ARTHUR B. Modell**'93****Owner and President****Born: June 23, 1925****Brooklyn, N.Y.****Purchased Browns: March 21, 1961****33rd Year with Browns**

Art Modell continues with the same type of energy and daring that inspired him to buy the Browns at the age of 35 for what was then (March, 1961) an unheard of sum of \$4 million. His 33 years of service as owner of one of the NFL's most successful franchises has been highlighted by dedication, loyalty, accomplishment and a human touch, often enhanced by his sense of humor, that is so often missing in today's multi-million dollar professional sports' industry.

HISTORY

- Dropped out of high school at the age of 15 to help financially-strapped family after the death of his father.
- First full-time job was as an electrician's helper, cleaning out the hulls of ships in a Brooklyn shipyard.
- Joined the Air Force in 1943 (he was 18).
- Under the G.I. Bill, he enrolled in a New York City television school following World War II.
- Produced one of the first regular daytime television shows in the nation.
- Joined the advertising business in 1954 and soon became a partner for the L.H. Hartman Company.

FOOTBALL HISTORY

- Purchased Browns on March 21, 1961.
- His fourth team, the 1964 Browns, won the World Championship, beating the Baltimore Colts, 27-0.
- His 1965, 1968 and 1969 teams played in the NFL title games.
- His 1986, 1987 and 1989 teams lost memorable AFC Championship games to the Denver Broncos.
- His 1967, 1971, 1972, 1980, 1982, 1985 and 1988 teams also made the playoffs. In total, Modell's Browns have played in 19 playoff games in 14 different seasons. Only Dallas (20), the Raiders (17), the Rams (16) and Vikings (16) have fared better in Art's 33 years of ownership.
- In five other seasons - 1963, 1970, 1976, 1979 and 1983 - the Browns had a chance to make the playoffs on the final day of the season, but did not qualify.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Only elected NFL President in league history, serving in that capacity in 1967, 1968 and 1969.
- Chairman of the NFL's Television Committee for 31 years. During his tenure, over eight billion, four hundred million dollars in revenues were negotiated on behalf of the NFL.
- Chairman of the Owners' Labor Committee, which successfully negotiated the NFL's first collective bargaining agreement with the players in 1968.
- Served on the NFL-AFL Merger Committee, breaking the impasse for realignment of the two leagues by moving the Browns into the American Football Conference.
- Chairman of NFL Films.
- Was an important participant in the negotiations with ABC to start Monday Night Football and then volunteered to host the first game in Cleveland in 1970.
- Volunteered the Browns to play in the first "second" Thanksgiving Day game at Dallas.

- Conceived and staged the first doubleheader in NFL history, which consisted of the Browns and three other teams playing back-to-back preseason games at Cleveland Stadium. From 1962 through 1971, the Browns hosted the annual doubleheader each August that drew over 800,000 fans in those 10 years.
- He is annually listed in the *Sporting News* "Top 100 Most Influential People" in sports (as high as 16 in 1992).

COMMUNITY IMPACT

- Recently was re-elected as President of the world renowned Cleveland Clinic.
- Serves on the boards for Baldwin Wallace College and Cleveland State University.
- Serves on the board of Churchill Downs.
- Former board member of National City Bank, National City Corporation and the Ohio Bell Telephone Company.

Art and his wife Pat (see inclusion) are the parents of John and David Modell. John, 34, is a musician/composer and works as a digital mastering engineer at Oceanview Digital Mastering. He and his wife Tracy, an artist, live in Los Angeles with their son Dylan Scott (3/21/92). David, the Browns' Vice President/Assistant to the President, and his wife Olwen, an attorney, live in Kirtland with daughter Breslin Ebright (2/5/90) and son Arthur Edward (11/23/91).

Pat Modell, the former Patricia Breslin, gained fame as one of the most recognized actresses in television history. At one point, she had appeared in more motion pictures and television shows (400) than any other actress. Her most famous roles included a co-starring spot opposite Jackie Cooper in the long-running series "People's Choice" and her portrayal of Meg Baldwin in "General Hospital". Today, Pat devotes much of her time to a variety of Cleveland area projects. She has co-chaired recent major fundraisers for the Hospice of the Western Reserve and the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland. She also has lent her energy and expertise to the Make-A-Wish Foundation, the Playhouse Square Foundation, the Cerebral Palsy Association, Ursuline College, the Cleveland Musical Arts Foundation and the Cleveland Ballet.

When the NFL's new collective bargaining agreement was announced last spring, Browns' owner Art Modell joked publicly that "this thing is so complicated that our first draft pick will have to be a Harvard Law School graduate." Privately and with confidence, Art turned to his executive vice president, Jim Bailey, to master the document and guide the Browns through the first year of free agency, transition and franchise players, salary cap and a slew of other regulations that are now common to the game.

It's not the first time that Modell has placed an important part of the Browns' business in the capable hands of Bailey, who joined the franchise 16 years ago. Jim's trademark low-key style is so unusual in a profession as public as the NFL. But his quiet approach does not diminish his input on every significant decision made by the Browns.

"There is not a Browns' function that does not include Jim's input. He's been involved with everything from hiring a coach, to building our training complex, to our legal and government affairs," Modell says of his executive vice president, administration and legal. "If there's an important decision to be made about the future of the Browns, Jim's thoughts on the subject will be given weight," Modell adds.

Bailey functions as the Browns' chief administrator on a day-to-day basis. He spearheaded the building of and the move to the team's new (1991) state of the art Training and Administrative Complex in Berea, Ohio. Jim started the project, and directed the details of getting it built in a timely manner.

A former scholarship winner as a defensive back at Florida State, Bailey was promoted to his current position in early 1984. During his tenure with the Browns, Bailey has done everything from negotiate player, radio and TV contracts, to handle Browns' legal affairs, to coordinate Cleveland Stadium activities. In fact, most of Jim's initial work with the organization involved the development and maintenance of Cleveland Stadium Corporation.

Bailey earned a law degree from the University of Michigan after graduating from FSU. Prior to joining the Browns, Jim worked for the Cleveland-based law firm of Guren, Merritt, Sogg and Cohen, where he was quickly named a partner in 1976. Bailey's duties at the law offices included work with Art Modell in the development of the Cleveland Stadium Corporation lease arrangement with the city of Cleveland. That association was instrumental in bringing Bailey to the Browns.

A native of Wilmington, Ohio, Bailey stood out in three sports (football, basketball and track) at Wilmington High School. Currently, Jim serves on the Board of Directors of the NFL Alumni/Browns' Chapter and the Board of Trustees for the Discover Berea Chamber of Commerce.

Jim and his wife, Ann, live in Bratenahl and are the parents of two grown daughters: Sarah, a 1989 graduate from St. Louis' Washington University with a degree in psychology and business, is attending an interior design school in Chicago; while daughter Jenny, a 1990 Northwestern University graduate (psychology and finance), is attending graduate school at the University of Colorado.

David Modell**'93****Vice President/Assistant to the President****Born: August 16, 1961
Los Angeles, Calif.****19th Year with Browns**

No person in the Browns' organization has more hands-on experience in as many different areas of the company as the 32-year-old David Modell. Starting in Stadium and game-day operations when he was 14, David also worked in the team's ticket office, public relations' department, and he started Browns' marketing in 1985. Today he is a franchise vice president and assistant to the President and is involved in all aspects of the team's functions.

When he gave up his title as vice president of marketing a year ago, he devoted more time to player contract negotiations and became the team's main contact with the league office on all player-related business.

David made his mark on the team and in league circles with the work he did marketing the Browns. The younger Modell started a marketing department in 1985 and developed a series of programs that have enhanced the team's image and provided revenues to contend with the increasingly difficult task of meeting the expenses involved with running an NFL team. Other teams have copied some of the innovations started by David, including Browns' television productions (weekly shows and preseason games produced by teams rather than selling those rights) and an elaborate training camp magazine that is distributed to fans. The teams' original television ventures were both produced and sold by Modell.

"At a time when most teams were wondering whether they should have a marketing department, David had ours up and running and setting a pace a number of franchises have since followed. He increased our market share of advertising dollars, both locally and nationally, and added needed revenues to keep pace with the forever growing expenses of running an NFL team," Jim Bailey, Browns' executive vice president, said. David also served as a coordinator for the Browns' promotional and advertising activities with radio stations WMMS/WHK, which has the rights to the Browns' broadcasts.

Modell is the President-Elect of the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland, while heading their development fundraising. He was recently elected to the Board of Trustees for the Cleveland Convention and Visitors' Bureau. Modell also works with the Lake County Boy Scouts' Association and serves on the Visiting Committee of the Athletic Department at Case Western Reserve University.

As a 14-year old student, David worked Browns' games as a member of the grounds' crew. In the next years, he spent time as a front office aide and training camp intern. After graduating from the The Gunnery School (Washington, Ct.) and attending Wittenberg University, Modell joined the Browns in a fulltime capacity in the team's ticket office (1981-82). He then worked two years as the front office manager for the Fernwood Inn, a resort in the Pocono Mountains (1982-84) before returning to Cleveland in October of 1984.

Modell's wife Olwen, an attorney, serves on the board of two groups: Youth Visions (formerly Big Brothers and Big Sisters) and Starting Point (child care referral). Olwen and David are parents of daughter Breslin Ebright (2/5/90) and Arthur Edward (11/23/91) and are expecting their third child in September. The Modells live in Kirtland.

KEVIN BYRNE**'93**

**Vice President,
Director of Public Relations**

Enjoying his 15th NFL season, 13th with the Browns, Kevin Byrne is a team vice president and the director of public relations. Byrne, who was born in Cleveland 44 years ago, joined the franchise in 1981 as the Director of Publicity and earned his promotion to vice president three years later (1984).

