

PERTINENT DATES FOR THE 1985 NFL SEASON

RIVERFRONT STADIUM

Riverfront Stadium, located on the banks of the Ohio River, is Bengal-land in Cincinnati.

The stadium is situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway.

The seating capacity when the field is in football configuration is 59,755.

The playing surface at Riverfront is Astroturf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will hold 4500 automobiles. Three parking decks, plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium.

Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages and cartoons through a computer.

The Stadium opened in 1970.

The largest crowd ever to assemble for a sporting event in Cincinnati was at Riverfront when 60,284 fans watched the Bengals and Browns on October 17, 1971.

PAUL BROWN VICE PRESIDENT GENERAL MANAGER

Professional football today reflects the genius of Paul Brown, the greatest innovator the game has known.

The legendary Brown, the man with the most distinguished coaching record in football history, is a

principal owner, vice president and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Brown has guided the destinies of the Bengals since he founded the club late in 1967. He served as general manager and head coach from 1968 through 1975 and then moved into the general manager's chair on a fulltime scale.

The touch of Paul Brown made the Bengals almost an instant success as he guided the young team to three playoff appearances and two American Football Conference Central Division championships in eight years.

It took Brown only three years to win the AFC Central Division title in 1970, quickest ever for an expansion team in the National Football League. His final team in 1975 won another AFC Central crown and finished with an 11-3 record.

Brown was named "National Football League Executive of the Year" in 1981, after directing the Cincinnati Bengals to their first AFC championship and appearance in Super Bowl XVI.

During his brilliant coaching career, Brown has been a part of the "big game" more than any man who ever coached.

He has experienced the championship game feeling many times during his career at every level of competition. His first professional team, the Cleveland Browns, played for the world championship every year during the first 10 years of its existence. Founded for the All-America Conference in 1946, the team won all four championships during that league's history, then came into the NFL under much scorn and derision.

Brown and his Browns responded by thumping the defending champion Philadelphia Eagles, 35-10, in the season's opener to set the stage for things to come. The Browns went on to win the league championship.

He won three NFL titles and seven Eastern Division crowns as coach of the Browns.

"We didn't call it the Super Bowl at the time, of course," said Brown, "but it was the same thing — the championship game of professional football."

Brown achieved 361 victories, suffered only 133 losses and 16 ties for a remarkable .725 percentage, top record ever. He fashioned 213 victories, 104 losses and nine ties in 25 years of coaching in the NFL.

His return to the NFL, after a five-year absence after leaving Cleveland in 1963, coincided with the emergence of pro football as the nations's top spectator sport and he has done much to keep it that way as a member of the NFL's competition committee, the group most responsible for opening up the game's offenses during recent years.

He was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1967, his first year of eligibility when he was away from coaching. He also has presented many of his former players for induction. Brown is the master builder of pro football franchises. He cre-

Brown is the master builder of pro football franchises. He created a dynasty in Cleveland and in 17 years in Cincinnati has given the Queen City three AFC Central division champions, a "wild card" playoff team, an AFC championship and a Super Bowl team.

Brown is responsible for making pro football coaching the exacting science it is today. When he organized the Cleveland Browns in the All-America Football Conference in 1946, he started doing things no one else had ever done. He made coaching a science. His success was instantaneous and only when other coaches began copying his procedures did the won and lost records start to level off.

In spite of his statistical record, which has no challenger, Brown did more than put numbers in the win column. It is the way he went about putting together the teams that made his record possible that he will be remembered and honored for.

Here, in part is how his citation read when he was inducted into the Professional Football Hall of Fame: "... in addition to his great record, Brown is equally respected as a man who brought fine organization to professional football. He was the first to make coaching a fulltime profession, not only for himself, but for a staff of assistants, a practice that has since become universal."

Brown is certainly a friend of coaches everywhere, regardless of the level at which they coach.

He had a background of exceptional success as a high school, college and military service coach when he was given his first pro assignment with the new Cleveland team. Immediately, he hired a fulltime staff and he instituted a system for scouting college talent on a scale never before imagined by other pro teams.

He became the first to (1) use intelligence tests as a hint to a player's learning potential, (2) use notebooks and classroom techniques extensively, (3) set up complete film clip statistical studies and (4) then grade his own players from what he found. Brown was the first coach to keep his players together at a hotel the night before a home game as well as a road game.

