RIVERFRONT STADIUM

Riverfront Stadium, located on the banks of the Ohio River, is Bengal-land in Cincinnati.

The stadium is situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway.

The seating capacity when the field is in football configuration is 59,755.

The playing surface at Riverfront is Astroturi.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will hold 4500 automobiles. Three parking decks, plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium.

Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces. A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages and carbons through a computer.

The stadium opened in 1970.

The largest crowd ever to assemble for a sporting event in Cincinnati was at Riverfront when 60,284 fans watched the Bengals and Cleveland Browns on October 17, 1971.

PAUL BROWN Vice President, General Manager

Paul Brown has earned the respect of everyone associated with football. Brown is a legend in his own time. He is football's greatest innovator and has handled virtually every job in the game. His contributions exceed those of all others.

Brown is a principal owner, director, vice president and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals.

His impact on professional football is constant. All of his measures are now common practice, but 36 years ago they were revolutionary in the football world.

As a coach, Brown achieved the most distinguished record in football history — he won 361 games, lost only 133 and had 16 ties for a remarkable .725 percentage, top record ever. He had 213 victories, 104 losses and nine ties in 25 years of coaching in the National Football League.

His teams were noted for being well-coached and sound in fundamentals. His philosophy: "You have to be fundamentally sound, you can't beat yourself."

Many players and coaches benefited from his teaching. He has 15 former players and coaches who have been associated with him in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Hall of Famers who have been touched by the Brown magic are: Doug Atkins, DE, Cleveland 1955-62; Jim Brown, FB, Cleveland 1957-63; Willie Davis, DE, Cleveland 1960-62; Weeb Ewbank, Coach, Cleveland 1949-53; Len Ford, E, Cleveland 1950-57; Frank Gatski, C, Cleveland 1950-56; Otto Graham, QB, Cleveland 1946-55; Forrest Gregg, Coach, Cincinnati 1980-83; Lou Groza, T-K, Cleveland 1950-62; Dante Lavelli, E, Cleveland 1946-56; Mike McCormack, G, Cleveland 1954-62; Marion Motley, FB, Cleveland 1946-53; Bill Willis, G, Cleveland 1946-53; Bobby Mitchell, RB, Cleveland 1958-61; and Len Dawson, QB, Cleveland 1960-61.

Brown has guided the destinies of the Bengals since their start in 1968 and years before that while he was organizing the franchise and working to locate it in Cincinnati.

He was general manager and head coach from 1968 to 1975 when he moved into the general manager's role on a fulltime basis.

The touch of Paul Brown made the Bengals almost an instant success as he guided the young team to three playoff appearances and two American Football Conference Central Division championships in eight years.

It took Brown only three years to win the AFC Central Division title in 1970, quickest ever for an expansion team in the National Football League. His final team in 1975 won another AFC Central crown and finished with an 11-3 record. Brown was named "National Football League Executive of the

Brown was named "National Football League Executive of the Year" in 1981, after directing the Cincinnati Bengals to their first AFC championship and an appearance in Super Bowl XVI.

During his brilliant coaching career, Brown was a part of the "big game" more than any man who ever coached.

He has experienced the championship game feeling many times during his career at every level of competition. His first professional team, the Cleveland Browns, played for the world championship every year during the first 10 years of its existence. Founded for the All-America Conference in 1946, the team won all four championships during that league's history, then came into the NFL under much scorn and derision.

Brown and his Browns responded by thumping the defending champion Philadelphia Eagles, 35-10, in the season's opener to set the stage for things to come. The Browns went on to win the league championship.

He won three NFL titles and seven Eastern Division crowns as coach of the Browns.

"We didn't call it the Super Bowl at the time, of course" said

Brown, "but it was the same thing — the championship game of professional football."

His return to the NFL, following a five-year absence after leaving Cleveland in 1963, coincided with the emergence of pro football as the nation's top spectator sport and he has done much to keep it that way as a member of the NFL's competition committee, the group most responsible for opening the game's offenses during recent years.

He was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1967, his first year of eligibility when he was away from coaching. He also has presented many of his former players for induction.

Brown is the master builder of pro football franchises. He created a dynasty in Cleveland and in 19 years in Cincinnati has given the Queen City three AFC Central Division champions, a "wild card" playoff team, an AFC championship and a Super Bowl team.

Brown is responsible for making pro football coaching the exacting science it is today. When he organized the Cleveland Browns in the All-American Football Conference in 1946, he started doing things no one else had ever done. He made coaching a science.

His success was instantaneous and only when coaches began copying his procedures did the won and lost records start to level off.

He won game after game but his contributions went further than that. The way he went about putting together his teams won't ever be forgotten.

Here, in part is how his citation read when he was inducted into the Professional Football Hall of Fame ", . . in addition to his great record, Brown is equally respected as a man who brought fine organization to professional football. He was the first to make coaching a fulltime profession, not only for himself, but for a staff of assistants, a practice that has since become universal."

Brown is a friend of coaches on every level of football.

He had a background of exceptional success as a high school, college and military service coach when he was given his first pro assignment with the new Cleveland team. Immediately, he hired a fulltime staff and he instituted a system for scouting college talent on a scale never before imagined by other pro teams.

He became the first to (1) use intelligence tests as a hint to a player's learning potential, (2) use notebooks and classroom techniques extensively, (3) set up complete film clip statistical studies and (4) then grade his own players from what he found. Brown was the first coach to keep his players together at a hotel the night before a home game as well as a road game.

Strategically, he started the practice of calling plays from the sideline by utilizing guards as messengers.

He developed pass patterns for the offense that were designed to pick holes in the defense, but then he devoted his efforts to perfecting the kind of defense that could counteract a pattern passing attack.

Using his personnel to the limit, Brown was the first to switch some fine running backs to the defense because "they were so good I did not want to waste them on offense."

All now are common practice, but they were highly unusual when Brown first employed them 36 years ago.

Brown's coaching resume shows two years at Severn Prep School in Maryland; nine years at Massillon High School in Ohio (Brown's hometown); three years at Ohio State University, two years with the successful Great Lakes Navy team during World War II; 17 years with the Cleveland Browns in the All-America Football Conference and the National Football League and eight with Cincinnati.

Despite his success in the pro ranks, Brown feels the Massillon High School job was the best he ever had.

"The best job I ever had was coaching the Massillon Tigers," Brown says. "That's because I really think I did the most good there.

"The reason is that I was able to send many, many athletes to college through their athletic skills when there was no other way for them to go."

Brown was an excellent athlete himself at Massillon High School where he became a top football player and a state pole vault champion. When he became head football coach in 1932, he compiled an 80-8-2 record, becoming known throughout the nation in the process. His teams had separate winning streaks of 33 and 26 games. The Massillon Stadium is named "Paul Brown Tiger Stadium."

Brown's glory at Massillon led Ohio State to offer him the job of coaching the Buckeyes. The offer came in 1941.

