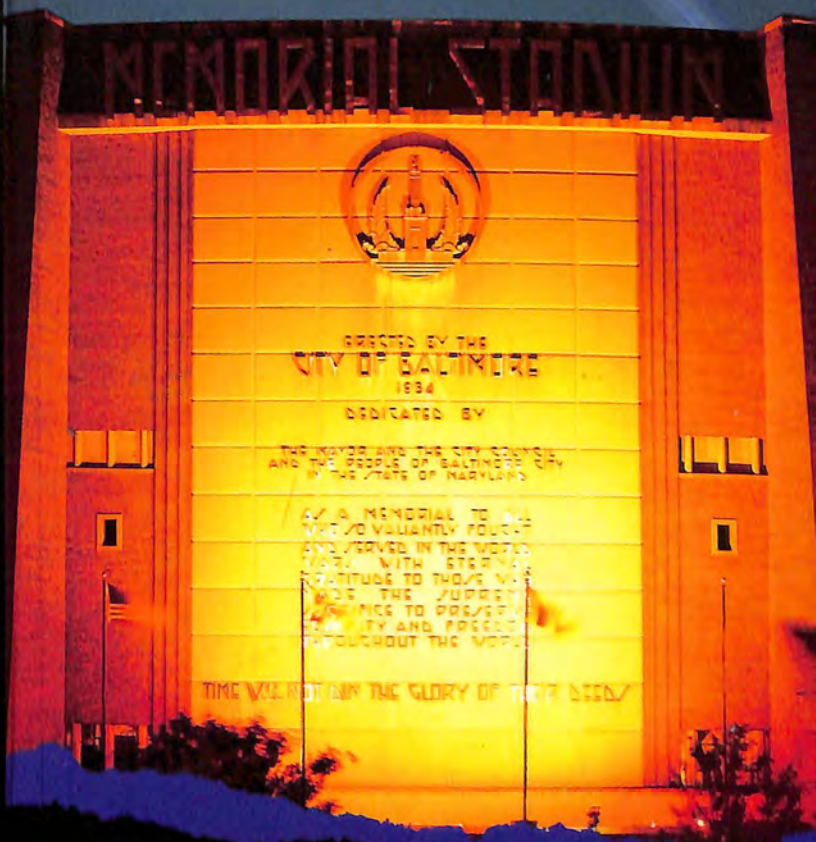

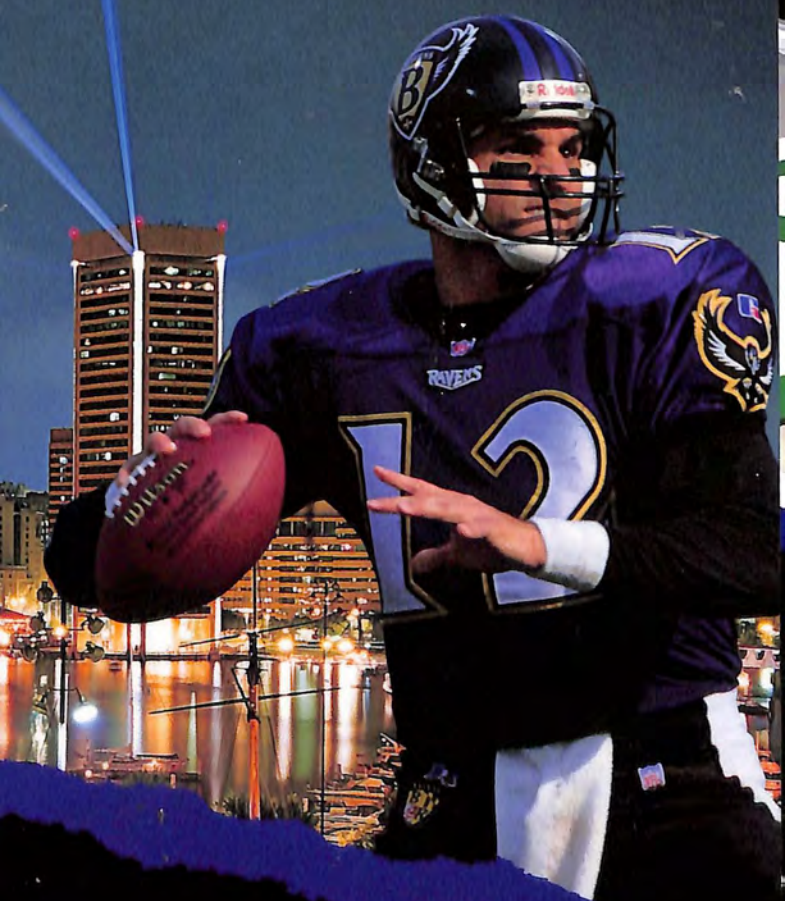

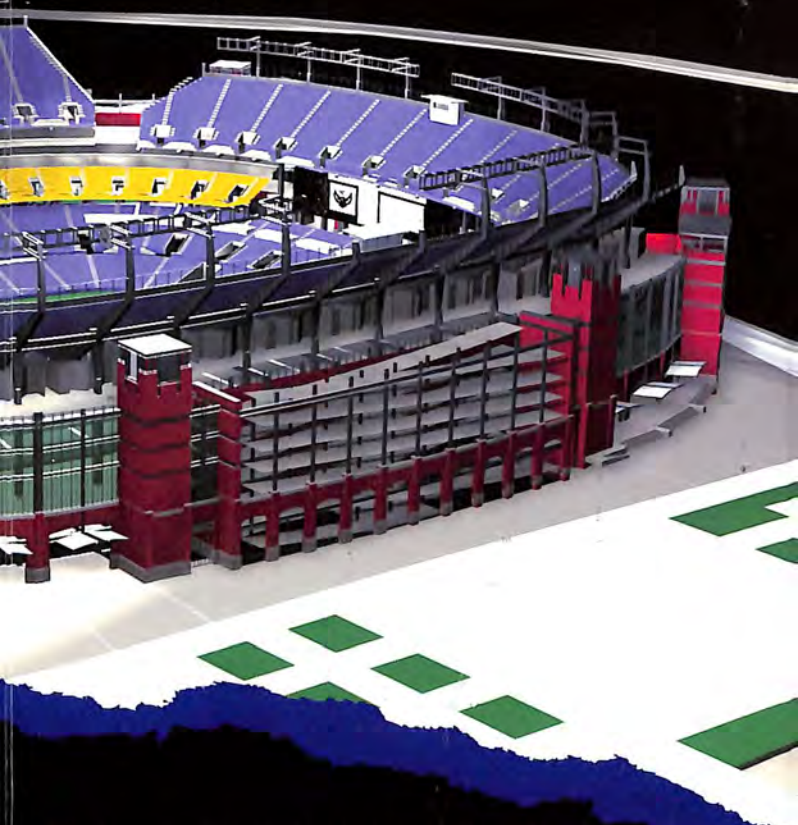


THE NEW STADIUM AT CAMDEN



- The Ravens' new stadium will open in August of 1998. The Maryland Stadium Authority, the architectural firm HOK, the joint construction managers Whiting-Turner/Barton/Malow/Essex Construction and the Ravens are working in concert to provide Baltimore the NFL's premier stadium.
- The stadium is situated just south of Oriole Park at Camden Yards on 85 acres purchased and cleared in 1989 and 1990. It will be nearly twice as large as Oriole Park, with 1.6 million square feet.
- The estimated construction and design costs of the stadium is \$200 million (including \$10 million to expand parking) funded by a combination of a state sports lottery and the Ravens.
- The stadium, which is fully ADA compliant, will seat 68,400 fans, including 108 suites and 7,900 Club Seats. The Club Seats were the fastest in the stadium to sell.

EN YARDS — Opening August, 1998



- Front-row seating in the lower deck will be six feet above the playing field and only 50 feet from the sideline. End zone seats will start 20 feet from the back of the end zone.
- The distinct upper seating area includes open corners, providing fans with breathtaking views of the city skyline and surrounding vistas. This also allows the upper deck sections in the end zones to be moved closer to the field. Grand entries allow fans to experience a unique sense of arrival like no other NFL stadium.
- The stadium will have 70 bathrooms, 50 concession stands and 275 "points of sale" to buy food and drinks. The video boards and sound system will be state of the art and reflect cutting-edge technology.
- The exterior brick will be darker in tone than Oriole Park to highlight the more industrial nature of Camden Yard's southern half. The facade will contain almost 2 million bricks, all laid by hand.

Art Modell is the person who brought the NFL back to Baltimore, and when people see him in "Charm City", they greet him with an enthusiasm and affection that is heartwarming. Art Modell is also the person who moved his franchise from Cleveland, leaving his home of 35 years.

Modell did not leave the fans of Cleveland empty handed. He left the name "Browns", the team colors and the great Browns' history. "It was important that the fans got to keep Jim Brown, Otto Graham, Leroy Kelly, Brian Sipe and the rest of that great history. That didn't happen before, not in Baltimore with the Colts, not in Brooklyn with the Dodgers, nor in other cities that lost teams."

The welcome to the Modell family by the fans of Baltimore has been overwhelming. "They instantly made us feel a part of their community, and they certainly responded to the team with their season ticket commitments," Modell added. "For anyone who questioned whether Baltimore is a good NFL area, these fans answered when we sold out all 10 games last season."

At the age of 35, Modell bought the Cleveland Browns for what was then (March, 1961) an unheard of sum of \$4 million. In his 35 years of Browns' ownership, his team played 20 playoff games, including winning the NFL Championship in 1964, plus appearances in three other NFL title contests and three AFC Championship games. Just a few weeks prior to announcing the move to Baltimore (Oct., '95), Modell was once again one of the 60 finalists for the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

HISTORY:

- Dropped out of high school at the age of 15 to help his financially-strapped family after the death of his father.
- First full-time job was as an electrician's helper, cleaning out the hulls of ships in a Brooklyn shipyard.
- Joined the Air Force in 1943 (he was 18).
- Under the G.I. Bill, he enrolled in a New York City television school following World War II.



Modell, chairman of the Owners' Labor Committee, negotiated the NFL's first collective bargaining agreement. His long-time friend, Vince Lombardi, served on Art's committee.

- Produced one of the first regular daytime television shows in the nation.
- Joined the advertising business in 1954 and soon became a partner for the L.H. Hartman Company.

FOOTBALL HISTORY:

- Purchased the Browns on March 21, 1961.
- His fourth team, the 1964 Browns, won the World Championship, beating the Baltimore Colts, 27-0.
- His 1965, 1968 and 1969 teams played in the NFL title games.
- His 1986, 1987 and 1989 teams lost memorable AFC Championship games to the Denver Broncos.
- His 1967, 1971, 1972, 1980, 1982, 1985, 1988 and 1994 teams also made the playoffs.
- In five other seasons—1963, 1970, 1976, 1979 and 1983—the Browns had a chance to make the playoffs on the final day of the season, but did not qualify.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

- Only elected NFL President in league history, serving in that capacity in 1967, 1968 and 1969.
- Chairman of the NFL's Television Committee for 31 years. During his tenure, over eight billion, four hundred million dollars in revenues were negotiated on behalf of the NFL.
- Chairman of the Owners' Labor Committee, which successfully negotiated the NFL's first collective bargaining agreement with the players in 1968.
- Served on the NFL-AFL Merger Committee, breaking the impasse for realignment of the two leagues by moving the Browns into the American Football Conference.
- Chairman of NFL Films.
- Was an important participant in the negotiations with ABC to start Monday Night Football and then volunteered to host the first game in Cleveland in 1970.
- Conceived and staged the first doubleheader in NFL history, which consisted of the Browns and three other teams playing back-to-back preseason games at Cleveland Stadium. From 1962 through 1971, the Browns hosted the annual doubleheader each August that drew over 800,000 fans in those 10 years.



Commissioner Pete Rozelle and Modell, the NFL's Television Committee Chairman for 31 years, negotiated almost \$8.5 billion worth of TV contracts on behalf of the league.

COMMUNITY IMPACT:

- Serves on the Executive Committee of the Greater Baltimore Committee.
- Served on the board of the world renowned Cleveland Clinic for 20 years, including the last seven as President.
- Served on the boards for Baldwin Wallace College and Cleveland State University.
- Serves on the board of Churchill Downs.
- Co-chaired (with his wife, Pat) the 1996 Cystic Fibrosis Gala.
- Former board member of National City Bank, National City Corporation and the Ohio Bell Telephone Company.
- Cleveland Touchdown Club gave the Academic Achievement Award to a high school student in Art's name each year.

Art and his wife Pat (see inclusion) are the parents of John and David Modell. John, 37, is a musician/composer and works as a digital mastering engineer at Oceanview Digital Mastering. He and his wife Tracy, an artist, live in Los Angeles with their son Dylan Scott (3/21/92). David, the Browns' Assistant to the President, and his wife, Olwen, an attorney, live in Greenspring Valley with daughters Breslin Ebright (2/5/90) and Collier Honora (10/6/93) and sons Arthur Edward (11/23/91) and David Orrick, Jr. (9/25/96).

PAT MODELL



Pat Modell, the former Patricia Breslin, gained fame as one of the most recognized actresses in television history. At one point, she had appeared in more motion pictures and television shows (400) than any other actress. Her most famous roles included a co-starring spot opposite Jackie Cooper in the long-running series "People's Choice" and her portrayal of Meg Baldwin in "General Hospital." Like her husband Art and son David, Pat Modell believes in getting involved in the community. Since arriving in Baltimore, Pat has joined the board of the Kennedy Krieger Institute, helped establish and direct the Ravens' Foundation for Families, and co-chaired (with Art) a major fundraiser for Cystic Fibrosis. In Cleveland, Pat devoted much of her time to a variety of area projects. She co-chaired major fundraisers for the Hospice of the Western Reserve and the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland. Pat also lent her energy and expertise to the Make-A-Wish Foundation, the Playhouse Square Foundation, the Cerebral Palsy Association, Ursuline College, the Cleveland Musical Arts Foundation and the Cleveland Ballet.

As soon as Art Modell made the commitment to move his NFL franchise to Baltimore, he turned to Jim Bailey, his executive vice president - legal and administration, to begin that process. It was another huge responsibility given to Bailey in his 20 years with the team. "Every important decision we have made in the last 18 or so years has included significant input from Jim. He is very reliable," Modell complimented.

Bailey oversees the most involved aspects of the Ravens' operations using his trademark low-key "business-as-usual" approach. Whether it was maneuvering the franchise through the first two years of the salary cap, or moving the team to Owings Mills, Bailey gets the job done. Among his important involvements through the years have been hiring top executives, including head coaches, and coordinating the Ravens' legal and government affairs.

"If there's an important decision to be made about the future of the Ravens, Jim's thoughts on the subject will be given weight," Modell added. Bailey functions as the Ravens' chief administrator on a day-to-day basis. Currently, Bailey is working with the Maryland Stadium Authority and architects from HOK as they complete the new NFL stadium at Camden Yards. While with the Browns, Jim coordinated the building of the team's state-of-the-art training and administrative complex.

A former scholarship winner as a defensive back at Florida State, Bailey was promoted to his current position in early 1984. During his tenure with the Browns, Bailey did everything from negotiate player, radio and TV contracts, to handle legal affairs, to coordinate Cleveland Stadium activities. In fact, most of Jim's initial work with the organization involved the development and maintenance of Cleveland Stadium Corporation.

Bailey earned a law degree from the University of Michigan after graduating from FSU. Prior to joining the franchise, Jim worked for the Cleveland-based law firm of Guren, Merritt, Sogg and Cohen, where he was quickly named a partner in 1976. Bailey's duties at the law offices included work with Art Modell in the development of the Cleveland Stadium Corporation lease arrangement with the City of Cleveland. That association was instrumental in bringing Bailey to the Browns.

