

# ARTHUR B. MODELL

OWNER



Born 6/23/25, Brooklyn, N.Y. Purchased Browns 3/21/61

To a great extent, Art Modell's success embodies the so-called "American Dream"... from high school dropout, to successful businessman and finally to prominence in his profession.

Modell was just 15 when he first entered the labor force as an electrician's helper in a Brooklyn, N.Y. shipyard to help his financially strapped parents

survive the Depression. That forced the hard-driving Modell to finish high school via night classes and gave him a temporary divorce from sports (Art had received attention as a baseball catcher).

Modell joined the Air Force in 1943 (he was 18) and then enrolled in a New York City television school following World War II. Always an innvoator, Modell quickly produced and directed the first regular daytime television show in New York, and probably the nation. He moved into the advertising business in 1954 with L. H. Hartman Co. (in N.Y.), one of the country's most successful agencies. Soon after, he became a partner.

Modell, 35 at the time, made his most daring move March 21, 1961 when he purchased the Cleveland Browns. In 21 seasons of ownership, the Browns have earned the playoffs eight times and suffered just four losing seasons. In 1964, the Browns won the NFL championship and gained the title game in 1965, 1968 and 1969. Cleveland also advanced to the postseason in 1967, 1971, 1972 and 1980.

Modell's prominence and influence in the league is widely known. A Phoenix columnist polled NFL officials at last winter's league meetings and wrote that Modell was regarded as "the second most influential person in the league." As chairman of the NFL's broadcast committee, he was an important contributor to the league's new five-year television contract.

Business aside, Modell simply enjoys football. "It's exciting, great entertainment," Modell said. "The anticipation, the anxiety and emotional involvement of the game is exhilarating. The competition is super . . . The first Brown helmet out of the dugout; the reaction of the crowd, the electricity of the event and the hope for victory."

A staunch supporter of Commissioner Pete Rozelle and the NFL constitution, Modell served as league president from May, 1967 to March, 1970. His bold move to transfer the Browns to the American Conference, along with Baltimore and Pittsburgh, cleared a sizeable roadblock in the merging of the NFL and AFL, returning peace to football. Among many innovations developed by Modell was the preseason doubleheader concept that proved extremely popular for a decade (1962-71). (Major proceeds from the twinbill were

given to charities sponsored by the Cleveland Plain Dealer and the Cleveland Press).

The native New Yorker, who has adopted Cleveland as his home, has become a "mover and shaker" in the Northeast Ohio community. "I came to Cleveland as an out-of-towner and purchased one of the great loves of this community. I think I understand that responsibility and I'm thankful for the support the people of this area have given me and my family," Modell said.

Modell has attempted to repay for the support, not only with his dedication to make the Browns a winner, but his extensive involvement in other community projects. In 1974, he signed a 25-year lease with the city of Cleveland to take over management of Cleveland Stadium, which had become a financial strain on the city. With that signing, Art agreed to make at least \$10 million worth of improvements, with all of those already completed. He also lent his money and influence to refurbish the financially troubled Cleveland Sheraton Hotel at Public Square, which was turned into a downtown showpiece under the name of Stouffer's Inn on the Square.

Honors accorded him in the last year for his services and accomplishments have included: the "Champion of Brotherhood" distinction from the National Conference of Christian and Jews for Modell's "lifetime of service in combatting discrimination and prejudice"; the "Citizen of the Year" award from the Cleveland Board of Realtors; and the "United Way Commitment" honor for his and his team's involvement with that organization. Other recent presentations to him have come from the New York Football Writers' Assn.; the Sports Media Association of Cleveland and Ohio (SMACO) and the Variety Club ("Super Citizen Award").

A noted philanthropist, Modell has raised funds for St. Vincent Charity Hospital; has been a chief sponsor for the Muny Football Assn., and is a regular contributor to the many worthwhile charity and cultured activities of the Cleveland area. He is a trustee of the Cleveland Clinic Foundation and a member of the Greater Cleveland Growth Assn. Hiram College made him a member of its prestigious Garfield Society; John Carroll University awarded him an honorary LL.D degree (1979) and Wilberforce University has honored him for "Outstanding Citizenship". He has also served as foreman of the Cuyahoga County Grand Jury.

Along with the Browns, Modell serves on five boards of directors: National City Bank, Ohio Bell, Higbee Co., Twentieth Century Fox and Lake Erie Radio, operator of station WJW.

Pat Modell, Art's wife, is highly involved with the Cleveland community. She is on the board of Ursuline College and is active with the Cleveland Musical Arts Assn., the Cleveland Ballet, the Playhouse Square Foundation and Cerebral Palsy Assn. A former movie and television actress, Pat appeared in over 400 TV shows. The couple has two sons: John, 22, who is studying music at the California School of the Arts; and David, 20, who is a member of the Browns' front office.

# JIM BAILEY

# VICE PRESIDENT/GENERAL COUNSEL



Born 8/21/46, Wilmington, O. 5th Year Browns

Although maintaining a low public profile, Jim Bailey has become a dominant force in the Browns' organization. As vice president and general counsel, Bailey works closely with Art Modell in the every day operations of all facets of the club.

While handling the legal matters involving the Browns and Cleveland

Stadium (along with associate Rick Lease), Bailey negotiates player contracts and coordinates the Browns' other business interests, One of his current major projects is the moving of all departments of the Browns to one facility.

Bailey earned a football scholarship to Florida State after starring in three sports at Wilmington, O. H.S. (A defensive back at FSU, Bailey jokes that he was a major contributor to the confidence of teammate Fred Biletnikoff, who became the great Raider receiver).

