# ARTHUR B. MODELL, Owner

Born: June 23, 1925 at Brooklyn, New York

A redoubling and intensifying of efforts to return the Cleveland Browns to the high level of past successes is the chief objective of Art Modell this year.



Two consecutive losing seasons on the football field don't set well with the hard-working Modell, who takes enormous pride in the Browns' positive accomplishments and is deeply affected by the adversity the club has encountered of late.

Modell thrives on challenges, and re-establishing the Browns to their former eminence starting in 1976 and continuing into the coming years is a top-priority task he is pursuing with all of his well-known vigor.

"I fully intend for the Browns to become a dynasty again, and I fully expect it," says Modell. "There was a period when we had 80,000 fans for 17 consecutive home games. Those were the days I enjoyed. We'll be back there very soon, we'll be back competitively, and with big crowds."

While the Browns are Modell's over-riding chief interest, they are by no means his only one. Yet nearly everything else he plunges into has the betterment of the Browns as his ultimate goal. That includes widespread activity in National Football League affairs, and the immense job of refurbishing Cleveland Stadium which Modell shouldered 3 years ago.

Dramatic improvements in the 45-year-old Stadium already are very much in evidence—luxurious loges, thousands of new and more comfortable seats, better rest room and concession facilities, revamped electrical and plumbing systems, general cleaning and painting, much better lighting, improved parking, and fresh this year is a lowered (by two feet) and completely re-sodded playing surface for both football and baseball. And there is more coming, too.

Modell has been motivated by king-sized tasks such as those involving the Browns and Stadium for as far back as he can recall. As a youth of 15, after seeing his parents struggle through the depression, he got his first job as an electrician's helper in a Brooklyn, N. Y., shipyard and went nights to finish high school.

By his own standards a fair athlete with being a baseball catcher as his strongest suit, he had to relinquish sports at an early age to help his parents make ends meet. Modell went on to join the Air Force in 1943 and following World War II enrolled in a New York City television school.

The same foresight and imagination that have aided Modell so much in pro football led him into formulating and directing the first regular daytime television show in New York, and possibly the entire nation. In 1954, he moved into the advertising business with one of the country's most successful agencies, the L. H. Hartman Co. in New York City.

Modell took the giant and daring step that transformed him from advertising executive to majority owner of the Browns in March, 1961 and pro football has been the better for it ever since.

Although competition throughout the league has intensified greatly in recent years, Modell takes pride in the fact the Browns remained at or near the top longer than any other team in pro football. Among the rewards were the 1964 NFL title and 6 trips to post-season playoffs or championship games (1965, 1967, 1968, 1969, 1971 and 1972).

It was Modell who developed the pre-season doubleheader idea that proved so popular for a decade. Economics led to a change in the format to several single home games starting

the summer of 1972, but a portion of the proceeds still goes to charities sponsored by The Cleveland Press and The Plain Dealer.

It was Modell, always a trendsetter, who took another major and dramatic step in the spring of 1969 by agreeing to shift the Browns, along with Pittsburgh and Baltimore, to what had been the American Football League. The realignment cleared up a major roadblock in the merging of the NFL and AFL.

Modell served as president of the NFL from May, 1967, to March, 1970, and has been on numerous league committees, especially those involving labor negotiations and television. Last fall, he was the foreman of the Cuyahoga County Grand Jury. At the conclusion of his term, he made several suggestions on improving procedure that were lauded in legal circles.

Joining him in many humanitarian interests that benefit the Cleveland community is his wife, Pat, since their marriage July 25th, 1969. They have two sons, John, 16, and David, 15, from Mrs. Modell's previous marriage. The Modells recently purchased a new home in the Lake County community of Waite Hill, about 20 miles east of downtown Cleveland.

## PETER HADHAZY

Executive Assistant to the President

Born: February 9, 1944 at Debrecen, Hungary

Newest member of the Browns' front office staff and a person expected to be an important aide to Art Modell is Peter Hadhazy.



In making the announcement of Hadhazy's move to the Cleveland organization last February, Modell indicated that he would be involved in all facets of the club's operations. Modell has known Hadhazy throughout his period of ownership of the club and had been impressed by him almost from the first when Hadhazy was a high school youngster working part-time in the NFL office in New York.

As a matter of record, all of Hadhazy's employment since his graduation from Iona College has been in professional football with the league office, the New England Patriots and now the Browns. He had come to the United States with his parents as a youngster from Hungary where he was born.

Hadhazy enrolled at Iona on a tennis scholarship and is still rated as one of the best tennis players in the NFL.

At the NFL office, Hadhazy did specialized work on financial projects, contracts and player relations. In addition he handled many administrative responsibilities in connection with staging the Conference championship games and the Super Bowl. In 1969 he was elevated to the position of Director of Player Personnel for the NFL, a post he held until joining New England in July, 1971 as administrative assistant to the then General Manager Upton Bell.

In January, 1973 he advanced to the position of Assistant General Manager when Chuck Fairbanks assumed the dual jobs of General Manager and Head Coach of New England.

Hadhazy and his wife Rita have 2 daughters — Andrea, two, and Deana born last March.



# FORREST GREGG, Head Coach

3rd season with the Browns, 7th in coaching

Born: October 18, 1933 at Birthright, Texas

Graduated Southern Methodist University, 1956

A man of unwavering confidence in his own ability and that of his players despite the many pitfalls of last season, Forrest Gregg is moving into his second year as head coach of the Cleveland Browns with the same determination to succeed that marked his more than a decade as a player.



"There was a definite turn-around in attitude and performance in the last 7 games of the 1975 season," says Gregg, citing the maturing of some of the younger players as one of the keys.

"The men never quit battling, and responded to what we asked of them. We have a lot of sound players, people with ability and character. I'd have to credit most of the improvement to them."