Jim is on the Board of Visitors of Towson University and on the Board of Directors of Maryland Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

A native of Wilmington, Ohio, Bailey stood out in three sports (football, basketball and track) at Wilmington High School. Jim and his wife, Ann, who is an owners' representative in construction projects, live in Baltimore. They are the parents of two daughters: Sarah, who is an interior designer in Chicago; and Jenny, a mathematics teacher living in San Diego with her husband, Mike Bjornstad, and their new son, John Bailey.

IT'S A FACT

Vinny Testaverde scored the first-ever touchdown in Ravens' history on September 1, 1996. Testaverde ran nine yards for a TD with 39 seconds left in the first quarter vs. the Oakland Raiders, as Baltimore defeated Oakland, 19-14, in front of 64,124 fans at Memorial Stadium.

To say David Modell has leaped into the Baltimore community would be an understatement. From spearheading the effort to find the team name, colors and logos, to helping a number of important local groups raise money to better the area, David has kept a fast pace since moving to his new home.

"Community involvement was a hallmark of Art Modell's franchise in Cleveland, and we're trying to do the same here. My father and mother (Pat) set the example. They not only recognize where they can help, they get things done. I'm fortunate to be able to follow their lead," David said.

Along with his family, the Ravens are the priority in David's life. "There is an indomitable desire to excel among our staff, and, for that matter, many others who work in the NFL. There's a commitment to teamwork, a building of consensus in a very public competition. It's great to be part of something like this," the younger Modell added.

Soon after the team's arrival in early 1996, David coordinated a fan vote through *The Baltimore Sun* to select the team nickname—the Ravens. Working with staff, NFL Properties and Baltimore area focus groups, he directed the process to select the team colors and uniform design. "It was a collaborative effort. The fans got involved, my family, obviously Art, plus many members of the organization."

No person in the Ravens has more hands-on experience in as many different areas of the company as the 36-year-old David Modell. Starting in Cleveland Stadium and game-day operations when he was 14, David also worked in the team's ticket office, public relations' department, and he started a marketing division in 1985. Today he is the executive vice president and assistant to the president.

While he works closely with Ravens' marketing vice president David Cope and his staff, Modell stays involved in all aspects of the team's business and football operations. For example, he handles contract negotiations with some of the Ravens' top players and draft choices.

David made his mark with the franchise and in league circles with the work he did marketing the Browns. The younger Modell started a marketing department in 1985 and developed a series of programs that enhanced the team's image and provided needed revenues. Other teams have copied some of the innovations started by David, including team television productions (weekly shows and preseason games produced by teams rather than selling those rights) and an elaborate training camp magazine that is distributed to fans. The teams' original television ventures were both produced and sold by Modell.

"At a time when most teams were wondering whether they should have a marketing department, David had ours up and running and setting a pace a number of franchises have since followed. He increased our market share of advertising dollars, both locally and nationally, and added needed revenues to keep pace with the forever growing expenses of running an NFL team," Jim Bailey, the Ravens' other executive vice president, said.

In less than a year and a half in Baltimore, Modell was invited to join four important boards of directors: the United Way of Central Maryland, the Port Discovery Children's Museum, the University of Maryland Medical System's Shock Trauma and the Maryland Public Television Foundation. David is also the chairman of the Ravens' Foundation for Families.

In Cleveland, Modell was President of the Diabetes' Association of Greater Cleveland, and he headed its development fundraising. He was a member of the Board of Trustees for the Cleveland Urban League and the Convention and Visitors' Bureau. Modell also worked with the Lake County Boy Scouts' Association and served on the Visiting Committee of the Athletic Department at Case Western Reserve University.

As a 14-year old student, David worked Browns' games as a member of the grounds' crew. In the next years, he spent time as a front office aide and training camp intern. After graduating from the The Gunnery School (Washington, CT) and attending Wittenberg University, Modell joined the Browns in a full-time capacity in the team's ticket office (1981-82). He then worked two years as the front office manager for the Fernwood Inn, a resort in the Pocono Mountains (1982-84) before returning to Cleveland in October of 1984.

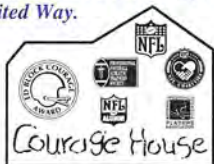
Modell's wife Olwen, an attorney, served on the board of two groups: Youth Visions (formerly Big Brothers and Big Sisters) and Starting Point (child care referral). Olwen, a board member for the Ravens' Foundation for Families, and David are parents of daughters Breslin Ebright (2/5/90), and Collier Honora (10/6/93), and sons Arthur Edward (11/23/91) and David Orrick Jr. (9/25/96). The Ravens believe that the health of families in this region ought to be better because of the team's presence. The Ravens can't say "yes" to every group that asks for a team presence or donation, but we are trying to make a difference.

The Foundation's resources are applied to programs creating motivational and educational opportunities for youth and to help other family-related programs.

Among the important groups receiving financial help from the Ravens in the team's first year are: the Kennedy Krieger Institute, the Ed Block Courage House, Associated Black Charities, the Rocky Gap Festival, Port Discovery and the United Way.

Ted Marchibroda can easily be described as the NFL's all-time "turnaround coach". And he's being asked to do it again with the Ravens. Twice in his career he has improved his team by a margin of eight victories. Inheriting a 2-12 Colt team when he was named head coach on Feb. 15, 1975, Ted helped Baltimore to a 10-4 record and the AFC East title. That was the largest victory swing in the history of the NFL. For his accomplishment, he was a consensus pick for NFL Coach of the Year. Marchibroda achieved the eight-game swing the second time in 1992, taking the Indianapolis Colts to a 9-7 mark after the team had finished a dismal 1-15 in 1991.

Ted's assignment is to direct the Ravens, who finished with a 4-12 mark in their first season (1996), into a playoff contender. "Ted was dealt a tough hand last year," Ravens' owner Art Modell said. "We came over to Baltimore late; our offseason program was hurt because of that; players were moving, we had cap problems and we had those unusual number of injuries along the defensive line."

The Ravens were valiant in their first season, but in eight of the final 10 games, the team lost after leading in the third quarter. "The players kept fighting, but we couldn't close the door at the end of games," Marchibroda said. Typical of the Raven defeats were four against Jacksonville and Cincinnati. Each of those games was decided in the final minute of play and one in overtime (Jaguars in Baltimore).

"Ted started his coaching career the same year (1961) I bought the Browns and there are a number of compliments you always hear about him: he knows football, he gets his players to play hard and that he's a quality person," Modell said. "I've known him a long time and he gives me confidence that we can get back on the winning track soon."

"To come home to Baltimore means so much to me and my family. I know what football means to this community and to be part of the NFL's return here is something I would have never predicted," Marchibroda, who was hired by Modell on Feb. 15, 1996, said.

Marchibroda's Indianapolis Colts came within one dropped "Hail Mary" touchdown pass of going to the 1995 Super Bowl in a thrilling 20-16 loss to the Pittsburgh Steelers at Three Rivers Stadium. The Colts finished with a 9-7 record, good for second place in the AFC East, one game behind the 10-6 Buffalo Bills. Entering the postseason as a Wild Card team, the Colts won at San Diego, 35-20, and then knocked the Chiefs, the team with the best record in the NFL (13-3) in 1995, out of the playoffs with a 10-7 victory at Arrowhead Stadium.

The highly respected Marchibroda is tied with the legendary Hall of Famer Don Shula for the most victories in Colts' history, each with 73. Ted's nine-year record with the Colts is 73-68, and he guided the team to the playoffs in four of those seasons (1975, '76, '77 and '95), plus he produced the 9-7 team in '92 and an 8-8 squad in '94.

Marchibroda originally left the Colts following the 1979 season and was rehired as the team boss on Jan. 28, 1992. Ted's first Colt team in 1975 became the first team in league history to go from last place to first place in back-to-back seasons. The AFC East title winners finished 10-4. The Colts followed with two more division titles, earning 11-3 and 10-4 records in 1976 and 1977. Those are the most titles won by any coach in Colts' history. Weeb Ewbank (1958, '59) and Shula (1964, '68) each won two NFL Western Conference crowns.

In a remarkable run from Oct. 26, 1975 through Nov. 20, 1977, Marchibroda's Colts won 29 of 33 regular season games. His 1976 team won 11 of 14 games

and topped the NFL in offense (5,236 net yards), passing (215 of 361, 59.6%, 209.1 yards/game, 9.05 avg./att., 24 TDs and nine ints.) and scoring, 417 points (29.8 per game). During the three-year division title run, the Colts lost twice to the eventual Super Bowl champion Steelers in the playoffs, plus a memorable double-overtime thriller to the Raiders (37-31) in 1977.

Prior to returning to the Colts in 1992, Marchibroda, who is a veteran of 33 NFL seasons, served five years (1987-91) as an assistant with the Buffalo Bills. After spending his first two seasons with Buffalo as quarterbacks' coach/passing game coordinator, Ted was the team's offensive coordinator for three years. His "no-huddle" attack helped Buffalo establish 13-3 records in 1990 and '91, along with AFC Championships and Super Bowl XXV and XXVI appearances. The Bills scored more than 400 points each season from 1989-91 with the offense averaging 362 yards per game. The Bills' balanced attack under Marchibroda's coordination had a perfect blend - 1,516 passes and 1,516 runs.

Marchibroda began his coaching career as backfield coach with the Washington Redskins in 1961 under Bill McPeak. He stayed in D.C. through 1965 and then joined George Allen and the Rams in 1966. When Allen took the job with the Redskins in 1971, Ted went with him as offensive coordinator through the 1974 season. The Redskins played in Super Bowl VII in 1973. With the Redskins, Ted coached Sonny Jurgensen, who was the NFC passing leader in 1974, and Billy Kilmer.

In 1981, Marchibroda was the Bears' quarterback coach and then moved to Detroit to coordinate the Lions' offense in 1982-83. Ted had the same title with the Eagles in 1984-85. Under his guidance, two quarterbacks - Roman Gabriel (Rams, 1969) and Bert Jones (Colts, 1976) - won NFL Most Valuable Player honors, while players like Jim Kelly and Jim Harbaugh blossomed under Ted's teachings.

Certainly Vinny Testaverde, who made the Pro Bowl for the first time last season, stepped to a new level under Marchibroda's influence.

A quarterback, Marchibroda played at St. Bonaventure College in 1950-51, but the football program was dropped. (St. Bonaventure awarded Ted with an honorary doctorate last May). He transferred to the University of Detroit, where he led the nation in total offense in 1952. He was the first pick of the Steelers in 1953 and played one season before joining the Army. He returned to play two more years (1955-56) with Pittsburgh before ending his playing career with the Chicago Cardinals in 1957. His best season came in '56 with the Steelers when he completed 124 of 275 passes for 1,585 yards and 12 touchdowns.

Marchibroda was born March 15, 1931 in Franklin, Pa. At Franklin High School, he was an all-state selection in both football and basketball, and was

also a baseball standout. Marchibroda, a willing volunteer to help his community, recently donated funds to the "DOOR", a Baltimore city mission. Ted is currently helping the Catholic Relief Services, an international organization based in Baltimore, and he is the Honorary Chair for the Baltimore Evangelical Festival (9/27/97).

He and his wife Ann have four children—two daughters, Jodi and Lonni, and two sons, Ted Jr. and Robert.

The Ravens' offense was among the NFL's elite in 1996. The 5.6 yards gained per play was the league's best; the 5,723 yards gained was third; the 248.6 yards passing per game was second, while the third down efficiency (43.8%) was also third. Baltimore scored 371 points, sixth best in the NFL, and only one TD was by the defense or special teams.

Maxie Baughan enters his second year as the Ravens' linebackers' coach and his fourth reunion with head coach Ted Marchibroda. Baughan, a 16-year NFL coach, originally served under Ted as defensive coordinator for the Baltimore Colts (1975-79), and later both coached with the Detroit Lions (1982). Baughan played linebacker with the Rams (1966-70) and the Washington Redskins (1971, '74), while Marchibroda coached both offenses.

In '96, the Ravens switched to a 3-4 defense seven games into the season due to injuries along the defensive line. Later, injuries to linebackers forced the switch back to the 4-3 scheme. Baughan's renovated linebacking corps will include '97 draft picks: Peter Boulware (D1), Jamie Sharper (D2a), Tyrus McCloud (D4) and Cornell Brown (D6a) along with MLB Ray Lewis (D1b, '96), who led the Ravens in tackles with 142 last season. Ray earned consensus All-Rookie honors and was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week following a 19-14 win over Oakland (9/1/96).

Baughan tutored Minnesota Vikings' linebackers (1990-91) before joining Tampa Bay (1992-95), where he coached MLB Hardy Nickerson. In '95, Hardy was named MVP for the second time in three years by the *St. Pete Times* and led Bucs' tacklers with 143.

From 1983-88, Maxie was head coach at Cornell where he led the Big Red to a 28-29-2 record. Prior to the Cornell post, Baughan served as defensive coordinator for the Detroit Lions (1980-82). In '82, Baughan's defense ranked first in the NFC in two categories: rushing defense and sacks. Other coaching assignments include: Washington Redskins (1974, player/assistant coach) and Georgia Tech (1972-73, assistant coach/defensive coordinator). The "Ramblin' Wreck" earned a Liberty Bowl berth in Baughan's first season. Baughan, a linebacker at Georgia Tech, played in the NFL for the Philadelphia Eagles (1960-65), L.A. Rams (1966-70) and Washington (1971, '74).

Baughan's 13 seasons in the NFL as a standout linebacker began as a second-round draft choice of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1960. He was runnerup for NFL Rookie of the Year honors when the Eagles won the league championship. Maxie earned All-Pro honors six times and was a nine-time selection to the Pro Bowl. Baughan and Detroit's Joe Schmidt previously held the record for most Pro Bowls by a linebacker before that mark was broken by the Giants' Lawrence Taylor.

At Georgia Tech, Baughan was a star linebacker, earning an All-America selection as a senior as well as a degree in industrial management. Maxie was named to the All-Time teams of the Eagles and Rams, and is a member of several Halls of Fame: Georgia Tech, Gator Bowl, National Football Foundation, College, State of Georgia and State of Alabama Sports Hall of Fame. Baughan, 58, and his wife, Diane, have three grown sons: Maxie III, Mark and Matthew. The Baughans reside in Reisterstown.

Jacob Burney's defensive line will have a different look in '97. Returning eight-year veteran Pro Bowler LDE Rob Burnett will join DT James Jones, a free agent signee (8/26/96, Denver), and '97 acquisitions DT Tony Siragusa (UFA, Indianapolis) and DE Michael McCrary (UFA, Seattle). Burnett started the first six games of last season, then suffered a knee injury and was lost for the season. Jones started 11 of 16 games, eight at NT and three at LDE for Burnett.

In '96, injuries to the line forced the Ravens to switch to a 3-4 defense seven games into the season, but subsequent injuries to the linebacking corps forced Baltimore back to the 4-3 scheme for its final two games. In his first year (1994) with the Modell franchise, Burney coached a Browns' line that contributed to one of the best defensive performances in the league, allowing a league-low 204 points. Opponents scored only nine rushing touchdowns and averaged 3.6 yards per carry during the regular season.

Burney's coaching career was launched in 1983, when he joined Joe Morrison's staff at New Mexico, where he served as defensive line coach for four seasons. He moved to Tulsa in '87, where he coached former New York Jets' defensive tackle Dennis Byrd. In 1988, he tutored inside linebackers at Mississippi State. Slated to rejoin Morrison at South Carolina for the '89 season until Morrison's untimely death, Jacob moved to Wisconsin and worked with the Badgers' defensive line. Prior to a one-year stint with Tennessee's defensive line (1993), Jacob spent three years coaching the UCLA Bruins' defensive line (1990-92).

