



PAUL BROWN

Paul Brown, the football genius who founded the Cincinnati Bengals and Cleveland Browns, added further lustre to his brilliant coaching career during the 1969 season.

Brown was acclaimed American Football League Coach-Of-The-Year and in doing so became the only man to win the coveted award in both leagues. Brown was coach the year in the National Football League in 1951.

Brown led his young Bengals to a 4-9-1 record in a season which saw the Cincinnatians upset the Kansas City Chiefs, the eventual world champions, and hand the powerful Oakland Raiders their only regular season defeat. He also achieved his 300th coaching victory during the 1969 season.

The Bengals' 4-9-1 record enables them to become the best two-year expansion team in history. The Bengals have put together a two-year mark of 7-20-1.

Brown is looking forward to the 1970 season because of the realignment which finds Cleveland, Pittsburgh and Baltimore shifting over to the American Football Conference. The Bengals will be in the AFC's Central Division with Cleveland, Houston and Pittsburgh.

The Cincinnati coach provided the strong hand in bringing about the realignment which fosters natural rivalries as well as inter-conference play.

Paul Brown is entering his 36th year of coaching and the four victories achieved in 1969 give him 303 victories in his distinguished career.

Brown is responsible for making professional football what it is today and, of course, is one of the leaders in shaping its future.

Brown made pro football a science, a full-time business with a full-time staff when he began building the Cleveland Browns in 1946. He hired full-time assistants on a year-round basis and scouted college talent on a scale never before imagined by other professional teams.

His innovations include:

- First to employ a year around coaching staff.
- First to use notebooks and classroom techniques extensively.
- First to set up complete film clip statistical study.
- First to grade players from individual film clips.
- First to keep players together at a downtown hotel the night before home games as well as on the road.
- First to call plays from sidelines by rotating guards as messengers.
- Developed detailed pass patterns which opened specific defensive areas.
- Made major contributions to improve science of defensive play to counteract pattern passing by others who followed his lead.
- First to switch some fine running backs to defensive specialists and explained "they were so good, I didn't want to waste them on offense."
- Invented face bars on helmets.
- First to use intelligence tests as a clue to player's learning potential.

After graduating from Massillon High School, Brown enrolled at Ohio State but found that 135 pounds wasn't heavy enough for Big 10 football. He transferred to Miami where he became a fine runner and passer.

Brown's coaching career began in 1930 at Maryland's Severn Prep, a Naval Academy preparatory school. In two years his teams rolled up a record of 16 wins, one loss and a tie. Planning on a law career, Brown attended law school for a year and a half while coaching at Severn.

However, in 1932 he returned to his home in Massillon as football and basketball coach.

When Brown arrived at Massillon, the school had a stadium with a capacity of 5000. During his tenure, the school built a new stadium seating 21,000. Eight home games in the 1940 season drew 161,000 people, more than any college team in the state with the exception of Ohio State.

Brown coached the Massillon Tigers to one state championship after another and soon began receiving offers from small colleges throughout Ohio. But he was only interested in one job — head football coach at Ohio State University.

Paul reached his goal in 1941 and guided the Buckeyes to six wins, one loss and a tie. In 1942, he coached Ohio State to the national collegiate championship with a 9-1 record. Then came the war and he went to Great Lakes where he produced several outstanding teams.

After the war, Brown joined Arthur McBride and put together the Cleveland Browns.

His Browns dominated the All-American Conference and when they moved into the established National Football League they kept right on winning as Brown molded football's greatest dynasty.

RIVERFRONT STADIUM

The Bengals' new home is Cincinnati's beautiful Riverfront Stadium, located on the banks of the Ohio River.

The stadium, situated on a 48-acre site bounded by Second Street to the Ohio River and from Elm Street to Broadway, has a seating capacity of 56,200 for football.

The four-level circular stadium has a diameter of 700 feet encompassing approximately eight and a half acres.

The Riverfront Stadium features a complete playing surface of AstroTurf.

Parking facilities on the immediate site will accommodate 4500 autos. Three parking decks plus the plaza level, all 12 acre areas, completely surround the stadium. A total of 75 buses and 100 taxi cabs park on the plaza level. Two four-lane streets run underneath the stadium, adjacent to the parking area. Within a 12-block radius, there are 20,000 parking spaces.

A massive scoreboard, 20 feet high by 180 feet long, contains 24,000 lamps and is capable of displaying scores, messages and cartoons through a computer.

