






# 2023 MEDIA GUIDE





### **ABOUT**

Representing New Jersey and New York, Gotham FC plays its National Women's Soccer League home matches at Red Bull Arena in Harrison, New Jersey.

Founded in 2007, Gotham FC originally debuted as Jersey Sky Blue and played in the United Soccer League's W-League. Later that year, it was selected to represent the New Jersey/New York metropolitan area in the newly founded Women's Professional Soccer (WPS) League set to begin operations in 2009. The Club rebranded as Sky Blue FC and won its first trophy in the inaugural WPS Championship in 2009.

Sky Blue FC was one of eight teams to join the National Women's Soccer League (NWSL) in 2012 following the disbandment of the WPS. It won its first NWSL playoff match since 2013 during the 2020 NWSL Challenge Cup. In April 2021, the Club underwent a major rebrand and officially changed its name to NJ/NY Gotham FC. The name, logo and colors were selected after extensive fan involvement and will guide the club into the future with bold international ambitions.

Most recently, Gotham FC advanced to the 2021 Challenge Cup Final against the Portland Thorns, the Club's first ever championship appearance in an NWSL competition. Gotham also reached the postseason for the first time since 2013 after a fifth-place regular season finish in 2021.



#### **TAMMY MURPHY**

CLUB CHAIR, OWNER


Tammy Snyder Murphy and her husband, Phil Murphy, have been owners of Gotham FC since the club's founding in 2008. The Murphys have guided the club through its membership in multiple professional women's leagues including, in 2013, when Sky Blue FC became a founding member of the National Women's Soccer League.

Serving as Chair of the club, Tammy provides strategic guidance on operational issues and collaborates with management on key personnel decisions.

Over the years, Tammy has worked with non-profits, a think-tank, and other organizations focused on the environment, education, women's health, the arts, and youth and family services. Tammy worked in finance in the U.S. and Europe and has traveled extensively throughout the world, living overseas in London, Frankfurt, Hong Kong, and Berlin. She speaks Italian and is fluent in German.

Tammy has always believed in collaborative problem-solving through coalition-building and personal engagement. It is a central theme of her life, whether running for student office during college, thriving in the competitive and male-dominated finance industry, starting and working with nonprofits, or joining the Women's March in Trenton. She is passionate that women and girls receive treatment equal to that of men and boys. Tammy earned a Bachelor of Arts in English and Communications at the University of Virginia, where she sits on the University's Board of Visitors. She also serves as Secretary and charter member of The Climate Reality Action Fund, an organization founded by former Vice-President Al Gore.

Since January 2018, Tammy has served as the First Lady of the State of New Jersey.



#### PHIL MURPHY

**OWNER** 

Born in Boston, Phil Murphy and his family have called Monmouth County, New Jersey, home for two decades. A graduate of both Harvard University and the University of Pennsylvania, he made his career in financial services, and worked around the world. Since his retirement from business in 2003, he and Tammy have immersed themselves in charitable works and public service.

From 2009 until 2013, Phil served with distinction as the United States Ambassador to the Federal Republic of Germany, having been appointed by former President Barack Obama. He was the board chair of 180 Turning Lives Around, a Monmouth County organization committed to ending domestic and sexual violence.

Along with Tammy, he founded 2nd Floor, a successful teen helpline. He also served as New Jersey's sole representative on the national operating board of the NAACP. Since 2018, Phil has served as the Governor of New Jersey. He and Tammy have been married for 25 years. They have four children.



#### **STEVEN TEMARES**

**OWNER** 

Steven Temares was born in the Bronx, New York, and raised in Paramus, New Jersey. He joined the club's ownership group prior to the club's professional debut in 2009 as a member of the NWSL's predecessor league, Women's Professional Soccer (WPS). In his first year as an owner, Sky Blue won the championship in the inaugural WPS season.

Steven formerly served as CEO of retail giant Bed Bath & Beyond, where he was responsible for day-to-day operations of the company and its subsidiaries for twenty-two years. He currently serves on the Advisory Board for Beastcoast, a professional eSports organization that emphasizes gamer interests, well-being, and happiness and focuses on celebrating the diversity of the gaming community.

Steven is also a minority owner of Major League Baseball's New York Mets and sits on the team's Advisory Board.