He says he was so excited about "getting a chance to coach Ohio State I didn't even ask what my salary was going to be. My doctor advised me: 'Paul don't take that job, you're wound too tight. But I told him the truth, I said I have to go.' "

And the Norwalk, Ohio, native kept right on going, ending up at the highest plateau of the game — the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Among the more significant accomplishments of his teams are a series of Ohio state championships at Massillon which in turn made that school one of America's foremost prep powers, a national collegiate championship at Ohio State in 1942, four straight AAFC championships and seven divisional titles and three NFL championships in 1950, 1954, and 1955 after the Browns had joined the NFL following the breakup of the AAFC. Ironically, it was Brown's overwhelming success — his Cleveland team had a 52-4-3 record in AAFC play — that was probably the major factor in the breakup of that league.

Brown has achieved greatness, but says he's not all that aware of it. His secret might be his perspective.

He recalls something that happened at Massillon.

"Once we were scheduled for a road game against Niles the week before the (Canton) McKinley game, and for one of the few times in my life I became very ill. My doctor told me I'd have to miss the trip, which I just couldn't imagine doing. How could the team win without me?

"But the doctor told me, 'Everyone's useful, no one's necessary,' which I didn't guite believe, but I stayed home anyway.

sary,' which I didn't quite believe, but I stayed home anyway. "That night at home, I waited frantically to get a phone call at halftime to see how we were doing. Finally it rang.

halftime to see how we were doing. Finally it rang. "How are we doing?" I asked. "The voice on the other end said, we're winning 47-0. That was a lesson — and a lesson that put me in my place but good."

me in my place but good." Brown has won countless football and civic awards. Among them are the prestigious Ohio Governor's Award from Jarnes A. Rhodes; the NFL Alumni Association's Order of the Leather Helmet; the National Football Foundation's "Mr. Ohio Award." He was inducted into the National High School Sports Hall of Fame in July.

He also has authored a book — "P.B.: The Paul Brown Story" which tells of his life in football.

Brown played quarterback at Miami (Ohio) University and graduated with a bachelor of arts degree. He has a master of arts degree from Ohio State University.

Paul and his wife, Mary, live in Indian Hill. His first wife, Katie, died in April, 1969. Two of his sons, Mike and Pete, are associated with the Bengal organization as assistant general manager and legal counsel and director of player personnel respectively. Another son, Robin, a former Bengal scout, died in July, 1978.



AUSTIN E. KNOWLTON Chairman of the Board

Austin E. "Dutch" Knowlton is the chairman of the board of the Cincinnati Bengals and has been a firm supporter from the first day of the franchise's inception.

Knowlton, a well-known builder and sportsman, has been a founder, owner and director since the franchise was begun and often can be found watching his team

can be found watching his team play at some of the farthest waystops on the NFL map, in addition to his regular attendance at games in Riverfront Stadium.

Knowlton also is an avid sportsman who spends as much of his free time as possible overseeing his second great interest the breeding and selling of show horses at his Emerald Farm in Delaware County.

Also, during the glorious days of the 70's, Knowlton was the

largest owner of the Cincinnati Reds.

Sometimes there is not as much time to devote to these activities as he'd like because of his business interests. A few years ago he organized the ARGA Co. One division, Vesta Construction Company, is engaged in the construction of buildings, leasing of buildings and other endeavors. A division of this company, K Construction Management, is engaged in the construction management business in Ohio and other states.

After receiving a degree in architecture and civil engineering from Ohio State University, Knowlton joined his father's construction company and later assumed ownership of the construction business and operated it under the name of Knowlton Construction Company.

During the expansion of the college program, he designed, built and financed 54 college dormitories and other buildings for various colleges and universities in various states. He built the major portion of Ohio University, Bowling Green State University and many college buildings at Ohio State University, Miami University, Capital University, Otterbein College and numerous other schools and universities.

His offices are in Bellefontaine and Columbus, Ohio, and he resides in Delaware County at Emerald Farms, and in Aspen at Red Mountain Ranch.



JOHN SAWYER President

John Sawyer, a well-known business executive, has been president of the Cincinnati Bengals since the team was formed in 1967.

Sawyer, along with Paul and Mike Brown, was one of the Bengals founders. He put in many hours of hard work and thousands of miles of travel to bring the NFL franchise to Cincinnati. He is an owner and a member of the team's board of directors.

John, Paul and Mike represented Cincinnati in the many NFL meetings held prior to awarding the franchise. He currently attends all NFL owners' meetings and played a part in the NFL realignment in 1970.

Sawyer, a man constantly on the go, has made every road trip with the Bengals except two since the team began playing in 1968.

John developed and is president of J. Sawyer Company, a multifaceted agricultural concern which has included aviation firms, an automobile agency, a restaurant, an antique shop, a horticultural products company, a commercial feed lot, numerous farms and ranches in Ohio, Kentucky, Mississippi, Florida, Wyoming, Colorado, and Arkansas. J. Sawyer Company is one of the leading farm management and real estate brokerage firms in the midwest.

He is an inductee of Ohio Agricultural Hall of Fame, Ohio's highest honor in the field of agriculture, and has been honored for serving Ohio agriculture for more than 30 years as a farmer and innovator. His support and leadership helped greatly in the early development of the American Soybean Association and the Ohio Beef Marketing Program.

As a pilot, he was a pioneer in the aerial application of crop pesticides. He has been a leader in sound environmental management in the livestock industry and has developed a high volume composting system used at the Paygro plant and Ohio Feed Lot in South Charleston, Ohio. This innovative "Paygro Composting System" has been recog-

This innovative "Paygro Composting System" has been recognized by the EPA as an effective method of sludge treatment and is being installed in large Ohio cities to help solve the tremendous municipal waste problems.

John has never lost his love of airplanes which began as a B-17 pilot in WWII. He still retains the company's Lear jet which he flew on business trips from Madison Aviation Center which he built in London, Ohio.

Other special interests of John's include the Boy Scouts, Children's Hospital Medical Center, Episcopal Diocese of Southern Ohio, Little Miami Inc., and the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center at Wooster, Ohio. John is a graduate of Princeton University and is the son of the late Charles Sawyer, former Secretary of Commerce. He and his wife, Ruth, live in Indian Hill and have four daughters, Anne Putnam, Elizabeth Selnick, Catherine Ryall, and Mary. They also enjoy three grandsons, John Putnam, William Selnick III and Nickolas Selnick.



MIKE BROWN Assistant General Manager, Legal Counsel

Mike Brown is assistant general manager, legal counsel, an owner and a member of the board of clirectors of the Cincinnati Bengals.

In these key positions, he has combined with his father, Paul, an owner, vice president and general manager, to give the Bengals one of the finest franchises in the National

Football League.

Mike has guided the Bengals from an expansion franchise in 1968 to a Super Bowl team in 1982. The 1981 Cincinnati Bengals' team fulfilled most of his hopes by winning the American Football Conference championship to earn a berth in Super Bowl XVI.

Mike and Paul Brown played major roles in bringing the Bengals to Cincinnati. Their hard work was rewarded in 1967 when the Queen City was awarded a franchise in the old American Football League which merged with the National Football League in 1970.

