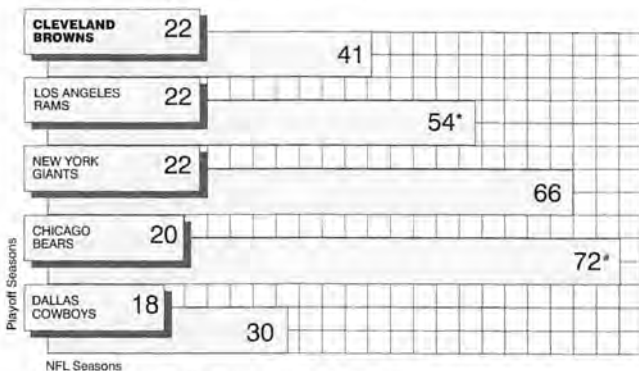
A PLAYOFF FRANCHISE

The Cleveland Browns have made the NFL playoffs 22 times in their 41-year history. Only the Los Angeles Rams and New York Giants have produced as many playoff seasons.

The Browns were the only AFC team to advance to postseason play five straight years, from 1985-89 (including three AFC Central Division titles). Only San Francisco matched that streak in the NFL.

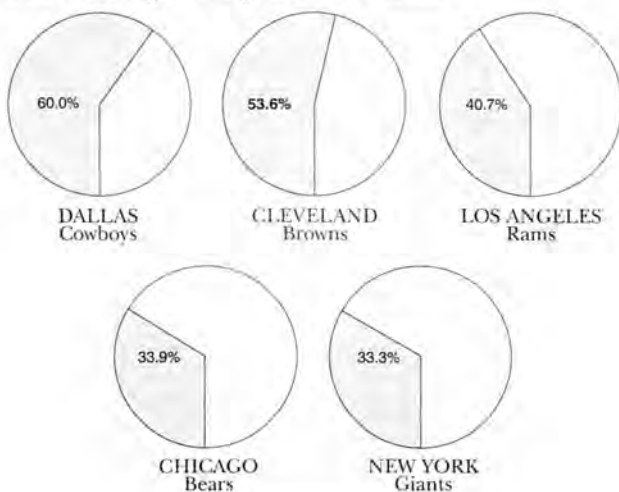
The Browns won the AFC Central five times and made the Super Bowl tournament seven times in the 1980's. Cleveland owned the fourth-best overall record in the AFC in the '80's, and the conference's best between 1986-89. The Browns have won more games than any other club since 1950 (338-222-10), and owner Art Modell has seen Cleveland make the playoffs 14 times since purchasing the club in 1961.

31st Year with Browns

Be it at the local level or on a national scale, Art Modell continues to be acknowledged for his devotion to and his work on behalf of the Browns, the NFL and his community. And while the recognition gives pause for reflection, Modell continues with the same type of energy and daring that inspired him to buy the Cleveland Browns at the age of 35 for what was then (March, 1961) an unheard of sum of \$4 million.

Certainly this past year has been, as described by Modell, "my most frustrating". The Browns fall from the NFL's elite was dramatic as they went from the brink of a Super Bowl with a January, 1990 appearance in the AFC Championship game to a disturbing 3-13 season. Last year's dismal display stopped a Browns' streak of five straight trips to the playoffs that included four AFC Central Division championships and three AFC Title Game losses to Denver. Modell did not hesitate to try and stop the fall and the result is new head coach Bill Belichick and his staff.

Modell and everybody connected with the Browns are calling the 1990 season "a nightmare, a temporary setback, but an inspiration to do everything we can to go right back to the top with a chance to win Super Bowls." Leading that charge will be Modell, who last Spring was picked in a special *Sporting News* edition as one of the "100 Most Powerful People in Sports". Modell was listed as 18th, the highest ranking of the 28 NFL owners. In April, the Northeastern Chapter of the National Football Foundation saluted Art with the "1991 Distinguished American Award." Next Spring, the NFL Alumni Association will give its highest distinction, the "Leather Helmet" award, to Modell.

At the local level, Modell's dedication to the world renowned Cleveland Clinic is emphasized with his appointment as President of the Cleveland Clinic Foundation in April. "The clinic is so important to the good health of this community and accepts patients from all over the world, including the leaders from a variety of nations, because of its outstanding reputation," Modell says.

Modell's influence in the NFL was recognized at the 1990 NFL Owners' Spring meeting. Commissioner Paul Tagliabue called a surprised Art Modell to the front of the room and presented the Browns' owner with an elaborate plaque signed by Art's fellow owners. In a letter written by Tagliabue that was mounted on the plaque, which also included a *New York Times* article on the NFL's current television agreement, the Commissioner wrote:

"The League has always had its share of special people. These have been the founders, owners, officials and coaches who have stayed the course over long periods of years, and who have made special contributions to the welfare of the League and its members. . . Your leadership and achievement in securing the latest round of television contracts again make clear that you are one of these special people."

Modell's 31 years of service as owner of one of the NFL's most successful franchises has been highlighted by dedication, loyalty, accomplishment and a human touch, often enhanced by his sense of humor, that is so often missing in today's multi-million dollar professional sports' industry.

Actually, Modell showed signs that he was a "special person" at an earlier age. When he was 15 years old, Modell dropped out of high school and began work as an electrician's helper in a Brooklyn shipyard. He was cleaning out the hulls of ships to help his financially strapped family after the death of his father.

Not too many years later, Modell became an NFL owner. Risking every dollar he owned and borrowing as much money as his bankers would allow, Modell, then a highly respected New York advertising and television executive working as a partner for the L.H. Hartman Company, purchased the Cleveland Browns on March 21, 1961. With his entry into the NFL at the age of 35, Modell had written his "American success story."

Modell's vision that the NFL would soon explode at the box office and on television proved correct, and his prominence in the league grew rapidly. By 1967, he was President of the NFL, a position he held until 1970. "When I first came into the league, I was in awe of people like George Halas and Art Rooney. They were very kind and gracious to accept me into their fraternity so quickly," Modell says. Today, Modell is the dean of owners, having more years of NFL ownership than any other.

Modell and the Browns have been successful in the 30 years of Art's leadership. During his tenure, the Cleveland record is 242-189-7 for a winning percentage of .561. Only the Cowboys, the Raiders, the Dolphins, and the Rams have fared better than Modell's Browns in that time. His teams have played 19 playoff games in 30 years, earning the postseason 14 times. In five other years (1963, 1970, 1976, 1979 and 1983), the Browns had a chance to make the playoffs on the final day of the regular season, but did not qualify.

Modell's fourth Browns' team (1964) won the NFL Championship with a stunning 27-0 victory over the Baltimore Colts. The 1965, 1968 and 1969 teams each played in the league title contest, while Art's recent frustration saw his team lose heart-breaking, but memorable AFC Championship games in 1986, '87 and '89 to the Denver Broncos. Under Modell, the Browns also earned postseason play in 1967, 1971, 1972 (when the Dolphins preserved their historic undefeated season with a thrilling come-from-behind 20-14 victory), 1980, 1982, 1985 and 1988.

Modell's recent recognitions add to an impressive local and national gallery, including the Washington Touchdown Club's first-ever Lifetime Achievement Award (1988). Modell's salute from the Browns' Chapter of the NFL Alumni in 1988 is one he cherishes. "I have great respect for the men who have played in this league, specifically those who have helped make this a consistent winning franchise. I'm a fan at heart and it made me feel very proud to have players like Jim Houston, Doug Dieken and Paul Warfield come back and say 'way to go,'" Modell says.

The Professional Football Writers bestowed the Jack Horrigan Award on Modell in 1988, as a tribute to his aiding and understanding their profession. Here are other awards Modell has earned: the "National Volunteer Citation" from the Arthritis Foundation, "Champion of Brotherhood" distinction from the National Conference of Christians and Jews for "Modell's lifetime service in combatting discrimination and prejudice," the "Citizen of the Year" award from the Cleveland Board of Realtors, the "United Way Commitment" honor for his and his team's involvement, the "Blanton Collier Award" from the Browns' Alumni, "1983 Executive of the Year" from the Cleveland Sales and Marketing Club, the "Pride of Cleveland" award from the Sports' Media Association of Cleveland and Ohio, and the "Super-Citizen" honor from the Variety Club.

Area hospitals, cultural organizations, Cleveland schools and youth activities have all received Modell's time and money to meet severe financial strains. Hiram College made Modell a member of its prestigious Garfield Society; John Carroll University awarded him an honorary LL.D. degree (1979), and Wilberforce University has honored him for "Outstanding Citizenship." Modell has also served as the Foreman for the Cuyahoga County Grand Jury.

Modell's community leadership inspired a 1974 request to run Cleveland Stadium, which was in terrible repair and losing money for the city. Seventeen years later, Modell continues to run the Stadium that is leased through 1998 and gives Cleveland over \$1 million in revenues annually. Art also lent his money and influence to refurbish the financially troubled Cleveland Sheraton Hotel at Public Square, which became Stouffer's Inn On the Square under his direction. The *Cleveland Plain Dealer* said of his effort: "Not only did Modell take on the job of saving the hotel, he turned the venture into a team effort to save downtown and Public Square from a visual blight and the city from a loss of millions in convention business."

In NFL matters, his dedication to the league Constitution and Commissioner's office is second to none. He serves as Chairman of both the league's Broadcast Committee and NFL Films. His daring transfer (1966) of the Browns to the American Conference, along with Pittsburgh and Baltimore, solved the AFL/NFL merger problem. He is also a member of the NFL's current Expansion Committee.

One of the many innovations he started with the Browns was the preseason doubleheader concept that proved extremely popular from 1962 to 1971. When a host team was sought for the first Monday Night Game in 1970, Modell volunteered the Browns and 85,703 watched Cleveland beat the Jets, 31-21, quieting league moguls who were predicting box office disaster with a weeknight game. When other teams doubted a second Thanksgiving Day game in Dallas could succeed, Modell volunteered and the Detroit/Dallas doubleheader has become a holiday tradition.

Modell serves on the boards of directors of National City Corporation and National City Bank. He is a board member at Churchill Downs and is one of two Churchill directors on the Triple Crown Productions Company.

Modell, who completed high school through night classes, joined the Air Force in 1943 (he was 18) and then enrolled in a New York City television school following World War II. Always an innovator, Modell produced one of the first regular daytime television shows in the nation before moving into the advertising business in 1954.

Pat Modell, Art's wife, has worked hard to improve the Cleveland community. Currently, she and Marty Knerly (mother of Olwen Modell, David's wife) are raising funds to build a hospice to serve the eastside of Cleveland. Pat serves on the board at Ursuline College and is active with the Make-A-Wish Foundation, the Cleveland Musical Arts Association, the Cleveland Ballet, the Playhouse Square Foundation and Cerebral Palsy Association. A former actress, Pat appeared in over 400 motion pictures and television shows.

The Modell's have two sons: John, 32, and David, 30. John is a musician/composer and works as a digital mastering engineer at Oceanview Digital Mastering. He and his wife, Tracy, an artist, live in Los Angeles. David, the Browns' Vice President of Marketing and Assistant to the President, lives in Kirtland with his wife, Olwen, an attorney, and Art and Pat's granddaughter, Breslin Ebright (2/5/90). David and Olwen expect their second child in November.

"According to the individuals who run the clubs, the NFL's most respected owner is Art Modell of the Cleveland Browns. Modell, they say, makes it a point to get along with the representatives of the league's many cliques and factions. He can be tough, but he plays fair. In a sense, they say Modell is the NFL." *Los Angeles Times*, Jan. 25, 1987.

BROWNS' TELEVISION

Along with producing a football team, the Browns also produce television shows, including a weekly half hour prime time feature called "Browns' Insider" and the team's preseason games. "Browns' Insider" airs weekly during the season at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesdays on WOIO-TV. The show originated in 1989 and won a local "Emmy" for the use of original sound in a segment reviewing a win over the Chicago Bears. Last year's show was nominated for three Emmys, including "best sports' show." David Modell serves as the show's Executive Producer, working closely with Kevin Byrne, who writes the segments. The Browns' Video Department, headed by John Wuehrmann, "shoots" and edits the segments. Jim Mueller is the host.

This is the second year the Browns are producing their preseason games, which will also be carried on WOIO-TV. Mueller provides the play-by-play. Ted Nathanson, who recently resigned as NBC's Coordinating Producer for NFL Football, will direct three preseason broadcasts (Aug. 5 vs. Tampa Bay, Aug. 16 at Washington and Aug. 23 at Minnesota).



JIM BAILEY

The abilities Jim Bailey brings to the Browns can best be seen in the importance and the success of the projects he directs. From coordinating trips to London for a preseason game as he did in 1989, to serving as the team's chief administrator on a day-to-day basis, almost everything the Browns accomplish reflects his influence. The team's brand new state-of-the-art \$13 million football complex is Bailey's most recent accomplishment. Jim started the project, directed the details of getting it built and has it ready for the start of the 1991 season.

In a business "covered" by the media as thoroughly as an NFL team is, it is surprising that Bailey has maintained such a low profile in his 14 years with the Browns. Always working closely with Owner Art Modell since joining the franchise in 1978, Jim has opted to work quietly behind the scenes, while having impact on every aspect of the team's operations. "There is not a Browns' function that does not include Jim's input. From hiring a head coach, to our legal and government affairs, Jim is involved," Modell recently said of the Browns' Executive Vice President, Administration and Legal.

A former scholarship winner as a defensive back at Florida State, Bailey was promoted to his current position in early 1984. During his tenure with the Browns, Bailey has done everything from negotiate player, radio and TV contracts, to handle Browns' legal affairs, to coordinate Cleveland Stadium activities. In fact, most of Jim's initial work with the organization involved the development and maintenance of Cleveland Stadium Corporation.

