

## Reaching Out In the Community



In the past year, Ravens players, wives and staff members have made more than 600 appearances in Baltimore and the surrounding community. Each player has made community appearances and visits have included area hospitals, schools, along with community and corporate events. The following is a sample of community programs supported and created by Ravens players and staff.

► Holiday Christmas parties were held at The ESPN Zone in Baltimore, the University of Maryland Medical Center, and St. Vincent's Center in Timonium (The Ravens' Courage House). Each player participated at the parties where over 300 children had the opportunity to meet, talk and receive gifts from their favorite



Ravens players. Ravens players gave away more than 700 turkeys during Thanksgiving to churches, homeless shelters and other non-profit organizations that feed the less fortunate.

► The Ravens coaching staff, led by head coach Brian Billick, hold annual statewide high school and college coaching clinics in May and June.



► Coach Brian Billick is a spokesman and benefactor for the Living Classrooms Foundation in Baltimore, whose purpose is to provide hands-on education and work force development programs for thousands of Baltimore area youngsters.



► The annual Ravens Kick Off Luncheon to benefit the United Way, held before the first week of the season, is attended by all players and coaches and provides funds for local United Way agencies.

► The Ravens Wives' organization sponsors two events annually. The Annual Ravens' Family Food drive held at PSINet Stadium collected 20,000 lbs. of food last year and collected over \$20,000 during the Dec. 5th game vs. Tennessee. The Ravens' FANTastic Charity Event is a black tie affair designed to raise funds for the Pediatric Burn Unit at Johns Hopkins Hospital. In the past three years, this event has raised more than \$400,000 for the Pediatric Burn Unit.

► More than 10 Ravens' players participate in the Ravens/PAL Challenge, which is a performance based pledge system that raised more than \$10,000 in 1999.

## Reaching Out

► In April, defensive end Michael McCrary established Mac's Miracle Fund with an initial contribution of \$100,000 to the Maryland Special Olympics, the largest gift from an athlete or entertainer in Special Olympics history. Mac's Miracle Fund is dedicated to providing multi-tiered, values-based athletic and enrichment programs for Maryland's Special Olympics.



► Ravens' players participated in NFL Play Football programs in September. NFL Play Football is a youth initiative designed to give children structured access to the game of football while providing contemporary instructional techniques to attract today's youth to the game. Jamie Sharper, Peter Boulware, Michael McCrary, Corey Harris, Jermaine Lewis, Keith Washington, Marques Douglas, James Trapp, Lionel Dalton and Martin Chase participated and gave free instructional clinics at different sites.



► The Harry Swayne Scholarship fund gives two graduating seniors in the Baltimore area \$2500 grants.



► Priest Holmes became the spokesperson and mentorship leader for the statewide GEAR UP program. It is a pioneering educational program that gives financial and academic support to low-income students with college potential.

► Duane Starks' annual "Quest for Success" scholarship program awards five high school students with \$1500 scholarships to attend the college of their choice.

► Sam Adams and Junior Achievement of Central Maryland have partnered with the mission of educating and inspiring young people to value free enterprise, understand business and economics and be workforce ready. Sam will participate as a mentor in local classrooms and special event activities delivering the message to young people to stay in school and realize their potential. Sam is continuing the relationship he began with Junior Achievement while playing for the Seahawks.

► Baltimore area high schools participate in Jonathan Ogden's "Ogden Club", an organization established to get high school students involved in community service.

In addition to the players and coaches, the Modell family has made it a priority to participate actively in charitable endeavors. Ravens' owner, Art Modell, serves on the Executive Committee of the Greater Baltimore Committee and co-chaired (with his wife, Pat) the 1996 Baltimore Cystic Fibrosis Gala. He was named a 1999 Sports Champion from the Multiple Sclerosis Society and the list of awards and

citations for his work in the community is extensive (see page 10). Ravens' President David Modell serves on five area boards of directors: the United Way of Central Maryland, Port Discovery Children's Museum, Father Martin's Ashley, the University of Maryland Medical System's Shock Trauma and the Maryland Public Television Foundation.



## Ravens Foundation for Families



Central to the vision of the Modell family during their 40 years in the NFL is extensive outreach and participation in the community. Since arriving in Maryland in 1996, the Modells have tried to make a significant difference in


the surrounding area via community outreach, the Ravens' Foundation for Families and cooperative fundraising. The goal, simply put, is to use the team's position in the community to make it a better place to live.

The team established the Ravens Foundation for Families (RFF), which helps area families pursue a healthy and productive life. The Foundation (510c3) is a separate non-profit entity of the Ravens community outreach. It has set the objective of full participation from players, coaches, staff and spouses that crosses various social, economic and ethnic strata. That participation includes, but is not limited to, motivational talks, social education, anti-drug and anti-delinquency programs, football clinics, mentoring and fundraising efforts.

## ART MODELL



As Art Modell enjoys his 40th NFL season of ownership, he can reflect on a memorable career that includes everything from an NFL Championship, to three other NFL title games, to three AFC Championship contests, to his tenure as the first and only elected NFL president, and to his negotiations of the initial collective bargaining agreement with committee members like Vince Lombardi and Jim Finks.

There is Art's long-time standing as the NFL's Broadcast Chairman when the contracts he negotiated set the standard for sports TV; and there are the many friendships with the greats of the game – from George Halas to Jim Brown, from Wellington Mara to Pete Rozelle. And, while Art enjoys reflecting on the past, his focus is clearly on the present and near future. "We've put together a pretty good Ravens' team that we expect will be championship caliber over the next couple of seasons. We're ready for a strong run," Modell says.

At the age of 35, Modell bought the Cleveland Browns for what was then (March, 1961) an unheard of sum of \$4 million. In his 35 years of Browns' ownership, his teams played 20 playoff games, including winning the NFL Championship in 1964, plus appearances in three other NFL title contests and three AFC Championship games. Just a few weeks prior to announcing the move to Baltimore, Modell was once again one of the 60 finalists for the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Art Modell is the person who brought the NFL back to Baltimore. It was not an easy move to make for the proud Modell. "I didn't get into this business to go bankrupt. I'm in it to win, and I couldn't continue to make the best effort to win in Cleveland with the stadium situation we had. This is a game I love - my family loves - and we had to find a way to stay competitive."

Modell did not leave the fans of Cleveland empty handed. He left the name "Browns", the team colors and the great Browns' history. "That didn't happen in Baltimore with the Colts, in Brooklyn with the Dodgers, nor in other cities that have lost sports teams," Modell explains.

The welcome to the Modell family by the fans of Baltimore has been overwhelming. "The fans here have given us four years of sellouts as we've rebuilt the team. It's time to reward them with a play-off run."

Art and his wife Pat (see inclusion) are the parents of John and David. John, who coordinated the installation and use of the innovative scoreboards at PSINet Stadium, is a composer/producer and president of Modular Entertainment, a music and multimedia production company. John also coordinates the Ravens' home game entertainment and schedule as the Vice President of Special Projects. He and his wife Tracy, an artist, live in Los Angeles with their son Dylan Scot (3/21/92) and daughter Isabella Sophia (4/28/98).

David, the Ravens' President, and his wife, Olwen, an attorney, live in Owings Mills with daughters Breslin Ebright (2/5/90) and Collier Honora (10/6/93) and sons Arthur Edward (11/23/91) and David Orrick Jr. (9/25/96).

"The first real hero I remember was in 1935, and he was a player with the Brooklyn Dodgers who played without a helmet - Roy 'Father' Lumpkin from Georgia Tech. I enjoyed all sports, but as a fan, I had a passion for football...I look back now at the NFL and marvel at the vision of George Halas, Dan Reeves, Art Rooney and the Mara family. ## HISTORY

- ▶ Dropped out of high school at the age of 15 to help financially-strapped family after the death of his father.
- ▶ First full-time job was as an electrician's helper, cleaning out the hulls of ships in a Brooklyn shipyard.
- ▶ Joined the Air Force in 1943 (he was 18).
- ▶ Under the G.I. Bill, he enrolled in a New York City television school following World War II.
- ▶ Produced one of the first regular daytime television shows in the nation.
- ▶ Joined the advertising business in 1954 and soon became a partner for the L.H. Hartman Company.

## FOOTBALL HISTORY

- ▶ Purchased Browns on March 21, 1961.
- ▶ His fourth team, the 1964 Browns, won the World Championship, beating the Baltimore Colts, 27-0.
- ▶ His 1965, 1968 and 1969 teams played in NFL title games.
- ▶ His 1986, 1987 and 1989 teams lost memorable AFC Championship games to the Denver Broncos.
- ▶ His 1967, 1971, 1972, 1980, 1982, 1985, 1988 and 1994 teams also made the playoffs.
- ▶ In five other seasons - 1963, 1970, 1976, 1979 and 1983 - the Browns had a chance to make the playoffs on the final day of the season, but did not qualify.
- ▶ In 39 years of ownership, Art has 25 winning seasons with an overall record of 302-278-8.
- ▶ Moved franchise to Baltimore on Feb. 9, 1996.

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- ▶ Only elected NFL President in league history, serving in that capacity in 1967, 1968 and 1969.
- ▶ Chairman of the NFL's Television Committee for 31 years. During his tenure, the NFL TV contracts set the standard and records for the highest in sports' history.
- ▶ Chairman of the Owners' Labor Committee, which successfully negotiated the NFL's first collective bargaining agreement with the players in 1968.

After graduation from college (New Rochelle), Patricia Modell entered the acting profession. She soon appeared in three Broadway plays in her hometown of New York, where she also acted in over 200 live TV shows. The talented actress then moved to Los Angeles where she appeared in three series, including the long-running "People's Choice" and as Meg Baldwin in "General Hospital."

Patricia also acted in other TV shows and movies. She retired from show business in 1969, married Art Modell and moved to Cleveland with her two sons. Pat quickly became an important part of her new home, dedicating her time and energy to a variety of important projects. She co-chaired major fundraisers for the Hospice of the Western Reserve and the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland. She also helped raise funds for the Make-A-Wish Foundation, the Playhouse Square Foundation, the Cerebral Palsy Association, Ursuline College, the Cleveland Musical Arts Foundation and the Cleveland Ballet.

In Baltimore, Patricia is on the boards of the Kennedy Krieger Institute, the Walters Art Gallery and the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra. She helped establish and direct the Ravens' Foundation for Families, and co-chaired (with Art) a major fundraiser for Cystic Fibrosis. Like her husband Art, and sons David and John, Patricia Modell believes in getting involved in the community.

DAVID MODELL



David Modell keeps his associates at the Ravens focused: "Our number one goal is to win. This oversimplification cannot be re-stated often or loudly enough as it will shape every decision and action this organization takes," Modell says. David carries a plastic card that states the organization's mission and values. He shows it often at meetings, recites it for anyone who wants to hear, or any Ravens' associate who needs a reminder.

"I know it by heart, and I believe in it," David says. "I don't want us just to be the best football team. We aspire to be the best business organization. As our mission states: 'Here, the extraordinary must be commonplace.'"

"Just as Brian (Billick) and the team must pay attention to detail, so must all of our associates," adds David. "You have to have a vision, but set realistic goals. You have to communicate effectively internally, as well as externally, and hold everyone accountable. Plus, we will continue to embody my father's philosophy of being first-class in every way, and we'll have fun doing all of this."

Since becoming President of the Ravens in 1998, David has organized the franchise into five groups, each directed by a "group operating head". With guidance from his father Art, David also spearheaded the search for a new head coach and the hiring of Brian Billick.

David was a key player in the innovative agreement with PSINet that set a new standard in the marriage of professional sports and a commercial entity. He coordinated the opening of PSINet Stadium in 1998, which included a three-day football festival in downtown Baltimore that attracted over 100,000 fans.

Since he arrived in Baltimore in 1996, David has been extremely active in the Baltimore community. From leading the effort to find the team name, colors and logos, to helping a number of important local groups raise money to better the area, Modell has been busy. He was recently (Jan., 2000) picked by the Baltimore Business Journal as one of "40 Under 40" leaders who help Baltimore industry and the community in general.

"Community involvement was a hallmark of Art Modell's franchise in Cleveland, and we're trying to do the same here. My father and mother (Patricia) set the example. They not only recognize where they can help, they get things done. I'm fortunate to be able to follow their lead," David says.

Along with his family, the Ravens are the priority in David's life. "I love to go to work with these great associates at the Ravens. I love this organization, and that bond will grow as we share future victories. It's great to be part of something like this," David adds.

When the team arrived in Baltimore in 1996, David coordinated a fan vote through *The Baltimore Sun* to select the team nickname - the Ravens. Working with staff, NFL Properties and Baltimore area focus groups, he directed the process to select the team colors and uniform design. "It was a collaborative effort. The fans got involved, my family, obviously Art, plus many members of the organization." In 1999, David once again involved the fans in the vote for a new Ravens' logo.

No person in the Ravens' organization has more hands-on experience in as many different areas of the company as 39-year-old David Modell. Starting in Cleveland Stadium and game-day operations when he was 14, David has had experience in every phase of the team except playing and coaching. He worked in the team's ticket office, public relations department and started the marketing division in 1985.

As the Ravens' president and chief operating officer, he runs the club's daily activities. David is involved in every aspect of the team - from chairing weekly group operating head meetings, to negotiating player contracts, to writing guidelines for game-day help, and coordinating the grand opening of PSINet Stadium. David also serves on the NFL's Stadium and Expansion Committees.

David made his mark with the franchise and in league circles with the work he did marketing the Browns. The younger Modell started a marketing department in 1985 and developed a series of programs that enhanced the team's image and provided needed revenues. Other teams have copied some

of David's innovations, including team television productions (weekly shows and preseason games produced by the team rather than selling those rights), an elaborate training camp magazine that is distributed to fans, and advertising moments of exclusivity at home games. The team's original television ventures were both produced and sold by Modell.

"At a time when most teams were wondering whether they should have a marketing department, David had ours up and running and setting a pace that a number of franchises have since followed. I'm very proud of his production and creativity," Art Modell said.

