RIVERFRONT STADIUM

Riverfront Stadium, located on the banks of the Ohio River, is Bengal-land in Cincinnati.

The stadium is situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway. The seating capacity when the field is in football configuration

is 59,754.

The playing surface at Riverfront is Astroturf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will hold 4500 automobiles. Three parking decks, plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas,

completely surround the stadium.

Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages and cartoons through a computer.

PAUL BROWN Vice President, General Manager

Legendary Paul Brown, the man with the most distinguished coaching record in football history, is a principal owner, vice president and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Brown has guided the destinies of the Bengals since he founded the club late in 1967. He served as

general manager and head coach from 1968 through 1975 and then moved into the general manager's chair on a fulltime scale

moved into the general manager's chair on a fulltime scale.

The touch of Paul Brown made the Bengals almost an instant success as he guided the young team to three playoff appearances and two American Football Conference Central Division champion-

ships in eight years.

It took Brown only three years to win the AFC Central Division title in 1970, quickest ever for an expansion team in the National Football League. His final team in 1975 won another AFC Central crown and finished with an 11-3 record.

Brown was named "National Football Executive of the Year" in 1981, after directing the Cincinnati Bengals to their first AFC cham-

pionship and appearance in Super Bowl XVI.

During his brilliant coaching career, Brown has been a part of

the "big game" more than any man who ever coached.

He has experienced the championship game feeling many, many times during his career at every level of competition. His first professional team, the Cleveland Browns, played for the world championship every year during the first 10 years of its existence. Founded for the All-America Conference in 1946, the team won all four championships during that league's history, then came into the NFL under much scorn and derision.

Brown and his Browns responded by thumping the defending champion Philadelphia Eagles, 35-10, in the season's opener to set the stage for things to come. The Browns went on to win the

league championship.

He won three NFL titles and seven Eastern Division crowns as

coach of the Browns.

"We didn't call it the Super Bowl at that time, of course,"said Brown, "but it was the same thing—the championship game of professional football."

Brown achieved 351 victories, suffered only 133 losses and 16 ties for a remarkable .725 percentage, top record ever. He fashioned 213 victories, 104 loses and nine ties in 25 years of coaching in the NFL.

His return to the NFL, after a five-year absence after leaving Cleveland in 1963, coincided with the emergence of pro football as the nation's top spectator sport and he has done much to keep it that way as a member of the NFL's competition committee, the group most responsible for opening up the games' offenses during recent years.

He was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1967, his first year of eligibility when he was away from coaching. He also has

presented many of his former players for induction.

Brown is the master builder of pro football franchises. He created a dynasty in Cleveland and in 14 years in Cincinnati has given the Queen City three AFC Central Division champions, a "wild card" playoff team, an AFC championship and a Super Bowl team.

Paul Brown is responsible for making pro football coaching the exacting science it is today. When he organized the Cleveland Browns in the All-America Football Conference in 1946, he started doing things no one else had ever done. He made coaching a science.

His success was instantaneous and only when other coaches began copying his procedures did the won and lost records start to level off.

In spite of his statistical record, which has no challenger, Brown

did even more than put numbers in the win column. It is the way he went about putting together the teams that made his record

possible that he will be remembered and honored for.

Here, in part, is how his citation read when he was inducted into the Professional Football Hall of Fame: ". . . . in addition to his great record, Brown is equally respected as a man who brought fine organization to professional football. He was the first to make coaching a fulltime profession, not only for himself, but for a staff of assistants, a practice that has since become universal."

PB is certainly a friend of coaches everywhere, regardless of the

level at which they coach.

Brown had a background of exceptional success as a high school, college and service coach when he was given his first pro assignment with the new Cleveland team. Immediately, he hired a fulltime staff and he instituted a system for scouting college talent on a

scale never before imagined by other pro teams.

He became the first to (1) use intelligence tests as a hint to a player's learning potential, (2) use notebooks and classroom techniques extensively, (3) set up complete film clip statistical studies and (4) then grade his own players from what he found. Brown was the first coach to keep his players together at a hotel the night before a home game as well as a road game.

Strategically, he started the practice of calling plays from the

sideline by utilizing guards as messengers.

He developed pass patterns for the offense that were designed to pick holes in the defense, but then he devoted his efforts to perfecting the kind of defense that could counteract a pattern passing attack.

Using his personnel to the limit, Brown was the first to switch some fine running backs to the defense because "they were so

good I didn't want to waste them on offense.

All of PB's measures are now common practice, but 34 years

ago they were revolutionary in the coaching world.

Brown's coaching resume shows two years at Severn Prep School in Maryland; nine years at Massillon High School in Ohio (Brown's hometown); three years at Ohio State University; two years with the successful Great Lakes Navy Team during World War II; 17 years with the Cleveland Browns in both the All-American Football Conference and the National Football League and eight with Cincinnati

Brown feels the Massillon High School job was the best he ever

had

"The reason is because I felt I did much good at Massillon and was able to send many, many athletes to college through their athletic skills when there was no other way for them to go.

PB says he was so excited about "getting a chance to coach Ohio State I didn't even ask what my salary was going to be. My doctor advised me, 'Paul, don't take that job, you're wound too tight; but I told him the truth, I said, 'I have to go.' "

And he kept right on going, ending up at the highest plateau of the game—the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Among the more significant accomplishments of his teams are a series of Ohio state championships at Massillon which in turn made that school one of America's foremost prep powers, a national collegiate championship at Ohio State in 1942, four straight AAFC championships and seven divisional titles and three NFL championships in 1950, 1954 and 1955 after the Browns had joined the NFL following the breakup of the AAFC. Ironically, it was Brown's overwhelming success—his Cleveland team had a 52-4-3 record in AAFC play—that was probably the major factor in the breakup of that league.

