## Arthur B. Modell

OWNER AND PRESIDENT

**Born:** June 23, 1925

Brooklyn, NY

**Purchased Browns:** March 21, 1961

35th Year Owning Browns

In his first 34 years of ownership of the Browns, Art Modell has seen his Browns play 20 playoffs games, including winning the NFL Championship in 1964, playing in three other league title games, plus appearances in three AFC Championship contests. High accomplishments for the man who heads the NFL's most successful franchise, but certainly not enough to satisfy the competitive Modell. "I want to go to the Super Bowl and win, and then I want to win more after that. That's what drives this franchise and me every day," Modell says.

Art continues with the same type of energy and daring that inspired him to buy the Browns at the age of 35 for what was then (March, 1961) an unheard of sum of \$4 million. His 35 years of service as owner of one of the NFL's most storied franchises has been highlighted by dedication, loyalty, accomplishment and a human touch, often enhanced by his sense of humor, which is so often missing in today's multi-million dollar professional sports' industry.

### HISTORY

- Dropped out of high school at the age of 15 to help financially-strapped family after the death of his father.
- First full-time job was as an electrician's helper, cleaning out the hulls of ships in a Brooklyn shipyard.
- Joined the Air Force in 1943 (at age 18).
- Under the G.I. Bill, he enrolled in a New York City television school following World War II.
- Produced one of the first regular daytime television shows in the nation.
- Joined the advertising business in 1954 and soon became a partner for the L.H. Hartman Company.

### FOOTBALL HISTORY

- Purchased Browns on March 21, 1961.
- His fourth team, the 1964 Browns, won the World Championship, beating the Baltimore Colts, 27-0.
- His 1965, 1968 and 1969 teams played in the NFL title games.
- His 1986, 1987 and 1989 teams lost memorable AFC Championship games to the Denver Broncos.
- His 1967, 1971, 1972, 1980, 1982, 1985, 1988 and 1994 teams also made the playoffs. In total, Modell's Browns have played in 20 playoff games in 15 different seasons. Only Dallas (22), the Raiders (18), the Vikings (18) and Rams (16) have fared better in Art's 34 years of ownership.
- In five other seasons - 1963, 1970, 1976, 1979 and 1983 - the Browns had a chance to make the playoffs on the final day of the season, but did not qualify.

### CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Only elected NFL President in league history, serving in that capacity in 1967, 1968 and 1969.
- Chairman of the NFL's Television Committee for 31 years. During his tenure, over 8.4 billion dollars in revenues were negotiated on behalf of the NFL.
- Chairman of the Owners' Labor Committee, which successfully negotiated the NFL's first collective bargaining agreement with the players in 1968.
- Served on the NFL-AFL Merger Committee, breaking the impasse for realignment of the two leagues by moving the Browns into the American Football Conference.

- Former Chairman of NFL Films and currently a member of the Finance Committee.
- Was an important participant in the negotiations with ABC to start Monday Night Football and then volunteered to host the first game in Cleveland in 1970.
- Volunteered the Browns to play in the first "second" Thanksgiving Day game at Dallas.
- Conceived and staged the first doubleheader in NFL history, which consisted of the Browns and three other teams playing back-to-back preseason games at Cleveland Stadium. From 1962 through 1971, the Browns hosted the annual doubleheader each August that drew over 800,000 fans in those 10 years.
- He is annually listed in *The Sporting News* "Top 100 Most Influential People" in sports (as high as 16 in 1992).

### COMMUNITY IMPACT

- President of the world-renowned Cleveland Clinic.
- Serves on the boards for Baldwin Wallace College and Cleveland State University.
- Serves on the board of Churchill Downs.
- Former board member of National City Bank, National City Corporation and the Ohio Bell Telephone Company.
- Cleveland Touchdown Club annually awards a scholarship in Art's name.

Art and his wife, Pat (page 5), are the parents of John and David Modell. John, 36, is a musician/composer and works as a digital mastering engineer at Oceanview Digital Mastering. He and his wife, Tracy, an artist, live in Los Angeles with their son Dylan Scott (3/21/92). David, the Browns' Vice President/Assistant to the President, and his wife, Olwen, an attorney, live in Kirtland with daughters Breslin Ebright (2/5/90) and Collier Honora (10/6/93) and son Arthur Edward (11/23/91).

## Pat Modell



Pat Modell, the former Patricia Breslin, gained fame as one of the most recognized actresses in television history. At one time, she had appeared in more motion pictures and television shows (400) than any other actress. Her most famous roles included a co-starring spot opposite Jackie Cooper in the long-running series "People's Choice" and her portrayal of Meg Baldwin in "General Hospital". Today, Pat devotes much of her time to a variety of Cleveland area projects. She has co-chaired major fundraisers for the Hospice of the Western Reserve and the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland. She also has lent her energy and expertise to the Make-A-Wish Foundation, the Playhouse Square Foundation, the Cerebral Palsy Association, Ursuline College, the Cleveland Musical Arts Foundation and the Cleveland Ballet.

*"My first real hero I remember was in 1935, and he was a player with the Brooklyn Dodgers who played without a helmet - Roy 'Father' Lumpkin from Georgia Tech. I enjoyed all sports, but, as a fan, I had a passion for football...I look back now at the NFL and marvel at the vision of George Halas, Dan Reeves, Art Rooney and the Mara family. And I have a deep, deep regard and affection for the older players. Players who made this game what it is today...Players who played for the love of the sport. I'm proud to be a part of this game today."*

## Jim Bailey

**EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT,  
ADMINISTRATION AND LEGAL**

When the Cleveland Touchdown Club recognized Jim Bailey with its "Pro Recognition Award" last February, it was a salute that embarrassed him, but it publicly proclaimed what Browns' owner Art Modell has been saying for years. The award cited Bailey's "outstanding contributions" to the Browns. "The award is well deserved," Modell said. "Every important decision the Browns have made in the last 15 or so years has included significant input from Jim."

Bailey oversees the most involved aspects of the Browns' operations using his trademark low-key "business as usual" approach. His administrative and legal expertise has helped guide the Browns through the first two years of the salary cap. Among his important involvements through the years have been hiring top executives, including head coaches, construction of the Browns' impressive training and administrative complex and coordinating the Browns' legal and government affairs.

"In effect, if there's an important decision to be made about the future of the Browns, Jim's thoughts on the subject will be given weight," added Modell. Currently, Jim is devoting much of his time and energy to keep the Browns' stadium situation competitive with other NFL teams and safe, comfortable and convenient for the fans. The Browns 25-year lease to play at historic Cleveland Stadium expires after the 1998 season.

Bailey, who is a former scholarship winner as a defensive back at Florida State, was promoted to his current position in early 1984. During his tenure with the Browns, he has negotiated player and radio and TV contracts, handled the Browns' legal affairs, and coordinated Cleveland Stadium activities. Jim's initial work with the organization involved the development and maintenance of Cleveland Stadium Corporation.

Bailey earned a law degree from the University of Michigan after graduating from FSU. Prior to joining the Browns, Jim worked for the Cleveland-based law firm of Guren, Merritt, Sogg and Cohen, where he was quickly named a partner in 1976. Bailey's duties at the law offices included work with Art Modell in the development of the Cleveland Stadium Corporation lease agreement with the city of Cleveland. That association was instrumental in bringing Bailey to the Browns.

A native of Wilmington, OH, Jim stood out in three sports (football, basketball and track) at Wilmington High School. Currently, Jim serves on the Board of Directors of the NFL Alumni/Browns' Chapter and the Board of Trustees for the Discover Berea Chamber of Commerce.

Jim and his wife, Ann, who is an owners' representative in construction projects, live in Bratenahl. They are the parents of two daughters: Sarah, who is an interior designer in Chicago; and recently married Jenny, who is a mathematics teacher in Denver.

### IT'S A FACT

Entering 1995, a Browns' running back has rushed for 100 yards or more 175 times in 166 games since 1950. Cleveland's record in those games is 133-30-3 (.801). The Browns have an 11-game winning streak when a running back runs for 100 yards or more.

## David Modell

**VICE PRESIDENT/  
ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT**

**Born:** August 16, 1961  
Los Angeles, CA  
21st Year Browns

Every year David Modell has assumed more responsibility in the Browns' organization. In fact, no one in the Cleveland franchise has more hands-on experience in as many different areas of the team as the 34-year-old Modell. At the same time, Modell has increased his involvement in a number of important civic and charitable causes.

David's start with the Browns goes back to his youth when, at the age of 14, he worked at the Stadium and assisted on game days. He later moved to the ticket office, worked in the team's public relations' department and started the Browns' marketing office in 1985.

He has become increasingly involved in important community activities. He is the President of the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland. He is a member of the Board of Trustees for the Cleveland Convention and Visitors' Bureau (he chaired the ConVis. annual golf outing this summer) and the Urban League. Modell also works with the Lake County Boy Scouts' Association and serves on the Visiting Committee of the Athletic Department at Case Western Reserve University.

David made his mark on the team and in league circles with the work he did marketing the Browns. The younger Modell started a marketing department in 1985 and developed a series of programs that has enhanced the team's image and provided revenues to contend with the increasingly difficult task of meeting the expenses involved with running an NFL team. Other teams have copied some of the innovations started by David, including Browns' television productions (weekly shows and preseason games produced by teams rather than selling those rights) and an elaborate training camp magazine that is distributed to fans. The teams' original television ventures were both produced and sold by Modell.

"At a time when most teams were wondering whether they should have a marketing department, David had ours up and running and setting a pace a number of franchises have since followed. He increased our market share of advertising dollars, both locally and nationally, and added needed revenues to keep pace with the forever growing needs of running an NFL team," Jim Bailey, Browns' executive vice president, said. David also served as a coordinator for the Browns' promotional and advertising activities with the holders of the Browns' radio rights.

Since relinquishing his title as vice president of marketing three years ago, he has devoted more time to player contract negotiations and became the team's main contact with the league office on all player-related business. He does, however, continue to serve as executive producer of Browns' TV and radio programming.

As a 14-year old student, David worked Browns' games as a member of the grounds' crew. In the next years, he spent time as a front office aide and training camp intern. After graduating from the The Gunnery School (Washington, Ct.) and attending Wittenberg University, Modell joined the Browns in a full-time capacity in the team's ticket office (1981-82). He then worked two years as the front office manager for the Fernwood Inn, a resort in the Pocono Mountains (1982-84), before returning to Cleveland in October of 1984.

Modell's wife, Olwen, an attorney, serves on the board of two groups: Youth Visions (formerly Big Brothers and Big Sisters) and Templum House (domestic violence shelter). Olwen and David are parents of Breslin Ebright (2/5/90), Arthur Edward (11/23/91) and Collier Honora (10/6/93). The Modells live in Kirtland.

Enjoying his 17th NFL season, 15th with the Browns, Kevin Byrne is a team vice president and the director of public relations. Byrne, who was born in Cleveland 46 years ago, joined the franchise in 1981 as the Director of Publicity and earned his promotion to vice president three years later (1984).

While he directs the Browns' public relations' department, Byrne also supervises the team's ticketing department and works closely with the marketing staff. He has negotiated a number of the Browns' preseason television and radio contracts and also coordinated some Cleveland Stadium Corporation activities.

A significant portion of Byrne's attention is given to the production of Browns' television shows. The team produces a weekly one-hour show, "Browns' Insider with Bill Belichick" and will add two more weekly shows this season. "Browns' Insider" has been nominated for a local "Emmy" for 'best sports' programming" three of the last five years.

Byrne began his NFL career with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1977 when he was named as the then-youngest public relations director in the league. He stayed with the Big Red for two years before becoming Director of Public Affairs for Trans World Airline (1979-80).

From 1974-77, Byrne was sports information director at Marquette University, where he worked with Al McGuire and the Warriors' 1977 NCAA basketball champions. His first job after graduating from college was as the "SID" at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. His publications at both schools won numerous national and regional awards from the College Sports Information Directors' Association.

Byrne earned distinction as a member of Alpha Sigma Nu, the National Jesuit Honor Society, while gaining a degree in journalism from Marquette University (1971). He was a member of "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities" and was a four-year member of the Warrior wrestling team. (Byrne currently helps coach a grade school wrestling team in the Cleveland area). Kevin is a graduate of Lakewood (OH) St. Edward High School, where he is Chairman of the school's Board of Trustees and Executive Committee.

For the past eight years, he has been the chairman of the NFL's Pro Football Writers' Liaison Committee. Recently (1993), Byrne received the Cleveland Touchdown Club's Pro Recognition Award. Byrne has been selected by the NFL to work 11 Super Bowls and two Pro Bowls.

## Bill Belichick

HEAD COACH

When Bill Belichick interviewed with Art Modell for the Browns' head coaching position following the team's disastrous 3-13 1990 season, the then-Giants' defensive coordinator was honest. Bill told Art that the Browns fall from the 1989 AFC Championship game appearance to the lowly 3-13 mark a year later was not a mirage. In so many words, Coach Belichick said "your team has gotten old in a hurry and it's not very good."

That's typical Belichick bluntness. And, when Mr. Modell talked with Bill about taking the Browns' position, Belichick said he wanted a five-year contract so he would have the time to build a winning team the right way. "The Browns were in a tough position then," Belichick explained. "They had a lot of older players who had been to the playoffs and a few good, young ones, but not the needed core of four-to-seven year veterans that are so important to championship teams."

With help from his staff, the cooperation from the personnel department and the support of the front office, Coach Belichick has put the Browns back among the NFL's elite once again. The '94 Browns finished 11-5, gaining the playoffs as a Wild Card (one game behind the Steelers). Cleveland then beat the Patriots in the first round of the playoffs and fell short of the AFC Championship game when the team lost at Pittsburgh to end the season.

Typical of Belichick teams, the '94 Browns were sound in every phase of the game, showing Bill's attention to detail. The special teams were the NFL's best (based on 19 different categories compiled by *The Dallas Morning News*). The defense gave up the fewest points in the NFL and set a Browns' 16-game record by allowing only 204 points. The offense scored 340 points, the most by a Cleveland team since 1987 (390), while the offensive line allowed the fewest sacks in the NFL with 14.

"We are a sound team right now that, hopefully, can better what we were a year ago. We have a lot of people pulling in the right direction. We just have a lot of coaches, players and staff working hard to win a championship," Belichick said.

Like many of the the NFL's best coaches (Bill earned the AFC Coach of the Year Award from the Touchdown Club of Washington D.C. last season), Belichick is admired for his outstanding work ethic. "On the whole, the coaches in this business work very hard. In fact, I've known people who would have been very good coaches, but they did not want to cope with the hours," Modell said. "But, Bill is something else. I've never seen anything like his work ethic. His energy level is extraordinary. He leaves nothing to chance. In fact, I've asked him to slow down a few times."

Belichick does not consider his hours long. "I never think about it. I enjoy being a football coach. I enjoy the business. If I didn't, I wouldn't do it. To me, it's not a big deal."

### IT'S A FACT

The Browns have finished in first place in their division or conference 18 times in the 45-year NFL history of the franchise. That marks the most titles of any franchise, followed by the N.Y. Giants' 17 titles (since 1933) and the Chicago Bears' 16 (since 1933).

On Feb. 5, 1991, 38-year-old Bill Belichick was named head coach of the Browns by Modell. Belichick became the eighth fulltime head coach in the team's history. At the time, Belichick was the league's youngest head coach.

