RIVERFRONT STADIUM

The Bengals' home is Cincinnati's beautiful Riverfront Stadium, located on the banks of the Ohio River.

The stadium, situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway, has a seating capacity of 56,200 for football.

The four-level circular stadium has a diameter of 700 feet encompassing approximately eight and a half acres.

The Riverfront Stadium features a complete playing surface of Astroturf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will accommodate 4500 autos. Three parking decks plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium. A total of 75 buses and 100 taxi cabs park on the plaza level. Two fourlane streets run underneath the stadium, adjacent to the parking area. Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages

and cartoons through a computer.

The NFL will have two new wrinkles in 1978. First, it will increase its regular season schedule from 14 to 16 games and reduce its preseason schedule from six to four games. Secondly, an additional Wild Card team in each conference will enter the payoff format at the end of the season.



PAUL BROWN Vice President and General Manager

Paul Brown is a legend in his own time who prefers to look forward instead of back.

Brown, who is the winningest coach in football history, is part owner, vice president and general manager of the Cincinnati Bengals, the team he founded in 1967. He became the club's first fulltime general manager on January 1, 1976, after serving the dual role of head coach and GM for eight years.

In his 41 seasons of coaching with the Bengals, the Cleveland Browns, Great Lakes Naval Training Center, Ohio State, Massillon High School and Severn Prep, his teams won 351 games against 134 losses and 16 ties, the most distinguished

record in the game's history.

Brown has built the Bengals into a solid organization both on and off the field and has played a major role in shaping the National Football League and charting its course. He was one of the most influential leaders in the movement which brought the old American Football League into the NFL. He is presently a member of the NFL's competition and planning committees.

The Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, tapped PB for enshrinement in 1967. He has been called upon many times to present former players and coaches for enshrine-

This year he will present Weeb Ewbank, one of his assistants at Cleveland who went on to become head coach of

the Baltimore Colts and New York Jets.

Brown made the Bengals a contender quicker than any expansion team on record. By their third season Brown's Baby Bengals were in the NFL Playoffs as the American Football Conference Central Division winner. They also qualified as a wild card team in 1975 and again in 1976 with an

11-3 record, best in the franchise's 10-year history.
His early Cincinnati teams were judged by many as the "best expansion teams" ever produced in professional football, and they produced a number of notable upsets including a 24-19 victory over Kansas City in 1969. The Chiefs went on to win the Super Bowl that year.

The quiet, thoughtful coach has built champions on all

levels.

Brown made Massillon a name known to football fans throughout the country as he won one Ohio high school championship after another while achieving an 80-8-2 mark in his nine years there.

He left Massillon in 1941 and became head coach at Ohio State University fulfilling a lifetime ambition at that time. He guided the Buckeyes to a 6-1-1 season in 1941 and brought them a Big 10 and national championships a year later with a

9-1 record.

Then came World War II and in 1943 Brown went into the Navy as an officer and was assigned to Great Lakes where he became athletic director and head coach. He produced two outstanding teams which conquered many of the top college teams of that day.

After the war he organized the Cleveland Browns and with it the biggest dynasty in the history of professional football.

In four years with Otto Graham at quarterback, the Browns won four All-American Conference titles with an overall 52-4-3 record to completely dominate the league. The Browns were then absorbed by the NFL and they went on to win eight divisional, seven in a row, and three NFL championships.

His record at Cleveland was 115-49-6 and only once dur-

ing his tenure did the Browns have a losing season.

Brown, a classic example of a man ahead of his time, is a great innovator and introduced a scientific approach to coaching. With his success, his theories of organization were soon copied by other NFL teams.

Football became a fulltime business with a fulltime coaching staff when he began building the Browns in 1946. He

ing staff when he began building the Browns in 1946. He hired assistants on a year-round basis and scouted college personnel on a scale never before imagined.

Many of his techniques are now accepted as standard but

were unknown before he introduced them.