While he directs the Browns' public relations' department, Byrne also supervises the team's ticketing department, and works closely with the marketing staff. He has negotiated a number of the Browns' preseason television and radio contracts and also coordinates some Cleveland Stadium Corporation activities.

A significant portion of Byrne's attention is given to the production of Browns' television shows. The team produces a weekly one-hour show, "Browns' Insider with Bill Belichick". Byrne writes the show, which has been nominated for a local "Emmy" for "best sports programming" two of the last three years.

Byrne began his NFL career with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1977 when he was named as the then youngest public relations director in the league. He stayed with the Big Red for two years before becoming Director of Public Affairs for Trans World Airline (1979-80). In 1980, St. Louis Magazine selected Byrne as one of 80 St. Louisans "to watch in the 80's."

From 1974-77, Byrne was sports information director at Marquette University, where he worked with Al McGuire and the Warriors' 1977 NCAA basketball champions. His first job after graduating from college was as the "SID" at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. His publications at both schools won numerous national and regional awards from the College Sports Information Directors' Association.

Byrne earned distinction as a member of Alpha Sigma Nu, the National Jesuit Honor Society, while gaining a degree in journalism from Marquette University (1971). He was a member of "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities" and was a four-year member of the Warrior wrestling team. (Byrne currently helps coach a grade school wrestling team in the Cleveland area). Kevin is a graduate of Lakewood (O.) St. Edward High School, where he is Vice-Chairman of the school's Board of Trustees and Executive Committee. For the past seven years, he has been the chairman of the NFL's Pro Football Writers' Liaison Committee. Last February (1993), Byrne received the Cleveland Touchdown Club's Pro Recognition Award for his his "dedication to community service".

Kevin and his wife Sally live in Westlake with their four children: daughter Shannon, 17, and sons Sean, 16, Tim, 14, and Conor, 11.

Since taking over the Browns following the team's disastrous 3-13 1990 season, Bill Belichick has methodically and with great determination, re-built one of the NFL's winning franchises. Step-by-step, Bill has developed a strong coaching staff and helped restructure the personnel department into cohesive units that have the Browns on the brink of returning to the playoffs.

"We restored the team's respectability in the league in our first season (1991), and we contended for a playoff position until a late-season falling off a year ago," Belichick said. "Now it's time to take another step. We expect to be better."

Like many of the the NFL's best coaches, Belichick is admired for his outstanding work ethic. "On the whole, the coaches in this business work very hard. In fact, I've known people who would have been very good coaches, but they did not want to cope with the hours," Browns' owner Art Modell said. "But, Bill Belichick is something else. I've never seen anything like his work ethic. His energy level is extraordinary. He leaves nothing to chance, and I like what I see."

Belichick does not consider his hours long. "I never think about it. I enjoy being a football coach. I enjoy the business. If I didn't, I wouldn't do it. To me, it's not a big deal."

On Feb. 5, 1991, the then 38-year-old Bill Belichick was named head coach of the Browns by Modell. Belichick became the eighth fulltime head coach in the team's 44-year NFL history. At the time, Belichick was the league's youngest head coach.

Belichick and his staff coaxed six wins out of his first Browns' team (6-10, in 1991), losing six games by a total of just 17 points. That season, the Browns finished first in the AFC with a +15 giveaway/takeaway mark, a remarkable turnaround from an NFL low of -24 in 1990. Cleveland set a team mark with just 18 giveaways, only four shy of the all-time record of 14 set by the 1990 Super Bowl champion Giants.

In year two, the Browns improved to 7-9, but proved they could play head-to-head with the league's playoff teams. Cleveland beat Pittsburgh (17-9, in Cleveland), which won the AFC Central, and Houston (24-14, at the Astrodome), both playoff qualifiers. However, the Browns dropped heartbreaking games to four playoff teams after building late fourth-quarter leads. AFC West winner San Diego escaped Cleveland with a 14-13 victory after the Browns led 13-7 in the final stanza. The Browns powered their way to a 13-3 fourth quarter lead at NFC Central champion Minnesota, only to see the Vikings rally with two late TDs for a 17-13 victory. Playing on a broken ankle that would cause him to miss the next nine games, Bernie Kosar led a remarkable TD drive that gave the Browns a 23-20 lead over the AFC East champion Dolphins with less than a minute to play. Dan Marino, however, worked his magic and matched Kosar's drive, and the Dolphins won at the Stadium, 27-23, in a Monday night spectacular.

Perhaps the toughest loss from a year ago, and maybe the one that best indicates how close Belichick is to having a playoff team, is the 17-14 defeat to Houston in game 15. This devastating loss knocked the Browns out of the postseason

action. The Browns dominated every phase of this contest for three and one-half quarters and enjoyed a 14-3 lead with three minutes remaining in the game. However, Houston rallied for two TDs in two and a half minutes to win. "We've had some tough, tough losses in the last two years. Hopefully, we'll find a way to win those in 1993," Belichick offered.

Belichick came to the Browns from the New York Giants, where he served as an assistant for 12 seasons and helped the Giants to Super Bowl victories in 1986 and 1990. In the latter season, the Giants' championship defense, which was coordinated by Belichick, allowed just 211 points, an average of 13.2 per game, lowest in the league. During the 1986 Super Bowl campaign, the Giants gave up 236 points, second best in the NFL to the Bears' 187. Over Belichick's last three seasons, the Giants allowed the fewest points in the league, 777.

"To be a head coach in this league was a goal of mine. The fact that it is Cleveland makes it a dream come true," Belichick said. "Cleveland is in my blood. I have very fond memories of this area."

Belichick's father Steve is from Struthers, Ohio (near Youngstown) and played football at (Case) Western Reserve University (1938-40) under Bill Edwards, who was Bill's godfather. (Steve played fullback for the Detroit Lions in 1941). "I still have family in Struthers, and I always enjoyed visiting there and coming up to Cleveland to see Browns and Indians' games," Belichick said. "My father used to take me to Hiram College when I was a boy to watch the Browns practice, and I remember seeing some of the greats like Jim Brown, Lou Groza, Gary Collins, Erich Barnes and Gene Hickerson." (Steve Belichick recently retired from the Naval Academy, where he coached for 33 years. He currently does some scouting for the Browns).

Today, Belichick invites many of the Browns' alumni to spend time with the team and speak to them. "I have great respect for the history of this franchise and the players who made it the winningest. A Jim Brown, an Ozzie Newsome, a Jim Houston - those types of players and people - they can help us get better," Belichick said.

Belichick began his coaching career as a 23-year-old in 1975 as a special assistant to then-Baltimore Head Coach Ted Marchibroda. "He was a young man who was willing to work round the clock for nothing and learn everything he could about the game," Marchibroda recalled. "After training camp, we got him a hotel room across from mine and, whatever we gave him, he did it well and thoroughly. The first thing you should know about Bill is that he's a worker, plus he knows people and this is a people business. He's a good man, with good character and there's no doubt he knows defense. I believe he'll be a successful head coach."

"Ted taught me what being an NFL coach is all about and I owe him a great deal. He gave me a tremendous learning experience at a young age. I saw the highs and lows. The Colts lost four of their first five and then came back to go 10-and-four and win the AFC Eastern championship," Belichick added.

A year later, Belichick joined the Lions' staff of Rick Forzano as assistant special teams' coach and later helped with the tight ends and receivers under Tommy Hudspeth. He left the Lions after the 1977 season to join Red Miller's Denver Bronco staff as assistant special teams' coach and assistant to defensive coordinator Joe Collier. In 1979, he went to the Giants to serve as a defensive assistant and special teams' coach under Ray Perkins. After coaching the special teams in 1979-80, Belichick was given the added duties of linebackers in 1981-82. Under Bill Parcells, Belichick began coordinating the defense in 1983, plus coaching linebackers for two seasons. Parcells gave him the defensive coordinator's title, plus secondary coaching responsibilities, in 1989 and 1990.

Belichick, who grew up in Annapolis, Maryland, is a graduate of Annapolis High, where he was recently (2/24/93) inducted into the school's Hall of Fame, and Phillips Academy, Andover (Mass.). He earned a B.A. in economics in 1975 from Wesleyan (Middletown, Ct.) University. Bill played football (center and tight end) and lacrosse in both high school and college.

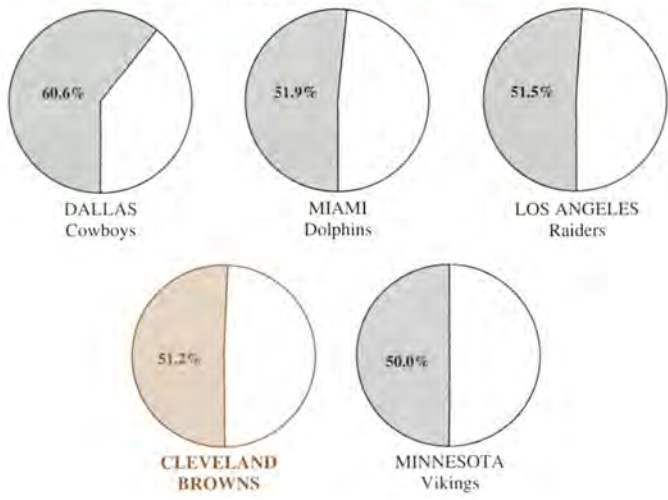

Ernie Adams, named special assignment coach earlier this year, received one of the first coaching offers made by Bill Belichick in '91. As special assignment coach, Adams' current duties focus on key game situations, including inside-the-20 and third down conversions.

