Art Modell addressed the Ravens' players and coaches in the locker room immediately after his team won Super Bowl XXXV at Raymond James Stadium last January. "I'm so proud and happy for all of you players and coaches. You worked so hard and did yourself and my family proud." A few days later Brian Billick sat in his office and expressed what many Ravens associates were feeling. "For all the selfish reasons you want to win a Super Bowl, and we all have them, we all had a part of us wanting to win the championship for Art. I'm glad I could do my part to make it happen," Billick said.

In 40 years of NFL ownership, Modell has won two NFL championships, 1964 and 2000. Three other Modell teams ('65, '68 and '69) played in NFL title games, while three more ('86, '87 and '89) lost memorable AFC Championship battles against John Elway and the Denver Broncos. Eight other teams earned the playoffs, while five more entered the season's final week with a chance to make the postseason. With his 26 winning seasons in 40 years, Modell has earned respect and recognition. But he might be more noted for his efforts on behalf of the league through the years. In fact, his fellow owners surprised him with a salute at a league meeting in 1990 with a proclamation: "The league has always had its share of special people. They have been the founders, owners, officials and coaches who have stayed the course over long periods of years, and who have made special contributions to the welfare of the league and its members. Art, you are one of those special people."

Modell is the only elected NFL President in league history, serving in that capacity in 1967 through 1969. He chaired the negotiations for the first collective bargaining agreement with the players in 1968, leading a committee that included Vince Lombardi and Jim Finks.

Modell might be most noted for his tenure as the NFL's Broadcast Chairman. The contracts he negotiated over a 31-year period (1962-93) set the standard for sports TV. Art enjoys reflecting on all of this, but what he really enjoys is talking about the many friendships he has made through the NFL, including with the greats of the game – from George Halas to Jim Brown, to Wellington Mara to Pete Rozelle.

Art Modell, who bought the Cleveland Browns for what was then an unprecedented price (\$4 million in 1961), is the person who brought the NFL back to Baltimore. It was not an easy move to make for the proud Modell. "I didn't get into this business to go bankrupt. I'm in it to win, and I couldn't continue to make the best effort to win in Cleveland with the stadium situation we had. After I left, the politicians found the funds for a new stadium. I don't believe I could have gotten that done."

Modell did not leave the fans of Cleveland empty handed. He left the name "Browns", the team colors and the great Browns' history. "That didn't happen in Baltimore with the Colts, in Brooklyn with the Dodgers, nor in other cities that have lost sports teams," Modell explains. The welcome to the Modell family by the fans of Baltimore has been overwhelming. "The fans here have given us five years of sellouts as we rebuilt the team to the current championship level."

"Art should be in the NFL Hall of Fame. He's won at the highest level. He's made the league stronger with his business acumen, negotiation abilities and emphasis that the whole is greater and more important than the individual teams. And he's treated his players fairly, generously and with compassion through the years."

Art and his wife, Pat, (see inclusion) are the parents of John and David. John, who coordinated the installation and use of the innovative scoreboards at PSINet Stadium, is a composer/producer and president of Modular Entertainment, a music and multimedia production company. John also coordinates the Ravens' home game entertainment and schedule as the Vice President of Special Projects. He and his wife Tracy, an artist, live in Los Angeles with their son Dylan Scot (3/21/92) and daughter Isabella Sophia (4/28/98).

David, the Ravens' President, lives in Baltimore and has four children: daughters Breslin Ebright (2/5/90) and Collier Honora (10/6/93) and sons Arthur Edward (11/23/91) and David Orrick Jr. (9/25/96).

HISTORY

- ▶ Dropped out of high school at the age of 15 to help financially-strapped family after the death of his father.
- ▶ First full-time job was as an electrician's helper, cleaning out the hulls of ships in a Brooklyn shipyard.
- ▶ Joined the Air Force in 1943 (he was 18).
- ▶ Under the G.I. Bill, he enrolled in a New York City television school following World War II.
- ▶ Produced one of the first regular daytime television shows in the nation ("Market Melodies").
- ▶ Joined the advertising business in 1954 and soon became a partner for the L.H. Hartman Company.

FOOTBALL HISTORY

- ▶ Purchased Browns on March 21, 1961.
- ▶ Has won two NFL Championships: the 1964 Browns beat the Baltimore Colts, 27-0, and the 2000 Ravens won Super Bowl XXXV with a 34-7 victory over the New York Giants.
- ▶ His 1965, 1968 and 1969 teams played in NFL title games.
- ▶ His 1986, 1987 and 1989 teams lost memorable AFC Championship games to the Denver Broncos.
- ▶ His 1967, 1971, 1972, 1980, 1982, 1985, 1988 and 1994 teams also made the playoffs.
- ▶ In five other seasons - 1963, 1970, 1976, 1979 and 1983 - the Browns had a chance to make the playoffs on the final day of the season, but did not qualify.
- ▶ In 40 years of ownership, Art has 26 winning seasons with an overall record of 318-282-8.
- ▶ Moved franchise to Baltimore on Feb. 9, 1996.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- ▶ Only elected NFL President in league history, serving in that capacity in 1967, 1968 and 1969.
- ▶ Chairman of the NFL's Television Committee for 31 years (1962-93). During his tenure, the NFL TV contracts set the standard and records for the highest in sports' history.
- ▶ Chairman of the Owners' Labor Committee, which successfully negotiated the NFL's first collective bargaining agreement with the players in 1968.
- ▶ Served on the NFL-AFL Merger Committee, breaking the impasse for realignment of the two leagues by moving the Browns into the American Football Conference.
- ▶ First Chairman of NFL Films.
- ▶ Was an important participant in the negotiations with ABC to start Monday Night Football and then volunteered to host the first game in Cleveland in 1970.
- ▶ Conceived and staged the first doubleheader in NFL history, which consisted of the Browns and three other teams playing back-to-back preseason games at Cleveland Stadium. From 1962 through 1971, the Browns hosted the annual doubleheader each August that drew over 800,000 fans in those 10 years.

- ▶ Joined wife Pat to host major fundraiser for the Hospice of Baltimore last April. Among the many Baltimore area organizations Art generously funds are the United Way of Central Maryland and the Police Athletic League.
- ▶ Serves on the Executive Committee of the Greater Baltimore Committee.
- ▶ Served on the board of the world-renowned Cleveland Clinic for 20 years, including his last seven as President.
- ▶ Served on the boards for Baldwin Wallace College and Cleveland State University.
- ▶ Serves on the board of Churchill Downs.
- ▶ Former board member of National City Bank, National City Corporation and the Ohio Bell Telephone Company.
- ▶ Baltimore's Quarterback Club gives scholarships in his name each year.

Like her husband, Art, and her sons, David and John, Patricia Modell believes in getting involved in the community. Pat is on the boards of the Kennedy Krieger Institute, the Walters Art Gallery and the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra. She helped establish and direct the Ravens' Foundation for Families, and co-chaired (with Art) major fundraisers for Hospice of Baltimore (2001) and Cystic Fibrosis (1997).

After graduation from college (New Rochelle), Patricia entered the acting profession. She soon appeared in three Broadway plays in her hometown of New York, where she also acted in over 200 live TV shows. The talented actress then moved to Los Angeles where she appeared in three series, including the long-running "People's Choice" and as Meg Baldwin in "General Hospital."

Patricia acted in other TV shows and movies. She retired from show business in 1969, married Art Modell and moved to Cleveland with her two sons. Pat quickly became an important part of her new home, dedicating her time and energy to a variety of important projects. She co-chaired major fundraisers for the Hospice of the Western Reserve and the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland. She also helped raise funds for the Make-A-Wish Foundation, the Playhouse Square Foundation, the Cerebral Palsy Association, Ursuline College, the Cleveland Musical Arts Foundation and the Cleveland Ballet.

Two years ago, in an interview with NFL Films, David Modell said: "How cool will it be to wake up in my house with the Super Bowl trophy next to my bed for a night? How cool will it be for others with the Ravens to do the same? How cool will it be for our fans to have that trophy in Baltimore?"

With hard work and the right leadership, dreams do come true and David enters his 25th season in the NFL as a defending world champion. But, the younger Modell has not been selfish with the championship. The Ravens' Super Bowl trophy has been touched by over 100,000 hands since Art Modell accepted it last Jan. 28. "We want to make sure that our fans know that we understand that they are very much a part of our championship. Their support, their stadium and their investment in us are major factors to our winning. Sharing the trophy with them symbolizes that union," said Modell, who has had the trophy on tour. "Eventually we will shine it up and put in a case, but we're sharing the trophy first."

Modell keeps his associates at the Ravens focused: "Our number one goal is to win. This oversimplification cannot be re-stated often or loudly enough. It shapes every decision and action this organization takes," Modell said. "I don't want us just to be the best football team. We aspire to be the best business organization. As our mission statement proclaims: 'Here, the extraordinary must be commonplace.'"

"You have to have a vision, but set realistic goals. You have to communicate effectively internally, as well as externally, and hold everyone accountable. Plus, we continue to embody my father's philosophy of being first-class in every way and having compassion, and we'll have fun doing all of this."

Since becoming President of the Ravens in 1998, David has organized the franchise into four groups, each directed by a "group operating head". With guidance from his father, Art, David also spearheaded the search for a new head coach and the hiring of Brian Billick.

David was a key player in the innovative agreement with PSINet that set a standard in the marriage of professional sports and a commercial entity. He coordinated the opening of PSINet Stadium in 1998, which included a three-day football festival in downtown Baltimore that attracted over 100,000 fans.

Both Baltimore Magazine and the *Baltimore Business Journal* have saluted Modell. *Baltimore Magazine* picked him as one of "40 Leaders Under 40" this May, and he was picked by the *Baltimore Business Journal* (Jan., 2000) as one of "40 Under 40" leaders who help Baltimore industry and the community in general. He will receive the Better Business Bureau of Greater Maryland's "Outstanding Achievement Award" this fall. When the team arrived in Baltimore in 1996, David coordinated a fan vote through *The Baltimore Sun* to select the team nickname - the Ravens. Working with staff, NFL Properties and Baltimore area focus groups, he directed the process to select the team colors and uniform design. "It was a collaborative effort. The fans got involved, my family, obviously Art, plus many members of the organization." In 1999, David once again involved the fans in the vote for a new Ravens' logo.

No person in the Ravens' organization has more hands-on experience in as many different areas of the company as the 40-year-old Modell. Starting in Cleveland Stadium and game-day operations when he was 14, David has had experience in every phase of the team except playing and coaching. He worked in the team's ticket office, public relations department and started the marketing division in 1985.

As the Ravens' president and chief operating officer, he runs the club's daily activities. David is involved in every aspect of the team - from chairing weekly group operating head meetings to negotiating player contracts. He coordinated the many organizational details that came with the Ravens run through the playoffs and eventual Super Bowl title. David also serves on the NFL's Stadium and Expansion Committees.

David made his first mark with the franchise and in league circles with the work he did marketing the Browns. The younger Modell started a marketing department in 1985 and developed a series of programs that enhanced the team's image and provided needed revenues. Other teams have copied some of David's innovations, including team television productions (weekly shows and preseason games produced by the team rather than selling those rights), an elaborate training camp magazine that is distributed to fans, and advertising moments of exclusivity at home games. The team's original television ventures were both produced and sold by Modell.


"At a time when most teams were wondering whether they should have a marketing department, David had ours up and running and setting a pace that a number of franchises have since followed. I'm very proud of his production and creativity," Art Modell said.

Modell is an active member of five Baltimore boards of directors: the United Way of Central Maryland, the Port Discovery Children's Museum, Father Martin's Ashley, the University of Maryland Medical System's Shock Trauma and the Maryland Public Television Foundation. David is also the chairman of the Ravens Foundation for Families. "Community involvement has always been a hallmark of Art Modell's franchise. My father and mother (Patricia) set the example. They not only recognize where they can help, they get things done. I'm fortunate to be able to follow their lead," David said.

In Cleveland, Modell was President of the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland, and he headed its development fundraising. He was a member of the Board of Trustees for the Cleveland Urban League and the Convention and Visitors' Bureau. Modell also worked with the Lake County Boy Scouts Association and served on the Visiting Committee of the Athletic Department at Case Western Reserve University.

As a 14-year old student, David worked Browns' games as a member of the grounds crew. In the next few years, he spent time as a front office aide and training camp intern. He graduated from The Gunnery School (Washington, CT), where he delivered a stirring commencement address last May, and attended Wittenberg University. Modell joined the Browns in a full-time capacity in the team's ticket office in 1981. He then worked two years as the front office manager for the Fernwood Inn, a resort in the Pocono Mountains (1982-84) before returning to Cleveland in October of 1984.

David is the father of daughters Breslin Ebright (2/5/90), and Collier Honora (10/6/93), and sons Arthur Edward (11/23/91) and David Orrick Jr. (9/25/96).

John Modell, who was named Vice President of Special Projects in February of 1999, spearheads the Ravens' mission to provide the best game day entertainment in professional sports. Modell, 41, is the eldest son of owner Art and Pat Modell and is president of Modular Entertainment, a music and multimedia production company in Los Angeles.

John was involved in the design and realization of the SmartVision video screens at PSINet Stadium. The two high-resolution displays are made up of over nine million LED's and measure 100' x 24' each - the largest in any sports venue. The screens are used to combine graphics, scoring, stats and cutting edge video into one multi-functional format that is brighter and more visually dynamic than anything previously experienced. This new kind of video technology was the first use of its kind in the world, effectively making Jumbotron-type installations obsolete.

"We've tapped into some of the finest talent from the video and film industry to create the bold visual look of the content seen on the SmartVision boards," said Modell. "Along with our great sound system, the Ravens provide the best in-stadium experience in the business. That's what our fans deserve and have come to expect."

John also plays a key role in bringing other kinds of entertainment to PSINet Stadium, securing concerts such as Metallica and the HFStival. "PSINet Stadium was built with concerts in mind. With the best technical facilities and acoustics, we have hands down the best stadium concert facility in this part of the country. We are well suited to compete in a marketplace that previously only included venues in the D.C. area," Modell said.

Modell majored in music composition at the California Institute of the Arts (Cal Arts). Prior to that, John attended high school at University School in Cleveland, where he played defensive tackle.

John is a composer and music producer, creating music for TV, commercials and records. With his company, Modular Entertainment, he is also involved in the design and production of live multimedia events and installations. He is the author of the Ravens' Fight Song. John and his wife, Tracy, an artist, are the parents of Dylan Scot (3/21/92) and Isabella Sophia (4/28/98).

To prepare for his ownership, Bisciotti regularly attends Ravens practices and important team functions, plus he accompanies the Modells and other Ravens' executives to NFL owners' meetings. "I appreciate the willingness of Art and David to allow me to learn more about the NFL," Bisciotti added. "Being part of a Baltimore NFL franchise is a dream come true for me in many ways."

An Anne Arundel County businessman and an enthusiastic supporter of Baltimore football and University of Maryland athletics, Bisciotti founded Aerotek in 1983 and helped build it into one of the nation's leading technical staffing firms. Steve quietly contributes significant funds to a variety of Baltimore community projects.

Bisciotti was born on April 10, 1960, in Severna Park, MD and graduated from Salisbury State University in 1982. Steve and his wife, Renee, reside in Millersville, MD with their two sons, Jason, 16, and Jack, 14.

Ozzie Newsome is legendary in his beloved home state of Alabama, where he earned college football Hall of Fame honors. He's among the elite players in NFL history, capped with his induction into the NFL Hall of Fame. You can add another honor to this distinguished gentleman's resume – Architect of the Super Bowl Champions.

And Newsome's style is notable. Humble is his way. Gentle is his manner. Hard work is his mantra. As a player, he was about production without flamboyance. As one of the NFL's top executives, he credits those around him for the Ravens' success.

But those in the know understand. Rick Gosselin of the Dallas Morning News picked Newsome as the NFL's Executive of the Year for 2000. "Those awards and recognitions are very nice, but there are lots of Ravens responsible for our success," Newsome explained. "The support and direction from Art and David (Modell); Brian (Billick) and his coaches are the best. And I do think we have outstanding talent evaluators and hard-working scouts, headed by Phil (Savage) and James (Harris)."

Newsome did not slow down after last January's impressive victory over the Giants in Super Bowl XXXV. "I firmly believed that we could not compete for a second championship with the team that won in Tampa. Our only chance to get back to the playoffs and stay at the highest level was to upgrade our team, specifically on offense," Newsome said. As he did a year ago when he signed key veteran free agents like Shannon Sharpe, Sam Adams, Trent Dilfer and Sam Gash, Newsome directed the signing of more proven talent. The Ravens added a pair of Pro Bowlers to their offense: QB Elvis Grbac and RT Leon Searcy.

"I believe we put ourselves in a position to be a playoff team again, as long as we stay relatively healthy. Once you get to the playoffs, you have your opportunity to compete for the championship," Newsome added.

One of the first things Art Modell did when he moved his franchise to Baltimore was invite Ozzie Newsome to join him as the Ravens' vice president of player personnel. "I've known Ozzie for over 20 years," Modell said. "I knew him as a great player, a Hall of Fame-type athlete. He had tremendous abilities as an athlete, but he worked hard to be the best."