Modell is an active member of five Baltimore boards of directors: the United Way of Central Maryland, the Port Discovery Children's Museum, Father Martin's Ashley, the University of Maryland Medical System's Shock Trauma and the Maryland Public Television Foundation. David is also the chairman of the Ravens Foundation for Families.

In Cleveland, Modell was President of the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland, and he headed its development fundraising. He was a member of the Board of Trustees for the Cleveland Urban League and the Convention and Visitors' Bureau. Modell also worked with the Lake County Boy Scouts Association and served on the Visiting Committee of the Athletic Department at Case Western Reserve University.

As a 14-year old student, David worked Browns' games as a member of the grounds crew. In the next few years, he spent time as a front office aide and training camp intern. After graduating from the The Gunnery School (Washington, CT) and attending Wittenberg University, Modell joined the Browns in a full-time capacity in the team's ticket office (1981-82). He then worked two years as the front office manager for the Fernwood Inn, a resort in the Pocono Mountains (1982-84) before returning to Cleveland in October of 1984.

Modell's wife Olwen, an attorney, serves on the board of the Ravens Foundation for Families and Baltimore's House of Ruth (homes for abused women). In Cleveland, she was a member of Youth Visions (formerly Big Brothers and Big Sisters) and Starting Point (child care referral). Olwen and David are parents of daughters Breslin Ebright (2/5/90), and Collier Honora (10/6/93), and sons Arthur Edward (11/23/91) and David Orrick Jr. (9/25/96). The Modells live in Owings Mills.

JOHN MODELL



John Modell, who was named Vice President of Special Projects in February of 1999, spearheads the Ravens' mission to provide the best in-stadium game entertainment in professional sports. Modell, 40, is the eldest son of Art and Pat Modell and is president of Modular Entertainment, a music and multimedia production company in Los Angeles.

John was involved in the design and realization of the new SMARTVISION video boards at PSINet Stadium. The two high-resolution video screens are made up of over nine million LED's and measure 100' x 24' each - the largest in any sports venue. Incorporating graphics, scoring information and cutting-edge video into a multi-functional format, these screens were the first of their kind in the world.

"We've tapped into some of the finest talent from the video and film industry to create the bold visual look of the content seen on the SMARTVISION boards," said Modell. "Along with a great sound system, we provide premium in-stadium entertainment - that's what our fans deserve and have come to expect."

John also seeks and produces other kinds of entertainment at PSINet Stadium, including this July's Metallica concert. John played a key role in securing the HFStival, a day-long concert in May of 1999 featuring top modern rock acts. The concert was a sellout with over 75,000 tickets purchased in just 88 minutes, the most tickets ever sold by TicketMaster in that short of time.

Modell majored in music composition at the California Institute of the Arts (Cal Arts). Prior to that, John attended high school at University School in Cleveland, where he lettered at defensive tackle.

John, a composer and producer, is the author of the Ravens' Fight Song (see below). He and his wife, Tracy, an artist, are the parents of Dylan Scot (3/21/92) and Isabella Sophia (4/28/98).



## OZZIE NEWSOME



Ozzie Newsome's achievements on the field earned him an induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame with the Class of 1999. His skills at handling the intricacies of running football operations are fast approaching the quality of his brilliant playing career. His transition from a legendary playing career to front office administrator has been remarkable if viewed by an outsider. However, those familiar with his work ethic, regard for others and his intelligence for the game, can comprehend what he has accomplished.

One of the first things Art Modell did when he moved his franchise to Baltimore was invite Ozzie Newsome to join him to become the vice president of player personnel. "I've known Ozzie for over 20 years," Modell said. "I knew him as a great player, a Hall of Fame-type athlete. He had tremendous abilities as an athlete, but he worked hard to be the best."

When Newsome retired following the 1990 season, his 13th with the Cleveland Browns, Modell invited him to join the front office as a special assignment scout. Two years later, "the Wizard" was promoted to assistant to the head coach/offense-pro personnel. "I had to find out what direction my career would go," Newsome said. "Art gave me the opportunity to work with the coaches, and I enjoyed that. At the same time, I increased my experience with the personnel department and decided that's where I wanted my career to head."

In 1994, Newsome was named the team's director of pro personnel. While he continued to help on the field, Newsome provided detailed studies on other NFL players and recommended players the team should try to acquire. "I've seen some former players who can't make the transition to the front office. That's not been the case with Ozzie. He attacks his job the same way he became a great player - by working harder than those around him and learning everything he needs to know to be successful," Modell added.

"Drafts are exciting," Newsome explained. "They remind me of getting ready for a big game, like the Steelers or a playoff game. We feel pretty good about the players we acquired over the last five drafts and through free agency." The facts overwhelmingly support Ozzie's opinion: In a survey conducted by *The Dallas Morning News*, the Ravens draft over the last five years has produced more Pro Bowlers (four) and a higher percentage of starters (38.5%) than any other NFL team. The survey also concluded that the Ravens have the highest percentage of drafted players still on the team (69.2%). Of the four categories used to analyze the draft, the Ravens finished first in three. The survey covered the years 1996-99.

The first draft choice under Newsome's direction produced two three-time Pro Bowlers in left tackle Jonathan Ogden and middle linebacker Ray Lewis. Also making the Pro Bowl as a return specialist was Jermaine Lewis, a fifth-round pick in that draft. In his second draft, Newsome picked linebackers



Peter Boulware and Jamie Sharper, safety Kim Herring and center Jeff Mitchell - all four are starters. Boulware was a consensus choice for the NFL's 1997 Rookie of the Year and has made the Pro Bowl twice.

In 1998, Newsome coordinated the selections of cornerback Duane Starks and receiver Patrick Johnson with the team's first two picks. Starks tied for the NFL's interception lead among rookies (equalling Charles Woodson's five thefts) and started eight games, then matched that total last season. Johnson has emerged as the team's most dangerous deep threat, as he owns the highest career receiving average in team history (16.7 yards per catch), plus the longest kick-off return (97 yards) in team history.

Newsome continued his hot hand in 1999, when he tabbed Arizona CB Chris McAlister with the 10th pick in the first round. He also picked promising WR Brandon Stokley, G Edwin Mulitalo, who has established himself as a starter at guard, and potential blue-chipper S Anthony Poindexter, who dropped to the seventh round after he underwent major knee surgery in his senior season at Virginia.

Last April, Ozzie found himself with two first-round picks, the fifth and 10th overall, after trades with Atlanta in 1999 and then Denver just prior to the

draft. Baltimore tabbed Tennessee's All-America running back Jamal Lewis and productive Florida WR Travis Taylor. In the third round, the Ravens selected QB Chris Redman of Louisville, the nation's leading collegiate passer. Newsome and his staff then tabbed OL Richard Mercier (Miami), Adalius Thomas (Southern Miss.) and DT Cedric Woodard (Texas). On draft day, the Ravens also inked DT Sam Adams as an unrestricted free agent from Seattle.

Not only have Ozzie's drafts been productive, but free agent signings have proven fruitful, too. One of the game's all-time great players, Rod Woodson, made the Pro Bowl as a safety last season, his eighth trip to Hawaii. He made the transition to safety that Newsome envisioned, and led the AFC with seven interceptions, two for touchdowns. DE Michael McCrary has made the Pro Bowl each of the last two seasons after signing as an unrestricted free agent from Seattle in 1997. One of the great tight ends in the history of the game was inked by Ozzie last spring when seven-time Pro Bowler Shannon Sharpe of the Denver Broncos signed a four-year deal with the Ravens. Shannon is on pace to break Newsome's all-time receiving records for a tight end.

"I don't care about records being broken," said Ozzie. "As long as we can go to, and win, the Super Bowl. I've received some credit for the players we've picked during our four years in Baltimore, but it is a collective effort. Phil (Savage, director of college scouting) and our scouts, James (Harris, director of pro personnel) and John (Wooten, recently retired assistant director of pro personnel) all have a voice and contribute in a significant way."


Newsome has also gained induction into three other halls of fame - the National Football Foundation's College Hall of Fame (1994), the NCAA Hall of Fame (1994) and his beloved University of Alabama (1995). Placed prominently on the wall of Newsome's office is a sideline portrait of Paul "Bear" Bryant. "Coach helped me grow up. He pushed me further than I thought I could go, both on and off the field," Newsome said.

Newsome's pro career is the best of any tight end in NFL history. His 662 receptions (for 7,980 yards) are not only the most ever caught by a tight end, but the most in Browns' history. Ozzie

ended his career as the fourth leading NFL receiver of all-time. He earned three Pro Bowls (1981, 1984-85) and was a four-time winner of the Cleveland Touchdown Club's Offensive Player of the Year award (1978, 1981, 1983 and 1984). His consecutive game reception streak of 150 is the second longest in NFL history.

Newsome, who was named to the All-NFL team of the 1980's (2nd team), consistently received All-AFC and All-NFL honors throughout his career. Ozzie, 43, was a 1978 number one draft choice, along with Clay Matthews, and the two are among an elite group of Browns to play in three decades. The others are Gene Hickerson (1958-60, 62-73), Dick Schafrath (1959-71) and Don Cockroft (1968-80).

Winner of the 1990 Byron "Whizzer" White Award as the NFL's top community volunteer, Newsome is widely known for his willingness to help those in need. Ozzie, who still works out every day, his wife, Gloria, and their son, Michael Ryan, live in Cockeysville.

## BRIAN BILLICK



Brian Billick enjoyed a successful season with the 1999 Ravens, his first stint as a head coach at any level. The 8-8 Ravens produced the most victories in the franchise's four-year history, won the most consecutive games (4), the most road games (4), including the first victory at Pittsburgh, and finished with the best-ever Ravens' defense (2nd in the NFL). But Coach Billick didn't take a bow for this progress.

Immediately following the final game last December, Billick gathered the Ravens and said: "We've raised the bar. We can't go back. We are at a new level, and we will move forward. Our fans, the media, the organization - all have new expectations for us. They're justified in wanting more success. Eight and eight is not going to get it anymore. We need to take the next steps to become a playoff team."

The Ravens earned the .500 mark in the tough AFC Central, plus a new-found respect around the league, thanks to the strong defense (in the top two in the NFL in five key categories) and an improving offense. The offense evolved into an efficient unit, averaging 25.4 points and 322 yards per game over the final nine games (record 6-3), up from 13.5 points and 268.4 yards per game in the first seven contests (record 2-5). The Ravens outscored their final nine opponents, 229-142, including a 41-14 victory over AFC Champion Tennessee on Dec. 5. QB Tony Banks, who became the Ravens' starter in game seven, threw a career-high 17 TD passes and a career low eight INTs in his 10 starts.

Billick was one of nine new head coaches in the league last season, one of six first-time head coaches, and his 8-8 mark was better than all but Gunther Cunningham (Kansas City) and Mike Holmgren (Seattle), who both finished 9-7. He was named co-Rookie Coach of the Year (along with Cunningham) by *College & Pro Football Newsweekly*.



During this offseason, Baltimore added weapons to the offense with the signing of seven-time Pro Bowl TE Shannon Sharpe and with the drafting of RB Jamal Lewis (Tennessee), WR Travis Taylor (Florida) and QB Chris Redman (Louisville). "The old saying that states 'you win championships with defense' doesn't work anymore. You have to have to be able to score. You have to have big plays as part of your arsenal. We need to add more 'explosives' to our attack," Billick said.

Billick became the second head coach in Baltimore Ravens' history when he accepted a six-year contract from owner Art Modell on January 19, 1999. Billick, the highly successful offensive coordinator for the Minnesota Vikings from 1994-98, directed a Vikings' attack that set a variety of NFL and team records in a 15-1 1998 campaign.

"When we began our search, we couldn't talk with Brian because his team was in the playoffs," Modell said. "Instead, we talked with 28 people who had some direct association with Brian."

"Everything we heard about Coach Billick told us to wait for him," explained David Modell, the Ravens' president. The younger Modell and Ozzie Newsome, the Ravens' vice president of personnel, helped Art during the head-coaching search. "We talked with everybody from the person who introduced Brian to his wife, Kim, to Dennis Green, to Tony Dungy, to Bill Walsh. All of these people painted a picture of a person and a coach ready to take the next step up in the NFL."

"I was very fortunate," Billick said. "Usually there is one 'hot' coordinator and one job available. I had other opportunities, but I picked Baltimore."

Billick, 46, was the architect of a Minnesota offense that in 1998 shattered the NFL record for most points scored in a season (556), breaking the old mark (541) set by the 1983 Washington Redskins. The '98 Vikings scored 53 of 56 times they were inside the 20. In their two playoff games, the Vikings scored 41 points against the Arizona Cardinals and 27 against Atlanta in the NFC Championship game. Minnesota tied for the NFL lead with 41 touchdown passes, shattering a team mark, and scored over 100 points in each quarter for the first time in team history. Minnesota ranked second in the NFL (behind San Francisco) with a team-record 6,262 total net yards and first in the league with 4,328 yards passing. QB Randall Cunningham, who replaced the injured Brad Johnson early in the season, led the NFL with a 106.0 QB rating and set a Vikings' record with 34 TD passes. Cunningham's favorite target was rookie WR Randy Moss, who burst onto the NFL scene with 17 TD receptions.

Over his five full seasons, Billick guided the Vikings into the top five in the NFL in yards per game, passing yards per game, completions and third down conversions. Under Billick's guidance, the Vikings recorded their top three offensive seasons (1998, 1995 and 1994), and five of the top 10 offensive seasons in team history. Most importantly, the Vikings advanced to the playoffs all but one season (1995) during Billick's tenure. Minnesota played postseason games in 1993-94 and 1996-98.

Billick joined the Vikings in 1992 as tight ends coach. "When he came here, Brian was the only guy with a computer, and now all the coaches use them," said Vikings' head coach Dennis Green. Brian was named offensive coordinator three games into the 1993 season, and Minnesota's production increased dramatically: The Vikings went from 264.8 yards per game over the first six weeks of the season to a 323.3-yard average over the final 10 games. During a three-game winning streak that propelled the Vikings into the playoffs, the offense averaged over 21 points and 351 yards per game. In Billick's first full season as offensive coordinator in 1994, the Vikings finished second in the NFL in passing yards (4,324) – now the third-most in team annals. Minnesota won the NFC Central Division title, but lost to the Bears in the first round of the playoffs.

