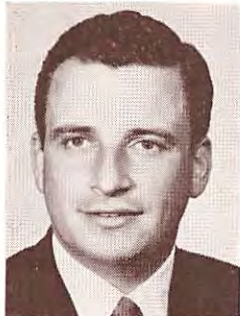

HEAD COACH and GENERAL MANAGER

17th season with Browns

33rd in coaching

Graduated Miami of Ohio '30

M.A. in Education at Ohio State 1940



Played quarterback at Massillon (Ohio) High School and Miami (Ohio) University . . . originally enrolled at Ohio State but transferred when he realized 135 pounds wasn't heavy enough for Big Ten football . . . planned on law career and attended law school for a year and a half while coaching at Severn, the Naval Academy's preparatory school . . . moved to Massillon High School for 1932 season . . . school was in athletic doldrums when he arrived . . . football team had won only one game in 1931 . . . led them to 5-4-1 record in first season . . . following two were 8-2 and 9-1 . . . then, from 1935 through 1940, his football teams won an unprecedented six consecutive Ohio high school championships and compiled an incredible 58-1-1 record . . . during the same period his basketball teams twice went to the State finals . . . also taught English and history while coaching . . . Ohio Coaches Association put on vigorous campaign and he was named head coach at Ohio State University for 1941 . . . his first Buckeye team finished with 6-1-1 record . . . his second (1942) won national championship after compiling 9-1 mark . . . suffered first losing season in 1943 when, with his own stars called into military service and using 17 year olds for a team nicknamed the "Baby Bucks", he faced a series of opponents loaded with Naval trainees . . . wound up winning 3 and losing 6 . . . moved to Great Lakes Naval Training Station for 1944-45 and resumed winning ways with 9-2-1 and 6-3-1 seasons . . . latter team, a green one, won final six games including the upset of the year, a 39-7 walloping of Notre Dame . . . meanwhile, Arthur B. McBride had obtained Cleveland franchise for projected All-American

Conference, play to begin whenever war ended . . . he had Arch Ward, late sports editor of Chicago Tribune prevail on Brown to take over as coach and general manager although Brown and McBride had never met . . . teams immediately became powerhouses and won four straight championships (1946-49) . . . 1948 club was undefeated while winning 15 . . . this was part of a record string of 29 consecutive games without a loss . . . moved into NFL in 1950 and beat champion Philadelphia Eagles on their field, 35-10, in season opener . . . went on to win Eastern Division and beat Los Angeles for championship . . . that was first of six straight division titles . . . only losing pro season broke this string in 1956 when team finished 5 and 7 . . . this was first year without quarterback Otto Graham . . . Browns bounced back in 1957 to again win the Eastern Division . . . altogether, his Browns have won 7 division titles and 3 championships in 12 NFL seasons . . . over this period Browns have best win-loss record in NFL . . . they stand 104-38-4 in regular season play for a fine .732 percentage . . . New York is second with 92-48-6, Detroit third at 83-58-5 and Chicago Bears fourth with 83-60-3 . . . credited with numerous "firsts" in pro football . . . first to employ year round coaching staff . . . first to use notebooks and classroom techniques extensively . . . together with his coach, Blanton Collier, set up first complete film clip statistical study . . . players were graded from individual film clips . . . first to keep players together at downtown hotel the night before home games as well as on the road . . . first to call plays from sidelines by rotating guards as messengers . . . credited with important role in developing detailed pass patterns which opened specific defensive areas . . . then made major contributions to improved science of defensive play to counteract pattern passing by others who followed his lead . . . switched some fine running backs to defensive specialists and explained, "they were so good, I didn't want to waste them on offense" . . . invented, and still receives royalties from face bars on helmets which practically eliminated the team dentist . . . also first to use intelligence tests as clue to player's learning potential . . . a master technician and teacher of sound fundamentals . . . thoroughness extends to areas away from playing field . . . insists players deport themselves as young business executives . . . always wear coats and ties while traveling and around team hotel . . . carries a 10 handicap in golf . . . also enjoys cards, the theater and music . . . lives in suburban Shaker Heights.

