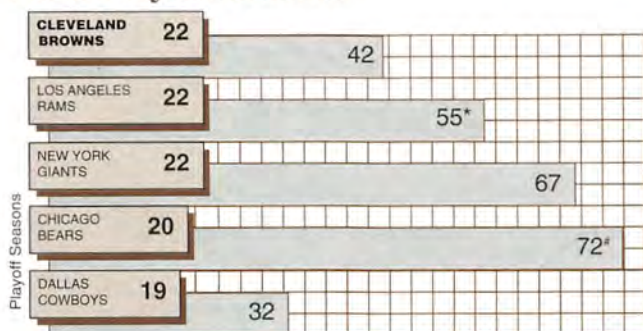
# A PLAYOFF FRANCHISE

The Cleveland Browns have made the NFL playoffs 22 times in their 42-year history. Only the Los Angeles Rams and New York Giants have posted as many playoff seasons.

Cleveland's percentage of playoff seasons (52.4%; 22 playoff appearances in 42 seasons) is third best in the history of the NFL. Only the Dallas Cowboys (59.4%) and the Los Angeles Raiders (53.1%) have been as consistent.

The Browns made the playoffs seven times in the 1980s, including AFC Championship Game appearances in 1986, '87 and '89. Cleveland has won more games than any other team since 1950 (354-250-10), and owner Art Modell has seen the Browns make the playoffs 14 times—appearing in 19 playoff games—since purchasing the club in 1961.

## Most Playoff Seasons

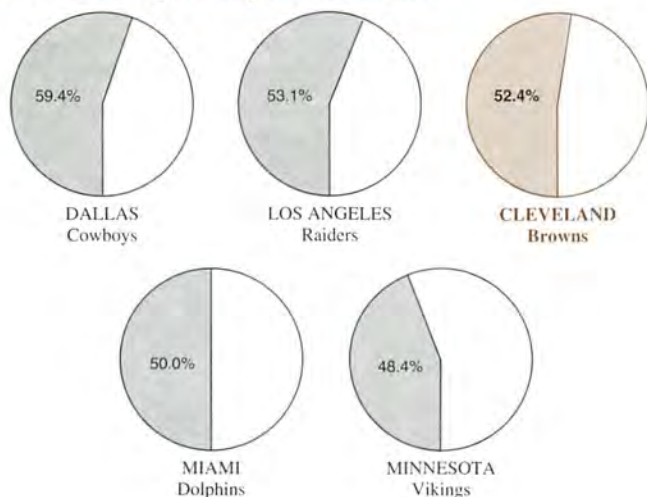


NFL Seasons

## STEVE CROSBY

### Running Backs

**Born:** July 3, 1950

Great Bend, Kan.

**3rd Year Browns (1985, '91)**

**14 Years Coaching**

**Fort Hays (Kan.) State**

Steve Crosby, reunited with the Browns last season after Head Coach Bill Belichick hired him to coach running backs, had his first stint with the club in 1985. Crosby, 42, formerly an assistant to the head coach for offense under Marty Schottenheimer during the '85 campaign, coached fullback Kevin Mack and running back Earnest Byner. They became the third duo in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards each in the same season.

"I'm looking forward to working with the new players who were here in minicamp, including our first round pick, Tommy Vardell out of Stanford," said Crosby. "But I'm also looking forward to coaching all the guys like Kevin Mack. I love Kevin. Leroy Hoard had a great year last season, and Eric Metcalf's speed is always exciting. The running game will add a new dimension to our offense in '92."

"Steve brings a wealth of NFL experience to our staff," said Belichick. "He's coached offense and special teams, plus he's had experience in personnel. It is well known around the league that Steve is a very dedicated and enthusiastic teacher."

**GIANTS' GENERAL MANAGER GEORGE YOUNG ON BELICHICK:** "He has priorities. He goes in the order of those priorities, which is a plus. He was with us 12 years. He worked as hard, if not harder, than anybody we had. He's a one-purpose guy when it comes to football. He's well prepared, very industrious, bright and well-organized. If it's effort, time and dedication — if that's what it takes — he has those things."

A running back for the New York Giants from 1974-76, Crosby began his coaching career on Don Shula's Miami Dolphin staff in 1979 after serving as a Dolphin scout for two years (1977-78). From 1979 through 1982, Crosby coached the Dolphins' special teams and linebackers, while continuing personnel duties. Crosby joined the Atlanta Falcons (1983-84) and worked with quarterbacks and running backs. After tutoring Browns' running backs in 1985, Crosby returned to Atlanta as quarterback coach in 1986 and switched to running backs coach (1987-89). In 1990, he accepted an invitation from the Patriots to coach special teams and tight ends.

Crosby is a 1972 graduate of Fort Hays (Kan.) State University, where he earned a degree in physical education and a master's in athletic administration. As a senior, he rushed for 1,024 yards on 179 carries (5.7 avg.). He was twice named an NAIA All America and was a three-time all-conference performer before being drafted in the 17th round in 1974. Steve attended Pawnee Rock (Kan.) H.S.

Crosby and his wife, Lisa, have two sons: Matthew (6) and Jeffrey (4). The Crosbys reside in Strongsville, O.

## DID YOU KNOW ?

Entering 1992, a Browns' running back has rushed for 100 yards or more in a game 172 times in 163 games since 1950. Cleveland's record in those games is 130-30-3 (.798). The Browns have an eight-game winning streak when a running back runs for 100-yards or more, but did not enjoy a 100-yard day by a running back in 1989, 1990, or 1991.



## JIM BATES

**Defensive Line**

**Born: May 31, 1946**  
Pontiac, Mich.

**2nd Year Browns**  
**23rd Year Coaching**

Jim Bates, who has coached every defensive position and served as a defensive coordinator and USFL head coach, takes on a new assignment this year, switching from linebacker to defensive line coach.

"Jim's coaching experience in every phase of the defense gives him flexibility to move into a different role this year, developing and working with the defensive line," said Head Coach Bill Belichick. "His flexibility to work with multiple positions and his knowledge of the game can only enhance our defensive schemes."

"Good team defense starts up front," said Bates. "We have some young men who have the ability to be a force on defense. I'm looking forward to working with this group of guys."

Bates was defensive coordinator/secondary coach at Florida (1990) when the Gators' defense ranked fifth in the nation in total yards allowed. He coached linebackers at Tennessee in 1989, and the Vols were SEC co-champs and Cotton Bowl victors. Prior to the Browns, Bates' last professional coaching position was as an assistant coach with the Detroit Drive of the Arena Football League in 1988. He spent 1986 as defensive coordinator for the USFL Arizona Outlaws after serving as head coach for the San Antonio Gunslingers in 1985. Bates joined the Gunslingers as defensive coordinator in 1984.

Jim, 46, spent six years (1978-83) at Texas Tech as secondary coach and defensive coordinator. He tutored the secondary at West Virginia in 1977. From 1975-76, he coached linebackers at Kansas State. He was an offensive line coach at Villanova in 1973, but switched to linebackers' coach the following year. Bates spent the 1972 season coaching freshmen at Southern Mississippi. He was head coach at Sevier County (Tenn.) H.S. from 1969-71 after working as a graduate assistant at Tennessee, his alma mater.

Bates played in the 1965 Bluebonnet Bowl, the 1966 Gator Bowl and the 1968 Orange Bowl as a linebacker for the Vols. In 1967, Tennessee finished second in the nation and won the SEC championship. Jim graduated in 1969 with a degree in physical education. He attended Oxford (Mich.) H.S., where he was graduated in 1964.

Jim and his wife, Beverly, are residents of Strongsville, O. He has two sons: James (19), who is a linebacker at the University of Florida and Jeremy (16).

## ERNIE ADAMS

**Offensive Assistant, Tight Ends**

**Born: March 31, 1953**

**Waltham, Mass.**

**2nd Year Browns**

**9th Year Coaching**

Ernie Adams, formerly pro personnel director of the New York Giants (1982-85), received one of the first coaching offers made by Head Coach Bill Belichick last year. Named offensive assistant, Adams has an extensive coaching and scouting background on both the professional and college levels.

"Ernie's talented and versatile enough to work with a number of positions," said Belichick. "He's worked with quarterbacks, tight ends, receivers and some line—plus he's also worked in pro personnel and has been involved with the drafting of players."

A former offensive assistant coach with both the New England Patriots (1975-78) and the New York Giants (1979-81), Adams was promoted to Director of Pro Personnel for the Giants (1982-85). In the latter capacity, he was responsible for rating all players in the NFL for purposes of trade or waiver acquisition, evaluating college talent for the NFL draft, and evaluating upcoming Giants' opponents. After leaving the Giants, Adams tackled Wall Street as an analyst/trader (1986-1990) for Mabon, Nugent & Co. of New York.

"I've known Bill for 20 years, and we've spent countless hours talking about football teams and what you need to be a winner in this league. The Browns have a team with a lot of tradition and ingredients here to put together a championship team. It's hard work, but undeniably satisfying and a lot of fun."

Upon graduation from Northwestern (1975) with a B.S. in education, Adams was hired as administrative assistant to then-head coach Chuck Fairbanks of the Patriots. His duties included all aspects of football operation, plus computer analysis, statistical evaluation and film coordination. At the Giants, Adams served as an assistant offensive coach under then-head coach Ray Perkins. His duties were similar to those held at the Patriots and included on-the-field work with the offensive unit, coaching during meetings, and preparing offensive game plans.

Adams was graduated from Phillips Academy, Andover (Mass.), and enrolled at Northwestern. He worked under head coach Alex Agase, assisting the coaching staff as a game scout and undergraduate assistant on the freshman football team. He assumed the same responsibilities with the varsity teams, including on-the-field work with tight ends.

Adams is single and lives in Lakewood, O.

and Gene Hickerson." (Steve Belichick recently retired from the Naval Academy, where he coached for 33 years. He currently does some scouting for the Browns).

Today, Belichick invites many of the Browns' alumni to spend time with the team and speak to them. "I have great respect for the history of this franchise and the players who made it the winningest. A Jim Brown, an Ozzie Newsome, a Jim Houston - those types of players and people - they can help us get better," Belichick says.

Belichick began his coaching career as a 23-year-old in 1975 as a special assistant to then-Baltimore Head Coach Ted Marchibroda. "He was a young man who was willing to work round the clock for nothing and learn everything he could about the game," Marchibroda recalls. "After training camp, we got him a hotel room across from mine and, whatever we gave him, he did it well and thoroughly. The first thing you should know about Bill is that he's a worker, plus he knows people and this is a people business. He's a good man, with good character and there's no doubt he knows defense. I believe he'll be a successful head coach."

"Ted taught me what being an NFL coach is all about and I owe him a great deal. He gave me a tremendous learning experience at a young age. I saw the highs and lows. The Colts lost four of their first five and then came back to go 10-and-four and win the AFC Eastern championship," Belichick adds.

A year later, Belichick joined the Lions' staff of Rick Forzano as assistant special teams' coach and later helped with the tight ends and receivers under Tommy Hudspeth. He left the Lions after the 1977 season to join Red Miller's Denver Bronco staff as assistant special teams' coach and assistant to defensive coordinator Joe Collier. In 1978, he went to the Giants to serve as a defensive assistant and special teams' coach under Ray Perkins. After coaching the special teams in 1979-80, Belichick was given the added duties of linebackers in 1981-82. Under Bill Parcells, Belichick began coordinating the defense in 1983, plus coaching linebackers for two seasons. Parcells gave him the defensive coordinator's title, plus secondary coaching responsibilities in 1989 and 1990.

Belichick, who grew up in Annapolis, Maryland, is a graduate of Annapolis High and Phillips Academy, Andover (Mass.). He earned a B.A. in economics in 1975 from Wesleyan (Middletown, Ct.) University. Bill played football (center and tight end) and lacrosse in both high school and college.

Bill's wife Debby has already become an important part of the Browns' family and the Cleveland community. After reading a newspaper story about the financial troubles of a home for battered women and children, she organized the coaches' wives to lend a hand and continues to help the Zelma George Home on a regular basis. Bill and Debby (formerly Clarke), who is an elementary education graduate of Birmingham (Ala.) Southern College, have three children: Amanda (7), Stephen (5) and Brian, who was born last November.

## BILL BELICHICK

**Head Coach**

**Born: April 16, 1952**  
Nashville, Tenn.

**2nd Year Browns**

**18th Year Coaching**

When people would congratulate Bill Belichick on last season's 6-10 record, which included six losses by a total of only 17 points, the new Cleveland head coach would grumble a little: "The only good thing you can say about six wins is that it's better than five. We didn't win enough. We have to get better."

If hard work is the first step to "getting better," Belichick is well on his way to success. "On the whole, the coaches in this business work very hard. In fact, I've known people who would have been very good coaches, but they did not want to cope with the hours," Browns' owner Art Modell says. "But, Bill Belichick is something else. I've never seen anything like his work ethic. His energy level is extraordinary. He leaves nothing to chance, and I like what I see."

Belichick does not consider his hours long. "I never think about it. I enjoy being a football coach. I enjoy the business. If I didn't, I wouldn't do it. To me, it's not a big deal."

On Feb. 5, 1991, the then 38-year-old Belichick was named head coach of the Browns by Modell. Belichick became the eighth fulltime head coach in the team's 42-year NFL history. At the time, Belichick was the league's youngest head coach. A year later, he's the second oldest head coach in the AFC Central behind Houston's Jack Pardee (56) and in front of Pittsburgh's Bill Cowher (35) and Cincinnati's Dave Shula (33).

In reality, Belichick and his staff did more than coax six wins out of last year's Browns. They restored discipline and gained the respect of each team they played, a far cry from the disastrous 3-13 team (1991) they inherited. The Browns finished first in the AFC with a +15 giveaway/takeaway mark, a remarkable turnaround from an NFL low of -24 in 1990. Cleveland set a team mark with just 18 giveaways, only four shy of the all-time record of 14 set by the 1990 Super Bowl champion Giants.

"I think Bill and his staff did a tremendous job last season," Modell says. "When you consider all the injuries we had, and I don't think we ever had more, especially to the defense; that Bill had two or three new players every week and over 80 for the season; plus, we had all those close, tough defeats. I think we have a lot of reasons to be optimistic."

Belichick came to the Browns from the New York Giants, where he served as an assistant for 12 seasons and helped the Giants to Super Bowl victories in 1986 and 1990. In the latter season, the Giants' championship defense, which was coordinated by Belichick, allowed just 211 points, an average of 13.2 per game, lowest in the league. During the 1986 Super Bowl campaign, the Giants gave up 236 points, second best in the NFL to the Bears' 187. Over Belichick's last three seasons, the Giants allowed the fewest points in the league, 777.

"To be a head coach in this league was a goal of mine. The fact that it is Cleveland makes it a dream come true," Belichick says. "Cleveland is in my blood. I have very fond memories of this area."

Belichick's father Steve is from Struthers, Ohio (near Youngstown) and played football at (Case) Western Reserve University (1938-40) under Bill Edwards, who was Bill's godfather. (Steve played fullback for the Detroit Lions in 1941). "I still have family in Struthers, and I always enjoyed visiting there and coming up to Cleveland to see Browns and Indians' games," Belichick says. "My father used to take me to Hiram College when I was a boy to watch the Browns practice, and I remember seeing some of the greats like Jim Brown, Lou Groza, Gary Collins, Erich Barnes



## KEVIN BYRNE

**Vice President,  
Director of Public Relations**

**Born: August 20, 1949

Now in his 12th year with the Browns and his 14th NFL season, Kevin Byrne is a Browns' Vice President and the team's Director of Public Relations. Byrne, who was born in Cleveland 43 years ago, joined the franchise in 1981 as the Director of Publicity and earned his promotion to vice president three years later (1984).

While he directs the Browns' public relations' department, Byrne also supervises the team's ticketing department, and works closely with the marketing staff. He has negotiated a number of the Browns' preseason television and radio contracts and also coordinates some Cleveland Stadium Corporation activities.

A significant portion of Byrne's attention is given to the production of Browns' television shows. A year ago, the team produced two weekly half hour shows (the Emmy Award-winning "Browns' Insider", which has been nominated two years in a row for "outstanding achievement in sports' programming", and the "Bill Belichick Show") and Byrne wrote both of these. This season, the team will produce a weekly one-hour show in prime time (Wednesdays at 10 p.m.) called "Browns' Insider with Bill Belichick".

Byrne began his NFL career with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1977 when he was named as the then youngest public relations director in the league. He stayed with the Big Red for two years before becoming Director of Public Affairs for Trans World Airline (1979-80). In 1980, St. Louis Magazine selected Byrne as one of 80 St. Louisans "to watch in the 80's."

