Perhaps no one knows more about the realities of life in the NFL than Art Modell, one of 15 finalists for the league's Hall of Fame earlier this year. In 42 years of NFL ownership, he understands the highs and lows of building a championship-caliber team, the inner workings of the league office and the marriage between communities and their teams.

Art has lived much of the NFL's history. He doesn't just know about Vince Lombardi. He worked alongside the legendary coach to complete the league's first collective bargaining agreement. He doesn't just appreciate the powerful blending of the NFL and television, he negotiated, along with Pete Rozelle, the first standard-setting network contracts. He gave the last two Super Bowl winning coaches, Brian Billick and Bill Belichick, their first head coaching positions. He hired Blanton Collier, who led his 1964 Browns to the NFL Championship, after firing the legendary Paul Brown two years earlier. He helped revitalize a struggling city in Cleveland, which he eventually left after frustrating negotiations with politicians for a new or revamped stadium failed. He brought the NFL back to Baltimore and rewarded the Ravens' supporters with a Super Bowl victory in the team's fifth season.

For Modell, the years and seasons have been dramatic and traumatic, exhilarating and disappointing, full of joy and heart wrenching. He vacationed with George Halas, stood up for Ray Lewis, and used every resource he could to find help for the dying Ernie Davis. His closest friends include Wellington Mara and Jim Brown. Shannon Sharpe, now back with the Broncos, said: "Art talked with me every day. He knew everything about what was going on in my life. He showed real concern. But, it wasn't just me. He knew the practice squad players' names. He treated them the same. He was out at practice when it was 100 degrees and when the December snows came. I loved playing for him."

Art expects the highest level of effort from his associates, but he always applies his noted sense of humor. "Art wants to know everything we're doing, and he directs us every day. He's demanding, but he makes me laugh and smile at the same time. The tougher the situation, the better his humor," Ozzie Newsome, Ravens senior vice president of football operations, said. "One of the main reasons I came to Baltimore was to work for an icon like Art." Ravens head coach Brian Billick offered, "Certainly all of the selfish reasons you win a Super Bowl were there for all of us. But I can assure you that all of us wanted to win that trophy for Art, too."

In his first 41 seasons of NFL ownership, Modell won two NFL championships (1964 and 2000), and three other Modell teams ('65, '68 and '69) played in NFL title games. Three more ('86, '87 and '89) lost memorable AFC Championship battles against John Elway and the Denver Broncos. Nine other teams earned the playoffs, while five more entered the season's final week with a chance to make the postseason. Over the last two seasons, the Ravens own the second-best NFL record (27-11) to the Rams (26-10).

With his 27 winning seasons in 41 years, Modell has earned respect and recognition. But he might be more noted for his efforts on behalf of the league. In fact, his fellow owners surprised him with a salute at a league meeting in 1990 with this proclamation: "The league has always had its share of special people. They have been the founders, owners, officials and coaches who have stayed the

course over long periods of years, and who have made special contributions to the welfare of the league and its members. Art, you are one of those special people."

Modell is the only elected NFL president in league history, serving in that capacity from 1967 through 1969. He chaired the negotiations for the first collective bargaining agreement with the players in 1968, leading a committee that included Lombardi and Jim Finks, another NFL Hall of Famer.

Modell might be most noted for his tenure as the NFL's broadcast chairman. The contracts he negotiated over a 31-year period (1962-93) set the standard for sports TV. "The money generated from our TV contracts made our league strong, and it helped convince our ownership of the importance of all teams competing from the same financial base," Modell said. "These contracts leveled the playing field. It gave us competitive balance that still exists today. It meant that a small community like Green Bay could compete with a New York."

Art Modell, who bought the Cleveland Browns for what was then an unprecedented price (\$4 million in 1961), is the person who brought the NFL back to Baltimore. It was not an easy move to make for the proud Modell. "I didn't get into this business to go bankrupt, I'm in it to win, and I couldn't continue to make the best effort to win in Cleveland with the stadium situation we had. After I left, the politicians found the funds for a new stadium. I don't believe I could have gotten that done."

Modell did not leave the fans of Cleveland empty handed. He left the name "Browns," the team colors and the great Browns' history. "That didn't happen in Baltimore with the Colts, in Brooklyn with the Dodgers, nor in other cities that have lost sports teams," Modell explained. The welcome to the Modell family by the fans of Baltimore has been overwhelming. "The fans here have given us six years of sellouts. They were there at Memorial Stadium at the beginning, stood with us as we became a championship team, and continue to support us today as we go through our current transition."

"According to the individuals who run the clubs, the NFL's most respected owner is Art Modell. Modell, they say, makes it a point to get along with the many representatives of the league's many cliques and factions. He can be tough, but he plays fair. In a sense, they say Modell is the NFL."

Art and his wife, Pat, (see inclusion) are the parents of John and David. John, who coordinated the installation and use of the innovative scoreboards at Ravens Stadium (formerly PSINet), is a composer/producer and president of Modular Entertainment, a music and multimedia production company. John also coordinates the Ravens' home game entertainment schedule as the vice president of special projects. He and his wife, Tracy, an artist, live in Los Angeles with their son, Dylan Scot (3/21/92), and daughter, Isabella Sophia (4/28/98).

David, the Ravens' president, lives in Baltimore and has four children: daughters, Breslin Ebright (2/5/90) and Collier Honora (10/6/93) and sons, Arthur Edward (11/23/91) and David Orrick Jr. (9/25/96).

ART HISTORY

- ▶ Left high school at age of 15 to help financially-strapped family after the death of his father
- ▶ First full-time job was as an electrician's helper, cleaning hulls of ships in a Brooklyn shipyard
- ▶ Joined the Air Force in 1943 (he was 18)
- ▶ Under the G.I. Bill, he enrolled in a New York City television school following World War II
- ▶ Produced one of the first regular daytime television shows in the nation ("Market Melodies")
- ▶ Joined the advertising business in 1954 and soon became a partner for the L.H. Hartman Company

FOOTBALL HISTORY

- ▶ Purchased Browns on March 21, 1961
- ▶ Has won two NFL championships: the 1964 Browns beat the Baltimore Colts, 27-0, and the 2000 Ravens won Super Bowl XXXV with a 34-7 victory over the N.Y. Giants
- ▶ His 1965, 1968 and 1969 teams played in NFL title games
- ▶ His 1986, 1987 and 1989 teams lost memorable AFC Championship games to the Denver Broncos
- ▶ His 1967, 1971, 1972, 1980, 1982, 1985, 1988, 1994 and 2001 teams also made the playoffs

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- ▶ Only elected NFL president in league history, serving in that capacity in 1967, 1968 and 1969
- ▶ Chairman of the NFL’s Television Committee for 31 years (1962-93). During his tenure, the NFL TV contracts set the standard and records for the highest in sports history
- ▶ Chairman of the Owners Labor Committee, which successfully negotiated the NFL’s first collective bargaining agreement with the players in 1968
- ▶ Served on the NFL-AFL Merger Committee, breaking the impasse for realignment of the two leagues by moving the Browns into the American Football Conference
- ▶ First Chairman of NFL Films
- ▶ Was an important participant in the negotiations with ABC to start Monday Night Football and then volunteered to host the first game in Cleveland in 1970
- ▶ Conceived and staged the first doubleheader in NFL history, which consisted of the Browns and three other teams playing back-to-back preseason games at Cleveland Stadium. From 1962 through 1971, the Browns hosted the annual doubleheader each August attracting over 800,000 fans in those 10 years

PATRICIA MODELL

Like her husband, Art, and her sons, John and David, Patricia Modell believes in getting involved in the community. Pat is on the boards of the Kennedy Krieger Institute, the Walters Art Gallery, the Hospice of Baltimore and the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra. She helped establish and direct the Ravens Foundation for Families, and co-chaired (with Art) major fundraisers for Hospice (2001) and Cystic Fibrosis (1997). She was also instrumental in raising substantial funds and awareness for the House of Ruth, a shelter for abused women and children in Baltimore.

After graduation from college (New Rochelle), Patricia entered the acting profession. She soon appeared in three Broadway plays in her hometown of New York, where she also acted in over 200 live TV shows. The talented actress then moved to Los Angeles where she appeared in three series, including the long-running "People's Choice" and as Meg Baldwin in "General Hospital."

Patricia acted in other TV shows and movies. She retired from show business in 1969, married Art Modell and moved to Cleveland with her two sons. Pat quickly became an important part of her new home, dedicating her time and energy to a variety of important projects. She co-chaired major fundraisers for the Hospice of the Western Reserve and the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland. She also helped raise funds for the Make-A-Wish Foundation, the Playhouse Square Foundation, the Cerebral Palsy Association, Ursuline College, the Cleveland Musical Arts Foundation and the Cleveland Ballet.

"Art Modell has been a solid ambassador for the league. He has an exemplary track record for community service. And he's demonstrated great compassion for his players, including the establishment of the "The Inner Circle" in Cleveland. Modell has also been proactive in minority hiring: two of the NFL's highest-ranking African-American front office executives are with the Ravens."

David Modell keeps his associates at the Ravens focused: "Our number one goal is to win. This oversimplification cannot be re-stated often or loudly enough. It shapes every decision and action this organization takes," Modell says. "I don't want us just to be the best football team. We aspire to be the best business organization. As our mission statement proclaims: 'Here, the extraordinary must be commonplace.' We want to set the standard on and off the field."

With guidance from his father, Modell set and organized the structure for the franchise after the team arrived in Baltimore in 1996. "You have to have a vision and set realistic goals. Like a coach has to get the players in the right position to make plays, we aim to get the rest of our associates in the right spots to make us efficient and winning," Modell says. "You have to communicate effectively internally, as well as externally, and hold everyone accountable. Plus, we continue to embody my father's philosophy of being first-class in every way and having compassion. And, we try to have fun doing all of this."

David almost predicted the Ravens' Super Bowl XXXV victory. In an interview with NFL Films in the spring of 1999, Modell said: "How cool will it be to wake up in my house with the Super Bowl trophy next to my bed for a night? How cool will it be for others within the Ravens to do the same? How cool will it be for our fans to have that trophy in Baltimore?"

And the younger Modell was not selfish with the championship. The Ravens' Super Bowl trophy was touched by over 100,000 hands of fans before being placed in a trophy case. "We made sure that our fans knew that we understood that they are very much a part of our championship. Their support, their stadium and their investment in us are major factors to our winning. Sharing the trophy with them symbolized that union," Modell says.

David spearheaded the search for a new head coach after the '98 season and the subsequent hiring of Brian Billick. Modell organized a group of Ravens executives and detailed a profile of what the ideal head coach should be. The group then discussed and thoroughly researched approximately 50 possible candidates before focusing on Billick. "I was very impressed with David's approach, and he led the Ravens and me to Brian," Art Modell recalls.

David coordinated the opening of Ravens Stadium in 1998, which included a three-day football festival in downtown Baltimore that attracted over 100,000 fans. Modell then coached his associates at the Ravens to create an atmosphere at the first home games that would give fans the impression "that we've been in the stadium for years." He hired J.D. Powers to then survey the fans at the first few home games to test the results. "We received high marks in everything from video boards, to ticket takers, to ingress and egress. It said a lot about our associates and the good people who work with us on game days." It also said a lot about Modell's ability to organize and motivate.

Both *Baltimore Magazine* and the *Baltimore Business Journal* have saluted Modell. *Baltimore Magazine* picked him as one of "40 Leaders Under 40" in May of 2001, and he was picked by the *Baltimore Business Journal* (January of 2000) as one of "40 Under 40" leaders who help Baltimore industry and the community in general. He received the Better Business Bureau of Greater Maryland's "Outstanding Achievement Award" in the fall of 2001.

When the team arrived in Baltimore in 1996, David coordinated a fan vote through *The Baltimore Sun* to select the team nickname — the Ravens. Working with staff, NFL Properties and Baltimore area focus groups, he directed the process to select the team colors and uniform design. "It was a collaborative effort. The fans got involved, my family, obviously Art, plus many members of the organization." In 1999, David once again involved the fans in the vote for a new Ravens' logo.

No person in the Ravens' organization has more hands-on experience in as many different areas of the company as the 41-year-old Modell. Starting in Cleveland Stadium and game-day operations when he was 14,





David has had experience in every phase of the team except playing and coaching. He worked in the team's ticket office, public relations department, and started the marketing division in 1985.

As the Ravens' president and chief operating officer, he runs the club's daily activities. David is involved in every aspect of the team. He coordinated the many organizational details that came with the Ravens' run through the 2000 playoffs and eventual Super Bowl title. David also serves on the NFL's Stadium and Expansion Committees.

David made his first mark with the franchise and in league circles with the work he did marketing the Browns. The younger Modell started the marketing department in 1985 and developed a series of programs that enhanced the team's image and provided needed revenues. Other teams have copied some of David's innovations, including team television productions (weekly shows and preseason games produced by the team rather than selling those rights), an elaborate training camp magazine that is distributed to fans, and advertising moments of exclusivity at home games. The team's original television ventures were both produced and sold by Modell.

"At a time when most teams were wondering whether they should have a marketing department, David had ours up and running and setting a pace that a number of franchises have since followed. I'm very proud of his production and creativity," Art Modell says.

Modell is an active member of five Baltimore boards of directors: the United Way of Central Maryland, the Port Discovery Children's Museum, Father Martin's Ashley, the University of Maryland Medical System's Shock Trauma and the Maryland Public Television Foundation. David is also the chairman of the Ravens Foundation for Families. "Community involvement has always been a hallmark of Art Modell's franchise. My father and mother (Patricia) set the example. They not only recognize where they can help, they get things done. I'm fortunate to be able to follow their lead," David says.

In Cleveland, Modell was president of the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland, and he headed its development fundraising. He was a member of the Board of Trustees for the Cleveland Urban League and the Convention and Visitors Bureau. Modell also worked with the Lake County Boy Scouts Association and served on the Visiting Committee of the Athletic Department at Case Western Reserve University.

As a junior high school student, David worked Browns games as a member of the grounds crew. In the next few years, he spent time as a front office aide and training camp intern. He graduated from The Gunnery School (Washington, CT), where he delivered a stirring commencement address in May of 2001, and attended Wittenberg University.

Modell joined the Browns in a full-time capacity in the team's ticket office in 1981. He then worked two years as the front office manager for the Fernwood Inn, a resort in the Pocono Mountains (1982-84), before returning to Cleveland in October of 1984.

David is the father of daughters, Breslin Ebright (2/5/90) and Collier Honora (10/6/93), and sons, Arthur Edward (11/23/91) and David Orrick Jr. (9/25/96).



ART MODELL 42nd Opener

This year's opening day

will be the 42nd for Ravens owner Art Modell. Art's teams are 23-18 (.561) on opening day. Art speaks fondly of season openers. "Off the top of my head, I'd have to say the season opener in 1961, the first year I owned the Browns, is one I'll never forget. It was in Franklin Field against the Eagles, and Philadelphia's Timmy Brown took the opening kickoff 105 yards for a score. Lou Groza had just returned to the team after serving in the Army, and Lou was chasing him like

he had tin cans tied to his legs. Then there was the 2000 shutout over Pittsburgh that set the tone for the Championship season. The 1996 game at Memorial Stadium against the Raiders was right up there. That opened a new chapter in my life and reminded me why I love this game."

John Modell, who was named vice president of special projects in February of 1999, spearheads the Ravens' mission to provide the best game-day entertainment in professional sports. Modell, 42, is the eldest son of owner Art and Pat Modell and is president of Modular Entertainment, a music and multi-media production company in Los Angeles.

John was involved in the design and realization of the SMARTVISION video screens at Ravens Stadium. The two high-resolution displays are made up of over nine million LEDs and measure 100' x 24' each—the largest in any sports venue. The screens are used to combine graphics, scoring, stats and cutting edge video into one multi-functional format that is brighter and more visually dynamic than anything previously experienced. This new kind of video technology was the first of its kind in the world and has influenced scoreboards in every stadium built since Ravens Stadium opened in 1998.

Modell is very proud of the team's game-day presentations. "We've tapped into some of the finest talent from the video and film industry to create the bold visual look of the content seen on the SMARTVISION boards," said Modell. "Along with our outstanding sound system, the Ravens provide the best in-stadium experience in the business. That's what our fans deserve and have come to expect."

John also plays a key role in bringing other kinds of entertainment to Ravens Stadium, securing concerts such as Metallica and the HFStival.

"Ravens Stadium was built with concerts in mind. With the best technical facilities and acoustics, we have, hands down, the best stadium concert facility in this part of the country. We are well suited to compete in a marketplace that previously only included venues in the D.C. area," Modell said.

Modell majored in music composition at the California Institute of the Arts (Cal Arts). Prior to that, John attended high school at University School in Cleveland, where he played defensive tackle.

John is a composer and music producer, creating music for TV, commercials and records. With his company, Modular Entertainment, he is also involved in the design and production of live multi-media events and installations. He is the author of the Ravens Fight Song. John and his wife, Tracy, an artist, are the parents of Dylan Scot (3/21/92) and Isabella Sophia (4/28/98).

Did You KNOW ?

In addition to NFL football, Ravens Stadium has hosted concerts, such as Metallica and the HFStival, and is the sports home for the MLL Baltimore Bayhawks and the annual high school Turkey Bowl games held each November between City and Poly and Calvert Hall and Loyola. Ravens Stadium also hosted the Army-Navy Game in December of 2000.

Steve Bisciotti is the minority owner of the Baltimore Ravens and has the option to purchase the franchise from Art Modell in 2004. Bisciotti is a lifelong Baltimore-area resident and a self-described avid Ravens fan. "I have the utmost respect for Art Modell, and I'm thrilled to be associated with the Ravens. I enjoy being involved with a team that is one of the NFL's top franchises," Bisciotti said.

Modell, who has owned the majority of his NFL franchise since he purchased it in 1961, is excited to have Bisciotti as a member of the Ravens' family. "As we've become more familiar with Steve, it is apparent why he has enjoyed such business success. He is a quick study, bright, plus he's a pleasure to be around. The respect he's shown toward me, my family and to the NFL is impressive and appreciated. He's a winner," Modell said.

To prepare for his ownership, Bisciotti regularly attends Ravens practices and important team functions, plus he accompanies the Modells and other Ravens executives to NFL Owners meetings. "I appreciate the willingness of Art and David to allow me to learn more about the NFL. The more time I spend with other members of the organization, I see firsthand why this franchise succeeds," Bisciotti added. "Being part of a Baltimore NFL franchise is a dream come true for me in many ways."

An Anne Arundel County businessman and an enthusiastic supporter of Baltimore area teams and the University of Maryland athletics, Bisciotti founded Aerotek, now known as the Allegis Group, in 1983. He helped build it into one of the nation's leading technical staffing firms. Steve quietly contributes significant funds to a variety of Baltimore community projects.

Bisciotti was born on April 10, 1960, in Severna Park, MD, and graduated from Salisbury State University in 1982. Steve and his wife, Renee, reside in Millersville, MD, with their two sons, Jason, 17, and Jack, 15.

Ozzie Newsome, promoted to senior vice president of football operations in the fall of 2001, is a man with credentials. He is the architect of a Ravens' football team that has earned the second best record in the NFL (27-11) over the last two years (Rams are 26-10). These two Ravens teams made the playoffs with the 2000 squad winning Super Bowl XXXV. He is legendary in his home state of Alabama, where he earned college Hall of Fame honors. Plus, he's counted among the elite players in NFL history, capped by his induction into the NFL Hall of Fame (1999).

Yet for all of his success and notoriety, Newsome's style is notable. Humble is his way. Gentle is his manner. Hard work is his mantra. As a player, he was about production without flamboyance. As one of the NFL's top executives, he credits those around him for the Ravens' success.

But those in the know understand. Rick Gosselin of the *Dallas Morning News* picked Newsome as the NFL's Executive of the Year for 2000. "Those awards and recognitions are very nice, but there are lots of Ravens responsible for our success," Newsome explains. "The support and direction from Art and David (Modell); Brian (Billick) and his coaches are the best. And I do think we have outstanding talent evaluators and hard-working scouts, headed by Phil (Savage) and James (Harris).

"One of our real strengths is that most of the personnel department has been together since the franchise started. We know each other well. We know how to evaluate what each of us reports as we go through the scouting process of bringing in new Ravens, either through the draft or free agency," Newsome says.

Newsome and his staff have assembled the youngest team in Ravens history. "We brought a group of players together that won a championship. It's now time to get different players here, plus keep the key guys like Ray Lewis and a handful of others, and build back to a championship level," Newsome explains. "That's the goal. Can we win another Super Bowl in the next three, four or five years? We're trying."

Newsome believes the heart of a Super Bowl champion comes from the draft. "You can't make many mistakes drafting, especially in the first rounds, and expect to win a title," Newsome says. "You then supplement your drafted players with selective use of free agency...the right veteran at the right price." If you spend any time with Newsome during the free agency period, you hear his mantra: "Right player at the right price."

"Drafts are exciting," Newsome explains. "They remind me of getting ready for a big game, like the Steelers or a playoff game. We feel pretty good about the players we acquired over our seven Ravens drafts, plus getting free agents who not only are productive, but guys like Rod (Woodson) and Shannon (Sharpe), who showed our young players how to prepare to win and stay winners. Now players like Ray Lewis and Jonathan Ogden show the young players."

2000 EXECUTIVE OF THE YEAR: OZZIE NEWSOME

"The Ravens needed help on offense, so Newsome signed the NFL's two all-decade tight ends, Shannon Sharpe and Ben Coates, and added QB Trent Dilfer for insurance. The Ravens cashed in the Dilfer policy in November. Newsome chose halfback Jamal Lewis in the draft ahead of Thomas Jones, and Lewis rushed for 1,364 yards. Newsome also signed Pro Bowl tackle Sam Adams for the defense."

The first draft (1996) under Newsome's direction produced two five-time Pro Bowlers in LT Jonathan Ogden and MLB Ray Lewis, who was the MVP in Super Bowl XXXV and the NFL's most valuable defensive player in 2000. Also making the Pro Bowl (twice) as a return specialist was Jermaine Lewis, a fifth-round pick in that draft. In his second draft (1997), Newsome picked linebackers Peter Boulware and Jamie Sharper, S Kim Herring and C Jeff Mitchell—all four started against the Giants in the Super Bowl XXXV victory. Boulware was a consensus choice for the NFL's 1997 Rookie of the Year, made the Pro Bowl twice and led the AFC in sacks last season with 15.

In 1998, Newsome coordinated the selections of CB Duane Starks and WR Patrick Johnson with the team's first two picks. Starks tied for the NFL's interception lead among rookies that year (equaling Charles Woodson's five thefts) and started eight games as a rookie. Starks added five more thefts in his second season, led the Ravens with six in 2000, and thrilled Ravens fans with a 49-yard interception for a touchdown against the Giants in the Super Bowl. Johnson caught the game-winning TD in the final minute of the Ravens' first win at Tennessee in 2000, allowing Baltimore to be the first visiting team to win at the Titans' new home.

Newsome continued his hot hand in 1999, when he tabbed Arizona CB Chris McAlister with the 10th pick in the first round. Most experts believe McAlister will be the next member of the Ravens' defense to earn Pro Bowl honors. Newsome and his staff also picked two starters, RT Edwin Mulitalo and WR Brandon Stokley, in the fourth round of the '99 draft. Stokley opened the scoring in SB XXXV with a 38-yard TD grab.

Newsome and his staff hit the mark again with the 2000 draft, picking RB Jamal Lewis with the first of two first round choices. Lewis set a Ravens' team record with 1,364 rushing yards as a rookie. WR Travis Taylor was also selected in the first round, and he was the team's leading wide receiver until a fractured clavicle placed him on injured reserve after nine games in his rookie season. Taylor came back with 42 catches for 560 yards last season.

The first four selections from the 2001 draft are expected to start for the Ravens this season: TE Todd Heap (1) and G/C Casey Rabach (3) on offense and CB Gary Baxter (2) and ILB Ed Hartwell (4) on defense.