Belichick and his staff coaxed six wins out of his first Browns' team (6-10, in 1991), losing six games by a total of just 17 points. That season, the Browns finished first in the AFC with a +15 giveaway/takeaway mark, a remarkable turnaround from an NFL low of -24 in 1990. Cleveland set a team mark with just 18 giveaways, only four shy of the all-time record of 14 set by the 1990 Super Bowl champion Giants.

In year two, the Browns improved to 7-9, and proved they could play head-to-head with the league's playoff teams. Cleveland beat Pittsburgh, which won the AFC Central, and Houston, both playoff qualifiers. However, the Browns dropped heartbreaking games to four playoff teams (San Diego, Minnesota, Miami and Houston) after building late fourth-quarter leads in each of these contests.

After starting 3-0 in '93, including victories over playoff teams San Francisco and the Raiders, the Browns lost dramatic close games twice to Houston, plus the Patriots and the Steelers, and finished with a second straight 7-9 campaign. "We made progress that year, but the record didn't show it, and you are what your record is," Belichick said.

Belichick came to the Browns from the New York Giants, where he served as an assistant for 12 seasons and helped the Giants to Super Bowl victories in 1986 and 1990. In the latter season, the Giants' championship defense, which was coordinated by Belichick, allowed a league-low 211 points, an average of 13.2 points per game. During the 1986 Super Bowl campaign, the Giants gave up 236 points, second-best in the NFL to the Bears' 187. Over Belichick's last three seasons, the Giants allowed the fewest points in the league, 777.

Belichick's father Steve is from Struthers, Ohio (near Youngstown), and he played football at Cleveland's (Case) Western Reserve University (1938-40) under Bill Edwards, who became Bill's godfather. (Steve played fullback for the Detroit Lions in 1941). "I still have family in Struthers, and I always enjoyed visiting there and coming up to Cleveland to see Browns and Indians' games," Belichick said. "My father used to take me to Hiram College when I was a boy to watch the Browns practice, and I remember seeing some of the greats like Jim Brown, Lou Groza, Gary Collins, Erich Barnes and Gene Hickerson." (Steve Belichick recently retired from the Naval Academy, where he coached for 33 years. He currently does some scouting for the Browns).

Today, Belichick invites many of the Browns' alumni to spend time with the team and speak to them. "I have great respect for the history of this franchise and the players who made it the winningest. A Jim Brown, an Ozzie Newsome, a Jim Houston - those types of players and people - they can help us get better," Belichick said.

Belichick began his coaching career as a 23-year-old in 1975 as a special assistant to then-Baltimore Head Coach Ted Marchibroda. "He was a young man who was willing to work round-the-clock for nothing and learn everything he could about the game," Marchibroda recalled. "After training camp, we got him a hotel room across from mine and, whatever we gave him, he did it well and thoroughly. The first thing you should know about Bill is that he's a worker, plus he knows people and this is a people business. He's a good man, with good character and there's no doubt he knows defense. I believe he'll be a successful head coach."

"Ted taught me what being an NFL coach is all about, and I owe him a great deal. He gave me a tremendous learning experience at a young age. I saw the

highs and lows. The Colts lost four of their first five and then came back to go 10-4 and win the AFC Eastern championship," Belichick added.

A year later, Belichick joined the Lions' staff of Rick Forzano as assistant special teams' coach and later helped with the tight ends and receivers under Tommy Hudspeth. He left the Lions after the 1977 season to join Red Miller's Denver Bronco staff as assistant special teams' coach and assistant to defensive coordinator Joe Collier. In 1978, he went to the Giants to serve as a defensive assistant and special teams' coach under Ray Perkins. After coaching the special teams in 1979-80, Belichick was given the added duties of linebackers in 1981-82. Under Bill Parcells, Belichick began coordinating the defense in 1983, plus coaching linebackers for two seasons. Parcells gave him the defensive coordinator's title, plus secondary coaching responsibilities, in 1989-90.

Belichick, who grew up in Annapolis, Maryland, is a graduate of Annapolis High, where he was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame, and Phillips Academy (Andover, Mass.). He earned a B.A. in economics in 1975 from Wesleyan (Middletown, Ct.) University. Bill played football (center and tight end) and lacrosse in both high school and college.

Bill's wife, Debby, has become an important part of the Browns' family and the Cleveland community. The couple started the Bill and Debby Belichick Charity Foundation two years ago and has raised over \$80,000 for the Zelma George Home, a shelter for homeless women and children in Cleveland. Bill and Debby (formerly Clarke), who is an elementary education graduate of Birmingham (Ala.) Southern College, have three children: Amanda (9), Stephen (7) and Brian (3).

Ernie Adams, formerly a pro personnel specialist with the New York Giants, joined Bill Belichick's staff in 1991 as an offensive assistant. In 1993, his new duties as special assignment coach focused on specific game situations, such as inside-the-20 scoring and third down conversions. Last season, the Browns were able to score 80.5% of the time they penetrated opponents' 20-yard lines (23 TDs and 10 FGs).

A former offensive assistant coach with both the New England Patriots (1975-78) and the New York Giants (1979-81), Adams was promoted to Director of Pro Personnel for the Giants (1982-85). In the latter capacity, he was responsible for rating all players in the NFL for purposes of trade or waiver acquisition, evaluating college talent for the NFL draft, and evaluating upcoming Giants' opponents. After leaving the Giants, Adams tackled Wall Street as an analyst/trader (1986-1990) for Mabon, Nugent & Co. of New York.

Upon graduation from Northwestern (1975) with a B.S. in education, Adams was hired as administrative assistant to then-head coach Chuck Fairbanks of the Patriots. His duties included all aspects of football operations, plus computer analysis, statistical evaluation and film coordination. At the Giants, Adams served as an assistant offensive coach under then-head coach Ray Perkins. His duties were similar to those held at the Patriots and included on-the-field work with the offensive unit, coaching during meetings, and preparing offensive game plans.

Adams, 41, graduated from Phillips Academy (Andover, Mass.), and enrolled at Northwestern. He worked under head coach Alex Agase, assisting the coaching staff as a game scout and undergraduate assistant on the freshman football team. He assumed the same responsibilities with the varsity teams, including on-the-field work with tight ends. Adams is single and lives in Lakewood.

Jim Bates, formerly a Browns' defensive end coach and one of the most energetic coaches on a practice field, is returning to Cleveland as secondary coach after a one-year stint with the Falcons as defensive coordinator. Bates has coached every defensive position and served as a defensive coordinator and a USFL head coach (San Antonio Gunslingers).

Jim was defensive coordinator/secondary coach at Florida (1990) when the Gators' defense ranked fifth in the nation in total yards allowed. He coached linebackers at Tennessee in 1989, and the Vols were SEC co-champs and Cotton Bowl victors. Prior to the Browns, Bates' last professional coaching position was as an assistant with the Detroit Drive of the Arena Football League in 1988. He spent 1986 as defensive coordinator for the USFL Arizona Outlaws after serving as head coach for the San Antonio Gunslingers in 1985. Bates joined the Gunslingers as defensive coordinator in 1984.

Bates, 49, spent six years (1978-83) at Texas Tech as secondary coach and defensive coordinator. He tutored the secondary at West Virginia in 1977. From 1975-76, he coached linebackers at Kansas State. He was an offensive line coach at Villanova in 1973, but switched to linebackers' coach the following year. Jacob Burney marked his first year in the NFL coaching a line that contributed to one of the best defensive performances in the league, allowing a league-low 204 points. Opponents scored only nine rushing touchdowns and averaged 3.6 yards per carry during the regular season. Burney's group included two Pro Bowlers: LDE Rob Burnett, who had a career-high 10 sacks, and DT Michael Dean Perry (now with Denver). The Browns' 134 sacks over the last three seasons rank second in the NFL, behind New Orleans (144).

Burney's coaching career was launched in 1983, when he joined Joe Morrison's staff at New Mexico, where he served as defensive line coach for four seasons. He moved to Tulsa in '87, where he coached former New York Jets' defensive tackle Dennis Byrd. In 1988, he tutored inside linebackers at Mississippi State. Slated to rejoin Morrison at South Carolina for the '89 season until Morrison's untimely death, Jacob moved to Wisconsin and worked with the Badgers' defensive line. Prior to a one-year stint with Tennessee's defensive line (1993), Jacob spent three years coaching the UCLA Bruins' defensive line (1990-92).

Burney, 36, was a standout at the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga. He started all four years (1977-80) at defensive tackle, helping lead the Moccasins to four Southern Conference championships and a record of 33-9-2. He was selected All-Southern Conference in each of his final three seasons. He has a bachelor's degree in physical education from Tennessee-Chattanooga (1981). Burney had tryouts with the Detroit Lions in '81 and '82. Jacob was an All-State performer in football, wrestling and track and field at Tyner (Chattanooga, TN) H.S. Jacob and his wife, Madrinna Paton, have two sons: Jacob, 12, and Benjamin, 8.

Steve Crosby officially assumed the role of offensive coordinator last season. The Browns scored 340 points, their best production since 1987 when they scored 390. Cleveland scored 82.1% of the time when in the "red zone," including 26 TDs and 20 FGs. Browns' QBs were sacked a league-low 14 times. Both the running and receiving games have been upgraded with the free agent signings of Lorenzo White (Houston) and Andre Rison (Atlanta). After coaching positions in Atlanta and New England, Steve returned to the Browns as running backs' coach in 1991 under Bill Belichick.

A running back for the New York Giants from 1974-76, Crosby began his coaching career on Don Shula's Miami staff in 1979 after serving as a Dolphins' scout for two years (1977-78). From 1979 through 1982, Crosby coached the Dolphins' special teams and linebackers, while continuing personnel duties. He joined the Atlanta Falcons (1983-84) and worked with quarterbacks and running backs. After tutoring Browns' running backs in 1985, Crosby returned to Atlanta as quarterbacks' coach in 1986 and switched to running backs' coach (1987-89). In 1990, he accepted an invitation from the Patriots to coach special teams and tight ends.

Crosby, 45, is a 1972 graduate of Fort Hays (KS) State University, where he earned a degree in physical education and a Master's in athletic administration. As a senior, he rushed for 1,024 yards on 179 carries (5.7 avg.). He was twice named NAIA All-America and was a three-time all-conference performer before being drafted in the 17th round in 1974. Steve attended Pawnee Rock (KS) H.S.

Crosby and his wife, Lisa, have three children: Matthew (9), Jeffrey (7) and Lauren (2). The Crosbys reside in Strongsville.

Kirk Ferentz coached one of the NFL's best offensive lines last year, giving up a league-low 14 sacks on the season, snapping the old team record of 16 set in 1970 (14 games; 1980: 16 games, 23 sacks). The line matured last season with veteran LT Tony Jones (83 consecutive games is team high), C Steve Everitt, RG Bob Dahl, RT Orlando Brown, LG Gene Williams, C/G Wally Williams and T/G Herman Arvie. This is a group that should be even better in 1995.

Ferentz was the head coach of the University of Maine's Black Bears from 1990-1992. Prior to that position, the 40-year old Ferentz was the offensive line coach and running game coordinator at Iowa for nine years (1981-89), under the direction of head coach Hayden Fry. Ferentz coached the Hawkeyes' Joel Hilgenberg (a 1993 Pro Bowler as member of the New Orleans Saints). During his tenure at Iowa, the Hawkeyes appeared in Bowl Games eight consecutive times and won a total of 73 games. Kirk has coached several All-American offensive linemen, including three first round draft choices and an Outland Trophy finalist.

Ferentz joined Pittsburgh (1980) as the offensive line coach under Jackie Sherrill. He helped guide the Panthers to a 10-1 record and the nation's number two ranking. Ferentz began his coaching career in 1977 on a part-time basis at his alma mater (Connecticut), prior to his graduation. He assisted the defensive coordinator and served as linebackers' coach. Ferentz then accepted a defensive coordinator/offensive line coach position (1978-79) at Worcester Academy.

A 1978 graduate of Connecticut with a degree in English education and Academic All-Conference honors, Ferentz, a linebacker, was a three-year letter winner and team co-captain. He attended Upper St. Clair H.S., near Pittsburgh, Pa. Kirk and his wife, Mary, live in North Royalton with their five children: Brian (12); Kelly (10); Joanne (8), James (6) and Steven (1).

Pat Hill was named tight ends/offensive line assistant in 1994 and will continue his special assignments' duties in the personnel department. He has assisted the offensive line coach since joining the Browns in 1992. In 1994, the offensive line allowed a league-low 14 QB sacks, snapping the previous team record of 16 set in 1970 (14-game schedule). The 16-game record was 23, set in 1980.

Hill joined the Arizona staff after serving as offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at Fresno State for six years (1985-90). He helped the Bulldogs win three PAC titles and three California Bowl championships. Fresno State was among the nation's most explosive offensive teams during this period. Pat began his collegiate coaching career as offensive line coach at Los Angeles Valley Junior College (1974-76), before working with the offensive line and as recruiting coordinator at Utah (1977-80).

*The Sporting News* selected Hill as one of the top assistant coaches in its 1989, '90, and '91 nationwide surveys. In their 1990 and 1991 polls, TSN ranked him as the fifth and second best assistant, respectively. Prior to his tenure at Fresno State, Pat was offensive coordinator and worked with the offensive line and running backs for the Calgary Stampeders of the CFL (1983-84). He was offensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator for the University of Nevada-Las Vegas (1981-82), where he saw his Rebels average 526 yards and 42 points a game in 1981. One of his recruits was QB Randall Cunningham of the Philadelphia Eagles.

Hill was a three-time All-Conference center at California-Riverside (1971-73), earning All-America honors in 1973. He also lettered in rugby, received his B.A. in 1973 and was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame in 1989. He lettered in football, baseball and wrestling at Crespi H.S. in Los Angeles. Hill and his wife, Cathy, reside in Berea with their three sons: Mike (11), Matt (9) and Zak (6).

Scott O'Brien was voted 1994's NFL Special Teams' Coach of the Year following a ballot by fellow NFL special teams coaches. The voting margin for O'Brien was the largest in the award's seven-year history. In 1994, Browns' special teams ranked first in the NFL in the following areas: field goal percentage, 92.8% (K Matt Stover was 26 of 28); 2-point conversions, 4 of 5; avg. starting point after kickoffs, 33.4; PAT %, tied with 20 others at 100%; points scored, 24, tied with 3 others; and points allowed, 0, tied with 11 others. *The Dallas Morning News* surveyed all NFL teams and reported that Cleveland (126.5) finished first in NFL team rankings by a full 110 points over second place Denver (236.5).

Scott came to the Browns from the University of Pittsburgh (1987-90), where he coached special teams and assisted in coaching the defensive line. Prior to his four years at Pittsburgh, he coached linebackers and special teams at Wisconsin-Superior (1980-82), Nevada-Las Vegas (1983-85), and Rice (1986).

O'Brien, 38, was a defensive lineman at Wisconsin-Superior who also ran track and played hockey. Scott was signed by the Green Bay Packers (1979) and the Toronto Argonauts (1980). He earned his bachelor's degree in 1979 and a Master's degree in education from Nevada-Las Vegas in 1984. O'Brien was graduated from Superior (WI) Senior H.S. in 1975.

Scott is married to the former Shawn Kinney of Superior, WI, and the O'Briens reside in Strongsville. Shawn recently received a doctorate in psychology from the University of Pittsburgh.

