The following is a brief overview of MLS media guidelines for the 1996 season:

CREDENTIALS

Members of the working media requesting single-game credentials should call the media relations director of the home team for the specific game you are attending. Requests for season working media credentials should be made in writing, on company letterhead or by completing a Major League Soccer accreditation form. The requests can be faxed to the MLS Communications Department at (310) 843-4836 or mailed to MLS Communications Department, 2029 Century Park East, Suite 400, Los Angeles, CA, 90067, USA.

MLS INFORMATION SERVICES

In an effort to assist the media in covering MLS, the league will feature the following information services during the 1996 season:

MLS Fax-On-Demand -- This service offers general information on MLS along with updated statistics and team-by-team information by calling from the handset of your fax machine. For more information on MLS Fax-On-Demand, call Aaron Heifetz at 310/772-7505.

MLS News Releases -- The MLS Communications Department publishes the MLS news release every Tuesday during the regular season and playoffs. It contains news, current standings, complete player and team statistics, game results, injury reports, transactions, television schedule and league notes. To be placed on the mailing or fax list to receive the MLS news release, call Aaron Heifetz at (310) 772-7505.

NON-RIGHTS HOLDING ENG GUIDELINES

Electronic News Gathering (ENG) crews must agree to abide by the industry standard of film/video use within a 72-hour window of the conclusion of a televised event as part of a regularly scheduled news or sports program. No other usage rights are granted for any other broadcast or video applications.

Major League Soccer has a variety of other guidelines pertaining to ENG crews at broadcast and nonbroadcast events. ENG crews may acquire a copy of these guidelines by calling the MLS Communications Department.

LOCKER ROOM POLICY

MLS policy allows members of the working media access to all team locker rooms 10 minutes after the game has finished. Although there is no pre-game access, members of the working media may request pre-game interviews with players and coaches. Please submit your requests to the specific team media relations director. Only individuals with prominently displayed media credentials will gain admittance into locker rooms.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER LAUNCHES A NEW ERA IN PRO SOCCER

cross the United States and around the world, interest is high as a new era in professional sports arrives this spring with the launch of Major League Soccer. World-class professional outdoor soccer comes to the forefront of the American sports scene as MLS enters its inaugural season. MLS will begin with 10 teams that feature many of the superstars who emerged from the highly successful World Cup USA 1994.

Alexi Lalas, Jorge Campos, Carlos Valderrama and Cobi Jones are a few of the world-class players who became household names in the United States during World Cup USA 1994. These top players are now returning to showcase their skills in MLS. Sports fans eagerly await the return of these U.S. and international soccer heroes as evidenced by a recent ESPN Chilton sports poll. Soccer placed first among 10 different sports when an overwhelming 32% of the poll's overall respondents indicated that outdoor soccer was the hottest new sport in America among sports that had emerged within the last 10 years. With a strong on-field product, growing fan interest and the league's unique business plan, the time is right for Major League Soccer.

THE SINGLE-ENTITY CONCEPT

MLS features a unique ownership and operating structure. Unlike other professional sports leagues which are a confederation of individual franchise owners, MLS is structured as a single limited liability company (single-entity). In a single-entity league, each team operator owns a financial stake in the league, not just their individual team. In addition, player contracts are owned by the league rather than by individual teams.

The single-entity concept allows teams to operate autonomously in their markets, but with the incentive to see that all teams are financially successful. MLS believes this single-entity structure will enable it to avoid many of the pitfalls that have plagued other professional sports leagues. The single-entity structure will enable it to:

- Limit the financial disparities between large and small markets
- Offer commercial affiliates an integrated sponsorship and licensing program
- Decrease the opportunity for sponsor ambush
- Gain economies of scale in purchasing power and cost control
- Make decisions in the best interest of the entire league rather than just one team
- Control player acquisition costs and enforce a sensible player salary structure

THE STRUCTURE

MLS is currently the only Division I United States professional outdoor soccer league sanctioned by FIFA and

Top players from the collegiate ranks who will play in MLS include the Hermann Trophy and Missouri Athletic Club Award winners from the past two years.

On the international level, MLS Deputy Commissioner MLS has inked long-term commercial affiliates Sunil Gulati and the league's player personnel department have signed many world-class players from around the globe.

Jorge Campos, the colorful goalkeeper from Mexico's National Team, became MLS's first international player when he signed with the league June 6, 1995. Campos will electrify the fans in Los Angeles, minding the nets and playing forward for the Galaxy.

Other star players with significant international experience include:

· Colombia's midfield tandem of Carlos Valderrama ABC Sports and ESPN have entered into a threeand Leonel Alvarez. Valderrama will bring his playmaking ability to Tampa Bay while Alvarez will anchor the midfield for the Dallas Burn.

 Italian 1990 and 1994 World Cup midfielder Roberto Donadoni. Following 12 seasons in Italy's Serie A, including the last 10 years with world-renown A.C. Milan, Donadoni will grace the playing field at Giants Stadium as a member of the MetroStars. Bolivia's dynamic Marco Etcheverry. One of the top offensive players in the world, the 25-year-old Etcheverry will team with U.S. World Cup star John Harkes to give Washington D.C. United one of the league's top midfields.

 South Africa's creative midfielder Doctor Khumalo. Khumalo, who led South Africa to the 1996 African Nations Cup, will play for the Columbus Crew.

· Mexican superstar Hugo Sanchez. Mexico's mostlauded soccer player is among the world's most prolific goal scorers. Sanchez will play for the Dallas Burn. Zimbabwe National Team striker Vitalis Takawira. The speedy forward, who won the Golden Boot as the top goal scorer in Africa in 1994, will team with U.S. World Cup forward Frank Klopas to give the Kansas City Wiz two solid goal scorers.

 Nigerian National Team defenders Michael Emenalo and Uche Okafor. Emenalo, who played in three games for Nigeria's "Super Eagles" during World Cup USA 1994, will play midfield for the San Jose Clash while Ukafor will anchor the Kansas City Wiz defense.

In addition, other notable international players include 1995 Uruguavan First Division Most Valuable Player Washington Rodriguez (Burn), South African National Team striker Shaun Bartlett (Rapids), Ecuadorian National Team forward Eduardo Hurtado (Galaxy), El Salvador's Mauricio Cienfuegos (Galaxy) and Bolivia's Juan Berthy Suarez (United).

TELEVISION EXPOSURE

year broadcast agreement calling for 10 games to be televised on ESPN, 25 games on ESPN2 and the MLS Championship Game on ABC. The 1996 championship game will be broadcast on October 20. ESPN2 will broadcast MLS games primarily on Thursday nights during prime time. In addition to eight regular season and two playoff games, ESPN will broadcast the MLS All-Star Game from Giants Stadium.

OVERVIEW

Univision is the league's exclusive Spanish-language television partner and will broadcast an additional 26 matches on Sundays. World-famous broadcaster Andres Cantor will handle the call on Univision's national game-of-the-week. Along with ESPN. Univision will broadcast the MLS All-Star Game.

Major League Soccer games will be broadcast internationally by ESPN International, reaching more than 90 million households outside of the United States.

In addition to the league's comprehensive national and international television schedules. MLS teams will broadcast games in their local markets, allowing for fans to view more than 75 percent of all MLS games on television.



MLS INAUGURAL WEEKEND

Major League Soccer will get off to a grand beginning with the Inaugural Weekend, April 4-6, in San Jose, CA. The main event for the Weekend, Washington D.C. United vs. San Jose Clash, will feature world-class players including Marco Etcheverry, John Harkes and Eric Wynalda.

The Weekend quickly grabbed people's attention when the "singing" invitation was received by more than 1,100 national and international media, and MLS special guests. The cover of the invitation invited the recipient to "be a part of history," and when the invitation was opened, the popular soccer song, "Ole, Ole, Ole" could be heard.

All members of the MLS family - investors, sponsors, licensees, general managers, coaches, players, league officials - are expected to participate in the Weekend's activities.

The Weekend's events are set to begin on Thursday, April 4, when the Washington D.C. United and the San Jose Clash face off for the first time before the media. Thursday evening,

Major League Soccer's corporate marketing department will host a private reception for all MLS commercial affiliates.

On Friday, April 5, the media will be treated to two special panels. The first will include all 10 MLS coaches, and the second will include the MLS Management Committee, which is a committee made up of MLS investor representatives.

Both the Washington D.C. United and San Jose Clash are scheduled to practice Friday afternoon at Spartan Stadium. The Nike PLAY group (Participate in the Lives of America's Youth) will bring children from the East San Jose Youth Foundation to the Clash practice that afternoon to meet the players and engage in their own soccer instruction. On Friday evening, MLS guests will attend the AT&T Inaugural Game Dinner.

Saturday's events kick off with several of MLS's best known players hosting a breakfast. The MLS superstars will then head to Spartan Stadium for autograph sessions at Soccer Celebration. Saturday afternoon, MLS Official Sponsor Budweiser will host a tailgate party, and finally, at approximately 4:30 pm, the Opening Ceremony of the Inaugural Game will commence with entertainer Jon Secada. The Inaugural Game, broadcast live by ESPN, will begin at 5:00 pm (PST).

ALAN I. ROTHENBERG

Chairman

Alan I. Rothenberg, who spearheaded soccer's rise in the United States during the 1990s as Chairman of World Cup USA 1994 and President of the United States Soccer Federation, is the Chairman and Founder of Major League Soccer.

Alan I. Rothenberg

Rothenberg, who has been President of U.S. Soccer since August 5, 1990, oversaw World Cup USA 1994, the most successful event in FIFA history. World Cup USA 1994 left a significant legacy for soccer in the United States, including the formation

of Major League Soccer. With an operating surplus of approximately \$50 million — more than double early projections — World Cup USA 1994 funded the U.S. Soccer Foundation, an organization committed to promoting soccer in the United States. The legacy of World Cup USA 1994 also includes improved training facilities and stadiums in World Cup communities, upgraded to meet FIFA standards.

Rothenberg served as Commissioner of Soccer for the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles and was responsible for drawing the largest crowds of any sport at the '84 Games. Among other achievements during his more than 25 years of involvement in soccer are his ownership of the Los Angeles Aztecs of the North American Soccer League from 1977-1980, and his position as General Manager and Counselor of the Los Angeles Wolves of the United Soccer Association.

In addition to his soccer interests, Rothenberg served 15 years on the Board of Governors for the National Basketball Association (representing the Los Angeles Lakers and Clippers), and was President of the NBA's Los Angeles Clippers from 1982-89.

A former President of the State Bar of California, Rothenberg has practiced law in Los Angeles for more than 30 years. He began his sports business practice as Vice President and General Counsel for Jack Kent Cooke, Inc., a cable television company, and California Sports Inc., the parent company for the Los Angeles Lakers, Los Angeles Kings and The Forum. He appeared regularly on the ESPN sports talk program "SportsLook" as a commentator in the field of sports law.

Additionally, Rothenberg has chaired the American Bar Association's Committee on Sports Law since 1986, and has been an instructor of sports law at the University of Southern California.

