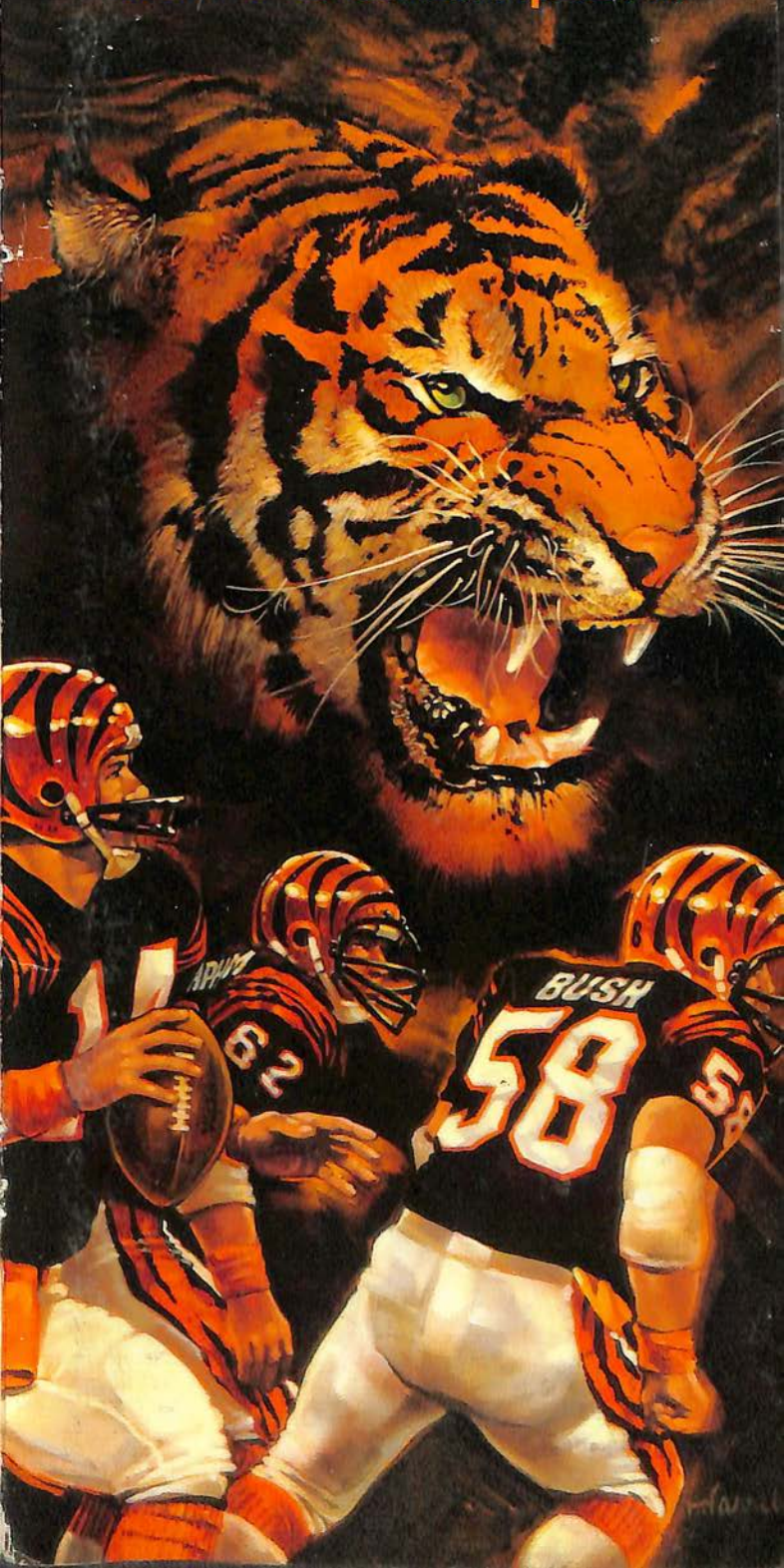

RIVERFRONT STADIUM

Riverfront Stadium, located on the banks of the Ohio River, is Bengal-land in Cincinnati.

The stadium is situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway.

The seating capacity when the field is in football configuration is 59,754.

The playing surface at Riverfront is AstroTurf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will hold 4500 automobiles. Three parking decks, plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium.

Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages and cartoons through a computer.

BENGAL TICKETS

Cincinnati Bengals' season and individual game tickets may be purchased from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Saturday at Gate 9 on the Plaza Level at Riverfront Stadium. Bengal tickets also are on sale at all Ticketron outlets.

PAUL BROWN

Vice President, General Manager

Paul Brown has added another jewel to the football crown he wears with such dignity.

Brown, the National Football League's executive of the year, directed his Cincinnati Bengals to their first American Football Conference title in 1981 and an appearance in Super Bowl XVI.

Brown is the man who founded the "Baby Bengals" in 1968 and made them an almost instant success. After coaching the young team to three playoff appearances, which included two AFC Central Division championships, he resigned from coaching to devote fulltime to being general manager. He held both jobs for eight years. His final team was 11-3 in 1975.

The man who is vice president and general manager and a principal owner of the Bengals is a Pro Football Hall of Fame member and holds the most distinguished coaching record in football history.

Although the excitement of the Super Bowl is electric, PB has experienced the feeling many times during his coaching days at every level of competition. His first professional team, the Cleveland Browns, played for the world championship every year during the first 10 years of its existence. Founded for the All-America Conference in 1946, the team won all four championships during that league's history, then came into the National Football League under much scorn and derision.

Brown and his Browns responded by knocking over the defending champion Philadelphia Eagles, 35-10, in the season's opener and going on to win the league title.

He won three NFL titles—and seven Eastern Division crowns—as head coach of the Browns.

"We didn't call it the Super Bowl at that time, of course," recalls Brown, "but it was the same thing—the championship game of professional football."

A legend in his own time, Brown achieved 351 victories, suffered only 133 losses and 16 ties for a remarkable .725 percentage, top record ever. He fashioned 213 victories, 104 losses and nine ties in 25 years of coaching in the NFL.

His return to the NFL, after a five-year absence after leaving Cleveland in 1963, coincided with the emergence of pro football as the nation's top spectator sport and he has done much to keep it that way as a member of the NFL's competition committee, the group most responsible for opening up the games' offenses during recent years.

He was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1967, his first year of eligibility when he was away from coaching. He also has presented many of his former players for induction.

Brown is the master builder of pro football franchises. He created a dynasty in Cleveland and in 14 years in Cincinnati has given the Queen City three AFC Central Division champions, a "wild card" playoff team, an AFC championship and a Super Bowl team.

Paul Brown is responsible for making pro football coaching the exacting science it is today. When he organized the Cleveland Browns in the All-America Football Conference in 1946, he started doing things no one else had ever done. He made coaching a science.

His success was instantaneous and only when other coaches began copying his procedures did the won and lost records start to level off.

In spite of his statistical record, which has no challenger, Brown did even more than put numbers in the win column. It is the way he went about putting together the teams that made his record possible that he will be remembered and honored for.

Here, in part, is how his citation read when he was inducted into the Professional Football Hall of Fame: "... in addition to his

great record, Brown is equally respected as a man who brought fine organization to professional football. He was the first to make coaching a fulltime profession, not only for himself, but for a staff of assistants, a practice that has since become universal."

PB is certainly a friend of coaches everywhere, regardless of the level at which they coach.

Brown had a background of exceptional success as a high school, college and service coach when he was given his first pro assignment with the new Cleveland team. Immediately, he hired a fulltime staff and he instituted a system for scouting college talent on a scale never before imagined by other pro teams.