He earned his Bachelor of Arts in Economics from Rutgers University - where he serves on the Board of Trustees - and his Juris Doctorate from the University of Pennsylvania Law School. Steven and his wife, Amy, have three daughters.



#### **BOBBY CHO**

**OPERATING OWNER** 

Bobby Cho is a partner at POA Partners, a diversified principal investment firm across public and private technology focused investments. Along with his wife, HyeMi, Bobby manages their family office, Starry Eyed Tomorrow, which invests in various industries with one simple goal - to make the world a better place.

Prior to these roles, Bobby spent most of his career helping to build venture-backed, financial technology companies.

Bobby is an active alumnus of Villanova University through his sponsorship of the Cho Family Endowed Scholarship for underrepresented students and sits on Villanova's Institute for Innovation and Entrepreneurship board.

A lifelong soccer enthusiast, Ed Nalbandian joined Gotham FC's ownership group in January 2020. He is a former high school, collegiate, and semi-professional player; a former professional youth soccer coach, and a devoted NWSL, Major League Soccer, and Premier League fan.

As the club's Vice Chair, a role that reports to Tammy, Ed is the lead owner on day-to-day club operations, collaborating closely with General Manager Yael Averbuch West and Acting President Nan Vogel.

Ed comes to Gotham FC with more than thirty-five years of executive experience. He served as a successful CEO of three IT services companies; held executive roles at IBM, AT&T, Cognizant, and Avaya, and was a finalist for Ernst & Young's Entrepreneur of the Year award in 2003.

Ed currently sits on the Board of Directors of Carousel Industries, a leading IT services company. He also authored the acclaimed IT services book, "The Managed Services Playbook," and was a founding member of the Board of Directors of the Technology Services Industry Association's Managed Services division.

Ed earned a Bachelor of Arts in Economics at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. He and his wife of 30 years, Tracy, have two children, Kellie and Eric.



#### **KRISTIN BERNERT**

SECOND CHAIR, OWNER

Kristin Bernert, along with business partner, Karen Bryant, joined Gotham FC's ownership group in March 2022. She also serves as Gotham FC's second chair on the NWSL's Board of Governors alongside Ed Nalbandian.

Bernert, who was named the President of Business Operations for the Columbus Crew of Major League Soccer in January 2022, also served as interim Chief Business Officer for Gotham FC in 2021.

As the former Executive Vice President, Sports Operations, Madison Square Garden Sports, Bernert was responsible for leading the business operations for Company's professional sports franchises - New York Knicks, New York Rangers, Westchester Knicks, Counter Logic Gaming and Knicks Gaming - including developing their overall commercial strategy, vision and goals, as well as managing business financial matters, building key strategic relationships, and leading fan as well as brand development.

During her decade-long tenure at MSG, also served as Senior Vice President, Business Operations, MSG Sports, where her role included strategic planning, budgeting and day-to-day team business operations, and led the New York Liberty's basketball operations and was responsible for player personnel, development and team performance.

Bernert has been recognized as a "Game Changer" by the Sports Business Journal for having a major impact on the sports industry. She has also been named to the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Hall of Fame Honor Roll and was enshrined in "The MAAC Experience" exhibit at the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, MA.

Prior to joining MSG, Bernert's roles in the sports industry included: President of the Los Angeles Sparks; Vice President of Team Marketing and Business Operations at the NBA; Vice President at the Detroit Shock; Assistant Marketing Director at Ohio State University; and Assistant Athletic Director at Bowling Green State University. Kristin played Basketball at and graduated from Siena College with a BA in Psychology and received an MA in Sports Management from The Ohio State University.



#### **KAREN BRYANT**

OWNER, OPERATING PARTNER

A top Senior Executive in the sports industry with over 25 years of experience leading world-class organizations and a passion for impact, Karen Bryant joined Gotham FC's ownership group in March 2022.

In 2021, Bernert and Bryant co-founded KB2 Sports, a consulting firm focused on driving investment and innovation in women's sports. KB2 Sports offers strategic guidance and collaboration with key stakeholders to identify and operationalize transformative growth for women's sports teams, leagues, media companies and properties.

With Bryant's leadership, KB2 Sports began working with Gotham FC in 2021 and helped the club develop strategic planning in various areas of the organization.