Mike Sheppard was promoted from offensive assistant to receivers' coach in 1994. Last season, rookie Derrick Alexander finished as the team's leading receiver with 48 catches for 828 yards (Hall of Famer Paul Warfield still holds the all-time rookie receiving mark of 52 catches for 920 yards in 1964). Alexander, Michael Jackson, and unrestricted free agent Andre Rison (Atlanta) will comprise the three-receiver set in 1995. Before joining the Browns, Sheppard was offensive coordinator/quarterbacks' coach at California (1992). The 44-year old Sheppard spent five-years at New Mexico as head coach (1987-91).

Prior to his role of head coach at New Mexico, Sheppard held the same position at Long Beach State for three years (1984-86), owning a 16-18 record. Other coaching experience included Kansas (offensive coordinator in '83), Long Beach State (quarterbacks' coach in '82), Idaho State (quarterbacks and receivers' coach in '80 and '81), United States International University (offensive coordinator in '79), BYU (graduate assistant on offense, 1977-78) and Cal Lutheran (receivers' coach, 1974-76).

A '73 Cal Lutheran graduate with a bachelors degree in business, Sheppard was a two-sport standout, who earned all district honors in both football and baseball both as a junior and senior. He was chosen most valuable lineman in the '71 NAIA national championship game and won Lutheran All-America honors in '72. He was named his baseball team's MVP in his senior season and played pro baseball for one summer with the Portland Mavericks (1973).

Sheppard earned a California teaching credential in '75 and his master's in physical education at BYU in '82. He attended John Burroughs H.S. in Burbank, CA. Sheppard and his wife, Cathie, make their home in Strongsville with their children Chrissi (16), Brian (12), Shelby (7) and Macall (4).

Jerry Simmons' offseason conditioning program involves a year-round philosophy of not getting in shape, but keeping in shape. Former Pro Bowl running back John Settle (Washington, Atlanta) will assist Simmons in the strength and conditioning program this season. Over 40 players participated in the program, while Simmons monitored the few who worked out on their own with periodic visits. The idea, according to Jerry, is to limit injuries and maximize abilities.

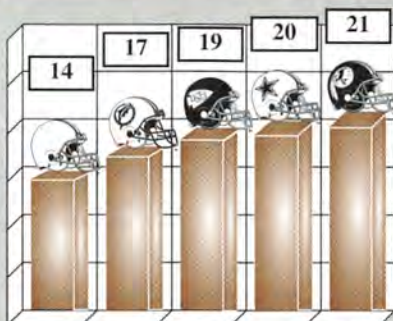
Simmons, formerly the strength coach at the New England Patriots for three years (1988-90), was a strength training site director at the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles. In 1978, he accepted a position as assistant strength coach and graduate assistant working with linebackers at Fort Hays (Kan.) State University. Although Simmons left coaching in 1979, he returned as an assistant strength coach at Clemson (1980). He moved to Rice University (1981-82) as the strength and conditioning coach and designed the school's first strength facility. Rick Venturi was named defensive coordinator this past offseason, replacing Nick Saban, who took the head coaching post at Michigan State. Venturi inherits a defense that finished as the stingiest in the NFL and set a 16-game team record by allowing only 204 regular season points. The Browns' 22 touchdowns allowed set a 16-game team record and led the NFL. Opponents were able to convert third down plays only 34.3% of the time, fourth in the league. In nine home games, the defense allowed eight touchdowns and 91 points (avg. 10.1 per game). The Browns outscored opponents 221-91 at home, owning a 7-2 record. Last season, Rick coached the vastly improved Browns' secondary. Along with his coordinating duties, he'll work with linebackers in 1995.

Venturi, 49, served as the Colts' defensive coordinator/linebackers' coach, an assignment he held to open the 1991 season. He succeeded Ron Meyer as head coach for the final 11 games of '91. Additionally, Rick held the coordinator title in 1984. Venturi served a stint as guest coach with Frank Kush for the Hamilton Tiger Cats of the Canadian Football League in 1981 before joining the Colts. Rick entered the coaching ranks as a freshman coach at Northwestern from 1968-69. He took charge of the secondary there from 1970-72, then moved to Purdue (1973-76) as linebackers' coach for four years. In 1977, Venturi was named secondary coach at Illinois until he landed the head coaching position at Northwestern, where he remained for three seasons.

Venturi earned a bachelor's degree in physical education and history and his master's in education from Northwestern. A motorcycle enthusiast (he has two bikes), Rick attended Pekin Community H.S. in Pekin, IL. Rick is married to the former Cheri Rotello of Rockford, IL. They have two children, Marin (23) and Jason (21).

As a player, John started 29 of 46 games in his NFL career. He helped prepare the team for the first year under the salary cap by working under a team-imposed "ceiling" in 1993.

Impressed by Lombardi's expertise in evaluating collegiate talent during his tenure at UNLV (1982-83), the San Francisco 49ers offered him a scouting position in 1984. Mike coordinated all scouting reports for the West Coast club in addition to scrutinizing collegiate talent in the northeast, southwest and western regions.

His evaluation techniques and knowledge of the game led to an offer to join the Browns' scouting staff in 1987. Two years later, in May of 1989, he was named pro personnel director prior to his 30th birthday. In 1994, Mike was promoted to player personnel director.

Lombardi, 36, is recognized as one of the NFL's youngest and brightest talent evaluators. His observations were extremely helpful to Bill Belichick when he became head coach of the Browns in 1991. According to Belichick, "Michael never looks at notes," and mentally carries an encyclopedia of extensive player personnel knowledge.

Mike, who is always taking the extra step to get one more piece of information on a prospect, is an advocate of the "black box" device, a sophisticated method the Browns use to test a player's agility and speed. A native of Ocean City, NJ, Lombardi lettered in both football and baseball at Valley Forge Military Academy (Wayne, PA). He attended Hofstra University (1978-81), where he played nose tackle for the Flying Dutchmen.

Lombardi, an avid baseball and basketball fan, and his wife, Millie, who is very active in fund raising with Debby Belichick, reside in Broadview Heights with their two children: Michael (6) and Matthew (4).

## CLEVELAND TOUCHDOWN CLUB

The Cleveland Touchdown Club was founded in 1938 by Joe Fogg and twelve other Cleveland businessmen, whose love for football prompted them to organize a group dedicated to the sport. By the time the NFL Rams departed for Los Angeles in 1946, the Browns (AAFC) were establishing themselves in Cleveland. The Club took on an active role in promoting the team within the business community.

Over the years, the Club's mission has been to assist the Browns in their civic endeavors while at the same time, give recognition to student athletes for their athletic and academic achievements.

Proceeds from various Club events are used to assist disadvantaged and/or physically challenged youth in meeting members of the Browns and participating in other football-related activities. Recently established are scholarship funds in the names of Arthur B. Modell, owner of the Browns, and the late Browns' play-by-play announcer, Nev Chandler.

The Club's more popular events are the Annual Kickoff Luncheon (oldest of its kind in the NFL), the postseason awards dinner (in existence since 1947) and the TD Club Sports Celebrities golf outing held in June at Columbia Hills Country Club.

## Ozzie Newsome

Five short years ago, Ozzie Newsome left the playing field and joined the Browns' front office with as much grace and skill as any touchdown pass he ever caught. Armed with a 13-year playing career and his extensive knowledge of the game, Newsome joined the Browns' personnel department as a special assignment scout (in '91). Two years later, he was promoted to assistant to the head coach/offense-pro personnel, and in '94, he became director of pro personnel. Ozzie's duties include analysis of pro talent, detailed studies on certain positions and players and acquisition of talent. Throughout the season, he's called upon to tutor the receiving corps, plus help with offensive game plans. On game day, Ozzie is on the sidelines working closely with Bill Belichick and the assistant coaches.

Considered by most to be a "lock" for enshrinement into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, Newsome has recently been inducted into "two" Halls of Fame: the National Football Foundation's College Hall of Fame (1994) and the NCAA Hall of Fame (1993). Newsome is the NFL's all-time leading pass-catching tight end and top receiver in Browns' history with 662 receptions for 7,980 yards. Ozzie ended his career as the fourth-leading receiver in league annals. He earned three trips to the Pro Bowl (1981, 1984-85) and was a four-time winner of the Cleveland Touchdown Club's Offensive Player of the Year Award (1978, 1981, 1983 and 1984). His consecutive game reception streak of 150 is the second longest in NFL history. He was named to the All-NFL Team of the 80's (second team) in addition to numerous All-NFL and All-AFC honors.

Ozzie, 39, was a number one Browns' draft choice, along with Clay Matthews in 1978, and the two are among an elite group of Browns to play for three decades. The others are Gene Hickerson (1958-60, 62-73), Dick Schafrath (1959-71) and Don Cockroft (1968-80).

Winner of the 1990 Byron "Whizzer" White Award for his community involvement, Newsome is widely known as a willing volunteer for charitable causes. Ozzie and his wife, Gloria, make their home in Orange Village with their son Michael Ryan (3).

Tom Dimitroff's 36 years of playing and coaching experience in the U.S. and Canada brought an extensive football background to Browns' personnel. From 1957-58, Dimitroff played quarterback for the Ottawa Rough Riders of the CFL and the AFL's Boston Patriots (1960). After retiring as a player, Tom returned to Northern Ohio as an assistant at Wadsworth H.S. (1965-68) and Barberton H.S. (1968-69). Dimitroff entered the collegiate level as an assistant at Miami (OH) from 1969-72, and at Kansas State in 1973. Newsome, 34, played with the Browns for two years prior to his retirement. He totaled 233 tackles while with Cleveland, leading the defense in '91 with 127 stops. With the Rams, Newsome led in tackles each of his last two seasons and three times in his last five years. His 10-year career totals include: 763 tackles (526 solo), four sacks and 62 defended passes. Vince grabbed 17 interceptions in his career, along with forcing seven fumbles and recovering nine. He was originally a fourth round selection by the Rams in 1983.

Earlier in his career, Ellis was offensive coordinator for the CFL Winnipeg Blue Bombers (1978-83), the USFL Denver Gold (1983-84) and Pittsburgh Maulers (1984-85). He spent two years as a member of the CFL scouting combine (1985-86) and offensive coordinator of the CFL Toronto Argonauts (1986-89). He helped lead the Argonauts to three league titles in four seasons. His 1988 team set a CFL total offense record.

After his pro tenure, Rainsberger returned to collegiate competition in 1989 at Toledo to work as offensive line coach. The 1990 Rockets (under Saban) were MAC champions with a 7-1 mark (9-2 overall), and in '91, Rainsberger was given the added title of assistant head coach at Toledo.

Rainsberger was an assistant at Drake (1959-62), and then named head coach at Washburn (1962-65). There, he led his team to a 10-1 record and the 1964 league championship, the first for the school since 1942. He became defensive coordinator at Kansas (1965-66), then head coach at Southern Illinois. In 1972, he was offensive/defensive coordinator at Illinois (1967-72), later accepting a post as offensive/recruiting coordinator at Wisconsin (1972-74). His 1973 Wisconsin offense was among the top 10 in the nation. In 1974, he was named head coach at his alma mater, Kansas State (1974-78).

Ellis was a three-year letterman for the Wildcats and was an All-Big Eight selection (1956-57) and an Academic All-American (1957). He also lettered twice in wrestling, winning the Missouri Valley title. Rainsberger and his wife, Shirley, are the parents of six children: Becky (35), Bud (34), Cathy (32), Sandy (30), Chris (27) and Mike (26). Ellis and Shirley reside in Swanton (OH).

Head Trainer Bill Tessendorf's tireless efforts over the years have not gone unnoticed. Bill and his staff (Mark Smith, who has been with the club since 1986 and second-year assistant Lloyd Givan) have gained a reputation as one of the top training staffs in the league. In 1989, Bill's crew was honored as the "NFL's Athletic Training Staff of the Year" by the Professional Football Athletic Trainers' Society. Bill personifies the type of person it takes to be successful in his ever-expanding field. It is no coincidence that the Browns advanced to the playoffs six of the past 10 seasons, despite the myriad of injuries connected with the game. Perhaps no campaign was as ill-fated as the 1988 season, when the Browns lost four quarterbacks to injuries.

"Bill Tessendorf is a dedicated worker who is a very, very valuable member of our organization," says owner Art Modell of the man who is entering his 12th season as head trainer. The Ohio Athletic Trainers' Association felt that way as well, bestowing upon Bill the Clinical/Professional Trainer of the Year Award in May of 1989.

Tessendorf first joined the Browns as an assistant trainer in 1973 while working towards his master's degree in exercise physiology at Kent State. ## BROWNS' WIVES ASSOCIATION

The Browns' Wives Association was established in the early 1980s by a group of players' wives interested in lending a hand to various charities in the Cleveland community.

Since that time, the wives have been involved in many projects and fundraising endeavors like the annual dinner for Bellefaire Center, benefiting abused children; celebrity fashion shows like Ronald McDonald House's annual Familia; and the fundraiser for the New Joshua Center for substance abuse rehabilitation.

The Wives Association is chaired by an executive committee of three-to-four members. Elections are held annually in September at a special luncheon, and all the wives participate. Last year, Kamilla (Tony) Jones, Mitzi (Vinny) Testaverde, Lori (Brian) Kinchen and Carlanda (Walter) Reeves chaired the association.

The wives' main focus is the annual canned food drive, which spans the six-week period between the Thanksgiving-Christmas holiday season. Working in conjunction with the Cleveland Food Bank and area businesses, the wives kick off Operation Can Do prior to a game at Cleveland Stadium, collecting cash donations and non-perishable items. Players and their families make personal appearances throughout the city promoting the food drive, and dropoffs for food items are located at sponsor businesses for the duration of the six weeks. Last year, the association collected \$8,000 in contributions and 6,000 lbs. of food. Over the years, the wives have collected more than \$100,000 for the event.

## CLEVELAND BROWNS' TRAINING AND ADMINISTRATIVE COMPLEX

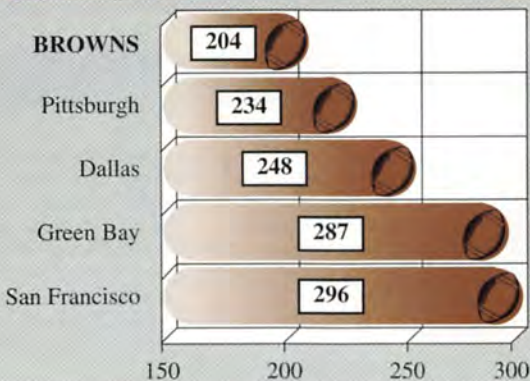


Situated on 10 acres of land in Berea, Ohio, the Browns' facility was constructed specifically for training a professional football team. Its campus comprises an administration building of 76,000 sq. ft., a field house of 60,000 sq. ft., and a field maintenance building. Five natural grass fields serve as outdoor practice fields and an alternative 70-yard astroturf surface is used indoors. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held in May of 1990 and construction was completed in August of 1991.

The Browns' staff, previously housed in four separate buildings in the Cleveland area, now function under one roof for the first time since the early 1970s. Some state-of-the-art training features include a 6,000 sq. ft. weight room, a 4,500 sq. ft. training room, including a Jacuzzi, cold water plunge, three whirlpools, sauna, and a Swim-Ex pool, which circulates 30,000 gallons of water per minute and registers a water current of up to 6.5 MPH for resistance. In addition to classrooms and a theater, there is a restaurant-style kitchen for training camp meal preparation. A half-court basketball surface, two racquetball courts, and locker rooms for the staff complete the football operation.

