## ARTHUR B. MODELL

## OWNER



**Born** 6/23/25, Brooklyn, N.Y.  
**Purchased Browns** 3/21/61

When Art Modell was 15 years old, he dropped out of high school and began work as an electrician's helper in a Brooklyn, N.Y. shipyard. Modell was cleaning out the hulls of ships to help his financially-strapped family after the death of his father.

Twenty years later, the progressive and energetic Modell made a bold move, purchasing the Cleveland Browns for what was then an "unheard amount" of \$4 million. To a great extent, Modell had achieved the so-called "American success story" ... from high school dropout to successful businessman and finally to prominence in his profession.

In Modell's 23 years of Browns' ownership, his teams have been consistent and entertaining winners. During his tenure, the Browns have compiled the fifth best record in the NFL (185-136-6; .575) behind Dallas (.662), the Raiders (.656), Miami (.619) and the Rams (.581). In 14 of those years, the Browns were either battling to gain the playoffs or had already clinched a spot in the postseason on the final weekend of the schedule. Nine times the Browns advanced to the championship series. In 1964, the Browns won the NFL championship and gained the title game in 1965, 1968 and 1969. Cleveland also advanced to the playoffs in 1967, 1971, 1972, 1980 and 1982. In five other seasons under Modell's leadership, the Browns were playing for a playoff spot in the season finale, but did not qualify (1963, 1970, 1976, 1979 and 1983).

Simply stated, Modell enjoys football. "It's exciting. It's competitive and it's great entertainment," Modell said. "The anticipation, the anxiety and emotional involvement of the game is exhilarating. The game is a super event ... the first orange helmet out of the dugout at Cleveland Stadium; the reaction of the crowd; the electricity of that moment and the hope for victory."

Modell, who completed high school through night classes, joined the Air Force in 1943 (he was 18), and then enrolled in a New York City television school following World War II. Always an innovator, Modell produced one of the first regular daytime television shows in the nation. He moved into the advertising business in 1954 with L.H. Hartman Co. (in N.Y.), one of the country's most successful agencies. Soon after, he became a partner.

After purchasing the Browns (3/21/61), Modell quickly became a recognized leader among league owners and he served as president of the National Football League from 1967 to 1970. His daring transfer of the Browns to the American Conference, along with Pittsburgh and Baltimore, cleared a sizeable roadblock in the merging of the NFL and AFL, returning peace to football. Among the many innovations developed by Modell was the pre-season doubleheader concept that proved extremely popular for a decade (1962-71). Modell volunteered to have his team host the first "Monday Night" game and while skeptics predicted disaster, a soldout crowd watched the Browns defeat the Jets (1970). (He also took his team to Dallas (1966) for the first of what has become an NFL doubleheader tradition on Thanksgiving Day).

Modell remains a prominent NFL owner. A 1982 newspaper poll of league officials revealed that Modell was considered "the second most influential person in the league." He is chairman of the NFL's important broadcast committee.

The native New Yorker, who has adopted Cleveland as his home, is a "mover and shaker" in the Northeast Ohio community. "I came to Cleveland as an out-of-towner and purchased one of the great loves of this community. I think I understand that responsibility and I'm thankful for the support the fans of this area have given the Browns," Modell said.

Modell has been extensively involved in community projects. In 1974, he signed a 25-year lease with the city of Cleveland to take over management of Cleveland Stadium, which had become a financial strain on the city and was badly in need of repair. With that signing, Art agreed to make at least \$10 million worth of improvements, with all of those already completed. He

also lent his money and influence to refurbish the financially troubled Cleveland Sheraton Hotel at Public Square, which was turned into a downtown showplace under the name of Stouffer's Inn on the Square. "Everytime I see that great ballroom filled with over 1,000 people, I feel proud of what we accomplished," Modell said. The *Plain Dealer* said of his efforts. "Not only did Modell take on the job of saving the hotel, he turned the venture into a team effort to save downtown and Public Square from a visual blight and the city from a loss of millions in convention business."

The Cleveland Sales and Marketing Club's 1983 Executive of the Year is the most recent (January, 1984) of a number of top honors given to Modell. Others accorded him in the last few years for his services and accomplishments have included: the "Champion of Brotherhood" distinction from the National Conference of Christians and Jews for Modell's "lifetime of service in combating discrimination and prejudice"; the "Citizen of the Year" award from the Cleveland Board of Realtors; and the "United Way Commitment" honor for his and his team's involvement with that organization. Modell has also earned presentations from the New York Football Writers' Assn; the Sports Media Association of Cleveland and Ohio ("Pride of Cleveland") and the Variety Club ("Super Citizen Award").

A noted philanthropist, Modell has raised funds for St. Vincent Charity Hospital; has been a chief sponsor for the Mundy Football Assn., and is a regular contributor to the many worthwhile charity and cultural activities of the Cleveland area. He is a trustee of the Cleveland Clinic Foundation and a member of the Greater Cleveland Growth Association. Hiram College made him a member of its prestigious Garfield Society; John Carroll University awarded him an honorary LL.D degree (1979) and Wilberforce University has honored him for "Outstanding Citizenship". He has also served as foreman of the Cuyahoga County Grand Jury.

Along with the Browns, Modell serves on the boards of directors of National City Corporation, The Ohio Bell Telephone Company, The Higbee Company and Twentieth Century Fox Film Corporation.

Pat Modell, Art's wife, is also highly involved with the Cleveland community. She is on the board of Ursuline College and is active with the Cleveland Musical Arts Assn., the Cleveland Ballet, the Playhouse Square Foundation and Cerebral Palsy Association. A former movie and television actress, Pat appeared in over 400 TV shows. The couple has two sons: John, 24 and David, 22.

"Jim's importance to the Browns has continually grown and I wanted to publicly recognize his stature," said owner Art Modell in announcing Jim Bailey's promotion from vice president and general counsel to executive vice president-administration and legal earlier this year. "Jim's involved in every aspect of our business work and has fast become one of the most capable administrators in the NFL."

Bailey, who joined the Browns in June of 1978, has maintained a low public profile while working closely with Modell in the every day operations of all facets of the club. Along with his work with the team, Bailey has also been involved with other Browns' subsidiaries, including handling the legal matters involving Cleveland Stadium and Village Square Travel.

A three-sport standout at Wilmington (O.) High School, Bailey earned a football scholarship to Florida State. Although never a star for the





Seminoles, Jim jokingly claims he did help develop all-time great receiver Fred Biletnikoff. "Working against me in practice, he developed many of his patterns and his tremendous self-confidence."

Bailey earned his law degree at the University of Michigan and became a fulltime associate of the Cleveland law firm of Guren, Merritt, Sogg and Cohen in 1971. He was named a partner in 1976.

Jim and his wife Ann and their two daughters, Sarah and Jenny, live in Shaker Heights.

**ERNIE ACCORSI****ASSISTANT TO PRESIDENT**

**Born 10/29/41, Hershey, Pa.  
1st Year Browns  
Wake Forest**

Ernie Accorsi, general manager of the Baltimore Colts the last two years and a highly respected NFL executive, joined the Cleveland Browns as assistant to the president in March. His principal responsibilities with the Browns are to assist Art Modell in all phases of Browns' activities, especially the signing of players.

"Jim Bailey (Browns' executive vice president-administration and legal) and I were looking for a qualified person who could concentrate his efforts on the negotiating of player contracts," Modell said. "Getting Ernie was a bonus. He's been a successful negotiator and he's earned a reputation as one of the top administrators in professional sports. We're excited to have him with us. He had a number of opportunities, both in the NFL and other sports-related businesses and we're pleased we could attract him here," Modell added.

Bailey agrees. "Ernie's exactly what we need to round out our administrative staff. He shares our philosophy with regard to signing players and he's experienced."

Accorsi, who resigned from the Colts in February, has worked in the NFL since 1970 when he joined Baltimore as public relations director. In 1975 and 1976, he served as assistant to the president of the National Football Conference on Commissioner Pete Rozelle's staff. He returned to the Colts as assistant general manager in 1977 and was named the general manager in 1982.

During the past six years, he assisted in policymaking decisions involving every aspect of the Colts' organization. Accorsi directed the development of the Colts' 1981 offseason marketing campaign, which increased season ticket sales. This was the first increase following a sub .500 season in 25 years. He also participated in negotiation of player contracts and radio/TV agreements in addition to serving as the Colts' liaison with the NFL office.