Coaching career began at Canton (Ohio) Central Jr. H.S., 1929-31 . . . moved to Canton McKinley H.S. under late Jim Aiken, 1932-35 . . . also head basketball coach there . . . held same two posts at Akron U., 1936-38 and Colgate, 1939-40 . . . became football assistant at Ohio State, 1941-45, and head coach in 1946 . . . head coach at Colgate, 1947-51, and assistant at U. of Pennsylvania, 1952-53 . . . joined Browns in 1954 when Blanton Collier resigned . . . was 180 lb. fullback and earned All-Ohio honors . . . taught biology and math in early coaching days . . . recently voted into Mt. Union Hall of Fame . . . first caught Paul Brown's eye as coach of Canton McKinley against Brown's Massillon teams . . . first hired by Brown for Ohio State . . . offered job with original Browns in 1945 but remained at Ohio State and later became head coach in unusual switch that saw Carroll Widdoes step down to assistant.

Coaching career began at Massillon Jr. H.S., 1939-40 . . . took over as head coach of Steubenville (Ohio) High School in 1941-42 . . . returned there for three more seasons, 1946-48 after three years in Army . . . moved to Ohio University as line coach for three years, 1949-51 . . . became end coach with Browns in 1952 . . . doubled as team's chief scout . . . shifted to defensive and backfield coach in 1954 when Paul Bixler joined Browns and took over as end coach and chief scout . . . was outstanding center at Miami of Ohio while working way through college . . . played next to Browns' coach Fritz Heisler who was a guard on same team . . . subsequently earned Master's Degree in Physical Education at Ohio State in 1950 . . . graduated from Massillon High School in 1933 after having played on Paul Brown's first team there . . . worked for one year before entering college . . . makes year-round home in Shaker Heights.



BLANTON COLLIER

OFFENSIVE BACKFIELD COACH

Began coaching career in 1928 when he became athletic director as well as head football and basketball coach at Paris (Ky.) High School . . . remained there 16 years through 1943 season . . . teams won three football and seven basketball championships during that time . . . enlisted in Navy in December, 1943 . . . became assistant coach of Great Lakes football team under Paul Brown in 1945 . . . turned down head coaching offer from large university to join original Browns in 1946 . . . served as backfield coach and was credited with devising many of team's successful pass and pass defense patterns . . . left Browns in 1954 to take over as head coach at University of Kentucky where he stayed eight years, through 1961 . . . rejoined Paul Brown in spring of 1962 . . . was a halfback and basketball forward during college days at Georgetown (Ky.) . . . considered a great teacher of football and meticulous technician . . . obtained Master's Degree in Education Administration at Kentucky in off-season of 1947.

Began coaching career with Santa Barbara Marines in 1945 . . . became assistant coach at Long Beach (Calif.) City College in 1946 . . . moved to Nevada as assistant 1947-50 and to Loyola of Los Angeles in same capacity in 1951 . . . entered pro coaching ranks as assistant with Chicago Cardinals in 1952 . . . returned to service in 1953 and coached San Diego Navy eleven . . . in 1954 he took over Naval Station team at Itsugi, Japan . . . following year he became assistant to Joe Kuharich at Washington and remained until 1959 when he moved to Notre Dame with Kuharich . . . is veteran of four seasons as a NFL end—two with Green Bay and two with Chicago Cardinals . . . won three letters each in football and basketball at Iowa where he starred with famous "Iron Men" of 1939 . . . his son is named after the great Nile Kinnick who was his close friend and teammate . . . chosen for 1940 College All-Star game . . . prepped at DePaul Academy in Chicago.

Began coaching career under Paul Brown at Massillon High School in 1938, immediately after graduation from Miami of Ohio where he'd been regular guard and made several All-Ohio teams despite weighing only 155 pounds . . . followed Brown to Ohio State and coached freshman team there in 1941 . . . he developed such outstanding stars of O.S.U.'s 1942 national champs as Bill Willis, Tommy James and Gene Fekete . . . all subsequently played for Browns . . . commissioned an Ensign in Navy in March, 1942 . . . stationed at De-Pauw University in 1943 and coached Navy V-5 Aviation Cadet team to an undefeated season . . . joined Browns in January, 1946 as part of the original staff . . . first met Paul Brown when, as a 135-pound youngster, he tried out for the Massillon team . . . he made it as a regular guard and played with the first of that high school's super teams . . . now resides in Aurora, Ohio.

