RIVERFRONT STADIUM

The Bengals' home is Cincinnati's beautiful Riverfront Stadium, located on the banks of the Ohio River.

The stadium, situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway, has a seating capacity of 56,200 for football.

The four-level circular stadium has a diameter of 700 feet encompassing approximately eight and a half acres.

The Riverfront Stadium features a complete playing surface of AstroTurf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will accommodate 4500 autos. Three parking decks plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium. A total of 75 buses and 100 taxi cabs park on the plaza level. Two four-lane streets run underneath the stadium, adjacent to the parking area. Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages and cartoons through a computer.

PAUL BROWN
Vice President
and
General Manager

Paul E. Brown, the Cincinnati Bengals' vice president, general manager and part-owner, has been a guiding light in professional football for more than 30 years.

Brown, long recognized as a genius among football coaches and administrators, left coaching in 1976 to devote fulltime to his duties as general manager.

A legend in his own time, Brown wound up a brilliant coaching career with 351 victories, only 133 losses and 16 ties for a remarkable .725, the most distinguished record ever.

As an administrator, Brown built solid organizations in Cleveland and Cincinnati and has played a major role in shaping the NFL and charting its course. He was one of the leaders in the movement which brought the old American Football League into the NFL and is presently a member of the NFL's competition and planning committees.

His unprecedented success ushered him into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, in 1967. He's also been called upon several times to present his former players for enshrinement.

Brown founded the Cincinnati Bengals in 1968 and served the dual role of head coach and general manager for eight years. He built the Bengals into a contender in as short a time as possible, guiding the young team to two divisional titles — 1970 and 1973 — in the rugged American Football Conference's Central Division in just six years. His last team won 11 games and lost 3 and earned another playoff berth while posting the Bengals' best record to date.

His early Cincinnati teams were judged by many as the "best expansion teams" ever produced in professional football, and they produced a number of notable upsets including a 24-19 victory over Kansas City in 1969. The Chiefs went on to win the Super Bowl that year.

The quiet, thoughtful coach has built champions on all levels. He put together dynasties at Massillon High School, Ohio State University, Great Lakes Naval Training Center and with the Browns in Cleveland.

Brown made Massillon a name known to football fans throughout the country as he won one Ohio high school championship after another while achieving an 80-8-2 mark in his nine years there.

He left Massillon in 1941 and became head coach at Ohio State University fulfilling a lifetime ambition at that time. He guided the Buckeyes to a 6-1-1 season in 1941 and brought them a Big 10 and national championships a year later with a 9-1 record.

Then came World War II and in 1943 Brown went into the Navy as an officer and was assigned to Great Lakes where he became athletic director and head coach. He produced two outstanding teams which conquered many of the top college teams of that day.

After World War II, Brown embarked on a journey which would make him the most successful coach in professional football.

Brown and Art McBride formed the Cleveland Browns in the old All-American Football Conference in 1946. The Browns dominated the AAFC, winning four successive championships with 52 victories, four losses and three ties before moving into the National Football League.

The Browns' domination continued as PB's teams won three NFL titles and eight Conference championships in 13 years. His Cleveland coaching record was 115-49-6, and only once during his tenure did the Browns have a losing season.

The list of his former players and coaches who have gone on to distinguished professional careers goes on and on.

Brown's quick mind and dedication helped him achieve lofty success but, perhaps, even more noteworthy is the scientific approach he introduced to the game. Many of his innovations seem so standard today that it's difficult to believe there was a time when the game was played without them.

He was the classic example of a man ahead of his time.

He made pro football a science, a full-time business with a full-time staff when he began building the Cleveland Browns in 1946. He hired full-time assistants on a year-round basis and scouted college talent on a scale never before imagined by other professional teams.

