

RIVERFRONT STADIUM

Riverfront Stadium, located on the banks of the Ohio River, is Bengal-land in Cincinnati.

The stadium is situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway.

The seating capacity when the field is in football configuration is 59,755.

The playing surface at Riverfront is Astroturf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will hold 4500 automobiles. Three parking decks, plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium.

Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages and cartoons through a computer.

The stadium opened in 1970.

The largest crowd ever to assemble for a sporting event in Cincinnati was at Riverfront when 60,284 fans watched the Bengals and Cleveland Browns on October 17, 1971.

PAUL BROWN

Vice President, General Manager

Paul Brown, a legend in football and the game's greatest innovator, is a principal owner, vice president and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals, the team he founded in 1967.

Brown, the man with the most distinguished coaching record in football history, has guided the destinies of the Bengals since the team's start. He was general manager and head coach from 1968 to 1975 and then moved into the general manager's role on a fulltime basis.

The touch of Paul Brown made the Bengals almost an instant success as he guided the young team to three playoff appearances and two American Football Conference Central Division championships in eight years.

It took Brown only three years to win the AFC Central Division title in 1970, quickest ever for an expansion team in the National Football League. His final team in 1975 won another AFC Central crown and finished with an 11-3 record.

Brown was named "National Football League Executive of the Year" in 1981, after directing the Cincinnati Bengals to their first AFC championship and appearance in Super Bowl XVI.

During his brilliant coaching career, Brown has been a part of the "big game" more than any man who ever coached.

He has experienced the championship game feeling many times during his career at every level of competition. His first professional team, the Cleveland Browns, played for the world championship every year during the first 10 years of its existence. Founded for the All-American Conference in 1946, the team won all four championships during that league's history, then came into the NFL under much scorn and derision.

Brown and his Browns responded by thumping the defending champion Philadelphia Eagles, 35-10, in the season's opener to set the stage for things to come. The Browns went on to win the league championship.

He won three NFL titles and seven Eastern Division crowns as coach of the Browns.

"We didn't call it the Super Bowl at the time, of course," said Brown, "but it was the same thing — the championship game of professional football."

Brown achieved 361 victories, suffered only 133 losses and 16 ties for a remarkable .725 percentage, top record ever. He fashioned 213 victories, 104 losses and nine ties in 25 years of coaching in the NFL.

His return to the NFL, after a five-year absence after leaving Cleveland in 1963, coincided with the emergence of pro football as the nation's top spectator sport and he has done much to keep it that way as a member of the NFL's competition committee, the group most responsible for opening the game's offenses during recent years.

He was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1967, his first year of eligibility when he was away from coaching. He also has presented many of his former players for induction.

Brown is the master builder of pro football franchises. He created a dynasty in Cleveland and in 18 years in Cincinnati has given the Queen City three AFC Central Division champions, a "wild card" playoff team, an AFC championship and a Super Bowl team.

Brown is responsible for making pro football coaching the exacting science it is today. When he organized the Cleveland Browns in the All-America Football Conference in 1946, he started doing things no one else had ever done. He made coaching a science.

His success was instantaneous and only when other

coaches began copying his procedures did the won and lost records start to level off.

In spite of his statistical record, which has no challenger, Brown did more than put numbers in the win column. It is the way he went about putting together teams that made his record possible that he will be remembered and honored for.

Here, in part is how his citation read when he was inducted into the Professional Football Hall of Fame: "... in addition to his great record, Brown is equally respected as a man who brought fine organization to professional football. He was the first to make coaching a fulltime profession, not only for himself, but for a staff of assistants, a practice that has since become universal."

Brown is certainly a friend of coaches everywhere, regardless of the level at which they coach.

He had a background of exceptional success as a high school, college and military service coach when he was given his first pro assignment with the new Cleveland team. Immediately, he hired a fulltime staff and he instituted a system for scouting college talent on a scale never before imagined by other pro teams.

He became the first to (1) use intelligence tests as a hint to a player's learning potential, (2) use notebooks and classroom techniques extensively, (3) set up complete film clip statistical studies and (4) then grade his own players from what he found. Brown was the first coach to keep his players together at a hotel the night before a home game as well as a road game.

Strategically, he started the practice of calling plays from the sideline by utilizing guards as messengers.

He developed pass patterns for the offense that were designed to pick holes in the defense, but then he devoted his efforts to perfecting the kind of defense that could counteract a pattern passing attack.

Using his personnel to the limit, Brown was the first to switch some fine running backs to the defense because "they were so good I didn't want to waste them on offense."

All of Brown's measures are now common practice, but 35 years ago they were revolutionary in the coaching world.

Brown's coaching resume shows two years at Severn Prep School in Maryland; nine years at Massillon High School in Ohio (Brown's hometown); three years at Ohio State University, two years with successful Great Lakes Navy team during World War II; 17 years with the Cleveland Browns in the All-American Football Conference and the National Football League and eight with Cincinnati.

Despite his success in the pro ranks, Brown feels the Massillon High School job was the best he ever had.

"The reason is because I felt I did much good at Massillon and was able to send many, many athletes to college through their athletic skills when there was no other way for them to go."

The Massillon stadium is named "Paul Brown Tiger Stadium"

He says he was so excited about "getting a chance to coach Ohio State I didn't even ask what my salary was going to be. My doctor advised me: 'Paul don't take that job, you're wound too tight', but I told him the truth, I said 'I have to go.'"

And the Norwalk, Ohio, native kept right on going, ending up at the highest plateau of the game — the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Among the more significant accomplishments of his teams are a series of Ohio state championships at Massillon which in turn made that school one of America's foremost prep powers, a national collegiate championship at Ohio State in 1942, four straight AAFC championships and seven divisional titles and three NFL championships in 1950, 1954, and 1955 after the Browns had joined the NFL following the breakup of the AAFC. Ironically, it was Brown's overwhelming success — his Cleveland team had a 52-4-3 record in AAFC play — that was probably the major factor in the breakup of that league.