Burney, 38, was a standout at the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga. He started all four years (1977-80) at defensive tackle, helping lead the Moccasins to four Southern Conference championships and a record of 33-9-2. He was selected All-Southern Conference in each of his final three seasons. He has a bachelor's degree in physical education from Tennessee-Chattanooga (1981). Burney had tryouts with the Detroit Lions in '81 and '82. Jacob was an All-State performer in football, wrestling and track and field at Tyner (Chattanooga, TN) H.S. Jacob and his wife, Madrina Paton, have two sons: Jacob, 14, and Benjamin, 10, and a daughter, Helena, 9. The family resides in Reisterstown.

Offensive line coach Kirk Ferentz also holds additional responsibilities as the assistant head coach-offense. Under Ted Marchibroda, the Ravens opened up their offense last season, using a variety of formation changes: one-back and two-back sets, a no-huddle attack and anywhere from three-to-five receivers on the field. Baltimore ranked third in the NFL in offense (behind Denver and Jacksonville), including second in passing (behind Jacksonville), and the Ravens' 371 points were sixth best in the league.

In '96, the Ravens' solid offensive line got stronger with the addition of top draft pick Jonathan Ogden (D1a) from UCLA. Ogden started all 16 games at left guard and earned consensus All-Rookie honors. Wally Williams, projected to start at center (replacing Steve Everitt, who signed with the Philadelphia Eagles), tore his Achilles in the offseason, but should be ready in late October. RT Orlando Brown, who started 16 games, matured into a team leader and offensive captain. The non-drafted Brown and Williams have developed under Kirk's teaching.

Veteran Leo Goeas (UFA'97, St. Louis), who has played guard, center and tackle, was signed last March to fill the void at left guard when Ogden moves to left tackle this season (replacing Tony Jones, who was traded to Denver). Goeas started 13 of 16 games at left guard for the Rams last season. G Jeff Blackshear (16/12) replaced Williams last season when Wally moved to center. Jeff is slotted at right guard.

Ferentz was the head coach of the University of Maine's Black Bears from 1990-1992. Prior to that position, the 42-year old Ferentz was the offensive line coach and running game coordinator at Iowa for nine years (1981-89), under the direction of head coach Hayden Fry. Ferentz helped coach the Hawkeyes' Joel Hilgenberg (a 1993 Pro Bowler as member of the New Orleans Saints) and Pro Bowler John Alt (Kansas City). During his tenure at Iowa, the Hawkeyes appeared in Bowl Games eight consecutive times and won a total of 73 games. Kirk has coached several All-American offensive linemen, including three first round draft choices and an Outland Trophy finalist.

Ferentz joined Pittsburgh (1980) as a graduate assistant under Jackie Sherrill. He helped guide the Panthers to a 10-1 record and the nation's number two ranking. Ferentz began his coaching career in 1977 on a part-time basis at his alma mater (Connecticut), prior to his graduation. He assisted the defensive coordinator and served as linebackers' coach. Ferentz then accepted a defensive coordinator/offensive line coach position (1978-79) at Worcester Academy.

A 1978 graduate of Connecticut with a degree in English education and Academic All-Conference honors, Ferentz was a three-year letter winner at linebacker and team co-captain. He attended Upper St. Clair H.S., near Pittsburgh, Pa. Kirk serves on the National Advisory Board of Bethesda Family Services Foundation. He and his wife, Mary, live in Baldwin, MD, with their five children: Brian (14); Kelly (12); Joanne (10); James (8) and Steven (3).

Al Lavan, who enters his second year with the Ravens in '97, had 13 years of coaching experience with three NFL teams (including the 1989 Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers), prior to joining Baltimore. Lavan has coached some of the NFL's best running backs: Roger Craig at San Francisco, plus Tony Dorsett and Herschel Walker, while serving under Tom Landry's Dallas Cowboys. He spent two years coaching DBs and special teams with the Atlanta Falcons.

In '96, the Ravens averaged 4.2 yards per rushing attempt, ranking seventh in the NFL. RB Bam Morris started seven of 11 games and finished as the team's leading rusher with 737 yards on 172 carries and four TDs. Bam, who recorded three 100-yard games, started the final seven games and led the AFC (second, NFL) in rushing over that span (618 yards). Only Barry Sanders (756) had more yards over the final seven games. RB Earnest Byner finished second on the team with 634 yards on 159 carries and four TDs. Newcomer Jay Graham (D3'97) from Tennessee "was impressive at rookie minicamp" according to head coach Ted Marchibroda, and is expected to contribute early. Graham ranked third on the school's all-time rushing list (2,609 yards) and notched 27 career TDs.

While at Washington (1992-95), Lavan coached Napoleon Kaufman, the most prolific running back in Huskies' history. Kaufman was selected by the Oakland Raiders in the first round (18th overall) of the '95 NFL draft. He was the first running back taken by the Raiders since Marcus Allen in '82. From 1989-90, Al worked with the 49ers' running backs, and prior to that two-year stint, he coached Dallas' running backs (1980-88) for nine years. He began his coaching career as receivers' coach at his alma mater, Colorado State (1972), before joining Louisville (1973, defensive backs), Iowa State (1974, receivers coach), Atlanta Falcons (1975-76, defensive backs and special teams), Georgia Tech (1977-78, receivers and running backs) and Stanford (1979, running backs).

Lavan, 50, who was drafted in the eighth round by Philadelphia (1968), played in the secondary for the Eagles and the Falcons (1969-70). Al was a defensive back and kick returner for the Rams at CSU, where, as a senior, he received the Nye Award, given to the outstanding senior athlete. He earned a bachelor's degree in sociology in '68. Lavan attended Southside H.S. in Newark, N.J. He and his wife, Bessie, have three children: Travis (26), Douglas (23) and Maeleke (17). The Lavans reside in Finksburg, MD.

In his second year as defensive coordinator, Marvin Lewis will employ a 4-3 scheme and some new faces on the defense with the acquisition of three standout free agents and seven draft picks. Free agent acquisitions are: DT Tony Siragusa (Indianapolis), one of the league's best run stoppers; DE Michael McCrary (Seattle), a pass rush specialist with 13.5 sacks last season (tied for first in the AFC with Buffalo's Bruce Smith); and S Rondell Jones, (Denver), considered one of the best special teams' players in the league.

MLB Ray Lewis, who earned consensus All-Rookie honors and led the team with 142 tackles, will be joined by four rookie linebackers, '97 draft picks: Peter Boulware (D1), Jamie Sharper (D2a), Tyrus McCloud (D4), and Cornell Brown (D6a). Kim Herring (D2b), who is expected to challenge for the roster spot at free safety, DE Chris Ward (D7a), S Ralph Staten (D7c) and DT Leland Taylor (D7d) are among the newest Ravens.

No other coach in the NFL had to make the adjustments Lewis made in his first year as defensive coordinator. The "projected" defensive line played together only the first play of the season opener before a litany of injuries took its toll. It forced Baltimore to switch first to a 3-4 scheme seven games into the season, then back to the 4-3 for the final two games after injuries affected the linebacking ranks.

Lewis, formerly with the Pittsburgh Steelers, spent four seasons (1992-95) coaching some of the best linebackers in the NFL, including Pro Bowlers Kevin Greene (now with Carolina), Chad Brown (now with Seattle) and Greg Lloyd. From 1993-95, the Steelers' defense ranked among the top three in the NFL.

Pittsburgh bumped two teams out of the playoffs in '95—Buffalo (40-21), and an Indianapolis (20-16) team coached by Ted Marchibroda—before losing to Dallas in the Super Bowl (27-17). Of Pittsburgh's 97 sacks in two seasons ('94-'95), the linebackers made 63.5, including 37.5 of a team record 55 sacks in '94 (42 in '95). Lloyd (46) ranks fourth on the Steelers' all-time sack list, while Greene (31) ranks ninth. Under Lewis, Pittsburgh's linebackers aggressively pursued the ball, racking up 339 or 42% of the total tackles (815) in 1995.

Lewis, 38, who enters his 17th year in coaching, including 11 at the college level, began his career coaching linebackers at his alma mater, Idaho State (1981-84). The Bengals finished 12-1 in Marvin's first season and won the NCAA Division I-AA championship. Lewis spent two years (1985-86) at Long Beach State before taking a post at New Mexico (1987-89), where he tutored inside linebackers the first two years and moved to the outside in '89. In 1990, he accepted a position coaching outside linebackers at Pittsburgh (1990-91).

Marvin received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Idaho State in 1981 and his master's in athletic administration in '82. He earned All-Big Sky Conference honors (1978, '79, '80) as a linebacker and also played quarterback and free safety during his college career. Lewis attended Fort Cherry H. S. in McDonald (PA), where he was an all-conference quarterback and safety, and earned letters in wrestling and baseball. He and his wife, Peggy, have two children: daughter Whitney (12) and son Marcus (seven). They reside in Finksburg.

After a three-year absence in which he coached receivers for the New York Jets, Richard Mann marks his return to Art Modell's franchise for his second stint as receivers' coach. Previously, Mann spent nine years coaching and developing outstanding receivers like Pro Bowlers Webster Slaughter and tight end Ozzie Newsome, plus Michael Jackson, Reggie Langhorne and Brian Brennan of the Cleveland Browns. Prior to joining Modell's staff in 1985, Richard spent three years (1982-84) under Frank Kush (then head coach of the Baltimore/Indianapolis Colts).

In '97, Mann will coach Jackson and Derrick Alexander, who were one of four receiver tandems to eclipse the 1,000-yard mark last season. Jackson had a career-high 1,201 yards (second in the AFC) on 76 catches and led the NFL with 14 TD receptions (tied with San Diego's Tony Martin). Jackson has 23 TDs in his last 29 games. Alexander finished eighth in the AFC with 1,099 yards on 62 catches and nine TDs, all career highs. They combined for 41.2% of the Ravens' 335 receptions, and their 23 TDs topped all NFL receiving tandems last year.

Mann's reputation is best known for developing and working with young receivers. While at the Jets, he worked with rookie Keyshawn Johnson (D1, '96, 1st overall) and Wayne Chrebet. In his '95 All-rookie season, Chrebet, a free agent signee, was second among NFL rookies in receptions and broke the club record for receptions by a rookie (66). Although they finished 1-15 last season, the Jets were 10th in the NFL in passing offense. Chrebet was sixth in the AFC in receptions (83) and Johnson was 14th (63). In AFC receiving yards, Chrebet was 14th (909); Johnson, 16th; and Jeff Graham 20th (788).

In 1995, Mann tutored TE Kyle Brady (D1, '95, 9th overall) in his first season coaching tight ends. He was credited with the '94 success of WR Rob Moore who posted his first career 1,000-yard season and a trip to the Pro Bowl. Mann also coached Jacksonville's Keenan McCardell (1992-93) and Carolina's Mark Carrier (1993) while both played for Cleveland.

After three years (1982-84) under Colts' head coach Frank Kush, whom he played under and later coached for at Arizona State, Mann, 50, was hired by former Browns' Head Coach Marty Schottenheimer in 1985. He assisted in the development of receivers on the college and high school level a decade before joining the NFL in '82. Among the college players he helped advance was former Miami Dolphin standout WR Mark Clayton (Louisville).

At ASU, Mann was a three-year starter, first year at flanker, later at tight end. He earned a B.S. in elementary education and returned to his hometown high school (Aliquippa, PA) as a teacher and coach (1970-73) and was later inducted into the Aliquippa H.S. Hall of Fame. While an ASU coach, Mann spent six years developing future NFLers John Jefferson, Bruce Hardy and Jerry Bell. After a two-year stint at Louisville, he joined the Baltimore staff in '82.

Richard and his wife, Karen, have four children: daughters Deven (18), Brittany (8), and sons Richard (16) and Mario (14). The Manns reside in Owings Mills.

Scott O'Brien, a coach whose nonstop enthusiasm is legendary among his players, dubbed his special teams the "Strike Force". The level of achievement to earn the elite *SF* status is staggering, but attainable. O'Brien was voted NFL Special Teams' Coach of the Year ('94) by his peers. The voting margin for "Scotty-O" was the largest in the award's then seven-year history.

Entering '97, K Matt Stover's 127 field goals in 159 attempts (.7987), made him the NFL's third-most accurate kicker of all time (min. 100 FGs), behind Doug Pelfrey (.8125) and Nick Lowery (.7996). Greg Montgomery, was one of the best punters in the NFL last season, finishing with a 43.6-yard average on 68 punts, with five touchbacks (tied for fourth lowest in the NFL). It was the first time in his career that Montgomery downed 23 punts inside the 20-yard line (best was 19 in '94). He booted the second longest punt of his career, a 67-yarder vs. New Orleans (LG was 77 at San Diego, '93).

Under Scott's tutoring, Stover set a Browns' single-season field-goal record with 29 three-pointers in 1995 to break his old mark of 26 set in '94. His 87.9% success rate (29 of 33) was first in the AFC (second in the NFL).

In 1994, the Browns' special teams ranked first in the NFL in the following areas: field goal percentage, 92.8% (K Matt Stover was 26 of 28); two-point conversions, 4 of 5; avg. starting point after kickoffs, 33.4; PAT %, tied with 20 others at 100%; points scored, 24, tied with 3 others; and points allowed, 0, tied with 11 others. *The Dallas Morning News* surveyed all NFL teams and reported that Cleveland (126.5) finished first in NFL team rankings by a full 110 points over second place Denver (236.5).

Scott came to the Browns from the University of Pittsburgh (1987-90), where he coached special teams and assisted in coaching the defensive line. Prior to his four years at Pittsburgh, he coached linebackers and special teams at Wisconsin-Superior (1980-82), Nevada-Las Vegas (1983-85), and Rice (1986).

O'Brien, 40, was a linebacker at Wisconsin-Superior, and he also ran track and played hockey. Scott was signed by the Green Bay Packers (1979) and the Toronto Argonauts (1980). He earned his bachelor's degree in 1979 and master's degree in education from Nevada-Las Vegas in 1984. O'Brien was graduated from Superior (WI) Senior H.S. in 1975.

Scott is married to the former Shawn Kinney of Superior, WI, and the O'Briens reside in Baltimore County. Shawn earned a doctorate in psychology from the University of Pittsburgh.

Alvin Reynolds marks his second year in Baltimore coaching Ravens' defensive backs. In '96, the defensive backfield was impacted by injuries to the "front seven", causing a mid-season switch from a 4-3 to a 3-4 scheme and back for the final two games. CB Antonio Langham led the team with 21 defended passes and tied S Eric Turner (who signed with Oakland in the offseason) with five INTs. Turner (112) and S Stevon Moore (108), finished second and third, respectively, on the team's final tackle chart.

Changes expected to improve the secondary this season include the acquisition of safety Rondell Jones, considered one of the best special teams' players in the NFL. Reynolds coached Jones while the two were members of the Denver Broncos. Safeties Kim Herring (D2b'97) and Ralph Staten (D7c'97) will join veteran DBs Langham, Moore, Bennie Thompson, DeRon Jenkins, Donny Brady, and Dorian Brew.

Alvin, a defensive assistant for the Denver Broncos (1993-95), held responsibilities that included quality control and assisting the special teams and the defensive backs' coach. He coached FS Steve Atwater, who made his sixth straight appearance in the Pro Bowl and marked his first start in Aloha Stadium in '95. That season, Denver ranked ninth in the NFL on pass defense and was the only AFC team that did not give up a 300-yard passing performance (San Francisco and Philadelphia were the two NFC teams).

Reynolds, 38, launched a 10-year coaching career at his alma mater, Indiana State University (1983-92), where he spent three years (1990-92) as assistant head coach and recruiting coordinator, plus coached the secondary. After accepting his first post at ISU as a graduate assistant in '82, he was elevated to full-time status as a secondary coach in '83. During his tenure with ISU, Alvin helped develop the talents of two All-America selections, Wayne Davis (Washington Redskins) and Vencie Glenn (Chargers, Saints, Vikings and Giants).

