RIVERFRONT STADIUM

The Bengals' home is Cincinnati's beautiful Riverfront Stadium, located on the banks of the Ohio River.

The stadium, situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway, has a seating capacity of 59,754 for football.

The four-level circular stadium has a diameter of 700 feet encompassing approximately eight and a half acres. The Riverfront Stadium features a complete playing sur-

face of Astroturf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will accommodate 4500 autos. Three parking decks plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium. A total of 75 buses and 100 taxi cabs can park on the plaza level. Two fourlane streets run underneath the stadium, adjacent to the parking area. Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, con-tains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages and cartoons through a computer.

PAUL BROWN Vice President and General Manager

Paul Brown, a Hall of Famer and holder of the most distinguished coaching record in football history, is an owner, vice president and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals, the team he founded in 1967.

He has charted the course of professional football, a game he truly loves, along its way to the great prominence it now enjoys.

PB, long recognized as a genius among football coaches and administrators, left coaching in 1976 to devote fulltime to his duties as general manager.

A legend in his own time, Brown wound up a brilliant coaching career at every level of football with 351 victories, only 133 losses and 16 ties for a remarkable .725, the top record ever. (Paul Brown's coaching record on page 13)

As an administrator, Brown built solid organizations in Cleveland and Cincinnati and has played, and continues to play a major role in shaping the NFL. He was one of the leaders in the movement which brought the old American Football League into the NFL and is presently a member of the NFL's competition and planning committees.

His unprecedented success ushered him into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, in 1967. He's also been called upon several times to present his former players for enshrinement.

Brown founded the Cincinnati Bengals in 1968 and served the dual role of head coach and general manager for eight years. He built the Bengals into a contender in as short a time as possible, guiding the young team to two divisional titles — 1970 and 1973 — in the rugged American Football Conference's Central Division in just six years. In 1975, his last team won 11 games and lost three and earned another playoff berth while posting the Bengals' best record to date.

His early Cincinnati teams were judged by many as the "best expansion teams" ever produced in professional football, and they produced a number of memorable upsets including a 24-19 victory over Kansas City in 1969. The Chiefs went on to win the Super Bowl that year.

Perhaps more than any other person, Paul Brown is responsible for making pro football coaching the exacting science it is today. When he organized the Cleveland team in the new All-America Football Conference in 1946, he started doing many things no one else had ever done.

His success was instantaneous and only when other coaches started copying many of the Brown procedures did the won-lost records start to level off,

Brown had a background of exceptional success as a high school, college and service coach when he was given his first pro assignment with the new Cleveland team. Immediately, he hired a full-time staff on a year-round basis and he instituted a system for scouting college talent on a scale never before imagined by other pro teams.

In his handling of his team, he became the first to (1) use intelligence tests as a hint to a player's learning potential, (2) use notebooks and classroom techniques extensively, (3) set up complete film clip statistical studies and (4) then grade his own players from what he found. Brown was the first coach to keep his players together at a hotel the night before a home game as well as a road game. From the strategic standpoint, he started the practice of calling plays from the sideline by utilizing alternating guards as messengers. He developed pass patterns for the offense that were designed to pick holes in the defense, but then he devoted his efforts to perfecting the kind of a defense that could counteract a pattern passing attack. Using his personnel to the limit, he was the first to switch some fine running backs to the defense because "they were so good I didn't want to waste them on offense."

These measures are now common practice, but 34 years ago, they were revolutionary in the coaching world. The results quickly proved the merits of the system for the Browns won all four AAFC titles, compiling a 47-4-3 regularseason record in the process. Then came the merger of 1950 and the NFL stalwarts

Then came the merger of 1950 and the NFL stalwarts eagerly awaited the comeuppance of the Browns when they met the "real pros," the defending champion Philadelpha Eagles, in the 1950 NFL season opener. There were plenty of lessons to be learned that night, but they were all taught by the Browns, who stunned the Eagles, 35-10.

