

# RIVERFRONT STADIUM

The Bengals' home is Cincinnati's beautiful Riverfront Stadium, located on the banks of the Ohio River.

The stadium, situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway, has a seating capacity of 56,200 for football.

The four-level circular stadium has a diameter of 700 feet

encompassing approximately eight and a half acres.

The Riverfront Stadium features a complete playing surface of Astroturf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will accommodate 4500 autos. Three parking decks plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium. A total of 75 buses and 100 taxi cabs can park on the plaza level. Two four-lane streets run underneath the stadium, adjacent to the parking area. Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages

and cartoons through a computer.

# PAUL BROWN Vice President and General Manager

Paul Brown, a man who has charted the course of professional football along the way to the great prominence it now enjoys, is an owner, vice president and general manger of the Cincinnati Bengals, the team he founded in 1967.

PB, long recognized as a genius among football coaches and administrators, left coaching in 1976 to devote fulltime

to his duties as general manager.

A legend in his own time, Brown wound up a brilliant coaching career at every level of football with 351 victories, only 133 losses and 16 ties for a remarkable .725, the most

distinguished record ever.

As an administrator, Brown built solid organizations in Cleveland and Cincinnati and has played, and continues to play a major role in shaping the NFL. He was one of the leaders in the movement which brought the old American Football League into the NFL and is presently a member of the NFL's competition and planning committees.

His unprecedented success ushered him into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, in 1967. He's also been called upon several times to present his former players

for enshrinement.

Brown founded the Cincinnati Bengals in 1968 and served the dual role of head coach and general manager for eight years. He built the Bengals into a contender in as short a time as possible, guiding the young team to two divisional titles — 1970 and 1973 — in the rugged American Football Conference's Central Division in just six years. His last team won 11 games and lost three and earned another playoff berth while posting the Bengals' best record to date.

His early Cincinnati teams were judged by many as the "best expansion teams" ever produced in professional football, and they produced a number of memorable upsets including a 24-19 victory over Kansas City in 1969. The Chiefs

went on to win the Super Bowl that year.

Perhaps more than any other person, Paul Brown is responsible for making pro football coaching the exacting science it is today. When he organized the Cleveland team in the new All-America Football Conference in 1946, he started doing many things no one else had ever tried.

His success was instantaneous and only when other coaches started copying many of the Brown procedures did

the won-lost records start to level off.

Brown had a background of exceptional success as a high school, college and service coach when he was given his first pro assignment with the new Cleveland team. Immediately, he hired a full-time staff on a year-round basis and he instituted a system for scouting college talent on a scale never before imagined by other pro teams.

In his handling of his team, he became the first to (1) use intelligence tests as a hint to a player's learning potential, (2) use notebooks and classroom techniques extensively, (3) set up complete film clip statistical studies and (4) then grade his own players from what he found. Brown was the first coach to keep his players together at a hotel the night before a home game as well as a road game.

From the strategic standpoint, he started the practice of calling plays from the sideline by utilizing alternating guards as messengers. He developed pass patterns for the offense that were designed to pick holes in the defense, but then he devoted his efforts to perfecting the kind of a defense that could counteract a pattern passing attack. Using his personnel to the limit, he was the first to switch some fine running backs to the defense because "they were so good I didn't want to waste them on offense."

These measures are now common practice, but 34 years ago, they were revolutionary in the coaching world. The results quickly proved the merits of the system for the Browns won all four AAFC titles, compiling a 47-4-3 regular-season record in the process.

Then came the merger of 1950 and the NFL stalwarts eagerly awaited the comeuppance of the Browns when they met the "real pros," the defending champion Philadelphia Eagles, in the 1950 NFL season opener. There were plenty of lessons to be learned that night, but they were all taught by the Browns, who stunned the Eagles, 35-10.

Paul Brown's team won Eastern Division titles its first six seasons in the NFL and added overall NFL titles in 1950, 1954 and 1955. In his first 10 seasons as a head coach, Brown had won a league or division championship every year. No other coach has ever come even close to this record.