The 42-year-old Accorsi is a native of Hershey, Pennsylvania and a graduate of Wake Forest University (1963). He worked as a sportswriter for the Charlotte News prior to a tour of duty with the Army and then joined the Baltimore Evening Sun in 1964. He was the sports publicity director at Philadelphia's St. Joseph College before joining the Philadelphia Inquirer in 1966. In 1969, Accorsi returned to collegiate athletics as assistant sports information director at Penn State University.

Ernie and his wife Judy have three children: Michael, 15, Sherlyn, 14 and Patrick, 10.

### PAUL WARFIELD

### PLAYER RELATIONS

When Paul Warfield was named director of player relations for the Browns two years ago, it was an area which had never before been touched by a professional sports team. But in this short period of time the program has been in existence, the results have been dramatic.

Due in large part to Warfield's work, approximately 40 Browns' players reside in the Cleveland area year round. In addition, through Warfield's efforts and encouragement, several players currently are in the process of finishing up work on their college degrees. "What we do is make it as easy as we can for our players to become a part of the Cleveland area community," said Warfield. "That in turn helps them to become more productive as football players." Paul also helps players begin the transformation from pro athlete to business person.

Warfield, an All America at Ohio State as a running and defensive back, is a native of nearby Warren. His undergraduate degree was in physical education and he has a master's in radio/television from Kent State.

Paul began his professional football career as a wide receiver with the Browns in 1964 and had career totals of 427 receptions, 8,565 yards and 85 touchdowns. Although his number of receptions does not place him in the Top-20 of all-time pass receivers, his 20.1 yards per catch is the all-time best, as is his seven consecutive seasons with a plus-20 yards per catch average. Warfield was with the Browns from 1964 through 1969; was traded to Miami where he played 1970 through 1974; joined the now defunct World Football League in 1975; then "came home" to the Browns in 1976 and finished his playing career in 1977.

Last year he was selected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility. "Being selected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in my first year of eligibility is really the best honor that I could ever receive," said Warfield.

Following his retirement as a player, Paul spent the next three years as a television sports reporter. He became the Browns' assistant director of pro personnel in 1980. He was elevated to assistant to team president Art Modell in 1981, becoming involved in a number of front office functions. One of his responsibilities was as liaison to the league office regarding NFL rules and player developments, including all waiver procedures.

Paul's wife Beverly, also from Warren, owns a public relations firm. They reside in Beachwood with their two children, Sonja, 14, and Malcolm, 11.

## SAM RUTIGLIANO

## HEAD COACH

### VICE PRESIDENT



**Born 7/1/32, Brooklyn, N.Y.**

**31st Year Coaching**

**Tulsa**

A two-time AFC Coach of the Year (1979 and 1980 — both by UPI), Sam Rutigliano is now in his seventh season as head coach of the Cleveland Browns. Rutigliano, only the fifth head coach in the team's 39-year history, has also been a Browns' vice president since July, 1981.

Rutigliano is already fifth in seniority among NFL head coaches with the same team. Dallas' Tom Landry, who is entering his 25th season with the Cowboys, is first. The Steelers'

Chuck Noll is going into his 16th; followed by Don Shula at Miami (14th) and John McKay at Tampa Bay (ninth). Tied with Coach Sam is Detroit's Monte Clark. (Noll, Shula and Clark are former Browns' players).

Twice in the last four years (1982 and 1980), Rutigliano has taken the Browns to the playoffs. His 1980 team won the AFC Central title, while the 1983 and 1979 contingents finished one game short of the postseason tournament. "Our goal at the start of each training camp is to make the playoffs. We've made it twice and twice we were playing on the last Sunday to get in," Rutigliano said. "Our ultimate goal is to win the Super Bowl, but first you have to make the tournament before you can get your three swings and the opportunity to capture the trophy."

An 18-year NFL coaching veteran, Rutigliano is celebrating his 31st season in the coaching profession. He began at the high school level in the New York and Connecticut areas — Lafayette in Brooklyn, Greenwich (Conn.) and Chappaqua high schools - from 1953 through 1963. Rutigliano was the offensive coordinator for Rick Forzano at the University of Connecticut in 1964-65. In 1966, Sam joined Lou Saban at Maryland, first as freshman coach and then as offensive coordinator.

When Rutigliano joined Saban as pass offense coordinator for the Denver Broncos in 1967, it started a pro career that reached its peak Dec. 27, 1977 when Sam was named head coach of the Browns. After serving the Broncos through 1970, Rutigliano became offensive coordinator of the New England Patriots (under John Mazur in 1971 and 1972). He was the lone staff member retained by Chuck Fairbanks in 1973, serving as receivers' coach that season.

Prior to coming to the Browns, Rutigliano worked two years (1976-77) as receivers' coach under Hank Stram at the New Orleans Saints. In 1974-75, Rutigliano was a member of Charlie Winner's New York Jets' staff as defensive backfield coach.

The Brooklyn native prepped at Erasmus Hall, earning all-scholastic honors as an end for the 1949 New York City championship team. After gaining junior college All-America honors at East Central (Decatur, Miss.), he enrolled at Tennessee; there he was a member of General Bob Neyland's 1951 national championship team. Rutigliano then transferred to Tulsa.

lettering under another West Point product, Bobby Dodds. Later, Sam earned his master's degree from New York's Columbia University.

Rutigliano has devoted much of his free time to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and to the prevention of drug and alcohol abuse. His fellow NFL coaches recently selected him to help develop a league wide preventative program through the NFL Players' Association and the NFL Management Council. Members of Congress have also sought Rutigliano's advice regarding chemical prevention problems.

Rutigliano is a noted lecturer and motivational speaker and his humorous style is well documented by the media. He is married to the former Barbara Abe and they are the parents of three children — Paul, who is 27, Alison, 19, and Kerry, 17. Paul and his wife Cindy made Sam and Barbara grandparents in March with the birth of a daughter.

### DAVE ADOLPH

### LINEBACKERS



**Born 6/6/37, Akron, O.**

**6th Year Browns**

**23rd Year Coaching**

**Akron University**

Last year the Browns' linebackers were described as "potentially the best in the NFL." Now, most people leave off the word "potentially." One big reason for that is the work of Dave Adolph, now in his 6th year as a Browns assistant, including fourth as linebacker coach.

Adolph, a native of nearby Akron and a longtime Browns' fan, has blended the Browns' talented linebacking corps into a solid unit that is the backbone of the team's

young defense.

Dave attended Mogadore High School, then went to Akron University where he received awards for both his scholarship and leadership. He played guard and linebacker for the Zips and was selected as the Ohio Conference's top lineman in 1958. Adolph then served three years of Air Force duty (1959-61) as a commissioned officer before joining the coaching ranks.

Adolph's first teaching opportunity came at Cleveland's Shaw High School (1962), followed by two years (1963-64) as offensive line coach at Akron University. His association with Sam Rutigliano began in 1965 when they both served as assistants to Rick Forzano at the University of Connecticut. In 1969, he joined John Ray at Kentucky as defensive coordinator; then became linebacker coach at Illinois in 1973 and worked with Woody Hayes at Ohio State in 1977-78.

Dave joined the Browns as defensive line coach in 1979 and took over the linebackers in 1981.

Dave lives in Richfield, O., and has three sons: Michael, 21; Mark, 19, and Thomas, 14.

**JOE DANIELS****RECEIVERS****Born 11/15/42, Bethel Park, Pa.****2nd Year Browns****21st Year Coaching****Slippery Rock**

Throughout Sam Rutigliano's reign as head coach of the Browns, Cleveland has lacked one important ingredient from its receiving corps—world class speed. Now, however, second-year receivers' coach Joe Daniels appears to have the makings of a "burner" brigade. During the offseason the Browns acquired Duriel Harris from Miami and speedster Bruce Davis in the second round of the draft. Plus, second-year man Rocky Belk is expected to continue to develop under Daniels, giving the Browns three players with "burner" potential.

Daniels came to the Browns from the University of Pittsburgh, where he served as offensive coordinator in 1982 after joining the Panther staff as quarterback coach in 1980.

Joe began his coaching career in 1964 at Bishop McCort High School (Johnstown, Pa.), where he taught recently retired Steeler linebacker Jack Ham. Daniels, who had earned his B.S. in health and physical education at Slippery Rock, then received his master's in education from East Stroudsburg, where he served as a graduate assistant in 1966. He was an assistant at New Hampshire (1967-68); the quarterback and receivers' coach at Boston College (1969-76), and taught the quarterbacks at West Virginia (1977-79) before joining Jackie Sherrill at Pittsburgh.