A flood wall completely circles the outer perimeter of the stadium and sub-surface pumps, within the confines of the flood wall, will ensure protection of the playing field.

BENGAL ATTENDANCE DATA

The Cincinnati Bengals played before 191,091 fans in seven home games at Nippert Stadium in 1969, an average of 27,299 a game. Total attendance (home and away) was 533,946, an average of 38,132. In 1968 the Bengals home attendance for seven games was 180,362, an average of 25,766. Total attendance (home and away) was 450,127, an average of 32,152.

1970 BENGALS OUTLOOK

Coach Paul Brown's Cincinnati Bengals have perfected their "bomb" and now they are working on a defense to go with it.

Quarterback Greg Cook and receivers Bob Trumpy, Eric Crabtree, Speedy Thomas and Chip Myers gave the Bengals a solid passing game in 1969 and, hopefully, it will be even better in 1970 with the added year of experience gained by the youngsters who make it go.

Cook, a sparkler in his rookie season, connected on long passes so often that it prompted one observer to remark: "When Cook is passing, it's first and goal from anywhere on the field."

The long gainer was instrumental in the Bengals upset victories over the Kansas City Chiefs, Oakland Raiders and San Diego Chargers last season.

"We came up with the long plays frequently last season," said Brown who was voted American Football League coach of the year in 1969. "We were able to move the football and score, but many times our biggest problem was keeping the other team from scoring. Our defense was lacking in certain areas at times.

"It was for that reason that our college draft was geared to the defense," added Brown, noting that 12 of the 17 Bengal selections are defensive players.

Leading the list is Mike Reid, the All-American defensive tackle from Penn State. Reid is 6-3 and weighs 258.

"We feel mighty fortunate that we were able to get Mike Reid since we were picking seventh in the first round," emphasized Brown. "He would have been our selection if we had had the first choice in the first round. We like his speed and agility, his ability to rush the passer and just the way he conducts himself all the way around. He's a class man, just the kind we want in our organization."

The Bengals second pick was another defensive tackle, Ron Carpenter, a 6-4, 270-pounder from North Carolina State. Carpenter, also an All-American, had been projected as a first round selection by Bengal scouts.

"We were kind of surprised to find him around in the second round," commented Brown. "He's big and fast and can make plays all over the field. He's a relentless, hustling type of player. We feel that Mike Reid and Ron Carpenter are 10-year football players."

In the third round the Bengals went for linebacker Chip Bennett, a hard-tackler from Abilene Christian. Bennett is 6-3 and weighs 236 pounds.

In addition to Reid and Carpenter, the Bengals have veteran defensive tackle Frank Parker, obtained during the winter as a free agent; and ends Royce Berry, Steve Chomyszak and Martin Baccaglio. Rookies Bill Trout, an eighth round pick from Miami, Fla., and Tom Truesdell, an

11th round selection from Ohio Wesleyan, Nick Roman of Ohio State and Nick Kukalicka also will be battling for a defensive line spot.

The Bengals' linebacking corps is headed by Bill Bergey, a 6-2, 240-pound, tackling demon who was AFL Defensive Rookie of the Year in 1969. Starters Bill Peterson and Al Beauchamp also are back along with Ken Avery, Ed Harmon, Wayne McClure, who was in the service last season, and Tim Buchanan. Draftees battling for a job will be Bennett, Larry Ely and Sam Wallace.

In the defensive backfield, the Bengals will have young Ken Riley, who was impressive in 1969; Fletcher Smith, Billy Hayes, Marvin Weeks, Phil Johnson and John Guillory fighting for cornerback jobs. Hayes, Weeks and Johnson are rookies.

Ken Dyer, Charlie King, Al Coleman, Mark Stewart and Sandy Durko are among those contending for safety positions. Bobby Hunt, a starter at safety for two years for the Bengals, retired to become an assistant coach with the Buffalo Bills.

The Bengals' offense revolves around Cook, who led the AFL in passing last season. Coach Brown believes Cook will be even better this year.

"The good thing about Cook and Bergey this season is that we'll have them at training camp all the way," emphasized Brown. "Last year they missed practically all of the camp because they were members of the College All Star team. Both have tremendous potential."

Sam Wyche is the Bengals back-up quarterback. Wyche played a big part in engineering the upset victory over the Chiefs, replacing Cook before the end of the first half and putting together the victory. Dave Lewis, a punting specialist and former Canadian League star, and Jim Del Gaizo, a southpaw passer from Tampa, also are in the quarterback picture.