After graduating from Massillon High School, Brown enrolled at Ohio State and later transferred to Miami where he became a fine

runner and passer. He also was a track star.

He returned to his home in Massillon as football and basketball coach in 1932. The stadium in Massillon is "Paul Brown Tiger

He is holder of the prestigious Ohio Governor's Award from James A. Rhodes; the NFL Alumni Association's Order of the Leather Helmet; the National Football Foundation's "Mr. Ohio Award" and many others.

He also has authored a book-"PB: The Paul Brown Story"

which tells of his life in football.

Paul and his wife, Mary, live in Indian Hill. His first wife, Katie,

died in April, 1969. Two of his sons, Mike and Pete, are associated with the Bengal organization as assistant general manager and director of player personnel respectively. Another son, Robin, a former Bengal scout, died in July, 1978.

Paul was born in Norwalk, Ohio. He holds a bachelor of arts degree from Miami University and a master of arts degree in educa-

tion from Ohio State.

AUSTIN E. KNOWLTON Chairman of the Board

Austin E. "Dutch" Knowlton is the chairman of the board of the Cincinnati Bengals and has been a firm supporter from the first day of the franchise's inception.

Knowlton, a well-known builder and sportsman, has been the founder, owner and director since the franchise was founded and often

can be found watching his team play at some of the farthest waystops on the NFL map, in addition to his regular attendance at games in Riverfront Stadium.

"Like every other Bengal fan, we are looking forward to the 1983 Bengals football team winning the World Championship and the

Super Bowl.'

Besides being not only one of the team's most rabid fans as well as its chairman of the board, Knowlton also is an avid sportsman who spends as much of his free time as possible overseeing his second great interest—the breeding and selling of show horses at his Emerald Farm in Delaware County.

Also, during the glorious days of the 70's, Knowlton was the

largest owner of the Cincinnati Reds.

Sometimes there is not as much time to devote to these activities as he'd like because of his business interests. A few years ago, after several decades as head of Knowlton Construction Co., he organized the Arga Co., which is engaged in the construction of buildings, leasing of buildings, and other endeavors. A division of this company, K Construction Management, is engaged in the construction business in Ohio and other states.

After receiving a degree in architecture and civil engineering from Ohio State University, Knowlton joined his father's construction

company.

He assumed ownership of the construction business and operated it under the name of Knowlton Construction Company.

Knowlton Construction Company built the major portion of Ohio University, Bowling Green State University; as well as many college buildings at Ohio State University, Miami University, Capital University, Otterbein College and numerous schools and universities.

After World War II, he secured the franchise for the sale of Beechcraft Products in Ohio and surrounding areas and formed the Ohio Aviation Company of Vandalia and Cleveland, Ohio.

His offices are in Bellefontaine and Columbus, Ohio, and he resides in Delaware County at Emerald Farms, and Aspen at Red Mountain Ranch.



JOHN SAWYER President

John Sawyer, a well-known business executive, has been president of the Cincinnati Bengals since the team was formed in 1967.

Sawyer, along with Paul and Mike Brown, was one of the Bengal founders. He put in many hours of hard work and thousands of miles of travel to bring the NFL franchise to Cincinnati.

John, Paul and Mike represented Cincinnati in the many NFL meetings held prior to awarding the franchise. He currently attends all NFL owners' meetings and played a part in the NFL realignment in 1970.

Sawyer, a man constantly on the go, has made every road trip with the Bengals except one since the team began playing in 1968.

The well-known business executive operates J. Sawyer Co., a multi-faceted agricultural concern which includes aviation firms, an antique shop, art center, restaurant, a line of popcorn and farms and ranches in Ohio, Mississippi, Wyoming, Montana and Colorado. Sawyer is one of only a few farm managers and real estate brokers in the country.

He has never lost his love of airplanes and flies his company's Lear jet out of Madison Aviation center, which he built in London,

Ohio, on business trips around the country.

John is a graduate of Princeton and is the son of the late Charles

Sawyer, former Secretary of Commerce.

John and his wife, Ruth, live in Indian Hill and have four daughters, Anne, Elizabeth, Catherine, and Mary.



MIKE BROWN Assistant General Manager Legal Counsel

Mike Brown, a tireless worker, has combined with his legendary father, Paul, in bringing to Cincinnati one of the National Football League's finest franchises.

Mike, the Bengals assistant general manager and legal counsel, has guided his team from an expansion franchise to a Super Bowl contender.

The 1981 team fulfilled most of his dreams and hopes and hours of long work by winning the American Football Conference championship and earning a berth in Super Bowl XVI.

Following the fantastic 1981 season, Paul Brown was voted NFL "Executive of the Year" and Mike Brown was the runnerup.

Mike fills a number of key roles in the Bengals' operation. He is the team's assistant general manager, legal counsel and, in addition, an owner and a member of the board of directors.

As assistant general manager and legal counsel, Mike handles player contract matters and the Bengals' contracts and negotiations with the City of Cincinnati. He also works closely with television and radio executives involved with the Bengals and handles all the club's legal matters.

The Brown family dedicated itself to bringing professional football to the Queen City in the mid-60's and was rewarded in 1967 when the city was awarded a franchise in the old American Football League which was due to merge with the National Football

League in 1970.