Reynolds played strong safety at ISU (1978-81), and as a senior, received two votes for the Heisman Trophy. His four-year career stats include 225 tackles, 21 passes defended, five fumble recoveries and five INTs. Alvin received his bachelor's degree in business management (1982) and his master's in political science (1990). He was president of the University Club at ISU and served as a member of several groups: the President's Committee on Ethnic Diversity, the Indiana Black Expo, the Charles T. Hyte University Center (as president of the board), and the Minority Students Retentions Program Committee. Reynolds was active in the Denver chapter of the 100 Black Men of America Organization, which emphasizes education and job training for the underprivileged. He attended West Jefferson H.S. in Harvey, LA, where he was an All-American in football and two-time MVP on the track team. Reynolds has one son, Alvin, Jr., (12).

Jerry Simmons' best advice for a player's conditioning program is to "never get out of condition in the first place." As early as February, Jerry designs specific workout routines for players' individual needs, he reviews the program with the players, and each one participates on an almost daily basis. Jerry's ideal is to "limit injuries and maximize abilities."

The '97 offseason program consisted of an extensive full-body routine that included, not only strength and conditioning, but flexibility, speed, power and agility training. This enables players to maximize their natural abilities while reducing the chance of injury. Assisting Jerry in the weight room for a second straight year is former Pro Bowl running back John Settle (Washington, Atlanta).

Simmons, formerly the strength coach at the New England Patriots for three years (1988-90), was a strength training site director at the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles. In 1978, he accepted a position as assistant strength coach and graduate assistant working with linebackers at Fort Hays (Kan.) State University. Although Simmons left coaching in 1979, he returned as an assistant strength coach at Clemson (1980). He moved to Rice University (1981-82) as the strength and conditioning coach and designed the school's first strength facility. From 1983-88, he held that position at the University of Southern California.

Simmons graduated from Fort Hays State (1977), where he played linebacker for two years, with a degree in physical education. He acquired his master's (1978) in secondary school and administration and physical education at his alma mater. Simmons began his collegiate playing career at Garden City (KS) Junior College. Jerry, 43, attended Elkhart (KS) H.S. and earned all-state football honors as a senior.

Jerry and his wife, Rebecca, have two sons: Joseph (14), and Jordon (9), and one daughter, Jennifer (12). The Simmons' family resides in Reisterstown.

Don Strock, who will play a significant role in calling plays this season, marks his second year as both a Baltimore Raven and NFL quarterbacks' coach. Strock first joined Art Modell's franchise as a Cleveland Brown in 1988. The 15-year veteran NFL quarterback (Miami, 1973-87), joined the team in a reserve role, but was later called upon to help guide Cleveland to the playoffs in an unusual season of quarterback injuries.

In '96, the Ravens finished second in the league in passing (behind Jacksonville). QB Vinny Testaverde capped his best season with his first trip to the Pro Bowl, having established several milestones: 33 TD passes (second in NFL to Brett Favre's 39), an 88.7 QB rating (2nd, AFC; 5th NFL), and his 4,177 yards (2nd, NFL) made him the eighth QB in NFL history to throw for 4,000 yards and 30 TDs in a single season (first from a team under .500).

Strock was a fifth-round draft selection of the Miami Dolphins in 1973 and spent one year each with Cleveland (1988) and Indianapolis (1989). His career statistics include: 443 completions in 779 attempts for 5,349 yards with 45 touchdowns and 42 interceptions. While with Cleveland, Strock started two of four games and was one of four starters at quarterback in an injury-plagued '88 season (QBs Bernie Kosar, Mike Pagel, and Gary Danielson were casualties). Don signed with Indianapolis on 10/29/89, but did not see action.

Strock, 46, began his coaching career in 1993 with Miami of the Arena Football League, guiding the team to a 5-7 record and the playoffs. In '94 he joined the Mass Marauders (AFL), taking them to an 8-4 mark and the playoffs. Strock was offensive coordinator/quarterback coach of the Rhein Fire of the World League in '95.

Don's outstanding college career involved a pass-oriented offense at Virginia Tech. Overall, he completed 628 of 1,174 attempts (53.5%) for 8,857 yards. Strock led the nation in passing as a senior, made an appearance at the Hula Bowl and was voted Outstanding Offensive Player in Blue-Gray Classic. He holds a bachelor of science degree in distributive education. Don attended Owen J. Roberts H. S. in Pottstown, PA, and lettered in football, basketball and baseball. He and his wife, Debby, reside in Owings Mills.

Ken Whisenhunt, a nine-year NFL veteran at tight end/halfback, enters his first NFL coaching position as the Ravens' tight ends' coach. Whisenhunt spent the last two years coaching special teams and tight ends at Vanderbilt University following his NFL playing career with Atlanta (1985-88), Washington (1989-90), and the New York Jets (1991-93). Originally, he was the Falcons' 12th round draft pick out of Georgia Tech in 1985, when he made the NFL All-Rookie Team.

Whisenhunt, 35, played in 16 games in his rookie year with Atlanta and caught three passes. In 1986, he started 14 games and caught 20 passes for three touchdowns. A shoulder injury in '87 sidelined him after seven games and 17 receptions. He reclaimed his starting role in '88, but then signed with Washington (1989) as a free agent, and spent the entire season on the PUP list with a leg injury. He saw action with the 'Skins in '90, but injuries limited his playing time. Ken signed with the Jets in 1991 and retired from the player ranks in '93. His career stats include: GP/GS: 74/37; 62-601-9.7 avg.-29 LG-5 TDs.

At Vanderbilt (1995-96), Whisenhunt coached tight ends and H-backs, as well as special teams. In 1995, the Commodores ranked 10th nationally in net punting (39.1), blocked five punts and six extra point attempts. In '96, Bill Marinangel averaged 46.6 yards on 77 punts, leading the NCAA Division I schools. Vanderbilt led the SEC and was third in the nation with a 42.7 net punting average.

Whisenhunt earned a degree in civil engineering at Georgia Tech, where he played tight end and ranked second on the career receiving yardage list (1,264 yards) and fourth in all-time receptions (82). He earned recognition on *Sports Illustrated's* All-Walk-On Team. As a freshman (1980), he quarterbacked the Yellow Jackets in a 3-3 tie against top-ranked Notre Dame. A consensus All-ACC pick in 1984, Ken holds the school record for yards-per-catch in a season by a tight end (19.1). Other school honors include: All-America in 1984, Honorable Mention in 1983, and offensive MVP in 1984.

An Augusta, Ga., native, Ken graduated from Richmond Academy in 1980. He lettered in football and baseball (1978, '79-80), and received numerous honors including Offensive MVP in '80 and All-State in baseball (1979, 1980 and MVP 1980). Ken is married to Alice (formerly O'Neill), and the couple have two children: Kenneth, Jr., 6 and Ashley, 4.

After Settle joined Washington (1991-92), he spent two years on injured reserve with ribs ('91) and a knee ('92).

After his release in '93, John signed with the Shreveport Pirates (1994) of the CFL, and subsequently accepted a position as assistant running backs' coach at his alma mater. Settle broke 31 school records at Appalachian State and 19 Southern Conference marks. In 1994, John was inducted into the Appalachian State Hall of Fame. He attended Rockingham (N.C.) County H.S., where he was the conference player of the year as a senior. Ozzie Newsome was one of the 15 finalists for the NFL's Hall of Fame earlier this year and he seems destined to be inducted into that elite group soon. But, it is in the draft room and weaving his way through the intricacies of the NFL's salary cap where Ozzie is getting attention these days.

"Methodically and impressively, Newsome has spent this offseason pushing his team onto higher, more optimistic ground," *The Sporting News* reported last May.

One of the first things Art Modell did when he moved his franchise to Baltimore was invite Ozzie Newsome to join him to become the vice president of player personnel. "I've known Ozzie for almost 20 years," Modell said. "I knew him as great player, a Hall of Fame type athlete. He had tremendous abilities as an athlete, but he worked hard to be the best."

When Newsome retired following the 1990 season, his 13th with the Cleveland Browns, Modell invited him to join the front office as a special assignment scout. Two years later, "the Wizard" was promoted to assistant to the head coach/offense-pro personnel. "I had to find out what direction my career would go," Newsome said. "Art gave me the opportunity to work with the coaches and I enjoyed working with Bill Belichick and his staff. At the same time, I increased my experience with the personnel department and decided that's where I wanted my career to head."

In 1994, Newsome was named the team's director of pro personnel. While he continued to help Belichick on the field, Newsome provided detailed studies on other NFL players and recommended players the team should try to acquire. "I've seen some former players who can't make the transition to the front office. That's not been the case with Ozzie. He attacks his job the same way he became a great player - by working harder than those around him and learning everything he needs to know to be successful," Modell added.

"Drafts are exciting," Newsome explained. "They remind me of getting ready for a big game, like the Steelers or a playoff game. We feel pretty good about the players we acquired over the last two drafts." The first choice under Newsome's direction was left tackle Jonathan Ogden, who headed a strong Ravens' group that included middle linebacker Ray Lewis, cornerback DeRon Jenkins and return specialist/receiver Jermaine Lewis. In his second draft, which received consensus "A's" from reporters across the country, Newsome picked linebackers Peter Boulware and Jamie Sharper, along with safety Kim Herring.

Newsome has already gained induction into three other halls of fame - the National Football Foundation's College Hall of Fame (1994), the NCAA Hall of Fame (1994) and at his beloved University of Alabama (1995). Placed prominently on the wall of Newsome's office is a sideline portrait of "Bear" Bryant. "Coach helped me grow up. He pushed me farther than I thought I could go, both on and off the field," Newsome said.

OVERHEARD...

"Newsome's plans are already taking shape and soon will return the Ravens to respectability...no personnel man in the league has functioned more brightly."

Newsome's pro career is the best of any tight end in NFL history. His 662 receptions (for 7,980 yards) are not only the most ever caught by a tight end, but the most in Browns' history. Ozzie ended his career as the fourth leading NFL receiver of all-time. He earned three Pro Bowls (1981, 1984-85) and was a four-time winner of the Cleveland Touchdown Club's Offensive Player of the Year Award (1978, 1981, 1983 and 1984). His consecutive game reception streak of 150 is the second longest in NFL history.

Newsome, who was named to the All-NFL team of the 1980's (2nd team), consistently received All-AFC and All NFL honors throughout his career. Ozzie, 41, was a 1978 number one draft choice, along with Clay Matthews, and the two are among an elite group of Browns to play in three decades. The others are Gene Hickerson (1958-60, 62-73), Dick Schafrath (1959-71) and Don Cockroft (1968-80).

Winner of the 1990 Byron "Whizzer" White Award as the NFL's top community volunteer, Newsome is widely known for his willingness to help those in need.

Ozzie, who still works out every day, his wife, Gloria, and their son Michael Ryan live in Cockeysville.

Savage is responsible for the organization and administration of the team's college scouting department along with the evaluation of hundreds of prospects across the country.

Under the direction of vice president of player personnel Ozzie Newsome, Savage and his staff held successful drafts in both '96 and '97. Last season, OT Jonathan Ogden (D1a, UCLA) and LB Ray Lewis (D1b, Miami) earned consensus All-Rookie honors. In the '97 NFL Draft, the Ravens' scouting team selected pass rush standout LB Peter Boulware (D1, Florida State), Virginia's all-time leading tackler (435) LB Jamie Sharper (D2a) and S Kim Herring (D2b, Penn State), who is expected to challenge for the starting role at free safety.

Phil joined Cleveland in '91, after a month-long stint as tight ends/running backs' coach for the San Antonio Riders of the World League. His first three years with the Browns' coaching staff was as an assistant to former defensive coordinator Nick Saban (now head coach at Michigan State). The following year, Phil took on added duties in the personnel area when he began scouting college players, while continuing to break down coaching film and compiling scouting reports on upcoming opponents.

Savage, 32, launched his coaching career at the age of 21, when he served as a graduate assistant at Alabama under Bill Curry in 1987. From 1988-89, he coordinated the projects of other Alabama graduate assistants, plus coached the tight ends. In 1990, Savage followed Alabama offensive coordinator Homer Smith to UCLA, where he coached tight ends, analyzed opponent game video and helped with administrative duties for the Bruins' offense.

Savage played football and baseball at the University of the South (Sewanee, TN) and earned a B.A. in English. As a senior, he was selected as the school's Fellowship of Christian Athletes' Male Athlete of the Year. He received a master's in physical education from Alabama. One of Phil's offseason projects includes holding a football skill camp for high school players in his hometown of Mobile, where Murphy H.S. (his alma mater) is located. Phil, who is single, resides in Fairhope, AL.

James Harris was named to the post of director of pro personnel in February of '97. He spent four years with the New York Jets (1993-96) as the assistant general manager and prior to that stint, gained six years of scouting experience with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1987-92). A former pro quarterback, James played for three NFL teams: Buffalo Bills (1969-71), L.A. Rams (1972-76) and San Diego Chargers (1977-81). He was drafted as the eighth selection of the Buffalo Bills (1969) out of Grambling.

Harris' efforts this past offseason brought the talents of several distinctive NFL free agents to the Ravens: G Leo Goetas (St. Louis Rams), whose versatility includes experience at guard, center and tackle; S Rondell Jones (Denver Broncos), considered one of the NFL's best special teams' players; DT Tony Siragusa (Indianapolis), one of the league's best run stoppers; and DE Michael McCrary, one of the AFC's top sackers (13.5) in '96.

At the Jets, Harris specialized in the free agent recruiting process and brought players like Neil O'Donnell, Jumbo Elliott, David Williams, Jeff Graham, Frank Reich, Matt Brock, Gary Jones and Erik Howard to New York. His responsibilities included evaluating college and pro talent, free agent and draft preparation, scouting combines and player signings.

During his 12-year career in the NFL as a quarterback, James passed for 8,136 yards and 45 touchdowns. He led the NFL with an 89.8 pass rating in 1976 and was named MVP of the 1975 Pro Bowl, rallying the NFC to a 14-13 victory with two touchdown passes. His best day came against Miami in 1976 with 17 completions in 29 attempts for 436 yards and two touchdowns.

Harris' was coached by college football's winningest coach, Grambling's Eddie Robinson. The Tigers won back-to-back SWAC titles in 1967 and 1968. James was named MVP of the 1967 Orange Blossom Classic. He earned a bachelor's degree in education and was subsequently nominated as a distinguished alumni for his contributions to American society during his NFL career. Harris was inducted into the SWAC Hall of Fame and the Grambling Athletic Hall of Fame. Nicknamed "Shaq," James attended Carroll (Monroe, LA) High School. Marciniak lives in Garland, TX, and is responsible for the Western part of the U.S.

Ron was head coach at Dayton for four years (1973-76). His collegiate coaching career began as an assistant at Arizona (1959-66). Ron later gained experience at Southern Illinois (1967-68), Tulsa (1969), Northwestern (1970-72), Purdue (1973), Miami, Fla. (1977-79) and Colorado (1979-81).

The N.Y. Giants drafted Marciniak in the seventh-round in 1955, and before his rookie season, traded him to Washington. His retirement came on the heels of a diagnosis indicating a high-risk spinal condition. Newsome had been a valuable Plan B (L.A. Rams) acquisition for the Browns prior to the '91 campaign. For the past five seasons, Vince's scouting duties have been primarily concentrated on the West Coast.

Newsome, 36, played with Cleveland for two years prior to his retirement. He totaled 233 tackles for the Browns, leading the defense in '91 with 127 stops. With the Rams, Newsome led the team in tackles each of his last two seasons and three times in his last five years. His 10-year career totals include: 763 tackles (526 solo), four sacks and 62 defended passes. Vince grabbed 17 interceptions in his career, forced seven fumbles and recovered nine. He was originally a fourth-round selection by the Rams in 1983.