He is the holder of the prestigious Ohio Governor's Award from James A. Rhodes; the NFL Alumni Association's Order of the Leather Helmet; the National Football Foundation's "Mr. Ohio Award" and many others.

Brown also has authored a book — "P.B.: The Paul Brown

Story" which tells of his life in football.

Little wonder Paul Brown is known as one of the legends of the game.

He played quarterback at Miami (Ohio) University and graduated with a bachelor of arts degree. He has a master of arts degree from Ohio State University.

Paul and his wife, Mary, live in Indian Hill. His first wife, Katie, died in April, 1969. Two of his sons, Mike and Pete, are associated with Bengal organization as assistant general manager and legal counsel and director of player personnel respectively. Another son, Robin, a former Bengal scout, died in July, 1978.

AUSTIN E. KNOWLTON **Chairman of the Board**

Austin E. "Dutch" Knowlton is the chairman of the board of the Cincinnati Bengals and has been a firm supporter from the first day of the franchise's inception.

Knowlton, a well-known builder and sportsman, has been a founder, owner and director since the franchise was begun and often can be found watching his team

play at some of the farthest waystops on the NFL map, in addition to his regular attendance at games in Riverfront Stadium.

Knowlton also is an avid sportsman who spends as much of his free time as possible overseeing his second great interest — the breeding and selling of show horses at his Emerald Farm in Delaware County.

Also, during the glorious days of the 70's, Knowlton was the largest owner of the Cincinnati Reds.

Sometimes there is not as much time to devote to these activities as he'd like because of his business interests. A few years ago he organized the ARGA Co., which is engaged in the construction of buildings, leasing of buildings and other endeavors. A division of this company, K Construction Management, is engaged in the construction business in Ohio and other states.

After receiving a degree in architecture and civil engineering from Ohio State University, Knowlton joined his father's construction company and later assumed ownership of the construction business and operated it under the name of Knowlton Construction Company.

During the expansion of the college program, he designed, built and financed 54 college dormitories and other buildings for various colleges and universities in various states. He built the major portion of Ohio University, Bowling Green State University and many college buildings at Ohio State University, Miami University, Capital University, Otterbein College and numerous other schools and universities.

His offices are in Bellefontaine and Columbus, Ohio, and he resides in Delaware County at Emerald Farms, and in Aspen at Red Mountain Ranch.



JOHN SAWYER **President**

John Sawyer, a well-known business executive, has been president of the Cincinnati Bengals since the team was formed in 1967.

Sawyer, along with Paul and Mike Brown, was one of the Bengals founders. He put in many hours of hard work and thousands of miles of travel to bring the NFL franchise to Cincinnati. He is an owner and a member of the team's board of directors.

John, Paul and Mike represented Cincinnati in the many NFL meetings held prior to awarding the franchise. He currently attends all NFL owners' meetings and played a part in the NFL realignment in 1970.

Sawyer, a man constantly on the go, has made every road trip with the Bengals except one since the team began playing in 1968.

John developed and is president of J. Sawyer Company, a multi-faceted agricultural concern which has included aviation firms, a restaurant, an antique shop, a horticultural products company, a commercial feed lot, numerous farms and ranches in Ohio, Kentucky, Mississippi, Florida, Wyoming, Colorado, and Arkansas. J. Sawyer Company is one of the leading farm management and real estate brokerage firms in the midwest.

He is an inductee of Ohio Agricultural Hall of Fame, Ohio's highest honor in the field of agriculture, and has been honored for serving Ohio agriculture for more than 30 years as a farmer and innovator. His support and leadership helped greatly in the early development of the American Soybean Association and the Ohio Beef Marketing Program.

As a pilot, he was a pioneer in the aerial application of crop pesticides. He has been a leader in sound environmental management in the livestock industry and has developed a high volume composting system used at the Paygro plant and Ohio Feed Lot in South Charleston, Ohio.

This innovative "Paygro Composting System" has been recognized by the EPA as an effective method of sludge treatment and is being installed in large Ohio cities to help solve the tremendous municipal waste problems.

John has never lost his love of airplanes which began as a B-17 pilot in WWII. He still retains the company's Lear jet which he flew on business trips from Madison Aviation Center which he built in London, Ohio.

Other special interests of John's include the Boy Scouts, Children's Hospital Medical Center, Episcopal Diocese of Southern Ohio, Little Miami Inc., and the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center at Wooster, Ohio.

John is a graduate of Princeton University and is the son of the late Charles Sawyer, former Secretary of Commerce. He lives in Indian Hill and has four daughters, Anne Putnam, Elizabeth Selnick, Catherine Ryall, and Mary.



MIKE BROWN **Assistant General Manager, Legal Counsel**

Mike Brown holds the key roles of assistant general manager and legal counsel of the Cincinnati Bengals and is also an owner and member of the board of directors.

He has combined with his father, Paul, the team's vice president and general manager, to give Cincinnati one of the finest franchises in the National Football League.

Mike handles player contract mat-

ters and the Bengals' contracts and negotiations with the City of Cincinnati. He also works closely with television and radio executives involved with the Bengals and handles all the club's legal matter.

He has guided the Bengals from an expansion franchise to a Super Bowl contender. The 1981 team fulfilled most of his dreams by winning the American Football Conference championship and playing in Super Bowl XVI.

The Brown family dedicated itself to bringing professional football to Cincinnati in the mid-60s and was rewarded in 1967 when the city was awarded a franchise in the old American Football League which merged with the National Football League in 1970.

Professional football in Cincinnati was visualized by Mike long before it became a reality. Several years before the Cincinnati franchise materialized he conducted a detailed survey which showed the potential of the area as a professional football market. His drive produced the franchise for Cincinnati.

Paul and Mike Brown represent the Bengals at all league meetings and played a major role in bringing about the merger of the American Football League and the National Football League.

Mike, who has been associated with football all his life and has had the benefit of the best possible teacher, is a member of the NFL Management Council, a group which deals with labor-management decisions within the NFL.