Strategically, he started the practice of calling plays from the sideline by utilizing guards as messengers.

He developed pass patterns for the offense that were designed to pick holes in the defense, but then he devoted his efforts to perfecting the kind of defense that could counteract a pattern passing attack.

Using his personnel to the limit, Brown was the first to switch some fine running backs to the defense because "they were so good I didn't want to waste them on offense."

All of Brown's measures are now common practice, but 34 years ago they were revolutionary in the coaching world.

Brown's coaching resume shows two years at Severn Prep School in Maryland; nine years at Massillon High School in Ohio (Brown's hometown); three years at Ohio State University, two years with the successful Great Lakes Navy Team during World War II; 17 years with the Cleveland Browns in the All-American Football Conference and the National Football League and eight with Cincinnati.

Despite his success in the pro ranks, Brown feels the Massillon High School job was the best he ever had.

"The reason is because I felt I did much good at Massillon and was able to send many, many athletes to college through their athletic skills when there was no other way for them to go."

The Massillon stadium is named "Paul Brown Tiger Stadium".

He says he was so excited about "getting a chance to coach Ohio State I didn't even ask what my salary was going to be. My doctor advised me. 'Paul don't take that job, you're wound too tight', but I told him the truth, I said, 'I have to go.'"

And the Norwalk, Ohio, native kept right on going, ending up at the highest plateau of the game — the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Among the more significant accomplishments of his teams are a series of Ohio State championships at Massillon which in turn made that school one of America's foremost prep powers, a national collegiate championship at Ohio State in 1942, four straight AAFC championships and seven divisional titles and three NFL championships in 1950, 1954, and 1955 after the Browns had joined the NFL following the breakup of the AAFC. Ironically, it was Brown's overwhelming success — his Cleveland team had a 52-4-3 record in AAFC play — that was probably the major factor in the breakup of that league.

He is holder of the prestigious Ohio Governor's Award from James A. Rhodes; the NFL Alumni Association's Order of the Leather Helmet; the National Football Foundation's "Mr. Ohio Award" and many others.

Brown also has authored a book — "PB: The Paul Brown Story" which tells of his life in football.

Little wonder Paul Brown is known as one of the legends of the game.

He played quarterback at Miami (Ohio) University and graduated with a bachelor of arts degree. He has a master of arts degree from Ohio State University.

Paul and his wife, Mary, live in Indian Hill. His first wife, Katie, died in April, 1969. Two of his sons, Mike and Pete, are associated with the Bengal organization as assistant general manager and director of player personnel respectively. Another son, Robin, a former Bengal scout, died in July, 1978.

AUSTIN E. KNOWLTON Chairman of the Board

Austin E. "Dutch" Knowlton is the chairman of the board of the Cincinnati Bengals and has been a firm supporter from the first day of the franchise's inception.

Knowlton, a well-known builder and sportsman, has been a founder, owner and director since the franchise was begun and often can be

found watching his team play at some of the farthest waystops on the NFL map, in addition to his regular attendance at games in Riverfront Stadium.

"Like every other Bengal fan, we are looking forward to the 1985 Bengals football team winning the World Championship and the Super Bowl."

Besides being not only one of the team's most rabid fans as well as its chairman of the board, Knowlton also is an avid sportsman who spends as much of his free time as possible overseeing his second great interest—the breeding and selling of show horses at his Emerald Farm in Delaware County.

Also, during the glorious days of the 70's, Knowlton was the largest owner of the Cincinnati Reds.

Sometimes there is not as much time to devote to these activities as he'd like because of his business interest. A few years ago, he organized the Arga Co., which is engaged in the construction of buildings, leasing of buildings, and other endeavors. A division of this company, K Construction Management, is engaged in the construction business in Ohio and other states.

After receiving a degree in architecture and civil engineering from Ohio State University, Knowlton joined his father's construction company.

He assumed ownership of the construction business and operated it under the name of Knowlton Construction Company.

Knowlton Construction Company built the major portion of Ohio University, Bowling Green State University; as well as many college buildings at Ohio State University, Miami University, Capital University, Otterbein College and numerous schools and universities.

After World War II, he secured the franchise for the sale of Beechcraft Products in Ohio and surrounding areas and formed the Ohio Aviation Company of Vandalia and Cleveland, Ohio.