The Bengals have big Bob Trumpy set at tight end. The 6-6, 225-pound Trumpy was All-Pro in 1969 and caught 37 passes for 835 yards and nine touchdowns. Backing up Trumpy is Bruce Coslet, who showed well in his rookie year before breaking his right knee cap.

Eric Crabtree, a veteran the Bengals obtained a year ago from Denver, and Speedy Thomas were the starters at the wide receiver spots most of last season. Crabtree was Cincinnati's leading pass-catcher with 40 grabs for 855 yards and seven touchdowns. Thomas caught 33 passes for 481 yards and three touchdowns.

This pair will get competition from Chip Myers, who made two sensational TD catches in the upset over Oakland; Tommie Smith, the former Olympic champion, and Jack Gehrke. Draftees who are considered good prospects are Joe Johnson, a 14th round pick, and Paul Dunn, a 13th round selection, and free agent Billy Waller, a former Xavier University star.

st year's starters at the running back positions were Paul Robinson, the 1968 AFL rookie-of-the-year, and Jess Phillips, a converted defensive back. Phillips was the team's leading rusher with 578 yards in 118 carries for an average of 4.8.

Other running backs on the Cincinnati roster are Clem Turner, Ron Lamb and Essex Johnson, all with the club last year, rookies Bill Bolden, Richard Smith, Roger Gann and veteran Bob Cappadona.

In an effort to bolster the offensive line, the Bengals traded defensive linemen Bill Staley and Harry Gunner to the Chicago Bears for Rufus Mayes, former Ohio State All-American tackle. Mayes was a first round draft choice for the Bears in 1969.

Besides Mayes, the Bengals list Howard Fest, Frank Peters and veteran Ernie Wright at the tackle posts.

Bengal guards include Pat Matson, Dave Middendorf, Guy Dennis, Mike Wilson, rookie Joe Stephens and Gary Kirner, obtained from San Diego in a trade for Andy Rice.

Bob Johnson, who is entering his third season, is the Cincinnati center. Johnson has been the team's offensive captain for the past two seasons.

The Bengals appear well set in the placekicking department with German soccer-style booter Horst Muhlmann. Muhlmann led the team in scoring with 80 points. He connected on 16 of 24 field goals, one for 51 yards, and 2 of 33 extra point attempts.

Punter Dave Lewis was signed during the off-season. Lewis led the Canadian League in punting for three years.

Paul Brown believes the Bengals are right on schedule in their building process and is proud of the team's achievements in its first two seasons.

In both years the Bengals tied the record for victories by expansion teams. The Bengals won three in 1968 and four in 1969.

"We're still putting down the foundation and we have a lot of building to do, but we can see some progress," said Brown. "We're building with youngsters all the way."

"BENZOO"

The official mascot of the Cincinnati Bengals is Benzoo, a beautiful Bengal tiger.

Benzoo came to the Bengals early in 1968 while still a baby.

He can be seen daily at the Cincinnati Zoo except on those days when he is at Cincinnati's Riverfront Stadium roaring for the Bengals.

Benzoo appears at all Bengal home games.

JOHN SAWYER . . . President

John Sawyer is president and one of the owners of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Sawyer along with Paul and Mike Brown led the drive to bring a professional football franchise to Cincinnati.

The young business executive also played a part in the recent realignment of professional football, attending all the owners' meetings with Paul and Mike Brown.

Sawyer, a member of a prominent Cincinnati family and now a resident of London, Ohio, is a frequent visitor to the Bengals' training camp and attends every game, home and away. On some occasions he flies his own plane to the city in which the Bengals are playing.

In addition to his activities with the Bengals, Sawyer is an owner of the Cincinnati Reds baseball team and was a leader in the building of Cincinnati's Riverfront Stadium.

Sawyer is president of Orleton Farms and has ranches in Ohio, Florida, Montana and Pennsylvania. He is the son of Charles Sawyer, former Secretary of Commerce.

John and his wife, Ruth, have four daughters — Anne 15; Elizabeth 13; Catherine 10, and Mary 6.

MICHAEL BROWN . . . Assistant General Manager

Michael Brown serves in the key positions of assistant general manager and legal counsel for the Cincinnati Bengals.

Mike combined with his father, Paul, and club president John Sawyer in the initial drive to bring a professional football franchise to Cincinnati.