A former offensive assistant coach with both the New England Patriots (1975-78) and the New York Giants (1979-81), Adams was promoted to Director of Pro Personnel for the Giants (1982-85). In the latter capacity, he was responsible for rating all players in the NFL for purposes of trade or waiver acquisition, evaluating college talent for the NFL draft, and evaluating upcoming Giants' opponents. After leaving the Giants, Adams tackled Wall Street as an analyst/trader (1986-1990) for Mabon, Nugent & Co. of New York.

Upon graduation from Northwestern (1975) with a B.S. in education, Adams was hired as administrative assistant to then-head coach Chuck Fairbanks of the Patriots. His duties included all aspects of football operations, plus computer analysis, statistical evaluation and film coordination. At the Giants, Adams served as an assistant offensive coach under then-head coach Ray Perkins. His duties were similar to those held at the Patriots and included on-the-field work with the offensive unit, coaching during meetings, and preparing offensive game plans.

Adams, 40, was graduated from Phillips Academy, Andover (Mass.), and enrolled at Northwestern. He worked under head coach Alex Agase, assisting the coaching staff as a game scout and undergraduate assistant on the freshman football team. He assumed the same responsibilities with the varsity teams, including on-the-field work with tight ends.

Adams is single and lives in Lakewood.

Jim Bates, who coaches the Browns' defensive ends, has coached every defensive position and served as a defensive coordinator and USFL head coach (San Antonio Gunslingers).

Jim was defensive coordinator/secondary coach at Florida (1990) when the Gators' defense ranked fifth in the nation in total yards allowed. He coached linebackers at Tennessee in 1989, and the Vols were SEC co-champs and Cotton Bowl victors. Prior to the Browns, Bates' last professional coaching position was as an assistant with the Detroit Drive of the Arena Football League in 1988. He spent 1986 as defensive coordinator for the USFL Arizona Outlaws after serving as head coach for the San Antonio Gunslingers in 1985. Bates joined the Gunslingers as defensive coordinator in 1984.

Bates, 47, spent six years (1978-83) at Texas Tech as secondary coach and defensive coordinator. He tutored the secondary at West Virginia in 1977. From 1975-76, he coached linebackers at Kansas State. He was an offensive line coach at Villanova in 1973, but switched to linebackers' coach the following year. Bates spent the 1972 season coaching freshmen at Southern Mississippi. He became head coach at Sevier County (Tenn.) H.S. from 1969-71 after working as a graduate assistant at Tennessee, his alma mater.

Bates played in the 1965 Bluebonnet Bowl, the 1966 Gator Bowl and the 1968 Orange Bowl as a linebacker for the Vols. In 1967, Tennessee finished second in the nation and won the SEC championship. Jim graduated in 1969 with a degree in physical education. He attended Oxford (Mich.) H.S., where he was graduated in 1964.

Jim and his wife, Beverly, are residents of Strongsville. He has two sons: James (20), who is a linebacker at the University of Florida and Jeremy (17), who is a junior at Sevier County (Tenn.) H.S. .

Steve Crosby, who enters his fourth season as running backs coach, has cultivated the talents of the Browns' backfield, including athletes the caliber of Eric Metcalf, Kevin Mack and Leroy Hoard, plus promising newcomers Randy Baldwin and Tommy Vardell. Under Crosby's direction, Mack and former Brown Earnest Byner became the third duo in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards each in the same season (1985).

A running back for the New York Giants from 1974-76, Crosby began his coaching career on Don Shula's Miami Dolphins' staff in 1979 after serving as a Dolphins' scout for two years (1977-78). From 1979 through 1982, Crosby coached the Dolphins' special teams and linebackers, while continuing personnel duties. He joined the Atlanta Falcons (1983-84) and worked with quarterbacks and running backs. After tutoring Browns' running backs in 1985, Crosby returned to Atlanta as quarterback coach in 1986 and switched to running backs coach (1987-89). In 1990, he accepted an invitation from the Patriots to coach special teams and tight ends.

Crosby, 43, is a 1972 graduate of Fort Hays (Kan.) State University, where he earned a degree in physical education and a Master's in athletic administration. As a senior, he rushed for 1,024 yards on 179 carries (5.7 avg.). He was twice named NAIA All-America and was a three-time all-conference performer before being drafted in the 17th round in 1974. Steve attended Pawnee Rock (Kan.) H.S.

Crosby and his wife, Lisa, have three children: Matthew (7) and Jeffrey (5) and Lauren (6 months). The Crosby's reside in Strongsville.

Kirk Ferentz marks his first year in the National Football League as the Cleveland Browns' new offensive line coach. Ferentz (pronounced fer-ENTZ), was the head coach of the University of Maine's Black Bears for the past three years, including 1992, when Maine finished 6-5.

Prior to his position as head coach, the 37-year old Ferentz was the offensive line coach and running game coordinator at Iowa for nine years (1981-89), under the direction of head coach Hayden Fry. Ferentz coached the Hawkeyes' Joel Hilgenberg, a 1993 Pro Bowler and member of the New

Orleans Saints' squad, who is the brother of Browns' Pro Bowl center Jay Hilgenberg. During his tenure at Iowa, the Hawkeyes appeared in Bowl Games eight consecutive times and won a total of 73 games.

Ferentz coached several All-American offensive linemen including three first round draft choices and an Outland Trophy finalist. He has coached the following NFL players: John Alt (Kansas City Chiefs); Dave Croston (Green Bay Packers); Ron Hallstrom (Green Bay), Mike Haight (New York Jets/Washington Redskins), Chris Gambol (Indianapolis Colts), Rob Baxley (Cardinals), Joel Hilgenberg (New Orleans Saints); Bob Kratch (New York Giants) and Brett Miller (Atlanta Falcons).

Ferentz joined Pittsburgh (1980) as the offensive line coach under Jackie Sherrill. He helped guide the Panthers to a 10-1 record and the nation's number two ranking. While at Pitt, he coached future NFL Pro Bowl selections Mark May, Russ Grimm and Jimbo Covert. Ferentz began his coaching career in 1977 on a part-time basis at his alma mater (Connecticut), prior to his graduation. He assisted the defensive coordinator and served as linebacker coach. Ferentz then accepted a defensive coordinator/offensive line coach position (1978-79) at Worcester Academy.

A 1978 graduate of Connecticut with a degree in English education and Academic All-Conference honors, Ferentz, a linebacker, was a three-year letter winner and team co-captain. He attended Upper St. Clair H.S., near Pittsburgh, Pa. Kirk and his wife, Mary, live in North Royalton with their four children: Brian (10); Kelly (8); Joanne (6) and James (4).

Richard Mann's longevity as a Browns' receivers coach brings a level of continuity to the Browns' receiver corps. Mann, whose forte is developing young receivers, will parlay the talents of seven-year veteran and Pro Bowler Mark Carrier (unrestricted free agent, Tampa) as mentor to his youthful group of Michael Jackson, Lawyer Tillman, Rico Smith, Keenan McCardell and Patrick Rowe.

Originally hired in 1985 by former Browns' Head Coach Marty Schottenheimer, Mann, 46, describes his coaching mode as "demanding". He had begun developing receivers on the college and high school level a decade

before joining the NFL in 1982. Among the college players he helped advance is Miami standout WR-Mark Clayton at the University of Louisville. After that, Mann moved on to the pros with the Baltimore/Indianapolis Colts and maximized the Colts' receiving talent.

With the Colts, Mann worked under then-head coach Frank Kush, whom he played under, and later coached for, at Arizona State. At ASU, Mann was a three-year starter (first year at flanker) and caught 28 passes for 340 yards his final two seasons at tight end. After earning a B.S. degree in elementary education, Mann returned to his hometown high school (Aliquippa, Pa.) as a teacher and coach from 1970-73.

At ASU, Mann spent six years developing future NFLers like John Jefferson, Bruce Hardy and Jerry Bell. He then moved on to Louisville for two years, before joining Baltimore in 1982. He spent three seasons on that staff before coming to Cleveland in 1985.

Richard and his wife, Karen, have four children: Deven (15), Richard (13), Mario (11) and Brittany (5), and reside in Shaker Heights.

John Mitchell, who coaches defensive tackles like Pro Bowler Michael Dean Perry, James Jones and Bill Johnson, marks his third year with the Browns. This season, three-time Pro-Bowler Jerry Ball (acquired in a trade with the Detroit Lions prior to the '93 NFL Draft), will add a new dimension to the Browns' defensive line up. Mitchell recruited Browns' former tight end Ozzie Newsome out of Muscle Shoals (Ala.) H.S. and coached him at Alabama under Paul "Bear" Bryant.

After coaching outside linebackers at LSU (1987-89) for three seasons, Mitchell was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1990, but retained the responsibilities for outside linebackers. He was instrumental in shaping the careers of All-SEC performers Eric Hill and Ron Sancho in 1987 and 1988. Mitchell served on the staffs of legendary coaches like Alabama's Bryant (1973-76) and former Arkansas' mentor Lou Holtz (1977-82), coaching the defensive lines for both. As special teams' coach, O'Brien's efforts have aided in developing the abilities of players like Randy Baldwin (22.5 yard avg. per KOR and voted special teams' MVP by the Cleveland TD Club in '92), and Eric Metcalf, whose speed and elusive style allowed him to break for a 75-yard punt return and touchdown in a 27-14 win vs. Chicago last season.

Prior to his four years at Pittsburgh, O'Brien coached linebackers and special teams at Wisconsin-Superior (1980-82), Nevada-Las Vegas (1983-85), and Rice (1986).

O'Brien, 36, was a defensive lineman at Wisconsin-Superior who also ran track and played hockey. Scott was signed by the Green Bay Packers (1979) and the Toronto Argonauts (1980). Nick Saban has coached football for half his youthful 42 years, including a two-year stint as secondary coach for the Houston Oilers. Saban's defense set five team records last season, including fewest TDs allowed (29); fewest rushing TDs allowed (5); fewest rushing yards allowed (1,065); most QB sacks (48); and most consecutive quarters not allowing a touchdown (14).