Daniels helped develop former Steeler quarterback Mike Kruczek during his stay at Boston; Oliver Luck, now of the Houston Oilers, while at West Virginia and Dan Marino, the Miami Dolphins' starting quarterback, at Pittsburgh.

Joe and his wife, Kathy, reside in Brecksville.

Jim Garrett, who has served as both an offensive and defensive coordinator during his 24-year coaching career, was the obvious choice three years ago when Sam Rutigliano created the position of Director of Research and Development.

Garrett, the first and only person to hold such a role in the history of the Browns' organization, is a key link for the team. Through films, computers and scouting combine reports, Jim aids in the study and

evaluation of players and team strategies of upcoming opponents. He also is involved in game plans, trades and "serves as a monitor to our overall approach and philosophy," Rutigliano said.

The Utah State graduate came to the Browns in 1978 and served as running back coach in his first four seasons.

Garrett began his NFL career in 1966 when he joined BLESTO, a scouting combine. He joined the Dallas Cowboys as a scout in 1968 and two years later became a member of the New York Giants' staff, where he stayed for four years. He went back to the Cowboys in 1974 before gaining the head coaching job of the Houston Texans in the World Football League. He later joined Hank Stram in New Orleans and stayed there until joining the Browns.

While at Utah State, Garrett earned four letters in football and baseball and was named All-Skyline Conference. After serving in the Army for two years, he played briefly with Philadelphia and the New York Giants and then with British Columbia and Ottawa of the CFL. He moved into coaching at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, Lehigh and as head coach at Susquehanna, where he compiled a 40-3-1 record and was later inducted into that school's Hall of Fame.

Jim and his wife, Jane, live in Cleveland Heights and are parents of eight children ranging in age from 24 to 17: Jim, Jane, Jennifer, Janine, Jill, John, Jason and Judd.

Howard Mudd begins his second year as offensive line coach for the Browns hoping to see as much improvement this year as he saw in 1983. With the return to health of several key veterans and the continued improvement in young players like Cody Risien and Mike Baab, the Browns' offensive line maintained the standard they have long been known for. Not only was the pass protection among the best in the league, but running back Mike Pruitt once again rushed for more

than 1,000 yards as the famed "Browns' Sweep" returned.

Mudd has always been involved with pass-oriented offenses, developing a vast scope of the passing game and a great knowledge in the area of play action.

Mudd, a two-time All Pro and three-time Pro Bowl performer, played six seasons with the San Francisco 49ers and two with the Chicago Bears. He was named to the All-1960's NFL team.

The Midland, Michigan native, who attended Hillsdale (Mich.) College and later gained entrance to the NAIA Hall of Fame, began his coaching career in 1972 as an assistant at the University of California. His first pro coaching experience came with San Diego in 1974. "He was instrumental in the development of the fine offensive line of the San Diego Chargers," said Browns coach Sam Rutigliano.

In 1977, Mudd was line coach at San Francisco, then went to Seattle for the next five years before joining the Browns in 1983.

Howard and his wife, Marie, have a son, Darren, 14, and a daughter Ami, 12, and they live in Medina.

### JOHN PETERCUSKIE

Four years ago, when the Browns last won the AFC Central Division title, the "Kardiac Kid" offense received most of the attention. But the play of the special teams, under the direction of John Petercuskie, also had a lot to do with the success of the 1980 team.

The Browns set a National Football League record for kickoff coverage, allowing only 14.3 yards per kick return. That success, which went almost unnoticed, shows the significance special teams have on the outcome of games. Today, NFL special teams are on the field an average of





once in every five plays.

Last year, place kicker Matt Bahr's 87.5 percent field goal conversion (21 of 24) was tops in the NFL and ranks as the fourth best of all-time. Steve Cox's 58-yarder at Denver broke Don Cockroft's team record (57 yards) and ranks as third longest in NFL history.

Petercuskie also will benefit from the return of Cox (limited last year to kickoffs and long field goal attempts due to brain surgery), who has a career 41-yard punting average.

Petercuskie, the dean of the Browns' coaching staff with more than 33 years experience, started at the high school level in 1950 and has added considerable experience at various colleges.

Following high school, John served four years in the U.S. Marine Corps in World War II, including participation in the invasion of Okinawa. He then played guard for East Stroudsburg Teachers College (1947-49) before starting to build a reputation as a standout high school and college coach.

After succeeding at a number of high schools in eastern Pennsylvania in a 15-year stretch, Petercuskie joined the Dartmouth College staff as defensive line coach (1966-68). He enjoyed the same capacity at Boston College, where he also became defensive coordinator, from 1969 to 1972. He had similar responsibilities at Princeton from 1973 to 1977.

Petercuskie and his wife, Dorothy, live in Strongsville. They have three grown sons: John, Jerry and Gary. Jerry coaches defensive line at Rutgers; Gary is scouting director for the USFL and John is working for Digital Corp. and lives in Boston with his wife Jane and John's grandchildren (Jill and Julie).

Tom Pratt, beginning his fourth year with the Browns, has an important job in 1984—making sure the young defensive line continues to make progress. Last year, with rookie DE Reggie Camp improving steadily throughout the season and Bob Golic seeing his first full year at nose tackle, the line showed improvement. This year, veteran Carl Hairston has been acquired to give on-the-field leadership, plus young veterans Keith Baldwin and Elvis Franks return to help

solidify the line.

Pratt first started coaching defensive linemen in the NFL 20 years ago with the Kansas City Chiefs, and he is recognized as one of the top teachers of those positions in all of football. Tom gained notoriety for his development of defensive lines for the Chiefs' Super Bowl teams of 1967 and 1970. The latter championship unit of Jerry Mays, Aaron Brown, Buck Buchanan and Curly Culp became near awesome. Pratt stayed with the Chiefs from 1963 through 1977.

In 1978, Tom rejoined Hank Stram at New Orleans where he pushed his 1979 line to 46 sacks, a Saints' record.

Pratt played linebacker at Miami (Fla.) from 1953 through 1956 and remained at his alma mater as an assistant coach until 1960. He was an assistant at Southern Mississippi in 1961 and 1962 before joining the Chiefs.

Tom and his wife, Hope, live in Medina and they have three children: Kendra, 22; Shana, 19; and Tyler, 13.

In Dave Redding's first year as strength coach for the Browns, his main objective was simply to add strength to the players through weightlifting. Last year, the weightlifting continued, but a bigger emphasis was put on flexibility, agility and running. Now in the third year, Redding has added ballet and "speed skating" to his ever-growing list of activities.

"We wanted to add something in the line of ballet or aerobics," Redding said. "After talking with Dr. (John) Bergfeld, we decided that we're getting enough aerobics through the regular program and that ballet would be beneficial because it has more specific arm and leg movements and it provides balance."

Because of the success of Redding's offseason training programs, and the fact approximately 40 players now reside in the Cleveland area year-round, the Browns have done away with the traditional minicamp concept.

Dave, who has developed a close relationship with the veteran players, had six years of strength coaching experience prior to joining the Browns in 1982. He also had three years of experience coaching defensive ends on the collegiate level. Plus, Dave was a three-year letterman at defensive end for the University of Nebraska.

Prior to arriving in Cleveland, Redding was the strength and conditioning coach at Missouri (1978-81). He also coached defensive ends and was in charge of the football winter conditioning and fitness program for one season at Washington State University (1977).

Upon completion of his B.S. Degree in physical education, with a minor in public health, Redding became a graduate assistant football and strength coach at Nebraska. He was responsible for the winter conditioning and lifting program for his alma mater's freshman football team.

Redding and his wife, Jane, who is a commercial artist, live in Medina.

### KEITH ROWEN

Keith Rowan was a valuable addition to the Browns' staff this year, replacing Joe Scannella as coach of the running backs after the latter was elevated to the post of offensive coordinator.

"Keith is recognized as one of the finest young coaches in football today," said coach Sam Rutigliano, "and we are extremely pleased to have a man of his capabilities tutoring our running backs."

A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Stanford University, where he was also an outstanding offensive lineman, Keith possesses a unique blend of intelligence and enthusiasm that has earned him the respect of athletes he's coached on both the collegiate and professional level, according to Rutigliano.

Rowen began his coaching career at Stanford in 1975, working with the defensive line and specialty teams. He moved on to Long Beach State as offensive line coach in 1977 before becoming offensive line and specialty teams coach at the University of Arizona in 1979.