The Ravens' 2002 draft has to be productive. "We drafted 10 players this April. I can see six or seven of those playing prominent roles for us this season. We think we selected some players who will be productive for us for four, five years and maybe more. If they're not, then we let down the franchise," Newsome says.

Not only have Ozzie's drafts been productive, but free agent signings have proven fruitful, too. One of the game's all-time great players, former CB Rod Woodson, made the Pro Bowl as a safety the last three seasons, his eighth, ninth and 10th trips to Hawaii. DE Michael McCrary has made the Pro Bowl twice and was a first alternate in 2000 after signing as an unrestricted free agent from Seattle in 1997. Along with TE Shannon Sharpe, Newsome recruited and signed DT Sam Adams, who produced his first two Pro Bowl seasons as a Raven (2000-01).

One of the first things Art Modell did when he moved his franchise to Baltimore was invite Ozzie Newsome to join him as the Ravens' vice president of player personnel. "I've known Ozzie for over 20 years," Modell says. "I knew him as a great player, a Hall of Fame-type athlete. He had tremendous abilities as an athlete, but he worked hard to be the best."

When Newsome retired following the 1990 season, his 13th with the Cleveland Browns, Modell asked him to join the front office as a special assignment scout. Two years later, "the Wizard" was promoted to assistant to the head coach/offense-pro personnel. "I had to find out what direction my career would go," Newsome explains. "Art gave me the opportunity to work with the coaches, and I enjoyed that. At the same time, I increased my experience with the personnel department and decided that's where I wanted my career to head."

"As best you can, you're always working on three-to-five year plans with your roster and the salary cap. We knew a few years ago that we would have to become a much younger team in 2002. The hope is that you build to a championship level, and we were fortunate to win the championship, and then transition for another run. We will be a very young team this season. But, our cap situation will be very healthy the next few years, and we'll be able to add players that either will keep us at the playoff level or put us back there."

In 1994, Newsome was named the team's director of pro personnel. While he continued to help on the field, Newsome provided detailed studies on other NFL players and recommended players the team should try to acquire. "I've seen some former players who can't make the transition to the front office. That has not been the case with Ozzie. He attacks his job the same way he became a great player—by working harder than those around him and learning everything he needs to know to be successful," Modell adds.

Newsome has gained induction into four halls of fame—the NFL's (1999), the National Football Foundation's College Hall of Fame (1994), the NCAA Hall of Fame (1994) and the University of Alabama (1995). Placed prominently on the wall of Newsome's office is a sideline portrait of Paul "Bear" Bryant. "Coach helped me grow up. He pushed me further than I thought I could go, both on and off the field," Newsome says.

Until Sharpe broke his records a year ago (see photo below), Newsome's pro career was the best of any tight end in NFL history. His 662 receptions (for 7,980 yards) are the second most ever caught by a tight end, and the most in Browns history. Ozzie ended his career as the fourth-leading NFL receiver of all-time. He earned three Pro Bowls (1981, 1984-85) and was a four-time winner of the Cleveland Touchdown Club's Offensive Player of the Year award (1978, 1981, 1983 and 1984). His consecutive game reception streak of 150 is the second longest in NFL history.

Newsome, who was named to the All-NFL team of the 1980's (2nd team), consistently received All-AFC and All-NFL honors throughout his career. Ozzie was a 1978 number one draft choice, along with Clay Matthews, and the two are among an elite group of Browns to play in three decades. The others are Gene Hickerson (1958-60, 62-73), Dick Schafrath (1959-71) and Don Cockroft (1968-80).

Winner of the 1990 Byron "Whizzer" White Award as the NFL's top community volunteer, Newsome is widely known for his willingness to help those in need. Ozzie, who works out every day, his wife, Gloria, and their son, Michael Ryan, live in Cockeysville, MD.



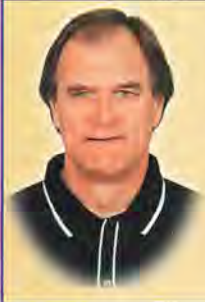

In the last four years, Brian Billick clearly demonstrated an ability to take NFL players to the highest levels of achievement. There's the Super Bowl victory following the 2000 season. There's the NFL's second-best record over the last two seasons (27-11 to the Rams' 26-10). There are the 2001 Ravens that ran over the Dolphins, 20-3, at Miami in the first round of the playoffs.

There are the numbers, offensively and defensively: in 1998, Billick coordinated a Vikings' offense that scored the most points in NFL history (556); and the 2000 Ravens' defense that set the NFL's 16-game standard for fewest points (165). Prior to Billick's arrival in Baltimore in 1999, the Ravens' defense had been ranked no higher than 22nd in the league over the team's first three seasons. In each of Coach Billick's three years as the Ravens' head coach, Baltimore's defense has been ranked second in the league.

"Success in any sport at any level is based, on a large part, on talent. Usually, the teams with the most talent win," Billick says. "But, I do believe coaching makes a difference. If I didn't, I'd find another challenge. I believe coaching and teaching are synonymous. We are teachers. We have a staff of good teachers, and I do think we make a difference."

"As a leader, your goals and aspirations must be strong enough to sustain you through the toughest of times. And trust me, if your goals are set high enough and your aspirations are worthy enough, there will be tough times."

Spend enough time with Coach Billick, and you're going to hear two words often: passion and accountability.

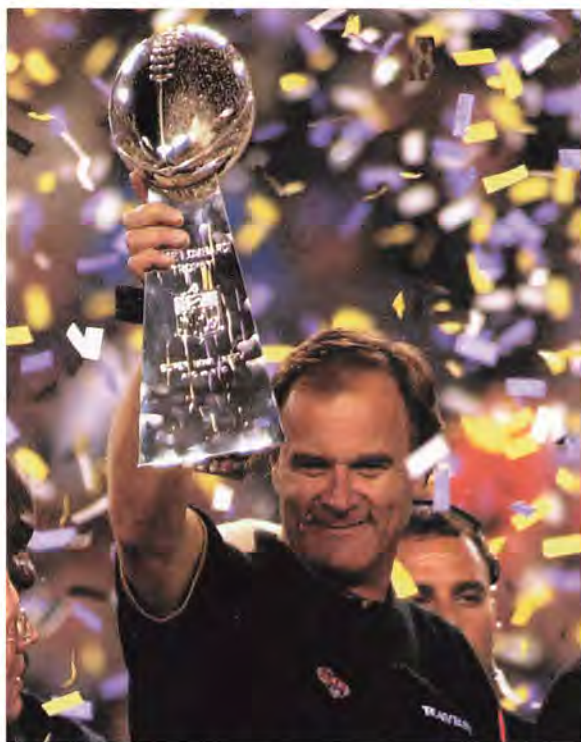
They are cornerstones to his foundation of coaching and leadership. These are ingredients some players and staff lacked when he took over as head coach of the Ravens in 1999. Not any more. You want passion? Watch the Ravens play games or practice. You want accountability? The team's performance under Billick speaks for itself.

"You have to have passion for the work you do to succeed. If a player doesn't like to study, practice or train, doesn't like the physicality of the game, he's going to have a very difficult time succeeding. Passion is a lubricant for success," Billick explains. "Accountability is obvious. You have to perform. Accountability is also a sign of respect for your team. It is a reflection of a team's integrity when individuals take responsibility for their actions."

In his second year at any level of being a head coach, Billick directed his team to the ultimate prize with a 34-7 Super Bowl victory over the New York Giants. The Ravens finished with a 16-4 record (12-4 in the regular season), blowing by opponents in the playoffs: 21-3 over Denver, 24-10 at Tennessee, 16-3 at Oakland in the AFC Championship game.

The 2001 Ravens defended their title with passion, but fell short of the goal of winning consecutive titles when they dropped a 27-10 decision at Pittsburgh, one game short of the AFC Championship. "I'm proud of what our players accomplished last season. Every time we had a setback, they responded. They could have curled up in the fetal position and cried for help, but they kept fighting until the end," Billick says.

Last season's list of Ravens injuries has been well documented. It started early. Billick's hope to combine a power running game with the accurate passing of Elvis Grbac never happened. RB Jamal Lewis and RT Leon Searcy, the team's significant offseason free agent addition, suffered season-ending injuries in the first week of training camp. TE Todd Heap, the team's 2001 number one draft



choice who was expected to team with Shannon Sharpe in two-tight end sets, sustained a high ankle sprain in week two and never fully recovered. There were games when none of the team's season-opening defensive front four could play. In all, Ravens starters missed a total of 54 regular-season games due to injuries, tops among the NFL's 12 playoff teams. Despite these obstacles, the Ravens finished the regular season at 10-6.

The 2000 Super Bowl champion Ravens finished first in five important league-wide defensive categories, including shutouts (4), points allowed per game (10.3), rushing yards allowed per game (60.6), rushing yards allowed per attempt (2.7), take-aways (49) and fumble recoveries (26). The team's turnover ratio of +23 was also the NFL's best. Baltimore, with then-rookie RB Jamal Lewis gaining 1,364 yards, was the league's fifth-best rushing team and was second in time of possession. K Matt Stover led the NFL with 35 field goals; Jermaine Lewis was first in punt returns (16.1-

yard average) and P Kyle Richardson was first in the NFL with 35 punts inside-the-20.

Billick's leadership shined in the playoffs when the Ravens outscored their four opponents 95-23. The Ravens became the fourth Wild Card team to win the Super Bowl, following the '97 Broncos, the '80 Raiders and the '69 Chiefs. Brian's ability to keep the team unified and focused that October when the Ravens did not score a touchdown (five straight games) and suffered a three-game losing streak is notable.

There were clear signs in Brian's first year (1999) as the Ravens' head coach that he had special leadership abilities. The 8-8 Ravens produced the most victories in the franchise's four years, won the most consecutive games (4), the most road games (4), including the first victory at Pittsburgh, won four of the season's final five games, and finished with the best-ever Ravens' defense (2nd in the NFL).

"Brian knows how to get a team ready to compete," says former Raven and future Hall of Famer Rod Woodson. "I joke that his training camps are 'Club Med' in comparison to others I've done. But, he knows how to keep players fresh. He treats us like men, and he expects accountability in return."

In Billick's first three seasons, Baltimore has the best November/December record in the league (18-5), and the second-best December mark (9-2). Brian is second to Joe Gibbs for consecutive playoff wins at the start of a career (five to Gibbs' six). Billick's three-year record is 35-19, the second-best mark among active coaches (Mike Martz entered 2002 with a 26-10 standard).

Billick became the second head coach in Ravens history when he accepted a six-year contract from owner Art Modell on January 19, 1999. Brian received a new contract this offseason that extends through 2005. Before arriving in Baltimore, Billick was the highly successful offensive coordinator for the Minnesota Vikings from 1994-98. He directed a Vikings' attack that set a variety of NFL and team records in a 15-1 1998 campaign.

"When we began our search, we couldn't talk with Brian because his team was in the playoffs," Modell says. "Instead, we talked with 28 people who had some direct association with Brian."

"Everything we heard about Coach Billick told us to wait for him," explains David Modell, the Ravens' president. The younger Modell and Ozzie Newsome, the Ravens' senior vice president of football operations, helped Art during the head-coaching search. "We talked with everybody from the person who introduced Brian to his wife, Kim, to Dennis Green, to Tony Dungy, to Bill Walsh.

All of these people painted a picture of a person and a coach ready to take the next step up in the NFL. And, Brian fit the profile of a coach with a set of skills and characteristics we wanted, and he's proven our assessment correct."

"I was very fortunate," Billick says. "Usually there is one 'hot' coordinator and one job available. I had other opportunities, but I picked Baltimore."

Billick, 48, was the architect of a Minnesota offense that in 1998 eclipsed the NFL record for most points scored in a season (556), breaking the old mark (541) set by the 1983 Washington Redskins. The '98 Vikings scored 53 of 56 times they were inside the 20. Minnesota tied for the NFL lead with 41 touch-down passes, shattering a team mark, and scored over 100 points in

each quarter for the first time in team history. Minnesota ranked second in the NFL (behind San Francisco) with a team-record 6,262 total net yards, and first in the league with 4,328 yards passing. Over his five full seasons as coordinator, Billick guided the Vikings into the top five in the NFL in yards per game, passing yards per game, completions and third-down conversions. Under Billick's guidance, the Vikings recorded their top three offensive seasons (1998, 1995 and 1994), and five of the top 10 offensive campaigns in team history. Most importantly, the Vikings advanced to the playoffs all but one season (1995) during Billick's tenure. Minnesota played postseason games in 1993-94 and 1996-98. Billick, of course, has followed a similar pattern with the Ravens, earning the playoffs two of his first three seasons as head coach.

Billick was hired in 1992 by Dennis Green as the Vikings' tight ends coach. Brian was named offensive coordinator three games into the 1993 season, and Minnesota's production increased dramatically. The Vikings went from 264.8 yards per game over the first six weeks of the season to a 323.3-yard average over the final 10 games. In Billick's first full season as offensive coordinator in 1994, the Vikings finished second in the NFL in passing yards (4,324) — now the third-most in team annals. Minnesota won the NFC Central Division title, but lost to the Bears in the first round of the playoffs

In 1995, the Vikings failed to qualify for the postseason, but the offense scored a then-team record 412 points and gained 5,938 yards. WR Cris Carter set a Vikings' record with 17 TD receptions (later tied by rookie WR Randy Moss in '98). QB Warren Moon set a then-team mark with 33 TD passes (topped by Randall Cunningham's 34 in '98). The 1996 Minnesota team qualified for a Wild Card berth with a 9-7 mark, as Carter grabbed 96 passes, and Jake Reed placed second in the NFL with 1,320 receiving yards.

"Brian really helped my development as a coach. I learned so much by being part of his staff—the way he treats the players, his organizational skills, his focus on everyone being accountable and bringing passion to what you do. He put me light years ahead of where I was. And he also encourages his assistants to learn about being a coordinator and head coach. He cultivates that. He wants players and coaches to reach for higher levels, to seek more responsibility, to prepare to succeed every day."

You can see a pattern in Billick's coaching history. Quarterbacks have their most productive seasons with his guidance. Moon, Brad Johnson, Cunningham, Tony Banks and Trent Dilfer transcended to new success with Billick's help. "Brian finds out what you do best, and he makes that a major part of what the offense will do. He holds you accountable, and he's a very good teacher," Cunningham says.

Before his appointment with the Vikings, Brian was a Stanford assistant from 1989-91 under Coach Green. Prior to Stanford, Billick spent three seasons as offensive coordinator at Utah State (1986-88). When he arrived at Utah State, the team was ranked 107th out of 108 NCAA Division I-A teams offensively. In his final two seasons as coordinator, the Aggies ranked in the top 10 in total offense.

Brian coached receivers, tight ends and quarterbacks at San Diego State from 1981-85, and held the added responsibility of recruiting coordinator. Aztec QB Todd Santos set all-time NCAA passing records during Billick's tenure. "San Diego State gave me a great chance to learn from a good offensive mind like Doug Scovil (head coach), to learn what it meant to coach, to be a professional," Billick says. "Doug wasn't particularly interested in doing a lot of administrative things, so I absorbed a lot of those and continued to learn what an organization needs to do to function."

Brian began his coaching career as an assistant at the University of the Redlands in 1977, while helping coach a local high school team and working at a health club at the same time. He spent the following year (1978) as a graduate assistant at Brigham Young University. At BYU, he worked with tight ends and the offensive line. Following that season, Brian was assistant director of public relations for the San Francisco 49ers in 1979-80. Two years earlier (1977), Billick had been drafted by the 49ers in the 11th round, was released and had a brief stint with the Dallas Cowboys. Brian earned All-Western Athletic Conference honors and honorable mention All-America in 1976 as a tight end at Brigham Young University. In 1976, he caught 20 passes for 338 yards and a touchdown. Brian played linebacker at Air Force as a freshman before transferring to BYU.

Since coming to Baltimore in January of 1999, Billick has enthusiastically helped improve the community. Billick gives extra time to the United Way of Central Maryland and to the Living Classrooms Foundation, where he serves on the board of directors. Brian has hosted significant fundraisers for the Living Classrooms, and has had a number of Raven players volunteer at this important educational facility. Brian has personally donated and raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for the Living Classrooms. Last April, Billick was the honorary chair for the American Lung Association's Breath of Life Celebration. Billick was picked as the Maryland Chapter of Multiple Sclerosis 2001 "Champion of the Year." Brian's wife, Kim, joins him in many of these community works, especially at the Living Classrooms. Brian also hosts an annual clinic for Maryland and southern Pennsylvania high school football coaches.

Billick has co-authored two books: "Competitive Leadership: Twelve Principles for Success" (with Dr. James A. Peterson) and "Finding the Winning Edge" with NFL Hall of Fame coach Bill Walsh and Dr. Peterson. This last book is a blueprint for developing an NFL team, covering everything from practice schedules to front office structure.

Billick was born in Fairborne, OH on Feb. 28, 1954, but grew up in Redlands, CA. He is the fourth of five children. Billick earned three letters in both football and basketball at Redlands H.S. At Redlands, Billick played quarterback and safety. He still holds the California prep record for career interceptions with 21. Redlands retired his jersey number 17 in March, 2001, and Brian has helped the school raise funds for the athletic department. He was a Helms Scholar-Athlete as a senior. Brian earned a B.A. in communications from BYU, where he also pursued a master's in communications. Billick endows a scholarship at the communications college at BYU. He and Kim (who at one time was an assistant to Tex Schramm of the Dallas Cowboys) have two daughters: Aubree (3/5/84), a freshman at Northwestern University, and Keegan (6/26/89).

Matt Cavanaugh has accumulated three Super Bowl rings in his 23 years in the NFL—one as the offensive coordinator for the Baltimore Ravens and two as a player for two different teams (San Francisco 49ers and New York Giants). Cavanaugh calls the Ravens' offensive plays and enters his fourth season in that capacity. In 2002, Matt will concentrate on his coordinator role, delegating quarterback coaching duties to David Shaw, who will coach both quarterbacks and receivers.

"We've got some younger guys on offense who have been with us for three or four years, and even though we're a younger team this year as a whole, these players are familiar with our system," said Cavanaugh. "I liked the chemistry and communication I saw between the players who have been here and the newcomers at minicamps. I think that chemistry is crucial in achieving success as a team."

Last season, Cavanaugh completed his third year as the Ravens' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach after serving in the same capacity with the Chicago Bears for two seasons (1997-98). The Ravens finished 14th overall in offense and 11th in rushing in the NFL, despite losing RB Jamal Lewis to a knee injury and RT Leon Searcy to an elbow problem in training camp.

"Our offense has improved steadily under Matt's direction," said head coach Brian Billick. "I expect that we'll be just as competitive this season. Matt is fully aware of how to play the game, as well as coach it. I think that gives us great insight. If we ask a quarterback to do something, Matt will tell us if what we're asking is possible. He's a solid teacher. I've got tremendous confidence that Matt is the kind of coach who can get these young guys ready to play and execute what we teach."

A 14-year NFL veteran quarterback, Matt is in his 10th season coaching, his sixth as coordinator. Since his arrival in 1999, Cavanaugh has worked with a total of five starting quarterbacks (Scott Mitchell, Stoney Case, Tony Banks, Trent Dilfer and Elvis Grbac). Dilfer finished 11-1 as a starter in 2000, including the Ravens' 34-7 Super Bowl XXXV victory over the New York Giants. The Ravens set a new team rushing record with 2,199 yards, fifth in the NFL. The powerful ground game, led by rookie Jamal Lewis (1,364 yards), enabled the offense to rank second in the NFL in average time of possession (33:19). The Ravens scored 333 points, second-most in team history, despite a five-game TD drought in October.

Cavanaugh spent the 1996 season as quarterbacks coach of the San Francisco 49ers, where he initially coached former Ravens QB Elvis Grbac. Matt tutored quarterbacks for the Arizona Cardinals from 1994-95. He launched his coaching career in 1993 as tight ends coach at the University of Pittsburgh.

Matt played 14 NFL seasons after being selected in the second round of the 1978 draft by the New England Patriots. He spent five seasons with the Patriots before being traded to San Francisco in 1983, where he backed up Joe Montana. (The 49ers defeated Miami, 38-16, in Super Bowl XIX following the 1984 season). In 1986, Matt was traded to the Philadelphia Eagles, where he played four seasons. He played for the Giants in 1990 and '91, where he earned his second Super Bowl ring as a player. In 112 career games, Cavanaugh completed 305 of 579 passes for 4,332 yards, 28 TDs and 30 INTs.

Cavanaugh was named MVP of the 1976 Sugar Bowl in which the Pittsburgh Panthers won the National Championship. Matt has three children: Amy (a sophomore at Southern Cal), and Andrew and Mollie. Cavanaugh lives in Owings Mills, MD.

Mike Nolan resumes the familiar role of defensive coordinator, a position he held for eight years with three teams: New York Jets (2000), Washington Redskins (1997-99), and the New York Giants (1993-96). A Baltimore native, Mike spent last season coaching Ravens wide receivers, but with the departure of Marvin Lewis (to the Redskins), Nolan shifted over to the defensive side of the ball in February.

Head coach Brian Billick said then that Nolan had been part of his plan for the future. "When we recruited Mike to join us a year ago, it was with the thought that Marvin could leave soon as an NFL head coach, and Jack (Del Rio) was another hot candidate for a coaching opportunity."

"Mike had a wealth of knowledge, but the only job I had to give him last year was receivers coach," Billick added. "I'm glad I did. His defensive background not only helped the receivers, but it helped the offense as a whole. He would look at film for us and explain what defenses were trying to do. He gave us that unique perspective. Now, he's got insight into how an offense prepares to attack a defense. That's a huge plus for him as he steps back to defense."

Nolan will use some elements of a 3-4 defense this season, but the Ravens still plan to use a number of different defensive looks as well, including the 4-3. "We're going to use the best configuration for whatever given situation we're in during a game," said Nolan. "There are a lot of factors that come into play in a game situation. It's important to be both versatile and aggressive and to use the talent you have in the best possible way, given the game situation at the time. The game changes constantly, and you have to be able to adjust quickly and come up with the solution that works."

In 2001, the Ravens finished second in overall defense (behind the Pittsburgh Steelers), fourth against the run and eighth against the pass. Ray Lewis led the Ravens in tackles (196) for the sixth straight season and led the NFL for the third time in his career. Linebacker Peter Boulware, who played defensive end after the season-ending injury to Michael McCrary, led the Ravens with a team-record 15 sacks (tops in the AFC and second in the NFL).

During his one-year stint with the Jets (2000) as defensive coordinator, the defense rebounded to 10th (tied with Philadelphia) in the league—11 spots better than the previous year (21st). Prior to the Jets, Nolan spent three years as defensive coordinator for the Washington Redskins (1997-99). While Nolan was with Washington, the Redskins captured the NFC East title (1999) and advanced to a divisional play-off game following a Wild Card game victory over Detroit. In '97, Nolan's defense allowed the eighth-fewest points in the NFL and finished third overall in pass defense.

Nolan spent four seasons (1993-96) as the defensive coordinator for the New York Giants under then-head coach Dan Reeves. In his first season, the Giants' defense allowed the fewest points in the NFL (205). Nolan joined the Denver Broncos (1987-88) as a special teams coach/defensive assistant and then moved to linebackers coach (1989-92).

He coached linebackers at LSU in 1986 and at Stanford in 1983, after a one-year stint as the Cardinal defensive backs coach (1982). In 1984-85, he coached defensive backs at Rice. In 1981, Nolan made his coaching debut as a graduate assistant at Oregon, where he was a 3-year letterman at free safety. Nolan participated in the 1981 Broncos' training camp as a defensive back under Dan Reeves. Eventually, Reeves hired him as Denver's special teams coach in 1987.

Mike, one of six children and the son of former NFL head coach Dick Nolan (San Francisco and New Orleans), graduated from Woodside (CA) H.S. He and his wife, Kathy, have four children: sons, Michael (a freshman at East Carolina) and Christopher, and daughters, Laura and Jennifer.