His offices are in Bellefontaine and Columbus, Ohio, and he resides in Delaware County at Emerald Farms, and Aspen at Red Mountain Ranch.



JOHN SAWYER President

John Sawyer, a well-known business executive, has been president of the Cincinnati Bengals since the team was formed in 1967.

Sawyer, along with Paul and Mike Brown, was one of the Bengals founders. He put in many hours of hard work and thousands of miles of travel to bring the NFL franchise to Cincinnati.

John, Paul and Mike represented Cincinnati in the many NFL meetings held prior to awarding the franchise. He currently attends all NFL owners' meetings and played a part in the NFL realignment in 1970.

Sawyer, a man constantly on the go, has made every road trip with the Bengals except one since the team began playing in 1968.

John developed and is president of J. Sawyer Company, a multifaceted agricultural concern which has included aviation firms, a restaurant, an antique shop, a horticultural products company, a commercial feed lot, numerous farms and ranches in Ohio, Kentucky, Mississippi, Florida, Wyoming, Colorado, and Arkansas. J. Sawyer Company is one of the leading farm management and real estate brokerage firms in the midwest.

John is an inductee of the Ohio Agricultural Hall of Fame, Ohio's highest honor in the field of agriculture. He has been honored for serving Ohio agriculture for more than 30 years as a farmer and innovator. His support and leadership helped greatly in the early development of the American Soybean Association and the Ohio Beef Marketing Program.

As a pilot, he was a pioneer in the aerial application of crop pesticides. He has been a leader in sound environmental management in the livestock industry and has developed a high volume composting system used at the Paygro plant and Ohio Feed Lot in Southern Charleston, Ohio.

This innovative "Paygro Composting System" has been recognized by the E.P.A. as an effective method of sludge treatment and is being installed in large Ohio cities to help solve the tremendous municipal waste problems.

John has never lost his love of airplanes which began as a B-17 pilot in WWII. He still retains the company's Lear jet which he flew on business trips from Madison Aviation Center which he built in London, Ohio.

Other special interests of John's include the Boy Scouts, Children's Hospital Medical Center, Episcopal Diocese of Southern Ohio, Little Miami Inc., and the Ohio Agricultural Research & Development Center at Wooster, Ohio.

John is a graduate of Princeton University and is the son of the late Charles Sawyer, former Secretary of Commerce. He lives in Indian Hill and has four daughters, Anne Putnam, Elizabeth Selnick, Catherine and Mary.



MIKE BROWN Assistant General Manager Legal Counsel

Mike Brown holds the important roles of assistant general manager and legal counsel of the Cincinnati Bengals.

He has combined with his father, Paul, the team's general manager, to give Cincinnati one of the finest franchises in the National Football League. In addition to being assistant general manager and legal counsel, Mike Brown also is an owner and a member of the Bengals' board of directors.

Mike handles player contract matters and the Bengals' contracts and negotiations with the City of Cincinnati. He also works closely with television and radio executives involved with the Bengals and handles all the club's legal matters.

He has guided the Bengals from an expansion franchise in 1968 to a Super Bowl contender. The 1981 team fulfilled most of his dreams by winning the American Football Conference championship and playing in Super Bowl XVI.

The Brown family dedicated itself to bringing professional football to Cincinnati in the mid-60s and was rewarded in 1967 when the city was awarded a franchise in the old American Football League which merged with the National Football League in 1970.

Professional football in Cincinnati was visualized by Mike long before it became a reality. Several years before the Cincinnati franchise materialized he conducted a detailed survey which showed the potential of the area as a professional football market. His drive produced the franchise for Cincinnati.

Paul and Mike Brown represent the Bengals at all league meetings and they played a major role in bringing about the merger which brought the American Football League and the National Football League together.

Mike, who has been associated with football all of his life and has had the benefit of the best possible teacher, is a member of the NFL Management Council, a group which deals with labormanagement decisions within the NFL.

Mike did his undergraduate work at Dartmouth where he played quarterback. He received his law degree from Harvard Law School and was associated with a law firm in Cleveland for five years and then joined his father with the Cleveland Browns.

Mike and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Katie, 19, and a son, Paul, $15\frac{1}{2}$.



PETE BROWN Director of Player Personnel

Pete Brown heads the Cincinnati Bengals player personnel department.

Pete, Paul Brown's youngest son, is highly respected throughout the National Football League as an excellent judge of football talent.