Although his first year as head coach turned into a nightmare of injury and defeat he never dreamed could happen, Gregg has the built-in fortitude to match his imposing physique and deep-throated voice.

"It's hard for me to be discouraged, no matter what has happened," he said at the height of last year's adversity. "I believe in these football players. And if you believe in the people you're working with and in what you're doing, you know this can't last forever."

Things did get better, too, with 3 victories in the last 5 games, a banner year for Greg Pruitt, improved defensive work, and the emergence of rookies like Oscar Roan, Mack Mitchell, Dick Ambrose, Tony Peters and Bob Jackson.

Their work, along with that group of proven veterans, form the nucleus for what Gregg is firmly convinced will be a much better season in 1976.

The big, rugged-looking Texan brought impressive credentials to his most important assignment so far in pro football. A background of 15 playing seasons, mostly under famed teacher-coach Vince Lombardi at Green Bay; All-Pro honors as an offensive lineman; participation in 3 Super Bowl victories; and a number of seasons as an assistant coach at Green Bay and San Diego.

Gregg grew up in Birthright, Texas, a town located east of Dallas and named after a distant relative, and nearby Miller Grove. His first taste of competitive football came at yet another nearby town, Sulphur Springs.

He broke in as a defensive tackle despite never having seen a game of football in his life, and did so well that he earned a scholarship to Southern Methodist University—as an offensive lineman. That, in turn, led to him being picked in the second round of the 1956 draft by the Packers.

The Pack was in deep trouble on the field when Gregg joined them, and were in even deeper when he returned in 1958 after 21 months of military service. Then came the late Lombardi and one of the more dramatic turnabouts in NFL history.

Gregg was a key figure in Green Bay's glory years through much of the 1960s, and at one stretch was named to the Pro Bowl 7 out of 8 years.

"At the end of my playing career, I knew I had gotten absolutely all I could ever get out of myself as an athlete," he recalls. It was then that the teaching and philosophy of

Lombardi began to pay off for Gregg in the coaching field.

The 6-4, 240-pound Gregg is his own man, though, and says, "There was only one Lombardi and I don't expect there ever will be another. You can't pattern yourself after someone else. No. two people feel alike, or react alike, to things that occur on or off the football field.

"As a coach, I demand a lot and I expect a lot. If I don't get it, I start looking to someone else."

Gregg and his wife, Barbara, reside in the Cleveland suburb of Brecksville with their two children — Forrest Jr. and Karen.

## **RAYMOND BERRY**

**Coach, Receivers**

One of the premier pass catchers in NFL history joins the staff this season as successor to Doug Gerhart as the Browns' receiver coach.

The name Raymond Berry is indelibly etched in pro football annals for his accomplishments with the Baltimore Colts from 1955 through 1967. As the favorite and most dependable receiver for famed quarterback Johnny Unitas, Raymond led the league in receiving in 1958, 1959 and 1960.

Despite the passage of time, Raymond's name still is easily found among all-time NFL records, and is even more prominent in Baltimore's history for club records he owns outright. Among the latter are career totals of 631 catches for 9,275 yards.

The most deserving of all rewards, however, was being named to Pro Football's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, in 1973.

A native Texan, Berry starred at Southern Methodist University before turning pro. After finishing his career with the Colts, he entered coaching as an assistant on the Dallas Cowboys' staff in 1968, and went to the University of Arkansas 2 years later. He comes to Cleveland from Detroit where he coached the past 3 seasons.

He and his wife, Sally, have 2 daughters, Suzanne and Ashley, and a son, Mark. They reside in Brecksville, Ohio.

## **BLANTON COLLIER**

**Coach, Quarterbacks**

When invited to forsake the scouting department, where he had been since stepping down as Cleveland's second head coach after the 1970 season, Blanton Collier literally jumped at the opportunity.

"I told Art Modell and Forrest Gregg I'd do anything to help the Browns," said Collier. "I'm excited to be back in the game. I guess I'm sort of a coach-aholic. It's in my blood."

"Blanton is one of the great football strategists of all time," says Modell. "The book says he's 69, but he's more like 48 going on 30. He's a very vibrant man."



One of Collier's first duties in pro football was working with Otto Graham in the late 1940s. Graham always credited Collier with helping him become one of the game's all-time great quarterbacks.

A native of Millersburg, Kentucky, Collier coached at the University of Kentucky between terms with the Browns. During his term as head coach of the Browns, the team won 76, lost 34 and tied twice for one of the better records in pro football during the 1963-1970 period. Cleveland won 1 league title, 4 conference championships, 3 division crowns and twice finished second.

Blanton and his wife, Mary Forman, reside in Aurora. They have 3 daughters and 7 grandchildren.

## WALT COREY

Coach, Linebackers

The almost instant success of Dick Ambrose as the Browns' hard-hitting rookie middle linebacker marked Walt Corey's first year as the club's new linebacker coach and overseer of Cleveland's weight and conditioning program.

A strong interest in intensive body-building helped direct Corey's future after he completed his college career at the University of Miami (Fla.) as a 180-pound defensive end.

Corey embarked on a personal weight program that boosted him to 235 pounds in 6 months and earned him a free agent trial with the Dallas Texans (later the Kansas City Chiefs) in the American Football League. He won the job and played from 1960 through 1966.

Walt also instituted the club's first off-season weight program in 1964. He entered coaching at Utah State in 1967, returned to Miami in 1970, and became Kansas City's linebacker-strength coach in 1971, positions he held until joining the Browns' staff last year.

Walt and his wife, Jane, have three children: Kathy, Carla and Mark. The family home is in North Olmsted, Ohio.

## ROD HUMENUIK

Coach, Offensive Line

Despite numerous injuries and the necessity for considerable changing of personnel and positions, the offensive line in its first year under Rod Humenuik helped the Browns average 4.2 yards a rush. That figure was better than the league average of 4.0 yards, and was surpassed by only 4 other teams.

