PAUL BROWN

Paul Brown, the football mastermind, has put his magic touch to the Cincinnati Bengals.

Brown, a giant among football coaches, guided his third-year Bengals to the championship of the American Football Conference's Central Division in 1970. In accomplishing this feat Brown brought his team back from a 1-6 mid-season mark and put together seven straight victories to edge out the Cleveland Browns, the team he founded in 1946, for the title.

Paul Brown was voted coach of the year for the tremendous job he did with the youthful Bengals.

"I am pleased and honored but can only accept on behalf of our staff and the players," said Brown. "This is the finest staff I have ever had and the credit should really go to them and the players."

The Bengals' 8-6 record is the best ever posted by a third year expansion team and their 15 victories in three seasons is also a record. Brown has made the Bengals a team to be reckoned with in just three years.

Brown will be entering his 37th year of coaching this season and he has achieved a brilliant record of 311 victories, 102 defeats and 16 ties.

He was recently honored by the New York Chapter of the Professional Football Writers Association for "meritorious service to football." Brown has played a major role in "shaping" the National Football League and has charted the course in pro football.

Along with Art McBride, he helped form the Cleveland Browns in the old All-American Football Conference after World War II. The Browns won 52, lost only four and tied three in four championship seasons before moving into the National Football League.

Many experts said Brown's Browns couldn't make it in the NFL and the schedule-maker called for an early showdown, matching Cleveland with the Philadelphia Eagles, the defending NFL champions.

Brown's team not only routed the Eagles, 35-10, in that game, but went on to win the world championship in Cleveland's first year in the NFL, beating the Los Angeles Rams, 30-28, in the title game.

Brown's 13-year record at Cleveland after joining with the NFL was a glittering 115-49-6, and only once during that stretch did the Browns ever have a losing year.

Brown's start with the Bengals has, perhaps, been even more impressive.

Starting in the old American Football League in 1968, the Bengals had a 3-11 record, but in the process they scared some teams to death. In 1969 they did more.

In the AFL's final season the Bengals were 4-9-1, and started out by beating Miami, San Diego and the to-be world champion Kansas City Chiefs in their first three games.

Last season, after the AFL-NFL merger, the Bengals moved into the Central Division of the American Conference and won it by winning seven straight games to finish with an 8-6 record.

Brown is responsible for making professional football what it is today and, of course, is one of the leaders in shaping its future.

Brown made pro football a science, a full-time business with a full-time staff when he began building the Cleveland Browns in 1946. He hired full-time assistants on a year-round basis and scouted college talent on a scale never before imagined by other professional teams.

His innovations include:

- First to employ a year around coaching staff.
- First to use notebooks and classroom techniques extensively.
- First to set up complete film clip statistical study.
- First to grade players from individual film clips.
- First to keep players together at a downtown hotel the night before home games as well as on the road.
- First to call plays from sidelines by rotating guards as messengers.
- Developed detailed pass patterns which opened specific defense areas.
- Made major contributions to improve science of defensive play to counteract pattern passing by others who followed his lead.
- First to switch some fine running backs to defensive specialists and explained "they were so good, I didn't want to waste them on offense."
- Invented face bars on helmets.
- First to use intelligence tests as a clue to player's learning potential.

After graduating from Massillon High School, Brown enrolled at Ohio State and later transferred to Miami where he became a fine runner and passer.

Brown's coaching career began in 1930 at Maryland's Severn Prep, a Naval Academy preparatory school. In two years his teams rolled up a record of 16 wins, one loss and a tie. Planning on a law career, Brown attended law school for a year and a half while coaching at Severn.

However, in 1932, he returned to his home in Massillon as football and basketball coach.

When Brown arrived at Massillon, the school had a stadium with a capacity of 5000. During his tenure, the school built a new stadium seating 21,000. Eight home games in the 1940 season drew 161,000 people, more than any college team in the state with the exception of Ohio State.