Paul Brown's team won Eastern Division titles its first six seasons in the NFL and added overall NFL titles in 1950, 1954 and 1955. In his first 10 seasons as a head coach, Brown had won a league or division championship every year. No other coach has ever come even close to this record. In his 17 seasons as the Brown's head man, Paul Brown ex-

In his 17 seasons as the Brown's head man, Paul Brown experienced only one losing season in 1956. Brown left. Cleveland after the 1963 season.

He came back into the picture as head coach and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals, an expansion club in the American Football League, in 1968. Just two seasons later, in 1970, he guided the youthful Bengals to the Central Division championship of the American Football Conference of the expanded NFL.

He had not lost the magic that establishes him indelibly as one of pro football's alltime premier coaches.

Brown's resume shows two years at Severn Prep School in Maryland; nine years at Massillon high school in Ohio (Brown's hometown); three years at Ohio State University; two years with the successful Great Lakes Navy team during World War II; 17 years with the Cleveland Browns in both the All-American Football Conference and the National Football League and eight with Cincinnati.

Among the more significant accomplishments of his teams are a series of Ohio state championships at Massillon which in turn made that school one of America's foremost prep powers, a national collegiate championship at Ohio State in 1942, four straight AAFC championships and seven divisional titles and three NFL championships in 1950, 1954 and 1955 after the Browns had joined the NFL following the breakup of the AAFC. Ironically, it was Brown's overwhelming success — his Cleveland team had a 52-4-3 record in AAFC play — that was probably the major factor in the breakup of that league.

In spite of his statistical record — as great as it is, Brown will be remembered and honored again and again for far more than his record alone. What he will be most honored for is how he went about putting together the teams that made his record possible.

When he was inducted into the Professional Football Hall of Fame, his citation read in part..."in addition to his great record, Brown is equally respected as a man who brought fine organization to professional football. He was the first to make coaching a year-round occupation, not only for himself, but for a fulltime resident coaching staff, a practice that has since become universal."

After graduating from Massillon High School, Brown enrolled at Ohio State and later transferred to Miami where he became a fine runner and passer.

He returned to his home in Massillon as football and basketball coach in 1932. The stadium in Massillon now is known as "Paul Brown Tiger Stadium."

He is a holder of the prestigious Ohio Governor's Award from James A. Rhodes; the NFL Alumni Association's Order of the Leather Helmet; the National Football Foundation's "Mr. Ohio Award" and many others.

He also has authored a book—"PB: The Paul Brown Story" which tells of his life in football.

Paul and his wife, Mary, live in Indian Hill. His first wife, Katie, died in April, 1969. Two of his sons, Mike and Pete, are associated with the Bengal organization as assistant general manager and director of player personnel respectively. Another son, Robin, a former Bengal scout, died in July, 1978.

Paul was born in Norwalk, Ohio. He holds a bachelor of arts degree from Miami University and a master of arts degree in education from Ohio State.



AUSTIN E. KNOWLTON Chairman of the Board

Austin E. Knowlton, wellknown builder and sportsman, has been an owner and director of the Cincinnati Bengals since the franchise was founded in 1968.

After receiving a degree in architecture and civil engineering from Ohio State University, he

joined his father's construction company which was engaged in public buildings, such as hospitals, schools and industrial projects.

He assumed ownership of the construction business and operated it under the name of Knowlton Construction Company.

Knowlton Construction Company built the major portion of Ohio University, Athens, Ohio; Bowling Green State University, Bowling Green, Ohio; as well as many college buildings at Ohio State University, Miami University, Capital University, Otterbein College and numerous schools and universities.

After World War II, he secured the franchise for the sale of Beechcraft Products in Ohio and surrounding areas and formed the Ohio Aviation Company of Vandalia and Cleveland, Ohio.

A few years ago, he organized the Arga Co. which is engaged in the construction of buildings, leasing of buildings and other endeavors. A division of this company, K Construction management is engaged in the construction business in Ohio and other states.

Knowlton also is a director of the Cincinnati Reds. His offices are in Bellefontaine, Ohio, and Columbus, and he resides in Delaware County at Emerald Farms where he breeds and raises thoroughbred horses.



JOHN SAWYER President

John Sawyer, a businessman who is always on the move, has been president and an owner of the Cincinnati Bengals since the franchise was founded in 1968.