When Newsome retired following the 1990 season, his 13th with the Cleveland Browns, Modell asked him to join the front office as a special assignment scout. Two years later, "the Wizard" was promoted to assistant to the head coach/offense-pro personnel. "I had to find out what direction my career would go," Newsome said. "Art gave me the opportunity to work with the coaches, and I enjoyed that. At the same time, I increased my experience with the personnel department and decided that's where I wanted my career to head."

In 1994, Newsome was named the team's director of pro personnel. While he continued to help on the field, Newsome provided detailed studies on other NFL players and recommended those whom the team should try to acquire. "I've seen some former players who can't make the transition to the front office. That has not been the case with Ozzie. He attacks his job the same way he became a great player - by working harder than those around him and learning everything he needs to know to be successful," Modell added.

"Drafts are exciting," Newsome explained. "They remind me of getting ready for a big game, like the Steelers or a playoff game. We

feel pretty good about the players we acquired over our six Ravens drafts, plus getting free agents who not only are productive, but guys like Rod (Woodson) and Shannon (Sharpe) who show our young players how to prepare to win and stay winners."

The first draft (1996) under Newsome's direction produced two four-time Pro Bowlers in left tackle Jonathan Ogden and middle linebacker Ray Lewis, who was the MVP in Super Bowl XXXV and the NFL's most valuable defensive player last season. Also making the Pro Bowl as a return specialist was Jermaine Lewis, a fifth-round pick in that draft. In his second draft (1997), Newsome picked linebackers Peter Boulware and Jamie Sharper, safety Kim Herring and center Jeff Mitchell - all four started against the Giants in the championship. Boulware was a consensus choice for the NFL's 1997 Rookie of the Year and has made the Pro Bowl twice.

In 1998, Newsome coordinated the selections of cornerback Duane Starks and receiver Patrick Johnson with the team's first two picks. Starks tied for the NFL's interception lead among rookies that year (equaling Charles Woodson's five thefts) and started eight games as a rookie. Starks added five more thefts in his second season, led the Ravens with six in 2000, and thrilled Ravens fans with a 49-yard interception for a touchdown against the Giants in the Super Bowl.

Johnson caught the game-winning TD in the final minute of the Ravens' win at Tennessee last season, allowing Baltimore to be the first visiting team to win at Adelphia Coliseum.

Newsome continued his hot hand in 1999, when he tabbed Arizona CB Chris McAlister with the 10th pick in the first round. Most experts believe McAlister will be the next member of the Ravens' defense to earn Pro Bowl honors. Newsome and his staff also picked two starters, LG Edwin Mulitalo and WR Brandon Stokley, in the fourth round of the '99 draft. Stokley opened the scoring in SB XXXV with a 38-yard touchdown grab.

It looks like Newsome hit the mark again with the 2000 draft, picking RB Jamal Lewis with the first of two first round choices. Lewis set a Ravens' team record with 1,364 rushing yards as a rookie. WR Travis Taylor was also selected in the first round, and he was the team's leading wide receiver until a fractured clavicle placed him on injured reserve after nine games.

Not only have Ozzie's drafts been productive, but free agent signings have proven fruitful, too. One of the game's all-time great players, former cornerback Rod Woodson, made the Pro

Bowl as a safety the last two seasons, his eighth and ninth trips to Hawaii.

DE Michael McCrary has made the Pro Bowl twice and was a first alternate in 2000 after signing as an unrestricted free agent from Seattle in 1997. Along with Sharpe and Gash last season, Newsome recruited and signed DT Sam Adams, who produced his first Pro Bowl season and anchored a defensive front that allowed the fewest rushing yards (970) in NFL history (16 games).

Newsome has gained induction into four halls of fame – the NFL's (1999), the National Football Foundation's College Hall of Fame (1994), the NCAA Hall of Fame (1994) and the University of Alabama (1995). Placed prominently on the wall of Newsome's office is a sideline portrait of Paul "Bear" Bryant. "Coach helped me grow up. He pushed me further than I thought I could go, both on and off the field," Newsome said.

Newsome's pro career is the best of any tight end in NFL history. His 662 receptions (for 7,980 yards) are not only the most ever caught by a tight end, but the most in Browns' history. Ozzie ended his career as the fourth-leading NFL receiver of all-time. He earned three Pro Bowls (1981, 1984-85) and was a four-time winner of the Cleveland Touchdown Club's Offensive Player of the Year award (1978, 1981, 1983 and 1984). His consecutive game reception streak of 150 is the second longest in NFL history.

Newsome, who was named to the All-NFL team of the 1980's (2nd team), consistently received All-AFC and All-NFL honors throughout his career. Ozzie, 45, was a 1978 number one draft choice, along with Clay Matthews, and the two are among an elite group of Browns to play in three decades. The others are Gene Hickerson (1958-60, 62-73), Dick Schafrath (1959-71) and Don Cockroft (1968-80).

Winner of the 1990 Byron "Whizzer" White Award as the NFL's top community volunteer, Newsome is widely known for his willingness to help those in need. Ozzie, who still works out every day, his wife, Gloria, and their son, Michael Ryan, live in Cockeysville.

Passion and Accountability

Spend enough time with Brian Billick and you're going to hear those two words. They are cornerstones to his foundation of coaching and leadership. These are ingredients some players and staff lacked when he took over as head coach of the Ravens in 1999. Not any more. You want passion? Watch the Ravens play games or practice. You want accountability? How about the 34-7 Super Bowl victory over the New York Giants last January? How about a World Championship in only his second season as a head coach?

"You have to have passion for the work you do to succeed. If a player doesn't like to study, practice or train, doesn't like the physicality of the game, he's going to have a very difficult time succeeding. Passion is a lubricant for success," Billick explained. "Accountability is obvious. You have to perform. Accountability is also a sign of respect for your team. It is a reflection of a team's integrity when individuals take responsibility for their actions."

In his second year at any level of being a head coach, Billick directed his team to the ultimate prize with the Super Bowl victory. The Ravens finished with a 16-4 record (12-4 in the regular season), blowing by opponents in the playoffs: 21-3 over Denver, 24-10 at Tennessee, 16-3 at Oakland in the AFC Championship and the crushing victory over the Giants in the title contest.

Billick has now coached a Viking offense that set the NFL record for the most points scored in a season - 556 in 1998; and a 2000 Ravens' defense that smashed the fewest points allowed standard (for a 16-game season) by giving up 165 points, 22 less than the 187 permitted by the 1985 Chicago Bears.

Billick directed the best team in the Ravens' five-year history last season when the team beat Jacksonville for the first time ever (and did it twice), became the first visiting team to win at Tennessee's Adelphia Coliseum (and did that twice), and finished the year with 11 consecutive victories, including the playoffs.



The Super Bowl champion Ravens finished first in five important league-wide defensive categories, including shutouts (4), points allowed per game (10.3), rushing yards allowed per game (60.6), rushing yards allowed per attempt (2.7), takeaways (49) and fumble recoveries (26). The team's turnover ratio of +23 was also the NFL's best. Baltimore, with rookie RB Jamal Lewis gaining 1,364 yards, was the league's fifth-best rushing team and was second in time of possession. K Matt Stover led the NFL with 35 field goals; Jermaine Lewis was first in punt returns (16.1-yard average) and P Kyle Richardson



was first in the NFL with 35 punts inside the 20.

Billick's leadership shined in the playoffs when the Ravens outscored their four opponents 95 to 23. The Ravens became the fourth Wild Card team to win the Super Bowl, following the '97 Broncos, the '80 Raiders and the '69 Chiefs. Brian's ability to keep the team unified and focused last October when the Ravens did not score a touchdown and suffered a three-game losing streak is notable.

There were clear signs in Brian's first year (1999) as the Ravens' head coach that he had special leadership abilities. The 8-8 Ravens produced the most victories in the franchise's four years, won the most consecutive games (4), the most road games (4), including the first victory at Pittsburgh, won four of the season's final five games, and finished with the best-ever Ravens' defense (2nd in the NFL).

That season, the Ravens earned the .500 mark in the tough AFC Central, plus a new-found respect around the league, thanks to the strong defense (in the top two in the NFL in five key categories) and an improving offense. The offense evolved into an efficient unit, averaging 25.4 points and 322 yards per game over the final nine games (record 6-3), up from 13.5 points and 268.4 yards per game in the first seven contests (record 2-5). The Ravens outscored their final nine opponents, 229-142, including a 41-14 victory over AFC Champion Tennessee on 12/5/99. QB Tony Banks, who became the Ravens' starter in game seven, threw a career-high 17 TD passes and a career-low eight INTs in his 10 starts.

"The old saying that states 'you win championships with defense' doesn't work anymore, despite what we did last year. We have to be better balanced now. We can't rely on the defense as much. We have to be able to score more. We need more big plays as part of our arsenal. We'll add more 'explosives' to our attack this season with the addition of Elvis Grbac, second seasons for Jamal and Travis Taylor, and the maturation that came from our playoff run," Billick said.

Billick became the second head coach in Baltimore Ravens history when he accepted a six-year contract from owner Art Modell on January 19, 1999. Billick, the highly successful offensive coordinator for the Minnesota Vikings from 1994-98, directed a Vikings' attack that set a variety of NFL and team records in a 15-1 1998 campaign.

"When we began our search, we couldn't talk with Brian because his team was in the playoffs," Modell said. "Instead, we talked with 28 people who had some direct association with Brian."

"Everything we heard about Coach Billick told us to wait for him," explained David Modell, the Ravens' president. The younger Modell and Ozzie Newsome, the Ravens' vice president of personnel, helped Art during the head-coaching search. "We talked with everybody from the person who introduced Brian to his wife, Kim, to Dennis Green, to Tony Dungy, to Bill Walsh. All of these people painted a picture

of a person and a coach ready to take the next step up in the NFL. And, Brian fit the profile of a coach with a set of skills and characteristics we wanted, and he's proven our assessment was correct."

"I was very fortunate," Billick said. "Usually there is one 'hot' coordinator and one job available. I had other opportunities, but I picked Baltimore."

Billick, 47, was the architect of a Minnesota offense that in 1998 shattered the NFL record for most points scored in a season (556), breaking the old mark (541) set by the 1983 Washington Redskins. The '98 Vikings scored 53 of 56 times they were inside the 20. Minnesota tied for the NFL lead with 41 touchdown passes, shattering a team mark, and scored over 100 points in each quarter for the first time in team history. Minnesota ranked second in the NFL (behind San Francisco) with a team-record 6,262 total net yards and first in the league with 4,328 yards passing. Current Raven QB Randall Cunningham, who replaced the injured Brad Johnson early in the season, led the NFL with a 106 QB rating and set a Vikings' record with 34 TD passes. Cunningham's favorite target was rookie WR Randy Moss, who burst onto the NFL scene with 17 TD receptions.

Over his five full seasons as coordinator, Billick guided the Vikings into the top five in the NFL in yards per game, passing yards per game, completions and third down conversions. Under Billick's guidance, the Vikings recorded their top three offensive seasons (1998, 1995 and 1994), and five of the top 10 offensive campaigns in team history. Most importantly, the Vikings advanced to the playoffs all but one season (1995) during Billick's tenure. Minnesota played postseason games in 1993-94 and 1996-98.

Billick joined the Vikings in 1992 as tight ends coach. "When he came here, Brian was the only guy with a computer, and now all the coaches use them," said Vikings' head coach Dennis Green. Brian was named offensive coordinator three games into the 1993 season, and Minnesota's production increased dramatically: The Vikings went from 264.8 yards per game over the first six weeks of the season to a 323.3-yard average over the final 10 games. During a three-game winning streak that propelled the Vikings into the playoffs, the offense averaged over 21 points and 351 yards per game. In Billick's first full season as offensive coordinator in 1994, the Vikings finished second in the NFL in passing yards (4,324) – now the third-most in team annals. Minnesota won the NFC Central Division title, but lost to the Bears in the first round of the playoffs.

"I enjoy working with the media, and I respect the jobs they have, which are very difficult at times, especially at deadline. I am surprised when a reporter is taken aback because I expressed my opinion publicly. I am entitled to an opinion, and I am entitled to express it. So are they and they do often."

Robert Smith set team records for rushing yards in a season (1,266), 100-yard games (six) and finished third on the team with 37 receptions. Minnesota's rushing attack finished second in the NFC with 2,041 rushing yards. They defeated the Giants, 23-22, in the Wild Card round, before dropping a 38-22 game at San Francisco in the Divisional Playoffs.

You can see the pattern in Billick's coaching history. Quarterbacks have their most productive seasons with his guidance. Moon, Johnson, Cunningham, Tony Banks and Trent Dilfer all transcended in Billick's system. "Brian finds out what you do best, and he makes that a major part of what the offense will do. He holds you accountable, and he's a very good teacher," Cunningham said.

Before his appointment with the Vikings, Brian was a Stanford assistant from 1989-91 under Coach Green. He helped in the development of wide receivers Ed McCaffrey, Chris Walsh and tight ends Ryan Wetnight and Jim Price. All four went on to NFL careers. Prior to Stanford, Billick spent three seasons as offensive coordinator at Utah State (1986-88). Brian helped develop QB Brent Snyder,

who set school passing marks with 2,887 yards in 1987 and 3,218 yards in 1988. When he arrived at Utah State, the team was ranked 107th out of 108 NCAA Division I-A teams offensively. In his final two seasons as coordinator, the Aggies ranked in the top 10 in total offense.

Brian coached receivers, tight ends and quarterbacks at San Diego State from 1981-85 and held the added responsibility as recruiting coordinator. Aztec QB Todd Santos set all-time NCAA passing records during Billick's tenure. Brian also coached WR Webster Slaughter and TE Rob Awalt (the NFL's rookie of the year in 1987). "San Diego State gave me a great chance to learn from a good offensive mind like Doug Scovil, to learn what it meant to coach, to be a professional," Billick said. "Doug wasn't particularly interested in doing a lot of administrative things, so I absorbed a lot of those and continued to learn what an organization needs to do to function."

Brian began his coaching career as an assistant at the University of the Redlands in 1977, while helping coach a local high school team at the same time. He spent the following year (1978) as a graduate assistant at Brigham Young University. At BYU, he worked with tight ends and the offensive line. Following that season, Brian was assistant director of public relations for the San Francisco 49ers in 1979-80. Two years earlier (1977), Billick had been drafted by the 49ers in the 11th round, was released and had a brief stint with the Dallas Cowboys. Brian earned All-Western Athletic Conference honors and honorable mention All-America in 1976 as a tight end at Brigham Young University. In 1976, he caught 20 passes for 338 yards and a touchdown. Brian played linebacker at Air Force as a freshman before transferring to BYU.

Since coming to Baltimore in January of 1999, Billick has enthusiastically helped improve the community. Billick gives extra time to the Central Maryland United Way and to the Living Classroom Foundation, where he serves on the board of directors. Brian has hosted significant fundraisers for the Living Classroom, and has had a number of Raven players volunteer at this important educational facility. Billick was picked as the Maryland Chapter of Multiple Sclerosis 2001 "Champion of the Year". Brian's wife, Kim, joins him in many of these community works, plus she has helped Baltimore's Red Cross with a number of important projects.

Billick has co-authored two books. He completed "Competitive Leadership: Twelve Principles for Success" (with Dr. James A. Peterson) this offseason. He previously co-wrote "Finding the Winning Edge" with NFL Hall of Fame coach Bill Walsh and Dr. Peterson. This book is a blueprint for developing an NFL team, covering everything from practice schedules to front office structure.

Billick was born in Fairborne, OH on Feb. 28, 1954, but grew up in Redlands, CA. He is the fourth

Matt Cavanaugh, the person who calls the Ravens' plays, is in his third season as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach after serving in the same capacity with the Chicago Bears for two seasons (1997-98). A 14-year NFL veteran quarterback, Matt is in his ninth season coaching, his fifth as coordinator.

Since his arrival in 1999, Cavanaugh has worked with four starting quarterbacks (Scott Mitchell, Stoney Case, Tony Banks and Trent Dilfer). Dilfer, who is no longer with Baltimore, finished 11-1 as a starter in 2000, including the Ravens' 34-7 Super Bowl XXXV victory over the New York Giants. The Ravens set a new team rushing record with 2,199 yards, fifth in the NFL. The powerful ground game, led by rookie Jamal Lewis (1,364 yards), enabled the offense to rank second in the NFL in average time of possession (33:19). The Ravens scored 333 points, second-most in team history, despite a five-game TD drought in October.

"Matt has had to deal with four different starting quarterbacks since we've been here, and Elvis Grbac will be his fifth," said head coach Brian Billick. "He weathered the storm last October when we didn't score a touchdown. We came out of that situation stronger than before and won our final 11 games including the World Championship. There aren't many coordinators who could have done that. He certainly has my respect. I believe Matt will be a head coach in the NFL."

Cavanaugh, 44, spent the 1996 season as quarterbacks coach of the San Francisco 49ers, where he coached current Ravens' QB Elvis Grbac. Matt tutored the quarterbacks for the Arizona Cardinals from 1994-95. He initiated his coaching career in 1993 as tight ends coach at the University of Pittsburgh.

Matt played for 14 NFL seasons after being selected in the second round of the 1978 draft by the New England Patriots. He spent five seasons with the Patriots before being traded to San Francisco in 1983, where he backed up Joe Montana. In 1986, Matt was traded to the Philadelphia Eagles, where he played four seasons. He played for the Giants in 1990 and '91, where he earned his second Super Bowl ring as a player. In 112 career games, Cavanaugh completed 305 of 579 passes for 4,332 yards, 28 TDs and 30 INTs.