In addition, the Browns also improved their protection for the quarterback and reduced the total sacks by 10.

The University of Southern California benefited from Rod's work at guard from 1956 through 1958. He then entered pro ball under head coach Bud Grant at Winnipeg in the Canadian League and helped the club gain the playoffs each year along with capturing the prized Grey Cup in 1961 and 1962.

Although the illness of one of his children took Humenuik

away from pro football for a while, he remained active as a coach on the high school and junior college levels.

Rod returned to USC as offensive line coach under John McKay in 1966, and the Trojans appeared in 4 consecutive Rose Bowl games. He moved over to California State University in 1971, then coached the Toronto Argonauts' line under John Rauch for 2 seasons before coming to Cleveland.

Rod and his wife, Susie, have three daughters: Kim, Kerry and Kelly and one son Mike. The Humenuiks live in Brecksville, Ohio.

In a sense, the pro football career of Billy Kinard has come full circle with his appointment as the Browns' new defensive backfield coach this year. It was Cleveland that first drafted him out of the University of Mississippi exactly 20 years ago.

Billy went on to perform as a defensive back with Green Bay in 1957 and 1958, and with Buffalo in 1960 after a one-year taste of coaching at Daytona Beach (Fla.) High School.

Coaching became Billy's fulltime occupation in 1961 when he became an assistant at Auburn, followed by terms as an aide at Florida (1964-1966), Georgia (1967-1969) and Arkansas (1970) before he became the first alumnus ever to serve as head coach at Ole Miss.

The Rebels posted a 10-2-1 record in 1971, their best season in 8 years. Billy left Mississippi after the 1973 campaign and returned to pro football as defensive backfield coach at Green Bay. Last year, he was the Packers' director of research and development.

Kinard and his wife, Kay, have 2 children: Billy Jr., attending Auburn University, and Kathy. The family resides in Broadview Heights, Ohio.

When Dick Modzelewski was given the additional responsibility of defensive coordinator this year after 8 years as defensive line boss, head coach Forrest Gregg said:

"Mo is a very knowledgeable coach and has been in the business a long time. He's done his homework well. He does an excellent job getting the most out of the people working with him and he has the respect of the players. There isn't anything more you can ask."

Mo still is fired with all the enthusiasm that drove him to become one of the better defensive tackles in pro football. Last year his pride and joy was the steady development of first-round draft choice Mack Mitchell at right end to fit in

perfectly with Dick's longtime mainstays, tackles Jerry Sherk and Walter Johnson.

Washington drafted Modzelewski in the second round out of Maryland in 1953 and 2 years later sent him to Pittsburgh. But Mo first found his real niche with the New York Giants starting in 1956. He became part of the famed "Fearsome Foursome" and did much to help the Giants win the league crown and 4 conference titles in 7 years.

The Browns acquired Mo in exchange for receiver Bob Crespino in 1964, and Cleveland immediately went on to win the NFL championship that year. He ran his consecutive game playing streak to 180 games before retiring after the 1966 season. He scouted for Cleveland the following year, then was appointed to the coaching staff for the 1968 season.

Dick and his wife, Dorothy, have 4 children: Mark, Laurie, Terrie and Amie. The Modzelewskis make their home in Cleveland Heights, Ohio.

Getting peak production from men under his command is a recognized talent of this Clevelander, who returned "home" a year ago to handle the Browns' offensive backfield.

Greg Pruitt promptly had his finest pro season with 1,067 yards rushing, and more than doubled his previous reception total with 44. It was a pattern Sefcik set at Baltimore in his 2 seasons there where Lydell Mitchell rushed for 1,720 yards in 2 seasons, and led the entire NFL in 1974 with 72 catches.

Sefcik helped Benedictine High School bring the state title to Cleveland in 1957 as a 5-foot-8, 158-pound halfback. He still found time as a youth to sit in the bleachers at Cleveland Stadium for 50 cents in the hope of catching placekicks by Lou Groza.

National fame came to George at Notre Dame, followed by an immediate start on a coaching career. First stop was Niles (Ill.) High School, then back to Notre Dame a year later as freshman coach under Hugh Devore.

When Ara Parseghian became head coach of the Irish, Sefcik stayed on to coach the receivers for 6 years before going to the University of Kentucky as offensive coordinator under Johnny Ray. He left Kentucky in 1973 to join Baltimore.

George and his wife, Loretta, have 3 children. They live in Strongsville, Ohio.

Don Cockroft continues to be the most accurate of all active field goal kickers in the American Conference and his

punting last year was third best in the AFC.

Cleveland also might have had the top kickoff return in the NFL had not Billy Lefear suffered a broken leg on his 13th return, 1 short of the number required to qualify. Lefear's average was 31.7 yards, the same as league-leader Walter Payton of Chicago.

Cockroft twice has led the league in field goal accuracy, and has become one of the Browns' all-time point producers under Tabor's guidance. Tabor also is credited with helping Greg Pruitt lead the AFC in kickoff returns 2 years ago.

Among the players Tabor worked with on their way to pro stardom during his 8 years as a coach at Southern University were Rich Jackson, Isiah Robertson, Frank Pitts, Al Beauchamp and Pete Barnes.

Tabor also coached at Texas Southern, Wiley College, Ft. Valley State and 4 years on the high school level in Port Arthur, Texas. In 1967 and 1968, he scouted for the New Orleans Saints. He joined the Browns from Southern U. in 1972.

Al and his wife, Ernestine Rounette, have 3 children. There are twins Reginald and Regina, who are 13, and 12-year-old Alvin. The family resides in Elyria, Ohio.

## **ED ULINSKI**

### **Film Coordinator**

Mack Mitchell, Oscar Roan, Tony Peters, Dick Ambrose and Robert Jackson were among the prime new talent brought to the Browns last season alone through the scouting setup.