Mike had visualized Cincinnati as an NFL city long before the franchise was awarded. He conducted a detailed study which showed the potential of the Cincinnati area as a professional football market.

Mike handles player contract matters. He also handles Bengals' contract and negotiations with the City of Cincinnati, works with television and radio outlets involved with the Bengals and administers all the club's legal matters.

He and his father represent the Cincinnati Bengals at all NFL meetings and both played big parts in bringing about the merger of the AFL and the NFL in 1970.

Mike is a member of the NFL Management Council, a group which deals with labor-management decisions within the NFL, and served on a four-man committee of owners that selected luture Super Bowl sites.

He is a graduate of Dartmouth where he played quarterback. He received his law degree from Harvard Law School and was associated with a law firm in Cleveland before joining his father with the Cleveland Browns.

PETE BROWN Director of Player Personnel

Pete Brown, Paul Brown's youngest son, is the Cincinnati Bengals' director of player personnel.

director of player personnel. Brown, very highly-respected throughout the National Football League as a judge of football talent, is in his 19th season as director of player personnel for the Bengals. He served as assistant director of player personnel for one year line in the department

before moving into the top position in the department. Brown, whose drafts are annually considered among the best in the NFL, supervises a staff of scouts and also personally scouts a heavy schedule of college games.

He is an owner and a member of the board of directors of the Bengals. He also played a major role in giving the successful and efficient Nautilus program an early introduction to the Bengals. Pete is a graduate of Denison University.



SAM WYCHE Head Coach

Sam Wyche has developed the Cincinnati Bengals into the topranked offensive football team in the National Football League in just three years.

Wyche, who at 42 is the youngest head coach in the NFL, has put excitement into the Bengals with a skilled, varied attack filled with innovations and surprises.

His never stop offense has rewritten the Bengals' record book and last year was at the top of the NFL Club Rankings by Yards.

Wyche's Bengals gained 6490 yards in 1986-3957 passing and 2533 rushing. The Bengals scored 409 points and averaged 25.6

per game. Wyche led the team to a 10-6 record, the best for Cincinnati since a 7-2 mark in 1982, and missed a playoff berth the last week of the season. It was the third consecutive year a Cincinnati playoff entry hinged until the final week.

Wyche has made the Bengals an entertaining team with great fan appeal. His high-powered offense is spiced with unusual plays and innovations such as bringing the entire offensive team to the sideline for skull sessions during timeouts, having the offense run without a huddle at times and use of the split huddle.

His football is solid and strong and his offensive philosophies and knowledge of the passing game are unsurpassed

Wyche played a major role in the development of Cincinnati quarterback Boomer Esiason.

"He has an extreme knowledge of football and has helped me so very much," Esiason said. "We spend a lot of time together." Wyche has a 25-23 record in his three seasons in the NFL-8-8

in 1984, 7-9 in 1985 and 10-6 in 1986.

Wyche (pronounced like "witch" with a long "i") was named head coach of the Bengals on December 28, 1983, succeeding Forrest Gregg.

Paul Brown wasted no time in signing Wyche as the Bengals' new coach after the opening for the job appeared. In fact, Brown had been thinking about Wyche as a future head coach as far back as 20 years when he was trying out for the Bengals at the team's training camp.

Brown has always kept the playbooks of "players who for one reason or another seemed to stand out in my mind. Sam's was one of those I kept.

"Four years ago I was looking up Mike McCormack's book because I had to nominate him for the Hall of Fame at Canton, and I came across Sam's.

'I know why I kept his. Even when he was a free agent quarterback who we kept on that old 1968 team, he was special. I looked at the book and he had everything in excellent order. This shows that way back then I had a feeling ... he was a student of the game.

"We kept close track of Sam after he left us and he was the man we wanted when the job in Cincinnati was open," Brown said.

As a coach, Wyche has the perspective of the players since he filled their role for many seasons.

"I have the perspective of the players," Wyche says. "I've sat in the locker room. I've complained about the coach's long practice, stupid sprints and all those kinds of things. So I know what the scuttlebutt will be somewhat.

Discipline is important, and without it, you collapse. At some point, you find a way to beat yourself without discipline. Discipline, though, is something that can't be dished out all the time. So you create that atmosphere where the players don't want to disappoint you, as opposed to they don't want to do things so that you don't holler at them.

"I hope that I am respected by them. I hope they think of me as a knowledgeable coach, a fair coach.

Wyche was born in Atlanta, Ga., on January 5, 1945, and attended North Fulton High School there.

After graduating from North Fulton High School in Atlanta, he became a "walk-on" quarterback at Furman University in Greenville, S.C., where he earned a bachelor of arts degree in business administration.

Wyche signed with the Wheeling Ironmen of the Continental Football League in 1966 and played for one season before going to the University of South Carolina as a graduate assistant for two seasons and in 1968 earned a M.B.A. degree in Business Administration Management.

In 1968, Wyche was given a try-out with Brown's Cincinnati Bengals, an American Football League expansion team in its initial season. He made the team and was the starting quarterback much of the time. He was a member of Cincinnati's first American Football Conference Central Division playoff team in 1970.

During his first three seasons with the Bengals, Wyche completed 115 of 220 passes (52.3%) for 1743 yards and threw 12 touchdown passes.

touchdown passes. In 1971, Wyche was traded to the Washington Redskins where he played for coaches George Allen and Ted Marchibroda. He played on three playoff teams including Super Bowl VII with the Redskins.

Wyche was traded to the Detroit Lions in 1974. His coach there was Rick Forzano. In 1976, Sam began the season with the St. Louis Cardinals where he participated in the first professional football game ever played in Tokyo, Japan. He concluded his playing career in 1976 with the Buffalo Bills.

After retiring from professional football, Wyche and a partner opened a sporting goods store (Sam Wyche Sports World) in Greenville, S.C., and that operation has now grown into a fifteen store chain.

In 1979, Wyche received a call from his former quarterback coach with the Bengals, Bill Walsh, who asked him to join the San Francisco 49er staff as quarterback and passing game coach.

He accepted and coached the passing game of the 49ers from 1979 through 1982 including Super Bowl XVI when San Francisco defeated the Bengals 26-21.

While with the 49ers for four years he was widely credited with developing quarterbacks Joe Montana, Steve DeBerg and Guy Benjamin and receivers Dwight Clark, Freddie Solomon and Renaldo Nehemiah.

Montana says, "Sam Wyche's knowledge of offensive philosophies is unsurpassed." Clark says: "Sam has a great ability for teaching receivers and a special knack for spotting talent in a player and helping him reach his potential—potential he sometimes doesn't know he has. His knowledge of the passing game is unequaled."

Wyche was head coach at Indiana University in 1983 where he compiled a 3-8 record in a rebuilding season.

He has been taught by some of the finest coaches in the garne.