Her storied career in sports began in her role as General Manager for the Seattle Reign, managing operations for a start-up professional women's basketball franchise during the launch of the American Basketball League.

Bryant then began a 15-year tenure with the Seattle Storm, leading a range of business and operations roles and culminating in her serving as President and CEO for 6 years. Bryant successfully led the organization's transition from an NBA-affiliated team to an independently-owned team in 2008, achieving unprecedented financial performance and positioning the Storm as one of the premier franchises in the WNBA.

After leaving the Storm, Karen founded Suite J Consulting in 2014, a sports management consulting firm serving clients including the University of Washington, Seattle Sports Commission, City of SeaTac, Atlanta Dream, Nube9 and Seattle University. In 2017, Bryant entered the sports tech space as CEO of Atavus Sports, a coach education and performance analytics startup. Karen played basketball at Seattle University and University of Washington and graduated from UW with a BA in Communication.

#### **SUE BIRD**

**INVESTOR** 

Bird has a proven track record of success across her career. Her resume includes a historic five Olympic Gold Medals, four WNBA championships, four FIBA World Cups, five EuroLeague Women championships, and two NCAA championships. She has been selected to thirteen WNBA All-Star teams, eight All-WNBA teams, and was recently voted into the W25 as one of the WNBA's top 25 players of all-time.

A 2002 alumnus of the University of Connecticut, Bird was drafted first overall by the Seattle Storm in the 2002 WNBA Draft. In June, Bird announced her upcoming retirement from her WNBA playing career at the conclusion of the 2022 season.

As an owner, Bird acts as a consultant and advisor to boost the club's profile in local, national, and international markets. She also collaborates with Tammy Murphy, Managing Owner Ed Nalbandian, and club leadership on a variety of club initiatives to promote the club and support its players and community.



#### **KEVIN DURANT**

INVESTOR

Kevin Durant is a 12-year NBA veteran and forward for the Phoenix Suns. He is a 2x NBA Champion and Finals MVP; having also won an NBA MVP Award, four NBA scoring titles, two Olympic gold medals, two NBA All-Star Game MVP Awards, and an NBA Rookie of the Year Award. He is also a ten-time NBA All-Star.

Off the court, Durant is co-founder and president of Thirty Five Ventures alongside his business partner Rich Kleiman. Founded in 2017, Thirty Five Ventures Thirty Five Ventures incorporates the duo's business entities across sports, tech, media, philanthropy and more.

Thirty Five Ventures' flagship media property is The Boardroom, a sports business platform that includes video interviews & infographics, The Boardroom University college program, events, an e- newsletter and a podcast network. Other recent Thirty Five Ventures initiatives include: the recently debuted BASKETBALL COUNTY: In The Water documentary on SHOWTIME and the upcoming basketball-themed scripted series "SWAGGER" with Imagine Entertainment and Apple; an equity partnership with premium audio brand Master & Dynamic; a minority stake in and consulting agreement with the Philadelphia Union; and the Durant Center, a state-of-the-art educational and leadership facility in Durant's hometown in Prince George's County, Maryland.

The Kevin Durant Charity Foundation's signature programs include Build It and They Will Ball, a global basketball court renovation project with 22 courts completed to date, and The Durant Center, a 10-year, 10-million dollar program in partnership with College Track that helps low-income and underserved students enroll and graduate from college. Durant received the season long NBA Cares Community Assist and ESPN Muhammad Ali Sports Humanitarian awards in 2018.

#### **PETE GUELLI**

**INVESTOR** 

Pete Guelli has more than two decades of experience as a professional sports executive. Prior to being named Chief Commercial Officer of the Giants, Guelli served as the Senior Vice President of the NFL's Buffalo Bills and the Chief Operating Officer of the NBA's Charlotte Hornets.

During his ten-year tenure with Hornets, Guelli oversaw the return of the historic Hornets brand and helped the franchise surpass more than \$1 billion in value.

As an owner of Gotham FC, Guelli's focus will be to support the club, its players, and fans by working with leadership and his fellow owners to enhance existing efforts to elevate the club's local, national and international profile.



#### **CARLILLOYD**

**INVESTOR** 

Two-Time Olympic Gold Medalist and Two-Time World Cup Champion Carli Lloyd is a former soccer legend who played for the U.S. Women's National Soccer Team for 17 years (2005-2021). Carli was awarded the most prestigious and highest award in soccer: FIFA World Player of the Year (2015 and 2016); only one other American player has received the award twice.

