

# RIVERFRONT STADIUM

Riverfront Stadium is situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway. The seating capacity when the field is in football configuration is 60,389.

The playing surface at Riverfront is Astroturf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will hold 4500 automobiles. Three parking decks, plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium.

Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages and cartoons through a computer.

The stadium opened in 1970.

The largest crowd ever to assemble for a sporting event in Cincinnati was at Riverfront when 60,284 fans saw the Bengals and Cleveland Browns on October 17, 1971.



# PAUL BROWN Vice President, General Manager

Paul Brown has put his own indelible mark on the powerful and successful National Football League.

The legendary coach and administrator has his touch on each and every area of the NFL.

His contributions to the game he loves have been enormous.

Brown, the founder, an owner and vice president and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals, continues

to give his knowledge and experience to the NFL as a member of its strong and prestigious "Competition Committee."

Brown lives by discipline.

He has set high standards for his team and himself. He has never asked any of his players or staff members to do something he wouldn't do.

Honesty, dedication and loyalty are parts of Paul Brown. His standards are high.

Brown was successful at every level of competition as a coach prep, high school, college, military and professional. He started at Severn Prep in Maryland, built a dynasty at Massillon High School, brought a national championship to Ohio State, developed a powerhouse at Great Lakes during World War II, founded the Cleveland Browns and won one title after another, and brought professional football to Cincinnati and developed the Bengals who have been to the Super Bowl twice and have won two American Football Conference championships, five AFC Central Division titles and have been in the playoffs seven times.

Without question, as a coach, Brown was one of the most meticulous strategists the game of football has ever known.

An example is the way he prepared the Browns for the opening game of the 1950 season against the NFL's defending champion Philadelphia Eagles. The Browns, who had won four successive All-America Conference championships, were taken into the NFL following the 1949 season amid much scorn and derision. The Browns' success in the ACC was not accepted by NFL owners and fans.

As fate would have it, the Browns and Eagles were matched in the opener at Philadelphia. A pair of champions for sure, but the Eagles were heavily favored.

The final score: Cleveland 35, Philadelphia 10.

Brown carefully prepared for the battle with the all-conquering Eagles. He reasoned that if on each play he split his line a fraction of a step further he would eventually spread and isolate the Eagle line, allowing big holes for fullback Marion Motley and the rest of the backs to barrel through.

So deftly did he design his offense with quarterback Otto Graham either passing or handing the ball on a draw to the devastating Motley, or pitching out to a cadre of fleet halfbacks that the famed Eagle defense was unable to contain.

"When the game was over Greasy Neale, the Eagles' coach, said we were only 'a pass and trap team' that played basketball," Brown recalled.

"You had to laugh at that," he said.

"Well, when we played them in Cleveland later that season, it was a rainy, muddy day and we hardly threw a pass, keeping the ball on the ground and beating them in a different way," Brown said with a smile.

Brown came up with revolutionary ideas and methods in his early days in football and now they are common practice. Everyone who has followed Brown has borrowed from him. His contributions to the game are excessive.

"I don't claim I brought anything to the game," Brown said. "I did my thing in my own style. I was meticulous in my organization and in my way of doing things. I did it in terms of being a leacher. Coaching was teaching to me — handling of people. "We have a set of principles that I have always believed in, even when I was coaching at Massillon High School, "he continued. "The key to all we do is that it must make sense, else we would just be wasting time and effort doing something that was of no avail. For instance, in our franchise, we don't believe in bringing 150 people to training camp, preferring half that number so our coaches can concentrate on teaching those who we feel can play for us during the season."

The "master" is a friend of coaches on every level of football. He has helped them in many ways. He has opened up jobs for them.

When he became the head coach of the new Cleveland Browns in 1946, Brown immediately hired a fulltime staff. He then instituted a system for scouting college talent on a scale never before imagined by other pro teams.

Here are a few of his innovations which have made football a better game:

Use of intelligence tests as a hint to a players' learning potential.

Use of notebooks and classroom techniques extensively.

 Use of complete film clip statistical studies which he used to grade his players.

 Utilized guards as messengers in calling the plays from the sideline.

 Developed pass patterns for the offense that were designed to pick holes in the defense, but then he devoted his efforts to perfecting the kind of defense that could counteract a pattern passing attack.

 Used personnel to the limit and was the first to switch some fine running backs to the defense because "they were so good I did not want to waste them on offense."

 Kept players and coaches at a hotel the night before a home game as well as a road game.

Brown has won virtually every honor that exists in pro football — Pro Football Hall of Fame member, coach of professional and college champions, National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Gold Medal winner and the 1989 Walter Camp Football Foundation Man-of-the-Year among many others.

Here, in part, is how Brown's Hall of Fame citation read: "... in addition to his great record, Brown is equally respected as a man who brought fine organization to professional football. He was the first to make coaching a fulltime profession, not only for himself, but for a staff of assistants, a practice that has since become universal."

Brown brought professional football to Cincinnati in 1967 and the Bengals he founded began playing in the American Football League in 1968. He is an owner, vice president, general manager and a member of the board of directors of the Bengals and has been in professional football since he founded the Cleveland Browns in 1946.

No one can approach Brown's coaching record. His cumulative 361 victories in his career and a .725 winning percentage are records in football coaching annals.

In the NFL, Brown won 223 games, lost 127 and played to nine ties in 25 years of coaching.

Brown was more than a coach. He was a teacher and more than 50 of his former players and assistants have been NFL coaches.

Eleven Super Bowl games have been won by Brown's disciples: Chuck Noll, four; Bill Walsh, three; Don Shula, two; Weeb Ewbank, one, and Don McCafferty, one.

Brown makes no bones about telling people football is his business.

"Football is our only business," says Brown. "All the energies of this organization are directed toward it, and we have built our business so it can subsist within that framework.

"My sons, Mike and Pete, are partners with me in our business," Brown said, "and they have been raised to the sport so that all our decisions are based on a sound, fundamental knowledge of the game, not on any whims or fancies as often happens when nonfootball people get into this business." Brown's "business pursuit" began 61 years ago with his first

Brown's "business pursuit" began 61 years ago with his first coaching job at Severn Prep in 1930 after he graduated from Miami (Ohio) University where he was an outstanding quarterback. He compiled a 16-1-1 record at Severn in two seasons before Massillon High School, located in his hometown, called and asked him to come home.

Brown did and made Massillon the most popular and successful high school football team in the United States.

Brown's Massillon Tigers won a series of national and state titles while he was there and had a record of 80-8-2. During his last six seasons at Massillon, his teams went 58-1-1.

"It's the best job I ever had," Brown says of his coaching at Massillon. "That's because I really think I did the most good there. The reason is that I was able to send many, many athletes to college through their athletic skills when there was no other way for them to go."

The stadium in Massillon is named Paul Brown Stadium.

Brown's tremendous success at Massillon was duly noted at Ohio State where a coaching change was in the works. Paul Brown was the Buckeyes' man.

He agreed to take the job at OSU over his doctor's objections who said Brown was "wound too tight."

But, Brown said there was never any question because "I had to take it. I was so excited about getting a chance to coach Ohio State that I didn't even ask what my salary was going to be."

Brown, who said his only ambition in life was to be the greatest football coach in the nation and who became just that on all levels, said his "new deal" for the Buckeyes would be strictly the revival of the game's fundamentals and his code of conduct for the players and coaches.

"The players were to be gentlemen and scholars and not just a bunch of tough guys who can take it," Brown said. "It has been my policy during my coaching career to stress fast thinking and clean living to build greater athletes."

Brown led the Buckeyes to the national championship in 1942 and compiled an 18-8-1 record in three seasons before entering the Navy during World War II.

This led to another step in his legendary career when he was assigned as head football coach at Great Lakes Navai Station where he put together a team that dominated its time and produced many future professional stars. His Great Lakes' teams played against the top college and military squads in the country and had a 15-5-1 record under Brown in two seasons.

Brown was discharged from the Navy in 1946 and pro football loomed on his horizon. He founded the Cleveland Browns who would play in the new All-America Conference. The AAC was a rival league to the established NFL.

Brown's Browns dominated the AAC during its four years, winning all the titles while posting a 52-4-3 record. The AAC probably folded because the Browns were so good there was never a close race for the championship.

The NFL took Cleveland, San Francisco and Baltimore into its ranks after the AAC closed up.

It was another challenge for Brown and he loved it. He made believers and created a pro football dynasty in Cleveland.

Brown showed in the first game what his teams could do and he went on to win three NFL championships — 1950, 1954 and 1955 — and seven Eastern Division titles. He was in 11 championship games.

"We didn't call it the Super Bowl at that time, of course," Brown remarked, "but it was the same thing — the championship game of professional football."

Brown left the Browns in 1963 after amassing a brilliant record of 168 victories, 68 losses and eight ties.

His departure from Cleveland shook the football world and he remained out of football, even though he was offered a number of NFL jobs, until 1967 when he founded the Cincinnati Bengals. The Bengals went into the American Football League which was merged with the NFL in 1970.

Being away from football for five years didn't diminish any of Brown's brilliance.

"I felt like I was starting to live again when we started the Bengals," Brown said. "Football is a big, big part of my life."

Brown developed the best expansion team ever, and the Bengals won the AFC Central Division title in 1970, only their third season in the AFL. It is the earliest an expansion team has ever won a title in the NFL.

His Cincinnati teams were competitive from the start and his final team in 1975 went to the playoffs with an 11-3 record.

Following the 1975 season, Brown retired from coaching and became a fulltime general manager.

He continued to excel as the leader of the franchise and has seen his team win American Football Conference championships in 1981 and 1988 and play in Super Bowl XVI and Super Bowl XXIII. He was selected "National Football League Executive of the Year" in 1981 and 1988.

Brown was presented the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Gold Medal, the highest award given by the organization. in 1990. Previous winners include five presidents - Dwight Eisenhower, John Kennedy, Richard Nixon, Gerald Ford and Ronald Reagan — plus Gen. Douglas McArthur, Supreme Court Justice Byron "Whizzer" White and Amos Alonzo Stagg.

"Paul Brown is a name of integrity and a true giant in American tootball annals," said the late Vincent de Paul Draddy, then the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame chairman of the board, in presenting Brown the Gold Medal.

Brown has authored a book titled "P.B. The Paul Brown Story" which tells of his life in football. He thinks it all began in Norwalk, Ohio, where he lived as a youngster.

"I saw a picture of me at age five taking a snap from my best friend," Brown chuckled.

Brown was an excellent quarterback at Miami, the "Cradle of Coaches," and graduated with a bachelor of arts degree. He is a member of the Miami Athletic Hall of Fame and served on the board of directors of the university for many years. He has a master of arts degree from Ohio State University.

Paul and his wife, Mary, live in Indian Hill. His first wife, Katie, died in April, 1969. Two of his sons, Mike and Pete, are associated with the Bengals as assistant general manager and legal counsel and director of player personnel, respectively. Another son, Robin, a former scout and business executive, died in July, 1978.

# AUSTIN E. KNOWLTON Chairman of the Board

Austin E. "Dutch" Knowlton is the chairman of the board of the Cincinnati Bengals and has been a firm supporter from the first day of the franchise's inception.

Knowlton, a well-known builder and sportsman, has been a founder, owner and director since the franchise began and often can be found watching his team play at

some of the farthest waystops on the NFL map, in addition to his regular attendance at games in Riverfront Stadium.

Knowlton also is an avid sportsman who spends as much of his free time as possible overseeing his second great interest the breeding and selling of show horses at his Emerald Farm in Delaware County. He is also a Trustee of the Brown Jug Society which runs the Triple Crown for standardbred pacing horses.

Also, during the glorious days of the 70's, Knowlton was the largest owner of the Cincinnati Reds.

Sometimes there is not as much time to devote to these activities as he'd like because of his business interests. A few years ago he organized the ARGA Co. One division, Vesta Construction Company, is engaged in the construction of buildings, leasing of buildings and other endeavors. A division of this company, K Construction Management, is engaged in the construction management business in Ohio and other states.

After receiving a degree in architecture and civil engineering from Ohio State University, Knowlton joined his father's construction company and later assumed ownership of the construction business and operated it under the name of Knowlton Construction Company.

During the expansion of the college program, he designed, built and financed 54 college dormitories and other buildings for various colleges and universities in various states. He built the major portion of Ohio University, Bowling Green State University and many college buildings at Ohio State University, Miami University, Capital University, Otterbein College and numerous other schools and universities.

His offices are in Bellefontaine and Columbus, Ohio, and he resides in Delaware County at Emerald Farms, and in Aspen at Red Mountain Ranch.

# JOHN SAWYER President

John Sawyer has been president of the Cincinnati Bengals since the franchise was formed in 1967.

A well-known business executive, Sawyer was one of the founders of the Bengals. He put in many hours of hard work and thousands of miles of travel to bring the National Football League franchise to Cincinnati.

Sawyer, Paul Brown and Mike Brown represented Cincinnati in the

many NFL meetings held prior to awarding the franchise. He currently attends most NFL owners' meetings and played a part in the NFL realignment in 1970.

Sawyer is an owner, president and a member of the team's board of directors. And, importantly, he is one of the Bengals top fans.

He has missed only four road trips with the Bengals since the team began playing in 1968.

Sawyer is president of J. Sawyer Co., a multi-faceted agricultural firm he developed which has included aviation firms, an automobile agency, a restaurant, an antique shop, a horticulture products company, a commercial feed lot and numerous farms in Ohio, Kentucky, Mississippi, Florida, Wyoming, Colorado and Arkansas. J. Sawyer Co. is one of the leading farm management and real estate brokerage firms in the Midwest.

He was inducted into the Ohio Agricultural Hall of Fame, Ohio's highest honor in the field of agriculture, in 1983. He has been honored for serving Ohio agriculture as a farmer, landowner and innovator for more than 30 years. His support and leadership helped greatly in the early development of the American Soybean Association and the Ohio Beef Marketing Program.

ation and the Ohio Beef Marketing Program. Sawyer, who was a B17 pilot in World War II, was a pioneer in the aerial application of crop pesticides. He has been a leader in sound environmental management in the livestock industry and has developed a high volume composting system used at the Paygro plant and Ohio Feed Lot in South Charleston, Ohio. This innovative "Paygro Composting System" has been recog-

This innovative "Paygro Composting System" has been recognized by the EPA as an effective method of sludge treatment and is being installed in large Ohio cities to help solve the tremendous municipal waste problems.

Sawyer has never lost his love of airplanes and flew a company Lear jet on business trips from Madison Aviation Center which he built in London, Ohio.

He is very active in charitable and civic endeavors and is vice president of fund-raising for Easter Seals, a social agency he became involved with through former Cincinnati quarterback Ken Anderson, He's a member of the board of trustees of Children's Hospital, active with Springer School, Boy Scouts, Episcopal Diocese of Southern Ohio and Little Miami, Inc.

Sawyer is a graduate of Princeton University and is the son of the late Charles Sawyer, former Secretary of Commerce. He and his wife, Ruth, live in Indian Hill and have four daughters, Anne Wetherill, Elizabeth Selnick, Catherine Ryall and Mary. # MIKE BROWN Assistant General Manager, Legal Counsel

Mike Brown is the assistant general manager and legal counsel of the Cincinnati Bengals and also is an owner and a member of the board of directors of the team.

He fills the key roles in the administrative operation of the franchise which is among the best in the National Football League.

Brown was very instrumental in bringing professional football to Cincinnati. He and his father, Paul, one of football's most success-

Cincinnati. He and his father, Paul, one of football's most successful coaches and now an owner, vice president and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals, brought professional football to the Queen City in 1967 with a franchise in the American Football League which merged with the National Football League in 1970.

The Bengals began playing in the AFL in 1968.

Brown had eyed Cincinnati as a possible and favorable NFL site for many years. He did detailed research and conducted studies which showed the potential of the Cincinnati area as a professional football market.

Brown has played a major role in the success of the Cincinnati Bengals in their rise from an expansion team to a solid, highlycompetitive team that has been in the Super Bowl twice, won two American Football Conference championships, four American Football Conference Central Division titles and played in the playoffs seven times.

He works with players on contracts with the Bengals and handles NFL matters. He's involved in all facets of the team's operation including contracts and negotiations with the City of Cincinnati and television and radio outlets.

Brown also administers the organization's legal matters. He is a member of the Executive Committee of the NFL Management Council, a group of owners involved in NFL labor-management decisions.

He and his father represent the Bengals at all NFL owners' meetings. They played a big part in the AFL-NFL merger.

A graduate of Dartmouth where he played quarterback, he received a law degree from Harvard Law School and was associated with a law firm in Cleveland before joining his father with the Cleveland Browns.

Mike and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Katie, and a son, Paul. Both are members of the board of directors.



# PETE BROWN Director of Player Personnel

Pete Brown, the architect of the Cincinnati Bengals' annual draft of college football players, has been the director of the team's player personnel department for 23 years.

Brown has played a major role in the development of a team that has gone to the Super Bowl twice and has been in the playoffs seven times since its inception in 1968.

Brown has been with football all

his life. He is the son of Paul Brown, owner, vice president and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals.

He started with the Bengals when the team was formed in 1967 and was assistant director of player personnel in 1968. He became director of player personnel in 1969.

Brown, who has a vast knowledge of players and scouting, has had many outstanding drafts for the Bengals.

He is an owner, and a member of the board of directors of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Brown is a graduate of Denison University.



## CINCINNATI HEAD COACH SAM WYCHE

Sam Wyche, considered by many as the most innovative coach in football, directed the Cincinnati Bengals to the 1990 American Football Conference Central Division championship and into the second round of the National Football League playoffs last season.

Wyche's Bengals finished the regular season with a divisionwinning 9-7 record, then defeated Houston in the first round of the playoffs before being eliminated by the Los Angeles Raiders.

The Bengals fought a rash of injuries to key players throughout the season.

"We had a good year," said Wyche who has been head coach of the Bengals since 1984. "We led the division all but two weeks and came back and had to beat a real good Houston team two times in three weeks. And we came within a hair of beating the Los Angeles Raiders in the worst situation (injuries to top players) you can come into."

The dynamic Wyche won his second AFC Central division crown last season. The other one came in 1988 when he won the AFC Central, AFC championship and led his team into Super Bowl XXIII against the San Francisco 49ers. One of the most exciting Super Bowl games took place and the 49ers edged the Bengals 20-16 in the final seconds.

The Bengals were the dominant team in the AFC Central, posting a 5-1 record against division teams for the second consecutive year.

"Our play against division teams was intense, which is good," Wyche said. "If you beat the teams in your own division you usually win it."