Sawyer, along with Paul and Mike Brown, was one of the Bengal

founders and one of the original people in the Bengals' organizational structure. He worked diligently with the Browns in bringing professional football to Cincinnati. He, Paul and Mike represented Cincinnati at the many National Football League meetings held prior to the awarding of the franchise. He still attends many league meetings with the Browns and played a part in the NFL realignment in 1970.

He has not missed a Bengal game, home or away, since the team began playing in 1968.

The well-known business executive operates J. Sawyer Co., a multi-faceted agricultural concern which includes aviation firms, an antique shop, art center, restaurant, a line of popcorn and farms and ranches in Ohio, Mississippi, Wyoming, Montana and Colorado. Sawyer is one of only a few farm managers and real estate brokers in the country.

He has never lost his love of airplanes and flies his company's Lear jet out of Madison Aviation center, which he built, in London, Ohio, on business trips around the country. John, a graduate of Princeton, is a member of a prominent

John, a graduate of Princeton, is a member of a prominent Cincinnati family and he and his wife, Ruth, live in Indian Hill. He is the son of the late Charles Sawyer, former Secretary of Commerce.

The Sawyers have four daughters, Anne, 26; Elizabeth, 24; Catherine, 21; and Mary, 17.



MIKE BROWN Assistant General Manager Legal Counsel

Mike Brown holds a number of key roles in the operation of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Mike is the team's assistant general manager, legal counsel and, in addition, he's an owner and a member of the board of directors.

Add all this up and you come up with a man who is dedicated to football and his team, the Bengals. Thanks to the tireless efforts of Mike, and his father, Paul, the Bengals are in Cincinnati.

As assistant general manager and legal counsel, Mike handles player contract matters and the Bengals' contracts and negotiations with the City of Cincinnati. He also works closely with television and radio executives involved with the Bengals and handles all the club's legal matters.

The Brown family dedicated itself to bringing professional football to Cincinnati in the mid-60's and saw its efforts rewarded in 1967 when the city was awarded a franchise in the old American Football League which was due to merge with the National Football League in 1970.

Mike, who has been associated with football all of his life and has had the benefit of the best possible teacher, is a member of the very active NFL Management Council. This group deals with labor-management decisions within the NFL.

Professional football in Cincinnati was visualized by Mike long before it became a reality. Several years before the Cincinnati franchise materialized he conducted a detailed survey showing the potential of the area as a professional football market. His drive produced the franchise for the Queen City.

Paul and Mike Brown represent the Bengals at all league meetings and they played a major role in bringing about the merger which brought the American Football League and the National Football League together.

Mike did his undergraduate work at Dartmouth where he played quarterback. He received his law degree from Harvard Law School. He was associated with a law firm in Cleveland for five years and then joined his father with the Cleveland Browns.

Mike and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Katie, 15, and a son, Paul, 111/2.



FORREST GREGG **Head Coach**

Forrest Gregg, one of the greatest offensive linemen of alltime, took over the Cincinnati Bengals head coaching reins in 1980 on the heels of two successive 4-12 seasons and immediately put the team back in the right direction. Hall-of-Famer Gregg fielded a

highly-competitive, spirited, hardhitting, well-disciplined team that showed marked improvement while posting a 6-10 record despite a series of injuries to key performers.

Gregg became head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals on Decem-

ber 28, 1979, succeeding Homer Rice. Gregg resigned as head coach of the Toronto Argonauts in the Canadian Football League to take the position with the Bengals.

The 47-year-old Gregg, who was inducted in the Pro Foot-ball Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, in 1977, previously was head coach of the Cleveland Browns. He took over as head coach in Cleveland in 1975 and had a 3-11 record during a rebuilding season.

Forrest was named National Football League Coach of the Year in 1976 when his team posted a 9-5 record and was in the thick of the fight for a playoff berth until the final week of the season

His 1977 Cleveland team won five of its first seven games. Then injuries hit and the Browns dropped six of their last seven. Gregg resigned with one game remaining in 1977.

He was assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers before joining Toronto in 1979 where he compiled a 5-11 record with a young and inexperienced team.

