Art Modell enjoys football. "It's exciting. It's competitive and it's great entertainment," Modell said. "The anticipation, the anxiety and emotional involvement of the game is exhilarating. The game is a super event ... the first orange helmet out of the dugout at Cleveland Stadium; the reaction of the crowd; the electricity of that moment and the hope for victory."

The excitement for the Browns' fans and Modell certainly has been there for Art's 22 seasons of ownership. In 13 of those years, the Browns were either battling to gain the playoffs or had already clinched a spot in the

postseason on the final weekend of the schedule. Nine times the Browns advanced to the championship series. In 1964, the Browns won the NFL championship and gained the title game in 1965, 1968 and 1969. Cleveland also advanced to the playoffs in 1967, 1971, 1972, 1980, and 1982. In four other seasons under Modell's leadership, the Browns were playing for a playoff spot in the season finale, but did not qualify (1963, 1970, 1976 and 1979).

During Modell's tenure, the Browns have compiled the fifth best record in the NFL (176-129-6; .576), behind Dallas (.658), the Raiders (.651), Miami (.610) and the Rams (.582).

Modell is a prominent NFL owner. A 1982 newspaper poll of league officials revealed that Modell was considered "the second most influential person in the league." He is chairman of the NFL's broadcast committee and the chief architect of the league's new television contract.

To a great extent, Modell's success embodies the so-called "American success story" ... from high school dropout, to successful businessman and finally to prominence in his profession.

Modell was just 15 when he first entered the labor force as an electrician's helper in a Brooklyn, N.Y. shipyard to help his financially strapped family (after the death of his father). That forced the hard-driving Modell to finish high school via night classes and gave him a temporary divorce from sports (Art had received attention as a baseball catcher).

Modell joined the Air Force in 1943 (he was 18) and then enrolled in a New York City television school following World War II. Always an innovator, Modell quickly produced one of the first regular daytime television shows in the nation. He moved into the advertising business in 1954 with L.H. Hartman Co. (in N.Y.), one of the country's most successful agencies. Soon after, he became a partner.

At the age of 35, Modell made his most daring move, purchasing the Cleveland Browns (3/21/61). He quickly became a recognized leader among league owners and he served as president of the National Football League from 1967 to 1970. His bold move to transfer the Browns to the American Conference, along with Pittsburgh and Baltimore, cleared a sizeable roadblock in the merging of the NFL and AFL, returning peace to football. Among the many innovations developed by Modell was the preseason doubleheader concept that proved extremely popular for a decade (1962-71).

The native New Yorker, who has adopted Cleveland as his home, has become a "mover and shaker" in the Northeast Ohio community. "I came to Cleveland as an out-of-towner and purchased one of the great loves of this community. I think I understand that responsibility and I'm thankful for the support the people of this area have given the Browns," Modell said.

Modell has been extensively involved in community projects. In 1974, he signed a 25-year lease with the city of Cleveland to take over management of Cleveland Stadium, which had become a financial strain on the city. With that signing, Art agreed to make at least \$10 million worth of improvements,

with all of those already completed. He also lent his money and influence to refurbish the financially troubled Cleveland Sheraton Hotel at Public Square, which was turned into a downtown showplace under the name of Stouffer's Inn on the Square.

Honors accorded him in the last few years for his services and accomplishments have included: the "Champion of Brotherhood" distinction from the National Conference of Christians and Jews for Modell's "lifetime of service in combating discrimination and prejudice"; the "Citizen of the Year" award from the Cleveland Board of Realtors; and the "United Way Commitment" honor for his and his team's involvement with that organization. Other recent presentations to him have come from the New York Football Writers' Assn; the Sports Media Association of Cleveland and Ohio (SMACO) and the Variety Club ("Super Citizen Award").

A noted philanthropist, Modell has raised funds for St. Vincent Charity Hospital; has been a chief sponsor for the Muny Football Assn., and is a regular contributor to the many worthwhile charity and cultural activities of the Cleveland area. He is a trustee of the Cleveland Clinic Foundation and a member of the Greater Cleveland Growth Assn. Hiram College made him a member of its prestigious Garfield Society; John Carroll University awarded him an honorary LL.D degree (1979) and Wilberforce University has honored him for "Outstanding Citizenship". He has also served as foreman of the Cuyahoga County Grand Jury.

Along with the Browns, Modell serves on five boards of directors: National City Bank, Ohio Bell, Higbee Company, Twentieth Century Fox, and Lake Erie Radio, operator of station WJW.

Pat Modell, Art's wife, is also highly involved with the Cleveland community. She is on the board of Ursuline College and is active with the Cleveland Musical Arts Assn., the Cleveland Ballet, the Playhouse Square Foundation and Cerebral Palsy Assn. A former movie and television actress, Pat appeared in over 400 TV shows. The couple has two sons: John, 23, and David, 21.

Jim Bailey, a behind-the-scenes director in an out-front business, has become a dominant force in the Browns' organization. Bailey, who maintains a low public profile, works closely with Art Modell in the every day operations of all facets of the club.

He negotiates player contracts and coordinates the Browns' other business ventures, including handling the legal matters involving the Browns and Cleveland Stadium (along with associate Rick Lease).

Bailey came to the Browns in June, 1978 after a successful stint with the Cleveland law firm of Guren, Merritt, Sogg and Cohen. The University of Michigan law school graduate became a fulltime associate of the firm in 1971 and was named a partner in 1976.

Bailey earned a football scholarship to Florida State after being a standout at Wilmington, O. in three sports. Although never a star at Florida State, Jim says he did help develop all-time great receiver Fred Biletnikoff. "Working against me in practice, he developed all of his patterns and his tremendous self-confidence."

Bailey did become good friends with fellow Gator backup Bob Urich, who went on to star in the TV series "Vegas".

Jim and his wife Ann and their two daughters, Sarah and Jenny, live in Shaker Heights.

PAUL WARFIELD

PLAYER RELATIONS

"Being selected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in my first year of eligibility is really the best honor that I could ever receive," said Paul Warfield, who earned that distinction earlier this year. Warfield, now in his fourth year as a member of the Browns' administration, joined another former Brown, Bobby Mitchell, Sonny Jurgensen, Bobby Bell and Sid Gillman in composing the Class of 1983.

Warfield began his career as a wide receiver with the Browns in 1964 and had career totals of 427 receptions, 8,565 yards and 85 touchdowns. Although his number of receptions does not place him in the Top-20 of all-time pass receivers, his 20.1 yards per catch is the all-time best, as is his seven consecutive seasons with a plus-20 yards per catch average. Warfield was with the Browns from 1964 through 1969; was traded to Miami where he played 1970 through 1974; joined the now defunct World Football League in 1975; then "came home" to the Browns in 1976 and finished his playing career in 1977.