Nussbaumer, a three-sport star in college at Michigan, played with the Washington Redskins, Chicago Cardinals and Green Bay Packers as a receiver and defensive back until an injury ended his playing days in 1951.

Hired by the Browns in 1965 as a scout after 11 years as the Detroit Lions' personnel director, Nussbaumer quickly was switched to receiver coach and helped in the development of Milt Morin, along with the continued improvement of Gary Collins and Paul Warfield.

Says Forrest Gregg, "There was no way he should have lasted until the 12th round of the draft—but we're glad he did" . . . in fact, when Gregg had occasion to talk with Dick's former college coach, Sonny Randle, during the summer, the Browns' head coach asked, "Do you have any more players like him over there?"

Randle's advice to a Cleveland scout had been, "Don't

weigh him, measure him, or time him—just play him" . . . Dick is on the somewhat short side for the position at an even six feet, but has a mountain of muscle among his 235 pounds . . . he looks like a boxer, and belts opponents like one . . . nicknamed "Bam-Bam" by his teammates.

"I've never been one for much finesse," he says. "In college, I just tried to run over people. Right through the secondary was a straight line to the goal line" . . . that was in his freshman year as a fullback . . . he later moved to defensive tackle as a 214-pound sophomore, and finally to linebacker his last two years.

Had one of his finest pre-seasons ever before the injury hit, and started the first 4 regular season games at the middle linebacker job Bob likes best . . . eventually gave way to rookie Dick Ambrose to allow his leg some healing time.

"The transition of different coaching concepts confuses some players, but Bob is a very willing person in taking on new ideas and is a hard worker," says assistant coach Walt Corey, who handled the Browns' linebacking corps for the first time last year.

Says Bob, "It was hard to come back and adjust to middle linebacker in 1973 after what I call my 'lost' years on the outside at San Diego" . . . required knee surgery for the second time after the 1973 campaign . . . first operation came after a 1969 pre-season game against Cleveland and cost him his rookie season.

Browns gave a first-round draft choice in 1974 along with second and fourth-round picks in 1975 to acquire Bob from the Chargers . . . relished the opportunity to return to his native northeastern Ohio area.

"If I didn't enjoy football, I don't think I'd be here," says Bob. "It's not worth the time and sacrifices, and the pain you go through, to play this game just for money. If you don't enjoy what you're doing, you're wasting your time and everyone else's."

Drafted No. 1 by San Diego and led the team in tackles in 1970 . . . following year set a club record by downing ball carriers 194 times, an average of 14 per game.

**PERSONAL:** Was named All-Mid-American Conference two years and the MAC's Lineman of the Year in 1968 at Miami . . . also picked for several All-America first teams and played in the Coaches' All-America, North-South, Senior Bowl

**PRO:** A bittersweet day he'll never forget occurred last October 19 in Denver when Don set 2 team field goal records, tied a league mark and had his best day punting, yet saw the Browns lose by a single point . . . ironically, it was



a final play 53-yard field goal by old pro Jim Turner that decided the game.

In the final analysis, however, it was another fine season for Cleveland's double-duty performer . . . he led the team in scoring for the seventh straight year, continued his excellent field goal accuracy with 17 of 23, and was fourth in the American Conference in punting with a 40.5-yard average.

By far the most prolific punter in Cleveland history, Don now holds 4 team records in that department . . . also has done excellent field goal work over the years, but still stands in the monumental shadow of Lou Groza in most facets of placekicking.

Did surpass the famed "Toe" twice in the Denver game, though, with 7 field goal attempts and 5 successes . . . Groza's peak days were 6 attempts against New York (1952) and Washington (1962) and 4 successes twice, the latter Cockcroft had matched on two previous occasions.

Don's longest successful three-pointer last year was 49 yards in the Denver game, when he also hit from 43, 42, 24 and 20 . . . his punting average that day was 47.7 yards, helped by his longest kick of the season, 57 yards.

Looking back on the game, he says, "It was one of my best days, yet one of the worst" . . . after tying Kansas City's Jan Stenerud's NFL record of 16 consecutive field goals, Don missed from 37 yards out and later saw a 27-yarder ricochet off the right upright.

**PRO:** Proved everything the Browns envisioned when they drafted Mack in the first round a year ago . . . stepped right in at defensive right end, played the entire season and was instrumental in the big improvement of the over-all work of the front four.

"Mack can be an outstanding defensive end," says Forrest Gregg. "The ideal situation would have been to not put the burden of playing fulltime on him all at once, but it will help him in the long run."

"He already has learned how to play the trap and the double-team, and he's starting to feel confident in what he's doing. In college, they had him 'reading', then taking off, but about mid-season last year he began taking off right with the snap."

Perhaps his best day as a pro rookie came against Kansas City when Mack sacked young quarterback Tony Adams 4 times and applied continuous pressure all afternoon . . . says Mack, "For a defensive lineman, sacking the quarterback is like catching a touchdown pass" . . . a stronger pass rush was the main reason Cleveland drafted him.

Fellow defensive end Ron East says, "Mack is going to be hellacious by 1976. He has the size, the speed, and best of all, he has a great attitude" . . . tackle Walter Johnson adds, "When Mack came here, he had speed and quickness, but no techniques. Mo (defensive line coach and coordinator Dick Modzelewski) has done a tremendous job of teaching him."

Tallest man on the team at 6 feet, 7½ inches, he nevertheless ran 40 yards in 4.65 seconds at the Browns' rookie day camp in May last year . . . long-ago middle guard Bill Willis was possibly the only faster Browns lineman in the opinion of veteran Cleveland observers.