Keith joined the professional coaching ranks in 1983 when he accepted the dual role of offensive line coach and offensive coordinator of the new Boston/New Orleans Breakers of the USFL. His offensive unit ranked 5th of the 18-team USFL circuit in 1984. The offensive line tied a pro record for permitting the fewest sacks (8) in 1983 and had only 11 charged to them in 1984.

Keith lettered in each of his four seasons at Stanford (1971-74). He was named as one of the nation's top linemen by the *Football News* while earning Academic All-America honors by the NCAA, in addition to being selected to the All-PAC 8, All Coast by AP and UPI.

He majored in political science, with a near straight A average, receiving a B.A. in 1975 and M.A. in 1977 at Stanford and a Ph.D. in physical education from USC in 1981. He was an 11th round draft choice of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1975.

He is the author of several publications on the game of football, two of which, "Pass Protection" and "Utilizing the Tight End in the Passing Attack" were published by the *Athletic Journal*.

Rowen and his wife Sheri have two daughters: Mandee (3) and Holly Nicole who was recently born. His father, Vic, is head football coach at San Francisco State.

Joe Scannella, running back coach for the Browns the past two seasons, is the team's new offensive coordinator. Scannella, with 30 years coaching experience, will also tutor the team's quarterbacks.

"Joe's been a head coach at two colleges and at the professional level," Sam Rutigliano said. "He coached with the Raiders, where he received credit for helping develop Ken Stabler and Darryl Lamonica. He's had a lot to say with what we've done in the past two

seasons and he'll have more to say now. We don't plan major changes in our offense and naming Joe coordinator allows us continuity. He's well respected by the players and other coaches."

A little All-America quarterback at Lehigh University (1947-50), Scannella played professional football as a quarterback/safety for Saskatchewan of the CFL (1951-52).

He began his coaching career as head coach at the high school level in Long Island, N.Y. (Port Jefferson, Oceanside and Baldwin high schools). He coached receivers at Cornell University and in 1964 became head coach at C.W. Post College where he earned a 27-18-1 record in five years. He served with the New York Giants as a scout in 1968 and in 1969 he was the offensive coordinator of the Montreal Alouettes. In 1970 and 1971, Scannella was the head coach at the University of Vermont.

Joe spent the next six years (1972-77) with the Oakland Raiders. His responsibilities included special teams' and extensive work with the Raiders' young quarterbacks, in particular Stabler. During his tenure with Oakland, the Raiders gained the playoffs each season and won the 1976 Super Bowl.

Scannella then returned to the Alouettes as head coach and over the next three years (1978-80) he took Montreal to two Grey Cup title games, the Super Bowl for the Canadian Football League. His 1978 team, his first at Montreal, finished 10-8-1 and earned a Grey Cup match, as did his 1979 team, which finished with a 12-5-1 record. In 1980, Scannella led the Alouettes to a 9-9 mark.

Scannella and his wife, Lillian, have three children: Joe, 29, a musician and graphic artist; Beth, 26, a teacher and coach in Danville, Calif.; and Jim, 22, a student at California and one of the nation's top hurdlers (competed in the 1984 U.S. Olympic Trials in June).

"At the end of the 1982 season, we set an objective for ourselves that we would move up to a point somewhere in the middle of the league's defensive ratings, and we successfully achieved that objective. This year, we aim to get into the top six statistically, or into the upper echelon," said Marty Schottenheimer as he begins his fifth season with the Browns.

Last year, the Browns ranked 9th overall defensively in the NFL, marking the first time the team has ranked in the top 10 since 1976. In the AFC, Cleveland ranked fifth.

Schottenheimer sees numerous reasons why the Browns should move into the "upper echelon" in 1984. "We've improved our secondary, our defensive line, and the linebackers are a year older," said the former University of Pittsburgh All-America performer who is now one of the most highly respected assistant coaches in the NFL.

In addition to his coordinator duties, Marty, for the second straight year, will also be working with the defensive backs.

Schottenheimer began his coaching career as an assistant with Portland in the World Football League in 1974. He then worked for and studied under one of the NFL's defensive geniuses, Bill Arnsparger, then the head coach of the New York Giants. Marty joined the Giants' staff in 1975 as linebackers' coach and later became defensive coordinator (1977).

Following his stint with the Giants, Schottenheimer spent two years (1978 and 1979) with the Detroit Lions as linebackers' coach before coming to Cleveland.

After gaining honors at Pittsburgh as a linebacker (1964), Schottenheimer was picked in the seventh round of the 1965 draft by the Buffalo Bills. While a member of the Bills, Marty played in the 1965 and 1966 American Football League title games. He finished his playing career with the Boston Patriots in 1969 and 1970.

Following his retirement as a player, Schottenheimer worked as a real estate developer in both Miami and Denver from 1971 until accepting a coaching position in 1974.

### BILL DAVIS

Bill Davis, now in his fourth year with the Browns, has quickly gained the reputation around the NFL of running a very thorough and aggressive personnel department. Davis was the innovator of the trade last May which saw the Browns package four late-round draft choices to the Chicago Bears in exchange for the Bears' three choices in the June supplemental draft for draft-eligible seniors who had signed with a rival league. "I'm banking on it being a good bet for the

future," said Davis at the time of the trade.

Davis possesses the leadership qualities that merit the confidence Art Modell bestowed upon him when he named Davis to the important post of Director of Personnel July 16, 1981. Modell gave Davis a recent boost, naming Bill a team vice president in June.

Davis is accountable for all facets involving player personnel—including the development and management of the team's collegiate and pro scouting staffs, conducting a draft, claiming and acquiring waived players, working with Sam Rutigliano on proposed trades and handling the negotiations and signings of some draft choices and most free agents.

Upon being named, Bill wasted no time in restructuring the Browns' personnel department and weaving it closer to the coaching staff. The result has been a productive and compatible relationship that has proven beneficial to the organization.

In Davis' first draft with the Browns (1982), eight of the 12 players taken made the team, including two-time Pro Bowl performer Chip Banks (1st round) at linebacker and Mike Baab (fifth round) who, barring injury, should definitely be a future Pro Bowl player. Last year, eight of the 11 draftees made the team, including 11th round choice Boyce Green, who appears destined for a bright future at running back.

Under Davis' guidance the past three years, the Browns' overall personnel master plan has been unparalleled in Browns' history.

His appointment to the Browns' staff was like a homecoming for the Youngstown native, who prepped at Rayen High School. He went on to become a Little-All-America quarterback (1960) at Mt. Union College (Alliance, O.), and then began his coaching career as a student assistant for the Purple Raiders. He later became head coach at Austintown Fitch High School (1964-66), where his record was 18-8-1. He was an assistant coach at Westminster (Pa.) College in 1967. (Bill earned his master's in education at Westminster).

He then became head coach at Adrian College (1968-72), during which time three of his five teams shared the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association championship. He produced Adrian's first winning season since 1949 and first league title since 1911.

From 1973-75, Davis was the offensive backfield coach at Michigan State before getting his first shot at professional football. In 1976, Bill was linebacker coach for Dick Vermeil at Philadelphia, then advanced to become Vermeil's administrative assistant and tight end and special teams' coach in 1977 and 1978.

Davis joined the Miami Dolphins' staff in February, 1979, where he was director of Pro Personnel and Administrative Assistant to Don Shula. At Miami, he handled the negotiations of all player contracts and evaluated NFL talent for possible waiver or trade additions.

Davis and his wife Joanne, also from Youngstown, reside in Berea with their three children: Diane, 20, a junior at Ohio University, and sons Bill, 18, and Bret, 16. Bill, a quarterback, will be starting his freshman year at the University of Cincinnati this fall, while Bret is a standout linebacker-center at Berea High School, where he is a junior.

Chip Falivene is just starting his second year as Director of Pro Personnel, but he already has performed like a seasoned veteran. Last summer, soon after being elevated to the position, Chip was instrumental in the Browns signing Canadian Football League star Harry Holt, who performed extremely well for the Browns in 1983. This past spring, Chip landed Frank Minnifield from the USFL, another player the Browns are counting on to challenge for a starting role in 1984.

"For as young as Chip is, he's a remarkable judge of football ability," said Browns Vice President of Personnel Bill Davis. "Plus, he's very organized, which is so important in his work with the volumes of information he must keep on all pro players and possible free agents." Sam Rutigliano said, "Chip understands what our talent needs are and the types of athletes who can fit our program."