Brown coached the Massillon Tigers to one state championship after another and soon began receiving offers from small colleges throughout Ohio. But he was only interested in one job—head football coach at Ohio State University.

Paul reached his goal in 1941 and guided the Buckeyes to six wins, one loss and a tie. In 1942, he coached Ohio State to the national collegiate championship with a 9-1 record. Then came the war and he went to Great Lakes where he produced several outstanding teams.

He then moved into the pro ranks in Cleveland where he built football's greatest dynasty.

RIVERFRONT STADIUM

The Bengals' home is Cincinnati's beautiful Riverfront Stadium, located on the banks of the Ohio River.

The stadium, situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway, has a seating capacity of 56,200 for football.

The four-level circular stadium has a diameter of 700 feet encompassing approximately eight and a half acres.

The Riverfront Stadium features a complete playing surface of Astroturf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will accommodate 4500 autos. Three parking decks plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium. A total of 75 buses and 100 taxi cabs park on the plaza level. Two four-lane streets run underneath the stadium, adjacent to the parking area. Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages and cartoons through a computer.

A flood wall completely circles the outer perimeter of the stadium and sub-surface pumps, within the confines of the flood wall, will ensure protection of the playing field.

THE 1971 OUTLOOK

The young Cincinnati Bengals hope to pick up in 1971 where they left off a year ago when they won the American Football Conference's Central Division championship.

The surprising Bengals stunned pro football experts with a whirlwind finish that saw Paul Brown's team win seven in a row after losing six straight. The fantastic finish enabled the Bengals to become a division champion in just three years, tops for an expansion team.

The prospects for this season are bright because the Bengals are a youthful team still learning and maturing. But the road ahead is tough.

"Even though we won a division championship we are not being misled," says Brown, who was acclaimed professional football coach of the year in 1970. "We are still putting down the foundation; still building a solid football team."

Much attention during training camp will be focused on the quarterback spot and the return of Greg Cook who was a sensation in his rookie season, but sidelined by a right shoulder injury last year.

While Cook was healing, Virg Carter took over the quarterback job for Cincinnati and led the team to the division title. Carter picked the team up and made it move.

The Bengals are hopeful they strengthened their offensive forward wall in the college draft.

Cincinnati went heavy for offensive linemen and made their first two choices a tackle and a guard.

First choice was big Vernon Holland, a 6-6, 270-pound tackle from Tennessee State. Second pick was Steve Lawson, a quick 6-3, 265-pound guard from Kansas.

"The development in this area is slower than at any other place, except perhaps at quarterback," said Brown. "But we're convinced that these two men can make it and will give us from eight to ten years of good football."

A POSITION BY POSITION LOOK

OFFENSE

QUARTERBACK—The Bengals will go to training camp this year with four quarterbacks—Virg Carter, Greg Cook, rookie draft choice Ken Anderson and Dave Lewis, who also is the club's punter.

Carter took over for Cook last year when the latter was shelved and led the Bengals to the American Football Conference's Central Division championship. The fiery Carter sparked the Bengals' drive for the title during the second half of the season when they snapped a six game losing streak and then went on to win seven in a row. Carter piled up some interesting passing statistics and also was a threat as a ball carrier.

Carter connected on 143 passes in 278 attempts for 1647 yards and nine touchdowns. He also showed he can run with the football, picking up 246 yards in 34 carries and scoring two touchdowns.

Cook, a sensation in his rookie season in 1969, recently underwent surgery for the second time on his injured right shoulder and he is expected to be ready.

Lewis is the Bengals' all-pro punter and also a quarterback, performing at that position during the 1970 pre-season games.

Anderson is the Bengals' third round draft choice from little Augustana College in Illinois. The 6-2, 215-pounder has a strong throwing arm, but like all rookies needs game experience.

RUNNING BACKS—The Bengals sport two veteran running backs who averaged four yards or better a try last year in Paul Robinson and Jess Phillips.