He became the first to (1) use intelligence tests as a hint to a player's learning potential, (2) use notebooks and classroom techniques extensively, (3) set up complete film clip statistical studies and (4) then grade his own players from what he found. Brown was the first coach to keep his players together at a hotel the night before a home game as well as a road game.

Strategically, he started the practice of calling plays from the sideline by utilizing guards as messengers.

He developed pass patterns for the offense that were designed to pick holes in the defense, but then he devoted his efforts to perfecting the kind of defense that could counteract a pattern passing attack.

Using his personnel to the limit, Brown was the first to switch some fine running backs to the defense because "they were so good I didn't want to waste them on offense."

All of PB's measures are now common practice, but 34 years ago they were revolutionary in the coaching world.

Brown's coaching resume shows two years at Severn Prep School in Maryland; nine years at Massillon High School in Ohio (Brown's hometown); three years at Ohio State University; two years with the successful Great Lakes Navy Team during World War II; 17 years with the Cleveland Browns in both the All-American Football Conference and the National Football League and eight with Cincinnati.

Among the more significant accomplishments of his teams are a series of Ohio state championships at Massillon which in turn made that school one of America's foremost prep powers, a national collegiate championship at Ohio State in 1942, four straight AAFC championships and seven divisional titles and three NFL championships in 1950, 1954 and 1955 after the Browns had joined the NFL following the breakup of the AAFC. Ironically, it was Brown's overwhelming success—his Cleveland team had a 52-4-3 record in AAFC play—that was probably the major factor in the breakup of that league.

After graduating from Massillon High School, Brown enrolled at Ohio State and later transferred to Miami where he became a fine runner and passer.

He returned to his home in Massillon as football and basketball coach in 1932. The stadium in Massillon is "Paul Brown Tiger Stadium."

He is holder of the prestigious Ohio Governor's Award from James A. Rhodes; the NFL Alumni Association's Order of the Leather Helmet; the National Football Foundation's "Mr. Ohio Award" and many others.

He also has authored a book—"PB: The Paul Brown Story" which tells of his life in football.

Paul and his wife, Mary, live in Indian Hill. His first wife, Katie, died in April, 1969. Two of his sons, Mike and Pete, are associated with the Bengal organization as assistant general manager and director of player personnel respectively. Another son, Robin, a former Bengal scout, died in July, 1978.

Paul was born in Norwalk, Ohio. He holds a bachelor of arts degree from Miami University and a master of arts degree in education from Ohio State.



AUSTIN E. KNOWLTON

Chairman of the Board

A. E. "Dutch" Knowlton is the chairman of the board of the Cincinnati Bengals and has been a firm supporter from the first day of the franchise's inception.

Knowlton, a well-known builder and sportsman, has been an owner and director since the franchise was founded and often can be

found watching his team play at some of the farthest waystops on the NFL map, in addition to his regular attendance at games in Riverfront Stadium.

"The only times I miss a game is when my business calls me out of the country, and there is no possible way I can either avoid the trip or return in time to see the game," he says. "I'm as rabid in my devotion to this team as the most loyal fan in Cincinnati, and I'm often torn when I have to leave during the season."

"Like every other Bengal fan in 1981, I rejoiced at our success. And like every other fan, being able to play for the world championship in the Super Bowl was like a dream come true. This was something we dreamed about when the team was formed, but now that it has happened, it's still a bit unbelievable."

Besides being not only one of the team's most rabid fans as well as its chairman of the board, Knowlton also is an avid sportsman who spends as much of his free time as possible overseeing his second great interest—the breeding and selling of show horses at his Emerald Farm in Delaware County.

Sometimes there is not as much time to devote to these activities as he'd like because of his business interests. A few years ago, after several decades as head of Knowlton Construction Co., he organized the Arga Co., which is engaged in the construction of buildings, leasing of buildings and other endeavors. A division of this company, K Construction Management, is engaged in the construction business in Ohio and other states.

After receiving a degree in architecture and civil engineering from Ohio State University, Knowlton joined his father's construction company which was engaged in public buildings, such as hospitals, schools and industrial projects.

He assumed ownership of the construction business and operated it under the name of Knowlton Construction Company.

Knowlton Construction Company built the major portion of Ohio University, Athens, Ohio; Bowling Green State University, Bowling Green, Ohio; as well as many college buildings at Ohio State University, Miami University, Capital University, Otterbein College and numerous schools and universities.

After World War II, he secured the franchise for the sale of Beechcraft Products in Ohio and surrounding areas and formed the Ohio Aviation Company of Vandalia and Cleveland, Ohio.

His offices are in Bellefontaine, Ohio, and Columbus, and he resides in Delaware County at Emerald Farms where he breeds and raises thoroughbred horses.



JOHN SAWYER

President

John Sawyer saw one of his dreams unfold last season. He watched the team he and Paul and Mike Brown founded back in 1967 win the American Football Conference championship and with it a spot in Super Bowl XVI.

John Sawyer knew it was going to happen, he just didn't know when.

He is the president and an owner of the Bengals and the team's biggest fan, win or lose.

Last fall he had an illness which ended a long Bengal streak. Sawyer had not missed being at a Bengal game, home or away, since the team began playing in 1968.

He still hasn't missed one, although he's had to rely on television a couple of times.

A couple of weeks later he was back in his seat at Riverfront and also on the airplane for road trips.

Nothing slows John Sawyer down. He's a businessman on the move, in one city today, another tomorrow.

Sawyer, along with Paul and Mike Brown, was one of the Bengal founders and one of the original people in the Bengals' organizational structure. He worked diligently with the Browns in bringing professional football to Cincinnati.

He, Paul and Mike represented Cincinnati at the many National Football League meetings held prior to the awarding of the franchise.

He still attends many league meetings with the Browns and played a part in the NFL realignment in 1970.

The well-known business executive operates J. Sawyer Co., a multi-faceted agricultural concern which includes aviation firms, an antique shop, art center, restaurant, a line of popcorn and farms and ranches in Ohio, Mississippi, Wyoming, Montana and Colorado. Sawyer is one of only a few farm managers and real estate brokers in the country.

He has never lost his love of airplanes and flies his company's Lear jet out of Madison Aviation center, which he built, in London, Ohio, on business trips around the country.

John is a graduate of Princeton and is the son of the late Charles Sawyer, former Secretary of Commerce.

John and his wife, Ruth, live in Indian Hill and have four daughters, Anne, 27; Elizabeth, 25; Catherine, 22, and Mary, 18.



MIKE BROWN

Assistant General Manager Legal Counsel

Mike Brown's hard work and dedication to a lifetime love—professional football—served him well last season.

Mike and his father, Paul, put all the pieces of the Bengal puzzle together and their team won the AFC championship and landed in the Super Bowl.

The job done by the Browns in such a relatively short time did not go unnoticed.

The widely-read and highly-regarded Sporting News voted Paul Brown National Football League Executive of the Year. The runner-up was Mike Brown.

Quite a salute to professional football's foremost family.

Mike Brown wears a number of hats in the Bengals' front office as he fills several key roles.

Mike is the team's assistant general manager, legal counsel and, in addition, he's an owner and a member of the board of directors.

Thanks to the tireless efforts of Mike, and his father, Paul, the Bengals are in Cincinnati.

As assistant general manager and legal counsel, Mike handles player contract matters and the Bengals' contracts and negotiations with the City of Cincinnati. He also works closely with television and radio executives involved with the Bengals and handles all the club's legal matters.

The Brown family dedicated itself to bringing professional football to the Queen City in the mid-60's and saw its efforts rewarded in 1967 when the city was awarded a franchise in the old American Football League which was due to merge with the National Football League in 1970.

