Michelle French took over the U-20s in a historic appointment as U.S. Soccer's first fulltime head coach for this age level. A team in transition went 4-5-2 overall and 2-3-2 in international matches as the year was spent identifying talent and forming a player pool that would take the USA into the World Cup year.

Looking back at 2012, it was one of the best years ever for the U.S. program, as the team went 16-

2-1 in international matches (17-2-2 overall) and won perhaps the most competitive U-20 Women's World Cup in history. The USA rolled through Concacaf World Cup qualifying to earn a berth to Japan by winning all five games by a combined score of 18-1 and pulled off a dramatic late-game comeback to defeat Canada by a 2-1 score in the championship game on a game-winner from Chioma Ubogagu.

U.S. head coach Steve Swanson fashioned a team that had speed and skill all over the field, which when combined with tremendous heart, gave the Americans a unique squad that overcame adversity to reach the top of the podium in Tokyo, Japan. The U.S. team featured several players with bright full National Team futures, and the victory further cemented the USA's youth programs among the best in the world. U.S. captain Julie Johnston, who would be named the U.S. Soccer Young Female Player of the Year for 2012, won the Bronze Ball as the third-best player in the tournament, a rare honor for a defender.

Swanson took over the program in 2011. It served as a transition year for the U-20s as the team played only a handful of international matches, going 6-2-1 overall and 2-1-1 against other countries. Still, the year was highly productive as Swanson refined his player pool and started to develop a team that would go on to win the World Cup. He saw several veterans of the U-20 level continue to mature while numerous young players showed their ability to play and prosper at the international level. The schedule included two matches with the Japanese U-20 squad, which the USA split with the visitors during a camp in Chula Vista, Calif.

In 2010, Jill Ellis led the team to a 16-3-5 overall record and 13-2-3 in international play, winning the title at the Concacaf Women's World Cup Qualifying Tournament in Guatemala. The U.S. team went undefeated against international competition until its final two friendlies before the U-20 Women's World Cup, then fell to Germany and Japan on a pre-World Cup trip to Germany. At the Women's World Cup, the USA was surprised by Ghana in the opener, a 1-1 tie, before rebounding to defeat Switzerland 5-0 and Korea Republic 1-0 to win the group and earn a berth in the quarterfinals. There, the USA played a hard-fought match against Nigeria with regulation time ending at 1-1. A scoreless overtime led to a shootout, where the U.S. goalkeeper Bianca Henninger twice saved penalties that were ordered retaken, and the USA fell in the shootout for what then was the earliest elimination in history for a U.S. team at a Women's World Cup. With five goals in the 2010 tournament and 10 in her U-20 career, Sydney Leroux became the USA's all-time leading scorer in U-20 Women's World Cup tournaments.

In 2009, Ellis led the team to a 9-2-3 overall record and 4-1-2 in international play as she narrowed down the player pool in preparation for Concacaf qualifying in early 2010. The schedule included wins against the Norway, England and Canada U-20 teams as well as draws with the always-talented France and Germany. Kelly Cobb, Maya Hayes and 2008 U-20 Women's World Cup star Sydney Leroux led the USA in scoring with six goals apiece in all matches.

In 2008, despite taking over as head coach from Ellis fairly late in the cycle, Tony DiCicco molded a team that would win the USA's seventh women's world title. DiCicco's side experienced some growing pains during the year, but it all came together in brilliant fashion during the Women's World Cup as the USA scored 12 goals and allowed just three, controlling every match (aside from a meaningless 2-0 loss to China in group play), on the way to a convincing 2-1 defeat of Korea DPR in the title game. The USA won three matches by 3-0 scores, including the quarterfinal against England, and then outplayed a talented German side to win the semifinal by a 1-0 score. Leroux became just the second U.S. player to win the Golden Ball at a FIFA event and also won the Golden Shoe as the tournament's top scorer with five goals. Alex Morgan also had a great tournament, scoring four times and winning the Silver Ball and the Bronze Shoe. Goalkeeper Alyssa Naeher was world class, allowing just one goal, that in the waning moments of the final match, a performance that earned her the Golden Glove as the tournament's top 'keeper. The U-20s finished 2008 with an overall record of 20-7-0 while going 14-4-0 in international games.

In 2007, Ellis took the team through some excellent preparation during the identification stage for this pool of players, eventually winning the silver medal at the Pan American Games in Rio de Janeiro, an achievement that included defeating the full Women's National Team of Canada in the semifinal, 2-1. In the gold medal game, the USA ran into a Brazilian buzzsaw in front of a packed house at the famed Maracana Stadium, but that experience served as a benefit the players as they moved forward in their National Team careers. The U-20s finished 10-5-1 on the year, but four of those losses were to full Women's National Teams.

In 2006, the U.S. U-20s played a remarkable 50 matches before the 2006 FIFA U-20 Women's World Championship in Russia, eventually compiling an overall record of 39-10-7 for the year. The USA's

16-2-3 international record was stellar, although the year ended on a down note with a fourth-place finish at the world championship. The USA got some big-time goal production from several forwards during the year, including Jessica Rostedt (24 goals, 7 in international play), Lauren Cheney (21/9), Kelley O'Hara (20/10) and U.S. Soccer Young Female Player of the Year Danesha Adams (18/7). The USA qualified for the world championship with an undefeated run at the Concacaf U-20 Women's Final Qualifying Tournament held in Mexico in January of 2006, downing the hosts 3-0 for a berth to Russia and beating Canada 3-2 in the championship game.

In 2005, the team had a quiet year of activity due to the transition of head coaches.

In 2004, under head coach Mark Krikorian, the USA went 17-7-2 and 11-5-2 in international matches, but lost its first-ever match to a team in its age group, falling to Japan, 1-0. The USA finished second in Concacaf qualifying, falling 2-1 to Canada in the championship, but they had already secured a berth to Thailand by virtue of a clinical 6-0 win against Mexico in the semifinal. The USA put together four excellent matches to open the U-19 Women's World Cup, starting with a rousing 3-0 win against Korea Republic followed by a 4-1 domination of Russia. The USA finished group play with a hard fought 1-0 win against Spain. In the quarterfinal match against a plucky Australia, Angie Woznuk came off the bench to help set up the USA's two goals, both of which were assisted by Stephanie Lopez, sending the USA to the semifinal. In the semifinal, the young Americans ran into a German wall. Tied at 1-1 at halftime, the USA pressing forward, Germany scored another to secure the final 3-1 margin. The USA earned third-place honors with a 3-0 win against Brazil.

In 2003, the U-19s went 7-4-1 overall and 6-2-0 in international competition, getting wins against Mexico, Japan, Germany and Netherlands during the year.

In 2002, the U-19s went 22-2-2 overall and 17-1-0 in international matches, including six wins at the FIFA U-19 Women's World Cup in Canada. The victory in the title game of the first-ever U-19 WWC was another in a long line of "firsts" for the U.S. Women's National Team program, which includes the first Women's World Cup championship and the first Olympic gold medal. Team captain Lindsay Tarpley scored a 109th-minute "golden goal" against host Canada to win 1-0 on Sept. 1, 2002, in front of 47,784 fans at Edmonton's Commonwealth Stadium.

In 2001, the USA went 10-4-4 overall and 4-0-1 in international matches as the nucleus of the 2002 World Championship team started to form.

Under Steve Swanson in 2000, the U-18s went 10-2-3, including 3-0-2 in international competition, all against senior Women's National Teams.

The first season of U-18 competition in 1999 was a banner year, as the team went 14-0-3 overall and 8-0-2 internationally, winning a gold medal in the Pan American games to clinch an unprecedented "treble" for the U.S. Women's National Team, which also won gold at the 1999 Women's World Cup and U-21 Nordic Cup.

Shannon Cirovski, a veteran of the USA's 1991 Women's World Cup championship team, was the first coach of the U-18s but stepped down to take the head coach position at the University of Maryland. She coached the U-18s halfway through 1999 before U.S. Women's National Team assistant coach Jay Hoffman took the reins and guided the team to gold at the Pan Am Games in Winnipeg, Canada.

In its 25 years of competition as a U-18, U-19 and now a U-20 team, the program has compiled an all-time international record of 199-49-34 and has lost just 37 games to teams in its age group.

# FIFA UNDER-20 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP REVIEW

The U.S. Under-19/Under-20 Women's Youth National Team has participated in all 10 FIFA World Cups for this age group. The USA won the inaugural title in 2002 in Canada, finished third in 2004 in Thailand, took fourth in 2006 in Russia, reclaimed the crown in 2008 in Chile, got knocked out in the quarterfinal round in penalty kicks in Germany in 2010 and then rebounded to win its third title in 2012 in Japan. In 2014, the USA fell in penalty kicks in the quarterfinal and in 2016 returned to the semifinal round but would finish in fourth place. In 2018, the USA just missed out on the quarterfinals, finishing group play behind the eventual tournament champion and runner-up. The 2020 tournament was first moved and then later cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, with 2020 host Costa Rica being granted rights to host in 2022, a tournament at which the USA failed to advance out of the group. In 2006, the competition moved to the Under-20 level, bringing it in line with the men's FIFA U-20 World Cup.

# GOOD START, TOUGH FINISH FOR THE USA IN COSTA RICA (2022)

In 2022, the USA became one of four teams to qualify for all 10 FIFA Women's World Cups at this level. Drawn into a difficult group with Ghana, Netherlands and Japan, the Americans started off well, downing Ghana 3-0 on goals from team captain Michelle Cooper, Alyssa Thompson and Ally Sentnor. It was the first time since the 2012 U-20 Women's World Cup that the USA had won its first game of the tournament. The USA dominated the match, outshooting the Africans 21-5, but did not take advantage of playing 60 minutes with a woman advantage after a Ghana red card, and left goals on the table. Those goals could have made a big difference in the final group game against Japan after a 3-0 loss to the Netherlands in the second group game put the USA in a big hole. The USA gave up goals on a blast from distance, a header off a corner kick and a penalty kick. The U-20s fought gallantly in the group finale, but a 3-1 loss to Japan when the USA needed a win sent the Syoung Americans home early. Forward Simone Jackson scored for the USA in that game. Both the Netherlands and Japan advanced to the semifinal round and Japan made it to the World Cup Final, where it lost to Spain.

# **USA FALLS A GOAL SHORT OF ADVANCEMENT IN FRANCE (2018)**

In 2018, the USA became one of four teams to qualify for all nine FIFA Women's World Cups at this level. Drawn into a group with the eventual tournament champion Japan and runner-up Spain, the USA fought until the end, but finished third in Group C and failed to reach the knockout round for the first time. After falling to Japan 1-0 on a long-range goal in its opening match, the USA rolled past Paraguay 6-0 to put itself in position to qualify with a victory in its final group stage match. While the U.S. fell behind early to Spain, the Americans roared back late to draw even at 2-2 but were unable to create a game-winner that would have clinched a spot in the quarterfinals.

In the tightly-contested opening match against Japan, both teams struggled to find their rhythms offensively. While the U.S. out-possessed and out-passed Japan, the Asian champion broke through in the 76th minute, as Honoka Hayashi unleashed a well-hit shot from distance that struck the underside of the crossbar and bounced into the net. Sparked by the deficit, the USA searched for an equalizer and produced a number of quality chances in the last 15 minutes. While Jaelin Howell put two dangerous headers on frame during the game's final stretch, the Japanese defense kept the U.S. off the board.

Needing a convincing result to keep its quarterfinal hopes alive, the U.S. delivered an emphatic victory against Paraguay in its second group stage match. With its attack in full force, the USA created chances early and often, outshooting Paraguay 27-7. Sophia Smith started things off for the U.S. in the 15th minute with a remarkable run through the Paraguayan defense and a nifty finish, while Savannah DeMelo opened the floodgates late in the first half, netting twice in five minutes. Ashley Sanchez added a goal on the other side of halftime, while Smith, who spent the afternoon running roughshod through the South American defense.

bagged a brace in the 63rd. DeMelo capped off the scoring in the 78th to complete a hat trick, the USA's fourth in U-20 World Cup history, and a number of near-misses down the stretch could have made the scoreline even more lopsided in a dominant showing.

The USA went into its final match against Spain needing a win to secure a spot in the knockout round. A misplayed clearance set Spain up for an early goal and La Roia doubled its lead off of a set piece just before halftime. Down 2-0, the U.S. rallied late in the second half, working to get back in the game during the final 20 minutes. After a number of dangerous forays into the Spanish final third, the USA finally broke through in the 82nd minute off of a free kick from Smith. Pressing for an equalizer, DeMelo added her fourth goal of the tournament in the 87th to draw the USA even, but the USA could not get another goal.

#### CHARACTER. COMEBACKS AND SLIM MARGINS IN PAPUA NEW GUINEA (2016)

In 2016, the USA played in its eighth consecutive FIFA tournament at this level, winning the most difficult group in the competition by the slimmest of margins. Led by 2016 Olympian Mallory Pugh, who captained the U.S. team in the exotic locale of Papua New Guinea, the USA opened the tournament with a hard-fought 0-0 tie against a very talented France side that would go on to advance to the championship game. The USA then defeated New Zealand 3-1 on goals from Pugh, 17-year-old Ashley Sanchez (who became the first player to score in a U-17 and U-20 Women's World Cup in the same cycle) and substitute Ally Watt, who bagged an insurance score later in the match.

A wild dipping shot from distance (which was officially called an own goal as it hit off the post and then the hands of U.S. goalkeeper Casey Murphy) opened the scoring for Ghana in the final group match, but the USA promptly answered back as Pugh scored two minutes later. The eventual 1-1 draw with a tough, physical Ghana team tied the USA with France on every tie-breaker except the last one - Fair Play points - and with the USA receiving no yellow cards in group play while France received one, the Americans won the group and advanced to the quarterfinal against Mexico.

In that match, Mexico took the lead in the 64th minute on a well-struck free kick, forcing the USA to mount an epic comeback. Watt, playing the role of super sub once again, tied the game in the 81st minute off a superb pass from Sanchez. After some end-to-end play produced chances for both teams near the end of regulation, it was Sanchez who set up the game-winner three minutes into stoppage time with a brilliant dribble and pass from the right wing. She beat a defender around the corner, got to the end line and played a pass back on the ground that was dummied by Pugh and rolled to the crashing Kelcie Hedge, who had entered the game in the 68th minute. Near the right edge of the six-yard box, Hedge spun her first-time shot off the foot of a defender from about eight yards out and it settled into the lower left corner for the game-winner.

The tremendous talent and overall strength of the Asian teams was on display in the semifinal round. The USA met eventual champion Korea DPR in the semifinal and played an excellent first 30 minutes, but as the match wore on, the technical savvy and power of an organized Korea DPR team put the USA on its heels. In the 51st minute, the Koreans got their goal from the penalty spot after U.S. midfielder Katie Cousins was whistled for a handball while blocking a shot and Jon So Yon converted her spot kick.

The Americans kept fighting and, as they'd done all tournament, got a goal when they needed one. As the game entered the 89th minute, forward Jessie Scarpa cut back on her defender from the left wing and sent a cross into the penalty area for Pugh. She took a hard touch and it bounced off a defender, then back off Pugh, before a Korea defender made a poor clearance. Defender Natalie Jacobs came flying through to hit an athletic left-footed, first-time volley that looped into the right side of the net to tie the game.

Due to the cooling breaks and several injuries in the stifling heat, seven minutes of stoppage time were added to the end of the match that saw some wild end-to-end play. The USA was forced to play the last four minutes of stoppage time with 10 players when Watt, its fastest player, had to go out injured after the Americans had already made their three allowed substitutes in regulation. After the USA dodged a few quality scoring chances from Korea DPR in second half stoppage time, U.S. head coach Michelle French was able to utilize the new rule allowing for a fourth sub in overtime and sent on Courtney Peterson for Watt.

Korea DPR wasted no time going ahead, however, creating a very nice goal less than a minute into the first overtime. The USA tried to push for a second equalizer and battled with tremendous heart until the end, but a clearly fatigued U.S. team could not find the net again.

The U.S. team expended a tremendous amount of energy in the tournament but still had enough left in the third-place match to hold a supremely talented Japan without a goal – with Murphy making several excellent saves along the way -- until the 87th minute, when Golden Boot winner Mami Ueno looped in the game-winner from the left side of the penalty box.

Although the USA did not get on the podium, the tournament did showcase some bright young stars, most notably Pugh, Sanchez and Murphy. At the time, the third-place match was just the second game the USA had lost in regulation time in its history at this tournament.

# THE PAIN OF PENALTIES, AGAIN (2014)

The 2014 FIFA U-20 Women's World cup opened with a rare meeting between the 2012 finalists. This time, Germany came out on top, scoring two second half goals to down the USA in the first game of Group B. The Americans rebounded with two wins by shutout over Brazil and China PR to earn second place in the group and a spot in the quarterfinal.

Forward Lindsey Horan, the first professional to represent the USA in the U-20 Women's World Cup, showed why she was one of the world's best young players, scoring three of the four goals over the final two group matches. Her goal against Brazil in a tremendously hard-fought match came with eight minutes left to play. Rose Lavelle added a clinching score against China during a 3-0 victory in Moncton, Canada.

The USA's first three games were played on artificial turf, but on grass in Toronto at BMO Field, the USA met the North Koreans in the quarterfinal, the same country it had beaten at this stage four years ago. This time the Koreans turned the tables in a competitive match that saw Makenzy Doniak open the scoring for the USA in just the sixth minute. North Korea tied the game on a penalty kick in the 65th minute and the teams played scoreless through the rest of regulation and overtime.

Unfortunately, the USA missed its first three penalty kick attempts. While Stephanie Amack converted on the fourth try, the Americans had dug themselves too deep a hole and the Koreans prevailed 3-1 in the shootout, sending the USA home before the semifinal for just the second time.

Through this tournament, the USA had only lost one knockout match in regulation time in the seven tournaments, that coming to Germany in the 2004 semifinal.

# TOP OF THE PODIUM IN TOKYO (2012)

The 2012 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in Japan was a triumph of American spirit as well as Japanese character. The hosts organized a fantastic tournament on short notice after it was moved from Uzbekistan and then captured the attention of the nation with some tremendously attractive soccer played with unabashed joy. The Japanese fell to the powerful Germans in the semifinal (after giving up three goals inside of 20 minutes) while the USA defeated a talented Nigeria team to make the World Cup Final and then triumphed 1-0 on a goal from speedy attacker Kealia Ohai.

What made the USA's march to the tournament title even more special was the adversity the team faced in group play. After a convincing 4-0 opening game victory against Ghana, featuring a hat trick from Maya Hayes, the USA tied China PR 1-1 and then got smashed by Germany, 3-0.

Those results gave the Americans a remarkably tough road to the championship as they would have to defeat three group winners along the way. First up was a Korea DPR side that featured 10 players from its 2012 London Olympic Team. Seven North Koreans who played against the full U.S. Women's National Team at the Olympics during the USA's 1-0 group play victory at Old Trafford in Manchester, England, played against the U.S. U-20s in the quarterfinal, and the Koreans came into the game with a tournament-high 15 goals. The USA got a wonderstrike from distance from Vanessa DiBernardo and an overtime header from Chioma Ubogagu to earn the hard-fought 2-1 win and a berth to the semifinal against Nigeria, the country that had knocked the USA out of the U-20 World Cup two years earlier in the quarterfinal stage.

The Americans played a tremendous match against Nigeria in the 2-0 victory, getting a header goal from Morgan Brian and a strike off a beautiful run from Ohai. That victory earned the USA another shot at Germany, which made the championship game without allowing a goal in its previous five games of the tournament.

The USA ruined Germany's perfect record just before halftime as Crystal Dunn's dynamic run with the ball down the right flank in the 44th minute set up Ohai for what would be the game winner.

The USA played stout defense in the second half, led by center backs Cari Roccaro and Julie Johnston – who would win the Bronze Ball as the third best player in the tournament – and got several clutch saves from goalkeeper Bryane Heaberlin to earn the historic victory.

# THE PAIN OF PENALTIES IN GERMANY (2010)

If the 2010 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup proved anything - besides Germany's dominance at home - it's that the African teams were getting stronger. The USA drew 1-1 with both African sides it faced and was knocked out of the tournament at the guarterfinal stage.

The USA started the tournament with a tie against a tough Ghana side, although the Americans had plenty of chances to win the game, firing 25 total shots with only Sydney Leroux finding the back of the net with 20 minutes left. The young Americans rebounded to defeat Switzerland, 5-0, in its second match as Leroux notched a hat trick, the first for an American woman in a Women's World Cup since 1991 and just the thirdever for a U.S. player.

The USA then faced the Korea Republic with the group title on the line and edged the talented Koreans, 1-0, as Leroux once again found the net. That set up a quarterfinal match with Nigeria, a physical side which somehow racked up 26 fouls (with four yellow cards) to the USA's five. The Americans scored early through Amber Brooks, but gave up a bomb from distance just 11 minutes from the end of the game. The USA once again had plenty of chances to win the game, including a few in overtime, but Nigeria managed to fire a remarkable 31 shots with U.S. goalkeeper Bianca Henninger making 14 saves.

The match went to penalty kicks and U.S. U-20 veterans Christine Nairn and Leroux missed the USA's first and fourth kicks, respectively, while Nigeria made all four, but not without controversy. Henninger twice saved the shot of Nigeria's third kicker, only to have both wiped away and ordered retaken by the referee. Nigeria finally tallied on its third chance.

Leroux's five goals, which won her the Bronze Shoe as the third-leading scorer in the tournament, combined with the five she scored in 2008 in Chile, gave her the most for a U.S. player in U-20 Women's World Cup history. Henninger, who gave up just two goals in the tournament, won the Golden Glove as the best goalkeeper in the competition.

# **GLORY REGAINED IN CHILE (2008)**

The 2008 U.S. Under-20 Women's World Cup Team put together one of the most complete performances ever for a U.S. team at a world championship event, scoring 12 goals while allowing just three on the way to a glorious 2-1 title game victory over defending U-20 world champions Korea DPR. The fans in Chile adopted the U.S. team during the tournament as the players had once-in-a-lifetime experiences during the first-ever FIFA Women's World Cup in South America.

Forwards Sydney Leroux and Alex Morgan had fantastic tournaments, accounting for nine of the USA's 12 goals. The USA took home an unprecedented amount of hardware as Leroux won the Golden Ball as the best player in the tournament and the Golden Shoe as the top scorer with five goals. Morgan, who scored four times, won the Silver Ball and the Bronze Shoe while goalkeeper Alyssa Naeher, who allowed just one goal over the five brilliant matches in which she played, took home the Golden Glove. The USA also won the FIFA Fair Play Award.

The U.S. started off with two convincing 3-0 wins over France and Argentina. With the top spot in the group locked up after just two matches, DiCicco played numerous reserves in the third group game against China PR, a 2-0 loss.

The Americans rolled to a 3-0 win against England in the quarterfinal as captain Keelin Winters scored on a fantastic header to get things started. The Americans then out-battled the Germans, getting an own goal on a cross from Nikki Washington as well as a hustling slide from Leroux.

The win set up a championship game meeting with Korea DPR. Leroux scored a fantastic goal from distance in the 23rd minute and Morgan added another brilliant long-range strike just before halftime that goes down as one of the greatest ever goals for a U.S. player in a world championship final. The dangerous Koreans attacked with fervor, but the U.S. defense stayed strong, led by center backs Nikki Marshall and Lauren Fowlkes. The Asian champions did pull a goal back in the second minute of second half stoppage time, but the Americans would lift the trophy in front of an appreciative crowd in Santiago.

# **UNFORTUNATE FOURTH IN RUSSIA (2006)**

The USA's 2006 U-20 team disappointed in its results at the world championship in Russia, taking fourth and becoming the only U.S. women's team to finish out of the top three at a FIFA world championship to that point. The U.S. team had played 50 matches against national teams, colleges and women's clubs in 2006 leading into the world championship and had never failed to score at least one goal, but somehow could not muster one in the semifinal or third place match, which both went to penalty kicks. The U.S. team had kicks to win both games only to miss, and then miss the next as well.

In group play, the USA struggled a bit early as U.S. head coach Tim Schulz utilized his entire roster. The U.S. U-20s opened the tournament with a 2-1 win over minnow DR Congo. The young Americans then defeated Argentina 4-1 in a match that could easily have seen more U.S. goals, and put together a quality performance in the final first round match to defeat France 1-0 on a goal from Jessica Rostedt.

In the quarterfinal round, the USA looked to be the favorite after trouncing defending champion Germany 4-1 as Danesha Adams scored twice, but then came the scoreless semifinal and third-place match against China PR and Brazil, respectively, and the painful penalty kick shootouts.

Standouts on the U.S. team included Adams, a midfielder/forward, who won the Bronze Ball as the third-best player in the tournament, as well as goalkeeper Val Henderson and midfielder Amanda Poach, who along with Adams made the All-Tournament Team. Flank defender Tobin Heath and flank midfielder Kelley O'Hara (two goals) also had fine tournaments for the USA.

This U.S. team featured several players with bright futures on the full National Team, including forwards Amy Rodriguez (who scored twice in her second youth world championship), Lauren Cheney, Heath and Stephanie Lopez.

# **TAKING THIRD IN THAILAND (2004)**

The 2004 U.S. U-19 Women's National Team was going to be hard-pressed to live up to the standards set by the 2002 squad, which won the first-ever world youth championship for women while rolling over the competition in Canada, but amazingly, they almost did. Featuring four players from the 2002 squad, the 2004 team in Thailand put on one of the finest displays of soccer ever seen by a U.S. team in a world championship to win a difficult Group C that featured Asian champion Korea Republic, European champion Spain and Russia.

The USA opened the tournament with a 3-0 victory over Korea Republic, scored in just the second minute in a 4-1 victory over Russia and finished group play with a highly professional 1-0 win over Spain as Jessica Rostedt provided the lone goal. The USA dominated Australia 2-0 in the quarterfinals as Angie Woznuk came off the bench to help create both goals, but ran into a wall in the always tough and talented Germans in the semifinal and fell 3-1 to end its dreams of a second world youth title. The young U.S. team rebounded remarkably well in the Third-Place match, taking out Brazil 3-0 despite the South Americans featuring the virtuoso attacking duo of Marta and Cristiane from their silver-medal winning team at the 2004 Olympics.