For Falivene, the past 10 years have been marked by a rapid rise in the organization. In 1975, he began as an assistant to the team's coaching staff, devoting much of his time to evaluations and studies with the Browns' computer.

He now must keep a thorough file containing information on every NFL player, in addition to tracking the CFL and USFL talent. He also scouts the Browns' upcoming opponents and prepares reports for the coaching staff.

Football has always been a part of Falivene's life. His father, Carl, was a highly respected high school coach in the Greater Cleveland area before moving on to an assistant post at Ohio University. Recently, he was named offensive coordinator at Akron University.

Chip played center at Baldwin Wallace College, home of the Browns' year-round training and practice facility. Following his graduation, he began working part time for the Browns and soon became a fulltime member. In 1978, he was named administrative assistant to Rutigliano and was elevated to pro personnel assistant in 1982.

Chip and his wife, Denise, reside in Berea with their two sons—seven-year-old Jared and one-year-old Chase.

Dom Anile begins his second year as an area scout for the Browns following a brilliant 24-year career as a standout college coach. Anile is responsible for tracking talent for much of the eastern sections of the country.

Although in only his second year with the Browns, Anile is well known to the Browns' organization. He worked the team's training camp as an assistant to the offensive line coach for three years.

"Dom, especially because he's worked with us, understands the talent needed at this level," said Bill Davis, vice president of player personnel.

A native of Brooklyn, N.Y., Anile is a 1959 graduate of C.W. Post and he attended graduate school at Brooklyn College. He began his coaching career immediately after graduation and served in a number of capacities, including offensive coordinator, at Post (from 1959 to 1967).

In 1968, he was named head coach at Post and became one of the most successful college division coaches during the next 12 years. His teams compiled an 84-33-1 (.716) record and twice won the Lambert Bowl as the East's top team—1973 (10-1) and 1976 (8-2).

Dave Beckman knew who he wanted the Browns to take as a "sleeper" in the 1983 draft and he refused to let up until Bill Davis took his man—running back Boyce Green out of Carson-Newman College. Beckman's keen insight backs up the confidence Davis has in his longtime friend and associate.

One of Davis' first official acts as Personnel Director was to acquire the services of Beckman, who had accumulated an outstanding background in coaching, admin-

istration and analyzing all aspects of the game.

The Cleveland native began his coaching career with stints at Akron Highland, Warren Harding and Hubbard High Schools. He was head coach at Hubbard from 1961 to 1969 and was coach of the year in 1963. In 1970, he joined Davis' staff at Adrian College as offensive coordinator.

He then served as an assistant coach at the University of Evansville (1971-72), Iowa (1973-78) and Lamar (1979-81). Dave's first collegiate job was in 1960, serving as an assistant to the late Lee Tressel at Baldwin Wallace.

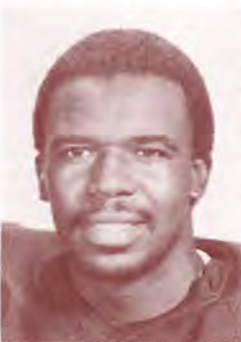

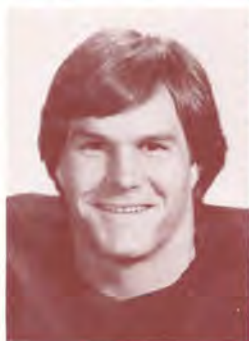

# 1983 REVIEW



**SUNDAY, SEPT. 4 — Vikings 27, BROWNS 21 (70,087) at Cleveland Stadium.** With over 70,000 fans screaming for a vintage "Kardiac Kids" finish (37 of last 58 games), the Browns' defense made a dramatic stop at fourth and one at the Viking 41 with less than two minutes to play in the season opener. However, QB Brian Sipe's pass on a third and one was intercepted by CB Rufus Bess at the V-31 with 32 seconds left, ending the attempted comeback. Minnesota took a 17-7 halftime lead on two RB Ted Brown TDs and a Benny Ricardo field goal. Cleveland scored on an 18-yard toss from Sipe to WR Ricky Feacher in the second quarter and closed the gap to three after the Browns opened the second half with a 72-yard, 12-play drive, capped with a six-yard toss from Sipe to FB Mike Pruitt. However, a Browns fumble gave the Vikings the ball on the Cleveland 20 and Brown's third TD (10-yard pass from QB Tommy Kramer) gave the Vikings a 24-14 lead. The Browns made it 27-21 when WR Willis Adams pulled down the first TD pass of his career (23 yards) with 2:35 to play. Sipe finished with 20 completions in 33 attempts for 223 yards and three TDs, but was intercepted twice. Pruitt averaged 5.5 yards per rush on 17 carries for 94 yards, while Brown rushed 19 times for 74 and caught six for 63. TE Ozzie Newsome caught five for 35 and WR Dave Logan four for 83 yards. Kramer was 22 of 33 for 198. OLB Chip Banks had a game-high 11 tackles and FS Mike Whitwell, starting and playing his first pro game on defense, had an interception.

**SUNDAY, SEPT. 11 — BROWNS 31, Lions 26 (60,095) at Silverdome.** Behind QB Brian Sipe's four touchdown passes, the hard running of FB Mike Pruitt (137 yards on 24 carries) and a defense that produced five turnovers (three interceptions and two fumble recoveries), the Browns defeated the Lions. Detroit QB Eric Hipple teamed with WR Leonard Thompson (eight catches for 179 yards) for an 80-yard TD pass on the third play of the game to give the Lions an early 7-0 lead. Cleveland retaliated in the first quarter with a 42-yard strike from Sipe to WR Ricky Feacher (three for 66). Pruitt put the Browns on top, 14-7, on a six-yard toss from Sipe, but Hipple connected with TE Ulysses Norris with 14 seconds left in the half to tie the score at 14. The Browns took a 28-17 lead into the final ten minutes of the game after Sipe tied (15 yards to TE Ozzie Newsome) and broke (22 yards to WR Dave Logan) Frank Ryan's club mark of 134 career TD passes. After Sipe was sacked for a safety (Browns led, 28-26), FS Mike Whitwell intercepted a QB Gary Danielson pass and returned it 28 yards to the Lions' 27-yard line. Matt Bahr clinched the win with a 25-yard FG with 1:57 to play. CB Larry Braziel led all tacklers with 11; ILB Tom Cousineau registered two sacks and CBs Hanford Dixon and Rod Perry added interceptions. LBs Dick Ambrose and Chip Banks recovered Lion fumbles. Hipple and Danielson combined to complete 25 of 42 for 359 yards and RB Billy Sims was limited to 11 carries for 54 yards.

Cleveland scored on touchdowns by TE Ozzie Newsome (19 yards from QB Brian Sipe) and FB Mike Pruitt (one-yard plunge) and on a 19-yard Matt

Bahr field goal. Sipe completed 21 passes to nine different receivers for 201 yards (31 attempts and two interceptions). Pruitt rushed 25 times for 83 yards and grabbed five passes for 16 yards. Newsome moved into fifth place on the Browns' all-time reception list with five catches for 50 yards. Bahr converted his 75th consecutive PAT and S Clarence Scott and OLB Chip Banks each had interceptions. QB Ken Anderson was 26 of 40 for 207. RB Charles Alexander (33 yards) and WR Cris Collinsworth (83 yards) each caught six. WR Ricky Feacher, playing in his 100th consecutive game, injured his thigh and did not play again until week nine.

**SUNDAY, SEPT. 25 — BROWNS 30, Chargers 24 (OT) (49,482) at Jack Murphy Stadium.** The Browns' defense shut out the explosive Chargers in the fourth quarter and QB Brian Sipe threw three touchdown passes. Matt Bahr kicked a 32-yard field goal to tie the game at 24 with 18 seconds remaining in the game. The Browns won the toss to receive the overtime kickoff and scored just four plays later (1:53 into OT) when rookie TE Harry Holt caught a Sipe pass at the Charger 25, broke three tackles and scored his first NFL touchdown on a play that covered 48 yards. LB Curtis Weathers blocked a 34-yard FG attempt by San Diego's Rolf Benirschke early in the fourth quarter and the defense held "ground Coryell" to 70 yards. Chargers' QB Dan Fouts was 24 of 38 for 351 yards, including eight completions (108 yards) to TE Kellen Winslow and six to WR Wes Chandler for 134 yards and two TDs. Sipe broke his own club record for lowest interception rate in a single game, as he threw 44 passes without an interception (completing 27 passes for 327 yards, both season highs). Dwight Walker threw the game's only interception on a halfback option play. FB Mike Pruitt gained 63 yards rushing (24 carries) and added 21 yards receiving on five catches. WR Dave Logan equalled his career-high for receptions with eight (121 yards). Five of Logan's catches were during third or fourth and long situations and all were good for first downs. TE Ozzie Newsome's seven catches for 65 yards moved him past Ray Renfro into fourth place on the club's all-time catch list. The Browns' offense converted nine of 14 third down attempts (64.3%) and made a season-high 29 first downs. LT Doug Dieken played in his 175th consecutive game.