Professional football in Cincinnati was visualized by Mike long before it became a reality. Several years before the Cincinnati franchise materialized he conducted a detailed survey showing the potential of the area as a professional football market. His drive produced the franchise for Cincinnati.

Paul and Mike Brown represent the Bengals at all league meetings and they played a major role in bringing about the merger which brought the American Football League and the National Football League together.

Mike, who has been associated with football all of his life and has had the benefit of the best possible teacher, is a member of the very active NFL Management Council. This group deals with labor-management decisions within the NFL.

Mike did his undergraduate work at Dartmouth where he played quarterback. He received his law degree from Harvard Law School. He was associated with a law firm in Cleveland for five years and then joined his father with the Cleveland Browns.

Mike and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Katie, 16, and a son, Paul, 12½.



PETE BROWN

Director of Player Personnel

Cincinnati's Super Bowl roster listed 36 Bengal draft choices and 11 were first rounders. Only nine other players came via different routes.

That statistic pretty much tells the story of what kind of a job the Bengal personnel department under the direction of Pete Brown is doing.

The Bengals build heavily on the draft and they have the talent-seekers and know-how to do it.

Pete Brown, Paul Brown's youngest son, is the director of player personnel for the Cincinnati Bengals.

A well-respected and astute judge of football talent, Brown is starting his 14th season as director of player personnel. He worked his first season as assistant director and has been director of scouting for 15 years.

He's also an owner of the Cincinnati Bengals and a member of the organization's board of directors.

Pete's drafts are considered among the best in the National Football League. He is known by college coaches throughout the country.

He is also very involved in physical conditioning and played a major role in implementing the Nautilus training program with the Bengals.

He is a graduate of Denison University.



FORREST GREGG

Head Coach

Forrest Gregg took the Cincinnati Bengals from last to first in the American Football Conference in just two seasons.

The Hall of Famer brought the American Football Conference championship to Cincinnati for the first time as his Bengals rolled to a 12-4 regular season record in win-

ning the AFC Central Division. He followed this up with conquests of Buffalo and San Diego in the playoffs for the AFC title and a spot in the Super Bowl.

Gregg's transformation of the Bengals began December 28, 1979, when general manager Paul E. Brown appointed him head coach to succeed Homer Rice.

The appointment teamed a pair of Hall of Fame members.

Gregg faced a most difficult assignment when he took over a group of Bengals who had suffered through two straight 4-12 seasons and seemed destined to be the permanent AFC cellar-dweller.

However, the former Green Bay Packer great, quickly instilled pride and gave the Bengals that spirit and true dedication that a winner must have. In short, he made them believe in themselves, and in doing so they made believers out of the National Football League.

After compiling a 6-10 record in 1980, Gregg and the Bengals shocked everyone by having the best won-loss record in the American Conference, and then made believers out of the cynics when his team whipped through the playoffs in beating Buffalo and San Diego for the right to play the 49ers in the Super Bowl XVI.

His 12-4 record earned him AFC coach of the year honors from everyone who presents such a trophy—the AP, UPI, Professional Football Writers Assn. He also was honored by numerous sports groups throughout the country.

In May, he went to the White House to receive the American Cancer Society's "National Courage Award" from President Reagan.

There are some who still are a bit startled at this resurgence but Gregg has not achieved anything through black magic or sleights of hand. He is a straight forward, clear-talking man who his coach at Green Bay, Vince Lombardi once called, "the best player who I ever coached." His straight forward, forceful manner reminds many of Lombardi but Gregg really has patterned himself after no one save himself.

His players obviously have great faith in what he says and does. Cris Collinsworth, the Bengals fine wide receiver, was moved to note late in the season that "the beauty of Forrest Gregg is that he treats everyone the same. He'll yell at Ken Anderson with the same force that he yells at the last man on the roster if he believes it is necessary."

Looking at his team's accomplishments over the 1981 season, Gregg says: "Our improvement is a gradual thing since 1980. We changed a lot of people's minds this year. Many were happy that they had us on their schedule but they don't look at it that way now."

Gregg's overall record in his two seasons with the Bengals, including playoffs, is 20-15.

Gregg came to the Bengals from Toronto where he was head coach of the Argonauts in the Canadian Football League.

The 48-year-old Gregg, who was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, in 1977, previously was head coach of the Cleveland Browns.

He took over as head coach in Cleveland in 1975 and had a 3-11 record in a rebuilding season.

Gregg turned things around for the Browns in 1976 by compiling a 9-5 record. He was named National Football League Coach of the Year.

His 1977 Cleveland team won five of its first seven games. Then injuries hit and the Browns dropped six of their last seven. Gregg resigned with one game remaining in 1977.

He was assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers before joining Toronto in 1979 where he compiled a 5-11 record with a young and inexperienced team.

During his distinguished 15-season career in the National Football League, Gregg performed as both a guard and tackle with the Green Bay Packers under Vince Lombardi from 1956 to 1970 and with Dallas in 1971.

During his last two seasons at Green Bay, Gregg served as a player-coach. He also was a player-coach with Dallas' 1971 Super Bowl champion. He was offensive line coach with the San Diego Chargers in 1972 and 1973 before joining the Browns in the same capacity in 1974.

Throughout his career, Forrest Gregg was known as one of the most capable and most unselfish of all players.

Team-minded and versatile, Gregg also proved to be durable, playing in a then-record 188 consecutive games from the first game of his rookie 1956 campaign until the first game of the 1971 season, the final one of his career, which he spent with the Dallas Cowboys.

Add to that the summation that Lombardi, the architect of the awesome Green Bay juggernauts of the 1960s, included in his book "Run to Daylight." Lombardi said simply: "Forrest Gregg is the finest player I ever coached!"

With credentials and endorsements like that, it is not surprising that Gregg was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1977, the first time he was eligible following the mandatory five-year retirement period.

Gregg, a native of Birthright, Texas, had already established himself as a multi-talented, injury-free athlete by the time he joined the Packers. He participated in football, baseball, basketball and track at Sulphur Springs, Texas, high school and then won all-Southwest Conference honors twice as a two-way tackle at SMU. He was captain of the Mustangs in his senior year and a second round draft choice of Green Bay.

A broken arm when he was a high school sophomore was the only severe injury Forrest suffered during his career. Once in the NFL, a bruised knee almost kept him out of a game against Detroit in 1965, but he blocked on an extra point attempt to keep his consecutive game streak alive.

Forrest stood 6-4 but weighed only 230 pounds when he reported as a rookie. He quickly realized that, as an offensive right tackle, he would have to learn to finesse the monstrous defensive left ends that would be pouring in on him.

So Gregg learned to recognize and combat the rushing tactics of every defensive lineman he would have to face. During his career, he did battle with the best—Gino Marchetti, Gene Brito and Deacon Jones early in his career and later standouts like Carl Eller and Claude Humphrey.

Following the 1956 campaign, Forrest spent a year in the U.S. Army. When he returned in 1968, the new coach, Lombardi, was on hand. As the Packers climbed to the heights under the leadership of the great coach, Gregg, one of the few pre-Lombardi players on the team, dramatically improved his stature.

In 1960, the year that Green Bay won its first Western Division championship under Lombardi, Gregg was named all-NFL, the first in a string of eight straight years of all-league acclaim. In 1965, when he changed positions, Forrest not only did not blow his chance for all-league honors, he actually was named at both positions! Associated Press picked him as a guard on its honor team, United Press International as a tackle on its team.

As eager as Forrest was to play football and to do anything asked of him at any time, he actually retired four times before making his fifth retirement finally stick.