The talented Wyche, beginning his eighth season as head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals, has developed one of the most interesting and explosive teams in the National Football League.

Wyche was voted NFL and AFC "Coach of the Year" after his team posted a 12-4 regular season record and a 14-5 overall mark, best in the league in 1988.

Wyche's teams are always strong offensively and were ranked No. 1 in the NFL in that category in 1988 and 1989. He combines a mixture of passing and rushing that produces yardage and touchdowns. The Bengals have rewritten the offensive category of the club record book under Wyche.

Wyche has an unusual knowledge of offensive philosophies and the results he gets prove it.

He's always willing to test new horizons with a myriad of innovative offensive moves, many of which are being copied elsewhere in the NFL. He's never satisfied with the status quo, though never at the expense of sound, fundamental football from which all the Bengals offensive dynamics originate.

He loves coaching. "There is as much left to do in the game as has been done already," Wyche says. "Every time they change a

rule, you can come up with multiple options on how to adjust to it."

Paul Brown, the Bengals vice president and general manager, saw Wyche's brightness and intelligence a long time ago when he was coaching the young quarterback. His aptitude for football thinking was evident as a player with the Bengals during the first three years of the team's existence.

"I always kept playbooks of the players who for one reason or another seemed to stand out in my mind," said Brown who signed Wyche for the Bengals as a free agent quarterback in 1968.

"Sam's was one of those I kept.

"Some years ago I was looking up Mike McCormack's book because I had to nominate him for the Hall of Fame at Canton, and I came across Sam's.

"I know why I kept his. Even when he was a free agent quarterback who we kept on that old 1968 team, he was special. I looked at the book and he had everything in excellent order. This shows that way back then I had a feeling ... he was a student of the game.

"We kept close track of Sam after he left us and he was the man we wanted when the job in Cincinnati was open," Brown said.

Brown brought Wyche to the Bengals as head coach in 1984. He has compiled a 58-53 regular season record and is 3-2 in post season play, and is the Bengals' winningest coach.

Wyche has been taught by some of the finest coaches in the game. Personally, he believes that everyone he has come in contact with over the years has left a mark on him. His coaches and associates in more than 20 years read like a litany of football greats.

"From 1967 until the present, I have either been a teammate of or coached by or with the following people: "Paul Brown, Paul Dietzel, Bill Walsh, Mike McCormack, Bill Johnson, Ted Marchibroda, Bruce Coslet, Rick Forzano, Jack Pardee, George Allen, Maxie Baughan, Don Coryell, Jim Hannifan, Joe Gibbs, Raymond Berry, Jim Ringo, Norb Hecker, Sonny Jurgensen, Billy Kramer, O.J. Simpson, Jim Hart, Mike White, Denny Green and John Ralston among others.

"I have been fortunate to be around so many fine coaches and players," Wyche says. "My good fortune has also included four playoff years as a player, including participation in Super Bowl VII (1972) with the Washington Redskins. I also coached with the 1981 World Champion 49ers in Super Bowl XVI.

"I played in the NFL for almost 10 years and was with five teams," he added. "I didn't realize it at the time, but in the long run, it was fortunate I got bounced around. I met a lot of great players and coaches and was exposed to a lot of systems. There is at least something from all of those men in my coaching philosophy. I don't think you are around anybody who doesn't rub off on you."

Wyche was born in Atlanta, Ga., on January 5, 1945, and attended North Fulton High School there.

After graduating from high school in Atlanta, he became a "walkon" quarterback at Furman University in Greenville, S.C., where he earned a bachelor of arts degree in business administration.

Wyche played with the Wheeling Ironmen of the Continental Football League in 1966 before going to the University of South Carolina as a graduate assistant for two seasons. In 1968, he earned an M.B.A. degree in Business Administration Management.

Wyche was given a tryout in 1968 with Brown's Cincinnati Bengals, an American Football League expansion team in its initial season. He made the team and was the starting quarterback much of the time. He was a member of Cincinnati's first American Football Conference Central Division playoff team in 1970.

During his three seasons with the Bengals, Wyche completed 115 of 220 passes (52.3%) for 1743 yards and threw 12 touchdown passes,

In 1971, he was traded to the Washington Redskins where he played for coach George Allen. He played on three playoff teams including Super Bowl VII.

Wyche was traded to the Detroit Lions in 1974. In 1976, he began the season with the St. Louis Cardinals and concluded his playing career with the Buffalo Bills.

After retiring from professional football, Wyche and a partner opened Sam Wyche Sports World in Greenville, S.C., now a chain of 11 stores.

In 1979, Wyche joined his former quarterback coach with the Bengals, Bill Walsh, in San Francisco as quarterback and passing game coach and directed the passing game of the 49ers from 1979 through 1982 including Super Bowl XVI when San Francisco defeated the Bengals, 26-21.

While with the 49ers for four years, he was widely credited with developing quarterback Joe Montana who says, "Sam Wyche's knowledge of offensive philosophies is unsurpassed.

Wyche was head coach at Indiana University in 1983 where he compiled a 3-8 record in a rebuilding season.

He and his wife, Jane, have two children, Zak, 20, and Kerry, 18. When he's away from football, Wyche enjoys playing golf, tennis

and the guitar. He's also a magician and he flies airplanes as an additional hobby.

Wyche is active working for many charitable groups and is committed to helping the homeless.

He has raised money for the homeless in many different ways and has spent many, many hours in doing so. In addition to giving his time, he donates a percentage of the proceeds from his public speaking engagements. He has been honored for his work for the homeless.

Wyche is in much demand as a speaker. He is bright and articulate and enthusiastic and always delivers a message. He works a little magic into some of his talks and uses audience participation.

"Home made" is Cincinnati Bengals' coach Sam Wyche's personal effort to inspire Cincinnatians to champion the needs of the significant subculture of homeless people who have nowhere to go at day's end.

"You know, the homeless are not all derelicts leaning up against a lamppost drinking cheap wine," Wyche said. "Most of them have jobs, or even two jobs, but don't make enough to support a home. It's a sad and moving situation when you take the time to stop and really understand what's happening to these people."

Wyche was drawn to the cause of the homeless "casually and by accident," he said. "On Sunday mornings before our games, I get into the car and just drive around the city to relax myself. In doing this, I noticed people literally coming out of the woodwork at daybreak. Kids, elderly people, able-bodied people, all of whom had spent the night on the street. When I stopped to talk to them, they knew all about me and the Bengals and Ickey and Boomer. It wasn't like they were out of touch with the world around them. They just didn't have any money."

It was at that point that Sam Wyche decided to channel his spare It was at that point that Sam Wyche decided to channel his spare time energies into helping the homeless. "HomeMade is like those pies your grandma used to make. We do it ourselves. I'm not an agency. There's no phone number to call. We try to help agencies through donations and give them a softer sell when they go out to ask corporate America to assist in helping the homeless. We're trying to make it an in-vogue thing to do," Wyche concluded.

# SAM WYCHE LOOKS AT 1991

"Barring any unexpected injuries prior to training camp or during training camp, the Bengals enter the 1991 season as healthy as we have been in the eight years this staff has been together. ' head coach Sam Wyche said.

Last year we suffered injuries to Eric Thomas in the off-season, the recovery of Ickey Woods from knee surgery, as well as injuries early in the season to Bruce Reimers, David Fulcher, Rickey Dixon and others. If we can stay healthy, we enter the 1991 season as one good football team. No one can predict how many games any team will win, but I know that a healthy Bengals' ball club will require an excellent effort by everyone on our schedule in order to whip us.

"We have to upgrade our run defense. We have to upgrade our pass rush, not just our pressures on the passer, but the out-andout sack that really stops offensive drives and gives the ball back to our offense.

Offensively, we are in the prime of the careers of many of our players. Boomer Esiason, Rodney Holman, James Brooks, Ickey Woods, our entire offensive line, Eddie Brown, Tim McGee - all of them should be in their prime. And with the young running backs that are developing from within our organization, we hope to be as strong as any offense in the National Football League.

Special teams is always important. We made strides last year and we hope to make strides again this year. If Mitchell Price develops as a return man or if a new face enters the picture as an exciting addition to the punt and kickoff return, we hope field position begins to play a big part of the victories in 1991.

'We know that the schedule is tough - playing both Super Bowl contenders as well as many playoff teams. Our division continues to cycle up with Houston and Pittsburgh very strong and Cleveland expected to rebound from a very unusual poor record.

'As always we're optimistic at this time of year, but I think we have a legitimate cause for optimism with a mature and healthy ball club.

## QUARTERBACKS

VETERANS: Boomer Esiason (8), Erik Wilhelm (3).

With the loss of Todd Philcox to Cleveland in Plan B, the Bengals must find a third quarterback to challenge Erik Wilhelm for the backup spot to Boomer.

Boomer Esiason is in his prime. As a young quarterback, he showed the promise that he is now fulfilling. His leadership as well as his technical skill makes the 1991 season an exciting one to look forward to by fans, coaches and players alike.

"Erik Wilhelm enters the 1991 season with a lot to prove. It's his turn to step up and show that he is a National Football League quality quarterback and he will get his chance during the preseason." RUNNING BACKS

VETERANS: James Brooks (11), Stanford Jennings (8), Ickey Woods (4), Eric Ball (3), Craig Taylor (3), Harold Green (2), "James Brooks returns for this 11th season in tremendous con-

dition. His diligent conditioning is providing him with the long career that helps Cincinnati maintain its status as one of the top offenses in the league.

Ickey Woods will return from day one as a healthy running back. He's worked hard in the off-season, pushed very hard by Eric Thomas in the weight room and should be back to 100%.

'Stanford Jennings returns again as our halfback/fullback combination and also the one man that we can rely on when the extra duties are needed at wide receiver or on the special teams.

"Craig Taylor could be our lead fullback-type blocker and heavy duty ball carrier. He's a big, solid runner and we hope that he develops in that area.

"Eric Ball turned in a tremendous job in 1990 not only as a ball carrier and a blocker but as a special teams return man and cover specialist. We feel that we are well-covered with veterans plus the addition of Harold Green now a sophomore in the National Football League. He should emerge as one of the top players at his position

od as healthy tight ends and hopefully we return in 1991 with the three best combination of tight ends in the National Football League."

## WIDE RECEIVERS

VETERANS: Eddie Brown (7), Tim McGee (6), Kendal Smith (3), Mike Barber (3), Lynn James (2) and Reggie Rembert (1).

"The wide receiver corps, usually a strong suit with the Bengals, is strong on the front line with some uncertainties in the backup positions.

"Eddie Brown and Tim McGee are two of the finest receivers in the league and when they are healthy and playing their best, we have deep threats as well as the threat of a long run following a short completion.

"Mike Barber has proved to be the cagey veteran that can get open in clutch situations and will return as our most reliable backup.

"The uncertainty of the development of Kendal Smith, Lynn James and Reggie Rembert leave the receiver corps one to watch during training camp in 1991. The potential is there to have one of the finest groups of receivers in the league. The potential is also there to be very thin in depth."

## **OFFENSIVE LINE**

VETERANS: Anthony Munoz (12), Bruce Reimers (8), Bruce Kozerski (8), Brian Blados (8), Joe Walter (7), Paul Jetton (3), Ken Moyer (3), Mike Brennan (2), Kirk Scrafford (2), and Eric Crigler (1).

Moyer (3), Mike Brennan (2), Kirk Scrafford (2), and Eric Crigler (1). "We perennially have the reputation of being one of the better offensive lines in the National Football League. Much of this is due to the training they receive from Jim McNally, considered by many to be the best offensive line coach in the league. But great lines are produced by solid football players. Anthony Munoz leads that group again this year playing in his 12th season, and recovery from his shoulder problems of a year ago seems to be on schedule.

"Bruce Reimers may be the big question mark in terms of health. A foot injury is slow in recovery and his health is of some concern at this writing.

"Bruce Kozerski and Brian Blados both seem to be returning healthy from injuries in 1990.

"Joe Walter, Paul Jetton, Ken Moyer, Kirk Scrafford and Mike Brennan give us plenty of depth, size and experience."

## DEFENSIVE LINE

"The defensive line is much maligned in the media as being too small, not good enough in the pass rush and not stout enough to stop the running game. "We do have in Tim Krumrie, David Grant, Skip McClendon and

"We do have in Tim Krumrie, David Grant, Skip McClendon and Natu Tuatagaloa big defensive linemen. We now have to step into the production stage. We have to coordinate our efforts so well, not just as a defensive line but as a defensive line working in coordination with the linebackers, that the running game forces teams into pass situations that are then constantly harassed by an improved pass rush.

"Our season rests on the development and improvement of the defensive line and linebacker corps."

## LINEBACKERS

VETERANS: Leo Barker (8), Ed Brady (8), Carl Zander (7), Leon White (6), Alex Gordon (5), Kevin Walker (4), James Francis (2), Bernard Clark (2) and Craig Ogletree (2).

"The linebacker corps will be one of the most interesting areas for fans to follow during the training camp period. No one other than James Francis has a job sown up. There will be competition at every position, inside and outside, and the best players are going to start for us this year.

"We had good play at times from all of our linebackers but we did not have consistent defense against the run and pass that a championship team has to have.

"The addition of Alex Gordon will provide good competition at the outside linebacker spot.

"We have hopes that three or four of our linebackers (depending on whether we are playing a three-man or a four-man defensive line) will step forward as championship-type players. Crucial to our 1991 effort will be the development of this group."

## DEFENSIVE BACKS

VETERANS: David Fulcher (6), Lewis Billups (6), Eric Thomas (5), Barney Bussey (6), Carl Carter (6), Rod Jones (6), Rickey Dixon (4) and Mitchell Price (2).

The defensive backfield is one of our strengths going into 1991. We feel we have as good a group of inside defensive backs in David Fulcher, Barney Bussey and Rickey Dixon. Good size, good speed and experience are part of each of those players.

'At the cornerback position, the addition of Carl Carter and Rod Jones made us stronger and more reliable in pure coverage situations.

'Mitchell Price is a young player to watch. He has all the 'want to' that makes a player good. "Eric Thomas recovered beautifully through a lot of hard work

and should be back to his old self as an All-Pro candidate in 1991.

We must find solid reliable players to come in and fulfill the nickel situations if we're going to be good, and we think we are going to be good in this position.

## KICKERS-PUNTERS

VETERANS: Jim Breech (13) and Lee Johnson (7).

"Jim Breech returns for his 13th season as accurate as ever and Lee Johnson returns for his seventh season as one of the best punters in the league as well as the best kickoff man in football.

"We don't have a weakness here but there will always be competition in training camp to push these players prior to the NFL regular season.

### COACHES

Sam Wyche, head coach; Jim Anderson, running backs; Dana Bible, quarterbacks; Marv Braden, special teams; Dick LeBeau, defensive coordinator-defensive backs; Jim McNally, offensive line; Dick Selcer, linebackers; Dave Shula, wide receivers; Mike Stock, tight ends; Chuck Studley, defensive line; Kim Wood, strength.

"We add one new coach to our staff this year in Dave Shula who will coach the wide receivers. This addition is the result of the retirement of Bill 'Tiger' Johnson from the tight end position.

Mike Stock will move from wide receivers to coach the tight ends and Dave Shula will replace Mike Stock as the wide receiver coach.

Dana Bible will work closely with that group as he coaches the quarterbacks. Dana returns for his second season as an NFL coach.

'Jim Anderson, one of the league's best running back coaches, will assure that a group of fine athletes are well-coordinated weekin and week-out.

"Jim McNally, considered the guru of line coaches in the National Football League, always has our offensive line ready for any eventuality. That won't change in 1991.

On the defensive side of the ball, Dick LeBeau coordinates a defense that will see a variety of fronts and coverages. Veteran players along with a staff that has been together and has molded one of the best systems in the game, provide us with a solid front defensively

"Chuck Studley returns as our defensive line coach and brings with him years of experience under several different systems.

"Dick Selcer is our linebacker coach again for the eighth straight year and consistently motivates his players and prepares them to be one of the most mistake-free combination of players in the league.

Our special teams will be organized by Marv Braden in his second year with the Bengals and recognized around the league as one of the top special teams coordinators in football.

"Kim Wood returns as our strength and conditioning coach and through the use of our Hammer-Strength equipment maintains not only a level of strength and stamina but confidence that the players must have in order to compete in this league," Wyche concluded.

# JIM ANDERSON Running Backs

Jim Anderson has coached the Cincinnati Bengals' running backs since 1984 and has played a big part in the development of the team's high-powered ground attack.

The Bengals ranked first in rushing in the National Football League in 1988 and 1989

and were fifth last season. Before joining the Bengals' staff, Anderson coached at five colleges: Stanford, 1981-83; Southern Methodist, 1976-80; Nevada-Las Vegas, 1974-75; Scottsdale Community College, 1973, and Cal Western (now US. International) 1970-71. He coached San Diego Morse High School in 1972.

Anderson played linebacker and defensive end for Cal Western in San Diego in 1970 and was a co-captain and voted to the NAIA All-District team.

Anderson coached the running backs at Nevada-Las Vegas in 1974 when the Runnin' Rebels went 12-1 and advanced to the Grantland Rice Bowl (the NCAA Division II semi-finals).

Among the running backs he coached in college were Mike Thomas, NFL Rookie of the Year in 1975 with the Washington Redskins, at Nevada-Las Vegas; Art Whittington, the former Los Angeles Raiders running back, at SMU, and Darrin Nelson, the first running back taken in the 1982 draft by the Minnesota Vikings, at SMU.

He was born March 27, 1948, and he and his wife, Marcia, have a son, Derek, 17.



# DANA BIBLE Quarterbacks

Dana Bible is starting his second season as the coach of the Cincinnati Bengals' quarterbacks.

Prior to coming to the Bengals, Bible had been slated to be the offensive coordinator and coach of the quarterbacks and wide

receivers at Toledo in 1990.

Previously, Bible coached quarterbacks and receivers at the University of Cincinnati 1976-80. He was quarterbacks coach at Miami (Ohio) in 1989 and also was there from 1981-83 as receivers coach. He was an assistant coach at North Carolina State from 1983-85 and in 1986 was offensive coordinator at San Diego State where he helped lead the Aztecs to the Western Athletic Conference championship and an appearance in the Holiday Bowl.

Bible was a defensive back at UC and graduated in 1976. He also holds a masters degree from UC.

He and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Adele, 3.



## MARV BRADEN Special Teams

Marv Braden, an experienced and talented NFL coach, joined the Cincinnati coaching staff in 1990 as special teams coach.