In his 17 seasons as the Brown's head man, Paul Brown experienced only one losing season in 1956. Brown left

Cleveland after the 1963 season.

He came back into the picture as head coach and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals, an expansion club in the American Football League, in 1968. Just two seasons later, in 1970, he guided the youthful Bengals to the Central Division championship of the American Football Conference of the expanded NFL

He had not lost the magic that establishes him indelibly

one of pro football's alltime premier coaches. Brown's resume shows two years at Severn Prep School in Maryland; nine years at Massillon high school in Ohio (Brown's hometown); three years at Ohio State University; two years with the successful Great Lakes Navy team during World War II; 17 years with the Cleveland Browns in both the All-American Football Conference and the National Foot-

ball League and eight with Cincinnati.

Among the more significant accomplishments of his teams are a series of Ohio state championships at Massillon which in turn made that school one of America's foremost prep powers, a national collegiate championship at Ohio State in 1942, four straight AAFC championships and seven divisional titles and three NFL championships in 1950, 1954 and 1955 after the Browns had joined the NFL following the breakup of the AAFC. Ironically, it was Brown's overwhelming success
— his Cleveland team had a 52-4-3 record in AAFC play that was probably the major factor in the breakup of that league.

In spite of his statistical record — as great as it is, Brown will be remembered and honored again and again for far more than his record alone. What he will be most honored for is how he went about putting together the teams that

made his record possible!

When he was inducted into the Professional Football Hall of Fame, his citation read in part..."in addition to his great record, Brown is equally respected as a man who brought fine organization to professional football. He was the first to make coaching a year-round occupation, not only for himself, but for a full-time resident coaching staff, a practice that has since become universal.'

After graduating from Massillon High School, Brown enrolled at Ohio State and later transferred to Miami where he

became a fine runner and passer.

He returned to his home in Massillon as football and basketball coach in 1932. The stadium in Massillon now is

known as "Paul Brown Tiger Stadium."

Paul and his wife, Mary, live in Indian Hill. His first wife, Katie, died in April, 1969. Two of his sons, Mike and Pete, are associated with the Bengal organization as assistant general manager and director of player personnel respectively. Another son, Robin, a former Bengal scout, died in July, 1978.



# MIKE BROWN Assistant General Manager Legal Counsel

Mike Brown holds a number of key roles in the operation of the

Cincinnati Bengals.

Mike is the team's assistant general manager, legal counsel and, in addition, he's an owner and a member of the board of directors.

Add all those up and you come up with a man who is dedicated to football and his team, the Bengals. Thanks to the tireless effors of Mike, and his father, Paul, the Bengals are in Cincinnati.

As assistant general manager and legal counsel, Mike handles player contract matters and the Bengals' contracts and negotiations with the City of Cincinnati. He also works closely with television and radio executives involved with the Bengals and handles all the club's legal matters.

The Browns dedicated themselves to bringing professional football to Cincinnati in the mid-60's and saw their efforts rewarded in 1967 when the city was awarded a franchise in the old American Football League which was due to merge

with the National Football League in 1970.

Mike, who has been associated with football all of his life and has had the benefit of the best possible teacher, has caught the attention of NFL owners and executives and is a member of the very active NFL Management Council. This group deals with labor-management decisions within the NFL.

Professional football in Cincinnati was visualized by Mike long before it became a reality. Several years before the Cincinnati franchise materialized he conducted a detailed survey showing the potential of the area as a professional football market. His drive produced the franchise for the Queen City.

Paul and Mike Brown represent the Bengals at all league meetings and they played a major role in bringing about the merger which brought the American Football League and

the National Football league together.

Mike did his undergraduate work at Dartmouth where he played quarterback. He received his law degree from Harvard Law School. He was associated with a law firm in Cleveland for five years and then joined his father with the Cleveland Browns.

Mike and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Katie, 14, and a son, Paul, 101/2.