A television studio with light and sound systems, several private interview rooms, and a working press room overlooking the fields are media-related features of the facility.

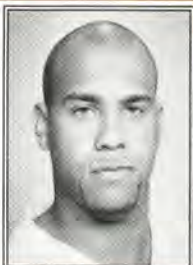

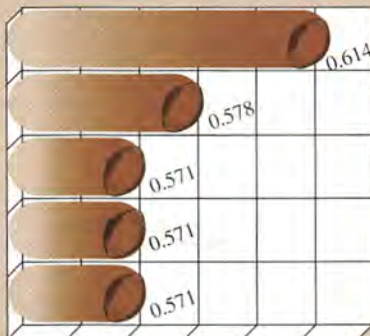

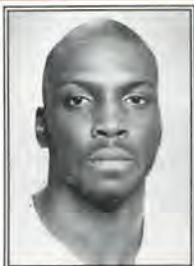

**IT'S A FACT**

The Browns' 1994 special teams were clearly the best in the NFL, according to a series of rankings from *The Dallas Morning News*. *The News* ranked all 28 teams in 19 categories relating to special teams. Each team's cumulative score determines the final results - the lower the score, the better. The Browns finished first by a landslide - 126.5 - over second-place Denver - 236.5. The Browns finished in the top 10 in 17 of the 19 categories. The largest spread between the first and second place teams in the first four seasons of the 1990s had been just 10 points. But the Browns won by 110 points. (The Browns finished 35 points ahead of 1993 winner, New Orleans.) The 1994 rankings by team:

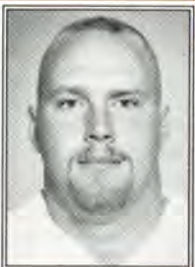
## BROWNS' BACKERS ASSOCIATION

**PRO:** Fixture at RG on line that permitted fewest sacks in league last season, a team record-low 14...Chagrin Falls native has been a starter since the middle of the 1992 campaign...Received "Unsung Hero" Award from Wooster (OH) Browns Backers in 1993, and a similar award by the trading card company, Playoff Corporation, last June 15 (a random insert trading card)...Started final nine games of 1992 season after injury to John Rienstra...A converted defensive lineman,

made switch to offensive line as recently as the middle of 1991 with Pittsburgh's practice squad, after being a third round choice (72nd overall) of the Bengals in 1991...Spent half of '91 season on Cincinnati's practice squad...Was released from Bengals' practice squad, signed onto the Steelers' practice squad, and it was there that he made switch to offensive line...Browns signed him as a free agent on 3/3/92, and he was assigned to the practice squad in September, until being activated to the 47-man roster on 10/31/92...Coincidentally, made first pro start the next week against the Bengals...Following the 1992 season, when the Steelers showed little interest in signing him, he used his father's business FAX machine and wrote a letter to all the league's personnel directors, stating that his future was on the offensive line...He heard from 20 teams, worked out for all of them, but eventually signed with his hometown Browns...Elected Browns' player representative to the NFLPA last season.

▶ *Bob is a converted defensive lineman, and has only played on the offensive line since 1991. He was a defensive lineman on Notre Dame's undefeated 1988 National Championship team.*

▶ *Elected Browns' player representative to the NFLPA last season.*

**1994:** Played in 17 of 18 games, all starts at right guard...Returned to the starting lineup for both playoff games, after missing regular season finale with a knee injury...In 20-13 Wild Card win vs. N.E. (1/1/95), the Browns' offense tallied a season-high 379 yards...Snapped string of 40 straight starts in finale vs. Seattle (12/24) with a knee injury...Was the third-longest current streak at the time...Started 40th straight game at Pitt. (12/18), but left in second half with a knee injury and did not return...Started at RG in 34-10 win vs. Hou. (11/27), as Browns rolled up 343 yards of offense, 144 yards rushing and four TDs...Made 35th straight start in 26-7 win at Phil. (11/13), as Browns did not allow a sack and rushed for 140 yards...Started 34th straight game, as Browns amassed a season-high 148 yards rushing in 13-6 win vs. N.E. (11/6)...Earned game ball for play in 11-8 win at Hou. (10/13), as line did not permit a QB sack and LT Ray Childress was limited to one tackle.

**OVERHEARD****OFFENSIVE LINE COACH KIRK FERENTZ ON BOB DAHL:**

*"Anything good that's happened to him has come as a result of his dedication. He covers all of the bases, and it shows up out there on the field. He goes above and beyond the other guys, in terms of preparation, both mentally and physically."*

**1993:** Started each game at right guard...The offensive line allowed only 10 QB sacks over the final seven games, and the Browns averaged 335 net yards per game...Played alongside new starters Steve Everitt at center and Gene Williams at right tackle.

**1992:** Started final nine games of season at LG, after injury to John Rienstra...Browns rushed for over 100 yards in four of final five games...Saw action at left tackle in finale at Pitt. (12/27) after Tony Jones left game...Played in first pro game as a starter at left guard at Cinc. (11/1), the team that drafted him in '91 in the third round.

**COLLEGE, PERSONAL:** Earned three letters at defensive tackle for Lou Holtz's Fighting Irish...Irish captured '88 National Championship...Earned honorable mention All-America as a senior from *Football News* and *The Poor Man's Guide to the NFL Draft*...Started final two campaigns, recording 6-1/2 QB sacks in career...Graduated in May of 1991, with a bachelor of finance degree...A Chagrin Falls (OH) H.S. product, Bob earned three letters in football, playing tight end and defensive tackle...Was first-team All-State defensive tackle, and caught 20 passes for 315 yards as a senior...Has three sisters, enjoys golf, the outdoors and writing...Worked one summer in Cuyahoga County Commissioners' Office, and also helped develop and train clients of a manufacturing firm...Completed commercial real estate courses and worked with local firm in past offseasons...Read to area students for "Right to Read Week"...Bob and Tommy Vardell participated in *The Cleveland Plain Dealer's* Annual Spelling Bee contest last May...Participant in Miami Project fundraiser and Swim for Diabetes...Lives in Hinckley, OH...Browns' player representative to the NFLPA...Full name: Robert Allen Dahl.

**PRO:** Gerald is third on the Browns over the past two seasons with 30 special teams' tackles...Has a blocked punt that resulted in a TD...Most of his playing time in '93 and '94 was on special teams, with limited action at LB...Spent rookie season on injured reserve with an ankle injury...Was selected in the third round (78th overall) of the 1992 draft with a choice obtained from Dallas.

**1994:** Finished season tied with Mike Caldwell for third place with 19 special teams' stops, plus a blocked punt and an onsidies kick recovery...Played in both playoff games...Recorded first career QB sack, a five-yarder, in the fourth quarter of 34-10 win vs. Hou. **PRO:** A true blocking artist...Except for one game missed last season with a neck injury, Steve has started every game since being the Browns' top choice in '93 ...Started all 16 games as a rookie, more than proving his value as the 14th selection in the 1993 draft, and then started 15 of 16 last season on a line that led the NFL with only 14 sacks allowed...Won 1993 All-Rookie honors from *Pro Football Weekly*, *PFWA*, *Football Digest*, *College & Pro Football Newsweekly* and *Football News*...Makes all the calls on the offensive line...The first offensive lineman selected by the Browns in round one since Pete Adams in 1973...Cleveland obtained the pick from Denver, along with Denver's third round choice (83rd overall; Browns selected LB Mike Caldwell of Middle Tennessee State), in exchange for the Browns' first round pick (11th overall; the Broncos selected Toledo DE-Dan Williams).

**1994:** Started 15 of 16 games at center, plus both playoff games...Also handled snapping duties on field goals and extra points...Anchor of the Browns' offense that scored 340 points, the best scoring total since the '87 team, and helped pave the way for Pro Bowler Leroy Hoard (890 yards on 209 carries)...The offensive line permitted the league's fewest sacks, 14, a team record...Was named to Tom Jackson's *Pro Football Update* second team All-Pro Team...Fairview (OH) American Legion Man of the Year...Browns'

▶ *Steve broke his jaw in his junior year at Michigan and lost one of the screws in a restaurant (his father, Michael, jokes that Steve really does have a screw loose)*

▶ *Anchor of the Browns' line that led the NFL with only 14 sacks allowed last season.*

## OVERHEARD

**TONY JONES ON EVERITT:** "As a rookie, sometimes Steve would peek over to me after making the line call to see if he was right. Last year, he was much more confident. I think he has the chance to become one of the best centers the Browns have ever had."

**STEVE EVERITT ON HIS ARTISTRY:** "Art has always been an important part of my life. My dad (Mike) has been a real influence on me through his work as a sculptor. Artwork provides a release from the aggression associated with playing football."

Backers Central voted him their 1994 Offensive Lineman of the Year...On inactive list vs. Jets (10/2) with pinched nerve injury...One game in particular stands out as a reflection of his toughness: In the Week four 21-14 win at Indianapolis (9/25), Steve re-injured his pinched neck nerve (burner) in the second quarter and was apparently done for the day...His replacement, Wally Williams, was injured and replaced by a hobbled Doug Dawson...With no available centers left, Everitt was spotted walking back onto the field from the lockerroom, putting on his uniform in the process, in case he was needed (he wasn't).

**1993:** Started all 16 games as a rookie...Was first rookie offensive lineman to start for the Browns since Ed King in 1991, and before that, Cody Risien in 1979 (although Mike Baab started a playoff game in 1982)...Offensive line allowed 35 sacks in first nine games, but only 10 in final seven (and averaged 335 net yards in the final seven)...Made all the calls on the offensive line, and faced some of the league's toughest linemen, including Cortez Kennedy, Sean Gilbert, Ray Childress (twice), Ted Washington, Tim Krumrie, as well as banging heads with Michael Dean Perry in practice every day.

**COLLEGE, PERSONAL:** Four-year starter who was rated best center in draft...Bill Belichick said: "There hasn't been a center like Steve coming out in the draft since Pete Brock (1976). When I came here, I talked about being strong up the middle. I think we've done that with Eric Turner, Tommy Vardell and Steve"...Can play center or guard (started at guard in the Browns' '93 preseason), and also is a proficient long snapper... Wolverines posted a 29-3-3 record in games Steve started...Missed 13 games with injury (record: 9-4)...Toughness impressed scouts, as he missed only four games with a broken left foot and only one game with a painful broken jaw...When he broke his right thumb as a senior (1992), he snapped flawlessly left handed (he had done the same thing as a freshman)... Earned First-Team All-Big Ten, as well as second team UPI...As a junior (1991), he broke his jaw vs. Notre Dame, needing a steel plate and several screws...One screw came out in a restaurant, another is unaccounted for (his father, Michael, jokes that Steve really does have a screw loose)...He only missed one game (vs. Florida State) with the jaw injury, but missed Purdue and Northwestern games with an ankle injury...Steve started seven games, but still gained second-team All-Big Ten honors...Named co-MVP of the Gator Bowl as a sophomore (1990)...Started only four games, as a broken left foot suffered vs. Maryland limited his role to deep snapper for four games...Injury snapped a 15 games-started streak...Earned UPI honorable mention and All-Big Ten as a freshman (1989) after redshirting in 1988...Started every game at center, and was selected one of the top freshman linemen by *The Sporting News*...Earned All-State and All-County selections for two years at Southridge (Miami) H.S...Also wrestled...Named Dade County Offensive Player of the Year as a senior (1987)...Missed the 1993 Senior Bowl (coached by Bill Belichick and his staff) because he returned to his parents' home in Cutler Ridge, Fla., about six miles north of Homestead, FL, which was devastated by Hurricane Andrew...His parent's house was leveled by the storm..."Our house was pretty much wiped out. I felt guilty, I felt bad. So I stayed in Miami for about two weeks. I didn't go and play because I wanted to stay home and help out"...Earned degree in fine arts and specializes in painting (abstract and surreal)...Began building his portfolio when he was in junior high school in Florida...Steve was a featured artist at NOVA (New Organization for the Visual Arts), benefitting NOVA's art education programs in Cleveland...His father, Michael, started his career as a commercial graphics artist and is an experienced sculptor...Mom, Barbara, is an elementary school teacher...As a rookie, Steve's choice as the ritual song selection sung at the training table was Black Sabbath's "Iron Man": "There wasn't a real big sing-along," understated Everitt...He is a regular at heavy metal rock concerts...Single, lives in Westlake, OH...Full name: Steven Michael Everitt.

## OVERHEARD

**STEVE EVERITT ON HIS BIGGEST DISAPPOINTMENT IN FOOTBALL:** *"I was cut when I went out for 65-pound pee-wee football when I was around seven years-old. They said I had no talent. My dad was one of the coaches."*

**PRO:** Valuable lineman who can play inside and at the ends...Saw most of his action on third downs last season...Has all the tools: height, weight speed, strength and quickness...Saw limited action in his rookie season, playing behind team sack leaders Anthony Pleasant (11) and Rob Burnett (nine)...Outstanding athletic ability and heart helped overcome a major left knee injury (three torn ligaments and extensive cartilage damage) suffered in 1990, which is fully recovered; in fact, left knee is 11 percent stronger than right knee and measured 430 pounds on the Cybex (among the highest ever for any athlete)...Was the third Seminole drafted in '93 (Marvin Jones, Jets and Carl Simpson, Bears), and eighth defensive end overall.

▶ As a tailback at Hillsborough High School in Tampa, Dan once rushed for 212 yards and four TDs in a game.

▶ Overcame a serious knee injury suffered with Florida State in 1990, and broke the cybex machine during rehabilitation.

**1994:** Recorded 39 tackles, including two and one-half QB sacks...In the playoffs, he recorded four stops at Pitt. (1/7/95) after tallying a tackle and three QB pressures in 20-13 win vs. N.E. (1/1/95)...Shared a QB sack with Rob Burnett among his four stops in 13-6 regular season win over N.E. (11/6), and led the team with three QB pressures...Recorded a 10-yard QB sack among his four tackles in 37-13 win vs. Cinc. (10/23)...Recorded seven tackles and a team-high four QB pressures in 27-7 win vs. the Jets (10/2)...Responded to first pro start at LDE for Anthony Pleasant (groin injury) with a five-yard QB sack among his eight tackles (three for losses), a batted pass and a QB pressure in 21-14 win at Ind. (9/25), as defense limited Marshall Faulk to a 2.8 yard rushing avg. on 22 carries.

**1993:** On inactive list final four games, and eight on the season...Saw action on line and on special teams in 17-13 win over N.O. (12/5)...On inactive list with a hamstring injury vs. Denver (11/7), which limited him most of the second half of the season...Recorded first career sack, an eight-yarder of Jeff Hostetler in 19-16 win over Raiders (9/19)...Inactive vs. S.F. (9/13) and saw little action in first NFL game vs. Cinc. (9/5).