Braden, a 15-year veteran of NFL coaching, served as special teams coach of the Phoenix Cardinals from 1986-89, special offensive

assistant and special teams coordinator for the San Diego Chargers from 1981-85, and special teams coach of the Denver Broncos from 1977-80.

His performance has been impressive. His units in Denver finished the season ranked first in 1977 and 1979 and at San Diego first in 1982 and 1985.

A graduate of Southwest Missouri State University, Braden began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Missouri (1961-62). After three years as defensive coordinator at Parsons (Iowa) College, he was head coach at Northeast Missouri State in 1967-68

Braden was head coach at California Western (now U.S. International) from 1969-72 and had a 23-12-1 record. He moved to lowa State as defensive coordinator in 1973 and served as offensive coordinator at SMU from 1974-75 before joining Michigan State in the same capacity in 1976.

Marv and his wife, Becky, have a daughter, Janice.



# DICK LEBEAU Defensive Coordinator

Former All-Pro cornerback Dick LeBeau begins his eighth season as the defensive coordinator for the Cincinnati Bengals.

LeBeau has been on the Cincinnati coach-

ing staff for 12 years. He was defensive back-field coach for four seasons before being appointed defensive coordinator. He still handles the defensive backfield.

LeBeau has been in the National Football League since 1959 when he was drafted in the fifth-round by Cleveland following a brilliant career at Ohio State where he was an offensive and defensive back for three seasons including 1957 when the Buckeyes won the national championship. He was an All-Ohio High School selection before going to Ohio State.

LeBeau was released by the Browns as a rookie and signed with Detroit where he distinguished himself for 14 seasons at cornerback. He set an alltime durability record for cornerbacks by playing 171 consecutive games during his career with the Lions. His 62 pass interceptions rank him fifth on professional football's alltime list. Ken Riley, one of LeBeau's former Bengal cornerbacks, passed him in 1983 to claim fourth with 65 interceptions.

While with the Lions, LeBeau was selected to play in three Pro Bowl games. He had his best statistical season in 1970 when he intercepted nine passes and compiled 96 yards in returns.

LeBeau retired as a player in 1972 and joined the Philadelphia Eagles as special teams coach. He became defensive backfield coach of the Green Bay Packers in 1976 and was there until he joined the Bengals in the same capacity in 1980.

Well-experienced and highly-regarded in the NFL coaching circles, LeBeau develops hard tacklers and has knowledgeable players. He has been instrumental in the rapid development of the Bengals' young defensive players.

He was born Charles Richard LeBeau on September 9, 1937, in London, Ohio. Dick and his wife, Nancy, have a son, Brandon Grant, 12.



## JIM MCNALLY Offensive Line

Highly-regarded Jim McNally annually fields one of the top offensive lines in the National Football League.

The knowledgeable, hard-working McNally is rated one of the very best offensive line coaches in the NFL

His awesome front paved the way for the Bengals' No. 1 ranking in rushing in the NFL in 1988 and 1989. The Bengals ranked fifth in rushing last season. Cincinnati's passing attack operates well behind the offensive line, ranking third in passing in the AFC and seventh in the NFL in 1989 and seventh passing in the AFC and 15th in the NFL in 1990.

McNally has developed a reputation of taking late-round draft choices and turning them into top-notch offensive linemen. Examples include guard-tackle Bruce Reimers, eighth-round in 1984,

center Bruce Kozerski, ninth-round in 1984, tackle Joe Walter, seventh-round in 1985, and tackle Ken Moyer, a free agent.

He also works extremely well with All-Pro tackle Anthony Munoz. McNally, like all Bengal coaches, scouts the players he's interested in drafting.

"I check 'em out from top to bottom," says McNally. "In my first year, Pete Brown (Bengals' player personnel director) told me exactly where to go. Now, 10 years later, I've learned the ropes and I know coaches and people in all college towns. They help me,"

McNally coached at four colleges before coming to the Bengals in 1980. He was offensive line coach at Wake Forest in 1979, Boston College 1976-78, Marshall 1973-75 and Buffalo 1966-69.

He played for the University of Buffalo for three seasons and was an All-East performer. He is a member of the University of Buffalo Hall of Fame.

McNally was born December 13, 1943. He and his wife, Carolyn, have three children, Jenny, 19, Betsy, 17, and Jon, 16.



# DICK SELCER Linebackers

Dick Selcer has been the coach of the Cincinnati Bengals' linebackers since 1984.

Selcer, a Cincinnatian, is beginning his 31st season in the coaching ranks — 11 in the National Football League and 20 with college teams.

Selcer, who has developed a hard-hitting group of young linebackers, came to the Bengals from the Houston Oilers on January 6, 1984. He coached the Houston linebackers in 1981-82-83.

He was head coach at Xavier University in 1970 and 1971 and was an assistant there in 1962-63-64.

Selcer was defensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati 1965-66 and at Brown University 1967-69. He was an assistant at the University of Wisconsin 1972-74, and defensive coordinator at Kansas State 1975-77 and Southwestern Louisiana 1978-80.

Selcer was an outstanding athlete in Cincinnati and Ohio during his high school playing days. At Cincinnati Elder, he was an All-Ohio High School halfback and captained the football, basketball and baseball teams in his senior year.

He went from Elder to Notre Dame where he lettered three years in football and baseball. He played halfback for the Irish for three years. He was an All-American second baseman in 1959.

Selcer was born August 22, 1937. He and his wife, Meryl, have five children, Michael, 31, Stephen, 30, Patrick, 28, Connie, 25, and Kevin, 20.



## DAVE SHULA Wide Receivers

Dave Shula was named wide receivers coach of the Cincinnati Bengals January 29, 1991.

Shula, son of Don Shula, coach of the Miami Dolphins, came to the Bengals from the Dallas Cowboys where he had been coaching

since 1989. He was offensive coordinator for Dallas in 1989, quarterbacks coach in 1990 and was to be passing game coordinator in 1991.

Shula began his coaching career with Miami in 1982 as receivers coach and over the next few seasons helped Mark Duper and Mark Clayton become one of the NFL's best receiving tandems. He later added the duties of quarterbacks coach and worked with Dan Marino during the years he set NFL passing records. In 1988, Shula was named assistant head coach of the Dolphins.

"He's been around a lot of good coaches," Cincinnati head coach Sam Wyche said. "And he's been around a lot of systems, so he's not a dyed-in-the-wool, one-system type coach. We like that flexibility." Following an outstanding career at Dartmouth where he once held the school receiving marks, the two-time All-Ivy League selection played a season as a wide receiver/kick returner for the Colts in 1981.

Shula, who was born May 28, 1959, and his wife, Leslie, have three sons - Daniel, Christopher and Matthew



# MIKE STOCK **Tight Ends**

Mike Stock, who coached the Bengals' wide receivers last season, is the coach of the tight ends, succeeding Bill Johnson who retired at the end of the 1990 season.

Stock joined the Bengals January 27, 1986 as special teams coach. He coached the spe-

cial teams in 1986-87-88 before moving to the wide receivers post.

Stock left Notre Dame where he was an assistant coach to accept a position with the Bengals. He had two tours of duty on the Notre Dame staff. He coached for the Irish from 1969 to 1975 under Ara Parseghian. He was freshman coach in 1969 and varsity receiver coach the next five years. His second tour at Notre Dame began in 1983 as pass receiver coach and recruiting coordinator, and he assumed responsibility for the special teams in 1984 and was offensive coordinator in 1985.

Stock also coached at Wisconsin where he was offensive coordinator from 1975-77 before taking over as head coach at Eastern Michigan from 1978-82.

He was an offensive backfield coach of the New Jersey Generals in the USFL in 1983.

Stock was an outstanding fullback at Northwestern under Parseghian. He was a two-year co-captain and All Big Ten Conference in 1959 and 1960. He also was Big Ten Conference Medal of Honor winner as a senior for academic and athletic performances.

He played for Saskatchewan of the Canadian Football League after graduating from Northwestern, but his playing career was curtailed by a knee injury.

Stock started his coaching career in 1961 as an assistant at Northwestern and then served in the U.S. Army for three years. He returned to coaching in 1965 at Akron (Ohio) South High School. He worked as freshman coach and scout at the University of Buffalo in 1966 and 1967 and coached receivers and the offensive backfield at the U.S. Naval Academy in 1968. Stock was born September 29, 1939. He and his wife, Peggy, have two sons, Michael and Patrick, and a daughter, Cynthia.



# CHUCK STUDLEY **Defensive Line**

Chuck Studley is in his third season in his second tour of duty as defensive line coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Studley returned to the Bengals February 8, 1989, after resigning as coach of the Miami Dolphins' linebackers. He was defensive coor-

dinator of the Dolphins for three seasons, 1984-85-86, and coached the linebackers 1987-88.

Studley was defensive line coach of the Bengals from 1969 through 1978. He worked on the coaching staffs of Paul Brown (1969-75) and Bill Johnson (1976-78). Brown is an owner, vice president and general manager of the Bengals and Johnson was tight ends coach until retiring following the 1990 season.

In 1979, Studley left the Bengals to become defensive coordinator of the San Francisco 49ers under head coach Bill Walsh who he worked with earlier in Cincinnati. He was 49ers defensive coordinator from 1979-82. Cincinnati head coach Sam Wyche was quarterback and passing game coach of the 49ers during the same years.

Studley became defensive coordinator of the Houston Oilers in 1983 and became interim head coach after the team got off to an 0-6 start. He finished 2-8-0.

Studley first came to the Queen City in 1961 as head coach of the University of Cincinnati Bearcats. He directed UC to two Missouri Valley Conference championships.

He coached the University of Massachusetts to the Yankee Conference championship in 1960.

Born in Maywood, III., January 17, 1929, Studley was an All-Merican guard at the University of Illinois (1949-51), captaining its undefeated 1951 team that went to the Rose bowl. He began his coaching career at Alton (III.) High School (1952-54) before returning to Illinois as an assistant.

He and his wife, Peggy, have six children, Carole, Doug, Sue, David, Mike and Steve.



# KIM WOOD Strength Coach

Kim Wood is in his 17th season as the Cincinnati Bengals strength coach.

Wood has played a big part in developing the Bengals into one of the strongest and best conditioned teams in the NFL. He has instilled pride and dedication in physical fitness with

the players.

Wood, who became Cincinnati's first fulltime strength coach in 1975, has been one of the leaders in training programs and is credited with many techniques being used throughout football. He has set up programs for a number of NFL and college teams.

An outstanding running back at the University of Wisconsin during his college days, Wood also is associated with Hammer, a strength developing organization.



Eric Ball, the first player drafted by the Cincinnati Bengals in 1989, is starting his third season in the National Football League ... The 24-year-old running back from UCLA, who was drafted in the second round, has displayed fine potential and his production has been good ... His big play in 1990 was the reception of a 48-yard touchdown pass, only his second pass catch of the season, from Boomer Esiason to give the Bengals a 21-14 victory over the Cleveland Browns in the final regular season game ... Ball rushed for 72 yards on 22 attempts and one touchdown in 1990 ... He caught two passes for 46 yards ... In the Bengals' two playoff games, Ball rushed for 45 yards on 12 attempts and scored one touchdown

.... In his two seasons with the Bengals, Ball has rushed for 463 yards on 120 attempts for a 3.9 yards average and four touchdowns .... He has eight pass receptions for 90 yards and a touchdown

Ball has happy thoughts about his fourth-quarter TD catch against the Browns which helped lift the Bengals into the playoffs... "The Browns' defense was playing the run," Ball said. "All I did was block the corner, swing out and get behind them. They were certainly expecting the off-tackle run by Ickey (Woods). No question Boomer (Esiason) is the best play action quarterback there is. I don't think there's anybody who fakes as well as he does on any team."... Ball remembered a pass in 1989 that didn't go as well

"Last year (1989) at Pittsburgh I was wide open in the end zone for a pass like that and I dropped it, so my main concern was first to catch the ball," he said. "The ball seemed to take forever to come down." . . . Ball works well in the Bengals' system, is smart and a quick learner... Good speed for his size and can play either run-ning back position ... "We ask Eric to do a lot of things," says coach Sam Wyche, "and he can do them all. He's a solid performer."... Ball is one of Esiason's favorites .... "Eric Ball is a very talented player," Esiason says. "He's a disciplined runner. If you tell him to hit a hole, he's going to be at that hole. I fee very confident with Eric."... Ball is regarded as one of the Bengals best special teams players by coach Marv Braden . . . He played on both coverage teams at the end of the season and was four kickoff returns shy of qualifying for fourth in the NFL with a 22.9 yards average . . . Breech uses his experience to counter any slumps and he hasn't had many ... "Usually there's a good reason, and if I think through it I can usually come up with a good answer," Breech said. "The longer you do something, the more you learn about what you're doing and you can make adjustments. I'll go home and get it straightened out in my head as to what I felt I was doing wrong. It's usually just minor things. You go through the kick in your head, and as you do it mentally you try to feel what it was like physically, or what it should feel like. A lot of times for me it's tempo. I get to rushing the kick a little too much and that throws the timing off. The good thing about having done it for a while is I can usually pick up the problem pretty quickly." . . . Breech is one of the better athletes among the Bengals .... He plays golf, softball and basketball and was offered a professional baseball contract before entering the NFL . . . He is an excellent golfer and uses the sport to help him analyze his kicking game ... He thinks about kicking in terms of his golf stroke, then the whole concept is just like the golf swing — keeping your left side in, swinging up through the ball. You run into the same problem coming from outside in, coming across the ball and not keeping your head down. It's uncanny."... Two of Breech's finest efforts have come against the uncanny." San Francisco 49ers He was three-for-three in field goal attempts in Super Bowl XXIII and four-for-four against the 49ers in a regular season game in 1987 when he led the AFC in scoring with 97 points on 24 of 30 field goal attempts and 25 of 27 PAT tries Breech has been four-for-four in field goal attempts four times . He kicked five field goals against Houston in 1987 in his career . ... Soccer style kicker although he never played soccer .... He says he was impressed with soccer style kicker Jan Stenerud when he watched him kick for Montana State in the 1968 Camellia Bowl in Sacramento, Calif., where Breech grew up . . . Set Bengal season scoring record with 120 points on 24 of 33 field goal tries and 48 of 50 extra point attempts in 1985 to top his old record of 115

in 1981, the year the Bengals won the AFC championship and went on to Super Bowl XVI... Has won many games with winning field goals in the final moments or in overtime periods for the Bengals ... Breech's 20-yard field goal gave Cincinnati a 20-17 overtime victory over Washington on the road to Super Bowl XXIII... His 32-yard field goal was the margin in the Bengals 30-27 win in overtime over the Chiefs in 1987... Last season his 44-yard field goal gave the Bengals a 34-31 victory over the Rams in overtime . . . He won a game against the Browns in 1984 with a field goal in overtime . . . Breech was an outstanding kicker for California where he holds many records including four field goals in one game . . . He was successful on 51 of 80 field goal attempts for the Golden Bears . . . Very diligent worker for charitable groups . . . A member of the Bengals Super Star Competition team which visits Greater Cincinnati area schools and speaks to the students at assemblies on the evils and detrimental effects of drugs ... Breech was a speaker at the Cincinnati "Know to Say No" anti-drug rally for youths ... Co-chairman with former Bengals' safety Robert Jack-son in Cincinnati's "Take It To The Streets" Walk-A-Thon against substance abuse ... Chairman of the Hamilton County Park's annual Family Fishing Festival which benefits the Muscular Dystro-phy Association ... Member of the Anderson Township Park Board . . . "I'm honored to be a member of the board," Breech savs. "It's a great opportunity for me. We (my wife and family) spend a lot of time in the township parks for soccer games and just going to the playground for fun. "I think kids identify with me. Mike Brennan is a highly-regarded young offensive lineman who was drafted by the Cincinnati Bengals in the fourth-round in 1990 ... "He learned a lot in his rookie year," says Cincinnati offensive line coach Jim McNally. "He played well in short yardage situations and should develop into an outstanding player because of all the physical abilities he possesses." . . . McNally hopes to work Brennan at guard and also at center during training camp . . . "He has the agility and balance for those positions, and I think he can become a center," McNally added. "He's not a 300-pounder, so he has more agility than those big guys. I envision him as a player who can get into an opponent with quickness and get good leverage McNally says Brennan is still in the learning stages of becoming an offensive lineman. Cincinnati's brilliant running back James Brooks, the team's alltime leading rusher, rushed for 1004 yards, averaging 5.2 yards an attempt, last season for the AFC Central Division champions . . . Brooks rushed for 100-yards or more twice — 105 against Pittsburgh and 201 against Houston — to take the alltime team lead in that category by doing it 15 times in six seasons with the Bengals

... His 201-yards rushing output also is tops in a game in Cincinnati history .... In playoff games, Brooks' playing time was curtailed because of a broken thumb, but he gained 46 yards on 17 carries .... A big threat as a pass receiver, Brooks caught 26 for 269 yards, a 10.3 yards average, and four for touchdowns in 1990