His innovations include:

- First to employ a year-round coaching staff.
- First to use notebooks and classroom techniques extensively.
- First to set up complete film clip statistical study.
- First to grade players from individual film clips.
- First to keep players together at a downtown hotel the night before home games as well as on the road.
- First to call plays from sidelines by rotating guards as messengers.
- Developed detailed pass patterns which opened specific defense areas.
- Made major contributions to improve science of defensive play to counteract pattern passing by others who followed his lead.
- First to switch some fine running backs to defensive specialists and explained "they were so good, I didn't want to waste them on offense."
- Invented face bars on helmets.
- First to use intelligence tests as a clue to player's learning potential.

After graduating from Massillon High School, Brown enrolled at Ohio State and later transferred to Miami where he became a fine runner and passer.

His coaching career began in 1930 at Maryland's Severn Prep, a Naval Academy preparatory school. In two years his teams rolled up a record of 16 wins, one loss and a tie.

Paul and his wife, Mary, live in Indian Hill. His first wife, Katie, died in April, 1969. Two of his sons, Mike and Pete, are associated with the Bengal organization as assistant general manager and director of player personnel respectively. Another son, Robin, is a business executive and also scouts for the Bengals.



BILL JOHNSON
Head Coach

"Football is a Spartan-like game. It takes a helluva man to play it and a great man to stand up to it."

Those are the words of Bill "Tiger" Johnson, the Cincinnati Bengals' head coach, who has earned the respect of everyone in professional football.

Bill was named to his first head coaching job in 1976 when the legendary Paul Brown moved from the sidelines to the front office to devote fulltime to his duties as vice president and general manager of the Bengals.

Johnson responded with an excellent 10-4 season and his team narrowly missed a spot in the NFL playoffs. Actually, the Bengals and Steelers tied for first place in the rugged American Football Conference Central Division but Pittsburgh got the playoff berth by virtue of beating Cincinnati twice in head-to-head competition.

"It was a good season and we had a nice record but it was still a disappointment because we didn't get into the playoffs," said Johnson who is in his 31st year in professional football — nine as a player and 22 as a coach.

The 51-year-old Johnson was offensive line coach and Brown's right-hand man for eight seasons. He's a stickler for details who doesn't put up with mental mistakes, and a disciplinarian who has the respect of his players. He's a player-oriented coach with a great sense of humor and loves to tell stories of the old days in pro football.

"Tiger's" coaching philosophy is simple: "Hard work produces results, and everyone must get a square deal," emphasizes the Bengal coach.

"I'm not really an emotional type," says Johnson, who was instrumental in developing the Cincinnati offensive line which protected quarterback Ken Anderson on his way to back-to-back NFL passing championships.

"But I do like to get at it," he adds quickly.

"I believe in basic, sound football," Johnson continues.

Johnson, who is much like Brown in many respects, is painstakingly careful about little details which can "often win or lose a football game."

He says his first year as a head coach was about what he expected although he admits "as an assistant you could perhaps rationalize and say this didn't happen because this guy didn't do his job. But as a head coach you can't do that. You're in charge of everything."

Johnson says his ambition to become a coach came after my fourth or fifth year with the 49ers.

"I think the decision was made when I realized I was going to play football for a number of years. I wanted to stay with the game because I enjoyed the camaraderie and things going on around the game," Johnson said.

Camaraderie gave Johnson his nickname of "Tiger." When Johnson was a rookie with the 49ers in 1946, he broke his wrist and was out of the lineup for weeks. He became impatient and was the subject of much kidding from the veterans.

One day fullback Norm Standlee, asked Johnson, "When are you coming out of that cast?"

"Pretty soon," Johnson said. "And when I do I'm coming out like a tiger."

Johnson smiles when he is asked about the story. "Yeah, it's true," he says. "Not very glamorous, is it?"

Hall of Famer Y. A. Tittle grew up with Bill Johnson in east Texas and they played football against each other many times in high school. After high school, Tittle went to LSU and Johnson went to Texas A & M. However, they were reunited later with the San Francisco 49ers where Johnson was a player for nine seasons and a coach for 11 years.

"He was a helluva coach," recalled Tittle. "He used to come in the locker room when things weren't going right and throw a chair across the room. But when it was over it was over. He never carried a grudge in his life. He's the hardest working guy I've ever met — determined, fair and honest. What more can you ask from a man?"