**COLLEGE, PERSONAL:** Earned third-team All-America and first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors...Also was recipient of the Brian Piccolo Award, given to the ACC player who made the most inspiring comeback from an injury (see PRO section, above)...Finished senior year (1992) fifth on team with 65 tackles, including four QB sacks, three tackles behind the line of scrimmage and a batted pass...Made 37 tackles, recovered a fumble, four and

**PRO:** "Snap-to-whistle" defensive tackle who has missed only three NFL games since being selected in the fourth round of the draft by New England in 1988 (87th overall)...New England obtained the choice with a trade of their 1987 fifth round pick to Tampa Bay (Henry Rolling, currently with Rams)...Signed with the Browns as an unprotected free agent last April 18 after playing seven seasons with the Patriots...Has started 105 of 109 games

entering 1995, and the only games he missed were last year's final three contests...Spent the last three games on IR after a leg fracture against the Jets (12/4/94)...Has always had success against the Browns (26 career tackles): Recorded five stops in last season's 13-6 Browns' victory; eight stops and Player of the Game honors in the Pats' 20-17 win in '93; tied a career high with 12 tackles in 1992 (Browns won 19-17) and added three tackles in the Browns' 20-0 win in 1991...Excellent vs. the run, and noted for effort, quickness and toughness.

**1994:** Started first 13 games of the season, but suffered a right fibia fracture in Week 13 vs. the Jets (12/4)...Amassed 74 tackles (47 solo), three sacks for 24 yards, a fumble recovery, a forced fumble and a batted pass...Had career-high 13 tackles including a QB sack vs. Green Bay in Week five...Recorded five tackles vs. Browns on 11/6...Missed final three games, plus Wild Card game (1/1/95), a 20-13 Browns' win.

**1993:** Snapped a 31-game start streak in opener at Buffalo (9/5) when Pats opened in different alignment...Finished third on tackle chart with 77 (tied with ex-Brown Harlon Barnett)...His 52 solo stops was one shy of career-best 53 set in '90...Shared credit of a Jeff George sack (10/31) with Brent Williams...Earned game MVP honors for second time in four weeks with an eight-stop performance against the Browns (11/19), a 20-17 Patriot victory.

▶ *Tim has started 105 of 109 games entering 1995 (all with New England), and the only games he missed were last year's final three contests.*

▶ *Tim's wife, Marsha, played basketball for UNC and recently qualified for the LPGA.*

**1992:** Started all 16 games and finished third on team with 72 tackles, including 2-1/2 QB sacks...Tied a then-career high with 12 tackles vs. the Browns (10/25) (see 1990)...Recorded solo sacks at Miami (10/18) and vs. Colts (12/6)...Scored first career TD when he returned a Christian Okoye fumble 19 yards for a score vs. K.C. on 12/13.

Ratings for the NFL's three over-the-air broadcasters went up four percent over 1993, the largest year-to-year increase in 10 seasons. (Postseason ratings rose four percent over 1993, while preseason ratings were the highest since 1989.)

Andre Rison reached the 400 career reception mark in his 80th NFL game. Only Jerry Rice (79th game) and Kellen Winslow (72nd game) reached that plateau faster.

Rison owns 18 100-yard games, and had four consecutive 100-yard efforts in 1990, a Falcons' record.

Andre averages 10 TDs per season, the second best ratio in NFL history.

A gifted athlete, Andre played *eight* different positions on his high school football team. He pitched and played outfielder on a touring AAU team in Fairmont, WV. He was an All-State point guard in high school, guiding the hoopsters to a 55-1 record. He played for Jud Heathcote at Michigan State, alongside Steve Smith and Scott Skiles. He also participated in the long jump.

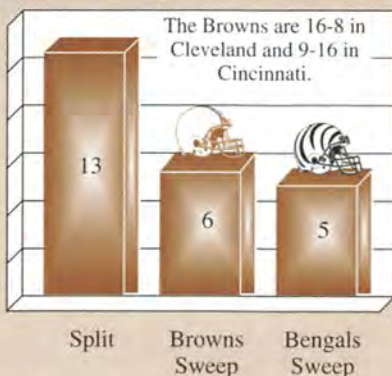

## BROWNS' CHARITIES



Starting with Art Modell and his wife, Pat, who serve in leadership roles in a number of important fundraising projects, community involvement has always been part of the rich tradition of the Cleveland Browns. The Modells efforts include participation among the coaches, players and staff in reaching out to the community.

Last year, over 10,000 requests for player appearances were filtered through the Browns' office. Most of these are charity or civic appearances—and every request is considered worthwhile. Although it is impossible to honor all these requests, almost every single Brown makes a commitment to some worthwhile cause. Many are involved in more than one charity or foundation, and during the holiday season, every player makes at least once visit to a local hospital, children's ward or nursing home.

The Bill and Debby Belichick Charity Foundation was formed in 1992, and among other projects, raised close to \$100,000 for the Zelma George Shelter in Cleveland. The shelter is operated under the ministries of the Interchurch Council of Greater Cleveland and offers a temporary place to live for homeless women and children.

Operation Can-Do is the main focus of the Browns' Wives Association, although the players' wives are involved in many other events in the community. Other events have included a SIDS (Sudden Infant Death Syndrome) fashion show and fundraisers for Bellefaire. Operation Can-Do is a six-week food drive during the November-December holidays and is kicked off at a midseason Browns' game.

The Browns' family extends to the local NFL Alumni Chapter and the Cleveland Touchdown Club. These organizations help local groups, high schools, civic and charity associations by their involvement in the community.

Browns' players rank among the most active professional athletes who dedicate themselves to society's increasing needs. One estimate of the Browns' involvement in charitable events projects \$1.5 million is raised annually.

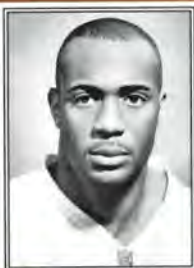

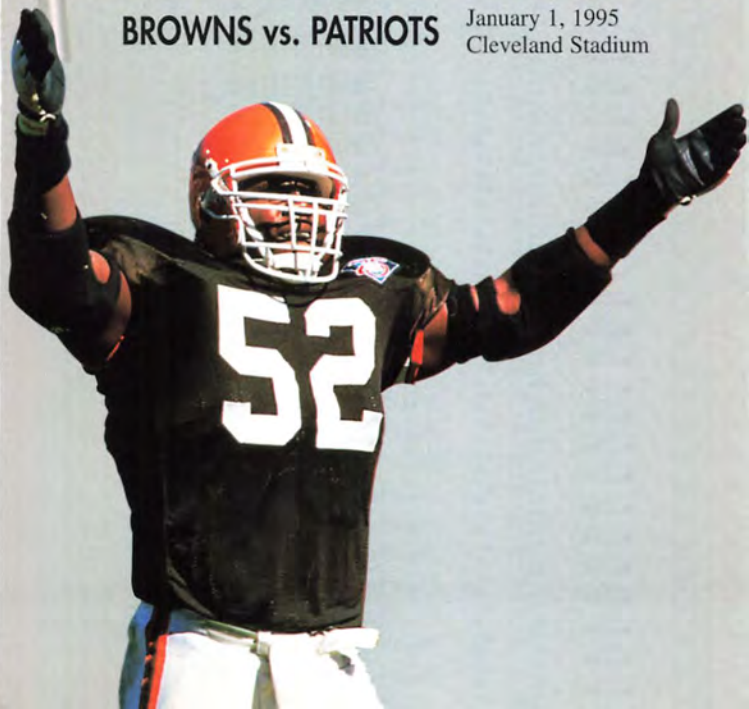

### (1) Sunday, Sept. 4 - Browns 28, Bengals 20 (52,778) at Riverfront Stadium.

Ignited by two kick returns for touchdowns, the Browns won their 1994 season opener, 28-20, at Riverfront Stadium over division rival Cincinnati to stand alone at 1-0 in the AFC Central. Randy Baldwin raced 85 yards on a kickoff return with 9:32 remaining in the first half, and then Eric Metcalf returned a punt a team record 92 yards less than three minutes later to boost Cleveland's lead to 25-7. It marked the first time since 1958 that the Browns returned both a punt and kickoff for a touchdown in the same game (Bobby Mitchell vs. Philadelphia on November 23, 1958). The Lions were the last NFL team to return a punt and kickoff for scores in the same game, when Eddie Payton did so on 12/17/77 vs. Minnesota. The Browns opened the scoring by driving 71 yards on 12 plays, capped by a Matt Stover 19-yard field goal. A possession later, Cleveland drove 50 yards on six plays, and Vinny Testaverde hit Leroy Hoard on an 11-yard TD pass. Holder Tom Tupa ran over the left side on the PAT attempt to become the first player in NFL history to score a two-point conversion, staking the Browns to an 11-0 lead. Derrick Fenner put Cincinnati on the board on a second-quarter one-yard plunge, and then the special teams' returns opened Cleveland's lead to 25-7. Doug Pelfrey's 38-yard field goal with 15 seconds left in the half made the score 25-10, and his second field goal (49 yards) midway through the third quarter closed the lead to 25-13. Matt Stover, also two-for-two on the day, booted a 22-yard field goal to extend the lead to 28-13 early in the fourth quarter. David Klingler (27 of 43 for 224 yards, one TD and two INTs) hit Darnay Scott on a 24-yard pass to close the lead to 28-20. Cincinnati got the ball back with 6:13 left in the game, and drove to Cleveland's 10-yard line, but Klingler's potential game-tying pass into the end zone was intercepted by Browns' top pick Antonio Langham to seal the win. Leroy Hoard led all rushers with 92 yards on 16 carries and caught an 11-yard TD pass, and the offensive line did not permit a QB sack. The win was the second consecutive opening day victory over the Bengals, and improved the Browns' all-time opening day mark to 26-19.

### (2) Sunday, Sept. 11 - Steelers 17, Browns 10 (77,774) at Cleveland Stadium

The Browns lost their home opener to the Pittsburgh Steelers, 17-10, snapping a four-game home winning streak against their division rivals. The Browns committed five turnovers, including four interceptions, while Pittsburgh did not turn the ball over. QB Vinny Testaverde (19 of 37, 211 yards, one TD, four INTs), marched Cleveland 64 yards on four plays, and connected with TE Walter Reeves on a one-yard TD pass to give the Browns a 7-0 lead with 6:50 left in the first quarter. Matt Stover connected on a 23-yard field goal to increase the Browns lead to 10-0 in the second quarter. QB Neil O'Donnell (15 of 25 for 199 yards, one TD and no INTs) directed a four-play, 45-yard drive, culminated with a 31-yard TD pass to WR Yancey Thigpen with 9:25 left in the first half. The Browns marched to the Steelers' 14-yard line on their next possession, but Stover's 32-yard field goal attempt sailed wide right. The Steelers then moved 77 yards in eight plays, capped by Barry Foster's one-yard TD plunge to give Pittsburgh a 14-10 halftime lead. Gary Anderson kicked a 25-yard field goal in the fourth quarter to make the score 17-10. An apparent game-tying 33-yard touchdown pass to Mark Carrier with two minutes left in the game was nullified due to a holding penalty. Barry Foster led all rushers with 84 yards on 31 carries (2.7 yard avg.), while Eric Metcalf paced Cleveland's rushers with 43 yards on nine carries (4.8 yard avg.). Pittsburgh's Darren Perry recorded three interceptions (tying a mark against the Browns held by 10 other players), and Rod Woodson one. The loss evened both clubs' 1994 records at 1-1, while Houston and Cincinnati fell to 0-2.

**(3) Sunday, Sept. 18 - Browns 32, Cardinals 0 (62,818) at Cleveland Stadium.**

The Browns registered their first home shutout since 1983 by defeating the Arizona Cardinals, 32-0, at sunny Cleveland Stadium. The shutout was Cleveland's 26th since 1950, its first since a 31-0 win over the Colts in Indianapolis on 12/1/91, and its first at home since a 20-0 win over Tampa Bay on 11/13/83. Cleveland scored 29 second-half points after Matt Stover's 32-yard field goal represented the first half's only scoring. QB Vinny Testaverde (17 of 27 for 248 yards, two TDs and one INT) led the Browns on a 55-yard, six-play drive on their first second-half possession, and scored on a one-yard plunge to put the Browns ahead 10-0. After a "three-and-out" by Arizona, the Browns marched 64 yards in nine plays, and Testaverde hit Tommy Vardell on a 16-yard swing pass for a TD. Holder Tom Tupa scored his second two-point conversion of the season on a rush out of kick formation. After forcing two Arizona punts, the Browns re-gained possession with 8:53 left in the game, and Testaverde threw an "out pass" to rookie Derrick Alexander, who slipped a tackle and raced 81 yards for a touchdown, tied for the sixth-longest in team history. S Eric Turner ended the Cardinals' next two drives, the first when he picked off QB Jim McMahon (19 of 38 for 169 yards, no TDs, two INTs) at the Browns' 26 for an eight-yard return. On the Cards' next possession, Turner raced 93 yards for a TD on his second interception, the second-longest in team history. Turner's second pick came off QB Jay Schroeder (seven of 20 for 100 yards, one INT). The Cardinals' 58 pass attempts were the most ever in regular season history against the Browns.

**(4) Sunday, Sept. 25 - Browns 21, Colts 14 (55,821) at the RCA Dome.**

Vinny Testaverde threw three touchdown passes, two to Eric Metcalf, as the Browns defeated the host Indianapolis Colts, 21-14, in the RCA Dome, halting a two-year string of defeats to the Colts in Indianapolis (and three of the last four). Testaverde (16 of 28 for 266 yards) threw two first-half TD passes to Eric Metcalf (57 and 15 yards), and added a game-winning 65-yarder to Leroy Hoard in the fourth quarter to match his career high of three scoring aerials, accomplished six times previously. Meanwhile, the Browns' defense limited rookie sensation Marshall Faulk to 61 rushing yards on 22 carries (2.8-yard avg.). Faulk scored the first of two Colts' touchdowns on a one-yard rush on the Colts' first possession following Metcalf's electrifying 57-yard TD catch and run on the game's opening drive. The Browns broke the 7-7 tie on a nine-play, 80-yard march, as Metcalf made an acrobatic 15-yard reception for a score with 34 seconds left in the first half. Indianapolis tied the contest at 14 in the third quarter, when QB Jim Harbaugh directed an eight-play, 64-yard drive, capped with a 13-yard TD pass to FB Roosevelt Potts. Early in the fourth quarter, Testaverde connected with RB Leroy Hoard on a 65-yard TD pass over the middle to provide the Browns' with the margin of victory, 21-14. The Cleveland defense did not allow the Colts past their own 36 on their final three drives. Metcalf gained 74 yards on five receptions and added 42 yards on eight carries, while Hoard gained 88 yards on two receptions and 34 yards on 10 rushing attempts. The win upped the Browns record to 3-1, one game ahead of 2-2 Pittsburgh, two games ahead of 1-3 Houston and three up on 0-4 Cincinnati.