In 1995, the Vikings failed to qualify for the postseason, but the offense scored a then-team record 412 points and gained 5,938 yards. WR Cris Carter set a Vikings' record with 17 TD receptions (tied by Moss). QB Warren Moon set a then-team mark with 33 TD passes (topped by Cunningham's 34). The 1996 Minnesota team qualified for a Wild Card berth with a 9-7 mark, as Carter grabbed 96 passes and Jake Reed placed second in the NFL with 1,320 receiving yards. Brad Johnson established himself as one of the game's top quarterbacks, finishing third in the NFL with an 89.4 QB rating. Johnson threw 17 TD passes in only eight starts. The Vikings once again made the playoffs in 1997, qualifying as a Wild Card with a 9-7 record. The Vikings lost starting quarterback Brad

Johnson and center Jeff Christy in the middle of the season. Johnson finished fourth in the NFC with an 84.5 QB rating and threw 20 TD passes despite missing three games. RB Robert Smith set team records for rushing yards in a season (1,266), 100-yard games (six) and finished third on the team with 37 receptions. Minnesota's rushing attack finished second in the NFC with 2,041 rushing yards. They defeated the Giants, 23-22, in the Wild Card round, before dropping a 38-22 game at San Francisco in the Divisional Playoffs.

Before his appointment with the Vikings, Brian was a Stanford assistant from 1989-91 under Coach Green. He helped in the development of wide receivers Ed McCaffrey, Chris Walsh and tight ends Ryan Wetnight and Jim Price. All four went on to NFL careers. Prior to Stanford, Billick spent three seasons as offensive coordinator at Utah State (1986-88). Brian helped develop QB Brent Snyder, who set school passing marks with 2,887 yards in 1987 and 3,218 yards in 1988. When he arrived at Utah State, the team was ranked 107th out of 108 NCAA Division I-A teams offensively. In his final two seasons as coordinator, the Aggies ranked in the top 10 in total offense.

Brian coached receivers, tight ends and quarterbacks at San Diego State from 1981-85 and held the added responsibility as recruiting coordinator. Aztec QB Todd Santos set all-time NCAA passing records during Billick's tenure. Brian also coached WR Webster Slaughter and TE Rob Awalt (the NFL's rookie of the year in 1987). "San Diego State gave me a great chance to learn from a good

offensive mind like Doug Scovil, to learn what it meant to coach, to be a professional," Billick said. "Doug wasn't particularly interested in doing a lot of administrative things, so I absorbed a lot of those and continued to learn what an organization needs to do to function."

Brian began his coaching career as an assistant at the University of the Redlands in 1977, while helping coach a local high school team at the same time. He spent the following year (1978) as a graduate assistant at Brigham Young University. At BYU, he worked with tight ends and the offensive line. Following that season, Brian was assistant director of public relations for the San Francisco 49ers in 1979-80. Two years earlier (1977), Billick had been drafted by the 49ers in the 11th round, was released and had a brief stint with the Dallas Cowboys. Brian earned All-Western Athletic Conference honors and honorable mention All-America in 1976 as a tight end at Brigham Young University. In 1976, he caught 20 passes for 338 yards and a touchdown. Brian played linebacker at Air Force as a freshman before transferring to BYU.

Since coming to Baltimore in January of 1999, Billick has enthusiastically helped improve the community. As he did in his

first few months with the team, Billick continued to make countless appearances to help a variety of charities and foundations raise awareness and funds this offseason. Billick gives extra time to the Central Maryland United Way and to the Living Classroom Foundation, where he serves on the board of directors. Brian's wife, Kim, joins him in many of these community projects, plus she has helped Baltimore's Red Cross with a number of important projects.

Billick was born in Fairborne, OH on Feb. 28, 1954, but grew up in Redlands, CA. He is the fourth of five children. Billick earned three letters in both football and basketball at Redlands High School. He was a Helms Scholar-Athlete as a senior. Brian earned a B.A. in communications from BYU, where he also pursued a master's in communication. He and Kim (who used to work as an assistant to Tex Schramm of the Dallas Cowboys) have two daughters: Aubree (3/5/84) and Keegan (6/26/89).

## MATT CAVANAUGH



Matt Cavanaugh enters his second season as the Ravens' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach after serving in the same capacity with the Chicago Bears for two seasons (1997-98). A 14-year NFL veteran quarterback, Matt is in his eighth season coaching, his fourth as coordinator.

Last year, Cavanaugh worked with three starting quarterbacks (Scott Mitchell, Stoney Case and Tony Banks). The Ravens' offense evolved over the course of last year and, over the last nine games, Baltimore averaged 25.4 points and 322.6 yards per game (compared to 13.5 points and 268.4 yards over the first seven contests). QB Tony Banks, named the starting QB for the final 10 games, set a career-high with 17 TD passes and a career low eight INTs. The Ravens went 6-4 over that span, including 4-0 in December.

"Matt did a great job last year under tough circumstances," said head coach Brian Billick. "He came into a situation where the head coach oversees the offense heavily. That's tough to do. But the fact is, I felt comfortable letting Matt call plays in our first season together. I wasn't sure we could get to that point in our first season, but we got to it by midseason. He earned that respect."

Cavanaugh, 43, spent the 1996 season as quarterbacks coach of the San Francisco 49ers after coaching the quarterbacks for the Arizona Cardinals for two seasons. He initiated his coaching career in 1993 as tight ends coach at the University of Pittsburgh.

Matt played for 14 NFL seasons after being selected in the second round of the 1978 draft by the New England Patriots. He spent five seasons with the Patriots before being traded to San Francisco in 1983, where he backed up Joe Montana. In 1986, Matt was traded to the Philadelphia Eagles, where he played four seasons. He played for the Giants in 1990 and '91, where he earned his second Super Bowl ring. In 112 career games, Cavanaugh completed 305 of 579 passes for 4,332 yards, 28 TDs and 30 INTs.

Cavanaugh was named MVP of the 1976 Sugar Bowl in which the Pittsburgh Panthers won the National Championship.

Matt and his wife, Nancy, have three children: Amy, Andrew and Mollie. The Cavanaugh family lives in Owings Mills, MD.

## MARVIN LEWIS



Marvin Lewis is in his fifth year with the Ravens as defensive coordinator. He was the only coach retained from the previous staff by Brian Billick (in 1999). The Ravens' young defense has evolved into one of the NFL's elite groups. Last season's unit finished ranked second in the league in yards allowed per game (263.9). In fact, the Ravens defense finished in the top two in five important categories, including first in yards allowed per play (4.1) and opponents' average gain per pass attempt (5.48). The defense did not permit a 100-yard rusher last season, and permitted only 38 plays of 20 yards or more (second in the league to Buffalo's 37). Baltimore's defense sent four players to the Pro Bowl: DE Michael McCrary,

LB Ray Lewis, S Rod Woodson and LB Peter Boulware.

In each of Marvin's four previous seasons as coordinator, the Ravens have improved in the most important defensive category: points allowed. Last season, the Ravens ranked sixth in the NFL by allowing only 17.3 points per game. In 1998, they were 16th, allowing an average of 20.9 points per game. In 1997, Baltimore ranked 18th (21.6) and in 1996, the Ravens were 29th (27.6).

Lewis spent four seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers (1992-95) coaching some of the best linebackers in the NFL, including Pro Bowlers Kevin Greene, Chad Brown, Levon Kirkland and Greg Lloyd. From 1993-95, the Steelers' defense ranked among the top three in the NFL each season. Of Pittsburgh's 97 sacks in two seasons ('94-95), the linebackers made 63.5, including 37.5 of a team record 55 sacks in '94.

Lewis, 42, is in his 20th year in coaching. He began his career coaching linebackers at his alma mater, Idaho State (1981-84). The Bengals finished 12-1 in Marvin's first season and won the NCAA Division I-AA championship. Lewis spent two years (1985-86) at Long Beach State before taking a post at New Mexico (1987-89), where he tutored inside linebackers the first two years and moved to the outside in '89. In 1990, he accepted a position coaching outside linebackers at Pittsburgh (1990-91).

Marvin received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Idaho State in 1981 and his master's in athletic administration in 1982. He earned All-Big Sky Conference honors (1978, '79, '80) as a linebacker and also played quarterback and free safety during his college career.

Lewis attended Fort Cherry H. S. in McDonald (PA), where he was an all-conference quarterback and safety, and earned letters in wrestling and baseball. He and his wife, Peggy, have two children: daughter Whitney (15) and son Marcus (10). They reside in Finksburg, MD.

**JIM COLLETO**



Jim Colletto is in his 34th year of coaching, his second with the Ravens. He came to the Ravens from Notre Dame, where he spent his final two seasons (1997-98) as offensive coordinator. In 1998, Jim coached tight ends in addition to coordinating the offense.

Colletto, 55, was the head coach at Purdue from 1991-96. He has 11 overall seasons of head coaching experience, including five years (1975-79) at Cal State Fullerton.

Prior to being named Purdue's head coach, Jim was the assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Ohio State from 1988-90, where he also worked with offensive tackles and tight ends. From 1985-87, Colletto was offensive coordinator at Arizona State. The Sun Devils defeated Michigan in the 1987 Rose Bowl. Colletto joined head coach John Cooper at Ohio State in the winter of 1988.

Colletto entered the coaching ranks at his alma mater of UCLA as a graduate assistant in 1966. He coached the Bruins' offensive line for two seasons (1967-68). ## JACK DEL RIO



Jack Del Rio's role as linebacker coach was an integral component in the Ravens' second-ranked defense last season. Del Rio, in his second season with Baltimore, coached the talented starting trio of Peter Boulware, Ray Lewis and Jamie Sharper. Sharper enjoyed his best year as a pro, setting a career-high with 122 tackles and four QB sacks. Lewis once again led the NFL with 198 tackles and made his third Pro Bowl. Boulware made his second consecutive trip to Hawaii after recording 10 QB sacks despite a shoulder dislocation that required a harness.

Jack joined the Ravens after spending the two seasons with the New Orleans Saints, 1998 as linebackers' coach and 1997 as assistant strength and conditioning coach. An 11-year NFL veteran, Jack was a third-round choice of the Saints in 1985. He earned the Saints' Rookie of the Year honors in 1985 and was named to the PFWA All-Rookie team. After two seasons (1985-86) with the Saints, Jack played for the Chiefs (1987-88), Cowboys (1989-91) and Vikings (1992-95). Del Rio led the Vikings in tackles for three straight years (1992-94) and played in the Pro Bowl following the '94 season. Jack logged over 100 consecutive starts from 1989-94, recorded over 1,000 career tackles and had 13 career interceptions.

Del Rio was a four-year starter at Southern Cal, where he earned consensus All-America as a senior and was a finalist for the Lombardi Award. He led USC in loss-tackles for three consecutive seasons. Del Rio was also a catcher on USC's baseball team, where he batted .330, caught current Arizona ace Randy Johnson and played with St. Louis slugger Mark McGwire.

Jeff Friday is in his second season in charge of the Ravens' weight and conditioning program after spending the previous three seasons (1996-98) as the Minnesota Vikings' assistant strength and conditioning coach.

"Jeff put his program in place last year and it really paid off," said Ravens' head coach Brian Billick. "The fact that we were 4-0 in December indicates that the players were in good condition."

Friday joined the Vikings as assistant strength coach in 1996 after four years in the same capacity at Northwestern University. While with the Wildcats, Jeff worked primarily with the men's and women's basketball teams, although he helped develop the football squad that won the Big Ten title in 1995.

Wade Harman is in his second year coaching tight ends for the Ravens. Last February, Baltimore signed seven-time Pro Bowl tight end Shannon Sharpe from the Denver Broncos. Sharpe enters the 2000 season with 552 receptions for 6,983 yards and 44 TDs. Sharpe needs 111 receptions and 998 yards to eclipse Ozzie Newsome's NFL marks of 662 receptions for 7,980 yards. He recorded three 1,000-yard seasons and 15 career 100-yard games.



He became the first player in NFL history to make the Pro Bowl as a safety, cornerback and kick returner. The secondary set a team mark with 21 interceptions, with four going for touchdowns.

**MILT JACKSON**



Milt Jackson, a 21-year NFL veteran, did an outstanding job last season: the Ravens starting receiver corps in 1999 - Qadry Ismail and Justin Armour - combined for one catch over the 1997 and 98 seasons. But last year, Ismail posted a career-high 1,105 yards on 68 catches and six TDs, while Armour finished with 27 receptions for 538 yards and four TDs. The receiving corps, which includes speedsters Patrick Johnson and Jermaine Lewis, plus productive Brandon Stokley and veteran Billy Davis, was upgraded when the Ravens selected Florida WR Travis Taylor with the 10th pick in the draft last April.

"Milt is one of the most experienced receiving coaches in the NFL," said Brian Billick. "I've had a working relationship with him for over 20 years. He brings a wealth of knowledge, both schematically and fundamentally, to us."

Before the respected Jackson coached the Seattle receivers in 1998, he spent three seasons coaching receivers for the Atlanta Falcons (1994-96). In 1995, the Falcons had three 1,000-yard receivers (Eric Metcalf, Terance Mathis and Bert Emanuel). Milt spent two seasons with the Rams (1992-93) and had jobs with the Colts (1989-91) and Oilers (1986-88). Milt also coached running backs for the Eagles (1985) and was wide receivers coach for the Bills (1983-84) and 49ers (1980-82).

Jackson entered the collegiate ranks in 1973 at Oregon State. In 1974, he coached at Rice, then coached at the University of California (1975-76), Oregon (1977-78), and UCLA (1979). He was drafted in the seventh round by the San Francisco 49ers as a defensive back in 1967, and was also tabbed by the Philadelphia Phillies the same year as a pitcher.

Milt and his wife, Brenda, have four children: Garrett, Stephen, Shelley and Jeremy. Jackson earned his B.A. degree from Sacramento State and his master's from Oregon State.