Professional football in Cincinnati was visualized by Mike long before it became a reality. Several years before the Cincinnati franchise materialized he conducted a detailed survey showing the potential of the area as a professional football market. His drive produced the franchise for Cincinnati.

Paul and Mike Brown represent the Bengals at all league meetings and they played a major role in bringing about the merger which brought the American Football League and the National Foot-

ball League together.

Mike, who has been associated with football all of his life and has had the benefit of the best possible teacher, is a member of the NFL Management Council, a group which deals with labormanagement decisions within the NFL.

Mike did his undergraduate work at Dartmouth where he played quarterback. He received his law degree from Harvard Law School. He was associated with a law firm in Cleveland for five years and

then joined his father with the Cleveland Browns.

Mike and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Katie, 17, and a son, Paul, 131/2.



PETE BROWN Director of Player Personnel

Pete Brown is in charge of the Cincinnati Bengals all-important player personnel department.

The Bengals' roster is annually heavy with draft choices and presently includes 13 first rounders selected by Brown and his staff.

Brown, youngest son of Paul Brown, is well-respected as an

astute judge of football talent throughout National League circles. He is in his 15th season as director of player personnel with the Bengals. He worked for one season as assistant director of player personnel before taking over as director.

His drafts are annually considered among the best in the NFL. His job includes supervising a staff of scouts and he is known by

college coaches throughout the country.

Pete also is an owner of the Bengals and a member of the board of directors

He is very involved in physical conditioning and played a major role in bringing the successful Nautilus training program to the Bengals.

Pete is a graduate of Denison University.



FORREST GREGG Head Coach

Forrest Gregg has been a tower of strength in the National Football League for many years—first, as an offensive lineman, who is called by many the best to ever play the game, and now as a head coach with unmatched determination and dedication.

Forrest Gregg coaches like he

played—with total dedication to the team concept, hard work, extreme determination and the knowledge of what it takes to win.

Hall of Famer Gregg came to the Cincinnati Bengals on December 28, 1979, and took over a team that had just completed back-to-back 4-12 seasons and seemed destined to be the permanent American Football Conference cellar-dweller.

His appointment as head coach by general manager Paul E.

Brown teamed up a pair of Hall of Fame members.

In just three years, Gregg has brought the Bengals from the depths to one of the most respected teams in the National Football League.

Gregg coached the Bengals to their first AFC championship in 1981 with a 12-4 regular season record, two playoff victories and

a berth in Super Bowl XVI opposite the San Francisco 49ers. He followed up the Super Bowl season with a 7-2 mark and another playoff appearance in 1982. The Bengals are the winningest team in the NFL the last two seasons.

When Gregg came to the Bengals he quickly instilled into his team the pride, dedication and spirit to be a winner that he has possessed throughout his distinguished career.

In short, he made the Bengals believe in themselves and in doing

so they made believers out of the NFL

Gregg compiled a 6-10 record in his first season in Cincinnati in 1980, but the look of what was to come was there.

It came quickly the following season when Gregg and the Bengals put together the best won-loss record (12-4) in the AFC, and then made believers out of the few cynics who remained by whipping through the playoffs by beating Buffalo and San Diego and moving into the Super Bowl.

The season, which is etched indeliably into Cincinnati sports history, brought many, many honors to Gregg including the all-prestigious AFC Coach-of-the-Year award.

He also was named coach-of-the-year by the Associated Press. United Press International and the Professional Football Writers Association and numerous sports groups throughout the country.

He went to the White House in May, 1982, to accept the American Cancer Society's "National Courage Award" from President Reagan.

Many football experts are still somewhat startled at the Bengals resurgance, but Gregg has not achieved anything through black magic or sleights of hand.

Forrest Gregg is a straight forward, clear-talking man who his coach at Green Bay, Vince Lombardi, called "the best player I ever

His manner reminds many of Lombardi, but Gregg really has pat-

terned himself after no one save himself.

His players have great faith in what he says and does. Cris Collinsworth, the Bengals' fine wide receiver, was moved to say that 'the beauty of Forrest Gregg is that he treats everyone the same. He'll yell at Ken Anderson with the same force that he yells at the last man on the roster if he believes it is necessary.

Gregg's overall record in his three seasons with the Bengals, including playoffs, is 27-18. His record the last two seasons is 21-8,

the best in the NFL.

Gregg came to the Bengals from Toronto where he was head coach of the Argonauts in the Canadian Football League. The 49-year-old Gregg, who was inducted into the Pro Football

Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, in 1977, previously was head coach of the Cleveland Browns.

He took over as head coach in Cleveland in 1975 and had a 3-11

record in a rebuilding season.

Gregg turned things around for the Browns in 1976 by compiling a 9-5 record and was named National Football League Coachof-the-Year.

His 1977 Cleveland team won five of its first seven games. Then injuries hit and the Browns dropped six of their last seven. Gregg

resigned with one game remaining in 1977.

He was assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers before joining Toronto in 1979 where he compiled a 5-11 record with a young and inexperienced team.

During his outstanding 15-season career in the National Football League, Gregg performed as both a guard and tackle with the Green Bay Packers under Vince Lombardi from 1956 to 1970 and

with Dallas in 1971.

During his last two seasons at Green Bay, Gregg served as a player-coach. He also was a player-coach with Dallas' 1971 Super Bowl champion. He was offensive line coach with the San Diego Chargers in 1972 and 1973 before joining the Browns in the same capacity in 1974.