She was best known for her clutch performances in the biggest moments, but it was Lloyd's consistent production over the course of her career, her extreme dedication to the game and her relentless pursuit of self-improvement that perhaps best exemplifies her contribution to U.S. and world soccer history.

Carli is a two-time Olympic Gold Medalist (2008 and 2012) and a Bronze Medalist (2020). She holds the unique distinction of scoring in every Olympic medal match, including the 2008 gold medal match against Brazil, a brace in the 2012 gold medal game against Japan, and a brace in the 2020 Bronze medal game against Australia. Carli holds the record for All-time leading scorer in USWNT Olympic history with 10 goals. She is the only American player to score in four different Olympics (2008, 2012, 2016, 2020).

She also competed in four Women's World Cup tournaments (2007, 2011, 2015, and 2019), and is a two-time World Cup Champion (2015 and 2019). She became the first player in FIFA Women's World Cup to Score a Hat Trick in a World Cup Final (2015). She was awarded the Golden Ball (MVP) and Silver boot at the 2015 World Cup. Carli played in more World Cup (25) and Olympic matches (22) than any other USWNT player. She scored 134 goals, in 316 Caps (games played), which ranks 3rd All-time on the international stage for men and women.

Carli is a role model who empowers and inspires others to be Better Every Day and to never give up on achieving their goals. Carli also runs her own CL10 Soccer Clinics for ages 8-18 years of age for both boys and girls. The bestselling author of When Nobody Was Watching, Carli empowers audiences to find their own success with lessons from both in and beyond the world of sports.

Rich Kleiman is the co-founder of Thirty Five Ventures and longtime manager of Kevin Durant. Founded in 2016, Thirty Five Ventures incorporates the duo's business entities across sports, tech, media, philanthropy and more.

The Thirty Five Ventures umbrella includes the sports business media network Boardroom; an investment portfolio with over 75 companies, including Acorns, Coinbase, Dutchie, Overtime, Dapper Labs/NBA Top Shot, Postmates, OpenSea, and more; a film/TV arm with projects including the documentary seriesIn the Water (SHOWTIME), the Academy Award-winning Two Distant Strangers(Netflix),and the critically acclaimed scripted series "SWAGGER" (Apple TV+); a minority stake in MLS team Philadelphia Union, and management of Kevin Durant's on-and-off court business.

Kleiman also serves as the Executive Director of the Kevin Durant Charity Foundation, helping oversee the development and expansion of the Durant Center in Maryland's Prince George's County. KDCF has also partnered with the College Track program in its first DC area presence, and has built or refurbished over 25 basketball courts throughout the globe.

Kleiman sits on the Board of Directors at New Heights Youth, Inc., a non-profit dedicated to sports-based youth development and education in New York City. He is also very active in volunteering and fundraising for Coalition for the Homeless.

In 2013, Kleiman helped launch Roc Nation Sports, where he served as Vice President of the sports agency founded by Jay-Z. He worked with athletes such as Victor Cruz, CC Sabathia, Skylar Diggins-Smith, Robinson Cano, and more. Kleiman started with Roc Nation in 2008 as a music manager representing artists and DJ/Producers like D Nice, Mark Ronson, Solange, Wale, and Meek Mill.

Kleiman's career in entertainment began at renowned production company Radical Media, where he was a music supervisor, as well as a producer on projects such as Jay-Z's feature-length documentary Fade To Black.



#### **ELI MANNING**

**INVESTOR** 

Drafted first overall in the 2004 NFL Draft, Eli Manning retired from football in January of 2020 after a remarkable 16-season career with the New York Giants. He is a two- time Super Bowl champion and MVP who holds the Giants' franchise records for passing yards, touchdown passes, and completions.

In 2016, Manning won the Walter Payton Man of the Year Award for spearheading Hackensack University Medical Center's "Tackle Kids' Cancer" and other children's health initiatives.

As an owner, Manning will act as a consultant and advisor to boost the club's profile in local, national, and international markets. He will also collaborate with his fellow owners and club leadership on a variety of club initiatives to promote the club and support its players and community.