During his distinguished 15-season career in the National Football League, Gregg performed as both a guard and tackle with the Green Bay Packers under Vince Lombardi from 1956 to 1970 and with Dallas in 1971.

During his last two seasons at Green Bay, Gregg served as a player-coach. He also was a player-coach with Dallas' 1971 Super Bowl champion. He was offensive line coach with the San Diego Chargers in 1972 and 1973 before joining the Browns in the same capacity in 1974. Throughout his career, Forrest Gregg was known as one of

the most capable and most unselfish of all players.

Team-minded and versatile, Gregg also proved to be dur-able, playing in a then-record 188 consecutive games from the first game of his rookie 1956 campaign until the first game of the 1971 season, the final one of his career, which he spent with the Dallas Cowboys.

Add to that the summation that Lombardi, the architect of the awesome Green Bay juggernauts of the 1960s, included in his book "Run to Daylight." Lombardi said simply: "Forrest Gregg is the finest player I ever coached!'

With credentials and endorsements like that, it is not surprising that Gregg was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1977, the first time he was eligible following the mandatory five-year retirement period.

Gregg, a native of Birthright, Texas, had already establish-ed himself as a multi-talented, injury-free athlete by the time he joined the Packers. He participated in football, baseball, basketball and track at Sulphur Springs, Texas, high school and then won all-Southwest Conference honors twice as a two-way tackle at SMU. He was captain of the Mustangs in his senior year and a second round draft choice of Green Bay

A broken arm when he was a high school sophomore was the only severe injury Forrest suffered during his career. Once in the NFL, a bruised knee almost kept him out of a game against Detroit in 1965, but he blocked on an extra point attempt to keep his consecutive game streak alive. Forrest stood 6-4 but weighed only 230 pounds when he

Forrest stood 6-4 but weighed only 230 pounds when he reported as a rookie. He quickly realized that, as an offensive right tackle, he would have to learn to finesse the monstrous defensive left ends that would be pouring in on him.

So Gregg learned to recognize and combat the rushing tactics of every defensive lineman he would have to face. During his career, he did battle with the best — Gino Marchetti, Gene Brito and Deacon Jones early in his career and later standouts like Carl Eller and Claude Humphrey.

Following the 1956 campaign, Forrest spent a year in the U.S. Army. When he returned in 1968, the new coach. Lombard, was on hand. As the Packers climbed to the heights under the leadership of the great coach. Gregg, one of the few pre-Lombard players on the team, dramatically improved his stature.

In 1960, the year that Green Bay won its first Western Division championship under Lombardi, Gregg was named all-NFL, the first in a string of eight straight years of all-league acclaim. In 1965, when he changed positions, Forrest not only did not blow his chance for all-league honors, he actually was named at both positions! Associated Press picked him as a guard on its honor team, United Press International as a tackle on its team.

As eager as Forrest was to play football and to do anything asked of him at any time, he actually retired four times before making his fifth retirement finally stick.

He first quit after the 1963 campaign to accept an assistant coaching job at the University of Tennessee. Lombardi couldn't believe that anyone as good as Gregg could consider retirement at the age of 30 so he talked Forrest into coming back.

Gregg started both the 1969 and 1970 seasons as a member of the Packers' coaching staff but injury problems prompted his return to playing action each year. He retired a fourth time before the 1971 season, was released by the Packers, but returned to action with the Dallas Cowboys when Coach Tom Landry issued an SOS for help for an injurydecimated offensive line. Forrest thus became a member of a Super Bowl championship team for a third time. Following Super Bowl VI, he retired for good. Born October 18, 1933, he was 38 at the time.

"I always think of playing in terms of what I am learning," Gregg said during his playing days. "I really feel like I'm going to coach some day. The longer I play, the more I learn."

While Forrest played in nine Pro Bowls, as well as the long string of Packers playoff games, he can't pinpoint any one outstanding thrill.

"The whole thing was a very gratifying experience," he reminisces. "They say you don't get much recognition on the offensive line but there is a lot of satisfaction if you know you're doing your job and the coaches know it. Our backs always knew they didn't make those long runs by themselves."