Throughout his career, Forrest Gregg was known as one of the

most capable and most unselfish of all players.

Team-minded and versatile, Gregg also proved to be durable playing in a then-record 188 consecutive games from the first game of his rookie 1956 campaign until the first game of the 1971 season the final one of his career, which he spent with the Dallas Cowboys.

Add to that the summation that Lombardi, the architect of the awesome Green Bay juggernauts of the 1960s, included in his book "Run to Daylight." Lombardi said simply: "Forrest Gregg is the

finest player I ever coached!'

With credentials and endorsements like that, it is not surprising Gregg was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1977, the first time he was eligible following the mandatory five-year

retirement period.

Gregg, a native of Birthright, Texas, had already established himself as a multi-talented, injury-free athlete by the time he joined the Packers. He participated in football, baseball, basketball and track at Sulphur Springs, Texas, high school and then won all-Southwest Conference honors twice as a two-way tackle at SMU. He was captain of the Mustangs in his senior year and a second round draft choice of Green Bay.

A broken arm when he was a high school sophomore was the only severe injury Forrest suffered during his career. Once in the NFL, a bruised knee almost kept him out of a game against Detroit in 1965, but he blocked on an extra point attempt to keep his con-

secutive game streak alive.

Forrest stood 6-4 but weighed only 230 pounds when he reported as a rookie. He quickly realized that, as an offensive right tackle, he would have to learn to finesse the monstrous defensive left ends that would be pouring in on him.

So Gregg learned to recognize and combat the rushing tactics of every defensive lineman he would have to face. During his career, he did battle with the best—Gino Marchetti, Gene Brito and Deacon Jones early in his career and later standouts like Carl Eller and Claude Humphrey.

Following the 1956 campaign, Forrest spent a year in the U.S. Army. When he returned in 1958, the new coach, Lombardi, was on hand. As the Packers climbed to the heights under the leadership of the great coach, Gregg, one of the few pre-Lombardi players

on the team, dramatically improved his stature.

In 1960, the year that Green Bay won its first Western Division championship under Lombardi, Gregg was named all-NFL, the first in a string of eight straight years of all-league acclaim. In 1965, when he changed positions, Forrest not only did not blow his chance for all-league honors, he actually was named at both positions! Associated Press picked him as a guard on its honor team, United Press International as a tackle on its team.

As eager as Forrest was to play football and to do anything asked of him at any time, he actually retired four times before making his fifth retirement finally stick.

He first "retired" after the 1963 campaign to accept an assis-

tant coaching job at the University of Tennessee. Lombardi couldn't believe that anyone as good as Gregg could consider retirement at the age of 30 so he talked Forrest into coming back.

Gregg started both the 1969 and 1970 seasons as a member of the Packers' coaching staff but injury problems prompted his return to playing action each year. He retired a fourth time before the 1971 season, was released by the Packers, but returned to action with the Dallas Cowboys when Coach Tom Landry issued an SOS for help for an injury-decimated offensive line. Forrest thus became a member of a Super Bowl championship team for a third time. Following Super Bowl VI, he retired for good. Born October 18, 1933, he was 38 at the time.

While Forrest played in nine Pro Bowls, as well as the long string of Packers playoff games, he can't pinpoint any one outstanding

thrill.

"The whole thing was a very gratifying experience," he reminisces. "They say you don't get much recognition on the offensive line but there is a lot of satisfaction if you know you're doing your job and the coaches know it. Our backs always knew they didn't make those long runs by themselves.

He also proved that if you play football the Forrest Gregg way, even an offensive lineman can gain ample recognition. His election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame verifies that.

As Gregg said on his election to the Hall: "It's awesome when ou think that as a player or a coach, your tenure is only temporary. But election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame is permanent. It's something that can never be taken away!'

Forrest and his wife, Barbara, have two children-Forrest Jr.,

and Karen. Both are students at SMU.

BENGALS ASSISTANT COACHES



HANK BULLOUGH Defensive Coordinator— Linebackers

Hank Bullough is known throughout the NFL as "The Doctor of Defense."

The rugged defenses Bullough has produced through the years have earned him the distinguished title.

Bullough and head coach Forrest Gregg installed the 3-4 defense and the Bengals climbed from last in overall defense in 1979 to

fifth against the rush.

Bullough was assistant head coach and defensive coordinator for the New England Patriots before coming to the Bengals. He compiled an enviable defensive record with the 3-4 at New England.

The 49-year-old Bullough joined the Patriots in 1973 and coached the defensive line five years and the linebackers two. Prior to going to New England, he was linebacker coach at the Baltimore Colts for three seasons.

of duty in between.

Shane was a high school All-American linebacker at Cincinnati

Moeller High School and now is a freshman at Michigan State.



BRUCE COSLET Special Teams—Tight Ends

Bruce Coslet has quickly developed the Bengals' special teams into one of the strongest units in the NFL.

Coslet came to the Bengals in 1981 and made an immediate impact as the club's special teams and tight end coach by turning areas which were

lacking into strengths.

Coslet joined the Bengals in January, 1981, from the San Francisco 49ers where he also worked with special teams and tight ends.

Coslet played for the Bengals for eight seasons as a tight end and outstanding special teams player. He was with the Bengals from 1969 until he retired following the 1976 season. He was special teams captain for several seasons and is the first former Bengal to return to the team as a coach.

A graduate of the University of the Pacific, Coslet caught 64 passes for 877 yards and nine touchdowns during his career.

Bruce and his wife, Kathy, have two children, JJ., 8, and Amy, Bruce was born August 5, 1946.