John Brodie, former 49er quarterback and now television analyst, has this to say about Johnson. "He has a great football mind. He taught me more about the offensive phase of football than anyone I've ever been associated with."

Johnson played center for Texas A & M in 1944 and 1946, missing a year while serving in the Navy. In 1947 he was captain of the Tyler, Texas, Junior College champions and Little Rose Bowl winners. He is a graduate of Stephen F. Austin College.

Johnson joined the San Francisco 49ers of the old All American Football Conference in 1946 and moved with the 49ers into the NFL in 1950.

An all-pro center for years, Johnson played through 1955 in the period when the team had such performers as Tittle, Standlee, Hugh McElhenny, Joe Perry, John Henry Johnson, Leo Nomellini, Gordy Soltau and Bob St. Clair.

Johnson's career as a center earned him a spot on the Helms Foundation All-Time All-Pro team.

After leaving the playing ranks Johnson served as an assistant coach under Frankie Albert, Red Hickey and Jack Christiansen before coming to Cincinnati in 1968 when the Bengals joined the old American Football League as an expansion team.

Bill was born July 14, 1926 in Tyler, Texas. He and his wife, Dot, have three children — Bill Jr., 27; Sherilyn, 26, and Tommy, 18.

HOWARD BRINKER Defensive Coordinator Linebackers

Howard Brinker, a veteran of 26 years of coaching in the National Football League, is the Bengals' defensive coordinator and linebacker coach.

One of the top defensive strategists in football, Brinker rejoined Paul Brown following the 1973 season when he left the Cleveland Browns after 22 years to become the Bengals' linebacker coach.

Brinker, an outstanding teacher and organizer who has an extensive knowledge of the game, took charge of the overall defense in 1975.

He has put together a rugged defense for the Bengals and has played a big part in the development of middle linebacker Jim LeClair and young outside 'backers Bo Harris and Reggie Williams.

A graduate of Massillon High School, Brinker played on Brown's first team there. After finishing college at Miami of Ohio, he began coaching on the junior high school level in Massillon in 1939.

His first head coaching job was at Steubenville, Ohio, High School where he served in 1941 and 1942. He then went into the military service and returned to Steubenville in 1945 for three more seasons before going to Ohio U. as line coach in 1949.

Paul Brown brought Brinker to Cleveland as chief scout and assistant coach in 1952. He became defensive coordinator in 1954.

Howard, who was born in Canal Fulton, Ohio, on March 31, 1914, has a masters' degree in physical education from Ohio State University. He and his wife, Mary, have two sons — David, 23, and William, 21.



JACK "J.D." DONALDSON **Offensive Backfield**

Jack Donaldson, one of the original members of the Cincinnati Bengals' coaching staff, is beginning his 14th season in the National Football League.

"J. D.", who came to the Bengals from the New York Jets in 1968, is the offensive backfield coach. He has exceptional knowledge of all phases of football and has coached both the offense and defense at all levels.

Donaldson was named defensive line coach when he joined the Bengals and immediately put together a hard-nosed expansion group that thrived on hitting.

He assumed the offensive backfield duties in 1969 and has held the post ever since. J.D. has been instrumental in the professional development of such present Cincinnati running backs as Boobie Clark, Stan Fritts, Lenvil Elliott, Archie Griffin and Tony Davis.

Prior to entering professional football with the Jets in 1963, Donaldson was an assistant coach at the University of Toledo where he coached for three years.

He was a highly-successful high school coach at McArthur, Xenia, Carey and Perrysburg. He compiled a 38-8 mark at Perrysburg, near Toledo, in five years with two conference championships and two unbeaten seasons.

Donaldson is a 1949 graduate of Ohio State University holding a bachelor of science and master's degree in physical education. He was born Feb. 28, 1927.

"J. D." and his wife, Patricia, have three children — Debbie, 28; Nettie Lou, 25, and John, 22.