He did his undergraduate work at Dartmouth where he played quarterback. He received his law degree from Harvard Law School and was associated with a law firm in Cleveland for five years before joining his father with the Cleveland Browns.

Mike and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Katie, 20, and a son, Paul, 16½.



PETE BROWN

Director of Player Personnel

Pete Brown directs the Cincinnati Bengals' player personnel department.

Highly-respected throughout the National Football League as a judge of football talent, Brown's Bengal drafts are annually considered among the best.

Brown is in his 18th season as director of player personnel with the Bengals. He served as assistant director of player personnel for one year before being elevated to the top spot. He supervises a staff of scouts and personally scouts a heavy schedule of college games.

Pete also is an owner and a member of the board of directors of the Bengals. He is involved in physical conditioning and played a major role in giving the successful Nautilus program an early introduction to the Bengals.

Pete is Paul Brown's youngest son. He is a graduate of Denison University.



SAM WYCHE

Head Coach

Sam Wyche, the youngest head coach in the National Football League, has given Cincinnati the tops in exciting football the last two seasons.

The 41-year-old Wyche has directed the Bengals to an 8-8 record in 1984 and 7-9 in 1985 and narrowly missed winning the American Football Conference Central Division each time.

His never stop offense has won the approval of experts throughout the NFL. Wyche's teams have virtually rewritten the Bengals' offensive record book. His 1985 team scored 441 points, an average of 28 per game, best ever in Bengal history.

Wyche, who succeeded Forrest Gregg on December 28, 1983, has made his Bengals an entertaining group with the high powered offense with unusual plays and innovations such as bringing entire offensive team to the sideline for skull sessions during timeouts and having the offense run without a huddle at times.

"He has taught me and shown me so much about the game," says Boomer Esiason, who moved in as starting quarterback early last season. "He has an extreme knowledge about football and has helped me very much."

Bengals' wide receiver Cris Collinsworth says:

"Everybody thinks of him they see him do his magic tricks and they think of him as a light, jovial person.

"Sam is a much tougher person than that, and he's a very creative man. I think that as he gets a chance to really improve his offense and work with Boomer on a hands-on kind of basis our offense is really going to develop just as it has over the last couple of years."

Paul Brown, Bengals' vice president and general manager, thought of Wyche as a future head coach as far back as 19 years ago when he was trying out for the Bengals at the team's first training camp.

"For many years I've kept the playbooks on some of my players who for one reason or another seemed to stand out in my mind," Brown recalled. "Two years ago I was looking up Mike McCormack's book because I had to nominate him for the Hall of Fame at Canton, and I came across Sam's.

"I know why I kept his. Even when he was a free agent quarterback who we kept on that old 1968 team, he was special. I looked at the book, and he had everything in excellent order. This shows that "way back then I had a feeling he was a student of the game."

Brown said the Bengals "kept close track of Sam down through the years after he left us."

"He was the man we wanted when the head coaching job in Cincinnati was open two years ago."

Wyche describes himself as a coach the following way:

"I have the perspective of the players. I've sat in the locker room. I've complained about the coach's long practice, stupid sprints, and all those kinds of things. So I know what the scuttlebutt will be somewhat.

"Discipline is important, and without it, you collapse. At some point, you find a way to beat yourself without discipline. Discipline, though, is something that can't be dished out all the time. So you create that atmosphere where the players don't want to disappoint you, as opposed to they don't want to do things so that you don't holler at them.

"I hope that I am respected by them. I hope they think of me as a knowledgeable coach, a fair coach."

Wyche was born in Atlanta, Ga., on January 5, 1945, and attended North Fulton High School there.

After graduating from North Fulton High School, Wyche (like witch with a long i) enrolled at Furman University in Green-

ville, S.C. He tried out for the football team as a "walk on" quarterback, made it and was awarded a scholarship.

He graduated from Furman University in 1966 with a B.A. degree in Business Administration.

Wyche signed with the Wheeling Ironmen of the Continental Football League in 1966 and played for one season before going to the University of South Carolina as a graduate assistant for two seasons and in 1968 earned an M.B.A. degree in Business Administration Management.

In 1968, Wyche was given a try-out with Brown's Cincinnati Bengals, an American Football League expansion team in its initial season. He made the team and was the starting quarterback much of the time. He was a member of Cincinnati's first American Football Conference Central Division playoff team in 1970.

During his three seasons with the Bengals, Wyche completed 115 of 220 passes (52.3%) for 1743 yards and threw 12 touchdown passes.

In 1971, Wyche was traded to the Washington Redskins where he played for coaches George Allen and Ted Marchibroda. He played on three playoff teams including Super Bowl VII with the Redskins.

Wyche was traded to the Detroit Lions in 1974. His coach there was Rick Forzano. In 1976, Sam began the season with the St. Louis Cardinals where he participated in the first professional football game ever played in Tokyo, Japan. He concluded his playing career in 1976 with the Buffalo Bills.

After retiring from professional football, Wyche and a partner opened a sporting goods store (Sam Wyche Sports World) in Greenville, S.C., and that operation has now grown into an eleven store chain.

In 1979, Wyche received a call from his former quarterback coach with the Bengals, Bill Walsh, who asked him to join the San Francisco 49er staff as quarterback and passing game coach.

He accepted and coached the passing game of the 49ers from 1979 through 1982 including Super Bowl XVI when San Francisco defeated the Bengals 26-21.

While with the 49ers for four years he was widely credited with developing quarterbacks Joe Montana, Steve DeBerg and Guy Benjamin and receivers Dwight Clark, Freddie Solomon and Renaldo Nehemiah.

Montana has this to say about Wyche:

"All of Sam's career had been spent with great teachers in the game of football, and Sam deserves to be in that category now. He has been very instrumental in my development as a quarterback and complete player. His knowledge of offensive philosophies is unsurpassed."

And this from All-Pro wide receiver Dwight Clark:

"Sam has a great ability for teaching receivers. He has a special knack for spotting talent in a player and helping him reach his potential — potential the player sometimes doesn't know he has. Sam's knowledge of the passing game is unequalled. He is one of the main reasons that this 10th round draft choice is All-Pro today."