Nick was appointed head coach at the University of Toledo on December 22, 1989. In 1990, Saban's lone season as a head coach, the Rockets finished 9-2, including 7-1 in the Mid-American Conference. They were co-champions with Central Michigan, the only team to hand them a conference loss (13-12). Saban's Rockets finished five points shy of an undefeated season. Toledo's defense was ranked 12th in the nation, allowing just 284.8 yards per game; the Rockets gave up 16.2 points per game, 16th stingiest in the nation.

Before accepting the Toledo job, Saban tutored the Houston Oilers' secondary in 1988 and '89. In 1989, Houston finished (tied for) fourth in the AFC with 21 interceptions. In 1988, despite the holdouts of both starting cornerbacks (Patrick Allen and Steve Brown), the Oilers tied for second in the conference with 22 thefts.

Saban spent 15 years in successful college programs before joining the Oilers. From 1983-87, he was on George Perles' Michigan State staff. He joined the Spartans as secondary coach in 1983, and was given additional responsibilities as defensive coordinator in 1984 at the age of 33. In three of four years as coordinator, the Spartans earned bowl invitations, including the 1988 Rose Bowl, as the 9-2-1 Spartans defeated Southern Cal, 20-17, and led the nation in run defense (69.8 yards per game) and finished second in total defense (241 yards per game). Current Browns' safety Harlon Barnett was the starting right cornerback on that Michigan State squad as a sophomore.

Saban coached with Belichick's father, Steve, at the Naval Academy in 1982, tutoring the Midshipmen's defensive backs. From 1980-81, he was on Earle Bruce's Ohio State staff as secondary coach. Nick coached defensive backs at West Virginia from 1978-79 after tutoring defensive ends at Syracuse in 1977. He began his coaching career at Kent as a graduate assistant from 1973-74.

before taking over the Golden Flashes' linebackers in 1975 and 1976. In each of his collegiate posts, Nick was heavily involved with recruiting, especially in the Ohio area.

Saban played defensive back at Kent and helped lead the team to the 1972 Tangerine Bowl. He also played baseball for the Golden Flashes. Nick earned a bachelor's degree in secondary education and Master's degree (MED) in athletics, both from Kent. Saban is a graduate of Monongah (W. Va.) H.S.

Nick and his wife, Terry, have two children: Nicolas, 7, and Kristen, 3. The Sabans reside in Medina, O.

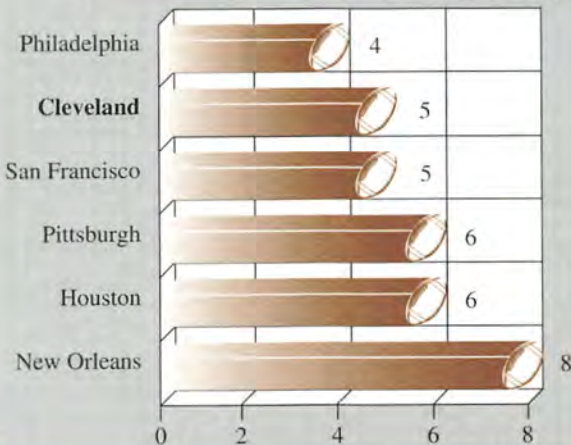

Mike Sheppard, named offensive assistant for the Cleveland Browns in '93, joins the pro ranks for the first time in his career, and will work closely with the tight ends. Most recently, Sheppard was offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at California (1992). The 41-year old Sheppard spent five-years at New Mexico as head coach (1987-91).

Among the players he has coached in his career, Sheppard's list includes Bob Gagliano, Todd Dillon, Frank Seurer and Terance Mathis. Mathis earned consensus All-America honors in 1989 and finished his career as the NCAA's all-time leading receiver with 264 catches for 4,254 yards before playing with the N.Y. Jets.

Prior to his role of head coach at New Mexico, Sheppard held the same position at Long Beach State for three years (1984-86), owning a 16-18 record. Other coaching experience included Kansas (offensive coordinator in '83), Long Beach State (quarterbacks' coach in '82), Idaho State

Simmons, formerly the strength coach at the New England Patriots for three years (1988-90), was a strength training site director at the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles. In 1978, he accepted a position as assistant strength coach and graduate assistant working with linebackers at Fort Hays (Kan.) State University. Although Simmons left coaching in 1979, he returned as an assistant strength coach at Clemson (1980). He moved to Rice University (1981-82) as the strength and conditioning coach and designed the school's first strength facility. From 1983-87, he held the position at the University of Southern California.

Simmons was graduated from Fort Hays State (1977) with a degree in physical education, where he played linebacker for two years. He acquired his Master's (1978) in secondary school and administration and physical education at his alma mater. Simmons began his collegiate playing career at Garden City, (Kan.) Junior College. Gary Tranquill, one of the first offensive coaches hired by head coach Bill Belichick in 1991, will work with two reunited Miami Hurricane alumni in '93: starting QB Bernie Kosar, who has taken the Browns to three AFC championship games, and Vinny Testaverde, an unrestricted free agent (Tampa Bay), who signed with the team last spring. Known for his teaching ability, Tranquill has a knack for developing young players and will get an opportunity to work with backups Todd Philcox and Brad Goebel.

Tranquill, 53, was most recently the quarterbacks' coach at the University of Virginia. His four years (1987-90) with the Cavaliers were nothing short of prolific. As play caller for high-powered Virginia, Gary's offense led the

Cavaliers to the nation's number one ranking for three consecutive weeks in 1990, and set an ACC mark by scoring over 50 points in four games.

Tranquill spent five seasons (1982-86) as head coach at the Naval Academy, where he compiled a 20-34-1 record. Gary succeeded George Welsh, who left to take over the Virginia head coaching job. One member of Tranquill's staff was Bill Belichick's father, Steve. Tranquill spent four seasons, from 1973-76, as the Midshipmen's quarterbacks and receivers' coach under Welsh.

Tranquill began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach in 1963 at Wittenberg, his alma mater, and then became a full-time assistant from 1965-69. In 1970, he accepted a post at Ball State, then took over as an assistant at Bowling Green (1971-72). Gary was appointed quarterbacks' and receivers' coach at Navy in 1973. He coached under Woody Hayes at Ohio State from 1977-78, then accepted an assistants' job at West Virginia under Don Nehlen (1979-81). Tranquill served one season as defensive coordinator and two years as offensive coordinator. He helped groom quarterback Oliver Luck before returning to Navy in 1982 as head coach.

A 1962 graduate of Wittenberg with a degree in physical education, Gary obtained his Master's in secondary school administration. He won four letters in both football and baseball, played on two Ohio Conference baseball championship teams and two NCAA regional winners. In 1960, his junior year, Tranquill earned the Ohio Conference's top football player award, and was inducted into the Wittenberg Athletic Hall of Fame in 1986. Gary was inducted into the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame last May. He was graduated from Avella (Pa.) H.S.

Gary and his wife, Shirley, have two children, Kari (28), who lives in Baltimore with their first grandson, Wesley Barnes (1); and Christopher (25), a Naval Academy graduate stationed in Norfolk, Va.

Woody Widenhofer, who joined the Browns as linebackers' coach after serving four years as defensive coordinator for the Detroit Lions, gained notoriety as the Pittsburgh Steelers' defensive coordinator. His 11-year career with the Steelers began in 1973. During his tenure, Pittsburgh won four Super Bowl championships, and Woody coached high-calibre players like Pro Football Hall of Famers' Joe Greene, Mel Blount and the "two Jacks"-- Lambert and Ham.

Wayne Fontes named Widenhofer as his successor (1989-92) to the defensive coordinator position when Fontes moved to head coach of the Lions. Detroit went from NFC Central Division champions with a 12-4 record and a divisional playoff berth in 1991 (defeating Dallas 38-6) and losing to the Washington Redskins (41-10) in the championship game, then suffered setbacks last season after a series of unfortunate losses to their personnel (the career-ending injury to G Mike Utley in '91 and the untimely deaths of defensive backs' coach Len Fontes and G Eric Andolsek prior to the '92 season).

Widenhofer returned to his alma mater (1985-88) as head coach before going to Detroit. He was named head coach of the USFL's Oklahoma Outlaws in 1984. At Pittsburgh (1973-83), Widenhofer coached three All-Pro linebackers (Jack Ham, Andy Russell and Jack Lambert) on the famous "Steel Curtain" defense. Defensive backs were added to his linebacker coaching duties (1978) before being named defensive coordinator in 1979. He assumed the assistant head coaching duties for his final two seasons (1982-83) with the club.

The Missouri graduate began his coaching career on the high school level in the Detroit area as an assistant at Holy Redeemer H.S. (1965) and the head coach at Nativity H.S. (1966-68). Widenhofer coordinated the freshman program and coached the defensive line at Michigan State (1969-70). He then went to Eastern Michigan as defensive coordinator (1971), whose program produced a perfect 11-0 record and ranked third nationally. He coached linebackers at Minnesota (1972) before going to the Steelers.

