PAUL BROWN

Head Coach
and
General Manager

Paul Brown is a football giant and has been since the day he started coaching in 1930 at Severn Prep in Maryland.

His genius and dedication have made him a winner at all levels—high school, college, service and professional. In fact, Brown is the winningest coach in the history of football.

He enters his 40th season with a record of 333 victories, only 123 defeats and 16 ties, far and away the best mark in the business.

These include games won while coaching at Severn Prep, Massillon (Ohio) High School, Ohio State University, Great Lakes Naval Station and with the Cleveland Browns and Cincinnati Bengals.

His lifetime mark in professional football is 195-96-9.

Brown's latest achievement was coaching his expansion Bengals to their second American Football Conference Central Division championship in just six years last season.

When PB started the Cincinnati franchise he promised fans a team that would be competitive in five years. He beat his own timetable by a couple of seasons with a division champion in the club's third year.

He made the Bengals the most successful expansion team in National Football League history. Cincinnati won 37 games in its first six years, topping the 35 won by the Miami Dolphins in the same period of time.

In addition to his genius on the field, Brown has played a major role in shaping the NFL and charting the course of professional football and is still doing so. He was one of the guiding forces behind the merger which brought the old American Football League into the National Football League.

Brown is a member of the NFL competition committee which recommended and had accepted the new set of rules which will be in effect this season.

Pro football for Paul Brown started in Cleveland after World War II when he formed the Cleveland Browns in the old All-American Football Conference.

Brown's Browns won 52, lost only four and tied three in winning four successive championships before moving into the NFL and stunning the traditionalists by winning the crown in their first try.

Many experts said the Browns couldn't make it in the NFL and the schedule-maker called for an early showdown with the Philadelphia Eagles, the defending NFL champions.

Brown's team routed the Eagles, 35-10, and set the tone of things to come.

For the 13 seasons in which Brown was at the helm in Cleveland, the Browns compiled a 115-49-6 record and only once during that time did he have a losing record. He led the Browns

to three NFL titles, seven conference crowns and had his team in the championship game a record seven times.

Brown's start with the Bengals has been even more impressive considering the obstacles he faced in building the team.

Even in their first two seasons, with a squad comprised of rookies and castoffs, the Bengals pulled off some amazing upsets including one over the Super Bowl champion-to-be Kansas City Chiefs. Then in their third year the Bengals actually won a division crown.

Meanwhile, Brown kept drafting judiciously and working methodically and he was rewarded with a 10-4 season, the Bengals best to date, and another AFC Central championship in 1973.

Even more noteworthy, perhaps, than Brown's glistening won-loss record and other achievements is the scientific approach he introduced to the game. Many of his innovations seem so standard now that it's difficult to believe there was a time when the game was played without them. Surely he was the classic example of a man far ahead of his time.

Brown was the first coach to employ a year-around staff, or to use notebooks and classroom techniques extensively. He introduced the system of grading players from film clips and he originated the idea of intelligence tests for his athletes.

He was the first coach to call plays from the sidelines with his famous messenger guard system, and he was the innovator in converting offensive stars into defensive specialists.

He made pro football a science and scouted college talent on a scale never before imagined by other teams. His wide-range searching for talent made it possible for players from small schools to become professionals.

Brown was the leader in developing a number of detailed pass patterns and by the same token made major contributions to improve the science of defensive play to counteract pattern passing by those who followed his lead.

One of his inventions, now taken for granted by every football player in the land, was the face bar on helmets.

A graduate of Massillon High School and Miami (Ohio) University, where he was a fine runner and passer, Brown began his coaching career at Severn Prep in Maryland, a U.S. Naval Academy preparatory school. After two successful years there (16 wins, a loss and a tie) he was called back to his home to revive Massillon's sagging football fortunes.

He did just that. His overall Massillon record in nine years was 80 wins, eight losses and two ties.

As he coached the Massillon Tigers to one state championship after another he began receiving offers from small colleges throughout Ohio. But he was only interested in one job—head football coach at Ohio State University.

Brown reached his goal in 1941 and guided the Buckeyes to six wins, one loss and a tie. In 1942, he coached Ohio State to the national collegiate championship with a 9-1 record. Then came the war and he went to Great Lakes where he produced several outstanding teams.

He then moved into the pro ranks in Cleveland where he built football's greatest dynasty.