Wyche became head coach of Indiana University in 1983 and compiled a 3-8 record in a rebuilding season.

Wyche has been taught by some of the finest teachers in the game. Among them are Brown, Walsh, Allen, Marchibroda, Forzano, Mike McCormack, Jack Pardee, Don Coryell, Jim Hanifan, Bill Johnson, Jim Ringo, Raymond Berry and Joe Gibbs.

"I don't think you are around anyone who doesn't rub off on you," said Wyche.

Wyche is a much sought-after public speaker and is member of the prestigious President's Council on Physical Fitness.

Among his hobbies are magic, guitar, tennis, golf and home computers.

Sam and his wife, Jane, are the parents of two children, son, Zak, 15, and daughter, Kerry, 13.

SAM WYCHE LOOKS AT 1986

Improving team speed on defense and special teams and getting off to a faster start are vital for the Cincinnati Bengals in 1986, says head coach Sam Wyche.

"A year ago I said the 1985 season would depend in part on the way the Bengals started the season," Wyche recalled. "We did not start with victories in the early going and, as a result, we finished in a "must-win" circumstance.

"We fell short," the Bengals' coach added. "As we enter the 1986 season we are working hard to correct the reasons for a slow start in 1984 and 1985. Improving team speed on defense and special teams is vital.

"I have no complaints with effort, desire, conditioning or the preparation of our players in 1985," Wyche said. "The hard facts are that a willing, all out effort is not good enough if a faster, quicker opponent is one step in front of you and running for a touchdown. We have to improve this part of our game from WITHIN our team and through additions to the squad in 1986.

"The players and coaches know we are on the verge of being a good team. The victories will come if we continue to upgrade and correct the vulnerable areas of the squad.

"The coaches have to be sharper, move quicker with decisions concerning theory, philosophy, strategy, as well as personnel. The players have to be totally committed to 16 games of winning effort. All of us have to realize that off-season study and conditioning are essential in this effort. There is no other way for the Bengals or anyone else," Wyche said.

Here's a position-by-position look by Wyche prior to the 1986 draft.

"Boomer Esiason has emerged as the clear choice for our starting quarterback. His performance improved from week to week in the 1985 season and the team's confidence in his ability to head a winner is strong. Ken Anderson, who has had an outstanding career, is our next quarterback on the roster. He is a talented veteran quarterback.

The running back situation was also clarified during the 1985 season. James Brooks had a very good year as a runner and as a receiver. Larry Kinnebrew promises to be in the 250-pound range for the 1986 season. That will increase his quickness and make him a much better athlete on the field. Stanford Jennings, Charlie Alexander and Bill Johnson are all strong NFL running backs who have contributed and will contribute if we are to win in '86. Our offense allows for all running backs to participate in every game and each one of them will be a factor in our standings in December of 1986.

At wide receiver, Cris Collinsworth and Eddie Brown return as one of the better duos in the NFL. Both have the potential to break games open and each compliments the other. Michael Martin and Steve Kreider return as solid receivers with experience and allow us to play our offense without modification in the event Eddie or Cris are unable to play. Clay Pickering and some promising free agents will provide some healthy competition here. Rodney Holman had a good year at tight end and M.L. Harris is a solid veteran player.

We have a large offensive line, although not any bigger than many teams in the National Football League. The strength of our team revolves around the performance of these eight men. Our starting five are as good a combination of offensive linemen as any in the NFL and the players who replace them are also big and strong. Our offensive line is one of the strengths of the 1986 season.

The defensive line is an area in which we must have more productivity in '86. Pass rush and pressure on the passer may be the difference in the Bengals' playoff hopes for 1986. Our defensive line is dedicated to having a rebounding year this season. The pride among the defensive line will help push them in the right direction.

Our linebackers suffered through a year of injuries and experimentation in 1985. The '86 season will be much more defined and should help this position to get off to a quick start. Leadership from our veteran linebackers will be crucial as we approach the '86 season.

Our defensive backfield is now a veteran group of players who have performed together long enough to know each other inside and out. They have taken a great deal of criticism over the past year, but are much better than the critics allow. I look for our defensive backs to be a part of a very strong defensive unit in '86.

Our punt team has nothing to brag about following the 1985 season. We finished last in the National Football League after being seventh in the league in 1984. This is an area that has to improve if we are to be the AFC Central Division champions. Pat McNally returns for his 11th year and we are expecting a return to his All-Pro performance level. Jim Breech returns for his eighth year as our placekicker and kickoff man. Jim is one of the most accurate kickers in football.

Our return teams had their moments in the '85 season, but must be much more consistent in 1986. There will be a great deal of competition on these teams and only the very best will be presented on the field. Our special teams, as a group, will be more competitive, carrying more status and having more pride than in any year in Bengal history. This is a personal goal of mine," Wyche concluded.

BENGALS POSITION COACHES



JIM ANDERSON **Running Backs**

Jim Anderson is in his third year as the running back coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Anderson joined head coach Sam Wyche's staff in January, 1984, after coaching the running backs at Stanford University for three years (1981-83).

He had coached at five colleges before joining the Bengals.

The 38-year-old Anderson coached at Southern Methodist (1976-80), Nevada-Las Vegas (1974-75); Scottsdale Community College (1973), and Cal-Western (now U.S. International) (1970-71). He also coached San Diego Morse High School in 1972.

A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Anderson was voted team co-captain and NAIA All-District as a linebacker-defensive end for Cal-Western in San Diego in 1970.

Anderson was running back coach at Nevada-Las Vegas in 1974 when the Runnin' Rebels posted a 12-1 season and advanced to the Grantland Rice Bowl (the NCAA Division II semi-finals). He coached Mike Thomas, NFL Rookie of the Year with the Washington Redskins in 1975 at Nevada-Las Vegas and has coached NFL performers Art Whittington, (SMU), formerly with the Los Angeles Raiders, and Darrin Nelson, (Stanford), the first running back taken in the NFL in 1982 by Minnesota.