**SUNDAY, OCT. 2 — Seahawks 24, BROWNS 9 (75,446) at Cleveland Stadium.** The Seahawks used three second-half Cleveland turnovers, including the NFL's longest interception return of the 1983 season (73-yard TD by DE Jacob Green), to seal a 24-9 win over the Browns. The first turnover came on the second play of the second half with the score deadlocked at three. QB Brian Sipe's pass was stolen by LB Shelton Robinson at the Browns' 29 and returned to the 11, where it took RB Curt Warner three plays to give the Seahawks a 10-3 lead. Early in the fourth quarter, Sipe drove the Browns 88 yards in 13 plays as rookie RB Boyce Green scored his first pro TD (five-yard pass from Sipe). However, Matt Bahr missed his first PAT in three years (78 straight) and the Browns trailed by one. On Cleveland's next possession, Sipe was sacked and fumbled on his own 15. Four plays later, Warner gave the Seahawks a 17-9 advantage with 8:19 to play. Facing a fourth and two situation at the Seahawks' 21 with two minutes remaining, Sipe's screen pass, intended for Mike Pruitt, was stolen by Green and returned for a TD. Sipe finished the day 25 of 40 for 310 yards. Pruitt went over the century mark for the fourth time in seven games versus Seattle (24 carries for 107 yards) and TE Harry Holt led all receivers with six catches for 77 yards. TE Ozzie Newsome added five for 55 and WR Willis Adams grabbed four for 73. The Browns outgained Seattle, 405 yards





to 259. ILB Tom Cousineau's 10 tackles paced Cleveland's defense. For Seattle, QB Jim Zorn was 11 of 17 for 122 and Warner gained 94 on 24 tries and caught five passes.

**SUNDAY, OCT. 9 — BROWNS 10, Jets 7 (78,235) at Cleveland Stadium.**

Matt Bahr's 44-yard FG as time expired was the difference in the Browns' fourth victory. WR Bobby Jones, playing against his former teammates, made a diving 32-yard catch with 19 seconds to play in the first half for Cleveland's lone TD. ILB Tom Cousineau had a career-high 15 tackles, a fumble recovery that stopped a Jets' drive at the Browns' nine-yard line, and an interception at the Cleveland five. OLBs Chip Banks and Clay Matthews each had ten tackles. Matthews caused the fumble that Cousineau recovered, and Banks added a QB sack and stopped RB Mike Augustyniak on a fourth-and-inches play early in the game at the Browns' 16. After Todd drove the Jets 83 yards in nine plays to tie the game at seven with 1:28 to play, Cleveland started the winning drive at their own 35-yard line. QB Brian Sipe hit TE Harry Holt for 16 yards and a key 20-yard completion to WR Dave Logan preceded Bahr's winning kick. Todd was 22 of 31 for 197, including eight to RB Bruce Harper for 71 yards. Sipe was 21 of 31 for 294. Jones and TE Ozzie Newsome each caught five (for 68 and 57 yards, respectively) and Holt grabbed four for 75. Rookie RB Boyce Green (16 carries for 48 yards) saw his first action at RB after FB Mike Pruitt (bruised ribs) left the game following the opening series. Pruitt's consecutive game streak, with at least one catch, was stopped at 53 (second LG in Browns' history). Cleveland lost starting ILB Dick Ambrose for the remainder of the season when he broke his ankle in the fourth quarter. In the last five games the Browns and Jets have played, the winning score has come in the final seconds (Browns have won four).

**SUNDAY, OCT. 16 — Steelers 44, BROWNS 17 (59,263) at Three Rivers Stadium.**

The battle for control of first place in the AFC Central Division, between the 4-2 Browns and Steelers, was decided early. Pittsburgh capitalized on three Brian Sipe interceptions, two of which bounced out of the arms of Cleveland receivers, in the first five and one-half minutes of the game, to take a 17-0 lead. The Browns committed a season-high seven turnovers (six interceptions and one fumble) and lost their 14th straight at Three Rivers Stadium. LB Mike Merriweather scored Pittsburgh's second touchdown on a 31-yard interception and S Greg Best got the final Steeler points on a 94-yard fumble recovery return. The loss dimmed an outstanding performance by RB Boyce Green (137 yards on 28 carries, two TDs and five receptions for 35 yards). Green became the first Browns' rookie since 1969, and only the second in club history, to rush for 100 yards in his initial NFL start. His 137-yard effort is the second-best total ever by a Steeler opponent at Three Rivers (opened in 1970). Sipe completed 27 of 49 for 310 yards, but his six interceptions tied his own club mark set vs. Pittsburgh in 1981. TE Ozzie Newsome's nine catches (for 103) raised his career total over the 300 mark. WR Bobby Jones grabbed six for 88. Steeler QB Cliff Stoudt was 14 of 18 for 194 with WR Calvin Sweeney catching four for 69 (one TD). RB Walter Abercrombie rushed for 65 yards on 15 tries (one TD). The Browns outgained Pittsburgh 449 to 332 and had 27 first downs to the Steelers' 19.

**SUNDAY, OCT. 23 — Bengals 28, BROWNS 21 (50,047) at Riverfront Stadium.** Fifteen-year veteran CB Ken Riley's 42-yard interception return for a TD broke a 21-21 tie with 9:23 remaining, as the Browns suffered a second straight divisional setback. After throwing the interception to Riley, QB Brian Sipe (19 of 35 for 225, three TDs and two interceptions) completed just one pass in six attempts, as the Browns managed just 34 net yards on their final three possessions of the game. Cleveland took a 14-7 lead into the locker room at half on Sipe TD passes to TE Ozzie Newsome (five yards) and WR Bobby Jones (eight yards). Jones' score was made possible when ILB Tom Cousineau recovered a FB Pete Johnson fumble on the Bengal three with 18 seconds remaining in the second quarter. Cleveland's final TD came in the third quarter, when the Browns took a 21-14 lead on a 17-yard Sipe-to-Newsome scoring play. Along with Riley's TD, Cincinnati got six points on three runs—Johnson (second quarter), QB Turk Schonert (third quarter) and RB Charles Alexander (fourth quarter). Schonert's 80% completion rate (16 of 20 for 163) was the highest allowed by the secondary all season. Newsome, seven catches for 69 yards and two TD's, became the seventh player in Browns' history to crack the 4,000-yard career receiving barrier. Cousineau, for the fifth straight week, was the team's leading tackler with a game-high 12. ILB Eddie Johnson added 11 stops.

**SUNDAY, OCT. 30 — BROWNS 25, Oilers 19 (OT) (66,955) at Cleveland Stadium.** Facing a Central Division foe for the third time in as many weeks, the Browns won in overtime. FS Mike Whitwell intercepted a QB Gifford Nielsen pass in OT and returned it 15 yards to the Oiler 20. On the next play, rookie RB Boyce Green raced 20 yards for the winning TD. On the afternoon, Green, an 11th-round draft choice, accounted for 239 yards, including 107 rushing (all in the second half), 40 receiving (four catches), and 92 yards on kickoff returns. FB Mike Pruitt added 66 yards on 18 tries. Matt Bahr kicked a career-high four field goals, including a 29-yarder with 7:23 to play and 30-yarder with 49 seconds left. A highlight of the game came with 25 seconds remaining in the half and the Browns trailing, 10-3. Thirteen-year veteran LT Doug Dieken scored his first NFL touchdown on a 14-yard pass from Paul McDonald on a fake field goal try to give the Browns a 10-all tie at intermission. However, Houston's Nielsen wasted little time reclaiming the lead, hitting WR Mike Renfro with a 38-yard pass on the third play of the second half. McDonald, starting in place of QB Brian Sipe (elbow problem), was 19 of 41 for 209 yards, one TD and two interceptions. TE Ozzie Newsome, one of nine receivers utilized by McDonald, caught four passes for 41 yards and moved past WR Reggie Rucker into third place on the Browns' all-time reception list (312). ILB Tom Cousineau had a game-high 13 tackles, once again leading the Browns in tackles (the sixth straight week). Nielsen was 11 of 27 for 152, including four catches by Renfro for 70 yards and two TDs. The win gave the Browns a 7-3 all-time mark in OT games and dealt the winless Oilers their third sudden death loss of the season. Cleveland's defense surrendered a season-low 11 first downs and allowed only 255 net yards.