EDWARD F. ULINSKI

Was outstanding guard with the Browns through four championship seasons in the All-American Conference, 1946-49 . . . rated as exceptional blocker and one of finest linemen ever to play for Browns . . . was a keen student of line play and demonstrated qualities that make a good teacher . . . this made him natural choice for former Browns' coach, Dick Gallagher, who hired him as line coach at Santa Clara when he retired as player after 1949 season . . . coached there three years, 1950-52, and shifted to Purdue University for 1953 season when Santa Clara gave up football . . . less than 24 hours after Weeb Ewbank resigned to take head coaching job at Baltimore for 1954 season, Ulinski's appointment to Browns' staff was announced . . . starred as defensive end, guard and blocking back while making Little All-American at Marshall . . . drafted by Detroit in NFL but chose Cleveland through contact with Browns' coach John Brickels who had known him while coaching high school team at Huntington (W. Va.) where Marshall College is located . . . also starred in basketball at Ambridge (Pa.) High School.

1961 season in review

Sunday, Sept. 17 Eagles 27, Browns 20 (60,671) at Phil.

Lou Groza, returning to action after sitting out the 1960 season, kicked off and Timmy Brown ran it back 105 yards for a touchdown. It was the longest run ever against the Browns and provided the winning margin in this exciting offensive battle. Cleveland tied it at 10-10 late in the first quarter on a 60 yard pass, Plum to rookie Charley Ferguson who was playing his first NFL game. Jurgensen and Walston combined on an 18 yard aerial to put the Eagles back on top 17-10. But the first of two costly fumbles, this one on the Philadelphia one yard line with only seconds remaining prevented a half-time tie. Groza tightening things with his second field goal shortly after the intermission and then the Brown defensive team went to work. Gain and Houston threw Jurgenson for successive losses, forcing a punt. But Bobby Mitchell fumbled the kick and the Eagles recovered. Six plays later Jurgensen threw to McDonald to make it 24-13. Walston added a field goal but the Browns bounced back with a touchdown and were marching toward a tying score when an interception by Brookshier ended the threat with one minute remaining.

Sunday, Sept. 24 Browns 20, Cards 17 (50,443) at Cleve.

Early mistakes had the Browns in the hole from the start in this one. Dale Meinert intercepted a Plum pass and ran it back 40 yards to set up a St. Louis score with only six minutes gone. Shortly after the start of the second quarter Mitchell fumbled on the Browns 25 from where it took just three plays to make the score read 14-0, Cards. After the kickoff the Browns marched 74 yards for their first touchdown. A 16 yard Plum to Watkins pass capped the drive which consumed nearly eight minutes. Cleveland narrowed it to 14-10 a moment later when Michaels picked off an Etcheverry pass and Groza cashed it by kicking a field goal. On the first play of the final quarter the Cards intercepted another Plum pass on the Browns 32 and moved close enough for a Perry field goal to make it 17-10. Here Jim Brown took a hand with a 30 yard carry and Plum followed with a 41 yard touchdown heave to Clarke, tying the score at 17-17. After the Cards stalled, Brown and Watkins moved the ball downfield and with 32 seconds left, Groza booted it through from the 19.

Sunday, Oct. 1 Browns 25, Cowboys 7 (43,638) at Cleve.

Four fumbles, only one of which was recovered, stalled the Browns offense in the first half but they still left the field with a 15-0 lead thanks to a bruising effort by the defensive team. Dallas managed only 26 yards while the Browns rolled up 179. Cleveland dominated the game throughout and rolled to a 25-0 lead before the Cowboys averted a shutout on a Merideth to Perkins pass late in the final quarter. Jim Brown accounted for one Browns touchdown and Rich Kreitling got the other two on passes. Groza kicked two 28 yard field goals.

1961 season in review

Sunday, Oct. 8 Browns 31, Redskins 7 (46,186) at Cleve.