Cincinnati drafts are annually con-

sidered among the best in the NFL.

Brown is in his 16th season as director of player personnel with the Bengals. He served as assistant director of player personnel for one year before being elevated to the top spot. He supervises a staff of scouts and personally scouts a heavy schedule of college games. Pete also is an owner and a member of the board of directors of

the Bengals.

He is involved in physical conditioning and played a major role in giving the successful Nautilus program an early introduction to the Bengals.

He is a graduate of Denison University.



SAM WYCHE HEAD COACH

The Cincinnati Bengals' Sam Wyche is the youngest head coach in the National Football League. The 40-year-old Wyche was named head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals on December 28, 1983. A former Bengal quarterback,

Wyche directed Cincinnati to an 8-8 record in a thrilling 1984 season. He

led his team to eight victories in the final 11 games and into the American Football Conference Central Division championship battle which was not decided until the final week of the regular season.

Cincinnati was considered out of the playoff picture when it opened its season with five consecutive losses. But Wyche kept the team moving and it responded with a tremendous showing in the second half of the season.

The fan-pleasing Bengals displayed a varied and successful offense which reflected Wyche's flair and knowledge in that area.

Sam Wyche is an innovative man who has installed a wideopen offense, and our fans enjoy it," said Paul E. Brown, Cincin-nati vice president and general manager. "He's his own offensive coordinator.'

'He makes it exciting and interesting to watch," added Brown.

"When he was a player for us he was very knowledgeable about the game and he impressed me very much, said Brown who coached Wyche in 1968-69-70 with the Bengals.

"He was the man we wanted when the head coaching job was open a year ago," Brown said. "We sought him, he didn't seek us. "I contacted Sam," added Brown. "He didn't apply for the job. I had him as a player. I knew what went with him. He's the one and only person that we contacted." Brown thought of Wyche as a future head coach as far back as

18 years ago when he was trying out for the Bengals at the team's first training camp.

"For many years I've kept the playbooks on some of my players who for one reason or another seemed to stand out in my mind, Brown recalled. "A year ago I was looking up Mike McCormack's book because I had to nominate him for the Pro Football Hall of Fame at Canton, and I came across Sam's.

"I know why I kept his. Even when he was a free agent guarterback who we kept on that old 1968 team, he was special. I looked at the book, and he had everything in excellent order. This shows that 'way back then I had a feeling ... he was a student of the game.

He was never a big star, although he did have some very good games, but he was really with it. We really kept close track of Sam down through the years after he left us.'

Wyche was born in Atlanta, Ga., on January 5, 1945, and attended North Fulton High School there.

After graduating from North Fulton High School, Wyche (like witch with a long i) enrolled at Furman University in Greenville, S.C. He tried out for the football team as a "walk on" quarterback, made it and was awarded a scholarship.

He graduated from Furman University in 1966 with a B.A. degree in business administration.

Wyche signed with the Wheeling Ironmen of the Continental Football League in 1966 and played for one season before going to the University of South Carolina as a graduate assistant under head coach Paul Dietzel. He served as a graduate assistant for two seasons and in 1968 earned an M.B.A. degree in business administration management.

In 1968, Wyche was given a try-out with Brown's Cincinnati Bengals, an American Football League expansion team in its initial season. He made the team and was the starting quarterback much of the time. He was a member of Cincinnati's first American Football Conference Central Division playoff team in 1970.

During his three seasons with the Bengals, Wyche completed 115 of 220 passes (52.3%) for 1743 yards and threw 12 touchdown passes.

In 1971, Wyche was traded to the Washington Redskins where he played for coaches George Allen and Ted Marchibroda. He played on three playoff teams including Super Bowl VII with the Redskins.

Wyche was traded to the Detroit Lions in 1974. His coach there was Rick Forzano. In 1976, Sam began the season with the St. Louis Cardinals where he participated in the first professional football game ever played in Tokyo, Japan. He concluded his playing career in 1976 with the Buffalo Bills.

After retiring from professional football, Wyche and a partner opened a sporting goods store (Sam Wyche Sports World) in Greenville, S.C., and that operation has now grown in to an eleven-store chain.

In 1979 Wyche received a call from his former quarterback coach with the Bengals, Bill Walsh, who asked him to join the San Francisco 49er staff as quarterback and passing game coach.

He accepted and coached the passing game of the 49ers from 1979 through 1982 including Super Bowl XVI when San Francisco defeated the Bengals 26-21.