# JOHN SAWYER President

John Sawyer, a business man who is always on the move, has been president of the Cincinnati Bengals since the franchise was founded in 1968.

Sawyer, along with Paul and Mike Brown, was one of the Bengal

founders and one of the original people in the Bengals' organizational structure. He worked diligently with the Browns in bringing professional football to Cincinnati. He, Paul and Mike represented Cincinnati at the many National Football League meetings held prior to the awarding of the franchise.

He still attends many league meetings with the Browns and played a part in the NFL realignment in 1970.

He has not missed a Bengal game, home or away, since


the team began playing in 1968.

The well-known business executive operates J. Sawyer Co., a multi-faceted agricultural concern which includes aviation firms, an antique shop, art center, restaurant, a line of pop-corn and farms and ranches in Ohio, Mississippi, Wyoming, Montana and Colorado.

He has never lost his love of airplanes and flies his company's Lear jet out of Madison Aviation center, which he built, in London, Ohio, on business trips around the country.

John is a member of a prominent Cincinnati family and he and his wife, Ruth, live in Indian Hill. He is the son of the late Charles Sawyer, former Secretary of Commerce.

The Sawyer's have four daughters, Anne, 25; Elizabeth, 23; Catherine, 20; and Mary, 16.

## FORREST GREGG **Head Coach**

Hall of Famer Forrest Gregg became head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals on December 28, 1979, succeeding Homer Rice.

Gregg resigned as head coach of the Toronto Argonauts in the Canadian Football League to take the position with the Bengals.

The 46-year-old Gregg, who was inducted in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, in 1977, previously was head coach of the Cleveland Browns. He took over as head coach in Cleveland in 1975 and had a 3-11 record during a rebuilding season.

Forrest was named National Football League Coach of Year in 1976 when his team posted a 9-5 record and was in the thick of the fight for a playoff berth until the final

week of the season.

His 1977 Cleveland team won five of its first seven games. Then injuries hit and the Browns dropped six of their last seven. Gregg resigned with one game remaining in 1977.

He was an assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers before joining Toronto last February. He compiled a 5-11 record with a young and inexperienced team last season. During his distinguished 15-season career in the National

Football League, Gregg performed as both a guard and tackle with the Green Bay Packers under Vince Lombardi

from 1956 to 1970 and with Dallas in 1971.

During his last two seasons at Green Bay, Gregg served as a player-coach. He also was a player-coach with Dallas' 1971 Super Bowl champion. He was offensive line coach with the San Diego Chargers in 1972 and 1973 before joining the Browns in the same capacity in 1974.

Throughout his career, Forrest Gregg was known as one of the most capable and most unselfish of all players.

When Forrest joined the Packers in 1956 as a No. 2 draft pick from Southern Methodist, he really wanted to try out for the defensive line. But Lisle Blackbourn, then the Green Bay coach, assigned him to offensive tackle, a position by 1956 NFL standards he was too small to play.

Yet Gregg went right to work, not only developing his physical abilities but spending countless hours watching films particularly of Jim Parker and Roosevelt Brown, con-

sidered to be the elite offensive tackles of their time.

"That's the only way a fellow with a little ability can become a good tackle," Gregg modestly explained, "and that is through hardwork."

A few seasons later, when injuries created a crisis on the Green Bay line, Gregg eagerly moved to guard where he had to learn a completely new set of assignments and where his chances for continued all-league recognition would be impaired.

"Winning the championship will be payment enough," Gregg told an appreciative coach, Vince Lombardi, when

complimented on his willingness to make the move.

Team-minded and versatile, Gregg also proved to be durable, playing in a then-record 188 consecutive games from the first game of his rookie 1956 campaign until the first game of the 1971 season, the final one of his career, which he spent with the Dallas Cowboys.

Add to that the summation that Lombardi, the architect of the awesome Green Bay juggernauts of the 1960s, included in his book "Run to Daylight." Lombardi said simply: "For-

rest Gregg is the finest player I ever coached!"