The Ravens named Gary Zauner as their special teams coordinator in February of 2002. Zauner spent the last eight years (1994-2001) coaching Minnesota's special teams. He was named the Vikings' special teams coordinator prior to the 2001 season, after spending his first seven seasons as special teams coach. During his tenure in Minnesota, Zauner's special teams players have set several NFL records, led the league in a number of categories, and Mitch Berger became the first punter in the Vikings' 39-year history to make the Pro Bowl ('99).

In 2001, Gary Anderson added to his NFL scoring record by kicking 15 of 18 field goals and 29 of 30 PATs, and now has 2,133 career points scored. P Mitch Berger finished seventh among the top 10 punters in the NFL and tied for second in the NFC with a 43.5 yard punt average. Anderson missed only one field goal in 2000, finishing the season as the NFL's leader in FG percentage (.957, 22-23). Against Buffalo on 10/22/00, he surpassed George Blanda to become the NFL's all-time leading scorer. Berger led the NFC in punting for the second consecutive season (44.7).

"There is a rare breed of special teams coaches, and in my opinion, a very rare breed, less than a handful, and I think we have the best by way of Gary Zauner," said head coach Brian Billick. "He has proven his expertise in not only special teams play, but in the specifics of kicking, punting and long snapping, which are such a huge part of this game. He is a tremendous resource to us."

Minnesota set a team record (1999) for kickoffs returned for a touchdown in a season with three (kickoffs by Robert Tate and Moe Williams and a punt by Randy Moss). The Vikings also led the NFL in average opponents drive start on kickoffs (23.5-yard line).

Zauner guided Anderson to the first perfect kicking season in NFL history in 1998 (35 of 35 on FGAs and 59-of-59 on PATs). Also in '98, Anderson set the NFL record for most kicking points with 164. Berger led the NFL with 40 touchbacks in '98, an NFL record since the kickoff was moved to the 30-yard line in 1993. He was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week twice and NFC Special Teams Player of the Month for November. Berger set Vikings single-game records for punting average (55.8) and net punting average (48.2) vs. Cincinnati (11/15).

In 1997, kicker Eddie Murray surpassed the then-NFL record for consecutive extra points of 234, en route to 250 at season's end. Harold Morrow set a team record with 32 special teams tackles and punt returner David Palmer led the NFC in punt return average (13.1) for the second time in his career. Zauner coached kicker Scott Sisson and punter/kickoff specialist Berger in 1996, both in their first season with the Vikings.

In 1995, K Fuad Reveiz set then-league records of consecutive FGs (31) and consecutive FGs of 45-or-less yards (39). Zauner's special teams placed a player among the top two in the NFC in punt return average (Palmer, 13.2) and kickoff return average (Qadry Ismail, 24.7) for the first time in the same season in team history. In his first season at Minnesota in 1994, Zauner guided punter Mike Saxon, who he tutored at San Diego State, to a team season record for punts inside the 20-yard line with 28. All-Pro Reveiz scored 132 points en route to his first Pro Bowl appearance.

From 1992-93, prior to joining the Vikings, Zauner consulted with many NFL teams and players on kicking and special teams. Some of the Pro Bowlers he has advised include John Kasay, Chris Gardocki, Cary Blanchard, Ralf Mojsisjenko, Eddie Murray and David Treadwell. He also spent time with All-Pros John Carney, Mike Horan, Jeff Jaeger, Chip Lohmiller and Nick Lowery.

Zauner was hired by George Allen at Long Beach State in 1990. He spent two seasons working with the 49ers' special teams program. From 1987-88, Zauner coached special teams at the University of New Mexico and guided former Falcons wide receiver Terance Mathis, who tied a NCAA season

record (1988) for TDs (three) on kickoff returns for the Lobos. From 1981-85, he was with San Diego State and guided the Aztecs to become one of the best special teams units in the country. Zauner's coaching experience began at Brigham Young in 1979, where in his two years, he recruited punter/placekicker Lee Johnson, a fifth-round draft choice by Houston in '85.

Zauner spent time as a punter at training camps of the Vikings ('73) and the Houston Oilers ('74). He lettered in football and baseball at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse where he received his bachelor's degree in health and physical education (double major) and master's degree in physical education. Gary graduated from Hamilton (Milwaukee, WI) H.S.

Mark Asanovich enters his first season as assistant strength and conditioning coach for the Baltimore Ravens and his eighth season as an NFL coach. Jim Colletto marks his 36th coaching anniversary this year and his fourth year as offensive line coach for the Baltimore Ravens. Despite injuries to the Ravens' offensive line as early as the 2001 training camp, which forced numerous substitutions throughout the regular season, the Ravens' offense managed a 14th overall NFL ranking. The team rushed for a total of 1,810 yards (3.7 avg.), second highest in team history.

In 2000, the Ravens set a new team rushing mark with 2,199 yards and a 4.3-yard avg., and RB Jamal Lewis set a new franchise mark by rushing for 1,364 yards. Lewis sustained a left ACL tear in training camp in 2001 and missed the entire season.

Colletto came to the Ravens in 1999 from Notre Dame, where he spent two seasons (1997-98) as offensive coordinator. In 1998, Jim coached tight ends in addition to coordinating the offense.

"Jim brings so much in terms of teaching at big college football programs," said head coach Brian Billick. "He's such a great motivator, he has fun with it, and he communicates well with all the players, both the young guys and the veterans."

Colletto has 11 seasons of head coaching experience, including five years (1975-79) at Cal State Fullerton and six years at Purdue (1991-96). He spent three seasons (1982-84) as Purdue's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. The 1984 Purdue team is the only Boilermakers' squad to beat Notre Dame, Michigan and Ohio State in the same season.

Prior to being named Purdue's head coach, Jim was the assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Ohio State from 1988-90, where he also worked with offensive tackles and tight ends. From 1985-87, Colletto was offensive coordinator at Arizona State. The Sun Devils defeated Michigan in the 1987 Rose Bowl. Colletto joined head coach John Cooper at Ohio State in the winter of 1988.

Colletto entered the coaching ranks at his alma mater of UCLA as a graduate assistant in 1966. He coached the Bruins' offensive line (1967-68; 1980-81), Brown (1969), Xavier of Ohio (1970-71) and Pacific (1972-74). Colletto graduated from UCLA in 1967, where he played both football and baseball. He led the team in rushing as a sophomore fullback in 1963. In 1965, he was an All-League defensive end and captained the Bruins' team that beat Michigan State in the Rose Bowl. He was a two-time All-League pick in baseball with a .306 career average as a catcher and centerfielder. In January, 2000, Jim was inducted into the UCLA Baseball Hall of Fame.

Jim and his wife, Suzanne, have three children: Dawn, Dan and Patrick. The Collettos live in Finksburg, MD.

Jeff Friday enters his fourth season in charge of the Ravens' strength and conditioning program after spending three seasons (1996-98) as the Minnesota Vikings' assistant strength and conditioning coach. Following the 2000 season when the Ravens became world champions, Jeff was named *Professional Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year*, by vote of his peers in the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Coaches Society.

"Jeff's signature is all over our strength and conditioning program," said Ravens head coach Brian Billick. "He is the one who keeps players in excellent condition. You can't overlook the fact that we have gone 9-2 in December over the last three seasons and then defeated Minnesota in the January makeup game (because of 9/11). Jeff knows how to motivate the players and get the most out of their bodies over the long season."

Friday joined the Vikings as assistant strength coach in 1996 after four years in the same capacity at Northwestern University. While with the Wildcats, Jeff worked primarily with the men's and women's basketball teams, although he helped develop the football squad that won the Big Ten title in 1995.

Jeff spent two years as the assistant strength and conditioning coach at Illinois State while he worked on his master's degree in exercise science. He earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

In 2002, Jeff received The President's Award from the Ricky Byrdsong Foundation, an organization that battles the growing epidemic of hate and violence in our society by and against youth. Jeff met basketball coach Ricky Byrdsong in 1993 during his tenure as strength and conditioning coach at Northwestern. In 1999, Byrdsong was walking with two of his three children a block from his home when he became the victim of a hate crime and was killed by a young man. He was 43.

A Milwaukee native, Friday attended Marquette University H.S. Jeff, his wife, Jennifer and daughter, Hailey (2), reside in Ellicott City, MD.

Wade Harman enters his fourth year coaching tight ends and assisting with the offensive line for the Ravens. Baltimore drafted Arizona State TE Todd Heap with its first pick (31st overall) in the 2001 NFL draft, and despite missing four games after injuring an ankle, Todd caught 16 passes for 206 yards and notched his first career touchdown vs. Cleveland. The Ravens selected another tight end, Terry Jones, Jr., out of Alabama (D5, 155th overall) in the NFL draft last April.

"Wade is known for inspiring his players," said head coach Brian Billick. "He's a great teacher and motivator. Wade has been familiar with our offensive system since his introduction to it when we were both at Utah State. His experience coaching the offensive line is also a plus. I can't think of a better coach for our young players like Todd and Terry."

Last season, future Hall of Famer Shannon Sharpe (who signed with the Denver Broncos in the off-season) became the NFL's all-time pass-catching tight end (on Nov. 18 vs. Cleveland) eclipsing Ozzie Newsome's NFL marks of 662 receptions for 7,980 yards. Sharpe entered 2002 with 690 career receptions for 8,553 yards, both all-time NFL records for a tight end. Sharpe caught a dazzling game-winning TD pass at Jacksonville (11/25) with nine seconds remaining. In 2000, the Ravens signed Sharpe, and he led the team with 67 catches for 810 yards and five TDs, plus added huge plays in the postseason, catching six passes for 230 yards and two TDs.

Harman spent two seasons (1997-98) with the Vikings as a coaching assistant, helping tutor the Vikings' offensive line under offensive line coach Mike Tice. He assisted the coaching staff with playbook development, practice plans and schedules, game plans, opponents scouting reports and also assisted the pro personnel department with player evaluations.

Harman came to the Vikings in April of 1997 after serving as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Morningside College in Sioux City, IA. He coached a variety of offensive positions at the University of the Pacific from 1992-95, and monitored administrative affairs for the football program.

He entered the coaching ranks in 1987 at Utah State, where he was a graduate assistant and worked under then-offensive coordinator Brian Billick. Harman was a linebacker at Utah State after transferring from Drake. He earned a master's degree in health, physical education and recreation from Utah State in 1988.

Wade and his wife, Angie, have two daughters, Madison (3/7/95) and Rylee (5/23/97), and a son, Hunter (2/17/00). The Harmans live in Reisterstown, MD.

Donnie Henderson, a Baltimore native, joined Brian Billick's staff in 1999 and is now in his 20th year of coaching. Henderson has helped coach the secondary for the past three seasons and will have increased responsibilities with the retirement of Steve Shafer, former assistant head coach/secondary.

Last season, the Ravens finished second in the NFL in overall defense and eighth against the pass. The secondary intercepted 12 passes (plus two more in the postseason), forced six fumbles and recovered six more. Baltimore's first-round pick (24th overall) in 2002 was safety Ed Reed from Miami, who is expected to play a prominent role on this year's Ravens defense.

"Donnie has always been good at teaching technique to young players," said head coach Brian Billick. "I think his 16 years in the college ranks demonstrates his ability to communicate to younger players. When you encourage passion and accountability to all your players, it works to your advantage, both on and off the field. Donnie lets them know they are accountable."

In 2000, the World Champion Ravens' defense set 16-game NFL records including fewest points allowed (165) and fewest rushing yards allowed (970). The secondary, led by Pro Bowl S Rod Woodson, who was named to his ninth Pro Bowl, helped set a team mark with 23 interceptions making the Ravens the NFL leader with 49 takeaways. Baltimore allowed only 11 TD passes in 20 games (tops in the NFL).

Before joining the Ravens, Donnie spent the 1998 season coaching defensive backs at the University of Houston. While at Houston, he was promoted to assistant head coach. Donnie spent six seasons (1992-97) on the Arizona State coaching staff, coaching safeties from 1992-94 and defensive backs from 1995-97.

Henderson spent two years (1990-91) coaching linebackers at California. Prior to that, Donnie was recruiting coordinator and defensive backs coach at Idaho in 1989. He started his collegiate coaching career at his alma mater, Utah State, in 1983 as a graduate assistant, then took over the Aggies' linebackers in 1986.

Henderson played two seasons at Santa Monica Junior College before transferring to Utah State. He earned first-team All-PCAA honors as a senior cornerback. Henderson was selected by the Detroit Lions in the 1980 NFL draft. Donnie lives in Owings Mills, MD.

Rex Ryan enters his fourth year coaching the Ravens' defensive line. Ryan has coached 70 games as a "D-line" coach in the NFL, and only once has a rusher gained 100 yards in a game against the front four. Baltimore's record-setting defense did not permit a 100-yard rusher in 50-straight games, including the playoffs, until the Bengals' Corey Dillon gained 127 yards on 24 carries (12/23/01).

Baltimore's streak was the longest since the 1993-95 Chargers had a string of 34 games without allowing a 100-yard rusher. Prior to the Chargers, the Eagles' 53-game streak occurred in 1989-92. The Ravens set a 16-game NFL record in 2000 by allowing only 970 yards rushing and 2.68 yards per rushing attempt.

In 2002, Ryan will help defensive coordinator Mike Nolan implement the 3-4 defense, but the Ravens will continue to use a number of different defensive looks, including the 4-3. Last season, Baltimore finished second in the NFL in defense, fourth against the run and eighth against the pass. The Ravens' defense finished in the NFL's top four in several important categories, including first in total yards allowed per play (4.4), second in total yards allowed per game (277.9), and third in rushing average allowed per play (3.4). Baltimore was fourth in the NFL in fewest points allowed with 265.

Rex joined Brian Billick's staff in 1999 after spending the 1998 season as Oklahoma's defensive coordinator. Rex coached the Sooners' defense after spending two seasons as defensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati. He used the "46" defense, created by his father, Buddy, throughout his coordinating career. Oklahoma's defense ranked sixth in the nation in total defense. While at Cincinnati (1996-97), the defense ranked fifth and 13th in his two seasons.

"Rex's enthusiasm is contagious," said Billick. "He's considered one of the best young defensive minds in the game today, and he has a great rapport with his players. I think he gets a lot out of his guys. They love to play for him."

Ryan spent two seasons (1994-95) with the Arizona Cardinals under his father, then-head coach Buddy Ryan. In his first season, he coached the defensive line, and in his second season, the linebackers. In 1994, the Cardinals ranked in the NFL's top five in every major defensive statistical category, including third in overall defense.

Before joining the NFL, Ryan was defensive coordinator at Morehead (KY) State from 1990-93. In 1989, Rex was assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at New Mexico Highlands. He started his collegiate coaching career as defensive ends coach at Eastern Kentucky in 1987.

Ryan played collegiately at Southwestern Oklahoma State. He earned both a bachelor of science and master's degree (1988) in physical education from Eastern Kentucky. Ryan attended Stevenson H.S. in Prairie View, IL. His brother, Rob, is linebackers coach in New England under Bill Belichick. The Ryan family has coached in five Super Bowls with five different teams. Rex and his wife, Michelle, have two sons: Payton (9) and Seth (8). The Ryans live in Ellicott City, MD.

David Shaw joined the Baltimore Ravens in February of 2002, replacing newly-promoted defensive coordinator Mike Nolan, who was the Ravens' receivers coach last season. Shaw's additional duties include coaching quarterbacks, a role formerly held by offensive coordinator Matt Cavanaugh.

David spent four seasons with the Oakland Raiders (1998-01) prior to his move to Baltimore. In Shaw's first three years with the Raiders, he was a quality control assistant for the offense, then secured a promotion to quarterbacks coach in 2001. The Raiders won the AFC West last season and gained a playoff berth, but lost the Divisional Playoff contest at New England, 16-13.

"I'm excited about David's role with the Ravens," said head coach Brian Billick. "He's familiar with the positions, and I like the idea of combining receivers and quarterbacks. I feel comfortable with the fact that I've known David for a long time, and I know how capable he is."

Shaw helped coach Raiders QB Rich Gannon, who last season ranked first in the AFC and second in the NFL (behind the Rams' Kurt Warner), with a 95.5 QB rating. Gannon completed 361 passes in 549 attempts (3,828 yards), and recorded 27 touchdowns and only nine interceptions. Oakland was fourth in the league in passing, and seventh overall in offense. Gannon won consecutive Pro Bowl MVP honors (2000-01).

In 1997, Shaw jumped to the NFL ranks by joining the Philadelphia Eagles as an offensive assistant. He worked closely with then-coordinator Jon Gruden and the other offensive coaches, studying tapes of opponents for game-planning, and assuming various on-field responsibilities.

Shaw spent the 1995-96 seasons at Western Washington and the early portion of 1997 at Idaho State. At WWU, he first tutored outside linebackers before moving over to the offensive side of the ball in '96 to oversee tight ends and punt returners. Shaw then had a one-month stint as wide receivers coach at Idaho State before joining the Eagles. He spent the summer of '96 with the Eagles as a training camp fellowship coach, working with TEs, WRs and PRs. One year prior, he worked with the Rams' linebackers as a coaching intern in St. Louis' 1995 training camp.

Shaw earned a sociology degree at Stanford. As a Cardinal, he recorded 57 receptions and six touchdowns at the flanker position and was a four-year letter winner. A multi-talented athlete, Shaw became only the third man in Stanford history to participate in three varsity sports (football, 1990-94; track, 1993; and basketball, 1994). Billick coached him in his first two seasons at Stanford. Shaw, a San Diego native, was a three-sport star at James Logan H.S. in Union City, CA.

Shaw is the son of Willie Shaw, defensive coordinator for the Minnesota Vikings, who also coached at Oakland and New Orleans, and is the nephew of two-time USC All-America football player Nate Shaw. David and his wife, Kori, live in Reisterstown, MD.

Matt Simon is in his fourth season as the Ravens' running backs coach. The return of Jamal Lewis, who is coming off an ACL injury to his left knee, should give the Ravens' ground attack an added dimension they missed last season. Despite Lewis' injury, the Ravens still earned rushing respectability a year ago, finishing 11th overall in the NFL.

As a team, Baltimore carried the ball 483 times for a total of 1,810 yards (3.7 average) and 11 touchdowns. The Ravens' rushing attack was 11th overall in the league last season, while total offense ranked 14th.

Jamal Lewis broke the Ravens' single-season rushing mark with 1,364 yards in 2000. Counting the postseason, Lewis combined for an amazing 2,038 yards, rushing and receiving. Baltimore set a new team rushing record with 2,199 yards, fifth in the NFL. In 1999, Ravens running backs did not fumble once in 431 carries.

"You have certain expectations when you achieve the kind of success we did when we went to Super Bowl XXXV," said head coach Brian Billick. "Matt is the kind of coach who won't be satisfied with past success. He's going to want to go out and do it again."

Simon served as a coaching intern in the Denver Broncos' 1998 training camp. Matt was head coach at the University of North Texas (1994-97), when he was named AFCA Region Coach of the Year in 1994 after the Mean Green won the Southland Conference Championship. The following season (1995), the football program moved up from Division I-AA to I-A.

He also won the 1994 Southland Conference Coach of the Year, the 1994 Black Coaches Association National Football Coach of the Year and the 1994 AFCA Region 4 Coach of the Year.

Prior to his post at North Texas State, Matt was offensive coordinator at New Mexico (1993), when the Lobos averaged 413 yards and 30.5 points per game. From 1982-91, he was the running backs and kicking coach at the University of Washington. He is a 1997 inductee into the University of Washington Hall of Fame. During his tenure, the Huskies went to nine bowl games and won a national championship in 1991. Matt coached several of the then-top 10 rushers in school history.

Simon coached tight ends and linebackers from 1979-81 at the University of Texas-El Paso. He entered the coaching ranks as an assistant coach at Borger (TX) H.S. Simon served as a graduate assistant at Eastern New Mexico in 1977 after lettering four seasons as a linebacker. Matt is a member of the Eastern New Mexico Hall of Honors and holds both B.S. and master's degrees from ENMU in physical education.

Simon is both a sponsor and chief fundraiser for the Howard County (MD) Bruins where he holds the post of general manager. His sixth-to-eighth grade youth football team plays a 10-game season plus a "super bowl," and they are part of the Mid-Atlantic Limited Football Association. "My goal was to put the team together, get them a place to play, buy them the equipment they needed and do something positive for my community," said Simon. "We did well, and I feel pretty good about that."

Matt attended Burgess H.S. in El Paso, TX, where he lettered in football and wrestling. He and his wife, Melanie, have three children: Micah, Matthew and Morgan. The Simons live in Ellicott City, MD.

Mike Smith takes over as linebackers coach in 2002, replacing Jack Del Rio, who held the position for the past three years. A fourth-year Raven, Smith played the linebacking position with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers in the CFL and at East Tennessee. He's had experience in one form or another with almost every position on defense and special teams.

In 2001, MLB Ray Lewis led the Ravens in tackles for the sixth consecutive season with 196 and also led the NFL in tackles for the third time in his career. Lewis has 1,086 career stops in 91 regular season games (avg. 11.9 per game). LB/DE Peter Boulware, who played mostly at defensive end after the season-ending injury to Michael McCrary, led the Ravens with a team-record 15 QB sacks (tops in the AFC and second in the NFL). Boulware has 52 sacks in 80 career regular season games.

"Our defense will be even more exciting this year, if that's possible," said head coach Brian Billick. "We have some veterans at linebacker, and at the same time, we have some young men with high expectations. We'll utilize several different schemes on defense, including changing up from a 4-3 to a 3-4. I know Mike will meet the challenge. There's no question in my mind that he has the qualities needed to be an outstanding linebacking coach in the NFL."

Prior to this year, Smith was a defensive assistant/defensive line coach, who was familiar with all aspects of the defensive game plan, and assisted with special teams. Smith was responsible for the preparation of playbooks, scouting reports and statistical analysis of opponents tendencies. In addition, his duties included self-scouting, defensive play-calling and preparation of scouting reports.

In 2000, the Ravens' championship defense set NFL 16-game records for fewest points allowed (165) and fewest rushing yards allowed (970).

Smith joined the Ravens in 1999 after coaching 12 years at Tennessee Tech, the last three as the Golden Eagles' defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. Mike signed with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the CFL in 1982 as a linebacker. He served as a part-time assistant coach at San Diego State University in 1982, and then spent the next three seasons (1983-85) coaching the Aztecs' linebackers. It was at San Diego State where he worked with Billick.

In 1986, Mike served as defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at Morehead (KY) State. Following that season, Smith joined the Tennessee Tech staff as defensive line coach. Smith also served as special teams coordinator from 1988-95. He tutored the line for nine seasons before being promoted to defensive coordinator and linebackers coach in 1996. As defensive coordinator, the Golden Eagle defense finished in the top 10 nationally in 1997 and 1998. Also in 1998, Smith was named the defensive coordinator/assistant head coach at Tennessee Tech.

Mike was named defensive MVP twice as a linebacker at East Tennessee. As a senior, he led the team with 186 tackles. He was a standout athlete at Father Lopez H.S. in Daytona Beach, FL, and earned all-state honors as a linebacker in 1975. Mike and his wife, Julie, are the parents of daughter, Logan, born 5/13/00. The Smiths live in Eldersburg, MD.

Bennie Thompson is in his third season assisting the Ravens' special teams, his first as an assistant to newly-hired Gary Zauner, formerly with the Minnesota Vikings.

Thompson was one of the game's best-ever special teams performers for 11 NFL seasons (1989-99) and three CFL seasons (1986-88). Bennie was voted to two Pro Bowls as a special teams performer in 1998 and 1991.

"Bennie truly knows what has to be done to perform on special teams," said head coach Brian Billick. "He is a tremendous measuring stick for players. I've always said that special teamers are a unique breed with a special brand of courage. His involvement on special teams makes us tougher."