Paul and his wife, Mary, live in Glendale. His first wife, Katie, died in April, 1969. Two of his sons, Mike and Pete, are associated with the Bengal organization. Another son, Robin, is a business executive in Arkansas and scouts for the Bengals.

Press Box Credentials: Cincinnati Riverfront Stadium press box space is reserved for members of the working news media. Requests for credentials should be made in advance and directed to Allan Heim, Public Relations Director, Cincinnati Bengals, 200 Riverfront Stadium, Cincinnati, Ohio, 45202.

Television and Radio: Network television and visiting radio are assigned to marked booths in the press box. Spotters are available upon request.

Photographers: Only accredited working photographers are allowed on the sidelines. They must obtain and wear a "Field Photo" credential. The bench areas are off limits.

Locker Rooms: Press box credentials are used to gain admittance into the locker rooms after the game.

Press Box Services: Complete statistical information is supplied during and after the game. Scores of other games are announced as received. Refreshments are served before the game and at half-time in the press lounge.

THE CINCINNATI BENGALS 1974 OUTLOOK

Coach Paul Brown has won two division championships in six years with the expansion Cincinnati Bengals and heads into the 1974 season with bigger goals.

The Bengals, newest team in professional football, pulled themselves together in 1973 after their injured were healed and went on a six-game winning streak to win the championship of the rugged American Football Conference Central Division with a 10-4 record.

The outlook for 1974 is bright if key personnel remain healthy.

The 1973 team, buoyed by fine seasons from rookies Boobie Clark, a running back, and Isaac Curtis, a receiver, was the best to represent Cincinnati to date.

The presence of Curtis gives the Bengals a new dimension—the big play. Quarterback Ken Anderson and Curtis combined for some spectacular plays last season and more of the same is hoped for in 1974.

The Bengals offense, with solid improvement up front, was equally effective on the ground and in the air while the defensive unit ranked among the best in the AFC.

The college draft turned out to be better for Cincinnati than Brown had expected. The first two choices were Bill Kollar, a defensive tackle from Montana State; and Charles Davis, a running back from Colorado.

"When you are drafting in as low a position as we were (23rd) you don't expect to get players of this quality," said Brown. "Overall we're happy with our draft, but only time will tell how it really turned out.

"As for the coming season we know what we are up against," Brown added. "We won our division on the last day of the season in 1973 and I'm sure the race will be the same kind this year."

A position-by-position look at the Bengals follows:

QUARTERBACK—The Bengals appear to be in good shape at the all-important quarterback spot barring injuries.

Ken Anderson, entering his fourth professional season, came into his own in 1973 as he led the Bengals to the AFC Central Division championship.

A cool and poised competitor, the 6-2½, 210-pound Anderson set five club records along the way to the division crown.

Battling for the backup job will be veteran Wayne Clark, former San Diego signal-caller who was obtained in an off-season trade with the San Diego Chargers.

Clark has the size—6-3, 205—and experience—entering his fourth season—to help the Bengals. He was a starter for the Chargers in the latter part of the 1973 season.

Other quarterbacks seeking a spot on the Cincinnati roster are Mike Ernst, Anderson's backup last year, and Greg Cook who is hoping to make a comeback after three shoulder operations.

RECEIVERS—Last season Isaac Curtis, then a rookie, was a sensational performer. Curtis, the receiver with sprinter's speed from San Diego State, was the Bengals' first-round draft pick and Paul Brown said at the time, "We may have the fastest man in football."

Curtis used his speed to great advantage, making outstanding catches and teaming up with Anderson on long plays. Nine of his 45 catches were good for touchdowns and he had three TD grabs in the 34-17 victory over the Cleveland Browns.

Charlie Joiner, a veteran of five years, returned to action in mid-season after two injuries and made the Cincinnati passing game go.

Chip Myers, the club's leading receiver in 1972, saw limited duty because of injuries but can be expected to be in the thick of things this year. The 6-5, 215-pounder is at his best catching the ball in a crowd.

All-pro selection Bob Trumpy will be at the tight end spot, a post he has held down effectively since 1968. The 6-5 Trumpy gives Anderson a healthy target and is coming off a good season which netted him a berth in the Pro Bowl. He's backed up by

veteran Bruce Coslet and young Al Chandler, a No. 2 draft choice in 1973, who has top potential.