Following law school at the University of Michigan, Bailey joined the Cleveland firm of Guren, Merritt, Sogg and Cohen as a fulltime associate in 1971. He was named a partner in 1976 and came to the Browns in June, 1978.

He and his wife Ann and their two daughters, Sarah and Jenny, live in Shaker Heights.

# PAUL WARFIELD

# DIRECTOR, PLAYER RELATIONS



Born 11/28/42, Warren, O. 3rd Year Browns Ohio State

Paul Warfield, now in his third year as a member of the Browns' administration, is continuing to take on more responsibility and have more input into the direction of the Cleveland franchise.

Three years ago (1980), Warfield, one of the most feared offensive threats in

the history of the NFL, gave up a career in television sports' reporting and joined the Browns as assistant director of pro personnel. After serving in that capacity for a year, Paul was promoted to become an assistant to team president Art Modell.

In that capacity, Warfield became involved in a number of "front office" functions, including contract negotiations. His main responsibility, however, was as liaison to the league office regarding NFL rules and player developments, including all waiver procedures. While he will continue in this

last capacity, a new responsibility for Paul will be as director of player relations, his third promotion in as many years.

"It's a somewhat new position in the league," Warfield explained. "But what we will be attempting to do is make it as easy as we can for our players to become a part of the Cleveland area community, which will help them be more productive as football players. We will also begin programs to help older players begin the transformation from athlete to business person. To a degree, we will function as a counseling service."

Warfield, who is a likely inductee to Pro Football's Hall of Fame and is eligible this year, played for the Browns from 1964 through 1969 and finished his playing career here in 1976 and 1977.

He helped Miami to three Super Bowls as a Dolphin (1970 through 1974). He played for Memphis of the World Football League in 1975. A consistent All Pro and Pro Bowl performer, Warfield averaged over 20 yards per catch in his career. (Thirteen year NFL statistics show 427 catches for 8,565 yards and an astounding 85 touchdowns).

Warfield, an All America at Ohio State as a running back, is a native of nearby Warren. His undergraduate degree was in physical education and he has a masters in radio/television from Kent State. His wife Beverly, also from Warren, is the public relations director for the Cleveland YWCA. They reside in Beachwood with their two children: Sonja. 12 and Malcolm, 9.

# COACHES

# SAM RUTIGLIANO VICE PRESIDENT and HEAD COACH



Born 7/1/32, Brooklyn, N.Y. 29th Year Coaching Tulsa

Sam Rutigliano, AFC coach of the year in both 1979 (UPI) and 1980 (UPI), is currently in his fifth season as head coach of the Browns. His teams have produced records of 8-8 (1978), 9-7 (1979), 11-5 (1980) and 5-11 (1981). The 1980 Browns won the AFC Central title, while the 1978 and 1979 teams

stayed in playoff contention until the final weeks of those respective seasons.

Owner Art Modell made Rutigliano a vice president of the Browns in July, 1981. "I gave the title to officially recognize the importance of Sam to every part of our organization," Modell said.

Rutigliano became head coach of the Browns on Dec. 27, 1977 after building a solid foundation that was carefully constructed through two decades of coaching on the high school, collegiate and professional levels. This is his 16th year in the NFL.

Prior to coming to the Browns, Rutigliano worked two years (1976-77) as receivers' coach under Hank Stram at the New Orleans Saints. In 1974-75, Rutigliano was a member of Charlie Winner's New York Jet staff as defensive backfield coach. After serving as offensive coordinator of the New England Patriots in 1971 and 1972 (under John Mazur), Rutigliano was the lone staff member retained by Chuck Fairbanks in 1973, serving as receivers' coach that season.

The Brooklyn native began his NFL career as the pass offensive coordinator for the Denver Broncos in 1967 (through 1970), working with Lou Saban, Rutigliano had worked under Saban in 1966 at the University of Maryland, first as a freshman coach and later as offensive coordinator.

Rutigliano, only the fifth Browns' head coach in the team's 36-year history, prepped at Erasmus High School, where he earned all scholastic honors as an end for the 1949 New York City championship team. After gaining junior college All-America honors at East Central (Decatur, Miss.) he enrolled at Tennessee; there he was a member of Gen. Bob Neyland's 1951 national championship team. Rutigliano then transferred to Tulsa, lettering under another West Point product, Bobby Dobbs.

Following his graduation from Tulsa, he started his coaching career on the high school level in the New York and Connecticut areas — Lafayette in Brooklyn, Greenwich (Conn.) and Chappaqua (N.Y.) high schools. During this period, Sam also earned a master's degree at Columbia University.

His collegiate coaching start came in 1964 when Rick Forzano invited Rutigliano to become his offensive coordinator at the University of Connecticut. An accomplished lecturer and motivational speaker, Rutigliano has a growing reputation as a television consultant. He worked the 1977 and 1979 Super Bowls, plus the 1979 AFC championship game, for NBC.

The often-quoted Rutigliano is noted for his bright, humorous style, but, according to Browns' owner Modell, "Those who mistake Sam's communication abilities and pleasant manner for softness do not last with the Browns. He's demanding and one of the most competitive persons I have ever met,"

Rutigliano is married to the former Barbara Abe and is the lather of three children — Paul, who is 25, Alison, 17, and Kerry, 15.