He also proved that if you play football the Forrest Gregg way, even an offensive lineman can gain ample recognition. His election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame verifies that

As Gregg said on his election to the Hall: "It's awesome when you think that as a player or a coach, your tenure is only temporary. But election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame is permanent. It's something that can never be taken away!"

Forrest and his wife, Barbara, have two children — Forrest Jr., and Karen. Both are students at SMU.

HANK BULLOUGH Defensive Coordinator— Linebackers

Hank Bullough came to the Cincinnati Bengals in 1980 as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach and made his presence felt immediately.

Bullough and head coach Forrest Gregg installed the 34 defense and the Bengals climbed from last in the American Football Conference in overall defense in 1979 to fifth in 1980 and first against the rush.

Bullough, tabbed throughout the league as the "doctor of defense", was assistant head coach and defensive coordinator for the New England Patriots before coming to the Bengals. He compiled an enviable defensive record with the 34 at New England.

The 47-year-old Bullough joined the Patriots in 1973 and coached the defensive line five years and the linebackers two. Prior to going to New England, he was linebacker coach of the Baltimore Colts for three seasons.

Before entering the pro ranks Bullough was defensive coordinator at Michigan State, starting under Dulfy Daugherty in 1959. He was a defensive tackle at Michigan State and played guard for the Green Bay Packers in 1955 and 1958 with two-year military tour of duty in between. Born January 24, 1934, in Scranton, Pa., Hank and his wife,

Born January 24, 1934, in Scranton, Pa., Hank and his wife, Lou Ann, have three children, Cheryl, 18; Shane, 16, and Chuck 12.



BRUCE COSLET Special Teams— Tight Ends

Bruce Coslet, a former Cincinnati Bengal player, was named special teams and tight end coach in January. Coslet came to the Bengals from the

San Francisco 49ers where he worked

with special teams and tight ends in 1979. He played tight end and was an outstanding special teams performer for eight seasons, 1969 through 1976 when he retired.

A graduate of the University of the Pacific, Coslet caught 46 passes for 556 yards and nine touchdowns during his career. He was captain of the special teams for several years. He is the first Bengal to return to the team as a coach.

Bruce and his wife, Kathy, have two children, J.J., 5, and Amy, 4. Bruce was born August 5, 1946.



LINDY INFANTE Receiver— Quarterback Coach

Lindy Infante is beginning his second season as the Cincinnati Bengals receiver-quarterback coach.

In his first season with Cincinnati, Infante did an excellent job developing the passing game despite key injuries.

Infante, who was offensive coordinator at Tulane in 1979, coached the New York Giants' receivers in 1977 and 1978. He joined the Giants from Tulane where he was offensive coordinator during the 1976 season. He returned to the Green Wave in 1979.

The 40-year-old Infante was defensive backfield coach for the Charlotte Hornets of the World Football League in 1975.

Infante played three seasons at the University of Florida as both a running back and defensive back, serving as cocaptain in 1962 after winning All-Southeastern Conference honors in 1961. He played in the Gator Bowl in 1960 and 1962. He was drafted by both Cleveland (NFL) and Buffalo (then AFL) in 1963 and reported to the Bills' training camp. However, he opted for Hamilton of the Canadian Football League where he played the 1963 season as a running back.

Infante started his coaching career at Miami (Fla.) Senior High School and in 1966 moved to the University of Florida as freshman coach and then offensive backfield coach. In 1972, he went to Memphis State as offensive coor-

dinator and assistant head coach.

Born, May 27, 1940, Infante and his wife, Stephanie, have two children. Brett 10, and Brad, 8.



DICK LeBEAU Defensive Backfield

Dick LeBeau joined the Cincinnati Bengals on December 31, 1979, as defensive backfield coach and played a major role in the team's improvement in 1980.

LeBeau's defensive backs quickly became known as a group of hitters. While at Green Bay, LeBeau's defensive backfield was called the SWAT unit because of the ability of its members to hit.

LeBeau joined the Packers in 1976 after serving as Philadelphia's special teams coach for three years following retirement as a player after the 1972 season.

The 43-year-old LeBeau was a fifth round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1959 after an outstanding career at Ohio State as a defensive and offensive back. He was released by Cleveland and signed by Detroit in his rookie year.