It was a breakout tournament for Woznuk, the USA's dynamic attacking midfielder, who won the Silver Ball as the second Most Valuable Player and the Bronze Boot as the third-leading scorer in the competition despite battling a foot injury throughout. A new wave of talented American strikers also emerged as 17-year-old Amy Rodriguez scored two goals while 18-year-old Rostedt and 19-year-old Megan Rapinoe scored three goals each.

Like she did for the 2002 U-19 squad, goalkeeper Ashlyn Harris played every minute and was once again stellar, sealing her status as one of the top young goalkeepers in the world. Harris earned All-Tournament recognition along with Woznuk and center-back Becky Sauerbrunn, who teamed with Rachel Buehler to form a bruising partnership in the middle of the U.S. back line. Left back Stephanie Lopez also showed signs of future U.S. stardom while the USA was awarded the FIFA Fair Play Award, getting just two yellow cards in the tournament.

# **HISTORIC WIN IN CANADA (2002)**

In the first FIFA tournament for U-19s, under the most adverse conditions and on the biggest of stages, the U.S. Under-19 Women's National Team achieved one of the most historic victories in U.S. Soccer history, defeating host Canada 1-0 on Sept. 1, 2002, in front of 47,784 fans at Commonwealth Stadium in Edmonton, Alberta, to win the 2002 FIFA Under-19 Women's World Championship.

This unique group of teenagers represented the first young women in U.S. history with the opportunity to play in a sanctioned FIFA world championship. They embraced that challenge, played the semifinal and championship game in front of massive crowds and a world-wide TV audience, and came out champions, showing with unbridled emotion that all young girls in the United States could look forward to the chance to be a world champion as a youth player.

On the field, the young U.S. players had to maintain their composure in the championship game, played in front of a massive Canadian crowd, awash with red-and-white flags. Substitute Megan Kakadelas created the winning goal by curving a cross on the ground into the penalty area late in overtime. The ball was kept alive by

a darting Heather O'Reilly, who crashed into a defender on a hard near post run. The ball squirted across the goalmouth to U.S. captain Lindsay Tarpley who pounded a shot into the net from close range to end the game.

With the win, the U-19s added another first to the glorious history of the U.S. Women's National Team program, which claimed the first Women's World Cup and the first Olympic gold medal for women's soccer. The USA rolled through Group play, defeating England 5-1, Australia 4-0 and Chinese Taipei 6-0, before blasting Denmark 6-0 in the quarterfinal match. The USA fell behind 1-0 to Germany in the semifinal, before storming back to win 4-1 on two goals from Wilson, one from Tarpley and one from defender Jill Oakes.

Tarpley was awarded with the Bronze Boot as the third leading scorer in the tournament with six goals while Kelly Wilson earned the Silver Boot as the tournament's second-leading scorer with nine goals in just five games. Wilson also picked up the Bronze Ball as the third most valuable player in the tournament.

The victory was the end of a glorious two-year run to the tournament in which the first crop of U-19s went 21-1-1 in international competition and formed a family bond that carried them past an excellent and tough Canadian team, and their massive fan support, to the first-ever world championship for youth women.

"The journey not only made us better players, but it showed us that great things can be accomplished through hard work, love and belief," said Tarpley, who two years later would score for the USA in the Olympic gold medal match. "Over the last two years, we've had some amazing times on the soccer field, but it's the friendships we'll carry forever. I know we will look back at this 20 years from now with the same feelings for each other that we have now. We'll remember the day we became world champions together."

# U.S. UNDER-18 WOMEN'S YOUTH NATIONAL TEAM BRIDGES GAP

In 2008, the U.S. Under-18 Women's Youth National Team was reinstituted (after having existed from 1998-2001) to give international competition to players who have just finished a cycle with the U.S. U-17s but are a year away from the next U-20 cycle.

This year's group of players will likely have several domestic training camps and an international trip. Several of the U-18s may be called into U-19 or U-20 events as that group of players enters more intense preparations for the 2024 FIFA Under-20 Women's World Cup.

The U-18 WYNT provides a transition for a number of those players that could possibly make up the core of the team that would attempt to qualify for the following U-20 Women's World Cup or even contribute to the current cycle of U-20s. The U-18s also provide a proving ground for players in the U-20 pool who may be just below the core group training for the U-20 Women's World Cup, giving them an environment to show that they are worthy of being pulled back into the top tier of U-20s.

In 2021 and 2022, all U-18 WYNT programming was cancelled due to the global pandemic.

In 2020, before the COVID-19 pandemic shut down all YNT programming, the U-18s played three matches during a tournament in Lakewood Ranch, Florida, defeating China PR 2-0 and Norway 5-0 before falling to the Netherlands, 2-1.

In 2019, the U-18s played just two international matches, both against England in England, winning one and tying one. In 2018, the U-18s played five international matches, once again all abroad, three during the La Manga Tournament in Spain and two in Switzerland. The USA went 1-1-3 in those games against top European sides.

In 2017, the U-18s played all six of its international matches abroad, traveling to England and to Australia. The USA defeated England while tying and beating Norway during its trip to England. In Canberra, the USA fell to the Canada U-20s but beat Australia twice to finish with a 4-1-1 record.

In 2016, the U-18s had an excellent slate of international matches, playing games in Spain, England and Northern Ireland over the course of the year. The USA went 4-2-2 with wins against England U-19, Norway U-19, France U-19 and Northern Ireland U-19. The USA picked up draws against Denmark U-19 and England U-18. The only losses both came to England, to the U-18s and U-19s.

In 2015, the team had several domestic events and an international trip to play the Mexico U-20s while compiling a record of 3-1-2. In 2014, the team mostly had domestic events while compiling a 1-3-3 overall record, but did get in two valuable international trips, one to La Manga, Spain, for a tournament against older national teams and a trip to Mexico City for two games against the Mexico U-20s that produced a win and a draw.

In 2013, the team played a series of domestic matches, going 4-1-1 against colleges and women's clubs. In 2012, the squad had three training camps and compiled a record of 2-1-1, which included two matches against top Chinese women's club Shanghai FC.

In 2011, the squad went 3-1-1, including a victory over the German U-18s and a loss to the Japanese U-20s. In 2010, the squad went 4-2-2 and in 2009, head coach Dave Chesler led the team to a 4-0-3 record, which included a 5-1 victory against the Canada U-20 team.

Dean Duerst, who coached the U.S. U-17s in 2007, led the 2008 U-18s to a highly successful year, defeating three college teams and winning six games against European U-19 sides in Europe.

The U.S. U-18s had a nice run of success during the late 1990s, winning the 1999 Pan American Games in Canada and going 14-0-3 during the year. Shannon Cirovski, a veteran of the USA's 1991 FIFA Women's World Cup championship team, was the first coach of the U-18s in 1998 before then U.S. Women's National Team assistant coach Jay Hoffman grabbed the reins and guided the team to Pan Am gold.

Chesler coached the U-18s in 2009 and 2010 and former Youth Women's National Teams Director April Heinrichs coached the team from 2011-2016, before Jaime Frias took over as the full-time head coach for 2017 and 2018.

### U.S. UNDER-17 WOMEN'S YOUTH NATIONAL TEAM LOOKS TOWARD 2022 FIFA U-17 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

The U.S. Under-17 Women's Youth National Team will play its 21st year of existence as it heads into 2023 with the goal of qualifying for the 2024 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup. Players eligible for the next U-17 Women's World Cup must be born on or after Jan. 1, 2005.

U.S. Soccer first added the U-17 Women's Youth National Team to its programming at the end of 2002. The U-17 program was initiated as U.S. Soccer felt it was vitally important to get more talented young players training with National Team coaches and with the best players in their age group. The philosophy for the U-17s is to accelerate the development of the USA's best young players and better prepare them for the game's highest levels through training with top players and international matches.

Starting in 2008, the age group got its own world championship, an exciting prospect for the young Americans who will get the chance to compete for their country in a Concacaf qualifying competition and then, potentially, the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup.

# **HISTORY OF THE U.S. UNDER-17 WYNT**

In 2022, a wonderfully talented group of players had an excellent run, storming through the Concacaf Women's U-17 Championship, winning its group at 2022 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup and going unbeaten in regulation for the entire year with an 11-0-3 record. During the qualifying tournament in the Dominican Republic, the U-17s set several records while winning all seven matches and piling up a 58-1 margin of victory which included a 3-0 win over Canada in the semifinal to earn a berth to the World Cup and a 2-1 victory over Mexico in the title game. Forwards Melina Rebimbas and Amalia Villareal each scored eight goals during qualifying to lead the team while Charlotte Kohler and Claire Hutton scored six apiece. At the World Cup, the USA opened with an 8-0 win over host India, drew 1-1 with Brazil and then won the group with a 4-0 victory over Morocco to become the first U.S. team to win its group at the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup. Despite dominating its quarterfinal against Nigeria in very way except on the scoreboard, the USA drew 1-1 in regulation and then fell in penalty kicks. Rebimbas led the USA in scoring on the year with 10 goals, including two in the World Cup while Kohler had nine, including three in the World Cup. A remarkable 18 different players scored for the USA in international matches during 2022.

In 2021, coming off a long pause in programing due to the global pandemic, the U-17s finally resumed with training camps in October and November, the latter under new head coach Natalia Astrain.

In 2020, before the U-17s even had the chance to attempt to qualify for the 2020 FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup in India, the qualifying tournament was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The dates for the World Cup itself were subsequently moved, and then the competition was finally cancelled in November of 2020 due to the pandemic without the Concacaf qualifying tournament ever taking place. India was then given hosting rights by FIFA for the 2022 tournament.

In 2019, the U-17s had an excellent first year of the cycle, compiling a 9-1-1 record in international play, losing only to Spain in a back-and-forth 4-3 result and tying Germany. Along the way, the USA beat Mexico, Russia, Portugal, the Czech Republic, Belgium, China and Sweden. The U.S. players certainly got a taste for international travel, playing tournaments in Spain and the Czech Republic (both of which it won) and a friendly competition in Sweden. Thirteen different players scored for the USA in 2019, led by Allyson Sentnor, who was born in 2004 and had six international goals. The U-17s scored multiple goals in 10 of its 11 games and three or more goals in nine of 11.

In 2018, the U-17s had a stellar preparation period for the Women's World Cup, playing 18 international matches in four different countries before heading to Uruguay. The USA lost just one of those games while picking up victories against Venezuela, Argentina, Uruguay, Japan, Costa Rica, Bermuda, Canada, Haiti, Mexico and Colombia. The USA won all five games at an unusual Concacaf Women's U-17 Championship, beating Costa Rica in its first game in Nicaragua before the tournament was postponed due to civil unrest. The tournament resumed about six weeks later in Florida, and the USA took care of business, winning the group before defeating Haiti in the semifinal to qualify for Uruguay, and then defeated Mexico, 3-2, in the championship game to take the regional title. At the World Cup, the USA defeated Cameroon in the opening game, but then fell to youth powers Korea DPR and Germany and did not advance out of the group. Still, the USA went 15-3-3 during the year and 40 players got experience in international matches. Hawaiian forward

# U.S. UNDER-17 WOMEN'S YOUTH NATIONAL TEAM

Sunshine Fontes had a record-breaking year, pounding in 22 goals, most-ever for a female U.S. YNT player in a calendar year, and broke the U.S. record for most career international goals at the U-17 level with 24.

In 2017, the U-17s got off to an excellent start in the first year of the cycle, getting the chance to play 13 high-level international matches as part of its preparations for Concacaf qualifying. The USA went 9-1-3, defeating Mexico, England, Italy, Japan and Haiti, with its only loss coming to China PR in a wild 5-4 game in Weifang, China. The USA got to travel abroad three times, giving the young U.S. players valuable experience playing in difficult environments. Jordan Canniff (6 goals) and Maya Doms (5 goals) led the team in scoring. The USA allowed five goals in its one loss to China but allowed just six over the other 12 games.

In 2016, the U-17s compiled a record of 13-2-2 and won the Concacaf U-17 Women's Championship with a perfect 5-0-0 record, defeating Canada 5-0 in the semifinal to qualify for the U-17 Women's World Cup and then downed Mexico in the championship game, 2-1. The USA also won the U.S. Soccer NTC Invitational at the beginning of the year, defeating the England, Korea Republic and Japan U-17 teams. At the World Cup in Jordan, the USA started strong with a 6-1 win against Paraguay as Civanna Kuhlmann scored three goals, but then lost its final two group games 2-1 to Ghana and 3-2 to Japan, and did not advance to the quarterfinals. The losses were the first in the entire cycle for a team that came into the tournament unbeaten in international matches.

In 2015, the U-17s had an extensive schedule of domestic training camps and won the second annual NTC Invitational in Carson, Calif., defeating the U-17 teams from Mexico, Canada and Japan. The year was used for growth and evaluation to prepare for the Concacaf U-17 Women's Championship at the beginning of 2016 that qualified three teams for the U-17 Women's World Cup in Jordan. The USA finished the year with a 9-0-1 record.

In 2014, the U-17s were split as the 97s finished their cycle with three tremendous results at the NTC U-17 Women's Invitational where the USA defeated China, New Zealand and eventual U-17 Women's World Cup champion Japan to win the competition, while the 99s comprised the last three events of the year and logged two dominating victories over host Korea Republic during a trip to South Korea. The USA finished the year with a 7-0-0 record.

B.J. Snow was named the first full-time head coach for the U-17 program in January of 2013. The U-17s put together a quality series of results over the year, including two draws with Germany and two dominating wins against England, but a penalty kick loss in the semifinal of the Concacaf Women's U-17 Championship knocked the Americans out of the Women's World Cup despite outscoring its opponents at the tournament by a 26-1 margin. Amazingly, it was the second time in the program's history that a team had dominated at Concacaf qualifying and failed to reach the U-17 Women's World Cup due to a penalty kick loss. Still, the USA compiled a record of 9-1-5 and many talented young players who would have bright futures with older National Teams emerged from this cycle.

The U-17s had a successful year in 2012, going 19-1-4 overall and 13-0-4 in international matches, but learned how cruel the game can be, especially in a Women's World Cup, when the squad became the first U.S. women's team to fail to advance out of group play in a World Cup tournament. Despite not losing a match, the USA's 6-0 win against Gambia and draws with eventual finalists France (0-0) and Korea DPR (1-1) made the USA the first team ever to exit a FIFA women's tournament after the group stage while earning five points.

Still, 2012 saw the USA register wins against U-17 teams from Germany and China, U-19 teams from France and the Netherlands and a win against the full Slovenian Women's National Team. The USA also drew 0-0 with China's U-20s. The USA rolled through Concacaf qualifying while earning five shutouts, outscoring its opponents 26-0, including a hard-fought 1-0 victory against Canada to win the regional title in Guatemala. Summer Green led the USA in scoring with 16 goals, including 12 at qualifying, the most ever for an American player during a Concacaf qualifying event.

In 2011, Albertin Montoya took over the program and started building and also refining the player pool as he developed a team that played an attractive ball-possession attacking style. The young U.S. team went 1-1-2 in international matches, facing Germany and Japan twice each.

The U.S. U-17s had an odd year in 2010 as head coach Kazbek Tambi put together an incredibly talented group that outscored its opponents 38-0 at Concacaf Qualifying in Costa Rica, but fell in the all-important semifinal in penalty kicks to Canada to end its World Cup dreams.

The U-17s had a tremendous build-up schedule in place that included games against the Germany, Brazil and Japan U-17s, but one missed penalty kick rendered the preparation moot. The team nevertheless went 16-2-3 during 2010, including a 13-2-3 record in international play with its only losses coming to Japan three months after the disappointment at qualifying.

In 2009, the U-17s put together an overall record of 7-2-2, including 4-2-1 in international games, and ended

the year with an impressive four-game sweep of the U-17 and/or U-20 sides from Chile, Argentina and Uruguay in Buenos Aires. The U.S. played three close matches with a German team one year older to start the year but tied once and lost twice at the event in Florida.

After coaching the U.S. U-16s in 2007, Tambi moved with the age group to U-17s in 2008 to prepare for qualifying for the historic 2008 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, the first of its kind for this age group. In 2008, the U-17s compiled a record of 19-3-2 and 11-2-1 in international matches while winning the Concacaf qualifying tournament in Trinidad & Tobago and came within minutes of winning the inaugural FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, eventually falling 2-1 in overtime to Korea DPR.

In 2007, as this age group began its run to the 2008 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, the team went 9-1-0, defeating two college teams as well youth sides from Germany (U-17), Denmark (U-19), England (U-19), Argentina (U-20) and Uruguay (U-17). The only setback was a loss to the Argentina U-17s.

In 2006, the U-17s defeated and tied the Germany U-17s twice early in the year and then lost to two women's clubs before reeling off six straight wins including a 4-1 triumph against the Argentina U-20s. The only setback in international matches was a 2-1 loss to the full Argentina Women's National Team. In 2005, the U-17s defeated Germany's U-17s twice, and defeated Japan's U-18s, but struggled on a trip to Mexico where they lost to Mexico and Canada's U-20s and Mexico's U-18s.

In 2004, the U-17s defeated Canada's U-17s with a resounding 5-2 win and downed Germany's U-17s, 2-1. In 2003, the U.S. went undefeated in international matches, defeating Canada once and Germany twice. The U-17s also went undefeated against much older competition at the U.S. Soccer Festival in Houston, Texas. In fact, the only loss of the year came in a 4-3 shootout to the U.S. U-16 Girls in the first match of the year.

The U-17s played their first three matches in late November of 2002, two against older regional teams, and then won its first international 3-0 against Scotland in Boca Raton, Fla., on Nov. 30, 2002.

# FIFA U-17 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP HISTORY

The U.S. Under-17 Women's National Team has participated in five of the seven U-17 Women's World Cups that have been staged since FIFA began holding the competition for this age group in 2008. The USA finished the first tournament in 2008 as runner-up to Korea DPR after a 2-1 overtime loss in the final. Four years later in 2012, having missed out on the 2010 edition of the tournament, the U-17s returned to the competition, only to be eliminated in group play despite finishing level on points with eventual champion France and runner-up Korea DPR. The U-17s did not qualify for the 2014 competition but returned for the 2016 event in Jordan. At the first Women's World Cup to be held in the Middle East, the USA won its first group game but lost its next two matches and did not qualify for the knockout rounds. In 2018 in Uruguay, the USA started fast, but dropped its next two group games and did not advance. In 2020, the Concacaf U-17 Women's Championship was never played due to the COVID-19 pandemic, which was also the reason for the eventual cancellation of the FIFA Under-17 FIFA Women's World Cup in India. India was awarded by the hosting rights by FIFA for the 2022 tournament at which the USA put on an impressive performance, winning its group before falling in penalty kicks in the quarterfinal.

# TALENTED TEAM DESERVED MORE AT HISTORIC WORLD CUP IN INDIA (2022)

In 2022, a wonderfully talented group of players had an excellent run at the 2022 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, one of the more unique FIFA Women's World Cups ever held, with India serving as host. The U.S. team displayed an entertaining, dynamic style of possession-oriented attacking soccer and routed the hosts, 8-0, as seven different players scored to open the tournament. The USA failed to win during a 1-1 tie with Brazil in the second group game only due to some fantastic goalkeeping from the Brazilian netminder as Nicollette Kiorpes scored for the USA. In the group finale, the young Americans downed Morocco, 4-0, as Charlotte Kohler and little-used reserve Samantha Smith scored twice each to win Group A. This U.S. team became the first U.S. team to win its group at a FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup and then faced Nigeria in the quarterfinal.

Despite dominating the game in every facet besides where it counts the most – on the scoreboard – and outshooting the Africans 27-8, the USA put only three shots on goal and drew 1-1 in regulation. Nigeria's goal came off a penalty kick after a highly questionable VAR review and the USA's score came off a fine finish by Amalia Villarreal. With U-17 WWC knockout matches going straight to penalty kicks after regulation time, the USA were forced into a shootout where it painfully lost, 4-3, but not before U.S. goalkeeper Valentina Amaral saved Nigeria's third attempt only to see another VAR review go against the U.S., deeming that Amaral had jumped off her goal line early. Nigeria converted the retake.

Another highlight of the tournament was the experience of Mia Bhuta, a 16-year-old midfielder from Pittsburgh, Pa., and the team's co-captain. She became the first player of Indian descent to play for the USA in a World Cup. Her father was born in Mumbai and grew up in Rajkot in the state of Gujarat. A tennis player, he moved to the USA at the age of 16 to pursue better sporting and educational opportunities, and amazingly, in 2022, Mia was able to return to India to play in a World Cup at the same age her father was when he left.

In the first match against host India, Bhuta came on at halftime, wore the captain's armband, and scored the USA's eighth goal of the game, a tremendous shot from outside the penalty area. Making it even more special, she dedicated the goal to her grandfather -- her father's father - who was in the hospital in India recovering from heart surgery and could not make it to the game. Sadly, he passed away a few days later. Her story generated quite a bit of interest from the Indian media throughout the tournament and an outpouring of support via her social media channels from fans both in India and the USA.

During the USA's unbeaten run during the year, the team picked up a win and a draw against eventual FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup champions Spain during a trip to Madrid about six weeks before the World Cup. Melina Rebimbas led the USA in scoring on the year with 10 goals, including two in the World Cup while Charlotte Kohler had nine, including three in the World Cup.

## HARD-FOUGHT EFFORT NOT ENOUGH IN URUGUAY (2018)

Entering its fourth FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, the U-17 USWNT faced a tough group featuring a strong African side in Cameroon, reigning champion Korea DPR and perennial women's soccer powerhouse Germany.

The USA got off on the right foot, putting together a 3-0 victory over a physical Cameroon side. The U.S. back line stood tall while the offense struggled in the early going, but the USA rode a wild first half into the break with a 2-0 lead. In the 22nd minute, the U.S. played on with a Cameroon player on the ground and as the African players paused, Mia Fishel raced towards goal, shot at the goalkeeper and then pounded her own rebound into the net to put the USA on the board. Tensions rose as the half wore on, culminating with a straight red card shown to the Cameroon 'keeper and a penalty kick awarded to the USA. Sunshine Fontes hammered it home to double the advantage and the Hawaiian forward clinched the match late with a long-range chip in the 81st minute.

Against Korea DPR, the USA were undone by set plays, allowing all three goals on corner kicks in a 3-0 loss. While the U.S. defense, led by goalkeeper Angelina Anderson, held strong during the run of play, the North Koreans capitalized on their set-piece opportunities, finding the net on three of five corners, including the first two of the game.

All four teams in Group C entered the final day of group play tied at three points and the USA needed a win against Germany to guarantee advancement to the quarterfinals. After falling behind early on a direct free kick in the fourth minute, the U.S. responded energetically, taking the initiative on the attack and creating a number of quality chances. Despite outshooting Germany and controlling the tempo of the game, the U.S. failed to finish any of its opportunities and German goalkeeper Wiebke Willebrandt put on a remarkable performance. In the first half, a U.S. goal was waved offside and another was disallowed because of a handball just before the break. Down 2-0, the USA fought valiantly in the second half, but was unable to find the back of net as Germany was ruthless on the counterattack, going on to win 4-0 as the U.S. failed to advance out of group play for a second straight U-17 WWC.

# **GREAT START, TOUGH FINISH IN JORDAN (2016)**

The 2016 FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup marked the first FIFA women's event in the Middle East and Jordan did not disappoint as hosts, putting on a fantastic tournament over four venues in and around the capital of Amman. The USA started the tournament with a 6-1 trouncing of Paraguay as forward Civanna Kuhlmann became the first U.S. player to score three times in a U-17 Women's World Cup match. She was the fourth U.S. player to score a hat trick in a youth Women's World Cup as three players had accomplished the feat at the U-20 level. Frankie Tagliaferri, Ashley Sanchez and defender Kiara Pickett also scored against Paraguay.

The USA got off to another fast start in its next Group D game against Ghana, scoring an early goal as Tagliaferri, off an assist from Kuhlmann, tallied again, this time in just the fifth minute, but then a physical Ghana side became the aggressor. Ghana scored an equalizer in the 63rd minute, and an 84th minute penalty kick called for a hand ball in the box turned out to be the USA's undoing. The young Americans fell 2-1 to set up a likely must-win game against powerhouse Japan in the group finale.

Against Japan, the USA started strongly as Sanchez put the USA up 1-0 in the 33rd minute when she burst past the back line to finish a breakaway. The Americans took the 1-0 lead into halftime and were in position to qualify for the quarterfinals even after Japan tied the game in the 53rd minute. That all changed around the 68th minute, when Ghana scored against Paraguay in the other group match taking place at the same time, meaning the USA needed a goal to win the game and earn the three required points to advance.

Instead, it was Japan that scored twice and the USA was eliminated after finishing third in Group D. Sanchez pulled a goal back in stoppage time for the final 3-2 score line, converting a penalty kick after she was taken down in the box, but the Americans would have needed two more scores at that point. The USA did have two goals called back for offside in the second half, significant calls that would have made a big difference had at least one gone the other way, but instead Japan advanced and made it to the championship game where it lost to Korea DPR in penalty kicks after a 0-0 draw in regulation.

# FIVE POINTS NOT ENOUGH IN AZERBAIJAN (2012)

The 2012 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup in Azerbaijan turned into a painful learning experience for the young Americans who became the first team ever in a FIFA women's competition to earn five points in group play and yet fail to advance to the quarterfinals. The USA learned the importance of a goal or two in advancing during a World Cup, losing out to eventual champion France on goal difference to finish third in the group. It was the first time a U.S. women's team had not advanced out of group play during a FIFA event.

The USA was drawn into what turned out to be by far the most difficult group, which produced the eventual finalists and champion France. The Americans drew with the French 0-0 and tied eventual runners-up Korea DPR 1-1, but as it turned out, a 6-0 victory over Gambia in the middle game of Group B proved to be the USA's undoing. The North Koreans beat Gambia 11-0 and France beat the Africans, debutantes in a FIFA Women's World Cup, by a 10-2 score, getting six goals in the last 20 minutes to move ahead of the Americans on goal difference.