Among these are notebooks and classrooms, film scouting, grading players from film study, specific pass patterns, face bars on helmets and lodging the team at a hotel on the night before home games.

Brown also brought intelligence tests for players as a clue to a player's learning ability, using messenger guards to bring in the next play from the sidelines, and switching college offensive players to defense.

After graduating from Massillon High School, Brown enrolled at Ohio State and later transferred to Miami where he

became a fine runner and passer.

His coaching career began in 1930 at Maryland's Severn Prep, a Naval Academy preparatory school. In two years his teams rolled up a record of 16 wins, one loss and a tie.

Massillon recently renamed its football stadium "Paul Brown Tiger Stadium" in honor of the city's favorite son.

Paul and his wife, Mary, live in Indian Hill. His first wife, Katie, died in April, 1969. Two of his sons, Mike and Pete, are associated with the Bengal organization as assistant general manager and director of player personnel respectively. Another son, Robin, is a business executive and also scouts for the Bengals.

BILL JOHNSON **Head Coach**

Bill "Tiger" Johnson, a football man respected by all, has compiled an impressive 18-10 record in his first two seasons as head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

The 52-year-old Johnson has molded contenders in his first two seasons at the Cincinnati helm and has had his team in the thick of the American Football Conference's Central Division chase right down to the final wire in 1976 and 1977.

In 1976, Johnson's first year as head coach, the Bengals put together a 10-4 record which was good enough to tie the Steelers for first place in the AFC Central. Pittsburgh, however, got the play-off berth by virtue of beating Cincinnati twice in head-to-head competition.

Last season, Johnson kept his injury-plagued team in contention until the final Sunday when Pittsburgh again

slipped in as the AFC Central playoff representative.

Football has been Johnson's life. He is entering his 32nd season in the National Football League - nine as a player and 23 as a coach.

"Tiger" was named to his first head coaching job on January 1, 1976, when Paul Brown moved from the sidelines to the front office to devote fulltime to his duties of general manager of the Bengals.

Johnson's appointment was not a surprise. He was offensive line coach and Brown's right-hand man for eight seasons. He's a stickler for details who doesn't put up with mental mistakes, and a disciplinarian who has the respect of his players. He's a player-oriented coach with a great sense of humor.

"Tiger's" coaching philosophy is simple: "Hard work pro-

duces results, and everyone must get a square deal.

"I'm not really an emotional type," says Johnson, who was instrumental in developing the Cincinnati offensive line which protected quarterback Ken Anderson on his way to back-to-back NFL passing championships

But I do like to get at it," he adds quickly.

"I believe in basic, sound football," Johnson continues.
"Tiger" says this about his sport: "Football is a Spartanlike game. It takes a helluva man to play it and a great man to stand up to it."

Johnson, who is much like Brown in many respects, is painstakingly careful about little details which can "often win or lose a football game.

Johnson says his ambition to become a coach came after

my fourth or fifth year with the 49ers.

"I think the decision was made when I realized I was going to play football for a number of years. I wanted to stay with the game because I enjoyed the camaraderie and things going on around the game," Johnson said.

Camaradarie gave Johnson his nickname of "Tiger." When Johnson was a rookie with the 49ers in 1946, he broke his wrist and was out of the lineup for weeks. He became impatient and was the subject of much kidding from the veterans.

One day fullback Norm Standlee, asked Johnson, "When

are you coming out of that cast?

"Pretty soon," out like a tiger." ' Johnson said. "And when I do I'm coming

Johnson smiles when he is asked about the story. "Yeah, it's true," he says. "Not very glamorous, it is?

Johnson was an outstanding college football player for Texas A&M and Tyler Junior College in a career that was

interrupted by a hitch in the Navy.

He was captain of the 1946 Tyler team which was the Junior College national champion and winner of the Little Rose Bowl. "Tiger" is a graduate of Stephen F. Austin College.