Bennie joined the Ravens' coaching staff in August of 2000 after his stellar playing career. He totaled an amazing 197 career special teams stops, 149 tackles in the secondary, six sacks and seven interceptions. He played for the Modell franchise from 1994 through 1999, the Kansas City Chiefs from 1992-93, and the New Orleans Saints from 1989-91. Bennie played for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers from 1986-88 after being released by the Chiefs as a rookie free agent in 1985.

Thompson was a team captain and team MVP as a senior at Grambling, where he started for two seasons. He attended John McDonough H.S. in New Orleans, where he was a two-time All-State linebacker.

Phil Zacharias joined the Ravens in February of 2002, assuming the position of defensive assistant/defensive line coach and linebackers. Zacharias will work closely with Ravens defensive coordinator Mike Nolan in various capacities, including game-planning, studying opponents video, and assuming various on-field responsibilities. Phil's most recent coaching assignment was at Notre Dame, where he re-joined head coach Tyrone Willingham (named head coach on Jan. 2, 2002), as linebackers/special teams coach.

"I'm excited about adding Phil to our staff," said head coach Brian Billick. "His college experience speaks for itself. It tells you what a great teacher he is. He'll bring some enthusiasm and energy. I'm confident he'll contribute at a high level to the Ravens." While a member of the Stanford University staff, Zacharias' held a coaching intern position at the first Baltimore Ravens' training camp (1996).

Zacharias spent the past seven years at Stanford (1995-01) coaching defensive ends and special teams. Four out of the seven years, Phil coached a Pac-10 leader in sacks (Kailee Wong and Rial Johnson). The Cardinal ranked second nationally in punt returns (15.86 yards each) in 2001. He coached Luke Powell, who ranked second in the NCAA in punt returns, and earned first-team All-America honors as a kick returner from the Football Writers Association of America. In 1995, Zacharias' kickoff return unit ranked second nationally. Phil also coached 1997 Lombardi Award finalist Kailee Wong, currently a member of the Minnesota Vikings.

In 1995, Zacharias helped the Cardinal put together a first-ranked kickoff return team in the Pac-10 (second in the nation). The punt return team set a school record by blocking four punts during the season. In 1996 and '97, one of his students, (Wong), was named first-team All-Pac-10 after finishing among the league leaders in sacks and tackles-for-loss. In 1999, Zacharias special teams unit included a First-Team All-Pac-10 placekicker (Mike Biselli) and a kickoff return specialist (Ryan Wells), who ranked 10th in the country.

Zacharias began his coaching career at Georgetown College (KY) as the secondary coach in 1981. From 1982-84, he coached the secondary at St. Paul College in Virginia. While at St. Paul, he also served as the head baseball coach in 1983. Phil was a part-time coach at the University of North Carolina in 1985 before accepting a position at Morehead State University (KY), where he remained for three seasons (1986-88). There, he coached outside linebackers and was the strength coach in '86, the outside linebackers and special teams coach in '87, and in '88, he was promoted to defensive coordinator.

From 1989-90, Zacharias coached outside linebackers at Eastern Michigan University and then at Rutgers from 1991-93. During the summer of '94, he served as an intern with the Los Angeles Rams before becoming the defensive coordinator for Asbury Park H.S. in New Jersey.

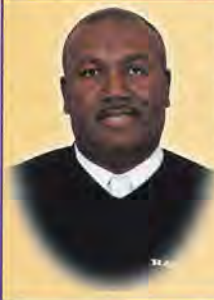

The Ravens' director of pro personnel since 1997, James Harris has played an important role in the Ravens' recent success. Harris, is involved in all aspects of the team's personnel decisions and works closely with Ozzie Newsome on a daily basis. "When the Chicago Bears interviewed 'Shack' for their top football position (during the 2001 offseason), we held our breath. We want him here," said Art Modell.

Over the last few years, the Ravens have had success acquiring key free agents, including Pro Bowlers QB Jeff Blake (Cincinnati, 1995 Pro Bowl) and TE Shannon Sharpe (eight Pro Bowls). The Ravens also signed key free agents DT Sam Adams from Seattle (2000-01 Pro Bowl) and QB Trent Dilfer from Tampa Bay prior to the team's Super Bowl run in 2000. During his first two seasons with Baltimore, James recommended DE Michael McCrary (1998 and 1999 Pro Bowl), DT Tony Siragusa and S Rod Woodson (1999, 2000 and 2001 Pro Bowl).

"There's a comfort zone we all have with Shack. And by all, I mean Brian (Billick), the assistant coaches, even the players," Ozzie Newsome, Ravens senior vice president of football operations, said. "When Shack says a player can play, we listen, because he's always on target. He's a student of the game, plus he brings the knowledge from his days as one of the league's top quarterbacks."

Harris was the New York Jets' assistant general manager for four years (1993-96) after scouting for six seasons for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1987-92). A former pro quarterback, James played for three NFL teams: Buffalo Bills (1969-71), L.A. Rams (1972-76) and San Diego Chargers (1977-81). He was drafted in the eighth round by the Buffalo Bills (1969) out of Grambling.

During his 12-year career in the NFL as a quarterback, James passed for 8,136 yards and 45 touchdowns. He led the NFL with an 89.8 pass rating in 1976 and was named MVP of the 1975 Pro Bowl. He rallied the NFC to a 14-13 victory with two touchdown passes. His best day came against Miami in 1976 with 17 completions in 29 attempts for 436 yards and two TDs.

Harris was coached by college football's winningest coach, Grambling's Eddie Robinson. The Tigers won back-to-back SWAC titles in 1967 and 1968. James was named MVP of the 1967 Orange Blossom Classic. He earned a bachelor's degree in education and was subsequently nominated as a distinguished alumnus for his contributions to American society during his NFL career. Harris, a legendary high school athlete in his hometown of Monroe, LA, has been inducted into the SWAC Hall of Fame, the Grambling Athletic Hall of Fame and the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. James attended Carroll (Monroe, LA) H.S. He and his wife, Vicki, live in Owings Mills, MD.

Phil Savage, one of the NFL's top football personnel experts, is in his seventh season as the team's director of college scouting and 12th year with Art Modell's franchise. Phil's promotion from national scout to college director came with the team's move to Baltimore. Savage manages the team's draft preparation and, with his staff, coordinates the evaluation of hundreds of prospects across the country.

In a survey conducted by *The Dallas Morning News* in 2000, the Ravens' drafts over the four-year span from 1996-1999 produced more Pro Bowlers (four) and a higher percentage of starters (38.5%) than any other NFL team. The survey also concluded that the Ravens had the highest percentage of drafted players still on the team at the time (69.2%). The survey included the years 1996-99, the period of time that Phil has served as director of college scouting.

Last April, Savage and the scouting department, under the direction of Ozzie Newsome, selected 10 players in the NFL Draft. S Ed Reed (Miami) was chosen as the 24th pick in the first round. Reed was followed by second-round pick DE Anthony Weaver (Notre Dame), fourth-round picks P Dave Zastudil (Ohio) and WR Ron Johnson (Minnesota) and fifth-round pick TE Terry Jones, Jr. (Alabama). The Ravens drafted four players in the sixth round: DB/RS Lamont Brightful (E. Washington), WR Javin Hunter (Notre Dame), RB Chester Taylor (Toledo) and S Chad Williams (S. Mississippi). QB Wes Pate (Stephen F. Austin) was the Ravens' seventh round pick.

Since 1996, the Ravens have drafted Pro Bowlers OT Jonathan Ogden (D1a, 1996), LB Ray Lewis (D1b, 1996), WR/PR Jermaine Lewis (D5, 1996) and LB Peter Boulware (D1, 1997). Other major contributors include LB Jamie Sharper (D2a, 1997), C Jeff Mitchell (D5, 1997), CB Duane Starks (D1, 1998), CB Chris McAlister (D1, 1999), WR Brandon Stokley (D4a, 1999), OL Edwin Mulitalo (D4b, 1999), RB Jamal Lewis (D1a, 2000), WR Travis Taylor (D1b, 2000), QB Chris Redman (D3, 2000), LB Adalius Thomas (D6, 2000) and TE Todd Heap (D1, 2001).

Phil joined the Cleveland Browns in '91, after a month-long stint as tight ends/running backs coach for the San Antonio Riders of the World League (coached by former Chargers head coach Mike Riley). His first three years with the Browns' coaching staff were spent as an assistant to former defensive coordinator Nick Saban (now head coach at LSU). The following year, Phil took on added duties in the personnel area when he began scouting college players, while continuing to break down coaching film and compiling scouting reports on upcoming opponents.

Savage, 37, launched his coaching career at the age of 21, when he served as a graduate assistant at Alabama under Bill Curry (current ESPN analyst) in 1987. From 1988-89, he coached the tight ends, including now-retired Giant Howard Cross. In 1990, Savage followed Alabama offensive coordinator Homer Smith to UCLA, where Phil coached tight ends, analyzed opponent game video and helped with administrative duties for the Bruins' offense. Savage worked under then-Bruins head coach and current 49ers general manager Terry Donahue.

Last summer, Phil held his 12th annual football skills camp for high school players in his hometown of Mobile, AL, where Murphy H.S. (his alma mater) is located. Three of Phil's graduates are current NFLers: DT Eddie Freeman (UAB), drafted by the Chiefs (D2, '02), QB Tee Martin (Tennessee), drafted by the Steelers (D5, '00) and DL Leonardo Carson (Auburn), drafted by the Chargers (D4, '00).

During the 2001 offseason, Phil teamed with his brother, Joe, and traveled with five Ravens coaches, players and two scouts to Cancun, Mexico, for a combined football camp and mission with the Ninos Mexicanos football players.

Savage played football and baseball at the University of the South (Sewanee, TN) and earned a B.A. in English. As a senior, he was selected as the school's Fellowship of Christian Athletes Male Athlete of the Year. He received a master's degree in physical education from the University of Alabama. Phil resides in Fairhope, AL.

Pat Moriarty, Ravens director of football administration, is responsible for negotiating player contracts, salary cap administration, roster management, and overseeing the day-to-day operations of the player personnel department. Moriarty is the team's top contract negotiator and main liaison with the NFL Management Council and Players Association.

Since the Ravens' arrival in Baltimore (1996), Pat has negotiated contracts and coordinated the signing of nine Ravens first round draft choices, as well as numerous important free agents. In addition, Moriarty has re-negotiated the contracts of several key players such as Michael McCrary and Jonathan Ogden.

Pat is the Ravens' "capologist," responsible for the management and strategic planning of the Ravens' salary cap. He works closely with Ozzie Newsome, helping coordinate budgets of the scouting, coaching, equipment, video, training, and strength and conditioning departments. Moriarty is also a member of the NFL Management Council's Club Services Committee.

"To use talent evaluation terms, Pat is an 'impact player' in our organization," Ozzie Newsome, Ravens senior vice president of football operations, said. "Pat is thorough and sound, plus creative in the structuring of contracts. He has a working knowledge of every team's salary cap structure and knows the ins and outs of working with the league office. His management of our cap helped us win the Super Bowl."

Moriarty earned a bachelor's degree in industrial management from Georgia Tech where he was a three-year starter at running back. He later earned his master's degree in business administration from John Carroll University. He worked for Key Bank in Cleveland in the corporate lending division before joining the Browns' front office in 1994.

A Cleveland native, Pat earned all-state honors in both football and track at Benedictine High School and was inducted into the school's athletic hall of fame in the spring of 2002. After college, Moriarty had the opportunity to come back to his hometown to play professional football for the Browns. He played running back (scored two touchdowns) and special teams as a rookie free agent in 1979.

Pat, who serves on the advisory board for the National Aquarium (located in Baltimore), and his wife, Lynn, are the parents of three children: Kevin (14) Laura (11) and Katherine (8). The family lives in Hunt Valley, MD.

Earnest Byner knows what it takes to endure and succeed in the NFL. The Ravens' director of player development, Earnest also assists running backs coach Matt Simon during practice and spends time assisting the personnel department throughout the year. Byner joined Art Modell's front office in 1998 after he retired in 1997 from his 14-year NFL career.

Earnest oversees the Ravens' player programs and works with the coaching staff on the field. As player programs coordinator, Byner administers continuing education, internship and financial planning programs for the team. "The Modell's are committed to helping players beyond the field, including post-career planning. It's my responsibility to make sure players use these resources to better themselves," Byner said.

Earnest, known for his toughness, determination and play, played 14 seasons and finished his stellar career ranked 16th on the NFL's all-time rushing list with 8,261 yards on 2,095 carries and 56 TDs. In his third season as the Ravens' western college supervisor, Vince Newsome scouts players from colleges in the Western half of the country for future NFL talent. Newsome also assists the pro personnel staff in evaluating free agent prospects during the free agency period. A former NFL standout defensive back for the Rams and Browns, Vince joined the Cleveland Browns' personnel department after retiring from the NFL in the spring of '93. His retirement came on the heels of a diagnosis indicating a high-risk spinal condition. Newsome had been a valuable "Plan B" acquisition for the Browns prior to the '91 campaign.

Newsome, played with Cleveland for three years prior to his retirement. He totaled 233 tackles for the Browns, leading the defense in '91 with 127 stops. With the Rams, Newsome led the team in tackles each of his last two seasons and three times in his last five years. His 10-year career totals include: 763 tackles (526 solo), four sacks and 62 defended passes. Vince grabbed 17 interceptions in his career, forced seven fumbles and recovered nine. He originally was a fourth-round selection by the Rams in 1983. A former Ed Block Award recipient (1989), Vince started seven of his 10 years in the league and was a Pro Bowl alternate behind Ronnie Lott in 1986. In 1985, he was named the Rams' special teams player of the year.

Newsome earned honorable mention All-America honors as a senior for Washington. He led the secondary with 69 tackles and recorded four interceptions. Vince was president of Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity at Washington and majored in psychology.

Art Perkins, who is in his sixth year as the Ravens' West area scout, covers the Pac-10, WAC and Big Sky conferences, among others. A fourth-round draft choice of the Los Angeles Rams in 1962, Art was named to the NFL's All-Rookie team. Perkins' playing career lasted nine years as a running back for the Los Angeles Rams (1962-64), Winnipeg Blue Bombers (1964-66), and Edmonton Eskimos (1967-70).

Following his playing days, Perkins landed his first coaching job in 1972 as offensive coordinator for the Los Angeles Mustangs. Perkins directed all facets of the Mustangs' offense before joining Compton (CA) College, where he spent 24 years. Perkins climbed the ranks at Compton College, starting out as an offensive coach (1974-77) in charge of quarterbacks, wide receivers, and running backs, before being promoted to director of cooperative education. On Friday, March 29, 1996, Baltimore's NFL team became the Ravens. According to *The Baltimore Sun*, a record-breaking 33,748 callers telephoned their vote in a fan poll. "The name means something historically to the community," said Ravens president David Modell.

The raven is 22-27 inches long, a powerful bird known for its sleek black feathers that look purple in certain lighting. It has been described in various encyclopedias as a "strong, soaring flier able to perform acrobatics," and a "bird that is mentioned in myths and legends as magical" and a "soaring bird that can be taught to speak."

The three finalists in *The Sun* poll included the Ravens, Americans and Marauders. The tally was Ravens—22,463; Americans—5,635 and Marauders—5,650. The previous Sundial record of 14,249 calls was set in 1993, over a three-day period, when readers were asked to name a potential expansion NFL team and chose the name Ravens.

Kevin Byrne has been an integral part of the Modell organization for the past 22 years. "Kevin has earned respect around the league and among the reporters who cover the NFL. He has performed a wide variety of duties for us, and his responsibilities go well beyond the regular public relations functions," Modell said. Originally from Cleveland, Byrne currently directs the Ravens' public and community relations, plus the content for the team's various communications vehicles. Byrne's activities for the franchise through the years have included contract negotiations, directing the team's marketing department and serving on committees to select and interview head coaching candidates.

Byrne coordinated with David Modell to start the team's television productions in Cleveland. The Browns were the first NFL team to produce their own preseason games and weekly TV shows. When they left Cleveland, the team was producing five weekly TV shows, including "Browns Insider," which was nominated for a local "Emmy" for "best sports programming" three of five years (1990-94). Byrne wrote most of the Browns television shows over a six-year span. In 1977, his first year in the NFL, Kevin was the public relations director for the St. Louis Cardinals. Two years later, he became the director of public affairs for Trans World Airline (1979-80).

Prior to the NFL, from 1974-77, Byrne was sports information director at his alma mater, Marquette University. He worked with Al McGuire and the Warriors' 1977 NCAA basketball champions. Byrne's first job after graduation was sports information director at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. Byrne earned a degree in journalism from Marquette University (1971), where he was selected to Alpha Sigma Nu, the National Jesuit Honor Society, and was a four-year member of the Warrior wrestling team. Kevin is a graduate of Lakewood (OH) St. Edward High School, where he is a board member and former chairman of the school's Board of Trustees. He received the St. Edward Alumnus of the Year Award in 2000. Byrne is also on the Board of Goodwill Industries of the Chesapeake and is the vice chairman of the Ravens Foundation for Families.

For 10 years (1985-96), he was the chairman of the NFL's Pro Football Writers' Liaison Committee. Byrne has been invited by the NFL to work 18 Super Bowls and two Pro Bowls. Along with the Ravens' publications director, Francine Gerres Lubera, Byrne co-wrote "Super Journey: Diary of the Ravens World Championship Season," following the Super Bowl XXXV victory.

Kevin and his wife, Sally, have four children: daughter, Shannon, and sons, Sean, Tim and Conor, a sophomore at Boston College.

Reaching Out



In the Community

Coming off the Super Bowl XXXV championship, it was important to the Baltimore Ravens to continue a strong community involvement with Baltimore and its surrounding communities that have supported the team since 1996. As it has over the 41 years Art Modell has owned the team, all franchise members are asked to be involved in the community. More often than not, associates willing to volunteer.



Art Modell has always made the marriage between his team and community a priority. Together with his wife, Pat, Art has contributed generously to many Baltimore area organizations such as the United Way of Central Maryland, House of Ruth and the Police Athletic League. In September of 2002, the Big Brothers Big Sisters of Central Maryland honored him at their annual banquet. Art also received a lifetime achievement award (2002) at the Arthritis Foundation's annual dinner, while Pat co-chaired the House of Ruth luncheon for the second year in a row. The Modells are on the boards of many local charity organizations and continue their extensive commitment to community involvement.

Ravens head coach Brian Billick not only encourages all of his players and coaches to be involved in the community throughout the year, but Billick is one of the most active members of the organization. As he has done each year since he arrived in Baltimore, Coach Billick spent much of the 2002 offseason with Ravens fans at community fundraisers and activities, including many Ravens Roost and Ravens Nest events in the area.

Among his many speaking engagements and charity activities was the American Lung Association's Breath of Life Celebration 2002. Coach Billick was Honorary Chair for the event that benefited children with asthma. In April, he spent two evenings with Ravens suiteholders and corporate sponsors, giving them his "State of the Ravens" address. Together with Redskins head coach Steve Spurrier, Brian hosted the 4th Annual Coaches Clinic for Maryland high school and college coaches on the morning of the Preakness. In 2000, Brian adopted the Living Classrooms Foundation and has served as both a spokesman and benefactor. He hosted a major fundraiser for LCF in June of 2001. This past offseason, Brian donated all funds generated from his local business motivation presentations to the Living Classrooms. He introduced the organization to his players, and many of them have spent hours working with the students enrolled in its courses.



The Ravens hosted their annual Spring Football Festival at Ravens Stadium on Draft Day. Each year, the event features Q&A fan forums with Ravens players and cheerleaders, interactive on-field activities and live ESPN broadcast of the NFL Draft on big screen TVs and spectacular SMARTVISION video boards. The event benefits the Ravens Foundation for Families.

The third annual Ed Block Courage Rally at Ravens training camp in Westminster (MD) signaled the start of the 2002 season, and once again helped raise money for a cause very close to the Ravens' organization: the St. Vincent's Center (also known as the Baltimore Ravens Courage House).



Each year, 100 percent of Ravens players, coaches and staff make a financial commitment to the United Way of Central Maryland, and each year the Ravens launch the annual campaign at the United Way Kickoff Luncheon, held in September. Each player and coach enjoys lunch with Ravens fans and United Way support-



ers during this major fundraising event. Also, as they have in years past, Ravens players and members from Sandtown Habitat for Humanity teamed with youth service corps members from Civic Works to take part in the United Way/NFL Hometown Huddle. In 2001, the group painted, framed and rebuilt three vacant homes in the Sandtown neighborhood of Baltimore City.

During the season, the majority of players spend Tuesdays (their only day off) in the community working with their favorite causes, including the Red Cross, Special Olympics of Central Maryland, Living Classrooms Foundation, the Police Athletic League and St. Vincent's Center.

Two-time Pro Bowl DE Michael McCrary's unmatched intensity on the field is equaled in his community efforts off the field. McCrary established Mac's Miracle Fund in April of 2000 with a \$100,000 contribution to Special Olympics of Central Maryland. He continues to focus his community efforts primarily on Special Olympics and the Baltimore Police Athletic League. In 2000, those efforts earned him the NFL's most distinguished national community honor: The Byron "Whizzer" White Award.



OL Edwin Mulitalo has been very active with the American Red Cross, especially after the events of September 11.

Mulitalo has not only shared his time to help encourage participants in local blood drives, but he has donated his blood at a number of these drives. He also has coordinated the involvement of many of his teammates in Red Cross events.



Former Raven Shannon Sharpe hosted the Gridiron Halloween party to benefit Goodwill Industries of the Chesapeake for two years. Sharpe was joined by many of his teammates in costume to help raise over \$100,000 for Goodwill Industries at these very successful events. TE Todd Heap and Mulitalo will co-host the 3rd annual Halloween party on Oct. 28.

The Baltimore Ravens established the Ravens Foundation for Families (RFF) in their first season in Baltimore. The foundation seeks to help change fundamental ills with which Baltimore and Maryland families must deal in the pursuit of healthy and productive lives for themselves and their community.

The Foundation's programming and funding are intended to make a difference in the quality of life in the state in which we operate. The funding priority of RFF is the physical and mental health of youth and the creation of environments for their positive social development.

The foundation is a separate non-profit entity of the Ravens' community outreach. It has set the objective of full participation from players, coaches, their families and Ravens associates that crosses various social, economic and ethnic strata.

That participation includes, but is not limited to, motivational talks, social education, anti-drug and anti-delinquency programs, football clinics, mentoring and fundraising efforts.