Still, there were many positives to be taken from the USA's Women's World Cup experience. The U.S. team allowed just one goal in the tournament and battled extremely talented French and Korean teams to the final whistle. Against North Korea, the USA took the lead on a goal from Darian Jenkins in just the second minute, only to concede a few minutes later to eventual Golden Ball winner Ri Un Sim in the fourth. The USA had several chances to steal the match at the end, but it was not to be and the Koreans deservedly won the group.

The USA did get a glimpse of some future talent, especially in goal where Jane Campbell showed signs that she could be one of the most talented young 'keepers to emerge in a while. In the beginning of 2013, she would get her first call-up to the full Women's National Team. Summer Green, the USA's leading scorer during the year, scored her first two World Cup goals.

Kudos should also go to Azerbaijan, the first predominantly Muslim country to stage a Women's World Cup at any level, as it put on a world class event. The tournament featured many activities around the matches and some of the best crowds of the three FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup tournaments held so far. France would eventually triumph in a penalty kick shootout that went eight players deep as France goalkeeper Romane Bruneau saved Ri Un Yong's attempt to end the game and Les Bleus lifted the trophy.

The 2008 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup in New Zealand was held with 16 nations playing in four venues and four stadiums – Auckland, Hamilton, Wellington and Christchurch – and the tournament organizers put on a fantastic first world championship event for this age group.

The high level of play displayed over the 18 days from such young players was a sight to behold, giving cause for excitement about the U-17 and U-20 Women's World Cups to come. The organization from the Kiwis, as well as the support from the people of New Zealand, made the tournament memorable and added to the excitement for these players getting their first taste of soccer at the world stage.

The U.S. team actually started slow, losing its first match to a talented Japan team by a 3-2 score. The young Americans also needed to come from a goal down against a spunky Paraguay side in its second group match to win 3-1, setting up a clash with France for a spot in the guarterfinals. The USA gutted out a 1-1 tie against the French, but that was good enough to earn a quarterfinal meeting with Korea Republic.

The USA's World Cup run then picked up steam as the U-17s put together their best match to date, trouncing the Koreans, 4-2. A powerful German squad awaited in the semifinal, but the USA put forth a tremendous performance, coming back from a goal down to win, 2-1, as forwards Vicki DiMartino and Courtney Verloo each scored. Verloo (four goals) and DiMartino (five goals) combined for nine of the USA's 13 goals with Kristie Mewis adding two more.

The first ever FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup Final opened with a startling goal for the USA in just the second minute off a throw-in, but then Korea DPR methodically took control of the match and ended up doubling the USA in shots. Still, the USA clung to a 1-0 lead until the North Koreans tied the game with just 13 minutes left in regulation time. The match remained knotted at 1-1 and looked headed for penalty kicks, but Korea DPR scored the game-winner just three minutes from the end of overtime.

Despite the loss, which ended the USA's record of winning every "first" FIFA women's world championship (the 1991 FIFA Women's World Cup, the 1996 Olympics and the 2002 FIFA U-19 Women's World Cup), the young Americans distinguished themselves very well and the team produced numerous future professional players.

The USA's emotional run to the title game was backed by some excellent individual performances. Kristie Mewis won the Bronze Ball as the third best player in the tournament and would be named the U.S. Soccer Young Female Player of the Year a few months later. DiMartino won the Silver Shoe as the second leading scorer in the tournament and Taylor Vancil won the Golden Glove as the top 'keeper.

Other top players for the USA included defensive midfielder Amber Brooks, defenders Cloee Colohan, Rachel Quon and Crystal Dunn and midfielders Olivia Klei and Samantha Mewis. The Mewis sisters became the first siblings to represent the USA in a FIFA Women's World Cup.

## U.S. UNDER-15 WOMEN'S YOUTH NATIONAL TEAM

#### U.S. UNDER-15 WOMEN'S YOUTH NATIONAL TEAM SETS BASE FOR THE FUTURE

In its 20th year of existence, the U.S. Under-15 Women's Youth National Team was instituted in 2004 to help bridge the gap between the annual summer Under-14 Girls' National Identification Camp (which is no longer held, having been replaced for several years by U-14 WYNT training camps and a U-14 Talent Identification Program) and the U.S. Under-17 Women's Youth National Team. With the implementation of the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, the importance of the U-15s and the U-16s has grown as this age group has a tangible goal when they enter their first major programming experience with the U.S. Women's National Teams.

U.S. Soccer's scouts monitor a large pool of players for the U-15s with many evaluated at the Youth National Team ID Centers across the country. A pool of around 35-40 players will be brought to several training camps and international friendlies over the course of the year to give more players of this age the experience of being in a National Team camp and match environment. In 2019, the team played a series of friendlies vs. Netherlands and would have played more international matches in 2020 if not for the global pandemic. All programming was cancelled in 2021 due to the ongoing pandemic but the team returned to the field in 2022 and won the Concacaf Girl's U-15 Championship in Tampa, Fla., which was the USA's third Concacaf title at this age level. The player pool is identified and monitored on a year-round basis through the YNT ID Centers with players coming from club soccer, ODP national/interregional events and U.S. U-14 Women's Youth National Team camps.

In 2016, the USA participated for the first time in the Concacaf Girls' U-15 Championship (the second time the tournament had been held). The USA won all seven games by shutout, compiling a 49-0 goal difference, and defeating Costa Rica 5-0 in the semifinal and Canada 2-0 in the championship game to take the regional title.

In 2018, the USA participated in its second Concacaf Girls' U-15 Championship, taking a younger team of players born in 2004 and 2005 to play against teams of players mostly born in 2003. The USA won four games and lost one, that to guest team Portugal by a 3-0 score in group play, but avenged that setback in the semifinal, flipping the score to win 3-0. In the championship game, the USA battled Mexico to a 0-0 tie through the 70 minutes of regulation before scoring three goals in extra time via current NWSL players Jaedyn Shaw (two goals) and Alyssa Thompson.

The USA would have participated in its third Concacaf Girls' U-15 Championship in August of 2020, but it was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The tournament returned in 2022 and the USA rolled through the competition, outscoring its five opponents by a 34-1 margin. The USA defeated the Dominican Republic, 6-0, in the semifinal and downed Canada, 4-1, in the championship game. Kennedy Fuller led the USA in scoring with nine goals while Abby Ballek had seven, Alexandra Pfeiffer had six, Ashlyn Puerta had five and Kimmi Ascanio scored four.

## **EXTENDED NATIONAL TEAMS**

The Extended National Teams is a division of U.S. Soccer's Sporting Department focused on extending opportunities beyond the traditional 11-a-side game by championing awareness, access, growth and high-performance environments on the grass, court and sand.

#### THE TEAMS

The ENT Department now includes nine different U.S. Soccer National Teams, four of them Women's National Teams:

- Beach Soccer (MNT & WNT)
- Futsal (MNT & WNT)
- CP (MNT & WNT)
- Deaf (MNT & WNT)
- Power Soccer (Coed NT)

#### **BEACH AND FUTSAL PROGRAMS**

Beach Soccer and Futsal are both five-a-side competitions that play in official men's FIFA World Cups every two and four years, respectively. Futsal is played indoors on a court with no walls, and Beach Soccer is, of course, played at the beach and showcases a unique culture at the highest level of the sport.

Although FIFA does not have official World Cups for women's programming yet, U.S. Soccer is investing in the sports with that goal in mind. The Women's Beach Soccer National Team does compete in number of official competitions, including the quadrennial ANOC World Beach Games. The Futsal WNT is just starting out and does not yet have any official competitions, but that day is coming.

The Beach Soccer and Futsal National Teams see a variety of athletes playing for the love of the game, often seeing them achieve that impossible dream of playing for their country at World Cup.

#### PARA NATIONAL TEAM PROGRAMS

CP, Deaf and Power Soccer are three disciplines showcasing athletes with disabilities pushing themselves to excel at the highest levels of the sport.

Deaf Soccer is an 11-a-side sport for players with significant hearing impairments. Both the men's and women's NTs have a four-year cycle of competition that includes the Deaflympics and World Championship tournaments once every four years. The women are the current Deaflympic champions.

CP Soccer is one of the oldest forms of soccer for players with disabilities, having been played since the 1980s, and predominantly features players with cerebral palsy, stroke or traumatic brain injuries. The team has frequently featured a number of U.S. military veterans through the years. In 2022, a Women's program was launched for the first time worldwide, and the USA won the initial IFCPF Women's World Cup in Spain (at a competition in which the U.S. MNT finished in the top 4 for the first time).

Power Soccer is the first competitive team sport designed and developed specifically for power wheelchair users. It gives an opportunity to people with an array or different disabilities, including athletes with quadriplegia, multiple sclerosis, muscular dystrophy, cerebral palsy and many others. The co-ed U.S. team will compete in the FIPFA Powerchair Football World Cup in 2023 in Australia.

#### **U.S. SOCCER'S MEMBERSHIP**

Beyond the official U.S. Soccer National Teams detailed above, U.S. Soccer's membership includes the following Disabled Service Organizations, some of which run their own independent National Team programs. U.S. Soccer has established an annual support application process for any of our members organizations to request assistance at every level, up to and including becoming an official National Team managed by U.S. Soccer. ## U.S. WOMEN'S BEACH SOCCER NATIONAL TEAM

Born on the beaches in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, beach soccer has long been played informally on sandy shorelines around the world. Despite its South American roots, the game was codified in 1992 by a group in Los Angeles and one year later the first professional beach soccer competition was held at Miami Beach with the USA hosting Brazil, Argentina and Italy.

In 1994, the first World Championship was held for men's beach soccer in Rio de Janeiro, and the U.S. team had modest success with a second-place finish in 1995 and a third-place finish in 1997. FIFA recognized men's beach soccer beginning in 2005, and has staged ten FIFA Beach Soccer World Cups.

The U.S. Women's Beach Soccer National Team took the field for the first time in August 2019 at Concacaf qualifying for the inaugural ANOC World Beach Games. Vying for the lone North American berth to the main event, the USA finished second in El Salvador, going 2-1-0, but still qualified for the World Beach Games thanks to another nation dropping out of the competition. At the World Beach Games, the Beach WNT dropped its first two matches before topping Paraguay to finish 1-2-0 and fifth place at the tournament.

In 2021, the Beach WNT participated in the first Women's Intercontinental Beach Soccer Cup that was held in Russia before the FIFA Beach Soccer World Cup at the same venue that hosted the men's tournament.

The Beach WNT returned to the sand in 2022 and won its first-ever tournament title by winning three games in Costa Rica.

While there is no FIFA Beach Soccer World Cup for women, as the game continues to grow, the Beach WNT will continue to compete in games and tournaments around the world.

#### **BASIC LAWS OF THE GAME**

Beach Soccer is played on a field that is approximately 36 meters long and 27 meters wide. The game is played on sand that is a minimum of 40 centimeters deep and players must be barefoot. Five players, including a goalkeeper, are on the field at one time and play three 12-minute periods.

There are up to seven substitutes on the bench, and like Futsal, there are unlimited substitutions. In instances where games cannot end in ties, matches are decided by a three-minute overtime and then kicks from the penalty spot, which is an imaginary mark on an imaginary penalty area line nine meters from the goal.

Other rules include:

- · After a ball goes out of bounds, it can be thrown or kicked back in play.
- Goalkeepers can pick up the first back pass from a teammate per possession.
- Players taking a free kick can make a small mound of sand to place the ball on.

## U.S. WOMEN'S CEREBRAL PALSY NATIONAL TEAM

The U.S. Women's Cerebral Palsy National Team was launched in January of 2022 as the Women's Para National Team and immediately had success. The USA participated in the International Federation of CP Football Women's World Cup in May of 2022, which was the team's first international competition.

The USA topped Australia 4-2 in overtime during the thrilling World Cup Final, lifting the first-ever world championship trophy for women's CP soccer. Catarina Guimarães scored 11 goals in the tournament to lead the team.

In 2022, the team was renamed to the Women's CP National Team to align with international naming conventions for the sport.

The Women's CP NT was celebrated for its world title at the U.S. Women's National Team's match against Germany on Sunday, Nov. 13, 2022, at Red Bull Arena in Harrison, N.J.

The Women's CP NT is currently coached by Tricia Taliaferro.

#### U.S. WOMEN'S DEAF NATIONAL TEAM

## U.S. WOMEN'S DEAF NATIONAL TEAM

The U.S. Women's Deaf National Team officially joined U.S. Soccer's National Team programs in 2022, the same year they won the gold medal at the 2022 Summer Deaflympic Games in Brazil.

The Deaf WNT includes eligible qualifying players who must have a hearing loss of at least 55 decibels in their "better ear." If you or someone you know qualifies for the Women's Deaf National Team and plays at a high level, you can contact us via email at extendedNT@ussoccer.org for more information on potential playing opportunities.

Soccer, as with other team sports played with deaf participants, dates back to the founding of each sport; in the case of soccer, in England, the first organized game between deaf teams was played in 1871. However, United States participation in international soccer came along rather recently.

Internationally organized deaf sports date back to the formation of The Comite International des Sports des Sourds, founded in Paris, France on August, 1924. In the United States, the American Athletic Union of the deaf was formed in 1945, with the name being changed to the USA Deaf Sports Federation in 1997.

In 1965, the United States first entered a men's team in the Deaf Olympics, hosted by the United States, The USA team was 10th out of 10th teams. The United States has entered teams in most international deaf sports events since.

The women's team formed to participate in the first Deaflympics in Australia, in 2005, and took the gold medal.

The first foray into the sport for the women's team began in 1999 with a small-sided outdoor tournament in London England, The St. John's Tournament. The USA team were tournament champions.

The U.S. team is currently coached by former U.S. Women's National Team goalkeeper and long-time college coach Amy Griffin with USWNT legend Joy Fawcett serving as an assistant coach.

The U.S. team had great success for many years before officially becoming a U.S. Soccer National Team, winning four Deaflympics and two World Cup championships.

# COMPETITIONS

## FIFA WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Federation Internationale de Football Association (FIFA) conducts eight major outdoor soccer world championships played at the international level. Those tournaments are the FIFA World Cup, the FIFA World Cup, the Men's Olympic Football Tournament, the Women's Olympic Football Tournament, the FIFA Under-20 World Cup, the FIFA Under-17 World Cup, the FIFA Under-20 World Cup and the FIFA Under-17 World Cup. Additionally, FIFA also conducts the Futsal World Cup every four years, and the Beach Soccer World Cup biennially. A quick synopsis of these tournaments is listed below. More detail can be found on USA performances at each of these tournaments throughout the U.S. Men's National Team Media Guide.

### **FIFA WORLD CUP**

The FIFA World Cup has been played 22 times since the first competition in 1930 in Uruguay. The tournament has grown in stature over the years and has become not only the biggest sporting event in the world, but also simply the biggest event in the world every four years. Outside of the USA's third-place finish in the inaugural tournament, the team's quarterfinal run in 2002 is the side's best World Cup finish.

### FIFA WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

The FIFA Women's World Cup has been contested on eight occasions with the USA earning four championships (China '91, USA '99, Canada '15 and France '19), Germany two (USA '03 and China '07) and Norway (Sweden '95) and Japan (Germany '11) one each. The 2011 Women's World Cup featured 16 teams for the fourth time, after seeing 12 compete in both 1991 and 1995. Canada 2015 was the first time the Women's World Cup featured 24 nations while the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup, which will be jointly hosted by Australia and New Zealand, will be expanded to 32 teams.

#### FIFA COMPETITIONS

## **OLYMPIC FOOTBALL TOURNAMENTS**

After competing as an exhibition sport at the 1900 and 1904 Olympic Games, soccer became the first team sport included in the Olympics with the first official tournament dating back to the 1908 London Games when the United Kingdom defeated Denmark to claim the gold medal. Since that time soccer has been part of every Olympiad except the 1932 event in the United States.

On the women's side, the sport wasn't introduced to the Olympics until the 1996 competition in the United States. The U.S. claimed the inaugural gold medal in women's Olympic football by defeating China 2-1 on Aug. 1, 1996, in front of a capacity crowd of 76,481 fans in Athens, Georgia.

The growth of professional football after World War II meant that some of the best players were not eligible to compete in the Olympics. Nevertheless, the Olympic Tournament retained its vitality as a forum for the amateur game. In 1952, Hungary's great generation with players such as Grosics, Czibor, Puskas and Kocsis won the tournament in Helsinki. After that, and until Los Angeles in 1984, all the Olympic titles went to Eastern Europe, a span of eight straight tournaments.

When the Olympics entered the modern era, FIFA was obliged to reconsider its position for the Barcelona 1992 tournament, where, for the first time, the tournament was restricted to Under-23 national teams. In 1996, FIFA altered the U-23 designation slightly, allowing teams to add three overage players into the mix, a rule that is still in effect.

Through the 1928 Olympics in Holland, Olympic caps were counted as full international appearances, but that designation changed with the advent of the World Cup in 1930. Although the Olympic Games football tournament actually falls under the realm of the International Olympic Committee. FIFA presides over the event on behalf of the IOC.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games were postponed to 2021.

### MEN'S OLYMPIC SOCCER TOURNAMENT

#### FIFA COMPETITIONS

### **FIFA UNDER-20 WORLD CUP**

Contested every two years, the FIFA Under-20 World Cup is restricted to players under 20 years of age. The tournament was renamed from the FIFA World Youth Championship in 2006. The U.S. has qualified for the tournament on 16 occasions, finishing fourth in 1989 (Saudi Arabia). At the most recent tournament in 2019 in Poland, the U.S. opened group play with a 2-1 loss to eventual champions Ukraine before reeling off victories against Nigeria (2-0) and Qatar (1-0) to advance to the knockout stage. In the Round of 16, the U-20 MNT won a thrilling game against favorites France 3-2 to move on to the quarterfinals where it faced eventual third place finisher Ecuador and dropped an incredibly competitive match, 2-1. The U-20 MNT's performance marked the third consecutive time the team reached the quarterfinals after also doing so in 2017 and 2015, making the USA the only nation to reach the quarterfinals of the last three U-20 World Cups. The 2021 edition of the tournament was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Indonesia will host the tournament in 2023.

### FIFA UNDER-20 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

Renamed the FIFA Under-20 Women's World Cup in 2008, the tournament was staged as a U-20 event for the first time in 2006 after two initial tournaments were played as Under-19 events. The inaugural FIFA U-19 Women's World Championship was held in Canada from Aug. 17-Sept. 1, 2002, with 12 teams. That first tournament was an incredible success, with the USA capturing the first championship via a Lindsay Tarpley golden goal in a 1-0 victory in front of 47,784 fans in Edmonton, Canada. The U.S. fell to Germany in the semifinals in Thailand in 2004, and in 2006 finished out of the top three for the first time in program history. In 2008, however, Golden Ball winner Sydney Leroux and Silver Ball winner Alex Morgan returned the U.S. to the top of the podium. After getting knocked out once again in penalty kicks in 2010, this time in the quarterfinal, a 1-0 victory against Germany in the 2012 U-20 Women's World Cup Final in Tokyo capped a remarkable run by the young Americans with defender and captain Julie Johnston) earning the Bronze Ball. In 2014, the USA once again fell on penalty kicks, losing to Korea DPR in a quarterfinal shootout after drawing 1-1, and in 2016 it finished in fourth place after losing to eventual World Cup champion Korea DPR in the semifinal, 2-1. The 2018 edition of the tournament saw the U.S. ousted from a tough group that included champions Japan and runner-up Spain. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 edition of the tournament was postponed and eventually cancelled. At the 2022 U-20 Women's World Cup in Costa Rica, the U.S. failed to advance to the knockout round having been drawn into a challenging group that included eventual runner-up Japan and fourth-place finisher the Netherlands.

## FIFA UNDER-17 WORLD CUP

The Under-17 World Championship is contested every two years for players less than 17 years of age. The U.S. was the only team in the world to qualify for every U-17 World Championship, from the tournament's inception in 1985 through 2013. The first three tournaments were actually played as U-16 World Championship tournaments, but FIFA changed the event to its present U-17 status in 1989. The Concacaf region hosted the tournament for a second time in 2001, when Trinidad & Tobago served as the first-ever Caribbean host for a FIFA World Championship. Mexico became the first Concacaf team to win an outdoor men's world championship in 2005 with an impressive triumph in Peru before winning the tournament a second time in 2013 as the host country. The U.S. achieved its best result in 1999, finishing fourth. In 2019, the U-17 MNT did not escape its group which contained semifinalists the Netherlands. Senegal and Japan.

### FIFA UNDER-17 WOMEN'S WORLD CUP

The FIFA Under-17 Women's World Cup was played for the first time in 2008 in New Zealand. The U.S. made an impressive run to the final where it was defeated by Korea DPR in overtime. In 2012 in Azerbaijan, the USA was drawn into a group with eventual finalists France and Korea DPR, and despite not losing a game and earning five points in the group, the young Americans failed to advance to the knockout stage, becoming the first women's team in a FIFA event to earn five points in its group but not advance. The USA did not qualify for the 2010 or 2014 U-17 Women's World Cups, losing in penalty kicks in the semifinal of the qualifying tournaments. The USA failed to advance past the group stage in both 2016 and 2018. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 edition of the tournament was postponed and eventually cancelled. India hosted the 2022 U-17 Women's World Cup, where the USA won its group but fell on penalty kicks in the quarterfinal.

#### **FIFA FUTSAL WORLD CUP**

The FIFA Futsal World Cup has been contested eight times with Brazil winning the first three tournaments, and Spain winning two championships in 2000 and 2004 before Brazil returned to glory as hosts in 2008 and defeated Spain for a fifth title in 2012. The Futsal World Cup is the only indoor tournament hosted by FIFA. The 1992 second-place finish was the best-ever showing in a FIFA event by a U.S. men's team, and came on the heels of a third-place finish in 1989. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 edition of the tournament was postponed to 2021. Portugal defeated defending champions Argentina in the 2021 final, which was contested in Lithuania.

## FIFA BEACH SOCCER WORLD CUP

Beach soccer became a part of the FIFA family in 2005 when the first FIFA Beach Soccer World Cup was staged on Copacabana Beach in Rio de Janeiro. To everyone's surprise, France defeated Portugal in the final, while Brazil fell in the semis; however, Brazil rebounded to win four straight tournaments from 2006-09. 2011 marked the first time the competition was played biennially and ushered in a new era of dominance as Russia upended Brazil in the final before defeating Spain in 2013 to claim a second straight championship. Portugal won at home in 2015, while Brazil returned to glory in 2017 and earned its fifth title. Portugal captured its second title in 2019, which the USA qualified for but did not escape its group that featured semifinalists Japan and host nation Paraguay. The USA qualified again for the 2021 Beach World Cup and nearly beat hosts and eventual champions Russia in the opening match, but did not make it out of the group stage.

### **FIFA CONFEDERATIONS CUP**

The Confederations Cup was contested under FIFA's auspices for the first time in 1997 and replaced the Intercontinental Championship, which was staged in 1992 and 1995 with all three tournaments held in Saudi Arabia. In 1999, the Confederations Cup was held in Mexico and it returned to Asia in 2001, where it was staged as a precursor to the 2002 FIFA World Cup in Korea and Japan. In 2005, the competition became quadrennial, staged one year before the World Cup in the tournament's host country. Brazil won the tournament from 2005-13, defeating the U.S. in the final of the 2009 edition after the USA had built a 2-0 half-time lead. In 2017, defending World Cup champion Germany defeated South American champions Chile, 1-0 to claim its first Confederations Cup title. In 2019, FIFA announced plans to abolish the tournament and replace it instead with a quadrennial, 24-team FIFA Club World Cup.

## **OLYMPIC HISTORY** HISTORY OF SOCCER PARTICIPATION

The first official men's Olympic soccer tournament dates back to the 1908 London Games, when Great Britain defeated Denmark to claim the first soccer gold medal. Since that time soccer has been part of every Olympic Games Program, with the exception of the 1932 Los Angeles Games. The 1940 and 1944 Olympic Games were canceled completely due to the political tensions surrounding World War II.

The United States has competed in the men's Olympic finals 13 times, including five straight tournaments from 1984 to 2000. In addition, the U.S. qualified for – but did not compete in – the 1980 Moscow Games following a boycott by the U.S. Olympic Committee. The U.S. missed out on qualifying for the 2004 Athens Olympics, but returned in 2008 after finishing second at the Concacaf qualifying event, which was held in the U.S. The U.S. me qualified for the 2024 Olympics with a dominant 3-0 win over host Honduras in the 2022 Concacaf U-20 Championship semifinal.

In 2012, the U.S. Women's National Team earned its third straight gold medal and fourth overall when it topped 2011 FIFA Women's World Cup champion Japan on Aug. 9 in front of more than 80,000 spectators at Wembley Stadium in London. The U.S. Men were eliminated in Concacaf qualifying in March, dropping to third place in their group following a late El Salvador goal in the closing seconds of a 3-3 draw on March 26.

Up until and including the 1988 Seoul Games, the Olympic soccer tournament was an unrestricted event, and thus the U.S. Olympic Soccer Team was essentially the U.S. National Team. However the tournament structure has changed since that time, and the restrictions on age and experience of players involved in Olympic competition has been under review by FIFA, which makes all tournament recommendations to the International Olympic Committee (IOC).

The 1992 Barcelona Games proved to be the turning point in the Olympic soccer tournament, when the tournament was competed as an under-23 event for the first time. Host Spain captured the title at Barcelona's famed Nou Camp Stadium in front of 95,000 jubilant fans. Spain's progress in the tournament aided struggling attendances in 1992, which were far lower than expected. There is little doubt that the poor attendance in Spain played a role in the changes made for the 1996 Atlanta Games.

Not only did Atlanta '96 signify the first time women's soccer was included in the Olympic Program, but the men's tournament was adapted from its under-23 format in 1992 to include three "overage" players. "Overage" players are those who were either over 23 years of age or who previously played in an Olympic Games soccer tournament. Claudio Reyna (who was age eligible in 1996, but had competed for the U.S. in 1992), Kasey Keller and Alexi Lalas were the USA's overage players in 1996.