The final score belies the closeness of this one which the Browns didn't lock up until the final seven minutes. A Groza field goal and two strikes from far out, one on a 52 yard Plum to Mitchel pass and the other on a 64 yard punt return by Mitchell, made it 17-0. But the 'Skins narrowed it to 17-7 just before halftime when Snead connected with Osborne. As sometimes happens in football, Washington had the statistical edge with 8 first downs to 5 and 136 total yards to 115. The going continued rugged until midway through the 4th quarter when Mitchell broke loose for a 31 yard scoring sprint. Moments later Don Fleming intercepted a Snead pass and the Browns put the game out of reach as Dawson found Renfro open in the end zone. This was the one game Dick Schafrath missed after being called to active duty in Air National Guard.

Sunday, Oct. 15 Packers 49, Browns 17 (75,042) at Cleve.

As Green Bay coach Vince Lombardi said later, "this was our perfect day. Everything we did was right. It was like watching your blackboard diagrams come true." And that's exactly what happened right from the start as Taylor swept 25 yards for a TD the first time the Packers had the ball. Next time they got it, he plowed over again from the one. Even at that the Browns might have made it tight in the 2nd quarter. They got a 58 yard drive going but settled for a Groza field goal. Then Taylor, deep in his own territory, fumbled and the Browns recovered. However, it was ruled that the whistle had blown. Green Bay kept the ball and marched 80 yards to make it 21-3 at the half. They followed it by taking the second half kickoff and rolling another 80 yards in six plays to make the game a rout. Cleveland managed two touchdowns on passes but the champions added three more and finished with a total of 487 total yards, largest against the Browns in some time. To add injury to insult, Plum suffered a dislocated thumb on the Browns' final play. Taylor got four of the Green Bay scores while Renfro and Nagler had one each for Cleveland. Hornung booted seven extra points and plunged for one touchdown.

Sunday, Oct. 22 Browns 30, Steelers 28 (29,266) at Pitts.

Len Dawson took over for the injured Plum as the Browns fought to recover from the Green Bay shocker. The first half was all Cleveland as the defensive team limited the Steelers to 63 total yards while the offense rolled up 201. But all they had to show for it was a 10-0 lead on Groza's 24 yard field goal and a six yard TD by Mitchell. A pass interception and a fumble by Jim Brown on the one held the score down. In the second half the Steelers began running wild. After they'd grabbed an errant Dawson toss, Bukich made it 10-7 with a pass to Dial. Aided by four more Dial catches they marched 74 for another touchdown and took the lead. Groza countered with a 36 yard

field goal to cut the Steelers' lead to 14-13 as the third quarter ended. Plum entered the game and the two club's engaged in a wild scoring final quarter. Mitchell counted twice more for the Browns but Groza's third field goal, from the 12 with less than three minutes left, provided the winning points as the game ended 30-28. Buddy Dial had his greatest day as a pro with nine catches for 235 yards. Altogether, the lead changed hands five times in this see-saw struggle.

Sunday, Oct. 29 Browns 21, Cards 10 (26,696) at St. Louis

Head coach Paul Brown resorted to trickery to overcome a potent St. Louis defense here. Paul Wiggin set the stage by recovering a Card fumble on the Browns' 46. Led by Jim Brown, they moved in to the 12 on fourth down. Groza came in for a field goal try but holder Bobby Franklin picked up the ball and fled around left end for a touchdown. St. Louis fumbled on the following kickoff, the Browns recovered and scored on a 12 yard pass from Plum to Renfro on the first play to make it 14-0. The Cards got on the board with a field goal but, halfway through the second quarter, Mitchell swept right end and scampered 56 yards to make it 21-3. As the second half opened, Plum fumbled on his own 45 and St. Louis recovered. Seven plays later Guglielmi punched over from the three to narrow the gap to 21-10. From here in the Browns stuck to the ground to keep the clock moving while protecting their lead. Neither team got inside their opponent's 35 until the final series when the Browns, with Jim Brown pounding away, moved to the 19 before a holding penalty set them back. During the entire game, Plum threw only nine passes, five of them in the first half. Season record: Won 5, Lost 2.

Sunday, Nov. 5 Steelers 17, Browns 13 (62,723) at Cleve.