Anderson was born March 27, 1948, and he and his wife, Marcia, have a son, Derek, 11.



BRUCE COSLET **Offensive Coordinator**

Bruce Coslet was named offensive coordinator of the Cincinnati Bengals on January 7, 1986. He had been the team's wide receiver coach for four seasons.

A former Cincinnati tight end, Coslet joined the Bengals in 1981 after leaving the San Francisco 49ers where he was special teams and tight ends coach.

He coached the Cincinnati tight ends and special teams in the 1981-82 seasons. In the 1983 season he directed the Bengals' passing game.

Coslet played for the Bengals for eight seasons (1969-76) at tight end and was an outstanding special teams player. He was special teams captain for several years and was the first former Bengal player to return to the team as a coach.

A graduate of the University of the Pacific, Coslet caught 64 passes for 877 yards and nine touchdowns during his National Football League career.

Bruce and his wife, Kathy, have two children, J.J., 11, and Amy, 9. He was born August 5, 1946.



BILL JOHNSON **Tight Ends**

Bill Johnson is starting his second season as coach of the Cincinnati Bengals' tight ends.

Johnson returned to the Bengals' coaching staff in 1985. He was head coach of the Bengals in 1976, 1977 and for five games in 1978 after succeeding Paul Brown.

Before becoming head coach, he coached the Bengals' offensive line from 1968 to 1976.

Johnson compiled an 18-15 won-lost record while coaching the Bengals.

After leaving the Bengals, Johnson joined the Tampa Bay Bucs where he was offensive line coach from 1979 through 1982.

"Tiger" came back to Cincinnati from the Detroit Lions where he coached running backs in 1983 and 1984.

Johnson's coaching career began in 1956 with the San Francisco 49ers where he was offensive line coach until moving to the Bengals in 1968. Johnson played center for the 49ers from 1948-1956 and was elected to the Helms Foundation All-Pro team. He played college football at Texas A & M.

Johnson, who has been coaching in the National Football League for 29 years, is a native of Tyler, Texas. He and his wife, Dot, have a daughter, Sherilyn, and two sons, Bill and Tommy.



DICK LEBEAU **Defensive Coordinator**

Dick LeBeau, former All-Pro cornerback and well experienced coach, is the Cincinnati Bengals' defensive coordinator.

LeBeau became defensive coordinator on December 30, 1983, after being defensive backfield coach of the Bengals for three years.

Highly-regarded in the NFL coaching circles, LeBeau's defenders are known for their ability to deliver hard hits and their knowledge of the game. He has played a vital role in the development of the younger defensive players.

LeBeau, who played 14 seasons with the Detroit Lions, came to Cincinnati from the Green Bay Packers where his secondary group was called the SWAT unit because of their hard tackles.

He joined the Packers in 1976 after serving as a special teams coach of the Philadelphia Eagles following retirement as a player in 1972.

The 48-year-old LeBeau was the fifth round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1959 after an outstanding career at Ohio State where he was an offensive and defensive back. He was released by Cleveland and signed by Detroit as a rookie.

He set an alltime durability record for cornerbacks by playing 171 consecutive games during his career with the Lions. His 62 pass interceptions rank him fifth on professional football's alltime list. Ken Riley, one of LeBeau's former Bengal players, went around him in 1983 to claim fourth with 65 interceptions.

LeBeau starred for Ohio State for three seasons and was a standout performer on the national championship team in 1957.

While with Detroit, he was selected to play in three Pro Bowl games and enjoyed his best statistical season in 1970 when he intercepted nine passes and compiled 96 yards in returns.

Born Charles Richard LeBeau on September 9, 1937, in London, Ohio, he was an All-Ohio High School selection before going to Ohio State.

Dick and his wife, Nancy, have a son, Brandon Grant, 7.



JIM McNALLY **Offensive Line**

Jim McNally is in his seventh season as offensive line coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

The hard-working McNally has put together a huge, cohesive unit that is considered one of the best offensive lines in the NFL.

When McNally arrived in Cincinnati in 1980 one of the tasks he faced was to increase the pass protection and trim the number of quarterback sacks. This he has accomplished.

McNally had a wealth of college coaching experience before taking his first pro job with the Bengals.

He was offensive line coach at Wake Forest in 1979; at Boston College from 1976 to 1978; at Marshall from 1973 to 1975, and at the University of Buffalo from 1966 to 1969.

He played guard for three seasons at the University of Buffalo where he was All-East. He was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame in 1983.

Born December 13, 1943, in Buffalo, Jim and his wife, Carolyn, have three children, Jenny, 14; Betsey, 12; and Jon, 11.



DICK SELCER **Linebackers**

Dick Selcer is entering his third season as linebacker coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Selcer, a Cincinnati, came to the Bengals from the Houston Oilers on January 6, 1984. He had coached the Houston linebackers in 1981-82-83.

Selcer coached in the collegiate ranks for 19 years before joining the Oilers. He was an assistant at Xavier University (1962-64), defensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati (1965-66) and Brown University (1967-69).

He was head coach at Xavier in 1970-71 before moving to the University of Wisconsin where he was an assistant from 1972-74. He served as defensive coordinator at Kansas State University and later held the same position at Southwestern Louisiana University.

Selcer, who was born August 22, 1937, is a former Notre Dame quarterback and running back and earned letters in football and baseball. He played high school football at Cincinnati Elder where he was All-Ohio. He also captained the Elder football, basketball and baseball teams in his senior year.

He and his wife, Meryl, have five children, Michael, 26; Stephen, 25; Patrick, 23; Connie, 20; and Kevin, 15.



BILL URBANIK **Defensive Line**

Bill Urbanik is entering his third season as the Cincinnati Bengals' defensive line coach.

Urbanik joined Cincinnati on January 16, 1984, after serving as defensive line and special teams coach at Wake Forest University for six years.