**SUNDAY, NOV. 6 — Packers 35, BROWNS 21 (54,089) at Milwaukee County Stadium.** Despite rolling up a season-high 456 yards (365 passing), the Browns' record fell to 5-5 as Cleveland had trouble getting the football in the end zone. Five times the Browns moved inside the Packer 30 and came away with no points. Cleveland trailed 21-7 at the half and 28-7 after three quarters. Green Bay limited the Browns to 48 yards rushing in the first half and held Cleveland to gains of three yards or less eleven times on 14 first-half, first-down plays. With 1:25 to play in the game, the Browns did manage to get within seven (28-21), but an onsidies' kick failed. The defense checked two of the Packs' Pro Bowl receivers (WR James Lofton two for 64 and TE Paul Coffman had two for nine), but WR John Jefferson had seven catches for 102 yards and QB Lynn Dickey threw four TD passes, completing 20 of 33 passes for 228 yards. Green Bay also rushed for 154 yards with RB Gerry Ellis getting 86 on 17 tries and FB Jessie Clark adding 50. Cleveland's defense allowed a season-high 26 first downs on 75 offensive plays. QB Brian Sipe relieved Paul McDonald in the third quarter and was 16 of 27 for 231 yards. McDonald was 11 of 23 for 134 and each QB had one interception. TE Ozzie Newsome caught eight for 90 and extended his club record to 60 regular season games in a row with at least one catch. WR Bobby Jones added four for 93. FB Mike Pruitt's 16 carries for 73 yards moved him past Greg Pruitt into third place on the Browns' all-time rushing list. RB/KR Dino Hall's two punt returns broke Leroy Kelly's club record for most punt returns in a career (94). Cleveland intercepted three passes, including one by NT Bob Golic. OLB Chip Banks hit the throwing arm of Dickey and Golic sprinted seven yards with the theft for his first TD ever. G Joe DeLamielleure started the 150th game of his career.

**SUNDAY, NOV. 13 — BROWNS 20, Buccaneers 0 (56,091) at Cleveland Stadium.** For the first time since Dec. 1, 1974, when they shut out the 49ers, 7-0, in a blizzard, the Browns blanked an opponent. Matt Bahr's two field goals and FB Mike Pruitt's two one-yard touchdown runs provided the Browns' scoring. QB Brian Sipe, starting for the first time in three games, was 14 of 26 for 174 with no interceptions. Pruitt rushed 23 of the team's season-high 39 times for 60 yards and caught four for 26 as Cleveland controlled the ball for nearly 35 minutes. TE Ozzie Newsome grabbed three passes for 81 yards. The defense yielded only 232 yards to the Bucs, including a season-low 66 yards rushing. RB James Wilder, fresh from a 219-yard performance the previous week, gained just 62 yards (19 carries) before leaving the game with an injury. Bahr's missed 41-yard FG with 39 seconds left in the game was his last miss of the season. Cleveland linebackers Clay Matthews (nine), Chip Banks (seven) and Tom Cousineau (six) combined for 22 tackles.

**SUNDAY, NOV. 20 — BROWNS 30, Patriots 0 (40,987) at Sullivan Stadium.** For the first time in 32 years (1951), the Browns recorded back-to-back shutouts. Five interceptions (most by a Cleveland defense since 1974), including two each by ILB Tom Cousineau and RCB Hanford Dixon and one by OLB Chip Banks for a touchdown (65 yards), highlighted a Browns' defense that permitted a season-low 190 yards (108 passing) and allowed

just 12 first downs. New England entered the contest as the NFL's leading rush team, but managed only 114 yards running. Despite the season's lowest offensive output (227 net yards), the Browns rolled up 30 points for the third time in '83. FB Mike Pruitt rambled over the century mark for the 14th time in his career (136 yards on 24 carries, averaging 5.7 yards per try). Along with Banks' TD, rookie WR Rocky Belk (two for 41) scored his first pro TD. Pruitt scored once and Matt Bahr kicked FGs of 22, 20 and 20 yards. QB Brian Sipe completed nine passes to seven receivers (20 attempts for 71 yards). TE Ozzie Newsome kept his streak alive (61 consecutive games with at least one reception) when he grabbed his only pass (four-yarder) on the game's first play. Banks' TD interception came after Cousineau hit Patriot QB Steve Grogan as he (Grogan) was throwing. Banks also contributed two QB sacks, six tackles and batted away a pass on a fourth-and-goal play in the closing seconds of the first half. ROLB Clay Matthews registered eight tackles and ILB Eddie Johnson had six. New England QBs Grogan and rookie Tony Eason combined for 13 of 31 for 108 yards. The Browns had not won back-to-back, non-"Kardiac Kid" games since 1978 and the Patriots had not been shut out since 1975.

## SUNDAY, NOV. 27 — BROWNS 41, Colts 23 (65,812) at Cleveland Stadium.

The Browns won a third straight game, boosting their record to 8-5. The Browns took a 28-17 halftime lead and extended it to 38-17 after three quarters. Not only did TE Ozzie Newsome become the Browns' all-time pass receiver (332 career catches), but "Oz" also broke his own single-season record of 69 receptions (set in 1981). On the afternoon, Newsome hauled in eight passes for 108 yards and had a spectacular 66-yard TD reception (outjumped two defenders for the ball and carried another Colt the final seven yards into the end zone.). QB Brian Sipe connected on 20 of 33 passes attempted for 313 yards, threw three touchdown passes and had no interceptions. FB Mike Pruitt rushed for 110 yards (24 carries), his fourth 100-yard performance of the season, and scored two TDs. WRs Willis Adams (15 yards) and Dave Logan (nine yards) added TDs, while Matt Bahr made both field goals he attempted, converted five PATs and scored the 400th point of his career. Four of the Browns' TD drives were 71 yards or longer. The offense accumulated 417 net yards and averaged seven yards per play. The defense allowed only 186 yards through the air, but permitted a season-high 195 on the ground. OLB Chip Banks and SS Clinton Burrell had interceptions and Dino Hall returned five punts for 64 yards. ILB Tom Cousineau was the Browns' leading tackler with 12, while Banks and OLB Clay Matthews each had ten tackles and a QB sack. ILB Eddie Johnson added nine, giving the LB corps a total of 41. LT Doug Dieken started his 175th consecutive regular season game, while FS Clarence Scott matched that number in games played in a row.

The Browns made the mistakes they had avoided during their three-game win streak and, for the only time in 1983, were held without a touchdown. Denver's defense limited Cleveland to two field goals, 281 net offensive yards, four first downs rushing and a season-low 65 yards rushing. QB Brian Sipe, who had only one interception in his last three games, threw three against a tough Bronco secondary. The Bronco offense quickly turned the three thefts into 17 points. Sipe completed 22 of 47

passes for 231 yards and was sacked twice. Meanwhile, Bronco QB John Elway, for the first time all season, finished a game in which his team won. The first player taken in the 1983 draft totaled 284 yards passing and threw two touchdown strikes (39 and 49 yards) to another rookie, WR Clint Sampson (three for 101 yards). On the bright side for Cleveland, Steve Cox booted a record 58-yard field goal with two seconds left in the first half. Cox's first professional FG was the longest in Browns' history, longest ever against Denver, equalled the longest in the NFL during the '83 season and ranks tied for third in the history of the NFL (behind Tom Dempsey's 63-yarder in 1970 and Tony Franklin's 59-yarder in 1979). Matt Bahr converted his sixth straight FG in the first quarter, a 47-yarder. TE Ozzie Newsome continued his record-setting season with eight catches for 78 yards. C Mike Baab did not play because of a knee injury and SS Clinton Burrell broke his arm.