## DAVE ADOLPH

## LINEBACKERS



Born 6/6/37, Akron, O. 4th Year Browns 21st Year Coaching Akron University

More than any other Browns' assistant, Dave Adolph knows the tradition of the Browns and the importance of the team to the people of northeast Ohio. A native of nearby Akron (Mogadore High School), Dave is a long-time Browns' fan, who began his

coaching career at Cleveland's Shaw High School (1962).

Adolph joined the Browns as defensive line coach in 1979 and then took over the linebackers last season. His association with Sam Rutigliano started in 1965 when they were both assistants to Rick Forzano at the University of Connecticut.

As a student at Akron University, Adolph received awards for both his scholarship and leadership. He played guard and linebacker for the Zips and was selected as the Ohio Conference's top lineman in 1958, Following three years of Air Force duty as a commissioned officer (1959-61), Dave Joined the coaching profession. After Shaw and prior to Connecticut, Adolph served Akron as offensive line coach (1963-64). In 1969, he joined John Ray at Kentucky as defensive coordinator; he became linebacker coach at Illinois in 1973 and worked with Woody Hayes at OSU in 1977-78.

He and his wife Julie live in Bath, O., with their three sons: Michael, 19; Mark, 17; and Thomas, 12.

#### LEN FONTES

## DEFENSIVE BACKS



Born 3/8/38, Canton, O. 3rd Year Browns 23rd Year Coaching Ohio State

Len Fontes, now in his third season as the coach of the Browns' defensive backs, has had the rare opportunity to be associated with both his home state's top college team and his home area's professional football organization.

The Canton, O. native fulfilled a coaching dream when he joined the Browns' staff in 1980

and he helped Ohio State (as a player under Woody Hayes) to the national championship in 1957.

Fontes came to the Browns from the University of Miami (Fla.) where he was the secondary coach for three years (1977-79). Prior to that, he taught defensive backs at Eastern Michigan (1968), Dayton (1969-72) and Navy (1973-76).

Following his graduation from Ohio State in 1960, Fontes coached at three Ohio high schools (Logan, Canton Mc-Kinley and Mansfield Madison) until 1968. His Mansfield team won one conference title and, while he was at Canton McKinley, the school captured two state titles and missed a third in a showdown with Massillon.

A superb prep athlete, Fontes performed in four sports at Warren (Mass.) High School, winning state honors in football and baseball. Before entering OSU, he had a

tryout with the Boston Red Sox.

He and his wife Mimi have three children: Debbie, a recreational therapist, Kathy, a senior at the University of Miami (Fla.) and Leonard, a freshman at Dartmouth. His brother Wayne is the defensive coordinator for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

# JIM GARRETT

## RESEARCH DEVELOPMENT



Born 6/19/30, Rutherford, N.J. 5th Year Browns 22nd Year Coaching Utah State

The Browns' running backs' coach the past four seasons, Jim Garrett was promoted to Director of Research and Development by Sam Rutigliano last January. He is the first such director in Browns' history.

Garrett's new responsibilities will al-

low him to take advantage of the resources available to an NFL team that would aid in the study and evaluation of players and team strategies. Resources would include film, computers and scouting combine reports. "A number of teams have tried this approach, but only one has succeeded and that's in Dallas where Ermal Allen has the title of Director of Research and Development." Rutigliano said. "I'm sure we'll be a better team with Jim's input."

"I think there are two keys to making my new position important to the improvement of the team," Garrett said. "First, the relationship with the head coach has to be one of mutual respect and Sam and I have that. We've known each other for 22 years and we've worked together for the

last six (New Orleans and Cleveland).

"Second," Garrett added "the coaching staff has to put faith in the information I can produce. Having been part of

this staff, I'm confident this will happen."

Rutigliano noted that Garrett would be involved with game plans, trades and "serve as a type of monitor of our overall approach and philosophy. What I think will make Garrett especially effective in this position is the fact that he's been an offensive coordinator, a defensive coordinator and a special teams' coach, plus he worked in the Dallas system," Rutigliano said.

Garrett, who is 52, began his NFL career in 1966 when he joined BLESTO, a scouting combine. He joined the Cowboys as a scout in 1968 and two years later became a member of the Giants' staff where he stayed four years. He went back to the Cowboys in 1974 before gaining the head coaching job of the Houston Texans in the World Football League. He later joined Hank Stram's staff in New Orleans and stayed there until 1978 when he came to Cleveland.

Garrett earned four letters in football and baseball at Utah State and was named All Skyline Conference. After serving in the Army two years, he played briefly with Philadelphia and the New York Giants and then with British Columbia and Ottawa of the CFL. He then moved into coaching at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, Lehigh and as head coach at Susquehanna, where he compiled a 40-3-1 record and was later inducted into that school's Hall of Fame.

# PAUL HACKETT

# QUARTERBACKS



Born 7/5/47, Burlington, Vt. 2nd Year Browns 12th Year Coaching California - Davis

Although just 35 years old, Paul Hackett has already coached 12 years and has a reputation in the coaching world as a rising young star. The energetic Hackett is in his second season as teacher for the Browns' talented quarterback group.

Hackett first gained notoriety in 1974 when his prized pupil at the University of California was Steve Bartkowski, then the nation's leading collegiate passer and now the standout for the Atlanta Falcons. In 1975, Hackett tutored Joe Roth, who appeared a cinch for pro stardom until his untimely death. Hackett, who began his coaching career at California-Davis in 1970 and 1971, was at California from 1972 through 1975.

In 1976, Hackett joined the staff at Southern California as the quarterbacks' coach. In his first year at USC he guided the rapid development of Vince Evans, currently of the Chicago Bears. He also worked with Rob Hertel, who later played with the Philadelphia Eagles. Hackett's top student at USC set 17 NCAA, PAC-10 and USC records the player, of course, is Paul McDonald of the Browns.