RUSS PURNELL



Russ Purnell, a 15-year NFL coaching veteran, is in his second season as the Ravens' special teams' coach. Last year, P Kyle Richardson and the punting unit set an NFL record with 39 punts inside-the-20, and Matt Stover connected on his final 18 attempts to finish 28 of 33 (84.8%). Stover's percentage was the third-best of his career, and his best since 1995.

Purnell spent four seasons with the Tennessee Oilers (1995-98), after spending nine seasons (1986-94) with the Seattle Seahawks. The Oilers blocked two field goals against the Ravens on 12/14/97 (the final home game played at Memorial Stadium). The Oilers (now Titans) led the NFL in both gross and net punting in 1998. On Oct. 11, 1998, the then-Oilers blocked a Kyle Richardson punt that proved to be the difference in the 12-8 Tennessee win over the Ravens.

With the Seahawks, Russ was the tight ends/assistant special teams' coach from 1987-91, before taking over the special teams in 1992.

Russ entered the collegiate coaching ranks in 1970 as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Whittier College. He coached for four seasons at USC as special teams and tight ends' coach before joining the Seahawks as offensive special assignments' coach in 1986. Rex Ryan is in his second year coaching the Ravens' defensive line. Last season, in Rex's first year with Baltimore, the defense was one of two units (along with St. Louis) that did not permit a 100-yard rusher. Baltimore led the league in average yards allowed per play (4.1) and finished second in rushing yards allowed per game (76.9) and opponents rushing average (3.1). Baltimore's 49 QB sacks were a 10-sack increase over 1998. The Ravens sent DE Michael McCrary, who finished with 11-1/2 QB sacks, to the Pro Bowl (one of four defensive players who were voted to the Pro Bowl).

Rex joined Brian Billick's staff as defensive line coach in 1999 after spending the 1998 season as Oklahoma's defensive coordinator. Rex joined the Sooners after spending two seasons as defensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati. He has used the "46" defense, created by his father, Buddy, throughout his coaching career. Oklahoma's defense ranked sixth in the nation in total defense. While at Cincinnati (1996-97), the defense ranked 5th and 13th in his two seasons.

"Rex is an extremely enthusiastic coach with NFL experience," said Brian Billick. "He's considered one of the best young defensive minds in the game today."

Ryan spent two seasons (1994 and '95) with the Arizona Cardinals, his first season coaching the defensive line and his second, the linebackers. In 1994, the Cardinals ranked in the NFL's top five in every defensive statistical category, including third in overall defense.

Before joining the NFL, Ryan was defensive coordinator at Morehead (KY) State from 1990-93. In 1989, Rex was assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at New Mexico Highlands. He started his collegiate coaching career as defensive ends coach at Eastern Kentucky in 1987.

STEVE SHAFER



Steve Shafer is in his 33rd year coaching, his second with the Ravens. Shafer is also the Ravens' assistant head coach and is responsible for helping head coach Brian Billick in various administrative roles. Last season, the Ravens sent Rod Woodson to his eighth Pro Bowl, his first with Baltimore and as a safety. He became the first player in NFL history to make the Pro Bowl as a safety, cornerback and kick returner. The defense ranked in the top two in five critical categories, including first in opponent's average passing yards per attempt (5.48). The secondary also set a team mark with 21 interceptions, with four going for touchdowns.

"I believe Steve is the most fundamentally-sound secondary coach in the NFL," said Billick. "His experience and background will prove an invaluable source for our players and other defensive coaches. Steve and I have known each other and shared football ideas for 25 years."

Before joining Billick's staff, Steve tutored the Carolina Panthers' defensive backs in 1998. The Panthers tied for fourth in the NFL that season with 19 interceptions. Steve coached the Oakland Raiders' secondary for three seasons (1995-97) after serving as defensive coordinator at San Diego State in 1994. He coached the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' defensive backs from 1991-93 and the Los Angeles Rams defensive backs from 1983-90.

Shafer launched his coaching career in 1968 at San Mateo (CA) Junior College, where he was defensive coordinator for five seasons before taking over as head coach for the 1973-74 seasons. He then coached defensive backs at San Diego State from 1975-82.

Matt Simon enters his second season as the Ravens' running backs' coach. Last year, Ravens' running backs did not fumble all season (431 carries) and averaged 4.1 yards per carry (10th in the NFL). Matt gets a boost to his arsenal with the addition of top pick Jamal Lewis of Tennessee (D5 '00) to add to his stable of young backs Priest Holmes, Jay Graham and fullback Chuck Evans.

Simon served as a coaching intern in the Denver Broncos' 1998 training camp. Matt was head coach at the University of North Texas (1994-97), when he was named AFCA region coach of the year in 1994 after the Mean Green won the Southland Conference Championship. The following season (1995), the football program moved up from I-AA to I-A.

He also won the 1994 Southland Conference Coach of the Year, the 1994 Black Coaches Association National Football Coach of the Year and the 1994 AFCA Region 4 Coach of the Year.

## JAMES HARRIS



James Harris, named to the post of director of pro personnel in February of '97, is assigned the role of securing football talent from the pro ranks. The Ravens signed unrestricted free agents TE Shannon Sharpe (Denver), CB Robert Bailey (Detroit), DT Sam Adams (Seattle) and QB Trent Dilfer (Tampa Bay) this past offseason. During his first two seasons with the Ravens, James brought DE Michael McCrary (1998 and 1999 Pro Bowl), DT Tony Siragusa and CB Rod Woodson (1999 Pro Bowl).

Harris spent four years with the New York Jets (1993-96) as the assistant general manager after scouting for six seasons for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1987-92). At the Jets, Harris specialized in the free agent recruiting process and brought players like Neil O'Donnell, Jumbo Elliott, David Williams, Jeff Graham, Frank Reich, Matt Brock and Erik Howard to New York. His responsibilities included evaluating college and pro talent, free agent and draft preparation, scouting combines and player signings.

A former pro quarterback, James played for three NFL teams: Buffalo Bills (1969-71), L.A. Rams (1972-76) and San Diego Chargers (1977-81). He was drafted in the eighth round by the Buffalo Bills (1969) out of Grambling.

During his 12-year career in the NFL as a quarterback, James passed for 8,136 yards and 45 touchdowns. He led the NFL with an 89.8 pass rating in 1976 and was named MVP of the 1975 Pro Bowl, rallying the NFC to a 14-13 victory with two touchdown passes. His best day came against Miami in 1976 with 17 completions in 29 attempts for 436 yards and two touchdowns.

Harris was coached by college football's winningest coach, Grambling's Eddie Robinson. The Tigers won back-to-back SWAC titles in 1967 and 1968. James was named MVP of the 1967 Orange Blossom Classic. He earned a bachelor's degree in education and was subsequently nominated as a distinguished alumnus for his contributions to American society during his NFL career. Harris, a legendary high school athlete in his hometown of Monroe, has been inducted into the SWAC Hall of Fame, the Grambling Athletic Hall of Fame and the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. Nicknamed "Shack," James attended Carroll (Monroe, LA) High School. He and his wife, Vicki, live in Owings Mills, MD.

## PHIL SAVAGE



Phil Savage is in his fifth season as director of college scouting and 10th year with Art Modell's franchise. Phil's promotion from the scouting ranks came with the team's move to Baltimore. Savage manages the team's college scouting department and, with his staff, coordinates the evaluation of hundreds of college prospects across the country.

In a recent survey conducted by *The Dallas Morning News*, the Ravens drafts over the last five years

has produced more Pro Bowlers (four) and a higher percentage of starters (38.5%) than any other NFL team. The survey also concluded that the Ravens have the highest percentage of drafted players still on the team (69.2%). The survey included the years 1996-99, the period of time that Phil has served as director of college scouting.

Last April, Savage and the scouting department, under the direction of Ozzie Newsome, selected RB Jamal Lewis of Tennessee and WR Travis Taylor of Florida with the fifth and 10th picks overall, then added QB Chris Redman of Louisville in the third round. The Ravens also selected G Richard Mercier (Miami), DE Adalius Thomas (Southern Mississippi) and Texas DL Cedric Woodard.

Since the 1996, the Ravens have drafted Pro Bowlers OT Jonathan Ogden (D1a, 1996), LB Ray Lewis (D1b, 1996), WR/PR Jermaine Lewis (D5, 1996) and LB Peter Boulware (D1, 1997). Other major contributors include LB Jamie Sharper (D2a, 1997), S Kim Herring (D2b, 1997), RB Jay Graham (D3, 1997), C Jeff Mitchell (D5, 1997), CB Duane Starks (D1, 1998), WR Patrick Johnson (D2, 1998), DT Martin Chase (D5a, 1998), OT Sammy Williams (D6b, 1998), CB Chris McAlister (D1, 1999), WR Brandon Stokley (D4a, 1999), OL Edwin Mulitalo (D4b, 1999) and S Anthony Poindexter (D7, 1999).

Phil joined Cleveland in '91, after a month-long stint as tight ends/running backs' coach for the San Antonio Riders of the World League (who were coached by current Chargers' head coach Mike Riley). His first three years with the Browns' coaching staff were spent as an assistant to former defensive coordinator Nick Saban (now head coach at LSU). The following year, Phil took on added duties in the personnel area when he began scouting college players, while continuing to break down coaching film and compiling scouting reports on upcoming opponents.

Savage, 35, launched his coaching career at the age of 21, when he served as a graduate assistant at Alabama under Bill Curry (current ESPN analyst) in 1987. From 1988-89, he coached the tight ends, including 12-year Giants' veteran Howard Cross. In 1990, Savage followed Alabama offensive coordinator Homer Smith to UCLA, where he coached tight ends, analyzed opponent game video and helped with administrative duties for the Bruins' offense. Savage worked under then-Bruins' head coach Terry Donahue, current 49ers Director of Player Personnel.

One of Phil's offseason projects includes holding a football skills camp for high school players in his hometown of Mobile, where Murphy H.S. (his alma mater) is located. Two of Phil's graduates are current NFLers: Steelers (D5, '00) and former Tennessee All-America QB Tee Martin, and Chargers (D4, '00) and former Auburn DL Leonardo Carson.

Savage, now competing in triathlons, played football and baseball at the University of the South (Sewanee, TN) and earned a B.A. in English. As a senior, he was selected as the school's Fellowship of Christian Athletes' Male Athlete of the Year. He received a master's in physical education from the University of Alabama. Phil, who is single, resides in Fairhope, AL.

Earnest Byner knows what it takes to endure in the NFL. Currently serving as the Ravens' Director of Player Development, Earnest retired after the 1997 season, and joined Art Modell's front office in 1998.

Earnest, known for his tough, determined preparation and play, played 14 seasons and finished his stellar career ranked 16th on the league's all-time rushing list with 8,261 yards on 2,095 carries and 56 TDs. He currently is ranked 18th entering 2000. He added 15 career receiving touchdowns and one TD on a recovered fumble for 72 total scores. Byner was originally selected in the 10th round (280th overall) of the 1984 draft by the Cleveland Browns. He recorded 20 career 100-yard games and usually saved his best for big games.

Based out of his Seattle home, Vince Newsome was recently promoted to West Coast College Supervisor. He scouts the West Coast for future NFL talent and helps evaluate free agent prospects for the pro personnel department during the free agency period. A former NFL standout defensive back for the Rams and Browns, Vince joined the Browns' personnel department after retiring from the league in the spring of '93. His retirement came on the heels of a diagnosis indicating a high-risk spinal condition. Newsome had been a valuable Plan B acquisition for the Browns prior to the '91 campaign.

Newsome, 39, played with Cleveland for two years prior to his retirement. He totaled 233 tackles for the Browns, leading the defense in '91 with 127 stops. KEVIN BYRNE




Kevin Byrne has been an integral part of the Modell organization for the last 19 years. "Kevin has earned respect around the league and among the reporters who cover the NFL. He has performed a wide variety of duties for us, and his responsibilities go well beyond the regular public relations functions," Modell said. Originally from Cleveland, Byrne currently directs the Ravens' public relations department. Byrne's activities for the franchise through the years have included contract negotiations, directing the team's marketing department and serving on committees to select and interview head coaching candidates.

Byrne coordinated with David Modell to start the team's television productions in Cleveland. The Browns were the first NFL team to produce their own preseason games and weekly TV shows. Byrne wrote most of the Browns' television shows over a six-year span. In 1977, his first year in the NFL, Byrne was named the league's youngest public relations director at that time for the St. Louis Cardinals. Two years later, he became the Director of Public Affairs for Trans World Airline (1979-80).

Prior to the NFL, from 1974-77, Byrne was sports information director at his alma mater, Marquette University. He worked with Al McGuire and the Warriors' 1977 NCAA basketball champions. Byrne's first job after graduation was Sports Information Director at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. Byrne earned a degree in journalism from Marquette University (1971), where he was selected to Alpha Sigma Nu, the National Jesuit Honor Society, and was a four-year member of the Warrior wrestling team. Kevin is a graduate of Lakewood (OH) St. Edward High School, where he is a board member and former chairman of the school's Board of Trustees. 
**Leigh Ann Curl, M.D.**

**Associate Team Physician**



**PRO:** A solid run-stopper, one of the best in the NFL, Sam Adams signed a four-year contract with the Ravens last April 17 as an unrestricted free agent from Seattle...Hard to block one-on-one, can drive linemen back to the quarterback quickly...Will add to a unit that led the NFL in fewest yards allowed per play (4.1) and second in average yards per rush allowed (3.1)...Originally a first-round choice in the 1994 draft by the Seahawks, Adams enters 2000 with 214 total tackles (167 solo), 23 QB sacks, 21 batted passes, an interception for a touchdown, a safety, four forced fumbles and three fumbles recovered...Has three career two-sack games (vs. Oakland, 11/24/96; vs. Oakland, 10/26/97; at New Orleans, 11/16/97)...His safety came 11/12/95 at Jacksonville and his lone TD came on a 25-yard interception return at Dallas, 11/22/98.