Bailey earned a law degree from the University of Michigan after graduating from FSU. Prior to joining the Browns, Jim worked for the Cleveland-based law firm of Guren, Merritt, Sogg and Cohen, where he was quickly named a partner in 1976. Bailey's duties at the law offices included work with Art Modell in the development of the Cleveland Stadium Corporation lease arrangement with the city. That association was instrumental in bringing Bailey to the Browns.

A native of Wilmington, Ohio, Bailey stood out in three sports (football, basketball and track) at Wilmington High School. Currently, Jim serves on the Board of Directors of the NFL Alumni/Browns' Chapter.

Jim and his wife, Ann, who coordinated the day-to-day activities of the building of the Browns' new facility, live in Bratenahl. Daughter Sarah, a 1989 graduate from St. Louis' Washington University with a degree in psychology and business, is working for the Chicago advertising firm of Lee Hill Inc., while daughter Jenny, a 1990 Northwestern University graduate (psychology and finance), is working in Denver for Princeton Review, a college testing company.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Browns' have finished in first place in their division or conference 18 times in the 41-year NFL history of the franchise. That marks the most titles of any franchise, followed by the N.Y. Giants' 17 titles (since 1933) and the Cleveland/L.A. Rams' 15.



ERNIE ACCORSI

Few NFL executives can claim the production Ernie Accorsi has achieved since coming to the Browns in 1984. In those seven seasons, Accorsi has helped direct the Browns to five playoff seasons, including four AFC Central titles and three appearances in the AFC Championship game (following 1986, '87 and '89).

Now in his third decade as an NFL executive, Accorsi is respected league-wide as an astute "football man" who earned his position through hard work and intelligence. What is Ernie's impact on the Browns? In December of 1989, *Pro Football Weekly* stated it simply: "Look at the Browns' record since Accorsi arrived."

To his credit, Accorsi downplays his role in the Browns' success. "We're not a big company and we have an owner who works every day at the football business, and he allows a number of us to express our opinions. We've been able to reach a consensus on most major decisions and, except for last season, it's worked out pretty well for us."

Accorsi is celebrating his 22nd year in the NFL this season. He began his league career in 1970 as the public relations' director of the then Baltimore Colts. Since that job, Accorsi has worked in virtually every phase of the football business, save coaching. In his current capacity with the Browns as Executive Vice President-Football Operations, Accorsi shoulders most of the responsibilities for player acquisitions, including the draft, and other player-related movements. He works closely with Head Coach Bill Belichick, directs all player contract negotiations and manages the Browns' personnel department.

Accorsi handled the delicate and important trade that gave the Browns the rights to then-sophomore Bernie Kosar in the spring of 1985. Kosar joined the Browns that summer and the team has progressed to win four of the last six AFC Central championships, plus make the playoffs a fifth time (1988) as a Wild Card team. After serving five years with the Colts in the public relations' capacity, Accorsi joined Commissioner Pete Rozelle's staff as Assistant to the President of the National Football Conference in 1975 and '76. He returned to the Colts in 1977 as assistant general manager and later became the club's general manager for two years (1982 and '83).

Just prior to coming to Cleveland, Accorsi's responsibilities in Baltimore included all of the Colts' functions. From negotiating local radio/TV contracts, to player movements, to the team's marketing and public relations efforts, Accorsi's imprint was seen. The Colts' climb from a winless 1982 (strike-shortened, 0-9) to seven victories in 1983, is attributed to Ernie's influence and direction. Last November, the Sports' Boosters of Maryland cited Ernie with their "Excellence in the Field of Sports Award".

Accorsi received the highest commendation from his alma mater, Wake Forest, in 1988 when he was presented the "Distinguished Service Citation for Athletics." Following his graduation from Wake in 1963, Accorsi served in the Army between jobs as a sportswriter for the *Charlotte News* and later with the *Baltimore Evening Sun* (1964). He then worked as the Sports' Publicity Director of Philadelphia's St. Joseph's College before joining the *Philadelphia Inquirer* in 1966. Three years later (1969), he returned to collegiate athletics as Penn State University's Assistant Sports Information Director.

Ernie, who is an avid reader of world and sports' histories, has three children: Michael, 22, who graduated from Pittsburgh with a degree in communications in June and is now a graduate assistant to George Welsh's staff at Virginia; Sherlyn, 21, a student at Penn State; and Patrick, 17, a high school senior.

Ten years ago, only two teams in the NFL had marketing departments. Today, all 28 football franchises devote much time and energy to marketing their teams. A trendsetter in this quickly-growing field is the Browns' marketing team headed by David Modell, who organized the department in 1985.

Among the many revenue-producing projects started by Modell, who first worked for the team at the age of 14, is the Browns' television production effort. Modell started a weekly half-hour television show ("Browns' Insider") two years ago and, last season, added the team's preseason television production under the Browns' umbrella. (All but three NFL teams sell their preseason TV rights to a station). Modell not only serves as the producer of the Browns' television ventures, he also is the main sales person of the commercial time.

Modell was promoted to Vice President of Marketing/Assistant to the President in April of 1989. Previously, Modell, who is 30, had been the team's first-ever Director of Marketing. Modell's appointment was explained by Browns' Executive Vice President Jim Bailey. "The promotion reflects the added importance we've placed, as well as the other NFL teams, on local marketing. Player and operational costs are rising and we are aggressively seeking new sources of income through marketing to balance this inflation. Secondly, David's promotion is an indication of his growing role in our organization," Bailey said.

Since leaving his Browns' public relations' assistant job six years ago, Modell has significantly increased the team's advertising revenues with such innovations as a 56-page training camp program, production and networking of Browns' television shows and numerous game-day sponsorships. At the league level, Modell serves on the Executive Committee for marketing specialists.

Along with his marketing duties, Modell has continually increased his responsibilities with the Browns. For the past four years, he has negotiated player contracts under the direction of Ernie Accorsi. He serves as a coordinator for the Browns' promotional and advertising activities with radio stations WMMS/WHK, which has the rights to the Browns' broadcasts.

Modell is deeply involved with the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland, where he serves on the Board and Executive Council, while heading their development fund raising. Modell also works with the Lake County Boy Scouts' Association.

As a 14-year-old student, David worked Browns' games as a member of the grounds' crew. In the next years, he spent time as a front office aide and training camp intern. After graduating from The Gunnery School (Washington, Ct.) and attending Wittenberg University, Modell joined the Browns in a fulltime capacity in the team's ticket office (1981-82). He then worked two years as the front office manager for the Fernwood Inn, a resort in the Pocono Mountains (1982-84) before returning to Cleveland in October of 1984.

Modell and his wife Olwen, an attorney, are parents of daughter Breslin Ebright, who was born on 2/5/90. The Modells, who live in Kirtland, are expecting their second child in November.

Now in his 11th year with the Browns and his 13th NFL season, Kevin Byrne is a Browns' Vice President and the team's Director of Public Relations. Byrne, who was born in Cleveland 42 years ago, joined the franchise in 1981 as the Director of Publicity and earned his promotion to vice president three years later (1984).

While he directs the Browns' public relations' department, Byrne also works closely with the team's ticketing, operations and marketing departments and he has negotiated a number of the Browns' preseason television and radio contracts. Along with David Modell, Byrne coordinates the Browns' preseason telecasts and a weekly half-hour TV show called "Browns' Insider", which he writes.

Byrne began his NFL career with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1977 when he was named as the then youngest public relations director in the league. He stayed with the Big Red for two years before becoming Director of Public Affairs for Trans World Airline (1979-80). In 1980, *St. Louis Magazine* selected Byrne as one of 80 St. Louisans "to watch in the 80's."

From 1974-77, Byrne was Sports Information Director at Marquette University, where he worked with Al McGuire and the Warriors' 1977 NCAA basketball champions. His first job after graduating from college was as the "SID" at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. His publications at both schools won numerous national and regional awards from the College Sports Information Directors' Association.

Byrne earned distinction as a member of Alpha Sigma Nu, the national Jesuit Honor Society, while gaining a degree in journalism from Marquette University (1971). He was a member of "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities" and was a four-year member of the Warrior wrestling team. (Byrne currently helps coach a grade school wrestling team in the Cleveland area). Kevin is a graduate of Lakewood (O.) St. Edwards High School, where he is Vice-Chairman of the school's Board of Trustees and Executive Committee. For the past five years, he has been the chairman of the NFL's Pro Football Writers' Liaison Committee.

Kevin and his wife, Sally, live in Westlake with their four children: daughter Shannon, 15, and sons Sean, 14, Tim, 12, and Conor, 9.

BILL BELICHICK

On Feb. 5, 1991, 38-year-old Bill Belichick was named head coach of the Cleveland Browns by Owner and President Art Modell. Belichick becomes the eighth fulltime head coach in the team's 41-year NFL history and the current youngest head coach in the league.

Belichick comes to the Browns from the New York Giants, where he served as an assistant for the past 12 seasons and helped the Giants to Super Bowl victories in 1986 and 1990. Last season, the Giants' championship defense, which was coordinated by Belichick, allowed just 211 points, an average of 13.2 per game, lowest in the league. During the 1986 Super Bowl campaign, the Giants gave up 236 points, second best in the NFL to the Bears' 187. Over the last three seasons, the Giants have allowed the fewest points in the league, 777, nine better than San Francisco's 786.

Modell, who offered Belichick a five-year contract, said "We studied the field thoroughly since early December and interviewed candidates over the last month, and it became clear that Bill Belichick has something special and deserves this opportunity at a relatively young age. He's bright, competitive, intense and dedicated to the game. He knows what it takes to win in this league and he's going to help get us back to where we expect to be - in the playoffs, fighting to win the Super Bowl."

"To be a head coach in this league has been a goal of mine. The fact that it is Cleveland makes it a dream come true," Belichick said. "Cleveland is in my blood. I have very fond memories of this area."

Belichick's father Steve is from Struthers, Ohio (near Youngstown) and played football at (Case) Western Reserve University (1938-40) under Bill Edwards, who was Bill's godfather. (Steve played fullback for the Detroit Lions in 1941). "I still have family in Struthers and I have always enjoyed visiting there and coming up to Cleveland to see Browns and Indians' games," Belichick said. "My father used to take me to Hiram College when I was a boy to watch the Browns practice, and I remember seeing some of the greats like Jim Brown, Lou Groza, Gary Collins, Erich Barnes and Gene Hickerson." (Steve Belichick recently retired from the Naval Academy, where he coached for 33 years).

Belichick began his coaching career as a 23-year-old in 1975 as a special assistant to then-Baltimore Head Coach Ted Marchibroda. "He was a young man who was willing to work round the clock for nothing and learn everything he could about the game," Marchibroda recalled. "After training camp, we got him a hotel room across from mine and, whatever we gave him, he did it well and thoroughly. The first thing you should know about Bill is that he's a worker, plus he knows people and this is a people business. He's a good man, with good character and there's no doubt he knows defense. I believe he'll be a successful head coach."

"Ted taught me what being an NFL coach is all about and I owe him a great deal. He gave me a tremendous learning experience at a young age. I saw the highs and lows. The Colts lost four of their first five and then came back to go 10-and-four and win the AFC Eastern championship," Belichick added.

A year later, Belichick joined the Lions' staff of Rick Forzano as assistant special teams' coach and later helped with the tight ends and receivers under Tommy Hudspeth. He left the Lions after the 1977 season to join Red Miller's Denver Bronco staff as assistant special teams' coach and assistant to defensive coordinator Joe Collier. In 1978, he went to the Giants to serve as a defensive assistant and special teams' coach under Ray Perkins. After coaching the special teams in

1979-80, Belichick was given the added duties of linebackers in 1981-82. Under Bill Parcells, Belichick began coordinating the defense in 1983, plus coaching linebackers for two seasons. Parcells gave him the defensive coordinator's title, plus secondary coaching responsibilities in 1989 and 1990.

Belichick, who grew up in Annapolis, Maryland, is a graduate of Annapolis High and Phillips Academy, Andover (Mass.). He earned a B.A. in economics in 1975 from Wesleyan (Middletown, Ct.) University. Bill played football (center and tight end) and lacrosse in both high school and college.

Bill and his wife Debby (formerly Clarke), who is an elementary education graduate of Birmingham (Ala.) Southern College, have two children: Amanda (6) and Stephen (4).

The appointment of Ernie Adams was one of the first offensive assignments made by Head Coach Bill Belichick (along with Quarterbacks' Coach Gary Tranquill). Named offensive assistant, Adams was formerly the pro personnel director of the New York Giants (1982-85). Ernie brings to the Browns an extensive coaching and scouting background on both the professional and college levels.

"Ernie's responsibilities will be better defined as we put together our offensive staff, but I wanted to make sure he was going to be part of it," said Belichick. "He's talented and versatile enough to work with a number of positions. He's worked with quarterbacks, tight ends, receivers and some line, plus he's worked in pro personnel and has been involved with the drafting of players."

A former offensive assistant coach with both the New England Patriots (1975-78) and the New York Giants (1979-81), Adams was promoted to Director of Pro Personnel for the Giants (1982-85). In the latter capacity, he was responsible for rating all players in the NFL for purposes of trade or waiver acquisition, evaluated college talent for the NFL draft, and evaluated upcoming Giants' opponents. After leaving the Giants, Adams tackled Wall Street as an analyst/trader (1986-1990) for Mabon, Nugent & Co. of New York.

"Bill Belichick and I worked together for six years with the Giants," said Adams. "We have known each other for 20 years and have spent countless hours talking about football teams and what you need to have a winner in this league. The Browns have a team with a lot of tradition and ingredients to put together a championship team. A lot of hard work—plus when you get a team playing well—it's undeniably satisfying and a lot of fun."