After a three-year stint as a television sports' reporter, he became the Browns' assistant director of pro personnel in 1980. Paul then became assistant to team president Art Modell in 1981, becoming involved in a number of front office functions, including contract negotiations. His main responsibility, however, was as liaison to the league office regarding NFL rules and player developments, including all waiver procedures.

He continues to have those same duties, but last year added the new responsibility of director of player relations. "What we do is make it as easy as we can for our players to become a part of the Cleveland area community, which helps them to be more productive as football players," said Warfield, who also helps the veteran players begin the transformation from athlete to business person.

Warfield, an All America at Ohio State as a running and defensive back, is a native of nearby Warren. His undergraduate degree was in physical education and he has a master's in radio/television from Kent State.

Paul's wife Beverly, also from Warren, is a public relations professional. They reside in Beachwood with their two children: Sonja, 13, and Malcolm, 10.

SAM RUTIGLIANO

HEAD COACH

VICE PRESIDENT

A two-time AFC Coach of the Year (1979 and 1980 — both by UPI), Sam Rutigliano is now in his sixth season as head coach of the Cleveland Browns. Rutigliano, only the fifth head coach in the team's 38-year history, has also been a Browns' vice president since July, 1981.

Twice in the last three years (1982 and 1980), Rutigliano has taken the Browns to the playoffs. His 1980 team won the AFC Central title. (The 1979 contingent finished one game short of the postseason tournament.) "Our goal at the start of each training camp is to make the playoffs," Rutigliano said. "The ultimate goal is to win the Super Bowl, but first you have to make the tournament before you can get your three swings and the opportunity to capture the trophy."

A 17-year NFL coaching veteran, Rutigliano is celebrating his 30th season in the coaching profession. He began at the high school level in the New York and Connecticut areas — Lafayette in Brooklyn, Greenwich (Conn.) and Chappaqua high schools - from 1953 through 1963. Rutigliano was the offensive coordinator for Rick Forzano at the University of Connecticut in 1964-65. In 1966, Sam joined Lou Saban at Maryland, first as freshman coach and then as offensive coordinator.

When Rutigliano joined Saban as pass offense coordinator for the Denver Broncos in 1967, it started a pro career that reached its peak Dec. 27, 1977 when Sam was named head coach of the Browns. After serving the Broncos through 1970, Rutigliano became offensive coordinator of the New England Patriots (under John Mazur in 1971 and 1972). He was the lone staff member retained by Chuck Fairbanks in 1973, serving as receivers' coach that season.

Prior to coming to the Browns, Rutigliano worked two years (1976-77) as receivers' coach under Hank Stram at the New Orleans Saints. In 1974-75, Rutigliano was a member of Charlie Winner's New York Jets staff as defensive backfield coach.

The Brooklyn native prepped at Erasmus Hall, earning all scholastic honors as an end for the 1949 New York City championship team. After gaining junior college All-America honors at East Central (Decatur, Miss.), he enrolled at Tennessee; there he was a member of General Bob Neyland's 1951 national championship team. Rutigliano then transferred to Tulsa, lettering under another West Point product, Bobby Dodds. Later, Sam earned his master's degree from New York's Columbia University.

Rutigliano is a noted lecturer and motivational speaker and his humorous style is well documented by the media. He is married to the former Barbara Abe and they are the parents of three children — Paul, who is 26 and recently married (Cindy), Alison, 18, and Kerry, 16.

DAVE ADOLPH

LINEBACKERS

Dave Adolph, now in his fifth season as a Browns' assistant, including third as linebacker coach, has an important task in the 1983 season. A native of nearby Akron and a long-time fan of the Browns, Adolph must blend the Browns' talented linebacking corps, described as potentially the best in the National Football League, into a solid unit, which will serve as the foundation for a young defense.

Dave attended Mogadore High School, then went to Akron University where he received awards for both his scholarship and leadership. He played guard and linebacker for the Zips and was selected as the Ohio Conference's top lineman in 1958. Adolph then served three years of Air Force duty (1959-61) as a commissioned officer before joining the coaching ranks.

Adolph's first coaching opportunity came at Cleveland's Shaw High School (1962), followed by two years (1963-64) as offensive line coach at Akron University. His association with Sam Rutigliano began in 1965 when they both served as assistants to Rick Forzano at the University of Connecticut. In 1969, he joined John Ray at Kentucky as defensive coordinator; then became linebacker coach at Illinois in 1973 and worked with Woody Hayes at Ohio State in 1977-78.

Dave joined the Browns as defensive line coach in 1979 and took over the linebackers in 1981.

Adolph lives in Bath, O., and has three sons: Michael, 20; Mark, 18; and Thomas, 13.

JOE DANIELS

RECEIVERS

For the past several years, Joe Daniels has craved a chance to coach in the NFL. His appetite whetted by two decades of coaching on the high school and college level, Daniels had his ambitions fulfilled when he was selected to coach the Browns' receivers. "This is a tremendous opportunity for me," Daniels said. "For the last couple of years, I've wanted to work in the NFL because I believe that level of competition is the best and I wanted to be part of it."

Sam Rutigliano said he chose Daniels because, "We wanted a younger, but experienced coach who could blend with the chemistry of our staff and Joe fits the bill. I like his background, especially the success the Pittsburgh team has had the three years Joe was there. I anticipate our receivers will enjoy his coaching style."

COACHES

Daniels was the offensive coordinator at the University of Pittsburgh last season after joining the Panther staff as quarterback coach in 1980. He began his coaching career in 1964 at Bishop McCort High School (Johnstown, Pa.), where he taught recently retired Steeler linebacker Jack Ham.

Joe earned a B.S. in health and physical education at Slippery Rock and a master's in education from East Stroudsburg, where he served as a graduate assistant in 1966. He was an assistant at New Hampshire (1967-68); the quarterback and receivers' coach at Boston College (1968-76), and taught the quarterbacks at West Virginia (1977-79) before joining Jackie Sherrill at Pittsburgh.

Daniels helped develop former Steeler quarterback Mike Kruczek during his stay at Boston; Oliver Luck, now of the Houston Oilers, while at West Virginia and Dan Marino, the recent No. 1 draft choice of the Miami Dolphins, at Pittsburgh.

Joe, a native of Bethel Park, Pa., is married to the former Kathy Hampton.

JIM GARRETT

RESEARCH/DEVELOPMENT

Jim Garrett begins his second year as Browns' Director of Research and Development, the first and only person to hold such a role in the history of the Browns' organization.