Second-year man Tim George, who started several games last year, will be in the battle for a wide receiver spot as will draftees Richard Williams, (No. 4) from Abilene Christian; John McDaniel, (No. 8) from Lincoln; and Chuck Herd, (No. 10) from Penn State.

RUNNING BACKS—What a difference a year makes. Last year at this time the Bengals were thin at this position, but this time around they seem to have an abundance of running backs.

Much of this is because of the emergence of Boobie Clark, the rugged 6-2, 240-pound blockbuster from Bethune-Cookman where he played linebacker and tight end. Clark gave Paul Brown the "big back" he had been looking for since the Bengals were formed in 1968.

A 12th round draft pick in 1973, Clark teamed with the speedy veteran Essex Johnson to give the Bengals a solid running game. Both Johnson and Clark narrowly missed the 1000-yard rushing milestone.

Johnson, who came to the Bengals in their first college draft in 1968, has an uncanny running style and frequently comes up with the long-gainer. He's effective as a starter or "coming off the bench" and also is one of the club's top receivers.

Joining Clark in the "big back" category will be 6-2, 228-pound Doug Dressler. Dressler, a starter for much of the 1972 season, appeared headed for a big year in 1973 but suffered a knee injury in the final pre-season game. The injury required surgery and Dressler missed the entire season.

Second-round draft choice Charles Davis, an All-American from Colorado, also is expected to be a factor at running back along with second-year men Lenvil Elliott and Joe Wilson. Ed Williams, a taxi squad member, also will be back for another try.

In addition, rookie running back Haskel Stanback from Tennessee; will be battling for a spot.

OFFENSIVE LINE—The Bengals' offensive line was a cohesive unit throughout the 1973 campaign enabling the Cincinnati to move effectively by ground and air.

The offensive line has maturity and many of the members have been together five or six seasons. Center Bob Johnson, the first player the Bengals ever drafted and the club's offensive captain, is starting his seventh season. Tom DeLeone is Johnson's backup and also plays guard.

The guard posts are handled by veterans, John Shinnors, Howard Fest, Pat Matson and DeLeone. This foursome gives the Bengals plenty of experience and depth. Draft choice Daryl White (No. 4b), an All-American from Nebraska, is expected to be in the thick of the battle for a spot.

Vernon Holland, a 6-5, 275-pounder, heads the tackles and teams with Rufus Mayes. The Bengals are hoping for the return of Stan Walters, sidelined by hepatitis most of last season. Dave Lapham, a third-round draft choice from Syracuse, can be used at tackle or guard.

DEFENSIVE LINE—A solid, veteran front four puts the Bengals in good shape here.

Defensive tackle Ron Carpenter, entering his sixth season, led the front four in tackles and quarterback sacks in 1973.

All-pro Mike Reid, one of the quickest defensive linemen in the NFL, holds down the other tackle position and is among the top pass rushers in professional football.

The end spots are manned by defensive captain Royce Berry and cat-quick Sherman White. The durable Berry has been a starter since 1968 while White is entering his third season with the Bengals, all as a starter.

Backing up this talented quartet are veterans Ken Johnson, a 6-6, 270-pounder; Lee Thomas and Steve Chomyszak.

The Bengals top draft choice was defensive lineman Bill Kollar, a 6-3½, 245-pounder from Montana State. Kollar is exceptionally quick and will be a factor. Other draft choices include Richard Bishop (No. 5), defensive tackle from Louisville; Mike Phillips, defensive end from Cornell, and Bob Maddox, a

defensive end from Frostburg State, Md., who was drafted in 1973 but did not play last year.

LINEBACKERS—The Bengals are deep at this position. They have an outstanding and experienced group.

Doug Adams and rugged Tim Kearney will be battling for the spot in the middle. Ron Pritchard, a middle linebacker at Houston before coming to the Bengals, may be shifted back to his old spot.

Cincinnati's outside linebackers are veteran Al Beauchamp, a starter since 1968 when he was drafted by the club, Pritchard, veteran Ken Avery, a hard-hitter starting his seventh season; and rugged Jim LeClair who is in his third season.

Evan Jolitz, an outstanding linebacker at the University of Cincinnati, was a third round draft choice.

DEFENSIVE BACKFIELD—The cornerback positions are in the veteran and capable hands of Lemar Parrish and Ken Riley. Both are seasoned players at this vital spot and give the Bengals a solid duo.

Bernard Jackson has provided excellent backup support at corner and is in the picture for a starting job at safety where he performed well in 1973.