**1999:** Started 13 games for the Seahawks and finished with 38 tackles (31 solo), two QB sacks, a fumble recovery and two batted passes...Started the playoff game vs. Miami (1/9/00) and made four tackles and a QB sack...Had a career-high seven stops in the regular season finale at the N.Y. Ask Ravens' LB Cornell Brown if there's a sibling rivalry between he and his brother Ruben of the Bills and a big smile comes to his face. "There's always been a rivalry. This one's for bragging rights. We played against each other twice in college and I beat him twice." That was when Ruben played for the University of Pittsburgh and the younger Cornell starred at Virginia Tech. Last season's Bills at Ravens (10/31) matchup was their first meeting in an NFL game. Buffalo, behind a fourth-quarter rally, beat Baltimore, 13-10.

Ruben, 6'-3, 315 lbs., has made the Pro Bowl each of the last four seasons for the Bills. He was a first round pick in 1995. Cornell, the Ravens' sixth round selection in 1997, increased his playing time last season, averaging over 23 plays from scrimmage per game and starting five games. He has 34 career special teams' tackles in three years.

"We talk about twice a week," said Cornell. "We got our athletic ability from our mom (Oglessa) who was a pretty good basketball player." Ruben, Sr. and Oglessa Brown had two sons and two daughters and live in Lynchburg, VA. Both Ruben and Cornell starred at E.C. Glass High School in Lynchburg. They played together for two seasons in high school, but always played against each other in their younger days and in college.

"I remember as a kid, he was scared of the dark," said Cornell of his older brother. "We shared a room, and I used to try to scare him."

"Seriously, I'm proud of what he's accomplished," said Cornell of Ruben's four trips to Honolulu. "After all, he's my brother."






## KYLE RICHARDSON

On Friday, March 29, 1996, Baltimore's NFL team became the Ravens.

"In there stepped a stately Raven of the  
saintly days of yore;

Not the least obeisance made he; not a  
minute stopped or stayed he;

...Quoth the Raven, 'Nevermore.'"

According to *The Baltimore Sun*, a record-breaking 33,748 callers telephoned their vote in a fan poll.

"The name tested very well with the people of Baltimore in all of the studies we conducted and those polls done before we came here," said Ravens' President David Modell. "The name means something historically to the community."

The raven is a large (22-27 inches long), powerful bird known for its sleek black feathers that look almost purple in certain lighting. It's been described in various encyclopedias as a "strong, soaring flier able to perform acrobatics," and a "bird that is mentioned in myths and legends as magical" and a "soaring bird that can be taught to speak."

The three finalists in *The Sun* poll included the Ravens, Americans and Marauders. The tally was Ravens—22,463; Americans—5,635 and Marauders—5,650. The previous Sundial record of 14,249 calls was set in 1993, over a three-day period, when readers were asked to name a potential expansion NFL team and chose the name Ravens.

The Ravens lost the opening game of the 1999 season, 27-10, to the host St. Louis Rams. Rams' second-year QB Kurt Warner threw three TD passes, while completing 28 of 44 attempts for 316 yards. The loss spoiled the debut of Head Coach Brian Billick, and was Baltimore's third consecutive opening-day defeat. St. Louis opened the scoring on a Jeff Wilkins' 36-yard field goal in the first quarter. Matt Stover's 54-yard attempt to tie the game later in the first period was long enough, but hit the right upright. On the Rams' subsequent possession, LB Ray Lewis intercepted Warner and returned the ball a career-long 60 yards, but two plays later Ravens' QB Scott Mitchell was intercepted by S Todd Lyght, who then lateralled the ball to CB Taje Allen, and Allen gained another 36 yards. Ravens' Pro Bowl T Jonathan Ogden suffered a concussion below his hip trying to make the tackle, forcing him to leave the game (he was replaced by Spencer Ffolau at LT). Warner capitalized on the turnover by tossing a six-yard TD pass to TE Roland Williams for a 10-0 lead. Rookie CB Chris McAlister's interception on the Rams' next possession gave the Ravens a first-and-goal at the St. Louis six, but they could only manage a Stover 25-yard field goal. The Rams increased their lead to 17-3 at the half as Warner directed a 12-play, 83-yard drive, capped by Isaac Bruce's two-yard TD reception. The Ravens pulled to within a touchdown when Mitchell found rookie WR Brandon Stokley in the endzone to complete a 28-yard pass play. Early in the fourth quarter, a blitzing DeRon Jenkins forced a Warner fumble on a sack, and the fumble was recovered by Fernando Smith. But again, the Ravens could not capitalize on the turnover, as they were forced to settle for Stover's second 54-yard field goal attempt, which for the second time was wide right. On the following St. Louis possession, Wilkins booted a 51-yard field goal to increase the Rams' lead to 10 points, 20-10. After a Ravens' three-and-out, Warner directed an 86-yard drive in 10 plays, hitting rookie WR Torry Holt for a 20-yard TD pass with 2:40 remaining, to complete the scoring. LB Ray Lewis played a great game, totaling 14 solo unofficial tackles, the 60-yard interception and an eight-yard QB sack. Lewis also helped limit Rams' RB Marshall Faulk to 54 yards on 19 carries (2.8-yard avg.). Baltimore's Mitchell completed only 17 of 40 pass attempts for 188 yards, with one TD and two interceptions. He was sacked five times for 25 yards lost. Three different Ravens caught four passes apiece (Justin Armour, Qadry Ismail and Charles Evans). Armour gained 76 yards on his four catches for a 19.0-yard average. The Rams' Isaac Bruce led all receivers by grabbing eight passes for 92 yards.

Kris Brown kicked a 36-yard field goal as time expired to lift the Pittsburgh Steelers to a 23-20 win over the Ravens, spoiling the home debut of new Head Coach Brian Billick in front of 68,965 at PSINet Stadium. The game-winning kick was set up when Will Blackwell returned a Matt Stover kickoff to midfield after the Ravens had tied the score, 20-20, with 1:27 remaining. Pittsburgh QB Kordell Stewart completed his first two passes of the game-winning drive, 12 yards to Courtney Hawkins and 16 yards to Troy Edwards to set up Brown's field goal. The Ravens' game-tying score came on a Stoney Case to Qadry Ismail 19-yard TD strike with 1:22 remaining, to cap a six-play, 72-yard drive. Case, who replaced starting QB Scott Mitchell with 9:18 left in the third quarter, completed seven of 15 passes for 130 yards, one TD and no INTs for a 99.3 QB rating. He engineered two fourth-quarter scoring drives, the TD pass to Ismail and a Matt Stover 28-yard field goal. WR Justin Armour had key plays in both drives, catching a 17-yard Case pass on a fourth-and-one on Pittsburgh's 32 to set up Stover's field goal, and then grabbing a 26-yard pass on third-and-10 at the two minute warning. Three plays later, Ismail caught his game-tying pass over the middle from Case. The Steelers took a 7-0 first quarter lead when Kordell Stewart (18 of 27 for 138 yards, no TDs or INTs, plus 51 yards rushing on eight carries) scored on an eight-yard rush. The Ravens tied the score, 7-7, when RB Errict Rhett scored on a two-yard run with 1:39 left in the first quarter. On that drive, Rhett gained 46 of the Ravens' 80 yards, and he finished the day with 101 rushing yards on 22 carries. It was his first 100-yard game for the Ravens, ninth of his career, first since 1995 with Tampa Bay. Later in the second quarter, RB Richard Huntley scored on a 17-yard run around left end to cap a nine-play, 80-yard drive, but the Ravens countered with a Matt Stover 45-yard field goal to make the score 14-10 at half-time. Case entered the game for starter Scott Mitchell (seven of 16 for 48 yards, two INTs) in the Ravens' second possession of the second half. On his third pass attempt, Case was sacked by LB Carlos Emmons, fumbled and lost the ball to LB Levon Kirkland at the Ravens' 24-yard line. But the Baltimore defense limited the Steelers to a field goal and a 17-10 lead. The loss dropped the Ravens to 0-2, gave Pittsburgh a 2-0 mark and a 6-1 record overall vs. the Ravens.

QB Stoney Case, in his first start as a Raven, rushed for two TDs and RB Errict Rhett gained 113 yards on 22 carries as the Baltimore Ravens defeated the Cleveland Browns, 17-10, at PSINet Stadium. Case, who completed 12 of 25 passes for 165 yards, threw three interceptions. Browns' QB Tim Couch was 13 of 32 for 123 yards, with one touchdown and one interception. Rhett, who gained over 100 yards for the 10th time in his NFL career, cracked the century mark for the second consecutive game after gaining 101 yards on 22 carries vs. Pittsburgh in week two. The Ravens jumped to a 10-0 lead in the first half after a Matt Stover 44-yard field goal and Case's first TD run, a one-yard rollout around right end. That TD was set up when LB Peter Boulware sacked Couch and forced a fumble that was recovered by DE Michael McCrary on the Browns' one-yard line. Browns' LB Rahim Abdullah intercepted Case on the first play of the second half to set up a Phil Dawson 49-yard field goal that put the Browns on the board, 10-3. Three series later, Case hit Qadry Ismail on a 45-yard pass play to set up his second rushing TD from one-yard out, increasing the Ravens' lead to 17-3. Early in the fourth quarter, Couch flicked a short pass to RB Terry Kirby, who raced 61 yards, which led to a Couch to Kevin Johnson 11-yard TD play. Prior to the two-minute warning, a Couch pass intended for Johnson was intercepted by rookie CB Chris McAlister, and Baltimore converted two first downs to run out the clock for the win. The Ravens' defense held Cleveland to 189 total net yards, including a Ravens' defensive record 89 yards passing. Peter Boulware recorded two sacks, Michael McCrary and Ray Lewis one apiece.

Stoney Case threw a dramatic 54-yard touchdown pass to Justin Armour two minutes and 29 seconds into overtime to lift the Ravens to a 19-13 win in the Georgia Dome. The Ravens trailed 13-3 late in the third quarter, but scored the game's final 16 points for the victory. The comeback started when Case connected with Patrick Johnson on a 52-yard touchdown pass with 1:33 remaining in the third quarter to make the score 13-10, Falcons. On Atlanta's next possession, DE Rob Burnett forced a Byron Hanspard fumble and Kim Herring recovered on the Falcons' 35, leading to Matt Stover's 26-yard field goal to tie the score at 13-13. Atlanta had a chance to take the lead inside the two-minute warning, but a holding penalty on Bob Whitfield knocked the Falcons back from the Ravens 26 to the 36, forcing a punt instead of a potential game-winning field goal attempt. The Falcons won the toss in overtime and elected to receive, but were forced to punt after three pass plays, including two incompletions. The Ravens took over on their own 36 after the punt, and on their third play, Case found Armour wide open over the middle and hit him in stride for the game-winner. Case completed 13 of 27 passes for 192 yards, but threw touchdown passes of 52 and 54 yards. RB Erric Rhett rushed for 136 yards on 27 carries, his third consecutive 100-yard game, and a personal high. Qadry Ismail led the Ravens with six receptions for 65 yards. The Baltimore defense forced and recovered three fumbles, and DE Fernando Smith recovered a team-record two. Smith also recorded a QB sack. LB Peter Boulware had a sack to increase his league lead to five. Atlanta's starting QB, Tony Graziani, was knocked out of the game on a Ray Lewis blitz halfway through the second quarter, and was replaced by Danny Kanell. Kanell completed a 30-yard shovel pass to Jammi German for Atlanta's lone touchdown in the third quarter. The Ravens did not turn the ball over for the first time all season. The victory evened Baltimore's record at 2-2, while the defending NFC Champion Falcons fell to 0-4.

The Ravens dropped a hard-fought divisional game in Nashville to the Tennessee Titans, 14-11, before 65,486 fans in Adelphia Coliseum. The Ravens' offense managed just three Matt Stover field goals, yet the defense kept Baltimore in the game to the end. The loss extended Tennessee's 10-game winning streak vs. the AFC Central and snapped Baltimore's two-game winning streak. The Ravens opened the scoring when Stover kicked a 44-yard field goal with 6:53 left in the first quarter, but the Titans countered with a Lorenzo Neal one-yard TD run. Stover kicked a 46-yarder early in the second quarter to cut the score to 7-6. The Ravens took the lead in the third quarter when Stover kicked a 50-yard field goal, but Tennessee answered back with a touchdown pass from Neil O'Donnell (24 of 35 for 216 yards, one TD) to Yancey Thigpen to take a 14-9 lead. Late in the third quarter P Kyle Richardson pinned the Titans at their own one-yard line. On the next play, LB Ray Lewis tackled RB Rodney Thomas in the endzone for a safety. Thigpen led all receivers with 99 yards on five receptions. For Baltimore, Jermaine Lewis caught four passes for 58 yards and Patrick Johnson caught four for 57. Stoney Case finished the game 15 of 37 for 207 yards, with no TDs or INTs. RB Erriq Rhett was held to 59 yards on 21 carries, snapping a three-game string of 100-yard games. Tennessee's Eddie George was held to 55 yards on 20 carries. The Titans were flagged 15 times for an NFL-record 212 yards.

The Ravens fell to 2-4 after losing a Thursday night special to the visiting Kansas City Chiefs, 35-8, in front of 68,771 at PSINet Stadium and a national television audience. The Chiefs intercepted three Stoney Case passes including two for touchdowns. Despite gaining just 218 yards, the Kansas City offense played well enough to win, as QB Elvis Grbac found TE Tony Gonzalez twice for touchdowns, an 11-yarder in the second quarter and a 22-yarder to start a 21-point fourth quarter. The Ravens' lone touchdown came on an Errict Rhett two-yard run with four minutes left in the game. That score was set up on a Cris Dishman 35-yard pass interference penalty. Kansas City took a 7-0 lead into the third quarter when James Hasty stepped in front of a Case pass intended for Justin Armour and raced 56 yards for a touchdown to give the Chiefs a 14-0 lead. Gonzales' second touchdown pushed the Kansas City lead to 21-0 in the fourth quarter. Baltimore's next possession resulted in another Kansas City defensive score when LB Donnie Edwards picked Case off at the Ravens' 49-yard line, then lateralled to S Reggie Tongue, who raced 46-yard for a TD and a 28-0 Kansas City cushion. After Rhett's TD put Baltimore on the board, ex-Raven Bam Morris, who was the game's leading rusher with 70 yards on 16 carries, scored on a one-yard run to complete the scoring. The 21 fourth-quarter points by the Chiefs tied for the most-ever in the fourth quarter against the Ravens (21 on 10/5/97 by Pittsburgh).