With credentials and endorsements like that, it is not surprising that Gregg was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1977, the first time he was eligible following the mandatory five-year retirement period.

Gregg, a native of Birthright, Texas, had already established himself as a multi-talented, injury-free athlete by the time he joined the Packers. He participated in football, baseball, basketball and track at Sulphur Springs, Texas, high school and then won all-Southwest Conference honors twice as a two-way tackle at SMU. He was captain of the Mustangs in his senior year.

A broken arm when he was a high school sophomore was the only severe injury Forrest suffered during his career. Once in the NFL, a bruised knee almost kept him out of a game against Detroit in 1965, but he blocked on an extra point attempt to keep his consecutive game streak alive.

Forrest stood 6-4 but weighed only 230 pounds when he reported as a rookie. He quickly realized that, as an offensive right tackle, he would have to learn to finesse the monstrous defensive left ends that would be pouring in on him. For sure, he would never be able to overpower them.

So Gregg learned to recognize and combat the rushing tactics of every defensive lineman he would have to face. During his career, he did battle with the best - Gino Marchetti, Gene Brito and Deacon Jones early in his career and later standouts like Carl Eller and Claude Humphrey.

Following the 1956 campaign, Forrest spent a year in the U.S. Army. When he returned in 1968, the new coach, Lombardi, was on hand. As the Packers' climbed to the heights under the leadership of the great coach, Gregg, one of the few pre-Lombardi players on the team, dramatically improved in stature.

1960, the year that Green Bay won its first Western division championship under Lombardi, Gregg was named all-NFL, the first in a string of eight straight years of allleague acclaim. In 1965, when he changed positions, Forrest not only did not blow his chance for all-league honors, he actually was named at both positions! Associated Press picked him as a guard on its honor team, United Press International as a tackle on its team.

The casual observer might ponder why the move from tackle to guard drew such raves. The truth is that there are many above-average players who could never successfully

make such a switch.

"Most tackles aren't built to play guard because they are not agile and quick enough," Packer line coach Ray Wie-techa explained. "Gregg is comparatively small but he makes up for size with quickness, agility and intelligence.

We had no worries with Gregg at guard."

Basically, the offensive tackle's job is to block the defen-sive end, moving him in or out on running plays and screening him wide away from the passer. The guard, on the other hand, is responsible for the massive defensive tackles on passes and, on running plays, he must pull out of the line, lead the ball carrier and make his blocks in open field.

While Gregg experienced some difficulty as a guard in perfecting his timing for cutting up field and making the open-field blocks, he proved equal to the occasion both in 1961 and 1965. An injury to Kramer forced his first switch in 1961 and multiple injuries to Kramer, Fuzzy Thurston and Stan Wright kept Forrest away from his familiar tackle spot most of the 1965 season.

"Moving to guard meant learning new assignments and new techniques and meeting new opponents," Gregg remembers. "But I welcomed the challenge just to see if I

could do it."

Regardless of where he played, though, opponents always knew they had faced a master. The experience of Philadelphia's pass rush specialist, Joe Robb, in the 1960 NFL title

game is a good example.

'I tried everything against that Gregg," a frustrated Robb admitted after the game. 'I just couldn't get a good rush. He'd be four yards deep, still blocking on me before I could set up. You just can't throw him. He's the greatest tackle I ever taced.'

As eager as Forrest was to play football and to do anything asked of him at any time, he actually retired four times before making his fifth retirement finally stick.

He first quit after the 1963 campaign to accept an assistant coaching job at the University of Tennessee. Lombardi couldn't believe that anyone as good as Gregg could consider retirement at the age of 30 so he talked Forrest into

coming back.

Gregg started both the 1969 and 1970 seasons as a member of the Packers' coaching staff but injury problems prompted his return to playing action each year. He retired Packers, but returned to action with the Dallas Cowboys when Coach Tom Landry issued an SOS for help for an injury-decimated offensive line. Forrest thus became a member of a Super Bowl championship team for a third time. Following Super Bowl VI, he retired for good. Born October 18, 1933, he was 38 at the time.