Hackett proved his feel for the quarterback position as a student at California-Davis, where he led the Far Western Conference in passing his senior year (1969). Paul, who has a master's degree from California State - Sacramento, lives in Strongsville with his wife Elizabeth and their two children: David, 9, and Nathaniel, 2.

## ROD HUMENUIK

# OFFENSIVE LINE



Born 6/17/38, Detroit, Mich. 8th Year Browns 19th Year Coaching Southern California

Traditionally, the Browns have maintained an offensive line that has stood among the elite in the NFL. Such is the case today and has been that way since Rod Humenuik took control in 1975.

Humenuik's forces have allowed the Browns the luxury of having six 1,000-yard running back efforts in the last seven seasons. Greg Pruitt was escorted to 1,000 yards in 1975, 76 and 77; while Mike Pruitt has used Humenuik's charges the past three seasons for successful 1,000-yard campaigns. In fact, a major reason for the Browns' offensive prominence in the last few years can be traced directly to the strength of the Browns' front five.

Center Tom DeLeone and tackle Doug Dieken have progressed to Pro Bowl status under Humenuik, who was the only Browns' assistant held over when Sam Rutigliano became head coach in 1978. Adjusting to injury, a Humenuik strength, was severely tested last season when three starters (DeLeone, Dieken and guard Henry Sheppard) suffered significant problems, yet the Browns still finished fourth in the NFL in total yards.

Prior to coming to Cleveland, Humenuik coached the offensive line for the Toronto Argonauts (1973-74) under John Rauch. Rod was the head coach at California State-Northridge in 1971 and 72 after spending five seasons with John McKay at Southern California. The Trojans appeared in four consecutive Rose Bowls in that span.

Humenuik entered coaching in 1964 as an assistant at Fullerton Junior College. He was a star guard for USC from 1956 through 1958, then played three years under Bud Grant for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the CFL.

Rod and his wife Susie live in Brecksville with their four children: daughters — Kim, 22; Kerry, 20; Kelly, 16; and son Mike, 14.

# RICH KOTITE

RECEIVERS



Born 10/13/42, Brooklyn, N.Y. 5th Year Browns 9th Year Coaching Wagner College

Sam Rutigliano is very proud of his profession and firmly believes that a coach must first be a teacher. Those who have had the opportunity to watch Rich Kotite work the past four years have seen this philosophy in practice. Kotite is indeed a teacher and many

of his pupils have graduated to stardom.

The emergence of Ozzie Newsome and Dave Logan as NFL standouts has come under Kotite. Another student on the rise is Ricky Feacher, a game-breaker molded in the

Kotite system. "You study under Rich," Logan said. "He helps you understand the importance of detail in getting open and he emphasizes why certain things work and what you have to do to make it happen again."

Kotite, who missed part of last season for the removal of a benign tumor, began his pro coaching career in 1977 on the same New Orleans Saints staff with Rutigliano. Rich was in charge of quality control, which included the breaking down and analyzing of films. He joined the Browns in 1978, Sam's first year in Cleveland.

Kotite began coaching in 1973 at Tennessee - Chattanooga under his former New York Giants' teammate Joe Morrison. He stayed there until 1976.

Kotite earned Little All America honors and rewrote the school's receiving records at Wagner (Staten Island, N.Y.) College (1963-65). Signed by the Giants in 1967, Rich spent the following season with the Pittsburgh Steelers and then rejoined the Giants in 1969 for the beginning of a four-year stint as a tight end.

Rich and his wife Elizabeth live in Berea with their fiveyear old daughter Alexandra.

# JOHN PETERCUSKIE

# SPECIAL TEAMS

Born 1/31/25, Old Forge, Pa. 5th Year Browns 32nd Year Coaching East Stroudsburg Teachers

An average of one in every five plays in the NFL is a special teams' situation and the responsibility for making sure the Browns are top notch in this area belongs to John Petercuskie.

Petercuskie is the dean of the Browns' coaching staff, having been in the profession 32 years, including the last four with Cleveland. He started at the high school level in 1950 and has also had considerable experience at various colleges.

Following high school, John served four years in the U.S. Marine Corps in World War II, including participation in the invasion of Okinawa. He then played guard for East Stroudsburg Teachers College (1947-49) before starting to build a reputation as a standout high school and college coach.

After succeeding at a number of high schools in eastern Pennsylvania in a 15-year stretch, Petercuskie joined the Dartmouth College staff as defensive line coach (1966-68). He enjoyed the same capacity at Boston College, where he also became defensive coordinator, from 1969 to 1972. He had similar responsibilities at Princeton from 1973 to 1977.

Petercuskie and his wife Dorothy live in Strongsville. They have three grown sons: John, Jerry and Gary. Jerry coaches defensive ends at Brown and Gary is an administrative assistant to Joe Paterno at Penn State.

# TOM PRATT

# DEFENSIVE LINE



Born 6/21/35, Edgerton, Wis. 2nd Year Browns 26th Year Coaching Miami (Fla.)

Sam Rutigliano's faith in Tom Pratt's ability to develop young talent is evidenced by the fact the Browns entered the preseason without a defensive lineman with more than three years of NFL experience. Pratt is ready for the challenge. "We've got a young, talented

and eager group and we're ready to turn them loose,"

Pratt said.