Doug Flutie threw a five-yard touchdown pass to FB Jonathan Linton with 1:44 remaining to propel the visiting Buffalo Bills to a 13-10 win over the Ravens at PSINet Stadium. Flutie's pass capped a drive that was extended when the scrambling quarterback gained 17 yards on a fourth-and-15 from the Ravens' 39-yardline. The Ravens took a 10-3 lead into the fourth quarter, but the final period turned into a horror show this Halloween, as two turnovers led to 10 Buffalo points. The Bills converted a Tony Banks interception by Kurt Schulz into a Steve Christie 40-yard field goal. On Baltimore's subsequent possession, LB Gabe Northern caused a Banks fumble that LB Sam Rogers recovered at Baltimore's 45 to initiate Flutie's game-winning drive. The Ravens opened the scoring on a Banks to Justin Armour seven-yard TD pass. Later in the opening period, rookie CB Chris McAlister intercepted a Flutie pass to set up a Matt Stover 37-yard field goal and a 10-0 Ravens' lead. McAlister's interception was one of three in the game for the Ravens, as Rod Woodson and Duane Starks also picked off Flutie passes. The Bills managed a 25-yard field goal late in the second quarter to make the score 10-3 at halftime. RB Errict Rhett had a game-high 73 rushing yards on 24 carries, while Buffalo's Andre Reed led all receivers with seven receptions for 76 yards. P Kyle Richardson pinned the Bills inside-the-20 four times. Flutie completed 18 of 40 passes for 155 yards, one TD and three INTs for a 32.8 QB rating. Banks was 13 of 34 for 129 yards, with one TD and one INT (plus a lost fumble) for a 47.3 QB rating. Both quarterbacks were sacked three times.

The Ravens scored the most convincing victory in their brief history with a 41-9 win over the host Cleveland Browns. Baltimore scored in each quarter and set several team scoring records in the win over Cleveland, including most points scored, fewest points allowed, largest margin of victory and most rushing touchdowns. RB Errict Rhett rushed for 117 yards and two scores. QB Tony Banks threw a 28-yard TD pass to Qadry Ismail, back-up QB Stoney Case rushed for a 20-yard TD and S Rod Woodson raced 66 yards for a score on an interception return. The Ravens' defense allowed just one touchdown (a fourth quarter Ty Detmer pass to Terry Kirby with five minutes remaining) and limited the Browns to 159 total yards. The Ravens scored on the opening drive for the first time this season as Banks marched the offense 73 yards in 12 plays, capped by a Rhett 11-yard TD rush. The Browns countered with a Phil Dawson 25-yard field goal that was set up after a Jermaine Lewis muffed punt return. The Browns then successfully attempted an onside kick, but CB Duane Starks intercepted a Tim Couch pass in the endzone to thwart the Browns' scoring threat. Banks, who finished with 129 yards passing while completing 14 of 25 passes, marched the Ravens 80 yards in 10 plays and found WR Qadry Ismail open on a 28-yard scoring play. Matt Stover kicked a 28-yard field goal at the end of the first half for a 17-3 Baltimore lead. In the third quarter, Rhett broke loose for a 52-yard TD rush that was the longest rushing touchdown in team history, the longest in his career, and propelled him over the 100-yard mark for the fourth time this season and the 12th time in his career. In the fourth quarter, Stover kicked a 44-yard field goal and then Woodson stepped in front of a Ty Detmer pass and raced 66 yards for a touchdown to give the Ravens a 34-3 lead. The Ravens lost a tough defensive battle, 6-3, to the Jacksonville Jaguars before 67,391 fans at ALLTEL Stadium. Jacksonville entered the game ranked number one in defense, while the Ravens came in at number two, and both teams lived up to their billing (after the game, these two teams were tied for first in total defense). The game was the lowest scoring game in Ravens' and Jaguars' history. The Ravens held the Jaguars to 132 total yards, including 47 yards rushing and 85 yards passing. The Ravens sacked QB Mark Brunell six times for 33 yards, and Jacksonville's longest play was 12 yards. The high-powered Jaguars' averaged just 2.2 yards per offensive play. After a scoreless first quarter, Mike Hollis kicked a 28-yard field goal that was set up when Kyle Richardson's punt was blocked by Dave Thomas, giving the Jaguars the ball on the Ravens' 14. Matt Stover booted a 23-yard field goal at the end of the first half to knot the score, 3-3. At halftime, QB Tony Banks (10 of 21 for 73 yards) suffered an ankle injury that knocked him out of the game for most of the second quarter, and he was replaced by Stoney Case, who was seven of 12 for 103 yards before Banks returned to start the second half. The Jaguars lost RB Fred Taylor with a strained hamstring late in the first quarter. Hollis kicked his second field goal, from 28 yards, in the third quarter in what was to be the final score of the game. Midway through the fourth quarter, a 41-yard field goal attempt by Hollis was wide right. It was his third straight attempt following two consecutive penalty plays (and both kicks were good). Banks drove Baltimore to the Jaguars' 34-yard line, but an incomplete pass on third down and a QB scramble for no gain preserved the win for the 8-1 Jaguars, and dropped the Ravens' record to 3-6. Field position was a huge factor in the game, as the Ravens average drive start was their own 19 and Jacksonville's average drive start was their own 44-yard line. Seven of Baltimore's 13 drives started inside their own 15-yard line, while Jacksonville started seven of its 12 drives from their 40-yard line or beyond. Ten different Ravens caught passes, a team record, and two players, WR Justin Armour (calf) and FB Chuck Evans (triceps), left the game with injuries and did not return.

Matt Stover kicked a 50-yard field goal as time expired to lift the Ravens to a wild 34-31 win over the Bengals in Baltimore's final Cinergy Field appearance. The Ravens scored 31 unanswered points after the Bengals had jumped to 14-0 first quarter lead, tying the largest comeback in franchise history. But Cincinnati answered by scoring 17 consecutive points in the second half to tie the game, 31-31, on a Doug Pelfrey 19-yard field goal. Pelfrey's field goal followed a goal line stand by the Ravens' defense after Cincinnati had a first-and-goal at the Ravens' one following a pass interference penalty. Banks then marched the Ravens 37 yards in 11 plays to set-up Stover's game-winning field goal. Stover entered the game six of 18 on 50+ yard field goals, including one for four this season. The Bengals jumped to a quick 14-0 lead on Jeff Blake TD passes to Carl Pickens (seven yards) and Darnay Scott (23 yards). Stover kicked a 25-yard field goal to put the Ravens on the board, then QB Tony Banks found H-B Greg DeLong on a two-yard scoring play, DeLong's first career touchdown, to end the half with Cincinnati ahead, 14-10. The Ravens then exploded for three consecutive touchdowns, all within four minutes, in the third quarter. The outburst followed a Doug Pelfrey 39-yard field goal that was blocked by DE Keith Washington, who had just entered the game after a rib injury to Rob Burnett on Pelfrey's initial attempt, which was negated due to a false start penalty. On the Ravens' subsequent possession, Banks hit Billy Davis on a 73-yard pass play (the longest play of the season) to set up an Errict Rhett two-yard TD run. Rod Woodson then recorded his 50th career interception and fourth in his career vs. Blake. Four plays later, Banks hit WR Patrick Johnson on a 25-yard scoring play for a 24-14 Ravens' lead. On Cincinnati's second play of their next possession, CB Duane Starks intercepted a pass intended for Pickens and raced 43 yards for a touchdown for a seemingly comfortable 31-14 Ravens' lead. But the Bengals roared back as Blake hit Darnay Scott for a 15-yard TD pass at the end of the third quarter. With 9:09 left in the fourth quarter, PR Craig Yeast raced 86 yards for a TD on a punt return, the longest-ever against the Ravens, to make the score 31-28. Pelfrey's 19-yard field goal tied the game at 31 with 1:50 left in the game, setting up Banks' game-winning drive and Stover's game-winning kick as time expired. Banks finished the game with 274 yards passing while completing 24 of 40 passes, including two TDs and an interception. He was sacked seven times for 49 yards. Blake was 20 of 39 for 246 yards, with three TDs and two INTs. He was sacked just once (on a scramble out of bounds). The Bengals were penalized 15 times for 127 yards. The victory was Baltimore's third straight over Cincinnati and ended their three-game road swing at 2-1.

The Jacksonville Jaguars scored 23 fourth quarter points to win their NFL-best 10th game of the season, 30-23, against the Ravens in Baltimore. The Ravens held a 16-7 lead entering the fourth quarter when Jaguars' QB Mark Brunell led an eight-play, 64 yard drive, capped by a one-yard scoring pass to Keenan McCardell to make the score 16-14. On the first play of the Ravens' next possession, DE Tony Brackens intercepted a Tony Banks' pass and returned it 21 yards for a touchdown to put the Jaguars ahead, 22-16, after a two-point conversion (Brunell to McCardell). Brackens had a huge day, scoring a TD on an interception, forcing a fumble, and recovering a fumble. The Ravens came back to take a 23-22 lead when FB Charles Evens caught a three-yard scoring pass from Banks that was set up by a Jermaine Lewis 46-yard reception on third down and 10. Brunell then marched Jacksonville's offense 78 yards in 12 plays, ending when RB James Stewart scored on a four-yard rush (plus another two-point conversion - Brunell to Jimmy Smith). Stewart's score was the first rushing TD allowed by the Ravens in 19 quarters. The winning drive was kept alive when Brunell hit McCardell on a four-yard pass on fourth-down and one from the Ravens' 34. Baltimore's final drive ended when Banks was sacked by Kevin Hardy, forcing a fumble that Brackens recovered deep in Baltimore territory. The Ravens built a 10-0 first-quarter lead on an Erriett Rhett 20-yard TD pass from Banks and Matt Stover's 46-yard field goal. Banks (17 of 34 for 214 yards, two TDs, one INT, two fumbles, 77.3 QB rating) was hit by Brackens and fumbled on the first play of the second quarter. Brunell then led the Jaguars 85 yards in nine plays to make the score 10-7 after he found WR Jimmy Smith on an eight-yard scoring play. Smith caught 10 passes for 132 yards and a score, while Keenan McCardell caught eight for 102 yards and a TD. Stover kicked his second field goal (a 31-yarder) to make the score 13-7 at halftime. Stover's third field goal came at the end of the third quarter when his 33-yard attempt was good. The loss was Baltimore's eighth against Jacksonville in as many tries, and was the sixth time that the game was decided by a TD or less. The Ravens dropped to 4-7 on the year.

The Ravens scored a convincing 41-14 home victory over the Tennessee Titans behind four Tony Banks touchdown passes. Banks' performance set a career high and tied a Ravens' record held by Vinny Testaverde. The victory snapped a 13-game winning streak by the Titans against the AFC Central. The 41 points matched a franchise high in points scored, set Nov. 7 at Cleveland. The Ravens' offense executed six plays over 20 yards, including three over 50 and two over 70 yards. Baltimore gained 447 yards, tied for fourth-most in Ravens' history, and the second-highest in non-overtime games. RB Priest Holmes rushed for 100 yards on only nine carries, including a team-record 72-yard run in the second quarter. Holmes had replaced starting RB Errict Rhett, who left the game with bruised ribs. WR Qadry Ismail recorded the Ravens' first 100-yard receiving game of 1999, grabbing five passes for 113 yards. WR Jermaine Lewis caught two TD passes, his first two of the season, and Patrick Johnson scored on a 76-yard catch and run. Johnson strained his right calf on the play and did not return. The final blow came in the fourth quarter, when S Rod Woodson raced 47 yards for a touchdown on his 52nd career interception. It was Woodson's ninth TD on an interception in his career, tying him with Ken Houston for most in NFL history. DE Michael McCrary had three and one-half sacks. The Titans opened the scoring in the first quarter on an Al Del Greco 39-yard field goal. With 3:24 left in the opening quarter, Banks found Patrick Johnson on the near sideline, and after two Tennessee defenders collided, Johnson limped on an injured calf the remaining yardage for a TD. On Baltimore's next possession Banks capped a nine-play, 61-yard drive with a six-yard TD pass to Jermaine Lewis. It was Lewis' first TD of the season and first of two in the game. Eddie George scored on a three-yard rush on the Titans' next possession to cap a nine-play, 76-yard drive, and Tennessee's two-point conversion was successful to make the score 14-11. On the first play of the Ravens' next drive, Holmes raced 72 yards to Tennessee's six, to set up a Matt Stover 21-yard field goal. Del Greco's 33-yard field goal at the end of the second quarter made the score 17-14. Baltimore, at halftime. A 40-yard pass interference penalty on S Blaine Bishop set up a Banks to Justin Armour one-yard TD pass midway through the third quarter to give the Ravens a 24-14 lead. On the Titans' next drive, CB Chris McAlister intercepted a Steve McNair pass intended for Kevin Dyson in the endzone. Stover's second field goal made the score 27-14 early in the fourth quarter, then Banks found Lewis in the endzone on a 39-yard pass play for a 34-14 lead. On the Titans' next possession, Rod Woodson picked off McNair's pass intended for Dyson at the Tennessee 47 and raced untouched into the endzone for the final score of the day.