Sam Rutigliano created the position to allow Garrett to take advantage of the resources available to an NFL team that would aid in the study and evaluation of players and team strategies. Resources include film, computers and scouting combine reports.

"I think there are two keys to making my new position important to the improvement of the team," Garrett said. "First, the relationship with the head coach has to be one of mutual respect and Sam and I have that. Second, the coaching staff has to put faith in the information I can produce."

Garrett also is involved in game plans, trades and "serves as a type of monitor of our overall approach and philosophy," said Rutigliano, noting Garrett's experience as an offensive and defensive coordinator, as well as a special teams' coach.

Garrett, who came to the Browns in 1978 and served as running back coach his first four seasons, began his NFL career in 1966 when he joined BLESTO, a scouting combine. He joined the Cowboys as a scout in 1968 and two years later became a member of the Giants' staff where he stayed for four years. He went back to the Cowboys in 1974 before gaining the head coaching job of the Houston Texans in the World Football League. He later joined Hank Stram's staff in New Orleans and stayed there until joining the Browns.

Garrett earned four letters in football and baseball at Utah State and was named All-Skyline Conference. After serving in the Army two years, he played briefly with Philadelphia and the New York Giants and then with British Columbia and Ottawa of the CFL. He moved into coaching at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, Lehigh and as head coach at Susquehanna, where he compiled a 40-3-1 record and was later inducted into that school's Hall of Fame.

Garrett and his wife Jane live in Cleveland Heights and are parents of eight children ranging in age from 23 to 16: Jim, Jane, Jennifer, Janine, Jill, John, Jason and Judd.

COACHES

HOWARD MUDD

OFFENSIVE LINE

During his dozen years of coaching on the college and pro level, Howard Mudd has always been involved with pass-oriented offenses, developing a vast scope of the passing game and a great knowledge in the area of play action. With that type of coaching experience, not to mention eight years as a player (including All-Pro honors twice and three Pro Bowls), it came as no surprise when Sam Rutigliano selected Mudd as the Browns' new offensive line

coach.

Mudd, who served in similar roles with San Diego, San Francisco and Seattle over the past 10 years, now has another very important factor in his favor. "The bottom line has been the response from our players. Guys like Cody Risien, Doug Dieken, Bob Jackson, Tom DeLeone and Matt Miller are saying it is great to have a coach with all that experience and one who also was a player," Rutigliano said.

Mudd played six seasons with the 49ers and earned All-Pro honors in 1967 and 1968, participating in three Pro Bowls. He closed out his playing career with two seasons as a member of the Chicago Bears. He was named to the All-1960's NFL team.

The Midland, Michigan native, who attended Hillsdale (Mich.) College and gained entrance to the NAIA Hall of Fame, began his coaching career in 1972 as an assistant at the University of California. His first pro coaching experience came with San Diego in 1974. "He was instrumental in the development of the fine offensive line of the San Diego Chargers," said Rutigliano. In 1977, Mudd was line coach at San Francisco, then went to Seattle for the next five years.

"I am excited about the opportunity of joining what I consider to be the finest organization in football," said Mudd. "I have always had a great admiration for Sam Rutigliano and the system he employs with the Browns."

Mudd and his wife Marie have a son, Darren, 13, and a daughter, Ami, 11, and they live in Medina.

JOHN PETERCUSKIE

SPECIAL TEAMS

John Petercuskie's job title is the same as it was when he joined the Browns in 1978, yet the significance his units have on the outcome of the game seems to be increasing every year. The veteran special teams' coach has a unit on the field an average of once in every five plays.

Petercuskie, the dean of the Browns' coaching staff with more than 32 years experience, started at the high school level in 1950 and has added considerable

experience at various colleges.

Following high school, John served four years in the U.S. Marine Corps in World War II, including participation in the invasion of Okinawa. He then played guard for East Stroudsburg Teachers College (1947-49) before starting to build a reputation as a standout high school and college coach.

COACHES

After succeeding at a number of high schools in eastern Pennsylvania in a 15-year stretch, Petercuskie joined the Dartmouth College staff as defensive line coach (1966-68). He enjoyed the same capacity at Boston College, where he also became defensive coordinator, from 1969 to 1972. He had similar responsibilities at Princeton from 1973 to 1977.

Tom Pratt first started coaching defensive linemen in the NFL 20 years ago with the Kansas City Chiefs, and is recognized as one of the top teachers of those positions in all of football. His young group of Browns' linemen have improved each of the last two years under his direction and Pratt expects even better production in 1983.

"It's been a while since the Browns have dominated offenses up front, but these young guys can develop into a tough unit.

What we lack in experience, we'll make up with hard work and enthusiasm," Pratt said. "We do have some talent and opposing quarterbacks will find that out soon."

Tom gained notoriety for his development of defensive lines for the Chiefs' Super Bowl teams of 1967 and 1970. The latter championship unit of Jerry Mays, Aaron Brown, Buck Buchanan and Curly Culp became near awesome. Pratt stayed with the Chiefs from 1963 through 1977.

In 1978, Pratt rejoined Hank Stram at New Orleans where he pushed his 1979 line to 46 sacks, a Saints' record.

Pratt played linebacker at Miami (Fla.) from 1953 through 1956 and remained at his alma mater as an assistant coach until 1960. He was an assistant at Southern Mississippi in 1961 and 1962 before joining the Chiefs.

Tom and his wife Hope live in Medina and they have three children: Kendra, 21, Shana, 18, and Tyler, 12.

DAVE REDDING

STRENGTH

"Players are more responsive than they were last year and now there is a bigger emphasis on flexibility, agility and running, rather than just lifting weights to get stronger," said Dave Redding as he started his second full year as Browns' strength coach.

Redding, who had six years of strength coaching experience at three major universities prior to joining the Browns, also has three seasons of experience coaching defensive ends on the collegiate level. Plus,

Dave was a three-year letterman at defensive end for the University of Nebraska.

COACHES

Prior to arriving in Cleveland, Redding was the strength and conditioning coach at Missouri (1978-81). He also coached defensive ends and was in charge of football's winter conditioning and lifting program for one season at Washington State University (1977).

Upon completion of his B.S. Degree in physical education, with a minor in public health, Redding became a graduate assistant football and strength coach at Nebraska. He was responsible for the winter conditioning and lifting program for his alma mater's freshman football team.

"My main goal is to keep the players healthy and ready to play. By reducing injuries, more players will be available game day," Redding said.

The Browns' new training facility at Big Creek Racquet Club in Parma also has been a big help for Redding, allowing the players to do more sprints and distance running without having to battle the weather.