**PERSONAL:** Went to Houston on a combination football-basketball scholarship, but found himself on the cage bench watching future pro players Dwight Davis and Dwight Jones compete . . . began concentrating on football after his sophomore year.

Captained his college team as a senior and had 33 quarterback sacks . . . named unanimous All-American and rated with Maryland's Randy White as nation's best defensive linemen in 1974 . . . single, resides in Diboll, Texas.

Has been pulling down passes with the surest hands on the team for a decade, then churning downfield with the drive of a bull . . . says, "Receiving comes naturally for me. The blocking is something I really have to concentrate on, though."

Physical problems marred his early pro years . . . a foot problem hampered his rookie season, a ligament torn away from the bone held him to 7 catches in 1967, and he underwent surgery for a herniated disc 88 days before the regular season opened in 1969 . . . made a miraculous recovery from the latter operation and played in the opener.

Milt's 87-yard catch against Philadelphia in 1968 still stands as a club record.

Mike's career . . . 23 completions in 36 attempts for a personal high of 298 yards and 2 touchdowns against the Cincinnati Bengals . . . the outburst snapped the Browns' 9-game losing string, and far surpassed his previous peak of 198 yards against the same Bengals in 1972.

It not only was the most impressive day in his 6 years with the Browns, but presaged an outstanding final 5 weeks . . . in that closing surge, he completed 92 of 164 passes for 1,022 yards and all 4 of his TD's.

Coming after a rash of early-season problems that led to some time on the bench, the fast finish could signal the emergence of Mike as one of the league's better quarterbacks . . . "I have the tendency to be self-critical, and I lost some self-confidence earlier, but I always felt it was just a matter of time," he said.

Commented Forrest Gregg, "We told him that if this team was going to win, he had to be the man to do it. The players rallied behind him, and when he had good games against Oakland, Cincinnati and New Orleans, it gave him confidence and encouragement" . . . Mike passed for 204 yards against Kansas City and 213 against Houston in the last two games.

Much of the credit goes to quarterback coach Blanton Collier in his first year back in a teaching capacity after 4 years of concentrating on scouting . . . "Blanton spent a lot of time with Mike on the passing game and it paid off," says Gregg. "Mike feels more involved and confident in what he's doing now."

A noteworthy example of the former Purdue star's strong work down the stretch was his engineering of a 97-yard drive to the winning touchdown against New Orleans . . . "Mike had to make key plays in that drive and the way he did is a sign the offense is maturing," said offensive tackle Doug Dieken.

One indicator of the maturing process that should make him more effective is that he scrambled only 18 times last season, by far the lowest total since he became a starting quarterback in 1972 . . . as he becomes more adept at finding receivers and getting rid of the ball quicker, the need to take off has lessened . . . remains an effective runner, however, with a career average of 5.8 yards per carry . . . better protection also has allowed him to stay in the pocket more.

Spectacular pass plays have dotted his pro career . . . 3 of the biggest dazzlers were a 42-yarder to Greg Pruitt for a vital third down following an unbelievable escape from on-rushing Pittsburgh Steelers in 1973; a pinpoint 38-yard strike to Frank Pitts in the closing minutes for the winning touchdown against San Diego in 1972, and a last-minute 51-yarder with Milt Morin for a 20-20 tie at Kansas City 3 years ago.

Was only the third college player selected in the 1970 draft and watched from the bench for 2 years before taking over from Bill Nelsen on September 24, 1972, at Philadelphia . . . led the Browns to a 27-17 victory and has started all but 6 games since that day.

Jim Brown did it 7 times and Leroy Kelly 3 times, the last big year coming in 1968.

The play that pushed Greg over the top was a sweep to the left from 14 yards out for his third touchdown of the day on a muddy, slippery field . . . later returned to put finishing touches on a 214-yard performance, only 23 shy of Browns' team record.

"He strikes the same fear O. J. (Simpson) does," said Chiefs' head coach and former Browns' defensive end Paul Wiggin. "He has great balance" . . . Greg called it, "The biggest day of my career."

Completed season with 1,067 yards and a 4.8-yard average despite his modest dimensions of 5 feet 10 inches and about 190 pounds . . . ripped off 50-yard gains against Kansas City and Cincinnati, team highs for the season, and also had the Browns' longest reception, 48 yards against the Bengals.

Chiefs' safety Mike Sensibaugh had this description from a defender's viewpoint: "The guy's unbelievable. He reminds me a lot of a deer, he's so quick. He plants that foot and suddenly cuts. I was lucky to get a hold of his jersey. That's all most guys get of him."

Wears tearaway shirts and went through 7 at a cost of \$140 on his memorable day . . . said equipment manager Chuck Cusick, "It was worth it. We buy about 10 dozen of those jerseys a year for Pruitt alone. A good indication of how the Browns are performing in a game is the number of jerseys Greg has ripped off."

Scored 8 TD's running, 1 receiving and his 54 points were the most by a Cleveland player other than kicker Don Cockroft in 4 years . . . ripped off 103 yards against Oakland's fine defense and a week later got 121 against Cincinnati . . . a 49-yard run through the Raiders set up a tying third-quarter TD although the 17-17 score didn't hold up . . . an even more remarkable effort was a 13-yard TD against the Bengals on which he squirmed out of the grasp of 2 Cincinnati players at the 10.

Says Greg, "A little guy has more incentive. He has to go harder all the time. It's developed my style of running, which is to keep moving. Sometimes when I'm following a big tackle or guard, the tacklers don't even see me. I sort of hide behind them. It works the other way, too, of course. I have to be careful how I position myself so that I can see what's out in front."

Considered one of the most exciting runners in Cleveland history, Greg also returned a kickoff 40 yards against Detroit and had a team high 30-yard punt return against Baltimore . . . total offensive yardage for last season was 1,798.