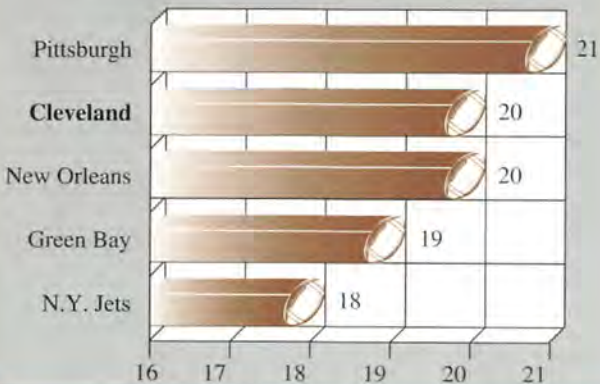

Michael Lombardi, recently promoted to Player Personnel Director, oversees college scouting and pro personnel. His first job in football as defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas, launched a career that led him quickly to the NFL. This offseason, Lombardi was credited by the Browns' front office for his tireless efforts in securing Jerry Ball, a three-time Pro Bowler (1989-91), in a trade with the Detroit Lions prior to the '93 NFL Draft.

During his tenure at UNLV (1982-83), Lombardi's expertise on evaluating collegiate talent caught the attention of the San Francisco 49ers, who were so impressed that they offered him a scouting position in 1984. He coordinated all scouting reports in addition to scrutinizing collegiate talent in the northeast, southwest and western regions.

His evaluation techniques and knowledge of the game led to an offer to join the Browns' scouting staff in 1987. Two years later, in May of 1989, he was named pro personnel director before his 30th birthday.

Lombardi, 34, is recognized as one of the NFL's youngest and brightest talent evaluators. His observations were extremely helpful to Bill Belichick when he became head coach of the Browns in 1991. According to Belichick, "Michael never looks at notes," and mentally carries an encyclopedia of extensive player personnel knowledge.

In addition to scouting and coordinating the college and pro personnel department, Mike assists in contract negotiations. He is an advocate of the "black box" device, a sophisticated method the Browns use to test a player's agility and speed in the 40. A native of Ocean City, N.J., Lombardi lettered in both football and baseball at Valley Forge Military Academy (Wayne, Pa.). He attended Hofstra University (1978-81), where he played nose tackle for the Flying Dutchmen.

Lombardi, an avid baseball and basketball fan, and his wife, Millie, reside in Broadview Heights with their two children: Michael (4) and Matthew (2).

IT'S A FACT

Ozzie Newsome, whose distinguished 13-year career as a premier tight end for the Browns, is close to a "sure lock" for enshrinement in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Newsome brings the same football savvy, dedication and commitment to his new responsibilities in pro personnel as he did to his playing career. Ozzie's duties include analysis of pro talent, detailed studies on certain positions and players and acquisition of talent. Throughout the season, he's called upon to tutor the receiving corps plus help with offensive game plans. On game day, Ozzie is on the sidelines working closely with Bill Belichick and the assistant coaches.

Newsome is the NFL's all-time leading pass-catching tight end and top receiver in Browns' history with 662 receptions for 7,980 yards. Ozzie ended his career as the fourth-leading receiver in league annals. He earned three trips to the Pro Bowl (1981, 1984-85) and was a four-time winner of the Cleveland Touchdown Club's Offensive Player of the Year Award (1978, 1981, 1983 and 1984). His consecutive game reception streak of 150 is the second longest in NFL history. He was named to the All-NFL Team of the 80's (second team) in addition to numerous All-NFL and All-AFC honors.

A QUICK LOOK AT OZZIE NEWSOME'S PLAYING CAREER

- * The NFL's all-time leading pass catching tight end with 662 receptions for 7,980 yards.

Winner of the 1990 Byron "Whizzer" White Award for his community involvement, Newsome is widely known as a willing volunteer for charitable causes. Ozzie and his wife, Gloria, make their home in Orange Village with their son Michael Ryan (1).

BELICHICK ON OZZIE NEWSOME: "Looking around and analyzing the problem areas, I looked at different people who could contribute productively to our offense. The more I looked, the more I didn't see anybody who could contribute anywhere close to what Ozzie can."

Dom Anile, entering his third year as Director of College Scouting, supervises and directs the Browns' scouting staff in preparation for the NFL draft. Anile brings a wealth of knowledge to his position, having scouted colleges for eight seasons as a member of the Browns' personnel department prior to his appointment as director.

Ron Marciniak, who spent ten years scouting for the Dallas Cowboys (1982-91), joined the Browns' personnel staff in 1992. He spent two years as a member of the CFL scouting combine (1985-86) and offensive coordinator of the CFL Toronto Argonauts (1986-89). He helped lead the Argonauts to three league titles in four seasons. His 1988 team set a CFL total offense record.

After his pro tenure, Rainsberger returned to collegiate competition in 1989 at Toledo to work as offensive line coach. In 1990, he worked for head coach Nick Saban, now the Browns' defensive coordinator. The 1990 Rockets were MAC champions with a 7-1 mark (9-2 overall). Over the years, Bill and his staff have gained a reputation as one of the top training staffs in the league. Last seasons' hard work paid off with courageous - and unexpected - comebacks by veterans Mark Bavaro (knee) and Lawyer Tillman (ankle).

In 1989, Bill and his staff were honored as the "NFL's Athletic Training Staff of the Year" by the Professional Football Athletic Trainers' Society. With a tireless work ethic and a compassion for all, Bill personifies the type of person it takes to be successful in his ever-expanding field. It is no coincidence that the Browns advanced to the playoffs five of the past eight seasons, as Bill and his staff have helped Browns' players through a myriad of injuries, perhaps none as storied as the 1988 season, when Cleveland lost four quarterbacks to injuries.

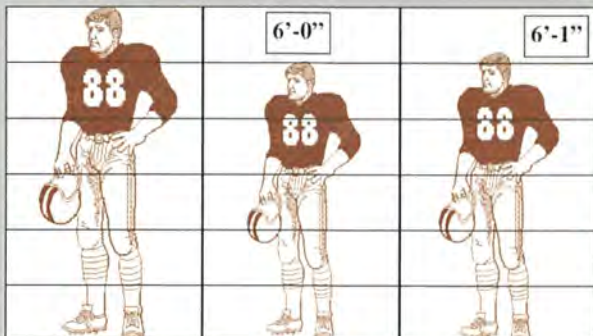

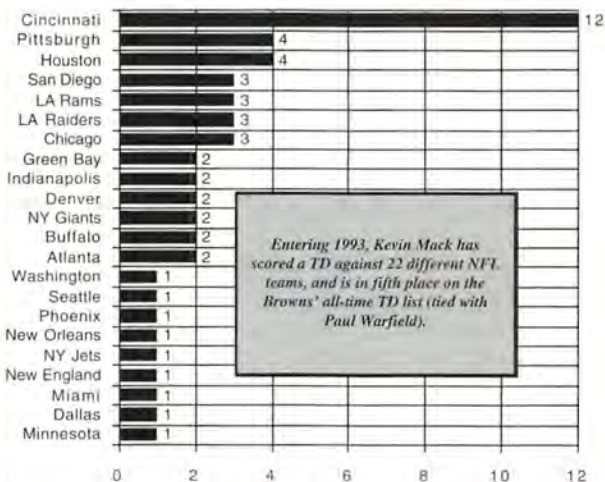

1990: When Eric returned to the starting lineup at running back for the final seven games, he averaged 4.6 yards per carry (42 for 192); for the first nine games, he averaged 1.5 (38 for 56 yards)...Finished season with career-high 1,752 all-purpose yards, the most by a Brown since Greg Pruitt had 1,798 in 1975...Average of 9.27 per attempt snapped the Browns' all-time record, set by Bobby Mitchell (9.25) in 1961...Rushed 80 times for 248 yards, caught 57 passes (second on club and third among AFC RBs) for 452 yards, and snapped Browns' single-season kickoff return marks with 52 for 1,052 yards (set in 1979 by Dino Hall)...Two TDs on KORs led NFL, and 20.2 avg. was eighth in AFC...Lost three of Browns' team record eight fumbles at Pitt. 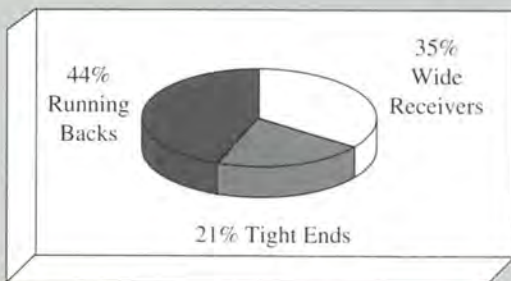

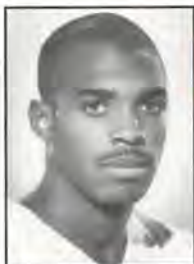

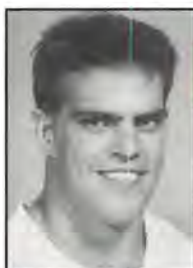

The Browns suffered a disappointing loss in the season opener, as the Colts recorded 11 QB sacks and limited Cleveland to a field goal in the 14-3 loss. The defeat was Cleveland's second straight opening day setback, while the Colts won their first opener since 1983. Ex-Browns' LB Chip Banks recorded four QB sacks and an interception to lead the Indy defense. RB Rodney Culver scored on a one-yard run to give the Colts a 7-0 first quarter lead. K Matt Stover missed a 38-yard field goal attempt at the end of the first half to keep the Browns off the scoreboard, but on the opening kickoff of the second half, Barry Wilburn recovered an Ashley Ambrose fumble, and Stover converted a 20-yarder to make the score 7-3. On the Colts' next possession, QB Mark Herrmann, subbing for injured Jeff George, completed a 26-yard TD pass to ex-Browns' WR Reggie Langhorne to make the score 14-3. That score held for the remainder of the game, as Kosar was sacked five more times, upping the total to 11, which tied a Browns' team record set in 1984. Cleveland was able to generate only 145 total net yards, the Colts only 236.