Qadry Ismail amassed 258 receiving yards on six catches, three for touchdowns, as the Ravens defeated the Pittsburgh Steelers, 31-24, their first-ever victory at Three Rivers Stadium. In fact, the Modell franchise had not won at Three Rivers Stadium since 1989, a span of 10 games (including one playoff game). The win was Baltimore's fourth in six games, all division games, and improved their overall record to 6-7. The six wins matched the Ravens' victory total of each of the last two seasons, with three games remaining. Ismail, who scored touchdowns of 54, 59 and 76 yards, set a team yardage mark and the NFL's single-game yardage mark in 1999. In fact, Ismail's yardage total was the 11th-best in NFL history and the most since Jerry Rice gained 289 yards for San Francisco vs. Minnesota on Dec. 18, 1995. It was only the NFL's second 250+ receiving yardage game of the 1990s. With his performance, Ismail became the sixth player in NFL history with at least 250 receiving yards and three touchdowns in a game. Ismail's three receiving TDs tied Michael Jackson's team record, set on 12/22/96 vs. Houston. The Steelers opened the scoring on their first possession when Hines Ward caught a 21-yard Jerome Bettis touchdown pass on a halfback option play. Priest Holmes, who gained 130 yards on 18 carries, raced 64 yards for a touchdown on Baltimore's first possession, the longest touchdown run in team history, to tie the score, 7-7. Kris Brown kicked a 31-yard field goal to put Pittsburgh back on top, 10-7, and then Matt Stover countered with a 19-yarder early in the second quarter to tie the game again, 10-10. The third quarter belonged to Ismail and QB Tony Banks, as Banks found Ismail for long touchdowns on three straight possessions. In the third quarter alone, Ismail had four catches for 210 yards and three TDs. After 54, 59 and 76-yard touchdowns, the Ravens had built a 31-17 lead heading into the fourth quarter. The Steelers scored a final touchdown with 2:45 remaining in the game when Mike Tomczak threw an 11-yard TD pass to Kordell Stewart. Banks completed only eight passes on the day, but three went for touchdowns. Holmes recorded his second straight 100-yard game and sixth of his career. The Ravens improved to 6-0 when Holmes gains 100 yards. The Ravens sacked Tomczak five times (two each by Tony Siragusa and Rob Burnett, plus one by Larry Webster) and the defense held Jerome Bettis to 39 yards on 13 carries.

Tony Banks threw three TD passes and the Ravens' defense shutdown the Saints offense as Baltimore throttled visiting New Orleans, 31-8. The victory was Baltimore's third straight and evened its record at 7-7. The Ravens' defense intercepted four passes, tying a team record, and permitted a team record-low 11 rushing yards and eight total first downs. The Ravens took a 24-0 lead into the fourth quarter before New Orleans scored its first and only touchdown, a 20-yard Keith Poole TD reception from QB Billy Joe Tolliver. The Ravens opened the scoring in the first quarter with a Matt Stover 36-yard field goal, his 11th straight successful attempt. Banks then hit RB Priest Holmes on a perfect 34-yard pass play for a 10-0 lead early in the second quarter. It was Holmes' first career receiving touchdown. Banks later directed a 10-play, 82-yard drive and found Justin Armour in the back of the endzone for a six-yard TD pass with 35 seconds remaining in the first half for a 17-0 Baltimore lead. Banks was intercepted twice in the third quarter, but the Ravens defense forced a "three-and-out" following both turnovers and the score remained 17-0 until early in the fourth quarter when Banks threw a perfect strike in stride to WR Qadry Ismail for a 47-yard TD and a 24-0 lead. Ismail caught seven passes for 115 yards to surpass the 1,000-yard barrier for the first time in his career. It was Ismail's team-record third consecutive 100-yard game and gave him 486 yards in his last three games. After Poole's 20-yard reception spoiled the bid for a shutout, the defense atoned when S Corey Harris raced 24 yards on an interception return for a touchdown with 1:49 remaining in the game.

The Ravens' defense shut out the potent Cincinnati Bengals and Matt Stover kicked five field goals as Baltimore defeated visiting Cincinnati, 22-0. The defense intercepted two Jeff Blake passes, including a touchdown saving 'pick' in the endzone by CB Duane Starks, and Keith Washington blocked a field goal in Cincinnati's only two possessions that penetrated the red zone. The shutout was the first in team history and propelled the Ravens to their club record fourth straight win and eighth on the season. While the Ravens did their part to stay in the playoff picture, the Buffalo Bills defeated the New England Patriots 13-10 in overtime to officially eliminate the red-hot Ravens from postseason contention. The Ravens only touchdown of the game came with 3:14 left in the first quarter, when Errict Rhett caught a two-yard Tony Banks pass to cap an eight-play, 47-yard drive. Matt Stover then kicked field goals of 24 and 48 yards on successive drives in the second quarter for a 13-0 lead. S Rod Woodson then picked off Blake with 1:25 left in the half, setting up Stover's third field goal of the quarter and a 16-0 halftime lead. The interception was Woodson's seventh of the season, his fifth career theft vs. Blake and the 54th in his career, tying him with Willie Brown for 16th on the NFL's all-time interception list. The Bengals put together a serious scoring threat late in the third quarter and into the fourth by marching 94 yards in 21 plays, but DE Keith Washington blocked Doug Pelfrey's 20-yard field goal attempt. The Ravens countered with a 14-play, 68-yard drive capped by Stover's fourth three-pointer (and 200th of his career), a 30-yarder to give the Ravens a 19-0 lead with 7:06 left in the game. DE Michael McCrary recorded his third sack of the game on a fourth down and three play from the Bengals' 35 to set up a Stover 19-yard field goal. That was Matt's fifth of the game, tying his single-game career high and giving him 16 points on the day and 113 on the season.

The Ravens ended their season at 8-8 after losing on the road in Foxboro to the New England Patriots, 20-3. New England's return units gave them excellent field position and the Ravens turned the ball over four times, including a Tony Banks fumble that ex-Raven Chad Eaton returned 23 yards for a touchdown. The loss ended a four-game winning streak for Baltimore and evened its' 1999 road record at 4-4. The Ravens scored first when Matt Stover kicked a 19-yard field goal in the second quarter, extending his consecutive field goal streak to 18. But the KOR unit permitted a 49-yard kickoff return by Troy Brown and Adam Vinatieri tied the score, 3-3. After a three-and-out, Brown then returned a Kyle Richardson punt 52 yards to the Ravens' 23-yard line. Five plays later, QB Drew Bledsoe threw a one-yard TD pass to TE Mike Bartrum for a 10-3 lead. Bledsoe then led a 22-yard drive in seven plays and Vinatieri kicked a 51-yard field goal as time expired in the first half for a 13-3 New England lead. Midway through the third quarter, Ted Johnson sacked Tony Banks, forcing a fumble that was scooped up by Eaton and returned 23 yards for a score and a 20-3 New England lead. On the Ravens next possession, Banks marched the Ravens to the New England 11, but a pass intended for TE AJ Ofofodile into the endzone was intercepted by Kato Serwanga. Banks, who completed 18 of 26 passes for 163 yards, strained his left knee and was replaced by backup Stoney Case in the fourth quarter. Case completed eight of 14 passes for 88 yards and an interception. WR Patrick Johnson set career highs with nine receptions for 114 yards, and RB Priest Holmes gained 95 yards on 16 carries, plus caught six passes for 43 yards. Bledsoe was 15 of 25 for 108 yards, with one TD and one INT (by rookie Chris McAlister). In all, the Ravens out-gained the Patriots, 313 yards to 151, had 23 first downs to New England's 12 and held a 33:14 to 26:46 time of possession advantage. But Troy Brown's returns (avg. 17.5 yards on four punt returns and 51.5 yards on two kickoff returns) and the turnovers proved too costly for the Ravens.



## HISTORY OF PRO FOOTBALL IN BALTIMORE

*Note: The following chronology outlines historical highlights of the AAFC and NFL teams based in Baltimore and reflects history while those teams were in Baltimore only.*

**December 28, 1946** Baltimore was awarded the bankrupt Miami Seahawks franchise of the All-America Football Conference. The team was renamed Colts via a fan contest. Bob Rodenberg heads the purchasing group.

**September 7, 1947** The Colts won their first-ever AAFC game over the Brooklyn Dodgers, 16-7, in front of 27,418 fans at Baltimore Stadium with Cecil Isbell as head coach. The Colts finish 2-11-1, drawing just under 200,000 fans.

**April 28, 1948** The Colts reorganized, with over 200 stockholders. Jake Embry was named president and Walt Driskill was named general manager.

**December 12, 1948** The Colts lose their first-ever playoff game, 28-17, against visiting Buffalo in a game marked by near riots after both teams finished tied for the Eastern Division title with 7-7 marks. Attendance totaled 244,502.

**February 24, 1949** Walt Driskill was named president and general manager, with Robert C. Embry becoming vice-chairman of the board.

**Fall, 1949** Isbell fired after four games and Driskill was named head coach. Colts finished 1-11.

**December 8, 1949** AAFC and NFL reached merger agreement. The Colts entered the NFL for 1950 season.

**December 18, 1949** Abraham Watner was named Colts' president.

**December 19, 1950** Under head coach Clem Crowe, the Colts finished 1-11 in their first NFL season with a 15-14 loss to the New York Yanks at Yankee Stadium. The Yanks will later become the Baltimore Colts.

**January 18, 1951** Watner withdrew the franchise due to financial distress and received \$50,000 for his players by the NFL.

**1951 and 1952** No Colts team existed.

**December 3, 1952** Commissioner Bert Bell challenged Baltimore to sell 15,000 tickets in six weeks to re-enter NFL. The ticket drive reached its quota in four weeks, three days.

**January, 1953** Carroll Rosenbloom headed an ownership group and Baltimore was awarded the Dallas Texan franchise. Don Kellett was named president and Keith Molesworth head coach.

**March 25, 1953** Baltimore and Cleveland put together one of the largest trades in sports' history, with the Browns trading 10 players to the Colts for five players.

**September 27, 1953** The Colts upset the Chicago Bears, 13-9, in the NFL opener at Memorial Stadium.

**Spring, 1954** Weeb Ewbank was named head coach.

**December 28, 1958** The Colts defeated the New York Giants, 23-17, in Yankee Stadium in "sudden death" for the World Championship. This game sparked the emergence of the NFL as a televised sports giant.

**December 27, 1959** The Colts won their second straight World Championship, again over the Giants, in Baltimore, 31-16.

**December 11, 1960** The Rams snapped an NFL-record 47-game consecutive TD pass streak by Johnny Unitas.

**January 8, 1963** Don Shula replaced Weeb Ewbank as head coach. Gino Marchetti and Bill Pellington were named player-coaches.

**January 20, 1964** Carroll Rosenbloom purchased the remaining shares of the club to gain 100% ownership.

**December 13, 1964** Raymond Berry caught his 506th career pass and Lenny Moore scored his 20th touchdown of the season against Washington, both NFL records at the time.

**December 27, 1964** The Browns defeated the Colts, 27-0, in Cleveland for the NFL title. Art Modell wins his first NFL title, with Blanton Collier as head coach.

**December 26, 1965** The Packers beat the Colts, 13-10 in "sudden death" playoff for the Western Conference title. Tom Matte quarterbacked the club with plays written on his wristband, subbing for injured QBs Johnny Unitas and Gary Cuozzo.

**June 8, 1966** The National Football League and the American Football League announced plans to merge in 1970. The Colts, Browns and Steelers would later join the AFC in the NFL's realignment.

**March 17, 1967** Harry Hulmes, Colts' publicity director, was named general manager, succeeding Joe Campanella, who passed away on February 15 after 23 days in the GM capacity.

**November 5, 1967** The Colts defeated the World Champion Packers, 13-10, snapping a five-game losing streak to Green Bay.

**August 3, 1968** Art Donovan became the first Colt inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

**December 29, 1968** The Colts shut out the Browns, 34-0, for the NFL Championship. Earlier, the Colts had defeated Green Bay, 16-3, and Minnesota, 24-14, for the Western Conference crown.

**January 12, 1969** The Jets defeated the Colts, 16-7, in Super Bowl III at the Orange Bowl after Joe Namath "guarantees" a New York victory.

**April 3, 1970** Don Shula resigned to become head coach of the Miami Dolphins and was succeeded by Don McCafferty. In January, Don Klosterman was named general manager.

**September 20, 1970** The Colts beat San Diego, 16-14, to win first AFC game in the newly realigned NFL.

**December 13, 1970** The Colts clinched their first AFC Eastern Division title with a 20-14 win at Buffalo.

**December 26, 1970** The Colts beat Cincinnati, 17-0, in divisional playoff game.

**January 3, 1971** The Colts beat the Oakland Raiders, 27-17, to win the AFC championship.

**January 17, 1971** Jim O'Brien kicked a 32-yard field goal with five seconds to play as the Colts won Super Bowl V over Dallas, 16-13, in the first-ever AFC-NFC Super Bowl.

**January 2, 1972** Miami beat Baltimore, 21-0 in the AFC title game. The Colts had defeated Cleveland, 20-3, in the AFC playoffs to advance to the conference championship.

**July 26, 1972** Robert Irsay acquired the Colts from Carroll Rosenbloom in exchange for the Los Angeles Rams. Joe Thomas was named general manager.

**July 29, 1972** Gino Marchetti was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

**October 16, 1972** John Sandusky replaced Don McCafferty as head coach after the fifth game of the season.

**February 14, 1973** Howard Schnellenberger was named head coach.

**July 28, 1973** Raymond Berry and Jim Parker were inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

**September 29, 1974** Joe Thomas replaced Howard Schnellenberger as head coach.

**January 15, 1975** Ted Marchibroda was named head coach.

**August 2, 1975** Lenny Moore was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

**December 21, 1975** Colts won the first of three straight AFC East Division crowns by defeating New England, 34-21, at Memorial Stadium. The season capped the greatest turnaround in NFL history (at that time), as Marchibroda led the Colts to a 10-4 mark after the team was 2-12 in 1974.

**December 12, 1976** The Colts won their second straight AFC East crown by defeating Buffalo, 58-20, in last home game of regular season.

**January 25, 1977** Dick Szymanski was named general manager and Ernie Accorsi assistant general manager.

**December 18, 1977** The Colts won their third straight AFC East title with a 30-24 win over New England that featured a 99-yard game-winning TD drive, longest in team history.

**July 28, 1979** Johnny Unitas was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, a year after Weeb Ewbank.

**January 16, 1980** Mike McCormack was named head coach, replacing Ted Marchibroda.

**December 21, 1981** Frank Kush was named head coach.

**May 16, 1982** Ernie Accorsi was named general manager.

**April 26, 1983** The Colts selected John Elway with the first pick in the NFL draft, but traded him on May 2 to Denver for OT Chris Hinton, QB Mark Herrmann and Denver's top pick in 1984.