Also led team in rushing in 1974 with 540 yards, and headed entire American Conference in kickoff returns with 27.5-yard average . . . has been Browns' best punt return man each year since being a second-round draft choice in 1973 . . . was named the Browns' Offensive Player of the Year by Cleveland Touchdown Club in 1974 and played in the Pro Bowl at season's end.

Had Cleveland's longest run from scrimmage since 1968 with a 65-yard effort against Kansas City two years ago . . .

combined yardage that season was 1,769 after rolling up 976 his rookie year.

"I went to camp last summer in my best condition ever," says Greg. "I worked with weights to build the upper part of my body even more" . . . informed by Forrest Gregg prior to last season that he would play virtually full-time for the first time as a pro, Greg said, "I need that kind of confidence from my coach. It relieves some of the pressure. A lot of other guys my size are playing full-time in the NFL."

**PERSONAL:** At Oklahoma, he rushed for 1,665 yards in 1971 and 938 yards in 1972 despite having opponents keying on him . . . scored career total of 40 touchdowns in college and was named runner-up to Nebraska's Johnny Rodgers in voting for 1972 Heisman Trophy.

Stood only 4'-3" when he began participating in sports in junior high and was 5-7½ when he entered Oklahoma . . . played tight end in high school and caught over 80 passes as a senior.

Has returned to Oklahoma at conclusion of each of last three seasons to complete work on his degree in journalism.

Oscar is a couple years ahead of me when I came into the league. He didn't play or handle himself like a rookie. There are things he can do that I never could have done at that age. He's dedicated, he wants to be the best and I admire him for it."

In his very first regular season game, Oscar caught 6 passes for 69 yards at Cincinnati, and went on to finish his 14 starting assignments with 41 receptions, 463 yards and 3 touchdowns . . . averaged 11.3 yards per catch . . . earned the call over Morin 2 days before the opener after grabbing 8 passes for 152 yards in pre-season, and wound up 4th in UPI's NFL Rookie-of-the-Year voting.

Has the speed to get deep quickly, and is an excellent blocker, 2 important requisites for a pro tight end . . . he's a big target at 6 feet, 6 inches, has good hands and is an explosive blocker.

Most exceptional catch was a leaping, one-handed stab in the end zone against Cincinnati in the return match to trigger a 20-point fourth quarter rally for a 35-23 victory . . . "There was no way I thought I could reach that five-yard pass," Oscar admitted, "But I put my hand up as high as I possibly could and, praise the Lord, I got it. I felt as though someone was helping me."

**PERSONAL:** His high school track coach helped him gain coordination, and Oscar wound up on both the football and basketball squads upon entering UCLA . . . one of his teammates on the freshman cage squad was Bill Walton . . . Learned to run disciplined pass routes under Tommy Prothro, then transferred to SMU after Prothro took the Los Angeles Rams' head coaching job . . . married Linda Joyce Banks of Dallas, May 27, 1972 . . . active in Fellowship of Christian Athletes . . . son Mario born last May 5.

"He has deceptive speed, I found that out early. In the first few games, I underestimated his speed and underthrew him a number of times" . . . the Browns' new aerial combination was formed after Cleveland obtained Reggie from New England for a modest fourth-round choice the first day of the 1975 draft.

Best game last year came in rain and mud against Kansas City . . . caught 6 passes for 130 yards, including 1 covering 40 yards . . . caught 7, but for lesser yardage, against both New Orleans and Houston, and 6 against Cincinnati and the Oilers.

Suffered a torn knee cartilage when clipped in fourth game of season against Houston, but waited until January to undergo surgery . . . used to playing with pain . . . had right wrist fractured 4 games into 1974 season with Patriots, but continued playing with a cast for protection and wound up with 27 catches for 436 yards and 4 TD's.

"The only thing that is important to me is catching the football," said Reggie as he closed in on his most productive season since turning pro as a free agent with Dallas in 1968. "When I'm driving my car or just walking around, I can see a pass coming into my hands. That may be a selfish way of thinking, but if you fit it into a team concept, it's healthy."

"I've always had confidence in my ability," says Reggie. "I had to have because the odds were very much against me when I first went to Dallas and won a job. Later, when I twice was among the top receivers in the league, it proved to me I could do it with the best."

First major break came in starting for injured Lance Rentzel in Super Bowl V against Baltimore . . . foot surgery ruined 1971 season . . . signed by New York Giants as free agent after being released by Cowboys that year, then moved on to New England later in season . . . finally established himself with 44 catches in 1972 and 53 more in 1973.

Even last season, before the injuries took a hold he couldn't shake, Clarence picked off 2 passes against Minnesota . . . now has a career total of 15, including 5 in 1973 when he led the entire team.

A regular almost from the day he reported to the Browns after being drafted No. 1 in 1971 and quickly succeeded veteran Erich Barnes on the left side, Clarence now is the elder statesman of the Cleveland secondary at the age of 27 . . . the loss of Thom Darden to knee surgery early in pre-season put a tremendous burden on Clarence and he tried valiantly to help the newer members in the backfield.

Despite a deceptively slender build, is one of the hardest-hitting tacklers on the team . . . "Concentration is the secret of playing cornerback," says Clarence. "You can't commit yourself too quickly. You want to be aggressive, but not overly so.

"As for tackling, that's really mental. It's mostly desire, rather than technique."

Named to the AFC All-Star team in 1974 and chosen to play in the Pro Bowl at the conclusion of that season . . . also honored in 1973 along with Bob Babich and Bob DeMarco as the Browns' most valuable players.

Longest interception as a pro came on a 45-yarder for a touchdown in the 1973 opener against Baltimore . . . led team that year with 5 thefts . . . against Green Bay in the 1972 opener, he hurried 55 yards for his first pro TD after scooping up a blocked field goal attempt by the Packers.