Newsome earned honorable mention All-America honors as a senior for the Huskies. He led the secondary with 69 tackles and recorded four interceptions. Vince was president of Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity at Washington and majored in psychology.

Born in Braintree, England, Vince attended Vacaville (CA) H.S., where he lettered in football, basketball and track. He held the nation's second-best time in hurdles (36.3) as a senior and had a personal best time of 48.0 in the quarter mile. Following his playing days, Perkins landed his first coaching job in 1972 as offensive coordinator for the Los Angeles Mustangs. Perkins directed all facets of the Mustangs' offense before joining Compton (CA) College, where he has spent the last 24 years. Perkins climbed the ranks at Compton College, starting out as an offensive coach (1974-77) in charge of quarterbacks, wide receivers, and running backs, before being promoted to director of cooperative education. In that position (1977-79), he coordinated a program between upper level management of large American companies and college students to provide the students with practical experience and training that would enhance their employment opportunities after graduation. He was captain of the football and basketball teams in his senior year, and named first-team All-State in football and second-team All-State in basketball as a senior. Ernie played at Ohio State (1943) and Great Lakes Academy (1944) then returned to the Buckeyes (1946) before transferring to Miami of Ohio (1947-49), where he earned his degree in education. He spent two years as a member of the CFL scouting combine (1985-86) and served as offensive coordinator of the CFL Toronto Argonauts (1986-89). After his pro tenure, Rainsberger returned to collegiate competition (Toledo) in 1989 to work as the offensive line coach. The 1990 Rockets were MAC

champions with a 7-1 mark (9-2 overall). In '91, Rainsberger was given the added title of assistant head coach.

He was named head coach at Washburn (1962-65), where he led his team to a 10-1 record and the 1964 league championship (last championship was 1942). He became defensive coordinator at Kansas (1965-66), then head coach at Southern Illinois. In 1972, he was offensive/defensive coordinator at Illinois (1967-72), later accepting a post as offensive/recruiting coordinator at Wisconsin (1972-74). His 1973 Wisconsin offense was among the top 10 in the nation. In 1974, he was named head coach at his alma mater, Kansas State (1974-78).

Ellis was a three-year letterman for the Wildcats and was an All-Big Eight selection (1956-57) and an Academic All-American (1957). He also lettered twice in wrestling, winning the Missouri Valley title. Rainsberger and his wife, Shirley, have six grown children: Becky, Bud, Cathy, Sandy, Chris and Mike. One of the key Cleveland Browns' employees Ravens' owner Art Modell invited to join his franchise in Baltimore is Kevin Byrne. "Kevin has earned respect around the league and among the reporters who cover the NFL. Keeping him with the franchise was important," Modell said.

Byrne is in his 19th year in the NFL and 15 of the first 17 were spent with Modell in Cleveland, which is Kevin's hometown. "I have great respect for Art, and saw first-hand the difficulties he faced in making the franchise operate in Cleveland," Byrne said.

While he currently directs the Browns' public relations' department, Byrne also has supervised the team's ticketing department, and continues to work closely with the marketing staff. He has negotiated a number of the team's preseason television and radio contracts and also coordinated some Cleveland Stadium Corporation activities.

Along with David Modell, Byrne helped start the team's television productions in Cleveland. The Browns were the first NFL team to produce their own preseason games and weekly TV shows. When they left Cleveland, the team was producing four weekly TV shows, including "Browns' Insider", which was nominated for a local "Emmy" for "best sports' programming" three of five years (1990-94). In the six years of Browns' television, Byrne wrote most of the shows.

Byrne began his NFL career with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1977 when he was named as the then youngest public relations director in the league. He stayed with the Big Red for two years before becoming Director of Public Affairs for Trans World Airline (1979-80).

From 1974-77, Byrne was sports information director at Marquette University, where he worked with Al McGuire and the Warriors' 1977 NCAA basketball champions. His first job after graduating from college was as the "SID" at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. His publications at both schools won numerous national and regional awards from the College Sports Information Directors' Association.

Byrne earned distinction as a member of Alpha Sigma Nu, the National Jesuit Honor Society, while gaining a degree in journalism from Marquette University (1971). He was a member of "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities" and was a four-year member of the Warrior wrestling team. Kevin is a graduate of Lakewood (OH) St. Edward High School, where he recently resigned as Chairman of the school's Board of Trustees. (He continues as a board member).

For 11 years (1985-96), he was the chairman of the NFL's Pro Football Writers' Liaison Committee. Byrne has been selected by the NFL office to work 12 Super Bowls and two Pro Bowls.

Included in Cope's responsibilities are sales of stadium suites, stadium signage, publication advertising, plus radio and television commercial time sales.

David Modell expressed his enthusiasm for Cope: "As we searched for the right person to head our marketing and sales, more than a few people recommended David. He had already helped a number of professional franchises in this area, and we feel fortunate he joined our team."

Prior to joining the Ravens, Cope was the General Sales Manager for Capitol Sports, where he was responsible for corporate sponsorship sales and broadcast operations for the Washington Bullets, Washington Capitals, USAir Arena and other regional sports and entertainment properties (Georgetown basketball, Washington Warhogs, Baltimore Arena, Patriot Center and TicketMaster).

With his new responsibilities, Moriarty became the team's prominent negotiator of player contracts. "I think my background as a player, although my career was very short, plus my history in banking, helped me prepare for

negotiating player contracts," Moriarty said. "I respect what the player has to go through to play at this level and his need to maximize his earnings. At the same time, I understand the organization's need to treat each player fairly and within reason."

Moriarty, who first earned a reputation in the Cleveland area for his high school athletic achievements, is a former running back for the Browns. He made the team as a free agent rookie in 1979, scoring two touchdowns and playing special teams. "I feel very proud that I played in the NFL, especially in my hometown," Moriarty said.

Along with his duties with contracts, Pat also assists executive vice president Jim Bailey with a number of projects and day-to-day operational duties. "Pat's responsibilities have grown since he joined us in 1994. His banking background helps us through the maze of financial matters NFL clubs face," Bailey explained. When the current Ravens transferred to Baltimore from Cleveland in 1996, Bill's tireless efforts towards re-establishing the Owings Mills' training facility from an operating standpoint was a key factor in a smooth transition.

"Bill Tessendorf is a dedicated worker who is a very, very valuable member of our organization," said owner Art Modell of the man who is entering his 13th season as head trainer. The Ohio Athletic Trainers' Association felt that way as well, bestowing upon Bill the Clinical/Professional Trainer of the Year Award in May of 1989.

PRO: Derrick blossomed into a big-play threat last season, achieving career highs with 1,099 yards on 62 catches and nine TDs (tied for fifth in the AFC)...He was voted as first alternate to the AFC Pro Bowl squad and teamed with close friend Michael Jackson to form one of the league's

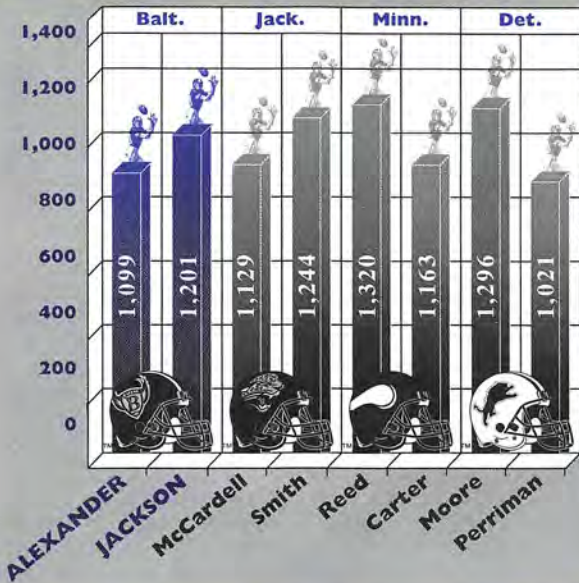

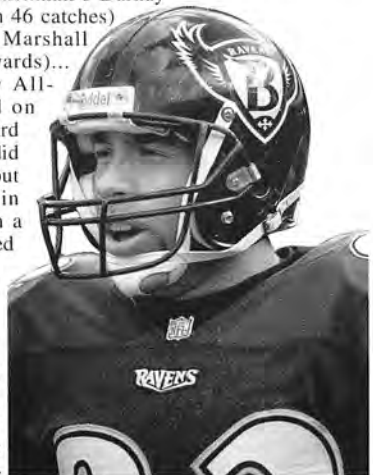

NFL's 1,000 Yard Duos in 1996



1995: Led team with a 13.6-yard punt return avg., with one TD, and was second with a 20.0-yard kickoff return avg. on 21 returns...Also had 216 yards on 15 receptions...Returned three kickoffs 78 yards, including a season-long 42-yarder at Minn. (12/9)...On inactive list at Cinc. (10/29) and vs. Jacksonville (10/22) with a lower leg injury...Raced 69 yards for a touchdown on a first quarter punt return vs. Buffalo (10/2), the Browns' only TD of the game...Was his first career PR-TD and the 10th-longest in team history...Caught one 10-yard pass, and gained 29 rushing yards on a reverse...Gained 92 yards on three receptions in 22-6 win vs. Tampa Bay (9/10), including a key 40-yarder in final scoring drive of the first half to stake the Browns to a 19-0 halftime lead.

1994: Finished rookie season as team's leading receiver with 48 catches for 828 yards (17.3 avg.) and two TDs, the best yardage total by a Browns' rookie since Paul Warfield in 1964...Recorded three 100-yard games, tying Warfield's rookie mark, set in 1964...Second among NFL rookies in both receiving yards (Cincinnati's Darnay Scott led rookies with 866 yards on 46 catches) and receptions (Indianapolis RB Marshall Faulk caught 52 passes for 522 yards)... Earned spot on *Football News* All-Rookie Team...Finished second on team with 41 first downs, 15 on third down (team high)...In playoffs, he did not catch a pass at Pitt. (1/7/95), but had five receptions for 69 yards in 20-14 win vs. N.E. (1/1/95), with a LG of 23 on opening drive...Gained week 14's NFL-high 177 yards on seven receptions vs. N.Y.G. (12/4), the ninth best single-game total in team history...On inactive list at Phil. (11/13) with a sprained ankle...Started third straight game in 27-7 victory over the Jets (10/2) and played key role, leading all receivers with seven receptions for 105 yards...Was his second 100-



yard game in only his third NFL start...Also gained 25 yards on a reverse...Responded to first pro start vs. Arizona (9/18) with 136 yards on six receptions, including an 81-yard fourth quarter TD catch and run, tied for the sixth-longest in team history (Dub Jones from Otto Graham, vs. S.F., 9/30/51)...Recorded first two receptions of career, a 22-yarder and 10-yarder vs. Pitt. 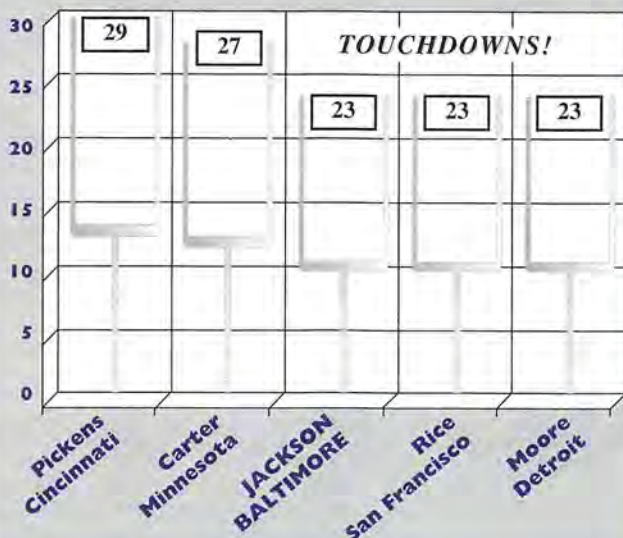

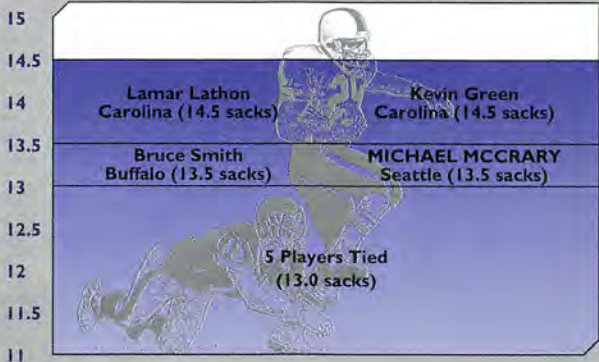

Baltimore celebrated the return of NFL football after a wait of 13 years, as the largest crowd in the city's professional sports history, 64,124, watched the Ravens defeat the visiting Oakland Raiders, 19-14. RB Earnest Byner's one-yard plunge midway through the fourth quarter capped an eight-play, 83-yard, no-huddle drive for the victory. The game followed an emotional pre-game ceremony in sun-drenched Memorial Stadium, as 50 former Baltimore Colts were introduced and Hall of Famer John Unitas presented the game ball to referee Dale Hamer. QB Vinny Testaverde scored the Ravens' first-ever TD when he raced nine-yards up the middle with 39 seconds left in the first quarter. The Raiders' Tim Brown caught two Billy Joe Hobert TD passes (seven and 10 yards) to stake Oakland to a 14-7 halftime lead. Matt Stover kicked two third-quarter field goals (25 and 37 yards) to pull Baltimore to within a point, 14-13. Testaverde (19 of 33 for 254 yards, no INTs) led Baltimore on its game-winning march by completing his first pass for 27 yards to Michael Jackson and his second for 25 yards to Earnest Hunter. The Ravens ran the ball the rest of the way in for the win. The Ravens' defense limited Oakland to 238 total net yards and did not permit Oakland past its own 42-yard line in the second half. Rookie MLB Ray Lewis led the charge with seven tackles and an interception in the endzone for a touchback in the second quarter. Antonio Langham added a 28-yard interception to halt the Raiders' first second-half drive. Both quarterbacks were sacked three times. Ted Marchibroda called for the no-huddle attack in the second half in 86-degree heat, and it resulted in 189 yards and three scoring drives. Testaverde gained 42 yards rushing on eight carries, while Byner gained 43 on 14 rushes. TE Brian Kinchen, Byner and FB Carwell Gardner each caught four passes, while Michael Jackson gained 60 yards on three receptions. The Ravens had 21 first downs vs. Oakland's 13, out-gained the Raiders, 314 yards to 238 and dominated time of possession, 34:38 to 25:22.

The Ravens dropped to 1-1 with a 31-17 loss to the Pittsburgh Steelers at Three Rivers Stadium. Steelers' QB Mike Tomczak threw two TD passes, while completing 18 of 25 passes for 198 yards. The Steelers rolled up 206 yards rushing and controlled time of possession 35:11 to 24:49. CB Rod Woodson raced 43 yards for a TD on the second play of the game after intercepting Ravens' QB Vinny Testaverde (13 of 24 for 159 yards, one TD, one INT). Baltimore tied the score on a 10-play, 65-yard drive capped by Testaverde's six-yard TD run. The Steelers then marched 70 yards on nine plays and Jerome Bettis (116 yards on 21 carries) scored from one yard out, but Testaverde fired a 17-yard TD pass to Derrick Alexander to knot the score at 14-14. Tomczak threw a five yard pass to WR Charles Johnson to give the Steelers a seven-point lead, 21-14, and then hit WR Andre Hastings from 20 yards out for a 28-14 lead midway through the second quarter. Tomczak's second TD pass was set up after a Testaverde fumble gave Pittsburgh the ball at Baltimore's 43. DE Rob Burnett forced a Tomczak fumble that was recovered by LB Jerrol Williams to set up a Matt Stover 29-yard field goal to make the score 28-17, Pittsburgh at halftime. The Steelers opened the second half with a 14-play, 63-yard march that resulted in a Norm Johnson 35-yard field goal, the final tally of the game. Pittsburgh controlled the third-quarter game clock, 12:33 to 2:27. The Ravens drove to Pittsburgh's two midway through the final quarter, but Earnest Hunter fumbled at the goal line on a first-and-goal-to-go to stymie the Ravens' comeback bid.