(2) Monday, Sept. 14 - Miami 27, Cleveland 23 (74,765) at Cleveland Stadium. The Browns came close to pulling off their biggest come-from-behind win in 26 years, but Dan Marino snatched away a 27-23 victory in a wild finish. Down 20-3 with 11:49 remaining in the game, QB Bernie Kosar, playing on a fractured ankle suffered in the first half (unbeknownst to him) led the Browns on an eight-play, 80-yard drive including a fourth-down, six-yard TD pass to WR Michael Jackson. On the Dolphins' ensuing possession, LB Mike Johnson pried the ball loose from Mark Higgs on Miami's 32-yard line, and LB David Brandon picked up the fumble and raced 32 yards for a touchdown to close the gap to 20-17, Miami, with 6:39 remaining. After forcing a punt, Cleveland gained possession with 3:59 left and Kosar led a nine-play, 77-yard march that ended in a Mark Bavaro three-yard TD catch, giving Cleveland a three point lead, 23-20 (K Matt Stover hit the left upright on the PAT attempt). The Dolphins started their final drive on their own 16 with 1:15 remaining, and Marino drove them 84 yards in five plays, including a major roughing the passer penalty, as Higgs rammed one yard for the winning TD with seven seconds remaining. Marino completed 25 of 35 passes for 322 yards and one TD, while the gutty Kosar completed 19 of 28 passes for 230 yards and two TDs. Jackson led all receivers with five receptions for 98 yards and a TD.

(3) Sunday, Sept. 20 - Browns 28, LA Raiders 16 (48,102) at LA Coliseum. The Browns capitalized on five Raiders' turnovers, and RB Eric Metcalf had a spectacular four-touchdown performance as the Browns ripped the Raiders 28-16 for their first win of the season. Todd Philcox, subbing for injured Bernie Kosar (fractured ankle), threw three TD passes and no interceptions in his first NFL start. Metcalf's four TDs were the most by a Brown since Leroy Kelly vs. the Giants on 12/1/68, and tied for the most in the 1992 NFL season, with Buffalo's Thurman Thomas. Unbelievably, Philcox suffered a fractured right thumb in the first half after jamming it against Aundrey Bruce's helmet; yet for the second straight week, the Browns' starter played the entire game with the injury, only to have Monday's x-rays tell the grim story. The injury forced Philcox to miss the next eight weeks. Metcalf totaled 177 yards receiving and three TDs, with the yardage total representing the fifth most in team history, while three TD receptions tied the club record, last accomplished by Calvin Hill vs. Baltimore in 1978. The Browns sacked Marinovich six times for 41 yards, intercepted him three times, and witnessed "the other Todd" throw 59 passes, shattering the team mark held by Tampa Bay's Doug Williams against Cleveland in 1980. Vince Newsome intercepted two passes, and Clay Matthews one. The win was Cleveland's second straight over the Raiders, and their second consecutive west coast victory.

(4) Sunday, Sept. 27 - Broncos 12, Browns 0 (78,064) at Cleveland Stadium. Denver's Jeff Treadwell kicked four field goals as the visiting Denver Broncos shutout the Browns, 12-0, in a defensive struggle. The Broncos penetrated Cleveland's 20 four times and converted all four opportunities, although they never got into the end zone. Conversely, Cleveland drove past Denver's 20 three times, yet were unable to muster any points. Denver opened the scoring on their first drive on Treadwell's 23-yarder, and the injury-riddled Browns, led by their third starting quarterback in as many weeks, Mike Tomczak (nine of 19 for 75 yards and two interceptions), drove to Denver's 33, but were stopped on a fourth-and-one. On the Broncos' next possession, LB David Brandon intercepted John Elway's (10 of 17 for 157 yards and one interception) second-quarter pass at the Browns' 20-yard line. Cleveland marched to Denver's four-yard line and a field goal attempt, but holder Brian Hansen could not handle the snap from center cleanly. Hansen flipped the ball to K Matt Stover, who tossed a desperation pass into the arms of Denver's Steve Atwater. The Broncos intercepted Tomczak on consecutive third quarter possessions, which led to two more Treadwell three-pointers, and Denver iced the win with a fourth-quarter 12-play, 94-yard drive that ate up 7:44 of the final period, as Treadwell hit his fourth and final field goal, from 20 yards. Cleveland did not allow a sack for the second straight game (and 10 straight quarters) and was able to get to Elway five times. The loss dropped the Browns to 1-3, while Denver's mark improved to 3-1.

(5) Sunday, Oct. 11 - Browns 17, Steelers 9 (78,080) at Cleveland Stadium. The Browns defeated the visiting Pittsburgh Steelers, 17-6, behind 14 second-half points, in the 85th meeting between the long-time rivals. Cleveland's defense, which had not allowed a TD in its last nine quarters, limited the Steelers to three Gary Anderson field goals. QB Mike Tomczak, utilizing play action effectively, connected on 10 of 17 passes for 171 yards and one TD, and rallied the Browns on TD drives of 90 and 65 yards in the second half. Pittsburgh dominated the first half in terms of time of possession and total yardage, but were able to muster only two field goals (Anderson's 25 and 36-yarders). K Matt Stover booted a 51-yard field goal late in the second quarter to pull Cleveland within three, 6-3, at the half. In the third quarter, the Browns gained possession of the ball on their own 10 yard line, and drove 90 yards in nine plays, 62 of those yards on the ground (45 by Eric Metcalf), culminating in a Kevin Mack one-yard TD dive, to give the Browns a 10-6 lead. After Anderson hit his third field goal to make the score 10-9, Cleveland marched 65 yards in six plays, capped when Tomczak hit a wide-open Michael Jackson for a 47-yard pass with 10:32 remaining. On Pittsburgh's next drive, Cleveland stopped Barry Foster on fourth-and-one to regain possession. Pittsburgh's final offensive opportunity resulted in the Browns' only forced turnover of the game, as LB Mike Johnson stripped Merrill Hoge of the football, and S Stevon Moore recovered the fumble and advanced it 25 yards to seal the win for the Browns. Cleveland upped their record to 2-3, 1-0 in the AFC Central, and the Steelers dropped to 3-2, 1-1 in the division.

The Browns evened their record at 3-3, and won their third game in their last four, with a 17-6 triumph over the visiting Green Bay Packers. FB Kevin Mack scored two touchdowns on runs of four and five yards, and led all ball carriers with 75 yards on 19 rushes. The second TD was the 50th of his career, good for seventh place on the Browns' all-time TD list, one ahead of Ozzie Newsome. QB Mike Tomczak completed 13 of 21 passes for 158 yards, did not throw an interception and was not sacked. Tomczak was eight of nine for 107 yards in the second half. The Browns opened the game with a 61-yard, 17-play march that ended with a Matt Stover 26-yard field goal. The Packers knotted the score at 3-3 on their opening second-half drive on a Chris Jacke 44-yard field goal, but the Browns countered with a 73-yard, seven-play drive, capped by Mack's first TD. Browns jumped to an early 9-0 lead on three Matt Stover field goals on their first three possessions. Cleveland's defense surrendered their first TD in 14 quarters with 35 ticks remaining on the second-quarter clock, when Hugh Millen completed a 19-yard pass over the middle to Kevin Turner. The Patriots took a 14-9 lead when Millen found Ben Coates all alone for a 22-yard score in the third period, and Charlie Baumann booted a 30-yard field goal to give the winless Pats a 17-9 cushion. LB Mike Johnson recorded a game-high 20 tackles, including two sacks and recovered the fumble that led to the winning score. (9) Sunday, Nov. 8 - **Browns 24, Oilers 14 (57,348) at The Astrodome.** The Browns scored a convincing 24-14 win over AFC Central rival Houston behind a strong defensive effort. Cleveland limited the Oilers' attack to 273 yards, including only 55 in the first half. The Browns forced the Oilers to go "three and out" in seven straight drives, and in nine of their 12 possessions. Houston starting QB Warren Moon completed 12 of 25 passes for 70 yards, and did not throw a TD, while his back-up, Cody Carlson, was nine of 11 for 111 yards - all in the fourth quarter after Cleveland held a 17-0 lead. Browns' P Brian Hansen pinned four of his five punts inside the Houston 20, and Houston did not cross their own 40-yard line in eight of their 12 drives. Tomczak (17 of 26 for 219 yards and two TDs, with no INTs for a 117.3 QB rating), completed a second quarter 46-yard scoring pass to RB Leroy Hoard to give Cleveland a 10-0 lead. S Stevon Moore picked up the loose ball and rambled 73 yards for a TD to give Cleveland a 17-0 lead. It was the second longest fumble return in Browns' history (89 yards by Don Paul, 11-10-57 vs. Pittsburgh). Carlson relieved Moon in the fourth quarter and completed a 12-yard scoring pass to ex-Brown Webster Slaughter, but Cleveland countered with a 12-play, 74-yard drive capped by a Tomczak to Mark Bavaro 17-yard touchdown. Carlson completed the scoring by hitting Givins for a 18-yard TD pass with six seconds remaining.

(10) Sunday, Nov. 15 - **Chargers 14, Browns 13 (58,396) at Cleveland Stadium.** Three costly turnovers, one leading to a Charger touchdown and another to end the potential game-winning drive, proved to be the downfall for the Browns, as they dropped a 14-13 decision to San Diego in snowy Cleveland Stadium. Cleveland overcame a 7-3 fourth quarter deficit on a Mike Tomczak to Michael Jackson 24-yard TD pass that culminated a 99-yard drive, and then a 28-yard Matt Stover field goal staked them to a 13-7 lead with under five minutes remaining. But San Diego marched 72 yards in six plays and Stan Humphries hit Anthony Miller on a 45-yard scoring strike for a 14-13 lead with two minutes remaining. The Browns countered by moving the ball from their own 20 to mid-field before Eric Metcalf was stripped of the ball by Darren Carrington after a 13-yard reception with 52 seconds left, clinching the Chargers' fifth victory in their last six games. Tomczak threw for a career-high 322 yards (his third career 300-yard game) by completing 18 of 32 passes (over 10 yards per attempt), a touchdown and two interceptions. WR Lawyer Tillman recorded his first career 100-yard game (eight for 148 yards), Frank Minnifield recorded his first interception since 1990, and Mike Johnson recovered a Ronnie Harmon fumble, caused by Stevon Moore, leading to Stover's final field goal. Ernie Logan blocked a San Diego field goal attempt in the second quarter. The loss dropped Cleveland to 5-5, third in the AFC Central behind 7-3 Pittsburgh and 6-4 Houston.