While with the 49ers for four years he was widely credited with developing quarterbacks Joe Montana, Steve DeBerg and Guy Benjamin and receivers Dwight Clark, Freddie Solomon and Renaldo Nehemiah.

"Sam Wyche is the finest mind and teacher of football in the game today," says Walsh, president, general manager and head coach of the 49ers.

Montana has this to say about Wyche:

"All of Sam's career had been spent with great teachers in the game of football, and Sam deserves to be in that category now. He has been very instrumental in my development as a quarterback and complete player. His knowledge of offensive philosophies is unsurpassed."

And this from All-Pro wide receiver Dwight Clark:

"Sam has a great ability for teaching receivers. He has a special knack for spotting talent in a player and helping him reach his potential — potential the player sometimes doesn't know he has. Sam's knowledge of the passing game is unequalled. He is one of the main reasons that this 10th round draft choice is All-Pro today."

Wyche became head coach of Indiana University in 1983 and compiled a 3-8 record in a rebuilding season.

He has been taught by some of the finest teachers in the game. Among them are Brown, Walsh, Allen, Marchibroda, Forzano, Mike McCormack, Jack Pardee, Don Coryell, Jim Hanifan, Bill Johnson, Jim Ringo, Raymond Berry and Joe Gibbs.

"I don't think you are around anyone who doesn't rub off on you," said Wyche, who describes himself as a coach this way:

"I have the perspective of the player. I've sat in the locker room. I've complained about the coach's long practice, stupid sprints and all those things. So I know what the scuttlebutt will be among the team.

"Discipline is important, and without it, you collapse. At some point you find a way to beat yourself without discipline. Discipline, though, is something that can't be dished out all the time. So you create an atmosphere where the players don't want to disappoint you, as opposed to an atmosphere where they don't want to do things wrong so you won't criticize them.

"I hope that I am respected by the team. I hope they think of me as a knowledgeable and fair coach."

Wyche is a much sought-after public speaker and is a member of the prestigious President's Council on Physical Fitness.

Among his hobbies are magic, guitar, tennis, golf and home computers.

Sam and his wife, Jane, are the parents of two children, son Zak, 14, and daughter, Kerry, 12.

HEAD COACH SAM WYCHE LOOKS AT 1985



SAM WYCHE DIRECTS ACTION

"The 1985 season will depend in a large part on the way the Bengals start the regular season," Sam Wyche, Cincinnati head coach, says. "Early wins that lead to early momentum will be crucial in our drive for the playoffs this year. "In order for us to start quick and to win early, the players must

"In order for us to start quick and to win early, the players must come back to training camp in the best shape of their football careers. Knowing the attitude of our players as I do, I am confident that we will have everyone ready to go physically, mentally and emotionally.

"The strong finish in 1984 has left all of the players, coaches and staff feeling good about our chances in '85.

"Individual players crucial to the outcome of our '85 campaign center around the quarterback position. If the Bengals are involved in a difficult turn-around transition in '85, the result could be the loss of a game or two unnecessarily. Kenny Anderson is working hard and should come back in good shape. Turk Schonert, Boomer Esiason and Wayne Peace are all experienced players now.

"Defensively, we must play with fierce aggressiveness and progress from the foundation laid by Dick LeBeau in 1984. The changes that were made at the linebacker position, and the addition of draft choices in '85, should see improved productivity from our defense.

"Ray Horton has a year of starting experience now and should, barring the injuries we suffered in 1984, solidify a very strong defensive backfield.

"The college draft was important, not only as it related to the depth of our club, but the potential of some freshmen starters coming out of the '85 selections.

"The fact that the coaching staff has been together for a year now, plus the addition of Bill Johnson, gives the team confidence and adds stability to the Bengal prospects. I hope that we will maintain our youthful enthusiasm and will go into the '85 season anticipating good things happening.

"I also hope that the Bengal fans will become just as involved and just as excited about our efforts in '85. The fans play such an important part in the motivational aspect and thus the performance of our team that we must have them excited and enthusiastic in order to have the best season possible," Wyche concluded. Wyche commenting on the team position-by-position, said:

"The quarterback position is not only deep, but strong in experience and talent. The position seems crowded at the moment, but all of the players contribute talent and three of the four bring with them NFL experience. We should be strong and competitive at that position.