Born April 10, 1939, he is a graduate of the University of Michigan with a bachelor of arts degree (1960) and a law degree (with distinction, 1963). He resides in Los Angeles along with his wife, Georgina. They have three sons - Brad, Richard and Danny.

Long-time sports and entertainment executive Douglas G. Logan was introduced as Major League Soccer's Commissioner, CEO and President on November 21, 1995. Logan comes to MLS with nearly 20 years experience in the sports and entertainment industry.

Prior to joining MLS, Logan was a self-employed sports marketing and event management consultant with clients including National Basketball Association teams, National Hockey League teams, SMG Management Company and OCESA (Operadora de Centros de Espectaculos, S.A.) in Mexico.

Douglas G. Logan

Logan was a Senior Vice President of Ogden Entertainment Services for seven years (1986-93), where he was responsible for managing the overall strategic and operational direction for the management and promotional division of Ogden. Under Logan's direction, the management and promotional division of Ogden developed from a start-up operation into a unit which generated more than \$230 million in revenue by 1993.

Fluent in Spanish, Logan relocated to Mexico City in 1993 when he was recruited to be the President/CEO of OCESA, a leader in the international entertainment industry. The private corporation has promoted hundreds of international events including rock concerts, family shows, Broadway shows, ballet and opera. In addition, OCESA has promoted and hosted several NBA exhibition games, including the 1994 NBA Challenge in Mexico City. The event featured a two-day, four-team exhibition including the NBA Champion Houston Rockets.

Logan's career in the sports and entertainment industry began in 1976 when he joined the city of Rockford, Illinois to head up its downtown redevelopment project. One of his first projects was overseeing the development of the 11,000-seat MetroCentre, which has become one of the most profitable arenas of its size in the United States. He pioneered the concept of facilities promoting their own events. In fact, the MetroCentre was the only building to self-promote a Rolling Stones concert during the band's 1981 tour. In addition, he served as General Manager of the CBA's Rockford Lightning from 1986-87. During his 10 years with the city of Rockford, he was responsible for booking and promoting over 860 events which were patronized by more than 3.5 million people.

A First Lieutenant in the United States Army from 1964-67, Logan spent 13 months in combat in Vietnam, earning two Bronze Stars.

Born May 11, 1943, in Glenridge, New Jersey, Logan grew up in Cuba, learning both English and Spanish as a youth. He attended Manhattan College and the University of Baltimore law school.

Logan and his wife, Ann, have two children and currently reside in Sarasota, Florida. Sons Carter (13) and Philip (11) have each been playing soccer since they were five years old. In addition, he has two children by a previous marriage, Douglas (29) and Caroline (26), along with one grandchild, Casey (2). During his spare time, the 53-year-old Logan enjoys bicycling, ocean kayaking and golf.

successful World Cup ever, Gulati's many responsibilities included competition, World Cup Travel Services and the World Cup Accommodation Bureau. In addition, he was a member of the World Cup USA 1994 Management Committee.



In his work for the United State Soccer Federation from 1987 to 1994, Gulati played a major role in the rise of the U.S. National Team to world prominence, serving in numerous positions including Managing Director of National Teams, Chairman of International Games Committee and Chairman of both U.S. Cup '92 and U.S. Cup '93. Gulati spearheaded U.S. Soccer's involvement with UNICEF and the Children's Defense Fund, leading to a donation of \$1,000,000 from the U.S. Soccer Federation in 1993.



In addition to his more than 20 years experience in soccer at all levels, Gulati also has an extensive academic background. He graduated Magna Cum Laude from Bucknell University followed by his M.A. and M.Phil. in Economics at Columbia University. Gulati served as an Assistant Professor of Economics at Columbia from 1986-90, before joining the World Bank through its Young Professionals Program in 1991 and serving as country economist for the emerging country of Moldova.



Executive Vice President Randy Bernstein oversees the marketing programs for Major League Soccer. Among his responsibilities are guiding the day-to-day operations of the league's broadcasting, licensing, sponsorship sales and services, promotions, team and youth soccer constituent services, media and public relations and publications departments.

OVERVIEW

Bernstein developed the outline and foundation for Major League Soccer's unique integrated marketing programs in sponsorship and licensing. Prior to the commencement of the inau-

gural season, long-term corporate sponsorships totaling more than \$50 million have been obtained from such internationally respected companies as AT&T, Anheuser-Busch, MasterCard International, Fujifilm and Nike. In an effort to increase soccer's popularity in the United States, Bernstein also orchestrated MLS's agreement with North American (now Major League) Soccer Camps presently operating in 38 states.

Prior to coming to MLS, Bernstein served as Senior Vice President of Corporate Marketing for the 1994 World Cup Organizing Committee where he was responsible for the sales and implementation of more than 25 Official Product/Service, Equipment Supplier and assorted Regional Supporter sponsorships. He also managed the sales for World Cup's ancillary programs — SoccerFest and Legacy Tour '94.

Bernstein's involvement with professional soccer began at a team level with the Major Indoor Soccer League's San Diego Sockers. In 1985, Bernstein started as the Vice President of Marketing and ended his association with the team as Executive Vice President and General Manager in 1991. During his tenure, Bernstein was responsible for all areas of operation for the MISL club including player contracts, broadcasting, ticket and sponsorship sales, countywide grass roots programs, as well as office administration and operations. In his seven seasons with San Diego, the Sockers captured the league title six times.

Prior to joining the Sockers, Bernstein entered professional sports as Director of Ticket Administration for the NBA's San Diego Clippers. After two seasons, Bernstein relocated with the team to Los Angeles and the following year, the 23-year-old was named Vice President of Sales, becoming one of the youngest executives in NBA history.

Actively involved in charity, Mr. Bernstein spends much of his free time working with the Special Olympics and the Children's Hospital.

Bernstein attended San Diego State University where he was a collegiate baseball player for four seasons, earning Western Athletic Conference Scholar-Athlete accolades each year. He was also a member of the SDSU forensics team and graduated in 1982 with a bachelor's degree in speech communication. Born and raised in San Diego, Calif., he currently resides in Marina Del Rey, Calif.



HARLEY FRANKEL

Executive Vice President

One of the founding executives of Major League Soccer, Harley Frankel is responsible for the overall management for the three league-operated teams in Dallas, San Jose and Tampa Bay and overall coordination of all general managers. He oversees the development of the MLS schedule and the salary cap along with management of the MLS Player Draft. In addition, he manages all stadium leases, executive recruiting for the league and many of the teams, the downsizing of stadiums and other operational areas.

Harley Frankel

Prior to joining Major League Soccer, Frankel spent 10 years as an executive with the NBA's Los Angeles Clippers and Portland Trail Blazers. From 1991-93, he was an Executive Vice President with the Clippers where he was responsible for improving the performance of the team and developing plans to build a first-class arena in the Los Angeles area. Frankel played the lead role in recruiting Coach Larry Brown and signing him to a five-year contract. He was also responsible for negotiating trades, developing overall strategy for the team and negotiating player contracts. The Clippers made the NBA Playoffs during each of these seasons — the only times the club has accomplished this feat.

During his tenure in Portland, the Trail Blazers sold out every game at Memorial Coliseum and made the playoffs every year. Frankel was responsible to the Chairman for the business operations and basketball activities of the team. He was also instrumental in negotiating the sale of the team to a new owner. During this period, the Trail Blazers were one of the most successful small market sports franchises in the country. The nucleus of young players developed during this period went on to win two Western Conference Championships.

Before entering the sports industry, Frankel worked in the telecommunications industry and held several prominent government positions including serving as a White House aide, State Budget Director for Colorado, Director of the Head Start Program, and he served as a member of the Clinton/Gore Transition Team.

Frankel is a member of the Los Angeles Sports Council Board of Directors and was previously Chairman of the Commission on School Reform for the Los Angeles Educational Partnership. A graduate of Columbia University in 1964, he received his Master's degree in Business Administration from Harvard in 1966.

A three-time city tennis champion, Harley and his wife Wendy reside in Santa Monica with their 14-year-old son David, and 11-year-old daughter Laura.





MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER CHRONOLOGY

December 17, 1993

In fulfillment of U.S. Soccer's promise to FIFA, World Cup USA 1994 Chairman and CEO Alan I. Rothenberg announces the formation of Major League Soccer (MLS) and unveils the league logo.

January 22, 1994

Representatives from 29 communities gather in Los Angeles at the Major League Soccer Bidders Conference to learn more about the process of becoming one of the initial 10 MLS teams.

January 24, 1994

OVERVIEW

Following the MLS Bidders Conference, interested communities embark on the process of demonstrating their interest and commitment to MLS via selling season ticket deposits, establishing local training facilities and providing interim as well as long-term stadium options.

March 15, 1994

MLS, ABC Sports and ESPN announce a three-year broadcast agreement, whereby in its initial year 10 games will be televised on ESPN, 25 games on ESPN2 and the championship game on ABC.

March 23, 1994

U.S. Soccer, MLS, and the United States Interregional Soccer League (USISL) announce experimental rules to be used during the upcoming 1994 USISL season. The experimental rules focus on goal size, multiple fouls, free kicks/fouls, offside, corner kicks, throw-ins and game length.

May 9, 1994

MLS names David Dir as its Director of Player Development.

May 18, 1994

MLS announces that 22 cities have submitted formal bids to secure a team.

July 14, 1994

At an "MLS Sponsor Seminar," held in Pasadena three days before the 1994 World Cup Final, MLS Chairman Alan I. Rothenberg announces that Nike has signed a multi-year sponsorship agreement with MLS as an official uniform and footwear supplier to MLS and Mitre has signed a multi-year sponsorship agreement with MLS as the official game ball of MLS.

June 15, 1994

MLS selects its first seven teams for the league. The teams announced are Boston, Columbus, Los Angeles, New Jersey, New York (Long Island), San Jose and Washington, D.C.

August 11, 1994

Reebok signs a multi-year sponsorship agreement with MLS as an official uniform and footwear supplier to MLS.

September 21, 1994

adidas signs a multi-year sponsorship agreement with MLS as an official uniform and footwear supplier to MLS.

October 12, 1994

MLS announces its plan to begin play in 1996, instead of 1995.



MLS announces its charter investors.

November 16, 1994

MLS Chairman Alan I. Rothenberg announces that Metromedia partners John Kluge and Stuart Subotnick, the Hunt family, headed by American sports entrepreneur Lamar Hunt and his son, Clark, LA Soccer Partners, headed by Los Angeles investor Marc Rapaport, and API Soccer, headed by Kevin Payne, are MLS's charter investors and team operators.



MLS announces Tab Ramos, U.S. National Team star, as its first player. Ramos is immediately loaned to Tigres of the Mexican First Division.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

January 17, 1995

MLS petitions U.S. Soccer and FIFA to permit MLS to implement certain rule changes (from the USISL experiment) during the league's inaugural 1996 season. The rule modifications specifically requested are: 1) Allowing a player to have the option of a throw-in or kick-in when the ball goes out of play along the sideline, and; 2) Penalizing an encroachment by one or more defenders on freekicks within the final defensive 35 yards by requiring a yellow card, and moving the opposing team 15 yards away from the ball when the freekick is retaken. MLS will consider several other rule modifications, which the USISL will test further in 1995.