Cavanaugh was named MVP of the 1976 Sugar Bowl in which the Pittsburgh Panthers won the National Championship.

Matt and his wife, Nancy, who is actively involved in fundraising activities for the American Red Cross, have three children: Any, Andrew and Mollie. The Cavanaughs live in Owings Mills, MD.

"It's only a matter of time before Marvin is a successful NFL head coach. The best thing that happened to our staff this offseason is that Marvin decided to stay with us," Ravens head coach Brian Billick said. Lewis is in his sixth season as the Ravens' defensive coordinator, which is the longest tenure with Baltimore among the coaches.

The Ravens shattered the single season record for fewest points allowed in a 16-game season with 165 (previous record was 187, held by 1986 Chicago Bears). The 2000 defense achieved a number of other significant accomplishments, including setting the NFL's 16-game rushing yards allowed record with 970 and extending their consecutive games without allowing a 100-yard rusher to 33 games. The unit finished first in the league in six key defensive categories: points allowed, rushing yards allowed, rushing average allowed, total take-aways, fumble recoveries and shutouts.

The Ravens' four shutouts were the most by an NFL team since the Steelers recorded five shutouts in 1976. The defense held opponents scoreless in 41 quarters (out of 64, or 64%). It allowed one TD or fewer in 14 of the team's last 18 games.

Baltimore's defensive cornerstone, LB Ray Lewis, was named the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year and Super Bowl XXXV Most Valuable Player, becoming the second player in NFL history to accomplish the feat. He was also only the second linebacker to win Super Bowl MVP. The defense sent three players to the 2000 Pro Bowl: DT Sam Adams, LB Ray Lewis and S Rod Woodson.

Marvin was honored last spring by Southwest Visions, Inc. with its First Annual "Vision" Award. Southwest Visions, Inc. is a non-profit housing and community development organization dedicated to providing quality affordable housing to the citizens of southwest Baltimore. The Ravens' defensive coordinator received other honors and awards this off-season. He was named "Man of the Year" by *The Washington Observer* in his hometown of Pittsburgh. The Professional Football Writers Association also honored Lewis as the "Assistant Coach of the Year" at the Ed Block Courage Awards dinner in March. He also was inducted into his alma mater's (Idaho State) Hall of Fame in September 2000.

Lewis addressed NFL coaches at the league's spring meeting in May, 2001, on "Preparing for Your Next Challenge." Marvin's efforts in the community have continued to be extensive during the off-season. He

Lewis spent four seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers (1992-95) coaching some of the best linebackers in the NFL, including Pro Bowlers Kevin Greene, Chad Brown, Levon Kirkland and Greg Lloyd. From 1993-95, the Steelers' defense ranked among the top three in the NFL each season. Of Pittsburgh's 97 sacks in two seasons ('94-95), the linebackers made 63.5, including 37.5 of a team record 55 sacks in '94.

Lewis, 43, is in his 21st year in coaching. He began his career coaching linebackers at his alma mater, Idaho State (1981-84). The Bengals finished 12-1 in Marvin's first season and won the NCAA Division I-AA championship. Lewis spent two years (1985-86) at Long Beach State before taking a post at New Mexico (1987-89), where he tutored inside linebackers the first two years and moved to the outside in '89. In 1990, he accepted a position coaching outside linebackers at Pittsburgh (1990-91).

Marvin received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Idaho State in 1981 and his Master's in athletic administration in 1982. He earned All-Big Sky Conference honors (1978, '79, '80) as a linebacker and also played quarterback and free safety during his college career.

Lewis attended Fort Cherry H.S. in McDonald (PA), where he was an all-conference quarterback and safety, and earned letters in wrestling and baseball. He and his wife, Peggy, have two children: daughter Whitney (16) and son Marcus (11). They reside in Finksburg, MD.

Jim Colletto is in his 35th year of coaching, his third with the Ravens as offensive line coach. The 2000 Ravens set a new team rushing mark with 2,199 yards and a 4.3-yard avg., and Jamal Lewis set a new franchise mark by rushing for 1,364 yards.

Colletto came to the Ravens in 1999 from Notre Dame, where he spent two seasons (1997-98) as offensive coordinator. In 1998, Jim coached tight ends in addition to coordinating the offense.

Colletto, 55, has 11 overall seasons of head coaching experience, including five years (1975-79) at Cal State Fullerton and six years at Purdue (1991-96). He spent three seasons (1982-84) as Purdue's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. The 1984 Purdue team was the only Boilermakers' squad to beat Notre Dame, Michigan and Ohio State in the same season.

Prior to being named Purdue's head coach, Jim was the assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Ohio State from 1988-90, where he also worked with offensive tackles and tight ends. From 1985-87, Colletto was offensive coordinator at Arizona State. The Sun Devils defeated Michigan in the 1987 Rose Bowl. Colletto joined head coach John Cooper at Ohio State in the winter of 1988.

Colletto entered the coaching ranks at his alma mater of UCLA as a graduate assistant in 1966. He coached the Bruins' offensive line for two seasons (1967-68). He has also coached at Brown (1969), Xavier of Ohio (1970-71) and Pacific (1972-74). Colletto graduated from UCLA in 1967, where he played both football and baseball. He led the team in rushing as a sophomore fullback in 1963. In 1965, he was an All-League defensive end and captained the Bruins' team that beat Michigan State in the Rose Bowl. Jack Del Rio, in his third season with Baltimore, coaches the talented starting trio of Peter Boulware, Ray Lewis and Jamie Sharper. Last season, Baltimore's defense set the NFL 16-game record by allowing only 165 points. The defense, led by Defensive Player of the Year and Super Bowl XXXV MVP Ray Lewis, recorded four shutouts, one shy of the post-1970 record. The defense continued its domination in the playoffs, allowing just one touchdown in four games. The lone score allowed in Baltimore's 34-7 Super Bowl XXXV win over the New York Giants came on a kickoff return.

Jack joined the Ravens after spending two seasons with the New Orleans Saints, 1998 as linebackers' coach and 1997 as assistant strength and conditioning coach. An 11-year NFL veteran, Jack was a third-round choice of the Saints in 1985. He earned the Saints' Rookie of the Year honors in 1985 and was named to the PFWA All-Rookie team. After two seasons (1985-86) with the Saints, Jack played for the Chiefs (1987-88), Cowboys (1989-91) and Vikings (1992-95). Del Rio led the Vikings in tackles for three straight years (1992-94) and played in the Pro Bowl following the '94 season. Jack logged over 100 consecutive starts from 1989-94, recorded over 1,000 career tackles and had 13 career interceptions.

Del Rio was a four-year starter at Southern Cal, where he earned consensus All-America as a senior and was a finalist for the Lombardi Award. He led USC in loss-tackles for three consecutive seasons. Del Rio was also a catcher on USC's baseball team, where he batted .330, caught current Arizona ace Randy Johnson and played with St. Louis slugger Mark McGwire.

Donnie Henderson, a Baltimore native, joined Brian Billick's staff in 1999 and is now in his 19th year coaching. In 2000, the World Champion Ravens' defense set 16-game NFL records including fewest points allowed (165) and fewest rushing yards allowed (970). The secondary, led by Pro Bowl S Rod Woodson, who was named to his ninth Pro Bowl, set a team mark with 23 interceptions and led the NFL with 49 takeaways. The Ravens allowed only 11 TD passes in 20 games (tops in the NFL).

The only change from last year's World Championship coaching staff is the wide receivers coach, Mike Nolan, who in 2000 held the position of defensive coordinator for the New York Jets. Mike, a Baltimore native, was hired on Feb. 15, 2001, replacing Milt Jackson, who will officially retire in October.

"Mike brings a unique perspective to the wide receivers' coaching position," says head coach Brian Billick. "Who better to teach receivers on how to beat defensive backs than someone who has spent a few years coaching defenses and stopping receivers?"

Prior to his one-year stint with the Jets, Nolan spent three years as defensive coordinator for the Washington Redskins (1997-99). While Nolan was with Washington, the Redskins captured the NFC East title (1999) and advanced to a divisional playoff game following a Wild Card Game victory over Detroit. In '97, Nolan's defense allowed the eighth-fewest points in the NFL and finished third overall in pass defense.

Nolan spent four seasons (1993-96) as the defensive coordinator for the New York Giants under then-head coach Dan Reeves. In his first season, the Giants' defense allowed the fewest points in the NFL (205). Nolan joined the Denver Broncos (1987-88) as a special teams coach/defensive assistant and then moved to linebackers coach (1989-92). He coached linebackers at LSU in 1986 and at Stanford in 1983, after a one-year stint as the Cardinal defensive backs coach (1982). In 1984-85, he coached defensive backs at Rice. In 1981, Nolan made his coaching debut as a graduate assistant at Oregon, where he was a four-year letterman at free safety. Nolan participated in the 1981 Denver Broncos' training camp as a defensive back.

Mike, the son of former NFL head coach Dick Nolan (San Francisco and New Orleans), was graduated from Woodside (Calif.) H.S. He and his wife, Kathy, have four children: sons, Michael and Christopher, and daughters, Laura and Jennifer.

Russ Purnell, a 16-year NFL coaching veteran, is in his third season as the Ravens' special teams' coach. Last year, K Matt Stover made his first Pro Bowl and led NFL kickers with 35 field goals and 135 points. Stover has a remarkable 87.5% success rate (63 of 72) over the last two seasons. P Kyle Richardson has led the NFL in punts-inside-the-20 each of the last two seasons (35 in 2000 and an NFL record 39 in 1999). The Ravens also led the league in 2000 with a 15.8-yard punt return average, and Jermaine Lewis led the NFL with a 16.1-yard punt return average on 36 returns, the highest for a player with at least 30 punt returns in a season in NFL history. Lewis, who scored two touchdowns on punt returns against the Jets on 12/24/00, also raced 84 yards for a score on a kickoff return in Super Bowl XXXV to ice Baltimore's 34-7 win over the Giants. Purnell's special teams were ranked fourth overall in *The Dallas Morning News*, an annual ranking by writer Rick Gosselin. The rankings take into account several different statistical categories.

Purnell spent four seasons with the Tennessee Oilers (1995-98), after spending nine seasons (1986-94) with the Seattle Seahawks. With the Seahawks, Russ was the tight ends/assistant special teams' coach in 1987, before taking over the special teams and tight ends in 1992.

Russ entered the collegiate coaching ranks in 1970 as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Whittier College. He coached for four seasons at USC as special teams and tight ends' coach before joining the Seahawks as offensive special assignments' coach in 1986. He was promoted to special teams/tight ends coach in 1992.

Purnell played at Orange Coast J.C. and transferred to Whittier College. He started his coaching career at Corona del Mar H.S. in 1972 and then coached at Edison High from 1973-81, before joining John Robinson's staff at USC. Russ and his wife, Jill, have three children, Timothy (5/11/88) and twins Erin and Jonathan (2/11/91). The Purnells live in Ellicott City, MD.

Rex Ryan is in his third year coaching the Ravens' defensive line. The Ravens' record-setting defense has not permitted a 100-yard rusher in 33 games (37 including the playoffs), the longest streak since the 1993-95 Chargers had a string of 34 games without allowing a 100-yard rusher. The longest such streak prior to the Chargers streak was 53 consecutive games by the Eagles from 1989 to 1992. Last season, Sam Adams earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl and the Ravens set a 16-game NFL record by allowing only 970 yards rushing and 2.68 yards per rushing attempt.

Rex joined Brian Billick's staff in 1999 after spending the 1998 season as Oklahoma's defensive coordinator. Rex coached the Sooners defense after spending two seasons as defensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati. He has used the "46" defense, created by his father, Buddy, throughout his coaching career. Oklahoma's defense ranked sixth in the nation in total defense. While at Cincinnati (1996-97), the defense ranked 5th and 13th in his two seasons.

"Rex is an extremely enthusiastic coach with NFL experience," said Brian Billick. "He's considered one of the best young defensive minds in the game today."

Ryan spent two seasons (1994 and '95) with the Arizona Cardinals, his first season coaching the defensive line and his second, the linebackers. In 1994, the Cardinals ranked in the NFL's top five in every defensive statistical category, including third in overall defense.

Before joining the NFL, Ryan was defensive coordinator at Morehead (KY) State from 1990-93. In 1989, Rex was assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at New Mexico Highlands. He started his collegiate coaching career as defensive ends coach at Eastern Kentucky in 1987.

Ryan played collegiately at Southwestern Oklahoma State. He received a master's degree from Eastern Kentucky in 1988. Ryan attended Stevenson High School in Prairie View, IL. His brother, Rob, is linebackers coach in New England under Bill Belichick. Rex and his wife, Michelle, have two sons: Payton (8) and Seth (7). The Ryans live in Ellicott City, MD.

Steve Shafer is in his 34th year of coaching, his third with the Ravens. Shafer is also the Ravens' assistant head coach and is responsible for helping head coach Brian Billick in various administrative roles. In 2000, the World Champion Ravens' defense set 16-game NFL records including fewest points allowed (165) and fewest rushing yards allowed (970). The secondary, led by Pro Bowl's Rod Woodson, who was named to his ninth Pro Bowl, set a team mark with 23 interceptions and led the NFL with 49 takeaways. The Ravens allowed only 11 TD passes in 20 games (tops in the NFL).

"I believe Steve is the most fundamentally-sound secondary coach in the NFL," said Billick. "His experience and background are an invaluable source for our players and other defensive coaches. Steve and I have known each other and shared football ideas for 27 years."

Before joining Billick's staff, Steve tutored the Carolina Panthers' defensive backs in 1998. The Panthers' tied for fourth in the NFL that season with 19 interceptions. Steve coached the Oakland Raiders' secondary for three seasons (1995-97) after serving as defensive coordinator at San Diego State in 1994. He coached the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' defensive backs from 1991-93 and the Los Angeles Rams' defensive backs from 1983-90.

Shafer launched his coaching career in 1968 at San Mateo (CA) Junior College, where he was defensive coordinator for five seasons before taking over as head coach for the 1973-74 seasons. He then coached defensive backs at San Diego State from 1975-82.

Matt Simon is in his third season as the Ravens' running backs' coach. Last year, rookie Jamal Lewis broke the Ravens' single-season rushing mark with 1,364 yards. Counting the postseason, Lewis combined for an amazing 2,038 yards in regular season and postseason, rushing and receiving. Baltimore set a new team rushing record with 2,199 yards, fifth in the NFL. In 1999, Ravens' running backs did not fumble once in 431 carries.

Simon served as a coaching intern in the Denver Broncos' 1998 training camp. Matt was head coach at the University of North Texas (1994-97), when he was named AFCA Region Coach of the Year in 1994 after the Mean Green won the Southland Conference Championship. The following season (1995), the football program moved up from I-AA to I-A.

He also won the 1994 Southland Conference Coach of the Year, the 1994 Black Coaches Association National Football Coach of the Year and the 1994 AFCA Region 4 Coach of the Year.

Prior to his post at North Texas State, Matt was offensive coordinator at New Mexico, where, in 1993, the Lobos averaged 413 yards and 30.5 points per game. From 1982-91, he was the running backs and kicking coach at the University of Washington. He is a 1997 inductee into the University of Washington Hall of Fame. During his tenure, the Huskies went to nine bowl games and won a national championship in 1991, and he coached six of the top 10 rushers in school history.

James Harris played an important role in the Ravens' Super Bowl Championship last season. Harris, the Ravens' Director of Pro Personnel since 1997, is involved in all aspects of the team's personnel decisions, working closely with Ozzie Newsome on a daily basis. "When the Bears interviewed 'Shack' for their top football position, we held our breath. We want him here," said Art Modell.

The Ravens have had great success acquiring key free agents, including two Pro Bowlers this past offseason. QB Elvis Grbac (Kansas City) played in last year's Pro Bowl and T Leon Searcy (Jacksonville) went to the Pro Bowl after the 1999 season. In 2000, the Ravens signed prominent free agents Shannon Sharpe (Denver, 2000 All-Pro), Robert Bailey (Detroit), Sam Adams (Seattle, 2000 Pro Bowl) and Trent Dilfer (Tampa Bay). During his first two seasons with Baltimore, James brought DE Michael McCrary (1998 and 1999 Pro Bowl), DT Tony Siragusa and CB Rod Woodson (1999 and 2000 Pro Bowl).

Harris spent four years with the New York Jets (1993-96) as the assistant general manager after scouting for six seasons for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1987-92). A former pro quarterback, James played for three NFL teams: Buffalo Bills (1969-71), L.A. Rams (1972-76) and San Diego Chargers (1977-81). He was drafted in the eighth round by the Buffalo Bills (1969) out of Grambling.

During his 12-year career in the NFL as a quarterback, James passed for 8,136 yards and 45 touchdowns. He led the NFL with an 89.8 pass rating in 1976 and was named MVP of the 1975 Pro Bowl, rallying the NFC to a 14-13 victory with two touchdown passes. His best day came against Miami in 1976 with 17 completions in 29 attempts for 436 yards and two touchdowns.