"From 1967 until the present, I have either been a teammate of or coached by the following people: Paul Brown, Paul Dietzel, Bill Walsh, Mike McCormack, Bill Johnson, Ted Marchibroda, Rick Forzano, Jack Pardee, George Allen, Maxie Baughan, Don Coryell, Jim Hannifan, Joe Gibbs, Raymond Berry, Jim Ringo, Norb Hecker, Sonny Jurgensen, Billy Kilmer, O.J. Simpson, Jim Hart, Mike White, Denny Green and John Ralston among others.

"I have been fortunate to be around so many fine coaches and players," Wyche says. "My good fortune also included four playoff years as a player, including participation in Super Bowl VII (1972) with the Washington Redskins. I also coached with the 1981 World Champion 49ers in Super Bowl XVI.

"I don't think you are around anyone who doesn't rub o'f on you," Wyche said.

Wyche is a popular public speaker and is a member of the Fresident's Council on Physical Fitness.

His hobbies include magic, guitar, tennis and golf.

Sam and his wife, Jane, have two children, Zak, 16, and Kerry, 14.

SAM WYCHE LOOKS AT 1987

"The Cincinnati Bengals were a good team in 1986 with a good record and some tremendous outings during the season, but in order for us to become more than that, a playoff team, several things have to heppen," says head coach Sam Wyche. (1) "Our high-powered offense that was ranked #1 in the NFL last

- (1) "Our high-powered offense that was ranked #1 in the NFL last year can't get fat. We have to understand that last year's performance will not gain us one yard in 1987.
- (2) "Our defense has to play to the level of it's best performance in 1986. The last six games of the 1986 season proved that our defense could perform well enough to take us to the playoffs. In 1987, they have to perform that way week after week from week #1.
- (2) "Our special teams have to respond to the efforts of our new coach, Mike Stock, and not only keep us in ball games, but win two or three games for us in the 1987 campaign.

"In 1987 football will see that the Central Division of the American Football Conference is as fine a division as there is in the game. For that reason, we will have to play even better than we did in 1986 to maintain our record. The coaches are aware of our challenge and have worked hard in the off-season to put the players in a position to be winners. We've been together for four years now and I think the players and coaches are running the same race with full appreciation of each others abilities.

"When the season is over this year, I think the measure of our success or failure will be made in terms of our consistency. Playing consistent football is always important, but in a tough division with improving teams consistency is the difference. Our goal as coaches and players for the 1987 season has to be to play consistent, predictable football, week in and week out.

"Offensively, everyone knows the difference between leading the league in offense and making the big play at the pivotal time during the game. Our offense does have room to improve in terms of detail. We cannot be happy with the number one ranking statistically, but must strive to contribute even more toward victories. In 1987 we will have to be a high-powered, but unselfish offense. We cannot get fat and assume we'll repeat our offensive effort — 1986 statistics will not score one TD in 1987. As it turned out, the 1986 stats were not good enough to put us in the playoffs anyway.

"We are expecting our *defense* to be more than "better." We expect it to be "good." We have high effort and talented people who are well-trained and well-positioned. The 1987 season should climax a three-year effort to re-establish defensive prowess on this Bengals' team. We don't ask for a number one ranking defensively, but we do expect winning efforts week after week."

"Overall, our 1987 team should be as good or better than our 1986 squad. We were blessed with relatively few injuries, although we had some in 1986. Our 1987 draft is not plentiful in numbers, but we feel that we can add two, possibly three, players in a contributing way from it. Most of the players on this team have been together now for some period of time and they and the coaches feel that our moment is at hand. Our team will be good. Whether we are good enough will depend on the dedication of the squad during the spring and summer months as we prepare for the season. We have proven to be a strong finishing team and a team that builds in confidence as the season goes along. As always, the entire season from game #1 determines our playoff hopes. We will concentrate once again on a fast start and consistent play, realizing that any one game has the potential of putting us in or keeping us out of the playoff picture," Wyche concluded.

JIM ANDERSON Running Backs

Jim Anderson joined the Cincinnati Bengals' coaching staff in 1984 as coach of the running backs.

In 1986, the Bengals ranked No. 1 in offense in the National Football League, second rushing and third passing. Four Bengal

ond rushing and third passing. Four Bengal running backs — James Brooks, a Pro Bowl selection, Larry Kinnebrew, Bill Johnson and Stanley Wilson — averaged four yards or better per attempt last season.

Anderson coached at five colleges before coming to the Bengals. The 39-year-old Anderson coached the running backs at Stanford from 1981-83. He also coached at Southern Methodist 1976-

80, Nevada-Las Vegas (1974-75); Scottsdale Community College (1973), and Cal-Western (now U.S. International) (1970-71). He also coached San Diego Morse High School in 1972.

A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Anderson was voted team co-captain and NAIA All-District as a linebacker-defensive end for Cal-Western in San Diego in 1970.

Anderson was running back coach at Nevada-Las Vegas in 1974 when the Runnin' Rebels posted a 12-1 season and advanced to the Grantland Rice Bowl (the NCAA Division II semifinals). He coached Mike Thomas, NFL Rookie of the Year with the Washington Redskins in 1975, at Nevada-Las Vegas and has coached NFL performers Art Whittington, (SMU), formerly with the Los Angeles Raiders, and Darrin Nelson, (Stanford), the first running back taken in the NFL draft in 1982 by Minnesota.

Anderson was born March 27, 1948, and he and his wife, Marcia, have a son, Derek, 13.



BRUCE COSLET Offensive Coordinator

Bruce Coslet is beginning his second season as coordinator of the Bengals' high-powered offense. The Cincinnati offense ranked first overall in the National Football League in 1986, second in rushing and third in passing.

Coslet was named offensive coordinator on January 7, 1986, after being Cincinnati's wide receiver coach for four seasons.

He has been instrumental in the development of Cincinnati's outstanding crop of wide receivers which include Cris Collinsworth, Eddie Brown and Tim McGee.

A former Cincinnati tight end, Coslet joined the Bengals in 1981 after leaving the San Francisco 49ers where he was special teams and tight ends coach.

He coached the Cincinnati tight ends and special teams in the 1981-82 seasons. In 1983 he directed the Bengals' passing game.

1981-82 seasons. In 1983 he directed the Bengals' passing game. Coslet played for the Bengals for eight seasons (1969-76) at tight end and was also an outstanding special teams player. He was special teams captain for several years and was the first former Bengal player to return to the team as a coach.

A graduate of the University of the Pacific, Coslet caught 64 passes for 877 yards and nine touchdowns during his NFL career. Bruce and his wife, Kathy, have two children, J.J., 12, and Amy, 10. He was born August 5, 1946.



BILL JOHNSON Tight Ends

Bill Johnson is starting his third season as coach of the Cincinnati Bengals' tight ends. Johnson returned to the Bengals' coaching staff in 1985. He was head coach of the Bengals in 1976, 1977 and for five games in 1978 after succeeding Paul Brown. Before becoming head coach, he coached the Bengals' offensive line from 1968 to 1976.

Johnson compiled an 18-15 won-lost record while coaching the Bengals.

After leaving the Bengals, Johnson joined the Tampa Bay Bucs where he was offensive line coach from 1979 through 1982

' came back to Cincinnati from the Detroit Lions where he 'Tiger' coached running backs in 1983 and 1984.

