RIVERFRONT STADIUM

Riverfront Stadium is situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway.

The seating capacity when the field is in football configuration is 60,389.

The playing surface at Riverfront is Astroturf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will hold 4500 automobiles. Three parking decks, plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium.

Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages and cartoons through a computer.

The stadium opened in 1970.

The largest crowd ever to assemble for a sporting event in Cincinnati was at Riverfront when 60,284 fans saw the Bengals and Cleveland Browns on October 17, 1971.

AUSTIN E. KNOWLTON



CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

Austin E. "Dutch" Knowlton is the chairman of the board of the Cincinnati Bengals and has been a firm supporter from the first day of the franchise's inception.

Knowlton, a well-known builder and sportsman, has been a founder, owner and director since the franchise began and often can be found watching his team play at some of the farthest waypoints on the NFL map, in addition to his regular attendance at games in Riverfront Stadium.

Knowlton also is an avid sportsman who spends as much of his free time as possible overseeing his second great interest — the breeding and selling of show horses at his Emerald Farm in Delaware County. He is also a Trustee of the Brown Jug Society which runs the Triple Crown for standardbred pacing horses. He also owns thoroughbreds that run in California, Kentucky, Chicago and Florida.

After receiving a degree in architecture and civil engineering from Ohio State University, Knowlton joined his father's construction company and later assumed ownership of the construction business. He now operates it under the name of Knowlton Construction Company. They are engaged in the construction, leasing and management of various types of commercial buildings.

During the expansion of the college program, he designed, built and financed 54 college dormitories and other buildings for various colleges and universities in various states. He built the major portion of Ohio University, Bowling Green State University, Capital University, Otterbein College and numerous other schools and universities.

His offices are in Bellefontaine, Columbus, Ohio, and he resides in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., and in Delaware County at Emerald Farms.

JOHN SAWYER



PRESIDENT

John Sawyer has been president of the Cincinnati Bengals since the franchise was formed in 1967.

A well-known business executive, Sawyer was one of the founders of the Bengals. He put in many hours of hard work and thousands of miles of travel to bring the National Football League franchise to Cincinnati.

Sawyer, Paul Brown and Mike Brown represented Cincinnati in the many NFL meetings held prior to awarding the franchise. He currently attends most NFL owners' meetings and played a part in the NFL realignment in 1970.

Sawyer is an owner, president and a member of the team's board of directors. And, importantly, he is one of the Bengals' top fans.

He has missed only four road trips with the Bengals since the team began playing in 1968.

Sawyer is president of J. Sawyer Co., a multi-faceted agricultural firm he developed which has included aviation firms, an automobile agency, a restaurant, an antique shop, a horticulture products company, a commercial feed lot and numerous farms in Ohio, Kentucky, Mississippi, Florida, Wyoming, Colorado and Arkansas. J. Sawyer Co. is one of the leading farm management and real estate brokerage firms in the Midwest.

He was inducted into the Ohio Agricultural Hall of Fame, Ohio's highest honor in the field of agriculture, in 1983. He has been honored for serving Ohio agriculture as a farmer, landowner and innovator for more than 30 years. His support and leadership helped greatly in the early development of the American Soybean Association and the Ohio Beef Marketing Program.

Sawyer, who was a B17 pilot in World War II, was a pioneer in the aerial application of crop pesticides. He has been a leader in sound environmental management in the livestock industry and has developed a high volume composting system used at the Paygro plant and Ohio Feed Lot in South Charleston, Ohio.

This innovative "Paygro Composting System" has been recognized by the EPA as an effective method of sludge treatment and is being installed in large Ohio cities to help solve the tremendous municipal waste problems.

Sawyer has never lost his love of airplanes and flew a company Lear jet on business trips from Madison Aviation Center which he built in London, Ohio.

He is very active in charitable and civic endeavors and is vice president of fund-raising for Easter Seals, a social agency he became involved with through former Cincinnati quarterback Ken Anderson, who is now a member of the coaching staff. He's a member of the board of trustees of Children's Hospital, active with Springer School, Boy Scouts and the Episcopal Diocese of Southern Ohio.

Sawyer is a graduate of Princeton University and is the son of the late Charles Sawyer, former Secretary of Commerce. He and his wife, Ruth, live in Indian Hill and have four daughters, Anne Wetherill, Elizabeth Selnick, Catherine Ryall and Mary. They also enjoy nine grandchildren, John, Putnam, Meredith and Daniel Wetherill, William III and Anna Selnick, and Nicholas, Christina, Jonathan and Patrick Ryall.

MIKE BROWN



VICE PRESIDENT. GENERAL MANAGER

Mike Brown is the vice president and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals and also an owner and a member of the board of directors of the team.

He fills the key roles in the administrative operation of the franchise which is among the best in the National Football League.

Brown was instrumental in bringing professional football to Cincinnati. He and his father, the late Paul Brown, a football legend, brought professional football to the Queen City in 1967 with a franchise in the American Football League which merged with the National Football League in 1970.

The Bengals began playing in the AFL in 1968.

Brown has played a major role in the success of the Cincinnati Bengals in their rise from an expansion team to a solid, highly-competitive team that has been in the Super Bowl twice, won two American Football Conference championships, four American Football Conference Central Division titles and played in the playoffs seven times.

A graduate of Dartmouth where he played quarterback, he received a law degree from Harvard Law School and was associated with a law firm in Cleveland before joining his father with the Cleveland Browns.

Mike and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Katie Brown Blackburn, and a son, Paul. Katie is the team's corporate secretary and legal counsel and is a member of the board of directors. Paul works with scouting and player personnel and also is a member of the board of directors.

ASS'T GENERAL MANAGER, DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Pete Brown, an owner and member of the board of directors, has been the director of player personnel for the Cincinnati Bengals since 1969. He joined the Bengals in 1967 as their assistant director of player personnel.

Brown became assistant general manager of the Bengals in August, 1991.

He is the architect of the Bengals' annual draft of college players. In the 1980's, his draft selections led the team to two Super Bowls. The Bengals have made seven playoff appearances.

Brown is the son of the late Paul E. Brown who founded the Bengals, coached the team and was general manager from 1968 to 1975 when he became fulltime general manager until 1991.

He is a graduate of Denison University.

KATHERINE BLACKBURN



CORPORATE SECRETARY, GENERAL COUNSEL

Katie Blackburn is the corporate secretary and general counsel for the Cincinnati Bengals.

Katie, who joined the Bengals in October, 1991, represents the team in contract talks with players and with the radio and television affiliates. She also is involved in the stadium lease negotiations with the City of Cincinnati.

She is the daughter of Mike Brown, the Bengals' vice president and general manager. Prior to joining the Bengals, she practiced law with the firm of Taft, Stettinius and Hollister.

Katie is a graduate of Dartmouth as an economics and math major and of the University of Cincinnati College of Law.

She and her husband, Troy, have a daughter, Elizabeth.

PAUL H. BROWN



SCOUTING/PLAYER PERSONNEL

Paul H. Brown is in his first year working in the Cincinnati Bengals' front office.

Brown concentrated on scouting talent at the collegiate level during the 1992 season. Besides his scouting duties, he also negotiates player contracts.

Paul, the son of Mike Brown, Bengals' vice president and general manager, has been close to football and his life. His early memories are of being with his grandfather, Paul, at the Bengals' training camp at Wilmington College in Wilmington, Ohio.

Brown is a graduate of Purcell High School in Cincinnati and Regis University in Denver, Colo. He played varsity tennis and was a member of the debate team at Regis.

DAVE SHULA



HEAD COACH

Dave Shula, the youngest coach in the National Football League, is in his second season as head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

The 34-year-old Shula, who has been with football all of his life, was appointed head coach of the Bengals December 27, 1991.

In one season, he has revitalized the team which climbed from 3-13 in 1991 to 5-11 in 1992.

Shula has been in the NFL for 11 years, beginning at Miami where he began coaching under his father, Don, as quarterbacks and receivers coach of the Dolphins. During his time with the Dolphins, quarterback Dan Marino set numerous passing records. He also helped develop Mark Duper and Mark Clayton into one of the NFL's best receiving tandems.

Dave remembers getting his first job with the Dolphins. He was leaving for a round of golf and his father summoned him as a quick replacement for an aide who was leaving. Dave accepted the job and was an assistant coach with his father for seven seasons with the Miami Dolphins.

"He's a lot like his father," Clayton says. "He sits down and goes over every bit of information a million times before he makes up his mind."

"He's a no-nonsense coach," Clayton added. "He doesn't think you can win when you play around. He knows what it takes to win games."

Shula was assistant head coach of the Dolphins in 1988. He then went to the Dallas Cowboys in 1989 and served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach before joining the Bengals in 1991 as receivers coach.

He was offered the head coaching job of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1986 when he was 26 years old. He declined.

Shula played in the NFL in 1981 with the Baltimore Colts as a wide receiver and punt and kickoff returner. He played college football at Dartmouth where he had an outstanding career and held many receiving records at one time. He was selected All-Ivy twice.

The Bengals' coach has a strong football background that began when he was a child. He never missed an opportunity to work with his father's team, starting out as a ball boy and towel chaser and climbing right up the ladder.

"I grew up around the game of football," Shula said. "I was always interested in what I was doing around the game. I paid attention."

Mike Brown, Bengals' vice president and general manager, agrees: "Dave comes from a distinguished football family, and some of us don't hold that against him."

Brown is a son of the late coach Paul Brown, a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame and founder of the Cleveland Browns and the Cincinnati Bengals.

The Shula's are the first father-son combination to be head coaches in the NFL at the same time.

Shula, who was 32 when he accepted the Cincinnati job, is the youngest man to be named head coach of an NFL team in recent years. His father was 33 when he took over the Baltimore Colts in 1963.

"He told me, 'You're going to break my record,'" Dave Shula said. "At that point I hadn't thought of being the youngest head coach."

"Then he said, 'But I'm all for you, and I hope the next record you break is 300 wins.' I said back to him, 'I just want to get one first.'"

Shula has plenty of energy and imagination and has installed a new work ethic and discipline for the Bengals. He has the usual mini-camp during the off-season but follows it with two weeks of "voluntary" workouts which emphasize running and exercises which will put a team in proper condition.

He has stressed to the Cincinnati players that once they are inside the gates at Spinney Field, the team's practice facility, football is their only concern.

Shula says his goals are simple.

"First win the AFC Central Division, and if not, then the goals are to make the playoffs and to win the Super Bowl."

Shula's work has impressed players and executives.

"I'm happy and proud of David," said Don Shula shortly after his son's appointment as head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals. "It was many years ago that I signed my first contract, in 1951, as a player for Paul Brown with the Cleveland Browns. Now, 40 years later, David has been given the opportunity to become head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals by Mike Brown."