Harris was coached by college football's winningest coach, Grambling's Eddie Robinson. The Tigers won back-to-back SWAC titles in 1967 and 1968. James was named MVP of the 1967 Orange Blossom Classic. He earned a bachelor's degree in education and was subsequently nominated as a distinguished alumnus for his contributions to American society during his NFL career. Harris, a legendary high school athlete in his hometown of Monroe, has been inducted into the SWAC Hall of Fame, the Grambling Athletic Hall of Fame and the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. Nicknamed "Shack," James attended Carroll (Monroe, LA) High School. He and his wife, Vicki, live in Owings Mills, MD.

One of the NFL's top football personnel experts, Phil Savage is in his sixth season as director of college scouting and 11th year with Art Modell's franchise. Phil's promotion from the scouting ranks came with the team's move to Baltimore. Savage manages the team's college scouting department and, with his staff, coordinates the evaluation of hundreds of college prospects across the country.

Last April, Savage and the scouting department, under the direction of Ozzie Newsome, selected TE Todd Heap of Arizona State as the 31st pick in the first round, the first of seven end-of-round picks for the Ravens. DB Gary Baxter (Baylor) was the team's second round (62nd overall) selection, followed by third-round pick C/G Casey Rabach (92nd overall) from Wisconsin. The Ravens then selected LB Edgerton Hartwell (Western Illinois) as their fourth-rounder (126th overall) and RB Chris Barnes (New Mexico St.) as their fifth-rounder (161st overall). LS Joe Maese (New Mexico) and DE Dwayne Missouri (Northwestern) finished out the Ravens' 2001 draft.

Since 1996, the Ravens have drafted Pro Bowlers OT Jonathan Ogden (D1a, 1996), LB Ray Lewis (D1b, 1996), WR/PR Jermaine Lewis (D5, 1996) and LB Peter Boulware (D1, 1997). Other major contributors include LB Jamie Sharper (D2a, 1997), CB Duane Starks (D1, 1998), WR Patrick Johnson (D2, 1998), OT Sammy Williams (D6b, 1998), CB Chris McAlister (D1, 1999), WR Brandon Stokley (D4a, 1999), OL Edwin Mulitalo (D4b, 1999), RB Jamal Lewis (D1a, 2000), WR Travis Taylor (D1b, 2000) and QB Chris Redman (D3, 2000).

In a survey conducted by *The Dallas Morning News* last year, the Ravens' drafts over the 5-year span from 1996-1999 have produced more Pro Bowlers (four) and a higher percentage of starters (38.5%) than any other NFL team. The survey also concluded that the Ravens have the highest percentage of drafted players still on the team at the time (69.2%). The survey included the years 1996-99, the period of time that Phil has served as director of college scouting.

Phil joined Cleveland in '91, after a month-long stint as tight ends/running backs' coach for the San Antonio Riders of the World League (who were coached by former Chargers' head coach Mike Riley). His first three years with the Browns' coaching staff were spent as an assistant to former defensive coordinator Nick Saban (now head coach at LSU). The following year, Phil took on added duties in the personnel area when he began scouting college players, while continuing to break down coaching film and compiling scouting reports on upcoming opponents.

Savage, 36, launched his coaching career at the age of 21, when he served as a graduate assistant at Alabama under Bill Curry (current ESPN analyst) in 1987. From 1988-89, he coached the tight ends, including 12-year Giants' veteran Howard Cross. In 1990, Savage followed Alabama offensive coordinator Homer Smith to UCLA, where he coached tight ends, analyzed opponent game video and helped with administrative duties for the Bruins' offense. Savage worked under then-Bruins' head coach Terry Donahue, current 49ers Director of Player Personnel.

This off-season, Phil teamed with his brother Joe and traveled with three Ravens' coaches and players, and two scouts to Cancun, Mexico for a combined football camp and mission with the Ninos Mexicanos football players. The group worked with both players (ages 7-14) and with coaches. They talked about football fundamentals and ran football exercises and position drills.

Another one of Phil's off-season projects is to hold a football skills camp for high school players in his hometown of Mobile, where Murphy H.S. (his alma mater) is located. Two of Phil's graduates are current NFLers: Steelers (D5, '00) and former Tennessee All-America QB Tee Martin, and Chargers (D4, '00) and former Auburn DL Leonardo Carson.

Savage played football and baseball at the University of the South (Sewanee, TN) and earned a B.A. in English. As a senior, he was selected as the school's Fellowship of Christian Athletes' Male Athlete of the Year. He received a master's in physical education from the University of Alabama. Phil, who is single, resides in Fairhope, AL.

Pat is the Ravens' "capologist" - responsible for the management and strategic planning of the Ravens' salary cap. He works closely with Ozzie Newsome, helping coordinate budgets of the scouting, coaching, equipment, video, training and strength and conditioning departments.

"To use talent evaluation terms, Pat is an 'impact player' in our organization," Ozzie Newsome, the Ravens' Vice President of Personnel, said. "Pat is thorough and sound, plus creative in the structure of contracts. He has a working knowledge of every team's salary cap structure and knows the ins and outs of working with the league office. His management of our cap helped us win the Super Bowl."

Moriarty earned a bachelor's degree in industrial management from Georgia Tech where he was a three-year starter at running back. He later earned his master's degree in business administration from John Carroll University. He worked for Key Bank in Cleveland in the corporate lending division before joining the Browns' front office in 1994.

A Cleveland native, Pat earned all-state honors in both football and track at Benedictine High School. After college, Moriarty had the opportunity to come back to his hometown to play professional football for the Browns. He played running back (scored two touchdowns) and special teams as a rookie free agent in 1979.

Pat, who serves on the advisory board for the National Aquarium (located in Baltimore), and his wife, Lynn, are the parents of three children: Kevin, 13, Laura, 10, and Katherine, 7. The family lives in Hunt Valley.

Earnest oversees the Ravens' player programs and works with the coaching staff on the field. As player programs coordinator, Byner administers continuing education, internship and financial planning

programs for the team. "The Modells are committed to helping players beyond the field, including post-career planning. It's my responsibility to make sure players use these resources to better themselves," Byner said.

Earnest, known for his tough, determined preparation and play, played 14 seasons and finished his stellar career ranked 16th on the league's all-time rushing list with 8,261 yards on 2,095 carries and 56 TDs. He currently is ranked 18th entering 2001. He added 15 career receiving touchdowns and one TD on a recovered fumble for 72 total scores. Byner was originally selected in the 10th round (280th overall) of the 1984 draft by the Cleveland Browns. He recorded 20 career 100-yard games and usually saved his best for big games.

His retirement came on the heels of a diagnosis indicating a high-risk spinal condition. Newsome had been a valuable Plan B acquisition for the Browns prior to the '91 campaign.

Newsome, 40, played with Cleveland for two years prior to his retirement. He totaled 233 tackles for the Browns, leading the defense in '91 with 127 stops. With the Rams, Newsome led the team in tackles each of his last two seasons and three times in his last five years. His 10-year career totals include: 763 tackles (526 solo), four sacks and 62 defended passes. Vince grabbed 17 interceptions in his career, forced seven fumbles and recovered nine. He was originally a fourth-round selection by the Rams in 1983. A former Ed Block Award recipient (1989), Vince started seven of his 10 years in the league and was a Pro Bowl alternate behind Ronnie Lott in 1986. In 1985, he was named the Rams' special teams' player of the year.

Newsome earned honorable mention All-America honors as a senior for the Huskies. He led the secondary with 69 tackles and recorded four interceptions. Vince was president of Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity at Washington and majored in psychology.

Born in Braintree, England, Vince attended Vacaville (CA) H.S., where he lettered in football, basketball and track. He held the nation's second-best time in hurdles (36.3) as a senior and had a personal best time of 48.0 in the quarter mile. assistant at Arizona (1959-66). He later gained experience at Southern Illinois (1967-68), Tulsa (1969), Northwestern (1970-72), Purdue (1973), Miami, FL (1977-79) and Colorado (1979-81).

The N.Y. Giants drafted Marciniak in the seventh-round in 1955, and before his rookie season, traded him to Washington. In 1956, the Redskins traded him to the Toronto Argonauts of the CFL for kicker Sam Baker (who kicked for the Browns in 1960-61). In Toronto, he was moved to the defensive line and named defensive captain. A member of the U.S. Army Reserves, Marciniak was called to active duty (1957) and was a player/coach at Fort Bliss, TX, then returned to the Argonauts to finish his playing career after the '58 season.

Art Perkins is the Ravens' West Area Scout. His experience as a professional football player, coach, and administrator spans more than 30 years. He joined the Ravens' scouting department in 1997. A fourth-round draft choice of the Los Angeles Rams in 1962, Art was named to the NFL's All-Rookie team. Perkins' playing career lasted nine years as a running back for the Los Angeles Rams (1962-64), Winnipeg Blue Bombers (1964-66), and Edmonton Eskimos (1967-70).

Following his playing days, Perkins landed his first coaching job in 1972 as offensive coordinator for the Los Angeles Mustangs. Perkins directed all facets of the Mustangs' offense before joining Compton (Calif.) College, where he spent 24 years. Perkins climbed the ranks at Compton College, starting out as an offensive coach (1974-77) in charge of quarterbacks, wide receivers, and running backs, before being promoted to director of cooperative education. In that position (1977-79), he coordinated a program between upper level management of large American companies and college students to provide the students with practical experience and training that would enhance their employment opportunities after graduation. Beginning in 1979, Perkins served as a physical education professor and head football coach at Compton College. He also held the title of athletic director (1979-89). In addition to his duties as head coach at Compton, Perkins served as a personnel scout for the New York Jets (1994-96), where he worked closely with Ravens' pro personnel director James Harris. In addition to his scouting duties, Art helps evaluate free agent prospects for the pro personnel department during the free agency period.

Perkins received a Master's degree from Pepperdine University and also attended California State University at Dominguez Hills and North Texas State. Art and his wife, Elise, have a 12-year-old son, Jacques, and the family resides in Los Angeles.

RAVENS' NAME ORIGIN



On Friday, March 29, 1996, Baltimore's NFL team became the Ravens.

"In there stepped a stately Raven of the
saintly days of yore;

Not the least obeisance made he; not a
minute stopped or stayed he;

...Quoth the Raven, 'Nevermore.'"

— Edgar Allan Poe, 1845

According to *The Baltimore Sun*, a record-breaking 33,748 callers telephoned their vote in a fan poll. "The name tested very well with the people of Baltimore in all of the studies we conducted and those polls done

before we came here," said Ravens' President David Modell. "The name means something historically to the community."

The raven is a large (22-27 inches long), powerful bird known for its sleek black feathers that look almost purple in certain lighting. It's been described in various encyclopedias as a "strong, soaring flier able to perform acrobatics," and a "bird that is mentioned in myths and legends as magical" and a "soaring bird that can be taught to speak."

The three finalists in *The Sun* poll included the Ravens, Americans and Marauders. The tally was Ravens—22,463; Americans—5,635 and Marauders—5,650. The previous Sundial record of 14,249 calls was set in 1993, over a three-day period, when readers were asked to name a potential expansion NFL team and chose the name Ravens.

Kevin Byrne has been an integral part of the Modell organization for the last 20 years. "Kevin has earned respect around the league and among the reporters who cover the NFL. He has performed a wide variety of duties for us, and his responsibilities go well beyond the regular public relations functions," Modell said. Originally from Cleveland, Byrne currently directs the Ravens' public relations department. Byrne's activities for the franchise through the years have included contract negotiations, directing the team's marketing department and serving on committees to select and interview head coaching candidates.

Byrne coordinated with David Modell to start the team's television productions in Cleveland. The Browns were the first NFL team to produce their own preseason games and weekly TV shows. When they left Cleveland, the team was producing five weekly TV shows, including "Browns' Insider", which was nominated for a local "Emmy" for "best sports programming" three of five years (1990-94). Byrne wrote most of the Browns' television shows over a six-year span. In 1977, his first year in the NFL, Kevin was the PR Director for the St. Louis Cardinals. Two years later, he became the Director of Public Affairs for Trans World Airline (1979-80).

Prior to the NFL, from 1974-77, Byrne was sports information director at his alma mater, Marquette University. He worked with Al McGuire and the Warriors' 1977 NCAA basketball champions. Byrne's first job after graduation was Sports Information Director at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. Byrne earned a degree in journalism from Marquette University (1971), where he was selected to Alpha Sigma Nu, the National Jesuit Honor Society, and was a four-year member of the Warrior wrestling team. Kevin is a graduate of Lakewood (OH) St. Edward High School, where he is a board member and former chairman of the school's Board of Trustees. He received the St. Edward Alumnus of the Year Award last November. Byrne is also on the Board of Goodwill Industries of the Chesapeake, the advisory board for MAC's Miracle Fund and is the Vice Chairman of the Ravens Foundation for Families.

For 10 years (1985-96), he was the chairman of the NFL's Pro Football Writers' Liaison Committee. Byrne has been invited by the NFL office to work 17 Super Bowls and two Pro Bowls. Along with the Ravens' publications director Francine Lubera, Byrne co-wrote "Super Journey: Diary of the Ravens World Championship Season" this offseason.

Kevin and his wife, Sally, have four children: daughter Shannon, 25, a graduate of Kenyon College, and sons Sean, 24, a Boston College graduate, Tim, 22, a senior at the Maryland Institute College of Art, and Conor, 19, a freshman at Boston College.



Head Team Physician

Andrew M. TUCKER, M.D.

Dr. Tucker cares for Ravens players and organization members, from football injuries to general medical problems. He is the director of primary care sports medicine at the University of Maryland and an assistant professor of family medicine at the University of Maryland School of Medicine. Dr. Tucker's practice at the University of Maryland Medical Center and Kernan Hospital focuses on musculoskeletal problems and medical issues in athletes and active patients of all ages. He currently serves on two NFL advisory committees.



Head Team Orthopaedic Surgeon

Leigh Ann CURL, M.D.

Dr. Curl works closely with head athletic trainer Bill Tensendorf in managing the day-to-day orthopaedic care of the Ravens. A board-certified orthopaedic surgeon and fellowship-trained specialist in sports medicine and shoulder surgery, Dr. Curl is the director of sports medicine for the University of Maryland Department of Orthopaedic Surgery. In addition to her role on the Ravens' medical team, she is also the head team physician for all sports at the University of Maryland, College Park. Dr. Curl's practice includes reconstruction of complex knee and shoulder problems as well as joint arthroscopy in the treatment of orthopaedic problems in athletes of all ages and skill levels.

Andrew N. POLLAK, M.D.



In the Community

As important as winning the Super Bowl is for the Baltimore Ravens, community involvement is not far behind. This organization prides itself on having all players, coaches and associates involved in the community. It is an extension of the Modell family philosophy. It does not happen by accident. Members of the organization are asked to get involved, and usually, they say yes. Here are some examples:

Two-time pro bowler DE Michael McCrary's unmatched intensity on the field is equaled in his community efforts off the field. McCrary established Mac's Miracle Fund in April, 2000 with a \$100,000 contribution to Special Olympics of Central Maryland, but Mac did not stop there. His extensive community efforts, focusing primarily on Special Olympics and the Police Athletic League in 2000, earned him the NFL's most distinguished national community honor: The Byron "Whizzer" White Award.



Pro Bowl DT Sam Adams partnered with Junior Achievement to educate and inspire youth to value free enterprise, understand business and economics and be workforce ready. Adams mentored students in their classrooms and at special event activities delivering both the stay in school and realize your potential messages.

When he wasn't stopping some of the NFL's top rushers, Tony Siragusa was busy donating his time and money to the community via The Tony Siragusa Foundation. Over his 11-year career,

Tony has donated over half a million dollars to charity.

Jermaine Lewis is constantly giving back to his hometown community including the funding of two foundations. G Edwin Multalo is a player whose fingerprints can be found all over the youth community.

First-year Ravens' QB Elvis Grbac hopes to make a big contribution to the Ravens' offense this year. Grbac made a big contribution to Villa



Angela/St. Joe's High School, Elvis' alma mater in Cleveland. The \$100,000 donation built an outdoor track and upgraded the school's athletic facilities. Starting this season, Elvis is a spokesperson and helper for Brave Kids, a non-profit organization that serves the needs of children with chronic and life-threatening diseases through an Internet community.



Ravens' head coach Brian Billick encourages his players and coaches to be visible in the community throughout the year, but he is probably one of the most visible members of the organization in the Baltimore area. He spent much of his time this past off-season with Ravens fans at community fundraisers and activities. Coach Billick's schedule was filled with community events, even attending three events one night.

Among his many speaking engagements and charity activities was the Multiple Sclerosis Society annual Dinner of Champions, where coach Billick was named honoree for the evening. He also received the Civic Works Community Service Award at Civic Works' Annual Spring Swing. Coach Billick served as the Preakness Parade Grand Marshall in May, and hosted the 3rd annual Ravens' coaching clinic for Maryland high school coaches the morning of the Preakness. In 2000, coach Billick adopted the Living Classrooms Foundation and has served as both a spokesman and benefactor. He hosted a major fundraiser for

them in June. He introduced the group to his players, and many of them have spent time on their off days working with the students enrolled in its courses.



Art and Pat Modell were honored by a number of local organizations throughout this off-season for their commitment to the community. They served as honorary chairs at the annual Hospice Gala in April and were honored at the Triple Crown Ball in May. Pat Modell also co-chaired the House of Ruth luncheon. The Modell's are on the boards of many local charity organizations and continue their extensive commitment to community involvement (see page 6).



In the summer of 2000, the first annual Ed Block Courage Rally signaled the start of the season, and helped raise money for a cause very close to the Ravens' organization, the St. Vincent's Home for Abused Children (also known as the Baltimore Ravens' Courage House).