Robinson was a ball of fire in the second half of the season and finished with 622 yards in 149 carries for a 4.2 average. Phillips was the club's leading rusher for the second year in a row. Phillips piled up 648 yards in 163 attempts for a 4.0 average.

The starting duo was backed up by speedy Essex Johnson, who is entering his fourth pro season.

Ron Lamb, captain of the specialty teams, young Doug Dressler, a powerful runner, and Henry Dyer, who was obtained from Washington in a trade for Sam Wyche, are the other veterans returning at the running back position.

Two rookies—Fred Willis, a fourth round draft choice from Boston College, and Dave Buchanan, a free agent from Arizona State, were impressive in the Bengals' rookie camp and are expected to push the veterans. Both are hard runners and good receivers.

RECEIVERS—The Bengals are steep in speedy and lanky receivers.

All-pro tight end Bob Trumpy heads the list. Trumpy was hampered by an ankle injury last season, missing three games, but was outstanding late in the season. He has the speed and hands to get the Bengals the quick score. Chip Myers was the club's leading receiver in 1970. The 6-5 Myers pulled in 32 passes for 542 yards for an average of 16.9 per catch.

Other veteran receivers in the Bengals' camp are Eric Crabtree, Speedy Thomas, Bruce Coslet, Paul Dunn and Tommie Smith. Rookie draft choice Ed Marshall, an 11th round selection from Cameron, also will be battling for a spot, as will veteran Mike Kelly and rookies Cookie Brinkman and Dave Knapman, three tight ends.

OFFENSIVE LINEMEN—The Bengals' two top picks in the 1971 draft—Vernon Holland and Steve Lawson—are expected to be big factors in the club's future.

The Cincinnati offensive line showed much improvement in 1970 and is expected to be better in 1971.

Veteran Ernie Wright will be entering his 12th season at one tackle spot while veteran Howard Fest and rookie Holland will probably battle it out for the other. Mike Wilson also is in the picture at the tackle slot.

Guy Dennis and Pat Matson will be back again as "messenger guards" and Rufus Mayes and Lawson will be on the other side of the line at guard. Rookie Jack Stambaugh, a 10th round pick from Oregon, will try to crack the lineup at guard.

The center post is held down by offensive captain Bob Johnson, who is entering his fourth season with the Bengals. Johnson has developed into one of the top centers in pro football.

Overall the Bengals' offensive line should show further improvement, especially if Holland and Lawson develop quickly.

DEFENSE

DEFENSIVE LINE—The Bengals defensive line was solid last year with improved performances from the veterans and outstanding play by Mike Reid, the cat-quick tackle. Reid has the potential to become an all-pro tackle. He has speed, size and intelligence. He won AFC rookie honors and was judged rookie of the year by Football News.

Tackle Steve Chomyszak also blossomed for the Bengals in 1970 and big things are expected from him this year. Defensive end Royce Berry is expected to have another fine season and further improvement is expected from Ron Carpenter, a rookie a year ago.

Nick Roman, who was out much of the 1970 season with an ankle injury, could be a factor at a defensive end slot as could Willie Lee Jones, who did a fine job filling in at tackle last year when Reid was injured, and rookie Ken Johnson. Draft choice Arthur May from Tuskegee also will be battling for a spot.

LINEBACKERS—The Cincinnati linebacking corps performed well in 1970 and with a year's experience behind it should be even better this year.

Key man is Bill Bergey the hard-tackling, hustling middle backer. Ken Avery and Al Beauchamp man the outside spots.

Chip Bennett, third round draft choice in 1970, will be back after missing the entire season because of a knee injury.

Backing up Bergey in the middle is Larry Ely, who is in his second year. Bill Peterson and Wayne McClure, a pair of three-year veterans, will be battling for an outside linebacking job as will rookies Mark Debevc and Gary Gustafson.

DEFENSIVE BACKS—The Bengals defensive backfield showed great improvement in 1970 and should develop further because of its youthfulness.