**December 18, 1983** In the last NFL regular season game in Memorial Stadium - until 1996 - the Colts beat the Houston Oilers, 20-10. TE Pat Beach scored the last TD of the game on a 12-yard pass from Mike Pagel.

**March 28, 1984** The Colts' franchise relocated to Indianapolis.

## RAVENS' HISTORY

**November 6, 1995** The Cleveland Browns announced their intention to move to Baltimore for the 1996 season.

**February 9, 1996** NFL approved franchise move.

**February 15, 1996** Ted Marchibroda was named Baltimore's head coach exactly 21 years and one month to the date he was hired by the then-Baltimore Colts.

**March 29, 1996** Baltimore's NFL franchise was officially named the Ravens after a *Baltimore Sun* telephone poll received a record number of calls supporting the name Ravens.

**April 1, 1996** The Ravens opened operations at the Owings Mills training facility with the start of the offseason program.

**April 20, 1996** The Ravens selected UCLA offensive lineman Jonathan Ogden with their first-ever draft choice (fourth overall). University of Miami linebacker Ray Lewis was selected with the second pick in the first round (26th overall).

**May 16, 1996** Ravens announced season ticket and personal seat license policies in a press conference at Memorial Stadium.

**June 5, 1996** Ravens unveiled their new logo, colors and uniforms in a fashion show at Harborplace.

**June 14, 1996** The Ravens sold over 50,000 season tickets in 14 days.

**September 1, 1996** The Ravens first-ever regular season game is played before 64,124 fans at Memorial Stadium, the largest crowd in Baltimore's professional sports history. QB Vinny Testaverde scores the first touchdown on a nine-yard run to propel the Ravens to a 19-14 win over the Oakland Raiders.

**December 22, 1996** The Ravens concluded their inaugural season with a 4-12 record following a 21-24 loss to the Houston Oilers. The Ravens were 4-4 at home, but 0-8 on the road. The team sold out all 10 home games, including the two preseason games. Baltimore held a second-half lead in 10 of its 11 final games, but won only two. QB Vinny Testaverde was voted to the Pro Bowl after throwing for 4,177 yards and 33 touchdowns. WRs Michael Jackson and Derrick Alexander both eclipsed the 1,000-yard receiving mark and combined for 23 TD receptions.

**March 18, 1997** The Ravens and Western Maryland College entered into a five-year agreement to hold training camp at the Westminster, MD campus.

**April 19, 1997** The Ravens selected LB Peter Boulware with their first pick in the 1997 draft (fourth overall). Boulware went on to win NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and finished with 11.5 QB sacks, the fourth-best sack total by a rookie in NFL history.

**September 21, 1997** The Ravens defeated the Tennessee Oilers, 36-10, to start the season 3-1.

**December 14, 1997** Baltimore defeats Tennessee, 21-19, in the final game at Memorial Stadium. Ceremonies included a salute to former Colts, generations of season ticket holders and the Armed Forces. Of the 16 regular season games played by the Ravens at Memorial Stadium, 13 were sold out.

**December 21, 1997** Baltimore drops a 16-14 game at Cincinnati to finish the season 6-9-1. OT Jonathan Ogden is named consensus All-Pro and is voted as a starter to the Pro Bowl. LB Ray Lewis led the NFL in tackles with 210, and was voted first alternate to the Pro Bowl, and then was selected to play in the game by coach Bill Cowher.

**Sept. 5, 1998** The new NFL Stadium at Camden Yards (soon to be named PSINet Stadium) was the backdrop for an opening gala that included fireworks, a Stevie Wonder/Baltimore Symphony Orchestra concert and a spectacular laser show.

**Sept. 6, 1998** The Ravens opened their new NFL Stadium in downtown Baltimore (soon to be named PSINet Stadium) before a host of dignitaries, a packed house and the Pittsburgh Steelers. The Ravens lost, 20-13.

**Nov. 29, 1998** The Colts returned to Baltimore for the first time since 1983. The Ravens overcame two 14-point deficits and scored 25 second-half points to win a 38-31 thriller.

**Dec. 13, 1998** The Ravens and Minnesota Vikings set an NFL record with three kickoff returns for touchdowns, all in the first quarter. Ravens' Corey Harris, Patrick Johnson and Minnesota's David Palmer all scored TDs on returns in the Vikings' 38-28 win. Gary Anderson set an NFL record when he kicked his 34th straight successful field goal, one of six three-pointers on the day for Minnesota.

**December 28, 1998** After a 6-10 finish, the Ravens did not renew Head Coach Ted Marchibroda's contract. Six Ravens represented the AFC in the Pro Bowl: LB Peter Boulware, WR Jermaine Lewis, LB Ray Lewis, DE Michael McCrary, T Jonathan Ogden and S Bennie Thompson.

**January 19, 1999** Brian Billick became the second head coach in Baltimore Ravens' history when he accepted a six-year contract from owner Art Modell. Billick, the highly successful offensive coordinator for Minnesota, directed a Vikings' attack that set a variety of NFL and team records, including the league's all-time scoring mark of 556 points in 1998.

**January 26, 1999** PSINet Inc., the first and largest independent commercial Internet Service Provider (ISP), announced an innovative partnership with the Ravens to develop a global Internet-based network for the Ravens that will significantly enhance outreach between fans and the team, as well as establish a new business model for sports marketing. Under the 20-year agreement, the NFL's new downtown stadium at Camden Yards was named PSINet Stadium.

**January 30, 1999** Ravens' Vice President of Player Personnel Ozzie Newsome was selected to go into Pro Football's Hall of Fame, along with Lawrence Taylor, Eric Dickerson, Tom Mack and Billy Shaw. Newsome is the NFL's all-time leading tight end in pass receptions.

**February 4, 1999** Art Modell, Owner and Chief Executive Officer of the Baltimore Ravens, named David Modell as the Ravens' President and Chief Operating Officer and John Modell as Vice President of Special Projects.

**March 16, 1999** The Ravens traded for Lions' QB Scott Mitchell for a third-round draft pick in 1999 and a fifth-round pick in 2000.

**April 17, 1999** The Ravens selected Arizona CB Chris McAlister with their first round pick, and traded their second-round choice for Atlanta's first-round choice in 2000. Baltimore also acquired veterans QB Tony Banks, OL Everett Lindsay and TE Lovett Purnell in trades involving '99 picks.

**Sept. 12, 1999** Brian Billick's debut as head coach was spoiled in the regular season opener, as the St. Louis Rams defeated the Ravens 27-10 in the TransWorld Dome. Little known QB Kurt Warner, who went on to become the league's MVP, threw three TD passes in his first NFL start.

**Sept. 26, 1999** Billick notched his first win as an NFL head coach, 17-10, over the expansion Cleveland Browns. Stoney Case started at quarterback, replacing Scott Mitchell.

**October 31, 1999** Tony Banks took over as the team's starting quarterback against Buffalo in a 13-10 loss. Banks went 6-4 as a starter, including 4-0 in December. He threw a career-high 17 TDs and a career-low eight INTs.

**December 26, 1999** The Ravens recorded their first-ever shutout, a 22-0 win over Cincinnati. The victory completed a perfect December and gave the Ravens a franchise-high eight victories. Five players (LB Peter Boulware, LB Ray Lewis, DE Michael McCrary, T Jonathan Ogden and S Rod Woodson) were named to the Pro Bowl. The Ravens' defense finished ranked second in the NFL, and in the team's 6-3 finish, Baltimore outscored opponents, 229-142.

**February 18, 2000** The Ravens signed seven-time Pro Bowl tight end Shannon Sharpe, an unrestricted free agent who starred for 10 years with the Denver Broncos. Sharpe caught 552 passes for 6,983 yards and 44 TDs for Denver.

**March 27, 2000** NFL owners approved the sale of 49% of the Ravens for \$275 million to Anne Arundel County business executive Stephen Bisciotti. Bisciotti has an option to purchase the remaining 51% for \$325 million in 2004.

**April 15, 2000** The Ravens went for offense in the 2000 NFL Draft, selecting Tennessee RB Jamal Lewis (fifth overall), Florida WR Travis Taylor (10th overall) and Louisville QB Chris Redman (75th overall).







**PSINET STADIUM**

**PSINet Stadium** is arguably the crowning jewel of the nation's premier sports facility, the Camden Yards Sports Complex. Nestled just south of Oriole Park at Camden Yards, PSINet Stadium offers Ravens' fans the latest in technology, including state-of-the-art SMARTVISION video boards, combined with fabulous amenities. With a capacity of 69,084, including 108 suites and 7,900 club seats, the stadium was completed in 1997 in just over two years at an estimated cost of \$220 million. Designed by the architectural firm HOK, which also designed Oriole Park at Camden Yards, PSINet Stadium was funded through a combination of proceeds generated from the sale of tax-exempt revenue bonds, debt service being paid by lottery proceeds and the Ravens.





### SEATING:

- ❑ With a seating capacity of 69,084, PSINet Stadium is substantially larger than its sister baseball stadium to the north. At 1.6 million square feet, it is nearly double Oriole Park's size.
- ❑ There are 7,900 club seats at PSINet Stadium, featuring extra-wide seating, VIP parking and access to the club lounges that provide specialty foods, fully-staffed bars, a concierge and scenic views of downtown.
- ❑ Each of the 108 suites at PSINet Stadium can hold between 20-24 persons, and features three televisions, a private restroom, VIP parking, personal wait service, as well as many other amenities.

### VIDEO BOARDS:

- ❑ The two SACO SMARTVISION video boards located in each endzone, measuring 100 feet by 24 feet, are the largest permanent display boards located in any sports venue in the entire world. In essence, these boards are giant computer screens.
- ❑ Operated by a crew of up to 20 people each game day, the boards feature network pregame shows, live video of games from around the league, instant replays, highlights and up-to-date statistics.
- ❑ Each screen, which can be divided into as many as 16 different sections, is augmented by over 1,894 custom-built speakers that produce crystal-clear sound, producing breathtaking special effects.



### SIGHTLINES:

- ❑ Front-row seating in the lower level is six feet above the playing field, high enough to eliminate obstructed views in that area. In addition, the front row of seats are only 50 feet from the playing field on the sidelines and 20 feet from the back of the endzones.
- ❑ The distinct upper seating area includes open notches in each corner of the stadium, creating scenic views of the city of Baltimore for fans to enjoy. This feature also enables upper-level endzone seating to be moved closer to the field.

**A**MENTITIES:

- ❑ Extra-wide concourses (between 44 and 64 feet) make for easier navigating in PSINet Stadium. Seven public elevators (four handicapped accessible) and two escalators (to club level) also assist fans maneuvering about the stadium.
- ❑ There are 55 concession stands located throughout the upper level, lower level and club level featuring both standard football fare and various Baltimore specialties.
- ❑ In addition, there are several Ravens' team stores located in PSINet Stadium where fans are able to purchase all the latest Ravens' merchandise, plus six Provident Bank ATMs scattered throughout the facility.
- ❑ Fully ADA compliant, PSINet Stadium allows disabled fans to access areas throughout the facility via ramps and elevators. Handicapped seating also exists in every PSL (permanent seat license) zone in the new NFL stadium.


**T**RANSPORTATION:

- ❑ Located at 1101 Russell St., PSINet Stadium is surrounded on all sides by the following elevated roadways: I-95 and the Hamburg St. bridge to the north; I-95 and I-395 (plus Light Rail line) to the east; the Ostend St. bridge to the south; and the Russell St. viaduct to the west.
- ❑ Fans can also easily access the new stadium using Mass Transit. The Light Rail has a drop-off point located directly outside of Gate B, and Park-and-Ride shuttles are available from various locations around the greater Baltimore area.
- ❑ Parking in stadium lots, administered by AMCO System Parking, is limited, but numerous downtown lots are available for game-day parking just a short walk away.

**Q**UICK FACTS:

- ❑ PSINet Stadium is 185 feet tall, making it 35 feet taller than Oriole Park at Camden Yards.
- ❑ The playing surface is rated among the league's best in a survey of NFL players.
- ❑ The two SMARTVISION video boards located in each endzone generate 16 million colors, and at peak output, consume up to 80,000 watts of electrical power.
- ❑ Besides Ravens' football, PSINet Stadium features various other forms of entertainment, including concerts and other sporting events. College football games featuring Morgan State and Maryland have been played at the stadium. In 1998, The HFStival sold out in under 90 minutes and featured 15 bands and attracted over 90,000 fans. Heavy metal was in full force, as Metallica (plus Korn, Kid Rock, Powerman 5000 and System of a Down) rocked the stadium on July 4, 2000. The Army-Navy football game is slated for Dec. 2, 2000.
- ❑ In recognition of the Knaabe Piano factory, which was once located on the site of PSINet Stadium, a plaza in the shape of a piano was erected in the southwest corner of the facility. Interestingly, the paving pattern of the plaza was designed to look like piano keys.



One of the most recognizable voices in sports television, Dick Stockton makes his debut this season as the play-by-play announcer for telecasts of Ravens' preseason football.

Stockton also begins his sixth season this fall providing play-by-play with popular analyst partner Matt Millen for the NFL on FOX. Together, Stockton and Millen are one of football's top broadcasting tandems.

This season marks Stockton's 34th year as a professional broadcaster overall, and his vast experience includes 17 years at CBS Sports (1978-94). At CBS, he worked on NCAA regular-season and tournament basketball, and speed skating at the Lillehammer Olympic Winter Games. In Lillehammer, Stockton called the gold medal-winning performances by Americans Dan Jansen and Bonnie Blair, moments that he considers to be among the highlights of his career. Stockton also teams with analyst Hubie Brown to form TNT's lead NBA broadcast team.

Stockton graduated from Syracuse University in 1964 with a degree in political science. Born in Philadelphia, Stockton is married to ESPN/ABC Sports reporter and former Boston Globe writer Lesley Visser. The couple resides in Boca Raton, Fla.

Matt Millen, a 12-year NFL linebacking veteran with the Raiders (1980-88), 49ers (1989-90) and Redskins (1991), teams with veteran play-by-play man Dick Stockton for their first-ever year of Ravens' preseason football.