In 2000, veteran defenders Jeff Agoos and Frankie Hejduk, as well as goalkeeper Brad Friedel, were selected as the USA's overage players, helping the team on an unprecedented tournament run, which saw the U.S. advance to the medal round before falling in the semifinals to a strong Spanish team.

For the 2008 Olympics in China, Brian McBride agreed to come out of international retirement and captained a team that included Under-23 stars Sacha Kljestan and Freddy Adu, who had paced the U.S. through qualifying. After a 1-0 victory against Japan in the first game, the U.S. was minutes away from upsetting reigning European champions Netherlands, but had to settle for a 2-2 tie after giving up a late free kick goal. In the third group game, eventual runner-up Nigeria took advantage of a third-minute red card by Michael Orozco and held on for a 2-1 win to send the U.S. home despite earning four points.

The U.S. Women's National Team claimed the inaugural gold medal in women's competition at the Atlanta Games with a 2-1 victory over China before 76,481 fans on Aug. 1, 1996, in Athens, Ga. The attendance mark, which at the time was the largest crowd to ever watch a women's athletic event, set the stage for the incredibly successful Women's World Cup staged in the U.S. in 1999. The gold medal victory culminated an impressive five-game undefeated run through the tournament in which the U.S. Women played in front of packed crowds.

As they did in 1996, the U.S. Women had a strong run to the medal stand in 2000, winning the "Group of

Death" that included China, Nigeria and Norway. In the Gold Medal match, a spirited Norway team refused to yield and eventually took home the gold with a thrilling 3-2 overtime triumph.

The 2004 Athens Games were a fitting end for a number of U.S. veterans, including Mia Hamm, Julie Foudy and Joy Fawcett, who went out of the sport as they came into it: as champions. The never-say-die team won both its semifinal and final matches in overtime, courtesy of a Heather O'Reilly strike against Germany and an Abby Wambach goal against Brazil to claim the gold.

Four years later, the U.S. came into the Olympics without Wambach, the team's top scorer who broke her leg in a preparation match. With Pia Sundhage leading the team into her first world championship as head coach, a new class of players including Hope Solo, Carli Lloyd and surprise leading scorer Angela Hucles led the team to gold with a 1-0 victory over Brazil.

In 2012, the U.S. Women went undefeated at 6-0-0 for the first time at an Olympic tournament. The USA's run included a thrilling come-from-behind victory in the semifinal against Canada, with Alex Morgan scoring the game-winner in the 123rd minute for the latest goal ever scored in a FIFA competition. In the gold medal match, Lloyd scored both U.S. goals against Japan and the USA became the first country – in either men's or women's soccer – to earn a fourth gold.

In 2016, the U.S. women defeated New Zealand 2-0 to open their Olympic tournament in Belo Horizonte, and went on to defeat France 1-0 before drawing Colombia 2-2 in Manaus to win the group. In the quarterfinal round, the USA fell to Sweden in penalty kicks following a 1-1 draw through regulation and extra time despite outshooting Sweden 27 to 6 and dominating much of the match. It was the first time in USWNT's history that the team did not medal at an Olympic tournament.

The U.S. Women returned to the podium in 2021, as the Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games were postponed one year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The USA fell to Sweden in the opening match of group play but responded with a 6-1 win over New Zealand and a 0-0 draw against Australia to finish second in the group and advance to the knockout round. In the quarterfinal round, the USA defeated the Netherlands, 4-2 on penalty kicks, following a riveting 2-2 draw through regulation and extra time. After falling to Canada on a late penalty kick in the semifinal, the USWNT bounced back to win the bronze medal with a 4-3 win over Australia. It was the USWNT's sixth Olympic medal overall, the most of any country.

The U.S. Women became just the second nation to earn a berth into the Olympic Women's Soccer Tournament at Paris '24, joining hosts France after beating Canada, 1-0, to win the 2022 Concacaf W Championship.

## PAN AM GAMES HISTORY OF SOCCER PARTICIPATION

The Pan American Games are held every four years during the summer preceding the Olympic Games. In terms of the number of sports and athletes, the Pan American Games are second in size only to the Olympics. The men's soccer tournament has been part of every Pan American games since its inception and in 1999 women's soccer made its debut.

After scheduling conflicts kept the United States from competing in the 2003 games in Santo Domingo in the Dominican Republic, U.S. Soccer was able to return to the competition at the 2007 event in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. However, conflicts again kept the U.S. out of the 2011 event hosted in Mexico and also precluded participation in all subsequent Pan Am Games.

In 2007, the U.S. Men's team was represented by head coach Bob Jenkins' Under-18 Men's National Team, and after opening the tournament with a strong 2-1 win over Venezuela, the U.S. dropped its next two games and was eliminated. In its second match, the U.S. led Bolivia 2-0 at the half, only to lose 4-2. Against Mexico in its final group game, the teams were tied 0-0 with 15 minutes remaining when the U.S. was reduced to 10 men, and eventually lost 2-0.

That same year, the U.S. Under-20 Women's National Team had a very strong run into the tournament finals, behind a blistering six-goal tournament from Lauren Cheney (U.S. Soccer's Young Female Athlete of the Year in 2007). After winning their group with a 2-1-0 record, head coach Jill Ellis' U-20s defeated the Senior Canada Women's National Team 2-1 in the semifinal, then lost to the full Brazil Women's National Team 5-0 in the final.

In 1999, the U.S. Under-23 National Team competed in the men's tournament, while the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team represented the U.S. in the women's competition held in Winnipeg, Canada. The U.S. Men captured the second Pan-Am Games Bronze Medal in their history with a 2-1 victory over the Canada in the third-place match. Carlos Bocanegra and a young Landon Donovan led the USA with goals in that match.

The Women's U-18 squad captured gold medal in the first-ever Pan American Women's Final with a hard-fought 1-0 win over an older Mexico squad. The U.S. Women dominated their opponents throughout the tournament, going undefeated in six games (5-0-1) while outscoring their opposition 22-2.

The first Pan American Games were held in 1951, but its history goes back two decades earlier. In 1932, the South American delegation of the International Olympic Committee (IOC) proposed the formation of an organization to promote amateur sports in the Americas. The idea led to the first Pan American Sports Congress in Buenos Aires, Argentina, in 1940. The 16 countries represented at the meeting formed the Pan American Sports Committee, and agreed to hold the first Pan American Games in 1942 in Buenos Aires, but World War II forced their postponement.

The idea stayed alive, and the first Pan American Games finally opened in Buenos Aires on Feb. 25, 1951. The organization governing the Games was renamed the Pan American Sports Organization (PASO) and is made up of nations of North, Central and South America and the Caribbean.

The soccer tournament at the Pan American Games has never enjoyed a very high profile, perhaps because in the past competing nations have not sent their strongest team. The one exception was the 1975 Games in Mexico City, when 110,000 spectators turned out at Azteca Stadium to watch the final between Mexico and Brazil.

Like many of the competing nations, the United States has used the competition as a preparation for the Olympic Games. In 1991, the U.S. won its first Pan American gold medal in soccer in Havana, Cuba, defeating Mexico 2-1 in overtime. Former U.S. Men's National Team midfielder Joe-Max Moore scored a sensational free kick to win that game for the Americans.

## CONCACAF WOMEN'S CHAMPIONSHIP HISTORY

#### Hosts, Champions & Qualifiers

Concacaf has hosted 16 competitions that have served as regional championships for women's national teams. The USA has participated in 15 of those tournaments, missing only the 1998 Concacaf Women's Championship when the Americans were automatic qualifiers for the 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup, which it hosted. The USA has won 14 Concacaf championships.

Eight of those tournaments were qualifying events for the FIFA Women's World Cup, five were Olympic Qualifying tournaments, one served as qualifying for both the World Cup and Olympics, and two did not have any qualifying ramifications (the Women's Gold Cup in 2000 and the Concacaf Women's Championship in 1993). The 1996 and 2000 Olympic Women's Soccer Tournaments did not have Concacaf Qualifying events as the teams qualified for the Olympics based on their Women's World Cup finish the previous years.

Three of the tournaments were called Concacaf Women's Gold Cups. Those took place in 2000 (hosted by USA) when it was an eight-team competition that was not a qualifying tournament and featured guest team Brazil; in 2002 in a tournament co-hosted by Canada and the USA that served as the qualifying for the 2003 FIFA Women's World Cup; and a six-team event in 2006 hosted by the USA that served as qualifying for the 2007 FIFA Women's World Cup.

In December 2020, Concacaf announced the launch of a Concacaf Women's Nations League, which will commence play in 2023.

In August 2021, the Confederation announced the qualifying path to the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup, which also served as the path to the 2024 Olympic Games in Paris and, for a few teams, the newly instituted 2024 W Gold Cup.

The newly dubbed 2021 Concacaf W Qualifiers began for all teams – except the USA and Canada – during the FIFA Women's Match Windows in November 2021 and continued in April 2022, and served as the preliminary round of the 2022 Concacaf W Championship. The eight team Concacaf W Championship was held in July 2022 and consisted of group play, followed by semifinal and championship rounds. Along with qualifying for the World Cup, at conclusion of the Concacaf W Championship, the winning nation – the USA – guaranteed its place in the 2024 Paris Summer Olympic Games Women's Football Tournament and the 2024 Concacaf W Gold Cup. The runner-up (Canada) and the third-place nation (Jamaica) progressed to a Concacaf Olympic play-in to be played in September of 2023. The winner of the play-in will also guarantee their place in the 2024 Paris Summer Olympic Games and the 2024 W Gold Cup.

Inspired by the U.S. WNT players, SheBelieves is an initiative led by U.S. Soccer to inspire and encourage women and girls. The campaign launched in the run-up to the 2015 Women's World Cup and has since grown into a powerful message of empowerment and believing in oneself. The SheBelieves Cup, presented by Visa, is a four-team elite international tournament, represents a showcase event for the campaign, which also features efforts such as the SheBelieves Summit, presented by Deloitte, a forum bringing together young professionals and leaders in sport and business, SheBelieves Hero<sup>™</sup>, a nationwide search for a young community leader who embodies the SheBelieves ethos, SheBelieves Academy, an online learning tool conceived in partnership with author Joan Kuhl and designed to help young women achieve personally and professionally, and SheChampions, a coach mentorship program concepted in collaboration with former head coach Jill Ellis to increase the number of female coaches in the U.S. through mentorship, resources, and support.

#### 2022 SHEBELIEVES CUP

The 2022 SheBelieves Cup featured the first two match days at the Dignity Health Sports Park in Carson, Calif., before moving to Toyota Stadium in Frisco, Tex., for the final doubleheader. The USA's opening game was a surprising 0-0 draw with a talented Czech Republic team, but most of the credit went to Czech goalkeeper Barbora Votíková who made eight saves to help her side earn a point. The USA then rallied to rout New Zealand (in a match that oddly featured three own goals by the same New Zealand player) and Iceland, both by 5-0 scores, to win the tournament. Mallory Pugh scored three times for the USA, but Catarina Macario was named MVP after her two goals in the finale against Iceland. Ashley Hatch and Kristie Mewis also scored for the USA in the tournament. Iceland finished second in a fine performance after defeating New Zealand, 1-0, and downing Czech Republic, 2-1, while the Czechs and the Football Ferns finished third and fourth, respectively after not winning a match.

#### **2021 SHEBELIEVES CUP**

In the 2021 SheBelieves Cup, which was held exclusively at Exploria Stadium in Orlando, Fla. due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the USA swept the competition and became the first nation to win back-to-back SheBelieves Cup titles. The Americans swept all three matches, 1-0 vs. Canada, 2-0 vs. Brazil and 6-0 vs. Argentina, and in the process, became and the first team to not allow a single goal at the competition. USWNT midfielder Rose Lavelle was awarded the Visa SheBelieves Cup MVP award and scored the game-winning goal vs. Canada in the USA's first match of the Tournament. Christen Press and Megan Rapinoe scored in the win over Brazil, who finished second after wins over Canada (2-0) and Argentina (4-1). Canada's lone win of the tournament came in a 1-0 victory over fellow SheBelieves Cup debutant Argentina. The 2021 SheBelieves Cup produced a total of 17 goals.

#### **2020 SHEBELIEVES CUP**

In the 2020 SheBelieves Cup, which was the USA's final competition before the sports world shut down (it would be 261 days before the USA would play again), the American women took the title while sweeping all three games, 2-0 vs. England, 1-0 vs. Spain and 3-1 vs. Japan. The victory against Spain came on a last gasp header from Julie Ertz that whipped the sold-out crowd at Red Bull Arena into a frenzy. Spain finished second after wins over Japan (3-1) and England (1-0) and Alexia Putellas, who scored twice in the tournament, was named the first-ever SheBelieves Cup Visa MVP. England managed to beat Japan, 1-0, in its middle match, but fell to the USA and Spain in its first and last games, respectively. A Japan team in transition allowed the most goals in the tournament (7) and failed to win a game, finishing fourth. After a 19-goal bonanza in 2019, the 2020 SheBelieves Cup Produced 13 total scores.

## Cindy Parlow CONE

## **U.S. Soccer President**

Cindy Parlow Cone is first female President of U.S. Soccer, the second sitting National Soccer Hall of Fame inductee and the first to hold the position who played for a senior U.S. National Team. Cone was elevated from Vice President to President of the U.S. Soccer Federation on March 12, 2020. She is also one of only nine female federation presidents across FIA's 211 member associations (as of May 3, 2022).

She was first elected Vice President of U.S. Soccer in February of 2019 at the U.S. Soccer Annual General Meeting and served in the position for a year, completing the term that was vacated. She then was re-elected to a full, four-year term at the 2020 AGM in February.

While leading the Federation back to resuming programming through the COVID-19 global pandemic, which began just after her being elevated to President, Cone's priorities included focusing on improving U.S. Soccer's efforts to take meaningful action in the diversity, equity, inclusion and belonging space, bringing commercial rights back in house, team building, and leading efforts to grow the game in all its forms.

Cone was then re-elected as U.S. Soccer's President during the National Council Meeting at the Federation's Annual General Meeting in Atlanta on March 5, 2022, after earning 52.9 percent of the weighted vote in a two-candidate race.

In May 2022, under Cone's leadership, U.S. Soccer and the United States Women's National Team Players Association (USWNTPA) and the United States National Soccer Team Players Association (USNSTPA) agreed to terms on historic, first-of-their-kind collective bargaining agreements (CBAs) that achieved equal pay through identical economic terms, setting the global standard moving forward in international soccer.

Cone is a title-winning coach at the grassroots, collegiate and professional levels and holds a USSF "A" coaching license. During the past 20 years, she has served on numerous committees, including the FIFA Steering Committee, the U.S. Soccer Medical Advisory Committee, Appeals Committee, and the Athletes' Council.

The Memphis, Tennessee native was a star for the U.S. Women's National Team during a career that spanned 1996-2004, earning 158 caps while scoring 75 goals, which still stands as 8th all-time on the USA's all-time goals list. Her seven career hat tricks are still second all-time behind Mia Hamm and Carli Lloyd. She also had 35 career assists. In 1998, she won U.S. Soccer's inaugural Young Female Player of the Year Award.

At 5-foot-11, she was a towering presence on the USA's forward line. During her career she was a two-time Olympic gold medal winner (1996 & 2004) and a member of the historic 1999 Women's World Cup winning side, scoring two goals in that tournament including a diving header against Nigeria in group play and the crucial opening score in the 2-0 semifinal victory against Brazil.

She played her last match for the U.S. WNT on Dec. 8, 2004, in a 5-0 win against Mexico at The Home Depot Center in Carson, Calif., in what was also the final match for Mia Hamm, Julie Foudy, Brandi Chastain and Joy Fawcett (who was on the bench but did not play).

She is the youngest player ever to win both an Olympic gold medal and a Women's World Cup title. In total, she played in nine Olympic matches and 11 World Cup matches. In 2000, she led the USA with 19 goals, which was her career high in a calendar year. She had four hat tricks that year, one shy of a U.S. record for a single year.

She also played for the USA's Youth National Teams and played three seasons in the WUSA, the USA's first women's pro league, advancing to two championship games with the Atlanta Beat.

Inducted into the National Soccer Hall of Fame in 2018, Cone was a four-time All-American at the University of North Carolina, scored 68 goals and totaled 53 assists in 103 games, and was on teams that won two NCAA titles. She won both the Hermann Trophy and the M.A.C. Player of the Year awards as the consensus college soccer player of the year as a junior and a senior, which at the time, paired her with Mia Hamm as the only two-time winners of both awards. Cone was also pioneer of sorts for college soccer, entering UNC early after three years of high school. She majored in Education at UNC.

She also served as an assistant coach at UNC, winning four NCAA titles, including 2012 when she took the coaching lead due to an illness to head coach Anson Dorrance's wife.

She was also the first head coach to win a National Women's Soccer League championship, guiding Portland Thorns FC to the title in 2013 during the league's inaugural season.

Cone is on the board for the non-profit Goals for Girls, an organization that uses "soccer to teach leadership skills in young women and teach them how to be agents of change, in their own lives and in their communities."

She is currently the Girls' Director for NCFC Youth in the Durham-Chapel Hill area.

In the summer of 2007, she married John Cone in Chapel Hill. She has a street – Cindy Parlow Drive – named after her in her hometown of Memphis, Tenn.

## JT BATSON

## CEO / Secretary General U.S. Soccer Federation



JT Batson was named CEO / Secretary General of the U.S. Soccer Federation on Sept. 26, 2022.

Batson fell in love with soccer at a young age. He played club soccer for Augusta Arsenal growing up in Georgia and later helped run the club while serving as a referee and a referee assignor, mowing and lining fields and working in coaching recruitment. He has coached boys and girls at the grassroots level and has been active in supporting his childhood soccer club as a member of the Augusta Arsenal Soccer Club advisory board.

A long-time member of the soccer community, he feels his experience in grassroots soccer helped shape who he is today, an executive who prides himself on doing the work necessary to achieve goals and create important bonds with employees and partners while also teaching and mentoring.

A strong believer in the power of teamwork, the first software he ever worked on was for the assigning of youth soccer referees for tournament organizers. He also paid for college, in part, by working soccer camps. He has described his young self as being a kid that didn't dream of playing in a World Cup, but instead of organizing one. Like for many, the 1994 FIFA World Cup held in the USA had a profound impact on Batson and opened his eyes to the potential and global impact of soccer. It was a rallying cry to think big about soccer in the USA, and a watershed event for his generation, showing how big investment can impact the future while setting the stage for the 2026 FIFA World Cup to impact many more soccer fans of all ages.

Batson has spent his professional career at the intersection of media, advertising and technology, focused on solving challenging problems at scale through innovation and collaboration.

A former member of U.S. Soccer Finance Committee, Batson comes to the Federation with experience heading large companies. He previously served as CEO of Hudson MX, a 425-person NYC- and Atlanta-based software company, which he co-founded and where he will remain a member of the board, that focuses on workflow and financial software for the advertising ecosystem.

His previous work with U.S. Soccer led to him helping spearhead the creation of the U.S. Soccer Development Fund which raises money to support U.S. Soccer's development of world-class players, coaches and referees, all with the goal of continuing to inspire a nation.

Prior to founding Hudson MX, he was an Entrepreneur in Residence at Greylock Partners and Accel Partners.

Batson began his career as an early employee of Mozilla focused on international growth efforts of the then-nascent Firefox browser. He subsequently joined the Rubicon Project pre-revenue where he helped scale the company to six countries as the EVP, Revenue and Global Development. He's also served in executive roles at Mediaocean and Cumulus Media.

He is currently on the Undergraduate Cabinet at Stanford, from which he graduated with a BA in Political Science and where he won the JE Wallace Sterling Award, an honor that recognizes the graduating senior whose undergraduate leadership and volunteer activities have made the largest impact on the Stanford community.

As an undergrad at Stanford, he worked with the men's and women's soccer programs as a student assistant focused on recruiting, soccer operations, marketing, camps and fundraising. The Stanford men's basketball teams took notice, and he also worked with that program, building a recruiting CRM system, managing dynamic ticket process and fan development. He also continued to referee during his college years, experiences that included running the middle during several scrimmages for the local professional teams.

Batson is a member of the board of the LGBTQ+ entrepreneur focused non-profit StartOut. He also serves on the board of directors for the NYC Ballet. Batson has guest taught at Stanford's Hasso Plattner Institute of Design and the Graduate School of Business.

## U.S. SOCCER REFEREE PROGRAM

The U.S. Soccer Federation Referee Program's membership ranks among the largest of all FIFA nations with nearly 120,000 registered officials, mentors, coaches, and assignors. Officials registered with U.S. Soccer work sanctioned games at all levels of competition including youth, adult, professional, and international matches.

### **Referee Education Resources**

U.S. Soccer is committed to producing referee education resources aimed at supporting officials regularly working amateur games at the youth and adult levels. These officials represent the foundation of the U.S. Soccer Referee Program and their training and development is paramount to the success of the program. This is accomplished through the development of targeted training materials and standardized curriculums supporting specific levels of competition.

### **Referee Identification and Training**

These initiatives focus on identifying and training high potential officials with the ability to referee at the professional and international levels. These efforts see U.S. Soccer assign a network of highly qualified referees, referee mentors and referee coaches to various elite-level regional and national events. Quantitative and qualitative data from these events are used to classify the program's up-and-coming and high performing officials.

### The Professional Referee Organization (PRO)

The Professional Referee Organization is the organization responsible for managing the referee, assistant referee, and vmo program in professional soccer leagues in the United States and Canada, working alongside the U.S. Soccer Federation, Major League Soccer, United Soccer League and National Women's Soccer League.

The organization's goals are to increase the quality of officiating in U.S. and Canadian professional leagues, develop more professional-quality officials at a younger age, and produce officials who will represent the United States and Canada in FIFA competitions.

### **2023 FIFA International Panel**

A list of international referees and assistant referees that are eligible to officiate FIFA sanctioned matches in the coming year is announced annually by FIFA. The current American contingent totals 13 referees, 17 assistant referees, 10 video match officials, some of whom are also referees or assistant referees, and one futsal referee.





## U.S. SOCCER'S COACHING DEPARTMENT AND NATIONAL COACHING SCHOOLS

U.S. Soccer Coaching Education was established in the early 1970s by famed West German teacher and coach Dettmar Cramer. Each level of the U.S. Soccer Coaching License Pathway is designed to meet the needs of coaches ranging from the coach who is inexperienced in soccer to the former professional player who desires to coach in amateur, professional, or international competitions.

U.S. Soccer has licensed thousands of coaches in the decades since the department was first founded. U.S. Soccer is committed to providing soccer coaches with up-to-date theoretical and practical knowledge so coaches can develop to their full potential. The diagram below shows the current U.S. Soccer Coaching License Pathway.



U.S. Soccer provides courses in which coaches can earn nationally-recognized certifications that afford them opportunities and recognition inherent in the attainment of various levels of coaching expertise. Proven curriculums improve coaches' knowledge of the game and provide valuable information on current coaching trends and international developments in the game.

The course curriculums are based on sets of tasks that a coach must carry out. These tasks are defined as coaching matches, coaching training sessions, leading the team, leading the player, managing a performance environment, leadership and more. Coaches are educated and assessed based on the progression of these tasks relative to each course within the license pathway.

"A" (Senior and Youth), "B" and "C" level courses span four to ten months and take place over a series of meetings. Candidates have an opportunity to practically apply what they have learned in their home environment with their own team between meetings. U.S. Soccer staff typically travel to assess candidates in their home environment for the Pro, A-Senior and A-Youth courses.

U.S. Soccer also offers "C", "D" and Grassroots level courses that are available through member organizations. While the member organizations are responsible for the execution of these courses, the curriculum is developed and overseen by U.S. Soccer Coaching Education. #### Introduction to Grassroots Coaching

The Introduction to Grassroots Coaching is a cost-free, online module intended for all parents and coaches of youth players. The focus of this grassroots introduction is to share U.S. Soccer's best practices in creating a fun, supportive, activity-centered and age-appropriate environment for grassroots players.

#### **Grassroots Licenses**

The eight Grassroots courses, which replaced the "F" and "E" License courses, offer an a-la-carte approach meant to empower coaches with education that is relevant to their specific coaching needs. The Grassroots Licenses will help coaches ensure fun, enjoyable, and developmentally appropriate environments for their players. Student-coaches will learn how to understand the basic needs of grassroots players, the basic structure of the game, the basic structure of a grassroots training session and the basic tasks of a grassroots coach.

#### **"D" License**

The National "D" license is a 45 to 60-hour course for the grassroots coach who meets the prerequisites outlined above. The focus of this course is to prepare coaches to work with youth teams (U-6 to U-19) in a participation environment. Coaches will learn to create game-like training sessions and a gameday environment that encourages players' ownership of their decision-making. The course consists of a mix of classroom lectures and field sessions that focus on using the Play-Practice-Play training methodology.

#### **"C" License**

The "C" license prepares coaches to work with youth teams (U-11 to U-19) in a participation environment. The goals of the course are to educate student-coaches in creating a series of progressive game-like training sessions that encourage players' ownership of their decision-making and create a gameday environment linked to training session goals.

#### "B" License

The "B" license prepares coaches to work with youth (U-13+) or senior teams in a performance environment. The goals of the course are to educate candidates in implementing a game model based on a style of play as well as creating and implementing a coaching structure to influence players during games and training sessions.

#### **A-Youth License**

The A-Youth License prepares coaches to work as a head coach with youth teams in a highperformance environment. The course runs for 10 months, typically including three in-person meetings and three development periods. Candidates are educated in creating and articulating a style of play in a game model as well as creating and implementing a training and coaching methodology to develop the team and individual players during training sessions and games.

#### **A-Senior License**

The A-Senior License prepares coaches to work as a head coach with a senior team in a highperformance environment. Similar to the A-Youth License, candidates are educated in creating and articulating a style of play in a game model as well as creating and implementing a training and coaching methodology to develop the team and individual players during training sessions and games.