He first "retired" after the 1963 campaign to accept an assistant coaching job at the University of Tennessee. Lombardi couldn't believe that anyone as good as Gregg could consider retirement at the age of 30 so he talked Forrest into coming back.

Gregg started both the 1969 and 1970 seasons as a member of the Packers' coaching staff but injury problems prompted his return to playing action each year. He retired a fourth time before the 1971 season, was released by the Packers, but returned to ac-

tion with the Dallas Cowboys when Coach Tom Landry issued an SOS for help for an injury-decimated offensive line. Forrest thus became a member of a Super Bowl championship team for a third time. Following Super Bowl VI, he retired for good. Born October 18, 1933, he was 38 at the time.

While Forrest played in nine Pro Bowls, as well as the long string of Packers playoff games, he can't pinpoint any one outstanding thrill.

"The whole thing was a very gratifying experience," he reminisces. "They say you don't get much recognition on the offensive line but there is a lot of satisfaction if you know you're doing your job and the coaches know it. Our backs always knew they didn't make those long runs by themselves."

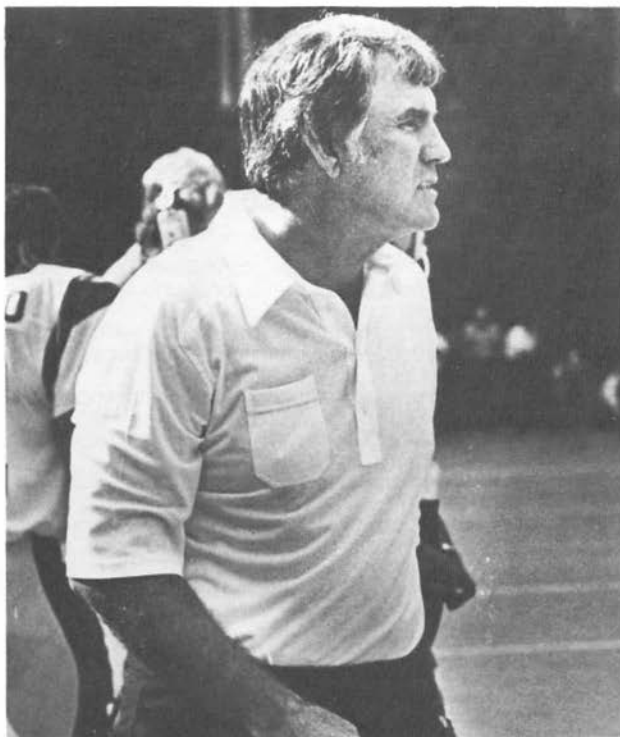
He also proved that if you play football the Forrest Gregg way, even an offensive lineman can gain ample recognition. His election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame verifies that.

As Gregg said on his election to the Hall: "It's awesome when you think that as a player or a coach, your tenure is only temporary. But election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame is permanent. It's something that can never be taken away!"

Forrest and his wife, Barbara, have two children—Forrest Jr., and Karen. Both are students at SMU.

HANK BULLOUGH **Defensive Coordinator—** **Linebackers**

Hank Bullough, the NFL's "Doctor of Defense," has given the Cincinnati Bengals one of the proudest and toughest defensive units in football.

The Bengals, who meshed their offense and defense near perfect to reach the Super Bowl in 1982, ranked fourth in the AFC in overall defense. They were sixth against the rush and ninth against the pass.

Measure this with the fact that in 1979, the year before Bullough arrived, Cincinnati, with virtually the same defensive unit, was dead last in defense in the NFL.

Bullough came to the Cincinnati Bengals in 1980 as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach and made his presence felt immediately.

Bullough and head coach Forrest Gregg installed the 3-4 defense and the Bengals climbed from last in overall defense in 1979 to fifth in 1980 and first against the rush.

Bullough was assistant head coach and defensive coordinator for the New England Patriots before coming to the Bengals. He compiled an enviable defensive record with the 3-4 at New England.

The 48-year-old Bullough joined the Patriots in 1973 and coached the defensive line five years and the linebackers two. Prior to going to New England, he was linebacker coach of the Baltimore Colts for three seasons.

Before entering the pro ranks, Bullough was defensive coordinator at Michigan State starting under Duffy Daugherty in 1959. He was a defensive tackle at Michigan State and played guard for the Green Bay Packers in 1955 and 1958 with a two-year military tour of duty in between.

Born January 24, 1934, in Scranton, Pa., Hank and his wife, Lou Ann, have three children, Cheryl, 19; Shane, 17, and Chuck, 13.



BRUCE COSLET **Special Teams—Tight Ends**

Former Bengal player Bruce Coslet had an immediate impact as the club's special teams and tight end coach.

Coslet turned an area which was lacking in 1980 into a strong point in his first season as a coach with the Bengals.

Cincinnati's return yardage shot upward while the opponents' total on returns tumbled.

Coslet also got maximum performances from tight ends Dan Ross, an All-Pro challenger, and M.L. Harris.

Coslet was named special teams and tight end coach in January, 1981.

He came to the Bengals from the San Francisco 49ers where he worked with special teams and tight ends in 1979.

Coslet played tight end and was an outstanding special teams performer for eight seasons, 1969 through 1976 when he retired.

A graduate of the University of the Pacific, Coslet caught 46 passes for 556 yards and nine touchdowns during his career. He was captain of the special teams for several years and is the first Bengal to return to the team as a coach.

Bruce and his wife, Kathy, have two children, J.J., 6, and Amy, 5. Bruce was born August 5, 1946.



LINDY INFANTE

Offensive Coordinator

Lindy Infante put his touch to the Cincinnati Bengals' pass offense and set off a thrilling explosion which helped win the team the AFC championship and a spot in the Super Bowl.

Infante, in his second season with the Bengals, designed the flight plan for "Air Anderson" and with it brought the most exciting offense seen in the NFL in many years to Cincinnati.

Infante was named offensive coordinator following the 1981 season. It is the first time the Bengals have used the title. He had been receiver-quarterback coach.

The Cincinnati passing offense was ranked second in the AFC, and amassed a club record 3995 yards during the regular season. Most other club passing records were wiped out by the 1981 Bengals.

Infante played a big part in the rapid development of Cris Collinsworth, a rookie who earned Pro Bowl status with a superlative season in 1981.

In his first season with Cincinnati, Infante did an excellent job developing the passing game despite injuries to key personnel. He was setting the stage for what was to come in 1981.

Infante, who was offensive coordinator at Tulane in 1979, coached the New York Giants' receivers in 1977 and 1978. He joined the Giants from Tulane where he was offensive coordinator during the 1976 season. He returned to the Green Wave in 1979.

He was defensive backfield coach for the Charlotte Hornets of the World Football League in 1975.

Infante played three seasons at the University of Florida as both a running back and defensive back, serving as co-captain in 1962 after winning All-Southeastern Conference honors in 1961. He played in the Gator Bowl in 1960 and 1962. He was drafted by both Cleveland (NFL) and Buffalo (then AFL) in 1963 and reported to the Bills' training camp. However, he opted for Hamilton of the Canadian Football League where he played the 1963 season as a running back.

Infante started his coaching career at Miami (Fla.) Senior High School and in 1966 moved to the University of Florida as freshman coach and then offensive backfield coach.

In 1972, he went to Memphis State as offensive coordinator and assistant head coach.

Born May 27, 1940, Infante and his wife, Stephanie, have two children, Brett, 11, and Brad, 9.



DICK LeBEAU

Defensive Backfield

Dick LeBeau, former All-Pro with the Detroit Lions, has molded youth with experience and has given the Cincinnati Bengals a cohesive, hard-hitting and high-spirited secondary.