LINDY INFANTE Offensive Coordinator

Lindy Infante has given the Cincinnati Bengals a passing attack that is one of the most feared in the National Football League.

Infante, in his third season with the Bengals, designed the flight plan for "Anderson Air-

lines" and with it brought the most exciting offense seen in the NFL in many years to Cincinnati.

Infante was named offensive coordinator following the 1981 season. It is the first time the Bengals have used the title. He had been receiver-quarterback coach.

The Cincinnati passing offense has ranked second in the American Football Conference the last two seasons and set a club

record 3995 yards in 1981.

Infante has played a big role in the development of Cris Collinsworth, who has earned Pro Bowl status both seasons he's been in the league. His receiving corps of Collinsworth, Isaac Curtis, Steve Kreider and David Verser is among the best in the league.

Infante, who was offensive coordinator at Tulane in 1979, coached the New York Giants' receivers in 1977 and 1978. He joined the Giants from Tulane where he was offensive coordinator during the 1976 season. He returned to the Green Wave in 1979.

He was defensive backfield coach for the Charlotte Hornets of

the World Football League in 1975.

Infante played three seasons at the University of Florida as both a running back and defensive back, serving as co-captain in 1962 after winning All-Southeastern Conference honors in 1961. He played in the Gator Bowl in 1960 and 1962. He was drafted by both Cleveland (NFL) and Buffalo (then AFL) in 1963 and reported to the Bills' training camp. However, he opted for Hamilton of the Canadian Football League where he played the 1963 season as a running back.

Infante started his coaching career at Miami (Fla.) Senior High School and in 1966 moved to the University of Florida as freshman

coach and then offensive backfield coach.

In 1972, he went to Memphis State as offensive coordinator and

assistant head coach.

Born May, 27, 1940, Infante and his wife, Stephanie, have two children, Brett, 12, and Brad, 11.



DICK LeBEAU Defensive Backfield

Dick LeBeau, former All-Pro with the Detroit Lions, is in his fourth season as defensive backfield coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

LeBeau has given the Bengals a cohesive, hard-hitting, high-spirited secondary, marked

by its aggressiveness and knowledge of the game.

Highly-regarded in NFL coaching circles, LeBeau joined the Bengals, December 31,1979, and improvement in the secondary

came quickly.

LeBeau's defensive backs have become known as a group of hitters. While at Green Bay, his defensive backfield was called the SWAT unit because of the ability of its members to deliver jarring tackles.

LeBeau joined the Packers in 1976 after serving as Philadelphia's special teams coach for three years following retirement as a player

after the 1972 season.

The 45-year-old LeBeau was a fifth round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1959 after an outstanding career at Ohio State as a defensive and offensive back. He was released by Cleveland and signed by Detroit in his rookie year.

He set an alltime durability record for cornerbacks by playing 171 consecutive games during a 14-year career with the Lions. His 62 pass interceptions rank him fourth on professional football's

alltime list.

LeBeau starred for Ohio State for three seasons and was a standout performer on the national championship team in 1957. While a pro, he was selected to play in three Pro Bowl games and enjoyed his best statistical season in 1970 when he intercepted nine passes for 96 yards.

Born Charles Richard LeBeau on September 9, 1937, in London, Ohio, he was an All-Ohio High School selection before going

to Ohio State.

Dick and his wife, Nancy, have a son, Brandon Grant, 4.



JIM McNALLY Offensive Line Coach

Hard-working Jim McNally joined the Cincinnati Bengals in 1980 as offensive line coach. Cincinnati's offensive line under McNally

has blossomed into one of the best in the NFL In 1981 it formed a ring of protection around

quarterback Ken Anderson that was second to none and played an important part in the march to Super Bowl XVI.

When McNally arrived on the Cincinnati scene he was faced with

an immediate job of cutting down the number of quarterback sacks. The number in 1979 was 63, highest in the league. The Bengal line, responding to McNally, reduced that figure to 36 in 1980, 35 in 1981, and 27 in 1982.

'I'm still not satisfied, but we're getting there," says McNally. McNally had a wealth of college coaching before taking his first

pro job with the Bengals.

He was offensive line coach at Wake Forest in 1979; at Boston College from 1976 to 1978; at Marshall from 1973 to 1975 and at the University of Buffalo from 1966 to 1969.

He played guard for three seasons at the University of Buffalo

where he was All-East.

Born December 13, 1943 in Buffalo, Jim and his wife, Carolyn, have three children, Jenny, 12; Betsey, 9, and Jon, 8.



DICK MODZELEWSKI Defensive Line

Former All-Pro Dick "Mo" Modzelewski is the Cincinnati Bengals defensive line coach. "Mo" is in his fifth year with the Bengals. He came to Cincinnati in February, 1979, from the New York Giants where he had been

defensive coordinator.

Modzelewski has produced excellent results from defensive linemen Ross Browner, Eddie Edwards and Wilson Whitley, the start-

ers, plus pass rusher Mike St. Clair.

A veteran of 16 years in the NFL coaching ranks, "Mo" served as defensive line coach of the Cleveland Browns from 1968 until 1976 and was the defensive coordinator in 1976 and 1977. He was interim head coach of the Browns during the final week of the 1977 season and was defensive coordinator for the Giants in 1978.
"Mo" was an All-Pro defensive tackle for several years for the

was an All-Pro defensive tackle for several years for the Giants and the Browns during his playing days. He was with the Giants from 1956 through 1963. He was traded to the Browns in 1964 and played three more seasons before retiring in 1966

Drafted No. 2 by the Washington Redskins in 1953 after being an All-American at Maryland where he won the Outland Trophy in 1952, he also played with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1955 before being traded to the Giants where he became a vital part of the "Fearsome Foursome" along with Andy Robustelli, Jim Katcavage and Rosey Grier. "Mo" played on six conference champions and two National Football League championship teams-the Giants in 1956 and the Browns in 1964.