Starters at safety the last two years have been Tom Casanova and Neal Craig. Casanova led the club in interceptions with four even though he was sidelined for five games with a pulled hamstring.

Other Bengal defensive backs are veteran Bob Jones, a safety; and draft choices William Bryant (No. 6b), Grambling; Ken Sawyer (No. 7), Syracuse; and Rudy McClinton (No. 12), Xavier.

KICKING GAME—Two veterans—Horst Muhlmann and Dave Lewis—have the inside track on the all-important kicking phase of the Bengals' operation. Both have handled the chores the last five years.

Placekicker Muhlmann had an outstanding season in 1973, booting 21 field goals on 31 attempts and finished with 94 points. His contributions were great in the Bengals' drive for the division championship and his game-winning field goal against Buffalo as time elapsed sent the team off on a six-game winning streak.

Lewis' average slipped slightly last year, but overall he was still effective. He averaged 41 yards per kick. He was the NFL's top punter in 1970 and 1971.

Dave Green will be contesting Lewis and Muhlmann. Green punted for Houston last year.

KICK RETURN GAME—Cincinnati boasts one of the best in this category. Speed is an absolute necessity and it is provided in abundance by Leapin' Lemar Parrish and swift Bernard Jackson on kickoff returns.

Parrish and wily Tom Casanova are usually the punt return duo. Lyle Blackwood, Joe Wilson and Lenvil Elliott also are effective return men.

John Sawyer is president and one of the owners of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Sawyer has been a key figure in the Bengals' picture from the very beginning,

combining with Paul and Mike Brown to bring the professional football franchise to Cincinnati.

Sawyer, along with the Browns, represented the Cincinnati group at the many league meetings held prior to the awarding of the franchise.

The young business executive also played a part in the realignment of professional football, participating in all the National Football League owners' meetings with Paul and Mike Brown.

Sawyer, a member of a prominent Cincinnati family and now a resident of London, Ohio, is a frequent visitor to the Bengals' training camp and attends every game, home and away. On some occasions he flies his own plane to the city in which the Bengals are playing.

Sawyer is president of Orleton Farms and has ranches in Ohio, Florida, Montana and Pennsylvania. He is the son of Charles Sawyer, former Secretary of Commerce.

John and his wife, Ruth, have four daughters, Anne 19; Elizabeth, 17; Catherine, 14; and Mary, 10.



MIKE BROWN **Assistant General Manager**

Mike Brown is the assistant general manager and legal counsel for the Cincinnati Bengals.

Mike was one of the driving forces behind bringing professional football to Cin-

cinnati. Several years before the franchise finally materialized, Mike began action on the project with a detailed survey showing the potential of Cincinnati as a professional football market. Mike also played a big part in bringing about the merger in pro football which saw the American Football Conference and the National Football League combine in 1970. As assistant general manager, Mike handles all negotiations with the city of Cincinnati concerning the Bengals and Riverfront Stadium plus many contract matters.

A member of the Bengals board of directors, Mike did his undergraduate work at Dartmouth, where he was a quarterback, and received his law degree from Harvard. He worked in the Cleveland Browns front office for a number of years and also was associated with a Cleveland law firm.

Mike and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Katie, 8; and a son, Paul, 4½.

JOHN MURDOUGH

Business Manager

The Bengals business manager is John Murdough, a veteran of 33 years as a major league sports executive.

Murdough was one of the first men employed by Paul Brown after the Cincinnati Bengal franchise was founded late in 1967. Murdough was with the Cincinnati Reds for 26 years before resigning to join the Bengals in November, 1967.

The stadium, situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway, has a seating capacity of 56,200 for football.

The four-level circular stadium has a diameter of 700 feet encompassing approximately eight and a half acres.

The Riverfront Stadium features a complete playing surface of AstroTurf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will accommodate 4500 autos. Three parking decks plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium. A total of 75 buses and 100 taxi cabs park on the plaza level. Two four-lane streets run underneath the stadium, adjacent to the parking area. Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages and cartoons through a computer.

The twice-daily workouts are held on two practice fields and a regulation football field adjacent to the fieldhouse.

The team is housed in Clarence E. Pickett Hall, a four-story dormitory; dining room facilities are located in nearby Pyle Center. As a fan, you are cordially invited to both tour the campus and watch the Bengals in action.