"In football, the heart works hard for a few seconds, then rests in the huddle. The heart works the same way during sprints. That kind of running is just as important as distance running, which is good for stamina," Redding said.

Redding and his wife Jane, who is a commercial artist, live in Medina.

JOE SCANNELLA

RUNNING BACKS

When Joe Scannella began coaching, Mike Pruitt was still in diapers. Charles White wouldn't come into this world for another four years. Yet there appears to be no generation gap between Joe, now in his second year as Browns' running back coach, and the players to whom he gives orders. Guided by three decades of coaching experience, including three as head coach of the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL, Joe has gained the respect of his pupils.

In three seasons at Montreal, Scannella took the Alouettes to two Grey Cup title games, the Super Bowl for the Canadian Football League. His 1978 team, his first at Montreal, finished 10-8-1 and earned a Grey Cup match, as did his 1979 team, which finished with a 12-5-1 record. In 1980, Scannella led the Alouettes to a 9-9 mark.

A little All-America quarterback at Lehigh University (1947-50), Scannella played professional football as a quarterback/safety for Saskatchewan of the CFL (1951-52).

He began his coaching career as head coach at the high school level in Long Island, New York (Port Jefferson, Oceanside and Baldwin high schools). He coached receivers at Cornell University and in 1964 became head coach at C.W. Post College where he earned a 27-18-1 record in five years. He served with the New York Giants as a scout in 1968 and in 1969 he was the offensive coordinator for the Montreal Alouettes. In 1970 and 1971, Scannella was the head coach at the University of Vermont.

Joe spent six years (1972-77) with the Oakland Raiders. His responsibilities included special teams' and extensive offensive work, especially with Oakland's young quarterbacks. During his tenure with Oakland, the Raiders gained the playoffs each season and won the 1976 Super Bowl.

Scannella and his wife Lillian have three children: Joe, 28, a musician and graphic artist; Beth, 25, a teacher and coach in Danville, Calif.; and Jim, 21, a student at California and one of the nation's top hurdlers.

MARTY SCHOTTENHEIMER DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Marty Schottenheimer, one of the most highly respected assistant coaches in the NFL, has taken on additional coaching duties in this, his fourth year with the Browns. Marty, the Browns' defensive coordinator, is assuming the added responsibilities of defensive backfield coach at his own request.

"We have a young defense and young secondary; Marty knows the players and the system and we felt it would not be in our best

interest to get someone we'd have to break in," said Sam Rutigliano in regards to the vacancy created by the departure of Len Fontes.

Schottenheimer began his coaching career as an assistant with Portland in the World Football League in 1974. He then worked for and studied under one of the NFL's defensive geniuses, Bill Arnsparger, then the head coach of the New York Giants. Marty joined the Giants' staff in 1975 as linebackers' coach and later became defensive coordinator (1977).

Following his stint with the Giants, Schottenheimer spent two years (1978 and 1979) with the Detroit Lions as linebackers' coach before coming to Cleveland.

After gaining All-America honors at the University of Pittsburgh as a linebacker (1964), Schottenheimer was picked in the seventh round of the 1965 draft by the Buffalo Bills. While a member of the Bills, Marty played in the 1965 and 1966 American Football League title games. He finished his playing career with the New England Patriots in 1969 and 1970.

Following his retirement as a player, Schottenheimer worked as a real estate developer in both Miami and Denver from 1971 until accepting a coaching position in 1974.

Schottenheimer and his wife Patricia live in Strongsville with their two children: daughter Kristen, 13, and son Brian, 10.

LARRYE WEAVER

Calling him "the right man at the right time," Browns' head coach Sam Rutigliano selected Larrye Weaver as the team's offensive coordinator, the first time Rutigliano has had anyone fill that role since he arrived in 1977.

Weaver comes to Cleveland from San Diego where he served as offensive coordinator the past two seasons. Included with Weaver's duties in Cleveland will be the tutoring of the Browns' quarterbacks. Weaver, who called

all of San Diego's plays the last two seasons, will do the same for the Browns.

At San Diego, Weaver's offense set NFL records for total net yards (6,744) and passing yards (4,873) in 1981. The Chargers scored 478 points that season, the second-highest total in NFL history (bettered only by the 1961 Houston Oilers). In strike-shortened 1982, the Chargers set an NFL mark for average yards passing per game (321). The team's 450.4 total yards per game last year is third best in NFL history behind the 1951 and 1950 Los Angeles Rams (458.8 and 451.6).

COACHES

"Larrye Weaver is respected as one of the finest coaches in the league because he's had success on both sides of the ball," said Rutigliano. Prior to coaching the Chargers' offense, Weaver was the team's secondary coach from 1977-80. In 1977, the San Diego defensive backs placed sixth in the NFL (passing yards) after finishing 27th the previous season. In 1979, his secondary was the AFC's second best and allowed just 11 touchdown passes, a Charger record.

Weaver and Rutigliano were members of Chuck Fairbanks' New England Patriot staff in 1973. Weaver taught the Pats' secondary and Rutigliano guided the receivers. Weaver began his pro coaching career with Tommy Prothro and the Rams in 1971-72. He stayed with the Patriots until 1976 when he joined the Chargers. Weaver's college coaching credentials include stints at North Dakota State (1964-66), Arizona (1967-68) and UCLA (1969-70).

Weaver was born in Monte Vista, Colo., and was raised in southern California, attending Anaheim High School and Fullerton Junior College. He has graduate and undergraduate degrees from Adams (Colo.) State.

Larrye, who lives in Bay Village, has six grown children: sons Chris, Brett and Greg, and daughters Vicky, Ting and Sandy.

He rejoined the Browns in 1954 and held a number of coaching positions on the staff before becoming a fulltime film coordinator. For the past 11 years he has been in charge of the coaching films, including film exchange, an important assignment in pro football.

Bill Davis possesses the leadership qualities that merit the confidence Art Modell bestowed upon him when he named Davis to the important post of Director of Personnel on July 16, 1981. The appointment was like a homecoming to Davis, a Youngstown native.

Davis is accountable for all facets involving player personnel — including the development and management of the team's collegiate and pro scouting staffs, conducting the draft, claiming and acquiring

waived players, working with Sam Rutigliano on proposed trades and handling the negotiations and signings of some draft choices and free agents.

Davis wasted no time in restructuring the Browns' personnel department and weaving it closer to the coaching staff. The result has been a productive and compatible relationship that has proven beneficial to the organization.

The key to Bill Davis' philosophy and that of his staff members is a meticulous study of a player's habits both on and off the field to expose the strengths and weaknesses of an individual. Davis calls this "exposure." "We don't want any surprises. We want our draft choices to have been interviewed by one of our scouts and a coach, plus Sam and me if possible," Davis explained.