This will be Pratt's second season as defensive line coach for the Browns and his 20th in the NFL in that same capacity. He gained notoriety for his development of defensive lines for the Kansas City Chiefs' Super Bowl teams of 1967 and 1970. The latter championship unit of Jerry Mays, Aaron Brown, Buck Buchanan and Curly Culp became near awesome. Pratt stayed with the Chiefs from 1963 through 1977.

In 1978, Pratt rejoined Hank Stram at New Orleans where

he pushed his 1979 line to 46 sacks, a Saints' record.

Pratt played linebacker at Miami (Fla.) from 1953 through 1956 and remained at his alma mater as an assistant coach until 1960. He was an assistant at Southern Mississippi in 1961 and 1962 before joining the Chiefs.

Pratt and his wife Hope live in Medina and they have three chlidren: Kendra, 20, Shana, 17 and Tyler, 11.

# DAVE REDDING

STRENGTH



Born 6/14/52, North Platte, Neb. 1st Year Browns 7th Year Coaching Nebraska

In a competition as close as that in the NFL, victory sometimes belongs to the healthiest and best conditioned team. Helping the Browns be prepared is Dave Redding, who was appointed last February to the newly created position of Browns' strength coach.

Redding, who has six years of strength coaching experience at three major universities, also has three seasons of experience coaching defensive ends on the collegiate level. Dave was a three-year letterman at defensive end for the

University of Nebraska.

Prior to arriving in Cleveland, Redding was the strength and conditioning coach at Missouri (1978-81). He also coached defensive ends and was in charge of football's winter conditioning and lifting program for one season at Washington State University (1977).

"Over the past four years, the specialization of the strength coach has become a trend in the NFL," Sam Rutigliano said. "The Browns are interested in improving the players' overall strength, quickness, conditioning and



their ability to perform and that's why we sought Redding."

Upon completion of his B.S. degree in physical education. with a minor in public health, Redding became a graduate assistant football and strength coach at Nebraska. He was responsible for the winter conditioning and lifting program for his alma mater's freshman football team.

"My main goal is to keep the players healthy and ready to play. By reducing injuries, more players will be available game day," Redding said.

Redding and his wife Jane, who is a commercial artist, live in Medina.

# JOE SCANNELLA

# RUNNING BACKS



Born 5/22/31, Passaic, N.J. 1st Year Browns 29th Year Coaching Lehigh University

A new and welcome addition to the Browns' coaching staff is Joe Scannella, who will handle the team's running backs. Prior to joining the Browns, Scannella had been the head coach of the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian Football League.

In three seasons at Montreal, Scannella took the Alouettes to two Grey Cup title games, the Super Bowl for the Canadian Football League. His 1978 team, his first at Montreal, finished 10-8-1 and earned a Grey Cup match, as did his 1979 team, which finished with a 12-5-1 record. In 1980, Scannella led the Aloutetes to a 9-9 mark.

Prior to his head coaching job at Montreal, Scannella spent six years with the Oakland Raiders (1972-77). His responsibilities included special teams work and extensive offensive work, especially with Oakland's young quarterbacks. During his tenure with Oakland, the Raiders gained the playoffs each season and won the 1976 Super Bowl.

A little All-America quarterback at Lehigh University (1947-50), Scannella then played professional football as a quarterback/safety for Saskatchewan of the CFL (1951-52).

Scannella began his coaching career at the high school in Long Island, New York (Port Jefferson, Oceanside and Baldwin high schools). He coached at Cornell University and in 1964 became head coach at C.W. Post College where he earned a 27-18-1 record in five years. He served with the New York Giants as a scout in 1968 and in 1969 he was the offensive line coach for the Montreal Alouettes. In 1970 and 1971, Scannella was the head coach at the University of Vermont.

Scannella and his wife Lillian have three children: Joe, 27, a musician (with the Soul Angets); Beth, 24, a teacher and coach in Danville, Calif.; and Jim, 20, a student at California and one of the nation's top hurdlers.

Following his retirement as a player, Schottenheimer worked as a real estate developer in both Miami and Denver from 1971 until accepting a coaching position in 1974.



# BILL DAVIS

# DIRECTOR OF PERSONNEL



Born 7/21/38, Youngstown, O. 2nd Year Browns Mt. Union College

Long-time Browns' observers, including owner Art Modell, were impressed with the way the team's 1982 draft was conducted. "I'm confident we selected NFL quality players, but time will have to prove that," Modell said. "But," he continued, "I can tell you that we have never been better prepared or

better organized in our approach and follow through in the draft than this one."

Bill Davis, named the Browns' director of player personnel in July of 1981, is the man responsible for the recent draft. A skillful administrator and a proven finder of talent, Davis has restructured the Browns' personnel department and has linked it closer to the coaching staff. "Sam and I seem to work very well together and that should make us a better organization. I welcome the input of the coaches. They can supplement the information our scouts obtain," Davis explained.

Prior to coming to the Browns, Davis, a native of nearby Youngstown, O., had been the Director of Pro Personnel for the Miami Dolphins, where he also served as an administrative assistant to Don Shula.

Davis' responsibilities for the Browns include the management of the team's collegiate and pro scouting staffs. He also handles the negotiations and signings of some draft choices and free agents.

Davis joined the Dolphins in February, 1979. At Miami, he handled the negotiations of all player contracts and evaluated NFL talent for possible waiver or trade additions. Prior to his Dolphin association, Davis spent three years with the Philadelphia Eagles — starting in 1976 as linebacker coach and advancing to become Dick Vermeil's administrative assistant and tight end and special teams' coach.