Weeb Ewbank, who was head coach of the Baltimore Colts and New York Jets, was a classmate of Bengals' founder Paul Brown at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. He coached Don Shula, Dave's father, with the Colts. Don Shula then succeeded Ewbank as Colts head coach in 1963.

"If you look at this, you have two young men there (Bengals' general manager Mike Brown, 58, and Shula, 34) running this and you might fret," Ewbank said. "But here are two boys who have grown up and have had nothing but football in their lives. If anybody's going to have a possibility of doing things right, they would. When you grow up around a father like Don Shula, you're bound to pick-up the good points of coaching."

Dave Shula is a very hard worker and he enjoys his job.

"I enjoy it immensely," he said. "I don't enjoy losing, but I enjoy the job. I enjoy the challenge of trying to right the ship."

"I haven't confronted any situation where I've felt uncomfortable, like 'What do I do?'" Shula said. "By saying that, I don't want people to think I'm trivializing the job. I've learned a heck of a lot."

Shula and his wife, Leslie, have three sons — Daniel, 10, Christopher, 7, and Matthew, 4.

RUNNING BACKS

Jim Anderson joined the Cincinnati Bengals in 1984 as coach of the running backs.

He has played a key role in developing the team's potent running attack over the last nine years. The Bengals ranked first in rushing in the National Football League in 1988 and 1989, fifth in 1990 and third in the AFC in 1992.

Anderson has been instrumental in the development of Cincinnati running backs including young Harold Green who was a Pro Bowl selection last season.

Before joining the Bengals' staff, Anderson coached at five colleges: Stanford, 1981-83; Southern Methodist, 1976-80; Nevada-Las Vegas, 1974-75; Scottsdale Community College, 1973, and Cal Western (now U.S. International) 1970-71. He coached San Diego Morse High School in 1972.

Anderson played linebacker and defensive end for Cal Western in San Diego in 1970 and was co-captain and voted to the NAIA All-District team.

Anderson coached the running backs at Nevada-Las Vegas in 1974 when the Runnin' Rebels went 12-1 and advanced to the Grantland Rice Bowl (the NCAA Division II semi-finals).

Among the running backs he coached in college were Mike Thomas, NFL Rookie of the Year in 1975 with the Washington Redskins, at Nevada-Las Vegas; Art Whittington, the former Los Angeles Raiders running back at SMU; and Darrin Nelson, the first running back taken in the 1982 draft by the Minnesota Vikings, at Stanford.

He was born March 27, 1948, and he and his wife, Marcia, have a son, Derek, 19.

KEN ANDERSON



QUARTERBACKS

Ken Anderson, who holds virtually all the Cincinnati Bengals' passing records, was named the team's quarterback coach January 7, 1993.

"The way he played the game will be a great example to the quarterbacks we'll have here this year," coach Dave Shula said.

"When Ken Anderson walks into a room, even if he doesn't say a word, he commands a lot of respect from young football players," Shula continued. "The way he played the game says a lot right there."

Haluchak joined the Bengals' coaching staff January 13, 1992, after coaching the San Diego linebackers since 1986 where he worked with Ron Lynn, now Cincinnati's defensive coordinator. He and Lynn also worked together with the USFL Oakland Invaders 1983-85 and several years in college football.

Haluchak is developing a solid linebacking corps in Cincinnati just as he did in San Diego. He has outstanding teaching skills and can utilize players by switching positions.

Before joining the Chargers, Haluchak served three years as linebackers coach with Oakland in the USFL after seven years on the collegiate level. SPECIAL TEAMS

Marv Braden is beginning his fourth season as coach of the Cincinnati Bengals' special teams.

Braden, who has coached in the National Football League for 17 years, came to the Bengals in 1990 from the Phoenix Cardinals where he coached from 1986-89.

Other NFL coaching positions for Braden during his career include special assistant and special teams coordinator for the San Diego Chargers from 1981-85 and special teams coach of the Denver Broncos from 1977-80.

Braden has improved Cincinnati's special teams. His units in Denver finished the season ranked first in 1977 and 1979. Braden's special teams at San Diego ranked first in 1982 and 1985.

A graduate of Southwest Missouri State University, Braden began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Missouri (1961-62). After three years as defensive coordinator at Parsons (Iowa) College, he was head coach at Northeast Missouri State in 1967-68.

Braden was head coach at California Western (now U.S. International) from 1969-72 and had a 23-12-1 record. He moved to Iowa State as defensive coordinator in 1973 and served as offensive coordinator at SMU from 1974-75 before joining Michigan State in the same capacity in 1976.

BOB KARMELOWICZ



DEFENSIVE LINE

Bob Karmelowicz, a hard-working and hard-driving coach, is in charge of the Cincinnati Bengals' defensive line.

Karmelowicz came to the Bengals January 13, 1992, from the University of Miami (Fla.) where he was defensive line coach for three seasons.

Karmelowicz guided three of the finest defensive lines in college history during his stay with the Hurricanes. During that span, the Hurricanes produced six defensive linemen who were selected in the first three rounds of the National Football League draft. Heading that group are Russell Maryland, who was the Outland Trophy winner and the No. 1 overall pick in the 1991 draft by the Dallas Cowboys, and Cortez Kennedy who was the No. 3 overall pick in 1990 by the Seattle Seahawks.

Under Karmelowicz, Miami was No. 1 in total defense in 1989 and established a school record for sacks with 52. His 1990 and 1991 units were ranked high. His 1991 defense led the country in scoring defense and won the national championship.

Karmelowicz also has coached at Washington State, UNLV, UTEP, Arizona State, Massachusetts and Illinois.

A 1972 graduate of the University of Bridgeport, Karmelowicz was a three-year starter and a consensus Little All-American nose tackle in his senior season.

He was born July 22, 1949, in New Britain, Ct.

RON LYNN



DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Ron Lynn, a highly-respected coach, is the Cincinnati Bengals' defensive coordinator.

Lynn joined the Bengals January 8, 1992, after six seasons as defensive coordinator of the San Diego Chargers where he improved the defense dramatically from its No. 28 ranking in 1985, the year before he took over. The Chargers were ranked sixth in defense in 1989 and fifth in 1990.

Lynn employs an aggressive, attacking style of defense. Last year, the Bengals had 46 sacks, more than twice as many as the previous season.

Before joining the Chargers, Lynn coordinated the defense of the Oakland Invaders of the USFL from 1983-85. His defense led the USFL in sacks in 1983 with 74 while finishing third in overall defense. His 1985 unit finished second against the run, allowing 101.8 yards a game.

Lynn coached three seasons, 1980-82, at the University of California, the last two as defensive coordinator. He was defensive coordinator at the University of the Pacific in 1979 and at San Jose State, 1977-78.

Lynn coached at Kent State (1974-76), Mt. Union College (1968-73) and Toledo (1966-67).

He was born December 6, 1944, in Struthers, Ohio. He played football and baseball for Struthers High School and Mt. Union College, Alliance, Ohio.

Lynn received a bachelor of science degree in chemistry from Mt. Union College and a master's degree in education from Toledo.

Ron and his wife, Cynthia, have sons, Ryon, 5 and John, 3½. Son Alec died March 18, 1993. He was 15 months old.

RON MEEKS



DEFENSIVE BACKFIELD

Ron Meeks is the Cincinnati Bengals' defensive backfield coach. He was appointed to the position January 30, 1992, after being defensive assistant for the Dallas Cowboys in 1991.

Meeks stresses technique and an understanding of the discipline necessary to play in the secondary.

Meeks was defensive backfield coach at Fresno State where his unit finished 10th in the nation in pass defense in 1990. He also coached at Fresno State in 1989.

He coached the secondary at New Mexico State in 1988 and was a graduate assistant at Miami (Fla.) in 1986-87 where he worked with defensive backs and special teams.

Meeks played two seasons as a defensive back at Arkansas State, including 1975 when the Indians went undefeated. After going to training camp as a rookie free agent with the New York Giants in 1977, he played three seasons in the Canadian Football League, two with Hamilton and one with Ottawa.

He signed with the Giants again in 1980, but returned to Canada later that year and played two seasons for Toronto.

Meeks began his coaching career at Arkansas State as graduate assistant in 1984 and a part-time assistant in 1985.

He holds a degree in journalism from Arkansas State.

Meeks was born August 27, 1954 and was an outstanding running back and defensive back at Robert E. Lee High School in Jacksonville, Fla.

JIM McNALLY



OFFENSIVE LINE

Jim McNally is one of the best offensive line coaches in the National Football League.

He is in his 14th year with the Bengals.

McNally is a hard-working, knowledgeable offensive line coach who annually has a strong forward wall on the field for the Bengals regardless of the injury toll.

His tough front has been instrumental in giving the Bengals one of the best offenses — rushing and passing — in the NFL in the last 13 years. In 1988 and 1989, Cincinnati was No. 1 in rushing in the NFL. Last season, Cincinnati was third in rushing in the AFC. The passing attack has always been very effective and was at the top in 1988 and 1989.

McNally has a reputation of taking late-round draft choices and turning them into top-notch linemen. Examples include center Bruce Kozerski, ninth-round selection in 1984, tackle Joe Walter, seventh-round choice in 1985, tackle Ken Moyer, a free agent, and free agent tackles Kirk Scrafford and Kevin Sargent.

McNally coached at four colleges before joining the Bengals in 1980. He was offensive line coach at Wake Forest in 1979, Boston College 1976-78, Marshall 1973-75 and Buffalo 1966-69.

He is a member of the University of Buffalo Hall of Fame. He played for the University of Buffalo for three seasons and was an All-East performer.

McNally was born December 13, 1943. He and his wife, Carolyn, have three children, Jenny, 22, Betsy, 19, and Jon, 18.

MICHAEL POPE



OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR TIGHT ENDS

Michael Pope was appointed offensive coordinator of the Cincinnati Bengals January 7, 1993. He also will continue to coach the tight ends.

Pope joined the Bengals January 13, 1992, as tight ends coach after serving in a similar capacity with the New York Giants for nine seasons.

"Mike has always displayed to me knowledge of overall offense," head coach Dave Shula said. "He understands concepts, he has a lot of different ideas and he's always searching for better ideas, trying to improve the situation he is in.

"He has an unusual work ethic to say the least," Shula added. "He's very much dedicated to putting in whatever time is absolutely necessary."

Pope joined the Giants in February, 1983, after spending five seasons as receivers coach at Mississippi. He coached the Giants' tight ends in two Super Bowl championship seasons, 1986 and 1990. While with the Giants, Pope coached all-rookie and all-pro Mark Bavaro and all-rookie Howard Cross.

He played quarterback at Lenoir Rhyne College and won All-Conference honors and his team played in the national championship game three times, winning the title once.

Pope coached high schools at Charlotte, N.C., Jacksonville, Fla., and Lake Wales, Fla., and twice guided teams to the Florida state championship finals.