January 31, 1995

MLS signs Indiana University All-Americans Brian Maisonneuve and Todd Yeagley, the 1994 College Players of the Year, the first collegiate players to ink deals with MLS.

February 2, 1995

MLS receives an overwhelmingly favorable rating from top U.S. executives within the sports industry, 67% of whom believe the new league will succeed, according to a poll released by *The Sports Business Daily*. In addition, MLS Chairman Alan I. Rothenberg was third in a ranking of ten American sports executives behind only NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue and NBA Commissioner David Stern.

February 22, 1995

MLS signs Mike Burns, a member of the 1994 U.S. World Cup Team and the only player to represent the United States at every FIFA men's outdoor championship event.

April 5, 1995

MLS signs Peter Vermes, a former U.S. National Team captain who has played professionally in Spain, Holland and Hungary.

April 6, 1995

MLS announces Umbro International has joined its family of suppliers and will become the exclusive outfitter of the league's referees.

April 28, 1995

MLS signs Jean Harbor, the APSL's all-time leading scorer.

June 6, 1995

Jorge Campos, the colorful goalkeeper for the Mexican National Team, becomes the first international player to sign with Major League Soccer. He signs a three-year pact and will play for the Los Angeles-based MLS team. In addition, Tab Ramos is assigned to the MetroStars.

MLS announces its first commercial affiliate. Budweiser becomes the "Official Beer" of MLS.

MLS announces the completion of its financing with the addition of two major investors, Denver businessman Philip F. Anschutz and New England Patriots owners, the Kraft Family. MLS adds Dallas, Denver and Kansas City to its existing roster of cities for the 1996 season, giving the league 10 teams for its initial year.

June 13, 1995


MLS reinforces its commitment to developing young talent by signing Carlos "Chile" Farias, a 19-year-old Chilean-born midfielder who has lived and played in Southern California for the last six years. MLS also signs Jamaican National Team center forward Peter Isaacs.

June 14, 1995

MLS announces that TSI Soccer, one of the country's largest soccer retailers, will be the league's official mailorder catalog. TSI Soccer, in conjunction with MLS and its suppliers, will distribute and market MLS merchandise to several million households.

June 25, 1995

MLS takes a giant step toward bringing U.S. National Team stars home by signing Alexi Lalas. The colorful







defender, who rose to prominence with a superb performance at the 1994 World Cup, found similar success in Italy's Serie A with Padova. The signing of Lalas is among the most significant acquisitions to date.

July 10, 1995

MLS announces that Puma, one of the world's oldest suppliers of soccer equipment, has joined the league's prestigious family of official suppliers and will provide uniforms and equipment for MLS's Denver team. Puma completes the league's roster of official suppliers, joining adidas, Nike and Reebok as well as corporate partners Umbro and Mitre.

August 21, 1995

OVERVIEW

MLS signs one of Mexico's all-time goal scoring greats Hugo Sanchez. Sanchez, who won five Spanish First Division scoring titles and four league championships with legendary club Real Madrid, is the second Mexican superstar to sign with MLS, joining goalkeeper Jorge Campos.

August 24, 1995

MLS signs rising U.S. National Team star Roy Lassiter.

September 5, 1995

Kellogg Company, the world's leading manufacturer of breakfast cereal, becomes the ninth commercial affiliate to join Major League Soccer's growing sponsor family. Kellogg Company will serve as the "Official Breakfast Cereal" of Major League Soccer and each of its 10 teams.

October 11, 1995

The Kansas City Wiz names Ron Newman as its head coach, the first coach hired by a Major League Soccer team.

October 17, 1995

MLS hosts the gala celebration MLS Unveiled at the Palladium in New York City by unveiling uniforms, logos and colors for all 10 teams, as well as the Official Ball by Mitre and referee uniforms from Umbro. MLS Chairman Alan I. Rothenberg introduces several marquee players to MLS's existing roster, including Marco Etcheverry, John Harkes, Mike Sorber, Roy Wegerle and

Frank Klopas. MLS assigns several top stars to MLS teams: Mike Burns and Alexi Lalas England (New Revolution), John Harkes (Washington D.C. United), Tab Ramos (MetroStars), Hugo Sanchez (Dallas Burn), Mike Sorber (Kansas City Wiz), Roy Wegerle (Colorado Rapids) and Meola Tony (MetroStars).

MLS announces AT&T as the Official Telecommunications Sponsor of the league.

October 19, 1995

U.S. National Team and New England Revolution defender Alexi Lalas is named U.S. Soccer Federation Male Athlete of the Year.





January 19, 1996

MLS announces that its inaugural championship game will take place at New England's Foxboro Stadium, October 20, 1996. The match will be broadcast live on ABC.

January 22, 1996

MLS assigns striker Eric Wynalda to the San Jose Clash and former U.S. National Team player Mark Santel to the Dallas Burn.

January 23, 1996

MLS assigns Uruguayan midfielder Washington Rodriguez to the Dallas Burn. MLS also assigns Mexican First Division veteran Martin Vasquez to the Tampa Bay Mutiny.

January 24, 1996

MLS assigns U.S. National Team midfielder Dominic Kinnear to the Colorado Rapids.

January 26, 1996

MLS announces that All Sport Body Ouencher is the 12th commercial affiliate to join the new league. In a multi-year agreement, All Sport will serve as the Official Sports Drink of Major League Soccer.

January 31, 1996

MLS assigns Zimbabwe National Team striker Vitalis Takawira to the Kansas City Wiz.

February 1, 1996

MLS assigns 1996 U.S. Olympic Team member Brian Maisonneuve to the Columbus Crew.

MLS names Tim Hankinson as its new Director of Player Development, replacing Dave Dir, who left to become the Head Coach of the Dallas Burn.

February 2, 1996

MLS assigns Bolivian National Team star Marco "El Diablo" Etcheverry to Washington D.C. United.

February 3, 1996

MLS assigns 1990 U.S. World Cup Team member Brian Bliss to the Columbus Crew.

February 4, 1996

February 5, 1996

MLS signs Marcelo Balboa, the U.S. National Team captain and the all-time appearance leader in U.S. Soccer history. MLS signs Roberto Donadoni, a veteran of the 1990 and 1994 Italian World Cup Teams as well as a long-time member of AC Milan.

MLS assigns 12 more players, bringing the total to 39. Marcelo Balboa (Colorado Rapids), Roberto Donadoni and Damian Silvera (MetroStars), Giuseppe Galderisi and Jim St. Andre (New England Revolution), Cle Kooiman (Tampa Bay Mutiny), Juan Berthy Suarez (Washington D.C. United), Leonel Alvarez (Dallas Burn), Eduardo Hurtado and Mauricio Cienfuegos (Los Angeles Galaxy), Ben Iroha (San Jose Clash) and Preki (Kansas City Wiz).

February 6, 1996

MLS conducts its first player draft, holding the first eight rounds at the Hotel Inter-Continental in New York City. Brian McBride, a two-time All-American at St. Louis is the first player drafted, by the Columbus Crew.

MLS assigns South African National Team striker Shaun Bartlett to the Colorado Rapids, bringing the number of assigned players to 40, or four per team, as the league had originally planned.

February 7, 1996

MLS conducts the final eight rounds of its first player draft at the Hotel Inter-Continental in New York City. The 10 MLS teams select 160 players over the two-day, 16-round draft.

MLS and the USISL join forces in a landmark agreement under which the USISL will serve as the official minor league to Major League Soccer. The basic terms call for each MLS team to have cooperative agreements with several USISL teams within their regions, which would supply players to the MLS team in case of injuries or other circumstances.

February 13, 1996

The MLS Management Committee decides to evaluate the possibility of utilizing larger goals after the committee's monthly meeting. MLS also announces that MLS games which end in

a tie after regulation will go directly to a shootout, featuring five players from each team challenging the goalkeeper in a one-on-one situation; that MLS will award three points for a win in regulation and one point for a shootout win and zero points for a loss; and that players in the U.S. Olympic Team pool will be allowed to participate in MLS games prior to the 1996 Olympic Games.

February 28, 1996

MLS conducts Player Combine II in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., for players who were not able to attend the first combine. The five-day combine features more than 60 players, including 20 young Brazilians and Argentines.

March 1, 1996 MLS training camps open.

March 4, 1996

MLS conducts its three-round supplemental draft and its three-round college draft in Ft. Lauderdale. Italian Serie A veteran Nicola Caricola is the first player taken in the supplemental draft by MetroStars and St. Louis All-American Matt McKeon is the first player taken in the college draft by the Kansas City Wiz.

March 6, 1996

MLS signs 1994 World Cup Team member and U.S. National Team veteran Cobi Jones, who will play for the Los Angeles Galaxy.

March 9, 1996

After discussing the possibility of using larger goals in Major League Soccer for the league's inaugural season, FIFA decides to continue with the standard 24 feet wide by eight feet high goals.

March 13, 1996


Spring training camps open as five teams convene in Boca Raton, Fla., and five teams convene in San Diego, Calif., for 10 days of preseason training and scrimmages.

April 6, 1996

MLS opens its inaugural season at San Jose's Spartan Stadium as the San Jose Clash hosts Washington D.C. United in the MLS Inaugural Game. The game is broadcast live to a national television audience on ESPN.



MLS SCORES WITH BROAD TELEVISION EXPOSURE

Before the first players were drafted, Major League Soccer already had in place the most farreaching television agreement ever in U.S. professional soccer, covering four networks and two languages.

When MLS begins its inaugural season on April 6, in San Jose, Calif., ESPN, the world's largest cable network, will be there to broadcast it live.

The game will mark the first of at least 35 games ESPN and ESPN2 will combine to televise this season.

"We're very excited to be part of this exciting new league," said John Wildhack, ESPN senior vice president, programming. "The tremendous success of our 1994 World Cup coverage proved the American appetite for soccer. The 25 games on ESPN2 only adds to that network's broad-based appeal."

In addition to regular-season competition, ESPN will televise the MLS All-Star Game from New Jersey's Giants Stadium

and ESPN2 will televise 2-3 postseason games beginning in late September. ESPN is also scheduled to air 1-2 postseason games. ABC will televise the MLS Championship Game from Foxboro, Mass.

ESPN2's coverage, including 25 games, will be highlighted by a Thursday Night Game of the Week. ESPN will televise 10 games.

"We're extremely happy ESPN is involved with Major League Soccer," said MLS Commissioner Doug Logan. "Such national exposure is very important to the league and is one of the primary elements that will help us grow."

ESPN is now in 68.1 million U.S. homes, while ESPN2, launched in October 1994 and already in nearly 30 million homes, was the nation's fastest growing cable network over the last two years.





1996 MLS ALL-STAR GAME



On July 14, 1996, Giants Stadium will be the site of the 1996 Major League Soccer All-Star Game.

The top players in Major League Soccer will showcase their skills July 14 at Giants Stadium when the Eastern Conference all-stars battle the Western Conference all-stars in the first annual Major League Soccer All-Star Game.

The MLS All-Star Game will be broadcast live to a national and international television audience on ESPN and Univision.