Urbanik was a three-year letterman under Woody Hayes at Ohio State and was twice named honorable mention as defensive tackle on the All-Big Ten team. He was chosen academic All-American in 1969 and was a member of the Buckeye's national championship team in 1968.

Urbanik's coaching career began as a student assistant at Ohio State in 1970. He was assistant football and head wrestling coach in Columbus Watterson High School in 1970 and 1971. After leaving Watterson, Urbanik went to Marshall where he earned his masters degree and coached the offensive linemen from 1971-73.

In 1973 he returned to the high school ranks as head coach at George Rogers Clark High School in Winchester, Ky., before going back to Marshall for one-year stint as defensive line coach. He then served as defensive line coach and defensive coordinator at Northern Illinois for three seasons before moving to Wake Forest in 1978.

He and his wife, Martha, have a son, Urson, 5.



KIM WOOD
Strength Coach

Strength coach Kim Wood is in his 12th season as a member of the Cincinnati Bengals.

The 39-year-old Wood became the Bengals' first fulltime strength coach in 1975. He has made the Bengals one of the best conditioned teams in the NFL and has instilled dedication and pride in physical fitness among the players.

The innovative Wood has been one of the leaders in the Nautilus training program since its inception and is credited with many training techniques being used throughout football. He has set up programs for a number of NFL and college teams.

Wood was an outstanding running back at the University of Wisconsin. Kim and his wife, Connie, have a son, John, 7, twin daughters, Becky and Alyssa, 5, and another daughter, Jacqueline, 3.

Outstanding quarterback who is entering his 16th professional season, all with the Cincinnati Bengals . . . Starting quarterback for the Bengals from 1972 until third game of the 1985 season . . . Completed 16 of 32 passes for 170 yards and two touchdowns last season . . . Smart, highly intelligent player who has worked with quarterback Boomer Esiason and aided his development . . . One of the very top quarterbacks to ever play the game . . . Has glowing statistics from his brilliant career . . . Injuries slowed Anderson during the 1984 season, but he still turned in several sterling performances including coming off the bench from an injury and completing 18 of 26 passes for 191 yards and two touchdowns in a 24-21 win over New Orleans to keep the Bengals alive in the American Football Conference Central Division race . . . For the season he completed 175 of 275 passes (63.6%) for 2107 yards, threw 10 touchdown passes and 12 interceptions . . . His rating was 80.8 . . . He also rushed for 64 yards on 11 carries . . . Highlights of his career include passing for 416 yards on 40 of 36 and two touchdowns against Buffalo in 1975 . . . Passed for more than 300 yards 19 times . . . 1985 CINCINNATI BENGALS

Cincinnati finished with a 7-9 record and tied with Pittsburgh for second place in the American Football Conference Central Division, one game behind the winning Cleveland Browns who were 8-8.

The Bengals set a team scoring record of 441 points and numerous other club offensive marks under head coach Sam Wyche and were in the AFC Central race until the final week.

Boomer Esiason took over as the starting quarterback in the third game of the season and performed superbly, completing 251 passes of 431 attempts for 3443 yards, 27 touchdowns and 12 interceptions. Esiason's season TD total is second best to Ken Anderson's 29 in 1981 and his yardage trails only Anderson's 3754 in 1981.

Cris Collinsworth was Cincinnati's top pass catcher with 65 receptions for 1125 yards, just five yards short of the club record he set in 1983. James Brooks had 55 receptions and rookie Eddie Brown 53.

Brooks was the Bengals' top rusher with 929 yards on 192 carries, a 4.8 average, and seven touchdowns. He also caught five touchdown passes.

Safety Jim Griffin captured the interception honors with seven and returned them 116 yards. Robert Jackson, also a safety, had six interceptions and 100 return yards.

Nose tackle Tim Krumrie finished first in tackles with 96 — 68 solos and 28 assists — and had 3½ sacks and recovered two fumbles. Jackson was second with 84 tackles and cornerback Louis Breeden third with 81.

Defensive ends Ross Browner and Eddie Edwards led Cincinnati in sacks. Browner had nine and Edwards 8½.

Jim Breech made 24 of 33 field goal attempts and was 48 of 50 on point after touchdown attempts.

Mike Martin returned 48 kickoffs for 1104 yards, an average of 23 yards per kick, and his longest was 45. He also returned 32 punts for 259 yards, an average of 8.1 yards. His longest punt return was 26 yards.

Wyche's Bengals set a number of club records during the 1985 season. The explosive offense scored 441 points, 27.6 per game, passing the 1981 Bengals (421 points) as the most productive in club history.

Cincinnati's 274 yards rushing against the Dallas Cowboys is a club record, topping the 269-yard performance against Kansas City in 1976.

Among other records, placekicker Breech scored 120 points, topping his club individual mark of 115 in 1981.

Swift, running back Brooks, a double threat, became the Bengals' top yardage producer with 1505 yards, 929 rushing and 576 on pass receptions. He passed Pete Johnson's mark of 1398 set in 1981.



BENGALS - FRITO LAY CHALLENGE FOR CHILDREN

The Cincinnati Bengals and Frito-Lay, Inc., have been teammates since 1982 in benefitting the Ricky King Fund and community causes.

For each point scored by the Bengals in the regular season, Frito Lay contributes \$100 to the Ricky King Fund of Children's Hospital.

Frito-Lay has contributed more than \$157,000 to the Ricky King Fund at Children's Hospital since the Challenge for Children program began in 1982.

In 1984, the program was expanded to include the weekly Frito-Lay Bengals Unsung Hero. To honor this new Unsung Hero, Frito-Lay donated an additional 10% to Children's Hospital each week. The total 1985 contribution was \$53,390.

Frito-Lay also hosts an annual "Challenge For Children" golf outing featuring Bengal players and an "Unsung Hero" banquet following the season.