Johnson was drafted by the San Francisco 49ers of the old All American Football Conference and this is where he crossed paths with Paul Brown for the first time. Brown, of

course, was then coach of the Cleveland Browns.

Bill quickly became an all-pro center and moved with the 49ers into the NFL in 1950 and continued playing until 1955 when he retired and entered the coaching ranks as offensive line coach for the team with which he played his entire career. He was a 49er player for nine years and coach for 11.

Johnson played with some of the greats of the NFL. His teammates included such performers as Y. A. Tittle, Norm Standless, Hugh McElhenny, Joe Perry, John Henry Johnson,

Leo Nomellini, Gordy Soltau and Bob St. Clair.

Johnson's outstanding career as a center won him a spot on the Helms Foundation Alltime All-Pro team.

After leaving the playing ranks Johnson served as an assistant coach under Frankie Albert, Red Hickey and Jack Christiansen before coming to Cincinnati in 1968 when the Bengals joined the old American Football League as an expansion team.

Tittle, a Hall of Famer and one of professional football's alltime great quarterbacks, grew up with Johnson in east Texas and they played football against each other many

times in high school.

Following graduation from high school, Tittle went to LSU and Johnson to Texas A&M, but they were reunited later with the San Francisco 49ers.

"He was a helluva coach," recalled Tittle. "He used to come in the locker room when things weren't going right and throw a chair across the room. But when it was over it was over. He never carried a grudge in his life. He's the hardest working guy I've ever met - determined, fair and honest. What more can you ask from a man?'

John Brodie, former 49er quarterback and now television analyst, has this to say about Johnson. "He has a great football mind. He taught me more about the offensive phase of

football than anyone I've ever been associated with.

Bill was born July 14, 1926 in Tyler, Texas. He and his wife, Dot, have three children — Bill Jr., 28; Sherilyn, 27, and Tommy, 19.



HOWARD BRINKER **Defensive Coordinator** Linebackers

Howard Brinker, a veteran of 27 years of coaching in the National Football League, is the Bengals' defensive coordinator and linebacker coach.

One of the top defensive strategists in football, Brinker rejoined Paul Brown following the 1973 season when he left the Cleveland Browns after 22 years to become the Bengals' linebacker coach.

Brinker, an outstanding teacher and organizer who has an extensive knowledge of the game, took charge of the overall

defense in 1975.

He has put together a rugged defense for the Bengals and has played a big part in the development of linebackers Jim LeClair, Bo Harris, Reggie Williams, Glenn Cameron and the blossoming Ray Phillips.

A graduate of Massillon High School, Brinker played on

Brown's first team there. After finishing college at Miami of Ohio, he began coaching on the junior high school level in

Massillon in 1939.

His first head coaching job was at Steubenville, Ohio, High School where he served in 1941 and 1942. He then went into the military service and returned to Steubenville in 1945 for three more seasons before going to Ohio U. as line coach in 1949.

Paul Brown brought Brinker to Cleveland as chief scout and assistant coach in 1952. He became defensive coordina-

tor in 1954.

Howard, who was born in Canal Fulton, Ohio, on March 31, 1914, has a masters' degree in physical education from Ohio State University. He and his wife, Mary, have two sons -David, 24 and William, 21.



BOYD DOWLER Receivers

Former Green Bay Packer great Boyd Dowler is in charge of the Bengals' receiving corps.

Dowler, an all-pro wide receiver dur-

ing his playing days with the Packers, came to Cincinnati in 1976 from the Philadelphia Eagles where he had been pass coordinator since 1973.

With the Bengals he has put together a strong group of receivers that includes Isaac Curtis, Billy Brooks, John Mc-Daniel and Pat McInally.

Dowler was an assistant coach for the Los Angeles Rams in 1970 and the Washington Redskins in 1971 and 1972. He

was a player coach for the Redskins in 1971.