"The return of Cris Collinsworth and development of players like David Verser, Michael Martin plus first round draft choice Eddie Brown, give the Bengals a solid offensive receiver corps.

"Although the starting backfield has not been promised to any pair of backs, everyone returning to camp contributes a different ability that adds a tremendous amount of flexibility to our offensive attack.

"Our offensive line is among the biggest in pro football and among the most talented. Not only do we have a strong front line, but a lot of depth in the persons of Bruce Kozerski, Bruce Reimers, Gary Smith and the return of Mike Obrovac.

"Our defensive line is strong and deep. We have six defensive linemen, all of whom can be a factor in any game in 1985.

"The linebacker position which was suspect going into the 1984 season, proved to be a strong point and looks to be even stronger in 1985.

"Our defensive backfield should be much better this year. Ray Horton is no longer a first year starter and our guys return healthy and intact for the '85 campaign.

"Our specialists, punter Pat McInally returns with All-Pro experience and is excited about the '85 campaign and Jim Breech is one of the most consistent kickers in football and has proven to be a clutch kicker over the years. Michael Martin led the National Football League in punt returns last year and will see action, not only as a returner, but more snaps as a wide receiver as well.

"Our special teams will receive a great deal of emphasis this year. I will work very closely with each of the special teams. Individual position coaches will be involved in different areas of the kicking game. We improved greatly in 1984 and must be among the best in 1985 to have a championship year."

JIM ANDERSON Running Backs

Jim Anderson is in his second year as the running back coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Anderson joined head coach Sam Wyche's staff in January, 1984, after coaching the running backs at Stanford University for three years (1981-83).

He had coached at five colleges before joining the Bengals.

The 37-year-old Anderson coached at Southern Methodist (1976-80), Nevada-Las Vegas (1974-75); Scottsdale Community College (1973), and Cal-Western (now U.S. International) (1970-71). He also coached San Diego Morse High School in 1972.

A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Anderson was voted team co-captain and NAIA All-District as a linebacker-defensive end for Cal-Western in San Diego in 1970.

Anderson was running back coach at Nevada-Las Vegas in 1974 when the Runnin' Rebels posted a 12-1 season and advanced to the Grantland Rice Bowl (the NCAA Division II semi-finals). He coached Mike Thomas, NFL Rookie of the year with the Washington Redskins in 1975, at Nevada-Las Vegas.

Anderson was born March 27, 1948, and he and his wife, Marcia, have a son, Derek, 10.



BRUCE COSLET Wide Receivers

Bruce Coslet is entering his fourth season on the Cincinnati Bengals coaching staff.

Coslet will direct the Bengals' wide receivers for the second consecutive season.

A former Cincinnati tight end, Coslet joined the Bengals in 1981 after leaving the San Francisco 49ers where he was special teams and tight ends coach.

He directed the Cincinnati tight ends and special teams in 1981-82-83 seasons. He was a teammate of new head coach Sam Wyche for two years with the Bengals and coached with him at San Francisco.

Coslet played for the Bengals for eight seasons (1969-76) at tight end and was an outstanding special teams player. He was special teams captain for several years and was the first former Bengal to return to the team as a coach. A graduate of the University of the Pacific, Coslet caught 64 passes

A graduate of the University of the Pacific, Coslet caught 64 passes for 877 yards and nine touchdowns during his National Football League career.

Bruce and his wife, Kathy, have two children, J.J., 10, and Amy, 8. He was born August 5, 1946.



BILL JOHNSON Tight Ends

Bill Johnson returned to the Cincinnati Bengals' coaching staff on January 29, 1985.

Johnson, who was head coach of the Bengals in 1976, 1977 and for five games in 1978 after succeeding Paul Brown, will direct the tight ends.

"I have known Bill since 1968 when I was a player here and have admired him as a person and a coach from that time on," said Sam Wyche, Bengals' head coach. "He will add just the right dose of experience and maturity to an already cohesive staff."

Johnson compiled an 18-15 won-lost record while coaching the Bengals. He had been Cincinnati's offensive line coach from 1968 until being named head coach in 1976.

"Tiger" came back to Cincinnati from the Detroit Lions where he was backfield coach in 1983 and 1984.

After leaving the Bengals, Johnson joined the Tampa Bay Bucs where he was offensive coordinator from 1979 through 1982.