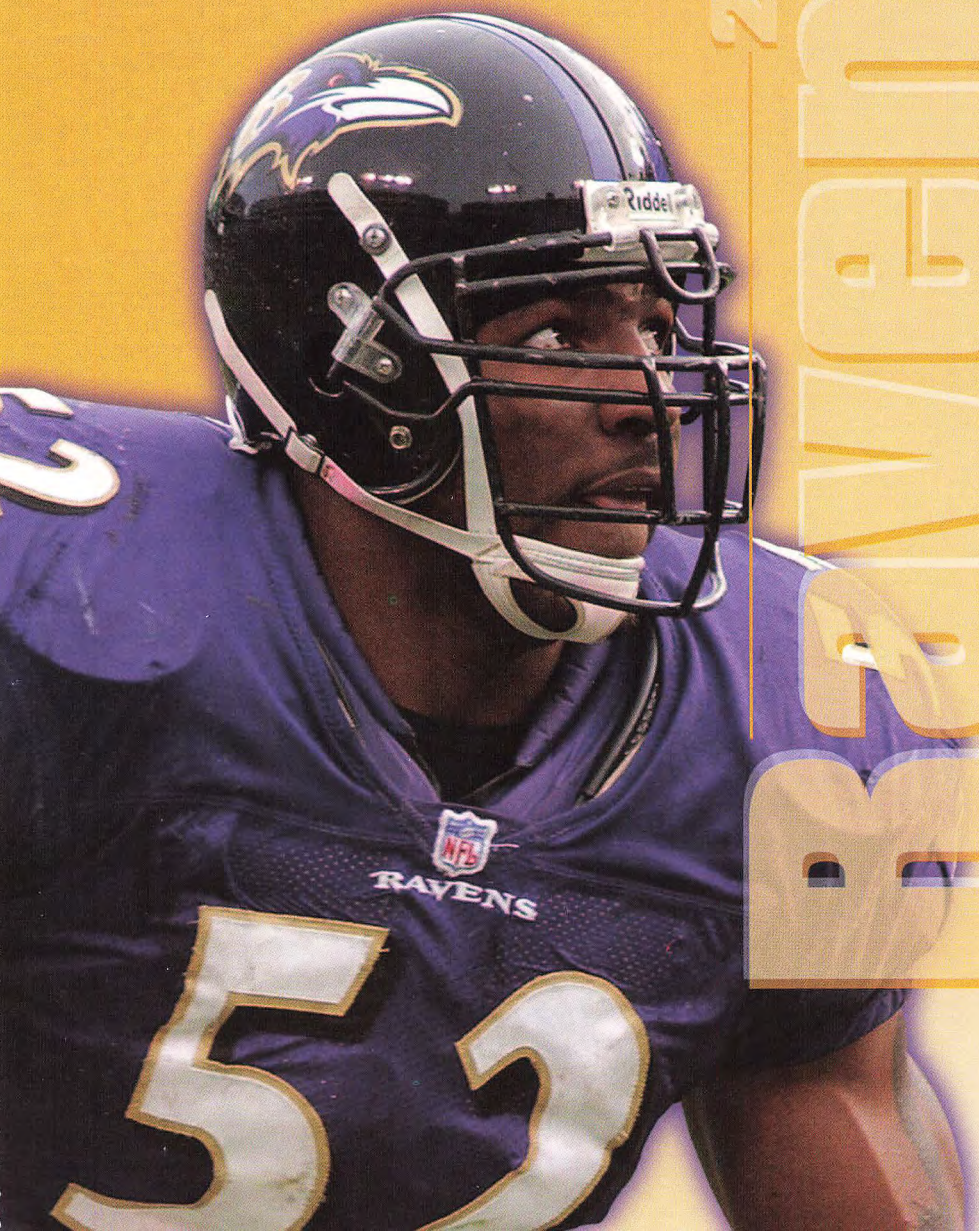

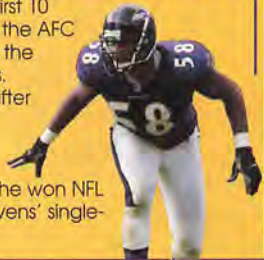

He tied a team record with four sacks in the regular season finale vs. Minnesota (Michael McCrary, 11/8/98 vs. Oakland) and had 7-1/2 sacks in the final month of the season after switching to defensive end. For his effort against the Vikings, Boulware was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week. Boulware has 52 sacks in 80 career regular season games. Peter's previous single-season high was 11.5 sacks in 1997, when he won NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year. Michael McCrary had held the Ravens' single-season sack lead with 14.5 in 1998.

PRO: The most dominant defensive player in the game today, Ray earned his fifth consecutive **Pro Bowl** in 2001 when he led the NFL in tackles (196)...Ray also earned first-team **All-Pro** honors in 2001...He was the second player in NFL history to win both **NFL Defensive Player of the Year** and **Super Bowl MVP (2000)**...Harvey Martin of Dallas won Defensive Player of the Year in 1977 and was co-MVP of Super Bowl XXII with Randy White...**Pro Bowl starter** and first-team **All-Pro** while leading the Ravens to the world championship - all at age 25...The emotional and physical leader of the Ravens, Lewis was voted to his **fourth straight Pro Bowl** in 2000 and once again led the team in tackles...Named a unanimous **All-Pro**...In 2000, led a defense that set a 16-game single season record for fewest points allowed (165), set the 16-game record for fewest rushing yards allowed (970), recorded four shutouts, one shy of the post-1970 merger record, and finished ranked first league-wide in six key defensive categories...Intense, physical, and experienced beyond his 27 years, Lewis has led the NFL in tackles three times (1997, 1999 and 2001)...In 2000, Ray led the Ravens with 187 tackles...Led all NFL tacklers in postseason with 31 (44 after coaches video review)...In 1999, he was credited with 198 tackles (131 solo) by Ravens coaches, 167 total tackles according to NFL play-by-plays, which led all NFL tacklers (Tampa Bay's Derrick Brooks was second with 153)...Has led the Ravens in tackles in each of his six years...Ray made his second

2001: First-team **All-Pro** and earned fifth consecutive **Pro Bowl** nod as he started all 16 games and led the team and the NFL with 196 tackles, the sixth consecutive year that he has led the Ravens in tackles...Made two tackles and scored a touchdown in the Pro Bowl...After CB Ty Law intercepted QB Donovan McNabb and ran 31 yards, he pitched the ball to Lewis, who rumbled 13 yards into the end zone while carrying three defenders on his back...Recorded 10 tackles (six solo) and forced two fumbles in 27-10 Divisional playoff loss at Pitt. (1/20/02)...Forced WR Troy Edwards to fumble on a reverse in the second quarter, but the ball was recovered by WR Hines Ward...Caused RB Amos Zereoue to fumble in the fourth quarter, but the ball again was recovered by Ward...Recorded seven tackles (four solo) in 20-3 Wild Card win at Miami

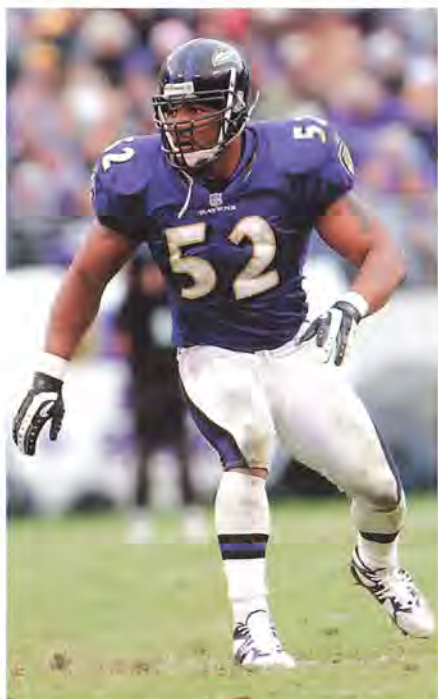

2000: NFL Defensive MVP and Super Bowl MVP...Pro Bowl Starter and First-Team All-Pro while leading the Ravens to the world championship - all at age 25...The emotional and physical leader of the Ravens, Ray was voted to his **fourth straight Pro Bowl** and once again led the team in tackles...Named a unanimous **All-Pro...Ravens 2000 Player of the Year** by the QB Club of Baltimore...Was named **AFC Defensive Player of the Year** by the K.C. 101 Club...Led a defense that set a 16-game single-season record for fewest points allowed (165), set the 16-game record for fewest rushing yards allowed (970), recorded four shutouts, one shy of the post-1970 merger record, and finished ranked first in six key defensive categories...In the postseason, Ray led all players with 44 tackles (28 solo), two interceptions (one for a 50-yard TD at Tennessee on 1/7/01), seven passes defended and a fumble recovery...Baltimore outscored opponents 95-23 in the postseason and the defense permitted just one TD (a two-yard rush by Eddie George)...Won the **Pete Rozelle Award** as the **Super Bowl XXXV MVP**...Recorded five tackles, three solo and four passes defended in the Ravens' 34-7 win over the N.Y. Giants (1/28/01)...One of the passes he deflected went into the arms of LB Jamie Sharper in the second quarter with the ball at midfield and the Ravens ahead 7-0...Made an amazing across-the-field tackle of RB Tiki Barber on a sweep left that appeared to

1998: Voted to the Pro Bowl as one of two middle linebackers (along with Junior Seau)...Also named All-Pro by *The Sporting News* and second-team All-Pro by AP...Led team with 154 tackles despite missing almost three games with a dislocated elbow...Also had two INTs, three QB sacks, 10 passes defended and a caused fumble...Led all tacklers with 13 (nine solo) at Chi. (12/20)...Recorded season-high 17 tackles vs. Minn. (12/13) and was on the field for all 92 plays the Vikings ran in 38-28 loss...Led team with 13 tackles at Tenn. (12/6), as the Ravens limited Eddie George to a 2.3-yard average (27-63) and the Oilers to 213 yards of offense in the 16-14 loss...Had a game-high 13 tackles in 38-31 win vs. Ind. (11/29), to give him an even 100 on the season...Recorded eight tackles, a QB sack and two INTs in 20-13 win at Cinc. (11/22), as defense limited Bengals to 242 total net yards and only 58 on the ground...The two INTs were a single-game high and led to two field goals...Had 15 tackles at S.D. (11/15), as Baltimore permitted a record-low 203 total yards...Also batted two passes...Finished with 12 tackles and also recorded a QB sack in 13-10 win vs. Oak. 2001 PLAYER PARTICIPATION CHART

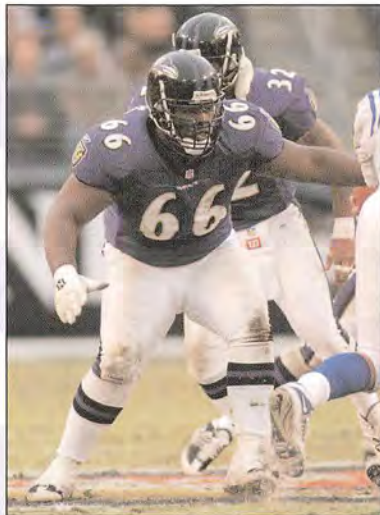

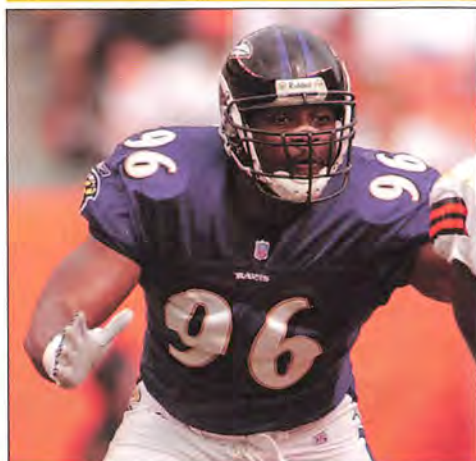

Ravens 17, Bears 6
(69,365) at PSINet Stadium



The Ravens scored a workmanlike 17-6 victory over the visiting Chicago Bears in the 2001 season opener at PSINet Stadium. Baltimore's defense did not permit a touchdown and intercepted Chicago starting quarterback Shane Matthews twice in the fourth quarter, the first by Ray Lewis leading to a touchdown and the second by James Trapp to seal the win. QB Elvis Grbac set a Ravens' single-game record by completing 80% of his passes (24 of 30 for 262 yards, one TD and no INTs for a 114.2 QB rating). Baltimore outgained Chicago, 316 to 183. The Bears opened the game with an impressive 14-play, 74-yard drive, but a goal-line stand by the Ravens forced a Paul Edinger 20-yard field goal. Matt Stover tied the game, 3-3, on the last play of the first half when he kicked a 37-yard field goal to cap a 72-yard, nine-play drive. Edinger booted a 46-yarder early in the third quarter after a Terry Allen fumble. But, the Ravens answered, though, by driving 87 yards on 11 plays and Grbac found a wide-open Sam Gash on a 6-yard scoring pass to put Baltimore ahead, 10-6. Matthews, who completed 24 of 39 passes for 138 yards, was intercepted with 5:47 left in the game by Lewis. Following Lewis' 21-yard return, Allen capped a five-play drive with a 1-yard TD rush, the 71st rushing TD of his career. Trapp intercepted Matthews on Chicago's next possession to seal the victory for the Ravens. The victory was Baltimore's 12th in a row overall and second consecutive opening day win.

Bengals 21, Ravens 10

The Ravens turned the ball over six times in a 21-10 loss to the Cincinnati Bengals at Paul Brown Stadium to snap a 12-game winning streak that started in the same stadium on Nov. 5, 2000. The opportunistic Bengals' defense intercepted QB Elvis Grbac three times and recovered three Baltimore fumbles. All the Bengals' points came off forced turnovers. Matt Stover kicked a 38-yard field goal in the first quarter to take a 3-0 lead. In the second quarter, a 17-play, 74-yard Ravens' drive turned sour when an apparent TD pass from Grbac to Patrick Johnson was overturned after an instant replay ruling showed Johnson had stepped out of the back of the end zone. Six plays later, a Grbac pass was batted into the air and intercepted by Cincinnati MLB Brian Simmons. Johnson fumbled the second-half kickoff, giving the Bengals the ball on the Ravens' 18-yard line. Five plays later, Bengals QB Jon Kitna found RB Corey Dillon on a one-yard TD pass for a 7-3 Cincinnati lead. It was the first offensive touchdown allowed by the Ravens in 17 quarters. On the Ravens' next play, TE Todd Heap fumbled after a 5-yard pass reception and CB Rodney Heath recovered. Six plays later Kitna ran two yards for a TD and a 14-3 Cincinnati lead. Late in the third quarter, Peter Warrick was hit by Alvin Porter after fielding a punt, and Brad Jackson recovered to give Baltimore the ball on the Bengals' 17. Grbac threw a two-yard TD pass to Johnson four plays later to cut the Cincinnati lead to 14-10. But with 6:18 left in the game, Grbac was intercepted by LB Takeo Spikes, who raced 66 yards for a TD and a 21-10 Cincinnati lead. Two long Baltimore fourth quarter drives failed to produce any points, and the Bengals recorded their sixth turnover on the last play of the game when Grbac fumbled on a QB sneak from the 1-yard line. S Cory Hall returned the ball 73 yards, but was tackled from behind by WR Brandon Stokley to end the game. Grbac set Ravens' single-game records with his 33 completions and 63 attempts. Baltimore out-gained Cincinnati, 382 to 203, and ran 86 offensive plays to Cincinnati's 55. The loss dropped the Ravens to 1-1 and improved the surprising Bengals to 2-0.

The Ravens improved to 2-1 on the season with a 20-13 come-from-behind road win over the Denver Broncos at Invesco Field at Mile High. Baltimore caused three turnovers, including two interceptions of QB Brian Griese, and limited the Broncos to 228 total yards. Denver's powerful rushing attack was limited to 61 yards, 34 by Mike Anderson. The Ravens' defense sacked Griese five times for 24 yards, and applied constant pressure (Griese finished as Denver's second leading rusher with 17 yards on five attempts). Baltimore QB Elvis Grbac was a steady 17 for 30 for 221 yards, with two second-half TDs. The performance earned Grbac his fifth consecutive career win over the Broncos, but not without an ominous beginning. His first pass of the game was intercepted by Chester McGlockton and returned 17 yards to the Baltimore 3-yard line. Griese then threw a TD pass to TE Dwayne Carswell and just 20 seconds into the game, Denver led, 7-0. Denver had one first half FG, and after the second quarter, it was 10-6, Broncos. CB Duane Starks intercepted a Griese pass with 6:29 left in the third quarter. Three plays later, Grbac threw a perfect sideline pass to Qadry Ismail for a 20-yard touchdown, tying the score at 13-13. The Ravens took the lead for good early in the fourth quarter with an impressive 12-play, 70-yard drive that featured a 20-yard burst off the right side by Jason Brookins. The drive was capped with a Travis Taylor 3-yard touchdown reception. Taylor finished with a career-high 90 yards on four receptions. Griese led two final drives in an attempt to tie the game. The first ended on a fourth down and one from the Ravens' 19, as TE Desmond Clark could not come down with a Griese throw. The second drive ended when Corey Harris intercepted a pass intended for WR Rod Smith to seal the impressive victory against previously unbeaten Denver.

Ravens 26, Titans 7
(69,494) at PSINet Stadium



The Ravens dominated division rival Tennessee, 26-7, to improve to 3-1 on the season. The win was Baltimore's third straight over the Titans and their seventh consecutive at PSINet Stadium. The Ravens rushed for 207 yards, fourth-most in team history, including 108 by Terry Allen, his first 100-yard game as a Raven and the 22nd of his career. Allen scored the game's first TD, and rookie RB Jason Brookins scored the last, as the Ravens put up points in every quarter. The Ravens' offense totaled 460 yards and 23 first downs. Tennessee CB Donald Mitchell was flagged for a 36-yard pass interference penalty on the fifth play of the game, and two plays later, Allen raced nine yards for a TD to give Baltimore a 7-0 lead. In the second quarter, QB Elvis Grbac hit WR Qadry Ismail in stride for a 77-yard touchdown. The reception was the longest as a Raven for Ismail, the second-longest of his career, and the fourth-longest in Ravens' history. Baltimore extended its lead to 17-0 with 5:01 left in the first half when Matt Stover kicked a 26-yard field goal. Stover's second field goal, a 25-yarder in the third quarter, gave the Ravens a 20-0 lead, moments later, the Titans' Mitchell blocked a Kyle Richardson punt and returned the ball 26 yards for Tennessee's lone touchdown. S Rod Woodson intercepted a Michael Green halfback option pass in the fourth quarter, and the Ravens drove 82 yards in 10 plays, capped by Brookins 1-yard TD run, for a 26-7 cushion (2-point pass failed). The Ravens' defense did not allow a touchdown for the second game of the 2001 season. Tennessee's furthest penetration was the Ravens' 28-yard line, and they crossed midfield just four times in 13 drives. DE Michael McCrary recorded two sacks and CB Duane Starks joined Woodson with an interception, giving both 18 for their Baltimore careers, tops on the Ravens' all-time interception list.

Packers 31, Ravens 23
(59,866) at Lambeau Field



The Ravens lost to the Green Bay Packers, 31-23 at Lambeau Field, falling to 3-2. Packers QB Brett Favre threw for three touchdowns and 337 yards, completing 27 of his 34 passes (79.4%). Favre improved his home record to 62-11 (.849), the best mark in NFL history, surpassing Terry Bradshaw's 67-12 (.848) mark with Pittsburgh. The Ravens turned the ball over four times, and the Packers capitalized by converting two of the miscues into touchdowns. Favre completed passes to nine different receivers, his favorite target being Antonio Freeman. The Baltimore native (Poly) caught nine passes for 138 yards and a TD. Things started well for the Ravens, as CB Duane Starks caused an Ahman Green fumble and Corey Harris recovered on the Ravens' 36. Four plays later, QB Elvis Grbac found a wide-open Travis Taylor for an 18-yard touchdown and a 7-0 lead. On the Ravens' next drive, FB Obafemi Ayanbadejo fumbled and Green Bay DT Cletidus Hunt recovered the ball on the Packers' 41-yard line. Favre marched the Packers 59 yards on nine plays, the last a 2-yard TD pass to TE Bubba Franks to tie the score, 7-7, early in the second quarter. Green Bay took the lead, 10-7, following a Ryan Longwell 33-yard field goal, then extended their lead to 17-7 after Mike McKenzie intercepted a Grbac pass, which led to a Favre-to-Freeman 8-yard TD connection at the end of the first half. The Ravens opened the second half with a determined nine-play drive, but S Darren Sharper, brother of Ravens' LB Jamie Sharper, intercepted Grbac. Matt Stover kicked a 28-yard field goal to cut the Packers' lead to 17-10 midway through the third quarter to tie Fred Cox's NFL record for most consecutive games with a field goal (31). On the Packers' next drive, Favre hit WR Donald Driver on a 39-yard pass play on a third-and-10. Five plays later, Green scored from one-yard for a 24-10 lead going into the fourth quarter. Favre threw his third TD pass with 7:03 left in the game, another 2-yarder to Franks for a 31-10 Packer lead with 6:59 remaining. Randall Cunningham replaced Grbac, who suffered a mild concussion, and the Ravens cut Green Bay's lead to 31-17 on a Jason Brookins' 1-yard touchdown run. Baltimore recovered the ensuing onsidies kick, and Cunningham scored on an 11-yard TD run to make the score 31-23 after an unsuccessful two-point conversion attempt. The touchdown was the 35th rushing TD of Cunningham's illustrious career. The Ravens tried another onsidies kick, but Green Bay retained possession to secure their eighth home win in a row.

The Ravens fell to 3-3 on the year with a 24-14 loss to the Browns at Cleveland Browns Stadium. Three costly turnovers led to 10 Cleveland points, and despite 321 yards of offense, the Ravens scored just one touchdown, a fourth-quarter 22-yard TD pass from QB Randall Cunningham to WR Qadry Ismail. The Browns recorded seven QB sacks, three against starting QB Elvis Grbac, the last one a 7-yard tackle by LB Jamir Miller that bruised Grbac's ribs and knocked him out of the game. Cunningham was sacked four times in the final quarter and a half. The Browns took a 7-0 lead – a lead they never relinquished – on the game's opening drive after a 42-yard opening kickoff return by Ben Gay. Six plays later, rookie RB James Jackson scored on an 11-yard run. Matt Stover kicked a 21-yard field goal after a 67-yard drive stalled at the Cleveland 3-yard line to make the score, 7-3, in the second quarter. Stover set an NFL record by kicking a field goal in his 32nd career NFL game, breaking Fred Cox's mark of 31 set in 1968-70 for the Minnesota Vikings. Grbac was intercepted by DB Anthony Henry as he was hit throwing a pass intended for Ismail later in the second quarter, and that led to a Phil Dawson 33-yard field goal for a 10-3 Cleveland lead. Stover kicked his second field goal, a 38-yarder, with five seconds left in the first half to make the score 10-6 at intermission. Cleveland QB Tim Couch threw a 28-yard TD pass to WR Kevin Johnson on the Browns' first second-half possession to cap a 9-play, 80-yard drive for a 17-6 lead, then Miller's sack of Grbac forced a fumble that was recovered by DE Greg Spires. Couch threw a 36-yard TD pass on the next play to WR Quincy Morgan for a 24-6 Cleveland lead. Cunningham's TD pass to Ismail midway through the fourth quarter cut the lead to 24-14, but two Baltimore drives stalled on fourth down attempts as the Browns defeated the Ravens for the first time in five tries.

The Ravens scored two touchdowns in the last 10 minutes to overcome a 17-6 deficit and defeat the Jacksonville Jaguars, 18-17, at PSINet Stadium. The come-from-behind win extended Baltimore's home winning streak to eight (seven in the regular season) and improved the Ravens' seasonal record to 4-3. Qadry Ismail caught the game-winning TD pass with 4:07 left in the game from QB Randall Cunningham, who started for injured Elvis Grbac (chest). Cunningham was seven-for-seven for 76 yards in the fourth quarter while engineering two TD drives. Both teams kicked second-quarter field goals, a 49-yarder by Matt Stover and a 40-yarder by Mike Hollis for a 3-3 halftime deadlock. The Ravens took a 6-3 lead on their first possession of the third quarter when Stover kicked a 28-yarder after a 58-yard drive stalled at the Jacksonville 10-yard line. Jaguars QB Mark Brunell (25 of 37 for 306 yards, two TDs) threw a 35-yard TD pass to Jimmy Smith to cap a 90-yard drive and give the Jaguars a 10-6 lead with just over a minute left in the third quarter. On the Ravens' next possession, a pass by Cunningham (23 of 31 for 222 yards, one TD, one INT) bounced off RB Jason Brookins' hands and into the arms of LB Hardy Nickerson at the Ravens' 45-yard line. Brunell wasted no time hitting WR Keenan McCardell for 34 yards, then RB Stacey Mack for an 11-yard TD pass to give the Jaguars a 17-6 lead early in the fourth quarter. Cunningham, starting his first game since 11/5/00 vs. Dallas, directed a nine-play, 71-yard drive that ended in a 2-yard Jason Brookins' touchdown run to make the score 17-12 (2-point failed pass). After forcing a Jacksonville punt, the Ravens started the game-winning drive on their own 44. Key plays on the drive included a 16-yard reception by Ismail (plus a 15-yard facemask penalty on Jacksonville), a 13-yard catch by TE Shannon Sharpe on a third-and-three, and Ismail's diving 2-yard TD catch in the end zone that gave the Ravens the 18-17 lead (a second two-point conversion failed) with 4:07 left in the game.