#### **Pro License**

The Pro License prepares candidates to work as a head coach with a senior team at the highest level of national and international professional soccer. The primary goals of the course are to educate the student-coach in developing a winning team culture, creating a game model that aligns with the club culture, the quality of the players and beliefs of the coach, and developing and using a leadership style that drives the high-performance environment. The year-long course is centered around the management of a professional team.

### SUPPLEMENTAL PATHWAY

#### **Coach Educator License**

The Coach Educator License prepares student-coach educators (SCEs) with the necessary competencies required to teach U.S. Soccer Coaching Courses (Grassroots to Pro). The goals of the course are to develop a deeper understanding of the U.S. Soccer Coaching Education Philosophy & Principles and to facilitate a self-regulated learning process that allows for SCEs to guide, support, engage and challenge student-coaches throughout their own learning process. The course is divided into four sequential parts; Base Course (Part 1), Course Level Pathway (Part 2), Apprenticeship (Part 3), and Summative Assessment (Part 4).

#### **Academy Director License**

The Academy Director License is designed to meet the high demands and standards of leading an academy in an elite youth development environment. The goals of the course are to educate student-coaches in creating an elite training and competitive environment that is aligned with the club philosophy and creating a culture of excellence that seeks to develop a complete player on and off the field.

#### **Talent Scout**

The Talent Scout License prepares youth scouts to learn the process of identification, examination and monitoring of potential (top) talented players. Students will acquire or further develop the competencies (knowledge, skills, attitude) and personal traits necessary to work as a Talent Scout. The primary goal of the course is to help youth scouts learn the process of identification, examination and monitoring of potential (top) talented players.

#### **Coach For Community**

Coach For Community is a free educational resource. The target is to provide the necessary tools and resources for coaches to create the most impactful learning environments for players. While the primary focus is on entry-level coaches, the program is open to all. The three key program objectives are to share best practices for player development including coaching games and practices (with a focus on U.S. Soccer's Play-Practice-Play methodology), provide expertise in grassroots coach education and player development, and to make connections with local soccer leaders.

Each individual that completes a free registration in U.S. Soccer's Learning Center and participates in the event will receive a \$25 voucher to be used towards one of the four online courses.

### U.S. Soccer National Development Center

Home to U.S. Soccer Coaching Education and Sporting Kansas City's first team, the National Development Center celebrated its grand opening on May 16, 2018. The \$75 million, 50.49-acre facility, which serves as the home to the U.S. Soccer Coaching Education department, is also home to Children's Mercy Sports Medicine Center. Sporting the latest soccer-specific technology and sports medicine innovations, the NDC represents the future of the sport in the United States and aligns with U.S. Soccer's primary objective of improving the sport at all levels.

Located along the north side of the NDC, the U.S. Soccer Coaching Education Center provides a world-class environment designed to maximize the development of coaches. With full-time administrative and technical staff, two locker rooms, four classrooms with operable walls, six breakout rooms, all-day cafeteria access, two full-size, synthetic turf fields with LED sports lighting, and a two-story coaching pavilion, the NDC will host more than its fair share of U.S. Soccer coaching courses over the coming years.

The NDC is located at 1913 Pinnacle Way in Kansas City, KS. Sitting approximately 1.5 miles northeast of Children's Mercy Park, Sporting Kansas City's home venue, the NDC is about a 20-minute ride from the Kansas City International Airport and equidistant from downtown Kansas City (Missouri).

### U.S. Soccer National Training Center

U.S. Soccer's National Training Center at Dignity Health Sports Park in Carson, Calif., stands as one of the great achievements in the organization's 100-plus-year history. What started as a vision in 1999 became a reality with its construction in 2003 and is now widely hailed as an exemplar of sports infrastructure in the United States.

The complex is a first-class facility that shows the integration of all U.S. National Team programs, from talent identification camps straight through to the full Men's and Women's National Teams playing in the main stadium.

The National Training Center officially opened on June 6, 2003, as the U.S. Under-17 Men's National Team arrived to begin training. The first game at what is now known as Dignity Health Sports Park was played in the stadium one day later on June 7, 2003, as the Los Angeles Galaxy topped the Colorado Rapids 2-0 in Major League Soccer action.

Located on the campus of California State University, Dominguez Hills, the National Training Center includes four grass soccer fields, two FieldTurf soccer fields and a general training area. The complex also includes three additional practice fields, as well as all the necessary team support facilities, including locker rooms, a training room, a weight room and office space for staff. U.S. Soccer has approximately 10 full-time staff working out of the National Training Center.

In a very short time, the National Training Center established itself as the center of the soccer world in the United States and was the main reason the United States was able to serve as an emergency host for the 2003 FIFA Women's World Cup. The facility hosted early round games, as well as the third-place match and the final on short notice after the tournament was moved from China to the United States.

The stadium has also hosted numerous international and professional tournaments, including the Concacaf Gold Cup, Champions League, SuperLiga and InterLiga, while also attracting some of the largest clubs in the world for friendlies.

Currently, the *Soccer for Success* program serves more than 40,000 children in over 180 communities across the country. To date, more than 100,000 youth have participated in *Soccer for Success*.

To address some of the challenges created by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Foundation adapted the Soccer for Success program. Partners now have access to the Soccer for Success curriculum that provides coachmentors with training, tools, and practice plans to run virtual or in-person socially distanced sessions.

To bring elements of the program to all children and families, the Foundation created Soccer for Success at Home which incorporates the program's five components. This free online hub includes videos, activities, and resources.

#### **SAFE PLACES TO PLAY**

In addition to programming, the U.S. Soccer Foundation works to provide children with safe and accessible places to play by transforming underutilized spaces into soccer fields. In communities where space is at a premium, the Foundation developed the 'mini-pitch' to provide customized solutions to meet communities' needs. The Foundation's *Safe Places to Play* program also provides grants to organizations to help them build or enhance field space(s) in their communities.

#### PASSBACK

Since 2002, the U.S. Soccer Foundation's *Passback* program has collected and redistributed more than one million pieces of soccer equipment to children in underserved communities. Thanks to dedicated individuals, soccer clubs, and organizations that collect and donate soccer equipment, the *Passback* program is able to bring the game of soccer to children who love the sport but can't afford the gear to play.

In addition to its programs, the Foundation is dedicated to assisting those who serve youth through soccer in underserved communities. Each year the Foundation organizes the Urban Soccer Symposium, an event which brings together non-profit organizations that directly support soccer programs and projects to share funding resources, best practices and other technical expertise. The Foundation has laid the groundwork for networking and partnership opportunities among urban soccer programs nationwide.

### NATIONAL SOCCER HALL OF FAME

The National Soccer Hall of Fame (NSHOF) is a public-private partnership among FC Dallas, the City of Frisco, Frisco Independent School District and U.S. Soccer Federation. The NSHOF, part of a \$55 million renovation at Toyota Stadium in Frisco, Texas, contains two components: The NSHOF Experience and the HOF Club.

The NSHOF Experience is a 10,000-square foot segment of the NSHOF that honors the past, while fully incorporating modern technology of the present and future including virtual reality, gesture technology and interactive digital video boards throughout to celebrate the players and builders of American soccer that have elevated the sport to where it is today. It features interactive exhibits and iconic soccer memorabilia and serves as the home for Hall of Fame induction ceremonies annually.

The NSHOF's home in Frisco opened in 2018 after not having a home for seven years, with the previous home located in Oneonta, N.Y. from 1979-2010. The NSHOF was officially recognized by U.S. Soccer in 1983.

What is now the National Soccer Hall of Fame first sprang to life in 1950 when a group of former professional and amateur players from the Philadelphia "Old-timers" Association took it upon themselves to recognize the achievements of soccer in America. Decades after the "Old-timers" first got together, more than 300 members have been elected to the Hall of Fame for their outstanding contributions to American soccer, both on and off the field.


The Hall of Fame also possesses an archive of more than 80,000 items, which make up one of the largest collections of soccer artifacts and records in the world. The collection includes such rare pieces as the world's oldest soccer ball (made in the USA) and both the 1991 and 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup trophies. The collection also includes the North American Soccer League archive, the 1994 FIFA World Cup USA archive, a rare soccer photography collection from New York depression-era photographer John Albok, materials from the U.S. National Teams in World Cup competition and artifacts from the American Soccer League of the 1920's and 1950's.

Members are elected annually via three ballots – Player, Builder and Veteran (player), and since 2018 have been inducted in Frisco, Texas. Beginning with the Class of 2021, a 96-member Selection Committee consisting of Hall of Famers, media members, historians and soccer executives and coaches participate in annual elections. Starting with the election of the Class of 2022, the maximum number of inductees is three Players, one Builder and one Veteran.

The USA's 3.9 million registered players are the second most in the world, behind only Germany (6.3 million\*), and ahead of third-ranked Brazil (2.1 million\*).

Soccer continues to see impressive participation growth at the high school and collegiate levels. In the 2014-15 academic year, Soccer was fourth most popular high school sport for girls (behind only track and field, volleyball and basketball) with 375,681 participants, but showed the steepest continued incline in new participants^ over the last 15 years. Participation levels increase for soccer at the collegiate level relative to all other sports with only track and field involving more athletes; however new track and field team numbers are stagnant, while colleges and universities continue adding women's soccer programs with 599 having been started throughout the country since 1988-89.+

With approximately 145,000 registered referees, the U.S. is second in the world behind only Japan.

According to the 2010 FIFA Big Count, there are nearly 800,000 soccer officials in the U.S. (coaches, referees, administrators).

## SOCCER ON TELEVISION

After years of fruitful media rights partnerships in both English and Spanish with FOX, ESPN and Univision, U.S. Soccer struck an eight-year media rights partnership with Warner Bros. Discovery in 2022 for its Englishlanguage rights and a four-year deal with NBCUniversal Telemundo Enterprises at the beginning of 2023 for its Spanish language rights.

Between the two, 75 percent of USMNT and USWNT matches will be broadcast on linear TV and all will be simulcast across each partner's streaming properties. More importantly, for the first time ever, all USWNT matches will be broadcast in Spanish, resulting in 100 percent coverage of both National Teams across English and Spanish language for the first time ever. The National Teams will also receive significant promotional support across other high-profile sport properties (NBA, English Premier League, Olympics, FIFA World Cup, etc.) and entertainment franchises.

### 2018/2019/2022/2023 FIFA WORLD CUP TELEVISION RIGHTS

In October of 2011, the amazing growth of the sport was demonstrated when a bidding war over the U.S. broadcast rights for the 2018 and 2022 FIFA World Cups and 2019 and 2023 FIFA Women's World Cups played out in Zurch, Switzerland. In the end, a record sum of more than \$1 billion was paid by Fox and Telemundo, an increase of more than 147 percent over the combined \$425 million that ESPN and Univisión paid for the rights to the 2010 and 2014 tournaments.

Fox paid a reported \$450 to \$500 million to beat out ESPN and NBC for the English rights, while Telemundo is said to have paid \$600 million to outbid Univision for the Spanish rights. Additionally, FIFA granted FOX the U.S. broadcast rights for the 2026 World Cup, which was awarded to the United Bid from Canada, Mexico and the United States at the 2018 FIFA Congress.

# FIFA

### FIFA - SOCCER'S WORLD GOVERNING BOARD

Founded in 1904 to provide unity among national soccer associations, the Federation Internationale de Football Association (FIFA) boasts 211 members, rivaling that of the United Nations, and is arguably the most prestigious sports organization in the world.

FIFA was established on May 21, 1904, by seven national associations — Belgium, Denmark, France, Netherlands, Spain, Sweden and Switzerland — to "promote the game of Association Football (as opposed to rugby or American football), to foster friendly relations among National Associations, Confederations, their officials and players, by promoting the organization of football matches at all levels, and to control every type of association football by taking steps as shall be deemed necessary or advisable."

FIFA's birth was a result of the growing number of international games shortly after the dawn of the 20th century. Soccer leaders in Europe felt that such expanded competition required a governing body, and under the leadership of Robert Guerin, a French journalist, the seven founding members gathered in Paris to shape the future of the sport. Guerin, FIFA's first president, presided over the organization from 1904 to 1906. Seven other men have also served as FIFA president, including Jules Rimet for 33 years from 1921 to 1954.

Currently, Italy's Gianni Infantino serves as FIFA president, having been elected in 2016's Extraordinary Congress held in the wake of corruption allegations against numerous FIFA Officials that resulted in former president Joseph "Sepp" Blatter stepping aside and then being banned from FIFA by its Ethics Committee. FIFA's general secretary since 2009, Infantino served a three-year term as FIFA president and was re-elected for a second term at the 2019 FIFA Presidential Election during the 69th FIFA Congress in Paris on June 5.

Under FIFA's governance soccer has become the world's most popular sport. According to the Federation's 2006 "Big Count," the game is played by more than 150 million registered athletes — including 10 million women — and viewed by billions of fans in stadiums and on television worldwide.


As soccer's ultimate administrative authority, FIFA governs all facets of the game: regulating the rules of play, overseeing the transfers of players internationally, organizing international competitions such as the FIFA World Cup, establishing standards for refereeing, coaching and sports medicine, and encouraging soccer's development around the world.

Among the official world championships staged by FIFA are the World Cup, the Women's World Cup, the Under-20 World Cup, the Under-20 Women's World Cup, the Under-17 World Cup, the Beach Soccer World Cup and the Futsal World Cup. Additionally, FIFA oversees the men's and women's Olympic Football Tournament staged under the auspices of the International Olympic Committee every four years. FIFA has also staged the FIFA Confederations Cup, a competition between each of its confederations' champions, and the FIFA Club World Cup, which was held at the beginning of 2000 for the first time in Brazil.

### HOST OF THE WORLD'S GAME

The Confederation of North, Central America and Caribbean Association Football (Concacaf) was founded in 1961 and serves as the organizing body for 41 national associations, including the United States, and spans from Canada in the north to Suriname in the south. Concacaf organizes international competition in a number of events, including the Champions League, qualifying tournaments for all FIFA competitions and the Gold Cup.

2022 marked a full return to competitions as youth programming resumed, with the Concacaf Women's U-20 Championship and the Concacaf Women's U-17 Championship both being claimed by the USA. The U.S. Men's Youth National Team claimed the 2022 Concacaf U-20 Championship in Honduras, which was originally cancelled due to COVID-19 in 2020.

The USA won the 2022 Concacaf W Championship with a thrilling win over Canada, thereby earning its berth to the 2023 Women's World Cup and the 2024 Olympic Games. The feat came after Concacaf announced in 2020 that it would launch new senior Women's National Team competitions to benefit the entire Confederation beginning in 2021, which would conclude with qualifying for the Women's World Cup and the 2024 Olympics as well as the first Concacaf Women's Nations League tournament.

The structure of new competitions is aimed at transforming Women's National Team football across the entire confederation. The new calendar prioritizes providing more official match dates for all Concacaf region women's senior national teams and ensuring there is elite competition to showcase the highest level of women's international football. Through this new calendar, Concacaf will more than double the number of official senior women's national team matches compared with the former cycle of competitions. This major development for the women's game followed the launch in June 2019 of Concacaf W – the Confederation's women's football strategy – which has focused on working with Concacaf Member Associations (MAs) to grow all aspects of women's football in North and Central America and the Caribbean.

After a shutdown of all competitions due to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, the originally postponed inaugural Concacaf Nations League Final Four took place in Denver, Colorado from June 3-6, 2021. The United States claimed the title after defeating archrivals Mexico in extra time with a penalty kick goal from Christian Pulisic and a dramatic penalty kick save from Ethan Horvath in the dying moments of the match. The USA would earn its second consecutive Concacaf major title just one month later after beating Mexico yet again to claim the 2021 Gold Cup.

Additionally, the Concacaf Men's Olympic Qualifying Championship which was to be held in March 2020 and the start of Men's World Cup qualifying, which was to hold its first windows in September and November that same year, were all postponed and played on those same dates in 2021. Of course, the 2020 Tokyo Olympics was also postponed until 2021 and the United States won the bronze medal.

While the Under-20 Women's World Cup qualifying did take place in January 2020 – and was won by the USA – many events didn't take place, including qualifying for the U-17 Women's World Cup. Both youth Women's World Cups were eventually cancelled by FIFA, as were the Men's Youth World Cups for '21 because qualifying could not be held.

2019 was a positive year for Concacaf in that the U.S. Women's National Team claimed its fourth Women's World Cup title, winning all seven games in France en route to the historic title which concluded with a 2-0 victory against the Netherlands in Lyon, France. In his first major tournament since taking the helm of the U.S. Men's National Team, head coach Gregg Berhalter marshaled a young and developing side to the 2019 Concacaf Gold Cup Final where they fell in a 1-0 thriller against Mexico. The USA also finished atop its group in Concacaf Nations League play in the fall.

Concacaf kicked off the summer of 2018 with the announcement that the United Bid of the United States, Canada and Mexico was awarded the right to host the 2026 FIFA World Cup. In October, three teams: the USA, Canada, and Jamaica, qualified for the 2019 FIFA World Cup in France. Jamaica became the first women's team from the Caribbean to qualify for a FIFA Wornen's World Cup while the USA won its 12th regional title.

In 2017, the United States won the biannual Confederation championship in thrilling fashion with a 2-1 win against Jamaica in the 2017 Gold Cup Final.

The previous year in 2016, Concacaf hosted the Copa America Centenario in honor of the 100th anniversary of the world's oldest international football tournament. In stunning fashion, Chile retained the Copa America crown it had also won a year earlier in a rematch against Argentina in the Centenario Final that drew 82,026 fans, making it the most well-attended final of the Millennium. Staged outside South America for the first time, the tournament featured six teams from Concacaf and all 10 teams from CONMEBOL as the two American Confederations partnered for the historic competition, setting a new standard for worldwide interconfederation cooperation.

2015 began Concacaf's current run of hosting the world's largest football tournaments when it held the FIFA Women's World Cup in Canada – which was won by the USA -- its first World Cup at the full international level since the United States hosted the Women's World Cup in 2003. In recent history, Concacaf has hosted the 2014 U-20 Women's World Cup in Canada, the 2011 U-17 World Cup in Mexico and the 2010 U-17 Women's World Cup in Trinidad & Tobago.

The 2012 London Olympic Games proved to be a landmark tournament for the confederation as the U.S. Women's National Team and Mexico U-23 Men's National Team captured gold, making it the first time in the competition's history that teams from the same confederation stood atop the podium.

The 2002 World Cup was a banner tournament for Concacaf that saw the U.S. advance to the quarterfinals, while Mexico won their group to earn a second round berth in Korea and Japan.

In 2005, Concacaf saw one of its men's teams win the first-ever outdoor world championship in the confederation's history as Mexico swept through the FIFA U-17 World Cup in Peru.

In 2000, Guatemala hosted the FIFA Futsal World Cup and in doing so became the first Central American country to host a FIFA world championship. And in 2001, Trinidad & Tobago hosted the spectacular Under-17 World Cup, becoming the first Caribbean country to host a world championship. A year later, the first-ever FIFA Women's Under-19 World Cup was staged in Canada in 2002 and won by the United States. After Trinidad & Tobago hosted the U-17 World Cup, Mexico welcomed the 2011 U-17 World Cup for men and triumphed as tournament champions.

As the Confederation's premier men's event, the Gold Cup is traditionally played every two years by the national teams within Concacaf. It rotated to an odd-year, summer schedule in 2003. Mexico, eight-time winner of the Gold Cup, defeated the U.S. in the 1993, 1998, 2009, 2011 and 2019 finals, downed Brazil in '96 and 2003 and defeated Jamaica in 2015. The U.S. has won six Gold Cups, the inaugural 1991 event, and again in 2002, 2005, 2007, 2013 and 2017. The 2000 Gold Cup was perhaps the most surprising, with Canada taking home their first major international title as the U.S. and Mexico failed to qualify for the semifinals. In 2015, the Confederation's entrant to the FIFA Confederations Cup shifted to a system whereby one nation must win the two Gold Cups held before the Confederations Cup or, if it does not win both editions, enter a one-game playoff against the nation that also won either of the Gold Cup tournaments in advance of a Confederations Cup.

The Women's Gold Cup lasted for three events, with the U.S. winning all three in 2000, 2002, 2006. In 2002, it took a golden goal from Mia Hamm for the U.S. to dispatch Canada in the final, 2-1, and in 2000 the U.S. downed guest-team Brazil 1-0 to claim the championship. In the most recent edition of the tournament, the U.S. again prevailed in extra time, this time courtesy of a Kristine Lilly penalty kick in the 120th minute. The Women's Gold Cup is now known as the Concacaf Women's Championship.

Concacaf competed in the FIFA Club World Cup for the first time in 2000, when Mexico's Necaxa impressed with a third place finish in the 2000 tournament in Brazil. Most recently, the confederation's best finish came from Mexico's Monterrey, which claimed third in 2012. The Concacaf club tournament, which is contested amongst 38 nations' domestic league champions, was won by D.C. United in 1998 and 2001 and by the LA Galaxy in 2000. In 2008, Concacaf unveiled its own Champions League to replace the Champions Cup and decide the region's annual club title.

In 1994, Concacaf joined Europe and South America as the only confederations to host three or more World Cup finals. Mexico welcomed the world twice, in 1970 and 1986, while the United States staged the event for the first time in 1994.

Launched on April 6, 1996, Major League Soccer is the U.S. Soccer sanctioned Division I outdoor professional soccer league in the United States. The LA Galaxy are the league's most successful team and its first to claim five MLS Cup titles (2002, 2005, 2011, 2012, 2014), surpassing D.C. United, winners of three of the first four MLS Cup titles (1996, 1997 & 1999) as well as the 2004 crown. Five more clubs have claimed multiple titles; the San Jose Earthquakes (2001, 2003), Houston Dynamo (2006, 2007), Seattle Sounders FC (2016, 2019), Columbus Crew (2008, 2020) and Kansas City Wizards/Sporting Kansas City (2000, 2013). They are joined on the list of MLS Cup champions by the Chicago Fire (1998), Real Salt Lake (2009), Colorado Rapids (2010), Portland Timbers (2015), Toronto FC (2017), Atlanta United FC (2018), New York City FC (2021), and reigning Champions Los Angeles FC (2022).

In 2023, the league will continue to be divided into two conferences: Eastern Conference – Atlanta United FC, Charlotte FC, Chicago Fire FC, Columbus Crew SC, D.C. United, FC Cincinnati, Inter Miami CF, CF Montreal, New England Revolution, Nashville SC, New York City FC, New York Red Bulls, Orlando City, Philadelphia Union, Toronto FC; Western Conference – Austin FC, Colorado Rapids, FC Dallas, Houston Dynamo, LA Galaxy, Los Angeles FC, Minnesota United, Portland Timbers, Real Salt Lake, San Jose Earthquakes, Seattle Sounders FC, Sporting Kansas City, Saint Louis City SC and Vancouver Whitecaps FC.

Nashville and Miami began play in 2020, Austin FC in 2021, and Charlotte FC in 2022, while St. Louis City SC will play its inaugural season in 2023.

MLS has a unique ownership and operating structure, based on a "single entity" concept. Unlike other professional sports leagues, which are a confederation of independent franchise owners, MLS' "single entity" structure allows investors to own an interest in the league, as well as individual teams. MLS believes that the structure will better position the league for long term success.

In 2021, MLS announced the new MLS NEXT Pro, a division III league that kicked off in March 2022 consisting of 21 pro clubs, including one independent club in Rochester New York FC. The league is set to add more independent clubs in 2023 and beyond. The league serves to build on the MLS pro pathway, which begins at the youth level in MLS NEXT, which was introduced in 2020 and kicked off in 2021 as a successor to the U.S. Development Academy.

The National Women's Soccer League (NWSL) is a 12-team Division I women's professional soccer league featuring players from around the world. The clubs are Angel City FC, Chicago Red Stars, Houston Dash, Kansas City Current, NY/NJ Gotham FC, North Carolina Courage, OL Reign, Orlando Pride, Portland Thorns FC, Racing Louisville FC, San Diego Wave FC, and Washington Spirit. Based in Chicago and New York City, the NWSL is supported by the Canadian Soccer Association and the United States Soccer Federation.

The NWSL will kick off its historic eleventh season in 2023 as fans will get to enjoy some of the biggest names in women's soccer – such as U.S. internationals Mallory Swanson, Becky Sauerbrunn, Crystal Dunn, Megan Rapinoe and Alex Morgan as well as Canada internationals Christine Sinclair, Sophie Schmidt and Desiree Scott.

In addition, the league will also feature other notable stars such as Sweden international Sofia Jakobsson, former Japan international Yuki Nagasato, Wales international Jess Fishlock and Brazil internationals Debinha and Marta.

The league will be looking to build on a 2022 season which saw the Portland Thorns claim the title with a 2-0 win over the Kansas City Current in the Final. Meanwhile, OL Reign won the NWSL Shield after topping the regular season standings with 40 points, while the North Carolina Courage won the 2022 NWSL Challenge Cup with a 2-1 win over the Washington Spirit in the final. The 2023 season will once again comprise of 22 games for each team from March-November, and for the first time ever, the NWSL Challenge Cup will run concurrently with the regular season from April to September.

In March of 2020, the league announced a landmark, multi-year media rights agreements, in which CBS Sports and Twitch have acquired the rights to exclusively present all NWSL matches for the next three years, beginning with the 2020 season.


303 E. Wacker is a modern office space which features a brand-new lobby and new penthouselevel amenities following a major repositioning by the property's ownership group, Beacon. The new amenity center showcases Nanoglass operable windows, a stunning tenant lounge, and a fitness facility, while the lobby hosts a new coffee shop.

The building is a 30-story, 944,000 square foot building located on the riverfront in Chicago's East Loop. The property's Miesian architectural design offers highly efficient 33,000 square-foot floorplates that are well-suited for both open-plan and private office layouts. Floor-to-ceiling window lines provide spectacular views of the Chicago River, Lake Michigan, and the Chicago skyline.