The Ravens dropped to 1-2 on the year with a disappointing 29-13 loss to the host Houston Oilers before only 20,082 fans. Turnovers proved too costly to overcome, as Houston converted three interceptions into two touchdowns and scored a safety on an errant deep snap. The Oilers' average drive start was their own 42, while Baltimore averaged drive starts on its own 23. Houston opened the scoring when Chris Chandler (16 of 27 for 162 yards, two TDs) hit TE Frank Wycheck on a three-yard pass. That drive was set-up when CB Darryll Lewis pried the ball away from WR Derrick Alexander at Baltimore's 36 on a perfectly thrown Vinny Testaverde pass (ruling was an interception). Testaverde (25 of 40 for 217 yards, two TDs, three INTs) suffered his second turnover when FS Marcus Robertson stepped in front of a pass intended for Calvin Williams and returned the ball to the Baltimore 23. Three plays later, Chandler found Willie Davis for an 18-yard TD and a 14-0 Oilers' lead in the first quarter. Testaverde led the Ravens on a 10-play, 64-yard drive and connected with Michael Jackson for a seven-yard TD pass, but Houston marched back to kick a field goal to make the score 17-7 at the half, as Baltimore's last drive failed to produce points before the second quarter clock ran out. The Ravens' first second-half possession resulted in a safety when Brian Kinchen's deep snap to Greg Montgomery sailed over his head and was alertly tossed out of the back of the endzone by the ex-Oiler. Later in the third quarter, Ronnie Harmon scored on a two-yard run to give Houston a commanding 26-7 lead. Al Del Greco kicked his second field goal of the day in the fourth quarter for a 29-7 Houston lead, then Baltimore's Herman Arvie, who reported into the game as an eligible receiver, caught a one-yard pass from Testaverde with just over two minutes remaining to complete the scoring.

Bolstered by Earnest Byner's 149 yards rushing, the Ravens defeated the New Orleans Saints 17-10 at Memorial Stadium to even their record at 2-2. The 34-year old Byner recorded his 20th career 100-yard game, carried the ball 24 times, and had a 42-yard gain in the second quarter, his second-longest rush from scrimmage and the longest since his rookie season (1984). QB Vinny Testaverde had a workman-like day, completing 11 of 20 passes for 186 yards and two TDs. The Ravens did not turn the ball over (nor did the Saints). Testaverde threw TD passes to Derrick Alexander (64 yards) and Michael Jackson (six yards). K Matt Stover kicked a 38-yard field goal in the second quarter, but missed on attempts of 48 and 49 yards, his first multiple miss game since 1993. New Orleans' QB Jim Everett was 23 of 30 for 207 yards, including a 31-yard TD pass to WR Michael Haynes to tie the score, 10-10, early in the fourth quarter. Baltimore then took control of the game by dominating the remaining time of possession, 10:44 to 4:16. After Testaverde found Jackson on the six-yard fade to put the Ravens ahead, 17-10, the Saints drove to the Baltimore 31. Facing a fourth-and-one, Everett tried a QB sneak over left guard, but was stopped short of the first down. Baltimore subsequently ran out the final 6:23 by gaining three rushing first downs, the final blow a two-yard fourth-down conversion by Byner. The victory improved the Ravens' home mark to 2-0 and kept them a game out of first place in the AFC Central (behind 3-1 Pittsburgh).

In the highest scoring NFL game since 1991, the New England Patriots beat the Ravens, 46-38, at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium. It was the most points scored in a game since Buffalo defeated Pittsburgh, 52-34, on 9/8/91. Baltimore scored 24 fourth-quarter points to claw back into the game after trailing 38-14 early in the final period. Both quarterbacks enjoyed terrific success in the passing game, as New England's Drew Bledsoe threw four TDs, and Baltimore's Vinny Testaverde threw for three scores. Both QBs threw for over 300 yards to account for the 663 yards of passing in the game. The two clubs set an NFL record with five two-point conversions, the Ravens setting the NFL mark with three two-pointers, and the Patriots adding two. The Patriots managed three field goals from K Adam Vinatieri, and blocked a Greg Montgomery punt in the fourth quarter that was returned four yards for a TD by Tedy Bruschi for a New England score to give New England a 46-22 lead with 7:53 left in the game. Vinny Testaverde (29 of 45 for 353 yards) led Baltimore on an 11-play, 60-yard drive capped by Earnest Byner's five-yard TD run. Byner's second TD rush of the game. Testaverde hit Michael Jackson on a corner fade for a two point conversion, Jackson's second of the game. The ensuing onside kick was recovered by Baltimore, and Testaverde then threw a 27-yard TD pass to Jackson and FB Carwell Gardner converted the two-point conversion, the Ravens' NFL record third of the game, to close the gap to 46-38. Baltimore forced a New England punt to regain possession with 49 seconds remaining, but were unable to score as New England won its first road game of the season and the Ravens lost their first at home. Penalties haunted the Ravens (13-146), who entered the game as the league's least penalized team (11-10) after four games).

The Ravens suffered a heartbreaking 26-21 loss to the host Indianapolis Colts in front of a national television audience and 56,978 fans. The setback was magnified by the loss of starting defensive linemen Rob Burnett (knee ligament damage) and Dan Footman (fractured arm), and overshadowed a gutsy performance from QB Vinny Testaverde, who threw for three TD passes while constantly on the move avoiding pressure. Testaverde threw two scoring passes to WR Derrick Alexander (23 and five yards) and a three-yard TD pass to WR Calvin Williams. It was Vinny's second straight three-touchdown game. Indianapolis jumped to a 10-0 lead on Cary Blanchard's 27-yard field goal and a Jim Harbaugh 30-yard TD pass to WR Brian Stablein on a blown coverage. The Ravens' ensuing possession ended in Alexander's 23-yard TD catch, but Indianapolis marched back to kick a field goal and take a 13-7 lead into the locker room at halftime. Baltimore took the opening drive of the second half 67 yards in 11 plays, as Testaverde found Alexander in the corner of the endzone for a 14-13 lead, Alexander's first career two-TD game. But the Colts also drove 67 yards on their next possession and Marshall Faulk scored on his third try on first-and-goal at the one to give the Colts a 20-14 lead. On the Ravens' next drive, Testaverde was intercepted by LB Jeff Herrod, who raced 68 yards for a TD, the longest INT return for a TD by a Colts' linebacker in franchise history. With 4:09 left in the game, Vinny hit Williams on a three-yard TD pass ending a drive that featured a gutsy 16-yard Testaverde run to setup a first-and-goal situation. The Ravens forced the Colts to punt and had a chance for the go-ahead TD, but Alexander dropped a long pass, the officials ruled that Michael Jackson stepped out of bounds (and came back in) on an 11-yard pickup, and a failed fourth-down attempt ended the drive. Baltimore forced yet another Colts' punt and got the ball back with just 25 seconds remaining, but were unable to advance past midfield. Baltimore's defense sacked Harbaugh four times, limited him to 155 yards passing, and held the Colts to a 3.2-yard rushing average, despite playing without starters Footman, Burnett, LB Mike Caldwell (knee) and S Eric Turner (ankle).

The Ravens dropped a wild offensive shoot-out to the host Denver Broncos, 45-34, at Mile High Stadium. QB Vinny Testaverde threw a career-high four TD passes and the Ravens took a 34-31 lead into the fourth quarter, but Denver's John Elway drove the Broncos to two fourth-quarter scores for the win. The Ravens overcame an 18-point second-quarter deficit, as Testaverde (27 of 45 for 338 yards, four TDs, one INT) hit RB Earnest Byner, WR Floyd Turner and WR Michael Jackson twice for touchdowns. Meanwhile, Elway (25 of 39 for 326 yards, three TDs, one INT) found WR Ed McCaffrey for all three of his scoring tosses, and RB Terrell Davis rushed for a team-record 194 yards on 28 carries and two TDs, including a 71-yard TD scamper in the first quarter to post the Broncos to a 14-0 lead. After a Matt Stover 45-yard field goal, Davis scored on a four-yard run to stake the Broncos to a seemingly insurmountable 21-3 lead. Testaverde threw a four-yard swing pass to Earnest Byner for a TD to cut the score to 21-10, then CB Antonio Langham recorded the first Ravens' turnover in five games when he picked off Elway near midfield and returned the ball to the Broncos' 18. But Baltimore was able to manage only a Stover 33-yard field goal, and Elway drove the Broncos 75 yards in eight plays for a 28-13 half-time lead. Testaverde led the Ravens' on three straight third-quarter scoring drives, hitting Floyd Turner on an 11-yard TD pass, and Michael Jackson on 25 and nine-yarders. After Elway's third TD pass to McCaffrey made the score 38-34, the Broncos drove to the Ravens' one-yard line and, facing fourth down, Davis was stopped shy of the goal line. Baltimore faced 99 yards with 1:57

remaining for the potential go-ahead score, but Testaverde's pass on third-and-10 was intercepted by Tyrone Braxton and returned to Baltimore's 15. Elway subsequently scored on a nine-yard rush on third-and-four to put the game out of reach. The Ravens' defense surrendered 548 total net yards, including 222 yards rushing. Baltimore played the game without defensive starters Eric Turner (ankle), Rob Burnett (knee), Dan Footman (forearm), Mike Caldwell (knee). During the game, the Ravens' lost offensive linemen Jonathan Ogden (knee) and Steve Everitt (shoulder). WR Derrick Alexander caught six passes for 126 yards for his fifth career 100-yard game, and Testaverde's four TDs.

Vinny Testaverde threw a 22-yard TD pass to Michael Jackson with 10 seconds left in overtime to lift the Ravens to a 37-31 victory over the St. Louis Rams. The game featured several missed opportunities for both teams, as Baltimore had a chance to win the game with four seconds left in regulation, but Matt Stover's 32-yard field goal was wide left. And the Rams had an opportunity to win it in overtime but a muffed snap on Chip Lohmiller's 32-yard field goal attempt turned the ball over to Baltimore. The game featured eight turnovers, 782 yards of passing, 163 plays (including 92 by the Rams) and 22 penalties. While the stats portrayed a poor defensive outing by both teams, the Ravens' defense stopped the Rams at the one-yard line on a first quarter drive and also on fourth down in overtime, forced five fumbles (recovering two) and intercepted Rams' QB Tony Banks twice, while sacking him six times. The Rams jumped to a 20-6 third-quarter lead after S Todd Lyght intercepted Testaverde's pass and returned it 25 yards for a TD, but the Ravens stormed back to score on its next four possessions (Matt Stover's 50-yard field goal, Derrick Alexander's 13-yard TD reception and two Bam Morris TD runs - three and 10 yards) to take a 31-23 lead. Banks drove St. Louis 87 yards in 10 plays, capped by RB Harold Green's one yard run and another Green run for a two-point conversion (the second attempt, as CB Donny Brady was called for defensive holding on the first—and unsuccessful—two point try) to tie the game at 31. On its' next drive, St. Louis turned the ball over when LB Jerrol Williams stripped Banks of the ball and DeRon Jenkins recovered at the St. Louis 41. Testaverde hit WR Floyd Turner over the middle to the 14-yard line, and Stover's potential game-winning 32-yarder sailed wide left to send the game into

overtime. The Rams won the toss and marched to Baltimore's 15 on a 16-play drive. Chip Lohmiller, with new holder Jamie Martin, lined up for the potential game-winning 32-yard FGA, but the snap went through Martin's hands, bounced off his shoulder pads, and S Stevon Moore recovered to give the Ravens new life. On the ensuing possession, Testaverde was sacked by Kevin Carter at the 49, forcing a fumble that was recovered by Leslie O'Neal. But the Rams could not convert a fourth-and-one at the Ravens' 40, Baltimore's second fourth-down stop of the game, and Testaverde had 1:05 left on the clock with the ball on the 40. He hit Michael Jackson on a 23-yard pass, Brian Kinchen for seven and Jackson again for 13, setting up first and 10 at the St. Louis 22 with 20 seconds remaining. The play that was in called for a QB sneak to set up a FGA, but Testaverde changed the play and hit Jackson on the corner fade route in the endzone for the win. Testaverde threw for 429 yards while completing 31 of 51 passes, three TDs and two INTs, the second-highest yardage total of his career and his fourth straight three touchdown day. Jackson (seven receptions for 113 yards and a TD), Floyd Turner (six for 108 and a TD) and Earnest Byner (six for 96) were Testaverde's prime targets. Meanwhile, the Rams' Banks had career highs with 40 attempts, 26 completions and 353 yards, one TD and two INTs. WR Isaac Bruce strafed the Ravens' secondary for 229 yards on 11 catches and a TD.

Doug Pelfrey kicked a 34-yard field goal as time expired to lift the visiting Cincinnati Bengals to a 24-21 win over the Baltimore Ravens. The Ravens squandered a 21-3 halftime lead, reversing a recent trend of Baltimore comebacks. QB Vinny Testaverde threw two touchdown passes (17 yards to Derrick Alexander and 26 yards to Michael Jackson) in the first half, and Bam Morris scored on a one-yard dive to give Baltimore a 21-3 lead at the half. But the second half saw Cincinnati intercept three passes (and four on the day), and control the second half time of possession, 22:01 to 7:59. Cincinnati QB Jeff Blake (22 of 39 for 255 yards, 0 TDs and one INT, plus seven rushes for 49 yards and a TD) led the Bengals on an 88-yard drive in 11 plays in the third quarter to close the gap to 21-10, as Ki-Jana Carter scored from one-yard out. A Testaverde pass on Baltimore's next possession was intercepted by Corey Sawyer, and Blake capped a 77-yard, 12-play drive with a four-yard TD rush. The Bengals converted the two-pointer to pull within three, 21-18 early in the fourth quarter. That TD followed a fourth and goal play from the Ravens' two-yard line that was incomplete, but LB Ray Lewis was called for pass interference to give Cincinnati a first-and-goal from the one. Testaverde was intercepted on each of Baltimore's next two possessions, leading to Doug Pelfrey's 49-yard, game-tying field goal with 1:54 left in the game. The Ravens went three-and-out with 1:45 left, using up only 20 seconds, and Blake drove the Bengals from the Cincinnati 28 to the Baltimore 16 in just five plays. Pelfrey's 34-yard kick was true as time expired to lift Cincinnati to 3-6, while Baltimore fell to 3-6. The Ravens' injury depleted defense suffered a big blow when CB Antonio Langham was forced to leave the game early in the second half with a hamstring pull. He was replaced by rookie CB DeRon Jenkins. WR Floyd Turner led all receivers with 104 yards on six catches.

Mark Brunell scored on a one-yard run with 41 seconds left to propel the Jacksonville Jaguars to a 30-27 victory over the visiting Ravens. The score capped a 27-point second half for Jacksonville, spoiling a commanding halftime lead for Baltimore for the second straight week. The Ravens jumped to a 17-3 lead at intermission behind Vinny Testaverde's five-yard TD pass to Michael Jackson, a 52-yard catch and run by Bam Morris and Matt Stover's 21-yard field goal. Testaverde (17 of 27 for 253 yards, three TDs, no INTs, three lost fumbles) countered a Jacksonville TD to open the third quarter by leading a 64-yard, 11-play drive, and Stover kicked his second 21-yard field goal to make the score 20-10. Jacksonville's Mike Hollis kicked a 33-yarder following a Testaverde fumble to close the gap to 20-13 after three quarters, and then booted a 24-yarder to make the score 20-16 with 11:11 left in the game. On the Ravens' next possession, Testaverde found Derrick Alexander on a 21-yard pass play to lift the Ravens to a 27-16 lead with 6:23 left, The Jags answered with a Brunell to James Stewart eight-yard pass, and the two point attempt failed to make the score 27-22, Ravens, with 3:50 left. Baltimore went three-and-out on its next possession, and Brunell directed a 66-yard, eight-play drive and scored from one-yard on a bootleg left with 46 seconds remaining. RB Bam Morris accounted for 182 yards from scrimmage in his first start as a Raven, as he rushed for 109 yards on 26 carries and scored his first-ever receiving TD on a 52-yard catch and run over the middle. Brunell (24 of 37 for 354 yards, one TD, one INT) was Jacksonville's leading rusher with 58 yards on seven carries, including the game-winning TD. The loss dropped the Ravens to 3-7 and improved the Jaguars to 4-6.