(62,906) at Heinz Field



The Ravens won a physical 13-10 decision at Heinz Field in Pittsburgh, handing the Steelers their first-ever loss in their new stadium. Matt Stover kicked two field goals, including the 39-yard game winner with 1:49 left in the game. Pittsburgh had a chance to tie the game, but Kris Brown's 35-yard attempt with 14 seconds left was wide right. Brown was 1-for-5 on FGAs on the day. The victory improved the Ravens' record to 5-3 at the season's midway point, while division-leading Pittsburgh fell to 5-2. Baltimore played without starters Elvis Grbac (ribs) and Terry Allen (ankle). The Steelers opened the scoring when Brown kicked a 38-yard field goal, but the Ravens countered with a 53-yard kickoff return by Jermaine Lewis to ignite a 4-play, 42-yard TD march. On the drive, QB Randall Cunningham (starting for Grbac for the second straight week) completed a 17-yard pass to TE Shannon Sharpe and a 13-yard scoring strike to Sharpe for a 7-3 Ravens' lead early in the second quarter. The TD reception was the 50th of Sharpe's career, tying him for third-place on the NFL's all-time TD list for tight ends. Sharpe caught three passes for 56 yards, giving him 660 career receptions, two shy of Ozzie Newsome's all-time reception mark for most by a tight end in league history. Pittsburgh took a 10-7 lead when QB Kordell Stewart (22 of 37 for 236 yards) threw a 21-yard TD pass to Plaxico Burress with 21 seconds left in the first half to complete a 4-play, 32-yard drive after a 30-yard Kyle Richardson punt from Baltimore's 2-yard line. The TD catch was the first of Burress's career. The Steelers opened the second half with a 15-play, 64-yard drive, but Brown's 33-yard field goal attempt was partially blocked by CB Chris McAlister. On Pittsburgh's next possession, DE Adalius Thomas caused a Chris Fuamatu-Ma'afala fumble that was recovered by S Corey Harris with 5:01 left in the third quarter. Cunningham then directed a 9-play, 58-yard drive that stalled at the Pittsburgh seven, leading to a Matt Stover 25-yard field goal and a 10-10 tie early in the fourth quarter. After Brown missed a 48-yard field goal in the fourth quarter, the Ravens drove 40 yards to set up Stover's game-winning 39-yard field goal at the two-minute warning for a 13-10 lead.

Ravens 16, Titans 10
(68,798) at Adelphia Coliseum



In one of the wildest endings in recent memory, the Ravens defeated the Tennessee Titans, 16-10 in a Monday night special in Adelphia Coliseum. S Corey Harris and LB Jamie Sharper stopped QB Steve McNair on a QB sneak at the 1-yard line as time expired to earn the Ravens their third consecutive win in Nashville. The play came after an illegal contact penalty by Baltimore on the previous play, during an apparent 1-yard QB sneak by McNair that would have given the Titans the winning touchdown. The bizarre play culminated a 15-play, 77-yard drive by the Titans that started with 3:06 left on the clock and the Ravens ahead, 16-10. McNair was aided on the drive by a 15-yard roughing penalty by DE Michael McCrary and a third-down catch by Kevin Dyson that was reviewed and upheld. With 14 seconds left, McNair connected with Dyson down to the Ravens' 1-yard line, then with three seconds left, C Bruce Matthews snapped the ball, McNair plunged into the end zone and the crowd celebrated what they thought was the game-winning score. After lengthy deliberation, officials ruled that due to illegal contact on the defense, one final "un-timed" play would be run. McNair's attempt to sneak was thwarted by the Baltimore defense, as Harris and Sharper tackled him for no gain. The game was scoreless at halftime. A mishandled snap on a third-quarter Baltimore punt gave the Titans the ball on the Ravens' 8-yard line, but the Ravens held Tennessee to a 27-yard Joe Nedney field goal for a 3-0 lead. After a 76-yard Jermaine Lewis kickoff return, the Ravens knotted the score, 3-3, on Matt Stover's 31-yard field goal. The two teams then scored TDs on their next possessions—Tennessee on a Dyson 22-yard reception from McNair and the Ravens on a 57-yard catch and run by WR Qadry Ismail. Ismail finished with 129 yards on eight catches, while Tennessee's Derrick Mason caught a game-high 12 passes for 99 yards. The Ravens scored the go-ahead field goal in the fourth quarter after Ray Lewis, who led the team with 15 tackles, caused an Eddie George fumble that was recovered by LB Peter Boulware on the Titans' 18-yard line. Stover kicked his second fourth-quarter field goal, a 30-yarder, with 3:10 left in the game to give the Ravens a 16-10 lead, setting up the dramatic finish. The Ravens had a season-high six QB sacks, including a career-high 3.5 by Sharper, and allowed just one TD for the second consecutive game.

The Cleveland Browns completed a two-game seasonal sweep of the Ravens with a 27-17 win at PSINet Stadium. The Browns' win snapped Baltimore's eight-game home winning streak and dropped the defending Super Bowl Champion's record to 6-4. Baltimore's three-game win streak also came to an end as Cleveland improved to 5-4 in 2001. QB Elvis Grbac threw four interceptions, three to rookie CB Anthony Henry and a fourth to S Devin Bush, who returned it 43 yards for a TD in the second quarter for a 17-0 Cleveland lead. The first two interceptions led directly to Cleveland touchdowns and the last two stalled long drives deep in Cleveland territory. The Browns scored first on a Phil Dawson 29-yard field goal, and then took a 10-0 lead when Ben Gay ran seven yards for a TD after Henry's first interception early in the second quarter. After Bush's touchdown made the score 17-0, the Ravens moved 60 yards in six plays, the last a 21-yard TD pass from Grbac to WR Brandon Stokley. Cleveland answered with a 42-yard field goal by Dawson to take a 20-7 lead at halftime. Baltimore opened the second half with a 13-play, 75-yard drive, but Grbac's pass into the end zone lofted for Qadry Ismail on a third-down play from the Cleveland four was picked off by Henry. Rod Woodson then recorded his 60th career interception, and three plays later, TE Todd Heap caught his first career TD pass, a 24-yarder from Grbac to make the score, 20-14. DE Michael McCrary recorded his first career interception off a batted pass by DE Adalius Thomas with 3:35 left in the third quarter, and Matt Stover kicked a 42-yard field goal to close the gap to 20-17. The field goal was Stover's 17th straight, and extended his own NFL record to 36 consecutive games with a three-pointer. Midway through the fourth quarter, however, the Browns drove 68 yards in 12 plays, and Jamel White scored on a 1-yard rush to increase the Browns lead to 27-17. Tight end Shannon Sharpe became the NFL's all-time pass catching tight end when he caught a 29-yard pass on Baltimore's fifth play of the game to break his tie with Ozzie Newsome (at 662). Sharpe made seven catches for 78 yards, giving him 669 career receptions for 8,361 yards, both all-time records for a tight end in league history.

QB Elvis Grbac threw a 3-yard TD pass to TE Shannon Sharpe with nine seconds remaining to lift the Ravens to a 24-21 win over the Jacksonville Jaguars in at ALLTEL Stadium. The Ravens let a 17-0 third-quarter lead disappear by allowing three Jacksonville TDs in a span of just over 15 minutes, including a Stacey Mack 3-yard TD run with just 1:32 left in the game that gave the Jaguars a 21-17 lead. But Grbac directed a masterful 9-play, 74-yard game-winning drive in just 1:23. The Ravens took a 10-0 lead into the locker room at halftime after Matt Stover's first-quarter 41-yard field goal that extended his NFL record to 37 games with a field goal, and Jason Brookins' 2-yard run in the second quarter. After two quarters, Baltimore had 13 first downs to Jacksonville's three and 122 net passing yards to the Jaguars' 33. Brookins scored his second touchdown of the game on a 1-yard plunge to stake Baltimore to a 17-0 lead early in the third quarter. But Mark Brunell led the Jags on consecutive scoring drives at the end of the third quarter and the beginning of the fourth. Stacey Mack scored on a 4-yard run to put the Jags on the board with 1:40 left in the third quarter. After forcing a punt, Jacksonville marched 87 yards on seven plays, capped by a 12-yard Brunell TD pass to Jimmy Smith to close the gap to 17-14. Following a Brookins' fumble that was recovered by Tony Brackens, the Jaguars drove 38 yards in eight plays, the last one Mack's 3-yard TD run to put the Jags ahead, 21-17, with just 1:32 remaining. Grbac completed 21 of 30 passes for 259 yards, with one TD and one INT. Brunell threw for the same yardage total, completing 23 of 38 attempts, with one TD and no INTs. Sharpe led the Ravens with six receptions for 55 yards and the game-winning TD and also surpassed Herman Moore for 15th on the NFL's all-time reception list. Brookins rushed a career-high 32 times for a game-high 82 yards and scored two TDs, the first multiple TD game for a Raven rusher this season. The Ravens' defense, playing without starting defensive ends Rob Burnett and Michael McCrary, sacked Brunell four times (two by Peter Boulware, who played much of the game at end). The victory improved the Ravens' record to 7-4 (5-3 in the division and 4-3 on the road), while Jacksonville fell to 3-7.

The Ravens improved to 8-4 with another come-from-behind victory defeating the Indianapolis Colts, 39-27. The Ravens scored the game's final 13 points after the Colts took a one-point lead, 27-26, late in the third quarter. After exchanging first-quarter field goals, FB Obafemi Ayanbadejo scored on a 5-yard TD pass from Elvis Grbac. Two possessions later, CB Jeff Burris intercepted a Grbac pass and ran 30 yards untouched into the end zone to tie the score, 10-10. Adalius Thomas forced a QB Peyton Manning fumble on a 9-yard sack that Shannon Taylor recovered, leading to a Stover field goal and a 13-10 Ravens' lead. On the Colts' next offensive play, Thomas tackled Colts RB Dominick Rhodes and caused a fumble (recovered by Ray Lewis). Stover then booted a 29-yard field goal to give the Ravens a 16-10 halftime lead. The second half began with another Rhodes fumble, when S Corey Harris took the ball out of his hands at the Colts' 23 to set up another Stover field goal for a 19-10 lead. Later, a Shannon Sharpe fumble led to an Indianapolis field goal, which cut Baltimore's lead to 19-13. On the following kickoff, Jermaine Lewis raced 64 yards down the left sideline, but Clifton Crosby punched the ball from behind and it sailed 30 yards into the end zone for a touchback. Manning then threw a 40-yard TD pass to Marcus Pollard to give the Colts a 20-19 lead. The Ravens quickly re-gained the lead, however, when Moe Williams raced 55 yards, followed by Ayanbadejo's 9-yard TD run. That lead didn't last long though, as Manning tossed a 57-yard TD pass to Marvin Harrison two plays later to put Indianapolis back on top, 27-26 at the end of the third quarter. On Baltimore's next possession, Grbac found WR Qadry Ismail on a 5-yard TD pass to cap a six-play, 48-yard drive to put Baltimore ahead, 32-27. The defense forced Colts punts on their next three possessions, then Woodson picked off Manning's pass intended for Harrison and rambled 47 yards for a TD to end the scoring.

Steelers 26, Ravens 21
(69,506) at PSINet Stadium



The Ravens dropped a 26-21 decision to the Pittsburgh Steelers at PSINet Stadium to fall to 8-5 on the year. The 11-2 Steelers totaled 476 yards of offense, including 333 yards passing by Kordell Stewart, to clinch the AFC Central title. Stewart completed 20 of 31 passes for two TDs, including a back-breaking 90-yard score to WR Bobby Shaw on a third-and-seven from the Pittsburgh 10-yard line in the fourth quarter to give the Steelers a 19-7 lead. The Steelers had the ball for 41:05 to the Ravens' 18:55, and ran 73 plays to the Ravens' 53. Pittsburgh set the tone in the first quarter by marching 73 yards in 14 plays and consuming 8:28 off the clock to take a 3-0 lead on Kris Brown's 22-yard field goal. The Ravens took a 7-3 lead when QB Elvis Grbac rambled around right end on a 2-yard QB keeper early in the second quarter, but Brown kicked his second field goal to cut the lead to 7-6. Matt Stover missed a 48-yard field goal on the Ravens' next possession and his streak (NFL record) of 38 consecutive games with a field goal ended. Moments later, Stewart threw a 25-yard TD pass to WR Plaxico Burress for 13-7 Pittsburgh halftime lead. After a scoreless third quarter, the Ravens had the Steelers backed up at their own 10 when Stewart hit Shaw on the third-and-seven play to give Pittsburgh a 19-7 lead. The Ravens responded after a 32-yard kickoff return by Corey Harris with a Grbac to Qadry Ismail 14-yard TD pass to make the score, 19-14. On the Steelers' next possession, Stewart hit Burress on a 38-yard strike on another third-and-seven situation to set up Dan Kreider's 4-yard TD run for a 26-14 Pittsburgh lead. Grbac threw his second TD pass of the fourth quarter to Brandon Stokley with 1:20 left in the game to close the gap to 26-21, but the ensuing onside kickoff was recovered by the Steelers. Baltimore, with no timeouts remaining, could not stop the clock.

The Ravens improved their record to 9-5 with a 16-0 victory over the Cincinnati Bengals at PSINet Stadium. The shutout was Baltimore's first of the season, but third consecutive home shutout win over the Bengals, the first time in 24 years (1975-77, Oakland over San Diego) that a team shut out an opponent at home in three straight meetings. The Ravens intercepted QB Jon Kitna three times, two by MLB Ray Lewis, and limited Cincinnati's passing attack to 131 net yards. The Bengals penetrated the 20-yard line just twice during the game, and both of those drives ended with interceptions (a second-quarter theft in the end zone by Duane Starks and a fourth-quarter interception by Lewis that he returned 64 yards). The Ravens' first score was a Matt Stover 43-yard field goal midway through the first quarter. On Baltimore's next possession, QB Elvis Grbac drove the offense 80 yards in nine plays, capped by Terry Allen's 4-yard TD rush, the 73rd of his career, for a 10-0 lead. Starks intercepted Kitna on Cincinnati's next possession. Lewis picked off a Kitna pass on the Bengals' following possession and returned the ball 30 yards to Baltimore's 48 to set up Stover's 29-yard field goal with four seconds remaining in the half for a 13-0 lead. After a scoreless third-quarter, Peter Boulware forced a Kitna fumble that Carnell Lake recovered, which led to Stover's third field goal of the game, and a 16-0 lead. Cincinnati RB Corey Dillon (24 carries, 127 yards) became the first player to rush for 100 yards against the Ravens since Chicago's James Allen gained 163 yards on 12/20/98 at Chicago. The Ravens went a span of 50 consecutive games (including playoffs) of not allowing a 100-yard rusher.

The Ravens suffered a 22-10 loss to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, dropping their seasonal record to 9-6. Two interceptions, a fumble and a blocked punt offset a strong defensive effort, as the Bucs scored 13 points after Ravens miscues. A poor first-quarter punt gave the Bucs a short field, and they drove 36 yards in eight plays to set up a Doug Brien 42-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead. The Ravens countered with a 10-play, 69-yard touchdown drive that ended with an Elvis Grbac 14-yard TD pass to Travis Taylor for a 7-3 lead early in the second quarter. Another short punt coupled with an interference penalty on the fair catch gave the Bucs possession on the Ravens' 36-yard line midway through the second quarter. But the Ravens' defense held Tampa to a field goal, and the Ravens led, 7-6. Punting woes continued for the Ravens on their next possession as Kyle Richardson's punt was blocked by TE Todd Yoder, but once again the defense limited Tampa to a field goal, a 24-yarder by Brien, giving Tampa a 9-7 lead. Three plays later, LB Derrick Brooks intercepted a Grbac pass and raced 53 yards to the Ravens' 1-yard line. Tampa QB Brad Johnson scored on a quarterback sneak on the next play to give the Bucs a 16-7 halftime lead. After a scoreless third quarter, the Ravens faced a first-and-goal at the Tampa Bay 2-yard line, but had to settle for a Matt Stover 24-yard field goal that cut the Bucs' lead to 16-10. The Ravens had two fourth-quarter possessions to try to take the lead. The first chance had the Ravens starting at their own two, which resulted in a punt. After forcing a Tampa Bay punt, and faced with 88 yards to take the lead with 2:56 left, a fourth-and-10 play came up short, giving the Bucs the ball on the Ravens' 31. Two plays later, FB Mike Alstott broke several tackles on a 32-yard TD run that ended any chance of a comeback. The Ravens limited the Bucs to 13 first downs and 213 net yards, including just 90 net yards passing. But, the Bucs intercepted Grbac twice, sacked him five times, blocked a punt, and P Mark Royals pinned the Ravens inside their own 20-yard line four times.

The Ravens clinched a playoff berth with a 19-3 victory over the Minnesota Vikings in windy PSINet Stadium. Baltimore rushed for a season-high 212 yards, including 133 by Terry Allen, and Matt Stover kicked four field goals to account for all the Ravens' offensive points. The Ravens' defense, which didn't permit a touchdown for the third game of the season, limited Minnesota to 179 total net yards and forced four turnovers, including the game-clincher in the fourth quarter when Peter Boulware forced QB Spergon Wynn to fumble, which LB Jamie Sharper returned eight yards for a TD. Boulware tied a team record with four sacks and finished as the AFC's sack leader with 15 (second in the NFL). For his effort, Boulware won AFC Defensive Player of the Week. The Vikings scored first on a Gary Anderson 26-yard field goal midway through the first quarter. Baltimore countered with an 11-play, 77-yard drive that ended with a Stover 21-yard field goal. A Cris Carter fumble led to another Stover field goal after an impressive goal-line stand by the Vikings that saw them stop six straight plays from inside their 3-yard line. A bad snap by newly signed LS Dale Hallestrae gave Minnesota possession on the Ravens' 10, but Wynn's pass intended for Randy Moss in the end zone was intercepted by CB Chris McAlister. The Ravens drove 60 yards in six plays including a 46-yard catch by WR Brandon Stokley, then Stover kicked his third field goal (38 yards) to give the Ravens a 9-3 halftime lead. Stover booted his fourth field goal in the third quarter to push the Ravens' lead to 12-3. The Sharper fumble return for a touchdown with 1:37 left sealed the win. It was the first touchdown on a fumble return in team history, and the fourth turnover forced by the Ravens' defense that night.

The Ravens dominated the Miami Dolphins, 20-3, at Pro Player Stadium to advance to the AFC Divisional Playoff game at Pittsburgh. The Ravens became the only team in NFL history to win their first five postseason games. Baltimore held the Dolphins to a postseason record-low 151 total net yards. Miami's only points came on an Olindo Mare 33-yard field goal after the Ravens' Jermaine Lewis fumbled the opening kickoff. The Ravens' running game rolled to a playoff team-record 226 yards on 50 carries, including 109 yards by Terry Allen (first career 100-yard postseason game) and 65 yards by Jason Brookins. The effectiveness of the ground game was a huge factor in helping the Ravens to their two longest drives in their postseason history, one resulting in a 90-yard, 17-play march in the second quarter, and then an 11-play, 99-yard third-quarter drive. The long drives helped Baltimore to a 37:54 - 22:06 time of possession advantage. After Miami jumped to the quick 3-0 lead, the Ravens started their 90-yard drive with four passes in five plays, but 11 runs on the next 12 plays, ending with an Allen 4-yard TD burst. Neither team scored again in the first half. Miami's Matt Turk placed a punt at the Ravens' 1-yard line midway through the third quarter, but QB Elvis Grbac hit Travis Taylor on a 4-yard TD on a fade route to cap the 99-yard drive. Taylor helped set up his TD with a 45-yard reception from Grbac on third-and-one, and a 15-yard reverse on a second-and-six. Peter Boulware forced a fumble by Jay Fiedler (15 of 28 for 122 yards, no TDs, one INT) that was recovered by Sam Adams early in the fourth quarter. That led to a Matt Stover 35-yard field goal for a 17-3 lead. On Miami's next possession, CB Duane Starks intercepted Fiedler's pass that set up Stover's second field goal, a 40-yarder that made the final score, 20-3.

The Ravens string of consecutive playoff wins was stopped at five as the top-seeded Pittsburgh Steelers defeated the defending Super Bowl Champs, 27-10, in an AFC Divisional Playoff Game at Heinz Field. The Steelers jumped to a 20-0 first-half lead and stifled the Ravens' offense to advance to the AFC Championship Game against the eventual Super Bowl Champion New England Patriots. Baltimore's lone TD came in the third quarter when Jermaine Lewis raced an NFL postseason record 88 yards on a punt return for a TD to make the score, 20-10. But the Steelers iced the game by driving 83 yards on 12 plays that took almost six minutes off the clock, scoring the game's final TD on a Kordell Stewart to Plaxico Burress 32-yard pass. The Steelers' defense limited the Ravens to just seven first downs, 150 total net yards (including only 22 yards rushing) and forced four turnovers (including three INTs of Elvis Grbac). Chad Scott intercepted Grbac on his first pass attempt and returned the ball 19 yards to the Ravens' 43, but the Steelers managed only a field goal by Kris Brown for a quick 3-0 lead. After forcing a Ravens' punt that gave the Steelers possession at the 49-yard line, Stewart led Pittsburgh on a 7-play, 51-yard drive that included long completions to Burress and Hines Ward, that was capped by a 1-yard run by RB Amos Zereoue for a 10-0 Steelers' lead. Later in the first quarter, Ravens' CB Chris McAlister intercepted a Stewart pass intended for TE Matt Cushing and returned the ball 18 yards to the Steelers' 7-yard line. But after the turnover, Grbac was intercepted in the end zone by S Brent Alexander on a pass intended for TE Shannon Sharpe. The Steelers scored 10 points in the second quarter on another Zereoue 1-yard run and a 46-yard field goal by Brown to extend their lead to 20-0. Matt Stover kicked a 26-yard field goal just before halftime to make the score 20-3. "A lot of things didn't happen for us," said head coach Brian Billick after the game. "Some of our doing, a lot of their doing."