Upon graduation from Northwestern (1975) with a B.S. in education, Adams was hired as administrative assistant to then-head coach Chuck Fairbanks of the Patriots. His duties included all aspects of football operation, plus computer analysis, statistical evaluation and film coordination. At the Giants, Adams served as an assistant offensive coach under then-head coach Ray Perkins. His duties were similar to those held at the Patriots and included on-the-field work with the offensive unit, coaching during meetings, and preparing offensive game plans.

Adams was graduated from Phillips Academy, Andover (Mass.), and enrolled at Northwestern. He worked under head coach Alex Agase, assisting the coaching staff as a game scout and undergraduate assistant on the freshman football team. He assumed the same responsibilities with the varsity teams, including on-the-field work with tight ends.

Adams is single and lives in Lakewood.

Jim Bates, whose coaching career spans 22 years, has coached every defensive position, served as a defensive coordinator and USFL head coach. Bates will coach the Browns' inside linebackers in his first NFL assignment. Most recently, Bates was defensive coordinator/secondary coach at Florida. The Gators' defense ranked fifth in the nation in total yards allowed last season. Prior to his one-year stint at Florida, Bates coached linebackers at Tennessee in 1989, and the Vols were SEC co-champs and Cotton Bowl victors.

"I'm really excited about coming here," said Bates. "The opportunity to work in the NFL is every coaches' dream, especially with an organization like the Browns. I look forward to working with Bill Belichick, regarded as one of the best in the business, and with Nick Saban, who has tremendous credentials."

"Jim's coaching experience with defensive backs and linebackers is outstanding," said Head Coach Bill Belichick. "He also has pro experience in the USFL. His secondary experience gives him flexibility to help develop and work with the secondary, which is so important with today's trend toward nickel and dime coverages, where a linebacker might become a defensive lineman, or a defensive back a linebacker. His flexibility to work with multiple positions and his knowledge of the game will enhance those schemes for us."

Bates' last professional coaching position was as an assistant coach with the Detroit Drive of the Arena Football League in 1988. He spent 1986 as defensive coordinator for the USFL Arizona Outlaws after serving as head coach for the San Antonio Gunslingers in 1985. He joined the Gunslingers as defensive coordinator in 1984.

Jim, 45, spent six years (1978-83) at Texas Tech as secondary coach and defensive coordinator. He tutored the secondary at West Virginia in 1977. From 1975-76, he tutored linebackers at Kansas State. He was defensive coordinator at Villanova from 1973-74, and spent the 1972 season coaching freshmen at Southern Mississippi. Jim was head coach at Sevier County (Tenn.) H.S. from 1969-71 after working as a graduate assistant at Tennessee, his alma mater.

Jim played in the 1965 Bluebonnet Bowl, the 1966 Gator Bowl and the 1968 Orange Bowl as a linebacker for the Vols. In 1967, Tennessee finished second in the nation and won the SEC championship. Jim graduated in 1969 with a degree in physical education. He attended Oxford (Mich.) H.S., where he graduated in 1964.

Jim has two sons, James (18) and Jeremy (15).

Don Blackmon, a seven-year standout veteran linebacker for the New England Patriots, comes to the Browns from the Patriot organization, where he coached for the last three seasons (1988-90), following his 1987 retirement as a player. He served as the Pats' outside linebackers' coach last season, the same position he'll coach for the Browns. Blackmon assisted linebackers' coach Don Shinnick his first two years.

"I've known Don for a long time, going back to his playing days," said Head Coach Bill Belichick. "He had an outstanding playing career cut short by a neck injury. When I was with the Giants, we used to work out with the Patriots and discuss common opponents with their coaches. I was impressed with Don's thorough understanding of the game. He's very intelligent, and has great knowledge of that position."

"I'm really excited to be joining Bill's staff," said Blackmon. "I spent the last three years with the Patriots' coaching staff, and when Bill gave me the opportunity to join his staff, I was intrigued. His track record is tremendous."

An exceptional linebacker for the Patriots for seven seasons, Blackmon, 33, was a fourth-round pick in the 1981 draft out of Tulsa. He recorded 541 tackles, 30.5 quarterback sacks, six fumble recoveries, 19 pass deflections, two safeties, 10 forced fumbles and five interceptions during his NFL career. Don started 72 of 89 games before a neck injury in a game vs. the Raiders ended his playing career (11/11/87). It was his third football-related neck injury.

Blackmon was a three-time All-Missouri Valley Conference selection at Tulsa. As a senior, he was named the conference's Defensive Player of the Year, and named to the University of Tulsa's Sports Hall of Fame in 1990. Blackmon attended Boyd Anderson (Lauderdale Lakes, Fla.) High School.

Don and his wife, Jacqueline, have two daughters, Candice (9) and Tiffany (6), and a son, Don II (4).

Steve Crosby's reunion with Browns' fullback Kevin Mack at the veterans' minicamp last April rekindled thoughts of 1985, when Mack and former Brown running back Earnest Byner became the third duo in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards each. Crosby, 41, formerly an assistant to the head coach for offense under Marty Schottenheimer during the 1985 campaign, coached the two backs.

"I am very pleased to be back and I am looking forward to working with some of the players who were here in 1985 and all the players here now," said Crosby. "I love Kevin Mack. I always have. Another big plus is Eric Metcalf's quickness. His speed and catching ability lend a lot to what you can do offensively. As for the Browns' running game, it can't go anywhere but up."

"Steve brings a wealth of NFL experience to our staff," said Head Coach Bill Belichick. "He's coached offense and special teams, plus he's had experience in personnel. People who saw him in Cleveland in 1985 know that he is a very dedicated and enthusiastic teacher."

A running back for the New York Giants from 1974-76, Crosby began his coaching career on Don Shula's Miami Dolphin staff in 1979 after serving as a Dolphin scout for two years (1977-78). From 1979 through 1982, Crosby coached the Dolphins' special teams and linebackers, while continuing personnel duties. Crosby joined the Atlanta Falcons (1983-84) and worked with quarterbacks and running backs. After tutoring Browns' running backs in 1985, Crosby returned to Atlanta as quarterback coach in 1986 and switched to running backs coach (1987-89). In 1990, he accepted an invitation from the Patriots' to coach special teams and tight ends.

Crosby is a 1972 graduate of Fort Hays (Ks.) College, where he earned a degree in physical education and a master's in athletic administration. As a senior, he rushed for 1,024 yards on 179 carries (5.7 avg.). He was twice named an NAIA All America and was a three-time all-conference performer before being drafted in the 17th round in 1974.

Crosby and his wife, Lisa, have two sons: Matthew (5) and Jeffrey (3).

Entering 1990, a Browns' running back has rushed for 100 yards or more in a game 172 times in 163 games since 1950. Cleveland's record in those games is 130-30-3 (.798). The Browns have an eight-game winning streak when a running back runs for 100-yards or more, but did not enjoy a 100-yard day by a running back in 1989 or 1990.



HAL HUNTER

Hal Hunter, who brings 28 years of experience as an offensive line coach, returns to coaching that position after a one-year stint (1990) as a special assistant to the head coach. Hunter is one of two coaches (Receivers' Coach Richard Mann is the other), retained by first-year Head Coach Bill Belichick from Bud Carson's original staff. Hal signed on as the offensive line coach in 1989, and only seven teams were sacked less than the Browns (34 times) that season.

"The one thing I knew about Hal Hunter before I came here is that his offensive lines were well-prepared, well-schooled and played hard," said Belichick. "After spending about 10 hours interviewing him last February, it became clear that we should keep him on our staff. We've had a number of quality line coaches apply here, but Hal is the best man for this job."

Hired by the Steelers in 1985, Hunter coached guards and centers. He was part of an offensive line coaching duo along with Ron Blackledge, who coached tackles and tight ends. In 1985 and '86, the Steelers were second in the NFL in fewest sacks allowed, and in 1987 they were fifth. On the ground, the Steelers ranked 7th, 5th and 6th in the NFL (1986-88, respectively) in rushing yards.

Hunter, 57, entered the professional ranks in 1981 as offensive coordinator under Frank Kush for the Hamilton Tiger Cats of the Canadian Football League. Kush took Hunter with him as offensive line coach when he went to the Baltimore Colts in 1982, (where Hal worked with colleagues Ernie Accorsi and Richard Mann). Hunter was named interim head coach for the Indianapolis Colts for the final game of the 1984 season.

In 1958, Hunter began his college career at Richmond as defensive line coach. He switched to the offensive line for a two-year stint at West Virginia (1962-63), another two years at Maryland (1964-65), followed by five years at Duke (1966-70). Hunter became offensive coordinator at Kentucky (1971-72) and accepted an offensive line assignment at Indiana (1973-76). In 1977, he was named head coach at California State University of Pa., and remained there until joining Kush in the CFL.

Hunter graduated from Pittsburgh with a bachelor's degree in secondary education and received his master's in science in 1962 from West Virginia. He was a starting Panther at linebacker and guard from 1953-55. In 1956, he played guard for the Pittsburgh Steelers, before a knee injury ended his playing career. From 1952-54, he was Pitt's heavyweight wrestler and placed fourth in the 1956 AAU national wrestling championships.

Hal and his wife, Eileen, have three children: Hal (offensive line coach at Vanderbilt University), and two daughters, Heidi (a lawyer in Indianapolis) and Heather (director of public relations for a Philadelphia, Pa. naval base). Hal's mother, Freda Wargo, is a Cleveland resident. The Hunters recently built a home in Hinckley, Oh.

Richard Mann is a mainstay as the Browns' receivers coach and brings seven seasons of continuity to the offense. He is one of two coaches retained from the previous staff (Hal Hunter, offensive line coach, is the other). Mann's forte is developing young receivers into disciplined, solid players and his group is among the team's strongest positions. Head Coach Bill Belichick indicated one of the advantages of retaining Mann is that he could help communicate the new system in terminology familiar to the players.

"When I coached against the Browns, I was always impressed with the receivers," said Belichick. "They played as well as any group of wideouts we faced. They ran disciplined routes and were so good at getting off the line of scrimmage. And, Richard will have a more expanded role in our offense than he has in the past."

Mann, who had several interviews and offers, opted to stay in Cleveland. "It's an opportunity to stay in an organization where I've had a lot of good experiences. I feel that with Bill Belichick and his new staff, I'll be given an opportunity to express myself."

Pro Bowler Webster Slaughter led the team with 59 catches for 847 yards (both totals were 11th in the AFC) and four touchdown catches despite suffering with tendonitis in his leg all season. Slaughter recorded three 100-yard games in 1990, to give him nine 100-yard games during the regular season, tied for third most in team history. Reggie Langhorne, who missed all or part of five games with several broken ribs, still caught 45 passes for 585 yards and two touchdowns. Brian Brennan tied Langhorne with 45 catches, despite only five starts, and moved into fifth place on the Browns' all-time reception list (284). In fact, Brennan, Slaughter and Langhorne each have over 200 career catches and over 3,000 yards.

Originally hired in 1985 by former Browns' Head Coach Marty Schottenheimer, Mann, 44, describes his coaching mode as "demanding" and has been developing receivers for a dozen years on the college level and more recently in the NFL. Among the college players he helped advance are Miami standout WR-Mark Clayton at the University of Louisville. After that, Mann moved on to the pros with the Baltimore/Indianapolis Colts and maximized the Colts' receiving talent.

With the Colts, Mann worked under then-head coach Frank Kush, whom he played under, and later coached for, at Arizona State. At ASU, Mann was a three-year starter (first year at flanker) and caught 28 passes for 340 yards his final two seasons at tight end. After earning a B.S. degree in elementary education, Mann returned to his hometown high school (Aliquippa) as a teacher and coach from 1970-73. Richard is a member of the Aliquippa Hall of Fame.

At ASU, Mann spent six years developing future NFLers like John Jefferson, Bruce Hardy and Jerry Bell. He then moved on to Louisville for two years, before joining Baltimore in 1982. He spent three seasons on that staff before coming to Cleveland in 1985.

Richard and his wife, Karen, have four children: Deven (13), Richard (11), Mario (9) and Brittany (2), and reside in Strongsville.

John Mitchell, who recruited Browns' former tight end Ozzie Newsome out of Muscle Shoals (Ala.) H.S., and coached him at Alabama under Paul "Bear" Bryant, joins the Browns as defensive line coach. Mitchell, formerly defensive coordinator/outside linebackers' coach at Louisiana State University, brings 15 years of college coaching experience to the club.

"John has experience coaching linebackers and defensive linemen, and also has experience coaching in the USFL, as well as major colleges," Head Coach Bill Belichick said. "He's an outstanding coach, who will get results from that unit. He's a fine addition to our staff, and we're lucky to have him."

"I'm ecstatic," said Mitchell. "It is something I've always wanted to do—to coach in the NFL—especially for a team like the Cleveland Browns. Words cannot express my feelings."

After coaching outside linebackers at LSU (1987-89) for three seasons, Mitchell was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1990, but retained the responsibilities for outside linebackers. He was instrumental in shaping the careers of All-SEC performers Eric Hill and Ron Sancho in 1987 and 1988. Mitchell served on the staffs of legendary coaches like Alabama's Bryant (1973-76) and former Arkansas' mentor Lou Holtz (1977-82), coaching the defensive lines of both. In 1983, Mitchell accepted a linebackers' coaching position in the United States Football League for the Birmingham Stallions (1983-85). He coached defensive ends at Temple in 1986.

Mitchell is a 1972 graduate of Alabama, where he was consensus All-America defensive end (6'-3", 230 lbs.) his senior season. He played for the Crimson Tide under Bryant from 1971-72. Mitchell played two years at Eastern Arizona Junior College (1969-70), where he was a two-time JUCO All-America. He attended Williamson H.S. (Mobile, Ala.). John, 41, is married (Joyce).