Under LeBeau's guidance, the Bengals have become one of the toughest defensive backfields in the NFL. The unit is marked by its aggressiveness and the knowledge of the game that each member possesses.

LeBeau, highly-regarded in coaching circles in the NFL, joined the Bengals December 31, 1979, and improvement in the secondary was almost immediate. His 1980 secondary quickly distinguished itself and set the stage for its outstanding performance which helped lead to the 1981 AFC championship and Super Bowl XVI.

LeBeau's defensive backs have become known as a group of hitters. While at Green Bay, his defensive backfield was called the SWAT unit because of the ability of its members to deliver jarring tackles.

LeBeau joined the Packers in 1976 after serving as Philadelphia's

special teams coach for three years following retirement as a player after the 1972 season.

The 44-year-old LeBeau was a fifth round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1959 after an outstanding career at Ohio State as a defensive and offensive back. He was released by Cleveland and signed by Detroit in his rookie year.

He set an alltime durability record for cornerbacks by playing 171 consecutive games during a 14-year career with the Lions. His 62 pass interceptions rank him fifth on professional football's alltime list.

LeBeau starred for Ohio State for three seasons and was a stand-out performer on the national championship team in 1957. While a pro, he was selected to play in three Pro Bowl games and enjoyed his best statistical season in 1970 when he intercepted nine passes for 96 yards.

Born Charles Richard LeBeau on September 9, 1937, in London, Ohio, he was an All-Ohio High School selection before going to Ohio State.

Dick and his wife, Nancy, have a son, Brandon Grant, 3.



JIM McNALLY **Offensive Line**

Jim McNally loves football and hard work. And in this case they go hand-in-hand and McNally is a happy man.

McNally was somewhat of a surprise choice when he was named offensive line coach by the then new head coach Forrest Gregg early in January, 1981. McNally had been an assistant at Wake Forest and several other schools but had never coached in the NFL.

If there were any doubters then, there are none now.

Cincinnati's offensive line under McNally has blossomed into one of the best in the NFL. In 1981 it formed a ring of protection around quarterback Ken Anderson that was second to none.

When McNally arrived on the Cincinnati scene he was faced with an immediate job of cutting down the number of quarterback sacks. The number in 1979 was 63, highest in the league. The Bengal line, responding to McNally, reduced that figure to 36 in 1980 and to 35 in 1981.

"I'm still not satisfied, but we're getting there," says McNally.

McNally was offensive line coach at Wake Forest in 1979; at Boston College from 1976 to 1978; at Marshall from 1973 to 1975 and at the University of Buffalo from 1966 to 1969.

He played guard for three seasons at the University of Buffalo where he was All-East.

Born December 13, 1943 in Buffalo, Jim and his wife, Carolyn, have three children, Jenny, 10; Betsey, 7, and Jon, 6.



DICK MODZELEWSKI **Defensive Line**

Dick "Mo" Modzelewski, an All-Pro himself and a participant in many playoff games, brought his Cincinnati defensive line to Super Bowl status last season.

Mo's part in Cincinnati's march through the AFC and into the Super Bowl was mighty. His trio of Eddie Edwards, Wilson Whitley and Ross Browner provided the "3" in the Bengals "34" defense.

Mo's fiery threesome, aided by Mike St. Clair, the now retired Rod Horn, and Gary Burley, gave the Bengals a good pass rush and a hard-nosed game against the rush.

"Mo" came to Cincinnati in February, 1979, from the New York Giants where he had been defensive coordinator. He served as defensive line coach of the Cleveland Browns from 1968 until 1976

and was the club's defensive coordinator in 1977. He was interim head coach of the Browns during the final week of the 1977 season.

"Mo" was an outstanding defensive tackle for the Giants and the Browns during his playing days. He was with the Giants from 1956 through 1963. He was traded to the Browns in 1964 and played three more seasons before retiring in 1966.

Drafted No. 2 by the Washington Redskins in 1953 after being an All-American at Maryland, he also played with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1955 before being traded to the Giants where he became a vital part of the "Fearsome Foursome" along with Andy Robustelli, Jim Katcavage and Rosey Grier. An All-Pro several seasons, "Mo" played on six conference champions and two National Football League championship teams—the Giants in 1956 and the Browns in 1964.

He was born February 16, 1931, in West Natrona, Pa. He and his wife, Dorothy, have four children—Mark, Laurie, Terrie and Amie.



GEORGE SEFCIK

Offensive Backfield

George Sefcik, one of the most highly-respected offensive coaches in the NFL, brought the 1000-yard rusher back to Cincinnati last season.

The pass-minded Bengals had been without a 1000-yard seasonal rusher since 1968 until Pete Johnson turned the trick in 1981. Johnson chalked up 1077 rushing yards to top the 1024 gained by Paul Robinson in the Bengals' first year of existence.

Sefcik's well-designed infantry game complemented the powerful airborne offense and propelled the Bengals to the AFC championship and a berth in the Super Bowl.

Sefcik, who has been offensive backfield coach of the Bengals since 1978, has been instrumental in the development of Johnson, one of the premier fullbacks in the league, Charles Alexander and Archie Griffin.

His 1979 backs gained more yardage and scored more touchdowns than any group in Cincinnati history.

George came to the Bengals from the Cleveland Browns where he was offensive backfield coach from 1975 to 1978.

He is a graduate of Notre Dame where he was a halfback on the 1959-60-61 teams. Following graduation, he became head coach at Niles (Ill.) High School. He returned to Notre Dame a year later as freshman coach.

The following year when Ara Parseghian became head coach of the Irish, Sefcik was named coach of the receivers. He stayed at Notre Dame until 1969 when he went to the University of Kentucky as offensive coordinator.

He was an offensive coach with the Baltimore Colts in 1973 and 1974 and joined the Browns in 1975. A native of Cleveland, Sefcik helped bring the state title to Benedictine in 1957 as a halfback.

George and his wife, Loretta, have three children.



KIM WOOD

Strength Coach

The Cincinnati Bengals are known throughout the National Football League as a well-conditioned team.

The Bengals are a dedicated group and pride themselves on their physical fitness.

The man who has instilled this desire in them and who helps them keep the way they want to be is Kim Wood.

Kim Wood is in his eighth season as strength coach of the

Cincinnati Bengals.

The 37-year-old Wood became the Bengals' first fulltime strength coach in 1975. He is credited with many training innovations being used today throughout football.

Wood has been one of the leaders in the Nautilus training program since its inception. He is a dedicated and tireless worker and has set up programs for a number of NFL and college teams.

He was an outstanding running back at the University of Wisconsin. Kim and his wife, Connie, have a son, John, 3, and twin daughters Becky and Alyssa, 1.

Kim was born July 12, 1945, and his hometown is Barrington, Ill.