He moved into the collegiate ranks in 1970 as an assistant at Florida State, and in 1975 became assistant coach at Texas Tech. He then went to Mississippi.

Pope and his wife, Lee, have two sons — Travus and Daron. He was born March 15, 1942.

RICHARD WILLIAMSON



RECEIVERS

Richard Williamson, a talented and respected coach, is in his second season with the Cincinnati Bengals as coach of the receivers.

Williamson came to the Bengals January 4, 1992, after being head coach of the Tampa Bay Bucs in 1991. He gives the Cincinnati staff solid experience on offense and he has a vast knowledge of receivers. He has coached and developed several Pro Bowl receivers.

Williamson served as interim coach of Tampa Bay for the final three games of the 1990 season and was named head coach February 4, 1991. His record was 1-2 in 1990 and 3-13 in 1991.

Williamson coached the Tampa Bay wide receivers from 1987 through 1990 after serving in the same capacity with the Kansas City Chiefs from 1983 through 1986.

He was head coach of Memphis State for six seasons (1975-80) and was selected Southern Independent Coach-of-the-Year in 1976. He compiled a 31-35 record at Memphis State.

Williamson coached in the Blue-Grey All-Star Game twice. He was an assistant coach at Alabama (1963-67, 1970-71) and Arkansas (1968-69, 1972-74). He was a top receiver for Alabama in 1961 and 1962. The '61 Crimson Tide won the national championship.

NFL HELPS PLAYERS

For many National Football League players, the off-season is a time to relax and prepare for another challenging season.

But for those players involved in NFL Player Programs, under the supervision of director, Lem Burnham, the off-season also provides time to exchange a football for a textbook, or shoulder pads for a suit.

The NFL Player Programs are comprised of a Career Internship Program, a continuing Education Program, a Family Assistance Program and a Financial Education Program.

In Cincinnati, consultant Bill Johnson, former player, head coach and assistant, handles the programs for the Bengals. He has directed a number of players to part-time jobs, some of which become permanent after playing careers ended through the NFL Career Internship Program. He also has been instrumental in some players returning to college to earn their degrees under the NFL's Continuing Education Program.

"The Career Internship Program gives players a chance to develop business and managerial skills that they can use after football," Johnson said. "We realize a playing career is relatively short and that players must prepare for life after football. The program gives players a chance to develop business and managerial skills they can use after football."

The NFL also provides consultation year-round for players and their families through the Family Assistance Program. Financial education is available during the season through a series of Financial Education Seminars.

Johnson says there has been a marked increase in the amount of interest in the programs from the players.

"ESSEX EXPRESS"

Essex Johnson, one of the finest running backs in Bengals' history, had the distinction of being on the ground floor of two National Football League expansion teams.

Johnson was with the expansion Bengals from 1968 to 1975 and then was signed by the Tampa Bay Bucs in their first season in 1976.

"It was wild because there were so many players in those camps," Johnson recalled. "I was a rookie the Bengals' first year and there were about 90 rookies in camp. Paul Brown (then coach) was cutting players almost every day and it was nerve-wracking. You'd see guys at breakfast and then never again."

With Tampa Bay, the tough part was the season in which the Bucs went 0-14.

"During the season we had new players almost every day," Johnson said. "Half the time, you'd have to introduce yourself to guys the day before the game."

Brown said the "Essex Express," who rushed for 3070 yards for the Bengals, "has the best balance of any back I've ever coached."

The 5-9, 200-pound speedster was taken in the sixth round after playing college football at Grambling.

"In 1992, our coaching staff implemented the style of football we want to be known for - aggressive and disciplined - and we make strides toward achieving those goals.

Ray Bentley, a talented veteran linebacker, won a starting position at linebacker for the Bengals in 1992 but suffered a torn anterior cruciate ligament in the second game of the season and was sidelined the rest of the year...The loss of Bentley hurt the Bengals...He provided the team with experience and intelligence of he game gained through seven years in the National Football League..."We missed Ray when he went out last season," coach Dave Shula said. "He gives us a lot of leadership. He's a very intelligent player and was a big part of our defense. He provides us with experience."...Bentley has recovered from surgery and after a long rehabilitation program is ready for training camp and the 1993 season when he hopes to pick up where he left off last year...He called the defensive signals for the Bengals in the 1992 preseason and two regular season games he played...Bentley's big play of the 1992 season came in the opener against Seattle in the Kingdome when he recovered a fumble and returned it 78 yards for a touchdown...Bentley, a Plan B free agent from Buffalo, signed with the Bengals on March 10, 1992... Bentley had been with the Bills for six seasons and was a starter most of the time... In his stay with Buffalo, Bentley accounted for 440 tackles - 277 solos and 163 assists, had two sacks and three pass interceptions... He played in two Super Bowl games for the powerful Bills... "He's a sturdy, veteran middle linebacker," Mike Brown, Bengals' general manager, said. "He's a little bigger and stronger than the guys we have. He can take on guards and stop the run effectively."... Bentley served as the Bills' "quarterback on defense" by relaying the signals from the bench to the huddle and making the adjustment calls at the line... Bentley signed with the Bills as a free agent in 1986... Prior to joining Buffalo, he played for the Michigan Panthers and the Oakland Invaders in the USFL from 1983-85... He played for the 1983 Panthers, the USFL championship team... While with the Invaders, Bentley played for Bengals' defensive coordinator Ron Lynn and linebackers' coach Mike Haluchak... He won All-USFL honors and led both teams in tackles... When he joined Buffalo in 1986, he was primarily a special teams player but moved into the starting lineup in the 10th week of the season... Before Bentley entered the starting lineup, Buffalo failed to hold an opponent under 100 yards rushing, but with him at linebacker held six of the last seven teams played under 100... He led the Bills in tackles with 122 in 1988, including a club-high of 15 against the Bengals... He also had 12 tackles in playoffs, high for the Bills... Bentley's books about the heroics of Darby the Dinosaur bring messages to children.

Jan Krueger was a visitor to Chatterlings to meet the linebacker-author and read "Darby's Christmas Adventure."

"I like that it says Christmas is for everyone and you can change someone who's bad by being nice to them," she says of the story in which the dinosaur rescues a kidnapped Santa Claus.

Visitors liked Darby's messages to children to stay with their parents when shopping.

"If they don't listen to Mom, maybe they'll listen to Darby," Margie Minturn said.

Parents visiting the store found it unusual to find an NFL linebacker writing children's stories.

"It shows you a side of these guys that you don't see on Sunday afternoons," said Minturn.

Bentley, who is in his eighth season in the NFL, began writing about Darby, the bespectacled dinosaur, in 1989.

Bentley and his wife, Jodi, have five children and Darby developed from tales he told them.

Bentley prefers books that deal with real issues and things that happen to children.

"A little fantasy is all right, but I don't like the violent stuff," Bentley said.

Most impressive is Breech's clutch performance in overtime games, with nine game-winning kicks, a league record...The 1992 season was another consistent year for the Bengals' placekicker, hitting 19 field goals on 27 attempts...The 15-year veteran continued to display accuracy, making 15 field goals on 15 attempts inside the 40 yard line...Over the last five years (1988-1992) Breech has made 82 out of 107 attempts from inside the 30-yard-line and converted 182 out of 199 point after attempts...Head Coach Dave Shula calls Breech "Mr. Clutch" for his pressure performances in close games and overtime...Shula explains, "Jim provides tremendous accuracy with short to midrange field goals, even when the game is on the line."...Breech has faced many pressure kicks in his career, but always is mentally up to the task... Breech says, "Dealing with pressure is a matter of concentrating on the things you have control over. If a kicker begins to worry about the outcome of the kick instead of the mechanics and fundamentals then the kick will usually be missed. I can not control the crowd or the media reaction, but I can control the actual kick itself. My thought process only focuses on the physical aspects of kicking the ball."...Bengals special teams coach Marv Braden explains this focus as "competitive temperament"...Braden says, "There are some athletes who thrive on pressure situations and Jimmy is one of them. He wants to kick with the game on the line."...In the odd event Breech does miss a kick he knows how to handle it...Jim explains: "I analyze it right after it happens, why it happened, then I correct it on the sidelines. The longer you do something the more you learn about what you're doing and you make adjustments."...Braden adds that, "Jimmy believes in himself and his abilities and welcomes the opportunity to be put in pressure situations."...Breech was a standout kicker at the University of California where he holds several records...He was drafted in 1978 by Detroit...After being waived by Detroit he signed with Oakland late in the 1978 season...Breech then came to the Bengals November 25, 1980, after the Raiders waived him...Breech is very active in the Greater Cincinnati community, working with the Muscular Dystrophy Association, Hoxworth Blood Center, and several anti-drug groups...Jim and his wife, Polly, live in Cincinnati with their six children-Jimmy, 18, Rebekah, 15, Ruthie, 12, John, 11, Daniel, 9 and Joseph, 8...Born April 11, 1956...Hometown is Sacramento, Calif.

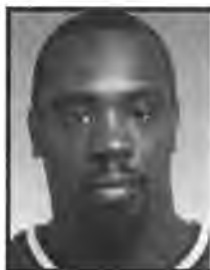

Cincinnati Bengals' wide receiver Eddie Brown hopes to return to action this season after missing the 1992 campaign because of a ruptured disc in his neck... "You miss guys like Eddie Brown, not just for the yards you lose, said Cincinnati coach Dave Shula. "He's just got a way about him where he's well-liked by everyone in organization and on the team."... "I'm hoping that I can come back," Brown said. "But I'm ready for any disappointment. Whatever happens, I'm set and ready to go whichever way it goes."... Brown had surgery August 3, 1992, on his neck... Brown has led the Bengals in pass receptions in four of his seven full seasons in the NFL, including a career high of 59 in 1991... He was missed last season when Cincinnati's passing attack dropped off considerably... Since the operation, Brown has worked to keep in shape by riding a bike, running and lifting weights... Brown was the Bengals' first-round draft choice in 1985 and immediately became a vital part of the team's high-powered offense... Brown led the Bengals' in receptions in 1985, 1987, 1988 and 1990... He is third on the Bengals' alltime pass receiving list with 363 following Isaac Curtis, 420 and Cris Collinsworth, 417... Brown needs 58 receptions to move to the head of the class... His career statistics are 363 receptions, 6136 yards, 16.9 average, 40 touchdowns... Brown holds the Cincinnati record for reception yards in a game with 216 on seven catches in a 42-7 victory over Pittsburgh in 1988... He is second in touchdown receptions in a season with nine in 1988 and 1990, one short of 10 by Curtis in 1974... Brown caught 50 or more passes in five of his seven NFL seasons—1985, 1986, 1988, 1989, 1991—missing the 50 mark only in the strike-shortened 1987 season and in 1990... He was selected for the Pro Bowl in 1988 after playing a major role in the Bengals drive to the American Football Conference title and a berth in Super Bowl XXIII... He was NFL Rookie of the Year in 1985 when he caught 53 passes for 942 yards, 17.8 average, and eight for touchdowns... He is a poised receiver who has good hands, has speed and quickness and is a good open field runner... He's a threat for a long-gainer or score each time he handles the football... Brown also is a good blocker... He was selected to all the All-America teams following his final season with the Miami Hurricanes in 1984... During his three seasons with the Hurricanes, Brown caught 98 passes for 1754 yards, 17.8 average, and 14 for touchdowns... He was the first Miami player to gain 1000 yards in a season and holds the team single game reception record with 10... Brown was a defensive back for Miami in his first season... He attended Navarro Junior college in Corsicana, Texas, before going to Miami... Brown played quarterback, defensive back and returned punts and kickoffs at Miami Senior High School where he was an All-Florida selection... His hobbies are fishing, basketball, drawing and golf... He annually

WHY BENGALS?