#### **NAN VOGEL**

ACTING CLUB PRESIDENT

Nan Vogel serves as Acting President of Gotham FC. In her role, she oversees all divisions of business operations.

Vogel joined Gotham FC as Senior Vice President of Partnerships, In-Game Experience, and Community in September 2022 and was promoted to Acting Club President in February 2023.

Prior to Gotham FC, Vogel spent more than eleven years in a series of leadership roles in the Partnership Marketing and Integrated Media Solutions departments in the league office of Major League Soccer and Soccer United Marketing. Among her many responsibilities at SUM, Vogel most recently oversaw MLS' emerging media partnerships as well as the relationship with the U.S. Soccer Federation and associated partnerships, including presenting partner Volkswagen. She previously led the Marketing Operations team and Concacaf partnership leading up to the 2021 Concacaf Gold Cup.

As Senior Vice President, Marketing + Brand, Jonna Valente leads the Gotham FC marketing division, which includes brand marketing, digital marketing, creative direction, merchandise, and product development.

Valente joined Gotham FC in October 2022 after serving as Vice President of Communications for the Washington Spirit of the NWSL.

In 2018, Valente founded the brand agency Juniper & Berkeley, which was designed to serve professional athletes who desire to make an impact within and beyond sports. The agency provided media strategy, brand development, business venture advising, content development, partnerships, and media licensing support to athletes such as World Cup champion Kelley O'Hara, USWNT star Lynn Williams (both members of the current roster of Gotham FC), Olympian Ali Riley, WNBA star Angel McCoughtry, French Olympian Ysaora Thibus, and NBA All-Star Jaylen Brown, among others.

Prior to her work in the NWSL, Valente's prestigious previous roles include Head of Festival Marketing and Brand Lead at Moog Music, Manager of New Product Community Development at the Washington Post, and in The White House as a member of the Office of Presidential Speechwriting during the first term of President Barack Obama.

Valente began her career under the mentorship of the late Tim Russert, who ignited her desire to seek opportunities that leave a positive impact.

Valente earned a Bachelor of Arts at Wesleyan University and completed her MBA at Duke University's Fuqua School of Business. Alexa Fuentes joined Gotham FC as Senior Vice President of Ticket Sales and Service in December 2022. In her role, Fuentes is the architect of the ticket revenue strategy and oversees a team responsible for securing new and return ticket sales as well as Season Ticket Memberships and Founders Club Memberships.

Prior to joining Gotham FC, Fuentes held the position of Vice President of Sales and Service at Elevate Sports Ventures, where she spearheaded the strategic partnership with Circuit of the Americas and led the ticketing, premium sales, and service teams across multiple major events, including: the U.S. Grand Prix of Formula One, Moto GP, and live concerts at the Germania Insurance Amphitheater in Austin, Texas.

Between tenures at MLS and the Red Bulls, Fuentes spent three years from 2016-2019 at the sports and entertainment experience company Legends, where she arrived as a manager and elevated to roles as a Director and General Manager. During her time with Legends, Fuentes provided strategy and support to the U.S. Tennis Association to increase sales at the U.S. Open of premium inventory, including Luxury suites and the launch of new hospitality areas. She also oversaw sales operations at One World Observatory.

Fuentes earned her Bachelor of Arts degree at Drexel University. She lives in Jersey City with her dog Bogie.



#### **CHRISTA MANN**

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, COMMUNICATIONS

Christa Mann joined Gotham FC as Senior Vice President, Communications in January 2023. In this role, Mann serves as the club's primary spokesperson and media stakeholder, as she develops and executes the strategic plan to increase the Gotham FC's visibility through media coverage globally, nationally, and in the New York-New Jersey area.

A former professional and collegiate soccer player, Mann's lifelong long passion for the sport has developed into a career. She joined Gotham FC from Major League Soccer, where she spent more than six years in a variety of communications leadership roles at the league office in Manhattan. During her tenure, MLS experienced its most rapid growth period from 20 to 29 clubs and experienced a significant increase in fan engagement and press coverage.

Among her many responsibilities at MLS, Mann served as communications stakeholder for league media partners FOX and CBS, and she provided communications support for MLS Competition, the Diversity, Equity & Inclusion leadership team, and the Professional Referee Organization (PRO). She managed the communications strategies to launch new groundbreaking on-field initiatives, including Video Assistant Referee (VAR) implementation and concussion substitutions, and she facilitated media opportunities while on the ground at the MLS is Back Tournament when the entire league returned to play in a protected environment during the pandemic.