... He also caught one in the playoffs for 22 yards ... Brooks was selected for the Pro Bowl and was one of the major contributors in the AFC's victory over the NFC, 23-21 ... He rushed for 36 yards and caught three passes for 47 yards in the AFC victory ... Brooks became the Bengals' alltime leading rusher in 1990 ... He has rushed for 5876 yards and passed Pete Johnson who rushed for 5421 yards for Cincinnati during the 1977-83 seasons ... It's somewhat ironic that the Bengals traded Johnson to the San Diego Chargers in 1984 in exchange for Brooks ... It resulted in being the best trade the Bengals have made ... "Obtaining Brooks in a trade for Pete Johnson produced more than anyone with the Bengals realized at the time, Mike Brown, assistant general manager says. "When we traded for him you would have been a little daft to think he could reel off the kind of offensive numbers he has," Brown said. "But he has. James is a very good player and the numbers he's established have proven it." ... Brooks rushed for the team record 201 yards in a 40-20 victory over the Houston Oilers last season ... His record day included runs of 56, 45 and 40 yards ... Brooks loves to cut back against aggressive defenses such as the Oilers ... Brooks has been over 1000-yards rushing three times in his 10-year career ... Brooks is a professional all the

way and does not complain when his number of carries is limited When asked why, he replied: "It's about growing up. If they don't give it to me, that's part of the game."... Brooks is extremely quick and needs little time to break free for a long run . . . "A half quick and needs inthe time to break nee for a long further with a second," he said. "If I don't get through there in a half-second I'm dead."... Brooks doesn't get the notoriety he deserves, but he isn't bothered ... "I don't worry about it," he said. "I just sit back and laugh. I know I can play. I live a nice, comfortable life. I'm not going to be one to complain. If it doesn't happen, it doesn't hap-... Brooks' career rushing statistics for 10 seasons - three pen. with San Diego and seven with Cincinnati - are 7293 yards, on 1515 attempts, an average of 4.8 yards per carry and 47 touch-downs . . . In the pass receiving department, he has caught 334 for 3284 yards, 9.8 yards a reception, and 28 for touchdowns Brooks was the Chargers first-round draft choice in 1981 after averaging 5.7 yards a carry at Auburn and he piled up big yardage rushing, pass receiving and returning kickoffs and punts for three seasons before being traded to Cincinnati . . . He is among 14 play-ers in NFL history with 2000 or more yards in rushing, receptions and returns . . . An outstanding runner in high school and college, it took Brooks some time to develop his superb passing catching skills, mainly because he was never a prime target until he joined the Bengals ... "I ran the ball in high school (Warner Robbins, Ga.) about 30 times a game," Brooks said. "At Auburn, we didn't believe in throwing the ball. I caught one pass, a little screen pass, my whole career. It was the only pass they threw to me. Brooks' catching ability amazes guarterback Boomer Esiason 'J.B. makes catches that running backs just don't make," Esiason

says. "He's got great hand-to-eye coordination, he's very smooth on his feet, and he knows where he is in relation to where defenders are."... Brooks is an extremely hard worker and has excellent practice habits . . . He is all business .... Being in the best of condition is one of his prime goals . . . "Being in condition is one thing I pride myself in," Brooks said, "I set my goals higher and higher each year. People look at me and say I'm getting older. What they don't know is that I also am getting faster. I push myself. I think I work harder in the off-season than I do in the regular season. I want to be the best in my field, I push myself hard so I know no one can push me as hard as I've already pushed myself, I've been really blessed to be able to do all the things that I can do." Cincinnati coach Sam Wyche admires Brooks and the way he performs . . . "J.B.'s more than a running back," said Wyche. "He's also a wide receiver and blocking back. More important, though, he's a team player. He takes good care of himself, and he can run forever. He's one of those guys who is first on the practice field and stays," said Wyche. "He runs an extra 20 yards on every practice play and gives it everything he's got."... Brooks runs many gassers (sprints) at the end of practice sessions . . . "I push myself. I could go easy, but I push myself to run hard. I'm not satisfied to be 'all right.'" When Brooks entered Auburn, top backs, Joe Cribbs and William Andrews were on the squad ... "It didn't frighten me because I like competition," Brooks said.... Andrews Andrews became a blocker for Brooks and Cribbs ... Brooks broke the Auburn career rushing record and his mark held until Bo Jackson topped it ... "We've had some great backs here," said Auburn assistant coach Frank Young. "If I had to give the football to one once we got inside the 20-yard line, it'd be James Brooks, because he wants to cross that goal line." . . . Brooks is busy during the offseason doing other things in addition to his all-out conditioning pro-gram. He conducted his second "Who Dey Football Camp" for children at Mt. St. Joseph College ... He also plays softball and basketball, bowls and does some traveling ... He was an All-American at Auburn where his darting running style and explosiveness destroyed opponents , . . He also was selected to the high school All-America team while at Warner Robbins where he rushed for 45 TDs and more than 3000 yards in three seasons Warner Robbins was 31-2 during his stay and was voted high school co-national champions with Cincinnati Moeller in 1976 .... He and his wife, Simone, have a daughter, Jasmyn Raquel, 1 ... Brooks was born December 28, 1958 ... Hometown is Warner Robbins, Ga. ... Lives in Villa Hills, Ky.

#### **BROOKS IS BIG ENOUGH**

James Brooks has had to listen to people say "he's too small" for a long time. His play in the National Football League has silenced most of them.

As a college freshman, Brooks went on the football field as a 150-pound halfback and many said he was too small to take the pounding of major college football, a criticism he has heard throughout his career.

Of course, JB proved his detractors wrong, became an All-American and was the top running back on an Auburn team that also included former NFL stars William Andrews and Joe Cribbs.

Brooks says his size, now 5-10, 180, is an asset.

"A lot of tacklers forget to wrap up the ball carrier in the pros, because they are so big they just think they can knock you down," says Brooks. "They look at me, and think they're just going to push me out of the way. But, it's not that easy, because I'm on the move at the same time. A lot of big defensive linemen hit you with their chest when they tackle you. They don't put their helmets to you and that's a big plus because I can bounce 20 yards down the field."

That's JB's approach to the game; always light for those extra yards.

Eddie Brown is among the top-flight wide receivers in the National Football League . Cincinnati Bengals' coach Sam Wyche says the team tries to devise as many ways to get the ball to him as possible... "He's a threat every time he handles the football," Wyche said. "He's an outstanding athlete." ... Brown led the Bengals in pass receptions last season with 44 for 706 yards, 16.0 average, and nine for touchdowns ... He also had four receptions for 32 yards in the two playoff games ... In six seasons with the Bengals, Brown has caught 304 passes for 5309 yards, an aver-age of 17.5 yards a catch, and 38 touchdowns . . . He's third on the Bengals' alltime pass reception list behind Isaac Curtis and Cris Collinsworth . . . Brown, the Bengals' first-round draft choice in 1985 after being an All-American at Miami (Fla.), holds the Cincinnati record for pass reception yards in a game with 216 on seven catches in a 42-7 victory over Pittsburgh in 1988.... Brown has all the assets a top receiver needs plus more . . . He has tremendous acceleration off the line of scrimmage, quickness, the ability to make leaping catches and run like a talented running back in the open field and a soft pair of hands . . . But, he's also an excellent "He's an outstanding blocker as well as a receiver, blocker . . . says Mike Stock, tight ends coach who coached the receivers last season. "He's as good a blocker at the wide receiver position as you can find anywhere in the NFL. If he has a blocking assignment, he fulfills his obligation. When a receiver or a running back breaks the line of scrimmage and goes into the open field, we can feel confident that Eddie Brown is going to make a good block for him for a few extra yards. He's always looking for the chance to cut somebody, knock them down and make them pay the price if we're not throwing the pass."... Brown enjoys the Bengals' offense and playing under Wyche .... "The offense is an explosive offense," Brown says. "A receiver gets to do a lot. It's fun when it's clicking and moving down the field. He (Wyche) tends to put me in motion a lot, so I am able to move around and make adjustments on my own routes." . . Brown, who is quiet, says his goals are to go back to the Super Bowl and win, break some more records and go to the Pro Bowl again (he went in 1989) ... Brown was Week 2 AFC Offensive Player of the Week after he caught 10 passes for 178 yards and two touchdowns in the Bengals 21-16 victory over the Chargers in San Diego ... He experienced the funniest moment in his career in that game. "It was a ball that was thrown to me and I thought I had it when my hands came down, but the ball hit me on the top of my head. As I turned around with my arms out, the ball just dropped right into my hands. I wasn't even looking. It was funny when I saw it on film after the game." .... Brown was the consensus NFL Rookie of the Year in 1985 when he caught 53 passes for 942 yards, 17.8 yards average, and eight touchdowns

... He is second in touchdown pass receptions in a season with nine twice (1988 and 1990), one short of 10 by Isaac Curtis in 1974 ... Brown has caught 50 or more passes in four (1985, 86, 88, 89) of his six seasons ... He missed the 50 mark in strike-shortened 1987 and in 1990 ... Brown is one of seven Bengals ever to catch 50 or more passes in a season ... He works with "play dough" to strengthen his hands ... He did a good job in his first season with the Bengals and fifth in the National Football League ... Carter and Rod Jones, also obtained in a trade, plugged some holes in the Cincinnati secondary early in the season ... "They did a really good job for us," defensive coordinator Dick LeBeau said. "Both of them got here extremely late and had to get a little on-the-job training, pick up the system in the games."

#### A DREAM CAME TRUE

"I can remember playing football at a friend's house when I was a little kid," Bengals' free safety Rickey Dixon said. "We always used to play there. His name was Ronnie. His mother, Jackie, always asked the kids what we wanted to be when we grew up. Some kids would say a fireman, or a race-car driver. I always said I wanted to be a football player and play in front of big crowds of people. This is what I always wanted to do. This is my dream."

#### BENGALS, RAMS PRODUCE NFL FIRST

The Bengals — Rams game last season produced a National Football League first when five receivers topped 100 yards on receptions. For the Bengals who won the game 34-31 in overtime, tight end Rodney Holman caught 10 passes for 161 yards, wide receiver Tim McGee, eight for 142 yards, and running back James Brooks, seven for 109 yards and two touchdowns. For the Rams, wide receiver Willie Anderson caught seven passes for 144 yards and a touchdown and wide receiver Henry Ellard also caught seven for 100 yards.

#### WHY BOOMER?

Two or three people overheard me and picked up on it. Whenever they called they'd ask, 'How's Boomer doing?" It's a real life story. He had his nickname before he was born."

Boomer Esiason, one of the most exciting and productive guarterbacks in the National Football League, is beginning his eighth season with the Cincinnati Bengals . . . Esiason set the Bengals' record for passing yardage with 490 yards against the Los Angeles Rams in a 34-31 overtime road victory last season . . . He completed 31 of 45 passes, three for touchdowns and had no interceptions. . . His season totals were 224 of 402 for 2931 yards, 55.7 percent, 24 touchdowns and 22 interceptions. . . In the two playoff games, Esiason was 22 of 35 for 254 yards, 69.2 percentage, three touchdowns and no interceptions ... His career totals for Cincinnati are: Passing, 2686 attempts, 1520 completions, 56.6%, 21,381 yards, 150 touchdowns, 98 interceptions; Rushing, 286 attempts, 1231 yards, 4.3 yards average, five touchdowns; Punt-ing, four for 120 yards, 30 yards average . . . Esiason who was voted to the Pro Bowl following the 1988 and 1989 seasons, has passed for 400 yards or more in a game three times - 490 against the Los Angeles Rams last season to set a club record, 425 against the New York Jets in 1986, and 409 against Pittsburgh in 1985 ... He has passed for 300 yards or more in 17 games ... Esiason has passed for touchdowns five times, a club record, in two games — vs. Tampa Bay in 1988 and vs. New York Jets in 1986 . He won the NFL Most Valuable Player Award in 1988 after leading the Bengals to the AFC Championship and into Super Bowl XXIII... He was a consensus All-Pro in 1988... "Boomer Esia-son is in his prime," Wyche said. "As a young quarterback, he showed the promise that he is now fulfilling. His leadership, as well as his technical skill, makes the 1991 season an exciting one to look forward to by fans, coaches and players alike." ..., Esiason has an "exceptional overview of the game and he is able to help others," says All-Pro tackle Anthony Munoz . . . Many times Esiason attends meetings of the offensive linemen, watches films with them and discusses the game with all the players .... "I'm not going to tell you I'm the next Einstein," Esiason said, "but I've got common sense and I'm quick on my feet, and that's good to have in football. I have a lot of confidence in myself as a person and as a player, and that has come through some hard lumps. I'm into football in all areas and want to help in any and all the ways I can." Esiason puts the heat on himself when the Bengals are not going as well as he thinks they should . . . "I think that's part of playing quarterback, of having an ego not so fragile that you can't take a little heat," Esiason said. "I've never backed down from my responsibility as a quarterback. I'll never, ever publicly or privately. put a bad performance by myself on other players. I don't think that's expected of me around here." ... Esiason fits perfectly with the Bengals' style of attack ... "He has one of the best throwing arms in the game," Wyche said. "He has a strong arm and is accu-rate and has mobility." ... Kansas City coach Marty Schottenheimer, former Cleveland coach, says preparing for Esiason is what it must be like in the NBA getting ready for Michael Jordan "because Boomer can do so many things with the ball." . Second-round draft choice from Maryland in 1984 and was the first quarterback selected . . . He started four games in his rookie season and became the fulltime starter in 1985 . . . He compiled the best passing records in Maryland history, rewriting the Terps' record book . . . His career totals were 461 completions of 850 passes for 54.2%, 6259 yards, 42 touchdowns and 27 interceptions .... Esiason is a definite leader and has the ideal makeup for a quarterback ... He's a strong player who plays with injuries ... Eslason's statistics were off somewhat in 1990, but the top people in the Bengals' organization weren't worrying... "Statistically, he's not doing as well, he knows that," said Mike Brown, assistant general manager, during the season. "The interceptions are up. We

haven't thrown the ball in 1990 as well as we have in recent seasons. Notwithstanding all of that, if he gets us to the playoffs he's done his job. (He did.) His job is to win football games, not statisti-cal appraisal."....Wyche said: "He's standing there with the ball in his hands, so every time something goes wrong he is partly responsible in the fans' eyes. He's had some weeks that were not among his best, but they haven't been disaster weeks and they haven't been anything virtually any other quarterback in the league goes through." . . . Esiason, along with quarterback Dan Marino of Miami and Warren Moon of Houston, was an analyst for USA Net-work television coverage of the World League of American Football in its opening season in 1991 . . . Esiason is a national spokesman for the National Arthritis Foundation and has hosted a golf tournament for the organization for the last six years . . . Active member of the Long Island Celebrity Golf tourney which benefits numerous charities .... "Bengals Man-of-the-Year" in 1987 for his contributions to charitable causes . . . Winner of the "Marge Schott (Cincinnati Reds' owner) Citizen of the Year Award" in 1986 at the Arthritis Foundation's benefit "Auction Aperitif" ... Honored by the National Association for Sports and Physical Education . . Color analyst for television on coverage of the World Football League ... James Francis was an outstanding first-round draft selection for the Cincinnati Bengals in 1990 ..... The big linebacker from Baylor did everything he was asked to do and more . . . He was one of the very top rookies in the National Football League and won numer-ous honors ... "What more could he have done?" linebacker coach Dick Selcer asked. "He rushed. He covered. He played special teams. And he hasn't said a word." . . . Francis does all his talking on the football field . . . He led the Bengals in tackles with 78 — 63 solos and 15 assists . . . He also had eight sacks and returned a pass interception 17 yards for a touchdown against Cleveland . . . He also had four tackles on special teams . . . In the two playoff games, he had eight tackles and a fumble recovery . . . Francis played more snaps than any other defensive player . . . He pressures quarterbacks and breaks up passes with his speed and quickness . . . He can rush and cover and is a tremendous athlete . . Selcer says Francis has NBA skills and that he reminds him of Robert Brazile, a former Houston linebacker . . . Because his NBA caliber skills - speed, quickness, strength, agility, footwork - the Bengals can use Francis in several ways - outside linebacker, down lineman, middle linebacker and only linebacker in the nickel Francis is happy and is learning ... "You can be in a position of trying to learn too much," he said. "They didn't want to put too much on me. I think coach (Dick) LeBeau (defensive coordinator) did a good job of playing me here and there and not trying to put pressure on me. I played a lot of spots, but at the same time he kept it simple." . . . He's most comfortable at outside linebacker, the position he was drafted to play ... "I'm more comfortable and have more opportunities to make big plays at outside linebacker. I can roam the field more." .... Francis is slated to work at inside linebacker this season . . . He plays as if he is on a "search and destroy mission." . . . When Francis was growing up in La Marque, Texas, linebacker Bob Brazile of the Houston Ollers was one of his favorites . . . "I was a Houston fan," Francis recalled. "I switched to being a Cowboys' fan after my brother (cornerback Ron) was drafted (No. 2 by Dallas in 1987)." ... Basketball was Francis' game early ... USA Today named Cincinnati Bengals' linebacker James Francis its 1990 AFC Defensive Rookie of the Year.

Francis is a linebacker with the athletic skills of a basketball player: He's 6-5 and can run and jump. Dick Selcer, his coach with the Cincinnati Bengals, says Francis has "NBA skills."

Before turning to football as a Baylor University sophomore, he played football and basketball. "I went to college to play basketball," said Franics. "I thought I was going to be the next great player... but all those guys were 7-foot and 6-9."

Francis might be the next great linebacker. He was the Bengals' No. 1 pick in the draft. He started every game, led the team in tackles with 96 and in sacks with eight, getting seven in the first seven games.

Selcer says Francis has "an intuition, an instinct for football that you can't coach."