BENGALS HISTORY

Paul Brown, who had left the Cleveland Browns following the 1962 season with an NFL record of 115-49-6, seven conference titles, and three NFL championships, had the urge to get back into football. His son Mike did a study on pro football expansion and recommended Cincinnati as a potential site. In 1965, Brown met with Governor James Rhodes and the two agreed the state could accommodate a second pro football team.

1966 Fearful the Reds baseball team would leave town and feeling pressure from local businessmen pushing for a pro football franchise, Cincinnati's city council approved the construction of Riverfront Stadium.

1967 Brown's group was awarded an AFL expansion franchise. Brown called the team the Bengals, the name of the previous Cincinnati AFL franchises in 1937, 1940, and 1941. The Bengals acquired quarterback John Stofa by trading two draft choices to Miami.

1968 The Bengals were awarded 40 veteran players in the allocation draft. In the college draft they selected Tennessee center Bob Johnson as their first pick. Other draftees included running backs Jess Phillips and Essex Johnson, tight end Bob Trumpy, linebacker Al Beauchamp, and tackle Howard Fest. The Bengals lost their first preseason game 38-14 to Kansas City before 21,682 fans at Nippert Stadium. The Bengals played respectably during the regular season, upsetting Denver 24-10 and Buffalo 34-23 in their first two home games. Paul Robinson led the AFL in rushing with 1,023 yards and was named rookie of the year.

1969 Brown drafted quarterback Greg Cook of the University of Cincinnati in the first round. The same draft also produced linebacker Bill Bergey. The Bengals jumped to a 3-0 record, but the club finished 4-9-1. Brown was named AFL coach of the year. Bergey was honored as AFL defensive rookie of the year, and Cook won the AFL passing title.

1970 After his arm went bad in training, Cook was placed on the injured reserve list. Virgil Carter, a castoff from two other NFL teams, was signed to play quarterback. The Bengals lost six of the first seven games, then rallied to win the last seven for an 8-6 record. They became the first third-year expansion team to win a division title, the AFC Central. They lost to Baltimore 17-0 in the playoffs.

1971 The Bengals picked up quarterback Ken Anderson and tackle Vernon Holland in the draft, then went 5-0-1 in preseason play. After a 37-14 victory over Philadelphia, the Bengals lost seven in a row on the way to a 4-10 record.

1972 Looking for defensive help, Brown drafted end Sherman White, safety Tommy Casanova, linebacker Jim LeClair, and cornerback Bernard Jackson. Anderson unseated Carter as starting quarterback, and the Bengals won three of their last four to post an 8-6 record. Chip Myers set a club record with 57 pass receptions.

1973 Brown drafted wide receiver Isaac Curtis and runners Boobie Clark and Lenvil Elliott. The Bengals split their first eight games, then swept their last six and won their second AFC Central Division championship. Cincinnati lost to Miami 34-16 in the AFC playoffs. Clark, who finished the year with 988 yards rushing and 45 pass receptions, was named AFC rookie of the year. Essex Johnson led Cincinnati with a career-high 997 yards rushing and Curtis caught 45 passes.

1974 Cincinnati traded Bergey to Philadelphia for two first-round draft choices and third-round pick in 1977. LeClair replaced Bergey at middle linebacker. The Bengals won four of their first five games but couldn't keep pace with Super Bowl-bound Pittsburgh. Anderson won the NFL passing championship and completed a club-record 64.9 percent of his attempts. Cornerback Lemar Parrish led the NFL in punt returns.

1975 The Bengals opened with six straight wins. LeClair preserved a 21-19 victory over Houston, making all four tackles in a goal-line stand. The Bengals won their eighth game in nine starts against Buffalo as Anderson completed 30 of 46 passes for 447 yards, the tenth-highest one-game total in NFL history. Cincinnati scored 27 points in the first quarter to crush San Diego 47-14 and finish 11-3, its best regular-season record. The Bengals qualified as the AFC wild card team for the playoffs, but their losing postseason record continued with a 31-28 setback to Oakland. Anderson won his

second NFL passing championship. A serious blow was the loss of defensive tackle Mike Reid, who retired at 26 to pursue a career in music.

1976 Brown announced his retirement after 41 seasons of coaching and named Bill Johnson, his long-time assistant, as the successor. Brown continued to serve as the club's general manager and vice president. The Bengals acquired defensive end Coy Bacon in a trade with San Diego and drafted halfback Archie Griffin, the two-time Heisman Trophy winner from Ohio State. The Bengals set a fast pace in the AFC Central Division, winning 9 of their first 11 games. The season came down to games against Pittsburgh and Oakland and the Bengals lost both. Those defeats not only cost Cincinnati the division title but the AFC wild card spot as well. Cornerback Ken Riley led the AFC with nine interceptions.

1977 A loss to Houston in the final game cost the Bengals a spot in the playoffs. The team finished with an 8-6 record. Curtis missed the final six games with a knee injury. Trumpy retired.

1978 The Bengals played the first four games without Anderson. Johnson was replaced as head coach after an 0-5 start. Homer Rice took over, but the losing streak continued; the Bengals won only once in the first three months of the season. Wins over Atlanta, Los Angeles, and Cleveland at season's end improved the record to 4-12.

1979 After six straight losses to open the season, the Bengals stunned Pittsburgh 34-10, recovering seven Steelers fumbles. Ray Griffin ran back an intercepted pass a club-record 96 yards in a 26-24 loss to San Diego. Pete Johnson powered his way to 15 touchdowns, but the Bengals struggled to their second successive 4-12 record. Former Cleveland coach Forrest Gregg was named to replace Rice as head coach.

1980 Scoring touchdowns was the major problem for the Bengals, who went 6-10 in 1980. They managed only 244 points, lowest in the AFC. Anderson had a sub-par year with only six touchdown passes. The Bengals won only one of their first five games but upset defending Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh twice. First-round draft choice Anthony Munoz impressed at offensive tackle.