Mann played collegiately at Georgia State University, where she started every match of her college career, before embarking on a professional playing career in the Icelandic Women's Premier League (Landsbankindeild) in 2008. With Afturelding FC, Mann became the first female foreign athlete to garner the club's Player of the Year honors.

An English and conversational Spanish speaker, Mann earned her BA in Journalism at Georgia State and a Master of Sports Administration at Ohio University, along with several business and management certifications from McKinsey and Company.

While competing in the NWSL, Jenkins was actively preparing for a career off the field, which led to positions in the social media marketing department at the NWSL, as a coach at the Reign FC Academy and Harvard-Westlake School, and for Rise Management - a Los Angeles-based literary management company serving clients across film, television, comedy, and sports media.

Prior to joining Gotham FC, Jenkins also participated in an immersive program with the Fortune 100 insurance company Nationwide, in partnership with the NWSL, and she was involved with Voice in Sport (VIS) - a New York-based sports and advocacy company that inspires girls and young women in sports through a member-only platform connecting them to experts and pro athletes.

Jenkins began her professional playing career in 2017, when she was selected with the seventh overall pick in the NWSL Draft by the North Carolina Courage. Over her six seasons in the league with North Carolina, Kansas City, OL Reign, and Orlando, Jenkins scored 11 goals and added three assists in 83 her appearances. #### YAEL AVERBUCH WEST

GENERAL MANAGER AND HEAD OF SOCCER OPERATIONS

An accomplished business leader and former member of the U.S. National Team and standout collegiate and professional player, Yael Averbuch was named interim General Manager and Head of Soccer Operations of Gotham FC in August, 2021 and officially took over the position four months later.

Born in New York City and raised in Montclair, N.J., Averbuch developed as a player in youth programs in her home state before reaching the first of her two goals in the game: play for the University of North Carolina.

In her time at UNC, the Tar Heels won national championships in 2006 and 2008. Averbuch set the school record by starting 105 consecutive games, and she scored the fastest goal to begin a game in women's college soccer history (four seconds, against Yale in 2006). Among several honors during her collegiate career, Averbuch was named ACC Offensive Player of the Year in 2006, ACC Scholar-Athlete of the Year for women's soccer in 2007, and was voted First Team All-America three times by the NSCAA coaches. Averbuch received the ultimate honor when North Carolina retired her No. 17 after her senior year.

Averbuch achieved her other childhood dream by earning 26 caps as a member of the U.S. National Team between 2007 - 2013. When she took the helm at Gotham FC in 2021, Averbuch became the first former women's national team player to be named general manager of an NWSL club.

Averbuch was selected by Sky Blue FC with the fourth overall pick in the 2009 WPS Draft and went on to help lead the club to the league championship that year. She won another WPS title with the Western NY Flash in 2011.

After two years playing in Russia and Sweden - which included competing in the UEFA Women's Champions League in 2012 - Averbuch played in the NWSL for five years between 2014 - 2018. This included an NWSL championship in 2015 during her three seasons with FC Kansas City, and one season each with the Washington Spirit and Seattle Reign.

While still playing in the NWSL, Averbuch began her career as an entrepreneur and business leader. In 2016, she launched Techne Futbol - an innovative app providing personal training for soccer players of all ages, experience and skill levels - and remains owner of the business today. In 2017, she founded the NWSL Players Association and served as the organization's first president and, later, its first executive director.

Now that she has come full circle as GM and Head of Soccer Operations for NJ/NY Gotham FC, Averbuch has returned to Montclair, where she lives with her husband and two children.



#### **JUAN CARLOS AMORÓS**

HEAD COACH

Juan Carlos Amorós was named Gotham FC head coach on November 1, 2022. The 38-year-old Amorós, who last season led the Houston Dash as their interim head coach to a fourth-place finish and the team's first-ever NWSL playoff appearance, has been signed by Gotham FC to a three-year contract.

Amorós brings a wealth of experience across global soccer to Gotham FC, having served as a head coach of clubs in the top leagues in Spain, England, and the U.S. Prior to his stint in Houston, Amorós was coach of Real Betis Féminas from 2021 - 22 and led them to a club-record unbeaten streak in Spain's top division.