BOYD DOWLER **Quarterbacks-Receivers**

Boyd Dowler, former Green Bay Packer all-pro wide receiver, is entering his second season as coach of the Bengals' quarterbacks and receivers.

Dowler came to the Bengals in 1976 and took charge of the passing game. He came to Cincinnati from the Philadelphia Eagles where he had been pass coordinator since 1973.

He has put together an outstanding receiving corps that includes Isaac Curtis and young Billy Brooks and John McDaniel.

The experienced Dowler was an assistant coach for the Los Angeles Rams in 1970 and the Washington Redskins in 1971 and 1972.

He was a player-coach with the Redskins in 1971.

During his brilliant playing career, Dowler played on five title-winning Green Bay teams — three NFL champions and two Super Bowl winners.

Boyd was with the Packers from 1959 to 1969 and had 474 receptions during his pro career.

He was a quarterback and a wide receiver at Colorado and was drafted in the third round by Green Bay in 1959.

Boyd was born October 19, 1937. He and his wife, Patricia, have two children — Kristen, 14, and Brian, 7.



MIKE McCORMACK Offensive Line

Mike McCormack is entering his second season as offensive line coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Former head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles, McCormack joined the Bengals on January 1, 1976, the day Paul Brown resigned as head coach and became fulltime general manager and Bill Johnson was elevated to the head coaching job.

McCormack succeeded Johnson as Cincinnati's offensive line coach.

The knowledgeable and likeable McCormack was head coach of the Eagles in 1973, 1974 and 1975. Prior to that he was the offensive line coach of the Washington Redskins from 1966 through 1972.

McCormack's association with Paul Brown goes back to his playing days with the Cleveland Browns. He played for Brown from 1954-62 and achieved all-pro status as a guard. He also played for the New York Yankees and the Baltimore Colts. He was named to the Pro Bowl squad four times.

Mike was drafted in the first round by the New York Yankees in 1951 after completing a brilliant college career at the University of Kansas where he was an All-American. He played in the College All-Star game and was captain of the West squad in the East-West Shrine game in 1951.

He was born June 21, 1930 and he and his wife, Ann, have four children — Michael, 18; Timothy, 17; Molly, 15, and Colleen, 11.



CHUCK STUDLEY Defensive Line

Chuck Studley, a tough taskmaster, is beginning his ninth season as the Cincinnati Bengals' defensive line coach.

Studley, a stickler for conditioning, put together a quick and exciting front four in 1976 that specialized in quarterback sacks and hard-nosed tackling. He worked Coy Bacon back to all-pro status and developed young Gary Burley into a fine defensive end.

Studley has been a successful coach on all levels. He won two Missouri Valley Conference championships while coaching at the University of Cincinnati from 1961 until 1966 and coached the University of Massachusetts to the Yankee Conference title in 1960.

Before moving into college coaching, Chuck was very successful at Alton High School in Illinois for three years. Prior to that he was an assistant coach at Illinois for five years.

An All-American guard at Illinois, Studley was captain of the 1951 Illinois Rose Bowl team that won the Big 10 with a 9-0-1 record. He played for Illinois for three years.

Chuck was born in Maywood, Ill. He and his wife, Peggy, have six children — Carol, 25; Doug, 24; Susan, 20; David, 18; Mike, 16 and Steve, 13.



CHARLEY WINNER **Defensive Backfield**

Charley Winner, former head coach of the St. Louis Cardinals and the New York Jets, is in his second season as the Bengals' defensive backfield coach.


In his first year with the Bengals, Winner's defensive backfield was ranked number one against the pass in the American Football Conference.

Charley compiled a 35-30 record with the Cardinals from 1966 through 1970. He was an assistant coach with the Washington Redskins in 1971 and 1972 and joined the Jets in 1973 in a similar capacity.

He was named head coach of the Jets in 1974 and lifted the club to a 7-7 record. He left the Jets midway through the 1975 season.

The experienced Winner also was an assistant coach with the Baltimore Colts for 12 years and prior to that an aide at Washington University of St. Louis and at Case Institute of Technology in Cleveland.