From 1974-77, Byrne was Sports Information Director at Marquette University, where he worked with Al McGuire and the Warriors' 1977 NCAA basketball champions. His first job after graduating from college was as the "SID" at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. His publications at both schools won numerous national and regional awards from the College Sports Information Directors' Association.

Byrne earned distinction as a member of Alpha Sigma Nu, the National Jesuit Honor Society, while gaining a degree in journalism from Marquette University (1971). He was a member of "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities" and was a four-year member of the Warrior wrestling team. (Byrne currently helps coach a grade school wrestling team in the Cleveland area). Kevin is a graduate of Lakewood (O.) St. Edwards High School, where he is Vice-Chairman of the school's Board of Trustees and Executive Committee. For the past six years, he has been the chairman of the NFL's Pro Football Writers' Liaison Committee.

Kevin and his wife Sally live in Westlake with their four children: daughter Shannon, 16, and sons Sean, 15, Tim, 13, and Conor, 10.

## DAVID MODELL

**Vice President/Assistant to the President**

**18th Year with Browns**

Despite his relative youth, 31 on Aug. 16, David Modell can boast of 18 years of experience with the Browns, and his responsibilities have increased continually during his tenure with the franchise. Recently, he gave up his title as Vice President of Marketing to devote more time to player contract negotiations and serving as the team's main contact with the league office on all player-related business.

Already David has made his mark on the franchise and in league circles with the work he's done marketing the Browns. The younger Modell started a marketing department in 1985 and developed a series of programs that have enhanced the team's image and provided revenues to meet the increasingly difficult task of meeting the expenses involved with running an NFL team. Other teams have copied some of the innovations started by David, including Browns' television productions (weekly shows and preseason games produced by teams rather than selling those rights) and an elaborate training camp magazine that is distributed to fans. The teams' television ventures were both produced and sold by Modell.

Modell, who first worked for the team when he was 14, was promoted to Vice President of Marketing/Assistant to the President in April of 1989. His appointment was explained at that time by Browns' Executive Vice President Jim Bailey. "The promotion reflects the added importance we've placed, as well as the other NFL teams, on local marketing. Player and operational costs are rising and we are aggressively seeking new sources of income through marketing to balance this inflation. Secondly, David's promotion is an indication of his growing role in our organization," Bailey said.

Since leaving his Browns' public relations' assistant job seven years ago, Modell significantly increased the team's advertising revenues. At the league level, Modell serves on the Executive Committee for marketing specialists.

Prior to this season, Modell negotiated player contracts for four years under the direction of Ernie Accorsi, who resigned from the team last April. He also served as a coordinator for the Browns' promotional and advertising activities with radio stations WMMS/WHK, which have the rights to the Browns' broadcasts.

Modell is deeply involved with the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland, where he serves as Vice President of the Board and Executive Committee, while heading their development fundraising. Modell also works with the Lake County Boy Scouts' Association.

As a 14-year old student, David worked Browns' games as a member of the grounds' crew. In the next years, he spent time as a front office aid and training camp intern. After graduating from the The Gunnery School (Washington, Ct.) and attending Wittenberg University, Modell joined the Browns in a fulltime capacity in the team's ticket office (1981-82). He then worked two years as the front office manager for the Fernwood Inn, a resort in the Pocono Mountains (1982-84) before returning to Cleveland in October of 1984.

Modell and his wife Olwen, an attorney, are parents of daughter Breslin Ebright, who was born on 2/5/90, and Arthur Edward, who will be a year old on Nov. 23. The Modells live in Kirtland.



## JIM BAILEY

Jim Bailey has worked closely with Art Modell in every phase of the Browns' business since joining the franchise 15 years ago. Jim's trademark low-key style is so unusual in a profession as public as the NFL. But his quiet approach does not diminish his input on every significant decision made by the Browns.

"There is not a Browns' function that does not include Jim's input. He's been involved with everything from hiring a coach, to building our training complex, to our legal and government affairs," Browns' owner Art Modell says of his executive vice president, administration and legal. "If there's an important decision to be made about the future of the Browns, Jim's thoughts on the subject will be given weight," Modell adds.

Bailey functions as the Browns' chief administrator on a day-to-day basis. Most recently, he spearheaded the building of and the move to the team's new (1991) state of the art Training and Administrative Complex in Berea, Ohio. Jim started the project, directed the details of getting it built in a timely manner and made sure the move into the facility last August ('91) did not interfere with the team's preparation for the new season.

A former scholarship winner as a defensive back at Florida State, Bailey was promoted to his current position in early 1984. During his tenure with the Browns, Bailey has done everything from negotiate player, radio and TV contracts, to handle Browns' legal affairs, to coordinate Cleveland Stadium activities. In fact, most of Jim's initial work with the organization involved the development and maintenance of Cleveland Stadium Corporation.

Bailey earned a law degree from the University of Michigan after graduating from FSU. Prior to joining the Browns, Jim worked for the Cleveland-based law firm of Guren, Merritt, Sogg and Cohen, where he was quickly named a partner in 1976. Bailey's duties at the law offices included work with Art Modell in the development of the Cleveland Stadium Corporation lease arrangement with the city of Cleveland. That association was instrumental in bringing Bailey to the Browns.

A native of Wilmington, Ohio, Bailey stood out in three sports (football, basketball and track) at Wilmington High School. Currently, Jim serves on the Board of Directors of the NFL Alumni/Browns' Chapter and the Board of Trustees for the Discover Berea Chamber of Commerce.

Jim and his wife Ann live in Bratenahl and are the parents of two grown daughters: Sarah, a 1989 graduate from St. Louis' Washington University with a degree in psychology and business, is attending an interior design school in Chicago; while daughter Jenny, a 1990 Northwestern University graduate (psychology and finance), is working in Denver for Princeton Review, a college testing company.

## DID YOU KNOW?

The Browns have finished in first place in their division or conference 18 times in the 42-year NFL history of the franchise. That marks the most titles of any franchise, followed by the N.Y. Giants' 17 titles (since 1933) and the Chicago Bears' 16 (since 1933).

Modell, who later completed high school through night classes, joined the Air Force in 1943 (he was 18) and then enrolled in a New York City television school following World War II. Always an innovator, Modell produced one of the first regular daytime television shows in the nation before moving into the advertising business in 1954. Prior to purchasing the Browns in 1961, Modell had become a highly successful New York advertising and TV executive working as a partner for the L.H. Hartman Company.

His success carried over to football and his fourth Browns' team (1964) won the NFL championship with a stunning 27-0 victory over the Colts. The 1965, '68 and '69 teams each played in the league title contest, while Art's recent frustrations came from his team's heart-breaking, but memorable AFC Championship losses in 1986, '87 and '89 to the Denver Broncos. Under Modell, the Browns also earned postseason play in 1967, '71, '72 (when the Dolphins preserved their historic undefeated season with a thrilling come-from-behind 20-14 victory), '80, '82, '85 and '88. In five other years (1963, '70, '76, '79 and '83), the Browns had a chance to make the playoffs on the final day of the regular season, but did not qualify.

Importantly, the Browns, under Modell, have played in 19 playoff games and made the postseason 14 times; only Dallas (19), the Raiders (17), the Rams (16) and the Vikings (15) have fared better in the 31 years of Art's ownership.

Art and his wife Pat (see inclusion) are the parents of John and David Modell. John, 33, is a musician/composer and works as a digital mastering engineer at Oceanview Digital Mastering. He and his wife Tracy, an artist, live in Los Angeles with their son Dylan Scott (3/21/92). David, the Browns' Vice President/Assistant to the President, and his wife Olwen, an attorney, live in Kirtland with daughter Breslin Ebright (2/5/90) and son Arthur Edward (11/23/91).

"According to the individuals who run the clubs, the NFL's most respected owner is Art Modell of the Cleveland Browns. Modell, they say, makes it a point to get along with the representatives of the league's many cliques and factions. He can be tough, but he plays fair. In a sense, they say Modell is the NFL." *Los Angeles Times*, Jan. 25, 1987.

Pat Modell



Pat Modell, the former Patricia Breslin, gained fame as one of the most recognized actresses in television history. At one point, she had appeared in more motion pictures and television shows (400) than any other actress. Her most famous roles included a co-starring spot opposite Jackie Cooper in the long-running series "People's Choice" and her portrayal of Meg Baldwin in "General Hospital". Today, Pat devotes much of her time to a variety of Cleveland area projects. She has co-chaired recent major fundraisers for the Hospice of the Western Reserve and the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland. She also has lent her energy and expertise to the Make-A-Wish Foundation, the Playhouse Square Foundation, the Cerebral Palsy Association, Ursuline College, the Cleveland Musical Arts Foundation and the Cleveland Ballet.

Modell's impact in NFL matters is such that at the annual Owners' Spring meeting in 1990, Commissioner Paul Tagliabue called a surprised Modell to the front of the room and presented the Browns' owner with an elaborate plaque signed by fellow owners. In a letter written by Tagliabue that was mounted on the plaque, which also included a *New York Times* article on the NFL's current television agreement, the Commissioner wrote:

*"The League has always had its share of special people. They have been the founders, owners, officials and coaches who have stayed the course over long periods of years, and who have made special contributions to the welfare of the League and its members...you are one of these special people."*

Modell's impact is also seen on the local level. His dedication to the world renowned Cleveland Clinic is emphasized with his election to President of the Cleveland Clinic Foundation (April, '91).

Those who know Modell's history realize his ability to get things done in a decisive manner, but with compassion. When he was 15 years old, Modell dropped out of high school and began work as an electrician's helper in a Brooklyn shipyard. He was cleaning out the hulls of ships to help his financially strapped family after the death of his father.

Earlier this year (4/24/92), the NFL Alumni Association presented Art Modell the "Order of the Leather Helmet" at its annual convention. The award was given for "Art's deep and lasting contribution to pro football." Modell joined elite company when he received the "helmet" recognition. Art Rooney, George Halas, Pete Rozelle, Don Shula and Vince Lombardi are a few of the people who have earned the same recognition. Art was humbled to be included with this prestigious group: "I fell in love with pro football when I was 10 years of age," Modell said at the installation. "My first hero was a player with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1935 who played without a helmet - Roy 'Father' Lumpkin from Georgia Tech...I look back now and marvel at the vision of George Halas, Dan Reeves, Art Rooney and the Mara family. And I have a deep, deep regard and affection for the older players. Players who made this game what it is today...Players who played for the love of the sport. I'm proud to be part of this game today."

Modell continues with the same type of energy and daring that inspired him to buy the Browns at the age of 35 for what was then (March, 1961) an unheard of sum of \$4 million. His 32 years of service as owner of one of the NFL's most successful franchises has been highlighted by dedication, loyalty, accomplishment and a human touch, often enhanced by his sense of humor, that is so often missing in today's multi-million dollar professional sports' industry.

Some of Art Modell's career highlights are:

- ...Only elected NFL President in league history, serving in that capacity in 1967, '68 and '69.
- ...Chairman of the NFL's Television Committee for 30 years. During his tenure, over eight billion, four hundred million dollars in revenues were negotiated on behalf of the NFL.
- ...Chairman of the Owners' Labor Committee, which successfully negotiated the NFL's first collective bargaining agreement with the players in 1968.
- ...Served on the NFL-AFL Merger Committee, breaking the impasse for realignment of the two leagues by moving the Browns into the American Football Conference.
- ...Chairman of NFL Films.
- ...Was an important participant in the negotiations with ABC to start Monday Night Football and then volunteered to host the first game in Cleveland in 1970.
- ...Volunteered the Browns to play in the first "second" Thanksgiving Day game at Dallas.
- ...Conceived and staged the first doubleheader in NFL history, which consisted of the Browns and three other teams playing back-to-back preseason games at Cleveland Stadium. From 1962 through 1971, the Browns hosted the annual doubleheader each August that drew over 800,000 fans in those 10 years.
- ...In its annual listing of the "Top 100 Most Influential People" in sports, the *Sporting News* listed Modell 16th this year; he's the only NFL owner on the list.

Al Groh, former defensive coordinator of the New York Giants, begins his first year as linebackers' coach on Browns' Head Coach Bill Belichick's staff. Last year, the Giants' ranked seventh in total defense in the NFL. Groh was the linebackers' coach at the Giants and replaced Belichick as defensive coordinator after Bill accepted the head coaching assignment in Cleveland on Feb. 5, 1991. Groh and Belichick worked together for two years, including coaching the 1990 Super Bowl XXV champion Giants' team.

"Bill Belichick is one of the two or three best football men I've ever been around," said Groh. "He's got a clear picture of what he wants to get done, a definite plan and exceptional focus. It's great to be part of what Bill's doing and to add to the great tradition of Browns' football."

"There are a number of different areas he can help us with," Belichick said. "I think everybody in the organization felt like we could use a little more experience on our defensive coaching staff. Al has a lot of experience in a good system and he was part of a championship team."

Prior to the Giants, Groh joined the Atlanta Falcons in 1987 (as a special teams' and tight ends' coach) and coached with then-Falcons' coach, Steve Crosby, who now coaches the Browns' running backs. In 1988, he was named offensive coordinator at South Carolina University under the late ex-Giant great Joe Morrison. Groh was head coach at Wake Forest for six years (1981-1986), and was the second winningest coach in Deacon history. He coached at various defensive assistant positions at Texas Tech (1980) and Air Force (1978-79). At North Carolina (1973-77), Groh helped recruit and coach Giants' 10-time Pro Bowler LB Lawrence Taylor. From 1970 to 1972, he held the title of defensive assistant at Virginia. Groh moved to the collegiate ranks as an assistant at West Point in 1968 after his first coaching stint in Charlottesville, Va., at Albemarle H.S. (1966-67). Groh won four letters as a defensive end at the University of Virginia. He was a scholastic standout at Chaminade (Mineola, N.Y.) H.S.

Al and his wife, Anne, have three children: Michael (20), who is a quarterback at Virginia, Ashley Anne (18), who attends Bowling Green, and Matthew (12). The Grohs live in Westlake, O.

## HAL HUNTER

**Offensive Line**

**Born: June 3, 1934**

**Canonsburg, Pa.**

Hal Hunter is an offensive line coach with 29 years of experience. Last year, he returned to coaching that position after a one-year stint (1990) as a special assistant to the head coach. Hal signed on as the offensive line coach in 1989, and only seven teams were sacked less than the Browns (34 times) that season. He spent three years at the Pittsburgh Steelers (1985-88), under then-Head Coach Chuck Noll, who was "one of the finest teaching coaches I've ever seen."

"I wanted Hal Hunter to stay on as part of the Browns' coaching staff once I began to hire my staff last year. I knew his offensive lines were well-prepared, well-schooled and played hard," said Browns' Head Coach Bill Belichick. "I really believe that Hal is the best man for this job."

"I enjoy coaching the offensive line. I feel right at home," said Hunter. "I also enjoy working with Bill (Belichick)—he's a lot like Chuck Noll in that he's involved in all phases of the game and thoroughly understands both sides of the ball."

Hired by the Steelers in 1985, Hunter coached guards and centers. He was part of an offensive line coaching duo with Ron Blackledge, who coached tackles and tight ends. In 1985 and '86, the Steelers were second in the NFL in fewest sacks allowed, and in 1987 they were fifth. On the ground, the Steelers ranked 7th, 5th and 6th in the NFL (1986-88, respectively) in rushing yards.

Hunter, 58, entered the professional ranks in 1981 as offensive coordinator under Frank Kush for the Hamilton Tiger Cats of the Canadian Football League. Kush took Hunter with him as offensive line coach when he went to the Baltimore Colts in 1982 (where Hal worked with Richard Mann). Hunter was named interim head coach for the Indianapolis Colts for the final game of the 1984 season.

In 1958, Hunter began his college career at Richmond as defensive line coach. He switched to the offensive line for a two-year stint at West Virginia (1962-63), another two years at Maryland (1964-65), followed by five years at Duke (1966-70). Hunter became offensive coordinator at Kentucky (1971-72) and accepted an offensive line assignment at Indiana (1973-76). In 1977, he was named head coach at California State University of Pa., and remained there until joining Kush in the CFL.

Hunter graduated from Pittsburgh with a bachelor's degree in secondary education and received his master's in science in 1962 from West Virginia. He was a starting Panther at linebacker and guard from 1953-55. He was captain of Pitt's 1956 Sugar Bowl Squad, later playing guard for the Pittsburgh Steelers that same year. From 1952-54, he was Pitt's heavyweight wrestler and placed fourth in the 1956 AAU national wrestling championships. Hunter graduated from Canonsburg (Pa.) H.S., with 11 varsity letters in football, wrestling and track.