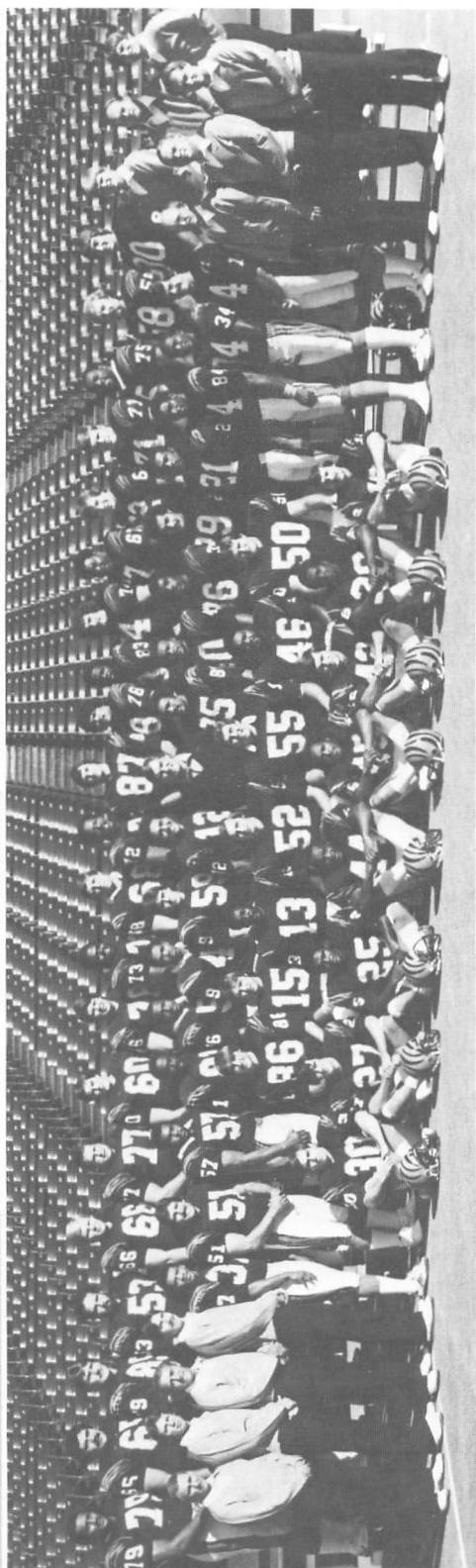

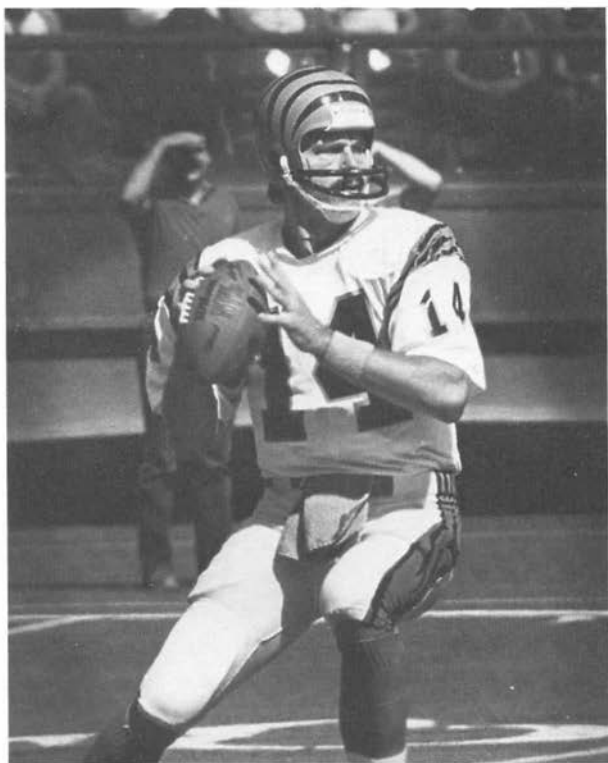

A PREVIEW OF "BENGALS 1982"

"We're really a young team starting to mature," says Cincinnati head coach Forrest Gregg of his Bengals who won the American Football Conference championship in 1981.

"What we have done is more of a reshaping of talent already there than rebuilding," pointed out Gregg who led the Bengals to a 12-4 regular season record, two playoff victories and a spot in the Super Bowl XVI.

"We're starting to get a lot of guys in the four, five and six-year categories of experience and that is good," he added.

Our improvement has been a gradual thing since 1980," Gregg said. "We changed a lot of people's minds last year."

RUNNING GAME

Big Pete Johnson heads the infantry attack which complements the Bengals' explosive air game. Johnson carries the load and at 6-0, 249-pounds he is a load for enemy tacklers. He scored 16 touchdowns while rushing for a club-record 1077 yards and catching 46 passes for 318. Johnson's running mate is Charles Alexander, who is beginning his fourth NFL season. Archie Griffin does spot duty, behind Alexander in the two running back format. Jim Hargrove was Johnson's backup in 1981. Quarterback Ken Anderson's running (300 yards last season) keeps defenses honest. The Bengals will get a look at two running backs from the 1982 draft, fourth-round choice Rodney Tate of Texas and 11th round selection Russell Davis from Idaho.

PASSING GAME

Anderson made a remarkable comeback last season. He was benched in the opening game but rallied to lead the NFL in passing and the Bengals to the Super Bowl. The final statistics show Anderson, the 1974-75 passing leader, rated first with 98.5 points. He had the highest completion percentage (62.6) and the lowest interception rate (2.1) in the NFL. He also set a Super Bowl record with 25 completions. Anderson is backed up by Jack Thompson and Turk Schonert. In Cris Collinsworth, Isaac Curtis, and Steve Kreider, the Bengals have three talented receivers who often are on the field at the same time. Talented David Verser, the Bengals top draft pick in 1981, is a fine receiver and was a top kickoff return man in 1981. Lanky Pat McInally doubles as the punter and a wide receiver. Dan Ross is one of the best tight ends in the game. M.L. Harris and Don Bass are capable backups who see action in double tight end sets. Third round draft choice Rodney Holman will be given a close look.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Anthony Munoz went to the 1982 AFC-NFC Pro Bowl (along with Anderson, Collinsworth, Johnson and punter Pat McInally), and the huge left tackle (6 feet, 6 inches, 278 pounds) surely deserved it. He mans the left side with left guard Dave Lapham, who often alternates with Glenn Bujnoch. Center Blair Bush does a fine job of taking on the big nose tackles who line up against him in the 3-4 defense. His blocking is responsible for much of Johnson's short-yardage success. Versatile tackle Max Montoya remains an important factor in keeping sack-minded defensive men away from Anderson. Mike Wilson is the starting right tackle. Valuable backup help comes from Blake Moore and Mike Obrovac. Rookie draft choice Kari Yli-Renko (8th round) and Jim Hannula, on injured reserve last season, will be battling for spots on the roster.

DEFENSIVE LINE

This is the third year the Bengals have been using the 3-4 defense installed by defensive coordinator Hank Bullough. Left to right up front are Eddie Edwards, Wilson Whitley, and Ross Browner. When Edwards missed three games last year due to injuries, Mike St. Clair stepped in at left end. Edwards led the front three with 10 sacks. Browner proved his value with an outstanding game in the Super Bowl after a nine-sack season. The retirement of Rod Horn moves Gary Burley from end to back up Whitley, who has been nose tackle since 1980.

Cincinnati went for defensive linemen with its first two selections in the 1982 draft and came up with Glen Collins, an end from Mississippi State, and Emanuel Weaver, from South Carolina. Weaver will be worked at nose tackle.

LINEBACKERS

This unit—Bo Harris and Jim LeClair on the left, Glenn Cameron and Reggie Williams on the right—has been together since the Bengals became a 3-4 team. Williams, a seven-year starter, comes off an excellent year in which he made 106 tackles, 11 sacks, and four interceptions. LeClair has been the Bengals' leading tackler seven years in a row. Backing up the starters are Rick Razzano, Tom Dinkel, and Guy Frazier.

The Bengals added linebacker Ben Needham in the draft.