In the tradition of many world soccer federations and the FIFA House in Zurich, the U.S. Soccer's former residence at Soccer House consisted of two refurbished mansions in Chicago's Prairie Avenue Historical District for three decades. Initially located in Colorado Springs, Colo., U.S. Soccer moved their operational base in December of 1991 into the Kimball and Coleman houses which made up Soccer House.

# **U.S. SOCCER TIMELINE**

**Early 1800s:** As was the case in England, many American schools and colleges played forms of football, but under rules that varied from place to place.

**1862:** The Oneida Football Club, made up of Boston prep school students, was organized by Gerritt Smith Miller. The game the Oneidas played was more like rugby than like soccer, but they were the first American team playing any type of football to be organized on a continuing basis, rather than just for the day.

**1866:** The first game in America using the association football rules standardized three years before in London was played on Oct. 11 in Waukesha, Wis. A team of Carroll College students beat a team of local residents.

**1869:** A week after they played what has been called the first American football game, teams from Princeton and Rutgers met on Nov. 13 in Princeton, N.J., in a game using association football rules, the first intercollegiate soccer game in America.

**1876:** Most of the football-playing colleges abandoned soccer in favor of rugby. However, within a few years soccer had begun to take hold in immigrant communities in various American locations such as Fall River, Mass.; Kearny, N.J., and St. Louis.

**1883:** The first soccer league in America, the Western Football Association, was organized in St. Louis.

**1884:** The American Football Association, only the second national soccer association outside of the British Isles, but one that was really more regional than national, was organized in Newark, N.J.

**1885:** The first American Football Association Cup was won by ONT of Kearny, N.J., and a team representing the United States played one from Canada in Kearny on Nov. 28 in the first "international" game in America.

**1894:** The first attempt to start a pro soccer league in the United States, the American League of Professional Football Clubs, lasted for only three weeks in October. However, a longer-lasting league, the National Association Foot Ball League, began the following spring.

**1898:** A depression resulting from the financial panic of 1893 caused the suspension of both the American Football Association and the nation's leading league, the National Association Foot Ball League of New Jersey.

**1904:** A Canadian team won the soccer competition at the Olympic Games in St. Louis.

**1905:** A 17-game North American tour by the Pilgrims, an English amateur team, helped to revive soccer in the United States. St. Leo's won the first of its 10 consecutive St. Louis Major League titles.

**1906:** West Hudson of Harrison, N.J., won the first championship of the revived AFA Cup. A year later, it added the first championship of the revived National Association Foot Ball League.

**1913:** The United States Football Association was founded at an April 5 meeting in New York. FIFA, which had been founded in 1904, granted it provisional

membership later in the year and full membership in 1914.

**1914:** The first National Challenge Cup tournament, the championship of the new USFA, was won by the Brooklyn Field Club (the tournament's name was later changed to the U.S. Open Cup).

**1916:** The first national team organized by the USFA, named the All-American Football Club, played six games in a tour of Sweden and Norway. The captain, Thomas Swords of Fall River, scored the first goal ever for the U.S. national team, against Sweden.

**1919:** Bethlehem Steel, after sweeping the National Challenge Cup, the AFA Cup and the National Association Foot Ball League, became the first American club to make a European tour when it played 14 games in Sweden and Denmark.

**1920:** The National Challenge Cup was won for the first time by a team from west of the Alleghenies, Ben Millers of St. Louis.

**1921:** The original American Soccer League, largely a merger of the National Association Foot Ball League in the Middle Atlantic states and the Southern New England Soccer League, began play. In its first season, it included three teams from Massachusetts, two from New York, two from New Jersey and one from Pennsylvania.

**1924:** The Fall River Marksmen became the first team to win the American Soccer League and National Challenge Cup titles in the same year.

**1925:** Archie Stark of Bethlehem Steel scored 67 goals in the 44-game ASL season, setting an American first-division record that still stands.

**1926:** A game between Austrian first-division team Hakoah and a New York all-star team drew a crowd of 46,000 to the Polo Grounds in New York. Bethlehem Steel won the last of its five National Challenge Cup titles.

**1928:** The Soccer War, a year-long battle between the ASL and the USFA, began with ASL demands to take over the leading role in administering the sport.



**1930:** The 1930 U.S. World Cup Team advanced into the semifinals and finished third.

**1930:** The United States was one of 13 nations to compete in the first World Cup in Uruguay, upsetting Belgium and Paraguay before being eliminated by Argentina in the semifinals. Bert Patenaude of Fall River scored the first World Cup hat trick. Later in the year, the Fall River Marksmen, again winners of the ASL and National Challenge Cup titles, made a six-game tour of Czechoslovakia, Hungary and Austria.

**1932:** Disputes over the definition of an amateur and the costs of long travel distance from Europe caused the elimination of soccer from the program at the Los Angeles Olympic Games.

**1933:** Two years after the demise of the original American Soccer League, a new ASL, with a scaled-back budget, began play.

**1934:** Buff Donelli, later a famous American football coach, scored four goals in a World Cup qualifying victory against Mexico. The U.S. Men took part in their second consecutive World Cup, going winless in Italy.



**'34 IN ITALY:** The U.S. lost their only match of the 1934 World Cup, losing 7-1 to host Italy.

**1938:** The USFA, citing the gathering threat of war in Europe, declined to send a team to the World Cup in France.

**1941:** The Kearny Scots won their fifth consecutive American Soccer League championship. The National Soccer Coaches Association was formed by 10 coaches at a meeting in New York.

**1944:** Billy Gonsalves, playing for Brooklyn Hispano, won the last of his remarkable eight U.S. Open Cup championships.

**1945:** The U.S. Football Association changed its name to U.S. Soccer Football Association.

**1947:** Ponta Delgada of Fall River became the first team to win the U.S. Open Cup and the National Amateur Cup in the same year.

**1948:** The first game in the United States between two leading European teams, Liverpool of England and Djurgardens of Sweden, was played in Brooklyn.

**1950:** Joe Gaetjens' goal in the 37th minute enabled the United States to earn its famous 1-0 victory against England in Belo Horizonte, Brazil. Despite the victory, the United States failed to advance past the first round of the World Cup.

**1952:** The United States played Scotland in front of a crowd of 107,765 at Hampden Park in Glasgow.

**1953:** The USSFA assumed administration of the National Soccer Hall of Fame in an agreement with the Philadelphia Old-Timers Association, which had started the Hall three years before.

**1959:** The first NCAA soccer championship was won by St. Louis University. The United States finished third in the soccer tournament at the Pan-American Games in Chicago.

**1960:** The International Soccer League, featuring European and South American clubs in their off-seasons, began play in New York. In the first championship game, Bangu of Brazil beat Kilmarnock of Scotland.

**1961:** Concacaf, the Confederation of North and Central America and the Caribbean of Association Football, was formed at a meeting in Mexico City.

**1965:** The first college women's varsity soccer team was organized at Castleton State College in Vermont.

**1966:** Pelé played his first game in the United States, for his longtime Brazilian club Santos against Benfica of Portugal in New York.

**1968:** The Atlanta Chiefs defeated the San Diego Toros in the first North American Soccer League championship series.

**1974:** The U.S. Soccer Football Association changed its name to U.S. Soccer Federation.

**1975:** Pelé, who had retired the year before from Santos, signed for \$2.8 million with the New York Cosmos.

**1977:** Pelé won his only North American Soccer League championship as the Cosmos defeated the Seattle Sounders in the final. A month after the season, Pelé played his final game, changing uniforms at halftime in a match between the Cosmos and Santos, in East Rutherford, N.J. By signing Franz Beckenbauer of West Germany and Carlos Alberto of Brazil, the Cosmos became the first team in world soccer history to field the captains of the last two World Cup-winning teams.

**1978:** American soccer rode the crest of the attendance surge that followed Pelé's American venture, with the North American Soccer League expanding from 18 teams to 24 and the Major Indoor Soccer League beginning play with six teams.

**1982:** A European selection played a World selection in the FIFA all-star game in East Rutherford, N.J., but the NASL surge was beginning to fade. The Cosmos won the last of their five NASL championships. North Carolina won the first NCAA women's soccer championship.

**1984:** A crowd of 101,799, still the largest ever to attend a soccer game in the United States, saw the Olympic final between Brazil and France in Pasadena, Calif.

**1985:** The North American Soccer League folded, a year after the second American Soccer League had done the same. Three months later, the New York Cosmos folded, after attempting to play a series of exhibition games. The United States men were surprisingly eliminated by Costa Rica in World Cup qualifying, but the United States women's national team played its first game.

**1988:** FIFA, which five years earlier had rejected a United States bid for the 1986 World Cup, named the United States as host of the 1994 World Cup.

**1989:** The United States qualified for the World Cup for the first time in 40 years. Paul Caligiuri's famous goal in the deciding game was a 35-yard dipping shot that found the net in a 1-0 upset victory against Trinidad & Tobago Nov. 19 in front of 35,000 red-clad Trinidadians. The U.S. Futsal National Team finished third at the first FIFA World Championship for Futsal.



**FIRST OF SIX:** The 1990 World Cup marked the first of six consecutive world cup appearances for the U.S.

**1990:** The U.S. competed in the World Cup for the first time in 40 years. The WSL and the ASL merged to form the American Professional Soccer League (APSL).

**1991:** The U.S. Women captured the first-ever FIFA Women's World Championship in China with a 2-1 win against Norway Nov. 30. The women qualified for the world championship by defeating their five Concacaf opponents by a combined score of 49-0. The U.S. National Team won its first-ever regional championship July 7 when it captured the Concacaf Gold Cup by defeating Honduras 4-3 in penalty kicks. The U.S. U-23 team won the gold medal at the Pan Am Games in Cuba.

**1992:** The U.S. Men won the inaugural U.S. Cup '92 in June, defeating Ireland 3-1 and Portugal 1-0, and tying three-time World Cup champion Italy 1-1. The U.S. Futsal Team won the silver medal at the 2nd FIFA World Championship in Hong Kong. The M(I)SL folded after 15 years in existence.

**1993:** In February, U.S. Soccer held the first-ever Strategic Summit where more than 250 soccer leaders and personalities met in Chicago for four days to plan the development of soccer into the 21st century. U.S. Cup '93 was used as a dress rehearsal for World Cup organizers, officials and volunteers, as well as the U.S. Men. The USA's 2-0 defeat of England made headlines around the world. Attendance and media interest were high, with 286,761 people attending the June 13 U.S.-Germany match.

**NUMBER ONE:** Anson Dorrance led the U.S. Women to the inaugural Women's World Cup crown in 1991 in China.

The U.S. Under-20 Men defeated Europe's No. 1 seed, Turkey, 6-0 in the first game of the World Youth Championship in Australia. FIFA officials called the trouncing one of the most extraordinary results in the history of the tournament.

The APSL was declared a Division II professional league. The United States Interregional Soccer League (USISL) was given Division III status. Plans for Major League Soccer — a Division I league to follow the legacy of World Cup '94 — were presented by U.S. Soccer President Alan Rothenberg.



**STARS AND STRIPES I:** The 1994 MNT advanced out of World Cup group play for the first time in 64 years.

**1994:** U.S. Soccer served as host national association for the 1994 FIFA World Cup, staging the greatest event in FIFA history. More than 3.5 million fans flocked to stadiums — still a World Cup record — and soccer fever in the U.S. was at an all-time high. The U.S. team advanced beyond the first round for the first time in 64 years, falling to eventual champion Brazil 1-0 in a July 4 round of 16 showdown at Stanford Stadium in Palo Alto, Calif. On June 4, 91,123 fans jammed the Rose Bowl to watch the U.S. defeat Mexico, 1-0, in its final tune-up prior to the World Cup. Game proceeds netted \$1 million in U.S. Soccer contributions to UNICEF/ Children's Defense Fund.

The U.S. Women won the Chiquita Cup, a four-team international tournament in which the U.S. hosted Germany, China and Norway. The U.S. went on to successfully defend its Concacaf championship, qualifying for the 1995 FIFA Women's World Championship by outscoring the opposition 36-1 en route to winning all four qualification matches. Head coach Anson Dorrance announced his resignation and U.S. Soccer named assistant coach Tony DiCicco to succeed him.

**1995:** U.S. Soccer announced in February its intention to host the 1999 Women's World Cup and began the formal bid process with FIFA. The U.S. Men won the U.S. Cup '95 in June, defeating Nigeria and Mexico and tying Colombia. Later that month, the women placed third in the FIFA Women's World Cup in Sweden, falling to eventual champion Norway in the semifinals 1-0, then defeating China.

In July, the men made international headlines by advancing to the semifinals of Copa America. The U.S. scored its first-ever victory against Argentina, 3-0, and advanced via penalty kicks (against Mexico) into the semifinals before falling 1-0 to defending world champion Brazil. Steve Sampson, who had served as interim coach since April, was named full-time head coach in August.

**1996:** The U.S. Women won the first women's soccer gold medal at the 1996 Atlanta Olympics, defeating China 2-1 in the championship game. The U.S. posted a 21-1-2 overall record and won the Brazil Cup and U.S. Women's Cup '96. The U.S. Men's Olympic Team narrowly missed advancing to the quarterfinals with a 1-1-1 record.

Major League Soccer was launched, providing the United States with its first Division I outdoor pro league since the North American Soccer League cassed operations in 1985. MLS averaged more than 17,000 fans per game. The A-League and USISL merged to form a larger and stronger Division II outdoor league.

FIFA awarded the 1999 Women's World Cup to the United States and U.S. Soccer pledged it would be the biggest and most successful women's sporting event ever.

**1997:** The U.S. Men qualified for a third straight World Cup, completing a 16-game qualifying run with just two losses and advancing with a game to spare. The U.S. Women continued their impressive play by winning their fourth straight Nike U.S Cup.

The FIFA Women's World Cup Organizing Committee had awarded the '99 games to seven U.S. locations: Boston; Chicago; Los Angeles; New York/New Jersey; Portland, Ore.; San Francisco Bay Area; and Washington, D.C.

**1998:** A disappointing World Cup finished with the U.S. in last place after two difficult match-ups against Germany and Yugoslavia, and a heartbreaking loss to Iran. Brian McBride scores the team's only World Cup goal. The tournament concludes with the resignation of head coach Steve Sampson, who is eventually replaced on Oct. 27, by Bruce Arena.

The women's team continued their impressive play, losing just twice in 1998 while playing in front of record

crowds all across the country. Dr. Bob Contiguglia took over as U.S. Soccer's new president, replacing Alan I. Rothenberg, who had reached the eight-year term limit.

**1999:** In front of more than 90,000 fans at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif., the U.S. women won the 1999 FIFA World Cup by playing China to a 0-0 tie through regulation and overtime and then defeating them 5-4 in penalty kicks. Soccer hysteria spread through America as the women appeared on every top news program, at the White House and on the cover of *Time, Newsweek, People* and *Sports Illustrated.* U.S. Women's National Team head coach Tony DiCicco resigned in November as the winningest coach in U.S. Soccer history with a record of 103-8-8.

In Bruce Arena's first full year at the helm of the U.S. Men, the team recorded triumphs against Germany (twice), Argentina, Chile and earns third place at the 1999 FIFA Confederations Cup in Mexico. The U-23 Men's beat Canada for the bronze medal at the 1999 Pan American Games in Winnipeg, Canada, while the U-18 Women captured the gold. The U-20 Men advanced to the second round of the 1999 FIFA World Youth Championship in April, with their only two loses coming to eventual finalists Spain and Japan. Taylor Twellman scored four goals and earned the Bronze Boot to become the first American male in the modern era to earn a FIFA scoring award. In November, the U-17 Men extended a record unbeaten streak to 24 games, advancing to the semifinals of the World Championship before losing in penalty kicks to Australia. Landon Donovan and DaMarcus Beasley earned the Gold and Silver Balls as the tournaments top two MVPs.



**COMING UP ROSES:** The U.S. Women's National Team won the 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup, the most successful women's sporting event ever, in a penalty shootout against China.

**2000:** Bruce Arena's squad continued to advance toward their ultimate goal of qualifying for the 2002 World Cup. The team secured 10 out of a possible 12 points — all shutouts — to win its semifinal qualifying group.

The U.S. Women maintained the momentum from their historic Women's World Cup title with 41 matches in 2000, posting a 26-6-9 record. The U.S. won six tournament titles in 2000, but had to settle for a silver medal at the 2000 Summer Olympics, losing in overtime to archrival Norway in the gold medal match.

The U.S. Men and Women put on an impressive display

for the world at the Sydney Games as the only nation to have both its teams advance to the semifinals. The men were the surprise team of the tournament, winning their group and advancing to the semis before grabbing fourth place, the highest Olympic finish for the U.S.

**2001:** The U.S. Men qualified for a fourth straight World Cup, boosted by four wins and a draw to open the final round of Concacaf qualifying. For the first time, the U.S. Men clinched a spot in the World Cup at a home qualifier, topping Jamaica 2-1 behind two goals from Joe-Max Moore in front of 40,483 fans at the last soccer match played at Foxboro Stadium.

The U.S. Women played only 10 international matches as the Women's United Soccer Association begins play, with the Bay Area CyberRays winning the inaugural Founders Cup. Mia Hamm was named the first FIFA Women's World Player of the Year.

The Under-17 Men advanced to a ninth consecutive FIFA U-17 World Cup, but were drawn into the Group of Death in Trinidad & Tobago with Japan, Nigeria and France, and were eliminated in the first round. The U.S. Under-20 Men qualified for their third straight FIFA World Youth Championship, where the team finished second in their group in Argentina and were eliminated in the second round by Egypt.

The National Professional Soccer League, in existence since 1984-95, merged with the WISL and was renamed as the Major Indoor Soccer League.



**SAVED:** Brad Friedel saved a penalty kick by Korea Republic as the U.S. preserved a 1-1 draw in their second group game in 2002.

**2002:** The U.S. Men advanced to the quarterfinals at the 2002 World Cup in Korea/Japan, the team's best World Cup showing since 1930. The U.S. shocked the world with a stunning 3-2 opening game upset of Portugal before eventually finishing in second place in Group D. The U.S. then posted their first victory in the World Cup knockout stage, blanking Concacaf rival Mexico 2-0 in the Round of 16. The World Cup run ended in the quarterfinals with a 1-0 loss to Germany. Claudio Reyna was named to the All-Tournament Team, while Landon Donovan earned honorable mention. The men began 2002 by winning the Concacaf Gold Cup in January with a convincing 2-0 victory against Costa Rica for the first Gold Cup title for the U.S. since 1991.

The U.S. Women qualified for their fourth consecutive FIFA Women's World Cup after capturing the 2002

Concacaf Gold Cup with a 2- 1 overtime victory against Canada at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. The U.S. Under-19 Women topped the host Canadians 1-0 in overtime to win the inaugural FIFA U-19 Women's World Championship. Kelly Wilson won the Bronze Ball as the tournament's third MVP and the Silver Boot, while captain Lindsay Tarpley earned the Bronze Boot.

The U.S. Under-20 Men's National Team qualified for their fourth consecutive FIFA World Youth Championship. The U.S. National Futsal Team played their first home matches in history, defeating Canada and tying Mexico in March in Baltimore, Md., and Washington, D.C., respectively.

**2003:** Due to the outbreak of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome, FIFA relocated the Women's World Cup out of China. After a successful bid to host the tournament, U.S. Soccer faced the unprecedented task of hosting the tournament with just four months of preparation. The U.S. Women won Group A and then beat Norway in the quarterfinals 1-0. But Germany stunned the U.S. with a 3-0 victory in the semifinals, which led the U.S. to top Canada in the third-place match. Shannon Boxx, Joy Fawcett and Mia Hamm all earned all-star honors from FIFA.

The U.S. Men, preparing for World Cup qualifying in 2004, finished in third place at the Concacaf Gold Cup with a 3-2 come-from-behind win against Costa Rica. The Men's Under-17 and Under-20 squads finished their respective World Championships with fifth place finishes after bowing out with quarterfinal losses to Brazil and Argentina, respectively.

**2004:** The U.S. Women won every tournament entered, culminating with the 2004 Olympics. Other tournament titles included the Algarve Cup, the Four Nations Tournament and the Concacaf Regional Olympic qualifying tournament, as the team set a record with 28 victories on the year.

Under head coach Bruce Arena, the U.S. Men qualified for the final round of World Cup Qualifying for the Concacaf region. The men finished the year with an 8-1-6 record, losing only to the Netherlands away and going a record 13-games undefeated.

The U-23 Men failed to qualify for the Olympics for the first time since 1976, losing 4-0 to Mexico in Guadalajara after winning their group only match up against the second-place Mexicans in the singleelimination qualifier. The Under-19 Women finished third at the FIFA U-19 Women's World Championship. The Futsal Team won the 2004 Concacaf Championship and qualified for the 2004 FIFA Futsal World Championship, where the team had a strong showing with a seventh-place finish.



**GOLDEN GIRL:** Abby Wambach was truly golden in 2004, scoring an unfathomable 31 goals, including the overtime winner to clinch the 2004 gold medal at the Athens Olympics.

**2005:** Manager Bruce Arena led the U.S. Men to a first place finish in Concacaf World Cup qualifying for the first time in 71 years, earning a berth at the 2006 FIFA World Cup Finals in Germany with a 2-0 win against Mexico in Columbus, Ohio. The men also brought home the 2005 Concacaf Gold Cup, beating Panama 3-1 in penalty kicks after a scoreless draw. The team finished the year with a record 13 wins and .750 winning percentage.

The U.S. Women began a new era, starting off the year with a new coach, Greg Ryan, and a third consecutive Algarve Cup title, their fourth overall. They ended the year undefeated and without allowing a single goal.

The Under-20 Men swept through Concacaf Qualifying, earning a berth to the FIFA Youth World Championship, where they finished 11th, bowing out to Italy in the Round of 16. The Under-17 Men also had a strong 2005, qualifying for the 2005 FIFA U-17 World Championship and finishing fifth overall after a loss to Holland in the second round.

**2006:** A disappointing World Cup in Germany for the United States, as the team failed to advance out of the first round despite a gallant, nine-man 1-1 draw with eventual World Cup champions Italy. After eight years in charge, Bruce Arena was replaced at the helm of the USMNT by Bob Bradley, on an interim basis.

Later in the summer, the U.S. Under-20 Women's National Team finished fourth in Russia. The disappointing finish marked the first time a U.S. Women's National Team had finished outside the top three in a FIFA world championship or Concacaf championship event.

The U.S. Women, however, continued their incredible run under Greg Ryan, winning three of the four tournaments they enter. The year concluded with another Women's Gold Cup crown and a berth in the 2007 FIFA Women's World Cup in China.

**2007:** Bob Bradley became the first Men's coach to win his first three games in charge and was hired fulltime to guide the USA through 2010. In the summer of 2007, the MNT won its second consecutive Gold Cup, and fourth total title, by defeating Mexico 2-1 in front of a packed house at Soldier Field in Chicago. With the victory, the MNT gained entry into the 2009 Confederations Cup. The Men also travelled to Venezuela to compete in Copa America for the third time.

After qualifying for their respective World Cups to continue impressive streaks, the U-17 Men and U- 20 Men took on the world during the summer in back-toback tournaments. The U-20 team performed admirably in Canada, and reached the guarterfinals after defeats of Poland, Brazil and Uruguay. The U-17 team, meanwhile, did well to qualify from a tough group in South Korea, before being eliminated by Germany in the Round of 16. The U.S. Women maintained a two-plus year undefeated run, looking to take the streak into the FIFA Women's World Cup. Drawn into the toughest group in Women's World Cup history, the U.S. advanced in first place after three difficult games against Korea DPR, Sweden and Nigeria. The U.S. rolled into the semifinals, but was upended by a quality Brazil side. Eventually, the WNT took third place for the second consecutive World Cup with a convincing win against Norway. Former Swedish National Team player and captain Pia Sundhage was appointed to the position of WNT coach after Greg Ryan's departure from the team.

Wilmer Cabrera was named head coach of the U-17 MNT, replacing John Hackworth. For the first time, U.S. Soccer hired four full-time referees to enhance high-level performance, training and development opportunities for the sport's elite officials in the United States. The U.S. Soccer Development Academy launched in the fall. **2008:** Led by Pia Sundhage, the U.S. Women had one of their best years ever, losing only one game, which ironically came in the opening match of the 2008 Beijing Olympics, a tournament the U.S. would eventually win to take home their third gold medal. Overall, the U.S. won all six tournaments it entered to finish with a 33-1-2 record, giving them the most wins and best winning percentage ever in a calendar year (.944).

The U.S. Men was successful in its own right, starting off on the right foot in 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifying with a 9-0 aggregate against Barbados in the second round. The U.S. opened the semifinal round with 1-0 victories in Guatemala and Cuba. Coming back to the U.S., home victories against T&T and Cuba clinched advancement with two games to play.

The U-23 MNT joined the U.S. Women by qualifying for the 2008 Olympics in March, but just missed out on the second round once arriving in Beijing. Despite a 1-0 victory against Japan and a 2-2 draw with the Netherlands, the U.S. fell 2-1 against eventual silver medalist Nigeria. On the youth side, the U-17 and U-20 Women's National Teams both made the championship match of their respective FIFA World Cups. In New Zealand, the U-17s went on an impressive run to the final before finally succumbing to Korea DPR in the final, but in Chile their older counterparts were able to exact revenge with a 2-1 victory to bring the World Cup trophy back to the United States for the first time since 2002.

Building off the initial kickoff in 2007, U.S. Soccer's Development Academy wrapped up its first year with a collection of dynamic matches during Finals Week at The Home Depot Center. In the U-15/16 championship, Carmel United topped PDA 1-0, and the Baltimore Bays topped LAFC 4-2 to take the U-17/18 title.

**2009:** The U.S. Men opened 2009 focused on final round qualifying for the 2010 FIFA World Cup with a

2-0 win against archrival Mexico in Columbus, Ohio, Bob Bradley's squad proceeded to go undefeated at home and clinch a spot in South Africa with a come-from-behind win in Honduras. They finished atop the Concacaf table with a tie against Costa Rica in Washington, D.C., on the last day of qualifying.