One hundred percent of Ravens' players and coaches each year make a financial commitment to the United Way of Central Maryland, and each year help kick off its annual campaign at



the United Way Kickoff Luncheon, held in September. Each player and coach enjoys lunch with Ravens' fans and United Way supporters during the fundraising event.

During the season, players spend many Tuesdays (their only day off) in the community, working with groups they have relationships with, including the Living Classrooms Foundation, the Police Athletic League and St. Vincent's Center.

Shannon Sharpe hosted the Gridiron Halloween party at ESPNZone to benefit Goodwill Industries of the Chesapeake. Sharpe dressed as "Austin Powers" and was joined by many of his teammates in costume to help raise over \$40,000 for Goodwill Industries at the very successful event.

Ravens Foundation for Families



The Baltimore Ravens established the Ravens Foundation for Families (RFF) in their first season in Baltimore. The foundation seeks to help change fundamental ills with which Baltimore and Maryland families must deal in the pursuit of healthy and productive lives for themselves and their community.

The Foundation's programming and funding are intended to make a difference in the quality of life in the state in which we operate. The funding priority of RFF is the physical and mental health of youth and the creation of environments for their positive social development.

The foundation is a separate non-profit entity of the Ravens community outreach. It has set the objective of full participation from players, coaches, their families and Ravens' associates that crosses various social, economic and ethnic strata.

That participation includes, but is not limited to, motivational talks, social education, anti-drug and anti-delinquency programs, football clinics, mentoring and fundraising efforts.

Ask Ravens' LB Cornell Brown if there's a sibling rivalry between he and his brother Ruben of the Bills and a big smile comes to his face. "There's always been a rivalry. We played against each other twice in college and I beat him twice. He got me once in the pros." That was when Ruben played for the University of Pittsburgh and the younger Cornell starred at Virginia Tech.

Ruben, 6-3, 315 lbs., has made the Pro Bowl each of the last five seasons for the Bills. He was a first round pick in 1995. Cornell, the Ravens' sixth-round selection in 1997, has 43 career special teams' tackles in four years.

"We talk about twice a week," said Cornell. "We got our athletic ability from our mom (Oglessa) who was a pretty good basketball player." Ruben, Sr. and Oglessa Brown had two sons and two daughters and live in Lynchburg, VA. Both Ruben and Cornell starred at E.C. Glass High School in Lynchburg. They played together for two seasons in high school, but always played against each other in their younger days and in college.

"I remember as a kid, he was scared of the dark," said Cornell of his older brother. "We shared a room, and I used to try to scare him."

"Seriously, I'm proud of what he's accomplished," said Cornell of Ruben's five trips to Honolulu. "After all, he's my brother."



Giants (11/20)...He earned **NFC Offensive Player of the Month** honors for November after leading Philadelphia to a 4-0 mark while completing 78-of-151 yards for 1,037 yards, five touchdowns and five interceptions while rushing for 163 yards on 29 carries...In the season finale at Dallas (12/18), he passed for 238 yards and two touchdowns and rushed for 50 yards on five carries.

1987: In his first full season as the starting quarterback, Cunningham was named a **Pro Bowl alternate** and **Offensive MVP** by his Philadelphia teammates...Finished third in the NFC in touchdown passes (23) and passing yards (2,786), while throwing 118 consecutive passes without an interception during the Eagles stretch drive in December...Led the Eagles to a come-from-behind win at St. Louis (11/1) to earn **NFC Player of the Week** honors after throwing for three touchdowns, including the game-winning nine-yard toss with 50 seconds remaining...Threw three touchdown passes, including a 40-yarder with 1:06 left vs. Washington (11/8)...Completed 18 of 31 passes for 314 yards, two touchdowns and an interception at New England (11/29), while carrying the ball seven times for 31 yards and a score.



1997: Sharpe started all 16 games and was selected to his sixth straight **Pro Bowl**, named **All-NFL** by the Associated Press for the fourth time in his career (third time as a first-teamer), and also named first-team All-NFL by *The Sporting News*, *USA Today*, *Pro Football Weekly* and *College & Pro Football Newsweekly*...He was also named second-team All-NFL by *Football Digest* and **All-AFC** by *Pro Football Weekly*...Finished second on the team with 72 receptions for 1,107 yards (a career-high 15.4-yard avg.) with three touchdowns, posting the

third 1,000-yard season of his career to tie Todd Christensen for the NFL tight end record...Became Denver's all-time leading tight end in the opener, when

he caught four passes for 41 yards vs. K.C. (8/31)...Surpassed Riley Odoms (396)...Two weeks later vs. St.

receptions for a career-high 180 yards...Caught a game-high eight passes for 137 yards and one touch-down vs. San Diego (11/19)...Sharpe's fourth and final TD of the season came Dec. 3 against Jacksonville, before he took a blow to the face and suffered an orbital fracture to his left eye in the second quarter...He underwent surgery on the eye Dec. 7, forcing him to miss the final three games of the season (against Seattle, 12/10; at Kansas City, 12/17; and at Oakland, 12/24), but he was not placed on the injured reserve list.

1994: Sharpe was selected to his **third straight Pro Bowl** as he posted a career-high 87 receptions for 1,010 yards and four TDs...His 87 catches were the most by any Bronco since 1961 (Lionel Taylor, 100) and the third-most all-time for a Denver player...He ranked fourth in the AFC and eighth in the NFL in receptions...He had six or more catches on eight occasions...Sharpe matched his then-career-high with 10 receptions (95 yards) in Denver's dramatic overtime victory at Kansas City (12/4), and followed that a week later with nine catches for 89 yards at the Raiders (12/11)...He gained 121 yards on six catches at San Diego (10/23), including a 44-yard pass from Elway for his longest reception of the year...After an outstanding opening day (9/4) on which he caught nine passes for 97 yards against San Diego, he was placed on the inactive list for game two at the N.Y. 

TRANSACTIONS: Tony Siragusa signed with the Ravens as an unrestricted free agent on 4/24/97 from the Colts...Originally signed as a rookie free agent by Indianapolis on 4/30/90.

PRO: "Goose" is a mainstay on the Ravens' defense that set the NFL's 16-game record (165 points and 970 rushing yards) and went on to win Super Bowl XXXV...A solid run-stopper, the Ravens have not allowed a 100-yard rusher in the last 33 games (37 including playoffs)...The Ravens' 2000 rush defense led the league by allowing just 60.6 yards per game, a 2.68-yard rushing average and allowed just 59 rushing first downs...In last year's playoff run, "Goose" knocked Oakland QB Rich Gannon out of the AFC Championship game in the second quarter on an incomplete pass...Gannon was replaced by Bobby Hoying, but later returned...The Ravens' defense finished second in the NFL in 1999, including tops in the league in average yards allowed per play (4.1)...Against the run, Baltimore ranked second by allowing just 76.9 yards rushing per game and a 3.1 yard rushing average...The Ravens' defense allowed a 2.68-yard rushing average last season, a 3.6 yard rushing average in both 1997 and '98, and a 3.1-yard avg. in 1999, after permitting 3.78 yards per rush in 1996...A true character, "Goose" enters 2001 with 155 games played including 135 starts...Has 713 career stops (441 solo), 21 QB sacks, nine forced fumbles, nine recoveries and 26 batted passes...Started for five seasons for the Colts at RDT, as Indianapolis made the playoffs in his last two campaigns (1995 and 1996)...In two 1995 postseason games, he recorded 14 tackles, eight solo, three batted passes and a QB pressure...He was inactive for the second of three Colts' playoff games in 1995 (1/7/96) with the flu...Missed six games (weeks 10 through 15 of the '96 season) with a knee injury sustained vs. San Diego (11/3/96)...Last April during mini-camp, Goose arrived at the training facility via helicopter that landed on the Ravens' practice field.

Ravens 16, Steelers 0
(55,049) at Three Rivers Stadium



The Ravens opened the 2000 season with a 16-0 win over the Pittsburgh Steelers in their final appearance at Three Rivers Stadium. Baltimore's defense yielded only 30 rushing yards (including eight yards on nine carries by Jerome Bettis) and 223 total net yards. The Steelers mounted an 88-yard, 16-play drive in the fourth quarter, but the defense stiffened to stop seven consecutive plays from inside the five-yard line (one was a pass interference penalty, giving the Steelers a first-and-goal from the one). The Ravens' defense recorded their second shut out in their last three games (after blanking Cincinnati in game 15 last season). Baltimore's defense has allowed just two touchdowns in its last four games. The Steelers had not been shut out at Three Rivers Stadium since Nov. 12, 1989, when the Bears blanked them, 20-0. That same season, Art Modell's Cleveland Browns shut out Pittsburgh in the opener, 51-0 at Three Rivers Stadium. The Ravens jumped to a 10-0 first-quarter lead on Matt Stover's 23-yard field goal and Qadry Ismail's 53-yard catch and run for a touchdown. It was Ismail's fourth touchdown in Three Rivers in his last two games. Stover connected on a 26-yard field goal in the second quarter as the first half expired, and then capped his three field goal day with a 33-yarder in the third quarter for a 16-0 lead. Stover extended his consecutive field goals made streak to 21. Ismail tied a career high with seven receptions for 102 yards. Combining this game's total with his six catches for 258 yards and three TDs last Dec. 12 at Three Rivers Stadium, Ismail had 360 yards on 13 receptions and four TDs (all over 50 yards) in his last two games against the Steelers. RB Priest Holmes rushed for 119 yards on 27 carries, his seventh career 100-yard game and second consecutive against Pittsburgh. The Ravens are 7-0 when Holmes rushes for 100 yards or more. QB Tony Banks completed 18 of 32 passes for 199 yards with the one TD and no INTs. The Ravens did not turn the ball over. The win was the Ravens' second on opening day, their first since 1996, and their first opening-day win on the road.

Ravens 39, Jaguars 36
(68,843) at PSINet Stadium



The Ravens won a 39-36 thriller over the Jacksonville Jaguars at PSINet Stadium to improve their record to 2-0. QB Tony Banks threw a career-high five touchdown passes, including the game-winning 29-yard touchdown pass to TE Shannon Sharpe with 41 seconds remaining. The Ravens overcame a 17-0 deficit, their largest comeback in franchise history to beat Jacksonville for the first time in nine tries (11 dating back to 1995, when the franchise was in Cleveland). The Jaguars' Jimmy Smith caught an unbelievable 15 Mark Brunell passes for 291 yards and three touchdowns. Smith's reception total tied for the sixth-most in NFL history and his single-game yardage total ranks fifth all-time. Banks' five touchdown passes tied Gary Cuozzo for the most in Baltimore pro football history and was a Ravens' record. The Jaguars jumped to a 17-0 first-quarter lead after Brunell (28 of 50 for 386 yards, three TDs, two INTs) hit Smith on perfect 45 and 43-yard scoring aerials and Mike Hollis kicked a 36-yard field goal. Rookie WR Travis Taylor caught the first of two TD passes on the day, a 14-yarder from Banks, but two more Hollis field goals (45 and 48 yards) gave Jacksonville a 23-7 lead at halftime. "At halftime, I didn't rant and rave," said head coach Brian Billick. "I told them that what they do in the second half - win or lose, it doesn't matter - will define who they are." On the first play of the second half, Banks hit Taylor for a 40-yard gain, and three plays later, the Florida rookie hauled in a 23-yard touchdown pass to make the score 23-15 after a two-point conversion (Banks to Coates). Taylor's two TDs set a rookie single-game receiving mark for the Ravens. Hollis kicked his third field goal to make the score 26-15, but the Ravens responded by marching 76 yards in 10 plays, capped by a five-yard scoring pass to Obafemi Ayanbadejo to make the score 26-22. With just over 10 minutes left in the game, LB Jamie Sharper forced and recovered a Stacey Mack fumble on the Jaguars' 12-yard line. Banks then hit WR Jermaine Lewis (who was receiving an IV for fluid replacement on the sideline the previous series) for a 12-yard score and a 29-26 Baltimore lead. On Jacksonville's ensuing possession, S Kim Herring intercepted a deflected pass that led to Matt Stover's 44-yard field goal and a 32-26 lead. A 48-yard Hollis field goal pulled the Jags within three, 32-29. With 1:55 remaining, Brunell's pass intended for Keenan McCardell popped into the hands of Smith, who broke a Duane Starks tackle and scored to complete a 40-yard play and put the Jaguars ahead, 36-32. With 1:45 left, Banks marched the Ravens 75 yards on seven plays, including 19 and 15-yard completions to WR Billy Davis and a 12-yard hook-up with Ayanbadejo. With 48 seconds left, Banks threw a strike over the middle to Sharpe for the winning touchdown.

The Ravens lost their first game of the season, 19-6, at Pro Player Stadium to the Miami Dolphins. Miami's defense limited the Ravens to just two field goals in four redzone possessions, sacked QB Tony Banks six times and blocked a 30-yard field goal attempt in front of an inspired crowd of 73,464 that witnessed the retirement ceremonies of Dan Marino's number 13. Miami's Lamar Smith scored both of the Dolphins' touchdowns and QB Jay Fiedler was an efficient 11 of 16 for 160 yards, with one TD and one INT. Olindo Mare kicked 42 and 41-yard field goals to give the Dolphins a 6-0 halftime lead. The first half was played in sloppy field conditions due to heavy rains from Hurricane Gordon that prevailed in the pregame and throughout the first half. Matt Stover, kicking in the muddy infield portion of the stadium, had his consecutive field goal streak snapped at 22 when his 30-yard attempt at the end of the first half was blocked. Stover's attempt was set up by a 45-yard Jamal Lewis carry. Lewis finished as the game's leading rusher with 76 yards on nine carries (8.4-yard avg.). The Dolphins opened the second half with a five-play, 61-yard scoring drive and Smith scored on a seven-yard rush to give Miami a 13-0 lead. Stover kicked a 27-yard field goal to put the Ravens on the board, 13-3. Miami sacked QB Tony Banks twice after the Ravens had a first-and-goal at the one, forcing the field goal attempt. Fiedler, who completed his first seven passes of the second half, threw an eight-yard TD pass to Smith for a 19-3 Miami lead early in the fourth quarter (Olinde's PAT in the muddy infield was no good). Stover kicked a 33-yard field goal on the Ravens' next possession to make the score 19-6. The Dolphins stopped a fourth-and-two play at their 13-yard line to seal the win when a Banks pass to Travis Taylor fell incomplete. Banks finished 19 of 31 for 189 yards, with no TDs and an interception.

The Ravens shut out the visiting Cincinnati Bengals, 37-0, to improve to 3-1 on the season. Baltimore's defense set team records by allowing just 94 yards, including four yards rushing and only seven first downs. The Ravens caused four turnovers and made four QB sacks, including a crushing tackle by DE Rob Burnett on Cincinnati QB Akili Smith that forced him to leave the game early in the second quarter. The Bengals crossed midfield only three times in the game. The Ravens jumped to a 10-0 lead in the first quarter behind Matt Stover's 30-yard field goal and an eight-yard TD pass from Tony Banks to rookie WR Travis Taylor. After the touchdown, Tremain Mack fumbled the kickoff after being hit by Anthony Poindexter and the ball was recovered by Baltimore's O.J. Brigance at the Cincinnati 27. Jamal Lewis scored his first career touchdown, an 11-yard run, to put the Ravens ahead, 17-0, early in the second quarter. Lewis finished the game, his second career start, with 116 yards on 25 carries. Ex-Raven QB Scott Mitchell, who entered the game after Smith's concussion, was intercepted by Rod Woodson midway through the second quarter, and the Ravens converted when Banks threw a one-yard TD pass to Shannon Sharpe. It was Sharpe's 46th career TD reception and his second in as many games at PSINet Stadium. The only third-quarter score was a Stover 37-yard field goal for a 27-0 Baltimore lead. FB Obafemi Ayanbadejo scored on a one-yard rush for a 34-0 lead with 6:39 remaining. Stover kicked a 19-yard field goal just after the two-minute warning to complete the scoring. The win was Baltimore's sixth consecutive vs. the AFC Central and their fifth straight victory at home. The 37-0 win was the largest margin of victory in team history. The previous mark was 32 points (a 41-9 win at Cleveland on 11/7/99). The shutout was Baltimore's second of the season and third in the last six games.

The Ravens recorded their second consecutive shutout with a 12-0 win over the Cleveland Browns. The victory followed a 37-0 win over the Cincinnati Bengals and improved Baltimore's record to 4-1 (all four wins coming against AFC Central teams). Matt Stover accounted for all of the scoring, as he kicked four field goals, three in the first half. The last team to record consecutive shutouts were the 1985 Chicago Bears (11/17/85 at Dallas, 44-0 and 11/24/85 vs. Atlanta, 36-0). Baltimore forced four Cleveland turnovers and halted three Cleveland drives that penetrated the redzone, two of them in the fourth quarter. Jermaine Lewis set up the Ravens first score when he returned a first-quarter punt 50 yards to mid-field that resulted in a Stover 45-yard field goal. Early in the second quarter, Stover booted a 30-yard field goal after a Jamal Lewis two-yard TD run was nullified due to a holding penalty. On the Browns' next play from scrimmage, QB Tim Couch was intercepted by Duane Starks on the Browns' 36-yard line. Stover kicked his third field goal, a 44-yarder, three plays later for a 9-0 lead that held until half-time. Just inside the two-minute warning, Browns' FB Marc Edwards fumbled at the four-yard line that was recovered by Rod Woodson in the endzone for a touchback. The Ravens opened the second half with an impressive 19-play, 76-yard drive but had to settle for Stover's fourth field goal (a 22-yarder) for a 12-0 lead. The drive ran 10:04 off the game clock, but the Browns countered with a 12-play, 66-yard drive that was abruptly halted when Couch's pass intended for RB Travis Prentice was intercepted by LB Ray Lewis. The Browns saw the ball only once more, and they drove to the Ravens' six-yard line, but on fourth-and-goal from the six, Prentice was tackled two-yards shy of the goal line, ending yet another Cleveland scoring threat and preserving the shutout. The Ravens rushed for 188 yards and permitted the Browns only 23 yards on the ground. Baltimore controlled time of possession, 36:44 to 23:16, and had 22 first downs vs. Cleveland's 11.