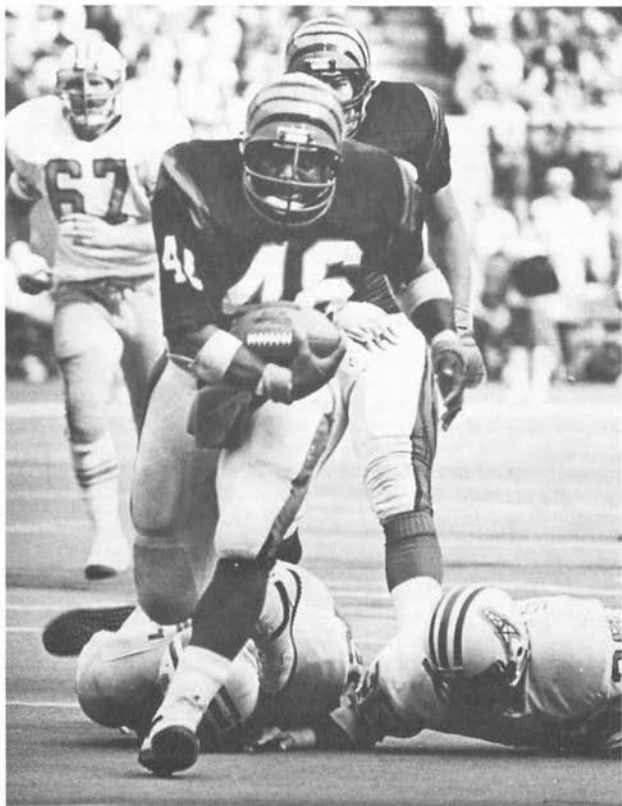
SECONDARY

Cornerback Ken Riley is still starting and making key interceptions in his 14th year. Riley has been a starter since 1969 and leads all Bengals in seniority. Louis Breeden has earned recognition at left corner. Bobby Kemp, an eighth-round draft choice, became the strong safety starter as a rookie. Bryan Hicks took over for the injured (knee) Dick Jauron at free safety. Jauron is back with hopes of regaining a starting role. Among the contenders at the corners are Ray Griffin and John Simmons. Mike Fuller, a former Charger, is a backup safety. Robert Jackson, an injured reserve due to knee surgery as a rookie, hopes to make a bid for a safety job.

Newcomers are safety Paul Sorensen, a fifth round pick from Washington State, and Larry Hogue, a 10th rounder from Utah State.

KICKING

One of the main reasons for the Bengals' success was the punting of Pat McNally, whose 45.4-yard average led the NFL. His booming, accurate punts with excellent hang time make him invaluable. Kicker Jim Breech moved around the NFL before he joined the Bengals late in 1980. He tied for the AFC scoring title with 115 points. Verser's 23.7-kickoff return average was fourth best in the AFC. Fuller managed 7.7 on punts.

1981 SEASON REVIEW

Everyone snickered when the Cincinnati Bengals showed up to begin the 1981 season with the new look stripes on their uniform. When the season had ended, the Stripes were "in," so were the Bengals and no one was snickering as they came from a 6-10 record in 1980, to finish with a 12-4 mark this season, the best in the AFC.

The reasons for this amazing turnabout began late in 1979 when general manager Paul Brown, determined to instill a strong hand at the coaching throttle, hired Forrest Gregg to be his head coach. The final results of this move became evident late in 1980 when the team won three of its last four games, and in that fourth game, many who follow the Bengals believe that the groundwork for the 1981 season had already taken root in the final game against Cleveland. In that game, wide receiver Pat McInally left the game with an injury after catching a pass. No one expected that he would return to play but in the fourth quarter, with the Bengals nip-and-tuck against the Browns, he came back into the game and caught a 52-yard touchdown pass.

It was, all around the team agree, the final coming together of a group of players under Gregg's leadership. Though the Bengals lost the game by just three points in the final minutes, the residual effects of that effort, and in particular McInally's gallant determination to practice the new message they had heard his coach preach from the first day of training camp, set the tone for 1982.

Still many thought that 1982 would be another building season, hopefully one that would at least reach 8-8 considering that the team had a schedule rated among the top three in toughness. But the Bengals stamped themselves as something special on the first Sunday of the season when they roared from a 21-0 first quarter deficit against Seattle to win 27-21, and then picked up steam at the midseason point to rip off a five-game winning streak.

There were no sudden lightning bolts or off-the-wall finishes to send the team to its best-ever record. Mirroring the personality of its coach the team won by dominating opponents from start to finish. In the playoffs, it did the same thing in beating Buffalo, and then the high-powered San Diego Chargers for the AFC title.

The hallmark of the team was its solid consistency. It did not build itself to win on offense through any single dimension, though Ken Anderson's NFL-leading passing statistics were a major reason. Swinging with pro football's trend of using a predominately single-setback, Pete Johnson carried the bulk of the rushing load and wound up with a record-setting 1077 yards. A year ago, Johnson and Charles Alexander split the rushing load, and each finished with over 700 yards rushing, though Johnson missed all or parts of five games.

Defensively, the Bengals utilized a second season with coach Hank Bullough's 3-4 defense and finished fourth in the AFC. Louis Breeden highlighted the defense's effort with a smashing 102-yard interception return in the team's 40-17 romp over the Chargers during a Nov. 8 game.

Another major improvement was in the kicking game. Pat McInally led the NFL's punters with a 45.4 average and David Verser, the team's top draft choice, was fourth in kickoff returns with a 24.3 average. His longest return was for 78 yards, and a 40-yard sweep during the AFC championship game against San Diego helped set up the Bengals deciding touchdown early in the second quarter.

It paid off when the Bengals broke from a tightly packed AFC-Central in late October and put together their five-game winning streak. It followed what was the season's low-point—a shocking 17-7 loss to the New Orleans Saints—when the Bengals traveled to Houston and beat the Oilers 34-21, turning three intercepted passes into touchdowns and taking first place for the rest of the season. There then followed an eye-popping 40-17 win at San Diego, that not only included Breeden's record setting interception return, but an overpowering performance by Anderson and wide receiver Isaac Curtis, who caught eight passes for 147 yards and one touchdown.

The next two weeks, Cincinnati defeated the Los Angeles Rams 24-10, and in a battle of the AFC's two best teams, totally dominated the Denver Broncos at Riverfront Stadium, winning 38-21. It was that game that finally convinced the skeptics the Bengals were not just a team on a hot roll, but one that was able to go out and compete successfully with the top teams in the NFL.

The capper to this surge came the following week when the Bengals travelled to Cleveland and not only beat their intra-state rivals 41-31, but also eliminated the defending AFC-Central champs from the title race. It was a special day for Gregg, who had been fired by the Browns just three years ago but rehired by general manager Paul Brown, who appreciated his ability to provide strong and vibrant leadership to a team.

The final punctuation mark to this amazing season was put in place on December 13 when the Bengals clinched their first AFC-Central title since 1973 with a 17-10 victory at Pittsburgh, the fourth straight win over the four-time NFL champions.

The Bengals roared into the playoffs and beat the Buffalo Bills, 28-21, in a thriller before 55,420 fans at Riverfront Stadium on January 3. It was the first NFL playoff game ever hosted in Cincinnati.

Charles Alexander became the Bengals big offensive weapon, rushing for 72 yards on 13 carries and scoring two touchdowns.

Ken Anderson continued his mastery of the airwaves with 14 of 21 completions for 192 yards and a touchdown pass to Cris Collinsworth.

The Bengals grabbed a 14-0 first quarter lead and were never headed.

Cincinnati won its first AFC championship by routing the San Diego Chargers 27-7 at Riverfront Stadium in nine-below zero weather and a chill factor of minus 59.

The Bengals zipped out to a 10-7 early lead and then added 17 more markers while defusing the highly-explosive Chargers.

Pete Johnson rushed for 80 yards and Anderson connected on 14 of 21 icy passes for 161 yards and two touchdowns, one to M. L. Harris and the other to Don Bass.

Super Bowl XVI saw the Bengals stage a brilliant second half comeback but still fall short of the San Francisco 49ers, 26-21.