During his brilliant playing career, Dowler played on five title-winning Green Bay teams — three NFL champions and two Super Bowl winners. He was inducted into the Packer Hall of Fame this year.
Boyd was with the Packers from 1959 to 1969 and had 474

receptions, 40 for touchdowns, during his pro career.

He was a quarterback and a wide receiver at Colorado and

was drafted in the third round by Green Bay in 1959.

Boyd was born October 19, 1937. He and his wife, Patricia, have two children - Kristen, 15 and Brian, 8.



MIKE McCORMACK Offensive Line

Mike McCormack is beginning his third season as offensive line coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Former head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles, McCormack joined the

Bengals on January 1, 1976, the day Paul Brown resigned as head coach and became fulltime general manager and Bill Johnson was elevated to the head coaching job.

McCormack succeeded Johnson as Cincinnati's offensive

line coach.

The knowledgeable and likeable McCormack was head coach of the Eagles in 1973, 1974 and 1975. Prior to that he was the offensive line coach of the Washington Redskins from 1966 through 1972.

McCormack's association with Paul Brown goes back to his playing days with the Cleveland Browns. He played for Brown from 1954-62 and achieved all-pro status as a guard. He also played for the New York Yankees and the Baltimore Colts. He was named to the Pro Bowl squad four times.

Mike was drafted in the first round by the New York Yan-

kees in 1951 after completing a brilliant college career at the University of Kansas where he was an All-American. He played in the College All-Star game and was captain of the

West squad in the East-West Shrine game in 1951.

He was born June 21, 1930, and he and his wife, Ann, have four children - Michael, 19; Timothy, 18; Molly, 16, and Colleen, 12.



HOMER RICE Quarterbacks

Homer Rice, former head coach at the University of Cincinnati and Rice University, joined the Cincinnati Bengals' staff in April, 1978.

Rice has a vast football background and has developed several top-ranked college quarterbacks including former Bengal Greg Cook, the Vikings' Tommy Kramer and Rick Norton, formerly of the Miami Dolphins. He coached Cook at Cincinnati, Kramer at Rice and Norton at Kentucky and had number one ranked passing teams.

A native of Ft. Thomas, Ky., Homer was athletic director and head coach at Rice from 1976 until 1978. He was athletic director at North Carolina from 1969-75; head coach at UC in 1967 and 1968; assistant at Oklahoma in 1966, and

at Kentucky from 1962 through 1965.

In 11 years as a high school coach, Rice won 101 games, lost only nine, tied seven and at one point won 50 in a row.

He was Little All-American quarterback at Centre College where he received his degree. He also holds a masters' degree from Eastern Kentucky University. He has written three books on football.

Homer was born February 20, 1927. He and his wife, Phyllis, have three daughters - Angela, 22, Phyllis, 25, and Nancy, 27.



GEORGE SEFCIK Offensive Backfield

George Sefcik joined the Cincinnati Bengals as offensive backfield coach in January, 1978.

The 38-year-old Sefcik came to Cincinnati after coaching the offensive

backfield at Cleveland for three seasons where he was instrumental in the progress of running backs Greg Pruitt and Cleo Miller who both averaged 4.6 per carry last year.

Sefcik is a graduate of Notre Dame where he was a halfback on the 1959-60-61 teams. Following graduation, he became head coach at Niles (III.) High School. He returned to

Notre Dame a year later as freshman coach.

The following year when Ara Parseghian became head coach of the Irish, Sefcik was named coach of the receivers. He stayed at Notre Dame until 1969 when he went to the Uni-

versity of Kentucky as offensive coordinator.

He was an offensive coach with the Baltimore Colts in 1973 and 1974 and joined the Browns in 1975. A native of Cleveland, Sefcik helped bring the state title to Benedictine in 1957 as a halfback.

George and his wife, Loretta, have three children.



CHUCK STUDLEY Defensive Line

The Bengals' defensive line is in the capable hands of Chuck Studley who is entering his 10th season with the club.

Studley, a stickler for conditioning, has put together a quick and exciting defensive line.