David Fulcher has established himself as an All-Pro strong safety . He has been selected for and played in three consecutive Pro Bowl games ... Despite missing three games last year because of a shoulder separation, Fulcher ranked second on the Bengals in total tackles with 75 - 53 solos - and tied for the team lead in pass interceptions with four . . . In the two playoff games, he had nine tackles — five solos, four assists and two pass interceptions Fulcher was selected AFC Defensive Player of the Week in the first week of the 1990 season for this splendid play in the Bengals 25-20 come-from-behind victory over the New York Jets ... Fulcher notched his first safety when he sacked Jets' guarterback Ken O'Brien in the end zone to set off the Bengals' late game-winning rally .... Besides the safety, Fulcher stopped the Jets with nine tackles and one assist and a pass interception ... He recorded nine tackles — seven solos, two assists — in the Bengals 20-17 overtime loss to the San Francisco 49ers . . . Fulcher was on the All-Pro teams selected by the Associated Press. United Press International, Football News and College and Pro Football Weekly .... The big, strong, hard-tackling Fulcher has earned the ultimate compliment from opposing coaches .... The opponents avoid his area of the field as much as possible .... But even if teams try to avoid him he finds a way to do damage ... He has that sense of knowing when the ball is going . . . "Championship teams are built around players like David Fulcher." Cincinnati coach Sam Wyche says . . . He has a way of making impact plays forcing fumbles, sacks, pass interceptions . . . He is excellent against the run . . . "I love to force the run," Fulcher says. "When I see a running back or a guard coming out to lead the sweep, that's a few seconds where I don't have to worry about all the team aspects of defense. It's just me against that guy one-on-one, and it's a great feeling to have the power to knock them down," ... Fulcher also likes to blitz. "Some players just seem to know where the ball is going," says Bengals' defensive coordinator Dick LeBeau. "David's that kind of a player. More than his size and athletic ability, I think that's what makes him such a productive player. We try to point him at the ball and let him go. There's no strong safety I'd rather have."... LeBeau says the best play he has seen Fulcher make was one in which he used all his best attributes quickness, instinct and big-play ability .... "We were playing Cleveland up there (1988)," LeBeau said. "He was on a rush and they had a screen play called, which is a pretty good play against a pressure defense. David, for some reason, instinctively felt the play, reacted off the block and reached up and intercepted Bernie Kosar's pass and ran it 30-something yards for a touchdown. It's unusual to see a blitzer react and intercept a screen pass. You might see it every seven or eight years. That's a special play." . . . A strong team leader, Fulcher has the respect of his teammates . . . The biggest strong safety in the NFL at 6-3 and 238 pounds, he Reggie Williams, who is now general manager of the New York-New Jersey Knights of the World Football League. "David has not

has forced the opponents to change their game plans completely." ... During the off-season, Fulcher underwent arthroscopic surgery on his left knee ... "They smoothed out some rough cartilage," he said ... Fulcher had knee problems early in the 1990 season but did not miss any games because of it although it limited his practice time ... Fulcher accepts responsibility on and off the field ... He's a caring man ... Fulcher adopted his wife Faith's niece and nephew who were orphaned when his sister-in-law died

Harold Green, the Cincinnati Bengals' second-round draft choice last year burst onto the scene in fine style in his rookie season in the NFL ... The talented young running back who started nine games for the Bengals, accounted for some good statistics in his first year by rushing for 353 yards on 83 attempts, a 4.3 yards average, and one touchdown ... His longest rush was 39 yards ... Green caught 12 passes for 90 yards, 7.5 yards per reception, and one for a touchdown .... In the two playoff games, he averaged five yards a carry with 11 for 55 and caught two passes for 15 yards and a touchdown ... Green was somewhat of a borus for the Bengals in the 1990 draft, coming in the second round ... Rodney Holman is a premier All-Pro tight end who is beginning his 10th season with the Cincinnati Bengals .... He has been selected for the Pro Bowl three consecutive years in which he displayed his brilliance in pass receiving and blocking . . . In 1990, Holman had 40 receptions for 596 yards, an average of 14.9 yards per catch, and five for touchdowns for the AFC Central Division champions

. In the two playoff games, he caught four passes for 102 yards, an average of 25.5 yards, including one for 46 yards against the Los Angeles Raiders . . . His biggest game of the 1990 season was in the Bengals' 34-31 victory over the Los Angeles Rams in overtime . . . Holman had 10 receptions for 161 yards . . . He caught five passes against San Diego and San Francisco. . A big man with excellent speed who has the ability to make the big play after he catches the ball . . . He is an outstanding blocker and has

the discipline of mind and body . . . His specialty is blocking down or "sealing" a linebacker or defensive end to open up a sweep "We try to get the man off the ball," Holman says. "I imagine we could hook block if we tried, but coach Bill Johnson (now retired) is from the school that wants them knocked off the ball, because then the running back has room to see and to run. If we don't get any movement with the man we're blocking, we're going to catch hell, I don't care how good the play goes" . . . Holman is a very quiet man and a dedicated player whose accomplishments sometimes seem to be overlooked . ... Perhaps, because he rarely talks about them . . . "In a football sense, I think he's all business," coach Sam Wyche says. "He takes notes in meetings, if there is something he doesn't fully understand, then he works with it until he does. I think he's just one of those guys who has to be totally offduty before he lightens up." . . . All-Pro strong safety David Fulcher sums up Holman this way: "He's just one of those guys that's cool, laid back and quiet. He's not into the hype and the outside world." Holman says he's "a quiet person, but I laugh and make jokes with my teammates." . . . He believes some of the lack of publicity could come from the position he plays . . . "You see writers coming up to the quarterback or the running backs or the receivers, the glamour positions, and talking about different things," Holman said. The only time they come to me is when I've had a spectacular play. Then it's one question and one line and they're packed around the quarterback again." ... A football writer called Holman the best player at a dead position . . . Holman doesn't agree . "With all these teams going to the run-and-shoot offense, it's sort of made tight ends obsolete," Holman said. "It's fashionable to run these kinds of offenses, like a few years ago when all these college teams were winning with the wishbone and everybody thought it was the offense to go with."....Mike Brown, the Bengals assistant general manager, said Holman was not well-known when the Bengals drafted him out of Tulane in 1982 . . . Lindy Infante, then as assistant coach with the Bengals and now head coach of the Green Bay Packers, had been an assistant coach at Tulane while Holman was there and recommended him .... "We had no idea that he was going to be a perennial all-pro," Brown said. "Rodney is the kind of player we look for," he added. "We look for players who are willing to work hard and compete to reach a level of success." . . . The Bengals got just that kind of player in Holman . Holman gets plenty of notice with his pass receptions, but he is equally efficient as a blocker . . . "People rarely notice individual blocks, " says former Cincinnati tight ends' coach Bill "Tiger" Johnson. "Heck, when I'm just watching a game, I don't notice them that often myself. But the tight end is right at the point of attack in our running game much more than people realize, and if he's not getting movement of his man off the line, the running game isn't going anywhere."... Johnson wishes Cincinnati fans could watch Holman in a game through his eyes .... "His blocking is a pretty thing to watch." ... Johnson ranks Holman with the best .... "There's no question in my mind that Rodney is one of the finest tight ends who ever played the game," said Johnson, a 33-year veteran of professional football coaching, "and I've seen most of the great ones." .... Holman has an exceptional knowledge of defenses .... "The thing I probably admire most about Rodney is his knowledge of defenses," tight end Jim Riggs commented. "When we're in meetings watching films of the other team, he's the first one to call out the defenses. He knows what he can do, even when things get real complicated, and it doesn't matter how tough you are physically if you don't know that." . . . Holman's blocking has played a big part in paving the way for him going to the Pro Bowl three consecutive years ... "Rodney's a quiet guy, and his name can get lost with the offensive stars we have," quarterback Boomer Esiason said. "But I'm not sure there's a better tight end in football." . Holman, who grew up in Ypsilanti, Mich., resides in football. the off-season in Slidell, La., which is located about 25 miles from New Orleans ... He said he developed an attraction to New Orleans while going to Tulane and decided to stay in the area Holman is an avid hunter and fisherman and annually gets his limits of fish and game in the bayou area . . . He remembers his father, Eddie, got him into the outdoors sports ... In fact, he fondly remembers how he got his first gun ... "I was hunting with my father and uncle," Holman recalled. "My father told me if I got a rabbit, he'd give me the gun. I wasn't a very good shot, but for

some reason that day I got a rabbit. I still have the gun."... Holman was an All-American at Tulane in 1981 and 1982... He is the green Wave's alltime leading pass receiver with 135 for 1512 yards, 33 short of the Tulane reception yardage record held by Alton Alexis, a former Bengal... He's a cousin of Preston Pearson, former Baltimore, Pittsburgh and Dallas running back ... Does charitable work at Children's Hospital of New Orleans and frequently speaks at schools. Speaks for drug awareness programs for school children and also those on the college level.... Works with Golf for Special Olympics. Youth Football Association and the Child Wish Program ... Rodney and his wife, Sandra, have two daughters, Shayla, 6, and Rachael, seven months .... Born April 20, 1960 in Ypsilanti, Mich., and lives in Slidell, La., during the off-season.

Reliable and versatile Stanford Jennings is in his eighth season with the Cincinnati Bengals . . . The multi-talented Jennings is the Bengals' kickoff return specialist and a solid running back . . . Last season, Jennings returned 29 kickoffs for 583 yards, 20.1 yards average, with his longest 33 yards ... He rushed for one touch-down and had 12 carries for 46 yards, a 3.8 yards average per attempt, and caught four passes for 23 yards . . . His career stalis-tics are: 136 kickoff returns for 2752 yards, 20.2 yards average, one touchdown (98 yards against Kansas City [club record] in 1988); rushing, 308 attempts, 1225 yards, 3.9 yards average, nine touchdowns; pass receiving, 107 receptions, 927 yards, 8.5 yards average, nine touchdowns. Jennings' biggest kickoff return came in Super Bowl XXIII, one day after his wife Kathy presented him with a daughter, Kelsey ... "That kickoff return for a touch-down was for Kelsey Amanda," Jennings said ... Jennings was drafted by the Bengals in the third round in 1984 after he set rushing records at Furman and led the Southern Conference in 1981-82-83 . . . Coach Sam Wyche refers to him as "Mr. Reliable." "He's really a jack-of-all-trades," says Wyche. "He's a kick returner, running back, pass receiver, blocker. We don't hesitate to put him into any circumstances. We have no reservations with Stanford Jennings."... Jennings has played halfback and fullback for Cincinnati . . . Perhaps, his biggest rushing game in the NFL came against the Los Angeles Raiders in 1989 when he replaced an injured James Brooks and gained 92 yards on 19 carries for a 4.8 yards average . . . Paul Jetton came to the Cincinnati Bengals as a sixth-round draft choice from Texas in 1988 and has displayed good potential despite some injuries . . . Jetton played in 15 games in 1990 and started at guard in the playoff game against the Los Angeles Raiders ... Jetton was sidelined for the 1988 season and was on injured reserve with finger problems .... In 1989, he started two games and played in six before a knee injury ended his year . . . Offensive line coach Jim McNally likes the versatility Jetton possesses . . . "He can play guard, tackle or center and is a good snapper," says McNally. "He'll compete, and he'll fight you. He works hard in the weight room and he may be our strongest offensive lineman. He's got functional football strength. Some guys are strong, but they don't know how to use their strength. We really like him, he's tough. He's a good blocker with quick feet and good speed. We want him to play." . . . Coach Sam Wyche commented: Paul Jetton is a good young offensive lineman. He does well. He is sharp on assignments. He doesn't miss them. His execution is very good. We have high hopes for him and he should be a factor in the offensive line.".... There is no doubt Jetton can play with pain . . He broke his finger on the second day of training camp in 1988, but practiced four weeks before it was decided surgery was

needed . . . He hesitated about telling anyone about his injury . . . "I didn't realize how bad it was," said Jetton . . . A guard at Texas, Jetton works hard when used at center: "When I first came to Cin-

Lee Johnson is a superb punter and kickoff specialist, and his attributes have helped the Cincinnati Bengals greatly since he joined them in 1988 in the early season after being waived by Cleveland . . . The left-footed punter and kicker has a very strong vards deep and in the air 4.28 or 4.35 seconds," Braden said The enemy doesn't get a good chance for a big return when Johnson is kicking off .... "Lee's long and lean," Braden said. "He's got a great lever. It's not that he's so strong, just a real fine leg swing coming through the ball. If you had a high-speed sequence of photographs, I think people would be amazed how much he must compress the ball when he kicks off," Braden said . . . Johnson is left-footed and gets an unorthodox rotation on the football, both kicking off and punting .... He kicks the opponents some disconcerting knuckleballs Johnson finished third in punting in the AFC in 1990 with 64 punts for 2705 yards for an average of 42.3 yards and a net of 34.3 ... He punted inside the 20-yard-line 12 times and had eight touchbacks ... He averaged a lofty 49.1 on eight punts in the playoffs .... Johnson isn't totally happy with his punting, but Braden likes it .... "He's capable of being a very good punter." Braden said. "At times, he's his own worst enemy. He batites himself. I want to get him to where he's satisfied in doing two things — first, eliminate bad punts altogether, and second, be happy with what we would say is a good punter. I think Lee goes out there and wants to punt like he kicks off. He wants the great ball. If he doesn't get it, he's frustrated. But he's got a good leg."

. He hit some great punts last season (two for 70 yards each) . . Braden says Johnson has a tendency to overwork . . . "If Lee's got a fault, and I've told him this, it's that he overkicks," said Braden. "I don't want to see him overwork. I want him to stay fresh. But, the thing I like, he's unselfish. We get in plus-territory (across mid-field) and he's tanking the ball up high instead of kicking it through the end zone," . . . The latter boosts the average and the former helps field position . . . Johnson produced the two longest punts in the NFL last season . . . He had a 70-yarder against New England and a second one against Cleveland at Cleveland ... H + was also 1.000% in the passing department with a touchdown loss to tight end Rodney Holman . . . Johnson has made the rounds of the AFC Central Division since graduating from Brigham Young in 1985. He was drafted by Houston in the fifth round in 1985 and was with the Oilers two-and-one-half years before moving to Cleveland in 1986 . . He came to the Bengals in 1988 . . The only AFC Central team he has missed is Pittsburgh . . The Bengals grabbed him as soon as the Browns waived him in the early part of the 1988 season and his punting and kickoffs played a big part in bringing the AFC Championship and a berth in Super Bowl XXIII to Cincinnati . . . Johnson strives for consistency . . "It's a combination," he said, of mostly mind and a little bit of matter. The mental part comes from adopting what I can of an 'I don't care' attitude. You finally

come to realize that it's easy to get cut, that it happens to punters all the time, and that you're not going to let it tear you up if it hap-pens to you. It takes some pressure off. The physical part is that I wear a shoe to punt now (he had punted barefoot). The shoe gives me a little more control, even though I don't get some of the 65-yarders I got without it. But the shoe thing has a mental aspect, too, because now I'm like everybody else. I don't worry about being different or about slipping in bad weather on a bare foot." Johnson changed from a barefoot punter to wearing a shoe when he joined the Bengals ... "As soon as I got here, I kept the shoe Johnson said. . . He believes he's fortunate the way his footon. "I'm the luckiest player in the ball career has turned out league, because I've gone from Houston to Cleveland (1987), and I'm in the AFC Championship game, and from Cleveland to Cincinnati and I'm in the Super Bowl and then a couple of years later in the playoffs," Johnson said. "For a player who is getting waived left and right each year to get on a Super Bowl or Super Bowl caliber team is very unique, very unusual - especially to come in and have such a semi-role and move up to a larger role." ... Tight end Eric Kattus had a splendid season for Cincinnati in 1990 when he caught 11 passes for 145 yards, 13.2 yards average per catch, and two for touchdowns ... He also put his excellent blocking to work ... In two playoff games, Kattus had two pass receptions for 19 yards, 9.5 yards average, and one touchdown... In his five seasons with the Bengals, he has 54 receptions for 562 yards, 10.4 yards average, and five touchdowns ... Kattus, like all players, wants to be a starter, but he understands his role as a backup to the talented Rodney Holman, who has been a Pro Bowl selection the last three seasons ... Kattus has great respect for Holman ... "He's an all-pro, there's no doubt about it," Kattus says. "He can do so many things. He's almost like a wide receiver. He can run and he can block. He's a prototype tight end. If I wasn't behind Rodney Holman and not playing, I wouldn't be happy. But

we get our chances. There's a lot of ball being played. I'm happy." ... Holman says Kattus and Jim Riggs, another tight end, "could be starting anywhere in the league, no doubt."... Cincinnati coach Sam Wyche calls Holman, Kattus and Riggs the best tight end combination in the NFL.... "We've got three," Wyche said. "We try to get our horses in the game when we've felt like the running game would work. They get some balls thrown their way, but their main task in that framework is to block. We've had Eric line up in the backfield, taking on a defensive lineman when we wanted to 'slide' our line. We've mixed it up," Wyche added ... Kattus grabbed some of the spotlight in the Bengals 40-20 victory Houston late in the season at Riverfront Stadium by catching two touchdown passes for quarterback Boomer Esiason . . . He caught the over Pittsburgh at Riverfront Stadium .... He had three pass receptions for 63 yards and each catch came on key possessions which led to Cincinnati scores . . . Kattus got an "A" for his blocking in the Bengals 21-16 early season win over San Diego ... "He meant just as much to this victory as Eddie Brown (10 pass receptions, 178 yards, two touchdowns) and Lewis Billups (six tackles, a pass interception and a fumble recovery)," Wyche said . . . . Kattus blocked Chargers defensive end Burt Grossman and at times outside linebacker Leslie O'Neil which allowed Cincinnati's interior to double team Lee Williams, an AFC sack leader . . . "It's something we worked on in training camp," Kattus said of blocking the bigger Grossman. "I stepped up and took a deep angle on him and tried not to let him get outside. He's a bull, so you had to dig your feet in once you made the block or he'd run over you." . . . Kattus was a high school star in football and basketball before going to Michigan ... He was "Player of the Year" and All-Cincinnati in football and basketball at Colerain High School ... He made the Parade Maga-

zine High School All-America team in his senior year when he caught 53 passes for 923 yards, an average of 17.4 yards a catch ... In basketball, he averaged 16.4 rebounds in his senior year ...

At Michigan, Kattus, who was a tri-captain in his senior season, caught 42 passes for 605 yards, 14.3 yards average, and 10 for touchdowns ... He played in four bowl games while with the Wolverines — Rose, Fiesta, Sugar and Bluebonnet ... He was a National Football Foundation Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete Award winner for the Cincinnati chapter in 1983... Works for West Shell Commercial during the off-season ... Born March 4, 1963... Hometown is Cincinnati, Ohio.

Bruce Kozerski, a smart, talented offensive lineman is beginning his eighth season in the NFL and fourth as the Cincinnati Bengals starting center . . . He has started at all five offensive line positions during his career with the Bengals which began in 1984 when he was a ninth-round draft choice from Holy Cross . . . The smart and intelligent Kozerski, a physics major at Holy Cross and an honor student with a 3.7 grade average, calls the blocking schemes at the line of scrimmage . . . After a play is called, Kozerski checks the defensive alignment and matches a blocking-system he thinks "It's a center's job because he has will be productive against it . . . the best overall view," Kozerski says. "A good quarterback can look at a defense and see a weakness, maybe a 'cover two,' and know how to exploit it," says Kozerski. "A good offensive lineman can look at a front and recognize a weakness. They (opponents) have to give you something." . . . Kozerski points out that most of the blocking calls are code words keyed to certain techniques "A lot of it is word association," the center said, "whatever's easiest to remember. It can be fun sometimes, making up those words. You've got to have fun when you play this game, or else it's work. . . Kozerski says linemen adjust their actions as the game progresses .... "That's what a lot of our talks on the sideline are about," he said. "We're trying to figure out what will work the best." . . Offensive line coach Jim McNally says Kozerski is "one of our keys and is as good as any center in the league." .... A dominating blocker ... He has good techniques, quickness, agility and instincts ... "He's always in the right position," McNally said. "He could play all offensive line positions, and has. He's intelligent, very smart, and it is a big thing with him. He uses his head. Kozerski was a starter at right guard in 1986 but moved to center for four games . . . In 1987, he played at guard and tackle . . . Then he went to center to stay . . . He says playing center meant chang-ing techniques . . . "It wasn't a mental adjustment as much as it was techniques," Kozerski said. "Your blocking changes quite a bit because you have a man on your head every play. You're not chas-ing 230-pound linebackers, you're blocking 280-pound linemen. If now more comfortable at center than at any time . . . "I've moved from position to position during my career, but now I'm where I want to stay." ... Coach Sam Wyche says Kozerski is very valu-able because of his versatility .... "There is a mastering of versatility," Wyche said. "You have to have some of those players. Bruce does it."... Excellent snapper ... He was first-team All-America, first-leam Academic All-America, first-team All-ECAC, first-team All New England, and was awarded an NCAA post graduate scholarship as one of the nation's leading student athletes . . . He was a National Honor Student and majored in physics . . . In his four sea-sons at Holy Cross, the Crusaders went 3-8, 6-5, 8-3 and 9-2-1 and reached the NCAA Division 1AA playoffs in 1983 and won the Lambert Cup as the East's top team in its class . . . Kozerski developed a philosophy about football while at Holy Cross where he was a four-year starter: "When you walk onto the football field you have no friends. Being on the offensive line teaches you one thing, someone is going to lose a battle on every snap and someone is going to win. During my first year, especially, I learned that the one guy that was going to get beat on was me. I hope I've changed that a little." . He sure has . . . Very active member of the Bengals' Super Star Competition Program in which players speak at Cincinnati area schools on the dangers of drugs and alcohol . . . Works with Athletes in Action . . . Hobbies include fishing, hunting, soft-ball, basketball, camping, hiking and golf . . . Represents Hammer Strength in New England . . . He and his wife, Elizabeth, have a son, Matthew, 3 . . . Born April 3, 1962. . . Hometown is Plains, Pa. .... Lives in Edgewood, Ky.