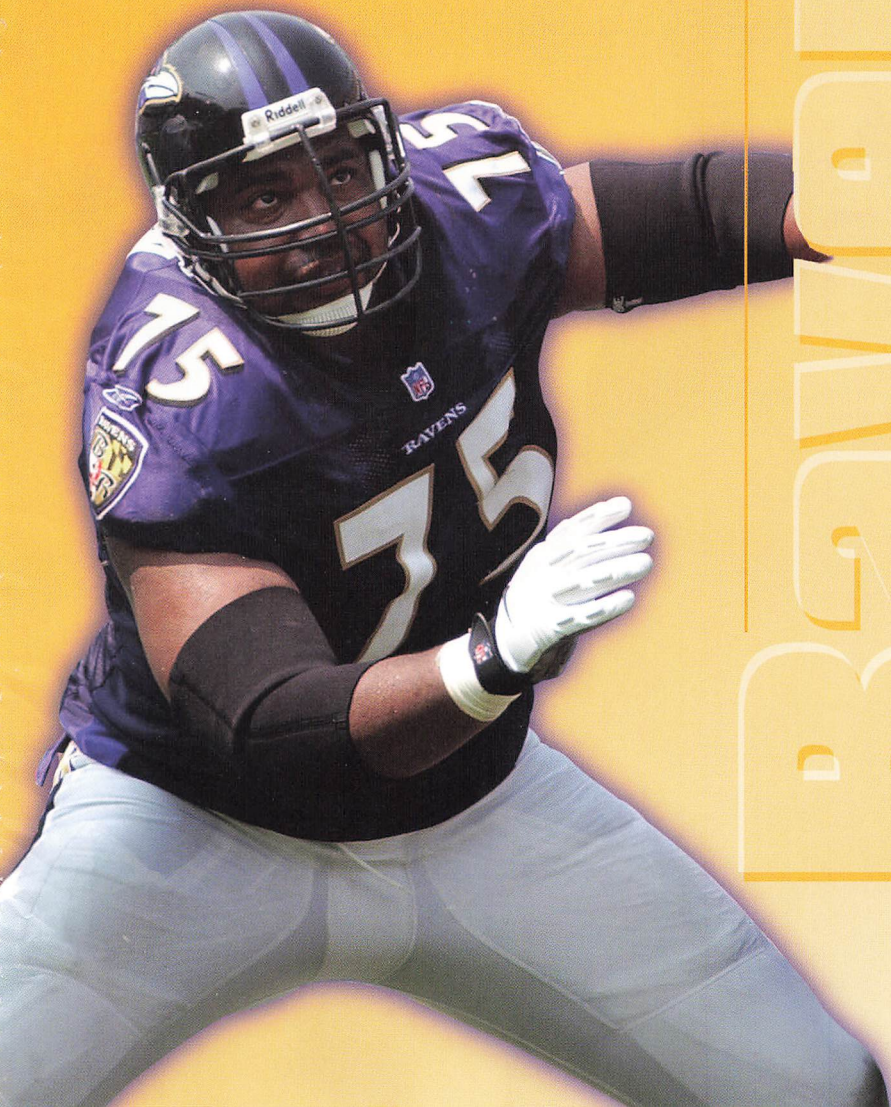

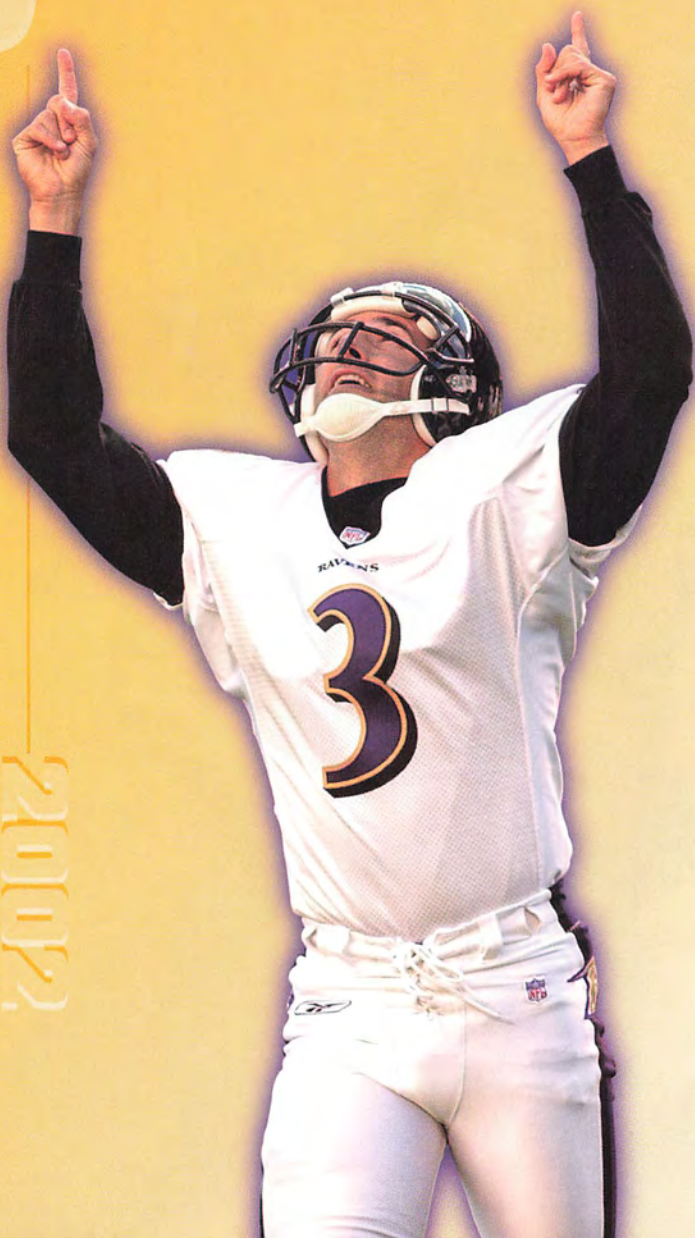

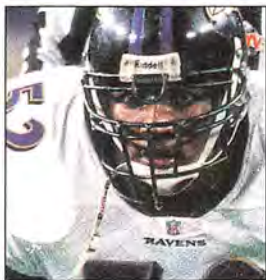

The Baltimore Ravens began the 2000 NFL season talking playoffs; they ended it as champions, thanks to one of the most dominant defenses in pro football history.

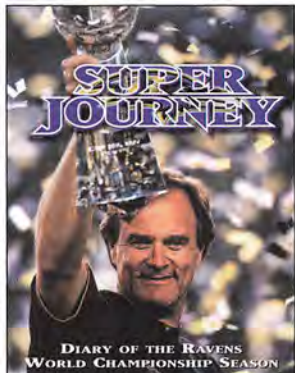
The Journey began with an ominous regular season schedule that included five road games in seven weeks. In the middle of it all was a five-game streak without a touchdown, but the drought never divided the team.

The race toward the Lombardi trophy was not without its hurdles: Ray Lewis rebounding from a trying offseason; Trent Dilfer returning to Tampa for the Super Bowl; Jermaine Lewis dedicating an emotional performance to the memory of his still-born son. Yet, the team rallied, and it made the victory that much sweeter.

The Journey was about coming of age. It belonged to tough veterans like Rod Woodson, Ray, Rob Burnett, Shannon Sharpe, Matt Stover, and kids like Jamal Lewis, Chris McAlister, Duane Starks, Michael McCrary and Jonathan Ogden.

The Journey belonged to every citizen in the State of Maryland and the City of Baltimore. The fans numbered in the thousands at the sendoff at Harbor Place in January. While the fans celebrated in Baltimore, the team went to Tampa and beat the New York Giants, 34-7, on January 28, 2001. And then the fans numbered in the hundreds of thousands to welcome the team home in a downtown parade on a cold, rainy January 30.

Ray Lewis earned Super Bowl XXXV MVP honors, as well as Defensive Player of the Year. The Ravens broke or tied a number of records in the game, including tying a Super Bowl record with four interceptions. They were the third team in NFL history to not commit a turnover in a Super Bowl, and most exciting of all: three scores in three successive plays which set a Super Bowl record. The back-to-back kickoff returns for touchdowns were also a new record. After receiving the Vince Lombardi trophy, Art Modell lifted it in the air and said: "To the people of Baltimore City, Baltimore County and the State of Maryland, this belongs to you. From the bottom of my heart, thank you."





HISTORY OF PRO FOOTBALL IN BALTIMORE

Note: The following chronology outlines historical highlights of the AAFC and NFL teams based in Baltimore and reflects history while those teams were in Baltimore only.

December 28, 1946 Baltimore was awarded the bankrupt Miami Seahawks franchise of the All-America Football Conference. The team was renamed Colts via a fan contest. Bob Rodenberg heads the purchasing group.

September 7, 1947 The Colts won their first-ever AAFC game over the Brooklyn Dodgers, 16-7, in front of 27,418 fans at Baltimore Stadium with Cecil Isbell as head coach. The Colts finished 2-11-1, drawing just under 200,000 fans.

April 28, 1948 The Colts reorganized, with over 200 stockholders. Jake Embry was named president and Walt Driskill was named general manager.

December 12, 1948 The Colts lose their first-ever playoff game, 28-17, against visiting Buffalo in a game marked by near riots after both teams finished tied for the Eastern Division title with 7-7 marks. Attendance totaled 244,502.

February 24, 1949 Walt Driskill was named president and general manager, with Robert C. Embry becoming vice-chairman of the board.

Fall, 1949 Isbell fired after four games and Driskill was named head coach. Colts finished 1-11.

December 8, 1949 AAFC and NFL reached merger agreement. The Colts entered the NFL for 1950 season.

December 18, 1949 Abraham Watner was named Colts' president.

December 19, 1950 Under head coach Clem Crowe, the Colts finished 1-11 in their first NFL season with a 15-14 loss to the New York Yanks at Yankee Stadium. The Yanks will later become the Baltimore Colts.

January 18, 1951 Watner withdrew the franchise due to financial distress and received \$50,000 for his players by the NFL.

1951 and 1952 No Colts team existed.

December 3, 1952 Commissioner Bert Bell challenged Baltimore to sell 15,000 tickets in six weeks to re-enter NFL. The ticket drive reached its quota in four weeks, three days.

January, 1953 Carroll Rosenbloom headed an ownership group and Baltimore was awarded the Dallas Texan franchise. Don Kellett was named president and Keith Molesworth head coach.

March 25, 1953 Baltimore and Cleveland put together one of the largest trades in sports' history, with the Browns trading 10 players to the Colts for five players.

September 27, 1953 The Colts upset the Chicago Bears, 13-9, in the NFL opener at Memorial Stadium.

Spring, 1954 Weeb Ewbank was named head coach.

December 28, 1958 The Colts defeated the New York Giants, 23-17, in Yankee Stadium in "sudden death" for the World Championship. This game sparked the emergence of the NFL as a televised sports giant.

December 27, 1959 The Colts won their second straight World Championship, again over the Giants, in Baltimore, 31-16.

December 11, 1960 The Rams snapped an NFL-record 47-game consecutive TD pass streak by Johnny Unitas.

January 8, 1963 Don Shula replaced Weeb Ewbank as head coach. Gino Marchetti and Bill Pellington were named player-coaches.

January 20, 1964 Carroll Rosenbloom purchased the remaining shares of the club to gain 100% ownership.

December 13, 1964 Raymond Berry caught his 506th career pass and Lenny Moore scored his 20th touchdown of the season against Washington, both NFL records at the time.

December 27, 1964 The Browns defeated the Colts, 27-0, in Cleveland for the NFL title. Art Modell wins his first NFL title, with Blanton Collier as head coach.



December 26, 1965 The Packers beat the Colts, 13-10, in "sudden death" playoff for the Western Conference title. Tom Matte quarterbacked the club with plays written on his wristband, subbing for injured QBs Johnny Unitas and Gary Cuozzo.

June 8, 1966 The National Football League and the American Football League announced plans to merge in 1970. The Colts, Browns and Steelers would later join the AFC in the NFL's realignment.

March 17, 1967 Harry Hulmes, Colts' publicity director, was named general manager, succeeding Joe Campanella, who passed away on February 15, after only 23 days in the GM capacity.

November 5, 1967 The Colts defeated the World Champion Packers, 13-10, snapping a five-game losing streak to Green Bay.

August 3, 1968 Art Donovan became the first Colt inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

December 29, 1968 The Colts shut out the Browns, 34-0, for the NFL Championship. Earlier, the Colts had defeated Green Bay, 16-3, and Minnesota, 24-14, for the Western Conference crown.

January 12, 1969 The Jets defeated the Colts, 16-7, in Super Bowl III at the Orange Bowl after Joe Namath "guarantees" a New York victory.

April 3, 1970 Don Shula resigned to become head coach of the Miami Dolphins and was succeeded by Don McCafferty. In January, Don Klosterman was named general manager.

September 20, 1970 The Colts beat San Diego, 16-14, to win their first AFC game in the newly realigned NFL.

December 13, 1970 The Colts clinched their first AFC Eastern Division title with a 20-14 win at Buffalo.

December 26, 1970 The Colts beat Cincinnati, 17-0, in divisional playoff game.

January 3, 1971 The Colts beat the Oakland Raiders, 27-17, to win the AFC championship.

January 17, 1971 Jim O'Brien kicked a 32-yard field goal with five seconds to play as the Colts won Super Bowl V over Dallas, 16-13, in the first-ever AFC-NFC Super Bowl.

January 2, 1972 Miami beat Baltimore, 21-0, in the AFC title game. The Colts had defeated Cleveland, 20-3, in the AFC playoffs to advance to the conference championship.

July 26, 1972 Robert Irsay acquired the Colts from Carroll Rosenbloom in exchange for the Los Angeles Rams. Joe Thomas was named general manager.

July 29, 1972 Gino Marchetti was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

October 16, 1972 John Sandusky replaced Don McCafferty as head coach after the fifth game of the season.

February 14, 1973 Howard Schnellenberger was named head coach.

July 28, 1973 Raymond Berry and Jim Parker were inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

September 29, 1974 Joe Thomas replaced Howard Schnellenberger as head coach.

January 15, 1975 Ted Marchibroda was named head coach.

August 2, 1975 Lenny Moore was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

December 21, 1975 Colts won the first of three straight AFC East Division crowns by defeating New England, 34-21, at Memorial Stadium. The season capped the greatest turnaround in NFL history (at that time), as Marchibroda led the Colts to a 10-4 mark after the team was 2-12 in 1974.

December 12, 1976 The Colts won their second straight AFC East crown by defeating Buffalo, 58-20, in last home game of regular season.

January 25, 1977 Dick Szymanski was named general manager and Ernie Accorsi assistant general manager.

December 18, 1977 The Colts won their third straight AFC East title with a 30-24 win over New England that featured a 99-yard game-winning TD drive, longest in team history.

July 28, 1979 Johnny Unitas was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, a year after Weeb Ewbank.

January 16, 1980 Mike McCormack was named head coach, replacing Ted Marchibroda.

December 21, 1981 Frank Kush was named head coach.

May 16, 1982 Ernie Accorsi was named general manager.

April 26, 1983 The Colts selected John Elway with the first pick in the NFL draft, but traded him on May 2 to Denver for OT Chris Hinton, QB Mark Herrmann and Denver's top pick in 1984.

December 18, 1983 In the last NFL regular season game in Memorial Stadium - until 1996 - the Colts beat the Houston Oilers, 20-10. TE Pat Beach scored the last TD of the game on a 12-yard pass from Mike Pagel.

March 28, 1984 The Colts' franchise relocated to Indianapolis.

RAVENS HISTORY

November 6, 1995 The Cleveland Browns announced their intention to move to Baltimore for the 1996 season.

February 9, 1996 NFL approved franchise move.

February 15, 1996 Ted Marchibroda was named Baltimore's head coach exactly 21 years and one month to the date he was hired by the then-Baltimore Colts.

March 29, 1996 Baltimore's NFL franchise was officially named the Ravens after a *Baltimore Sun* telephone poll received a record number of calls supporting the name Ravens.

April 1, 1996 The Ravens opened operations at the Owings Mills training facility with the start of the offseason program.

April 20, 1996 The Ravens selected UCLA offensive lineman Jonathan Ogden with their first-ever draft choice (fourth overall). University of Miami linebacker Ray Lewis was selected with the second pick in the first round (26th overall).

May 16, 1996 Ravens announced season ticket and personal seat license policies in a press conference at Memorial Stadium.

June 5, 1996 Ravens unveiled their new logo, colors and uniforms in a fashion show at Harborplace.

June 14, 1996 The Ravens sold over 50,000 season tickets in 14 days.

September 1, 1996 The Ravens first-ever regular season game is played before 64,124 fans at Memorial Stadium, the largest crowd in Baltimore professional sports history. QB Vinny Testaverde scored the first touchdown on a 9-yard run to propel the Ravens to a 19-14 win over the Oakland Raiders.

December 22, 1996 The Ravens concluded their inaugural season with a 4-12 record following a 24-21 loss to the Houston Oilers. The Ravens were 4-4 at home, but 0-8 on the road. The team sold out all 10 home games, including the two preseason games. Baltimore held a second-half lead in 10 of its 11 final games, but won only two. QB Vinny Testaverde was voted to the Pro Bowl after throwing for 4,177 yards and 33 touchdowns. WRs Michael Jackson and Derrick Alexander both eclipsed the 1,000-yard receiving mark and combined for 23 TD receptions.

March 18, 1997 The Ravens and Western Maryland College entered into a five-year agreement to hold training camp at the Westminster, MD campus.

April 19, 1997 The Ravens selected LB Peter Boulware with their first pick in the 1997 draft (fourth overall). Boulware went on to win NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and finished with 11.5 QB sacks, the fourth-best sack total by a rookie in NFL history.

September 21, 1997 The Ravens defeated the Tennessee Oilers, 36-10, to start the season 3-1.

December 14, 1997 Baltimore defeats Tennessee, 21-19, in the final game at Memorial Stadium. Ceremonies included a salute to former Colts, generations of season ticket holders and the Armed Forces. Of the 16 regular season games played by the Ravens at Memorial Stadium, 13 were sold out.

December 21, 1997 Baltimore drops a 16-14 game at Cincinnati to finish the season 6-9-1. OT Jonathan Ogden is named consensus All-Pro and is voted as a starter to the Pro Bowl. LB Ray Lewis led the NFL in tackles with 210, was voted first alternate to the Pro Bowl, and then was selected as a "needs" player by coach Bill Cowher.



September 5, 1998 The new NFL Stadium at Camden Yards (later to be named PSINet Stadium) was the backdrop for an opening gala that included fireworks, a Stevie Wonder/Baltimore Symphony Orchestra concert and a spectacular laser show.

September 6, 1998 The Ravens opened their new NFL Stadium in downtown Baltimore before a host of dignitaries, a packed house and the Pittsburgh Steelers. The Ravens lost, 20-13.

November 29, 1998 The Colts returned to Baltimore for the first time since 1983. The Ravens overcame two 14-point deficits and scored 25 second-half points to win a 38-31 thriller.

December 13, 1998 The Ravens and Minnesota Vikings set an NFL record with three kickoff returns for touchdowns, all in the first quarter. Ravens Corey Harris and Patrick Johnson and Minnesota's David Palmer all scored TDs on returns in the Vikings' 38-28 win. Gary Anderson set an NFL record when he kicked his 34th straight successful field goal, one of six three-pointers on the day for Minnesota.

December 28, 1998 After a 6-10 finish, the Ravens did not renew Head Coach Ted Marchibroda's contract. Six Ravens represented the AFC in the Pro Bowl: LB Peter Boulware, WR Jermaine Lewis, LB Ray Lewis, DE Michael McCrary, T Jonathan Ogden and S Bennie Thompson.

January 19, 1999 Brian Billick became the second head coach in Baltimore Ravens history when he accepted a six-year contract from owner Art Modell. Billick, the highly successful offensive coordinator for Minnesota, directed a Vikings' attack that set a variety of NFL and team records, including the league's all-time scoring mark of 556 points in 1998.

January 26, 1999 PSINet Inc., the first and largest independent commercial Internet Service Provider (ISP), announced an innovative partnership with the Ravens to develop a global Internet-based network for the Ravens. Under the 20-year agreement, the NFL's new downtown stadium at Camden Yards was named PSINet Stadium.

January 30, 1999 Ravens Vice President of Player Personnel Ozzie Newsome was selected for induction into Pro Football's Hall of Fame, along with Lawrence Taylor, Eric Dickerson, Tom Mack and Billy Shaw. Newsome was the NFL's all-time leading tight end in pass receptions (until Shannon Sharpe eclipsed Ozzie in 2001).

February 4, 1999 Art Modell, Owner and Chief Executive Officer of the Baltimore Ravens, named David Modell as the Ravens' President and Chief Operating Officer and John Modell as Vice President of Special Projects.

April 17, 1999 The Ravens selected Arizona CB Chris McAlister with their first round pick and traded their second round choice for Atlanta's first round choice in 2000. Baltimore also acquired veterans QB Tony Banks, OL Everett Lindsay and TE Lovett Purnell in trades involving '99 picks.

September 12, 1999 Brian Billick's debut as head coach was spoiled in the regular season opener, as the St. Louis Rams defeated the Ravens, 27-10, in the TransWorld Dome. Little-known QB Kurt Warner, who went on to become the league's MVP, threw three TD passes in his first NFL start.

September 26, 1999 Billick notched his first win as an NFL head coach, 17-10, over the expansion Cleveland Browns. Stoney Case started at quarterback replacing Scott Mitchell.

October 31, 1999 Tony Banks took over as the team's starting quarterback against Buffalo in a 13-10 loss. Banks went 6-4 as a starter, including 4-0 in December. He threw a career-high 17 TDs and a career-low eight INTs.

December 26, 1999 The Ravens recorded their first-ever shutout, a 22-0 win over Cincinnati. The victory completed a perfect December and gave the Ravens a franchise-high eight victories. Five players (LB Peter Boulware, LB Ray Lewis, DE Michael McCrary, T Jonathan Ogden and S Rod Woodson) were named to the Pro Bowl. The Ravens' defense finished ranked second in the NFL, and in the team's 6-3 finish, Baltimore outscored opponents, 229-142.

February 18, 2000 The Ravens signed seven-time Pro Bowl tight end Shannon Sharpe, an unrestricted free agent who starred for 10 years with the Denver Broncos. Sharpe caught 552 passes for 6,983 yards and 44 TDs for Denver.

March 27, 2000 NFL owners approved the sale of 49% of the Ravens for \$275 million to Anne Arundel County business executive Steve Bisciotti. Bisciotti has an option to purchase the remaining 51% for \$325 million in 2004.

April 15, 2000 The Ravens went for offense in the 2000 NFL Draft, selecting Tennessee RB Jamal Lewis (fifth overall), Florida WR Travis Taylor (10th overall) and Louisville QB Chris Redman (75th overall) with their first three picks.



September, 2000 The Ravens opened the 2001 season with a 16-0 win at Pittsburgh in their last-ever visit to Three Rivers Stadium on September 3. They won three of their first four games, including a dramatic 39-36 win over Jacksonville (their first-ever win over the Jaguars) and a 37-0 shutout win over Cincinnati.

October, 2000 Baltimore finished October, 2-3, and did not score a touchdown during the month. Trent Dilfer replaced Tony Banks at quarterback on October 29 vs. Pittsburgh.

November/December, 2000 The Ravens won their final seven regular season games by a combined score of 193-63. On November 26, Earnest Byner was the first person named to the Ravens' Ring of Honor during halftime of the 44-7 win over the Cleveland Browns. On December 10, owner Art Modell was honored in pregame ceremonies for his 40 years of ownership, and later rewarded with the Ravens' first-ever playoff berth after defeating San Diego, 24-3.

December 24, 2000 The Ravens' defense set a 16-game record by allowing only 165 total points. Baltimore also set an NFL record by allowing only 970 yards rushing. The Ravens finished 12-4 after beating the New York Jets, 34-20, on Christmas Eve. Rookie RB Jamal Lewis rushed for a team-record 1,364 yards.

December 31, 2000 The Ravens defeated the Denver Broncos, 21-3, in an AFC Wild Card Playoff Game at PSINet Stadium, the first home playoff game in Baltimore since 1977. Jamal Lewis rushed for 110 yards on 30 carries and scored twice, while the defense allowed Denver's rushing attack only 42 yards on the ground.

January 2, 2001 LB Ray Lewis won NFL Defensive MVP honors from the Associated Press.

January 7, 2001 The Ravens scored 14 fourth quarter points to defeat the Tennessee Titans, 24-10, at Adelphia Coliseum to advance to the AFC Championship game. The go-ahead touchdown was a 90-yard return of a blocked field goal by Anthony Mitchell, then Ray Lewis scored on a 50-yard interception return to seal the win.

January 14, 2001 The Ravens traveled to Oakland and defeated the Raiders, 16-3, in the AFC Championship game to advance to Super Bowl XXXV. Shannon Sharpe scored on an NFL postseason record 96-yard pass from Trent Dilfer to give the Ravens all the points they would need. The Ravens limited the Raiders to 24 rushing yards.

January 28, 2001 The Ravens defeated the New York Giants, 34-7, to capture their first-ever World Championship in Super Bowl XXXV played at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa, FL. Ray Lewis was named Super Bowl MVP and only Ron Dixon's 97-yard kickoff return for a touchdown averted a shutout for the Giants. A Super Bowl record was set when three touchdowns were scored in a span of 36 seconds, including Duane Starks' 49-yard interception return and Jermaine Lewis' 84-yard kickoff return.

January 30, 2001 Over 200,000 people turned out on a cold, gray, rainy day to attend the Baltimore Ravens' Victory Parade. "This is the thrill of my life," exclaimed owner Art Modell.

March 6, 2001 The Ravens reached an agreement in principle on a five-year contract with QB Elvis Grbac. Grbac threw for a career-high 4,169 yards and 28 TDs for the Kansas City Chiefs in 2000 and was named to his first Pro Bowl.