The Ravens completed a two-game season sweep of Jacksonville with a 15-10 win at ALLTEL Stadium. Baltimore's defense set a franchise record with six forced turnovers (three fumbles and three interceptions) and kept the Jaguars out of the endzone until 4:04 remaining in the game. Matt Stover kicked a career-tying high five field goals, the second straight week that he accounted for all of the Ravens' points. Steve Lindsey kicked a 49-yard field goal after Aaron Beasley recovered a Travis Taylor fumble in the first quarter to put the Jags out in front first. Stover countered with a 47-yarder to tie the game at three, and then booted a 25-yarder with 25 seconds left in the second quarter to give Baltimore a 6-3 halftime lead. That score was set up when Robert Bailey recovered a Fred Taylor fumble and returned it 27 yards to Jacksonville's 33. Jaguars QB Mark Brunell fumbled a snap on the Jaguars' first second-half possession and Michael McCrary recovered the ball at Jacksonville's 24, but the Ravens had to settle for a 43-yard Stover field goal to take a 9-3 lead. Brunell, who finished 18 of 28 for 167 yards with two INTs, fumbled three snaps from center and lost one. Early in the fourth quarter, the Ravens once again had to settle for a Stover field goal, this one from 21 yards, after a 16-play, 65-yard drive stalled at the Jacksonville four, to give Baltimore a 12-3 cushion. The Ravens then intercepted Brunell on consecutive possessions, the first by Rod Woodson (which netted no points) and the second by Kim Herring, which resulted in Stover's 24-yarder and a 15-3 lead. Jamie Martin replaced Brunell on the next series and drove the Jaguars 75 yards in 13 plays, capped by Fred Taylor's one-yard TD run. It was the first TD allowed by the Ravens defense in 12 quarters and only the second rushing touchdown allowed in 2001 by Baltimore's defense. After forcing the Ravens to punt, Jacksonville started a potential game-winning drive at their own 12-yard line, but Martin's pass intended for Jimmy Smith was intercepted by Chris McAlister and returned 44 yards to seal Baltimore's third straight win and their first-ever in Jacksonville. LB Ray Lewis had a monster game, recording 13 tackles (12 solo) and recovering a fumble on the Ravens' seven yard line to halt a Jacksonville third-quarter scoring threat. WR Qadry Ismail caught a career-high nine passes for 85 yards. S Rod Woodson recorded his third interception of the season, the 57th of his career, which is tops among all current players and moved him into a tie for ninth place on the NFL's all-time interception list with four players. LB Peter Boulware had his third straight multiple-sack game against the Jaguars. The win improved the Ravens' record to 5-1, including 5-0 in the division, while Jacksonville fell to 2-4 (2-3 in the division).

The Ravens traveled to FedEx Field and lost a defensive struggle, 10-3, to the Redskins in front of 83,252 fans in the "Battle of the Beltway." Redskins RB Stephen Davis bolted 33 yards on a touchdown run early in the fourth quarter for the game's only touchdown, breaking a 3-3 tie. The only Ravens' score came on a Matt Stover 51-yard field goal in the second quarter. The loss was only the second of the season for the Ravens, but was the third straight game that the Ravens' offense failed to score a touchdown. Davis carried the ball 21 times for 91 yards, the highest rushing total by an opposing running back vs. the Ravens since James Allen gained 176 yards for the Bears on 12/20/98. Davis' 33-yard touchdown was the longest touchdown rush vs. the Ravens since Marshall Faulk raced 68 yards for the Indianapolis Colts on 11/29/98. Redskins' K Kris Heppner booted a 37-yard field goal in the second quarter to complete an 11-play, 45-yard drive to give Washington a 3-0 lead. After Stover's 51-yard field goal (his longest since 12/12/93 vs. Houston) in the second quarter, the Ravens could not capitalize on a Washington turnover. Jamie Sharper jarred the ball loose from Davis, and Chris McAlister recovered, giving the Ravens the ball on Washington's 42 with 2:57 remaining in the first half. The Ravens moved to the Redskins' 12 with 15 seconds remaining, and a pass interference gave them a first-and-goal at the one with 10 seconds left. QB Tony Banks threw a pass over the middle intended for TE Shannon Sharpe, but the pass was intercepted in the endzone by LB Kevin Mitchell to squash the Ravens' only serious TD threat of the game. The Davis touchdown run in the fourth quarter gave the Redskins a 10-3 lead. After two Ravens' punts, the Redskins were able to kill the final 5:30 off the clock by converting three crucial third down plays into first downs (one by penalty).

The Ravens dropped a 14-6 decision to the visiting Tennessee Titans to fall to 5-3 on the year, while the Titans moved to 6-1 in the tough AFC Central. Baltimore failed to score a touchdown for the fourth straight game, and increased their streak to 49 consecutive possessions without a touchdown. Ravens' QBs threw four INTs, three by Tony Banks, the fourth by QB Trent Dilfer, tying a team record. The Ravens jumped to a 6-0 lead behind Matt Stover's 21 and 38-yard field goals. Just before the end of the first half, Tennessee PR Derrick Mason's 29-yard punt return set up a Steve McNair nine-yard TD pass to Rodney Thomas for a 7-6 Titans' halftime lead. In the first half, Tennessee had 82 net yards and just three first downs, compared to 182 yards and 13 first downs for the Ravens. On Baltimore's first offensive play in the second half, Banks' pass was intercepted by LB Randall Godfrey, who rambled 25 yards for a TD and a 14-6 lead that held through the game. It was the first of two interceptions on the day for Godfrey. Banks, who completed 17 of 32 passes for 229 yards and three interceptions, was replaced by back-up Trent Dilfer in the fourth quarter. Dilfer finished seven of 13 for 58 yards and an INT. On a fourth-and-goal from the Tennessee 21 with 1:28 left, Dilfer threw a pass into the back of the endzone that was caught by Qadry Ismail, but officials and a subsequent replay review ruled Ismail out of the endzone.

The Ravens lost their third consecutive game, 9-6, to the visiting Pittsburgh Steelers to drop to 5-4 on the season, while Pittsburgh improved to 5-3 with their fifth consecutive victory. The win gave Pittsburgh sole possession of second-place in the AFC Central. A change of quarterbacks by the Ravens did not help the scoring drought, as Baltimore's offense did not score a TD for the fifth consecutive game. QB Trent Dilfer got the starting nod, replacing Tony Banks, and completed 11 of 24 passes for 152 yards, with no TDs and one INT. The Ravens' best chance to score a TD came on their opening drive, but after marching 64 yards in nine plays, Dilfer fumbled the center exchange at the Steelers' nine, and SS Lee Flowers recovered the fumble on the 13-yard line. It was the only time that the Ravens penetrated the Pittsburgh 20. Matt Stover kicked two second-quarter field goals to give the Ravens a 6-0 lead. Stover's three-pointers came from 51 and 49 yards. In the third quarter, Kordell Stewart connected with Hines Ward on a 45-yard TD pass. Kris Brown missed the point after attempt, pushing the ball wide right. On the ensuing kickoff, Ravens' KOR Corey Harris fumbled the ball and Pittsburgh recovered at the Ravens' 27. Six plays later, Brown atoned for his missed PAT by kicking a 24-yard field goal, giving the Steelers a 9-6 lead. The fourth quarter was scoreless, as Dilfer's last four passes fell incomplete, including a fourth-and-10 pass for Qadry Ismail with 1:59 remaining in the game. It was the first time in five games this season that Baltimore held a halftime lead and failed to win.

QB Trent Dilfer threw three touchdown passes in a 12-minute span in the second quarter to end Baltimore's touchdown-less streak, and the Ravens' defense held Cincinnati to only one TD in a 27-7 victory at Paul Brown Stadium. The win snapped a three-game losing streak and ended a 21-quarter touchdown drought, tied for second longest in the NFL since 1970. Dilfer, making his second start for the Ravens, broke the ice with a 14-yard pass to WR Brandon Stokley early in the second quarter for a 10-0 lead. He then directed two scoring drives and capped both by completing 18 and 19-yard scoring strikes to TE Shannon Sharpe for a 24-0 halftime lead. The 24 first-half points tied a Ravens record for most points scored in the first two periods, and the 21 second-quarter points set a franchise record. A 27-yard punt return by Craig Yeast in the third quarter set up a six-play, 15-yard TD drive that was completed with a four-yard rush by Peter Warrick, who had lined up under center on a third-and-goal from the four. Matt Stover kicked a 32-yard field goal midway through the fourth quarter, his second three-pointer of the game, to complete the scoring. Cincinnati's touchdown in the third quarter was their first in 10 quarters against the Ravens' number one ranked defense. Baltimore has outscored Cincinnati 86-7 in the last three games. Ravens' rookie RB Jamal Lewis gained 109 yards on 22 carries, plus had 70 yards on three receptions. His 179 yards from scrimmage topped the previous week's effort when he totaled 146 yards rushing and receiving. Dilfer enjoyed his seventh-career three-touchdown game, while Sharpe recorded his seventh multiple TD game and surpassed Ozzie Newsome and tied Raymond Chester for fifth place on the all-time tight ends' TD list with 48. Defensively, the Ravens held the Bengals' top-ranked rushing attack (entering the game) to 44 yards on 27 carries (1.6-yard avg.), including 23 yards on 16 carries by Corey Dillon. The Bengals gained only 174 total yards and 11 first downs. Other than Yeast's punt return to the 15-yard line in the third quarter, the Bengals never penetrated the Ravens' 40-yard line in 11 possessions. The win moved the 6-4 Ravens into second place in the AFC Central, 2-1/2 games behind the 8-1 Tennessee Titans.

The Ravens did what no other NFL team had done before – beat the Tennessee Titans in highly-charged Adelphia Coliseum. Baltimore won the emotional, see-saw contest, 24-23, as QB Trent Dilfer engineered a nine-play 70-yard game-winning drive, capped by a two-yard scoring pass to WR Patrick Johnson to give the Ravens a one-point lead with 25 seconds remaining. The Titans returned the ensuing "squib" kickoff 27 yards to the Tennessee 44. Steve McNair then scrambled 20 yards down to the Ravens' 25 with four seconds left. Al Del Greco, who had missed an extra point minutes earlier, pushed the 43-yard field goal attempt wide right to end the game. The Titans entered the game with a perfect 12-0 record in their new stadium and an eight-game winning streak this season since dropping their opener against Buffalo. Their propensity for comeback wins and opportunistic play continued when S Perry Phenix intercepted Dilfer's pass intended for Johnson at the 13 late in the game. Phenix raced 87 yards for a touchdown. Del Greco's extra point attempt hit the left upright, but the Titans had a 23-17 lead with 2:30 left in the game. The interception thwarted a perfect Ravens scoring opportunity after LB Peter Boulware forced a McNair fumble that was recovered by DE Rob Burnett at Tennessee's 22 with the game tied at 17. Dilfer, who finished the game 23 of 36 for 281 yards, two TDs and the long interception, opened the scoring with a 46-yard pass to Qadry Ismail midway through the first quarter. The Ravens then took a 14-0 lead when RB Jamal Lewis (who gained 99 yards on 23 carries) capped the longest drive of the season, a 96-yard, 17-play masterpiece, with a two-yard run with 12:56 left in the first half. Derrick Mason caught a 10-yard scoring pass from McNair for Tennessee's first TD. A Matt Stover 45-yard field goal put the Ravens up by 10, 17-7, but the Titans countered with a Lorenzo Neal four-yard TD reception with three seconds left in the first half to make the score 17-14 at intermission. Del Greco kicked a 23-yard field goal to tie the game midway through the fourth quarter, setting up the dramatic ending. The Ravens win was their seventh straight on the road over an AFC Central opponent.

The Ravens blanked the visiting Dallas Cowboys, 27-0, to improve to 8-4 on the year. RB Jamal Lewis rushed for a career-high 187 yards on 28 carries, the second-best rushing total in team history, and the Ravens piled up a team-record 250 yards rushing. QB Trent Dilfer threw long TDs of 40 yards to Qadry Ismail and 59 yards to Shannon Sharpe to extend his overall November winning streak to eight straight games. Baltimore's defense recorded its fourth shutout of the season, the most in the NFL since the 1976 Pittsburgh Steelers recorded five. The defense limited Troy Aikman, Emmitt Smith and Co. to 192 yards of offense, 55 yards rushing, and intercepted Aikman three times. Dallas managed just nine first downs and was 1-10 on third-down conversions. The Cowboys' deepest penetration came in the third quarter when they stalled at the Ravens' 28, and Tim Seder missed a 46-yard field goal attempt. The Ravens won the coin flip and drove 81 yards in seven plays as Dilfer found Ismail on a 40-yard TD pass that went through the hands of CB Phillip Sparks. It was Ismail's third touchdown reception of 40 yards or longer this season. After forcing a three-and-out, Dilfer led the offense 50 yards in nine plays, and Matt Stover kicked a 25-yard field goal for a 10-0 Baltimore lead. Midway through the second quarter, S Rod Woodson intercepted a Troy Aikman pass, the 58th interception of his career, tying him with Emmitt Thomas for eighth place on the NFL's all-time interception list. Four plays later, Dilfer found a wide-open Sharpe for a 59-yard touchdown strike and a 17-0 Baltimore lead. The touchdown was Sharpe's 49th, tying him with Keith Jackson for fourth-place on the all-time touchdown list among tight ends in NFL history. Sharpe ended up with five catches for 101 yards, his 17th career 100-yard game and second of the season. Stover kicked a 19-yard field goal in the fourth quarter to extend the lead to 20-0, then Priest Holmes rushed for a five-yard touchdown to complete the scoring. Holmes added 64 yards rushing on 13 carries.

The Ravens scored their most convincing win in team history, a 44-7 victory over the visiting Cleveland Browns. The victory propelled the Ravens to 9-4 on the season and gave them an 8-2 AFC Central record. RB Jamal Lewis rushed for 170 yards on 30 carries and two TDs. Baltimore rushed for 247 yards overall and tied a team record with three rushing touchdowns (two by Lewis, one by Priest Holmes). QB Trent Dilfer threw two TD passes, two yards to Sam Gash 46 yards to Patrick Johnson. K Matt Stover kicked three field goals to set a single-season field goal record (31) and reach the 1,000 point milestone. Baltimore's defense limited the Browns to one TD on the game's opening drive (86 yards), then shut-down the Cleveland offense for the rest of the game. The Browns managed just 112 yards and five first downs. The Ravens recorded a season-high six QB sacks (two by LB Ray Lewis). The win was Baltimore's fourth straight and gave them a 4-0 record in November. The nine victories also set a Ravens' franchise high.

The Ravens clinched their first-ever playoff berth with a 24-3 drubbing of the visiting San Diego Chargers. Baltimore's defense continued its dominating style of play, as it did not permit a touchdown for the fifth game this season and continued its pace toward setting the NFL record for fewest points allowed in a 16-game season. The Ravens not only held San Diego out of the endzone, but they set another team record by allowing only 64 net yards passing. The Ravens forced four fumbles and intercepted QB Ryan Leaf once. Baltimore capitalized on the five Chargers' turnovers by scoring three touchdowns off the miscues. Leaf completed just nine of 23 passes for 78 yards and was sacked twice for 14 yards lost. The Ravens' offense was an efficient 11 for 16 on third down and managed 276 yards against the Chargers' tough defense. RB Jamal Lewis rushed for 91 yards on 29 carries and a TD and added 39 yards on three receptions. It was Jamal's fifth-straight 90+ yard rushing game. QB Trent Dilfer was a workman like 16 for 24 for 187 yards, with two TDs and two INTs. Baltimore controlled time of possession, 37:36 to 22:24. The Ravens opened the scoring on their first possession by marching 60 yards in 17 plays, as Matt Stover kicked a 32-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead. In the second quarter, LB Cornell Brown stripped Leaf on an eight-yard sack and Larry Webster recovered, setting up a Trent Dilfer to Qadry Ismail 28-yard TD pass that was originally ruled incomplete but reversed by instant replay for a 10-0 lead. San Diego's John Carney kicked a 47-yard field goal with 54 seconds left in the first half for San Diego's only points of the game. DE Rob Burnett recovered a Terrell Fletcher fumble on San Diego's three-yard line early in the third quarter, and then Jamal Lewis scored on a one-yard TD run to give the Ravens a 17-3 lead with just over 10 minutes left in the third quarter. Dilfer threw a 22-yard scoring strike midway through the third quarter to WR Brandon Stokley after a muffed San Diego punt return for a 24-3 lead that held for the rest of the game. Prior to the game, Ravens' owner Art Modell was introduced to a standing ovation in celebration of his 40th NFL season. Three hours later, the Ravens' were 10-4 and playoff-bound, one game behind the 11-3 Tennessee Titans in the AFC Central.