Richard Mann's eight years as a Browns' receivers coach brings continuity to the offense. His forte is developing young receivers into disciplined, solid players. This year, the youth movement at the receivers' position will be a dominant factor as Pro Bowler Webster Slaughter (27) and second-year player Michael Jackson (23), two Browns' veterans, return to a receiving corps averaging 24 years of age.

"This is a very important second year for us under Bill Belichick," said Mann. "I'm excited about working with all these young guys coming in, but now that the introductions are over, we need to get down to work."

"I was always impressed with the Browns' receivers whenever I coached against Cleveland," said Head Coach Bill Belichick. "They played as well as any group of wideouts we faced. They ran disciplined routes and were so good at getting off the line of scrimmage."

Slaughter led the team for the third straight year with 64 catches for 906 yards (12th in the AFC) and three touchdowns. He recorded his 15th career 100-yard game in 1991 (a team record). With only 27 catches in '92, he will surpass Gary Collins' career reception total (331), second on the Browns' all-time receiving list. Jackson led the club in his rookie year with a 15.8 yard average and grabbed two touchdowns.

Originally hired in 1985 by former Browns' Head Coach Marty Schottenheimer, Mann, 45, describes his coaching mode as "demanding". He had begun developing receivers on the college and high school level a decade before joining the NFL in 1982. Among the college players he helped advance are Miami standout WR-Mark Clayton at the University of Louisville. After that, Mann moved on to the pros with the Baltimore/Indianapolis Colts and maximized the Colts' receiving talent.

With the Colts, Mann worked under then-head coach Frank Kush, whom he played under, and later coached for, at Arizona State. At ASU, Mann was a three-year starter (first year at flanker) and caught 28 passes for 340 yards his final two seasons at tight end. After earning a B.S. degree in elementary education, Mann returned to his hometown high school (Aliquippa, Pa.) as a teacher and coach from 1970-73.

At ASU, Mann spent six years developing future NFLers like John Jefferson, Bruce Hardy and Jerry Bell. He then moved on to Louisville for two years, before joining Baltimore in 1982. He spent three seasons on that staff before coming to Cleveland in 1985.

Richard and his wife, Karen, have four children: Deven (14), Richard (12), Mario (10) and Brittany (4), and reside in Strongsville.

John Mitchell, formerly defensive coordinator/outside linebackers' coach at Louisiana State University, brought 15 years of college coaching experience to the club. He shares defensive line duties this year with Jim Bates, who switched from inside linebackers to the line. Mitchell recruited Browns' former tight end Ozzie Newsome out of Muscle Shoals (Ala.) H.S., and coached him at Alabama under Paul "Bear" Bryant.

"John is an outstanding coach, who gets results from that defensive unit. He has experience coaching linebackers as well as defensive linemen," Head Coach Bill Belichick said. "He does an excellent job of incorporating and developing rookies with the veterans on the line."

"My first year as an NFL coach was exciting," said Mitchell. "In fact, working with players like Michael Dean Perry, Rob Burnett, Anthony Pleasant, James Jones and all the rest of the defensive line was a learning experience for everyone—including John Mitchell. I expect more out of myself this year and more out of the players. We have the nucleus for a much-improved defensive front."

After coaching outside linebackers at LSU (1987-89) for three seasons, Mitchell was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1990, but retained the responsibilities for outside linebackers. He was instrumental in shaping the careers of All-SEC performers Eric Hill and Ron Sancho in 1987 and 1988. Mitchell served on the staffs of legendary coaches like Alabama's Bryant (1973-76) and former Arkansas' mentor Lou Holtz (1977-82), coaching the defensive lines for both. In 1983, Mitchell accepted a linebackers' coaching position in the United States Football League for the Birmingham Stallions (1983-85). He coached defensive ends at Temple in 1986.

Mitchell, 42, is a 1972 graduate of Alabama, where he was consensus All-America defensive end (6'-3", 230 lbs.) his senior season. He played for the Crimson Tide under Bryant from 1971-72. Mitchell played two years at Eastern Arizona Junior College (1969-70), where he was a two-time JUCO All-America. He attended Williamson (Mobile, Ala.) H.S.

As special teams' coach, Scott O'Brien has more contact with more members of the team than any other staff member next to Head Coach Bill Belichick. O'Brien's last assignment before coming to the Browns was special teams' coach at Pittsburgh (1987-90), where he held additional duties assisting the Panthers' defensive line coach.

"Scott's knowledge of coaching the individual specialists really impressed me," Belichick said. "Whatever the phase of special teams—from snappers to holders to kickers—he's very knowledgeable. In fact, as far as I'm concerned, Scott knows as much as any special teams' coach I've met."

"I like to call the special teams the 'no second chance team'," said O'Brien. "Unlike offense or defense, we only get one play to perform. Our sole purpose is to control vertical field position, starting the offense and the defense in the best position possible after every exchange. Special teams have the opportunity to score and make big plays. They also set and control the tempo of the game."

Prior to his four years at Pittsburgh, O'Brien coached linebackers and special teams at Wisconsin-Superior (1980-82), Nevada-Las Vegas (1983-85), and Rice (1986). At Pitt, he helped develop punter Brian Greenfield, who averaged 41.7 yards per punt in 1989, and ranked 17th in the country. The following year, Greenfield was second in the country with 45.6 yards per punt, leading the country with a net punting average of 42.7.

O'Brien, 34, was a defensive lineman at Wisconsin-Superior, who also ran track and played hockey. Scott was signed by the Green Bay Packers (1979) and the Toronto Argonauts (1980). He earned his bachelor's degree in 1979 and a master's degree in education from Nevada-Las Vegas in 1984. O'Brien was graduated from Superior Senior H.S. in Superior, Wis., in 1975.

Scott is married to the former Shawn Kinney of Superior, Wis., and the O'Briens reside in Strongsville, O.

## NICK SABAN

Nick Saban was the first coach hired by Head Coach Bill Belichick when he began assembling his staff in 1991. Saban, 41, a former assistant with the Houston Oilers, most recently held the position of head coach at the University of Toledo in 1990.

"Nick brought us a nice blend of head coaching and NFL experience. This, plus his tremendous work ethic, makes him a valuable addition to the Browns," Belichick said. "I'm pleased we attracted him to our staff. He did an excellent job at Toledo and, three years ago, he was considered one of the bright, young assistants in the NFL."

"I'm looking forward to the challenge ahead in 1992 for our defense," said Saban. "We must continue to improve, maintain our enthusiasm, be more physical, and make more big plays that change the field position. I feel certain our players and coaches will be well prepared for the challenge of restoring the Browns' winning tradition."

Saban was appointed head coach at the University of Toledo on December 22, 1989. In 1990, Saban's lone season as a head coach, the Rockets finished 9-2, including 7-1 in the Mid-American Conference. They were co-champions with Central Michigan, the only team to hand them a conference loss (13-12). Saban's Rockets finished five points shy of an undefeated season. Toledo's defense was ranked 12th in the nation, allowing just 284.8 yards per game; the Rockets gave up 16.2 points per game, 16th stingiest in the nation.

Before accepting the Toledo job, Saban tutored the Houston Oilers' secondary in 1988 and '89. In 1989, Houston finished (tied for) fourth in the AFC with 21 interceptions. In 1988, despite the holdouts of both starting cornerbacks (Patrick Allen and Steve Brown), the Oilers tied for second in the conference with 22 thefts.

Not unlike the Browns' Belichick, Saban has a wealth of coaching experience, despite his relatively young age. Saban spent 15 years in successful college programs before joining the Oilers. From 1983-87, he was on George Perles' Michigan State staff. He joined the Spartans as secondary coach in 1983, and was given additional responsibilities as defensive coordinator in 1984 at the age of 33. In three of four years as coordinator, the Spartans earned bowl invitations, including the 1988 Rose Bowl, as the 9-2-1 Spartans defeated Southern Cal, 20-17, and led the nation in run defense (69.8 yards per game) and finished second in total defense (241 yards per game). Current Browns' safety Harlon Barnett was the starting right cornerback on that Michigan State squad as a sophomore.

Saban coached with Belichick's father, Steve, at the Naval Academy in 1982, tutoring the Midshipmen's defensive backs. From 1980-81, he was on Earle Bruce's Ohio State staff as secondary coach. Nick coached defensive backs at West Virginia from 1978-79 after tutoring defensive ends at Syracuse in 1977. He began his coaching career at Kent as a graduate assistant from 1973-74, before taking over the Golden Flashes' linebackers in 1975 and 1976. In each of his collegiate posts, Nick was heavily involved with recruiting, especially in the Ohio area.

Saban played defensive back at Kent and helped lead the team to the 1972 Tangerine Bowl. He also played baseball for the Golden Flashes. Nick earned a bachelor's degree in secondary education and master's degree (MED) in athletics, both from Kent. Saban is a graduate of Monongah (W. Va.) H.S.

Nick and his wife, Terry, have two children: Nicolas, 5, and Kristen, 2. The Sabans reside in Medina, O.

"Evaluating college personnel, in addition to some of my other coaching duties—like breaking down opponent tape and handling the offensive scout team—will be invaluable experience," says Savage. "I am really looking forward to expanding my background both in the personnel area and the technical parts of the game."

The 27-year-old Savage got his start in the coaching ranks at the age of 21, when he served as a graduate assistant at Alabama in 1987. From 1988-89, he coordinated the projects of other Alabama graduate assistants, plus coached the tight ends. In 1989, Alabama TE Lamonde Russell earned all-SEC honors, and in 1988, the Crimson Tide's Howard Cross (N.Y. Giants) was picked as the SEC's Most Outstanding Blocker. At UCLA (1990), Savage analyzed opponent game video, helped with administrative duties for the Bruins' offense and coached tight ends Corwin Anthony (N.Y. Jets) and Randy Austin (New England).

Savage played football and baseball at the University of the South (Sewanee, TN) and earned a B.A. in English. As a senior, he was selected as the school's Fellowship of Christian Athlete's Male Athlete of the year. He also received a master's in physical education from Alabama. Jerry Simmons embraces a "no excuses" motto in the weight room and maintains that his biggest responsibility is to motivate players to become their physical best. This year, Jerry introduced martial arts to the players in an attempt to fortify some of their on-the-field techniques and increase flexibility.

Said Belichick: "Jerry understands what we're trying to do here is to improve the players and get them to be the best football players they can be, whatever their position."

"All the hard work in the weight room is a direct reflection of the philosophy of Bill Belichick," said Simmons. "We try to strengthen the entire body, and we try to instill the work ethic of the head coach."

Simmons, formerly the strength coach at the New England Patriots for three years (1988-90), was a strength training site director at the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles. In 1978, he accepted a position as assistant strength coach and graduate assistant working with linebackers at Fort Hays (Kan.) State University.

Although Simmons left coaching in 1979, he returned as an assistant strength coach at Clemson (1980). He moved to Rice University (1981-82) as the strength and conditioning coach and designed the school's first strength facility. From 1983-87, he held the position at the University of Southern California.

Simmons was graduated from Fort Hays State (1977) with a degree in physical education, where he played linebacker for two years. He acquired his master's (1978) in secondary school and administration and physical education at his alma mater. Simmons began his collegiate playing career at Garden City, (Kan.) Junior College. Jerry attended Elkhart (Kan.) H.S. and earned all-state football honors as a senior.

Kevin Spencer, formerly the head coach of Wesleyan University (Bill Belichick's alma mater), joined the Browns near the end of last season. In addition to his offensive assistant duties, Spencer works with strength coach Jerry Simmons and special teams' coach Scott O'Brien.

"Kevin helps us in a number of areas. He's a real student of the game, enthusiastic and a hard worker. I've known him a long time, and the other coaches and players were impressed with him when he helped us at training camp," Belichick said.

"This was an opportunity I couldn't pass up. I got a taste of football at the professional level when I coached in the Browns' training camp last year. It's quite a challenge," Spencer said.

Spencer was named the Wesleyan head coach in 1987 and in his five years, he compiled a 14-26 record, including a 6-2 mark in 1990, the school's best record in 12 seasons. Spencer was an assistant coach at Ithaca College (1981-86), where he was head freshman coach for five years before switching to running backs and quarterbacks for the varsity (1986). He was also the head lacrosse coach at Ithaca for three years. Prior to his graduate assistant duties at Cornell University (1979-80), Spencer coached at Detroit Country Day School in Birmingham, Mich. He later taught at the Gilman School in Baltimore, where he was named head coach (1980-81). He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at State University of N.Y. (1975-76) in football, wrestling and lacrosse.

Kevin, 38, is a 1975 graduate of Springfield (Mass.) College, where he played football and lacrosse. He earned a master's from SUNY-Cortland in 1976. While at Wesleyan, Spencer was an associate professor of physical education. He is a 1971 graduate of Monroe-Woodbury Central H.S. in Central Valley, N.Y. Gary Tranquill was one of the first offensive coaches hired by Head Coach Bill Belichick (Offensive Assistant Ernie Adams was the other) when he began assembling his staff. Said Belichick: "I've obviously known Gary a long time —ever since he played for my godfather (Bill Edwards) at Wittenberg and through my family's association at Navy. I think Gary has a great football mind, tremendous teaching ability and a knack for developing young players. He's versatile because he's coached both sides of the ball, plus he's been a head coach at a major level."

Tranquill, 51, was most recently the quarterbacks' coach at the University of Virginia. During his tenure with Virginia, his two starting quarterbacks were Scott Secules (Dolphins) and Shawn Moore. Tranquill's passers threw for over 2,000 yards four straight seasons. His four years (1987-90) with the Cavaliers were nothing short of prolific. As play caller for high-powered Virginia, Gary's offense led the Cavaliers to the nation's number one ranking for three consecutive weeks in 1990, and set an ACC mark by scoring over 50 points in four games. Tranquill is credited with the development of quarterback Shawn Moore, who was a first-team All America selection and finished fourth in the Heisman Trophy balloting in 1990.

"I'm looking forward to this coming season," says Tranquill. "In a lot of ways it should be a more efficient operation because, as coaches and players, we have had a season together. That means a great deal in terms of knowing and understanding each other and our system a whole lot better."

Tranquill spent five seasons (1982-86) as head coach at the Naval Academy, where he compiled a 20-34-1 record. Gary succeeded George Welsh, who left to take over the Virginia head coaching job. One member of Tranquill's staff was Belichick's father, Steve. Tranquill spent four seasons, from 1973-76, as the Midshipmen's quarterbacks and receivers' coach under Welsh.

**QB COACH GARY TRANQUILL ON KOSAR:** "We try to play to his strengths. I like to do a lot of things. I'm fairly broad minded offensively. A good analogy would be: You don't take Roger Clemens and try to make a knuckleballer out of him. We'll do what he does best."

Tranquill began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach in 1963 at Wittenberg, his alma mater, and then became a full-time assistant from 1965-69. In 1970, he accepted a post at Ball State, then took over as an assistant at Bowling Green (1971-72). Gary was appointed quarterbacks' and receivers' coach at Navy in 1973. He coached under Woody Hayes at Ohio State from 1977-78, then accepted an assistants' job at West Virginia under Don Nehlen (1979-81). Tranquill served one season as defensive coordinator and two years as offensive coordinator. He helped groom quarterback Oliver Luck before returning to Navy in 1982 as head coach.

A 1962 graduate of Wittenberg with a degree in physical education, Gary obtained his master's in secondary school administration. He won four letters in both football and baseball, played on two Ohio Conference baseball championship teams and two NCAA regional winners. In 1960, his junior year, Tranquill earned the Ohio Conference's top football player award, and he was inducted into the Wittenberg Athletic Hall of Fame in 1986. He was graduated from Avella (Pa.) H.S.

Gary and his wife, Shirley, have two children, Kari (27), who lives in Baltimore and presented her parents with their first grandson, Wesley Barnes (six mos.); and Christopher (24), a Naval Academy graduate stationed in Norfolk, Va.

Head Trainer Bill Tessendorf enters his 20th season with the Browns in 1992. Over the years, Bill and his staff have gained a reputation as one of the top training staffs in the league. Any player who has ever worn a brown jersey can attest to this.

In fact, in 1989, Bill and his staff were honored as the "NFL Athletic Training Staff of the Year" by the Professional Football Athletic Trainers' Society. With a tireless work ethic and a compassion for all, Bill personifies the type of person it takes to be successful in his ever-expanding field. It is no coincidence that the Browns advanced to the playoffs five of the past seven seasons, as Bill and his staff have helped Browns' players through a myriad of injuries, perhaps none as storied as the 1988 season, when Cleveland lost four quarterbacks to injuries. Last season, the Browns suffered through a torturous string of injuries to defensive backs.