Next to the head coach, the special teams' coach has the most contact with more members of a team than any other staff member. Scott O'Brien, 34, was most recently special teams coach at Pittsburgh (1987-90), and held additional duties assisting the Panthers' defensive line coach.

"What really impressed me about Scott is his knowledge of coaching the individual specialists," Head Coach Bill Belichick said. "From snappers to holders to kickers, he's is very knowledgeable about special teams. In fact, as far as I'm concerned, Scott knows as much as any special teams' coach I've met."

O'Brien's philosophy on special teams is straightforward and emphasizes control of the football: "I like to call the special teams the 'no second chance team'. Unlike offense or defense, we only get one play to perform. Our sole purpose is to control vertical field position, starting the offense and the defense in the best position possible after every exchange. Special teams have the opportunity to score and make big plays. They also set and control the tempo of the game."

Prior to his four years at Pittsburgh, O'Brien coached linebackers and special teams at Wisconsin-Superior (1980-82), Nevada-Las Vegas (1983-85), and Rice (1986). At Pitt, he helped develop punter Brian Greenfield, who averaged 41.7 yards per punt in 1989, and ranked 17th in the country. The following year, Greenfield was second in the country with 45.6 yards per punt, leading the country with a net punting average of 42.7. The Browns drafted Greenfield in the 10th round last April.

O'Brien was a defensive lineman at Wisconsin-Superior, and he also ran track and played hockey. Scott was signed by the Green Bay Packers (1979) and the Toronto Argonauts (1980). He earned his bachelor's degree in 1979 and a master's degree in education from Nevada-Las Vegas in 1984.

Scott is married to the former Shawn Kinney of Superior, Wisc.

Nick Saban, who enjoyed an impressive first season as Head Coach at the University of Toledo last fall, is the Cleveland Browns' new defensive coordinator. Saban, 39, is a former NFL assistant with the AFC Central Houston Oilers, and the first coach hired by Browns' Head Coach Bill Belichick.

"Nick brings a blend of head coaching and NFL experience. This, plus his tremendous work ethic, makes him a valuable addition to the Browns," Belichick said. "I'm pleased we could attract him to our staff. He did an excellent job at Toledo and, two years ago, he was considered one of the bright, young assistants in the NFL."

"I am looking forward to joining Bill Belichick and his staff, and an organization with such a rich and successful tradition," said Saban. "This is an exciting opportunity, but I do leave Toledo with some sadness. They gave me a great opportunity and they made me part of their family. I will carry this memory with me."

Saban was appointed head coach at the University of Toledo on December 22, 1989. In 1990, Saban's lone season as a head coach, the Rockets finished 9-2, including 7-1 in the Mid-American Conference. They were co-champions with Central Michigan, the only team to hand them a conference loss (13-12). Toledo's other loss was a 14-10 setback to Navy. Both defensive struggles epitomized Saban's tough defensive team, as the Rockets finished five points shy of an undefeated season.

Toledo's defense was ranked 12th in the nation, allowing just 284.8 yards per game; the Rockets gave up just 16.2 points per game, 16th stingiest in the nation; and their pass defense was 18th in the country with a 96.4 efficiency rating.

Before accepting the Toledo job, Saban tutored the Houston Oilers' secondary in 1988 and '89. In 1989, the Oilers finished (tied for) fourth in the AFC with 21 interceptions. In 1988, despite the holdouts of both starting cornerbacks (Patrick Allen and Steve Brown), the Oilers tied for second in the conference with 22 thefts.

Not unlike the Browns' Belichick, Saban has a wealth of coaching experience, despite his relatively young age. Saban spent 15 years in successful college programs before joining the Oilers. From 1983-87, he was on George Perles' Michigan State staff. He joined the Spartans as secondary coach in 1983, and was given additional responsibilities as defensive coordinator in 1984 at the age of 33. In three of four years as coordinator, the Spartans earned bowl invitations, including the 1988 Rose Bowl, as the 9-2-1 Spartans defeated Southern Cal, 20-17, and led the nation in run defense (69.8 yards per game) and finished second in total defense (241 yards per game). Current Browns' safety Harlon Barnett was the starting right cornerback on that Michigan State squad as a sophomore.

Saban coached with Bill Belichick's father, Steve, at the Naval Academy in 1982, tutoring the Midshipmen's defensive backs. From 1980-81, he was on Earle Bruce's Ohio State staff as secondary coach. Nick coached defensive backs at West Virginia from 1978-79 after tutoring defensive ends at Syracuse in 1977.

Saban began his coaching career at Kent as a graduate assistant from 1973-74, before taking over the Golden Flashes' linebackers in 1975 and 1976. In each of his collegiate posts, Nick was heavily involved with recruiting, especially in the Ohio area.

Saban played defensive back at Kent and helped lead the team to the 1972 Tangerine Bowl. He also played baseball for the Golden Flashes. Nick earned a bachelor's degree in secondary education and master's degree (MED) in athletics, both from Kent.

Nick and his wife, Terry, have a son, Nicolas, 4, and an infant daughter, Kristen.

BELICHICK ON HIS PHILOSOPHY OF BEING STRONG UP THE MIDDLE:

"Offensively or defensively, the most important positions are the ones closest to the middle of the field. Center, quarterback, running back, interior defensive linemen, middle linebackers, safeties. Those people are involved in every play. The further you are from the ball, the easier it is to work away from that guy. Obviously, when you have a guy like Michael Dean Perry, you can see a lot of things that guy can do. Mike Johnson is another very productive player. Bernie Kosar, Kevin Mack, Thane Gash...guys like that. You see some talented players in those inside positions."

Along with his "no excuses" motto, Jerry Simmons maintains that his biggest responsibility is to motivate the players to become their physical best. Simmons, formerly the strength coach at the New England Patriots for three years (1988-90), was a strength training site director at the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles.

"There is no question that the strength coach position was the most sought after on this staff," said Head Coach Bill Belichick. "We had many, many well-qualified coaches apply, and, in the end, Jerry became the clear-cut choice. Jerry understands what we're trying to do here is improve the players and get them to be the best football players they can be."

Said Simmons, "The philosophy is going to be basically the same for everybody. We're going to try to strengthen the entire body, we'll work on all the muscle groups, and we'll have specificity of training by position."

In 1978, Simmons accepted a position as assistant strength coach and graduate assistant working with linebackers at Fort Hays (Ks.) State University. Although he left coaching in 1979, he returned as an assistant strength coach at Clemson (1980). Simmons moved to Rice University (1981-82) as the strength and conditioning coach and designed the school's first strength facility. From 1983-87, he held the position at the University of Southern California.

Simmons was graduated from Fort Hays State (1977) with a degree in physical education, where he played linebacker for two years. He acquired his master's (1978) in secondary school and administration and physical education at his alma mater. Simmons began his collegiate playing career at Garden City, (Ks.) Junior College. Jerry attended Elkhart (Ks.) H.S. and earned all-state honors as a senior.

Jerry and his wife, Rebecca, have two sons, Joe (7), and Jordon Lynn (3), and one daughter, Jennifer Jo (5).

Then somebody gets injured or retires and suddenly, you don't have that kind of special player. Your system, which you changed for him, doesn't work anymore."

GIANTS' GENERAL MANAGER GEORGE YOUNG ON BELICHICK: "He has priorities. He goes in the order of those priorities, which is a plus. He was with us 12 years. He worked as hard, if not harder, than anybody we had. He's a one-purpose guy when it comes to football. He's well prepared, very industrious, bright and well-organized. If it's effort, time and dedication — if that's what it takes — he has those things."

BILLS' OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR TED MARCHIBRODA ON BELICHICK: "He's ready. This is what he's been waiting for. He'll do it. He is someone who likes to roll up his sleeves and go to work. He's tremendously intense and absorbed."



GARY TRANQUILL

Quarterbacks Coach

Gary Tranquill became one of the first of two offensive coaches hired by Head Coach Bill Belichick (Offensive Assistant Ernie Adams was the other). Tranquill, 51, who will serve as quarterbacks' coach, was most recently the quarterbacks' coach at the University of Virginia. During Tranquill's tenure with Virginia, his two starting quarterbacks were Scott Secules (Dolphins) and Shawn Moore. Virginia quarterbacks have thrown for over 2,000 yards four straight seasons, but prior to Tranquill's arrival, no Cavalier quarterback ever threw for as many yards in a season.

Tranquill's four seasons (1987-90) with the Cavaliers were nothing short of prolific. As play caller for high-powered Virginia, Gary's offense led the Cavaliers to the nation's number one ranking for three consecutive weeks last season, and set an ACC mark by scoring over 50 points in four games. Tranquill is credited with the development of quarterback Shawn Moore, who was a first-team All America selection and finished fourth in the Heisman Trophy balloting.

"I'm really excited about the opportunity with the Browns," said Tranquill. "I never had aspirations about getting into the NFL before, but as it all transpired, I feel great about coming to Cleveland and working with a team with such a great tradition. I've known Bill and his dad (Steve) for years, and the prospect of joining Bill's staff is appealing."

Tranquill spent five seasons (1982-86) as head coach at the Naval Academy, where he compiled a 20-34-1 record. Gary succeeded George Welsh, who left to take over the Virginia head coaching job. One member of Tranquill's staff was Belichick's father, Steve. Tranquill spent four seasons, from 1973-76, as the Midshipmen's quarterbacks and receivers' coach under Welsh.

"I've obviously known Gary a long time — ever since he played for my godfather (Bill Edwards) at Wittenberg and through my family's association at Navy," said Belichick. "More importantly, I think Gary has a great football mind, tremendous teaching ability and a knack for developing young players. He's versatile because he's coached both sides of the ball, plus he's been a head coach at a major level."

Tranquill began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach in 1963 at Wittenberg, his alma mater, and then became a full-time assistant from 1965-69. In 1970, he accepted a post at Ball State, then took over as an assistant at Bowling Green (1971-72). Gary was appointed quarterbacks' and receivers' coach at Navy in 1973. He coached under Woody Hayes at Ohio State from 1977-78, then accepted an assistants' job at West Virginia under Don Nehlen (1979-81). Tranquill served one season as defensive coordinator and two years as offensive coordinator. He helped groom quarterback Oliver Luck before returning to Navy in 1982 as head coach.

A 1962 graduate of Wittenberg with a degree in physical education, Gary obtained his master's in secondary school administration. He won four letters in both football and baseball, played on two Ohio Conference baseball championship teams and two NCAA regional winners. In 1960, his junior year, Tranquill earned the Ohio Conference's top football player award, and he was inducted into the Wittenberg Athletic Hall of Fame in 1986.

Gary and his wife, Shirley, have two children, Kari (27), who lives in Baltimore, and Christopher (24), a Naval Academy graduate stationed in Norfolk, Va.

Phil Savage, who spent last season coaching the tight ends at UCLA, was named a coaches' assistant to Cleveland Browns' head coach Bill Belichick last March 29. Savage, like Belichick, who got his coaching start at the age of 23 with the Detroit Lions, also had an early entry into the coaching ranks. Savage, 25, was 21 when he served as a graduate assistant at Alabama in 1987.

In 1988-89, Savage coordinated the activities of the other Alabama graduate assistants, plus coached the tight ends. In 1989, Alabama TE Lamonde Russell earned all-SEC honors and in 1988, the Crimson Tide's Howard Cross (now of the Giants) was picked as the SEC's Most Outstanding Blocker. During those two seasons, 'Bama tight ends caught 105 passes for 1,287 yards.

Last season at UCLA, Savage analyzed opponent game video, helped with administrative duties for the Bruins' offense and coached the tight ends.

Savage, who is single, was born on April 7, 1966 in Mobile, Ala., where he graduated from Murphy High School. He played football and baseball at the University of the South (Sewanee, TN) and earned a B.A. in English. As a senior, he was selected as the school's Fellowship of Christian Athlete's Male Athlete of the Year. He also received a masters' in physical education from Alabama.

It is no coincidence that the Browns were the only AFC team to advance to the playoffs five of the past six seasons, as Bill and his staff have helped Browns' players through a myriad of injuries, perhaps none as storied as the 1988 season, when Cleveland lost four quarterbacks to injuries.

"Bill Tessendorf is a dedicated worker who is a very, very valuable member of our organization," says owner Art Modell of the man who is entering his eighth year as head trainer. The Ohio Athletic Trainers Association felt that way as well, bestowing upon Bill the Clinical/Professional Trainer of the Year Award in May of 1989.

Tessendorf first joined the Browns as an assistant trainer in 1973 while working towards his master's degree in exercise physiology at Kent State. Bill did his undergraduate work at Northern Illinois University, graduating with a B.A. in 1971. He worked as a graduate assistant under Kent State coach Don James in 1971, then took a job as an elementary school teacher in the Dekalb (Ill.) Public School District in 1972.

He returned to Kent State a year later and began assisting Browns' trainer emeritus, Leo Murphy, while working towards his master's, which he received in 1976. "Bill's a fine young man and the team is lucky to have someone with his talents," Murphy said.

"I feel very fortunate to have had the opportunity to work with Leo Murphy, Dr. (Vic) Ippolito, Dr. (John) Bergfeld and the other doctors on our staff. They have enhanced my professional career," Tessendorf added. Bill has served for the past four years as treasurer of the Professional Football Athletic Trainers Society. Bill is also President-Elect of the Great Lakes Athletic Trainers Association.

Bill and his wife, Nan Jean, reside in Medina and are the parents of Amy Ann, who will turn eight in February.

In 1947, Murphy graduated from Notre Dame, then went on to work with the AAFC's Chicago Rockets and baseball's New York Yankees. Murphy has long been regarded as one of the top

trainers in the world, evidenced by induction into the National Athletic Trainers' Association Hall of Fame in 1982.

