

RIVERFRONT STADIUM

The Bengals' home is Cincinnati's beautiful Riverfront Stadium, located on the banks of the Ohio River.

The stadium, situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway, has a seating capacity of 56,200 for football.

The four-level circular stadium has a diameter of 700 feet encompassing approximately eight and a half acres.

The Riverfront Stadium features a complete playing surface of AstroTurf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will accommodate 4500 autos. Three parking decks plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium. A total of 75 buses and 100 taxi cabs park on the plaza level. Two four-lane streets run underneath the stadium, adjacent to the parking area. Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages and cartoons through a computer.

PAUL BROWN

Head Coach
and
General Manager

Paul Brown is a legend in his own time. He is a giant of professional football. His touch, his class and his style can be felt and seen throughout the sport he has devoted his life to.

This extraordinary man, who has coached more football victories than anyone else in history, is entering his 41st season. His record is a fantastic 340 wins, 130 defeats and 16 ties, a mark that is very likely to go unchallenged for many, many years.

Brown has mastered the art of coaching and winning at all levels—high school, college, service and professional. He molded dynasties at Massillon High School, Ohio State University and then with the Cleveland Browns after piloting the Great Lakes Naval Station to phenomenal success during World War II.

PB made Massillon a name known to football fans from coast to coast; he brought an almost instant national championship to Ohio State in 1942; founded the Cleveland Browns and dominated the old All-America Conference and then moved into the National Football League where he and his team became even more prominent.

In 1967 he came out of retirement to start the Cincinnati Bengals, a new team that would open play a year later in the old American Football League.

He built his Cincinnati team with a solid foundation and, just as he had promised Bengal fans, it was competitive within five years. The Bengals startled the football world by winning two American Football Conference Central Division championships—1970 and 1973—in their first six years. It would have been an unheard of accomplishment for most coaches but not for Paul Brown.

That the Cincinnati franchise has become successful in all phases of the operation is due in large part to the genius of Paul Brown who, besides coaching, is also the club's general manager.

Brown has played a major role in shaping the NFL and charting its course and is still doing so. He was one of the guiding forces behind the merger which brought the AFL into the NFL.

As a member of the NFL competition committee he has had a part in recommending and having accepted rules changes which have made pro football even more exciting.

Pro football for Paul Brown started in Cleveland after World War II. Along with Art McBride, he formed the Cleveland Browns in the old All-American Football Conference. The Browns won 52, lost only four and tied three in four championship seasons before moving into the National Football League.

Many experts said Brown's Browns couldn't make it in the NFL and the schedule-maker called for an early showdown, matching Cleveland with the Philadelphia Eagles, the defending NFL champions.

Brown's team not only routed the Eagles, 35-10, in that game, but went on to win the world championship in Cleveland's first year in the NFL, beating the Los Angeles Rams, 30-28, in the title game.

The "master's" 13-year record at Cleveland after joining with the NFL was a superb 115-49-6, and only once during that stretch did the Browns ever have a losing year.

But even as great as the dynasty he built in Cleveland was, the job he has done in Cincinnati is perhaps more impressive considering the obstacles he faced in building an expansion team.

Even in their first two seasons, with a squad comprised of rookies and castoffs, the Bengals pulled off some amazing upsets including one over the Super Bowl champion-to-be Kansas City Chiefs. Then in their third year the Bengals actually won a division crown.

Meanwhile, Brown kept drafting judiciously and working methodically and he was rewarded with a 10-4 season, the Bengals best to date, and another AFC Central championship in 1973.

Even more noteworthy, perhaps, than Brown's glistening won-loss record and other achievements is the scientific approach

he introduced to the game. Many of his innovations seem so standard now that it's difficult to believe there was a time when the game was played without them. Surely he was the classic example of a man far ahead of his time.

Brown is responsible for making professional football what it is today.

He made pro football a science, a full-time business with a full-time staff when he began building the Cleveland Browns in 1946. He hired full-time assistants on a year-round basis and scouted college talent on a scale never before imagined by other professional teams.