"Bill Tessendorf is a dedicated worker who is a very, very valuable member of our organization," says owner Art Modell of the man who is entering his ninth season as head trainer. The Ohio Athletic Trainers' Association felt that way as well, bestowing upon Bill the Clinical/Professional Trainer of the Year Award in May of 1989.

Tessendorf first joined the Browns as an assistant trainer in 1973 while working towards his master's degree in exercise physiology at Kent State. Bill did his undergraduate work at Northern Illinois University, graduating with a B.S. in 1971. He worked as a graduate assistant under Kent State coach Don James in 1971, then took a job as an elementary school teacher in the DeKalb (Ill.) Public School District in 1972.

He returned to Kent State a year later and began assisting Browns' trainer emeritus, Leo Murphy, while working towards his master's, which he received in 1976. "Bill's a fine young man and the team is lucky to have someone with his talents," Murphy said.

"I feel very fortunate to have had the opportunity to work with Leo Murphy, Dr. (Vic) Ippolito, Dr. (John) Bergfeld and the other doctors on our staff. They have enhanced my professional career," Tessendorf added. Bill has served for the past five years as treasurer of the Professional Football Athletic Trainers' Society. Bill is also President of the Great Lakes Athletic Trainers' Association.

Bill and his wife, Nan Jean, reside in Medina and are the parents of Amy Ann, who will turn nine in February.

Chuck Cusick enters his third season as facilities' manager, a role that has him oversee the daily operations of the Browns' state-of-the-art training facility. Chuck coordinated the closing of the Browns' previous three office locations and the move into the new training facility in Berea in 1991. He oversees overall upkeep and smooth operation of the facility, which has already been cited as one of the NFL's finest. The Browns will hold summer training camp at the facility in 1992, after training the last 10 years at Lakeland Community College.

In 1974, Cusick was named equipment manager, replacing Morrie Kono, a pioneer in the football equipment business.

As equipment manager, Cusick coordinated the purchasing and maintaining of equipment for the Browns, as well as the operations involved in transporting these from Baldwin Wallace to training camp at Lakeland Community College, Cleveland Stadium, road sites and on to the offseason training headquarters at Big Creek Racquet Club. Charley and his staff coordinated the transport of the club's gear to London, England in 1989 after a trip to Canada in 1988. They also equipped the AFC Pro Bowl squad following the 1986, 1987 and 1989 seasons.

Cusick lives in Westlake with his wife, Patty.

Leo Murphy will spend his 43rd year with the Browns in the capacity of trainer emeritus, having earned well-deserved "semi-retirement" three years ago. Starting in 1950, when the Browns joined the NFL, Leo's quick wit has made the pressures of the locker and training room a pleasant experience for the team.

In 1947, Murphy graduated from Notre Dame, then went on to work with the AAFC's Chicago Rockets and baseball's New York Yankees. Murphy has long been regarded as one of the top trainers in the world, evidenced by induction into the National Athletic Trainers' Association Hall of Fame in 1982.

Leo has two children, Nancy and Martin, and three grandchildren.



## MICHAEL LOMBARDI

**Pro Personnel Director**

Mike Lombardi's first job in football as defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas began a meteoric rise that led him quickly to the NFL.

During his tenure at UNLV (1982-83), Lombardi's expertise on collegiate talent caught the attention of the San Francisco 49ers, who were so impressed that they offered him a scouting position in 1984. He wound up coordinating all scouting reports in addition to scrutinizing collegiate talent in the northeast, southwest and western regions.

His evaluation techniques and general knowledge of the game became widely known, leading to an offer to join the Browns' scouting staff in 1987. Two years later, in May of 1989, he was named Pro Personnel Director before his 30th birthday.

Today, at age 33, Lombardi is now recognized as one of the NFL's youngest and brightest talent evaluators. His observations and guidance were extremely helpful to Bill Belichick when he became head coach of the Browns last season. "We went through the entire Plan B list, and he never had to look at his notes. He impressed me immediately," Belichick said.

In addition to scouting and coordinating the pro personnel department, Mike assists in contract negotiations. He is an advocate of the "black box" device, a sophisticated method the Browns use to test a player's agility and speed in the 40. He estimates more than 2,000 players have been tested in the last five years.

A native of Ocean City, N.J., Lombardi lettered in both football and baseball at Valley Forge Military Academy (Wayne, Pa.). He attended Hofstra University (1978-81), where he played nose tackle for the Flying Dutchmen. Lombardi, an avid baseball and basketball fan, and his wife, Millie, reside in Strongsville with their two children: Michael (3 1/2) and Matthew (1 1/2).

**BILL BELICHICK ON HIS DEPLOYMENT OF PERSONNEL:** "It's vital that you implement a sound system and find the players to make it run effectively. Many great defensive coaches, even today, have made an error by adjusting too quickly to their personnel. Then somebody gets injured or retires and suddenly, you don't have that kind of special player. Your system, which you changed for him, doesn't work anymore."

Dom Anile served the Browns as an area scout for eight years before he was elevated to the post of Director of College Scouting in 1991. It was a ringing endorsement of Anile's abilities, and a move that proved highly effective for the organization.

In his second year as Director of Collegiate Scouting, Dom supervises and directs the Browns' scouting staff in preparation for the draft. Extremely organized and knowledgeable, Dom's system keeps the Browns well-informed on collegiate talent.

Anile was an offensive coordinator at Columbia University when the Browns asked him to assist coaching the offensive line at three consecutive training camps (1980-82). His work led to an offer to join the scouting staff, bringing 24 years of coaching experience with him.

Dom is a 1959 graduate of C.W. Post, where he was a three-year letter winner in both football and baseball. He captained the football team two years and was MVP as a senior. Immediately after attending graduate school at Brooklyn College, Dom began his coaching career and served in a number of capacities, including offensive coordinator at Post (from 1957-67).

In 1968, he was named head coach at Post, becoming one of the most successful college division coaches during the next 12 years. His teams were 84-33-1 (.716) and twice won the Lambert Bowl as the East's top team with a 10-1 mark in 1973 and 8-2 in 1976.

Selected as Eastern Coach of the Year in 1973, he was also picked as New York's Metropolitan Coach of the Year four times. Dom joined the Columbia staff in 1980.

Anile has three children: Dom, Jr. (31), Theresa (28) and Gary (26). He and his wife, Carolyn, reside in Strongsville with her daughter, Jennifer (15). He has one grandchild: Kimberly Rose, born 11/4/90.



## TOM DIMITROFF

A unique football background, a strong work ethic, a firm and no-nonsense approach to his job are the ingredients that have placed Tom Dimitroff among the higher echelon of NFL scouts. He has an outstanding record of grading players, which has paid great dividends for the organization.

Born and raised in nearby Barberton, Dimitroff came to the Browns in 1987 with an extensive background that totaled 32 years of playing and coaching in the U.S. and Canada.

A 1953 graduate of Barberton High School, Tom was an exceptional athlete who went on to star at quarterback for Miami University (Ohio), where he is a member of the school's Hall of Fame.

He played quarterback for the Ottawa Rough Riders of the CFL (1957-58), and the AFL's Boston Patriots (1960). After retiring as a player, he returned to football as an assistant for Wadsworth H.S. (1965-68) and Barberton H.S. (1968-69).

Dimitroff entered the collegiate level as an assistant at Miami (Ohio) from 1969-72, and then at Kansas State in 1973. He moved into the professional ranks in 1974 as offensive coordinator for the Ottawa Rough Riders (through 1977).

Tom was named head coach of the Hamilton Tiger Cats in 1978, and then returned to the collegiate ranks as head coach of the University of Guelph (1979-83), where his five-year record was 21-13-1. Rejoining the Rough Riders in 1984, he served as an assistant coach and offensive coordinator, later moving to the scouting department as director of player personnel (1985-86).

An excellent racquetball player, Dimitroff and his wife, Helen, reside in Strongsville. The Dimitroffs have three children: Randy (30), Sharon (29) and Thomas (26), who scouts for the World League. They have one grandchild: Dillon (2), son of Randy and his wife.



## PAT HILL

Pat Hill adds a wealth of experience and knowledge of collegiate personnel to the extensive scouting staff assembled by the Browns this year.

Hill came to the Browns from the coaching staff of the University of Arizona, where he spent the last two seasons. In 1990, he served as offensive line coach and, in 1991, was promoted to offensive coordinator of the Wildcats.

Pat joined the Arizona staff after serving as offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at Fresno State for six years (1985-90). He helped the Bulldogs win three PAC titles and three California Bowl championships. Fresno State was among the nation's most explosive offensive teams during this period.

*The Sporting News* selected Hill as one of the top assistant coaches in a 1989 nationwide survey. In their 1990 and 1991 polls, TSN ranked him as the fifth and second best assistant, respectively. Prior to his tenure at Fresno State, Pat was offensive coordinator and worked with the offensive line and running backs for the Calgary Stampeders of the CFL (1983-84). He was offensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator for the University of Nevada-Las Vegas (1981-82), where he saw his Rebels average 526 yards and 42 points a game in 1981. One of his recruits was QB Randall Cunningham, who was a major factor in the impressive offensive stats.

Hill began his collegiate coaching career as offensive line coach at Los Angeles Valley Junior College (1974-76) before working with the offensive line and as recruiting coordinator at Utah (1977-80).

Pat was a three-time All-Conference center at California-Riverside (1971-73), earning All-America honors in 1973. He also lettered in rugby, received his B.A. degree in 1973 and was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame in 1989. He lettered in football, baseball and wrestling at Crespi H.S. in Los Angeles.

Hill and his wife, Cathy, and have three sons: Mike (8), Matt (6) and Zak (3).



## RON MARCINIAK

Ron Marciniak joined the Browns last May after spending 10 years as a scout for the Dallas Cowboys. Prior to his tenure with the Cowboys, he was a member of the NFL scouting combine staff for one year. While with the Cowboys, he spent four training camps assisting former defensive coordinator Ernie Stautner with the defensive line.

Marciniak coached 23 years on the collegiate level, including four seasons as head coach at Dayton (1973-76), where the Flyers responded with their best record under a first-year coach (5-5-1). His collegiate coaching career began as an assistant at Arizona (1959-66). He then worked at Southern Illinois (1967-68), Tulsa (1969), Northwestern (1970-72), Purdue (1973), Miami (Fla., 1977-79) and Colorado (1979-81). At Miami, he coached under ex-Brown Lou Saban.

A four-time football letter winner as a guard at Kansas State, Marciniak was team captain as a senior. He also earned All-Big Eight honors, Honorable Mention All-America, was selected to play in the North-South Shrine Game, was named to the All Mid-West Team by the *Omaha Herald* and was chosen to receive his team's Most Inspirational Player Award. He also lettered in baseball and wrestling.

The N.Y. Giants drafted Marciniak in the seventh-round in 1955 and, before his rookie season, traded him to Washington. In 1956, the Redskins traded him to the Toronto Argonauts of the CFL for kicker Sam Baker (who kicked for the Browns in 1960-61). At Toronto, he was moved to the defensive line and named defensive captain. A member of the U.S. Army Reserves, he was called to active duty in 1957 and was a player/coach at Fort Bliss, Texas, before returning to the Argonauts to conclude his playing career after the 1958 season.

A native of Pittsburgh, Ron lettered in football, basketball, baseball and soccer at St. George H.S. He and his wife, Janet, have five children: Michael (36), Michelle (33), Melody (29), Mary Jo (27) and Marie (24)



## TERRY McDONOUGH

Terry McDonough's accomplishments in less than two years as an executive and scout in the new World League were enough to convince the Browns to offer him a position on their personnel staff.

The youngest member of the Browns' scouting team, McDonough, who will be 27 this year, received his introduction to professional football in 1989 while serving his internship in the San Francisco 49ers' scouting department.

Shortly after receiving his B.A. in sports management from Massachussetts, his abilities were remembered by former 49er Director of Scouting, Tony Razzano, who recommended him for the position of player personnel director for the Barcelona Dragons of the WL.

McDonough joined the Dragons in December of 1990 and handled a variety of personnel assignments along with serving as west coast scout for the entire league (in helping each team prepare for the WL drafts). His duties also included a tour of NFL and CFL training camps to grade potential WL players.

His 1991 Barcelona team finished with a 9-3 record, losing the league title to London in the World Bowl. His 1992 team clinched the European title before he joined the Browns last May.

An All-League running back in football, Terry was also an All-League selection in basketball and lettered in baseball at Hingham (Mass.) H.S. before transferring to Bridgton Academy, where his playing career ended when his injured left knee required reconstructive surgery.

Terry is single. His father, Will McDonough, is a nationally known NBC-TV football color analyst and sports columnist for The Boston Globe.



## OZZIE NEWSOME

As a player, whose distinguished 13-year career will eventually place him as almost a "sure lock" for enshrinement in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, Ozzie Newsome brings the same talents, dedication and commitment to his position as Special Assignment Scout as he did on the playing field. In only his second year in personnel, Ozzie has earned the respect of his colleagues by providing the Browns with a comprehensive and accurate analysis of college athletes in the northeastern part of the country, plus detailed studies on certain positions and players. In addition, he's called upon to work with the receiving corps on the field throughout the season.

Newsome is the NFL's all-time leading pass-catching tight end and top receiver in Browns' history with 662 receptions for 7,980 yards. Ozzie ended his career as the fourth-leading receiver in league annals.

He earned three trips to the Pro Bowl (1981, 1984-85) and was a three-time winner of the Cleveland Touchdown Club's Offensive Player of the Year Award (1978, 1981 and 1984). His consecutive game reception streak of 150 is the second longest in NFL history. He was named to the All-NFL Team of the 80's (second team) in addition to numerous All-NFL and All-AFC honors.

Ozzie was a number one Browns' draft choice, along with Clay Matthews in 1978, and the two are among an elite group of Browns to play for three decades. The others are Gene Hickerson (1958-60, 62-73), Dick Schafrath (1959-71) and Don Cockroft (1968-80).

Winner of the 1990 Byron "Whizzer" White Award for his community involvement, Newsome is widely known as a willing volunteer for charitable causes. Ozzie and his wife, Gloria, make their home in Orange Village. The Newsomes celebrated the birth of their first child, Michael Ryan, last June 11.

A Columbus native, Ernie Plank returned to the state of Ohio last June when he joined the Browns' personnel department after serving as a scout for the San Francisco 49ers' since 1978. Among his many recommendations at San Francisco were quarterback Joe Montana and linebacker Bill Romanowski.

Ernie's first job in football was head coach at Grove City H.S., located on the outskirts of Columbus, where he also was head coach of the basketball team (1950-55). He moved into the collegiate ranks as linebackers' and receivers' coach at his alma mater, Miami of Ohio (1956-62).

He coached the linebackers and receivers at Yale (1963-64) before accepting the defensive coordinator's job and linebackers' coach at Indiana (1965-72). He helped take the Hoosiers to the Rose Bowl in 1967, losing 14-3 to USC, which was led by the great O.J. Simpson. Prior to his tenure in the 49ers' scouting department, Ernie was defensive coordinator and linebackers' coach at Northwestern (1972-78).

Plank lettered as an end in football, basketball and baseball at Bexley H.S. in the Columbus area. He was captain of the football and basketball teams in his senior year, and was named first team All-State in football and second team All-State in basketball as a senior.

His college football was interrupted by a stint in the U.S. Navy. He began playing at Ohio State (1943), Great Lakes Academy (1944) and resumed playing for the Buckeyes (1946) before transferring to Miami of Ohio (1947-49), where he earned his degree in education and was captain and All-MAC as a senior. He is a member of the school's Hall of Fame.

Ernie and his wife, Virginia, have a son, James, and a daughter, Vicky, and four grandchildren.

## ELLIS RAINSBERGER

The combination of experience and skill on both the collegiate and professional level as a recruiter, coach and scout made Ellis Rainsberger a logical selection to join an elite group of scouts in the Browns' personnel department.

Rainsberger's background in the pro ranks includes serving as offensive coordinator for the CFL Winnipeg Blue Bombers (1978-83), the USFL Denver Gold (1983-84) and Pittsburgh Maulers (1984-85), two years as a member of the CFL scouting combine (1985-86) and offensive coordinator of the CFL Toronto Argonauts (1986-89). He helped lead the Argonauts to three league titles in four seasons. His 1988 team set a CFL total offense record.

His collegiate career began as an assistant at Drake (1959-62), and included stints as head coach at Washburn (1962-65), defensive coordinator at Kansas (1965-66), head coach at Southern Illinois, offensive/defensive coordinator at Illinois (1967-72), offensive/recruiting coordinator at Wisconsin (1972-74), and head coach at his alma mater, Kansas State (1974-78). After his pro tenure, Rainsberger returned to collegiate competition in 1989 at Toledo to work as offensive line coach. In 1990, he worked for head coach Nick Saban, now the Browns' defensive coordinator.