He set an alltime durability record for cornerbacks by playing 171 consecutive games during a 14-year career with the Lions. His 62 pass interceptions rank him fifth on profes-sional football's alltime list.

LeBeau starred for Ohio State for three seasons and was a standout performer on the national championship team in 1957. While a pro, he was selected to play in three Pro Bowl games and enjoyed his best statistical season in 1970 when he intercepted nine passes for 96 yards. Born Charles Richard LeBeau on September 9, 1937, in

London, Ohio, he was an All-Ohio High School selection before going to Ohio State.

Dick and his wife, Nancy, have a son, Brandon Grant, 2.



JIM MCNALLY Offensive Line

Young Jim McNally is the Cincinnali Bengals offensive line coach. McNally, 36, came to the Bengals

last season from Wake Forest and immediately began putting together a

cohesive offensive line which cut the number of guarterback sacks from 63 in 1979 to 36 in 1980. His unit was also effective moving the football on the ground as Pete Johnson's four 100 yards plus rushing games will attest.

While in college football, McNally was regarded as one of the country's finest offensive line coaches. He was offensive line coach at Wake Forest in 1979; at Boston College from 1976 to 1978; Marshall University from 1973 to 1975 and the University of Buffalo from 1966 to 1969.

McNally took over a veteran offensive line, spiced it with an outstanding rookie, and saw constant improvement.

He played guard for three seasons at the University of Buffalo where he was All-East before graduating and entering the coaching ranks.

DICK MODZELEWSKI Defensive Line

Dick "Mo" Modzelewski is starting his third season as defensive line coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Mo's defensive line was one of the bright spots in the 1980 campaign. His well to the "34" alignment

group responded well to the "34" alignment. "Mo" came to Cincinnati in February, 1979, from the New York Giants where he had been defensive coordinator. He served as defensive line coach of the Cleveland Browns from 1968 until 1976 and was the club's defensive coordinator in 1977. He was interim head coach of the Browns during the final week of the 1977 season.

"Mo" was an outstanding defensive tackle for the Glants and the Browns during his playing days, He was with the Glants from 1956 through 1963. He was traded to the Browns in 1964 and played three more seasons before retiring in 1966.

An All-Pro several seasons, "Mo" played on six conference champions and two National Football League championship teams — the Giants in 1956 and the Browns in 1964.

He was born February 16, 1931, in West Natrona, Pa. He and his wife, Dorothy, have four children — Mark, Laurie, Terrie and Amie.



GEORGE SEFCIK Offensive Backfield

George Sefcik has been offensive backfield coach of the Cincinnati Bengals since 1978.

Sefcik has been instrumental in the development of all of the current Ben-

gal running backs. His 1979 backs gained more yardage and more touchdowns than any group in Cincinnati history. He came to the Bengals from the Cleveland Browns where

he was offensive backfield coach from 1975 to 1978.

Sefcik is a graduate of Notre Dame where he was a halfback on the 1959-60-61 teams. Following graduation, he became head coach at Niles (III.) High School. He returned to Notre Dame a year later as freshman coach.

The following year when Ara Parseghian became head coach of the Irish, Sefcik was named coach of the receivers. He stayed at Notre Dame until 1969 when he went to the University of Kentucky as offensive coordinator.

He was an offensive coach with the Baltimore Colts in 1973 and 1974 and joined the Browns in 1975. A native of

Cleveland, Sefcik helped bring the state title to Benedictine in 1957 as a halfback. George and his wife, Loretta, have three children.

NEW BENGAL UNIFORM


Working at the request of Cincinnati Bengals' general manager Paul Brown, National Football League Properties' Creative Services developed several different types of emblems for a new Bengals helmet, beginning in fall 1979.

After receiving many ideas, Paul decided that the direction he preferred was to incorporate tiger stripes on the helmet, giving it a unique identity in the NFL.

Bruce Claypool, art director for NFLP Creative Services, designed the helmet, the striping of which was modified a few times by Paul before the final design was accepted in the fall of 1980.