His innovations include:

- First to employ a year-round coaching staff.
- First to use notebooks and classroom techniques extensively.
- First to set up complete film clip statistical study.
- First to grade players from individual film clips.
- First to keep players together at a downtown hotel the night before home games as well as on the road.
- First to call plays from sidelines by rotating guards as messengers.
- Developed detailed pass patterns which opened specific defense areas.
- Made major contributions to improve science of defensive play to counteract pattern passing by others who followed his lead.
- First to switch some fine running backs to defensive specialists and explained "they were so good, I didn't want to waste them on offense."
- Invented face bars on helmets.
- First to use intelligence tests as a clue to player's learning potential.

After graduating from Massillon High School, Brown enrolled at Ohio State and later transferred to Miami where he became a fine runner and passer.

His coaching career began in 1930 at Maryland's Severn Prep, a Naval Academy preparatory school. In two years his teams rolled up a record of 16 wins, one loss and a tie.

Then he was called back to Ohio to pick up Massillon's sagging football fortunes.

He did just that. His overall Massillon record in nine years was 80 wins, eight losses and two ties.

He coached the Massillon Tigers to one state championship after another and soon began receiving offers from small colleges throughout Ohio. But he was only interested in one job—head football coach at Ohio State University.

Brown reached his goal in 1941 and guided the Buckeyes to six wins, one loss and a tie. In 1942, he coached Ohio State to the national collegiate championship with a 9-1 record. Then came the war and he went to Great Lakes where he produced several outstanding teams.

He then moved into the pro ranks in Cleveland where he built football's greatest dynasty.

Paul and his wife, Mary, live in Glendale. His first wife, Katie, died in April, 1969. Two of his sons, Mike and Pete, are associated with the Bengal organization as assistant general manager and director of player personnel respectively. Another son, Robin, is a business executive and also scouts for the Bengals.

MEDIA INFORMATION

Press Box Credentials: Cincinnati Riverfront Stadium press box space is reserved for members of the working news media. Requests for credentials should be made in advance and directed to Allan Heim, Public Relations Director, Cincinnati Bengals, 200 Riverfront Stadium, Cincinnati, Ohio, 45202.

Television and Radio: Network television and visiting radio are assigned to marked booths in the press box. Spotters are available upon request.

Photographers: Only accredited working photographers are allowed on the sidelines. They must obtain and wear a "Field Photo" credential. The bench areas are off limits.

Locker Rooms: Press box credentials are used to gain admittance into the locker rooms after the game.

Press Box Services: Complete statistical information is supplied during and after the game. Scores of other games are announced as received. Refreshments are served before the game and at half-time in the press lounge.

THE CINCINNATI BENGALS 1975 OUTLOOK

The Cincinnati Bengals hope to escape the injury jinx that crippled them last season and regain the form they showed in 1973 when they won the American Football Conference's Central Division championship.

"I would just like to start training camp and continue through the season with a healthy group of young men," says Paul Brown who is entering his 41st season of coaching.

"Injuries wrecked us last year," said Brown. "We were hit at key spots and really decimated. But our record (7-7) was respectable to those who know the game. We lost more people with serious injuries than I can remember ever having happened to a team I coached."

The presence of young Ken Anderson, the passing champion of the National Football League and ranked among the very best quarterbacks, plus further maturity and added depth at all positions give the Bengals high hopes for challenging the World Champion Pittsburgh Steelers, an AFC Central foe.

"It's going to be a very difficult proposition to overtake the Steelers," Brown emphasized. "They are outstanding in every sense of the word."

"And besides playing two games with the Steelers we also meet the Houston Oilers and the Cleveland Browns twice," added Brown. "Our division is as tough or tougher than any in professional football."

"But we'll do our best and I think we'll make a good account of ourselves. We're a contender because we have a fine quarterback and, basically, you have to start there. Ken Anderson is very bright; he's courageous, he knows where he's going; he's no ordinary young man."