I always think of playing in terms of what I am learning," Gregg said during his playing days. "I really feel like I'm going to coach some day. The longer I play, the more I

While Forrest played in nine Pro Bowls, as well as the long string of Packers playoff games, he can't pinpoint any

one outstanding thrill.

"The whole thing was a very gratifying experience," he reminisces. "They say you don't get much recognition on the offensive line but there is a lot of satisfaction if you know you're doing your job and the coaches know it. Our backs always knew they didn't make those long runs by themselves."

He also proved that if you play football the Forrest Gregg way, even an offensive lineman can gain ample recognition. His election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame verifies that.

As Gregg said on his election to the Hall: "It's awesome when you think that as a player or a coach, your tenure is only temporary. But election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame is permanent. It's something that can never be taken away!"

Forrest and his wife, Barbara, have two children - Forrest

Jr., and Karen.



## HANK BULLOUGH Defensive Coordinator -Linebackers

Hank Bullough, one of the most highly-respected defensive coaches professional football, became the Cincinnati Bengals' defensive coordinator and linebacker coach January 16,

1980.

Bullough came to the Bengals from the New England Patriots where he was assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. He is the man largely responsible for New England's rock-ribbed "34" defense which is being installed in Cincinnati.

"Hank is very important to us as we put in the "34" defense," said Cincinnati head coach Forrest Gregg. "He's an outstanding coach and very experienced in all phases of defense. His record at New England speaks for itself."

The 46-year-old Bullough joined the Patriots in 1973 and coached the defensive line five years and the linebackers two. Prior to going to New England, he was linebacker coach of the Baltimore Colts for three seasons.

Before entering the pro ranks Bullough was defensive coordinator at Michigan State, starting under Duffy Daugherty in 1959. He was a defensive tackle at Michigan State and played guard for the Green Bay Packers in 1955 and

1958 with two-year military tour of duty in between. Born January 24, 1934, in Scranton, Pa., Hank and his wife, Lou Ann, have three children, Cheryl, 17; Shane, 15,

and Chuck, 11.



# FRANK GANSZ Special Teams — Tight Ends

The Cincinnati Bengals had one of the top special teams units in the National Football League in 1979 and the man responsible for it was Frank Gansz.

The hard-working, effervescent Gansz came to the Bengals from the San Francisco 49ers where he was special

teams coach in 1978.

Besides handling the special teams, Gansz works with the tight ends and played a big role in the outstanding performance of rookie Dan Ross last season.

Prior to working with the 49ers, Gansz coached on the collegiate level with six teams including the three military

service academies - Army, Navy and the Air Force.

He coached at the Air Force Academy (1964-66), Colgate (1968), the Naval Academy (1969-72), Oklahoma State (1973 and 1975), the U.S. Military Academy (1974) and UCLA

(1976-77).

Gansz is a graduate of Navy where he played football from 1957 to 1959 and was a member of the 1958 Cotton Bowl team. He played center, guard and linebacker for the Midshipmen.

After graduating from Annapolis in 1960, Gansz served in the U.S. Air Force as a jet pilot from 1961 to 1966, coaching concurrently at the Air Force Academy the last three years. He was a commercial airline pilot in 1967 and 1968.

Gansz is 41 years old and he and his wife, Barbara, have

a son, Frank Jr., 18, and a daughter, Jennifer, 17,



# LINDY INFANTE Receiver — Quarterback Coach

Lindy Infante, former New York Giants assistant and offensive coordinator at Tulane, is the Cincinnati Bengals new receiver-quarterback coach. Infante joined the Bengal staff on February

26, 1980.

Infante, who was offensive coordinator at Tulane last season, coached the Giants' receivers in 1977 and 1978. He joined the Giants from Tulane where he was offensive coordinator during the 1976 season. He returned to the Green Wave in 1979.