Before Real Betis, Amorós enjoyed enormous success as a coach in England. Over five years, he helped lead Tottenham Hotspur FC Women from the third tier in England to the FA Women's Super League. In 2019, Tottenham was promoted to the Super League after finishing second in the second-division FA Women's Championship League. He earned Manager of the Year honors that season, and won the same honor while coaching Tottenham Hotspur in the third-division FA Women's National League.

In the 2022 NWSL season, Amorós began his tenure as interim head coach of the Houston Dash on July 16 with a 4-1 win over Chicago. He led Houston to a 6-3-2 record as the club earned the first playoff berth in its nine-year history.

Amorós holds a UEFA PRO license - the highest-level UEFA license attainable - and received a diploma in Football Management from the League Managers Association Institute of Leadership and High Performance. He has also participated in elite coaching courses with the Royal Spanish Football Federation, and in 2018 earned a Master of Business Administration from Autonomous University of Madrid.



#### **JEN LALOR**

ASSISTANT COACH

Jen Lalor joined Gotham FC in 2023. In addition to her duties as assistant coach, Lalor also will play an integral role for Gotham FC with the club's player development pipeline. Lalor won the bronze medal with the USWNT at the FIFA Women's World Cup in 1995 and played professionally in Japan, Denmark and Sweden. She also played in the first women's professional league in the U.S. (Women's United Soccer Association) with the New York Power and San Diego Spirit. At Santa Clara University, Lalor was the first women's soccer player in school history to earn a full athletic scholarship and was later inducted into the SCU Athletic Hall of Fame. Lalor has worked extensively at U.S. Soccer in the youth national team system as a coach, scout, technical advisor, and club development manager. As a head coach, she has led two teams to national championships: San Diego SeaLions of the WPSL in 2013, and Albion SC San Diego U16 in 2022.



#### SHAUN HARRIS

ASSISTANT COACH

Prior to joining the staff of Gotham FC in 2023, Shaun Harris spent the last twelve seasons with Tottenham Hotspur, including years when Amorós was Head Coach of the women's team. As a senior member of the staff within the club's Global Football Development team, he traveled around the world to deliver coaching education and player development programs and help implement coaching curriculums within national football associations. More recently, as lead technical coach, Harris played an integral role in helping Tottenham Hotspur Women reach fifth place in the table in 2021-22, their highest-ever finish in the Women's Super League.



#### **AK LAKANI**

ASSISTANT COACH

Ak Lakhani joined Gotham FC in 2023 from the Jamaican Football Federation, where he was the head of United Kingdom recruitment for the Women's U17, U20 and Senior Women's national team. He is also the assistant coach of the Jamaican Women's National Team that will compete in the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup, and was assistant coach when the team won the bronze medal at the 2022 Concacaf Women's Championship in Mexico. Lakhani was part of Amorós' coaching staff during his successful tenure at Tottenham Hotspur Women's FC when the club earned back-to-back promotions. He has also worked at Tottenham Hotspur Academy and Leyton Orient Academy, and he was one of 150 coaches in the UK to be awarded a Medal from Prince William for "Outstanding Contribution to Football."



#### **ADRIÁN BENÍTEZ JIMÉNEZ**

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH

Prior to joining Gotham FC in 2023, Adrián Benítez Jiménez was Head of Performance for Real Betis in Spain's First Division women's league (Liga F) - where he worked with Amorós, a former head coach of Real Betis - and as rehabilitation coach at Real Betis Academy. Among his previous roles, Jiménez was a fitness coach and Academy strength and conditioning coach at Córdoba FC and Marcet Football Academy, and he has also worked with Girona, Real Betis' men's team, Atlético de Madrid Academy, the Argentinian Men's National Team, Basel FC, Granada FC, RCD Mallorca, and Cádiz FC.



#### **JESÚS BOTELLO HERMOSA**

HEAD OF TACTICAL ANALYSIS

Jesús Botello Hermosa joined Gotham FC in 2023 after previously serving as an assistant coach with Real Betis, where his focus was on tactical analysis and designing of game strategies. It was during his time with Real Betis that he worked with Amorós as the club became a competitive force in LIGA F. Botello Hermosa has also served as head of tactical analysis for CD Ronda in Spain, was co-founder and a professor of Sports Management and Sports Scouting at the Royal Football Federation, and was a professor in High Performance in football as well as a coach educator for the Royal Spanish Federation. Botello Hermosa has worked in the broadcasting industry as a La Liga analyst for Mass Media and Real Betis TV, and he is an author of books on tactical analysis.