Paul Brown picked the name Bengals for Cincinnati's football team "to give it a link with past professional football in Cincinnati."

From 1937 through 1941 the Bengals were a famous unit in the Cincinnati area. In 1938 they played three teams from the National Football League. They beat the Chicago Bears, 17-14, and the Pittsburgh Steelers, 38-0, and tied the Chicago Cardinals, 7-7.

"If we can pick up a thread of tradition, we think it's good," said Brown when he named the team.

Hundreds of names were suggested by fans in an effort to name the new Cincinnati team and the most popular was Buckeyes. It was rejected for obvious reasons. "The owners rejected it because we didn't want it to be confused with the Ohio State Buckeyes and wanted something to embody four states rather than just one."

"We feel at home with the name Bengals."

Rickey Dixon was the Cincinnati Bengals' first round draft choice in 1988...The veteran free safety had 42 tackles – 37 solos and five assists – last season...Dixon now plays fulltime at free safety, the position he wants to play... "Free safety's my home," says the soft-spoken Dixon who is beginning his fifth season with the Bengals after coming to them as their No. 1 draft choice in 1988 following a splendid career at Oklahoma... "That's where I've played throughout my career. At free safety, I can use my natural instincts. I am more comfortable back there and I feel like I can help the team more at free safety. Really I'd like to never play corner again and just stay a free safety. I can play corner, but I'd like to see the day that I can stay at free safety for good."... When Dixon was drafted in 1988 he was ticketed to play corner even though he played safety for Oklahoma... "They projected me as a corner, which I can play, but I'm a better free safety," Dixon added... Dixon once compared playing corner or free safety this way: "Playing corner is like staying at my neighbor's house. Playing at free safety is like being at my home."... Dixon has good speed (about 4.4 in the 40) and covers from sideline to sideline... He breaks to the ball and has good hands and good instincts... He is proud of his reputation of being a hard-hitting tackler... "I feel that for a guy who weighs just over 180 pounds, that I deliver a pretty good hit. If I weighed a little more and was a little bit bigger, there's no doubt in my mind that I would be considered one of the hardest hitters in the league."... Dixon loves to play football and he's happy doing it... "This is my dream," he says. "I can remember playing football at a friend's house when I was a little kid," Dixon said. "We always used to play there. His name was Ronnie. His mother, Jackie, always asked the kids what we wanted to be when we grew up. Some kids would say a fireman, or a race car driver. I always said I wanted to be a football player and play in front of big crowds of people. That's what I'm doing."... Selected for the All-Madden team in 1991... A consensus All-American at Oklahoma, he shared the Jim Thorpe Award, presented annually to the best college defensive back, with Bennie Blades of the University of Miami, Fla., in 1987.... "He has been a pleasant addition for us."...This season could see Fenner in the backfield with Green some of the time...Fenner wants as much action as he can get...Last season he said: "My problem is that I'm a competitor—not a participant," says Fenner. "I want to play. But you have to accept things the way they fall sometimes. I have accepted it, but I still haven't put my goal out of reach. I'm trying to look at this positively. I am going to achieve my goal. I'm going to get 1000 yards (in a season) before I leave this league."...Jim Anderson, coach of the Bengals' running backs, respects Fenner for what he has done for the Bengals: "As far as total performance goes, we haven't had a combination like Harold Green and Derrick Fenner since James Brooks and Ickey Woods. They were different types of runners and it was a different scheme, but they gave us that same 1-2 punch."...Fenner is excellent in short yardage situations and, although not essentially a power runner, he can bull over a defender...Good open field runner..."We envisioned him as that type of player here when we went after him in Plan B a year ago," said Anderson. "We felt he would fit in well and he has. It wasn't a surprise at all."...Anderson says Fenner is effective from any area on the field..."One of his biggest assets is that it doesn't matter whether it is in a short yardage situation, on the goal line or in the middle of the field," Anderson said. "We don't miss a beat when he comes in. He picks up wherever we are."...Fenner likes Cincinnati..."This is a great situation for me," Fenner said. "I like the coaches and I like the city. But we're not winning like we should be right now. And when you're not winning, you're not happy. We've got to get back on the winning track."...Fenner played for Seattle for three seasons and his biggest was in 1990 when he rushed for 859 yards on 215 attempts, averaging 4.0 yards per carry and scored 14 touchdowns...He also caught 17 passes for 143 yards and one for a touchdown to give him 15 for the season, tops in the American

"It was hard changing positions last year (an experimental switch to inside linebacker was halted early in 1991). There were a lot of things going on in my head and it affected me a little. But that's the way the ball bounces. Now, I know my role. I'm over the tight end on every play and I can concentrate on handling him and then flying to the ball. I love this defensive scheme. I'm more comfortable and have more opportunities to make big plays at outside linebacker."...Francis likes sacks but isn't upset because his position isn't featured in the Bengals' pass rush scheme..."My role is to do a lot of things and make plays. Make an interception, cause a fumble. I'm not much of a rush guy anymore. I don't rush much. But that's OK, as long as we're getting sacks as a team."...Francis played at 250 last season, seven pounds lighter than in 1991...Had arthroscopic knee surgery during the off-season...Francis was selected for most All-America teams following his final season at Baylor when he had 129 tackles, 12 for losses, four pass interceptions, five deflected passes, three fumble recoveries and eight blocked kicks...His 42 blocked kicks is a Baylor record...Basketball was Francis' favorite sport when he was in high school...Francis' coach at Baylor, Grant Teaff, says the linebacker "has more athletic ability than any player I've ever coached and you've got to put your best athlete at linebacker."...Francis has an instinct for football that can't be coached...His brother, Ron, played cornerback for the Dallas Cowboys 1987-1990...He played high school football for LaMarque, Texas...Francis was born August 4, 1968, in Houston, Texas.

He was the sixth man on the Baylor basketball team and may be the only player to have played in a bowl game in football—1988 Bluebonnet and 1989 Liberty—and a post-season basketball tournament—1988 NIT and 1989 NCAA—two years in a row.

WHY MORE SACKS?

"It's all in the way we're lining up," says nose tackle Tim Krumrie. "Instead of lining up directly opposite the offensive lineman, we shade into a gap. We only have to worry about controlling that one gap, whereas last year (1991) we had to try to control the gap on each side of our man.

"It gives you an extra step on the pass rush, so the linemen are getting more sacks."

CINCINNATI SHUTOUTS

The Cincinnati Bengals have shut out teams seven times since the franchise began play in 1968. The most recent came over Cleveland 21-0 in 1989. Others are 31-0 vs. San Diego, 1971; 27-0 vs. Minnesota, 1973; 21-0 vs. New Orleans and 31-0 vs. Philadelphia, 1975; 21-0 vs. Tampa Bay, 1976; and 14-0 vs. Minnesota, 1980.

Freemont High School in Los Angeles, Calif...Fulcher and Eric Davis, formerly with the Cincinnati Reds and now with the Los Angeles Dodgers, were teammates in baseball and basketball...Fulcher was a catcher and was drafted by the Braves...Hobbies include basketball, softball, golf and video games...David and his wife, Faith, have adopted two children, Iris, 17 and Corey, 15...Born September 28, 1964...Hometown is Los Angeles, Calif...Lives in Cincinnati.

NICKNAME "FUL-ROCK"

How did David Fulcher get his nickname "Ful-Rock"?

"I got it when I hit a guy from Colorado State when I was playing at Arizona State," Fulcher said, "and a couple of guys said I hit him like a rock."

"They started calling me 'Rock', 'Rock' all the time and I just put 'Ful' in front of it."

FULCHER VISITS SOMALIA

Cincinnati Bengals' strong safety David Fulcher visited Somalia for a week during the off-season as a goodwill ambassador to United States troops.

"Basically, it's just hell over there," said Fulcher who was accompanied by wide receiver Stephen Baker of the New York Giants on the trip sponsored by the USO and supervised by the U.S. Army.

"We went everywhere," Fulcher said. "To the hospitals, to the feeding sites through the desert to villages, anywhere the troops were."

"We saw it all, and it changed my mind and my life," Fulcher said. "It taught me one thing, it's that the problems over here are not real problems. We complain about the smallest things, but those people don't have anything."

"Going to the feeding centers was the thing that hurt most," Fulcher added. "Just watching kids eat that food, and not just eating for two minutes but eating for hours. I saw a kid eating and eating and then just continuing to keep eating and eating."

"And then, for me to hold one of those little babies in my arms. That was pretty scary, because it was just so sad. But I did it. That little baby wasn't any bigger than my arm. But I wanted to be there."

SUPER BOWL 'FIRSTS'

January 15, 1967 – The Green Bay Packers defeated the Kansas City Chiefs 35-10 in the first Super Bowl. Played in the Los Angeles Coliseum, it was the only Super Bowl not to sell-out.

January 12, 1969 – The title Super Bowl was recognized for the first time. Previously it had been called the AFL-NFL World Championship Game.

January 12, 1969 – The New York Jets became the first AFL team to win a Super Bowl when they upset the Baltimore Colts 16-7 in Super Bowl III.

January 18, 1976 – The Dallas Cowboys became the first wild-card playoff team in the Super Bowl, losing to Pittsburgh 21-17 in Super Bowl X.

January 15, 1978 – The Super Bowl was played indoors for the first time. The Dallas Cowboys defeated the Denver Broncos 27-10 in Super Bowl XII played in the Louisiana Superdome.

January 25, 1981 – Oakland defeated Philadelphia 27-10 in Super Bowl XV to become the first wild-card playoff team to win a Super Bowl.

“It's something I've done since college,” Green added. “Sometimes it works and sometimes it doesn't.”

Players weren't the only ones setting NFL records in 1992. NFL fans attended games in record numbers for the fourth consecutive season. The total paid attendance of 17,784,354 in 1992 was the highest in the NFL's 73-year history, surpassing the 1991 record of 17,752,139.