Johnson's coaching career began in 1956 with the San Francisco 49ers where he was offensive line coach until moving to the Bengals in 1968. Johnson played center for the 49ers from 1948-1956 and was elected to the Helms Foundation All-Pro team. He played college football at Texas A & M.

Johnson, who has been coaching in the National Football League 30 years, is a native of Tyler, Texas. He and his wife, Dot, have a daughter, Sherilyn, and two sons, Bill and Tommy.



DICK LEBEAU Defensive Coordinator

Former All-Pro cornerback Dick LeBeau is the Cincinnati Bengals' defensive coordinator. LeBeau was appointed defensive coordinator on December 30, 1983, after being defen-

sive backfield coach of the Bengals for three

years. Well-experienced and highly-regarded in National Football League coaching circles, LeBeau develops hard tacklers and knowledgeable players. He has played an important role in the development of young defensive players

LeBeau played 14 season with the Detroit Lions and after retir-ing in 1972 he joined the Philadelphia Eagles as special teams coach. He became the defensive backfield coach of the Green Bay Packers in 1976.

Le Beau was the fifth round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1959 after an outstanding career at Ohio State where he was an offensive and defensive back. He was released by Cleveland and signed by Detroit as a rookie.

He set an alltime durability record for cornerbacks by playing 171 consecutive games during his career with the Lions. His 62 pass interceptions rank him fifth on professional football's alltime list. Ken Riley, one of LeBeau's former Bengal players, went around him in 1983 to claim fourth with 65 interceptions.

LeBeau starred for Ohio State for three seasons and was a standout performer on the national championship team in 1957.

While with Detroit, he was selected to play in three Pro Bowl games and enjoyed his best statistical season in 1970 when he intercepted nine passes and compiled 96 yards in returns.

Born Charles Richard LeBeau on September 9, 1937, in Lordon, Ohio, he was an All-Ohio High School selection before going to Ohio State

JIM MCNALLY Offensive Line

The Cincinnati Bengals' offensive line is coached by Jim McNally who is starting his eighth season.

McNally has put together a big, cohesive unit considered one of the finest in the

National Football League. It played a big part in the Bengals' No. 1 ranking in offense in the NFL in 1986. The hard-working McNally's unit has given excellent pass protection and had only 11 of 28 sacks recorded against it last season.

Before joining the Bengals in 1980, McNally was offensive line coach at Wake Forest in 1979, Boston College 1976-78, Marshall 1973-75 and at the University of Buffalo 1966-69.

He played guard for three seasons at the University of Buffalo

where he was All-East. He is a member of the school's Hall of Fame. McNally was born December 13, 1943. He and his wife, Carolyn, have three children, Jenny, 15, Betsy, 13, and Jon, 12.



DICK SELCER Linebackers

Dick Selcer is starting his fourth season as linebacker coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Selcer, a Cincinnatian, came to the Bengals from the Houston Oilers on January 6, 1984. He had coached the Houston linebackers in 1981-82-83.

Selcer coached in the collegiate ranks for 19 years before joining the Oilers. He was an assistant at Xavier University (1962-64), defensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati (1965-66) and Brown University (1967-69).

He was head coach at Xavier in 1970-71 before moving to the University of Wisconsin where he was an assistant in 1972-74. He served as defensive coordinator at Kansas State University (1975-77) and later held the same position at Southwestern Louisiana University (1978-80).

Selcer, who was born August 22, 1937, is a 1959 graduate of Notre Dame where he lettered two years in both football and baseball. He played halfback for the Irish three years and was an All-American second baseman in 1959. He played high school football at Cincinnati Elder where he was All-Ohio. He also captained the Elder football, basketball and baseball teams in his senior year. He and his wife, Leryl, have five children, Michael, 27; Stephen,

26; Patrick, 24; Connie, 21 and Kevin, 16.



MIKE STOCK Special Teams

Mike Stock was named special teams coach of the Cincinnati Bengals on January 27, 1986.

Stock came to the Bengals from Notre Dame where he was an assistant coach.

He coached the Notre Dame running backs last season in his second tour of duty on the Irish coaching staff. He rejoined Notre Dame in 1983 as pass receiver coach and recruiting coordinator, assumed responsibility for specialty teams in 1984 and served as offensive coordinator in 1985.

Stock was offensive backfield coach of the New Jersey Generals of the United States Football League in 1983. He previously had been head coach at Eastern Michigan from 1978-82.

Stock coached at Notre Dame from 1969 to 1975 under Ara Parseghian. He was freshman coach in 1969 and varsity receiver coach the next five seasons. He then left Notre Dame to become offensive coordinator at Wisconsin from 1975-77 before taking the head coaching job at Eastern Michigan.

Stock played college football at Northwestern under Parseghian and was a two-year co-captain and All Big 10 fullback in 1959 and 1960. He also was the Big Ten Conference medal of honor recipient as a senior for academic and athletic performances.

After graduating from Northwestern, Stock signed with Saskatchewan of the Canadian Football League. His playing career

was curtailed by a knee injury. He coached and scouted in 1961 at Northwestern and then served three years in the U.S. Army.

Stock returned to coaching in 1965 at Akron (Ohio) South High School and then worked as freshman coach and scout at the University of Buffalo in 1966 and 1967.

He coached receivers and the offensive backfield at the U.S. Naval Academy in 1968.

BILL URBANIK Defensive Line

Bill Urbanik came to the Cincinnati Bengals January 16, 1984, as defensive line coach after coaching at Wake Forest University where he was defensive line coach and special teams coordinator for six years.

Urbanik was a three-year letterman under Woody Hayes at Ohio State and was twice named honorable mention as defensive tackle on the All-Big Ten team. He was chosen academic All-American in 1969 and was a member of the Buckeye's national championship team in 1968.

Urbanik's coaching career began as a student assistant at Ohio State in 1970. He was assistant football and head wrestling coach at Columbus Watterson High School in 1970 and 1971. After leaving Watterson, Urbanik went to Marshall where he earned his masters degree and coached the offensive linemen from 1971-73.

In 1973 he returned to the high school ranks as head coach at George Rogers Clark High School in Winchester, Ky., before going back to Marshall for a one-year stint as defensive line coach. He then served as defensive line and linebacker coach along with being the defensive coordinator at Northern Illinois for three seasons before moving to Wake Forest in 1978.

He and his wife, Martha, have a son, Urson, 6.



KIM WOOD Strength Coach

Kim Wood is beginning his 13th season as strength coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Wood became the Bengals' first fulltime strength coach in 1975. He has developed the Bengals into one of the best conditioned teams in the NFL and has instilled dedication and pride in physical fitness among the players.

The innovative Wood has been one of the leaders in the Nautilus training program since its inception and is credited with many training techniques being used throughout football. He has set up programs for a number of NFL and college teams.



The team began training at Wilmington College in 1968, the Bengals first year in the old American Football League which merged with the National Football League in 1970.

The 1987 training camp will open July 26 for rookies and July 30 for veterans. The Bengals will break camp August 21.