"We have good, solid people, the kind you have to have to be a good winner," Brown pointed out. "The core is there. We've had our heartaches but by and large we've just kept sawing wood, building, planning and staying with it as best as could."

Anderson compiled a 95.8 passing rating and completed 64.9% of his aeriels, both tops in the NFL, while rewriting the Bengal record book in 1974.

Wide receiver Isaac Curtis and Anderson have put the "bomb" in the Cincinnati air game. Curtis caught 10 TD passes last season, most of them long strikes, and was an All AFC selection along with Anderson.

A return to action by Boobie Clark and the multi-talented Essex Johnson, both out most of 1974 with injuries, would enhance the ground game to more effectively compliment the passing attack.

The starting Cincinnati defensive unit is manned almost completely by veterans and could be the key to the season.

Finding depth for the defense was one of the Bengals' considerations in the 1975 college draft. First-round choice Glenn Cameron could win a spot at middle or outside linebacker, areas hard hit by injuries. Three other linebackers were selected in the draft and a third-round pick was defensive end Gary Burley.

"We think we helped ourselves in the draft," said Brown. "We'll find out just how much very soon."

A position-by-position look at the Bengals follows:

QUARTERBACK—Anderson, who is entering his fifth pro season, has established himself as one of the premier quarterbacks in the NFL and the Bengals appear to be set at this position for a long time.

The Augustana bomber broke virtually all the club's passing records in 1974, throwing 18 touchdown passes while gaining 2667 yards in the air.

An interesting battle for the back-up quarterback job is shaping up between John Reaves, recently obtained in trade with Philadelphia, and rookies Gary Sheide, a third-round draft choice from Brigham Young, and Tom Shuman, a sixth-round selection from Penn State.

RECEIVERS—Cincinnati is deep in talent at this skilled position with Curtis leading the way. The fleet-footed Curtis, is a threat to go all the way each time the ball is thrown to him. He and Anderson give the Bengals a sensational duo in the aerial department.

Veterans Chip Myers and Charlie Joiner and second-year man John McDaniel are also vital members of the Bengal receiving corps. Myers led the club in receptions last year with 32.

The veterans will be challenged by rookies Pat McNally, a 6'6", 220-pounder from Harvard who was drafted in the fifth round; Kansas State's John Tuttle, a 16th round selection, and Lofell Williams, ninth-round pick from Virginia Union.

Big Bob Trumpy, starting his eighth season, leads the parade at tight end with veteran Bruce Coslet in the backup role. Rookies Jeff West, also a top punter, and Jack Novak from Wisconsin, a pair of draftees, will try to win a spot.

RUNNING BACKS—Cincinnati went into the 1974 season loaded with running backs but injuries, especially to key performers, quickly cut into the ranks.

The Bengals hope to see the return to 1973 form by Essex Johnson and Boobie Clark. The pair chalked up almost 2000 yards between them in 1973 but played very little last year because of injuries.

Second-year man Charlie Davis, who gave a solid performance as a rookie, Lenvil Elliott, Ed Williams, a late-season surprise, Doug Dressler and rookie Stan Fritts, a fourth-round selection from North Carolina State where he shattered all rushing records and 1974 draft choice Issac Jackson round out the Cincinnati ground corps.

OFFENSIVE LINE—Center and captain Bob Johnson anchors the Bengals veteran offensive line. The Bengals were seriously disabled last season when Johnson was sidelined with a broken ankle with five games remaining. Regular guard Howard Fest is Johnson's backup.

Fest pairs with veterans John Shinnery and Pat Matson at guard. Second-year man Dave Lapham can perform at guard or tackle. Another candidate for a job at guard is Greg Dubinetz, ninth-round draft choice from Yale.

Vern Holland, who missed practically all of last season with a broken leg, will be back at one tackle spot while veterans Rufus Mayes, Lapham and rookie Al Krevis, the second-round draft choice from Boston College, will be battling for the other starting job.