Under Davis' guidance the past two years, the Browns overall personnel master plan has been unparalleled in Browns history.

Davis joined the Dolphins in February, 1979, where he was Director of Pro Personnel and Administrative Assistant to Don Shula. At Miami, he handled the negotiations of all player contracts and evaluated NFL talent for possible waiver or trade additions. Prior to his Dolphin association, Davis spent three years with the Philadelphia Eagles — starting in 1976 as linebacker coach and advancing to become Dick Vermeil's administrative assistant and tight end and special teams' coach.

From 1973 to 1975, Davis was the offensive backfield coach at Michigan State. While head coach at Adrian College (1968-72), three of his five teams shared the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association championship. (He produced Adrian's first winning season since 1949 and first league title since 1911.)

A Little All America quarterback (1960) at Mt. Union College (Alliance, O.), Davis began coaching as a student assistant at Mt. Union. He later became head coach at Austintown-Fitch High School (1964-66), where his record was 18-8-1. He was an assistant coach at Westminster (Pa.) College in 1967. (Davis earned a master's in education at Westminster.)

Davis prepped at the Rayen School and his wife Joanne is also a native of Youngstown. They reside in Berea with their three children: Diane, 19, a sophomore at Ohio University, and sons Bill, 17, and Brett, 15, both students at Berea High School and members of the Braves highly rated football team.

Chip Falivene has made a rapid climb in the Browns' organization. Both Sam Rutigliano and Bill Davis have confidence in Falivene's ability. "Chip understands what our talent needs are and

the types of athletes who could fit our program" Rutigliano said. Davis added: "For as young as Chip is, he's a remarkable judge of football ability. Plus, he's very organized, which is so important in his work with the volumes of information he must keep on all pro players and possible free agents."

Along with keeping a thorough file containing information on every NFL player, Falivene also tracts the CFL and USFL talent. He scouts the Browns' upcoming opponents and prepares reports for the coaching staff.

Football has always been a part of Falivene's life. His father (Carl) was a highly respected high school coach in the Greater Cleveland area before moving to his current position as an assistant at Ohio University. Chip played center for Baldwin Wallace College, home for the Browns' year-round training and practice facility. Following his graduation, he began working part-time for the Browns and soon became a fulltime member. In 1978, he was named administrative assistant to Rutigliano and was elevated to pro personnel assistant in early 1982.

Chip and his wife Denise reside in Berea with their two sons — six-year-old Jared and recent arrival, Chase.

"Dom, especially because he's worked with us, understands the talent needed at this level," Personnel Director Bill Davis said. "He knows most of the head coaches in his territory, which can only help him do his job; and he's committed to change careers and get away from college coaching and move into personnel evaluation," Davis added.

A native of Brooklyn, N.Y., Anile is a 1959 graduate of C.W. Post and he attended graduate school at Brooklyn College. He began his coaching career immediately after graduation and served in a number of capacities, including offensive coordinator, at C.W. Post from 1959 to 1967.

In 1968, he was named head coach at Post and became one of the most successful college divisions coaches during the next 12 years. His teams compiled an 84-33-1 (.716) record and twice won the Lambert Bowl as the East's top team — 1973 (10-1) and 1976 (8-2).

Anile was a three-year letter winner in both football and baseball at Post. He captained the football team two years and was MVP as a senior. He and his wife Geri have three children: Dom Jr., 21, Gary, 16, and daughter Terri, 18. The family lives in Centereach, N.Y.

One of Bill Davis' first official acts as Personnel Director was to acquire the services of Dave Beckman, who had accumulated an outstanding background in coaching, administration and analyzing all aspects of the game.

Beckman scouts portions of the SEC, ACC, Big 8 and Big 10 conferences. An astute judge of talent, he first impressed Davis while working for him as Offensive Coordinator at Adrian College in 1970.

Dave helped Davis evaluate talent at the camps of the Philadelphia Eagles and Miami Dolphins (1976-80) while working as an assistant coach on the collegiate level at the University of Evansville (1971-72), Iowa (1973-78) and Lamar (1979-81). Beckman's first collegiate job was in 1960, serving as an assistant to the late Lee Tressel at Baldwin Wallace.

Ohio high school fans remember Dave as coach of Akron's Highland H.S. (coach of the year in 1963), Warren Harding as an assistant and head coach at Hubbard H.S. from 1961 to 1969.

Born in Cleveland, he graduated from Bellevue H.S., received his B.A. from Baldwin Wallace and master's degree at Akron. Dave resides in Berea with his wife Pat and two sons: Tim, a freshman gridder at the University of Kentucky; and Ted, 16, a quarterback for the Berea H.S. team.

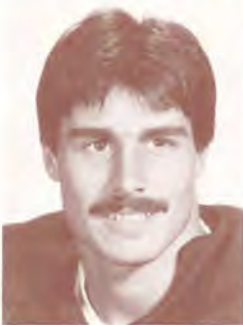

PRO: Most productive quarterback in history of the Cleveland Browns and the NFL's consensus most valuable player in 1980 ... Started the Browns' first six games of 1982 ... Best day last season was against San Diego (30-13 loss) when he finished with club-record 33 completions in 48 attempts for 338 yards (13th 300-plus performance of career) and one TD, including 23 of 31 for 234 yards in second half ... Established team mark of 14 consecutive completions in that game ...

Became 32nd player in NFL history to surpass 20,000 career yards passing ... Continually roughed-up, including being sacked ten times in last three starts ... Was 13 of 18 for 126 yards at Cincinnati before leaving the game dazed in the fourth quarter ... Bengal game was his 70th straight start over past five years, but his last appearance in 1982 ... Enters 1983 rated sixth among the NFL's active QBs with a 73.9 career rating (21st all-time) ... True success story, began career as 13th-round choice in 1972 and then spent first two years with Browns as member of the taxi-squad ... Made active roster for first time in 1974, but did not become a regular until 1976 when Mike Phipps separated his shoulder in season opener and was replaced by Sipe ... Has since become most prolific passer in team history, needing just seven TD passes to own every Browns' career, season and single-game record (Frank Ryan holds record for most TD passes in career with 134, Sipe has 128) ... Threw for more than 3,700 yards three consecutive seasons (1979-81), including 1981 when he amassed 3,876 (third best in NFL) ... Brian set four Browns' records in 1981: most yards passing in a game (444, vs. San Diego and 17th best NFL performance all-time); attempts in a season (567); attempts and completions in a game (57 and 31 vs. S.D.) ... See accompanying box for other team and individual marks owned by Sipe ... Missed part of three games in 1981 after jarring tackles (at Pittsburgh, Buffalo, and Cincinnati) ... Had remarkable 1980, leading the NFL with a 91.4 QB rating, passing for over 300 yards on six occasions and