During the summer, the U.S. Men traveled to South Africa to compete in the 2009 FIFA Confederations Cup. The USMNT was drawn into a group with Italy, Brazil and Egypt, and advanced into the semifinals by virtue of a 3-0 dismantling of Egypt in the final game. They kept the nation captivated by beating Spain, the No.1-ranked team in the world in the semifinals before falling 3-2 to Brazil in the final. Tim Howard was awarded the Golden Glove and Clint Dempsey given the Bronze Ball.

Pia Sundhage's women's team had a more relaxed year after their gold medal winning exploits in 2008, and wrapped up the year with a 7-0-1 that included falling in penalties to Sweden in the Algarve Cup final.

Both the U-17 and U-20 Men's National Teams competed in their respective FIFA World Cups this year, with the U-17 team advancing out of the group stage in Nigeria before falling to Italy in the Round of 16. A tough group containing Germany, Cameroon and Korea Republic saw the U-20s out of the tournament following the first round in Egypt.

The U.S. Soccer Development Academy completed its second year of competition in 2009, once again concluding the season with Finals Week at The Home Depot Center. In the U-15/16 age group, playoff No.1seed Derby County Wolves continued their strong season straight through Finals Week with a title. Indiana United Academy defeated D.C. United to take home the U-17/18 championship.

**2010:** The year's most memorable moment came in the U.S. Men's third group game at the 2010 World Cup in South Africa as Landon Donovan scored a last-minute goal for the U.S. to clinch advancement and clinch a group for the first time in 80 years. Following a 1-1 tie with England, a 2-2 tie with Slovenia and a 1-0 win against Algeria, the U.S. was eliminated in the Round of 16, losing to Ghana 2-1. Clint Dempsey became the second U.S. player to score in multiple World Cups, and Landon Donovan had three total goals to be come the third to score in multiple World Cups and the all-time World Cup goal leader for the U.S.

After a surprising loss to Mexico in the semifinals of Women's Concacaf qualifying, the U.S. topped Italy 2-0 in a two-game qualifying playoff to earn a spot in the 2011 FIFA Women's World Cup. The U.S. won its seventh Algarve Cup with the first of two victories against 2011 hosts Germany.

The U.S. Under-20 Women lost in penalty kicks to Nigeria in the quarterfinals of the 2010 FIFA U-20 World Cup, while the U-17 Women became the first U.S. Women's team to fail to qualify for a FIFA World Cup event after not advancing out of the CONACACAF qualifying tournament.

No Division II league met U.S. Soccer's sanctioning standards, so the Federation administered a league called USSF D-2 for one year.

**2011:** The U.S. Women were on center stage during the 2011 Women's World Cup in Germany. Their dramatic run in the Women's World Cup was highlighted by an electric, come-from-behind victory in the quarterfinals against Brazil, in which Abby Wambach scored the latest goal (six minutes into stoppage time) ever in a World Cup match. The U.S., however, would lose out in penalties to a spirited Japanese side in the final after playing to a 2-2 draw through 120 minutes.

During the summer of 2011 at the Concacaf Gold Cup, the U.S. MNT advanced to its third consecutive final, scoring two early goals before falling 4-2 to Mexico.

The continental tournament would prove to be Bob Bradley's last involvement as head coach of the U.S., with former Germany international and FIFA World Cup winner Jurgen Klinsmann taking the helm of the U.S. Men in August. He earned his first win in Miami against Honduras thanks to a Clint Dempsey strike and later led the team to a 3-2 victory against Slovenia in its last game of the year.

The U-17 and U-20 Men's National Teams both entered another cycle of their respective FIFA World Cups. The U-17 Men reached the knockout round for the seventh time but lost to Germany in the Round of 16. After winning their qualifying group with two shutout victories, the U-20s graduated to the quarterfinals but fell to Guatemala and did not reach the World Cup for the first time since 1995.

**2012:** The USWNT capped off the 2012 London Olympics with a 2-1 victory against Japan in front of more than 80,000 spectators at Wembley Stadium as the U.S. Women earned their fourth Olympic gold – a first for any country on the men's and women's sides. Carli Lloyd scored both goals for the USA, capping off a tournament that featured a dramatic game-winning goal from 2012 U.S. Soccer Female Athlete of the Year Alex Morgan in the 123rd minute of the team's semifinal victory against Canada.

The USMNT advanced to the final round of 2014 FIFA World Cup Qualifying, defeating Guatemala 3-1 in the final Group A match of the Semifinal Round as Clint Dempsey scored his 29th and 30th career goals to tie Brian McBride for third all-time in U.S. history. The U.S. Men also had some memorable international friendly victories in 2012, including the first win on Mexico's home soil – a 1-0 victory at Estadio Azteca on Aug. 15.

The U.S. U-20 WNT defeated defending champion Germany 1-0 in the 2012 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in Tokyo. Kealia Ohai scored the game's lone goal and the Americans earned their third World Cup crown in the tournament's history. The U.S. U-17 WNT competed in the 2012 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup, and in an extremely rare occurrence did not advance past the group stage despite an unbeaten 1-0-2 record.

**2013:** U.S. Soccer celebrated its 100th birthday in 2013, marking the occasion with a doubleheader event on June 2 as the USMNT beat Germany 4-3 in an electrifying match in the nation's capital, Washington, D.C. The USWNT also enjoyed victorious celebration as it defeated Canada 2-0 in Toronto in the first match since the dramatic semifinal victory in the 2012 London Olympics.

The MNT accomplished its primary task of qualifying for the 2014 FIFA World Cup, marking the seventhconsecutive time the team has reached the finals. The USA finished in first place for the third straight Concacaf cycle, highlighted by yet another "Dos a Cero" victory against regional rival Mexico. The team captured its fifth Gold Cup title, winning all six matches en route to the championship. A multitude of team and individual records were broken, a Snow Clasico played out in Denver and a dramatic comeback against Panama punctuated the end of the qualifying campaign.

The U.S. Women's unbeaten 2013 campaign was highlighted by Abby Wambach capturing the international scoring record on June 20 with four goals against Korea Republic at Red Bull Arena. She surpassed Mia Hamm's record of 158 and continued to extend the record, ending the year on 163.

**2014:** A banner year for U.S. Soccer. Growth is the word that best defined the year as record numbers of fans flocked to stadiums, parks and any available TV to see the USMNT compete at the 2014 FIFA World Cup. Impressive new television and sponsor agreements were signed, allowing U.S. Soccer to invest heavily in its coaching and youth development programs. All the while, the USWNT continued to cement its role as the No. 1 women's program in the world and turning heads in the process.

Early in the year, the USWNT transitioned to the guidance of former interim head coach and long-time assistant Jill Ellis, who led the team to an impressive qualification to the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup in Canada as well as a 17-1-4 record to finish the year. Along the way, team captain Christie Rampone became only the second soccer player in history – man or woman – to reach 300 caps for their country. The team also brought in talented youngsters such as midfielder Morgan Brian and defenders Julie Johnston and Crystal Dunn.

The USMNT's year was highlighted by a successful run to the Round of 16 at the 2014 FIFA World Cup in Brazil. Head coach Jurgen Klinsmann guided the team out of the 'Group of Death' on the back of a cathartic win against Ghana and a dramatic draw against the world's No. 1 player Cristiano Ronaldo and Portugal. Despite goalkeeper Tim Howard's heroics – and tournament record 15 saves - against Belgium, the USA exited in the first knockout round. The team and soccer culture in the United States was then stunned by the retirement of the greatest player it had ever produced when Landon Donovan decided to hang up his cleats after playing one final match for his country in an October friendly against Ecuador.

**2015:** A year of continued evolution for the U.S. Soccer National Teams and Federation as a whole, saw the USWNT claim the most coveted prize in the sport by winning the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup in record breaking fashion vs. Japan. It was a dominant year for the WNT, which also won a final Algarve Cup title early in the year before launching the #SheBelieves campaign aimed at inspiring fans throughout the world to achieve their dreams and then drawing record TV audiences for its World Cup games that subsequently let to record crowds during its Victory Tour.

The USMNT's high-water mark came in June when the team won back-to-back friendlies on European soil vs. the Netherlands and reigning World Cup champions Germany. The team also saw an injection of youth in its ranks as promising young players climbed the MNT program ladder from a talented U-20 team that made an inspired run to the FIFA U-20 World Cup Quarterfinals up to the U-23 MNT and in the case of defender Matt Miazga the full National Team. Despite less than desireable results in the semifinals of the Concacaf Gold Cup and Concacaf Cup, the MNT closed out the year with quality results in its first two games of Semifinal Round Qualifying for the 2018 FIFA World Cup in Russia.

**2016:** Another big year for U.S. Soccer saw its Men's and Women's teams of all age groups find success throughout the year. On the women's side, the year began with a storming run to the Concacaf Olympic Qualifying tournament title by the senior team, which then won the inaugural SheBelieves Cup with victories against European powers England, France and Germany. From there another pair of quality results against rival Japan had the team looking good heading into the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio; however, a bitter Round of 16 exit at the hands of former coach Pia Sundhage and Sweden on penalty kicks after a 1-1 draw left a sour taste. The team finished the year strong, winning its remaining six games while introducing a wealth of young talent.

Additionally, the U-20 WNT made a strong run at the U-20 Women's World Cup, reaching the third-place match.

The Men's National Team had a roller coaster of a year. A must-win World Cup Qualifying match at home to Guatemala saw the USA come good to set the team up for an impressive summer run at the Copa America Centenario, which was hosted in the United States. Despite an opening match loss to Colombia, the U.S. recovered to steam into a semifinal showdown against world power Argentina, where the team was defeated by a sublime performance from five-time FIFA World Player of the Year Lionel Messi. The MNT righted the ship by cruising into the Final Round of 2018 World Cup Qualifying with a pair of high-flying wins. But the year would take a sharp turn once more as defeats to Mexico at home and Costa Rica away sealed the fate of Jurgen Klinsmann as head coach and saw former manager Bruce Arena reinstalled to lead the team in 2017.

**2017:** The U.S. Women's National Team experienced one of its busiest, most competitive schedules to begin a World Cup and Olympic cycle. The team played seven teams in the top 10 of the FIFA Women's World Rankings on the way to compiling a 12-3-1 record that included an eight-game unbeaten streak to finish the year. The USA hosted two major tournaments in the SheBelieves Cup and the Tournament of Nations, as head coach Jill Ellis used the year for experimentation and player evaluation as more than 50 players were seen in training camps and games while six players earned first caps.

After starting the Final Round of 2018 FIFA World Cup Qualifying with two defeats to end the previous year, the U.S. Men's National Team set a different course with the return of Bruce Arena as head coach.

The turnaround began in March when the U.S. picked up eight points via two home wins and two away draws, one against Mexico at the revered Estadio Azteca. With qualifying stabilized, attention shifted to the Concacaf Gold Cup, where the U.S. earned its sixth confederation title when Jordan Morris' 88th minute game winner defeated Jamaica in the championship match on July 26.

With a regional crown in hand, the MNT returned to qualifying in September, but faltered with a home defeat to Costa Rica and away draw with Honduras that saw the USA still alive with two qualifying matches left. An impressive 4-0 win against Panama pushed the U.S. to the brink of qualifying for the 2018 World Cup, but needing just a draw on the last matchday at Trinidad & Tobago, the side fell 2-1 to the Soca Warriors in Couva, Trinidad, a result that, combined with Honduras and Panama wins that night, knocked the U.S. out of the World Cup.

Arena resigned on Oct. 13, opening the search for a new head coach, and a month later the beginnings of a new-look MNT took its initial step when a young team led by acting head coach Dave Sarachan played defending European champions Portugal to a 1-1 draw.

On the youth side, the U.S. was one of only two nations to see its U-17 and U-20 Men's National Teams reach the Quarterfinals of their respective World Cups. The U-17 squad secured its spot at its World Cup with a second-place finish at the Concacaf U-17 Championship. The U-20 MNT qualified for the competition by winning the Concacaf U-20 Championship for the first time in federation history, defeating Honduras on penalties.

Additionally, the Paralympic National Team earned its best finish at a major world competition since the 1996 Paralympic Games with a fifth-place result at the 2017 IFCPF CP Football World Championships in San Luis, Argentina.

**2018:** The U.S. Women's National Team went unbeaten through 20 matches in 11 states and two countries in a year that will go down as one of the most successful in program history. The squad lifted three trophies by winning the SheBelieves Cup, the Tournament of Nations, and the Concacaf Championship. Jill Ellis' side punched its ticket to the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup in dominant fashion, winning all five qualifiers by a combined score of 26-0. In its penultimate match of the year, the USA captured its 500th all-time victory with a 1-0 win versus Portugal in Lisbon.

The U.S. Men's National Team took on a transitional year in 2018 by facing one of the most challenging schedules in team history. The USA squared off against the likes of Brazil, England, Italy, and Colombia in a gauntlet designed to test a new generation of the red, white, and blue. One of the team's best moments came in June, when it drew eventual World Cup champion France, 1-1, in Lyon. The USA then hired its first-ever General Manager in Earnie Stewart and new head coach Gregg Berhalter to lead the charge toward the 2022 World Cup.

On the youth side, the U-15 Girls' National Team, U-17 Women's National Team, and U-20 Men's National Team all won Concacaf Championships. The Para 7-a-Side team qualified for the 2019 IFCPF World Cup with a third-place finish at Copa America.

And in a momentous moment for soccer in the U.S., the United Bid of Canada, Mexico and the United States, was awarded hosting rights for the 2026 FIFA World Cup. The 2026 competition will be the first to host an expanded field of 48 teams. The three Federations are now working to build excitement, energy and awareness for what will be the biggest World Cup in history!

**2019:** The U.S. Women's National Team experienced an historic 2019 that saw the team win its fourth World Cup title. The U.S. set Women's World Cup records for goals (26), goal differential (plus-23) and never trailed to become the first team to go 7-0-0 in the Women's World Cup. Midfielder Megan Rapinoe was awarded the Golden Ball as the tournament's best player and the Golden Boot as its top scorer with six goals and three assists. At the conclusion of the 2019 Victory Tour, head coach Jill Ellis retired with

a remarkable 106-7-19 overall record. On October 28, U.S. Soccer announced Vlatko Andonovski as the ninth head coach in USWNT history. The Andonovski era started on a high note as the U.S. closed out 2019 with wins over Sweden and Costa Rica.

In head coach Gregg Berhalter's first year in charge, the U.S. Men's National Team started his tenure with friendly wins over Panama, Costa Rica and Ecuador while earning a 1-1 draw with defending Copa América champions Chile. En route to its 11th Gold Cup Final, the USMNT outscored opponents 15-1 in three group stage and two knockout round matches before falling to Mexico, 1-0. After another loss to Mexico in a friendly a couple of months later, the U.S. rebounded with a 1-1 draw vs. world No. 5 Uruguay. The inaugural edition of the Concacaf Nations League served as the next set of games on the schedule for the USA. Drawn into Nations League A, Group A, the USMNT closed out the year with home and away matches against Canada and Cuba. With two wins against Cuba and one over Canada, the U.S. advanced to the Final Round of Nations League and finished the year at No. 22 in FIFA's world rankings, up three spots from 2018, its highest year-end finish since 2013 (14th).

On the youth side, the U.S. became the only nation to reach the guarterfinals of the last three U-20 World Cups. Before falling to Ecuador in the guarterfinals, the U-20 USMNT advanced to the knockout stage with wins over Nigeria and Qatar before upsetting tournament favorite France with a 3-2 comeback victory in the Round of 16. The U-17 USMNT qualified for a record 17th FIFA U-17 World Cup after reaching the 2019 Concacaf U-17 Championship Final. With wins over Belgium, Czech Republic and the Republic of Ireland, the U.S. Under-17 Women's National Team won the UEFA Women's Development Tournament in Czech Republic. Additionally, the U.S. Para 7-a-Side National Team won the program's first Parapan American Games medal with a dominating 7-0 win against Venezuela to claim the bronze at the 2019 tournament and the Beach Soccer Women's National Team was launched.

**2020:** A year that was supposed to be a busy schedule for the U.S. Men's and Women's National Teams as well as several youth teams was largely halted due to the global health pandemic caused by the COVID-19 outbreak in March.

In their first full year under head coach Vlatko Andonovski, the U.S. Women's National Team started 2020 with an energy and performances befitting a team aiming to win a World Cup and an Olympics in backto-back years. Yet the day after the USA won the 2020 SheBelieves Cup and capped a perfect 8-0-0 start to 2020 – including qualifying for the Tokyo Games – the sports world shut down. The Olympics were eventually postponed, all of the USA's programming was cancelled, and the team would not hit the field again for seven months when an October training camp was held in Colorado. On Nov. 27, the USWNT finally played its first game in 261 days, a rousing 2-0 win vs. the Netherlands in Breda to close the year ranked No. 1 in the world.

The U.S. Men's National Team opened the year with a 1-0 win over Costa Rica in February, then did not reconvene again until November, playing Wales to a 0-0 draw on Nov. 12 and beating Panama, 6-2, on Nov. 16. Gregg Berhalter's side then closed the year with a commanding 6-0 victory over El Salvador in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, the first domestic match for any U.S. National Team since the start of the pandemic.

On the youth side, the Under-20 U.S. Women's National Team opened the year by winning the 2020 Concacaf Women's U-20 Championship and in the process, qualifying for the Under-20 Women's World Cup. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, all youth World Cups scheduled for 2020 and 2021 were cancelled.

2021: The U.S. Women's National Team hit the ground running in 2021, becoming the first team to win backto-back SheBelieves Cup titles in the tournament's six-year history after recording wins over Canada, Brazil, and Argentina, while also becoming the first team to finish the tournament without conceding any goals. In July, the team earned its first-ever bronze medal at the delayed 2020 Olympic Tournament in Tokyo, which had been pushed back a year due to the COVID-19 global pandemic. During that competition, Samantha Mewis and Kristie Mewis made history by becoming the first sisters to represent the USWNT at a major senior tournament (after doing so at two Youth FIFA World Cups). The team finished the year with a 17-2-5 record, a +64 goal differential and an .812 winning percentage, all the while continuing to build on a 62-game home unbeaten streak to end 2021. The USWNT once again finished the year at the top of the FIFA Rankings. Six players earned their first cap on the year, while legendary midfielder-turnedforward Carli Lloyd retired as the second-most capped player in world soccer history with 316 games played.

The Men's National Team recorded one of its best years in history, setting a record for most wins in a calendar year after posting a 17-2-3 record in 2021. The USMNT won two major titles in one summer as they conquered the Concacaf Gold Cup and the inaugural Concacaf Nations League – beating archrival Mexico in both finals -- while featuring two young and almost completely different rosters in each tournament. The team went on to finish the year with three wins against El Tri after adding a thrilling "Dos a Cero" victory in Cincinnati during World Cup Qualifying. The MNT also ended the year ranked

11th in the FIFA World Rankings, making the USA the highest-ranked in Concacaf and marking their highest year-end ranking since 2005. In addition to 27 players earning their first appearance in a World Cup Qualifier, head coach Gregg Berhalter twice sent out starting lineups that were the youngest ever for the United States in a qualifier. The team also boasted a +34 goal differential, a .841 winning percentage, and a .54 goals against average, all of which were best in team history, while their 12 clean sheets tied their best record in that category.

On the youth side, after a long pause in regular programming due to the pandemic, the U-17 and U-20 U.S. Women's Youth National Teams and the U-17 Men's Youth National Team returned to the field in October with training camps in Chula Vista. Calif. In November, the U-20 MYNT kicked off a new cycle at the Revelations Cup in Mexico as it prepares for the 2022 Concacaf U-20 Championship which will serve as qualification to the 2023 FIFA U-20 World Cup and the 2024 Summer Olympics. The U-20 WYNT also held an end-of-year training camp in December as they prepared for the 2022 Concacaf U-20 Women's Championship in early 2022 in the Dominican Republic. The YNT programs underwent several changes in coaching staffs as Gonzalo Segares was named U-17 MYNT head coach (previously U-15 MYNT) and Tracey Kevins was named U-20 WYNT head coach (previously U-15 and U-17 WYNT), while Mikey Varas, Natalia Astrain, and Katie Schoepfer were hired as U-20 MYNT, U-17 WYNT, and U-15 WYNT head coaches, respectively.

**2022:** The U.S. Women's National Team started off the year by winning its fifth overall SheBelieves Cup title in a tournament that included Iceland, Czech Republic and 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup cohost New Zealand. In July, the USA won the 2022 Concacaf W Championship in Monterrey, Mexico, to earn berths to both the 2023 WWC and the 2024 Paris Olympics. In the newly formatted tournament, the U.S. Women claimed the title with a 5-0-0 run and a 1-0 victory over Canada in the championship game. The USWNT closed out the year with losses at England and Spain, then split with Germany in a

two-game set at home, but still finished 2022 ranked No. 1 in the world for the seventh consecutive year.

The U.S. Men's National Team closed out the arduous and demanding qualification process in the Octagonal in March 2022, earning one of the confederation's three automatic berths to the World Cup and returning to the world's biggest stage for the first time since 2014. The USA's starting lineups during those games averaged 23 years, 302 days, which is the youngest average age in team history during a qualifying cycle. Just weeks later, the team was drawn into one of the most challenging groups in Qatar alongside England, Wales and IR Iran. The USA earned a win and two draws to advance out of the group, all the while making history as the match against England set a record for the most-watched men's soccer game on American English-language television ever, amassing 15.3 million viewers on FOX plus another 4.6 million on Telemundo. After the team's World Cup exit in the Round of 16 against Netherlands, the USA finished the year ranked 13th in the FIFA world rankings.

On the Youth side, the U-20 Men's Youth National Team won its third consecutive Concacaf U-20 Championship title, qualifying for the 2024 Olympics in Paris in the process and marking the USA's return to its first Men's Olympic Football Tournament since Beijing 2008. The U-17 Women's Youth National Team won its third consecutive and record fifth overall Concacaf Women's U-17 Championship and went on to reach the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup Quarterfinals after topping their group, before falling just short against Nigeria in penalty kicks. The U-20 WYNT went undefeated to win the Concacaf Women's U-20 Championship, earning a record seventh Concacaf title for this age group. The USA bowed out of the U-20 Women's World Cup in the group stage, albeit after matches against tough opposition in Japan, Netherlands and Ghana.

### 2022 U.S. Soccer Players of the Year

For their excellence at the highest levels of the sport, U.S. Soccer voters named U.S. Men's National Team midfielder **TYLER ADAMS** as the 2022 BioSteel Male Player of the Year, forward **SOPHIA SMITH** as the 2022 BioSteel Female Player of the Year, midfielder **YUNUS MUSAH** as the 2022 Chipotle Young Male Player of the Year, and midfielder/forward **JAEDYN SHAW** as the 2022 Chipotle Young Female Player of the Year.

The U.S. Soccer Player of the Year awards have a longer history than any major individual award in American soccer – having first begun more than 30 years ago. Alongside the Best of FIFA awards, the U.S. Player of the Year awards are the only awards to honor both the top male and the top female in the sport.

Votes are collected from respective National Team coaches, National Team players who have earned a cap in the applicable calendar year, American soccer league (MLS, USL and NWSL) head coaches, select media members, former players and administrators. Players cannot win the Young Male or Young Female award more than once. For the second consecutive year, fans were able to vote for the U.S. Soccer Player and Young Player of the Year Awards with those votes weighted at 15% of the total.

# BIOSTEEL U.S. SOCCER MALE PLAYER OF THE YEAR Tyler ADAMS

Midfielder Tyler Adams was voted the 2022 BioSteel U.S. Soccer Male Player of the Year after captaining the U.S. Men's National Team at the 2022 FIFA World Cup to cap off an excellent year for club and country. Selected by his teammates to wear the armband in Qatar, the midfielder led the USMNT in minutes played this year and featured in every minute of the USA's successful World Cup run while winning the DFB-Pokal with RB Leipzig and making a massive impact since joining the English Premier League with Leeds United last summer.

Adams received his third nomination for the award, following his first full year with the USMNT in 2018 and after helping propel RB Leipzig to the UEFA Champions League Semifinals in 2020. He joins a long list of USMNT stars to win U.S. Soccer Male Player of the Year, which was first awarded in 1984 to Rick Davis.

The USMNT midfielder was critical to the team's success at the World Cup and Adams was electric in the middle of the park, his seemingly endless engine earning him Man of the Match honors in the USA's first two games – a 1-1 draw against Wales and 0-0 deadlock against No. 5-ranked England. The youngest captain at the tournament and the youngest USMNT captain at the World Cup since 1950, Adams was one of three players to play every possible minute in Qatar. Against the Netherlands in the Round of 16, Adams became the youngest U.S. captain ever in a World Cup Knockout Round match. The Wappingers Falls, N.Y., native also covered more ground than any other player on the field twice during the tournament, running 8.2 miles against Wales and eight miles in the Knockout Round-clinching victory against Iran.

On the year, Adams led the team with 1,131 minutes played and 14 starts while tying for the USMNT lead with 14 appearances. During World Cup qualifying, Adams played in 13 of 14 matches, tied for the team lead, including 12 starts.



# BIOSTEEL U.S. SOCCER FEMALE PLAYER OF THE YEAR **Sophia SMITH**

In a year in which she was the leading scorer for the U.S. Women's National Team and Portland Thorns FC, won the National Women's Soccer League Most Valuable Player and was named MVP of the NWSL Championship Game, forward Sophia Smith was voted the 2022 BioSteel U.S. Soccer Female Player of the Year.

This was the first U.S. Soccer Female Player of the Year award for Smith. She became the 19th different player to win the award in its 38-year history. Smith also became just the fourth player to win both U.S. Soccer Young Female Player of the Year (which she won in 2017) and U.S. Soccer Female Player of the Year, joining Tobin Heath, Julie Ertz (who won the Player of the Year twice), and Lindsey Horan, who was the 2021 U.S. Soccer Female Player of a finalist in 2022.

The 22-year-old Smith was the youngest player to lead the USA in scoring since 1993 and was the youngest-ever NWSL MVP. Not counting the Covid-19 impacted 2020 season, this was just Smith's second professional season.