He has been instrumental in the development of Gary Burley, Eddie Edwards and Wilson Whitley, three of the top young defensive linemen in the NFL. His latest addition is Ross Browner, the All-American from Notre Dame, who was the Bengals' top draft choice in 1978.


Studley has been a successful coach on all levels. He won two Missouri Valley Conference championships while coaching at the University of Cincinnati from 1961 until 1966 and coached the University of Massachusetts to the Yankee Conference title in 1960.

Before moving into college coaching, Chuck was very successful at Alton High School in Illinois for three years. Prior to that he was an assistant coach at Illinois for five

years.

An All-American guard at Illinois, Studley was captain of the 1951 Illinois Rose Bowl team that won the Big 10 with a 9-0-1 record. He played for the Illini for three years.

CHARLEY WINNER Defensive Backfield

Charley Winner, former head coach of the St. Louis Cardinals and the New York Jets, is in his third season as the Bengals' defensive backfield coach. In his first year with the Bengals,

Winner's defensive backfield was ranked number one against

the pass in the American Football Conference.

Charley compiled a 35-30 record with the Cardinals from 1966 through 1970. He was an assistant coach with the Washington Redskins and George Allen in 1971 and 1972 and joined the Jets in 1973 in a similar capacity.

He was named head coach of the Jets in 1974 and lifted the club to a 7-7 record. He left the Jets midway through the

1975 season.

The experienced Winner also was an assistant coach with the Baltimore Colts for 12 years, working for Weeb Ewbank and Don Shula, and prior to that an aide at Washington University of St. Louis and at Case Institute of Technology in Cleveland.

Charley is a graduate of Washington University and holds a masters degree from Washington University of St. Louis. He and his wife, Nancy, have two daughters — Cinda, 25 and

Lisa, 21 and live in Montgomery, Ohio.



KIM WOOD Strength Coach

Kim Wood is beginning his fourth season as the Cincinnati Bengals' strength coach.

The 33-year-old Wood, who has been one of the leaders in the Nautilus

program, became the club's first fulltime strength coach in 1975. He has put all Bengal players on a year-round training program.

Kim has been closely associated with Nautilus training since its inception. He is a dedicated and tireless worker and has made the Bengals one of the league's best conditioned

teams.

Wood has set up strength programs for a number of National Football League teams and many major colleges.

Kim was an outstanding running back at the University of Wisconsin. His wife's name is Connie. He was born July 12, 1945, and his hometown is Barrington, III.



MARVIN POLLINS Trainer

The Bengals' chief trainer is Marvin Pollins who joined Paul Brown when the franchise was formed in 1968.

Pollins had been a trainer at Northwestern University for two years and Miami of Ohio for five years before

joining the Bengals' staff.



TOM GRAY Equipment Manager

Tom Gray, who was associated with Paul Brown in Cleveland for many years is the Bengals' equipment manager.

Gray, a native of Ravenna, Ohio, aided in the team's initial purchase of

equipment and operates the club's equipment room at Wilmington College and Spinney Field, the Bengals practice facility in Cincinnati.

JOHN SAWYER President

John Sawyer is president and one of the owners of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Sawyer has been a key fig-

ure in the Bengals' franchise from the very beginning, combining with Paul and Mike

Brown to bring professional football to Cincinnati.

Sawyer, along with the Browns, represented the Cincinnati group at the many league meetings held prior to the awarding of the franchise.

The business executive also played a part in the realignment of professional football, participating in all the National Football League owners' meetings with Paul and Mike Brown.

Sawyer, a member of a prominent Cincinnati family and now a resident of Cincinnati, is a frequent visitor to the Bengals' training camp and attends every game, home and away.

He is president of J. Sawyer Co. which has farms and ranches in Ohio, Mississippi, Florida, Montana, Colorado and Wyoming. He is the son of Charles Sawyer, former Secretary of Commerce.