Mike has played an important part in bringing about the new alignment in professional football which goes into effect this season. He also represented the Bengals in all negotiations concerning the city's new riverfront stadium.

A member of the Bengals' board of directors, Mike did his undergraduate work at Dartmouth, where he was a quarterback, and received his law degree from Harvard. He worked in the Cleveland Browns' front office for a number of years and also was associated with a Cleveland law firm.

ke and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Katie, 4, and a son, Paul, four months.

JOHN MURDOUGH . . . Business Manager

John Murdough, a veteran of 29 years as a major league sports executive, is the Cincinnati Bengals' business manager.

Murdough was with the Cincinnati Reds for 26 years before resigning to join Paul Brown and the Bengals in November, 1967. While with the Reds he served as traveling secretary and business manager and became vice president of the organization in 1965.

The versatile Murdough has served in every capacity in the front office of a major sports franchise.

John and his wife, Helen, have two children, Debbie, 18, and John, 13.

ALLAN HEIM . . . Public Relations Director

Allan Heim came to the Bengals in December, 1967, from the Cincinnati Enquirer where he had been executive sports editor for eight years. He worked for The Enquirer for 12 years also serving as a general reporter and financial writer.

Heim is a native of Springfield, Ohio, attended Wittenberg College and graduated from Ohio State University in 1956 following a four-year tour of duty in the Air Force where he worked for the Air Force Times and Stars and Stripes in Japan and Korea.

He and his wife, Charlene, have three children, Allan Jr., 15; Julie, 13, and Steve, 11.

PETE BROWN . . . Director of Player Personnel

Pete Brown heads the vital player personnel department for the Cincinnati Bengals.

Pete became director of player personnel in 1969 after serving a year as assistant director. He also has been in charge of the club's scouting since its formation in 1968.

Pete, a graduate of Denison University, has played a big part in putting together the Bengals and a major role in the team's three college drafts.

Pete is single and lives with his father, Paul, in Glendale.

DOUG HAFNER . . . Assistant Director of Player Personnel

Doug Hafner is the Bengals' assistant director of player personnel.

Hafner joined the Bengals in 1969 after serving as personnel recruiter at Florida State University for three years. Prior to that, Hafner worked in the player personnel department of the Oakland Raiders.

Before going into football, Hafner coached baseball at the

University of Miami, Fla. He also played football at Miami where he is a graduate.

Doug and his wife, Nancy, have a daughter, Jena, 13.

ROGER NOBLE . . . Ticket Manager

Roger Noble heads up the Cincinnati Bengals' ticket department.

Noble came to the Bengals in 1968 from the Cincinnati Reds where he had served as ticket manager from 1961 to 1967. He had been with the Reds for 14 years.

Noble has played a key role in handling the numerous Bengal sellouts in the first two seasons and the large advance sale for 1970.

Roger and his wife, Carole, have seven children — Charlie, 11; Sharon, 10; Steve, 9; Lisa, 8; Jenny, 5; Kevin, 4, and Julie, 1.

MARVIN POLLINS . . . Trainer

Marvin Pollins has probably seen more players the last two years than any other professional football trainer.

Pollins cared for more than 200 players at one time or another during the Bengals first season and a substantial number last year.

Pollins joined the Bengals in 1968 after resigning his post as assistant trainer at Miami University where he had served for five years. He also was an assistant at Northwestern for two years.

Marvin and his wife, Merle, have a daughter, Karen, 3.

TOM GRAY . . . Equipment Manager

Tom Gray, who was associated with Paul Brown in Cleveland for many years, is the Bengals' equipment manager.

Gray, a native of Ravenna, Ohio, aided in the team's initial purchase of equipment and set up the club's equipment room at Wilmington College and Spinney Field, the Bengals' practice facility in Cincinnati.

Gray worked with the Browns before coming to the Bengals in 1968.

Tom and his wife, Bridget, have three children — Lori, 14; Allyson, 8, and Tom, 5.

GEORGE BIRD . . . Entertainment Director

George T. "Red" Bird rejoined Paul Brown in 1968 as the Bengals' director of entertainment.

Bird had been associated with Brown in Cleveland and before that at Massillon High School. Bird's halftime shows for the Bengals won wide acclaim and those he organized

Cleveland were rated the best in the National Football League.

Bird's Bengal Band entertains at all home games in addition to the visiting band he selects for the halftime show.