The 1990 Rockets were MAC champions with a 7-1 mark (9-2 overall). Rainsberger was given the added title of assistant head coach at Toledo last year. At Washburn, he led his team to a 10-1 record and the 1964 league championship, the first for the school since 1942. His 1973 Wisconsin offense was among the top 10 in the nation.

A center, he was a three-year letterman at Kansas State and was an All-Big Eight selection (1956-57) and an Academic All-American (1957). He also lettered twice in wrestling, winning the Missouri Valley title.

Rainsberger and his wife, Shirley, are the parents of six children: Becky (32), Bud (31), Cathy (29), Sandy (27), Chris (24) and Mike (23).



## BILL SHUNKWILER

Bill Shunkwiler came to the Browns' scouting department last year with an impressive list of credentials after scouting for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1990-91), Dallas Cowboys (1987-90), Philadelphia Stars of the USFL (1982-85) and Chicago Fire of the WFL League (1973-75).

In between scouting stints, Bill was offensive coordinator at Hiram College (1978-79) and offensive line coach at Thiel College (1985). Shunkwiler began his football career as an assistant coach at Orrville (O.) H.S. in 1952 and was elevated to head coach in 1955, a position he held along with being the school's athletic director until 1965 when he accepted the head coach's job at Warren Harding (O.) H.S.

He moved to the collegiate ranks in 1969 as offensive line coach at Kent State University. In 1971-72, he was head coach of the Youngstown Hard Hats of the Mid-West Semi-Pro Football League.

Bill was raised in the Willoughby area (east of Cleveland) and lettered in football as a running back, basketball and baseball at Willoughby H.S. He was team captain in football as a senior. He played guard at Ohio Northern University, where he lettered in football and baseball before receiving a B.S. degree in education. He received his master's degree in education from Kent State.

Shunkwiler is past president of the Ohio High School Football Coaches Association and, in 1987, was inducted into the Ohio High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame and the Wayne County Sports Hall of Fame.

Bill and his wife, Edith, make their home in Warren (O.). They have six children and nine grandchildren.



## LIONEL VITAL

In only his third year in the scouting ranks, Lionel Vital has already earned the respect of his peers. Vital (pronounced Vih-TAL) joined the Browns' organization last March after distinguishing himself as a scout for the World Football League, a position he held since October of 1990. He also served as Director of Player Personnel for the Montreal Machine during the WL playing season.

Vital's expertise in the technical aspects of football became noticeable as a player in the CFL and as a scout in the WL, earning him high recommendations from people in top positions in the two leagues.

Vital was originally drafted as a running back/kick returner in the seventh round (7b, 185th overall) of the 1985 draft by the Washington Redskins. He spent the year on injured reserve and was waived in 1986. That year, he signed with the Chicago White Sox to play in the minor leagues as an outfielder. The Buffalo Bills signed him in December of 1987, and the following year he went with the Detroit Lions. From 1989-90, Vital played for the Saskatchewan Rough Riders.

Vital attended Nicholls State, where he majored in criminal justice. As a junior, he rushed for 776 yards on 146 carries, which was a school rushing record. He had 14 catches for 167 yards and 21 kickoff returns for 572 yards to rank among the Division 1-AA leaders in all-purpose yards. Vital had three 100-yard games and scored five touchdowns. He was named the Colonels' MVP. He was a two-time All-District selection in football and received All-State honors in baseball at Loreauville (La.) H.S.

Vital, who is single, makes his home in Loreauville, La.

### **BELICHICK ON HIS PHILOSOPHY OF BEING STRONG UP THE MIDDLE:**

"Offensively or defensively, the most important positions are the ones closest to the middle of the field. Center, quarterback, running back, interior defensive linemen, middle linebackers, safeties. Those people are involved in every play. The further you are from the ball, the easier it is to work away from that guy. ## BROWNS' WIVES ASSOCIATION

The Browns' Wives Association was established in the early 1980s by a group of players' wives, who wanted to lend a hand to various charities in the Cleveland community.

Since that time, the wives have been involved in many projects and benefits like the annual dinner for Bellflower Center benefiting abused children; celebrity fashion shows like the one for Ronald McDonald House, and the fundraiser for the New Joshua Center for substance abuse rehabilitation. This year, the wives plan to sponsor a Monte Carlo night (Sept. 27), to benefit cerebral palsy.

The Wives' Association is chaired by an executive committee of three women. Elections are held in September of each year, and all the wives participate in the voting process. Last year, Zondra (David) Brandon, Karen (Dan) Fike and Lynette (Randy) Hilliard chaired the association.

Their biggest project is the annual canned food drive, which runs six weeks between the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. Working in conjunction with the Cleveland Food Basket and area businesses, the wives kick off "Operation Can-Do" in November, collecting canned goods and non-perishable items prior to a Browns football game at Cleveland Stadium. Players and their wives make personal appearances throughout the city promoting the food drive. Drop offs are located at sponsor businesses for the duration of the six weeks. Last year, the association collected more than \$12,000 in contributions and food items for the hunger center.

**PRO:** A "veteran" leader at age 28, Kosar enters his eighth season...Including his final two years in college, Kosar had a streak of seven straight postseason appearances (including three AFC Championship games), but the last two seasons have seen the Browns end up short of the playoffs...Only three quarterbacks who entered the NFL since 1985 have played in conference championship games: Kosar, Buffalo's Jim Kelly (three times), and Jim Everett (Rams, once)...Raiders' Jay Schroeder was picked in '84...Led the Browns to the playoffs in each of his first five NFL seasons (four division titles), tops in the AFC...Only Kosar and Miami's Dan Marino led their clubs to three straight divisional crowns in their first three years in the NFL (since the 1970 merger)...Kosar started all 16 games last year, and set team marks for the highest completion percentage (62.1%) and the lowest interception rate (1.82), while snapping a 26-year old NFL record of most consecutive passes without an interception, held by Bart Starr...Kosar's streak ended at 308 in week 11, while Starr's mark of 294 was set in 1964-65...Kosar fired 18 TD passes, while throwing an AFC-low nine interceptions last year, and finished as the AFC's second-rated signal-caller with an 87.8 QB rating, behind Jim Kelly's 97.6 mark...Bernie completed 50.0% or more of his passes in 14 of 16 games...Kosar was selected to go to the Pro Bowl after John Elway's injury, but declined...Owns the Browns' all-time highest completion percentage mark (58.5) and the Browns' and the NFL's all-time lowest interception percentage (2.4), which is ahead of Joe Montana's 2.68...Was the youngest starting quarterback in the NFL in each of his first three seasons...Kosar is ranked eighth on the active QB passer rating list with an 81.6 rating...Joined the Browns as the youngest quarterback in team history, with two years of college eligibility remaining...Graduated from Miami in only three years...Is twelve days younger than QB-Vinny Testaverde of Tampa Bay, who succeeded him at Miami, and was the first pick in '87 draft...Browns obtained Kosar in a trade involving Bills: Cleveland sent Buffalo four draft choices—two number ones (1985 and 1986), a third (1985) and a sixth

**QB BERNIE KOSAR ON THE 1992 BROWNS:** "I think the realization we're going to be a better team, and that we have a chance to compete again next year for the playoffs has us excited. The way we work, and the way this coaching staff works and prepares the game plan, I think will mesh together to make this a better team."

1991: Finished as second-ranked AFC QB with an 87.8 QB rating, behind Jim Kelly (97.6)...Was asked to play in Pro Bowl after John Elway was forced out with an injury, but Kosar declined offer...Threw for 18 TDs (fourth in AFC), and AFC-low nine interceptions (min. 300 attempts)...Had career-high 62.1 completion percentage...Threw for 3,478 yards...Started season by snapping NFL mark of most consecutive passes without an interception...Extended streak to 308 before being intercepted by Ben Smith in the second quarter of week 11 game vs. Phil. (11/10)...Old mark was 294, held by Bart Starr (1964-65)...Finished 1991 at Pitt. (12/22) with poorest outing of season, completing 28 (tying season high) of 49 passes for 335 yards, one TD and three INTs...Was most INTs since 9/23/90 vs. San Diego, but his 11th career 300-yard game...Was sacked five times for 20 yards...Completed season-high 28 passes in 40 attempts for 258 yards, two TDs and one INT vs. Hou. (12/15)... (10/20), as Browns bounced back from a 17-3 deficit to beat Chargers in overtime, 30-24...Completed 26 of 42 passes for 297 yards, two TDs and no INTs...Snapped club record held by Milt Plum since 1960, extending his consecutive pass without an interception streak to 233...Rushed twice for eight yards, and was sacked once for three yards...Completed 21 of 29 passes for 266 yards, with no TDs or INTs at Wash. (10/13)...Was sacked four times for 25 yards...Threw for 133 yards on 16 completions in 24 attempts vs. Jets (10/6)...Threw a four-yard TD pass to Leroy Hoard...Rallied Browns to two third quarter TDs to knot score, 14-14, but winning drive was thwarted when ball was stripped on a scramble late in the fourth quarter...Completed 13 of 22 passes for 107 yards, one TD and no INTs at Giants (9/22)...Completed a seven-yard TD pass to Kevin Mack in fourth quarter in 13-10 Giants' win...Led Browns on game-winning 14-play, 60-yard drive with 3:09 remaining, culminating in Matt Stover's 45-yard field goal to upend Cincinnati (9/15), 14-13...Completed 20 of 41 passes for 197 yards, no TDs or INTs...Tied Otto Graham for third place on the Browns' all-time TD passing list by throwing two TDs at N.E. (9/8) to give him 88 for his career...Completed 15 of 22 passes for 187 yards and no interceptions, throwing TD passes of 65 and seven yards (a 35-yard scoring pass to Webster Slaughter was negated due to a penalty)...Completed 22 of 31 passes for 249 yards, with one TD and no INTs vs. Dallas (9/1)...Completed a 62-yard TD pass to Webster Slaughter on the opening play of the second half.

**COACH BILL BELICHICK ON QB BERNIE KOSAR:** "Bernie is strong in the pocket. He could throw with someone hanging on him because he's good at passing the ball in unusual positions."

1990: Most frustrating season during his tenure with the Browns by far, saw Bernie miss three starts, two due to injury and Browns compile franchise-worst 3-13 record...Completed 230 of 423 passes for 2,562 yards, 10 TDs and career high 15 INTs in 13 starts for a career-low 65.7 QB rating (13th in AFC)...Was sacked 37 times, two shy of career high...Rushed 10 times for 13 yards...Suffered a chip fracture and a sprained ligament in right thumb vs. Atl. (12/16) sometime in second quarter, but played entire game...Missed final two games of season (on two-man inactive list at Pitt. (12/23) and at Cinc. (12/30)...Completed 22 of 37 passes for 217 yards, two sacks, no TDs and one INT, as Browns snapped eight-game losing streak vs. Atl. (12/16)...Completed 13 of 26 passes for 166 yards, one TD and two INTs at Hou. (12/9)...Was sacked four times for 28 yards...Lost a fumble on a snap in second quarter...Completed 23 of 39 passes for 281 yards, two TDs, no INTs and was sacked four times vs. Rams (12/2)...Completed 17 of 37 passes for 191 yards, no TDs and two INTs on his 27th birthday vs. Mia. (11/25) in his 75th career game: Compare Kosar's stats to other Browns' QBs through 75 games, and he had more completions (1,306), attempts (2,261) and yards (15,786) than any QB in club history...Completed season-high 25 passes on 35 attempts for 279 yards, two TDs and two INTs vs. Hou. (11/18)...Was sacked three times for 16 yards...Did not play vs. Buff. (11/4), as Mike Pagel started in 42-0 loss...Was first missed start in 24 regular season games, and first since rookie year not due to injury...Completed nine of 18 passes for 106 yards, no TDs and one INT at S.F.

(10/28)...Was sacked three times...Was relieved by Mike Pagel late in the third quarter...Completed 17 of 33 passes for 190 yards, no TDs, two INTs and four QB sacks for 33 yards lost vs. Cinc. (10/22)...Threw 80th career TD pass in 70th career game at N.O. (10/14), a 13-yarder to Webster Slaughter...Completed 18 of 36 passes for 168 yards and no INTs...Was sacked twice for 11 yards...Had 10th career 300-yard game at Den. (10/9) by completing 24 of 38 passes and three TDs...Was not sacked for first time all season, as Browns ended an 18-year drought to beat Broncos in Denver, 30-29...Directed drives of 80 and 61 yards for victory in final 3:21...Completed nine of 17 passes for 61 yards, no TDs or INTs at K.C. (9/30)...Was relieved by Mike Pagel late in the third quarter with the Browns trailing 34-0...Had only fourth career three-interception day vs. San Diego (9/23)...Broke string of 152 straight regular season passes without throwing an interception...Was 17 of 36 for 232 yards, no TDs, three INTs and was sacked three times... Completed 24 of 41 passes for 233 yards, one TD and no INTs at Jets (9/16)... Was sacked three times for 18 yards lost...TD pass was first of season (four-yarder to WR-Reggie Langhorne)...Completed 13 of 30 passes for 120 yards, no TDs or INTs vs. Pitt. (9/9), and was sacked a career-high seven times (42 yards).

**1989:** Finished as fourth-rated QB in AFC with 80.3 QB rating...Completed 303 of 513 passes (59.1 completion pct.), 18 TDs and 14 INTs...Only four NFL quarterbacks threw more passes...Threw TD passes of 97, 80, 77, 68 and 62 yards among his 18 scoring tosses...Browns were 7-1 when Kosar did not throw an interception and 2-5-1 when he threw at least one...Completed 39 of 73 passes (53.4%) for 461 yards, five TDs and three INTs in playoffs...Perhaps best game of career came in 34-30 win over Buffalo in the divisional playoffs, as he completed 20 of 29 passes for 251 yards, three TDs and no INTs (130.1 QB rating)...Threw four TDs and no INTs in last two regular season games, leading Browns to division crown with wins over Houston (12/23) and Minnesota (12/17)...Broke a string of 20 quarters and 174 attempts without a TD pass vs. Vikings...Threw for season-high 353 yards, with no TDs and two INTs at Indy (12/10)...Had career-high 81.1% completion percentage (18 of 22, second-best in team history) at Tampa Bay (11/5), and threw three first half TDs...Had a fourth TD pass to Brian Brennan (50 yards) nullified due to a penalty...Was his ninth career three TD game...Set club record by completing 16 straight passes (eight in first half at Tampa Bay, eight in second half previous week vs. Houston)...In those halves, Kosar was 20 of 21 for 338 yards and five TDs...Completed 14 of 19 passes for 262 yards vs. Oilers (10/29), two TDs, no INTs...Also ran for a five-yard TD (longest TD run of career)...In second half, was 8-8 for 207 yards and two TDs, after completing six of 11 for 55 yards, two INTs in first half...Both TDs were to Webster Slaughter, 80 and 77 yards...Had TD passes of 97, 80 and 77 yards in weeks seven and eight...Completed 22 of 29 passes for 281 yards, two TDs, no INTs vs. Bears (10/23)...Entered record books when he hit Webster Slaughter on a team-record 97-yard TD bomb in fourth quarter...Was the 13th-longest in NFL history, and the longest ever on Monday Night Football...Suffered worst day of career vs. Pittsburgh (10/15) by completing just 15 of 41 passes for no TDs and four INTs...Was lowest completion pct. and most INTs thrown in career...Had a streak of 11 straight incompletions...Had string of 181 straight passes without throwing an interception broken vs. Denver (10/1), a personal high...Completed 25 of 38 passes for 216 yards, one TD and one INT in 16-13 win over Broncos...Completed five of six in final 54-yard drive that led to Matt Bahr's game-winning 48-yard field goal...Had career-long 23-yard rush, and had two first downs rushing...In all, credited with four carries for 33 yards...Threw two TDs, while completing 15 of 23 for 203 yards at Cincinnati (9/25), while qualifying for the NFL's all-time lowest interception percentage leader (2.4, min. 1,500 attempts)...Threw three TDs vs. Jets (9/17) for sixth time in his career (regular season), while completing 15 of 30 passes for 196 yards...Had five passes batted at the line of scrimmage...Offered no complaints despite being bothered by a series of nagging and painful right arm injuries in the second half of season.