Smith, who is the youngest USWNT player to win Female Player of the Year honors since a 22-year-old Mia Hamm was so honored in 1994, scored 11 goals for the USA in 2022 and started a team-high 17 matches. She was second on the team with 1,192 minutes played and she scored her first career hat trick on April 9 vs. Uzbekistan, becoming the youngest USWNT player since 2000 and the fifth youngest to net a hat trick in USWNT history.

Smith also scored against Colombia (2), Jamaica (2), Nigeria (2), England (at a packed Wembley Stadium in front of nearly 77,000 fans) and Germany (in the USA's 2-1 win to end the year).

# CHIPOTLE U.S. SOCCER YOUNG MALE PLAYER OF THE YEAR YUNUS MUSAH

Yunus Musah was voted the 2022 Chipotle U.S. Soccer Young Male Player of the Year after capping off one of the most productive runs ever for a teenager representing the USMNT. Before turning 20 during the 2022 FIFA World Cup, the midfielder logged the most minutes and starts for a teenager in team history while playing a critical role in the midfield during the USA's successful run in Qatar.

2022 marked Musah's third nomination for the award after making his senior international debut for the U.S. in 2020 and establishing himself as a USMNT regular in 2021. He joins a long list of talented players to win U.S. Soccer Young Male Player of the Year, which was first awarded in 1998 to Josh Wolff.

The U.S. midfield was a key driver of the team's success at the World Cup and Musah started all four matches in Qatar alongside captain Tyler Adams and Weston McKennie. The Valencia midfielder became the first teenager to start a World Cup match for the USA as well as the first to appear in multiple matches as he logged 345 minutes out of a possible 360 during the tournament.

Before his 20th birthday on Nov. 29, the day of the USA's knockout round-clinching victory vs. IR Iran at the World Cup, Musah's 1578 minutes played and 20 starts set new records for a teenager with the USMNT, while his 21 caps equaled the previous mark set by Jozy Altidore and Christian Pulisic.

On the year, Musah played in a career-high 12 matches and logged 1000 minutes, second for USMNT midfielders behind Adams. The midfielder also earned Man of the Match honors twice, during a crucial 0-0 draw against Mexico at the famed Estadio Azteca on March 24 and following a dominant, gritty performance in the 1-1 draw at El Salvador in Concacaf Nations League play on June 14.

# CHIPOTLE U.S. SOCCER YOUNG FEMALE PLAYER OF THE YEAR Jaedyn SHAW


Midfielder/forward Jaedyn Shaw was voted the Chipotle U.S. Soccer Young Female Player of the Year after a standout rookie season in the NWSL with San Diego Wave FC and a solid performance at the 2022 FIFA Under-20 Women's World Cup. She joins a long line of talented players to win the U.S. Soccer Young Female Player of the Year Award, which was first awarded in 1998 to current U.S. Soccer President Cindy Parlow Cone.

Shaw, who turned 18 in November of 2022, entered the NWSL via the Discovery Process and signed her first professional contract with the Wave on July 18, 2022, after training for six months with the Washington Spirit. She made her pro debut on July 30, 2022, scoring 28 minutes into her first game and first start against the Chicago Red Stars. The goal turned out to be the game-winner in the Wave's 1-0 victory and she got on a plane the next day to join the U.S. U-20 WYNT for its pre-World Cup training camp in Houston, Texas.

Shaw made a late run to earn a spot on the roster in Costa Rica, but then played in all three matches, starting two, in what was her first FIFA World Cup. She ended the year with seven U-20 caps and three goals, scoring against Costa Rica, Mexico and the Netherlands, the latter two to help the USA win the Sud Ladies Cup in Aubagne, France. Shaw is age-eligible for the 2024 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup.

The Texas native not only became the youngest player to score in her first NWSL match, but remarkably, scored in three of her first four professional matches, finishing the season year with three goals – one with her left foot, one with her right and one with her head – in seven games spanning 378 minutes played, helping the Wave reach the NWSL semifinals.





# 2022 ADAPTandTHRIVE and **Extended National Team Awards**

Six winners for U.S. Soccer's new end-of-year awards in disability soccer, beach soccer and futsal were announced in 2022. The ADAPTandTHRIVE Disability Award recognizes an individual making an impact in the United States' broad landscape of disability soccer, while the Beach Soccer Female and Male Plaver of the Year Awards. the Futsal Player of the Year Award, and the CP Female and Male Player of the Year Awards, presented by Degree, honor players from U.S. Soccer's Extended National Teams excelling at other versions of the sport on the sand and court.

Danhouser earned the honor after serving on the Board for Diversity and Inclusion in Soccer with the U.S. Soccer Coaches community, as well as for his work with US Youth Soccer's TOPSoccer (The Outreach Program for Soccer), a community-based training program for athletes with intellectual, emotional and/or physical disabilities to play the game in a safe, fun and supportive environment. He is also a member of the Disabilities Allies Coaches Community, dedicated to providing resources and information, raising awareness, and creating a community for coaches of athletes with disabilities and coaches with disabilities to share experiences and ideas. He is also a coach at Addison United in Addison, III. outside of Chicago.

# Beach Soccer Male Player of the Year: Nico PEREA Perea earned his second consecutive Player of the Year honors after helping to lead the U.S. Beach Men's National Team to a runner-up finish at the Mundialito, including scoring a goal as the team defeated No. 2 ranked Portugal 6-5 in their second match of the tournament. Perea also scored



## Beach Soccer Female Player of the Year: Ali HALL

Hall earned her second Player of the Year Award after displaying tremendous defensive prowess and versatility to contribute anywhere on the field. Hall finished 2022 with three goals and two assists in three matches played, helping the team to a first-place finish at the 2022 Women's Beach Soccer Cup in El Salvador with wins against Argentina, Bahamas, and El Salvador.

## Futsal Player of the Year: Diego BURATO

Burato was a standout in his international debut, tallying two goals and three assists in six games played in 2022. The U.S. Futsal National Team returned to action at the 2022 Umag Nations Cup in Croatia, winning the tournament after defeating the Czech Republic U-21s (5-3), Slovenia U-21s (5-2) and France U-23s (5-3) in the friendly tournament played at the Novigrad Sports Hall. Burato was especially key in the victory over the Czech Republic U-21s as he scored his first two international goals. The FNT also played three friendly matches during the two-week trip in Croatia, tying and defeating Montenegro's full team prior the tournament, and beating the Czech Republic U-21s again on the last day. Burato was one of 10 players who made their USA debuts as the team went undefeated over the six matches.

#### CP Female Player of the Year, presented by Degree: Michelle CROSS

twice during the team's run at the Intercontinental Beach Soccer Cup in Dubai.

In the team's inaugural year, Cross was the only player to feature in every minute of the USA's IFCPF Women's World Cup triumph which included a 4-0-1 record and a thrilling 4-2 win in extra time to win the final.

#### CP Male Player of the Year, presented by Degree: John SULLIVAN

On the CP MNT side, Sullivan had his most impactful season with strong distribution and ballwinning skills across consistent performances while helping the team to its strongest ever showing at the IFCPC Men's World Cup in 2022 with a fourth-place finish.

- · A rarity among professional athletes across all sports, USWNT captain Christie Rampone was honored for her

enduring professionalism and longevity at the highest level of soccer when she made her 300th appearance for her country against Mexico during Women's World Cup Qualifying, becoming just the second soccer player in history – man or woman – to achieve the feat.

- The torch was passed on to the next generation of the USMNT as three pillars of the team's unparalleled success over the last decade all announced their retirement: DaMarcus Beasley, Carlos Bocanegra and Landon Donovan.
- With his team approaching its final group game at the 2014 FIFA World Cup, USMNT head coach Jurgen Klinsmann wrote a letter asking that fans be released from work in order to cheer on the USA against Germany. His words went viral on the internet, spawning numerous positive responses from bosses, celebrities and politicians as well as more than a few copy cats.
- USMNT goalkeeper Tim Howard turned in a larger-thanlife performance in the USA's Round of 16, overtime defeat to Belgium at the 2014 FIFA World Cup, making a tournament-record 16 saves and cementing his legacy among soccer fans as first goalkeeper to become the "Secretary of Defense."
- U.S. Soccer enjoyed a record year of fan support and interaction, from the thousands that followed the USMNT to Brazil for the 2014 FIFA World Cup to the ever-present USWNT fans that cheered on the team as it qualified for the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup. An assuredly giant leap was made by U.S. Soccer with the help of its fans and partners in 2014, one that has raised the bar higher than ever before in the United States.



# **BEST OF U.S. SOCCER #100YEARS EDITION WINNER**

In 2013, U.S. Soccer provided fans with the opportunity to determine the top moment of the Federation's history. Set up as a bracket-style competition that pits the top moments across U.S. Soccer's 100-year history head-to-head, fans voted daily to determine their favorite moment of all-time.

Abby Wambach's dramatic and stunning goal against Brazil in the 2011 FIFA Women's World Cup quarterfinal defeated all challengers to win the Best of U.S. Soccer: #100Years Edition. More than 10,000 fans voted on the final matchup to crown Wambach the winner, while more than 210,000 votes were cast overall.

Wambach's stoppage-time score that pulled the USA even at 2-2 at the very end of overtime in a match that the USA eventually won in penalty kicks, triumphed in all six of its matchups during the 64-moment bracket-style competition. In the final round, Wambach's 122nd-minute header off a cross from Megan Rapinoe – which at the time was the latest goal ever scored in a FIFA competition – edged Landon Donovan's historic strike in the waning seconds of the USA's last match of group play against Algeria at the 2010 FIFA World Cup in South Africa.

Please familiarize yourself with the information and policies in this document so that your coverage of the U.S. National Teams is conducted in the most efficient manner possible. These guidelines and policies are enforced by the U.S. Soccer Communications Department. # **GENERAL GUIDELINES**

# **Professional Conduct**

Media are expected to follow the guidelines set forth in this document, as well as the instructions of U.S. Soccer staff, stadium employees and security, at the risk of limitation of access or revocation of credentials.

Media credentials are issued with the purpose of providing access to interviews and written, audio and visual accounts of the game as appropriate. Media members should not use access for autographs, personal photographs or commercial requests.

Media credentialed for access to shoot photographs and video are expected to use professional equipment to file photographic or video accounts. Use of equipment such as 'point and shoot' style cameras or mobile telephones that are not considered professional equipment will result in access being restricted or rescinded.

# **Media Services**

Press Releases: To be added to the U.S. Soccer media distribution list, please visit www.ussoccer.com/mediaservices.

**Media Guides:** To request a current media guide for the U.S. Men's or Women's National Team, please send an email request to communications@ussoccer.org. A digital version of the Men's and Women's National Team's media guides can be found on the Media Guide page in the right-hand navigation column.

Interview Requests: Media requesting interviews with U.S. National Team players, coaches or administrators should make arrangements with the U.S. Soccer Communications Department or the onsite press officer with the respective team. When requesting and conducting interviews, media should identify the organization that they are representing, and provide advance notice if audio or video will be recorded for later distribution. All audio and video interviews are subject to U.S. Soccer's Video Guidelines, which are included in this document.

**ussoccer.com:** Is the official web site of the U.S. Soccer Federation. All press releases – content that includes a dateline are posted on ussoccer.com, and can be republished by media in their entirety. U.S. Soccer press releases are available in Spanish. Media interested in receiving press releases in Spanish can send an email request to communications@ussoccer.org.

Video: Media are welcome to embed videos that appear on ussoccer.com. Visit youtube.com/ ussoccerdotcom and http://www.ussoccer.com/stories for the latest U.S. Soccer-produced videos.

Audio, Video Roll & Interviews: U.S. Soccer periodically sends out video and audio media rolls from National Team events for outlets to use free of charge, provided they properly credit video as; Courtesy of U.S. Soccer/Veritone. If you'd like to sign up for the email list that distributes these media rolls, please email communications@ussoccer.org with Media Roll in the subject line.

**Twitter:** U.S. Soccer provides updates at www.twitter.com/ussoccer that include breaking news and new content posted to ussoccer.com. # **U.S. SOCCER EVENTS**

# **Credentials**

**Policies:** In addition to the policies listed below, please note that only working media will be credentialed and no one under the age of 18 will be issued a credential.

**Applications:** Media can request credentials for matches online at www.ussoccer.com/media-services/mediacredentials. The online application process can be found by clicking on the Media Services link in the footer on the front page of ussoccer.com. Media can also contact U.S. Soccer Communications with questions on the application process directly by phone at 312-808-1300 or e-mail at communications@ussoccer.org.

**Deadlines:** The deadline to apply for credentials to U.S. Soccer events is generally two (2) weeks prior to the game. There is no guarantee that late applications will be accepted.

**Pickup:** U.S. Soccer will distribute credential pickup times prior to each game. Credential pickup times generally coincide with media availabilities. For pickup on the day of the game, Media Will Call at the stadium will open approximately two (2) to (3) three hours before kickoff. Each media member must show identification in order to receive their credential. An individual cannot pick up more than one credential.

**Parking Shipping:** If you would like single-game parking passes (subject to availability) to be shipped, please provide a UPS or FedEx account number at least two (2) weeks prior to the game. Replacement parking passes cannot be provided if lost in transit.

**All Matches Credential Holders:** All media provided an All Matches credential must still inform the U.S. Soccer Communications Department of their plans to attend specific matches to ensure a space in the press box. Please do so at least two (2) weeks in advance of a match.

# **Media Facilities**

Media facilities, including the press box and photographers' work area, will open approximately two (2) - three (3) hours before each game.

Press Box: All seats will be assigned. Auxiliary seating arrangements will be made if the capacity of the press box is exceeded.

Photographer Work Room: Where available, a photographer work room will be available at field level.

Internet: Wireless Internet access will be provided to media filing on deadline.

Game Notes & Media Guides: Game notes will be distributed digitally ahead of each game. Media guides will be made available upon request and digital versions are available online at ussoccer.com/about/us-soccer-media-services.

Lineups: Official lineups are made available approximately one (1) hour prior to kickoff. Lineups, which include jersey numbers for each team, will be distributed to the media as quickly as possible.

# Media Access / Interviews

There is no pre-game access to U.S. Soccer players and coaches on game days. No "flash" interviews are permitted on the field. All post-game access is available in the press conference and mixed zone.

**Press Conference:** There will be a formal press conference with the head coach shortly after the final whistle. In the event something changes a member of the U.S. Soccer communications staff will inform the media.

**Mixed Zone:** Locker rooms are not open to the media at U.S. Soccer events. All post-game interviews will be conducted in a press conference or mixed zone. Players from both teams will typically be available in the mixed zone. The media mixed zone will generally be near the locker rooms.

# **Print & Online Media**

Live Blogging / Commentary: Live blogging of U.S. Soccer events from either the venue or via the television broadcast is subject to our Live Blogging Guidelines. The guidelines are included in Appendix III of this document.

Video: Please notify U.S. Soccer in advance if your coverage includes video recording. Any video footage, including interviews, gathered by print and online media is subject to the U.S. Soccer Video Guidelines. The Video Guidelines are included in Appendix I of this document.

Audio: Please notify U.S. Soccer in advance if your coverage includes audio recording. Any audio, including interviews, gathered by radio, print and online media is subject to the U.S. Soccer Audio Use Guidelines. The guidelines are included in Appendix II of this document.

# Radio - Non Rights Holders

Non-rights-holding radio journalists are welcome to conduct pregame and postgame reports from the press box, but NO play-by-play reports are permitted. Radio non-rights-holders will have access to post-match press conference and mixed zones unless otherwise notified. Radio outlets interested in purchasing rights should contact U.S. Soccer at media@ussoccer.org.

Audio: Any audio, including interviews, gathered by radio, print and online media is subject to the U.S. Soccer Audio Use Guidelines. The guidelines are included in Appendix II of this document.

# **Field Access**

Print, online and radio writers and reporters are not permitted on the field at any time. Media members granted field access must have a working purpose. Representatives from the broadcast media who are not filing reports, but would like to attend as an observer, should inform U.S. Soccer of such when making the application.

# **Still Photographers**

**Locations:** Still photographers are permitted to shoot U.S. Soccer events from behind the field sign boards in either end line. At events where space allows, photographers may also shoot on the sideline opposite the benches between the end line and the 18-yard line. Shooting from the 18-yard line will be allowed on a match-by-match basis depending on space. The attacking direction of the teams is determined by a coin toss. Following the coin toss, photographers must pick one end of the field to shoot for the entire half. The ONLY time photographers may change ends is at halftime. At NO time are photographers allowed on the field of play.

**Photo Marshals:** U.S. Soccer will use photo marshals to assist on-field media. Photo marshals can assist with providing lineups/rosters, distributing bibs and assist with questions on location and other topics. Photographers are required to follow all instructions of the photo marshals.

**Bibs:** All still photographers are required to wear a colored bib as provided by U.S. Soccer. The bib is lightweight and designed to be worn outside of outerwear and be visible at all times. Please return the bibs to a photo marshal following the game, or leave them in the press box / photographers' work room.

**Pre-Game Photos:** Each team's starters will pose for a pre-game photo near the bench area following the national anthems. Photographers should gather in the near-side corners once the teams leave the field after warm-ups. U.S. Soccer will escort the photographers to midfield.

Field Watering: The grounds crew may water the field prior to warm-ups and also prior to kickoff. Please be responsible for your equipment during this time. U.S. Soccer is not responsible for damage to any equipment.

# Non-Rights Holder Video (ENG)

Video Footage: All non-rights holders and ENG crews must follow the U.S. Soccer Video Guidelines for all footage gathered at events. The Video Guidelines are included in Appendix I of this document.

**TV Reporters:** ENG reporters may stay on the field until two (2) hours prior to kickoff to shoot 'scene sets,' and are not allowed on the field again until after the conclusion of the broadcast window. Reporters/anchors will not be issued a bib. U.S. Soccer will not generally credential non-rights holder producers, editors, or technicians.

**Location:** ENG cameras are permitted to shoot U.S. Soccer events from behind the field sign boards of either end line. The attacking direction of the teams is determined by a coin toss. Following the coin toss, ENG cameras must pick one end of the field to shoot for the entire half. The ONLY time ENG crews may change ends is at halftime. At NO time are any media members allowed on the field of play.

# MEDIA SERVICES

**Photo Marshals:** U.S. Soccer will use photo marshals to assist on-field media. Photo marshals can assist with providing lineups/rosters, distributing bibs and assist with questions on location and other topics. ENG crews are required to follow all instructions of the photo marshals.

**Bibs:** All ENG camera operators are required to wear a colored bib as provided by U.S. Soccer. The bib is lightweight and designed to be worn outside of outerwear and be visible at all times. Please return the bibs to a photo marshal following the game, or leave them in the press box / photographers' work room.

Field Watering: The grounds crew may water the field prior to warm-ups and also prior to kickoff. Please be responsible for your equipment during this time. U.S. Soccer is not responsible for damage to any equipment.

Live Newscasts: Please contact U.S. Soccer in advance of the event if you would like to broadcast live pre or post-game as part of a newscast from the stadium.

# **Social Media**

U.S. Soccer will not generally credential media looking to cover a U.S. Soccer event only for social media purposes. This means someone looking to provide coverage of a match for social media sites not limited or restricted to; Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc., will be considered for a press credential on a case basis but in most cases will not be accommodated for a press credential.

**Social Media Reporting:** U.S. Soccer permits credentialed reporters to report on behalf of their media organizations through social media channels or personal accounts. U.S. Soccer permits pictures to be taken from the press box for social media reporting purposes but prohibits the collection of any type of video from the press box. Doing so may result in revocation of press credentials.

# APPENDIX I: NON-RIGHTS HOLDER VIDEO GUIDELINES

Video Footage: All rights to match footage including all applicable copyrights belong to U.S. Soccer and its rights holders who broadcast each specific match. U.S. Soccer has two rights holders that will broadcast their Men's National Team and Women's National Team matches in 2023: WBD Sports and Telemundo. If an organization is interested in recording video footage at a U.S. Soccer match for non-news gathering purposes they should contact U.S. Soccer Communications at media@ussoccer.org.

# **Television Broadcasters**

**Game Action:** Local television affiliates can use footage of U.S. Soccer events obtained either via 1) their own recording or 2) action dubbed from a U.S. Soccer rights holder broadcast with credit only in connection with its regularly scheduled news programming within a week of the game. This footage should not exceed two (2) minutes. Highlights aired as part of a continuous news program should not be longer than one (1) minute per 30-minute segment.

Filming – Game Action: For televised events, local non-rights holders affiliates / ENG cameras may record the first 15 minutes of each half (from 00:00 to 15:00 and 45:00 to 60:00 on the game clock). For non-televised events, non-rights holders / ENG cameras may record the entire game but are still subject to the aforementioned limits. This includes events that are web streamed live online.

Filming – Interviews and Scene Sets: There is no limit to the gathering of footage pre-game, at halftime and post-game. All footage gathered is subject to the usage guidelines indicated in this document.

Filming – In Seating Area: Video cameras looking to shoot in the concourse or seating area must contact U.S. Soccer in advance of the event for approval.

**Previews or Advances:** In advance of a U.S. Soccer event, television broadcasters can use two (2) minutes of archival game action to preview an upcoming event. In the local/regional markets, broadcasters should mention the time and location of the game along with their report. Outside of the local markets, broadcasters should mention the time and broadcast information.

**Television Broadcasters' Web Sites:** Video produced for air as part of regular programming that is simulcast or archived online must be accompanied by a link to ussoccer.com. Content produced exclusively for the Internet is subject to the guidelines for Online Video.

U.S. Soccer Video Dept. Audio and Video Roll: U.S. Soccer periodically sends out video and audio media rolls

from National Team events for outlets to use free of charge, provided they properly credit video as; Courtesy of U.S. Soccer/Veritone. If you'd like to sign up for the email list that distributes these media rolls, please email communications@ussoccer.org with "Media Roll" in the subject line.

# **Online Video**

**Game Action:** Online organizations (including print publications that post video online) are not permitted to film or use game action video at any time. Game action includes any footage of the field, teams, etc., following the beginning of the television broadcast window. Only video of off-field activities (i.e. interviews, training sessions) may be recorded.

**Non-Game Video:** Any video posted online that is recorded as part of media access is limited to the use of eight (8) minutes per day/activity date. Online video may not incorporate integrated advertising and must be accompanied by links to ussoccer.com.

**Professional Presentation:** Online video is expected to be recorded, edited and presented in a professional manner. Video must be presented/hosted on an organization's website, and not solely on a site provided by a third-party (i.e. YouTube, Vimeo, Facebook, etc.).

**Online Video Sites:** Organizations who regularly post video to online video sites (i.e. YouTube, Vimeo, etc.) may not include advertising with video gathered as a result of media access. Allowing users to embed these videos is not permitted, and the description of any video must include a link to ussoccer.com.

# APPENDIX II: NON-RIGHTS HOLDER AUDIO GUIDELINES

# **Radio Broadcasters**

Play-by-Play Accounts: Play-by-play accounts are forbidden by non-rights holders at any time.

Non-Game Audio: Any online audio recorded as part of media access is limited to the use of eight (8) minutes per day/activity date. Audio posted on radio broadcaster websites must comply with Online Guidelines below.

# Online

**Non-Game Audio:** Any audio recorded as part of media access is limited to the use of eight (8) minutes per day/activity date. Online audio may not incorporate integrated advertising and must be accompanied by links to ussoccer.com.

# APPENDIX III: LIVE WRITTEN UPDATES

# All Media

Online or text reports (i.e., live blogs, Twitter, etc.) concerning U.S. Soccer games while they are in progress ("Live Written Updates") are subject to the following:

- Live updates may not use any audio, video or graphic simulations of U.S. Soccer games.
- Live updates must provide television and radio broadcast information for that U.S. Soccer Game. For example: "Tonight's U.S. Soccer game is being broadcast live on (name of television/radio station)."
- All live updates must be free of charge to readers.

**NOTE:** This policy does not prohibit the posting of the facts of a game (i.e., goals scored, cards given, game score and time remaining).

Her goal vs. Nigeria on Sept. 3 (which came from the penalty spot) was the 119th of her international career and heading into 2023, she is now 11 short of tying her childhood idol Kristine Lilly for fourth on the USA's all-time goals list ... Her goal vs. Nigeria also gave her 165 combined goals and assists for the USA, moving her past Tiffeny Milbrett for fifth best all-time in USWNT history ... The goal against Nigeria also meant that she has now scored against teams from all six FIFA Confederations, becoming the 14th USWNT player to accomplish that feat ... 2021: In her first full year back after giving birth, she played 965 minutes over 20 matches and made nine starts ... She was named the Player of the Game in the first match against Thailand and in the Semifinal ... Four of her goals against Thailand came in the second half ... Her sixth goal was one of the most important of the tournament as it came off a header off a cross from Lindsey Horan just after the half hour mark in the Semifinal against England and proved to be the game-winning goal ... In that Semifinal, she was also the recipient of a dangerous foul that earned England defender Millie Bright a red card with five minutes left in regulation time ... She had a performance for the ages against Thailand in the USA's opening game of the World Cup, tying a World Cup record with five goals while adding three assists ... She was named to the FIFA FIFPro World XI and finished second in the voting for the FIFA Best Women's Player of the Year behind Megan Rapinoe ... She finished third in the voting for France Football's Ballon d'Or ... She played a part in both goals in the epic 2-1 Quarterfinal win against France, getting fouled for the free kick that led to the first goal, and putting Tobin Heath through with a slick pass down the right side before Heath fed Rapinoe for what would be the game-winner ... Played in the final four games of the year, starting one, against Switzerland on Oct. 23 ... Youth National Teams: Played with the U.S. Under-23 Women's National Team in 2015, traveling to Spain to play in the La Manga tournament and scored against the Japan and England U-23 sides ... Also attended camps in 2014 ... Ended her U-23 career with two caps and two goals ... First Cap: Oct. 19, 2016, vs. Switzerland.

Professional / Club: Despite missing the entire 2022 NWSL season, her 57 career NWSL regular season goals heading into the 2023 regular season are third all-time in league history behind Australian Sam Kerr (77) and Canadian Christine Sinclair (59), and most ever for an American ...