From 1973 to 1975 Davis was the offensive backfield coach at Michigan State. While a head coach at Adrian College (1968-72), three of his five teams shared the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association championship. (He produced Adrian's first winning season since 1949 and first league title since 1911).

An All-America quarterback (1960) at Mt. Union College (Alliance, O.), Davis began coaching as a student assistant at Mt. Union. He later became head coach at Austintown-Fitch High School (1964-66), where his record was 18-8-1. He was an assistant coach at Westminster (Pa.) College in 1967. (Davis earned a master's in education at Westminster).

Davis prepped at The Rayen School and his wife Joanne is also a native of Youngstown. They reside in Berea with their three children: Diane, 18, a freshman at Ohio Univ., and sons Bill, 16, and Bret, 14, both of whom are quarterbacks at their respective schools.



# ALLAN WEBB DIRECTOR OF PRO PERSONNEL



Born 1/22/34, Washington, D.C. 4th Year Browns Arnold College

As the Browns' director of pro personnel, Allan Webb has the important responsibility of keeping tabs on all the players in the league, maintaining evaluations on each. Webb also scouts upcoming opponents and works closely with Sam Rutigliano preparing the Browns for the next games.

Webb's impressive list of credentials include stints as a player, coach and scout. Browns' fans still remember him as a starting defensive back on three New York Giants' teams (1961-63) that won Eastern Division titles over Cleveland. He played with the Giants until 1965 and then coached several seasons in the Atlantic Coast Football League.

He rejoined the Giants as a scout in 1972 and later became coach of the offensive backs until 1978 when he came to the Browns.

Webb gained Little All America honors at Arnold College in Connecticut. After a trial with the Los Angeles Rams, he served two years in the Navy. He played with the Montreal Alouettes before going to the Giants.

Webb, a native of Washington, D.C., and his wife Olga have two children: Lisa, 23, and Marc, 17. They live in Berea.

#### DAVE BECKMAN

Dave Beckman, who scouts portions of the SEC, ACC, Big 8 and Big Ten conferences for the Browns, left an assistant coaching position at Lamar University a year ago to continue a long time association with Bill Davis. Beckman first joined Davis as the offensive coordinator at Adrian (Mich.)

College in 1970. From 1976-1980, he helped Davis evaluate talent at the camps of the Philadelphia Eagles and the Miami Dolphins.

Born in Cleveland, Beckman graduated from Bellevue (O.) H.S., received his B.A. from Baldwin Wallace and earned a master's degree at Akron. Garcia began his career as football coach and athletic director at Cuero (Tex.) H.S. in 1957 after graduating from Prairie View State, where he played football.

Following three years in the Army, he held a number of coaching and athletic directors' jobs at Texas high schools until 1968 when he went to Bishop College as defensive coordinator. He later coached at Jackson State.

#### TOM HECKERT

AREA SCOUT



Born 9/18/38, Youngstown, O. 1st Year Browns Youngstown State

The newest member (3/8/82) of the Browns' scouting department is Tom Heckert, most recently the head football coach and athletic director at Adrian (Mich.) College.

Youngstown native Heckert began his coaching career as an assistant to Bill Davis in 1961 at Youngstown's Fitch

High School. He stayed there until 1965, although his tenure was interrupted by a two-year Army hitch (1962-63), serving as a lieutenant.

While working as a graduate assistant at Kent State University in 1966-67, Heckert earned a master's degree in education. The Youngstown State graduate then became head coach at Maumee (O.) H.S. (1967-68). Heckert became head coach at Adrian (1973) after serving as defensive coordinator to then head coach Bill Davis for three years (1969-72). He was named athletic director in 1977.



Upon hiring Heckert, Davis realigned his staff and assigned Heckert to the Midwest. He will remain in Adrian with his wife Rose, 18-year old daughter Kimberly and son Tom, 14.

# TOM MINER

AREA SCOUT

A strength and mainstay of the Browns' personnel department the last eight years has been Tom Miner, who came to the organization in 1975 after serving the San Diego Chargers as player personnel director and vice president, player relations.

A veteran of over 40 years of coaching and scouting, Nixon was head coach of both the Washington Redskins (1959-60) and the Pittsburgh Steelers (1965). An All-America performer at Pittsburgh, Mike played for Brooklyn Dodgers and Chicago Cardinals of the NFL. He joined the Browns in 1969 after spending the three prior years with the Philadelphia Eagles as a coaching aide. Mike had the special assignment of scouting veterans of both pro leagues at games and on film in preparation for Browns' playing in the AFC in 1970.

Nixon and his wife Thelma live in Brecksville, Ohio. They have one married daughter. Mike was voted into the Pennsylvania Hall of Fame in 1980 and was once a member of the Pennsylvania Legislature.





Brian set four Browns' records in 1981: most passing yards in a game (444); attempts in a season (567); attempts and completions in a game (57 and 31 vs. San Diego) . . . See accompanying box for other team and individual marks owned by Sipe . . . Has not missed a game in last four years and enters 1982 with 65 straight starts . . . Did miss parts of three games last year after jarring tackles (at



## 1981 REVIEW



MONDAY, SEPT. 7 — Chargers 44, BROWNS 14 (78,904) at Cleveland Stadium. San Diego's offense rolled up a total of 535 yards and QB Dan Fouts completed 19 of 25 passes for 330 yards as the Chargers could do no wrong before a sellout crowd and national television audience. The game was billed as an aerial circus with the two top quarterbacks from 1980 facing each other, but San Diego jumped to an early lead and could not be caught. RB Chuck Muncie ran for 161 yards and WR Charlie Joiner caught six passes for 191 yards to highlight the Charger attack. Brian Sipe broke Browns' records for completions (31) and attempts (57), accounting for 375 passing yards. Greg Prultt grabbed seven passes for 86 yards and Ozzie Newsome caught six for 87. Dino Hall injured his knee and was placed on injured reserve.