By far the most honored of the Browns last season, Jerry climaxed it all with a typically strong performance in his third consecutive Pro Bowl game . . . prior to that was named for the second time in 4 seasons by Cleveland Touchdown Club

as the team's defensive player of the year.

Jerry's teammates also selected him Most Valuable Player on the Browns for the second straight year in balloting for Third Down Award sponsored by N.E.A. . . . was the only Cleveland player chosen on U.P.I.'s American Conference squad (second team).

A brand new honor, the first annual Bulldog Award sponsored by Mack Trucks, Inc., and voted on by the NFL's offensive linemen, cited Jerry as "outstanding defensive lineman of the year" in the entire league.

The honors again were richly deserved for Jerry's work in spearheading much improved defensive line from his right tackle post . . . began season by dropping Cincinnati quarterback Ken Anderson in the end zone resulting in a fumble recovered for a touchdown by teammate Charlie Hall in the opener . . . never let up in his weekly pressuring of opposing passers, while still playing a powerful game against the run.

Says defensive line coach (and now defensive coordinator) Dick Modzelewski, who has guided Jerry's development all 6 pro seasons, "He's the best defensive tackle in the NFL. If there's a better one, you're going to have to show me."

Mo points to one play last year in particular. "Jerry was knocked on his rear end, but got up and made a tackle 40 yards downfield," said the coach. "That's the way he plays football—all out pursuit all the time."

Recovered seventh career fumble against Kansas City, and also has 2 interceptions to his credit . . . one of most remarkable games came against San Diego in 1974 when Jerry made 8 solo tackles, assisted on several others, recovered 2 fumbles and batted down a field goal attempt and a conversion kick.

Has teamed with left tackle Walter Johnson since winning a job as the Browns' only rookie starter in 1970 . . . won Big Eight heavyweight wrestling title in college and credits experience in that sport in high school, junior college, and at Oklahoma State for much of his enormous strength and agility.

"What I try to do is get as ready as possible during the week," says Jerry in explaining his gridiron approach. "There are certain things I can do better against certain opponents. I also like to study a team's over-all offense to see if there is anything that I might be able to exploit."

"He's going to benefit the team, the fans and me," says Raymond. "We're all going to gain by this move.

"Paul is one of the most fluid receivers we'll ever see and his assets aren't all physical, either. He will have a great influence on our other players."

Originally chosen by Cleveland in the first round of the 1964 draft, Paul has compiled phenomenal figures in his 12 years of pro football . . . his original six-year term with Cleveland resulted in 215 catches for 4,346 yards, and 44 touchdowns . . . in five seasons with Miami, he caught 156 for 3,355 yards and 33 TD's . . . and last year, despite a hamstring pull that limited his playing time, he hauled in 25 passes for 422 yards and 3 TD's for the Memphis Grizzlies up to the point where the World Football League folded.

**Sunday, Sept. 21 Bengals 24, BROWNS 17 (52,874) at Cin.**

Down 24-3 midway through the third quarter, the Browns twice came within 1 yard of pulling even in the final period. Six plays from a yard out failed to produce the necessary touchdown and nullified an 8-yard scoring sweep by Greg Pruitt and an end zone recovery by Charlie Hall of a Ken Anderson fumble in the space of 48 seconds.

Cincinnati scored the first 2 times it got the ball on a 16-yard pass from Anderson to Isaac Curtis and a 14-yard run by Boobie Clark. Dave Green made it 17-3 at the half with a 44-yard field goal and Lenvil Elliott boosted the Bengal lead even more with a 3-yard run.

Rookie tight end Oscar Roan made a spectacular debut with 6 catches for 69 yards, and Pruitt carried 17 times for 66 yards, but the Browns' only other points came on an 18-yard field goal by Don Cockroft.

**Sunday, Sept. 28 Vikings 42, BROWNS 10 (68,064) at Cleve.**

Clarence Scott had 2 interceptions, and the Browns gained 250 yards against the tough Minnesota defense, but Cleveland gradually crumbled after trailing only 14-3 late in the first half.

Fran Tarkenton threw TD passes of 29 and 13 yards to John Gilliam and Chuck Foreman, respectively, and scored himself on a 2-yard rollout. Foreman and Robert Miller each tallied from a yard out, and Bob Lee passed 33 yards to Jim Lash for Minnesota's other touchdowns.

The Browns got on the board with a 38-yard Don Cockroft field goal, and a late end around option pass from Willie Miller to Reggie Rucker 26 yards away.

**Sunday, Oct. 5 Steelers 42, BROWNS 6 (73,595) at Cleve.**

It was all over by the half as Pittsburgh jumped to a 28-0 lead on 1-yard runs by Franco Harris and Mike Collier, and passes of 3 yards by Terry Bradshaw to John Stallworth and 57 yards by Joe Gilliam to Lynn Swann.

Cleveland briefly interrupted the assault on a 7-yard scoring run by Hugh McKinnis, but Pittsburgh answered with a 45-yard pass from Gilliam to Reggie Garrett, and a 3-yard run by Reggie Harrison.

**Sunday, Oct. 12 Oilers 40, BROWNS 10 (46,531) at Cleve.**

Cleveland took early leads of 3-0 and 10-3 on a 39-yard field goal by Don Cockroft and a 1-yard run by Hugh McKinnis, but the rest was mostly Houston as the Oilers won for the first time ever on the Browns' gridiron.

Dan Pastorini tossed 3 short TD passes to tight end Mack Alston, and Ron Coleman rushed for 110 yards to pace Houston. Skip Butler chipped in with field goals of 46, 33, 25 and 21 yards.

Billy Lefear returned 4 kickoffs 106 yards for the Browns, and Brian Sipe replaced Mike Phipps at quarterback late in the third quarter.