**(5) Sunday, Oct. 2 - Browns 27, Jets 7 (76,188) at Cleveland Stadium.**

Powered by three rushing touchdowns, three forced turnovers and a home crowd of 76,188, the Browns dominated the New York Jets, 27-7, to improve to 4-1, their best start since 1979. Cleveland came close to recording back-to-back shutouts at home for the first time since 1951, but Rob Moore caught a 24-yard pass from Jack Trudeau with just under seven minutes left in the game for New York's lone score. Moore's TD broke a string of nine consecutive quarters of not allowing a six-pointer on grass, and was just the third TD allowed by the Browns at home all season. QB Vinny Testaverde completed 21 passes to seven different targets, including seven for 105 yards to rookie WR Derrick Alexander. It was Alexander's second 100-yard game of the season. The Browns scored first in the opening quarter when Eric Metcalf raced 37 yards around right end and into the arms of the Dawg Pound faithful. Matt Stover kicked the first of two field goals (23 yards) in the second quarter after Eric Turner intercepted a Trudeau pass and returned the ball 32 yards. Frank Stams forced a Johnny Johnson fumble on the Jets' next possession. Cleveland drove 79 yards on five plays, aided by a 50-yard Testaverde-to-Rico Smith pass play, capped by Earnest Byner's one-yard TD run. The Browns forced the Jets to punt after three plays, and Testaverde drove the offense 57 yards in five plays, as Leroy Hoard bulled his way into the endzone from 18 yards out to give the Browns a commanding 24-0 lead. The Browns entered the game with just one rushing touchdown through four games. Stover kicked his longest field goal of the season midway through the third quarter to stake the Browns to 27-0 lead. Moore's 24-yard diving grab in the endzone ended the scoring with 6:55 left in the game. CB Tim Jacobs intercepted a Trudeau pass with 1:01 left in the game on the Browns' 20 to halt the Jets' final drive. Trudeau threw 46 times, completing 28 for 288 yards and was sacked twice (Rob Burnett and Eric Turner). P Tom Tupa averaged 49 yards on seven punts, with two inside-the-20, limiting New York to an average drive start of its own 26-yard line.

## (6) Thursday, Oct. 13 - Browns 11, Oilers 8 (50,364) at The Astrodome.

The Browns improved to 5-1 for the first time since 1965, and won their fourth game in a row for the first time since 1989, by defeating the Houston Oilers, 11-8, at the Astrodome. While the point total was the lowest in a victory since a 6-3 win in the 1988 season opener at Kansas City, it was a tribute to a stubborn Browns' defense that led the league in fewest points allowed (66) after six games. The Oilers did not score until 28 seconds remaining. After a scoreless first quarter and a failed Matt Stover field goal from 50 yards (wide right), the Browns drove 80 yards in just four plays, capped by a Vinny Testaverde-to-Mark Carrier 25-yard pass play. Holder Tom Tupa scored his third two-point conversion of the season on a sweep right option with K Matt Stover trailing the play. With 4:49 left in the second quarter, the Browns began a nine-play, 38-yard drive that ended with a Stover 35-yard field goal on the first half's final play for an 11-0 cushion at halftime. Each team held the ball for just one possession in the third quarter: The Browns held the ball for the first 6:09, but were forced to punt; the Oilers held the ball for the rest of the quarter, and into the fourth, marching to the Browns' 11, only to see Al Del Greco sail a 29-yard field goal attempt wide left. The Oilers later drove to the Browns' 15 midway through the fourth quarter, but rookie CB Issac Booth intercepted a Billy Joe Tolliver pass at the Browns' eight-yard line. Tolliver had replaced Bucky Richardson (13 of 23 for 114 yards) at the beginning of that drive. Houston got another opportunity in the fourth quarter against the tired Browns' defense, driving 69 yards in 13 plays, as Tolliver (nine of 17 for 115 yards, one TD and one INT) threw a five yard TD pass to RB Lorenzo White with 28 seconds left. Tolliver's two-point conversion pass to Haywood Jeffires pulled the Oilers within three, but the ensuing onside kick attempt went out of bounds after it touched several players from both teams, and with no time-outs left for either team, Testaverde simply knelt down to seal the win. Vinny was 15 of 25 for 196 yards, with one TD and two interceptions, both on long passes to Mark Carrier who had beaten CB Darryl Lewis, but the balls were underthrown and Lewis came up with the picks. Testaverde was not sacked, and the Browns got to Houston QBs five times, including two by DE Rob Burnett. The win gave the Browns at least two road victories over division rivals for the first time since 1989.

## (7) Sunday, Oct. 23 - Browns 37, Bengals 13 (77,588) at Cleveland Stadium.

Sparked by two third-quarter special teams' touchdowns, the Browns defeated the Cincinnati Bengals 37-13 for their fifth consecutive win to improve to 6-1. The Browns scored their third and fourth special teams' TDs of the year against the Bengals, and a fumbled punt recovery led to a field goal, for 17 third-quarter points in less than four minutes. Eric Metcalf raced 73 yards on a punt return, just minutes after Gerald Dixon blocked a Lee Johnson punt and Travis Hill recovered in the endzone. It was Metcalf's second punt return for a TD against the Bengals this season, and fifth overall PR-TD of his career. The blocked punt was the first by the Browns since 10/14/90. Cincinnati held a 13-10 half time lead behind Tim McGee's 11-yard TD reception from David Klingler and Doug Pelfrey's 36 and 49-yard field goals. The Browns scored first on Matt Stover's 45-yard field goal. Leroy Hoard scored the first of two TDs on an 11-yard catch and run from Vinny Testaverde to tie the score at 10-10 in the second quarter. Stover's 27-yard field goal in the third quarter knotted the score at 13, and then the special teams' show began. The Bengals' were flagged for an illegal man down field on a third quarter punt, and on the ensuing punt, Dixon raced through the middle of the line and blocked Lee Johnson's kick. Travis Hill recovered the ball in the endzone for a 20-13 lead. Cincinnati was forced three-and-out on its next drive, and Johnson's punt bounced past Eric Metcalf. He turned and picked up the ball, raced down the Bengals' sideline and then diagonally across the field for his fifth punt return touchdown in three seasons. Cincinnati's next two possessions ended on downs, and Stover booted his third field goal of the day, a 35-yarder to increase the lead to 30-13. The Bengals' again lost the ball on downs, and Leroy Hoard gained 42 yards, all on the ground, capped by a one-yard TD run with two-minutes left to complete the scoring. The Browns sacked Klingler (18 of 34 for 200 yards) three times, and forced him to leave the game with a strained right knee in the fourth quarter. Don Hollas replaced Klingler and left the game with a separated shoulder after a 20-yard sack by Pepper Johnson. Vinny Testaverde left the game in the third quarter with headaches, and was replaced by Mark Rypien. Testaverde was eight of 18 for 103 yards, one TD and one INT, while Rypien completed three of 11 attempts for 31 yards. Hoard led all rushers with 58 yards and all receivers with five receptions to earn a game ball. Rookie WR Derrick Alexander caught three passes for 77 yards, and Bennie Thompson recovered a Corey Sawyer fumble on a punt return to set up Matt Stover's second field goal, tying the game at 13 in the third quarter. Pepper Johnson earned a game ball on defense and Metcalf was presented a special teams' game ball. The win improved the Browns mark to 6-1, its best start since 1963, and increased their winning streak to five games.

**(8) Sunday, Oct. 30 - Broncos 26, Browns 14 (73,190) at Mile High Stadium.**

The Browns lost only their second game of the season (and their first on the road) at Mile High Stadium, 26-14, to the Denver Broncos. John Elway improved to 10-2 against Cleveland by throwing for 349 yards, two TDs, and completing 30 of 41 passes, 24 to backs and tight ends. The 349 passing yards allowed were the most allowed by a Cleveland team (and only 300-yard game) since 10/24/93 by Pittsburgh's Neil O'Donnell (355 yards). QB Vinny Testaverde left the game in the second quarter after suffering a recurrence of dizziness that dated back to the 10/23 Cincinnati game. He was sacked on the sixth play of the game by Simon Fletcher, played in four more series, and was replaced by Mark Rypien. The Broncos, who controlled time of possession 38:07-21:53, capped a first-quarter drive that lasted 8:48, when Elway threw a one-yard TD pass to TE Jerry Evans for a 7-0 lead. Matt Stover kicked two field goals in the second quarter to pull Cleveland to within one, 7-6. The second field goal was set up on an Elway fumble caused by Mike Caldwell, the second fumble on successive possessions for Denver. On Denver's next drive, a 10-play, 81-yard TD march, CB Issac Booth was flagged for pass interference in the end zone on a third-and-six at the 13-yard line to set up a Leonard Russell one-yard TD plunge and a 14-6 Denver lead. The Broncos' Jason Elam connected on two field goals to make the score 20-6, but Rypien (17 of 30 for 210 yards, one TD, no INTs) drove the Browns 60 yards on seven plays, the last a six-yard TD pass to Mark Carrier. The ensuing two-point conversion attempt was a similar play, this time to Derrick Alexander, to pull the Browns to within six, 20-14. It was the fourth successful two-point attempt in as many tries for the Browns in '94. On the Broncos' next possession, Derek Russell slipped an Antonio Langham tackle after a swing pass on second and 10, and raced 43 yards to set-up Elway's 17-yard TD pass to RB Glyn Milburn and a 26-14 lead. The Browns drove to Denver's 12-yard line on their next possession, but a fourth down Rypien pass fell incomplete to end the Browns' hopes for a 7-1 start.

**(9) Sunday, Nov. 6 - Browns 13, Patriots 6 (73,878) at Cleveland Stadium.**

The Browns, utilizing a dominating defense and strong running attack, improved to 7-2 by defeating the New England Patriots, 13-6, at windy Cleveland Stadium. The Browns' defense did not allow a New England six-pointer, limited Drew Bledsoe to an 18.2 QB rating and forced four interceptions. QB Mark Rypien made his first start as a Brown for injured Vinny Testaverde (concussion) and completed 14 of 28 passes for 164 yards, one TD pass to Leroy Hoard and one interception. Rypien improved his overall mark as a starter to 46-27. Hoard rushed for a career-high 123 yards on 21 carries, and caught two passes, including a one-yard scoring toss for the game's only TD, in the fourth quarter. Hoard's rushing total was the most by a Brown since Kevin Mack gained 133 yards vs. Cincinnati on 12/13/87. Each team benefited from two field goals, as Matt Stover extended his successful streak to eight by connecting on 33 and 41-yard boots, while New England's Matt Bahr was perfect on 20 and 39-yard attempts. The Cleveland defense limited the high-powered Pats' offense (first in the NFL in passing yardage entering the game) to 277 total net yards, 159 passing and 118 rushing. Eric Turner recorded two interceptions, giving him six on the year, a single-season high, while Tim Jacobs and Mike Caldwell each added thefts. The victory kept the Browns one game ahead of 6-3 Pittsburgh in the AFC Central race.

**(10) Sunday, Nov. 13 - Browns 26, Eagles 7 (65,233) at Veterans Stadium.**

The Browns snapped the Eagles' 20-0 streak with Randall Cunningham at quarterback in Veterans Stadium with another dominating defensive display. The 26-7 win improved the Browns' mark to 8-2, best in the NFL, along with Dallas, San Francisco and San Diego after 10 games. The defense limited the Eagles to drives under 30 yards on 12 of 14 possessions, held Cunningham to 195 yards passing on 38 attempts (5.1 avg.), no TDs, one INT and a fumble, and checked the Eagles, who were leading the league in third down conversion percentage entering the game, to three of 14 (21%) conversions. The special teams provided excellent field position, with two long returns setting up scores, and the running game, led by Leroy Hoard's 86 yards on 21 carries, rolled up 140 yards in the win. On the game's opening drive, Michael Dean Perry sacked Randall Cunningham on his own two-yard line to force a Bryan Barker punt, which was returned 22 yards by Eric Metcalf to the Eagles' 18. After three running plays by Hoard moved the ball to the three, QB Mark Rypien (12 of 30 for 158 yards, one TD, one INT, no sacks) hit Mark Carrier for a TD and a 7-0 lead. Rypien led the Browns 59 yards on 10 plays on Cleveland's next possession, setting up Matt Stover's 35-yard field goal and a 10-0 lead. It was the start of a busy day for Stover, as he tied a career high with four three-pointers (35, 41, 22 and 36 yards), set a career high with 14 points, and extended his successful field goal streak to 12 in a row. A flurry of penalties thwarted a Browns' scoring threat in the second quarter, forcing a Tom Tupa punt. With the Eagles facing third-and-one on their own 25, CB Antonio Langham was called for a 47-yard pass interference penalty, setting up a Vaughn Hebron 15-yard TD run around right end. It was just the fifth rushing TD allowed by the Browns and the first longer than one yard. The second half was all Browns, and after Stover's remaining three field goals, Earnest Hyner scooted four yards for a TD with 11:07 left in the game to seal the 26-7 win.

**(11) Sunday, Nov. 20 - Chiefs 20, Browns 13 (69,121) at Arrowhead Stadium.**

The Browns dropped a 20-13 game at Kansas City in a downpour to fall to 8-3 on the season. Cleveland lost three fumbles, entering the game with a league-low four lost fumbles, and gained a season-low 239 yards. The Browns were flagged for 15 penalties (tied for fourth-most in team history) for 142 yards (fifth-most in team history). The Browns missed a giant scoring opportunity in the first quarter after Mark Carrier returned a punt a career long 60 yards to the Chiefs' six, but three plays later, the exchange between C Steve Everitt and QB Mark Rypien was not clean, and the slippery ball was recovered by the Chiefs. Kansas City drove 59 yards in 10 plays early in the second quarter to take a 7-0 lead when Joe Montana hit TE Tracy Greene on a six-yard TD pass. Vinny Testaverde entered the game at quarterback for the Browns in the second quarter, and led a 50-yard, nine-play drive including a 15-yard scoring pass to Eric Metcalf on third down and 10. The Browns went for two, and Leroy Hoard was stuffed at the line, the first time all season the Browns did not succeed at the two-point try. The Chiefs took a 10-6 lead after Lin Elliott kicked a 22-yard field goal. The Browns captured their first and only lead when Mark Rypien, who started the second half, connected with Michael Jackson on a 15-yard TD pass to make the score 13-10. The TD was Jackson's first of the season after struggling with a hamstring injury for most of the campaign, and featured Jackson dragging two Chiefs into the end zone with him. Elliott kicked his second field goal, from 28 yards, to knot the score at 13 early in the fourth quarter. A Rypien pass intended for Michael Jackson was intercepted by Dale Carter at the Kansas City 39 with 12 minutes to play in the quarter. Montana led a 61-yard, eight-play drive, aided by three defensive penalties, and Kimble Anders scored on a one-yard rush to provide the margin of victory for the 7-4 Chiefs. RB Leroy Hoard had 124 yards from scrimmage in the contest (68 rushing, 56 receiving). Rypien completed 10 of 24 passes for 114 yards, one TD and one INT, while Testaverde was four of 12 for 38 yards and a TD. The loss, coupled with Pittsburgh's overtime win against Miami, created an 8-3 tie in the AFC Central with five games to play.

**(12) Sunday, Nov. 27 - Browns 34, Oilers 10 (65,088) at Cleveland Stadium.**

Leroy Hoard rushed for 103 yards and two fourth-quarter touchdowns and Vinny Testaverde returned to the starting lineup and threw for two more as the Browns beat the Houston Oilers, 34-10, at Cleveland Stadium to improve to 9-3. The sweep of the Oilers was the first since 1989, and improved the Browns' AFC Central mark to 4-1. The Browns rolled up 144 yards rushing, 99 in the second half, and the rushing game was bolstered by Hoard's second 100-yard game in November. TE Frank Hartley caught his first career TD pass from Testaverde (15 of 28 for 199 yards, two TDs and one INT) from one-yard out to stake the Browns to a 10-0 second quarter lead. Lorenzo White scored on a one-yard rush to pull the Oilers within three, 10-7. Testaverde then hit TE Brian Kinchen on an 11-yard scoring strike to stake the Browns to a 17-7 lead. Al Del Greco kicked a 42-yard field goal to make the score 17-10 at the half. Matt Stover kicked his second field goal of the day in the fourth quarter to extend his field goal streak to 14. Stover's second field goal was sandwiched between Hoard's TD runs of one and five yards. Testaverde, starting for the first time since 10/30 at Denver, completed passes to seven different players and was sacked just once. The Browns converted a season-high 50% of their third down conversions (7-14). The Cleveland defense allowed just its fifth TD of the season at home in six games and limited the Oilers to 182 total net yards, including 102 passing and 80 rushing.