Cincinnati's offensive line is composed primarily of players with more than five years experience and the addition of Krevis, believed to be one of the "blue chippers" in the draft, should give the club the depth it needs.

DEFENSIVE LINE—A hard core of seasoned players make up the Cincinnati forward wall even though the talented Mike Reid has retired.

Ken Johnson, Sherman White and Royce Berry, all veterans, are keys at the defensive end spot. Johnson won a starting job at mid-season in 1974. Third-round draft choice Gary Burley, an All-American from the University of Pittsburgh, also is in the picture.

The Bengals appear to be solid at the tackle position with Ron Carpenter and Bill Kollar, a first-round draft choice in 1974, and Johnson who can play tackle or end.

LINEBACKERS—This position was beset by injuries in 1974. In an effort to strengthen the linebacking situation Cincinnati selected four in the draft.

First-round choice Glenn Cameron from Florida is expected to battle talented Jim LeClair, hampered by injuries all last season, and Tim Kearney for the starting job in the middle. Brad Cousino, All-Mid American Conference most valuable player for two consecutive years, also is a candidate. LeClair had off-season surgery on his right foot and appears ready to go full strength.

Cameron and LeClair also can play on the outside and will be worked there also along with seven-year regular Al Beauchamp and rugged Ron Pritchard, another veteran starter. Second-year man Evan Jolitz and rookies Bo Harris, Chris Devlin and Ron Rosenberg will be in the thick of the battle to earn a spot on the Cincinnati roster.

DEFENSIVE BACKS—Lemar Parrish and Ken Riley give Cincinnati a talented pair at the all-important cornerback positions. Bernard Jackson was the corner back-up last season and a regular at safety most of the way where he combined with the heady Tom Casanova. Spirited Lyle Blackwood, Ken Sawyer and Bob Jones were the reserve defensive backs in 1974.

There will be four rookie defensive backs on the scene looking for a job when the squad assembles for training camp at Wilmington College in July. These are Marvin Cobb, a standout performer for the national champion Southern California Trojans; Rollen Smith, Arkansas; Ricky Davis, Alabama; and Elvin Charity, Yale.

KICKING GAME—The Cincinnati kicking game will have a new look in 1975.

The club's placekicker will be Dave Green following the trade of Horst Muhlmann to Philadelphia for a future draft choice. Green, the club's punter, kicked off from mid-season in 1974 after Muhlmann suffered a thigh injury. The Bengals drafted placekicker Greg Enright of Southern Oregon and will give him a look at training camp along with rookie wide receiver Pat McNally who handled the placekicking chores for Harvard.

Green will be challenged in the punting department by the University of Cincinnati's Jeff West, the leading punter in college football last season.

RETURN GAME—Lemar Parrish, that little bit of lightning from Lincoln U., and Tom Casanova give the Bengals the best one-two punt return game in pro football.

Parrish returned 18 punts for 338 yards for an average of 18.8, tops in the NFL. Casanova returned 24 for 265 yards for an average of 11.0. Two of Parrish's returns went for TDs, a 90-yard scamper against Washington which was the longest of the year in the NFL, and a 62-yard scoring return against Cleveland in the opening game of the season.

Bernard Jackson is the top kickoff return man for the Bengals. Last year Jackson returned 29 for 682 yards for an average of 23.5. Charlie Davis mans the other spot on the Cincinnati kickoff return tandem and is a constant breakaway threat.

WILMINGTON COLLEGE TRAINING CAMP

The Cincinnati Bengals "summer home" is Wilmington College in Wilmington, Ohio, where they are holding their training camp for the eighth consecutive year.

The heart of the training camp is housed in Hermann Court—a modern and well-equipped fieldhouse located on the south edge of the campus. The fieldhouse includes an Olympic swimming pool, a Nautilus-equipped training room, handball courts, and two basketball courts. The twice-daily workouts are held on two practice fields and a regulation football field adjacent to the fieldhouse.