The Ravens overcame a rocky offensive showing but forced four Arizona turnovers, two inside their own 15-yard line, to hold off the Cardinals, 13-7, at sunny Sun Devil Stadium. The victory was Baltimore's sixth in a row and improved its record to 11-4, tied with Oakland for the second-best mark in the AFC and one game behind 12-3 Tennessee in the AFC Central. The win was the sixth of the season on the road for Baltimore (against two losses). Rookie RB Jamal Lewis rushed for 126 yards on 29 carries and scored the Ravens' only touchdown. It was his fifth 100-yard game of the season, a new Ravens' single-season record. The Ravens have won their last 11 games when they have had a 100-yard rusher. The Ravens enjoyed their most productive drive on their first possession of the game, as they marched 68 yards in 13 plays to set up a Matt Stover 42-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead. On Arizona's next possession, the Cardinals drove to the Ravens' eight-yard line, but RB Michael Pittman fumbled after being hit by S Rod Woodson and others on the seven-yard line and the ball was recovered by Ray Lewis. Pittman suffered a concussion on the play and did not return. After a scoreless second quarter, Arizona's Jake Plummer (23 of 43 for 266 yards, one TD, two INTs) marched the Cardinals 60 yards, capped by a 27-yard touchdown pass to WR Frank Sanders to give Arizona a 7-3 lead. It was the first time a team had scored a point against the Ravens in the second half in four games. On Arizona's next possession, LB Jamie Sharper intercepted a Plummer pass intended for TE Chris Gedney and rambled 45 yards to the Arizona six. Three plays later, Lewis scored on a one-yard plunge to put the Ravens ahead, 10-7. Stover kicked his second field goal, a 42-yarder, to give the Ravens a 13-7 cushion late in the third quarter. After exchanging turnovers early in the fourth quarter, an apparent sack and forced fumble by LB Peter Boulware was reversed and ruled an incomplete shovel pass with just over two minutes left in the game, giving Arizona a second chance for a potential game-winning touchdown. But on fourth-and-five from the Ravens' 12-yard line, Plummer's pass intended for RB Thomas Jones was batted down by Ray Lewis, preserving the close 13-7 win. Lewis finished with a game-high 13 tackles, a fumble recovery and the batted pass.

The Ravens concluded the regular season with a wild 34-20 win over the New York Jets on Christmas Eve. The win was their seventh in a row and improved their mark to a franchise-record 12-4. The defense set the NFL 16-game single-season scoring record by allowing just 165 points (and 13 of those points came off interception returns by Tennessee). The 1986 Chicago Bears held the old mark of 187 points allowed. Baltimore also set the NFL's 16-game rushing yards allowed mark with just 970 yards allowed on the ground. The victory over New York was punctuated by long returns for touchdowns, as Jermaine Lewis tied his own NFL record with two punt returns for scores (54 and 89 yards), plus a team-record 98-yard interception for a touchdown by CB Chris McAlister. Baltimore's defense tied a team record by forcing six turnovers. Jets' QB Vinny Testaverde was one pass shy of an NFL record by throwing the ball 69 times and completing 36 passes for 481 yards. The ex-Raven threw two first-quarter touchdown passes to stake the Jets to a 14-0 lead and three second-quarter interceptions (a fourth interception by Kim Herring in the fourth quarter was reversed by instant replay). The Ravens scored 20 unanswered second-quarter points by capitalizing on four New York turnovers. After Keith Washington recovered a fumbled exchange from center on the first play of the second quarter, QB Trent Dilfer hit WR Qadry Ismail for a seven-yard TD in the back of the endzone. Duane Starks intercepted Testaverde on the next possession to set up a Matt Stover 42-yard field goal, cutting the Jets' lead to 14-10. After the Jets intercepted Dilfer on the Jets' one, DE Michael McCrary tackled Curtis Martin in the endzone for a safety, then McAlister raced 98 yards for a score on the last play of the first half, and Jamal Lewis plowed in for a two-point conversion and a 20-14 halftime lead. New York's Brett Conway kicked a 40-yard field goal in the third quarter, then Jermaine Lewis exploded for a 54-yard punt return for a TD to give the Ravens a 27-17 lead. A second Conway field goal cut the lead to 27-20 early in the fourth quarter, but Lewis broke loose for an 89-yard score after fielding a Tom Tupa punt with 5:02 left in the game to complete the scoring.

The Ravens advanced to the AFC Divisional Playoffs with a dominating 21-3 win over the visiting Denver Broncos. Denver entered the game with the NFL's second-ranked offense and a seven-game postseason winning streak, but the Ravens' defense permitted just one field goal, 177 total net yards and nine first downs. The Broncos' three points scored were the fewest they had scored since 1992. The Baltimore defense recorded five QB sacks, four on Broncos' starting QB Gus Frerotte. The Broncos' deepest second-half penetration was their own 41-yard line, and they crossed midfield just once during the game (resulting in a second-quarter field goal). Ravens' RB Jamal Lewis gained 110 yards rushing on 30 carries and scored two TDs. His first touchdown came on a one-yard dive to complete a 10-play, 75-yard drive that featured a 20-yard Lewis run one play earlier. His second touchdown came in the third quarter on a 27-yard burst when he broke three tackles. That score was set up by a Jermaine Lewis 17-yard punt return. QB Trent Dilfer completed nine of 14 passes for 130 yards, with one TD and no INTs. After a Jason Elam 31-yard field goal made the score 7-3 with 4:31 left in the second quarter, Trent Dilfer flipped a swing pass to RB Jamal Lewis, but the ball glanced off him and into the hands of former Bronco TE Shannon Sharpe. Sharpe raced 58 yards down the sideline to give Baltimore a 14-3 halftime lead. Baltimore's record improved to 13-4 on the season and 12-1 when leading at halftime (12-0 when leading after three quarters).

The Ravens advanced to the AFC Championship Game with a gutsy 24-10 win over the defending AFC Champion Tennessee Titans in Adelphia Coliseum. The Titans only two losses in two years on their home turf were both to the Ravens in 2000. The opportunistic Ravens scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns on returns to break a 10-10 tie. Anthony Mitchell raced 90-yards for a score after Keith Washington blocked an Al Del Greco 37-yard field goal attempt. Ray Lewis then intercepted a Steve McNair pass intended for Eddie George and raced 50-yards for a touchdown to seal the 24-10 win. The Titans opened the game with an impressive 11-play, 68-yard drive that featured six Eddie George runs, including a two-yard TD. The Ravens tied the game, 7-7, when Jamal Lewis scored on a one-yard TD that was set up by Shannon Sharpe's 56-yard reception from QB Trent Dilfer. On the Titans' ensuing possession, Del Greco's 45-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Keith Washington – the first of two blocks by Washington. Inside the two-minute warning, Tennessee's WR Chris Coleman blocked a Kyle Richardson punt, giving the Titans the ball on the Ravens' 25 with 1:44 left in the half. But Del Greco's 31-yard attempt hit the left upright leaving the score deadlocked at 7-7 at halftime. Del Greco atoned for the miss with a 21-yard field goal in the third quarter to put the Titans ahead, 10-7, but Matt Stover booted a 38-yarder to tie the score, 10-10. After Mitchell's 90-yard return of the blocked field goal in the fourth quarter, Ray Lewis raced 50 yards for a score on the interception to seal the win. The victory was Baltimore's ninth in a row and second straight in Adelphia Coliseum.

The Ravens captured the AFC Championship with a stifling 16-3 win over the Oakland Raiders in rowdy Network Associates Coliseum. TE Shannon Sharpe broke open a scoreless game with an NFL postseason record 96-yard catch and run on a third down and 18 from Baltimore's four with 11:08 left in the second quarter. On Oakland's next two plays from scrimmage, DT Tony Siragusa knocked QB Rich Gannon out of the game with a sore shoulder, then CB Duane Starks intercepted backup Bobby Hoying's pass intended for James Jett to set up a Matt Stover 31-yard field goal and a 10-0 Baltimore lead. It was the first of two interceptions by Starks on the day. In the third quarter, a Trent Dilfer interception led to a Sebastian Janikowski 24-yard field goal to cut the Ravens' lead to 10-3. A Stover 28-yard field goal gave the Ravens a 13-3 lead, and then a Jamal Lewis fumble gave Oakland the ball at the Ravens' 43 near the end of the third quarter, but Starks intercepted Gannon, who had returned to action in the second half. Stover kicked a 21-yarder in the fourth quarter to give the Ravens a 16-3 lead. Jamie Sharper intercepted Hoying at the two-yard line with 3:41 left in the game to seal the win. The Ravens' aggressive defense forced five Oakland turnovers, limited the Raiders to 191 yards, including just 24 yards rushing, and sacked the two Raiders' quarterbacks four times. Oakland entered the game with the NFL's leading rushing attack, but Baltimore controlled time of possession, 34:38 to 25:22. The victory celebration after the game was the Ravens' 10th straight and propelled them into a Super Bowl XXXV matchup against the New York Giants in Tampa.

Super Bowl XXXV

Ravens 34, Giants 7



(71,921) at Raymond James Stadium

The Ravens completed their ascent to the top of the NFL with a 34-7 win over the NFC Champion New York Giants in Super Bowl XXXV at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa. Baltimore became only the fifth team in NFL history to not allow an offensive touchdown in the Super Bowl (joining the 1971 Cowboys, 1972 Dolphins, 1974 Steelers and 1988 49ers; three of those four teams repeated the next season). The Ravens allowed the Giants just 152 total net yards (third-fewest in Super Bowl history) and the New Yorkers crossed midfield just twice. Baltimore's defense tied a Super Bowl record with four interceptions off Giants' QB Kerry Collins. The Ravens became just the third team in NFL history to not commit a turnover in a Super Bowl. The Ravens opened the scoring with a Trent Dilfer to Brandon Stokley 38-yard TD pass over CB Jason Sehorn. In the second quarter, LB Jamie Sharper intercepted a Collins pass intended for Amani Toomer. On the next play, Dilfer's pass was intercepted by LB Jessie Armstead, who raced untouched to the endzone, but the play was nullified due to a New York holding penalty. Matt Stover kicked a 47-yard field goal with 1:48 left in the second quarter, then a Collins' pass intended for TE Peter Mitchell at the end of the first half was intercepted by CB Chris McAlister, preserving the 10-0 halftime lead. CB Duane Starks put Baltimore ahead 17-0 in the third quarter when he raced 49 yards after intercepting a Collins pass intended for Toomer. On the kickoff, Giants' return specialist Ronnie Dixon raced 97 yards to put the Giants on the board, 17-7. Not to be outdone, Baltimore's Jermaine Lewis took the Giants ensuing kickoff and tight-roped down the Ravens' sideline for an 84-yard TD to increase the Ravens' lead to 24-7. The three scores in three successive plays set a Super Bowl record, and the back-to-back KOR-TD was also a new record. Rookie RB Jamal Lewis (27 carries for 102 yards) scored from three yards out on a play that was reviewed and upheld by instant replay to give the Ravens a 31-7 lead with 8:45 remaining. Stover kicked his second field goal with 5:27 left, a 34-yarder, to complete the scoring. Ravens' QB Trent Dilfer was an efficient 12 of 25 for 153 yards, with one TD and no interceptions and completed passes to eight different receivers. The Ravens limited the Giants to 66 yards rushing on 16 carries. LB Ray Lewis, who led all players with four passes defended and recorded five tackles, was named Super Bowl MVP. After the win, Ravens' Owner Art Modell hoisted his first Super Bowl Trophy after 40 years of ownership and said, "To the people of Baltimore City, Baltimore County and the State of Maryland, this belongs to you. From the bottom of my heart, thank you."



HISTORY OF PRO FOOTBALL IN BALTIMORE

Note: The following chronology outlines historical highlights of the AAFC and NFL teams based in Baltimore and reflects history while those teams were in Baltimore only.

December 28, 1946 Baltimore was awarded the bankrupt Miami Seahawks franchise of the All-America Football Conference. The team was renamed Colts via a fan contest. Bob Rodenberg heads the purchasing group.

September 7, 1947 The Colts won their first-ever AAFC game over the Brooklyn Dodgers, 16-7, in front of 27,418 fans at Baltimore Stadium with Cecil Isbell as head coach. The Colts finished 2-11-1, drawing just under 200,000 fans.

April 28, 1948 The Colts reorganized, with over 200 stockholders. Jake Embry was named president and Walt Driskill was named general manager.

December 12, 1948 The Colts lose their first-ever playoff game, 28-17, against visiting Buffalo in a game marked by near riots after both teams finished tied for the Eastern Division title with 7-7 marks. Attendance totaled 244,502.

February 24, 1949 Walt Driskill was named president and general manager, with Robert C. Embry becoming vice-chairman of the board.

Fall, 1949 Isbell fired after four games and Driskill was named head coach. Colts finished 1-11.

December 8, 1949 AAFC and NFL reached merger agreement. The Colts entered the NFL for 1950 season.

December 18, 1949 Abraham Watner was named Colts' president.

December 19, 1950 Under head coach Clem Crowe, the Colts finished 1-11 in their first NFL season with a 15-14 loss to the New York Yanks at Yankee Stadium. The Yanks will later become the Baltimore Colts.

January 18, 1951 Watner withdrew the franchise due to financial distress and received \$50,000 for his players by the NFL.

1951 and 1952 No Colts team existed.

December 3, 1952 Commissioner Bert Bell challenged Baltimore to sell 15,000 tickets in six weeks to re-enter NFL. The ticket drive reached its quota in four weeks, three days.

January, 1953 Carroll Rosenbloom headed an ownership group and Baltimore was awarded the Dallas Texan franchise. Don Kellett was named president and Keith Molesworth head coach.

March 25, 1953 Baltimore and Cleveland put together one of the largest trades in sports' history, with the Browns trading 10 players to the Colts for five players.

September 27, 1953 The Colts upset the Chicago Bears, 13-9, in the NFL opener at Memorial Stadium.

Spring, 1954 Weeb Ewbank was named head coach.

December 28, 1958 The Colts defeated the New York Giants, 23-17, in Yankee Stadium in "sudden death" for the World Championship. This game sparked the emergence of the NFL as a televised sports giant.

December 27, 1959 The Colts won their second straight World Championship, again over the Giants, in Baltimore, 31-16.

December 11, 1960 The Rams snapped an NFL-record 47-game consecutive TD pass streak by Johnny Unitas.

January 8, 1963 Don Shula replaced Weeb Ewbank as head coach. Gino Marchetti and Bill Pellington were named player-coaches.

January 20, 1964 Carroll Rosenbloom purchased the remaining shares of the club to gain 100% ownership.

December 13, 1964 Raymond Berry caught his 506th career pass and Lenny Moore scored his 20th touchdown of the season against Washington, both NFL records at the time.

December 27, 1964 The Browns defeated the Colts, 27-0, in Cleveland for the NFL title. Art Modell wins his first NFL title, with Blanton Collier as head coach.

December 26, 1965 The Packers beat the Colts, 13-10, in "sudden death" playoff for the Western Conference title. Tom Matte quarterbacked the club with plays written on his wristband, subbing for injured QBs Johnny Unitas and Gary Cuozzo.

June 8, 1966 The National Football League and the American Football League announced plans to merge in 1970. The Colts, Browns and Steelers would later join the AFC in the NFL's realignment.

March 17, 1967 Harry Hulmes, Colts' publicity director, was named general manager, succeeding Joe Campanella, who passed away on February 15 after 23 days in the GM capacity.

November 5, 1967 The Colts defeated the World Champion Packers, 13-10, snapping a five-game losing streak to Green Bay.

August 3, 1968 Art Donovan became the first Colt inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

December 29, 1968 The Colts shut out the Browns, 34-0, for the NFL Championship. Earlier, the Colts had defeated Green Bay, 16-3, and Minnesota, 24-14, for the Western Conference crown.

January 12, 1969 The Jets defeated the Colts, 16-7, in Super Bowl III at the Orange Bowl after Joe Namath "guarantees" a New York victory.

April 3, 1970 Don Shula resigned to become head coach of the Miami Dolphins and was succeeded by Don McCafferty. In January, Don Klosterman was named general manager.

September 20, 1970 The Colts beat San Diego, 16-14, to win their first AFC game in the newly realigned NFL.

December 13, 1970 The Colts clinched their first AFC Eastern Division title with a 20-14 win at Buffalo.

December 26, 1970 The Colts beat Cincinnati, 17-0, in divisional playoff game.

January 3, 1971 The Colts beat the Oakland Raiders, 27-17, to win the AFC championship.

January 17, 1971 Jim O'Brien kicked a 32-yard field goal with five seconds to play as the Colts won Super Bowl V over Dallas, 16-13, in the first-ever AFC-NFC Super Bowl.

January 2, 1972 Miami beat Baltimore, 21-0 in the AFC title game. The Colts had defeated Cleveland, 20-3, in the AFC playoffs to advance to the conference championship.

July 26, 1972 Robert Irsay acquired the Colts from Carroll Rosenbloom in exchange for the Los Angeles Rams. Joe Thomas was named general manager.