**(13) Sunday, Dec. 4 - Giants 16, Browns 13 (72,068) at Cleveland Stadium.**

Brad Daluiso kicked a 33-yard field goal with 19 seconds remaining to lift the New York Giants to a 16-13 win over the Browns at Cleveland Stadium. The loss dropped the Browns to 9-4 and into second place in the AFC Central behind the 10-3 Steelers, with three games to play. Daluiso kicked three field goals on the day after replacing slumping David Treadwell, who missed a 37-yard attempt in the second quarter. The Browns continuously hurt themselves by committing 11 penalties and turning the ball over five times, two leading to field goals. Yet Cleveland tied the game at 13-13 with 4:24 remaining when Vinny Testaverde rocketed a 60-yard bomb to WR Derrick Alexander to set up a Leroy Hoard five-yard scoring run. After that score, the Giants drove 59 yards on 13 plays, and used up 3:55 on the game clock, to set-up the winning field goal. Cleveland's Matt Stover kicked 41 and 23 yard three-pointers to extend his streak to 16 straight field goal attempts, tying Don Cockroff's club mark. The Giants scored the game's first touchdown on a 10-yard pass from Dave Brown to Aaron Pierce. Brown was 17 of 33 for 226 yards, one TD and one INT. Cleveland QB Vinny Testaverde completed 20 of 38 passes for 238 yards, no TDs and was intercepted twice. Testaverde lost a fumble, as did Eric Metcalf and Brian Kinchen (attempting a lateral). Rookie WR Derrick Alexander recorded the ninth-best receiving day in team annals with 171 yards on seven catches. He tied Paul Warfield's rookie mark for most 100-yard games in a season (three, set in 1964). The Giants' Mike Sherrard became the first opponent to record a 100-yard performance against the '94 Browns, as he gained 101 yards on five receptions.

**(14) Saturday, Dec. 10 - Browns 19, Cowboys 14 (64,826) at Texas Stadium.**

The Browns defeated the defending champion Dallas Cowboys, 19-14, in a game not decided until TE Jay Novacek was stopped inches from the goal line on the final play. With the Browns ahead 19-14, the Cowboys drove for the potential winning TD starting from their own 49-yard line (their best starting field position of the day) with 1:49 to play. Dallas marched to the Browns' six with 10 seconds left, when Troy Aikman hit Novacek at the one on a curl route over the middle. Novacek slipped on the wet turf, and S Eric Turner instantly made contact to prevent the Cowboys from the winning score. The Browns' defense, the stingiest in the NFL in terms of points allowed, forced four Dallas turnovers (two interceptions and two recovered fumbles) and kicker Matt Stover kicked four field goals (34, 32, 43 and 32 yards) - three set up by the turnovers - to extend his streak to 20 consecutive successful three-pointers. The Browns marched down the field on their first possession of the game, but Leroy Hoard was stripped of the ball by DE Charles Haley on the one-yard line and fumbled into the endzone, which was recovered by LB Robert Jones, ending a potential 68-yard TD drive. Dallas then marched 80 yards and took a 7-0 lead on Aikman's seven-yard pass to Emmitt Smith. Cleveland countered with a 63-yard, seven-play drive ending with a Vinny Testaverde-to-Michael Jackson two-yard "alley-oop" into the corner of the endzone. Stover kicked the first of his four field goals in the second quarter to give the Browns a 10-7 lead at halftime. Cleveland allowed Dallas just one net yard in the third quarter and held the ball for 11:04 compared to 3:56 for Dallas. Stover kicked another field goal early in the fourth quarter, and then a Don Griffin interception on the Cowboys' next possession set up Stover's third three-pointer and gave the Browns a 16-7 lead. Dallas rallied and drove 78 yards, 48 by Smith, to close the margin to 16-14. After an exchange of possessions, the Cowboys faced a fourth-and-one on their own 17, and the exchange between Aikman and C Mark Stepnoski was fumbled. DT Bill Johnson pounced on the loose ball, setting up Stover's fourth field goal (and team record 26th of the year) for a 19-14 lead, and forcing Dallas into needing a touchdown to win. RB Leroy Hoard paced the Browns' 134-yard rushing effort with 99 on 25 carries. Emmitt Smith gained all of the Cowboys' 112 rushing yards on 26 carries and scored both of the Cowboys' TDs, on a seven-yard pass and a four-yard run. Aikman was limited to 188 yards passing on 36 attempts, was sacked twice for 11 yards, and was intercepted twice. His longest completion of the game was 18 yards. Vinny Testaverde completed his first seven passes en route to 15 for 25, 118 yards, one TD and one INT. Cleveland converted three of its' four forced turnovers into field goals. The win, coupled with Buffalo's loss to Minnesota, clinched a playoff berth for the 10-4 Browns.

**(15) Sunday, Nov. 18 - Steelers 17, Browns 7 (60,808) at Three Rivers Stadium.**

The Browns lost to the Pittsburgh Steelers, 17-7, before a record Three Rivers Stadium crowd of 60,808, assuring the Steelers of the AFC Central title and the Browns of a Wild Card spot. Cleveland committed three turnovers, 10 penalties and spotted the Steelers a 14-0 first quarter lead. The Browns had faced a 14-point deficit only once all season (at Denver, in the third quarter). Pittsburgh's touchdowns came on a 40-yard strike from Neil O'Donnell to Yancey Thigpen, the longest TD pass against Cleveland in 1994 (the previous long was Thigpen's 31-yarder in week two against the Browns), and a Barry Foster one-yard run. Foster became just the second back to gain over 100 yards (joining Emmitt Smith) against Cleveland, as he compiled 106 yards on 32 carries. Late in the second quarter, the Browns marched 84 yards on nine plays to cut the lead to 14-7, as Vinny Testaverde hit Mark Carrier on a 14-yard TD pass with 10 seconds left in the first half. It was the longest drive against the Steelers all season. The Browns received the second half kickoff, and the play following a Testaverde-to-Byner pass netted 30 yards. Leroy Hoard lost a fumble on a hand-off at the Steelers' 43-yard line. The Steelers were unable to convert the turnover, and the game headed into the fourth quarter with Pittsburgh still holding a 14-7 lead. On Cleveland's first fourth-quarter possession, Testaverde was intercepted by Chad Brown at the Browns' 45, and four plays later, Gary Anderson kicked a 49-yard field goal to extend the Steelers' lead to 17-7. The final two possessions by Cleveland ended on downs, the last one at the Steelers' two-yard line, as four Testaverde pass plays into the endzone fell incomplete. Vinny was 21 of 42 for 250 yards, one TD and two INTs, while O'Donnell finished 10 of 18 for 175 yards, one TD and no INTs. The Browns sacked O'Donnell twice (Michael Dean Perry and Rob Burnett), while the Steelers' league-leading sack attack tackled Testaverde just once. Pittsburgh gained 123 rushing yards on 41 carries, and 175 yards on 18 pass attempts, while the Browns, forced into throwing the ball due to the early deficit, gained 250 yards passing on 42 attempts, and 86 rushing yards on 24 carries.

**(16) Saturday, Dec. 24 - Browns 35, Seahawks 9 (54,180) at Cleveland Stadium.**

The Browns closed out the regular season with a convincing 35-9 win over the visiting Seattle Seahawks, as the offense scored a season-high five touchdowns. WR Mark Carrier scored on a 35-yard Vinny Testaverde pass and on a 14-yard reverse, his second career rushing TD. Testaverde completed 16 of 22 passes for a season-high 72.7 completion percentage, two TDs, one INT, and scored on a one-yard rush in the second quarter. He was not sacked, as Cleveland finished with a team record-low (and NFL low) 14 QB sacks allowed on the season. Eric Metcalf scored on a six-yard run on the Browns' opening drive, the 12th time in 1994 that Cleveland scored first in a game (record: 10-2). Three of the Browns' touchdowns came in the first half, staking them to a 21-0 halftime lead. Pro Bowl safety Eric Turner intercepted his ninth pass of the year, tied for the second-most in team history, to set up a Testaverde three-yard scoring strike to Derrick Alexander in the third quarter. Seattle's John Kasay kicked a 30-yard field goal in the third quarter, and James McKnight caught a 25-yard Stan Gelbaugh

pass late in the fourth quarter to complete the scoring. Cleveland finished as the league's stingiest defense and set a team 16-game record by allowing only 204 points, the sixth best performance since the NFL went to the 16-game schedule in 1978, behind the 1985 Chicago Bears (187), 1978 Pittsburgh Steelers (195), the 1978 Denver Broncos and 1986 Chicago Bears (198) and the 1992 New Orleans Saints (202). The victory was the 199th in Cleveland Stadium since 1950 regular season play, improving the Browns' 1994 home record to 6-2, and their overall mark to 11-5, tied for the second-most wins in franchise history.

**CLEVELAND BROWNS' 1994 POSTSEASON IN REVIEW**

(AFC Wild Card) Sunday, Jan. 1, 1995 - Browns 20, Patriots 13 (77,452) at Cleveland Stadium. The Browns advanced past the Wild Card playoff round with a 20-13 victory over the visiting New England Patriots, who entered the game with a seven-game winning streak. The Cleveland defense intercepted QB Drew Bledsoe three times (one each by Louis Riddick, Eric Turner and Pepper Johnson). Bledsoe threw for 235 yards on 50 attempts, with 21 completions, including a 13-yard TD pass to Leroy Thompson. His QB rating was 41.0. Browns' QB Vinny Testaverde completed 20 of 30 passes for 268 yards, one TD, with no INTs, for a 106.0 QB rating. Vinny threw a second-quarter five-yard TD pass to WR Mark Carrier to put the Browns on top, 10-7. At one point in the second half, he completed 11 consecutive passes. WR Michael Jackson led all receivers with seven receptions for 122 yards, the fourth-best yardage total in Browns' postseason history. The Cleveland running game, led by FB Leroy Hoard (17 for 66, one TD), totaled 125 yards, vs. 57 for the Patriots. The Browns opened the scoring with a Matt Stover 30-yard field goal, his 21st consecutive successful attempt on the year. Bledsoe's TD pass to Thompson gave New England its only lead of the game, 7-3, and then Testaverde hit Carrier for a 10-7 lead. A fake punt set up Matt Bahr's first field goal, tying the score, 10-10. Stover's 50-yard FGA at the end of the half was blocked by DE Mike Pitts. The Browns drove 79 yards in 10 plays midway through the third quarter, capped by a Leroy Hoard 10-yard TD burst for a 17-10 lead. On that drive, RB Earnest Byner converted a third down and five with a five-yard run, and became the Browns' all-time postseason rushing leader, surpassing Kevin Mack. Bledsoe threw consecutive interceptions on two New England fourth quarter drives, but the Browns were able to convert on only one, a Stover 21-yard field goal. The Patriots closed the gap to 20-13 when Bahr kicked his second field goal, a 33-yarder to move into second place on the NFL's all-time postseason field goal list. New England recovered the ensuing onside kick with 1:30 left in the game, but Bledsoe's fourth down pass from the Patriots' 48-yard line fell incomplete, securing the Browns' win.

(AFC Divisional Playoff) Saturday, Jan. 7, 1995 - Steelers 29, Browns 9 (58,185) at Three Rivers Stadium. Cleveland lost to rival Pittsburgh for the third time in one season, 29-9, to end the Browns' Super Bowl dreams. The Steelers totally dominated each phase of the game, building a 17-0 second-quarter lead before 58,185 Three Rivers' faithful. The Browns' offense sputtered on their first drive, suffering two dropped passes, and was forced to punt. Pittsburgh drove 65 yards on 13 plays, ending with a 39-yard Gary Anderson field goal. Following a three-and-out, the Steelers drove 53 yards on eight plays, as QB Neil O'Donnell (16-23 for 186 yards, two TDs, no INTs) threw a two-yard TD pass to TE Eric Green. Following a Browns' punt, RB John L. Williams burst threw a gaping hole and ran 26 yards for a TD to make the score 17-0. A Matt Stover 22-yard field goal put the Browns on the scoreboard, and following a forced fumble, the momentum briefly swung Cleveland's way, but on the second play following a fumble recovery by Eric Turner, Vinny Testaverde's pass intended for WR Derrick Alexander was intercepted by CB Tim McKyer. Three plays later, O'Donnell connected with Yancey Thigpen for a nine-yard TD pass and a 24-3 halftime lead. Gary Anderson's 40-yard field goal increased Pittsburgh's lead to 27-3, before Testaverde threw a 20-yard TD pass to WR Keenan McCardell. Testaverde was 13 of 31 for 144 yards, one TD, two INTs and was sacked twice, both on the Browns' final drive. The last sack by Carnell Lake in the endzone for a safety with 2:45 remaining, was the first-ever safety against the Browns in the playoffs and completed the scoring. The Steelers rushed for 238 yards, the most ever against the Browns in a playoff game, and were led by Barry Foster's 133 yards on 24 carries. The Steelers had 14 rushing first downs, and held a staggering 42:27 to 17:33 time of possession advantage. WR Ernie Mills gained 117 of Pittsburgh's 186 passing yards. The loss dropped the Browns' overall season record to 12-6, with three of the defeats coming at the hands of the Steelers.

## IT'S A FACT

The Browns first regular season win at Cleveland Stadium this season will be the 200th regular season home victory since entering the NFL in 1950. Entering 1995, the Browns' all-time regular season record at Cleveland Stadium is 199-112-5.

Last season, the Browns were 7-2 at home (including playoffs) and outscored opponents 221-91 in those nine games. The defense allowed just eight touchdowns on the Lakefront.

The Browns drew 559,582 fans to eight regular season home games last season, pushing the all-time regular season attendance total since 1946 to 22,019,239.

## GLOSSARY OF MEDICAL TERMS

**A.C. Joint**—Acromioclavicular joint; joint of the shoulder where acromion process (of the scapula) and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.

**Abscess**—An infection which produces pus; can be the result of a blister, callus, penetrating wound or laceration.

**Anterior**—In front of; the front surface.

**Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL)**—Ligament of knee attaching to anterior tibial plateau and posterior medial aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from coming forward.

**Arthrogram**—X-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected in affected area (to show torn cartilage or rotator cuff tears).

**Brachial Plexus**—Network of nerves originating from the cervical vertebrae running down into the arm.

**Burner**—Common term for brachial plexus trauma in the neck. Usually results in burning or tingling sensation into the shoulder or arm when the neck is forced beyond the normal range of motion.

**Capsule**—An enclosing structure which surrounds the joint and contains ligaments which stabilize that joint.

**Cartilage**—Smooth, slippery substance preventing two ends of bones from rubbing together and grating.

**Disc**—A flat, round-like, plate structure usually referring to cartilage between vertebrae.

**Echymosis**—Bleeding into the surface tissue below the skin, resulting in a "black and blue" effect.

**Effusion**—Accumulation of fluid, or the fluid itself, in various spaces in the body. Commonly found in the knee following injury.