The team is housed in Clarence E. Pickett Hall, a four-story dormitory; dining room facilities are located in nearby Pyle Center. As a fan, you are cordially invited to both tour the campus and watch the Bengals in action.

A member of the Bengals board of directors, Mike did his undergraduate work at Dartmouth, where he was a quarterback, and received his law degree from Harvard. He worked in the Cleveland Browns front office for a number of years and also was associated with a Cleveland law firm.

Mike and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Katie, 9 and a son, Paul, 5½.

JOHN MURDOUGH

Business Manager

The Bengals business manager is John Murdough, a veteran of 34 years as a major league sports executive.

Murdough was one of the first men employed by Paul Brown after the Cincinnati Bengal franchise was founded late in 1967. John was with the Cincinnati Reds for 26 years before resigning to join the Bengals in November, 1967.

While with the Reds, Murdough served as ticket manager, traveling secretary and business manager and was appointed a vice president of the club in 1965. He has served in every front office capacity of a major sports franchise. John and his wife, Helen, have two children, Debbie, 23 and John, 18.

ALLAN HEIM

Public Relations Director

Allan Heim, former executive sports editor of the Cincinnati Enquirer, is the Bengals public relations and publicity director. Heim joined the Bengals in December, 1967, after serving as executive sports editor of The Enquirer for eight years. He worked for The Enquirer for 12 years also serving as a general assignment reporter and business writer.

A native of Springfield, Ohio, Heim attended Wittenberg University for two years and graduated from Ohio State University in 1956 following a four-year tour of duty in the Air Force where he worked for Stars and Stripes and Air Force Times in Japan and Korea.

Al and his wife, Charlene, have three children, Allan Jr., 20; Julie, 18 and Steve, 16.

PETE BROWN

Director of Player Personnel

Pete Brown heads the vital player personnel department for the Cincinnati Bengals.

Pete became director of player personnel in 1969 after serving a year as assistant director. He also has been in charge of the club's scouting since its formation in 1968 and has visited virtually every college campus in the country in search of future Bengals.

A graduate of Denison University, Pete has played a big part in putting together the Bengals and a major role in the team's seven college drafts. He has also supervised the club's Nautilus exercise program.

DOUG HAFNER

Asst. Dir. of Player Personnel

Doug Hafner is the Cincinnati Bengals assistant director of player personnel.

Hafner joined the Bengals in 1969 after serving as personnel director at Florida State for two years during which time he recruited teams that played in the Gator Bowl and Peach Bowl. Prior to that he worked in the player personnel department of the Oakland Raiders.

Before entering pro football, Hafner was assistant football and baseball coach at the University of Miami, Fla., and Tulane. The Miami baseball team was Florida state champion for two years during his stay there and the football team was in the Liberty Bowl.

HOWARD BRINKER Linebackers

Howard Brinker is one of the top defensive strategists in the National Football League. He is an outstanding teacher and organizer and has an extensive knowledge of the game.

Brinker rejoined Paul Brown following the 1973 season when he left the Cleveland Browns to become the Cincinnati Bengals linebacker coach. He had worked with Brown for 22 years in Cleveland as an assistant coach of the Browns.

A graduate of Massillon High School, Brinker played on Brown's first team there. After finishing college at Miami of Ohio, he began coaching on the junior high school level in Massillon in 1939.

His first head coaching job was at Steubenville, Ohio, High School where he served in 1941 and 1942. He then went into the military service and returned to Steubenville in 1945 for three more seasons. He then went to Ohio U. as line coach in 1949.

Paul Brown brought Brinker to Cleveland as chief scout and assistant coach in 1952. He became defensive coordinator in 1954.

Howard, who was born in Canal Fulton, Ohio, has a master's degree in physical education from Ohio State University. He and his wife, Mary, have two sons—David, 21 and William, 19.



JACK DONALDSON Offensive Backfield

An original member of Paul Brown's Bengals' staff, Jack "J.D." Donaldson came to Cincinnati from the New York Jets in 1968.