throwing for 4,132 yards (second best in NFL) ... His 2.5 percent interception rate was the lowest figure in the league (lowest in AFC since 1976) and his 30 TD passes were matched only by Dan Fouts in the AFC ... A master at probing a defense and finding secondary receivers, Sipe had over 50 completions to five Browns in 1981, including over 60 to Newsome and the two Pruitts (Mike and Greg) ... Started for AFC in 1981 Pro Bowl ... 28 TD passes in 1979 was best in NFL (tied with Steve Grogan); his 3,793 yards were bettered only by Dan Fouts and no one in the AFC had more passes thrown than Sipe (535) ... Became famous for leading comeback, fourth quarter "Kardiac Kid" victories as he engineered late winning scoring drives in six of the club's nine 1979 victories ... Threw longest pass of career (74 yards) to Ozzie Newsome against Baltimore (9/16/79) ... Began his assault on Browns' record book (since broken again) in 1978 when he set marks for attempts and completions (399 and 222) ... Most dramatic drive engineered by Sipe covered 73 yards in 62 seconds to pull into a 34-34 tie with Jets in final minute, a game won by Browns in overtime ... Fired longest TD strike of career, and Browns' longest of season, 69 yards to Reggie Rucker during opening day triumph over 49ers (9/3/78) ... Despite elbow and shoulder ailments, he led Cleveland to 5-3 record in 1977 (with one-game hold on first place in AFC Central), but he suffered a broken shoulder blade vs. Pittsburgh and missed remainder of season (placed on injured reserve Nov. 29) ... In first year as a regular (started 12 of 14 games in 1976), he led Browns to a 9-5 mark and was selected as the team's top offensive player by the Cleveland Touchdown Club (an award he also earned in 1979) ... Finished sixth among AFC passers with a 77.1 rating ... Twice (vs. Miami and San Diego) completed 12 passes in a row (then a team record) and his 82.1 passing percentage against San Diego (10/24/76) still stands as club mark (23 of 28 for 246 yards) ... Started two games in 1975 (Washington and Baltimore) and played in five others ... Threw first regular season pass as a pro in 1974 (at St. Louis, Sept. 29), contributing to three of four wins by Browns that year ... Started five games and played in ten in 1974 ... Showed potential for his "Kardiac" style when he entered game against Denver trailing 21-9 in fourth quarter and rallied teammates to 23-21 upset triumph, scoring first two TDs of career, including winner on a one-yard sneak with 1:56 left ... First starting assignment as pro came following week in hometown of San Diego; completed 16 of 23 passes for 186 yards, threw first TD pass and scored another pair of TDs on one-yard runs ... Saw only limited preseason duty in both 1972 and 1973 before being assigned to taxi squads ... Needs 161 completions, 434 attempts and 4,571 yards passing to crack the NFL's top 20 in those categories ... Has thrown three or more TD aerals in a single game 13 times, including five versus Steelers (10/7/79) and four against Baltimore (11/19/78), Cincinnati (10/21/79), Pittsburgh (10/26/80), Cincinnati (11/23/80) and Baltimore (10/25/81) ... Played in 110 games and started 98 during nine-year NFL career ... Needs 57 more passes for 3,000 career ... Enters 1983 with more wins (seven), completions (234) and yards passing (2,722) against Cincinnati than any other team in NFL; also at Bengals expense: completed 60.2% of all passes, has thrown 18 TD passes and 13 interceptions ... Against Houston, Sipe is 154 of 307 for 1,637 yards, six TDs and 15 interceptions; and 196 of 392 for 2,513 yards, 21 TDs and 22 interceptions versus Steelers ... 330th player selected in 1972 NFL draft.

1983 NFL RULE CHANGES

The following are rule changes for 1983:

1. Any player on field can call a team timeout.
2. There is no pass interference if there is incidental contact while moving to the ball that does not materially affect the route of a receiver or a defender.
3. A player who uses as a weapon a helmet he is not wearing is automatically disqualified.
4. If the defensive team commits a foul when it has no time outs left during the final 30 seconds of either half, the offensive team can decline the penalty for the foul and have the time on the clock expire.

1982 REVIEW

SUNDAY, SEPT. 12 — BROWNS 21, Seahawks 7 (55,907) at Kingdome. In the season opener, Cleveland jumped to a 21-0 halftime lead and was never threatened. FB Mike Pruitt (30 rushes for a season-high 136 yards and two touchdowns) and RB Charles White (73 yards on 14 carries and five catches for 66 yards) provided the offensive thrust, while the defense tied a team record with eight quarterback sacks. Rookie linebacker Chip Banks, playing in his first professional game, contributed three QB sacks, four tackles, a defended pass and forced a fumble. Banks' impact was felt midway through the first quarter when he sacked and forced QB Dave Krieg to fumble (DE Marshall Harris recovered), enabling Pruitt to score five plays later. On Cleveland's next possession, White took a pitchout 18 yards around left end, giving the Browns a 14-0 lead. The Browns' defense turned in its finest performance of the season, holding Seattle to 40 yards rushing and 180 total net yards (both season lows), while the offense had season-high totals in first downs (25) and yards rushing (200). Pruitt caught his 200th pass and became the fourth player in Cleveland history to surpass 1,000 career carries. Cleveland lost LB Clay Matthews for nearly the entire season when he broke his ankle in the final minute of the game. Since 1962, the Browns own a 15-6 record on opening day, second best in NFL behind Dallas (17-3-1).

SUNDAY, SEPT. 19 — Eagles 24, BROWNS 21 (78,830) at Cleveland Stadium. A soldout Cleveland Stadium crowd celebrated too soon when the Browns took a 21-17 lead over the Eagles with 57 seconds left in the game. The Browns' score came on a 34-yard touchdown toss from QB Brian Sipe to TE Ozzie Newsome. However, Philadelphia QB Ron Jaworski engineered a quick, four-play, 65-yard drive to earn the Eagles a 24-21 victory with 22 seconds to play. Following a 57-day players' strike and playing for the first time in nine weeks, Cleveland's Matt Bahr calmly booted a 24-yard field goal as time expired to lift the Browns over New England on a rain-soaked afternoon. After a scoreless first three quarters, the Browns took a 7-0 lead early in the final period on a QB Brian Sipe to WR Ricky Feacher 40-yard package. The Patriots tied the score at seven with 3:18 left in the game when QB Matt Cavanaugh completed his third and last pass of the game, a 38-yard scoring strike to WR Preston Brown in the corner of the endzone. Bahr's winning FG was made possible after SS Clinton Burrell forced FB Mark Van Eeghen to fumble (second of the game and only the 24th fumble in his nine-year career). Burrell recovered the loose ball on the New England 12 with 1:24 to play to set up the winning kick. Sipe finished the day with 13 completions in 32 attempts for 138 yards, including a seven of 11 (87 yards) performance in the second half. Feacher caught four for 78 yards and RB Charles White added 48 yards through the mud and 18 yards (three receptions) through the air. The Browns did not commit a turnover and Steve Cox kept the Pats backed up most of the game with four punts