#### PHILLIP CONGLETON

HEAD OF SPORTS SCIENCE

Phillip Congleton has been with Gotham FC since 2020. Prior to joining the club, Congleton served as High Performance Coach for the women's soccer team at James Madison University while earning his Master of Science in Exercise Physiology. His duties included interpreting health analytics and video analysis to monitor players' physical performance during games and training sessions. Congleton used this data to implement training, return-to-play, injury prevention and recovery protocols designed to enhance player performance. He was also a Strength and Conditioning Coach for Mary Baldwin University Women's Soccer Team in 2017.

#### **FULL 2023 COMPETITION GUIDELINES**

Highlights Include 2023 Competition Calendar, Increased Salary Cap and Allocation Allotments, Under-18 Entry Mechanism

**NEW YORK (March 20, 2023)** - The National Women's Soccer League today released the 2023 Competition Manual. The full manual is available <a href="here">here</a>.

Each team has a minimum of \$1,975,000 available to spend on a 22-26 player roster for the 2023 season. This includes the \$1,375,000 salary cap plus \$600,000 in Allocation Money. Unused Allocation Money from 2022 may also be carried forward to 2023. The new spend marks a 25 percent increase from the 2022 campaign.

Introduced in 2019, Allocation Money is financial credit that a team may purchase within limits defined by the league each year or acquire from another team through a transaction. Allocation Money may be used to reduce the salary cap impact of a player's salary, pay a transfer fee or loan fee when acquiring a player outside the league, or trade to another team.

Introduced in 2022, the NWSL established a new entry mechanism for players under the age of 18 wishing to enter the league. With the consent of the player and their parent or legal guardian, teams may place eligible players on an Under-18 Entry List to be selected under the following criteria:

- Each team is limited to two Under-18 players between its senior roster and the Entry List;
- Players must be signed to a guaranteed contract within 30 days of being placed on the list and the contract term must run through the season in which the player turns 18;
- Players will occupy a full roster spot;
- Players may be placed on or called up from the list at any time during the season;
- Players may not be waived or traded until the player has turned 18 or the team has received consent from both the player and parent or legal guardian;
- Players may not be selected in the expansion process;
- Players must reside with a parent or legal guardian until their 18th birthday;
- Players must be citizens or permanent residents of the United States.

Under-18 Entry List slots are not tradeable.

Information regarding the NWSL Expansion Draft will be available at a later date.



#### **GOTHAM FC AND NWSL BROADCAST INFORMATION**

Matches during the NWSL Season will be available to fans on multiple platforms, including CBS Network Television, CBS Sports Network, Paramount+, TSN and TSN+, and NWSLSoccer.com.

CBS Sports' multiplatform coverage will feature all 176 NWSL matches this season.

Gotham FC's match on July 18 will serve as one of the league's six marquee matchups on the CBS Television Network, with live streaming available on Paramount+.

Gotham FC has two matches slated to appear on CBS Sports Network and eight matches airing on Paramount+, Paramount Global's subscription streaming service.

CBS Sports Network will air 23 matches across the regular season, playoffs and the Challenge Cup. Paramount+ will exclusively stream all additional NWSL matches live in the U.S, with a select number of those matches also streaming live on the CBS Sports Golazo Network, which launches on Tuesday, April 11.

In addition, all 2023 regular season and Challenge Cup matches will be streamed live internationally for free on NWSLSoccer.com. Match replays, highlights and additional NWSL produced content will also be available on NWSLSoccer.com. Additional international distribution information will be released prior to season kickoff.

The NWSL announced a partnership this year with Canadian sports broadcaster TSN to distribute NWSL matches, including the 2023 NWSL Championship, across its network in Canada this season. Live match coverage will air [in English] across TSN, TSN.ca, TSN+ and the TSN app.

In total, TSN+ will stream 58 matches throughout the 2023 season. TSN will also air both semifinal matches of the 2023 NWSL playoffs as well as the 2023 NWSL Championship.