**Epicondylitis**—Inflammation in the elbow due to overuse of either the flexor or extensor muscles attaching to the medial or lateral epicondyle of the humerus.

**Fibula**—The smaller of the two bones in the lower leg, located to the outside.

**Fracture**—Breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, incomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.

**Humerus**—Bone of the upper arm.

**Inferior**—Lower, beneath, toward the bottom.

**Lateral**—To the outside of the body.

**Lateral Collateral Ligament (LCL)**—Ligament of knee attaching lateral femoral condyle and to fibula head. It provides lateral stability to the knee.

**Medial**—Pertaining to or near the middle.

**Medial Collateral Ligament (MCL)**—Ligament of knee along the medial aspect that connects the femur to the tibia. It provides stability to the medial aspect of the joint.

**Meniscus**—Crescent shaped cartilage usually pertaining to the knee joint.

**Metacarpals**—Five long bones of hand, just below fingers.

**Metatarsals**—Five long bones of foot, just below toes.

**Neuritis**—Inflammation of a nerve.

**Patella**—The kneecap.

**Pectorals**—Chest muscles beneath breast, leading up to shoulder.

**Plantar**—Pertaining to the sole of the foot.

**Plica**—A fold of tissue in the joint capsule and a common result of knee injury.

**Posterior**—At the back part, or rear of the body.

**Posterior Cruciate Ligament (PCL)**—Ligament of the knee attaching to posterior tibial plateau and anterior lateral aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from going backward.

**Quadriceps (Quads)**—The four powerful muscles in the front of the thigh, responsible for extending the knee joint.

**Rotator Cuff**—Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area: supraspinatus, infraspinatus, teres minor, and subscapularis. Often irritated by overuse.

**S-C Joint**—Sternoclavicular joint; articulation between the sternum and the clavicle.

**Scapula**—The shoulder blade.

**Sciatic Nerve**—Largest nerve in body located in back of leg which controls most of its function.

**Sprain**—A joint injury. A violent twisting, stretching, pulling or tearing of a ligament.

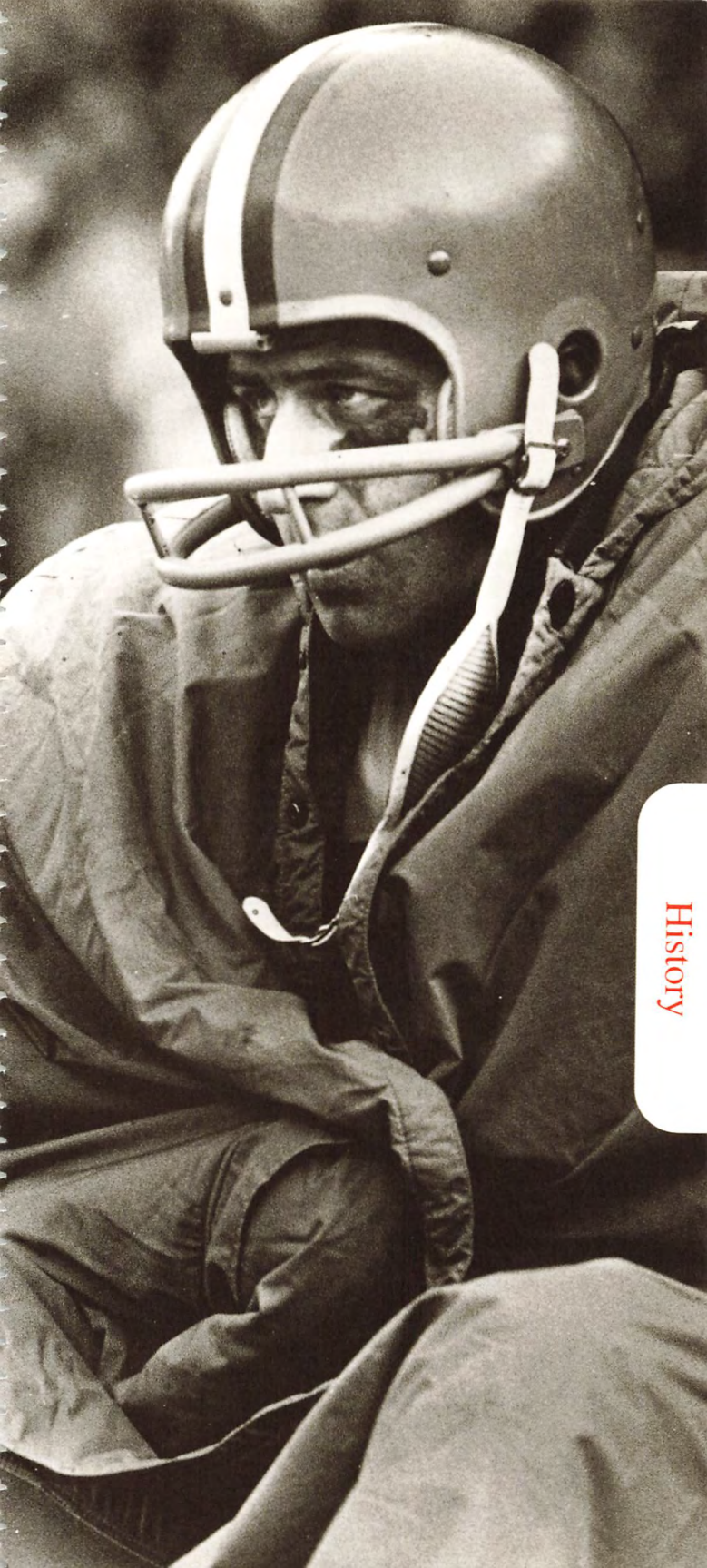
**Strain**—A muscle injury. The pulling or twisting of a muscle or tendon.

**Superior**—In anatomy, the upper of the two parts; toward the top or above.

**Triceps**—Muscle of the posterior upper arm, opposite the biceps, that extends the elbow.

**Ulnar Nerve**—Nerve in the elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing or repeated trauma.

## BROWNS' HISTORY

- 1946:** Browns were started by owner Arthur (Mickey) McBride as member of the All-America Football Conference. Paul Brown was named coach and general manager and the first player he signed was then tailback Otto Graham. The Browns won the Western title with a 42-17 victory over the Buffalo Bisons and then defeated the New York Yankees in the championship game (14-9).
- 1947-49:** Browns continued their domination of the AAFC, winning three more championships.
- 1950:** Following the merger of the AAFC and the NFL, the Browns tied with the New York Giants with 10-2 records for a share of Eastern title. Browns won playoff, 8-3, and then stopped Los Angeles, 30-28, for the championship.
- 1951-53:** Browns won three consecutive Eastern titles, but lost each time in the league's title match, once to Los Angeles and twice to Detroit. In 1953, McBride sold the club to an organization headed by David Jones.
- 1954-55:** Led by quarterback Otto Graham, the Browns won back-to-back NFL championships, defeating Detroit and Los Angeles.
- 1956:** At 5-7, the Browns suffered first losing season.
- 1957:** Jim Brown was drafted; was named rookie of the year and helped Cleveland to Eastern Division title.
- 1961:** Former television and advertising executive Art Modell purchased the Browns for the then unheard of sum of \$4 million.
- 1963:** Blanton Collier, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach.
- 1964:** Browns win division title with 52-20 victory over Giants and captured NFL championship with 27-0 win over Colts.
- 1965:** In his last season, Jim Brown won NFL MVP honors and led Cleveland to NFL title game where they were defeated by Green Bay.
- 1966:** An eighth round pick from 1964, Leroy Kelly became the club's dominant threat, rushing for 1,141 yards, but the Browns finished second in their division to Dallas.
- 1968:** With newly acquired quarterback Bill Nelsen (from Pittsburgh), Browns won division; beat Dallas in playoffs and lost to Baltimore in the championship.
- 1969:** Browns won third consecutive division crown, but lost to Minnesota in title game.
- 1970:** Browns became members of AFC Central and finished second. The Browns beat the New York Jets on Monday Night Football's first-ever telecast.
- 1971:** Nick Skorich, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach. Team won first AFC Central crown.
- 1972:** Browns once again gained postseason, losing to eventual champion Miami in playoffs, 20-14, as Dolphins complete undefeated season.
- 1975-77:** Forrest Gregg, Browns' offensive line coach, becomes head coach; Greg Pruitt has three consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons; Dick Modzelewski coaches final game of 1977.
- 1978:** Sam Rutigliano becomes the first non-Browns' assistant to gain head coaching position. Team won first three on way to 8-8 finish.
- 1979:** Losses in final two games prevented team from entering playoffs, finishing 9-7; Mike Pruitt keeps the tradition of outstanding Browns' running backs and has the first of three straight 1,000-yard seasons.

- 1980:** Browns win AFC Central title with 11-5 record; lost to eventual Super Bowl champion Oakland in playoff; Brian Sipe is consensus MVP of league.
- 1982:** In strike-shortened season, Browns finish eighth in AFC (4-5) and gain playoffs second time in three years. Lost to Raiders in Super Bowl Tournament.
- 1983:** Browns tied for wildcard playoff spot with 9-7 record, but lost NFL tie-breaking procedure to Denver and Seattle.
- 1984:** Browns replaced head coach Sam Rutigliano with defensive coordinator Marty Schottenheimer after a 1-7 midseason record and finished season at 5-11. TE Ozzie Newsome caught 89 passes for second straight year.
- 1985:** Browns captured their third Central Division championship, but lost to Dolphins, 24-21, in Miami. Rookie Kevin Mack (1,104) and Earnest Byner (1,002) each gained 1,000 yards rushing. It marked the third time in 66-year history of NFL that teammates both rushed for over 1,000 yards in the same season.
- 1986:** Browns won more games than ever before during regular season, finishing 12-4 en route to their second consecutive AFC Central crown. In a double-overtime playoff thriller before a packed Cleveland Stadium crowd, the Browns beat the New York Jets, 23-20, to advance to the AFC championship game. The Browns lose to Denver, also in overtime, 23-20.
- 1987:** Browns capture their third straight AFC Central, as they finished the season 10-5. The third week of the NFL season was cancelled due to the 24-day players' strike, while three "replacement" games were played (the Browns went 2-1). The Browns defeated the Colts, 38-21, at Cleveland Stadium in the AFC playoffs, then dropped their second straight AFC Championship to Denver despite a spectacular come-from-behind bid that saw them score 30 second-half points, only to fall, 38-33 in Mile High Stadium. Bernie Kosar wins the AFC passing title with a 95.4 QB rating, and an NFL-high eight Browns make the Pro Bowl.
- 1988:** Cleveland finishes 10-6 and earns a Wild Card berth by defeating Houston, 28-23, in the season finale by overcoming a 16-point third-quarter deficit. Houston defeats the Browns, 24-23, in the Wild Card game played on Christmas Eve. Four Cleveland quarterbacks suffered injuries during the course of the season. Marty Schottenheimer resigns on Dec. 27.
- 1989:** Owner Art Modell announces Bud Carson as the Browns' seventh full-time head coach on January 27. The Browns win their fourth division title in five years with a 9-6-1 record, and advance to the playoffs for an AFC-high fifth straight season. Browns advance to third title game in four years by defeating Buffalo, 34-30, but lose to Denver, 37-21, at Mile High Stadium in AFC Championship.
- 1990:** Browns suffer worst season in franchise history, finishing 3-13. Jim Shofner replaces Bud Carson as interim head coach on November 5.
- 1991-93:** Owner Art Modell announces Bill Belichick as the eighth full-time head coach on February 5, 1991. Browns move into new training and administrative complex, located in Berea, OH, in August, 1991 and hold training camp there in July, 1992. Browns finish 6-10, 7-9 and 7-9, respectively. Unrestricted free agency begins in 1993. Browns sign five players in first year of system, including quarterback Vinny Testaverde of Tampa Bay.
- 1994:** The Browns earn a playoff berth for the first time in the '90s, finishing 11-5 and defeating the New England Patriots, 20-13, in the Wild Card game at soldout Cleveland Stadium. The Browns faced the Steelers for the first time ever in the playoffs, and lost 29-9 at Three Rivers Stadium. The Cleveland defense sets a team record by allowing just 204 points, and six players go to the Pro Bowl. Leroy Kelly becomes 13th Brown to enter Hall of Fame on July 30.

## CLEVELAND STADIUM

Cleveland Stadium is a famous and proud landmark for the city of Cleveland. The Stadium, with a current capacity of 78,512, was completed in July of 1931 at a cost of \$3.5 million.

Despite the departure of the Cleveland Indians, the Stadium remains active during the summer. In the past two years, the Stadium has hosted a variety of events, including the Billy Graham Crusade, a USA soccer match, a truck and tractor pull show, motocross and concerts by "Pink Floyd", "The Eagles" and "The Rolling Stones." In September of 1995, the Stadium will host the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame concerts, part of the Hall's grand opening.

A \$6,000,000 improvement program was completed recently, comprised of a new scoreboard (including sideboards that continuously update out-of-town scores), a new sound system, 47 color TV monitors located within the concourse, renovation of concession stands and upgraded restroom facilities, new roof lights, and replacement of all original electrical transformers, and new bleacher seating.

The Stadium, which sits on a landfill, has proved to be multi-purpose. The range of activities at the Stadium has included everything from a heavyweight championship bout (Schmeling vs. Stribling) to religious convocations. The Metropolitan Opera and the Beatles have performed on the field, as have circuses, rodeos, big bands, tractor pulls, and a horde of professional and amateur athletes. In 1991, a Hollywood film crew used Cleveland Stadium as the setting for the television movie, "The Babe Ruth Story."

Over the years, the Stadium became a financial strain for the city of Cleveland. Art Modell responded to the need in 1974, when he formed Cleveland Stadium Corporation and signed a 25-year lease with the city. When the agreement between the city and Modell was first reached in 1974, the Browns' owner promised a \$10 million improvement plan, which was concluded in 1984.

Those original improvements included the addition of 108 luxury loges, a computerized scoreboard, more comfortable seats, new concession facilities, a new lighting system (both inside and around the perimeter of the Stadium), the installation of a new playing field, which was lowered two feet to provide a better view from the stands (1976), a new football pressbox elevator and many structural steel repairs.

Since 1984, additional improvements continue to be made as needed. Including the scoreboard mentioned above, over \$18 million has been invested in the building since 1974.

Former Cleveland Mayor (and current Governor) George Voinovich gives Modell and the Stadium staff the credit for saving the Stadium. "If the city had held onto the Stadium, it probably would be closed today," Voinovich said. (Cleveland Press, 3/28/80).

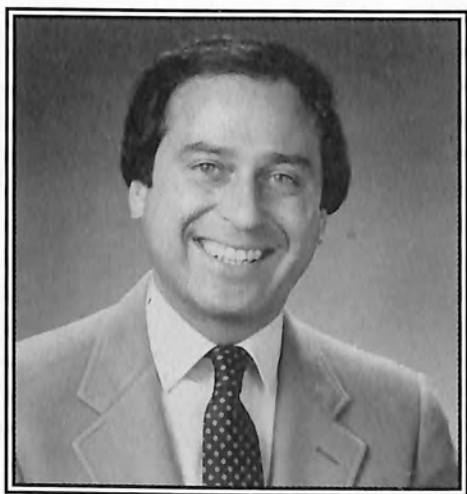