"We're happy with our association with Wilmington College and the city," Paul E. Brown, Bengals' vice president and general manager, said.

All outdoor practice sessions at Wilmington College are open to the public without charge.

The football stadium seats 3100 and there is adequate parking.

KEN ANDERSON RETIRES

Cincinnati Bengals guarterback Ken Anderson retired June 2. 1987.

The 38-year-old Anderson, one of the outstanding quarterbacks of alltime, had been the starting quarterback for the Bengals from 1972 until the third game of the 1985 season. He had backed up Boomer Esiason since then.

Anderson came to the Bengals from Augustana College in Rock Island, III., as a third round draft choice in 1971.

"He has had a great career and has been a credit in every way to the game, his family and certainly to the Bengals," Paul Brown, vice president and general manager, said. (Brown coached Ander-son in 1971-72-73-74 and 75.) "He has his life in good order and we wish him well in every respect. I'm sure we'll be seeing him often at our office and at the games."

Head coach Sam Wyche said he has "mixed feelings about what Anderson's retirement means in terms of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Kenny has been an important fixture in this organization for one and a half decades.

"He's been a great player and he has been a tremendous example. He's been actively involved in the community. "We'll miss him, but we know he'll be as successful in his next endeavor as he has been in his football career."

The 6-3, 212-pound Anderson holds most of the Bengals' passing records. His career statistics are outstanding: 4475 passes, 2654 completions, .593 average, 32,838 yards, 197 touchdowns and 160 interceptions.

Highlights in his brilliant career include:

1) Passing for 416 yards by completing 30 of 46 passes, two for touchdowns, in a 33-24 victory over Buffalo in a Monday Night Game in Cincinnati in 1975.

2) Passing for more than 300 yards 19 times.

3) Completing 25 of 34 passes for 300 yards and two touchdowns against San Francisco in Super Bowl XVI.

4) Setting the National Football League alltime pass completions percentage with a 70.6 in 1982 to top the old mark of 70.3

which had been held by Sammy Baugh since 1937. 5) Reaching an NFL milestone by completing 20 consecutive passes in Cincinnati's 35-27 victory over Houston in the Astrodome in 1982.

Winning the NFL passing crown four times – - 1982 (95.5 quarterback ranking), 1981 (98.5), 1975 (94.1) and 1974 (95.1).

7) A 90.1 completion percentage against Pittsburgh in 1974 ranks as an alltime NFL mark of passing excellence.

8) Selected to play in the Pro Bowl five times (1974, 1976, 1977, 1981 and 1982).

Anderson was the consensus All-Pro quarterback and National Football League Most Valuable Player in 1981 when he led the Bengals into Super Bowl XVI. He passed for 29 touchdowns and accumulated 3754 yards on 300 completions of 479 attempts. He threw only 10 interceptions.

1986 CINCINNATI BENGALS

The Cincinnati Bengals put together a 10-6 record in 1986 for their first winning season since 1982 when they were 7-2. Coach Sam Wyche's Bengals were the top-ranked offensive

team in the National Football League and three of the stalwarts -running back James Brooks, tackle Anthony Munoz and guard Max Montoya - were voted starters on the American Football Conference Pro Bowl team. Quarterback Boomer Esiason also was on the Pro Bowl team.

Brooks sparked the high-powered offense by rushing for a club record 1087 yards and adding 686 more on 54 pass receptions for 1773 total yards, tops ever by a Bengal player. Esiason completed 273 of 469 passes for a club high 3959

yards. He threw 24 touchdowns, a club record five in the 52-21 win over the New York Jets, and 17 interceptions.

Cris Collinsworth had 62 pass receptions for 1024 yards, the fourth time in six seasons he has gone over 1000 yards with receptions

Nose tackle Tim Krumrie led the Bengal defense with 113 tackles - 73 solos and 40 assists. It was the second straight season he has led the team in tackles.

Linebacker Reggie Williams and safety David Fulcher each had 105 tackles.

Linebacker Emanuel King topped the team in sacks with nine and cornerback Louis Breeden had seven pass interceptions.

The Bengals set many club records during the 1986 campaign including the following:

BENGALS-FRITO LAY "CHALLENGE FOR CHILDREN"

The Cincinnati Bengals and Frito-Lay, Inc., have been teammates in a joint effort called "Challenge for Children" since 1982. For every point the Bengals score during regular season, Frito-

Lay, Inc., contributes \$100 to the Ricky King Fund of Children's Hospital.

The program was expanded in 1984 to feature the weekly Frito-Lay/Bengals Unsung Hero. To honor this new Unsung Hero, Frito-Lay, Inc., donates an additional 10% to the hospital each week. Frito-Lay, Inc., has contributed over \$200,000 to the Ricky King

Frito-Lay, Inc., has contributed over \$200,000 to the Ricky King Fund at Children's Hospital since the "Challenge for Children" program began with the Bengals. The total contribution in 1986 was \$44,990.

"We are very happy to be associated with Frito-Lay in this most worthy venture," said Paul E. Brown, vice president and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals. "It's a wonderful partnership and we hope it will continue for many years."

BENGALS HISTORY

Paul Brown, who had left the Cleveland Browns following the 1962 season with an NFL record of 115-49-6, seven conference titles, and three NFL championships, had the urge to get back into football. His son Mike did a study on pro football expansion and recommended Cincinnati as a potential site. In **1965**, Brown met with Governor James Rhodes and the two agreed the state could accommodate a second pro football team.

1966 Fearful the Reds baseball team would leave town and feeling pressure from local businessmen pushing for a pro football franchise, Cincinnati's city council approved the construction of Riverfront Stadium.

1967 Brown's group was awarded an AFL expansion franchise. Brown call the team the Bengals, the name of the previous Cincinnati AFL franchises in 1937, 1940, and 1941. The Bengals acquired quarterback John Stofa by trading two draft choices to Miami.

1968 The Bengals were awarded 40 veteran players in the allocation draft. In the college draft they selected Tennessee center Bob Johnson as their first pick. Other draftees included running backs Jess Phillips and Essex Johnson, tight end Bob Trumpy, linebacker Al Beauchamp, and tackle Howard Fest. The Bengals lost their first preseason game 38-14 to Kansas City before 21,682 fans at Nippert Stadium. The Bengals played respectably during the regular season, upsetting Denver 24-10 and Buffalo 34-23 in their first two home games. Paul Robinson led the AFL in rushing with 1,023 yards and was named rookie of the year.

yards and was named rookie of the year. **1969** Brown drafted quarterback Greg Cook of the University of Cincinnati in the first round. The same draft also produced linebacker Bill Bergey. The Bengals jumped to a 3-0 record, but the club finished 4-9-1. Brown was named AFL coach of the year. Bergey was honored as AFL defensive rookie of the year, and Cook won the AFL passing title.

1970 After his arm went bad in training, Cook was placed on the injured reserve list. Virgil Carter, a castoff from two other NFL teams, was signed to play quarterback. The Bengals lost six of the first seven games, then rallied to win the last seven for an 8-6 record. They became the first third-year expansion team to win a division title, the AFC Central. They lost to Baltimore 17-0 in the playoffs.