In addition to seeing the top stars in Major League Soccer battle it out, soccer fans will be treated to a unique doubleheader with game two featuring the 1994 World Cup Champion, Brazil, against the FIFA Select Team. With Romario, Bebeto and the bulk of Brazil's 1994 World Cup squad scheduled to play, look for a high-scoring affair on the Giants Stadium pitch. Additionally, there is a possibility fans will be able to see MLS superstars such as the Galaxy's Jorge Campos and Washington D.C. United's John Harkes.

"We are pleased to have the inaugural MLS All-Star Game located where there is a rich soccer tradition such as the metropolitan area," said MLS Commissioner Douglas G. Logan. "Giants Stadium is the perfect setting for the league's midseason event."

Giants Stadium has played host to a number of historic soccer games, including seven games during the 1994 World Cup. Giants Stadium served as home to the NASL's Cosmos from 1977-84, setting numerous United States professional soccer attendance records, including the landmark crowd of 77,691 fans on August 14, 1977, when Eddie Firmani's Cosmos defeated Ron Newman's Fort Lauderdale Strikers 8-3.

The combination of Major League Soccer's best players, the 1994 World Cup Champions and the FIFA Select Team is sure to make MLS's midseason event one of the top sporting attractions of the summer.

MLS PLAYOFF FORMAT



1. The top four teams from each conference at the conclusion of the regular season will qualify for the MLS Playoffs. The top four teams will be determined in accordance with the MLS points system, under which teams are awarded three points for a win, one point for a shootout win, and no points for a loss.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

2. The Conference Champions will be seeded one and two, respectively. The Conference Champion with the higher number of points in the MLS standings will be seeded one and the other Conference Champion will be seeded two.

3. Higher seeded teams will have home-field advantage in the Conference Semifinals and Conference Finals.

4. The Conference Semifinals will be a bestof-three format with the first game at the stadium of the lower seeded team and the final two games at the stadium of the higher seeded team. Winners advance to the Conference Finals.

5. The Conference Finals will be a best-ofthree format with the first game at the stadium of the lower seeded team and the final two games at the stadium of the higher seeded team. Winners advance to the Championship Game.

6. The Championship Game will be played October 20 at Foxboro Stadium.





MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER REGULATIONS

Below is a summary of facts and definitions concerning regulations that govern the players and games of Major League Soccer for the 1996 Season.

ROSTERS

ERVIEW

Each team's active roster will consist of a maximum of 18 players, with the following exceptions: (a) teams may carry a larger roster during training camp, and (b) teams may add a temporary replacement player if its active roster is depleted to under 16 healthy players due to injuries or players absent for national team duty.

A total of 16 players can be placed on the team's game roster for an MLS league season game. Three substitutions plus a goalkeeper may be used in any league season game.

REPLACEMENT PLAYERS

A team may add a replacement player to its active roster if an active roster player is unavailable due to injury or national team duty. A temporary replacement can occur whenever a team's active roster is projected to drop below 16 players.

ROSTER CUT DOWN DATES

Teams must cut their rosters to 22 players by March 24, 1996. Teams must then cut to the 18-player regular season active roster by April 15, 1996.

FOREIGN PLAYER LIMIT

Teams can carry a maximum of four (4) non-resident aliens on their active roster. Permanent residents (Green Card holders), players with conditional permanent resident status, temporary resident status, or individuals who have been granted refugee and asylum status will be considered citizens for purposes of the MLS active roster and foreign player limit.

ROSTER FREEZE DATE

No additions can be made to a team's active roster during the period immediately following the team's final regular season game through the day after the league championship game.

INJURED RESERVE LIST

To qualify for the injured reserve list, a player must have sustained a season-ending injury, or an injury that will prevent him from playing in four or more consecutive MLS games. Once placed on the injured reserve list, the player is ineligible for his team's next four matches. A player placed on injured reserve list will not count against the team's active roster.

WAIVERS

A team may place a player on waivers at any time during the regular season. If that player is not claimed within 72 hours, he may be released outright from the league, or if he clears waivers, the team that originally waived him has 24 hours to re-claim that player.

Any player released from a training camp roster, up until April 15, may be claimed by another team within 24 hours of the waiver. If there are multiple claims within the 24-hour period, the player will go to the team that drafted later in the MLS Player Draft.

MULTIPLE WAIVER CLAIM

If more than one team claims the same player from the waiver list, the team that has the fewest points in the standings at that time, based on an equal number of games, will receive the player.

TRADE DEADLINE

The trade deadline for the 1996 MLS season is 2 p.m. EDT on August 9. After this date, teams may not trade players until after the league championship game.

POINT SYSTEM

Teams will receive three points for a win, one point for shootout win and zero points for a loss, whether it be in regulation time or in a shootout.

LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

A single league championship game will be held at a predetermined site in October of each year between the two league conference winners.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

TEAM STANDINGS TIE-BREAKING PROCEDURES

The team awarded the highest position in the MLS standings will be the team with the greatest number of points as determined by the point system. Ties will be broken according to the following system:

a. The team with the better win/loss record in current regular season games against all other teams equal in points

b. The team with the greatest goal difference (goals scored minus goals allowed) against all other teams during the regular season.

c. The greatest number of goals scored against all teams during the regular season.

d. If the teams are still equal, the procedures described in this section will be applied only to games played on the road by each team against all other teams during the regular season.

e. If the teams are still equal, the procedures described in this section will be applied only to games played at home by each team against all other teams during the regular season.

f. If the teams are still equal, the highest position in the standings will be determined by a coin flip.

PLAYOFF FORMAT

The playoff format will consist of best of three game series, where the #1 team plays the #4 team in each conference and the #2 team plays the #3 team in each conference in a home and away series. The #4 and #3 teams will host the first game, and the #1 and #2 teams will host the second game. If a third game is needed, it will be held at the home field of the #1 and #2 teams. The first team to win two games in regulation time or a shootout will advance to the next playoff round.

The four winners of round one playoffs will advance to round two, with the team finishing lower in the conference standings hosting the first game. The higher finishing team will host the second game and any tie-breaker.

RED CARDS

Any player receiving a red card in an MLS regular season game will be suspended for the next league season game. Any player receiving a red card in an exhibition game will be suspended for the next exhibition game and not the next regular season game. Any player that receives a second red card during the season will be suspended for the next two regular season games.

Players who receive a second yellow card in a game, and thus a red card, will not have the yellow cards count towards his accumulation.

YELLOW CARDS

Any player who receives five yellow cards in any number of MLS regular season games within the same league season will be suspended for the next MLS league season game following the game in which he received his fifth yellow card. For each additional three yellow cards received during the regular season, the player will be suspended for the next two league season games. Yellow cards received in exhibition games will not count towards a player's regular season accumulation.


Any player who receives three yellow cards in any number of MLS playoff games, will be suspended for the next MLS playoff game, including the championship game if applicable. For each additional three yellow cards in post-season play, the player will be suspended for an additional playoff game.


CARD CARRY OVERS


Suspensions for red card and yellow card accumulations for regular season games will carry over to playoff games, even though yellow card accumulations begin anew in the playoffs. Any suspension for a red card or yellow card accumulation during playoff games that would otherwise be served after the team's last league season game will carry over to the first game of the next league season.

GAME CLOCK

The official game time for all MLS games will be displayed on the stadium clock. However, the game time remains under the control of the referee throughout the game. In all cases, the clock shall only start on the signal from the referee, who may also signal time outs for injuries, time-wasting or other disturbances. If necessary, the referee may have the stadium clock adjusted to the correct game time.











THE HUNT FAMILY Investor-Operator

LAMAR HUNT'S football background has been well documented. His American football background, that is.

As an original organizer of the American Football League in 1960 and as the founder of the Kansas City Chiefs, Hunt

helped turn the National Football League into America's sporting pasttime of the last half-century. In fact, Hunt was a principle negotiator in the AFL/NFL merger that paved the way for much of the modern growth of professional football. Under his guidance, the Chiefs franchise became the winningest team in the 10-year history of the AFL, earning spots in two of the first four Super Bowls.

His other football background, in that of American soccer, has been much less publicized. But Hunt's influence on American soccer echoes his development of the NFL into America's favorite sport.

In 1967, Hunt became an investor in the Dallas Tornado Soccer Club of the North American Soccer League. In 14 years in Dallas, the Tornado was one of the sport's model franchises. The Tornado's legacy of soccer disciples is given credit for being the catalyst in the development of the game, which today places North Texas at the forefront of the American youth soccer market.

Hunt has again stepped to the forefront of American soccer by becoming an original investor in MLS. As a soccer fan, Hunt has been involved at every level of the sport in the U.S. supporting youth soccer as a proud parent, winning championships as a hands-on owner, assisting in the start-up of two professional leagues and serving as the Co-Chairman of the Dallas World Cup Host Committee.

For his early efforts in establishing the sport of soccer in the United States, Hunt was inducted into the U.S. Soccer Hall of Fame in Oneonta, New York in 1982. Hunt is also a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame and the International Tennis Hall of Fame. Amazingly, Hunt's induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame came just 13 years after he founded the AFL. The 63-year-old sports entrepreneur has also been honored in state Sports Halls of Fame of both Missouri and Texas.

CLARK HUNT is a study in contrast. He is not your typical student-athelete, he is not your typical business man and he is certainly not your typical major investor in a start-up professional soccer league. Yet, he is all of these and more.

Hunt is the President of Hunt Financial Group (HFG), a Dallas, Texas based financial services concern. Through Hunt Financial, the native of Dallas has been responsible for the development of two Securities and Exchange Registered Investment Advisory firms: SCM Advisors and Speece, Lewis & Thorson. He has also been responsible for the development of an investment fund manager, Hunt & Wissman, L.L.C. (H&W).



Hunt also serves as a director of several family controlled enterprises including Hunt Capital Group, and is a venture capital investor in Hunt Midwest Enterprises, a real estate mining and theme park conglomerate. He is also a recent past director of international oil and gas concern, Placid Oil Company.

In addition, Hunt is an officer and director of Hunts Sports Entertainment, the management company responsible for overseeing the Hunt family investments

in the Kansas City Chiefs of the NFL, the Chicago Bulls of the NBA, and the Kansas City Wiz and Columbus Crew.

With MLS, Hunt plays a key role as a member of the league's first Competition Committee, which played an important part in the league's early development through "star player" assignment and through formatting the league's rules.

Hunt attended Southern Methodist University (SMU), where he graduated first in his class with a Bachelor of Business Administration and was a two-time recipient of the University's highest academic award, the Provost Award for Outstanding Scholar.

Outside of the classroom, Hunt was captain of the school's nationally ranked Division I soccer team, and was twice named a First Team Academic All-American. Hunt was also the recipient of the University's Presidential Award of Excellence as a Scholar-Athlete and the Senior Athletic Award for Outstanding Scholar.

LAMAR HUNT JR. is the Assistant to the President of Unity Hunt Resources, a service company for various family related entities. He is also Vice President of Administration and Operations for Hunts Sports Entertainment, the management company responsible for overseeing the Hunt's family investments in the Kansas City Chiefs of the NFL, the Chicago Bulls of the NBA, and the Kansas City Wiz and Columbus Crew of Major League Soccer.