This was the week Bobby Mitchell was called to active Army duty and the absence from practice showed at once as he carried only four times and lost eight yards. But it was the kickoff and punting teams who were ultimately responsible for the loss. Pittsburgh ran them ragged as Sample returned a punt 47 yards and a kickoff 59. Haley added another 90 yards on three runbacks. Despite these lapses the Browns were never behind until the final two minutes when Schnelker, played his first game for the Steelers, grabbed a 26 yard scoring toss from Bukich. Cleveland had led 10-0 at one point on a Jim Brown TD and Groza field goal but Pittsburgh tied it in the third quarter as a result of Sample's heroics. With 3:51 left in the game, Groza made it 13-10 with a 37 yard boot. However, Haley returned the kickoff 50 yards and Schnelker and Bukich finished the job. The Browns suffered an even more damaging blow in this quarter as Watkins dislocated a shoulder which sidelined him for four games. Coupled with Mitchell's military duties, it put a major crimp in the Browns running attack for the rest of the season.

1961 season in review

Sunday, Nov. 12 Browns 17, Redskins 6 (28,975) at Wash.

Washington was really up for this one after suffering a humiliating defeat the previous Sunday in New York. Cleveland had to win to stay in the race. The old kicking master, Lou Groza, got things going with a long 48 yard field goal when the first Browns march stalled. Less than five minutes into the second quarter, Jim Brown surprised everyone in the Stadium by lofting a beautiful 37 pass to Ray Renfro to make it 10-0. It was the first pass of his five-year NFL career. That was it for the half. But the 'Skins got a break early in the third quarter when Mitchell and Shofner collided fielding a punt and Mattson recovered on the one. Bosseler banged over but Aveni missed the kick and it was 10-6. The Browns took the following kickoff and, with Plum completing six passes, marched 75 yards before Kreitling caught the payoff throw to close out the scoring, 17-6. Washington threatened once more but Shofner intercepted on the goal line. Jim Brown, pressed closely by Green Bay's Taylor for the NFL rushing lead, rolled up 133 yards in 20 carries.

Sunday, Nov. 19 Browns 45, Eagles 24 (68,399) at Cleve.

Cleveland had to win this one to tie the Eagles for second place, one game behind New York. It turned out to be Jim Brown's big day as he tied his own NFL single game rushing record of 237 yards and added another 52 on three catches. The Browns rolled up a total of 505 yards, their best of the season and highest since 1954 against Redskins when they got 515. A Walston field goal gave the Eagle's a 3-0 lead at the quarter but Jim Brown went over from the 2 after a 60 yard drive to put the Browns on top early in the second. But the Eagles took the kickoff and marched 68 yards to take the lead once again, 10-7. This was cancelled almost immediately as the Browns followed with an 83 yard drive of their own to make it 14-10 at the half. Three passes to Renfro and five Brown carries, including the touchdown sweep, featured the push. On the first series of the third quarter Plum made it 21-10 when he hit Mitchell for a 28 yard TD. It looked like the see-saw scoring duel would continue as the Eagles followed the kickoff by rolling to the Browns 29 on just six plays. However, Bernie Parrish intercepted Jurgenson's pass and the Browns marched close enough for a Groza field goal and a 24-10 margin. The game broke open when the Eagles' fumbled Groza's kickoff and Galen Fiss recovered on their 23. On the second play of the final quarter Brown took it over. Moments later Brown scored again and, after the Eagle's matched it on a Jurgensen to McDonald pass, Mitchell ran 91 yards with the kickoff to make it 45-17. Two long heaves to Tim Brown gave Philadelphia another as the clock ran out on Cleveland's finest showing of the season.

1961 season in review

Sunday, Nov. 26 Giants 37, Browns 21 (80,455) at Cleve.