Tim Krumrie, the Cincinnati Bengals rough and ready nose tackle. is beginning his ninth season in professional football . . . Krumrie, an All-Pro selection in 1988, has recovered from an operation on his left leg which he broke in Super Bowl XXIII against the San Francisco 49ers . . . Krumrie returned to action in 1989 and was at full strength in 1990 . . . Since the operation. Krumrie plays with a metal rod in his left leg .... The rod will remain there until he quits playing .... "They are not going to take it out until my career is over," Krumrie said. "When the rod comes out, I'll be done playing football. They explained there was so much new bone formed around the rod that there would be too much trauma to the leg to take the rod out. I don't feel the rod anymore. It's all healed. There's no crack anymore. It's solid.".... "He's a tremendous player and a tremendous person," says Cincinnati coach Sam Wyche ... It's unusual when a nose tackle leads the team in tackles, but Krumrie has done it in four of the last six seasons . . . In 1990, he was fourth with 68 tackles — 45 solos and 23 assists — two sacks and a fumble recovery ... He had six tackles and an assist in two playoff hustles every minute he's on the playing field ... His relentless, keep-on-coming approach has helped make him one of the top nose tackles in the business . . . He thrives in close quarters, mid-dle-of-line action . . . Krumrie has the respect of his teammates and opponents . . . He was voted to the Pro Bowl following the 1987 and 1988 seasons ... . In 1988, he was a major part of the Bengals' defense and a key man in the team's AFC championship season and appearance in Super Bowl XXIII . . . Krumrie says the less he sees on the field the better off he is . . . "When you start looking in the backfield is when you get in trouble," he says, "because then you start trying to read things. The best way to play is to just follow the center. He'll always take you to the ball." ... Krumrie overpowers centers, keeps his balance and makes tackles while they go down .... He says his balance comes from the wrestling he did in 

"Somebody put 360 pounds on a leg-press machine, and there was a little contest to see who could do the most repetitions without resting," Wyche recalled. "Krumrie was so far ahead of everyone else, lifting with the leg he broke (in Super Bowl XXIII), the numbers just boggle your mind."... Krumrie did 101 lifts while the average of the other players was about 28 times.... Krumrie and tackle Anthony Munoz were involved in the first test by pro athletes of a patented exercise program designed to restore speed and quickness... The pair of Bengals worked with John Frappier at Red River Valley Sports Medicine Institute in Fargo, N.D.... The Bengals drafted Krumrie in the 10th round in 1983 and going that late still bothers him.... "When I was drafted in the 10th round, I was too short, too slow, and too light," says Krumrie. "Well, I still am, but I'm still here. I didn't get taller, I didn't get bigger, I didn't get faster. I'm still here. I didn't get taller, I didn't get bigger, I didn't get faster. I'm still moti- the same. I'm not a great athlete but I can play football with the best of them. That's what I'm here for. I'm still motivating myself over the 10th round draft choice. Hell, I was two-time All-America, three-time All-Big 10, and I led the team in tackles three years at Wisconsin. It's not like I'm a Cinderella story. I had the credentials. I'm just not a computer player."... Bengals general manager Paul Brown says Krumrie is one present day player who could have lined up for his great Cleveland teams of the 1950s

"He'd be right in there in the middle of that line," Brown says. "He'd be a guy like Bob Gain (a five-time Pro Bowl defensive tackle) — just tenacious and making tackles all over the place."... Extremely tough and once pulled three dislocated fingers into place in the huddle without missing a play... Krumrie is known for his annual scraps with offensive players at training camp.... Practice field fights just happen. Krumrie says..."I don't work at fighting and being rough in practice, it just happens," he explains. "Honest, I don't fight anywhere else. I don't fight in bars or parking lots, just on the practice field, not football field. Practice and games are different. You don't draw penalties in practice and when you do something stupid, you don't hurt your team. Sometimes I get a little carried away at practice, but I like to think I have the kind of total concentration you need to keep from doing those things in a game."....Krumrie says he has only drawn one personal foul penalty in a game "and, I don't think I deserved that one.".... It came in the Cincinnati-Butfalo AFC championship game in 1988.....

"Jim Kelly threw an interception and I blocked him during the runback. As we were going down, he pulled me on top of him and the officials called me for a personal foul."... Krumrie hates penalties and can't remember the last time he's been called for being offsides... "All penalties are stupid and that's a part of the game I try to avoid as much as possible. But there's no excuse for me being offsides. I'm right on top of the ball. When the ball moves, I move."

... Krumrie is an exception as a nose tackle ... He makes more than his share of tackles and led the Bengals in a four-year period through 1988 ... Most nose tackles are set up men who work hard while the stops go to others ... "It's a matter of wanting to do it and believing I can do it," he said. "Most people think a nose tackle is there to take on two blockers and plug the hole. I try to take on two blockers, plug up the hole and make the tackle." ... He strives to keep his ability at a Pro Bowl level ... "I want very much to be a Pro Bowl nose tackle and I have been." Krumrie says. "I really feel I deserve it. I'll just work that much harder to stay on top." ... "He's definitely a Pro Bowl player," Wyche emphasized. "I don't know anybody who plays against him and walks away enjoying it." Krumrie was a consensus All-American in 1981 and 1982 at Wisconsin where he started 46 consecutive games ... Wisconsin all-

state high school linebacker and heavyweight wrestling champion Hobbies are motorcycling, participating in road races and canoe triatholons... Speaks at schools on the danger of alcohol and drugs... Tim and his wife, Cheryl, have a daughter, Kelly, 7, and a son, Dexter, 21/2... Born May 20, 1960, In Menomonie, Wisc... Hometown is Mondovi, Wisc.... Lives in Eau Claire, Wisc., during the off-season.

Tim Krumrie finds out all he can about his opponent by watching films.

The Cincinnati nose tackle says at times he can predict things that are going to happen in a game. "I'm a very good cheater. It's part of the game," Krumrie said. "That's part of being a pro. You have to study your opponent. The more you know about your opponent, the better off you'll be in the game. The biggest thing I know is how to study film and I know what to look for," he said, adding he seeks little tipoffs to the play from the opponents. Krumrie makes an unusual number of tackles for a nose tackle. "I think it goes back to attitude and determination," he said, of leading the team in tackles four straight years. "I was a linebacker in high school and that's something a linebacker always did — make a lot of tackles. When I went to college (Wisconsin), I was moved to nose guard because one of the nose guards got hurt. The first thing, I called home and talked to Cheryl (then his girlfriend, now his wife) and she said, 'Well, you're not going to make any tackles at nose guard. So that was the answer she had for me. I said, 'Oh, yeah, I can make quite a few tackles there." "Krumrie convinced Cheryl quickly.

Skip McClendon is in his fifth season with the Cincinnati Bengals A starting defensive left end. McClendon had 28 tackles - 25 solos and three assists — and two sacks in 1990 . . . He had a good season in all respects . . . "If you had to order defensive linegood season in all respects . ... you'd want to get," said Chuck Studley, Bengals' defensive line coach, about the 6-7, 287-pound McClendon . . . "Since he was a linebacker in college, he's got quick feet and great lateral movement. There aren't many guys who can handle a body his size like he can. The only thing Skip needs to work on is playing the leverage. He has a tendency to play too high because he was so used to playing linebacker. He had been playing football standing up for so long, he was really looking at the game of football from a different angle. That's what we're working on now. He's tall and rangy and can shed blockers. He'll shed blockers on one side of the field and come up with the big tackle on the opposite end. He's arrived. McClendon was drafted by the Bengals in the third-round in 1987 out of Arizona State where he played linebacker .... Coach Sam Wyche likes McClendon's pass rush and his "Joe Hustle" efforts against the rush ... "He'll play all over the field to chase you against the rush ... "He'll play all over the field to chase you down," Wyche said.... McClendon suffered a broken ankle during the off-season before the 1990 training camp but returned to full strength .... McClendon started eight games in 1988 when the Bengals won the American Football Conference title and went to Super Bowl XXIII ... McClendon's goal is to help the Bengals in every way he can ... "I want to help this team become a consistent winner," McClendon said. "I want to be a factor in keeping this team constantly competitive, week in and week out. When teams come to play us, I want them to think of us as someone they'll always have to fight against. Personally, I want to consistently be known as one of the top defensive linemen in the league. I feel like I'm getting better, but I want people to be able to say every year that Skip McClendon is consistently competitive. I'm competitive now, but I don't feel I've reached my potential yet, but I'm getting there. I feel like I can become a great player if I can keep the right attitude and stay focused. I can do a lot better than I'm doing." One of McClendon's hobbies is roller-skating and one of his nicknames was "Wimpy." "I've been a hamburger man all my life," McClendon says. "That's why my mother used to call me 'Wimpy."

... He says the most memorable moment of his career "was going to the Super Bowl, but it won't be complete unless we go back there and win it." ... McClendon was a Junior College All-American at Butler County Community College where he played two seasons ... He also played at Northwestern as a freshman before transferring to Arizona State where he became an All-PAC-10 linebacker ... He was an All-City and All-Metro player for Radford High School in Detroit, Mich.... Tim McGee, a first-round draft choice in 1985, caught 43 passes for 737 yards, tops for the Bengals, and one touchdown in 1990, for the AFC Central Division champions . . . He averaged 17.1 yards a reception . . . McGee had eight receptions for 142 yards, 17.7 yards average, in the Bengals 34-31 win over the Los Angeles Rams in overtime . . . He had seven receptions against Indianapolis and six vs. the New York Jets and the New England Patriots. . . . His pass reception yardage against the Patriots was 163 yards ... In five seasons, McGee is averaging 18.1 yards per reception on 183 catches for 3318 yards ... He has caught 17 touchdown passes . . His best season thus far was in 1989 with 65 catches for 1211 yards and five 100-yard games . . . McGee was slowed by a deep thigh bruise last season and missed some action because of it . . . McGee teams with wide receiver Eddie Brown, tight end Rodney Holman and running back James Brooks to give quarterback Boomer Esiason an outstanding quartet of receivers ... This also means the ball goes to more than one receiver ... "A receiver always wants to see the ball coming his way," McGee says. "When that's not the case, you just have to suck it up. Frustration builds up inside you, but you just have to take it out on the opponents." McGee credits Cincinnati coach Sam Wyche with making him a better receiver . . . "I work with him. I catch 50 balls from Sam every Thursday during the season and I think it helps me. McGee's speed makes going deep one of his strengths . . . He has good moves and also can go across the middle . ...McGee has made many circus catches during his five years with the Bengals "The thing about Timmy is that he is one of the most acrobatic receivers around," quarterback Boomer Esiason said. "He makes every effort to get the ball. He's not afraid to go across the middle and catch the ball." . . . McGee has the ability to run patterns smoothly and is a very smart receiver who can catch the ball under pressure . . . Wyche calls McGee "a complete receiver. He can go deep and he also can go across the middle. He's always been an excellent pattern runner." ... McGee, who replaced the now retired Cris Collinsworth as a starter in 1988, says he uses his speed to his advantage, but does not concentrate on just being a speed receiver. ... "Going across the middle is one thing I've tried to do, and I think it has turned me into a complete receiver," McGee Tennessee's alltime leading receiver . . . He caught 50 said passes for 947 yards for the Vols in 1985 and won All-America hon-ors . . . His career totals for Tennessee were 123 receptions for 2042 yards and 15 touchdowns . . . He also was a top track per-

former for the Volunteers for two years before dropping the sport to concentrate totally on football . . . "I think the key to my career was passing up track in my junior and senior years to concentrate on football," McGee said. "If you are perceived as a trackman, people think all you can do is run by the defensive backs." . . . McGee played high school football at John Hay in Cleveland, Ohio, where he has had a number of good games against the Browns . . . He's a member of the Bengals' Super Star Competition group which annually visits schools in the Cincinnati area and discusses the dangers of drugs and alcohol . . . Hobbies include basketball . . . "He's the epitome of what an NFL offensive tackle should be," said Mike McCormack, a Hall of Fame member who played on the offensive line for Paul Brown in Cleveland and was a head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles and an assistant with the Bengals . . . Great foot quickness and agility enables Munoz to handle defensive ends .... Very agile for his size ... Exceptional straight-on blocker ...

Gives strong pass protection ... Tremendous team player and leader .... Bengals' offensive line coach Jim McNally says: "Anthony has tremendous strength and agility and intelligence, but most of all he has fast hands. He has those hands and they're just all over. Boorn, boom, boom. I haven't seen him lose one step not anything. He can play as long as he wants to. He's the best athlete I've ever been around," McNally continued. "He could be a linebacker or a tight end. His agility and quickness are outstanding. Anthony doesn't blow the guys off the line like he did when he first came here, but that's only because the game has changed and he's facing defensive ends who weigh as much as he does. He may be the most athletic lineman in the NFL."... Munoz is a "near perfect" receiver for the Bengals - four pass receptions, four touchdowns . . . 

Cornerback Eric Thomas returned to action following an operation on his right knee quicker than any one believed he could . . . He injured his knee while playing basketball during the off-season . . . In late May, 1990, he had anterior cruciate ligament reconstruction surgery, a major operation that usually takes a year to recover from . . . His return to the playing field inspired the Cincinnati defensive

... His return to the playing field inspired the Cincinnati defensive unit in the Bengals drive for the AFC Central Division title ... Thomas had 11 solo tackles during the two regular season games he played in ... In the two playoff games, he had nine tackles, eight solos and one assist ... Thomas returned to the active roster late in the season and played against Houston on December 23

... "I'm not going to be able to get back 100% before the season is over, I know that," Thomas said during rehabilitation. "But each week, I feel myself getting better, more confident. I'm probably about 90 per cent as far as being healed and 95 per cent as far as my mind's concerned. I'm thinking about it just a little bit, and that little bit is what's causing me to hesitate when I make a cut or what-... In his first game back after rehabilitation, he made six ever. tackles and was paired against the speedy receivers of the Hous-ton Oilers .... "I felt like coming back against Houston was good for me," Thomas said. "A spread offense is not an offense where you get a lot of running football. When you get running football, you've got linemen coming at you more. And usually when the run is on is when guys roll on top of you and whatever. In the run-andshoot, you're matching up against people more your size and that helps."... He said the toughest moment in returning to action was the first point of contact . . . "Their very first offensive play, I was covering Drew Hill, and he came out and ran a little flat route, and as soon as he caught the ball and turned around, I was able to tackle him," Thomas said. "I was hoping something like that would happen, like right away — just so I could feel confident bumping it on the ground."... Thomas continued his rehabilitation during the off-season by following the program operated by former Bengals' linebacker Jim LeClair in Fargo, N.D., that nose tackle Tim Krumie and tackle Anthony Munoz went through last season . Thomas. who was a key man to the Bengals drive to Super Bowl XXIII, operates like a coach on the field . . . He knows his job and works at it

... "There are going to be times when you're going to get beat, especially at this level," says Thomas. "The guys here are all good players and you've got to expect that they are going to do well themselves. When something like that happens, you can't get down on yourself. You've got to come back and play the next play." ... Thomas led the Bengals with seven pass interceptions in

Super Bowl XXIII season in 1988 and was selected for the Pro Bowl ... Coach Sam Wyche terms Thomas "just pure speed, plus he's physical enough to play well on the corner." ... Thomas was a track star at Tulane and he took up football relatively late "Speed is something I've always had, and harnessing it has always been a problem in football. Sometimes, earlier, I had a tendency to let my speed get out of control and that affected my pass coverage techniques." ... Thomas, who hopes to coach track after he retires from football, has logged times of just over 4.3 seconds in the 40, 10.3 seconds for 100 meters, 20.8 seconds for 200 and an eight-inch long jump of 25 feet ... Defensive coordinator Dick LeBeau says Thomas has excellent speed and acceleration

... LeBeau adds that Thomas has corrected his track attributes which do not mesh with football ... "Everything you do as a sprinter is based on building a powerful, straightaway long stride," LeBeau said. "A defensive back needs quick, short strides. He keeps his speed under control until he reads the keys that determine where he's supposed to go. Then comes the burst of speed." ... Thomas attended Pasadena City College before entering Tulane ... His hobbies are track, basketball, weightlifting and music ... he has a son Brandon, 6... Born September 11, 1964 ... Hometown is Sacramento, Calif.