Hunt holds a Bachelor of Music Performance degree from the University of Cincinnati, and a Master of Music Performance degree from Duquesne University. He served for 11 years in Kansas City as a flutist with the Kansas City Symphony. While living in Kansas City, he founded and performed with Summerfest, a classical chamber music concert series. He also has started a similar series in Dallas called the Trinity Chamber Music Concerts. In addition, Hunt has served as an adjunct professor of music at the University of Missouri, Kansas City.

General Manager

Columbus Crew General Manager Jamey Rootes is representative of the new era in professional soccer, a bright, young executive with a wealth of experience on the field as well as in the business arena.

Rootes, a native of Stone Mountain, Georgia, received national recognition as a high school player and was selected to the U.S. National Team player pool in 1984. As a freshman that year at Clemson University, he helped the Tigers to their first NCAA soccer championship. As a senior in 1987, he led the Clemson to their second NCAA title while earning First-Team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors.

Jamey Rootes

During Rootes' four years at Clemson, he began to develop his business skills as the founder and operator of Rootes' Soccer Academy, a successful development school that built soccer interest and ability among thousands of youngsters across the southeast.

Following his playing career, Rootes joined IBM Corporation, one of the country's top training grounds for executive talent. He served IBM as a Corporate Marketing Representative, where he guickly move up the organization's executive ladder. During this time, he remained active as a soccer coach and administrator, and eventually left IBM to become more heavily involved in the sport.

As part of the coaching staff at Indiana University, Rootes worked with premier players including Todd Yeagley and Brian Maisonneuve, who both won national collegiate player of the year honors in 1994, and who will both play for the Crew in 1996. Using his promoting and marketing skills, he also helped boost attendance at Hoosiers games by 45 percent. In 1994, he left Indiana University to help stage the most successful World Cup ever as an operations manager with World Cup USA's Chicago venue.



TIMO LIEKOSKI Head Coach

Timo Liekoski, the top assistant coach for the United States National Team during its wildly successful run to the second round of World Cup 1994, and former coach of the U.S. Olympic Team, is the first head coach of the Columbus Crew.

The Solon, Ohio, resident has more than 20 years of collegiate and professional coaching experience. A native of Helsinki, Finland, Liekoski started his soccer career as an All-American player at perennial collegiate soccer power Hartwick College in Oneonta, New York, home of the U.S. Soccer Hall of Fame. After a short stint as the Whittier College head coach. Timo returned to his alma mater to become Hartwicks's head coach. From 1973-75. Liekoski led Hartwick College to 30 wins. 9 losses and 7 ties. He also registered three straight NCAA Tournament appearances, including a Final Four appearance in 1974.

Timo Liekoski

Liekoski's college coaching experience led him to the Dallas Tornado in the NASL, where he was an assistant coach from 1976-78. Ironically, the Tornado team was owned by the Lamar Hunt family, who are now the investor-operators of the Columbus Crew.

Liekoski's professional coaching career took him from the Houston Hurricanes in the NASL, where he was named NASL Coach of the Year in 1979, to the Houston Summit of the Major Indoor Soccer League. In addition, he coached the Edmonton Drillers in the NASL and led the Drillers to the 1981 NASL Indoor championship. He then moved to the state of Ohio to coach the Cleveland Force of the MISL. While at Cleveland from 1982-88, he had an overall record of 178-121.

In 1988, Liekoski continued coaching in Ohio, this time for the Canton Invaders in the National Professional Soccer League. His 109-40 record led to two NPSL championships, the best overall wining percentage in NPSL history (.732) and the best single-season record ever in indoor soccer history 36-4 (.900), set during the 1989-90 NPSL season.

The son of a sports writer, Liekoski came to the United States at the age of 19, having already served his mandatory 19 months of military service in Finland. He then served three years in the U.S. Army and enrolled at Hartwick College under the G.I. Bill.





BILLY HICKS

President/General Manager

Billy Hicks has more experience than most when it comes to promoting football in Europe. He was one of the founders of the World League of American Football. As European Coordinator for the WLAF, Hicks was responsible for negotiating contracts with stadiums, television, governments, corporate sponsors and fostering relationships with international media. Most impressively, however, he sold the London fans, who live for soccer, on American football.

Now Hicks will sell Dallas fans, who live on American football, a steady diet of Major League Soccer. On September 19, 1995, Billy Hicks was named General Manager of the Dallas Burn.

After helping establish the WLAF, Hicks moved into the position of General Manager for the London Monarchs which played its home games on one of soccer's most hallowed grounds, Wembley Stadium. He hired coaching, administrative and support staff and developed an aggressive marketing scheme to launch the new team and new sport with a high profile. His work resulted in the Monarchs leading the World League in attendance during the inaugural season with an average of 41,000 fans per game. The team finished with an 11-1 record and won the first-ever World Bowl championship.

Hicks, most recently a sports and event consultant whose clients included the Colorado Silver Bullets women's professional baseball team, spent three years with the Dallas Cowboys as Business Manager from 1986-1989. His primary responsibilities included team travel, summer training camp, vendor relationships and the Cowboys Center Facility.

Hicks graduated from Northern Arizona University with a B.S. in Business Administration and went on to earn his Master's of Sports Administration at Ohio University. He has also served as administrative assistant with the San Diego Chargers of the National Football League as well as a national support manager for MDS/Qantel Computers.



DAVE DIR

Head Coach

One of the most successful American professional soccer coaches of the '90s, leading the Colorado Foxes to two APSL Championships, Dave Dir was named Head Coach of the Dallas Burn on November 27, 1995.

From 1992-93, Dir was Head Coach of the Colorado Foxes of the APSL. In addition to the two APSL Championships, Dir led the team to a Pro Cup Tournament championship in 1992. Dir's overall record at Colorado was 40-16.

In May of 1994, Dir was hired by Major League Soccer as Director of Player Development. In that capacity, he was responsible for all scouting, player iden-

tification and player assessment in preparation for the league's first player draft.


In his playing days as a goalkeeper, Dir played college soccer at Western Illinois University, where he earned All-Midwest and All-Illinois honors. In 1980, he was a first-round draft pick of the Chicago Sting of the NASL before a knee injury cut short his playing career.

In 1990, Dir became coach at Regis University in Denver, Colo. His team won back-toback Colorado Athletic Conference (CAC) Championships in 1990 and '91, and Dir was named CAC Coach of the Year in 1991.

THE HUNT FAMILY Investor-Operator

LAMAR HUNT'S football background has been well documented. His American football background, that is.

As an original organizer of the American Football League in 1960 and as the founder of the Kansas City Chiefs, Hunt

helped turn the National Football League into America's sporting pasttime of the last half-century. In fact, Hunt was a principle negotiator in the AFL/NFL merger that paved the way for much of the modern growth of professional football. Under his guidance, the Chiefs franchise became the winningest team in the 10-year history of the AFL, earning spots in two of the first four Super Bowls.

His other football background, in that of American soccer, has been much less publicized. But Hunt's influence on American soccer echoes his development of the NFL into America's favorite sport.

In 1967, Hunt became an investor in the Dallas Tornado Soccer Club of the North American Soccer League. In 14 years in Dallas, the Tornado was one of the sport's model franchises. The Tornado's legacy of soccer disciples is given credit for being the catalyst in the development of the game, which today places North Texas at the forefront of the American youth soccer market.

Hunt has again stepped to the forefront of American soccer by becoming an original investor in MLS. As a soccer fan, Hunt has been involved at every level of the sport in the U.S. supporting youth soccer as a proud parent, winning championships as a hands-on owner, assisting in the start-up of two professional leagues and serving as the Co-Chairman of the Dallas World Cup Host Committee.

For his early efforts in establishing the sport of soccer in the United States, Hunt was inducted into the U.S. Soccer Hall of Fame in Oneonta, New York in 1982. Hunt is also a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame and the International Tennis Hall of Fame. Amazingly, Hunt's induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame came just 13 years after he founded the AFL. The 63-year-old sports entrepreneur has also been honored in state Sports Halls of Fame of both Missouri and Texas.

CLARK HUNT is a study in contrast. He is not your typical student-athelete, he is not your typical business man and he is certainly not your typical major investor in a start-up professional soccer league. Yet, he is all of these and more.

Hunt is the President of Hunt Financial Group (HFG), a Dallas, Texas based financial services concern. Through Hunt Financial, the native of Dallas has been responsible for the development of two Securities and Exchange Registered Investment Advisory firms: SCM Advisors and Speece, Lewis & Thorson. He has also been responsible for the development of an investment fund manager, Hunt & Wissman, L.L.C. (H&W).

Hunt also serves as a director of several family controlled enterprises including Hunt Capital Group, and is a venture capital investor in Hunt Midwest Enterprises, a real estate mining and theme park conglomerate. He is also a recent past director of international oil and gas concern, Placid Oil Company.

Clark Hunt, Lamar Hunt and Lamar Hunt Jr. In addition, Hunt is an officer and director of Hunts Sports Entertainment, the management company responsible for overseeing the Hunt family investments in the Kansas City Chiefs of the NFL, the Chicago Bulls of the NBA, and the Kansas City Wiz and Columbus Crew.

With MLS, Hunt plays a key role as a member of the league's first Competition Committee, which played an important part in the league's early development through "star player" assignment and through formatting the league's rules.

Hunt attended Southern Methodist University (SMU), where he graduated first in his class with a Bachelor of Business Administration and was a two-time recipient of the University's highest academic award, the Provost Award for Outstanding Scholar.

Outside of the classroom, Hunt was captain of the school's nationally ranked Division I soccer team, and was twice named a First Team Academic All-American. Hunt was also the recipient of the University's Presidential Award of Excellence as a Scholar-Athlete and the Senior Athletic Award for Outstanding Scholar.

LAMAR HUNT JR. is the Assistant to the President of Unity Hunt Resources, a service company for various family related entities. He is also Vice President of Administration and Operations for Hunts Sports Entertainment, the management company responsible for overseeing the Hunt's family investments in the Kansas City Chiefs of the NFL, the Chicago Bulls of the NBA, and the Kansas City Wiz and Columbus Crew of Major League Soccer.


Hunt holds a Bachelor of Music Performance degree from the University of Cincinnati, and a Master of Music Performance degree from Duquesne University. He served for 11 years in Kansas City as a flutist with the Kansas City Symphony. While living in Kansas City, he founded and performed with Summerfest, a classical chamber music concert series. He also has started a similar series in Dallas called the Trinity Chamber Music Concerts. In addition, Hunt has served as an adjunct professor of music at the University of Missouri, Kansas City.

Latta gained extensive experience in all phases of operating a professional soccer team during his 11 years with the San Diego Sockers, who became known as "Team Champion" during his tutelage. He was personally involved in eight of the team's 10 league championship seasons.

Consistency, class and stability were hallmarks of the Sockers dynasty during Latta's tenure. He was heavily involved in league and international aspects of professional soccer, serving on two Continental Indoor Soccer League committees, including the Board of Governors.