Leo and his wife, Betty, have two children, Nancy and Martin, and three grandchildren.

Charley Cusick enters his second season as facilities' manager. Cusick is responsible for closing of the Browns' three office locations, the move into the new training facility in Berea, and the overall upkeep and smooth operation of the facility, which will be completed in August of 1991.

Cusick made the transition from equipment manager to facilities manager in July, 1990. Charley, who has the talent and physique of a professional athlete, had his career cut short by a severe knee injury. However, the Lakewood High School product still found his way to professional football 22 years ago as an assistant to long-time Browns' equipment manager Morrie Kono.

In 1974, Cusick was named equipment manager, replacing Kono, a pioneer in the football equipment business.

As equipment manager, Cusick coordinated the purchasing and maintaining of equipment for the Browns, as well as the operations involved in transporting these from Baldwin-Wallace to training camp at Lakeland Community College, Cleveland Stadium, road sites and on to the offseason training headquarters at Big Creek Racquet Club. Charley and his staff coordinated the transport of the club's gear to London, England in 1989 after a trip to Canada in 1988. They also equipped the AFC Pro Bowl squad following the 1986, 1987 and 1989 seasons.

Jim Shofner, who returned to the Browns last year as offensive coordinator (and later took over as interim head coach for the final seven games), made the transition to Player Personnel Director after the conclusion of the season.

A first round draft choice by the Browns in 1958, Shofner played defensive back for the Browns from 1958-63. He came back to serve as quarterbacks' coach from 1978-80. After his playing career ended in 1963, Jim began coaching as an assistant at TCU (1964-66), San Francisco (1967-73; 77), head coach at TCU (1974-76) Houston Oilers (1981-82), Dallas Cowboys (1983-85) and St. Louis/Phoenix Cardinals (1988-89).

Shofner, 55, played football and baseball at his alma mater, earning All-Southwest Conference as a running back and defensive back. He played in the 1957 East-West Shrine and College All-Star games (against the Detroit Lions).

Jim's new duties encompass the evaluation and judgment of players in both the professional and collegiate levels, including the current Browns' roster. Shof also helped negotiate player contracts this spring.

His first job was to provide a thorough rating of every player on last year's roster in preparation of a list for Plan B free agents. His input plays a major role in the all-important talent decision-making process in the personnel department. He was instrumental in the selection of Bill Belichick to succeed him as head coach.

"Jim Shofner brings a unique perspective to our staff, having spent 27 years as a coach and, more recently, as a head coach," said Executive Vice President of Football Operations Ernie Accorsi. "I think personnel departments in this league need a coach's viewpoint in evaluating a player, and this was evident in the last collegiate draft."

"In the 16 years I've been in the NFL, I don't think anyone impressed me as quickly as Mike Lombardi," head coach Bill Belichick said shortly after being hired last February 5. "He has a tremendous knowledge of the players in the league and everything about them," Belichick added about Lombardi, who is in his third year as the Browns' Pro Personnel Director.

Lombardi, 32, has established himself as one of the NFL's youngest and brightest scouts. Before joining the Browns in 1987, Lombardi spent three years scouting for the San Francisco 49ers.

In addition to scouting and coordinating the pro personnel department, Michael assists Vice President of Football Operations Ernie Accorsi in contract negotiations. He is an advocate of the "black box" device. He estimates more than 1,600 players have been tested on the "box" in the last four years, which is a sophisticated agility testing device that was initially developed for astronauts' training and testing.

"Mike has an encyclopedic memory and knowledge of players in the NFL. He's also very valuable evaluating the top prospects in the college draft," said Accorsi.

A native of Ocean City, N.J., Michael lettered in both football and baseball at Valley Forge Military Academy (Wayne, Pa.). He attended Hofstra University (1978-81), where he played nose tackle for the Flying Dutchmen. Lombardi began his football career as a defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas (1982-83).

Lombardi, an avid baseball and basketball fan, and his wife, Millie, reside in Strongsville with their two children: Michael (2-1/2) and Matthew (8 months).

Dom Anile's importance to the Browns' personnel department received an exclamation mark earlier this season when Executive Vice President of Football Operations Ernie Accorsi named Anile as Director of College Scouting after eight years as a Browns' area scout.

"Dom will supervise and direct the schedules of the other area college scouts, plus continue to evaluate and visit the schools in the southeast," said Accorsi. "Dom is very organized, and he'll handle these additional chores well."

As an offensive coordinator at Columbia University, the Browns asked him to assist coaching the offensive line at three consecutive training camps (1980-82). His work led to an offer to join the scouting staff, bringing 24 years of coaching experience with him.

Anile is a 1959 graduate of C.W. Post, where he was a three-year letter winner in both football and baseball. He captained the football team two years and was MVP as a senior. He was inducted into Post's Hall-of-Fame in 1982.

Dom began his coaching career in 1959, at C.W. Post, while attending graduate school at Brooklyn College. He served in a number of capacities, including offensive coordinator through 1967.

In 1968, he was named head coach at Post, becoming one of the most successful college division coaches during the next 12 years. His teams were 84-33-1 (.716) and twice won the Lambert Bowl as the East's top team with a 10-1 mark in 1973 and 8-2 in 1976. Selected as Eastern Coach of the Year in 1973, he was also picked as New York's Metropolitan Coach of the Year four times. Dom joined the Columbia staff in 1980.

Anile has three children: Dom, Jr. (30), Theresa (27) and Gary (25). He and his wife, Carolyn, reside in Strongsville with her daughter, Jennifer (14). He has one grandchild: Kimberly Rose, born 11/4/90.

One of the Browns' top acquisitions came last year when Ernie Accorsi, Executive Vice President of Football Operations, convinced his long-time friend Milt Davis to join his scouting staff.

Davis, 62, has built an outstanding reputation in 25 years of scouting, going back to the days when he and Accorsi were part of the Baltimore Colts' organization that won Super Bowl V.

Considered to be one of the most astute judges of talent in the NFL, Milt's scouting assignment covers colleges throughout the western region of the United States. Before joining the Browns, Davis surveyed the same area for the Miami Dolphins for 12 years.

"I've known Milt for 22 years. He has a unique knowledge of the game and has been a strong addition to our scouting staff," said Accorsi.

A defensive back (1957-60) and scout (1967-76) for the Colts, Davis was an All-Pro selection in 1957, his rookie year, nabbing 10 of his 27 career interceptions. He tied for the NFL lead in interceptions twice (1957 and 1959). He was a starter on the 1958 and '59 Baltimore Colts' World Championship teams that defeated the New York Giants. From 1961 to 1966, Davis taught biology at L.A. City College and signed players (like TE John Mackey) for the NFL Colts during the heyday of the NFL-AFL competition. Milt scouted for the Colts for 10 years (1967-76), spent one year seeking talent for the Los Angeles Rams (1977), then signed on with the Dolphins (1978-89). In addition to scouting, Davis assisted the Miami coaching staff during minicamp and training camp.

After 28 years as a counselor and biology professor at Los Angeles City College, Davis retired in June of 1987. He has a B.S. and master's degree in zoology and a doctorate in administrative education from UCLA. He is an avid ornithologist.

Milt and his wife, Yvonne, reside in Eugene, Oregon. They have three children: Allison (32), and twins Brian and Hilary (29). The Davises have two grandchildren: Chance (8) and Felicity (3).

It was a homecoming for Tom Dimitroff when he accepted a scouting position with the Browns in 1987. Born and raised in nearby Barberton, Dimitroff came to the Browns with an extensive background that totaled 32 years of playing and coaching in the U.S. and Canada.

"No one works harder than Tom Dimitroff. He has a tremendous record of players he's graded high for us who have been successful in the NFL," said Executive Vice President of Football Operations Ernie Accorsi.

A 1953 graduate of Barberton High School, Tom was an outstanding athlete who went on to star at quarterback for Miami University (Ohio), where he was recently inducted into the university's Hall of Fame.

He went on to quarterback the Ottawa Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League (1957-58), and the American Football League's Boston Patriots (1960). (Tom was also drafted by the Browns in the 25th round in 1957.) After retiring as a player, he managed an Akron restaurant for four years. He returned to football as an assistant coach for Wadsworth H.S. (1965-68) and Barberton H.S. (1968-69).

Dimitroff entered the collegiate level as an assistant at Miami (Ohio) from 1969-72, and then at Kansas State in 1973. He moved into the professional ranks in 1974 as the offensive coordinator for the Ottawa Rough Riders (through 1977).

Tom was named head coach of the Hamilton Tiger Cats in 1978, and then returned to the collegiate level as head coach of the University of Guelph (1979-83), where his five-year record was 21-13-1. Rejoining the Rough Riders in 1984, he served as an assistant coach and offensive coordinator, later moving to the scouting department as director of player personnel (1985-86).

Dimitroff, who still plays a good game of racquetball, and his wife, Helen, reside in Strongsville. The Dimitroffs have three children: Randy (29), Sharon (28) and Thomas (25). They have one grandchild: Dillon (1), son of Randy and daughter-in-law, Val.

Regarded as a keen evaluator of collegiate talent, Gary Horton is in his fifth year as a member of the Cleveland Browns' personnel department, and second year of covering the colleges in the Rocky Mountains, the western edge of the Midwest including Oklahoma, and the Big Eight Conference regions of the United States.

"Gary Horton is a very comprehensive personnel scout, who does a complete and thorough job in all phases of his duties," said Executive Vice President of Football Operations Ernie Accorsi.

Horton came to the Browns in 1987 after accumulating 16 years of substantial expertise in evaluating college and pro talent, most recently, four years of scouting potential players for the Tampa Bay Buccaneer (1983-86).

Horton attended Chaffey Junior College and Cal State Northridge, where he played football and earned two letters. He received his bachelor of science degree from L.A. Baptist College in 1969. After college, Horton taught school and coached at Scottsdale (Ariz.) H.S. from 1970-71, and at Marcos DeNica (Tempe, Ariz.) H.S. in 1972. He joined Arizona State's coaching staff and served as Frank Kush's chief recruiter from 1973-79.

As Director of Player Personnel at Illinois (1979-82), Gary concentrated on player evaluation and recruitment. While with the Fighting Illini, he was credited with recruiting a number of standout junior college players, including three who went on to play quarterback in the NFL: Tony Eason, Jack Trudeau and Dave Wilson. Gary is single and is a resident of Phoenix.

Hall of Fame-bound Ozzie Newsome, who epitomized the word "class" both on and off the field during his stellar 13-year playing career, continues to perform at a high level in his new role as Special Assignment Scout. Among Oz's responsibilities will be scouting colleges in the northeastern part of the country.

Ozzie's experience as a player, his assessment of collegiate talent and his on-the-field work with tight ends are paying dividends to both the personnel and coaching staffs. He participated in his first NFL draft this past April.

"In 22 years in this league, I've never seen anyone who has exhibited such a feel for scouting in such a short period of time as Ozzie did this year," said Executive Vice President of Football Operations Ernie Accorsi. "He's been a bonus for us, and I can see he'll be as complete of a professional in this endeavor as he was on the football field."

Newsome is the NFL's all-time leading pass-catching tight end and top receiver in Browns' history with 622 receptions and 7,980 yards. He is the fourth-leading receiver in league annals.

He earned three trips to the Pro Bowl (1981, 1984-85) and was a three-time winner of the Cleveland Touchdown Club's Offensive Player of the Year Award (1978, 1981 and 1984). His consecutive game reception streak of 150 games is the second longest in NFL history. He was named to the All-NFL Team of the 80's (second team), selected by 26 Pro Football Hall-of-Fame members in addition to numerous All-NFL and All-AFC honors.

Ozzie was the Browns' first draft choice, along with Clay Matthews, in 1978, and the two are among an elite group of Browns to play for three decades. The others are Gene Hickerson (1958-60, 62-73), Dick Schafrath (1959-71) and Don Cockroft (1968-80).

Winner of the 1990 Byron "Whizzer" White Award for his community involvement, Newsome is widely known as a willing volunteer for charitable causes. Ozzie and his wife, Gloria, make their home in Orange Village.

He's enthusiastic, organized and a proven winner. There's still a lot of work to be done to get back to the level where we were. We were horrible last year against blitzes, and I think that type of stuff is a direct correlation to how mentally sharp you are. That's the type of thing you should take advantage of, and we just haven't been able to do that the last year or two."

BELICHICK ON KOSAR: "He's a hell of a quarterback. He has great vision and presence on the field. I know from playing against him with the Giants. I always felt he was one of the best, if not the best, at recognizing what the defense was doing and getting the offense into a good play to hurt the defense. I'm glad to finally get him on my side."

QB COACH GARY TRANQUILL ON KOSAR: "We'll try to play to his strengths. I like to do a lot of things. I'm fairly broad minded offensively. A good analogy would be: You don't take Roger Clemens and try to make a knuckleballer out of him. We'll do what he does best."

(1) SUNDAY, SEPT. 9 — BROWNS 13, Steelers 3 (78,298) at Cleveland Stadium. The Browns' defense created three turnovers, one for a touchdown, another to set up a field goal, and a third to seal a hard-fought 13-3 win over the Pittsburgh Steelers. CB Tony Blaylock returned a RB Merrill Hoge fumble 30 yards for the game's only touchdown in the third quarter. That gave the Browns a 7-3 lead, and K Jerry Kauric booted two field goals of 28 and 47 yards to secure the Browns' victory. The key to the game came late in the first half when QB-Bernie Kosar fumbled the ball when being sacked by Hardy Nickerson and Pittsburgh recovered on the Browns' one. The Cleveland defense stuffed Pittsburgh on three straight plays, and the Steelers had to settle for a 19-yard field goal by K-Gary Anderson. Mike Johnson caused two fumbles, Thane Gash and David Grayson recorded interceptions and Michael Dean Perry recorded two key QB sacks on successive plays in the fourth quarter. Bernie Kosar was sacked a career-high seven times, and completed 13 passes in 30 attempts for 120 yards, no TDs or INTs. FB Kevin Mack led the Browns with 45 rushing yards and 24 receiving yards before leaving the game late in the second quarter with a fractured ring finger on his left hand.