He was born February 16, 1931, in West Natrona, Pa. He and his wife, Dorothy, have four children-Mark, Laurie, Terrie and

Amie.



GEORGE SEFCIK Offensive Backfield

George Sefcik, who is entering his sixth season with the Bengals, is among the most highly-respected offensive backfield coaches in the NFL.

Sefcik has provided the Bengals a highgeared infantry attack to go along with its explosive aerial attack.

He brought the 1000-yard rusher back into the Cincinnati picture in 1981 when Pete Johnson rushed for 1077 yards. The passminded Bengals had been without a 1000-yard seasonal rusher since their first season in 1968 when Paul Robinson gained 1024.

Sefcik, who has been offensive backfield coach of the Bengals since 1978, has been instrumental in the development of Johnson. one of the premier fullbacks in the league, Charles Alexander and

Archie Griffin.

His 1979 backs gained more yardage and scored more touchdowns than any group in Cincinnati history.

George came to the Bengals from the Cleveland Browns where

he was offensive backfield coach from 1975 to 1978.

He is a graduate of Notre Dame where he was a halfback on the 1959-60-61 teams. Following graduation, he became head coach at Niles (III.) High School. He returned to Notre Dame a year later as freshman coach.

The following year when Ara Parseghian became head coach of the Irish. Sefcik was named coach of the receivers. He stayed at Notre Dame until 1969 when he went to the University of Ken-

tucky as offensive coordinator.

He was an offensive coach with the Baltimore Colts in 1973 and 1974 and joined the Browns in 1975. A native of Cleveland, Sefcik helped bring the state title to Benedictine in 1957 as a halfback.







A LOOK AT THE 1983 BENGALS

Head coach Forrest Gregg's 1983 edition of the Cincinnati Bengals is gearing up for a third straight appearance in the National Football League playoffs.

The powerful Bengals reached the Super Bowl two years ago

but were eliminated in the first round last year.

Cincinnati has a roster full of talented veterans plus, what appears

to be, an excellent crop of draftees and free agents.

The Bengals are strong offensively, especially the passing game led by quarterback Ken Anderson. In 1982, Anderson topped the NFL in passing for the fourth time, completing 218 of 309 passes for 2495 yards and four touchdowns. Along the way he set one NFL mark by throwing 20 consecutive completions, and then erased Sammy Baugh's 37-year-old single season record for completion percentage, connecting on 70.6 percent for the year. The cagey 13-year veteran also ran for 85 yards, the third most by an AFC quarterback.

Backing up Anderson is veteran Turk Schonert and rookie Jeff Christensen, a sixth round draft choice from Eastern Illinois.

Anderson's favorite target in 1982 was wide receiver Cris Collinsworth, who tied for second in the AFC with 49 catches for 700 yards. Isaac Curtis, an 11-year veteran, still possesses all the speed and savvy at the other wide receiver spot. Curtis is always a threat and highly-respected by the opposition. The talented Steve Kreider backs up both Collinsworth and Curtis. Tight end Dan Ross caught 47 passes in 1982. He was backed up by M.L. Harris and Rodney Holman

Draftees are Mike Martin (No. 8), an NCAA record-setter from Illinois, and Gary Williams (No. 11), the record-receiver from Ohio

State.

Big Pete Johnson is the powerhouse of the Bengals' running game and also contributes to the airborne (31 receptions) efforts. The Bengals' alltime leading rusher, Johnson carried the ball 58% of the time last year and finished with 622 yards and seven touchdowns.

Johnson is joined in the Cincinnati backfield by Charles Alexander, who ran for 207 yards in 1982. Top backup is two-time Heisman Trophy winner Árchie Griffin. Second-year man Rodney Tate is a dangerous runner and important special teams man.

Two draftees, Larry Kinnebrew (No. 6a) a Pete Johnson-type from Tennessee State, and Stanley Wilson (No. 9), highly-credentialed

from Oklahoma, are seeking backfield spots.

At 6-6 and 278 pounds, All-Pro Anthony Munoz heads up the Bengals' offensive line. Munoz is joined on the left side by guard Dave Lapham. Dave Rimington, a 6-3, 290-pound All-American from Nebraska, or veteran Blake Moore will be the center. The right side of the line is solid with guard Max Montoya and tackle Mike Wilson. Glenn Bujnoch, Mike Obrovac, Ray Wagner and Jim Hannula round out this highly-formidable group.

The Cincinnati defense is a strong unit and could be even better

as the result of the draft.

The line consists of three number one draft choices: left end Eddie Edwards, who led the club with six sacks last year; nose tackle Wilson Whitley, and Ross Browner at right end. The men playing behind this talented trio are young Glen Collins, the No. 1 draft choice in 1982; Mike St. Clair, a veteran with good pass rushing abilities; seasoned veteran Gary Burley; Jerry Boyarsky a valuable addition last season; Emanuel Weaver, 1982's No. 2 selection, and nose tackle Arthur King, a No. 6 who missed the season with a broken wrist. Tenth round draft choice Tim Krumrie from Wisconsin is a definite challenger. He's a nose tackle.