Latta joined the Sockers in 1984 when the club was a member of the North American Soccer League. He started out in the sales department, then served the team as Public Relations Director, Marketing Director and Director of Broadcasting. He became the club's General Manager in September of 1992.

Latta, who grew up in Los Angeles and moved to San Diego in 1977, graduated from San Diego State University, where he majored in Speech Communication and minored in Broadcast Management. Prior to joining the Sockers, he worked in radio as both a promotions director and on-air talent.

Ron Newman, the winningest professional coach in American soccer history and and a recent inductee of the U.S. Soccer Hall of Fame, was named Head Coach of the Kansas City Wiz on October 11, 1995, the first coach hired in Major League Soccer history. In 27 years of coaching in the U.S., Newman has won 13 professional

Known predominantly for his incredible winning record in indoor soccer in the 1980s, Newman first established himself as a master of the outdoor game in the 1970s. In 15 seasons as a head coach in the old North American Soccer League (NASL) and one in the American Soccer League (ASL), Newman achieved unparalleled success, winning three championships with three different teams while compiling an all-

time outdoor record of 215-159-27 (.570).

As the only coach in the 18-year history of the NASL to win two Coach of the Year awards, Newman will be reunited with Lamar Hunt and the Hunt family, who gave the 61-year-old native of Portsmouth, England his first head coaching position in 1969 with the NASL's Dallas Tornado.

After seven seasons in Dallas, Newman spent the summer of 1976 as the head coach of the Los Angeles Skyhawks, where he led the team to a 21-2-3 mark and an ASL championship. In 1977, Newman returned to the NASL to lead the Ft. Lauderdale Strikers, where he won his third outdoor championship in 1978. After three vears with the Strikers, Newman took over the head coaching reigns of the San Diego Sockers in 1980. In 14 years with the Sockers, Newman led the team to 10 indoor championships. He also coached the team to two NASL division titles and four semifinal appearances in five outdoor seasons from 1980 to 1984. Internationally, Newman coached the Sockers in two European tours in 1993 and 1994. Most recently, Newman was the head coach of the Arizona Sandsharks during the 1995 Continental Indoor Soccer League season.

With an all-time professional record of 701-442-27 (including outdoors, indoors, regular season and playoffs), a .611 all-time winning percentage, Newman is the only coach in U.S. professional soccer history to reach the 500win plateau, let alone 700 victories. For all of that and more, Newman was inducted into the United States Soccer Hall of Fame in August 1992.

During his time with the 1992 Olympic Team, Osiander helped develop future National Team stars Mike Burns, Brad Friedel, Cobi Jones, Alexi Lalas, Mike Lapper, Joe-Max Moore and Claudio Reyna. His 1991 Pan American Games team won the gold medal, defeating Mexico in the final.

In recent years, Osiander has coached the California-North Men's State Team, assisted with the San Francisco Bay Blackhawks, coached the San Francisco Greek-Americans and the Palo Alto Firebirds of the USISL. He coached the Atlanta Ruckus of the A-League in 1995 and was named Coach of the Year after leading the team to the championship final.

CHARLIE STILLITANO

Vice President and General Manager

A leader in New Jersey's soccer community for the last two decades, Charlie Stillitano was named Vice President and General Manager of the MetroStars after serving as the Venue Executive Director for the New York/New Jersey Venue during World Cup USA '94.

Stillitano is a 1981 graduate of Princeton University, where he was an All-American and All-Ivy League defender. He is also a 1987 graduate of Rutgers Law School.

An attorney by trade, Stillitano served in that capacity with the AT&T Credit Corporation. and with the law firm of Crummy, Del Deo, Dolan, Griffinger and Vecchione, before making soccer his full-time vocation prior to the World Cup.

New York/New Jersey's Giants Stadium played host to seven games, including Bulgaria's stunning, guarterfinal upset of Germany and the subsequent semifinal between Italy

and Bulgaria, in which Italy advanced to the final. In all, the World Cup matches at Giants Stadium played to 100 percent capacity, drawing 525,000 spectators.

During the World Cup, Giants Stadium featured a grass field, which was grown over the stadium's Astroturf surface. Stillitano oversaw that multi-million dollar project and later devised a game plan for the MetroStars to play on a similar grass pitch.

Few have been as devoted to soccer as Stillitano. In addition to playing at Princeton from 1977-81, he was a member of the U.S. Under-19 team in 1978 and '79 and played professionally for the New York United Soccer Club in 1981.

In recent years, Stillitano has served as First Vice President of the New Jersey State Soccer Association, Chairman of the State Referee Committee and President of the Friends of Princeton Soccer. He has also coached many teams within the New Jersey state system. Currently, Stillitano is Vice Chairman of the U.S. Soccer Federation Foundation.





EDDIE FIRMANI Head Coach

One of the most successful coaches in the history of professional soccer in North America, Eddie Firmani was introduced as the MetroStars' first Head Coach on Jan. 4, 1996, and brings close to 30 years of experience into Major League Soccer's first season.

While he has coached on three continents, Firmani, 62, gained his greatest acclaim in the North American Soccer League, where he was the head man for four franchises, most notably the New York Cosmos, a team that packed Giants Stadium with a worldfamous cast, including Pele, Franz Beckenbauer, Carlos Alberto and Giorgio Chinaglia.

Firmani is the only coach to win three NASL championships capturing the Soccer Bowl title with the 1975 Tampa Bay Rowdies and 1977 and '78 Cosmos. In nine NASL seasons, Firmani amassed a 154-89 record, including nine playoff victories. He is second

to Ron Newman on the NASL's all-time wins list.

Born in Cape Town, South Africa, and raised in Great Britain, Firmani was a standout center forward with Charlton Athletic of the English first division, a club that signed him to play professionally at the age of 16.

In July of 1955, Firmani was transferred to Sampdoria F.C., of the Italian first division, for an English League-record transfer fee of 35,000 pounds. Since his grandfather was of Italian descent, Firmani was allowed to play with the Italian National Team and began doing so in 1956.

Firmani played in Italy's Serie A from 1956-61, with Sampdoria, Inter Milan and Genoa F.C., before returning to England and Charlton in 1962 where he finished his playing career five years later. Soon thereafter, he began his successful coaching career.

Five years of coaching in England were followed by nine in North America. When the NASL folded its outdoor league in 1984, Firmani landed in the Middle East, where he coached club teams for 10 years in Kuwait, Oman and the United Arab Emirates. Most recently, he coached the APSL's Montreal Impact.



JOHN KLUGE



Investor-Operator

John Kluge is the principle General Partner, Chairman and President of Metromedia Company -- one of the largest private companies in the United States with businesses in the restaurant and hospitality industry, as well as in telecommunications, automotive components, computer software and medical technology. Metromedia also holds a majority interest in Orion Pictures Corporation.

Kluge first became President and Chairman of the Board of Metropolitan Broadcasting Corporation in 1959. At that time, the firm owned independent television stations and four radio stations. Under his direction, Metropolitan Broadcasting was transformed into a media empire,

the largest independent operator of radio and television stations in the U.S., owning seven stations in such principal markets as New York, Chicago and Los Angeles. In 1986, Metromedia sold its television business, plus a television production company which it acquired in 1965.

Currently, Kluge serves on the boards of several companies including Bear Steans, Occidental Petroleum, Orion Pictures, Metromedia Steakhouses, Benale Holdings, and the Shubert Foundation. He is active in numerous civic causes, and his commitment to philanthropy reflects his belief in human potential and creativity.

A graduate of Columbia University, Kluge has made a number of major gifts to his alma mater, earmarked for creating opportunities for minority students. In 1992, the University Alumni Association awarded him the prestigious Alexander Hamilton Medal, an award for distinguished service and accomplishment.



STUART SUBOTNICK

Investor-Operator

Stuart Subotnick is a General Partner and Executive Vice President of Metromedia Company, where he serves as Chief Operation Officer and Chief Financial Officer for one of the nation's largest privately held companies. John Kluge and Subotnick are its sole owners.

Subotnick's business relationship with Metromedia began in 1967 when he joined the company as a tax attorney. During the next 20 years, he rose rapidly through the organization, becoming its Chief Financial Officer in 1981.

With the creation of the office of president, he assumed additional responsibilities, and in 1983 was named Senior Vice President of finance and administration. In 1986, after the liquidation of Metromedia, Inc., he was elected Executive Vice President of Metromedia Company.

As one of the principal architects of the leveraged buyout of Metromedia in 1984, he was responsible for the refinancing of Metromedia's bank debt and for creating the first major zero coupon high yield bonds which were used in the refinancing.

Since 1981, Subotnick has negotiated all of the major transactions entered into by Metromedia, including the sale of Metromedia's television, radio corporation, outdoor advertising, paging, cellular and entertainment divisions. Subotnick serves on the Board of Orion Pictures, Carnival Cruise Lines, Benale Holdings, Metromedia Technologies, Metromedia Steakhouses, Brooklyn Law School, the New World Symphony, Beth Israel Medical Center, the Thelonius Monk Institute of Jazz, and the Park Avenue Synagogue

THE KRAFT FAMILY Investors-Operator

As one of the most influential men in New England professional sports, **Robert Kraft** is the owner of the National Football League's New England Patriots and Foxboro Stadium as well as the investor-operator of the New England Revolution. Foxboro was the sight of six matches during the 1994 World Cup.

Kraft became owner of the Patriots prior to the 1994 NFL season, leading the organization through a historic tournaround. In 1994, the Patriots made the playoffs for the first time since 1986.

Kraft's fullfillment of his commitment to provide the team with the resources to make the Patriots a competitive NFL franchise has helped

the team reach a level of popularity unmatched since its founding. Kraft plans to duplicate this success with the Revolution.

A native of Brookline, Mass., Kraft attended local public schools before entering Columbia University on an academic scholarship. After graduating from Columbia, where he also played football, he received a fellowship to attend Harvard School of Business, where he earned a Master's in Business Administration.

Kraft began his business career with the Rand-Whitney Group, Inc. of Worcester, Mass., a company he later acquired. In 1972, he founded International Forest Products, a trader of paper commodities which does business in more than 80 countries around the world. Together, Rand-Whitney and International



Forest Products comprise one of the largest privately-owned paper and packaging companies in the United States.

During the past 20 years, Kraft and his wife, Myra, have been very active in charitable and civic affairs. Kraft serves on the Executive Committee of the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute and the Board of Overseers of the Boston Symphony Orchestra. He is also a trustee of Columbia University and serves on the Board of Directors for the Harvard Business School. He is the recipient of honorary degrees from Boston University, Curry College and Suffolk University.

Jonathan Kraft

Jonathan Kraft played an essential role in bringing the Revolution to the Boston area. He serves as the club's leading representative to Major League Soccer, as well as to the media, and will also be entering his third season with the NFL's New England Patriots in the same capacity. He assists both the Revolution and Patriots in strategic planning.

In addition to his roles with the Revolution and the Patriots, Kraft will continue as Chief Executive Officer of Rand-Whitney Containerboard, the only paper company in the world which manufactures products from 100 percent post-consumer waste and 100 percent post-consumer waste water. He will continue to serve as a Director for both the Rand-Whitney Group and International Forest Products.