The 49ers, behind quarterback Joe Montana, built a 20-0 halftime lead.

Cincinnati came right back with NFL Player of the Year Anderson firing two touchdown passes to tight end Dan Ross and running for another.

Ross set a Super Bowl record with 11 receptions for 104 yards. Anderson completed 25 passes for 300 yards. He threw for two TDs and two interceptions.

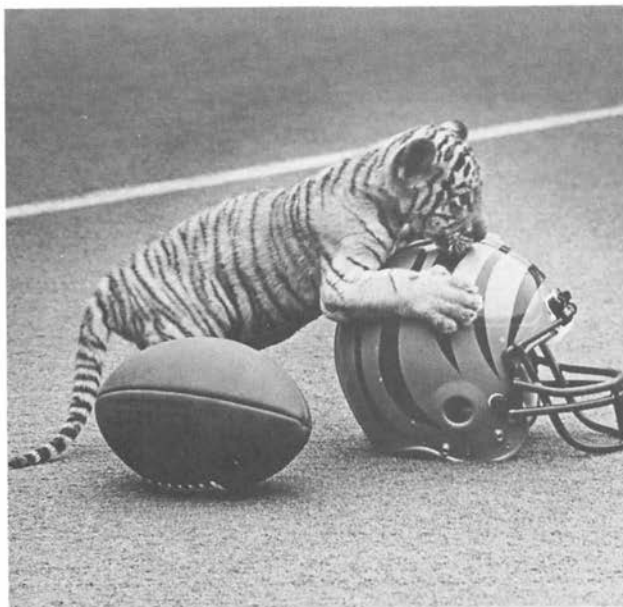

BENGALS SHOW THEIR STRIPES

The Cincinnati Bengals caught the fancy of the nation's football fans with their stripes in 1981.

Wherever you saw stripes you saw the Bengals and what followed was called Bengalmania.

Here's how Bengalmania began.

Working at the request of Cincinnati Bengals' general manager Paul Brown, National Football League Properties' Creative Services developed several different types of emblems for a new Bengals helmet, beginning in fall 1979.

After receiving many ideas, Paul decided that the direction he preferred was to incorporate tiger stripes on the helmet, giving it a unique identity in the NFL.

Bruce Claypool, art director for NFLP Creative Services, designed the helmet, the striping of which was modified a few times by Paul before the final design was accepted in the fall of 1980.

To complement the helmet, it was decided to bring the tiger stripes into the actual uniform and again NFLP Creative Services produced several concepts before one was agreed upon. David Boss and Bruce Claypool collaborated on the design of the uniform and the application of the tiger stripe details.

The Riddell Company is the manufacturer of the helmet, and Russell Southern Athletic is the manufacturer of the uniform.

WILMINGTON COLLEGE TRAINING CAMP

The Cincinnati Bengals "summer home" is Wilmington College in Wilmington, Ohio, where they are holding their training camp for the 15th consecutive year.

The heart of the training camp is housed in Hermann Court—a modern and well-equipped fieldhouse located on the south edge of the campus. The fieldhouse includes an Olympic swimming pool, a Nautilus-equipped training room, handball courts, and two basketball courts. Workouts are held on two practice fields and a regulation football field adjacent to the fieldhouse.

The team is housed in Clarence E. Pickett Hall, a four-story dormitory; dining room facilities are located in nearby Pyle Center. As a fan, you are cordially invited to both tour the campus and watch the Bengals in action.

The Bengals stay at Wilmington College runs from July 29 until August 27.

BENGALS ATTENDANCE IN '81

The Cincinnati Bengals played before six sellout crowds at Riverfront Stadium last season, attracting a record-setting 422,430 fans, topping the old mark of 414,769 in 1971.

Cincinnati had regular season sellouts for Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Houston, Los Angeles, Denver and San Francisco. Only the early season games with Seattle and Buffalo were not sellouts.

The Bengals home crowd average was 52,804.

Cincinnati drew 367,240 to home games in 1980.

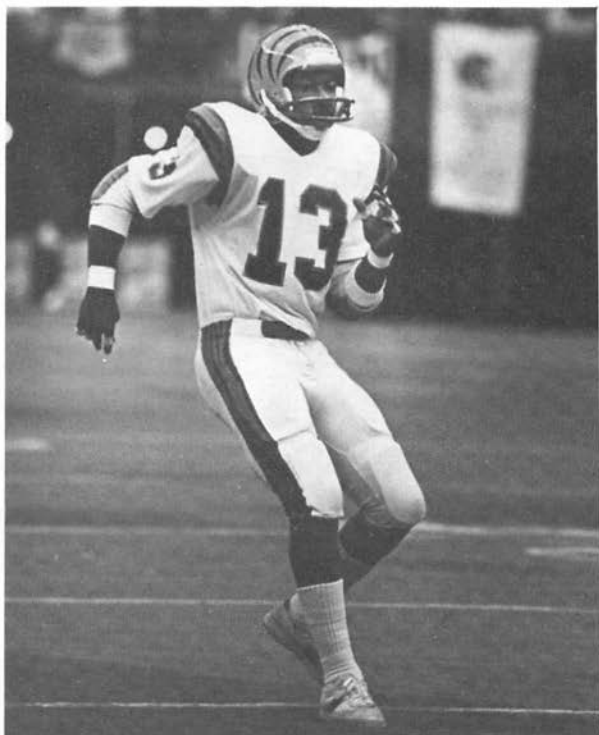

NOTES ABOUT THE CINCINNATI BENGALS

Cincinnati's offense ranked No. 2 in total yards (373 avg.) and No. 3 in passing yards (249.6 avg.) in the AFC in 1981.

Every player in the Bengals' starting lineup—both on offense and defense—was a Cincinnati draft choice. There were only 10 players on the Cincinnati roster who were not drafted by the Bengals. The only new starter on offense was rookie Cris Collinsworth, who finished with 67 receptions for a club-record 1,009 yards. SS Bobby Kemp, an 8th-round draft choice from Cal State-Fullerton, was the only new starter on defense.

QB Ken Anderson captured his third NFL passing title in 1981. He completed 300 of 479 attempts for 3,754 yards to give him a 98.5 rating. Twenty-nine of his passes went for touchdowns and only 10 were intercepted. He finished with the highest completion percentage (62.6) and lowest interception rate (2.1) among NFL QBs.

FB Pete Johnson set Cincinnati records for most rushing attempts (274) and yards (1,077) in 1981. He also scored a team-high 12 touchdowns.

110,230,000 WATCH BENGALS AND 49ERS

Super Bowl XVI drew the largest audience in the history of television with 110,230,000 viewers, according to A. C. Nielsen Research.

The game, in which San Francisco defeated Cincinnati, 26-21, on January 24 in the Silverdome in Pontiac, Mich., drew over eight million more viewers than Super Bowl XII, the previous holder of the largest audience for a television show.

The Bengals-49ers game was telecast by CBS.

The biggest total audience among non-sporting events is the final episode of "Roots," which drew 98,710,000 viewers in 1977. That show now rates as the third highest audience in television history.

Super Bowls XII, XIII, XIV, XV and XVI hold five of the first six spots in total audience, according to Nielsen Research.

COLLINSWORTH MAKES TOUR

Bengals' wide receiver Cris Collinsworth and four other NFL players visited United States military installations in Europe during a 21-day tour last spring under the sponsorship of the USO and Department of Defense.

Collinsworth was joined by cornerback Ronnie Lott of the San Francisco 49ers; linebacker Matt Blair, Minnesota Vikings; kicker Effren Herrera, Seattle and fullback Mike Augustyniak, New York Jets.

Bill Granholm of the NFL office was in charge of the tour.