He has an exceptional knowledge of all phases of football and has coached both the offense and defense at all levels.

Upon joining the Bengals "J.D." was named defensive line coach and put together a hard-nosed expansion group that thrived on hitting. At the conclusion of the first year Donaldson took over the offensive backfield job, a post he has held since. He has guided the development of such standouts as Booby Clark, Essex Johnson and Charlie Davis.

Before coming to Cincinnati, Donaldson was on the staff of the New York Jets under head coach Weeb Ewbank for five years serving as defensive backfield coach for four years and defensive line coach for one year.

"J.D." was an assistant coach at the University of Toledo prior to joining the Jets in 1963. He coached three years at Toledo. Prior to that he was a highly-successful high school coach at McArthur, Xenia, Carey and Perrysburg. At Perrysburg, near Toledo, he compiled a 38-8 record in five years with two conference championships and two unbeaten seasons.

Jack is a 1949 graduate of Ohio State University holding a bachelor of science and a master's degree in physical education.

He and his wife, Patricia, have three children—Debbie, 24, Nettie Lou, 21 and John, 18.



BILL JOHNSON Offensive Line

Knowledgeable and experienced Bill "Tiger" Johnson, one of the most well respected coaches in the National Football League, is the Bengals' offensive line coach.

Johnson, who has been with the Bengals since their start in 1968, was faced with the most difficult task of putting together an offensive forward wall for an expansion team. He has developed the Bengals offensive line into one of the best.

CHUCK STUDLEY

Defensive Line

Dedicated and determined Chuck Studley has put together one of the top "front fours" in pro football for the Bengals.

Studley has been instrumental in the development of the likes of Ron Carpenter, the now retired Mike Reid, Sherman White, Ken Johnson, and young Bill Kollar during his seven seasons in Cincinnati.

BILL WALSH

Quarterbacks-Receivers

The man behind the Cincinnati Bengals' top-flight passing game is Bill Walsh.

The precise and perfection-minded Walsh is starting his seventh season with the Bengals as the coach of the club's receivers and quarterbacks.

He has put together a passing game that is rated among the best in the National Football League and has been instrumental in the development of the Ken Anderson and Isaac Curtis duo, one of the most exciting in football.

Under Walsh's tutelage, Anderson became the top-rated passer in the NFL in just four seasons. He also played a big part in the play and development of such former Bengal quarterbacks as Virg Carter and Greg Cook and present receivers Chip Myers and Bob Trumpy.

Walsh was offensive backfield coach for the Oakland Raiders before joining the Bengals. His coaching background also includes a three-year stint at Stanford University as the top aide to John Ralston, now head coach of the Denver Broncos. Prior to that he spent three years at the University of California as defensive coordinator. Bill, a native of Los Angeles, began his coaching career with three years as a head high school coach. He was an outstanding receiver at San Jose State.

Bill and his wife, Jeri, have two sons, Steve, 18 and Craig, 14 and a daughter, Elizabeth, 3.



CHUCK WEBER

Defensive Backfield

Chuck Weber, former Little All-American and standout National Football League linebacker, is the coach of the Bengals' defensive backfield.

A former linebacker for Paul Brown in Cleveland, the talented Weber molded a solid defensive backfield in Cincinnati with cornerbacks Lemar Parrish and Ken Riley and safeties Tommy Casanova and Bernard Jackson.

Weber played for the Cleveland Browns in 1955 and 1956. He has the distinction of being on two different teams that won National Football League championships—the Browns in 1955 and the Philadelphia Eagles in 1960. He also played for the Chicago Cardinals (now St. Louis) from 1956 until 1958 and was the club's defensive captain.

Before coming to Cincinnati, Weber was an assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers for two years and an assistant with the Boston Patriots for four seasons. Weber is a graduate of West Chester State College in Pennsylvania where he was a Little All-American. He was born in Philadelphia.

KIM WOOD

Strength Coach

Kim Wood became the Cincinnati Bengals first fulltime strength coach early in 1975.