BILL JOHNSON

Offensive Line



Bill Johnson, former all-pro center, heads up the Cincinnati Bengals' offensive line. He's in his third year with the Bengals.

"Tiger" came to the Bengals from the San Francisco 49ers where he was a member of the organization for 20 years — nine as a player and 11 as an assistant coach.

Johnson is acknowledged as one of the top offensive line coaches in professional football and played the major role in putting together the Bengals' young forward wall.

While a player he was one of the top centers in professional football and was named to the Helms Foundation's All-Time Pro Bowl team.

Johnson was signed by the 49ers as a linebacker but broke his wrist early in the season. He took over the center job the next season and held it for nine years until he retired. Johnson played his college football at Texas A & M.

Bill and his wife, Dot, have three children — Bill Jr., 21; Sherilyn, 20, and Tommy, 12.

JACK DONALDSON

Offensive Backfield



Experienced Jack (J. D.) Donaldson is in charge of the Bengals' offensive backfield.

Donaldson is responsible in large part for the excellent passing game the Bengals displayed in 1969.

J. D. is in his third season with Paul Brown and the Bengals. Before coming to Cincinnati, he was an assistant coach with the New York Jets for five years.

Donaldson coached the Bengals' defensive line in 1968 and switched to the offensive backfield last season.

A graduate of Ohio State University, Donaldson coached at the University of Toledo with Clive Rush, now head coach of the Boston Patriots, before joining the Jets. Prior

to that he was a highly-successful high school coach in Perrysburg, Ohio, where he compiled a 38-8 record, won two conference titles and had two undefeated seasons. Donaldson is from Pataskala, Ohio. He and his wife, Patricia, have three children — Debbie, 21; Nettie Lou, 18, and John, 14.

Bill Walsh, who is in his third season with the Cincinnati Bengals, is in charge of the team's receivers.

Walsh played a major role in the formation of the Bengals' top notch passing game and the development of young receivers Bob Trumpy, Speedy Thomas and Chip Myers.

Walsh came to the Bengals in 1968 after coaching the San Jose team to a 10-4 record and second place finish in the Continental League. Before taking over as head coach at San Jose, Walsh was offensive backfield coach of the Oakland Raiders in 1966.

His coaching background also includes three-year stints as an assistant at the University of California and Stanford University and three years as a high school head coach. He was an outstanding player at San Jose State.

Bill and his wife, Jeri, have two sons — Steve, 14, and Craig, 10.



CHUCK WEBER

Defensive Coordinator

Chuck Weber, defensive coordinator and defensive backfield coach, is the newest member of the Bengals' staff. Weber is in his first season with Paul Brown and the Bengals in a coaching capacity.

Weber was a linebacker on Paul Brown's Cleveland Browns teams in 1955 and 1956. He played on two championship teams in the National Football League — the Browns in 1955 and the Philadelphia Eagles in 1960. He was defensive captain of the Chicago Cardinals (now St. Louis) from 1956 to 1958.

Before coming to the Bengals, Weber was an assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers for two years and an assistant with the Boston Patriots for four seasons. He is a graduate of West Chester State College, Pa.

Chuck and his wife, Ginnie, have five children—Charles, 12; Wayne, 10, Tracey, 8; Bruce, 3, and Scott, 2.



CHUCK STUDLEY

Defensive Line

Chuck Studley, former head coach at the University of Cincinnati, is in his second season as defensive line coach for the Cincinnati Bengals.

Studley coached the University of Cincinnati to a Missouri Valley Conference championship in 1964 and a co-championship in 1963. Studley also coached the University of Massachusetts to the Yankee Conference championship in 1960.

Studley was an All-American guard at Illinois and captained the 1951 Illini Rose Bowl team that won the Big 10 title with a 9-0-1 record. He also served as an assistant coach at Illinois for five years and was head coach at Alton High School in Illinois for three years.

Chuck and his wife, Peggy, have six children — Carole, 18; Doug, 17; Susan, 13; David, 11; Mike, 9, and Steve, 7.



VINCE COSTELLO

Linebackers

Vince Costello, who played for Paul Brown in Cleveland for seven years, is the Cincinnati Bengals' linebacker coach. He was an outstanding linebacker himself for 12 years while playing for the Browns and the New York Giants.

Costello came to the Bengals in 1968 after winding up his playing career. During his first season he played a big part in the development of middle linebacker Bill Bergery who was the American Football League's Defensive Rookie of the Year.