April 21, 2001 The Ravens selected Arizona State tight end Todd Heap with their first choice in the 2001 draft, and Baylor S Gary Baxter in the second round. Picking 31st, the Ravens held all of their own choices in each of the seven rounds.

July/August, 2001 The Ravens opened training camp as defending World Champions under the scrutiny of the entire nation, as HBO's "Hard Knocks: Training Camp With the Baltimore Ravens" debuted with the Ravens as the feature team. RB Jamal Lewis and RT Leon Searcy suffered season-ending injuries in the first week of camp.

August 13, 2001 The Ravens first preseason game vs. the Eagles was cancelled at Philadelphia's Veterans Stadium due to hazardous field conditions.

September 9, 2001 The Ravens won their 12th consecutive game and second consecutive opener with a 17-6 win over the Chicago Bears at PSINet Stadium.

October 21, 2001 Matt Stover broke the NFL record for most consecutive games with a field goal, snapping Fred Cox's old mark of 31 games, when he booted two three-pointers in a 24-14 loss to the Cleveland Browns in Cleveland Browns Stadium. Stover's mark ended at 38 games with a field goal on Dec. 16 vs. Pittsburgh.



November 18, 2001 TE Shannon Sharpe became the NFL's all-time leading pass catching tight end, surpassing Ravens senior VP of football operations Ozzie Newsome's mark of 662, when Sharpe caught a 29-yard pass on the fifth play of the game vs. the Cleveland Browns. Sharpe finished the 2001 season with 692 career receptions for 8,604 yards—both all-time NFL highs for a tight end.

December 2, 2001 S Rod Woodson set an NFL record by returning a Peyton Manning interception 47 yards for a touchdown, his NFL-best 10th career TD on an interception return in a 39-27 win over the visiting Indianapolis Colts. Woodson's TD snapped a tie with Ken Houston, who had nine career INTs for TDs.

December 23, 2001 Corey Dillon of the Cincinnati Bengals rushed for 127 yards, snapping the Ravens' streak of 50 games (including playoffs) of not allowing a 100-yard rusher, the longest streak since the 1989-92 Philadelphia Eagles had a 53-game streak. The Ravens scored their third consecutive home shutout win over the Bengals (16-0), the first time in 24 years (1975-77, Oakland over San Diego) that a team had three straight home shutouts over the same opponent.

January 2, 2002 Six Ravens were selected to play in the Pro Bowl, tying the team mark set in 1998. Selected were LB Ray Lewis, T Jonathan Ogden, DT Sam Adams, RS Jermaine Lewis, TE Shannon Sharpe and S Rod Woodson.

January 7, 2002 The Ravens played a postponed regular season game against Minnesota at Ravens Stadium and defeated the Vikings, 19-3, allowing Baltimore to advance to the playoffs. The game was originally scheduled for Monday, Sept. 17, but was re-scheduled because of the September 11 terrorist attack on the United States. The victory gave the Ravens a 10-6 record and clinched a Wild Card spot as the AFC's fifth seed. LB Peter Boulware set a team record with four QB sacks vs. the Vikings to finish as the AFC's leading sacker with 15.

January 13, 2002 The Ravens traveled to Miami and defeated the Dolphins, 20-3, in the AFC Wild Card Playoff game at Pro Player Stadium. Baltimore set a playoff team record with 226 rushing yards on 50 carries. The Ravens became the first team in NFL history to win its first five playoff games. Only Joe Gibbs, who won his first six playoff games surpassed Brian Billick's mark of five (tied with Tom Flores).

January 20, 2002 After five consecutive playoff wins (including the Super Bowl run in 2000), the Ravens were stopped at Heinz Field with a 27-10 loss to the Pittsburgh Steelers in the AFC Divisional Playoff game. The Steelers jumped to a 20-0 first-half lead and stifled Baltimore's offense. The Ravens' only touchdown came when Jermaine Lewis set an NFL playoff record with an 88-yard punt return for a score in the third quarter.

April 20, 2002 In the 66th Annual NFL Selection Meeting, the Ravens chose young players who are expected to make an immediate impact. Baltimore picked S Ed Reed (24th overall) out of Miami (FL) with its first pick and DE Tony Weaver (Notre Dame) with its second. The Ravens had a total of 10 picks, three compensatory.

May 15, 2002 The Ravens and McDaniel College (formerly Western Maryland College) announced a three-year contract extension to keep Ravens training camp in Westminster, MD through the 2004 season. The team has trained at the Westminster campus since the 1996 inaugural season.

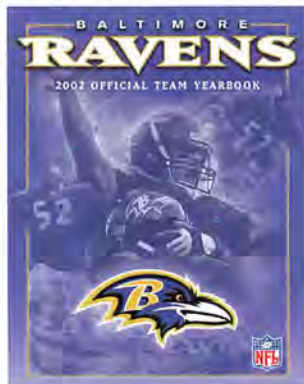

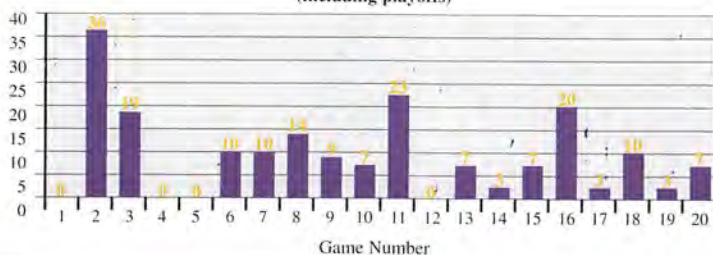

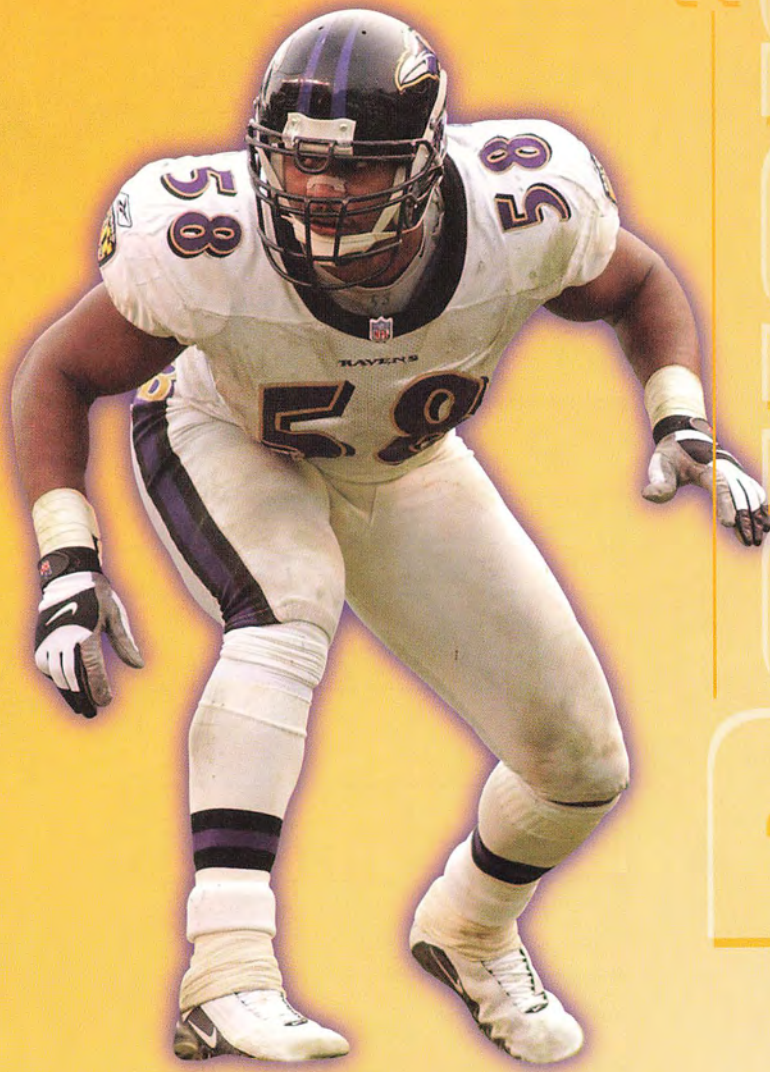
ED BLOCK COURAGE AWARD

is arguably the crowning jewel of the nation's premier sports facilities. Located just south of Oriole Park at Camden Yards, Ravens Stadium offers Ravens football fans the latest in technology, including state-of-the-art SMARTVISION video boards, combined with fabulous amenities. With a capacity of 69,084, including 109 suites and 7,900 club seats, the stadium was completed in 1998, in just over two years at an estimated cost of \$220 million. Designed by the architectural firm HOK, which also designed Oriole Park at Camden Yards, Ravens Stadium was funded through a combination of proceeds generated from the sale of tax-exempt revenue bonds, debt service being paid by lottery proceeds, and the Ravens.

SEATING:

- With a seating capacity of 69,084, Ravens Stadium is substantially larger than its sister baseball stadium to the north. At 1.6 million square feet, it is nearly double Oriole Park's size.
- There are 7,900 club seats at Ravens Stadium, featuring extra-wide seating. VIP parking and access to the club lounges that provide specialty foods, fully-staffed bars, a concierge and scenic views of downtown are available to club seat holders.
- Each of the 109 suites at Ravens Stadium can hold between 20-24 persons, and feature three televisions and a private restroom. VIP parking, personal wait service, and many other amenities are available to suite holders.

GAME DAY



VIDEO BOARDS:

- ❑ The two SMARTVISION video boards located in each end zone, measuring 100 feet by 24 feet, are the largest permanent video display boards located in any sports venue in the entire world. Basically, these video boards are giant computer screens.
- ❑ Operated by a crew of 20 people each game day, the boards feature network pregame shows, live video of game highlights from around the league, instant replays, up-to-date scores and statistics.
- ❑ Each screen, which can be divided into as many as 16 different sections, is augmented by over 1,894 custom-built speakers that produce crystal-clear sound and breathtaking special effects.

SIGHTLINES:

- ❑ Front-row seating in the lower level is six feet above the playing field, high enough to eliminate obstructed views. In addition, the front row is only 50 feet from the playing field sidelines and 20 feet from the back of the end zones.
- ❑ The distinctive upper seating area includes open notches in each corner of the stadium, creating scenic views of the city of Baltimore for fans to enjoy. This feature also enables upper-level end zone seating to be moved closer to the field.

AMENITIES:

- ❑ Extra-wide concourses (between 44 and 64 feet) allow easier navigating in Ravens Stadium. Seven public elevators (four disabled accessible) and two escalators (to club level) also assist fans maneuvering about the stadium.



- ❑ There are 55 concessions stands located throughout the upper level, lower level and club level featuring both standard football fare and various Baltimore specialties.

- ❑ In addition, there are several Ravens Team Stores located in Ravens Stadium where fans

can purchase all the latest Ravens' merchandise, plus six Provident Bank ATMs are scattered throughout the facility.

- ❑ Ravens Stadium allows disabled fans to access areas throughout the facility via ramps and elevators. Disabled seating is located in every PSL zone in Ravens stadium.



TRANSPORTATION:

- ❑ Located at 1101 Russell St., Ravens Stadium is surrounded on all sides by the following elevated roadways: I-95 and the Hamburg St. bridge to the north; I-95 and I-395 (plus Light Rail line) to the east; the Ostend St. bridge to the south; and the Russell St. viaduct to the west.
- ❑ Fans can also easily access the new stadium using Mass Transit. The Light Rail has a drop-off point located directly outside of Gate B, and Park-and-Ride shuttles are available from various locations around the greater Baltimore area.
- ❑ Parking in stadium lots, managed by Central Parking Systems, is limited, but numerous downtown lots are available for game day parking and are just a short walk away.

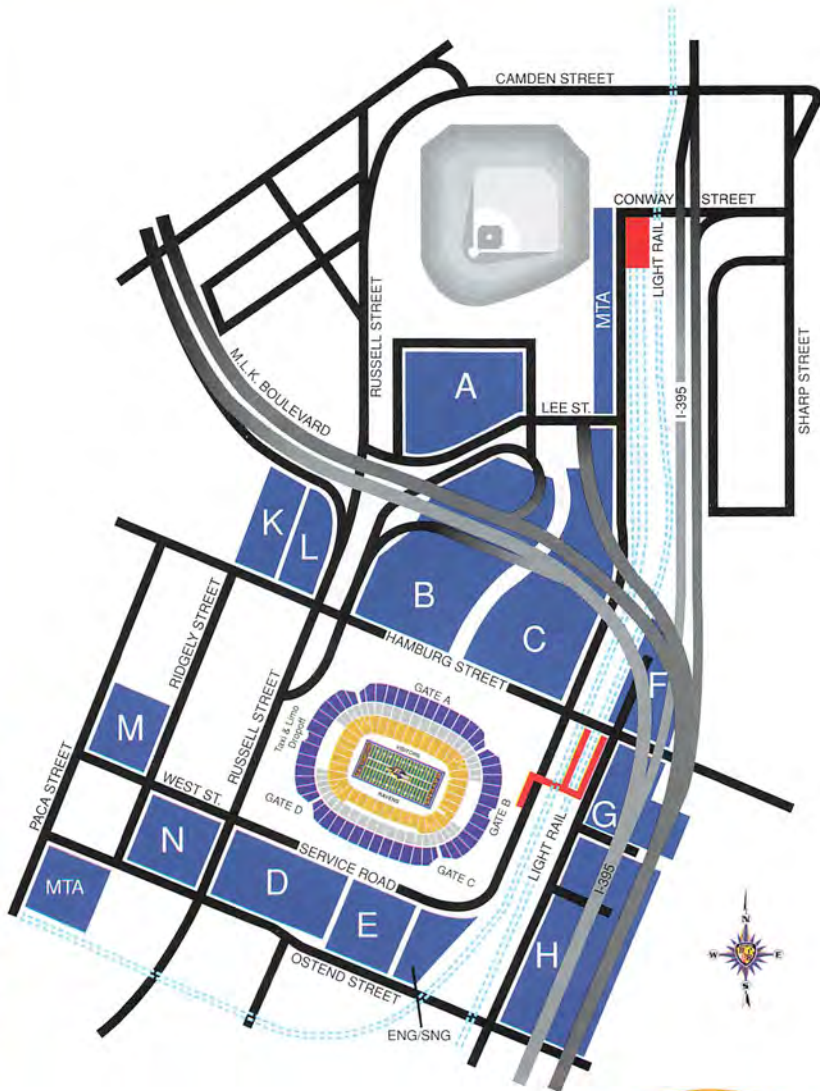
QUICK FACTS:

- ❑ Ravens Stadium is 185 feet tall, making it 35 feet taller than Oriole Park at Camden Yards.
- ❑ The playing surface is rated among the league's best in a survey of NFL players.
- ❑ The two SMARTVISION video boards located in each end zone generate 16 million colors, and at peak output, consume up to 80,000 watts of electrical power.
- ❑ Besides Ravens football, Ravens Stadium features various other forms of entertainment, including concerts and other sporting events. Several college football games have been played since 1998, including 2000's hugely successful Army-Navy clash. Maryland vs. Georgia Tech, Salisbury State vs. Frostburg State, and three Morgan State games have been staged at the stadium. Navy and Notre Dame will play Nov. 9, 2002. In 1998, the HFStival sold out in under 90 minutes and featured 15 bands and attracted over 90,000 fans. Heavy metal was in full force, as Metallica, Korn, Kid Rock, Powerman 5000 and System of a Down rocked the stadium on July 4, 2000.
- ❑ In recognition of the Knaabe Piano factory, which was once located on the site of Ravens Stadium, a plaza in the shape of a piano was designed in the southwest corner of the facility. A concrete pattern on the plaza represents the piano keys.



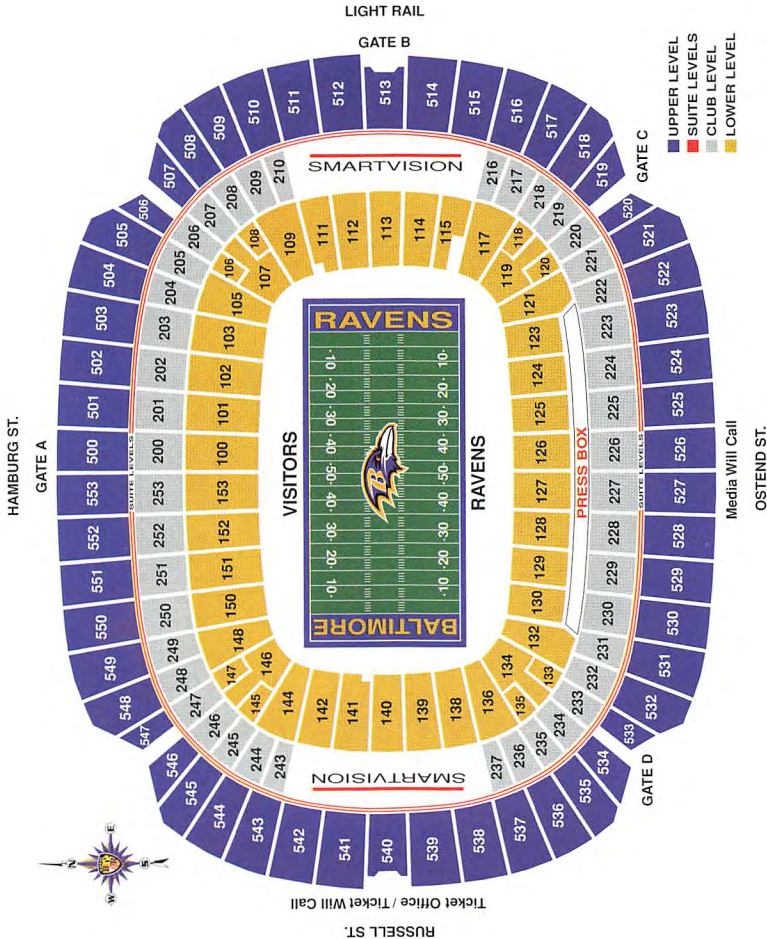


STADIUM PARKING LOTS

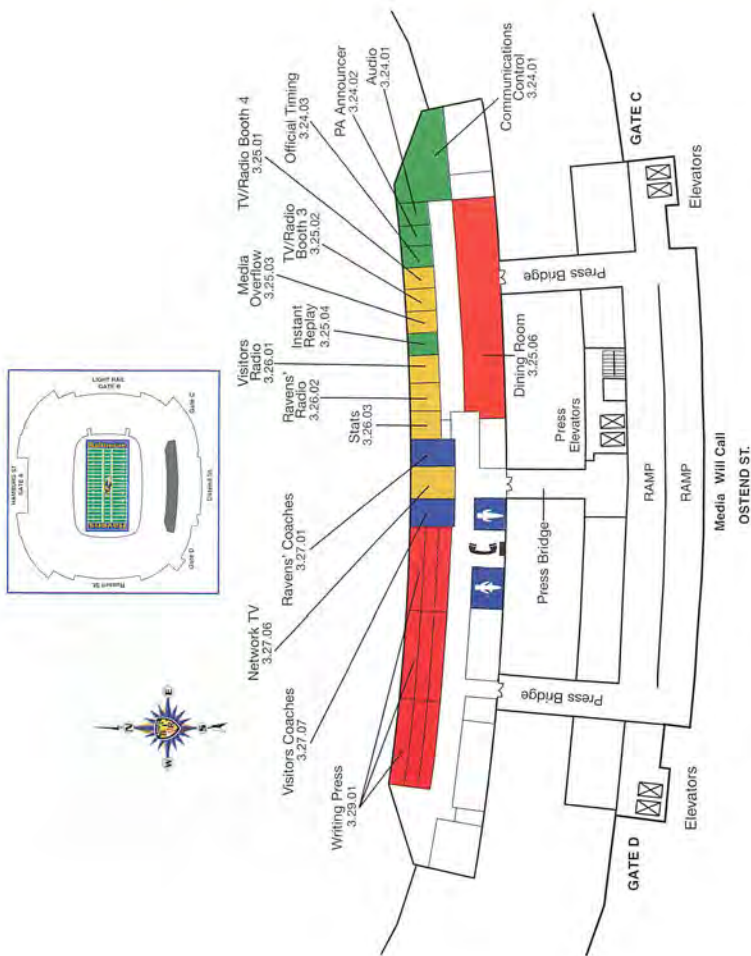
STADIUM SEATING DIAGRAM

The Baltimore Ravens cheerleading squad has 24 members on the dance team and 29 members on the stunt team, 13 women and 16 men. The cheerleaders' coordinator is Tina Simijoski, who also directs the University of Maryland Cheerleaders.



**BAND...**

Over 250 musicians and 50 flagline performers make up Baltimore's Marching Ravens. BMR's distinctive purple and white uniforms are in the military-style with brass buttons and crisp white detail. Tall black hats with feather plumes finish the uniform. This electrifying band performs *Script Ravens* during the pre-game. AWARD-WINNING TELEVISION



RaveTV won two Emmy Awards in two categories from The Capital Region chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences at its annual banquet in June, 2002.

Producer W. Donald DiRaddo and anchor Larry Rosen, assisted by Joel Kitay and Brett Dorman, received trophies for their work on *Kickoff From The Ravenszone*. The program was one of three that received an Emmy in the Sports Programs categories.

Additionally, NATAS honored Rosen and videographer Jeff Atkinson and Kitay, for *Ravens Visit Ground Zero*, a special feature on the players' visit to New York City after the attacks of Sept. 11. (See photo, below right). This trio won in the Sports Programming: Sports Segments category, along with one other finalist.

The 2002 winnings brought RaveTV's Emmy Award total to four in the team's six-year history. The staff has been nominated 11 times. Rosen has now won seven Emmys, Kitay has four, while Dorman and DiRaddo each won for the first time. In 1997 and 1999, RaveTV won for Audio ENG, a category honoring the quality of natural sound.

The Capital Region chapter includes television stations from Baltimore, Richmond and Norfolk.

RaveTV plans to bring back *Ravens Report*, a show that provides insider access to the team. The show will premiere on Comcast SportsNet every Saturday night at 10:30 PM, beginning on Sept. 7.

A new show will be unveiled this year on Sept. 9. Called *Wired*, it's a weekly program that "mikes" a Ravens' player or coach (see Billick inset above) through the week and throughout the entire game.

Kickoff is an hour-long pre-game show that airs at 7 PM in the pre-season and is co-hosted by Rosen, and Comcast's Sage Steele, who is back for a second year. (See photo above, left). *Kickoff* will be broadcast on Comcast SportsNet. Ravens preseason games will be simulcast on Comcast SportsNet and WBFF TV, Channel 45, with kickoffs at 8 PM.

Kickoff is designed to get fans ready for the game with live interviews and an indepth look at training camp as players fight for spots on the roster.

If final examinations at a player's school conclude after this date, the player is prohibited from participating in any activities until after the player's final day of examinations. If the player has left or leaves school, he is prohibited from participating in any club activities until after the final day of examinations at his school.
- June 1** Deadline for Old Club to send tender to its unsigned Restricted Free Agents or to extend Qualifying Offer, whichever is greater, in order to retain rights.
- June 1** Deadline for Old Club to send tender to its unsigned Unrestricted Free Agents to retain rights if player is not signed by another club by July 22.
- June 2** Any unamortized signing bonus amounts will be included in the succeeding year's Team Salary for any players removed from the team's roster other than by trade.
- June 15** Deadline for club to withdraw Qualifying Offer to Restricted Free Agents and still retain exclusive negotiating rights by substituting tender of one-year contract at 110 percent of previous year's Paragraph 5 salary (with all other terms carried forward unchanged).
- July 15** On or after this date a club that extends an existing Player Contract for a Franchise Player shall not be deemed to have utilized its Franchise Player designation for the period of the extension.
- July 22*** Signing period ends at 4 p.m., New York time, for Unrestricted Free Agents to whom a June 1 tender was made by Old Club, and for Transition Players. After this date and through 4 p.m., New York time, on the Tuesday after the 10th regular season weekend, Old Club has exclusive negotiating rights to these players.