The Bengal linebacking corps is a veteran group which includes Reggie Williams and Bo Harris outside and Jim LeClair and Glenn Cameron inside. This talented unit gets its depth from Rick Razzano, Jeff Schuh, Tom Dinkel and Ron Simpkins. Fourth round draft choice Steve Maidlow and 12th round selection Andre Young also

are in the linebacker picture.

The longtime leader of the Bengals' defensive backfield is 15-year veteran cornerback Ken Riley, who tied for the AFC interception lead with five in 1982, giving him a career total of 57 to tie him with Mel Blount of Pittsburgh for the high among active players.

Louis Breeden, a splendid athlete with All-Pro credentials. is the other veteran cornerback. Ray Griffin backed up the corners and served as a nickel back in '82. John Simmons played well at corner. Strong safety Bobby Kemp was the team's leading tackler (52) in 1982. Bryan Hicks and Mike Fuller were the free safeties with Robert Jackson the backup.

Draft choices Ray Horton (No. 2) and Jimmy Turner (No. 3) could change the makeup of the defensive backfield. Horton is 5-10, 180 pounds from Washington and Turner is a 5-11, 190-pounder from UCLA. Both are excellent prospects. Another draftee is safety

James Griffin (No. 7).

18 field goals. Fuller is one of the surest-handed return men in the league and is on the brink of setting a punt return record. David Verser and Rodney Tate share the kickoff return duties. Draftees Horton and Wilson returned kicks in college.


WKRC BENGAL FLAGSHIP STATION

CINCINNATI 27, HOUSTON 6

September 12, Riverfront Stadium, Attendance, 52,268 The defending American Football Conference champion Cincinnati Bengals opened the season in grand style by defeating the Houston Oilers, 27-6.

All-Pro quarterback Ken Anderson completed 29 of 40 passes for 354 yards. One of Anderson's completions was an 18-yarder

to tight end Dan Ross for a touchdown.

Ross had five receptions for 65 yards, while Cris Collinsworth had four for 95 yards. Charles Alexander caught a seven-yard pass for a TD.

Meanwhile, Pete Johnson rushed for 69 yards, and the Bengal defense thwarted every Oiler thrust.

PITTSBURGH 26, CINCINNATI 20 (overtime) September 19, Three Rivers Stadium Attendance, 53,973 The Steelers edged the Bengals 26-20 in overtime in a classic football game. The winning TD came on a two-yard pass from Terry Bradshaw to John Stallworth following Dwayne Woodruff's interception of a Ken Anderson pass.

The Bengals had a chance to win the game in regulation time

but Jim Breech's 39-yard field goal attempt was blocked.

Cris Collinsworth caught nine passes for 144 yards. Anderson completed 27 of 38 for 323 yards. Pete Johnson accounted for 49 rushing yards.

CINCINNATI 18, PHILADELPHIA 14

November 21, Veterans Stadium, Attendance, 65,172 The Bengals resumed action after being idled for nine weeks by the National Football League Players Association strike and downed the Philadelphia Eagles 18-14.

Three field goals by Jim Breech provided the difference for Cincinnati. The Bengals other scores came on a Ken Anderson to Dan

Ross pass and a Reggie Williams safety.

Cincinnati's defense limited Philadelphia to 62 yards rushing. Pete Johnson picked up 72 yards on the ground for the Bengals.

BENGALS 31, RAIDERS 17

November 28, Riverfront Stadium, Attendance, 53,330 The Bengals bombed the Los Angeles Raiders, 31-17, in what was probably their best performance of the season.

Big Pete Johnson provided a lot of offensive fireworks for Cincinnati, picking up 129 yards on 23 carries for one touchdown and

a 5.6 average.

Ken Anderson was 14 of 26 for 210 yards and one touchdown. Inside linebacker Jim LeClair had eight tackles, one assist and an intercept to lead a Cincinnati defense which held rookie-of-theyear Marcus Allen to zero yards rushing.

BENGALS 20, COLTS 17

December 5, Memorial Stadium, Attendance, 25,598 Cincinnati made it three in a row with a hard-fought 20-17 victory over the winless Baltimore Colts.

Tight end M.L. Harris caught two short TD passes from Ken Anderson who completed 20 of 29 aerials for 209 yards. He also

threw a touchdown strike to Steve Kreider. Pete Johnson rumbled for 90 yards on the ground and Cris Col-

linsworth had seven receptions good for 79 yards.
The Colts missed a chance to tie the game on the final play when a 40-yard field goal attempt by Mike Woods went awry.

BENGALS 23, BROWNS 10

December 12, Riverfront Stadium, Attendance, 54,305 Cincinnati sailed to its fourth consecutive victory and won the 1982 "Battle of Ohio" with a 23-10 verdict over the Cleveland Browns.

Three field goals by Jim Breech, touchdown runs by Pete Johnson and Ken Anderson and a rugged defense which held the

Browns to just 64 yards rushing keyed the victory.

Bo Harris, an inside linebacker, accounted for nine tackles and an assist. Defensive end Ross Browner, outside linebacker Reggie Williams and safety Bobby Kemp had interceptions.

CHARGERS 50, BENGALS 34

December 20, Jack Murphy Stadium, Attendance, 52,040 The Bengals four-game winning streak was snapped by the San Diego Chargers, 50-34, in a thrilling Monday night game in which the lead see-sawed back and forth many times.