Kraft played the lead role in securing the 1991 and 1992 National Earth Day concerts at Foxboro Stadium. He has been the chief negotiator for the stadium in securing the appearances of a number of major musical acts, including the Rolling Stones, Aerosmith, Elton John and Billy Joel. The Greater Boston Convention and Visitors Bureau, Inc. presented Kraft with the "Spirit of Tourism" Award for his work in promoting tourism and economic activity in the state.

Kraft is a graduate of Williams College and received his Master's in Business Administration from the Harvard School of Business. He is on the Board of Directors for several organizations including the New England Israeli Chamber of Commerce and the Genesis Fund. He is also on the board of trustees for the Belmont Hill School.

BRIAN O'DONOVAN General Manager

Brian O'Donovan made an easy transition from American football to the world's football. After the 1995 New England Patriots football season, when he managed the overall stadium operations for the Patriots games, as well as a variety of major local and international events, O'Donovan became the General Manager of the New England Revolution.

O'Donovan, a native of Clonakilty County Cork, Ireland, was appointed General Manager of Foxboro Stadium in 1987 after serving three years as Events Coordinator of the stadium. Along with managing Foxboro during Patriots games, he oversaw stadium operations for a number of major concerts over the years, including major acts such as Madonna, Guns N' Roses, Sting, The Grateful Dead, Elton John, Billy Joel, U2, the Rolling Stones and The Who.

In addition, O'Donovan was responsible for the overall operations of Foxboro Stadium for World Cup USA 1994. Under his guidance, Foxboro was voted one of the most successful venues. He was also instrumental in bringing World Cup games to the Boston venue. Prior to joining Foxboro Stadium, O'Donovan served as Executive Vice President of GEN Star, Inc., a Boston-based event management and consulting company which has produced several large scale concerts in Israel and educational exhibits in Taiwan.

He is a 1978 graduate of University College Cork in Ireland with a bachelor of arts degree and acquired his masters degree at Emerson College in Boston. He is a member of the International Association of Auditorium Managers and the Stadium Managers Associated. He has frequently lectured on topics relating to stadium and event management.

O'Donovan has also served as producer/host of A Celtic Sojourn, a weekly radio program on NPR/PRI affiliate WGBH-FM in Boston which explores traditional and contemporary music from the Celtic Countries and England. His special Christmas editions of the program were broadcast nationwide in 1992 and 1993. In 1994, he was the recipient of the Broadcast Personality of the Year Award from the Massachusetts Broadcasters Association.



FRANK STAPLETON Head Coach

As the all-time leading scorer for the Irish National Team, and with 17 seasons of professional soccer in Europe's top leagues, Frank Stapleton brings a wealth of experience to his position as Head Coach of the New England Revolution. The former Irish star was named Head Coach on January 4, 1996.

The 39-year-old Stapleton is Ireland's all-time leading scorer with 20 goals in 71 international appearances and played professionally for such renowned clubs as Arsenal, Manchester United and Ajax.


In addition to his experience on the field, Stapleton was the assistant coach for English Premier League side Queens Park Rangers during the 1994-95 season and served as a player-coach for English clubs Huddersfield Town and Bradford City.

Stapleton was also the captain of the Irish National Team for 30 international matches.

Stapleton began his playing career in 1973 as an apprentice with Arsenal of the then-English First Division (now Premier League). He debuted with Arsenal in 1975 and quickly became one of the English League's most consistent strikers. In 1981, he was transferred to Manchester United and played seven seasons at Old Trafford.

Stapleton joined Dutch power Ajax in 1988 before returning to England with Derby County. After playing with Le Harve in France, he was transferred to Blackburn Rovers for the 1989-90 season. He finished his playing career as a player-coach with Bradford City of the English Second Division in 1994.

Stapleton's illustrious playing career included a record five F.A. Cup Finals, winning once with Arsenal and twice with Manchester United.

PETER BRIDGWATER

President/General Manager

A transplanted Englishman whose passion for soccer has survived and even flourished in the sometimes indifference of his adopted country, Peter Bridgwater was named President and General Manager of the San Jose Clash on August 1, 1995.

Bridgwater, 60, had been working as a consultant to MLS after serving as Venue Executive Director (VED) of the San Francisco venue during World Cup USA 1994.

Peter Bridgewater

As Chairman of the San Francisco Bay World Cup Bid Committee, Bridgwater succeeded in securing the World Cup bid for the Bay Area, even after the region was not included in the initial list of potential venues. As VED, Bridgwater managed a Stanford Stadium site that was widely acclaimed as the most efficient and best-presented of the nine venues. The six matches at Stanford drew near-

ly 500,000 spectators, including an overflow crowd of 84, 147 for the Fourth of July showdown between the U.S. and eventual champion Brazil.

Born March 7, 1935, in Manchester, England, Bridgwater attended the Rossall College and worked in both law enforcement and banking in his native country. A part-time soccer player and coach, he began his professional soccer involvement assisting the Plymouth Argyle club.

Bridgwater left England in 1979 to become General Manager of the Vancouver Whitecaps, one of the most successful franchises in the North American Soccer League. Five years later, he moved to the Bay Area to become General Manager of the San Jose Earthquakes.

Bridgwater later bought the Earthquakes, and when the NASL folded, he founded the Western Soccer Alliance. After he sold the Earthquakes, he founded ProLink, a Santa Clara-based sports marketing firm, and began promoting international matches. Bridgwater has directed nearly 100 internationals, involving national and club teams from 25 countries. His 1990 match between the U.S. and the USSR at Stanford Stadium drew a crowd of 61,132, at the time the largest crowd ever to see the national team play in the United States.



LAURIE CALLOWAY Head Coach

Laurie Calloway, one of the most respected and recognizable names in the history of Bay Area professional soccer, was hired December 7, 1995, to coach the San Jose Clash.

A fan favorite as a player with the San Jose Earthquakes during the glory years of the North American Soccer League, Calloway has 10 seasons of professional coaching experience. He led the Earthquakes to the Western Soccer League championship in 1986 and guided the San Francisco Bay Blackhawks to the American Professional Soccer League championship in 1991.

Laurie Calloway

The 50-year-old Calloway boasts a career coaching record of 118-82-8, including stints with the American Soccer League's Los Angeles Lazers, the NASL's California Surf and Seattle Sounders and the APSL's Salt Lake Sting.

Born in Birmingham, England, Calloway played professionally for 17 years, logging more than 500 matches. He started his career in England where he played 12 seasons for five clubs - Blackburn Rovers, Wolverhampton Wanderers, York City, Southport and Shrewsbury Town.

Calloway joined the Earthquakes in 1974. He helped the Quakes to the NASL's Southern Division championship in 1976, when he was named the club's most valuable player and also made the All-NASL team.


Calloway retired as a player in 1979, and was presented with a key to the city by then San Jose Mayor Janet Gray Hayes. In addition to his coaching and playing experience, Calloway served as Competition Manager for the matches played at Stanford Stadium during World Cup USA 1994.

As one of the most successful coaches in the history of college soccer, and a prime example of the new wave of American-born coaches, Bruce Arena was named Head Coach and Assistant General Manager of Washington D.C. United on January 3, 1996, adding yet another dimension to his impact on American soccer. In October 1995, he was appointed by the United States Soccer Federation to the head coaching position for the Under-23 U.S National Team to prepare the side for the 1996 Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta, Georgia.

Bruce Arena

In accepting the coaching job with Washington D.C. United, Arena brought to a close an 18-year career as head soccer coach at the University of Virginia where he built the program into a perennial powerhouse, amassing a record of 295-59-31 and winning five NCAA Division I championship titles. His winning percentage at UVA ranks among the best ever in collegiate sports, surpassing even the legendary UCLA basketball coach John Wooden.

Arena took over the soccer program at UVA upon his arrival in Charlottesville in 1978 from Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y., where he was an assistant lacrosse coach. Inheriting a UVAs program that had enjoyed modest success, Arena wasted no time and in his first season finished with a 9-2-2 record. The Cavaliers went 12-4-1 in Arena's second year, stumbled slightly in 1980, and then began a 15-year run of winning seasons. In that time Arena's teams would appear in 15 straight NCAA Tournaments, winning the NCAA title four consecutive years and five times overall, and dominating the Atlantic Coast Conference by winning the regular season and ACC Tournament numerous times. He was named ACC Coach of the Year seven times.

Arena is a 1973 graduate of Cornell University where he was an All-American in lacrosse. He earned All-American honors in both soccer and lacrosse while attending Nassau Community College from 1969-71. A goalkeeper, he earned one cap with the United States National Team in 1973.

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER CONDENSED RULES OF THE GAME

Rule 1 - The Field of Play

Major League Soccer fields may have a minimum width of 50 yards and a maximum width of 100 yards. MLS fields may have a minimum length of 100 yards and a maximum length of 130 yards.

Rule 2 - The Ball

The official Mitre Game Ball of Major League Soccer will have a circumference of 27" -28" and a weight of 14 oz.-16 oz.

Rule 3 - Number of Players

Each team consists of 11 players, one of whom must be the goalkeeper. A maximum of three substitutes, plus the goalkeeper er, may be used. If an MLS team substitutes its goalkeeper during a match, he shall not count as one of its three allowed field player substitutes.

Rule 4 - Player Equipment

A player's uniform must consist of shirt, shorts, socks, shinguards and shoes. The goalkeeper must wear colors which distinguish him from the other players.

Rule 5 - Referees

One referee and two linesmen are appointed for each match. The referee is responsible for control of the game and his decisions are final.

Rule 6 - Referee's Assistant (formerly Linesman)

Two referee's assistants will assist the referee by indicating offside, when the ball is out of play, which team is entitled to a corner kick or throw in and by indicating other infringments of the laws of the game.

Rule 7 - Duration of the Game

The game shall be divided into two equal periods of 45 minutes each. If a MLS match is tied after 90 minutes, a shootout will be held to determine the winner. See MLS tiebreaker procedure.

Rule 8 - The Start of Play

A flip of a coin decides which team will kick off. Each team must stay in its own half of the field and the defending players must be at least 10 yards from the ball when it is kicked.

RULES

After a goal, the team scored upon will kick off. After halftime, the teams change ends and the kickoff will be taken by the opposite team to that which started the game. A goal cannot be scored directly from a kickoff.

Rule 9 - Ball In and Out of Play

The ball is out of play when (a) it has wholly crossed the goal line or touchline, whether on the ground or in the air, or (b) when the game has been stopped by the referee.


Rule 10 - Method of Scoring

A goal is scored when the whole of the ball has passed over the goal line, between the goals posts and under the cross bar, whether on the ground in or in the air.

Rule 11 - Offside

A player is in an offside position if he is nearer to his opponent's goal line than the ball, unless:

- a) He is in his own half of the field of play, or
- b) There are at least two of his opponents even with him



A player shall only be declared offside and penalized for being in an offside position, if, at the moment the ball touches, or is played by, one of his teammates, he is, in the opinion of the referee:

- i) Interfering with play or with an opponent, or
 ii) Seeking to gain an advantage by being in that position.
- A player shall not be declared offside by the referee i) Merely because of his being in an offside position, or ii) If he receives the ball direct from a goal-kick, a cornerkick, a throw-in, or when it has been dropped by a eree.