“We are pleased by the outstanding support that our teams received last season,” said Commissioner Paul Tagliabue. “The NFL continues to grow in popularity both here and overseas and we thank our fans for their support.”

Attendance for the regular season averaged 61,736 for 224 games, the third highest per game average ever. The AFC Champion Buffalo Bills paced the NFL in home paid attendance for the fifth straight season with a total of 630,978 for eight games.

Cincinnati Bengals' punter and kickoff artist Lee Johnson is entering his ninth season in the National Football League... He is in his fifth season with the Bengals...Johnson, who was an unrestricted free agent, signed a new contract with the Bengals this year...Last season, Johnson punted 76 times for 3196 yards, an average of 42.1...He punted 15 times inside the 20-yard line and his longest was 64 yards...Johnson's career statistics are 517 punts for 3196 yards, for a 42.1 yards average, 122 inside the 20-yard line and his longest a 70-yarder...Johnson is a left-footed kicker and punter...He is effective in kicking the football into and out of the end zone on kickoffs...He is sometimes called on to attempt long field goals and has a 53-yarder to his credit... Cincinnati special teams coach Marv Braden says Johnson "has the strongest leg I've seen. Lee's long and lean. He's got a great lever. It's not that he is so strong, just a real fine leg swing coming through the ball. If you had a high-speed sequence of photographs, I think people would be amazed how much he must compress the ball when he kicks off. He has top hang time on kickoffs. His kickoffs are usually seven or eight yards deep in the end zone and in the air 4.28 to 4.35 seconds. The enemy doesn't get a good chance for a return when Lee is kicking off"...Johnson gets an unorthodox rotation on the football when kicking and punting...His longest punts are a pair of 70-yarders, one against Cleveland and another vs. New England...He's capable of being a very good punter," Braden says, "but, he has a tendency to overwork. I don't want to see him overwork. I want him to stay fresh. But, the thing I like is he's unselfish. We got in plus territory (across midfield) and he's taking the ball high instead of punting it through the end zone."...The latter boosts the average and the former helps field position...Johnson was a barefoot kicker until he came to Cincinnati... "As soon as I got here I kept the shoe on," he said...The shoe gives me a little more control, even though I don't get some of the 65-yarders I got without it. But the shoe thing has a mental aspect, too, because now I'm like everybody else. I don't worry about being different or about slipping in bad weather on a bare foot."...Johnson loves his job and is fascinated at the way things have developed for him...He says he's the luckiest player in the NFL... "I've gone from Houston to Cleveland (1987) and I'm in the AFC Championship Game and from Cleveland to Cincinnati and I'm in the Super Bowl and a couple of years later in the playoffs," Johnson said. "For a player who is getting waived left and right each year to get on a Super Bowl or Super Bowl caliber team is very unique, very unusual, especially to come in and have such a semi-role and move up to a larger role."...Johnson set an NCAA record while at Brigham Young when he averaged

AN ANDERSON FAN

David Klingler has been a fan of new quarterbacks coach Ken Anderson for a long time.

"I wasn't a big pro football fan as a kid, but Kenny Anderson was the exception," Klingler said. "When Kenny Anderson was on TV, I wanted to watch the game. I only had two autographs as a kid, Kenny Anderson's and Nolan Ryan's."

Klingler says he enjoys working with Anderson.

"I'm excited, naturally," Klingler said. "It's funny how we've connected up after my following his career as much as I did."

"I like the idea that he's been there (in the games)," Klingler added. "There's not going to be a situation I face that he hasn't seen. And he's a very cool, level-headed individual, and I feel I work best with that kind of personality."

What were the reasons Klingler became a fan of Ken Anderson?

- Klingler lived until age 6 in Ada, Ohio, about 150 miles from Cincinnati, so there was some Bengals in his early sports background.
- Klingler then moved to Houston, which played the Bengals twice every season.
"It seemed like I saw the Bengals a lot," Klingler recalls. "I can't remember any one game that made me a Ken Anderson fan, but I have a real clear picture in my mind of that double-bar face mask he wore, and the word "BENGALS" written across his helmet (in pre-1981 style)."
- Klingler's grandmother, who works in a Wilson Sporting Goods factory in Ada, Ohio, obtained Anderson's autograph for Klingler on a piece of official pigskin.

"I still have it," the young quarterback said.

Veteran cornerback Rod Jones is entering his eighth season in the National Football League and his fourth with Cincinnati...Jones started 14 games and played in 16 for the Bengals last season when he had 63 tackles, fourth highest on the team, and two pass interceptions... Jones came back to a starting position in 1992 after missing all but the first four games in 1991 because of a broken arm...Jones came to Cincinnati from Tampa Bay in a trade for defensive end Jim Skow in 1990...He had a good season in 1990 with 46 tackles..."I think Jones is playing more consistent," defensive backfield coach Ron Meeks said last season. "I think he's getting to a point where he understands exactly what we expect out of him. And we're not going to settle for anything less. Rod Jones is playing better. I think for the most part he's a smart player. He always makes smart plays. His problem is being in the position to make a play and can't come up with the play. And we're just trying to give him a better chance by having him work on the technique part of it and learn how to finish the play. That's the part you have to work on, the finishing part of it."...Jones is a hard worker, constantly trying to improve...He recalled a play in a game earlier last year when he had good coverage on a wide receiver, but the receiver makes the catch anyway..."I went to all the next week's practices working on making the play," Jones said. "On the first day, I was right with the receiver, and the receiver was still making the play. But deep inside, I knew what was wrong. It wasn't that I was looking at the ball wrong or anything like that. I was just going after the ball too late. The receiver put his arm up and I was trying to put my arms up at the same time that he puts his arm up, and it was too late. Once I got that worked out, it worked out great."...Jones has extreme speed and narrowly missed making the U.S. Olympic team as a quarter-miler while at SMU..."I missed by 200th of a second," Jones recalls. "If you make the eight-man finals, you make the Olympic team because they took placers four through eight to run in the prelims. I was in the semi-finals and I thought I had fourth, but then I looked over and saw one guy on the outside lane I hadn't seen."...At SMU, Jones also ran the 100 meters, 400 relay and 600 relay...Tampa Bay liked Jones' speed and football ability and took him in the first round of the 1986 draft...The Bucs had two first round choices and took running back Bo Jackson with the first selection and Jones with the second...He was a top tackler for Tampa Bay, recording 80 in 1986, 47 in 1987, 20 in 1988 and 92 in 1989...He had four pass interceptions in his three seasons with the Bucs...Jones holds a degree in psychology...He takes instruction in Tae Kwon Do and enjoys doing caricatures in his free time...Wife's name is Simone...Born March 31, 1964, in Dallas, Tex.

David Klingler, the Cincinnati Bengals' first-round draft choice in 1992, has taken over as the team's No. 1 quarterback...The talented Klingler stepped into the starting job in the 12th game of the 1992 season against Pittsburgh in Riverfront Stadium...He then started against Cleveland, San Diego and New England...Klingler missed the final game against Indianapolis because of a sore shoulder...His statistics for his rookie season were 948 attempts, 47 completions, (48%), 530 yards, three touchdowns and two interceptions...He rushed 11 times for 53 yards for a 4.8 yards average...Klingler's biggest pass in his rookie year was an 83-yard bomb to wide receiver Jeff Query on the Bengals' first offensive play of the game against San Diego...General manager Mike Brown is anxious to see Klingler in the No. 1 quarterback spot... "We're happy we signed David Klingler," Brown said. "It was a move in the best interest of our team for the long haul. He has great potential. When you get a chance to draft a quarterback of his talent, you better snap him up because you might not get that chance for the next decade."...Coach Dave Shula says: "We head into the season with a new starter. David Klingler showed flashes of what we think is in his bright future in the three-and-one-half games he played in last season. (Klingler started four games, but was sidelined in the fourth with a shoulder injury.) "He's been tremendously productive," added Shula, citing the records Klingler set in his college career at Houston... Klingler feels comfortable at the controls of the Bengals' offense... "The makeup of the team has changed so much that I feel a lot more comfortable," Klingler said. "All the guys, or a lot of the guys, came in when I was here or a couple of years before me." Klingler says he will command leadership on the field, but will not be vocal...He likes the young wide receivers he is throwing to...This is the fastest wide receiver corps I think this team possibly has ever had," Klingler said. "You have Milt Stegall, who runs 4.5 (40-yard dash). You have a Jeff Query who does a low

David Klingler has changed back to the jersey number (7) he wore as far back as the first grade.

"I had always worn No. 7," Klingler said. "I was issued it the first day of first grade football."

"Last year, I wore No. 15, which is my brother Jimmy's number at Houston," Klingler added.

"I feel a lot more comfortable in 7," he said. "I didn't feel comfortable in 15, however goofy that sounds."

"When Boomer left, I asked him if he'd mind if I got No. 7, and he said no, not at all. He had no problems with it at all."

4.4s. You have Reggie Rembert who's low 4.4s. We've got Tony McGee (rookie tight end). I think it's not out of the question that by the end of the year the wide receivers are going to be the strength of this team." ...Klingler is anxious to start playing... "I got into training camp late (last year), and my mechanics were bad to begin with," Klingler said. "When I got in, I tried to do what the coaches told me, but I had no understanding of the offense. And that offense was suited to Boomer's strengths, not mine, and that's understandable. You can't change a system in midstream—but we're going to get a lot done that we couldn't get done last year." ...Klingler likes the looks of the Bengals' offense... "It's not the run and shoot, but it suits what I did in college a lot better," Klingler said. "There's not as much play-action fake, and we're not asking the offensive line to hold guys out for seven or eight seconds. The timing is the key. I get back quickly, make a correct decision based on my read, and get rid of the ball. I want to have the ball in the air at the end of my drop." ... "We'll definitely be better than last year," said the second-year quarterback. "I think there's tons of potential for improvement on offense and defense with the personnel we've got coming back. We didn't need to go out and sign 50 free agents, there's a lot of work to be done within these walls." ...Klingler has worked steadily at Spinney Field during the off-season... One of his goals is to be stronger and more durable in 1993... "I'm about five pounds heavier," he said... But, he thinks the new offense will cut down sacks and keep him healthier... "Getting rid of the ball, not taking so many hits, is going to be a key," Klingler added... Klingler first started playing football in his junior year at Stratford High School in Houston, Texas... Being a relatively unheard of quarterback, he directed Stratford to records of 6-4 and 3-7, numbers that seldom trigger an all-out recruiting war... But what the records didn't show was his remarkable athletic ability... Besides football, he played basketball, baseball and ran track, earning 10 varsity letters... "There are really great things you can learn from athletics and from being in competitions," Klingler said. "Anything you learn from athletics you use the rest of your life. Athletics can be a big part of your education." ...The rifle-armed Klingler set 51 NCAA Divisions I records while playing for the Houston Cougars... He passed for over 400 yards in 13 of his 21 starts for Houston... Klingler holds the Houston and Southwest Conference alltime record with 9430 yards passing... His 9327 yards in total offense and 91 touchdown passes are records... He was an All-America selection in 1990 and 1991... Finalist for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, Davey O'Brien Award and Football News Offensive Player of the Year Award... Recipient of the Ken Spain Scholarship as Houston's outstanding scholar-athlete...