The Ravens dropped a 38-20 game at rainy 3COM park vs. the San Francisco 49ers to fall to 3-8. San Francisco scored 21 second-half points including the final three touchdowns to overcome a 20-17 Baltimore lead early in the third quarter. The Ravens jumped to an early 7-0 lead when QB Vinny Testaverde hooked up with WR Michael Jackson for a 65-yard TD pass on the game's third play from scrimmage. San Francisco countered with a 74-yard drive in six plays, capped by RB Terry Kirby's six-yard TD run. On the ensuing kickoff, KOR Jermaine Lewis fumbled at the Baltimore 28, and Jeff Wilkins kicked a 27-yard field goal to give the 49ers a 10-7 lead. Jerry Rice caught a 34-yard Elvis Grbac pass to open the second quarter, extending San Francisco's lead to 17-7. On the next series, Vinny Testaverde (four of nine for 97 yards, one TD) was sacked by LB Kevin Mitchell and injured his ribs on the play (Testaverde, who had taken every snap this season, was replaced by Eric Zeier). A Dexter Carter fumbled punt return with 5:41 left in the half led to a Matt Stover 43-yard field goal, and Antonio Langham's interception on San Francisco's next possession led to another Stover field goal to make the score 17-13, San Francisco, at halftime. On the opening series of the second half, DE Anthony Pleasant rambled 36 yards to the 49ers' three-yard line on a fumble return after CB DeRon Jenkins stripped Kirby of the ball at the 39-yard line, setting up a Zeier to James Jones two-yard pass. Jones, a defensive tackle, had lined up as an eligible receiver in the goal line offense, and scored his second career offensive TD against San Francisco to give Baltimore a 20-17 lead. The 49ers then mounted a 16-play, 67-yard drive that ate up 8:54 of the third quarter, and William Floyd scored from a yard out to put San Francisco up 24-20. Early in the fourth quarter, DE Chris Doleman stripped Zeier of the ball, and recovered it in the endzone for a 31-20 San Francisco lead. Grbac scored on a one-yard plunge with 21 seconds left in the game to pad the 49er's margin, 38-20. The Ravens caused four turnovers, while surrendering three, the first time since week one that they recorded a positive take-away/give-away ratio. Zeier finished 10 of 21 for 97 yards, while Grbac was 26 of 31 for 268 yards, one TD and two INTs.

Mike Hollis kicked a 34-yard field goal with 5:54 left in overtime to lift the Jacksonville Jaguars to a 28-25 win at Memorial Stadium over the Baltimore Ravens. The Ravens surrendered a 15 point third-quarter lead by allowing two Jacksonville touchdowns in the fourth quarter. K. Matt Stover, who kicked four field goals (21, 29, 41 and 33 yards), missed a 49-yard attempt with seven seconds left in regulation to send the game into overtime, the Ravens' second OT game of the year. Jacksonville won the coin toss in the fifth quarter, but were forced to punt. Baltimore marched from its six-yard line to Jacksonville's 38, but Earnest Byner fumbled on a Kevin Hardy hit, which was recovered by the Jaguars' Kelvin Pritchett. QB Mark Brunell (28 of 46 for 306 yards, two TDs and two INTs), marched the Jaguars 48 yards to set up the game-winning field goal. The Ravens opened the scoring when LB Mike Caldwell intercepted Brunell on the game's fourth play and raced 45 yards for a TD, Baltimore's first defensive TD of the season. A possession later, the Ravens' recovered an apparent fumble by Jacksonville's PR Chris Hudson on Jacksonville's 15, but the officials ruled an inadvertent whistle had been blown. The Ravens advanced into the Jaguars' red zone two times in the second quarter (and once to their 22), but came away with only three Stover field goals. The score at halftime was 16-10 in favor of Baltimore. They increased the lead to 22-10 on the first possession of the third quarter, as Bam Morris slammed in from one-yard out to cap a 54-yard, eight-play drive. Stover kicked his fourth field goal to increase Baltimore's lead to 25-10 late in the third quarter, but Brunell led Jacksonville to two fourth-quarter touchdowns, and converted a successful two-point conversion to force overtime. QB Vinny Testaverde threw for 366 yards, his fourth 300-yard game this season. He completed 31 of 50 passes and was not intercepted. He snapped a 10-game TD passing streak, dating back to week two of the season. WR Michael Jackson and TE Brian Kinchen both set career single-game highs with nine receptions. Jackson's nine catches went for 150 yards, Kinchen's for 71. S Eric Turner intercepted his fifth pass of the season (one in each of the last five games) on the final play of regulation. The loss was Baltimore's fourth straight and seventh in the last eight games. Four of the losses were by less than a TD and in the last four, Baltimore held a second-half lead.

The Ravens snapped a four-game losing streak by defeating the Pittsburgh Steelers, 31-17, at rain-soaked Memorial Stadium. QB Vinny Testaverde threw three touchdown passes and completed 17 of 24 attempts, seven to WR Derrick Alexander, who set a personal best with 198 receiving yards (166 in the second quarter alone). Two ex-Steelers contributed to the win, as RB Bam Morris rushed for 100 yards on 28 carries and TE Eric Green capped the day's scoring with a three-yard TD reception. The Ravens, who had surrendered two fourth quarter TDs in four straight games, limited the Steelers to seven points in the second half, including none in the fourth quarter. Rookie PR Jermaine Lewis set up the first score when he raced 47 yards on a punt return to Pittsburgh's one-yard line. Testaverde then threw a one-yard pass to rookie OL Jonathan Ogden on a tackle eligible play, Ogden's first-ever touchdown. Pittsburgh answered with a Mike Tomczak to Andre Hastings 30-yard scoring pass and a Norm Johnson 22-yard field goal to take a 10-7 lead. Alexander, who surpassed the 1,000-yard mark for the first time in his career, caught a 24-yard pass in the endzone to give Baltimore a 14-10 lead it would not relinquish. A 44-yard completion to Alexander, followed by a 17-yarder, set up Earnest Byner's seven-yard TD rush for a 21-10 margin. Two plays later, LB Mike Croel intercepted a Tomczak pass and Matt Stover kicked a 40-yard field goal as the time expired in the first half for a familiar 24-10 halftime lead. The Steelers marched 46 yards on seven plays and Hastings caught his second TD to open the third quarter. Green's three-yard TD catch early in the fourth quarter completed the scoring. The win was the first by the Ravens/Browns over the Steelers since 10/24/93 (28-23 in Cleveland) and snapped a seven-game losing streak to the defending AFC Champions.

The Ravens suffered another fourth-quarter disappointment by dropping a 21-14 game in Cincinnati against the Bengals to fall to 4-10. The Ravens faced a first-and-goal on the Bengals' six-yard line with 1:02 remaining and the Bengals holding a 21-14 lead. A Bam Morris five-yard rush moved the ball to the one, but two more Morris runs for no gain set up a dramatic fourth and one with 30 seconds remaining. Vinny Testaverde's swing pass to Carwell Gardner was stopped for no gain by S Sam Shade, securing the victory for the 6-8 Bengals, winners of five of their last seven games. Earlier in the fourth quarter, Baltimore took a 14-13 lead after Testaverde found rookie WR Jermaine Lewis for a six-yard touchdown. The Bengals countered with a 68-yard drive led by QB Jeff Blake (26 of 42 for 272 yards, two TDs no INTs) who lobbed a one-yard TD pass to Tony McGee to give Cincinnati the 21-14 lead after Garrison Hearst ran for the two point conversion. Following a scoreless first quarter, Testaverde (21 of 39 for 205 yards, two TDs, one INT), threw a 23-yard TD pass to TE Brian Kinchen to give the Ravens a 7-0 lead. Blake hooked up with Carl Pickens for a game-tying score with a 14-yard TD pass, and then Doug Pelfrey kicked a 23-yard field goal to give the Bengals a 10-7 halftime lead that held until the fourth quarter. RB Bam Morris rushed for 117 yards on 21 carries and Jackson caught seven passes for 81 yards to surpass the 1,000-yard barrier, joining teammate Derrick Alexander in the 1,000-yard club.

The Ravens dropped the final road game of their inaugural season at Ericsson Stadium, 27-16, to the Carolina Panthers. Baltimore held a 13-10 second-half lead (the 10th consecutive game the Ravens held a second-half lead), but the Panthers outscored the Ravens 17-3 in the second half to remain unbeaten at home this season. The loss dropped the Ravens to 4-11, including 0-8 on the road. Pro Bowl QB Vinny Testaverde was intercepted on the game's third play to set-up a John Kasay 29-yard field goal for an early 3-0 Carolina lead, but the Ravens countered with a 12-play, 76-yard drive capped by Testaverde's 23-yard scoring pass to Michael Jackson. Carolina RB Anthony Johnson scored on a two yard rush early in the second quarter for a 10-7, Carolina lead. CB Antonio Langham picked off QB Kerry Collins to set-up a Matt Stover 37-yard field goal to knot the score at 10 with 5:01 left in the half. Following a Carolina punt, Testaverde found Jackson for a potential TD with 45 seconds left in the half, but Jackson was called for offensive pass interference and Baltimore had to settle for a 46-yard field goal with 33 seconds left to give the Ravens a 13-10 lead at the half. The Panthers opened the third quarter with a 12-play, 76-yard march that ended with a Collins to WR Mark Carrier six-yard TD pass, and then Kasay booted a 44-yard FG for a 20-13 Carolina lead. Stover's third field goal early in the fourth quarter sliced the lead to 20-16. After a Baltimore punt on its next possession, Collins drove the Panthers 63 yards, with the 12th play a one-yard TD toss to FB Scott Greene for the game's final score. Testaverde finished 20 of 37 for 240 yards, one TD and two INTs, with six of those completions to TE Brian Kinchen (who gained a career-high 87 yards), five to Jackson and five to Bam Morris. Morris gained 89 yards rushing on 22 carries and 44 receiving yards for 133 combined yards from scrimmage. With LB Ray Lewis unable to play with a hip injury, the Ravens were forced to play a 4-3 defense. Baltimore was able to convert eight of 16 third down conversions, but were stifled in the red zone (they entered the game with the NFL's fourth-best TD pct. inside-the-20), as they came away with only three field goals on three trips inside the redzone.

The Ravens concluded their inaugural season with a 24-21 loss to the Houston Oilers, dropping their record in Memorial Stadium to 4-4. The defeat was the fourth of the season by three points or less, and overshadowed a brilliant individual effort by WR Michael Jackson, who caught three Vinny Testaverde TD passes. Jackson, who totaled five receptions for 117 yards, caught a career-long 86-yard bomb in the first quarter to knot the score at 7-7. Houston then scored 17 unanswered points to take a commanding 24-7 lead into the final quarter. Jackson then caught two fourth quarter TD passes (eight and four yards) to pull Baltimore within three. His last score came with just 13 seconds remaining. Jackson finished the season with 14 TD reception, tied for first in the NFL with San Diego's Tony Martin. He also finished second in the AFC and sixth in NFL with 1,201 yards on 76 receptions. Testaverde concluded his Pro Bowl season with 307 yards passing, three TDs and two INTs. He was sacked four times for 50 yards lost. Houston QB Steve McNair completed 19 of 24 passes for 238 yards and one TD, and he scored on a 24-yard third-quarter scramble. Oilers' RB Eddie George led all rushers with 85 yards on 21 carries and a TD, while Bam Morris paced the Ravens' ground attack with 81 yards on just 12 carries (6.8-yard avg.). Testaverde became the first QB in league history to throw for 4,000 yards and 30 TDs for a sub-.500 team.

HISTORY/RECORDS

History of Pro Football in Baltimore

Note: The following chronology outlines historical highlights of the AAFC and NFL teams based in Baltimore and reflects history while those teams were in Baltimore only.

December 28, 1946 Baltimore was awarded the bankrupt Miami Seahawks franchise of the All-America Football Conference. The team was renamed Colts via a fan contest. Bob Rodenberg heads the purchasing group.

September 7, 1947 The Colts won their first-ever AAFC game over the Brooklyn Dodgers, 16-7, in front of 27,418 fans at Baltimore Stadium with Cecil Isbell as head coach. The Colts finish 2-11-1, drawing just under 200,000 fans.

April 28, 1948 The Colts reorganized, with over 200 stockholders. Jake Embry was named president and Walt Driskill was named general manager.

December 12, 1948 The Colts lose their first-ever playoff game, 28-17, against visiting Buffalo in a game marked by near riots after both teams finished tied for the Eastern Division title with 7-7 marks. Attendance totaled 244,502.

February 24, 1949 Walt Driskill was named president and general manager, with Robert C. Embry becoming vice-chairman of the board.

Fall, 1949 Isbell fired after four games and Driskill was named head coach. Colts finished 1-11.

December 8, 1949 AAFC and NFL reached merger agreement. The Colts entered the NFL for 1950 season.

December 18, 1949 Abraham Watner was named Colts' president.

December 19, 1950 Under head coach Clem Crowe, the Colts finished 1-11 in their first NFL season with a 15-14 loss to the New York Yanks at Yankee Stadium. The Yanks will later become the Baltimore Colts.

January 18, 1951 Watner withdrew the franchise due to financial distress and received \$50,000 for his players by the NFL.

1951 and 1952 No Colts team existed.

December 3, 1952 Commissioner Bert Bell challenged Baltimore to sell 15,000 tickets in six weeks to re-enter NFL. The ticket drive reached its quota in four weeks, three days.

January, 1953 Carroll Rosenbloom headed an ownership group and Baltimore was awarded the Dallas Texan franchise. Don Kellest was named president and Keith Molesworth head coach.

March 25, 1953 Baltimore and Cleveland put together one of the largest trades in sports history, with the Browns trading 10 players to the Colts for five players.

September 27, 1953 The Colts upset the Chicago Bears, 13-9, in the NFL opener at Memorial Stadium.

Spring, 1954 Weeb Ewbank was named head coach.

December 28, 1958 The Colts defeated the New York Giants, 23-17, in Yankee Stadium in "sudden death" for the World Championship. This game sparked the emergence of the NFL as a televised sports' giant.

December 27, 1959 The Colts won their second straight World Championship, again over the Giants, in Baltimore, 31-16.

December 11, 1960 The Rams snapped an NFL-record 47-game consecutive TD pass streak by Johnny Unitas.

January 8, 1963 Don Shula replaced Weeb Ewbank as head coach. Gino Marchetti and Bill Pellington were named player-coaches.

January 20, 1964 Carroll Rosenbloom purchased the remaining shares of the club to gain 100% ownership.

December 13, 1964 Raymond Berry caught his 506th career pass and Lenny Moore scored his 20th touchdown of the season against Washington, both NFL records at the time.

December 27, 1964 The Browns defeated the Colts, 27-0, in Cleveland for the NFL title. Art Modell wins his first NFL title, with Blanton Collier as head coach.

December 26, 1965 The Packers beat the Colts, 13-10 in "sudden death" playoff for the Western Conference title. Tom Matte quarterbacked the club with plays written on his wristband, subbing for injured QBs Johnny Unitas and Gary Cuozzo.