"He makes spectacular plays, but you would never know they were spectacular if you tried to get him to describe them. He's modest, sincere and unselfish. I don't think 'I' is in his vocabulary.".... Erik Wilhelm, a third-round draft choice of the Cincinnati Bengals in 1989, is a top young quarterback who has progressed rapidly in two seasons . . . Bengals' third-round draft choice in 1989 . . . A backup to Boomer Esiason, Wilhelm completed 12 of 19 passes for 117 yards and rushed for six yards last season . . . In his rookie year, he completed 30 of 56 passes for 425 yards, four . A touchdowns and two interceptions and rushed for 30 yards . . quick learner and a hard worker, Wilhelm is always among the last players to walk off Spinney Field after practices ... "They (Wilhelm and Todd Philcox, now with Cleveland) don't get the snaps on the field during practice," said Dana Bible, quarter-backs coach. "There are only a limited number of snaps and Boomer will get those. That's why we stay after. We go through the whole practice script again — that's where Erik and Todd get their snaps. They don't have the rest of the team to work with, but they're able to get their reps."... The Bengals are confident the 6-3, 217-pound Wilhelm can run their offense, and he showed them he could in 1989 against the Los Angeles Raiders and the Miami Dolphins ... Against Miami he completed five of six passes for 98 yards and a touchdown; against the Raiders he was 15 of 36 for 200 yards, one touchdown, one interception . He actually got his christening in the game with the Raiders when he took over at quarterback when Boomer Esiason suffered a bruised lung ... The Bengals' offensive unit was depleted with Injuries sidelining running backs James Brooks and Eric Ball and wide receivers Eddie Brown and Mike Martin . . . But Wilhelm stepped in and showed great poise even though the Bengals lost 28-7....'It was pretty tough, with our situation on the personnel 28-7..."It was pretty tough, with our situation on the personne, we had, being down two touchdowns and all those things against you," Wilhelm said. "But when you lose something you have to make up for it. You can't let it offset what you do, or stuff just isn't going to get done."... Cincinnati coach Sam Wyche says Wilhelm did an exceptional job in a difficult situation...."Erk Wilhelm did an exceptional job in a difficult situation ... "Erik had to do things he never practiced," Wyche said, "things he had never seen anybody practice. He did a great job. He's a bright, young player. We were in such a situation we got a couple of late calls to him. He was in a tough spot, but he looked me square in the eye," Wyche continued. "He was right with me. The players have a lot of confidence in him. He's going to be a fine quarterback. He's been christened in the toughest way it can happen to you." ... "He has displayed good command of our offense." Bible says. "He is an accurate passer, athletic and mobile. He fits well with what we do.".... Wilhelm reads defenses well although he says it was a difficult adjustment from college to pro . . college, I read defensive secondary coverages. I really don't have to look at the opponent's front. In college, I would just look at the two safeties and the cornerbacks to read the defense. I don't think I

have a problem reading defenses. It's just an experience factor. ... Wilhelm says he wants to play 10 or 12 years in the NFL .... 41 want to be a starter at some point," he says, "It can be frustrating as a back-up, but I understand where I'm at and I understand how good Boomer is. For now, I'll just work hard and wait for my chance." ... Wyche tells Wilhelm to "keep your head in the game, stay in the game mentally to be ready." ... "To think oth-erwise would be ludicrous," Wilhelm said ... The most prolific quarterback ever at Oregon State ... Holder of virtually all total offense and passing records for Oregon State Broke or tied 33 school and conference records Closed out his college career as the PAC-10 Conference's alltime leading passer with 9393 yards, surpassing the previous record of 9349 yards by Stanford's John Elway (1979-1982), now Denver Broncos' quar-terback ... Since Long had been making Campbell's Soup commercials, I said: 'Why don't you just eat your chunky soup.' He chuckled. Everybody was cracking up. It was funny. Ickey Woods came back to the AFC Central Division champion Cincinnati Bengals in the seventh game of the 1990 season after rehabilitating a knee injury followed by an operation ... Woods suffered the injury in the second game of the 1989 season . An outstanding performer in 1988 when the Bengals went into Super Bowl XXIII, Woods played well last season, rushing for 268 yards attempts for a 4.9 yards average and one touchdown . . . He also caught three passes for 18 yards . . . He also brought the famous "Ickey Shuffle" which he originated in 1988 back to stadiums in the NFL .... It has since been outlawed .... Woods worked hard at Wellington Sports Clinic to get back into action as quickly as he did . He had two-hour working visits at the clinic at least three days a week . . . Woods kept positive and fought off boredom by thinking about playing football ... He missed 20 games before playing against the Cleveland Browns on October 22 last season ... He worked his way back into the starting lineup in three weeks . Late in the season, Woods showed definite signs of returning to the form he showed in his rookie year of 1988 when he led the Bengals in rushing with 1066-yards and had four 100-yards plus games . He also had two 100-yards plus games in the playoffs .... Woods has worked hard and all the Bengals are pulling for him . . . "You can sense everyone around here is pulling for him," quarterback Boomer Esiason said. "I really want him to come back. He has something to prove and that makes him the most dangerous and successful player.", ... Woods was the Bengals' second-round draft choice in 1988 after he led college football in rushing with 1658 yards for UNLV in 1987 . . . His first name is Elbert and he was nicknamed Ickey because his brother called him "Eee-Eee" which reminded his mother of a carloon character . . . "Woods is a special-type runner," says Paul Brown who coached great fullbacks, such as Marion Motley and Jim Brown. "He is a quick fullback," he added. "When you talk about our run offense, start in here and bounce out there, he fits it." . . . Woods says the most memorable moment in his professional career "was going to the Super Bowl (XXIII). The only bad thing about it was not coming out with a victory. I was thinking, 'Hey, this is my first year and I'm pretty sure we can get here again. It's hard to do it again, but it can be done." Woods' goal is to play eight or nine more seasons and be productive..... Carl Zander, an excellent and dependable and intelligent inside linebacker, is in his eighth season with the Cincinnati Bengals... He had a solid season in 1990, turning in 37 tackles and 10 assists plus intercepting a pass and recovering two fumbles... He had two tackles on special teams... In playoff action, he had six tack-

les and a sack .... In addition to diagnosing and stopping enemy plays and rushing the passer. Zander has the added responsibility of calling defensive signals for the Bengals . . . #### TRAINING CAMP OPENS JULY 18

This will be the 24th consecutive year the Bengals have held their summer training camp at Wilmington College. Paul Brown, Bengals' vice president and general manager, selected the site prior to the 1968 season when the team opened play in the American Football League.

The annual intra-squad scrimmage will begin at 1 p.m., Satur-

day, July 27 at Wilmington College. The Bengals will close their training camp at Wilmington College on August 9 and resume practicing at Spinney Field in Cincinnati.

All outdoor practice sessions by the Bengals at Wilmington College are open to the public without charge.

The stadium seats 3100 and there is ample parking.

#### WILLIAMS BENGALS TOP CHOICE

The name of the 1991 draft for the Cincinnati Bengals was DEFENSE.

The defending American Football Conterence Central Division champions took defensive players in their first three selections.

No. 1 was outside linebacker Alfred Williams, a 6-6, 240pounder, who played for Colorado and won the Dick Butkus Award which goes annually to the top collegiate linebacker.

No. 2 was Lamar Rogers, a 6-4, 290-pound All-American defensive lineman from Auburn.

No. 3 was rugged Bob Dahl, who stands 6-5, weighs 290 and played at Notre Dame.

"We were trying to get stacked up on defense," said Paul Brown, Bengals' vice president and general manager. "We've attacked our needs as best as we could have hoped. It's a defensive draft."

Coach Sam Wyche was happy with the draft, especially the selection of Williams who had a school record 35 sacks for national champion Colorado in 1990.

"For us to be where we want to be, Alfred Williams has got to come in right away and play big time football," Wyche said.

Wyche added that Rogers wasn't drafted to add depth to the defensive line.

"With the athletic skills this guy's got, he's not coming in as somebody we expect to help with our depth," Wyche added. "Our starters better buckle it up, because if they come in here and aren't playing well, he'll take over their job,"

The draft broke down this way for the Bengals — one linebacker, two defensive linemen, three defensive backs, two wide receivers, two offensive linemen, one running back, one quarterback and one tight end.

"We're happy with our selection in the first-round," Paul Brown, vice president and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals, said. "Alfred Williams is an outstanding linebacker. He's a big, tall, active man who was a tremendous pass rusher for Colorado where he holds the record for sacks. We had him rated as high as sixth to eighth."

"Alfred Williams is an excellent linebacker — winner of the Dick Butkus Award which goes to the best college linebacker," Cincinnati coach Sam Wyche said. "He is a superb pass rusher and holds the Colorado record for sacks."

He is an excellent athlete and played for a while on the Colorado basketball team," added Dick Selcer, Bengals' linebacker coach. "He's a lot like James Francis (No. 1 choice for the Bengals in 1990 and also a basketball player at Baylor). He has plenty of athletic skills."

#### DR. CASANOVA LOOKS BACK

Tommy Casanova is a long way from being a free safety for the Cincinnati Bengals which he was from 1972 to 1977. He's now an opthalmologist, which is the practice of medicine and surgical diseases of the eye.

But Casanova remembers his days with the Bengals and it all led to what he is doing now.

He was drafted in the second round in 1972 after a brilliant, All-America college career at LSU. He told Paul Brown, then coach and general manager, he would play, but someday would leave for medicine, his chosen field.

Casanova remembers that each year at training camp, Brown made a speech and told the players they were at a crossroad in their life. He told them they had football now, but urged them to prepare for life after football.

"Coach Brown is one of the finest people I've ever met," Casanova said. "He did a lot for me."

When asked about the highlight of his football career, Casanova said: "I don't look at games or plays or awards. My highlights were just the experiences I had in Cincinnati. Those were the fun years, the most enjoyment I've ever had, and without football, it wouldn't have happened.

Brown says Casanova was special. "We've never had anyone like him," Brown said. "On defense, he played like an instinctive centerfielder. As a punt return man he was excellent. It's amazing the things he could do back there. He was a very, very good football player and was always a gentleman."

### WYCHE TAKES "STEPS" TO STUDENTS

Cincinnati Bengals' head coach Sam Wyche has put the nearly \$40,000 he received from fans who wanted to help him pay an NFL fine he was given for barring a female reporter from the locker room last season into a program titled STEPS — Students Taking Educational Performance Seriously.

The program, which began in March at Hughes High School, Schroder Paideia Middle and Roberts Paideia Elementary schools, establishes a point system for students based on attendance and achievement. Points can be used for class rings, bikes, movie passes, fast food gift certificates, etc.

"Lots of kids, because of the way they grow up, never realize the feeling of accomplishment that comes from getting a job, earning money and then purchasing something," Wyche said. "This gives them the chance to earn something on their own, legitimately.

"We're not paying kids to study, but we are giving them an incentive," Wyche added. "It's kind of like having a job, except their job is to do well in school."

Wyche, who paid the fine himself, received donations from fans in 43 states and 11 countries.

### NFL TERMINOLOGY

The term <u>NFL Rookie</u> is defined as a player who is in his first season of professional football and has not been on the roster of another professional football team for any regular-season or postseason games. A <u>Rookie</u> is designated by an "R" on NFL rosters. Players who have been active in another professional football league or players who have NFL experience, including either preseason training camp or being on an active roster for fewer than three regular-season or post-season games, are termed <u>NFL</u> <u>First-Year Players</u>. An <u>NFL First-Year Player</u> is designated by a "T" on NFL rosters. Thereafter, a player on an NFL active roster for at least three regular-season or post-season games is credited with an additional year of NFL playing experience.

#### FOOTBALL OR BASEBALL?

Cincinnati Bengals' quarterback Boomer Esiason still wonders how he ended up in football instead of baseball.

He was an outstanding southpaw pitcher for East Islip (N.Y.) High School and in his senior year posted a 15-0 record and drew the attention of plenty of major league scouts.

"I can replay this a million times and I still don't know why," Esiason said. "I signed my letter of intent to Maryland, which was the only major school that recruited me for football, before my senior year in baseball.

"After my senior year in baseball, every major school in the country wanted to give me a scholarship for baseball. I even had the Seattle Mariners come to my house.

"I'm confused; I'm saying, but I've already signed a letter of intent to Maryland. What am I supposed to do? I've never been through this before.

"I decided to honor my decision to go to Maryland, but I thought I was going to be allowed to play baseball there, too. "But that didn't happed," says Esiason. "I wasn't allowed. "To

this day that was a good decision, but I was really ticked off that I couldn't play baseball.

Esiason's high school coach, Sal Campi, says Boomer could have made it in football or baseball.

"I have no doubt that Boomer could have made it in any sport that he chose, but I really felt all along that he would end up in football.

"I could just picture him with that white hair being the quarterback. he just has that charisma.

Campi had it figured out right.

The "FACT" program will be renamed by the NFL "Football and Academics: A Championship Team."

The pilot program was directed at inner city youth and was distributed to more than 3000 students in 24 Cincinnati elementary schools

NFL Pro Set cards, with reading, math. social studies/geography, and science questions printed on the back in place of statistics, were used by the schools with a 15-week Instructional Game Plan.

Designed by the NFL and the Cincinnati Public Schools Curriculum Committee, the subject matter ranged in difficulty from the second grade through the sixth grade level.

The program was embraced by the Cincinnati school board and

judged an overwhelming success by Cincinnati teachers. "We're not paying kids to study, but we are giving them an incen-tive," Wyche said, "It's kind of like having a job, except their job is to do well in school."

### **BENGALS HISTORY**

Paul Brown, who had left the Cleveland Browns following the 1962 season with an NFL record of 115-49-6, seven conference titles, and three NFL championships, had the urge to get back into football. His son Mike did a study on pro football expansion and recommended Cincinnati as a potential site. In **1965**, Brown met with Governor James Rhodes and the two agreed the state could accommodate a second pro football team.

**1966** Fearful the Reds baseball team would leave town and feeling pressure from local businessmen pushing for a pro football franchise, Cincinnati's city council approved the construction of Riverfront Stadium.

**1967** Brown's group was awarded an AFL expansion franchise. Brown called the team the Bengals, the name of the previous Cincinnati AFL franchises in 1937, 1940, and 1941. The Bengals acquired quarterback John Stofa by trading two draft choices to Miami.

**1968** The Bengals were awarded 40 veteran players in the allocation draft. In the college draft they selected Tennessee center Bob Johnson as their first pick. Other draftees included running backs Jess Phillips and Essex Johnson, tight end Bob Trumpy, linebacker Al Beauchamp, and tackle Howard Fest. The Bengals lost their first preseason game 38-14 to Kansas City before 21,682 fans at Nippert Stadium. The Bengals played respectably during the regular season, upsetting Denver 24-10 and Buffalo 34-23 in their first two home games. Paul Robinson led the AFL in rushing with 1.023 yards and was named rookie of the year.

**1969** Brown drafted quarterback Greg Cook of the University of Cincinnati in the first round. The same draft also produced linebacker Bill Bergey. The Bengals jumped to a 3-0 record, but the club finished 4-9-1. Brown was named AFL coach of the year, Bergey was honored as AFL defensive rookie of the year, and Cook won the AFL passing title.

**1970** After his arm went bad in training, Cook was placed on the injured reserve list. Virgil Carter, a castoff from two other NFL teams, was signed to play quarterback. The Bengals lost six of the first seven games, then rallied to win the last seven for an 8-6 record. They became the first third-year expansion team to win a division title, the AFC Central. They lost to Baltimore 17-0 in the playoffs.

**1971** The Bengals picked up quarterback Ken Anderson and tackle Vernon Holland in the draft, then went 5-0-1 in preseason play. After a 37-14 victory over Philadelphia, the Bengals lost seven in a row on the way to a 4-10 record.

**1972** Looking for defensive help, Brown drafted end Sherman White, safety Tommy Casanova, linebacker Jim LeClair, and cornerback Bernard Jackson. Anderson unseated Carter as starting quarterback, and the Bengals won three of their last four to post an 8-6 record. Chip Myers set a club record with 57 pass receptions. **1973** Brown drafted wide receiver Isaac Curtis and runners Boo-

**1973** Brown drafted wide receiver Isaac Curtis and runners Boobie Clark and Lenvil Elliott. The Bengals split their first eight games, then swept their last six and won their second AFC Central Division championship. Cincinnati lost to Miami 34-16 in the AFC playoffs. Clark, who finished the year with 988 yards rushing and 45 pass receptions, was named AFC rookie of the year. Essex Johnson led Cincinnati with a career-high 997 yards rushing and Curtis caught 45 passes.

**1974** Cincinnati Iraded Bergey to Philadelphia for two first-round draft choices and third-round pick in 1977. LeClair replaced Bergey at middle linebacker. The Bengals won four of their first five games but couldn't keep pace with Super Bowl-bound Pittsburgh. Anderson won the NFL passing championship and completed a clubrecord 64.9 percent of his attempts. Cornerback Lemar Parrish led the NFL in punt returns.

**1975** The Bengals opened with six straight wins. LeClair preserved a 21-19 victory over Houston, making all four tackles in a goal-line stand. The Bengals won their eighth game in nine starts against Bulfalo as Anderson completed 30 of 46 passes for 447 yards, the tenth-highest one-game total in NFL history. Cincinnati scored 27 points in the first quarter to crush San Diego 47-14 and finish 11-3, its best regular-season record. The Bengals qualified as the AFC wild card team for the playoffs, but their losing postseason record continued with a 31-28 setback to Oakland. Anderson won his second NFL passing championship. A serious blow was the loss of defensive tackle Mike Reid, who retired at 26 to pursue a career in music.

1976 Brown announced his retirement after 41 seasons of coaching and named Bill Johnson, his long-time assistant, as the successor. Brown continued to serve as the club's general manager and vice president. The Bengals acquired defensive end Coy Bacon in a trade with San Diego and drafted halfback Archie Griffin, the two-time Heisman Trophy winner from Ohio State. The Bengals set a fast pace in the AFC Central Division, winning 9 of their first 11 games. The season came down to games against Pittsburgh and Oakland and the Bengals lost both. Those defeats not only cost Cincinnati the division title but the AFC wild card spot as well. Cornerback Ken Riley led the AFC with nine interceptions. 1977 A loss to Houston in the final game cost the Bengals a spot in the playoffs. The team finished with an 8-6 record. Curtis missed the final six games with a knee injury. Trumpy retired.

**1978** The Bengals played the first four games without Anderson. Johnson was replaced as head coach after 0-5 start. Homer Rice took over, but the losing streak continued; the Bengals won only once in the first three months of the season. Wins over Atlanta, Los Angeles, and Cleveland at season's end improved the record to 4-12.

**1979** After six straight losses to open the season, the Bengals stunned Pittsburgh 34-10, recovering seven Steelers fumbles. Ray Griffin ran back an intercepted pass a club-record 96 yards in a 26-24 loss to San Diego. Pete Johnson powered his way to 15 touch-downs, but the Bengals struggled to their second successive 4-12 record. Former Cleveland coach Forrest Gregg was named to replace Rice as head coach.

**1980** Scoring touchdowns was the major problem for the Bengals, who went 6-10 in 1980. They managed only 244 points, lowest in the AFC. Anderson had a sub-par year with only six touchdown passes. The Bengals won only one of their first five games but upset defending Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh twice. First-round draft choice Anthony Munoz impressed at offensive tackle.