The Browns' defense was outstanding, holding the Oilers to 209 total yards and FB Earl Campbell to 42 yards on 17 carries. However, the offense missed Mike Pruitt, Dave Logan and Reggie Rucker as they watched most of the second half action from the sidelines with injuries. The only Browns score, a 29-yard FG by Jacobs, came after a 41-yard pass from Brian Sipe to Ricky Feacher. Cleveland was held without a touchdown for the first time since Oct. 22, 1978 when Kansas City beat the Browns, 17-3. FS Clinton Burrell was lost for the season as the result of a knee injury.

The Browns used ball control (41:59 of the 60-minute game) to help record their first win and hand the Bengals their first loss of the season. Two Dave Jacobs field goals and an Ozzie Newsome touchdown grab from Brian Sipe (after a 49-yard toss to Reggie Rucker) gave Cleveland a 13-0 halftime lead. After the Bengals cut the margin to three, the Browns responded with a 12-play, 77-yard TD drive with Mike Pruitt, nursing a sore hamstring, accounting for 67 yards in the winning march. FB Cleo Miller, who started for the injured Pruitt, contributed 96 yards rushing on 22 attempts before giving way to a sprained ankle. Thirty-nine seconds later Sipe ran one yard for the Browns' third TD after Clay Matthews had recovered an Alfred Jenkins fumble. The Browns' defense did not allow the Falcons to convert a third-down play in 11 attempts, and Judson Flint and Dave Logan, playing designated defender in a last minute "Hall Mary" situation, used the first interceptions of their careers to half the Falcons' last two drives of the game. Sipe finished the contest with 21 completions in 34 attempts for 215 yards to mark the sixth consecutive regular season game he completed 20 or more passes. SUNDAY, OCT. 25 - BROWNS 42, Colts 28 (78,986) at Cleveland Stadium. Brian Sipe's 30 completions in 41 attempts for a club-record 444 yards, in addition to touchdown passes, ignited Cleveland's greatest offensive display in team history and enabled the Browns to finish the first half of the season at 4-4. In the fourth quarter, Baltimore appeared headed to a game-lying TD when rookie CB Hanford Dixon tipped a Bert Jones pass and Thom Darden intercepted the ball at the Browns' 10 yard line to snuff out the attempted comeback. Sipe then directed the Browns on their longest drive of the season (89 yards) for an insurance touchdown, a 16-yard run by Mike Pruitt. The Browns' 562 net yards broke the old mark of 550 vs. the Chicago Bears in 1951. Sipe's record performance eclipsed by 43 yards the mark set by Otto Graham vs. Pittsburgh in 1952. The most bizarre play of the season oc-curred when Curtis Weathers blocked Mike Wood's field goal attempt at the 11 yard line. The ball wound up in the hands of Colt TE Reese McCall, who lateraled to teammate Robert Pratt, who fumbled the ball as he was tackled. Greg Landry, holder on the FG try, scooped up the loose ball and scampered 11 yards for the Colts' second touchdown, Reggle Rucker became the second player in club history to catch 300 passes during a career, All-Pro center Tom DeLeone suffered a broken ankle and missed the balance of the season.

Three more TD tosses were for naught when it was ruled the players (two to Dave Logan and one to Calvin Hill) had caught balls out of bounds. The Browns' defense created four fumbles and an interception, but Cleveland never fully took advantage of the opportunities. Joe Cribbs rushed 23 times for 85 yards, caught five passes for 163 yards and scored three TDs; the last, a 60-yard grab and run, occurred on a key third and 10 with 7:23 remaining. The Bulfalo defense created havoc for Brian Sipe all day, sacking him a season-high six times for 59 yards. Sipe was held to a season-low 14 of 37 for 199 yards. The Browns, on the road for the third consecutive week against a playoff-contending team, traveled to San Francisco to meet the winners of seven straight and owners of the best record in the NFL, 8-2. Even though Cleveland's defense was the only unit to keep the high-powered S.F. offense out of the end zone all year, it took a last-second field goal by Matt Bahr, against his former teammates, to defeat the eventual Super Bowl champs. Dino Hall's 40-yard punt return, the team's longest of the season, and Brian Sipe's 21yard TD strike to Reggie Rucker (three catches for 77 yards) tied the score at 12. On the Browns' next possession, Sipe combined with Rucker again, this time for 38 yards, to set up Bahr's winning 24-yard FG with only 43 seconds remaining. Judson Flint intercepted QB Joe Montana's desperation pass to preserve the Browns' last win of the season. Greg Pruitt became the third player in club history to surpass 300 receptions. Ricky Feacher's 30yard TD pass from Brian Sipe was sandwiched between two Ken Anderson aerial scores in the second quarter, as the Bengals took a 28-7 lead to the locker room at halftime. Following a scoreless third period, M. Pruitt capped a 79-yard scoring march with a one-yard run to close the gap to 14 with 12:32 to play. Making the defeat even more frustrating was the fact Cleveland was unable to take advantage of a first and goal from the Oiler three with 1:10 remaining in the game. Cleveland's first two scores, field goals by Matt Bahr, came after Browns' drives stalled at the Oilers' one and two yard lines. Houston's Gifford Nielsen, in relief of starter Ken Stabler, guided his team 80 yards in 10 plays to put the Oilers on top, 10-6. Minutes later, Houston's Avon Riley blocked a Steve Cox punt and Adger Armstrong recovered, setting up an Earl Campbell one-yard plunge that increased the Oiler lead to 17-6. Cleo Miller, M. A club record nine fumbles (seven recovered by Seattle) and three interceptions contributed to all six of the Seahawk touchdowns. Rookie LS Ken Easley intercepted two Cleveland passes and recovered a fumble, sparking an aggressive Seattle defense to a 28-0 lead. Greg Pruitt put the Browns on the scoreboard in the second quarter with a fiveyard TD reception from Paul McDonald. Two TDs by Seattle in the span of a minute sealed the game for the home team in the third quarter. McDonald added TD passes to Dave Logan and Calvin Hill (65th of career) as the second-year QB completed 24 of 34 attempts for 297 yards. Hill, playing the last game of a 12-year career, caught five passes for 49 yards and rushed twice for 18. Logan led all receivers with 101 yards on five catches and Ozzie Newsome became only the second player in club history to attain 1,000 yards receiving in a season. One bright spot on defense was the play of rookie DE Mike Robinson, who recovered his first fumble and recorded two QB sacks.