1971 The Bengals picked up quarterback Ken Anderson and tackle Vernon Holland in the draft, then went 5-0-1 in preseason play. After a 37-14 victory over Philadelphia, the Bengals lost seven in a row on the way to a 4-10 record.

1972 Looking for defensive help, Brown drafted end Sherman White, safety Tommy Casanova, linebacker Jim LeClair, and cornerback Bernard Jackson. Anderson unseated Carter as starting quarterback, and the Bengals won three of their last four to post an 8-6 record. Chip Myers set a club record with 57 pass receptions.

1973 Brown drafted wide receiver Isaac Curtis and runners Boobie Clark and Lenvil Elliott. The Bengals split their first eight games, then swept their last six and won their second AFC Central Division championship. Cincinnati lost to Miami 34-16 in the AFC playoffs. Clark, who finished the year with 988 yards rushing and 45 pass receptions, was named AFC rookie of the year. Essex Johnson led Cincinnati with a career-high 997 yards rushing and Curtis caught 45 passes. 1974 Cincinnati traded Bergey to Philadelphia for two first-round

1974 Cincinnati traded Bergey to Philadelphia for two first-round draft choices and third-round pick in 1977. LeClair replaced Bergey at middle linebacker. The Bengals won four of their first five games but couldn't keep pace with Super Bowl-bound Pittsburgh. Anderson won the NFL passing championship and completed a clubrecord 64.9 percent of his attempts. Cornerback Lemar Parrish led the NFL in punt returns.

1975 The Bengals opened with six straight wins. LeClair preserved a 21-19 victory over Houston, making all four tackles in a goal-line stand. The Bengals won their eighth game in nine starts against Bulfalo as Anderson completed 30 of 46 passes for 447 yards, the tenth-highest one-game total in NFL history. Cincinnati scored 27 points in the first quarter to crush San Diego 47-14 and finish 11-3, its best regular-season record. The Bengals qualified as the AFC wild card team for the playoffs, but their losing postseason record continued with a 31-28 setback to Oakland. Anderson won his second NFL passing championship. A serious blow was the loss of defensive tackle Mike Reid, who retired at 26 to pursue a career in music. 1976 Brown announced his retirement after 41 seasons of coaching and named Bill Johnson, his long-time assistant, as the successor. Brown continued to serve as the club's general manager and vice president. The Bengals acquired defensive end Coy Bacon in a trade with San Diego and drafted halfback Archie Griffin, the two-time Heisman Trophy winner from Ohio State. The Bengals set a fast pace in the AFC Central Division, winning 9 of their first 11 games. The season came down to games against Pittsburgh and Oakland and the Bengals lost both. Those defeats not only cost Cincinnati the division title but the AFC wild card spot as well. Cornerback Ken Riley led the AFC with nine interceptions. 1977 A loss to Houston in the final game cost the Bengals a spot in the playoffs. The team finished with an 8-6 record. Curtis missed the final six games with a knee injury. Trumpy retired.

the final six games with a knee injury. Trumpy retired. **1978** The Bengals played the first four games without Anderson. Johnson was replaced as head coach after 0-5 start. Homer Rice took over, but the losing streak continued; the Bengals won only once in the first three months of the season. Wins over Atlanta, Los Angeles, and Cleveland at season's end improved the record to 4-12.

1979 After six straight losses to open the season, the Bengals stunned Pittsburgh 34-10, recovering seven Steelers fumbles. Ray Griffin ran back an intercepted pass a club-record 96 yards in a 26-24 loss to San Diego. Pete Johnson powered his way to 15 touchdowns, but the Bengals struggled to their second successive 4-12 record. Former Cleveland coach Forrest Gregg was named to replace Rice as head coach.

1980 Scoring touchdowns was the major problem for the Bengals, who went 6-10 in 1980. They managed only 244 points, lowest in the AFC. Anderson had a sub-par year with only six touchdown passes. The Bengals won only one of their first five games but upset defending Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh twice. First-round draft choice Anthony Munoz impressed at offensive tackle.

1981 The Bengals unveiled new uniforms with tiger-striped helmets, jerseys, and pants. They had at least a share of the AFC Central lead the entire season, and on December 6 Anderson threw two touchdowns as the Bengals clinched the division with a 17-10 victory over the Steelers. Cornerback Louis Breeden tied an NFL record when he returned a pass interception 102-yards for a touchdown in Cincinnati's 40-17 victory over the Chargers in San Diego. Anderson led the NFL in passing with a 98.5 rating. On January 3, the Bengals defeated the Buffalo Bills 28-21 in an AFC divisional playoff game. A week later, playing in their first AFC Championship Game ever, the Bengals defeated the San Diego Chargers 27-7 in a temperature of nine degrees below zero with a wind-chill factor of minus 59. In Super Bowl XVI on January 24, the Bengals trailed 20-0 at halftime and couldn't make up the deficit, losing to San Francisco 26-21.

1982 The Bengals followed up their Super Bowl season with another strong showing. They finished the strike-shortened season behind only the Raiders with a 7-2 mark. The Jets caught them sleeping in the first round of the playoffs, though, beating them 44-17. Anderson led the AFC in passing for the fourth time as the Bengals boasted the second-best offense in the NFL. Their defense ranked third in the NFL against the run.

1983 The Bengals' season looked promising at the start of 1983, but a horrendous opening brought about a premature ending. Cincinnati started the season by losing six of its first seven games. The Bengals never recovered and finished 7-9. Despite the losing record, the Bengals claimed the top overall defense in the NFL. In the off-season, Gregg resigned as head coach and Sam Wyche was named as his replacement.

1984 Pete Johnson was traded to San Diego for running back James Brooks. The Bengals lost their first five games and then bounced back to win eight of the last 11 and force the AFC Central Division championship race into the final week of the season only to fall a game short of Pittsburgh. Cincinnati finished 8-8.

1985 Wide receiver Eddie Brown from Miami (Fla.) was the Bengals' top draft choice. Wide receiver Isaac Curtis, a premier Bengal for 12 years, retired shortly before training camp opened. Cincinnati got off to another slow start, losing its first four games. The Bengals finished 7-9 and were in the thick of the AFC Central which was won by Cleveland with an 8-8 record. Second-year quarterback Boomer Esiason replaced Ken Anderson. Offensive tackle Anthony Munoz was named to the AFC Pro Bowl team the fifth consecutive time. The Bengals set a club scoring record with 441 points.

1986 Cincinnati's No. 1 selection in the NFL college draft was linebacker Joe Kelly who played at Washington. Wide receiver Tim McGee of Tennessee was drafted later in the first round. Punter Pat McInally retired. The Bengals unleashed a high-powered offense in their battle for the AFC Central Division title and finished 10-6 and narrowly missed a playoff berth. Offensive tackle Anthony Munoz was selected to the AFC Pro Bowl team for the sixth year in a row. He was joined by guard Max Montoya, running back James Brooks and quarterback Boomer Esiason. Linebacker Reggie Williams was selected "One of the Top 10 Young Men In America" by the United States Jaycees and was honored in Tulsa, Oklahoma, January 16 and 17. Later, Williams was selected NFL Man of the Year for his efforts to charity and the community and was honored at the Pro Bowl in Honolulu, Hawaii. Munoz was named Seagrams' top offensive lineman of 1986.