Ken Riley, who will be entering his third year, and 1970 "defensive rookie of the year" Lemar Parrish team to give the Bengals' an outstanding cornerback duo. Both were very effective last season.

Fletcher Smith appears to have found a home at strong safety after being shifted from corner. Ken Dyer, a third-year man who started last season, will be back at the other safety spot as will Sandy Durko, who was injured in the opening game in 1970.

The Bengals drafted four defensive backs—Fred Herring, Cornelius Craig, Irving Mallory and Sam Pearson.

THE KICKING GAME

The Bengals have what many term the best kicking game in professional football.

The punting chores are handled by Dave Lewis, top kicker in the National Football League last year with a 46.2 average.

The place-kicking is done by Horst Muhlmann, the soccer-style kicker from West Germany. Muhlmann led the Ben-

gals in scoring with 108 points, connecting on 25 of 37 field goal attempts. He hit on four of six from 50 yards or longer, best in the NFL.

PUNT AND KICKOFF RETURNS

Cincinnati's return and special teams were responsible in large part for the club's success last year. Lemar Parrish is an explosive kick return man and went all the way with a kickoff, punt and blocked field goal during the 1970 season. Parrish averaged 30.1 yards on kickoff returns while his running-mate Paul Robinson picked up an average of 25.9 yards a return. Rookie Buchanan also is a possibility as a kick return man.

"RETURNS" FAVOR BENGALS

The "return" was a big factor in the Cincinnati Bengals drive to the American Football Conference's Central Division championship in 1970.

The Bengals scored six touchdowns in 1970 by the return route as opposed to two in 1968 and only one in 1969.

Rookie Lemar Parrish led the way by returning a kickoff, a punt and a blocked field goal all the way for TDs.

Parrish scored two TDs on returns against Buffalo on November 8 in the Bengals' 43-14 victory. He scampered 95 yards with a kickoff and later picked up a blocked field goal and raced 83 yards for a score. Parrish's other TD return came against San Diego when he went 79 yards with a punt to give the Bengals a 17-14 victory.

Defensive end Royce Berry picked up two enemy fumbles and turned them into touchdowns. Berry ran 58 yards with a fumble by Cleveland and eight yards with one he picked up against the Bills.

Al Beauchamp, an outside linebacker, posted the other Bengal "return TD" when he picked up a fumble and rambled 25 yards against Houston in the Astrodome.

THE 1970 BENGALS

Paul Brown called the 1970 football season "the most gratifying and satisfying of my career."

And the reasons are obvious. In just three short years, Brown molded the Cincinnati Bengals into division champions and the best expansion team in the history of professional football. And, to top it off, he was voted professional football coach-of-the-year.

Brown, whose brilliant coaching career spans 36 seasons, guided his young Bengals to the American Football Conference's Central Division championship and a berth in the AFC playoffs.

The Bengals surprised the pro football world by walking off with the Central Division championship by nosing out their Ohio rivals, the favored Cleveland Browns.

The young Cincinnatians, with only one player with more than five years pro experience, got off to a bad start and were in last place with a 1-6 record at mid-season.

Then the club caught fire, won seven straight and clinched the division title and a berth in the playoffs.

The Bengals set a number of records for expansion teams:

- First expansion team to win a division title in three years.
- Most victories (15) in three seasons.
- Most victories (8) in one season.
- Longest winning streak (7) by an expansion team.

Statistically, Jess Phillips led the Bengals in rushing with 648 yards on 163 carries for an average of 4.0 a try. Paul Robinson picked up 622 yards in 145 carries for a 4.2 average.

Quarterback Virg Carter connected on 143 passes in 278 throws for a .514 average. His aerials gained 1647 yards and nine resulted in touchdowns. He had only nine passes intercepted.

Chip Myers was tops in the pass receiving department for the Bengals. The lanky Myers pulled in 32 passes for 542 yards, an average of 16.9. Jess Phillips was second with 31 receptions and Bob Trumpy third with 29.