The 39-year-old Infante was offensive coordinator for the Charlotte Hornets of the World Football League in 1975.

Infante played three seasons at the University of Florida as both a running back and defensive back, serving as cocaptain in 1962 after winning All-Southeastern Conference honors in 1961. He played in the Gator Bowl in 1960 and 1962. He was drafted by both Cleveland (NFL) and Buffalo (then AFL) in 1963 and reported to the Bills' training camp. However, he opted for Hamilton of the Canadian Football League where he played the 1963 season as a running back.

Infante started his coaching career as the head coach of Miami (Fla.) Senior High School and in 1966 moved to the University of Florida as freshman coach and then offen-

sive backfield coach.

In 1972, he went to Memphis State as offensive coordinator and assistant head coach.

Born May 27, 1940, Infante and his wife, Stephanie, have two children, Brett, 9, and Brad, 7.



# **DICK LeBEAU** Defensive Backfield Coach

Dick LeBeau, former Ohio State and Detroit Lions star and Green Bay Packer assistant, came to the Cincinnati Bengals as defensive backfield coach on New Year's Eve, 1979.

LeBeau, whose defensive backs at Green Bay were tagged the SWAT unit for their ability to hit, joined the Packers in 1976 after serving as Philadelphia's special teams coach for three years following retirement as a player after the 1972 season.

LeBeau was a fifth round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1959 after an outstanding career at Ohio State as a defensive and offensive back. He was released by Cleve-





#### 1980 BENGAL OUTLOOK

Forrest Gregg, an all-pro tackle eight times and a star on two Green Bay Super Bowl champions, has been entrusted with the job of putting the Bengals in the right direction after back-to-back 4-12 seasons.

The last time the Bengals were in the playoffs was in 1975 when Paul Brown led them to an 11-3 record, the finest mark

in their history.

Gregg brought in (former Green Bay teammate) Hank Bullough from New England as defensive coordinator and added Dick LeBeau, Lindy Infante and Jim McNally while retaining Dick Modzelewski, George Sefcik and Frank Gansz from the 1979 staff.

After losing their first six games in 1979, the Bengals staged a major upset by whipping the world champion Steelers, 34-10, recovering seven of nine Pittsburgh fumbles

and intercepting Terry Bradshaw twice.

They also surprised the playoff-bound Eagles 37-13 and snuffed out the Browns' last playoff hopes with a closing 16-12 victory. A 4-4 record at home was satisfactory, but an

0-8 mark on the road wasn't.

The 1980 schedule brings Buffalo, Baltimore, San Diego, Minnesota, and Tampa Bay to Riverfront Stadium in addition to home-and-home tests with the Browns, Steelers, and Oilers in the AFC Central. Other games are with Miami,

Kansas City, Oakland, Chicago, and Green Bay.

Both fullback Pete Johnson (865 yards) and halfback Archie Griffin (688) had their best pro seasons in a replay of their old Ohio State form as the Bengals rated fourth in the AFC in rushing. Charles Alexander, one of two first round draft choices, gained 286 yards in limited action. The club's fourth best rusher was quarterback Ken Anderson (235), who threw 16 touchdown passes and ten interceptions, finishing third in the AFC despite missing the equivalent of four games due to back and thumb injuries.

Jack Thompson, Cincinnati's top draft pick, started one game when Anderson was hurt and came off the bench

frequently, showing promise for the future.

Versatile Don Bass moved from tight end to wide receiver and set a club record with 58 catches. Rookie Dan Ross, his replacement at tight end, had 41 receptions. Isaac Curtis, the leader in the past, made his 32 catches good for 605 yards and eight touchdowns.

Gregg is installing the 3-4 defensive alignment and will have a solid corps of veterans and many eager rookies avail-

able to fill the positions.

Gregg feels he has a good nucleus of veteran talent and is very impressed with the players the Bengals selected in the 1980 draft.

"I like the players we have taken in the draft," says Gregg. "I think we've got some good football players and guys who are not afraid to hit. They're my kind of players."