"I've seen him drive a golf ball further than I've seen any human being do it," Flora added. "In tournament he drove one 350 to 360 yards."

"He could dunk basketball when was in the eighth grade," Flora said.

Klingler had scholarship offers from Kansas, Stanford, and Pittsburgh in addition to Houston.

All were interested and impressed with his passing ability.

Klingler threw the football 68 yards from the end zone with his legs crossed during a high school spring game when he was a sophomore.

He can throw 80 to 90 yards.

"The greatest thing about David Klingler is that he never cheated the talent he knows was given him," said his high school coach Oscar Cripps.

"He knew what he had and continually worked to develop it."

Smart and intelligent Bruce Kozerski, a well-respected offensive lineman is in his 10th season in the National Football League...Kozerski can play center, guard or tackle...Last year he performed at guard and was the Bengals' top offensive lineman...Kozerski is one of the key players on the Cincinnati roster..."He knows everything that's going on out there," says offensive line coach Jim McNally. "He can do it all. He can play center, guard or tackle."...He has started at all five offensive line positions in his nine NFL seasons...He started primarily at right guard but opened four games at center in 1986...In 1987, Kozerski played at guard and tackle and then settled in at center although he flopped over to guard and tackle because of injuries on the offensive line...Last season he was back at guard...A physics major and an honor student at Holy Cross with a 3.7 grade average, Kozerski calls the blocking schemes for the Bengals at the line of scrimmage...After a play is called, he checks the defensive alignment and matches a blocking system he thinks will be productive against it..."Basically, it's what "front" the defense is in," said Kozerski who was drafted in the ninth round by Cincinnati in 1984, "A good quarterback can look at a defense and see a weakness, maybe a 'cover two', and know how to exploit it. A good offensive lineman can look at a front and recognize a weakness. "When I went to college (Wisconsin), I was moved to nose guard because one of the nose guards got hurt," Krumrie recalled. "The first thing I called home and talked to Cheryl (then his girlfriend, now his wife) and she said, 'Well you're not going to make any tackles at nose guard.'"

"So, that was the answer she had for me. I said, 'Oh, yeah, I can make quite a few tackles there.'"

Draft Analyst Joel Buchsbaum, of Pro Football Weekly, on the Bengals drafting defensive lineman John Copeland in the first round.

"If Bob Karmelowicz (Bengals' defensive line coach), who I really regard highly as a defensive line coach, feels Copeland fits their system, then Copeland is probably the best pick. OFFICIALS' CLINIC

More than 100 National Football League game officials, supervised by director of officiating Jerry Seeman, went to "football school" with a clinic during the off-season. For the first time, NFL officials from around the country were brought to one central location, rather than participating in regionalized sessions.

The Dallas-Ft. Worth Airport Marriott was the base for classroom and film work, while the Dallas Cowboys' training complex in Irving was a center for on-field sessions.

Paul Brown, who had left the Cleveland Browns following the 1962 season with an NFL record of 115-49-6, seven conference titles, and three NFL championships, had the urge to get back into football. His son Mike did a study on pro football expansion and recommended Cincinnati as a potential site. In 1965, Brown met with Governor James Rhodes and the two agreed the state could accommodate a second pro football team.

1966 Fearful the Reds baseball team would leave town and feeling pressure from local businessmen pushing for a pro football franchise, Cincinnati's city council approved the construction of Riverfront Stadium.

1967 Brown's group was awarded an AFL expansion franchise. Brown called the team the Bengals, the name of the previous Cincinnati AFL franchises in 1937, 1940, and 1941. The Bengals acquired quarterback John Stofa by trading two draft choices to Miami.

1968 The Bengals were awarded 40 veteran players in the allocation draft. In the college draft they selected Tennessee center Bob Johnson as their first pick. Other draftees included running backs Jess Phillips and Essex Johnson, tight end Bob Trumpy, linebacker Al Beauchamp, and tackle Howard Fest. The Bengals lost their first preseason game 38-14 to Kansas City before 21,682 fans at Nippert Stadium. The Bengals played respectably during the regular season, upsetting Denver 24-10 and Buffalo 34-23 in their first two home games. Paul Robinson led the AFL in rushing with 1,023 yards and was named rookie of the year.

1969 Brown drafted quarterback Greg Cook of the University of Cincinnati in the first round. The same draft also produced linebacker Bill Bergey. The Bengals jumped to a 3-0 record, but the club finished 4-9-1. Brown was named AFL coach of the year. Bergey was honored as AFL defensive rookie of the year, and Cook won the AFL passing title.

1970 After his arm went bad in training, Cook was placed on the injured reserve list. Virgil Carter, a castoff from two other NFL teams, was signed to play quarterback. The Bengals lost six of the first seven games, then rallied to win the last seven for an 8-6 record. They became the first third-year expansion team to win a division title, the AFC Central. They lost to Baltimore 17-0 in the playoffs.

1971 The Bengals picked up quarterback Ken Anderson and tackle Vernon Holland in the draft, then went 5-0-1 in preseason play. After a 37-14 victory over Philadelphia, the Bengals lost seven in a row on the way to a 4-10 record.

1972 Looking for defensive help, Brown drafted end Sherman White, safety Tommy Casanova, linebacker Jim LeClair, and cornerback Bernard Jackson. Anderson unseated Carter as starting quarterback, and the Bengals won three of their last four to post an 8-6 record. Chip Myers set a club record with 57 pass receptions.

1973 Brown drafted wide receiver Isaac Curtis and runners Boobie Clark and Lenvil Elliott. The Bengals split their first eight games, then swept their last six and won their second AFC Central Division championship. Cincinnati lost to Miami 34-16 in

the AFC playoffs. Clark, who finished the year with 988 yards rushing and 45 pass receptions, was named AFC rookie of the year. Essex Johnson led Cincinnati with a career-high 997 yards rushing and Curtis caught 45 passes.

1974 Cincinnati traded Bergey to Philadelphia for two first-round draft choices and third-round pick in 1977. LeClair replaced Bergey at middle linebacker. The Bengals won four of their first five games but couldn't keep pace with Super Bowl-bound Pittsburgh. Anderson won the NFL passing championship and completed a club-record 64.9 percent of his attempts. Cornerback Lemar Parrish led the NFL in punt returns.

1975 The Bengals opened with six straight wins. LeClair preserved a 21-19 victory over Houston, making all four tackles in a goal-line stand. The Bengals on their eighth game in nine starts against Buffalo as Anderson completed 30 of 46 passes for 447 yards, the tenth-highest one-game total in NFL history. Cincinnati scored 27 points in the first quarter to crush San Diego 47-14 and finish 11-3, its best regular-season record. The Bengals qualified as the AFC wild card team for the playoffs, but their losing postseason record continued with a 31-28 setback to Oakland. Anderson won his second NFL passing championship. A serious blow was the loss of defensive tackle Mike Reid, who retired at 26 to pursue a career in music.

1976 Brown announced his retirement after 41 seasons of coaching and named Bill Johnson, his long-time assistant, as the successor. Brown continued to serve as the club's general manager and vice president. The Bengals acquired defensive end Coy Bacon in a trade with San Diego and drafted halfback Archie Griffin, the two-time Heisman Trophy winner from Ohio State. The Bengals set a fast pace in the AFC Central Division, winning 9 of their first 11 games. The season came down to games against Pittsburgh and Oakland and the Bengals lost both. Those defeats not only cost Cincinnati the division title but the AFC wild card spot as well. Cornerback Ken Riley led the AFC with nine interceptions.

1977 A loss to Houston in the final game cost the Bengals a spot in the playoffs. The team finished with an 8-6 record. Curtis missed the final six games with a knee injury. Trumpy retired.

1978 The Bengals played the first four games without Anderson. Johnson was replaced as head coach after 0-5 start. Homer Rice took over, but the losing streak continued; the Bengals won only once in the first three months of the season. Wins over Atlanta, Los Angeles, and Cleveland at season's end improved the record to 4-12.

1979 After six straight losses to open the season, the Bengals stunned Pittsburgh 34-10, recovering seven Steelers fumbles. Ray Griffin ran back an intercepted pass a club-record 96 yards in a 26-24 loss to San Diego. Pete Johnson powered his way to 15 touchdowns, but the Bengals struggled to their second successive 4-12 record. Former Cleveland coach Forrest Gregg was named to replace Rice as head coach.

1980 Scoring touchdowns was the major problem for the Bengals, who went 6-10 in 1980. They managed only 244 points, lowest in the AFC. Anderson has a sub-par year with only six touchdown passes. The Bengals won only one of their first five

games but upset defending Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh twice. First-round draft choice Anthony Munoz impressed at offensive tackle.

1981 The Bengals unveiled new uniforms with tiger-striped helmets, jerseys, and pants. They had at least a share of the AFC Central lead the entire season, and on December 6 Anderson threw two touchdowns as the Bengals clinched the division with a 17-10 victory over the Steelers. Cornerback Louis Breeden tied an NFL record when he returned a pass interception 102-yards for a touchdown in Cincinnati's 40-17 victory over the Chargers in San Diego. Anderson led the NFL in passing with a 98.5 rating. On January 3, the Bengals defeated the Buffalo Bills 28-21 in an AFC divisional playoff game. A week later, playing in their first AFC Championship Game ever, the Bengals defeated the San Diego Chargers 27-7 in a temperature of nine degrees below zero with a wind-chill factor of minus 59. In Super Bowl XVI on January 24, the Bengals trailed 20-0 at halftime and couldn't make up the deficit, losing to San Francisco 26-21.

1982 The Bengals followed up their Super Bowl season with another strong showing. They finished the strike-shortened season behind only the Raiders with a 7-2 mark. The Jets caught them sleeping in the first round of the playoffs, though, beating them 44-17. Anderson led the AFC in passing for the fourth time as the Bengals boasted the second-best offense in the NFL. Their defense ranked third in the NFL against the run.

1983 The Bengals' season looked promising at the start of 1983, but a horrendous opening brought about a premature ending. Cincinnati started the season by losing six of its first seven games. The Bengals never recovered and finished 7-9. Despite the losing record, the Bengals claimed the top overall defense in the NFL. In the off-season, Gregg resigned as head coach and Sam Wyche was named as his replacement.

1984 Pete Johnson was traded to San Diego for running back James Brooks. The Bengals lost their first five games and then bounced back to win eight of the last 11 and force the AFC Central Division championship race into the final week of the season only to fall a game short of Pittsburgh. Cincinnati finished 8-8.