Charger quarterback Dan Fouts and his fine bevy of receivers finally got the best of the Bengals by ringing up a total of 486 yards through the air. On the evening, the Chargers had 661 yards on

The Bengals had plenty of offense themselves, 397 yards passing. Ken Anderson was 40 of 56 for 397 and two touchdowns and an interception. His TD tosses were to Cris Collinsworth (49 yards), and M.L. Harris (17 yards).

Linebacker Bo Harris returned a pass interception 62 yards for

a touchdown.

BENGALS 24, SEAHAWKS 10
December 26, Riverfront Stadium, Attendance, 55,230
The Bengals bounced back to trim the Seattle Seahawks, 24-10, and assure themselves a berth in the NFL Playoffs.

Ken Anderson was razor-sharp, completing 22 of 29 passes for 265 yards including a 55-yard play with the speedy David Verser.

Cincinnati's defense held Seattle to 79 yards rushing and 200 yards passing. Ken Riley and Mike Fuller came up with interceptions.

BENGALS 35, HOUSTON 27

January 2, Astrodome, Attendance, 26,522 All-Pro quarterback Ken Anderson took charge in a record-setting performance to lead the Bengals to a 35-27 win over the Houston Oilers. The victory gave the Bengals the right to open the playoffs at home.

The Bengals were devastating in drilling the Oiler defense for

457 total net yards, 310 through the air.

Anderson completed 20 consecutive passes in a stretch from the first quarter to the third to set a new National Football League standard, eclipsing the 18 straight thrown by Steve DeBerg of Denver. Anderson's completion average for the season was 70.6, topping the old mark of 70.3 held by Sammy Baugh of the Washington Redskins since 1945.

Anderson's excellence at the Astrodome is exemplified in his statistics of 27 strikes of 31 passes, 3232 yards and two touchdowns. Nine of Anderson's passes were caught by tight end

Dan Ross.



BENGALS AMONG 1982 AFC STAT LEADERS

Quarterback Ken Anderson heads the list of Cincinnati Bengals who finished high statistically in the American Football Conference.

Anderson was the leading passer in the AFC and the entire National Football League. He recorded a record-setting .706 completion mark with 218 of 309 for 2495 yards, 12 touchdowns and nine interceptions.

His 95.5 rating also topped all NFL passers.

Anderson set another record by completing 20 of 20 passes during a stretch in the regular season finale, a 35-27 victory over Houston.

Second-year wide receiver Cris Collinsworth wound up tied for second in pass receptions with 49 for 700 yards and nine touchdowns. The Chargers' Wes Chandler had a like number of receptions

Kellen Winslow, San Diego tight end, led all AFC receivers with

54 receptions.

Bengals' tight end Dan Ross was fifth with 47 and running back Pete Johnson 16th with 31.

In the rushing category, Johnson finished sixth with 622 yards and seven touchdowns on 156 attempts. He averaged four yards per carry.


Johnson tied for fourth in touchdowns with seven.

Placekicker Jim Breech finished third among AFC scorers, behind the Chargers' Rolf Benirschke and Nick Lowery of Kansas City. Breech accounted for 66 points on 25 of 26 extra point attempts

and 14 of 18 field goal tries.

Cornerback Ken Riley, the leading pass interceptor among active players in the AFC with 56, added five in 1982 and tied for the top spot with Bobby Jackson, Jets; Dwayne Woodruff, Steelers, and Donnie Shell, Steelers. Riley's 88 yards in returns was the highest in the AFC.

Pat McInally tied for 10th in punting with an average of 38.7. Rookie Rodney Tate was ninth in kickoff returns with a 22.4 average.





BENGALS SECOND OFFENSIVELY

The high-powered Cincinnati Bengals' attack was second only to the San Diego Chargers in the American Football Conference last season.

The Bengals averaged 365.3 yards per game while the Chargers averaged 450.4.

Cincinnati was second in passing in the AFC with a 259.9 average. San Diego finished with a 325.9 average.

The Bengals were 10th in the AFC in rushing, averaging 105.4

yards per game.

Defensively, the Cincinnatians were eighth in the conference, third against the rush and ninth against the pass. The Bengals yielded an average of 94.4 yards a game against the rush and 227 yards against the pass.

FOES 65-69-1 IN '82

The combined record in 1982 of the Bengals' opponents this season was 65-69-1.

The Bengals will play 10 games in 1983 with teams that appeared

in the NFL playoffs last season.
They are: the Los Angeles Raiders, Miami Dolphins, Pittsburgh Steelers (2), Cleveland (2), Green Bay, Minnesota, Tampa Bay and Detroit.

40.3 POINTS PER GAME

The average points scored in the 126 games played in the NFL in 1982 was 40.3 per game. The 1982 average is 1.7 points less than the 1981 average of 42.0 points per game, but this season's average of 40.3 marks the third consecutive season that the average points per game topped 40. The average in 1980 was 40.4.

The Cincinnati Bengals currently have 13 first-round draft choices on their 1983 roster.

NFL AVERAGE 53.540

The total actual, or in-house, attendance for the 126 games played in the strike-abbreviated, nine-week 1982 NFL season was 6,638,899 for an average of 53,540 per game. There were 873,373 no-shows (tickets purchased but not used).

AFC HOLDS EDGE

The AFC edged the NFC 15-14-1 in the 30-game interconference series. The AFC has won the season series nine times, the NFC three times, and it ended tied once since 1970. In the 13-year series since the implementation of the merger, the AFC has won 286 games, the NFC has won 241, and there have been seven ties.

HOME TEAM ADVANTAGE