Rookie cornerback Lemar Parrish topped the club in interceptions with five. Ken Riley had four.

Parrish also was the leader in kickoff returns with 16 for 482 yards, an average of 30 yards a return. The rookie star led the punt return category, too, with 200 yards in 25 returns.

Punter Dave Lewis finished with a lofty 46.2 average, best in the AFC. Lewis punted 87 times for 3964 yards.

Place-kicker Horst Muhlmann led the Bengals in scoring with 108 points. Muhlmann hit on 25 of 37 field goal attempts and made four from 50 yards or better. Robinson finished second in scoring with 42 points.

JOHN SAWYER . . . President

John Sawyer is president and one of the owners of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Sawyer along with Paul and Mike Brown led the drive to bring professional football to Cincinnati.

The young business executive also played a part in the recent realignment of professional football, participating in all the National Football League owners' meetings with Paul and Mike Brown.

Sawyer, a member of a prominent Cincinnati family and now a resident of London, Ohio, is a frequent visitor to the Bengals' training camp and attends every game, home and away. On some occasions he flies his own plane to the city in which the Bengals are playing.

In addition to his activities with the Bengals, Sawyer is an owner of the Cincinnati Reds baseball team and was a leader in the building of Cincinnati's Riverfront Stadium.

Sawyer is president of Orleton Farms and has ranches in Ohio, Florida, Montana and Pennsylvania. He is the son of Charles Sawyer, former Secretary of Commerce.

John and his wife, Ruth, have four daughters—Anne 16, Elizabeth 14, Catherine 11, and Mary 7.

MICHAEL BROWN . . . Assistant General Manager

Michael Brown serves in the key positions of assistant general manager and legal counsel for the Cincinnati Bengals.

Mike combined with his father, Paul, and club president John Sawyer in the initial drive to bring a professional football franchise to Cincinnati.

Mike played an important part in bringing about the new alignment in professional football. He also represented the Bengals in all negotiations concerning the city's new riverfront stadium.

A member of the Bengals' board of directors, Mike did his undergraduate work at Dartmouth, where he was a quarterback, and received his law degree from Harvard. He worked in the Cleveland Browns' front office for a number

of years and also was associated with a Cleveland law firm. Mike and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Katie, 5, and a son, Paul, 1½.

JOHN MURDOUGH . . . Business Manager

BILL JOHNSON

Offensive Line

BENGAL ATTENDANCE DATA

The Cincinnati Bengals played before more than a million fans in 1970.

Total attendance for the club's 21 games — 10 home and 11 away—was 1,097,130, an average of 52,149 per game. The Bengals drew 571,677 fans for seven regular season and three pre-season games at Cincinnati's Riverfront Stadium and 525,453 for seven regular season, one playoff and three pre-season road games.

The Bengals average attendance per home game was 57,167.

In the seven regular season home games, the Bengals attracted 407,757 fans for an average of 58,251 a game. Attendance for the three pre-season battles was 163,920, an average of 54,640.

The Bengals' top crowd of 60,157 was on hand for the regular season finale on December 20 and watched Cincinnati thrash the Boston Patriots to win the American Football Conference's Central Division title.

The second largest home crowd was 60,007 for the regular season game with the Cleveland Browns on November 15. The Bengals rewarded their fans that day with a 14-10 victory.

The largest crowd to watch the Bengals was the 83,520 in Cleveland's Municipal Stadium on October 11. The Browns won a thriller that afternoon, 30-27.

The three games between the Bengals and the Browns attracted 200,639 fans. That's an average of 66,879 a game. The Bengals' 1970 attendance figures are quite a contrast with those of the last two years when the team played its games in Nippert Stadium.

In 1969 Cincinnati played before 191,091 fans in seven home games in Nippert Stadium, an average of 27,299 per game.

In 1968, the Bengals home attendance for seven games was 180,362, an average of 25,766.