John and his wife, Ruth have four daughters, Anne, 23, Elizabeth, 21, Catherine, 18, and Mary, 14.



MIKE BROWN Assistant General Manager — Legal Counsel

Michael Brown ably holds the dual positions of assistant general manager and legal counsel of the Cincinnati Bengals.

He has held these posi-

tions since the franchise was formed in 1967.

Mike teamed with his father, Paul, to bring professional football to Cincinnati. He has been associated with football all of his life and has had the benefit of the best possible teacher.

A tireless worker, his efforts have won the attention of owners and executives throughout the National Football League. He is a member of the prestigious NFL Management Council which deals with labor-management decisions.

Professional football in Cincinnati was visualized by Mike long before it became a reality. Several years before the Cincinnati franchise materialized he conducted a detailed survey showing the potential of the area as a professional football market. His drive and untiring efforts produced the franchise for the Queen City.

Paul and Mike Brown represent the Bengals at all league meetings and they played a major role in bringing about the merger which brought American Football League and the

National Football league together.

As assistant general manager, Mike handles player contract matters and negotiations with the City of Cincinnati concerning the Bengals and Riverfront Stadium. He also works closely with television and radio sponsors, handles all the club's legal matters, and is a member of the Bengals' board of directors.

Mike did his undergraduate work at Dartmouth and received his law degree from Harvard.

He worked in the Cleveland Browns' front office many years and also was associated with a Cleveland law firm.





WILMINGTON COLLEGE TRAINING CAMP

The Cincinnati Bengals "summer home" is Wilmington College in Wilmington, Ohio, where they are holding their train-

ing camp for the eleventh consecutive year.

The heart of the training camp is housed in Hermann Court—a modern and well-equipped fieldhouse located on the south edge of the campus. The fieldhouse includes an Olympic swimming pool, a Nautilus-equipped training room, handball courts, and two basketball courts. The twice-daily workouts are held on two practice fields and a regulation football field adjacent to the fieldhouse.

The team is housed in Clarence E. Pickett Hall, a four-story dormitory; dining room facilities are located in nearby Pyle Center. As a fan, you are cordially invited to both tour the

campus and watch the Bengals in action.

BENGALS 1977 REVIEW

The Bengals recovered from a slow start, in which they lost four of their first six games, with a two-game winning streak, including an overtime victory over the Oilers and a decision over their interstate rivals from Cleveland. The success ended in Minnesota with a 42-10 defeat.

At 4-5 with five games remaining, the Bengals stunned Miami on a spectacular triple reverse flea-flicker, beat the Giants and Kansas City, and won a "big game" from the

Steelers, 17-10.

After gaining 413 yards and forcing five turnovers by the Steelers, the Bengals were on the threshold of a division title. A victory in the final game at Houston would have done it, but the Oilers' Billy Johnson put on a 263-yard show and the Cincinnati playoff hopes disappeared in a 21-16 loss.

The first Pittsburgh game, October 17, on Monday night television, turned into a rugged affair in which quarterback Ken Anderson suffered a thigh injury. He tried to play hurt the next week in a 24-13 defeat at Denver and came off the bench a week after in relief in the overtime victory in the first game with the Oilers, won on Chris Bahr's 22-yard field goal.

The Bengals finished 8-6, a game behind the division-win-

ning Steelers.

Anderson completed 166 of 323 passes for 2154 yards and

11 touchdowns. He was intercepted 11 times.

Billy Brooks led the receivers with 39 receptions for 772 yards and four touchdowns. His 19.8 average per catch was tops in the AFC.

Rookie Pete Johnson was Cincinnati's top rusher, picking up 585 yards on 153 carries. He was followed by another Ohio State product, Archie Griffin, who gained 549 yards on 138 attempts.

Pat McInally averaged 41.8 yards per kick and had a net punting average of 37.4, best in the National Football League. Chris Bahr made 19 of 27 field goal tries and led the club

in scoring with 82 points.