**1988:** Fourth-leading passer in AFC: 259 attempts, 156 completions, 60.2% — tops in AFC, second in NFL — 1,890 yards, 10 TDs, 7 INTs, 84.3 QB rating...Was 6-3 as a starter...Missed seven regular-season starts and Wild Card game with two different injuries...Sidelined for Houston finale (12/18) and Houston Wild Card

loss (12/24) with sprained knee ligaments suffered in third quarter at Miami (12/12, week 15) after a hit by LB-John Offerdahl...Also absent weeks 2-7 after straining right elbow ligaments in first series of second quarter in opener at K.C. (9/4) when hit by blitzing K.C. S-Lloyd Burruss...Placed on injured reserve on 9/10, prior to Jets' game...Completed three of eight passes for 39 yards before injury at K.C., breaking a string of 17 straight games with at least one TD pass...Made triumphant return at Phoenix (10/23) by completing 25 of 43 passes for 314 yards, three TDs and three INTs...Moved into fourth place among Browns' all-time passers at Washington (11/27, two days after turning 25), surpassing Bill Nelsen...More importantly, led Browns on scoring drives of 50, 76 and 80 yards in 17-13 win by completing 23 of 36 passes for 219 yards under heavy pressure (six sacks, tying a career-high)...Recorded second 300-yard, three-TD passing day of season vs. Dallas (12/4), as he completed 19 of 27 passes for 308 yards, three TDs and no INTs...Completed 21 of 30 passes for 202 yards, one TD, no INTs at Miami (12/12) in last action of season before leaving game with knee injury...Also rushed for only TD of year, a two-yarder in the third period.

**1987:** Was voted second alternate to the Pro Bowl, and was named to the squad by AFC coach (and then-Browns' head coach) Marty Schottenheimer...Also named the NFL's MVP in balloting for the Gillette-NFL "People's Choice" Award...Finished ahead of John Elway and Joe Montana...His amazing second-half rally in the AFC Championship game (16 of 22 for 256 yards, three TDs, no INTs for a 150.8 QB rating ) capped a brilliant year...Led the AFC in passing with a 95.4 QB rating, a 62.0 completion percentage (241 of 389) and 7.8 yards per-attempt...Threw for 3,033 yards in 12 games, the most ever by a Cleveland quarterback in that number of games...His 22 TD passes were fifth-most in team history, a career high, and the most ever in 12 games by a Cleveland QB...Only Seattle's Dave Kreig (23) and Miami's Dan Marino (26) threw for more scores in the conference...Threw for a career-high four TDs and no INTs vs. Bengals (12/13)...Had second lowest INT rate in NFL (2.3, nine of 389)...His 7.8-yard average gain tied John Elway for the AFC's best and was second to Wade Wilson of Vikings...His 62.0 completion percentage was the second best in team history (Otto Graham compiled a 64.7 mark in 1953)...Rushed 15 times for 22 yards on the season, and scored a TD on a three-yard plunge in the opener at N.O. (9/13)...Completed 46 of 72 passes for 585 yards, six TDs and two INTs in playoffs for a 105.4 QB rating...Set an AFC Championship record by completing 26 passes (41 attempts) in 38-33 loss to Broncos (rallied club from a 21-3 halftime deficit)...Browns' nominee for Byron "Whizzer" White humanitarian award...Named Offensive MVP by Cleveland Touchdown Club for second straight year...Led all quarterbacks by throwing for 124 yards, while completing 10 of 17 passes for no TDs and one INT in Pro Bowl.

**1986:** Led Browns to most wins in club history...Enjoyed third-best season in club history and finished third in AFC (behind Dan Marino and Boomer Esiason) with 3,854 yards...Completed 310 of 531 passes, while tossing 17 TDs and throwing only 10 interceptions...1.9 interception percentage was by far the lowest in the NFL, and the best in club history...Had thrown 171 consecutive passes (five games) without an interception before K.C.'s Kevin Ross picked one off (10/12)...Won AFC Offensive Player of the Week honors twice, both 400-yard passing efforts (Miami, 11/10; Pittsburgh, 11/23)...401 yards passing vs. Miami on Monday night was first career 400-yard effort...Two weeks later, set regular-season career high with 414-yard performance...Rank as second and third-best passing days in club regular season history...His 50 pass attempts (32 completions) vs. Dolphins was third-highest in club history...Became first Cleveland quarterback to beat Steelers in Pittsburgh since Bill Nelsen (11/16/69), when Browns came away 27-24 victors on 10/5...In two playoff games, completed 51 of 96 passes for 748 yards, three TDs and four INTs...Took every snap from center until Mike Pagel relieved him late in regular season finale vs. San Diego...Was named Offensive MVP by Cleveland Touchdown Club.

**1985:** Broke Browns' rookie records for lowest interception rate (2.8) and highest QB rating (69.3) while finishing season ranked ninth among AFC signal callers...In AFC, only Jets' Ken O'Brien (1.6) and Chiefs' Bill Kenney (2.7) had lower rate than Kosar's 2.8...Had thrown 134 consecutive passes (six games) without an interception before his last pass of regular season was stolen in endzone (at Jets)...

Earned AFC Offensive Player of Week honors and was voted first game ball for 14 of 28, 161-yard, three passing TDs and one rushing TD effort vs. Oilers (12/15)...Quarterbacked in last 12 games after watching Gary Danielson lead team to 2-2 start...Browns were 4-5 in games which Kosar started and finished (4-6 in all starts)...Relieved Danielson in second quarter of Patriots' game (10/6) after Gary separated his shoulder; led team to 24-20 comeback win after trailing 20-17 in final period...After fumbling his first NFL snap (2:12 to play in first half), came back to complete his first seven passes attempted, including his initial pass to Brennan (9 yards)...Finished afternoon 9 of 15 for 105 yards...Fired first TD pass following week at Houston in his first NFL start — 68-yard bomb that put the Browns in front to stay, 7-6...First home start came before soldout Cleveland Stadium crowd of 77,928 against Raiders (10/20)...Quarterbacked in first pro game (10/6) at the age of 21 years, 10 months and 11 days...Was not named to any all-rookie teams (Rams' 34-year-old Dieter Brock was consensus pick).

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 1992

FB Kevin Mack to move into the Browns' all-time top 10 scoring list. Mack, with 282 points (47 TDs) needs two TDs to tie, three to pass, Ozzie Newsome (294 points) for 10th place. He needs five TDs to tie, six to pass, ninth-place Mike Pruitt (312), and six to tie, seven to pass eighth place Paul Warfield (318).

Mack (1,112 carries for 4,547 yards) needs 950 yards to pass Greg Pruitt (5,496 yards) into fourth-place on the Browns' all-time rushing yardage list, and 47 rushing attempts to pass Pruitt (1,158) into fourth place on the all-time rushing attempts list.

WR Webster Slaughter, with 305 catches for 4,834 yards, needs 27 catches to move into second place on the Browns' all-time reception list, surpassing Gary Collins (331). Slaughter needs 675 yards to move past Ray Renfro (5,508 yards) into second place on the team's all-time receiving yardage list.

QB Bernie Kosar (1,671 completions in 2,857 attempts for 19,937 yards) needs to pass for 63 yards for 20,000 in his career, and needs 3,777 yards to surpass Brian Sipe (23,713) for tops on the Browns' all-time passing list. Kosar needs 583 attempts and 274 completions to surpass Sipe for first place in those passing categories.

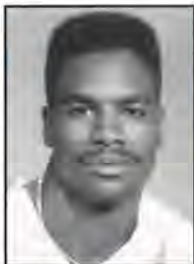

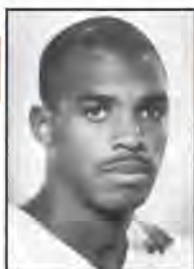

## CLEVELAND BROWNS' TRAINING AND ADMINISTRATIVE COMPLEX



The Browns' state-of-the-art facility was built specifically for training a professional football team. Situated on 10 acres of land in Berea, OH, the Browns' campus comprises an administration building of 76,000 sq. ft., a field house of 60,000 sq. ft., and a field maintenance building. There are five natural grass fields outside and a 70-yard astro turf surface indoors. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held in May of 1990 and construction was completed by August of 1991.

The Browns' staff, previously housed in four separate buildings in the Cleveland area, now function under one roof for the first time since the early 1970s. Some of the training features include a 6,000 sq. ft. weight room, a 4,500 sq. ft. training room, including a Jacuzzi, a cold water plunge, three whirlpools, sauna, and a Swim-Ex pool, which provides a current of water for resistance. In addition to classrooms and a theater, there is a kitchen for training camp meal preparation. A half-court basketball surface, two racquetball courts, and lockerrooms for the staff complete the football operation.

*The Browns extend a special thank you to Ann Bailey, who served as the Browns' project manager for the construction of the team's new training and office complex. In that capacity, Ann supervised the day to day activities during construction, working closely with the architects and contractors. She has continued in that role as the Browns adjust to their new surroundings and prepare for their first training camp at the new complex.*

A television studio, several private interview rooms, and a working press room overlooking the fields are media-related features of the facility.

## 1991 REVIEW

**(1) Sunday, Sept. 1 – Dallas 26, BROWNS 14 (78,860) at Cleveland Stadium.**

The Browns dropped their opener, stopping what would have been their fourth straight opening day victory. In the first series of the game, Dallas struck with a 38-yard field goal by Ken Willis. Several plays later, a pass interference call (on a Kosar-to-WR Brian Brennan pass) put the ball on the Cowboys' five-yard-line. FB Kevin Mack went around the left end for a one-yard run and six points. The score was 7-3, Browns. Dallas' second field goal was a 25-yarder in the first series of the second quarter (7-6, Browns). Cleveland did not score in the second quarter and allowed two touchdown passes in that period. The first was a QB Troy Aikman toss for three yards to TE Jay Novacek; the second was on Dallas' next series—a four-yard pass to WR Michael Irvin. Cleveland, down 20-7 at the half, opened up the third quarter with a Kosar-to-WR Webster Slaughter 62-yard touchdown pass on the first play. Browns' K Matt Stover attempted a 45-yard field goal at the end of the quarter, but it was wide left. (Score: 20-14, Dallas). The fourth quarter belonged to Dallas, which produced two Ken Willis' field goals (22- and 54-yards, respectively), that clinched the game for the Cowboys, 26-14. Kosar finished the game with 22 of 31 attempts, 249 yards and no INTs. Aikman was 24 for 37 and 274 yards, plus two TDs.

**(2) Sunday, Sept. 8 – BROWNS 20, New England 0 (35,377) at Foxboro Stadium.**

Cleveland shut out the New England Patriots at Foxboro Stadium, 20-0, before a crowd of 35,377. LB Mike Johnson intercepted a QB Tommy Hodson pass midway in the first quarter on the New England 42, but the Browns could not capitalize on the turnover. There was no score at the end of the first period. Early in the second quarter, S Vince Newsome forced RB Leonard Russell to fumble; the ball was recovered by DL Ernie Logan. RB Leroy Hoard caught a seven-yard touchdown pass from QB Bernie Kosar near the end of the quarter. The score at halftime was 7-0, Cleveland. In the middle of the third quarter, Matt Stover kicked a 30-yard field goal, climaxing an 11-play, 58-yard drive (7:09) that included five Cleveland first downs. It was 10-0 going into the fourth quarter. The Browns scored twice in the last quarter, first on Stover's 32-yard field goal, then CB Randy Hilliard intercepted a Hodson pass intended for WR Irving Fryar setting up the Browns' next scoring play. WR Michael Jackson scored on a 65-yard Kosar pass, making the score 20-0. The drive was six plays, 80 yards (4:39). Kosar was 15 of 22 for 187 yards and two touchdowns. Hodson was 12 of 26 for 95 yards, with two interceptions and no TDs. RB Joe Morris had 20 rushes for 70 yards. The Patriots' offense was held to 72 net rushing yards and 95 receiving yards. Cleveland totaled four sacks: DT Michael Dean Perry had two for -13 yards, and Hilliard had two for -11.

**(3) Sunday, Sept. 15 – BROWNS 14, Cincinnati 13 (78,269) at Cleveland Stadium.**

In a game that started with QB Bernie Kosar being sacked on the first play, the Browns turned it around and won a heated contest (14-13) against the Cincinnati Bengals before a sold-out Cleveland Stadium crowd of 78,269. Stover was four of four with field goals of 30, 42, 38 and 45 yards. DT James Jones' safety on RB James Brooks accounted for the team's other two points. In the first quarter, Cleveland had to punt after the first series. It was Cincinnati's ball, but Brooks was forced to fumble by Cleveland's LB Van Walters. The ball was recovered by S Vince Newsome at the Browns' 43. On the next play, RB Joe Morris fumbled and the ball was recovered by S David Fulcher. Cincinnati capitalized on the turnover with a Jim Breech 21-yard field goal. At the end of the first quarter, the score was 3-0, Cincinnati. Midway through the second quarter, the Browns' James Jones tackled Brooks in the endzone for a safety. After the free kick and an eight-play, 30-yard drive, Cleveland scored on a Stover 30-yard field goal. At halftime, the Browns led, 5-3. S Vince Newsome recovered a Harold Green fumble on Cincinnati's 46 (forced by Michael Dean Perry), on the Bengals' first series in the third quarter. The Browns made good on the turnover when Stover's 42-yard field goal proved successful, five plays and 22 yards later. Another turnover followed, when Eric Ball fumbled the kick return (forced by CB Anthony Florence and recovered by LB Richard Brown) on the Bengals' 25. Stover's second field goal attempt of the quarter was good from 38 yards. WR Tim McGee scored on a 26-yard pass from QB Boomer Esiason in the first drive of the fourth quarter, diminishing the Browns' lead, 11-10. Cincinnati scored on a 36-yard Breech field goal on their next series, taking the lead 13-11. In the last drive of the game, both teams having used all their timeouts, Stover kicked the game-winning goal (45-yarder) with just four seconds remaining.

(4) Sunday, Sept. 22 - Giants 13, BROWNS 10 (75,891) at Giants Stadium.

The New York Giants built a 13-0 lead in the first half of the Sept. 22 matchup at the Meadowlands, and the Browns could not dig themselves out of the hole--even though the Giants did not score in the second half. The Giants won the contest 13-10. New York's initial turnover occurred early in the first quarter when RB Rodney Hampton fumbled (forced by DT Michael Dean Perry), and S Vince Newsome recovered for Cleveland. The Browns did not capitalize on the turnover and Brian Hansen was forced to punt. The Giants scored on that drive with a Matt Bahr field goal (44 yards) after seven plays and 21 yards. Bahr kicked a 48-yard field goal on the Giants' next drive (second quarter), and with less than five minutes in the quarter, Hampton sprinted 28 yards for a touchdown. At halftime, the score was 13-0, Giants. The Browns stalled the Giants' offense in the second half. Matt Stover's third quarter FG, set up by RB David Meggett's fumble (forced by C Brian Kinchen; recovered by CB Odie Harris), was a 30-yarder, after eight plays and 34 yards. In what was to be the last score of the game, QB Bernie Kosar passed to FB Kevin Mack for a seven yard touchdown. Prior to the drive, which was four plays for 46 yards, RB Eric Metcalf lateraled to CB Frank Minnifield (28-yard return) on Sean Landeta's 61-yard punt to Cleveland's 23. A last ditch effort by the Browns to set up a field goal failed as time ran out. Kosar was 13 of 22 for 107 yards, one touchdown, and for the fourth straight week, no interceptions. Giants' QB Jeff Hostetler was 9 of 15 for 65 yards and no TDs. Mack, who scored the only touchdown for the Browns, rushed 20 times for 71 yards and caught four passes for 22 yards and one TD.

The New York Jets, ranked number one in rushing in the league after Week Five, were held to under 100 yards (76) by the Cleveland Browns' defense. Prior to the 10/6 matchup, the Jets were averaging 164.0 yards per game. The final, which was a 17-14 heartbreaker, was a game that the Browns almost pulled out on their last drive of the contest. Neither team scored until the Jets' first series in the second quarter when RB Blair Thomas attempted the first halfback option pass of his career to WR Rob Moore, who caught the 16-yarder in the endzone. On their next drive, RB Brad Baxter ran over left guard for a one-yard touchdown. At the half, the Jets were ahead 14-0. Cleveland scored on their first possession of the third quarter after S Harlon Barnett forced Thomas to fumble and DT James Jones recovered. Three plays later FB Kevin Mack went over LT Tony Jones for one yard and the touchdown. The Browns tied up the score (14-14) at the end of the third quarter on a QB Bernie Kosar-to-RB Leroy Hoard four-yard touchdown pass at the end of an eight-minute, 20-second drive. The Jets recovered the lead on Pat Leahy's 28-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter and prevailed, securing a 17-14 win. A lost opportunity, the Browns' final drive ended on a Kosar fumble (stripped by CB Mike Brim and recovered by CB James Hasty) with 1:14 remaining.