If a player is declared offside, the referee shall award an indirect free kick, which shall be taken by a player of the opposing team from the place where the infringement occurred.

Rule 12 - Fouls and Misconduct

A player who intentionally attempts to or actually: (a) kicks, (b), trips, (c) jumps at, (d) charges violently, (e) charges from behind, (f) strikes or spits at, (g) holds or (h) pushes an opponent, or (l) intentionally handles the ball shall be penalized by a direct free kick. Any one of these nine offenses committed in the penalty area by a defender will result in the award of a penalty kick to the offensive team.

A player committing less flagrant violations such as offside, dangerous play, obstruction or ungentlemanly conduct will be penalized by an indirect free kick.

Rule 13 - Free Kicks

Free kicks are classified into two categories: "Direct" (from which a goal can be scored directly against the offending side) and "Indirect" (from which a goal cannot be scored unless the ball has been touched by a player other than the kicker before entering the goal).

For all free kicks the offending team must be at least 10 yards from the ball or the goal line until it is kicked.

Rule 14 - Penalty Kick

A direct free kick taken at the penalty mark. All players except the player taking the kick and the goalkeeper must stay outside the penalty area and be at least 10 yards from the ball (hence the arc at the edge of the penalty area). See diagram.

Rule 15 - Throw In

When the ball has wholly crossed the touchline, it is put back into play by a throw in from the spot where it went out and by a player from the opposite team to the player who last touched it. A goal cannot be scored directly from a throw-in.

Rule 16 - Goal Kick

When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being last touched by a player from the attacking team, it is put back into play by a kick from the goal area by the defending team.

Rule 17 - Corner Kick

When the ball has wholly crossed the goal line after being last touched by a player from the defending team, it is put back into play by a kick by the attacking team from the corner on the side the ball went out.

MLS TIEBREAKER PROCEDURE/THE SHOOTOUT

MLS games which are tied at the end of regulation play will go directly into a shootout, involving players on each team challenging the opposing goalkeeper in a one-on-one situation.


Each team will then have five chances in alternate order, with the visiting team kicking first. The shooters will start with the ball thirty-five yards from the goal and will have five seconds in which to shoot. The goal-keepers have no movement restrictions within the five second period in accordance with normal rules of play. However, the goalkeeper must start each shootout attempt on his goal line.

The kicks shall be ended when one team has achieved an insurmountable advantage, such as scoring on its first three kicks while their opponents miss their first three.

If the teams remained tied after the prescribed five attempts, they shall continue to take alternate kicks until one has scored more than the other after an equal number of attempts. Only players in the game at the end of the match shall be eligible to take such kicks. Goalkeepers are eligible to kick if the coach so chooses. No player shall take a second kick until 11 kicks have been taken, at which time they shall continue in the same kicking order. The shooter is not allowed to play rebounds off the goalkeeper, crossbar, or goalposts, i.e. the shooter gets only one shot within the five seconds. If the goalkeeper handles the ball outside the penalty box, or fouls the shooter, a penalty kick will be awarded.

1996 MLS STANDING POINTS SYSTEM

Each winning team shall be awarded three points for a win in regulation time. A team winning in the Shootout will be given one point. No points will be given for a loss, either in regulation or a shootout.

GLOSSARY OF SOCCER TERMS

BOOTS

Another name for soccer cleats.

CENTER

When the ball is passed from a wide area of the field into the penalty area.

CHIP

A high, floated kick that lifts the ball over the heads of defenders or the goalkeeper.

CROSS

See Center.

CLEAR

A kick, ideally of good distance, that attempts to get the ball away from the penalty area quickly. Can also be a punch by a goalkeeper.

DRIBBLE

A way of advancing the ball by a series of short taps with one or both feet, usually keeping the ball close to the body, allowing one to change speed and direction with the ball.

ENDLINE

Either of the two lines running from corner flag to corner flag on which the goal sits. Also known as the goal line.

FLANK

ES

The area of the field near the touchline. Also known as the "wing".

HALF-VOLLEY

When the ball is kicked just as it is rebounding off the ground.

HANDS

An illegal act that involves touching the ball with the hands or arms. Also a "hand-ball."

HEADING

A method of scoring, passing or controlling the movement of the ball by making contact between the ball and a player's head.

MARKING

The act of guarding an opponent closely.

NUTMEG

The act of purposely dribbling the ball through an opponent's legs and regaining posession. Can be very embarrasing for the defender.

OBSTRUCTION

Preventing the opponent from moving around a player by standing in his path.

OVERLAP

An offensive play whereby a defender or midfielder runs down the wing past his own forward.

PENALTY SPOT

A circle 12 yards in front of the goal from which penalty kicks are taken.

PITCH

Another name for the field of play.

PROFESSIONAL FOUL

A foul, usually hard and from behind, in which a defender intentionally takes down a forward to disrupt a clear scoring opportunity, usually a break-away. The "professional foul" usally results in a yellow or red card.

RED CARD

A card presented to a player by the referee signifying the player's ejection from the match. The red card is presented for dangerous fouls, repeated fouls, striking an opponent, spitting or after a player receives a second yellow card during the game.

SAVE

When the goalkeeper prevents a scoring opportunity by catching the ball or deflecting it away from the goal.

GLOSSARY OF SOCCER TERMS

SHIELDING

Retaining possession of the ball by keeping your body between the ball and the opponent.

SHOOTOUT

The tie-breaking procedure after regulation time used in MLS games. In the shootout, each teams has five opportunities to score a goal in a one-on-one situation with the opposing goalkeeper. Each one-on-one situation begins with the goalkeeper in goal and the offensive player 35 yards away from the goal line. The player has five seconds to dribble the ball and score.

SLIDE TACKLE

An attempt to take posession of the ball from the opponent by sliding on the ground.

Another name for a forward, or a player whose primary responsibility is scoring goals.

SWEEPER

A defender who roams behind the back line of defenders, closing down attacking opportunities and starting the team's attack.

TACKLING

Attempting to take the ball away from the opponent when both players are playing the ball with their feet.

TRAP

Controlling the ball from a pass, and keeping it close to the body, using the feet, thighs, chest or head.

TOUCHLINE

Another word for the sidelines of the field.

VOLLEY

Kicking the ball out of the air before it hits the around.

WALL PASS

A pass to a teammate that is immediately returned around the opponent. Also known as a "give and go."

WING

An area of the field near the touchline. Also known as the flank.

WINGER

Name given to the right and left outside forwards in a 4-3-3 formation, not commonly played anymore in men's soccer.

WOODWORK

Another name for the crossbar and goalposts of a soccer goal.

YELLOW CARD

A "caution" card presented to a player by the referee indicating a warning for dangerous fouls, repetitive fouls or unsportsmanlike conduct. Two yellow card cautions result in a red card and the ejction of the player.

4-4-2

The formation most often used today, featuring the goalkeeper, four defenders, four midfielders and two forwards.

3-5-2

A formation growing in popularity, featuring a goalkeeper, a sweeper and two marking backs, five midfielders and two forwards.

4-3-3

An attacking oriented formation featuring a goalkeeper, four defenders, three midfielders and three forwards.

3-4-3

A rarely played formation, most often employed when a team is behind in a game and needs a goal. A 3-4-3 features a goalkeeper, three defenders, four midfielders and three forwards.

UNITED STATES SOCCER FEDERATION

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER AND USISL JOIN FORCES IN DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT

In its continuing effort to develop quality American players, Major League Soccer will utilize the United Systems of Independent Soccer Leagues (USISL) as the official developmental league to MLS. The alliance includes aspects of player movement, coach and referee development and marketing. The partnership marks the first-ever cooperative agreement between two professional soccer leagues in the United States.

The MLS-USISL partnership is a culmination of a two-year process that began when the USISL conducted various rule experiments for MLS. Executives from both leagues say it is their intent to forge a long-term agreement.

"This is a significant event and I think it clearly shows the commitment of both organizations to develop soccer in the United States," said MLS Deputy Commissioner Sunil Gulati. "I want to thank the USISL club ownership for its commitment and faith in such a far-reaching agreement. The USISL's support of MLS is sure to help create a great future for U.S. Soccer."

The MLS-USISL partnership was reached after unanimous recommendations by the USISL Select League executive committee, members of the USISL owners committee and Major League Soccer, Executives from both leagues looked at the U.S. sports landscape to help them create a hybrid of the American concept of a minorleague structure, taking examples from Major League Baseball, the National Basketball Association and the National Hockey League.

"To find common threads represents a very good start to what we hope will be a long and fruitful relationship," said USISL Commissioner Francisco Marcos. "We have reached an extensive agreement that for all practical purposes means that the easiest way for an American-based player to get to MLS is through the USISL. This is something that is great for the future of U.S. Soccer."

Each MLS team will have cooperative agreements with several USISL teams within their region. The USISL clubs will supply players to the MLS team in case of injuries or other circumstances, and at the same time serve as an environment for an MLS player coming off an injury to work himself back into shape.

The impact of the USISL was evident at the MLS Draft in early February where 73 drafted players boasted USISL experience, including top pick Brian McBride of the Columbus Crew.

In exchange for the transfer of these USISL players to MLS clubs throughout the season, MLS will provide the USISL with a significant financial contribution. The USISL plans to use the money to purchase television

MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER PLAYER COMBINE SHOWCASES TOP PLAYERS

Starting a major professional sports league is a monumental task. Under Major League Soccer's single-entity structure, all players sign contracts with the league and are later assigned or drafted by individual teams. After nearly three years of evaluating players from around the world, MLS recruited more

than 250 players to participate in the inaugural Major League Soccer Player Combine at the University of California, Irvine from January 5 -15, 1996.

Major League Soccer coaches and general managers attended the 11-day event to evaluate top domestic and international players. The MLS Player Combine featured

top domestic talent along with players from countries including Bosnia, Cameroon, England and Nigeria.

The MLS Player Combine paid off for all teams, especially the Tampa Bay Mutiny and Columbus Crew. Tampa Bay spotted Mexican First Division midfielder Martin Vasquez at the Combine while Columbus eyed former St. Louis All-American forward Brian McBride. Vasquez was assigned to the Mutiny shortly after the Combine, and McBride was selected by the Crew with the

first overall pick in the 1996 MLS Player Draft. "We felt Martin Vasquez was the standout player at the Combine, and I know a lot of other teams also felt that way," said Tampa Bay President and General Manager Farrukh Quraishi. "He is an elegant, skillful player who can both defend and attack."

"Brian (McBride) is exactly what Major League Soccer is about," said Eric Wynalda, the U.S. National Team career scoring leader and a member

of the San Jose Clash. "He's someone who will finally be able to showcase his ability to soccer fans in the United States."

The core of the MLS preseason rosters came from the MLS

Player Combine. Overall, 145 players from January's Combine were on a team preseason roster.