# HISTORY



- 1946: Browns were started by owner Arthur (Mickey) Mc-Bride as member of the All America Football Conference. Paul Brown was named coach and general manager and the first player he signed was then tailback Otto Graham. The Browns won the Western title with a 42-17 victory over the Buffalo Bills and then defeated the New York Yankees in the championship game (14-9).
- 1947-49: Browns continued their domination of the AAFC, winning three more championships.
- 1950: Following the merger of the AAFC and the NFL, the Browns tied with the New York Giants with 10-2 records for a share of Eastern title. Browns won playoff, 8-3, and then stopped Los Angeles, 30-28, for the championship.
- 1951-53: Browns won three consecutive Eastern titles, but lost each time in the league's title match. In 1953, McBride sold the club to an organization headed by David Jones.
- 1954-55: Led by quarterback Otto Graham, the Browns won back-to-back NFL championships.
- 1956: At 5-7, the Browns suffered first losing season.
- 1957: Jim Brown was drafted; was named rookie of the year and helped Cleveland to Eastern Division tilte.
- 1961: Former television and advertising executive Art Modell bought the Browns.
- 1963: Blanton Collier, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach.
- 1964: Browns win division title with 52-20 victory over Giants and captured NFL championship with 27-0 win over Colts.
- 1965: In what was to be his last season, Jim Brown won NFL MVP honors and led Cleveland to league title game where they were defeated by Green Bay.
- 1966: An eighth round pick from 1964, Leroy Kelly became the club's dominant threat, rushing for 1,141 yards, but the Browns finished second in their division to Dallas.
- 1967: NFL was realigned and Browns won Century Division.
- 1968: With newly acquired quarterback Bill Nelsen (from Pittsburgh), Browns won division; beat Dallas in playoffs and lost to Baltimore in the championship.
- 1969: Browns won third consecutive division crown, but lost to Minnesota in title game.
- 1970: Browns became members of AFC Central and finished second.
- 1971: Nick Skorich, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach. Team won first AFC Central crown.
- 1972: Browns once again gained postseason, losing to eventual champion Miami in playoffs.
- 1975-77: Forrest Gregg, Browns' offensive line coach, becomes head coach; Gregg Pruitt has three consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons; Dick Modzelewski coaches final game of 1977.
- 1978: Sam Rutigliano becomes the first non-Browns' assistant to gain head coaching position. Team won first three on way to 8-8 finish.
- 1979: Losses in final two games prevented team from entering playoffs, finishing 9-7; Mike Pruitt keeps the tradition of outstanding Browns' running backs and has the first of three straight 1,000-yard seasons.
- 1980: Browns win AFC Central title with 11-5 record; lose to eventual Super Bowl champion Oakland in playoff; Brian Sipe is concensus MVP of league.

# **CLEVELAND STADIUM**

# CLEVELAND STADIUM

Cleveland Stadium, a famous and proud landmark for this city, is the nation's largest facility housing both a Major League baseball team and an NFL franchise. The Stadium, with a current capacity of 80,322, was completed in July of 1931 at a cost of \$3.5 million.

The Stadium, which sits on a landfill, has proved to be multi-purpose. Along with baseball and football, the range of activities at the Stadium has included everything from a heavyweight championship bout (Schmeling vs. Stribling) to religious convocations. The Metropolitan Opera and the Beatles have performed on the field as have circuses, rodeos, big bands and a horde of professional and amateur athletes.

Over the years, Cleveland Stadium became a financial strain for the city of Cleveland. Art Modell responded to the need in 1974, forming Cleveland Stadium Corporation by signing a 25-year lease with the city. In early 1982, all of the stock of the corporation was sold to the Browns.

When the agreement between the city and Modell had been reached in 1974, the Browns' owner promised a \$10 million improvement plan, which was recently concluded. The results are very much in evidence.

The list of improvements is a long one, but includes the addition of 108 luxurious loges, a computerized scoreboard, more comfortable seats, new concession facilities, a new lighting system (both inside and around the perimeter of the Stadium), outfield fence pads, and the installation of a new playing field, which was lowered two feet to provide a better view from the stands (1976).

Old electrical and plumbing systems were replaced. A press box elevator was added. Cleaning and painting continue to be top priority items in a continuous maintenance program.