Cleveland answered Washington's first quarter touchdown with a 1-2-3 punch and a touchdown on a fake field goal attempt in which P/H Brian Hansen threw an 11-yard touchdown pass to WR Webster Slaughter, who had lined up along the sidelines. Initially, WR Art Monk scored midway through the first quarter on a 14-yarder from QB Mark Rypien. Redskins' RB Gerald Riggs' one-yard run made the score 14-7, Washington. Cleveland punted on their next series, and RB Earnest Byner's 21-yard TD run increased the lead, 21-7. K Matt Stover's 26-yard field goal in the third quarter was good, narrowing the lead 21-10. On the next Redskin drive, Riggs' fumble (caused by LB Clay Matthews), was picked up by S Vince Newsome and returned for a 37-yard touchdown. At 21-17, midway through the third period, rookie RB Ricky Ervins carried the ball 12 yards into the endzone (28-17). Riggs rushed for his second one-yarder for another six points early in the fourth quarter (35-17). The final was 42-17, after Ervins scored on a 65-yard run. Kosar was 21 of 29 for 266 yards, no TDs or INTs. Mack averaged 8.8 yards per carry on eight attempts for 70 yards and caught six passes for 53 yards. Rypien was 16 of 22 for 190 yards and one TD. The Browns had the ball 31:28, while Washington maintained possession 28:32. Cleveland had 389 total net yards vs. Washington's 398.

(7) Sunday, Oct. 20 - BROWNS 30, S.D. Chargers 24 (OT) (48,440) J. Murphy Stadium.

San Diego was forced to surrender the "W" in a 30-24 overtime thriller when LB David Brandon intercepted a QB John Friesz pass halfway through the fifth period. The home crowd of 48,440 witnessed the 30-yard TD return that came on second-and-ten at the San Diego 32 on a pass intended for WR Nate Lewis. In the first quarter, Chargers' John Carney opened the scoring on a 27-yard field goal after a four-play, two-yard drive that was set up by a 48-yard punt return by WR/PR Kitrick Taylor. Cleveland capitalized on a second quarter Friesz fumble (forced by S Harlon Barnett; recovered by MLB Cedric Figaro), when Matt Stover's 30-yard FG cleared the uprights. The score was tied at three. San Diego's running backs came back with two touchdowns in the third quarter, first on an 11-yard run by Ronnie Harmon (6 plays, 41 yards) and a two-yard run by Marion Butts (5 plays, 48 yards) on its next series. The Browns answered the call with a five-play, 76-yard drive culminated by a QB Bernie Kosar-to-FB Leroy Hoard six-yard touchdown pass (following a LB Richard Brown interception). Four minutes later, RB Joe Morris went over left guard for a one-yard touchdown. Again, the score was tied, this time at 17-17. On what was to be the Chargers' last score, a Friesz-to-RB Steve Hendrickson two-yard pass, the Chargers took the lead, 24-17. On Cleveland's next drive Kosar, in the shotgun, tossed a 15-yard aerial to Hoard for six points. Stover's conversion tied it up again, 24-24. With :05 remaining, Carney's 48-yard field goal attempt was wide left, and the game went into overtime. On San Diego's second overtime possession, Brandon intercepted Friesz's pass halfway through the period. Kosar, running a no-huddle offense most of the second half, was 26 of 42 for 297 yards and two touchdowns. Friesz was 33 of 54 for 321 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions. Cleveland held onto the ball 27:19, while the Chargers' time of possession was 40:21.

In the waning seconds of the fourth quarter, Pro Bowler Clay Matthews intercepted Neil O'Donnell's pass on fourth-and-14 at the Steelers' 45, returned it for 35 yards, and nailed the 17-14 victory over the Browns' archrivals. On their first drive of the game, Matt Stover clicked on a 34-yard field goal, which was aided by a 15-yard QB Bernie Kosar-to-WR Brian Brennan pass on third-and-seven to the Steelers' 32, for a first down. LB David Brandon's interception return of 40 yards on an O'Donnell pass (intended for Chris Calloway) at the Browns' 17, set up a Kosar-to-FB Leroy Hoard two-yard pass for a touchdown, early in the second quarter. O'Donnell scored a touchdown on a one-yard run up the middle near the end of the period. At the half, the Browns held the lead, 10-7. Mack rushed for one yard and the score in the third quarter after a 15-play, 68-yard drive. The 7:26 drive included a 19-yard pass to Brennan, one for 10 yards to Mack, a 7-yarder to RB Eric Metcalf, and a five-yarder to Brennan that marked his 300th career reception. At the end of the third quarter, Cleveland held the lead, 17-7. Pittsburgh scored on its first series of the fourth quarter on RB Warren Williams' one-yard run for a touchdown.

(9) Sunday, Nov. 3 - Bengals 23, BROWNS 21 (55,077) at Riverfront Stadium

The Browns' reception in Cincinnati was as cold as the wind chill (15 degrees) at Riverfront, when they dropped one to their archrival Bengals, 23-21. The only score in the fourth quarter was a 38-yard Jim Breech field goal, although the Browns tried twice for three points. The first attempt (a 47-yarder), hit the left upright with 1:56 remaining. In their next series, the Bengals punted on fourth down, and Cleveland got the ball. With :07 on the clock, K Matt Stover's 34-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Eric Thomas. FB Kevin Mack scored three rushing touchdowns: Twenty-eight seconds into the second quarter, Mack scored on a four-yard run after a six play, 46-yard drive (3:04). Mack's next score, a two-yard run after an eight-play, 61-yard drive (4:14), was set up by his 10-yard run on the previous play and a 21-yard QB Bernie Kosar-to-WR Webster Slaughter pass. The Browns' last scoring drive came in the third quarter

on another two-yard run by Mack on a six-play, 80-yard drive (4:10), after a 43-yard Kosar-to-Slaughter pass. The score at the end of the third period, was 21-20, Cleveland. Cincinnati opened the scoring on their first possession in the first quarter with a Jim Breech 23-yard field goal after a 5:49 drive of 12 plays for 74 yards. Cleveland maintained their lead after scoring in the second quarter (14-13), although the Bengals narrowed the gap with a two-yard QB Boomer Esiason-to-RB Mike Dingle strike and a 38-yard Breech field goal. In the third quarter, WR Eddie Brown caught a 34-yarder from Esiason and Cincinnati took the lead (20-14) until Mack scored on his third touchdown. Mack notched a career-high three-touchdown day, while Slaughter marked his third straight 100-yard game vs. the Bengals. QB Bernie Kosar, who was 19 of 31 for 285 yards, brought his total attempts without an interception to 293, one shy of Bart Starr's 294 record. Esiason was 18 of 30 for 185 yards and one interception (CB Stephen Braggs). RB Harold Green rushed for 135 yards on 24 carries.

(10) Sunday, Nov. 10 - Eagles 32, BROWNS 30 (72,086) at Cleveland Stadium.

The Browns jumped to a 23-point lead over the Eagles in the first half, but it wasn't enough as the Eagles roared back to win the contest 32-30 on a five-yard toss (Jim McMahon-to-Calvin Williams) midway in the fourth quarter. The Eagles' comeback ranks as the 13th greatest ever in NFL history (most points overcome to win a game), and the biggest blown lead by the Browns. In the first quarter, Matt Stover's 50-yard field goal attempt was good. QB Bernie Kosar's second pass, incomplete to WR Reggie Langhorne, broke Bart Starr's record (294) of most consecutive passes attempted (295) without an interception. On Philadelphia's first possession, S Eric Turner intercepted McMahon's pass (intended for Williams) and returned it 42 yards for a touchdown (10-0). The Eagles punted on their next series, and in a two-play, 69-yard drive (:59), Kosar's strike to RB Leroy Hoard was good for 65 yards and six points. Stover missed the PAT, but the Browns' owned the lead 16-0. Cleveland opened the scoring in the second quarter on a Kosar-to-Slaughter 18-yard pass, extending the gap to 23-0. The Eagles answered on their next three possessions: First on a McMahon toss to TE Keith Jackson for a 16-yard touchdown (23-7), on a McMahon-to-WR Fred Barnett 70-yard touchdown (23-14), and on a 21-yard Roger Ruzek field goal (23-17). Cleveland scored once more before the half on a Kosar-to WR Reggie Langhorne 24-yard pass for a 30-17 lead. The Browns were shut out in the second half, as Ruzek's two field goals (37, 24) in the third quarter closed in on the Browns' lead, 30-23. Ruzek's fourth field goal on the day (a 19-yarder) and McMahon's five-yard pass to Williams put the Eagles up, 32-30. DE Rob Burnett blocked Ruzek's PAT. Kosar, who had his first three-touchdown day since 10/8/90 at Denver, was 14 of 33 for 246 yards and one interception. The pass that stopped Kosar's streak (308) of attempts without an interception occurred near the end of the second quarter (6:22) when CB/S Ben Smith stole one intended for Langhorne. (Kosar was at 293 attempts going into the game). McMahon was 26 of 43 for 341 yards, three touchdowns and one interception. The Browns were held to 25 rushing yards and an 18:46 possession time. The Eagles owned the ball 41:14.

It was a thrill-a-minute in the Astrodome with the Browns leading in the fourth quarter until QB Warren Moon zapped a one-yard TD strike to WR Drew Hill with :12 remaining. The Oilers wrapped up the win 28-24. Moon was 31 of 44 for 399 yards, three touchdowns and one interception. Kosar was 21 of 34 for 279 yards, two touchdowns and one interception. RB Leroy Hoard caught a career-high 10 passes for 107 yards and one TD. WR Webster Slaughter had four catches for 78 yards, 48 LG (second quarter). Cleveland owned the ball 32:06, while Houston's time of possession was 27:54. Cleveland scored on a Kosar 14-yard toss to RB Leroy Hoard at the end of the first period to give the Browns a 7-0 lead. The scoring drive (11 plays, 80 yards, 7:50), included a Kosar-to-Hoard 33-yard pass on second-and-14 on the Browns' 45. In the second quarter, Houston responded with a nine-play, 72-yard drive (4:57) culminating on a RB-Allen Pinkett run off left tackle for five yards and a TD. Cleveland had to punt on their next series, but a WR-Ernest Givins' fumble (forced by CB Latin Berry, recovered by TE Scott Galbraith), gave the ball back to Cleveland. The Browns capitalized on the turnover when RB Joe Morris' five-yard run was good for six. A 19-yard pass to Galbraith preceded Morris' TD. The six-play, 30-yard drive (3:41), gave Cleveland the lead (14-7) going into halftime. WR Haywood Jeffries fumbled at the Browns' 42, after a 29-yard reception on the first series of the third quarter. S Eric Turner forced the fumble, then recovered it at Cleveland's 14. Again,

Cleveland took advantage of the turnover, when Matt Stover connected on a 55-yard field goal attempt after eight plays and 48 yards, including strikes to Hoard (11 yards) and Slaughter (22 yards). Moon's 40-yard pass to WR Drew Hill with 1:15 remaining in the third quarter, narrowed the gap, 17-14. Another fumble by Givins (forced by Turner; recovered by CB Alfred Jackson) resulted in a fake field goal attempt (fourth quarter) and a sack of P/H Brian Hansen. (12) Sunday, Nov. 24 -- BROWNS 20, Chiefs 15 (63,991) at Cleveland Stadium

A 31-degree temperature, blustery winds and a +10 wind chill welcomed the Kansas City Chiefs to Cleveland Stadium where the Browns won 20-15. Although the score was 20-3 (Browns) at the end of the third quarter, it was touch-and-go in the fourth period when K.C. scored 12 points and threatened the Browns' lead. The Chiefs dominated ball control in the first quarter with a 10:42 time of possession vs. the Browns' 4:18, but neither team scored. Kansas City fumbled in their first (DeBerg), second and third series, Okoye turning the ball over twice. Cleveland's James Jones recovered twice. A Kosar pass intended for Brian Brennan was intercepted by J. Pearson (1:37) at the CB 15 for no return. Cleveland got the ball at the 9:44 mark in the second quarter and scored when RB Leroy Hoard rushed over right tackle, notching his first rushing touchdown of the season. Setting up the score was a 52-yard run by Hoard, his career long. The drive was 10 plays, 85 yards (6:13), Browns 7-0. Matt Stover's 34-yard field goal came on Cleveland's next possession. Two passes to WR Reggie Langhorne, for 22 and 6 yards, respectively, helped set up the kick with :13 remaining. At the end of the first half, the score was Browns 10, Chiefs 0. Hoard caught his career long pass, a 71-yarder, and ran into the endzone for a touchdown. The five-play, 81-yard drive clocked 3:08 in the third quarter. The Browns maintained the lead, 17-0. On the next series, K.C. scored on a 34-yard Nick Lowery field goal. (Browns 17, Chiefs 3). During the drive, a QB Steve DeBerg-to-FL Tim Barnett 11-yard touchdown pass was called back when K.C. was charged with a false start. On the Browns' next series, a Kosar-to-Langhorne pass was intercepted by CB Kevin Ross--but turnaround is fair play--and CB Stephen Braggs intercepted a DeBerg pass intended for Barnett on the next play. Later, a RB Todd McNair fumble (forced by LB Cedric Figaro; recovered by CB Randy Hilliard), led to Cleveland's next score--a 21-yard Matt Stover field goal. The four-play, eight-yard drive (2:21) gave the Browns a 20-3 lead. Kansas City scored three times for 12 points in the fourth quarter. Lowery was good on a 22-yard field goal, Albert Lewis was credited with a safety, and DeBerg hit Emile Harry on a five-yard pass. On the safety, a bad exchange between Kosar and FB Kevin Mack led to a loose ball, which Kosar recovered in the endzone. Fourth quarter Browns' highlights included a 35-yard Joe Morris kickoff return at the 2:52 mark and a CB Alfred Jackson interception on a DeBerg-to-Harry pass at :11. The contest against the Chiefs marked the 11th straight game the Browns caused a turnover. This was only one of six 100-yard rushing games (123) for Cleveland in '91. Kansas City, who held a 139.5 rushing average on the season, was held to just 78 yards. Kosar was 13 of 20 for 170 yards, one TD and two INTs. DeBerg was 30 of 50 for 319 yards, one TD and two INTs.

The Browns blanked Indianapolis 31-0, as 24 of Cleveland's 31 points came on four Colt turnovers in the first half. Two fumbles and two interceptions buried the Colts and increased the Browns' give-and-take differential to +20. CB Alfred Jackson recovered a WR Jessie Hester fumble (caused by S Eric Turner) on the Colts' first series of the first quarter, and Matt Stover connected on a 41-yard field goal (drive: four plays, eight yards, 1:41). CB Stephen Braggs intercepted a QB Jeff George pass (intended for TE Pat Breach) at the Browns' 28. FB Kevin Mack's 3-yard reception from QB Bernie Kosar in the first play of the second quarter was good for six. The 11-play, 72-yard drive (6:11) included two passes to RB Leroy Hoard for 11 and 24 yards, respectively. The score: 10-0, Browns. A 9-play, 98-yard drive--the Browns' longest of the year--led to the longest rushing touchdown, a 51-yarder by Mack, who ran off right tackle. At the 5:16 mark in the second quarter, Cleveland led, 17-0. The Colts turned the ball over on the third play of their next series as LB Clay Matthews forced George to fumble, and DE Anthony Pleasant recovered. Again, Cleveland scored on Hoard's end around the left side. Stover's PAT was good, and in four plays, 12 yards, the Browns stretched the lead, 24-0. Still in the second quarter, and on their next series, the Colts turned it over the fourth time when LDT James

Jones intercepted George's pass for a 20-yard touchdown return. At halftime, the score was Cleveland, 31-0. Neither team scored in the second half, although the Browns knocked on the door twice. Cleveland's time of possession was 11:16 in the third quarter, and on the first series of the period, did not score at fourth-and-goal. The Colts were forced to punt and the Browns carried the ball into the fourth quarter. Matt Stover's 25-yard field goal attempt was wide right. QB Todd Philcox replaced Kosar on the Browns' next series. Kosar was 18 of 23 for 189 yards, one touchdown and no interceptions. Mack led the Browns' rushing with nine attempts for 69 yards and a 51-yard TD. He had three catches for 19 yards and one TD. Hoard had six catches for 74 yards and two rushes for two yards and one TD. George was 10 of 21 for 100 yards, no TDs and two INTs. RB Eric Dickerson rushed 16 times for 117 yards.