Paul Brown signed Costello for the Browns in 1956 as a free agent after the Ohio University graduate had played three seasons of minor league baseball. Costello was an outstanding football player at Ohio U. and is a member of the Bobcats' Hall of Fame.

Costello is a native of Magnolia, Ohio. He and his wife, Sally Ann, have six children — Carol, 10; Kay, 9; David, 8; Ann, 5; Susan, 3, and Mary Ann, 1.

THE 1969 BENGALS

Paul Brown's Cincinnati Bengals came through "Phase Two" of their building process with sparkling results.

The two-year-old Bengals were the surprise team of professional football during the early part of the 1969 season by virtue of their stunning upset victories over the World Champion Kansas City Chiefs and the rugged San Diego Chargers. In fact, the Bengals had a 3-0 record after the first three weeks and led the American Football League's tough Western Division.

The expansion Bengals delivered their final shocker in mid-season when they knocked off the previously-undefeated Oakland Raiders, 31-17, in the upset of the year.

The Bengals won more honors and awards for team and individual brilliance than any professional football expansion club in history.

The top accomplishment, and the one cherished most by Coach Brown and the players, was the 4-9-1 record. The four victories tied the record for expansion teams and the tie enabled the Bengals to better the old mark percentagewise.

"We are proud of what we accomplished in 1969 especially in view of the fact that we are a young team that is just in the beginning process of growing up," said Brown. "We're looking ahead with cautious optimism with the knowledge that we are young and still have plenty of building to do.

"It means very much to us to be the only team to defeat the Kansas City Chiefs and the only team other than the Chiefs to defeat the Oakland Raiders.

"These two victories were the high spots of the season for us and are very special to our young organization," Brown added.

Individual honors abounded for the Bengals and it was only fitting that Coach Brown won the top prize.

The Bengals' brilliant leader was named American Football League Coach-Of-The-Year for the way he molded his squad of youngsters and castoffs into a competitive team in just two seasons.

The Bengals themselves gave Brown another honor on the opening day of the 1969 season. Playing with heavy hearts following the early morning death of veteran linebacker Frank Buncom, the Bengals defeated the Miami Dolphins, 27-21, to give Brown his 300th victory in a distinguished 35-year coaching career.

"I'll never forget the day because of all the things that happened," commented a saddened Brown after the game as he reflected on the Buncom tragedy.

"This is the toughest day I've ever had as a coach," added the Bengal coach. "The squad was stunned by what happened, but they reacted the way Frank would have wanted them to."

Bengal tight end Bob Trumpy was honored for his splendid play by being named to the first unit of the All-Pro team. It was quite an accomplishment for a player who was fighting for a job during the Bengals' first training camp in 1968.

The 6-6, 225-pound Trumpy, who has exceptional speed for a big man, caught 37 passes for 835 yards and nine touchdowns. His average per catch was 22.6, third best in the AFL.

The Bengals' rookie twins — quarterback Greg Cook and middle linebacker Bill Bergey — made a big splash in their first season in professional football.

The 6-4, 220-pound Cook topped the AFL in passing with 106 completions in 197 attempts for a percentage of 53.8. Cook, who engineered the Bengals' upset victories with the bomb, passed for 1854 yards and 15 touchdowns.

The blond bomber also was named AFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by Associated Press and United Press International.

Bergey was named AFL Defensive Rookie of the Year and received similar honors from the AP and UPI.

Coach Brown and the Bengals are looking forward to 1970 for more reasons than most teams.

First, it'll be the third season of their development and the team is beginning to take shape as more and more players begin to establish themselves as regulars.

Second, the Bengals are looking forward to playing under professional football's realignment which puts them in a division with Cleveland, Pittsburgh and Houston.

Third, the Bengals will move into Cincinnati's new 56,200 seat Riverfront Stadium which will have an artificial playing surface. The Bengals used the University of Cincinnati's Nippert Stadium during their first two seasons.

"This is a big year for us in many respects," Brown emphasized. "We already have sold 48,000 season tickets and indications are that we can go over 50,000.

"The realignment appears to have worked out well for all concerned," adds Brown. "I'm sure that none of the teams who came in are sorry. As it turns out we (The American Conference) have the three true geographical divisions and should have some first rate competition.

That competition includes three games — one pre-season game and two regular season contests — with the Cleveland Browns, the team Paul Brown started in 1946.

There are big things ahead for the Bengals and their fans in 1970.