To complement the helmet, it was decided to bring the tiger stripes into the actual uniform and again NFLP Creative Services produced several concepts before one was agreed upon. David Boss and Bruce Claypool collaborated on the design of the uniform and the application of the tiger stripe details.

The Riddell Company is the manufacturer of the helmet, and Russell Southern Athletic is the manufacturer of the uniform.









WILMINGTON COLLEGE TRAINING CAMP

The Cincinnati Bengals "summer home" is Wilmington College in Wilmington, Ohio, where they are holding their training camp for the 14th consecutive year.

The heart of the training camp is housed in Hermann Court —a modern and well-equipped fieldhouse located on the south edge of the campus. The fieldhouse includes an Olympic swimming pool, a Nautilus-equipped training room, handball courts, and two basketball courts. The twice-daily workouts are held on two practice fields and a regulation football field adjacent to the fieldhouse. The team is housed in Clarence E. Pickett Hall, a four-story

The team is housed in Clarence E. Pickett Hall, a four-story dormitory; dining room facilities are located in nearby Pyle Center. As a fan, you are cordially invited to both tour the campus and watch the Bengals in action.

TRAINING CAMP DATES

The Cincinnati Bengals' rookies will report July 19 and work out at Spinney Field in Cincinnati before joining the veterans on July 23 at Wilmington College, Wilmington, Ohio, for the opening of summer training camp. The Bengals will break camp at Wilmington on August 21 and resume practice at Spinney Field in Cincinnati.

A BENGAL REVIEW AND PREVIEW

The Cincinnati Bengals posted a 6-10 season in 1980, and although it wasn't good enough to move up in the standings in the tough AFC Central Division, the team showed marked improvement and hopes for the future are bright. The Bengals responded well to Forrest Gregg, the Hall of

Famer, in his first season as head coach. His stamp was clearly imprinted on a team that was well-disciplined, solidly grounded in fundamentals, competitive and enthusiastic. It never gave up.

Gregg's Bengals came up with a sweep of the Pittsburgh

Steelers and put on a surge at the end of the season to win three of their last four games. The Bengals got off to a tough start in 1980, losing four of the first five games. The losses to Tampa Bay, Miami, Houston and Green Bay were by a total of 14 points. They led Tampa Bay, Miami and Houston going into the fourth quarter. Mistakes were their undoing.

A victory over Pittsburgh, ending an 18-game Steelers home win streak, and a 14-0 shutout of Minnesota, the Vik-ings' first since 1973 (also by Cincinnati at Riverfront Stadium), were high points of the first half of the season.

The Bengals went into a midseason slump when injuries The beingars went mite a midseason shall when humes mounted and the result was a five-game losing streak. Gregg's club snapped the streak with successive victories over Kansas City, Baltimore and Chicago with big Pete Johnson having three 100-yard rushing games. The 27-24 loss to Cleveland in the final game ended with the Bengals on the Browns' 14 yard line as time ran out.

RUNNING GAME:

Johnson and Charles Alexander give the Bengals the sixth-ranked running attack in the AFC. Johnson, one of the best power fullbacks in the NFL, probably would have wound up with 1000 yards instead of 747 if he hadn't missed five games with a knee injury. Alexander, entering his third NFL season, moved to a halfback to team with Johnson and gain d 702 words. When Johnson was sidelined (sease 9 through ed 702 yards. When Johnson was sidelined (games 8 through 12), Archie Griffin filled in and Alexander shifted to fullback, Deacon Turner also saw considerable action. More depth is needed at running back and the Bengals hope it comes from draftee Samoa Samoa, a converted quarterback from Washington State.

PASSING GAME:

The duo of the veteran Ken Anderson and young Jack Thompson give the Bengals two exceptional talents at this position. But problems in this area stem from frequent injuries to Anderson.