1987 Jason Buck, a defensive end and Outland Trophy winner from Brigham Young, was the Cincinnati Bengals' No. 1 draft choice.

CLOSE ENCOUNTERS IN NFL

Through the 224-game 1986 NFL regular season schedule, 106 games—47 percent—were decided by seven points-or-less. This is an increase of 19 games over the 1985 total of 87 decided by seven-or-less. Forty-seven games—21 percent—were decided by three points-or-less. This is nine more than last season's 38 decisions by three-or-less.

There were 16 overtime games compared to 10 in 1985, and two of the 16 ended in ties—San Francisco 10 at Atlanta 10 on Oct. 19 and St. Louis 10 at Philadelphia 10 on Dec. 7.

Home teams won 118 games for a winning percentage of .527. Visitors won 98 for a winning percentage of .438. There were two ties.

The total of 675 points scored on the final weekend (Dec. 19-22) of the 1986 season matches the seventh highest one-week total in NFL history. There were 675 points scored on Oct. 23-24, 1983. The record point total for a single weekend in the NFL is 761 on Oct. 16-17, 1983.

BENGAL WILLIAMS MAN OF YEAR

Reggie Williams, the veteran outside linebacker and defensive team leader of the Cincinnati Bengals, is the 1986 NFL Man of the Year.

The NFL Man of the Year award, which is administered by the Pro Football Hall of Fame, was created to honor those National Football League players who not only excel on the playing field but also contribute in many meaningful ways to their communities.

Since the award's inception in 1970, some of pro football's most noted stars, including four eventual members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, have been NFL Man of the Year honorees.

Williams was honored at the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl last February 1 in Hawaii. He received the distinctive Gladiator Statue, an original art creation by the noted sculptor Daniel Schwartz. In addition, a \$10,000 charity fund provided by the National Football League was donated in Williams' name to the cause of his choice.

In Williams' case, the "cause" is the Reggie Williams Scholarship Fund which has helped more than 100 Cincinnati-area students in their quest for a college education. Williams, who has been the Bengals' NFL Man of the Year nominee for five straight seasons, first instituted the fund with award money from the NFL Man of the Year program. He then solicited additional donations from friends and community leaders. The Williams Scholarship fund has distributed more than \$80,000 in the last four years.

"Being named the NFL Man of the Year is a great honor for me," Williams said. "I will use the grant money to help our scholarship fund expand and hopefully grow toward permanency. We are starting to have some college graduates from among those students who received help from our fund. We are also working toward having the Reggie Williams Scholarship Fund become a sanctioned part of the Cincinnati Public Schools scholarship program."

A former Dartmouth star who played his eleventh NFL season in 1986, Williams was named the 1985 Byron "Whizzer" White Humanitarian Award winner by the NFL Players Association for his exceptional participation in community affairs.

Williams is also involved in a wide variety of causes, including the American Cancer Society, American Red Cross, Big Brothers, Big Sisters, the Cincinnati Zoo, United Appeal, Cincinnati Public Schools, Cincinnati's Speech and Hearing Center, Juvenile Diabetes Foundation, and the Cincinnati Chamber of Commerce Sports Council.

Reggie has received numerous community honors, the latest of which was his January 17 presentation in Tulsa, Oklahoma, as one of the 10 Outstanding Young Americans of 1987 by the United States Jaycees. He is a two-time winner of the Caring for Kids Award of the NFL Alumni Association and also has received the Distinguished American Award of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame.

Each of the 28 NFL teams nominated one player for the 1986 NFL Man of the Year award. A committee, which included Congressman Jack Kemp, ABC-TV sportscaster Frank Gifford, and former Pittsburgh Steelers defensive standout Joe Greene, studied the qualifications of the 28 nominees and selected Williams as the 1986 winner.

INSTANT REPLAY APPROVED FOR 1987

For the second year in a row, NFL clubs have approved a limited system of Instant Replay on a one-year basis.

The system basically stays the same as in 1986 with the exception that larger monitors will be used by Replay Officials. In 1986, there were 374 plays closely reviewed (defined as a contact to the field, but not necessarily stoppage of play). There were 38 reversals for an average of one reversal in each six games. There were three other rulings (clarification of rules) by Replay Officials.

In 1986, the system was approved by a 23-4-1 vote. In 1987, the vote was 21-7.

The NFL has discussed Instant Replay in some degree or other since the early 1970s. The League experimented in 1976 and 1978 using two basic frameworks—an independent system using cameras, replay machines, and technicians separate from the network covering the game, and a "no frills" approach using existing television coverage.

In 1985, the NFL used the network feed of nine nationally televised preseason games to experiment with the basic system that later was adopted for 1986 and 1987. A total of 28 plays were examined closely in 1985 (17 confirmed call, 4 were inconclusive, 1 was reversed, and 6 had no replay shown).

What is the objective of this system?

The clubs feel that on certain plays the telecast viewed by the general public should be used to correct an indisputable error. The system will be used to reverse an on-field decision only when the Replay Official has *indisputable visual evidence* available to him that warrants the change.

Is the television network carrying the game part of the review process?

No. Although the Replay Official will be viewing the live network feed, there is no communication to television personnel as to what plays to show or not to show.

What is the step-by-step procedure of play review?

The Replay Official will view game action and a play will be replayed immediately on one of the two monitors, while the other monitor continues to record the live feed.

The Replay Official makes a determination if further study of the play is needed. If not, there is no contact with the field and play continues without interruption.

If the Replay Official believes an error may have been made, the Umpire will be contacted via a headset.

The Replay Official will watch replay(s) on one or both monitors and complete his review within a reasonable period after the play is over.

The Replay Official will inform the Umpire of his decision, and the Referee will make the appropriate announcement on the wireless microphone.

The limited instant Replay system concentrates on plays of possession or touching (e.g., fumbles, receptions, interceptions, muffs) and most plays governed by the sidelines, goal lines, end lines, and line of scrimmage (e.g., receiver or runner in or out of bounds, forward or backward passes, breaking the plane of the goal line).

However, the Instant Replay system will not include the following fouls: clipping; encroachment and offsides; grasp of facemask; false start; defensive pass interference; offensive pass interference; offensive holding and illegal use of hands; illegal batting or punching ball; illegal block on free kick or scrimmage kick; illegal crackback; illegal motion; illegal use of forearm or elbow; illegal use of hands by defense; illegally kicking the ball; illegally snapping the ball; intentional grounding; member of the punting team downfield early; illegal formation; palpably unfair act; piling on; roughing the passer; running into or roughing the kicker; striking, kicking, or kneeing; unnecessary roughness; unsportsmanlike conduct; and use of the helmet as a weapon.