1985 Wide receiver Eddie Brown from Miami (Fla.) was the Bengals' top draft choice. Wide receiver Isaac Curtis, a premier Bengal for 12 years, retired shortly before training camp opened. Cincinnati got off to another slow start, losing its first four games. The Bengals finished 7-9 and were in the thick of the AFC Central which was won by Cleveland with an 8-8 record. Second-year quarterback Boomer Esiason replaced Ken Anderson. Offensive tackle Anthony Munoz was named to the AFC Pro Bowl team the fifth consecutive time. The Bengals set a club scoring record with 441 points.

1986 Cincinnati's No. 1 selection in the NFL college draft was linebacker Joe Kelly who played at Washington. Wide receiver Tim McGee of Tennessee was drafted later in the first round. Punter Pat McNally retired. The Bengals unleashed a high-powered offense in their battle for the AFC Central Division title and finished 10-6 and narrowly missed a playoff berth. Offensive tackle Anthony Munoz was selected to the AFC Pro Bowl team for the

sixth year in a row. He was joined by guard Max Montoya, running back James Brooks and quarterback Boomer Esiason. Linebacker Reggie Williams was selected "One of the Top 10 Young Men In America" by the United States Jaycees and was honored in Tulsa Oklahoma, January 16 and 17. Later, Williams was selected NFL Man of the Year for his efforts to charity and the community and was honored at the Pro Bowl in Honolulu, Hawaii. Munoz was named Seagrams' top offensive lineman of 1986.

1987 Jason Buck, a defensive end and Outland Trophy winner from Brigham Young, was the Cincinnati Bengals' No. 1 draft choice. Kicker Jim Breech led the AFC in scoring with 97 points. Offensive tackle Anthony Munoz was voted to the AFC Pro Bowl team for the seventh consecutive year. Munoz did not play in the Pro Bowl game because of a shoulder operation. Nose tackle Tim Krumrie played in his first Pro Bowl game.

1988 The Cincinnati Bengals brought about the biggest turn-around in NFL history by rising from a 4-11 team in 1987 to a 12-4 regular season mark in 1988, the AFC Central Division title, the AFC championship and a berth in Super Bowl XXIII against the San Francisco 49ers. The Bengals fell in the Super Bowl, 20-16, when the 49ers scored a touchdown with 34 seconds remaining. Coach Sam Wyche and his Bengals recorded a 14-5 record in regular and post season play, the best in the NFL. Wyche received numerous honors for his brilliant coaching and nine Bengals was selected for the Pro Bowl - quarterback Boomer Esiason, nose tackle Tim Krumrie, tackle Anthony Munoz, guard Max Montoya, tight end Rodney Holman, wide receiver Eddie Brown, running back James Brooks, safety David Fulcher and corner-back Eric Thomas. Esiason was voted the NFL's most valuable player and Munoz the top offensive lineman. Linebacker Reggie Williams received the "Sportsman of the Year Award" from Sports Illustrated. The Award was presented to Williams by President Reagan in an Oval Office ceremony prior to the 1988 season. Defensive back Ricky Dixon, an All-American from Oklahoma, was the Bengal's first selection in the 1988 draft. "Ickey" Woods, the top rusher in college football in 1987 while at Nevada-Las Vegas, was Cincinnati's second choice. Woods led the Bengals in rushing in 1988 with 1066 yards.

1989 The Bengals defeated the Buffalo Bills, 21-10, to win the AFC championship, on January 8 at Riverfront Stadium. Cincinnati lost to San Francisco, 20-16, in Super Bowl XXIII on January 22 in Miami, Fla. The Cincinnati Bengals, the defending AFC champions, traded their first round draft choice to Atlanta for three later selections. Eric Ball, a running back from UCLA, was Cincinnati's first selection, coming in the second round. Guard Freddie Childress of Arkansas was the Bengals' second choice in the second round. The Bengals, hit hard by injuries throughout the season, went 8-8 and narrowly missed gaining a spot in the playoffs. Six Bengals were selected for the Pro Bowl - tackle Anthony Munoz, quarterback Boomer Esiason, strong safety David Fulcher, running back James Brooks, tight end Rodney Holman and guard Max Montoya.

1990 The Bengals obtained running back Paul Palmer and wide receiver Mike Barber and lost Montoya, wide receiver Ira

Hillary and tackle Rob Woods in Plan B. Cincinnati drafted Baylor linebacker James Francis in the first round of the 1990 draft. Running back Harold Green of South Carolina is the Bengals second round choice. Cincinnati posted a 9-7 regular season record to win the AFC Central Division Championship and move into the playoffs where the Bengals belted the Houston Oilers, 41-14, before losing to the Los Angeles Raiders, 20-10, in the second round. Three Bengals were selected for the Pro Bowl game – tackle Anthony Munoz, tight end Rodney Holman and strong safety David Fulcher.

1991 The Cincinnati Bengals acquired linebacker Alex Gordon and running back Derrick Fenner and lost safety Solomon Wilcotts, nose tackle Mike Hammerstein and quarterback Todd Philcox in Plan B. Cincinnati drafted outside linebacker Alfred Williams, an All-American from Colorado, in the first-round of the 1991 draft. Paul Brown, founder of the Cincinnati Bengals and a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, died August 5. He was a great coach and executive. The Bengals had a 3-13 season record. Dave Shula replaced Sam Wyche as head coach following the season.

1992 The Bengals made quarterback David Klingler, who played in college for the University of Houston, their No.1 draft choice. Klingler started four of the final five games of the season in which the Bengals finished 5-11. Harold Green rushed for 1170 yards and was selected to play in the Pro Bowl. All Pro Anthony Munoz played his final game for the Bengals. Michael Pope was named offensive coordinator and Ken Anderson was signed as coach of the quarterbacks.

1993 Defensive lineman John Copeland, an All-American from Alabama, was the Bengals' first-round draft choice. The Bengals acquired cornerbacks Sheldon White and Mike Brim and quarterback Jay Schroeder, who were unrestricted free agents, and lost cornerback Eric Thomas, wide receiver Tim McGee and safety Barney Bussey and tight end Jim Riggs. Quarterback Boomer Esiason was traded to the New York Jets for a third-round draft choice.

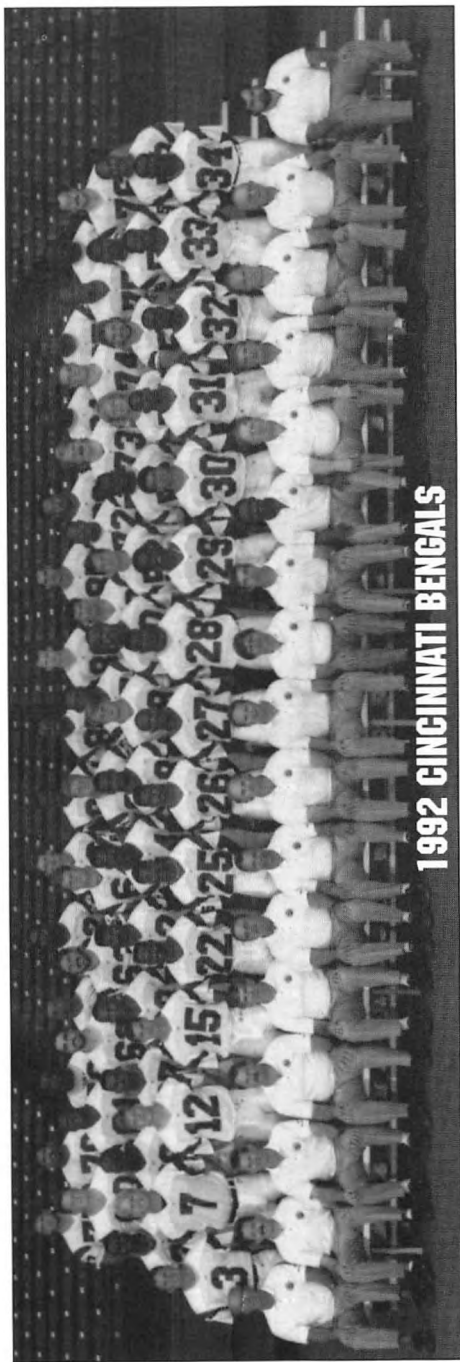

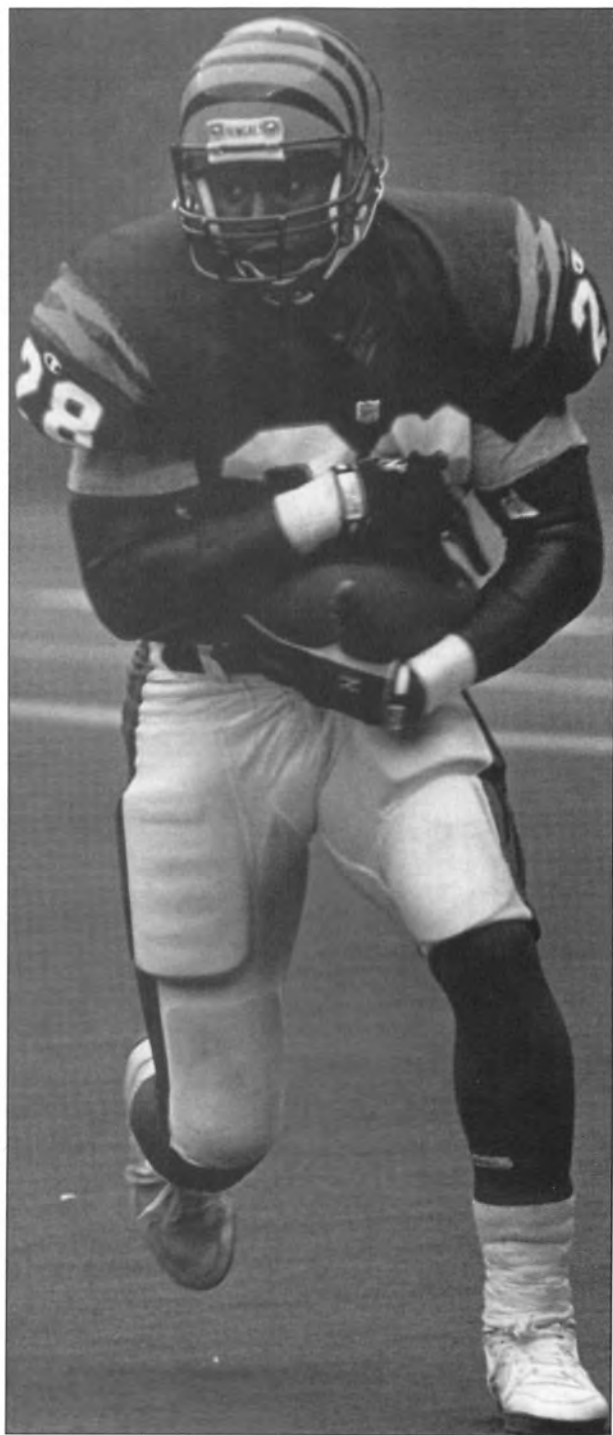

FIRST "TRIPLE CROWN" WINNER – 1943 - Sammy Baugh, Washington Redskins, led the NFL in passing, punting and interceptions.