Anderson started 12 games last year, but completed only two because of ankle, knee, and sternum injuries. Anderson threw six touchdown passes, Thompson 11 in four starts and frequent relief appearances. The receiving corps is talented, especially with the addition of the top two draft choices, Dave Verser and Cris Collinsworth. Dan Ross, an outstanding tight end, led the team with 56 catches and four touchdowns. Isacc Curtis, always among the league's top recievers, caught 43 for 610 yards and three touchdowns. He teamed with Don Bass, who had 32 catches and six touchdowns, despite missing the last six games due to a knee injury. Pat McInally, the punter, also is a talented receiver. He showed his courage in coming back for a big reception against the Browns after being knocked out on a hard hit. Steve Kreider and Mike Levenseller also show promise. Kreider had five big catches in Cincinnati's 17-14 overtime win over Chicago. Backup tight end M.L. Harris had an excellent season going until being injured.

OFFENSIVE LINE:

The addition of Anthony Munoz, the Bengal's number one draft choice in 1980, strengthens the maturing but still young unit that allowed only 37 quarterback sacks, compared to 63 in 1979. Munoz and Mike Wilson are a pair of massive strongmen at tackle. Glenn Bujnoch, a formidable run blocker, plays next to Munoz on the left side. Max Montoya, a standout pass blocker, is the right guard, backed by veteran Dave Lapham who also plays tackle and center. Blair Bush is a strong center capable of taking on nose tackles in the 3-4 defenses. He also is a talented snapper for punts and placekicks. Blake Moore, a free agent guard from Wooster College in 1980, has made his presence feit and could challenge for a starting job. Rookies include tackle-guard Jim Hannula, a ninth round draft choice.

DEFENSIVE LINE:

Gregg's decision to bring in Hank Bullough as defensive coordinator heralded the end of the Bengals' old 4-3 defense in favor of the 3-4 Bullough used with the New England Patriots. Eddie Edwards led the pass rush with 12 sacks from left end and Ross Browner dropped the quarterback nine times from the right side. Wilson Whitley proved to be a capable nose tackle, backed by Mike White and Rod Horn. Gary Burley provided outside help until he injured an ankle. He's ready again and will be worked at both nose tackle and end. A new addition is veteran Mel Lunsford, who came to Cincinnati in a trade with New England.

LINEBACKERS:

Veteran Glenn Cameron and steady Jim LeClair, the team's top tackler, work at the inside linebacker positions. Bo Harris and Reggie Williams are the outside linebackers with Tom Dinkel also frequently employed as a starter. Howie Kurnick returns after missing last season because of a nonfootball related knee injury. It's a solid group. Newcomers include fourth round draft choice Guy Frazier, Wyoming, and seventh round pick Jeff Schuh, Minnesota.

SECONDARY:

Louis Breeden, coming back from shoulder surgery, led the Bengals with seven interceptions last season. Ray Griffin, also a corner, turned two interceptions into two touchdowns (28 yards against Pittsburgh, 52 against Cleveland). Ken Riley, 33, and in his 13th season, is a fixture at right cornerback, opposite Breeden. Greg Bright, a ninth round draft pick from Morehead State, won the strong safety job in training camp last season. Dick Jauron, knocked out of the lineup last year at midseason with a knee injury, and Bryan Hicks will be back at free safety. New faces here include John Simmons, No. 3 choice from SMU; Bobby Kemp, a No. 8 pick from Cal-Fullerton, and Robert Jackson, No. 11 from Central Michigan.

KICKING:

McInally averaged 40.8 yards punting and put 22 kicks inside the 20. After three disappointments, Gregg found ex-Raider kicker Jim Breech for the last four games. The Bengals signed Tom Birney, who kicked two seasons for the Green Bay Packers, during the off-season. Hannula, the big tackle drafted out of Northern Illinois, will get a look as a punter. Mike O'Connell, a rookie quarterback, punted and placekicked at Ball State.

BENGAL VOICES

Phil Samp is beginning his 14th year as the Cincinnati Bengals' play-by-play announcer. Samp is joined on the "Bengal Network" by Andy Mac-

Samp is joined on the "Bengal Network" by Andy Mac-Williams, well-known sportscaster and WLW executive sports director, who will do the color.

WLW in Cincinnati is the flagship station of the "Bengal Network."

The Bengals' four 1981 preseason games will be telecast over WLW-T in Cincinnati. Zip Rzeppa will do the play-by-play and Weeb Ewbank, former coach of the Baltimore Colts and New York Jets, will do the color.