Charley is a graduate of Southeast Missouri State and holds a masters degree from Washington University of St. Louis. He was born July 2, 1925 and he and his wife, Nancy, have two daughters — Cinda, 24 and Lisa, 20.



KIM WOOD **Strength Coach**

Kim Wood is beginning his third season as the Cincinnati Bengals' strength coach.

The 32-year-old Wood has been one of the leaders in the Nautilus program and has worked with Bengal players for several years. He became the club's first fulltime strength coach in 1975 and has put all Bengal players on a year-round program.

Kim has been closely associated with the Nautilus training program since its inception. He is a dedicated and tireless worker and has made the Bengals one of the league's top-conditioned teams.

Wood has set up strength programs for a number of National Football League teams and many major colleges.

Kim was an outstanding running back at the University of Wisconsin. His wife's name is Connie. He was born July 12, 1945. and his hometown is Barrington, Ill.

John Sawyer is president and one of the owners of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Sawyer has been a key figure in the Bengals' franchise from the very beginning, combining with Paul and Mike Brown to bring professional football to Cincinnati.

MIKE BROWN **Assistant General Manager and Legal Counsel**

Mike Brown, one of the driving forces behind bringing professional football to Cincinnati, is the Bengals' assistant general manager and legal counsel.

Mike has been associated with football all his life and knows all facets of the game.

Several years before the Cincinnati franchise materialized, Mike conducted a detailed survey showing the potential of the Cincinnati area as a professional football market. His untiring efforts helped produce the franchise for the Queen City.

Mike, along with his father, Paul, represents the Bengals at all National Football League owners' meetings. He played a big role in bringing about the merger in pro football which brought the American Football League and the National Football League together.

As assistant general manager, Mike handles all negotiations with the City of Cincinnati concerning the Bengals and Riverfront Stadium. He also conducts many player contract matters and works closely with television and radio sponsors. He was recently appointed to the National Football League Management Council.

Mike is a member of the Bengals' board of directors. He is a graduate of Dartmouth, where he played quarterback, and received his law degree from Harvard. He worked in the Cleveland Browns' front office many years and also was associated with a Cleveland law firm.

Mike and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Katie, 11, and a son, Paul, 7½.



PETE BROWN
Director of Player Personnel

Pete Brown heads the vital player personnel department for the Cincinnati Bengals.

An outstanding judge of football talent, Pete became director of player personnel in 1969 after serving one year as assistant director. He has been in charge of the club's scouting program since the franchise began 10 years ago. His search for players has sent him to virtually every college in the country. He has consistently come up with outstanding drafts for the Bengals.

Pete is an authority on physical fitness and played a major role in implementing the Nautilus exercise program. He's a graduate of Denison University.

JOHN MURDOUGH
Business Manager

The Bengals business manager is John Murdough, a veteran of 36 years as a major league sports executive.

Murdough was one of the first men employed by Paul Brown after the Cincinnati Bengal franchise was founded late in 1967. He was with the Cincinnati Reds for 26 years before resigning to join the Bengals in November, 1967.

While with the Reds, Murdough served as ticket manager, traveling secretary and business manager and was appointed a vice president of the club in 1965. He has served in every front office capacity of a major sports franchise. John and his wife, Helen, have two children, Debbie, 25 and John, 20.

ALLAN HEIM
Public Relations Director

Allan Heim, former executive sports editor of the Cincinnati Enquirer, is the Bengals public relations and publicity director. Heim joined the Bengals in December, 1967, after serving as executive sports editor of The Enquirer for eight years. He worked for The Enquirer for 12 years also serving as a general assignment reporter and business writer.

A native of Springfield, Ohio, Heim attended Wittenberg University for two years and graduated from Ohio State University in 1956 following a four-year tour of duty in the Air Force where he worked for Stars and Stripes and Air Force Times in Japan and Korea.

All and his wife, Charlene, have three children, Allan Jr., 22, Julie, 20 and Steve, 18.

BILL HEDGECOCK
Ticket Manager

The Bengal ticket department is under the supervision of Bill Hedgecock.