July 29, 1972 Gino Marchetti was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

October 16, 1972 John Sandusky replaced Don McCafferty as head coach after the fifth game of the season.

February 14, 1973 Howard Schnellenberger was named head coach.

July 28, 1973 Raymond Berry and Jim Parker were inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

September 29, 1974 Joe Thomas replaced Howard Schnellenberger as head coach.

January 15, 1975 Ted Marchibroda was named head coach.

August 2, 1975 Lenny Moore was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

December 21, 1975 Colts won the first of three straight AFC East Division crowns by defeating New England, 34-21, at Memorial Stadium. The season capped the greatest turnaround in NFL history (at that time), as Marchibroda led the Colts to a 10-4 mark after the team was 2-12 in 1974.

December 12, 1976 The Colts won their second straight AFC East crown by defeating Buffalo, 58-20, in last home game of regular season.

January 25, 1977 Dick Szymanski was named general manager and Ernie Accorsi assistant general manager.

December 18, 1977 The Colts won their third straight AFC East title with a 30-24 win over New England that featured a 99-yard game-winning TD drive, longest in team history.

July 28, 1979 Johnny Unitas was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, a year after Weeb Ewbank.

January 16, 1980 Mike McCormack was named head coach, replacing Ted Marchibroda.

December 21, 1981 Frank Kush was named head coach.

May 16, 1982 Ernie Accorsi was named general manager.

April 26, 1983 The Colts selected John Elway with the first pick in the NFL draft, but traded him on May 2 to Denver for OT Chris Hinton, QB Mark Herrmann and Denver's top pick in 1984.

December 18, 1983 In the last NFL regular season game in Memorial Stadium - until 1996 - the Colts beat the Houston Oilers, 20-10. TE Pat Beach scored the last TD of the game on a 12-yard pass from Mike Pagel.

March 28, 1984 The Colts' franchise relocated to Indianapolis.

RAVENS' HISTORY

November 6, 1995 The Cleveland Browns announced their intention to move to Baltimore for the 1996 season.

February 9, 1996 NFL approved franchise move.

February 15, 1996 Ted Marchibroda was named Baltimore's head coach exactly 21 years and one month to the date he was hired by the then-Baltimore Colts.

March 29, 1996 Baltimore's NFL franchise was officially named the Ravens after a *Baltimore Sun* telephone poll received a record number of calls supporting the name Ravens.

April 1, 1996 The Ravens opened operations at the Owings Mills training facility with the start of the offseason program.

April 20, 1996 The Ravens selected UCLA offensive lineman Jonathan Ogden with their first-ever draft choice (fourth overall). University of Miami linebacker Ray Lewis was selected with the second pick in the first round (26th overall).

May 16, 1996 Ravens announced season ticket and personal seat license policies in a press conference at Memorial Stadium.

June 5, 1996 Ravens unveiled their new logo, colors and uniforms in a fashion show at Harborplace.

June 14, 1996 The Ravens sold over 50,000 season tickets in 14 days.

September 1, 1996 The Ravens first-ever regular season game is played before 64,124 fans at Memorial Stadium, the largest crowd in Baltimore's professional sports history. QB Vinny Testaverde scores the first touchdown on a nine-yard run to propel the Ravens to a 19-14 win over the Oakland Raiders.

December 22, 1996 The Ravens concluded their inaugural season with a 4-12 record following a 24-21 loss to the Houston Oilers. The Ravens were 4-4 at home, but 0-8 on the road. The team sold out all 10 home games, including the two preseason games. Baltimore held a second-half lead in 10 of its 11 final games, but won only two. QB Vinny Testaverde was voted to the Pro Bowl after throwing for 4,177 yards and 33 touchdowns. WRs Michael Jackson and Derrick Alexander both eclipsed the 1,000-yard receiving mark and combined for 23 TD receptions.

March 18, 1997 The Ravens and Western Maryland College entered into a five-year agreement to hold training camp at the Westminster, MD campus.

April 19, 1997 The Ravens selected LB Peter Boulware with their first pick in the 1997 draft (fourth overall). Boulware went on to win NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and finished with 11.5 QB sacks, the fourth-best sack total by a rookie in NFL history.

September 21, 1997 The Ravens defeated the Tennessee Oilers, 36-10, to start the season 3-1.

December 14, 1997 Baltimore defeats Tennessee, 21-19, in the final game at Memorial Stadium. Ceremonies included a salute to former Colts, generations of season ticket holders and the Armed Forces. Of the 16 regular season games played by the Ravens at Memorial Stadium, 13 were sold out.

December 21, 1997 Baltimore drops a 16-14 game at Cincinnati to finish the season 6-9-1. OT Jonathan Ogden is named consensus All-Pro and is voted as a starter to the Pro Bowl. LB Ray Lewis led the NFL in tackles with 210, and was voted first alternate to the Pro Bowl, and then was selected to play in the game by coach Bill Cowher.

September 5, 1998 The new NFL Stadium at Camden Yards (later to be named PSINet Stadium) was the backdrop for an opening gala that included fireworks, a Stevie Wonder/Baltimore Symphony Orchestra concert and a spectacular laser show.

September 6, 1998 The Ravens opened their new NFL Stadium in downtown Baltimore (later to be named PSINet Stadium) before a host of dignitaries, a packed house and the Pittsburgh Steelers. The Ravens lost, 20-13.

November 29, 1998 The Colts returned to Baltimore for the first time since 1983. The Ravens overcame two 14-point deficits and scored 25 second-half points to win a 38-31 thriller.

December 13, 1998 The Ravens and Minnesota Vikings set an NFL record with three kickoff returns for touchdowns, all in the first quarter. Ravens' Corey Harris and Patrick Johnson and Minnesota's David Palmer all scored TDs on returns in the Vikings' 38-28 win. Gary Anderson set an NFL record when he kicked his 34th straight successful field goal, one of six three-pointers on the day for Minnesota.

December 28, 1998 After a 6-10 finish, the Ravens did not renew Head Coach Ted Marchibroda's contract. Six Ravens represented the AFC in the Pro Bowl: LB Peter Boulware, WR Jermaine Lewis, LB Ray Lewis, DE Michael McCrary, T Jonathan Ogden and S Bennie Thompson.

January 19, 1999 Brian Billick became the second head coach in Baltimore Ravens' history when he accepted a six-year contract from owner Art Modell. Billick, the highly successful offensive coordinator for Minnesota, directed a Vikings' attack that set a variety of NFL and team records, including the league's all-time scoring mark of 556 points in 1998.

January 26, 1999 PSINet Inc., the first and largest independent commercial Internet Service Provider (ISP), announced an innovative partnership with the Ravens to develop a global Internet-based network for the Ravens. Under the 20-year agreement, the NFL's new downtown stadium at Camden Yards was named PSINet Stadium.

January 30, 1999 Ravens' Vice President of Player Personnel Ozzie Newsome was selected for induction into Pro Football's Hall of Fame, along with Lawrence Taylor, Eric Dickerson, Tom Mack and Billy Shaw. Newsome is the NFL's all-time leading tight end in pass receptions.

February 4, 1999 Art Modell, Owner and Chief Executive Officer of the Baltimore Ravens, named David Modell as the Ravens' President and Chief Operating Officer and John Modell as Vice President of Special Projects.

April 17, 1999 The Ravens selected Arizona CB Chris McAlister with their first round pick, and traded their second round choice for Atlanta's first round choice in 2000. Baltimore also acquired veterans QB Tony Banks, OL Everett Lindsay and TE Lovett Purnell in trades involving '99 picks.

September 12, 1999 Brian Billick's debut as head coach was spoiled in the regular season opener, as the St. Louis Rams defeated the Ravens 27-10 in the TransWorld Dome. Little-known QB Kurt Warner, who went on to become the league's MVP, threw three TD passes in his first NFL start.

September 26, 1999 Billick notched his first win as an NFL head coach, 17-10, over the expansion Cleveland Browns. Stoney Case started at quarterback, replacing Scott Mitchell.

October 31, 1999 Tony Banks took over as the team's starting quarterback against Buffalo in a 13-10 loss. Banks went 6-4 as a starter, including 4-0 in December. He threw a career-high 17 TDs and a career-low eight INTs.

December 26, 1999 The Ravens recorded their first-ever shutout, a 22-0 win over Cincinnati. The victory completed a perfect December and gave the Ravens a franchise-high eight victories. Five players (LB Peter Boulware, LB Ray Lewis, DE Michael McCrary, T Jonathan Ogden and S Rod Woodson) were named to the Pro Bowl. The Ravens' defense finished ranked second in the NFL, and in the team's 6-3 finish, Baltimore outscored opponents, 229-142.

February 18, 2000 The Ravens signed seven-time Pro Bowl tight end Shannon Sharpe, an unrestricted free agent who starred for 10 years with the Denver Broncos. Sharpe caught 552 passes for 6,983 yards and 44 TDs for Denver.

March 27, 2000 NFL owners approved the sale of 49% of the Ravens for \$275 million to Anne Arundel County business executive Stephen Bisciotti. Bisciotti has an option to purchase the remaining 51% for \$325 million in 2004.

April 15, 2000 The Ravens went for offense in the 2000 NFL Draft, selecting Tennessee RB Jamal Lewis (fifth overall), Florida WR Travis Taylor (10th overall) and Louisville QB Chris Redman (75th overall) with their first three picks.

September, 2000 The Ravens opened the 2001 season with a 16-0 win at Pittsburgh in their last-ever visit to Three Rivers Stadium on September 3. They won three of their first four games, including a dramatic 39-36 win over Jacksonville (their first-ever win over the Jaguars) and a 37-0 shutout win over Cincinnati.

October, 2000 Baltimore finished October 2-3 and did not score a touchdown during the month. Trent Dilfer replaced Tony Banks at quarterback on October 29 vs. Pittsburgh.

November/December 2000 The Ravens won their final seven regular season games by a combined score of 193-63. On November 26, Earnest Byner was the first person named to the Ravens' Ring of Honor during halftime of the 44-7 win over the Cleveland Browns. On December 10, owner Art Modell was honored for his 40 years of ownership, and was then rewarded with the Ravens' first-ever playoff berth after defeating San Diego, 24-3.

December 24 2000 The Ravens' defense set a 16-game record by allowing only 165 total points. Baltimore also set an NFL record by allowing only 970 yards rushing. The Ravens finished 12-4 after beating the New York Jets, 34-20 on Christmas Eve. Rookie RB Jamal Lewis rushed for a team-record 1,364 yards.

December 31, 2000 The Ravens defeated the Denver Broncos, 21-3, in an AFC Wild Card Playoff Game at PSINet Stadium, the first home playoff game in Baltimore since 1977. Jamal Lewis rushed for 110 yards on 30 carries and scored twice, while the defense allowed Denver's rushing attack only 42 yards on the ground.

January 2, 2001 LB Ray Lewis won NFL Defensive MVP honors from the Associated Press.

January 7, 2001 The Ravens scored 14 fourth quarter points to defeat the Tennessee Titans, 24-10, at Adelphia Coliseum to advance to the AFC Championship. The go-ahead touchdown was a 90-yard return of a blocked field goal by Anthony Mitchell, then Ray Lewis scored on a 50-yard interception return to seal the win.

January 14, 2001 The Ravens traveled to Oakland and defeated the Raiders, 16-3, in the AFC Championship Game to advance to Super Bowl XXXV. Shannon Sharpe scored on an NFL post-season record 96-yard pass from Trent Dilfer to give the Ravens all the points they would need. The Ravens limited the Raiders to 24 rushing yards.

January 28, 2001 The Ravens defeated the New York Giants, 34-7, to capture their first-ever World Championship in Super Bowl XXXV played at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa, FL. Ray Lewis was named Super Bowl MVP and only Ron Dixon's 97-yard kickoff return for a touchdown averted a shutout for the Giants. A Super Bowl record was set when three touchdowns were scored in a span of 36 seconds, including Duane Starks' 49-yard interception return and Jermaine Lewis' 84-yard kickoff return.

January 30, 2001 Over 200,000 people turned out on a cold, gray, rainy day to attend Baltimore's Ravens' Victory Parade. "This is the thrill of my life," exclaimed owner Art Modell.

March 6, 2001 The Ravens reached an agreement in principle on a five-year contract with QB Elvis Grbac. Grbac, threw for a career-high 4,169 yards and 28 TDs for the Kansas City Chiefs in 2000 and was named to his first Pro Bowl.

April 21, 2001 The Ravens selected Arizona State Tight End Todd Heap with their first choice in the 2001 draft, and Baylor S Gary Baxter in the second round. Picking 31st, the Ravens held all of their own choices in each of the seven rounds.

PSINet Stadium is arguably the crowning jewel of the nation's premier sports facility, the Camden Yards Sports Complex. Nestled just south of Oriole Park at Camden Yards, PSINet Stadium offers Ravens' fans the latest in technology, including state-of-the-art SMARTVISION video boards, combined with fabulous amenities. With a capacity of 69,084, including 109 suites and 7,900 club seats, the stadium was completed in 1997 in just over two years at an estimated cost of \$220 million. Designed by the architectural firm HOK, which also designed Oriole Park at Camden Yards, PSINet Stadium was funded through a combination of proceeds generated from the sale of tax-exempt revenue bonds, debt service being paid by lottery proceeds and the Ravens.

SEATING:

- ❑ With a seating capacity of 69,084, PSINet Stadium is substantially larger than its sister baseball stadium to the north. At 1.6 million square feet, it is nearly double Oriole Park's size.
- ❑ There are 7,900 club seats at PSINet Stadium, featuring extra-wide seating, VIP parking and access to the club lounges that provide specialty foods, fully-staffed bars, a concierge and scenic views of downtown.
- ❑ Each of the 109 suites at PSINet Stadium can hold between 20-24 persons, and feature three televisions, a private restroom, VIP parking, personal wait service, as well as many other amenities.

VIDEO BOARDS:

- ❑ The two SACO SMARTVISION video boards located in each endzone, measuring 100 feet by 24 feet, are the largest permanent display boards located in any sports venue in the entire world. In essence, these boards are giant computer screens.
- ❑ Operated by a crew of up to 20 people each game day, the boards feature network pregame shows, live video of games from around the league, instant replays, highlights and up-to-date statistics.
- ❑ Each screen, which can be divided into as many as 16 different sections, is augmented by over 1,894 custom-built speakers that produce crystal-clear sound, producing breathtaking special effects.



SIGHTLINES:

- ❑ Front-row seating in the lower level is six feet above the playing field, high enough to eliminate obstructed views in that area. In addition, the front row of seats are only 50 feet from the playing field on the sidelines and 20 feet from the back of the endzones.
- ❑ The distinct upper seating area includes open notches in each corner of the stadium, creating scenic views of the city of Baltimore for fans to enjoy. This feature also enables upper-level endzone seating to be moved closer to the field.

AMENITIES:

- ❑ Extra-wide concourses (between 44 and 64 feet) make for easier navigating in PSINet Stadium. Seven public elevators (four handicapped accessible) and two escalators (to club level) also assist fans maneuvering about the stadium.
- ❑ There are 55 concession stands located throughout the upper level, lower level and club level featuring both standard football fare and various Baltimore specialties.
- ❑ In addition, there are several Ravens' team stores located in PSINet Stadium where fans are able to purchase all the latest Ravens' merchandise, plus six Provident Bank ATMs scattered throughout the facility.
- ❑ Fully ADA compliant, PSINet Stadium allows disabled fans to access areas throughout the facility via ramps and elevators. Handicapped seating also exists in every PSL (permanent seat license) zone in the new NFL stadium.



TRANSPORTATION:

- ❑ Located at 1101 Russell St., PSINet Stadium is surrounded on all sides by the following elevated roadways: I-95 and the Hamburg St. bridge to the north; I-95 and I-395 (plus Light Rail line) to the east; the Ostend St. bridge to the south; and the Russell St. viaduct to the west.
- ❑ Fans can also easily access the new stadium using Mass Transit. The Light Rail has a drop-off point located directly outside of Gate B, and Park-and-Ride shuttles are available from various locations around the greater Baltimore area.
- ❑ Parking in stadium lots is limited, but numerous downtown lots are available for game-day parking just a short walk away.

QUICK FACTS:

- ❑ PSINet Stadium is 185 feet tall, making it 35 feet taller than Oriole Park at Camden Yards.
- ❑ The playing surface is rated among the league's best in a survey of NFL players.
- ❑ The two SMARTVISION video boards located in each endzone generate 16 million colors, and at peak output, consume up to 80,000 watts of electrical power.
- ❑ Besides Ravens' football, PSINet Stadium features various other forms of entertainment, including concerts and other sporting events. Several college football games have been played since 1998, including last year's hugely successful Army-Navy clash. Maryland vs. Georgia Tech, Salisbury St vs. Frostburg State, and three Morgan State games have been staged at the stadium. In 1998, The HFStival sold out in under 90 minutes and featured 15 bands and attracted over 90,000 fans. Heavy metal was in full force, as Metallica (plus Korn, Kid Rock, Powerman 5000 and System of a Down) rocked the stadium on July 4, 2000.
- ❑ In recognition of the Knaabe Piano factory, which was once located on the site of PSINet Stadium, a plaza in the shape of a piano was erected in the southwest corner of the facility. Interestingly, the paving pattern of the plaza was designed to look like piano keys.


STADIUM PARKING LOTS