Johnson's coaching career began in 1956 with the San Francisco 49ers where he was offensive line coach until moving to the Bengals in 1968. Johnson played center for the 49ers from 1948-55 and was elected to the Helms Foundation All-Pro team. He played college football at Texas A & M.

Johnson, who has been coaching in the National Football League for 29 years, is a native of Tyler, Texas. He and his wife, Dot, have a daughter, Sherilyn, and two sons, Bill and Tommy.



DICK LEBEAU Defensive Coordinator Defensive Backfield

Dick LeBeau is the Cincinnati Bengals' defensive coordinator and defensive backfield coach.

LeBeau, who is highly-ranked in NFL coaching circles, became Cincinnati's defensive co-

ordinator on December 30, 1983. He has been with the Bengals since the 1980 season and improvement in the team's once weak secondary came soon after his appointment.

LeBeau, a former All-Pro cornerback for the Detroit Lions, came to Cincinnati from the Green Bay Packers where his defensive backfield was called the SWAT unit because of the ability of its members to deliver hard tackles.

He joined the Packers in 1976 after serving as special teams coach of the Philadelphia Eagles following retirement as a player in 1972.

The 47-year-old LeBeau was a fifth round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1959 after an outstanding career at Ohio State where he was an offensive and defensive back. He was released by Cleveland and signed by Detroit as a rookie.

LeBeau set an alltime durability record for cornerbacks by playing 171 consecutive games during his career with the Lions. His 62 pass interceptions rank him fifth on professional football's alltime list. Ken Riley, one of LeBeau's former players, went around him in 1983 to claim fourth with 65 interceptions.

LeBeau starred for Ohio State for three seasons and was a standout performer on the 1957 Buckeye national championship team.

While with Detroit, he was selected to play in three Pro Bowl games and enjoyed his best statistical season in 1970 when he intercepted nine passes and compiled 96 yards in returns.

Born Charles Richard LeBeau on September 9, 1937, in London, Ohio, he was an All-Ohio High School selection before going to Ohio State.

Dick and his wife, Nancy, have a son, Brandon Grant, 6.



JIM McNALLY Offensive Line

Jim McNally is beginning his sixth season as offensive line coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

The hard-working McNally has put together a huge, cohesive unit that is considered one of the best offensive lines in the NFL.

When McNally arrived in Cincinnati in 1980 one of the tasks he faced was to increase the pass protection and trim the number of quarterback sacks.

He has responded to the challenge. In 1979, the year before he came on the scene, Bengal quarterbacks were sacked 63 times, highest in the NFL. McNally cut the number to 36 in 1980, 35 in 1981, 27 in 1982, 41 in 1983 and 45 in 1984.

McNally had a wealth of college coaching experience before taking his first pro job with the Bengals. He was offensive line coach at Wake Forest in 1979; at Boston College from 1976 to 1978; at Marshall from 1973 to 1975, and at the University of Buffalo from 1966 to 1969.

McNally played guard for three seasons at the University of Buffalo where he was All-East. He was inducted into the University of Buffalo Hall of Fame in 1983.

Born December 13, 1943 in Buffalo, Jim and his wife, Carolyn, have three children, Jenny, 14; Betsy, 11; and Jon, 10.



DICK SELCER Linebackers

Cincinnatian Dick Selcer, who has been in the coaching ranks for 23 seasons, is the linebacker coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Selcer is in his second year with the Bengals. He joined the Cincinnati staff January 6, 1984,

leaving the Houston Oilers where he directed the linebackers in 1981-82-83.

Selcer coached in the collegiate ranks for 19 years before joining the Oilers. He was an assistant at Xavier University (1962-64), defensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati (1956-64), and Brown University (1967-69).

He was head coach at Xavier in 1970-71 before moving to the University of Wisconsin where he was an assistant from 1972-74. He served as defensive coordinator at Kansas State University and then held the same position at Southwestern Louisiana University.

Selcer, who was born August 22, 1937, is a former Notre Dame quarterback and running back and earned letters in football and baseball. He played high school football at Cincinnati Elder and was an All-Ohio selection. He captained the Elder football, basketball and baseball teams in his senior year.

He and his wife, Meryl, have five children, Michael, 25, Stephen, 24; Patrick, 22; Connie, 19; and Kevin, 14.