Playing on Thanksgiving Day before a national television audience, the Browns dropped to 2-2 as Dallas pulled away to a 31-0 advantage before QB Paul McDonald, in relief of Brian Sipe, guided Cleveland to two fourth quarter touchdowns. Dallas used 299 yards rushing (116 by Tony Dorsett and 73 by Ron Springs) and 215 passing and took advantage of five Cleveland turnovers (four interceptions). Dallas fumbled six times, but the Browns managed just two recoveries. FB Mike Pruitt produced 65 yards on 14 rushes and RB Charles White caught a career-high eight passes for 45 yards. QB Brian Sipe (11 of 23 for 85 yards) was intercepted three times before McDonald (nine of 15 for 151) took over. P Steve Cox had his busiest day ever, punting nine times for a 43.7 average. ILB Tom Cousineau was the game's leading tackler with nine and intercepted his first NFL pass. RB Dino Hall's 18-yard TD was the first scoring reception of his career.

Despite five individual and club records by the Browns, the San Diego Chargers jumped to a 27-3 lead at the half and held on for a 30-13 victory. The Chargers scored on two of their first three possessions to take a 14-0 lead before Matt Bahr's 46-yard field goal put the Browns on the scoreboard. After two more San Diego TDs in the second quarter by RB James Brooks (22 carries for 96 yards), Cleveland closed the gap to 27-13 in the third quarter on another Bahr FG (34 yards) and a four-yard QB Brian Sipe to TE Ozzie Newsome pass. Sipe finished the day with a club-record 33 completions in 48 attempts for 338 yards, including 23 of 31 for 234 in the second half. In addition, Sipe connected on 14 straight passes, breaking his own club record of 13, and surpassed 20,000 yards passing in nine NFL seasons. Newsome caught ten passes for 140 yards (both career records) and FB Mike Pruitt, in addition to rushing 18 times for 77 yards, caught a career-high nine passes for 43 yards. QB Paul McDonald started his first NFL game and CB Hanford Dixon intercepted the first three passes of his career to spark a fired up defense and snap a three-game losing streak. The Browns defense, playing on a rain-soaked and soggy turf, held the Steelers to 222 total yards and one touchdown, with the TD coming after McDonald fumbled the ball when sacked on his own 22. Dixon, playing his best game since joining the Browns as a number one draft pick in 1981, added five tackles, a quarterback sack, two forced fumbles and a defensed pass. The Browns scored on a 44-yard Matt Bahr field goal in the first quarter, but Pittsburgh led 7-3 at the half. Cleveland scored the winning TD after Pittsburgh P John Goodson managed only 16 yards on a punt from the Steelers' endzone and TE Ozzie Newsome caught two McDonald passes (4 and 22) to set up FB Johnny Davis' first TD as a Brown. Davis was subbing for Mike Pruitt, who left the game with a thigh bruise. Cleveland's defense halted three of four Steeler drives with interceptions in the fourth quarter and P Steve Cox gave Pittsburgh a safety in the final seconds of the game. McDonald was 19 of 40 for 227, but was sacked six times. The wide receiver corps of Dwight Walker, Dave Logan and Ricky Feacher each caught four passes and RB Charles White three. Bradshaw finished the day with 12 completions in 39 attempts for 144 yards and was caught behind the line of scrimmage three times.

RB Charles White sailed over the top with 5:47 remaining to give Cleveland its margin of victory and move the Browns closer to their second playoff appearance in three years. SS Clinton Burrell recovered his second Earl Campbell fumble of the day, this one on the Oiler one-yard line, to set up White's dive. For the second week in a row, the defense came up with four interceptions, in addition to three QB sacks. QB Paul McDonald (18 of 34 for 248 yards, one TD and no interceptions) engineered the longest drive of the season (96 yards in eight plays) to put the Browns on top, 10-7, in the second quarter. McDonald capped the drive with the longest pass of his career, a 56-yard catch and run by WR Dave Logan. Houston led 14-10 at the end of three quarters before Matt Bahr added a 24-yard FG, closing the gap to one. Judson Flint made an acrobatic interception at the Cleveland 37 with 1:26 to play, preserving the fourth victory of the season and making it a "Kardiac" finish for the 36th time in the last 56 games. FB Mike Pruitt rushed 27 times for 88 yards and Logan, WR Ricky Feacher and White each caught four passes — Logan for 83 yards. Houston's Earl Campbell was held under 44 yards rushing (43 yards on 17 carries) for the third consecutive time vs. Browns' defense. Using a 120-yard (23 carries) rushing performance by RB Franco Harris and a 114-yard (five catches) receiving day by WR Lynn Swann, Pittsburgh defeated the Browns for the 13th consecutive time at Three Rivers Stadium. After trailing 27-7 early in the fourth quarter, the Browns pulled to within six at 27-21 with five minutes left in the game. Cleveland forced the Steelers to a third and 11 situation from the Pittsburgh 19, but QB Terry Bradshaw found Swann across the middle and the all-time Steeler reception leader raced 60 yards to set up a clinching 34-yard FG by Gary Anderson. All three of Cleveland's TDs came on QB Paul McDonald passes. McDonald, who hit on 22 of 47 attempts for a career-high 313 yards, connected with WR Ricky Feacher twice in the endzone (one and 12 yards) and WR Dave Logan (eight). Feacher finished his best game ever with career-high catches (seven) and yards (109), while Newsome pulled down nine passes for 123 yards (third 100-yard receiving game of season). The Steelers took advantage of six Cleveland turnovers (season high) and blocked a Steve Cox punt for a TD in the first half. FS Clarence Scott, playing in the 170th game as a Brown, intercepted Bradshaw for the sixth time of career, and increased his 12-year total to 37. Newsome extended his own club record to 50 consecutive games in which he has caught at least one pass. Matt Bahr booted three more PATs to extend his streak to 66 straight without a miss.