(2) SUNDAY, SEPT. 16 — Jets 24, BROWNS 21 (67,354) at The Meadowlands. The Browns' failed comeback dropped their record to 1-1, as New York defeated Cleveland, 24-21. The Browns scored two second-half touchdowns and shut out the Jets in the final two periods, but New York's 24-7 halftime lead proved too much to overcome. RB/KOR Eric Metcalf stunned 67,354 fans in the Meadowlands by returning the opening kickoff 98 yards to post Cleveland to an early 7-0 lead. But the Jets scored touchdowns on two of their next three drives on TD runs by Freeman McNeil (two yards) and Johnny Hector (six yards). Following a fumble by Metcalf early in the second quarter, Pat Leahy booted a 47-yard field goal, and then Brad Baxter scored on a one-yard run to stake New York to a 24-7 lead at intermission. The Browns scored on their initial second-half possession when QB Bernie Kosar (24 of 41, 233 yards, one TD, no INTs) hit WR Reggie Langhorne on a four-yard TD pass in the third period. Rookie FB Leroy Hoard scored his first pro TD on a nine-yard burst to cap a 10-play, 78-yard drive with 1:59 left in the game, but the Jets were able to run out the clock when QB-Ken O'Brien (13 of 21 for 218 yards, no TDs or INTs) scrambled for a first down after Cleveland had used up all of their timeouts. Defensively, Michael Dean Perry recorded two QB sacks, and Clay Matthews recorded another. Cleveland turned the ball over twice on fumbles, while New York did not commit a miscue.

San Diego outscored Cleveland 14-0 in the second half after the Browns held a 14-10 halftime lead. San Diego QB Billy Joe Tolliver threw two touchdown passes to WR Anthony Miller (19 and 23 yards), HB Rod Bernstine scored from one-yard out, and K Fuad Reveiz booted a 42-yard field goal for San Diego's points. Cleveland LB Mike Johnson put the Browns on the scoreboard with a 64-yard interception return for a touchdown, and Leroy Hoard bulled in from one yard out to account for Cleveland's scores. QB Bernie Kosar completed 17 of 36 passes for 232 yards, was intercepted three times and did not throw a TD pass. Kosar was sacked three times to increase his total to 13 on the season. San Diego's Tolliver completed 12 of 29 passes for 139 yards, threw two TDs and two INTs, and was sacked once for 10 yards.

(4) SUNDAY, SEPT. 30 — Chiefs 34, BROWNS 0 at Arrowhead Stadium (75,462). The Browns suffered their worst shutout in the club's 41-year NFL history, 34-0, matching the 34-0 loss to the Baltimore Colts in the 1968 Championship Game. Things looked promising early, as on the game's opening play, rookie RB Leroy Hoard bolted 42 yards from scrimmage, and six plays later, Cleveland was at the Kansas City's three on first and goal. But a fumble on a lateral to Hoard was recovered by Dan Saleaumua, thwarting the threat. In fact, it was the first of three turnovers committed by Cleveland. Adding to the woes were two blocked punts for touchdowns (one by Charles Washington, returned 31 yards by Chris Martin in the second quarter; the second by Albert Lewis and returned four yards by Kevin Ross in the third quarter). It marked the first time in club history that the Browns suffered two blocked punts for scores in one game. Chiefs' QB Steve DeBerg (12 of 21, 189 yards, two TDs, no INTs) hit WR Robb Thomas on a 47-yard scoring strike to open the scoring. Nick Lowery kicked the first of two field goals (39 and 34 yards), and Emile Harry caught DeBerg's second TD pass in the second quarter. After Lowery's second field goal in the third quarter, the Chiefs scored on their second punt block off Bryan Wagner. QB Bernie Kosar completed nine of 18 passes for 61 yards, no TDs or INTs. Mike Pagel relieved Kosar and completed 14 of 27 passes for 159 yards, and threw one INT.

(5) MONDAY, OCT. 8 — BROWNS 30, Broncos 29 at Mile High Stadium (74,814). The Browns scored 10 points in the game's final 3:21, overcoming a nine-point deficit, to defeat the host Denver Broncos, 30-29. The win was Cleveland's first over Denver in Mile High Stadium since 1972, snapping an 0-7 string, including two AFC Championship Game losses (1987 and 1989). K Jerry Kauric booted the game-winning 30-yard field goal as time expired, capping a furious 61-yard drive that started with 2:04 remaining. QB Bernie Kosar threw three TD passes, including a 24-yarder to Brian Brennan with 3:21 left in the game to pull Cleveland to within two, 29-27. Cleveland forced Denver to punt after three plays that used only 1:12 off the clock.

A see-saw first half saw the Broncos score twice on running plays (QB John Elway from 13 yards and RB Bobby Humphrey's 19-yarder), a Jeff Treadwell 20-yard field goal, and a blocked punt by Simon Fletcher that went through the endzone for a safety. It was the Browns' third blocked punt in two games, and their first safety allowed since 1987. Cleveland countered with an Eric Metcalf five-yard burst after a Kosar lateral (PAT failed) and a 43-yard Kosar to WR Webster Slaughter flea flicker. Denver held a 19-13 halftime lead.

On the Browns' second third-quarter possession, RB Kevin Mack caught an 11-yard Kosar TD pass to put Cleveland ahead, 20-19. On Denver's next drive, CB Frank Minnifield, playing in his first game this season, intercepted an Elway pass, but Kosar countered with an interception to start the fourth period. Denver's Mark Jackson scored on a 16-yard reverse to put Denver back on top, 26-20, and Treadwell kicked his second field goal after a Leroy Hoard fumble to give the Broncos a 29-20 lead. Kosar then led the Browns on their winning drives of 80 and 61 yards.

Kosar completed 24 of 38 passes for 318 yards and three TDs, and was not sacked for the first time this season. WR Webster Slaughter recorded his 10th career 100-yard game (7-123), and Brian Brennan caught five clutch passes for 65 yards. Rookie WR Vernon Joiner caught two key passes, one a 24-yarder on a fourth and two on drive #1, and another for 15 yards on second and 15 during drive #2. Denver RB Bobby Humphrey recorded his fourth straight 100-yard effort before leaving the game in the fourth quarter with a hamstring injury.

The win upped Cleveland's record to 2-3, tied for second in the AFC Central.

(6) SUNDAY, OCT. 14 — Saints 25, BROWNS 20 at The Louisiana Superdome (68,608). The Browns traveled for the third straight week, and dropped a 25-20 contest to the New Orleans Saints, lowering their record to 2-4. Cleveland rallied from a 25-6 fourth-quarter deficit, scoring two touchdowns in the game's final six minutes, but the Saints held on for the win to drop Cleveland for the fourth time in five games. The two clubs exchanged field goals early in the game, before Saints' newly acquired QB Steve Walsh entered the contest in the second period. Walsh completed his first eight passes, among them a four-yard TD strike to RB Dalton Hilliard (PAT unsuccessful), and Kauric hit the second of his two three-pointers to make the score 9-6 at the half. New Orleans scored three times in the second half, as Walsh hit a wide-open Floyd Turner with a 45-yard pass, and then threw a 13-yarder to Eric Martin to increase the lead to 23-6. For the fourth time in three games, P Bryan Wagner suffered a blocked punt, this time by Robert Massey. The ball rolled through the endzone for a safety. It was the third safety the Saints scored against the Browns in their last two games.

With 8:32 remaining, Cleveland drove 82 yards in 10 plays, capped by a Bernie Kosar to Webster Slaughter 13-yard scoring pass. On the Saints' next possession, rookie LB Jock Jones blocked a Tommy Barnhardt punt, which was recovered by Stephen Braggs to set up a Kevin Mack one-yard TD sweep. New Orleans faced a third-and-10 on their own 22 with over two minutes left, but Walsh fended off a Cleveland blitz and hit Eric Martin on a 58-yard pass. That set up a 30-yard Morten Andersen field goal at the two-minute warning, which was good. Cleveland was called offsides, and the Saints elected to take the penalty. The game clock clicked down to 14 seconds before Andersen's 39-yard attempt hit the right upright. The Browns last two passes with 10 seconds remaining were incomplete, ending the game and Cleveland's three-game road trip at 1-2.

FB Kevin Mack averaged a game-high 5.1 yards-per-carry on 13 rushes (66 yards). QB Bernie Kosar completed 18 of 36 passes for 168 yards, threw one TD and was not intercepted. Slaughter, Reggie Langhorne, Brian Brennan and Mack each caught three passes, and Stephen Braggs recorded his first career interception.

Langhorne left the game on his final catch with three broken ribs. Michael Dean Perry left the game in the second quarter with a bruised knee after recording his fifth QB sack of the season. Walsh finished 15 of 26 for 243 yards, three TDs and one INT, while his favorite target was Eric Martin, who made eight catches for 153 yards and a TD.

(7) MONDAY, OCT. 22 — Bengals 34, BROWNS 13 (78,567) at Cleveland Stadium. The Browns dropped their second straight game, and their fifth in six weeks, 34-13 to the visiting Cincinnati Bengals. The Browns allowed 233 rushing yards, the most since they allowed 257 yards rushing on Sept. 18, 1986 vs. Cincinnati (a 30-13 Thursday night loss). RBs Craig Taylor (73 yards), Harold Green (75 yards) and James Brooks (63 yards) accounted for most of the Bengals' offense. QB Boomer Esiason completed only seven of 17 passes for 85 yards, but two went for TDs (19 yards to TE Rodney Holman and two yards to WR Mike Barber). The Bengals' other scores came on a 28 yard James Brooks run in the second quarter and an Ickey Woods' one-yard burst in the fourth quarter. K Jim Breech added two field goals (20 and 21 yards).

The Browns were behind 17-13 after FB Leroy Hoard scored on a one-yard run as time expired in the first half. K Jerry Kauric booted two first half field goals (21 and 30 yards) as both of those drives stalled after Cleveland penetrated the Bengals' five-yard line. The Browns were shut out in the second half and managed only 56 yards in the final two quarters. QB Bernie Kosar finished with 190 yards passing, no TDs and two INTs, while completing 17 of 33 passes. Kosar was sacked four times. FB Kevin Mack gained 53 yards on 12 carries and 67 yards on five receptions to pace Cleveland. The loss dropped the Browns to 2-5, fourth in the AFC Central.

(8) SUNDAY, OCT. 28 — 49ers 20, BROWNS 17 (63,672) at Candlestick Park. The Browns suffered a gut-wrenching, last-second 20-17 loss at the hands of the defending World Champion San Francisco 49ers when Mike Cofer booted a 45-yard field goal with five seconds remaining. The loss dropped Cleveland to 2-6, while the 49ers remained unbeaten at 7-0. The setback overshadowed a fine comeback effort by the Cleveland offense (14 fourth-quarter points), and a solid performance by the Browns' defense (177 net yards passing allowed and two interceptions).

Trailing 14-0 with 8:26 left in the first half after a Jerry Rice 14-yard TD catch and a Tom Rathman one-yard run, QB Bernie Kosar (nine of 18 for 106 yards) marched the Browns downfield, only to have three passes to WR Webster Slaughter denied. The first was an apparent 32-yard TD pass, which was nullified because Slaughter stepped out of bounds on his pass pattern. The second was a seven-yard catch at San Francisco's 12 that was overturned by an instant replay, and the third was a 19-yard endzone pass that fell incomplete, but not without contact. The end result was a mishandled 51-yard field goal attempt, and the Browns came away empty handed.

CB Tony Blaylock intercepted Montana on San Francisco's first second-half possession, setting up Jerry Kauric's 45-yard field goal to put the Browns on the scoreboard, 14-3, and then Cofer countered with a 40-yarder to increase the 'Niners lead, 17-3. On the Browns' next possession, Mike Pagel (13 of 21, 156 yards, two TDs) entered the game and marched the team to the 49ers' 30, only to lose the ball on downs. The 49ers were forced to punt after three downs, but then Pagel threw an interception early in the fourth quarter. Felix Wright (25 career INTs) picked off Montana on the 49ers' ensuing drive, setting up a Webster Slaughter 11-yard TD catch (in double coverage). The Browns forced San Francisco to punt, and then drove 66 yards in 11 plays. TE Ozzie Newsome (46 career TDs) made a diving catch from Pagel from four yards, tying the score at 17-17 with 1:10 remaining in regulation. Montana then drove the 49ers 44 yards in seven plays, and Cofer, who was a free agent in the Browns' 1987 training camp, kicked the 45-yard game-winner in a swirring wind.

(9) SUNDAY, NOV. 4 — Bills 42, Browns 0 (78,331) at Cleveland Stadium. The Browns suffered their worst shutout defeat ever, bowing 42-0 to the visiting Buffalo Bills. The loss was the team's fourth straight and dropped them to 2-7, three games behind front-running Cincinnati and Pittsburgh, and two games behind third place Houston.

The Bills scored a touchdown in each of the first three quarters, and then scored 21 points in the final period. RB Thurman Thomas scored three touchdowns, two on runs (three and 11 yards) and one on an 11-yard pass from Jim Kelly. Kelly completed 14 of 19 passes for 200 yards and was not intercepted. Jamie Mueller and Kenneth Davis scored on TD runs of one and three yards, and Cleveland native Darryl Talley returned an interception 60 yards for a TD to account for Buffalo's points. The Bills improved their record to 7-1.