June 8, 1966 The National Football League and the American Football League announced plans to merge in 1970. The Colts, Browns and Steelers would later join the AFC in the NFL's realignment.

March 17, 1967 Harry Hulmes, Colts' publicity director, was named general manager, succeeding Joe Campanella, who passed away on February 15 after 23 days in the GM capacity.

November 5, 1967 The Colts defeated the World Champion Packers, 13-10, snapping a five-game losing streak to Green Bay.

August 3, 1968 Art Donovan became the first Colt inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

December 29, 1968 The Colts shut out the Browns, 34-0, for the NFL Championship. Earlier, the Colts had defeated Green Bay, 16-3, and Minnesota, 24-14, for the Western Conference crown.

January 12, 1969 The Jets defeated the Colts, 16-7, in Super Bowl III at the Orange Bowl after Joe Namath "guarantees" a New York victory.

April 3, 1970 Don Shula resigned to become head coach of the Miami Dolphins, and was succeeded by Don McCafferty. In January, Don Klosterman was named general manager.

September 20, 1970 The Colts beat San Diego, 16-14, to win first AFC game in the newly realigned NFL.

December 13, 1970 The Colts clinched their first AFC Eastern Division title with a 20-14 win at Buffalo.

December 26, 1970 The Colts beat Cincinnati, 17-0, in divisional playoff game.

January 3, 1971 The Colts beat the Oakland Raiders, 27-17, to win the AFC championship.

January 17, 1971 Jim O'Brien kicked a 32-yard field goal with five seconds to play as the Colts won Super Bowl V over Dallas, 16-13, in the first-ever AFC-NFC Super Bowl.

January 2, 1972 Miami beat Baltimore, 21-0 in the AFC title game. The Colts had defeated Cleveland, 20-3, in the AFC playoffs to advance to the conference championship.

July 26, 1972 Robert Irsay acquired the Colts from Carroll Rosenbloom in exchange for the Los Angeles Rams. Joe Thomas was named general manager.

July 29, 1972 Gino Marchetti was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

October 16, 1972 John Sandusky replaced Don McCafferty as head coach after the fifth game of the season.

February 14, 1973 Howard Schnellenberger was named head coach.

July 28, 1973 Raymond Berry and Jim Parker were inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

September 29, 1974 Joe Thomas replaced Howard Schnellenberger as head coach.

January 15, 1975 Ted Marchibroda was named head coach.

August 2, 1975 Lenny Moore was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

December 21, 1975 Colts won the first of three straight AFC East Division crowns by defeating New England, 34-21, at Memorial Stadium. The season capped the greatest turnaround in NFL history (at that time), as Marchibroda led the Colts to a 10-4 mark after the team was 2-12 in 1974.

December 12, 1976 The Colts won their second straight AFC East crown by defeating Buffalo, 58-20, in last home game of regular season.

January 25, 1977 Dick Szymanski was named general manager and Ernie Accorsi assistant general manager.

December 18, 1977 The Colts won their third straight AFC East title with a 30-24 win over New England that featured a 99-yard game-winning TD drive, longest in team history.

July 28, 1979 Johnny Unitas was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, a year after Weeb Ewbank.

January 16, 1980 Mike McCormack was named head coach, replacing Ted Marchibroda.

December 21, 1981 Frank Kush was named head coach.

May 16, 1982 Ernie Accorsi was named general manager.

April 26, 1983 The Colts selected John Elway with the first pick in the NFL draft, but traded him on May 2 to Denver for OT Chris Hinton, QB Mark Herrmann and Denver's top pick in 1984.

December 18, 1983 In the last NFL regular season game in Memorial Stadium - until this year - the Colts beat the Houston Oilers, 20-10. TE Pat Beach scored the last TD of the game on a 12-yard pass from Mike Pagel.

March 28, 1984 The Colts' franchise relocated to Indianapolis.

November 6, 1995 The Cleveland Browns announced their intention to move to Baltimore for the 1996 season.

February 9, 1996 NFL approves franchise move.

February 15, 1996 Ted Marchibroda was named Baltimore's head coach exactly 21 years and one month to the date he was hired by the then-Baltimore Colts.

March 29, 1996 Baltimore's NFL franchise was officially named the Ravens after a *Baltimore Sun* telephone poll received a record number of calls supporting the name Ravens.

April 1, 1996 The Ravens opened operations at the Owings Mills training facility with the start of the offseason program.

April 20, 1996 The Ravens selected UCLA offensive lineman Jonathan Ogden with their first-ever draft choice (fourth overall). University of Miami linebacker Ray Lewis is selected with the second pick in the first round (26th overall).

May 16, 1996 Ravens announced season ticket and personal seat license policies in a press conference at Memorial Stadium.

June 5, 1996 Ravens unveiled their new logo, colors and uniforms in a fashion show at Harborplace.

June 14, 1996 The Ravens sold over 50,000 season tickets in 14 days.

September 1, 1996 The Ravens first-ever regular season game is played before 64,124 fans at Memorial Stadium, the largest crowd in Baltimore's professional sports history. QB Vinny Testaverde scores the first touchdown on a nine-yard run to propel the Ravens to a 19-14 win over the Oakland Raiders.

December 22, 1996 The Ravens concluded their inaugural season with a 4-12 record following a 21-24 loss to the Houston Oilers. The Ravens were 4-4 at home, but 0-8 on the road. The team sold out all 10 home games, including the two preseason games. Baltimore held a second-half lead in 10 of its 11 final games, but won only two. QB Vinny Testaverde was voted to the Pro Bowl after throwing for 4,177 yards and 33 touchdowns. WRs Michael Jackson and Derrick Alexander both eclipsed the 1,000-yard receiving mark and combined for 23 TD receptions.

Ravens' Name Origin

On Friday, March 29, 1996, Baltimore's NFL team became the Ravens.

It was only after extensive research, exhaustive panel discussions, focus groups and fan polling that the name Ravens prevailed. In the end, though, it was none other than the exuberant Baltimore football fans who voiced their opinions and named the team after a mythical bird in a famous poem.

"In there stepped a stately Raven of the
saintly days of yore;
Not the least obeisance made he; not a
minute stopped or stayed he;
...Quoth the Raven, 'Nevermore.'"

— *Edgar Allan Poe, 1845*

According to *The Baltimore Sun*, a record-breaking 33,748 callers telephoned their vote to Sundial, a popular feature of the local newspaper where readers can interact with the medium and express opinions by telephone. The fan poll began one day prior to the naming of the team and closed at 10 a.m. on the day of the event—a mere two hours before team officials gathered with local VIPs and fans at the Amphitheater at Harborplace to announce the results.

"The name tested very well with the people of Baltimore in all of the studies we conducted and those polls done before we came here," David Modell, assistant to the president, explained. "It gives us a strong nickname that is not common to teams at any level, and it gives us one that means something historically to this community."

The raven is a large (22-27 inches long), powerful bird known for its sleek black feathers that look almost purple in certain lighting. It's been described in various encyclopedias as a "strong, soaring flier able to perform acrobatics," and a "bird that is mentioned in myths and legends as magical" and a "soaring bird that can be taught to speak."

The three finalists in *The Sun* poll included the Ravens, Americans and Marauders. The tally was Ravens- 22,463; Americans- 5,635 and Marauders- 5,650. The previous Sundial record of 14,249 calls was set in 1993, over a three-day period, when readers were asked to name a potential expansion NFL team and chose the name Ravens. "The first promise we made was we would bring this back to the fans in some way. That was important to us."

On June 5, 1996, the team announced its colors—black, purple and metallic gold—at a noon fashion show at the Gallery Mall before a record-breaking crowd of more than 4,000. The Ravens' 1997 uniforms, with some adjustments from the 1996 version, follows on the next page.



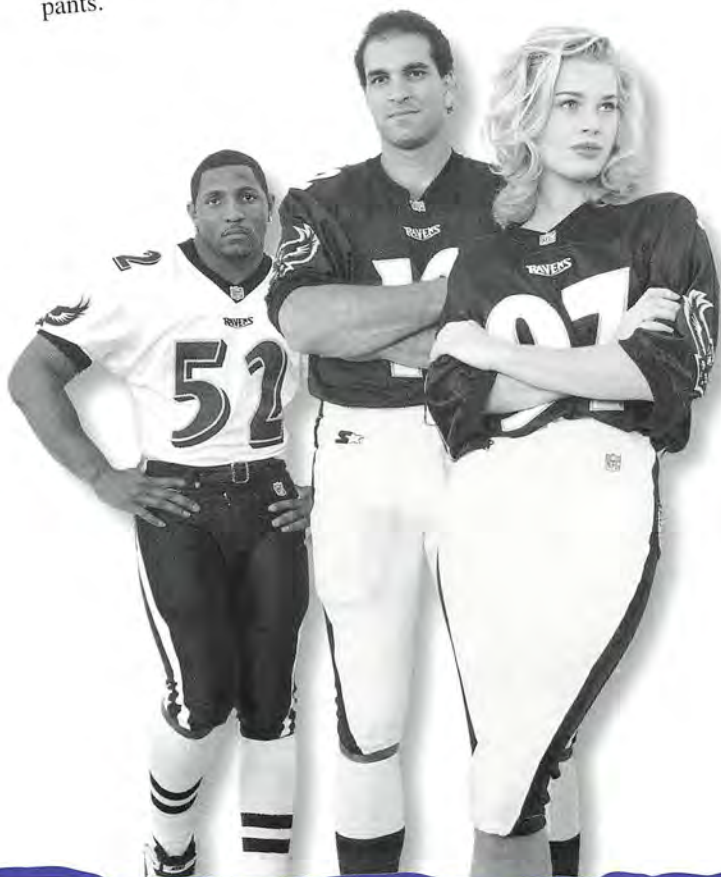


THE 1997 JERSEY

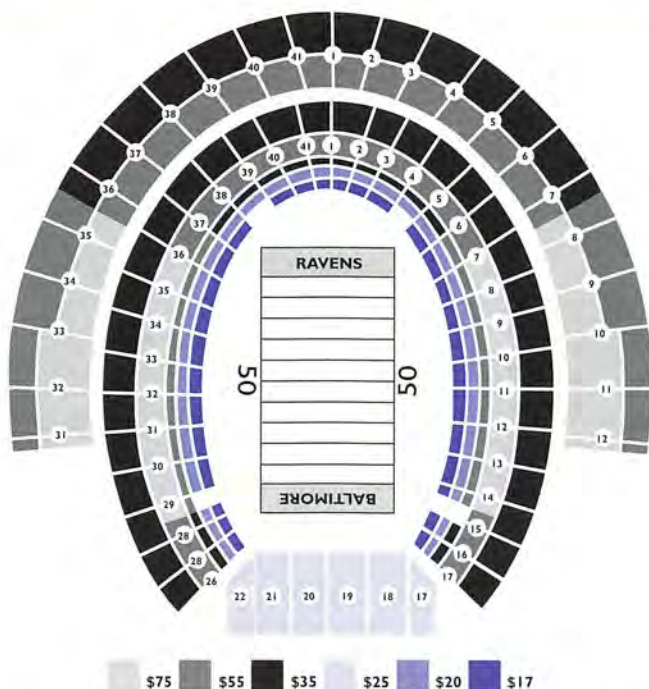
Numbers carry a drop shadow and are 1-inch larger on the front and 1½ inches larger on the back. The numbers are modified so that the “wings” are gone to make them more legible. The purple jersey is worn at home with white pants, while the “road jersey” is white, showing the black pants.

THE 1997 PANTS

The Maryland patch is larger and is shown on both sides of the hip. The home pants are white with purple side stripes inside a black stripe and the black pants have purple side stripes inside a white stripe. Last year, the Ravens only wore black pants with a solid white stripe.



Memorial Stadium



The 1997 season marks the Ravens' final season at Memorial Stadium. Last year, the Ravens sold out all 10 home games at Memorial, which has a proud and storied history. The stadium served as the home of the NFL Baltimore Colts in 1950; and from 1953 through 1983. The Baltimore Orioles played at Memorial from 1954 through 1991. The facility also hosted the Baltimore Stallions of the CFL in 1994 and 1995. The building was opened in 1954 with a capacity of 52,000.

Memorial Stadium was constructed on the site of the original Baltimore Municipal Stadium, which had a groundbreaking in 1922. Baltimore Stadium was completed in 1924 with a seating capacity of 80,000 and officially dedicated on November 29, 1924 when 80,150 fans attended the Army-Navy game.

Renovations and expansion have increased the Memorial Stadium capacity to 61,600. Obstructed view seats have been eliminated, thus reducing last season's capacity of 65,248. The old grass field has been replaced with SportGrass. The Ravens are the first team to install SportGrass, which has a 100% natural grass surface, but utilizes a synthetic surface below the field. The Green Bay Packers have installed SportGrass at Lambeau Field for the 1997 season, and the NFL Players' Association ranked SportGrass one of the top playing surfaces in the NFL.

The Ravens and the Maryland Stadium Authority have worked together to make many improvements and enhancements to the stadium for fan comfort and enjoyment. Specifically, the Ravens have added endzone seating and field seating to accommodate 12,000 more fans.

Baltimore's New Football Stadium



In 1998, the Ravens will move into their new stadium in downtown Baltimore. Some facts and figures:

LOCATION: At the south end of Camden Yards, the site is surrounded on all sides by elevated roadways, including I-95 and the Hamburg Street Bridge to the north, I-95 and I-395 ramps to the east, the Ostend Street Bridge to the south, and Russell Street viaduct to the west. SEATING CAPACITY: 68,400; in three distinct levels with 7,800 club seats and 108 luxury suites included.

LUXURY SUITES: 108; all located on two levels at the sidelines with potential growth of an additional 38 suites with exclusive suite holder entry lobbies. All 108 suites accommodate either 24 or 20 patrons and, as a whole, will be the most spacious in the NFL.

CLUB AREAS: 7,800 club seats that are serviced by independent and climate controlled club lounges with upscale amenities. Each sideline club lounge has unique character with views to the city skyline and surroundings. Club seats are wider with personal wait service at your seat for an uninterrupted view of the action on the field.

AMENITIES: The new stadium will have all the amenities expected of a modern stadium with: 60 over-sized restrooms conveniently distributed throughout each concourse. Fully ADA compliant. Retail outlets at each concourse; 245 permanent points of sale for food and beverage supplemented by numerous specialty food and beverage carts. Convenient ticketing locations outside the stadium with inside windows for advanced games sales. Numerous and convenient circulation choices to the upper levels of the stadium.

CONCOURSE: Extra wide concourses will make for comfortable and convenient movement of spectators within the stadium. The upper concourse will afford dramatic views of the skyline and surroundings from a vantage point never before experienced by the fan.

SIGHTLINES: All seats will have unobstructed views of the field in an arrangement which brings the fans as close to the action as possible. The upper seating tiers also allow views to the skyline and surroundings. The endzone upper seating tiers have been lowered, affording an opportunity to be closer to the action on the field.

SCOREBOARDS: The two scoreboard structures are integrated into the stadium to reduce overall mass and allow every fan an unobstructed view. Only the new TWA Dome in St. Louis has this updated feature. Each board will contain a video screen and active matrix for up-to-the-second information, as well as game clock and statistics.

SOUND SYSTEM: A distributed sound system that focuses the sound toward the fan and minimizes the impact to the surrounding areas. This system is considered the best in the industry.

LIGHTING: Improvements in lighting technology allow for stadium lighting that does not leak into the surrounding areas. Lights at the stadium, like theater lighting, will focus on a particular quadrant on the field: greatly eliminating the lighting outside the stadium.

LANDSCAPING: An integral landscaping plan that feeds off the existing plans at Oriole Park, yet creates a unique character to the stadium site. Large arrival plazas reinforce the entry points of the stadium, creating well-planned sequences of arrival.