FIRST USE OF PENALTY FLAG BY NFL OFFICIALS – 1948.

FIRST INTERNATIONAL GAME BY NFL TEAM – August 12, 1950-The New York Giants defeated the CFL's Ottawa Roughriders 20-6 in a game played in Ottawa.

FIRST TO RUSH 1,000 YARDS TWO STRAIGHT SEASONS – 1953-1954-Joe Perry, San Francisco 49ers.

FIRST OVERTIME GAME – August 28, 1955-The Los Angeles Rams defeated the New York Giants 23-17 after three minutes of overtime in a pre-season game.

TIE-BREAKING PROCEDURES

The NFL uses the following procedures to break standing ties for postseason playoffs (and determine regular-season schedules).

TO BREAK A TIE WITHIN A DIVISION

If, at the end of the regular season, two or more clubs in the same division finish with identical won-lost-tied percentages, the following steps will be taken until a champion is determined.

1. Head-to-head (best won-lost-tied percentages in games between the clubs).
2. Best won-lost-tied percentage in games played within the division.
3. Best won-lost-tied percentage in games played within the conference.
4. Best won-lost-tied percentage in common games (if applicable).
5. Best net points in division games.
6. Best net points in all games.
7. Strength of schedule.
8. Best net touchdowns in all games.
9. Coin toss.

TO BREAK A TIE FOR THE WILD CARD TEAM

If it is necessary to break ties to determine the two wild-card clubs from each conference, the following steps will be taken.

1. If the tied clubs are from the same division, apply division tie-breaker.
2. If the tied clubs are from different divisions, apply the following steps:

TWO CLUBS

1. Head-to-head, if applicable.
2. Best won-lost-tied percentage in games played within the conference.
3. Best won-lost-tied percentage in common games, minimum of four.
4. Best average net points in conference games.
5. Best net points in all games.
6. Strength of schedule.
7. Best net touchdowns in all games.
8. Coin toss.

THREE OR MORE CLUBS

(Note: If two clubs remain tied after other clubs have been eliminated, tie-breaker reverts to step 1 of applicable two-club format.)

1. Head-to-head sweep. (Applicable only if one club has defeated each of the others, or if one club has lost to each of the others.)
2. Best won-lost-tied percentage in games played within the conference.
3. Best won-lost-tied percentage in common games, minimum of four.
4. Best average net points in conference games.
5. Best net points in all games.
6. Strength of schedule.
7. Best net touchdowns in all games.
8. Coin toss.

NFL PASSER RATING SYSTEM

The NFL rates its forward passers for statistical purposes against a pre-fixed performance standard based on statistical achievements of all qualified pro passers since 1960. The system now being used replaced one that rated passers in relation to their position in a total group based on various criteria. The current system, adapted in 1973, removes inequities that existed in the former method and, at the same time, provides a means of comparing passing performances from one season to the next.

It is important to remember that the system is used to rate passers, not quarterbacks. Statistics do not reflect leadership, play-calling and other intangible factors that go into making a successful professional quarterback. Four categories are used as a basis for compiling a rating.

- Percentage of touchdown passes per attempt
- Percentage of completions per attempt
- Percentage of interceptions per attempt
- Average yards gained per attempt

The base, or average standard, is 1000. The bottom is .0000. To earn a 2.000 rating, a passer must perform at exceptional levels, i.e., 70 percent in completions, 10 percent in touch per pass attempt. The maximum a passer can receive in any category is 2.375.

For example, to gain a 2.375 in completion percentage, a passer would have to complete 77.5 percent of his passes. The NFL record is 70.55 by Ken Anderson (Cincinnati, 1982). To gain a 2.375 in percentage of interceptions, a passer would have to go the entire season without an interception. The 2.375 figure in average yards is 12.50, compared with the NFL record of 11.17 by Tommy O'Connell (Cleveland, 1957). To earn a 2.375 in percentage of touchdowns, a passer would have to achieve an 11.9. The record is 13.9 by Sid Luckman (Chicago, 1943).

In order to make the rating more understandable, the point rating is then converted into a scale of 100. For instance, if a passer completes 11 of 23 passes for 114 yards, with one touchdown and no interceptions, the four components would be:

- Percentage of Completions—11 of 23 is 47.8 percent. The point rating is .0890.
- Percentage of Touchdown Passes—1 touchdown in 23 attempts works out to 4.3 percent for a rating of 0.860.
- Percentage of Interceptions—You can't do better than zero, so the passer receives a maximum rating of 2.375.
- Average Yards Gained Per Attempt—23 attempts divided into 114 yards equals 4.96 yards per attempt for a corresponding rating of 0.490.

The sum of the four components is 4.615, which converts to a rating of 76.9. In order for a passer to achieve 100, his points would have to total 6.000. In rare cases, where statistical performance has been superior, it is possible for a passer to go over 100. However, such an instance is rare. The leading passers each year were checked from 1932 when the NFL began keeping official statistics, and only nine passers in history have scored over 100 in the year they led the league in passing. The most recent passer to lead the league and score over 100 was Miami quarterback Dan Marino, who achieved a 108.9 rating in 1984. The highest-rated passer in a single season was Milt Plum, who had a 110.4 rating with Cleveland in 1960.

TERMINOLOGY

AUDIBLE – Quarterback changes the play at the time of scrimmage. Also called an automatic.

BLIND SIDE – A player is “blind sided” when he is hit by a tackler he did not see. This usually happens to the quarterback.

BLITZ – An all-out rush by defensive front four with the aid of a linebacker or linebackers and/or safety. Also called Red Dog.

BOOTLEG – Quarterback tries to fake the opponent by hiding the ball on his hip before passing or running.

CLIP – An illegal block from behind.

DOUBLE WING – An offensive set where one running back lines up outside the tackle on the weak side (away from the tight end). This is used to get another receiver in a pass pattern quickly.

DRAW – The quarterback drops back to pass and then hands off to a running back.

FAIR CATCH – A player who is going to receive a punt raises one arm above his head to signal he will not run with the ball after catching it. He may not be hit when catching it. However, if he should fumble or not catch the kick, then the fair catch is off.

FIRST-YEAR PLAYER – A first-year player, unlike a rookie, has been in an NFL training camp but has not played in a regular season game. A first-year player may not be Rookie of the Year.

FLAT – The space from the ball to the sidelines. Short passes are often thrown in this area.

FLOOD – Sending two or more pass receivers to same part of field.

FOUR-THREE – Defensive alignment with four defensive linemen and three linebackers.

FREE AGENT – A player who is free of any contractual obligations.

FUMBLE – A play where the ball carrier loses control of the ball.

HASHMARKS – The broken lines that run the same way as the sidelines. They are 23 yards, 1 foot, 9 inches from each sideline.

I FORMATION – A formation or set where the two running backs line up directly behind the quarterback.

KEY – A player that a defender will watch to help him decide the flow of the play. Also called reading.

LINE OF SCRIMMAGE – An imaginary line that runs through the middle of the ball and to each sideline. Only the center may be within a yard of the ball when it is hiked.

LOOK-IN – A quick pass over the middle.

MAN-TO-MAN – A defensive pass coverage in which each defender is assigned to cover one offensive player.

MAN-TO-MOTION – Before the ball is hiked a back or receiver runs parallel with the line of scrimmage to change the offensive set. Only one man may move and he may not run toward the line of scrimmage before the ball is snapped.

NICKEL – Term referring to fifth defensive back or defense using five defensive backs.

ON-SIDE KICK – A short kickoff tried in hopes the kicking team will recover the ball. If the kickoff travels 10 or more yards either team may recover the ball.

TERMINOLOGY

OPTION PASS – A special play in which the running back has the option to either run or throw a forward pass.

PLAY-ACTION PASS – A pass play in which the quarterback will fake a handoff and then drop back to pass.

POCKET – The protected area, seven to 10 yards behind the center, into which the quarterback drops back to pass.

POST PATTERN – A path in which the receiver runs down the field and then turns and runs toward the goal post.

PURSUIT – When a player from the other team is chasing the player with the ball.

SACK – The quarterback is tackled for a loss while attempting to pass.

SAFETY – The team without the ball gets two points when it tackles a player from the other team in the other team's end zone.

SCREEN PASS – A delayed pass to a running back after the offensive linemen let the defenders rush in.

SHIFT – Before the ball is snapped, the team changes alignment.

STRONG SIDE – The side on which the tight end lines up. The weak side is just opposite the tight end.

THREE-FOUR – Defensive alignment with three defensive linemen and four linebackers.

ZONE DEFENSE – A defense in which players cover an area instead of a designated man.

ARTIST JOHN A. RUTHVEN



Wildlife his love...art his life's vocation. Together they have brought the world some of the most beautiful and truthful works of wildlife art known today. John's masterful blending of style and knowledge infuses the canvas with life-like quality. His fascination with nature began as a boy in Cincinnati. It continued through high school and four years in the Navy aboard a sub chaser. This Navy stint took him around the world sketching birds and animals as he went. Back in Cincinnati, John entered the Cincinnati Art Academy and later opened his own commercial art studio.

In 1960, he entered and won the Federal Duck Stamp competition, an honor afforded to only a few wildlife artists, with his original painting of Redhead Ducks. Three editions of prints were reproduced and are sought after by stamp and print collectors the world over.

His first one-man show was held in 1966 at Abercrombie and Fitch in Chicago and its total success established John as a wildlife artist. Within a few years he found that he could not produce enough paintings to satisfy the buyers and had accumulated a five year waiting list for his work. To fulfill the requests for his art, a portion of his paintings were reproduced in limited edition prints. In order to closely control the production and distribution of his work, John founded Wildlife Internationale, Inc. in 1971. The facility that houses the activities of the corporation is an "A" frame located high on a hill overlooking the fertile Ohio River valley four miles south of Georgetown, Ohio.

In addition to numerous major awards and commissions, Ruthven was selected as Ducks Unlimited's "First Artist of the Year" and to design Ohio's First Duck Stamp. Through his commissions from non profit organizations, originals have generated millions of dollars for their various projects. Over the years he has participated in the Leigh Yawkey Woodson Museum 'Birds in Art' Exhibit, the Denver Rotary Club's Artist of America Show and the Society of Animal Artists 'Art and the Animal' Exhibition. John's originals and limited edition prints hang in museums, corporate offices and private collections all over the world.

John and his wife, Judy, have become the driving force behind the historic preservation in their hometown of Georgetown, Ohio, where Ulysses S. Grant grew up. Today the Grant Homestead, owned by the Ruthven's, is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is also a National Landmark.