Facing the Raiders for the second consecutive time in postseason play, the Browns were defeated as Raiders totaled 510 yards of offense. QB Jim Plunkett completed 24 of 37 attempts for 386 yards, but two first quarter interceptions by the Browns' defense (FS Clarence Scott and CB Hanford Dixon) kept the game close. Trailing 13-10 at halftime, Cleveland took the second half kickoff and marched 54 yards to the Raider 14. On first down, RB Charles White (9 carries, 30 yards) gained three before former Brown DE Lyle Alzado forced the ball loose. LB Jeff Barnes recovered for L.A. and 12 plays, 89 yards later, RB Marcus Allen scampered into the endzone from three yards to widen the Raider margin to ten. Chris Bahr put the Raiders on the scoreboard first with a 27-yard FG after Plunkett passed 64 yards to WR Cliff Branch (five receptions for 161 yards) on the first play of the game. Matt Bahr tied the game and a NFL playoff record in the second quarter with the longest FG of his career — 52 yards. WR Ricky Feacher's 43-yard TD catch from McDonald (2:02 left in the half) tied the game at ten, but the Raiders quickly responded with another Bahr FG, this one with six seconds to play in the half. Although QB Paul McDonald was constantly harassed by the Raiders' defense (six sacks), the Southern Cal graduate did not throw an interception and completed 18 of 37 passes for 281 yards and one TD. P Steve Cox had the best day of his career, punting six times for an average of 48.5 — a Cleveland playoff record. Feacher, who set up Bahr's record-tying FG with a 47-yard catch, had his second straight 100-yard receiving game (four for 124 yards).

HISTORY

- 1946:** Browns were started by owner Arthur (Mickey) McBride as member of the All America Football Conference. Paul Brown was named coach and general manager and the first player he signed was then tailback Otto Graham. The Browns won the Western title with a 42-17 victory over the Buffalo Bills and then defeated the New York Yankees in the championship game (14-9).
- 1947-49:** Browns continued their domination of the AAFC, winning three more championships.
- 1950:** Following the merger of the AAFC and the NFL, the Browns tied with the New York Giants with 10-2 records for a share of Eastern title. Browns won playoff, 8-3, and then stopped Los Angeles, 30-28, for the championship.
- 1951-53:** Browns won three consecutive Eastern titles, but lost each time in the league's title match. In 1953, McBride sold the club to an organization headed by David Jones.
- 1954-55:** Led by quarterback Otto Graham, the Browns won back-to-back NFL championships.
- 1956:** At 5-7, the Browns suffered first losing season.
- 1957:** Jim Brown was drafted; was named rookie of the year and helped Cleveland to Eastern Division title.
- 1961:** Former television and advertising executive Art Modell bought the Browns.
- 1963:** Blanton Collier, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach.
- 1964:** Browns win division title with 52-20 victory over Giants and captured NFL championship with 27-0 win over Colts.
- 1965:** In what was to be his last season, Jim Brown won NFL MVP honors and led Cleveland to league title game where they were defeated by Green Bay.
- 1966:** An eighth round pick from 1964, Leroy Kelly became the club's dominant threat, rushing for 1,141 yards, but the Browns finished second in their division to Dallas.
- 1967:** NFL was realigned and Browns won Century Division.
- 1968:** With newly acquired quarterback Bill Nelsen (from Pittsburgh), Browns won division; beat Dallas in playoffs and lost to Baltimore in the championship.
- 1969:** Browns won third consecutive division crown, but lost to Minnesota in title game.
- 1970:** Browns became members of AFC Central and finished second.
- 1971:** Nick Skorich, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach. Team won first AFC Central crown.
- 1972:** Browns once again gained postseason, losing to eventual champion Miami in playoffs.
- 1975-77:** Forrest Gregg, Browns' offensive line coach, becomes head coach; Gregg Pruitt has three consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons; Dick Modzelewski coaches final game of 1977.
- 1978:** Sam Rutigliano becomes the first non-Browns' assistant to gain head coaching position. Team won first three on way to 8-8 finish.
- 1979:** Losses in final two games prevented team from entering playoffs, finishing 9-7; Mike Pruitt keeps the tradition of outstanding Browns' running backs and has the first of three straight 1,000-yard seasons.
- 1980:** Browns win AFC Central title with 11-5 record; lost to eventual Super Bowl champion Oakland in playoff; Brian Sipe is consensus MVP of league.
- 1982:** In strike-shortened season, Browns finish eighth in AFC (4-5) and gain playoffs second time in three years. Lost to Raiders in Super Bowl Tournament.

Few question that Jim Brown deserves the title "the greatest running back in the history of football." Brown is the leading rusher in NFL history, rushing for 12,312 yards in just nine seasons (1957-65), averaging 5.2 yards per carry. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1971 and his number (32) has been retired.

Lou Groza played in eight Pro Bowls and a club-record 17 seasons for the Cleveland Browns (1950-59, 1961-67). Fifteen seasons later, "The Toe" still holds 16 club records, including games played (216), most consecutive PATs made (138) and most points (1,349). Groza, who was also a dominant offensive tackle, was inducted into Pro Football's Hall of Fame in 1974.



Paul Warfield, who currently works in the Browns' front office, was elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility (1983). The former Ohio State All-America running back and defensive back averaged more than 20 yards per catch for seven consecutive seasons, an NFL record. Warfield's 20.1 yard per catch career average is unsurpassed in NFL history.

CLEVELAND STADIUM

Cleveland Stadium, a famous and proud landmark for this city, is the nation's largest facility housing both a Major League baseball team and an NFL franchise. The Stadium, with a current capacity of 80,098, was completed in July of 1931 at a cost of \$3.5 million.

The Stadium, which sits on a landfill, has proved to be multi-purpose. Along with baseball and football, the range of activities at the Stadium has included everything from a heavyweight championship bout (Schmeling vs. Stribling) to religious convocations. The Metropolitan Opera and the Beatles have performed on the field, as have circuses, rodeos, big bands and a horde of professional and amateur athletes.

Over the years, the Stadium became a financial strain for the city of Cleveland. Art Modell responded to the need in 1974, when he formed Cleveland Stadium Corporation and signed a 25-year lease with the city. In early 1982, all of the stock of the corporation was sold to the Browns.

When the agreement between the city and Modell had been reached in 1974, the Browns' owner promised a \$10 million improvement plan, which was recently concluded. The results are very much in evidence.

The list of improvements is a long one, but includes the addition of 108 luxurious loges, a computerized scoreboard, more comfortable seats, new concession facilities, a new lighting system (both inside and around the perimeter of the Stadium), outfield fence pads, and the installation of a new playing field, which was lowered two feet to provide a better view from the stands (1976).

Old electrical and plumbing systems were replaced. A press box elevator was added. Cleaning and painting continue to be top priority items in a continuous maintenance program.