1981 The Bengals unveiled new uniforms with tiger-striped helmets, jerseys, and pants. They had at least a share of the AFC Central lead the entire season, and on December 6 Anderson threw two touchdowns as the Bengals clinched the division with a 17-10 victory over the Steelers. Anderson led the NFL in passing with a 98.5 rating. On January 3, the Bengals defeated the Buffalo Bills 28-21 in an AFC divisional playoff game. A week later, playing in their first AFC Championship Game ever, the Bengals defeated the San Diego Chargers 27-7 in a temperature of nine degrees below zero with a wind-chill factor of minus 59. In Super Bowl XVI on January 24, the Bengals trailed 20-0 at halftime and couldn't make up the deficit, losing to San Francisco 26-21.

1982 The Bengals followed up their Super Bowl season with another strong showing. They finished the strike-shortened season behind only the Raiders with a 7-2 mark. The Jets caught them sleeping in the first round of the playoffs, though, beating them 44-17. Anderson led the AFC in passing for the fourth time as the Bengals boasted the second-best offense in the NFL. Their defense ranked third in the NFL against the run.

1983 The Bengals' season looked promising at the start of 1983, but a horrendous opening brought about a premature ending. Cincinnati started the season by losing six of its first seven games. The Bengals never recovered and finished 7-9. Despite the losing record, the Bengals claimed the top overall defense in the NFL. In the off-season, Gregg resigned as head coach and Sam Wyche was named as his replacement.

1984 Pete Johnson was traded to San Diego for running back James Brooks. The Bengals lost their first five games and then bounced back to win eight of the last 11 and force the AFC Central Division championship race into the final week of the season only to fall a game short of Pittsburgh. Cincinnati finished 8-8.

1985 Wide receiver Eddie Brown from Miami (Fla.) was the Bengals' top draft choice. Wide receiver Isaac Curtis, a premier Bengal for 12 years, retired shortly before training camp opened. Cincinnati got off to another slow start, losing its first four games. The Bengals finished 7-9 and were in the thick of the AFC Central which was won by Cleveland with an 8-8 record. Second-year quarterback Boomer Esiason replaced Ken Anderson. Offensive tackle Anthony Munoz

was named to the AFC Pro Bowl team the fifth consecutive time. The Bengals set a club scoring record with 441 points.

1986 Cincinnati's No. 1 selection in the NFL college draft was linebacker Joe Kelly who played at Washington. Wide receiver Tim McGee of Tennessee was drafted later in the first round.

PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

Three Cincinnati Bengals were honored as American Football Conference "Player's of the Week" during the 1985 season.

James Griffin, Bengals' safety, was the AFC Defensive Player of Week 6 when he scored a touchdown on a 23-yard interception return and recovered a late onside kick to clinch the Bengals 35-30 victory over the New York Giants at Riverfront Stadium.

Boomer Esiason, Cincinnati quarterback, was AFC Offensive Player of Week 13. Esiason was 18 for 24 with no interceptions, three touchdowns, and 320 yards in Bengals' 45-27 victory over Houston at Cincinnati. The Bengals, who had scored only four field goals in their previous two games, started out in their two-minute offense and led 28-0 after 4:01 of the second quarter.

Tim Krumrie, Bengals' nose tackle, was AFC Defensive Player of Week 14. Krumrie made 11 tackles and forced and recovered two fumbles in Cincinnati's big 50-24 victory over Dallas at Riverfront Stadium.

LIMITED INSTANT REPLAY SYSTEM TO BE USED IN 1986

At the NFL Annual Meeting in March 1986, the clubs adopted (by a 23-4-1 vote) a one-year system of limited Instant Replay of officiating calls for 1986.

The NFL has discussed Instant Replay in some degree or other since the early 1970s. The League experimented in 1976 and 1978 using two basic frameworks—an independent system using cameras, replay machines, and technicians separate from the network covering the game, and a “no frills” approach using existing television coverage.

In 1985, the NFL used the network feed of nine nationally televised preseason games to experiment with the basic system that later was adopted for 1986. A total of 28 plays were examined closely (17 confirmed call, 4 were inconclusive, 1 was reversed, and 6 had no replay shown).

What is the objective of this system?

The clubs feel that on certain plays the telecast viewed by the general public should be used to correct an indisputable error. The system will be used to reverse an on-field decision only when the Replay Official has *indisputable visual evidence* available to him that warrants the change.

Is the television network carrying the game part of the review process?

No. Although the Replay Official will be viewing the live network feed, there is no communication to television personnel as to what plays to show or not to show.

What is the step-by-step procedure of a play review?

The Replay Official will view game action and a play will be replayed immediately on one of the two monitors, while the other monitor continues to record the live feed.

The Replay Official makes a determination if further study of the play is needed. If not, there is no contact with the field and play continues without interruption.

If the Replay Official believes an error may have been made, the Umpire will be contacted (via a paging device worn at the beltline), and he then will use a walkie-talkie for further communication with the Replay Official.

The Replay Official will watch replay(s) on one or both monitors and complete his review within a reasonable period (probably 15-20 seconds) after the play is over. (If there is a time out, the Replay Official would not necessarily be restricted to the 15-20-second period.)

The Replay Official will inform the Umpire of his decision, and the Referee will make the appropriate announcement on the wireless microphone.

The limited Instant Replay system concentrates on plays of possession or touching (e.g., fumbles, receptions, interceptions, muffs) and most plays governed by the sidelines, goal lines, end lines, and line of scrimmage (e.g., receiver or runner in or out of bounds, forward or backward passes, breaking the plane of the goal line).

However, the Instant Replay system will *not* include the following fouls: clipping; encroachment and offsides; grasp of facemask; false start; defensive pass interference; offensive pass interference; offensive holding and illegal use of hands; illegal batting or punching ball; illegal block on free kick or scrimmage kick; illegal crackback; illegal motion; illegal use of forearm or elbow; illegal use of hands by defense; illegally kicking the ball; illegally snapping the ball; intentional grounding; member of the punting team downfield early; illegal formation; palpably unfair act; piling on; roughing the passer; running into or roughing the kicker; striking, kicking, or kneeling; unnecessary roughness; unsportsmanlike conduct; and use of the helmet as a weapon.