QB Mike Pagel started his fifth game as a Brown and completed 16 of 38 passes for 195 yards, no TDs and two INTs. The Browns penetrated inside the Bills' 20-yard line three times, twice in the second quarter, but came up empty. A Webster Slaughter seven-yard TD reception was called back due to a penalty in the second quarter, and the ensuing field goal attempt was blocked by Shane Conlan. The Browns drove to the Buffalo nine-yard line on their next possession, but C Mike Morris' snap sailed over holder Mike Pagel's hands to thwart that FGA. On the Browns' initial third quarter possession, Cleveland drove to Buffalo's 12-yard line, but Pagel's pass was batted in the air by Leon Seals and was intercepted by Talley. Cleveland did not threaten again in a game witnessed by 78,331 fans. This was Bud Carson's last game as the Browns' head coach.

(10) SUNDAY, NOV. 18 — Oilers 35, BROWNS 23 (76,726) at Cleveland Stadium. Warren Moon threw for five touchdown passes to five different receivers, as Houston overpowered the Browns, 35-23, in Jim Shofner's head coaching debut. The loss, played in front of 76,726 fans, dropped Cleveland's record to a disappointing 2-8 and was their fifth straight. Moon celebrated his 34th birthday by passing for 322 yards. He completed 24

of 32 passes, was not intercepted, but was sacked five times by five different Browns. Moon's favorite receiver was Curtis Duncan, who caught seven aerials for 130 yards and a 37-yard touchdown.

QB Bernie Kosar directed the Browns' offense to 361 total yards and threw two TDs and 279 yards. But four turnovers (two interceptions and two fumbles lost) and Moon's pinpoint passing proved too difficult to overcome. Duncan, Ernest Givens, Lorenzo White and Tony Jones each caught a touchdown pass, as the Browns' secondary was depleted due to injury (Frank Minnifield was unable to play, as was Mark Harper. Stephen Braggs left the game with a hamstring injury). For Cleveland, Ozzie Newsome caught his 47th and final career TD pass and Reggie Langhorne added a scoring catch in the fourth quarter. Derrick Gainer scored his first career TD on a one-yard rush in the first half. Jerry Kauric kicked a 21-yard field goal. WR Webster Slaughter caught six passes for 104 yards for his 11th career 100-yard game. FB Kevin Mack led all rushers with 73 yards on 14 carries and added 58 yards on six receptions.

(11) **SUNDAY, NOV. 25 — Dolphins 30, BROWNS 13; (70,225) at Cleveland Stadium.** The struggling Browns dropped their sixth straight game of the season, 30-13, to the visiting Miami Dolphins. The home loss was their fifth straight, setting a club mark, and lowered their record to 2-9. Miami QB Dan Marino fired two TD passes and completed 16 of 29 passes for 245 yards, while RB Sammie Smith gained 96 yards rushing on 24 carries. Marino threw TD passes of live and 25 yards to Mark Duper and James Pruitt in the first quarter. Smith scored a four-yard run in the second period to give Miami a 20-0 lead, and then CB Kerry Glenn bolted 31 yards on an interception return to put Miami ahead, 27-0. The Browns' Jerry Kauric kicked a 36-yard field goal as time expired in the first half, and then kicked a 42-yarder in the third period. Miami's Pete Stoyanovich kicked a 40-yard field goal before Kevin Mack scored on a two-yard run to complete the scoring.

Mack led the Browns with 79 yards rushing on 13 carries (6.1 avg.), including his two-yard TD run, and added four catches for 29 yards. QB Bernie Kosar completed 17 of 37 passes for 191 yards, no TDs and two INTs. Marino's 245 yards made him only the 11th NFL quarterback to reach the career 30,000 yard mark.

(12) **SUNDAY, DEC. 2 — Rams 38, BROWNS 23 (61,981) at Cleveland Stadium.** The Browns lost their seventh consecutive game and 10th of the season, 38-23, to the visiting Los Angeles Rams. QB Jim Everett threw four touchdown passes to four different receivers, as the Browns surrendered 30 or more points for the fourth straight game.

The two clubs exchanged field goals in the first period before Everett found TE Pete Holohan wide open from the one-yard line on fourth-and-goal for a 10-3 lead. Gaston Green caught a 16-yard Everett TD pass in the second period to give L.A. a 17-3 halftime lead. After punting in their first second-half drive, the Browns scored TDs on their final three possessions. Trouble was, the Rams also scored on three of their four second-half drives. The Browns' scores came on a Webster Slaughter 17-yard scoring grab, a Kevin Mack three-yard reception, and a Mack one-yard TD run. The Rams countered with a Cleveland Gary one-yard TD burst and two more Everett TD passes (21 yards to FB Robert Delpino and nine yards to RB Buford McGee). L.A. controlled the ball for the final 5:04 to seal their second straight win of the season.

QB Bernie Kosar completed 23 of 39 passes for 281 yards, two TDs and no INTs, and was sacked four times. Everett was 22 of 29 for 261 yards, four TDs and no INTs, and was sacked once. Webster Slaughter caught seven passes for 93 yards and Kevin Mack caught seven for 78 yards to lead the Browns. Henry Ellard became the Rams' all-time leading pass receiver by catching six for 90 yards (surpassing Tom Fears' 400 career receptions). The Rams out-rushed the Browns, 150 yards to 37, and also controlled time of possession, 38:38 to 23:22.

(13) **SUNDAY, DEC. 9** — Oilers 58, **BROWNS 14** (54,469) at The Houston Astrodome. The Browns were thrashed by the Oilers in Houston, 58-14, before a sellout Astrodome crowd. The loss was their eighth straight and club-record tying 11th of the season. It was the most points ever allowed by a Browns' team in a regular season game (they surrendered 59 in the 1957 NFL Championship game), a club-record fifth straight week of allowing over 30 points, and ran their total points allowed mark to a team record 396 (snapping the old mark of 375 set in 1981). The nightmare began when the Browns drove 73 yards to the Oilers' seven on the game's opening drive, only to have a Bernie Kosar pass intercepted and returned 47 yards by FS Terry Kinard to set-up Houston's first TD, a 10-yard run by RB Lorenzo White. White scorched the Browns for four rushing TDs, tying Jim Taylor's mark of four rushing TDs vs. Cleveland back on 10/15/61. Houston scored on their next seven offensive possessions, sandwiched around a 72-yard fumble recovery by Kinard for a TD in the second quarter. Houston QB Warren Moon, who had thrown for five TDs three weeks earlier vs. the Browns in Cleveland, tossed two TDs among his 17-completion, 190-yard performance. Moon hit WR Ernest Givens on a six-yard TD pass, and Leonard Harris with a 17-yarder. Oilers' backup QB Cody Carlson picked up right were Moon left off by completing 11 of 13 for 92 yards and a nine-yard TD pass to Tony Jones. Neither Houston passer was intercepted.

Browns' RB/KOR Eric Metcalf provided the only bright spots for Cleveland, as he raced 101 yards on a second-quarter kickoff return for a TD. It was the third-longest kickoff return in team history, the longest since Carl Ward raced 104 yards on 11/26/67 vs. Washington, and Metcalf's second kickoff return for a TD of the season, setting a Browns' record (he scored on a 98-yarder on the opening kickoff in week two at the Jets). Eric scored the Browns' second and last touchdown on a 31-yard pass from Bernie Kosar (13 of 26 for 166 yard, one TD, two INTs) in the third quarter.

Houston's 45-7 halftime lead represented the most points allowed by a Cleveland defense in a half since Nov. 12, 1967, when the Green Bay Packers jumped to a 45-7 halftime lead in Milwaukee. That halftime score also tied for third-most points allowed in a half in NFL history. The 31 points allowed in a quarter (second) was topped only in the aforementioned game when the 'Pack scored 35 in the first period. The Browns allowed 50 or more points in only five regular season games in their 41-year history, including this game, and twice in the postseason. The last 50+ yield came on 10/7/79 vs. Pittsburgh.

(14) **SUNDAY, DEC. 16** — **BROWNS 13**, Falcons 10 (46,536) at Cleveland Stadium. The Browns snapped an eight-game losing streak, their longest since 1975, by defeating the visiting Atlanta Falcons, 13-10. The win was interim head coach Jim Shofner's first, and extended the Falcons' consecutive road loss streak to 18. The Browns limited the Falcons to 260 total net yards, sacked Atlanta QBs eight times (most since 1988) and allowed the fewest points since the opening week of the season.

FB Kevin Mack rushed for 80 yards on 13 carries (6.2 avg.), and scored the Browns' only touchdown on a five-yard rush in the second quarter. K Jerry Kauric kicked field goals from 23 and 41 yards, after his first attempt from 37 yards hit the left upright. Kauric's counterpart, K Greg Davis, missed two of three field goal attempts (47 and 39 yards) and connected on a 30-yarder. The Falcons scored their lone touchdown on the game's final play, when WR Floyd Dixon caught an 11-yard pass from QB Hugh Millen.

Michael Dean Perry recorded 2-1/2 QB sacks to increase his season total to 11-1/2. Perry shared a sack with Anthony Pleasant. Mike Johnson added two QB sacks and Clay Matthews, Stephen Braggs and Rob Burnett each added a takedown. Bernie Kosar was

22 of 37 for 217 yards, no TDs and one INT. WR Reggie Langhorne led the Browns with five receptions for 70 yards, while Atlanta's Andre Rison caught six for 100 yards — all in the fourth quarter — for his fifth 100-yard game of the season and second vs. the Browns in his two-year career.

(15) SUNDAY, DEC. 23 — Steelers 35, BROWNS 0 (51,665) at Three Rivers Stadium. The Browns lost a team record eight fumbles in Three Rivers Stadium and were shut out 35-0 by the Steelers for their club-record 12th loss of the season. The loss was Cleveland's first in Pittsburgh since 1986, their third shutout of the year, a team record, and was only their second shutout loss to the Steelers in the 82-game rivalry. The Browns lost a fumble on their first three plays from scrimmage, all of which led to Bobby Brister first-quarter TD passes (20 and two yards to Mike Mularkey, and 20 yards to Chris Calloway). Brister, who entered the game without ever throwing a TD pass against the Browns in four games (10 interceptions), hit Merrill Hoge on a 12-yarder for his fourth scoring pass of the day early in the second quarter. Warren Williams then scored from one-yard out to give the Steelers a commanding 35-0 halftime lead.

Mike Pagel started at quarterback for the injured Bernie Kosar (thumb) and completed 12 of 29 passes for 125 yards and one interception against Pittsburgh's top-ranked defense. Jeff Francis, recently activated off of the Browns' practice squad, saw late action and completed both of his passes for 26 yards. The eight lost fumbles tied the NFL record set by the St. Louis Cardinals on 10/25/76, and the nine fumbles tied the team record, and tied six other teams for the second-most in league history. In all, six different players lost the ball. The Browns' running game was taken out of the contest early, as they gained only 25 yards on 16 carries. The Steelers limited the Browns to only one conversion in nine third-down situations, and controlled the ball for 39 minutes and 19 seconds.

(16) SUNDAY, DEC. 30 — Bengals 21, BROWNS 14 (60,041) at Riverfront Stadium. The Browns closed the most disappointing season in franchise history with a 21-14 loss at Cincinnati, enabling the Bengals to win the AFC Central title. Cleveland did not capitalize on two golden scoring opportunities, once in each half. After a Van Waiters' interception in the first quarter, the Browns established a first-and-goal at the Cincinnati one. Four straight running plays were stuffed by the Bengals' defense and the Browns came up short. On Cleveland's next possession, QB Mike Pagel's sideline pass to Brian Brennan was intercepted by LB James Francis and returned 17 yards for a touchdown, giving the Bengals a 7-0 lead. Pagel threw his second interception on Cleveland's next possession when CB Lewis Billups deflected the ball into the hands of S Barney Bussey. The Bengals moved quickly in for a TD when Boomer Esiason hit TE Rodney Holman on a 22-yard strike to increase their lead to 14-0.

S Felix Wright recorded his 26th career interception on the first play of the third quarter, and FB Kevin Mack rushed three straight times (13, four and two yards), the last for a touchdown to quickly put the Browns on the scoreboard, 14-7. Pagel rifled a 16-yard scoring pass to Brian Brennan on Cleveland's next possession to knot the score at 14-14. Rookie K Jerry Kauric missed a 47-yard FG wide left on the Browns' next possession. Cincinnati drove to the Browns' three-yard line on their next possession, but a James Brooks fumble was recovered by S Thane Gash. The Browns were then forced to punt, which set up Esiason's second touchdown pass, this one to RB Eric Ball, who scored on a 48-yard pass and run. The Browns moved to Cincinnati's 23-yard line on their next possession, but a fourth-and-five pass to Metcalf fell incomplete. The Browns did get the ball once again, with 1:36 left, and drove to the Bengals' 32, but Pagel threw his third interception on a pass intended for Brennan.

Pagel completed 14 of 32 passes for 184 yards, one TD and three INTs. WR Webster Slaughter led all receivers with six catches for 115 yards, his 12th career 100-yard game. FB Kevin Mack gained a season-high 85 yards on 16 carries. Bengals' QB Boomer Esiason completed 10 of 16 passes for 154 yards, two TDs and two INTs. James Brooks rushed 17 times for 84 yards to surpass the 1,000-yard mark for the 1990 season. The game was Jim Sholner's final as interim head coach.