**(14) Sunday, Dec. 8 - Denver 17, BROWNS 7 (73,539) at Cleveland Stadium.**

Cleveland scored first on a turnover (13th straight game with at least one turnover), but the Broncos took the "W" back to Denver, 17-7. In the first quarter, LB Clay Matthews forced a QB John Elway tumble on Denver's first possession, but RB Steve Sewell recovered and Denver punted on the next play. On the Bronco's next possession, LB Cedric Figaro intercepted an Elway pass and returned it nine yards to Denver's 37. With 2:48 remaining in that period, QB Bernie Kosar connected with RB Leroy Hoard on a 25-yarder, setting up FB Kevin Mack's three-yard run up the middle for six. The 2:20 drive was four plays for 37 yards. Denver scored at the opening of the second quarter on an Elway-to-WR Michael Young 30-yard pass. The seven-play, 71-yard drive included a 21-yard toss to TE Shannon Sharpe. Near the end of the quarter, Kosar was intercepted (on a pass intended for WR Reggie Langhorne) by CB Charles Dimry, who returned it for four yards. Time ran out as Elway was sacked by LB Clay Matthews for ten yards. The score was even (7-7) at halftime. The Browns were shut out in the second half and neither team scored in the third period. In the fourth quarter, an 8:13 drive, consisting of 16 plays for 54 yards, ended on a six-yard TD catch by Denver WR Vance Johnson. The Broncos took the lead 14-7. RB/KR Joe Morris returned David Treadwell's kick for 19 yards to the Browns' 30, but Cleveland was forced to punt. On their next series, Elway threw a 60-yard bomb to Sewell, putting the Broncos' in field goal position. Treadwell's 37-yarder stretched the gap, 17-7, and clinched the win for Denver. Kosar was 12 of 24 for 110 yards, no TDs and one INT. He was sacked five times for minus 30 yards. Elway was 16 of 29 for 221 yards, two TDs and one INT. He was sacked four times for minus 21 yards (Matthews had two sacks, DT James Jones had one and DEs Pio Sagapolutele and Ernie Logan shared one). Browns' individual highlights included a 26-yard gain by Mack in the first quarter, a 33-yard pass to Langhorne in the second period and a Morris 36-yard kick return in the waning minutes of the game. On the defensive side of the ball, lead tackler was MLB Richard Brown with 10 solos and three assists.

**(15) Sunday, Dec. 15 - Houston 17, BROWNS 14 (55,680) at Cleveland Stadium.**

It went down to the wire, but Houston won 17-14, as the Browns failed to make a 19-yard field goal with :04 remaining in the game. Both teams were close in almost every phase of the game: The Browns had 22 first downs, 340 total net yards (101 rushing, 239 passing); Kosar had 28 completions on 40 attempts and one interception, and a 29:17 time of possession. Houston had 20 first downs, 330 total net yards (83 rushing, 247 passing); Moon had 26 completions—also on 40 attempts and one interception, keeping the ball 30:43. Cleveland scored on its second possession of the first quarter, when RB Leroy Hoard caught an eight-yard toss from QB Bernie Kosar. (It was Hoard's ninth TD reception of the season and his career). A couple of mid-range passes to TE Scott Galbraith and a pair of 8-and 9-yard runs by FB Kevin Mack set up the touchdown. Houston responded in the second quarter with a QB-Warren Moon-to-WR Ernest Givins seven-yard TD pass in the first series. The nine-play, 79-yard drive consumed 6:16. The score was even at 7-7. Cleveland slipped ahead on the next series on another passing TD when Kosar hit WR Brian Brannan to give Cleveland a 14-7 lead. Houston scored a second time in the quarter when Al DelGreco connected on a 27-yard field goal after a 10-play, 46-yard drive (4:26). Neither team scored in the third quarter. In the first series of the fourth quarter, Moon was picked off by rookie S Eric Turner on a pass intended for WR Drew Hill for no return. The Browns did not capitalize on the turnover and were forced to punt. Moon passed to WR Haywood Jeffries for two yards and the final TD of the game. Houston's 6:43 drive was 13 plays for 82 yards, and the Oilers took the lead, 17-14. Although Cleveland got the ball with 2:11 remaining and drove 81 yards to the Oilers' one-yard line, Matt Stover's 19-yard field goal attempt (to take the game into overtime) was unsuccessful.

The Browns coughed up a loss in the season finale, 17-10, in a contest that featured an uncharacteristic five Cleveland turnovers. CB Richard Shelton robbed QB Bernie Kosar of three passes while CB Rod Woodson and LE Keith Willis recovered one fumble each. On the Steelers' first series, Gary Anderson's 46-yard field goal attempt was wide left. Near the end of the first quarter, however, Anderson connected on a 34-yard field goal after a four-play, nine-yard drive (1:36), capitalizing on the Browns' first turnover. Matt Stover's 19-yard attempt was good for three points midway through the second quarter. The drive (6:19) was 13 plays for 71 yards, leaving the score deadlocked at 3-3 at the half. In the third quarter, a QB Bobby Brister-to-WR Dwight Stone 65-yard pass was good for six. The three-play, 69-yard drive was :56. At the end of the third period, it was Steelers, 10-3. Shelton intercepted Kosar's pass intended for RB Leroy Hoard and returned it for a 57-yard TD in the fourth quarter. Cleveland answered with a Kosar-to-WR Michael Jackson 27-yard TD pass. The six-play, 83-yard drive (2:32), was partially set up by passes to WR Webster Slaughter (11 yards) and TE Scott Galbraith (33 yards). The score was 17-10 midway through the final period; neither team would score again. Kosar was 28 of 49 for 335 yards, one TD and three INTs. Brister was 7 of 26 for 113 yards and one TD. Slaughter recorded a career-high 11 receptions for 138 yards, his Browns' record-breaking 15th career 100-yard game.

## BROWNS' HISTORY

- 1946: Browns were started by owner Arthur (Mickey) McBride as member of the All American Football Conference. Paul Brown was named coach and general manager and the first player he signed was then tailback Otto Graham. The Browns won the Western title with a 42-17 victory over the Buffalo Bisons and then defeated the New York Yankees in the championship game (14-9).
- 1947-49: Browns continued their domination of the AAFC, winning three more championships.
- 1950: Following the merger of the AAFC and the NFL, the Browns tied with the New York Giants with 10-2 records for a share of Eastern title. Browns won playoff, 8-3, and then stopped Los Angeles, 30-28, for the championship.
- 1951-53: Browns won three consecutive Eastern titles, but lost each time in the league's title match. In 1953, McBride sold the club to an organization headed by David Jones.
- 1954-55: Led by quarterback Otto Graham, the Browns won back-to-back NFL championships.
- 1956: At 5-7, the Browns suffered first losing season.
- 1957: Jim Brown was drafted; was named rookie of the year and helped Cleveland to Eastern Division title.
- 1961: Former television and advertising executive Art Modell bought the Browns.
- 1963: Blanton Collier, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach.
- 1964: Browns win division title with 52-20 victory over Giants and captured NFL championship with 27-0 win over Colts.
- 1965: In what was to be his last season, Jim Brown won NFL MVP honors and led Cleveland to league title game where they were defeated by Green Bay.
- 1966: An eighth round pick from 1964, Leroy Kelly became the club's dominant threat, rushing for 1,141 yards, but the Browns finished second in their division to Dallas.
- 1968: With newly acquired quarterback Bill Nelsen (from Pittsburgh), Browns won division; beat Dallas in playoffs and lost to Baltimore in the championship.
- 1969: Browns won third consecutive division crown, but lost to Minnesota in title game.
- 1970: Browns became members of AFC Central and finished second.
- 1971: Nick Skorich, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach. Team won first AFC Central crown.
- 1972: Browns once again gained postseason, losing to eventual champion Miami in playoffs.
- 1975-77: Forrest Gregg, Browns' offensive line coach, becomes head coach; Greg Pruitt has three consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons; Dick Modzelewski coaches final game of 1977.
- 1978: Sam Rutigliano becomes the first non-Browns' assistant to gain head coaching position. Team won first three on way to 8-8 finish.
- 1979: Losses in final two games prevented team from entering playoffs, finishing 9-7; Mike Pruitt keeps the tradition of outstanding Browns' running backs and has the first of three straight 1,000-yard seasons.
- 1980: Browns win AFC Central title with 11-5 record; lost to eventual Super Bowl champion Oakland in playoff; Brian Sipe is consensus MVP of league.
- 1982: In strike-shortened season, Browns finish eighth in AFC (4-5) and gain playoffs second time in three years. Lost to Raiders in Super Bowl Tournament.
- 1983: Browns tied for wildcard playoff spot with 9-7 record, but did not advance, losing to Denver and Seattle through NFL tie-breaking procedure.
- 1984: Browns replaced head coach Sam Rutigliano with defensive coordinator Marty Schottenheimer after a 1-7 midseason record and finished season at 5-11. TE Ozzie Newsome caught 89 passes for second straight year.

- 1985:** Browns captured their third central division championship, but lost to Dolphins, 24-21, in Miami. Rookie Kevin Mack (1,104) and Earnest Byner (1,002) each gained 1,000 yards rushing. It marked the third time in 66-year history of NFL that teammates both rushed for over 1,000 yards in the same season.
- 1986:** Browns won more games than ever before during regular season, as they roll-up a 12-4 record en route to their second consecutive AFC Central crown. In a double-overtime playoff thriller before a packed Cleveland Stadium crowd, Bernie Kosar throws for an NFL-record 487 yards as the Browns beat the New York Jets, 23-20, to advance to the AFC championship game. The Browns lose to Denver, also in overtime, 23-20.
- 1987:** Browns capture their third straight AFC Central, as they finished the season 10-5. The third week of the NFL season was cancelled due to the 24-day players' strike, while three "replacement" games were played (the Browns went 2-1). The Browns defeated the Colts, 38-21, at Cleveland Stadium in the AFC playoffs, then drop their second straight AFC Championship to Denver despite a spectacular come-from-behind bid that saw them score 30 second-half points, only to fall, 38-33 in Mile High Stadium. Bernie Kosar wins the AFC passing title with a 95.4 QB rating, and an NFL-high eight Browns make the Pro Bowl.
- 1988:** Cleveland finishes 10-6 and earns a Wild Card berth by defeating Houston, 28-33, in the season finale by overcoming a 16-point third-quarter deficit. Houston defeats the Browns, 24-23, in the Wild Card game played on Christmas Eve. Four Cleveland quarterbacks suffered injuries during the course of the season. Marty Schottenheimer resigns on Dec. 27.
- 1989:** Owner Art Modell announces Bud Carson as the Browns' seventh fulltime head coach on January 27. The Browns win their fourth division title in five years with a 9-6-1 record, and advance to the playoffs for an AFC-high fifth straight season. Browns win division crown with a stunning, come-from behind, 24-20 victory at Houston in the final week of regular season. Browns advance to third title game in four years by defeating Buffalo, 34-30, but lose to Denver, 37-21, at Mile High Stadium in AFC Championship. Bud Carson becomes first head coach to advance to the AFC Championship since Red Miller in 1977.
- 1990:** Browns suffer worst season in franchise history, finishing 3-13. Jim Shofner replaces Bud Carson as interim head coach on November 5.
- 1991:** Owner Art Modell announces Bill Belichick as the eighth full-time head coach on February 5. Browns move into new training and administrative complex, located in Berea, Ohio, in August.

## GLOSSARY OF MEDICAL TERMS

### **A.C. Joint—**

Acromioclavicular joint; joint of the shoulder where acromion process (of the scapula) and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.

### **Abscess—**

An infection which produces pus; can be the result of a blister, callus, penetrating wound or laceration.

### **Anterior—**

In front of; the front surface.

### **Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL)—**

Ligament of knee attaching to anterior tibial plateau and posterior medial aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from coming forward.

### **Arthrogram—**

X-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected in affected area (to show torn cartilage or rotator cuff tears).

### **Brachial Plexus—**

Network of nerves originating from the cervical vertebrae running down into the arm.

### **Burner—**

Common term for brachial plexus trauma in the neck. Usually results in burning or tingling sensation into the shoulder or arm when the neck is forced beyond the normal range of motion.

### **Capsule—**

An enclosing structure which surrounds the joint and contains ligaments which stabilize that joint.

### **Cartilage—**

Smooth, slippery substance preventing two ends of bones from rubbing together and grating.

**Collagen—**

A substance existing in commonly injured tissues of the body, including skin, cartilage, ligaments and bone.

**Disc—**

A flat, round-like, plate structure usually referring to cartilage between vertebrae.

**Ecchymosis—**

Bleeding into the surface tissue below the skin, resulting in a "black and blue" effect.

**Effusion—**

Accumulation of fluid, or the fluid itself, in various spaces in the body. Commonly found in the knee following injury.

**Epicondylitis—**

Inflammation in the elbow due to overuse of either the flexor or extensor muscles attaching to the medial or lateral epicondyle of the humerus.

**Fibula—**

The smaller of the two bones in the lower leg, located to the outside.

**Fracture—**

Breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, incomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.

**Humerus—**

Bone of the upper arm.

**Inferior—**

Lower, beneath, toward the bottom.

**Lateral—**

To the outside of the body.

**Lateral Collateral Ligament (LCL)—**

Ligament of knee attaching lateral femoral condyle and to fibula head. It provides lateral stability to the knee.

**Medial—**

Pertaining to or near the middle.

**Medial Collateral Ligament (MCL)—**

Ligament of knee along the medial aspect that connects the femur to the tibia. It provides stability to the medial aspect of the joint.

**Meniscus—**

Crescent shaped cartilage usually pertaining to the knee joint.

**Metacarpals—**

Five long bones of hand, just below fingers.

**Metatarsals—**

Five long bones of foot, just below toes.

**Neuritis—**

Inflammation of a nerve.

**Patella—**

The kneecap.

**Pectorals—**

Chest muscles beneath breast, leading up to shoulder.

**Plantar—**

Pertaining to the sole of the foot.

**Plica—**

A fold of tissue in the joint capsule and a common result of knee injury.

**Posterior—**

At the back part, or rear of the body.

**Posterior Cruciate Ligament (PCL)—**

Ligament of the knee attaching to posterior tibial plateau and anterior lateral aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from going backward.

**Quadriceps (Quads)—**

The four powerful muscles in the front of the thigh, responsible for extending the knee joint.

**Rotator Cuff—**

Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area: supra-spinatus, infraspinatus, teres minor, and subscapularis. Often irritated by overuse.

**S-C Joint—**

Sternoclavicular joint; articulation between the sternum and the clavicle.

**Scapula—**

The shoulder blade.

**Sciatic Nerve—**

Largest nerve in body located in back of leg which controls most of its function.

**Sprain—**

A joint injury. A violent twisting, stretching, pulling or tearing of a ligament.

**Strain—**

A muscle injury. The pulling or twisting of a muscle or tendon.

**Superior—**

In anatomy, the upper of the two parts; toward the top or above.

**Triceps—**

Muscle of the posterior upper arm, opposite the biceps, that extends the elbow.

**Ulnar Nerve—**

Nerve in the elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing or repeated trauma

## CLEVELAND STADIUM

Cleveland Stadium, a famous and proud landmark for this city, is the nation's largest facility housing both a Major League baseball team and an NFL franchise. The Stadium, with a current capacity of 78,512, was completed in July of 1931 at a cost of \$3.5 million.

A \$6,000,000 improvement program was completed over the last three years, comprised of a new scoreboard (including sideboards that continuously update out-of-town scores), a new sound system, 47 color TV monitors located within the concourse, renovation of concession stands and upgraded restroom facilities, new rooflights, and replacement of all original electrical transformers, and new bleacher seating.

The Stadium, which sits on a landfill, has proved to be multi-purpose. Along with baseball and football, the range of activities at the Stadium has included everything from a heavyweight championship bout (Schmeling vs. Stribling) to religious convocations. The Metropolitan Opera and the Beatles have performed on the field, as have circuses, rodeos, big bands, tractor pulls, and a horde of professional and amateur athletes. In 1991, a Hollywood film crew used Cleveland Stadium as the setting for the television movie, "The Babe Ruth Story."

Over the years, the Stadium became a financial strain for the city of Cleveland. Art Modell responded to the need in 1974, when he formed Cleveland Stadium Corporation and signed a 25-year lease with the city. When the agreement between the city and Modell was first reached in 1974, the Browns' owner promised a \$10 million improvement plan, which was concluded in 1984.

Those original improvements included the addition of 108 luxurious loges, a computerized scoreboard, more comfortable seats, new concession facilities, a new lighting system (both inside and around the perimeter of the Stadium), the installation of a new playing field, which was lowered two feet to provide a better view from the stands (1976), a new football pressbox elevator and many structural steel repairs.

Since 1984, additional improvements continue to be made as needed. Including the scoreboard mentioned above, over \$18 million has been invested in the building since 1974.

Former Cleveland Mayor (and current Governor) George Voinovich gives Modell and the Stadium staff the credit for saving the Stadium. "If the city had held onto the Stadium, it probably would be closed today," Voinovich said. (Cleveland Press, 3/28/80).