The largest NFL crowd of the year turned out for this one which the Browns needed to win to tie for first place. Cleveland drew first blood after ten minutes of play when Plum connected with Renfro for a 43 yard touchdown. In the second quarter Tittle evened it by circling left end for a five yard TD. They made it 14-7 when Patton intercepted Plum's toss on the Cleveland 38 to set up a five-play scoring drive. A pass interference ruling on the 8 helped. But the Browns came back strong and marched 85 yards to tie it again, 14-14. A 57 yarder from Plum to Renfro accounted for the biggest chunk. After the intermission the Giants put on two sustained drives culminating in a pair of Summerall field goals and a 20-14 lead. When Galen Fiss recovered Gaiter's fumble on the Giant 22 it looked like the Browns would again take over. But, with Renfro all alone in the end zone, Plum's pass was short and the big chance gone. Seconds later the third quarter ended with the Giants on the march again. It took only another minute before New York made it 27-14 on Gaiter's 11 yard run. After the kickoff, Dawson took over at quarter. But his third attempt was picked off by Barnes in the flat and carried 35 yards for the TD that put the game out of reach, 34-14. Ray Renfro had one of his biggest days in the losing cause by catching 7 for 166 yards and two touchdowns. Statistically, the Browns did far better than the score indicates by gaining 334 yards to the Giants 369.

Sunday, Dec. 3 Browns 38, Cowboys 17 (23,500) at Dallas

The football really took strange bounces in this game as the Browns built up a 21-0 lead in the first quarter although they ran only six offensive plays and had the ball for only 2½ of the 15 minutes. On the first series of plays, Don Perkins was hit by Bob Gain, fumbled and Bernie Parrish picked it up to go 34 yards for the touchdown. On the next sequence Eddie LeBaron, trying to pass, was hit from behind by Floyd Peters. Vince Costello caught it in mid-air and went 30 yards for a second TD. On the third series LeBaron's pass was intercepted by Parrish and returned to the Dallas 40. Jim Brown burst through for 25 yards, then, five plays later, plunged across to make it 21-0. Dallas finally scored on a LeBaron to Jim Doran pass but Groza got part of it back with a 20 yard field goal. Each team had 10 first downs in the first half but the Browns led 24-10. The Browns made their lead safe in the first minute of the final quarter but they had to work for it. Jim Brown reversed his field and ran 21 yards after catching a screen pass to climax an 80 yard drive which took 15 plays. That made it 31-10. Each team scored again to reach the final total of 38-17.

1961 season in review

Sunday, Dec. 10 Bears 17, Browns 14 (38,717) at Chicago

This game marked the first time in history that the Bears beat the Browns in a regular NFL game. And it took a startling form reversal to do it. Cleveland started off as though they were going to roll up a big one by taking a 14-0 lead with only 9½ minutes gone in the opening quarter. Jim Brown started it with a brilliant, twisting 77 yard touchdown run. Actually, he ran about 90 after taking Plum's desperation outlet pass far back of the line of scrimmage. Moments later Plum found Bob Crespino open in the end zone for 13 yards and the second touchdown. Lou Groza made good both points to run his NFL scoring total to 826, breaking the record set by Don Hutson between 1935 and 1945. Between the first quarter and final moments, Cleveland got only two first downs as the Bears took over and dominated play. But they couldn't score until the final quarter when Galimore went over for one and Brown passed 64 yards to Coia for the other. Leclerc won it with a 9 yard field goal with only 4½ minutes left. Time ran out with the Browns on Chicago's 9 yard line.

Sunday, Dec. 17 Browns 7, Giants 7 (61,084) at New York

The Browns still had a chance to tie Eagles for second place as this one started on a gloomy afternoon which required lights all the way. It turned out to be an old fashioned defensive battle with New York having a decided edge early and Cleveland taking over in the second half. Poor punting kept the Browns bottled up and, late in first quarter, gave the Giants the ball on the Browns' 36. On the fifth play Wells took a 7 yard z-out pass from Tittle in the end zone and Giants led 7-0. Jim Brown totaled 45 yards in first half but Browns never got closer to goal than Giants' 49 yard line. Halfway through third period Browns took over on own 45 and scored in four plays. Payoff was a 38 yarder which Leon Clarke caught for the TD to tie it at 7-7. Both teams missed field goal tries from scoring range in second half. Late in fourth quarter news of the Eagles' win in Detroit was posted on the scoreboard and, with it, the Browns' chances for second went glimmering. At about the same time Cleveland had one more big chance but a pass was dropped on the 5 yard line and Groza's field goal try from the 48 in a 4th and 3 situation was short. As the Giants' needed only a tie to clinch the Eastern Division title, they played it safe in the final two minutes and finished in a 7-7 deadlock.