The Browns let costly mistakes chip away at a 13-0 halftime lead as the Minnesota Vikings escaped with a 17-13 victory in the Metrodome, despite being clearly outplayed. The Browns had a 13-3 advantage starting the fourth quarter, behind a Kevin Mack TD run and two Matt Stover field goals (all in the first half), but the Vikings scored two touchdowns within 30 seconds to take a 17-13 lead. After commandeering field position the first three quarters, the Browns suffered a critical personal foul following a punt return that gave Minnesota the ball at Cleveland's 27, leading to a Sean Salisbury three-yard TD pass to make the score 13-10. Salisbury (four for 12, 30 yards) was subbing for starter Rich Gannon (five for 12, 26 yards, two interceptions). On the next offensive play, QB Todd Philcox (subbing for Mike Tomeczak) threw a pass that bounced off TE Mark Bavaro and into the hands of CB Audray McMillian who raced 25 yards for the winning TD. It was McMillian's third interception on the day, setting a Vikings' record and tying the mark against Cleveland. It was also Minnesota's record-tying seventh defensive touchdown of the year. Statistically, the Browns dominated: Minnesota threw for only 62 net yards and rushed for 89. Total yardage was 275 for Cleveland, 141 for the Vikes. Time of possession was in favor of the Browns, 35:16 to 24:44.

The Browns suffered a 24-14 setback to the Detroit Lions in the Pontiac Silverdome, dropping their record to 7-7, and their all-time regular season mark vs. Detroit to 3-11. Detroit QB Andre Ware, making his first NFL start since 1990 (and second of his career), completed 10 of 14 passes for 138 yards, two TDs and no INTs, for a 142.3 QB rating. (15) Sunday, Dec. 20 -- Oilers 17, Browns 14 (59,898) at Cleveland Stadium. The Browns were eliminated from playoff contention by surrendering 14 unanswered fourth-quarter points to the Houston Oilers in a 17-14 heartbreaking loss. Houston started their winning drive with 1:51 left, and on a second and 23, Carlson threw a screen pass to Lorenzo White, who rambled 65 yards to Cleveland's 12. Two plays later, Carlson hit Ernest Givins on a three-yard scoring pass for a 17-14 lead. Cleveland scored TDs on their opening drives of each half, as QB Bernie Kosar (17 of 26 for 140 yards, two TDs, three INTs and no sacks), threw scoring passes to two unlikely targets: RB Ron Wolfley on a two-yarder and DT James Jones on a one-yard lob. Jones was lined up as a blocking back on a second down and short. The Oilers' Al Del Greco kicked a 47-yard field goal in the second quarter, while Matt Stover missed a 42-yard attempt wide right at the end of the first half. Cleveland sacked Carlson (19 of 34, 248 yards) six times, forced two interceptions and recovered a fumble. The Browns did not turn the ball over, and held a 4:34 time of possession advantage.

(16) Sunday, Dec. 27 - Steelers 23, Browns 13 (53,776) at Three Rivers Stadium. The Browns closed the season with a 23-13 loss to the AFC Central champion Pittsburgh Steelers, ending their season at 7-9. RB Barry Foster became the first back to rush for 100 yards against the Browns in 1992, marking his NFL record-tying 12th 100-yard rushing game of the season (matching Eric Dickerson's 1984 performance). Foster gained 103 of the Steelers' 105 rushing yards, and scored the first TD of the game on a seven-yard run in the first quarter, capping a 13-play, 80-yard drive. Matt Stover kicked the first of two 22-yard field goals after a 17-play, 90-yard drive in the second quarter, but the Steelers scored 10 points in the half's final 30 seconds. Following a 29-yard return on a short kickoff, the Steelers scored on a Bobby Brister (18 of 25, 223 yards, one TD) to Tim Jordan two-yard pass. On the ensuing kickoff, Leroy Hoard's second effort resulted in a lost fumble, and the Steelers drove 32 yards to set up a Gary Anderson 26-yard field goal at the end of the half, giving Pittsburgh a 17-3 lead. Mike Tomczak (eight of 15 for 141 yards) replaced injured QB Bernie Kosar (fractured ankle) at the start of the second half and his first pass was a 38-yard scoring strike to Michael Jackson to close the lead to 17-10. Anderson kicked a 29-yard field goal in the third quarter, Stover another 22-yarder, before Anderson's 28-yarder that sealed the win by knocking off the left upright and through with 2:35 left gave Pittsburgh the 23-13 lead. Cleveland sacked Brister five times to set a team mark of 48 QB sacks on the season, one by LB Clay Matthews, who tied Lou Groza's team mark of 216 games played, and increased his all-time QB sack record to 71. By holding the Steelers to two TDs, the Browns set a new club mark for fewest TDs allowed in a 16-game season (29). The loss was the Browns' third in a row, and evened their division mark at 3-3.

BROWNS' HISTORY

- 1946:** Browns were started by owner Arthur (Mickey) McBride as member of the All American Football Conference, Paul Brown was named coach and general manager and the first player he signed was then tailback Otto Graham. The Browns won the Western title with a 42-17 victory over the Buffalo Bisons and then defeated the New York Yankees in the championship game (14-9).
- 1947-49:** Browns continued their domination of the AAFC, winning three more championships.
- 1950:** Following the merger of the AAFC and the NFL, the Browns tied with the New York Giants with 10-2 records for a share of Eastern title. Browns won playoff, 8-3, and then stopped Los Angeles, 30-28, for the championship.
- 1951-53:** Browns won three consecutive Eastern titles, but lost each time in the league's title match, once to Los Angeles and twice to Detroit. In 1953, McBride sold the club to an organization headed by David Jones.
- 1954-55:** Led by quarterback Otto Graham, the Browns won back-to-back NFL championships, defeating Detroit and Los Angeles.
- 1956:** At 5-7, the Browns suffered first losing season.
- 1957:** Jim Brown was drafted; was named rookie of the year and helped Cleveland to Eastern Division title.
- 1961:** Former television and advertising executive Art Modell purchased the Browns for the then unheard of sum of \$4 million.
- 1963:** Blanton Collier, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach.
- 1964:** Browns win division title with 52-20 victory over Giants and captured NFL championship with 27-0 win over Colts.
- 1965:** In his last season, Jim Brown won NFL MVP honors and led Cleveland to NFL title game where they were defeated by Green Bay.
- 1966:** An eighth round pick from 1964, Leroy Kelly became the club's dominant threat, rushing for 1,141 yards, but the Browns finished second in their division to Dallas.
- 1968:** With newly acquired quarterback Bill Nelsen (from Pittsburgh), Browns won division; beat Dallas in playoffs and lost to Baltimore in the championship.
- 1969:** Browns won third consecutive division crown, but lost to Minnesota in title game.
- 1970:** Browns became members of AFC Central and finished second. The Browns beat the New York Jets on Monday Night Football's first-ever telecast.
- 1971:** Nick Skorich, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach. Team won first AFC Central crown.
- 1972:** Browns once again gained postseason, losing to eventual champion Miami in playoffs, 20-14, as Dolphins complete undefeated season.
- 1975-77:** Forrest Gregg, Browns' offensive line coach, becomes head coach; Greg Pruitt has three consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons; Dick Modzelewski coaches final game of 1977.
- 1978:** Sam Rutigliano becomes the first non-Browns' assistant to gain head coaching position. Team won first three on way to 8-8 finish.
- 1979:** Losses in final two games prevented team from entering playoffs, finishing 9-7; Mike Pruitt keeps the tradition of outstanding Browns' running backs and has the first of three straight 1,000-yard seasons.
- 1980:** Browns win AFC Central title with 11-5 record; lost to eventual Super Bowl champion Oakland in playoff; Brian Sipe is consensus MVP of league.
- 1982:** In strike-shortened season, Browns finish eighth in AFC (4-5) and gain playoffs second time in three years. Lost to Raiders in Super Bowl Tournament.
- 1983:** Browns tied for wild-card playoff spot with 9-7 record, but lost NFL tie-breaking procedure to Denver and Seattle.
- 1984:** Browns replaced head coach Sam Rutigliano with defensive coordinator Marty Schottenheimer after a 1-7 midseason record and finished season at 5-11. TE Ozzie Newsome caught 89 passes for second straight year.
- 1985:** Browns captured their third Central Division championship, but lost to Dolphins, 24-21, in Miami. Rookie Kevin Mack (1,104) and Earnest Byner (1,002) each gained 1,000 yards rushing. It marked the third time in 66-year history of NFL that teammates both rushed for over 1,000 yards in the same season.