BILL URBANIK Defensive Line

Cincinnati's defensive line coach is Bill Urbanik who is entering his second season on head coach Sam Wyche's staff.

head coach Sam Wyche's staff. Urbanik joined Cincinnati on January 16, 1984, after serving as defensive line coach at Wake Forest University for six years.

Urbanik was a three-year letterman under Woody Hayes at Ohio State and was twice named honorable mention at defensive tackle on the All-Big Ten team. He was a member of the Buckeye's national championship team in 1968.

Urbanik's coaching career began as a student assistant at Ohio State in 1970. He was head football and wrestling coach at Columbus Watterson High School in 1970 and 1971. After leaving Watterson, Urbanik went to Marshall where he earned his masters degree and coached the offensive linemen from 1971-73.

In 1973 he returned to the high school ranks as head coach at George Rogers Clark High School in Winchester, Ky., before going back to Marshall for a one-year stint as defensive line coach. He then served as defensive line, defensive end and linebacker coach at Northern Illinois for three seasons before moving to Wake Forest in 1978.

He and his wife, Martha, have a son, Urson, 4.

Strength coach Kim Wood is in his 11th season as a member of the Cincinnati Bengals. The 38-year-old Wood became the Bengals' first fulltime strength coach in 1975. He has made the Bengals one of the best conditioned

teams in the NFL and has instilled dedication and pride in physical fitness among the players. The innovative Wood has been one of the leaders in the Nautilus

The innovative Wood has been one of the leaders in the Nautilus training program since its inception and is credited with many training techniques being used throughout football. He has set up programs for a number of NFL and college teams.

Wood was an outstanding running back at the University of Wisconsin. Kim and his wife, Connie, have a son, John, 6, twin daughters Becky and Alyssa, 4, and another daughter, Jacqueline, 2.



Bengals Honor Curtis

The Cincinnati Bengals will honor retired wide receiver Isaac Curtis during halftime ceremonies at the Cincinnati-San Diego game September 22 at Riverfront Stadium.

"He's been a great player for us and is a fine person," said Paul E. Brown, Cincinnati Bengals' vice president and general manager. "We're happy he spent his entire career here and we plan to honor him at the San Diego game."

The swift, graceful sure-fingered Curtis came to Cincinnati in 1973 when he was the Bengals first round draft choice following an outstanding career at San Diego State where he was a top football player and a world class sprinter in track.

In 12 seasons with the Bengals, Curtis caught 420 passes for 7106 yards, both team records, and scored 53 touchdowns. He averaged 17 yards a reception and played in the Pro Bowl four times.

Curtis had many big seasons in Cincinnati and as a rookie in 1973 he caught 45 passes for 843 yards and had nine touchdown receptions. He had 10 TD receptions in 1974.

In 1975, Curtis sparked the Bengals to an 11-3 season and the American Football Conference Central Division crown with 44 receptions for 934 yards and seven touchdowns. His biggest year for receptions was 1978 when he had 47.

His 53 touchdowns, all on pass receptions, are second in club records only to the 70 scored by Pete Johnson. Curtis is national sales manager for Winegardner and Ham-

Curtis is national sales manager for Winegardner and Hammons Inc., a Cincinnati-based firm which operates Holiday Inns in 30 cities. He also is a partner with Bengal quarterback Ken Anderson in a beverage distributorship in Dayton, Ohio.

His hometown is Santa Ana, Calif.

NEW RULES FOR 1985 SEASON

Action taken by the NFL presidents at the League's 1985 annual meeting included the adoption of the following rules changes:

- Clarified the general rule regarding pass interference and made the exceptions involving incidental contact more specific.
- Player signaling for a fair catch must fully extend one arm above the head and wave from side to side.
- —When a player slides to the ground feet first, the play will be declared dead at the initial spot the player contacts the ground, eliminating the requirement that the ball carrier be touched by an opponent to end the play.
- —Clearly prohibited running forward and leaping in an obvious attempt to block a field goal or point after touchdown try at or near the line of scrimmage when the ball is snapped.
- A play will end whenever a quarterback kneels or simulates kneeling on the ground during the last two minutes of each half.
- -Players may not change the color of hand and arm coverings on a week-to-week basis.
- —The length of a team time out during the last two minutes of each half will be reduced from 90 to 60 seconds.
- —Except in the last two minutes of each half, the game clock will start with the referee's ready for play signal following all penalties on which the clock would have continued running had there been no penalty.