**SUNDAY, DEC. 11 — Oilers 34, BROWNS 27 (29,746) at Astrodome.** A fired-up and gambling Oilers' team severely dented the Browns' playoff hopes. Despite a comeback that saw the Browns return from a 24-6 deficit to a 27-24 lead in the third quarter, Cleveland could not overcome the Oilers' mistake-free and balanced offensive performance (152 yards rushing and 168 passing). FB Mike Pruitt's second quarter fumble, his first lost fumble all season and the first in eight games for a Browns' RB, led to a FB Earl Campbell TD and 17-3 Oiler lead. Matt Bahr's second FG narrowed the Houston lead to 17-6. But on the following kickoff, rookie CB Steve Brown raced 93 yards for a 24-6 Oiler advantage. Three unanswered Pruitt touchdowns (two, one and six-yard runs) put the Browns on top with 8:07 to play in the third quarter. Florian Kempf's 39-yard FG tied the game at 27 and QB Oliver Luck's 43-yard TD pass to WR Tim Smith proved to be the winning points for Houston. The final two Oiler scores followed two fourth quarter turnovers (Sipe interception and Pruitt fumble). Pruitt finished the game with 153 yards rushing (30 carries) and became a 1,000-yard runner for the fourth time in five seasons. TEs Ozzie Newsome and Harry Holt combined for 12 receptions and 152 yards (Newsome was seven for 71, while Holt grabbed five for a career-high 81 yards). Sipe completed a season-high 69.2% of his passes (18 of 26) for 223 yards and Bahr extended his consecutive FGM streak to eight. For Houston, it was a combination of an established star and two new ones. Campbell rushed 32 times for 130 yards (only opponent to crack century mark against Browns' defense all season) and Smith caught seven for 150 yards, including two TD passes. Second-year QB Luck was 13 of 24 for 178.

**SUNDAY, DEC. 18 — BROWNS 30, Steelers 17 (72,313) at Cleveland Stadium.** The Browns kept their playoff hopes alive by downing the Steelers, 30-17, at the Stadium, but their chance for the final wildcard spot died three hours later when Seattle defeated New England, 24-6, in the Kingdome. To make the playoffs, the Browns needed to beat Pittsburgh, Atlanta had to defeat Buffalo (they did) and New England had to win in Seattle. Cleveland, Denver and Seattle each finished 9-7, but the Broncos had a better conference record and the Seahawks earned the second wildcard berth because they had beaten the Browns. QB Brian Sipe, playing in his final game as a Cleveland Brown, threw four TD passes.

including two to TE Harry Holt. Sipe connected on 14 of 22 for 199 yards (no interceptions). RBs Boyce Green (12 for 66) and Mike Pruitt (15 for 43) combined for 109 yards. The Cleveland defense racked-up a season-high six sacks, including two by DE Elvis Franks. SS Clarence Scott led the Browns with nine tackles, while ILB Tom Cousineau knocked down four passes. CB Lawrence Johnson and S Al Gross each had interceptions. TE Ozzie Newsome caught four for 30 yards, extending his games with at least one catch streak to 66. Steeler QBs Cliff Stoudt and Mark Malone combined for 14 of 33 for 202 yards. WR Greg Hawthorne grabbed five passes for 66 yards and RB Franco Harris rushed 20 times for 56 yards. Pittsburgh's only lead of the day, 3-0 in the first quarter, lasted just 20 seconds as Sipe hit rookie WR Rocky Belk with a 64-yard bomb on the next play from scrimmage. Matt Bahr made his ninth field goal in a row and Holt caught a three-yard pass from Sipe to widen the Browns' lead, 16-3. Stoudt narrowed the gap to six, but Sipe found Feacher standing wide open in the corner of the end zone with one second remaining in the half (23-10). Sipe threw the 154th TD pass of his career (one-yarder to Holt) in the third quarter, as the Browns reached the 30-point mark for the fifth time in 1983 (most since 1968). Steeler LB Jack Lambert was ejected from the game in the third quarter for a flagrant foul against Sipe.

## HISTORY

- 1946:** Browns were started by owner Arthur (Mickey) McBride as member of the All America Football Conference. Paul Brown was named coach and general manager and the first player he signed was then tailback Otto Graham. The Browns won the Western title with a 42-17 victory over the Buffalo Bisons and then defeated the New York Yankees in the championship game (14-9).
- 1947-49:** Browns continued their domination of the AAFC, winning three more championships.
- 1950:** Following the merger of the AAFC and the NFL, the Browns tied with the New York Giants with 10-2 records for a share of Eastern title. Browns won playoff, 8-3, and then stopped Los Angeles, 30-28, for the championship.
- 1951-53:** Browns won three consecutive Eastern titles, but lost each time in the league's title match. In 1953, McBride sold the club to an organization headed by David Jones.
- 1954-55:** Led by quarterback Otto Graham, the Browns won back-to-back NFL championships.
- 1956:** At 5-7, the Browns suffered first losing season.
- 1957:** Jim Brown was drafted; was named rookie of the year and helped Cleveland to Eastern Division title.
- 1961:** Former television and advertising executive Art Modell bought the Browns.
- 1963:** Blanton Collier, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach.
- 1964:** Browns win division title with 52-20 victory over Giants and captured NFL championship with 27-0 win over Colts.
- 1965:** In what was to be his last season, Jim Brown won NFL MVP honors and led Cleveland to league title game where they were defeated by Green Bay.
- 1966:** An eighth round pick from 1964, Leroy Kelly became the club's dominant threat, rushing for 1,141 yards, but the Browns finished second in their division to Dallas.
- 1967:** NFL was realigned and Browns won Century Division.
- 1968:** With newly acquired quarterback Bill Nelsen (from Pittsburgh), Browns won division; beat Dallas in playoffs and lost to Baltimore in the championship.
- 1969:** Browns won third consecutive division crown, but lost to Minnesota in title game.
- 1970:** Browns became members of AFC Central and finished second.
- 1971:** Nick Skorich, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach. Team won first AFC Central crown.
- 1972:** Browns once again gained postseason, losing to eventual champion Miami in playoffs.
- 1975-77:** Forrest Gregg, Browns' offensive line coach, becomes head coach; Gregg Pruitt has three consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons; Dick Modzelewski coaches final game of 1977.
- 1978:** Sam Rutigliano becomes the first non-Browns' assistant to gain head coaching position. Team won first three on way to 8-8 finish.
- 1979:** Losses in final two games prevented team from entering playoffs, finishing 9-7; Mike Pruitt keeps the tradition of outstanding Browns' running backs and has the first of three straight 1,000-yard seasons.
- 1980:** Browns win AFC Central title with 11-5 record; lost to eventual Super Bowl champion Oakland in playoff; Brian Sipe is consensus MVP of league.
- 1982:** In strike-shortened season, Browns finish eighth in AFC (4-5) and gain playoffs second time in three years. Lost to Raiders in Super Bowl Tournament.
- 1983:** Browns tied for wildcard playoff spot with 9-7 record, but did not advance, losing to Denver and Seattle through NFL tie-breaking procedure.

# CLEVELAND STADIUM



Cleveland Stadium, a famous and proud landmark for this city, is the nation's largest facility housing both a Major League baseball team and an NFL franchise. The Stadium, with a current capacity of 80,098, was completed in July of 1931 at a cost of \$3.5 million.

The Stadium, which sits on a landfill, has proved to be multi-purpose. Along with baseball and football, the range of activities at the Stadium has included everything from a heavyweight championship bout (Schmeling vs. Stribling) to religious convocations. The Metropolitan Opera and the Beatles have performed on the field, as have circuses, rodeos, big bands, tractor pulls, and a horde of professional and amateur athletes.

Over the years, the Stadium became a financial strain for the city of Cleveland. Art Modell responded to the need in 1974, when he formed Cleveland Stadium Corporation and signed a 25-year lease with the city. In early 1982, all of the stock of the corporation was sold to the Browns.

When the agreement between the city and Modell had been reached in 1974, the Browns' owner promised a \$10 million improvement plan, which was recently concluded. The results are very much in evidence.

The list of improvements is a long one, but includes the addition of 108 luxurious loges, a computerized scoreboard, more comfortable seats, new concession facilities, a new lighting system (both inside and around the perimeter of the Stadium), outfield fence pads, and the installation of a new playing field, which was lowered two feet to provide a better view from the stands (1976).

Old electrical and plumbing systems were replaced. Locker rooms have been upgraded; Stadium restaurants have been renovated; and first aid areas were completed. A press box elevator was added. Cleaning and painting continue to be top priority items in a continuous maintenance program.

Current Cleveland Mayor George Voinovich gives Modell and the Stadium staff the credit. "If the city had held onto the Stadium, it probably would be closed today," Voinovich said. (Cleveland Press, 3/28/80).