**1981** The Bengals unveiled new uniforms with tiger-striped helmets, jerseys, and pants. They had at least a share of the AFC Central lead the entire season, and on December 6 Anderson threw two touchdowns as the Bengals clinched the division with a 17-10 victory over the Steelers. Cornerback Louis Breeden tied an NFL record when he returned a pass interception 102-yards for a touchdown in Cincinnati's 40-17 victory over the Chargers in San Diego, Anderson led the NFL in passing with a 98.5 rating. On January 3, the Bengals defeated the Buffalo Bills 28-21 in an AFC divisional playoff game. A week later, playing in their first AFC Championship Game ever, the Bengals defeated the San Diego Chargers 27-7 in a temperature of nine degrees below zero with a wind-chill factor of minus 59. In Super Bowl XVI on January 24, the Bengals trailed 20-0 at halftime and couldn't make up the deficit, losing to San Francisco 26-21.

**1982** The Bengals followed up their Super Bowl season with another strong showing. They finished the strike-shortened season behind only the Baiders with a 7-2 mark. The Jets caught them sleeping in the first round of the playoffs, though, beating them 44-17. Anderson led the AFC in passing for the fourth time as the Bengals boasted the second-best offense in the NFL. Their defense ranked third in the NFL against the run. **1983** The Bengals' season looked promising at the start of 1983,

**1983** The Bengals' season looked promising at the start of 1983, but a horrendous opening brought about a premature ending. Cincinnati started the season by losing six of its first seven games. The Bengals never recovered and finished 7-9. Despite the losing record, the Bengals claimed the top overall defense in the NFL. In the off-season, Gregg resigned as head coach and Sam Wyche was named as his replacement.

**1984** Pete Johnson was traded to San Diego for running back James Brooks. The Bengals lost their first five games and then bounced back to win eight of the last 11 and force the AFC Central Division championship race into the final week of the season only to fall a game short of Pittsburgh. Cincinnati finished 8-8.

**1985** Wide receiver Eddie Brown from Miami (Fla.) was the Bengals' top draft choice. Wide receiver Isaac Curtis, a premier Bengal for 12 years, retired shortly before training camp opened.

Cincinnati got off to another slow start, losing its first four games. The Bengals finished 7-9 and were in the thick of the AFC Central which was won by Cleveland with an 8-8 record. Second-year quarterback Boomer Esiason replaced Ken Anderson. Offensive tackle Anthony Munoz was named to the AFC Pro Bowl team the fifth consecutive time. The Bengals set a club scoring record with 441 points.

**1986** Cincinnati's No. 1 selection in the NFL college draft was linebacker Joe Kelly who played at Washington, Wide receiver Tim McGee of Tennessee was drafted later in the first round. Punter Pat McInally retired. The Bengals unleashed a high-powered offense in their battle for the AFC Central Division title and finished 10-6 and narrowly missed a playoff berth. Offensive tackle Anthony Munoz was selected to the AFC Pro Bowl team for the sixth year in a row. He was joined by guard Max Montoya, running back James Brooks and quarterback Boomer Esiason. Linebacker Reggie Williams was selected "One of the Top 10 Young Men In America" by the United States Jaycees and was honored in Tulsa, Oklahoma, January 16 and 17. Later, Williams was selected NFL Man of the Year for his efforts to charity and the community and was honored at the Pro Bowl in Honolulu, Hawaii. Munoz was named Seagrams" top offensive lineman of 1986.

**1987** Jason Buck, a defensive end and Outland Trophy winner from Brigham Young, was the Cincinnati Bengals' No. 1 draft choice. Kicker Jim Breech led the AFC in scoring with 97 points. Offensive tackle Anthony Munoz was voted to the AFC Pro Bowl team for the seventh consecutive year. Munoz did not play in the Pro Bowl game because of a shoulder operation. Nose tackle Tim Krumrie played in his first Pro Bowl game.

1988 The Cincinnati Bengals brought about the biggest turnaround in NFL history by rising from a 4-11 team in 1987 to a 12-4 regular season mark in 1988, the AFC Central Division title, the AFC championship and a berth in Super Bowl XXIII against the San Francisco 49ers. The Bengals fell in the Super Bowl, 20-16. when the 49ers scored a touchdown with 34 seconds remaining. Coach Sam Wyche and his Bengals recorded a 14-5 record in regular and post season play, the best in the NFL. Wyche received numerous honors for his brilliant coaching and nine Bengals were selected for the Pro Bowl - quarterback Boomer Esiason, nose tackle Tim Krumrie, tackle Anthony Munoz, guard Max Montoya, tight end Rodney Holman, wide receiver Eddie Brown, running back James Brooks, safety David Fulcher and corner-back Eric Thomas. Esiason was voted the NFL's most valuable player and Munoz the top offensive lineman. Linebacker Reggie Williams received the "Sportsman of the Year Award" from Sports Illustrated. The Award was presented to Williams by President Reagan in an Oval Office ceremony prior to the 1988 season. Defensive back Rickey Dixon, an All-American from Oklahoma, was the Bengals' first selection in the 1988 draft. "Ickey" Woods, the top rusher in college football in 1987 while at Nevada-Las Vegas, was Cincinnati's second choice. Woods led the Bengals in rushing in 1988 with 1066 yards

**1989** The Bengals defeated the Buffalo Bills, 21-10, to win the AFC championship, on January 8 at Riverfront Stadium. Cincinnati lost to San Francisco, 20-16, in Super Bowl XXIII on January 22 in Miami, Fla. The Cincinnati Bengals, the defending AFC champions, traded their first round draft choice to Atlanta for three later selections. Eric Ball, a running back from UCLA, was Cincinnati's first selection, coming in the second round. Guard Freddie Childress of Arkansas was the Bengals' second choice in the second round. The Bengals, hit hard by injuries throughout the season, went 8-8 and narrowly missed gaining a spot in the playoffs. Six Bengals were selected for the Pro Bowl — tackle Anthony Munoz, quarterback Boomer Esiason, strong safety David Fulcher, running back James Brooks, tight end Rodney Holman and guard Max Montoya.

**1990** The Bengals obtained running back Paul Palmer and wide receiver Mike Barber and lost Montoya, wide receiver Ira Hillary and tackle Rob Woods in Plan B. Cincinnati drafted Baylor line-backer James Francis in the first round of the 1990 draft. Running back Harold Green of South Carolina is the Bengals second round choice. Cincinnati posted a 9-7 regular season record to win the AFC Central Division Championship and move into the playoffs where the Bengals belted the Houston Oilers, 41-14, before losing

to the Los Angeles Raiders, 20-10, in the second round. Three Bengals were selected for the Pro Bowl game — tackle Anthony Munoz, tight end Rodney Holman and strong safety David Fulcher. **1991** The Cincinnati Bengals acquired linebacker Alex Gordon and lost safety Solomon Wilcots, nose tackle Mike Hammerstein and quarterback Todd Philcox in Plan B. Cincinnati drafted outside linebacker Alfred Williams, an All-American from Colorado, in the first-round of the 1991 draft.

## NFL Passer Rating System

The NFL rates its forward passers for statistical purposes against a pre-fixed performance standard based on statistical achievements of all qualified pro passers since 1960. The system now being used replaced one that rated passers in relation to their position in a total group based on various criteria. The current system, adapted in 1973, removes inequities that existed in the former method and, at the same time, provides a means of comparing passing performances from one season to the next.

It is important to remember that the system is used to rate passers, not quarterbacks. Statistics do not reflect leadership, playcalling and other intangible factors that go into making a successful professional quarterback. Four categories are used as a basis for compiling a rating.

-Percentage of touchdown passes per attempt

-Percentage of completions per attempt

Percentage of interceptions per attempt

-Average yards gained per attempt

The base, or **average** standard, is 1.000. The bollom is .0000. To earn a 2.000 rating, a passer must perform at exceptional levels, i.e., 70 percent in completions. 10 percent in touchdowns, 1.5 percent in interceptions, and 11 yards average gain per pass attempt. The **maximum** a passer can receive in any category is 2.375.

For example, to gain a 2.375 in completion percentage, a passer would have to complete 77.5 percent of his passes. The NFL record is 70.55 by Ken Anderson (Cincinnati, 1982). To gain a 2.375 in percentage of interceptions, a passer would have to go the entire season without an interception. The 2.375 figure in average yards is 12.50, compared with the NFL record of 11.17 by Tommy O'Connell (Cleveland, 1957). To earn a 2.375 in percentage of touchdowns, a passer would have to achieve an 11.9. The record is 13.9 by Sid Luckman (Chicago, 1943).

In order to make the rating more understandable, the point rating is then converted into a scale of 100. For instance, if a passer completes 11 of 23 passes for 114 yards, with one touchdown and no interceptions, the four components would be:

-Percentage of Completions-11 of 23 is 47.8 percent. The point rating is .0890.

—Percentage of Touchdown Passes—1 touchdown in 23 attempts works out to 4.3 percent for a rating of 0.860.

—Percentage of Interceptions—You can't do better than zero, so the passer receives a maximum rating of 2.375. —Average Yards Gained Per Attempt—23 attempts divided

—Average Yards Gained Per Attempt—23 attempts divided into 114 yards equals 4.96 yards per attempt for a corresponding rating of 0.490.

The sum of the four components is 4.615, which converts to a rating of 76.9. In order for a passer to achieve 100, his points would have to total 6.000. In rare cases, where statistical performance has been superior, it is possible for a passer to go over 100. However, such an instance is rare. The leading passers each year were checked from 1932 when the NFL began keeping official statistics, and only nine passers in history have scored over 100 in the year they led the league in passing. The most recent passer to lead the league and score over 100 was Miami quarterback Dan Marino, who achieved a 108.9 rating in 1984. The highest-rated passer in a single season was Milt Plum, who had a 110.4 rating with Cleveland in 1960.

# BRANCH RICKEY WANTED PB

Branch Rickey offered Paul Brown the job of managing the Pittsburgh Pirates in the 1950s.

Rickey met Brown in Fort Myers, Fla., in the late 1950s. Brown,

at that time, had a football dynasty in the Cleveland Browns. "I'd like you to manage the Pirates," Brown recalls Rickey telling him. "I was really surprised and I told him football is my world. I played centerfield for Miami of Ohio, but that's it for baseball. "You can't be serious, Branch," I said.

Rickey assured Brown he was serious.

"It makes no difference that you don't have a baseball background," Rickey said. "The same things apply to all sports. "Think it over," Rickey added.

A day later Brown told Rickey he couldn't do it.

# TERMINOLOGY

AUDIBLE — Quarterback changes the play at the time of scrimmage. Also called an automatic.

BLIND SIDE — A player is "blind sided" when he is hit by a tackler he did not see. This usually happens to the quarterback.

BLITZ — An all-out rush by the defensive front four with the aid of a linebacker or linebackers and/or safety. Also called Red Dog.

BOOTLEG — Quarterback tries to fake the opponent by hiding the ball on his hip before passing or running.

CLIP - An illegal block from behind.

**DOUBLE WING** — An offensive set where one running back lines up outside the tackle on the weak side (away from the tight end). This is used to get another receiver in a pass pattern quickly.

DRAW — The quarterback drops back to pass and then hands off to a running back.

FAIR CATCH — A player who is going to receive a punt raises one arm above his head to signal he will not run with the ball after catching it. He may not be hit when catching it. However, if he should fumble or not catch the kick, then the fair catch is off.

FIRST-YEAR PLAYER — A first-year player, unlike a rookie, has been in an NFL training camp but has not played in a regular season game. A first-year player may not be Rookie of the Year.

FLAT — The space from the ball to the sidelines. Short passes are often thrown in this area.

FLOOD — Sending two or more pass receivers to same part of field.

FOUR-THREE — Defensive alignment with four defensive linemen and three linebackers.

FREE AGENT — A player who is free of any contractual obligations.

FUMBLE - A play where the ball carrier loses control of the ball.

HASHMARKS — The broken lines that run the same way as the sidelines. They are 23 yards, 1 foot, 9 inches from each sideline.

I FORMATION — A formation or set where the two running backs line up directly behind the quarterback.

**KEY** — A player that a defender will watch to help him decide the flow of the play. Also called reading.

LINE OF SCRIMMAGE — An imaginary line that runs through the middle of the ball and to each sideline. Only the center may be within a yard of the ball when it is hiked.

LOOK-IN - A quick pass over the middle.

MAN-TO-MAN — A defensive pass coverage in which each defender is assigned to cover one offensive player.

MAN IN MOTION — Before the ball is hiked a back or receiver runs parallel with the line of scrimmage to change the offensive set. Only one man may move and he may not run toward the line of scrimmage before the ball is snapped.

**ONSIDE KICK** — A short kickoff tried in hopes the kicking team will recover the ball. If the kickoff travels 10 or more yards either team may recover the ball.

OPTION PASS — A special play in which the running back has the option to either run or throw a forward pass.

NICKLE - Term referring to fifth defensive back or defense using five defensive backs.

PLAY-ACTION PASS - A pass play in which the quarterback will fake a handoff and then drop back to pass.

POCKET - The protected area, seven to 10 yards behind the center, into which the guarterback drops back to pass.

POST PATTERN - A path in which the receiver runs down the field and then turns and runs toward the goal post.

PURSUIT — When a player from the other team is chasing the player with the ball.

SACK — The quarterback is tackled for a loss while attempting to Dass

SAFETY - The team without the ball gets two points when it tackles a player from the other team in the other team's end zone.

SCREEN PASS - A delayed pass to a running back after the offensive linemen let the defenders rush in.

SHIFT - Before the ball is snapped, the team changes alignment.

STRONG SIDE - The side on which the tight end lines up. The weak side is just opposite the tight end.

THREE-FOUR - Defensive alignment with three defensive linemen and four linebackers.

ZONE DEFENSE — A defense in which players cover an area instead of a designated man.

# PRO FOOTBALL NATION'S FAVORITE

Pro football remains the nation's most popular sport, according to a survey released on June 16 by Sports Illustrated. Sixty percent of those surveyed selected pro football as the sport they were most interested in. That figure matched the results of a similar 1986 poll. Pro football was followed by baseball, 52%; college football, 40%; fishing, 37%; and pro basketball, 34%. Pro football was the favorite sport of adults in nearly every category: men, women, 18-34 year olds, 35-49 year olds, 50-64 year olds, college attendees, high school graduates and fans in every household income bracket.

'RATTLER' PRAISES PB Former Cincinnati Bengals' cornerback Ken Riley, now head coach at Florida A & M, remembers the way it was when he played cornerback for Paul Brown from 1969 through 1975, the year PB retired.

"Paul Brown always wanted you to perform on the field and be prepared," Riley recalled. "He encouraged us all to go back to school or get involved in a business that can lead to something after football.

Riley is now on the NFL Players Advisory Board and sees what Brown warned his team against.

"There are some guys right now scruffing around," Riley said. "but most of the former Bengals are doing pretty well.

"It also shows the type of program the Bengals have and the type of people Mr. Brown brought into the program," Riley added. During those days we were tested.

"The coach always tried to pay you a decent salary and wanted his players to live first class," Riley emphasized.

Riley took a lot of what he learned from Brown into college coaching

'I don't run a typical college program," said Riley. "Some run four or five hour practices. We don't waste a lot of time. We spring for a couple of hours and get off the field. That is still a long time because these are student-athletes first and foremost.

'After a couple of hours, anyone is going to lose their interest. Body and mind needs to be refreshed. All you are doing is spinning your wheels if you go any longer than that.

'I learned that from Mr. Brown," Riley the Bengals' alltime leader in pass interceptions with 64, said with a smile. He played with the Bengals from 1969 through 1983.

# ARTIST JOHN A. RUTHVEN



"I believe that art is as necessary to our heritage as the history book. Both record past and present in the effort to educate and enrich the lives of people today and in the future. It is my endeavor, through my paintings, to record for later generations some of the beauty of nature that exists in my lifetime." JOHN A. RUTHVEN John A. Ruthven's fascination with nature

began as a boy in Cincinnati. It continued through high school and four years in the Navy aboard a subchaser going around the world four times sketching birds and animals along the way. Back in Cincinnati after his tour of duty, John entered the Cincinnati Art Academy and later opened his own commercial art studio. In 1960 he entered the Federal Duck Stamp Competition and won with his Redhead Ducks. He was on his way to the top from there. Commissions have kept him booked two to three years in advance. He was honored as Ducks Unlimited first artist of the year in 1972, first Ohio Ducks Stamp artist in 1982, first artist of the year for Ducks Unlimited Print/Stamp program and later, the first Ohio State Animal print/stamp artist.

John's originals hang in museums, corporate offices and homes all over the world. He formed Wildlife International in 1971 to publish and distribute limited edition lithographs. He remains in total control of all the processes from completion of the original to shipping of the prints all over the United States and the world. He has been accepted at most of the major judged shows in the country including Leigh Yawkey Woodson in Wausau, Wisconsin, the Artist of America exhibition in Denver and many others. He has been honored with unveilings of originals, paintings in the White House and abroad. John and his wife, Judy, have become the driving force behind the historic preservation in their hometown of Georgetown, Ohio, where Ulysses S. Grant grew up. Today the town, as well as the Grant Homestead, owned by the Ruthvens, is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

John has no time to sit back and enjoy the acclaim that has been given to his talent. He continues to search for new subjects to come to life on his drawing board. A recent trip to China, brought birds never before seen by most Americans. He hopes to show us the beauty of nature we can never see first hand. John serves on advisory boards for Wildlife Preservation, fund-raising including Ducks Unlimited and the International Center for the Preservation of Wild Animals. As he travels throughout the world on field trips, he sees his art being used for wildlife conservation increasing public awareness of the problems faced by our endangered species. John has a quiet pride that the thing he likes to do most can bring beauty and a growing awareness for preservation needs to the people his work touches.

# ICKEY ON TREADMILL

Cincinnati Bengals' running back Ickey Woods was on a twomonth running program using a hydraulic treadmill during the offseason.

The program Woods was on is designed to further rehabilitate a knee injury that required reconstructive surgery two years ago.

The treadmill Woods used reaches 26 miles per hour and "imbs to 40 degrees.

The program was administered to Woods, cornerback Eric Thomas and kicker Jim Breech by former Cincinnati linebacker Jim LeClair, who now is with Frappier Acceleration in Fargo, N.D.

"From what I see, Ickey should be able to run a 40 in the 4.5 range, maybe the low 4.6s," LeClair said. "He did 24 miles per hour on the treadmill and not many have."

Besides the hydraulic treadmil, the program features weights and sprint cords — rubberband-like ropes tied around a runner's waist and a stationary object.

"I can't wait to get on the field," Woods said. "I'm looking forward to playing right away and not having to sit and watch. I want to be what I was."