- 1986:** Browns won more games than ever before during regular season, as they roll-up a 12-4 record en route to their second consecutive AFC Central crown. In a double-overtime playoff thriller before a packed Cleveland Stadium crowd, Bernie Kosar throws for an NFL-record 487 yards as the Browns beat the New York Jets, 23-20, to advance to the AFC championship game. The Browns lose to Denver, also in overtime, 23-20.
- 1987:** Browns capture their third straight AFC Central, as they finished the season 10-5. The third week of the NFL season was cancelled due to the 24-day players' strike, while three "replacement" games were played (the Browns went 2-1). The Browns defeated the Colts, 38-21, at Cleveland Stadium in the AFC playoffs, then drop their second straight AFC Championship to Denver despite a spectacular come-from-behind bid that saw them score 30 second-half points, only to fall, 38-33 in Mile High Stadium. Bernie Kosar wins the AFC passing title with a 95.4 QB rating, and an NFL-high eight Browns make the Pro Bowl.
- 1988:** Cleveland finishes 10-6 and earns a Wild Card berth by defeating Houston, 28-33, in the season finale by overcoming a 16-point third-quarter deficit. Houston defeats the Browns, 24-23, in the Wild Card game played on Christmas Eve. Four Cleveland quarterbacks suffered injuries during the course of the season. Marty Schottenheimer resigns on Dec. 27.
- 1989:** Owner Art Modell announces Bud Carson as the Browns' seventh full-time head coach on January 27. The Browns win their fourth division title in five years with a 9-6-1 record, and advance to the playoffs for an AFC-high fifth straight season. Browns advance to third title game in four years by defeating Buffalo, 34-30, but lose to Denver, 37-21, at Mile High Stadium in AFC Championship.
- 1990:** Browns suffer worst season in franchise history, finishing 3-13. Jim Shofner replaces Bud Carson as interim head coach on November 5.
- 1991-92:** Owner Art Modell announces Bill Belichick as the eighth full-time head coach on February 5, 1991. Browns move into new training and administrative complex, located in Berea, Ohio, in August, 1991 and hold training camp there in July, 1992. Browns finish 6-10 and 7-9, respectively.

GLOSSARY OF MEDICAL TERMS

A.C. Joint—Acromioclavicular joint; joint of the shoulder where acromion process (of the scapula) and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.

Abscess—An infection which produces pus; can be the result of a blister, callus, penetrating wound or laceration.

Anterior—In front of; the front surface.

Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL)—Ligament of knee attaching to anterior tibial plateau and posterior medial aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from coming forward.

Arthrogram—X-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected in affected area (to show torn cartilage or rotator cuff tears).

Brachial Plexus—Network of nerves originating from the cervical vertebrae running down into the arm.

Burner—Common term for brachial plexus trauma in the neck. Usually results in burning or tingling sensation into the shoulder or arm when the neck is forced beyond the normal range of motion.

Capsule—An enclosing structure which surrounds the joint and contains ligaments which stabilize that joint.

Cartilage—Smooth, slippery substance preventing two ends of bones from rubbing together and grating.

Disc—A flat, round-like, plate structure usually referring to cartilage between vertebrae.

Echymosis—Bleeding into the surface tissue below the skin, resulting in a "black and blue" effect.

Effusion—Accumulation of fluid, or the fluid itself, in various spaces in the body. Commonly found in the knee following injury.

Epicondylitis—Inflammation in the elbow due to overuse of either the flexor or extensor muscles attaching to the medial or lateral epicondyle of the humerus.

Fibula—The smaller of the two bones in the lower leg, located to the outside.

Fracture—Breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, incomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.

Humerus—Bone of the upper arm.

Inferior—Lower, beneath, toward the bottom.

Lateral—To the outside of the body.

Lateral Collateral Ligament (LCL)—Ligament of knee attaching lateral femoral condyle and to fibula head. It provides lateral stability to the knee.

Medial—Pertaining to or near the middle.

Medial Collateral Ligament (MCL)—Ligament of knee along the medial aspect that connects the femur to the tibia. It provides stability to the medial aspect of the joint.

Meniscus—Crescent shaped cartilage usually pertaining to the knee joint.

Metacarpals—Five long bones of hand, just below fingers.

Metatarsals—Five long bones of foot, just below toes.

Neuritis—Inflammation of a nerve.

Patella—The kneecap.

Pectorals—Chest muscles beneath breast, leading up to shoulder.

Plantar—Pertaining to the sole of the foot.

Plica—A fold of tissue in the joint capsule and a common result of knee injury.

Posterior—At the back part, or rear of the body.

Posterior Cruciate Ligament (PCL)—Ligament of the knee attaching to posterior tibial plateau and anterior lateral aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from going backward.

Quadricep (Quads)—The four powerful muscles in the front of the thigh, responsible for extending the knee joint.

Rotator Cuff—Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area: supraspinatus, infraspinatus, teres minor, and subscapularis. Often irritated by overuse.

S-C Joint—Sternoclavicular joint; articulation between the sternum and the clavicle.

Scapula—The shoulder blade.

Sciatic Nerve—Largest nerve in body located in back of leg which controls most of its function.

Sprain—A joint injury. A violent twisting, stretching, pulling or tearing of a ligament.

Strain—A muscle injury. The pulling or twisting of a muscle or tendon.

Superior—In anatomy, the upper of the two parts; toward the top or above.

Triceps—Muscle of the posterior upper arm, opposite the biceps, that extends the elbow.

Ulnar Nerve—Nerve in the elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing or repeated trauma.

CLEVELAND STADIUM

Cleveland Stadium, a famous and proud landmark for this city, is the nation's largest facility housing both a Major League baseball team and an NFL franchise. The Stadium, with a current capacity of 78,512, was completed in July of 1931 at a cost of \$3.5 million.

A \$6,000,000 improvement program was completed recently, comprised of a new scoreboard (including sideboards that continuously update out-of-town scores), a new sound system, 47 color TV monitors located within the concourse, renovation of concession stands and upgraded restroom facilities, new rooflights, and replacement of all original electrical transformers, and new bleacher seating.

The Stadium, which sits on a landfill, has proved to be multi-purpose. Along with baseball and football, the range of activities at the Stadium has included everything from a heavyweight championship bout (Schmeling vs. Stribling) to religious convocations. The Metropolitan Opera and the Beatles have performed on the field, as have circuses, rodeos, big bands, tractor pulls, and a horde of professional and amateur athletes. In 1991, a Hollywood film crew used Cleveland Stadium as the setting for the television movie, "The Babe Ruth Story."

Over the years, the Stadium became a financial strain for the city of Cleveland. Art Modell responded to the need in 1974, when he formed Cleveland Stadium Corporation and signed a 25-year lease with the city. When the agreement between the city and Modell was first reached in 1974, the Browns' owner promised a \$10 million improvement plan, which was concluded in 1984.

Those original improvements included the addition of 108 luxurious loges, a computerized scoreboard, more comfortable seats, new concession facilities, a new lighting system (both inside and around the perimeter of the Stadium), the installation of a new playing field, which was lowered two feet to provide a better view from the stands (1976), a new football pressbox elevator and many structural steel repairs.

Since 1984, additional improvements continue to be made as needed. Including the scoreboard mentioned above, over \$18 million has been invested in the building since 1974.

Former Cleveland Mayor (and current Governor) George Voinovich gives Modell and the Stadium staff the credit for saving the Stadium. "If the city had held onto the Stadium, it probably would be closed today," Voinovich said. (Cleveland Press, 3/28/80).

CLEVELAND BROWNS' TRAINING AND ADMINISTRATIVE COMPLEX



The Browns' state-of-the-art facility was built specifically for training a professional football team. Situated on 10 acres of land in Berea, OH, the Browns' campus comprises an administration building of 76,000 sq. ft., a field house of 60,000 sq. ft., and a field maintenance building. There are five natural grass fields outside and a 70-yard astro turf surface indoors. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held in May of 1990 and construction was completed by August of 1991.

The Browns' staff, previously housed in four separate buildings in the Cleveland area, now function under one roof for the first time since the early 1970s. Some of the training features include a 6,000 sq. ft. weight room, a 4,500 sq. ft. training room, including a Jacuzzi, a cold water plunge, three whirlpools, sauna, and a Swim-Ex pool, which provides a current of water for resistance. In addition to classrooms and a theater, there is a kitchen for training camp meal preparation. A half-court basketball surface, two racquetball courts, and locker rooms for the staff complete the football operation.

A television studio, several private interview rooms, and a working press room overlooking the fields are media-related features of the facility.

QB BERNIE KOSAR ON THE 1993 BROWNS: "I think this is the best this team has looked in the last four or five years, and I think we should be pretty optimistic going into the season. 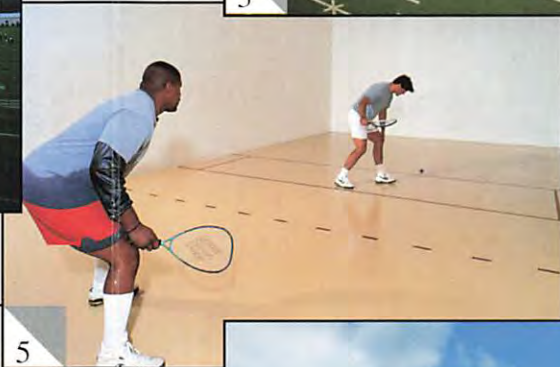

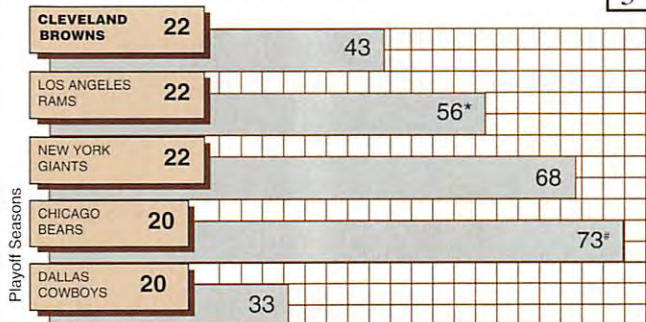