BROWNS' HISTORY

- 1946:** Browns were started by owner Arthur (Mickey) McBride as member of the All American Football Conference. Paul Brown was named coach and general manager and the first player he signed was then tailback Otto Graham. The Browns won the Western title with a 42-17 victory over the Buffalo Bisons and then defeated the New York Yankees in the championship game (14-9).
- 1947-49:** Browns continued their domination of the AAFC, winning three more championships.
- 1950:** Following the merger of the AAFC and the NFL, the Browns tied with the New York Giants with 10-2 records for a share of Eastern title. Browns won playoff, 8-3, and then stopped Los Angeles, 30-28, for the championship.
- 1951-53:** Browns won three consecutive Eastern titles, but lost each time in the league's title match. In 1953, McBride sold the club to an organization headed by David Jones.
- 1954-55:** Led by quarterback Otto Graham, the Browns won back-to-back NFL championships.
- 1956:** At 5-7, the Browns suffered first losing season.
- 1957:** Jim Brown was drafted; was named rookie of the year and helped Cleveland to Eastern Division title.
- 1961:** Former television and advertising executive Art Modell bought the Browns.
- 1963:** Blanton Collier, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach.
- 1964:** Browns win division title with 52-20 victory over Giants and captured NFL championship with 27-0 win over Colts.
- 1965:** In what was to be his last season, Jim Brown won NFL MVP honors and led Cleveland to league title game where they were defeated by Green Bay.
- 1966:** An eighth round pick from 1964, Leroy Kelly became the club's dominant threat, rushing for 1,141 yards, but the Browns finished second in their division to Dallas.
- 1968:** With newly acquired quarterback Bill Nelsen (from Pittsburgh), Browns won division; beat Dallas in playoffs and lost to Baltimore in the championship.
- 1969:** Browns won third consecutive division crown, but lost to Minnesota in title game.
- 1970:** Browns became members of AFC Central and finished second.
- 1971:** Nick Skorich, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach. Team won first AFC Central crown.
- 1972:** Browns once again gained postseason, losing to eventual champion Miami in playoffs.
- 1975-77:** Forrest Gregg, Browns' offensive line coach, becomes head coach; Greg Pruitt has three consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons; Dick Modzelewski coaches final game of 1977.
- 1978:** Sam Rutigliano becomes the first non-Browns' assistant to gain head coaching position. Team won first three on way to 8-8 finish.
- 1979:** Losses in final two games prevented team from entering playoffs, finishing 9-7; Mike Pruitt keeps the tradition of outstanding Browns' running backs and has the first of three straight 1,000-yard seasons.
- 1980:** Browns win AFC Central title with 11-5 record; lost to eventual Super Bowl champion Oakland in playoff; Brian Sipe is consensus MVP of league.
- 1982:** In strike-shortened season, Browns finish eighth in AFC (4-5) and gain playoffs second time in three years. Lost to Raiders in Super Bowl Tournament.
- 1983:** Browns tied for wildcard playoff spot with 9-7 record, but did not advance, losing to Denver and Seattle through NFL tie-breaking procedure.
- 1984:** Browns replaced head coach Sam Rutigliano with defensive coordinator Marty Schottenheimer after a 1-7 midseason record and finished season at 5-11. TE Ozzie Newsom caught 89 passes for second straight year.

- 1985: Browns captured their third central division championship, but lost to Dolphins, 24-21, in Miami. Rookie Kevin Mack (1,104) and Earnest Byner (1,002) each gained 1,000 yards rushing. It marked the third time in 66-year history of NFL that teammates both rushed for over 1,000 yards in the same season.
- 1986: Browns won more games than ever before during regular season, as they roll-up a 12-4 record en route to their second consecutive AFC Central crown. In a double-overtime playoff thriller before a packed Cleveland Stadium crowd, Bernie Kosar throws for an NFL-record 487 yards as the Browns beat the New York Jets, 23-20, to advance to the AFC championship game. The Browns lose to Denver, also in overtime, 23-20.
- 1987: Browns capture their third straight AFC Central, as they finished the season 10-5. The third week of the NFL season was cancelled due to the 24-day players' strike, while three "replacement" games were played (the Browns went 2-1). The Browns defeated the Colts, 38-21, at Cleveland Stadium in the AFC playoffs, then drop their second straight AFC Championship to Denver despite a spectacular come-from-behind bid that saw them score 30 second-half points, only to fall, 38-33 in Mile High Stadium. Bernie Kosar wins the AFC passing title with a 95.4 QB rating, and an NFL-high eight Browns make the Pro Bowl.
- 1988: Cleveland finishes 10-6 and earns a Wild Card berth by defeating Houston, 28-33, in the season finale by overcoming a 16-point third-quarter deficit. Houston defeats the Browns, 24-23, in the Wild Card game played on Christmas Eve. Four Cleveland quarterbacks suffered injuries during the course of the season. Marty Schottenheimer resigns on Dec. 27.
- 1989: Owner Art Modell announces Bud Carson as the Browns' seventh fulltime head coach on January 27. The Browns win their fourth division title in five years with a 9-6-1 record, and advance to the playoffs for an AFC-high fifth straight season. Browns win division crown with a stunning, come-from behind, 24-20 victory at Houston in the final week of regular season. Browns advance to third title game in four years by defeating Buffalo, 34-30, but lose to Denver, 37-21, at Mile High Stadium in AFC Championship. Bud Carson becomes first head coach to advance to the AFC Championship since Red Miller in 1977.
- 1990: Browns suffer worst season in franchise history, finishing 3-13. Jim Shofner replaces Bud Carson as interim head coach on November 5.
- 1991: Owner Art Modell announces Bill Belichick as the eighth full-time head coach on February 5.

CLEVELAND BROWNS' TRAINING AND ADMINISTRATIVE COMPLEX

This state-of-the-art facility, completed in August of 1991, was built specifically for training a professional football team. Situated on 10 acres of land in Berea, Ohio, the Browns' campus comprises an administration building of 76,000 sq. ft., a field house of 60,000 sq. ft., and a field maintenance building. There are four natural grass fields outside and a 70-yard omni turf surface in the field house. Groundbreaking took place in May of 1990, and construction was completed in less than a year-and-a-half.

The Browns' staff, previously functioning in four separate buildings in the Cleveland area, will now be housed under one roof for the first time since the early 1970s. Some of the training features include a 6,000 sq. ft. weight room, a 4,500 sq. ft. training room, including a Jacuzzi, a cold water plunge, three whirlpools and a Swim-Ex pool, which provides a current of water for resistance. A half-court basketball area and two racquetball courts, plus locker rooms for staff are on the premises.

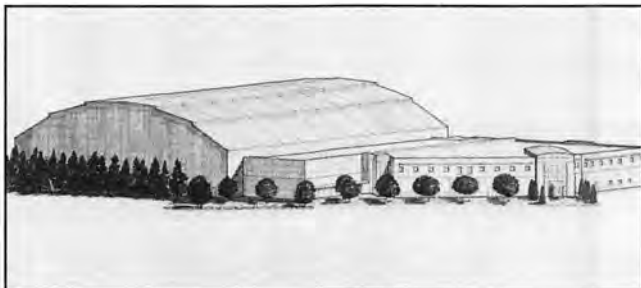
For the media, there is a large working press room overlooking the practice field, several private interview rooms, a complete television studio, and a press conference room.

CLEVELAND STADIUM

Cleveland Stadium, a famous and proud landmark for this city, is the nation's largest facility housing both a Major League baseball team and an NFL franchise. The Stadium, with a current capacity of 80,098, was completed in July of 1931 at a cost of \$3.5 million.

A \$6,000,000 improvement program was completed during 1989 and 1990, which included a new scoreboard (including sideboards that continuously update out-of-town scores), a new sound system, 47 color TV monitors located within the concourse, renovation of concession stands and upgraded restroom facilities, new rooflights, and replacement of all original electrical transformers.

The Stadium, which sits on a landfill, has proved to be multi-purpose. Along with baseball and football, the range of activities at the Stadium has included everything from a heavyweight championship bout (Schmeling vs. Stribling) to religious convocations. The Metropolitan Opera and the Beatles have performed on the field, as have circuses, rodeos, big bands, tractor pulls, and a horde of professional and amateur athletes. Last June, a Hollywood film crew used Cleveland Stadium as the scene for *The Babe Ruth Story*, to be shown this October.

Over the years, the Stadium became a financial strain for the city of Cleveland. Art Modell responded to the need in 1974, when he formed Cleveland Stadium Corporation and signed a 25-year lease with the city. When the agreement between the city and Modell was first reached in 1974, the Browns' owner promised a \$10 million improvement plan, which was concluded in 1984.

Those original improvements included the addition of 108 luxurious loges, a computerized scoreboard, more comfortable seats, new concession facilities, a new lighting system (both inside and around the perimeter of the Stadium), the installation of a new playing field, which was lowered two feet to provide a better view from the stands (1976), a new football pressbox elevator and many structural steel repairs.

Since 1984, additional improvements continue to be made as needed. Including the scoreboard mentioned above, over \$18 million has been invested in the building since 1974.

Former Cleveland Mayor (and current Governor) George Voinovich gives Modell and the Stadium staff the credit for saving the Stadium. "If the city had held onto the Stadium, it probably would be closed today," Voinovich said. (*Cleveland Press*, 3/28/80).

GLOSSARY OF MEDICAL TERMS

A.C. Joint—

Acromioclavicular joint; joint of the shoulder where acromion process (of the scapula) and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.

Abscess—

An infection which produces pus; can be the result of a blister, callus, penetrating wound or laceration.

Anterior—

In front of; the front surface.

Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL)—

Ligament of knee attaching to anterior tibial plateau and posterior medial aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from coming forward.

Arthrogram—

X-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected in affected area (to show torn cartilage or rotator cuff tears).

Brachial Plexus—

Network of nerves originating from the cervical vertebrae running down into the arm.

Burner—

Common term for brachial plexus trauma in the neck. Usually results in burning or tingling sensation into the shoulder or arm when the neck is forced beyond the normal range of motion.

Capsule—

An enclosing structure which surrounds the joint and contains ligaments which stabilize that joint.

Cartilage—

Smooth, slippery substance preventing two ends of bones from rubbing together and grating.

Collagen—

A substance existing in commonly injured tissues of the body, including skin, cartilage, ligaments and bone.

Disc—

A flat, round-like, plate structure usually referring to cartilage between vertebrae.

Ecchymosis—

Bleeding into the surface tissue below the skin, resulting in a "black and blue" effect.

Effusion—

Accumulation of fluid, or the fluid itself, in various spaces in the body. Commonly found in the knee following injury.

Epicondylitis—

Inflammation in the elbow due to overuse of either the flexor or extensor muscles attaching to the medial or lateral epicondyle of the humerus.

Fibula—

The smaller of the two bones in the lower leg, located to the outside.

Fracture—

Breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, incomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.

Humerus—

Bone of the upper arm.

Inferior—

Lower, beneath, toward the bottom.

Lateral—

To the outside of the body.

Lateral Collateral Ligament (LCL)—

Ligament of knee attaching lateral femoral condyle and to fibula head. It provides lateral stability to the knee.

Medial—

Pertaining to or near the middle.

Medial Collateral Ligament (MCL)—

Ligament of knee along the medial aspect that connects the femur to the tibia. It provides stability to the medial aspect of the joint.

Meniscus—

Crescent shaped cartilage usually pertaining to the knee joint.

Metacarpals—

Five long bones of hand, just below fingers.

Metatarsals—

Five long bones of foot, just below toes.

Neuritis—

Inflammation of a nerve.

Patella—

The kneecap.

Pectorals—

Chest muscles beneath breast, leading up to shoulder.

Plantar—

Pertaining to the sole of the foot.

Plica—

A fold of tissue in the joint capsule and a common result of knee injury.

Posterior—

At the back part, or rear of the body.

Posterior Cruciate Ligament (PCL)—

Ligament of the knee attaching to posterior tibial plateau and anterior lateral aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from going backward.

Quadriceps (Quads)—

The four powerful muscles in the front of the thigh, responsible for extending the knee joint.

Rotator Cuff—

Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area: supra-spinatus, infraspinatus, teres minor, and subscapularis. Often irritated by overuse.

S-C Joint—

Sternoclavicular joint; articulation between the sternum and the clavicle.

Scapula—

The shoulder blade.

Sciatic Nerve—

Largest nerve in body located in back of leg which controls most of its function.

Sprain—

A joint injury. A violent twisting, stretching, pulling or tearing of a ligament.

Strain—

A muscle injury. The pulling or twisting of a muscle or tendon.

Superior—

In anatomy, the upper of the two parts; toward the top or above.

Triceps—

Muscle of the posterior upper arm, opposite the biceps, that extends the elbow.

Ulnar Nerve—

Nerve in the elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing or repeated trauma.

PRO: Acquired from Cardinals 6/7/91 for a future undisclosed draft choice...Enters 13th NFL season as the 19th leading receiver in NFL history with 522 catches for 8,496 yards (16.3 avg.) and 66 TD catches (18th is former Steeler John Stallworth with 537 receptions)...Needs 67 catches to make all-time top ten - Fred Biletnikoff is tenth with 589...Originally was a fourth round choice of the then-St. Louis Cardinals in 1979...Left Cardinals with their records for receiving and touchdowns, 69 (also had one TD each rushing, kickoff return and punt return)...Has 21 plus-100-yard receiving games, including two last year...Had back-to-back 78-catch seasons in 1983-84, earning the Pro Bowl each year (in '84 accumulated 1,555 yards, the highest total in the NFL in 19 years at that time)...Has averaged 57 catches, 915 yards and 7.4 touchdowns over past eight seasons (caught at least 40 catches in each of those years)...Began career as defensive back and made history in '81 vs. Redskins (9/20) when he became first player to catch a touchdown pass and intercept a pass in same game for the first time since the Redskins' Eddie Sutton in 1957...Shares NFL record for longest kickoff return - 106 yards vs. Dallas on 10/21/79 - with Green Bay's Al Carmichael (1956) and Kansas City's Noland Smith (1967).