**Sunday, Oct. 19 Broncos 16, BROWNS 15 (52,590) at Denver**

A classic placekicking duel saw Don Cockroft set a team record with 5 field goals from 24, 49, 43, 20, and 42 yards, and veteran rival Jim Turner of Denver connect from 25, 48 and 53 yards. The latter won the game as time ran out, and tied a Bronco distance record.

Brian Sipe made his first start of the season for the Browns and completed 12 of 25 passes for 111 yards. Rookie

Dick Ambrose was given his initial start at middle linebacker and kept the job the remainder of the year.

Cockroft averaged 47.7 yards punting, his best of the season, and equalled Jan Stenerud's NFL record of 16 consecutive field goals before missing from 37 and then 27 yards. Game's only TD was scored by Denver's Jon Keyworth on a 1-yard dive in the fourth quarter.

**Sunday, Oct. 26 Redskins 23, BROWNS 7 (56,702) at Cleve.**

A 15-yard scoring pass from Brian Sipe to Oscar Roan brought the Browns to within 9-7 of the Redskins 11 minutes into the second half. But on the second play of the fourth quarter, Bill Kilmer passed 11 yards to Larry Brown, and with less than five minutes left rookie Mike Thomas scored on a 1-yard run to ice things for Washington.

Kilmer passed for 207 yards, and Thomas rushed 27 times for 124 yards. Sipe completed 11 of 20 for 117 yards, and Roan caught 5 for 71 yards for Cleveland.

**Sunday, Nov. 2 Colts 21, BROWNS 7 (37,285) at Balt.**

Cleveland didn't get on the scoreboard until 10:09 of the fourth quarter when Hugh McKinnis dived over the right side from 1 yard out.

The Colts corralled a first-quarter TD by Don McCauley from the 2, and a pair of second-quarter scoring passes by Bert Jones of 2 yards to Raymond Chester and 35 yards to Lydell Mitchell.

Right linebacker John Garlington was lost to the Browns for the remainder of the season after suffering severe knee damage on the opening kickoff. Brian Sipe started his third consecutive game, but Mike Phipps took over shortly before the half.

**Sunday, Nov. 9 Lions 21, BROWNS 10 (75,283) at Pontiac**

Will Cureton had his first pro start at quarterback for the Browns and threw a 12-yard scoring pass to Oscar Roan in the closing minutes, but it was too little and too late.

Detroit ran up a 14-0 halftime lead as Ray Jarvis caught a 62-yard pass from Joe Reed on the opening play to set up a 1-yard dive by Altie Taylor only 1:08 into the game, and Reed passed 21 yards to Jarvis early in the second quarter.

Shortly after the Lions' second score, Browns rookie Larry Poole suffered a broken arm after taking a pitchout 10 yards. A Don Cockroft field goal narrowed the margin early in the third quarter, but Detroit retaliated midway through the fourth quarter with a 67-yard interception runback by former Cleveland cornerback Ben Davis to ice the game.

**Sunday, Nov. 16 Raiders 38, BROWNS 17 (50,461) at Oakland**

The Browns kept it close for three quarters, but a 15-yard scoring pass from Ken Stabler to Fred Biletnikoff, a 31-yard pass from Stabler to Clarence Davis, and a 26-yard run by Davis settled the game for Oakland in the final 16 minutes.

Greg Pruitt's 10-yard run in the first quarter, and 10 more third-quarter points by Don Cockroft on a 25-yard field goal and Cleo Miller on a 1-yard run pulled Cleveland even at 17-17.

Mike Phipps, in his first quarterback start in 4 weeks, completed 14 of 30 passes for 116 yards and Pruitt rushed 12 times for 103 yards.

**Sunday, Nov. 23 BROWNS 35, Bengals 23 (56,427) at Cleve.**

Mike Phipps had the finest day of his pro career with 23 completions in 36 passes for 298 yards as Cleveland rallied from a 20-9 halftime deficit for the club's first victory of the season.

Billy Lefear keyed the day by returning the opening kickoff 92 yards, but fell and suffered a broken leg 2 yards short of the goal line. Greg Pruitt promptly carried over on the first play from scrimmage, and Don Cockroft made it 9-0 a short time later with a 27-yard field goal.

Ken Anderson passes of 35 yards to Bob Trumpy and 30 yards to Isaac Curtis, along with a 4-yard run by rookie Stan Fritts and a 21-yard Dave Green field goal, put Cincinnati ahead 23-12 before Cockroft answered with a 43-yard field goal.

Down 16-3 after three quarters, Cleveland rallied for a pair of touchdowns and a 1-point victory on a 22-yard pass from Mike Phipps to Reggie Rucker, and a sparkling 8-yard run by Greg Pruitt. The latter capped a 97-yard drive with only 3:12 left.

New Orleans built its lead on a field goal and a pair of 1-yard runs by Alvin Maxson. Don Cockroft got the Browns' first points on a 28-yard field goal in the third quarter.

**Sunday, Dec. 7 Steelers 31, BROWNS 17 (47,962) at Pitts.**

Two touchdowns in the space of 14 seconds shortly before the half helped Cleveland to a 17-10 lead before Pittsburgh rallied to pull out the victory. After Greg Pruitt scored on a 1-yard run, Willie Miller recovered a Mike Collier fumble on the ensuing kickoff and ran 17 yards to the Steeler end zone.

Terry Bradshaw and Franco Harris were Pittsburgh's big guns with the quarterback pitching 3 and 18 yards to Lynn Swann for a pair of third-quarter TD's only 46 seconds apart, and Harris running across from the 3 and 8-yard lines.

Rucker enjoyed his biggest day of the season with 5 catches for 130 yards, McKinnis rushed for 65 yards and Phipps completed 14 of 20 for 204 yards.

Mike Phipps had his third 200-yard game in 5 weeks with 24 of 42 for 213, and Reggie Rucker caught 7 for 79 yards. Burrough topped that with 5 receptions for 124 yards.
